FIRST SEDERUNT

At the City of Windsor, Ontario, and within St. Andrew's Church there, Saturday, the thirty-first day of May, in the year of our Lord, one thousand nine hundred eighty, at four o'clock in the afternoon:

Which place and time Ministers and Ruling Elders, Commissioners from the several Presbyteries of The Presbyterian Church in Canada, convened pursuant to appointment of the General Assembly held in the City of Sudbury, Ontario, on the third day of June last year.

The Rev. Kenneth G. McMillan, D.D., Moderator of the 105th General Assembly, assisted by the Rev. William Lawson, D.D., Minister of the host church, conducted public worship and preached a sermon on the text Isaiah 43:18-19, entitled The Majestic Purposes of God. According to the appointment, Dr. McMillan administered the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper. In this he was assisted by Dr. Lawson, the Rev. Joseph Riddell and the Rev. Charles A. Hammond, Moderator of the General Assembly of the United Presbyterian Church in the United States of America. The tables were served by Elders of St. Andrew's Church and Riverside Church.

Thereafter, with prayer, Dr. McMillan did constitute the General Assembly in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ, the only King and Head of the Church.

On behalf of the Committee to Advise with the Moderator and in accordance with the method determined by the Ninety-fifth General Assembly, Dr. John Ross moved, duly seconded the reception of the report of the Committee to Advise with the Moderator (Page 212) and the adoption of Recommendation No. 1 therein. The motion was adopted. On further motion of Dr. Lawson, duly seconded, it was agreed that Dr. Alex MacSween be declared elected Moderator of Assembly.

THANKS AND A CHALLENGE

Dr. McMillan commented briefly on his activities during the past year, expressing particular thanks for fellowship in peoples' homes and in the churches. He went on to put before the Assembly a call to repentance within The Presbyterian Church in Canada, a call to faith, and a call to recognize the seriousness of the spiritual warfare in which the Church is engaged.

INSTALLATION OF MODERATOR

Dr. Alex MacSween, having been conducted to the Chair by Dr. William Lawson and Dr. Robert Sinclair, mover and seconder of the motion to appoint Dr. MacSween as Moderator, was welcomed by Dr. McMillan.

Whereupon Dr. McMillan did by prayer call upon God to bless the newly elected Moderator and confer upon him strength and wisdom that he might discharge the duties of his office. He did then install him in the Moderator's Chair.

THANKS OF MODERATOR

Dr. MacSween expressed gratitude for the honour and responsibility placed upon him. He spoke of his pride in The Presbyterian Church in Canada and its commitment to spreading the gospel of Jesus Christ. Dr. MacSween also commented on the forty-two years of "team ministry" that he and his wife, Marie, had shared.

With the permission of Assembly, Dr. MacSween named Dr. Howard Doig as Chaplain to the Moderator.

WELCOME TO MODERATOR, U.P.C.U.S.A.

The Moderator noted the historic nature of this Assembly, being the first in which there is a joint meeting with a denomination outside of Canada. He welcomed the Reverend Charles A. Hammond, Moderator of the 192nd General Assembly of the United Presbyterian Church, U.S.A.

THANKS TO DR. McMILLAN

Mr. I. Wishart moved a sincere and hearty vote of commendation to Dr. Mc-Millan for his service to the Church, and for the sermon with which he had opened the Assembly. The motion was duly seconded and carried unanimously. The Moderator conveyed this commendation to Dr. McMillan.

PRESENTATION TO DR. AND MRS. MACSWEEN

Mr. Harry Durward presented a corsage to the Moderator's wife on behalf of the Moderator's brother, the Reverend Ian MacSween, and a gift was also made to the Moderator.

A. 1977 Guidelines

- 1. No application for a Special Assembly course may be recommended unless the applicant has attained the age of 35 years and not attained the age of 60 years as of June 1st of the year in which the application is to be considered.
- 2. Requirements for special General Assembly programmes shall be:
 - Age 35 40 10 courses in Arts, three years intramural study in Theology, 1 Biblical language may be assigned at the discretion of the Board.
 - Age 41 59
 5 courses in Arts, three years intramural study in Theology with exemption from the Biblical language requirement if desired by the applicant.

B. 1979 Proposed Guidelines

The Clerk of Assembly may then inform the Presbytery concerned that it may proceed to licence or ordain or induct as the case may be.

- 3. The Board of Education calls attention of Presbyteries to the Book of Forms 248, subsection VII and VIII and asks that Presbyteries emphasize the matters therein and especially the interrogation of applicants.

COMMITTEE ON LOYAL ADDRESSES

The Assembly called for a portion of the Report of the Committee on Loyal Addresses, which was presented by Mr. William R. Russell, Convener. Mr. Russell read to the joint Assemblies the following address to the President of the United States.

Mr President:

The One Hundred Sixth General Assembly of The Presbyterian Church in Canada, in an historic joint meeting with the One Hundred Ninety-Second General Assembly of the United Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, held today in Detroit, Michigan, wishes to convey to you and the American people the greetings and good wishes of 170,000 Canadian Presbyterians.

The easy neighbourliness of our two nations has long been an example to the rest of the world, and the crucial world events of recent months have proven again the inestimable value of our prayerful concern for, and active support of, one another.

Mindful of the tremendous personal burdens of world leadership, many of our people pray regularly for you, sir, and for the success of your government's efforts to free the American hostages in Iran and to preserve the peaceful balance of political power in Asia.

To paraphrase the closing lines of your great national hymn, set to music familiar to us as God Save the Queen:

Long may your land be bright With freedom's holy light, Protected by the might of God the King!

Dr. William Thompson read on behalf of the General Assembly of the United Presbyterian Church of the U.S.A. the following address:

The Right Honourable Pierre Elliott Trudeau Prime Minister of Canada

Mr. Prime Minister:

The One Hundred Ninety-Second General Assembly of the United Presbyterian Church in the United States of America in the first joint meeting with the One Hundred Sixth General Assembly of The Presbyterian Church in Canada, held today in Detroit, Michigan, avails itself of this unique opportunity to convey to you and to the Canadian people the greetings and good wishes of 2,500,000 Presbyterians situated in all fifty States of our nation.

We rejoice that the historic freedom of movement across our common border has encouraged us to undertake this meeting which demonstrates once again the goodwill which has so long prevailed between our two nations and peoples.

We wish to express our gratitude for the many evidences of friendship and mutual support which have characterized the relations between our two nations, most recently manifested in the aid given by your representatives in Iran to our fellow citizens who were in danger of being taken hostage there.

This heroic and humanitarian action has further enhanced the already high esteem in which your nation and people are held by us.

You may be assured that countless Presbyterians in the United States of America continue to pray regularly for you and for your fellow Canadians, especially at this time as you seek more intentionally for national unity and as you work with our nation and with people of good will throughout the world for lasting peace with justice for the citizens of all nations everywhere.

The combined assemblies responded by singing the hymn: Not Alone for Mighty Empire.

The United Presbyterian Church of the U.S.A. then adopted the above address.

Mr. Frank Whilsmith, Chairman of the 2nd Century Advance for Christ was unable to be present to present a report but the Moderator called forward Dr. M. Dymond and Mr. J.E. Smith and thanked them for their diligent work on behalf of the Second Century Advance for Christ, noting the telegram received from Mr. Whilsmith on tour in Seoul.

Recommendations 11, 12 and 13 were adopted.

RECOMMENDATION 14

The word "handicapped" was inserted before "refugee" in Recommendation 14 with permission of the Court.

Recommendation 14 was adopted.

On motion of Mr. John C. Carr, duly seconded, the Assembly recorded its appreciation to the Secretary of the Administrative Council for his leadership to the Church in the settlement of Vietnamese refugees.

FUND FOR MINISTERIAL ASSISTANCE

The Assembly called for the Report of the Appointors of the Fund for Ministerial Assistance, which was presented by Dr. A.W. Currie, Chairman, as follows:

The Fund for Ministerial Assistance reports that \$61,568 was distributed to an average of 131 eligible ministers and 216 children in 1979. Several special gifts were made to ministers in special need within the terms of the Fund. The gifts were at the increased rate of \$244. per eligible minister and \$65. per eligible child, per year. The Christmas Gift was at the rate of \$120. per eligible minister and \$25. per child.

The financial income has been increased due to the higher yield from the portfolio. The Appointors have increased the gift for 1980 to \$300. per eligible minister and \$76. per eligible child, per year. There has been a slight decrease in the numbers of eligible ministers, because self-supporting congregations are paying more than the General Assembly minimum and the Appointors trust that they will continue this practice.

The Appointors met twice in the year, February and December. The work is carried out by the staff of the Comptroller's Office and the Board of World Mission. Our gratitude is expressed to these servants of the Church for their efforts on behalf of the Fund.

The Donor shows a keen interest in the Church and its ministers and dependents. The Appointors are grateful for his generosity and know from the many letters received and forwarded to the donor that the recipients make good use of these extra funds during the year, and especially at Christmas time.

Dr. Currie then presented a brief history of the setting up and carrying out of the purposes of the Fund.

On motion of Dr. E.H. Bean, duly seconded, the report was received for information.

The Moderator thanked Dr. Currie for his interest in the Fund and asked that he convey the thanks of the Assembly to the Donor.

BOARD OF CONGREGATIONAL LIFE

The Assembly called for the Report of the Board of Congregational Life which, as printed (Pages 270 - 291), was presented by Dr. W. Adamson, Chairman. On motion of Mr. Ralph Kane, duly seconded, it was received and its recommendations considered seriatim.

RECOMMENDATION 3

In Paragraph A, page 273, the word "basis" was substituted for "foundation" with permission of the Court.

Recommendation 3 was adopted.

Mr. Raye Brown moved, duly seconded, an addition to Recommendation 3, ... "that the Committee to implement the strategy on church growth exercise special attention to a section on repentance and personal piety in the Church."

Carried.

RECOMMENDATIONS 4 - 6

RECOMMENDATIONS 7 - 12

Mr. Jim McKay moved in amendment to Recommendation 7 of the Board of Congregational Life, and replacing the subsequent recommendations 8 through 12:

That the functions and personnel of the Joint Task Force on Church Growth and the Special Committee on Doubling in the Eighties be merged as follows:

- (a) that the "Strategy for Church Growth" as approved by the General Assembly be the mandate for a merged committee.
- (b) that doubling our membership in the eighties constitute the overall target objective of this strategy.
- (c) that the new name for this merged committee be the "Growth in the Eighties" Committee.
- (d) that staff be assigned from within the two boards of World Mission and Congregational Life to include the equivalent of one full time person and one full time administrative assistant to co-ordinate the administrative functions of the Committee.

- (e) that the Boards of World Mission and Congregational Life review and reassign priorities within their present programs to ensure that personnel may be made available for the above staff requirements.
- (f) that funding for the new committee in 1980-81 come from existing budgets of the two boards together with a sum of \$40,000 for programming with the Administrative Council.
- (g) that the new committee report annually to the General Assembly through the Boards of World Mission and Congregational Life.

- Express its assurance to the families of those detained of its profound concern for their welfare and continuing prayer for their daily undergirding by Almighty God;
- 5. Express its hope that these cases may be speedily reviewed by those in positions of authority and responsibility in the Government of the Republic of China, in eager anticipation that Dr. Kao and the others may be released to return to their homes and positions of leadership;
- 6. Urge the Government of Canada and Canadian groups carrying on trade and commerce with Taiwan to find immediately effective ways to express Canada's concern that basic human rights are being denied to large groups of people in Taiwan.

- World service and development, etc. are words which I use to promote the total 2. concept of the General Assembly Budget in order to educate the Congregation in matters, concerns, and needs of our Church at home and overseas. Thus I feel the new name of the Committee will conflict with promotion and education pertaining to stewardship as it relates to the General Assembly Budget.
- I feel that many people today "take to" and respond favourably to ideas im-3. plied by such phrases as "Inter Church" (cooperating with other Christian denominations), "refugee" (a matter of immediate and visible emergency); and "world service" (which has been included in the former name of the Committee).
- It seems to me the proposed name, and now officially approved name of the 4. Committee will require a new education of our people as to what the "name" refers to specifically, whereas the former "name" was self-explanatory and has become very meaningful to our people.
- I hold some concern about the materials already in use for education and pro-5. motion under the former name of the Committee and wonder if such literature and materials will be of any use in the future unless it is all reprinted at great cost to include the new "name".

I regret that I cannot support Recommendation No. 1 of the said report, for reasons mentioned above and more which I could add; but I do promise to support and promote the good work of this valued Committee, regardless of what its "name" may be.

REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE RE: PARTICIPATION IN THE ORDINATION OF WOMEN, OVERTURES 3, 5, 10, 30 and MEMORIAL 1

The Assembly called for the report of the above Committee which was handed in by Mr. Peter Ruddell, Convener. On his motion, duly seconded, the report was received and its recommendations considered seriatim.

The report is as follows,

RE: OVERTURES 3, 5, 10, 30 and MEMORIAL 1 (1980)

We affirm that our theology of ministry has since 1966 included both women and men in the Order of Ministry of the Word and Sacrament.

We affirm that the Ministry of Word and Sacrament is an essential aspect of the Gospel ("how shall they hear without a preacher") and not merely peripheral to it as is implied in Overture No. 5 where ordination seems to be put in the category of "matters not of the essence of the Gospel."

We affirm that the ordination of women is a part of the doctrine of the Church which every minister is required to confess.

We affirm the liberty of conscience so magnificently set forth in the 20th chapter of the Westminister Confession of Faith. But we deny that this liberty of conscience is applicable to "such doctrine as the Church, in obedience to Scripture and under the promised guidance of the Holy Spirit may yet confess in its continuing function of reformulating the faith." (Book of Forms Section No. 409). The ordination of women clearly belongs to this category of doctrine.

We affirm that the confession of this doctrine carries with it the further requirement of participation in the act of ordination of all candidates, whether men or women.

We affirm that the strict application of the above would be ill-advised with respect to some present ministers and candidates for ordination in the light of the fact that the requirement that all teaching elders must participate in such ordinations has not been enjoined by any Assembly to this date. Therefore we allow an exception to be made in the case of those who will be ordained this year, and instruct the Presbytery of East Toronto to license Mr. D. McDougall.

We give notice to all concerned that no further exceptions will be made after 1980.

We decree that ordinands in 1980 and all ministers presently ministering within our Church who are opposed to ordination of women be excused from participation in such ordinations for a period of ten years provided they cooperate fully with all ministers and elders of the Church and abstain from prejudicing their people against the election of women to the ruling and teaching eldership.

RECOMMENDATION: That the above be the response of the 106th General Assembly to Overtures 3, 5, 10, 30 and Memorial No. 1.

RECOMMENDATION 1

Dr. W. Lawson moved, duly seconded, that the matter be deferred to a later sederunt. Defeated.

The Committee on Reception met twice during 1979 to consider an application from the Rev. John Robertson, to be received as a minister of The Presbyterian Church in Canada, and an application from Robert Anderson to be received as a licentiate. In both cases all Presbyteries were circularized and given two months to lodge a protest, if any. When no protest was received in the case of John Robertson, he was received as a minister of The Presbyterian Church in Canada. As a result of information lodged with the Committee in the case of Robert Anderson, permission was not given to have him received as a licentiate.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE RE: OVERTURES 23 and 31

The Assembly called for the Report of the above Committee which was handed in by Dr. J. C. Carr, Convener. On motion of Dr. Carr, duly seconded, it was agreed that the report be received and the recommendations be considered.

Recommendation 1

That the prayers of the Overtures be not granted and that this 106th General Assembly answer the overtures in the following terms:

- a) The 106th General Assembly affirms the importance of our continuing participation in the World Council of Churches. We note that the Program to Combat Racism is currently under a major critical review in which our Church is involved. We also note that evaluation of all W.C.C. work is a function of our denominations' representatives on the W.C.C.
- b) The 106th General Assembly notes the action taken by the 105th General Assembly which prohibited grants by The Presbyterian Church in Canada

to the W.C.C.'s Program to Combat Racism Special Fund unless individuals or congregations designate their offerings for that purpose (1979 A & P pp53-55 and 57-59).

c) The 106th General Assembly also draws attention to its actions on Recommendations 1 and 2 of the Committee on International Affairs as those recommendations were amended on the floor of Assembly.

Mr. Charles McGill moved in amendment that the prayer of Overture 23 be granted. Defeated.

Recommendation 1 was adopted.

Recommendation 2

That the Clerks of Assembly inform the Sessions of our Church of the actions taken on this matter by the 105th and 106th General Assemblies.

Recommendation 2 was adopted.

Mr. J. McIntosh moved, duly seconded, that the "Whereas" Clause 3 of Overture 23 be struck from the record of General Assembly, and that the Presbytery of Westminister be instructed to do the same with appropriate reasons.

The Supplementary motion was defeated.

Mr. Charles Congram was given permission to speak during the presentation of recommendations concerning church growth and doubling in the eighties.

RECOMMENDATIONS 7-12

Discussion resumed on the amendments to Board of Congregational Life Recommendations 7-12 presented in the Fifth Sederunt (page 46).

Mr. McKay was given permission to change his amendment to Recommendation 7 with the understanding that the amendment replaced 7 and subsequent recommendations 8, 9, 11 and 12. The changes were as follows:

After the words "the functions" (line 4) add "and personnel of the two groups into a new Joint Committee of the Boards of World Mission and Congregational

Life as follows:

- (a) that the "Strategy for Church Growth" as approved by this General Assembly be the mandate for a merged committee.
- (b) that doubling our membership in the eighties constitute the overall target objective of the strategy.
- (c) that the new name for this merged committee be the "GROWTH IN THE EIGHTIES" Committee.
- (d) that staff be assigned from within the two boards of World Mission and Congregational Life to include the equivalent of one full time person and one full time administrative assistant to co-ordinate the administrative function of the committee.
- (e) that the Boards of World Mission and Congregational Life review and reassign priorities within their present programs to ensure that personnel may be made available for the above staff requirements.
- (f) that funding for the new committee in 1980-81 come from existing budgets of the two boards, together with a sum of \$40,000.00 for programming, with the Administrative Council being given power to issue.
- (g) that the new committee report to the Boards of Congregational Life and World Mission, and that these two Boards arrange for a joint report to be presented annually to the General Assembly.
- (h) that the composition of this committee include five members from the Joint Task, five members from the C.O.D.E. five new members, with widest possible application of the principles of geographical representation and with the Chairman named by this Assembly.

CANADIAN FORCES CHAPLAINCY COMMITTEE

Mr. Jarvis moved, duly seconded, that material now handed in be included in the minutes. The motion carried and the material follows:

The churches of Canada have a significant presence in the armed forces of our nation and the five Protestant denominations, Anglican, Baptist, Lutheran, Presbyterian and United Churches have combined total of 91 chaplains serving.

Each year the Sunday Schools of the armed forces have a mission project, and the one chosen for 1979/80 was selected by the Presbyterian Church. It is designated as "The Children's Program of the Korean Christian Church, Osaka, Japan." The Motto which is being used is "Sharing Happiness". Last year the chapel Sunday Schools contributed over \$14,494.93 to a similar mission project that was chosen by the Lutheran Church, and it is anticipated the response to this year's project will be equally as generous. In addition to this it should also be noted that the chapel offerings on Canadian Forces Bases this past year which were donated to our General Assembly's Budget amounted to slightly over \$3,847.00.

Canadian Armed Forces Day is celebrated across Canada in June of each year and it is respectfully suggested that our ministers call the attention of our congregations at that time to the significant work and witness of our chaplains in the forces. They are carefully chosen by your committee and they are doing a splendid work; we can be proud of them.

RECOMMENDATION 12

Recommendation 12 was adopted.

SUPPLEMENTARY MOTION

Dr. J. A. Ross moved, duly seconded, the following supplementary motion:

That the Board of Ministry arrange a small conference of representatives from the four teaching colleges and from the Board of Education, with a view to developing policy and guidelines for teaching Presbyterian distinctives throughout the Church.

The motion carried.

On motion of Mr. H. H. Van Dyke, duly seconded, the Young Adult Observers present were granted leave to speak at this time. The Young Adult Observers made a presentation to the Moderator.

NOTICE OF MOTION

Mr. George Kingsborough moved that his notice of motion presented at the Seventh Sederunt (Page 64) re interprovincial and federal relations be considered.

The Court agreed to consider the matter. The motion, as found on Page 64, was presented, and was adopted.

NOTICE OF MOTION

Mr. Gordon Haynes moved, duly seconded, that his motion presented at the Sixth Sederunt (page 58) be considered. It was agreed that the matter of political and social tensions be considered. The motion was adopted unanimously.

The 106th General Assembly, in view of the present political and social tensions within our country, calls our people everywhere to repent for past and present sins between ourselves and our neighbours, and to strive for reconciliation amongst all people, empowered by the Spirit of God to act in love, regardless of the final political settlement, and commends this to all Sessions for prayerful consideration and action.

MR. PETER DE JONG

The Moderator called forward and greeted Mr. Peter De Jong of the Reformed Church now serving at the Valetta charge in the Presbytery of Chatham.

DISSENT

I record my dissent at the decision of the General Assembly in the case of the Rev. Edward O'Neill, believing that the Court has not investigated adequately all aspects of the case.

DISSENTS WITH REASONS

1. The affirmation that the "Ministry of Word and Sacrament" is an essential aspect of the Gospel is contrary to the teaching of the Church (W.C.F. XXV:2).

As the profession of "the true religion" (i.e. 'the Truth') is of the esse of the Church (para. 2), so "the ministry, oracles and ordinances of God" have been given for the bene of the Church (XXV:3). The ordained ministry exists for the good of the Church. Yet the Church can exist without an ordained ministry. To deny that ministry, Bible or ordinances are essential is not to affirm that they are peripheral. This statement is clearly in error doctrinally.

- 2. Our Church's teaching is that Christians have Liberty of Conscience in matters not supported by Scripture (W.C.F. XX:2) This statement denies that it is applicable to any regularly passed doctrine. Yet the qualification "in obedience to Scripture and under the promised guidance of the Holy Spirit" is the very question at issue. Many of our church have not been convinced by the arguments adduced by the proponents of the ordination of women that it is scriptural. It is such cases that W.C.F. XX:2 is intended to cover. Paragraph 4 of the statement clearly begs the issue (W.C.F. XXXI:3,4,) implies the infallibility of the courts, and denies the right of conscientious dissent to those who perceive Scripture differently.
- The reply does not deal satisfactorily with the difficult and complex questions
 raised in the four overtures and memorials. It contains a theological superficiality that trivializes the importance of the issues.
- 4. The 1990 terminus ad quem for an exemption of those with scruples of conscience concerning the Scriptural propriety of ordaining women is a dangerous and irregular precedent based on expediency rather than on any principle.
- 5. No opportunity was given to amend, correct or polish the report before sending it out. On a serious potentially divisive issue, any statement with the force of a General Assembly declaratory act (although it was never so called) ought to be most carefully thought out and constructed.
- 6. The effect of the refusal to deal frankly with the difficulties of those who feel this practice unscriptural, and the increasingly coercive pressure upon them, can only be divisive, and drive out of our fellowship some of God's choice people, and weaken the unity and witness of our Church at the outset of our emphasis on growth.

DISSENT

I wish to record my dissent with regard to the Assembly's acceptance of the recommendation of the Special Committee concerning Overtures 3, 5, 10, 30 and Memorial 1 (1980). The Committee's attempt at compromise is equitable only in the sense that it hurts all parties to the case equally.

 Ministers of the Church who cannot in good conscience ordain women are now under inappropriate pressure to change their views or forsake their office. For some this will involve no small trauma.

- 2. The Synod of Toronto and Kingston and the Presbytery of East Toronto have had their decisions overturned by an Assembly which has spent considerably less care and time with the matter than these lower courts. The Committee has made no mention of the "conscience" of the Synod and Presbytery.
- 3. Women Elders and Ministers of the Church must endure a further ten years of only partial recognition, with opposition to their orders being given an unprecedented official status by this Assembly.
- 4. The candidate concerning whom the appeals were presented must accept ordination with the possibility that his office will be terminated in ten years if his views remain unchanged.

A more decisive verdict on the Assembly's part would be more kind. The tenyear "limbo" before "graduation" is cruel and unusual punishment. I therefore conclude the report of the Special Committee is not a compromise but a decision unnecessarily punitive.

Announcements having been made, the Moderator adjourned the Assembly to meet on the same day, and in the same place, and at two o'clock in the afternoon, of which public intimation was made, and this Sederunt was closed by the Moderator with the Benediction.

ELEVENTH SEDERUNT

At Windsor, Ontario, and within Ambassador Auditorium, University of Windsor there, on Friday, the sixth day of June, in the year of our Lord, one thousand nine hundred eighty, at two o'clock in the afternoon, the General Assembly met pursuant to adjournment and was constituted by the Moderator with prayer.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON BUSINESS

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on Business which was given in and read by Dr. R.P. Carter, the Convener. On motion of Mr. Basil Lowery, duly seconded, it was received and considered and, being adopted, the business for the Eleventh Sederunt was ordered accordingly.

COMMITTEE ON REMITS

The Moderator called for the Report of the Committee on Remits which as printed (Pages 380 - 382) was presented by Mrs. F. Palmer. On her motion, duly seconded, the Report was received, and its Recommendations considered seriatim.

REMIT A Re-draft: Sections 205-212, Book Forms - Licensing

Sufficient Presbyteries have approved this remit to permit this Assembly to adopt this legislation.

Recommendation 1: That this legislation be approved. The recommendation was adopted, and the above sections in the book of forms were changed to the following:

LICENSING OF STUDENTS:

That the following Sections 205 - 210 replace the present Sections 205 - 212 Book of Forms:

- 205(a) Any student of theology and candidate for the ministry of The Presbyterian Church in Canada, and studying in one of our Church's Theological Colleges may, on application in writing to the Clerk of Presbytery before the December 31st prior to graduation be taken on trials for license by:
 - 1. The Presbytery in which the College is situated, or
 - 2. The Presbytery of most recent certification, if the latter has maintained oversight for two summers or two years, or

3. The Presbytery of first certification.

Such application shall be transmitted to or through the clerk of the Presbytery in which the College is situated. If application for trials is not made elsewhere, or is not acted upon, the Presbytery in which the College is situated shall take the applicant on trials for license. If the Presbytery to which application is made deem it expedient, and with the request and consent of the applicant and for good cause shown, the application and all relevant documents shall be transferred to another Presbytery. It is the responsibility of the applicant to ensure that the application is dealt with in accordance with the above regulations.

- 205 (b) If the applicant for licensure has studied wholly in a theological College other than one of this Church's Theological Colleges or is currently in the final year in such a college, application shall be made by the Presbytery through the Board of Education to the General Assembly for permission to take such on trials for license. The applicant will submit official transcripts of courses taken with the application and the Board of Education will satisfy itself through reference of these to the senate of one of our Theological Colleges that the course of studies meets the theological prescription and perspective of this Church. In cases of such applicants, the Presbytery applying to take on trials for license is required to circularize the Presbyteries to this effect not less than two clear months previous to the meeting of the Assembly.
- 206 (a) The Presbytery may begin examination of applicants at any time after application is received. In the trials, the Presbytery shall make careful enquiry as to the applicant's personal religion, motivation and aptitude for the ministry, based on the record, academic and practical of the applicant, and on interview and examination. It may, with the applicant's permission, avail itself of such evaluative statements as are forthcoming from other agencies and bodies of the Church. Presbyteries may conduct trials for license, if desired through a Committee, but members of the court may state their views at any stage before the vote to sustain the trials is taken.
 - (b) The Trials for licensure shall embrace the elected Biblical language and the core subjects outlined in the report of the Committee on the Structure of Theological Education (Acts and Proceedings 1969, p.44; 352), as well as the applicant's practical skills. But the Presbytery may accept the testamur of the College as proof of proficiency in these matters and dispense with examination in any or all of these subjects, it may assign primary responsibility for examination in each area to particular members of the court.
 - (c) Licensure shall take place only after certification from the Senate of one of this Church's Theological Colleges that;
 - 1. The applicant has completed the course prescribed or assigned or approved by this Church.
 - The applicant has given satisfactory evidence of the requisite practical gifts and skills of the Ministry, and

The applicant's character and conduct are suitable to the position of a candidate for the Ministry.

An applicant having completed studies in a college other than one of this Church shall present an equivalent certificate from that Theological College.

- If the trials are not sustained, Presbytery may prescribe new trials and initiate them after a period of not less than three months has elapsed, or otherwise dispose of the case as it sees fit. The applicant remains under the care of the Presbytery unless transferred to another Presbytery for trials.
- If the trials are sustained, the Presbytery proceeds to license the applicant in the following manner:
 - 1. The questions prescribed for license (Section 411) and a further question as to willingness to sign the formula when called upon to do so are put to the applicant, satisfactory answers being given.
 - 2. The Moderator engages in prayer, and then addresses the applicant in words to the following effect: "In the name of the Lord Jesus Christ, the only King and Head of the Church, and by authority of this Presbytery, I license you to preach the gospel within its bounds, or whereever God in His Providence may order your lot". The Moderator then gives counsel in suitable terms, and the clerk is instructed to give the applicant an extract of license.
- An applicant, under trials for license, may, for good cause shown be transferred to another Presbytery at any state of the same.
- In the event of an appointment under the Board of World Mission having been received and accepted, the applicant may, on being licensed, also be ordained as a minister of The Presbyterian Church in Canada by the Presbytery to which the applicant is appointed, or the licensing Presbytery or by another Presbytery upon permission being obtained so to do from the applicable Presbytery above.

REMIT B Session Minutes, Rec. 1 Clerks of Assembly, 1979.

Sufficient Presbyteries have approved this remit to permit this Assembly to adopt this legislation.

Recommendation 2: That this legislation be adopted.

The recommendation was adopted with Section 27 (i), Book of Forms being replaced by:

27 (i) pages commonly called loose-leaf (typewritten mimeographed, printed or otherwise produced) are permissible. Minutes shall be on paper of such quality so as to prevent the ink showing on the opposite side, and shall be temporarily bound in a commercial-type binder of the rigid fastener form. The ring type of book is not acceptable.

REMIT C Session Minutes, Rec. 2 Clerks of Assembly, 1979.

Sufficient Presbyteries have approved this remit to permit this Assembly to adopt this legislation.

Recommendation 3: That this legislation be adopted.

This recommendation was adopted, and the following was added in the Book of Forms:

That a new section 27(j) be added to the Book of Forms: Minutes of Kirk Sessions shall not be reproduced, and the single copy shall be produced by the Clerk of Session. When agreed to by the Session a summary of minutes composed under the supervision of the Moderator and the Clerk, and containing only material judged by the composers to be suitable for distribution to all members of the session, may be prepared and thus distributed.

REMIT D Session Minutes, Rec.3, Clerks of Assembly, 1979.

Sufficient Presbyteries have approved this remit to permit this Assembly to adopt this legislation.

Recommendation 4: That this legislation be adopted.

This recommendation was adopted, with a new section 27(k) being added to the Book of Forms as follows:

Any vacant spaces, except ordinary space between paragraphs, shall be stroked through and initialled by the Clerk.

REMIT E Session Minutes, Rec.4, Clerks of Assembly, 1979.

Sufficient Presbyteries have approved this remit to permit this Assembly to adopt this legislation.

Recommendation 5: That this legislation be adopted.

This recommendation was adopted, with a new section 27(1) being added to the Book of Forms as follows:

Ordinarily when the pages of the minutes total one hundred, they shall be bound commercially in book form, with the minutes of the last meeting recorded being complete in this commercial binding. Session minutes shall be bound under close scrutiny of the Clerk to secure secrecy of the minutes.

REMIT F Interim Part-Time Supply

Sufficient Presbyteries have approved this remit to permit this Assembly to adopt this legislation.

Recommendation 6: That this legislation be adopted.

The recommendation was adopted, and the section in the Book of Forms was changed as follows:

That the phrase "full or part time" be deleted from Section 176 (1) (a), Book of Forms.

REMIT G Age re Election to the Eldership

This legislation has been rejected by Presbyteries.

The Assembly agreed that no action be taken.

REMIT H Rec. 9, Board of World Mission, 1979.

Sufficient Presbyteries have approved this remit to permit this Assembly to adopt this legislation.

Recommendation 7: That this legislation be adopted.

The recommendation was adopted, with the addition, as follows:

That the following be added as Section 176 (1) (g), Book of Forms:

"Who are ordained ministers serving within the bounds of the Presbytery under appointment by the Board of World Mission, and who have been sent by their overseas Church, and received by the Board of World Mission as missionaries to The Presbyterian Church in Canada".

On motion of Mrs. Palmer, duly seconded, the report as a whole of the Committee on Remits, with its recommendations, was adopted.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE RE OVERTURES 1, 27

The Assembly called for the Report of the above Committee which was handed in by Mr. Robert Garvin, Convener. On his motion, duly seconded, it was agreed to receive and consider the following report:

Overture 1, p. 452, Re: 105th General Assembly Church Doctrine recommendations.

- 1. Ministers on appendix given right to sit and correspond;
- 2. Presbytery to examine appendix to roll to ensure that ministers thereon have not in fact forsaken their ministry.

General Assembly agreed to regard as an interim act and transmit to Presbyteries under Barrier Act. However, counsel re examining appendix did not go down to Presbyteries.

Overture 1 requests 106th General Assembly to counsel Presbyteries to maintain the appendix under constant review invoking and applying Section 251 re those who neither function as ministers of the word and sacraments nor hold themselves accountable to or participate in the life and work of the Presbytery.

Recommendation:

That the prayer of Overture 1 be granted. Carried.

Overture 27 p.461

- Re: (1) Clarification BF 176 (1) (e) meaning of "rendering active service".
 - (2) Authorizing Presbyteries to determine their own constituent roll without prior reference to General Assembly.

1. Recommendation:

Prayer of this section of the Overture be granted in terms of Clerks' report, page 217, 3rd paragraph "We can take . . . roll again". Carried.

2. (a) Ministers are ordained to the ministry of Word and Sacrament of the Holy Catholic Church and serve within the context of The Presbyterian Church

in Canada. Accordingly, oversight of Roll of her ministers should not be a local responsibility but that of the entire Church, the General Assembly.

- (b) We feel concern that if Presbytery had the right to place ministers on the roll apart from the General Assembly we could well have 44 different interpretations of reception requirements ranging from Presbyteries which are very strict to those who are very lax. We at present have one standard administered by the General Assembly.
- (c) We feel that undue pressure, division and stress could be placed upon smaller Presbyteries if they had the responsibility of deciding their constituent roll. Small courts not infrequently have younger, inexperienced ministers. The present practice of reception through the General Assembly relieves possible pressure and problems.

Recommendation:

We recommend that the prayer of part 2 of Overture 27 be not granted.

TO TAKE IMMEDIATE VOTE

It was moved by Mr. Alex MacDonald, duly seconded, that an immediate vote be taken, and the motion being put was carried.

The Recommendation was adopted.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE RE: APPEAL OF MR. SIU-MAN LEE

The Assembly called for the Report of the above Committee which was handed in by Mr. Peter McKague, convener. On his motion, duly seconded, it was agreed that a Commission of General Assembly be appointed to deal with the petition of Mr. Siu-Man Lee against the Presbytery of Vancouver Island.

On motion of Dr. E.H. Bean, duly seconded, the Special Committee was directed to bring back terms of reference for this Commission.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE RE APPEAL OF MR. CALVIN CHAMBERS

The Assembly called for the Report of the above Committee, which was handed in by Mr. J. R. Duke in the absence of the convener. On his motion, duly seconded, it was agreed that the following report be received and considered:

Having reviewed the written reports of the Presbytery of Westminster, and discussed the matter of Mr. Chambers' request with Commissioners of said Presbytery present at Assembly, and having satisfied itself that the Presbytery of Westminister has reviewed Mr. Chambers' request in a thorough and competent manner, this special committee concurs with the findings of the Presbytery of Westminster that Mr. Chambers at this time has not met the requirements for reinstatement to membership in The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

This Committee therefore recommends to Assembly that Mr. Chambers' request be not granted.

The recommendation was adopted, as was the report as a whole.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE RE OVERTURE 20

The Assembly called for the Report of the above Committee which was handed in by Mr. Ross Davidson, in the absence of the Convener. On his motion, duly seconded, it was agreed that the prayer of the overture be granted in the following terms:

- 1. That publication of the "Treasurer's Handbook" by the Comptroller's Office will assist in informing congregations of the requirements of the Department of National Revenue.
- 2. That presbyteries take steps to inform congregations of the intent of Public Information Return Form T3010, and the Annual Information Return Form T2052, and of the consequence of failure to file such forms properly.
- 3. That presbyteries promote training and assistance to Treasurers by such means as workshops and presbytery visitation.
- 4. That the appropriate Board(s) of the General Assembly correspond with other Canadian church organizations, such as the Canadian Council of Churches, in regard to this matter.

REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE RE OVERTURE 33

The Assembly called for the Report of the above Committee which was handed in by Mr. Glenn Noble, convener.

Mr. Noble moved, duly seconded, that the reply of the 106th General Assembly to Overture 33 from the Presbytery of Calgary-Macleod re: An Itinerary Committee for the Moderator be as follows:

That the concerns of the overture be communicated to future Moderators elect as soon as it is known who the official nominee will be, and that they be encouraged as soon as possible thereafter to confer with the Clerks of Assembly and the Board of World Mission re: requests and itinerary so that a preliminary schedule might be made available during the sitting of the Assembly.

Mr. Alex MacDonald moved in amendment, duly seconded, that the prayer of the overture be not granted. The amendment was carried, and becoming the main motion, was adopted.

DR. LOWRY EXCUSED

At the request of Dr. Lowry, the Moderator excused him from the Court during the consideration of the appeal of Mr. T.O. McAllister.

REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE RE: APPEAL OF MR. T. O. McALLISTER

The Assembly called for the Report of the above Committee which was handed in by Dr. William Lawson, Convener. On motion of Dr. Lawson, duly seconded, it was agreed that the report be received and its recommendations considered seriatim.

RECOMMENDATION 1

That a Commission of Assembly be established to hear the appeal of Mr. T.O. McAllister from the decision of the Presbytery of Brampton to refuse to initiate judicial proceedings; that the Commission meet without undue delay with both parties separately and jointly; and rule in the matter; that the Commission also determine whether or not it is possible under the laws of the church and/or advisable to grant Mr. McAllister a "fresh trial" in the case of his removal as a member of Session; and that the Commission consist of Mr. James Peter Jones, Guelph, Ont., Mr. Peter J. Walter, Hamilton, Ont., Ministers, and Mr. John Laing, Burlington and Mr. David Jack, Q.C. Fergus, Elders, with Dr. D. C. MacDonald, Principal Clerk, as consultant.

Dr. Lawson moved, duly seconded, that Recommendation 1 be adopted. The motion carried.

RECOMMENDATION 2

That Mr. McAllister be advised that, since no judicial proceedings were undertaken either by the Presbytery of Brampton or by the Commission of the 104th General Assembly there are no "Judicial Records" to be furnished anyone, and that the decision of the Presbytery Commission "in retentis" was properly taken and is not subject to appeal.

Dr. Lawson moved, duly seconded, that Recommendation 2 be adopted. Motion carried.

The Report as a whole, with recommendations, was adopted on motion of Dr. Lawson, duly seconded.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON BILLS AND OVERTURES

Consideration of the Report on Bills and Overtures was resumed, Dr. A. A. Bethune, Convener, reporting.

Dr. Bethune moved, duly seconded, that the 106th General Assembly go on record that no court or person shall circularize to the Church materials related to overtures, petitions, memorials, etc. which have been received by the Clerks for transmission to the next General Assembly.

TO TAKE IMMEDIATE VOTE

It was moved by Dr. William Lawson, duly seconded, that an immediate vote be taken, and the motion being put was carried.

The motion was adopted.

TIME AND PLACE OF FUTURE ASSEMBLIES

Dr. Sinclair moved, duly seconded, that the recommendation of his committee be adopted. This was adopted as follows:

That the 107th General Assembly of The Presbyterian Church in Canada be convened in Knox Church, Ottawa on the first Sunday in June, 1981, using the facilities of the University of Ottawa for housing and accommodation.

The following part of the report was presented for information as tentative suggestions:

- (a) 1981 Knox Church, Ottawa, with housing and business accommodation in University of Ottawa.
- (b) 1982 St. Andrew's Toronto, with housing and business facilities in Knox College.
- (c) 1983 Tentative plan was to meet in Stratford, but this was checked out and for various reasons found inadequate. Stratford as a site is cancelled.
- (d) 1983 St. Andrew's, Kingston, intended for 1984, was then accepted for consideration as a site for 1983. The plan, therefore, for 1983 is for St. Andrew's, Kingston, with housing and business accomodation in Queen's University.
- (e) 1984 No invitation to date.
- (f) 1985 Invitation to St. Andrew's, Lethbridge.
- (g) 1986 Meet conjointly in First Presbyterian Church, New Glasgow, and First Presbyterian Church, Pictou, both celebrating their 200th Anniversary.

Dr. Sinclair moved, duly seconded, that this report as a whole, with recommendations, be adopted.

RECESS

RECOMMENDATION 17

Miss E. Murdoch moved, duly seconded, in terms of earlier notice of motion (page 42) that the name of the General Assembly Budget be reconsidered. Carried.

Mr. R. Cochrane moved, duly seconded, that Recommendation 17 be referred back to the Board of Congregational Life to report to the next Assembly. Defeated.

TO TAKE IMMEDIATE VOTE

It was moved by Mr. R. Rahn, duly seconded, that an immediate vote be taken, and the motion being put, was carried.

Recommendation 17 was defeated.

RECOMMENDATIONS 18 to 25

Re the preamble to Recommendation 18, "3(c)" was changed to "15(c)". Re the preamble to Recommendation 21, Dr. Adamson noted the passing of Mr. J. Laing in May, 1980.

Recommendations 18 to 25 were adopted.

RECOMMENDATION 26

Mr. G. Doran moved, duly seconded, in terms of notice of motion (page 42) that the constitution of the Consultation on Church and Society be reconsidered. Carried.

Recommendation 26 was adopted.

Mr. Ralph Kane then addressed the Court as follows,

Moderator, Members of Assembly, I move that the following tribute to Dr. W. J. Adamson, retiring Chairman of the Board of Congregational Life, be adopted:

DR. W. J. ADAMSON

Dr W. J. Adamson has been a member of the Board of Congregational Life since its beginning, and for the last three years he has been its Chairman. As he leaves the Board, its members wish to record their gratitude for the leadership Bill has given. His keen perception and balanced judgment have served the Board well during its formative years. His vision of the Board as a close-knit family dedicated to the service of the Church at large has endeared him to his fellow members, and earned the respect of all with whom he has worked. His colleagues wish to say "thanks for a job well done".

The above motion was adopted, and the Moderator extended thanks to Dr. Adamson.

On motion of Mr. Kane, duly seconded, the report as a whole of the Board of Congregational Life, with its recommendations, as amended, was adopted.

REPORT OF THE ADMINISTRATIVE COUNCIL

The Report of the Administrative Council was resumed, Dr. D. C. MacDonald reporting in the absence of the Chairman. The Assembly had before it the amendment of Mr. James McKay to Recommendation 4.

The amendment was defeated.

Recommendation 4 was adopted.

Dr. A. A. Bethune moved, duly seconded, that the rearranging of the responsibilities of all concerned and the financing of the work of St. Andrew's Hall with reference to the Vancouver School of Theology, in consultation with all boards and committees presently examining the related problems, be referred to the Board of St. Andrew's Hall for action.

The motion carried.

On motion of Mr. G. McCutcheon, duly seconded, the Court adopted the Report as a whole of the Administrative Council, with its recommendations, as amended.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF WORLD MISSION

Consideration of the Report of the Board of World Mission was resumed, Mr. George Malcolm reporting in the absence of the Chairman.

RECOMMENDATIONS 21 - 27

Recommendations 21 - 27 were adopted.

The Court noted that this has been Mr. J. J. H. Morris' final year as Chairman of the Board of World Mission, and appropriate thanks were expressed.

TAIWAN SITUATION

Mr. E. F. Roberts moved, duly seconded, that this Assembly record its distress on learning that a military court in Taiwan has given a seven year sentence to Dr. C. M. Kao, General Secretary of the Presbyterian Church in Taiwan, and

to express to the Government of the Republic of China its sincere hope that Dr. Kao's sentence will be quickly reviewed and that he will soon be released to return to his home and position as General Secretary of the Presbyterian Church in Taiwan.

The motion was adopted unanimously. The Moderator then led in prayer for Dr. Kao and his family.

REPORT AS A WHOLE

On motion of Mr. Roberts, duly seconded, the Court adopted the Report as a whole of the Board of World Mission, with its recommendations, as amended.

REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE RE OVERTURE 7

The Assembly called for the Report of the above Committee which was handed in by Mr. Calvin Brown in the absense of the Convener. It was agreed that the following report be received, and its recommendation be adopted.

The Overture from Presbytery of Winnipeg asks that the Book of Forms, Section 176 (2) (b), be changed so that equalizing elders may be elected biennually and so serve for a period of two years, which would enable them to make "the maximum contribution" to the work of the court.

We agree that members of a Presbytery are probably able to contribute more meaningfully to the work of the court as with the passage of time they become better informed about both procedure and the various facets of the work about which that Presbytery is especially concerned. In order to make a "maximum" contribution, however, an elder ought probably to be a member of Presbytery for several years, particularly in Presbyteries encompassing larger urban areas.

It seems to us, however, that a Presbytery may, if it sees fit find ways and means to secure a term of service of two or more years within the framework of the present wording of Section 176 (2) (b). This section requires annual election of equalizing elders, with the privilege of electing to be rotated to each session. A Presbytery which wishes to do so can secure a term of two years on the basis of an annual election by deciding to rotate the privilege only every second year. Furthermore, since a vacancy in a pastorate will change the balance between ministers and elders in the presbytery, and so remove the need for an equalizing elder, retaining appointment on an annual basis seems reasonable.

Recommendation:

That the above statement be the answer to the prayer of Overture 7.

REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON OVERTURE 21

The Assembly called for the Report of the above Committee which was handed in by Mr. John Vaudry in the absence of the Convener. On his motion, duly seconded, the report was received and considered.

The Committee was sympathetic to the concern voiced through this Overture. On brief consultation with the Convener of the Board of Ministry, it was felt that this concern would best be considered by the Board in "conjunction with their present study and evaluation of guidance conferences and related matters of oversight of candidates for the ministry. (cf. Board of Ministry, 1980, Report, p. 349 under "future plans".)

Recommendation:

That Overture 21 (1980, Presbytery of Hamilton) be referred to the Board of Ministry for study and report to the 107th General Assembly.

The recommendation, and the report as a whole, were adopted, on motion of Mr. J. Vaudry, duly seconded.

The Assembly called for the Report of the above Committee which was handed in by Mr. W. J. O. Isaac, Convener. On his motion, duly seconded, the report was received, and considered.

On motion of Mr. D. N. Young, duly seconded, the matter was referred to the Senates of the Colleges and the Board of Ewart College.

REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE RE OVERTURE 36, 37

The Assembly called for the Report of the above Committee which was handed in by Dr. Ted Olson, Convener. On motion of Dr. Olson, duly seconded, the report was received and its recommendations considered.

This recommendation was also adopted.

This report as a whole was adopted.

On motion of Mr. T. Smith, duly seconded, the Court agreed that the evening sederunt start at six forty-five.

ADJOURNMENT

Announcements having been made, the Moderator adjourned the Assembly to meet on the same day, in the same place, at six forty-five o'clock, of which due intimation was made, and he did then pronounce the Benediction.

The Moderator led the Assembly in prayer. Then he said: "In the name of the Lord Jesus Christ, the only King and Head of the Church, and by the authority of this Assembly, I now dissolve this Assembly and appoint another General Assembly of The Presbyterian Church in Canada to meet in Knox Church, in the City of Ottawa, and within the Province of Ontario, on the first Sunday in June in the year of our Lord, one thousand nine hundred eighty one, at eight o'clock in the evening, local time."

The Moderator then closed the sessions of the Assembly with the Apostolic Benediction.

COMMISSION

The Commission appointed by the 106th General Assembly to deal with items that may have been overlooked hereby reports that no chairman was named for the Committee on "Church Growth to Double in the Eighties." The Commission agreed that the Principal Clerk of Assembly should call the first meeting of the Committee, and that the Committee, at its first meeting would name its chairman.

MINUTE OF APPRECIATION

The 1979-80 academic session marks the end of a distinguished thirty-threeyear-long teaching career for Dr. H. Keith Markell at The Presbyterian College and McGill University.

Professor H. Keith Markell graduated with his Bachelor of Arts degree from McGill University in 1938 and was the gold medallist in History. The quotation which accompanied his graduation picture was: "If looking back gives you no gain, then many men have lived in vain." Keith Markell took this saying to heart and made the study and teaching of history, specifically Church history, his life work. When he graduated from The Presbyterian College in 1941 he was the Robert J. Drysdale Gold Medallist in Church History. After ordination and service in two pastoral charges, Dr. Markell returned to the College in 1947 as Lecturer in Church History and in 1950 he was appointed Professor of Church History. When The Presbyterian College joined its sister affiliated colleges within the Faculty of Religious Studies at McGill in 1969 he became a member of the Department of Church History playing a significant role especially as Chairman of the Bachelor of Theology programme committee.

A generation of ministers of our Church and of the Anglican and United Churches have profited greatly from his wide knowledge and his careful scholarship.

He has written a short history of Canadian Presbyterianism and recently completed a history of the Faculty of Religious Studies. Over the years, Dr. Markell has made a splendid contribution to the life and work of The Presbyterian College. The Senate and Faculty, indeed our whole Church, owe him a great debt of gratitude. His loyalty and dedication, his wit and wisdom will be greatly missed by students and staff alike.

ANSWER TO THE DISSENT OF D.L. CAMPBELL & OTHERS

Paragraph one of this dissent denies that the ordained ministry is an essential aspect of the gospel, but offers no scriptural evidence for this view. The Westminster Confession of Faith 25:3 is cited, but this reference clearly teaches the essential nature of the ministry. It declares that Christ not only gives the ministry but joins Himself to it, — "doth by His own Presence and Spirit make [it] effectual." A ministry in which Christ is present and active cannot be other than essential to the gospel of which He is the soul and centre. The dissent makes no mention of Romans 10:14-17 where the essential union of the gospel and ministry is set forth and where the absolute need of the gospel for the ministry is set forth.

In Paragraph 2 of this dissent the authors seem to suggest that since they and others do not accept the ordination of women as scriptural, the issue as to whether it is or not, is somehow still in doubt. The truth is that this issue was resolved by the Church "in obedience to scripture and under the promised guidance of the Holy Spirit", and incorporated into the doctrine of this Church by the 92nd General Assembly. It is no longer an open question, but settled doctrine.

It is impossible for the Church in the long run to permit liberty of conscience on a matter of doctrine which so vitally affects the life and practice of the Church.

The appeal of the dissent to the Westminster Confession of Faith 20: 2 which states that "nothing contrary to the Word or 'beside' it can be held to be essential," is not relevant to the case, for The Presbyterian Church in Canada considers that the ordination of women is NOT contary to the Word or beside it but is in conformity with the Word and is part of that Ministry of Word and Sacrament which is an essential aspect of the gospel.

The dissent also makes reference to Westminster Confession of Faith 31: 3&4 and states that the Committee's report "implies the infallibility of Church Courts." Nothing in the report justifies such an interpretation. It is surely wrong to imply that the Church which has already given 14 years, and proposes to give a further 10 year period for study, prayer and reflection on this matter is guilty of requiring "an implicit faith and an absolute and blind obedience."

Paragraph 3 and 6 are expressions of opinion not requiring a reply. Paragraph 4 will be answered in the reply to the dissent of Mr. D.C. Cooper.

Paragraph 5 complains that "no opportunity was given to amend, correct or polish the report..." To this it must be pointed out that some of the authors of the dissent addressed the Assembly and could have moved amendments or motions to defer or refer. In the event they contented themselves with seeking the defeat of the motion to approve the report.

ANSWER TO THE DISSENT OF D.C. COOPER

The Special Committee's Report is not a compromise as this dissent suggests. The Report draws out the full implications of the decision of the 92nd General Assembly to authorize the ordination of women. It leaves no doubt that Ministers of the Word and Sacraments must recognize and participate in the ordination of women.

The ten year period of grace does not compromise the principle enunciated in the first five affirmations of the Report. Periods of grace are common even in the commercial world and are never understood to compromise the principle that payment is due on a fixed date. If the world of commerce can extend periods of grace how much more appropriate that such periods of grace be offered in the Church of Jesus Christ.

If there had been no grace period allowed, ministers "who cannot in good conscience ordain women" would have indeed been put "under inappropriate pressure to change their views or forsake their office", without being given a reasonable time for study, reflection and prayer.

The grace period affords to such brothers, who on reflection are still unable to ordain women, the opportunity to make the necessary change in the jurisdication of their ministry and to do so without undo haste.

It is asserted by this dissent that the Assembly "spent considerably less care and time with the matter than these lower courts". This is an unproven assertion and casts a demeaning reflection upon the 106th General Assembly. With respect to the lower courts involved we draw attention to the fact that the conscience of these courts were not matters properly before the Special Committee or the Assembly.

The Report of the Special Committee and the decision of the Assembly insists in the plainest possible language on the validity of the ordination of women and accorded to their ordination complete recognition. At the same time opposition to their ordination was specifically restricted (see Paragraph of Special Report).

It is opinion only and not fact that "a more decisive verdict... would be more kind". The opposite opinion, held by a large majority of Commissioners, is that the verdict of the Assembly was both decisive and generous.

THE ADMINISTRATIVE COUNCIL

To the Venerable the 106th General Assembly:

PREAMBLE

Each year the Administrative Council meets for three days in the last week of March, or in the first week of April, and within another week this report is required to be sent to the printer so that those who now read it will have it to read. So here it is April Fool's Day, and I am trying to record what came out of three days of serious consideration of how to do as much as possible in Canada and Overseas for the building of the Church in our day. We knew we came through 1979 with a slight surplus, but the best planning for 1980 left us facing a deficit of \$291,736.00. Most of the time was spent in trying to keep the 1981 deficit as close to zero as possible. But there is no item in the 1981 Budget to cover the deficit anticipated for 1980. How nice our meeting would have been if we could have agreed to do all the things we were urged to do! But a realistic look at what we could expect to receive gave us little room to manoeuver. We hope that those who read this report will plan, work and give enough to enable the Kingdom of our Lord and Saviour to grow and consolidate in the decade into which we have now entered. It would be so easy if everyone did what he/she could do.

MATTERS REFERRED TO THE COUNCIL BY PREVIOUS ASSEMBLIES

Items approved by the 105th General Assembly and referred to the Council with power to issue

BUDGET FOR CHURCH ARCHITECTURE COMMITTEE

The Council concurred in the decision of the Assembly to set the budget of the above Committee at \$1,500,00 for 1980.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 1 A

That the above be received for information.

TRAVEL ALLOWANCES

The Council concurred in the decision of the Assembly to affirm the Board of World Mission recommendation re basic travel increase from \$1,200.00 to \$1,500.00 per annum, and that the Sunday mileage rate be increased from \$19.00 per Sunday round trip to \$22.00, and that the other mileage allowance be increased from 12ϕ to 15ϕ per mile, effective January 1, 1980.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 2 A

That the above be received for information.

APPOINTMENTS TO THE TRUSTEE BOARD

The Assembly gave permission to the Administrative Council to name persons to fill the vacancies on the Trustee Board and Dr. Donald Corbett, Mr. W.D.

Morison, Dr. Douglas Stewart, and Mr. Campbell Burgess, Q.C., Chairman, were duly named to replace those retiring because of years of service.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 3 A

That the above be received for information.

SALARY OF THE DEAN OF ST. ANDREW'S HALL

This matter was referred to the Council by the 105th General Assembly, and correspondence was entered into with officials of St. Andrew's Hall, as well as with Dr. John Ross. At the writing of this report the Council considers it needs more information, but hopes to be in a position to issue this item at its May meeting of the Executive, in time to make a supplementary report to the Assembly.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 4 A

That the above report be received as one of progress.

OVERTURE NO. 6, PRESBYTERY OF EAST TORONTO, 1979

This Overture entitled "Stewardship Structure" has been under study by a committee of the Council, consulting with Board of Congregational Life. The Overture requests "re-shaping the stewardship structure of the Church so as to eliminate the need for financial campaigns and special appeals; and to modify the appalling inequities which exist in the stewardship of our members".

The Council does not support the suggestion to change the term "allocation" to "assessment" because to most congregations the change in terminology would make no difference to their actions, and that it could have a negative impact on some congregations. The difficulties of enforcing a true assessment system also mitigated against the adoption of the term.

The suggestion of a per member minimum average giving basis for the allocation was also not supported, primarily because it did not take into account the

wide regional economical disparities in our country.

Presbyteries in the process of making a settlement, either by call or appointment, should make enquiry into the level of support for the General Assembly Budget in the congregation. This examination should also be made during a Presbytery visitation. It was also felt that congregations should assume responsibility for making up whatever shortfall may occur between the amount contributed through the duplex envelopes and the allocation accepted by the congregation. This should be considered as part of the plan for reaching the allocation that congregations are required to submit to their Presbytery. Although the committee appreciated the philosophy behind the suggestion of withdrawing the duplex envelope, it was decided that, in some congregations, such a move would have a negative impact on givings as many of our members appreciate the opportunity of allocating their own givings.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 5

That the above statement be approved as the answer to the prayer of Overture No. 6, Presbytery of East Toronto, 1979.

OVERTURE NO. 14, 1979 GENERAL ASSEMBLY

This Overture requested a new proposal for setting the budget allocation (assessment), and it was referred to the Administrative Council for study with power to issue, after consulting with the Board of Congregational Life. The study has been completed, and we report as follows:

"From statistical information the suggested amendment to the basis for setting allocations would substantially reduce the overall allocation throughout the country. In addition, the type of formula suggested in the Overture does not take into account any regional economic disparities (for example, between small and large communities) and therefore would be inequitable.

The budget allocation formula is not generally well-known and has not been published in the Acts and Proceedings for some twenty-seven years. Therefore, the committee recommends that the formula appear this year as part of the

Board of Congregational Life report. In addition, there exists some confusion as to exactly what makes up 'total normal expenditures'. This year the statistical form will provide some clarification, but the inclusion of a chapter on the subject in the new Treasurer's Handbook, showing some examples, would be worthwhile."

