THE ATTENTION OF THE COURTS IS DRAWN TO THE FOLLOWING:

- The recommendations of the boards and committees as amended and adopted by the General Assembly, as well as the various acts of the Assembly. (A complete list of these is being sent to the clerks of synods and presbyteries, and all courts are requested to respond to the appropriate body within the time limit on referrals. Presbyteries are requested to forward the list of referrals to the sessions within their bounds.)
- Nominations for Moderator of the 112th General Assembly: Each presbytery is
 invited to make up to two nominations, and these must be received by the Clerks of
 Assembly by November 30, 1985.
- Assembly adopted as an Interim Act new wording for Book of Forms sections 205 and 205.1. The revised wording can be found on pages 27 and 28 of the minutes of Assembly (Board of Ministry Recommendation 1, pages 360, 27-28).

REMIT D: That sections 205 and 205.1 of the Book of Forms be reworded to read as per the wording found on pages 27 and 28 of the Acts and Proceedings (Board of Ministry Recommendation 1, pages 360 and 27-28).

REMIT E: That section 205.2 of the Book of Forms be amended to read as per the wording found on page 342 of the Acts and Proceedings, but with the words "two full months" changed to read "three full months" (Board of Education and Reception Recommendation 15, pages 342-43 and 21).

REMIT F: That new section 232.1 be added to the Book of Forms as per the wording found on page 261 of the Acts and Proceedings (Clerks of Assembly Recommendation 4, pages 260-61 and 52).

REMIT G: That section 248.12 of the Book of Forms be reworded as per the wording found on page 337 of the Acts and Proceedings (Board of Education and Reception Recommendation 3, pages 337-38 andd 21).

FIRST SEDERUNT

At the City of Guelph, Ontario, and within Knox Presbyterian Church there, on Sunday, the second day of June, in the year of our Lord, one thousand nine hundred eighty-five, at seven-thirty o'clock in the evening:

Which place and time ministers and ruling elders, commissioners from the several presbyteries of The Presbyterian Church in Canada, convened pursuant to appointment of the General Assembly held in the City of Peterborough, Ontario, on the third day of June last year.

The Rev. J.P. Jones, minister of the host congregation conducted public service, assisted by the Rev. A.J. Calder, D.D., Moderator of the 110th General Assembly, who preached a sermon entitled, "What is Holding Us Back?", using the scripture text Romans 8:38. Also assisting were the Rev. J.W. Milne, assistant minister at Knox and Mrs. Elizabeth Bedrosian, an elder of the host congregation. According to appointment, Mr. Jones administered the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper. In this he was assisted by Dr. Calder and the Rev. Anne Yee.

ASSEMBLY CONSTITUTED

Thereafter, with prayer, Dr. Calder did constitute the General Assembly in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ, the only King and Head of the Church.

The 111th General Assembly of The Presbyterian Church in Canada wishes hereby to record its deep appreciation for the devoted service of Dr. J. Charles Hay upon his retirement from the position of Principal of Knox College.

In this capacity as in others, Dr. Hay has been a distinguished and faithful servant of the Church and of the College. He has undertaken his duties with great ability, a cheerful vitality and a refreshing sense of the humourous liberally applied to the otherwise serious business of running Knox College. Although the obligations incumbent upon the Principal of the College have increased in size and number with an expanded curriculum and an enlarged student body, Dr. Hay did not fail to accept these burdens as they came his way and to carry them responsibly. He has been prominently involved in the process and the success of the Restoration and Expansion Fund Campaign; the College has required of him much travelling and time spent at meetings for this purpose. These additional duties he undertook with notable effect and with a generous allotment of his time and energies. Those who have studied under him remember him with great affection and sincere respect, both for the manner and the substance of his teaching; he stands in the tradition of the great teachers with whom Knox College has been blessed.

The Faculty also recognized and valued highly his gifts of scholarship, teaching and administration, gifts which were enjoyed not only by the College but also by Toronto School of Theology, an institution in whose early formation he played an important role. In addition, Dr. Hay has employed his talents with distinction for the benefit of the Association of Theological Schools in Canada and the United States.

Let this brief minute therefore record that Dr. J. Charles Hay has served his Church and his College well, that his service is duly recognized by them, and that they acknowledge their great debt of gratitude to him, a debt which these mere words can but poorly reflect for the edification of those who would understand the high esteem in which this General Assembly holds James Charles Hay, B.A., M.A., B.D., Ph.D., D.D., Principal of Knox College.

With permission of Assembly, Mr. Ferguson submitted the following rewording for revised Book of Forms Sections 205 and 205.1:

The sections should be reworded as follows:

Any student in theology and candidate for the ministry of The Presbyterian Church in Canada, and studying in one of our Church's theological colleges may, on application in writing to the Clerk of the Presbytery of most recent certification, be taken on trials for license. The candidate may request for good and sufficient reason the permission of that presbytery to be taken on trials for license by: (1) the Presbytery in which the college is situated; or (2)

the presbytery of first certification if it be different from the presbytery of most recent certification. Such application should normally be made by the end of the first term of the graduating year. It is the responsibility of the applicant to ensure that the application or request is initiated in accordance with the above regulation.

Upon reception of such application or request, the presbytery of most recent certification shall determine to take the candidate on trials for license or grant the request if it deem it expedient and good cause is shown, and all relevant documents shall be transferred to the competent presbytery named in the request.

Recommendation 1, was adopted with reworded Book of Forms sections 205 and 205.1, ordered as an Interim Act and sent down under the Barrier Act.

Recommendation 2 (p. 363) was adopted.

Recommendation 3 (p. 364)

In the preamble to recommendation 3, guideline 1 was reworded: "In accordance with government regulations, the female church worker is entitled to a maternity leave of up to 17 weeks." The guidelines were furthered changed by the addition of a new paragraph numbered 7: "Presbyteries are reminded that they may appoint an interim moderator during the absence of the minister." Permission having been given for these changes, the Court adopted recommendation 3.

Consideration of the report of the Administrative Council was resumed, Mr. G.K. Crockford reporting.

Referral of Recommendation 19 (cont'd from p. 43)

Further to the Assembly's action on recommendation 19 of the Administrative Council, the Comptroller reported that the increased cost of an additional \$1,000 maximum pensionable earnings amounts to increases of approximately \$44,400 for congregations and \$29,600 for the General Assembly Budget. On this basis, the Administrative Council is of the opinion that we should maintain the maximum pensionable income at \$22,500. On motion of Mr. D.W. Stewart, duly seconded, the Assembly instructed the Administrative Council to implement the level of \$23,500 maximum pensionable income as of January 1, 1986.

Recommendations 20 through 22 (p. 211 & 212) were adopted.

Additional Motion

On motion of Mr. J.A. MacFarlane, duly seconded, the Court agreed that the General Assembly commend congregations for their generous support of the General Assembly Budget, particularly the response to the appeal to reduce the deficit; and that presbyteries be urged to accept the full allocations as determined by formula, and that presbyteries encourage strong congregations within their bounds to accept allocations greater than those determined by formula to compensate for the support available from weaker congregations.

ADMIN. COUNCIL REC. 1: THE TENTH GROUP (cont'd from page 13)

The report of the above named briefing session was presented by Dr. R.F.G. Campbell, Convener. On motion of Dr. E.F. Roberts, duly seconded, the report was received and considered. The report follows.

The Commissioner's Vision

Introduction

Presbyterians in this Assembly have visions! Their dreams are exciting. They believe in their Church and its future. Recognizing their reformed tradition based on the revelation of a loving God and the place of prayer and Scripture and their trust in Jesus Christ as their Lord and Saviour, they demonstrate an eagerness to reach out and be relevant and play a significant role in God's plan for His people.

These are some of the observations that your listeners gathered as they led feedback sessions at this Assembly. Each individual was asked to name five priorities that he/she would like to see adopted by the Church. Each commissioner shared these hopes with others in small groups. They looked to the future. They asked themselves: "What should the programs, policies, procedures and organization be in five years?" Commissioners were not asked "how" these priorities were to be implemented. The commissioners reacted favourably and enthusiastically to the opportunity to express their views. They appreciated being able to review their ideas with others in this way.

The Vision

With apologies to all those who took part, the following priorities seemed to float strongly to the top in the opinion of the three listeners. Our conclusions were drawn from listening to the discussions, reviewing the summaries handed in by each small group and reading personal submissions given at the conclusion of each group. (Documentation available)

- Develop an expanded, clearly identified program of evangelization of young people in Canada and overseas. Clearly this was the first priority offered.
- 2. Initiate a ministry of communication to present the views and position of The Presbyterian Church in Canada to its own constituency and to the world at large. In spite of the chairman's attempts not to emphasize the matter (he comes from the field of communication), the participants insisted that the perceived image of The Presbyterian Church in Canada requires definition and distribution through all forms of communication media, be they religious or secular. Accountability for this function should be established.
- 3. Develop a means to comment on the social issues of the day and to take part in the public discussion of the values of society. The determination of the participants to see this priority established was fascinating. Although trying to be positive throughout, the participants insisted that Presbyterian polity and structure and tradition not inhibit the attainment of such a priority.
- 4. Define for today and tomorrow the role of ministry. Here the participants were suggesting that the role of ministry be broadened to encompass a variety of ministries for professional church workers and laity together with a variety of opportunities for training in flexible formats. Especially of concern was the practical training of "the clergy" and the opportunities for lay people in short term, specialized service based on their demonstrated God-given gifts (visitation, music, pastoral care, etc.)
- Streamline the policy, procedures, practices and polity of the Church to enable the other priorities to be reached

Conclusions

The mandate of this committee prevents us from making more than two recommendations. We offer, however, some ideas for future recommendations.

- 1. That the Administrative Council be congratulated for establishing the 10th group.
- That thanks be extended to the participants for their willingness to share their vision.
- That an action group be established to consider and recommend how these priorities can be implemented.
- That the listening group of this Assembly discuss with the 112th Assembly the hope of this vision.

On motion of Dr. Roberts, duly seconded, the report as a whole of the special committee re the tenth group, with its recommendations, was adopted.

OVERTURES 19 AND 24 (cont'd from page 28)

The Assembly called for the report of the Special Committee re Overtures 19 and 24, which was given in by Mrs. S. Triantafillou, Convener. On her motion, duly seconded, the following report was received and its recommendations considered.

Overture 19 from Presbytery of London re Abortion (p. 460-61):

Because at this time it can only be assumed that the Government of Canada intends to abolish current restrictions upon therapeutic abortions, we make the following recommendation:

Recommendation 1

That the 111th General Assembly communicate to the Minister of Justice of Canada the Church's existing statements concerning abortion;

Recommendation 2

That presbyteries, sessions and congregations be encouraged to set before their communities constructive alternatives to abortion.

Recommendations 1 and 2 re Overture 19 were adopted.

Overture 24 from Session of St. Paul's Church, Peterborough, Ontario re Abortion (p. 463):

Recommendation 3

That the 111th General Assembly encourage presbyteries, sessions and congregations to study the matter of abortion, and recommend the resource material prepared by the Board of Congregational Life, namely "Abortion, a Christian Perspective" by Dr. George Tattrie.

Recommendation 4

That the Board of Congregational Life be requested to prepare a study guide to accompany the resource book, "Abortion, a Christian Perspective".

Dr. A. Calder moved, duly seconded, that recommendations 3 and 4 be referred to the Board of Congregational Life and the Committee on Church Doctrine and they be instructed to study Overture 24 as well as in vitro fertilization, genetic engineering, surrogacy and in fact all aspects of sexuality and report back to the 112th General Assembly. Motion to refer defeated.

Recommendations 3 and 4 were adopted.

Report as a Whole

On motion of Mrs. Triantafillou, duly seconded, the report of the special committee re Overtures 19 and 24, 1984, with its recommendations, was adopted and became the answer of the 112th General Assembly to the two Overtures.

OVERTURE 20 AND APPEAL 1 (cont'd from page 30)

The Assembly called for the report of the Special Committee re Overture 20 (p. 461) and Appeal No. 1 (p. 466), which was given in by Dr. D.G. Neil, Convener. On his motion, duly seconded, the following report was received and its recommendation considered.

That Overture 20 and Appeal No. 1 be answered in the following terms:

In Book of Forms section 182.1 and in recommendation no. 7 of the 111th General Assembly's Committee on Church Doctrine, the term "expenses" refers to all obligations properly undertaken by the synod or presbytery;

Each presbytery or congregation under the synod's or presbytery's jurisdiction ought to accept the portion which the Court asks it to assume.

In cases where there is a dispute about meeting such obligations, the Court may forgive a failure to fulfil this moral obligation.

Mr. D.A. Beaton moved in amendment, duly seconded, that the answer to Appeal 1 be "that the Synod has the right to call for subscriptions from all its members." Defeated.

The committee's recommendation was adopted, and became the answer of the 111th General Assembly to Overture 20, 1985 and Appeal No. 1, 1985.

EXTENDING DEBATE

Mr. J. McGurrin moved, duly seconded, that the sederunt continue until business is finished. Defeated.

MOTION TO ADJOURN

On motion of Mr. R.C. Garvin, duly seconded, the Court agreed to adjourn.

PERMISSION TO DISTRIBUTE

On motion of Mr. T.G.M. Bryan, duly seconded, permission was given to the Renewal Fellowship within The Presbyterian Church in Canada to distribute copies of "Channels" at the close of the sederunt.

ADJOURNMENT

Announcements having been made, the Moderator adjourned the Assembly to meet in Peter Clark Hall, University of Guelph on Friday, the seventh day of June, in the year

of our Lord, one thousand, nine hundred eighty-five at nine-thirty o'clock a.m., of which public intimation was given and the sederunt closed with the benediction by the Moderator.

NINTH SEDERUNT

At Guelph, Ontario and within Peter Clark Hall, University of Guelph there, on Friday, June 7th, in the year of our Lord, one thousand nine hundred eighty-five, at nine-thirty a.m., the General Assembly met pursuant to adjournment and was constituted with prayer by the Moderator.

The Assembly called for the report of the Committee on Business which was presented by Mr. G.E. Timbers, Convener. On motion of Mrs. M.A. Wilson, duly seconded, the report was received, considered, and being adopted the business of the sederunt so ordered.

YOUNG ADULT OBSERVERS

The Moderator called upon the Young Adult Observers to make a presentation and to lead in prayer. Their singing was superb. Their presentation included fresh insights into many conventional Assembly terms; for example, if an overture is something to do with music, is the prayer of an overture a hymn? The presentation also included practical and helpful ideas for orientation.

The Y.A.O.'s presented gifts of a humorous nature to the Moderator and Dr. Roberts.

On motion of Mr. J. Congram, duly seconded, the Court agreed to spread the text of the Y.A.O. presentation in the minutes. The following notes were received from the young people.

Introduction

Moderator, commissioners and resource people, it is my privilege to address the Court on behalf of the Young Adult Observers, otherwise known as the Yahoos. In discussions together it has been obvious that General Assembly has been a very positive growing and learning experience for each one of the Observers.

Through worship services, briefing sessions and the Assembly Court itself, we were able to gain an appreciation of the behind the scenes activities which allow our denomination to function properly. Also we were able to meet and discuss with ministers in both a formal and non-formal atmosphere and the friendships made have been very rewarding and entertaining.

Many of us came to General Assembly with visions of amendments, and amendments to amendments but as you'll see from the rest of our report we will all leave with visions of commendments.

BCL Recommendation 6

The Young Adult Observers of the 111th General Assembly applaud recommendation 6 of the Board of Congregational Life which will enable the Young Adult Observers of the 112th General Assembly to meet "one day prior to the opening of the General Assembly." (p. 329 & 20) We suggest that the following activities be included in the day's agenda.

The first is the introductions and beginning of friendships with other Y.A.O.'s. Equally important is the establishment of channels of communication between the youth and their specific resourcepersons and eventually other commissioners. It is also important that the Y.A.O.'s be briefed on the procedures and formalities of the court. An engaging way to do this is to form a mock court with the Y.A.O.'s participating in all capacities with outside counsel from informed and experienced members of the Church. As preparation for this exercise, the stitched minutes should be in the Y.A.O.'s hands at least two weeks prior to the General Assembly, earlier if possible. Prospective Y.A.O.'s should also be encouraged to borrow their minister's Book of Forms and to discuss any questions with their minister.

With all of the organizational activities taken care of on the Saturday, the time following the evening sederunts can be set aside for discussion, for special guests, the sharing of insights and feelings, relaxation, and sleep.

Positive Aspects of Our Experience

- We really enjoyed the ecumenical visitors both in and out of the Court. We encourage their participation in General Assemblies of the future.

- 4. Our free evening on Wednesday where we travelled to Crieff Hills for dinner and fellowship. We would like to express our thanks at this time to Knox Presbyterian Church, Guelph, Youth Group who provided the funds for our transportation.
- The way in which we were received by Commissioners and resource people who welcomed us to the Assembly, talked with us and gave us support and encouragement throughout our stay.
- 6. The committees that were set up by the Assembly to study youth and young people in regard to staff, resources and programmes which included 2 Y.A.O.'s, as well as the Volunteers in mission programmes.
- 7. Morning hymn sing and worship times.
- 8. Colour coded tags which allowed us the chance to identify on the first day other Y.A.O.'s.
- The 10th briefing session where visions of the Church were discussed.
- The light atmosphere during Assembly which, during the proper time, was well appreciated.
- We appreciate the efficiency, coolness and sense of humour of our no-frills Moderator.

Suggestion

The Y.A.O.'s would find it very helpful if they had a Glossary of the terms used at Assembly but are not in common everyday use. Some examples from this Assembly are: ancilliary; antinomianism; apostolic succession; barrier act; docket; notice of motion; Overture; point of privilege; sederunt; exegesis.

Prayer

With the permission of the Moderator, the Y.A.O.'s closed their presentation with prayer led by several Y.A.O.'s, each in a different language.

MINUTE RE DR. DONALD C. MACDONALD (cont'd from page 42)

On motion of Dr. G.E. Dobie, duly seconded, the following minute of appreciation was spread in the minutes:

This One Hundred and Eleventh General Assembly wishes to go on record, taking note of your many years of faithful service to our Lord and His Church.

The late Drs. Archie Thomson and Louis Fowler were your mentors, and you learned much from them. You were able to combine the knowledge of rules and procedures, exemplified in Archie Thomson, with the good humour of Louis Fowler, and often excelled them in these gifts.

As a Clerk of the Assembly, and beyond the call of duty, you travelled across the land to meet with synods and presbyteries; in this respect you have been unique among Clerks of Assembly. The Courts of the Church have often turned to you for help in matters of law and precedent. Many individuals also have found someone to whom they could turn and they knew their problems were held in strictest confidence.

When ministers have been faced with long term illness, having consulted with you, they found more consideration than they ever expected. Your concern for them and their dependents has given them reason to be thankful to God and to you for the wise use of benevolent funds.

We recognize, as well, your interest and care for the smaller congregations whom you visited regularly and to whom you brought hope and encouragement. We recognize the outstanding service you have rendered in many organizations relating to the Church Universal, viz - the Canadian Council of Churches, the World Alliance of Reformed Churches, and the World Council of Churches, giving our Church a high profile in these and other ecumenical circles.

While holding before us observance of the laws of the Church, this was presented with such grace and humour as to make it more palatable and easier to fulfill. Above all, we pay tribute to a humble Christian gentleman and express our appreciation of all you have contributed as a Clerk of the Assembly over the past fifteen years. We trust that in future years, whatever ministry the Lord has in mind for you it will provide a continual sharing of your many gifts, and that your faith and experience will go on blessing the Church you have loved and served so well.

After a standing ovation, Dr. MacDonald responded warmly with reminiscences and humour.

The Court agreed "that the 112th General Assembly meet on the first Sunday in June, 1986 at seven-thirty o'clock and be held in 1986 at London, Ontario with the opening sederunt to take place in New St. James Church, London and the other sederunts at the University of Western Ontario."

The committee also suggested for information that tentatively the 113th General Assembly in 1987 be held in Cornwall, Ontario.

The report as a whole of the special committee, with its recommendation, was adopted.

The Assembly called for the report of the Committee on Courtesies which was presented by Mrs. R. Syme, the Convener, on whose motion, duly seconded, the report was received, considered and adopted as follows:

The 111th General Assembly is one which will be remembered more for its smooth efficiency than for the issues before the Church in 1985. It has been an Assembly remarkable for its harmony and goodwill.

We wish to thank the minister, the Rev. J.P. Jones, the Kirk Session and the congregation of Knox Church, Guelph who worked very hard to set that tone in the opening worship and the sacrament of the Lord's Supper with its wonderful music and the stirring accompaniment of the trumpets. We heard the challenge of our retiring Moderator, Dr. Calder, to speak with prophetic voice on the great concerns of our time and to move forward in faith.

The hospitality of the people of Knox Church expressed itself also in the reception following worship and in the banquet on Monday evening. The transportation from place to place was smooth and efficient. Our friendly reception at the Legion Hall where the banquet was held, the quality and quantity of the food and the fine entertainment and inspiring messages all welcomed and supported us in our work. The organizational gifts within the congregation are especially evident when one contemplates the logistics of serving 450 commissioners, guests and friends, buffet style, a challenge that was met as smoothly and efficiently as if it happened every day.

Everything humanly possible was done, thanks to the Local Arrangements Committee, and those of us who got lost from time to time were just not paying attention to the signs.

As the Moderator has noted, if the briefing sessions have done their work well there will be either no discussion or a great deal of discussion. One of the reasons for the dispatch with which this Assembly was able to conduct its business was the quality of its briefing sessions. We are all grateful both for the members of boards and committees who served as resource people and for the group leaders who keep everything moving. We are particularly appreciative of Dr. R. Campbell and the listeners who facilitated the report of "The Tenth Group", an initiative which promises to yield fruit in years to come.

The worship services which began our days focussed our attention on the meaning of discipleship. We thank the preachers and those who participated, but especially we express our appreciation to the work of the ad hoc committee who worked out the liturgies, made all the arrangements and co-ordinated all the people. Carrie Doehring's ministry of music was a special gift to this Assembly.

We thank the Clerks and all those responsible for the orderly progress of the business sederunts. Particularly impressive was the efficiency of Doug Lowry and his computer in getting minutes and reports processed with speed and accuracy.

We have been blessed by the presence and the words of the ecumenical visitors in our midst. None of us will soon forget the eloquent testimony of Dr. Maker, of the Church's witness for justice and equality among all the people of South Africa.

Finally, we thank the Moderator, Dr. McLelland, both for his firm hand and his good humour as he led us through the business of the Assembly. We pray for his good health and for the health and strength of his wife Audrey in this busy year to which he looks forward. May God's blessing support and enrich him in his journeys in Canada and abroad, in the name of the 111th General Assembly of The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

COMMISSION RE MATTERS LEFT

On motion of Dr. E.F. Roberts, duly seconded, it was agreed to appoint a commission composed of the Moderator and Clerks to deal with matters uncared for, or omitted, or overlooked during the business of this Assembly.

CIVIL LAW AND THE COURTS OF THE CHURCH

With the indulgence of the Court, Mr. J.W. Cruickshank was permitted to submit the following motion which was seconded and adopted: "That the Assembly direct the Clerks to study the decision of the Lindenburger case and that they point out the serious implications of the decision for the courts of our Church."

TEXT OF MORNING WORSHIP SERVICES

On motion of Mr. D.M. Marple, duly seconded, the Court agreed that the texts of the sermons from morning worship services be printed and distributed to all commissioners. The Moderator stipulated that this would be done if practicable.

CLOSING OF ASSEMBLY

The Moderator extended his thanks to the Court and to those who had enabled him in his task this week. The business being finished, the Assembly rose to sing Psalm 122, "I joyed when to the house of God". The Moderator then stated:

"In the name of the Lord Jesus Christ, the only King and Head of the Church, and by the authority of this Assembly, I now dissolve this Assembly and appoint another General Assembly of The Presbyterian Church in Canada to meet in London in the Province of Ontario, and within New St. James Church there, on the first Sunday in June, in the year of our Lord, one thousand nine hundred eighty-six, at 7:30 o'clock in the evening, local time."

The Moderator then closed the session with the Apostolic Benediction.

ADMINISTRATIVE COUNCIL

To the Venerable, the 111th General Assembly:

The spring 1985 meeting of Council opened with a service of worship. The sermon was entitled, "The God of the Impossible" and the text was taken from Genesis 18:14, "Is anything too hard for the Lord?" These were appropriate words for Council as it dealt with the realities of the past year and tried to develop plans for the future. A \$473,599 deficit at the end of the year and all that this implied was discouraging. The need to trim proposed 1985 authorized expenditures by 12.2 percent to cover the deficit as well as the adjustment required to 1985 estimated revenue, was even worse. However, hope and assurance comes in the realization that we serve "the God of the Impossible" and that truly nothing is too hard for the Lord. The deficit has hurt, but Council realized that the deficit has set in motion changes that are long overdue, changes which under God will result in a strengthened witness for our Church.

BRIEFING SESSIONS AT 111th GENERAL ASSEMBLY

Among the responsibilities assigned to the Administrative Council by the General Assembly is to "recommend policy, submit short and long range plans, co-ordinate and recommend a realistic and balanced budget, and generally present the current and future needs of the permanent departments, boards and committees to the General Assembly." In order to fulfill such responsibilities, it is important that Council seek guidance from presbyteries and synods. Also, wherever feasible, it should avail itself of opportunities to hear what "grass roots Presbyterians" have to say about the Church, what it is doing, as well as what it should do.

Each time the General Assembly meets some 270 commissioners come from across Canada. They participate in the decision making process which covers business brought to the Assembly by way of overture, memorial, petition, and reports from boards and committees. Apart from informal "bull sessions", there is practically no opportunity for commissioners to share their concerns, hopes and aspirations for our Church; unless of course there happens to be an item of business on the agenda to which they can peg their thoughts. While one has to be careful and recognize that the personal opinion of an individual does not necessarily represent the opinion of session, presbytery or synod, there is still considerable value in hearing what "grass roots Presbyterians" are thinking. The following proposal is intended as a means of helping the Administrative Council to hear what some 270 presbyterians are thinking.

There are 10 briefing groups being used at Assembly. It is suggested that at this Assembly, these 10 groups be realigned into 9 groups, and a new "10th group" introduced on an experimental basis. If at future assemblies the "10th group" is to be continued, this Assembly will have to give instructions.

The purpose of the "10th group" is quite different from that of the other 9 groups in that it will not concern itself with the business that would normally come before the Assembly. Rather, it will offer commissioners an opportunity to share together their hopes and dreams for our Church; to voice their opinion as to those things with which we are presently involved that require greater or lesser emphasis; and to suggest changes that might result in the strengthening of our Church's witness nationally and internationally.

The intent of the "10th group" is not to formulate a series of recommendations for consideration by Assembly. It is designed to provide a way for commissioners from across the country to voice their personal thoughts about our Church and to feed this input into the deliberations of the Administrative Council and the boards and committees of the Church. It is the right of presbyteries and synods to initiate business. It is hoped that personal ideas and opinions expressed in the 10th group would stimulate ideas from presbyteries and synods in the year to come.

Each of the 10 sessions on Monday and Tuesday will be chaired by the same person, one especially chosen for his/her ability to chair a discussion of this kind in a way that will help participants to maximize the relatively short time period available to each group; ensure that one or two persons do not dominate discussion; see that discussions are constructive; and steer the group out of side issues that lead nowhere. The Chairman need not be a commissioner.

Two Listeners will sit through all 10 of the briefing sessions. Their task will be to listen to what each group is saying, both directly and indirectly. Listeners will not be commissioners.

Following the completion of the Monday and Tuesday briefing sessions, the Chairman and Listeners will prepare a report summarizing what they feel are the pertinent points. (This report should not exceed 2 typed pages single spaced.) The report will be printed and distributed to commissioners by not later than the close of the Thursday morning sederunt.

The report should not contain recommendations dealing with any of the points raised in the "10th group's" discussions. However, there are two recommendations that the report may include: firstly, a recommendation that the summary be referred to the Administrative Council and the Council be responsible for seeing that consideration is given to the various points raised in the report, either by Council or through referral to one or more of the boards and committees of the Church; secondly, a recommendation as to whether or not a "10th group" should be part of the 112th and future Assemblies, and if so, whether changes should be made in procedures and reporting.

The Business Committee of Assembly will be asked to include in the Order of Business for either Thursday evening or Friday morning a period of 45 minutes for the consideration of the report and its recommendations. When the report comes on the floor of the Assembly, a motion should be moved that the Assembly move into a Committee of the Whole with the "10th group" Chairman serving as chairman and one of the Listeners as secretary.

During the Committee of the Whole, the content of the summary report should be discussed and changes made as deemed advisable. The exact wording of the two permissible recommendations should also be considered. When the Assembly resumes, the recommendations, as amended, should be put to the vote.

Recommendation No. 1 (adopted, p. 13; report from "10th group, p. 53))
That the proposal as outlined above be approved for implementation at the 111th General Assembly.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 2, 1983 - THE PRESBYTERIAN COLLEGE, MONTREAL (A & P 1983, p. 73, 293)

Re: Scholarship fund for doctoral theological study

The Senate of Presbyterian College recommended to the 109th Assembly the establishment of a "scholarship fund to support professional church workers who are graduates of our Colleges to undertake doctoral theological study". Assembly adopted the recommendation and forwarded it to the Administrative Council for consideration.

Council asked the Board of Ministry to assist it with this referral. At the fall 1984 meeting of Council six principles for a bursary fund were adopted. They are:

- It would be over and above any scholarships provided by our colleges.
- It would be related to the particular financial needs of the candidates, so that the amount awarded may vary within certain limits. It would, therefore, have the quality of a bursary.
- It would be awarded to candidates who show promise of successful completion of a programme of doctoral study.
- 4. It would be awarded to candidates pursuing doctoral studies at an accredited

institution in fields suitable to education for the Church's ministries.

- It would be awarded through a process outside the college structures but with college participation, for example, a committee of the Board of Ministry with the colleges represented.
- Graduates of our colleges and other professional church workers would be eligible to apply for such a bursary.

Council asked the Board of Ministry to appoint a committee, including representation from Knox, Ewart and Presbyterian College, to administer the fund, and whose first responsibility is to draft regulations for the operation of the fund. Council intends to present these regulations to the 112th Assembly.

Council is still exploring possible sources of funding. The suggestion under consideration is that initially funding come from the General Assembly Budget until such time as it can be funded through gifts and bequests.

Recommendation No. 2 (adopted, page 35)

That a bursary fund be established for the purpose of providing financial support for candidates in doctoral theological study as per the six principles stated above, and that Council be asked to report to the 112th Assembly re regulations governing the fund and financial arrangements for establishing the fund.

OVERTURE NO. 18, 1984 (A & P 1984, p. 527-28, 18) Re: Cancellation of Charitable Registration Numbers

The Overture, from the Session of Knox Church, Windsor, Ontario and forwarded simpliciter by the Presbytery of Chatham, asks that the Assembly protest to the Minister of National Revenue regarding the present practices in respect to the cancellation of charitable registration numbers, and to invite congregations and other denominations to take similar action.

Council agreed to present the following comments to Assembly:

- 1. The Minister of National Revenue provides each year to the last known address of the treasurer of a congregation the necessary forms T2052/T3010 together with an instruction sheet reminding the receiver that the forms must be completed and returned. He also sends at least one warning letter asking why the forms have not been returned. Then, after a period of time, he cancels the registration number by notification through the Canada Gazette. It is the responsibility of the congregation to ensure that all forms are submitted by the due date and to keep the Minister informed of any change in contact person and/or address. Council recommends that the Church address be used rather than a residence.
- In the Handbook for Congregational Treasurers, distributed by the Comptroller's Office to all congregational treasurers, on pages 77 and 78 there are instructions for preparation of the required forms and a warning that if they are not filed the congregation's registration number may be revoked.
- 3. Inasmuch as the registration process has been established by the Government of Canada Taxation Department to provide uniform information on the financial activities of charities and in order to obtain the registration number a congregation must agree to abide by the regulations, it would not be proper to mount an attack on the system when in fact we may not have abided by the regulations in effect. The alternative is not to be part of this procedure and as a result not be able to issue receipts acceptable for deduction from income in calculating the giver's income tax.

Recommendation No. 3 (adopted, page 35) That the above be Assembly's answer to Overture No. 18, 1984.

OVERTURE NO. 28, 1984 (A & P 1984, p. 524, 61, 216)

Re: Change name of "General Assembly Budget" to "Education, Mission and Service Fund"

The Presbytery of Bruce-Maitland by this overture requests the Assembly to change the name of the fund presently referted to as the General Assembly Budget. Similar requests have been before the Assembly on several occasions in recent years but no change has resulted, partly due to the difficulty of finding a suitable name.

Council and BCL consulted on this overture and considered several possible names and initially were inclined to suggest that no change be made. However, after further exploration, a committee of Council suggested the name Presbyterians Sharing. It is intended that whenever the name Presbyterians Sharing is used for promotional purposes, three or four words such as outreach, church growth, training, service, education, mission, etc. should be used in conjunction with the name to describe some of the ways Presbyterians share together through this fund.

Recommendation No. 4 (referred back, page 35)

That the fund known as "General Assembly Budget" be renamed "Presbyterians Sharing".

EXTENDED HEALTH AND DENTAL INSURANCE

The Pension Board reported to the 110th Assembly on two overtures referred from the 109th Assembly re health and dental insurance and requested direction from the Administrative Council in respect to financing. Council is still working on this referral. Presbyteries and synods have been asked about plans they presently have in operation and once this information is in hand consideration will be given to whether a national or regional approach would be most appropriate and how such a plan might be funded.

OVERTURE NO. 10, 1985 (p. 456)

Re: Group Health and Dental Insurance

The Overture, from the Session of Knox Church, Midland, Ontario and forwarded with the full support of the Presbytery of Barrie, asks that steps be taken to introduce a group health and dental insurance plan as quickly as is practical, current budgetary shortfalls not withstanding.

As reported above, Council is trying to find the best way to deal with this matter and plans to make recommendations to the 112th General Assembly.

Recommendation No. 5 (adopted, page 36)

That Council be given permission to report to the 112th General Assembly on Overture No. 10, 1985.

OVERTURE NO. 2, 1985 (p. 452)

Re: OHIP Payments for BWM Appointments to Self-Supporting Congregations

The prayer of the Overture from the Presbytery of Sarnia is to change present regulations in respect to graduating student appointments so that such appointees serving in self-supporting congregations fall under the minimum stipend and allowances schedules of the presbytery concerned, rather than under the General Assembly minimum stipend and allowances schedule as is presently the case. While neither the body nor the prayer of the Overture mentions it, the title of the Overture refers to OHIP (Ontario Health Insurance Plan) premiums. It is concluded that one of the intents of the Overture is to allow self-supporting congregations served by graduating student appointees to pay the provincial health insurance plan premiums in respect to their minister.

As indicated elsewhere in this report, Council is already studying the question of an extended health care and dental plan for professional church workers and expects to

present a final report to the 112th General Assembly. Council would like to include in that report a section on premiums in respect to provincial health insurance plans. At the same time Council will report on stipend and allowances regulations applicable to graduating student appointees serving in self-supporting congregations. The latter will be prepared in consultation with BWM.

Recommendation No. 6 (adopted, page 36)

That Council be given permission to report on Overture No. 2, 1985 to the 112th General Assembly.

OVERTURE NO. 5, 1985 (p. 453)

Re: Term Appointments for Executive Staff

The prayer of the Overture from the Presbytery of Northern Saskatchewan is that all appointments of executive staff made after June 1985 be on a term basis with a maximum term of 8 years for secretaries and 6 years for assistant secretaries. During the 1970's the subject of term appointments was before the General Assembly on a number of occasions and in fact both the Board of World Mission and the Board of Congregational Life, when they were first constituted under their present structures, appointed all of their executive staff on a term basis. However, the General Assembly in 1977 instructed that the practice of term appointments for executive staff be discontinued. This action was taken on recommendation of the Administrative Council and only after the Committee on Church Doctrine had referred the question of term appointments to presbyteries.

In the fall of 1984, Council appointed a task force to study the current staffing model and to consider new models of how the work of the Church may be done and the implications of such new models. This task force in its report to Council may or may not comment on term appointments. If they do, it is expected that they will provide information that has not been part of the Assembly's discussions on this subject. As the task force will not report to Council until the fall of 1985, Council wishes to delay recommending an answer to the overture for one year.

Recommendation No. 7 (adopted, page 36)

That Council be given permission to report to the 112th General Assembly on Overture No. 5, 1985.

PRESENTLY UNDER REVIEW

At the spring 1984 meeting of Council the Programme Co-ordinating Committee was asked to prepare a proposal "to make available \$500,000 from existing overhead and programming costs (which includes staff and administration) of the General Assembly Budget for possible use in new programmes or to further existing work." The Committee reported to the fall 1984 meeting of Council with a number of suggestions. Since then a number of task forces have been developing the suggestions further. The spring 1985 meeting of Council received reports from some of the task forces and wishes to inform Assembly re some of the items presently under consideration.

Biennial Assemblies

There have been many references during the past year to the need to more toward holding biennial assemblies. Council has studied the reasons given by presbyteries in 1976/77 and 1982/83 for not supporting biennial assemblies and has considered possible ways to deal with some of the concerns raised. At its spring 1985 meeting Council went on record as favouring less frequent assemblies and agreed to inform the 111th General Assembly of its intention to bring a definite proposal to the 112th Assembly.

Field Staff

Council asked representatives of BWM, BCL and WMS(WD) to examine their present deployment of field staff and to consider alternative uses. At its spring 1985 meeting, Council encouraged them to pursue the matter further with one of the synods.

Overlap of Evangelism, Church Growth and Social Action

The task force examining this area has made several suggestions which are presently being implemented by the various boards and committees concerned.

Administrative Procedures

Council has initiated a study of the decision making process and its costs as well as exploring possible changes that might be made in respect to such things as financial accounting, sharing of clerical staff and central mailing.

The Colleges

Council heard reports from the colleges re levying tuition fees, year round use of residences, and closer co-operation between Knox and Ewart in the area of Christian Education. Council requested the Colleges to continue to pursue the matter of charging tuition fees.

Arising out of the discussion re the colleges, Council noted the process candidates for the ministries of the Church go through from certification to licensure/designation.

Recommendation No. 8 (reworded and adopted, page 36)

That the Board of Ministry be asked to study the process from certification to licensure/designation of candidates for the ministries of the Church with a view to simplifying the process.

OVERTURE NO. 12, 1985 (p. 457)

Re: Consolidating programmes at Ewart College and Presbyterian College

The Overture from the Presbytery of Montreal requests the Assembly to instruct the Board of Ewart College and the Senate of the Presbyterian College to meet and consider the possibility of consolidating the programmes of the two colleges in Montreal.

Arising out of a decision of Council in the spring of 1984, Council at its fall 1984 meeting considered a series of recommendations relating to programmes and budgets. One of the recommendations requested the meeting of the joint faculties of Ewart, Knox and Presbyterian College to consider several items relating to the training of professional church workers. Representatives of the board/senate of the 3 colleges reported to the spring 1985 meeting of Council. Council was pleased to learn that Ewart and Knox are presently discussing ways to develop maximum co-operation in the area of training for Christian Education. At the suggestion of the college representatives, Council asked the Board of Ministry to participate in the discussions.

Council discussed the Overture from the Presbytery of Montreal in light of the discussion presently taking place between Ewart and Knox and agreed to report to Assembly that in its opinion now is not the time to introduce a discussion between Ewart and Presbyterian College.

Recommendation No. 9 (adopted as amended, pages 36 & 40)
That the prayer of Overture No. 12, 1985 be not granted for the reason stated above.

OVERTURE NO. 11, 1985 (p. 457) Re: Sale of 50 Wynford Drive property

The Overture from the Presbytery of Montreal requests Assembly to instruct Council to investigate the possibility of selling the 50 Wynford Drive property and re-moving to the property presently occupied by Ewart College. As the Presbytery rightly points out, this overture must be considered in conjunction with Overture No. 12, 1985 from the same Presbytery.

Council reported to the 110th Assembly that it had completed a study, re remaining at 50 Wynford Drive or moving to another location, and concluded that the Church Offices should remain where they are presently located. This study did not take into consideration the 156 St. George Street property as it was not available for use as an office.

Council recognizes the value of the St. George Street property and the possibility that it might be a suitable location for Church Offices, but is of the opinion that until such time as Assembly takes a decision which indicates the possible availability of the property, the requested study should not be undertaken.

Recommendation No. 10 (adopted, page 43)
That the prayer of Overture No. 11, 1985 be not granted.

PRINCIPAL CLERK OF GENERAL ASSEMBLY

Council reported to the 109th Assembly that in the fall of 1982 it had received the resignation of Dr. D. C. MacDonald as Principal Clerk but had refused to accept it. Instead, Council worked out with Dr. MacDonald an arrangement whereby "he would continue as Principal Clerk on the understanding that his responsibility would comprise principally legal advice and counsel plus his present ecumenical involvements; noting that such duties would not require regular attendance at 50 Wynford Drive. Further, Council agreed that this arrangement be reviewed prior to the 1984 Assembly." Dr. MacDonald was elected Moderator of the 109th General Assembly. This meant that the arrangements made by Council in the fall of 1982 had to be modified during the moderatorial year and it is only during the past year that they have been fully operative.

At its spring 1985 meeting Council discussed the arrangements made with Dr. MacDonald in 1982 and agreed that the "present ecumenical involvements", referred to in the 1982 agreement, should be the responsibility of the Secretary of the Administrative Council rather than the Principal Clerk.

Recommendation No. 11 (reworded and adopted, page 43) That the action of the Administrative Council be noted.

THE EXPERIMENTAL FUND

The Directors of the Experimental Fund have met on three occasions during the past year. A good number of interesting applications have been received. The Fund is not yet funded to the extent that it can support projects as fully as ultimately intended. The following projects, however, have been provided with "seed" grants:

- 1) A ministry making use of puppets and directed by the Rev. Fred Howard-Smith of London, Ontario received a grant of \$1,000. Mr. Howard-Smith reports that the grant has enabled him to obtain more puppets, improve the staging and lighting, and develop a new one hour presentation of Noah and the Ark. The puppet ministry has proven to be an effective means of evangelism among children and their families. Presently there are 20 teens training as puppeteers.
- 2) An adult education programme, Strategic Adult Lay-Leadership Training (SALT-Mine), directed by Mr. Paul Hurst at St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church in Puce, Ontario, received a grant of \$1,000. To date 12 courses have been offered to a total registration of 137 persons. Other congregations and denominations have shown interest in offering similar courses based on the SALT-Mine model. A second grant of \$500 has been made so that video educational programmes can be tested and evaluated in the SALT-Mine setting.
- 3) A grant of \$500 has been made to the Rev. Robert W. Johnson to conduct a research project among professional church workers who are in the pre-retirement phase of ministry and also among retired workers. It is expected that the results of this research will be useful to the Pension Board and the Board of Ministry.

4) A grant of \$1,000 has been made to the Rev. Dr. Stephen Farris to enable him to conduct research which will lead to development of a manual and an article on "The Minister and the Small Computer".

The Directors of the Experimental Fund would like to express gratitude for the vision and generosity of the donors who have initiated the fund and who intend to continue to develop its capital base.

REPLACEMENT OF EXECUTIVE STAFF

As per the direction of the 100th General Assembly, Council is to review all requests from boards and committees for permission to call for nominations to executive positions. During the year the Committee on Church Growth to Double in the Eighties requested permission to call for nominations for appointment to the position of Coordinator, which position came vacant with the resignation of Dr. James B. Sauer. At its spring 1985 meeting Council granted permission on the understanding that it is a term appointment to May 1988, but may be extended.

10 NEW CONGREGATIONS PER YEAR

Council reported to the 110th Assembly re arrangements for starting new congregations under the Incentive Growth Fund and the BWM New Congregations Capital Fund (A & P 1984, p. 208-11). Council is pleased to report that the first new congregation approved under the Incentive Growth Fund was started by the Presbytery of Kootenay at Slocan Park, B.C.

In that same report Council noted that there was an approximate balance of \$229,484 in the NDF"B" Fund which was to be added to the capital of the BWM New Congregations Capital Fund. Subsequently, the Comptroller, while reading back records, discovered that \$150,000 of the NDF"B" Fund had previously been designated for the Church's Lending Funds but never transferred. Council agreed to credit the \$150,000 to the Lending Funds and the balance of the NDF"B" Fund to the BWM New Congregations Capital Fund.

Recommendation No. 12 (adopted, page 43)
That the above be received as information.

1984 INCOME AND EXPENDITURES

At the end of the fiscal year there was a shortfall in the Church's operating account of \$473,599. At the February 1985 meeting of the Administrative Council Executive, which was enlarged to include representation from a number of the spending agencies, the situation was discussed. When reviewing the estimated income for 1985, which was based on anticipated rather than actual 1984 income, it was realized that the figure was too high. Therefore, estimated 1985 income was reduced from \$7,800,000 to \$7,470,000. Using the revised income figure and making the 1984 deficit the first charge against 1985 income, the procedures of the new budgetting process, as reported to the 110th Assembly (A & P 1984, p. 207), were applied. The result was an approximate 12.2 % decrease in the authorized budgets for each of the spending agencies.

The effect of this action will be felt on programmes and staffing. In spite of the negative aspects of a 12.2% cut, there are signs of hope and encouragement. Very often it takes a crisis to bring out innovation. This appears to be happening among congregations and spending agencies.

At the spring 1985 meeting of the Council the Presbyterian Church Building Corporation expressed concern that the Board of World Mission might not be able to fund any new congregations in 1985. As a result of this concern, Council asked Presbyterian Church Building Corporation, BWM and any other agency concerned with starting new work, to consult to see if a solution can be found to continue with new

work. One possibility is that PCBC may be able to help finance the purchase of manses for new work and thus free BWM funds for other items related to new work.

Each of the spending agencies have reported to Council on steps they have taken to bring their 1985 expenditures in line with the reduced budget. All have reported difficulty but a willingness to comply. BWM has indicated that they may have to overspend in 1985 by up to \$115,000 but that if this happens they recognize that this will be a first debit against 1986 BWM authorized budget. Council has granted permission for the over expenditure and corresponding debit against 1986.

Council has asked the Board of Congregational Life and the Comptroller to develop a system for reporting to congregations that will give their contributions to date as compared to the allocation they accepted. Also, again this year the spring meeting of Council had to leave the setting of 1986 estimated income to the meeting of its Executive in May due to the fact that there were not sufficient numbers of replies reaccepted allocations. BCL has been asked to study the matter to see if there is a way to ensure that this information is available by mid March.

1984 FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The audited financial statements for The Presbyterian Church in Canada (p. 216-224), the Fund for Ministerial Assistance (p. 231-232), the Pension Plan of The Presbyterian Church in Canada (p. 391-394), and the J.B. Maclean Bequest Fund (p. 353-356) have been reviewed by the Audit Committee and Council and have been found in order.

Recommendation No. 13 (adopted, page 43)
That the financial statements be received as information.

AUDITORS

Recommendation No. 14 (adopted, page 43)

That the firm of Thorne, Riddell and Company, Chartered Accountants, be continued as Auditors for the Church accounts for 1985, and the Administrative Council be authorized to set the fees.

OVERTURE NO. 24, 1984 (A & P 1984, p. 523, 61, 216) Re: General Assembly Budget Allocation Formula

The Overture from the Presbytery of Waterloo-Wellington requested a re-examination of the formula for determining congregational allocations for the General Assembly Budget. Council reported to the 110th Assembly that it was already studying the matter and asked permission to report to the 111th Assembly.

Council received a report on this matter at its fall 1984 meeting. Council is aware of some difficulties which were created by changes to the formula introduced a couple of years ago and is therefore hesitant to suggest further changes at this time without being able to test them against a data base. On recommendation of the Finance Committee, Council agreed that no change be made to the present formula; that BCL be requested to develop an adequate data base; and that all future changes be tested against that data base.

Recommendation No. 15 (adopted, page 43)
That the above be the reply of Assembly to Overture No. 24, 1984.

POLICY RE. DISTRIBUTION OF BEQUESTS

In 1962 the Assembly agreed:

That the practice of placing gifts, bequests and income from investments at the discretion of certain spending boards shall be discontinued and these will be considered as part of the income of the Church except (i) where the conditions

contained in the instrument of bequest or gift do not permit this course to be followed or (ii) where the Administrative Council determines that any particular gift or bequest is to be reserved for a specified purpose.

Council has studied this policy and is of the opinion that it does not adequately deal with the testator's wish where he/she leaves a bequest to a board for its use but does not specify the exact project. Council recommends that the policy be changed so that boards/committees designated as beneficiaries would receive the sum over and above its authorized expenditure budget.

Recommendation No. 16 (adopted, page 43)

That the policy statement, re distribution of bequests, adopted by the 88th General Assembly (A & P 1962, p. 356-57, 53, Recommendation No. 8) be rescinded and replaced with the following:

- that bequests and gifts received for the general use of the Church be added to revenue in the year received.
- 2. that a bequest or gift marked for a particular board/committee be directed to that board/committee on an "over and above" the budget basis on the understanding that it will not be used for normal operating budget purposes but will be set aside and used for a special project or for capital funding of a programme within the board/committee's jurisdiction.
- 3. that the designated portion of any bequest or gift received as defined in 2 above will be directed to the board/committee as follows:

1985: 0%; 1986: 33%; 1987: 67%; 1988 and thereafter: 100%

4. that each board/committee will operate a fund separate from its operating accounts to receive bequests/gifts which will be invested at interest by the Comptroller pending distribution.

STIPENDS AND ALLOWANCES 1986 Rates

See schedule on page 213.

Recommendation No. 17 (adopted, page 43) That effective January 1, 1986:

- 1) minimum stipend for ordained ministers be increased by \$515 per annum to the basic plus \$13 per annum for each increment (approximately a 3.5% increase) and that stipends for all other categories (diaconal ministries, lay directors of institutions, catechists/lay missionaries with specialized training, lay missionaries, overseas missionaries, superintendents, executive staff, support staff at national office, professors) be increased by the same percentage.
- maximum basic housing allowance, where applicable, be increased from \$5,400 to \$5,700 per annum.
- basic travel allowance, where applicable, be the same as in 1984, namely \$3,000 per annum.
- 4) basic per kilometer rate be increased from 17¢ to 18¢ and that all other travel rates be adjusted accordingly.

1987 Budgetting Rates

Recommendation No. 18 (adopted, page 43)

That for budgetting purposes only, in estimating 1987 stipend, increments, accommodation and basic travel, a 4% increase be applicable, with a minimum per annum increase of \$600 and a maximum of \$800.

MAXIMUM PENSIONABLE EARNINGS

Council received a letter from the Pension Board recommending that maximum pensionable earnings for 1986 be \$23,500. Council considered recent decisions of the General Assembly re recommendations from the Pension Board, the Special Committee on Pensions and the Administrative Council regarding maximum pensionable earnings and in light of the recommendation to the 1983 General Assembly by the special committee of the 1982 Assembly re pensions, which stated:

That for 1984 the maximum pensionable earnings be held at the 1983 level of \$20,000 and for future years they be increased annually at the same rate as the annual increase in the minimum stipend (including increments and housing allowance).

Council is of the opinion that maximum pensionable earnings for 1986, as based on the above recommendation, should be increased by approximately 4% or \$900 (3.5% increase on stipend and 5.5% increase on accommodation).

Recommendation No. 19 (adopted as amended, page 43 & 53)
That maximum pensionable earnings be increased from \$21,600 to \$22,500 per annum effective January 1, 1986.

GENERAL ASSEMBLY: PURPOSE, LOCATION, ARRANGEMENTS

The 110th General Assembly referred back to Council its Recommendation No. 34, 1984 re geographical location of Assembly. Assembly also asked Council "to review and articulate the purposes beyond its official functions to be served for commissioners and for the churches by the gathering of General Assembly; to recommend to the 111th General Assembly policies concerning time, location, accommodation, daily scheduling, format, and local arrangements which would both advance these purposes and help the General Assembly fulfil its central task; and that this study include an evaluation of the value and the annualized cost to the Church of a ten-year cycle including General Assemblies meeting once each in the east and in the west." (A & P 1984, p. 61) Council has not yet completed its study.

Recommendation No. 20 (adopted, page 53)

That permission be granted for Council to report to the 112th General Assembly on the referral from the 110th General Assembly.

SUPPLEMENTARY REPORT ADMINISTRATIVE COUNCIL

To the Venerable, the 111th General Assembly:

The Administrative Council begs leave to submit the following supplementary report.

BUDGETS FOR 1985 AND 1986

As authorized by the 110th General Assembly (A & P 1984, p. 212 and 26), Council has found it necessary to adjust estimated revenue and approved expenditures for the 1985 fiscal year. The revised schedule can be found on page 214.

As indicated earlier in Council's report (page 209), at its spring meeting Council was unable to prepare a recommendation re 1986 estimated income as there were not sufficient replies in hand re 1985 accepted allocations. Therefore, the Executive of Council was charged with this responsibility.

As of April 29, 1985 forty-one presbyteries had reported their accepted allocations for 1985. Projecting this information forward, and taking into consideration the current inflation factor, Council projects 1986 income from congregations to be \$6,736,000. Income from all other sources which can be used in support of the General Assembly Budget is estimated at \$1,043,000 for 1986.

Based on a projected income from all sources of \$7,779,000, Council submits to Assembly the 1986 authorized expenditure budgets for each of the spending agencies as indicated on page 214.

Recommendation No. 21 (adopted, page 53)

That the revised schedule of General Assembly Budget estimated revenue and authorized expenditure for the year 1985, as found on page 214, be received as information.

Recommendation No. 22 (adopted, page 53)

That the General Assembly Budget schedule as shown on page 214, be approved as budget estimates of revenue and expenditure for the year 1986 and that the Administrative Council be authorized to make such subsequent adjustments as may be required.

PRESBYTERIAN PUBLICATIONS

During the past year Council took the following decisions:

- That effective August 31, 1985 Presbyterian Publications will no longer serve as distributor of Council/Assembly materials, e.g. Book of Praise, Book of Forms.
- That Presbyterian Publications be requested to vacate the space they presently occupy in the 50 Wynford Drive building on August 31, 1985.

The Board of Congregational Life at its November 1984 meeting decided to undertake the sale and distribution of Christian Education: Shared Approaches (CE:SA) curriculum materials. To enable them to do so, Council agreed, effective with the curriculum materials for the winter quarter (December 1985 to February 1986), to authorize the Comptroller to advance the funds to purchase the inventory required. Due to circumstances beyond our control, this decision has since been amended to include curriculum material for the fall (September to November 1985) quarter.

Years of Service Increments: For incremental purposes, the second year rate becomes effective on January 1st following completion of the first 12 months of service, regardless of whether the 12 months are completed in March, December or whenever. Subsequent incremental increases also become effective on January 1st.
- 3. Accommodation for Diaconal Ministries and Lay Missionaries: The stipend rate for these categories includes an amount for accommodation. Therefore, those in these categories do not receive a free manse or additional grant toward the cost of accommodation.
- 4. Basic Travel
 - a) The \$3,000 figure for Basic Travel may be adjusted downward in specific instances where work assignment and/or type of transport used does not justify the full grant.
 - In addition to Basic Travel, an additional allowance is payable, in multiple point charges only, based on average Sunday round trip kilometers @ \$27.00 per annum per kilometer, to a maximum of \$3,240.
 - c) In certain cases (i.e. Superintendents, Church Extension and Presbytery workers) an additional allowance may be payable based on actual kilometers travelled at the rate of 18 cents per kilometer.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31,1984

1. STATEMENT OF NATURE OF FUNDS

- a) Operating Fund is the presentation of the assets, liabilities, revenue and expenditure of the Church's operation excluding its trust responsibilities. The properties owned include the land and buildings owned by the Church which includes the Ewart and Knox Colleges, 50 Wynford Drive, the Overseas Mission Residence, Armagh House and Mission properties across Canada.
- Lending Funds are the funds available for loans to help congregations provide the facilities to extend our Lord's work.
- c) Endowment, Restricted and Trust Funds these funds have come to the Church through donations, bequests and by direction of the Administrative Council. In most cases, the income earned is available for specific purposes only.

2. SUMMARY OF ACCOUNTING PRACTICES

The following is a summary of accounting practices followed by the Church:

a) Cash Receipts

Contributions held by congregations at December 31, 1984 for Budget Revenue, for the Second Century Advance for Christ Fund and for the Presbyterian World Service and Development Fund which were remitted to the Treasurer of the Church by January 15, 1985 have been included in revenue for the year in which they were given by members of the congregation.

b) Investment Transactions and Income

Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis.

Dividend income is recorded on the date of declaration.

Realized gains and losses from investment transactions are recorded on the trade date.

On the recommendation of The Trustee Board, the Church follows the practice of valuing marketable securities at market value rather than at acquisition cost.

c) Capitalization and Depreciation

Operating Fund

Properties owned are stated at cost, or if donated are recorded on the basis of fair market value at the time of acquisition. All other fixed assets are expensed when acquired.

