What do you think it means for you to "impress them on your children"?

This Scripture places high priority on the frequency of talking to our children about the commands of God. Think about how you might do this with your own parenting.

- At home?
- When you're out walking around?
- When you're lying down?
- When you're getting up?

What are other contemporary places that might be conducive for faith conversations? (For example, a car ride, at a sporting event, a hike or time spent at the park, etc.)
