FIRST SEDERUNT

At the City of Sudbury, Ontario, and within Fraser Auditorium, Laurentian University, there, Sunday, the third day of June, in the year of our Lord, one thousand nine hundred seventy-nine, at eight o'clock in the evening.

Which place and time Ministers and Ruling Elders, Commissioners from the several Presbyteries of The Presbyterian Church in Canada, convened pursuant to appointment of the General Assembly held in the City of Hamilton, Ontario, on the fourth day of June last year.

The Rev. J. E. Bigelow, D.D., Moderator of the 104th General Assembly, assisted by Rev. Arnold W. Fraser, Minister of Calvin and Hillside Churches, and Rev. Roy A. Taylor, Minister of Knox Church, conducted public worship and preached a sermon on the texts Matthew 28:19 and Ephesians 5:1-2, entitled "The Church Alive".

According to appointment, Dr. J. E. Bigelow administered the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper. In this he was assisted by the Rev. Roy A. Taylor and the Rev. Arnold W. Fraser. The tables were served by Elders of the several congregations of the Presbytery of Algoma and North Bay.

Thereafter, with prayer, Dr. Bigelow did constitute the General Assembly in the Name of the Lord Jesus Christ, the only King and Head of the Church.

ELECTION OF MODERATOR

Whereupon Dr. Bigelow did by prayer call upon God to bless the newly elected Moderator and confer upon him strength and wisdom that he might discharge the duties of his office. He then did install him in the Moderator's Chair.

The Board of Education begs to submit the following report:

I. SPECIAL COURSES

Guidelines for the Board of Education (1977)

1. No application for a Special General Assembly course may be recommended unless the applicant has attained the age of 35 years and not attained the age of 60 years as of June 1st of the year in which the application is to be considered.
2. Requirements for special General Assembly programmes shall be:
 - (a) Age 35-40
10 courses in Arts, three years intramural study in Theology. 1 Biblical language may be assigned if it is thought useful.
 - (b) Age 41-59
5 courses in Arts, three years intramural study in Theology with exemption from the Biblical language requirement.

a) Applications already considered by previous General Assemblies:

5. *May Anne Yee*. Presbytery of Brockville. The Faculty of The Presbyterian College has re-assessed Miss Yee's academic work, including credits toward a Bachelor of Arts and work completed at St. Lawrence College of Applied Arts and Technology. Her credits meet the 12 course requirement. Miss Yee has satisfactorily completed the In-Ministry Year and was awarded the Diploma In Ministry and the Diploma (rather than the Certificate) of the College. It is recommended that permission be granted to take her on trials for licence.
6. *Arthur C. Leeder*. Presbytery of Superior. Mr. Leeder had decided not to continue his studies for the Ministry. It is recommended that this case be dropped.
7. *Raymond E. Pearse*. Presbytery of Halifax and Lunenburg. The Senate of the College reports that this candidate has not performed satisfactorily and is considered unable to meet the academic requirements. It is recommended that this case be dropped.
8. *Thos. C. Brownlee*. Presbytery of Ottawa. Mr. Brownlee is reported to be completing the requirements prescribed last year, and preparing to enter the regular course. Reported for information.
9. *John Morrison Campbell*. Presbytery of East Toronto. Mr. Campbell was taken on Trials for Licence and ordained by the Presbytery of Lindsay-Peterborough. Reported for information.

 3. The Board of Education calls attention of Presbyteries to the Book of Forms 248, subsection VII and VIII and asks that Presbyteries emphasize the matters therein and especially the interrogation of applicants.

 5. *James Desmond Maxwell*, B.A., M.Th. Presbytery of Miramichi. It is recommended that permission be granted to take him on trials for licence subject to the usual stipulations.
 6. *Leslie Perrie*, B.A., M.Div. Presbytery of Stratford-Huron. It is recommended that this candidate be required to take a further year of practical training under the direction of the Senate of the Presbyterian College, Montreal, including the September Guidance Conference and that the application be reconsidered in 1980.
 7. *Frederik Wisse*, Ph.D. Presbytery of Hamilton. It is recommended that permission be granted to take him on trials for licence, subject to the usual stipulations.

III. WILLIAM E. ARCHIBALD TRUST

The matter was again referred to the Faculty of Knox College for their advice. It is recommended that on receipt of necessary information the chairman be authorized to issue on this matter.

IV. GUIDELINES FOR THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

It is recommended that in addition to the Guidelines approved by the 103rd General Assembly (see Section I above) the following be approved to become effective July 1, 1979.

1. Candidates for the Ministry who are graduates of North American theological colleges which are not accredited by the Association of Theological Schools in U.S.A. and Canada, (A.T.S.) will normally be required to take the full three-year course in one of our theological colleges.
2. Graduates of theological colleges, including those accredited by A.T.S., but not affiliated with The Presbyterian Church in Canada or member churches of the World Presbyterian Alliance or Reformed Churches listed in the report of the Committee on the Validity of Orders to the 1948 General Assembly and such others as may be added to this list from time to time, will normally be required to successfully complete at least one full academic year of studies at one of our theological colleges.
3. Graduates from theological colleges affiliated with member churches of the World Presbyterian Alliance, or Presbyterian or Reformed Churches on the Validity of Orders list as above whose academic requirements are the equivalent of ours, (namely an Arts degree or the equivalent plus three years in Theology) will normally be required to successfully complete courses in the history of The Presbyterian Church in Canada and in the government of the said Church.

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4. That the General Assembly call the attention of all the Presbyteries to the long established rule of the Church as contained in the Book of Forms, Section 202.

Johnston, one of the founding Appointors and Chairman of the Fund for Ministerial Assistance for many years, and Dr. E. A. Thomson, also a founding Appointor, and until recently very active in the work of the Fund, both passed away to be with God our Heavenly Father. The Appointors pay tribute to both of these ministers who were concerned and gave much time and energy in order to assist the ministers who were on the General Assembly minimum stipend and allowances.

Since the last Assembly, Mr. James Barbour, the Comptroller, has retired and Mr. Norman Creen has been appointed the new Comptroller. Our sincere thanks is extended to these gentlemen and their staff for their work on behalf of the Fund. Appreciation is also expressed to the Board of World Mission staff for their assistance with the administration of the Fund.

The Fund for Ministerial Assistance distributed \$64,810. for the year 1978 to an average of 138 eligible ministers and 225 children. Four gifts were made to ministers in special circumstances of need within the terms of the Fund. The Appointors have been able to continue the gift at the rate of \$220. per year for each eligible minister and \$60. per year for each eligible child. The extra gift at Christmas was \$100. per eligible minister and \$25. per eligible child.

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REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON HISTORY

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on History, which, as printed (pages 339-341), was presented by Mr. F. H. Rennie, Convener. On his motion, duly seconded, the Report was received and its Recommendations considered seriatim.

RECOMMENDATION 1

Mr. D. Nicholson moved in amendment, duly seconded, that Recommendation 1 read as follows:

"That the printing and publication of Volume II of "Called to Witness" be undertaken immediately and that this be carried out under the supervision of the Committee on History with a loan from the general funds of the Church up to \$3,000 (Three thousand dollars) if necessary and proceeds from the sales returned to the general funds of the Church and that the total loan be repaid during the next five years out of the budget of the History Committee if necessary."

The amendment was adopted, as was the motion as amended. It was agreed that no referral to the Administrative Council was intended by the Court.

Recommendations 2 and 3 were adopted.

On motion of Mr. F. H. Rennie, duly seconded, the report as a whole of the Committee on History, with its recommendations as amended, was adopted.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF WORLD MISSION

Consideration of the Report of the Board of World Mission was resumed, Mr. J.J.H. Morris reporting.

DR. MARGARET KENNEDY

The Moderator invited Miss Margaret Kennedy to come forward and Mr. Morris read the Minute of Appreciation as printed on pages 404-405. Recommendation 5 was adopted with a standing ovation for Miss Kennedy, who in turn addressed the Assembly.

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MISS IDA WHITE

Mr. Morris read portions of the Minute of Appreciation to Miss Ida White (page 482). In the absence of Miss White, Recommendation 22 was adopted with applause.

THE REVEREND H. GLEN DAVIS

Glen Davis was invited forward in connection with the Minute of Appreciation on Page 403. Recommendation 4 was adopted, and Mr. Davis spoke briefly to the Court.

RECOMMENDATION 1

Permission was given for the withdrawal of Dr. A. van Seter's amendment to Recommendation 1, Part 5, given in the Third Sederunt. The Board offered a new wording to Part 5 as follows:

"That such appointments shall be at one stipend for each pastoral charge, it being understood that a "pastoral charge" is that area of ministry normally served by one appointee."

There was consensus to accept this as the new wording for Part 5 of Recommendation 1.

Recommendation 1 was divided at the request of the members of the Court.

Parts 1 and 2 of Recommendation 1 were adopted.

Mr. L. J. Cowper moved in amendment to Part 3, duly seconded, the addition of:

Following after "where they shall reside":

"And, where applicable, the proportionate share to be paid by each pastoral charge towards the housing arrangements for the couple."

The amendment, and Part 3 as amended, were adopted.

Part 4 was adopted.

Mr. L. J. Cowper moved in amendment to Part 5, duly seconded, the addition of the following after "each pastoral charge":

"Except that when a husband and wife each are appointed to separate pastoral charges, each appointee shall receive from the charge to which he or she is appointed, the basic stipend plus increments, travel and continuing education allowances not to exceed the maximum allowable under the Board of World Mission regulations; and one manse (or housing allowance) including utilities shall be provided the couple, and the cost of the housing arrangements to be shared by the two pastoral charges, where applicable."

The amendment, and Part 5 as amended, were adopted.

Part 6 of Recommendation 1 was adopted.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE RE: OVERTURES RE: WORLD COUNCIL OF CHURCHES, INTER CHURCH AID, ETC.

The Assembly called for the Report of the above Committee which was handed in by Dr. W. R. Bell, Convener. Dr. Bell moved, duly seconded, that the report with

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its recommendations be received and considered seriatim.

Mr. C. Congram moved in amendment, duly seconded, that the recommendations be considered in the order 2, 3, 1 and 4. The amendment carried, and the motion as amended was adopted.

The report follows:

REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON THE WORLD COUNCIL OF CHURCHES AND THE PROGRAM TO COMBAT RACISM

I. *Membership in the World Council of Churches*

The Presbyterian Church in Canada joined the World Council of Churches at its inception in 1948, "because of a conviction as a Reformed Church, it was impossible to exist in isolation, but expression must be given to the unity which already exists between all who believe in God through Jesus Christ our Lord, and that, in the dynamism of the ecumenical movement, there is a viable alternative to one organized Church, either national or international. . . The General Assembly of 1947 at Calgary by an almost unanimous vote affirmed that it 'places itself on record. . . as not only encouraging but enjoining as a duty the fullest possible co-operation with all other Christian bodies, for the glory of God and the triumph of His purposes among men.'" (Acts and Proceedings 1971 p. 329). Since then The Presbyterian Church in Canada has consistently re-affirmed this relationship to the world Christian community. For example, the 1971 General Assembly resolved to "affirm again its belief in the catholicity and unity of Christ's Church and its conviction that this belief makes it imperative to seek and establish active, positive relationships with other parts of His Church. . . (and) that at the present time participation in the. . . World Council of Churches is a viable avenue for expression of that 'unity in diversity' which The Presbyterian Church in Canada has long professed and a good means of co-operation with other Christian bodies." (ibid). Insofar as our responsibility in the world community continually grows, the Committee recommends:

RECOMMENDATION 1: A. that the 105th General Assembly affirm again its commitment to the World Council of Churches.

II. *The Program to Combat Racism*

Racism in this present world is a serious and escalating problem. Therefore the demand for Christian concern and response in this particular issue cannot be ignored by any Christian denomination. The Program to Combat Racism of the World Council of Churches is making a positive attempt to counteract racism through its educational programs, research, and financial assistance to victims of racism in all parts of the world. The 1972 General Assembly resolved to "support the program. . . of anti-racism grants to the victims of oppressive regimes, and stress that these grants were made for social, medical, educational, and general relief activity, and for non-military purposes." (Acts and Proceedings 1972 p. 269). In the Zimbabwe situation, grants were given over a long period of time to groups that recently have become engaged in acts of violence. It should be noted that further grants to

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groups in Zimbabwe (since the most recent one in August 1978) have been denied. Therefore the Committee recommends:

RECOMMENDATION 2: that the 105th General Assembly affirm again its commitment to the Program to Combat Racism.

III. *Inter-Church Aid*

The General Assembly in 1972 instructed Inter-Church Aid to make grants to the Program to Combat Racism on behalf of The Presbyterian Church in Canada. (ibid). The Overtures under consideration indicate clearly that there are members of The Presbyterian Church in Canada who are opposed to the Program to Combat Racism, and do not wish to support it financially, but are quite committed to other programs of Inter-Church Aid. Therefore the Committee recommends:

RECOMMENDATION 3: that Inter-Church Aid be instructed to forward to the Program to Combat Racism only those funds specifically designated for the Program.

RECOMMENDATION 4: that the report as a whole be the answer of this General Assembly to Overtures 5, 7, 13, 21, 22, 25, 26, 29, 30, and the un-numbered Overture from the Session of St. Andrew's Niagara-on-the-Lake.

RECOMMENDATION 2

Mr. M. S. Reside moved in amendment to Recommendation 2, duly seconded, the addition of the following:

"provided it can be guaranteed that no grants be given to groups involved in murder and terrorism."

YOUNG ADULT OBSERVERS

On motion of Dr. D. C. MacDonald, duly seconded, Young Adult Observers were granted leave to speak during the presentation of this Report.

On motion of Dr. E. H. Johnson, duly seconded, permission was given to Rev. Mba Ogarekpe and Rev. Silas Ncozana to speak during this debate.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON THE WORLD COUNCIL OF CHURCHES AND THE PROGRAM TO COMBAT RACISM

Consideration of the Special Committee on the World Council of Churches and the Program to Combat Racism was resumed, Dr. W. R. Bell reporting.

Mr. Mba Ogarekpe (Nigeria) and Mr. Silas Ncozana (Malawi) addressed the Court.

On motion of Mr. F. Metzger, duly seconded, the Court agreed to take an immediate vote on Mr. Reside's amendment (page 00) to Recommendation 2 of the Special Committee.

The vote was recorded as 105 for the amendment, 124 against.
Recommendation 2 as printed was adopted.

DISSENTS

Various persons requested and received permission to record dissents to the above action.

DISSENT - (W. IAN MACPHERSON)

Mr. MacPherson gave in his reasons for dissent as follows:

I hereby record my dissent to the stance taken by the 105th General Assembly of The Presbyterian Church in Canada on the program of the World Council of Churches to support the Program to Combat Racism. Specifically, I object to what I view is the stance of this Assembly on murder and terrorism as acceptable means to this end. (see #2).

- 1) While I cannot countenance racism in any form and would rather support the building of relationships in love, as is our high calling in Jesus Christ, I stand opposed to any *means* that would so *drastically* qualify this statement and action of faith as to, in my view, render them (this statement and action) *void*; i.e., consigning them to the "abyss", (c.f. J. Ellul, *The Presence of the Kingdom*, especially the chapter on "means").
- 2) Further, in explanation, I say that I firmly believe that to *omit* is as serious as to *commit*, especially in such a case as this. I therefore take the action of Assembly in defeating the amendment to add the concern about "murder and terrorism" as a positive statement, that is, this Assembly has, in

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my view, accepted "murder and terrorism" as acceptable means of "combat".