Depreciation is not provided on the properties.

ii) Endowment, Restricted and Trust Funds

Fixed assets are recorded at values determined by executors with subsequent additions recorded at cost. Depreciation is provided on the building, furniture and equipment and vehicles on a straight line basis using the following annual rates:

Building 30% Furniture and Equipment 10% Vehicles 20%

Depreciation expense on buildings, furniture and equipment and vehicles has been charged against J. B. MacLean Bequest Fund included in funds held for specific purposes.

d) Composition of Assets and Liabilities

- For Knox and Ewart Colleges, Presbyterian Residence Saskatoon and Armagh only the fixed assets are included in the balance sheet.
- The assets and liabilities of the Pension Fund are not included in these financial statements. A separate statement covering this fund has been prepared.

e) Composition of Revenue and Expenditure

 Except for the amount allocated from the budget, no operating fund receipts or disbursements have been included in the statement of operating fund revenue and expenditure and unallocated fund deficit for the following:

Knox, Ewart and Presbyterian Colleges, St. Andrew's Hall, Presbyterian Residence - Saskatoon, Pension Fund and Armagh.

Revenue and expenditure does not include certain receipts and disbursements recorded directly to fund balance allocated for specific purposes, Board of World Missions and special projects and amounts available for Presbyterian World Service.

f) Profit on Inventory of Books and Materials

The accumulated proceeds on the sale of each printing is applied to reduce the inventory value of that printing. Profit on each printing is not realized until substantially all the inventory is sold.

3. MORTGAGES AND LOANS PAYABLE ON MANSES

The mortgages and loans payable on manses are secured by the related properties included in the operating fund.

4. FUND BALANCE ALLOCATED FOR SPECIFIC PURPOSES

The property fund has been reclassified with the operating fund for financial statements purposes. Accordingly, the property fund balance at December 31, 1983 of \$5,036,804 has been combined with the fund balance allocated for specific purposes. In addition, the fund balance represented by congregational loans of \$420,691 at December 31, 1983 has been reclassified with the fund balance allocated for specific purposes. Accordingly, the previously reported fund balance for specific purposes at December 31, 1983 has been increased by \$5,457,495.

5. ADJUSTMENT TO PROPERTIES OWNED

Operating fund properties and the fund balance allocated for specific purposes have both been reduced by \$308,898 to reflect the removal of St. Andrew's Hall, Vancouver property, from the records of The Presbyterian Church in Canada. This removal is consistent with the policy of not duplicating disclosure of properties where these properties are recorded on the financial statements of the separate colleges.

6. AMOUNTS HELD IN TRUST

Amounts held in trust are comprised of monies which the Church invests on behalf of certain organizations and remits the yearly income to that organization.

7. PENSION FUNDS

During 1984 actuarial valuations, as at December 31, 1983, were undertaken with respect to the Pension Fund and the Employees Retirement Fund. Based on the interim actuarial report the capital of the Pension Fund exceeded the estimated future obligations by approximately \$7,730,000. The Pension Board has approved increases in benefits which are estimated to amount to \$4,024,000 which will reduce the excess of capital over estimated future obligations to approximately \$3,706,000. The interim actuarial report with respect to the Employees Retirement Fund indicates that capital exceeded the estimated future obligations by approximately \$243,000.

8. RESERVE FOR EMERGENCIES

During the year, the Administrative Council approved the distribution of the reserve for emergencies in the Endowment, Restricted and Trust Funds as follows:

9. COLLEGE GRANTS

The total cost of operating Knox, Presbyterian and Ewart Colleges, St. Andrew's Hall and Presbyterian Residence - Saskatoon is \$1,850,866 (\$2,014,658 in 1983). Separate statements covering these institutions have been prepared. The Presbyterian Church in Canada has contributed \$894,739 (\$876,187 in 1983) towards the operation of these institutions.

COMPARATIVE FIGURES

Certain 1983 comparative figures have been reclassified to conform with the financial statement presentation adopted for 1984.

COMMENTS ON SUPPLEMENTARY FINANCIAL INFORMATION

We have reported to the Venerable the General Assembly of The Presbyterian Church in Canada on our examination made for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the financial statements of The Presbyterian Church in Canada for the year ended December 31, 1984.

We do not express an opinion on the following schedules since our examination did not extend to the detailed information presented therein.

SUMMARY OF ACCOUNTING PRACTICES

To the Venerable, the 111th General Assembly:

The Committee on Benevolences is a sub-committee of the Administrative Council. Many years ago the Council amalgamated five Benevolent Funds, maintaining the regulations under which each fund was established, under the control of a committee composed of the Chairman of the Board of World Mission as Chairman of the Committee; the Secretary of the Administrative Council as Secretary and Administrator of the Fund; the General Secretary of the Board of World Mission; the Chairman of the Pension Board; the Chairman of the Fund for Ministerial Assistance; the Chairman and Vice-Chairman of the Administrative Council. The General Secretary of the Board of Ministry was subsequently added.

During 1984 the Committee was able to provide regular monthly assistance to 46 retired and/or disabled professional church workers and/or spouses whose income from all sources can only be classified as subsistence. Also, special grants were made during the year to provide financial relief to professional church workers who suddenly found themselves confronted with a financial crisis. In this latter category the Benevolences Committee was assisted by the Fund for Ministerial Assistance.

The C.M. Pitts Fund has been augmented during the year by gifts from individuals and congregations and to each goes a special word of thanks. Special mention must be made of the gift to the Pitts Fund of \$10,000 from the assets realized from the sale of the property of First Presbyterian Church, Montreal at the time the congregation amalgamated with another congregation.

During 1984 the Administrative Council asked the committee to assume responsibility for the Bursary Funds under the care of Council. In all, there are 16 such funds. During the year awards totalling \$20,500 were made to 38 individuals.

Recommendation No. 1 (adopted, page 36)

That the thanks of the Assembly be extended to the congregations and individuals, who have made financial contributions to the Benevolent Funds.

Recommendation No. 2 (adopted, page 36)

That congregations and individuals be invited to remember needy servants of the Church in their prayers and with their gifts.

That congregations and individuals be reminded of the special need for gifts and bequests that can be used for needy non-ordained professional church workers and their families.

CHURCH ARCHITECTURE COMMITTEE

To the Venerable, the 111th General Assembly:

The purpose of the Church Architecture Committee is to advise Presbyteries, Congregations and Church Lending Agencies regarding the suitability of plans and cost estimates for proposed church buildings. The committee reviews the preliminary plans and cost estimates and comments regarding function, appearance and the reality of cost estimates.

All church building plans are to be submitted to the Committee's report received by the appropriate Presbytery before approval to proceed is granted. (A & P, 1962, p. 291).

The operational procedure of the Committee is outlined in the booklet "Guidelines for Planning a Church", available from our Secretary at the National Office.

The membership of the Committee is twelve, normally about six architects who are experienced in church architecture, one or more construction cost estimators, several ministers who are in church extension charges and have experience in building programmes, and ex-officio, the representatives of the Board of World Mission - Canada Secretary, Board of Congregational Life, Manager of the Presbyterian Church Building Corporation and the Director of Church Extension for the Synods of Hamilton-London and Toronto-Kingston. All of the members have considerable experience in church building programmes and have much to contribute to the Committee's deliberations.

In order to operate within our budget the Committee holds one annual meeting for consideration of policy matters, at which members from all parts of the country are present. The on-going business of the Committee is dealt with by the nine member Executive Sub-committee who are resident in southern Ontario and whose services are available to the Church through the Committee at little cost (A & P, 1978). In addition the Committee has appointed members by correspondence, resident in other areas of the country to act as regional representatives. Mission Superintendents have been advised of these members and consultation is encouraged.

Maintenance and upgrading of our church buildings and property is an important aspect of the responsible stewardship of our physical and financial resources. The Committee prepared a Property Committee Handbook to assist congregations in this task. It is available from the Church offices at cost.

A brochure of plans and photographs of recently constructed first unit churches is in preparation. It is felt that ideas generated for other church buildings will be helpful to congregations planning new buildings.

CHURCH DOCTRINE, COMMITTEE ON

To the Venerable, the 111th General Assembly:

This report will be the final one from the Committee to be signed by Ruth Syme as Secretary. Ruth was appointed to the Committee in 1979, and has served as its Secretary since 1980. In addition, she has served on a number of our sub-committees. She will be missed when the Committee meets in the fall. It was the wish of the Committee that our thanks be expressed for her service as she retires from the Committee. We also thank the others who complete their service on the Committee at this time.

We record the death of Mrs. Mae Lepard. Mrs. Lepard was appointed to the Committee by the 110th General Assembly, and died on July 21st, 1984. She was thus unable to take her place on the Committee. We have extended our sympathy to members of her family.

LIVING FAITH: A STATEMENT OF CHRISTIAN BELIEF

Living Faith was received by the General Assembly last year and has met with a heartening reception from the Church. The Administrative Council entered into a contract with Wood Lake Books to publish the document and the first copies were available in September. Since that time it has sold steadily. By March 25, 1985 25,000 copies had been sold, and it is hoped that these are in use in worship services, church school lessons, study groups, and for private reading and devotion. A special service for the reception and dedication of Living Faith was held in Calvin Church, Toronto, on October 28th, 1984, with representatives from the Committee and the General Assembly. On the same day services were held in many locations across the country based on the order of worship drawn up by Dr. D.G.M. Herron. Some Presbyteries and local congregations held similar services on other dates. The Convener introduced the statement in a service on MEETING PLACE on CBC Television on January 27th, 1985. That service, watched by ½ million people, employed parts of the document throughout the worship, and outlined the drafting and issuing of the book by The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

Living Faith is being translated into French. The first and second chapters have been printed in the January-February issue of La Vie Chretienne, and other chapters will follow in due course. It is to be hoped that the entire document can be presented to the Assembly in 1986 for approval of the French text. We also look forward to the production of a Korean translation, and perhaps others.

There has been some sale of the book outside the Presbyterian Church. Copies are available for sale in some bookstores and from Wood Lake Books. One school board in Newfoundland has ordered copies for classroom use. Favourable reviews have appeared in "Life and Work" and "The Canadian Churchman", lesser notices in "Christian Century", "The United Church Observer", and several other magazines and newspapers.

PARTICIPATION IN COMMUNION AS A TEST OF MEMBERSHIP

Book of Forms Section 125.5

Overture 32 & 33, 1981 (A & P 1981, p. 30, 461, 476)

Committee on Church Doctrine (A & P 1982, p. 228; 1983, p. 223; 1984, p. 244, 47)

At the 107th General Assembly, Overtures No. 32 (Neglect of Ordinances - Presbytery of Halifax & Lunenburg) and No. 33 (Membership Rolls - Presbytery of Lindsay-Peterborough) were referred to the Church Doctrine Committee (A & P 1981, p. 30, 461, 476). At the 108th General Assembly the Committee on Church Doctrine presented a statement entitled "On Participation in Communion as a Test of

Membership" as its initial response to Overtures 32 and 33. In its report the Committee asked the permission of the 108th General Assembly to invite sessions and presbyteries to study its report and the questions attached to it. The 108th General Assembly gave the committee this approval. (A & P 1982, p. 88, 228, 229) In its report to the 109th General Assembly the Committee on Church Doctrine provided the General Assembly with a summary outlining the response of the sessions and presbyteries to the questions contained in its report to the 108th General Assembly. In its report to the 109th General Assembly the Committee on Church Doctrine also suggested some principles as the basis for revisions to section 125 and 147 of the Book of Forms. This report was adopted by the 109th General Assembly. (A & P 1983, p. 223, 224) At the 110th General Assembly the Committee on Church Doctrine suggested an amendment to section 125 of the Book of Forms with the request that it be remitted to the presbyteries under the Barrier Act. This proposed amendment was itself amended by the 110th General Assembly. A subsequent motion referred our report back to presbyteries for further study. A third motion requested presbyteries to have their reports in the hands of the Committee on Church Doctrine by February 15, 1985. (A & P 1984, p. 47, 244) At its fall meeting the Committee agreed to ask presbyteries to study its original recommendation and report back to the Committee by the end of December 1984, so that the Committee would have time to study these replies and be in a position to make a report to the 111th General Assembly. Twenty-one presbyteries have studied the proposed amendment to section 125 of the Book of Forms. Fourteen presbyteries indicated approval for the proposed amendment. Three presbyteries gave approval, but suggested minor changes in the text. Three presbyteries responded against the proposed amendment. The Committee on Church Doctrine studied the replies from these presbyteries, and in light of the replies and the discussion at the 110th General Assembly has modified the proposed amendment.

Recommendation No. 2 (adopted, page 31)

That Section 125.5, Book of Forms, be amended to read as follows and that this revised text be remitted to the presbyteries under the Barrier Act:

125.5 During the annual revision of the roll, sessions are encouraged to use criteria such as attendance at services of worship, especially the sacrament of Holy Communion, and participation in the life and work of Members who have not been faithful in their the congregation. attendance at worship services and have ceased to participate actively in the life and work of the congregation shall be contacted, visited where possible, and encouraged to renew their commitment to Christ and His church. Those so contacted are to be informed that if after a year they have failed to renew their commitment, the session may decide to remove their names from the roll, as members no longer in good standing. In this event the session shall note the reason for this action opposite the names in the roll. The names of such persons shall be restored to the roll only by special resolution of the session to that effect, duly recorded in the minutes.

THE COVENANT OF GRACE

The 104th General Assembly directed the Committee to undertake "further study ... with particular reference to the sacrament of baptism and the practice of confirmation" (A & P 1978, p. 229, 230, 79). In 1980 a sub-committee undertook the special study of the topic, with particular attention to the question of whether baptised children should be included as participants at the Lord's Supper. The sub-committee has laboured steadily at its work; the Reverend Margaret MacNaughton, the convener, has given a great deal of time and effort in study and in writing. In 1984 the sub-committee prepared a booklet entitled "Children of the Covenant: Towards a Rethinking of the Place of Children at the Lord's Table". This is a working paper for use in the discussion of the topic rather than a statement of the position of the committee. It may be used by adult study groups, ministers, elders, and all those who share a concern about the place of children within the community of believers. The first chapters explore the meaning of God's covenant of grace, baptism, holy communion and

the profession of faith. The last chapter summarizes the responses of congregations which, at the request of the 106th General Assembly, reported on their "views and experiences" on the matter. Because the booklet was completed late in 1984 there was no opportunity for the sub-committee to enter into dialogue with congregations. The book is available from the Board of Congregational Life. This completes the work of the sub-committee, and we are grateful to its members for their service. We covet from the church responses on this subject. We plan to lay before the 112th General Assembly specific recommendations concerning this question.

Recommendation No. 3 (adopted, page 31)

That the Committee on Church Doctrine continue to study the question of the participation of children in Holy Communion.

Recommendation No. 4 (adopted, page 31)

That submissions from presbyteries, congregations, and individuals be in the hands of the Committee by January 31st, 1986.

BAPTISM, EUCHARIST AND MINISTRY

World Council of Churches, Faith and Order Paper No. 111, 1982 Committee on Ecumenical Relations (A & P 1983, p. 339; 1984, p. 371ff.) Committee on Church Doctrine (A & P 1984, p. 249)

The Faith and Order Commission has asked all churches to prepare an official response to this document. In accordance with the instructions of the 110th General Assembly representatives of the Committee have met with representatives of the Ecumenical Relations Committee to prepare our answer. Responses from presbyteries, groups and individuals have been received, and have been greatly appreciated.

The joint committee has outlined an answer which does not give a direct answer to the questions posed in BAPTISM, EUCHARIST AND MINISTRY. The first question in the document, "To what extent can our church recognize in this text the faith of the Church throughout the ages?" is not a question that Reformed Churches would normally regard as primary. We have, therefore, outlined a response which gives an answer to BEM which we regard as more relevant to The Presbyterian Church in Canada. First of all we would point out, with respect, that it is the general practice of our Church to recognize the sacraments and ministerial orders of other Christian Churches. In this we believe that we are following the normal custom of Reformed Churches, and we would ask other Churches to do the same. Secondly, we would forward to the Faith and Order Commission a copy of LIVING FAITH, with annotations on the topics of the three sections of BEM. Thirdly, we would deal with specific paragraphs in the document outlining some claims which challenge the practices of our Church, and other statements in the booklet which we would oppose.

The final form of this response is not ready for printing in the main report of our committee and will therefore be presented to this Assembly in the form of a Supplementary Report. (See p. 247-252)

Recommendation No. 5 (adopted, page 31)

That the Committee on Church Doctrine, after consultation with the Ecumenical Relations Committee, be given authority to finalize the report concerning BAPTISM, EUCHARIST AND MINISTRY, and forward it to the Faith and Order Commission of the World Council of Churches.

THE CHURCH AND HOMOSEXUALITY Overture No. 14, 1984 (A & P 1984, p. 520, 46, 370)

The task of preparing a draft response to Overture No. 14 of the Presbytery of Cape Breton was laid upon the Church Doctrine Committee by the 110th General Assembly. That overture asks the Assembly to "affirm to our people that The Presbyterian Church in Canada holds to the teaching of Holy Scriptures that homosexual practice is sinful".

It is to be noted that the prayer of the overture here refers not to homosexual orientation, but to "homosexual practices". We shall therefore, for the most part confine ourselves to a consideration of the rightness or wrongness of homosexual acts rather than the condition known as homosexuality. It seems reasonably clear, as we shall see, that this is also the focus of those Biblical texts that must be considered here.

The problem of the rightness or wrongness of homosexual practice involves to a degree unusual in ethical issues the testimony of psychiatrists and other scientists. It is clearly impossible to discuss the issues involved without considering their contributions. We cannot, however, abdicate to the psychiatrists our responsibility as a church to make our own ethical decisions. The question, after all, is not whether homosexual acts are insane but whether they are sinful. Psychiatrists are not necessarily competent to make that judgment. They are, for example, regularly called in to court to testify as to the sanity of people charged with criminal offenses; they are not asked to comment as to the rightness or wrongness of those acts. An act can be quite sane and yet sinful.

Moreover, we are not called upon as a church to determine the causes of homosexuality. (That would be clearly outside our competence.) Furthermore, psychiatrists and other scientists do not agree as to the cause of homosexual orientation. But the questions of the origin of orientation and the ethical estimation of homosexual acts are not the same. It may be true that the orientation arises either from genetic causes or from experiences so early in childhood that the person cannot be held responsible for that orientation. This is not exclusively true of homosexuality, however. The causes of violent behaviour or of sexual orientations such as paedophilia may also be genetic or environmental yet the indulgence of those tendencies must clearly be considered sinful. In short, homosexual orientation may well not be culpable but the practice that can spring from that orientation may be so.

We must not adopt an obscurantist attitude with respect to the empirical sciences and the contributions they can make to ethical discussion. Nor ought we from any misplaced sense of inferiority grant them too much weight. There is no reason to abandon those resources with which the church has always approached ethical questions, the witness of Holy Scripture and the wisdom of our forebears in the faith, when we consider this difficult issue.

We are also dealing with currents in the social atmosphere in our day. These are not as easily analyzed as the writings of scientists or theologians and yet they are of immense importance. First, we must take note of the widespread existence of "homophobia", the irrational fear and loathing of homosexuals, in our society. Interviews with homosexuals show the real pain and discrimination this attitude causes. Certainly, we must oppose this form of hatred as vigorously as any other. On the other hand, we must beware of those who label as homophobic anyone who hesitates to accept homosexuality as an equally valid alternative lifestyle. The issue is too serious for name-calling, sloganeering, or labelling, by either side.

It also must be noted that our society is fundamentally antinomian. This is, of course, not confined to homosexual issues. Our society respects little in the way of restraint on heterosexual activity as well. Societies are always most prone to attack those sins into which they are least likely to fall. This being the case, there will be many warnings in our time from both society as a whole and the church embedded in it against "legalism". It must be remembered, however, that both legalism and antinomianism are equally heretical.

The Witness of Scripture

Overture No. 14 declares its adherence to the Bible as "the rule of faith and life". With this general statement we, of course, agree. We have recently declared as a church that the Bible is "the standard of all doctrine by which we must test any word that comes to us from church, world, or inner experience. We subject to its judgment all we believe and do". (Living Faith 5.1) For us, therefore, a consideration of the texts relating to homosexual practices is vital.

Respect for the authority of Scripture demands great care in the application of its various texts to our present life. We must be sure we thoroughly understand those texts both as to their meaning and their enduring significance. Neither simple-minded "proof-texting" nor evading the meaning of passages to serve a pre-determined theory can be acceptable. Both informed exegesis and thoughtful hermeneutics are necessary.

The overture refers us to four texts, Lev. 18:22; Rom. 1:26-27; 1 Cor. 6:9,10 and Jude 7. Doubtless the Presbytery does not insist that we confine our attention to these passages. It should be noted that these texts are all "negative", that is, they all speak against a form of sexuality. There are "positive" passages which must also be considered, passages which speak of God's positive will for our sexuality. Although we must consider those passages to which the Presbytery of Cape Breton calls our attention it would be a grave error in any study of human sexuality to focus only on passages which speak negatively of certain aspects of human sexuality.

Lev. 18:22. This verse and the very similar Lev. 20:13 are quite clear as to their meaning. A translation such as "No man is to have sexual relations with another man." (TEV) is entirely accurate. The real problem here is, in fact, not exegetical but hermeneutical. To what degree are these passages authoritative for us?

It has often been noted that we do not obey a number of the regulations of the Holiness Code, the collection of laws in which our two commandments are embedded. We are "people of the New Covenant". We do, however, also maintain a number of the laws of Leviticus, most notably, perhaps, a certain injunction to love one's neighbour. Many of the regulations that deal with sexual matters, laws dealing with incest, bestiality and adultery, are also still widely accepted. Moreover, many are finding new value in the laws there which deal with the poor. In other words, we may neither automatically accept or reject as authoritative any particular commandment in Leviticus. We must always consider them in their wider canonical context. Does the law in question accord the key themes in the rest of Scripture? Is it contradicted or declared invalid at some other point in scripture? Does it accord with the work and witness of Jesus Christ?

The Old Testament does not merely or even mainly condemn sexuality. It has a consistent viewpoint with respect to human sexuality which may be summed up simply as, "Committed heterosexuality is a good and joyful gift of God." This basic insight is affirmed in the two creation accounts of Genesis I and 2, in the entire Song of Songs and underlies many accounts of male/female relationships throughout the length of the Old Testament. Heterosexuality is considered to be a basic and fundamental part of human nature as God created it. There is no point in the Old Testament at which it can be said that homosexual acts are viewed with any favour at all. The basic understanding of Genesis that humans are created to be heterosexual is accepted by the Jesus of the gospels, Mt. 19.3-12, Mk. 10.2-12. The regulations of Lev. 18 and 20 are fully in accord with this key Biblical line of understanding. They are part of a trajectory which simply cannot be justifiably removed from the Bible.

The New Testament texts mentioned in the overture confirm this basic understanding. Romans 1:26-27 presupposes the creation stories of Genesis. For Paul the "natural" is not merely what may be observed all around us; it is always rooted in the will of God disclosed in Scripture. The natural is not simply what is "there" but that which properly reflects the will of the creator. In this passage, therefore, Paul is not simply using a natural law argument; this passage is an extension of the trajectory we have already indentified in the Old Testament. Homosexual relations are part of the general brokenness of a humanity infected by sin. This understanding is by no means laughable, nor has it been rendered untenable by modern psychiatry. It must be noted that those who engage in homosexual acts are not here separated from the rest of humanity; this passage is part of a section of the epistle which aims to show that "all have sinned and fallen short of the glory of God". Homosexuals and heterosexuals alike need the grace of God appropriated in faith. Those who engage in homosexual practices are no less and no more culpable than those who engage in heterosexual licentiousness, verses 24-25, or the sins of the mind and spirit listed in verses 29-31.

1 Cor. 6.9-10. Here it is declared that "malakoi" (literally, the "soft") and "arsenokoitai", among others, will not inherit the Kingdom of God. The latter word also appears in a second sin list in 1 Tim. 8-10. It is a relatively rare word (the Pauline usage is its earliest appearance) and a valiant attempt has been made by various scholars to deny that it necessarily refers to homosexuals at all. While detailed arguments cannot be presented here it must be noted that the unusual word is very probably a literal translation of the rabbinic term for male homosexual activity "mishkav zakur", or "lying with a male". The Greek word is a compound one, made of the words for "male" and "bed". The latter is used euphemistically in a way that should not be unfamiliar to us. The two words are found in the Septuagint version of the laws of Leviticus considered earlier.

It is sometimes argued that these two passages, inasmuch as they are sin-lists containing traditional material widely circulating in the early church, have no authority for us. The logic of this position is not immediately apparent. Why should material that was accepted by the whole church, including Paul, be less authoritative than material that stems from Paul alone?

Finally, the overture asks us to consider Jude 7 which speaks of the destruction of Sodom and Gomorrah. It appears that the sin of Sodom is here interpreted sexually, perhaps following the example of the intertestamental work Jubilees. Little more can be said about this enigmatic passage.

It cannot be said that the Bible very often speaks of homosexual practices but where it does it speaks of them with disfavour. On the other hand it frequently celebrates the joys of committed heterosexuality. Its voice with respect to homosexual practices is, therefore, quite clear and consistent, in fact, unusually so. We cannot find any hermeneutical principle which will allow us to ignore this clear word. Nor does any general theological approach to scripture which emphasizes love or liberation to the exclusion of the demand of holiness commend itself to our approval.

The New Testament does not record any words of Jesus regarding homosexual practices. In the gospels Jesus maintains the validity of the Law of the Old Covenant (Mt. 5.17-19, Lk. 16.17) but retains an attitude both of freedom and authority with respect to it (Mt 5.21-47). It must be said, however, that Jesus generally uses this freedom to extend the Law rather than to curtail or to deny it. "Unless your righteousness exceeds that of the Scribes and Pharisees, you will never enter the Kingdom of Heaven." Mt. 5.20. It would be invalid to suggest that his silence with respect to the Law's prescriptions against homosexual acts should be interpreted as rejection of those regulations.

Perhaps the attitude of Jesus can best be deduced from a consideration of the story of the woman taken in adultery (John 7.53-8.11 in most of our Bibles). This story was considered to be of such importance that it was preserved outside of the regular Gospel tradition. Here Jesus is presented with a woman caught in the very act of adultery, an activity also forbidden in the Law. Despite the penalty laid down in the Law and despite the false righteousness first claimed by her accusers he offers to the woman both forgiveness and acceptance, "Nor do I condemn you." But he also accepts the Law's estimation of the sinfulness of her actions and lays upon her the stern command, "Go and sin no more".

Our society wishes to present us with two alternatives, either to share in the homophobic cruelty so widely practiced in our culture, or to accede to the antinomian ethical indifference which often passes for wisdom of our time, to condemn entirely or to condone. For us the task is to proclaim a middle way, to point sinners both heterosexual and homosexual to the grace and mercy of Jesus Christ and to declare before all his unconditional demand for holiness. Perhaps our word can be that of our master, "Neither do we condemn you; go, and sin no more".

Recommendation No. 6 (adopted, page 31)

That the prayer of Overture No. 14, 1984 be granted in terms of the above statement.

PRESBYTERY ASSESSMENTS Appeal of Mr. D. A. Beaton, 1982 (A & P 1982, p. 34, 37, 75; 1983, p. 522-24)

In 1982 Mr. Beaton appealed against a decision of the Presbytery of Chatham concerning assessments levied against congregations. The theological questions involved in the appeal were referred to the Committee on Church Doctrine. The text of the appeal was printed in the form of an overture in the records of the 109th General Assembly. (A & P 1983, p. 522-24)

The arguments presented in the overture to the 108th General Assembly correctly affirm that, under the New Covenant, the people of God are no longer constrained by the Law and are therefore not subject to compulsory tithing or taxes for benevolent purposes. Instead, the New Testament enjoins voluntary giving for missionary endeavours (Phil 4:15-16) and for charitable works (II Cor. 8:1-15). We are to give not because constrained by the Law, but because we are constrained by love for Christ, his kingdom and his people. However, it should also be noted that the Lord Jesus gave his people the command to provide for the needs of those who minister to them.

"The labourer is worthy of his hire (Luke 10:7; I Tim. 5:17-18). The Presbytery exercises a pastoral ministry to the congregations within its bounds. In this pastoral role the court is worthy to be recompensed for its expenses. Since Presbytery serves all of the congregations within its bounds, all of the congregations have a duty to share in its support. Therefore it is just for the Presbytery to have the "power ... to call for subscriptions for its own expenses, to be made of all the congregations under its jurisdiction." (Book of Forms, Section 182.1)

Recommendation No. 7 (adopted, page 31)

That the above be the reply to the theological questions raised by Mr. Beaton in his appeal to the 108th General Assembly.

KEEPING ATTENDANCE AT COMMUNION Overture 23, 1984 (A & P 1984, p. 522)

Living Faith affirms,

The church is present when the Word is truly preached the sacraments rightly administered, and as it orders its life according to the word of God.

This affirmation is in accordance with traditional Reformed Church teaching that the marks of the Church are the preaching of the Word, the celebration of the sacraments, and the maintenance of discipline according to the gospel. Discipline within the congregation is entrusted to the session. Lists of members, of adherents, of children, visiting homes, instructing and catechising are all part of the mechanisms of discipline. It has been normal in Presbyterian congregations to maintain a roll of communicants, and to keep a record of attendance at communion. A list of baptisms is also maintained, a record of those who have received baptisms.

When rightly used a gospel discipline should encourage commitment to Christ, growth in His love, service within the fellowship and service to the world, which are the aims sought in the Overture from the Session of Waterloo North Presbyterian Church. The exercise of discipline is not intended to be negative and legalistic.

The Committee on Church Doctrine is recommending to this General Assembly that the basis for judging which names are retained and which to be removed from the roll of communicants should be broadened. We suggest that the criteria include "attendance at services of worship, especially the sacrament of holy communion, and participation in the life and work of the congregation." The intention is to enable the Session to deal gently, yet effectively, with the onerous and delicate matter of discipline. Attendance at communion should, in our opinion, remain an essential part in that discipline. Sessions should continue to record attendance at communion, together with such other records as they find necessary in their duty.

Recommendation No. 8 (adopted, page 31)
That the above statement be the answer to Overture No. 23, 1984.

WORLD CONFERENCE ON FAITH AND ORDER

The Administrative Council has referred to the Committee the question concerning the possibility that in 1987 or 1988 a World Conference on Faith and Order may be held. The report of the Sixth Assembly of the World Council of Churches contained the following paragraphs:

- 27. It is more than twenty years since the churches have had an opportunty to survey and appraise the advances towards Church unity in a comprehensive conference on Faith and Order. Earlier conferences Lausanne 1927, Edinburgh 1937, Lund 1952, Montreal 1963 each marked an important ecumenical milestone.
- 28. Such a conference is essential in gathering up the fruits especially of our work on "Baptism, Eucharist and Ministry", on the common expression of the apostolic faith, on common ways of teaching and decision-making, and on the unity of the Church and the renewal of the human community. Significant roles in this conference should be given to representatives of bilateral dialogues, united and uniting churches, Christian World Communions, national and regional councils of churches. The task of such a conference should be more than simply to survey the ecumenical situation. It should be asked to help the churches evaluate the implications of these various steps towards unity for their ecumenical task and relationships. The "Baptism, Eucharist and Ministry" project has begun to teach the WCC how to formulate and lay an ecumenical question before the churches, and the churches are showing genuine readiness for creative response to such initiatives. Thus we recommend that this Assembly endorse the calling of a Fifth World Conference on Faith and Order in 1987 or 1988, and urge the Faith and Order Secretariat to submit specific plans for its appproval to the Central Committee in 1984.

The Presbyterian Church in Canada has been a regular participant in the general work of the World Council of Churches. The Faith and Order Commission is an essential part of the ecumenical thrust of modern Christianity, and we should continue to participate in its work.

Recommendation No. 9 (adopted, page 31)

That the Church Doctrine Committee be authorized to undertake correspondence and study preparatory to the holding of a Fifth World Conference on Faith and Order.

Recommendation No. 10 (adopted, page 31)

That the Administrative Council examine the possibility of finding funds to enable representatives of our church to participate in such a conference.

DOCTRINE OF MINISTRY Board of Ministry 1984 (A & P 1984, p. 412)

In accordance with the resolution of the 110th General Assembly, the Committee on Church Doctrine has appointed two of its members to serve on a Special Committee studying the Doctrine of Ministry. This Committee has held several meetings, and its progress will be reported to future Assemblies by the Board of Ministry and the Committee on Church Doctrine.

SERVICE OF DESIGNATION FOR A MEMBER OF THE ORDER OF DIACONAL MINISTRIES

The Task Force on Diaconal Ministries has prepared the following Service of Worship incorporating the preamble and questions which were commissioned of the Church Doctrine Committee by the 107th General Assembly. The Committee enthusiastically commend the Order of Service.

Designation

Moderator:

Beloved in the Lord, the Presbytery of is meeting to designate to the Order of Diaconal Ministries of The Presbyterian Church in Canada who has completed the training required by the Church and been certified by the Presbytery of

The Presbyterian Church in Canada is bound only to Jesus Christ, the King and Head. The Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments, as the written Word of God, testifying to Christ the living Word, are the canon of all doctrine, by which God rules our faith and life. We acknowledge our historic continuity with the Holy Catholic Church and the doctrinal heritage in the ecumenical creeds and the confessions of the Reformation. Our subordinate standards are the Westminster Confession of Faith, as adopted in 1875 and 1889, the Declaration of Faith concerning Church and Nation of 1954 and such doctrine as the Church, in obedience to Scripture and under the promised guidance of the Holy Spirit, may yet confess in the continuing function of reformulating the faith.

Liturgist:

Let us declare those things which The Presbyterian Church in Canada believes concerning the Church and ministry.

People:

The church is Christ together with his people called both to worship and to serve him in all of life.

- L. The church is one.
- P. It is one family under God whose purpose it is to unite all people in Jesus Christ.
- L. The church is holy.
- P. It is set apart by God through the Holy Spirit to be a chosen people in the world.
- L. The church is catholic.
- P. It is universal, including all people of all time who affirm the Christian Faith.
- L. The church is apostolic.
- P. It is founded on Christ and the apostles and is in continuity with their teachings.
- L. The church is in constant need of reform because of the failure and sin which mark its life in every age.
- P. The church is present when the Word is truly preached, the sacraments rightly administered, and as it orders its life according to the word of God.

- L. The Lord continues his ministry in and through the church.
- P. All Christians are called to participate in the ministry of Christ.
- L. As his body on earth we all have gifts to use in the church and in the world.
- All To the glory of Christ, our King and Head.

Moderator:

Through the church God orders this ministry by calling some to special tasks in the equipping of the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ.

Specialized ministries are recognized as through the designation of men and women to the Order of Diaconal Ministries.

Those designated to the Order of Diaconal Ministries join with the ordained and the laity to enable the whole people of God to participate in the reconciling ministry of Jesus Christ.

Vows

....., God has called you by the voice of the church to serve Jesus Christ. You know who we are and what we believe, and you understand the work for which you have been chosen.

Being assured of your faith in Christ and your love for people, the Presbytery is prepared to designate you in the name of the Triune God, to the Order of Diaconal Ministries of The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

We now ask you to declare your faith in the presence of God and the people by

- answering the appointed questions
- repeating the appointed statements.
- Do you believe (I believe) in God, the Father, made known in his son, Jesus Christ our Lord, to whom the Holy Spirit witnesses in the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments?

I do.

2. Do you (I) accept the subordinate standards of our Church, promising to be guided by them as you (I) lead the people of God?

I do.

3. Do you (I) accept the government of this Church by sessions, presbyteries, synods and general assemblies, and do you (I) promise to be subject to these courts and to work for the unity and peace of Christ among our Church and throughout the Holy Catholic Church?

I do.

4. Do you (I) promise, in the strength and grace of the Lord, Jesus Christ, to govern the way you (I) live as becomes the Gospel, and do you (I) promise to serve the people with compassion, energy, intelligence, imagination and love for the furtherence of God's reconciling mission in the world?

I do.

May the Lord bless you and give you the grace to faithfully fulfill these vows.

Prayer of Designation

God, our creator and guide, we marvel that you have made us to be your Church, coworkers in your divine purposes and instruments of your gracious love. We rejoice in the means of grace by which we celebrate the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, our Lord. We thank you for the Spirit who descended at Pentecost to abide in the Church forever, filling earthen vessels with heavenly treasures.

Especially hear our prayers, for your servant,, who now stands before you, as in your name we designate her/him to your service.

May the truth of your Gospel shine forth so that the gifts of service may flourish. Bestow upon him/her compassion and humility uncorrupted by self-seeking and boastfulness.

May her/his training as an enabler and leader be nourished by your Spirit that he/she may use all knowledge with understanding, diligence and integrity, remaining faithful in your Gospel.

May her/his ministry abound with creativity, vision, honesty; that your church may flourish.

May his/her life be filled with grace, love and peace, that all relationships may reflect your image.

Enrich him/her with good health of body, mind and spirit. Endow him/her with strength and gladness, with patience and courage, with common sense and laughter.

Save him/her from pride and hasty judgment, from laziness, apathy and despair. Sustain him/her in times of discouragement, dislocation and disillusionment.

Dwell in his/her heart, O Christ. By Your cross and bitter passion, help him/her through times of loneliness, betrayal, and times of darkness, and may the power of your resurrection help him/her to walk and not faint, and to be continually renewed to work with you for the reconciliation of your world. In Jesus' name we pray. Amen.

In the name of the Lord, Jesus Christ, the only King and Head of the Church, and by the authority of this Presbytery, I now declare you to be designated to the Order of Diaconal Ministries.

Then the Moderator will invite the representative of the Order of Diaconal Ministries to present the insignia of the Order.

Then the Moderator and members of Presbytery and any members of the Order shall be invited to extend the right hand of fellowship.

Then a charge to the new designate shall be given.

Followed by: a Hymn

Prayers of Thanksgiving and Intercession.

The new designate might be asked to dismiss the congregation with a commissioning followed by a benediction.

Recommendation No. 11 (recommendation and preamble reworded and adopted, page 31)

That the Service of Designation for a Member of the Order of Diaconal Ministries be the approved service for use in The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

SUPPLEMENTARY REPORT OF THE CHURCH DOCTRINE COMMITTEE

To the Venerable, the 111th General Assembly,

BAPTISM, EUCHARIST & MINISTRY (see Recommendation No. 5, page 238)

Proposed Response of The Presbyterian Church in Canada to Faith & Order Secretariat, World Council of Churches

Perhaps, at the outset, the most positive and constructive way in which we can respond to the Baptism, Eucharist and Ministry document is to draw your attention to the enclosed Living Faith: A Statement of Christian Belief. This statement was accepted with near unanimity by the 110th General Assembly of The Presbyterian Church in Canada meeting in June 1984 and best expresses our standpoint on the ministry and sacraments. The relevant portions of the statement can be found in Chapter 7 entitled "God's Church". You may wish to take note not only of what we said about these matters but also of the context in which we said it.

Turning now to the B.E.M. document itself, we note the request made in the preface that individual churches indicate "as precisely as possible the extent to which your church can recognize in this text the faith of the Church through the ages". This presupposes an objectivity of evaluation which is difficult to attain since each church will have its own particular preception of what constitutes "the faith of the Church through the ages". At best, individual churches can only look at the document through the eyes of their own denominational tradition and indicate at which points there appears to be agreement or disagreement. The following comments are based on this assumption and, therefore, they have been divided into two categories: 1) points at which we agree or are challenged to question our own beliefs and practices; 2) problem areas in the document where we disagree or have reservations.

General Comments

In examining the B.E.M. document we are greatly appreciative of the fact that the text is the culmination of a great deal of very painstaking and meticulous work undertaken over a period of some 50 years. We are also supremely aware of the great achievement which it represents in recognizing that over a hundred theologians from so many diverse traditions of the Christian Church have been able to reach such a remarkable degree of agreement. When we add to this the realization that the document deals with the most controversial of all ecumenical subjects – ministry and sacraments – we cannot but admit that this is certainly a very significant milestone on the long road towards Church unity.

There is much in the substance of this document which we receive with approval. The theological emphasis is certainly trinitarian and there is an authentic christological focus. We welcome also the significant place given throughout to ethical, eschatological and missionary themes as well as the way in which the power of the Holy Spirit is consistently recognized.

However, we are dismayed by a great deal of ambiguity in the B.E.M. document. It is unclear, for instance, whether some sections are based on the authority of Scripture or the authority of tradition. There is extensive use of certain phrases which lack specific content (e.g. "real presence", "unique sacrifice", "dependence on Christ", "submit to the authority of Christ", "guidance of the Spirit") and it is impossible to know whether we agree or disagree with them since their meaning is shrouded in obscurity. Wide divergences between differing positions and views is greatly minimized by use of a "both/and" rather than an "either/or" approach. The questions constantly in our minds are: How far can such wide divergences in faith and practice be accommodated without compromising authentic convergence? Do we have here a statement of real unity

between the various denominations or simply a list of points on which the churches have agreed to differ?

Baptism

We appreciate ther concern shown here for the mutual recognition of one another's baptismal practice and its importance for the growth of Christian unity (6, 13, 15).

The document presents us with a challenge that greatly needs to be heard in our own church: that we should guard more carefully against the practice of "indiscriminate baptism" and take more seriously our responsibility "for the nurture of baptized children to mature commitment to Christ" (16).

We also believe that we should take more seriously the fact that "Baptism is related not only to momentary experience, but to life-long growth in Christ" (9) and that "Baptism constantly needs to be reaffirmed (Comm. 14c).

We believe that we must pay particular attention to the suggestion that "Those churches which baptize children but refuse them a share in the eucharist before such a rite (confirmation) may wish to ponder whether they have fully appreciated and accepted the consequences of baptism" (Comm. 14b).

The document calls on us to clarify our position on the modes of baptism, and to consider the addition of elements in our service which might expand the meaningfulness of this sacrament; for example the inclusion of chrismation (19) and a more declarative renunciation of evil (20).

Yet there are several issues that we feel are not clearly expressed in this section on Baptism.

The relationship between baptism and faith is discussed (8-10) but the nature of the relationship between them appears to be ignored.

The place of confirmation is alluded to but not dealt with satisfactorily. There is a lack of attention paid to the concept of covenant theology, not only in this section but throughout the document.

The question of the relationship between baptism and salvation is not dealt with adequately. At one point it is said that "Baptism means participating in the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ" (3) i.e. that salvation is communicated through baptism. Yet at another point it says that "Baptism initiates the reality of the new life given in the midst of the present world" (7) giving the impression that baptism is the primary cause of salvation and thereby raising the question of sacramental regeneration. Our church would want to stress very strongly the former view, that baptism is the sign and seal of salvation, not its primary cause.

"Baptism", says the document, "is an unrepeatable act" (13). But how can those churches which do not regard infant baptism as authentic baptism avoid re-baptism in certain instances?

"Baptism is normally administered by an ordained minister, though in certain circumstances others are allowed to baptize" (22). In the Reformed tradition only an ordained minister administers baptism. Unless baptism is considered to be necessary for salvation (which, of course, the Reformed tradition does not) – and therefore has to be administered in a pastoral emergency – it is difficult to conceive of circumstances that would make it necessary for someone other than an ordained minister to administer this sacrament.

Eucharist

The very term "Eucharist" (Iff.) provides an emphasis on thanksgiving which the Reformed tradition has neglected and needs to hear again. Other topics dealt with which similarly challenge us to grow in our appreciation of this sacrament are: the eschatological dimension (4, 6, 18); the mutual involvement of eucharist and world (4, 20, 23); the ethical implications in terms of reconciliation and justice (24, 28); the references to Christ as intercessor for the faithful and the inclusion of their prayers in his (4, 8, 9); the stress on the eucharist and the Spirit and the concept of the eucharist as prayer rather than magical or mechanical action (14, 15).

Particularly welcome is the missionary emphasis expressed in sub-section 25: "The very celebration of the eucharist is an instance of the Church's participation in God's mission to the world" and again in sub-section 26: "The Eucharist is precious food for missionaries, bread and wine for pilgrims on their apostolic journey".

However, we also have certain concerns and reservations about this section.

The term "eucharist" is helpful, as we have already stated, but should it not be balanced by greater use of the other names, i.e. Lord's Supper, Communion etc.?

The reference to the Last Supper as one of a series of meals which "proclaim and enact the nearness of the Kingdom" (1) prompts us to ask if this sufficiently emphasises the unique character of the Last Supper?

The relationship of the eucharist to salvation is not fully clarified. "Every Christian receives this gift of salvation through communion in the body and blood of Christ" (2). Does this mean that salvation is only received through the eucharist? It so, this would tend to imply sacramental regeneration. This would also apply to sub-section 26 which says that "...the eucharist brings into the present age a new reality which transforms Christians into the image of Christ ...".

The reminder in this section that the eucharist is involved with the world and the world with the eucharist is helpful, but in what sense precisely does the Church speak on behalf of the whole creation (4, 23)? In what sense is the eucharist "a representative act of thanksgiving and offering on behalf of the whole world" (20)? What scriptural references might be helpful in supporting these claims?

The references in sub-sections 4, 8, 9 to Christ as intercessor for the faithful and the inclusion of their prayers in his, are very welcome. However, in the last line of sub-section 8 there is a subtle change in emphasis. It is no longer Christ who makes intercession on behalf of the Church but "... the Church offers its intercession in communion with Christ, our great High priest" (8).

The major concern in this section relates to the term "propitiatory sacrifice". "It is in the light of the significance of the eucharist as intercession that references to the eucharist in Catholic theology as 'propitiatory sacrifice' may be understood" (Comm. 8). The meaning here is rather ambiguous and leaves us wondering whether the eucharist is considered by the drafters of the document as a propitiatory sacrifice or not. The Reformed response would be that it is not.

"The celebration of the Eucharist properly includes the proclamation of the Word" (12). This gives the impression that the proclamation of the Word is subordinate to the celebration of the eucharist, just one among many other elements of the liturgy. From the Reformed point of view it would have to be said that the principal element in worship is the proclamation of the Word from which the sacraments alone derive their virtue.

Apart from "propitiatory sacrifice" there is no other term in the whole document that is open to such a wide divergence of opinion as "real presence" in sub-section 13. There are those churches which will see in this an assertion of the fact that Christ is present

within the elements themselves, in some substantial manner. There are other churches, such as our own, which will wish to talk about Christ as being present within the total sacramental action rather than exclusively within the elements. The question that must be faced is: Does an umbrella term such as "real presence" indicate meaningful consensus or does it simply conceal radical differences which are not being honestly expressed? The same questions might be asked of sub-section 32 dealing with presence after celebration.

"Christian faith is deepened by the celebration of the Lord's Supper. Hence the Eucharist should be celebrated frequently" (30, 31). There are many within the Reformed tradition who might argue that threre is a non sequitur in these two sentences. In fact, they might contend that exactly the opposite of this statement is nearer the truth. Because faith is deepened by the celebration of the Lord's Supper therefore it should not be celebrated too often in case frequency breeds a ritualistic approach of over-familiarity and thereby weakens faith. We believe that both sides of the argument always need to be kept firmly in mind in the on-going discussion about frequency.

Ministry

There is much in the section on Ordained Ministry and Authority (15) which is helpful, e.g. "The authority of the ordained minister is rooted in Jesus Christ ..."; "the authority of the ordained ministry is not to be understood as the possession of the ordained person but as a gift for the continuing edification of the body ...". We welcome the idea of authority being described as a gift having its origin in Christ but we feel that it would have been much more acceptable if this section had gone further. Professor William Klempa in an article in Ecumenism, June 1983, says "What would also have been desirable at this point would have been a statement regarding the truth that Christ alone is the ultimate possessor of ministry and authority in the Church" (p. 18).

Helpful to our denomination is the discussion of alternate styles of ordained ministry. It may aid us in considering new or forgotten modes for our own varied and changing contexts. The description of the functions of the three-fold ministry (28, 31), for instance, challenges us to evaluate the adequacy of our own ordering. In particular, the description of the diaconal ministry is very helpful to us on an issue currently under study in our Church.

We gladly receive the sub-sections on "The Conditions for Ordination" (45 ff.). We agree that the way to the ordained ministry must begin with personal awareness of God's call and that, after appropriate preparation of both an academic and spiritual nature has been carried out, that "This call must be authenticated by the Church's recognition of the gifts and graces of the particular person ..." (45).

We would consider the sub-sections on the mutual recognition of ordained ministries (51ff) to be perhaps the most central of the whole document. Without such mutual acceptance, agreement on the nature and meaning of the sacraments is of relatively little importance.

It should be noted here that we in The Presbyterian Church in Canada do not have a problem with the recognition of the ordained ministries of other churches. While we must confess that, at times, our practice does not live up to our theology, it has been our historical position that the sacraments and ministerial orders of other churches are, indeed, valid. We recognize the Baptism, Eucharist and Ministry of sister churches to be authentic. We would humbly invite them to do the same for us!

We would note here some concerns that we have with the section on Ministry.

The opening section seems promising since it is entitled "The Calling of the Whole People of God". It is then said in sub-section 6 that if the churches are to overcome their differences with regard to ministry then they "need to work from the perspective of the calling of the whole people of God" (6). But then there is no subsequent in-depth

consideration of the ministry of the Christian community. On the other hand, the writers turn directly to the matter of "The Church and the Ordained Ministry". From this point on, ministry is defined in terms of ordained ministry with the ministry of the whole people of God relegated to second place.

A major problem in this section is with regard to the ordination of women. We have high hopes when we read the words "The Church must discover the ministry which can be provided by women as well as that which can be provided by men" (18). But then the document draws back from making any strong or positive statement by merely adding "... the churches draw different conclusions as to the admission of women to the ordained ministry". Virtually no guidance is offered on the direction to be taken - in contrast, for instance, to the strong bias in favour of episcopal succession. We feel that decisive leadership should be given in encouraging all churches to move towards the ordination of women.

We find difficulty with the statement in sub-section 54: "Differences on this issue (the ordination of women) raise obstacles to the mutual recognition of ministries. But these obstacles must not be regarded as substantive hindrance for further efforts towards mutual recognition". This is extremely ambiguous. How will churches which do not ordain women accept ordained women of other denominations? Is this obstacle not a substantive hindrance?

The focus on hierarchy in this section is indicative of the almost totally male authority predominant in certain churches, since the desire for hierarchy would tend to be a masculine characteristic. Similarly, the functions of bishops, presbyters and even deacons (29-31) reflects male imaging.

In the sub-sections dealing with "The Forms of the Ordained Ministry (19ff), we are concerned that the Reformed concepts of priesthood and eldership are missing. The Reformed development of the idea of the threefold office (triplex mundi) - Prophet, Priest, King - is lost in the concentration on a single model of ministry. Moreover, human ministers share in the offices of Christ rather than represent or substitute for him. Connected to this is our doctrine of eldership which permits a duality of ministry, reflecting the clergy-laity components which the "threefold ministry" and historic episcopate ignore.

Also in these sub-sections, we have difficulty with the seemingly in-built bias towards "high church" expressions of ministry, e.g. "Although there is no single New Testament pattern ... nevertheless the threefold ministry of bishop, presyter and deacon may serve today as an expression of the unity we seek and also as a means of achieving it" (22). This same bias is also detected in the sub-sections dealing with "Succession in the Apostolic Tradition" (34ff) and also "Towards the Mutual Recognition of Ordained Ministries (51ff). It would seem that "low church" traditions are being encouraged to change towards "high church" for pragmatic reasons and that the implication is that the "low church" traditions are more likely to consider change than the episcopal ones. Episcopal churches are asked to recognize "apostolic content", "continuity in apostolic faith, worship and mission" and a "ministry of episkope" in non-episcopal churches (37, 53a) but they are not asked to recognize the validity of ordination in churches which have not preserved episcopal succession.

There are other concerns which we might express in regard to this section on Ministry: We find it difficult to accept that "It is especially in the eucharistic celebration that the ordained ministry is the visible focus of the deep and all-embracing communion between Christ and the members of his body" (14). In the Reformed tradition this focus would surely be just as evident, if not more so, in the proclamation of the Word.

We must admit that in sub-sections 41-43 we find it difficult to accept the sacramental language that is used in connection with ordination. e.g. "... God ... enters sacramentally into contingent historical forms of human relationship and uses them for his purpose. Ordination is a sign performed in faith that the spiritual relationship signified is present in, with and through the words spoken, the gestures made and the forms employed".

Conclusion

The fundamental question that we must ask about the B.E.M. document is: Can our Church accept it as a whole? The answer is yes and no. We can accept it as an expression of the emerging common ground among Christian churches today and of the developing convergence among the various traditions. We can accept it as an excellent starting-point for further dialogue among the churches. It opens the way for constructive debate since it addresses many of the central and problematic issues that have historically separated the churches. It is not, on the other hand, a statement which we can unequivocally accept as expressing adequately the basic elements of our faith and understanding. It is not a statement which can be viewed by our Church as being in any way definitive since it is not sufficiently Reformed in ethos or orientation. Perhaps the words "at this point in time" should be added to the two foregoing statements since it is to be hoped that further ecumenical dialogue would result in this document becoming more acceptable from the Reformed perspective.

Inspite of the concerns we have raised we are extremely grateful for the challenge, inspiration and achievement that is contained in the Baptism, Eucharist and Ministry document. We hope and pray that God will use it greatly in the future to bring about a much deeper level of understanding and unity between all the different denominations and traditions of the Church of Jesus Christ.

We report with regret the resignation of Dr. James B. Sauer and offer our best wishes as he returns to parish ministry. Members of the Committee deserve special thanks for the many additional responsibilities they carried during the interim and search process.

MINUTE OF APPRECIATION - DR. JAMES B. SAUER

The Committee on Church Growth to Double in the Eighties records its gratitude and appreciation for the zealous and faithful work of Dr. James Sauer, past Co-ordinator of Church Growth.

Jim received his education in Richmond, Virginia and was ordained in our sister Presbyterian Church, U.S.A.. He ministered in the mission field of Zaire, developing programmes to enable the indigenous church to carry out the commission of our Lord. He received and accepted a call to the pastoral charge of St. Andrew's, St. Lambert, Ouebec. In 1984, Jim became a Canadian citizen.

In 1981 Jim accepted the call to leadership in Church Growth as we endeavoured to double our membership in one decade. This was no easy challenge! His skills and abilities to analyze, research and teach combined with innate leadership qualities, have helped us to better understand ourselves as a denomination. Congregational vitality, pastoral leadership, barriers to and facilitators of growth are issues that he has helped us to identify and work through.

Jim has been a tireless worker. His prolific and timely writings, published under the name of our Church, have gained an international reading audience. In so doing, our denomination has taken its place in the world wide community of faith, offering a unique (Canadian) model for church growth.

Indeed, his challenging style and provocative thinking have helped us to enter into the 80's as a different denomination.

We would be remiss in this minute if we did not note our appreciation to his wife, Susan. We pray God's richest blessing on Jim, Sue and family as they follow our Lord's leading to the parish ministry in Ottawa.

We give thanks to God for the contribution which Jim has made to our committee, our Church and thereby to the Kingdom of God.

Recommendation No. 1 (adopted, page 22)
That this minute of appreciation for the Reverend Dr. James Sauer be adopted.

STATISTICAL INFORMATION

At this writing (April 1985) statistical reports indicate a loss of membership in the year 1984. Four synods decreased, with the most significant decreases in the Synods of Manitoba and Hamilton-London. Membership gains occurred in the three most westerly Synods (Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia) and in Toronto-Kingston.

Complete detailed reports and analyses will be available at General Assembly.

THE EVANGELISM STRATEGY

Last year the 110th General Assembly approved an interim "strategy for evangelism". The work of the Evangelism Task Force, under the leadership of Dr. Dennis Oliver, has continued. We report that the response to the strategy has been significant.

To date (most recent inventory) there have been eighty-two requests for the strategy study paper, representing one hundred fifteen congregations. Eight thousand copies of the report are in circulation. Over one hundred copies of the resource kit Evangelism: Face to Face have been sold and nine major workshops held.

The requests for workshops, consultations and resources in evangelism have stretched the limits of the Committee to respond, and encouraged the Committee with the Board of Congregational Life to establish the Co-ordinating Unit on Evangelism (CUE) in order to provide a central and extended source for resources, information and workshop requests in evangelism. This is a major cooperative effort which we call to the attention of sessions, ministers and lay leaders.

There has been a major change in the attitude of our Church towards evangelism which must be nourished. To this end the Committee is prepared to continue both in its work and budget to make evangelism a priority concern. A major effort underway in 1985 is the Academy of Evangelism For Church Growth, a training programme developed by Drs. Sauer and Oliver, which will provide sixteen weeks of intensive evangelism training for church professionals. One Academy is in process and another is planned for the fall.

We are encouraged by and support the efforts of our colleges to introduce evangelism into the curriculum of those preparing for ministry. We would encourage ministers and other professional church workers to consider intensive training in evangelism as part of their continuing education programmes. To this end the Committee has established, with the Board of Ministry, with Committee budget funds and a generous gift from the Presbytery of Lindsay-Peterborough, a bursary and scholarship fund for advanced training in church growth and evangelism. In 1984 there were seventeen grants made from this fund.

EVANGELISM TASK FORCE

The mandate of the 109th General Assembly, to provide "a strategy for a comprehensive approach to evangelism for the next five years of the Church's life" was partially fulfilled a year ago through Assembly's endorsing an emphasis on relational (face to face) evangelism. (A & P 1984, p. 281) This year we are fulfilling the mandate by outlining specific steps by which the Presbyterian Church can become more active and effective in this essential ministry. We cannot offer the "magic" of simplistic or easy suggestions. Evangelism demands a Christ-like commitment and sensitivity. Yet we have become convinced that The Presbyterian Church in Canada must and can be renewed in this ministry.

Many conflicting and confusing words about evangelism have been addressed to the Church in recent years. If we are to develop this ministry throughout the Church we will do well to share a similar emphasis an understanding. We endorse the definition found within our Church's recent statement of faith: "Evangelism (is) the offer of salvation to all people in the power of the Holy Spirit to be received through faith in Christ. It asks people to repent of their sins, to trust Christ, to be baptized and to enter a life honouring Jesus as Lord."