RECOMMENDATION NO. 6 A

That the above statement be received as the report of the Administrative Council on an item referred with power to issue.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 19, ADMINISTRATIVE COUNCIL, 1979 GENERAL ASSEMBLY

This recommendation committed "the Council to continue implementation of Recommendation No. 2 of the Committee on History to the 104th General Assembly. The recommendation dealt with implementing Records Management Feasibility Study of the Boards and Committees of the Church". Mr. A. Ross, a member on the Committee of History, made another presentation to the Council, and the matter was referred to the Program Co-Ordinating Committee (composed of the secretaries in charge of the various departments at 50 Wynford Drive, and the Principals of the three Colleges). This Committee has had difficulty getting together to meet, and the matter is still awaiting implementation. It is expected further action will be taken before the 106th General Assembly meets.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 7 A

That the above report be received as one of progress.

SALARY OF THE PRINCIPAL CLERK

The 105th General Assembly approved a recommendation of the Special Committee appointed to study Overtures 1 and 30, 1978, re: Principal Clerk and Deputy Clerks of General Assembly requesting the Administrative Council "to give serious study to the question of an adequate stipend for a Principal Clerk who is not the Secretary of the Council." This study has not issued yet in recommendations that the Council is prepared to take to the Assembly at this time, but the Council agreed to present the following recommendation to this Assembly

RECOMMENDATION NO. 8 A

That the Administrative Council complete its study on this matter, and be given power to issue.

ASSISTANT SECRETARY, BOARD OF MINISTRY

The Board of Ministry, by recommendation to the 105th General Assembly, requested the establishment of a new position on their staff of an Assistant Secretary. The Assembly referred the recommendation to the Administrative Council, and the Council now reports that having examined the request, and recognizing that a new General Secretary would likely be appointed at this Assembly, agreed that the new secretary should become settled in his/her position before a final decision is made with regard to establishing an additional position within the Board of Ministry.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 9 A

That the Administrative Council continue its study of the above item, and be authorized to permit the Board of Ministry to call for nominations for this new position if it agrees that such a position should be established.

MULTIPLICITY OF APPEALS

The Administrative Council has been studying for some time the Multiplicity of Appeals within our Church in recent years, and what procedure should be approved to provide an orderly review of requests for such appeals when they arise.

The Council is now prepared to recommend to the 106th General Assembly the adoption of the following procedures

- 1. The request for an appeal is directed to the Secretary of the Administrative Council.
- 2. The request is received by the Administrative Council, or its Executive, who appoint a special committee, including representatives of the Board of Congregational Life, to evaluate the appeal, and bring in recommendations to the Council.
- 3. A recommendation for or against the appeal is made in the annual report of the Administrative Council to the Assembly.
- 4. If approved by the Assembly, the appeal is forwarded to the Board of Congregational Life, in consultation with other boards or committees that might be involved, to be co-ordinated without total budget presentation to the Church, and for any further promotion that may be required.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 10 C

That the above procedure be approved.

SECOND CENTURY ADVANCE FOR CHRIST

The National Committee expresses its appreciation to the many congregations who have been involved in the purpose of the Second Century Advance for Christ "that the Gospel of Jesus Christ be advanced in Canada and Overseas" and "that Presbyterians be led to make an additional tangible expression of commitment by contributing to the Second Century Advance for Christ in 1978 and 1979."

An evaluation questionnaire has been sent to all congregations and a number of responses have been made. The full evaluation will be given to the Administrative Council and other Boards and Committees to assist future campaigns.

A large number of congregations ordered and used the Bible Study and Prayer booklets with a recorded appreciation of their excellence. The evaluation shows that many new Bible Study groups were formed and continue in congregations.

A wide variety of other activities were accomplished under the influence of the Second Century Advance for Christ such as acceptance of General Assembly Budget in full, reduction of mortgage, fellowship within the congregation, special events and worship services, emphasis on Mission and Stewardship, study seminars and Presbytery Rallies, etc.

We express our appreciation to the Chairman, Mr. Frank Whilsmith, Mr. Ted

Smith as Co-ordinator and Mrs. H. Dowds as clerical secretary.

The Financial Statement to December 31, 1979 is included in the Church Treasurer's report, which had a total of gifts at \$871,832. As of March 31, 1980 \$921,224 has been forwarded to the Treasurer. With contributions from congregations who have a commitment for this year, it is expected that over one million dollars (\$1,000,000) will be realized. While this is far short of the \$3 million goal set, it is an additional million dollars for new Church sites, manses, new Church buildings and Special Ministries in Canada and Overseas Capital Projects.

The basis of funding was set out as two thirds for Canada projects and one third for Overseas projects. The Administrative Council Allocations Committee received requests from Presbyteries, Boards and Committees of General Assembly through the Board of World Mission for grants to new Church buildings, new Church sites, new Manses and Special Ministries Projects and the Overseas Capital requests are for Capital Projects for new Churches, Theological College libraries, Leadership Development scholarships and new ministries.

The Sub-Executive of the National Committee will carry responsibility to the end of 1980 for the conclusion of the campaign.

The National Committee is grateful to God for the interest and concern of 685 out of 1067 congregations who have assisted by prayer, support and their tangible expression of commitment both in time and money in the Second Century Advance for Christ. The gifts of money from congregations ranged from \$10. to \$22,493.

The Presbyterian Church in Canada has many unfulfilled tasks. It is the hope and prayer of the National Committee of Second Century Advance for Christ that our Church will take forward steps in Church Growth and Doubling the Membership of the Church in the 80's as we advance in the Second Century.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 11 A

That the above report on Second Century Advance for Christ be received for information.

REFUGEES

Our Church responded early to the need of sponsoring refugees from various countries in the world, and especially from Vietnam. Approximately 250 families have been received and sheltered by congregations of our Church in the past eighteen months. The government, on the day this part of this report is being written, announced it would restore the number of families sponsored by the government in 1980 to the figure announced by the previous government, and then withdrawn. This means that an additional 10,000 families will be received in 1980 from Vietnam, such being sponsored by the Government.

There are many handicapped persons in these refugee camps who have little hope of being settled in a country where their needs will be attended to, unless provision is made by the provincial governments, the national government, and self help groups. The Council agreed to submit the following recommendations to this Assembly

RECOMMENDATION NO. 12 A

That Presbyteries, and Congregations, be encouraged, under the existing "umbrella" agreement to indicate to their local Immigration Office their interest in handicapped refugees, and to indicate, where feasible, their willingness to assist such handicapped refugees.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 13 A

That Presbyteries and Congregations, having discovered the types of needs of handicapped refugees, proceed to discover local support groups and facilities that can be called upon for assistance.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 14 (

That the Presbyterian Church in Canada urge the Federal Government to extend its maximum one year assistance to such a period of time that will assist the refugee to reach his/her maximum level of functioning.

OTHER MATTERS

AUDITORS

RECOMMENDATION NO. 15 A

That the firm of Thorne, Riddell and Company, Chartered Accountants, be continued as Auditors for the Church accounts, and that the Administrative Council be authorized to set their fees.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The Financial statements have been reviewed by an audit committee on behalf of the Council, and appear elsewhere in this book.

STIPENDS AND ALLOWANCES

The Priority Review Committee, the Finance Committee of the Administrative Council, and the Board of World Mission considered the stipend and allowance scale that we should recommend to the General Assembly, taking into account the rate of inflation, and the forecasted income for 1981. The consensus of opinion agreed to recommend a 7% increase for ordained ministers, with the established ratio increases for other Church workers. This will mean an increase of \$700.00 in basic stipend for 1981. There will also be an increase of 7% in utility cost, which item was approved by the 105th General Assembly as a part of stipend.

Regarding the action of the 105th General Assembly, the Pension Board has requested the Administrative Council to interpret the implications to the Pension Board of the action taken last year re salaries for 1980. In our report to Assembly last year (Acts and Proceedings, 1979, Pg. 208), it was reported "the implementation of these recommendations (paying utilities)" will mean an approximate increase of 8% on basic stipend, and will take the place of any such increase for 1980.

The Council draws the attention of commissioners to the items in the Board of World Mission's report re salary increases, which amplify on our report, and with which the Council concurs.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 17 A

That this Assembly concurs with the interpretation that the increase in salary, granted by the last Assembly, means that payment of utilities in manses, or house allowances, is in reality an increase in stipend, and the Pension Board be informed that such increase is in reality an increase in pensionable income.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 18

That an increase of 7% in basic stipend, and cost of utilities, be granted to ministers, beginning January first, 1981, with corresponding changes to other full-time church workers, in accordance with the schedule on Page 208.

THE LENDING FUND

The Lending Fund Committee reported to the Administrative Council, recommending changes in the rate of interest to be charged in the future for loans from the Fund. This rate has not been revised in some years. The Committee also pointed out the need for at least an additional \$200,000.00 to the capital of the Fund, but the Council did not consider it was opportune to attempt to raise this sum by a special appeal, but the Church should be informed, in view of the short-fall in the Second Century Advance for Christ appeal, that more money is needed to help new congregations get started. At this time the Council approved, and in turn recommends to Assembly as follows

RECOMMENDATION NO. 19 A

That on loans approved after June 30, 1980 the terms of repayment be as follows:

repayment of principal only until the seventh year; from the seventh year interest be charged at 8%.

CONGRESS 1983

Since our last report to Assembly another successful Congress was held last June in Guelph. Under the leadership of the Reverend Harrold Morris a capable panel of speakers and discussion leaders provided an exciting and inspiring experience.

The Council has begun plans for another Congress in 1983. The Reverend Harry Waite has agreed to chair a Committee which is in the process of being formed.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 20 A

That the above be received for information.

EXECUTIVE PERSONNEL SALARIES

The Executive-Personnel Committee of the Administrative Council has made a study of setting salary scales for the executive staff of our Church, and Professors of our Colleges. On the basis of these scales, and considering the increase in the cost of living, especially of housing in the Toronto area, the Council agrees to recommending to the Assembly as follows

RECOMMENDATION NO. 21 C

That a 7% increase be granted to the Executive Staff of the Church, and to College Professors, with a corresponding increase in regard to rental allowances where applicable, and that this increase be effective January first, 1981.

CHRISTIAN FESTIVAL CRÉTIEN — 1982

The Council has given its approval to Presbyterian participation in a Christian Festival being organized in Ottawa in late June, 1982. It is expected that this event will attract many people to the Capital of our nation, and more information will be going out to our membership from the Board of Congregational Life.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 22 A

That the above be received for information.

MACLEAN ESTATE

The Maclean Estate Committee has been operating Crieff Hills Community for 5 years now, providing training programs for individuals and congregational groups. These events are growing in popularity and many congregations are taking advantage of these types of facilities that Crieff Hills and other church conference centres provide. Further details are available from Crieff Hills Community, R.R. 2, Puslinch, Ontario NOB 2J0.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 23 A

That congregations be encouraged to set aside funds to assist their members in attending weekend training workshops and to provide means for them to share their experiences when they return.

OVERTURE 13, 1978 — ZERO-BASE BUDGETING

The Council reported in 1979 that steps were being taken to implement zerobase budgeting procedures for establishing the General Assembly Budget. These procedures involve a concerted effort to examine the work of agencies funded by the Budget, program by program, and to rank these programs by priority, to ensure that the most important tasks facing the Church are undertaken, and not eliminated due to financial constraints.

The results of the first year under these procedures are encouraging; the budgeted deficit has been reduced substantially for 1981. The Council recognizes that this degree of success has been achieved by the efforts of the Boards and Committees, often at the expense of considerable staff time. Without their co-operation, the exercise would have been futile. Several areas of improvement in procedure have been identified, and changes will be implemented in the process of preparing the 1982 budget.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 24 A

That the above be received for information,

BUDGETS FOR 1980 AND 1981

After many meetings, and a spate of words and arguments, the Council submits the following budgets for 1980 and 1981. It should be noted that budget presentations from Knox College Board, and the Committee for Doubling, were not re-

ceived in time for final resolution at the March meeting of the Council, and it is hoped the Executive of the Council will be able to finalize these two figures when it meets in May.

COMMITTEE TO ADVISE WITH THE MODERATOR

To the Venerable the 106th General Assembly:

The Reverend Doctor Kenneth G. McMillan, General Secretary of the Canadian Bible Society, was elected Moderator of the 105th General Assembly when it opened in Sudbury, Ontario.

During the year Dr. McMillan travelled extensively, usually accompanied by his gracious wife, Isabel. He visited every province in Canada except Prince Edward Island. Overseas, while his major trip was to Nigeria and Malawi, Dr. McMillan made many contacts on behalf of our church as will be seen from this list of those to whom he paid an official visit.

The Rev. Gioys Bouchard, Moderator of the Waldensian Church in Italy; the Rev. Michael Kyriakokis in Athens, former Moderator of the Presbyterian Church in Greece; the Right Rev. Robert O. Latham, Moderator of the United Reformed Church, London, England; the Right Rev. Akanu A. Otu, Moderator of the Presbyterian Church of Nigeria; the Right Rev. John G. Gatu, Nairobi, Kenya, Moderator of the Presbyterian Church of East Africa; Rev. Dr. Saindi Chiphangwi, General Secretary of the Blantyre Synod of the Church of Central Africa Presbyterian. He also contacted Presbyter Samuel Trinidad, Moderator of the Presbyterian Church of Mexico, and many other church leaders such as the Rev. John C. Kamou, a Presbyterian who is General Secretary of the National Christian Council of Kenya, and the staff of the All Africa Conference of Christian Churches in Nairobi, Kenya.

Through interviews on television and radio and through the press the Moderator was introduced to many thousands who were not at the services or meetings where he spoke. Exposure to the public through the media is an important part of the Moderator's ministry.

Twice during the moderatorial year Dr. and Mrs. McMillan travelled to Ottawa to attend the opening of Parliament, on October 9th, 1979 and April 14th, 1980!

In May they flew to Edinburgh to represent The Presbyterian Church in Canada at the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland. Our Moderator was given the high honour of preaching at the opening service of that Assembly in historic St. Giles' Cathedral.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 1 A

That the Reverend Alexander Ferguson MacSween, B.A., D.D., Canada Mission Secretary of the Board of World Mission, be officially nominated as Moderator of the 106th General Assembly.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 2 A

That the thanks of the Assembly be tendered to the Courts of the Church, the congregations, and the many persons who received the Moderator with kindness, courtesy and respect.

THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH ARCHITECTURE

To the Venerable the 106th General Assembly:

The function of the Committee on Church Architecture is to advise Presbyteries, Congregations and the Church Lending Agencies regarding the suitability of plans and cost estimates for proposed church buildings. Our procedures are outlined in Guidelines for Planning a Church, which is available from the Secretary at the National Office. Submission of preliminary sketch plans enables the Committee to comment at the critical early stages of the planning process, occasionally preventing costly adjustments at a later date. The Committee subsequently reviews and approves the revised drawings before working drawings are commenced.

The Committee notes that sometimes after tenders for construction have been received drastic deletions are proposed to bring the project within the budget. The

Committee is available for further consultation at this stage.

In order to operate within our budget the Committee holds one annual meeting for consideration of policy matters, at which all members from various parts of the country are present. The on-going business of the Committee is dealt with by an Executive sub-committee made up of members residing in southern Ontario, whose services are made available to the Church through the Committee at little or no expense. The Committee includes Architects, Cost Consultants, Engineers, Ministers and officials involved in Church Building.

The Committee has been active during the past year, having held one annual meeting of the full membership, and six meetings of the Executive, to review, comment upon and approve the plans for a number of Church building projects. The Committee's second publication entitled The Property Committee Handbook is

now available to congregations at cost.

THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH DOCTRINE

To the Venerable 106th General Assembly:

The Committee on Church Doctrine respectfully submits the following report of its work.

I. DEPOSITION

The Committee on Church Doctrine, through its sub-committee on Ministry, has consulted with the Presbytery of Miramichi as instructed by the 105th General Assembly. The Committee regrets the feeling of the Presbytery that our reply to Overture 28, A & P, 1978 p. 473-475 (see also A & P, 1979 pf. 223-224), misrepresents the position of the Presbytery. The Committee's concern was to deal with the request and the wording of the Overture.

It appears, however, that the Presbytery had one main concern about the Statement on the Meaning of Deposition, adopted by the General Assembly in 1976, namely, the interpretation of "In our divided state, sister churches should respect one another's discipline for the sake of the good estate of the whole Church." The Presbytery has indicated that it believes the word "respect" to be ambiguous and wants the word replaced in our final statement.

We note that the Statement was adopted after presbyteries had studied it and reported their comments. The Statement was and is final as the Committee has not the authority or the instruction from the General Assembly to revise any part of the Statement.

We would note further that the word "respect" is what the Committee intended. To respect the discipline of a sister denomination means that we hold it in esteem or honour, that we have regard for it or reference to it or are concerned with it. In other words, deposition by another denomination is not to be disre-

garded. "Respect" also means "to refrain from interfering with".

It is the meaning which is troublesome. It becomes a question of what constitutes interference. When a court of one denomination has a total disregard for the discipline of another, or when it acts as though the discipline has not taken place or sits in judgement over another denomination that court is interfering with the other denomination. *The Presbyterian Church in Canada requires that ministers be in good standing of another "Church which holds the same doctrine, government and discipline as this Church," (Book of Forms, section 215), (See also section 248), when applying for admission to our Church. Where these requirements cannot be fulfilled the proper procedure is for a person to become a communicant member of this Church and subsequently to have his/her suitability for ministry examined by this Church. This would not constitute interference with the discipline of a sister Church.

The Committee is not unsympathetic to the concern of the Presbytery, but for the good order of the Church we judge it wise to follow a procedure that is cautious when dealing with deposed ministers.

*When we say that "sister churches should respect one another's discipline" we mean "accept" unless there are grave and substantial reasons for non-concurrence.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 1 A

That the above reply replace the 1979 reply to Overture 28, A & P, 1978 and that the prayer of the Overture be not granted.

II. THE COVENANT OF GRACE

The sub-committee on the Covenant of Grace has been reorganised and is developing a long-range plan of study in response to the directive of the 104th General Assembly (1978), to undertake "further study... with particular reference to the sacrament of baptism and the practice of confirmation", (ref. A & P, 1978, pp. 229-230, 79). Attention will be given to related statements in the standards such as "knowledge to discern the Lord's body", and the Lord's Supper as a seal of the Covenant of Grace, (see Book of Forms, 110, a).

Correspondence with members of the Committee indicates that a significant minority believe that baptised children should be included as participants at the Lord's Supper. Study of this question will continue within the larger context of the

issue identified in the paragraph above.

Members of sessions who admit children to the Lord's Table at an early age, or who wish to identify areas of study related to the larger subject of 'the covenant of grace' are requested to continue to correspond with the Committee through the chairman as requested by the 103rd General Assembly, (A & P, 1977, pp. 223-226, and Recommendation 4, p. 229).

RECOMMENDATION NO. 2 C

That this Assembly reaffirm the decision of the 103rd General Assembly requesting ministers and sessions who admit children to the Lord's Table at an early age to convey the results of their experience to the Committee on Church Doctrine.

III. MINISTRY IN THE CHURCH

Re. Office and Function of the Elder and Term-Eldership. See Recommendation 2C of the Committee on Church Doctrine, (A & P, 1979, p. 222), and Overture No. 20, Presbytery of Superior, (A & P, 1979, p. 458).

The Committee regrets that it is as yet unable to provide a full response to the prayer of Overture No. 20, Presbytery of Superior. The remit of our Committee is to study and report on the ministry of the people of God with reference to the office and function of the Elder.

Since it is the Committee's intention to present a comprehensive historical and theological statement on this subject to the 107th General Assembly, it is felt that a response to the more specific question of Term-Eldership would at this stage be somewhat premature.

IV. CHRISTIAN SPIRITUALITY

With regard to issues of Christian Spirituality which are of immediate concern to the Church, the Committee would like to inform the General Assembly that a booklet on Christian Spirituality is in preparation. It will include a study of Transcendental Meditation in its broader context, and will address itself to issues which have emerged through contact with the Charismatic Movement.

V. STATEMENT OF FAITH

Over the past year the sub-committee working on a contemporary Statement of Faith has prepared and discussed a variety of written submissions. In spite of difficulties we are continuing with this project.

VI. BIOMEDICAL ENGINEERING

The Committee would inform the General Assembly that a Committee of the Church is being formed to study and monitor further developments in the field of biomedical engineering. In consultation with the Board of Congregational Life the proposal that a popular booklet on this subject be made available is currently under consideration.

THE CLERKS OF ASSEMBLY

A number of references have been made to the Clerks of Assembly by the 1979 General Assembly, as well as overtures sent up to the one hundred and sixth General Assembly, and the Clerks beg to report as follows:

REFERENCE RE SECTION 176 (1) (e) OF THE BOOK OF FORMS.

For many years General Assemblies of our Church have had difficulty in responding to Overtures from Presbyteries seeking permission to put ministers on their constituent roll who are on the appendix to their roll. It must be acknowledged that General Assemblies have not always dealt in a consistent manner with such requests. Some Assemblies have appointed a committee to consider these overtures, and after that committee dealt with them according to what they believed to be a responsible manner, the Assembly had overruled the findings of its special committee and granted permission to all Presbyteries overturing to place each name sent forward on the roll of their respective Presbyteries. Since Section 176 (1) (e) was adopted in 1976 there has been considerable difficulty in the minds of many how it should be interpreted.

As written, Section 176 (1) (e) prohibits the following from being placed on the constituent roll of Presbyteries:

non-theological teachers;

(2) non-theological professors;

(3) psychologists;

(4) social workers;

(5) other ministers in secular employment; and

(6) retired ministers, "except those who are rendering active service"

This list of exclusions does not appear to be uppermost in the minds of Presbyteries petitioning for the addition of names to constituent rolls. The supporting reasons given verbally before Assemblies are based on the earlier criterion of usefulness: "The General Assembly of 1966 declared that they be of continuing helpfulness through the availability of their gifts and time to the Presbytery and the Church." (Old footnote to Section 176 See A & P 1966, p. 401, A & P 1967, pp. 86, 87). There is a decided conflict between the desires of petitioning Presbyteries and the 1976 amendments.

We can take a significant step out of this recurrent dilemma. That is to place on the Presbytery involved the burden of interpretation of the phrase "except those who are rendering active service" in the case of retired ministers. If a Presbytery decides a retired minister on the appendix of its roll is doing a work with the knowledge of, and approval of, the said Presbytery, and if the work being done merits the minister being added to the constituent roll of the Presbytery, the Presbytery may overture the General Assembly for permission to add the name to its constituent roll, stating the reasons for permission to make the addition. Note that under a Declaratory Act passed in 1972 (A & P 1972, pp. 26, 96), the Presbytery would be obligated to remove the name when the reasons given for it being placed on the constituent roll are no longer relevant. If other reasons have then emerged, another overture may be forwarded to Assembly requesting permission to place the name on the constituent roll again.

Presbyteries may not under the 1976 amendments properly request Assembly to add to their constituent roll ministers who are NOT retired. The Clerks regard this situation as unfortunate, considering the clearly expressed desires of Presbyteries at each Assembly since 1976. The criterion of helpfulness to the Church, while somewhat vague in interpretation, does not suffer the arbitrariness of the present list of excluded persons. But we may interpret the law only as it is, not as we might like it to be. Barring procedures leading to a change in Book of Forms, Section 176 (1) (e), we ask General Assembly to rule ultra-vires overtures to add to the constituent roll of Presbyteries names of non-retired ministers who fall into the

excluded categories.

We here reprint the 1972 Declaratory Act as it bears on our recommendation.

DECLARATORY ACT (A footnote to Section 176 (1) (e) of the Book of Forms)

"When there has been a significant change in the status or abilities of the minister whose name has been ordered placed on the constituent roll, the name, as the Presbytery may judge, shall be placed on the appendix to the roll by proper motion of the Court. Should the new status, in the judgement of the Presbytery, merit a placing of the name on the constituent roll, the Presbytery may overture the General Assembly in conformity to 176 (1) (e) "

RECOMMENDATION NO. 1 A

That the above statement be adopted as the answer to the Reference re Book of Forms Section 176 (1) (e).

REFERRAL FROM BOARD OF MINISTRY, RECOMMENDATION 10, A & P. 1979, PAGES 370 and 39 RE FUTURE REVISIONS OF THE BOOK OF FORMS

This request that legislation re the Order of Deaconesses be included in the next revision of the Book of Forms will be carried out by the Clerks of Assembly in the revised edition of the Book of Forms which is now scheduled for this fall in loose-leaf form.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 2 A

That the above statement be received as information.

OVERTURE NO. 2, 1980 PRESBYTERY OF HAMILTON Re: USE OF THE APPENDIX TO THE ROLL

The Presbytery of Hamilton overtures the 106th General Assembly for a study of the Appendix of the Roll of Presbyteries re its effectiveness, re members on the Appendix accepting calls without reference to a Presbytery, and re desirability of

keeping a suitable roll of ministers who are in good standing.

The Clerks of Assembly wonder why this matter has arisen almost simultaneously and with almost identical preambles in both the Presbytery of Hamilton and Waterloo-Wellington. The Clerks also have real difficulties with the preambles of Overtures Nos. 2 and 6, but more especially with the preamble to Overture No. 2, Presbytery of Hamilton. Let us begin our reply by reference to some of these difficulties.

The first whereas states "ministers are placed on the appendix to the Roll to give status and recognition of their ordination when they are without a charge" (underlining that of the Clerks). We believe the Presbytery is incorrect in this assertion. In a comprehensive report on this subject to the Ninetieth General Assembly the Church Doctrine Committee gives an excellent treatise on this subject. The Clerks believe the Presbytery of Hamilton would have been well advised to study this report. In order to make it more available to the younger persons in our Church who may not possess copies of the Acts and Proceedings of the 90th General Assembly we reproduce a large part of the report following.

II. Re: USE OF THE APPENDIX TO THE ROLL IN PRESBYTERIES

The General Assembly of 1961 (Minutes, A. & P., page 65) instructed the Articles of Faith Committee, in connection with its study of the ministry and ordination thereto, to clarify the proper principles to be followed in the use in presbyteries of the appendix to the roll.

Acts and Proceedings, 1948, Minutes, pages 76 and 77, in answer to Overture 31 of the Presbytery of Edmonton, A. & P., 1948, Appendices, page 173, bears upon this question. Likewise does Overture 10, A. & P., 1954, Presbytery of Edmonton, pages 471, 472; this was answered in A. & P., 1955, pages 108, 109.

In these, the principles are enunciated (and made clear by the Declaratory Act of 1954, A. & P., 1954, page 78) that a Minister's name is not automatically added to the Appendix to the Roll, but only at his request and on formal motion of the Presbytery, and that "if a Presbytery has a matter of discipline against a Minister it should be taken directly, that is, initiated by Presbytery following proper representation, as it is with an inducted minister, and not be delayed by or hinge upon an application for the continuation of a privilege". (The latter phrasing here refers to the Overture which asked for a yearly scrutiny of names on the Appendix to the Roll.)

The report of 1948 (see A. & P., 1948, Minutes 76, 77) is specific:

"A minister or licentiate who has removed from one Presbytery to reside within the bounds of another Presbytery, is required to take a certificate of transference from the Presbytery which he leaves, and to lodge it with the Presby-

tery within whose bounds he is domiciled."

"When a minister resigns his charge, or ceases to be in the active service of the Church, and continues to reside within the bounds of the Presbytery, there is no obligation on the part of the Presbytery to place his name on the Appendix to the Roll. It is not a right to demand, but a privilege which is requested. As long as he remains within the bounds of the Presbytery, and the Court is satisfied with his life and character, and he associates himself with a Presbyterian congregation, the Presbytery may, at his request, continue to carry his name on the Appendix to the Roll."

"If he removes beyond the bounds of Presbytery and does not ask for his certificate, the Presbytery may notify him by registered letter of his duty, and then, if he fails to remove his certificate, the Presbytery should take action. His name may be removed by action of Presbytery, the reasons minuted; and on request, a historical certificate should be given him. Only a historical certificate could suit the case, as he would be residing beyond the supervision of Presbytery."

The Articles of Faith Committee believes its terms of reference relate, in this instruction for clarification, particularly to the doctrine of the ministry. The principles in the quotations given in the foregoing make clear that the adding of a name to the Appendix to the Roll is a privilege, not a right, and that the Presbytery has full right and duty of discipline over those whose names are on

the Appendix.

The doctrine of the ministry is a doctrine of ordination for life, and that ministry may not be relinquished or resigned unless there is sufficient cause. The Articles of Faith Committee believes that the cause must be stated to the Presbytery — as, indeed, it usually is, in the presentation of a resignation — and that the Presbytery is the judge (subject to appeal) of the adequacy of the cause. In the matter of cognate work, which is usually defined by the Pension Board in considering the minister's status with the Pension Fund, the Assembly, if approving the Board's recommendation for status as doing cognate work, considers that a minister taking up cognate work is exercising his ministry, and a Presbytery may therefore properly place his name on the Appendix. The Committee on Articles of Faith must in duty point out that when Assembly, following an overture from a Presbytery to place the name of a minister doing cognate work on the Constituent Roll, places such a name on the Constituent Roll, it enables the Minister concerned to assist in governing the Presbytery, but the Presbytery has no control over the cognate work.

That there is some abuse of the Appendix is plain, and although most infrequent, must be delineated. For example, a minister who resigns his charge for reasons of poor health, or other reasons which the Presbytery accepts, and within a few weeks or months engages in a secular task that involves his whole time and is in responsibility as heavy in its sphere as was his work in the ministry, may be called to account by the Presbytery. The Presbytery may deem him to have forsaken his ministry and proceed by formal action to remove his name from the Appendix to the Roll with reasons minuted. For another example, a minister who, dissatisfied with the calls that he may obtain, resigns and goes into secular work, or who resigns, having acquired means to retire, and retires before the retiring age when he obviously may be of service to the Church, may likewise be subject to this action.

That the abuse is the responsibility of the Presbytery is likewise plain. There are examples of the unwillingness of Presbyteries to deal with the situation in a congregation in which a minister should be subject to discipline; he is permitted to resign and his name, without protest, is placed on the Appendix to the Roll. He is then in a position to be certified as a "Minister in good standing", and the Presbytery, not being able to take retro-active action without peril to itself, must give that certificate.

The matter, in general, is clear. If Assembly accepts the doctrine that ordination is for life and may not be resigned unless within the provisions herein indicated, then the place of a minister's name on the Appendix must be defined and qualified

in the light of that doctrine, and the Presbytery must act accordingly.

The regulations of the Pension Fund, sub-sections (i) and (j) on page 152, Book of Forms, cover the matter of a minister unable to get a call, which is the case of "the stickit minister." Here, for the sake of getting a living, the minister, without loss of honour may engage in secular tasks or otherwise provide for his maintenance. It may seem a hard doctrine that a minister must take a call that is unsatisfactory to him or sacrifice his good name in that his name is not put on the Appendix to the Roll, but such is one of the hazards of the ministry in the call system.

Section 251 of the Book of Forms provides that a minister may cease to be a minister of the Presbyterian Church in Canada by a voluntary action. In some branches of the Presbyterian Church this is termed "demitting status." It is con-

ceivable that a Presbytery may be faced with the duty of pointing out to a minister that he must exercise his ministry within the possibilities offered, or take demission under Section 251. Indeed, here the Presbytery could proceed to disciplinary action. The line between what should be disciplinary action and what should be voluntary action on the part of the minister is most difficult to draw. And distinction here must be made between this situation and that previously referred to, subsection (i) and (j), page 152, re Pension Fund. The distinction is between a minister who can exercise his ministry and won't, and the minister who wishes to but is not able.

A dismissory letter, under Section 251, means that the minister ceases to be a minister of our Church. He automatically ceases to have the power to exercise any ministerial function anywhere. Another denomination may receive him as a minister, but at its own judgment. The question of the "indelible character of ordination" enters the discussion at this point, but the Committee on Articles of Faith feels that this question must be considered in connection with the Doctrine of Ordination rather than here; we are dealing at this point with the function of a man who has voluntarily taken demission. Inasmuch as no discipline is involved, the form of the letter (Appendix I:36) is worded with extreme care.

This dismissory letter must be distinguished from a Presbyterial Certificate (Appendix I:35), and Clerks of Presbyteries and Presbyteries have been confused here — sometimes badly. A Certificate is addressed to a Presbytery, but a minister, holding a dismissory letter, can return to the ministry only with the permission of

Assembly (Section 251, again).

Another distinction: The minister holding a dismissory letter is not on a par with the minister who has come under the procedure quoted earlier from A & P, 1948. The minister under that procedure is one whose name has been removed from the Appendix by Presbytery action with reasons minuted. The action is disciplinary. Such a minister may have requested and received an "historical certificate", and this certificate contains the record of the discipline. The dismissory letter is without discipline; the historical certificate records discipline. In either case, the minister has ceased to be a minister of our Church and is without valid power to exercise a ministry.

Except in rare cases, Presbyteries have shunned both dismissory letters and historical certificates and have been content to use the Appendix to the Roll in violation of both the word and the principles of the law of the Church. The responsibility cannot be handed to Synod or Assembly, for the Church has been explicit for centuries that jurisdiction over ministers is a primary work of the Presbytery. The church discourages references as an evasion of responsibility (Section 88, Book of Forms). A higher court may call a Presbytery to account

(Section 273) for anything done amiss.

It may also be remarked, in the matter of the Presbytery's care of ministers, either on the Constituent Roll or the Appendix, that matters of ministerial ethics are involved. A retired minister, whose actions interfere with the work of the parish in which he resides, or any parish, is subject to discipline. It is understandable, for example, that such a minister, for reasons of sentiment, may wish to solemnize the marriage of friends or former parishioners, or to baptize their children. To do so without the consent of the minister who is primarily concerned is a breach of ethics, and the Presbytery may have a duty to perform in discipline. In at least the Province of Ontario a minister's name must be on the Constituent Roll or Appendix before solemnizing marriage, or the ceremony may be invalid. For a minister on either Roll to proceed to marry without inquiry any couple who comes knocking at his door is a matter to be sharply challenged by Presbytery regardless of the denominational affiliation of the parties as alleged on the marriage license.

The above lengthy reproduction covers most of the issues raised by the Presbytery of Hamilton. In the second whereas of Overture 2 we believe the Presbytery goes too far in using the words "in any way". The third whereas is dealt with adequately in the quote from the 90th General Assembly. If the statement in the 4th whereas is true the Presbytery involved has failed in its proper jurisdiction with regard to the minister concerned. The Presbytery should have delayed granting a

certificate if it planned to lay a charge. No certificate may be granted when a charge is under review by the Presbytery.

In view of the regulations established by the statement above, which was adopted by the 90th General Assembly, the Clerks now briefly reply to Overture No. 2. We believe the Appendix to the Roll is an effective and adequate method to deal with ministers without a charge or appointment, if Presbyteries assume their responsibilities in how ministers are placed on the Appendix to their Roll, and conduct regular reviews of whether or not ministers continue to qualify for the privilege of remaining on the Appendix. (In this regard we draw attention to the reference in our reply recorded above re Reference Section 176 (1) (e) of the Book of Forms, and especially to the procedure re removing names from Constituent Roll).

The Presbytery of Hamilton in its fifth whereas takes issue with a common practice in our Church, that of bypassing the Presbytery of a minister not currently serving a pastoral charge. This practice is based on an interpretation of Section 221, Book of Forms, which reads in part: "If the court is satisfied the call is sustained, and, in the case of a licentiate or ordained minister without charge, is presented or

sent direct to him. '

The Clerks of Assembly believe that Section 221 must be interpreted in keeping with the time and setting in which it was framed. "Ministers without charge" were probationers who had "received ordination but had never been parochial incumbents... being for all practical purposes in exactly the same position as a minister who had resigned from a charge without retaining membership of a Presbytery." (See Cox, Practice and Procedure in the Church of Scotland, fifth edition page 146). "Ministers without charge" so defined simply do not exist in the Canadian Church, where ordination is only on the basis of a call or mission appointment. Section 221 refers properly to licentiates in that the rights or oversight of another Presbytery are not bypassed. The further reference to ministers without charge must be regarded as a most unlikely variant in The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

The correct practice where a minister is a member of another Presbytery is set out in Sections 227-232, Book of Forms. We hold that these procedures apply whether or not the minister called is currently serving a pastoral charge. We reaffirm the right of a Presbytery to determine whether or not a call should be placed in the hands of a minister whose name appears on its roll. To do otherwise is to abuse the rights of the sending Presbytery and to degrade oversight by Presbytery of ministers on the appendix to the roll.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 3 A

That the above statement be received as the answer to the Prayer of Overture No. 2, Presbytery of Hamilton.

OVERTURE NO. 6, 1980 PRESBYTERY OF WATERLOO-WELLINGTON Re: CALLS TO MINISTERS WITHOUT CHARGE

The Clerks of Assembly wish to deal with this Overture in the context of the previous Overture No. 2, from the Presbytery of Hamilton. Although the two Overtures have different preambles, and desire different studies, it appears that Section 221 is the only regulation that indicates to the Clerks of Assembly there may be an obstacle to obtaining a solution to the problems raised.

If Section 221 were understood as interpreted by the Clerks in their reply to Overture 2 above, it appears a call would need to go to the Presbytery wherein the name of the minister being called appears on the constituent roll, or appendix to

the roll.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 4 A

That the above statement, and the statement of the Clerks of Assembly given in answer to Overture No. 2, be the answer to Overture No. 6, Presbytery of Waterloo-Wellington.

RECOMMENDATION 18 OF THE BOARD OF CONGREGATIONAL LIFE 1979, A & P, PAGE 296, WHICH WAS REFERRED TO THE CLERKS BY THE 105th GENERAL ASSEMBLY

In Overture #11 (1978 G.A., A & P, Page 468) the Presbytery of Bruce-Maitland expresses a concern that in our mobile population members, and especially communicant members, are often lost to the Church because of lack of oversight on the part of the Sessions from whose care these people move and the fact that Sessions into whose area they come are unaware of their presence.

The Presbytery of Bruce-Maitland makes some suggestions as to how this situation might be to some extent remedied. The Board of Congregational Life to whom this Overture was referred by the 104th General Assembly recommended an answer to the prayer of the Overture which was adopted by the 105th General Assembly (Board of Congregational Life, Recommendation 17, Page 296 A & P) largely incorporating the prayer of the Overture.

The Board of Congregational Life then recommended that this matter be referred to the Clerks to find some way in which the answer to Overture #11 as set forth in Recommendation 17 "may become a permanent directive to Sessions in

their care of the Communion roll".

One of the practices of our Church, has been to keep the actual law of the Church, as found in the Book of Forms, to a minimum. Thus our Book of Forms is small and compact in comparison with some Presbyterian Churches. To lay down principles rather than seeking to enact a law to cover every possible instance seems to be eminently wise.

So we prefer to have Recommendation 18 of the Board of Congregational Life (1979, A & P, p. 296) answered by the General Assembly adopting a resolution giving instructions rather than sending something down under the Barrier Act and

being placed in the Book of Forms.

To accomplish this purpose and to guarantee (as far as this is possible) that this matter will come before Sessions annually, the Clerks recommend that Recommendation 17 of the Board of Congregational Life as adopted by the 105th General Assembly be sent out to Ministers and Clerks of Session in a fall mailing of the Board of Congregational Life annually (possibly September or October).

RECOMMENDATION NO. 5 A

That the following resolution be approved:

"That the reference re Overture No. 11 to the 105th General Assembly be

answered in the following terms:

a) that Sessions be urged to communicate as soon as feasible with communicant members who have moved to other communities, encouraging them to associate themselves with the church of their preference and to request their certificates of membership be sent to that church as soon as possible;

b) that Sessions be urged to correspond, as soon as feasible, with the Sessions of the Presbyterian Church nearest to where members who have moved are then residing, requesting that they be contacted and

made welcome by the church in their new community;

c) that Sessions be urged at the time of their annual review of the Communion Roll, to issue a reminder (if no action has been taken) both to the member who has moved and to the Session involved, as per item (b) above;

d) that the Board of Congregational Life bring this matter to the atten-

tion of Sessions once a year through their regular mailings,"

OVERTURE NO. 15, 1979, PRESBYTERY OF KAMLOOPS RE: REVISION OF THE STATISTICAL FORM

This Overture requests "a revision of the annual statistical form so that it may be more easily and conscientiously filled out", and the one hundred and fifth General Assembly directed that "the Clerks of Assembly study and report on this matter, consulting with the Board of Congregational Life, and that Presbyteries be invited to send suggestions to the Clerks of Assembly." Two or three Presbyteries

replied offering major redrafting, and two or three offered minor changes.

The form for 1979 statistics was revised somewhat before being printed, but of necessity long before Presbytery replies were received. The Clerks, with concurrence of the representatives of the Board of Congregational Life, agree more changes may be made in revising the forms, particularily in view of the reports received. We request the Assembly to grant authorization for revisions to be made in the forms for the 1980 statistics, such revisions to be made after consulting with the Board of Congregational Life.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 6 A

That Overture 15, 1979, Presbytery of Kamloops, be answered in accordance with the above report.

BOARD OF MINISTRY RECOMMENDATION 14, 1979 RE: STATUTORY VERSUS COMPULSORY RETIREMENT

In response to Overture 17, 1978 from the Presbytery of Northern Saskatche-

wan (A & P 1978, pp. 469, 24), the Board of Ministry recommended:

That the prayer of Overture 17, 1978 be granted by the following Declaratory Act: "The General Assembly affirms that reference in the Book of Forms and other Church documents to 'compulsory retirement age' shall henceforth be understood to mean 'statutory retirement age', since provision has been made in certain cases for continuing service in the ministry beyond age 70. (A & P 1979, pp. 377, 60)

This recommendation was referred to the Clerks for report to the 106th General

Assembly.

The current regulations are set out in A & P 1975, page 58 (see also pages 350-351 and A & P 1976, p. 55). The first two paragraphs are as follows:

i) That the compulsory retiring age for all ministers be 70, effective as of

January 1st following their full age of 70 years.

(ii) That where it is desired to continue the services in the present or another congregation, the presbytery, under the authority of Section 213, Book of Forms, makes arrangements mutually acceptable to the Presbytery concerned, after consultation with the congregation and the minister.

The Clerks find that the proposed change would have no effect on our standing under federal pension law. Nor would it alter Church procedures. The change is one of semantics only. We would agree that the word "statutory" carries less offense than "compulsory". Human nature tolerates statutes, but resists compulsion!

Our recommendation therefore is in the terms of the Board of Ministry's

Recommendation 14, 1979.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 7 A

That the prayer of Overture 17, 1978 be granted by the following Declaratory Act: The General Assembly affirms that reference in the Book of Forms and other Church documents to 'compulsory retirement age' shall henceforth be understood to mean 'statutory retirement age', since provision has been made in certain cases for continuing service in the ministry beyond age 70.

OWNERSHIP, ACCOUNTABILITY AND CONFIDENTIALITY OF RECORDS OF CHURCH COURTS, 1979 ACTS AND PROCEEDINGS, PAGE 236-237, AND PAGE 88

In the report of the Clerks of Assembly to the last General Assembly Recommendation #8, re the above type of Records of Church Courts was referred back to

the Clerks to consult with the Archivist and the Chairman of the Committee on History.

The Consultation involved a submission from the Committee on History of a request that the report of the Clerks to the 1979 General Assembly on this subject be included as an appendix to the Book of Forms, with proper inserts in relevant Sections in the Book of Forms. There was also a request that in Section I of the report of the Clerks of the last Assembly (Page 236, A & P 1979) that "Minutes" be changed to "Records". There was a further request that the report prepared by Dr. John Moir, entitled "For the Record", and the section entitled "Ownership and Accessibility" on Page 7 be included as an appendix in the Book of Forms. The Section is as follows:

Ownership and Accessibility: All records generated by The Presbyterian Church in Canada or by any of its Courts, Boards, Committees or employees are solely the property of the Church, and not of the individual who created them. No records may be destroyed, removed, withdrawn, transferred, mutilated, or alienated in any way without proper written authorization by the generating agency, the Clerk of Assembly, Archivist, or their duly appointed agents. Church records are private because they have been generated by a voluntary organization, and prior to their transfer to the Church Archives public access to or use of those records requires special permission of the generating agency or the Clerk of Assembly. Upon transfer to the Church Archives, however, these records must be deemed to become public property, accessible to all under such terms and restrictions as the Church, its agencies and the archivist shall place upon the availability and use.

Reasons for restrictions may be the nature of the records — i.e. the sensitivity or privacy of the contents. Such restrictions would normally involve refusing public access for a specified period, but in no case may such restriction apply only to a specific person or class of persons. Where restrictions on access are requested by the generating agency, the Archivist and the representative of that agency shall record in writing the particular terms of the restriction, and the records and their finding aids shall be clearly marked as restricted.

Normally donations of materials from private sources are only acceptable by the Archives without restrictions, and become the property of the Church Archives upon their deposit. Where restrictions are requested and such restrictions meet with the approval of the Archivist, the terms of such restrictions shall be recorded in writing by the two parties, and the papers and any finding aids shall indicate their restricted status. Archival deposits by church courts, however, are made only in trust, and such materials may be withdrawn by the court to which they belong.

No materials deposited in the archives from whatever source may be loaned or removed from the Archives premises for any reason without the express permission of the Archivist. Under exceptional circumstances (i.e. other than removal for photocopying) the Archivist may authorize temporary removal of records to another archival institution, providing the conditions of transfer, access, use, and return, meet with the Archivist's approval and are recorded in writing by both parties.

Access and use of archival materials in the Church Archives are subject to normal working hours and other practical considerations determined by the Archivist.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 8 A

That the Report of the Clerks of Assembly on this matter to the 1979 General Assembly be included as an appendix in the Book of Forms, changing the word "Minutes" in Section 1 to "Records".

RECOMMENDATION NO. 9 A

That the statement in the publication "For The Record" as recorded above be included as an appendix in the Book of Forms.

OVERTURE NO. 22, 1980, PRESBYTERY OF NIAGARA RE: RECOMMENDATIONS 6 AND 7 OF THE REPORT OF THE CLERKS OF ASSEMBLY TO THE 105th GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

The Presbytery of Niagara overtured the 106th General Assembly to direct the Clerks of Assembly, in consultation with the Committee on Church Doctrine, to reconsider the working of their report to the 105th General Assembly anent Recommendations 6 and 7. Certain problems are set forth in the preamble which the Clerks are requested to review, and perhaps revise.

The Clerks received this Overture just as they were completing their report to go to the printers, and had no time to do the proposed study or consult with the

Committee on Church Doctrine.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 10 A

That the Clerks undertake the study requested, and report to the 107th General Assembly.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EWART COLLEGE

To the Venerable the 106th General Assembly:

SECTION I: CONCERNS OF THE COLLEGE BOARD

1. The College and the Church. The Presbyterian Church in Canada needs Ewart College but also Ewart College needs the Church. The College endeavours to provide for the Church well prepared Christian Educators. The College needs the support of the Church as a whole to accomplish this task.

To have an intelligent, informed laity, growing in faith and able to take responsibility in Church and society, the Church must have a strong educational programme for all age groups — adult, youth and children. The establishment of a truly effective educational programme in the 1980's will mean major revisions in many existing programmes and introduction of new ones. To effect such revisions and innovations requires Church educators, prepared theologically and educationally to give leadership. The Board of College believes that the Church can look to Ewart College to provide these competent professional educators.

A growing trend in much theological education in North America today is of concern to the Board of the College. In the attempt to make the theological and educational institutions of the churches more independent financially the result has been a growing divorce from the sponsoring churches. This appears to us to be a dangerous trend. If a Church is to maintain its theological emphasis and not just its form of government, those who are to be its leaders in ministry, especially those related to the education of the membership, must receive their education in colleges which are supported in both morale and finances by the Church in which they will serve.

2. The Professional Christian Educator and the Church. The Board of the College has watched with concern as its graduates have sought to secure increased recognition in the life of the Church. Attempts to-date to achieve a relationship with the Courts of the Church by the establishment of an ordained diaconate have failed. There must be better ways to relate those who serve in the Church's

educational ministry to the Courts; further exploration is required.

In the meantime the College would remind the Church that there are, serving within its life, many, both male and female, who are extremely competent in their particular area of specialization. The Church as a whole could benefit greatly from a wider acceptance of their gifts and more opportunity for them to make their contribution within the Courts of the Church.

It is encouraging that there are indications of a growing awareness of the contribution that Ewart College graduates can make to the educational thrusts of the Church. This is evident in the increased number of requests for graduates. We regret that, in the last number of years, we have not been able to supply the Church with sufficient graduates to meet all of the requests.

- 3. Clustering of Congregations for Educational Development. At the 105th General Assembly the Board of the College requested that during the autumn of 1979 Presbyteries analyze the present status of educational needs in congregations within their bounds and consider the possibility of clustering some congregations for the purpose of employing a Christian Educator in order to strengthen educational efforts. While the number of replies was limited, we believe that in those Presbyteries which did undertake the study some valuable insights were discovered and a number of congregations are at present pursuing the possibility of forming a cluster in order to employ a professional Church educator. We would encourage those Presbyteries who have not yet undertaken this study to do so in the near future in order to plan for the future growth in educational endeavours.
- 4. Programmes and Enrolment at Ewart. The Board is now completing its present curriculum study (1977-1980) and reports that a number of changes in curriculum and field education programmes have been made in order further to strengthen the work of the College in the preparation of its students for specialized ministries and to meet current needs. In 1979 two students completed the two-year Graduate-Degree-Diploma programme inaugurated in 1977 and graduated receiving the Diploma of Ewart College and a Master of Education degree from the University of Toronto.

Enrolment for 1979-80 has been high and prospects for new students in the fall of 1980 look promising. Nevertheless to meet the needs of the Church for leadership in the specialized ministries, the Board would remind ministers and sessions to keep before their congregations the responsibility of encouraging people who might have a potential for work in these ministries.

- 5. Continuing and Lay Education. The Board is encouraged in the offering of Continuing and Lay Education programmes by the response of professional and lay leaders, particularly ministers who state that they welcome such opportunities to become more familiar with and competent to contribute to various aspects of Church education. Plans are already in progress for the offering of two such programmes each year well into the 1980's. It is hoped that still more ministers, deaconesses and key lay leaders will accept these opportunities for Continuing Education through Ewart College. The Board expresses appreciation to the Paulin Memorial Fund for a grant to subsidize the January programme.
- 6. Finances. The College Board records its appreciation to a number of individuals, groups, congregations and foundations who have contributed through legacies, gifts or grants to the various funds of the College Bursary, Scholarship, Library and Resource or to the general operating costs. Such gifts make possible some financial aid grants to students and enrichment of the College's programmes.

We are happy to report that the Resource Fund now stands at \$63,000. Now that this fund has surpassed the basic goal (\$50,000) it is possible to make use of interest from the fund for purposes "of strengthening and expanding the

work of the College".

Finances, however, continue to be a concern. Each year residence fees are increased substantially and careful oversight is given to expenditures. Yet the College must be dependent on the Church as a whole for a sizeable grant to support its work. We believe that the Church must continue to see the Colleges

as of crucial significance to its ongoing life and mission in our day and accept responsibility for their support

7. References from the 105th General Assembly. Two matters referred from the 105th General Assembly were considered by the Board.

In regard to "financial and employment policies for . . . professional church workers", the Board has indicated to the Board of Ministry that we believe that that Board is dealing with this matter in relation to Ewart College graduates in a satisfactory way and the College supports the efforts of the Board in this regard.

Preparation for ministry in rural areas is kept in mind in the preparation of Ewart College graduates, a number of whom serve both urban and rural areas as Area Educational Consultants.

SECTION II: ACADEMIC SESSION 1979-80

1. Academic Session. The 36 students were enrolled in programmes as follows: one in the Graduate-Degree-Diploma programme, two in the Graduate-Diploma programme, 19 in the Degree-Diploma programme, two in the Diploma programme and undertaking a pre-university course, ten in the Three-year Diploma programme and two studied as missionaries on furlough. The faculty consisting of Dr. Margaret Webster, Principal, the Reverend Irene Dickson, Professor of Biblical Studies, the Reverend Robert C. ACCOUNTING PRACTICES

The following is a summary of accounting practices followed by the College.

(a) Investments and investment income

The Consolidated Investment Portfolio, in which Ewart College has an interest, is held by The Presbyterian Church in Canada and is adjusted to market value each year. Any increase or decrease in market value is allocated to the capital portion of the various scholarship and bursary funds.

Other investments are recorded at cost.

Income from investments is recorded on an accrual basis.

Realized gains or losses from investment transactions are recorded on the transaction date.

(b) Fixed assets

Land and building are capitalized in the books of The Presbyterian Church in Canada and are not included in these accounts. Furnishings and office equipment are expensed in the year acquired.

(c) Funds

The fund balances are segregated in relation to restrictions placed upon their use by the donor.

The College Board determines the usage of any bequest received for which no specific use is stated by the donor.

With the exception of recording consolidated investments at market value, these financial statements have been prepared in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted for non-profit organizations.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF KNOX COLLEGE

To the Venerable the 106th General Assembly:

The Board of Knox College submits the following as its 136th Annual Report. The Board continues to be mindful of the high expectations that the Church holds for the work of the College and has striven to fulfill them. The Board is pleased to note that the Church has been able to respond generously to the needs of the College as it seeks to meet these high expectations.

The year has been a busy one. As you will see from the details of the report, it has been a mixture of progress, problems, reorganization, development and growth.

The Principal

Principal J. Charles Hay became ill during the year and is on sick leave. We pray that he will be soon restored to good health. We greatly appreciate his efforts in preparing and organizing for the year ahead which eased the problems resulting from his sudden absence from duty.

The Acting Principal

Professor W. James S. Farris was appointed Acting Principal while Principal Hay was on sick leave. We appreciate Dr. Farris' acceptance of this added responsibility and his capable performance on behalf of the College.

The Faculty

Associate Professor Donald C. Smith and Associate Professor Raymond A. Humphries were inducted into the Chairs of Church and Ministry, and New Testament, respectively, on November 8th, 1979.

Special arrangements regarding teaching assistants and the use of Toronto

School of Theology facilities were made as a result of Principal Hay's absence.

Enrolment

Total enrolment continued at record levels for the M.Div. and Advanced Degree students.

Residence

The occupancy rate of the residence continued at a high level. Further facilities are being made available for female students. One wing was in operation during the summer months.

Staff changes have made it necessary to expedite our plans for reorganizing the food and other services as well as space requirements. These plans are well under way and are expected to be effective late in 1980. The objective is to maintain the high standards and reputation of the service at the most reasonable per capita cost.

Room and board rates were adjusted to reflect the current cost elements. Our efforts to make these services self-supporting are continuing, but they must take into account (a) the competition in the area, (b) the undue effect of delayed and unusual maintenance costs, and (c) the students' ability to sustain themselves during their preparation for the Ministry.

Commendations

This has been a busy year for all concerned, with special problems due to illness, staff changes, reorganization plans, and the ATS accreditation visit.

The Board wishes to commend:

The Faculty, and Administrative and Library staffs, for their efforts, contributions, and cooperation, especially during Dr. Hay's absence.

The officers and committee members who have given so generously of their time and talents.

Recognition

The Board extends its special thanks to Mrs. Ruth Embree, the Principal's secretary, who is leaving after six years with us to accompany her husband to his overseas work under the Board of World Mission in South East Asia. Mrs. Embree has been most cooperative and helpful to the Board. Our prayers and good wishes go with them.

The College thanks the Choir for its contribution to the College through its many visits to congregations. The Knox Choir's participation in their services has been reported by several congregations as being most enjoyable and greatly appreciated.

Relations with the Academic Community

The College continues to benefit by these associations and continues to make

its own unique contribution.

The Association of Theological Schools in the United States and Canada has completed its accreditation visit and we feel that it has been satisfied with what it found and discussed. The ATS accreditation report concerning the College will be received in due course.

Property Maintenance

The maintenance program set in motion a couple of years ago is proceeding and being integrated with the space requirements of staff and administrative changes. Throughout, safety and overall economy are the main concerns.

Financial Administration

The Board continues to strive for the most economical basis of operation consistent with the objectives of the College and the welfare of the faculty, the students, and the staff. Recent staff changes as well as the effects of continued high

enrolment have hastened our plans to reassess the division of administrative duties. This study is in process and it is expected to reallocate these duties on a more equitable and efficient basis at the most economical level practical.

The Board is consulting and cooperating with the appropriate committee of the Administrative Council in the matter of faculty stipends, referred to us by the

105th General Assembly.

We repeat our prayer that the Church will continue to respond positively to the financial needs of the College, most of which are affected by factors such as inflation and energy costs that we are unable to control.

Financial Appeal

In accordance with our original commitment to avoid any conflict with the Second Century Appeal, we have delayed the campaign to late 1980 and into 1981. Much preliminary work is already being done to clarify the objectives, priorities, constituents and procedures originally approved.

Bequests and Donations

The Board expresses its grateful appreciation to the donors of gifts received during 1979 to be used for scholarships and bursaries. We encourage the donations of such gifts. The donations received are listed under items (a), (b), (c) and (d).

We have examined the balance sheet of Knox College as at December 31, 1979 and, the statements of revenue, expenditure and unexpended funds for the general fund, the scholarship funds and miscellaneous funds for the year then ended. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests and other procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

KNOX COLLEGE NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 1979

1. ACCOUNTING PRACTICES

The following is a summary of significant accounting practices followed by the College.

(a) Investments and investment income

Investments purchased by the College are valued at cost. Investments received by bequest are recorded on the basis of fair market value at the time of receipt.

Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis and dividends are recorded when received. Realized gains or losses from investment transactions are recorded on the transaction date.

(b) Fixed assets

The original land and buildings are recorded in the books of The Presbyterian Church in Canada and are not included in these accounts. Other fixed assets purchased by the College are expensed in the year of acquisition.

(c) Funds, donations and bequests

The fund, donations and bequests balances are segregated in relation to restrictions placed upon their use by the donor. The College Board determines the usage of any bequests received for which no specific use is stated by the donor.

REPORT OF THE SENATE OF KNOX COLLEGE

To the Venerable the 106th General Assembly:

This was the year of The Visit. A great deal of time was given over in the Fall to the preparation of the self-study prior to the accreditation visit of the Association of Theological Schools in the United States and Canada: a process that involved all elements of the Knox College constituency; students, alumni, Board, Senate, faculty, support staff. The result was a 172-page descriptive and analytical and critical review of our policies and programmes. A copy is available in the library to any who care to consult it. The visit itself by ATS took place at the first of March, when the visitors interviewed students, faculty, alumni, and some members of Board and Senate. At the time of writing we have not yet received a report of the visit, and will not actually receive the recommendations re accreditation until after the meeting of the Commission on Accrediting of ATS in June.

However, thorough as that critical review was, we are still involved in the process. The Knox College Financial Campaign Committee is currently at the preparation stage, with sub-committees like Facilities Planning and Program Priorities, again with representatives from all elements of the Knox College community and from the Church, including a good proportion of lay people. The College in all of

this is very much aware of its purpose in relationship to the Church.