The following asked that their names be associated with Mr. MacPherson's dissent:

Mr. Donald A. Codling asked his dissent be recorded, with the concurrence of Mr. Peter Szabo, as follows:

"I dissent to Recommendation 2 of the Special Committee on the World Council of Churches' Program to Combat Racism, on the grounds that defeat of the amendment requiring that no grants be given to groups engaging in murder and terrorism implies our admission of the validity of violence. As a Christian I cannot do this. Further I consider that this will be detrimental to givings to our relief activities."

Mr. Everett Hawkes asked his dissent be recorded as follows:

"I dissent on the grounds that I cannot approve support of Communist political and guerilla activity - which involve terrorism and murder."

Other dissents were as follows:

"The money our church gives to the Program to Combat Racism is in reality Mission Offerings from the church composed of many tithes and widows' mites. Far better we should spend that money combatting racism here in Canada where we could have some control over it than by putting it "no strings attached" into the hands of avowed Marxists who are using violence and terrorism to achieve political ends, while confessing to be only combatting racism."

"I hereby register my motion of dissent to the adoption of Recommendation No. 2 for the reason of conscience as I understand the scriptures."

John Snider.

"I wish to record my dissent on this matter, the reason being the lack of control over where the money goes."

R. J. Ritchie.

"I dissent from the decision of the 105th General Assembly in this matter for the following reasons:

1. The World Council of Churches has been unable to discern whether or not grants through the Program to Combat Racism have been used exclusively for humanitarian purposes or to ensure that further grants will be used in this manner.
2. Conscience will not permit me to support violence and terrorism - the avowed means of achieving liberation of groups to whom the Program to Combat Racism has given financial support."

C. N. Congram.

"I wish to record my dissent to the decision of the Court in regard to the Recommendation of the Special Committee on the World Council of Churches

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and the Program to Combat Racism, namely, "That the 105th General Assembly affirm its commitment to the Program to Combat Racism." My reason for doing so is that it violates my conscience to support groups involved in and committed to acts of terrorism."

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"I would like my dissent recorded in regard to the vote on the amended Recommendation 2 of the Special Committee on the World Council of Churches and the Program to Combat Racism for the following reasons:

When money is given specified for one cause, it releases money given for general use, to be used for another cause. So when people give to Inter-Church Aid for non-P.C.R. use, it releases other money to be used for P.C.R. When The Presbyterian Church in Canada sends money to P.C.R. for non-"Special Fund" uses, it releases other money for the Special Fund. Therefore, people who have scruples about contributing to P.C.R. Special Fund have no other choice than withhold money from Inter-Church Aid, which is not desirable."

Announcements having been made, the Moderator adjourned the Assembly, to meet on the same day, in the same place, at 2:00 p.m. of which due intimation was made, and he did then pronounce the Benediction.

TENTH SEDERUNT

At Sudbury, and within Fraser Auditorium, Laurentian University there, on Friday, the eighth day of June, in the year of our Lord, one thousand nine hundred seventy-nine, at two o'clock in the afternoon, the General Assembly met pursuant to adjournment and was constituted by the Moderator with prayer.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF WORLD MISSION

Consideration of the Report of the Board of World Mission was resumed, Mr. Harrold Morris, Chairman, reporting.

Recommendation 6 was adopted.

Recommendation 7 was adopted with the understanding that the section on Characteristics of the North is to be rewritten and clarified.

Recommendations 7-11 were adopted.

RECOMMENDATION 13

Mr. George Palmer, in amendment to Recommendation 13, moved, duly seconded, that Paragraph 1 of the preamble, and the first word of the second paragraph, be deleted. The amendment was defeated.

Mr. D. Codling moved in amendment, duly seconded, and the Court agreed to delete the first two paragraphs of the preamble and to make the third paragraph read as follows:

"That in order that our brothers and sisters across the world may know where we stand and that our Presbyterian family in Canada be given appropriate leadership, the 105th General Assembly goes on record as affirming its opposition to racism wherever it is expressed and is committed actively, vigorously and by all legitimate means to promote inter-racial harmony and to combat racism wherever it exists, in our own hearts, in our church lives, in our communities and in all the world."

Recommendation 13 as amended was adopted.

Recommendations 14-21 were adopted, with the change of "forms" to "form" in Recommendation 17, and moving "a)" to line 2 of Recommendation 18.

Mr. L. J. Cowper moved in terms of his motion presented at the Fourth Sederunt (page 41), re reconsidering the membership of the Committee re Place of Women in the Church. Carried.

He then moved, duly seconded, and it was agreed, that Rev. Nancy L. Cocks, B.A., M.Div., be added to the Committee dealing with the Memorial #1 re Place of Women in the Church and that Rev. Caroline Lockerbie be added by correspondence.

COMMITTEE TO ADVISE WITH THE MODERATOR

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee to Advise with the Moderator, including Overtures 10, 1979 (page 449) and 27, 1979 (p. 461), which, as printed (pages 216-217) was handed in by Dr. Alex MacSween.

On motion of Dr. D. C. MacDonald, duly seconded, the Report was received and its recommendations considered seriatim.

[Recommendation 1 was presented in the First Sederunt]

Recommendations 2 and 3 were adopted.

RECOMMENDATION 4

Recommendation 4 was amended on motion of Mr. W. Little, duly seconded with the addition of: "and each Presbytery may be permitted to make up to two nominations." Carried.

Recommendation 4 as amended was adopted.

On motion of Dr. D. C. MacDonald, duly seconded, it was agreed that the preceding action be taken as the Assembly's response to Overtures 10, 1979 and 27, 1979.

On motion of Dr. D. C. MacDonald, duly seconded, the report as a whole of the Committee to Advise with the Moderator, with its recommendations as amended, was adopted.

REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE RE: OVERTURE 16

The Report of the above named Committee was presented by Mr. Fred Rennie, the Convener.

On motion of Mr. Rennie, duly seconded, the Report was received and considered. The Report is as follows:—

The Special Committee re Overture 16 (1979) has met and reports as follows:

- 1) In addition to the members named, the Committee welcomed Miss Isabella Hunter, President of the W.M.S. (W.D.) to its numbers, and were appreciative of her assistance. The Committee Convener also spoke with the Editor of the Presbyterian Record on the subject.
- 2) It is the judgement of the Committee that granting the prayer of the overture is *not* warranted at the present time, for the following reasons:
 - a) the purposes of the three magazines are different, and such would be lost through incorporation into one;
 - b) not all Presbyterian households subscribe to the Every Home Plan of the Presbyterian Record; where the Glad Tidings or the Presbyterian Message are presently the only Church magazines entering the home, such entrance could well be lost since there is no guarantee that incorporation would increase subscriptions;
 - c) The administrative and editorial policies of the three magazines are different;
 - d) The "Glad Tidings" and "Presbyterian Message" are magazines of a regional nature and serve as effective communication arms of the Western and Eastern divisions of the Women's Missionary Society. Such would undoubtedly be lost through incorporation.
 - e) Incorporation would lead to increased size of the Record and this would increase cost, possibly curtailing subscriptions and defeating the Record's desire to be financially independent from the Budget Funds of the Church.
 - f) The amalgamation of the Glad Tidings and the Record was proposed by the Committee on Organisation and Planning in 1968 and refused at that time for several reasons given (see Correspondence Miss Olive Grant to the Rev. John Forbes, No. 1/68 in possession of W.M.S. (W.D.)).
 - g) The present autonomy of the W.M.S. (E.D.) of which the Presbyterian Message is an effective instrument, is very precious to the party concerned and not likely to be lightly surrendered.
 - h) A more appropriate step would be the incorporation of the present W.M.S. magazines into one, but this step would be possible only when the two organisations for women's missionary work are themselves united into one.

For these reasons your Committee would recommend that the prayer of the Overture be *not* granted.

On motion of Mr. Rennie, duly seconded, the Recommendation was adopted, as was the report as a whole of the Special Committee.

REPORT OF CLERKS OF ASSEMBLY

The Assembly called for the above report which, as printed, (pages 233-239 and 469-470), was presented by Dr. E. H. Bean.

On motion of Dr. D. C. MacDonald, duly seconded, this report was received and its recommendations considered seriatim.

Recommendations 1-7 were adopted.

Mr. F. H. Rennie moved re Recommendation 8, duly seconded, that the statement re ownership, accountability and confidentiality of records of church courts be referred back to the Clerks in consultation with the Archivist and the Chairman of the Committee on History. Carried.

Recommendation 8 as amended was adopted.

Recommendations 9-16 were adopted.

Recommendation 17 was amended on motion of Mr. J. Cameron Bigelow, duly seconded, by substituting "six month period" for "three month period" in Section 3.

Recommendation 17 as amended was adopted.

Recommendation 18 was adopted.

On motion of Dr. D. C. MacDonald, duly seconded, it was agreed that Overtures 32 and 33, 1979, be taken as answered by Assembly's decisions re Recommendations 1 to 4 of the Clerks of Assembly.

On motion of Dr. D. C. MacDonald, duly seconded, the report as a whole, with its recommendations as amended, was adopted.

BOARD OF KNOX COLLEGE

Consideration of the Report of the Board of Knox College was resumed, Mr. F. A. Beale, the Chairman, reporting.

Recommendations 2-3b, 2-3d were adopted.

Mr. James Weir moved, duly seconded, that (2-4) be referred to the Administrative Council in consultation with the Board of Knox College, re reply to the 106th General Assembly.

Mr. G. van Beek moved in amendment to the motion to refer, duly seconded, that referral include the other Colleges. Carried.

The motion to refer Recommendation 2-4 was adopted as amended.

On motion of Dr. D. C. MacDonald, duly seconded, it was agreed that the Clerks of Assembly contact the appropriate presbytery re a service of induction for the Rev. R. A. Humphries.

On motion of Mr. Beale, duly seconded, the report as a whole of the Board of Knox College, with its recommendation as amended, was adopted.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE RE: OVERTURE 31 RE: GRADUATING STUDENTS' APPOINTMENTS

The Assembly called for the Report of the above Committee which was handed in by Mr. Clarke Hood, Convener. On Motion of Mr. Hood, duly seconded, it was agreed that the report be received and its recommendation considered.

The Committee reported as follows:

That because the Overture contains two prayers, we recommend the following:

- a) the first part ending on the bottom line of page 463 with the words "of 1970" that it be not granted because it is considered that the Church's work and witness outside the main centres of population would suffer at the present time, were the present policy of making students' appointments to be abandoned.

It is recognized that current projections suggest that a few years hence a re-appraisal of the present policy will be advisable.

- b) The second part, comprising the remainder of the submitted prayer, is questionable in that it suggests a Committee be appointed to make a declaration.

The Committee recommends that this prayer be not granted because it is considered that the existing policy is best suited to meet current personnel needs in the Church.

Mr. J. C. Duff moved, duly seconded, that Overture 31 be referred to the Committee on Church Doctrine for study in relation to the doctrine of ordination.

The motion to refer was defeated.

On motion of Mr. Hood, duly seconded, the recommendation was adopted.

CHURCH ARCHIVIST

Mr. Fred Rennie moved in terms of this notice of motion in the Sixth Sederunt (page 55) expressing the Assembly's thanks to Dr. J. S. Moir. This motion was duly seconded and adopted.

Mr. Rennie also moved in terms of the second part of the same notice of motion regarding the listing of the name of the Church Archivist and location of the Church Archives in the Acts & Proceedings of the General Assembly. His motion was duly seconded, and adopted.

REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE RE: RESIGNATION OF MR. J. C. COOPER

The Assembly called for the Report of the above Committee which was handed in by Dr. William Adamson. On motion of Dr. Adamson, duly seconded, it was agreed that the report be received and considered.

Recommendations 1 and 2 were adopted as follows:

1. In consultation with the Rev. J. C. Cooper, we recognize and affirm his genuine reasons for his resignation. We therefore recommend, with sincere regret, that Mr. Cooper's resignation be accepted.
2. Your committee would draw to the attention of the Assembly Mr. Cooper's request regarding the termination date, viz., to "be effective just as soon as a new General Secretary can conveniently take up the duties of the office."

We therefore recommend that the termination date be arranged by the Board of Ministry in the above terms.

The report as a whole with recommendations was adopted on motion of Dr. Adamson, duly seconded.

He then said: "In the name of the Lord Jesus Christ, the only King and Head of the Church, and by the authority of this Assembly, I now dissolve this Assembly and appoint another General Assembly of The Presbyterian Church in Canada to meet in St. Andrew's Church, in the City of Windsor and within the Province of Ontario on Saturday, the thirty-first day of May in the year of our Lord, one thousand nine hundred eighty, at four o'clock in the afternoon, local time."

The Moderator then closed the session of the Assembly with the Apostolic Benediction.

ADDENDUM RE COMMISSION TO DEAL WITH MATTERS UNCARED FOR

Two Memorials from the Presbytery of the Lake of the Woods were received just before the opening of the Assembly and were inadvertently overlooked in the file of the Committee on Bills and Overtures.

In each case the Presbytery requested permission to take persons on trials for, and to proceed with, ordination.

In the first instance, permission was requested to ordain Mr. and Mrs. Anthony Paton, and the Commission agreed to give to the Presbytery of the Lake of the Woods, or the Presbytery to whom the said Presbytery might refer this responsibility, the right to proceed to licensure, and ordination, such action being now covered by the passage of Recommendation 1 of the Report of the Board of World Mission.

The second request was for permission to ordain Mrs. Florence Palmer, in order to assist her in her future work in the Church, and inasmuch as former Assemblies have on a few occasions granted this permission in similar circumstances, the Commission therefore grants this request; and gives permission to the Presbytery of the Lake of the Woods to ordain Mrs. Florence Palmer to the Holy Ministry.

THE ADMINISTRATIVE COUNCIL

To the Venerable the 105th General Assembly:

PREAMBLE

This is the Preamble I could not get anyone else to write. Who wants to write a preamble to a dull report like this that tries to give just enough to let commissioners know the main facts of each item, but not to go on so long that they get "turned off" and give up trying to understand? Then, too, there is so much here about facts and figures, and who cares anyway!

Nevertheless, this report contains much of where we are, and where we are going. It tells of deficits and wasted opportunities, and of victories never won because we never went into battle. It tells of an estimated income from congregations of \$4,000,000.00 in 1980, or about 50¢ per member per week. Where is the suffering at 7¢ a day, or do we really care?

But we are told things are improving, and we believe the Church is the witness of God in Jesus Christ to this weary, distraught world. So we take courage, and we submit the following for the information, and action, of the commissioners to the 105th General Assembly, and whosoever may be led to read. We too shall overcome — some day!

APPRECIATIONS

JUDGE EDWARD SHORTT

Judge Edward Shortt died on May 30th, 1978. He was Chairman of the Administrative Council from 1965 to 1967, and Convener of the Presbyterian Record Committee. A son of the late Reverend Dr. J. S. Shortt, Moderator of the 1934 General Assembly, he served as an elder in St. Andrew's Church, Perth, Ontario.