The emphasis is upon evangelism face to face (see last year's report, A & P 1984, p. 280-281). Our understanding is that the New Testament uses several words to describe the same process. Whether as "preaching", "heralding good news" or "witnessing", evangelism includes three essential aspects: incarnation, proclamation and invitation. Just as the evangel was most powerfully known when the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, what we, His followers, do and are is an essential aspect of our evangelism. Effective evangelism requires our living by the same values, priorities and grace as our Lord. This is the incarnational aspect of ministry. Our evangelism must also include proclamation: telling the story of Jesus Christ and interpreting its significance for humankind. The invitation of evangelism welcomes the hearer to Christ's salvation and into the fellowship, nurture and service of His Church. Our part in evangelism is to live our faith, to proclaim Christ and to invite the hearer to respond. We are content to leave the results to God, Whose Spirit is a powerful persuader. True evangelism is never manipulative.

How should we evangelize? There are many ways to share the faith and many resources and programmes available to those with the will to become effective in this ministry. We note with gratitude the creation of a common catalogue of evangelism resources, produced jointly by the Committee on Church Growth and the Board of Congregational Life. We would invite congregations to consider how their existing ministries (worship, baptisms, weddings, funerals, Christian education for all ages etc.) can be channels for evangelism. As well, we commend the contemporary approaches to story-telling evangelism as congenial to a majority of our congregations.

Recommendation No. 2 (adopted, page 22)

That Assembly affirm the above understanding of evangelism to guide the Church in the coming five years.

We cannot escape the conviction that evangelism is of the essence of the Church of Jesus Christ. Our theology upholds His primacy over all things and acknowledges His claims on the lives of all people. We recognize God's sovereign intent to win our unchurched neighbours to the same love and life celebrated in our congregations. We are under the same compulsion as the early Christians who accepted His commmand to make disciples of all nations and to witness to all, near and far. Jesus is not only the message; He Himself is the model evangelist. Thus we the Church, the Body of Christ, are meant to be evangelists. Whatever our distinctives from other traditions or our differences among ourselves (in theology, geography and culture) and whatever the words we use or the style of our work and worship, The Presbyterian Church in Canada must share the good news of Jesus Christ because we have received His grace. Evangelism is to the Church as warmth is to the sun or growth is to life. Evangelism is part of the very nature of a healthy Church.

Recommendation No. 3 (adopted as amended, page 22)

That every session identify who in their congregation will be responsible for its ministry of evangelism.

Recommendation No. 4 (reworded and adopted, page 22)

That every presbytery identify a committee or task force to resource its congregations in this ministry.

The primary agents of evangelism are the congregations. Jesus Christ is our model for this ministry and His mandate to us is best fulfilled by His Body. We would caution against the idea that all Christians are evangelists which seems to imply that each of us can become effective in every aspect of the evangelistic process. Rather we commend the concept that together we, each making a limited but vital contribution, can be effective in this ministry. When we consider the role that each can play, we are encouraged to realize the evangelistic potential of our Church. Our strategy is to train and activate a significant portion of the general membership.

Recommendation No. 5 (adopted, page 22)

That General Assembly set the goal for each congregation to train ten percent of its members in relational evangelism within five years.

Pastoral leadership is crucial for the development of our congregational ministry. Unfortunately relational evangelism has not been an emphasis in the theological training provided by our colleges. Clergy need to be models of evangelism for their congregations and to develop the skills to train them for this ministry. We endorse the action of the 110th General Assembly that our theological colleges provide an academic course and field education in evangelism and recommend

Recommendation No. 6 (adopted, page 22)

That General Assembly instruct our theological colleges to emphasize relational evangelism within their academic and field work instruction.

We recognize that continuing education affords an effective channel for the clergy to develop their evangelistic effectiveness. Therefore we recommend

Recommendation No. 7 (adopted, page 22)

That Assembly instruct every minister of the Church to take some continuing education in the practice of evangelism within the next five years.

National resourcing is vital to the achievement of the above goals. It is essential that the Church share in the next five years a common understanding of evangelism. Resources (staff and programming funds) should be made available for the promotion and development of evangelism as an urgent priority. To this end, your Committee wishes to indicate our support for the Board of Congregational Life's proposal to develop and staff an evangelism portfolio.

If the above recommendations are passed by General Assembly and implemented by our members, leaders and institutions, evangelism would become an effective ministry of our Church, with great blessing to us and to those we have yet to reach with the good news.

Recommendation No. 8 (adopted, page 22)

That the General Assembly record its appreciation to the following members for their diligence on this Evangelism Task Force: Dr. Dennis Oliver (Chairperson), Rev. John Allan, Rev. Jean Armstrong, Rev. Wallace Whyte, Rev. David Craig, Rev. Nancy Steeves, Rev. John Congram, Rev. John Cruickshank, Dr. Wayne Smith, Rev. Harry Waite.

RESEARCH

While your Committee has taken initiatives on evangelism we have not forgotten the many other significant areas that must be explored and dealt with to aid in our growth goal. We continue to do research and the efforts of the Committee this year have focused not on new work, but on a better understanding of what we already know. The committee is faced with more requests for workshops and consultations than it can possibly respond to. As a result, a major study was undertaken to identify the characteristics of congregations which are likely to grow. We call this "High Potential for Growth". As we engaged in the research we found it difficult to develop such criteria. Many of the issues are not simply those of fact (i.e. the locale, the demographic trends, etc.) but of value (style of ministry, self-perception, ultimate values, etc.). We found some congregations possessing none but growing anyway. Some who exhibited several of the criteria were declining. It is apparent that the criteria are not a complete measure of the congregation's growth potential; however, we would say any congregation with at least five of these characteristics, with at least two from the "values" section should be growing.

CRITERIA OF HIGH POTENTIAL CONGREGATIONS

Fact (contextual criteria)

 Relatively new congregations (those less than ten years old) have a high potential for growth (eg. extension congregations, congregations that have relocated).

These congregations face the issues of evangelism, assimilation, leadership development and development of a purpose in ministry.

Congregations with more than one hundred fifty and fewer than seven hundred fifty members have a high potential for growth.

These congregations face the unique issues of programme diversity, evangelism and staffing, particularly in congregations with more than two hundred fifty members.

Congregations whose ministry is to linguistic or cultural groups other than Northern European have a high potential for growth (eg. Korean congregations, congregations in communities with ethnic diversity). These congregations face the issues of resources for ministry to ethnic minorities (including leadership), support for ministry and leadership development.

 Congregations whose buildings are located in suburban or city-neighbourhood areas have a high potential for growth.

These congregations must address the issues of evangelism, assimilation of new members, purpose and dealing with change.

 Congregations whose population is characterized by rapid growth and/or change have a high potential for growth (e.g., new housing developments, new ethnic groups, people moving back to city cores).

The issues facing these congregations are change, understanding the surrounding community and assimilation of new members.

Congregations west of Thunder Bay and east of Montreal have a high potential for growth.

The issues are congregational vitality, evangelism and assimilation.

 Congregations where more than thirty percent of the members are non-traditional (family ties) Presbyterians have a high potential for growth.

The issues before such congregations are congregational vitality, purpose evangelism and assimilation.

 Congregations where there has been a recent change in pastoral leadership have a high potential for growth.

Change, congregational vitality and evangelism are central issues faced by these congregations.

 Congregations making requests for help and who have evangelism or church growth committees have a high potential for growth.

Values (attitude criteria)

There is a high potential for growth in a congregation:

- 10. When the primary orientation is to the present and future rather than to the present and past.
- Where there is an awareness that there are issues to be resolved.
- 12. Where the focus is on people and ministry rather than survival and institution.
- 13. Where at least one new programme (ministry) has been added/developed.
- 14. Where there is a high acceptance of change.
- 15. When the congregation wants to grow and is willing to pay the price for growth.

The conclusion that such a study leads to is that many of our congregations can and should experience growth. Continued decline in a congregation should cause leadership to look not only at demographics but also at their values and congregational lifestyle.

Recommendation No. 9 (adopted, page 22)

That sessions be encouraged to study these criteria and evaluate their ministry in the light of their findings.

WORKSHOPS AND TRAINING EVENTS

Direct involvement with congregations through training and consulting efforts is one of the keystones of the Committee's support to the Church in its growth. During the past year the Co-ordinator provided extensive direct leadership to l'Eglise Presbyterienne de Maurice (the Presbyterian Church of Mauritius), the Reformed Church in America and other groups as the programme for growth developed by our church attracts increasing attention of sister churches.

This training and consulting effort was supplemented by members of the Committee who were involved in twenty-seven training events or consultations. Additional help was provided to twelve congregations and presbyteries in organizing training events.

Two major training programmes were developed this year and will continue. One is the Academy of Evangelism For Church Growth to provide intensive training in evangelism to church professionals. Such training in a mainline setting is not available elsewhere in Canada. Secondly we have organized with the Board of Ministry and the Board of Congregational Life a major workshop called Facilitating Creative Change In Congregations.

DIRECTIONS FOR THE FUTURE

Your Committee has a heavy agenda for the remaining five years. We draw your attention to the following areas of endeavour:

- renewed efforts to motivate congregations who have yet to catch the vision of the church growth movement;
- develop ways and means of giving congregations and their leaders creative change skills;
- research and design resources to help congregations wrestle with their values and, where necessary, help them to develop new value systems;
- 4. concentrate on the barriers and strengths of small congregations;
- focus more intentionally on the training of the church's leadership, lay and ordained, with regards to the principles of church growth;
- continued resourcing of requests for workshops and consultations; requests continue to outpace our ability to meet the need.

CLERKS OF ASSEMBLY

To the Venerable, the 111th General Assembly:

OVERTURE NO. 14, 1983 - ST. ANDREW'S, VICTORIA (A & P 1983, p. 503, 18) **CLERKS' REPORT TO 110TH ASSEMBLY - RECOMMENDATION No. 3** (A & P 1984, p. 290, 28-29)

Re: A Session Quorum

The Clerks of Assembly reported to the 110th General Assembly re. Overture No. 14, 1983 and recommended that the prayer of the Overture be not granted. After discussion, the 110th General Assembly agreed to refer the matter of a session quorum to presbyteries for study and report.

Of the 20 presbyteries that replied to the referral by the January 31st, 1985 deadline, 15 presbyteries indicated they were not in favour of a change to the present quorum, many for the same reasons as stated by the Clerks of Assembly in their report to the 110th Assembly. Based on the replies from presbyteries, the Clerks present the same recommendation as they did a year ago.

Recommendation No. 1 (adopted, page 52) That the prayer of Overture No. 14, 1983 be not granted.

REFERRAL FROM 109TH ASSEMBLY (A & P 1983, p. 72)
CLERKS REPORT TO 110TH ASSEMBLY - RECOMMENDATION NO. 8 (A & P 1984, p. 293-94, 29)

Re: Request to define "active service" - Book of Forms section 176.1.8

The Clerks of Assembly reported to the 110th General Assembly on the above referral, giving background as to the number of times this particular section of the Book of Form's (section 176.1) has been before the Assembly since it was adopted by the 102nd Assembly, and requesting permission of Assembly to send down to presbyteries for study and report a proposed revision to section 176.1.8 that would allow the presbytery, by its own decision, to place the name of a retired minister on the roll but which would restrict such persons from being commissioners to the General Assembly.

Permission to refer the proposal to synods and presbyteries was granted by Assembly. No synods replied. Of the 18 presbyteries that replied by the January 31, 1985 deadline, 12 supported the proposal as presented by the Clerks; 2 supported the procedure but rejected the restriction re not being eligible for appointment as a commissioner to General Assembly; 3 rejected the proposal, commenting that the restrictions would appear to create a group of "second class citizens"; one presbytery stated that the Clerks did not define "active service" and that presbytery felt the proposal could not be judged until this was done.

Only 3 of the presbyteries replying in favour of the proposal commented on the relationship to synod of those placed in this manner on the roll of presbytery. All 3 felt that membership should be restricted to presbytery. The Clerks of Assembly support this position.

After studying the replies from presbyteries the Clerks concluded that there are two distinct groups to be considered: (1) those whose usefulness is primarily for the benefit of the presbytery and (2) those whose usefulness is both within and without the bounds of presbytery. For the latter, the Clerks recommend that the procedures as set out in section 176.1.8 apply. For the former, the Clerks recommend a new section 176.1.10 be added.

In their reply to the referral, two presbyteries questioned why section 176.1.8 excluded "non-theological teachers or professors, psychologists, social workers or other ministers in secular employment". The Clerks suggest that if presbyteries wish to pursue this matter further it should be by overture or memorial.

Recommendation No. 2 (adopted, page 52)

That the following amendments be made to the Book of Forms and that they be remitted to presbyteries under the Barrier Act.

a) That the following new section numbered 176.1.10 be added:

who are not included above but of whom the presbytery believes that their usefulness to the presbytery will be enhanced by the placing of their name on the roll by resolution of presbytery. Excluded from this category are non-theological teachers or professors, psychologists, social workers, or other ministers in secular employment. Those added to the roll under this category are not members of synod nor are they eligible for appointment as commissioners to the General Assembly, and should not be included in the count when determining the number of commissioners presbytery can send to Assembly. Such presbyteries are enjoined to review annually the services such ministers are rendering to the presbytery, and remove the name when presbytery considers the services they are rendering do not merit keeping the name on the roll.

b) That section 260 be amended by adding the following new sentence to the end of the section:

However, those ministers whose names have been added to the roll of presbytery as per section 176.1.10, and their equalizing elder, are not members of synod.

c) That section 278.1 be amended by adding the following new sentence to the end of the section:

However, those ministers whose names have been added to the roll of presbytery as per section 176.1.10 are not to be included in the count.

Recommendation No. 3 (adopted, page 52)

That should both the 111th and 112th General Assemblies agree to add a new section 176.1.10, then section 176.1.8 will be understood to be applicable to ministers whose special usefulness to the Church is both within and without the bounds of the presbytery, and a note be inserted in the Book of Forms at the end of section 176.1.8 referring to this decision.

OVERTURE NO. 22, 1984 - PRESBYTERY OF BRUCE-MAITLAND (A & P 1984, p. 522) CLERKS' REPORT 1984 - RECOMMENDATION No. 14 & 15 (A & P, p. 297, 29) Re: Statute of Limitations

In the Overture the presbytery has noted that at times there have arisen "claims and counter-claims . . . between ministers and appointees, on the one hand, and congregations, presbyteries and boards of the Church, on the other hand" and on occasion these matters were raised after a considerable period of time has elapsed since the official relationship between the congregation and the individual had been ended. The Clerks were asked by the 110th Assembly to prepare draft legislation, re a statute of limitation, and send it down to presbyteries for comment.

All eighteen of the presbyteries replying to the referral by January 31, 1985 did so with approval of the concept but several suggested different time limitations. At the suggestion of a presbytery, the Clerks consulted with legal counsel who advised that a specific time limit should not be stated. In light of this advice, the Clerks suggest the following.

Recommendation No. 4 (adopted, page 52)

That the following be adopted as new section 232.1 to the Book of Forms and remitted to presbyteries under the Barrier Act:

Presbytery, when setting the date for the dissolving of the pastoral tie by call, appointment, resignation, retirement, etc. shall ascertain whether there are outstanding financial matters needing to be cared for as between the minister on the one hand and the congregation, presbytery or boards of the Church on the other hand, and if there are such matters presbytery shall take proper action anent the same. When due to an oversight, a claim has not been dealt with at that time, it should be lodged with the presbytery within 90 days of the dissolving of the pastoral tie.

OVERTURE NO. 17, 1983 - PRESBYTERY OF KINGSTON (A & P 1983, p. 503, 18-19) CLERKS' REPORT TO 110TH ASSEMBLY - RECOMMENDATION NO. 4 (A & P 1984, p. 290-91, 29, 46)

Re: Demitting of Office by an Elder

The Presbytery of Kingston is concerned that there is no clear definition of "demit" in Section 108.1 of the Book of Forms. In the reply of the Clerks to the 1984 Assembly it was pointed out that "demit" is synonymous with "resign" in this context. Discussion on the floor of the Assembly indicated, that even with this understanding, Section 108.1 still was not clear. A motion was made and seconded that Section (108.1) be deleted and that this be sent down to presbyteries under the Barrier Act. At this point the Assembly adopted a motion to refer this entire matter back to the Clerks to report to the 111th Assembly.

It may be pointed out that the Presbytery of Lindsay-Peterborough overtured the Assembly in 1981 (A & P, p. 477 & 32) regarding the Removal of Negligent Elders, outlined in Section 134, which is related to Section 108.1. When these two sections are seen side by side, some of the difficulty that arises in viewing each of these sections without the other, may be overcome.

Recommendation No. 5 (adopted, page 52)

That a Declaratory Act be adopted stating that in Section 108.1 in the Book of Forms "demit" is synonymous with "resign".

Recommendation No. 6 (adopted, page 52)

That a parenthesis be added to Section 108.1, "(See Section 134)". That a parenthesis be added to Section 134, "(See Section 108.1)".

Recommendation No. 7 (adopted, page 52)

That the prayer of Overture No. 17, 1983 from the Presbytery of Kingston be granted in the above terms.

REFERRAL FROM 109TH ASSEMBLY (A & P 1983, p. 63, 308, 312) **CLERKS' REPORT TO 110TH ASSEMBLY - RECOMMENDATION NO. 7** (A & P 1984, p. 293, 29)

Re: Appeal by a corporate body - Book of Forms Sections 91-104

The specific problem referred to the Clerks of Assembly was how a congregation can enter a protest, or a protest and appeal, to the action being taken with regard to a Call, when the congregation could not meet in proper session to consider what action they wished to take, and inasmuch as the sections in the Book of Forms dealing with this situation require immediate action by the appealing body (bodies).

The Clerks of Assembly believe the intention of the rules to require immediate expression of an intention to appeal is valid, and the tenor of the regulations indicate the desire to be fair to all parties. Although an individual may be able to indicate his/her intention as soon as a Court announces its decision, such is not likely to be the case in sessions, congregations, or other bodies corporate. Even if individuals representing such bodies were given time to meet during the meeting of the Court, there could be situations where those individuals would not be qualified to speak for the body they represent. It is conceivable that time would be required to hold a legal meeting of a session, board of managers, congregation, etc. Yet the Clerks believe the

principle that the court considering the matter should be able to dispose of the matter as quickly and fully as possible is a desirable principle to be maintained. We believe such could be accomplished by those present, and presenting the request to the presbytery, having the right either individually or corporately to present an intention to appeal, etc. when the decision of the Court is made.

Therefore the Clerks present the following revision of the Book of Forms to accomplish the purpose of the above intention.

Add new sections 95.2 and 95.3 to the Book of Forms as follows:

- 95.2 In the case where the party petitioning the higher Court is a corporate body (i.e. a body of more than one individual which cannot meet to make a decision at the time required), some member, or members, of the party petitioning may give notice to the higher Court of a possible intention to appeal.
- 95.3 The body which the petitioner(s) represent(s) shall meet as early as is legally possible, and forward without delay to the higher Court its formal appeal, with reasons if desired. The higher Court shall then proceed to deal with the appeal as in Sections 93 and following, dealing with the body corporate making the appeal as though it were an individual.

Recommendation No. 8 (adopted, page 52)

That the above revision to the Book of Forms be approved, and remitted to presbyteries under the Barrier Act.

REFERRAL TO CLERKS FROM 110TH ASSEMBLY (A & P 1984, p. 31, 408) Re: Board of Ministry Recommendation No. 16 - mandatory revision of communicants roll

The 110th General Assembly agreed that the "Clerks be asked to consider the meaning of the last sentence in section 125.4 of the Book of Forms concerning the mandatory revision of the communion roll before application is made for moderation in a call to a minister, and that the Clerks be invited to offer some guidelines for such a special revision of the roll."

A Special Committee of the Board of Ministry has been working on a revision of "Guidelines for Filling Pulpit Vacancies". Members of this committee report that some sessions have taken unintended meaning from the requirement that "session shall also make a special revision of the roll before application is made for moderation in a call to a minister, or for the appointment of an ordained missionary." Apparently, some sessions believe that a special revision can be carried out without regard to the procedures set out in section 125.5. In other words, neglectful members have not consistently been given due notice and/or allowed a further year of grace. Such action is clearly wrong. Membership entitles a person to rights of the Church and these rights must not be abridged under the mere technicality that a call to a minister is being processed.

The last sentence of 125.4 is a curious piece of law. It is a tacit admission that the first sentence is not uniformly observed: "The session shall revise, correct and attest the roll once each year, and at the same meeting shall make entry in the minutes to the effect that they have done so." Annual revisal of the roll can be unsettling. This is particularly true where it is popularly believed that session removes people from the roll. (The reality is that people remove themselves from the roll, and session is left with the untidy duty of asking people either to confirm or reverse their personal decisions.) Offence may be taken unjustly, and the session gets signals that it would have been better to let things be. The result is all too common: the cost of an unrealistic communicant roll is seen as less than the cost of irate members and relatives.

The last sentence of 125.4 was inserted as a short term way of getting around the

problem of an inflated communicant roll which distorts presbytery's understanding of how well a call is supported by a congregation. In retrospect, the requirement of a special revision has not served its purpose. For the sake of clear law, it would have been preferable to ensure that normal procedures are followed routinely each year. The long term solution is not at all a matter of law. Clearly some of our congregations need ongoing training in the nature of membership and active participation in the body of Christ in the community where one resides.

Recommendation No. 9 (adopted, page 52)

That presbyteries be asked to comment by January 31, 1986 on the last sentence of Book of Forms section 125.4. Among other things, presbyteries should consider if the sentence is satisfactory the way it presently stands, should it be deleted, should it be amended so that it is clearly understood that the special revision is in terms of section 125.5?

REFERRAL FROM 110TH ASSEMBLY (A & P 1984, p. 31, 408)
Re: Board of Ministry Recommendation No. 17, 1984 - signatures on a call

The Board of Ministry in its recommendation asked "that the General Assembly Clerks be invited to consider the wording of the call forms (Appendix A, sections 11, 12, 13, 14 and 15) for possible change with particular reference to the allowable practice of an elder signing a member's name on his/her behalf with permission."

The Clerks have been given to understand that Recommendation No. 17 evolved from 1) a belief that elders should visit on so important a matter as processing a call, and 2) a concern over possible (or actual) abuse. The Clerks concur readily with the first proposition that elders should visit and not merely telephone concerning support for a call. We are not, however, in a position to pass judgment on whether abuses do in fact occur.

If the 111th General Assembly believes that the allowable practice of an elder signing a member's or adherent's name with permission invites abuse, this Assembly may without further reference discontinue the practice. No referral is required under the Barrier Act, since the sections dealing with signatures (Book of Forms 216 and 217) make no mention of the practice. The only changes required are to Appendix A, sections 11, 13 and 15.

Recommendation No. 10 (adopted, page 52)

That the above be referred to sessions for consideration and report to the Clerks of Assembly by January 31, 1986.

OVERTURE NO. 25, 1984 - PRESBYTERY OF WATERLOO-WELLINGTON (A & P 1984, p. 530, 18)

Re: Replacing the term "Interim Moderator" with reference to O.M. appointees and

REFERRAL FROM 110TH ASSEMBLY (A & P 1984, p. 34, 458-62)

Re: An advisor to the Ordained Missionary during Graduating Student Appointment

The prayer of Overture No. 25, 1984 and Recommendation No. 6 to the 110th General Assembly from the Special Committee re. Graduating Student Appointments are identical in intent and nearly identical in wording. The two matters were referred to the Clerks by the 110th General Assembly, the latter having been first adopted in principle.

Relevant background may be found in the revised wording of Board of World Mission Recommendation No. 28, 1981 (A & P 1981, pages 426 and 92). The amended wording:

The presbyteries requesting and receiving (two year appointments of graduating students) should retain Interim Moderators for their charges during the two year period. The Interim Moderator shall remain available for and take responsibility to provide support, guidance, and counsel to the ordained missionary, as occasion and

need arise. However, the ordained missionary, unless the presbytery deem it unwise, shall exercise the full scope of the Church's ministry as the recognized minister in the charge.

Petition No. 1, 1983 from students and graduands of Knox College (A & P 1983, pages 514, 69-70, 73) alleged there was an attitude "widespread throughout the Church that ministers serving their two year graduate appointments are not fully qualified ministers of Word and Sacraments when they are, in fact, duly licensed and ordained." The petition led to the formation of the Special Committee which in turn produced Recommendation No. 6, the item here referred. The wording of Recommendation No. 6 was as follows:

That presbyteries requesting and receiving O.M. appointments should name the former Interim Moderator of the charge or some other minister of presbytery as advisor to the Ordained Missionary during the two year appointment. The advisor shall remain available for and take responsibility to provide counsel to the Ordained Missionary, as occasion and need arise. However, the Ordained Missionary, unless the presbytery deem it unwise, shall exercise the full scope of the Church's ministry as the recognized minister in the charge. This does not negate the pastoral role of the Superintendent of Missions.

Inasmuch as the General Assembly adopted the content of the recommendation in principle, the Clerks understand the referral to them was for the purpose of putting the recommendation into effect by revision of the Book of Forms, if necessary. Our finding is that there is little in the Book of Forms to change. This is because the system of graduating student appointments has never found its way into the Book of Forms except in incidental ways.

The Clerks have studied the history of these appointments. From 1891 through 1938, students who had completed second year theology could be appointed to Home Mission Fields, "licensed to preach and, if necessary, be ordained, but shall not be eligible for settlement in a pastoral charge until they shall have completed the examination of the third theological year" (A & P 1891, minutes page 51; see also A & P 1911, minutes page 60). Examples can be readily found of the General Board of Missions appointing graduands as Ordained Missionaries (for example, A & P 1937 reports, page 4, paragraph 3). Appointments were not, however, compulsory.

In response to overtures, the Assembly in 1937 appointed a special committee to confer "as to the possibility of arranging for a summer session in theology, with a view to securing trained and efficient supply for our winter mission fields" (A & P 1937 reports, page 6). This committee reported in 1938 that it deemed a summer session in theology unworkable. Instead it recommended a regulation:

requiring all theological students, after graduation, as well as all students from other colleges and all licentiates who may be received by the General Assembly, to spend a period of one year on a mission field, under appointment by the Board of Missions, on the same terms and conditions as applied to student appointments generally; and that a certificate of such service should be secured before they shall be eligible to be called by a congregation.

This was amended "that the terms of the appointment be those of an Ordained Missionary", and the amended motion was adopted (A & P 1938, minutes pages 47 and 52). The following year the General Board of Missions recommended that Assembly reaffirm the action of the 1938 Assembly (A & P 1939, reports page 6, adopted minutes page 37). But there is at no point a record of study by presbyteries or of referral to them under the Barrier Act. Nothing was changed in the Book of Forms.

The Clerks present the above as a result of their search of Assembly records, but must express their relief that they were not asked to explain how the Church could take this action without considering it was changing a long-standing practice of the Church. The Clerks are of the opinion that, inasmuch as our Church has for over 45 years carried on

the practice of ordaining persons to the ministry when they have received an appointment by the Board of World Mission, it should be unnecessary now to do more than recognize this fact and carry on the practice.

Book of Forms section 213.3 is the one section which does invite mention. It in part reads:

An appointment as Ordained Missionary does not automatically constitute him/her Interim Moderator. Neither does it debar him/her. It is within the discretion of the presbytery as to the minister appointed Interim Moderator, and he/she may be either the missionary in charge, or some other minister as the presbytery may deem wise.

The Clerks suggest that a footnote be added to section 213.3 referring to Recommendation No. 6 and any confirming action of the 1985 General Assembly. The wording of section 213.3 is somewhat different in tone, but it is not inconsistent with the wording of Recommendation No. 6.

Recommendation No. 11 (adopted, page 52)

That the action of the 110th General Assembly in adopting in principle Recommendation No. 6 of the Special Committee re. Graduating Student Appointments be referenced by footnote in the Book of Forms, section 213.3.

Recommendation No. 12 (adopted, page 52)

That the above be the answer of the 111th General Assembly to Overture No. 25, 1984 and Recommendation No. 6 of the report to the 110th General Assembly from the Special Committee re. Graduating Student Appointments.

OVERTURE NO. 20, 1984 - PRESBYTERY OF BRAMPTON (A & P 1984, p. 529, 18) Re: Ballots for Moderator

The Presbytery of Brampton is concerned that few ruling elders know the persons nominated for Moderator and that in order to vote intelligently they should have before them (with a brief biography) a brief statement of the aims and priorities of each candidate for "this eminent office".

The Clerks appreciate the position in which many ruling elders and also many teaching elders find themselves in the matter of casting their ballot for Moderator for individuals whom they do not know personally and indeed often for persons whom they have never met. The Assembly has sought to assist with a brief biography in relation to each person who is nominated by at least two Presbyteries and agrees to the placement of his/her name on the ballot. This information gives a summary of the activities of the person concerned.

The Clerks are concerned that what is being asked of each nominee for Moderator is that he/she present an "election platform", almost as though the person were campaigning for office. The Assembly has sought to keep the idea of "campaigning" completely out of the picture. The Assembly has discouraged one presbytery informing another presbytery of their action re nominations and thus building up support for the name they put forward (A & P 1948, p. 94, 160).

It seems to the Clerks that calling for nominees to present a "platform" is to view the moderatorship as being something more than envisioned in the Book of Forms, Section 283 and following.

The Clerks would not like to see the election of the Moderator conducted on the lines of a civic election with the person putting forth the "best campaign" being elected. The Clerks believe a person should be voted into office on the basis of his/her contribution to the life and work of the Church during his/her ministry, and that the present practice be continued.

Recommendation No. 13 (adopted, page 52)
That the prayer of Overture No. 20, 1984 be not granted.

MEMORIAL NO. 1, 1984 - REV. J. D. McCONAGHY (A & P 1984, p. 533, 18)

Re: The position of a minister worshipping regularly in a congregation of which he/she is not the minister.

The 104th General Assembly adopted a declaratory interpretation of Section 106.2 of the Book of Forms (A & P 1978, p. 227, 78), and Memorial No. 1 of the 110th General Assembly requests that the essence of the declaratory interpretation be included in a revision to Section 106.2 of the Book of Forms.

It has been the policy of the Clerks of Assembly to revise the Book of Forms whenever a regulation is changed under the Barrier Act, but not necessarily to make a change when Assembly adopts an interpretation of a section of the Book. The Book of Forms has been revised, and reprinted, a number of times since 1875. In 1981 the present book was printed in a revised format, with loose leaf pages to enable easy revisions as necessary. Since then there has been a spate of changes made in our regulations to the extent that in three years more changes have been made than in previous decades.

It should be noted that the Book of Forms was never intended to contain every conceivable regulation under which The Presbyterian Church in Canada operates. The Clerks of Assembly have tried over the years to keep the size of the Book of Forms to reasonable proportions, and they have also tried to give every assistance to individuals and Courts of the Church seeking advice or interpretation.

Nevertheless, in view of the confusion mentioned in the Memorial, the Clerks are prepared to insert the following at the end of section 106.2 of the Book of Forms, "(see A & P 1978, p. 227, 78)".

Recommendation No. 14 (adopted, page 52)

That the above report, with its promised action, be approved as the answer to Memorial No. 1, 1984.

OVERTURE NO. 3, 1985 - PRESBYTERY OF SARNIA (p. 452-453)
Re: Change to Book of Forms Section 10, Appendix A - Minimum Stipend & Allowances

Overture No. 3, 1985 points out that annually the General Assembly sets minimum levels for stipends and various allowances but the Book of Forms makes no reference to these minimums. The prayer of the Overture is that in the wording of the guarantee to presbytery for a minister's stipend, which guarantee is presented to presbytery by a congregation calling a minister, among the items to be considered at the annual review of stipend should be the minimums established by the General Assembly.

The use of the word "minimum" by the General Assembly each year in itself is self explanatory in that, according to its dictionary definition, the word means "the least possible". The Clerks are of the opinion that generally throughout the Church the phrase "minimum stipend" is understood to mean the least possible amount that can be paid to a professional church worker who is classified as working full-time. Because of this generally accepted understanding, and in the hope that decisions not be taken that might eventually lead to including a chapter in the Book of Forms on conditions of service for professional church workers, the Clerks do not support the prayer of the Overture.

Recommendation No. 15 (adopted, page 52) That the prayer of Overture No. 3, 1985 be not granted.

OVERTURE NO. 4, 1985 - PRESBYTERY OF EAST TORONTO (p. 453)
Re: Informing nominees and receiving their consent for positions within the Church

The prayer of the Overture asks that nominations for positions within boards, committees, colleges and other agencies of the Church, that have been submitted to the

Clerks of Assembly, not be forwarded by the Clerks until it has been determined that the nominee has been notified and is prepared to let his/her name stand.

The Clerks agree that out of courtesy, persons nominated should be informed that they have been nominated. Such information should be sent by the presbytery or group making the nomination. The Clerks are uncomfortable with the suggestion that the nominee should give permission for his/her name to be sent forward. There have been instances in our Church where the initial reaction of a nominee has been negative, but after prayer, conversations with the search committee, and an invitation to accept the position, the response has been positive. Initial reaction and the Call of God are not always the same.

Recommendation No. 16 (adopted as amended, page 52) That the prayer of Overture No. 4, 1985 be not granted.

REFERRAL FROM 110TH ASSEMBLY (A & P 1984, p. 63) Re: Bringing computer technology to the Clerks' Office at Assembly

At the 110th General Assembly, the 3rd Deputy Clerk, Dr. Lowry, was delegated to bring computer technology to bear on the work of the Clerks' office at Assembly. The following is an interim report for information.

- a) Under Dr. Roberts' direction, word processing equipment is being used extensively in day to day operations throughout the year. Commissioners will notice that at the 111th General Assembly we will for the first time attempt to use word processing directly on the floor of Assembly to create the minutes. The first time is necessarily experimental; we will ensure that enough backup procedures are in place that we are not left without a record of proceedings. If all works well, we should be able to make minutes available to commissioners more quickly and with less strain on support staff.
- b) One attractive option will have to be foregone in 1985 because of budget pressures. This is the ability to display a computer terminal readout directly on a projection screen. We are persuaded that having actions being voted on always in sight of the commissioners would clarify the workings of Assembly. Rental costs of equipment are likely to go down in the future, so we set the idea aside only temporarily.
- c) A commercial product developed by the 3rd Deputy Clerk can be applied to situations where quick, easy retrieval is needed from large data bases. In the first instance we will use the "FindIT" product on the Book of Forms. This has wide relevance to day to day work in the church offices. We hope to use the same techniques at Assembly. In the long term, we aim to use optical discs to store Acts and Proceedings for the last twenty years; this will be coupled with quick search capability. This will provide a valuable research tool for any interested person or committee. All technology is in place for this project with the exception of reliable optical character recognition. Improvements in this field are being achieved rapidly, so we are not too far removed from the desired capability.

Recommendation No. 17 (adopted, page 52)
That the above report re computerization of the Clerks' Office at Assembly be received as information.

OVERTURE NO. 9, 1985 - BRIDLEWOOD SESSION, EAST TORONTO PRESBYTERY (p. 455-456)

Re: Compulsory participation in the ordination of women

In Overture No. 9, 1985 the Session of Bridlewood Church asks that Assembly make changes to Book of Forms, section 407.4. Paragraph 1 of this section reads as follows:

Ministers and elders already ordained within The Presbyterian Church in Canada have freedom of belief on the question of the ordination of women but do not have freedom of action. By virtue of their ordination vows all are obliged to exercise full ministry including active participation in the ordination of women.

In 1966 The Presbyterian Church in Canada extended the right to women to be ordained as elders and ministers. Section 407.4 was passed by General Assembly in 1982 as a "Declaratory Act", that is, a clarification to existing law. The Session of Bridlewood argues that this "is more than a clarification of an existing law of the Church since 1966, and thereby imposes on some ministers and elders a practice that was not part of their ordination vows."

The Presbytery of East Toronto received this overture and agreed by resolution not to support it. Presbytery forwarded the overture asking that the Clerks of Assembly report on the matter if possible to the 111th General Assembly.

The matter of participation in the ordination of women came before four successive General Assemblies, 1980 through 1983. The Session of Bridlewood Church has taken a lively interest in the topic, submitting in turn Overture No. 5, 1980; Memorial No. 16, 1981; Overture No. 13, 1983; and now Overture No. 9, 1985. The latter two overtures focus on Book of Forms 407.4, asking that this section be either withdrawn or rewritten.

The Clerks question the wisdom of re-opening this matter for debate at yet another Assembly. Each point in Overture No. 9 has been addressed by one or more General Assemblies within the past five years. But we are all enjoined by the very section in dispute, 407.4, "to deal with cases of conscience on the question with pastoral care and understanding for the parties involved with concern and sensitivity for the peace and unity of the whole Church." Therefore the Clerks of Assembly stand ready on invitation to meet with the Moderator and Elders of Bridlewood for whatever discussion they would deem helpful.

Recommendation No. 18 (adopted, page 52)
That the above be the answer of the 111th General Assembly to Overture No. 9, 1985.

COLLEGE, EWART BOARD

To the Venerable, the 111th General Assembly:

EWART COLLEGE IN THE LIFE OF THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA

That the Presbyterian Church in its wisdom and planning has since 1897 (88 years) supported Ewart College so that it could do a work for the Church in the areas of preparation for Missionary Service and Christian Education is a cause for rejoicing. Ewart College through its work primarily as an undergraduate institution provides persons for the Church with specialized education in a number of areas. Sometimes graduates from Arts, Nursing and Teaching also study at the College. Thus in all parts of Canada and in countries overseas, the graduates of Ewart serve as Directors of Christian Education, Congregational Deaconesses, inner city mission workers, extension workers, hospital visitors, overseas missionaries and Area Educational Consultants. Graduates also direct Youth Ministry programmes and give leadership and assistance on many Boards and Committees of the Church. The focus of the College leads graduates into educational positions where flexible and creative programmes can be attempted.

Since Ewart College is committed to the preparation of persons who serve the Church in educational positions, it is a matter of further rejoicing that the document "Living Faith" recognized this fact as an important aspect in its section (7.2) on Ministry.

"Specialized ministries are recognized through the designation of deaconesses and church educators, professors and administrators, missionaries and catechists, chaplains and counsellors." (7.2.5)

"Through such ministries the Word is proclaimed, God's people are nourished and nurtured, supported and guided. In the oneness of Christ we seek to serve God." (7.2.6)

CONCERNS AND INTERESTS OF THE BOARD

Special Event Year 1987

At its meeting in February, 1985, the Board set up a small committee to make preparations for a Special Event Year in 1987. At that time Ewart College will have served the Church for 90 years and the present building will be 25 years old. It is hoped that the Committee will promote displays, encourage events in areas where there are a number of college graduates who can plan together. The hope is to make the entire year a time of special celebration for education and Ewart in the life of the Church. (See Recommendation No. 1, page 272)

Dr. Margaret Webster

Ever since her appointment to the position of principal of Ewart College in 1957 until her resignation in 1983, Dr. Margaret Webster served The Presbyterian Church in Canada with distinguished and faithful service as an educator. The Board of Ewart feels it is now fitting and proper as evidence of the gratitude and esteem in which Dr. Webster is held to confer on her the title Principal and Professor of Christian Education Emeritus. The Board is, therefore, requesting the General Assembly to appprove this action of the Board of Ewart College. (See Recommendation No. 2, page 272)

Post Graduate Studies

A number of graduates are now undertaking post-graduate studies in a variety of educational institutions such as The University of Toronto, The Ontario Institute for Studies in Education, and Boston College. The Board is grateful for graduates who continue their education at Master's and Doctoral levels, since work at advanced levels in education will enrich the life of the Church in the future.

The Financial Situation

Conscious of the deficit of the Church in 1984, Ewart College Board has been concerned about ways to deal with a reduction in its budget grant for 1985. Last year the unexpected demise of the roof meant the replacement of a new roof at considerable expense. This fact meant that the Board was especially grateful for a bequest received from the Florence Mackenzie Estate. Money was set aside for a Bursary Fund in honour of Miss Mackenzie, and some of the estate was used, along with our contingency fund, to meet the cost of the roof. The Board was determined to do everything possible to live within its budget during this year of constraint.

Issues Under Consideration

The Board has presently discussed a number of issues and is working on these matters:

- the consideration of charging tuition fees for Ewart courses. (Students already pay fees for any subjects taken concurrently at The University of Toronto and at The Ontario Institute for Studies in Education.)
- a new audio-visual presentation
- pastoral care for Ewart students
- the beginning of a new round of consultations with Knox College

REFERENCE FROM THE 110TH GENERAL ASSEMBLY

Board of Ministry Recommendation No. 7 (A & P 1984, page 404 and 31)

While it is not clearly stated in the recommendation that Ewart College should be responding to the request since the recommendation is directed to the "theological colleges" and Ewart's mandate is to be the "College of Christian Education for The Presbyterian Church in Canada", we believe it may be helpful for the Church to gain some understanding of Ewart's involvement in missiology and mission education. At this point, we should say that Christian Education relies on theological and Biblical studies and insights as well as on educational theory and practice. In addition, Ewart sees mission and evangelism as an integral part of the Church's theological concerns.

Ewart College has, therefore, always maintained that the concerns of Missiology and Evangelism are important in the educational preparation of its students for service in the Church. In its various courses, Ewart has included an emphasis on mission and has, for this, drawn upon its own faculty and also on leaders from the Church and world at large. In this way students are exposed to thoughts from a variety of representatives and are involved existentially in the world in which they will one day serve. The college has tried to make sure that the entire programme of the college is concerned with mission. All professors in individual courses encourage thinking and response from the students.

Specifically, mission concerns are dealt with in Christian Education courses and Biblical courses which are taken by all students. Other courses reflect on the rationale for mission, and some, selected by students in differing programmes, offer an opportunity to do additional work. Two Ewart College courses "The Church in Mission" and "The Church in the Modern World" focus on the concerns of Missiology and Evangelism. These courses draw on outside resource persons, including staff members from the Board of World Mission. "Living Religions" (a Ewart course) introduces some students to the religiously pluralistic world in which we live and in which they serve. Other students are concerned with these subjects in some of their university courses.

In addition, all students are involved every year in Field Education courses. During the college year students observe and work in a variety of churches and institutions with opportunity provided to reflect on the responsibility of the Church to various groups in society.

Internships for all students also provide practical in-depth experiences where the outreach of churches into their communities helps students to understand the importance of the Church's mission and the complex world to which the Church must relate.

It is the conviction of Ewart College that such an approach does not require the appointment of a professor to an individual chair in a college, but that greater intentionality be called upon from all professors in the colleges of our Church. Such intentionality though should not be limited to the colleges of the church but should be stressed throughout the Church since the "Church is mission" and all are involved in the Church's outreach.

Because of present financial restraints and the need to be prudent in spending, it is also the conviction of Ewart College that at this time, funds should not be made available for the appointment of a professor to a chair of Missiology and Evangelism.

CONTINUING AND LAY EDUCATION

Ewart College continues to offer two occasions each year for specialized short-term study opportunities in Christian Education: a programme for ministers, Christian Educators and other professional church workers early in the year (usually January) and a June programme for professional and lay workers.

Since the last report to the General Assembly, the following programmes have been held:

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 1984

ACCOUNTING PRACTICES

The following is a summary of accounting practices followed by the College.

(a) Investments and investment income

Investments include amounts invested in the Consolidated Investment Portfolio held by The Presbyterian Church in Canada which is adjusted to market value each year. Any increase or decrease in market value is allocated to the capital portion of the various scholarship and bursary funds.

Other investments are recorded at cost.

Income from investments is recorded on an accrual basis.

Realized gains or losses from investment transactions are recorded on the transaction date.

(b) Fixed assets

Land and building are capitalized in the books of The Presbyterian Church in Canada and are not included in these accounts. Furnishings and office equipment are expensed in the year acquired.

(c) Funds

The fund balances are segregated in relation to restrictions placed upon their use by the donor.

The College Board determines the usage of any bequest received for which no specific use is stated by the donor.

2. FLORENCE MACKENZIE LEGACY

During the year the College received \$65,900 from the Estate of Florence Mackenzie. This legacy was to be disbursed in the following manner:

COLLEGE, KNOX BOARD

To the Venerable, the 111th General Assembly:

The Board of Knox College respectfully submits this its 141st Annual Report.

As will be seen from the report of the Senate of Knox College, this has been a banner year for enrollment at the College. The large numbers of students in all years and in the post-M.Div. programme have placed significant pressures upon the academic resources and physical limitations of the College. The Board has endeavoured to deal with these matters to the best of its ability and we trust that our stewardship has been satisfactory. The business of the College requires a considerable commitment from the members of the Board and we have been fortunate to have appointed to our number by the General Assembly many conscientious and loyal members of the Church who graciously give of their time and experience for the benefit of the College. We are sure that the names which will be put forward at this General Assembly will again provide the Nominating Committee with a selection of sound candidates for appointment. Although we need and appreciate the perspectives which are brought to the Board by members from distant communities and other provinces, the College requires a strong representation from Metropolitan Toronto and its environs to support the week-to-week and month-to-month activities of the Board.

The 110th General Assembly has asked us to respond to proposals for new and varied courses of instruction and the report of the Senate of the College deals with these concerns.

The Administrative Council has requested the College and other spending boards to review their plans for 1985 with a view to reducing the overall budget requirements of the Church. The Board has responded positively to this request and is able to make use of funds otherwise available to the College thus placing less reliance on General Assembly funds. As a result of a general cut-back in available financing from the Church, the College will suffer a reduction of approximately \$53,000 in the budget funds available to it during 1985. To the extent that we are able to reduce the cost of administrative overhead and teaching resources to accommodate this significant reduction in our funding, we shall do so; we shall not, however, lower the high standards of theological education for which the Church holds the College responsible. We will resort to available funds contributed to the College which were hitherto intended for more long-range projects than surviving 1985. Unfortunately, the College, too, had an unexpected cost overrun in 1984 which must be a first charge on it 1985 funding.

In accordance with the recommendation of the 1984 General Assembly, we have filed with the Office of the Church Comptroller a copy of our investment portfolio as of December 31, 1984. We are pleased to provide this information to the Church with respect to the College's investment policies which we consider to have been notably successful over the years.

The College has taken seriously its obligation to investigate the civic responsibility of corporations whose securities are held by the College with respect to the investment of their funds and the encouragement of businesses in foreign countries. To this end we have corresponded with the Bank of Nova Scotia and are satisfied that it has taken proper notice of our concern with respect to the discouragement of apartheid in the Union of South Africa.

The College, being the recipient of funds from the Government of Ontario as a result of the College's connection with the University of Toronto, has been recently subject to the jurisdiction of the Inflation Restraint Board. Notwithstanding that the College maintained the salary levels of its Faculty exactly as determined by General Assembly and the Administrative Council from time to time over the last few years, the College was cited by the Inflation Restraint Board for failure to comply with the relevant legislation and was ordered to roll back the salary levels of the Faculty to wipe out the

12% increase granted by the Church for 1983. After lengthy negotiations with the Inflation Restraint Board (which we found to be cooperative and understanding of our circumstances), the matter was settled by reducing the last two monthly salary payments in 1984 to 1983 levels and prohibiting any increase in Faculty salaries for 1985. In every case the members of Faculty would have been entitled to the maximum increase of \$1,200 per annum approved by the Church and this they will not receive, in addition to the loss of the 5% increase for the last two months of 1984. The Board sincerely regrets that it has had to curtail the income of the Faculty in this way given that the levels of their remuneration were already significantly below levels of remuneration in other theological colleges in the University of Toronto community. The Board will ask the Administrative Council to take appropriate steps in due course to ensure that the College Faculty will not be further penalized in future years as result of their not obtaining the authorized increase for 1985.

Through the use of funds made available from the Restoration and Expansion Fund Campaign, we are planning a further continuing education seminar for ministers in the Halifax area in May of next year. We have also provided \$1,000 in our 1985 budget for a programme to support "ministers in residence" who are seeking further academic credits in Toronto.

The College has been the fortunate beneficiary of a number of bequests, all of which have been gratefully received and some of which have been of significant size; these latter have already been reported in the Presbyterian Record. Largely these bequests have been left to the College with instructions that the funds be used for the support and encouragement of students, which does not permit the Board to expend the funds on "bricks and mortar". For the latter we have, of course, been able to resort in part to the proceeds of the Campaign. During November 1984, the College received most of the principal to which it was entitled out of the Billes Estate (Canadian Tire Corporation founder), a sum of approximately \$700,000. These funds are subject to restrictions on their use by the College in effect limiting the College to expenditures on bursaries and scholarships. Although this assists the College in providing cash to students for living and learning expenses, it does mean that the College cannot defray its general overhead expenses out of these funds. Nor does the College consider it wise to use the capital of the bequest for bursaries and scholarships but rather intends to apply the annual income for this purpose. Some of such income may be used to defray costs of administrating the funds. We also received some \$442,000 from the Estate of Alice Margaret McKenzie which was left to the College with the intent that it be used to encourage and train students in the ministry. The College proposes at this time to use the income from this fund to expand and improve the academic and teaching facilities of the College in conjunction with monies received through the Campaign. To some extent, the availability of these sums will free up other monies which can legitimately be used for building maintenance and repair.

In addition to the major fire-safety programme undertaken in the summer of 1984 which is reported below, the College has made numerous expenditures during last year on building maintenance and repair. The Chairman of the House and Property Committee, Mr. Douglas Collier of Glenview Church in Toronto, deserves great credit and has the gratitude of the College for the exemplary way in which he has organized, directed and seen through to completion the many building and maintenance projects which have been made possible by the Campaign funds.

This year the Knox College Choir is undertaking a tour through the Maritimes and Newfoundland in the month of May. This will be the first time that the Choir has ventured to Newfoundland and we trust that, as before, it will be received with great appreciation by congregations in the Atlantic Provinces. The Choir continues to be a most effective ambassador for the College and a valuable source of recruitment for ministry in the Church.

The Board expresses its grateful appreciation to the donors of gifts received during 1984 to be used for scholarships and bursaries. We respectfully solicit such gifts which are of great value and encouragement to our students for the Ministry. Donations received in 1984 will be published in the Knox College 1985 Convocation programme.

The Knox College Restoration and Expansion Fund has continued to make good progress over the past year. This is the second year of participation by congregations and strong support has continued from this direction. The summary of contributions shown below indicates that, since last year's report, the churches have almost doubled their total contributions. The Campaign Committee believes that congregational support will aggregate close to \$2.5 million when all pledges have matured and receipts are finalized.

The success of the Campaign to date has enabled the College to realize many of the objectives established at the outset. An appointment to the Cooke's Church Chair of Pastoral Care and Counselling will soon be announced; the Faculty plan to continue the Max Bell Seminars for Ministers by spending a week in Halifax next spring; during the summer of 1984 in excess of \$800,000 was spent renovating the residences - bringing them up to acceptable standards of fire and electrical safety; work was completed on two of the chapel windows which are now restored in strength and beauty; roof and drain repairs have continued; steam lines have been replaced.

The Board has many priorities still to consider. Among these are the following: strengthening certain academic areas - church and society, biblical interpretation and preaching, church music; up-grading the fire and electrical standards in the academic wing; creating a reserve fund for unexpected repairs; repairing and cleaning the interior and exterior stone work; up-grading the food services area; improving the lighting and installing a better sound system in the chapel; renovating the gymnasium. The funds for these projects have not yet been received. In addition, inflation has taken its toll on our cost estimates so that we have not been able to stretch the donations as far as we had hoped. It now appears that \$3.5 million will be required to complete the original plans for building renovations and academic expansion. The Board is sure that the extra \$1.0 million will be forthcoming from the congregation as their local campaigns gain momentum.

The Board again expresses its appreciation for the support exhibited by so many individuals from all congregations. In particular, the work of those ministers and laypersons who have acted as Campaign Representatives at Synod, Presbytery and Congregational levels must be recognized in the successes attained so far. The Board also wishes again to recognize the special efforts of the Campaign Committee members, all of whom have worked steadfastly and with great patience for the benefit of the College.

In addition to the above, a number of churches which started the Knox Campaign late in 1984 or early 1985 have indicated continued support over the next 3 to 5 years.

The Board especially wishes to recognize at this time the services of Gordon MacNeill, Chairman and Gordon Patterson and Grant McDonald, Vice-Chairmen of the Campaign Committee. Their limitless and untiring efforts on behalf of the College, their willingness to travel and commit large portions of their otherwise busy lives to making our plans come true and their refusal to take "no" for an answer when confronted by

seemingly insurmountable obstacles have meant that the College could rely on the Campaign organization to fulfil its mandate and could be comfortable in the knowledge that the best possible outcome was assured. Nor would the Campaign have succeeded without the responsible leadership of Kenneth Hall, Campaign Director, who, with the valuable assistance of Margaret Waterman, has given us cheerful guidance of the highest quality throughout the Campaign. We are sure that all those who came in contact with these persons during the Campaign would support this expression of our enthusiastic gratitude to them.

In keeping with its obligation to provide safe premises in which to train students for the Ministry, the Board has authorized the preparation of a technical report with respect to fire-safety and electrical services in the academic wing. It is expected that this report will be completed in time to permit a major undertaking in this regard in the summr of 1986, funded by the Campaign.

With the formal conclusion of the Campaign in sight, there is much still to be accomplished. We therefore again solicit the continuing support and prayers of all within the Church and of other friends of Knox College, so that the work and influence of this great theological institution may not only continue but be enhanced in the future.

The College has set aside in its budgeting the bursary funds, the sum of \$25,000 for scholarships to support graduate fellowships commencing in the fall of 1985 and the sum of \$40,000 to subsidize the internship programme which is proving so successful among students and churches. In addition, \$3,000 has been designated from the funds received from the Billes Estate to provide annual bursaries for persons engaged in advanced degree studies. The College will not, however, be able to make bursaries available for those undertaking doctoral studies at this time.

The College residences have been fully occupied at rates for room and board which are competitively low and yet high enough to cover a major portion of our expenses in this area. As a result of the restoration programme, summer use of the residence was prohibited in 1984 but we expect that accommodation will be available in the summer of 1985 which will bring in some revenue to the College. We have been asked to consider whether it would be wise and proper to charge tuition fees for all students enrolled in the College. The policy of the Church has been that no tuition fees are required from students who are certified by a Presbytery. This matter is under review by the Joint Faculties of Knox College, Ewart College and Presbyterian College. It would be expected that, if tuition fees were charged to certified students, there would be an increased call upon the bursary funds of the College which would offset to some extent the benefit of the additional revenue.

It is proposed to undertake some work this summer in the nature of repair, maintenance and up-grading. This is expected to include an improvement of the acoustical treatment of the class rooms, the improvement and refurbishing of the sound system in the chapel and the insulation of certain pipes in the residences. It is estimated that the cost for the foregoing would be approximately \$50,000 in the aggregate. It is hoped that sufficient funds will be donated through the Campaign to permit the refurnishing of the residence rooms, even if it must be done on a room by room basis. In addition, the Board has authorized the expenditure of approximately \$26,000 to up-grade and improve the equipment in the kitchen. The food service at the dining hall of the College is reputed to be among the best in the University of Toronto and the College endeavours to maintain this reputation by providing the students with a wholesome balanced diet (which also happens to be tasty and interesting and includes some marvelous desserts). Mr. Charles Kwan, our Food Services Director, manages to do this with great success and we are indebted to him for the morale which is thus engendered among the students.

As announced last year, Dr. J. Charles Hay is retiring from the office of Prinicpal as of June 30, 1985. In this capacity as in others, Dr. Hay has been a distinguished and faithful servant of the Church and of the College and has undertaken his duties with

ability, vitality, and a welcome sense of humour. During his tenure, the responsibilities of the Principal have become more arduous and have been extended, principally with regard to the expanded curriculum and the increased number of students. He has also been asked to undertake many additional responsibilities with respect to the Restoration and Expansion Fund Campaign and has done so generously and with great effect. The Board wishes to record its sincere appreciation of Dr. Hay's services to the College as Principal and to acknowledge the deep debt of gratitude owed to him by the College and the Church at large for his work among us. A nomination for the office of Principal of Knox College will be placed before you for consideration. Dr. Hay will continue to occupy the Chair of Preaching and Worship until June 30, 1986.

The Board also wishes to express again its appreciation to the members of the College Faculty for the manner in which they carry out their duties. The Board is aware that it does not, and in some cases cannot, respond adequately to the requests and interests of the Faculty but it will continue to endeavour to do so to the best of its ability given its human and financial resources. The Faculty members are uniformally concerned to encourage the spiritual and academic progress of the students; for this the Board is, and we believe the Church at large should be, grateful. The College is one of the fundamental resources of The Presbyterian Church in Canada and our Faculty keep it at the forefront of theological education in Canada.

We are fortunate in having active and interested representatives from the Knox College Assocation and the Missionary and Theological Socity serving on the Board and its committees. The Board endeavours to foster an active and progressive relationship between itself and the student organizations and welcomes their valuable input to its deliberations.

Our relationships with the University of Toronto and the Toronto School of Theology continue to be more than satisfactory and of great benefit to the College. Dr. Iain G. Nicol, Professor of Systemic Theology at the College, has been reappointed as Director of Toronto School of Theology for a further term of five years. He has provided dedicated and effective leadership during a difficult period in the history of TST.

The Board also wishes to recommend to the Church at large the administrative staff which serves the College devotedly. The effort expended by them is critical to the successful operation of the College and is nonetheless so for being "behind the scenes". We are greatly indebted to them for their continuing loyalty notwithstanding that, by order of the Inflation Restraint Board of Ontario, none of the administrative staff received any inflation-related increase in salary during 1984.