Our two new members of faculty, Professor Donald Smith and Professor Raymond Humphries were inducted in November. Dr. Smith already had, and Dr. Humphries already has made a significant contribution to the life of the Knox College community. We are delighted that our faculty, though lacking representation in certain areas, is now at original strength.

The Laidlaw Lectures were given in October 1979 by Dr. Hywel D. Lewis, Professor Emeritus, History and Philosophy of Religion, of the University of London, England. The subject was "Jesus in the Faith of Christians" and the individual lectures were entitled: "Religious Experience and Truth", "Christology and Prevarication", "The Christ Event", and "Jesus and other Faiths".

The Charles H. MacDonald Memorial Lecture was given in February by the Very Reverend David W. Hay, Professor Emeritus of Systematic Theology, Knox College, and Minister of First Presbyterian Church, St. David's, Ontario. Dr. Hay spoke on the subject, "Presbyterians and Liturgy".

Our thanks are due to our sessional lecturers: Dr. Margaret Webster, Christian Education; Rev. James A. Thomson, Liturgics; Rev. A. Ross Gibson, Homiletics; Rev. Brian Fraser, Canadian Presbyterian Church History; and Mr. John Derksen,

Church Music.

Consideration has been given to the question of a unicameral system of government, but as of this date the Senate has not quite arrived at a conclusion. A recom-

mendation will likely be ready for the Assembly.

THE PRESBYTERIAN COLLEGE REPORT OF THE SENATE 1979-1980

To The Venerable the 106th General Assembly:

The Senate of the Presbyterian College, Montreal, submits its report of the Session 1979-1980. The work of the College is continuing to progress and under the effective direction of the Principal, Reverend Dr. William J. Klempa, and the Faculty, every effort is being made to promote the interests of the College and we see for it a bright future.

Induction of the Director of Studies

A highlight of the year took place in The Church of St. Andrew and St. Paul on Wednesday, January 30, 1980 when The Reverend Thomas Gemmell was inducted into the position of Director of Studies by The Reverend William R. Russell, Moderator of the Presbytery of Montreal. The Reverend Thomas Gemmell gave the address and others participating in the service included Principal Klempa, who narrated the steps, and The Reverend Shirley J. Herman, who gave the charge.

The Theological Programme

The Presbyterian College participates in and helps to form the McGill Faculty of Religious Studies. This provides an enlarged faculty and a broader curriculum and makes it possible for our students to study theology in an ecumenical setting.

The first two years of the theological programme leading to the Bachelor of Theology or the Master of Sacred Theology degree, are taken in the Faculty of Religious Studies. Our Presbyterian College students along with students from Montreal Diocesan College and United Theological College receive instruction in Old Testament from Professor Robert C. Culley, in Church History from Professor H. Keith Markell, in Philosophy of Religion from Dean Joseph C. McLelland, all of whom are Presbyterian College faculty members of the Faculty of Religious Studies including Professor Charles Adams, Professor Stanley Frost, Professor George Johnston, Professor Arthur Boorman, Professor Douglas Hall, Professor Munroe Peaston, Professor Donna Runnalls, Professor Robert Stevenson and Professor Katherine Young. Courses in theology are also given by Principal William Klempa and in Old Testament by Dr. Arthur Van Seters.

We are very pleased to announce that Professor Joseph C. McLelland has been re-appointed as Dean of the Faculty of Religious Studies for a second five-year term. Dr. McLelland will be on sabbatical during the 1980-81 academic year.

Two new appointments have been made to replace retiring faculty members in the departments of New Testament and Church History. Dr. Fred Wisse, formerly of the McMaster University New Testament Project, has been appointed Associate Professor of New Testament. Dr. Wisse is a brilliant scholar who has made outstanding contributions in the field of New Testament textual criticism and the study of gnostic and other coptic texts. He is a graduate of Calvin College and he holds a doctorate in New Testament from Claremont Graduate School in California. Dr. Wisse is a Presbyterian and it is hoped that he will be appointed by our Senate to our Presbyterian College faculty. Dr. Edward Furcha has been appointed Associate Professor of Church History replacing Professor H. Keith Markell, who is retiring this year. Dr. Furcha is a graduate of McGill University and Hartford Seminary. He has taught in the Vancouver School of Theology and at Serampore College, Calcutta, India. He comes to the Faculty of Religious Studies from the position of Senior Minister of Washington United Church, Scarborough, Ontario.

The third year of the theological programme, called the In-Ministry Year, is taken in the Montreal Institute for Ministry. Here our students receive field-based training from field education supervisors and take courses in Preaching and Liturgy, Prophetic/Pastoral Ministry, Christian Education and Administration, and Denominational Studies. The Director of the Montreal Institute for Ministry is Dr. Arthur Van Seters, who also teaches Preaching and Liturgy. Our Director of Studies is the Reverend Thomas Gemmell. He teaches Prophetic/Pastoral Ministry. The course in Denominational Studies which includes the Reformed Tradition, Confessionalism and the Westminster Standards, and Presbyterian Polity is given by the Principal. Dr. Klempa also teaches Preaching and Liturgy. Others who teach include Principal Pierre Goldberger and the Reverend Tom Edmonds of United Theological College and the Reverend Donald Thompson of Montreal Diocesan College and the Reverend William Derby.

L.W. Anderson Lectures

The 1980 L.W. Anderson Lectures were given on February 14th by Dr. Walter Brueggemann, Professor of Old Testament and Dean of Academic Affairs, Eden Theological Seminary, Webster Groves, Missouri on the subjects, "On Anger and Anguish", "The Quaking New in the Heart of God" and "The Narrow Way to Newness in the Human Community". These lectures are made possible through the generosity of the late L.W. Anderson, a prominent Montreal businessman and a generous benefactor of the College for many years.

Continuing Theological Education

The College continues to offer Continuing Theological Education for Ministers:

Programme A: February 4-8, 1980

The following courses were given: Professor George Johnston of McGill Faculty of Religious Studies on "The Responsible Use of the New Testament in Preaching", Dean Joseph C. McLelland on "Preaching and Doctrine" and Dr. Stanley Walters, Professor of Old Testament, Knox College, Toronto on "Preaching from the Old Testament". A workshop on Preaching was led by Dr. Arthur Van Seters, Executive Director of the Montreal Institute for Ministry, and Dr. William Klempa.

Programme B: February 11-15, 1980

Courses were given by: Professor Robert C. Culley of the McGill Faculty of Religious Studies on "Biblical Foundations of a Prophetic Ministry" and The Reverend Thomas Gemmell and The Reverend Thomas Edmonds of Presbyterian College and United Theological College respectively on "Pastoral/Prophetic Ministry To-day". A workshop on "The Prophetic Ministry in Canada in the 1980's" was led by Dr. Geoffrey Johnston, Minister of Gateway Community Church, Toronto, and The Reverend Brian Fraser, Minister of Glebe Presbyterian Church, Toronto.

Programme C: February 18-22, 1980

Sessions were led by: Professor Allison Trites, Professor of New Testament, Faculty of Divinity, Acadia University on "Evangelism and Witness in the New Testament". Professor Gabriel Fackre, Professor of Theology at Andover-Newton

Theological Seminary, Andover, Massachusetts on "Christian Faith in a Pluralistic World". A workshop of Church Growth was led by the Reverend John Duncan of the Board of Congregational Life.

The Paulin Ministers' Institute: May 5-9, 1980

Led by Dr. James D. Smart and Dr. William Klempa and McGill faculty members and Montreal ministers.

In addition to these programmes, the College sponsored a Scholar in Residence Programme for a one or two week period during which ministers did directed reading under the supervision of a faculty member. The Montreal Institute for Ministry conducted two workshops: "Ministry and Sexuality" led by Mrs. Shelly Finson from the Centre for Christian Studies, Toronto and "The Referendum — Challenge to Faith". The Institute also directs a Reading Course in Christian Theology for interested laity.

There has been a good response to these various Continuing Education programmes and participants have found each of the programmes profitable and helpful.

College Hours

Members of the Faculty have been participating in a new programme called "College Hours" which is an attempt to keep our first and second year students cognizant of the Presbyterian tradition, ethos, and practice. Thursday afternoons have been devoted to this programme which includes workshops on Ministry Today, Preaching, Worship and Pastoral Care.

Roman Catholic-Protestant Co-operation

Efforts are underway to co-operate with the Roman Catholic authorities through the Department of Theological Studies at Loyola (Concordia University). At present anglophone candidates for the priesthood must take their theological studies outside the province of Québec. It is envisaged that a Roman Catholic institution will be established which will become a member along with Diocesan, United and Presbyterian Colleges of the Joint Board of Theological Colleges which presently directs the work of the Montreal Institute for Ministry.

The Master of Divinity Degree Proposal

The McGill Faculty of Religious Studies and the three affiliated colleges, Diocesan, United Theological and Presbyterian College have been exploring the possibility of conferring the degree of Master of Divinity. An accreditation team from the Association of Theological Schools has recommended that the Faculty of Religious Studies and the three colleges take steps to offer the Master of Divinity degree, to conform to what is now a fairly universal practice among American and Canadian seminaries. At present graduates of the two year theological programme at the McGill Faculty of Religious Studies receive either a Bachelor of Theology or a Master of Sacred Theology degree depending upon the programme they pursue and a Diploma in Ministry and a Diploma of the College upon successful completion of the In-Ministry Year (normally the third year) programme in the Montreal Institute for Ministry. It has been agreed that the Master of Divinity degree be conferred by the Colleges rather than by McGill University. The three affiliated colleges have examined their charters to determine whether this is possible. Both Diocesan College and Presbyterian College have charters which specify the right to confer the Bachelor of Divinity degree. United Theological College has a charter which gives it the right to grant "degrees in divinity." United Theological College is now proceeding with arrangements whereby the Master of Divinity degree can be given at the 1981 College Convocations. Presbyterian College along with Montreal Diocesan Theological College and the proposed Roman Catholic College plan to work through the United Theological College until such time as our charters have been changed. Thus it is hoped that Presbyterian College, making use of the charter of United Theological College, will begin conferring the Master of Divinity degree beginning in 1981.

Presbyterian College Residence

The Senate of the College made a decision a year ago to rent all the available rooms, apart from four which were reserved for Continuing Education participants, to McGill University students giving priority to candidates studying for the ministry. During the 1979-80 academic year there were thirty-six students in residence fifteen of whom are members of the theological student body of Presbyterian College and the others are students studying in the faculties of Nursing, Arts, Law, Medicine, Engineering, Science, etc.

The College Cafeteria provides meals for the forty resident students of Montreal Diocesan Theological College as well as to other persons particularly those who come for Continuing Education programmes. Since meals are not served on weekends, the College has had to proceed with the installation of a second kitchen which our resident students may use to prepare meals on Saturdays and Sundays. This has meant an expenditure of almost \$10,000 which has not been provided for in the budget. The House Committee of Senate is now in the process of doing a feasibility study of a plan to rent residence rooms to McGill summer students and visitors to Montreal during the months of May, June, July and August.

Francophone Theological Education

At present there is no Francophone Protestant Theological College in the Province of Québec. Steps have been taken by our College along with Diocesan Anglican and United Theological Colleges and the McGill Faculty of Religious Studies to set up a theological programme for the training of francophone candidates for the Ministry, validated by a university degree and recognized by our participating Churches. It is proposed that this programme take place within an "Institut de Théologie Francophone" under the responsibility of the Joint Board of Theological Colleges. Although many details must still be worked out, it is hoped that the programme will be initiated in September, 1980 with an enrolment of about six students. Several conversations have taken place with representatives of the Alliance de Réformée Evangélique which is also attempting to establish a theological programme for the training of francophone students. These conversations have been very productive and it appears that a measure of co-operation in theological education will be possible.

Our Senate and Faculty have been given strong support to this venture. Although Presbyterian College began with a French Department, which then became an integral part of the work of the College, this element has been lacking during the past six decades. This has had a deleterious effect on our Presbyterian witness in the

Province of Québec.

At its meeting on March 10, 1980, the Senate of the College approved that the following recommendation be presented to the 106th General Assembly: "That the General Assembly approve the involvement of the Presbyterian College in the development of a new francophone theological education programme associated with the theological colleges affiliated with McGill University and that Seven Thousand Dollars (\$7,000) additional funds be granted for this purpose for the year 1980-1981." (See Recommendation No. 1.).

Tuition Fees

A year ago the Administrative Council requested that the three Church colleges study the question of charging tuition fees. While most theological colleges in North America have charged tuition fees for many years our Colleges have not done so. Both our Theological Students' Society and the Senate have discussed this matter again during the past year. At its meeting on March 10, 1980 the Senate approved the following resolution: "That the Senate of the Presbyterian College, Montreal, reply to the Administrative Council that it is in favour of theological students paying tuition fees provided that similar action is taken by the other two colleges."

Joint Faculty Meeting

Presbyterian College hosted the Joint Meeting of the Ewart, Knox College and Presbyterian College faculties on February 8-9, 1980. Our meeting took a different

form this year. Discussion papers were prepared and sent out prior to the meeting and the time of the meeting was extended. Papers were read on the following subjects: "The Colleges and the Church", "The Responsibility of the College for Continuing Education and for Theological Leadership", "Selection and Evaluation of Candidates", "Guidelines for Theological Preparation for Ministry in The Presbyterian Church in Canada", "The Colleges and the Board of World Mission", "Projection of Supply-Demand re Ministers", etc. The Secretary of the Board of Ministry the Reverend Jack Cooper, was present at our meeting and he made a valuable contribution to our discussions.

It was agreed that we communicate with the Board of World Mission to inquire whether it would be possible to change the timing of the Ordained Missionary appointment from March to May since the appointment process creates some disruption in the college programme. Moreover, students receive their appointments before they graduate and are licensed by presbytery. When a student does not graduate this creates many difficulties. A letter has been sent to the Board of World

Mission making this request.

It was also suggested that certification of students be a two-stage process of first commending a person for theological studies and then certifying that person as a candidate for ministry.

Next year's Joint Faculty Meeting will be hosted by Knox College.

Appointment of Women to Senate

A year ago the Senate recommended that the Board of Ministry establish a task force which would seek to discover ways: (1) to eliminate discrimination against women in the appointment and call procedure and (2) to educate presbyteries, sessions and congregations regarding the partnership of men and women in ministry. In order to make this partnership more of a reality in its life and work, the Senate is recommending that the 106th General Assembly instruct the Committee to Nominate Standing Committees to nominate members to the Senate of the Presbyterian College with special emphasis on the appointment of women, lay and clerical.

Gifts to College

Again this year, the College has been the recipient of a number of gifts for bursaries, scholarships and prizes as well as the general funds of the College, which we gratefully acknowledge. A list of gifts will be printed again in the College calendar.

Professor H. Keith Markell

Professor H. Keith Markell retires from the McGill Faculty of Religious Studies as of August 31, 1980. Dr. Markell has been a distinguished member of the College Faculty for over thirty years and a devoted servant of the College.

Appreciation of the Principal

The Principal, Dr. Klempa, has introduced a spirit of adventure "new beginnings" within the College Community with his enthusiastic approach to the promotion of the College through new projects. Dr. Klempa has been well received by the students and Faculty and the prospects for the College are very encouraging.

THE PRESBYTERIAN COLLEGE, MONTREAL NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 1979

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles appropriate for a non-profit organization.

The College makes no charge for depreciation on buildings and equipment in the determination of annual operating results on the grounds that fixed assets, when replaced, will be financed from public or private donations. In order to provide for systematic write off of fixed assets, the Board of Management has adopted the policy of recording depreciation on fixed assets by a direct charge against the Building and Maintenance Fund.

Revenue from investments is treated as income of the General Fund with the exception of the portion thereof deemed to be earned by the Endowments for Scholarships which are allocated directly to Scholarship Funds Held for Disbursement. Gain or losses on the sale of investments are credited directly to the General Fund with the exception of the portion thereof deemed to be applicable to the Scholarship Funds Held for Disbursement.

2. LAND

Land, which was acquired for nominal consideration as part of an exchange with McGill University, is shown at the value assigned by the Board of Management in 1961.

3. SCHOLARSHIP FUNDS FOR DISBURSEMENT

This fund represents accumulated income on Endowments for Scholarships and contributions received for scholarships, bursaries and prizes not specifically donated to the Endowment Fund, less applicable disbursements to date.

COMMUNICATION SERVICES COMMITTEE

To the Venerable the 106th General Assembly:

"Lord, help us to communicate first with Thee so we might know what is important to communicate to others. Lord, teach us your Good News so that we might tell others and the whole world might rejoice!" Amen.

This short prayer forms the raison d'être for this committee and emphasizes the responsibility and the task that we have been given within the Church – to assist congregations, Presbyteries and Synods in becoming more fully aware of the many effective ways of communicating the gospel today and in the future and to provide training in order that these modern technologies can be more fully utilized in the service of Christ.

This has been the first full year for our new Director and Production Technician and we believe much has been accomplished. As a "service" committee we strongly believe we have been able to respond successfully to the particular needs and requests of any board, committee, presbytery, congregation or individual during this past year. This despite the fact that the department has been without the

services of a full time secretary since last June.

In the absence of the regular secretary, Mrs. Meta Robinson, due to illness the staff has been ably assisted, on a part-time basis, by Miss Mabel Booth and Mrs. Helen Young. The Committee wishes to express their indebtedness to Miss Booth and Mrs. Young for their outstanding efforts in assisting so well at a time when our department was expanding and during the period of reorganization of the Audio-Visual Resources Library.

Library Services:

All audio-visual resource materials presently in our library have been recatalogued. A new 130 page Audio-Visual Resources catalogue, listing all of our 16 mm films, filmstrips and slides, has been produced and distributed to congregations at a cost of \$5 per catalogue (this amount being our actual cost to produce and distribute them). The library has been moved into the Communication Services department area from the Distribution department where it had been previously housed. Through careful reorganization and a more complete utilization of space this relocation was done without structural changes or renovation costs.

During this past year the staff has been conducting an extensive study of the Library services pertaining, in particular, to delays in distributing library materials and the possibility of establishing a number of regional interchurch resource centres across Canada (Recommendation 2, Acts and Proceedings, 1979, page 287). Our

study indicates that:

(a) 66 per cent of churches contacted across Canada do not want to see re-

gional resource centres established at this time.

(b) The delivery of library materials to congregations in most areas of Canada has greatly improved due to using, almost exclusively, a private courier service wherever possible. Some areas can only be served by the Post Office and every effort is made to ensure prompt delivery.

(c) Since the distribution of the new 1980 catalogue, film and filmstrip orders have increased by 39 per cent in the first quarter of 1980 as compared to

1979.

- (d) The geographic breakdown of utilization of materials from our central film library is as follows (in per cent): Newfoundland .4, Nova Scotia 1.9, Prince Edward Island 2.3, New Brunswick 2.3, Quebec 3.7, Ontario 82, Manitoba 1.3, Saskatchewan 1.9, Alberta 1.9 and British Columbia 2.3.
- (e) Our study also indicates that there are sufficient alternate sources of media materials, particularly 16 mm films, available in almost all areas of Canada to supplement the use of materials from our central library in Don Mills,

During the year we have revised the rental rates to reflect the rising costs of maintaining the library services. The rates remain very reasonable with the average cost of individual filmstrips set at \$2.50 and 16 mm films and kits at \$5.00. We now have available an all-inclusive annual membership for \$25 for congregations who might find it to their advantage to subscribe to this membership plan. The annual membership (payable each April 1st) covers an unlimited number of book-

ings for materials from our central library exclusive of all shipping charges.

As the materials in the library were being recatalogued we quickly became aware that many of the materials were old and outdated. We plan to update and replace these obsolete materials within the limitations of the budget available. With the very high cost of 16 mm films, we believe that it may be soon impossible to purchase new 16 mm films for our library. Therefore, consideration must be given to concentrate on holding only sound filmstrips and multi-media kits which support Christian Education programmes and other ongoing mission studies. It may be necessary to leave this whole area of rental of 16 mm films to large Christian film rental libraries, regional library systems, National Film Board and other private or institutional sources.

Therefore, the Committee recommends that no further action be taken, at this time, to negotiate with Interchurch Communications or other church groups to establish a number of regional film library resource centres across Canada. The Committee and staff will continue to strive to provide the best possible library services to all regions of the Church within the budgets available. We encourage individual congregations to list all of their sources for films and filmstrips, to support their programmes, and send them into the Committee so that a complete resource guide can be prepared listing these sources which could then be shared with all congregations across Canada. See Recommendations 1 and 2.

Audio and Video Ministry

(a) Radio: The "Amazing Grace" weekly 15 minute radio series which had been aired in Oshawa, Ontario and Woodstock, New Brunswick until January, 1980 has been discontinued. On January 8, 1980 a Joint Radio Task Force met to discuss this whole area of radio ministry. This Task Force has recommended that:

(1) The production of the "Amazing Grace" radio series be discontinued.

(2) Sample cassette tapes be prepared by our staff in co-operation with Dr. Mariano DiGangi and be offered to congregations through the Board of Congregational Life. There appears to be a market for prepared audio cassettes with a Christian message which congregations would use in a cassette ministry with shut-ins and members who for various reasons cannot attend worship on a regular basis.

(3) Communication Services continue to monitor the viability of Christian radio ministry on A.M. stations and in particular F.M. stations across

Canada.

(4) We encourage the promotion and involvement of individual congregations and presbyteries in the many varied forms of radio ministry, with emphasis

on the proposed cassette ministry.

At present The Presbyterian Church in Canada is continuing to participate in an ecumenical weekly 20 minute radio programme entitled "Godshow" which is aired Sunday evenings over C.F.R.B. Toronto and C.K.O.Y. Ottawa. It is hoped that this radio programme can be broadcast nationally in the near future, since there is sufficient interest and support to do so. John Archibald, our production technician, has again been selected to act as host of this very popular religious radio programme. The total cost of producing this weekly programme is \$27,000 with the Presbyterian share set at \$1,900 for 1980.

(b) Television: Three Presbyterian churches were selected for the 1979-80 C.B.C.

television programme "Meeting Place" televised each Sunday morning:

Gateway, Don Mills, Ontario — December 9, 1979. St. Stephen's, Ottawa, Ontario — February 3, 1980. Centennial, Calgary, Alberta — March 23, 1980

In co-operation with Mr. Jim St. Marie, our Presbyterian Church representative on the C.B.C. Religious Advisory Committee, and the Program Co-ordinating Committee we have developed a Nominating Process and Procedures for Selecting Presbyterian Congregations for C.B.C. "Meeting Place" Programmes. This full report, outlining the steps for nominating congregations, will be circulated to all ministers and congregations in September, 1980.

Briefly the report states that:

(1) The allotment of Presbyterian church services in any given program year is based on the 1971 census which results in the C.B.C. offering us three services: one in the fall, one in midwinter and one in the spring.

(2) The C.B.C. has the responsibility for selecting the specific cities and dates

for Presbyterian services.

(3) The Presbyterian Church in Canada has the responsibility for nominating

two congregations (first and second choices) per selected locale.

(4) Under normal circumstances Presbyterian congregations selected must be within a one hour drive of a C.B.C. studio originating from: Cornerbrook Newfoundland, St. John's Newfoundland, Halifax Nova Scotia, Montreal Quebec, Ottawa Ontario, Toronto Ontario, Winnipeg Manitoba, Regina/ Moose Jaw Saskatchewan, Calgary Alberta, Edmonton Alberta and Vancouver British Columbia.

(c) Public Services Television Spots: Our five Presbyterian Church in Canada 60 second television spots have been distributed to 45 commercial television stations and 15 community cable systems across Canada and are currently being aired. We welcome comments from viewers who have seen these spots and would appreciate knowing on which station, the date and time the spots were

aired.

(d) Children's Television Special: This half hour children's television programme, in honour of the U.N. Year of the Child, entitled "Serendipity Spyglass", has been completed and has been shown twice on the national C.B.C. network: November 24, 1979 and February 24, 1980. It also was shown at the Religious Communications Congress/80 in Nashville, Tennessee on May 15, 1980. A 16 mm film of the programme is available for use in Sunday schools, church groups and schools and may be obtained from our central film library.

(e) Community Cable Television: We have been encouraged by the number of congregations who have informed us of successful utilization of the cable television system in their own community. We welcome this information and the offer of loaning us copies of their programmes to share with others who are just beginning to use cable television facilities. We encourage every congregation to explore the opportunities which are available to them and learn how they

might be put to use to meet their individual needs.

We are aware that many congregations have already made excellent use of radio, cassette ministry, television and community cable systems. The members and staff of the Committee are available and willing to meet with ministers, congregational groups and presbyteries to assist in the development of skills in the broadcast field, offer advice, hold workshops and to support existing programmes. We are prepared to respond to the particular needs which are presented to us.

Burning Bush Productions Inc.:

In 1973 the Communication Services Committee was given approval by the General Assembly to form a Canadian Corporation, called Burning Bush Productions Inc., whose charter was to produce and distribute a series of 26 television programmes for four and five year old children. As well the Corporation was to facilitate the financing, production and sale of these programmes.

A pilot of the series, entitled "My Place", was produced and shown to con-

A pilot of the series, entitled "My Place", was produced and shown to congregations across the country and as well sponsors were sought to assist in the financing. Unfortunately sufficient funding was not forthcoming and the pro-

ject was shelved in 1977.

In 1979, to honour the International Year of the Child, the Communication Services Committee and the Directors of Burning Bush Productions Inc. were successful in co-producing a children's television special with the Children's Department of the C.B.C. Financing for this programme came from the remaining Burning Bush Production funds supplemented with a \$2,500 grant from the Canadian International Year of the Child Committee.

Because of the ever increasing high cost of producing television programmes, finding sponsors and stations who would air our programmes, the Communication Services Committee believes in 1980 that the emphasis should now turn from producing commercial television programmes and be aimed at the whole new area of video ministry. Therefore, we believe that the original mandate for keeping Burning Bush Productions Inc. an ongoing viable identity is no longer financially valid. Following two major productions of the "My Place" pilot and the Children's Television Special there is not sufficient funding available to produce further projects. The annual legal and audit costs, just to keep the charter alive, will soon deplete what monies remain. The Communication Services Committee believes that this is not a very responsible way in which to continue to manage this Corporation.

This whole matter is being given further study by the Committee, in consultation which the Corporation's solicitor, and a supplementary report will be

presented to the General Assembly.

Field Work: The staff has conducted workshops and consultations in many areas for Presbyteries and some individual congregations. These have been related to the use of audio-visual resources and equipment, radio broadcasting, production for cable systems, television programming and filmstrip/slide productions. We would welcome more of such invitations.

The director has attended meetings and worked on consultations and workshops with: Interchurch Communications, Congress '79 Committee, World Association for Christian Communication in Los Angeles, California, Religious Communications Congress/1980 in Nashville Tennessee and with third year students at

Knox and Ewart Colleges.

Although we have accomplished a great deal this past year we look to the future with eager anticipation. As in the past, we are ready to respond to the individual needs of any minister, congregation, presbytery, synod, board or college. Therefore, whatever the interest or need in all areas of communication, we will do our best to respond. We are humbly grateful for the continued encouragement and support from so many areas of the Church.

Our aim is to support the presentation of Christ and His good news in as effective and efficient manner as is possible. Your Committee and staff, with your assis-

tance and support, will do all in its power to honour this commitment.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 1 A

As a result of the extensive study concerning the whole area of film library services from the central library in Don Mills, Ontario, the Communication Services Committee recommends to the 106th General Assembly that:

We do not establish regional film libraries or negotiate with other denominations for the establishment of co-operative joint regional film libraries at this time.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 2 A

That the 106th General Assembly encourage Presbyteries to assist the Communication Services Committee in finding alternate sources for the rental of Christian films in all areas of the country, and as well

(a) support the ongoing updating of filmstrips, slides and multi-media kits, within the budget available, in the central library,

(b) support the Communication Services Committee in keeping abreast of the changing media scene, particularly in the area of video cassettes,

(c) encourage congregations to obtain the new 1980 edition of the Audio-Visual Resources catalogue, and

(d) encourage congregations, who would find it to their advantage to use an annual film rental membership, to subscribe to the Audio-Visual Resources Library annual membership.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 3 A

That the 106th General Assembly urge Synods and Presbyteries to use the services of the Communication Services Committee to assist in organizing workshops to provide knowledge of and training in all areas of communication.

THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA BOARD OF CONGREGATIONAL LIFE

To the Venerable the 106th General Assembly:

The year 1979 was one of growth and development for many congregations of The Presbyterian Church in Canada. The Congregational Activities reports received by the Board of Congregational Life indicate a marked increase in programs of outreach and community service, and a significant number of congregations have made a serious effort to come to grips with the State of the Church Report and the principles of church growth and renewal. While the Church has not yet reached the point of a net increase in communicant membership it should be noted with gratitude to Almighty God that 4214 persons united with the Church by profession of faith, an increase of 30 over 1978, and an increase of 150 over 1977. The net decrease in membership was 730, less than half the decrease of the previous year.

Field Work

In keeping with the mandate to provide assistance to church courts and congregations in their programs of life and mission, through its staff the Board has worked with seven of the eight Synods in 1979, and with 26 Presbyteries. Besides the work initiated through the Presbyteries and Synods, the staff has responded to the needs of numerous congregations all across the Church, providing planning assistance, training events, workshops on a variety of subjects, and the introduction and use of resources.

In order to understand and respond better to local needs the Board has implemented a policy of holding consultations with Presbytery and Presbyterial representatives in Synod areas. One such consultation was held in Alberta in November 1979, and two more were held in Saskatchewan and Manitoba and Northwestern Ontario in January 1980. The evaluations from the participants at these three consultations have encouraged the Board to proceed with plans to hold such events with all the Synods over the next one to three years, the timing depending on the availability of funds.

Handbook for Presbytery Conveners

As a result of the work of a Task Force on Support for Presbytery Committees a Handbook for Presbytery Conveners has been prepared. Since there is a fairly rapid turnover of conveners such a Handbook will prove invaluable to any new convener, and will help provide continuity within the committee.

Response to the State of the Church Report

Presbyteries and Congregations were asked to study the State of the Church Report and to respond to it by January 31, 1980, by reporting to the Board of Congregational Life what actions have been taken or are planned as a result of their study.

Five Presbyteries have reported having studied the Report —

Prince Edward Island Waterloo-Wellington Bruce-Maitland

Westminster

Lindsay-Peterborough

The report from Waterloo-Wellington will be used as a model in encouraging other Presbyteries to study the report and take specific actions.

102 congregations have reported that they have studied the Report, and all but twenty-two have indicated specific actions which they have taken or planned as a result.

42 congregations have reported that they plan to study the Report early in 1980, and 7 congregations have reported that they have not studied the report,

with no indication that they intend to do so.

That makes a total of 5 Presbyteries and one hundred and forty-nine congregations which have reported. Five Presbyteries and eighty congregations have taken specific action. In addition, one person reported on his own study of the State of the Church Report.

Listed below are some of the strategies reported for strengthening the life and

work of the congregation —

5. Planning — short and long-range goals and objectives

6. Emphasis on leadership/eldership training

11. Increased lay participation Active follow-up of visitors

13. Participation of laity and youth in conduct of worship

14. Mission weekends

15. Congregation planning to relocate

16. Emphasis on Church Growth

17. Congregational newsletters 18. Coffee hour after worship

Ministry to the lonely

20. Planned community survey

Summary

149 congregations reported

80 congregations reported specific action

20 congregations reported no specific action

congregations plan to study the Report in 1980 congregations indicate no plans to study the Report

Conclusions

From the above summary of reports received one might assume that some presbyteries and congregations don't care, or that they are trying to ignore the problem of non-growth or declining membership. Only 13% of the congregations have replied, and of this number less than half have indicated specific action taken as a result of studying the Report!

It is apparent that many congregations may not have recognized the connection between church growth and the State of the Church Report. Actually, the analysis of the local situation guided by the State of the Church Report is one of

the best ways to start planning for church growth.

A review of the replies from congregations reveals an awareness of many of the principles of church growth. It is important that these congregations be encouraged to implement their plans and achieve their objectives. One of the problems may be a lack of planning on the part of the presbyteries to provide the kind of accountability and support system which will encourage congregations to keep moving ahead with growth possibilities.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 1 A

That those congregations which have not done so be urged to study the State of the Church Report and its implications for their renewal and growth, and report their plans and actions to their presbyteries, who will report to the Board of Congregational Life by January 31, 1981 for the information of the 107th General Assembly.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 2 A

That presbyteries plan to provide support and encouragement to congregations of their bounds in implementing the recommendations of the State of the Church Report as they may be applicable to the local situation.

A STRATEGY FOR CHURCH GROWTH

Background

The 104th General Assembly, in adopting the State of the Church Report, directed the Board of Congregational Life in co-operation with the Board of World Mission to develop concrete plans for a strong church renewal and growth initiative, and an ongoing strategy for growth for at least a ten year period. For this purpose the two Boards established a Joint Task Force on Church Growth which has been instrumental in developing the strategy which follows.

This strategy has been formulated on the basis of Recommendation 1 (amended) of the State of the Church Report, due note also having been taken of Recommendations 2 and 5 as they relate to the mandate in Recommendation 1. The cooperation of the presbyteries in implementing the State of the Church Report and the strategies for Church Growth is second only to that of the congregations. The responses of the presbyteries and congregations to their study of the State of the Church Report are integral to the development of this strategy and were a prime means of their participation in the planning of the strategy.

The State of the Church Report did an outstanding service to the Church, not only in describing the present conditions, the trends and the causes, but also in assessing the strengths and weaknesses of the Church, analysing the implications for the Church, and in proposing solutions in terms that the entire Church can act upon. The response to Recommendation 5, as indicated above, clearly indicates that the task ahead for the next ten years is gigantic. The fact that only 11% of the presbyteries and 13% of the congregations responded, and some of these in only a cursory fashion, makes it obvious that Church Growth will not be an easy task.

The Boards, through the Task Force, have taken the following steps in develop-

ing and planning a strategy for Church Growth.

A. The State of the Church Report was sent out to every congregation and presbytery together with the study guide with the request that they report the results

of that study by January 31, 1980.

- B. A Consultant was retained by the Board of Congregational Life in the person of the Rev. Douglas Walrath, a well known independent Church Growth consultant from Albany, New York. A minister of the Reformed Church in America, he has had twenty years experience working in Church Growth and has been instrumental in the development of a number of denominational and national programs. Most of his work is related to consulting with judicatories. His services have been invaluable in developing the plans and process of this strategy.
- C. The research phase is well underway. We have been concerned to determine what resources are available within the denomination. We are researching grow-

ing congregations and locating persons who have specialized gifts and training in areas related to Church Growth. From this information, models will be developed that can be shared throughout the Church. We are searching out information on what other denominations in North America are doing in the area of Church Growth. We are screening the considerable volume of literature that is being produced and building a resource library on Church Growth. We are in touch with independent organizations related to Church Growth and are seeking resources from them. Among these are the Center for Parish Development in Chicago, the Alban Institute in Washington, D.C., the Church Growth Institute in Pasadena, California, Evangelism Explosion III, Fort Lauderdale, Florida, the Robert Schuller Institute, the World Council of Churches and the National Council of Churches in the U.S.A. The task of learning who is producing resources, searching them out and evaluating them is alone a formidable task. As with any popular movement whose time has come, there is a proliferation of books, pamphlets and other resources.

D. At Congress '79, Douglas Walrath conducted four workshops and approximately one hundred and twenty people participated. A flyer prepared for the Congress as a follow-up piece has been reproduced and sent out to all congre-

gations in the Board of Congregational Life mailing.

E. Coincidentally with the work of the Task Force on Church Growth, the Board has also been involved with other denominations in setting up a number of seminars with the Rev. Lyle Schaller. These have dealt with areas of congregational life related to development and growth. The number of the Presby-

terians registering for these seminars has been gratifying.

F. A workshop was conducted for the Synod of British Columbia at their meeting in Vancouver in October 1979. That experiment with a design for workshops on a synod basis has resulted in some very good ideas being fed into the process. A three-day workshop was held for the three Prairie Synods in April 1980. Church Growth was featured at a continuing education course at Presbyterian College in February, 1980.

. We have worked with several presbyteries in planning and conducting work-

shops and in planning strategy.

H. We have worked in various ways with nine different congregations in developing plans and promoting Church Growth in specific situations. These have been varied as to type, size, location and context. These experiences were important to the Task Force in developing the strategy and knowing the kinds of resources needed by different kinds of churches.

I. A Congregational Workshop Guide - "Church Growth - A Presbyterian Perspective" has been ordered by over 250 congregations for use as a conscious-

ness-raising tool, and to initiate action at the local level.

Strategy

A. Foundation

The foundation for Church Growth in The Presbyterian Church is, and will remain for the immediate future, the State of the Church Report. Until significant and measurable change is clearly seen as a trend, this document will remain pertinent and necessary to the work of Church Growth. The widest possible utilization and continuous reference to this Report by the whole Church is essential.

B. Overall Policy

Recognizing that the Lord of the Church wants growth and will give the increase, it is our purpose to advocate Church Growth by stimulating presbyteries and congregations to take responsibility for their growth through effective discipleship.

C. Key Assumptions on which the Policy is Based

 Congregations grow that decide to grow. Intentional ministry is essential. 2. There are various approaches and opportunities for Church Growth, each suitable in some congregations or communities, but not in others.

3. Church Growth is costly and takes time; it is achieved through a process

that changes the basic attitudes and life ways of a congregation.

4. Congregations need support and accountability beyond themselves to sustain a long term Church Growth effort. The presbytery provides a natural setting for this.

D. The Design Process is in Three Stages

Information sharing and decision making; a time for presbyteries and congregations to learn about the program, to help shape it and to decide in what ways they wish to participate in it.

Training and preparation; a time when congregations facing similar mission situations work with one another and national resources to shape Church

Growth programs appropriate for their opportunities.

3. Implementation; a time when congregations engage in Church Growth with ongoing support from each other, from their presbyteries, and from the resources of the Boards of Congregational Life and World Mission.

E. A Task Force on Church Growth - Functions and Resources

This strategy has been formulated on the basis of the mandate given to the Boards by the 104th General Assembly. If the 106th General Assembly sees fit to alter this mandate, or combine it in some way with the Special Committee on Doubling, or replace the Task Force, then the function and resourcing that follow may change. What follows is the way the Task Force has seen its functions and the initial resourcing determined necessary in the beginning stages of the strategy. It is on this basis that the Task Force is prepared to proceed.

The Task Force has determined that the following functions are appropriate and necessary to sustain the efforts of the church's strategy for a

long term:

a) Research, planning and design of strategies for growth

b) Assessing needs and barriers to growth

- Research, design and production of resources for growth at all levels of the church
- d) Involvement of all structures of the church in strategy, planning and implementation

e) Design, produce and evaluate delivery systems for resources

- f) Training of leadership in growth methods and processes through workshops and pilot projects
- g) Consultation for problem solving at synod, presbytery and congregational levels
- h) Design and monitoring of accountability systems and evaluative methods to assure consistent efforts to sustain growth over at least ten years
- Identify persons with gifts and training in Church Growth and promote the utilization of these resources for the churches
- Identification of growing congregations and the sharing of their methods with the whole church.
- 2. In fulfilling these functions, the Task Force proposes that the following resources will be required in order to provide the Church with the means to grow purposefully and effectively. These provide options with sufficient flexibility to meet the needs of the diverse elements of the Church (geographic, cultural, theological and contextual) with the capability of being revised and updated as conditions in both the Church and Society change.
 - I Develop a list of resources including books, various electronic media, workshops that are scheduled by various groups, and so on. This list would be circulated with periodical updating as new opportunities become apparent. As a part of this, the Task Force would act as "broker" of ideas and methods developed by congregations and presbyteries across the Church that would prove helpful as models.

II Respond to requests for Church Growth resourcing with suggestions that meet the needs of particular congregations as they describe them. This will involve developing forms which congregations can complete which will give essential information needed in recommending re-

sources that will be most helpful to them.

III Offer Church Growth training workshops either at the presbytery or synod level, or in other appropriate groupings to which ministers and key lay leaders can be invited. The workshops would include basic training in Church Growth methodologies with opportunity for participants to apply the appropriate methods to their congregations. The workshops would include the opportunity for follow-up agreements. These might involve either subsequent consulting on the part of the Board, or support agreements that participants in similar situations could make with each other, or the follow-up role the presbytery or synod would take. Consult with the colleges on the design and leadership of continuing education for ministers in Church Growth. Act as resource consultant to the colleges on ways and means of implementing Church Growth principles and methods in the training of new church professionals.

IV Develop video cassette resources for training and motivation of congregations and presbyteries in workshops, either to be used by staff or simply loaned to congregations together with support material.

- V Train a group of Church Growth resourcers. These would be persons with talent, special interest and commitment to Church Growth who would be willing to spend time in learning Church Growth methodology and to share their skills with their own congregations and with others on request. It will be necessary to consider some compensation for these resourcers to be provided by the congregations who employ their services.
- VI Offer three or four-day to week-long training sessions for clergy and/ or key lay leaders in Church Growth methodology, probably during the summer. This would be an intensive training experience for pastors and lay leaders concerned to carry out Church Growth in their own congregations, or who would be willing to share their skills as suggested in the previous paragraph.

VII After identifying the key types of congregations in The Presbyterian Church (e.g. small, medium and large; or rural, suburban, urban; or high church growth potential, medium potential and low potential); run a limited number of strategically placed pilots to demonstrate

effective Church Growth methods.

The above resourcing plans will be continuously evaluated and revised to assure that the Church has available to it at all times the tools and training necessary to fulfill its goals and objectives.

The Task Force has already produced a number of resources in the initial

planning stages including:

- Training materials for Presbytery Workshops
- Congregational Workshop Guide
- Background paper on A Reformed Theology of Church Growth
- An analysis of Gallup research applicable to local congregations
- Informational and motivational pieces.

Support Systems

The major components of the strategy can be seen to be in the areas of research and planning, education, leadership development and resourcing to the end that congregations can effectively undertake their task of Church Growth. The Task Force operates in a consultative manner consistent to the basic policies outlined above. Church Growth is a grassroots movement. It is for the entire Church. Church Growth does not necessarily mean congregational growth. Some congregations will grow, and others may not due to factors beyond their control in the context in which they live and minister. The Task Force respects the integrity of the congre-

gation and does not presume to usurp the ultimate responsibility each has for plan-

ning, developing and implementing its own Church Growth efforts.

To this end the Task Force stresses that Church Growth is holistic and touches on every aspect of the Church's life. The Christian Church today, and The Presbyterian Church in Canada in particular, is in a mission situation. The methods, means and energies of the Church used so effectively to extend the Gospel around the world, are now needed in our own land. It then becomes necessary that the Courts of the Church and the Boards and Agencies focus their efforts on supporting congregations in making Church Growth a primary concern of their on-going work as well as to provide special help when needed. The Task Force has identified the following as being of particular importance:

A. Presbyteries

That the presbyteries follow diligently the instructions of the 104th General Assembly in Recommendation 2 of the State of the Church Report. While church growth is a congregational responsibility, we are not a congregational church. The support, encouragement, and accountability systems, integral to the relationship of the presbytery with its congregations in our Presby-

terian polity, are essential to Church Growth.

More specifically, the Task Force asks the General Assembly to require the presbyteries to instruct Sessions to study, or cause to be studied in every congregation, Church Growth as it relates to its ministry and to report periodically its plans and activities to the presbytery. The presbytery can then monitor Church Growth and adjust its plans and strategy accordingly. Further, it is requested that the presbyteries report in summary form at least once a year, or more frequently if specific help is needed, so that needs may be met and progress reported to the whole Church. Since churches most often grow where population grows, it is important for the presbytery to be informed on growth areas within its bounds, and to plan carefully and creatively with their Mission Superintendents and the Board of World Mission for new church development.

B. Synods

The synods have already functioned, and will continue to function significantly in the areas of training and promotion in Church Growth. This provides a logical and economically feasible setting for these functions. Synods should be particularly active in promoting training events for similar types of congregations in clusters, such as inner-city churches, suburban churches, small town churches or rural churches. Each type of church has its own unique opportunities and problems and is able to provide, through sharing of successes and failures, a great deal of mutual support to other similar churches. Resourcing and leadership should be provided on the basis of their common characteristics.

C. General Assembly

Besides the major task of holding up to the whole Church the priority of growth, the Assembly will need to be sensitive to and respond creatively and prophetically to the major policy questions that will inevitably arise as the Church grows. Church Growth will result in Church change. This will be increasingly obvious as the Church seeks to be faithful to its calling in our time.

The Assembly and its varied structures will need to be imaginative and bold in responding to, or initiating such changes of structure and policy as are necessary to effect and sustain growth. Our Church is a diverse and complex entity. This is part of our strength, and the capacity to encompass and respond to our diversity within the unity of the Church will be determinative of our

ability to grow.

The Assembly must be aware that we have committed ourselves in faith to a massive task. It will often be painful and perplexing. It will be necessary to commit our resources, experience and skills as well as our energies to changing our attitudes, ways of thinking and acting to accomplish this goal. Church Growth is not easy or cheap. We must be willing to pay the price of faithful discipleship.

Each of the Boards and Agencies of the General Assembly will need to reflect in its on-going work these same concerns and priorities. Church Growth is a deep and continuous process. It is not a short-term emphasis or a passing fad. To be fully effective, the present effort must be sustained for at least ten years according to the mandate for growth. Basic to the work of the Task Force is the premise that it cannot and will not stop there.

The major work areas of each of the Boards and Agencies are all relevant and essential to effective church growth. Careful planning by each in consultation with the Task Force as a coordinating facility will bring about the most

effective support of the congregations and presbyteries.

There is no Church Growth without evangelism in the widest and best sense of the word. While Church Growth is more than just another term for the latter, it is of paramount importance that the Church be constantly conscious of the necessity to reach out to the unconverted and lapsed — the "outsider". This attitude and emphasis must prevail in all our activity in Church Growth. We will need to explore and develop new ways and new language if we are to reach these persons with the Good News of Jesus Christ. The making of disciples to engage in this ministry is a necessity in fulfilling our commission. This is not something that can be left to the "professional"; it is the work of the whole Church.

Finally, the strategy of the Church is based on and looks to the scriptures and especially the ministry and methods of Jesus as the paradigm for Church Growth. This is the foundation from which we dare not stray. Following our Lord, we shall grow by His grace and to His glory.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 3

That the strategy outlined above be approved as the strategy for growth of The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 4 A

That presbyteries be asked to instruct sessions to study, or cause to be studied in their congregations, Church Growth as it relates to their ministry, and report their plans and activities to the presbytery.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 5 A

That presbyteries be urged to take initiative in planning appropriate strategies for the renewal and growth of the Church within their bounds.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 6 A

That presbyteries report in summary form at least once a year, so that needs may be met and progress reported to the whole Church.

Request from Administrative Council

At the request of the Administrative Council, the Boards of World Mission and Congregational Life asked their Joint Task Force on Church Growth to explore the possibility of the two mandates of the last two Assemblies, one on Church Growth and the other on doubling membership in the eighties, being brought together into one combined function.

From the commencement of the work of the Committee on Doubling in the Eighties (CODE), both groups have entered into their work in a spirit of co-operation and mutual support. CODE saw its task as largely motivational while the Task Force saw its work as developing a strategy for the Church and supporting it functionally. As time went on, areas of overlap began to appear. Each group was faithful to its mandate, yet it became increasingly obvious that both mandates could be fulfilled most effectively through a unified structure. Only the General Assembly can make such a major policy decision.

To the end that the two functions may be merged the Board recommends as follows:—

RECOMMENDATION NO. 7 A

That the 106th General Assembly, acknowledging the validity and importance to the Church of the actions of its two predecessors, and preserving the mandate given to the Joint Task Force on Church Growth and the Special Committee on Doubling in the Eighties respectively, merge the functions of the two groups into a new committee (or Task Force) of the General Assembly.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 8

That this new committee be named "CHURCH GROWTH TO DOUBLE IN THE EIGHTIES" or some such similar title that includes and recognizes the merger of the present mandate.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 9 A

That the new committee report its progress and proposals directly to the General Assembly.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 10 A

That the mandate given to the new committee include the following functions:-

a) Promote and maintain the priority of growth for the whole Church.

b) Research, planning and design of strategies for growth.

c) Inspire and motivate the Church on all levels toward involvement in Church Growth with special emphasis on doubling in the eighties.

d) Assess needs and barriers to growth.

- e) Research, design, production and delivery of resources for growth at all levels of the Church.
- f) Involvement of all structures of the Church in strategy, planning and implementation.
- g) Developing ways and means of reaching fringe, inactive and unchurched persons.
- h) Training of leadership, clerical and lay, in growth methods and processes through workshops and pilot projects.
- i) Consultation for problem solving at synod, presbytery and congregational levels.
- j) Design and monitoring of accountability systems and evaluative methods to assure consistent efforts to sustain growth over at least ten years.
- k) Identify persons with gifts and training in Church Growth and promote the utilization of these resources for congregations.
- l) Identification of growing congregations and the sharing of their methods with the whole Church through the development of models for growth.
- m) Develop capacity and methods of discipling and nurture of new members, incorporating them into the life and mission of the Church.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 11 A

That the new committee be made up in the following fashion:

- a) Nine representatives of the church-at-large appointed by the Assembly through the Committee to Nominate. These shall be on a three-year rotational basis.
- b) One representative from each of the Board of World Mission, the Board of Congregational Life, the Board of Ministry, Communication Services, Women's Missionary Society (WD) and one staff person from the colleges for a total of six. These agencies may appoint alternate representatives to provide continuity of liaison with their respective agency.

c) The chairman to be elected by the new committee from among the members appointed by the Assembly.

d) The membership of the committee should embrace both the principles of geographical representation and the experience of the present membership of the two merging entities.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 12 A

That the General Assembly recognize that Church Growth is a massive task that will require the commitment of staff and resources as well as the employment of other

specialists and consultants from time to time, and that one new staff person and one administrative assistant will be required to co-ordinate the administrative functions of the committee.

WITNESS OUTREACH AND COMMUNITY ACTION

The work of the Board in this area during the past year has been focused mainly on Church Growth. However, a number of initiatives in Evangelism have been undertaken to stimulate faithfulness in witness and outreach.

Evangelists-At-Large

The Board has under review the Evangelists-at-Large program. Some of the evangelists have moved or retired, and presbyteries are to be invited to present nominations for additional evangelists, especially persons with gifts in working with particular groups, e.g. children, aged, handicapped, etc. A statement in support of the program will accompany the request for nominations, and a new brochure will be used to promote it.

New Initiatives in Evangelism

For the past eighteen months an ad hoc group of denominational representatives has been exploring the feasibility of a major event in Canada like the Kirchentag which has been so successful in Germany for over thirty years. Plans are now under way for a "Christian Festival Cretien" in 1982 in the capital city of Ottawa. Sponsored jointly by the Christian Council of the Capital Area and a National Co-Ordinating committee made up of representatives of the denominations in the Canadian Council of Churches and the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops, the Festival will attract large numbers of people to a Christian exposition of witness, celebration and service. We believe this is a major opportunity for our Church and it is important that we be part of it.

Further in the area of Evangelism, efforts are being made to stimulate new attitudes and ways of engaging in this ministry. A paper by Raymond Fung, "Evangelism — A New Perspective", has been circulated to all congregations. This has started some debate and exploration of the how and why of evangelism in our time. Feed-back so far has been positive, even from those who disagree with Mr.

Fung's thesis. At least the Church is willing to struggle with new ideas.

Extensive use is being made of the "Good News Evangelism" booklets produced by the United Presbyterian Church, U.S.A., especially "Life Story Conversations". The "Evangelism Handbook" continues to be in steady demand. Connections have been re-established with the National Council of Churches' Evangelism Working Group in the U.S.A., a relationship which provides a link with other denominations across North America for the sharing of resources and ideas. The Board is grateful for the opportunity afforded to one of its staff members, Rev. John Duncan, to give a course at Ewart College on Evangelism in the Modern World.

CHURCH EDUCATION

A high priority is given to the staffing of on-field support for church education. Support for leaders in education is provided by four issues of NEXUS per year, and two mailings to Superintendents and Christian Education Committee chairpersons. Participation in the Christian Education: Shared Approaches continues, especially with a review of new resources and the evaluation of present resources.

In response to the action of the 105th General Assembly re the continuation of Bible Study resources and Prayer Concerns, the Board reports progress. A Bible Study on the Stewardship theme was introduced to the Church in the Fall of 1979. It has been decided that the Prayer Partnership should be seen as the answer to the request re Prayer Concerns, and that steps should be taken to enlarge its format and

circulation (present circulation is 16,000 per month).

In recognition of the need for educational resources for congregations and persons whose first language is not English, the Board has taken steps to explore, in consultation with the Board of World Mission, the needs of congregations in Canada where English is not the main language, and to plan ways of meeting those needs.

In 1980 Churches around the world are observing the 200th Anniversary of Robert Raikes and the Sunday School Movement. Resources have been developed and sent to congregations to encourage their local observance of this event, and a

Sunday bulletin has been prepared for use in September.

Through its Committee on Church Education the Board is constantly researching future needs and directions in Church education, and will continue to share with Church courts and congregations the findings of that research and the resources which will enable congregations to plan and provide effective educational programs for the 80's.

Heritage Resources are being well received by congregations of the Church. Over 200 congregations have ordered Unit I and are integrating it into their educational program. Unit II, "The Church Decides" is now ready for use and will be introduced to congregations this Fall. Work continues on Units III and IV, "The

Church Celebrates" and "The Church Grows".

Mission Education is supported and co-ordinated by a Joint Task Force with the Women's Missionary Society (WD) and the Board of World Mission. The recommendation regarding mission study themes for the years 1982-83 is being presented by the Board of World Mission and is supported by the Board of Congregational Life.

The 105th General Assembly asked presbyteries to survey congregations regarding the acceptability of the mission study themes being recommended to the General Assembly. At the time of writing this report only five presbyteries have responded. It is difficult, therefore, to report with any accuracy how the study themes are being received. Of those reponses received the majority indicate that the themes are acceptable, but even within the presbyteries reporting only a few congregations reported that they actually used the materials. As additional responses come in this matter will be kept under review.

Each year the W.M.S. (WD) asks the groups which order the study material to complete an evaluation form. Those evaluations have been largely positive, with only a few complaints about the material being too difficult for older people with little educational expertise. Some objected to the China study on the grounds that it was too one-sided, but the majority of those groups which actually used it reported that it had been helpful in broadening their understanding of a people whose

rich history and culture goes back many centuries before Communism.

Some responses questioned the policy of following the themes established by the Commission on Education for Mission of the National Council of Churches. In response to this question it should be pointed out that we do not always use the themes approved by NCC-CEM. Twice in recent years we have chosen to develop a study theme either on our own or in co-operation with other Canadian denominations. Such a decision involves our denomination in a great deal more work and expense, however, and precludes the obvious advantage of using the resources which are prepared by a number of denominations at a much smaller unit cost.

The Presbyterian Church in Canada is actively represented on the Commission on Education for Mission. The Joint Task Force on Mission Education co-ordinates our input to the CEM from the Women's Missionary Society (WD), The Board of World Mission and the Board of Congregational Life. Sometimes our choices of themes are developed, and sometimes they are not. When the theme chosen is con-

sidered to be totally unacceptable, we develop our own.

Canadian Association of Presbyterian Church Educators.

The Board supports and encourages the Canadian Association of Presbyterian Church Educators. CAPCE is a voluntary association of Church Educators of The Presbyterian Church in Canada committed to witnessing to the Gospel of Jesus Christ and to the advancement of the teaching ministry of the Church. Through its program the association endeavours to:

interpret the teaching ministry of the Church

interpret the roles of Church Educators within the ministry of the Church

maintain professional standards of christian educators

provide means to develop the abilities of the professional christian educator

- facilitate contact with professionals and professional organizations in other denominations and in related fields of education
- relate with and encourage Boards and Colleges of the Church responsible for education and personnel services.

Membership in CAPCE is open to all professional Church Educators within The Presbyterian Church in Canada who are involved in developing, directing or teaching within the Church's program of education.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 13 A

That presbyteries encourage ministers and other full-time professional Churck Educators to join CAPCE.

STEWARDSHIP

1979 Budget Performance

Givings to the General Assembly Budget in 1979 totalled \$3,616,731., as compared with the 1978 figure of \$3,347,477. an increase of \$269,254. which equals an increase of 8%.

The 1979 figure is made up of money received in that year, plus delayed offerings from 1978. The givings of 1979 as compared with 1978, without including delayed receipts in both years, show an increase of 9.2%.

The per member rate of giving to the General Assembly Budget rose from \$20.05 in 1978 to \$21.76 in 1979. Givings for All Congregational Purposes rose from \$27,083,865. in 1978 to \$31,288,740. in 1979. The per member rate for givings to All Congregational Purposes was \$188.27 in 1979 compared with \$162.25 in 1978.

Other national givings in 1979 were as follows: Second Century Advance for Christ - \$495,791. W.M.S. (WD) - \$385,000. W.M.S. (ED) - \$ 31,500. Inter Church Aid - \$160,980.

Givings to Other Benevolent Purposes showed a significant increase, perhaps reflecting the involvement of many congregations in sponsoring Refugee Boat Families. These givings totalled \$2,017,689. in 1979, compared with \$1,205,978. in 1978.

All these givings to causes outside the support of the local congregation amounted to \$6,707,691. in 1979, compared with \$5,441,867., an increase of \$1,265.824. or 23%.

Renaming of General Assembly Budget

The Board was asked to deal with Overture #27, 1978, regarding the renaming of the General Assembly Budget. The new name being suggested was "Mission, Administration and Preparation".

Through its Stewardship Committee, the Board asked presbyteries to respond to this Overture, or to suggest another name. The response toward the name "Mission, Administration and Preparation" was negative, and none of the other names suggested by presbyteries had any overwhelming support. Some presbyteries suggested keeping the present name and continuing to educate people regarding the work of the General Assembly Budget.

However, the Board would like to recommend that the reply to the Overture be that the General Assembly Budget be renamed simply "The General Assembly Program".

The reasons:

- 1) by eliminating the word 'budget', we eliminate the problem of confusing the local congregational budget with the General Assembly's Budget;
- 2) the word 'program' implies a budget but does not use the word;
- 3) by keeping the words "General Assembly", a connection is maintained with the National Church.

Ecumenical Centre for Stewardship Studies, Evanston, Illinois

In December 1979, the first Board of Directors' meeting of the Ecumenical Centre for Stewardship Studies, was held at Garrett Theological College, Evanston, Illinois. This is the fruit of many years of preparation by the Commission on Stewardship of the National Council of Churches.

This Centre is located jointly at Garrett Theological College and Seabury Western Theological College in Evanston, Illinois, a centre which is adjacent to North Western University and has access to a great number of theological colleges in

the greater Chicago area.