REV. L. L. de GROOT

The Reverend L. Louis de Groot died on January 17th, 1979. Mr. de Groot served as Chairman of the Board of World Mission 1972-1973, and during that period was a member of the Administrative Council.

DR. G. DEANE JOHNSTON

Dr. Deane Johnston died July 14th, 1978. He was minister of Central Church, Brantford, Ontario from 1932 to 1973. He was Chairman of the General Board of Missions from 1948 to 1960, and was a member of the Administrative Council for several years. He was Moderator of the General Assembly in 1966.

DR. E. A. THOMSON

Dr. Archie Thomson, son of the Reverend David A. Thomson, served as a minister of our Church from 1917 to his death on August 22, 1978. He served in almost every part of the administration of The Presbyterian Church in Canada. After serving as Secretary of the Board of Sabbath Schools and Young People's Societies, he was appointed Secretary of the Board of Administration on September 1st, 1947, and Joint Clerk of Assembly the following year. He became the first

Secretary of the Administrative Council on its formation in 1960, and served till 1967. The Council records its great appreciation to one who served with unfailing faithfulness for many years, and his memory will live on in the minds of many who knew and loved him.

MATTERS REFERRED TO COUNCIL BY PREVIOUS ASSEMBLIES

FRENCH TRANSLATION OF PARTS OF THE BOOK OF COMMON ORDER

The French translation of parts of the Book of Common Order was referred to the Administrative Council by the 103rd General Assembly with power to issue. The Council endeavoured to discover from our Committee on Church Worship how much need there is in our Church for producing these items. We reported to the last General Assembly that we understood the passages that might be desired in the French language could be obtained from publications from the Reformed Church in France. Our consideration has been further delayed by the fact that the Committee on Church Worship was amalgamated into the Board of Congregational Life by action of the 104th General Assembly. After a report was received at the April meeting of the Council from the Board of Congregational Life, it was agreed that no action be taken in translating passages into French and publishing these for our ministers at this time.

An item which is somewhat akin to this matter was referred to the Administrative Council out of the report of the Special Committee re National Unity to the 104th General Assembly (1978 A&P, Page 372). Our Church is seeking through joint action with the Canadian Council of Churches, and other Churches, to obtain an agency which would serve the English speaking part of churches in Canada when they need to communicate in the French language. Progress is reported in the obtaining of this facility.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 1 A

That the above be received for information.

EMOLUMENTS OF THE OFFICE OF PRINCIPALS OF OUR THEOLOGICAL COLLEGES

The 103rd General Assembly considered a recommendation from the Board of Knox College "that the incumbent of the office of Principal of Knox College receive an emolument of office equal to 15% of his professorial salary." This matter, along with "others in similar positions", was referred to the Administrative Council, with power to issue. The Council recommended to the 104th General Assembly that no increase be granted, and that "the Council continue its study and report to the 105th General Assembly". An amendment to this recommendation that "the emoluments for the Principals of our three theological colleges be raised to \$2,500.00 per annum" was defeated, and the recommendation was adopted.

The Council appointed a committee to do the study and now reports that it considers the emolument is paid because of the Principals' administrative work load, over and above his/her regular teaching duties. That rate has changed little over the past eighteen years, and on a percentage of regular salary has decreased. The Committee took into consideration the above items, as well as the financial situation in our Church in making its recommendations. It also recognized that the action of the 104th General Assembly in not making the salaries of Professors at Ewart College equal to Professors at our other two Colleges would affect setting a percentage increase for the three principals. Nevertheless, the Council agreed to adopt the recommendations of its committee as follows -

RECOMMENDATION NO. 2 A

That the emolument for the Principals of Ewart, Knox, and Presbyterian Colleges be calculated at 10% over and above the stipend of a full professor as established by General Assembly, or \$2,500.00 per annum whichever is greater, effective January 1st, 1980.

Recommendations 3 & 4 have been deleted.

FUTURE ASSEMBLIES AND NOTICE OF MOTION RE TIME OF ASSEMBLY

A schedule for future Assemblies was adopted by the 104th General Assembly. Subject to change by this Assembly, it was agreed to meet in 1980 at St. Andrew's Church, Windsor. A meeting has already been held with representatives from St. Andrew's Church and a Clerk of the Assembly of The United Presbyterian Church of the U.S.A., which Assembly is meeting in Detroit at the time of our Assembly in Windsor. In order to leave the weekend of June 1st available for fraternal celebrations it was agreed that our Assembly should begin on Saturday, May 31st, in St. Andrew's Church, Windsor.

A motion was passed by the last Assembly requesting "the Administrative Council to study the question of the possibility of holding the Assembly sometime during July." The Committee appointed by the Council to do this study reported that any date agreed upon had to be a compromise, but in their opinion July was the worst possible choice. The Council agreed to recommend as follows -

RECOMMENDATION NO. 5 A

That the next General Assembly convene at St. Andrew's Church, Windsor, on Saturday, May 31st, at 4:00 p.m. local time.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 6 A

That July is not considered to be a suitable month for convening the General Assembly.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 7 A

That invitations be requested for the General Assembly in 1982 and 1984.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 6 BOARD OF WORLD MISSION, 1977. USE OF CAPITAL FROM PENSION BOARD

The Administrative Council reported to the 104th General Assembly that the Trustee Board had replied to Recommendation No. 6, BWM. 1977 that it was "not in favour of implementing the recommendation." The Pension Board had not had time to report the results of its study before our report to the 104th General Assembly. That report has now been made, and considered by the Administrative Council. The report is of such value in the consideration of this matter that it is recorded herewith.

REPORT OF A COMMITTEE OF THE PENSION BOARD OF THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA

Appointed to deal with:

- (a) the recommendation of the General Assembly that the Trustee Board and the Pension Board be authorized to use the funds in their care to invest in mortgages on properties and manses owned by the Board of World Mission within the legal terms of the Trust Act, etc. and
- (b) that the Pension Board be instructed to create guidelines for implementing investments within the Church (i.e., mortgages to congregations, mortgage funds for capital investments of the Board of World Mission, and personal mortgages to retiring Church workers).

Your committee, composed of Richard M. Roberts, F.C.I.A., F.I.A., A.S.A., and Kenneth A. Mader, F.C.A., who were appointed at a duly called meeting of the Pension Board held in Toronto on October 14th, 1978 have considered these matters and beg to report as follows:

- (1) The primary purposes of the Trustee Board and the Pension Board are:
 - (a) to invest the funds within their trust so as to ensure that future income will become available as and when required to fulfill their obligations;
 - (b) to protect the capital of the assets of those funds of the Church placed in their care.

- (2) Subordinate to the protection of the capital of the funds, it is the responsibility of the Trustee Board and the Pension Board to maximize the rate of return obtained on the funds entrusted to their care so as to provide maximum support for the execution of the purposes for which these funds were created, and
- (3) There is general agreement by all that in the pursuit of the two previously indicated objectives of investment fund management that no investment should be made that is contrary to the belief, faith, objects, and purposes of the church.
- (4) At all times the abiding principle must be for the Boards to establish an investment policy which they judge to be the most appropriate policy at the time to adopt for the investment of the funds under their care and which they judge to be the best way in which to meet their obligation to satisfy the terms of the Pension Fund. This requirement does not prevent the Trustees from making changes in their investment policy from time to time as may seem appropriate.

Therefore, we recommend that the following be adopted as guidelines for investment of the funds of the Trustee Board and the Pension Board:

- (a) Independent investment counsellors be retained to advise and manage the investment funds under the care of the Boards;
- (b) That such advisors, counsellors, and managers be made aware of the desire of the Church to invest the funds in our care in those projects which will further the work of the Church when the Pension Board deems it appropriate.
- (c) That from time to time the Trustees may make funds available to invest in mortgages on properties owned by The Presbyterian Church in Canada and its Board of World Mission, and by its employees retiring from full-time employment, but only in such amount and for such terms as they shall deem appropriate under their investment policy at the time. To facilitate such loans they may establish the rate at which funds may be made available over a period of time but any such practice must be subject to review not less frequently than once every 12 months. They shall, however, retain the absolute discretion in conjunction with their advisors to determine to whom money will be lent and on what terms.
- (d) The rate of interest charged on any mortgage granted under the terms of these guidelines shall be the normal commercial rate ruling at the time for a mortgage of the amount and term applied for, bearing in mind the quality of the property against which the mortgage is lent and the proportion that the amount lent bears to the value of the property. Notwithstanding this principle, however, a deduction of not more than one half of one percent may be allowed from the rate of interest charged if the mortgage repayments are guaranteed by The Presbyterian Church in Canada and the actual repayments are collected by the Church and remitted to the Trustees as and when they fall due.
- (e) That all such investments be made with due regard to the existing statute and common law with regard to the potential and existing conflict of interest in the investment of funds arising from within the Church organization in the activities of the Church organization.

The Administrative Council considers the report preceding is acceptable. As will be recorded in the following section, the Administrative Council is planning to initiate a policy of Zero-based Budgeting in setting budget allocations, and the Council has referred the above report to be considered by those doing such financial reviews in the future, and will consider implementing Recommendation No. 6 of the Board of World Mission to the 1977 General Assembly when that study is being undertaken.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 8 A

That the above report be received for information.

ZERO-BASED BUDGETING

OVERTURE NO. 13 – PRESBYTERY OF VANCOUVER ISLAND

(1978 General Assembly) requested "that the General Assembly enact a policy requiring the Boards and Spending Committees to adopt the practice of Zero-base budgeting on alternate years, that is, to present a budget in which each item is justified concerning its continued value to the life and work of the Church, as opposed to the present practice of maintaining present work and requesting funds for new ventures." Last year the Council requested more time to consider this appeal.

The Council has considered this matter since the last Assembly referred Overture No. 13 back to it for further study, and at its April meeting the Council received and considered a lengthy report by the Comptroller outlining a proposed procedure for implementing this process in establishing budgets in the future. The Council noted that the Finance Committee approved, in principle, a more systematic and consistent budgeting procedure, with a provision for a review of priorities under the authority of the Administrative Council.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 9 A

That the above report be received as an answer to Overture No. 13, 1978 General Assembly.

MASTER POLICY FOR CHURCH INSURANCE

An Overture, originating with the Session of Erskine Church, Ottawa, and transmitted simpliciter by the Presbytery of Ottawa, was received by the 104th General Assembly, and the Administrative Council was directed "to investigate, and if possible, to obtain a Master Policy" for all church properties under a Presbyterian Insurance Plan. A committee was appointed to do this investigation and reported to the Council as follows –

"The Committee is of the opinion that the content of Recommendation No. 17 in the report of the Administrative Council to the 104th General Assembly (A&P, 1978 page 207) was carefully researched and prepared and is still a valid position for our Church to take with reference to the dangers and risks of establishing a Presbyterian Insurance Plan on a National scale.

The Committee, however, in its investigation has found a number of Insurance Agencies which would be willing to place coverage for churches on a National basis. This would mean that every congregation (or a great proportion of congregations) would insure with one agent somewhere in Canada and remit the annual premiums direct. This, of course, would omit the use of local agents and forfeit their generosity which some congregations enjoy.

The cost of replacement of church buildings is increasing and therefore the cost of insurance increases. The records of Ecclesiastical Insurance Limited, for 1977, show that its claims ratio for property (fire) insurance was 67% (for every dollar received in premiums the company paid out 67¢ in claims). For liability insurance its ratio rose to 156.7% and the overall ratio on all insurance was 77.7%. In the same year the expense ratio of the company was 22.3%. This zero margin of profit indicates the great risk incurred even by a large insurance company, and the reason for increased premium rates. Despite the above, the company is granting a 10% discount where possible and, depending upon the claims ratio in the future, will attempt to offer further discounts.

Your Committee believes that Presbyteries might seek a co-operative scheme, or a group policy, with an Insurance Agent which could result in lower rates if the premiums were collected by the Presbytery.

We are aware also that many congregations are insured for the replacement value of their present buildings. Congregations may insure only for the total costs of what their actual needs might be in a new building if the present one were destroyed. By securing 'a waiver of the co-insurance clause,' this option could be obtained and a possible saving realized."

The Council agreed to make the following recommendations to this Assembly —

RECOMMENDATION NO. 10 A

That a Presbyterian Insurance Plan on a national scale be not established by The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 11 A

That congregations be encouraged to seek competitive premium rates in their own communities for liability and fire insurance coverage.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 12 A

That congregations be encouraged to examine carefully their present insurance coverage with a realistic evaluation of what their exposure to loss would be in the event of a disastrous fire.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 13 A

That Presbyteries be encouraged to investigate the possibility of group insurance, or a co-operative scheme of insurance, with an Insurance Agency or Company in an effort to obtain the best coverage of insurance at the lowest rates for the congregations within their bounds.

SECOND CENTURY ADVANCE FOR CHRIST

The National Committee expresses its appreciation for the support of more than 600 out of 1,067 congregations actively engaged in the purpose of Second Century Advance for Christ, "that the Gospel of Jesus Christ be advanced in Canada and Overseas" and that Presbyterians be led to make an additional tangible expression of commitment by contributing to Second Century Advance for Christ in 1978 and 1979.

The congregations who are making a sincere attempt to enrich spiritual growth through prayer, study, witness and stewardship, report very gratifying results and spiritual enrichment and growth in the lives of individuals and congregations.

The second Bible Study, "Stewardship Today", written by the Rev. David Murphy, and the second Prayer Booklet, "Areas of Concern", both have had a distribution of 24,000 copies. Plans are underway for a third Prayer Booklet which will be available September, 1979.

Dr. Matthew Dymond, for medical reasons, has had to resign as National Co-ordinator. The whole Church is grateful for the dedication and inspiration Matthew Dymond has brought to the life and mission of the Presbyterian Church. Mr. J. Edwin Smith has been named his successor.

The Publicity Committee, Mrs. Helen Brisbin, Chairman, has prepared new pamphlets setting forth information which will assist congregations with their local campaigns.

The Financial Statement for 1978 is included in the Church Treasurer's Report. As of April 6, 1979 \$431,000 has been forwarded to the Treasurer out of a \$3 million goal.

We believe that Presbyterians would like to have a part in making this campaign a financial success and therefore challenge each Presbyterian family to contribute through their congregational treasurer, one day's pay or income for 1978 and 1979 in order that the \$3 million goal will be reached.

Some congregations are commencing their Advance in 1979 and on their own initiative will continue into 1980. Presbyterians can assist in Advance by helping new congregations and new ministries in Canada and Overseas.

The Administrative Council has approved \$210,000 grants for distribution by a priority system.

There are requests under consideration for New Church Buildings and Manses, a Special Literacy Project in Toronto, Evangel Hall, Ministry in North-West Canada and a variety of Overseas projects.

The Presbyterian Church in Canada has been called upon to Advance for Christ in the Second Century of the life of the General Assembly. Let us, by the guidance of the Holy Spirit, accomplish great things in the name of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 14 A

That this be received for information.

OVERTURE NO. 6, PAGE 467, A&P, 1978

This Overture, from the Presbytery of Lindsay-Peterborough, asked the General Assembly "to extend the campaign (of the 2nd Century Advance for Christ) for a period of at least ten years, continuing to link the campaign to a vital Church renewal emphasis under the guidance of the Administrative Council, the Board of Congregational Life, and the Board of World Mission."