The Board wishes to bring before the 1985 General Assembly a recommendation with respect to the appointment of a new Principal. The search committee charged with the responsibility of making a proposal in respect of such appointment has concluded its deliberations and will be reporting to a joint meeting of the Senate and Board of the College in early May. At such time, recommendations with respect to such appointment will issue from the Board and Senate and will be the subject of a further report to the General Assembly supplemental to this report. Such supplemental report may also give effect to emergent matters which arise hereafter.

SUPPLEMENTARY REPORT OF

THE BOARD OF KNOX COLLEGE

To the Venerable, the 111th General Assembly:

The Board of Management of Knox College respectfully submits this further report supplemental to its 141st Annual Report.

Appointment of Principal

The Senate and Board of Knox College established a Joint Search Committee for the principalship which met throughout last fall and winter. The Presbyteries were notified on October 1, 1984 of the resignation of Dr. Hay as Principal of Knox College and were invited to submit nominations for the position of Principal. The position was also advertised in the Presbyterian Record. Forty-two valid nominations were received from Presbyteries, naming nine candidates. No other nominations or applications were received by the Board. Five of the candidates nominated by the Presbyteries withdrew. Interviews were held with the remaining candidates, one of which subsequently withdrew. The Committee had the benefit of the valuable advice of a representative of Toronto School of Theology.

After due deliberation it was the unanimous decision of the Committee to recommend to the Joint Meeting of the Senate and Board of the College that the name of Dr. Donald J.M. Corbett be placed in nomination for the position of Principal of Knox College. This recommendation was approved unanimously by the Joint Meeting of Board and Senate and is the subject of the first recommendation appearing at the end of this supplemental report.

Dr. Donald Corbett is a native son with Scottish family roots in both eastern and western Canada. He was born into a Presbyterian home, and as a Presbyterian minister he represents a well-balanced loyalty to the denomination and to the principles and convictions on which our Church is based.

A graduate of Knox College, Dr. Corbett was ordained to the Ministry by the Presbytery of Westminster in 1957. He served charges in Prince George, Whalley and Vancouver in British Columbia before moving to Victoria-Royce Presbyterian Church in Toronto. Since 1979 he has served as minister of Rosedale Presbyterian Church in the same city.

Dr. Corbett's theological and administrative gifts have been recognized by the Church in his appointment to various committees and boards. He has been a member of the Board of Education, the Administrative Council and the Committee on Church Doctrine. He was Chairman of the Trustee Board of The Presbyterian Church in Canada and of the Board of Ministry's Task Force on the Vancouver School of Theology.

Dr. Corbett has a clearly articulated understanding of the relationship between Knox College and The Presbyterian Church in Canada. He regards it as essential that Knox College be a centre dedicated to an intelligent, scholarly, and contemporary reformed theology - a theology of the Word of God rooted and grounded in the reformed theological tradition. He is thus equipped and motivated to maintain and strengthen the ties between the College and the Church.

Dr. Corbett's training as a lawyer and his widely acknowledged skills as a negotiator will be a distinct asset to the College as it relates to its various constituencies - the Church, the Toronto School of Theology, and the University of Toronto. The upcoming renegotiation of the Memorandum of Agreement with the University calls for the legal and diplomatic skills which he has demonstrated throughout his career.

Although Dr. Corbett lacks teaching experience in an academic setting, his curriculum vitae amply demonstrates his intellectual capacity. His training in Arts, Law and Theology and the rigorous course of study culminating in his doctoral degree from the University of Edinburgh, together with a continuing interest in reformed theology and his skill as a communicator, admirably qualify him to teach introductory courses in Systematic Theology.

Dr. Corbett's pastoral experience, his commitment both to the Church and to Knox College, his skills as a negotiator and his intellectual interests make him an appropriate candidate for the office of Principal of Knox College and Assistant Professor in the area of Systematic Theology.

Chair of Preaching and Worship

Dr. J. Charles Hay has advised the Senate and Board of the College that he proposes to retire as Professor of Preaching and Worship at the end of the 1985/1986 academic year. It is therefore appropriate at this time that the Board seek nominations to fill the vacancy thus to be created and this forms the substance of the second recommendation which appears at the end of this supplemental report.

Recommendation No. 1 (adopted, page 27)

That the Reverend Donald J.M. Corbett, B.A., LL.B., B.D., Ph.D., be appointed Principal of Knox College, for an initial term of five years (A & P 1976, p. 451).

Recommendation No. 2 (adopted, page 27)

That, subject to approval by the Administrative Council and its Executive Personnel Committee, Knox College be granted permission to circularize the Presbyteries inviting the submission of names to be considered for nomination to the Chair of Preaching and Worship to fill the vacancy created by the retirement of Dr. J. Charles Hay as of June 30, 1986.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 1984

ACCOUNTING PRACTICES

The following is a summary of significant accounting practices followed by the College:

(a) Investments and investment income

Investments purchased by the College are valued at cost. Investments received by bequest are recorded on the basis of fair market value at the time of receipt.

Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis and dividends are recorded when received. Realized gains or losses from investment transactions are recorded as revenue receipts in the respective Funds.

(b) Fixed assets

Costs relating to the original land and buildings are recorded in the books of The Presbyterian Church in Canada and are not included in these accounts. Other fixed assets purchased by the College are expensed in the year of acquisition.

(c) Funds, donations and bequests

The fund, donations and bequests balances are segregated in relation to restrictions placed upon their use by the donor. The College Board determines the usage of any bequests received for which no specific use is stated by the donor.

COLLEGE, KNOX SENATE

To the Venerable, the 111th General Assembly:

Enrolment

Enrolment at Knox in the basic degree and diploma programme continues to grow. There were 93 students in this programme (including 5 General Assembly students) 15 enrolled in the Th.M., 8 in Th.D., 6 in D.Min., 1 M.A. and 1 Ph.D., for a total of 124, and with 6 occasional students in addition.

Fall Convocation

One of the unusual events at Knox College this past academic year was a special fall Convocation during which the Senate granted Honorary Doctorates to Principal Emeritus, The Reverend Dr. J. Stanley Glen and Professor Emeritus, The Very Reverend Dr. David W. Hay. The Chapel was filled for this occasion, as the Church joined with the College in honouring these two veteran ministers, who together represented 64 years contribution to Knox College and to the task of preparing men and women for ministry. Professor Joseph McLelland, a graduate of the College, and Dean of the Faculty of Religious Studies at McGill University, delivered the address on "The Concept of God in the Seminary". Both the Convocation and the Address were very well received, and it is our hope that we will be able to make that address available for a wider audience.

Special Lectureships

The Laidlaw Lectures were given this year by Professor Sallie McFague. Sallie McFague is one of our leading theologians on the North American continent, and has explored theology, often from a feminist perspective, with particular concern for theological language. The lectures were very well attended and her series attracted wide attention.

For the fall term we had Dr. Dale Bisnauth of the Presbyterian Church in Guyana as a Scholar-in-Residence. This represents one of the first fruits of the financial campaign, at least with respect to the academic programme. It was made possible through a substantial grant from the Charles Johnston Foundation, which at the initial instigation of Dr. Ted Johnston was designed to enable Knox College, in cooperation with the Toronto School of Theology, to bring a Third World Theologian to the Toronto campus. Dr. Bisnauth lived in residence, and entered fully into the life of that residence, and was able to establish very close contact with many of our students. From our viewpoint, the presence of a Third World theologian was of great help to us in our endeavour to introduce our candidates for ministry to the realities of the Third World, and deliver them from the parochialsm that constantly threatens us.

The Charles H. MacDonald Memorial Lecture was given this year by The Reverend Professor Donald V. Wade, known to all of us as a former Professor of History and Philosophy of Religion and Christian Ethics at Knox College. Again this lecture was well attended, as many former students of Don Wade were anxious to sit once more in his class, and it is available on tape from Communication Services.

General Assembly Referrals

The General Assembly has referred three items to Knox College. One was the reference from the 109th General Assembly (A & P 1983, p. 34) regarding a course on "Presbyterians and Evangelism in Canada". Dr. Brian Fraser, minister at Glebe Presbyterian Church and Adjunct Faculty member at Knox College, was asked to offer this course. The course consisted of an introduction to the way in which our church traditionally has dealt with the need for evangelism, a survey of the current debate and growing concensus about the context and scope of evangelism, and examination of the

dynamics of how people change and how the Church views that process, an exploration of the current literature in the field of evangelism, contemporary ideas regarding communication of and nurture by the Christian faith through the life of the Christian community, and the local congregation as the key locus for effective evangelism. Students were asked to develop a project which would enable "Median Street Presbyterian Church" (see Presbyterian Record October 1984, pps. 22-23) to develop a programme in evangelism. As part of the course a conference on Evangelism for the Toronto area was developed by Brian Fraser, with the Rev. Charles Congram and the Rev. Wallace Whyte as resource persons. As part of the attempt to introduce our students to specific projects in evangelism, Dr. Fraser used as participants in the course the Rev. Wallace Whyte, Rev. Chuck Congram, Rev. Charlotte Stuart, Rev. John Congram, Dr. Ed McKinley and the Rev. Merrill Reside. The course was very well received.

The Curriculum Committee gave consideration to the Assembly referral regarding the teaching of Missiology (A & P 1984, p. 404 & 31). It was agreed that this subject could be dealt with appropriately through a lectureship, when funds are made available.

The question of the acceptance of courses offered at Institut Farel for credit as part of the Basic Degree programme at Knox College was also given consideration, but regrettably, given the fact that Institut Farel is not accredited nor indeed is it in any way associated with an accreditation body, the College is not able to respond positively to this request.

Search Committees

The Board will be reporting with respect to the Search Committees for the Principal and also the Cooke's Chair of Pastoral Care and Counselling. Both these committees involved a great deal of time and effort on the part of members of the Board and Senate, with lay, alumni, faculty, and student representatives involved.

This was a very full year, and many other items were before Board and Senate for consideration and action.

Bursaries & Scholarships

As the Board will report, additional monies were received for bursary assistance. A special committee of Board and Senate has been working on the rationalization of our bursaries and scholarships, since these have come to Knox College throughout its long history. Some are no longer appropriate, and every attempt is being made to find ways of making more effective use of them while at the same time seeking to fulfill the intention of the original donors. They are at the time of writing in process of being computerized, and we hope that we will have greater command of this distribution. We are also working on developing a more effective programme of graduate scholarships, for both our own and overseas students.

Conversations with Ewart College

A committee has been appointed by Knox College to meet with representatives of Ewart College with a view to developing closer co-operation between the two colleges in the area of Christian Education. The Administrative Council appointed a representative from the Board of Ministry to serve on this committee.

Career Assessment

The Senate gave consideration this year to the development of some kind of career assessment programme, which would be of special assistance to our own students and perhaps also of some assistance to our own ministers in mid-career. We are in the process of trying to establish a pilot project in cooperation with the Anglican Church in Canada. The General Secretary of the Board of Ministry is also involved with the College in the development of this project.

Internships and Field Education Placements

The growth and the size of our student body are placing a great deal of stress on both our Field Education and Internship programme. We have had what we have called "Pilot Projects" in Internships over the last several years, but there are signs of growth in this area. It is expected that in 1985-6 there will be 10 internships and 20 Field Education Placements. This will place great stress on our own personnel resources, since there must be close and continuing liaison between the College and the congregations where these appointments are made.

Teaching Assistants

Knox College had a full range of teaching assistants this year, and they have more than proven their worth to the programme. These assistantships provide financial aid and teaching experience, while the T.A.'s serve as assistants to the faculty members in the various departments, and as liaison with the students, assisting them at many points in the programme. Our thanks are due to the following Teaching Assistants: Nancy Cocks, Dorcas Gordon, Michael Farris, John Vissers and Robert Elford.

Adjunct Faculty

Our thanks are also due to our Adjunct Faculty who have continued to serve us most effectively throughout this year: Prof. Russell Aldwinckle (S.T.), Rev. Dr. Brian Fraser (C.H.), Rev. James Thomson (Liturgics), Rev. Ian Clarke (C.E.), Rev. Ross Gibson (Homiletics).

Sabbaticals

The Rev. Professor Calvin Pater has been on sabbatical throughout the 1984-85 academic year, and the Rev. Professor Donald C. Smith completed his sabbatical during the Spring term of the 1984-85 year. The Rev. Professor Raymond Humphries will be on sabbatical for 1985-86.

College Choir

The College Choir, under the direction of Dr. John Derksen, has been very busy throughout this year, having conducted 7 services and concerts. It is in the process of planning a Spring tour to the Atlantic provinces, and will be performing at approximately 15 places. Our thanks are due to Dr. Derksen and also to the volunteer members of the choir for their willingness to give so much time to this effort.

Appointment of Prof. Iain G. Nicol

Prof. Iain Nicol has just completed a five year appointment as Director of the Toronto School of Theology, and following a review was re-appointed for an additional five years.

History of Knox College and the Knox College Archives

During the summer of 1984 one of our senior students, Mr. Stuart Macdonald, who holds a Masters degree in History, was appointed to organize the Knox College Archives. These are now catalogued and are therefore also available to Dr. Brian Fraser, who is in the process of beginning a history of Knox College. We hope that this will be completed in time for the 150th Anniversary of the College.

COLLEGE, PRESBYTERIAN SENATE

To the Venerable, the 111th General Assembly:

The Senate of The Presbyterian College, Montreal submits its report of the Session, 1984-1985. During this year the Principal, Reverend Dr. William Klempa was on a well-deserved sabbatical leave in Edinburgh, Scotland, and Dr. Frederik Wisse, professor of New Testament at the Faculty of Religious Studies of McGill University, functioned as Acting Principal of the College and Acting Chairman of the Senate. Reverend Daniel Shute, the librarian of the College, finished his Master of Library Science degree at McGill University and has joined the Faculty Council and Senate of the College. Others on the Faculty are Rev. Dr. Joseph C. McLelland, who finished this year his second and last term as Dean of the Faculty of Religious Studies at McGill, Dr. Robert C. Culley (on sabbatical leave during 1984-85) and Rev. Dr. Geoffrey D. Johnston, the Director of Studies. A recommendation for the reappointment of Dr. Johnston is appended to this report.

THE THEOLOGICAL PROGRAMME

The College has as its principle objective the training of men and women for the ministry of Word and Sacrament in The Presbyterian Church in Canada. It seeks to achieve this goal through academic studies in one of the oldest and finest of Canadian universities, McGill; through a field-based programme of learning in the actual practice of ministry in the Montreal Institute for Ministry and through denominational studies, worship and personal spiritual growth under the direction of the Faculty of Presbyterian College. The College operates in an ecumenical setting along with Montreal Diocesan College and United Theological College.

Through an agreement concluded in 1969 with McGill University, Presbyterian College participates in and helps to form the McGill Faculty of Religious Studies. The first two years of the theological programme leading to the Bachelor of Theology or the Master of Sacred Theology degree (for those with a religious major or honours in their Bachelor of Arts programme and a high B standing), are taken in the McGill Faculty of Religious Studies. Along with Anglican and United Church students, our Presbyterian College students receive instruction in Old Testament from Professor Patricia Kirkpatrick (Anglican), who replaced Professor Robert C. Culley (Presbyterian) during his sabbatical leave, and Professor Donna Runnalls (United Church); in New Testament from Professor Frederik Wisse (Presbyterian) and Professor N. Thomas Wright (Anglican); in Christian Theology from Professor Douglas J. Hall (United Church), Principal Pierre Goldberger (United Church), Professor William Lawlor (Roman Catholic) and Principal William Klempa (Presbyterian); in Church History from Professor Edward J. Furcha (United Church); in Philosophy of Religion from Professor Joseph C. McLelland (Presbyterian); in Christian Ethics from Professor Arthur Boorman (United Church) who upon his full retirement in 1986 will be replaced by Professor Gregory Baum (Roman Catholic); in Comparative Religion from Professor Robert Stevenson, Professor Charles J. Adams, Professor Katharine J. Young and Professor Braj Sinha; and in Liturgics from Dr. John I. McNab (Anglican). Professor Joseph C. McLelland is the Dean of the Faculty of Religious Studies until August 1, 1985.

The two year Bachelor of Theology degree of McGill is supplemented by a third year of professional studies at the Montreal Institute for Ministry. Students who have completed a bachelor degree prior to the B.Th. degree are eligible to receive the Master of Divinity degree after the professional year. It is conferred by Presbyterian College in conjunction with the Joint Board of the three Colleges.

In 1974 the three theological colleges affiliated with McGill formed the Montreal Institute for Ministry. The Institute was established to strengthen the professional and pastoral aspects of preparation for ministry in the third year of the student's programme of studies. Throughout the year the student is given the opportunity to learn through ministering to people in a local church or institution under the guidance of a supervising minister. In addition to the field appointment, students work in one of several supervised pastoral education groups (prison, hospital, school or social agency). There were in 1984-85 eight basic courses: the Ministry Seminars, Liturgy, Preaching, Pastoral counselling, Christian Mission, Christian Education, Church Management and Denominational Studies.

There were four one-week workshops. The classes in the Reformed Tradition, Confessionalism and the Westminster Standards, Presbyterian Liturgy and Polity are given by Presbyterian College.

The Montreal Institute for Ministry has undergone a number of changes in the past year. Dr. John McNab, Director of Studies at Montreal Diocesan Theological College, also acted as Executive Director for the Institute. Dr. Geoffrey Johnston continued in his teaching function at the Institute, and the Rev. Ron Coughlin served part time until the Rev. Bonnie Burnett, the new Director of Studies at United Theological College, takes over the position on May 1, 1985. Dr. Jack Neild, Rev. Arthur Sheffield, Rev. Shirley Herman, Dr. Lettie Cox, Rev. Chris Ferguson, Rev. Nathan Mair, and Rev. Kathryn Anderson taught in the programme on a part-time basis. After extended discussion between the Colleges it was decided not to proceed with the appointment of a new executive director. Cooperation between the Colleges in the Institute will continue but each College will be more directly responsible for the planning of the programme for its students in the Professional Year.

PRESBYTERIAN DISTINCTIVES

The teaching of Presbyterian Distinctives is emphasized within the total theological programme at the College. In addition to the regular course of studies at the Faculty of Religious Studies, Presbyterian students are required to take lectures and seminars one hour weekly during both fall and winter terms in their first and second years. One

term of "College Hours" is devoted to the study of the Presbyterian tradition, and a second to the Presbyterian understanding and practice of worship and preaching. In other terms attention is paid to the Christian ministry from a Reformed perspective, and to pastoral care. During their final year students continue their study of The Presbyterian Church in Canada, with particular reference to the Book of Forms, the Westminster Confession of Faith and other statements of the Church. College Hours, for the first and second years are taught by members of the College Faculty with the Principal taking overall responsibilities.

L. W. ANDERSON LECTURES

The 1985 L.W. Anderson Lectures were delivered on Thursday, March 7, by Professor Jan Milic Lochman of the University of Basel, Switzerland, one of the best known Reformed theologians in the world. His subject was "Challenge to Theology in East and West" and the lectures were entitled, "The Marxist Challenge: Theological Lessons from Christian-Marxist Encounter in Eastern Europe", "The Challenge of Western Pluralism: Zeal for Truth and Tolerance", and "The Name of God and the Hope of Human Identity in East and West." Professor Lochman stayed for ten days at the College and his visit and lectures were very much appreciated by all.

The L.W. Anderson Lectures for 1986 and 1987 will be combined in order to be able to organize together with the Faculty of Religious Studies of McGill a Calvin Symposium at the beginning of October 1986. The occasion will be the 450th anniversary of the first edition of the "Institutes".

CONTINUING THEOLOGICAL EDUCATION

In a time of economic restraint when it becomes necessary to cut programmes, the College continues to give priority to its continuing theological education programme. The Senate and Faculty are convinced that continuing theological education for the ministers of our Church is a prime requisite. Out of its total budget the College allocates close to \$10,000 annually to finance the two programmes which are offered. This amount is in addition to the modest fees which are paid by programme participants. Much time and attention are devoted to putting the programmes together, to inviting top calibre leaders and to housing and feeding our ministers. Those who come, many of whom come year after year, are always enthusiastic about the programmes. The registration is satisfactory but it could be higher. Figures from the Board of Ministry indicate that fewer than 50% of our ministers attend continuing education programmes. Our plea is that more and more ministers will come and that more and more sessions and presbyteries will encourage ministers to make use of the continuing education opportunities which are provided by our College and other theological institutions. Travel bursaries are provided for those who have to travel from some distance. The College offered two programmes during the 1984-1985 academic session:

COLLEGE LIBRARY

The Library has undergone a major reorganization during the past three years.

This renewal has included the proper classification of numerous volumes, the purchase of a third card catalogue, the establishing of a small French language collection, and the re-cataloguing of the College's Sebright collection of antiquarian books. Of special interest to alumni/ae of the College is the purchase of a map file to house the College's many years of composite photographs of the graduating classes. The Senate of the College has loaned its librarian, the Reverend Daniel Shute, to the Baptist Seminary in Managua, Nicaragua for the months of July and August of this summer. His task will be to help the Seminary's staff to organize its library.

RENOVATION OF THE COLLEGE CHAPEL

At a special meeting the Senate accepted plans for the renovation of the Chapel prepared by the architect, Mr. Murray R. Ross, the convener of the Church's Committee on Architecture. Work started in January and is expected to be finished in the early summer. Included in the plan is double glazing of the windows in the steeple to solve major leakage problems. Also the clerestory windows received double glazing for better insulation. The "floating" roof needed extra bracing since Montreal is in an earthquake zone. The balcony and vestry were removed since there were not needed and destroyed the architectural effect of the building. New lighting fixtures have been installed and the chancel area was moved from the centre west wall to the north-west corner of the sanctuary. A window was installed in the east wall looking out on the court yard. The chapel will be rededicated as the Rev. Dr. C. Ritchie Bell Memorial Chapel. The renovations were made possible through the Ritchie Bell Memorial Fund, a part of the proceeds of the sale of First Presbyterian Church in Montreal (the Milton Park Community Church, a continuation of First Church, meets at the College), and a legacy from the estate of the late Janet MacLeod which was designated for this purpose by the executors. The rededication service is planned for September 26, 1985 following the regular fall Senate meeting.

FRANCOPHONE THEOLOGICAL EDUCATION

The chief activities of L'Institut de Montreal during the 1984-85 academic year have been as follows:

Bible Ouverte

This is a programme of lay theological education through evening Bible studies. Two courses were offered this year, one on the biblical doctrine of creation, a kind of thematic Bible Study, and the other on Parables, contrasting those in the New Testament with parables elsewhere in the Bible and in other Judaic literature. A total of 15 persons registered for the programme.

Bible Ouverte is an ecumenical effort, led by a team of eight "animateurs" from Presbyterian, Anglican, Roman Catholic and United Churches. It is a programme which is quite unique in Montreal.

Montreal Institute of Ministry Core Group "en français"

The practice of having a francophone "core group" in the final year of the theological programme has been continued under the direction of the co-ordinator of the Institute, Mme Marie Payette-Falls. Four students have made use of this opportunity to immerse themselves in the French-speaking milieu.

Quebec Workshop

A workshop was organized by the Institute and held at the Dominican Pastoral Institute in Montreal for final year students on the Church in Quebec. The three-day workshop enabled students to familiarize themselves with the history of the churches in Quebec and to reflect on the nature of ministry in the light of the present situation of the churches in Quebec society.

The Institut welcomed as its co-ordinator Mme Marie Payette-Falls, replacing Mme Cosette Odier, who has returned to Switzerland. Mme Payette-Falls made an excellent contribution to the life of the Institut de theologie, and also to the Montreal Institute for Ministry.

COURSES IN THE THEOLOGY AND PRACTICE OF EVANGELISM

The 109th General Assembly resolved "that integral to the theological curriculum shall be at least one course of a semester in length in the theology and practice of evangelism and one semester in field work in Evangelism, beginning with the academic year 1984-85...". Our Senate is pleased to report that all theological students are now required to take a course in their second year called "Integration of Theological Studies", on the subject of the Mission of the Church in which the theology of mission and evangelism is studies. Third year students are also required to take a year-long course in Mission and Ministry. The matter of field work in evangelism has yet to be worked out. Now that the programme of the professional year is more directly in the hands of the College it is possible to do full justice to the intent of the 109th General Assembly in the 1985-86 academic year.

GIFTS TO THE COLLEGE

The College acknowledges gratefully the gifts for bursaries, scholarships and prizes as well as for the general funds of the College.

The One Hundred and Eighteenth Annual Convocation was held on Wednesday, the eighth day of May, one thousand nine hundred and eighty-five in Knox Crescent Kensington and First Presbyterian Church, Montreal. The degree of Doctor of Divinity (honoris causa) was conferred on the Reverend James Stewart Sankey Armour, B.A., B.D., S.T.M., Minister, The Church of St. Andrew and St. Paul, Montreal, Quebec, and the Reverend William James Ogsten Isaac, Superintendent of Missions, Synod of the Atlantic Provinces. The Convocation Address was given by the Reverend Phillip J. Lee, Minister of the Church of St. John and St. Stephen, St. John, New Brunswick.

ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(a) Basis of accounting

These financial statements are prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting policies except that in determining annual results of operations:

- (i) no charge is made in the general fund for depreciation on building
- (ii) the Senate determines the allocation between funds of revenue from investments (including gain or loss on disposal) and the amount of an annual interfund transfer which is reported as revenue of the General Fund.

Revenue from investments, including gain or loss on disposal, is allocated two-thirds to General Fund and one-third to Scholarship Funds for Disbursement.

(b) Significant accounting policies

Revenues and expenses are determined on an accrual basis of accounting.

A provision for depreciation on the building is charged against the Building and Maintenance Fund. (

The accounting policies adopted are considered to be appropriate by the Senate.

LAND

Land, which was acquired for nominal consideration as part of an exchange with McGill University, is shown at the value assigned in 1961.

3. WILLIAM VICTOR AND REV. WILLIAM LYALL LL.D. LECTURESHIP

For consideration received The Presbyterian College agrees and binds itself and its successors to pay to the donor an annuity in equal semi-annual payments of \$750 on the fifteenth day of each of the months of June and December during the lifetime of the donor. The obligation to pay such annuity shall terminate on the date of death of the donor. These payments are included in interest expense.

4. SCHOLARSHIP FUNDS FOR DISBURSEMENT

This fund represents accumulated income on Endowments for Scholarships and contributions received for scholarships, bursaries and prizes not specifically donated to the Endowment Fund, less applicable disbursements to date.

COLLEGE: VANCOUVER SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY

Report of the Principal

To the Venerable, the 111th General Assembly:

Agreement of Association

The 110th General Assembly agreed that The Presbyterian Church in Canada associate with the Vancouver School of Theology (following its five-year trial period of association). It further authorized the Board of Ministry in conjunction with St. Andrew's Hall Board to negotiate the details of this association. This negotiation has been completed and all three Boards ratified the Agreement, including a review in 1988. The Agreement also called for a joint appointment of the Dean of St. Andrew's Hall by St. Andrew's Hall and the Vancouver School of Theology. The Dean was also to teach Presbyterian Distinctives ("Chaplain" is the VST designation) to Canadian Presbyterian students and be a member of the teaching faculty of the Vancouver School of Theology.

Joint Appointment of Dr. Brian Fraser

A joint search committee of St. Andrew's Hall and the Vancouver School of Theology circularized the presbyteries and advertised in the "Presbyterian Record" and in "TOIL". Twenty-seven presbyteries responded with one or more nominations as follows:

Other suggestions to the search committee and personal applications produced an additional eleven names.

The Rev. Brian J. Fraser received a B.A. (Honours, Modern History) and an M.A. (History of Education), both from the University of Toronto, an M.Div. from Knox College and a Ph.D. from York University. His doctoral dissertation, "The Christianization of our Civilization': Presbyterian Reformers and their Defence of a Protestant Canada, 1875-1914" was supervised by Prof. Ramsay Cook. He has been a lecturer at Ewart College and both lecturer and Adjunct Faculty at Knox College. He has published several academic papers, and also a number of popular articles. An expanded version of his doctoral thesis is expected to be in press in the near future. In 1975 he was licenced by the Presbytery of East Toronto and in 1978, under appointment to Glebe Presbyterian Church, Toronto, he was ordained by the same presbytery. He has continued as minister of Glebe Church until the present. Dr. Fraser has also served on many committees of The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

In mid-summer Dr. Fraser will commence his duties at St. Andrew's Hall and the Vancouver School of Theology. His professorial appointment will be Assistant Professor of Church History. The Vancouver School of Theology is confident that this is a strong appointment and will enhance the School's effectiveness in preparing men and women to

serve in The Presbyterian Church in Canada. As a specialist in Church history, he will also make an important contribution to those training for ministry in the Anglican and United Churches.

Convocation

Convocation was held May Ist in Christ Church Anglican Cathedral, Vancouver. The Moderator of the 110th General Assembly, Dr. Alex Calder, participated with the Rev. David Stewart, Chairman of St. Andrew's Hall Board, to symbolize the new Agreement of Association between the Presbyterian Church and the School. The Convocation Speaker was Dr. Pauline Webb, who preached at the opening worship service of the Sixth Assembly of the World Council of Churches. Two Presbyterian Students, Laurie MacKay and Douglas Longstaffe, were among this year's graduates.

Missiology at the Vancouver School of Theology

The 110th General Assembly requested the theological colleges to review the teaching of missiology (in light of a report previously circulated by the Board of Ministry to the Presbyteries) and to report to the 111th General Assembly. I have read with interest the paper "Missiology – A Contemporary Theological Agenda" and have circulated it among our faculty. I have also reviewed the responses of the presbyteries to the questions posed by the Board of Ministry and note a difference of opinion regarding the establishment of a chair of missiology.

Prior to this request and these materials, the Vancouver School of Theology was already engaged in a serious study of how the School can contribute toward deepening the Church's understanding of its mission in the world. In 1980 the then Principal, Prof. Jim Martin, presented a paper, "Vision for Mission", and in 1983 Prof. David Lochhead prepared a study document for Senate consideration on a mission-based curriculum. This curriculum analysis toward possible curriculum revision has intensified during the current academic year. I believe there is a growing consensus that the curriculum as a whole should be more intentionally focussed on the mission of the Church. This is not just an aspect of practical theology but a central dimension of ecclesiology that requires careful historical, theological, ethical and sociological analysis.

This pervasive dimension of the curriculum does not preclude the necessity of particular courses. Four such courses are: M401 Foundations in the Theology and Practice of Ministry, M415 Society and Christian Responsibility, M431 Equipping for Mission, and LIII-555 The Church and the Societal Dimensions of Ministry. I have also noted with interest that Dr. Brian Fraser taught a course on Evangelism that was very popular with Knox College students during this past year. It may be that such a course can be one of his offerings at VST. During both the School year and in Summer School there are additional courses on the Mission of the Church available to M.Div. and Th.M. students as part of our Continuing Education offerings.

One major research project of Prof. Bud Phillips is on Church Revitalization. This onsite study of 14 United Methodist Churches in the State of Washington has already sparked considerable interest among Canadian Churches and grounds several Continuing Education offerings.

Perhaps one of the most significant projects that focusses on Mission of the Church is our Lay Education 10-week Television Program beamed by Anik satellite across the entire province of B.C.. This is a two-way service. Currently, Prof. David Lochhead has anchored a series, "Dimensions in Discipleship", that allows for a phone-back response and on-air dialogue. This direct contact with a wide variety of groups has made a major impact on the School's outreach (an estimated audience of 10,000) and brought to us the concerns and questions of a growing constituency. The full impact of this program on the life of the School and its basic degree programs has yet to be explored.

One further and very central dimension of this mission exploration concerns contextualization. What does it mean to "do theology" in the context of Canada, of the West Coast, and of the Pacific Rim? This is not easy to answer. One aspect has to do with preparing people more specifically for native ministry. We are, at present, beginning to explore a most imaginative program with the churches in the Caledonia area on the B.C. Coast. It is intended that this will be a significant breakthrough in furthering the Church's mission among and by native peoples. This past fall we held a conference for the entire school community on "VST Amid Global Realities". This is also strong encouragement to faculty to spend time in some third world country. This spring, Prof. Bill Crockett will have been the third member of faculty to travel recently to the Far East for study.

The issue of Mission is clearly of central importance to theological schools today. The Vancouver School of Theology has recognized this and is endeavouring to respond appropriately.

Since reporting last year your Committee's major activities and programs are ongoing, therefore it is our intention to make no recommendations but simply present a succinct report on the areas of our work which we believe are of prime importance to the Church at this time.

Your Committee is pleased to report that during this past year we have observed a greater integrated use of media resources and communications technology by local congregations to effectively support their ongoing programs. We applaude these congregations who have made good use of: audio-visual resources (films, filmstrips, audio and video tapes), radio ministry, cable television programs, local/area commercial television programs, newspaper advertising and newsletters, telephone ministry, new church signs and computers – just to name a few. We will continue to encourage them and pledge our support to those wishing our assistance in the wider use of this technology in their particular communities.

COMMITTEE EVALUATION

As a "service" committee we believe that over the past seven years we have successfully responded to most of the particular needs and requests from boards, committees, presbyteries, congregations and individuals. We have helped the Church face these many challenges of the use of modern technology through continued evaluation and improvement of our services and programs. To this end your Committee, this year, has solicited the assistance of seven members of the World Association for Christian Communication to carry out an independent and objective study of the Committee's mandate, programs, staff and productions and to make, if necessary, recommendations as to where we might make changes and/or improvements.

Each evaluator was mailed copies of our mandate and committee structure along with our 1982, 1983 and 1984 reports to the General Assembly. As well, each evaluator had a personal interview with the Director during the past year. We are pleased to present excerpts from their evaluations:

- 1. "There has never been a time in history when... Canadians need the message of hope and care that can be provided by Jesus Christ. The Presbyterian Church in Canada is in a unique position to be able to provide a kind of leadership of hope which is so crucially needed in our society. We stand strongly with the Communication Services Committee and their courageous outreach as they enable the local church and Christians across the country to find means of expressing their faith."
- 2. "We have noted with a sense of "coveting" the information your Committee has shared with churches in how to communicate. This type of leadership is essential... and gives local congregations the reason to want to support the work of the denomination. We congratulate you."
- 3. "We were most impressed with the comprehensive range of recommendations proposed to your General Assembly between 1982 and 1984. Whereas some groups have placed heavy emphasis only on the electronic media, your proposals suggest a balanced variety of services. We would go so far as to say that there are few church bodies who have a comprehensive and sensible an approach as the ones you have proposed."
- 4. "Our evaluation of the work of the Communication Services Committee is that it has been effective and innovative in its mission not only for The Presbyterian Church in Canada, but a leader in ecumenical relationship and co-operative work."

We thank these seven members of the World Association for Christian Communication for assisting your Committee in completing this study by submitting their comments and evaluations. Based upon their comments your Committee believes this reinforces our mandate and supports the direction in which we feel the Church should be going in the use of modern technology and resources. Therefore, your Committee will continue to serve the Church, its agencies and congregations with new vigour and renewed confidence.

AUDIO-VISUAL RESOURCES LIBRARY

Your resource library continues to grow. Over 700 congregations, including some Baptist, Anglican and United Churches, have obtained up-to-date catalogues (including Supplement #1, 2 and 3) and are making excellent use of films, filmstrips, audio and video cassettes. During this past year we added 140 new resources, including 50 half inch V.H.S. and Beta video tapes. Two hundred and fifty congregations have now taken out annual Audio-Visual Resources Library (AVRL) memberships, at a cost of \$35.00, which provides them with unlimited use of resources, exclusive of postage and handling costs. We would encourage congregations not using the resources from their Audio Visual Resources Library to contact the staff to see how such resources might help to support their congregational programs.

CBC RELIGIOUS ADVISORY COUNCIL

We are pleased to report, despite the seventy-five million dollar cuts to CBC programs and staff, that religious programming on CBC radio and television have survived. Your Director, acting as your Presbyterian representative on the CBC Religious Advisory Council, continues to serve the interests of the Church and religious broadcasting and is pleased to report that the following congregations presented Presbyterian worship services during the 1984-1985 CBC "MEETING PLACE" season:

INTERCHURCH COMMUNICATION

Interchurch Communication is a coalition of a communications staff or appointed person from each of six Christian denominations in Canada, representing the General Synod of the Anglican Church, The Baptist Convention of Ontario and Quebec, The Lutheran Council in Canada, The Presbyterian Church in Canada, the Episcopal Commission for Social communications of the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops, and The United Church of Canada. Interchurch Communication, as a coalition, enables the church institutions to act together in areas of mutual interest in the field of communications.

The Director of Communication Services continues to participate as your representative on this coalition and is pleased to report that Interchurch Communication has formed a "Task Force on Communications Technology" to study the variety of computers and word processors presently being used in the different church structures. A survey is to be undertaken that will define and explain the different communications technologies presently in use, the ways in which each technology could be used in church systems, estimates of costs for implementation on a local regional and national basis along with recommendations where appropriate for technologies most compatible with church systems.

A full report, when completed, will be circulated to the Church for consideration and study.

CANADIAN INTERFAITH NETWORK

As reported to the 110th General Assembly, your Committee has continued its relationship with the Canadian Interfaith Network (CIN) as an "observer" rather than as a full participating member with all of its financial obligations. The Board of Directors of CIN reported on November 14th 1984 that "although the case for such an interfaith retwork is generally sound" a number of practical concerns remain. As a result it was felt that more time was needed to consolidate the Network's position, thus CIN requested and received an adjournment of the licence hearing from the Canadian Radio-Television and Telecommunications Commission (CRTC).

Two rather severe constraints - money and time - have kept CIN from the essential task of building and development from the grassroots up. Now with the adjournment of the application process, and the prospect of an infusion of funds from outside the membership group the Network is anxious to take "its story on the road" and to consult fully with those who stand to gain most from this unique religious television service.

The objectives, timetables and budgets are presently in the final stages of preparation. As they become available your Committee will immediately report to the Church through The Presbyterian Record, newsletters and other media forums to assist Presbyterians in understanding more clearly the nature and potential of "religious broadcasting" in Canada.

COMPUTERS IN THE CHURCH

The Computer Sub-committee presented a successful computer display at the 110th General Assembly in Peterborough. This committee met throughout the year to search out software programs that could be used by our congregations. As well they compiled, and mailed out, a list of ministers/congregations who responded to the computer questionnaire distributed in the BCL mailing.

Plans were underway to print a Presbyterian computer newsletter. However, because of the 12.24% reduction in the 1985 budgets, your Committee found it impossible to continue to not only fund this newsletter but keep the sub-committee operating as well. Through the kind generosity of the Church Growth Committee we had sufficient funds to print and mail out one computer newsletter. This newsletter contained the list of all ministers/congregations presently using computers along with information concerning an excellent new Canadian church computer newsletter already on the market dealing

with both software and hardware. Your Committee thought it redundant to have two Canadian church computer newsletters.

Interchurch Communications (the communications co-operative of the six mainline churches) recently established "a task force on communications technology" to study the variety of computers and word processors presently being used in the different church structures as well as identifying the people who could assist our churches in providing leadership, information and assistance in this area of communications technology.

Taking into consideration all of the above factors, your Committee decided not to continue the computer sub-committee but that Anne Pennock, chairperson of this sub-committee, would become our liaison person with other ecumenical computer groups. As well, we have recommended and will support the present computer newsletter entitled "Computers in the Church," edited by Doug Tindal and published by Wood Lake Books.

We would like to thank Anne Pennock and her computer committee for doing the "spade work" for our Church in the area of computers and for their efforts in setting up and operating the Computer Display in Peterborough last June.

We would also like to thank the Church Growth Committee for supporting the work of this special committee, especially with funding and the leadership given by Dr. Jim Sauer.

PRODUCTIONS

Due to the increased demand for production services your Committee, on September 4, 1984, contracted the services of Mr. Neville Stevenson as our Production Technician. Mr. Stevenson has brought to this position a wide background of experience and talent, particularly in the area of photography. Your Committee feels very fortunate and extremely pleased to have him assisting in the area of the production of filmstrips, audio and video tapes.

This year has been extremely busy. Not only have we assisted the various boards, committees, colleges and other church agencies with their respective audio-visual productions but we have completely recatalogued our master slide collection, overhauled and repaired our equipment and redesigned our studio/production facilities to provide even better quality services to those seeking our assistance.

We would encourage those in need of production assistance and facilities to contact the Director and Production Technician.

STAFF APPRECIATION

Your Committee operates with a staff of three: Director, Secretary-Librarian and Production Technician. Much of the ongoing daily routines and workload fall directly into the lap of Mrs. Meta Robinson (secretary/librarian) and Mr. Neville Stevenson (production technician). We wish to recognize their loyalty and professionalism in handling the myriad number of requests for resources, equipment and productions throughout the past year. Their patience and cheerfulness are appreciated by those with whom they come in contact. The Committee, Chairman and Director wish to note here their appreciation and sincere thanks for a continued job so well done.

We believe that Christ is calling us at this particular moment to provide a very special witness through media as a handmaiden to the authentic expression of faith found in the local congregation. To this end, your Committee commits its energy, resources and expertise to supporting the work of all agencies in our Church both here at home and abroad.

CONGREGATIONAL LIFE, BOARD OF

To the Venerable, the 111th General Assembly:

Since the 110th General Assembly, the work of the Board of Congregational Life has been characterized by some new initiatives of co-operation, considerable pressure, and a certain amount of turmoil.

The Board worked in co-operation with:

- The Church Growth Committee in establishing the Co-Ordinating Unit on Evangelism and in publishing a catalogue of resources called Evangelism CUEs;
- The Board of Ministry and the Church Growth Committee in sponsoring a pilot workshop on "Facilitating Creative Change", designed to help ministers understand the problems and opportunities resulting from introducing changes within congregations;
- the Renewal Fellowship Within The Presbyterian Church in Canada, and the Board of Ministry in designing a conference for clergy on the theme "Hope In Our Calling: Spirituality in Ministry".
- the Board of World Mission in promoting the recent special emphasis on stewardship called "Fulfilling Discipleship".

The ceaseless preoccupation with a diminishing budget for programming for the Board of Congregational Life, as for all other boards and agencies, has placed a considerable amount of pressure on the Board and its staff. Fiscal restraint tends to frustrate visionary thinking. Fear of failure and wastage militates against experimentation. The need to find new resources and new ways of doing the work assigned to the Board has created some turmoil.

These stressful circumstances ought not to be allowed to obscure or diminish in any way the debt of gratitude that the denomination owes to the staff of the Board of Congregational Life. In particular, the Board acknowledges its gratitude to Brant Loper for the contribution he has made to the denomination. His consideration of, and sensitivity toward, people have taught us a great deal. Brant, whose resignation has been accepted by the Board, begins a new chapter in his pilgrimage and career and does so with the earnest prayer and best wishes of the Board of Congregational Life and all who have been touched by his ministry.

WORSHIP

The major direction of the Worship Committee of the Board has continued to be the development of the "Service Book" and the revision of the "Book of Common Order", to be ready by 1988 as reported last year. The task forces of the Worship Committee have begun to send in the manuscripts of foundation papers and orders of worship which they have drafted including services of Word and Sacraments, Marriage, Funerals, and several functions carried out by the Courts of the Church.

The Board commends members of the task forces for their dedication to our joint work and for their sensitivity to the needs of the Church for relevant and beautiful worship resources as we move toward the twenty-first century.

Additional concerns of the Worship Committee include the preparation of Presbyterian Prayer Partnership which has a total distribution of 15,064 in 248 standing orders.

The Worship Committee has editorial and promotional responsibility for "These Days" which has a circulation of 8,000. Plans are under way for the Board to assume the responsibility for the distribution of "These Days".

OUTREACH AND CORPORATE WITNESS

Evangelism

In the area of Evangelism, we continue to promote the use of the many resources produced. We have been gratified with the use made of the notebook "Basics for Congregational Life" with its wholistic approach to evangelism. The most significant section of this resource is on evangelism and growth. Co-operation with the Committee on Church Growth to Double in the Eighties has produced the new venture called CUEs for Evangelism. CUE stands for Co-Ordinating Unit on Evangelism, which combines in one catalogue all the resources produced by our Church on evangelism – print, audio visual, and people.

The Committee is actively involved in the planning for the next national Christian Festival Chretien, to be held in Calgary in May of 1986. The focus is evangelism, witness, and dialogue with the community. It will be fully ecumenical, national in scope and regional in focus. It is a joint venture of the Calgary Council of Churches and the Coalition of Christian Festivals.

The Board is concerned that congregations are not always able to read about and utilize the many fine resources that are available from the Church Offices. Too often, it rests with a very busy minister to be either a channel or a bottleneck for resources to the Church. The Board invites the General Assembly to address congregations on this subject as follows.

Recommendation No. 1 (adopted, page 20)

To assist ministers in dealing with the information explosion particularly as it relates to pronouncements of the General Assembly, its Boards, Committees, and related Coalitions, and to enable congregations to have greater access to our denominations broad resources and programs; the General Assembly recommends that congregations assess the adequacy of the secretarial and administrative support they provide to their ministers and be strongly encouraged to take appropriate action.

Social Justice

Once again the issue of capital punishment is being debated in Canada and there is pressure for reconsideration of the matter in Parliament. The Board reminds the Church that while the General Assembly of 1954 affirmed the right of the state to take a life, the Assemblies of 1957, 1965, 1966, and 1981 clearly affirmed the opposition of the Church to capital punishment.

Recommendation No. 2 (adopted as amended, page 20)

That the 111th General Assembly remind the Government of Canada of the long standing opposition of the Church to capital punishment.

Recommendation No. 3 (adopted, page 20)

That the 111th General Assembly encourage the congregations and courts of the Church to utilize the resources available from the Board of Congregational Life for the study of the issue of capital punishment, and after careful consideration, communicate with their Members of Parliament their views on this issue.

The Committee has been working with the other agencies of the church and our ecumenical partners on the various issues that arise out of the current national economic situation.

One aspect of this problem deals with the question of using the manufacture and sale of conventional armaments to Third World nations as a means of stimulating the economy. Some of the current debate about Canada's participation in Star Wars Technology is a part of this larger issue. It is not a question of defense, but the moral question of using armaments as a means of creating jobs.

Congregations and individuals who are interested in this question are invited to contact the Board of Congregational Life for study resources, such as "Economic Recovery and Military Spending: Christian Concern over Government Policy."

LAY MINISTRIES AND EDUCATION

Curriculum Development

The Christian Education: Shared Approaches program began in 1971 and the first resources were used in 1976. A proposal has been made to undertake a complete revision which will provide new resources for the Church no later than 1990 and hopefully by 1988. The proposal for Christian Education: Shared Approaches is to undertake development along two tracks.

Approach A will have as its focus the study of the Bible approach.

Approach B will have as its focus the personal and community life of the Christian with the Bible as a primary resource for that life.

At the same time The Presbyterian Church, U.S.A. proposed to several reformed/presbyterian denominations that they develop an educational program with an emphasis unique to presbyterian/reform theology. The denominations approached are The Cumberland Presbyterian Church, The Reformed Church in America, The Presbyterian Church, U.S.A., and The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

Faced with these three proposals, the Board has agreed to participate in the development of Approach A (The Bible) of the Christian Education: Shared Approaches, as well as in the presbyterian/reformed proposal.

As the proposals are more fully developed a decision regarding a recommended curriculum will be made.

Curriculum Distribution

The present CE:SA curriculum and any future curriculum developed by our denomination will be distributed by the denomination. At present this will be done through the Board of Congregational Life.

One of the implications of this change is that revenue from the sale of curriculum will accrue to the Church. Congregations purchasing CE:SA curriculum from other sources at present are encouraged to consider the benefits to our own church of purchasing from the Board of Congregational Life.

Adult Education

With the publication of "Not By Constraint", a booklet by Rev. Dr. John Cameron of Charlottetown, on the pastoral role of elders, a full complement of resources for eldership development is now complete, and includes:

- "The Eldership Development Kit"
- The Eldership Pamphlet "The Elder Who and What"
- "The Eldership in Today's Church"

Additional resources for Adult Education include:

- a study guide for "The Gospel According to Genesis"
- a study guide for "Baptism, Eucharist and Ministry"
- a study guide for "Living Faith"
- course material for "Training for Ministry"

Mission Education Consultation

It is the responsibility of the Board of Congregational Life to place before the General Assembly the proposal for the mission study themes arrived at in the Mission Education Consultation. They are as follows Recommendation No. 4 (adopted, page 20)

That the mission study themes for 1987-1988 be as follows:

1. Geographic - "The Churches and Peoples of the U.S.S.R

2. General - "Towards Health and Wholeness"

and, that where appropriate, the Board of World Mission, the Board of Congregational Life, and the Women's Missionary Society (WD) co-operate in the preparation of suitable materials for use across the Church.

Ministry With Men

A consultation among representatives from sixteen congregations was held in Guelph, Ontario, to consider, from the experience of the participants, the factors that contribute to an effective ministry among men in a congregation. The findings of this consultation have been described in "EQUIP" and will continue to guide the Board in supporting a congregational ministry with men.

Youth/Young Adult

1985 has been designated International Youth Year. This theme has been emphasized by the Board in

- I. Production of a Sunday bulletin cover,
- 2. Youth Ministry Resource Kit,
- 3. Youth Celebration, a leadership training event,
- 4. A directory of resources for Young Adult Ministries.

The Presbyterian Youth Triennium has had a history of positive impact on the youth of our Church. The Youth Triennium for 1986 is in the planning stages.

Recommendation No. 5 (adopted, page 20)

That congregations, presbyteries and synods be urged to take an active part in recruiting and sponsoring youth as well as organizing transportation pools for the 1986 Presbyterian Youth Triennium being held at Purdue University, Lafayette, Indiana, the week of July 7th, 1986.

The General Assembly Young Adult Observers continues to be a significant program of church leadership training and youth involvement. In response to a resolution initiated by Young Adult Observers, the Board has developed a proposed program whereby the Young Adult Observers are brought to the site of the General Assembly at least one day prior to the opening of the Assembly. This will provide an opportunity to develop a community dynamic as well as a time to learn from each other and to learn about the structure of the Church. At the present time the presbyteries sponsoring Young Adult Observers contribute \$50.00 toward the expenses incurred by the General Assembly in accommodating the Young Adult Observers. This does not provide sufficient funds for a meeting of the Young Adult Observers the day prior to the opening of the Assembly. Additional support must be sought from the sponsoring bodies.

Recommendation No. 6 (adopted, page 20)

That sponsoring Presbyteries be asked to increase their funding for each General Assembly Young Adult Observer by \$50.00 to allow for a meeting of the Young Adult Observers one day prior to the opening of the General Assembly.

Family Ministries

"A Church Guide for Strengthening Families" is a loose leaf handbook developed for planning congregational family ministries available from the Board.

Through the Canadian Ecumenical Family Ministries group, and with support from the Government of Ontario, a project is being developed to provide training for clergy in the area of counselling on the subject of family violence.

Camping

The late Gladys E. Montgomery left a bequest to the Presbyterian Church of about \$500,000 to be used "in providing holidays at a suitable camp or country home for children whose parents are unable to provide for same." The Board was asked by the Administrative Council to prepare a proposal for the use of this bequest and the proposal was approved in March of 1982. That proposal included a component of leadership development to insure that camps could offer effective experiences for children disadvantaged or otherwise. The Board of Congregational Life considered the ways in which a leadership development program may be most effectively carried out and agreed to establish a standing committee of the Board called "Camping and Outdoor Ministry Committee", with a mandate of five years during which time a leadership development program for church camping and outdoor ministry was to be designed and put in place. It was agreed that a contract would be let to engage the services of a qualified staff person for that term to undertake this assignment at the direction of the committee.

Synod Congregational Life Committees, or their equivalents, have been asked to appoint representatives to the Camping and Outdoor Ministry Committee of the Board and to do so in close consultation with the appropriate camping bodies within each Synod. Progress has been somewhat slow in establishing the committee and recruiting a contract staff person. In the meantime at the direction of the Board of Congregational Life the camps of The Presbyterian Church in Canada have been invited to apply for "camperships" to be made available from \$10,000 set aside from the Gladys Montgomery Estate Fund.

STEWARDSHIP

The Board of Congregational Life expresses commendation to the congregations for their support of the General Assembly Budget in 1984. Congregations contributed to the General Assembly Budget in an amount that was an increase of 5.3% over 1983 givings, which was approximately 1% over the inflation rate..

General Assembly Budget Allocation Scale

Based on recommendations received from the Administrative Council a task force has been established to investigate thoroughly the General Assembly Budget Allocation Scale. A preliminary report will be available on this subject by the end of 1985.

Stewardship of Accumulated Resources

Eight people have received training through workshops on the Stewardship of Accumulated Possessions and are now available to assist congregations and presbyteries to set up workshops on this theme. They are:

Rev. William Perry, Westminster Presbytery

Mr. Hugh Lloyd, Winnipeg Presbytery

Rev. William McElwain, Niagara Presbytery

Rev. George Dobie, Paris Presbytery

Rev. Edward Dowdles, Brampton Presbytery

Rev. Larry Cowper, Hamilton Presbytery

Rev. Fred Rennie, Glengarry Presbytery

Rev. Mel Fawcett, Prince Edward Island Presbytery

Such workshops teach that through special gifts, the making of Wills, and the transfer of life insurance to the Church as beneficiary, we can advance the Church's mission now and in the future.

Recommendation No. 7 (adopted, page 20)

That congregations become active in promoting and developing the Stewardship of Accumulated Possessions, and seek out the expertise of one of the identified resource persons to be of assistance to them; or seek the help of qualified people in

their community to assist with workshops dealing with the Stewardship of Accumulated Possessions.

Stewardship and Mission Task Force

This task force comprised of members from the Stewardship Committee of the Board of Congregational Life and the Committee on Education for Mission of the Board of World Mission has continued in the implementation of the strategy approved by the 110th General Assembly. The goal of this program is "to promote an understanding of stewardship and mission throughout every congregation that would be informative of the witness of The Presbyterian Church in Canada and challenge them to respond to the call of Christ."

This goal is to be met through congregational representatives participating in a repeatable detailed presbytery workshop.

The workshop is entitled "Alive for Mission: Stewardship and Mission in Harmony". According to the established time line, all presbyteries are to complete one presbytery workshop of "Alive for Mission" between January 1985 and January 1986.

Recommendation No. 8 (adopted as amended, page 20)

That every presbytery fulfill the mandate of the 110th General Assembly and carry out at least one of the "Alive for Mission: Stewardship and Mission in Harmony" workshops in the year 1985 and that failure to fulfill this mandate be reported to the 112th General Assembly with reasons for failure.

EVANGELISM TASK FORCE

The Board participated in the task force mandated to develop a strategy for evangelism initiated by the Church Growth Committee. In response to the work of that task force the Board resolved to support the strategy outlined by the task force and to work toward establishing a Standing Committee on Evangelism of the Board of Congregational Life through the negotiated realignment of staff and resources of the Committee on Church Growth by December 31st, 1985. Negotiations have begun with the Committee on Church Growth and there is every reason to believe that such a committee will be established to resource the Church in a very intentional evangelism by December 31st, 1985.

CHURCH AND SOCIETY

Several months ago the Consultation on Church and Society put forward a proposal suggesting the creation of a Board of Church and Society. This proposal was considered by the bodies represented on the Consultation on Church and Society individually and then again at a consultation dealing with the proposal and reactions to it. As a result of that initiative, the Board of Congregational Life resolved to work toward establishing a Standing Committee of Church and Society of the Board of Congregational Life by realigning staff and resources of the present Committee on Outreach and Corporate Witness. In keeping with the spirit of the original proposal from the Consultation on Church and Society, the Board understands its own reconfiguration to be a step toward the consolidation of the several groups in our denomination relating to social justice/church and society issues. To effect this consolidation, the Board of Congregational Life presents the following recommendation.

Recommendation No. 9 (referred to Consultation on Church and Society, page 20)

That the 111th General Assembly require the proposed new Committee of Church and Society of the Board of Congregational Life to be inclusive of the mandates and budgets of the Consultation of Church and Society and the International Affairs Committee.

OVERTURE NO. 3, 1984 (A & P 1984, p. 18, 524-25) Re: Women's Organizations in the Congregation

The Overture from the Session of St. Edward's Church, Beauharnois, Quebec, notes that there are various organizations of women in congregations and there are no directions in the Book of Forms for their organization, membership, purposes and relationships to other organizations. The Overture suggests that such direction be included in the Book of Forms.

The Book of Forms in Section 109.1 places the responsibility for the supervision and oversight of all associations of members and adherents connected with the congregation, on the Session. It would seem that Sessions are in the best position to determine most wisely the terms of reference of organizations in the congregation. To invite the General Assembly to ascertain appropriate organizational details for congregational organizations and then inscribe them in the Book of Forms, would be to usurp the proper authority and responsibility of the Session. In particularly inusual circumstances, a Session may seek guidance from a Presbytery in working out guidelines for congregational organizations. Such a recourse to Presbytery would doubtless be more helpful than seeking uniform regulation through the Book of Forms.

Recommendation No. 10 (adoped, page 21) That the above be the answer to Overture No. 3, 1984.

SUPPLEMENTARY REPORT OF

THE BOARD OF CONGREGATIONAL LIFE

The preamble to our report acknowledges the debt of gratitude owed to the staff of the Board of Congregational Life and mentions Brant Loper in particular who has resigned from the Board. Since the report was prepared the resignation of David Murphy, Associate Secretary for Stewardship, has been received, effective June 30th.