The committee is searching for a Director and it is planned that the program will begin in the Fall of 1980. This Centre will offer graduate and undergraduate courses as well as accommodate those who wish to continue their education in the research of Christian Stewardship. It is also hoped that the Centre will move out to work with clusters of churches in geographical areas.

We see a great future in stewardship studies in the years ahead through this Centre and we would encourage members of the Church to be aware of this and

take advantage of it in their future continuing education.

Field Work

The Board continues to place a priority on field work with presbyteries and congregations in support of a strong stewardship emphasis and the promotion of the General Assembly's Budget. An effective network of stewardship conveners or contact persons has been developed, and regular correspondence helps them with their work. The secretary for Stewardship has worked directly with many presbyteries and congregations during the past year, and a very successful Stewardship Workshop was held for conveners in the Synod of Hamilton and London in 1979, and for the Synod of Toronto and Kingston in 1980. Such Synod Workshops are to continue on an annual basis, providing inspiration and leadership skills for presbytery conveners and others responsible for stewardship education and Budget promotion.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 14 C

That the General Assembly Budget objective for 1981 be \$4,400,000. from congregations, and that congregational required shares based on this figure be sent to all presbyteries in time to be considered at their October meetings.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 15 A

That in order to achieve the above objective the following guidelines be directed to presbyteries and congregations:

a) That presbyteries be urged to accept the total required shares submitted to them, and that they be instructed to review, and where necessary, adjust individual congregational shares before submitting them to congregations, without reducing the presbytery total;

b) That congregations be urged to accept an allocation which exceeds an amount

given in the preceeding year;

- c) That, since congregations which do not meet their full budget allocations need the help of presbytery, they should report the reasons for their inability to reach their budget share, in order that the presbytery may assist them to establish an effective program of stewardship in their congregation;
- d) That congregations adopt the Biblical practice of proportional giving and that a minimum goal of 5% of income be encouraged, which corresponds to weekly offerings of \$1.00 for every \$1,000. earned annually; (i.e. a \$15,000. annual salary would mean weekly givings of \$15.00)

e) That congregations set as their goal the principle of equal giving, that is, giving as much to others as they spend maintaining their own congregational life.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 16 A

That in preparing their budgets, congregations provide for programs that support Church Growth and the Doubling of Church Membership in the 80's, as approved by the 104th and 105th General Assemblies.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 17 D

That Overture #27, 1978 be granted in the following terms: that the General Assembly Budget be renamed "The General Assembly Program".

Overture #4, 1980 - Halifax and Lunenburg

The Overture suggests that recommendations 4 & 5 (A & P 1979, p. 291) are coercive in nature and asks for methods to be employed which are less coercive and designed to stimulate genuine liberality.

The Board, through its Committee on Stewardship, has studied this Overture and offers the following comments. The intent and purpose of such recommendations is to encourage presbyteries to exercise a pastoral function in support of congregations which habitually fail to meet their fair share of the General Assembly's Budget. To this end Recommendation 3 c) above has been worded differently this year to emphasize a pastoral relationship between the presbytery and its congregations.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 18 C

That Overture #4, 1980 be answered in terms of the explanation above.

Allocation Formula

The Administrative Council, in its report on Overtures 6 and 14 (1979), has asked the Board of Congregational Life to include in its report the formula which is presently being used to establish the Budget allocations for presbyteries and congregations. This formula has been used, with only slight modification of the per member rate and the percentages charged on normal expenditures, since it was first approved by the General Assembly in 1952.

The Board of Congregational Life has under active consideration a revision of the formula on which the Budget allocations are based, and it is expected that a full report will be presented to the 107th General Assembly.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 19 A

That the following scale for computing Budget Allocations be received for information:—

Part I

A per member rate based on the number of members reported at the end of the last calendar year (\$5.00 per member for 1980)

plus

Part 2

A percentage of Total Normal Expenditures for the last calendar year on a sliding rate as follows:

on the 1st	\$ 1,000.		nil

WORSHIP AND LIFE-CYCLE MINISTRIES

Worship

By means of a newsletter, Worship Workbench, sample orders of worship and ideas for creative worship are offered to congregations.

The circulation of the daily devotional guide, These Days, continues to increase. The editorial board has agreed to a request that each issue present devotions written by at least one Canadian, and recent issues have reflected that decision. The

Board has been active in recruiting writers, and the manuscripts for each issue are read by a small group of readers, and their comments are sent to the editor.

Youth Ministry

Forty leaders of Presbyterian youth groups attended the Youth Leadership Training Labs which were sponsored by Joint Educational Development. In a

number of presbyteries follow-up events have been held or are planned.

In August 5,000 Presbyterian youths from congregations in the United States and Canada will gather at Bloomington, Indiana for the first North American Youth Triennium. Canadian youth and Board of Congregational Life staff have participated in the planning of this event and a number of Canadians will appear on the program. The attendance of youth from The Presbyterian Church in Canada is being co-ordinated by the Board of Congregational Life through the Synods.

The co-ordination and resourcing of youth ministry at the congregational level continues by means of a quarterly newsletter, Kurios. Each issue carries a listing of ideas and resources for youth ministry, and all are in a format ready for storing in a three-ring binder for future reference. Ours is one of only a few denominations on this continent which has a newsletter on youth ministry. In the past year an evalua-

tion of Kurios has indicated that it is being well used and appreciated.

Youth involvement in the life of the Church at the national level is co-ordinated through the National Advisory Council which has representation on both the Board of Congregational Life and the Board of World Mission, and also through the Young Adult Observers at the General Assembly. Youth participation in the 1979 Congress was of a high order, both in numbers and quality. It is significant that out of these kinds of youth involvement many young people have come into full-time service in the Church, and many others are creatively active in their local congregations.

Family Ministries

The second National Couples Weekend, an event which introduces couples to Marriage Enrichment, was filled to capacity. From this introduction couples are invited to go on to Marriage Enrichment Leadership Training (MELT) and to be prepared to offer leadership at the local level. Two MELT events are planned for 1980 — one in Ontario and one in Manitoba. The Family Ministries Resource Kit issued in 1979 was very well received. A second kit has been issued to congregations on a request basis this year.

A Family Ministries Planning Consultation will be held in Ottawa in the Fall to assist congregations to plan together for a strong support for family life within their communities. It is hoped that this pilot project will lead to such consultations being

held in other areas in the future.

A pilot consultation was held on ministry with families of Carribean Immigrants. Organized on an ecumenical basis with strong Presbyterian participation, this project was a most significant event, and has pointed the way for a growing ministry with immigrant people of any origin.

Since singles now make up a large percentage of the population and of congregations, the Board is exploring the need for a ministry with singles and how congre-

gations can be assisted in meeting that need.

A quarterly newsletter, Family Life Forum, is received by all congregations,

and representatives of other denominations are commending it.

We believe there will be significant changes in life-styles and community living in the eighties and the Board is planning for emphases which will assist congregations and families in this decade. For example, we are being advised that life will slow down under economic pressures and people will begin to place a much higher investment in the local community and its institutions, including the church. An increasing number of young adults will be asking questions about faith and spirituality. We must plan and develop programs with these opportunities in mind.

Church Camping

Church Camping continues to be the direct responsibility of the synods and presbyteries and their camp committees. The Board co-ordinates suggested re-

sources and assists with leadership training. The various camps are visited by staff. Use of the manual, Christian Community Camping, one of the best of its kind, is encouraged. A Camping Newsletter shares camping news and resource ideas. Through the Inter-Church Committee on Camping, camp consultations and leadership training are provided on an ecumenical basis.

International Year of the Disabled

RECOMMENDATION NO. 20 A

That the following resolution be approved.

Resolution

Whereas 1981 is designated as the International Year of the Disabled by the United Nations, and

Whereas public facilities are now increasingly more accessible for disabled persons, and

Whereas we believe that Jesus Christ came for all persons and He is open to men, women and children of every place and every sort of ability or disability, and

Whereas the Church of Jesus Christ includes both the able and the disabled and is open to all God's children, and

Whereas the disabled are often excluded by the lack of facilities or program, and

Whereas when the disabled are left out of the Church of Jesus Christ the Body of Christ is broken, and

Whereas there is an increasing number of disabled persons because of birth defects, accidents, illness, genetic disorders, famine, war, disease and abuse leaving millions physically or mentally impaired,

Therefore, we the members of the 106th General Assembly of The Presbyterian Church in Canada affirm the fullness of the Body of Christ and our calling to bear witness to all God's children, whether disabled or not. We call upon congregations of The Presbyterian Church in Canada to take seriously their ministry to all persons, including the disabled, and to make specific plans for the local observance of the International Year of the Disabled. We ask that the Board of Congregational Life develop a comprehensive strategy to assist congregations in planning for a ministry with disabled persons.

NATIONAL COMMITTEE OF PRESBYTERIAN MEN

The National Committee of Presbyterian Men has experienced a period of difficulty during the past year in its efforts to continue to promote the work of the Church among men.

Early in 1979 a reassessment of the purpose of the organization was undertaken together with an examination of the goals and objectives which would be necessary if this work were to flourish and grow.

A draft statement of purpose and goals was distributed to commissioners at the 105th General Assembly. In the light of comments and suggestions from a number of sources, a revised statement of purpose and goals was presented to the Fall 1979 meeting of the Board of Congregational Life and approved as follows:—

Purpose

To provide opportunities for men of The Presbyterian Church in Canada to become better informed in the faith, and to encourage them to live as responsible members of the Church, bearing witness to their faith in all of life — in home, church, business and community.

Goals

Toward the fulfillment of the above purpose the National Committee of Presbyterian Men will -

1. Develop a network of interested and concerned laymen throughout the Church

2. Provide opportunities for Christian fellowship

3. Encourage and promote study of the Bible and the mission of the Church

4. Provide a training program for the development of leadership skills

- Implement programs for training in personal Christian witness and visitation
- 6. Promote a program of daily personal and family devotions

7. Develop and support innovative outreach programs.

(Recommendation to follow)

A number of realistic objectives for the realization of these goals which were approved for the years 1979 and 1980 can be summarized as follows:—

• enlistment of P.M. representatives in each Presbytery

- establishment of Conference Planning Committees in each region by November of each year for conferences planned for the following year
- preparation of appropriate study material
 renewed contact with Presbytery contact persons regarding study materials, daily devotional guides, leadership training resources, etc.

• evaluation of training manuals as to their suitability for the 80's.

Considerable progress has been made toward the achievement of these objectives and work is continuing. In order that we may work effectively through the courts of the church it is important that every Presbytery name a contact person. We probably could name such people for those Presbyteries which have not responded to our request, but they would not be Presbytery representatives in the fullest sense. (Recommendation to follow)

The Annual Meeting in November 1979 was again confronted with the question of adequate application of available staff time for effective administrative and resource development leadership, and the National Executive requested that this matter be pursued with representatives of the Board of Congregational Life. This matter occupied the attention of a committee of the sub-executive into early 1980, and will be referred to later in this report under a forward look into the 1980's.

National Conferences 1979

- Conferences were held in the following Synods in 1979 -

Synod of Toronto and Kingston — April, Fair Havens Conference Centre, Beaverton, Ontario. A committee representing the men of Lindsay/Peterborough and East Toronto Presbyteries developed a fine program on Church Growth. Rev. Ed. McKinlay and Rev. Merrill Reside were conference leaders, and 85 persons attended.

Atlantic Synod - May, Truro, Nova Scotia.

The Conference Committee of the Synod again carried out the planning and presentation of the annual conference with appropriate assistance and liaison from the national office. Rev. Ted. MacDougall was the speaker on the theme "A Light in the Darkness". Approximately 100 men attended.

Alberta Synod - September, Sunshine Village, near Banff, Alberta.

The Congregational Life Committee of the Synod prepared an excellent conference on the theme "The Christian Family Connection" with Rev. Lockie Royal of Goderich, Ontario, as the theme speaker. Members of the Board of Congregational Life staff led a workshop on Family Life. Approximately 125 persons were present at this family conference.

Radio Ministry

The difficulties encountered in the promotion and expansion of the Amazing Grace program were fully discussed at the 1979 Annual Meeting. In view of the fact that the program was being aired on only two stations at that time, and the desire of the Communication Services Committee to expand the Radio Ministry into other formats as well as Amazing Grace, it was agreed that Communication Services and

the Board of Congregational Life be asked to assume responsibility and support for

the program along with others which are being planned.

The Amazing Grace program was discontinued on the Oshawa Station at December 31, 1979 and on the station at Woodstock, N.B. at the end of January, 1980.

Annual Meeting 1979

The annual meeting was held at Crieff Hills Community with representatives present from all Synod jurisdictions except Quebec and Eastern Ontario and British Columbia.

Regular reports from members of the National Committee indicated a continuing moderate level of interest in the work of Presbyterian Men across the country. The absence of field contacts over the past two or three years has now become apparent in the loss of contact at the "grass roots" level in presbyteries and con-

gregations.

The National Committee addressed itself to the question of full time administrative support and leadership, and while recognizing financial constraints within the administrative ranks of the Church, it was agreed that a Committee of the subexecutive should be directed to meet with representatives of the Board of Congregational Life to renegotiate the terms of the relationship between the National Committee of Presbyterian Men and the Board of Congregational Life.

To this end several meetings have been held and the following points have been

established by mutual agreement -

That the National Committee of Presbyterian Men should continue to be related to the work of the Board of Congregational Life.

That at least 50% of the time of one staff person be devoted to the support of the National Committee of Presbyterian Men and its functions.

A re-examination of its structure and its relationship to the Synods has resulted in a decision to ask the Synods to nominate representatives to the National Committee as the terms of the present representatives expire.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 21 A

That the stated purpose and goals of the National Committee of Presbyterian Men be approved and commended to presbyteries and congregations.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 22 A

That Presbyteries which have not appointed a contact person for Men's Work be urged to do so.

STUDIES AND STATEMENTS

The Board, along with several other Agencies, co-ordinates the study of current economic, political, cultural and social issues, providing theological and biblical comment for the guidance of courts and congregations of the church.

Studies Completed - Resources Available

- a) Baptism a pamphlet has been prepared for use with persons or parents preparing for this Sacrament.
- b) A paper on Genetic Engineering prepared jointly with the Committee on Church Doctrine and presented to the last Assembly met with favourable response at the National Bioethic Symposium last Fall. This paper will be reissued in booklet form as present stock is exhausted. Demand from within and outside the Church has been steady.
- c) The paper on Violence in the Home has met with excellent response. It too is being used by other denominations. This year it is included in the Family Ministries Kit.
- d) In response to some enquiries concerning the Infant Formula Controversy (Nestle), the Board has agreed to commend and distribute an information kit prepared by the United Church of Canada for use by presbyteries and congregations desiring to be informed and involved.
- e) On recommendation of its Committee on Studies and Statements the Board endorses a resource kit on *French/English Relations* prepared by the United Church of Canada, and commends it to congregations for study/action.
- f) Congregations concerned with criminal justice issues are directed to an excellent statement with a study guide prepared by The Presbyterian Church in the U.S. It is readily adaptable to the Canadian context and can be used with the Alternatives Kit distributed three years ago.
- g) The Board has prepared a study paper on Church and Nation in Canada as means of assisting congregations to make an in-depth study of The Declaration of Faith Concerning Church and Nation, and to promote understanding of the differences in the relationship of church and nation between the United States and Canada. The latter has become crucial as we have participated in the editing of CE:SA materials which are prepared for use on both sides of the border. The paper on Church and Nation will be published in pamphlet form together with a study guide and a copy of The Declaration Concerning Church and Nation.
- h) Justice and Freedom of Association The 105th General Assembly approved a resolution regarding justice and freedom of association (A & P, 1979, p. 70). The motion contained no specific reference to a particular situation or incident to which the Board could direct the attention of the Premiers of Ontario and British Columbia. Lacking such specifics, such a letter as required by the motion would have had little effect on provincial policy, and would have detracted from any influence the Church might have in this or any other matter.

It was decided that the subject could only relate to the article in the April 1979 issue of The Presbyterian Record by Ed. Vanderkloet entitled "A Threat to Freedom" (pg. 6). Mr. Vanderkloet of the Christian Labour Association of Canada was advised of the action of the General Assembly, and he advised us to wait until certain efforts being undertaken by the Association had been completed. Later our offer of support was accepted and on the basis of information provided the letters were written as requested by the General Assembly.

Studies in Progress

- a) Dying, Death and the Funeral, Ministry to the Bereaved a three-part study is now in the stage of development.
- b) Human Sexuality Research has been under way for some time. A working

outline has been prepared and a task force established to begin drafting a

report.

c) Racism — through the Canadian Council of Churches the Board has coordinated Presbyterian participation in a Canadian Consultation on Racism in Winnipeg earlier this year, and will have representation at a World Council of Churches consultation later in June. A resource kit on racism is being prepared for use by participating denominations. A network of resource persons is being formed on a regional basis across the country to facilitate the witness of the church in combating racism in Canada.

 Cults and Sects - A paper prepared by Prof. Iain Nicol is in the final stages of editing and is being prepared for publication together with an appropriate bib-

liography. Publication is planned for the Fall, 1980.

Overture #23, 1979 re Lotteries

Overture 23 asked that the General Assembly urge the Federal Government to discontinue its support of lotteries. Shortly after the Assembly, the Government turned over to the provinces the direct sponsorship and operation of any lottery, thus eliminating the primary purpose of the Overture.

The statement on lotteries approved by the 102nd General Assembly (1976) is

The statement on lotteries approved by the 102nd General Assembly (1976) is deemed to be adequate to the needs of the Church in the education of its members, and presbyteries and congregations are encouraged to review this statement and to

make use of it in their local situations.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 23 A

Because lotteries are now a provincial matter the Board recommends that synods, presbyteries and congregations be encouraged to utilize the statement approved by the 102nd General Assembly (A & P, 1976, p. 345-347) in making known to their respective provincial governments their views on this subject.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 24 A

That the prayer of the Overture be answered in the above terms.

SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY IN INVESTMENT POLICY

The Committee on Social Responsibility in Investment Policy was transferred to the Board of Congregational Life by the 104th General Assembly. At its recent meeting the Board has reaffirmed the purpose and mandate of such a committee as provided by the 99th General Assembly (A & P, 1973, pp. 389-91), and has sent this information to all congregations in order that they may be informed of the committee's work, and be able to respond to issues which arise within their jurisdiction.

A primary focus of the Committee's activity has been its membership in the Task Force of the Churches and Corporate Responsibility, an ecumenical body, with its own permanent staff, which undertakes research and co-ordinates the activities of the member churches in relation to corporate responsibility in investment policy. Policy statements related to investments in South Africa and Chile have been developed and referred to the denominations for consideration and action.

CONSULTATION ON CHURCH AND SOCIETY

The Board of Congregational Life convened a consultation on Church and Society on February 7th, 1980, in accordance with the action of the 104th General Assembly (A & P 1979, p. 381, rec. 5). Representatives were present from each of the following Boards or Committees:

The Board of World Mission

The Board of Congregational Life

The Women's Missionary Society (W.D.)

The Committee on Inter Church Aid

The Committee on International Affairs

The Committee on Church Doctrine

The Committee on Social Responsibility in Investment Policy

Each agency shared with the rest the extent and nature of its involvement in matters of social concern. In a period of reflection and discussion which followed, a number of issues were identified for joint effort and discussion. These are summarized as follows:—

Role of this consultation in dealing with emergent social issues.

2. Relationship to the briefing sessions at General Assembly.

 Method of responding to an issue identified by the General Assembly or the Administrative Council.

4. Emphasis on an educational approach to social issues.

- Inclusion of a representative of The Presbyterian Record in these consultations.
- 6. Need for a contemporary statement of faith which can inform our mission and social action policies.

 Mechanism for responding financially to an emergent issue and for finding a signatory.

The following proposal was accepted by the meeting to be shared with the bodies represented for inclusion in a report to the General Assembly:—

CONSULTATION ON CHURCH AND SOCIETY

Purpose - a point of referral for emergent issues

a place for denominational advice and support

a place to develop a theological framework for dealing with social issues.

Guidelines

- The consultation as presently structured will meet quarterly (plus the ability to meet on call for emergent issues) with a rotating chairmanship and the staff responsibility being shared among the staff representatives in the consultation.
- Reporting to the General Assembly will be by agreement on issues to be presented, and which agencies will carry the report.
- 3. In the event that the consultation should desire to make a special presentation to the Assembly, this will be accomplished by means of a recommendation within the report presented as in number 2.

4. An executive committee will consist of the Chairman and the "social action staff" included in the consultation.

It was agreed by the meeting on February 7th, that the Committee on Ecumenical Relations, The Presbyterian Record and the Administrative Council be invited to become regular participants in the Consultation on Church and Society. The Board of Congregational Life has approved the report and accordingly recommends as follows:—

RECOMMENDATION NO. 25 A

That the above proposal for future consultation on Church and Society be approved.

RECOMMENDATION No. 26 A

That the Consultation on Church and Society as presently constituted be enlarged to include representatives of the Committee on Ecumenical Relations, The Presbyterian Record, and the Administrative Council.

STAFFING AND PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Through its Committee on Staffing and Professional Development the Board carries out an annual review of staff functions and performance, and discusses with the staff their plans for continuing education.

The Board wishes to record its concern that, its staff having been reduced from 9 to 7 positions in recent years, its members now carry a work load which is demanding in the extreme. It should be noted also that a research and planning func-

tion is required within the Board in order to enable congregations and courts of the Church more adequately to address the future. Under present budgetary restraints no request is being made at this time, but it is obvious that either additional staff will be required, or some work will have to be discontinued.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON ECUMENICAL RELATIONS

To the Venerable the 106th General Assembly:

PREAMBLE

The Presbyterian Church in Canada has declared through the decades of its existence that it continually maintains its belief in the catholicity of the Church of Jesus Christ throughout the world. "We believe in the Holy Catholic Church". From the splendid statement on this tenet adopted by the 1947 General Assembly in Calgary to the following recommendations adopted by the 1971 General Assembly, The Presbyterian Church in Canada has affirmed its conviction in this regard:

- "This General Assembly affirms again its belief in the catholicity and unity
 of Christ's Church and its conviction that this belief makes it imperative
 to seek and establish active, positive relationships with other parts of His
 Church.
- This General Assembly affirms that at the present time participation in the Canadian Council of Churches and the World Council of Churches is a viable avenue of expression for that 'unity in diversity' which The Presbyterian Church in Canada has long professed and is a good means of co-operation with other "Christian Bodies".

Nevertheless, as this report is being prepared, the Administrative Council has before it a notice of motion which, if adopted, would send a recommendation to this General Assembly that we either pay our full allocation requested from the World Council of Churches and the Canadian Council of Churches, or that we withdraw our membership in these bodies. The financial amount involved is 0.9% of our anticipated income. While aware of the weakness of such national and international organizations, your committee believes that we are receiving good benefits for so small a token payment.

By action of the 105th General Assembly the name of this committee was changed from Committee on Inter-Church Relations to The Ecumenical Relations Committee. The scope of this committee has been wide and varied in relationships with other Churches and with the Inter-Church bodies of which The Presbyterian Church in Canada is a member. Dialogue with the Reformed Church of America (Canada Section) continues — and initiative is being taken to re-vitalize talks with the Christian Reformed Church. Reports on the World Council of Churches, the North American and Caribbean Area Council of WARC and the Canadian Council of Churches are included in this account.

Church to Church relations between our Church and Churches in North America, Europe and Australia have always been handled through the Ecumenical Relations Committee while the Board of World Mission has maintained contact between our Church and Churches in Asia, Africa, Latin America and the Caribbean. Historically this latter relationship was a "mission board to mission field" link. During the last twenty-five years this has changed into a "Church to Church" connection. As this division could lead to unfortunate misunderstandings the Executive of the Board of World Mission and the Ecumenical Relations Committee appointed a small committee to correlate channels of communication with all sister churches with whom we have contact.

We record some items that may be of interest to our membership of our participation in these ecumenical organizations and some benefits we are deriving from our membership.

SITUATION IN TAIWAN

Dr. Edmund Perret, General Secretary of the World Alliance of Reformed Churches, recently made a personal visit to that Country, and was able to provide valuable counsel and sympathy to a number of Presbyterian ministers under arrest and imprisonment.

WORLD OF COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

Mrs. Heather Johnston includes in this report some of her activities as a member of the Central Committee of this Council.

CANADIAN COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

Mrs. Heather Johnston is President of this Council, and continues to give valuable leadership in this responsibility.

WORLD ALLIANCE OF REFORMED CHURCHES

Dr. Donald C. MacDonald continues to act as the Treasurer of the North American and Caribbean Area Alliance of Reformed Churches, and a Director of the World Alliance.

An Assembly of the World Alliance is now scheduled to be held in the University of Ottawa in the summer of 1982, and a Council of the World Council of Churches is being held in the University of British Columbia in the summer of 1983.

REVIEW OF OUR PROCEDURE IN CALLING MINISTERS DIRECT FROM OTHER CHURCHES

The 104th General Assembly directed this committee to make a general RE-VIEW OF OUR PROCEDURES IN CALLING MINISTERS DIRECT FROM OTHER CHURCHES.

The Inter-Church Relations Committee (as it was then called) reported to the 105th General Assembly the progress made in reviewing our procedure in calling ministers direct from other Churches. It was agreed we continue the study with a committee constituted as follows:

- Four representatives of the Ecumenical Relations Committee, including the Chairperson;
- Two representatives of the Board of Ministry;
- Two representatives of the Board of Education;
- 4. The Principals of our three Colleges;
- 5. The Clerks of Assembly (or their alternates);
- Two representatives of the Board of World Mission.

These representatives were duly named and the committee met, and made its study. The Committee reported its findings to the Ecumenical Relations Committee which adopted the report in the following terms for presentation to the 106th General Assembly:

PREAMBLE TO REPORT ON RECEPTION OF MINISTERS AND LICENTIATES OF OTHER CHURCHES

The procedure for receiving ministers and licentiates from other Churches is outlined in the Book of Forms, Sections 248, sub-section I to XI. The list of Churches from which we may call direct is found in the 1948 Acts and Proceedings Pages 110-111 and the 1961 Acts and Proceedings Page 22. This list of Churches is very much outdated by changes which have taken place in unions, amalgamations, etc., since the time it was adopted. The Committee considered the time had come to propose new procedures to be followed in the future. The number and variety of Reformed Churches in the world have increased, and the standards in theological training, etc., have become more varied. The committee considered that Churches in the Reformed family should continue to be treated differently from other Churches, nevertheless it was agreed that some screening would be desired for ministers coming from any Church outside our own. The Committee was not prepared to compose a list of Reformed Churches wherein some would be treated in a different manner from others. So the following suggested procedure will put Churches which are members of the World Alliance of Reformed Churches in one category, and all other Churches in another. Inasmuch as we are proposing a screening process for the former Churches, with a more complete screening for all others

(the others being received by the same method as at present) the Committee con-

sidered the changes being recommended moderate in nature.

To accomplish the procedure outlined herein the Committee of the General Assembly on Reception will meet regularly at not longer periods than three months, unless there are no applications to consider.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 1

That the following wording for Section 248 of the Book of Forms be sent down to Presbyteries for consideration under the Barrier Act.

That Section 248 (I) be as follows:

Any minister who is a settled pastor, or a professor of Theology, or who is employed by special appointment in some department of the work of the Church, in a Church which is a member of the World Alliance of Reformed Churches, if regularly called by a congregation of the Church, may be received by a Presbytery after permission has been granted by the Committee of the General Assembly on Reception.

The Committee on Reception shall examine each applicant, researching such documents as Presbyterial certificate, academic degrees and certificates, etc.; but the Presbytery, if it sees cause, may refer the case to the

Assembly.

That Section 248 (II) be as follows:

Ministers described in Subsection I, in good and regular standing, who have not been called by a congregation of this Church, but who desire to come to Canada in hope of such a call, may be admitted to eligibility provided they make their application to the Clerk of Assembly before they resign their position in their home Church. The Committee on Reception shall receive such applications, and circulate them to Presbyteries. If no competent objection is received from any Presbytery within two months of the sending of the circular letters, the committee shall study the credentials as in I above, and have power to issue in the matter. If any competent objection is raised by a Presbytery, the application shall be dealt with under the Sub-section following. The Committee shall receive applications only from ministers belonging to Churches which have membership in the World Alliance of Reformed Churches, Licentiates shall be received only through the General Assembly. The Committee on Reception shall consist of the following, all ex-officio: The Chairman of the Board of Education, Convener; the Secretary of the Board of Education; the Moderator of the General Assembly; the Clerks of Assembly, or their appointees; the General Secretary of the Board of World Mission; the Principal of Knox College; the Principal of Presbyterian College; the Chairman of the Board of Knox College; and the Chairman of the Senate of Presbyterian College.

WORLD COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

After much discussion and honest confrontation in Sudbury, the 105th General Assembly overwhelmingly supported our continued membership in the World Council of Churches. There has been no Central Committee meeting since that Assembly yet much is happening in the Oikoumene. Some highlights have been shared in a letter entitled "Geneva News" sent to all ministers last December.

Dr. James Farris attended the "Faith, Science and the Future" conference as our official delegate. An excellent report appeared in the January issue of The Pres-

byterian Record.

The Ecumenical Prayer Cycle "For all God's People" enriches the prayer life

of some congregations.

Miss Mary Whale, one of three Canadian delegates, participated this past month in a World Conference under the theme "Your Kingdom Come" in Melbourne, Australia.

As we enter the eighties one of the greatest events for the Christian Churches in Canada will be the sixth Assembly of the WCC to be held July 24 to August 10, 1983 in Vancouver, B.C. Two committees have been set up, one local and one na-

tional, and we as a church participate in both. Remember this venture and all who plan for it in your prayers!

WORLD ALLIANCE

Report on the meetings of the Caribbean and North American Area Council of the World Alliance of Reformed Churches, Germantown, Pennsylvania, Feb. 28-Mar.1,1980.

This year the meetings of the Area Council of WARC were attended by Donald Campbell (Ottawa), George Malcolm (Toronto), May Nutt (Toronto), and Brian Fraser (Toronto) as official delegates from our church, and by Donald MacDonald (Toronto) and William Klempa (Montreal) in their executive capacity. The meetings marked a significant shift in the style of operations for the Council. New bylaws were approved that strengthen the committees of the Council and make them more active in their work of co-ordinating and promoting the work of the Alliance in the Caribbean and North America. It is hoped that each of the committees — Civil and Religious Liberty, Co-operation and Witness, and Theology — will be able to meet twice a year and that the continuity provided by more frequent meetings will strengthen the traditional functions of providing mutual support among member churches and encouraging theological reflection.

The Civil and Religious Liberty Committee addressed the pressing problems of human rights in Taiwan and Grenada, indicated that it intended to take up the refugee issue, took further steps to compile a catalogue of those in its member churches who are responsible for or interested in human rights issues, requested reports on the status of women in its member churches, and expressed continuing concern for

the ratification of the United Nations covenants on human rights.

The Co-operation and Witness Committee is taking special steps to form closer ties with the Presbyterian Church in Mexico and planning to undertake a study of

the growth of Islam and its implications for member churches.

The Theology Committee continues with its study of the Covenant and gives a special focus to the implications of our understanding of covenant for our particular context in the Caribbean and North America. This exercise in contextual theo-

logy has exciting possibilities for the future of the Alliance.

The next General Council of the Alliance will be held in Ottawa in 1982. Some 700 delegates from around the world will gather to consider the theme: "For Thine is the Kingdom, the Power, and the Glory". In his address to the delegates, Alliance President James McCord reviewed the work of the Alliance in the light of that theme, stressing the need to keep two questions in mind: 1) What does it mean to be Reformed?; and 2) How do we face up to our responsibility for each other in concrete ways? The general impression following the meetings was that the steps taken by this Area Council were positive and significant in moving to answer those questions.

CANADIAN COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

The Triennium of the Canadian Council of Churches was held in April 1979 in what proved to be the "convention town" of Sudbury. It was the year of the INCO

strike as well as the year that our General Assembly met in that town.

The purpose of the triennial meeting is that the member Churches have an opportunity to meet together in delegations commensurate with the sizes of the Churches, rather that in the rather balanced type of delegations at the Council and Executive meetings which meet twice annually and monthly respectively. Although reports are received and budgets, plus constitutional matters, are brought for adoption, the thrust of the triennium is more study and thinking together on themes prepared in advance. Hence it is more of a conference.

1979 Triennium was no exception. The relationship between labour and management in a strike situation, mining and environmental concerns, industry and

northern Ontario, regional interests and national interests, Roman Catholic — Protestant relations, and the activities of local ecumenical experiments were highlighted. Local tours and speakers provided ready illustrations.

The election of Mrs. Heather Johnston of Hamilton, Ontario, as president for the next three years made all Presbyterians very proud indeed. Not only is Heather the Chairperson of our Ecumenical Relations Committee, but she is also on the Central Committee of the World Council of Churches. She is very busy indeed.

Since many Presbyterians are involved within the committee structures of the C.C.C. and aside from those who are appointed directly by some board or committee of General Assembly, there is no vehicle for Presbyterians to report to our Ecumenical Relations Committee which is charged by Assembly to deal with outside bodies, we are establishing a coordinating "Presbyterian Caucus" which will meet from time to time to review progress and our Presbyterian participations in the C.C.C. In this way it is hoped that we will be able to avoid the weak "me too" position we sometimes are forced into; and also be able to give coordinated leadership in areas where our Church has expertise which we can share.

1. SUMMARY OF ACCOUNTING PRACTICES

The following is a summary of accounting practices followed by the Church:

(a) Cash receipts

Contributions held by congregations at December 31, 1979 for Budget Revenue, for the National Development Fund, for the Second Century Advance for Christ Fund and for the Inter-Church Aid Committee which were remitted to the Treasurer of the Church by January 15, 1980 have been included in revenue for the year in which they were given by members of the congregation. These amounts have been segregated for balance sheet purposes and designated as cash in transit.

(b) Investment transactions and income

Investment transactions are accounted for on the trade date (date the order to buy or sell is executed).

Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis.

Dividend income is recorded on the date of declaration.

Realized gains and losses from investment transactions are recorded on the transaction date.

On the recommendation of The Trustee Board, the Church follows the practice of valuing marketable securities at market value rather than at acquisition cost.

(c) Capitalization and depreciation

Property fund

Properties are stated at cost, or if donated are recorded on the basis of fair market value at the time of acquisition. All other fixed assets are expensed when acquired.

Depreciation is not provided on the properties.

Endowment, Restricted and Trust Funds

Fixed assets are recorded at values determined by executors with subsequent additions recorded at cost.

Depreciation is provided on the buildings, furniture and equipment and vehicles on a straight line basis using the following annual rates:

Buildings - 3%
Furniture and equipment -10%
Vehicles - 20%

Depreciation expense on buildings, furniture and equipment and vehicles has been charged against the J.B. MacLean Bequest Fund.

(d) Composition of assets and liabilities

- (i) Only the fixed assets of Knox, Presbyterian and Ewart Colleges, Saskatoon Residence, Armagh and St. Andrew's Hall are included in the balance sheet.
- (ii) The assets and liabilities of the Pension Fund are not included in these statements. A separate statement covering this fund has been prepared.

(e) Composition of income and expenditure

(i) Except for the amount allocated from the Budget, no receipts or disbursements have been included in the statement of income and expenditure for the following:

Knox, Presbyterian and Ewart Colleges, St. Andrew's Hall, Saskatoon Residence, Pension Fund and Armagh.

(ii) Current operations are charged with both principal repayments on mortgages and with costs relating to the acquisition of furniture and equipment. The related asset and liability accounts are adjusted at year end by a charge to the Property Fund.

(iii) Income and expenditure does not include certain receipts and disbursements recorded directly to unexpended appropriations Board of World Missions and special projects and amounts available for specific

purposes.

(f) Profit on Book of Praise

The accumulated proceeds on the sale of each printing of the Book of Praise and Praiseways is applied to reduce the inventory value of that printing. Profit on each printing is not realized until substantially all the inventory is sold.

With the exception of the following practices referred to above namely:

- (i) valuing marketable securities at market value rather than at acquisition cost (1(b))
- (ii) not recording depreciation on Property Fund fixed assets and charging depreciation expense on properties, furniture and equipment and vehicles directly against The Endowment, Restricted and Trust Fund (1(c))

(iii) charging operations with principal repayments on mortgages and with the cost of additions to furniture and equipment (1(e)(ii))

(iv) recording certain receipts and disbursements directly to unexpended appropriation, Board of World Missions and special projects, and amounts available for specific purposes (1(e)(iii)), and

(v) applying proceeds on the sale of each printing of the Book of Praise and Praiseways to reduce inventory values (1(f))

the financial statements have been prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

2. MORTGAGES AND LOANS PAYABLE ON MANSES

The mortgages and loans payable on manses are secured by the related properties included in the property fund.

3. AMOUNTS HELD IN TRUST

Amounts held in trust are comprised of: a) monies which the Church invests on behalf of certain organizations and remits the yearly income to that organization, and b) assets of dissolved congregations which are held for further use pending recommendation by the presbytery of the bounds.

4. SECOND CENTURY ADVANCE FOR CHRIST

The one hundred and first General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada held in June 1975 gave approval for the Second Century Advance for Christ campaign to be conducted over a two year period beginning in 1978.

The object of this fund is to provide capital for church extension in Canada and overseas.

THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (continued) YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 1979

5. COLLEGE GRANTS

The total cost of operating Knox, Presbyterian and Ewart Colleges, St. Andrew's Hall and Saskatoon Residence is \$1,483,900 (\$1,254,000 in 1978). Separate statements covering these institutions have been prepared. The Presbyterian Church in Canada has contributed \$498,886 (\$437,364 in 1978) towards the operation of these institutions.

6. CHANGES IN ACCOUNTING PRACTICE

(a) Property Fund

The church has retroactively adopted the policy of not recording depreciation on its property fund fixed assets, and expensing furniture and equipment in the year of acquisition.

(b) Endowment, Restricted and Trust Fund The J.B. MacLean Bequest Fund has retroactively adopted the policy of recording depreciation on its fixed assets.

The comparative figures have been restated to reflect these changes in accounting policy.

1. SUMMARY OF ACCOUNTING PRACTICES

The following is a summary of accounting practices followed by the Fund. With the exception of the practice of valuing marketable securities at market value rather than at acquisition cost and the practice of charging depreciation on its fixed assets directly to capital, the financial statements have been prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

(a) Investment transactions and income

Investment transactions are accounted for on the trade date (date the order to buy or sell is executed).

Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis.

Dividend income is recorded on the date of declaration.

Realized gains and losses from investment transactions are recorded on the transaction date

(b) Valuation

The Fund follows the practice of valuing marketable securities at market value rather than at acquisition cost. Adjustments arising thereon are allocated between capital and undistributed income, on the basis of the ratio of capital to undistributed income at the beginning of the year.

(c) Depreciation

Buildings are depreciated on the straight line basis at an annual rate of 3% of cost until the estimated residual value is attained.

Other fixed assets are depreciated on the straight line basis at the following annual rates:

Furniture and equipment - 10% Vehicles - 20%

Depreciation provided on properties, furniture and equipment and vehicles is charged to capital.

(d) Fixed assets

All fixed assets are recorded at values determined by executors with subsequent additions recorded at cost.

These financial statements are included in the financial statements of The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

THE COMMITTEE ON HISTORY

To the Venerable the 106th General Assembly:

The Committee on History respectfully submits the following Report of its activities during the year which has passed:

ARCHIVES

The administration of the Archives for The Presbyterian Church in Canada falls under the jurisdiction of this Committee of the General Assembly, and continues to occupy the greatest time and funds allotted to the Committee. Located in the basement of Knox College, 59 St. George St., Toronto, the Archives, equipped and under controlled climatic conditions, exists to preserve the historical records generated by the Church, from the local congregation to the General Assembly. Accessions are always welcomed, and congregations and Courts are encouraged to consider the Archives for the deposit of such materials which are invaluable to our history as a Church in Canada. Such accessions may be deposited for permanent safe-keeping, or in trust, for withdrawal after a time. The Archives particularly welcomes microfilm copy of materials, should it be desired to retain the original materials close at hand.

In the past year the Archives suffered the loss of the Archivist, Dr. John S. Moir, who for personal reasons and pressure of work, tendered his resignation. The Committee on History wishes to record its deep appreciation to the many hours of labour and the cheerful interest with which Dr. Moir carried out his office. It is to Dr. Moir that the Church as a whole is grateful for writing our most recent history,

"Enduring Witness", and for conceiving, promoting, writing, the guide-book "For the Record" which sets forth definitions, policies and practices with respect to the acquisition and preservation of our records. The sub-committee on Archives is presently considering a replacement for this position, as well as reviewing the guide-lines for the position. See Recommendation 1.

For some time now the Archives has been staffed by an Assistant to the Archivist, who does the day to day work in the Archives and works under the direction of the Archivist. During the past year it was found necessary to seek a replacement for Miss Sheila Moir who left our employ to further herself in other interests. The sub-committee immediately set about to find a person with suitable qualifications, willing to work for the Church at a reduced rate of remuneration. In December Miss Shelley King took up her work in the Archives. Miss King has degrees (M.A.) in both History and English, and has had experience in historical manuscript editing. In the interim of the vacancy, the Archives continued to function on a limited basis through the assistance of the Secretary of the Committee, the Rev. T.M. Bailey, and the Rev. Hartley Beattie of Hamilton, Ontario.

Despite the changes in personnel, materials have continued to flow to the Archives, as congregations become more aware of what the Church has to offer. At the same time telephone and walk-in requests have increased, and the Assistant to the Archivist has endeavoured to deal with these as completely as possible. Students, scholars, ministers, missionaries, and the general public are among our enquirers. There is particular concern for geneological information, no doubt a "spin off" effect of the popular television series "Roots" of a couple of years ago.

The Administrative Council has requested the Committee to consider the possible inclusion of our Archives within the Public Archives of Canada in Ottawa. The Committee has not yet considered or made response to that request. The Committee however, is disturbed that in some instances congregations are by-passing our Archives and depositing their records in government or other Archives. This action is deplored by the Committee, even though it is admitted that in terms of funds available, manpower and service, such agencies are often superior to what we can offer. While not being in a position to enforce deposit in the Church Archives, the Committee would press strongly for congregations to support their own Archives, which were made possible in the past and are maintained in the present by yearly givings of our people to the General Assembly Budget. See Recommendations 2 and 3.

In light of the increasing time, money and simple logistics, which is being required by the Archives to function adequately, the Committee on History will make an examination of the appropriateness of the separation of the work of the Archives from that of the Committee on History. Hopefully, a report on this matter will be available for the 107th General Assembly.

PRESBYTERIAN HISTORY

This paper is published periodically throughout the year by the Committee on History, and is enclosed with the monthly mailing to all ministers across the Church. For some time now it has been prepared and edited by the Secretary of the Committee, and the thanks of the Committee on behalf of the Church are extended to the Rev. T.M. Bailey. Additional copies may be procured from the Archives at a minimum cost, should any congregation wish to make broader use of the paper. In 1979 several issues were prepared and distributed, enabling us to bring our issues up to date. Shortly forthcoming will be our 1980 issues which will deal with the work of the Rev. Robert James McDowall, pioneer Presbyterian missionary to Upper Canada.

PRESBYTERIAN HISTORY PRIZE:

Each year the Committee on History awards two prizes for current writings in the field of Church History. In 1979 the awards were as follows: to Dr. W. Harold Reid, for "The Presbyterian Church, St. Andrew's and Lachute, Quebec, 1818-1932"; and to the Rev. Dr. John A. Johnston, for "Strong Wind Blowing", the 125th Anniversary History of MacNab Street Presbyterian Church, Hamilton, Ontario. Individuals and congregations are encouraged to make submissions to the

Secretary of the Committee by the end of each year. Copies of the recently revised rules are available from the Archives. A prize of \$25 is awarded for each winning entry.

RECORDS MANAGEMENT:

The Committee on History has nothing further to report on this project. At the November meeting of the Administrative Council, Mr. Alex Ross, a member of our Committee, made a submission to the Council and it was subsequently referred to one of their Committees. The Committee on History would reiterate its opinion that Records Management is of some urgency to the Church (and to the Archives) and it does not wish it to be lightly dismissed.

PUBLICATIONS:

Following the action of the 105th General Assembly in granting funds to the Committee on History to prepare Volume 2 of "Called to Witness", the manuscripts were submitted to the printer, galley proofs were checked, cover design finalized, and at the time of this writing, its is expected that the finished product will be on sale to commissioners and other interested parties at the 106th General Assembly. The book will be publicized through the monthly mailing and the Presbyterian Record. An order for 1000 copies has been placed, and the Committee will offer copies for sale at \$4.50 cash sale or \$5.00 postpaid from the Archives. This book is a companion volume to an earlier volume by the same title, and presents to the reader a substantial number of biographies of Presbyterian men and women who have made a significant contribution to the life of our Canadian society and Church. The Committee would urge all congregations to acquire copies of both volumes for their libraries and distribution on appropriate occasions.

Copies of "For the Record – a Brief Introduction to Definitions, Policies and Practices for the Records of The Presbyterian Church in Canada" were distributed to all commissioners to the 105th General Assembly. Copies were also sent gratis by the Committee to all Clerks of Presbyteries. Responding to advertisement, many congregations have received copies. More are still available, and the Committee would urge Presbyteries to provide a copy for all congregations of the bounds. The price is \$1.00 postpaid from the Archives. In the Committee's estimation, there is no comparable document available anywhere at present in Canada on the subject.

Under preparation at the present time is a paper on "Microfilming your Records", which will be distributed free to all congregations in 1981. Coming out very shortly to all congregations will be a "Records Survey - 1980", and the Committee would respectfully urge all congregations to participate and complete this Survey which pertains to the number and kind of records presently in the hands of congregations or deposited in other archives. When received and compiled in the Archives, such information will be an extremely valuable source for persons engaged in legitimate research. See Recommendation 4.

CANADIAN SOCIETY OF PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH HISTORY:

This Society is open to all ministers and lay persons across the Church who have an interest in Presbyterian history. In 1979 the Society met in Emmanuel College, Toronto. At time of writing, the date for the 1980 meeting has yet to be determined. For further information, contact Dr. John S. Moir, 167 Main St. N., Markham, Ontario.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 1 A

That this General Assembly acknowledge its deep appreciation to Dr. John S. Moir, for his selfless contribution to the acquisition, preservation, and publication of the history of The Presbyterian Church in Canada, and express its deep regrets upon his resignation from the position of Archivist of the Church.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 2 A

That Congregations be urged to consider the Archives of the Church as the proper depository of their Records, when no longer in active use, to the end that they may be best preserved against possible loss, misuse or abuse.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 3 A

That Presbyteries and Synods again be strongly urged to place their Minutes, as printed annually, in the Archives of the Church.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 4 A

That the "Records Survey -1980", as distributed by the Committee on History, be fully and promptly filled out when received by all congregations of the Church, and returned to the Archives.

THE COMMITTEE ON INTER CHURCH AID, REFUGEE AND WORLD SERVICE

To the Venerable the 106th General Assembly:

Inter Church Aid has continued its work in world development and relief during 1979.

INCOME: Income received from congregations and individuals in 1979 totalled \$160,890, a considerable increase over 1978's income of \$130,412. In addition, \$177,685 in matching grants was received from the Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA), the Alberta Council for International Co-operation (ACIC), and the Saskatchewan Council for International Co-operation (SCIC). Income received from all sources in 1979 is \$338,665.

DISBURSEMENTS: The mandate of Inter Church Aid is to act as the agency within The Presbyterian Church in Canada for informing, educating, and eliciting the response of congregations across our church regarding development, disaster and refugee needs across the world.

The Committee continues to place major emphasis on development aid which enables people to provide themselves with adequate food, gainful employment, housing, health care and education. Development efforts include trades and farming schools, irrigation wells, a rural revitalization programme, women's development, comprehensive community improvements and rural health clinics. Inter Church Aid has sent more than \$103,000 to development projects in 9 countries.

Relief to victims of natural and social disasters is another area of concern for Inter Church Aid. In 1979, the Committee sent \$16,400 to Nicaragua, Yugoslavia, Uganda, and Woodstock, Ontario to meet emergency needs for food, medicines and reconstruction.

Refugees have been a critical world issue for several years, but 1979's media publicity for Vietnamese boat people has raised public awareness for refugees worldwide. Although Inter Church Aid was not involved in an official capacity with the Canadian Refugee Sponsorship Programme, the Committee shared information with congregations and participated ecumenically in discussions with government officials. The Committee forwarded \$13,400 to refugee programmes in Indochina, Africa and to Palestinian refugees.

The Committee has maintained strong ecumenical links both in Canada and worldwide. Canadian ecumenical involvements include PLURA, a self help development fund for the poor in Canada; ICFID (Inter Church Fund for International Development), a development aid funding agency, the Canadian Council of Churches Committee on Development and Service, and the Committee on Refugee Concerns.

Our needs for a) documented information about relief and development operations, b) competent channeling of financial and human resources, and c) communication with persons in developing areas, are met largely through our participation in World Council of Churches programmes.

EDUCATION: The Committee realizes that education of Canadians about development is integral to its work. Progress towards effective global improvements necessarily includes a recognition of powerful economic and social factors and their

impact on the lives of ordinary people. To this end, Inter Church Aid participates with four other Canadian denominations in the educational programmes of GATTFly and Ten Days for World Development. The Ten Days theme for 1980-1982 is "Making a Living", and Inter Church Aid has produced supplementary study materials for adults, youth and children.

Information about the work of the Committee has been circulated to congregations through emergency appeals, pamphlets, information bulletins and articles in the Glad Tidings. The 1979 Share-Lent material was widely used by congregations

as was the Advent liturgy.

ADMINISTRATION: Administrative costs remain low, thanks to hard working committee members. Expenses for 1979 totalled \$18,358 11.4% of congregational

givings or less than 6% of income from all sources.

CHURCH & SOCIETY: At its February 1980 meeting, the Consultation on Church and Society discussed our denomination's involvement in issues of social justice. It was felt that though boards and committees were participating in a wide range of social issues, a forum for co-ordination, information sharing and voicing of concerns was needed.

The Consultation, of which Inter Church Aid is a member, has recommended that it meet quarterly and report to General Assembly each year (see Board of Congregational Life report). Inter Church Aid endorses this recommendation from the

Consultation on Church and Society.

NAME CHANGE: At the 105th General Assembly it was moved "that a change in the name of the Inter Church Aid, Refugee and World Service Committee be considered". This motion was referred to Inter Church Aid for action, and the Committee has recommended the following name: Presbyterian World Service and Development.

Mrs. Marjorie Lowry is retiring from the Inter Church Aid Committee after five years of service. The Committee is thankful for Mrs. Lowry's efforts on behalf

of international development.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 1 A

That the Committee's name be changed to "Presbyterian World Service and Development".

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS

To the Venerable the 106th General Assembly:

A. The goals of the General Assembly's Committee on International Affairs, as adopted in 1979, are as follows:

1. To hold meetings for the following purposes;

- a) to consider and discuss selected international issues
- b) to reflect from time to time on the theological dimensions of events of international significance, e.g. apartheid, disarmament, refugees
- c) to make recommendations to the General Assembly on matters of international concern
- d) to communicate with the Canadian government on matters of international concern to the Presbyterian Church in Canada.
- 2. To help Presbyterians across Canada to be informed and aware of important international issues for study, prayer, and action, e.g. disarmament, Declaration of Human Rights.
- To consult together with Canadians of other Churches, and inter-church bodies on matters of international concern to Christians, e.g. Churchperson's Seminar.

* * * *

- B. Following the last General Assembly, the Committee appointed a Task Force under Dr. Geoffrey Johnston in reponse to the following action of the Assembly.
 - "That the Assembly encourage study throughout the Church on violence as a social and/or political instrument: and

"That the International Affairs Committee be instructed to organize a Task Force for the purpose of producing a paper as a basis for study, based on

- a) a review of the positions which the Presbyterian Church in Canada has historically taken, explicitly or implicitly, on war, militarism and civil violence,
- b) a review of current printed and audio-visual resources available to individuals and congregations of our Church for study of this subject; and The following be invited to participate:

The Committee on Inter Church Aid

The Board of World Mission

The Board of Congregational Life

The Committee on Church Doctrine; and

"That the Committee on International Affairs report to the next General Assembly on this matter."

The Committee wishes to report in terms of the following statement and recommendation.

The Church and Social Violence

Although violence is as old as the nation, indeed as old as humanity itself, it was not until the years around the First World War that the Presbyterian Church in Canada addressed itself to the problem in any serious way. At that time, and ever since, the church has maintained a balanced and realistic position. While violence is never desirable, it is sometimes unavoidable.

The Westminster Confession (Art. 23/2) holds that a Christian magistrate may lawfully wage war. It follows therefore that a Christian citizen may lawfully serve in an army. Thus, in 1925, when the Presbytery of MacLeod wanted to call war a crime the Assembly committee appointed to reply disagreed. War

might be an extremely unpleasant activity but complicity in evil could well be worse. In the same way the Declaration of Faith Concerning Church and Nation allows for the possibility of a just revolution (Art 6). In 1973 the Committee on Church Doctrine suggested that Christians may have to show love and concern by endorsing a revolutionary cause while lamenting the violence it involves.

Historically then the church has accepted violence as an unfortunate necessity in a just cause. But justice is not something that can be defined in advance. Justice has to be worked out as the response of love in any given situation.

With traditional conflicts we are familiar. We know how to respond to a war with recognizable combatants in uniform, organized in chains of command on either side of a line of battle. But recent Assembly discussion of violence has arisen, not from conventional conflicts, but from guerrilla warfare in Africa. It is very probable that such wars will continue to flare up, both in Africa and in South America, as a result of both rising expectations and the increasing efficiency of modern dictators.

The twentieth century has seen an enormous increase in the power of the state. Governments have at their disposal a wide range of weaponry and communications equipment, the tools to make tyranny very efficient. But as long as tyranny does not expand across national boundaries other governments rarely act against it. Because those who suffer from the tyranny do not have the resources of a modern government they resort to guerrilla tactics.

Guerrilla warfare uses small groups of men and unconventional means. It differs from terrorism in that it uses violence against a recognized enemy. Terrorism is the use of indiscriminate violence. Guerrilla warfare, because it is more discriminate in its targets is less unpleasant than terrorism. But terrorism is not always mindless violence. It may be the only way to undermine a tightly controlled and tyrannical system. Besides it is difficult at a distance to separate terrorist from guerrilla activity. The murder of a school teacher may be terrorism, but the teacher may also have been a government informer.

Revolutionary violence usually develops in response to institutional violence. It is now generally recognized that violence is not restricted to those who would change things; it is also widely used by established governments. The existence of revolutionary violence probably indicates the existence of prior governmental violence, for people do not take to the barricades without serious provocation. The legitimacy of revolutionary violence has been accepted by the church, with caution and reluctance, in the Declaration of Faith Concerning Church and Nation. Christians who accept that violence may be an unfortunate necessity have the further responsibility of deciding when it is legitimate and when it is not. While we have not had to make such a choice for ourselves in many years others have, and their appeals for assistance have come to churches around the world.

In approaching such appeals we must recognize the importance and the difficulty of informed judgement. It is often difficult to amass sufficient reliable information to make a decision, especially as our chief sources in the public press are not without bias. Nor are we ourselves detached observers. We react differently depending on whether we can identify with one side or another, or with neither. Because our own presuppositions colour our judgement we must examine ourselves as well as the issues before we decide.

Decide we must. Not to decide is to support by default the government in power. Inaction places no obstacles in the path of the natural advantages possessed by the powers that be. But while decision is unavoidable it is entirely probable that Christians, equally diligent in examing their prejudices and equally diligent in amassing information may come to different conclusions. Our procedures as a church should allow for such honest disagreement.

On certain points we do agree. Whatever the justice of any given cause it is wrong that human beings should be under-fed, or homeless, or in pain, or without education for long periods. It is an act of love and therefore of justice to alleviate their suffering.

But such humanitarian activities will not solve the problem, Civil violence has its roots in disputes which have a measure of justice on both sides. The

second approach on which we can all agree is making peace, probing sympathetically into the minds of everyone involved, endeavouring to find ways to establish a just settlement.

* * * *

In the light of the foregoing, the Committee recommends to the General Assembly that:

RECOMMENDATION NO. 1 C

Agencies of the Church may respond to appeals for humanitarian assistance by revolutionary movements, provided that the Presbyterian Church in Canada and the agency through which the assistance is requested are actively seeking a just and lasting settlement of the conflict through whatever means may be advisable and practical.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 2 C

Individuals and congregations may dissociate themselves from such actions in support of revolutionary movements without prejudice to the other activities of the agency in question.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 3 C

The above paper be adopted as a basis for study and that the International Affairs Committee, in conjunction with the Board of Congregational Life prepare and circulate further educational material on the subject of revolutionary and other violence.

C. The Committee also wishes to report as follows:

Refugees have been a major concern of congregations across the Church during the past year. Reports were heard from time to time on international conditions in Kampuchea, Singapore, Hong Kong, and the efforts of the Canadian government and churches to offer assistance and resettlement to refugees.

The Committee commends the Presbytery of Bruce-Maitland for the work

of its Task Force on Disarmament.

The Middle East. The Committee began an examination of the political, economic and social factors at work in the nations of the Middle East and would commend to our people in presbyteries and congregations study which would enlarge understanding of dynamics at work among Moslem peoples.

Latin America. Canadian Presbyterians in world mission relationships have not had extensive contact with peoples of Latin America and tend to be out of touch with current developments and struggles of peoples in this part of the western hemisphere. The Committee spent one meeting considering recent developments in Central America and suggest that congregations would find conversations with people informed about Guatemala, Nicaragua, El Salvador, etc., highly interesting and challenging for their prayer life.

Taiwan. The Committee, after hearing reports on developments involving old friends in the Presbyterian Church in Taiwan, would join with the B.W.M.

in calling Canadians to informed prayer for people in that nation.

Joint Efforts. 1) The Canadian Council of Churches Committee on International Affairs is engaging in a review of Canadian foreign policy from the perspective of Christian concern. Our Church is represented in and shares the work of this group.

2) Project Ploughshares is a coalition of Canadian churchmen studying the critical questions of disarmament and alternative defense policies for Canada. It would urge Presbyterians to participate in local discussions on these important matters and to inform the Committee of studies undertaken, activities engaged in, or conclusions reached. The Committee would like to see more Presbyterian financial support of Ploughshares.

. 3) Consultation on Church and Society. This is a forum at the national level of our Church, of representatives of Boards and Committees, for the pur-

pose of sharing information on current social issues, being considered by Boards and Committees. Our Committee approves of the proposal that the Consultation meet quarterly rather than annually, in order to expand their function of informing the whole church on the state of the discussions of these issues, and improving the effectiveness of national agencies in relating appropriately to these issues.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 4 A

That a budget of \$2,000. be approved for the International Affairs Committee.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MINISTRY

To the Venerable the 106th General Assembly:

PREAMBLE

This has been the first year in office of the Chairman and Vice-Chairman, the Rev. Wallace Little and Professor Alexandra Johnston respectively, and at the same time the last year in office of the General Secretary, the Rev. J.C. Cooper who is retiring.