The Council had a committee consider this Overture, and agreed to recommend that the prayer be not granted for the following reasons:

1. It was clearly the intent of the Assembly authorizing this campaign, the mandate accepted by the Second Century Advance Committee, and the expectation of the whole Church, that this would be for a limited time, i.e., to end December, 1979.
2. To extend the campaign beyond its present term would incur extra expenses.
3. To extend the campaign would create a long term competition with the General Assembly for money. Your Committee believes that the emphasis should be placed on the Budget and not on special appeals.
4. The Overture speaks of the goals of the campaign "to promote the spiritual life of congregations and to strengthen stewardship in the whole church

Your Committee shares the concern of the Presbytery that the spiritual life of congregations and stewardship education should be a long term goal of the Church. But we believe that this has been and should continue to be, the responsibility of the Board of Congregational Life, and that the desire of the Overture can best be accomplished in the long term through the work of the Board of Congregational Life rather than prolonging a special campaign. We note that to carry on the programme of providing Prayer Concern booklets and Bible Study guides to congregations, the budget of the Board of Congregational Life will need to be increased, and your committee would support this increase.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 15 A

That the Prayer of Overture No. 6, 1978 General Assembly, be not granted for the reasons given above.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 16 A

That the Board of Congregational Life in its on-going work of promoting the spiritual life of congregations and stewardship education be asked to continue providing Prayer Concern Booklets and Bible Study materials to congregations.

**RECOMMENDATION NO. 7 (b) BOARD OF WORLD MISSION,
1978 GENERAL ASSEMBLY**

The 104th General Assembly approved recommendation No. 7 (b) of the Board of World Mission Report (A&P Page 405) which stated "in consultation with the Administrative Council with regards to the availability of money from the Second Century Advance for Christ, that for missions in Canada and Overseas, up to \$100,000.00 for Canada, and \$50,000.00 for Overseas, be provided for Capital needs (manses, church sites, overseas capital projects, etc.) to the extent that additional funds are available including bequest monies at the end of the year."

There being no monies available at the end of 1978, these grants were not made.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 17 A

That the above be received for information.

**RECOMMENDATIONS NOS. 8, 9, 12 and 13, B.W.M.,
1978 GENERAL ASSEMBLY**

The above Recommendations appeared on Pages 405 and 406 of the A&P, 1978 and were approved by General Assembly and referred to the Administrative Council for study and report. The Administrative Council reports that it approves these recommendations for implementation on January 1st, 1980.

The implementation of these recommendations will mean an approximate increase of 8% on basic stipend, and will take the place of any such increase for 1980. The following schedule will indicate the salary scale effective January 1st, 1980.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 18. A

That in lieu of a percentage increase in basic stipends for 1980, the inclusion of utilities under stipend for all categories be the action of General Assembly to our revision of stipends effective January 1st, 1980, and that the preceding schedule indicates this in detail.

**RECOMMENDATION NO. 2, HISTORY COMMITTEE - RECORDS
MANAGEMENT FEASIBILITY STUDY**

The above recommendation was submitted to the 104th General Assembly, and approved, and therefore the General Assembly agreed "to initiate a detailed Records Management Feasibility Study of the Boards and Committees of the Church, located at 50 Wynford Drive, Don Mills." The Assembly did not state who should initiate the study, but the Administrative Council undertook this study, and received Dr. J. Moir and Mr. A. Ross, representatives of the History Committee, to its November meeting. The matter was then referred to the Office and Property Committee, and the Programme Co-Ordinating Committee, for issuing. The Programme Co-Ordinating Committee, in its study, became aware that the Clerks of Assembly, in carrying out Recommendation No. 3 of the Committee on History to the 104th General Assembly, had received information from other Reformed Churches that might prove helpful in our procedures re the above, so it was agreed to sist procedures until that report from the Clerks of Assembly had been considered by the 105th General Assembly.

(1) In addition to the above, increments for years of service are payable per annum in 1980 as indicated in the various categories (a full increment scale for all categories will be in effect next year, 1981).

(2) In addition to the Basic Travel Allowance above, an additional Mileage Allowance is payable in Multiple Point Charges only, based on average Sunday mileage, round trip mileage, \$22.00 per annum per mile.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 19 A

That the Administrative Council continue implementation of Recommendation No. 2 of the Committee of History to the 104th General Assembly.

MOTION RE PRESBYTERIAN RECORD, 1978 A&P, PAGE 56

The 104th General Assembly agreed "that the subscription rates (for the Presbyterian Record) be increased as necessary with a view to making the Presbyterian Record self-supporting, the Administrative Council having authority to issue after consultation with the Presbyterian Record Committee." The Presbyterian Record Committee reported to the Executive of the Council in September indicating it was agreeable "to raise our subscription rates for individual subscriptions and for the Every Home Plan by \$1.00 per year, to \$4.50 and \$3.50 respectively. . . . The increase will be effective January 1st, 1979." The Executive approved this increase, and it has now been put into effect.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 20 A

That the above be received for information.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 17, BOARD OF WORLD MISSION, A&P, 1978, PAGE 408

This recommendation deals with moving expenses for ministers at the time of their retirement. The present regulation is to be amended by the addition of the following paragraph:

"That if the minister is still serving at General Assembly basic stipend and allowances, and has been called by that congregation where he/she was appointed by the BWM he/she be considered for the said moving expenses on application by his/her Presbytery,

and further to amend the third paragraph by adding the following words after BWM 'or is still serving in that congregation under call on minimum stipend'. The third paragraph would read 'The said allowance shall be calculated on the actual moving costs outlined above, at the rate of 15% for each year of consecutive service under the BWM or is still serving in that congregation under call on minimum stipend, immediately prior to retirement to a maximum of 75% of the total costs.'"

The Administrative Council has approved this change, and it is now operative.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 21 A D C

That the above be received for information.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 18, BOARD OF WORLD MISSION, A&P, 1978, PAGE 408

This recommendation, having to do with a single stipend for a married couple when appointed as overseas missionaries was originally intended to deal with a specific situation, which now has ceased to exist. It has been agreed to study the situation further, and to include regulations for appointments in Canada, as well as overseas. The Council is therefore awaiting a further report from the Board of World Mission.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 22 A

That this report be received for information.

OVERTURES REFERRED TO THE COUNCIL**OVERTURE NO. 6 - PRESBYTERY OF EAST TORONTO RE STEWARDSHIP STRUCTURE.**

The Committee appointed by the Council to study this Overture found it involved many items already under study by the Council. Multiplicity of Appeals,

Setting Budget Allocations, Zero-based Budgeting, an overall Financial Policy for the Church, all these and other items need to be considered. Therefore, the Council approved the recommendation of its Special Committee studying this Overture as follows -

RECOMMENDATION NO. 23 A

That this Overture be referred back to the Administrative Council for further study and report to the 106th General Assembly, after consulting with representatives of the Board of Congregational Life.

OVERTURE NO. 11 - PRESBYTERY OF CAPE BRETON RE REDUCTION OF THE BOARD OF CONGREGATIONAL LIFE AND ITS BUDGET.

The Administrative Council considered this Overture and reminds the General Assembly that the number of the Board of Congregational Life is already being reduced by action of the 104th General Assembly. The Budget Allocation of the Board of Congregational Life is less than that of the former constituents of the Board of Christian Education, the Board of Evangelism and Social Action, the Stewardship and Budget Board, the Committee on Presbyterian Men, and the Committee on Church Worship. The Council considers the Board of Congregational Life is offering an essential service to the Church. Now that we are introducing zero-based budgeting the entire activity of this Board will be required in order to carry out this budgeting process.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 24 A

That the Prayer of Overture No. 11 to the 105th General Assembly, be not granted.

OVERTURE NO. 12 - PRESBYTERY OF CAPE BRETON RE GENERAL ASSEMBLY APPOINTMENT OF A PROFESSOR OF THEOLOGY

The Council in its consideration of the Prayer of this Overture, is not convinced that the appointment system is inadequate, as is declared in Clause II of the preamble. There are almost always minorities in any democratic vote, but inasmuch as the appointment of a professor is equivalent to a Call to a minister, the Colleges have a selection committee which considers a number of nominations, and applications, and out of all these considerations presents the name of the person they believe is best qualified to receive the appointment. If a percentage is to be considered valid for the processing of an appointment the Council considers a simple majority is as acceptable as a 75% majority would be.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 25 A

That the Prayer of Overture No. 12 be not granted.

CHANGES IN STAFF

The 104th General Assembly agreed "that in view of the current deficit budgeting facing our denomination, a period of restraint be implemented, for a period of one year, freezing appointments at Church Offices." Some appointments agreed to before the freeze was invoked have been made.

The Reverend John Duncan, formerly minister of St. Andrew's, Perth, has replaced the Reverend Wayne Smith as Associate Secretary of the Board of Congregational Life, and the Reverend David Murphy has replaced the Reverend Alex Deans as Associate Secretary in the same Board.

The Reverend Glen Davis, an overseas missionary with the Board of World Mission, has replaced the Reverend M. Ransom as Secretary for Missionary Education. Mr. Donald Stephens has replaced the Reverend Harry Crawford as Consultant for Communication Services.

The 104th General Assembly authorized Knox College Board to take steps to make a nomination to fill the vacancy in the Chair of New Testament Language and Literature, and a nomination to this Assembly is anticipated.

The 104th General Assembly also authorized the Presbyterian College Senate to take steps to make a nomination to this Assembly to appoint a full-time Director of Studies to represent Presbyterian College in the Montreal Institute for Ministry, effective August 1st, 1979. Such nomination is likely to be made to this Assembly.

The Council, through its Committee on Executive-Personnel, considered the request of the Board of Knox College for an extension of the appointment of Dr. Donald Smith beyond the three year term agreed to by the General Assembly of 1976, and agreed that Dr. Smith should be continued as Director of Field Education, with a lessening of his responsibilities as Registrar, and adding to his position that of Professor in Church and Ministry, and that this not require a further circulation of Presbyteries, but only the approval of the 105th General Assembly.

The Council also considered by study and recommendation of its Executive-Personnel Committee the appointment of an Assistant to the Comptroller. This office was established by the Assembly, and was first occupied by Mr. James Barbour. After Mr. Barbour's appointment to the Office of Comptroller he was replaced by Mr. S. Voisey, and Mr. J. Grebby. Recently the office has not been filled, but with the work-load assumed by Mr. Creen being studied by the Executive-Personnel Committee, and recognizing the additional work-load created by the adoption of Zero-based budgeting, the difficulties of operating our Church in a deficit financial position, and the responsibilities falling to the three previous Assistants to the Comptroller, the Council has agreed to proceed as soon as possible to the calling of nominations from Presbyteries for filling this vacancy, and making the appointment as soon as possible.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 26 A

That the above report be received for information.

OTHER MATTERS

AUDITORS

RECOMMENDATION NO. 27 A

That the firm of Thorne, Riddell and Company, Chartered Accountants, be continued as Auditors of the Church accounts, and that the Administrative Council be authorized to set their fees.

TRUSTEES

Mr. W.D.S. Morden, Q.C., Chairman, the Honourable George McGillivray, Q.C., the Reverend Alex J. Calder, and Mr. W. S. Walton, Q.C., have completed their six year term as members of the Trustee Board. The Council expresses appreciation for the service these faithful churchmen have rendered. We shall need to make replacements for these persons, and usually the Trustee Board makes recommendation of suitable persons, but at the time of writing they have not arrived.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 28 A

That the Administrative Council be given authority to name replacements for retiring members of the Trustee Board.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The financial statements have been received by an audit committee on behalf of the Council and appear elsewhere in this book.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 29 A

That the financial statements be received for information.

EXECUTIVE PERSONNEL SALARIES

The Administrative Council, through its Executive-Personnel Committee, made a study of what would be the proper amount of increase of salary for executive and professorial staff. After considering the salary scale of other denominations, and

noting that in Metropolitan Toronto the cost of living rose by 8.4% in 1978 and will likely rise by a similar amount in 1979 while stipends of the staff increased by 6% in 1978. There has been no increase in increments for years of service for a considerable period of time. The Council recommends as follows -

RECOMMENDATION NO. 30 C

That an 8% increase be granted to the Executive Staff of the Church, and to College Professors, with a corresponding increase in regard to rental allowances where applicable, and that this increase be effective January 1st, 1980.

CONGRESS

The Committee planning for the 1979 Congress has been active for the past two-and-a-half years. The Congress will be held at the University of Guelph, June 29 to July 2, 1979.

The Theme is "The Power and The Glory". The Theme Speaker is the Rev. Dr. R. Sheldon MacKenzie of Memorial University, St. John's, Newfoundland. Other speakers and study leaders already secured are Mrs. Heather Johnston, Dr. William Klempa and Dr. Stanley Walters.

Arrangements are being made for upwards of 1,000 delegates. The basic cost per delegate will be \$185. (including \$30. registration, \$65. accommodation, and \$90. share in the travel pool). The Committee hopes that each Presbytery and Congregation will send their full quota of delegates to the Congress. The quota is based on an average of one delegate for every 150 members on the communion rolls.

There will be some extra cost for the delegates as the travel pool is based on approximately 80% of their actual travel costs.

Only registered delegates may attend the Congress except for the Sunday evening programme which is open to the public.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 31 A

That this be received for information.

MACLEAN ESTATE

The Maclean Estate (Crieff Hills Community) operates a programme for congregations and arranges many kinds of leadership training. Brochures are available on application to Crieff Hills Community, R.R. #2, Puslinch, Ontario N0B 2J0.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 32 A

That congregations in the area of Crieff Hills Community be invited to use the facilities for small group overnight meetings and larger one day gatherings.

UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE

A few Presbyteries have been able to take advantage of a regulation of Unemployment Insurance Coverage which decreases the payment of employers who agree to pay their employees for the first sixteen weeks of unemployment. The decrease is small, but each congregation would save approximately \$50.00 per year by taking advantage of this saving, and that would amount to approximately \$35,000 a year for all our congregations. Inasmuch as it would be very rare that a congregation would not pay their minister if incapacitated for six months, the Council considers all congregations should agree to this coverage. The Council has already recommended that Presbyteries should arrange to have all congregations in their bounds co-operate so each would share in supplying the pulpit of a fellow minister who becomes incapacitated. Some Presbyteries accomplish this by providing short term disability insurance and some do it by each congregation providing supply on a rota basis if a minister is incapacitated. To accomplish this end the following recommendation is presented -

RECOMMENDATION NO. 33 A

That Presbyteries be informed of the benefits available through participating in the above procedures.

VIETNAMESE REFUGEES

At its November meeting the Council agreed to initiate the sponsorship of refugees to this country from overseas. After some weeks of negotiations the Secretary of the Council, on behalf of The Presbyterian Church in Canada, signed an agreement with the Government of Canada whereby congregations were permitted to sponsor refugee families, or individuals, to enable them to come to Canada over and above the number of refugees admitted by government allotment. Agreement forms are available at local Immigration Offices, and congregations are encouraged to participate in this humanitarian venture.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 34 A

That congregations be encouraged to consider sponsoring refugees to settle in Canada, and to cover the expenses of housing, food, and clothing.