David will be missed as the gentle yet persuasive teacher of stewardship as lifestyle. His work and presence have been characterized by conciliation, a much needed virtue in our Church.

Recommendation No. 11 (adopted, page 21)

That the General Assembly note the resignation of Brant Loper and David Murphy and record its gratitude to them for their contributions to the life and work of The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

ECUMENICAL RELATIONS COMMITTEE

To the Venerable, the 111th General Assembly:

The Committee met three times during the year, with several more meetings of the Executive required to respond to the many communications from other churches and ecumenical agencies.

The World Council's statement of convergence on Baptism, Eucharist and Ministry from Lima, Peru was studied by a joint committee representative of the Church Doctrine Committee and of our committee. A large number of Presbyteries studied the document and their replies were considered by the joint committee. The report on the study will be made by the Church Doctrine Committee. (See pages 247-252)

We believe that in the process of studying B.E.M. many of our people have been helped to do some serious thinking about our own theology of the Sacraments and our practices in worship. Have we been casual or even indiscriminate in the act of baptism? In celebrating the Lord's Supper have we been the most meticulous about matters of least importance theologically? To make a valid contribution to the wholeness of Christian thought and practice in the total Christian community we should be sure that we are sharing the best of our denominational tradition.

Another special effort we undertook was toward implementation of Recommendation No. 5 in our Supplementary Report to the 110th Assembly (A & P 1984, p. 376-377). Questions were sent out to the presbyteries to assist them in considering the level of commitment to ecumenical activities. A substantial number of presbyteries have replied; after analysis and study a report will be made.

Preliminary steps have been taken along with representatives of the Board of Ministry and Consultation on Church and Society toward sponsoring workshops for ministers on the issues and impact of our ecumenical involvements, especially within the Canadian Council of Churches and also the World Council of Churches. The hope is that these might be held in conjunction with synod meetings in 1986.

WORLD COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

During 1984 the Rev. Robert Spencer, Director of Crieff Hills Community, was named to the W.C.C. Programme Unit on Education and Renewal. Then in early January this year, the Rev. Nancy Cocks, one of our ministers doing graduate studies, attended a W.C.C. Faith and Order Consultation in France as an invited participant. We were grateful to Knox College Board for assistance towards her travel expenses, as our committee's budget was overspent at the time. The theme was, "The Unity of the Church and the Renewal of Human Community." From her lucid report come these noteworthy sentences, "Our hope for Christian unity and renewal is founded in God's redemptive act in Christ, in whom we participate. Our sacramental life proclaims this redemption for the Church and for the world, and supports our existence as God's people in the world, to redeem the world . . . It struck me that our own denomination could learn from the model of the WCC dialogue a more constructive approach to the theological diversity we embody as Presbyterians. True renewal in our Church depends upon a commitment to listen and to find what is shared even among those who recognize fundamental differences in Biblical interpretation or approach to ministry. I sensed at Chantilly the painful awareness that if we as Christians cannot work towards consensus and community, then we will have nothing to offer the world in the name of our one Lord. Undoubtedly, the same could be said of Presbyterians in Canada."

One of our Church's representatives at the World Council's Sixth Assembly in Vancouver, Patti Talbot, has gone to Japan for mission work in the Korean Christian Church. She had been an active member of our committee.

WORLD ALLIANCE OF REFORMED CHURCHES

As it is with many organizations in the Church these days, the most crucial problem with the Alliance is a financial scarcity. After the General Council meeting in Ottawa in 1982, this problem became increasingly difficult. The meeting in Ottawa used up the surplus that had accrued as a result of not holding a Council meeting in 1977. Also the meeting in Ottawa took action on a number of new projects which have been fairly expensive. All these events have occurred when the member Churches have been going through financial stringencies.

Things became so crucial a few months ago that the General Secretary wrote the member Churches suggesting it might be necessary to terminate the World Alliance at the up-coming meeting of the Executive, scheduled for October of this year. Recent letters from the Secretary, and a meeting with him here in Canada late in March, have sounded a more hopeful note, but the crises still exist.

A meeting of the Caribbean and North American Area Alliance in Princeton in March was attended by four delegates from our Church, and all played a prominent part. Dr. Brian Fraser, a member of the Theological Committee, led the worship periods for the meetings. Mr. John MacFarlane, Ottawa, recently appointed Treasurer for the Caribbean and North American Area, is on the Executive Committee of the Alliance by correspondence. As a result of a motion introduced at the opening sederunt by Dr. Donald MacDonald, a committee was appointed, and met during the four day meeting, and their report for strengthening the work of the Area Council and the Alliance was considered. Mrs. Nancy Craig, Trois Rivieres, one of our delegates, served on this committee and was appointed Vice-President of the Area for the next year.

Dr. Donald MacDonald is the representative from Canada on the Executive of the World Alliance, and he attended the meeting of that body last year in Cairo. He is expected to attend this year's meeting in New Delhi, India, if finances will permit.

Another result of the Ottawa meeting was the publication of a booklet containing a summary of our living faith, which can serve as a complement to the recently published statement of "Living Faith", approved last year by the 110th General Assembly of our Church.

CANADIAN COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

In 1984 the Council celebrated its fortieth anniversary. It seemed appropriate to reconsider basic questions. What is the real ecumenical agenda in Canada? Is the Council's role only to be reactive to problems and needs among the churches and in Canadian society? Or should the churches work pro-actively, undertaking action together in response to Christ's call? During the General Board meetings in Aylmer, Quebec and Niagara Falls there was a particular effort to clarify the role of the Board.

During the year the Polish National Catholic Church was received as a member of the Council. There was also a letter from the General Secretary of the Conference of Mennonites in Canada indicating their intent to consider membership in the Council in the near future.

As reported to last year's Assembly, the proposal for a new Association of Christian Churches of Canada lacked support for implementation. Because our 108th General Assembly had committed our Church to becoming a member of the new council, the abandonment of the proposal was a disappointment to our Presbyterian representatives. During the summer of 1984 the Roman Catholic Church through the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops expressed the desire to become an associate member of the Canadian Council of Churches. Since there has not been any such category of membership, the Constitution Committee of the Council has been preparing an amendment to provide for this. If this is approved by the present member churches, it is possible that the Roman Catholic Church's reception will take place about mid-year 1985. It has been further agreed to extend a renewed invitation to other Christian churches to consider or reconsider membership in the C.C.C.

The executive, staff and members of the General Board set up visitation teams to engage in dialogue with senior judicatories of the present members of the Council on current perceptions of ecumenism and what might be undertaken together in the unity and mission of Christ. In recognition of 1985 as International Year of Youth the Council has established a Canadian Ecumenical Youth Coalition, which may become an ongoing programme.

The visit of Pope John Paul II was a major event in Canadian Church life in 1984. The Council's General Secretary served on two committees planning the tour. After one ecumenical service in Toronto, officers of the Council and heads of churches had a forty-five minute consultation with the Pontiff. Later, the General Board was invited by the Conference of Catholic Bishops to assist in evaluating the papal visit.

Other issues considered by the Council, with statements developed for each, were the displacement and internment of Japanese Canadians during World War II, poverty/unemployment in Canada and the new Canadian Security Intelligence Service.

The Faith and Order Committee of the Council has not been active, but has encouraged study and response to the Lima document on Baptism, Eucharist and Ministry. There has been surprisingly widespread study of this material, not only by denominational committees but also in ecumenical groups at the community level. The Council is setting up a three day consultation on B.E.M., with representatives of all the denominations in November 1985.

Our Church's representatives on the General Board for the past three years have been Dr. Donald MacDonald, Dr. Earle Roberts, along with the Rev. William McElwain. Another Presbyterian has served on the Executive as well as the Board, Mrs. Leone How of Saskatoon.

OTHER CHURCHES

A second Christian Festival is in the planning for Calgary in 1986. The Presbyterian representatives on the ecumenical Steering Committee are Rev. Bob Cruickshank, Terri-Lee Hamilton, Joe Meaton, and Mrs. Sheila Kirkland, with Rev. John Duncan of B.C.L. staff as national support person. Our Chairman has also served as consultant in financial matters.

In September 1984 we made a tentative decision not to continue our series of talks with the Christian Reformed Church on matters of faith and order. Since that time, however, contact between persons on our two committees has indicated a reluctance to terminate all dialogue, and a consensus has emerged for taking three steps:

- 1. To consider exchanging observers at the annual assembly in each denomination.
- 2. To consider exchange of observers at each other's major working boards.
- First of all, to furnish each other with copies of our contemporary statement of belief (CRC: "Our World belongs to God"; PCC: "Living Faith") for each minister to study and to consider local bilateral acceptance and action. There is an intention to provide these materials during May 1985.

Recommendation No. 1 (adopted, page 21)

That two of our church's fifteen representatives at the Triennial Assembly of The Canadian Council of Churches in Halifax, May 11-15 be granted permission to address the court.

EDUCATION AND RECEPTION, BOARD OF

To the Venerable, the Illth General Assembly:

The Board of Education and Reception submits the following report:

CURRENT GUIDELINES

For Reception of Ministers and Licentiates and for Special Courses

- 1. No application for a Special Assembly course may be recommended unless the applicant has attained the age of 35 years and not attained the age of 60 years as of June 1st of the year in which the application is to be considered.
- 2. Requirements for special General Assembly programmes shall be:
 - a) Age 35 40
 10 courses in Arts, three years intramural study in theology; 1 Biblical language may be assigned at the discretion of the Board.
 - Age 40 59
 courses in Arts, three years intramural study in theology with exemption from the Biblical language requirement if desired by the applicant.

These age guidelines shall come into effect at the time of application for a General Assembly course, or at the time a person begins the process of preparation for ministry, whichever is the earlier.

- 3. Candidates for the Ministry who are graduates of North American Theological Colleges which are not accredited by the Association of Theological Schools in the U.S.A. and Canada, (A.T.S.) will be evaluated on an individual basis preparatory to assignment of any supplementary courses. (A & P 1981, pages 23 and 105) The Board of Education and Reception will normally recommend that such candidates be required to take two years of study in one of our theological colleges.
- 4. Graduates from theological colleges affiliated with member Churches of the World Alliance of Reformed Churches, whose academic requirements are the equivalent of ours, viz., an Arts degree or the equivalent plus three years in theology, will normally be required to complete successfully courses in the history of The Presbyterian Church in Canada and in the government of the said Church. (A & P 1981, pages 23 and 105).
- 5. Candidates for the ministry who are graduates of theological colleges, including those accredited by A.T.S., but not affiliated with The Presbyterian Church in Canada or member churches of the World Alliance of Reformed Churches, or Reformed Churches which would be included under Book of Forms sections 248.5 and 248.6, will normally be required to complete successfully at least one full academic year of studies at one of our theological colleges; and that the year required in the theological college be designed by the Senate of the College to meet the needs of each particular candidate.
- 6. In cases where the General Assembly does not approve a recommendation of the Board of Education and Reception with regard to a particular candidate, the matter will be referred back to the Board of Education and Reception for further consideration and report.
- 7. In January of the final year of study of an Assembly student, the appropriate Presbytery is permitted to take him/her on trials for license, with licensure subject

to the certification by the college that prescribed studies have been satisfactorily completed and with affirmation, comparable to the college diploma, that the candidate has demonstrated fitness for ministry. The licensing Presbytery shall inform the General Assembly, through the Board of Education and Reception, of its action.

- 8. All candidates who have English as a second language and who are applying for a special course of studies in English, will be required to pass an English language examination under the supervision of the college the candidate proposes to attend.
- 9. The responsibility to examine candidates for licensure or reception in Canadian Presbyterian Church History and Government belongs to the presbyteries. Presbyteries are invited, nevertheless, to use the colleges of our Church as resources to assist them in this responsibility.

Note:

A reading course has been developed by the Presbytery of East Toronto in consultation with the Faculty of Knox College. The Board of Education and Reception is prepared to make this course available to presbyteries upon request.

10. Re travel costs: The policy of the Board is that applicants are responsible for any travel costs involved in appearing before the Board, except in those cases for which the Board accepts financial responsibility because of special circumstances.

Note:

The 110th General Assembly referred back to the Board its Recommendation 28 (A & P 1984, p. 385):

"That the following be approved as a Guideline of the Board of Education and Reception: That every candidate appearing before the Board be required to present, at his or her expense, a medical certificate".

During the past year the Board has consulted the Human Rights Commission of the Province of Ontario and in light of discoveries bring forth the following:

Recommendation No. 1 (reworded and adopted, page 21)

That the following be approved as a Guideline of the Board of Education and Reception: That all recommendations to the General Assembly concerning candidates be conditional upon receipt of a satisfactory medical certificate.

Recommendation No. 2 (adopted, page 21)

That, conditional upon the approval of the Guideline contained in Recommendation No. 1, it will apply to all recommendations concerning candidates brought before this Assembly.

BUSINESS ARISING AND REFERRED

- 1. The Board received and studied Remit G, 1983 (A & P 1984, p. 62, 455-56) which added sections 248.12 to 248.12.6 to the Book of Forms. Since this section refers only to the reception of ministers to serve in non-English speaking charges, the Board believes that the regulation should apply to all who apply for reception and, therefore, recommends a re-wording of section 248.12:
 - 248.12 Presbyteries which have applied for the reception of ministers, and whose applications for reception have been approved by the General Assembly, or as specified in sections 248.5 and 248.6 by the Board of Education and Reception, "subject to satisfying presbytery by examination of their knowledge of the history of The Presbyterian Church in Canada and its rules and forms of procedure", are authorized to:

Recommendation No. 3 (adopted, page 21)

That the proposed re-wording of section 248.12 of the Book of Forms be adopted and sent down to the presbyteries under the Barrier Act.

- The Board has adopted a set of guidelines re Theological Education for Francophone Canadians for a two year trial period after which they will be evaluated.
- 3. The Board has requested the Senate of the Presbyterian College, Montreal to nominate a student to be awarded the Archibald Bursary in 1985.

That Jacqueline MacDonald be assigned a two year course of studies in Christian Education and university subjects under the direction of the Board of Ewart College.

GUIDELINES FOR RECEPTION INTO THE ORDER OF DIACONAL MINISTRIES:

- 1. Each application should be received on its own merits.
- Transcripts will be forwarded to the Board of Education and Reception which will
 arrange to have them evaluated, paying attention to the degree of similarity of
 training to that of graduates of Ewart College.
- 3. For graduates of colleges of other Reformed Churches or A.T.S. accredited colleges, the applicants shall normally be required to pass an examination on The Presbyterian Church in Canada (its history, doctrine and polity) and on Christian Education in The Presbyterian Church in Canada.
- 4. Graduates of non-affiliated colleges shall normally be required to complete satisfactorily not less than one year of study at one of our colleges (normally at Ewart College), which year shall include those areas of study listed in Guideline 3.

AMENDMENT TO THE BOOK OF FORMS

In order that our practice relating to applicants for licensure will be consistent with our practice relating to applicants for reception, the following rewording of the last sentence of section 205.2 of the Book of Forms is recommended:

"In cases of such applicants, when the Secretary of the Board of Education and Reception has in hand the application and all required documentation, the presbyteries will be circularized and given two full months from the sending out of the circular letters to lodge with the Secretary of the Board any competent objection."

The effect of this rewording is that the Board, rather than presbyteries, will circularize the presbyteries.

Recommendation No. 15 (adopted with amendment to wording of section 205.2, page 21)

That the above rewording of Section 205.2 of the Book of Forms be approved and sent down to presbyteries under the Barrier Act.

RELATIONSHIP OF BOARD OF MINISTRY AND BOARD OF EDUCATION AND RECEPTION

The two Boards have agreed to confer with each other over the next year with a view to bringing recommendations concerning their ongoing relationship and work to the 112th General Assembly.

HISTORY, COMMITTEE ON

To the Venerable, the 111th General Assembly:

Your Committee on History is responsible for two primary functions: to encourage the preservation and presentation of the history of The Presbyterian Church in Canada and oversee the work of the Archives of The Presbyterian Church in Canada. The two, as you might surmise, are closely related and the Committee wishes to express its sincere appreciation to Mel Bailey and Kim Moir, together with a number of part-time workers and volunteers, for their continued dedication to the tasks assigned to them by the General Assembly. Through her participation in various associations of professional archivists, Mrs. Moir has brought to our national archives, not only additional skills and efficiency, but also a national prominence not enjoyed previously. Use of our archives and satisfaction with the service rendered is on the increase.

The collection of historical materials housed in our national archives continues to grow. We are grateful to all those individuals, congregations and agencies of the Church that have deposited their records with us. As we have mentioned in previous reports, we are especially interested in the following material:

- a) synod, presbytery and congregational records;
- b) personal papers of clergy and/or active lay people;
- books, pamphlets and periodicals published in Canada or written by Canadians on religious matters.

In relation to the housing of Church records with the national archives, several requests have been received regarding the housing of such records in regional repositories, such as city archives or provincial archives. Your Committee has taken a serious look at this question. The assumption upon which the General Assembly and your Committee has been operating is that official church records from congregations, presbyteries and synods are the property of the General Assembly and can be disposed of only with the permission of that body, working through its Committee on History. At the same time, we are sensitive to the value of such records for local and/or regional historians and have considerable sympathy with those who wish to preserve such records in archives that are easily accessible. It is our responsibility, however, to do our utmost to make such records available to those using our national archives, in order that as complete a record as possible of the life of our Church be available in a central location for researchers. We will recommend, therefore, that permission to deposit records in

repositories other than the National Archives of The Presbyterian Church in Canada be granted by the General Assembly, through its Committee on History, only if a microfilm copy of such records be placed in the national archives at no expense to those archives.

We are encouraged by the increased interest in the history of Canadian Presbyterianism that is evident within our Church. We welcome the invitation of the Board of Ministry to co-operate in the preparation of a resource outlining the ecumenical stance and contribution of The Presbyterian Church in Canada. Several requests have come to our Convener and others to participate in educational events and provide some background to the history of our branch of Christ's Church here in Canada. The quality of material submitted for the History Prizes attests to this growing interest. This year the two winners are:

Donald N. MacMillan, "The Kirk in Glengarry", and Gordon H. Allison, "The History of Barton Stone Church, Hamilton".

Although the volume was not available for consideration in this year's competition, your Committee commends to every Presbyterian in Canada, N. Keith Clifford's, "The Presbyterian Resistance to Church Union in Canada, 1904-1939", published in April of 1985 by the University of British Columbia Press. This book chronicles the activities and background of the Presbyterian Church Association in its endeavours to preserve The Presbyterian Church in Canada during the Church Union controversy.

At its spring meeting, your Committee was informed of the appointment of its Convener, Dr. Brian J. Fraser, as Dean of St. Andrew's Hall, University of British Columbia, and Assistant Professor of Church History, Vancouver School of Theology. It has accepted, with deep regret, Dr. Fraser's resignation from the Committee and wishes to record its appreciation for the faithful service Dr. Fraser has rendered to the Church through this Committee. We wish him God's blessing in his new position and look forward to his continuing interest in the preservation and presentation of the history of The Presbyterian Church in Canada. Your Committee is recommending that Dr. John A. Johnston be appointed the new Convener, replacing Dr. Fraser in the class of 1987. We have also asked Ms. Edith Firth to succeed Dr. Johnston as Chairperson of our Archives Sub-Committee.

We continue to draw to the attention of the General Assembly the need for a better system of records management with respect to the material produced by our National Office and our committment to do everything possible to ensure regional input and participation in the affairs of the Committee on History within the limitations of our small budget.

Recommendation No. 1 (adopted, page 23)

That the concerns of this report be brought to the attention of courts of the Church and individuals across Canada in order that your Committee may more faithfully preserve and communicate the richness of our God-given heritage in The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

Recommendation No. 2 (reworded and adopted, page 23) In the light of actions taken by previous General Assemblies (A & P 1879, 1917 and 1970), that the 111th General Assembly reaffirm that all official documents of any church court of The Presbyterian Church in Canada are the property of the General Assembly of The Presbyterian Church in Canada and must not be disposed of in any way without the express permission of the General Assembly through its agent, the Committee on History. Further, that permission to dispose of any official records of any church court in any place other than the National Archives of The Presbyterian Church in Canada be granted only on the condition that a copy of such material be placed with our archives at no cost to it.

INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS COMMITTEE

To the Venerable, the 111th General Assembly:

CANADIAN - UNITED STATES RELATIONS

For the past several years it has been the practice of the Committee on International Affairs to select critical areas for its study on behalf of the Church. Often our focus has been on a country in which our Church has had some mission involvement such as, for example, Nigeria and Taiwan. In other years, our attention has been concentrated on areas of universal concern such as mainland China and Central America. Recently, the Committee made certain recommendations to the General Assembly concerning nuclear disarmament.

This year, the Committee has embarked on a study of Canadian-United States relations. It is nicely underway and proving most interesting. However it is premature to consider conclusions. Committee members had the privilege of being invited to Parliament Hill for discussions on this subject with a representative of the Government of Canada, an Opposition Critic and a spokesperson from the N.D.P. In addition, the Committee also heard from the Minister of the United States embassy as well as from a high ranking official of the Canadian ministry of External Affairs. In these sessions, we were reminded of the enormity of the subject. The United States minister made the statement that 75% of Canada's exports are to the United States and that 25% of United States exports are to Canada. This exchange, he says, in terms of produce and dollars, makes our two countries the largest trading partners in the history of the world.

What became very clear in discussing the subject with these various experts in the field, is that Canada's unique relationship with the United States colours all her other relationships. So much depends on the reaction of Canada's closest neighbour, its largest trading partner, its military ally, that every decision on foreign affairs (and even many judgements on domestic matters) has to take into account what the United States perception of Canada's position will be as well as what it's reaction will be.

The Committee feels that this aspect of international affairs - the most important aspect of international affairs from the point of view of the Canadian government - cannot be ignored by our Church. During the coming year, the Committee plans to continue its study of the subject, especially in regard to the following areas:

Religious and Cultural

Are there religious and cultural differences which need to be explored and understood? To what extent is cultural exchange, especially via the media: T.V., radio, books, magazines and records, helpful to Canada or harmful? Is Canadian Christianity becoming transformed by an American influence? Is there a valid Canadian nationalism?

2) Economics

Is it possible for Canada to enjoy an adequate measure of economic independence while at the same time encouraging American investment in the economy? What kind of economic independence and/or investment helps or hurts ordinary people?

3) Defense and Third World Development

How can Canada influence its powerful NATO ally to take steps toward multilateral nuclear disarmament? Is it possible for Canada again to be the "honest broker" in Latin America and bring some reconciliation between the United States and revolutionary movements in Central America?

4) Ecology

What are the real issues involved in such current matters of tension as Acid Rain, and Great Lakes pollution?

In all these matters, can The Presbyterian Church in Canada help to bring about a better understanding of Canadian-American relationships beyond the often superficial analyses of the media? Could our Church initiate a dialogue with Presbyterians south of the border? Could our Church be an effective agent of reconciliation, by "speaking the truth in love" on this sensitive subject?

Recommendation No. 1 (reworded and adopted, page 33)

That Presbyteries, Sessions, and members of congregations be requested to forward their comments and suggestions in this report, to the Committee by December 31, 1985.

POLITICS OF FOOD

The Problem

Food aid as an immediate response to urgent need, such as the African famine crisis, is essential for saving lives. Such generosity, however, needs to be coupled with sincere determination to discover and eradicate the underlying causes of starvation and malnutrition in the world. Over-population, climate and weather are factors that aggravate conditions of hunger but do not cause them. Eliminate poverty and the birth rate will go down, since having many children is necessary to ensure enough survivors to eke out an existence for the family. Eliminate misuse of land, and trees and plants will survive to send moisture into the air which then returns as rain.

What, then, is at the root of the terrible problem of hunger in the world? Current physical resources and technical skills are sufficient to provide every human on earth with 3000 calories a day. The main reason that millions do not receive that kind of nourishment is that food is considered less as a basic human right than as a commodity produced for profit. Affecting fair and equal distribution of food to all people are the factors of power, control and money. Even food aid can be used as a lever in the balance of trade.

How is the Church to respond to this difficult and urgent issue?

Our Calling

"God is always calling the church to seek that justice in the world which reflects the divine righteousness revealed in the Bible.

God's justice is seen when we deal fairly with each other and strive to change customs and and practices that oppress and enslave others." (Living Faith 8.4.1 and 2)

Our Response to God's call

In order to be God's agents of change in an unjust global food imbalance, it is necessary a) to identify and study underlying problems, including the role played by Canadians and Canadian Government policy, and b) to make known our concerns to all levels of government urging agricultural aid that will be sustainable and not exploitative: c) to protest against the world arms race that diminishes our ability to fight hunger..."Living Faith 8.5.3; and d) to consider adopting a simpler, personal life style in order to free financial resources which can be directed to long-range food development projects through Presbyterian World Service and Development.

Recommendation No. 2 (reworded and adopted, page 33)

- That the General Assembly commend Presbyterian World Service and Development for its efforts, and congregations for their generous response in the African Famine crisis and urge congregations to consider the on-going and long-term needs in that area.
- That the General Assembly commend the Canadian government for its response to the African famine crisis and urge the government to keep the issue at the forefront of its concerns.
- 3) That the General Assembly encourage congregations, presbyteries and synods to study the issue of food aid and development in the context of our responsibility to share the world's resources with all peoples. (Enquire re study materials).
- 4) That the General Assembly urge the Canadian government in developing its foreign aid, international trade, and domestic agriculture policies, a) to consider the needs of the citizens (as well as governments) of developing countries to be self-sufficient in food production and b) to reconsider its decision to postpone until 1995 Canada's commitment to boost aid and development assistance spending to 0.7% of Canada's Gross National Product.

CENTRAL AMERICA

Over the past year a growing number of our Christian brothers and sisters in Central America have sent urgent requests to the P.C.C. to use its influence to help bring about peace with justice in the region.

The wars now being waged in Central America, especially in El Salvador and Nicaragua, are causing untold pain and suffering. Villages are bombed and burned, civilians are massacred, death squads strike terror into the hearts of the people, refugees by the thousands have fled their homes, economies are in chaos.

The overwhelming desire of the people is for peace, but not peace at any price. They also want some measure of justice, which require basic changes in systems that have kept the poor in grinding poverty while the rich have multiplied their wealth.

In El Salvador, only cosmetic change has occurred after over five years of struggle. Foreign aid to the Salvadorean government is often used to escalate the war against those who fight for justice. In Nicaragua, basic changes for the good of the people have

been instituted, but counter-revolutionary forces are determined to destroy what has been accomplished and win back their positions of wealth and power.

In both countries, the forces that oppose necessary change are supported by the United States government. The policies which dictate such support are neither true to the American tradition of justice, human rights and democracy, nor do they represent the basic goodwill and desire for peace of the American people.

The Protestant evangelical churches which have asked for our support make it clear that the key to achieving peace, with justice, in Central America, is a change in U.S. policy. The minimum changes required are:

- the cessation of military and economic support for the repressive regime in El Salvador,
- 2. the withdrawal of support for the covert war now being waged against Nicaragua,
- a commitment to negotiated rather than military solutions in both El Salvador and Nicaragua, and
- 4. the implementation of active measures of support for the Contadora peace process.

The Government of Canada has stated that "the Contadora initiative is the only viable instrument for reconciliation in Central America and merits strong political and moral support internationally".

Recommendation No. 3 (adopted, page 33)

That The Presbyterian Church in Canada:

- commend the Government of Canada for its support of the Contadora peace initiative;
- call upon the Government of Canada to go beyond its offer of assistance in redrafting security and control mechanisms in the Contadora draft, and to offer to become a co-signator of the treaty;
- request that Canadian aid to El Salvador be limited to non-governmental relief and development projects;
- 4) urge the Canadian Government to press for significant changes in U.S. policy towards Central America as outlined above; and
- 5) urge that Canadian policy on granting political refugee status to refugees from Central America be as generous and humanitarian as possible.

NUCLEAR DISARMAMENT AND PEACEMAKING

Strict or general deterrence

Several Churches have recently discussed the ethics of strict deterrence, but a more timely issue is the ethics of general deterrence. For strict deterrence, a nation maintains a minimum adequate arsenal to deter an adversary from attacking it with nuclear arms. The intent of strict deterrence is the avoidance of nuclear attack.

General deterrence threatens resort to nuclear retaliation in response to a perceived threat to national interest. A nuclear arsenal is an instrument for projecting national power through threat-posturing and potential brinksmanship. The intent of general deterrence is hegemony, or international dominance.

Strict deterrence requires an adequate arsenal for a credible retaliation; general deterrence requires an adequate arsenal for a credible threat of attack. Counter-force weaponry is used by the initiator of the exchange to minimize the retaliatory potential

of its victim. Under strict deterrence, balanced multilateral disarmament could proceed indefinitely. However, a reliance on perceived arms superiority for hegemony militates against sincere arms reduction.

The principal ethical argument advanced in favour of strict deterrence is that the use of nuclear weapons is so abhorrent that only the avoidance of nuclear annihilation can justify the possession of such arms. Even this is seen as a temporary measure to allow time for orderly abolition.

The burden of defending general deterrence, is to find issues of national influence, short of avoiding extinction, which justify the endangerment of a billion lives, and which are soluble through nuclear intimidation.

Inasmuch as the most recent cycles of the arms race have involved counterforce weapons, a rejection of general deterrence on ethical grounds implies a rejection of these weapons systems.

Recommendation No. 4 (adopted as amended, page 33)

That the General Assembly call on the Government of Canada to renounce the policy of general deterrence, and to urge NATO to renounce 'first' use, to cease arming with counterforce weapons for preemptive attack, and to abandon military strategies contingent upon the use of nuclear weapons. Further to call upon the Government of Canada instead to plan for functioning in a world free of nuclear threat posturing.

An independent Canadian position

No time will be better for Canada to speak up independently for peace, in spite of the present arms negotiations. Like a stock broker who can profit from a bull or a bear market, the arms lobby can exploit either an upturn or a downturn in the arms talks to justify an expanded arms race. Likewise, the demand for gestures of solidarity among NATO members is the same in detente as in polarization.

Militarization of space

"Star Wars" is a deceptively enticing logical extension of counterforce. In a counterforce exchange, weapons are aimed at other weapons and casualties are a secondary effect. Letting the weapons fight it out in space like gladiatorial robots would seem a good way to minimize casualties. The concept, however, is flawed:

The most accessible technology, and likely the first to be deployed, would provide a modest protection for hardened targets like MX missiles silos, and no protection for population. Hence, it is part of the counter-force scheme.

As an issue, it focuses on the arms race of the future and draws attention from the need to control the destabilizing counter-force weapons of 1985, like the MX.

Some obvious countermeasures, including an increased arsenal of offensive missiles, would be easier to deploy than the defensive systems. The hierarchy of systems, and the spiral of countermeasures constitute a whole new arms race.

A world with starving people and limited resources can ill afford to expend hundreds of billions of dollars launching a Maginot line into space, especially when the accompanying arms race makes the world less safe.

The separation of the research and deployment decisions provides little consolation. An expensive crash programme of research can fuel an arms race even before deployment. Such a programme expands the technological infrastructure, commits careers, and gives vested interest to an expanded constituency, thus militating against closure.

One of the most compelling objections is the exploitation of an idolatry of technology as Deliverer.

Recommendation No. 5 (reworded and adopted, page 34)

That the Assembly call upon the Government of Canada to withdraw endorsement of this dangerous new stage of the arms spiral, but instead to commit Canadian technology to the verification of disarmament agreements.

Recommendation No. 6 (reworded and adopted, page 34)

That the Assembly ask Presbyterians to continue to pray for the guidance of the Spirit in these matters, and that Sessions be invited to discuss the ethics of general deterrence and the spiritual implications of the idolatry of technology-as-Deliverer.

Avenues for expressing concern.

In answer to those who have requested information regarding local avenues for expressing concern it might be noted that one inter-Church group of which the P.C.C. is a contributing partner is Project Ploughshares. A list of local Ploughshares groups is available through the Committee.

Recommendation No. 7 (reworded and adopted, page 35)

That Presbyterians, moved by prayerful consideration to engage this issue individually, or through Church groups, be urged to join with local community groups involved in education or advocacy.

LENDING FUND COMMITTEE

To the Venerable the 111th General Assembly:

During 1984, new loans were approved for 14 congregations and 11 congregations completed repayment on their loans. At December 31, 1984, 109 loans totalling \$2,702,383 were outstanding.

The Committee reports that it will hold stated meetings on November 6, 1985 and February 19, 1986 and urges presbyteries to forward applications to the Secretary of the Committee by October 15, 1985 and February 1, 1986, to ensure that the application can be reviewed expeditiously.

The Committee would remind congregations who have an obligation to repay a loan that they remember that their collective repayment is the only source of funds available to assist new and worthy applicants for loans.

A statement of loans outstanding at December 31, 1984 is available to Commissioners at Assembly in the Administrative Council Study Group.

MACLEAN ESTATE COMMITTEE

To the Venerable, the 111th General Assembly:

The Maclean Estate reports a busy 10th year of operation of Crieff Hills Community as the retreat and conference centre for The Presbyterian Church in Canada. We celebrate these ten years and our challenge for the future in our 11th Annual Outdoor Service of Witness held Sunday, June 2nd at 3:30 p.m. outside of Maclean Hall on the 1st Concession of Puslinch Township. Because we are located just 20 minutes south of Knox Church Guelph we have invited commissioners and others including presbytery representatives who are attending this assembly. We hope that some time during this assembly everyone present will take the opportunity to visit your retreat and Conference Centre while you are so near.

PRESENT OPERATIONS

Our 10th year has been a year of expanded activity and interest. The number of people who attended programs, retreats or conferences at Crieff Hills Community grew again in 1984 to 4260 persons. When you multiply this figure by the number of days each person stayed it works out to 6923 people-days. We offered 38 different programs that were opened to all our church people and other interested individuals. The programs were planned for church leaders of various kinds, church school teachers, families, couples, and individuals both lay and clergy who are interested in our various topics on personal or congregational renewal. We also hosted 231 church groups and 36 other groups who did their own program.

The number of individuals serving on our volunteer committee structure more than doubled with the addition of various campaign committees. These people are very enthusiastic about the activities and possibilities of Crieff Hills and they are busy preparing for the various aspects of the campaign. Many of our committee members gathered for our bi-annual retreat in order to do some long range planning for the future of Crieff Hills. The long term objectives were later approved by the Maclean Estate Committee and are as follows:

By 1989, Crieff Hills Community will have:

- a full summer program, with a variety in program offered and people served, an excellence in leadership resource persons.
- achieved a national profile, through wide publicity and an image of excellence offering new programs as well as continuing existing programs.
- completed an evaluation of the farm and will be developing its potential for food produce, ecology and recreation in relation to program.
- 4. established a financial foundation to be used for program security.

The various committees are working at these in their regular meetings. These objectives are all in keeping with our purpose to provide a place of spiritual growth, Christian fellowship and leadership development in order to assist individuals and congregations to better serve the needs of a changing society.

The first steps in reaching these objectives can be seen in the eight page insert in the January 1985 issue of the "Presbyterian Record", which described our facilities, programs for the year and plans for the future. The second step is the Summer Holiday Week, August 4 - 10, 1985. This week of personal growth, re-creation and fellowship for all ages has been publicized across Canada through the Board of Congregational Life mailing. We are gradually drawing more participants to our programs from beyond southern Ontario, but at this summer event we hope that Presbyterians from all across the country will gather at Crieff Hills. For those who will be travelling in Ontario at

that time, we are offering bed and breakfast service in July and August by simply booking ahead. (Contact Crieff Hills Community, R.R. #2, Puslinch, Ontario, NOB 230 or phone (519) 824-7898 during week day office hours.)

COMMITTEE STRUCTURE

The Maclean Estate Committee met four times during 1984 and its twelve members represent the work of several sub-committees which include about 40 people in total. These committees are:

Program and Publicity, Ms. Barbara Hillis, Petrolia - Chairperson Property Management, Mr. Ben Vanderbrug, Ancaster - Chairperson Finance, Rev. Bert van Mossel, Kitchener - Chairperson Personnel, Mr. Jim Mason, Guelph - Resource person Campaign Steering, Mr. David Pinnington, Cambridge - Chairperson

This latter committee is broken into several sub-committees.

Publicity and Information - Mr. Alistair McIlwraith, Cambridge - Chairperson Friends of Crieff - Mrs. Billie Young, Terra Cotta - Chairperson Foundations - Mr. Harry Booty, Cambridge - Chairperson Corporations - Mr. David Barrie, Cambridge - Chairperson Special Names - Mr. Hamilton Goar, Cambridge - Chairperson Congregational - to be elected

Each of the sub-committees meets bi-monthly or monthly.

MOVING FORWARD

In recent years the number of training and retreat programs offered at Crieff Hills Community has increased as has the number of persons taking advantage of our programs and facilities. In order to meet the growing demand, we need to expand our facilities to include a conference centre building that will provide additional space for large and small group meetings, sleeping accommodation, recreational and lounge areas, bookstore and administrative offices. The estimated cost of building and furnishing the conference building, as well as providing more parking and access roads is \$2,250,000.

Approval has been given in 1982 by the Administrative Council to conduct a financial campaign to raise the necessary funds. Our Campaign Co-ordinator is Mr. Ken Self of Stratford. This financial appeal to the congregations in Ontario of the three central synods is scheduled to begin in the Fall of 1985. We look forward to your support of our building program.

SERVING CONGREGATIONS

Crieff Hills Community is seeking to be responsive to the needs and wishes of the congregations of our church. With this in mind we have increased the number of persons in each congregation who receive our mailings. We continue to keep in liaison with the Board of Congregational Life on program concerns in our denomination. We want to hear from the congregations and presbyteries on those matters related to retreat opportunities and conference programs that could be served by the type of facility offered by Crieff Hills Community. We are planning a questionnaire to seek out the needs and interests of congregations, which will be sent to churches throughout southern Ontario. But we would be pleased to receive input from any persons interested in sending in their suggestions and comments. We would like to hear about the interest in longer term residential lay training programs which might appeal to those for whom travel distance is now a key consideration in attending Crieff Hills Community.

It is our experience that those congregations, who have set aside funds to support their members in taking lay leadership training, are the most successful in getting people to participate in our programs. From the benefits these participants have brought back into their church fellowship, these congregations continue to encourage and support more lay people in attending programs in successive years. We would encourage more congregations to budget for this each year.

We appreciate and thank our many friends whose prayers and gifts have blessed our work and encouraged our staff.

Recommendation No. 1 (adopted, page 31)

That presbyteries and sessions forward their topical suggestions for current lay training needs, and their interests in specific resource leaders to Crieff Hills Community for the purpose of assisting in the planning and developing of future residential programs.

Recommendation No. 2 (adopted, page 31)

That sessions be requested to encourage their congregations to set up a bursary fund or expand, if necessary, an existing fund in their annual budget, in order to support their lay people in attending leadership development, personal spiritual growth or other Christian education programs at retreat and conference centres or other similar institutions.

YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 1984

SUMMARY OF ACCOUNTING PRACTICES The following is a summary of accounting practices followed by the Fund.

- (a) Interest in Consolidated portfolio
 - (i) Investment transactions and income.

Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis.

Dividend income is recorded on the date of declaration.

Realized gains and losses from investment transactions are recorded on the trade date.

(ii) Valuation

The Fund follows the practice of valuing marketable securities in the consolidated portfolio at market value, rather than at acquisition cost. Adjustments to the market value are allocated between capital and undistributed income, on the basis of the ratio of original capital to undistributed income.

(b) Fixed Assets

Fixed assets are recorded at values determined by executors with subsequent addition recorded at cost. Had depreciation been recorded, accumulated depreciation at December 31, 1984 would have amounted \$131,369; 1983, \$113,546.

These financial statements are included in the financial statements of The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

2. CHANGE IN ACCOUNTING POLICY

During the year, the Fund adopted a policy of not providing for depreciation on fixed assets. Previously, depreciation had been provided on fixed assets. As a result of this change, which has been applied retroactively, excess of revenue over expenses for the years ended December 31, 1984 and 1983 have been increased by \$17,823 and \$18,008. Previously reported undistributed income at beginning of year of \$35,972 in 1984 and \$52,740 in 1983 and fixed assets at December 31, 1983 and 1982 have been increased by \$113,546 and \$95,538 respectively.

THE McBAIN MEMORIAL FUND

To the Venerable, the 111th General Assembly:

The Fund is available to make loans to congregations for erection of churches and manses, and for renovations up to a maximum of \$5,000. Loans are made without interest and repayable in not more than ten years. The congregations must raise an amount equal to the loan which is requested.

It is necessary that congregations meet their repayment schedule so that other congregations may be assisted from this Fund. We appreciate the co-operation of congregations in meeting their repayment schedule.

MINISTRY, BOARD OF

To the Venerable, the 111th General Assembly:

PREAMBLE

A time of crisis in the life of the Church is a time for serious assessment of its mission and ministry. Staff and members of the Board of Ministry are conscious that a perceived crisis at this time is largely administrative. Crisis, therefore, provokes a search for answers and solutions. Inevitably the temptation is to look to the "payroll" which in the case of the Church means the professional church workers. There is ample evidence that the servants of the Church have been willing to bear a fair share of that burden. There are, moreover, signs of the Spirit at work, and in many congregations there is buoyancy, hope, and openness to the future. This Board believes that the real crisis is largely a crisis of spirit and of will. The whole Christian community of which we are part must seek for the answers within itself, by looking to the Spirit of the living Christ to enliven us with new purpose and direction.

The Board of Ministry has several matters to bring before this General Assembly which are largely reactive in nature. It is our hope that we can find ways to offer positive leadership to the Church so that we can participate in the discovery of new directions for Christian life and service.

PREPARATION FOR MINISTRY

Recruitment

A sub-committee has been established to ensure the Board's continuing attention to recruitment. The staff has participated in two recruitment events: a conference for prospective theological students organized by the Ministry Committee of Prince Edward Island and a workshop at an event for high school students of Hamilton-London and Toronto-Kingston Synods.

A copy of the filmstrip on recruitment, "Not Just Long Black Robes" was sent to each presbytery in the spring of 1984 and is available from the presbytery ministry convener. A few additional copies were sold.

The Chaplains' Branch of the Canadian Armed Forces has prepared a brochure on "The Military Chaplain". It will be made available to enquirers along with the other brochures the Board has prepared ("The Minister of Word and Sacrament"; "The Professional Christian Educator"; "The Institutional Chaplain"; "Opportunities for Service"; "Steps to Becoming a Minister of Word and Sacrament"). A new brochure, "The Overseas Missionary" is in the final stages of preparation and should be available sometime in the coming year.

Guidance Conferences for Candidates for Professional Church Leadership

Five conferences were held in 1984. Twelve candidates attended a conference at Vancouver School of Theology in May. Two conferences (April and September) were held for students of Knox College involving a total of 45 candidates. A conference for Ewart College students attracted 7 in June, and 8 candidates from The Presbyterian College attended a conference in September. The Board is planning 2 conferences in 1985, reflecting budget cuts. A process of evaluation of these conferences has been established, involving colleges, presbyteries, students, and counsellors. A report will be made in 1986.

Candidates

Overture No. 23, 1982; Overture No. 28, 1983; Notice of Motion of Ms. K. Hincke 1983; Overtures No. 2, and No. 4, 1984.

All of the above cited overtures and commissioner's motion, urge the Church and its colleges to extend the program of theological and ministerial education to 4 years, from the present 3 year program. A Task Force has been working on a study of the issues and implications involved in the proposal. A pilot project has been proposed, and has been sent to the colleges for study and consultation. The Board is planning to report with recommendations to the 112th General Assembly.

Licensing Procedures

In order to ensure contact between candidates for licensing and the presbytery of most recent certification, the Board has studied possible changes to Sections 205 and 205.1 of the Book of Forms. Since Section 204 allows the possibility of one of three presbyteries being the presbytery of most recent certification, the following wording of Sections 205 and 205.1 is recommended:

- 205. Any student in theology and candidate for the ministry of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, and studying in one of our Church's theological colleges may, on application in writing in the college year prior to his/her graduation to the Clerk of the Presbytery of most recent certification, be taken on trials for license or the candidate may request for good and sufficient reason the permission of that presbytery to be taken on trials for license by (1) the presbytery in which the college is situated; or (2) the presbytery of first certification if it be different from the presbytery of most recent certification; such application should normally be made by the December 31st prior to graduation.
- 205.1 Upon reception of such application or request, the presbytery of most recent certification shall determine to take the candidate on trials for license or grant the request if it deem it expedient and good cause is shown, and all relevant documents shall be transferred to the competent presbytery named in the request. It is the responsibility of the applicant to ensure that the application or request is dealt with in accordance with the above regulations.

Recommendation No. 1 (reworded sections 205 and 205.1, recommendation adopted, page 27-28)

That the above rewording to sections 205 and 205.1 of the Book of Forms be adopted as an Interim Act and sent down to presbyteries under the Barrier Act.

Goodfellow Scholarship Fund

In keeping with the wishes of the donor of the Goodfellow Scholarship Fund, the tuition fees of the students of Vancouver School of Theology have the first call on the fund. In 1984 the income of the fund was not adequate to pay for all the tuition fees of the Presbyterian students at V.S.T. and the remaining amount was paid from the general fund of the Church (\$5,870 from the Goodfellow Scholarship Fund and \$3,025 from General Assembly funds). These funds supported 5 full-time students and one part-time student in the spring term, I full-time student during the summer, and 4 full-time students and 2 part-time students in the fall term.

Vancouver School of Theology

The 110th General Assembly agreed that the Presbyterian Church in Canada associate with the Vancouver School of Theology, and that the Board of Ministry, in conjunction with St. Andrew's Hall Board, be empowered to negotiate the details of the association on behalf of the Church. The Board of Ministry has been involved in a process of negotiation with the Board of Governors of Vancouver School of Theology and the Board of Management of St. Andrew's Hall. We now have an Agreement of Association which is acceptable to Vancouver School of Theology, St. Andrew's Hall and the Board of Ministry, as well as a process for the joint appointment of the Dean of St. Andrew's Hall, and a job description for the Dean of St. Andrew's Hall.

The Agreement of Association was publicly recognized on May 1, 1985 at the annual Convocation of Vancouver School of Theology, at which the Moderator of the 110th General Assembly, Dr. Alex Calder, represented the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

The Vancouver School of Theology and St. Andrew's Hall will be reporting elsewhere on the joint appointment of Dr. Brian Fraser as Dean of St. Andrew's Hall and Assistant Professor of Church History. The Agreement of Association is:

THIS AGREEMENT made in quadruplicate as of the first day of September, 1984 at Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada.

BETWEEN:

VANCOUVER SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY a body corporate, of 6000 Iona Drive, Vancouver, British Columbia.

(hereinafter called "the School") OF THE FIRST PART

AND:

THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA a body corporate, of 50 Wynford Drive, Don Mills, Ontario.

(hereinafter called "the Church") OF THE SECOND PART

AND:

ST. ANDREW'S HALL a body corporate, of 6040 Iona Drive, Vancouver, British Columbia.

(hereinafter called "St. Andrew's) OF THE THIRD PART

WHEREAS the School and the Church, believing that a continued association between them will serve the interests of both, and St. Andrew's having agreed to continue to affiliate with the School for the purposes hereof;

AND WHEREAS the parties earlier entered into an Agreement of Association on the first day of September 1979 in furtherance of these same purposes and are desirous of continuing their Agreement as hereinafter stated;

WITNESS that in pursuance of such purposes, the parties DO MUTUALLY COVENANT AND AGREE AS FOLLOWS:

- The Church and the School will continue to co-operate as associates in achieving their respective objectives.
- 2. St. Andrew's and the School will continue as affiliated theological colleges within the meaning of the Vancouver School of Theology Act, S.B.C. 1971, c.72.
- 3. The Church and St. Andrew's accept the objectives of the School as stated in Section 41 of the Vancouver School of Theology Act, S.B.C. 1971, c.72.
- 4. The Church shall authorize its presbyteries to take on trials for license graduates of the School who are certified as candidates for the ministry of the Church.
- 5. The Church shall recognize the degrees and diplomas granted by the School to those students whom the Church certifies to attend the School (hereinafter referred to as "certified students") as if those degrees and diplomas were in fact granted by a Presbyterian College; and St. Andrew's shall exercise its right to grant degrees in theology, during the currency of this Agreement, solely through the School.
- 6. St. Andrew's will not offer courses of instruction leading to a degree or diploma in theology or grant any such degrees or diplomas independently during the term of this Agreement, save as provided in the preceding paragraph.
- The Church shall continue to be responsible for payment of tuition fees of certified students and be principally responsible for bursary and other aid funds required by

them; PROVIDED HOWEVER, that should the Church's present policy in this connexion change with respect to others of its Colleges in Canada, the Church will instead make adequate provision for financial assistance to its students attending the School.

- 8. The Church and the School shall provide for denominational studies for certified students in accord with the School's policy of July 1, 1984. Instruction in the Church's polity will be taught by a person appointed by St. Andrew's on behalf of the Church and the costs of this instruction will be borne by the Church and St. Andrew's.
- 9. The Church shall appoint a chaplain or provide for chaplaincy services for certified students in accord with the School's current policy.
- St. Andrew's will retain full charge of the management of St. Andrew's Hall and be responsible for its finances.
- 11. While St. Andrew's will retain its property and the School will have no financial responsibility for its maintenance, the School shall be consulted before any proposed change is made in the use of this property.
- 12. The School and St. Andrew's on behalf of the Church shall jointly appoint the Dean or other chief administrative officer of St. Andrew's Hall (hereinafter called "the Dean") by such method as they shall together agree.
- 13. The Dean shall have administrative and pastoral responsibilities for St. Andrew's Hall and at the same time, shall serve as a part-time member of the faculty of the School teaching in a subject area appropriate to the needs of the School and having responsibility for providing instruction in denominational distinctives to Presbyterian students at the School.
- 14. Funding for the position of Dean will remain the responsibility of the Church and St. Andrew's and so far as may be appropriate, the School's policies respecting members of its faculty will also apply.
- 15. The Church shall be entitled to appoint one member of the Board of Governors of the School and one member of the Senate, and the School shall be entitled to select one person for appointment by the General Assembly of the Church to be a member of the Board of Management of St. Andrew's.
- 16. There shall be established a Joint Working Group consisting of representatives of the School and St. Andrew's who shall meet regularly and from time to time during the currency of this Agreement whose principal tasks are to foster and enhance the working relationships amongst the Church, the School and St. Andrew's and to explore methods of extending and expanding areas of co-operatively achieving mutual goals in theological education; at least one national officer of the Church shall be a corresponding member of the Joint Working Group.
- 17. The School and the Church agree that this association shall be publicly recognized.
- 18. This Agreement shall come into force on January 1st, 1985 and shall continue until terminated by written notice by one of the parties to the others and to take effect at the end of the academic year three years after notice of such termination.
- 19. The parties further agree to cause the terms of this Agreement to be jointly reviewed on or before September 1st, 1987, and every three years thereafter; the current terms are subject to amendment at any time upon the agreement of all parties or on one year's notice in any other case.

CONTINUING EDUCATION

Review of Continuing Education Allowance

The annual Continuing Education Allowance provided by congregations was raised to \$300 in 1983. In order to decide whether this allowance should be increased, the Board monitors the costs of continuing education at the Church's colleges, and the total continuing education costs for those who apply to the Continuing Education Fund. In 1984, the average total cost for an individual's continuing education was \$3,119, an increase of 32.7% over 1982. The average length of leave decreased to 12 weeks from 16. The average cost per week rose from \$147 to \$260. In 1985, the costs of tuition, room and board at Ewart College, Presbyterian College, Toronto School of Theology, and Vancouver School of Theology have risen an average 14% since 1983. The Board is not recommending a further increase in the Continuing Education Allowance for 1986.

Continuing Education Fund

The funds available for continuing education in 1984 - \$12,202 - came from the Board of Ministry's budget, the Committee on Church Growth, and the interest from a capital fund. Of 36 requests for a total of \$21,865, 35 were granted for a total of \$12,202, the average grant being \$349.

Because of the budget cuts, the Continuing Education Fund will be discontinued in 1985 except for a small amount which has been specifically allocated for Church Growth courses. It is hoped that the fund will be re-opened in 1986 but with a new system of handling applications. Rather than dealing with each grant application separately, grants will be awarded 3 times a year - January, May, and September. Up to one third of the annual budget could be spent in each trimester. This should result in a fairer distribution of the funds and safeguard money for the people who take courses in the latter part of the year. This system will be evaluated after a year's experience.

SUPPORT FOR PROFESSIONAL CHURCH WORKERS

Guidelines for Filling Pulpit Vacancies

During 1984, presbyteries have studied the proposed guidelines. A good number of replies were received and the Task Force's study of the replies resulted in some minor revisions. The Board has approved the guidelines after calling for a re-drafting of Appendix C to reflect reasons for using a multiple leet. The guidelines are now ready and a copy will be sent to each Clerk of Presbytery. Additional copies are available on request at a nominal cost of \$1.

Recommendation No. 2 (adopted, page 28)

That a copy of the revised "Guidelines for Filling Pulpit Vacancies" be sent to each Presbytery Clerk asking the presbyteries to consider revising their Standing Orders to coincide with these guidelines.

Women in Ministry

Arising out of the event for professional church women, in May 1984, several interest groups were formed to pursue particular concerns in the areas of the doctrine of ministry, freelance work, networking among professional church women, communal living, and sexuality (with particular concern for sexual harrassment). As well, individuals who attended the national gathering have agreed to organize regional events in the West and the Maritimes. A task group made up of representatives of the issue groups and the editorial committee of the newsletter, "From a Woman's Perspective" will co-ordinate these activities.

Overtures No. 17 and No. 26, 1984. (A & P 1984, p. 521, 531, 18) Re: Maternity Leave

A task force of the Board studied Overture No. 17, and No. 26, 1984, both of which asked for a policy statement regarding maternity leave for Professional Church Workers. After consultation with a representative of the Board of World Mission, the Board has agreed to present the following guideline re maternity leave:

The following guidelines are in addition to a woman's rights under the Unemployment Insurance Act of Canada and any benefits which may be provided by provincial or any other government policy:

- 1. The female church worker shall be given a leave of absence up to 17 weeks at the birth of a child into a family in accordance with government regulations.
- This parent can take paid vacation leave to the extent of existing leave credits instead of unemployment insurance parental leave, or take it as a means of extending that parental leave. There is also the option of returning to work earlier than the full 17 weeks.

- Although pregnancy is not an illness, it should be recognized that sickness can
 occur during pregnancy. Paid sick leave should cover complications that arise out
 of the pregnancy or childbirth.
- 4. Where a doctor's certificate is provided stating that a longer period of maternity leave is required for health reasons, a reasonable extension of unpaid leave should be allowed.
- 5. While on maternity leave the church worker should accumulate all benefits and incremental pay increases. Arrangements for the payment of the benefit premiums (i.e., pension, UIC, health insurance, etc.) should be worked out between the employer and employee prior to the leave.
- 6. In the case of a pastoral minister:

The current provision for housing (manse or manse allowance) and utilities shall be maintained.

The pastoral charge will pay the costs of pulpit supply, if applicable.

Recommendation No. 3 (preamble reworded, recommendation adopted, page 28)

That the above Guidelines re Maternity Leave be adopted, and that the adoption of the Guidelines be the Assembly's answer to Overtures No. 17, and No. 26, 1984.

Christian Educators

Recommendation No. 20, 1984 (A & P, page 410) was referred back to the Board. After considerable study by a task force, the Board has concluded that it is the responsibility of presbyteries to give oversight in the hiring of professional church educators. There should nevertheless, be standards for church educators just as there are standards for ministers of Word and Sacrament. In this light, the Board has decided to present to General Assembly:

Recommendation No. 4 (adopted as amended, page 28)

- That congregations consult with the presbytery of the bounds when creating a
 position for a professional church educator.
- 2) That congregations, courts, boards, committees or societies be asked to place the name of a prospective professional church educator before the presbytery of the bounds with a view to obtaining its approval for the engagement of the aforesaid person.
- That normally, the professional church educator will be a member of the Order of Diaconal Ministries.
- 4) That the presbytery assess the qualifications of those not members of the Order of Diaconal Ministries before granting permission to the congregation, court, board, committee, or society to engage the professional church educator.
- 5) That the Board of Education and Reception be requested to prepare guidelines for use by presbyteries when making such assessments.

Movement from One Order of Ministry to Another

It is becoming a fairly common occurrence for persons who have served within the Church in one Order of Ministry to seek further training and move into another Order. Presently, years of experience have not been recognized when such moves have been made. The Board has considered this matter and has consulted with members of the staff of the Pension Board and the Board of World Mission.

Recommendation No. 5 (referred back, page 37 & 42)
That within the paid ordered ministries of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, years of service will be recognized with the exception of the duration of the person's ministry in a charge to which he/she has been first appointed as an

Ordained Missionary.

Overture No. 9, 1984 (A & P 1984, p. 519, 40, 419-20) Re: Pension Funds

The 110th General Assembly referred this Overture to a joint committee of the Board of Ministry and the Pension Board for study and report to the 111th General Assembly. The joint committee, chaired by the Rev. J.W. Milne, met on two occasions, November 20, 1984 and January 11, 1985, devoting 4-5 hours to debate the matter.

Members were: Rev. Douglas Crocker, Mrs. Diane Reid, Rev. Giollo Kelly, Mr. Herb MacFarlane, Rev. Carol Morrow (co-opted), Rev. J. W. Milne, and Rev. T. Gemmell

Recommendation No. 6 (adopted, page 37)

That the Pension Board institute options for members of the Pension Fund so that members may elect the type of pension to be paid at retirement, e.g., 100% survivor benefit, a 5 or 10 year guaranteed benefit, etc.