It has been an eventful year for the Board of Ministry in the light of these transitions in leadership and of the various tasks laid upon it by General Assembly.

PREPARATION FOR MINISTRY

A. Theological Education:

1. Joint Faculties Meeting:

For the first time, the Board of Ministry was represented at the annual meeting of the Joint-Faculties of our colleges, because of the thoughtful invitation given to the General Secretary to attend the meeting at Presbyterian College, Montreal in February. This provided an important step for the Board in fulfilling its mandate as sounding board-advocate-interpreter between the colleges and the church.

2. The Vancouver School of Theology:

The action of last year's General Assembly in agreeing to enter into association with V.S.T. called for representation on the Board of St. Andrew's Hall by V.S.T. and vice-versa. It was noted that such representation requires that the charter of St. Andrew's Hall be changed by the Province of British Columbia. Therefore, to fill the gap until this can be done, an interim agreement limiting these mutual representatives to the status of observers was drawn up by the church's solicitor in British Columbia, agreed to by the Board of Ministry and by the V.S.T. Board. Unfortunately, this happened only recently, and at the time of writing, St. Andrew's Hall Board meeting to consider the matter had not been held. It is hoped that a supplementary report to the General Assembly may be able to state that the interim agreement has been signed by all parties concerned.

B. Goodfellow Scholarship Fund:

We regret to report that Mr. Sampson J. Goodfellow, the generous donor of this fund, died shortly before last year's General Assembly. Before he died, however, he requested that our students at the Vancouver School of Theology be given priority for scholarships from the fund as outlined in the following terms:

SUPPLEMENTARY CLAUSE

At such time as the Presbyterian Church in Canada becomes an affiliate of, or a participating denomination in the Vancouver School of Theology as is being recommended by a committee of the four western synods of the church, the following clause is to be appended to the terms of the Sampson John Goodfellow, and the Ann Owen (Nancy) Goodfellow, and the Annie McFadyen Goodfellow Scholarship Fund:

In order that the students for the ministry of the Presbyterian Church in Canada studying at the Vancouver School of Theology may be as nearly as possible on the same financial footing as such students in Knox College and Presbyterian College, priority is to be given to the paying of the fees for such students at the Vancouver School of Theology subject to proper application by the individual students and consistent with the terms and conditions of the fund.

During 1979, \$3,800. was awarded in twelve scholarships in February, and \$2,700. to ten applicants for the same purpose in April. One scholarship for \$300. was awarded in December. The lowest scholarship was for \$100. (one only) whereas four students received the maximum amount of \$500. The average scholarship was about \$300.

In January of this year, the Goodfellow Fund Committee awarded scholarships to four V.S.T. student applicants in the amount of \$450. each, to cover their fall-term fees, and the committee was assured that bursary funds at the disposal of St. Andrew's Hall would pay their fees for the spring term. In addition, fourteen awards for academic excellence were made to students in our four colleges, in the January distribution, amounting to \$3,700. for an average of \$264. each.

C. Guidance Conferences for Students for Professional Church Leadership

1. History

The guidance conference has gone through three phases:

(a) In 1976, a proposal for initiating guidance conferences was approved by the General Assembly (A & P. 1976, pp. 351-355,49). Two conferences were held with individuals attending on a voluntary basis or on the recommendation of the presbytery. The written report on each student was accompanied by a recommendation to the presbytery for or against the certification of the student. (b) At the 1978 Board of Ministry meeting the decision was made to deemphasize the screening aspect leaving that function entirely to the presbyteries in favour of supportive counselling. Therefore, the recommendation concerning certification was removed from the report.

The General Assembly agreed, "that the trial period for guidance conferences be extended for three years and that for that time period it be compulsory for a candidate for the ministry of word and sacrament to attend a guidance conference before the completion of his/

her first year in theology". (A. & P. 1978, pp. 338,32).

(c) The General Assembly last year approved a motion from the senate of The Presbyterian College, "that the Board of Ministry reinstate the screening aspect of guidance conferences". (A. & P. 1979, pp. 273,46). Therefore, the recommendation for or against certification again accompanies the written report on each student.

Originally, reports from the guidance conferences were only sent to the presbytery and college upon request. The request was inadvertently omitted so often, that it was decided in 1979 to automatically send the report when authorized by the candidate to the appropriate presbytery and college. This year's Board meeting agreed to send a

copy to the Board of World Mission on request.

2. Statistics

One hundred students have attended the guidance conferences. Fifty-three attended during phases (a) and (c) when recommendations were made to presbyteries for or against certification. Of these fifty-three, six people were not recommended for certification. Five are no longer seeking to enter the ministry, and one will attend another guidance conference. In the case of three other students, special training before certification was recommended and for two other students it was suggested that a further assessment be made. The students have come from thirty-two different presbyteries. In 1979 the average cost per student was \$67. Students are now responsible for their own travel.

Eight conferences have been held, in Montreal, Toronto, Crieff, and Saskatoon. Thirty-four people have participated as counsellors, twelve of

them serving on two different occasions.

3. Current Practice

The Board has attempted to refine the guidance conference process through serious consideration of the evaluations made by students and counsellors who have attended. The Board is also indebted to Mr. Robert Dickie, a retired psychologist and personnel officer for the help he has given by sharing his expertise and experience in the area of interviewing, report writing and conducting experiential exercises.

What follows is a description of the process which is currently used:

Before the Conference

Before the conference, the students fill out information forms and send them in to the Board of Ministry. They record information on their education and experience and answer questions on such matters as their call, their perception of their own strengths and weaknesses related to ministry and their growth in understanding of the Christian faith. Three counsellors are chosen for each group of six students, the usual conference having eighteen students. One of these counsellors acts as director. The staff is chosen for their experience in ministry and in interviewing and counselling.

The counsellors have a training day before the conference in preparation for the conference. They are given the information forms of the students planning to attend. The director is given the letters of reference

that have been received about the students.

The Conference

The guidance conference is a three-day event, and has the following goals and objectives:

Goals:

To provide the Church with the best possible candidates for the ministry of word and sacrament and to help the students progress towards their calling by providing supportive counselling for them and making recommendations to the presbyteries regarding their certification.

Objectives:

- (a) To have the students express and/or display:
 - the motives underlying the decision to be a minister of word and sacrament;
 - faith in and commitment to Jesus Christ;
 - intelligence sufficient for leadership and continuing study;

ability to communicate;

ability to relate to other people;

stability of personality.

- (b) To examine with the students:
 - their lifestyles and the viability of these for ministers;
 - the reality factors that may influence their ministry.
- (c) In the light of the knowledge gained on the above matters:

To recommend to the presbytery that the students be certified or not be certified as candidates of the ministry of word and sacrament.

To work with the students in recognizing their characteristics, abilities and situation in the above areas as either strengths or weaknesses that will enhance or detract from their ministry.

To work with the students to develop a plan for growth to use their strengths and accept, compensate for, or overcome their weaknesses.

(d) To acquaint the students with good models for ministry through the leadership of the conference.

The plan is to reach these objectives through interviews, written exercises, group discussions, and group exercises. Each student has three half-hour interviews with three different counsellors. Each interview focuses on different aspects: One on education, experience and relevant skills, one on leadership potential for ministerial work and one on maturity and call to ministry. The rest of the time will be taken up in group discussion and exercises.

The counsellors meet throughout the conference and on the last afternoon to compare their assessments. Before the students leave, each person has a brief interview to be informed of the general content of the written reports.

After the Conference

After the students leave, the counsellors complete the written reports. The Board of Ministry office then does any minor editing required, has the reports typed and sent to the three counsellors for their signatures. This process takes about a month. Then the report is sent to the student who keeps one copy. If satisfied with the content of the report the student signs the original and returns it to the Board of Ministry. If some of the contents of the report are questioned, the student can negotiate with the counsellors through the Board of Ministry office for the re-wording of the report. The revised report would then be signed by the counsellors and the students. The final option open to the student is to withhold the report from circulation.

The signed original report is kept in the Board of Ministry office. One copy each is sent to the principal of the college to which the student is certified, the ministry convener of the certifying presbytery, and the

follow-up counsellor. These three parties are cautioned that the report is confidential, not to be copied and should be returned to the student when each one's responsibility to him or her has been completed. Upon ordination, the original will be returned to the candidate by the Board of Ministry.

If the student does not sign the report, The Board of Ministry destroys the report. The three parties to whom the report is normally sent would be informed that the student had attended the guidance conference but had not signed the report.

The follow-up counsellor is expected to continue the process begun at the guidance conference and be a source of supportive counselling and guidance during the student's training.

Before the students leave the conference, they give three names listed in order of preference to the Board of Ministry staff. The staff then arranges for a follow-up counsellor from among these three, taking into account such factors as distance and the counselling load of the follow-up counsellors. The student and the follow-up counsellor may meet whenever they wish at the instigation of either but it is recommended that they meet at least two or three times each year. The college and certifying presbytery are given the name of the follow-up counsellor and the counsellor is asked to report annually to the certifying presbytery.

Evaluations

The Board has received evaluations from the students and counsellors attending the conferences. It would be accurate to say that a large majority of students attending the conferences have appreciated the counsellors who have given leadership and the opportunity to reflect on the ministry, and their development as better candidates for this ministry.

Future Plans

By the time of Assembly, two more conferences will have been held, one in April at Knox College for students preparing for the ministry of word and sacrament and the other in May, the first one for students of Ewart College.

Before the Board brings a final report to the General Assembly on the guidance conferences in 1981, they will be giving further consideration to the refinement of report writing, to assistance to follow-up counsellors in their role, to a clearer delineation of the roles and relationship of the guidance conferences and the presbyteries in the process of certification. and to the necessary procedures to ensure that all professional church leaders planning to serve in the Presbyterian Church in Canada have the benefit of this programme.

CONTINUING EDUCATION

Overture 18, 1979, Presbytery of Chatham:

The prayer of the overture is:

'That the present definition of the Board of Ministry on study leave be refined to offer clarity and direction to sessions, boards of managers, institutions, and church workers on the matter of what is understood to constitute a study leave."

In somewhat similar vein, Recommendation No. 1(2) of the Senate of The

Presbyterian College (1979) requested:

"That the Board of Ministry formulate guidelines regarding what constitutes continuing theological education and thus qualifies for a study leave and grant.'

In 1969 the General Assembly established the right of professional church leaders to take study leave and receive an allowance for this purpose. Now after eleven years of experience with the practice of study leaves, it seems appropriate that the church outline its position on study leaves and continuing education in greater detail. The above overture and recommendation both indicate that the church is asking for this. The overture calls for a more comprehensive definition of study leave and some guidance to the various participants in the process. The recommendation asks for guidelines on the broader area of continuing theological education in order to facilitate decisions on study leaves and grants.

Study leave and continuing education are not synonymous terms but since continuing education is supposed to happen during study leaves and since we believe this is the real concern of the overture, as it is of the recommendation, these comments will refer mainly to continuing education in its broad sense

and include the mode and format of the study leave.

At the outset, we must face the difficulty of identifying what should constitute a study leave given the varying educational needs of different people and the fact that there are good and bad examples of any specific educational program or any particular mode of study leave. In the final analysis, each situation needs to be judged on its own merits.

Therefore, it is the intent of this reply to the overture and to Recommendation 1(2) in the report of The Presbyterian College to provide guidelines that will offer clarity and direction to presbyteries who have the ultimate authority

for approving continuing education plans.

Guidelines for Continuing Education

Five areas are covered in the following guidelines: Goals, Content, Quality, Format, Responsibilities:

1. Goals of Continuing Education:

Mark Rouch (Competent Ministry: A Guide to Effective Continuing Edu-

cation) has developed a definition of continuing education.

"Continuing education is an individual's personally designed learning program which begins when basic formal education ends and continues throughout a career and beyond. An unfolding process, it links together personal study and reflection and participation in organized group events."

This definition seems suitable for the professional church leader of the

Presbyterian Church in Canada.

The choice of a course must be based on accurate self-knowledge and an awareness of what study would most advance the person's ministry. Although the individual has the major responsibility for making this decision, the effectiveness of such a decision is enhanced if other people have been consulted. Our church has seen fit to require that presbytery approve any continuing education in order to allow for colleagues to test the validity of an individual's perception.

2. Content of Continuing Education

Six components for a rounded approach to continuing education for professional church leaders in the Presbyterian Church in Canada have been identified by the Board of Ministry.

(a) Biblical/Doctrinal/Historical Theology . . . Growth in the knowledge and communication of the Christian faith and our Presbyterian

heritage.

An example of this component is: Updating and supplementing biblical and theological studies.

(b) Pastoral Theology . . . Growth in dealing with issues that confront a professional church leader in working with people.

Some examples of this component are: Human relationships, sexuality, marriage, communication, dealing with children, handling conflict, role identity, middle age, retirement, sickness, dying and

bereavement.

(c) Skills for Ministry . . . Growth in leadership and functioning in ministry.

Some examples of this component are: Preaching, teaching, counselling, visiting, studying, leading worship, leadership, administration, time management, dealing with change, planning, working in team ministry.

(d) Issues in Church and Society . . . Growth in awareness about the context of ministry and the concerns for ministry in today's world, and

growth in ability to reflect theologically on these issues.

Some examples of this context of ministry and of these issues: A multi-cultural society with differences in language, religion, way of life and values, and located in urban, suburban, rural, inner-city, and frontier areas, faces issues of abortion, prison reform, human rights, racism, world hunger, over-population, peace, nuclear power, energy, employment, inflation and conservation.

(e) Personal and Spiritual Growth . . . Growth in personal and spiritual

maturity.

Some examples of this component are: Prayer, spiritual discipline, devotional exercises and literature, interpersonal relationships.

(f) Career Assessment and Development . . . Growth in planning for and

dealing with the changes within life and career.

Some examples of this component are: First pastorate/appointment, changing parishes/jobs, career crises, call to special ministries, availability of calls/positions, career goals, intentional ministry, retirement, assessment and evaluation of ministry, career centre programs, career development workshops, life work planning.

A course which fits into any of these six categories should qualify for study leave provided it has the potential to enhance an individual's

ministry as seen both by the individual and the presbytery.

Individuals should use this list to evaluate the scope of their plans for continuing education. Presbyteries should use it to ensure that over a period of time individuals are not giving undue emphasis to one component to the detriment of their growth towards wholeness in other areas.

3. The Quality of Continuing Education:

The individual participant should be satisfied that the course being chosen is of high quality and the presbytery should ensure that this is the case before approving a study leave. If the sponsor of the course is accredited through an independent body, e.g., a university or accredited theological college, or is responsible to a recognized higher body, e.g., a denominational institution of learning, this is usually sufficient guarantee of the quality though, of course, not in every case. However, if no such relationship exists, it does not necessarily follow that the course is of poor quality. It does mean that the course should be investigated more carefully to determine if the sponsorship, the instructors, the instructional methodology and the purposes are satisfactory.

The Board of Ministry has developed criteria for evaluating institutions, organizations, or associations that provide continuing education courses, and a list of the institutions the Board has recognized for grant purposes. Copies of these documents have been given to the Presbytery

Ministry Committees or their equivalents.

4. Format of Continuing Education:

Continuing education takes a variety of forms ranging from self-directed study carried out with or without supervision or a course for one day a week spread over an extended period, to studying full-time for one or two weeks or a year. If a choice is possible, the advantages and disadvantages will need to be weighed and the circumstances of the individual and the job considered. It might well be that the availability of a particular course will determine the format.

For any professional church leader who is concerned with growing in his or her ministry, self-directed study will be a familiar format of continuing education and will probably be used on a daily or weekly basis. Self-directed study may have the greatest potential for producing growth as the individual can tailor it to his or her needs, but as a form of study leave, it can also be easily abused. For this reason, if an individual wishes to take a study leave for self-directed study, the presbytery should set its own standards, including such things as: (a) a written proposal outlining the purpose of the study, the resources to be used and the plan of action; (b) a qualified supervisor who endorses the written proposal; (c) a written report summarizing what was learned.

5. Responsibilities of Various Bodies in Continuing Education

Board of Managers — to ensure that an adequate continuing education allowance (an annual minimum of \$200. plus pulpit supply where applicable) is put into the budget and set aside if it is not used, to accumulate (currently up to five years).

Session- to concur with the time chosen for continuing education in the light of the ongoing life of the congregation.

Professional Church Leaders

to identify priority areas of growth;

 to search out courses and choose the one(s) that have the potential for producing growth in a priority area;

to test out plans with trusted colleagues and/or lay people;

to seek session's approval of the time allotment for continuing education. (As a matter of courtesy the session should be informed about the continuing education that is being planned);

to seek presbytery's approval of the proposed continuing education.

Presby tery — To deal with requests for approval of the professional church leaders' plans for continuing education ensuring that it meets the needs of the individual and is of good quality:

 to encourage continuing education of the professional church leaders within its bounds.

Colleges — to promote continuing education among their students and where possible promote and/or provide continuing education programs suitable for the professional church leaders of the church.

 $Board\ of\ Ministry\ -$ to provide grants to supplement the congregational grant for study leave when required:

 to provide assistance to professional church leaders in planning for continuing education and in finding appropriate resources.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 1 A

That the above guidelines on continuing education be the reply to Recommendation 1(2) 1979 of The Presbyterian College, and that the prayer of Overture 18, 1979 be granted in these terms.

B. The Continuing Education Fund

In 1979, twenty-four grants were made, totalling \$8,216. for an average of \$342. Of these:

2 studied at Presbyterian College

2 studied at Ewart College

3 studied at Toronto School of Theology

3 studied at Vancouver School of Theology

6 studied at other Canadian institutions

7 studied in the U.S.A.

1 studied in Scotland.

Participants were made up of twenty ministers, three deaconesses, and one overseas mission worker. Fourteen live in central Canada, five are in the west, three in the east, and two are overseas.

C. Publicity

In the past, the Board of Ministry prepared a list of continuing education courses three times a year and sent them to professional church leaders through the B.C.L. mailing. Because the Anglican Church provided a similar service and to free up some staff time, the Anglican Church Newsletter in Continuing Education was sent on a trial basis to any of our professional church leaders who requested it. This will have to be re-assessed as the requests are running at more than double that anticipated and the cost/benefit ratio must be considered. The Board of Ministry will continue to send out Presbyterian Preview three times a year, a one-page mailing which lists the continuing education events sponsored by the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

SUPPORT FOR PROFESSIONAL CHURCH LEADERS

A. Overture No. 9, 1978, Presbytery of Cape Breton requesting a new benefits package for ministers.

Last year's General Assembly agreed that the very extensive study on the subject in the Board's Report be sent to presbyteries and other Boards for study and reply.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 2 A

In view of the limited number of presbyteries responding after study of the Board of Ministry's proposals arising out of Overture 9, 1978, the time of study be extended for another year during which time the Board of Ministry seek to engage in discussion with the Board of World Mission on the principles involved, and report to the 107th General Assembly.

B. Overture No. 35, 1979, Presbytery of Chatham re Annual Sick Leave.

Last year's General Assembly linked the study of this overture with that of Overture No. 9, 1978 above. The matter of sick leave has extensive ramifications. The Board wishes to obtain information from presbyteries on how they deal with the problem and to consult further with the Presbytery of Chatham.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 3 A

That Overture No. 35, 1979 be studied by the Board of Ministry for another year, and a report be made to the 107th General Assembly.

C. Overture No. 5, 1978, Presbytery of Algoma and North Bay asks that there be six weeks' vacation for ministers to permit a winter break. The Board noted that some interpret the "one-month" vacation to include five Sundays and some stretch that to five weeks, whereas others strictly observe the one-month vacation.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 4 A

That there be a minimum of five weeks of vacation for professional church leaders, including five Sundays, which need not be taken all at one time, and that the prayer of the overture be granted in these terms.

D. Presbytery Oversight of Stipends and Benefits.

The Board notes that some professional church lea

The Board notes that some professional church leaders do not fall into the usual categories for which minimum benefits are established, and that in fact there are congregations that do not abide by some minimums that are established.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 5 A

That presbyteries check annually the stipend and benefits of all professional church leaders within their bounds to see that ministers, deaconesses, and catechists are re-

ceiving at least the minimums set by the General Assembly; and that other lay people working in professional capacities in the church are receiving adequate salary and benefits.

E. Deaconess Benefits

The 1973 General Assembly provided an increase of \$1,200 in stipend in lieu of a housing allowance. The 1976 General Assembly addressing itself to the same problem, revised the rate of stipend increases for deaconesses expressed as a percentage of the increases applying to ministers, from 90% to 95% with an additional 1% annually until 100% is reached. Therefore, the increase for deaconesses in 1980 would be 99% of the ministers' increase.

The Church, of course, recognizes that this approach falls short of providing a housing allowance as enjoyed by ministers, catechists, and students in student charges, in lieu of a manse. This allowance currently stands at \$2,500. per annum. An alternative way of proceeding is offered in the following recommendation:

RECOMMENDATION NO. 6

That effective January 1, 1981, the minimum stipend and increments of deaconesses and male graduates of Ewart College be reduced to 85% of the ministers' minimum stipend and increments, and that a minimum housing allowance equal to the minimum housing allowance a minister receives be added, this additional amount to be implemented over a two-year period.

It is important that this motion not be divided as this could mean a decrease in stipend and benefits for deaconesses.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 7

That the General Assembly approve the principle that pension benefits for deaconesses and male graduates of Ewart College be on the same basis as for ministers, and refer the matter to the Pension Board for implementation.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 8

That active deaconesses be provided with copies of the Acts and Proceedings of the General Assembly each year.

F. Consultation on Future of Ministry

A major International Consultation entitled, Creative Ministry in an Age of Ambiguity, is being held in Toronto October 7-10, 1980 under the sponsorship of the Canadian Council of Churches and the National Council of Churches in the U.S.A. This Board has been involved in the planning of the consultation and will participate along with others in the church. The last such consultation was held in 1966, with a great many spin-offs, such as the organized provision of continuing education for professional leaders, personnel agencies in the churches, church career counselling centres, and Boards of Ministry in most denominations for the support of ministry.

MINISTRY OF WORD AND SACRAMENT

A. Annual Study and Recommendation of Stipend Levels.

The Administrative Council and the Board of World Mission have been collaborating for many years in a very satisfactory way, in bringing recommendations for improvements in ministerial stipends and benefits.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 9

That following the Board's final report to General Assembly on Overture No. 9, 1978, the Board of Ministry not be responsible for recommendations concerning the annual changes in ministerial remuneration, except in its pastoral role in monitoring possible injustices in levels of stipend and benefits.

B. Women in Ministry

A task force was established by the Board in response to Recommendation No. 5 of the Presbyterian College Senate and adopted by last year's General Assembly. It is a Montreal-based task force with Margaret Manson as chairman. The terms of reference given were "to seek to discover ways: (1) to eliminate discrimination against women in the appointment and call procedures where they may exist in our church; and (2) to educate presbyteries, sessions, and congregations regarding the partnership of men and women in ministry."

One of the results of their work, was the following paper:

How Does An Appeal To Liberty Of Conscience Relate To The Ordination Of Women?

In the Basis of Union (1875) of The Presbyterian Church in Canada the subordinate standard of our church is spelled out as the Westminster Confession of Faith. The Larger and Shorter Catechisms are "appointed to be used for the instruction of the people". Immediately after this statement reference is made to "liberty of conscience" in the following terms:

... it being distinctly understood that nothing contained in the aforesaid Confession or Catechisms, regarding the power and duty of the civil magistrate, shall be held to sanction any principles or views inconsistent with full liberty of conscience in matters of religion. (Book of Forms #406, 2).

It is clear that liberty of conscience is specifically related to one issue: the power and duties of the civil magistrate. An appeal, therefore, to "liberty of conscience" when one disagrees with some decision or another of the church cannot be supported from the Basis of Union.

The Ecclesiastical Issue.

The central ecclesiastical issue here would seem to be the nature of a confessional church and the implication of ordination/induction vows regarding the action of the ninety-second General Assembly's establishment of the ordination of women as the Law of the Church (Acts and Proceedings (1966) pp. 47, 52, 78). The second question put to ordinands/inductees is:

Do you accept the subordinate standards of this church, promising to uphold its doctrine under the continual illumination and correction of the Holy Spirit speaking in the Scriptures? (Book of Forms #409).

This question refers back to the preamble which specifies the

. . . subordinate standards are the Westminster Confession of Faith as adopted in 1875 and 1889, the Declaration of Faith concerning Church and Nation of 1954 and such doctrine as the Church, in obedience to Scripture and under the promised guidance of the Holy Spirit, may yet confess in its continuing function of reformulating the faith. (Book of Forms #409, italics supplied).

Dealing with Dissent.

It is clear that the Confessions and legal decisions of the church are to be judged by appeal to Scripture and the corporate mind of the church as it is led by the Holy Spirit. The church must always be open to being corrected in matters of doctrine. This is captured succinctly by the preface to the Scots Confession:

... if any (one) will note in this our Confession any article or sentence repugning to God's holy word, that it would please him/her of his/her gentleness, and for Christian charity's sake, to admonish us of the same in writ, and we of our honour and fidelity do promise unto him/her satisfaction from the mouth of God (that is, from his holy Scriptures), or else reformation of that which he/she shall prove to be amiss. (John Knox's History of the Reformation — W.C. Dickerson, vol. 2, p. 258).

The openness of our church in this regard is encouraged through a dissent procedure in which those who oppose a decision of a court may ask that their dissent be recorded with written reasons to be submitted. The court (or a higher

one) may prepare answers to the reasons of the complaint and if the complaint or appeal be dismissed by the highest court the decision of the original court stands affirmed. (Book of Forms 82-104).

So, in the case of the decision of the ninety-second General Assembly,

twenty-four commissioners registered their dissent for two reasons:

(a) It is contrary to the *doctrine* and *example* of Holy Scripture which is our only rule of faith and practice.

(b) It is contrary to the historic Reformed faith. (Acts and Proceedings [1966], pp. 57f).

The reply to this dissent referred to the Report of the Committee re the Place of Women in the Church (Acts and Proceedings [1965], pp. 384f) and added:

By adoption of this Report and the approval of the recommendation on the ordination of women to the ruling eldership the General Assembly has affirmed its conviction that such action is "in obedience to Jesus Christ who is the Word of God as His Will is made known through the witness of the Holy Scriptures, as the Spirit attests the essential content of that witness to the Truth" on this matter and is in keeping with a true understanding of the faith of our church, reformata et semper reformanda. (Acts and Proceedings [1966], p. 116).

The result is that the law of the Presbyterian Church clearly recognizes the ordination of women equal with that of men. One may extend this further and say that our theology of ministry, has, since 1966, included both women and men in the order of the Ministry of Word and Sacrament. This has become part of the doctrine of our church.

The Nature of a Confessional Church.

Let us return now to what was stated earlier about our being a confessional church. Confessional churches are made up of people who confess certain things and are led by people who further confess additional things. It is the responsibility of sessions to determine if a person's confession when becoming a communicant member conforms to the church's standards as indicated in the Book of Forms [#110 (a)]. It is the responsibility of presbyteries to determine if candidates for ministry accept the confessional position required of ordained ministers, (Book of Forms #211). By extension, when a person is ordained and/or inducted, there is a commitment (or renewal of commitment) to the doctrinal position of The Presbyterian Church in Canada. This does not mean that our confessional heritage should not be interpreted historically, but that an interpretation cannot appeal to liberty of conscience whenever a person disagrees with our declared heritage.

How, then, does any minister or ordinand who disagrees with the ordination of women for any reason deal with the ordination/induction vows calling for acceptance of our church's standards? How, also, does presbytery deal with a minister or ordinand who does not accept the ordination of women? How, further, does a synod or the General Assembly deal with a presbytery or synod

that does not accept the ordination of women?

Infant Baptism as a Parallel.

In order to clarify responsibilities and procedures let us take a different situation. Supposing an individual did not accept the baptism of infants and applied to become a licentiate. Presbytery would decline to licence such a person contending that such a position was contrary to our reformed heritage and our biblical understanding of the family within the covenant. It would be clear that such a person could not be a pastor to a Presbyterian congregation. People who do not accept infant baptism can become members of Presbyterian churches but would not be accepted into the order of ministry and perhaps not even into the order of the eldership because to these orders, through the courts of the church, the oversight of our doctrinal heritage regarding baptism has been entrusted. One cannot have a leader who, because of a different interpretation of Scripture and/or reformed theology, cannot freely administer one of the sacraments according to our tradition.

This is the theory, but would we, in fact, reject a Karl Barth, who would argue on biblical grounds that baptism should only be administered to adults? This is part of our dilemma. How and where do we draw lines? Unless we are prepared to modify our denomination's position on the baptism of infants, even a Karl Barth would have to be rejected if that person's leadership is exercised in such a way that our baptismal tradition is seen to be undermined.

The Ethical Issue of the Call of God to Women.

In some ways the issue of the ordination of women may be an even more crucial one than our church's understanding of infant baptism. We have to do here with the declared conviction of our church that the call of God to ministry is open to those who are women. To stand in the way of such a call is to attempt to prevent those whom God may be calling from receiving his call on the basis of sex, contrary to our declared understanding of Scripture and the reformed tradition. To tolerate such discrimination is to tolerate sexism which is ethically as unacceptable as racism, classism or any other dehumanizing process that treats people according to categories rather than as persons.

Our church cannot make the ordination of women the law of the church and then tolerate a leadership in the order of ministry that opposes such an ordination or one that will not participate in the act of licencing and ordaining women simply because they are women. The liberty of conscience clause in the Basis of Union cannot be used as a way of opting out of such responsibility or of opposing the ordination and/or induction of women anywhere in our church. The liberty of conscience clause is precisely the opposite. It was included in the Basis of Union because our church recognized in 1875 that particular references in the Westminster Confession of Faith to the civil magistrate may no longer be appropriate. Our church has by no means taken a similar position on the ordination of women.

This may not mean that ministers or even ordinands who have difficulty with the decision of the ninety-second General Assembly regarding the ordination of women should be barred from the order of ministry. But such persons, even if they have difficulty, must be willing to uphold the law of our church in this matter. They must be willing to ordain and process calls to women and must emphatically not be permitted to stand in the way of the possibility of God's calling a particular woman to a particular charge in any congregation, college, or national office simply (as noted already) because she is a woman!

Implications from our Presbyterian Polity.

At this point our theology and our polity cannot be separated. If the second ordination/induction question involves us theologically in the issue of the ordination of women (as has been argued above), the third question is also relevant:

Do you accept the government of this church by sessions, presbyteries, synods and general assemblies, and do you promise to share in and submit yourself to all lawful oversight therein, and to follow no divisive course but to seek the peace and unity of Christ among your people and throughout the Holy Catholic Church? (Book of Forms #409, italics supplied).

When the ninety-second General Assembly made the ordination of women the law of our church, presbyteries were bound to abide by this law according to our polity as a Presbyterian Church. The submission of ordinands and ministers to this polity means the acceptance of presbytery as corporate bishop. This means that if there is an action of presbytery regarding the call or ordination of a woman, a presbytery may require presbyters to participate in such a decision and may not tolerate active opposition against the law of our church. A presbytery may censure one of its members for failing to submit to its oversight and may even refuse to licence, ordain, or induct someone who declares an inability to submit to the presbytery on this matter. This is not an issue of power but of order. The individual is not ultimate but has accepted an ordering of his or her life by the church in the belief that God continues to speak through the church and its courts. Of course, this does not mean that all of this should be

conducted in a cold, legalistic manner. There must be understanding, love and patience, but not at the expense of what is just. Such justice requires upholding the law of the church which recognizes that the call of God to ministry is open equally to women and men.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 10 C

That the above paper be commended as a working document.

C. Clergy Supply and Demand,

The number of pulpit vacancies in the first quarter of each of the last ten years is shown below, revealing a remarkable wave over the decade.

1971 - 25 vacancies

1972 - 37 vacancies

1973 - 42 vacancies

1974 - 50 vacancies

1975 – 68 vacancies

Late 1975 - 85 vacancies

1976 - 64 vacancies

1977 - 46 vacancies

1978 - 47 vacancies

1979 - 43 vacancies

1980 - 37 vacancies

The 1980 figure represents a 5% vacancy rate which is close to the minimum rate consistent with reasonable mobility of ministers.

It is estimated, in the light of projected retirements and other departures, and establishment of new congregations, that the church will require from Knox College, The Presbyterian College, The Vancouver School of Theology and from other places through the Board of Education the following supply of ministers:

1980 - 42 new ministers required

1981 – 34 new ministers required

1982 - 31 new ministers required

1983 - 26 new ministers required

1984 - 27 new ministers required

This supply-demand projection is an estimate based on many variable factors.

D. Ministers in Crisis.

A previous committee had been set up by the General Assembly in 1978 "to determine a policy for dealing with professional church workers that experience indicates are unsuited for employment in that capacity". This committee identified three dimensions of the situation which would require policy delineation.

- (a) Managing the assessment and certification of candidates for full-time service in the church up to the point of their registration in our church colleges.
- (b) The early recognition of problems in the relationships and personalities of workers in the active service of the church and the possibility of providing a consultative and therapeutic facility.

(c) The problems in connection with the care of individuals whose effective ministry is in a state of collapse.

At the 1979 General Assembly, these concerns were given over to the Board of Ministry and the previous committee was discharged with thanks.

The Board set up a Ministers-in-Crisis Committee which reported as follows:

Dimension (a) is currently being done through the guidance conferences which the Board of Ministry is conducting. The format of these is continuing to develop.

Dimension (c) is being managed on an ad hoc basis as problems arise, but presbyteries need additional help in caring for individuals whose ministry is in a state of collapse and in caring for the congregations concerned.

Dimension (b) is the subject of a proposal below:

If potential problems can be identified sufficiently early in the career of an individual, the likelihood of a continuing effective ministry is greatly increased and the possibility of injury to a congregation reduced. This committee, therefore, as an initial step in developing policy and practices for this whole matter is preparing a proposal which could identify potential problem areas in an individual's pastoral and personal behaviour which are amenable to modification through counselling and/or therapy.

Summary of a Minister's Responsibility and Accountability.

There should be no doubt in any minister's mind regarding accountability after ordination. The presbytery is the court to which all are accountable and this is very carefully defined during ordination and induction.

Presbyteries are in an ideal position to oversee and assess the activities and behaviour of the ministers within their bounds and may use their own discretion regarding the method used. Presbyteries are enjoined to visit congregations within their bounds periodically. The Board of Congregational Life and the Book of Forms provide guidelines for the conduct of these visitations.

Part of the visitation is a meeting with the minister and several areas of concern are listed for discussion. This discussion, plus other information derived in the course of the visitation provides the basis for a report submitted to Presbytery on the effectiveness of the minister involved and is part of a larger report covering the whole congregation.

It is difficult to determine the objectivity of this method of assessment because a large part of the information is obtained second hand and is not derived from the direct observation of the assessor. More reliance can be placed and more positive action taken on an objective assessment of effectiveness.

This proposal changes the method of appraising the effectiveness of an individual to an objective assessment of results, activities, and behaviour over the assessment period and to be done by a peer group since accountability is to a corporate body rather than to an individual.

The Pastoral Relations Committee would be responsible for ensuring that potential problems identified during the appraisal process are followed up until both the individual and the committee are satisfied.

Future Work of The Committee

While the Board did not approve the details of the proposal, it did, however, authorize the Ministers-in-Crisis Committee to work with three presbyteries of their own selection to test and develop their proposal.

The committee also intends to begin work on assisting presbyteries in "the care of individuals whose effective ministry is in a state of collapse". [Dimension (c) above].

RECOMMENDATION NO. 11 C

That the legislation in the Book of Forms be changed so that the calls to ministers without charges would be transmitted to the presbytery where they are listed on the appendix to the roll, which presbytery, if it sees fit, would put the call in the hands of the minister. (cf. Books of Forms, Sec. 224).

The Board has been informed that there are overtures on this subject, to which the Clerks of Assembly have recommendations to the General Assembly.

SPECIAL MINISTRIES

A. Canadian Forces Chaplaincy Committee

At the present time we have six Permanent-Force chaplains serving in the Armed Services. These are:

Major S.D. Self, C.D. at C.F.B. Kingston; Major L.T. Barclay, C.D. at C.F.B. Winnipeg; Major R.A.B. MacLean, C.D. at C.F.B. Valcartier; Captain W.C. MacLellan at C.F.B. Cornwallis; Captain R.E. Baker at C.F.B. Borden; Captain L.E.M. Clifton at C.F.B. Comox.

Major W.J. Graham and Major P.L. Sams retired last summer and both

returned to serve in civilian pastorates.

Owing to a vacancy occurring this spring for the appointment of a new chaplain your committee has recommended to the Canadian Council of Churches Committee on Chaplaincy and to the Chaplain General's Department, the name of the Rev. George M. Zimmerman, M.Div., as our nominee for this vacancy. Mr. Zimmerman comes to this appointment very well qualified, as he is already a Commissioned Officer in the Reserve Forces of the Armed Services. This will bring our complement of Presbyterian chaplains up to strength and we will not have another vacancy until the spring of 1981.

Besides the regular force chaplains fourteen Presbyterian ministers serve in

the Active Reserves as chaplains.

B. The Institutional Chaplaincies Committee

The Committee met three times during the year. In the interests of economy it will try meeting just twice in 1980. The committee is studying the matter of unordained people such as deaconesses taking Supervised Pastoral Education to qualify for chaplaincy positions. The Canadian Council of Churches is now engaged in a similar study and our representative on the study group is JoAnne Walter.

1979 was a most difficult year for chaplaincy in Correctional Services Canada. The decision was made in 1978 to reduce the number of chaplains in Federal Correctional Institutions by almost 50% as an economy measure. Largely due to the efforts of the Inter-Faith Chaplaincy Committee on which Dr. Goodwill MacDougall is our representative, this was re-considered in 1979. Vacancies are now being filled as they occur. Renewable six-year appointments for these chaplains are now proposed, as well as Church involvement in annual evaluations and in relocating them to other ministries at the end of their terms.

The Ontario government is also re-assessing the role of institutional chaplains in the interests of economy, but the Ontario Provincial Inter-Faith Chaplaincy Committee, on which we are represented by Dr. Robert Armstrong, is

making strong representations to safeguard this important ministry.

The Board of Ministry requested the Worship Committee of BCL to produce a Service of Recognition for chaplains and cognate ministries for presbyteries' use.

C. Specialized Ministries Committee

The following is the report of the special committee appointed by the Board to respond to the motion of the 105th General Assembly (A. & P. 1979, p. 61):

That the Board of Ministry appoint a committee to re-examine the role and place in the Church of specialized ministries, deaconesses, Christian education workers, social workers, outreach and other ministries; and to report to the next Assembly.

The committee has met four times and submits the following conclusions:

 Specialized ministries must be affirmed as valid ministries of Christ. The Presbyterian Church in Canada already recognizes certain special ministries. Yet the model of a pastoral minister in a congregation is so central to the Presbyterian understanding of ministry that specialized ministries have tended to be downgraded. The Church has, of course, recognized the special ministries of professors in theological colleges, administrators serving the various agencies of the General Assembly, and chaplaincies, but it has been historically reluctant to think of specialized ministries in wider terms.

The result of this is that we have emphasized ministry within the congregation or within the denomination, while giving little consideration to ministry for the outsider and the world. Granted that every minister serves the larger community beyond his or her congregation, and granted also the all-important ministry of the laity to the world, nevertheless, as a denom-

ination we have been less than adventurous in reaching out through new forms of specialized ministry to the world outside the Church.

The nature of contemporary society is such that specialized ministries are a most effective way to reach the world. Where people no longer go to church, the church must go to them. This is the meaning of the Great Commission. Again, the ministry of the laity is the primary means of reaching the world. Yet that ministry of the laity can be reinforced by the ordained specialist trained for effective work both within and beyond the precincts of the institutional church. The "worker-priest", the institutional chaplain, the ordained minister in social service, all theologically trained and equipped, can be in the forefront of the church's penetration of human society.

There are recent precedents for ordination to specialized ministries. The Rev. Mary Farmery, upon completion of theological studies, was ordained to be the Director of Armagh. The Rev. John Scott, a medical doctor, after completion of his theological studies, was ordained to be a minister of word and sacrament. He serves as assistant minister in a congregation and as a medical doctor in a hospital palliative care unit.

The very nature of specialized ministries implies diversity. The Church must be open to a variety of specializations and thereby to the call and leading of the Spirit into new ways. Presbyteries ought to be free to consider these new ministries on their merits and make judgements with a view to the talent and commitment of those undertaking them.

If the Church is to affirm specialized ministries, it must have a renewed and enlarged understanding of the ministry of word and sacrament. This committee has been led to the inescapable conclusion that the ministry of word and sacrament has been too narrowly defined within the Presbyterian Church in Canada. Fundamentally, the Church has understood this ministry as that of a "preacher-pastor" in a congregation. While this model will rightly continue to be the normative one in the Church, it cannot be the only model.

We have seen that theological professors, chaplains, and staff of the General Assembly's Boards have been recognized as having a valid ministry. Yet even here the assumption has been that they come to these positions via the pastorate. While recognizing these ministries, the Church has wondered whether in some sense their preaching and sacramental role is dimin-

ished in their new function.

It is necessary for the Church to see that the ministry of word and sacrament can be exercised with integrity and effectiveness in specialized ministries. The ministry of the Word is surely the preaching of the Gospel. But is it not also a ministry of the Word to teach the Gospel? Does not the chaplain, the ordained counsellor, the Christian educator, speak the Gospel and so bear testimony to the Word? And further, it is not a ministry of that same Word to bring healing and social service to the world's need, proclaiming Christ in word and action?

Overseas missionaries provide us with a workable model in which there is institutional provision for variety of function apart from the parochial model. It is recognized that ordained ministers can work as teachers, doctors, administrators, writers, chaplains, translators or in any other task that needs to be done.

Other denominations, particularly the Roman Catholic and Anglican Churches, have long provided a great variety of roles for their ordained clergy.

Rather than the Presbyterian Church in Canada regarding specialized ministries as rare exceptions, the Church should identify areas of need and actively recruit, encourage, train and ordain specialized ministers, even though they may not become parish ministers.

While encouraging specialized ministries, we would urge an intimate relation between specialized ministers and the life and work of specific congregations. As ministers of word and sacrament, they would normally

share in the worship and sacramental life of the congregation. This would involve some kind of association with the parish minister. The congregation would recognize their ministry not only to the congregation, but also from the congregation to the world beyond. Moreover, this would give the congregation a sense of participation in mission beyond its boundaries and opportunity to support prayerfully and financially this ministry of outreach.

- 3. This committee has concluded that the role of Christian education workers and deaconesses should be brought within this enlarged understanding of the ministry of word and sacrament. If we are able to see valid ministries apart from the traditional "preacher-pastor" model, surely a most important specialized ministry is that of Christian education and pastoral service. The Christian educator especially trained would rightly be called a minister of the "Word". The sacramental function could be significant for the pastoral role of visitor, especially to the elderly and those in hospitals and nursing homes. The Presbyterian Church in New Zealand has recognized the validity of the ministry of deaconesses by ordaining them to the ministry of word and sacrament. It is the belief of this committee that the Presbyterian Church in Canada should move in this direction.
- 4. The implications of this proposal for theological education are considerable. There would, of necessity, be a core curriculum which would be required of all prospective ministers regardless of their specialty. Perhaps the last two years of training could concentrate on the intended specialty. Christian education specialists, for example, would concentrate on theory and practice in their field. Training in specialized ministries would be a practical means of the Church's affirming of their validity.

The committee will continue its study for another year.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 12 A

That presbyteries be asked to study this report on specialized ministries and report their comments to the Board of Ministry by December 31, 1980.

THE ROLE OF THE PRESBYTERY AS CONGREGATIONS CHANGE MINISTERS

The Board is planning a conference on this subject in co-operation with Crieff Hills Community, to be held September 24-25, 1980. The purpose of the conference is to bring together a number of interim moderators and other presbytery representatives to share the practices and policies of their presbyteries before, during, and following pulpit vacancies. Out of it will come a recommendation concerning the need for workshops for interim moderators and what the content should be.

GOALS OF THE BOARD OF MINISTRY

The Board at its annual meeting, identified unfulfilled terms of reference given to it by various General Assemblies, and which must be seen as goals for future concern and action. These are in the general areas of:

- A. Interpreting to the Church the doctrine of ministry (including ministries other than that of word and sacrament).
- B. Promoting church practice consistent with the doctrine of ministry.
- C. Advising the Assembly "in all matters pertaining to the ministries of the Church, and to engage in appropriate study and consultation to that end". [A. & P. 1973, p. 449, 3 (a)].
- D. Promoting the welfare and just treatment of deaconesses who have no voice in the courts of the Church to present their own case.
- E. Providing assistance to presbyteries in pastoral care and disciplining of ministers and deaconesses.
- F. Consulting with the colleges and the Board of World Mission concerning the supervision of students on mission fields, as a form of field work for academic credit.
- G. Promoting in the Church imaginative ways of using the gifts of the large number of candidates presenting themselves for full-time service, in a variety of ministries.

STAFFING

A. Minute of Appreciation: Rev. J.C. Cooper

On January 1, 1975, the Rev. John Craig Cooper, known to his colleagues and friends as "Jack", assumed the position of General Secretary of the Board of Ministry. He thus became the first General Secretary of this new Board, established by the 99th General Assembly. It is fitting that Jack Cooper should be thus remembered in The Presbyterian Church in Canada as one who shared in laying the foundations of the Board of Ministry for his career in the church has been characterized in many ways by a pioneering spirit. In the period, 1972 to 1974, he was the Director of Personnel Services. In this capacity, he was responsible for establishing the profile system which has proven to be of immeasurable assistance to interim moderators and to Boards of the Church. The work he accomplished in this area of personnel procedures was easily integrated into the Board of Ministry. In the fourteen years prior to 1972, Jack Cooper was a member of the executive staff of the Board of Missions, first as Assistant Secretary for Home Missions, and for the last nine years of that period, he was National Director of Church Extension. In this capacity, he travelled widely in the church and was well known for his quiet confidence in, and intense commitment to, the front line work of the church militant.

During more than five years as General Secretary of the Board of Ministry, Jack Cooper has been a catalyst in several significant developments in the church's life. He was present for the birth of the guidance conferences for future ministers of Word and Sacrament within The Presbyterian Church in Canada and he has nursed this new project through its formative years. As noted elsewhere, this past year has witnessed the extension of this concept of guidance conferences to include deaconesses. Jack has also encouraged ministers who have been in pastoral work for some time to consider the benefits of career counselling. With this rather new emphasis in clergy counselling, Jack was instrumental in forming the Canadian Career Development Council which is an ecumenical umbrella to encourage and organize career counselling for Canadian clergy. Jack was Chairman of the Canadian Career Development Council in the period, 1972-74. One of the most significant decisions of the 105th General Assembly was the agreement we reached as a church to affiliate with the Vancouver School of Theology. Jack Cooper has spent a good deal of time and energy, both before and since that day in June, 1979, ensuring that this affiliation will become a reality.

Although he has served the church well in executive positions, it must be noted that Jack Cooper has a deep affection for the pastoral ministry. He was himself minister of the Elmvale pastoral charge for five years and is still remembered with affection by those congregations. Jack and his wife Helen have two sons, both of whom answered God's call to ministry and are serving The Presbyterian Church in Canada in pastoral charges — David in Wiarton, Ontario and Glenn in Point Edward, Ontario. Their daughter, Rachel, is the Supervisor of Administration for the Eastern Region of the Victoria and Grey Trust Company, based in Lindsay, Ontario. For his pastorate, these last few years, Jack Cooper has had a congregation of ministers and deaconesses and other professional church workers and to many of them he has been a counsellor, a colleague, a friend.

The prayers and the gratitude of the whole church go with Jack Cooper and his wife Helen as they build a retirement home in Elmvale. Knox College, on behalf of the church, expressed gratitude to Jack in a most tangible way by bestowing upon him the honorary degree, Doctor of Divinity, at the recent Convocation in May. Dr. Cooper, we thank you for your love of people and Christ's Church, we thank you for your courage to undertake new ventures, we are grateful for your gentle spirit and your quiet determination. You are a genuine servant of the Lord!

B. Director of Personnel Services

The Board has a request before the Administrative Council's Executive Personnel Committee for a second executive staff person in the category of assistant secretary, to be known as the Director of Personnel Services. This is the same full-time position that existed before the creation of the Board of Ministry. No additional executive staff was provided when the Board began operations in 1975 with a greatly expanded mandate. Each subsequent General Assembly has added substantially to the work of the Board.

C. Filling the Position of General Secretary

At the time of writing, the Board had not completed its task of seeking a nominee to be recommended for this position to the General Assembly. A supplementary report will be prepared for distribution to commissioners.

REPORT OF THE PENSION BOARD

To the Venerable the 106th General Assembly:

Two meetings of the Pension Board were held, on October 29, 1979, and on March 14th, 1980.

In accordance with the decision of the 99th General Assembly all bequest monies received by the Pension Board are being applied to supplement the pensions of those retired members and widows who receive little or no benefit from the Canada/Quebec Pension Plan. It has been possible to continue such support during 1980. Assistance is given to 93 widows and 31 retired ministers.

An improved Group Insurance Plan came into effect July 1, 1979, providing for disability benefits of \$400 per month and a basic life insurance coverage of \$30,000 (gradually decreasing at ages above 50), with provision for members to be able to purchase additional optional coverage.

As indicated in the Board's report to the 105th General Assembly additional pensions were bought for annuitants during 1979 at a cost of \$1,112,525. Because of this purchase and the large number of retirements in 1979 there were limited funds available for investment.

Representatives of the Board met with Officers of Canada Life to review the handling of the investment portfolio. There have been significant gains in the market value of shares held, and the interest return on fixed income investments is at the highest level for many years.

The Retirement Fund for Church Employees was valued by the Actuary as of December 31, 1977. A small surplus is shown. The Actuary recommended, and the Pension Board agrees, that the members' pension credits earned during the three years (1975-1977) be increased by 20%.

It has been noted that recommendations 8 and 9 of the Board of World Mission, approved by the 104th General Assembly (p. 405, A&P), introduced a definition of minimum stipend as: "basic stipend plus increments along with a free house or apartment, including utilities (heat, electricity, water and sewer services, basic monthly telephone charges)...", to become effective January 1, 1980.

The Constitution of the Pension Plan (adopted 1974 A & P pp. 359-365)

The Constitution of the Pension Plan (adopted 1974 A & P pp. 359-365) defines "Pensionable Income of a Member for any calendar year to be the stipend or salary (up to a maximum (currently \$13,000)) paid to such a Member by an Employer for that year or for that part of a year during which the Member is in Pensionable Service but such stipend or salary shall not include any extra payments or allowances such as travel, house allowances, etc."

Because of the new definition of minimum stipend, the Pension Board would appreciate direction as to whether the definition of Pensionable Income should be changed to read—"such stipend or salary shall include amounts reported as part of income, but shall not include any extra payments or allowances such as travel, house allowances, etc."

The 104th General Assembly adopted the recommendation of a Special Committee (p. 375 1978 A&P) that, "the Pension Board be instructed not to increase the present maximum pensionable earnings of \$13,000 until such time as the minimum stipend, including increments, reaches that level."

Since minimum stipend for many members will now exceed \$13,000, it appears desirable that maximum Pensionable Income be increased.

Two overtures to the 106th General Assembly came to the Pension Board for consideration:

(A) Overture #9, Presbytery of Westminster, relates to divorce and the possible alleviation of the divorced spouse of a member with regard to pension rights. The Board discussed the matter at length and feels that this is a subject beyond its jurisdiction since court rulings as to rights to pension benefits in such cases may vary widely in different parts of the country.
(B) Overture #17, Presbytery of Ottawa re "Retrograde Trend of Ministers"

(B) Overture #17, Presbytery of Ottawa re "Retrograde Trend of Ministers' Pensions". The Board is sympathetic with the intent of the overture since it reflects a similar concern to that expressed by the Board on other occa-

sions relating to the future adequacy of pensions to ministers in the light of continuing inflation.

At its October 1979 meeting the Board decided that commencing in 1980 an annual statement will be sent to members outlining their current status in the Benefit Plans.

The Pension Board wishes to record its appreciation of the services so ably rendered by Miss Jamieson and Mrs. MacDonald, particularly during the past year when there has been an extremely heavy work load.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 1 A

That Group Insurance Plan IX, described in this report, be approved.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 2 A

That the improvement in benefits to members of the Employees' Retirement Plan be approved.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 3 A

That the proposed amendment to the definition of Pensionable Income be approved.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 4 A

That maximum Pensionable Income be increased at least in proportion to the periodic increase in minimum stipend.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 5 A

That the prayer of Overture #9 be not granted.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 6

That Overture #17 from the Presbytery of Ottawa be given favourable consideration.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 7 A

That the applications to receive pension be approved.

ACTUARIAL REPORT

The Retirement Fund for Church Employees

We now report on the first triennial valuation of this plan since it was introduced on 1 January 1975. Our initial report, of 7 November 1977, dealt with the adequacy of the combined 8% contribution rate to support the career-average pension benefit of 1.6% of salary. That study was based on salary data for 53 women and 8 men who had made a full year's contribution during 1975. There were also 55 members who had contributed for less than the full year in 1975.

In 1980 we have been supplied with data for all 108 members of the plan as at the end of 1977. Their total pension credits earned in the three years 1975-1977 inclusive amounted to \$29,140 of annual pension, to start at age 65. Only 13 of the 108 members were male.

We have calculated the contingent liabilities related to these pensions (and possible refunds of contributions) on the following assumptions:

- (a) interest at 6% per annum;
- (b) mortality after retirement (for both sexes) 1971 GAM female rates, at ages one year older than actual ages -:
- (c) pensions payable for life from age 65, guaranteed ten years;
- (d) benefit on death or withdrawal before age 65, the value of the annuity in (c), discounted at 6% interest, or refund of 1975-1977 contributions with 6% interest, if the contributions will be worth more than the value of the annuity.

The market value of the corresponding fund assets at 1 January 1978 was \$177,081, of which \$174,047 was already invested in Canada Life units (as part of its Policy No. P08372). The other \$3,034 was in transit. Canada Life's management charges, and its price for the two annuities bought for two pensioners during the three years, had already been charged to the P08372 account.

Since our actuarial assumptions include several margins of conservatism, it appears that there was an actuarial surplus of at least \$30,000 at 1 January 1978.

Recommendation

We suggest that all the pension credits earned during the three years 1975-1977 be increased by 20%. This bonus would raise the \$146,990 figure by a bit less than 20%, to \$174,030 (since the refunds of contributions would not be increased). About \$800 more would also be required, to raise the \$420.15 annual pension already bought for two pensioners under the new plan by 20%, i.e. by \$84.03 per annum (\$32.07 + \$51.96).

The next triennial valuation should be made as of 31 December 1980. When it has been completed, the Pension Board will then be able to decide what bonus can be granted for the members' service during 1978-1980, and what further bonus, if any, can be granted for service during 1975-1977.

So long as the fund can go on generating bonuses of the order of 20% every three years, it will be mitigating the effects of inflation to some extent.

If high rates of interest continue to depress the market values of the bond and mortgage units at the end of 1980, it will then be logical to use a valuation interest rate greater than 6%, so that the liability for future benefits will also be reduced. Alternatively the bonds and mortgages could justifiably be carried at cost, since on a 6% yield basis they would be worth considerably more than their actual book values. This alternative is harder to carry out, however, because the values of the investment units held by Canada Life are recorded only at their market values.

THE REPORT OF THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH BUILDING CORPORATION TO THE 106TH GENERAL ASSEMBLY

To the Venerable the 106th General Assembly:

The Building Corporation is pleased to report that in June 1979 the following congregations reached that happy event of discharging their mortgages on which debentures were issued in 1960 at 6\%% interest: Hopedale, Oakville, Ont.; St. Andrew's, Humber Heights, Toronto, Ont.; North Park, Toronto, Ont.; Westminster, Guelph, Ont.; and Westminster, Scarborough, Ont.

During the year the Corporation finalized the arrangements to guarantee bank loans for the following: The Synod of Hamilton and London for Kintail Camp; Brant Hills Church, Burlington, Ont.; Centennial Church, Calgary, Alta.; Forbes Church, Grande Prairie, Alta.; and Richmond Hill Church, Richmond Hill, Ont.

Applications were approved to guarantee bank loans for the following congregations: Trinity, London, Ont.; White Oaks, Mississauga, Ont.; New St. James,

Dawson Creek, B.C.; and Forest Glade, Windsor, Ont.

We note with satisfaction that congregations which have borrowed through the Corporation are reducing their loans. Only two congregations were in default of their payments at the end of the year. The Debentures outstanding were reduced by \$184,462, and Guaranteed Bank Loans increased by \$238,056.

We are grateful to the Max Bell Foundation for a grant this year of \$100,000. This Fund is being used by the Corporation to assist congregations to reduce the

amount borrowed from banks.

In our constant concern to assist the congregations which must borrow from the financial institutions we are increasing the percentage of the Interest Assistant Loans to 3% per annum within the provisions of the following:

TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF LOANS MADE TO CONGREGATIONS TO ASSIST IN REDUCING BANK INTEREST ON LOANS GUARANTEED BY THE BUILDING CORPORATION

That where a congregation that has a bank loan approved by The Presbyterian Church Building Corporation and is paying an interest rate in excess of 11% per annum, the Corporation will undertake to assist such congregations by lending it funds on the following terms:

That, depending on the availability of funds, as long as the congregation 1. is not in default on its bank loan, the Corporation will provide a loan of

up to 3% of the outstanding loan balance.

2. That, if the interest rate on the bank loan is less than 14%, the amount of the Corporation loan will be the difference between the 11% and the interest rate charged.

3. That such Corporation loan will be advanced twice annually on dates re-

lated to the Corporation's income.

4. That such Corporation loan will be repaid by the recipient congregation on

terms to be arranged when the bank loan is paid in full.

5. That no interest be charged on such Corporation loan until the bank loan is paid in full provided any extension of the loan is approved by the Corporation.

That such Corporation loan be used only for interest payments. 6.

That the recipient congregation provide proof (letter from bank manager or bank statement) of the outstanding balance of the loan and the interest rate charged before funds are advanced.

8. That the recipient congregation give back to the Corporation a Promissory Note for each advance. If no Promissory Note is given, no further advances

shall be made.

The Executive shall have discretionary powers as to which congregation 9. shall receive this assistance and to what extent.