ADDITIONAL GROUP INSURANCE COVERAGE

The Pension Board has arranged for ministers now enrolled in Plan VIII of our Group Insurance coverage to move into Plan IX. Plan IX provides \$2,000.00 insurance at age 70 years for ministers who have joined the Group Insurance Plan before age 50 years, and is "paid up" at the age of 70 years. This coverage will be paid by ministers now paying their disability rates from age 65 to age 70, although that type of coverage ceases at age 65.

Plan IX increases the death benefit from \$25,000.00 up to age 50 years to \$30,000.00, with increased benefits on a reducing scale from age 50 to age 70.

The disability coverage is increased from \$300.00 per month to \$400.00 per month. For 1979 and 1980 the increased cost will be covered by increasing the premiums from \$8.00 per month to \$10.50 per month, ceasing at age 70, and by using the "experience rating refund" available from Canada Life for these two years.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 35 A

That ministers be encouraged to upgrade their Group Insurance to Plan IX.

COMMEND MR. L.F.D. PURNELL, Q.C.

Mr. Lyman F. D. Purnell, Q.C., has completed his term of six years on the Administrative Council, and half of that time he has served as its Chairman. This has been an especially difficult period in the Council, because it has had to deal with increased expenditures, and mostly with anticipated, and sometimes actual, deficits. Mr. Purnell has shown deep concern for all the affairs that have come before the Council, and in spite of living in St. John, N.B., his attendance at meetings has been punctual and consistent. The Council at its April meeting agreed to request the Assembly to express its appreciation to Mr. Purnell for his excellent leadership.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 36 A

That General Assembly approve the above tribute to Mr. Purnell on his completion of three years as Chairman of the Administrative Council.

COMMITTEE TO ADVISE
WITH THE MODERATOR

To the Venerable the 105th General Assembly:

The Reverend Dr. Jesse E. Bigelow, minister of Westmount Church, Edmonton, Alberta, was elected Moderator of the 104th General Assembly meeting in MacNab Street Presbyterian Church Hamilton, Ontario.

The Moderator's busy year commenced on the Sunday following the dissolution of the Assembly with a visit to a congregation celebrating its 100th Anniversary. The same week, he represented The Presbyterian Church in Canada at the 350th Anniversary of the Reformed Church In America celebrated in New York city.

In August, Dr. and Mrs. Bigelow were guests of the Government of Alberta at a banquet honouring Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth; held in Edmonton in conjunction with members of the Royal Family attending the Commonwealth Games.

In late September and early October, Dr. Bigelow accompanied by his wife, Margaret, travelled to visit the Presbyterian Church in Taiwan, visiting briefly in Hong Kong. He brought greetings to the 70th anniversary of the Korean Christian Church in Japan, and to their General Assembly meeting in Osaka on Oct. 10th and 11th. On this visit, they were accompanied by the Reverend C. Rodger and Donna Talbot, former missionaries to Japan.

The month of November saw the Moderator representing our Church at the 100th anniversary observance of the founding of Pine Hill Divinity School in Halifax. During the time the Moderator was on the Eastern seaboard, he visited several congregations within the bounds of the Synod of the Atlantic Provinces. Your committee Chairman deems it worthy of interest to note that the son of the Moderator, the Rev. J. Cameron Bigelow, as Moderator of the Presbytery of P.E.I. shared in the services on two occasions at which his father was the guest preacher.

Later in November, the Moderator participated in the service of Installation of the Rev. Dr. William J. Klempa as Principal of the Presbyterian College, Montreal; conducted by the Presbytery of Montreal.

The immediate past Moderator, Dr. DeCourcy H. Rayner, acted on behalf of the Moderator in representing our Church at several functions during the year, including the Installation of the Governor General of Canada, the Hon. Edward Schreyer in 1979.

During January and February visits were made to the Synods of British Columbia and Manitoba, and to the Synod of Saskatchewan in April. During this time, the Moderator also responded to invitations from congregations within the Synod of Alberta. The Central Synods were visited during the months of September, November, March and May.

In May, Dr. and Mrs. Bigelow will represent our Church at the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, meeting in Edinburgh.

In addition to his many travels, and at the invitation of the Editor of the Presbyterian Record Dr. Bigelow contributed a column for that publication on a monthly basis entitled "From the Moderator".

OVERTURE 10, 1979 - PRESBYTERY OF CAPE BRETON
RE: THE METHOD OF ELECTING MODERATORS
OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY

This Overture was referred to the Committee to Advise with the Moderator, and consideration was given to the preamble and prayer of the Overture. The Committee considers that there are some inaccuracies in the reasoning of the Presbytery. For example, the Committee is not complaining of the extra work that is alleged to have been forced upon it. The counting of the ballots this year actually took only one and one-half hours to complete. This committee considers that a "simple" rota system by Synods would be unfair because of the large variation in the number of ministers in our Synods. This Committee does agree that the number of names on the ballots in the last two years is larger than desirable. Some consideration was given to recommending that each Presbytery could make two nominations as was permitted in earlier voting, and requiring a nominee to receive at least two nominations before qualifying, but it was agreed to leave amendments to the wishes of members of the Assembly. The Committee is therefore making a recommendation that should reduce the number of names on the ballot.

RECOMMENDATION No. 1 A

That the Reverend Kenneth G. McMillan, D.D., General Secretary of the Canadian Bible Society be officially nominated as Moderator of the 105th General Assembly.

RECOMMENDATION No. 2 A

That the thanks of the Assembly be tendered to the Courts of the Church, the congregations, and the many persons who received the Moderator with kindness, courtesy and respect.

RECOMMENDATION No. 3 A

That profound gratitude be extended to the retiring Moderator, the Rev. Dr. Jesse E. Bigelow for his tireless labours on behalf of the Church during his extensive travels. We also take this opportunity to express our warm thanks to Mrs. Bigelow for her strong support of her husband during the past several months, and for the way in which she enhanced the office of the Moderator by her presence at so many Church and State functions.

RECOMMENDATION No. 4 C

That ministers receiving nominations from two or more Presbyteries shall be eligible to be named on the ballot for nomination of a Moderator for the next General Assembly.

To the Venerable the 105th General Assembly:

These funds are administered by the Administrative Council acting through a sub-committee of five members. Information is received confidentially by the Secretary of the Council who makes a recommendation for assistance to the members of the Committee. Assistance is given to ministers, widows of ministers, and in rare cases to members of the Church who find themselves in financial embarrassment, and monthly cheques are sent to about 40 widows and 14 ministers.

During the past two years a deficit situation developed in the Pitts and Scott Funds, which are the only funds that permit payment to the widows of ministers. The last two Assemblies requested assistance from Sessions to alleviate this deficiency, but no response was made. Last Fall the Administrative Council authorized its Secretary to make a special appeal to sessions in order that widows might receive the same support as that provided to retired ministers. The response was instantaneous and generous. Contributions are still being received as this report is written. The amount received has totalled over \$50,000.00. This will enable the Committee to give reasonable support for the foreseeable future. Our Church can show mercy when challenged so to do, and funds are available when need is made known.

RECOMMENDATION 1. A

That Sessions, and individuals, be thanked for the generous support made to the appeal for assistance to our Benevolent Funds.

THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH ARCHITECTURE

To the Venerable the 105th General Assembly:

The function of the Committee on Church Architecture is to advise Presbyteries, Congregations and the Church Lending Agencies regarding the suitability of plans and cost estimates for proposed church buildings. Our procedures are outlined in Guidelines for Planning a Church, which is available from the Secretary at the National Office. Submission of preliminary sketch plans enables the Committee to comment at the critical early stages of the planning process, occasionally preventing costly adjustments at a later date. The Committee subsequently reviews and approves the revised drawings before working drawings are commenced.

The Committee notes that sometimes after tenders for construction have been received drastic deletions are proposed to reduce costs and bring the project within the budget. Reduction of insulation, double glazing, energy conservation measures, etc. is a short-sighted solution which we do not recommend. The Committee is available for further consultation at this stage.

The Committee has been active during the past year, having held one meeting of the full membership, and five meetings of the Executive, to review, comment upon and approve the plans for fifteen church building projects. The Committee has also produced its second publication entitled The Property Committee Handbook which is now available to congregations at cost.

Two actions of recent General Assemblies pose a dilemma for your Committee, the first being a reduction of the annual allotted budget. In an effort to reduce costs the Committee agreed several years ago to hold one annual meeting for consideration of policy matters, at which all members from various parts of the country would be present. The ongoing business of the Committee would be dealt with by an Executive sub-committee made up of members residing in southern Ontario, whose services are made available to the Church through the Committee at little or no expense. Our budget for 1980 has been reduced from \$1500 to \$500. The Committee cannot bring its members together now for even one full meeting a year, which would involve minimum travel costs of \$1300.

The second problem results from the reduction of membership. In order to properly perform its function it is essential that the Committee include Architects, Cost Consultants, Engineers, Ministers and officials involved in Church Building. If these disciplines are to be adequately represented at meetings dealing with specific projects, and often called on short notice, it is necessary to have available a minimum of nine members located in the vicinity of Toronto for obvious budgetary reasons. The remaining members from other areas are generally Architects who attend the annual meeting only, make valuable contributions to discussions about policy, and thereafter represent the Committee in dealing with projects in their own areas throughout the year.

RECOMMENDATION No. 1. A

That the membership of the Committee on Church Architecture be set at 12 members, nine from the Toronto-Hamilton area, three others from elsewhere in Canada.

RECOMMENDATION No. 2. C

That a budget of \$1500 be provided to the Committee for its work during 1980.

RECOMMENDATION No. 3. A

That the General Assembly advise Presbyteries and Congregations to consult with the Committee before approving significant adjustments to plans previously approved in order to reduce costs.

THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH DOCTRINE

To the Venerable 105th General Assembly:

The Committee on Church Doctrine respectfully submits the following report of its work.

I. MINISTRY OF WORD AND SACRAMENTS

The following statement on the Ministry of Word and Sacraments is formulated in response to the 104th General Assembly's decision to refer our statement of 1978 back to the Committee on Church Doctrine for further study. In its ensuing discussions the committee has given serious consideration both to the criticisms and constructive proposals which were suggested in connection with its previous statement. Consequently, the following revised statement is now submitted for consideration and approval.

A STATEMENT ON THE MINISTRY OF WORD AND SACRAMENTS

A. *This Ministry in Relation to the Mission of the Church and the Ministry of All Christians.*

Whenever a person is ordained either to the Ministry of Word and Sacraments or to the Ruling Eldership, we are reminded that all Christians have a ministry:

All ministries of the Church proceed from and are sustained by the ministry of our Lord Jesus Christ. He is our Prophet, Priest and King, the Minister of the covenant of grace. By the operation of God's Word and Spirit the Church is gathered, equipped and sent out to participate in this ministry. All her members are called to share the Gospel with the world. . . .¹

All have a ministry and as we serve God in and through our family, social and public life we are instruments of His grace and truth.

To enable the community of faith to live out God's purposes in the world, within the Church the Gospel must be faithfully proclaimed and taught, the sacraments rightly administered and the people of God nurtured by pastoral oversight. It is chiefly through these means that God takes command of His people's lives. This is why Christ chose, taught and empowered His Apostles to perform these functions before He proceeded to build His Church upon them.² For this reason also, Christ has perpetuated their particular ministry by continually providing the Church with men and women to be its pastors and teachers. We, therefore, believe that the Ministry of Word and Sacraments is an historical order continuing from the Apostles.

Our Lord Jesus Christ appoints some in the Church with authority to preach the Gospel, administer the sacraments and exercise pastoral rule in His name. This ministry is an historical order continuing from the Apostles, which Christ perpetuates as He wills by calling and setting apart others to carry onward this true apostolic succession until the end of the age.³

Presbyterians have always sought to order the Church's life in agreement with the practice and teaching of the New Testament Church. Though the variety of church offices and orders as they subsequently developed in the first century cannot be precisely duplicated today, the Church does conform to the ancient and biblically attested pattern of recognizing certain individuals within the whole community of faith as being specifically chosen to proclaim and teach the Word of God, to administer the sacraments and to exercise special leadership and pastoral oversight within and for the Church. The New Testament refers to them as *presbuteroi* or *episkopoi* — as presbyters or bishops.⁴ Within The Presbyterian Church in Canada they are frequently called *teaching elders* (a misnomer since they are teaching-ruling elders) and are more properly known as ministers of Word and Sacraments.

To this particular Ministry Christ has given not only the responsibility of preaching His Word and celebrating the sacraments but also that of safeguarding their purity. "The standards of His Church He entrusts in a special degree of responsibility to their care."⁵ They are "stewards of the mysteries of God."⁶ This Ministry, therefore, is necessary to the well-being of the Church: a view the Reformers also adopted.⁷ It is, therefore, not to be equated with, dissolved in or subsumed under any other office in the Church.

B. *Ordination.*

Since this ministerial order is charged with the stewardship of their office, ministers alone — in our case, duly assembled in presbytery — have the power to ordain a person to this office.⁸

Ordination places one into an ordered arrangement, into a recognized office and into a position of responsibility, accountability and authority for the discharge of a particular function. A minister is ordained to interpret, apply and communicate God's Word. This is usually done through preaching, teaching, administering the sacraments and exercising leadership and pastoral oversight. Through such means persons within and outside the Church are reconciled to God and the people of God are better enabled to carry out their own ministry in the church and in the world.⁹

As steward of the office, a presbytery should ensure that those who seek ordination meet certain standards. These are founded on Scripture and relate to the function of interpreting, applying and communicating the Word of God. Applicants should be responding to a Divine call to this ministry since this is not an office a person seeks for oneself but to which one is summoned.¹⁰ They should possess the necessary gifts, education and training for those whom God calls. He also equips and from them expects competence.¹¹ They should also be acceptable as future ministers to at least a representative and responsible segment of God's people.¹² Depending upon the locale and nature of one's particular ministry this body might be, for example, a congregation, a board or agency of the Church or a church court. It should be understood, however, that acceptability is not necessarily popularity. To judge solely on the basis of popularity is dangerous, but so is the possibility that one's ministry will be ineffectual because of one's personality or other personal characteristics.

Recognizing that the Holy Spirit is free to direct a person to labour other than as a pastor of a congregation, Reformed Churches historically have approved other forms of ministry and areas of activity as proper for ordained ministers. Professors and principals of theological colleges, certain positions on our national staff, evangelists-at-large, superintendents of mission and others have so been recognized by our Church. The Presbyterian Church in Canada also allows its ministers to enter *cognate work*. Cognate work is a ministry carried out under an agency other than the institutional church requiring competence in interpreting, applying and communicating the Word of God. Where such a requirement is definitely lacking, the work should be considered an area of Christian service more appropriate for the unordained church member.

The custom of our Church is to ordain to a full-time ministry of Word and Sacraments. Hence those who labour within the Church receive a stipend which frees them financially to serve the community of faith and its mission on a full-time basis. Though full-time service is the norm, the Church is free, when faced with an unusual situation, both to validate a part-time ministry and to permit a minister to earn the greater part of his or her income from secular work. In the latter case the presbytery should remain satisfied that the minister's secular work has not replaced his sacred calling as his primary interest, and in both cases that the Church is being adequately served by the best available means.