Recommendation No. 7 (adopted, page 37)

That the above recommendation be the answer of the General Assembly to Overture No. 9, 1984.

Recommendation No. 8 (adopted, page 37)

That the General Assembly remind presbyteries to consult with clergy couples with reference to the implications of their special status, with particular reference to their pensions.

THE ORDER OF DIACONAL MINISTRIES

The Council of the Order of Diaconal Ministries

The Council of the Order met in June of 1984 and celebrated the occasion of the first meeting with the new name "The Order of Diaconal Ministries". Dr. Margaret Webster, former Principal and Professor of Christian Education at Ewart College, was the speaker and resource person and led the Council in considering the theme "Affirmation and Challenge".

The Council accepted a revised constitution and decided to collect pictures and written records about the Order and individuals in the Order for historical purposes. Representatives will attend the meeting of the Diakonia of the Americas in Philadelphia in June. The Council renewed its membership with the World Federation of Sisterhoods and Diaconal Associations.

With the change in name of the Order, the symbol of the Order, the pin, had to be changed. The design that was used in the past and several new designs were mailed to all members of the Order for their consideration in a postal vote. The Order chose to retain the symbol of the St. Andrew's Cross with the wording on the pin being changed to "Diaconal Ministries, Presbyterian Church".

Recommendation No. 9 (adopted, page 37)

That a representative of the Order of Diaconal Ministries be heard.

Designation Service

One of the main tasks of the Task Force on Diaconal Concerns during this year has been the preparation of the worship service for designation to the Order of Diaconal Ministries as mandated to the Board of Ministry by the 107th General Assembly.

The preparation of this service intersects with the work of two other committees: The Committee on Worship which was asked by the 110th General Assembly to prepare a new Book of Common Order and the Committee on Church Doctrine which was asked by the 107th General Assembly to revise the designation questions and prepare a preamble. The Board of Ministry has consulted with both committees.

The preamble and questions are such an integral part of the service of designation that the service is printed in its totality in the report of the Church Doctrine Committee (p. 236-252) instead of placing portions of the service in two different reports.

Recommendation No. 10 (answered in terms of decision re Church Doctrine Rec. 11, page 31 & 37)

That the designation service be adopted and commended to presbyteries for use until such time as the new Book of Common Order is published.

Guidelines for Employing Members of the Order of Diaconal Ministries

The Task Force on Diaconal Concerns is preparing guidelines for the hiring, in-service support, and termination of the services of members of the Order of Diaconal Ministries. This work will be completed by the end of 1985 and should prove useful to presbyteries, boards, committees, and particularly to congregations. The Task Force is indebted to Dr. Mary Whale for her contribution to this work.

SPECIAL MINISTRIES

Institutional Chaplaincies Committee

The committee offers guidance and support to persons who are engaged in or are preparing for institutional chaplaincy. Guidance is offered also to presbyteries as they endeavour to support persons who have chosen to work in an institutional setting. Issues and concerns related to conducting ministry in an institutional environment receive the committee's attention.

The committee would remind congregations that chaplains are a valuable resource to help equip them for their ministry with marginalized persons.

The committee would like to report that:

- An interim position paper providing guidelines for chaplains and presbyteries on the sacramental ministry of chaplains has been referred to the Committee on Church Doctrine for comment.
- Provincial committees have now been established for the purpose of certifying chaplains to serve in public institutions.
- Criteria for annual reporting to this committee by chaplains of their work and accomplishments has been established.
- The Synod of Toronto and Kingston has approved of making grants available for eligible members engaged in a supervised pastoral education program.
- Pastoral support is now made available to Presbyterian ministers engaged in supervised pastoral education programs.
- Three \$15,000 bursaries are made available annually to enable eligible clergy to take a year's residency at the Kingston Institute of Pastoral Care.
- The first assessment of pastoral services in the correctional services of Canada took place at the Drumheller Institution, August 1984.

We are represented on the following inter-faith committees:

- Certification of Institutional Chaplains (Canadian Council of Churches) John Duncan.
- 2. Federal Correctional Inter-faith Committee Arnold Bethune.
- 3. Ontario Correctional Inter-faith Committee Margaret Kirkland-Coffey.

The 110th General Assembly asked presbyteries to consider appointing Institutional Chaplains within their bounds as commissioners to the 113th General Assembly (1987) in order to facilitate a National Conference of Chaplains. The replies from presbyteries have all been positive. The Board, therefore, has authorized its Institutional Chaplaincies Committee to plan a pre-Assembly 1987 Chaplains' Consultation on Pastoral Care to Marginalized Persons. Presbyteries will be notified by September 1986

of the plans for the consultation and of the need to appoint chaplains as commissioners to General Assembly.

Canadian Forces Chaplaincy Committee

At the present time The Presbyterian Church in Canada has seven of its ministers serving as Permanent Force Chaplains in the Canadian Armed Forces. Herewith, are their names and appointments: Major R.A.B. MacLean, Base Chaplain, C.F. Base, Shearwater, N.S.; Major W.C. MacLellan, Base Chaplain, C.F. Base, Baden-Soellingen, Germany; Captain R.E. Baker, C.F. Station, Goose Bay, Labrador; Captain L.E. Clifton, C.F. Training School, C.F.B., St. Jean, Richelain, Quebec; Captain G.L. Zimmerman, Royal Roads Military College, Victoria, B.C.; Captain D.C. Kettle, C.F. Base, Chilliwack, B.C.; Captain C.I. MacLean, C.F.B., Halifax, N.S.

The Rev. J. Edward Wiley of Knox Presbyterian Church, Morrisburg, Ontario is just in the recruitment process and, if he passes successfully all the necessary preliminary tests, he will be inducted as a Permanent Force Chaplain by the summer of 1985. This will bring our complement of Presbyterian Chaplains to eight in number.

Mr. Wiley is already a Primary Reserve Chaplain and serves part-time with the Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry Highlanders of Cornwall, Ontario. During his summer training with the forces, Mr. Wiley was awarded his Parachute Wings, the first Presbyterian Chaplain to have obtained this qualification.

It should also be noted that Captain W.C. MacLellan who is stationed with the Air Wing in Germany was promoted this past summer to his Majority, and is now the Base Chaplain in Baden-Soellingen, Germany.

Of special interest to our committee, as well, is Captain Lloyd E. Clifton's appointment to take French Language Training for two years, and he is presently studying at the French Language Training School, C.F.B., St. Jean, Richelain, Quebec.

Our committee is also pleased that Dr. Charles H.H. Scobie, of The Department of Religious Studies of Mount Allison University is chosen by The Canadian Council of Churches Chaplaincy Committee to give a course of lectures to the Regular Force Chaplains at their annual retreat to be held at The Royal Military College, Kingston, Ontario in June 1985.

During this past year two more of our Presbyterian ministers have been appointed to serve as Chaplains in the Reserve Forces. These are: Rev. Harvey James Reichelt, of First Presbyterian Church, Portage La Prairie, Manitoba; Rev. Henry Douglas Horst, Tri Congregational Church, 30 Benlammond Avenue, Toronto, Ontario.

Our committee is very pleased with the work and witness of our Presbyterian Chaplains, and we recommend that the Board of Ministry keep in close touch with them, and keep well informed too, of the new opportunities which are available through the Chaplains' Branch to certified theological students to be enrolled in "The Chaplain Training Course", which is a very fine and generous plan, and will be ideal for any of our prospective clergy who may feel called to exercise their vocation within the military environment.

The Board has discovered that the relationship of this Committee to the Board of Ministry and to the General Assembly should have been reviewed in 1983. The matter has been overlooked. The Board has instructed its Executive to enter into discussions with the Canadian Forces Chaplaincy Committee with a view to examining its constitution and relationship to the Board. A report will be made to the 112th General Assembly.

Recommendation No. 11 (adopted, page 27)

That a representative of the Canadian Forces Chaplaincy Committee be heard.

OTHER MATTERS

Task Force on Doctrine of Ministry

The 110th General Assembly accepted the plan of the Board to establish a special committee to write a contemporary statement of this Church's Doctrine of Ministry with a view to ensuring that our practice is congruent with our theology. The Special Committee, which includes two representatives of the Church Doctrine Committee, has been meeting and hopes to have a report ready for the 112th General Assembly.

Overture No. 1, 1985 (p. 452) Re: Training Programme to Instruct Lay Preachers

This Overture from the Presbytery of Kingston asks that the Board of Ministry be directed to establish a training program, by correspondence or otherwise, to instruct lay preachers, and that presbyteries be allowed to maintain a list of persons who have successfully completed such a program.

The Board of Ministry would draw to the attention of the General Assembly the fact that several programs of lay theological education are currently available:

- 1. The Montreal Institute for Ministry (in which The Presbyterian College is a partner) offers a two year reading course for lay persons who wish to develop theological and ministry skills. This program involves tutors (usually ministers of word and sacrament) who could help the student with preaching skills.
- The Board of World Mission has a number of copies of what was "The Catechist's Course" available. This course could, presumably, be administered by a presbytery which is concerned to provide theological and ministry education to lay persons for whatever reason.
- 3. The Board of Congregational Life offers a lay course based on the theological education by extension model, entitled, "Training For Ministry". This course involves participation in and accountability to a group especially with respect to a practical program of ministry in the congregation or community.
- 4. Vancouver School of Theology offers a program of lay theological and ministry education through its Knowledge Network which uses community television and group participation.

The above are resources available within our own denomination's system. Other denominations have their own approaches to education for lay ministry which might be explored for resources which could be adapted to our use. The United Church of Canada, for example, has a program of lay ministry and lay ministry training in the Presbytery of Quebec-Sherbrooke.

The matter of the use of lay preachers raises a plethora of questions to which presbyteries should give careful consideration. In a church whose tradition has been that those who preach should have a post-graduate university education, one might question the propriety of using lay preachers, even when such persons have had a short course. It should also be noted that it is very difficult to teach the art and skills of preaching via a correspondence course. The prevalence of the use of lay preachers might also be queried, and hence the need for a special training course across the Church. The question of supervision of such courses, and of such preaching also arises. What kind of oversight will be given to lay preachers by presbyteries? Finally, it has been suggested that persons who have completed such a course might then pressure for credit for such a course toward the educational requirements for ordination or designation.

The Board of Ministry holds that the use of and training of lay preachers is the primary responsibility of the presbyteries, as would be the oversight of lay preachers. A variety

of resources do exist which presbyteries could use in training such persons. The Board would strongly urge presbyteries to require some training in Biblical interpretation, theology, homiletics, and liturgics of persons who wish to be lay preachers, and that this training be provided before the person begins to practice in such a role.

Recommendation No. 12 (adopted, page 38)
That the above report with its suggestions be the reply of the 111th General Assembly to Overture No. 1, 1985.

Overture No. 8, 1985 (p. 455)
Re: Order of Diaconal Ministries

The overture requests that the Board of Ministry be instructed "to bring forward recommendations whereby presbyteries would be vitally involved in the selection of personnel of the Order of Diaconal Ministries for service within their congregations in parallel form to presbytery's involvement in the selection of personnel of the Ordained Ministry of Word and Sacrament". The overture arrived too late for consideration by the full Board, but the Executive is sympathetic to the request and has asked the Policy Committee to study the matter with a view to reporting to the 112th General Assembly.

PENSION BOARD

To the Venerable, the 111th General Assembly:

There were two general meetings of the Board held on October 1, 1984 and March 4, 1985.

The Board expresses its appreciation to Mr. George Palmer, former Chairman, who continues to participate in the work of the Board as advisor, and to the office staff, Mrs. Diane Reid and Miss Patti Whynotte.

BEQUEST MONIES

Bequest monies received by the Pension Board continue to be applied, as directed by the 99th General Assembly, to supplement the benefits of those retired ministers and widows who receive little or no benefit from the Canada/Quebec Pension Plan. At the beginning of 1985 there were 22 minister and 74 widows who were receiving such assistance.

CANADA LIFE

Representatives of Canada Life reported on their stewardship at the March meeting of the Board and responded in an acceptable manner to questions from Board members concerning investment policy and performance of the Fund. At the end of 1984, the market value of the Fund was some \$22.4 million (Bonds 37%, Stocks 48%, mortgages 9%, short term and Cash 6%).

MAXIMUM PENSIONABLE EARNINGS

The Pension Board has recommended to the Administrative Council that Maximum Pensionable Earnings for the Pension Plan for 1986 for \$23,500.

OVERTURE NO. 9, 1984 - PRESBYTERY OF NORTHERN SASKATCHEWAN (A & P 1984, p. 40, 420, 519)

Re: Pension Funds

In accordance with the action of the 110th General Assembly, the Pension Board participated in a joint committee with the Board of Ministry dealing with this Overture. The Board concurs in the recommendations of this special committee (see page 365, Recommendation No. 6). The Pension Board is currently working on making changes to the Pension Fund Constitution to reflect the special committee's recommendation regarding the availability of types of pensions at retirement.

ACTUARIES REPORT - PENSION PLAN

The Actuaries report on the Pension Plan was submitted to the October meeting. The Actuarial valuation of the Pension Plan was completed as of December 31, 1983. Following the valuation, the Pension Board agreed that the following changes in benefits be implemented, effective January 1, 1985:

- An increase of \$20 in the annual pension for each year of service rendered before 1974, to be granted to each pensioner regardless of age; for a non-retired member, a similar increase from \$100 to \$120 on retiring at age 65.
- An increase of 15% on the pension credits earned by each member under the new plan, to be applied to retired members as well.
- An increase of 20% of her present pension to each widow drawing a survivor's annuity.
- 4. An increase of 20% in the children's benefits.
- 5. An increase in the survivor's benefit from 60% to 67%, for future annuity purchases.

Recommendation No. 1 (adopted, page 36)

That the increases in pension benefits, as detailed above, be approved.

GROUP INSURANCE

The Group Insurance Committee of the Pension Board met to consider the report of Canada Life with regard to the experience rating of the Group Insurance Plan.

The Group Insurance Committee was asked to "cost" various improvements to the Group Insurance plans for Ministers and Others. They brought the following recommendations to the Pension Board which, in turn, brings them before the Assembly on the understanding that these proposals will not result in premium increases to the membership of either Plan nor will these improvements in the Plans affect the cost of the Church as employer.

Recommendation No. 2 (adopted, page 36)

Under the Group Insurance Plan for Ministers, that the following changes be made in the benefits effective July 1, 1985: Life Insurance to age 65 be increased to \$40,000 (from \$30,000); Life Insurance from age 65 - 70 be increased to \$10,000 (from \$8,000); Long Term Disability benefit be increased to \$600.00 per month (from \$500.00).

Recommendation No. 3 (adopted, page 36)

Under the Group Insurance Plan for employees that the following changes be made in the benefits effective July 1, 1985: Life Insurance to age 65 be increased to \$40,000 (from \$30,000); Life Insurance from age 65 - 70 be \$10,000 (from \$8,000); Long Term Disability benefit be increased to \$545.00 per month (from \$445.00).

ACTUARIES REPORT - EMPLOYEES RETIREMENT FUND

The Actuaries Report on the Employees Retirement Fund was presented to the Pension Board at the March 1985 meeting. There is a surplus in this Fund as well and on that basis the Pension Board wishes to make the following recommendation with regard to the Fund.

Recommendation No. 4 (adopted, page 36)

That benefits accrued in pension to December 31, 1983 for retired and non-retired members of the Employee's Retirement Fund be increased 15%, effective January 1, 1985.

MEMBERSHIP DEFINITION

The 110th General Assembly created The Order of Diaconal Ministries. After reviewing the Pension Plan Constitution the Pension Board has deemed it necessary to propose the following change:

Section 5, sub-section (f), after the words "Ewart College . . . " add "and/or Members of the Order of Diaconal Ministries".

Recommendation No. 5 (adopted, page 36)

That the above change in wording be approved.

SUPPLEMENTARY REPORT OF THE PENSION BOARD

To the Venerable, the 111th General Assembly,

Clause 8(c) now reads: "The pension of such an annual amount as shall be determined by the actuary in respect of each unit of pension of \$250 per annum for which the member has contributed to the previous plan.

Recommendation No. 8 (adopted, page 36)

That the pension provided under clause 8(c) of the Pension Plan become payable at age 65 in the full amount presently payable on attaining age 68.

There have been changes made in provincial legislation which are applicable to the minister's Pension Plan and to the Employees' Retirement Fund. It is required by those provinces that pension plans be amended to reflect those changes.

Recommendation No. 9 (adopted, page 36)

That the Church's pension plans be amended by adding to them the terms of the legislation in the various provinces.

ACTUARIAL REPORT TO THE PENSION BOARD ON THE RETIREMENT FUND FOR CHURCH EMPLOYEES OF THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA AS OF 31 DECEMBER 1983

I. INTRODUCTION

We were instructed to perform a valuation of the Retirement Fund for Church Employees of The Presbyterian Church in Canada as of 31 December 1983 in accordance with Regulations 18 and 22 governing the plan and in accordance with the requirements of the Pension Benefits Act of Ontario.

II. HISTORY OF THE PLAN

The General Assembly of The Presbyterian Church in Canada adopted the present earnings-related pension plan with effect from 1 January 1975 to provide pension and ancillary benefits for plan members. This plan superseded a previous money-purchase pension plan.

Since its inception, the plan has been amended from time to time, in response to General Assembly decisions, and changes in provincial and federal pension regulations. A summary of the major provisions of the plan as amended to 31 December 1983 is included as Appendix A of this report.

III. DATA

The valuation was based on data provided by the administrative staff of the Church. We subjected these data to such tests of reasonableness, accuracy, and consistency with the data used in the previous valuation as we considered necessary, and were satisfied that the data were adequate for the purposes of the valuation. A summary of the data is included as Appendix B of this report.

IV. ACTUARIAL ASSUMPTIONS AND METHODS

The actuarial assumptions and methods used in the valuation are summaried in Appendix C. These are essentially the same as the actuarial assumptions and methods used in the previous valuation as of 31 December 1980 except in the following respects.

- Provision has been made in this valuation for mortality both before and after retirement using male and female rates where applicable. In the previous valuation, provision was made only for mortality after retirement, using female rates.
- Assets have been taken in this valuation at an "adjusted" market value, as used for
 the valuation of the "Ministers" Pension Plan. In the previous valuation, assets
 were taken at an unadjusted market value. This change is especially appropriate at
 this time, in view of the large movements in market values in recent years for all
 types of securities.

The above changes bring the actuarial assumptions used in this valuation more into line with the assumptions used in the "Ministers" Pension Plan.

Given the money-purchase nature of the previous plan, the only cost aspect requiring actuarial calculations is the funding of the benefits accruing under the present earnings-related plan (i.e. with respect to pensionable service from 1 January 1975). We therefore excluded from this valuation the assets and liabilities in respect of the previous plan.

V. RESULTS OF THE VALUATION

Based on the data and actuarial assumptions and methods referred to above, the actuarial balance sheet of the plan as of 31 December 1983 is as set out in Appendix D.

The actuarial balance sheet in Appendix D shows that the plan had an estimated actuarial surplus (i.e. an excess of the value of existing assets over the present value of benefit payments related to service before the valuation date) of \$241,548 as of 31 December 1983.

The derivation of this surplus is approximately as follows:

The actuarial surplus may be used to improve benefits, or it might be retained in the plan as a contingency reserve.

The "normal cost" of the plan (i.e. the total rate of contributions required to finance currently accruing benefits) is 6.6% of the pensionable incomes of members aged under 65, or \$85,024 based on those members' 1983 pensionable incomes.

The rates of contribution to the plan, as specified in its provisions, total 8% of pensionable incomes (3.2% from members plus 4.8% from employers), and could not readily be changed. Since the plan had an actuarial surplus and the "normal cost" is less than the total actual rates of contribution to the plan, the solvency requirements of the Ontario Pension Benefits Act were being met (and in fact exceeded) as of 31 December 1983.

The actuarial opinion required for the purposes of the Ontario Pension Benefits Act is included as Section VII of this report.

VII. ACTUARIAL OPINION

This actuarial opinion forms a part of the actuarial report on the Pension Plan of The Presbyterian Church in Canada as of 31 December 1983. This plan has been assigned Registration No. 29230 by Revenue Canada, Taxation and Registration No. C-6281 by the Pension Committee of Ontario.

- 1. The purpose of the report was to prepare actuarial estimates of the funded position of the plan as of 31 December 1983, as well as the relationship between the projected contributions that will be made to it, at the rates specified in the provisions of the plan, and the amounts needed to meet the funding requirements of the plan for the period from 1 January 1984 to the effective date of the next valuation (which will be due to be made not later than as of 31 December 1986) in such a manner as to comply with applicable legislation.
- The required employer normal cost contributions for the period referred to above, after taking account of the amendments to the plan adopted in 1985, are 3.4% of members' pensionable incomes.
- The plan was fully funded as of 31 December 1983, having an estimated actuarial surplus of \$241,548.
- 4. The rate of employer contribution specified in the provisions of the plan is 4.8% of members' pensionable incomes. This exceeds the rate of required employer normal cost contributions referred to in item 2 of this opinion, and accordingly the projected contributions that will be made at the specified rates will be sufficient to meet the funding requirements of the plan. Nevertheless, emerging experience differing from the assumptions that I used will result in gains or losses, which will be revealed in future valuations.

5. In my opinion:

- a) the data on which this report is based are sufficient and reliable for the purpose of the valuation;
- the assumptions used are adequate and appropriate for the purpose of the valuation; and
- the methods employed are consistent with sound actuarial principles.
- This certificate and report have been prepared and my opinions given in accordance
 with generally accepted actuarial principles and conform with the
 Recommendations for Valuation of Pension Plans adopted by the Canadian Institute
 of Actuaries.

APPENDIX A

SUMMARY OF MAJOR PENSION PLAN PROVISIONS AS OF 31 DECEMBER 1983

EFFECTIVE DATE

The present plan came into effect on 1 January 1975, superseding a previous plan.

CONTRIBUTIONS

Members contribute to the plan at the rate of 3.2% of pensionable incomes, and participating employers contribute at the rate of 4.8% of members' pensionable incomes. For the purposes of the plan, "pensionable income" means the salary of a member, excluding bonuses, to a maximum of \$18,500 in a full year.

RETIREMENT DATE

A member may retire on an unreduced pension at age 65 or over. A member aged 60 or over may retire on an actuarially reduced pension. A member who defers retirement beyond age 65 continues to make contributions to the plan and receives a pension equal to his pension accrued from 1 January 1975 to his actual retirement date, plus an actuarially increased pension based on his pension accrued in respect of pensionable service under the previous plan.

RETIREMENT PENSION

The annual pension payable to a member on a normal retirement is equal to:

- i) the pension accrued under the previous plan; plus
- ii) 1.6% of his total pensionable income from 1 January 1975.

In addition, pensions accrued under the existing plan in respect of pensionable service from 1 January 1975 to 31 December 1980 were increased by 25% following the 1980 valuation.

The normal form of pension is payable only for the member's lifetime.

LUMP SUM DEATH BENEFITS

A death benefit is payable on the death of a non-retired member, equal to the member's accumulated contributions with interest.

TERMINATION BENEFITS

A member whose employment terminates at age 40 or over, after at leave five years of pensionable service, is entitled to a deferred pension commencing at age 65 equal to the pension accrued by the member under the present plan. Any other terminating member is entitled to a refund of his/her contributions to the present plan with interest, or may elect to receive a deferred pension. Termination benefits in respect of benefits accrued under the previous plan are subject to the provisions of that plan.

ADMINISTRATION

The administration of the plan is the responsibility of a Pension Board consisting of members appointed by the General Assembly.

APPENDIX C

ACTUARIAL ASSUMPTIONS AND METHODS

INVESTMENT RETURN

We assumed an investment return of 6% per annum, net of investment expenses.

MORTALITY

We assumed that the mortality for members both before and after retirement will be in accordance with the 1971 GAM Table.

RETIREMENT

We assumed that all members aged less than 65 on the valuation date will retire at age 65, and that members over the age of 65 will retire immediately.

TERMINATION OF MEMBERSHIP

We assumed that all members would continue in employment until death or retirement.

RETIRED MEMBERS

Pensions for retired members are bought from an insurance company at the date of the members' retirement. Existing pensions in payment on the valuation date are not therefore carried as liabilities of the plan in the actuarial balance sheet.

ASSET VALUATION

Invested assets under the present plan were taken at market value, less 2/3 of "notional" capital gains in 1983 and less 1/3 of "notional" capital gains in 1982. Since the financial statements issued by Canada Life do not identify separately interest payments and capital gains, we determined "notional capital gains by deducting from the total increase in unit values an amount equal to the "expected" interest earnings based on the 6% assumed rate of investment return.

The calculation of the adjusted asset value at 31 December 1983, determined as above, was as follows:

(The invested assets held by Canada Life under the previous plan amounted to \$395,288.40 on 31 December 1983).

ACTUARIAL COST METHOD

The actuarial cost method used in this valuation is the "attained age single premium cost" method. The balance sheet liability for active employees is the present value of benefits with respect to pensionable service under the present plan up to the valuation date. The "normal" cost for the year following the valuation date is the estimated present value of the benefit which accrues with respect to that year of pensionable service.

In view of the money-purchase nature of the previous plan, the balance sheet excludes both the liabilities and assets in respect of such plan.

ON THE PENSION FUND OF THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA AS OF 31 DECEMBER 1983

I. INTRODUCTION

We were instructed to perform a valuation of the Pension Plan of The Presbyterian Church in Canada as of 31 December 1983 in accordance with Rule 20 of the Constitution governing the plan and in accordance with the requirements of the Pension Benefits Act of Ontario.

In addition to reporting on the condition of the plan as of 31 December 1983, we also report on the effect on the plan's financial condition of certain benefit improvements approved since that date.

HISTORY OF THE PLAN

The General Assembly of The Presbyterian Church in Canada adopted the present earnings-related pension plan on 1 January 1974 to provide pension and ancillary benefits for plan members. This plan superseded a number of previous pension plans.

Since its inception, the plan has been amended from time to time, in response to General Assembly decisions, and changes in provincial and federal pension regulations. A summary of the major provisions of the plan as amended to 31 December 1983 is included in Appendix A of this report.

The following amendments effective after 1 January 1985 (hereinafter referred to as the "1985 amendments") were approved by the Pension Board at its meeting 4 March 1985.

- The accrued pensions of retired and non-retired members in respect to each year of pensionable service under the previous plan were increased by 20% (i.e. from \$100 to \$120).
- The pensions of retired and non-retired members accrued under the present plan in respect to pensionable service from 1 January 1974 to 31 December 1983 were increased by 15%.
- 3. All surviving spouses' pensions being paid were increased by 20%.
- All dependent children's pensions in respect of living and deceased members were increased by 20%.
- The surviving spouses' pensions in respect of members who retire on or after 1
 January 1985 were increased to 67% of the members' accrued pensions, from the
 previous 60%.

DATA

The valuation was based on data summarized for us by the administrative staff of the Church. We subjected these data to such tests of reasonableness, accuracy and consistency with the data used in the previous valuation as we considered necessary, and were satisfied that the data were adequate for the purposes of the valuation. A summary of the data is included in Appendix B of this report.

IV. ACTUARIAL ASSUMPTIONS AND METHODS

The actuarial assumptions and methods used in the valuation are summarized in Appendix C. These are essentially the same as the actuarial assumptions and methods used in the previous valuation as of 31 December 1980 except in the following respects.

- 1. In the current valuation, provision has been made for salary increases related to seniority and promotion, based on a study of actual salary levels. In the previous valuation no provision was made for seniority salary increases.
- In the current valuation, explicit provision has been made for the possibility of disability retirement, based on the experience in comparable but larger pension plans.
- 3. The assumed rate of general salary increases has been rounded up to 4.00% per annum, from 3.92% in the previous valuation.
- 4. Administrative expenses in future years have been reduced from 0.55% to 0.40% of future pensionable incomes, based on a review of actual expenses in recent years.

V. RESULTS OF THE VALUATION

Based on the data and actuarial assumptions and methods referred to above, the actuarial balance sheets of the plan as of 31 December 1983, before and after taking account of the 1985 amendments, are as set out in Appendices D and E respectively.

The rates of contribution to the plan are specified in its provisions and could not readily be increased. Accordingly, for the purposes of assessing the overall financial condition of the plan and determining the amounts of benefit improvements which may be provided, it is appropriate to compare the sum of the value of the existing assets of the plan, plus the present value of the expected contributions that will be made in the future on behalf of the existing active members, with the total present values of all benefits that are expected to be paid in the future to existing members and their beneficiaries and future administrative expenses. The use of this method to determine the surplus available for benefit improvements ensures that, provided future experience is not less favourable than the assumptions used in the valuation and provided that contributions continue to be made at the rates specified in the plan, the plan will be able to meet its expected obligations even if no additional members join the plan in the future.

The actuarial balance sheet in Appendix D shows that on this basis, before making provision for the 1985 amendments, the plan had an estimated actuarial surplus (i.e. an excess over the present value of future benefit payments and administrative expenses) of \$7,730,000 as of 31 December 1983.

The derivation of this surplus is approximately as follows:

As shown in the actuarial balance sheet in Appendix E, the 1985 amendments utilized \$4,739,000 of the plan's estimated surplus, leaving an estimated residual surplus of \$2.991,000.

For the purpose of reporting to the Pension Commission of Ontario in accordance with the requirements of the Ontario Pension Benefits Act, the actuarial surplus (or unfunded liability) should be determined on a basis that is independent of any rates of contribution specified in the provisions of the plan. It is therefore necessary to determine the "normal cost" of the plan (i.e. the total rate of contributions required to finance currently accruing benefits). For this purpose we used the "attained age single premium" actuarial cost method, under which the actuarial surplus is defined as the excess of the value of existing assets over the liability for only those benefits related to service before the valuation date. As shown in Appendices D and E, the estimated actuarial surpluses determined on this basis, before and after making provision for the 1985 amendments, were \$4,440,000 and \$262,000 respectively. The corresponding "normal cost" of the plan, after making provision for the 1985 amendments, is 10.7% of members' pensionable incomes (inclusive of members' contributions). As the plan had an actuarial surplus on this basis after providing for the 1985 amendments and the "normal cost" is less than the actual rates of contribution to the plan, the solvency requirements of the Ontario Pension Benefits Act were being met (and in fact exceeded) as of 31 December 1983.

The actuarial opinion required for the purposes of the Ontario Pension Benefits Act is included as Section VII of this report.

- 3. The plan was fully funded as of 31 December 1983, having an estimated actuarial surplus of \$4,440,000 before making provision for the 1985 amendments and an estimated actuarial surplus of \$262,000 after making provision for those amendments.

4. The rates of employer contribution specified in the provisions of the plan is deemed to equivalent to about 14% of members' pensionable incomes less members' required contributions. This exceeds the rate of required employer normal cost contributions referred to in item 2 of this opinion, and accordingly the projected contributions that will be made at the specified rates will be sufficient to meet the funding requirements of the plan. Nevertheless, emerging experience differing from the assumptions that I used will result in gains or losses, which will be revealed in future valuations.

- a) the data on which this report is based are sufficient and reliable for the purpose of the valuation;
- the assumptions used are adequate and appropriate for the purpose of the valuation; and
- c) the methods employed are consistent with sound actuarial principles.

APPENDIX A

SUMMARY OF MAJOR PENSION PLAN PROVISIONS AS OF 31 DECEMBER 1983

EFFECTIVE DATE

The present plan came into effect on 1 January 1974, superseding a number of previous plans.

ELIGIBILITY

Ministers, missionaries, professors, graduates of Ewart College and executive staff of the Church are eligible to become members of the plan provided they are in pensionable service with an eligible employer.

CONTRIBUTIONS

Participating employers remit contributions in accordance with a formula specified in the Constitution, which is approximately equivalent to 14% of members' pensionable incomes. Of this amount, 4% of pensionable income is contributed by the member. For the purposes of the plan, "pensionable income" includes a housing allowance provided by the employer, and is subject to a maximum of \$20,000 in a full year.

RETIREMENT DATE

A member may retire on an unreduced pension at age 65 or over. In this valuation we have assumed that the 'frozen' pension accrued in respect of the member's own contributions to the previous plan will be payable in full at age 65, instead of being reduced to 82% for the three year period between ages 68 and 65.

A member aged 60 or over may retire on a reduced pension, with his accrued pension being reduced by 0.5% for each month by which his age at retirement is less than 65.

A member who defers retirement beyond age 65 continues to make contributions to the plan and receives a pension equal to his pension accrued from 1 January 1974 to his actual retirement date, plus an actuarially increased pension based on his pension accrued in respect of pensionable service under the previous plan (before 1974).

RETIREMENT PENSION

The annual pension payable to a member on normal retirement is equal to:

- i) \$100 for each year of pensionable service under the previous plan; plus
- ii) a portion of the pension accrued under the previous plan ('frozen' pension), which represents member contributions under that plan; plus
- iii) 2% of his total pensionable income from January 1, 1974.

In addition, pensions accrued under the existing plan in respect of pensionable service from 1 January 1974 to 31 December 1980 were increased by 10% following the 1980 valuation.

The normal form of pension is payable for life, with 60% of the pension continuing to the member's surviving spouse after his death.

DISABILITY PENSION

A member who becomes totally disabled is entitled to a disability pension. The disability pension equals the member's full accrued pension.

SURVIVING SPOUSES' BENEFITS

The surviving spouse of a member who dies before or after retirement is entitled to a pension equal to 60% of the member's accrued pension, subject to a minimum of \$1,365 per annum, payable until the spouse's death. The amount of spouse's pension is reduced on an actuarial basis if the spouse is more than 10 years younger than the member.

CHILDREN'S BENEFITS

A surviving spouse with dependent children is entitled to an annual pension of \$396 for one child, \$720 for two children, \$1,008 for three children, plus \$198 for each additional child, payable until the child reaches age 18 (age 21 if attending school or university). Higher benefits are payable to the child's guardian in the event of the death of both parents.

LUMP SUM DEATH BENEFITS

A death benefit is payable on the death of a non-retired member, provided that neither a surviving spouse's pension for a children's pension is payable. The benefit equals the member's accumulated contributions with interest.

TERMINATION BENEFITS

A member whose employment terminates at age 40 or over after at least five years of pensionable service is entitled to a deferred pension commencing at age 65. Any other terminating member is entitled to a refund of his contributions with interest, or may elect to receive a deferred pension.

ADMINISTRATION

The administration of the plan is the responsibility of a Pension Board consisting of members appointed by the General Assembly.

INVESTMENT RETURN

We assumed an investment return of 6% per annum, net of investment expenses.

MORTALITY

1971 GAM Table rated down 2 years in age before retirement, after non-disability retirement, and for spouses. We assumed that future disability retirees will have the same life expectancy after retirement as members of the same sex retiring at age 65.

RETIREMENT

We assumed that all members aged less than 65 on the valuation date will retire at age 65, and that members over the age of 65 will retire immediately. We also assumed that the frozen benefit related to the member's own contributions before 1974 would be available in full at age 65.

DISABILITY

We assumed annual rates of disability retirement for male and female members in accordance with the following table.

TERMINATION OF MEMBERSHIP

We assumed that all members would continue in employment until death or retirement.

ADMINISTRATIVE EXPENSES

We assumed that non-investment expenses charged to the fund in each future year will equal 0.4% of total pensionable incomes.

MISCELLANEOUS ASSUMPTIONS

We assumed that 90% of members who die before retirement will be married, and that the same percentage of retiring members will be married. We treated all active members as if they were males and assumed that, on average, the spouse will be three years younger than the member.

RETIRED MEMBERS

Pensions for retired members and their surviving spouses and dependent children are bought from an insurance company at the date of the members' retirement or death. Existing pensions in payment on the valuation date are not therefore carried as liabilities of the plan in the actuarial balance sheet. In order to estimate the additional liabilities in respect of the "1985 amendments", we assumed that the additional pensions would also be bought from an insurance company, on the basis of current annuity purchase rates, but increased by 10% in order to provide for a possible decline in interest rates before the actual purchase date.

ASSET VALUATION

Assets were taken at market value, less 2/3 of net capital gains in 1983 and less 1/3 of net capital gains in 1982.

The calculation of the adjusted asset value at 31 December 1983, determined from the audited financial statement after deducting the balance of \$779,207 held in respect of bequests (which is used to provide additional payments to certain pensioners and widows over and above payments provided from the pension plan) was as follows:

ACTUARIAL COST METHOD

The actuarial opinion (Section VII of this report) was prepared on the basis of the attained age single premium actuarial cost method with salary projection.

For the purposes of the actuarial balance sheets (Appendices D and E), future contributions on behalf of the present active members, at the expected average rate of 14% of pensionable incomes as provided in the plan, together with the value of existing assets, were taken as assets of the plan, and the present values of all future benefit payments to existing members and their dependents along with future administrative expenses were taken as plan liabilities.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 1984

1. ACCOUNTING PRACTICES

The following is a summary of accounting practices followed by the Fund:

(a) Basis of valuation of Fund assets

The assets of the Fund are carried at current market values and unrealized gains and losses resulting from the adjustment to market are included in the statement of revenue and expenditure.

(b) Investment transactions and income

Realized gains and losses on the sale of investments are recorded as the difference between the proceeds and market value at the beginning of the year or cost at the date of purchase during the year.

(c) Fixed Assets

Fixed assets are expensed in the year of acquisition.

2. ACCOUNTS RECEIVABLE

Accounts receivable includes \$25,000 in bequests due from The Presbyterian Church in Canada which is to be received in 1985.

3. ADDITIONAL PAYMENTS TO PENSIONERS AND WIDOWS

As approved by the 99th General Assembly, bequests, commencing in 1972, will be used to provide additional payments to pensioners and widows receiving only small amounts from the Canada Pension Plan. The revenue and expenditure and balance on hand, as follows, are included in these financial statements.

4. CAPITAL FOR FUTURE OBLIGATION

These financial statements show the capital of the Pension Plan under the control of the Pension Board of The Presbyterian Church in Canada and do not purport to show the adequacy of the assets to meet the obligations of the Pension Plan.

During 1984 an actuarial valuation of the plan, as at December 31, 1983, was undertaken. Based on the interim actuarial report, the capital exceeded the estimated future obligations of the fund by approximately \$7,730,000. The Pension Board has approved increases in benefits which are estimated to amount to \$4,024,000, which will reduce the excess of capital over estimated future obligations to approximately \$3,706,000.

PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH BUILDING CORPORATION

To the Venerable, the IIIth General Assembly:

The Building Corporation serves the Church by assisting congregations faced with borrowing for building or renovating programs. The guarantee of the loans by the Corporation makes possible the obtaining of lower commercial rates of interest.

The congregations of Dixie, Mississauga, Ont., Guildwood, Scarborough, Ont., St. Stephen's, Weston, Ont., St. David's, Winnipeg, Man., and Westwood, Winnipeg, Man., have retired their loans this year. During the year the Corporation approved guaranteed bank loans for St. John's (Milliken), Scarborough, Ont., Chedoke, Hamilton, Ont., and Grace, West Hill, Scarborough, Ont.

Some congregations continue to take advantage of the Corporation's Interest Assistant Loans. All congregations are reducing their loans. The debentures outstanding were reduced to \$11,000 and the Guaranteed Bank Loans increased by a net of \$79,537. The Corporation has also outstanding loans amounting to \$277,695 from its Special Funds.

The Corporation has guaranteed bank loans for the following congregationns in an amount totalling \$959,997 as of December 31, 1984: First, Lower Sackville, N.S., Hopedale, Oakville, Ont., Forbes, Grande Prairie, Alta., St. Timothy's, Ajax, Ont., Trinity, London, Ont., Centennial, Calgary, Alta., St. James, Dawson Creek, B.C., London Korean Christian, London, Ont., White Oak, Mississauga, Ont., Waterloo North, Waterloo, Ont., Cheyne, Stoney Creek, Ont., Trinity, Kanata, Ont., McKercher Drive, Saskatoon, Sask., Forest Glade, Windsor, Ont., Malvern, Scarborough, Ont., Kortright, Guelph, Ont., United Korean, Calgary, Alta., St. Mark's, Malton, Ont., and Chedoke, Hamilton, Ont.

The Corporation has received the sum of \$207,000 from individuals and congregations at low rates of interest and has loaned the sum of \$114,500 to the congregations at low interest rates. We invite others to invest in church extension by loaning money to the Corporation.

In accordance with the instructions of the General Assembly of 1976 the Corporation continues to assist retired servants of the Church in securing housing accommodation. This year a number of inquiries and requests were received from retired ministers. We regret to report the death of the wife of one of our retired ministers. His subsequent illness required special care and therefore he vacated our house. The house was then sold and later another house was purchased to provide housing for one of our ministers and his family. The Corporation now provides housing for eleven (11) of our retirees as at the end of 1984. We have also assisted retired ministers with low interest mortgages. Knox Church, Oakville, Ont. continues to support us with a loan at a low interest rate from its Trust Fund in the amount of \$20,000. We acknowledge with thanks a gift of \$2,000 from New. St. James Church in London for our Housing Fund. The Corporation is hopeful that donations will be made by congregations and individuals to the Housing Fund so that we will be able to assist all of our retired servants who need help with housing at the time of retirement.

Our thanks are expressed to Mrs. Grace Bruner of Brantford, Ontario; Mr. R. Campbell of Wiarton, Ontario; Mr. A.H. Dancey of Oshawa, Ontario; Mr. M. Sewell of Saint John, N.B.; Mr. K. Percival of Guelph, Ontario; Dr. J.D. Mundie, Ph.D. of Winnipeg, Manitoba; Mr. B.L. Clark of Milton, Ontario; Dr. M.B. Dymond, M.D., C.M., LL.D., of Port Perry, Ontario; Mr. R.C. Johnston of Charlottetown, P.E.I. and Mr. Harry Lockington of Peterborough, Ontario, who assist the General Manager in looking after the retirement housing in their particular communities and show an interest in the welfare of our retired servants.

The details of the investment portfolio of the Corporation are available from the Comptroller's Office of The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

Nominations for Directors

The By-Laws of the Corporation provide that "Directors shall be elected annually by the General Assembly from nominees of the Directors".

We therefore submit the following recommendations:

Recommendation No. 1 (adopted, page 25)

That Mr. D.M. Walker, C.A., Vancouver, B.C., Dr. A.L. MacKay, B.D., D.D., LL.D., Hamilton, Ont., Mr. R. Thomson, Montreal, Que., Mr. G.O. Huggan, C.A., Don Mills, Ont., Dr. A.F. MacSween, B.A., D.D., Saanichton, B.C., and Dr. R.G. MacMillan, D.D., Burlington, Ont. be elected Directors of The Presbyterian Church Building Corporation for the next four years.

Recommendation No. 2 (adopted, page 25)

That Presbyteries, congregations and individual Presbyterians be encouraged to loan funds to The Presbyterian Church Building Corporation at reasonable rates of interest for Church Extension Work.

Recommendation No. 3 (reworded and adopted, page 25)

That congregations and individuals be encouraged to help The Presbyterian Church Building Corporation by gifts of money or real estate for its housing program for retired ministers, missionaries, deaconesses and their spouses.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 1984

1. ACCOUNTING PRACTICES

The following is a summary of accounting practices followed by the Corporation.

a) Investment transactions and income

Income from investments is recorded on an accrual basis.

Realized gains or losses from investment transactions are recorded on the transaction date.

b) Land, buildings and office equipment

Land, buildings and office equipment are recorded at cost. The corporation does not record depreciation on the buildings and office equipment.

c) Expenditure

All administrative expenses are borne by the Operating Fund. The portion of these expenses attributable to the Housing Fund for Retiring Ministers amounts to approximately \$22,000 (1983, \$20,000).

2. DUE FROM THE NATIONAL VICTORIA AND GREY TRUST COMPANY

These are funds held by The National Victoria and Grey Trust Company which are to be used for principal and interest payments of the debentures on a periodic basis.

MORTGAGES RECEIVABLE

Principal payments on the mortgages are received annually. The mortgages are due in 1985 and bear interest at rates varying from 6.0% to 11.0% with a weighted average interest rate of 10.0% on mortgages not in default.

4. RESERVE FUNDS

a) Capital Reserve Fund

Under the Deed of Trust and Mortgage dated December 1, 1970, the Corporation is required to maintain with The National Victoria and Grey Trust Company a capital reserve fund of 10% of the outstanding debentures payable. The reserve fund is composed of a guaranteed investment certificate due in 1985.

b) Specified Reserve Fund

Under the Corporation's Guidelines as set out April 1, 1977 the Corporation's directors have agreed to keep a specified reserve fund of 150% of the capital reserve fund. This fund should cover 5% of the outstanding debentures payable and 15% of the guaranteed bank loans referred to in note 9. This reserve fund is composed of guaranteed investment certificates due in 1985, 1986 and 1989.

Debentures, totalling \$11,000 and bearing interest at 6% per annum will mature in the year ending December 31, 1985.

This fund is restricted for use in Alberta only.

7. MAX BELL FOUNDATION FUND

As stipulated in the minutes of the Executive of September 20, 1979, all interest earned from the proceeds of this fund is to be added to the balance of the fund. During 1984, this interest amounted to \$5,028 (1983, \$2,916).

Interest under the mortgage will be 6% payable semi-annually provided there is no default of interest and the property is occupied by retired ministers, deacons, missionaries and employees of The Presbyterian Church in Canada and of Presbyteries of The Presbyterian Church in Canada and such other persons designated by the General Assembly to receive housing assistance. Interest will otherwise be 11%%.

10. CONTRIBUTED CAPITAL

During 1984, an amount of \$2,000 was contributed to the Corporation from St. James Presbyterian Church, London. This amount consisted of a contribution from the Congregation to assist in the housing needs of retired ministers, missionaries, deaconesses and their spouses.

PRESBYTERIAN RECORD

To the Venerable, the 111th General Assembly:

The Presbyterian Record Committee is pleased to report that 1984 was a good year for The Record for a variety of reasons. The most important of these was the continued leadership and wide appreciation of the efforts of the Editor.

It was also another year in which The Record made no financial demands on the General Assembly Budget. An error was discovered in the Church's accounting procedures in the records for 1982, resulting in an \$18,000 deduction from our reserve fund. The excess of income over expenditures in the past year was \$5,045. Nevertheless, at present there are no plans to raise either the subscription or advertising rates. A significant rise in postal rates might necessitate a review of this decision.

In 1984, The Record won four Canadian Church Press Awards, including a first place award for the best treatment of a subject or issue - the article on mental retardation, by Gerald Osterveen, entitled "Growing Pains".

In 1984 we introduced the Supplements to The Records, eight pages produced by Boards and Committees of the Church and included in The Record at cost or less.

In the near future the Committee plans to purchase computer equipment capable of handling the entire subscription list, which will in turn enable us to print our own mailing labels. This purchase will be financed out of the reserve fund. The Committee hopes to recover the initial outlay in two or three years, and will save money thereafter. This step will also improve the response time on address changes and free the circulation department from an antiquated and paper-laden system.

We were pleased to be able to upgrade the cover stock thereby permitting better colour reproduction, and as of May, 1985, we will be using a higher grade of paper for the interior. These changes have been made at no additional cost.

The major continuing concern of the Committee is to see that a high proportion of our members receive and read The Record. Slightly over 70 per cent of our congregations are on the Every Home Plan. While recognizing that this is a time of financial constraint, the Committee is concerned when congregations drop the Every Home Plan. We appreciate the efforts of congregations in keeping the decline in the number of congregations on the Every Home Plan as low as it has been. We urge congregations who are considering going off the Every Home Plan to notify The Record Office in the event that we can offer any help or guidance. Notification is particularly important so that members might be given an opportunity to subscribe individually without any interruption in receiving The Record.

Recommendation No. 1 (adopted, page 32)

That Presbyterians be urged to participate in the life and thought of the Church -at home or abroad - by subscribing to The Presbyterian Record, through the Every Home Plan, or by individual subscription.

Recommendation No. 2 (reworded and adopted, page 32)
That congregations be urged, where possible, to notify The Record Office prior to going off the Every Home Plan.

PRESBYTERIAN RESIDENCE, SASKATOON

To the Venerable, the 111th General Assembly:

In our report for 1984 we draw the attention of the Church to each aspect of the Residence life.

- The facilities were well used for a well situated home for students attending University of Saskatchewan. The facilities made it possible for the Synod to hold a Conference for Ministers on the prairies, at an attractive cost compared with other available locations. Once again the Residence provided a home location for the Synod Youth Conference; also we were able to make the Residence available for a small Taiwanese Cultural Conference.
- We experienced increased occupancy in the fall term with a slight reduction in the spring term because of Christmas graduates. The Dean has a great opportunity to come close to student life in a personal way in a day when student unrest is sponsored by the fear of unemployment, etc.

Parents should encourage the continuance of the small residence, since the new "high rise" approach presents a new major problem to the housing question of our students on campus.

- 3. While our financial picture for 1984 improved considerably over 1983 as we moved out of the deficit position, still the Board is faced with a number of costly improvements if the Residence is to remain open. Had these improvements/alterations required by the Saskatoon Fire Department been carried out, in the year 1984, our financial position would indicate a deficit.
- 4. The Board is continuing to wrestle with the question as to the best course of action to follow re the future of Presbyterian Residence. A recent survey of Presbyterian congregations indicated varied opinions. The balance seemed to swing in favour of updating and continuing in the present location while others suggested selling and using funds from the sale for extension and continuing education. A suggestion was made that we relocate and place an emphasis on lay training.

Since Presbyterian Residence has been productive in sending students into the Ministry, some have expressed a hope that one day we would be sharing in the cooperative program at University of Saskatchewan to Theological Studies in order that our students could spend one or two yeras in Saskatoon before proceeding for completion of courses of one of our Theological Colleges.

The Board has requested a grant from the General Assembly Budget of \$14,678 for 1986. The 1985 grant, after adjustments was \$7,547.

PRESBYTERIAN WORLD SERVICE AND DEVELOPMENT

To the Venerable, the 111th General Assembly:

The major issue for the Presbyterian World Service and Development Committee in 1984 was the response to the crisis of famine in Africa. While the Presbyterian World Service and Development 'Africa Famine Appeal' was launched in April 1984, and publicized through briefing sessions at the 1984 General Assembly and mailings to congregations, it gained momentum with the coverage of the crisis by the media. This brought unprecedented response from congregations and individuals seeking to be part of a world-wide church effort to alleviate the suffering and rehabilitate the famine-stricken areas. While Ethiopia was the country most in the news, more than twenty-five African countries have been identified as affected by famine.

Our network of partner churches and church agencies was responsible for identifying the most appropriate type of aid in each country, supervising its distribution, and reporting on the progress of relief efforts. For instance, in Ethiopia, the most urgent need was support for feeding centres which Presbyterian World Service and Development funded through the Ethiopian Orthodox Church, providing food and emergency shelter and medical care. In Zimbabwe, the pressing need was for a support of temporary camps established by Christian Care for refugees who had fled the famine in neighbouring Mozambique. The task was to provide tools, seeds and guidance in community organizing to enable these people to become self-sufficient until they are able to return home - no easy task for uprooted people from many different tribes.

As pressing as the immediate needs are, serious thought must also be given to rehabilitation and long-term improvements. The Sahel area of Africa was stricken with drought a decade ago. At that time, world churches mobilized resources to provide emergency assistance and to support long-range plans for ensuring that such devastation would not occur again. In the intervening ten years, water supplies have been improved, garden plots developed, community planning assisted and bins constructed for safe storage of cereal grains. These improvements have lessened the impact of the current drought. We must make similar efforts in the other areas now affected by drought -a long-term commitment Presbyterian World Service and Development makes on behalf of all Presbyterians in Canada.

All funds received in 1984 were forwarded immediately to meet emergency needs. Funds received in 1985 are being allocated to rehabilitation and long-term development programmes as well as relief efforts.

The Presbyterian World Service and Development Committee appreciates the generous support of many congregations and Presbyteries. In spite of the best efforts of the P.W.S. staff, the volume of contributions and inquiries was such that acknowledgements of these was a lengthy procedure. Presbyterian World Service and Development has made a policy that all designated funds received are forwarded promptly, and administration expenses are absorbed in the regular operating costs of Presbyterian World Service and Development.

Presbyterian World Service and Development is grateful for the outpouring of concern and offers of assistance - finances, skills, love - which flowed out of the Africa famine crisis. Many people became aware of PWS for the first time, and the committee will be making every effort to maintain the momentum and build on this newly-kindled interest.

DEVELOPMENT AND RELIEF PROGRAMMES

While the Africa famine crisis received widest attention, a number of other important development and relief initiatives were undertaken in the past year. Emergency responses are necessary, but they only meet the needs of the people in the short-term. In order to effect lasting improvements in living conditions, there must be long-term development projects.

In the past year, there was a substantial increase in financial support for development and relief efforts. There was an increase in per capita givings – from approximately \$1.14 per member in 1983 to \$3.44 per member in 1984. Presbyterian World Service and Development receives no funds from the General Assembly budget, but depends on contributions from congregations and individuals to carry on this work for The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

Presbyterian World Service and Development also received financial assistance for some development projects from the Government of Canada through the Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA), and from the Governments of Alberta and Saskatchewan. Projects approved for matching government grants may be funded on the following basis: Each dollar provided by Presbyterian World Service and Development for an approved project can receive one dollar from either the Government of Alberta or Saskatchewan. This combined amount can then be matched on a 3:1 basis by the Canadian International Development Agency. This can mean that one dollar from Presbyterian World Service and Development can become eight dollars by the time it is sent to the project.

ECUMENICAL RESPONSIBILITIES

On behalf of The Presbyterian Church in Canada, Presbyterian World Service and Development relates to a number of ecumenical groups and coalitions as a visible witness of our unity in Christ. Details of all such programmes are available from the Presbyterian World Service and Development office.

Development Coalitions

- ICFID, Inter-Church Fund for International Development, is a co-operative effort by the development agencies of the Anglican, Lutheran, Roman Catholic, Presbyterian, Mennonite and United Churches. With a total budget of over two million dollars made up of church grants and matching government grants, ICFID funds some fifty development projects and programmes each (Presbyterian World Service and Development's contribution in 1984 was \$23,750.)
- PLURA, is an ecumenical effort to support local initiatives by the poor in Canada. (The 1984 P.W.S. grant was \$11,000.)

Education Coalition

- 1. GATT-Fly is an ecumenical effort in research on economic justice, with particular emphasis on the sugar and textile industries. (Presbyterian World Service and Development provided \$7,790 in 1984).
- 2. Ten Days for World Development is an ecumenical effort to provide study/action materials on development issues for congregational use. The 1984 theme was "Participating in Development". It operates through various local committees across Canada which organize educational events. Their material is also used by congregational study groups. For the past three years, the Presbyterian World Service and Development grants to Ten Days have been reduced in order to make more funds available for our own denominational education programme. (Presbyterian World Service and Development provided \$4,000 in 1984.)
- 3. "Share", the Inter-Church Campaign Coalition, is an ecumenical effort to provide educational stewardship materials to promote response to development and relief needs. (Presbyterian World Service and Development provided \$2,816 in 1984.)

Issue Coalitions

- 1. Project Ploughshares is an ecumenical effort in research and education on peace and disarmament issues, development and disarmamenmnt connections. (Presbyterian World Service provided \$3,180 in 1984.)
- 2. Inter-Church Committee for Refugees is an ecumenical effort to monitor refugee crises in all parts of the world, to participate in advocacy in government policies, and to co-ordinate church responses to world-wide refugee needs. (Presbyterian World Service and Development provided \$2,900 for ICCR in 1983.) This is an area of increasing need for Canadian response, and to help plan this, the Committee wishes to determine what experiences in refugee resettlement congregations have already had.

BUILDING CONSTITUENCY AWARENESS

1984 was a year in which interest and awareness of the work of Presbyterian World Service and Development seemed to greatly increase throughout the church. As people become more aware of opportunities to respond to needs, they are eager to support them. Therefore, more education and promotion work is planned to make more in the church aware of these opportunities in the coming year.

Grants from the Public Participation Programme of the Canadian International Development Agency have continued to enable the Presbyterian World Service and Development development education project underway since 1982. This provides information materials such as Presbyterian World Service and Development's new newsletter, "PWS Developments", the Advent Candle liturgies and other study materials. As well, a fieldworker in western Canada assists congregations in study and awareness of development needs and make; recommendations to the Committee on initiatives which would be supportive of such congregational initiatives.

ADMINISTRATION

The Committee is grateful for the time and energy devoted to Presbyterian World Service and Development by volunteers, congregations, presbyteries and staff. The Presbyterian World Service and Development Committee, comprised of both clergy and laypeople, conscientiously tries to ensure that Presbyterians in Canada can provide an effective, efficient Christian response to people in areas of greatest need in our world.

Recommendation No. 1 (adopted, page 25)

That Assembly urge congregations to challenge their members with the relief and development needs of people across the world, and to provide opportunities for their response to this challenge through prayer, study and finances.

Recommendation No. 2 (adopted, page 25)

That Assembly express appreciation to the Governments of Alberta, Saskatchewan and Canada for their concern for world development and service, as expressed through their matching grant programmes.

Recommendation No. 3 (adopted, page 25)

That Assembly ask presbyteries to poll congregations to determine which ones have been involved in resettlement assistance to refugees, and report to the Presbyterian World Service and Development Committee by December 31, 1985.