We are privileged to report that a number of ministers nearing retirement have received helpful advice from the officers of the Corporation and that two houses were purchased this year enabling two of our retired servants and their wives to be settled in comfortable homes following their retirement. We now have five houses rented in our housing program for retired ministers, missionaries, deaconesses and their spouses. Our thanks is expressed to Mrs. William Ewing and the Rev. R. Martin of Vankleek Hill, Ont.; Mrs. Grace Bruner of Brantford, Ont.; Mr. Howard Elliott of Jarvis, Ont.; Mr. R. Campbell and the Rev. D.J. Cooper of Wiarton, Ont.; and Mr. A. H. Dancey of Oshawa, Ont.; whose kind supervision and counsel help us in our housing program.

We record our gratitude to The Charles Johnston Charitable Fund for a gift of \$30,000. this year for the Housing Program and to the Trustees of New St. James Church in London, Ont., who have assured us of financial assistance over a period of years beginning in 1980.

We express our appreciation to Mr. J.D. Finney of Toronto, Ont., whose term as a Director expires this year. Mr. Finney represented the Synod of Manitoba and Northwestern Ontario until he moved to Toronto a few years ago.

The Board of Directors are encouraged to know that the Synod of British Columbia at its last meeting instructed the Executive of the Synod to meet with the Directors of The Presbyterian Extension Fund (B.C.) Limited to evaluate the advantages of becoming part of The Presbyterian Church Building Corporation.

Nominations for Directors:

The by-laws of the Corporation provide that "Directors shall be elected annually by The General Assembly from nominees of the Directors". We therefore submit the following recommendations:

RECOMMENDATION NO. 1 A

That His Honour Judge R.H. Carley, Mr. A.L. Caldwell, Q.C., Dr. M.B. Dymond, M.D., C.M., Mr. D.A. Carman and Mr. T.H. Thomson, B.A. be elected Directors of the Corporation for the next four years.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 2 A

That The Synod of British Columbia be commended for its expressed willingness to consider in a positive way the wishes of the 93rd General Assembly (1967) to transfer the Assets and Liabilities of The Presbyterian Extension Fund (B.C.) Limited to The Presbyterian Church Building Corporation.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 3 A

That The Building Corporation be empowered to encourage congregations and individuals to contribute from capital or other funds in the form of gifts or low interest loans to help finance housing for retired ministers, missionaries, deaconesses and their spouses.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 4 A

That full time servants of our church be urged to consider carefully the advantages of the Registered Retirement Savings Plans and the Registered Home Ownership Savings Plans and take advantage of the programs most suitable to their individual needs in long range planning for their retirement.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 5

That congregations be urged to encourage their ministers and deaconesses to plan for their future retirement and when necessary, give financial assistance to help with their plans.

The 104th General Assembly decided that The Record should eventually become self-supporting. The first step towards this goal was taken in January, 1979 when the present subscription rates were implemented. The second step will complete our objective as effective January, 1981 annual individual subscriptions will be \$6.00; within the Every Home Plan, \$4.00; and students, \$3.00.

Advertising rates will be increased by 12.5 percent on July 1st, 1980.

The Record has eight extra pages since the previous increase and this was accomplished without addition to our small staff which already has a heavy workload. When self-support is established, another staff person will be employed and more pages will be added to give greater coverage to subjects of interest to the readers.

The Record is vital to the ongoing challenge for church growth and an absolute essential means of communication as we seek to "double in the eighties." It is a forum for the exchange of ideas as well as sharing the diverse attitudes over our vast

country.

Our church magazine receives and distributes information that brings church boards, committees, and colleges close to the membership. It creates an intimate relationship between families and congregations throughout Canada and Overseas, as well as to provide relevant knowledge on the work of the Church in the world.

Congregations on the Every Home Plan have a three-fold advantage: it is practical for missionary outreach; a sound financial investment as it reduces subscription costs to each household; and gives a sense of unity within the whole Church.

Presbyteries should appoint a Record Convener to work in close co-operation with a convener in each congregation. By this means information can be distributed concerning subscription and advertising rates. Guidance can also be given on the advantages of submitting articles and photographs of national rather than local interest.

The Record Committee has complete confidence in the professional competence of the Editor and the entire staff as with integrity they seek to serve the various attitudes that find expression in our church publication.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 1 A

That Presbyteries and congregations be urged to appoint Record Conveners, with the responsibility to keep before them essential information about The Record.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 2 A

That the congregations be encouraged to make self-support a reality by involvement in the Every Home Plan and, where practicable, individual subscriptions.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 3 A

That Presbyteries and congregations inquire from the Record Circulation Department how copies can be used in the promotion of their campaigns for church growth.

To the Venerable the 106th General Assembly:

Pres Res and the house for girls at 330-6th Ave. N. "The Mansion", continue to

provide a home away from home for University Students.

The Residence Board is still being faced with the demand to sell, or exchange the property, as the costs of property have risen sharply in the City and in particular in the area of the Residence. The Board, after much deliberation, has decided to give the program three years, during which time it is hoped that a special study will be carried out in respect to such questions as:

Are we in the most practical location?

Can we afford to hold such expensive property?

3. Need for a Residence — it is quite possible that the next three years will display a drastic change in the area of the role of a small residence. The Board would appreciate any feedin re: the role of the Residence in the name of the Church. To date, the evidence swings in favour of retaining Pres Res as an opportunity to make a spiritual witness, and provide visibility in a University City for our Church. It is true that we are providing accommodation for other than Presbyterian students, but our extension charges follow the same plan. (One of our Pres Res students is graduating this year from Presbyterian College, he came to us as a member of the Mennonite denomination).

As a Conference site Pres Res is excellent and the students who stayed at Pres Res for the Conference of the Learned Society, testified to this fact.

The Board is anxious that the Residence reach the status of "self-supporting", but rising taxes and cost of operation seem to prevent us from reaching this goal.

We would hope that more of our congregations in Saskatchewan would encourage their students to take advantage of the opportunity to stay at Pres Res.

THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA THE REV. DAVID MORRISON REID MEMORIAL FUND 1979

To the Venerable the 106th General Assembly:

This fund originated with a bequest from the late Mrs. Agnes Isobel Yuill Reid in memory of her husband, the Rev. David Morrison Reid. The income of the fund is applied to the general work of the Canada Mission section of the Board of World Mission.

The fund consists of 15,365 units of the Church's Consolidated Portfolio which represents an equity of \$15,365 at December 31, 1979.

THE COMMITTEE ON DOUBLING THE MEMBERSHIP

To the Venerable 106th General Assembly:

The work of the Committee on Doubling the Membership, reported here, represents the commitment of a small group of individuals who have enthusiastically pursued a mandate given by the 105th General Assembly. Several factors have made the task even more challenging. The first was the loss of the chairmanship of Dr. Dennis Oliver due to health and workload pressures. Despite being out of the chair, Dr. Oliver has continued to bear a large portion of the workload. Dr. Charles Hay has been lost to the committee for much of its life also due to health restrictions.

The Administrative Council, as well as the Board of Congregational Life, have sought the co-operation of this committee in amalgamating the mandate with that of The Task Force on Church Growth. The proposal before this Assembly represents a considerable amount of work.

AN ACTIONARY MANDATE

Every movement which gives rise to a committee such as this faces the possibility that it be deemed nothing more than a reactionary movement. For the committee, as we have addressed the task, it has become evident that it is much more than simply reactionary — it is an actionary movement.

At the bottom line, there is an intense desire to succeed in the task and perhaps no issue divides the theological community more than the issue of success. The question which must be answered is — "If we fail, who really fails?" At the point at which that question is resolved, two issues vie for priority consideration. They are "What will it take to succeed?" and "What will it cost?"

A THEOLOGICAL BASE

The Committee on Doubling the Membership believes the Lord Jesus Christ is calling the Presbyterian Church in Canada to a ministry of growth and outreach that will result in increasing numbers of unchurched Canadians being led into Christian faith and fellowship. In a calling to numerical growth, Christ also summons us to a renewal of discipleship, worship and every other aspect of our life and calling.

In Scriptural context, doubling means much more than adding names to a list — it is the addition of people to our midst. Under God, quantitative and qualitative growth are inseparable. (Matt 20:19-20; I Cor. 3:1-9; Rev. 3:1-6, 15-33) Precisely because of Jesus' value of the individual, He was concerned that multitudes of persons be reached (Mt. 9:36-38) and also that His followers authentically represent their God-given possibilities and responsibilities (e.g., Mt. 5:13-16). The account of the early Church's growth, under God (Acts 1:8; 4:24; 13:48), illustrates a wholesome growth in worship, witness, understanding, and service, as well as in numbers (e.g. Acts 2:37-47, 16:5).

The most worthy and the ultimate motivation for denominational growth is that God may be glorified as we respond to His calling to bear fruit in every aspect of our Christian vocation (Jn. 15:16). We are cautioned in the Scriptures to take care how we build (see 1 Cor. 3:10-13), and Jesus Himself rejected numerical success when it involved a betrayal of His highest loyalties (Mt. 4:8-10). In this sense we are called to be "faithful, not successful." Yet we would also vigorously affirm that witness, evangelism and church growth are a primary and essential part of any denomination's faithful response to the calling of God. In our increasingly secular and unchurched society, every Church (including the Presbyterian Church in Canada) is under obligation to reach out to those separated from the gospel and to seek to bring them into responsible relationship to Jesus Christ and His Church. As we grow in our faithful response to our divine calling, we are confident that the Presbyterian Church will bring glory to God through the maturing of its present membership the addition of new members, and the promotion of love and justice throughout the world. All these relate to the extension of His Kingdom on earth as in heaven, to the glory of His name (Mt. 6:9-10).

In commending the doubling of our Church as a realistic goal, we note that it relates to our denomination as a whole, and not to every congregation equally. For our denomination to attain this aspiration, many congregations will double, some will grow at an even greater rate, new Presbyterian churches will be established, but not every congregation can be expected to double. This committee has no desire to see doubling became a burdensome legalistic obligation. We view it rather as a joyful aspiration which, under God, can be met . . . echoing the joyful and free response of New Testament church growth (see Luke 15:3-10), (Acts 8:8).

A BOLD PROPOSAL

RECOMMENDATION NO: 1 C

That the 106th General Assembly merge the Joint Task Force on Church Growth and the Special Committee on Doubling in the Eighties in the terms outlined in the report of the Board of Congregational Life. The following amendment, for the purpose of clarity would be proposed by this committee — that IV be amended to read "That the primary mandate of the new committee be church growth with a view to doubling in the eighties. Its specific responsibilities are . . . (then follow the thirteen functions listed in the B.C.L. report).

That the 106th General Assembly approve the following budget in order to enable the work of the merged committee:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE MEMORIAL NO. 1 RE: PLACE OF WOMEN IN THE CHURCH

To the Venerable the 106th General Assembly:

BACKGROUND

At the 105th General Assembly, in Sudbury, Ontario, June 3-8, 1979, a committee was named to study Memorial No. 1 from the Presbytery of Montreal con-

cerning the "Place of Women in the Church". (A. & P. 1979, pp. 466-467)

The committee named by the moderator was to include "two ministers of the Word and Sacrament who are women, and representatives of the Board of Ministry, the Board of World Mission, Knox College Senate, Presbyterian College Senate and others". (A. & P. 1979, p. 26) The Rev. Irene Dickson (Convener), Rev. Helen Goggin and Rev. John Anderson were named as the ministers. Mrs. Criss Moffat and Mr. D. Crawford Smyth were named as elders. (A. & P. 1979, p. 33) At a later sederunt, the Rev. Nancy Cocks was included in the committee, and the Rev. Caroline Lockerbie was added by correspondence. (A. & P. 1979, p. 86) The following were named as representatives: Rev. George Malcolm from the Board of World Mission, Rev. William I. McElwain from the Board of Ministry, Rev. Helen Goggin from the Knox College Senate and Mrs. Lois Klempa from the Presbyterian College Senate.

The Memorial was concerned with the place of women in The Presbyterian Church in Canada who in trying to obey Christ's call to His Ministry "are experiencing discrimination and prejudice at all levels of Church life". (A. & P. 1979, p. 466)

The Memorial asked that the committee undertake:

. Education of the church in the implications of its law and commitment

with regard to the ordination of women;

2.a. Change in the attitudes which cause congregations to be unwilling to consider a woman as their minister; interim-moderators to be unduly influenced by this prejudgment; presbyteries to permit this prejudice; and boards and committees of Assembly to be insensitive to the issue of discrimination against women in ministry.

2.b. Change in the attitudes which cause congregations to be unwilling to consider women as ruling elders, and presbyteries which permit this prejudice

amongst their members:

 Modification of the church's language and terminology, both oral and written, on all church bodies, so as not to be exclusive of women, with particular attention to the Book of Forms, the Book of Common Order, and the Book of Praise.

WORK OF THE COMMITTEE

The committee has met four times. It has heard reports concerning the nature and duty of a memorial committee, the situation in Montreal in the Presbyterian College concerning appointments for women graduates, and the position of the BWM regarding appointments of women. The committee has received material from the Clerk of the Presbytery of Montreal about the discussions in the Presbytery of

Montreal that led to the writing of the Memorial.

Two members of the Memorial No. 1 Committee, Mrs. L. Klempa and Rev. W. McElwain, have served on the task force set up by the Board of Ministry to deal with Recommendation #5 of the Report of the Senate of the Presbyterian College. (A. & P. 1979, p. 273) Since that task force was "to eliminate discrimination against women in the appointment and the call procedure where they may exist in our church and to educate presbyteries, sessions and congregations regarding the partnership of men and women in ministry", it was necessary that there be communication with that committee. Through the task force of the Board of Ministry, the Committee on Memorial No. 1 has received copies of a significant paper written

by the Reverend Arthur van Seters entitled, "How Does an Appeal to Liberty of Conscience Relate to the Ordination of Women."

Other exploration has involved the committee in discussions concerning ways in which congregations might be helped in their acceptance of women as elders and ministers.

The Committee has made inquiries concerning the work of the East Toronto Presbytery Task Force on the Partnership of Men and Women, and has also considered recent developments regarding ordained women in the United Presbyterian Church, U.S.A. and in the United Church of Canada.

The United Presbyterian Church, U.S.A. has been ordaining women as elders since 1930 and as ministers since 1956. A concern developed in the 1970's that there could still be controversy or hesitancy in the calling of women. As a result, after research and study, a five-year programme called "Women in Ministry" was launched in 1977 with a denomination-wide approach to facilitate the placement of clergywomen and to enable church-wide acceptance and support of their ministry. Funding of \$500,000 has been provided and various strategies are presently under way, including the provision of a set of resources, with a basic manual, a film with study guide and several study leaflets.

The Committee on Memorial No. 1 has also examined a report on Project S.W.I.M.-A Study of Women in Ministry, published by a task force of the Ministers Council of the American Baptist Churches. This comprehensive document (over 80 pages) provides insights into some of the problems experienced by women as they meet committees and congregations looking for a minister. The report also examines reasons for the presence or absence of barriers to women in ministry.

Committee Memorial No. 1 has also examined the language used in the Book of Praise (1972), the Book of Common Order and the Book of Forms. It has also studied "The Eldership in Today's Church" (S. Hayes, 1975) and "Guidelines for Filling Pulpit Vacancies." (W.I. McElwain, 1976; revised 1980)

In order to discover the mind of the Church regarding women in ministry, a fact-finding questionnaire was designed primarily using quotations and ideas from Memorial No. 1. (1979)

The questionnaire was mailed to 282 persons in 44 presbyteries through a random sampling using the names of every 7th person. For ministers, the 1st, 8th, 15th, etc. persons named were used. For elders the 2nd, 9th, 16th etc. were used. Exceptions to this choice were made for vacancies and multiple charges.

The questionnaire was mailed to:

120 male ordained ministers (in pastoral charges only)

120 clerks of session

42 ordained women ministers

Replies came from:

50 male ministers

47 clerks of session

21 women ministers

The numerical response was 42 percent. Usually 10 or 12 percent is considered good. The committee is grateful for the number of respondants who completed the questionnaires and wrote additional comments.

ANALYSIS OF THE RESPONSES

The committee will not present the entire questionnaire with all the information gained from responses but will comment on some of the questions and answers in order to present the main emphases.

CONCERNING WOMEN AS RULING ELDERS

It seems obvious to the committee from the responses given that the Church has accepted the ordination of women as ruling elders. Behind the election of women to the position of ruling elders, there has been a positive awareness of the leadership abilities and gifts women have brought to the office. Women have been elected in congregations, not as "token" elders, but as active, competent individuals

whose gifts have been openly recognized by the Church members with whom they have worshipped and worked.

Only three respondents showed opposition to the ordination of women as rul-

ing elders. The reasons given were:

- a. an interpretation of Scripture maintaining that ordination of women to the eldership is contrary to the doctrine and example of Holy Scripture.
- b. a belief that ordination of women is contrary to the historic reformed faith.

Since 86 respondents approved of ordaining women elders, the committee concludes that women as ruling elders are accepted within The Presbyterian Church

and are making a positive contribution to it. (29 persons did not respond)

Ministers and elders requested some kind of educational process in congregations and presbyteries so that women might be better prepared to undertake the responsibility of eldership when invited to do so. For some women, the tradition of the elder as male has been so dominant that they have been unable to participate in the office.

There are congregations that have not yet elected any women as elders. Some of these congregations indicate that they will do so when the occasion arises. The fact that no action has been taken in those congregations over a period of fourteen years points to the need for education in sessions, congregations and presbyteries in order to help people respond to the implications of women as ruling elders.

Such an educational programme would strengthen the church in observance of

its law and commitment regarding the ordination of women as ruling elders.

CONCERNING WOMEN AS ORDAINED MINISTERS OF THE WORD AND SACRAMENT

Positive attitudes concerning women as ordained ministers of Word and Sacrament were expressed in the questionnaire by 77 respondents who were happy about the decision The Presbyterian Church in Canada made in 1966. These respondents commented on the significance of God's call. Their conviction is that if a person is called by God to the ministry of Word and Sacrament, the sex of the individual does not restrict that person from ordination. "If women feel a true call to the ministry, every opportunity should be given them." "God calls both men and women to serve Him".

The committee notes here that the 1966 statement stressed the importance of the call as "the basic theological issue: the call of Jesus Christ to women to bring all of their distinctive gifts into a partnership with men in every relationship of human life and the concomitant call of Christ to men to accept such a giving and to respond to it wholeheartedly". (A. & P. 1965, p. 384) As a result of the decision taken in 1966, the Church has been reaping the benefit of the involvement of women in the ministry of Word and Sacrament for the past fourteen years. Responses also revealed positive attitudes that have come where women ministers have served their churches faithfully for a number of years and have effected change in the attitudes of others by their ability to preach, to visit and to care for people.

There are, however, negative attitudes as well. On the ordination of women to the ordained ministry, 77 were in agreement, 2 were strongly opposed but accepted because the church has agreed, 2 agreed with strong reservations, 2 were opposed, and 2 were uncertain. (33 persons did not respond) Regarding the observation of

positive and negative attitudes to women in ministry -

91 perceived positive attitudes and 22 did not (no response from 5) 65 perceived negative attitudes and 43 did not (no response from 10)

The negative attitudes come from adherence to a church tradition where for years men only have been given the position of ordained minister of Word and Sacrament. Negative attitudes come also from a minority convinced that Scripture does not allow women to be ministers. The dissent is expressed in quotes like these:

"There are still those who find it impossible to accept women as ministers of word and sacrament — some on traditional and cultural grounds — some based on their interpretation of Scripture."

"Only when individuals can be convinced that it is not a violation of Scripture

will the issue be resolved."

The committee states emphatically that the responses by the majority of respondents reveal a deep reluctance to re-opening the question of ordination of women to the ministry of Word and Sacrament. This was not a matter raised in the questionnaire but it was added in comments from the respondents who paid tribute to the contribution of women ministers over the past fourteen years and who called for a process of education in order to help the church regarding the implications of the change initiated by the decision of 1966.

Singled out in the replies was the significant role of the Interim-Moderator in working with a Vacancy Committee and congregation toward calling a new minister. Even before names are considered, a Vacancy Committee could well be encouraged to discuss openly what calling a woman as minister might mean for the charge. Certainly no applicant should be ignored because of sex or marital status. Yet one of the respondents has observed, "We have interim-moderators who would never consider allowing a woman to be a candidate for a vacancy."

The committee commends to congregations and presbyteries the use of "Guidelines for Filling Pulpit Vacancies." (rev. ed.)

A significant work is also being done by sessions. In response to a question as to whether sessions or congregations had discussed "implications of the Church's law and commitment with regard to the ordination of women", 44 responded that they had; 74 however had not. The committee finds the action of 44 congregations to be encouraging. It would urge all sessions to give time to the study of women in ministry.

LANGUAGE USED IN THE CHURCH

The Committee on Memorial No. 1 was also instructed to look at the matter of "modification of the church's language and terminology...so as not to be exclusive of women." (A. & P. 1979, p. 467). In studying this matter the committee has given particular attention to the Book of Forms, the Book of Common Order and the Book of Praise.

The Committee finds that exclusive language continues to be used by the church. For example, general worship services in the Book of Common Order are quite exclusive in the use of such words as "man", "men", "brothers", "sons" and "fathers."

Special liturgies for baptisms, weddings and funerals are more carefully worded, obviously reflecting situations involving both women and men. The committee has discovered that out of 604 hymns in the Book of Praise (1972), approximately 153, or 25%, use language that exclude women. About 17 of the hymns are very exclusive.

In research the committee has discovered that four objections are usually raised when discussion about change in language occurs. Some object that the issue is trivial and unimportant. Some people believe that language doesn't need to be changed because terms like brother, son, man, etc. are generic. Some think that it is too difficult to change language and so are unwilling to make any beginning. They condemn as unethical any change of wording made in the words of a hymn, however minor such a change might be. Others object to change for fear that it might go too far and lead to requests for changes in Biblical texts.

The Committee believes that the issue of language is a significant one for all people. It suggests the use of material in the Resource list with specific reference to Language About God in Liturgy and Scripture. It is interesting to note that change has already begun in some curriculum resources. The Christian Education: Shared Approaches (CE:SA) avoids all language that excludes women. An attempt was made in The Eldership for Today's Church (S. Hayes, 1975) to include both men and women. Unfortunately, a lack of consistency developed very early in the booklet until the pattern of masculine usage of pronouns became dominant.

The committee recognizes the need for an educational process that will assist ministers to be more careful in word choice in worship services, editors and writers to be more precise about use of pronouns in order not to exclude women, and congregations to be more sensitive to women in their midst. Such a process would definitely help to develop positive attitudes to all women in ministry.

CONCLUSION

The committee realizes that the Memorial grew out of a specific situation in the Presbytery of Montreal in connection with women students graduating from the Presbyterian College. The committee believes that the Memorial has now served its purpose by drawing the attention of the whole church to the issues raised concerning women in ministry. The recommendations, if approved, will carry on the process of education begun by this Memorial.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 4 A

That Presbyteries and congregations begin as soon as possible a study of Women in Ministry using some of the resource material listed in the report.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 5 A

That the Board of Ministry be asked to publish educational material on Women in Ministry, including questions for study sessions, an annotated bibliography and a list of audio-visual resources helpful for Presbytery and congregational study, and that the Administrative Council be asked to provide money for publication costs.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 6 A

That the Board of Ministry be instructed to exercise a continuing concern for women in ministry.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 7 C

That all revisions made by The Presbyterian Church in Canada (Book of Common Order, the Book of Forms, the Book of Praise and others) and all current and new publications use language inclusive of both sexes and be carefully edited to that end.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 8 A

That the report of the committee and its recommendations be the answer of General Assembly to Memorial No. 1 of the Presbytery of Montreal, 1979.

The Executive met for regular meetings during the year.

The Council Executive of the Women's Missionary Society, W.D. respectfully submits the following report of the Society's work for the year 1979.

During 1979 the Society provided staff and resource materials related to "edu-

cation for mission".

Three new staff members were appointed to the Area Educational Consultant Staff one to British Columbia, one to Saskatchewan and a third to Northern Ontario. Miss Lois Powrie was appointed to the position of Children's and Teenage Work Secretary after serving on the Educational Consultant staff for a number of years.

The Area Educational Consultants have given leadership and support to Synodicals and Presybterials in planning and carrying out events. They also served the Board of Congregational Life as they continued to introduce curriculum material and help train leaders and teachers in local congregations. The staff have given time to promoting the emphasis of "Mission in the 80's" through presentations and preparation of materials.

RESOURCE MATERIALS

Resource materials were prepared and/or recommended for use of Adult, Youth and Children's groups related to the Human Rights theme and work begun on the upcoming India/Nepal theme.

The Glad Tidings kept readers informed about the work in which churches are involved in various parts of the world as well as including articles related to the Human Rights material. We experimented this year with having the adult study

material in one issue of the magazine - the August-September issue.

The Society is represented on the Joint Task Force on Mission Education Services along with the Board of Congregational Life and the Board of World Mission and support the recommendation being brought to this Assembly regarding the mission study themes for the year 1982-83 by the Board of World Mission.

The Society continued to cooperate with the Board of Congregational Life and the Board of World Mission. Area Educational Consultants represented the Board of Congregational Life in their areas, the national staff are associate staff of the Board of Congregational Life and two representatives of Council Executive serve on the Board of Congregational Life. A contribution was made toward the travel of Educational Consultants by the BCL.

In 1979 the Society contributed \$385,000 to the Board of World Mission and appointed 8 women to serve on the Board of World Mission and its various committees. Both of these boards have representatives on the Council, Council Executive,

and the Education Committee of the Society.

Deputation was arranged by the Executive Secretary in cooperation with the Board of World Mission including special sessions arranged for Miss Dawn Ross in British Columbia.

The Annual Council Meeting was held in May while Council Executive met

only 5 times this year in an experiment to include wider representation from the

Western Synodicals on the Executive.

Salaries were reviewed and salaries of Educational Consultants raised in accordance with General Assembly's action on stipends of deaconesses and proportionate increases were given to other staff members. The Executive sent Miss Nutt to Nigeria with a delegation from the Church to represent the Society at the celebration of 25 years of Mission Association with the Presbyterian Church of Nigeria.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF WORLD MISSION

To the Venerable the 106th General Assembly:

Eight Years Perspective

The Board of World Mission came into being following the 97th General Assembly, A & P June 6, 1971, p. 640-645 as a result the amalgamation of mission work of the General Board of Missions and the Women's Missionary Societies took place. A plan of organization for the Board was presented to the 98th General Assembly (1971) and adopted.

Introduction:

This proposal is based on the following considerations:

 The challenge of mission in today's world, in terms that are authentic to the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

2) The size of The Presbyterian Church in Canada, the geography, the numbers and potential growth.

and potential growth

3) The need for flexibility – provision for adaptability in the structure.

- 4) The need to make available the necessary resources, leadership and services for Mission Outreach, within General Assembly, Synods, Presbyteries, Congregations and other agencies of the Church and World.
- The need to develop an integrated system for mission responsibility throughout the Church.

6) The need to establish clear and direct lines of communication.

7) The need for identifying the accountability of committees and personnel, for the successful operation both of the whole structure and the designated areas. The Comprehensive Plan of the Board of World Mission:

Purpose:

The purpose of the Board of World Mission is to give leadership to the whole Church in all its structures for mission responsibility and vision, and, as authorized by the General Assembly, to plan and administer specific mission work throughout the world.

IIFunctions:

The Board shall study and recommend to the Church concerning needs and 1) opportunities in mission.

2) It shall develop plans and requirements for funds and personnel for the work of

the Board.

It shall administer funds made available to the Board by the General Assembly, 3) allocating these for specific purposes, in accordance with priorities established by the Board.

It shall provide a unified and effective administrative system for carrying out the stated purposes of the Board.

It shall appoint personnel to carry out the work approved by the Board, and shall support and give appropriate oversight to all such personnel.

It shall keep its work under constant review.

The Plan was amended by the addition of the Church and University Committee and an Executive Staff, Rev. Ron Mulchey in 1973 from the Christian Education Committee (Board of Congregational Life). Dr. A.G. MacDougall was appointed with the resignation of Mr. Mulchey. On the resignation of Dr. Howard Doig in December 1975, the work of the Secretary for Finance was handled by the General Secretary and an Administrative Assistant.

In 1977 Dr. E.H. Johnson resigned and a portion of the Finance was added to the work of the Secretary for Research and Planning. In 1978 Rev. R.M. Ransom,

Secretary for Mission Education resigned.

Miss Pat Hanna, Overseas Students and Laymen Abroad resigned to take full time theological studies. Overseas Students was assigned to Dr. MacDougall, and Laymen Abroad was added to Mission Education, Mr. Davis.

Superintendents of Missions

An addition to the original group of seven Superintendents was the Superintendent of Missions for Saskatchewan and Dr. D.T. Evans was appointed in 1975 but had to resign for health reasons in 1979.

Changes of Staff: Rev. C. Doka moved from Alberta to British Columbia Synod; Dr. A. Morrison resigned and Rev. W.J.O. Isaac was appointed to the Synod of the Atlantic Provinces; Rev. George Johnston was appointed to the Synod of Alberta. The Rev. John A. Neilson has been appointed as Superintendent of Missions for the Synod of Saskatchewan.

Some significant facts

The Board of World Mission itself has been reduced from 44 members to 38 members by a recent General Assembly, and is presently consisting of 27 members appointed by General Assembly and the 8 Synod Missions Conveners, Ex-officio: the President of the WMS (WD), the Treasurer of the Church and the Moderator of the General Assembly.

The Chairmen have been Rev. G. Malcolm (1971-72); Rev. L.L. de Groot (1972-73); Rev. J. Crabb (1973-75); Mrs. W.E. McCutcheon (1975-78); and Rev.

J.J.H. Morris (1978 to the present).

Overseas

Numbers of overseas personnel:

In the past year withdrawal from the work mainly for retirement or poor health has reduced the number of overseas personnel. In 1972 there were: one couple in the Caribbean (Theological College Jamaica); India, two couples and 11 single ladies; Japan, 3 couples and 2 single ladies; Nigeria, 3 couples, one single lady, one single minister; Malawi, one couple; Taiwan, 7 couples, 6 single ladies. In the years from 1972 to the present, we have had personnel in Nepal (3/5) Malawi (2/4) and Afghanistan (1) and short term workers in Crete, Japan and Jamaica.

The present staff will be listed in other places of the report.

Advance

The most significant advance made is the responsibilities taken on by the Overseas Churches for the work in their own country. The change from Mission to Church responsibility has been completed, and both in terms of personnel and finance, our Presbyterian Church in Canada share has decreased. Finances have been decreased not so much by the actual dollar but by inflation of our dollar. The increased support for the mission by work of the Overseas Church is a great step forward in responsibility and sharing for our Sister Churches Overseas.

The programme of Overseas Visitors for the past six years has been helpful in seeing Partnership in Mission as a two way street. When the Overseas Churches pay all or part of the visitors' air fare, it is another step in mutual partnership. The variety of overseas work has continued but the work of ordained ministers is significantly lower and it is almost impossible to gain entry into India, Nepal and Afghan-

istan for ordained ministers.

Careful and prayerful evaluations are needed in each of the traditional areas and new areas of endeavour. Recognition of the "Chinese Christian" and a carefully planned approach is needed and will make us a credible Church in the eyes of Chinese Christians.

Canada 1972 - 1980

One of the biggest steps forward in terms of Canada is the inauguration of the "10 Year Fiscal Guidelines for Aid-Receiving Charges". The wonderful way in which the aid-receiving congregations have increased the amount of support for ministry is a most encouraging sign. Forty-one congregations have become self-supporting, and only 2 have been unable to keep self support as stipends and allowances have been increased.

This has meant that the Administrative Council and the Board of World Mission could request, and General Assembly approve, higher stipends and allowances for all professional workers. The Church has been able to open three new congregations each year, the necessary funds being available.

Ukrainian congregations have been closed in Hamilton and Toronto Presbyteries, and a non-congregational work continued in Toronto. An Italian congregation was closed by Hamilton Presbytery. A few Anglo Saxon congregations were closed as well as Verdun Day Care Centre in Montreal and Prince Albert Fellowship Centre, Saskatchewan.

New Beginnings

5 Korean congregations were established, mostly self supporting. A Taiwanese congregation was established in Toronto. Community House in Ottawa and Anishinabe Centre for Native People in Winnipeg were opened.

39 congregations became self supporting and so far remain self supporting.

Many of the Hungarian congregations have moved from aid receiving to self supporting.

A careful reading of the General Assembly Acts & Proceedings from 1972 to 1980 will reflect other changes in areas of mission.

Overseas Scholarships

The Leadership Development has not been increased in numbers of overseas students but the costs have increased very much in the past eight years. Some important leaders of the Overseas Churches have received training through our Overseas Scholarship programme.

Mission Education

The work of Mission Education is increasingly important as education for mission becomes part of the needs of our Canadian churches. Literature, Visual Aids, Deputation, Overseas Visitors are part of this valuable effort of the BWM, and an important part of increasing Stewardship and Mission awareness in our congregations.

The "Calendar" is an important education tool as well as good public relations

for The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

Notes

The Board of World Mission has requested the Presbyterian Church Building Corporation to study the practice and desirability of congregations raising funds for building purposes by selling debentures to their own members and friends.

A new relationship has been established through the Board of Congregational Life with the National Advisory Council for Youth Ministry, and ways of implementing a closer working friendship are under review. It is hoped that a second young person could come to the Board of World Mission meetings and become the official delegate the next year to ensure some continuity with National Advisory Council.

The Presbyterian Church in Canada will be helped as our relationship with the Presbyterian Church of Korea develops. The Presbyterian Church of Korea is a dynamic fast growing Church which has developed leadership in stewardship,

evangelism and mission in society.

In 1979 the Second Century Advance for Christ Allocations Committee of Administrative Council has allocated \$100,000 for Canada Mission Projects and \$100,000 for Overseas Mission Capital Projects, both including new sites, assistance to new church buildings and special ministries, as well as \$10,000 in Canada to the Double the Membership in the 80's General Assembly Committee.

Significant Events

 Twenty-nine Graduating Theological Students have been appointed by the Board of World Mission, fifteen were to self supporting charges. There were three appointments to work with Native People and one appointment for Overseas work. Some Board of World Mission vacancies still exist.

- Fifty-six Summer Students have been appointed by the Board of World Mission

for 1980.

Eight aid-receiving congregations who achieved self support were: Presbytery
of Saint John, West Riverview, Bethel; Presbytery of Montreal, Kydd Memorial; Presbytery of Ottawa, Parkwood; Presbytery of Brampton, Erin; Presbytery
of Algoma/North Bay, Burk's Falls; Presbytery of London, Chalmers and Ilderton; Presbytery of Edmonton, Braeside.

In June, the Clerk of the Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Nigeria, the Rev. M.B. Ogarekpe and in October, six delegates — the Moderator, Rt. Rev. A.A. and Mrs. Otu, Dr. A. Ibiam, Miss A.E. Oku, Elders B.E. Nkama and U.I. Onwuka, visited our Churches in many parts of Canada for the celebration of 25

years of Mission Service by our Church in Nigeria.

In November, our Moderator, Dr. K.G. and Mrs. McMillan, Board of World Mission Chairman, Rev. J.J.H. Morris, Women's Missionary Society Executive Secretary, Miss May Nutt, Rev. E.F. Roberts and Rev. C.R. Talbot visited across Nigeria as part of that celebration and were warmly received. The continuing financial and mission interest of the Woman's Missionary Society E.D. and the Women's Missionary Society W.D. is appreciated.

The limited Board of World Mission funds for loans have enabled smaller congregations to repair their buildings including energy saving insulation. The interest rate has been standardized and will be charged on a compounded basis.

New congregations beginning in 1980: Orleans, Ottawa, Ontario; South Guelph,

Ontario; Terrace, B.C.

The Annual Reports indicate a deepening involvement in Bible Study and in

Church Growth concerns.

The Board lost two valuable members during the year through death: Miss A. Condon, representative from the Woman's Missionary Society, E.D. and Mrs. J. Burnett, representative from the Women's Missionary Society, W.D.

The Rev. Silas Ncozana, deputy clerk of the Synod of Blantyre, Malawi, spent

six months on a study-deputation programme.

The Board has endorsed the goal of the Canadian Council of Churches to assist member Churches in Canada to deal with the racial, ethnic and cultural diversity factors in the Church.

Concern and prayer is needed for the workers among Native People.

Dr. and Mrs. D.V. Wade are spending sabbatical leave in Taiwan, where Dr. Wade is teaching at Tunghai University, Taichung, Taiwan Theological College

in Taipei and Tainan Theological College in Tainan.

Special Ministries personnel who have terminated service: Mrs. R. Mercer for 15 years the Hospital Visitor in Vancouver, B.C.; Mr. Edward Bunn for 7 years Catechist at Birdtail-Pipestone Indian Reserve, Manitoba; Miss Fanny Tse for 10 years with the Chinese Church in Victoria, B.C.; Mrs. B. Hallgren (nee Annie Wilson) 31 years in the Chinese Church, Vancouver, B.C.; and Superintendent of Missions, Dr. D.T. Evans (ill health).

It was directed that the longer range goals were to be reviewed.

The next years ahead must be met with enthusiasm and zeal for the Advance of Christ's Kingdom on earth.

RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE 106th GENERAL ASSEMBLY

INCREASE IN BASIC STIPEND

The Administrative Council instructed that a 7% increase be built into Budget presentations for all church workers. The Board of World Mission has included the estimates into the 1981 Budget. Ordained Ministers would have an increase of \$700 (\$9,900 to \$10,600) in basic stipend. The proportionate increase for other church workers based on established percentages would be: Deaconesses (99%) \$693 (\$9,450 to \$10,143); Women Missionaries (80%) \$560 (\$8,000 to \$8,560); Catechists and Lay Missionaries (80%) \$560 (\$8,250 to \$8,810); Lay Directors of Institutions and Retired Ministers (100%) \$700 (\$9,900 to \$10,600); Superintendents of Missions (110%) \$770 (\$13,050 to \$13,820); Summer Students \$7 per week, \$100 plus room and board and utilities per week.

Overseas personnel are increased according to established policy, Married Couples at the Ordained Minister's rate and Single Missionaries at the Deaconess'

rate.

RECOMMENDATION 1 C

That an increase in the basic stipend of \$700 (\$9,900 to \$10,600 for Ordained Ministers) and a proportionate increase for other church workers (Deaconesses, Women Missionaries, Catechists, Lay Missionaries, Lay Directors of Institutions, Retired Ministers, Married Students, Summer Students and Superintendents of Missions) be made effective January 1, 1981.

INCREASE IN INCREMENTS

The increment scale was established April 1, 1968 at \$1400 and adjustment made to \$1700. The Board of Ministry, in its study of stipends and allowances, noted that the incremental scale had not been kept in line with other stipend in-

creases. The Board of World Mission proposes a two year schedule to bring the total increments to \$3000.

On the instruction of the Administrative Council re Zero based Budget, 7% of the \$1700 which is \$119 has been included in the 1981 Budget. The balance of \$491 for 1981 must come from the Congregations or the General Assembly Budget funds. \$35,000 additional would be needed over what is in the 1981 Estimates and the amount anticipated could be paid by aid-receiving congregations.

RECOMMENDATION 2 A

That the increment scale for Ordained Ministers for the first six years of service be increased to \$300 per year effective January 1, 1981 and a proportionate increase for other Church workers according to the 1978 Approved Schedule.

RECOMMENDATION 3 A

That the increment scale for Ordained Ministers for the seven to ten years period of service be increased to \$300 per year effective January 1, 1982 and a proportionate increase for other Church workers according to the 1978 Approved Schedule.

HOUSING ALLOWANCE

The housing allowance for Church personnel was last increased by the General Assembly in June 1974 to \$2500. This matter has been under review for the past three years. The instruction under Zero based Budgetting was to increase "housing allowance" by 8%. This means that \$200 is already included in the 1981 Budget. At present there are 21 persons including 3 Superintendents of Missions on a housing allowance. There may be some self supporting charges affected by an increase in housing allowance. A part of the estimated cost could be met by aid-receiving congregations and the \$6300 additional funds needed could be met by the Board of World Mission.

RECOMMENDATION 4 A

That the maximum housing allowance be increased from \$2500 per year to \$3600 per year effective January 1, 1981 and that the housing allowance be reviewed again in 1981 for possible further upgrading in 1982.

CAPITAL EXPENDITURES 1981

The Board of World Mission has very limited Capital resources for the purchase of new church sites, new manses, Overseas capital projects. This past year the Board of World Mission is grateful for the funds released by the Administrative Council from Second Century Advance for Christ for this purpose.

RECOMMENDATION 5 A

That authorized expenditures may be increased in 1981, in consultation with the Administrative Council, with regard to the availability of money from the Second Century Advance for Christ, that for missions in Canada and Overseas, up to \$100,000 for Canada and \$50,000 for Overseas for Capital needs (manses, church sites, overseas capital projects, etc.) to the extent that additional funds are available, including bequest monies, at the end of the year.

GIFTS OF NEW CHURCH SITES

The Board of World Mission has endeavoured to assist new congregations by providing the church site at no cost. There have been several gifts of land for new church sites by individuals and Presbyteries. With the increasing cost of land and the lack of capital funds the Board of World Mission recommends as follows:

RECOMMENDATION 6 A

That, in view of problems encountered by the Board of World Mission in providing funds for church sites, Presbyteries, congregations and individuals be encouraged to make gifts of such sites to Church Extension congregations.

RECOMMENDATION 7 A

That a study of ways and means be made to encourage individual congregations holding substantial reserve funds, and other congregations who may receive same, to assist new congregations by loans or grants made directly, or through the lending agencies of the Church, or by otherwise making these funds available either at interest-free or at preferred rates.

ADDITIONAL MEMBERSHIP ON THE BOARD OF WORLD MISSION

The Board of World Mission has tried to adjust to the reduction of membership on the Board. The Board of World Mission feels that the membership should be increased so that Board members are not obliged to serve on several Board committees and that adequate Board representation may be on its committees along with non Board members. Several committees have only one Board member serving.

RECOMMENDATION 8 A

That an additional six members from the Central Synods be added to ensure a fairer sharing of the work of the Board through its committees.

GUIDELINES RE RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA AND THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH OF KOREA

Preamble:

Over the years there have existed informal relations between our two churches, starting many years ago when there were Canadian Presbyterian missionaries working in Korea. In recent years we have again been drawn together as a result of Korean immigration to Canada, through the Korean Christian Church in Japan to whom we both relate for mission in Japan, through encouragement from sister churches in Asia and North America, and by PCC missionaries working with KCCJ who go to Korea for language study and orientation.

The PCC recognizes that through this formal statement of guidelines it is establishing relations with a dynamic, fast growing Church which has developed leadership in stewardship and evangelism and is concerned for the church's mission in society; and looks forward to the inspiration and guidance the PCK can give to them.

The Presbyterian Church of Korea recognizes that through this partnership with The Presbyterian Church in Canada it is establishing a relationship with a denomination having strong commitment to overseas mission, to church growth at home, and to a long range view of the mission of the church, and looks forward to develop together new horizons of mission which realistically fulfill the task of God's church today.

Guidelines:

1. It is with thanksgiving to God that we acknowledge the bonds of fellowship which Christians have with each other through our Lord Jesus Christ and recognize that The Presbyterian Church in Canada (PCC) and the Presbyterian Church of Korea (PCK) share a mutual responsibility in Christ's mission.

We jointly affirm our readiness to work together in mission in Canada, Korea and elsewhere where God may lead, and to this end we formally recognize the

relationship between our two churches.

3. We recognize that each partner has understanding and insights which when shared with the other could lead to more effective mission, and to this end encourage consultations and visits between Staff and officers of our two churches.

4. The PCC and PCK indicate willingness to respond to requests from the other

for sharing resources of people and money.

5. In addition to those things that we already do together, we see the possibility of (1) exchanges of visitors, (2) personnel with specific expertise for short term assignment, and (3) long term personnel. It is, however, not envisioned that there will be a major undertaking in mission on the part of either partner in terms of finance and/or personnel in the other country.

6. The PCC and the PCK accept the responsibility for the finances required to carry out their ongoing pastoral and outreach programmes. Where either feels financial assistance is desirable to fulfill these responsibilities, they may present requests to the other with supporting documentation. It is understood that funds will be used for the purpose for which they are requested and given, unless a change has been agreed upon by both Churches. In receiving grants the requesting church accepts responsibility for the administration of all financial assistance provided and agrees to provide to the other church audited financial

statements at the end of each financial year.

- 7. When either PCC or PCK requests personnel from the other, the sending church will recruit and screen candidates and offer them to the requesting church who will, if they find the candidates suitable, appoint each to a specific work, provide care for the missionary (and family) and assist their integration into the life of the community. On first arrival in the overseas country the missionary shall become a member of the receiving church and be subject to the discipline of that church; such discipline shall not be greater than that of depriving the missionary of membership in the receiving church, in which case the receiving church shall request the sending church to terminate the appointment. Further, it is understood and agreed that all of the above mentioned responsibilities will be carried out by the receiving Church.
- 8. In order to develop better understanding and prayer support between our two Churches, we agree to the regular exchange of information about the life and mission of our Churches and to share information received throughout our

Churches.

 Both Churches recognize the importance of professional development for church workers which will enable them to render more adequate leadership and service, and agree to work together in planning and implementing professional development programmes.

10. The PCC and the PCK do not view their relationship together as exclusive and

encourage relationships with other churches in each other's country.

11. It is understood and agreed by both Churches that either partner may withdraw from this relationship at any time after thorough discussion with the other partner.

12. This statement of guidelines is not intended to limit the relationship between the PCC and the PCK, but to give a formal basis to what is hoped will be a growing relationship between our two Churches.

RECOMMENDATION 9 A

That the above guidelines re the relationship between The Presbyterian Church in Canada and the Presbyterian Church of Korea be approved.

OVERTURE No. 9 (1979) HALIFAX-LUNENBURG RE PLACING NAMES OF UNITED CHURCH MINISTERS ON CONSTITUENT ROLL

This matter has been discussed with officials of the United Church at Presbytery and National levels. A tentative agreement follows for information:

TENTATIVE AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE	_PRESBYTERY OF
THE UNITED CHURCH OF CANADA AND THE PRESBYT	ERY OF HALIFAX
AND LUNENBURG OF THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN (CANADA

That we may further the glory of God and the enhancement of His Kingdom; that we may further proclaim our loyalty to the Lord Jesus Christ as King and Head of His Church:

We, the ______Presbytery of The United Church of Canada, and the Presbytery of Halifax and Lunenburg of The Presbyterian Church in Canada, do hereby re-affirm our faith in the co-operative work at present being conducted within our bounds. In witness whereof, we set forth the following understanding of the nature of this co-operative venture, praying that this shall speed the work, both within our own bounds, and beyond:

- 1. Steering Committee In each co-operative charge, there shall be a steering committee which shall determine any necessary local arrangements and control. This committee shall consist of an equal number of persons from each of the co-operating congregations. The Minister in charge will be the chairman of this committee, assisted by a Minister appointed by the presbytery of the other denomination. This committee shall meet at least once a year to consider local concerns.
- 2. Proportional payments The pastoral charges shall pay for the support of the ministry in proportion to the number of communicants in each constituency. This proportion shall be reviewed from time to time, and always during a vacancy. The cost of ministry is understood to include stipend, travel, and all other allowances recognized by the denomination to which the Minister belongs, congregational pension contributions, unemployment insurance, etc., as well as support for the Manse, or proportional share of a housing allowance.
- 3. Local arrangements Each congregation shall maintain separate communion rolls and other Church registers, and will maintain its own local property. Scheduling or worship service shall be established by mutual consent.
- 4. Residence The Minister appointed, in consultation with the two presbyteries, shall have choice of available manses within the co-operating charges as his place of residence.
- 5. Authority of the Minister The Minister appointed to the co-operating charges shall have authority recognized in all congregations. He shall be authorized by the other denomination to conduct baptisms and confirmations, to celebrate The Lord's Supper, all according to the forms of the particular denomination, and to preside at meetings of the Session. The Minister will be responsible to the United Church presbytery in those matters pertaining to United Church congregations, and to the Presbytery of Halifax and Lunenburg in those matters pertaining to the Presbyterian congregations. A Presbyterian incumbent in such co-operating charges may sit as a full member of the United Church presbytery. A United Church incumbent will be invited to sit and correspond at all meetings of the Presbyterian Presbytery and to take part in the life and work of the Court through sharing in committees, etc.
- 6. Consultation When a co-operating charge becomes vacant, both presbyteries and the congregations involved shall meet to consider the steps

to be taken to fill the vacancy, and shall erect a pastoral relations committee representative of all co-operating congregations to effect a settlement.

- 7. Alternating Ministry Where at all possible, it is desirable that charges involved in such co-operative arrangements recognize the principle of alternating ministry; i.e., when a charge becomes vacant, the denomination which has not been represented directly in the ministry shall have first opportunity to fill the vacancy, if a candidate acceptable to the pastoral relations committee can be found for recommendation to the congregations.
- 8. Induction The induction of a Minister to a co-operative charge shall be a shared responsibility of the two participating presbyteries.
- 9. Guidelines We recognize that the principles stated here are intended as guidelines. Notwithstanding the above, in the event of local situations not covered by these guidelines, the steering committee is empowered, in consultation with the two presbyteries, to take whatever action may be needed.

RECOMMENDATION 10 (

That the time is not appropriate for an affirmative answer to Overture No. 9 but that an enabling authority to permit these co-operative charges to work effectively should be drafted by the Clerks of the Assembly for the 1980 General Assembly meeting.

MISSION STUDY THEMES

Through the Joint Task Force on Mission Education, composed of representatives of the Women's Missionary Society, W.D., the Board of Congregational Life, and the Board of World Mission, our Church participates in the mission study programmes of the Commission on Education for Mission and recommends to the General Assembly the mission study themes two years in advance. Mission Themes which have already been approved by General Assembly: 1980 - 1981: "India and Nepal" dealing largely with our Church's involvement in mission in those lands, and "Biblical Understandings of Mission to the Individual and Society" as an alternate theme, with supplementary materials, where necessary, being prepared co-operatively by the Women's Missionary Society, W.D., the Board of Congregational Life, and the Board of World Mission. 1981 - 1982: "Europe — Dimensions of Christian Mission" and "Pluralism, Poverty and Cultural Bias in Relation to the Christian Gospel". Supplementary materials will be provided, as necessary, by the Women's Missionary Society, W.D., the Board of Congregational Life, and the Board of World Mission.

RECOMMENDATION 11 A

That the Mission Study Themes for 1982 - 1983 be as follows: General Theme: "Oneness in Christ"; Geographical Theme: "Pacific Islands", and that, where appropriate, the Women's Missionary Society, W.D., the Board of Congregational Life, and the Board of World Mission, co-operate in the preparation of suitable study materials for use across the Church.

APPOINTMENTS OF MARRIED STUDENTS TO VACANT CHARGES

The General Assembly (A & P 1952 (p. 82) has declared that "Appointments (of student missionaries) must be made by Mission Board and no private arrangements entered into . . ." The Board has consulted with representatives of the Theological Colleges and it has been agreed

a) that because married students are expected to work full-time in the summer on the field, the Board of World Mission would grant permission for formal academic study only in consultation with the Presbytery, interim-moderator and the appropriate college; and

b) that because all married student appointments are made by the Board of World Mission, the married student will not be appointed without written permission of the appropriate College and written agreement of the Synod Superintendent of Missions.

RECOMMENDATION 12 A

That the above be received for information.

NEW CONGREGATIONS — BUILDING PROGRAMME

The Board of World Mission and its Church Extension Advisory Committee has updated the guidelines for new congregations entering a building programme.

In view of current building costs and the need for adequate (200 seats) and attractive accommodation, congregations in urban areas be encouraged to aim for a building costing approximately \$250,000 (including landscaping and furnishings), and the Board of World Mission has approved the following guidelines:

a) That 25% of the total project costs be raised in actual cash by the congregation and Presbytery before construction is permitted to begin and of this amount at least 15% of the total cost must be raised by the congregation. (With a \$250,000 project, this involves a congregational fund of at least \$37,500 and Presbytery support of up to at least \$25,000.)

b) That the congregation should be able to raise a minimum of \$25,000 per annum (over and above Board of World Mission support) for debt management and operating costs before being permitted to proceed with construction.

c) That the present terms for special financing by the Board of World Mission for new church extension congregations engaged in a building programme, be extended to allow payment of full support for the ministry for up to four years if required, plus principal and interest grants at present available.

RECOMMENDATION 13 A

That the above guidelines be received for information.

INNER CITY

Whereas The Presbyterian Church in Canada has a mandate to double its membership in a decade, and whereas statistics show that many inner city (older urban) congregations in metropolitan areas often record no signs of growth from one year to another, and whereas many of the ministers serving these congregations are nearing retirement, and whereas a large number of the members frequently live outside the community, and whereas the needs of these changing communities, which call for vision and constant evaluation, are not being met —

RECOMMENDATION 14

That at the time of visitation to these congregations, Presbytery committees be instructed to ask relevant questions and discuss plans for outreach and mission,

and that where there is a decline or no growth situation, indicating stagnation and/or lack of vision, an annual visitation be required for the purpose of encouragement and support in performing their mission.

NATIVE PEOPLE

The Board of World Mission has had a group working on reassessment of the work among Native People. The work was visited and the workers and native people were consulted. The work among Native People is both difficult and challenging. Since the 1860's and the pioneering work of James Nesbitt, the main thrust of Presbyterian Ministry with Native People has been with specific reserves and institutions. Shoal Lake, Whitefish Bay, Kenora Fellowship Centre in North West Ontario, Oak Lake, Birdtail, Okanais, Rolling River, Waywayseecappo, Dakota Tipi, and in Winnipeg, Anishinabe Fellowship Centre all in Manitoba, Mistawasis, Wahpeton, Crutwell and Prince Albert in Saskatchewan, have been traditional areas of work. Approval has been given for a worker in Regina.

The General Assembly in both 1975 and 1978 acted to declare our ministry to Native People a priority. There is a growing sense of solidarity among Native People. Workers among the Native People must be prepared to learn the language and culture of the Native People and be willing to give the Native People a larger share in

decision-making.

RECOMMENDATION 15 C

a) That the Board of World Mission, as an expression of the above mentioned authority, be authorized to inform the members of the Church of the current and regional concerns of Canada's Native People, and

b) that tangible ways be found of saying that recognized regional and national groupings of native people have a special right to be heard by federal, provincial, territorial and municipal governments.

RECOMMENDATION 16 A

That appointments to Native ministries be

a) normally a five (5) year "Overseas style" appointment with prior and continuing orientation, language study, adequate work funds, and furlough with accompanying benefits, and

b) in special circumstances, a 2 - 3 year "Canada O.M." style appointment.

RECOMMENDATION 17

That the Colleges be instructed to offer courses in the study of Native Spiriuality and Culture as part of the program of study in Comparative Religions.

CONTINUING EDUCATION AND STUDY - NATIVE WORKERS

There is a need for adequate continuing education time and financial support for native studies. Arrangements need to be made in consultation between the Presbytery, the appointee, and the Board of World Mission.

RECOMMENDATION 18 A

That the above be received for information.

MINUTE OF APPRECIATION - Dr. D.T. and Mrs. Evans

The Board of World Mission records its gratitude to the Rev. Dr. D.T. and Mrs. Evans as Dr. Evans takes early retirement from the task of Superintendent of Missions for the Synod of Saskatchewan due to ill health.

In 1975 Dil and Lee Evans left Thornhill Presbyterian Church to undertake the Superintendent of Mission position in Saskatchewan. The mission work in the two Presbyteries needed the enthusiasm and joy of Dil Evans, who encouraged newly ordained ministers as they began their ministry. Experienced ministers speak of the blessing that they received in the fellowship of Dil Evans. A number of ministers from Assiniboia and Northern Saskatchewan Presbyteries have indicated their appreciation of Dil's pastoral ministry to them. In a vacant congregation Dil Evans

would be ready to conduct worship and preach. He was a frequent visitor along the 400 miles trail from North Battleford, Dore Lake and Buffalo Narrows. He served as chairman of the Prince Albert Fellowship House. He was secretary and then President of the exclusive "Superintendents of Missions Association".

In his work as Superintendent and in all his relationships, he is a cheerful and joyful person and all can say it is good to be with Dil Evans. In everything Dil is

ably assisted by Leila, better known as "wifie".

The Board of World Mission expresses its appreciation to Dilwyn and Leila Evans, and prays that God will continue to make them both a blessing wherever they go.

RECOMMENDATION 19

That the above minute of appreciation for Dr. D.T. and Mrs. Evans be approved.

OVERTURE No. 3 (1979) (WEST TORONTO) PROVINCIAL HEALTH INSURANCE

"that health insurance premiums for all ordained missionaries and other full time church workers employed by the Board of World Mission such as the Women's Missionary Society be fully paid . . .

The Board of World Mission has given study to the Provincial Health Insurance and wishes to report that it needs further time for study to prepare an answer for

the 107th General Assembly.

RECOMMENDATION 21

That the above be received for information.

RECOMMENDATION 22

That this report be received for information and that Presbyteries be urged to ensure that Catechists participate in the Retirement Fund for Church Employees in order to have this benefit on retirement.

USE OF LARGER WEEKLY OFFERING ENVELOPES

RECOMMENDATION 23 A

That the General Assembly encourage congregations to change from the commonly used duplex envelopes, which were designed for coin use, to a larger type envelope which will permit the distribution of the worshipper's offering to General Assembly Budget and local needs; and that those congregations now using the larger envelopes be commended for thus encouraging greater generosity among the people.

THE CONSULTATION ON CHURCH AND SOCIETY

The Board of World Mission concurs in the proposals made by the Consultation on Church and Society for more adequate meetings concerning social issues which by agreement will be reported by the Board of Congregational Life.

RECOMMENDATION 24 A

That the above be received for information.

BOARD OF WORLD MISSION BUDGET

The Board of World Mission expresses its strong concern to the General Assembly that any further cuts in real dollars to the Board Budget will adversely affect the Mission thrust of the Church.

RECOMMENDATION 25 A

That the above be accepted and forwarded to the Administrative Council for consideration.

COMMITTEE TO DOUBLE IN THE EIGHTIES AND THE JOINT TASK FORCE ON CHURCH GROWTH

The Board of World Mission approves the structure (the Budget was deleted) of the amended Task Force report as approved by the Board of Congregational Life and endorsed by the Committee to Double in the Eighties.

RECOMMENDATION 26 A

That the above be received for information.

BOARD OF WORLD MISSION GRANTS

There is confusion about the grants given to congregations through the Board of World Mission and the amounts of money paid by aid-receiving congregations.

The Board approved that Board of World Mission grants to congregations be included in the statistical report which is printed in the Acts and Proceedings of the General Assembly as a separate item.

RECOMMENDATION 27 A

That this matter be referred to the Clerks of the General Assembly for consideration and report.