We also hold that in accepting ordination to this office a person commits oneself to it for life. Ordained persons, therefore, ought not relinquish their ministry without sufficient cause nor without the permission of the presbytery. The biblical theology behind our understanding of ordination stresses God's involvement in the whole process. It is God who calls, empowers and enables. For this reason among others one should neither lightly nor on one's own authority disavow one's ordination. Nevertheless when a person truly believes himself no longer called to this ministry permission should be granted to demit the office without loss of honour.

Can one's ministry be otherwise terminated and under what circumstances? The answer to the first part of this question is Yes. At ordination a person is authorized to discharge a function. Power and authority are involved but these are primarily in the Word and not in the person being ordained. Thus one who can be charged with a function through which God's Word is operative can be removed from that function. Biblical examples support this view. Irresponsible priests were removed from office. The Spirit of God departed from Saul long before his death and David

was anointed in his place.¹³ Hosea quite firmly pronounced the removal of the holy mantle from both prophet and priest.¹⁴ While not conclusive, these examples indicate that the calling and endowing of those who preached and taught were not always considered permanent characteristics or powers of the persons involved.

In answer to the second part of the question, it is our practice in The Presbyterian Church in Canada not to remove a person from the ministerial office except for the most serious offences. These would include preaching of heresy, scandalous behaviour and the refusal to be accountable to the presbytery for his or her life, manner or vocation.

C. Accountability.

Ministers are accountable primarily to Christ whose servants they are and to the presbytery. While pastors of congregations are not under the jurisdiction of their Session, they are nonetheless obliged to abide by decisions made by that court which lie within its sphere of authority.

RECOMMENDATION No. 1. C

That the revised statement on the Ministry of Word and Sacraments be adopted as a current interpretation in agreement with the standards of our church.

RECOMMENDATION No. 2. C

That the Committee be authorised to proceed with a study of the ministry of the people of God, including the office and function of the elder.

II. HUSBAND-WIFE MINISTRY

The Presbyterian Church in Canada ordains persons into the Holy Ministry when they are called thereto, when they are judged fit and have completed the requirements of education. One's sex, marital status or being a parent are not barriers to this calling. Hence they cannot be barriers when The Church desires to ordain both husband and wife, whether called or appointed separately to one or more pastoral charges or together to one pastoral charge. The wont and usage of our Church is only that a full-time ministry be provided wherever feasible. The definition of stipend being an income to enable persons to do the work of ministry without undue hardships, it is permissible to pay one stipend to two persons married to each other. Therefore, the Committee approves the ordination of both husband and wife, who are to serve in separate pastoral charges, or as a team ministry in which both serve two pastoral charges or in one pastoral charge. Details are to be worked out carefully by the Board of World Mission and the presbytery or presbyteries concerned.

RECOMMENDATION No. 3. A

That the above statement on Husband-Wife Ministry be approved.

III. REPLY TO OVERTURE NO. 22 — PRESBYTERY OF KINGSTON (A & P 1977, 426, 29, 46) & OVERTURE NO. 28 — PRESBYTERY OF MIRAMICHI (A & P 1978, 473-5) RE: STATEMENT OF DEPOSITION

The concerns of the Overtures were similar in many respects and are best seen in a summary of the Overture from the Presbytery of Kingston. The General Assembly was asked to:

1. declare The Statement on Deposition unwise counsel because reasons for deposition vary within The Holy Catholic Church;
2. recognize the right of appeal from one denomination to another due to fallibility of Synods and Councils;
3. maintain judgments of other denominations until and unless such appeal is made and upheld.

The Presbytery of Kingston is not so far removed from our understanding of deposition when it argues in its third point to maintain the unity of the Church. The confusion lies in two areas. What do we mean when we say "churches should respect one another's discipline" and what do we mean by "appeal"?

First, by respecting one another's discipline we by no means intend a blind acceptance of that discipline. "Respect" does not mean "accept" but to "honour" (see the reply to Overture 9, A & P 1977, p. 222-223) or in the words of the Presbytery of Kingston, "recognize".

In view of the divided state of The Church we agree that deposition from one denomination does not necessarily constitute cause for deposition in another but neither does deposition from one denomination qualify a person to serve as a minister in another denomination. Therefore, to "respect" one another's discipline is to examine thoroughly the action and the reason for that action before accepting a deposed minister as a person fit for the ministry of our Church. The gravity of deposition in any denomination is such that it requires this treatment.

Secondly, we recognize the divided state of The Church when we advise that a court "having to deal with a minister whose doctrinal position is at variance with that of our Church would counsel him to seek admission into the ministry of another denomination whose doctrine and discipline are more compatible with his own views rather than risk deposition" for divisiveness (A & P 1977 p. 222-223). On this basis we, after due examination, also accept ministers from other denominations. In these cases, however, no deposition has taken place.

Thirdly, such an examination does not constitute an "appeal". Appeals can be made only within denominations since denominations have no jurisdiction over each other. An appeal is an attempt to overturn a judgment. As it is clearly impossible for The Supreme Court of The United States of America to overturn a decision by The Supreme Court of Canada, so The Presbyterian Church in Canada cannot overturn a Papal decision, nor can The General Council of The United Church of Canada overturn a decision of The General Assembly of The Presbyterian Church in Canada. No denomination can serve as a court of appeal vis-a-vis another since each denomination is sole judge over its doctrine and discipline. We may and do disagree with each other in some matters. It is not for us to say whether a person was unjustly deposed from the ministry of another denomination. We have the right, however, and the responsibility to assess carefully whether such a person is fit for the ministry of our Church. Here we simply assert what we said in the reply of 1978 (A & P p. 228-9): "Should a deposed minister transfer his membership to a different branch of The Church and subsequently seek admission to its ministry, this does not constitute an appeal but a church member's request to have his fitness for ministry assessed by his denomination in the light of its own standards and requirements".

IN ADDITION WE WOULD REPLY FURTHER TO OVERTURE NO. 28 — PRESBYTERY OF MIRAMICHI (A & P 1978, p. 473-5) AS FOLLOWS:

re ORDINATION. Ordination is not "only an outward and human act." In Reformed discipline the individual "call" is not sufficient. The marks of the Ministry

also include a call to function as a minister; it must be shown by the ability to interpret Scripture; and one must be acceptable to a congregation before induction. (The Form of Church Government, Concerning the Doctrinal Part of Ordination of Ministers, 6-8). The Holy Spirit calls persons to the Ministry not only by addressing individuals but through The Church. Thus in Acts 6:5 "the whole multitude" were pleased to separate the Apostles "to prayer and to the ministry of the word." The multitude chose the diaconate. When Barnabas and Paul were called to missionary work the Holy Spirit called through the gathered "prophets and teachers" (Acts 13:1-3). No "private" call is mentioned. In 1 Timothy 4:14 the weight of calling is given to the laying on of hands by the council of presbyters. In fact, the admonition is given not to be "hasty" in the laying on of hands (1 Timothy 5:22), hardly proper advice if the decisive factor for ordination is the private call. In Titus 1:5-9, ordination is by appointment following the examination of life, doctrine and ability. The New Testament evidence is that the act of ordination followed the decisive call from The Church under the direction of the Holy Spirit. The Church has the final responsibility in obedience to the Holy Spirit to declare the fitness of a person for the Ministry. Therefore, ordination "is always to be continued in the church." (The Form of Church Government: Concerning . . . ordination . . . , 2.) The wisdom of this procedure is clearly seen as compared to sad results which follow when an irresponsible person assumes the Ministry without authorization.

The appeal by The Presbytery of Miramichi to sections 11 and 12 of The Form of Presbyterian Church Government: Concerning the Doctrinal Part of Ordination of Ministers, is ill-founded. The "extraordinary" case of section 12 cannot be thought of as "private" ordination. Section 2, quoted above, is quite emphatic on this matter. Historically it permitted the Church to call men into its Ministry who were not as fully qualified as desired. The "extraordinary occasion" was "the present supply of ministers" (section 12). The exact parallel is to be seen today in the lowering of educational requirements for General Assembly students and permitting Catechists to preach. These sections do not support a claim for extraordinary ordination nor do they tell us what to do when "it is not possible to have God's calling publicly acknowledged in the divinely instituted form." The Ministry is never a "right" to be claimed. It is a responsible service to and in the Church of Jesus Christ. Whether it is sought by persons unordained or deposed, it cannot be bestowed hastily, carelessly and outside the discipline of The Church.

Ordination is always more than an outward and human act. The Lord, guiding His Body by means of The Holy Spirit is Himself involved in the call of The Church and in the laying on of hands.

This Overture suggests a break from the discipline of The Presbyterian Church in Canada when it states that ordination is by "laying on of hands of the assembled elders (the presbytery, in the broad sense of that word)." "Ordination is with prayer and the laying on of hands in which *all the ministers present, and they alone join.*" (Book of Forms 235.) See also section 4, Concerning the Doctrinal Part of Ordination, The Form of Church Government. In Acts 6:6 the Apostles ordain; in 1 Timothy 1:14 the council of presbyters is not a modern presbytery but a council of teaching elders.

RECOMMENDATION No. 4. C

That the prayer of the overture No. 22, Presbytery of Kingston (A & P 1977, p. 426) and the prayer of the overture No. 28, Presbytery of Miramichi (A & P 1978, pp. 473-5) be not granted and that the further statement on Deposition be approved.

IV. OVERTURE NO. 9, 1979 FROM THE PRESBYTERY OF HALIFAX AND LUNENBURG RE: PLACING OF THE NAMES OF UNITED CHURCH MINISTERS WHO SERVE OUR CONGREGATIONS IN A CO-OPERATIVE ARRANGEMENT ON THE CONSTITUENT ROLL OF PRESBYTERY

The Committee would comment as follows:

1. The critical factor is that whoever is on the constituent roll of Presbytery then comes under the discipline of that court. We believe that the United Church

would not care to have its Ministers under the discipline of our courts just as we would not care to have our Ministers under the discipline of theirs. The confusion of jurisdictions would lead to too many problems. It would be far better to involve such Ministers as are referred to in the Overture in more informal ways in the life of our Church.

2. Ministers referred to in the Overture can and in the opinion of the Committee should be invited to sit and correspond. Moreover such persons can and should be invited to participate in the life of Presbytery by being members of committees. The convener and secretary of Presbytery committees should be members of that court but other members may be from any church of whatever denomination.

RECOMMENDATION No. 5: C

That the Prayer of the Overture be not granted.

V. ONE BAPTISM, ONE EUCHARIST, AND A MUTUALLY RECOGNIZED MINISTRY

In 1975 the World Council of Churches published its Faith and Order Paper no. 73, entitled *One Baptism, One Eucharist, and a Mutually Recognized Ministry*. Responses to this paper were requested from the Churches and the Rev. Dr. David Hay and the Rev. Nicholas Vandermeij of the Church Doctrine Committee sent replies. A second booklet, "a reply to the replies", was sent out from the World Council under the title *Towards an Ecumenical Consensus: Baptism, Eucharist, Ministry*. This paper (no. 84) summarized the progress that had been made and recommended matters for further action and consideration.

The area of greatest consensus was that of the Eucharist. A majority of Churches recognize the Sacrament as "the centre of the ongoing life of the Church". For our Church in particular comes a challenge concerning frequency of celebration. The paper recommends "regular weekly celebration of the eucharist", a position supported by the tradition of the early Church, by John Calvin, as well as by implication in the Westminster *Directory of Public Worship's* command that "the communion, or supper of the Lord, is frequently to be celebrated." Our own committee felt that a beginning in this direction might be made on days of particular significance to the Church (e.g. Christmas, Easter, Pentecost, All Saints) as an addition to our prevailing quarterly celebrations.

In the area of Baptism, though there is "notable agreement" concerning the meaning of Baptism, the matter of Infant Baptism as over against exclusively adult Baptism remains unresolved.

Similarly with Ministry, while there is substantial agreement regarding the normality, continuity and christological basis of ordained Ministry, there must be more discussion about the meaning and expression of *episcopate* (oversight) in the Church.

This committee suggests that our Church continue her ongoing studies in these areas, keeping in mind that we are addressing ourselves to an increasingly ecumenical situation. It is our hope that further work will reflect an outlook that is relevant, challenging and conciliatory toward the positions, past and present, taken by the other Churches participating in the World Council's Faith and Order studies.

VI. THE VALUE OF HUMAN LIFE

**GENETIC ENGINEERING AND THE MEANING OF HUMAN LIFE
An Introductory Study**

It has become increasingly necessary to consider the far-reaching ramifications of *genetic engineering* for the meaning of human life. *Genetic engineering* has enormous possibilities. Kenneth Clark declared that "we might be on the threshold of scientific biomedical intervention which could stabilize and make dominant the moral and ethical propensities of man and subordinate, if not eliminate, his negative and primitive behavioral tendencies." We must speak also of present realities. A successful "test-tube conception" is now history. A baby conceived outside the

human body has been born — Louise Brown, born at Britain's Oldham General Hospital on July 25, 1978. Given the expansive possibilities and successes of biogenetics, understanding and guidance are necessary. This paper seeks to define the goals, the motivations and the assumptions of current biomedicine, to raise some pertinent questions and to provide some biblical and theological perspectives on the issues latent in genetic engineering.

Some Pro-Visions

Genetic engineering can be defined as "covering anything having to do with the manipulation of the gametes or the fetus, for whatever purpose, from conception other than by sexual union, to the treatment of disease *in utero*, to the manufacture of a human being to exact specifications" (*American Medical Association*). Genetic engineering then, proposes intervention, sometimes of immense proportions, in the "normal" genetic processes.

Genetic medicine is *preconceptive*: it proposes control of the basic genetic makeup of a new individual by reaching back through conception barriers to control the primal stuff that enters into the origin of human life with a view to preventing genetic defects at the source. Its intention is to locate and alter the genes which cause physical defects in people. The idea is to remove the bad genetic traits in order to liberate the good ones. Genetic medicine is informed by the laudable dictum that every child has the right to be free of genetic defect and abnormality insofar as this can be achieved.

Genetic engineering is the science of *eugenics*. It takes the form of either *negative eugenics* or *positive eugenics*. The former aims at the elimination of hereditary defects that have already occurred in individuals or preventing those who carry defective genes from passing them to their offspring. Genetic and fetal therapy are its major forms. The latter, rather than seeking to eliminate present defects, is concerned about improving the human race through various forms of controlled reproduction. The possibilities here are artificial insemination by donor, artificial in ovulation, *in vitro* fertilization and selected cloning.

Genetic engineering has as its background the "genetic dilemma." "Pollution" is not confined to the vocabulary of ecology; it also belongs to biomedicine, which is particularly concerned with the increasing "pollution in the genetic pool." Unfortunately, we are constantly contributing to the pollution in the genetic pool, a prime example of how a new finding can be a two-edged sword. Every time we find a treatment (which is not a cure) for a defective condition, we keep people alive who previously would have died before reaching the age for procreation. Now they live long enough to pass on their defective genes (See Leroy Augenstein, *Come Let Us Play God*. Harper & Row, 1969; p. 31). The "genetic dilemma" is marked by "reproductive roulette" (Joseph Fletcher, *The Ethics of Genetic Control*, Doubleday, 1974). Genetic engineering seeks to overcome "reproductive roulette" by purposive intervention in the genetic flow. It seeks not only to interpret the genetic pool, but to change it. It approves of Teilhard de Chardin's statement: "So far we have certainly allowed our race to develop at random, but now we should give some thought to what medical and moral factors must replace the crude forms of natural selection" (*The Phenomenon of Man*, p. 279).