To the Venerable, the 111th General Assembly:

OVERTURE NO. 7, 1985 (p. 454-455) Re: Use of Canadian Food Grains Bank

The Presbyterian World Service and Development Committee would reply in the following terms:

- P.W.S. has studied participation in the Food Grains Bank at its inception, and decided against full participation due to lack of sufficient resources to be a full participating partner.
- P.W.S. also regards the Food Grains Bank as an excellent vehicle for providing opportunities for contributors to give grain, not just cash. Lack of full membership does not discourage P.W.S. as a Committee from promoting and encouraging contributions to the Food Grains Bank.
- 3. P.W.S. also considers the Food Grains Bank an excellent vehicle for providing relief to areas where no local resources are available for purchase with our funds. P.W.S.'s usual procedure in emergency situations is to forward funds to obtain food stocks as close to the source of the disaster as possible. It is still the Committee's preference to use local resources wherever possible but, in cases where this is not possible, the Food Grains Bank does provide an excellent vehicle for supplying grain from our own plenty in Canada. P.W.S. has, during the past year, in co-operation with the United Church which is a Food Grains Bank member, participated in a shipment of grain to famine-stricken Africa.

P.W.S. continues to review the possibilities of full participation. P.W.S. will report further to the 112th General Assembly. In the interval, the Committee requests presbyteries and congregations, who would welcome an opportunity to participate in the Food Grains Bank, to so indicate to the Committee.

Recommendation No. 4 (reworded and adopted, page 26)
That the above be the answer to the request for a review of the Food Grains Bank by the 111th General Assembly.

ADDENDUM TO PRESBYTERIAN WORLD SERVICE REPORT

To the Venerable, the 111th General Assembly:

The Presbyterian World Service and Development Committee transmits the following report simpliciter.

CONSULTATION ON CHURCH AND SOCIETY

Two major items dominated the agenda of the Cosultation on Church and Society (CCS) since the last Assembly. The first is the matter of the future of the consultation and the nature of the pattern of our Church's organization in managing our responsibilities towards social justice ministries. The second matter which has consumed a considerable amount of effort, thought and consultation is our response to the Minister of Finance's invitation to advise him on matters affecting our national economic future and tax reform. Last but not to be forgotten is the role the CCS continues to play in relating to the Inter-Church Consultative Committee on Development and Relief (ICCCDR) which continues to grow in its importance as a mechanism in "inter-church land" to consult with our sister churches and develop priority agendas on policy, process and action.

The Future of CCS

In January 1984 a discussion paper was circulated to each of the constituent boards and committees of CCS, namely: Board of World Mission, Board of Congregational Life, Presbyterian World Service, Ecumenical Relations, Woman's Missionary Society (E.D.), and International Affairs Committee. The paper proposed the consolidation of all functions having responsibilities for various aspects of justice ministries to achieve an integrated approach to setting priorities (e.g. coalitions). The basis of the underlying principles includes: strengthening the link with congregations and local faith communities; economizing on the costs associated with meetings and administration, freeing up those funds for action and communication, and trying to make our level of contributions equal to our fair share when making the commitment to participate.

In the past decade the work of coalitions has increased in its significance to our Church and sometimes at our initiative. In this leaner era efficient management is particularly important to a small church. The CCS recognizes the merits of doing justice work in the ecumenical context, as has the Administrative Council in establishing criteria for budget preparation.

The discussion document was shared with each participant group in CCS and a special consultation event was held in January at the Centre for Christian Studies. The event was financed by a special grant from the Administrative Council. Prior to the January Consultation, the Presbyterian World Service and Development and Ecumenical Relations went on record of favouring not to change their existing character but agreed to cooperate as a participant observer. Inasmuch as the WMS was not affected by the proposal, Miss Barbara Woodruff agreed to chair the meeting.

The meeting reviewed the apparent options recognizing that Ecumenical Relations and Presbyterian World Service would continue to relate to whatever evolved. The options reviewed were:

- a committee of Assembly without full time staff
- 2) a committee of Assembly with full time staff
- 3) a Board of Assembly with staff
- 4) a Committee of an existing Board with staff

Most of the participants agreed that the last option would likely be the most likely to succeed and considering existing staff commitments it appeared to some that the Board giving the most staff time to justice ministries - being the Board of Congregational Life

- was the logical place for such a committee. Unanimity was not the order of the day however.

Genuine concern has been expressed regarding several implications of such a decision. First a board has a veto power over a committee in its ability to address issues and to propose positions for Assembly's judgement. Knowledge of the occasions where these types of conflicts have prevented work prepared for Assembly by Board of Congregational Life's Outreach and Corporate Witness Committee, leads some to question the desirability of this overall management framework.

A second concern is the degree to which a committee of a board like Board of Congregational Life, which meets annually and seldom has more than one board member participate in the work of a committee, either comprehends the significance, importance or sustains the commitment to the body of work generated by the committee. As a committee of Assembly, representation on the committee is national and the work as evidenced by International Affairs and Church Growth is of a high calibre. These two observations continue to be identified and well recognized by many participants in the consultative process.

At the Board of Congregational Life annual meeting, a resolution was passed which comes to this Assembly proposing to unite CCS, International Affairs and a portion of the former Outreach and Corporate Witness Committee into a committee on Church and Society, with the addendum that a new Evangelism Committee be established, with each having its own staff resource person.

In reaction to the intiative of the Board of Congregational Life, International Affairs informed CCS that they did not wish to be a part of such a reformed "consolidated" model. They had understood a conciliar model as the goal and were surprised at what they regarded as a failure to consult. At the April 3, 1985 meeting of the consultation, the participants observed that the resolution of the issue could only occur at this Assembly.

In recognition of the concerns expressed implicitly and explicitly by participants in the CCS, a consultative approach remains an important goal of the final solution. As the Board of World Mission has not willingly given up its funding responsibilities for coalitions in each of its two committees, Canada Operations and Overseas, the consolidation of budgets - which was to have included Ecumenical Relations and Presbyterian World Service and Development into the original proposition - the objective of integration of responsibilities is not a product of the Board of Congregational Life resolution. However, an improvement is the result of the Board of Congregational Life resolution in so far as a permanent staff support for the consultation and justice ministries would be realized. And however marginal a gain this is, it ought to be recognized as such. Currently the support of the CCS moves around each year to a different agency on the basis of a sharing of responsibilities given a very limited budget and staff commitments to other things.

The Brief to Michael Wilson - Minister of Finance

With the consent of the CCS member agencies a task group was formed by CCS to address a brief to the Minister of Finance. The objectives were to:

- inform him of our theological view with regard to church and nation and the concurrent responsibilities of the government and the church;
- to convey concern for the priorities of the employee fair taxation, meaningful employment, the poor, and the budget deficit.

Copies of the brief will be available in the CCS study group room.

ICCDR - Coalitions and "Inter-Church-Land"

The Inter-Church Consultative Committee on Development and Relief held its annual meeting in December and our Church was well represented. In reviewing the work of the 12 coalitions which come under the purview of this process a wages policy was agreed to by the participating churches which establishes a fair matrix of levels, compensations and capacities for movement in a personnel framework that has had as its goal equity. The movement of the scale would reflect the average of the participating churches which would result in continued variances but as each church pays its staff at different scales this was never going to result in a uniform pattern. Next year a benefits policy is to be thrashed out as this continues to be a matter of considerable variation.

While the Canadian Council of Churches participate with the ICCDR group, there is no formal link between the two structures. Canadian Council of Churches staff assist as do coalition and national Church office staff, in the programming of the 2½ day event.

CCS wishes to express its gratitude to the volunteers who represent our Church on the 12 coalitions we continue to support. The hope continues to exist that more volunteers can be found to assist in this work and nominations will be welcomed especially when individuals have special expertise to contribute. Although living close to Toronto is important – corresponding members are welcmed.

This year, in response to the desire to integrate expertise and focus some actions, two working groups have been formed to give attention to the domestic issues of priority and the international issues of priority. These two groups are working at matters relating to (a) the national economy, tax reform and reflecting on Christian strategies towards integrating theological and economic concerns, (b) the International gruop is focussing their efforts on the development of themes for existing coalitions to bring emphasis and focus in their priorities.

The struggle for justice and peace continues.

REMITS UNDER THE BARRIER ACT

To the Venerable, the 111th General Assembly:

REMIT A, A & P 1984, p. 62 - Book of Forms Section 110.2 (adopted, page 43)

That section 110.2 be reworded as follows:

110.2 The session is responsible for the examination of candidates for membership. It should enquire as to their acceptance of God as Father, of Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord, and of the Holy Spirit as Sanctifier. It should also enquire as to the desire of candidates to walk in God's ways and their willingness to seek the peace and welfare of the Church. The session may not require assent to any doctrine or special qualifications beyond this profession of faith so described and further expressed in the Apostles' Creed.

As the executive of the presbytery, the minister is responsible for the conduct and content of public worship and for the supply of the pulpit.

- 111.1 The session is responsible for regulating the hours and forms of public worship and for arranging special services. The session determines the appointed times and provides for the administration of the sacraments.
- 111.2 The session is responsible for the appointment of the organist and other leaders of the service of praise, whether voluntary or salaried. It should satisfy itself of their Christian character and behaviour, inasmuch as they are subject to its discipline.

ST. ANDREW'S HALL, VANCOUVER

To the Venerable, the 111th General Assembly,

In reporting to Assembly, The Board of St. Andrew's Hall acknowledges the historical importance of this year to our Board and to The Presbyterian Church in Canada. As a result of the direction of the 110th General Assembly the Board in conjunction with the Board of Ministry has negotiated and signed an agreement of association with the Vancouver School of Theology, thus bringing our church into what we believe to be an exciting adventure in the induction and training of ministries to serve our Church.

We would acknowledge, with appreciation, the co-operation of both V.S.T. and the Board of Ministry in arriving at this new relationship and look forward to an evergrowing involvement in the work of the Church of Jesus Christ, not just in the west but across our church as graduates serve the National Church.

This year, again under the direction of the 110th General Assembly, the Board takes pride in announcing the Joint Appointment of the Rev. Dr. Brian J. Fraser as Dean of St. Andrew's Hall and assistant professor of Church History at V.S.T. We acknowledge with thanks the response of the Church to our call for nominations and are proceeding to respond to the outstanding call of the Church in making this appointment (for further details refer to Principals Report).

The ministry of the Hall continues to provide a warm Christian atmosphere for residential life and we as a Board continue to be conscious of our stewardship responsibilities in maintaining our facilities, and our work of assisting students through bursary aid.

The Board is acutely aware of our changed and changing task as we seek to serve the Church in Canada. Now that we have this new relationship with V.S.T., at a very inexpensive price tag, we have a third College for the training of ministers for our Church.

With this new and broader mandate the Board is conscious of the need for the national Church to recognize financially as well as prayerfully the added dimension to our work. While we recognize the restraint nature of the Church's budgeting, may we be so bold to remind the Church of our national responsibility in providing training at V.S.T. is, at present, only the cost of one professorial appointment i.e. \$34,000. This single grant is presently only \$27,500 because of restraint. We as a Board have picked up from student fees the necessary short fall. It is impossible to continue to run a residence at a profit, at best it is a break even proposition. While as a Board we have other capital resources these are designated by donors for other purposes than operating costs.

Therefore in the next year we would like to have more comprehensive discussions with the Administrative Council re our future financing of this new relationship that our Church has entered into.

We look forward to the years ahead with great anticipation for this new venture to unfold.

SPECIAL COMMISSION RE EXECUTIVE STAFF POSITIONS

To the Venerable, the 111th General Assembly:

As instructed by the 110th General Assembly, this Commission met to consider the requests from the Church Growth Committee, the Communication Services Committee and the Board of World Missions for reclassification of executive staff positions. Three meetings were held during which all relevant material was examined and chairmen of the committees and board were interviewed. After careful deliberation, the Commission reached the following conclusions:

- 1. Re: Co-ordinator of Church Growth Committee
 In view of the specialized nature of the qualifications needed for this short-termed
 position, the Commission decided that an increase of \$2,500 would be granted or its
 equivalent in other benefits, and that it would be retroactive to the beginning of
 Dr. Sauer's second three-year term. The self-initiated and externally directed
 evaluation of the work in which he was engaged was a contributing factor in the
 decision of the Commission. This position was considered to be unique among
 church office staff at this level because it was time-limited.
- 2. Re: Director of Communication Services At present the main but not exclusive functions of the Communication Services Committee are production and service. The committee anticipates an expanded role as the Church takes advantage of developments in communication technology. We found an absence of objective evaluation of this anticipated role on the part of the Church and lack of substantial commitment to it. If this request for reclassification is to be renewed, it should be preceded by objective evaluation. At this point and under these circumstance we do not consider reclassification to be advisable.
- 3. Re: Board of World Mission Executive Secretaries It became plain during the Special Commission's enquiries that the request of the Board of World Mission for reclassification and salary adjustments for its staff would not have been made had not the Church Growth and Communication Services requests been made. Since we have regarded the circumstances of the Church Growth co-ordinator as special and do not regard our decision as creating a precedent applicable to permanent senior staff positions, and since we have not found the Communication Services Committee staff reclassification warranted at this time, we do not believe that reclassification of the Board of World Missions staff need be undertaken by this Commission.
- 4. We found objective evaluation helpful with respect to our decision on the Church Growth co-ordinator and were hampered by the lack of it with respect to the Communication Services Committee. We believe there is much talent in the Church, available on a voluntary basis, for other agencies to undertake this process as well. Much of this talent has gone unrecognized and unused in the Church. It goes well beyond people at home and retired people but certainly includes many in these categories who are highly qualified to help our church agencies not only evaluate present programmes but analyze anticipated opportunities and challenges.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY (EASTERN DIVISION)

To the Venerable, the 111th General Assembly:

The Woman's Missionary Society (Eastern Division) respectfully submits the following report for the year 1984.

A highlight of the year was a three day conference, "Discovery Days" in the month of May when we were pleased to have the Rev. Murray Garvin and Mrs. Garvin as our special resource persons.

In September the 108th Annual Meeting of the Society was held in First Presbyterian Church, Pictou with the Rev. Glen Davis as the guest speaker. We were also pleased to have with us Mrs. Claire Ellis, the President of the Women's Missionary Society (Western Division).

Reports received from our eight Presbyterials show a membership of 2,257 active members and 1,047 home helpers in 163 Auxiliaries. Only two Presbyterials showed an increase in membership. Children's mid-week groups report 604 boys and girls in 48 groups. In teen groups there are 220 girls registered in 19 groups. Groups reporting are Canadian Girls in Training, Girl's Brigade and Pioneer Girls. The number of children and girls attending mid-week groups remains about the same as in the last several years.

The Presbyterian Message is the Society's chief resource for personal and group mission education. This magazine continues to keep our members informed with news of overseas and Canada missions, missionary appointments and activity. Program resources and educational events are publicized and encouraged. Worship resources are offered for personal and group use. Increased costs of publishing and postage has made a \$1,000 subsidy necessary this year. Our capable Editor, Mrs. John (Joan) Posno now uses a word processor in preparing the Magazine so that printing is more economical.

During the year, our Historical Archives were placed in First Church, Pictou, N.S.. This enables some archives to be on display and all are easily accessible. The Rev. Lloyd Murdock has been of great assistance in this move.

Mission Education and Prayer is the heart of the Society. Studies during the past year centered on the Central Africa theme. Presbyterial rallies and camp conferences included introductions and workshops for the 1985 theme, Korea.

Assistance to Guyana Presbyterians through Presbyterian World Service and through the mailing of many parcels continued through the year. We are assured that parcels are received "with joy and thanksgiving". From the Anna MacDonald Memorial Fund, \$1,400 is sent annually for Children's Work in Guyana. To help encourage our fellow Christians in Guyana, our Annual Meeting budgeted to send two delegates to their 1985 Centennial Celebrations.

Miss Charlotte Brown continues her excellent work within the Society and assists in Christian Education work in congregations and presbyteries upon invitation. One highlight of her work which we are happy to support is her annual visit to Wabush, Labrador, Newfoundland.

New projects this year included the granting of a \$1,000 University Bursary to a Viet Nam-Canadian who graduated from High School with a 92% average and an overall excellent record throughout his four years in our Canadian schools. (This included learning English as a second language). A bursary for student ministers was included in the 1985 budget.

All reports show that the members of the Woman's Missionary Society continue to take an active part in many areas of church and community life. It is our hope and prayer that we may be enabled to do more in interesting the total church membership in mission and missions. We give to God praise and thanksgiving that He enables us to use our means and talents however modest they may be. We solicit your encouragement and prayers.

Finances

The reporting and financial year of the Society is August 1 to July 31. Receipts for the year totaled \$101,758.04, an increase over the previous year. Our largest disbursement is to The Presbyterian Church in Canada for use of the Board of World Mission. This grant is submitted twice a year.

Auxiliaries and Presbyterials submit givings twice a year therefore the balance shown in our statements is used for the first half of the succeeding year.

WOMEN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY (WESTERN DIVISION)

To the Venerable, the 111th General Assembly:

The Council Executive of the Women's Missionary Society (WD) respectfully submits the following report of the Society's work for the year 1984:

HIGHLIGHTS

One of the highlights of the year was Jubilation '84, a conference planned by a design group from the Hamilton and London area for Presbyterian Women in the Eastern Synodicals held at Western University in London, Ontario. Over 400 women from Ontario and Quebec attended the conference, where they were challenged by Dr. Sara Little who traced the path of women of faith through the ages.

COUNCIL AND COUNCIL EXECUTIVE

The Annual Council Meeting was held in May at Seneca College, the theme of the meetings being "United in Prayer". At the Council the workbook "United in Prayer" by Karen Timbers was launched. This resource was prepared as a part of the Society's strategy "to initiate and carry out a program to strengthen the prayer support for the mission of the Church".

Council Executive met three times during the year. Members of Council Executive serve on the Board of Congregational Life (2), the Board of World Mission (8), and Ewart College (1) as well as the Administrative Council, and Committees on International Affairs, Ecumenical Relations and Church Growth.

The Executive received and acted upon reports related to Finance. The Personnel Working Group reviewed and recommended salaries for staff. Christian Literature grants were approved by the Executive for Canada and Overseas and presentations were made by overseas workers and visitors.

MISSION STUDY RESOURCES

The Mission Study materials on the Korea theme for Adult, Youth and Children's groups were made available through the WMS Book Room. The Book Room also sold materials to individuals and groups across the Society on the Peace theme, devotional and Bible Study resources.

The Summer issue of Glad Tidings provided supplemental material related to the study themes of Korea and Peace. Other issues of Glad Tidings provided readers with information on mission activities of The Presbyterian Church in Canada and other churches around the world.

Task Forces were established to work on material related to the "Native Peoples of North America" theme.

The Society supports the recommendation of the Board of Congregational Life on the Mission Study themes for 1987-88.

WORLD MISSION, BOARD OF

To the Venerable, the 111th General Assembly:

In 1984 the Board of World Mission continued to serve The Presbyterian Church in Canada by keeping faith with the mandate given to the Board by the General Assembly.

Graduates from our Colleges were appointed to serve the Church in congregations across the country. Missionaries came home on furlough and by doing deputation work contributed to the education of believers in the matter of our Church's mission activities and obligations.

Other missionaries returned to their duties in India, Nigeria, Lesotho, Japan and Taiwan. A doctor was sent to Pakistan and our Secretary for Overseas Relations paid a brief but useful visit to three countries in Central America.

Normal and healthy lives will experience ups and downs, successes and failures, advancing and retreating. Such normal experiences manifest a condition which has been defined as 'the law of human undulation'. Rivers which, at one time, may be roaring torrents can, at other times, become quiet and tranquil streams. After a good rain even the desert will blossom. So it is with the Church. A time of apparent growth and advance is followed by a time of apparent stagnation and retreat. Yet, if there is life, there is growth and consolidation. In winter a tree may appear to be dead but with the coming of spring the truth is revealed. The prophet Isaiah affirmed: "But they that wait upon the Lord shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings as eagles; they shall run, and not be weary; and they shall walk and not faint." (Isa. 40:31)

Not all is excitement and dashing enterprise. There are times when movement is slow but the need to endure remains. When the evidence is indefinite then the quality of faith is revealed.

The temptation which perennially faces the Church is conformity to the world, imitating its methods, accepting its value systems, following its models. But the Church - like the Christian - is called to a transformation of being so that it may more perfectly obey and understand the purposes of God. We have wise words spoken by Lesslie Newbiggin: "... If we now see that we have been too much conformed to the world of the 19th century it is no adequate response to try now to be conformed to the world of the 20th century. We are not intended to be conformed to the world but to be transformed by the renewing of our minds. God uses the changes and chances of history to shake his people, from time to time, out of their conformity with the world, but when that happens our job, surely, is not just to push over the tiller and sail before the winds of chance, but to look afresh to our chart and compass, and to ask how we now use the new winds and the new tides to carry out our sailing orders. Every new situation is a summons to bring all our traditions afresh under the Word of God."

MINUTES OF APPRECIATION

Dr. Clare and Mrs. Grace McGill

For over 30 years the name McGill has been almost synonymous with the overseas mission programme of The Presbyterian Church in Canada. Clare and Grace McGill were approinted to Taiwan in 1953.

Clare grew up in Glencoe, Ontario and graduated from the University of Western Ontario and Westminster Theological Seminary. He also did extensive study in linguistics at the University of North Dakota and at the Kennedy School of Missions in Connecticut.

All of this prepared Clare well for the translation work he did in Taiwan. He gave himself completely to the task of enabling the Tayal people of Taiwan to read,

understand and communicate the Gospel. Working closely with these aboriginal people, he analysed and reduced their language to a written form. With great patience and dedication he helped publish a language primer, a hymnbook, Laubach's Story of Jesus and eventually the New Testament in the Tayal language. He also arranged Scripture verses to fit many of the popular native tunes, which resulted in three LP records. He further translated some 59 selected Psalms which were put to music.

Grace McGill made her own unique contribution to the work of the Gospel in Taiwan by opening her home to a continual flow of visitors, participating in the Bible studies and worship of the local community, and undergirding the mission enterprise with faithful prayer. She was born in Strongfield, Saskatchewan and received the B.Sc. degree in nursing from Wheaton College. She also did Bible School studies in Pambrun, Saskatchewan and took special training in linguistics.

One son, Tim, returned to mission service in Taiwan after studies in the U.S.A. Terry, the second son, is in university.

Just before the McGills left Taiwan in 1984 the Tainan Theological College and Seminary paid a fitting tribute to them by conferring on Clare the degree of Doctor of Divinity, Honoris Causa. He is the first Canadian Presbyterian missionary to be so honoured from within his country of service. In order to express the appreciation of a grateful Church for service well done we can do no better than to repeat here the citation presented to Dr. McGill at that time:

"With gratitude to God, the Tainan Theological College and Seminary recognizes the 31 years of faithful service you have given to Taiwan as missionary, pastor and Bible translator. You and Mrs. McGill have consistently sought the welfare of the Tayal people by your Christian love, hospitality, pastoral concern and countless travels. Most notably you have translated the whole of the New Testament into the Tayal language. You have proved yourself to be a faithful messenger of the Gospel of Christ."

The Rev. K. Calvin Doka, B.A., D.D.

The Rev. Dr. Doka is a product of our Church's mission outreach to Hungarian Canadians. He was born in Kipling, Saskatchewan, where he received his elementary education. He attended high school in Regina, then the Regina Normal School. Following graduation, he taught school for seven years in the rural areas of southern Saskatchewan where he met his future wife, Molly, who also was a teacher. Cal proceeded to McMaster University, graduating with a Bachelor of Arts degree in 1947. He then enrolled at Knox College, receiving the Diploma of the College in the spring of 1950. He was licenced by East Toronto Presbytery on April 28th of that year and was ordained by the Presbytery of Assiniboia on July 20th, 1950.

While a student at Knox, Cal started the Hungarian work in Brantford, Ontario. His first ordained appointment was to Abbotsford, B.C., where he started the Presbyterian work both in English and in Hungarian. The civil uprising in Hungary resulted in many thousands of Hungarian refugees emigrating to Canada in 1956 and 1957. During that time Cal served as Co-Chairman of the Hungarian Refugee Rehabilitation Committee of the Greater B.C. Mainland. He also was instrumental in starting a Hungarian ministry in Vancouver.

In April 1962, Cal terminated his ministry in Abbotsford to accept a Call to Knox Presbyterian Church, Calgary, at a critical stage in its history following a programme of relocation. He resigned from Knox in February 1967 to accept an appointment by the General Board of Missions as Superintendent of Missions for the Synod of Alberta.

While ministering in pastorates in Abbotsford and Calgary, Cal Doka served as Moderator of Westminster and Calgary Presbyteries, and the Synod of Alberta. He also served as Missions Convener for the Presbytery of Westminster, the Synod of B.C., and the Synod of Alberta.

Cal was Superintendent of Missions for the Synod of Alberta from April 1967 until the spring of 1975. During a vacancy in Saskatchewan, he also covered the Superintendent's work in the northern half of that Synod. On January 1st, 1975, he was transferred to the Synod of British Columbia as Superintendent, where he has served for the past ten years.

Cal and his wife, Molly, who is an elder in St. John's Presbyterian Church, White Rock, have three daughters, two sons and eight grandchildren.

Throughout his ministry, Cal has maintained keen interest in our Hungarian work and has been called upon many times to assist in this area of our Church's ministry. In May 1983, Knox College, honoured him for his contribution to this work, as well as for the other areas of his ministry, by conferring on him the degree of Doctor of Divinity (honoris causa). This degree was conferred in absentia inasmuch as Cal was on study leave in Hungary at the time of Convocation.

As Cal completes almost thirty-five years of ordained ministry, the last eighteen as a Superintendent of Missions, and moves into retirement at the end of March 1985, we extend to him our appreciation for his contribution to the life and work of our Church, and our best wishes for a long and happy retirement.

The Rev. Malcolm A. Mark, B.A.

With his retirement at the end of May 1985, the Rev. Malcolm A. Mark will have completed forty years of ordained ministry within The Presbyterian Church in Canada, the past twenty-five of which were spent as a Superintendent of Missions under the Board of World Mission.

Mac Mark was born in Brighton, Ontario, and received his elementary and secondary education in Port Hope. He attended McGill University and the University of British Columbia, graduating from the latter with a Bachelor of Arts degree in 1942. He then enrolled in Knox College, where he was active in student activities and sports. During his student days, Mac served in appointments in Nova Scotia, Quebec, Ontario, Saskatchewan, and British Columbia.

Upon graduation from Knox College in 1945, he was ordained in Toronto and appointed to Rocky Mountain House, Alberta, serving a wide frontier area as the first ordained Presbyterian minister in that district. During this period he was closely associated with the Women's Missionary Society (W.D.), which at that time operated a hospital in Rocky Mountain House.

In 1948 Mac was invited to serve as an assistant to Dr. James Alan Munro, Superintendent of Western Missions. Based in Nelson, B.C., this position required him to travel extensively throughout the three most westerly Synods, as he assisted mission fields, was involved in church extension, and gave special support to a number of vacant charges where he served as interim supply. Mac played an important role in the promotion of three campaigns in Western Canada: for the establishment of St. Andrew's Hall, Vancouver, Wasa Lake Camp in Kootenay Presbytery and the Presbyterian Leadership Training School in Medicine Hat.

In the latter part of 1950, Mac accepted a Call to St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church in Lethbridge. During the next nine years he led the congregation through a relocation and building campaign resulting in a fine new church and manse. As minister of St. Andrew's, Mac carried on a radio ministry and was active in both ministerial and community organizations. During this period he served for six years as a member of the General Board of Missions. He also served as Moderator and Missions Convener of the Synod of Alberta, and Missions Convener of Macleod Presbytery. He was instrumental in the establishment of Bethlen Hungarian Church in Lethbridge.

In 1959 he accepted the invitation of the General Board of Missions and the Synod of Toronto and Kingston to become Superintendent of Missions in Northern Ontario. In

1960-61 he was assigned by the Board of Missions to assist in Ontario and Quebec in the building campaign of the Missionary and Deaconess Training School, which led to the establishment of Ewart College.

Mac Mark served appointments by the General Assembly during his ministry on the Board of Education, the Committee on Church Architecture, the Committee for Recruitment and the Committee for Radio Broadcasting.

Several years ago the areas of responsibility for the Superintendents in the Synods of Toronto & Kingston, and Hamilton & London were changed and Mac was assigned the north/central presbyteries of these two Synods.

Mac and his wife, Helen have a daughter and son, and two grandchildren.

The Board of World Mission is grateful for the many years of dedicated service given by Mac Mark as an appointee of the Board, for the many gifts he has displayed in carrying out that service, and for his continuing interest in and concern for the frontier church. We wish for him a happy and healthful retirement.

The Rev. Malcolm S. McLean, C.D., B.A.

March 1st, 1985, marked the completion of eighteen years as Superintendent of Missions for the Synod of Manitoba and Northwestern Ontario for the Rev. Malcolm S. McLean. At the end of March, Mac will retire following almost thirty-five years of ordained ministry within The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

Mac was born in Brampton, Ontario, where he received his elementary and secondary education. He attended the University of Toronto for a year, followed by a year at the University of Alberta. While at University in Edmonton, Mac served at Benalto in Red Deer Presbytery and started Presbyterian work in several rural areas in that Presbytery, including Eckville. He later supplied First Church, Kenora, for six months, then was appointed to the Gonor charge in Winnipeg Presbytery.

Mac McLean worked for Radio Station C.K.C.H. in Kenora for eighteen months prior to enlisting in the R.C.A.F. and serving in Radar for three and a half years on the West Coast. Following World War II, Mac returned to the University of Alberta, graduating with a Bachelor of Arts degree in 1947. Upon graduation from Knox College in 1950, Mac was the recipient of the Heron Scholarship. He was licensed by East Toronto Presbytery on April 28th, and ordained by the Presbytery of West Toronto in his home congregation, St. Andrew's, Brampton, on May 12th, 1950.

Mac's first ordained appointment was to Yorkton, Barvas (Dunleath) and Stornoway, with responsibility to start a Presbyterian cause in Yorkton. Six years later he was Called to Knox Presbyterian Church, Moose Jaw, where he was inducted on December 11th, 1956. His next move was to accept an appointment to Elmwood Presbyterian Church, Winnipeg, on March 1st, 1964.

During his years in the pastorate, Mac served as Moderator of the Synod of Saskatchewan, the Presbytery of Assiniboia, as well as the Synod of Manitoba and Northwestern Ontario, and Winnipeg Presbytery. He also served as Missions Convener for the Synod of Saskatchewan.

Mac resigned from his ministry in Elmwood to accept an appointment as Superintendent of Missions for the Synod of Manitoba and Northwestern Ontario, effective March 1st, 1967. This Synod encompasses a large section of our Native Work. During his eighteen years as Superintendent Mac has shown a keen interest in and support of our Native ministry.

Mac and his wife Pearl, who has been a strong support to him throughout his ministry and who is a gifted pianist, have three sons and one grandchild.

The Board of World Mission expresses its gratitude to Mac McLean for his many years of dedicated service and for his leadership in our ministry to Native people. We wish for him a happy and rewarding retirement.

Recommendation No. 1 (adopted, page 32) That the above minutes of appreciation be adopted.

GUIDELINES FOR PRESBYTERIES

Reference from Board of World Mission:

"In order to assist Presbyteries in their stewardship of financial resources in work funded by the Board of World Mission, that Canada Operations prepare guidelines for Presbyteries to enable them to assess the viability of aid-receiving ministries, and report to the 1985 meeting of the Board."

Suggested Guidelines:

- 1. All requests for deficit grants must be approved by Presbytery.
- In applying for a deficit grant the Presbytery must certify that the request is based on a careful examination of the audited financial statement and balance sheet of the congregation, and that it is satisfied that the grant is justified. (A&P 1984 - p. 480)
- 3. Presbytery is requested to obtain from each congregation a statement of its plans, and to examine and evaluate the potential of said plans in justifying the request for a deficit grant. Such plans should include the contribution of the full amount requested through the Presbytery for the support of the General Assembly Budget. (A&P 1984 p. 480)
- 4. Congregations making application for a deficit grant must conduct a yearly every person visitation programme to formulate plans for the congregation and lay them before the members. Presbyteries are requested to assist congregations in such programmes, offering leadership and necessary information. (A & P 1984, p. 480)
- 5. The financial responsibility of the Board ceases when the grant approved for a field has been paid. Should an additional grant be requested by Presbytery, this can be considered only when full information has been presented through the Presbytery and Synod following a Presbytery Visitation of the field. (A & P 1984, p. 480)
- 6. The Board of World Mission has adopted a ten-year plan for reduction of deficit grants as follows, to be implemented in consultation with the Presbytery involved in each case:
 - (BWM 1977 Mar. p. 17 & App. C)
 - a) Congregations which have been aid-receiving five years and over are normally requested to move to self-support in five years in equal annual amounts. (BWM 1977 - Mar. p. 17)
 - b) Congregations which have been aid-receiving for less than five years are requested to reach self-support in equal annual amounts calculated on the basis of ten minus the number of years already in operation. (BWM 1977 -Mar. p. 17)
 - c) An individual schedule of development will be established in each aid-receiving congregation by the Board of World Mission in consultation with the Presbytery and Synod. (BWM 1977 - Mar. p. 17)
- Congregations applying for a deficit grant must demonstrate to the Presbytery a
 potential for growth based on a mission outreach programme within the
 community.
- 8. Where a congregation has demonstrated a serious attempt to grow, without satisfactory results, the Presbytery will assess the possibility for improvement, or the need for a continuing Presbyterian witness in the community.

Recommendation No. 2 (reworded and adopted, page 32) That these B.W.M. guidelines be approved.

B.W.M. GUIDELINE RE LAY MISSIONARIES

The Board of World Mission may appoint persons to full or part-time work as Lay Missionaries or Lay Missionaries With Specialized Training. Lay Missionaries without specialized training while not having formal qualifications such as degrees or diplomas, have other gifts, experience and dedication. The qualifications of Lay Missionaries With Specialized Training will be determined in relation to the requirements of the position being filled.

Requests for such appointments shall be accompanied by suitable job descriptions. The Board will require an interview before an appointment is considered.

The appointee shall be under the supervision and pastoral care of the Presbytery within which he/she works. The Presbytery is urged to provide an Advisory Committee where this is appropriate. This Committee should include, where feasible, the Superintendent of Missions, who shall also have some responsibility for pastoral care and fostering positive, supportive relations between the appointee and the Presbytery in which he/she serves.

Remuneration for Lay Missionaries and Lay Missionaries With Specialized Training shall be as determined by the General Assembly from time to time.

Recommendation No. 3 (adopted, page 32) That this B.W.M. Guideline be approved.

B.W.M. GUIDELINE RE LONG AND SHORT-TERM DISABILITY/ILLNESS

Casual Sick Leave (BWM regulations, section 12.01)

The Board of World Mission has no guideline for casual sick leave for its appointees. As professional church workers do not work a "9 to 5" day, a day taken off because of illness could be time to which they are entitled.

Long-Term Disability: Ordained Ministers Serving Congregations (BWM regulations,

section 12.02)

The 107th General Assembly ruled as follows: That where Presbyteries or provincial governments do not make adequate provisions for ministers during the initial period of an illness or disability, the congregation be required to include in the guarantee of stipend the following terms as minimum support:

- (a) the congregation to be responsible for paying the minister and paying for pulpit supply during the first three months of disability;
- (b) after three months disability the congregation would provide a free manse or housing allowance for a further three months and the minister would receive unemployment benefits as applicable. (A & P 1981, Rec. 5, pp. 384, 78)

The 108th General Assembly approved the following provisions for sick leave:

- (a) During the first three months of disability the congregation be responsible for continuing regular payments to their minister as well as paying for pulpit supply.
- (b) Starting with the 4th month and continuing to the end of the 7th month after the minister has been disabled, the congregation would continue to provide a free manse or housing allowance and the minister would receive government of Canada unemployment benefits as applicable.
- (c) After seven months of disability, unless improvement of health is imminent, the minister should consider resigning from the charge and if disability is permanent early retirement is advisable. One or more of the following may apply in cases of long-term disability or early retirement:
 - For ministers who are members of The Presbyterian Church in Canada group insurance plan, there are long-term disability benefits which may be applicable.
 - (2) The Canada or Quebec Plans have disability pension provisions.
 - (3) By early retirement, additional income could be secured from The Presbyterian Church in Canada pension plan. (A & P 1982, Rec. 10, pp. 391, 98)

Long-Term Disability: Non-Ordained Persons Serving Congregations

The Board understands the benefits outlined in Sections 12.01 and 12.02 as applicable also to non-ordained persons serving congregations.

Long-Term Disability: Professional Church Workers Who Receive Their Stipend From The B.W.M.

The Board understands the Benefits outlined in Sections 12.01 and 12.02 as applicable also to professional church workers who receive their stipend directly from the B.W.M., and assumes the responsibility for such benefits.

Short-Term Illness/Disability

Short-term illness covers a period from eight days to three months. Short-term illness is covered by Section 12.02 (a) above.

General Guidelines

The following General Guidelines are applicable to both long-term and short-term illness and disability.

- A medical certificate is required on the eighth consecutive day of absence due to illness or disability, and periodically, as requested, thereafter.
- During periods of long-term or short-term illness/disability the B.W.M. will
 normally continue to pay grants at the same rate and the Presbytery/congregation
 will be responsible for covering the work. In special circumstances the B.W.M. may
 assist with the cost of supply or temporary coverage of the work assignment, upon
 the request of the Presbytery.
- The B.W.M. recognizes that long-term disability may place marginally selfsupporting congregations in a difficult position and is, therefore, prepared to negotiate with Presbytery in such cases.

Recommendation No. 4 (adopted, page 32) That these B.W.M. guidelines be approved.

B.W.M. GUIDELINE RE MOVING EXPENSES

That upon the completion of the term of service under the Board of World Mission of an ordinand, the Board will be responsible for the travelling and moving expenses to any ministry within The Presbyterian Church in Canada which extends a Call, providing that the distance involved is not greater than that entailed in moving the ordinand from the College of graduation to the field of appointment, in which instance the additional expenses shall be that of the calling ministry.

Note: Notwithstanding the foregoing, presbyteries are expected to act judiciously so that the calling ministry will assume a reasonable portion of the expenses incurred.

Recommendation No. 5 (adopted, page 32)

That these B.W.M. guidelines be approved.

BWM-CANADA OPERATIONS GUIDELINES RE EXPECTATIONS OF PRESBYTERIES

With Respect To Appointments

It is the responsibility of the Presbytery to make application to the BWM for the appointment of students, ordained missionaries, lay missionaries, and other church workers.

It is also the responsibility of the Presbytery to request re-appointments where applicable.

While such requests may be sent to the Board at any time during the year, it is important that any new requests for appointment (or requests for re-appointment) be sent to the Board by February 15th.

The Board will supply each Presbytery with sufficient forms to be used in applying for appointments.

With Respect To Grants

It is the responsibility of Presbytery to ensure the following:

- a) that an Every Person Visitation has been conducted in terms of the policy approved by the General Assembly 1984. See Canada Section: (Principles, Policy and Practice 5.03f) and A & P 1984, p. 480.
- b) that each aid-receiving work receives the appropriate grant application forms by January. (These forms are available from the Supt. of Missions).
- that grant applications are examined carefully with respect to accuracy, and to the correct amount of stipend, allowances, etc.
- d) that grant applications are accompanied with the audited financial statements.
- that examination of the work shows that all grant reductions applicable have been implemented, or reasons why larger or smaller grant reductions should be considered.
- f) it is the responsibility of the Presbytery to see that approved applications are forwarded to the Synod for its approval.
- g) that congregations are notified in November of the grant approved by the BWM for the ensuing year.

With Respect To New Work

When Presbytery is considering new work which may require either funding through the BWM, or an appointment under the BWM, the Presbytery should forward such information to the Board at an early stage in its planning so that consideration can be given by the Board to its viability, the availability of adequate funds and suitable personnel.

With Respect to Communication

The Board will make available to Presbyteries a full set of all forms required for the request of appointments or grants, and a copy of the Board Policy manual as revised from time to time.

It is requested that Presbyteries notify the Board of all changes in grant requirements, or the movement of personnel as early as possible, and preferably at least six weeks before a change is to take place.

With Respect To Other B.W.M. Committees

As a Canada Operations Policy statement, the foregoing is limited to those areas under the oversight of this Committee. The Presbytery may also receive communications from other B.W.M. committees for consideration and action.

Recommendation No. 6 (adopted, page 32)

That these guidelines be approved.

BWM-CANADA OPERATIONS GUIDELINES RE EXPECTATIONS OF SYNODS

With Respect To Appointments

The Synod is asked to rate in order of priority the requests for appointment received from the Presbyteries for presentation to the B.W.M.

The Synod Missions Convener is expected to serve as a member of the Appointments Committee at its meeting prior to the Annual Meeting of the B.W.M.

With Respect to Grants

The Synod is expected to see that all Presbyteries have distributed the grant request forms to the congregations by January 15th.

The Synod is to receive the grant requests, as approved by the Presbyteries, to examine them for completeness, accuracy, and appropriateness as to amount; to rate them in order of priority; and to see that they are in the B.W.M. office no later than the 30th of June, together with all supporting documentation.

The Synod Missions Convener is expected to serve as a member of the Canada Grants Committee at its Fall meeting.

With Respect to Reports

To present to the B.W.M. for its annual meeting, a written report on that work of mission within the Synod which is assisted by the B.W.M.

With Respect To Other B.W.M. Committees

As a Canada Operations Policy statement, the foregoing is limited to those areas under the oversight of this Committee. The Synod may also receive communications from other B.W.M. committees for consideration and action.

Recommendation No. 7 (adopted, page 32)

That these guidelines be approved.

PROVISION OF HEAVY APPLIANCES FOR MANSES

That where the Board of World Mission purchases a manse, heavy appliances (fridge, stove, washer and dryer) be included as part of the manse. The congregation will be responsible for the maintenance and replacement of these appliances when necessary.

Recommendation No. 8 (adopted, page 32)

That this policy be approved.

SUPPORT FOR GUYANA PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

On the occasion of the Centennial of the Guyana Presbyterian Church the General Assembly of The Presbyterian Church in Canada records its profound thankfulness to God for a century of fruitful association with the people of Guyana, and in particular with that Church.

The General Assembly of The Presbyterian Church in Canada records its appreciation for the efforts of the Guyana Human Rights Association in keeping the situation in Guyana before the world, and expresses its solidarity with the people of Guyana and especially with the Guyana Presbyterian Church in these difficult times.

The General Assembly of The Presbyterian Church in Canada commends the Government of Canada for its continuing interest in the welfare of the Commonwealth Caribbean and again draws its attention to the serious human rights situation in Guyana. We urge the Government to ensure that any bilateral assistance it may offer to Guyana contributes to the improvement of the wellbeing of all Guyana's people.

Recommendation No. 9 (adopted, page 32)

That the General Assembly approve the above statement and forward it to the Guyana Presbyterian Church.

VISIT OF MODERATOR TO GUYANA

Recommendation No. 10 (adopted, page, 32)

That the 111th General Assembly send its Moderator to represent The Presbyterian Church in Canada at the July celebrations of the Centennial of the Guyana Presbyterian Church.

YOUTH IN MISSION

At the 109th General Assembly the following recommendation from the Church Growth Committee was adopted:

That the BWM propose a design for a programme to involve our youth in mission and service programmes of our church and report back to the next Assembly.

Rationale For Programme

- Our existing national programmes involve a very few specialized youth. There are not many involved in the national programmes, most are training for full-time ministry, and the age focus is geared to young adults. There is a need for a programme that involves younger teens who are not necessarily training for ministry.
- 2. The Church Growth Committee through their Consultations on Youth have found that there is a need to develop "new ways of integrating young people into the life and mission of the church", "creative ways to use their gifts in the mission and ministry of the church", to "develop some national guidelines for active youth participation in the mission field", and a need for a "systematic programme of leadership development and support."
- 3. There is a growing desire on the part of youth and young adults to be involved in the mission and service programmes of our church. In many conversations with youth we found a sense of excitement and a committed interest to new possibilities in mission. Indeed many of our Presbyterian youth have already volunteered through government and other church agencies because our own denomination did not offer an alternative.
- 4. There is a need for a programme that will connect people with people; the challenge is before us to develop new ways of doing mission. A programme involving youth and mission will be an opportunity for congregations, communities, presbyteries, synods, camps and institutions to expand their concept of mission.
- 5. Providing an opportunity of Christian service for youth encourages personal growth and leadership development. It is an education experience that focuses on service, mission and development. The ten year study on the Volunteers in Mission Programme of the United Presbyterian Church, U.S.A., shows that leadership development and personal growth in the area of faith and mission were listed by the youth as the major benefits of their programme. They have found that a large percentage of the youth who have been involved in the VIM programme are now active lay people in their congregations giving leadership and are still involved in mission and service in that local community.
- 6. Volunteerism with a service or educational focus is growing among Canada's young people. They are involved in projects such as Katimavik, Open Door, Canada, Canada World Youth, Operation North, Experience programmes as well as other church related programmes such as International Christian Youth Exchange, Student Christian Movement, Inter Varsity, and community based programmes in the States and Europe. Some of our churches and youth groups have and are developing exchange programmes, work camps, inner city missions and other mission and service related projects. In many ways a national programme would be enhancing what many are already doing.

Proposed Guidelines For A Volunteer In Mission Programme

- The programme would not be a national one, i.e. projects would be locally created and locally funded. Service projects could be in Canada and/or with partner churches overseas. There is also the possibility of linking in with the VIM programme in the States.
- 2. Our target groups would be Young Adults (18-30), Senior Youth (15-18) and Junior Youth (13-15). There could be the possibility of expanding to include adults, seniors, couples and families. Our main focus now is Youth and Young Adults.
- 3. The National Programme would:
 - advertise the programme
 - respond to requests for information
 - encourage congregations, presbyteries, synods, etc., to develop projects
 - approve principles and objectives of projects
 - screen participants
 - help to match participants and projects
 - inform participants after the project sponsor chooses
 - continue developing guidelines for the project
 - do any necessary administration

(The programme should serve the needs of participants and the requesting agency - it should not be seen as an employment agency.)

Types of Projects

- One-two year projects especially for university/college age, wishing to share and develop skills.
- Summer or two-four month projects for young adults and senior youth age. Would focus on participant's interests and willingness to serve as well as any specific skills.
- Short term work camps, or projects especially for junior youth, individuals and/or groups to channel energy and enthusiasm; could have exchange component.

Target Group - Youth

- Youth who wish to gain experience through involvement, serve others, test out vocational options, clarify life purpose, experience personal growth, grow in their personal faith, gain new skills, travel and meet new people, share in the mission of the church, pursue an experience where the rewards are personal and spiritual rather than monetary.
- Requirements/Characteristics of Participants would be maturity, flexibility, time
 available, willingness to travel, resourcefulness, skills to share (may be specifically
 asked for by the project), ability to work with and communicate well with others.
- An information packet for interested people and potential participants could be developed which would lead the reader to examine their motivation, capabilities and limitations, preparedness, own expectations and those of the programme, attitude towards mission.

Outline Of Process

 Volunteer applies to National Co-ordinator with small application fee. Fills out detailed application form for long term projects (shorter application for shorter programmes), supplies references, and should be sponsored by congregation.

- Project sponsor applies to the National Co-ordinator with a detailed design proposal, their acceptance of the programme guidelines, and the name of contact person and group, including name of supervisor. Projects should be sponsored by Presbytery (etc.).
- National Co-ordinator screens both potential participants and potential projects.
 Forwards suitable candidates application forms to accepted projects for consideration/selection.
- Projects sponsors select their volunteer from the applications and informs Coordinator.
- Co-ordinator informs participant(s).

Projects And Volunteers

- All projects should be locally initiated and locally funded and serve specific local needs.
- 2. Projects sponsor should enable participants to serve in Christian mission whether in a congregation, camp, community or institutional setting.
- Projects sponsor and participants should be involved in mutual mission; neither should be seen as sole giver or receiver.
- 4. Participants would not ordinarily be primary staff but, fill a vacant position on a short term basis, assist in overload situations, provide assistance otherwise not available, do a short term project.
- Projects sponsor must provide a clear job description, including expectations and accountability. A supervisor and/or support group to which participants are accountable must be appointed.
- 6. Projects sponsor would provide orientation to work environment, do periodic evaluation and provide feedback opportunities between supervisor and participant, and finally be aware of the personal needs of the participant, (i.e. time to be alone, opportunity for recreation, skill development or training).
- 7. The project sponsor would provide room and board as well as accident insurance (and health insurance if project is longer than 6 months) as well as any travel or work expenses incurred by the the participant. A small living allowance and the costs of travel to the project and home again could be negotiated. There should be the option for the participant and participant's congregation to raise money for travel and expenses. This would underline the sending and receiving nature of mission.
- 8. Emphasis must be placed on creating a "quality experience" for both participants and projects, that engages our church's philosophy of mission and service.

National Programme Committee and Co-Ordinator

- COMMITTEE The Committee would be made up of people who are enthusiastic
 about Youth and Mission. They themselves would be volunteers (ie. there would be
 no travel and time costs paid). This group would be made up of lay and clergy, reps
 from the church structure as well as 'interested' people. It would function much as
 a Board of Directors or Camp Board does. They would help develop the
 programme, encourage and support the Co-ordinator and give guidance, direction
 and vision.
- 2. CO-ORDINATOR To give the programme high visibility and to give the ideas "wings" it is important that the co-ordinator be able to give at least two years to this programme, on a full-time basis. There is the possibility of two part-time people as well. The Co-ordinator would provide the focus in helping to establish

this programme. He/she would with the committee's help begin to promote, develop and carry out the programme.

- VOLUNTEER STAFF Volunteers of interested people would be needed to provide
 office help; typing, answering phone, doing mail-outs, providing support to the Coordinator.
- 4. STUDENT INTERN Perhaps it would be possible to have a Knox/Ewart student for their field placement to work on specific aspects of the programme. For example, advertising, promotion, outreach, developing regional contacts, developing orientation programme for volunteers, developing newsletter or articles for churches, youth.

Funding

- 1. The funding for Youth in Mission will depend on a volunteer spirit. Volunteer and project costs will be borne locally. The only need for national funding is the over all administration of the programme.
- The administration costs to consider would involve: a monthly stipend for the Coordinator, any travel expenses incurred, office space and telephone, information and publicity, work funds, (postage, paper, supplies), office equipment, printing and processing.
- The goal of the programme is to operate on a budget of thirty thousand dollars or less.
- 4. During the experimental period the plan is to make the programme self-supporting through special gifts, seed money (ie. experimental fund, government grants, etc.).
- After the third year the programme would look for regular grant support from the BWM.

Recommendation No. 11 (adopted, page 32)

- a) That the Youth in Mission program be approved, and commended to Presbyteries and Congregations.
- b) That the BWM be authorized to test the programme for a three year period, and report to the Assembly in 1988.

FINGERPRINTING IN JAPAN

The Presbyterian Church in Canada works in friendly association with Churches in Japan, through the Japan-North American Commission on Co-operation Mission (JNAC), and enjoys a special relationship with the Korean Christian Church in Japan.

The United Church of Christ in Japan, and the Korean Christian Church in Japan, members of JNAC, have registered their protest against the practice of the Ministry of Justice of Japan in fingerprinting all aliens, including the Korean people born in Japan and living there for up to three generations.

In Japanese society fingerprinting is usually reserved for those suspected of committing a crime.

The practice of fingerprinting aliens is viewed as a violation of basic human rights, the guarantees to which rights are described in protocols of the United Nations, which protocols have been subscribed to by the Government of Canada and Japan.

Recommendation No. 12 (adopted, page 32)

That the General Assembly support our Sister Churches in Japan in their protest against the practice of fingerprinting aliens, and of persecuting those who have for

reasons of conscience refused to be fingerprinted, and urge all charges laid as a result of such protest action to be withdrawn, together with any other action direct or indirect against the parties concerned; and to request the Japanese Ministry of Justice to revise the Alien Registation Law so as to eliminate the requirement of fingerprinting.

BWM PROGRAMME REPORTS

EDUCATION FOR MISSION

There has been an encouraging increase in demand for Education for Mission resources during 1984.

Four new "You Are There" bulletin inserts were published, with a printing of 70,000 each. Four issues of "Mission Update" were published during the year, a poster on "Africa", seven B.C.L. bulletin covers, monthly "Mission Capsules", and the filmstrip: "Sowing Seeds of Peace".

The Booklet "Something Extra", with suggestions for projects which congregations, groups or individuals could undertake, usually "Over and Above the G.A.B. allocation", was revised and distributed upon request.

The 1985 calendar on the theme "Peace" sold out at over 49,000 copies.

Although personnel were limited, deputation was carried out in all Presbyteries but one.

Workshops on "Education for Mission in the Local Congregation" were held in fourteen locations.

"Presbyterians in Partnership" resources on Taiwan were produced, and Westminster Presbytery is actively strengthening a partnership relationship with the Presbyterian Church in Taiwan.

A brochure re the fingerprinting issue in Japan was printed (jointly with the United Church) and distributed, with over 1000 signatures being forwarded to support the K.C.C.J. and N.C.C.J. in their struggle.

Upcoming Mission Study Themes are as follows:

CANADA OPERATIONS

Within the limits of this report it is possible to give only a brief overview of mission in Canada. A great deal is happening, and there is good news all across the country. What follows is only a small part, but is typical of the mission life in our Church.

A rural congregation in New Brunswick is planning for its future, and those plans will

likely mean a new church home, because their present building is no longer adequate for their growth.

In the city of Three Rivers, Quebec, a new francophone congregation has been formed, I'Eglise St-Mattieu. As a result of a Bible study group in Hull, another is likely in 1985. St-Luc, in Montreal, the first francophone congregation after Union, will celebrate its 50th anniversary in 1985. Also in Montreal, Tyndale-St. Georges has a rapidly growing work among Central American refugees. Over the years the ministry at Tyndale has undergone many changes, but each change has been a response to the needs of the community to hear and to experience the love of God in Jesus Christ.

In Kanata, a suburb of Ottawa, the new Trinity Church, begun in 1977, with a church building now four years old, sees a need for expansion. Another Trinity Church, this one in Amherstview, near Kingston - for a number of years an aid-receiving charge, is now going from strength to strength, and is a generous supporter of Mission. A third Trinity Church, in London, Ontario, is fast outgrowing its first unit. And a fourth, the youngest, in Campbell River on Vancouver Island, worships in a "cottage" - a nice place to begin, but again now too small.

We're jumping ahead. Let's go back to Toronto. This metropolitan area gives the name "Presbyterian" a new dimension, for the Gospel here is proclaimed in many languages, and to people who come from all over the world. Whether in the new Unionville Presbyterian Church, just begun this year, or in older inner city congregations who are taking on new life as the communities around them change, the work of mission continues. In the Korean, Chinese, or Urdu languages, Jesus Christ is praised.

In the cities and towns to the west of Toronto, new churches are in the planning stage, or like Stoneybrook-Masonville in London, were begun, or are well on their way and growing. The General Assembly Committee on Church Architecture has been kept busy, approving plans for first units, and in many cases, approving plans for churches which have outgrown their first unit, and need larger spaces for worship and christian education. One of the concerns in church extension is the need now to build churches that are large enough to last a congregation for several years, so they can "catch their breath" before having to go into a second building programme. Right across the country, we have new congregations where you have to come early, or you'll be sitting in the front row, or standing at the back!

In Kenora, the ministry to women in need carried on at the Kenora Fellowship Centre is also expanding, because of community response to what the Church is offering.

One of the most exciting new works in 1984 is in the interior of British Columbia, in the Slocan valley. One of the beauty spots of Canada, this valley was a mining centre a hundred years ago. Today it is home to settlers, lumbermen, and people who want to get back to living a simple life, close to nature. Doug Swanson, a lay missionary, has postponed his theological studies for a year to begin this work, with the help of an Incentive Grant.

Across the country, there are now twelve congregations where the language of worship is Korean. The most recent is in Winnipeg, with 120 members. This year we welcomed on staff the Rev. Andrew Lee as Director of Korean Ministries. In our theological colleges there are now 21 Korean students preparing for ministry in Canada.

Some of our work has been co-operative, with other churches. The Rev. Les Barclay shared in such a ministry during the summer, as Industrial Chaplain in the Beaufort Sea Operations of Dome Petroleum, the Rev. C. C. Tong in another in the Mission to Seamen in Vancouver, and Dr. Don Wade ministered to St. John's, Milliken, now building a church complex that will be shared with an Anglican parish. We are also involved in ecumenical chaplaincies in several Universities.

During the past year, 12 congregations moved from aid-receiving to self-sustaining; fifteen graduates were appointed to ordained mission fields; 40 students served summer

appointments, from Vancouver Island in the west to Cape Breton in the east.

Part of the work of the Board was gathering together people engaged in special missions to give an opportunity to learn and to share. A Korean Ministries Consultation was held, a Native Elders Conference took place, as did a Seminar for staff in Native Ministries. There were also two Church Extension workshops, one in Ontario and one in Calgary.

We also would like to express our appreciation to our Superintendents of Missions: the Rev. W.J.O. Isaac, Atlantic Synod; the Rev. A. Ross Mackay, Quebec & Eastern Ontario Synod; the Rev. Malcolm A. Mark and the Rev. J. Calvin Elder, Synods of Toronto-Kingston and Hamilton-London; the Rev. Malcolm S. McLean, Synod of Manitoba and N. W. Ontario; the Rev. John A. Neilson, Synod of Saskatchewan; the Rev. George A. Johnston, Synod of Alberta; and the Rev. Dr. K. Calvin Doka, Synod of British Columbia.