FIELD REPORTS CANADA

SYNOD OF THE ATLANTIC PROVINCES

At the close of 1979 all established mission fields had been filled. One problem is that, in rural areas, population holds static or tends to decline. A number of the aid-receiving charges are located in such areas. Encouraging reports came in from many charges:

WABUSH, LABRADOR. Christ Church purchased a manse. An average of 40-45 adults and 65-70 children attend Sunday services. "The hub of the congregation's ministry is the Sunday School," reports Rev. David Renwick. Workshops were conducted for Sunday School teachers by Miss Charlotte Brown. About four to ten ladies attend a weekly Bible study group.

 HOPEWELL, EUREKA, MIDDLE RIVER, GAIRLOCH. The ordination of Rev. M.G. Fawcett was held in August, and since that time 14 new members have been added to the communicant rolls. The congregations are responding to an expanded number of services, and attendance at Christmas services proved particularly gratifying. DARTMOUTH IONA. Rev. Robert Cruickshank writes: "Although the community in which Iona is located reflects a transient highly mobile population, there are small signs of growth as new families (often through children's involvement) express interest and begin attending church." He reports excellent leadership potential among the 'core group'.

 SACKVILLE, FIRST. This congregation took over sole occupation of their new church facilities in February, after sharing with the former owners for several months. Rev. D.M. Marple reports that many new members and adherents were welcomed and there was a significant growth in the programs offered

to children and adults.

MURRAY HARBOUR NORTH, P.E.I. The mainthrust has been towards youth work and Christian education. Attendance at worship services improved, 28 new members were received. Sunday Schools now operate at all four points, and the Youth group showed steady growth and increased enthusiasm with young people taking an increasing role in worship services. Thomas J. Kay is lay missionary.

BROOKFIELD HARTSVILLE, HUNTER RIVER AND GLASGOW ROAD, P.E.I. This charge had been ministered to over the past 20 years for the most part by winter supply and summer students. Rev. Susan Triantafillou was appointed in 1979. She reports: "There has been a real outreach of the people to the community and relationships with other denominations have grown." The church building in Hunter River is currently being extended. There has been

rapid growth both in church and Sunday School attendance.

CHARLOTTETOWN, ST. MARK'S AND MARSHFIELD, ST. COLUMBA. On its tenth anniversary, St. Mark's produced a television program on "The Child in the Church". Rev. J.C. Bigelow reports: "The congregation continues to show a commitment to community and mission work." St. Mark's went to a duplex envelope and the General Assembly Budget givings doubled in one year.

SUNNY CORNER, ST. STEPHEN'S. Rev. Desmond Maxwell reports: "Congregational life is strong and of all our ventures in the past year a newly organized tape ministry has been exceptionally worthwhile." All worship services were recorded in full and the cassettes distributed to the bed-ridden and housebound members of the congregations as well as to several others in the community. About 30 young people meet weekly and 30 adults have a regular Bible study in Sunny Corner, while 19 attend a Bible study in WARWICK, St. Paul's.

 RIVERVIEW BETHEL. A newly organized Outreach Committee produced several programs for local cable TV and promoted the use of the 30-second presentations of The Presbyterian Church in Canada on both Cable TV and the local TV station. Plans were started for a mass mailing to homes of the com-

munity, to be followed by door-to-door contact.

Special Ministries

PRESBYTERY WORKER IN CAPE BRETON. Mrs. Joan Ashley reports that her activities included pre-planning and leadership training, then co-directing the girls' camps at Camp MacLeod; involvement in four Daily Vacation Bible Schools and two pre-training sessions for leaders. Approximately 178 children attended. She also assisted in WMS rallies and rallies for COC, Explorer and CGIT leaders, and in Sunday School teacher training.

PRESBYTERY DEACONESS IN HALIFAX & LUNENBURG. Miss June Pratt reports: "Spending a summer at Camp Geddie was a most interesting and enriching experience. There were 272 young campers during the season with 18 families at Family Camp. I worked with 36 senior leaders and 19 junior leaders.

 HOSPITAL VISITOR IN HALIFAX & LUNENBURG, Mrs. Eva L. MacLean reports having visited 1226 Presbyterian patients at five Halifax institutions.

SYNOD OF QUEBEC & EASTERN ONTARIO

 PORT CARTIER, The Church of the Good Shepherd. Rev. F.P. Howard-Smith reports that through intensive program planning and development this congregation of approximately 30 English-speaking households has redefined its ministry in terms of the French language. The Session is completely bilingual.

STE. FOY, Eglise St-Marc has experienced a year of growth both spiritually and in numbers attending services. There is a Sunday School of 34, two Bible studies for new Christians weekly, men's prayer breakfast weekly, and an Institute of Theology offering a variety of courses. Rev. David Craig is the minister.

FABREVILLE. The church property of this congregation consists of a private bungalow which has been converted for church purposes, with the basementsanctuary having a seating capacity of 45-50 people. They have no debts and are able to meet all operating costs as well as contribute to home and overseas

mission work.

CHATEAUGUAY VALLEY. Rev. Guy F. Choltus reports: "for two years I have been working in the Chateauguay Valley Outreach Mission. My co-worker is Georges Roulea, a French Canadian elder. Georges and I visit people, trying to reach as many unchurched as we can. We have Bible studies and prayer meetings in church or in homes. We had training sessions for people and a special workshop in stewardship open to any interested Christians.

MONTREAL, Beckwith Memorial Italian and St. Michel. Worship services were conducted in both English and Italian. At St. Michel an in depth Bible study for members of both congregations pointed up the need for commitment to Jesus Christ and for a more meaningful fellowship with one another and with

the unchurched.

ST. LAURENT. "The most exciting and challenging aspect of ministry here is the proposed amalgamation of this congregation and the local United congregation to form a community church," writes Rev. Gordon C. Saville. "Both congregations are beginning to come to grips with the kind of community in which we live". Unemployment, poverty, alcoholism and the plight of the elderly are but a few of the concerns.

OTTAWA, Trinity. Rev. R. Kendall reports that the congregation established a Planning Council, charged with the responsibility of studying the growth prospects of the congregation, defining a clear purpose for the church, examining the opportunities facing Kanata, and reporting back within a year. The congregation shared in a Family Camp program at Gracefield Presbytery Centre. An

outreach committee has been organized.

PETAWAWA AND POINT ALEXANDER. This past year has been one of spiritual and physical growth within both congregations, reports Ian K. Johnston, student minister. A developer in the community donated a one acre parcel of land to Petawawa congregation for a new worship centre.

Special Ministries

- HOSPITAL VISITOR IN PRESBYTERY OF MONTREAL. Mrs. Eileen Horne. continued a most effective ministry. She attended seminars presented by Royal Victoria Hospital with physicians and medical personnel sharing their knowledge with clergy and lay persons in ministering to the ill, the aging and the bereaved.
- OTTAWA, Christian Community House, with Sandra Estabrooks, moved to a new location and expanded to two households. While Miss Estabrooks' responsibilities centre around counselling, lay teaching, correspondence ministry and administration, Michael McCaffrey assists with crafts, guitar lessons, acts as Mr. Fix-it and social service resource person, as well as househead of the second household.

SYNOD OF TORONTO AND KINGSTON

The Synod is pleased to report that:

AJAX, ST. TIMOTHY'S became self-supporting in January 1979, as well as ERIN-OSPRINGE and UNIVERSITY CHURCH in January 1980.

REV. H. DENNIS OLIVER was appointed Church Growth Consultant in the Presbytery of West Toronto.

A few of the many reports are highlighted below:

GATEWAY COMMUNITY CHURCH. "Gateway is full of dedicated and tal-

ented people. Whatever they do, they do well," reports the Rev. Geoffrey Johnston. Highlights included an excellent China Night, an in depth look at development which included a telecast of a Sunday morning service with young men from Barbados and Pakistan participating and a Christmas production which was conceived, written, acted and danced from within the neighbourhood. Mr. Johnston says: "While we thank God for the many things we have been able to do we are also very aware of things left undone. There are hundreds of children in our schools, but few come to Sunday School. There are thousands of people in the Flemingdon Park housing development, but few come to church."

ERINDALE received 29 new members. Rev. Wayne J. Baswick reports: "To be a part of Mississauga is to be a part of a growing, active city, and I am glad to say that our congregation is sharing in the growth patterns that are being established in the community. We have shared in community outreach with the local cable television station.

GLENBROOK, as a first step in an outreach ministry, distributed leaflets to over 4,500 homes to be followed by the formation of neighbourhood study

groups asking the question: "Who is Jesus Christ?"

COCHRANE, KNOX. In addition to the weekly Bible studies, Young People's, Women's Fellowship and worship activities, a worship nursery was started, the Sunday School reorganized and a Young Adult group created. Rev. John D. Blue reports: "Church growth has become a vital concern for all members of Knox."

 EDEN MILLS and ROCKWOOD. Rev. Carrie Doehring made a door to door visitation in the community last summer inviting people to activities in the congregation, getting to know people and finding out their gifts and needs. A children's choir was formed, young people went on retreats to Crieff, Sunday worship and Sunday School attendance increased.

Special Ministries

TRI-CONGREGATION — EMMANUEL, ST. JAMES, ST. MATTHEW'S. Now in its seventh year, the Tri-Congregation has two staff ministers. Regular worship and witness in three old city neighbourhoods is maintained and an increasing sense of church family extended. Miss Charlotte Stuart, Resource Person in Inner City Ministries for the Presbytery of East Toronto, experimented by taking small numbers of community children on day trips and weekend tenting trips and did some community visiting, speaking about the things that make it difficult for people to live in an industrial area and also bringing to their attention the place of the Church and its message in their lives.

TORONTO, UKRAINIAN. The Ukrainian Presbyterian program "Evangelical Truth" was broadcast once a week to Ukraine from Monaco by Trans World Radio. Rev. Michael Fesenko completed the translation into Ukrainian of the Westminster Confession of Faith, Larger and Shorter Catechisms. A Ukrainian paid the costs of printing. The bi-monthly journal "Evangelical Truth" was printed in Ukrainian and English and distributed to libraries, hospitals, homes

for the aged, and to other countries.

VISITOR TO SENIOR CITIZENS, Miss Lillian Reay, visited in ten Homes on a regular basis. "The work is quite different from hospital visitation insofar as the 'Home' becomes the environment for the person," writes Miss Reay. "As I mingle with them from day to day in the various Homes, I am acutely aware how sensitive I must be to each individual." She expressed appreciation for the support received from ladies' groups.

Church Extension

MALVERN. Rev. Keith Boyer reports that the congregation continued to worship in a local school. Highlights of the year included a lenten Bible study, a gala second anniversary celebration, a six week backyard children's program, a family retreat at Crieff, and several Sundays when there was standing room only in the worship area.

- DOON. Rev. Terry Ingram reports a large numerical growth at Sunday worship as well as the reception of 37 new members. Offerings increased, the Sunday School program was enlarged with the addition of two new classes and 60 children attended VBS program.
- WATERLOO NORTH, which meets in a school building, grew to 82 active families and a membership of 108. Average attendance was 160, of which 110 were adults. Rev. Iris Ford reports: "We attract about two new families a month now. Three small groups started meeting weekly for Bible study, the sharing of faith and prayer." The Presbytery extension deaconess, Mrs. Francie Sullivan, helped develop a strong Church School staff, started a weekday children's club for 6-8 year olds, and a youth group. Vacation Bible School and Backyard Summer Fun reached 166 children, and a Christian Children's Club was organized. The Outreach Committee made regular calls to new families.

SYNOD OF HAMILTON AND LONDON

CORUNNA, MOORE and MOORETOWN. These three congregations, under the leadership of Rev. John Cruickshank, have found focus for their ministry in a unique project. Moore Presbyterian Foundation, incorporated in 1977, with ten directors who are church members, through gifts and donations from the congregations, raised \$350,000 to \$400,000 for property purchases. A retirement complex which will cost 2¼ million dollars to complete is being built on a 14-acre site. It includes two three-storey apartment wings with 59 apartments and a large adjoining centre. It is scheduled to open in May, 1980. In addition, a 5-acre site owned by the Foundation has been rezoned for construction of a 60-bed nursing home. The ten directors receive neither salary nor honorarium. The clearing of the trees and the care of gardens and lawns is being done by volunteers. The office staff, the librarian and assistants, as well as those in charge of the health program and facilities will be volunteers. Mrs. Jean Plumridge, a registered nurse, is organizing a nursing order from the congregations.

BRANT HILLS. Rev. Charles Shaver reports: "The building program has taken precedence this year. The sanctuary has been almost entirely finished, and we are happy with both design and function." He reports an interest in Church

Growth by the session.

WEST FLAMBORO. Rev. E.C. Hicks reports that they had a great deal of interest and excitement about Bible study amongst adult members, and two groups met weekly. They had eldership training classes and there was much activity in the congregation exploring the meaning and direction of the commitment to the General Assembly's motion to double the church.

DELHI, CALVIN. Rev. J. Vasarhelyi reports an average church attendance each Sunday of 70, with a mixed English-Hungarian service once a month. Young people 20-25 years meet regularly for a program of church music, dis-

cussions and questions regarding faith, friendship and responsibility.

DORNOCH, LATONA and CHATSWORTH. The congregation of farming families at Dornoch has added to its membership couples who have retired to the area, and families who have left the city life to farm in the area. Rev. Linda Ashfield reports, "Latona people have made the newcomers feel very welcome and consequently these new folk are adding much to the leadership and life of the congregation." The Church School has doubled in numbers since September.

Special Ministries

SAUBLE BEACH, HURON FEATHERS and OWEN SOUND, ST. ANDREW'S. "Working in a team in the summer months at a vacation resort is both exciting and exhausting. Working in a team ministry in a large congregation is also exciting and challenging," writes Rev. E. Brooke Ashfield. "Each year seems to bring a new need to the beach community and it is important for our summer ministry to remain open to these changes. Last summer it was primarily a Family and Youth ministry. It is tremendously exciting to talk to so many people who have never been inside a church building before."

Inner City

- HAMILTON, CALVIN. Mrs. Helen Allum, deaconess, reports the following activities: 3 after-school groups weekly, 2 Neighbourhood Fellowship Hours in a large senior citizens apartment building, 2 Mothers' Groups each week and a "Coffee Plus" get-together once a month. A Winter Break program was attended by 80 children.
- ROXBOROUGH PARK. Rev. George Zimmerman writes, "Due to the economic conditions of the area, it was deemed wise to establish cooperation with other community churches. A student was hired to do a research fact finding paper and the congregations formed The East End Ministry Committee (TEEM)." Plans include regular Sunday evening worship services and the development of a Christian Education program for adults at the local community night school.
- HOSPITAL VISITOR, HAMILTON. Mrs. JoAnne Walter makes 40-50 calls a
 week in hospitals and nursing homes, as well as some home visits when requested.

SYNOD OF MANITOBA AND NORTHWESTERN ONTARIO

GERALDTON, ST. ANDREW'S. Rev. Ian A. Gray reports that attendance has increased noticeably with approximately 75 attending Sunday worship, 50 in the Sunday School and 8 to 10 in a youth group. He says, "The people of St. Andrew's have recently taken a big step in showing their support of our National Church and also their concern that others outside this community be reached with the Gospel."

FLIN FLON, ST. ANDREW'S. A "Day of Decision" was held to examine the strengths and weaknesses of the congregation and to develop plans to improve congregational life and witness to the community. As a result (1) a newsletter was established, (2) an adult study group studied the Apostles' Creed and (3) a

stewardship visitation was carried out.

Special Ministries

ANISHINABE FELLOWSHIP continued its work among native women and children. Rev. Elizabeth Nitsch was appointed Director. A joint camping program with Flora House averaged 22 campers at each of three camps. Five children's groups met regularly and 2 Ladies' Clubs met to listen to recorded Bible lectures in the Cree and Ojibway languages. There was an informal worship service on Sundays.

FLORA HOUSE, WINNIPEG, continued "to be a house of friendship and fellowship, a house of hope and encouragement, and a house of Christian love," as it carried on its outreach ministry into the community. A 'Summer Fun' program in August included Bible study, crafts and recreation activities. Seven clubs have a total membership of 70. When voluntary helpers were sorely needed, five high school students came back as helpers. Miss Athalie Read continued the outreach into the community through involvement with the

nutrition program at King Edward School.

KENORA FELLOWSHIP CENTRE. With the appointment of Rev. Florence Palmer, this place has come alive again and is seeking to meet the needs of the community and the Native people. A Teen Drop-In Centre, started with 6, has had as many as 50. This program has been a good tie-in with the families on the reserves because the teenagers from the reserves board in Kenora during the school week.

 ELPHINSTONE, KEESEEKOOWENIN, ROLLING RIVER. Much of the work here involves facing the problems in the community. A successful Vacation Bible School was held at Keeseekoowenin with the band providing a bus. There

is great potential for youth work in Rolling River.

- RÓSSBŪRN, EKFORD, WAYWAYSEEČAPPO. Services were well attended

and 65 enrolled in the Vacation Bible School, Givings doubled.

 DAUPHIN, WINNIPEGOSIS. Work in Winnipegosis is now a joint venture in cooperation with the United Church, and Rev. R. McMillan reports a good feeling of oneness and some are being added to the church by profession of faith

and baptism.

 SHOAL LAKE. Rev. William Palmer began his pastoral ministry in September and reports that there was an open door into the classrooms at Shoal Lake and at the large new complex at Whitefish Bay.

 HOSPITAL VISITOR Mary A. McLaren reports having made 4120 hospital visits and 261 visits to nursing homes. She says, "Many of these people have

become cherished friends."

SYNOD OF SASKATCHEWAN

CARRAGANA, SYLVANIA, BLIGHTY. Under Rev. Neal Mather's guidance this charge is reaching for self-support. Plans are being made to build an adequate manse and rebuild to meet facility needs of the congregation. Services in Blighty, added late in 1979, are in a refurbished rural schoolhouse.

CALVIN/GOFORTH, under the faithful ministry of Rev. Ray Glen, has deepened the commitment of the people in the Gospel and strengthened its mission and outreach. Moving gradually towards self-support, with renewed enthusiasm for a growing community to the east, the congregation seems more vigorous

than ever.

 COLLEGE PARK had growing attendance and involvement of new families in active programming. Progress was made in assessing facility needs and a building fund established. Rev. Frank VanderZwan continues to give effective leadership.

Church Extension

WESTVIEW. A Church Extension begun by and currently supervised by Parkview minister and elders now requires a full time extension worker to assess and expand the focus to a large and growing area of North-western Saskatchewan.

Special Ministries

NORTH WEST TERRITORIAL MISSION. Mr. John Stephenson was very active in consolidating the work in Buffalo Narrows and developing ministry in La Loche, Beauval, Dore Lake and Isle a la Crosse. This is a frontier ministry with great promise in the path of uranium expansion in the North.

 MISTAWASIS, CRUTWELL, WAHPETON. This ministry to native people on these Reserves has been faithfully continued by Rev. Stephen How for a number of years. Extensive repairs were made to the Mistawasis Church by volun-

teers from the congregation.

 PARKVIEW, under Rev. Doug Johns, continued its ministry to the Caswell/ Mayfair/Westmount areas where older families are being replaced by younger

families with children.

 WORKER AMONG NATIVE PEOPLE IN PRINCE ALBERT. A person is needed to meet the needs of urban native families for worship, Christian Education, employment, housing, counselling and prison ministry. Such a position

is seen as a pilot ministry for three years.

 PRESBYTERY SUMMER STUDENT, Miss Anne Vandermay, did survey work in Melville and White City, and assisted with Vacation Bible School at Yorkton and Norman Kennedy Church, Regina. She worked among Native people in Regina, and offered valuable counsel to presbytery in that field as well as others.

SYNOD OF ALBERTA

 CHETWYND. The Missions Convener feels that this area, with both industrial and agricultural growth, presents a great challenge for our church. At present the Presbyterian Church has a cooperative arrangement with the United Church. - DAWSON CREEK, NEW ST. JAMES, under the capable leadership of Rev.

Brian Penny, showed some excellent signs of growth.

 EDMONTON, DAYSPRING conducted two outreach visitations and started a young people's group and a joint CGIT group with a neighbouring United Church.

LOUSANA. This field was reactivated last summer and served by a student, Mr.
 Ira Mullin. Presbytery was greatly encouraged by the response of the people.

 LETHBRIDGE, BETHLEN continued to minister to the Hungarian people of that area. Presbytery is encouraging the congregation to undertake more activities in the English language in an effort to make its witness more effective.

Church Extension

 THE PRESBYTERY OF CALGARY is looking seriously at Church extension in Calgary and other areas as it endeavours to meet the needs of a growing area.

CALGARY, CENTENNIAL turned the sod for its new building in July and officially dedicated the new sanctuary on January 6, 1980 with an attendance of over 400 people. The congregation continued to be a caring congregation with a sense of outreach and concern.

 PRESBYTERY OF CALGARY DEACONESS, Marion R. Barclay, was involved with 3 Vacation Bible Schools, teaching training meetings and workshops and

visited weekly in 3 Calgary hospitals.

SYNOD OF BRITISH COLUMBIA

CRESTON. Many celebrations took place to celebrate the 70th anniversary of this church, and Dr. Edward Bragg reports: "On a number of occasions the Church has been filled to overflowing and the time is not too far distant when serious thought will have to be given to enlarging the structure and making provision for more seating."

 CASTLEGAR, GRACE. There has been an increased interest in Bible study in this congregation, especially among those in their late twenties and early thir-

ties. A visitation of homes was conducted with ten volunteers involved.

NELSON and SLOCAN, ST. ANDREW'S. Three Christian Community Houses, sponsored by the Nelson congregation, are designed as a model for parish renewal and examples of Christian living. The doors are open to anyone desiring to grow in Christ. Sometimes that includes people struggling with emotional problems as well as the less drastic but equally real handicaps of self-interest. A contemporary singing group "One Heart" is made up of about 8 young adults and the choir. The Way Inn Coffee House ministry is in its fourth year. Once a month, a Christian film is shown to 50-60 people. A combined teen group for Nelson and Slocan Valley is attended by 20-25. A two half-days-a-week Christian play school has been started. Rev. Calvin Brown writes: "It has been a real blessing to housebound mothers to get time out and a great opportunity to teach the children about life with Jesus."

KITIMAT congregation continued to grow in spiritual maturity and in numbers worshipping each week. Bible study was an important part of the congregational life. A Wednesday Church School with an ever-increasing enrolment brought the gospel message to many children for the first time. A five-week lenten dialogue on "The Year of the Child" was well attended. Summer activities included a Vacation Bible School, a Co-Ed camp for high school students and door to door evangelism. The first program of a weekly radio ministry went on

the air on January 6.

COQUITLAM embarked on a building program for a new and expanded sanctuary, increasing capacity from 125 to 300, in preparation for church growth.

LANGLEY, with steady growth during 1979, has 63 communicant members and 75 children and youth involved in the congregation. The building fund reached \$15,000 and 107 children enrolled in the Vacation Bible School. The first of four planning committees to study the church's potential ministry to their community was established.

 MISSION, ST PAUL'S. A community visitation resulted in many new families attending services of worship and church activities. Over 50 children attended Vacation Bible School. A Bible study group met regularly and a telephone prayer chain was established to take prayer requests from both congregation and community.

 VANCOUVER ST. COLUMBA applied for a special grant to cover a one year appointment of Mr. Wen Yen Peng to work with orientals. An equalizing grant

has been offered by St. Columba.

Church Extension

NORTH VANCOUVER, SEYMOUR COMMUNITY CHURCH. Work in this
area began in August 1979. A visitation blitz was carried out and worship services began in a school gym in November with an average of 40-50 attending.

- PARKSVILLE. Rev. Tony Boonstra reports 13 new members, 51 households,

and \$14,000 has been raised for the Building Fund.

Special Ministries

- VICTORIA, CHINESE, reported that its Nursery School was filled to capacity (22) and it no longer needed to be subsidized. The congregation, together with the Chinatown Lions Club produced a one-hour Chinese program for the local radio station.
- HOSPITAL VISITOR, Florence Edge, in addition to visiting patients in hospitals, made herself available to transport people to and from hospital in cases of emergency and need. She said 95% of those visited were not actively involved in any congregation.

CANADA SPECIAL MINISTRIES

 THE STAFF serving under Special Ministries in Canada continued to reach out in concern and Christian love, endeavouring to meet the needs of people of every age, in a variety of situations and from a wide range of linguistic and cultural backgrounds.

 THE MINISTRY IN FRENCH CANADA expanded during the year, with Rev. Guy Choltus appointed to outreach in Montreal Presbytery, and Mr. Michel Duclos assisting in St. Marc and doing outreach in Charny. Rev. David Craig

gave excellent leadership at Eglise St. Marc, Ste. Foy.

 The KOREAN congregation in LONDON, which has shared facilities for five years, is investigating possible ways of having a building of its own.

REV. JOSEPH VASARHELYI was appointed to Calvin Hungarian Church in

Delhi, Ontario.

KENORA FELLOWSHIP CENTRE was closed at the end of January, 1979 because of the lack of a Director. Rev. Florence Palmer was appointed in August. Initially she concentrated on re-establishing the hostel which is operated in conjunction with the Centre. A number of programs have been organized for various age groups and others are being planned.

REV. ELISABETH NITSCH was appointed Director of Anishinabe Fellowship

in downtown Winnipeg.

The reassessment of the work of PRESBYTERIAN FELLOWSHIP HOUSE in Prince Albert indicated a decreased demand for residential facilities for young men of Native origin. The work was terminated in June and the building turned back to its owners, the WMS (WD), thus completing 15 years of providing a home-away-from-home for young men in Prince Albert.

On BIRDTAIL RESERVE a new church building was dedicated. Unfortunately, Mr. Ed Bunn, who served as lay missionary on his home reserve of Birdtail and on Oak Lake Reserve for seven years, found it necessary to resign for

health reasons.

 MISS ANNIE WILSON married Rev. B. Hallgren and retired in July, following 31 years of dedicated service with the Chinese congregation in Vancouver. - MISS FANNY TSE resigned, following 10 years of faithful ministry in the

Chinese congregation in Victoria.

 A NATIVE WORKERS' CONFERENCE was held in January 1980 when a group of 15 workers and Native people met to discuss the Church's ministry to our first Canadians. It was the first time such a conference was held on an Indian reserve.

THE HOSPITAL VISITOR MINISTRY continued in 8 centres from Halifax to

Vancouver.

 FIFTY-THREE STUDENTS served under appointment of the Board of World Mission during the summer of 1979.

N.B. For further information on "Special Ministries" see the field reports from each Synod above.

CHURCH EXTENSION

- THE CHURCH EXTENSION COMMITTEE continued to wrestle with two groups of problems which seem to be in constant and increasing tension.

The need and opportunity for establishing new congregations. For example, spectacular growth in population is taking place in Alberta and British Columbia.

2. The inevitable escalation in the cost of real estate for manses and church

ONCE it has been resolved to begin work in a new area, the Board of World Mission appoints a minister judged suitable for church extension and immediately has to provide a manse, usually by purchasing a house which offers normal facilities for a home, and if possible space to accommodate small groups in their initial stages as the new Christian group begins to develop. Efforts are made to secure a suitable Church site. Sometimes there is financial assistance from the presbytery. This site is eventually transferred to the new congregation as a gift from the whole Church, and serves as collateral in their program for financing a new building.

IN AN EXTENSION CHARGE, the Board of World Mission assumes responsibility for full support of the minister for up to three years, if necessary, and also provides special grants to help pay principal, interest and taxes. Other assistance, notably through the Presbyterian Building Corporation and the

Lending Fund Committee, is also available to the congregation.

BECAUSE OF THE DIFFICULTIES encountered in locating and acquiring a suitable church site in certain areas, particularly new suburban housing developments, the Church Extension Committee some years ago encouraged the formation of regional inter-church planning councils to deal with land developers and to plan together for the location of church buildings throughout the area. In some instances two or more denominations share a site and a building in order to effect some building economies. Because of some misunderstandings as to the intent of these church campus projects the Board during the past year has restated its policy in the following terms:

 That in preliminary planning for church extension, cooperation be sought with other denominations in the location and development of new

congregations.

That in the securing of land for church extension, the Board of World Mission, in consultation with Presbytery, where possible, secure single church sites for the erection of our own building; where circumstances warrant, consideration be given to joint ownership of land and buildings with other denomination(s).

DESPITE the various provisions for assisting congregations, the escalating costs
of construction are creating almost insurmountable difficulties for new congre-

gations. One undesirable tendency is to plan a building too small for any but the immediate needs of the congregation. The result is that a second unit is required before the first is paid for, and growth is impeded.

N.B. Information on specific extension charges in the various synods may be found in the individual synod reports.

INNER CITY

- A VOLUNTEER CATEGORY for service in Canada has been established.
 Canada Mission Volunteers will serve in inner city situations just as soon as suitable volunteers are available. One Presbytery has requested such a worker.
- A CONCERN at this time is for inner city (older urban) congregations which are facing real problems regarding their future. Their membership, which is aging and decreasing, lives largely outside the community and has little contact with those living in the vicinity of the church. At the same time there are districts of these communities that are undergoing urban renewal and young couples are moving in. There is a mission potential in these communities but it will require active outreach if that potential is to be realized.

FIELD REPORTS OVERSEAS

THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN NIGERIA

Synod Clerk - Rev. M.O. Ogarekpe

- 25TH ANNIVERSARY. To celebrate the 25th year of association with The Presbyterian Church in Canada visits were exchanged between the two churches. The Moderator of Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Nigeria, Rt. Rev. A.A. Otu and his wife visited Canada, also elders B.E. Nkama, Dr. Akanu Ibiam, U.I. Onwuka, Miss Ako E. Oku and Rev. M.O. Ogarekpe, Synod Clerk.
- Six delegates from The Presbyterian Church in Canada who visited Nigeria were: Rt. Rev. Dr. Kenneth G. McMillan and his wife, Miss May Nutt, Rev. H. Morris, Rev. C.R. Talbot and Rev. E.F. Roberts.
- EXPANSION. Synod agreed to establish congregations in all the state capitals where there were no existing congregations. This calls for more ministers of high calibre, well-trained evangelists and the ordination of more elders. Many congregations are springing up around rural and urban centres, and some congregations are attracting more members. The rate of expansion is taxing the resources of the Church. Congregations are so concerned with their local problems that the central organization is being neglected. Efforts are being made to remedy this situation. The Youth Wing of the Church inaugurated their National Young Peoples' Association, with representatives from Ghana taking part.
- TRAINING. 21 students are being trained for the ministry at Trinity College, 8 in first year, 9 in year two and 4 in final year. 22 male students in Goldie Training Centre and 8 women at Ikot Obong Training Centre are training to become evangelists. Training of evangelists was disrupted twice during the year because of shortage of funds. Contributions from individuals as well as the Women's Guild and the Men's Christian Association enabled the schools to keep open.
- MEDICAL WORK. Appeals were made through congregations to Presbyterian medical doctors to serve in Presbyterian hospitals to alleviate the shortage of doctors and medical personnel.

- SELF HELP EFFORTS. The women of the Church embarked upon a Hostel Project to help improve the finances of the Church. The sod was turned in August for a hostel in Calabar. Levies are imposed on members and funds raised by subscriptions. Many congregations are, by self-help efforts, putting up churches, manses and other buildings that may help reduce the burdens of the congregations.
- FINANCES. A strong committee was set up to diagnose and solve the financial problems of the Church.
- STATISTICS. Full communicant members total 25,042. There is a gross membership of 30,189 including women and children.

Canadian Staff

DR. DAVID AND MRS. SHEILA IRWIN taught at the University of Port Harcourt until forced to return to Canada for health reasons. Dr. Irwin was responsible for a second year course in biochemistry for 120 students. Mrs. Irwin taught an Earth Sciences course, a course on the human body for Arts students, and a community service course. In the latter course, second year students designed, produced, and demonstrated teaching aids to improve the teaching of biology in local secondary schools.

REV. RICHARD W. FEE continued as Moderator of Ezzikwo Parish (47 churches, 8 class centres) and teacher for Moral Instruction at Ikwo high school. He was also Moderator of Abakaliki Presbytery and a member on num-

erous synod committees.

MR. TREVOR AND MRS. PATRICIA FOWLER, Overseas Volunteers, taught in a boarding school where there was a great opportunity to develop relationships with the students. They report: "Through our friendships with these girls we cannot only help them to relate Christ's teaching to their everyday lives, but also offer them a 'cross-cultural' experience.

MISS ARLENE RANDALL continued to teach English, New Testament,

Church History, and Worship to men studying to be Synod evangelists at Goldie Training Centre in Arochukwu.

MR. JAMES C. AND MRS. KATHLEEN WHITEFIELD, Overseas Volunteers worked with the Port Harcourt Christian Council Project until March 1979 when they returned to Canada for health reasons. Since that time they have been doing part-time deputation and part-time work in the church offices.

MALAWI

BLANTYRE SYNOD Church of Central Africa Presbyterian, has had a change of General Secretary. The Very Rev. J.D. Sangaya died in August, 1979 and Synod appointed Dr. Saindi Chiphangwi to replace him. The Rev. Silas Ncozana who spent five months in Canada in 1979 on a B.W.M. Scholarship, has been named Deputy General Secretary.

THE CHURCH continued its high rate of growth and showed much vitality in outreach, education and service to the needy. Special emphasis was given to theological education and leadership training, in order to meet the urgent need for leaders to minister to the many new Christians who are coming into the

church.

Canadian Staff

MISS CYNTHIA H. CARR, overseas volunteer, was appointed to the Church of Central Africa Presbyterian, Blantyre Synod and the Christian Service Committee of the Churches in Malawi. She was seconded to these organizations jointly to the Malawi government, Department of Geological Survey, Water Section in the position of Geologist. Her job description is entitled "locating sites for water boreholes". This involves working in all rural parts of the country as the need requires, surveying to locate optimal water supply, consideration of pollution sources, proximity to users and wishes of local leaders.

REV. CHARLES and MRS. SHARON SCOTT continued working under the Church of Central Africa Presbyterian in Blantyre. Mr. Scott spent a major portion of his time as Director of Theological Education by Extension in Malawi. He says: "As Director of TEEM I have the opportunity to help create a new and worthwhile venture and answer a basic need in the church." He also served as Associate Minister of St. Michael's and All Angels congregation, Mrs. Scott taught in St. Andrew's Primary School.

THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN TAIWAN

General Secretary – Rev. Dr. Chun Ming Kao

GENERAL SITUATION: 1979 ended in a time of tension following a clash between the authorities and demonstrators in Kaohsiung which resulted in many people being injured and was followed by the arrest of most of the leaders of the non-party group. Contrary to rumors spread at the time, the Presbyterian Church was not a promoter of this incident in any way, and expressed

deep concern for those who suffered as a result of it.

RELIGIOUS LAW: The proposed new regulations for Shrines, Temples and Churches passed by the Executive Yuan was returned to the Ministry of the Interior for further study, after protest was raised both within Taiwan and overseas. The basis of opposition to the law is (1) the law is unconstitutional and infringes on the constitutional rights of freedom of religion, (2) by setting up a new required form for church organization and structure, thus law destroys the integrity and organization of the church, (3) the law will make it possible for local government authorities to confiscate church property or to dismiss ministers for "being against national policy" without due process or reference to the courts, (4) this law is not necessary. There is already civil law, criminal law, and martial law.

- THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH AND HUMAN RIGHTS: There have been newspaper and magazine attacks upon the Presbyterian Church in Taiwan because of its involvement in human rights. Many of these reports have not been accurate. Other kinds of harassment have taken place. Some school textbooks now contain material detrimental to the Presbyterian Church, and students have been forbidden to take part in Presbyterian Church activities. Local churches have been subjected to disturbance and investigation. Some government officials do not approve of these actions and leaders in the church have had amicable meetings with them, exchanging views and reaching a measure of understanding. In a mountain area in southern Taiwan an official letter was sent out by local authorities saying that Bibles in the mountain language were to be confiscated. This attempt failed. People did not give up their Bibles.
- RECENT DEVELOPMENTS: On December 23, 1979, the preacher at a small country church in Chiayi Presbytery, Mr. T.H. Hsu, was arrested by Tainan city police during the morning service. No warrant was presented for his arrest. The presbytery sent an official letter of protest to the government. This episode seems to have strengthened the determination and faith of the local congregation and brought it into a closer and warmer relationship both with the presbytery and the General Assembly.

THE TEN PLUS ONE MOVEMENT: It was "Coming Home Year", a time for recovering lapsed church members and for tracing church members who have been lost. Evangelistic meetings took place at 95 local churches. Training sessions were held for elders, deacons, ministers and organizers at presbytery level.

HAKKA EVANGELISM: Plans were made for a strong evangelistic thrust in

Hakka areas, with centres for evangelism being set up.

EDUCATION: The Sunday School Curriculum Centre produced materials for students and teachers, and sent out teams of people to train local teachers in how to use the materials. A handbook for Sunday School teachers was printed and a magazine for teachers was published bi-monthly.

YOUTH WORK: The celebration of the 30th Anniversary of the Church Young People's Movement held in Tainan lasted four days and was attended by about 2,200 people. Youth and Leadership handbooks were printed and training given to young people at a series of "Modern Disciples" conferences.

WOMEN'S WORK: For the first time, the summer conferences were not divided into plains and mountain, but into Taiwanese language and Mandarin language groupings. In this way it was hoped that Hakka and mainland women would be encouraged to join and the division between mountain and plains

women overcome.

MOUNTAIN WORK: Plains, mountain people and missionaries met together with an outside consultant for several days of discussion. In striving to bring about a true unity between the mountain and plains churches, it was felt that all General Assembly committees should have mountain and plains members and be concerned about both mountain and plains congregations.

SOCIAL SERVICES: NT 352,000 (\$11,750 Canadian) was raised on Social Service Sunday, the total to be divided among several projects. Money was also given to a tribal village where 31 houses had been destroyed by fire, to an orphanage to help with high medical expenses incurred due to the use of polluted

cooking oil and to an appeal for Cambodian refugees.

INTER-CHURCH RELATIONS: It was agreed in principle that the Presbyterian Church in Taiwan re-enter the World Council of Churches. The report of the General Assembly Executive Standing Committee reads: "We believe that by being a member of the WCC we can best demonstrate our belief in the unity and world-wide nature of the church and play a proper and responsible part in this powerful Christian body." A group of 17 Christians from North American Taiwanese congregations visited Taiwan, meeting with a number of congregations, exchanging ideas and deepening their understanding of the situation there.

Canadian Staff

MISS GEORGINE CALDWELL completed her Ph.D studies at Columbia University and returned to Taiwan in June 1979. She is professor of Christian Education and Chairman of the Christian Education Department at Taiwan Theolo-

gical College.

— REV TED AND MRS. MARILYN ELLIS: Mr. Ellis is Chaplain in the Tainan Theological College and Administrative Assistant to the Principal. He was chairman of the College's Worship Committee and he counselled students, directed a team-taught course on spiritual development and assisted Thai-peng Church in developing its small group Bible Study program. Mrs. Ellis in addition to family responsibilities, studied the Taiwanese language.

MR. JOHN AND MRS. BETTY GEDDES: Mr. Geddes taught in the English Department and one course in history at Tamkang College. He was involved in small group Bible study in the College, and a weekly English Bible class in Tamsui Church. Mrs. Geddes served as Secretary of Taipei International Church and

taught some English conversation classes.

- REV. CLARE AND MRS GRACE MCGILL: Mr. McGill produced another (3rd) LP record in Tayal of scripture verses arranged to Tayal tunes, completed work on 59 Selected Psalms, and is revising and enlarging the Tayal hymn book. There are many exciting stories of lives changed through the ministry of the cassette tapes of scripture verses arranged to Tayal tunes.

MISS DIANE PETRIE continued as Project Manager for the Ren Ai TB and Community Health program. This included planning of program and budget, supervision of patients and staff development. She reports: "This is a challenging and important work. I feel that we have made great progress in the area of

TB control in the mountain villages "

MISS JOY M. RANDALL continued as Director of Nursing Services of Changhua Christian Hospital where there are over 250 nurses and nursing aides in the department. She was responsible for Nursing Care provided to over 280 patients and the supervision and administration of the nurses.

KOREAN CHRISTIAN CHURCH IN JAPAN

General Secretary - Rev. Kun Shik Kim

 THE KCCJ continued to reach out to the 660,000 Koreans in Japan with the Gospel of Peace, and to serve as God's instrument for the righting of social wrongs.

Administration

A NEW CONSTITUTION, ratified at the 35th General Assembly in Osaka Church in October, 1979, has brought about significant changes. It delegates to the presbyteries the power to ordain qualified candidates for the ministry. It also provides for the reception of women candidates for both the ministry and the eldership. The assembly will meet every two years, at which time a new moderator and general executive will be chosen.

- A NEW WORSHIP MANUAL was approved at the same assembly for use

throughout the Church.

Growth of the Church

 TOTAL MEMBERSHIP is up 63 for a total of 2338. Catechumens number 307, Seekers 273, and Baptized Children 406.

IN ÉVANGELISM many churches held special rallies, following visitation in

the area by ministers, elders and deacons.

RETREATS and leadership training events included the gathering of representatives from the six KCCJ Nursery Schools and the Catholic Nursery School in Ikuno, resulting in the formation of the KCCJ Federation of Nursery Schools. The Federation's aim is to share problems and improve the services offered.

Human Rights Activities

CHRISTIANS concerned with achieving basic human rights for Koreans in Japan continued to bring pressure to bear upon community, local and national government bodies. In October a delegation was sent to the U.S. Department of External Affairs and the United Nations Commission on Human Rights on behalf of the Korean minority in Japan. A brief was submitted outlining the various kinds of discrimination suffered. U.N. officials expressed surprise upon receiving the information, and promised to open the matter for a full discussion early in the new year.

THE FIFTH ANNUAL Consultation for Combating Discrimination against Ethnic Peoples in Japan, held by the Research Action Institute for Koreans in Japan (RAIK), was attended by over 400 people representing 96 organizations in Japan. The emphases were on the legal status of Koreans in Japan, Education problems, Social Service benefits, the U.N. Declaration on Human Rights and how it affects Koreans in Japan, and the problem of discrimination in

labour organizations.

International Connections

 TIES have been strengthened with Churches inside and outside Japan. Through missionary personnel, the KCCJ now has working relations with six Churches, including The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

 RELATIONS with the United Church of Christ in Japan have grown closer as a result of consultations with Church leaders and fellowship between congrega-

tions on the local level.

 REPRESENTATIVES of the KCCJ attended the executive meeting of the World Alliance of Reformed Churches in Seoul in September and the Theological Consultation which followed. This meeting helped the KCCJ to identify more closely with other member churches in this confessional body, and to discover common goals.

New Church Buildings

 THE 1970s have been years of building and re-building. Many of the buildings hastily constructed in the post-War years are in need of extensive repair, and new life-styles and programmes demand a different kind of structure.

 OSAKA CHURCH left its temporary quarters in the KCC building in June and moved into its new 5-storey structure, which includes a nursery school for 119

children.

NEW CHURCHES in CHOFU and TOKYO were completed in December.

Youth Activities

 YOUNG PEOPLE in the KCCJ are involved in the human rights movement, sing in choirs, teach in church schools and assist in adult literacy programmes.

THE ANNUAL Youth Conference at Lake Nojiri in August was attended by 80 youth and their leaders.

Women's Activities

 THE NUMBER of women participating in the Women's Association increased by over 15% during 1979.

 A SUCCESSFUL National Conference, attended by representatives from every presbytery, involved leadership training, discussion groups and fellowship.

REGIONAL leadership training rallies were held in most areas.

Personnel

- REV. KYONG SHIK "SAM" CHOI, after six years as General Secretary, resigned to accept a call to Tokyo Church. During his time in office he made many positive contributions to the Church, both in dealing with local problems of administration and development, and on the inter-Church scene. Under his leadership the KCCJ moved to full membership in the Japan-North American Commission, and extended the work to Shikoku and Okinawa where there were no Korean Churches hitherto.

Canadian Staff

REV. ROBERT K. and MRS. PRISCILLA ANDERSON continued to serve in the KCCJ where Mr. Anderson is Associate to the General Secretary, with particular responsibility for international correspondence with English work generally. He led an English class, did supply preaching, produced PR material upon request and published the newsletter ARIRANG. His book "My Dear Redeemer's Praise: The Life of Luther Lisgar Young" was published in May, 1979. Mrs. Anderson did English typing in the KCCJ office, served as the KCCJ representative on the International Christian Youth Exchange Committee and shared leadership in Bible study groups.

REV. JOHN and MRS. CLARABETH MCINTOSH continued their ministry in Osaka for the first half of 1979, where Mr. McIntosh served as Interim Director of the Christian Centre and on the pastoral team of Osaka Korean Church. Mrs. McIntosh taught in a Christian Training School for Nursery School Teachers and in the YWCA. The McIntoshes returned to Canada on study furlough in

June and have carried a heavy load of deputation.

MISS DAWN M. ROSS, until December 1979, continued as secretary in the Urban Rural Mission office of the Christian Conference of Asia in Tokyo. On January 1, 1980, she began a three-year term as Administrative Assistant in the Urban Rural Mission office of the World Council of Churches.

REV. RONALD and MRS. SUSAN WALLACE were involved in Korean language study in Seoul, Korea for the first few months of 1979. After a brief furlough, Mr. Wallace then served as Kanto Presbytery Missionary with special relationship to Yokohama Church. Mrs. Wallace worked three days a week in the Church Day Nursery, which she found helped her in learning and using the Japanese language.

THE CHURCH OF NORTH INDIA

General Secretary – Mr. A.G. Dharmaraj

 THE INTEGRATION of the former six confessional traditions, missions and the Church has been fostered by the mutual concern, caring and sharing at all the pastorate, Diocesan and Synod levels.

THÊ CNI PÉNSION SCHEME to which The Presbyterian Church in Canada

contributed along with others is working well.

 THE DOCUMENTS on Structures and Self-Reliance have been most fruitfully used and the decisions taken by the CNI, especially with regard to non-stipendary supplementary ministries, are being implemented.

 THE CNI SYNOD Board of Social Services is now moving in leaps and bounds towards development of rural and urban potentials in leadership training, finan-

cial administration and revenue generating projects.

THE CNI is drawing nearer to its target date of Self-Reliance for pastoral and evangelistic ministry. Except for a few Dioceses they are all moving towards that date with confidence and determination. The evangelistic thrust within CNI, on its borders and across its frontiers, received the foremost attention, this being CNI's Priority No. 1.

AN AMBITIOUS PLAN to build a complex to house the CNI Synod Secretar-

iat and its officers is being implemented.

Diocese of Bhopal – Bishop John A. Gonsalves

THE CHRISTIAN CHURCH unitedly protested against the so-called "Freedom of Religions Bill" which was proposed in Parliament. (It was really an "anticonversion" bill.) The members of the CNI Diocese of Bhopal expressed their solidarity with Christians of other denominations by sending joint memoranda to the President of India and staging silent and dignified street demonstrations in various cities in Madhya Pradesh. Christians in this diocese are largely apolitical, yet the political influences cannot be ignored as institutions and people suffer, such as when legitimate requests for government grants for educational institutions are stalled or denied.

CHILD CARE. Reorganization of child-care activities during the year meant hostels were delinked from schools and brought under the governing body of Diocesan Hostels. Hostel facilities are now provided for a larger number of children, and a new hostel in Bamania has been started for tribal children of Ratlam Division. Rapidly escalating prices mean that increased finances are needed. To recognize the International Year of the Child functions were held in various churches in the diocese in which the importance of child-care was

emphasized and children participated in the services.

ADULT LITERACY. Teachers⁷ Training Camps for adult literacy were held, one in Indore and one in Bhopal. Eight new rural education centres functioned under the Diocese in the rural churches of Banswara, Rajasthan, a tribal region.

STEWARDSHIP DRIVE FOR SELF-RELIANCE. Contributions from pastorates to the Diocesan Pastoral and Ministerial expenses have increased in the past three years by almost 160% and pastorates are becoming more and more self-reliant in financial matters.

 TWO OVERSEAS VISITORS with Indian experience conducted retreats for the laity and ministers during 1979-80, one of which was Dr. William Fitch of

The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

DROUGHT. Bishop Gonsalves concludes with a word about the unprecedented drought condition. "The whole State of Madhya Pradesh has been declared a famine-stricken area. The Diocese is attempting to take up relief work with other organizations, but lack of funds limits our work. Much prayer and financial assistance is needed right now."

EFFECTIVE SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM. Miss Agnes Hislop comments: "Practically all of the leaders in the Church and institutions in this area have been fitted for their responsibilities because of the Scholarship program carried on by The Presbyterian Church in Canada through the years. I salute the wisdom and perceptiveness of our earlier missionaries who saw potential leader-

ship qualities and selected the young people for higher education and training so that when responsibilities were turned over to Bhil Christians (and missionaries were working themselves out of a job) there were educated leaders to carry the torch in all aspects of Church and institutional life. In addition, educated and trained persons have gone 'out' of the Bhil field to serve competently in the Name of Jesus Christ in many parts of India and abroad."

Canadian Staff

- MISS PAULINE BROWN is the Co-ordinator for Christian Rural Health Services in the Bhil area, based in Jobat.
- MISS AGNES HISLOP continued to be involved in the teaching program with lay people, lay leaders, Women's Fellowship, officers' training and Bible Study groups. Since June she served as Manager of Amkhut Girls' and Boys' Hostels with responsibility to establish the Church of North India Council for Child Care sponsorship program. "It is a challenge," she says, "to learn to recognize and call by name all 76 children in the two hostels in Amkhut 35 girls and 41 boys let alone get to know them as individuals!"
- MISS ELEANOR L. KNOTT supervised the Home Science Department of the Helen MacDonald Memorial School in Jhansi, and served as Treasurer of the School and Hostel. She set up a card file system of the academic records, medical information, and other personal information on each student. She also introduced the use of soya products to the girls' diet.

 MISS MARGARET C. LEASK described her assignment in 1979 as filling in wherever needed in school or hostel. She served as Manager of the Helen Mac-Donald Memorial School for three months, acted as Treasurer for a few months,

and did teaching as needed.

MR. CLARENCE O. and MRS. CATHERINE MCMULLEN. In the first half of 1979 Mr. McMullen continued to give leadership to the Christian Institute of Sikh Studies in Batala. The McMullens came to Canada on furlough in June and did deputation while Clarence pursued research for his doctoral program.

 MISS DOREEN MORRISON is Director of Christian Rural Health Services (CRHS), Community Health Project, Mandleshwar and Barwani, and Acting

Nursing Superintendent, Mandleshwar Christian Hospital.

 MISS DIANA WADSWORTH served as Manager of the Helen MacDonald School in Jhansi, was Overseer of Canadian Presbyterian properties in the Jhansi area, and taught English and Art part-time.

MISS IDA WHITE terminated her service because of family illness.

THE UNITED MISSION TO NEPAL

Executive Director — Carl Johansson

 (A group of expatriates from a score of countries and 34 agencies participate in the witness and service of the UMN.)

TWO MAJOR EVENTS marked the 25th Anniversary of the UMN in 1979.

- The Jubilee Workers' Conference was held in Pokhara in January with Dr. Samuel Moffett from Korea leading in word and study. Jonathan Lindell's new book, "Nepal and the Gospel of God", set out for posterity the history of the UMN.
- 2. The General Conference in March/April, graced by the provocative and stimulating presence of Dr. Kosuke Koyama and Rt. Rev. Lesslie Newbigin, were led into study, evaluative questioning, and to commitment once again to the mission which is God's mission in Nepal. Gratitude for the past was mingled with grappling with the realities of today and tomorrow.
- A REFERENDUM was announced in 1979 which could place in the hands of the people of Nepal the basic franchise. A mood of unrest found itself taking the form of strikes and questioning, particularly in our schools and hospitals. To be commended are the maturity and steadiness of our co-workers who live, so many of them, on the cutting edge of change.

INITIATIVES. Within the Economic Development Board there was created a Rural Development Division. The Food for Work program, initiated by the Integrated Rural Development Committee, has found acceptance in government, and a magnificent responsiveness by the member bodies of UMN. "Asianization", that is, seeking to recruit a number of people from the third world to fill vacant posts within the United Mission has been emphasized. Progress has been made in Jumla, Andhikhola, and the Patan Hospital projects.

HEALTH SERVICES: This area of work is growing, but is also posing deep and basic questions; for example, "What is the posture one has towards government relationships, the community, and what is possible and appropriate?" The growth of creative relationships between community health programming and

community has been a positive experience.

Canadian Staff

DR. RICHARD W. ALLEN worked as a general practitioner within a mission hospital in the foothills until mid-November when he became community

health doctor in Kathmandu Valley.

MR. JOHN AND MRS. JUDI BERTHOLET completed their work assignment in Nepal where Mr. Bertholet was in charge of maintenance for the Ghorka Project. He was also responsible for several village water improvement programs. This work covered an area of up to five hours' walk one way. He was also responsible for all the building programs of the project and spent 10 days living in the jungle with a crew of 14 men, supervising the cutting, preparing and portering of timber for building purposes. Mrs. Bertholet was involved in literacy instruction, nutrition improvement and working with her husband in the water development program. The Bertholets returned to Canada in July.

MISS MARY NICHOL serves as director of nursing education connected with

the Shanta Bhawan Hospital in Kathmandu.

MISS PATRICIA J. POOLER continued until June 1979 as Director of Community Health, Okhaldhunga Project. Miss Pooler then took a leave of absence and was involved in a program of lay ministry and studies in Canada.

GUYANA PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

Moderator - Dr. Dale A. Bisnauth

IN RESPONSE to some of the challenges which this Church has had to face in 1979, some bold decisions were made. "This in itself indicates that our small church is not unresponsive to changes and that she is not without the capacity to be creative," reports the Moderator.
TWO YOUNG MEN and one young woman have been recruited for training at

the United Theological College of the West Indies in Jamaica.

THE CHURCH recognized the need for a thorough-going program of education

for renewal and development at every level of Church life.

LAY LEADERS have been encouraged to register for Guyana Extension Seminary courses and thought has been given to devising a uniform and comprehensive program for Sunday Schools and youth groups now that Rev. Moses Har-

sham has returned from a refresher study course in Canada.

- MINISTERS have had a 25% increase in stipend to meet the spiralling costs in Guyana. Parishes have also been challenged to take over the responsibility for the maintenance of buildings from the presbytery. "The cut of the Canadian Church's grant by one-third in 1980 is not likely to have an adverse effect on the growth of the Church," says the report. "In fact, it may have the effect of stimulating a rationalization and re-organization of the Church's financial structure.
- EAST INDIANS continued to emigrate in large numbers to other countries, and this quite naturally has a weakening effect upon the Guyana Presbyterian

Church. The urban areas of Georgetown and New Amsterdam have been affected more than elsewhere.

THE CHURCH made her presence and influence felt on the Guyana Council of Churches, in the Guyana Extension Seminary and the seminars arranged by the Caribbean Conference of Churches.

A JOINT RETREAT involving ministers and lay leaders of the Presbytery of Guyana and the Guyana Presbyterian Church, and a joint camp involving youths from the two churches were efforts made in 1979 to cement relationships between the two churches.

THE CHURCH spoke out on matters of social, economic and political import

in the country.

NEW OVERSEAS APPOINTEES

MR. GLENN and MRS. LINDA INGLIS have been accepted for a regular overseas appointment with the area of service yet to be confirmed. Mr. Inglis is a member of the 1980 graduating class from Knox College.

MR. EBER and MRS. ALLENE KELLY have been appointed as Special Volunteers to serve in Malawi where Mr. Kelly will use his talents as a Chartered Accountant to assist the church in accounting procedures and budget management.

SPECIAL OVERSEAS MINISTRIES

REV. BRIAN and MRS. ELIZABETH CROSBY terminated their service at Iona Abbey, Scotland.

REV. B.L.M. and MRS. RUTH EMBREE: Mr. Embree worked on his Th.D dissertation in preparation for service in the South East Asia Graduate School of Theology.

REV. RUSSELL and MRS. ALICE SELF serve in New York where Mr. Self is the World Scripture Distribution Consultant for the United Bible Societies.

MISS MARGARET STEWART spent all of 1979 in Canada. She attended a tropical medicine course for nurses at Seneca College, was engaged in congregational work and in Mission Education assignments for the Board of World Mission and the Leprosy Mission. She has been seconded to the Leprosy Mission and in January 1980 she left for India to attend a 4-month orientation program.

MISSION EDUCATION

- DEPUTATION by both home and overseas missionaries, by overseas visitors and Board of World Mission staff made it possible to cover 41 of the 44 presbyteries in 1979. We responded to approximately 140 requests from churches, groups, camps, presbyteries and synods. Deputation continues to be one of the most popular and effective means of mission education, providing first hand news and personal contact. We have received many indications that General Assembly Budget givings improve noticeably after a deputation visit. We have tried to encourage the use home (Canada) missionaries in order to overcome the notion that mission takes place only overseas.
- OVERSEAS VISITORS. Rev. Silas Noozana (Malawi) and the team of six from Nigeria were especially well received as overseas visitors and as "missionaries to Canada".

LITERATURE

Mission Update. The first issues of this tabloid news update about mission programs and issues were well received. There are now bulk standing orders and single copy requests for 16,000 copies of each issue.

Mission Capsules were printed and sent out with the suggestion that they

be used in bulletins or read at Sunday services.

- 3. Quick Facts continued to be a useful resource for quick information on each aspect of the Board's work. All were updated and reprinted in 1979.
- 4. Mission Resources Catalogue was published again.

AUDIO VISUAL RESOURCES

- 1. The filmstrip "John Geddie and Company" sold 82 copies.
 - A new filmstrip "With the Moderator in the New Hebrides" was produced and 23 copies sold.
- Progress was made on producing a filmstrip on Mission in the Atlantic Synod.
- A tape of General Assembly highlights which focussed on mission items and issues was produced and almost 100 copies sold or sent to overseas missionaries.
- Work was begun on a cassette tape of interviews with missionaries and overseas visitors which will be made available to groups and congregations as a resource for discussion and information.

MISSION STUDY THEMES

Material for the 1979-80 theme "Human Rights and the International Order" produced by our Church was used quite widely, especially by WMS related groups. Material for the 1980-81 theme "India and Nepal" will include a background book on India by Margaret Kennedy. The Joint Task Force on Mission Education reviews the mission study themes and resources chosen by the Commission on Education for Mission of the National Christian Council of Churches.

LAYMEN ABROAD

One educational flyer-poster entitled "Going Abroad" was mailed to all congregations.

1980 Presbyterian Church Calendar

- Portraying the theme "Human Rights and the Gospel", 42,645 copies of the 1980 Calendar were sold, and about 2500 copies were used for promotional purposes and as gifts to friends around the world.
- The theme for the 1981 Calendar will be "Mission is . . ."