The underlying assumption of genetic medicine is that physical reality can be understood and that its aberrations can be minimized or eliminated. A primary issue in genetic science is that of remaking humanity and creating life. It is now possible to speak of *homo autofabricus* (Fletcher, *op. cit.*, p. 4), a prospect which is so clearly evident in the case of "cloning", i.e. reproduction from one parent only, using a body cell instead of combining a sperm and ovum (See Paul Ramsey, *Fabricated Man*. Yale University Press, 1970; pp. 60-96). The present biological revolution therefore represents a quantum leap in human change. It is filled with live possibilities and far-reaching implications for what it means to be human. Indeed, it places us in a unique situation of responsibility, a situation of responsibility which involves the *entire* community. To cite Kenneth Vaux, "our present technologies are frightening in their power, and they are only the beginning. They are frightening for one simple reason: they enlarge our responsibility. We will soon have the anticipatory knowledge, and therefore the responsibility, of choosing the kind of being

we allow to enter the human community" (*Biomedical Ethics*. Harper & Row, 1974; p. 3). Present biomedical breakthroughs place before us the necessity of responsible questioning.

Some Questions

What image of human existence serves as an adequate framework for determining our response to the reality of genetic disease or defect? The question has several implications. It is important, first of all, because it raises the issue of what constitutes acceptable human normality, a matter crucial for social responsibility. Behind the horror at genetic defectiveness there often stands a kind of prototype of human perfection which tends to narrow the range of acceptable normality. To cite Paul Ramsay:

Intrauterine screening seems destined to degrade society's willingness to accept and care for abnormal children and, at the same time, to enlarge the category of unacceptable abnormality, while narrowing the range of acceptable normality (*Ethical Issues in Human Genetics: Genetic Counselling and the Use of Genetic Knowledge*, eds. Bruce Hilton, Daniel Callahan et. al. New York: Plenum Press, 1973; p. 159).

Our image of man is important, for to adopt a prototype of human perfection is to posit a *monistic* image of humanity. But behind society's at least verbal commitment to civil rights, to justice for all, notes Daniel Callahan, "lies a rejection of images of individual perfection and uniformity" (*Ethical Issues*, p. 87). Humanity is *pluriform*. In fact, an image of the human based upon a pluralistic rather than a monistic picture of reality has been hard-won. It would be supreme irony, if, in the name of even greater progress, there was reintroduced the old monistic, monotypical kind of thinking, this time, as before, in the name of value, good order, and a mythical notion of perfection (Callahan, *ibid.*). The recognition that humanity is *pluriform* has issued in a recognition of those who have actual inequalities of individual assets and liabilities in society, a sense of shared responsibility for those having lesser genetic endowments. Such recognition represents a triumph, a triumph which, in the words of Callahan,

would be all for nothing if we accept the idea that defectives and their parents have no right to burden the rest of us with their troubles, or that it would be naive to find a social solution for a problem which can be done away with by a scientific solution (*Ibid.* p. 88).

The question of genetically defective children has further social implications. Bernard Häring warns that the fear of having defective children could easily become psychotic in our society. In fact, genetic education and the development of consciousness must be aware of the danger of manipulating people through unnecessary fear over the possibility of having defective children (*Ethics of Manipulation*. New York: Seabury, 1975; p. 172).

It is, secondly, important to ask in the context of mythical views of perfection whether the view of humanity that provides the impetus for the "creation of a new humanity" is basically the construct of a utopian vision. Is the "new person" envisioned, in fact, a Superman? If so, are we not projecting a person who is less than human? James F. Gustafson rightly underlines that in genetic engineering there should be a concern both for the means of research and for possible consequences of it which might violate the human as we have known it (*Theology and Christian Ethics*. Philadelphia: The United Church Press, 1974; p. 230).

Mythical views of a perfect humanity prompt additional questions. We ask whether we have an ideal biological model of humanity within our grasp. It appears that, over against "the mythical-perfect man", we have only one genetic picture of humanity — humanity as it now is — and however desirable it may be to improve upon our genetic lot, our task is to improve humanity as we now know it.

The question of what image of human existence shall inform our response to the reality of genetic disease is important, thirdly, because it raises the question, "What model of humanity shall we adopt?" Vaux appropriately asks,

Surely we are meant to transform human life toward its designed wholeness and potential. But what of positive eugenics? What of novelty creativity as

opposed to corrective alteration? Shall we clone man? Whose man shall we clone? Who says who will clone whom? Some serious scientists still argue the genetic deficiency of the black and the poor. Shall we refine the race? Who is your model 'ubermensch'? (*op. cit.*, p. 58).

The validity of such questions is clear when it is recognized that biomedicine does not proceed without certain presuppositions, not least of which is a particular view of humanity and its destiny. As Ramsey notes, "Our fundamental decisions will be made at the point where we accept a particular understanding of man" (*The New Genetics*, p. 171). Indeed, the scientist involved in biomedical experimentation can scarcely evade the question of what it means to be human.

To speak of "fundamental decisions" in biomedical experimentation is to raise the matter of moral responsibility. The spectre of the Third Reich and its medical experiments serves to sharpen our moral sensitivities. To cite Vaux,

When creativity becomes captive to demonic purpose, which military purpose always is and political purpose most frequently is, then we contradict the moral purpose of reality and invite destruction (*op. cit.*, p. 58).

Today we have immensely greater possibilities for perpetuating the strong than in the days of the Third Reich. Shall we allow our creativity to perpetuate the strong at the expense of the weak, those who do not comply with a certain model of humanity? Is it not the case that a genetic expertise free of moral restraints runs the risk of intensifying the inequalities of our day?

What it means to be human has further implications. The nature of humanity cannot be settled from a purely genetic or biological standpoint. Scientific anthropology runs the risk of de-personalizing man. The supreme norm in approaching the question of genetic improvement is the quality of life that will ensue, and not the sheer fact of life. Bernard Häring notes: "The mere observance of the impersonal and sub-personal laws and tendencies of 'nature' cannot guarantee an increasingly humane order of development" (*Medical Ethics*, Notre Dame: Fides Publishers, 1973; p. 62). To argue in these terms is not a matter of "spiritualizing man"; it is to underline the interpenetration of "spirit" and "flesh" in humanity and view humanity in a holistic way. A holistic approach to the human recognizes that "the spiritual person" is never possible without the concurrence of the body, "the flesh" (Häring, *ibid.* p. 50). But it also recognizes that what we do to "the flesh" has implications for "the spiritual" dimensions of earthly, bodily life. A violation of "the flesh" can violate the whole person. Biomedicine can serve us if it is careful to avoid fragmentation of bodily life.

The omnipresence of technology makes the issues surrounding genetic engineering particularly acute. The risk that the new genetics can become a servant of the goals of a technological society is certainly present, for technology is inclined to assess human value in terms of social usefulness and fitness, in which case medicine may well become "techno-medicine" and the doctor a "technician". Indeed, it may be asked whether genetic engineering does not belong in part to an extension of technology to the field of human medicine. The confidence of technology is expressed in the introduction to *The Bionic Man* — "we have the technology; we can rebuild him". We may rightly ask, "To what degree is the current optimism regarding the possibilities of genetic engineering an expression of our faith in technology?" "Man as Machine" is a prevailing perception of our time, and it implies that man can be improved as a machine can be improved. "This is precisely the reason", says Vaux, "that we have great difficulty in establishing an ethical context for health problems and fail to understand the dynamics and ramifications of moral decisions in the biomedical sphere" (*op. cit.*, XV).

There is a technocratic logic which assumes that those things which *can* be done inevitably *will* be done, or at least, *ought* to be done. It is spelled out in the belief, in some quarters, that the biological revolution under discussion will save humanity. We are tempted to embrace many scientific and technological innovations because we suppose these things to be our salvation. To believe that our salvation shall come from the biological revolution betrays a superficial reading of man's predicament. As Häring remarks, "today's world suffers more from the morally and spiritually defective than the genetically defective" (*Ethics of Manipulation*, p. 169).

For example, the abuse of corporate power is rooted in the moral and spiritual defects of the strong, and we have no guarantee that the "new man" envisioned by many protagonists of biological engineering will have sharper moral sensitivities. Is the failure to will *and* to do what is morally right rooted in genetic defects?

There is a mystery about man and his predicament that is only partially addressed in genetic science. The Christian can concur with genetic science in the concern for human wholeness, but he also affirms that the return to human wholeness comes as a gift. *Shalom* comes to us and our communities from God's gift of forgiveness and love. The Gospel speaks of a "new man", but out of an optimism born of grace. To bracket the "new man" and "grace" is to say Jesus Christ in whom this "new man" is disclosed and through whom this "new man" is made possible, which represents a more profound understanding of man and his possibilities.

Two further issues attend the matter of genetic engineering. Firstly, the new biomedicine with its advocacy of "cloning" impinges upon human sexuality at a crucial point. To have "babies without sex" would spell a serious division between human sexuality and procreative love. Integral to "the image of God" in man is sexuality (man is created *male* and *female*), and included is the ideal union of love and harmony between husband and wife ("one flesh"), which also includes procreation (Philip E. Hughes, *The Control of Human Life*. Philadelphia: Presbyterian & Reformed, 1973; pp. 7-8). While sexual union is eminently intended as an expression of love, it also involves the procreative aspect. Indeed, human procreation differs from animal or plant procreation precisely in the measure to which it functions within, and "in order to incarnate an antecedent loving relationship" (Harman L. Smith, *Ethics and the New Medicine*. Nashville: Abingdon, 1970; p. 81). Bernard Häring's remarks are equally pertinent:

By abolishing the normal biological relationships, the irreversible commitment of specific adults to specific children would be massively endangered. . . Man is an embodied person who needs to belong, to trust, to be accepted. He cannot separate biological belonging from its rootedness in irreversible human responsibility (*Ethic of Manipulation*, pp. 204-205).

Secondly, we must raise the question of cost. Scientific advances in human medicine are not without cost to the beneficiaries *and* the taxpayers. Can we absorb the cost? Is it in our best interests to expend funds for such research in view of the already heavy burden on the public dollar? We must also ask whether funds spent on genetic research could not be better utilized in ameliorating some of the conceivably more pressing social needs. It is quite possible that monies urgently needed elsewhere might be siphoned off for use in biomedical research. Our resources are limited; hence, we need to examine our priorities and engage in cost/benefit analysis, as is evident in the case of recombinant DNA (deoxyribonucleic acid) research. Recombinant DNA contains the genetic key to all of life, and the anticipated benefits of research into this genetic key are mind-boggling. It is theoretically possible to design bacteria which will manufacture hormones or blood-clotting for hemophiliacs. It may even be possible by recombinant DNA technology to develop vaccines which will attack viruses. Such aims are certainly laudable, and success in such research would certainly spell outstanding benefits. However, we must consider the cost. To cite James H. Burtness,

One cost often neglected in the debate over recombinant DNA research concerns the allocation of scarce resources that might be used otherwise. Even if those potential benefits can be realized, is it necessarily the case that scarce resources (money, talent, energy) should be so employed? . . . Funds spent for one thing cannot be spent for another. Doing one thing means leaving other things undone ("Creation in Our Own Image: Ethical Questions", *Christian Century*, Sept. 13, 1978, 818-822).

To raise the question of cost is to ask who shall benefit from the new medicine. In view of its cost, shall its benefits be confined to an elite who can afford it? For example, shall *in vitro* fertilization be a benefit available to only the wealthy? Finally, shall the benefits be confined to the richer nations who can afford the new medicine?

Some Perspectives

In that genetic research is rich in promise, we cannot argue that it be simply halted. Still, there is a paucity of hard data regarding the outcome of many of its proposals. Uncertainty is created and serious questions are prompted by the new situation genetic research has engendered. Questions will continually be raised, but we cannot confine ourselves to questions. We must consider the rich perspectives provided in the Bible and the Christian tradition.

The rich "humanism" of the Old Testament, for example, contributes to the appreciation of our remarkable likeness to God himself (Donald E. Gowan, *When Man Becomes God: Humanism and Hybris in the Old Testament*. Pittsburgh: The Pickwick Press, 1975; p. 7). This means that we can "play God", for there is a sense in which God has yielded his creative power to man. The theme "playing God" inheres in the theological themes of *creativity* and *procreativity*, the creation mandates — "fill the earth and subdue it" (creativity) and "be fruitful and multiply" (procreativity) (Gen. 1:28 cf. Ps.8). It is simply God's will that he wants us to be his "administrators" (Hans Schwarz). We are in a real sense "co-creators", given the creative capacity to shape life, and given a knowledge of nature. "Our God is not a pagan deity who jealously guards the secrets of nature, but the 'Father of our Lord Jesus Christ' who graciously (and progressively) reveals them to man made in his own image — partly in order that he may exercise the dominion with which he was entrusted" (Norman Anderson, *Issues of Life and Death*. Hodder & Stoughton, 1978; p. 39). From a Biblical and theological perspective there is no *a priori* reason for ruling out genetic research, and intervention in the genetic flow *per se* has a certain legitimacy. Both may be viewed as an expression of carrying out the creation mandates. To the Christian some of the undreamed of possibilities — actual or potential — which are being explored today by medical research may be regarded as an opportunity for us to fulfil, in a new and more intelligent way, the divine command to "fill the earth and subdue it" (Anderson, *ibid.*, p. 36).

Theology therefore, has no problem with science as such. The legitimacy of scientific research is rooted in the creation mandates. If questions are placed against science, and genetic science in particular, we are questioning science where it has lost its spiritual roots, where it has become fused with the goals of technology. Science has been *given* to know, but its knowledge is prone to be used in the pragmatic interests of technology (See Walter R. Thorson, "The Spiritual Dimensions of Science", *Horizons of Science*, ed. C.F.H. Henry. Harper & Row, 1978; p. 221). Scientific research and its immense achievements are correlates of the "creation mandates", and the latter serves to underline the importance of moral responsibility in the use of the findings of the former. To engage in scientific research in the light of the "creation mandates" is to place ourselves before God the Creator.

That man can "play God" involves both threat and promise. It should make him acutely aware of the danger in which that puts him, and the responsibilities and possibilities it entails. We have "come of age". We are in the world as creatures who, for the first time, have the structures and powers of the natural world sufficiently and growingly within our manipulative grasp to form it toward an order for human life of dream-like potentialities, or to utilize our knowledge-power toward an unimaginable hell (Joseph Sittler, *Essays on Nature and Grace*. Philadelphia: Fortress Press, 1972; p. 17).

That we can "play God" is at once our strength and the root of our *hybris* (pride). In our *hybris* we should not become so enamored with our power or the might of our hand (Deut. 8:17) that we feel that the biological future of man depends on our taking hold of the evolutionary process and shaping it to our intentions (Vaux, *op. cit.*, p. 59). We should rather stand silently and reverently before the glorious and terrifying possibilities that our creativity will fashion. The *hybris* of man is related to our refusal to accept death, and genetic engineering can in its impulses be an attempt to circumvent death. Indeed, the denial of death is connected with the whole success-oriented, man-affirming temper of our time which finds it difficult to see that death is part of what it means to be human. In fact, death, to cite Gowan again,

proves that man is no God, and the effort to cheat death is a manifestation of *hybris* (*op. cit.*, p. 128).