As three of our Superintendents retire this year, we extend our gratitude and our good wishes to them: Malcolm Mark, who has served as Superintendent for twenty-five years and has had a continuing interest in and concern for the frontier church; Malcolm McLean and Cal Doka both of whom have served as Superintendents for eighteen years, Mac McLean giving leadership in our Native ministries and Cal Doka giving strong support to our Hungarian work throughout Canada, these all as part of their wider duties as Superintendents of Missions.

OVERSEAS RELATIONS

During 1984 the B.W.M. maintained our partnership relationships with Churches in thirteen overseas countries, and added a fourteenth: Pakistan.

In addition we were able to respond to several other new opportunities.

Personnel

Dr. Rick Allen became our first missionary in Pakistan; Don and Jean Johnson went to Lesotho to fill a need in a Christian high school; Patti Talbot responded to a need for a volunteer to work with the National Christian Council of Japan; John and Betty Zwiers fitted perfectly into the job that needed doing in the Helen MacDonald Memorial School in India; Don MacKay returned to Nigeria to begin a new ministry in industrial chaplaincy. In addition, we were able to facilitate important short-term work by Sue Bonsteel in Nepal, James Sauer in Mauritius, and Lesley Bates and Stewart Gillan in Guyana.

Finance

We were able to respond financially with small emergency grants to the following needs: families of political prisoners in South Africa, war orphans in El Salvador, crisis at the Ludhiana Medical Centre in India and a consultation on overseas Koreans sponsored by the Korean Christian Church in Japan. We also channeled a total of over \$98,000. in specially designated gifts to projects overseas.

The approved overseas budget for 1984 (\$1,193,258.) was reduced by \$40,000. in order to help meet the G.A.B. deficit from 1983. Our actual expenditure in 1984 was \$1,099,032. or \$54,226. under the adjusted approved expenditure.

Area Missionaries

One of the major concepts to emerge from the Overseas Programme Review (1983) was that of "Area Missionary". We were instructed to appoint a missionary to the Caribbean/Latin America area as soon as a suitable candidate could be found. The B.W.M. appointed the Rev. Joseph W. Reed to this position at its March '85 meeting.

The Africa Advisory Committee and the China Sub-Committee have also been developing a rationale for an area missionary in their respective areas.

In addition the following persons either retired or resigned from the overseas staff in 1984: Clare and Grace McGill (Taiwan); Agnes Hislop (India); Barry and Anita Mack (Nigeria). John and Judi Bertholet returned from Cameroon and have taken a leave of absence. The net result was a gain of one overseas staff person in 1984.

Leadership Development

During 1984 nine overseas Church leaders were assisted in undertaking study programmes under the B.W.M. Leadership Development Program. In addition, Dr. Mfon Edyang-Ekpa visited the P.C.C. as the Nigerian Fellow under the E. H. Johnson Fund Exchange, and Miss Maureen Addie of Toronto was a guest of the Presbyterian Church of Nigeria as the return Fellow in this exchange. In May, eight ministers and laypersons of the Presbyterian Church in Taiwan spent three weeks in Canada under the Liu Memorial Leadership Development Program.

FIELD REPORTS OVERSEAS

The Guyana Presbyterian Church

Moderator: The Rev. Isaac Hansrajsingh Clerk: The Rev. Wilfred Ledra

The Guyana Presbyterian Church continues to witness in a land where the social and economic conditions worsen, with the ever-rising cost of living, shortage of basic food items and serious unemployment. Despite these difficulties the Church is maintaining witness across the land due to the unselfish and devoted service on the part of the ministers and members of the laity.

The Rev. Isaac Hansrajsingh returned to Guyana after doing a one-year Leadership Development Course in Canada and India, which included working with rural ministers, some deputation in Canada and a visit to rural development projects in the Church of North India.

Through the kind courtesy of the BWM and Knox College in Canada, the Rev. Dr. Dale Bisnauth spent a six-month period as a Third World Scholar in residence at Knox. He also took the opportunity of doing clinical studies relating to the terminally ill and the aged.

The Rev. Patricia Sheerattan, who graduated from the United Theological College of the West Indies in Jamaica in June 1983, was ordained to the Ministry of the Word and Sacrament. She is now serving in the East Demerara Parish. Another student of the UTCWI, Mr. Leonard Bhagwandin, who graduated in June 1984, was ordained also and assumed duty as parish minister in the Mahaica district.

Two ministers went into retirement at the end of the year - Rev. Jessie Ledra who served first as a deaconess and then as an ordained minister and Rev. Peter Sookhai who served the church as an ordained minister for over thirty (30) years.

The Annual County Youth Camp, which was held at Anna Regina in the county of Essequibo, brought together a large number of young people from different parts of the country. Mr. Stewart Gillan, a student of Knox College, who was assigned to Guyana during the summer, attended and made a positive contribution to the camp.

Two students from Canada - Stewart Gillan and Leslie Bates - spent part of their summer assignment working along with the church.

1985 marks the hundredth year since the establishment of the church in Guyana. It is to be observed as Centennial Year, Visitors from The Presbyterian Church in Canada and also from Trinidad are expected to attend the celebrations.

During the year the church has been receiving parcels or boxes containing essential items for the poor and needy. The GPC is grateful for this fine gesture.

The Presbyterian Church of Korea

Moderator: The Rev. Chong-Yul Park Stated Clerk: The Rev. Chang-In Kim

Among the important actions taken at the General Assembly were:

- 1. Changed the title of the Urban Industrial Mission to "Urban Industrial Evangelism".
- 2. Agreed to establish an Overseas Missionary Training Centre at the Presbyterian Theological College and Seminary.
- 3. Agreed to set up Urban Industrial Mission as a required course in the Seminary.
- 4. Agreed to set up an Office of Labour Counselling and a Committee of Human Rights in the Department of Evangelism of the General Assembly.

Regrettably, the matter of the Ordination of Women Elders was rejected.

We have endeavoured to have one and a half million members of our denomination and five thousand congregations by the Centennial Year. We have almost reached our aim with 1,372,094 members and 4,532 churches as of December 1983.

The PCK now sends 49 missionaries to 23 countries and receives about 70 missionaries from the Presbyterian Church (USA) and the Uniting Church in Australia.

During August the United Celebration of the Centennial was held at Yoido Plaza.

The Centennial Christian Education Conference was held at the King Sejong Hotel in Seoul. The World Mission Committee of the PCK held a "Centennial Mission Consultation" with its overseas partner churches in September. Its theme was "Mission Policies Toward the Second Century of the Korean Church". The Centennial Women's Conference and 49th Annual Meeting of the Presbyterian Women was held at the Centennial Memorial Building and Jamsil Gymnasium. The Centennial Celebration of the PCK was held in September at Jamsil Gymnasium in Seoul. The Centennial Celebration of the Blind was held at Yongnak Church on October 23 with 1,200 blind people attending. PCK built the Korean Church Centennial Memorial Building and the Martyrs' Memorial Tower.

The Church Of North India

Moderator - Bishop Gorai

The Church of North India has launched a massive and imaginative Leadership Development Programme - 100 Conferences in 3 years 1984-86 - under the title "Transfer of Vision". The main thrust of the programme is to make Christian leaders and field workers sensitive to the guidance of the Holy Spirit for the appropriate and relevant ministry of the Church in today's context, in every situation and at all levels: - people's participation; change of leadership at periodic intervals; urging the dioceses, the congregations and all Christian institutions to identify potential leaders; promoting grass root leaders and workers; teaching that mission is people's business; advocating inter-Pastorate, inter-Diocesan sharing for achieving the goal of self-reliance at all levels; affirming that it is time to take bold action to restore confidence in the minds of people; challenging Church and Institutions into launching innovative programmes to offer more relevant and effective Christian services to the weaker sections of the community. Christian action is a response to the need of the community; confirming that renewal and revival in the life of the Church is the burning need of the day; understanding the difference between God's work and denominational church work;

Bishops, Presbyters, heads of institutions and leaders identifying themselves with the hopes, aspirations and struggles of the common people; inviting us to rededicate ourselves and willingly accept the guidance of the Holy Spirit. It is imperative that we create conditions for fellowship.

Power and authority have to be systematically shared and delegated to achieve the "mission". Men and women, young and old, have equal responsibilities and obligations in fulfilling the Mission of the Church. All this is a vision that God gives us. "Transfer of Vision" is the goal of the Leadership Development Programmes.

Canadian Staff

Eleanor L. Knott - seconded to CMAI as Nutrition Co-ordinator and Secretary of the Paramedical Section, moved on September 4 to the beautiful NCCI Campus in Nagpur. A highlight of 1984 CMAI activities was the Biennial Conference held in October in Nagpur, when there the election of a new General Secretary, Dr. Daleep Mukarji, whose appointment was effective from February 1, 1985. As Paramedical Secretary, she attended three Regional Conferences, arranged for a Paramedical Executive meeting, and did considerable correspondence, as well as writing a quarterly column for the Paramedical Bulletin. In Nutrition she has been concentrating on developing materials for Nutrition Education, and working on a Therapeutic Diet Booklet.

Margaret Leask - This past year's work assignment at Helen MacDonald Memorial School, Jhansi, was much the same as that of the previous several years, as treasurer and overseeing purchasing for school and hostel. Also that in connection with the sponsorship programme has increased due to having more children sponsored. Mr. John Andriyas, who began work in November 1983, has given valuable assistance with daily accounts and also helped to prepare for audit. Other work includes teaching some of the high school mathematics, and purchasing materials and generally overseeing the building of the second storey of the new primary school. From July 1985 all classrooms will be needed and there will be no space for chapel and junior kindergarten, so starting the second wing of the building is being considered.

Diana R. Wadsworth - Helen MacDonald Memorial School, Jhansi, in May-June was on a short furlough in Canada, returning in July. The sudden reaction to Prime Minister Indira Gandhi's assassination on October 31 resulted in an ugly outburst. Jhansi was relatively quiet. The school was kept closed as a precaution for the whole 12 days of state mourning. Regarding the disaster in Bhopal, to the south there was much concern as several hostel girls are from Bhopal but all those families were able to get away. The Bishop of Bhopal said that no Protestants died but nine Catholic Christians died.

John and Betty Zwiers - arrived in Jhansi in September. Betty has been assisting in teacher training, trying to introduce some more modern teaching methods through demonstration or making suggestions. John has been working mostly on the new school, making bulletin boards, painting, varnishing, making bookcases and doing other repairs.

Agnes Hislop - retired at the end of 1984 after more than 33 years service in India. During most of the year she did extenive deputation throughout western Canada, in Ontario and the Atlantic Synod. Her enthusiastic and energetic presentation of the Mission of the Church has been much appreciated by many.

Doreen Morrison - as a Community Health nurse in the Diocese of Bophal of the Church of N. India, has been involved in establishing Community Health Services in her area, seeking to make community health work more effective, and to encourage development of the programmes in all hospitals and community health centres in her area.

Clarence McMullen - is the director of the Christian Institute of Sikh Studies at Baring Union Christian College, Batala, Punjab. During the recent period of intense unrest in that area he has been endeavouring to be an agent for understanding and reconciliation.

Catherine McMullen - has recently been spending much of the time at Mussoorie, where Woodstock School, the Christian International School which the McMullen children attend, is located.

The United Mission to Nepal

Executive Director: Mr. J. Howard Barclay

1984 saw considerable change in the leadership of the U.M.N. It was the first year for the Executive Director. In addition, nine of the Mission's projects had new directors, which covers a large portion of the work.

The U.M.N. is called into a parodoxical relationship to the Body of Chirst in Nepal. This is not easy individually as missionaries come from diverse denominational, cultural and racial backgrounds. On one hand, their agreement with the government does not allow them to "proselytize"; on the other, they are there as committed servants under the Lordship of Jesus Christ. This tension was highlighted during the year when they were instructed to discontinue one project immediately. The reasons given were, officially, that they had no agreement with the government re the project; unofficially, they were told they had been carrying on religious propaganda and converting people to Christianity - a charge which is not true. They are hopeful of being able to reach an agreement, and resume the project.

"Project Management Committees" - which allow for a stong stress on "grass roots" participation in planning and evaluation, have an important function in the U.M.N. and its process of "Nepalization".

Canadian Staff

Mary E. Nichol - as Nursing Instructor, Tribhuvan University, Makabaudha Nurse Campus, in 1984 taught Pharmacology to first year students and Primary Health Care to post basic Bachelor of Nursing students. She was also a member of the curriculum development committee for the course in Child Health Nursing. As Chairperson of the Benevolences Committee of the Protestant Congregation of Kathmandu, she has been able to have an active part in the outreach of that congregation.

The Korean Christian Church in Japan

General Secretary: Rev. Kim, Kun Shik

The covenant with the Kyodan which has been in preparation since 1979 was signed at the commemorative assembly on February 8, 1984. The essence of the covenant lies in the mutual co-operation in our respective missions as well as the protection of the human rights of Koreans living in Japan that was pledged in it. The objective of this covenant is to develop a relationship based on co-operation in missions. In regard to the significance of the covenant, the Moderator of the KCCJ pointed out the fact that although there are 51 churches of the KCCJ, they are concentrated in 20 prefectures. He said that in establishing churches in the 27 other prefectures, the KCCJ will hope for the co-operation of the Kyodan. There are already relations between the two churches at the individual church level. In Toyonaka, Shizuoka, and Sendai, churches of the Kyodan are being used. A Christian Centre for both churches was built in Fukuoka with the aid of the United Methodist Church. It will be used for joint projects. In order to further our mutual co-operation, a committee for co-operative missions was established. The first joint project after the signing of the covenant was to gather 500,000 signatures in a petition against the mandatory fingerprinting of aliens residing in Japan.

The First Overseas Korean Theological Conference was held under the auspices of the KCCJ at Amagi Sanso in the Izu Peninsula.

Reports were presented on churches from each geographical region. It was discovered that the status of Korean Diaspora differed greatly depending on the region. The Koreans in Japan, still unable to rid themselves of the heavy burden of the history of Japanese colonization; Koreans in N. American societies sandwiched between two cultures; and Koreans in Europe and S. America uninterested in history, and working to provide for themselves. Whether it was on their own will or not, these Koreans have been scattered to all corners of the earth. It is up to the Korean Christian churches to provide these people with hope and sympathy. The main objective of this seminar was not only to share the pain and to search for a solution for the problems that arise in our respective places of mission, but to probe the meaning of fellow Koreans becoming sojourners through the establishment of "theology of sojourners" and "theology of emigrants" in our respective parts of the world.

The movement to abolish fingerprinting is at its peak. Various churches of North America have been sending us signatures for our petition. The NCC of Korea is working to get one million signatures in a petition to submit to the Japanese government. At the Mission Co-operative Meeting of May 1984, it was decided to get 500,000 signatures in a petition. On a Pentecost Day, we went out into the streets in Tokyo and Osaka in an effort to get signatures and got a wide response. The issue of the fingerprinting system being a violation of human rights was brought to several courts in 1984.

Through testimonies by local civil servants and by Immigration offices, it was brought to light that fingerprints were used not by these civil servants and immigration officers, but by the police. 80% of all aliens residing in Japan (670,000) are Korean and the majority of them are second and third generation permanent residents. 370,000 Koreans in Japan, almost half of the total number, will be renewing their alien registration cards this year. 1985 will be a fate-defining year for this movement and for the future of human rights of Koreans. We are hoping to gather 500 people refusing to fingerprint from among the followers of our General Assembly and are having names sent to us by the day.

Canadian Staff

Rev. John McIntosh (Osaka) - In addition to his ministry in Tatsumi Church, a new mission project in a highly Korean section of Osaka, John has responsibilities as cooperative staff of the Korean Christian Centre, a community service and human rights action centre in the same part of Osaka, as well as with the Korean Y.M.C.A. and Kansai Korean Bible College, the new theological training programme of the K.C.C.J.

Clarabeth McIntosh (Osaka) - is also deeply involved in the programme of Tatsumi Church. Preparation for the 1985 Canadian tour of the K.C.C.J. Women's Association Arirang Chorus took much of her time. She also took a weekly course in the basic principles of social work and counselling at the Kyoto International Institute of Social Welfare and Counselling, to gain new skills which will be of assistance especially to the aged members of the community.

Patti Talbot (Tokyo) - Arrived in September 1984. During the remainder of the year her time was spent in language study, orientation to Japan and to her work. Her assignment with the National Christian Council of Japan is twofold: in the N.C.C.J. Centre for Christian Response to Asian Issues, where she will do research and documentation on issues concerning Japan and Asia, and in the N.C.C.J. office, where she will be largely assisting in the editing and production of the Japan Christian Activity News.

Presbyterian Church in Taiwan

Moderator: Rev. C. C. Shang General Secretary: Dr. C. M. Kao

The good news event of the year certainly revolved around the release of General Secretary C. M. Kao, August 15, 1984. Special Thanksgiving Services were held in five

locations early September with Dr. Kao looking in reflection, giving thanks and prayer. An estimated 10,000 people turned out. Andrew Hsieh, Acting General Secretary for the past two years, continued to be an Assistant to the General Secretary through December.

In June 1984, Tainan Theological College received a letter from Tainan City government that it should close because it was illegally operating as a school of higher education. An appeal was made to the city government with copies of the letter to the Ministry of the Interior. The case was resolved after the city realized that the school was not a regular school, was registered under the Ministry of the Interior, and that the purpose of the school was to train Christian ministers and church workers.

Three representatives of the Presbyterian Church in Taiwan attended an important ecumenical consultation on peace and justice in North East Asia, hosted by the World Council of Churches and National Christian Council of Japan. A follow-up Peace Conference was held in Okinawa in February, sponsored by the Christian Conference of Asia.

Fifteen youth representatives from Hong Kong, Malaysia, Singapore and Taiwan met at Fengyuan to plan the 1985 International Youth Conference. The Council for World Mission supported this planning meeting and the Presbyterian Church in Taiwan will serve as hosts for this event.

Thirteen new overseas missionaries plus five interns came to serve the Presbyterian Church in Taiwan during the past year. These have been assigned to a variety of areas - Hakka evangelism, University Student Work, Social Work Education, Theological Education, Public Health, Community Development and the Church Press. The new staff members came from equally mixed background (Canada, USA, Germany, Korea, New Zealand and Japan).

1985 marks the 120th Anniversary of the Presbyterian Church in Taiwan. Special activities are being planned to celebrate this occasion.

The Ten Plus One Evangelism Movement is in the first year of a two-year period focussing on the need for every church member to be actively involved in bringing others to Christ. Programs are in progress to train ministers, elders and deacons, women, young people and Sunday School children in methods of personal evangelism.

Forty-four (44) students graduated from our theological colleges this year. Five volunteered to go to the east coast and three to the Pescadores - both areas which are seen to be economically undeveloped.

The mine disaster at Meishan claimed the lives of 120 people. Among them were members of Presbyterian families. An emergency appeal went out to the churches and communities throughout the island. Gifts both locally and from overseas were received for needy families. The Church urged the government to develop more safety measures for the mining industry.

The Huadong Community Development Centre went through great financial stress this past year; however, a new thrust of promotion and local fund raising has borne fruit.

August 1983, the Mountain Work Committee of the General Assembly celebrated its 30th Anniversary by hosting special activities including sports competion and thanksgiving services.

Everywhere one looks in Taiwan, there is new construction. The church-related institutions and local congregations themselves reflect this construction boom. June 1983 groundbreaking ceremonies were held for the new "Evangelism Buidling". This will house all the Assembly's offices, the North Synod Office and still have three floors for rental income. The official opening for the new building was March 1, 1985.

Canadian Staff

Mrs. Marilyn Ellis - has the full-time job of teaching their daughter Stephanie by correspondence using the Ontario Department of Education materials and enriching them with other resources. Her chief extra task this year has been editing "The Rice Bowl", the twice-yearly publication of Canadian Presbyterian missionaries in Taiwan.

Rev. Ted Ellis - has been teaching New Testament in the Tainan Theological College. The Spring term was very heavy with three new courses to prepare: Introduction to the New Testament, Chinese exegesis of Luke-Acts, and New Testament Theology. An evening course for lay men and women on New Testament Interpretation and the advising of four M. Div. theses add to his workload. He serves on the General Assembly Executive and on the Assembly's Missionary Personnel Committee as well as on various College committees.

Georgine Caldwell, Ed.D. - Prof. of Christian Education, Taiwan Theological College, continues to teach courses on the undergraduate and graduate levels at the seminary and in the post graduate level in the South East Asia Grad. School of Theology. She also teaches a ladies English Class at the WMS school in Taipei. She is Chairperson of the C. E. Department, and a member of the Dean's committee, the Academic Affairs committee and several other College committees, as well as numerous General Assembly and Presbytery committees. During the year she took a computer course on the use of computers in education.

Rev. Clare and Mrs. Grace McGill - returned to Canada in the summer of 1984 after over 30 years service with the mountain tribal Church in Taiwan. During that period they made a most significant contribution to the spiritual life, the growth, education and leadership development of the Church among the Tayal tribe in particular, with their special emphasis on translation and literacy. Just before their return Tainan Theological College paid a fitting tribute to them by conferring upon Clare the degree of Doctor of Divinity, Honoris Causa. The McGills have now retired in Glencoe, Ontario.

Rev. Choong Mok and Mrs. Yung Ja Kim - were jointly appointed by The Presbyterian Church in Canada and the Presbyterian Church of Korea to work under the Hakka Evangelism Committee of the Presbyterian Church in Taiwan. They arrived in late spring, 1984, and have since been undertaking language study in preparation for their work.

John Geddes (Jack) - teaches English and History at Tam Kang University, Tamsui. He is the only foreign professor of Chinese history in Taiwan's universities, and was asked to teach two new courses; a four-month seminar on simultaneous translation and the new Biblical Literature course elective for their English department. He continues to advise the Christian Fellowship, and has helped organize a new Teachers' Fellowship. He also interviews new teachers; sits on promotion committees; and helped organize their first Vancouver English summer programme, which finally succeeded in taking 20 students to Vancouver Community College for three weeks in August.

Betty Geddes - took time along with Jack to acquire some basic computer skills during the winter. After a summer furlough their home was repainted inside with the downstairs floors sanded and refinished, repairing the damage of two floods in '77 and one in '81.

Rev. Paul D. McLean - The major task in 1984 was Hakka language study. In addition to learning "everyday language" he has been learning to read the new "Today's Chinese Version" of the Bible, and was able to lead a small group in Hakka at the Kungkuan Presbyterian Church. He had the personal joy to have been able to preach five times in Hakka since August. He has also been learning more of Hakka customs and culture, including learning how to sing traditional Hakka mountain songs, and learning to play the two-stringed Chinese violin which accompanies Hakka mountain songs.

Mary Beth McLean - After Peter's birth took time off from language study, beginning again in April. In May she began teaching an English conversation class one night a week at the Kungkuan Presbyterian Church. Besides providing the English class as a service to the community, she sees this as a means of building friendships between Christians and non-Christians and an avenue for sharing of the Gospel.

Joy Randall - As Director of Nursing at Changhua Christian Hospital is responsible for nursing care, supervision of the nursing staff of over 300 and the 130 nursing students from seven affiliated nursing schools, and In-Service Education for staff. One of her other major responsibilities was as secretary for the Quality Assurance Committee and supervision of its sub-committees who in turn report to the Executive Committee of which she is a member. She is involved with the Nursing Fellowship which meets regularly. Her Department has worship every morning on the wards and once a month together in the chapel. Last year seven nurses were baptized and 66 nursing students made decisions to accept Christ. She has been on furlough since August and in September began studies towards a Diploma in Nursing Administration with the Canadian School of Management, Toronto. She also took a course in Management Skill with the Ontario Hospital Association, Toronto, and carried out extensive deputation.

The Presbyterian Church of Nigeria

Moderator of Synod: Mba Ogarekpe

Currently we have two Americans, three Canadians, two Cameroonians, and five Dutch Fraternal Workers working full-time in various capacities in the church.

There remain eight presbyteries, although we recognize a need for some to be subdivided. While some presbyteries have five parishes, others have seventeen or twentyfour. New parishes continue to be created.

Board of Christian Education sent three clergy for degree courses this year. We have twenty-four students at Trinity College, the largest number for many years. Ikot-Obong and Goldie Training Centres for the training of evangelists remained closed during 1984.

Board of Church Life - The Youth, Men and Women continue to progress in their various endeavours. The Men's Hostel is under construction in Aba, while the Women's is still under construction in Calabar. The Order of the Diaconate is to be inaugurated by the July 1985 Synod. It is hoped that it will be more than a name change.

Board of Church Property Development - Itu Project: The need is for a resident director so that people see that something is happening. The agricultural sector has been revamped and miraculously is already showing a healthy income. Funds for this project have not yet been raised locally, but with the New Year the Rev. Dr. I. O. A. Ude will take all under his charge.

Board of Church Ministry happily has little to report on matters of discipline. Linguistic and ethnic considerations are being subtly acknowledged in regards to the postings of church workers. There are two schools of thought: one, that anything that even hints at a difference in the oneness of unity of the body of Christ must not be mentioned; the other, that for the effective furthering of the gospel, we must use the God-given structures of language and ethnic group to our advantage.

Board of Propagation and Publication is doing great work at getting evangelism training down to the local level. Successful workshops were held in 1984. More are planned for 1985.

Medical Board - We take great pride in our hospitals, although opening of new outstations is a financial worry. The governments, who call the tune financially, are talking of closures and cut-backs and limitations. Our new school of nursing at Eja Memorial is threatened. Still out-patient work in leprosy and T.B. are a wonderful manifestation of the gospel.

Board of Faith and Order - A revised Practice and Procedure is still badly needed. A Book of Common Order is at some stage of formulation for a printer.

Board of the PCN Press and Bookshops Limited - The Hope Waddell Bookshop in Calabar is functioning with a large staff. A new bookshop is to be opened at Biriba.

Board of Christian Eduction - The only Presbyterian on staff at Trinity College is the Reverend S. K. Okooha; we need at least one more. The needs are Old Testament, History and Homiletics.

Nigeria Politically and Economically - The Military Government continues to have the popular support of the people, although some are wondering when the benefits are going to start coming. Young people are the hardest hit; swinging merrily along to the tunes of Michael Jackson and Culture Club, they thought the world was theirs, complete with alligator shoes and yearly trips to New York. Today even with university degrees, technical college diplomas or secondary school diplomas, there is absolutely no work available. What does the PCN offer their young members?

Canadian Staff

Rev. Richard W. Fee - Returned from furlough and serves as Assistant Synod Clerk of the Presbyterian Church of Nigeria. His original work assignment was to assist in implementing new ideas and to act as a formulator of new structures to get the administration moving ahead. He was gratified to see that a budgetary system and method of collection of Synod assessments, which he had proposed, had doubled the income of Synod in the year he was away. The parish/presbytery/synod budgets which he designed were still in use; the pension scheme was "flowing like a spring in a parched land of church worker motivation"; the Board system which replaced a myriad of committees was progressing. It was interesting to return after 16 months to see what was strong enough to survive and what had fallen by the wayside.

Rev. Donald Walker MacKay - Arrived in Nigeria on September 12, 1984. Church involvements have included services in the various churches in the Lagos area, an industrial mission seminar, and acting for the month of December as the interim moderator of Lagos Presbyterian Church. His assignment is to the Lagos Presbytery working with the Rev. U. Ekpengyong to begin an Industrial Chaplaincy associated with Lagos Urban Industrial Mission. 1985 will be a time to proceed in establishing some pilot projects while attempting to work out many unanswered questions.

Arlene Leona Randall - During most of 1984 was in Canada continuing furlough and study leave. She studied full-time for the winter semester, taking five courses at the University of Waterloo in a Bachelor of Arts degree program. At the same time she did deputation on most weekends. She returned to Nigeria on September 24 to a new assignment. The Synod decided to form an Order of the Diaconate for both males and females and asked her to help set it up. Along with that she has been co-opted into working on the CGIT Syllabus and the Sunday School curriculum with others. She is to prepare a refresher course of three months' duration for three Church Sisters who will join others to become the first deaconesses of the PCN at Synod 1985, subject to obtaining sufficient funds from Synod.

The Church of Central Africa, Presbyterian

Canadian Staff: Synod of Blantyre

Clara E. Henderson - located in Blantyre, Malawi, as Director of Music Blantyre CCAP (fostering indigenous hymnody and music literacy with the Synod). The music programme this year consisted of music workshops held on the Synod, Presbytery, and parish levels. A Synod level workshop (including a Catholic choir) was very well received and was valuable in promoting ecumenical relations as well as indigenous expressions of worship. Workshops were also held in each of the five presbyteries within Blantyre Synod. Two new items were added to the music programme this year-

parish workshops and a Synod Youth Choir Festival, with a focus on developing and encouraging the use of indigenous music within church worship and on developing music literacy. In November the Director-Designate, Rev. Ngwale was appointed. He will assume full directorship when her appointment terminates. One of their goals is to work toward strengthening the music committees at the parish, presbytery, and synod levels in order to establish a stable network for the development of music within the Synod.

Rev. Glenn Inglis - The Associate Minister at St. Michael and All Angels Church in Blantyre. Work as congregational minister and secondary school chaplain goes on well and remains a source of challenge and joy. The amount of counselling that he has been doing has risen, which is an indication of trust and that some cultural barriers are falling. He has however submitted his resignation to the Synod of Blantyre effective June 15, 1985, a decision which has not been an easy one. Although committed to the social-political-spiritual struggle of the Malawian people, they feel cut off from involvement with them except on the most superficial level.

Linda Inglis - Continues to lead a weekly programme of recreation and skill training for handicapped children and their guardians, teaches one religion class at a local school and is involved in Sunday School work. The local library is still functioning. The mission guest house has been an added responsibility.

Canadian Staff: Synod of Livingstonia

Dr. William Kennedy - Completed a 2-year term of service as a medical doctor working at Ekwendeni CCAP Mission Hospital. His services involved looking after patients in one half of the wards during the day, these were the female ward, children's ward and premature infants ward. He also did some teaching: medical assistants - emergency care; student midwives -paediatrics; medical orderlies (nurses) - anatomy, physiology and basic medical diseases at two different levels of complexity. Further responsibilities involved surgery for patients on his ward and emergency cases. After Easter the Kennedys started a Bible study in their home for Tumbuka neighbours. This involved much work in translating English into Chitumbuka and endeavouring to share in the conversation.

Betsy Kennedy - began teaching Form 1 English at the CCAP Secondary School for Girls in January 1984. The school has about 327 students with classes of 40-50 girls. She taught 22 periods of 40 minutes each. During the one year and two months of her stay, she took language lessons. During the fall she held a Bible study for the Form 2 girls, bi-weekly on Saturdays.

In February 1985 Bill returned to Canada to take up a residency in paediatrics and Betsy to study for a Bachelor of Education.

The Presbyterian Church of Mauritius

President: Mr. M. Derblay

The highlight of the Presbyterian Church of Mauritius during 1984 was the Fete de la Foi. This "Festival of Faith" was a time of great renewal and outreach for the Church. Assistance in making preparations was given by the Rev. Dr. James Sauer, then Coordinator for Church Growth of The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

The Festival took place in each of the five parishes. It was especially exciting at Point aux Piments, with up to 160 people attending the sessions (i.e. virtually the entire local village plus many from further away) and Grand Gaube, where up to 500 attended. Many, many new people came regularly at both places: there were many who met Christ for the first time and many more who came asking for guidance and counsel. The signs of renewal within the Presbyterian community are encouraging. The follow-up work is, of course, most important and there now are plans to do as much as possible with training courses and on-going counselling, but it is more urgent than ever that we find a full-time pastor for the northern parishes.

Canadian Staff

Rev. Brian and Mrs. Elizabeth Crosby - Brian continued to be too busy with five parishes, course for new lay-preachers, restoring of St. Jean, St. Pierre and St. Joseph and the Festival of Faith August/September. The lay-preachers course had to be put in abeyance for a few months and he feels that he was not able to give the level of pastoral care he would have liked to in the various parishes. Elizabeth continued to catalogue church archives and theological library and to do general secretarial work. She has also expanded her involvement in church music with her flute and the recorder groups in the churches and with the making of church banners.

The Presbyterian Church of East Africa

Canadian Staff

George Loom (Kenya) - serves as Hospital Administrator for the Kikuyu Presbyterian Church Hospital. He reports excellent health in spite of malaria in January 1984 and operation for removal of appendix in August 1984. His first year has been very challenging. Hospital administration was completely new to him, but he is pleased to be able to report progress, especially with regard to maintaining the property. He has been able to improve the grounds. As a result, the morale of patients and visitors has improved. The Male Ward has been completely re-decorated and beds repaired, and many were repainted and electricity installed. An X-ray machine has been donated. Accounting has been changed to a more simplified system. The Nurses' Housing Project is in full swing. Due to absolute necessity, he hired more staff, e.g. Assistant Bookkeeper, Storekeeper, Records Clerk, and hopes to be able to hire more next year to run the hospital efficiently. In all the above he has had the support of Dr. Mlise, M.O. and Mrs. Grace Pereire, matron.

Lesotho Evangelical Church

Canadian Staff

Don and Jean Johnson - Arrived in the summer of 1984 to serve at the Masitise High School, primarily a boarding school with about 400 students. There are 27 teachers, 16 Basotho and 11 ex-patriates including four Canadians, three Indians and one from each of four other countries. They arrived into a bad situation with student unrest and subversive action by some staff members. After the Ministry and the police investigated and intervened, two staff members were dismissed and the school was closed. Grades 11 and 13 students were allowed to stay and write the external exams. This meant that Don only taught for a few weeks, teaching English Language and Bible knowledge. They enjoy going to church each Sunday even though they do not know the language. The singing is in full harmony and they can follow the words in the humn book. There are special services on certain days and these are quite exciting - spontaneous singing and dancing and offering which goes on and on. On one occasion they were there two and one-half hours, on another there were 78 children and two adults baptised and the service lasted just over two hours.

The United Presbyterian Church of Pakistan

Canadian Staff

Dr. Rick Allen - The first eight months of 1984 were spent in completing a Master of Public Health (MPH) in International Health at Tulane University in New Orleans. This study programme introduced new theory and ideas that could be related to his previous experience. His appointment to Pakistan is new. In some ways life in Pakistan is similar to that in Nepal, as both are developing countries found within the Indian subcontinent.

The major difference is that the dominant religion is Islam, while Nepal's is Hinduism. Language is also different, but fortunately there is a little overlap between Napali and

Urdu (the official language of Pakistan). His work is in the Rural Health Care Project of the Memorial Christian Hospital in Sialket, north of Lahore. The project is most concerned with maternal child health activities and sanitation. Over the initial three months, he tried to acquaint himself with the project as well as starting some evaluative procedures.

WHEREAS, some of these members are inactive by their own choice, and

WHEREAS, these same persons by their continued absence from church indicate by their absence a lack of desire to fulfill their communion vows and commitment to the church and Christ, and

WHEREAS, some persons on the communion roll move to other places and do not request their membership to be transferred but simply let it remain, and

WHEREAS, the Book of Forms allows a period of 3 years before the removal of such persons from the roll is allowed, and

WHEREAS, this can at times inflate communion roll figures and present an inaccurate picture of the congregation,

THEREFORE, we, the Session of Coquitlam Presbyterian Church, humbly overture the 111th General Assembly to revise the Book of Forms to provide for an inactive roll with the following stipulations, or to do otherwise as the General Assembly may in its wisdom deem best.

Placing persons on the Inactive Roll: When placing persons on the inactive roll, the Session should be especially conscious of its role in shepherding those under its charge. Thus to place a person on the inactive roll not only reflects on the commitments made to Christ by that individual, but it may also reflect on the failure of the Session to be diligent in its pastoral duties. For that reason certain requirements are placed on the Session before it may place a person on inactive status:

- (a) If a communicant member fails to participate in the life of the congregation for a period of one year, that individual may be placed on the inactive roll by an act of Session. However, prior to such action, the Session must earnestly seek to discover the causes of the failure to participate and seek to encourage the person to resume active involvement in the life of the congregation.
- (b) When a communicant member changes residence so that it is no longer possible or practical to participate actively in the life of the congregation, the Session shall encourage that person to establish a relationship to a church where participation is possible. After a period of six months, the Session may then remove that person's name to the inactive roll. In any event, the Session should notify a church in the area of the member's new residence and suggest that pastoral oversight be given.
- (c) A person placed on the inactive roll may be restored to the active roll upon request to the Session and when the individual has resumed active participation in the life of the congregation. The Session shall satisfy itself of the intention of renewed commitment.
- (d) If a ruling elder who is presently serving shall be placed on the inactive roll, that active officer relationship shall be automatically dissolved. This fact shall be reported to the congregation by the Session.
- (e) Those persons whose names have been on the inactive roll for a period of one year or a year and a half if on the inactive roll under item (b) above, shall then come under the provisions of Article 125.5 of the Book of Forms.

The Presbytery of Westminster agreed to transmit the above overture simpliciter.

WHEREAS, many of these presbytery plans have too restrictive and vulnerable a base to provide long-term protection and premium stability, and

WHEREAS, failure of the national church to take definitive action in our estimation represents a serious failure to act in the spirit of such New Testament references as Matthew 25:31-46, Acts 2:44-45 and Galatians 6:10,

THEREFORE, we, the Session of Knox Presbyterian Church, Midland, Ontario humbly overture the Venerable, the General Assembly to direct the Pension Board and the Administrative Council to organize an inclusive group health and dental insurance plan for church professionals and/or other church employees as quickly as it can practically be done, current budgetary shortfalls notwithstanding, or to do otherwise as the General Assembly in its wisdom deems best.

NO. 13 - PRESBYTERY OF NORTHERN SASKATCHEWAN (See Special Committee, Re: Store Openings on Sunday pages 19, 28, 40)

To the Venerable, the 111th General Assembly:

We, the Presbytery of Northern Saskatchewan of The Presbyterian Church in Canada, are concerned about the possibility of legislation which would enable retail business to be open on Sundays. We believe that such action would have a detrimental effect upon our society as a whole and upon our families in particular.

We believe it is important to be able to enjoy Sunday as a day of rest, religious observance and family activity. It is important for people to have time off together and Sunday is a day when most families are able to be together. If we believe in family life and its importance, we must be ready to support the policies which will enrich and enhance family life. We think a common day of rest is one factor that begins to hold families together. It provides a single day for caring and sharing with each other that is free from the pressures that are part of the work day.

- If there is Sunday retail, it simply means that business will be carried on as usual seven days a week. What this means is that families will not be allowed to be together. Someone in the household will probably be required to work on Sunday.
- We are aware that families are continually under tremendous pressure today and the possibility of the family unit disintegrating is always before us. If a parent or parents are forced to work on Sunday, the quality of family life will be diminished and parental supervision will be missing. Without the idea of a common day of rest, one is not able to enjoy the day with family and friends in an atmosphere of togetherness.
- Sunday retail will also prevent those who have strong religious convictions from participating in the worship activities on Sunday. We believe that Sunday has been set aside by God as the day of rest, recreation and worship. To be forced into an employment situation which is not necessary reduces the spiritual impact on the lives of the people.
- At the present time, the majority of retail stores have a minimum of 60 hours per week without being open on Sundays. Sunday openings really do not generate significantly greater sales, but they spread the existing sales over more hours. Many would argue that additional employment opportunities would be provided. In all probability, the worker's schedules would simply be re-adjusted to the seven-day week. Sunday openings would simply increase business overhead and this would have to be reflected in higher retail prices to the consumer. In shopping centres, all businesses whether large or small must be open if that is the decision of the centre's management. This would place great financial burdens on the smaller companies. They would be forced to remain open and would experience financial hardship.
- THEREFORE, we petition the Venerable, the 111th General Assembly to urge the Government of Canada and the Provincial Governments to prohibit retail stores from opening on Sunday, thus enabling Sunday to remain as a day of rest, recreation, and worship to the betterment of our community and positive lifestyle.

WHEREAS, opportunities for part-time congregational ministries are likely to increase, especially for married clergy whose spouse's income comes from secular work,

THEREFORE, it is humbly overtured by the Kirk-Session of St. James Church, Charlottetown, Presbytery of Prince Edward Island, that the General Assembly clarify the meaning and extent of the validation of part-time ministries and make provision accordingly in terms of the law and procedures of the Church for Call and Induction to such part-time ministries, or, to do otherwise for this object as the General Assembly, in its wisdom, may deem best.

APPEALS

NO. 1 - DAVID A. BEATON Re: Calling for Subscriptions

(See Special Committee, pages 19, 30, 56)

To the Venerable, the 111th General Assembly:

- WHEREAS, at the One Hundred and Eleventh meeting of the Synod of Hamilton and London of The Presbyterian Church in Canada and on the date of October 23, 1984 the Synod defeated an amendment (duly seconded) that "the Synod subscription for the work of the Synod for 1986 be \$1.75 per member", and
- WHEREAS, instead of the amendment as above, the Synod passed the following motion: "That the amount of dues necessary for the work of the Synod for 1986 continue at the current rate of \$1.75 per member", and
- WHEREAS, this motion has been interpreted by the Synod executive to mean "that 'dues necessary' is interpreted as being an assessment". This interpretation has been relayed to all Presbyteries within the bounds, and
- WHEREAS, de jure the Synod has been given the right to "call for subscriptions for its own expenses" (Book of Forms 272), and
- WHEREAS, Church law has not defined the Synod's right 'to assess', 'to levy an assessment', 'to charge dues' or to raise money in any fashion other than "to call for subscriptions", and
- WHEREAS, many instances can be cited to show that historically a subscription has been understood by the Church as 'the pledge of a gift' and that such an understanding conforms to the New Testament biblical tradition. (In 2 Corinthians Paul writes to the congregation urging them to be liberal in their gift to aid the poor in Jerusalem. He called for gifts among many congregations (2 Cor. 8:1). He makes it abundantly clear that these gifts were free will offerings (2 Cor. 8:3-4;9:1). He calls for the Church in Corinth to fulfill the full amount of the pledge that the congregation had made for the relief of the saints (2 Cor. 8:10). He also implies that the amount of the offering promised was decided by the congregation and not by Paul (2 Cor. 9:5). He makes it clear that this money is to be donated "not as an exaction but as a willing gift" (2 Cor. 9:5)), and
- THEREFORE, the law of our Church, as it stands, is in conformity with the tradition of the biblical witness. The action of the Synod is not in conformity either with the law of the Church or with the biblical witness, and
- THEREFORE, the undersigned appeals to the Venerable, the General Assembly, to overturn the decision of the 111 Synod of Hamilton and London and restore the lawful practice of calling for subscriptions; or to do otherwise, as the General Assembly in its wisdom, may deem best.

THE REVEREND HOWARD GRACE

In his seventy-fourth year, the Rev. Howard Grace died at Glace Bay, N.S. on May 28th, 1984.

Mr. Grace was born in Eight Island Lake, Guysborough County, Nova Scotia, in 1910. Following his elementary and secondary education, he entered the employment of the steel plant in Trenton, N.S.. Later, he served on the police force in the town of New Glasgow.

Answering the Call to the Ministry, Mr. Grace attended Sir George William's College, Montreal and St. F. University, Antigonish, N.S.. He graduated from the Presbyterian College, Montreal, in 1951. Later that same year he was ordained to the Christian Ministry by the Presbytery of Quebec.

The Rev. Howard Grace served The Presbyterian Church in Canada in congregations in Athelstan, Quebec; Thorburn, Nova Scotia; St. Stephen's, New Brunswick; Durham, Nova Scotia and Eckville, Alberta. He retired from the active ministry because of ill health, and for a period of time he was employed with the Nova Scotia Co-operative Organization.

From 1971 to 1978, he served as supply at MacLennan's Mountain, Pictou County, Nova Scotia.

In 1978, he moved to Glace Bay, where he took up residence and entered into the life and work of St. Paul's Church. He was pleased to supply pulpits in the Presbytery of Cape Breton when the opportunity arose, and when health permitted.

The Presbytery of Cape Breton gives thanks to Almighty God for the life and witness of the Rev. Howard Grace, a faithful colleague and co-worker in the Christian Ministry, and offers sympathy to Mrs. Grace, three sons - Byron, David, and John - and a number of grandchildren.

A funeral service was conducted in St. Paul's Church, Glace Bay, by the Moderator of Presbytery, who was assisted by several members of the Presbytery. Interment was in Riverside Cemetery, Merigomish, in Pictou County.

SYNOD OF QUEBEC AND EASTERN ONTARO

THE REVEREND R.J. BERLIS

The Presbytery of Montreal records its deep appreciation for the life and ministry of the Reverend R.J. Berlis, C.D., D.D., minister emeritus of the Church of St. Andrew and St. Paul, Montreal, who died on Sunday, 26 August, 1984, while on holiday in Prince Edward Island. His ministry within the bounds of the Presbytery spanned 45 distinguished years.

Born in Victoria Harbour, Ontario, where his father, the Reverend H.A. Berlis was minister of St. Paul's Presbyterian Church, Dr. Berlis was 73 years of age at the time of his death. He graduated in Arts from the University of Toronto and in Divinity from Union Theological Seminary, New York City. Following post graduate studies in Scotland and Germany he returned to Minneapolis, U.S.A., and from there was appointed to the Church of St. Andrew and St. Paul as Assistant Minister in 1939. He was honoured with the degree of Doctor of Divinity (honoris Causa) by the Montreal Presbyterian College in 1951.

Dr. Berlis was, first and foremost, a dedicated pastor. He exercised a Ministry of faithful visitation to the sick, the elderly and the bereaved. A master craftsman with words, he proclaimed the unsearchable riches of Jesus Christ in impressive and compelling manner. He sought to be a worthy Minister of the Word and Sacraments. A born teacher, each year he devoted mid-week seminars to the exposition of scripture. As a counsellor he was beloved and respected for his courtesy, admonition and encouragement.

For 32 years he was an army chaplain, in war and in peace. Throughout World War II he served overseas, first with the Canadian Forestry Corps and second with the Black Watch (Royal Highland Regiment) of Canada. Captain Berlis was severely wounded in the Normandy Invasion while attending his comrades.

As a Presbyter he was faithful and dedicated to the work of the courts. The Church of St. Andrew and St. Paul under his leadership gave the initial financial grants for such extension congregations as St. Columba-by-the-Lake and St. Laurent. Each year his Lenten Services raised the "Ten Ministers Fund" for the assistance of unfortunate colleagues.

During his ministry the Church of St. Andrew and St. Paul was recognized across Canada for the beauty of its liturgy, the drama of its preaching and the excellence of its church music. Perhaps the highlight of his long ministry in Montreal was the installation of ten clerestory windows, the work of Lawrence Lee. The first of these windows was unveiled by H.M. The Queen Mother, Colonel-in-Chief of the Black Watch, on June 10, 1962.

Dr. Berlis served for seven years as assistant minister of Knox Presbyterian Church, Guelph, Ontario, following his retirement from Montreal.

Funeral services were held in the Church of St. Andrew and St. Paul, on Thursday, August 30, conducted by his successors, the Reverends William R. Russell and J.S.S. Armour; his former assistants, The Reverends James Peter Jones, Stephen A. Hayes and Dr. John A. Simms, and the Reverend Professor R. Sheldon MacKenzie. Dr. Berlis is survived by two brothers, Douglas at Toronto, and Norman at London, England, and several nieces and nephews.

THE REVEREND EARL EATON

Earl Eaton died in Chesterville, Ontario, on October 14, 1984 at the age of 80. Mr. Eaton was born and educated in the United States. He received a B.A. from Syracuse University, a B.Th. from Gordon College, Boston, a B.T.A. from Central College, Nebraska, and a B.D. from Auburn College. He was ordained by the Congregational Church in America. In 1957 he came to Canada and was received as a minister of The Presbyterian Church in Canada. He served the Kirkwall-Sheffield charge, Logan Geggie Church, at Innerkip and Chesterville-Morewood, all in Ontario. He retired from the active ministry in 1970 but continued to supply pulpits of The Presbyterian Church, as well as Lutheran and United Churches.

Besides his church work, Mr. Eaton took an active interest in a variety of health related organizations, including Mental Health, the Red Cross, Alcohol and Drugs. He was a keen member of Mariners for Christ and the Businessmen's Gospel Fellowship. At the time of his death he was the chaplain for the St. Lawrence District of The Boy Scouts.

Mr. Eaton is survived by his wife, Constance, and by three daughters, Gwendolyn of Indiana, Gloria of New York State, and Constance of Ohio. He was pre-deceased by three wives, Olive, Ruth and Doreen. The funeral service was conducted by the Presbytery of Brockville on October 17 at Trinity United Church, Chesterville, Ontario. Mr. Eaton was buried in Brantford, Ontario.

THE REVEREND IVER MacIVER

At age 73, a retired Presbyterian minister, Dr. MacIver died in Kingston, Ontario on 5th June. 1984.

Born at Hunter's Mountain, N.S., Dr. MacIver received his early education in the Maritimes; he graduated with a B.A. degree from Acadia University, Wolfville, N.S., and went on to study theology at The Presbyterian College, Montreal, where he graduated in 1941.

He served as O.M. at Assiniboine, Saskatchewan and was ordained there. Later pastorates included Nanaimo, B.C., Cranbrook, Ont., Queen's Road Church, St. John's, Newfoundland, Scotsburn in Quebec and at Maxville, Ontario.

In 1973 The Presbyterian College conferred on him the degree of Doctor of Divinity (honoris causa). For 13 years he served as Clerk to the Presbytery of Glengarry and retired to Kingston in 1978.

Dr. MacIver is survived by his widow, Helen.

SYNOD OF TORONTO AND KINGSTON

THE REVEREND ANGUS MACKAY

The Reverend Angus Mackay, a beloved and faithful missionary, died in Waterloo, Ontario on Friday, June 8, 1984 at the age of 83.

Mr. Mackay was born on a farm near Whitechurch, Western Ontario. His education was in the same area where in early years he felt the call of God to missionary service. His chosen profession was teaching in which he had exceptional gifts. Before going overseas he taught for several years in the Bruce Peninsula.

Mr. Mackay sailed for Jhansi, India in 1927 where he served his Lord for 43 years. On his first furlough in 1934 he married Catharine Moodie of Burnaby, B.C., a teacher at the Girls' Mission School, Jhansi. They were to have celebrated their golden wedding anniversary on September 10, 1984.

Mr. Mackay's long and distinguished missionary career covered a changing era in missiological development. When he first arrived in India he became principal of the Boys' School on a large compound containing several mission institutions. With a rethinking of mission policy the school was closed and Mr. Mackay gave himself wholeheartedly to village evangelism. This often involved camping in the jungle with national evangelists and cycling up to thirty miles a day in order to reach the unreached with the Gospel.

After the Second World War and the breakup of colonialism the emphasis in missionary activity shifted to the training of national leaders. The Bundelkhand Bible School was opened in which Mr. Mackay served as principal for many years. Several of the graduates are active pastors and outstanding evangelists involved in radio ministry and Bible teaching across North India today. Angus Mackay also served for a time as Principal of the renowned Landour Language School as he was fluent in the national language of Hindi.

Mr. Mackay readily adapted himself in the decade of the sixties to "partnership in mission" with the growing Indian Church. The development of strong national leadership led to the independence of the Church from mission structures. In recognition of his spiritual leadership and administrative guidance in the formation of the Church of North India in the Jhansi area Mr. Mackay was ordained by the Bruce-Maitland Presbytery in 1956 while on furlough in Canada.

A well attended memorial service was conducted by Rev. John Henderson in Knox Presbyterian Church, Waterloo, assisted by the Rev. George Malcolm, General Secretary, Board of World Mission. Rev. Russell Self, a missionary colleague, spoke from Philippians 1:21 - "For what is life? To me, it is Christ. Death then will bring more" (TEV). The Christ-centered life of Angus Mackay examplified this text to all who knew him.

He is survived by his wife, Catherine Mackay, son Donald, daughter Mrs. Mary Ellen Stegenga, and five grandchildren.

THE REVEREND MALCOLM CARMICHAEL YOUNG

The Reverend Malcolm Young, retired Presbyterian Minister, died in London, Ontario, August 12, 1984, aged 73.

Mr. Young was born in the manse of South Eldon Church, Ontario in 1911. He attended the University of Toronto and then moved to London where he completed his university education and graduated with the B.A. degree in 1934. His Theological Degree was obtained at Knox College, Toronto, from which he graduated in April 1937. The following month he was ordained and called to the Charge of Waterdown and Kilbride in the Presbytery of Hamilton.

It was there he met and married Mary Elizabeth Duguid who proved to be a faithful wife and helpmate to him for 47 years. From this marriage were born three children, Douglas, Susan and John.

In 1940 he was called to the Charge of Beaverton and Gamebridge where he became a beloved and faithful Pastor for ten years. He was called to St. Andrew's, Gananoque, Ontario in 1950, where he continued his ministry for eighteen years. His third and final Charge brough him back to the place of his birth, where he served the congregations of Woodville, Cannington and South Eldon for nine years. During that period he was elected Moderator of the Lindsay Presbytery. When the Presbytery of Lindsay and the Presbytery of Peterborough were united, Mr. Young was honoured by being elected the first Moderator of the Presbytery of Lindsay-Peterborough. This office he discharged with ability and distinction. He had also served as Moderator of the Synod of Toronto and Kingston, and as Clerk-Treasurer of the Presbyery of Kingston. He was active on several Boards of the General Assembly, notably on the Board of Knox College.

Mr. Young was a man of strong convictions and never hesitated in any Court of the Church to voice those convictions. He was a man of deep yet simple faith - a wise counsellor - always compassionate in his dealings with others - especially those who may have differed with him. He was a faithful Presbyter - constant and diligent in his attendance until failing health compelled him to retire in 1977.

At the time of his death he was living in London, Ontario, and on August 16, 1984 a Memorial Service was held in Chalmers Church there.

The Presbytery of Lindsay-Peterborough expresses its sincere sympathy to Mrs. Young and the members of the family, and gives thanks for the life and ministry he exercised.

SYNOD OF HAMILTON AND LONDON

THE REVEREND JOHN WESLEY BELL

The Reverend John Wesley Bell, in his 74th year, a retired Presbyterian minister, died in University Hospital, London, Ontario on July 12, 1984, following a brief illness.

Mr. Bell was born in Flos Township (Elmvale) and received his early education there and in Barrie. He continued his education while serving in the Royal Canadian Medical

Corps from 1943 to 1948 in the United Kingdom, the Central Mediterranean Area and in Continental Europe. He completed his Arts at Waterloo College (U.W.O.) graduating in 1949, and took his theology in Presbyterian College graduating in 1952. The same year he was ordained by the Presbytery of Barrie and inducted into the Duntroon, Nottawa, West Nottawasaga charge. He then served the charges of Finch-Crysler, St. Michel, and Walkerton. He accepted an Overseas Mission appointment to Nigeria which was denied him due to a heart problem during orientation. He then accepted a Mission Board appointment to Amherstview and later to Whitechurch where he retired. He moved to Inverhuron and continued in his greatest joy, preaching the Gospel, supplying pulpits in Bruce-Maitland Presbytery.

Mr. Bell served on the Board of Presbyterian College, various synod and presbytery committees and was Moderator of Barrie Presbytery. He was a Mason and a life member of The Royal Canadian Legion.

John Bell was a keen student of God's Word, a thoughtful and dynamic preacher whose convictions concerning Divine Truth were deeply rooted, a dutiful pastor and a faithful presbyter.

He is survived by his wife, Carol, and two daughters, Phyllis (Mrs. Donald Vollrath) of Finch, Ontario, Ann (Mrs. Norman Grabatin) of Edmonton, Alberta, and by three sons, John Nelson Bell, Sault Ste. Marie, Albert Fontaine, Peterborough, and Wesley Bell, Walkerton, as well as by thirteen grandchildren and one great grandson.

The Presbytery of Bruce-Maitland commends his widow, daughters and sons, as well as other members of the family circle, to the care and comfort of God with the prayer that He may sustain and watch over them "until the day breaks and the shadows flee away".

THE REVEREND HAROLD THOMAS COLVIN

The Reverend Harold Thomas Colvin died suddenly on June 26, 1984 at his home in Markdale, Ontario.

Mr. Colvin was born sixty years ago in Mount Brydges in south western Ontario, the son of Thomas and Amy Colvin. Upon completion of his secondary school studies he enrolled in The Arts Faculty of The University of Western Ontario and was graduated in 1947. He undertook theological studies at Westminster Theological Seminary in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania and, in 1950, graduated from that institution, having been granted its Bachelor of Divinity degree. Following his reception as a candidate by the General Assembly, the Presbytery of London licensed and ordained him as a minister of Word and Sacraments in 1951.

During the intervening years Mr. Colvin served congregations in British Columbia: Victoria, Armstrong, Salmon Arm. In Ontario he ministered to congregations in Brussels and Belgrave; Angus, Baxter and Ivy; Welland: Port Colborne; Markdale, Swinton Park, Feversham, Priceville and Dundalk.

He was widely known and respected as a minister, forthright, outspoken, self-confident, always contending for the truth of the Holy Scriptures as he saw it. Even those who found themselves in disagreement with him never questioned his honesty and respected the courage with which he stood by his convictions.

The largely attended funeral service was held on Friday, June 29, 1984 in The Donald G. May Funeral Home, Markdale, and was conducted by The Reverend R. Boaz, a friend of the deceased and formerly a minister of The Anglican Church in Markdale. Interment took place at Sundridge, Ontario.

Mr. Colvin is survived by his widow Ethel, sons David, Robert, Bruce, Donald, Kenneth and Keith; one grand-daughter Sarah, a sister Aletha and two brothers Gerald and Donald.