RESEARCH AND PLANNING

- TASK FORCES on the following areas of mission have been active:
 - 1) China; 2) Ethnic Churches and Immigrant Churchmen; 3) Native Ministries; 4) French Ministries. These task forces prepared a number of recommendations which are being brought to the General Assembly by the Board of World Mission. Toward the end of the year two new and important Task Forces were activated: The Task Force on Priorities, which has been asked to recommend a method for reviewing and establishing the mission priorities of the Board; and the Task Force on Overseas Programs, which will have four working groups:
 - 1) East Asia and the Pacific; 2) South, Central and West Asia; 3) Africa, and 4) Caribbean and Latin America.
- REASSESSMENT OF NATIVE MINISTRIES. Perhaps the main factor which precipitated the review of policy and practice in native ministries at this time was a feeling among members of the Board of World Mission and other Church persons that, in spite of the investment of lives and money and love and prayers by Presbyterians over the past 50 years, the fruits of the Gospel amongst native people were not always easy to see. In fact, morale was reported to be low among some workers, institutions serving native people were experiencing difficulties, and recruitment of staff to this ministry was posing a challenge.
- A NUMBER OF GOALS for native ministries were identified by the task force and the Board is moving to implement them. The first goal is "to improve personnel recruitment, support and development" with an emphasis upon language and cultural studies for workers among native people. Another goal calls for "more participation by native people in direction, policy setting, and staff-

ing of native ministries". A third goal is "to support native people as they recover and develop a sense of pride and dignity and usefulness in the wider Canadian community". The development of an "Indian Church" is the fourth goal, and it encourages the discovery of ways in which the Christian church

may become more firmly rooted in Indian culture.

CHURCH GROWTH was an important focus in 1979 and the Board of World Mission was well represented on the Joint Task Force on Church Growth, created by the 1978 General Assembly, as well as on the Committee on Doubling the Membership in the Eighties (1979 Assembly). Encouraging emphasis upon, and signs of, growth were noted in reports from aid-receiving charges from coast to coast.

CHURCH AND UNIVERSITY

RECENT PROJECTS OF THE COMMITTEE

1. A workshop was held in Toronto in May, 1980, designed for clergy, young

adult-student leaders and chaplains.

 As a means of motivating and helping local congregations enlarge their ministry to students, materials have been prepared including suggestions for such a ministry, guidelines, resources available and information on what some congregations are doing.

NEW GUIDELINES were drawn up by the Committee to enable it to deter-

mine criteria for establishing new chaplaincies.

 ALTERNATE STYLES OF CAMPUS MINISTRY, such as part-time chaplaincy, are being studied by the committee. They are also seeking to involve, to a greater degree, faculty, staff and students in such a ministry.

THE RISE OF CULTS in Canada is of concern to the committee. A cassette on

cults is being prepared for distribution.

 INCREASED INTEREST on the part of some presbyteries, clergy in congregations near a campus, and by individuals, in establishing chaplaincies to colleges and universities is noted.

OVERSEAS STUDENTS. In communities where the Church is working closely with the community colleges in welcoming and orienting overseas students they made a much better adjustment to Canada than in places where this did not occur, according to the Canadian Bureau for International Education, Congregations can help by contacting colleges and universities in their local area to see if there are overseas students enrolled.

OVERSEAS SCHOLARSHIP REPORT 1979

REV. MOSES HARSHAM from Guyana completed a year of study in Canada.
 Mr. Harsham's studies included Christian Education at Ewart College and biblical study at Knox College. He returned to take up his duties as the minister of a parish.

REV. CHEN JEN SU from Taiwan completed a Master of Education programme at Selly Oak Colleges, Birmingham, England in November. He returned to Taiwan via Canada in December, where Mr. Su will take up his appointment as

Chaplain in the Chang Jung School.

— REV. DAVID MPHANDE from Malawi was admitted to the S.T.M. programme at McGill after completing his B.Th. programme. His wife MRS. MARY MPHANDE came to Canada in 1979 and she has been supported by the Board of World Mission as a scholarship student. She has taken classes in sewing and typing. Mr. and Mrs. Mphande will return to Malawi in 1980 to work with the Church of Central Africa, Presbyterian.

REV. SILAS NCOZANA, Synod of Blantyre, Church of Central Africa, Malawi
was in Canada from March 1979 to the end of July. He came to observe the
Canadian Church in several aspects of Ministry. Mr. Ncozana did effective deputation with congregations, groups and camps, General Assembly, and shared

leadership as a resource person in the Missionary Orientation Course. His visit

was supported in part by overseas scholarship funds.

The Board of World Mission has been assessing the overseas scholarship programme. Several people who have received assistance have been asked to evaluate their programme. From their reports and staff observations and study, it is hoped to make the Overseas Scholarship Programme as useful as possible in sharing development of leadership in overseas churches. The Overseas Scholarship Programme is aided greatly by special gifts. This assistance in the overseas programme is much appreciated.

MCKENZIE SCHOLARSHIP

The McKenzie Scholarship, in memory of the late D.A. McKenzie, is given to a final year theological student who has served at least three summers under the Board of World Mission and who is deemed to have rendered outstanding service to the Board. The 1980 scholarship was shared between Mr. Hugh Jack and Mr. Henry Hildebrandt.

MISSION RESIDENCE

The Board of World Mission maintains a residence primarily for Overseas Missionaries, although other Canadian Missionaires have made use of it from time to time. This four-apartment residence situated at 462 Oriole Parkway is beautifully kept and fully furnished for the missionaries and their families. The Board is indebted to Mr. and Mrs. James Whitefield who have this past year done many extra things to make the residence "a home away from home". Mr. and Mrs. Douglas Randall of Cobourg continued to do maintenance work in 1979.

Glenview Presbyterian Church, the Woman's Missionary Society (Eastern Division), Leaside Church Ladies, and Willowdale Church Ladies have made special

gifts available for the Residence.

No. 6-PRESBYTERY OF WATERLOO-WELLINGTON

Re: CALLS TO MINISTERS WITHOUT CHARGE (Referred to Clerks of Assembly)

WHEREAS, a Call extended to a minister without charge if presented, or sent directly to him or her (Book of Forms, Sec. 221); and

WHEREAS, a minister without charge is required only to present a Presbyterial Certificate from the Presbytery on whose rolls his or her name appears, to the Pres-

bytery extending a call (Book of Forms Sec. 224); and

WHEREAS, the practice of placing a Call directly into the hands of a minister without charge denies the Presbytery, on whose roll, whether on "others on the Roll" or on "the Appendix to the Roll", the name of such a minister may appear, the right and privilege of both full oversight of such a minister and reviewing the terms of the Call, before it is placed in the hands of such a minister; and

WHEREAS, because of the failure of some ministers without charge to have their name placed on the Roll of the Presbytery within whose bounds they reside, a Presbytery may be required to issue a Presbyterial Certificate for someone

hardly known to the court; and

WHEREAS, the geographical and communication conditions, which at one time made the practice of placing a Call directly into the hands of a minister without

charge, a viable one, no longer exists in this country.

To the Venerable the 106th General Assembly:

WHEREAS, concern was expressed by the Pension Board to the Venerable the 105th General Assembly that in its present direction the consequence of the Church's present Pension Plan will again be "flat" (and inadequate) pensions for ministers': and

WHEREAS, the people of our Presbyterian Church are echoing the same concern to the point that a congregation facing a five figure deficit budget proposed pur-

chasing a R.R.S.P. for its own minister; and

WHEREAS, after so many years of our "flat" pension of \$1500, per year and its

inadequacy, a new up-dated (but limited) plan was instituted; and

WHEREAS, realizing this limitation, the 102nd General Assembly increased the maximum Pensionable Earnings (stipend) from \$10,000. to \$12,000. as agreed to by the Administrative Council, to be effective January 1, 1976; and,

WHEREAS, The Pension Board recommended, the Administrative Council agreed and the General Assembly of 1976 adopted the motion that the maximum annual Pensionable Earnings (stipend) be increased to \$13,000., effective on January 1, 1977, allowing an increase of \$20,00 annual pension and producing the following:

MAXIMUM PENSION (ALLOWABLE) PURCHASED BY A NEW ENTRANT

year 1.	1974 —	\$200.
year 2.	1975	200.
year 3.	1976	240.
year 4.	1977 —	260.
ears 5 - 35.	2009 —	8,060.

MAXIMUM PENSION - \$8,960. (year 2009)

PURCHASING POWER in 2009 - \$???? - maybe \$1500, if we're fortunate; and, WHEREAS, a minister's pension decreases by over \$200, for each year of service

prior to 1974; and

WHEREAS, in spite of the Pension Board's continued expression of grave concern, the Special Committee on Pensions presented to the 104th General Assembly Recommendation 2 which was adopted and which allowed no further increase in "Pensionable Earnings" until the minimum stipend (and increments) reached \$13000.; and

WHEREAS, the 104th General Assembly defined minimum stipend as "basic sti-

pend plus increments and freehousing, including utilities", and

WHEREAS, the 105th General Assembly scheduled and adopted this definition and in lieu of an increase in basic stipends included payment of utilities under minimum stipend as the action of General Assembly, effective, January 1,1980, further retarding pension benefits for our lower-paid (stipend) ministers, but still increasing the minimum stipend well in excess of the \$13,000. limit directive; and

WHEREAS, most ministers with their Boards of Managers adjust yearly the "Total Package for Pastoral Ministry" (i.e. Stipend, Travel, House Allowance and utilities) with the objective of Income Tax savings, leaving 'stipend' as the bottom

line remuneration," and

WHEREAS, in most cases ministers can set their own divisions for Income Tax purposes, giving them the prerogative of declaring their own taxable earnings; and

WHEREAS, the present Pension Plan assesses 4% on only the stipend set by congregations, while other Pension Plans are assessed on gross earnings (the General Assembly's Minimum Stipend??);

THEREFORE the Presbytery of Ottawa humbly overtures the venerable, the 106th

General Assembly that:

The Pension Board be instructed to increase the amount of maximum "Pensionable Earnings" by \$4,000. (\$13,000. to \$17,000.), effective January 1, 1980 – this increase being less than an 8% increase for the years, 1977, 78, 79 & 80.

2. "Pensionable Earnings" be increased yearly thereafter according to the "Average Annual Increase In The Consumer Price Index" automatically by the Pension Board

3. with the past 50 years' experience confirming that a pension purchased in one year becomes minimal 10, 20, or 30 years later (when received) the Pension Board be instructed to review it's constitution and policy and develop a Pension Plan similar to plans offered the average Canadian

or do otherwise as the General Assembly in its wisdom may deem best.

WHEREAS, these contributions are insufficient on a sound actuarial basis to provide adequate pensions at age 65 or after 35 years of service:

THEREFORE, the Presbytery of Ottawa humbly overtures the venerable the 106th General Assembly that

1. The Pension Board be instructed to increase the authorized contribution the pension fund of congregations and of ministers by 50%, effective in 1981 and by another 50% (on 1979 rate) in 1982.

The Pension Board be advised to use these funds to reduce the age of retirement and the years of service required to obtain a full pension; and that the Pension Board should effect these changes at as early a date as possible in keeping with sound actuarial practice and to report its plans in this regard to the next General Assembly;

ministry"; and

WHEREAS, the Church Doctrine Committee clearly desired that only those on the appendix who hold themselves to some degree accountable to the Presbytery in the discharge of their particular function, or who are otherwise useful and accountable to the Court as Ministers of Word and Sacrament, or who having retired after years of faithful service have earned the right at least to sit and correspond; and

WHEREAS, the Church Doctrine Committee suggested, "there are undoubtedly some ministers on the appendix who being engaged in purely secular work might be considered as having forsaken their ministry and therefore ought not

to be accorded even the privilege of sitting and corresponding".

THEREFORE, the Presbytery of Lindsay-Peterborough humbly overtures the Venerable the General Assembly to preserve the integrity of the proposed new enactment, of the Presbytery as a Court, and of the Ministry itself by counselling Presbyteries to maintain their appendix under constant review, invoking and applying the substance of Section 251 of the Book of Forms in the cases of those who neither function as ministers of Word and Sacraments, nor hold themselves accountable to or participate in the life and work of the Presbytery; or to do otherwise as in its wisdom the General Assembly deems best.

WHEREAS, in Section 132 there is no real emphasis upon the "call to the elder-ship" (I Timothy 3:1)...

THEREFORE, we, the Kirk Session of St. Andrew's Church, Victoria, B.C., do humbly overture the Venerable the General Assembly to consider reviewing and rewriting Section 132 of the Book of Forms so as:

1. to place some emphasis upon "the call to the eldership" and

2. to require the Session to determine suitability for office before any election of an elder.

Or do to otherwise as the General Assembly in its wisdom may deem best.

WHEREAS, out of a grand total of 971 ministers reported on the Rolls of Presbyteries for the year ending December 31st, 1978, fewer than 150 ministers were actually serving on the Committees appointed by the General Assembly; and

WHEREAS, at the present time there are several ministers of the Church who serve on more than one of these Committees; and

WHEREAS, there are a number of persons who have repeatedly appeared as members of the standing Committees while other ministers of the Church have been totally ignored; and

WHEREAS, there are a considerable number of our ministers who display suitable gifts for such Committee work and who have never been called to serve the Church at the national level; and

WHEREAS, it is our belief that these people have much to offer that is good for a

Canadian way of life.

THEREFORE, the Presbytery of Winnipeg humbly Overtures the 106th General Assembly to instruct the Presbyterian, Knox, and Ewart Colleges, and to request the Vancouver School of Theology, to include in the required curriculum the study of Canadian Indian History, Culture and Traditional Religion in their Courses in Comparative Religions, or to do otherwise for this purpose as in their wisdom they deem best.

No. 20-PRESBYTERY OF MONTREAL

Re: REGISTRATION OF CHARITABLE ORGANIZATIONS

To the Venerable the General Assembly:

WHEREAS, a letter from Mr. Norman Creen, Comptroller, to The Presbyterian Church in Canada drew attention to the exceedingly severe penalties which can be enforced by the Department of National Revenue in the case of failure of a charitable organization to file the requisite income tax returns every year before the thirty-first day of March, namely:

a Public Information Return, form T3010, and the Annual Information

Return, form T2052; and

WHEREAS, the penalty for failure to file all such requisite returns includes revocation of the organization's charitable registration and a penalty tax of one hundred non-control the organization's not execute and

dred per cent of the organization's net assets; and

WHEREAS, it must be recognized that church management is done by volunteers, not professionals, who move in and out of office annually or more often, a fact which may cause discontinuity of leadership, and which may cause an omission to occur if the change in leadership occurs during the normal reporting period of such return; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Creen's letter indicated that the registration of almost two thousand charitable organizations have been revoked, including many churches, and including specifically three congregations of the Presbytery of Montreal, for

failure to file the aforementioned returns; and

WHEREAS, correspondence from Mr. Ian Watson, Member of Parliament, Laprairie, Province of Quebec, to one of his constituents, Mr. F. M. Groundwater, a member of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, St. Lambert, of the Presbytery of Montreal, gave assurance that no church has been penalized under the regulations requiring the filing of the aforementioned returns; and

WHEREAS, a letter on the same matter from the Minister of National Revenue to Mr. Ian Watson, Member of Parliament, Laprairie, emphasized that it is incorrect to state that the penalty tax contained in sub-sections 149 (16) and (17) of the Income Tax Act is applicable if annual returns are not submitted on time, but that the subsections actually require that when a charity's registration is revoked, all assets remaining after payment of outstanding debts and liabilities be transferred to registered charities within one year from the date of revocation; and

WHEREAS, such a policy is obviously discretionary, and subject to change; therefore

IT IS humbly overtured by the Kirk-Session of St. Andrew's Church, St. Lambert, Quebec, that the General Assembly shall:

INSTRUCT the Comptroller to ascertain if, in fact, any congregations of The Presbyterian Church in Canada have had their charitable registrations revoked, and,

if true, to publish the names of said congregation or congregations; and

INSTRUCT the Committee on Bills and Overtures, and the Committee on Business, to prepare, jointly or individually, a petition to be forwarded by the Principal Clerk of Assembly to the Minister of National Revenue, requesting action either to cancel the portions of the Act respecting penalties to churches for failure to meet the filing deadlines, or to ameliorate the penalties with respect to churches; and

INSTRUCT the Principal Clerk of Assembly to correspond with other Canadian church organizations, advising of the actions taken by The Presbyterian Church in Canada in these matters, and inviting these organizations to act in a similar

manner; or

THAT they may do otherwise for these matters what to their wisdom may seem best.

"... that no funds contributed by this congregation to the General Assembly Budget be forwarded to the World Council of Churches until that body desists from giving financial aid to terrorists or liberation groups which use

murder and worse as political tactics"; and

WHEREAS, there is considerable disquiet within a number of congregations in Westminster Presbytery, which we believe will have a continuing disturbing

effect upon the life of the Church; and

WHEREAS, this disquiet has resulted and will continue to result in the witholding of offerings to the General Assembly Budget, and Inter-Church Aid, because of the fear that such money may find its way to terrorist organizations and activities; and

WHEREAS, The Presbyterian Church in Canada and the World Council of Churches cannot give any effective guarantee that monetary support given to the Program to Combat Racism will not either directly or indirectly support the P.C.R., and other groups using violence and terrorism to further their political aims; and

WHEREAS, some recipients of the Program to Combat Racism funds have shown themselves to be violently opposed to the teachings of Christ, in their efforts

to secure power; and

WHEREAS, the Program to Combat Racism has been subverted to foster the acqui-

sition of political power; and

WHEREAS, since the 105th General Assembly news and other reports (e.g. "Liberation in Africa" pamphlet) continue to present accounts of atrocities attributed to groups receiving World Council of Churches funds, including attempts to disrupt agreed political processes by intimidation and violence; and

WHEREAS, the present course of action pursued by violent African groups supported by P.C.R. runs contrary to Reformed theology, ethics and morality as

stated in our Declaration of Faith Concerning Church and Nation; and

WHEREAS, the Program to Combat Racism support of these groups casts serious doubts upon the policies of the World Council of Churches and its member denominations and brings into serious question the acceptable activities of the W.C.C. which are in accordance with the teachings of the Lord Jesus Christ.

THEREFORE, the Presbytery of Westminster humbly overtures the Venerable the One Hundred and Sixth General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada that it serve notice upon the World Council of Churches of its intention to suspend its membership in that Council if the latter does not cease to support those organizations which use terrorism and violence to further their political and Social ends, or do otherwise for this purpose as in its wisdom the General Assembly may deem best.

THEREFORE, we, the Presbytery of Waterloo-Wellington humbly overture the venerable the 106th General Assembly, to commission a study of the present method of determining Allocations to the Budget of General Assembly with a view to creating a more equitable formula based on increasing the per member rate and decreasing the percentage tables as applied to the Congregation's total normal expenditures, and report to the next or subsequent General Assembly; or to do otherwise as the General Assembly may in its wisdom deem best.

No. 27-THE PRESBYTERY OF WATERLOO-WELLINGTON

RE: RETIRED MINISTERS ON APPENDIX TO THE ROLL OF PRESBYTERY

To the Venerable the 106th General Assembly:

WHEREAS, the present rules of the Church which permit some ministers to have their names inscribed on the constituent roll of Presbytery, and forbid to others the same recognition and courtesy, are currently honoured as much in the breach as they are in the observance; and

WHEREAS, no constituent members of the Church are removed from the active membership of the Church by reason of age or retirement, thereby depriving such members of all meaningful rights and privileges of membership, excepting

the ministers; and

WHEREAS, in the existing circumstances, a minister who has retired from the active work of the pastorate (or other), is relegated to a position of inferiority; and be he/she never so able and willing to contribute to the life and work of the Court, must nevertheless sit as a virtual 'alien' among his/her fellows, unable to vote on issues, receive minutes, initiate business and serve in a number of other capacities (except as a courtesy) — thus effectively curtailing his/her participation in work to which he/she may have made significent contributions over a period of many years; and

WHEREAS, the offence thus offered to ministers in retirement, though no doubt unintentional, is nonetheless real — as though by retiring a minister had disqualified him/herself from sitting as an equal with other members of the

Court; and

WHEREAS, the arbitrary re-classification of a retired minister which requires that his/her name be placed on an "appendix" to the roll of a Presbytery constitutes an unwarranted infringement on, and circumscription of, an individual's ordination to the ministry of the Word and Sacraments, and as such is unacceptable in the Church of Jesus Christ; and

WHEREAS, the implication that a minister who, through retirement, has no pastoral tie with a specific congregation or charge, has therefore no ministry, is

insupportable, and

WHEREAS, "It belongs to the General Assembly to erect a Presbytery, determine its bounds, fix its name, appoint the time and place of its first meeting, and name its first moderator. After being constituted by the moderator thus appointed, the Presbytery elects its own moderator.

A Presbytery cannot lawfully be prevented from choosing its own moder-

ator" (Bk. Forms, Sec. 177, p. 46).

That is to say that the Presbytery, which cannot (even by the General Assembly "lawfully be prevented from choosing its own moderator" remains under tutelage of the General Assembly in the matter of determining its own constituent membership.

THEREFORE, We, the Presbytery of Waterloo-Wellington, humbly overture the Venerable the General Assembly to rectify this unequal situation in the follow-

ing manner:

1. By defining more precisely what is intended by the phrase "rendering active service" as applied to ministers in retirement (Bk. of Forms Sec. 176 1(e))

 By authorizing Presbyteries to determine their own respective constituent memberships, with all rights, duties and privileges pertaining thereto, in accordance with the rules of the Church without prior reference to General Assembly (allowing always the right of appeal to all parties);

OR to do otherwise as the General Assembly in its wisdom may deem best.

Re: COMPULSORY ORDAINED MISSIONARY APPOINTMENTS

To the Venerable the 106th General Assembly:

WHEREAS, compulsory ordained missionary appointments denies graduating theological students the freedom to preach for a call, attributing to them a spiritual immaturity which prohibits them from faithfully discerning the Call of God; and

WHEREAS, the regulation making O.M. appointments mandatory (A. & P. 1975 B.W.M. Rec. 20) takes away from some pastoral charges the right to issue a call

to an individual; and

WHEREAS, this regulation takes away the right of the Presbytery to oversee and discern the suitability of an ordinand for the particular pastoral charge; and

WHEREAS, the stated purpose for this restriction has been "to ensure the continuing witness of our Church outside the main centers of population"; and

WHEREAS, the development of a two-year post-graduate internship supervised by the Board of World Mission has not been clearly established as the desire of the Church; and

WHEREAS, the development of this internship is evidenced by:

a) the requirement that all licentiates must have received a two year O.M. appointment before a Presbytery may proceed with ordination (A. & P. 1974 p. 203 B.W.M. rec. 5b);

b) the requirement that a Board of World Mission Certificate must be received after the Ordained Missionary has completed two years under its

appointment;

c) the requirement that all ordained ministers from other denominations coming into our church without two years pastoral experience after ordination must serve for a period of two years as an ordained missionary (A & P. 1974, p. 103, 4, B.W.M. Rec. 5a and 6): and

WHEREAS, many of the Ordained Missionary appointments outside the main centers of population are now being filled by those other than those recently

ordained; and

WHEREAS, the present system has no standard by which it's necessity can be substantiated in the present circumstance of many more candidates for the Ministry of Word and Sacrament.

THEREFORE: The Presbytery of Miramichi humbly overtures the General As-

sembly:

. to suspend the current regulations which made O.M. appointing compul-

sory, for a period of three years.

 to direct our colleges to a prayerful commitment to develop among their students a piety which will better equip them in discerning the Call of God, or that the General Assembly do otherwise toward this end as in its wisdom may seem best.

Re: FREEDOM OF CONSCIENCE

To the Venerable 106th General Assembly:

WHEREAS, the Westminster Confession of Faith Chapter 20 Section 2 states: "God alone is Lord of the conscience, and hath left it free from the doctrine and commandments of men which are in anything contrary to His Word, or beside it, in matters of faith and worship. So that to believe such doctrines, or to obey such commandments out of conscience, is to betray true liberty of conscience; and the requiring of an implicit faith, and an absolute obedience is to destroy liberty of conscience and reason also"; and

WHEREAS, the authority of Church Courts is "Ministerial and declarative announcing what Christ has revealed, and applying His law according to His direction"

(Book of Forms #3); and

WHEREAS, the W.C.F. states the following as reaffirmed in A. & P. (1966 p. 267): (Synods and Councils) "are to make their decrees and determinations in a manner 'consonant to the Word of God' (31:3). When such decisions are so made they are to be received with respect and obedience not only for their agreement with the Word, but also for the power whereby they are made is being an ordinance of God appointed thereunto in His Word" (31:3); and

WHEREAS, the W.C.F. also states "that the authority of such assemblies is to be held in great respect, yet their determinations are to be considered neither

infallible nor obdurate of review" (31:4); and

WHEREAS, the freedom of conscience is foundational to the process of correcting resolutions of courts, and of reformulating the faith, in a manner consonant

to the Word of God (see Romans 10:17, 14:23); and

WHEREAS, it follows that the forbidding of dissent, as it is allowed in Chapter 20 of the W.C.F., threatens; not only "conscience and reason" but also the prophetic voice against trends of the time that can and do affect resolutions of Synods and Councils; and

WHEREAS, the decision taken by the Presbytery of East Toronto denying Mr. Dan MacDougal ordination elevates participation in the ordination of women to a

new test of orthodoxy; and

WHEREAS, no-one in The Presbyterian Church in Canada was required at the time of their ordination to vow their participation in the ordination of women; and

WHEREAS, if the ordination of women becomes an article of faith required for ordination it could also become a requirement for inductions, thus excluding from further ministries all persons already serving in The Presbyterian Church in Canada who on grounds of conscience cannot participate in the ordination of Women.

THEREFORE, the Presbytery of Miramichi humbly overtures the Venerable, the 106th General Assembly:

- To reaffirm freedom of conscience as taught by Scripture and expressed in the Westminster Confession of Faith (Chapter 20, Sec. II);
- 2. To direct all lower courts of the Church to ensure this freedom of conscience to all within their bounds;
- To uphold the appeal of Mr. D. McDougall arising from the decision of the Presbytery of East Toronto;

or that the General Assembly do otherwise toward this end as in its wisdom may seem best.

WHEREAS, term membership on Session could ensure that the Session was representative of a constantly changing membership in some of our congregations;

and

WHEREAS, it is desirable to involve more men and women in the governing and pastoral work of the church.

THEREFORE, the Session of Atwood Presbyterian Church humbly overtures the

venerable 106th General Assembly that:

- The necessary procedures be followed by the General Assembly under the Barrier Act to alter the Book of Forms to allow the institution of the following system of term membership on Session within those congregations that deem it desirable and helpful to the work of the Church in their area.
- 2) A session wishing to opt for a system of term membership on sessions be allowed to do so with the approval of its presbytery.

In this system of term membership on session the following be stipulated:

a) That the term of office for an elder be six years

b) That after serving each term of six years an elder have the option of continuing for a further six years or of demitting for a minimum of two years before being eligible for re-election if he or she wishes,

or to do otherwise as the 106th General Assembly deems best in its wisdom.

courts of the Church; and

WHEREAS, our subordinate standards also provide for liberty in respect to matters of conscientious conviction based on a plausible interpretation of Holy Scripture; and

WHEREAS, insistence by a court on absolute conformity to criteria other than those directly involved in the Preamble and prescribed Questions may violate such liberty of conscience, discriminate against candidates otherwise qualified, provoke needless divisions at a crucial point in our Church's history, and weaken our witness in the world.

- I, Reverend Mariano Di Gangi, D.D., therefore, humbly memorialize the Venerable, the 106th General Assembly to:
- define the relevance of the 20th chapter of the Westminster Confession of Faith to the tension between liberty of conscience and ecclesiastical judgment; and
- rule on whether or not satisfactory answers to matters related to the prescribed Questions in the context of the authorized Preamble shall be considered sufficient to proceed with ordination or induction; or, that the General Assembly do otherwise for this object what to their wisdom may seem best.

No. 38-SESSION OF KNOX CHURCH, WINDSOR

Re: SPECIAL APPEALS

To the Venerable the 106th General Assembly:

WHEREAS, the Presbyterian Church in Canada in obedience to its LORD'S command, to go into all the world and disciple all people, and under the hand of its General Assembly has established a fund namely "The Budget", to facilitate that task and pay operating expenses: and

WHEREAS, The Presbyterian Church in Canada under the hand of the General Assembly has established, though not fully funded, a second source of revenue in "The National Development Fund", to strengthen that work and provide

additional expansion funds: and

WHEREAS, The Presbyterian Church in Canada under the hand of the General Assembly has now issued a third appeal in the "Second Century Advance for Christ", to obtain further outreach monies, and to assist congregations to build or expand their church religious plant; and

WHEREAS, some Presbyteries have issued similar appeals for building funds within their bounds and in competition with the General Assembly's appeal leaching out funds that weaken the overall expansion of the Presbyterian Church; and

WHEREAS, this multiplicity of appeals make a burdensome and impossible task for some congregations to meet, and at the same time keep their own life's work viable; and

WHEREAS, this multiplicity of appeals cause confusion as to where the loyalties of a congregation lie; and

WHEREAS, there is no objection to congregations or presbyteries making known throughout the bounds the need for gift or loan monies.

THEREFORE, the Session of Knox Presbyterian Church, Windsor, Ontario, of the Presbytery of Chatham humbly overtures the Venerable, the General Assembly, to enact legislation restricting Presbytery Building Fund Appeals by

allocations within its bounds while the General Assembly's appeal goes unmet, and to further enact legislation restricting Presbytery project allocations from its member congregations to a sum no greater than its annual assessment to those same congregations, or to do otherwise for this purpose that in its wisdom it may deem best.

ADDITIONAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MINISTRY

To The Venerable the 106th General Assembly:

Various actions since the printing deadline for the main Report of the Board of Ministry have necessitated this Additional Report.

A. Nomination for the position of General Secretary

RECOMMENDATION NO. 13A

That the Rev. James W. Evans, B.Ed., D.D., be appointed as General Secretary of the Board of Ministry, effective at a time following this General Assembly convenient to Dr. Evans and the Board.

B. The Vancouver School of Theology

The Interim Agreement between the Vancouver School of Theology, the St. Andrew's Hall Board, and The Presbyterian Church in Canada has now been signed by officers of the three parties to the Agreement. The occasion was publicly recognized and celebrated at the Vancouver School of Theology Convocation on May 7, 1980, with an exchange of documents between representatives of the three parties. The Rev. James Statham, Chairman of the St. Andrew's Hall Board represented that body; The Rev. Dr. Jesse E. Bigelow and Dr. John C. Cooper represented the documentation, the former specifically representing the Moderator of the 105th General Assembly, The Rev. Dr. Kenneth G. McMillan.

The terms of the Interim Agreement are as follows:

THIS AGREEMENT made in quadruplicate as of the first day of September, in the year of our Lord One Thousand Nine Hundred and Seventy-Nine.

BETWEEN:

VANCOUVER SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY, a body

corporate of 6000 Iona Drive, Vancouver, British Columbia

(hereinafter called "the School")

OF THE FIRST PART

AND:

THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA, of 50

Wynford Drive, Don Mills, Ontario

(hereinafter called "the Church")

OF THE SECOND PART

AND:

ST. ANDREW'S HALL, a body corporate, of 6040 Iona

Drive, Vancouver, British Columbia

(hereinafter called "St. Andrews")

OF THE THIRD PART

WHEREAS the School and the Church, believing that an association between them will serve the interests of both, and it being contemplated that the Church may in due course become a participating denomination in the School, and St. Andrews having agreed to affiliate with the School for the purposes hereof;

WITNESSETH that in pursuance of such purposes, the parties hereto do mutually covenant and agree as follows:—

- The Church and the School shall co-operate as associates in achieving their respective objectives;
- The Church accepts the objectives of the School as stated in Section 41 of the Vancouver School of Theology Act;
- The Church shall authorize its presbyteries to take on trials for licence graduates of the School who are certified as candidates for the ministry of the Church;
- 4. In response to the Church and St. Andrews not offering degree courses in theology at St. Andrews, the School shall educate such students as the Church certifies to attend the School and hereafter referred to as "certified students":
- The Church shall be responsible for payment of the tuition fees of certified students and be principally responsible for bursary and aid funds required by them;
- 6. (a) The Church shall provide at its own cost chaplaincy services for certified students. As is the case with participating denominational chaplains, the Principal of the School will initiate action to arrange for chaplaincy services. Related appointments would be subsequent to agreement between the School and the Church;
 - (b) The Church and the School shall provide for denominational studies for certified students in a manner patterned on the arrangements for Anglican Church of Canada and United Church of Canada denominational studies; these studies shall be a part of the Level II or equivalent programme of the School given under the general direction of the Director of Studies and instruction in the Church's polity will be taught by a person appointed by the Church. The costs of this teaching of the Church's polity shall be borne by the Church:
- 7. The Church shall take all steps that may be necessary for the affiliation of St. Andrews with the School on the following terms:
 - (a) St. Andrews will not offer courses of instruction leading to a degree in theology or grant any such degree during the term of this Agreement;
 - (b) The Board of Management of St. Andrews will retain full charge of the management of St. Andrews and be responsible for its finances;
 - (c) The School will be consulted before the appointment of the principal administrative officer of St. Andrews;
 - (d) On the affiliation of St. Andrews with the School, the Church will be entitled to appoint one member of the Board of Governors of the School and one member of the Senate, and the School will be entitled to nom-

inate one person for appointment by the General Assembly of the Church to be a member of the Board of Management of St. Andrews;

- (e) While St. Andrews will retain its property and the School will have no financial responsibility for its maintenance, the School shall be consulted before any proposed change is made in the use of this property.
- 8. Until an affiliation agreement has been entered into between the School and St. Andrews, the School and the Church shall ensure insofar as it is within their power to do so that the following provisions are implemented:
 - (a) The Church shall be entitled to send a member of the Board of Management of St. Andrews as an observer to the meetings of the Board and an observer to the Senate of the School;
 - (b) The Board of Governors of the School shall be entitled to send an observer to the meetings of the Board of Management of St. Andrews;
 - (c) Any change in the use of the property of St. Andrews shall be made only after consultation with the School;
 - (d) St. Andrews shall not offer courses of instruction leading to a degree in theology or grant any such degree during the term of this Agreement;
- 9. The School and the Church agree that this association shall be publicly recognized;
- 10. This Agreement shall come into force on September 1st, 1979, and shall continue for the term of five (5) years, provided that either the School or the Church may terminate it by giving at least one (1) year's notice of termination to take effect at the end of the academic year (June 30);
- 11. The Church will review its association with the School after three (3) years of the term of the Agreement have expired.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF the School and St. Andrews have caused their Corporate Seals to be affixed in the presence of their proper officers in that regard and the General Assembly of the Church has authorized these presents to be executed on its behalf by its proper officers in that regard.

At a meeting between Dr. J.C. Cooper and the St. Andrew's Hall Board on May 3, 1980, the following recommendations to the General assembly were concurred in by the St. Andrew's Hall Board.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 14 C.

For the duration of the five-year term of Association between The Presbyterian Church in Canada and the Vancouver School of Theology; and of Affiliation between St. Andrew's Hall and the Vancouver School of Theology:

(a) That the Board of Ministry be responsible for locating and co-ordinating bursary funds to cover the fees of Presbyterian students at the School on the

following basis:

(i) 100% of the fees of students from the Synods of British Columbia, Alberta and Saskatchewan (who are closer to the V.S.T. than to either of our other theological colleges).

(ii) 50% of the fees of students from the Synod of Manitoba and Northwestern Ontario (who are closer to Knox College than to the V.S.T. but are still

considered Western).

(iii) All other applications to be considered in the light of availability of funds.

with no guarantee that fees will be paid.

(b) That the St. Andrew's Hall Board be responsible for locating and co-ordinating bursary funds within British Columbia to assist Presbyterian students at the Vancouver School of Theology with bursary and aid funds required by them, other than for the payment of fees.

(c) That the Board of Ministry and the St. Andrew's Hall Board full inform each other of financial assistance to Vancouver School of Theology students at the

time grants are made.

(d) That Church agencies outside of British Columbia, and specifically sources of bursary funds outside of British Columbia, consult the Board of Ministry before awarding bursaries to Presbyterian students certified to the Vancouver School of Theology, to ensure equitable distribution of funds.

(e) That the Board of Ministry, in consultation with the St. Andrew's Hall Board,

be the principal liaison between the Church and the Vancouver School of

Theology.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 15 C.,

That in preparation for the Agreement of Affiliation with the Vancouver School of Theology, the St. Andrew's Hall Board undertake the revision of the Act incorporating the Hall to permit the implementation of the decisions of the 105th General Assembly, in consultation with the Board of Ministry and with legal advice.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 16 C.

That the St. Andrew's Hall Board negotiate the Affiliation Agreement with the Vancouver School of Theology, in consultation with the Board of Ministry.

For the academic year 1979-80, on the recommendation of the Presbytery of Westminster and of St. Andrew's Hall Board, the Board of Ministry appointed the Rev. David W. Stewart, the Rev. Ian J.P. Morrison, and Dr. John A. Ross to provide chaplaincy services and teach Presbyterian distinctives on behalf of the Church to our students at V.S.T. for one academic year.

There is some feeling on the part of St. Andrew's Hall Board that this arrangement could be improved. The St. Andrew's Hall Board has ther fore agreed to convene a meeting of its representatives with the Ministry Committee of Westminster Presbytery, the three chaplains, and the Presbyterian V.S.T. students who are available this summer, to evaluate the chaplaincy services and the teaching of Presbyterian distinctives in the academic year 1979-80, and to recommend to the Board of Ministry what provision should be made for future academic years.

COMMUNICATION SERVICES COMMITTEE – SUPPLEMENTARY REPORT

A REPORT FROM THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF BURNING BUSH PRODUCTIONS INC.

To The Venerable the 106th General Assembly:

The 100th General Assembly expressed concern about the lack of television programs for children which presented attitudes and values that we, as Presbyterians, hold. As a result, with a \$13,500 grant from the National Development Fund, a 30 minute pilot for a proposed series of 26 children's television programs entitled "MY PLACE" was produced and shown to the 101st General Assembly. It was the intention of the Communication Services Committee to use the Pilot to sell the program concept as a basis of a television series to major television networks and/or commercial sponsors both within and outside of Canada.

In order to facilitate and guarantee proper contractural and legal obligations of production, marketing, funding and copyright for media productions, the 101st General Assembly approved the establishment of a Canadian corporation called Burning Bush Productions Inc. with a charter to produce and distribute television programs. This company which was incorporated on September 22, 1975, was "to fund, supervise and carry out projects in the field of television, radio, film, record-

ing and any other related projects." (A. and P. 1975 – pages 464-465).

In November, 1976 permission was granted by the Administrative Council for the Communication Services Committee and Burning Bush Productions Inc. to carry out a financial campaign throughout the church from January 1, 1977 through to May 1, 1977 in order to raise \$300,000 to finance the 26 half hour children's television programs. Also, effective January 1, 1977, Burning Bush Productions Inc. was registered as a federal charitable organization for tax purposes.

During the campaign the Pilot was shown to some 65 congregations and presbyteries and letters soliciting funds were sent to every congregation and to 60 foundations. While the Pilot was enthusiastically received, the financial response was very disappointing, with only \$30,000 having been raised by the end of the

campaign.

The 103rd General Assembly recognized that the project must be aborted due to lack of funds. It agreed "that Burning Bush Productions Inc. be authorized to use the contributions received for the "MY PLACE" project in support of other forms

of children's television programming," (A. and P. 1977 - page 58).

In September 1978 the Communication Services Committee began to plan for the utilization of the remaining "MY PLACE" project funds on a children's television program to celebrate the International Year of the Child in 1979. In cooperation with the children's Department of the C.B.C. a 30 minute television special entitled "SERENDIPITY SPYGLASS" was produced and shown on National C.B.C. television on November 24, 1979 and February 24, 1980. This television special, costing \$21,500, was assisted by a \$2,500 grant from the Canadian International Year of the Child Committee in Ottawa. As well as the two television showings, a 16 mm print of the film was added to the Audio-Visual Resources Library for circulation to all church congregations.

Following the completion of this television special the Committee and the Board of Directors assessed the overall viability of Burning Bush Productions, particularly in the area of producing and distributing television programs. The Committee firmly believes that in the 1980's the emphasis should now turn away from the high cost of producing commercial television programs and be aimed at the whole

new area of video ministry.

With this in mind the directors of Burning Bush Productions, in consultation with the Communication Services Committee, unanimously approved in April 1980 the purchase of new colour video equipment at a cost of \$7,000 (camera, portable record/playback unit, tripod and lighting system) to be used exclusively to assist

the boards, committees and church organizations in this whole new area of video

ministry.

Because of budgetary constraints we believe that the original mandate for keeping Burning Bush Productions Inc. as an ongoing identity is no longer financially valid or necessary. The annual legal and audit fees just to keep the charter alive, will deplete what monies remain by the end of 1980.

After giving this careful study and with the advice of Miss Candice Hanson, of the law firm of Cassels, Brock, the Church lawyers, we hereby submit the following:

RECOMMENDATION 4 A.

That the Board of Directors of Burning Bush Productions, through the Communication Services Committee, recommends to the 106th General Assembly that:

(a) The Ontario Corporation known as Burning Bush Productions Inc. be dissolved by December 31, 1980.

(b) The Corporation be deregistered as a federal charitable organization.

(c) The present video equipment be turned over to the Communication Services Committee to be used to initiate the new video ministry programs.

(d) The Corporate name "Burning Bush Productions Inc." be transferred to the Communication Services Committee to be used to identify all of their future audio, video, film and filmstrip productions.

(e) Upon winding up the dissolution of the Corporation, what remains after the satisfaction of its debts, liabilities and obligations, all remaining monies be transferred to the Trustee Board of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

SUPPLEMENTARY REPORT OF THE BOARD OF WORLD MISSION

TAIWAN

Several times during the past six years, General Assemblies of The Presbyterian Church in Canada have expressed alarm at developments in Taiwan, recorded solidarity with the Presbyterian Church in Taiwan and its leaders, and stated their concern for the rights and freedom of all the people of Taiwan. Events in Taiwan during the past year, which have resulted in the arrests of 50 Taiwanese including Dr. C.M. Kao, the General Secretary of the Presbyterian Church in Taiwan, have shocked Christians and all freedom loving people throughout the world.

In view of the latest actions against the leadership of the Presbyterian Church in Taiwan and the continued unwillingness of the Government of the Republic of China to respond affirmatively to the expression of hope of the Taiwanese people:

RECOMMENDATION 28 A

That the 106th General Assembly:

1. Express its concern for all the people of Taiwan in that the rights of free elections and the determination of their own future destiny through participatory democracy have not been realized, and especially for those who have been persecuted for their activities in the pursuit of these goals.

2. Express its confidence in the integrity and leadership of Dr. C.M. Kao, General Secretary of the Presbyterian Church in Taiwan, who is well-known throughout the Christian world as a committed pastor who follows in his daily life the teaching of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ that his disciples should minister to those in need, not counting the risks or costs to their own safety or security;

Express its respect for and solidarity with the Presbyterian Church in Taiwan
and its leadership for its innovative evangelistic outreach, its devotion to the
life of Christian discipleship, and its courageous non-violent affirmation of the
God-given rights of all the people in Taiwan;

4. Express its assurance to the families of those detained of its profound concern for their welfare and continuing prayer for their daily undergirding by Almighty God:

5. Express its hope that these cases may be speedily reviewed by those in positions of authority and responsibility in the Government of the Republic of China, in eager anticipation that Dr. Kao and the others may be released to return to their homes and positions of leadership.

6. Urge the Government of Canada and Canadian groups carrying on trade and commerce with Taiwan to find immediately effective ways to express Canada's concern that basic human rights are being denied to large groups of people in Taiwan.

REPORT RE DEGREES OF MINISTERS

To the Venerable the 106th General Assembly:

The General Assembly of 1953 did enact:

1. That each minister be requested to give to the Clerk of his Presbytery, relevant information concerning his academic degrees and the universities, colleges, or seminaries by which these degrees have been conferred.

2. That this information be printed once every five years (e.g. 1955, 1960, 1965, etc.) in the Appendices to the Acts and Proceedings of the General Assembly,

but as a separate report from the Statistical and Financial Returns.

3. That academic degrees, the origin of which has not been acknowledged, be not printed in the yearly Statistical and Financial Returns.

Further:

What shall be done about ministers who fail to report degrees to the Clerk of Presbytery, and yet use them, is a matter primarily for the Presbytery discipline.

See A. & P., G.A. 1953, pp 93, 94, 395, 396.

SYNOD OF ATLANTIC PROVINCES

REVEREND FREDERICK PAULEY

Born in Belfast, Northern Ireland, Frederick Pauley received his early education there. He was a graduate of The Bible Training Institute, Glasgow, Scotland,

and worked as an aircraft inspector in Northern Ireland.

Fred came to Canada in 1953 with his wife May, and served as Catechist in the Oxford, Pugwash, Riverview Charge in Pictou Presbytery from 1953 to 56. He attended Acadia Divinity School and received his B.Th. and M.Th. degrees from The American Bible School. In 1956 Fred began his courses at The Presbyterian College, Montreal, and in April 1959 received the certificate of The College.

He was ordained by The Presbytery of Pictou on June 23rd, 1959, when his appointment by The Mission Board to the Oxford, Pugwash, and Riverview Charge was recognized. He was inducted into that same Charge on September 23, 1960.

On April 5th, 1962 Fred was inducted into the Durham, Green Hill, Salt

Springs Charge, where he served until his retirement on March 31st, 1975.

In 1970 Fred received an honorary D.D. degree from Pine Hill, Halifax, in recognition of his contributions to the study of the history of the churches of Pictou County, and his major effort, in 1969, towards the construction of a log replica church at Loch Broom, site of one of the first churches in Pictou County. He served as Moderator of The Synod of The Atlantic Provinces in 1969-70, and of The Presbytery of Pictou in 1964.

Active as supply after his retirement, Fred devoted 26 years of faithful and dedicated service to The Church within Pictou Presbytery, before returning on October 6th, 1979, to his native Belfast, Northern Ireland. He had already become active in the Presbyterian congregations there, when news of his sudden death on

December 28th, 1979 reached across the waters.

The Presbytery of Pictou records his sudden death with the deepest of regrets, acknowledging the loss of a good friend and faithful co-worker. And we express our most sincere sympathy to May.

SYNOD OF TORONTO & KINGSTON

REVEREND K. W. HOUSE

The Presbytery of East Toronto places on record its deep gratitude to God for the life and ministry of Rev. Kenneth William House, a retired minister of The Presbyterian Church in Canada, who died in Toronto on March 13, 1980, at the age of seventy-two.

Born in Sydney Mines, Nova Scotia, he received his primary education there and later was graduated from McGill University with the degree of Bachelor of Arts. He pursued theological studies at Presbyterian College, Montreal, graduating in 1933, was ordained, and appointed to the pastoral charge of Riverfield and Howick, P.Q. His other pastorates were: Hagerwille, Timmins, Queen Street East, Toronto, and Fallingbrook, Scarborough, Ontario. For seventeen years, Mr. House gave outstanding service as a Chaplain of the Royal Canadian Air Force where a noteworthy part of his ministry was his valued counselling to service personnel. After he retired from the Chaplaincy service, ex-servicemen continued to seek him out, expressing

appreciation for his kindnesses and help. Squadron Leader House's ability as a teacher was recognized by the R.C.A.F. in his term appointment at College Militaire

Royal de St-Jean, St-Jean, Québec, where he taught philosophy.

Kenneth was a faithful and beloved pastor possessing a deep concern and love for people. He was an eloquent preacher. His provocative sermons marked by soundness of exposition and clarity of thought contributed greatly to the spirituality of his people. He had an engaging sense of humour which was always charitable. His ministry was worthy of the finer traditions of the Church.

Diligent in Presbytery, he was very highly regarded by his fellow ministers.

His friendship was gladly given and treasured by his wide circle of friends.

Predeceased by his first wife, Evelyn, he leaves to mourn his wife Margaret, of Scarborough, his daughter Sylvia and granddaughter, Brenda, who reside in Peterborough.

The funeral service was held in Toronto on March 17, 1980, and was conducted by Rev. W. W. MacNeill, Clerk of the Presbytery of East Toronto.

REVEREND CHARLES McCARROLL

The Rev. Charles McCarroll was born in London, England, in 1905. With his parents he emigrated to Toronto, Canada, in 1914 and attended King Edward Public School and Harbord Collegiate. It had been his hope to proceed to the university, but his father becoming blind, he was compelled to enter the business world in order to support his parents and the rest of the family. Ultimately he attended the Toronto Bible College, and, deciding to enter the ministry, the University of Western Ontario and Knox College, graduating in 1952. Ordained by the Presbytery of London, he held charges at Molesworth, Ilderton, Knollwood Park in London, Knox Church in Hamilton, Cookstown, and finally at Brussels, Ontario. Retiring in 1974, he and his wife moved to Toronto. Almost immediately, he was appointed as stated supply to the Logan Geggie Charge in the Presbytery of West Toronto, where he served until February 1978. Incapcitated from active duty by severe strokes, he died on November 9, 1979.

Mr. McCarroll was a most faithful pastor and preacher. He spent the morning in his study, the afternoon visiting in homes and hospitals, the evening in attending meetings or in further visiting. He was a forceful preacher, a warm personality, an understanding heart and beloved by all who knew him. He is survived by his wife who still lives in Toronto and by two sons, both of whom reside in Hamilton. His son Paul is minister of St. Cuthbert's Presbyterian Church, Hamilton, and his other son is principal of a public school in Hamilton.

REVEREND D. S. JACKSON

Mr. Jackson was born in Strathroy, Ontario on May 26th. 1911. His family moved to Stratford, Ontario, one and a half years later. His early education was received in Stratford. Donald Jackson is a graduate of the University of Western Ontario in London. From there he enrolled in Presbyterian College, Montreal; from which place he graduated in 1942. It was while in Stratford that he met and eventually married Grace E. MacMillan.

His first charge was St. Andrew's Tillsonburg and St. Andrew's in Windham Centre; where he served from 1942 to 1944. Don was active in youth work here and coached the local Football Team. He was also a member of the local Lions

Club.

In 1944 he accepted a call to Paterson Memorial Church in Sarnia and stayed there until 1949. It was while he was here that Donald Jackson began a new work in Meadowlea Public School which was eventually to become the Laurel Lea Presbyterian Church. He served on the Board of Directors of the Sarnia and Lambton County Childrens Aid Society as its President.

In 1949, Mr. Jackson was called to Port Credit, and during his 30 years in St. Andrew's, was instrumental in building a Christian Education Wing and a new

Manse. St. Andrew's in Port Credit also donated the full purchase price for property for a new church in the West Toronto Presbytery. Donald was a member of the local Rotary Club, and worked for the establishment of the Mississauga Hospital.

He has served the Presbyterian Church in Canada as Moderator of the Presbyteries of Sarnia, West Toronto and Brampton. He was nominated to serve as Moderator of Synod, but declined. In addition he served on several General Assembly Boards, and on the Toronto Religious Advisory Committee of the C.B.C. He served on the Board of Managers of Presbyterian College in Montreal. Also he served on the Pension Board of the Church.

Two young people have entered the Ministry of the Church during his ministry,

the Rev. Marshall Jess and the Rev. Helen Goggin.

Mr. Jackson is survived by his wife, Grace; daughter Donna Grace and sonin-law James Burns, also by his three brothers Robert, David and Calvin and their respective families.

Many indeed are the words that could be used to express something of the characteristics of the life that was lived among us. Let us say that in Don Jackson we found a warm sense of his being a "bearer of glad tidings", proclaimed by Jesus

Christ.

He will long be remembered in his church, and by those who associated with him, for his evangelical fervour and solid expository preaching, all of which marked him as a man of God. And yet with it all there was a beautiful simplicity of style that endeared children to himself. The countless people who sought him out for counselling, found in him a most kind, compassionate and generous Christian. He gave himself unstintingly in the service of the Lord he loved. The members of Presbytery knew him as an able debater, and at all times a Christian gentleman. We will miss his wisdom as well as his warm sense of humour.

REVEREND WILLIAM A. YOUNG

The Reverend William A. Young, retired Presbyterian minister, died on January

9th, 1980, after a prolonged illness.

Dr. Young graduated from Ontario Agricultural College in 1926, and, following in the footsteps of his father, trained for the ministry, graduating from Knox College in 1929.

Dr. Young's first charge was Manotick and Kars, where he met and married Marion Waldron. From Manotick he went to Hensall and then for ten years was minister at Fergus, except for a two year interlude when he served as chaplain in the armed forces.

Dr. Young will be best remembered for his service as chaplain to Ontario Agricultural College. The students found in him a wise counsellor, a concerned friend, and a helper in every hour of need. He encouraged them; he challenged them; and when they completed their studies, he helped them choose their life's work, and he has left behind a rich memory which will be long cherished.

On his retirement from College, Dr. Young went to live in the Village of Elora, where he served, not only his Church, but the whole community, with much zeal

and energy until failing health forced him to curtail his activities.

Left to mourn Dr. Young are his wife, Marion, and five daughters: Ruth (Mrs. Wm. Hopper), Diantha (Mrs. Frank Jackson), Nora (Mrs. Neil Stoskops), Patricia (Mrs. Glen Wittur), and Joan (Mrs. John McGinness), as well as a brother, Rev. M. C. Young and a sister, Ruth (Mrs. J. Wilson).

The funeral service was held from St. Andrew's Church, Fergus, under the direction of the minister, Rev. J. M. Laurenson, assisted by Rev. K. J. Wilson (representing the Moderator of the Presbytery), and by Rev. Robert Whitehead, minister of Knox Church, Elora. The Rev. J.D. Wilkie, a classmate of Dr. Young's preached the sermon.

The Presbytery gives thanks to God for this life, and for the rich memory that it leaves behind, and we extend Sincerest Sympathy to all members of the family.

REVEREND NEIL DOUGLAS MACDONALD

Dr. MacDonald was born at Bowmanville, Ontario on December 29th, 1889. Dr. MacDonald received his early training in the west, graduating from the University of Alberta with his Bachelor of Arts Degree in 1915 and his Master of Arts degree in 1916.

Dr. MacDonald's Theological Training commenced with Robertson Theological College receiving his Diploma from that college in 1919. He was awarded there the McLean Training College Scholarship. In 1919, he received his Bachelor of Divinity Degree from the University of Alberta.

Dr. MacDonald's active ministry covered close to sixty years.

Dr. MacDonald was honoured with the Doctor of Divinity degree in 1961 from Knox College.

On three occasions, Dr. MacDonald served as Moderator of the Presbytery of Hamilton and Moderator of the Synod of Hamilton and London in 1960.

He served on the General Assembly's Board of Education and also as the Examiner of Catechists for the Board of World Mission.

Dr. MacDonald served in the capacity of Stated Supply at Knox Church, Port Dover. 1966-1976

Dr. MacDonald died on October 31, 1979 and his funeral took place in St. John Church on November 5th, 1979.

Dr. MacDonald is survived by his wife Alice, a son Neil and a daughter Joan.

SYNOD OF MANITOBA & NORTHWESTERN ONTARIO

REVEREND WILLIAM GORDON MACLEAN

On February 29, 1980 Dr. William Gordon Maclean passed away at Deer

Lodge Hospital in Winnipeg.

Dr. Maclean was born in Scotland in 1886 and studied for the ministry at the Universities of Aberdeen and St. Andrew's. He served as a chaplain with the British Army in Egypt and Palestine from 1916-18. He was parish minister in Dunbartonshire, Scotland, until 1932 when he came to Canada as minister of First Presbyterian Church, Winnipeg. In 1940 he went overseas with the Queen's Own Cameron Highlanders and became Senior Protestant Chaplain of the Second Canadian Division. He maintained an interest in the regiment and the A.N.A.F. Veterans. Dr. Maclean was Moderator of the Presbyterian Church in Canada in 1946, and although he retired in 1962 he continued to serve his Church as Minister Emeritus until his death.

Dr. Maclean held the respect and love of his people in First Church, Winnipeg, for forty-eight years. He was a devoted visitor, and in turn he welcomed visitors to his home. He was a thoughtful and helpful friend to many young men and students who came to Winnipeg during his long pastorate. Dr. Maclean was respected by his colleagues and also the wider community for his gifts of mind, as he was also enjoyed for his individuality.

He is survived by his wife Christina; daughters Kathryn Brett in Bermuda, Margaret Town in Vancouver, and sons, Gordon in Montreal, John in Winnipeg and Donald in Toronto. He is also survived by twenty grandchildren and one great grandchild.

The funeral service was held at First Presbyterian Church on March 4th with the Rev. Dr. Bruce A. Miles and the Rev. J. D. Marnoch officiating. Interment followed in Kildonan Presbyterian Cemetery.

Dr. Maclean will long be remembered for his faithful ministry and significant contribution to the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

SYNOD OF SASKATCHEWAN

REVEREND WILLIAM WIGHT MOORE

William Wight Moore was born on the Mistawasis Indian Reserve in September of 1896, when his parents, missionaries to Indian Canadians, were resident there. Later he lived with his parents in different parts of Saskatchewan — then known as the North-West Territories. After completing High School he attended the University of Saskatchewan, graduating in Arts and later in Theology from St. Andrew's College. Unfit for military service in World War 1, he served as a hospital worker during some of his university years, and especially during the flu epidemic of 1919. He later obtained a certificate for teaching school. In 1927 he returned to his birthplace, where he served as Missionary for more than twenty-nine years, and as teacher for nineteen and a half years, at which time he was responsible for the Mission Residence where children boarded during the week while attending classes. In the early years of that ministry, a new building for worship was erected. In 1937 he organized the special celebrations for many Indian bands in connection with the Seventieth Anniversary of Confederation.

In 1950 he was awarded the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity from Knox College, Toronto.

In October of 1956 Dr. Moore moved to Prince Albert, and began a ministry to the Dakota people of the Wahpeton Reserve and encouraged the building of a church there. He ministered also to the Metis settlement at Crutwell.

Dr. Moore retired at the end of December, 1966, moving to Salt Spring Island, British Columbia, and a few years later to Vancouver. In 1972 he was awarded the Order of Canada Service Medal, in recognition of his work with the First Canadians. Whenever possible, he would return to visit them.

On the 19th of July, 1979, Dr. Moore passed away in Vancouver. He is survived by a sister, Miss A. Wilna Moore, M.A., of Vancouver. Here was a man who gave himself, body, mind and spirit, to the service of his Lord and for the wellbeing of the native people of Canada. They recognized him as a spiritual father who had shared their life from the very beginning of his own. He regarded them as his own family, and he shared completely with them in both joy and sorrow. Though no longer present in the flesh, he will be remembered with thanksgiving; and his kindness will be recounted to generations yet unborn. It was of such as he that it has been written: "The memory of the just is blessed."