Our inclination toward *hybris* is further evident in our reluctance to recognize that the capacity to "play God" has a transcendent source — our creative capabilities come as a gift from our Creator.

A fundamental and comprehensive horizon for approaching genetic engineering is man in "the image of God". Man has an inalienable value because he is the creature of God. That is, a divine energy has given him the power to be; a divine image informs his nature and a divinely appointed purpose characterizes his destiny. This anthropology places a uniquely qualitative sense on the nature of man and therefore, on the legitimacy of manipulations and transformations designed in modern medicine. The presence of genetic engineering underlines the urgency of what Häring has called "wise piloting", the direction of which is provided by man in "the image of God".

To speak of "the image of God" is to speak of Jesus Christ in whom God's intention for us is disclosed. The rich possibilities open to us are not enfolded in our genetic makeup. God's design for us in Jesus Christ is moral and spiritual. It takes root in us through the creation of a "new person", not through the improvement of our genetic endowments.

We speak of the reality of being "in Christ", but even the person "in Christ" is "unfinished". We recognize with all seriousness the "not as yet" that is written over human existence. The "not as yet" qualifies all our aspirations. The "not as yet" forces upon us a realism about life and solutions to its problems. Our encounter with human sin, which impinges upon even our best efforts, thrusts upon us the reality of the "not as yet". Human anguish, with equal force, also reminds us of the "not as yet". While the new medicine promises to alleviate, if not eliminate, human suffering through the removal of genetic defects to a degree hitherto unrealized (and for this we should be profoundly grateful), it also remains under the "not as yet". Human suffering poses deep questions, and in the absence of answers we sometimes falter, but God's grace enables us to come to terms with the "not as yet". The Gospel calls forth patience, sensitivity, responsibility and hope — hope in the Resurrection — even in the face of human anguish. We place a premium on these "graces", for they are God's gifts to us. These "graces" stand as partners with human medicine in the response to our problems. They enable us to struggle with our problems and to avoid any easy solutions to our genetic dilemmas.

Finally, our response to genetic engineering should be a Christian realism, a realism which will enable us to steer between outright denial of the legitimacy of genetic research and uncritical acceptance. James B. Nelson indicates the stance of such realism, and captures, we believe, the intent of this paper:

A hopeful Christian realism about human life can go far in counteracting the extremes of technological utopias and night-marish doomsdays which now creep into the genetic discussions. A hopeful Christian vision of what makes human life truly human will encourage those genetic efforts which are even now relieving much suffering and contributing to human wholeness. On the other hand, a wise Christian realism will challenge the biological engineers who are not content with mankind but are ambitiously intent upon improving the race. Without any ingratitude for the brilliance of their genetic achievements, some of us believe that salvation lies beyond any human revolution (even the scientific one) and that any human movement which claims ultimacy for its own vision breeds tragedy. Such is the posture of hopeful realism (*Human Medicine: Ethical Perspectives on New Medical Issues*. Minneapolis: Augsburg Publishing House, 1973; p. 122).

There is a distinct need for ethical guidance concerning the present achievements of biomedicine. We are dealing with not only its proposals and experiments, but with things that can be done and are being done — for example, *in vitro* fertilization and amniocentesis. The latter by itself is only a diagnostic device, but the ethical questions it raises are apparent. It involves the procedure of withdrawing a small amount of amniotic fluid from the uterus. Fetal cells are then removed from the fluid and a culture is done (it is estimated that more than 500 metabolic genetic deficiencies will be determined this way by 1980). If the fetus is defective, then a choice must be made between at least two options: the fetus may be allowed to develop and be born genetically defective, or the fetus may be aborted. Amniocen-

tesis represents but one sensitive ethical frontier. As the new biomedicine expands its achievements, further ethical issues will be placed before us. Consequently, it is recommended that Task Force to report on new achievements in biomedicine and to provide material useful in pastoral counselling be set up.

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RECOMMENDATION No. 6. A

That the above statement be approved as an introductory study.

RECOMMENDATION No. 7. A

That in consultation with B.C.L. a study-guide, glossary, and a more extensive bibliography be prepared on this subject.

RECOMMENDATION No. 8. A

That in consultation with representatives of B.C.L. a task force be set up including representatives of the medical, legal and theological professions to study and monitor developments in this vast and complex area.

VII. CONCERNING RECOMMENDATION 3 OF THE SPECIAL CONSULTATIVE COMMITTEE RE: A FORUM ON THE CHURCH IN THE WORLD, (A & P 1978, pp. 380-381)

In response to the above Recommendation representatives of our Committee met and conferred with representatives of the B.C.L. on the matter of closer cooperation between our committee and the B.C.L.'s Advisory Committee on Studies and Statements on Economic and Social Issues. It was agreed that closer cooperation would be achieved by:

1. one or more members from each committee being full members of both;
2. agreement to exchange resource material, study papers and bibliographies where appropriate;
3. setting up task forces composed of an equal number of representatives from each committee in the case of specific issues of joint concern.

VIII. THE WORK OF THE HOLY SPIRIT

We are pleased to report that the booklet on Neo-Pentecostalism authorised by the 102nd General Assembly is now ready for distribution.

IX. RE: REPRESENTATION ON OUR COMMITTEE

We note that Presbyterian College at present has no Chair in Systematic Theology.

RECOMMENDATION No. 9. A

That the ex-officio representation of Presbyterian College on the Committee on Church Doctrine be changed from 'Professor of Systematic Theology' to 'the Principal or his designate'.

THE CLERKS OF GENERAL ASSEMBLY

A number of references have been made to the Clerks of Assembly by the last General Assembly and the Clerks beg to report as follows:

RECORDING AND DISTRIBUTION OF RECORDS OF KIRK-SESSIONS

OVERTURE NO. 12, 1978 PRESBYTERY OF BRAMPTON.
RE: HANDWRITTEN SESSION MINUTES.

OVERTURE NO. 2, 1978 PRESBYTERY OF WATERLOO-WELLINGTON.
RE: KIRK-SESSION MINUTES.

OVERTURE NO. 24, 1978 PRESBYTERY OF GLENGARRY.
RE: DISTRIBUTING INFORMATION TO ELDERS RE SESSION MEETINGS.

The above three Overtures are considered together in this report because the Clerks understand they deal basically with the issue of confidentiality of Kirk-Session meetings, and the recording of the same.

Overture No. 12, requests modification of Section 27(c) of the Book of Forms "to permit the recording of Session Minutes by typewriter or other recognized imaging method, with such strictures as will assure continued confidentiality". The Clerks gave a preliminary report on this on Pages 234-235 of the Acts and Proceedings of the One Hundred and Fourth General Assembly, and agreed to consult the procedures of other Reformed Churches, and report to this Assembly.

Overture No. 2 requests the General Assembly to permit Minutes of Kirk-Sessions "to be recorded in typewriting on loose-leaf paper", which is also the prayer of the former Overture.

Overture No. 24 prays that permission be granted to enable "the Moderator and Clerk of the Kirk-Session to prepare, for circulation among the elders, a digest or summary of the actions of the court after each meeting, if so desired, such digest or summary to deal with items of a general nature and selected at the discretion of the Moderator and the Clerk."

The Clerks have not had much success in receiving information from other Reformed Churches, among whom there seems to be little concern for the whole question of confidentiality of session meetings. One reported that items of personal conduct, etc., which would be part of the area where confidentiality is desired, are so rare at this time his church did not seem to be very concerned over this issue.

Nevertheless, because of the risk of civil court action arising in cases where libel may be an issue, the Clerks are concerned that we do not weaken the restrictions now in our regulations in such a way that the effectiveness of the Kirk-Session, or the rights of elders to speak and act freely, should be encroached upon. But the Clerks are aware of dissatisfaction over the restrictions of Section 27(c) of the Book of Forms. The Clerks would remind the Church that it is always possible for a Kirk-Session to agree that sections of its Minutes will be kept in retentis, and thereby a large degree of confidentiality can be retained.

Aside from the matters before us, the Clerks of Assembly have considered for some time that with the improvement in the quality of mimeograph paper, and the desire to conserve our natural products, it is no longer necessary to continue the restriction of using one side of the sheet only, and so the following proposed changes under the Barrier Act include the necessary action for accomplishing this change in the production of minutes.

In order to test the mind of the Church on these matters the Clerks propose the following changes go down to Presbytery for approval under the Barrier Act. (Each recommendation is a separate item under the Barrier Act, and the rejection of one does not affect the decision of the others.)

RECOMMENDATION NO. 1 A

That Section 27(i), Book of Forms be replaced by:

27(i) Pages commonly called loose-leaf (typewritten, mimeographed, printed or otherwise produced) are permissible. Minutes shall be on paper of such quality so as to prevent the ink showing on the opposite side, and shall be temporarily bound in a commercial-type binder of the rigid fastener form. The ring type of book is not acceptable.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 2 A

That a new section 27(j) be added to the Book of Forms:

Minutes of Kirk-Session shall not be reproduced, and the single copy shall be produced by the Clerk of Session. When agreed to by the Session a summary of minutes composed under the supervision of the Moderator and the Clerk, and containing only material judged by the composers to be suitable for distribution to all members of the session, may be prepared and thus distributed.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 3 A

That a new section 27(k) be added to the Book of Forms:

Any vacant spaces, except ordinary space between paragraphs, shall be stroked through and initialled by the Clerk.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 4 A

That a new section 27(l) be added to the Book of Forms:

Ordinarily when the pages of the minutes total one hundred, they shall be bound commercially in book form, with the minutes of the last meeting recorded being complete in this commercial binding. Session minutes shall be bound under close scrutiny of the Clerk to secure secrecy of the Minutes.

**OVERTURE NO. 18, 1978 PRESBYTERY OF BARRIE.
RE: LOOSE-LEAF BOOK OF FORMS**

The Presbytery of Barrie (Acts & Proceedings 1978, pp. 470 and 24) notes the frequency of changes in the Book of Forms and asks that it be made available in loose-leaf format. They further suggest a method of administering an update service for all loose-leaf copies in circulation.

The Clerks of Assembly find that in the two decades, 1949-1968, fourteen remits were sent down under the Barrier Act. Eight of these led to changes in the Book of Forms, that is, an average of one remit adopted every two and one half years. In the following single decade, 1969-1978, twenty-six remits were sent down, eighteen of which were adopted. The average has increased to one remit adopted every seven months or less. In the last three years alone, seven remits have been adopted, leading to changes in fourteen sections of the Book of Forms. There is strong support for the Presbytery's contention that "new legislation of successive General Assemblies necessitates frequent changes in the Book of Forms."

The Clerks also note that the Book of Forms is being re-issued with greater frequency than in the past. The 1969 edition had to be replaced only eight years later. The longer after the re-issue date, the more changes a purchaser must insert into a copy to make it current.

The Reformed Church in America issues a loose-leaf version of its *Book of Church Order*. Update of any one section can be achieved by inserting a single replacement page. The Clerks have studied the Reformed Church format and believe it would be workable for our Book of Forms.

We ask that the 105th General Assembly approve a loose-leaf format for the next printing of the Book of Forms. However, the card system proposed by the Presbytery of Barrie has disadvantages. Addresses would have to be kept up to date. Costs of individual mailings to each copy owner each year (envelope, addressing and

postage) would mount up. Estimating future costs over, for example, a ten year update commitment would be difficult.

Therefore in the interests of economy we suggest:

- (a) that publication of a loose-leaf version be delayed until less than six months' supply of the 1977 edition remains to be sold. A specific date is difficult to set at this time. As of late 1978, some 2,500 copies remained on hand with Presbyterian Publications. It appears that the majority of current users of the Book of Forms have purchased a 1977 edition. Future sales will be largely to theological students and new elders. From the information provided by Presbyterian Publications, we would estimate that present supplies will be exhausted circa 1982.
- (b) that, once a loose-leaf version is available, congregations indicate each year how many sets of update sheets they require. This would entail a one line addition on the order form included in the annual statistical returns. If the update sets were sent out in bulk with the congregation's copies of *Acts and Proceedings*, the added postage costs would be negligible.

We see this approach as far less costly and cumbersome to administer than a card record and separate mailing for every Book of Forms in circulation. Update sets might also be made available individually, but at a charge that would encourage people to order through their congregation.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 5 A

That the 105th General Assembly authorize preparation of a loose-leaf version of the Book of Forms in terms of the above report, upon depletion of the present supply.

**OVERTURE NO. 23, 1978 PRESBYTERY OF P.E.I. AND
OVERTURE NO. 31, 1978 PRESBYTERY OF GLENGARRY.
RE: PROCEDURE FOR ELECTING ELDERS**

Overtures 23 and 31, 1978 (A&P 1978, pp. 471, 477, 24) seek similar amendments to Section 132 of the Book of Forms. Each presbytery asks that a fourth procedure of electing elders be sanctioned, that of nomination by session "for optional use in conjunction with the three presently countenanced methods".

The reasons given are: (1) sanction by Presbyterian churches in other countries; (2) the fourth method is being used in some of our congregations despite section 132; and (3) the present three methods are unworkable in large congregations.

The Clerks are aware that section 132 is less than ideal. To overcome some of the confusion surrounding methods of election, the Board of Congregational Life commissioned a monograph to spell out procedures in detail. That monograph, entitled *The Election of Elders*, was released at the time of the 104th General Assembly, two to three months after Overtures 23 and 31 were drafted. We wonder if the overtures would have been forthcoming if the monograph had been available earlier.

There is a principle at stake which we believe both overtures overlook, namely, the separation of powers. It is set out in section 4 of the Book of Forms:

To take away all occasion of tyranny, our Lord wills that office-bearers in His Church should rule with mutual consent of brethren, and equality of power, each according to his function.

One of the checks on the considerable power of session is that election of elders is vested in the congregation. Book of Forms section 132(1) states in part: "A meeting of the congregation is held for the purpose of nominating persons qualified to fill the office. At this meeting nominations are made and a list is agreed upon. . . ." It is the Clerks' understanding that at a meeting of a congregation, organizations have no right to nominate, but only members. Under current law, the session has neither the right to elect its successors, nor the right to unduly influence their election, lest the session become self-perpetuating, lacking "mutual consent of brethren". The overtures do not ask for election by session as such. But official nomination by session would tend to dominate proceedings in practice. Members of the congregation might shy away from offering individual nominations when faced with an official slate. And they may give undue weight when voting on nominations that have a special sanction.

The reasons given for the change do not warrant setting aside the principle that is our major safeguard against tyranny. While the experience of sister churches has to be treated with respect, we feel that section 132 has proven basically sound and appropriate for the Canadian setting. The argument that the law is being tacitly ignored is not grounds in itself to change the law. Concerning workability in large congregations, our system allows elders to make nominations in their capacity as members of the congregation. Getting names of qualified persons onto the list of nominees is therefore no problem. What should be avoided is any hint of special status (psychological or real) for any nominee.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 6 A

That the prayers of Overtures No. 23, 1978 and No. 31, 1978 be not granted.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 7 A

That the interpretation of Book of Forms Section 132(1) as stated above be adopted.

**COMMITTEE ON HISTORY, 1978 ACTS AND PROCEEDINGS
PAGES 328 AND 49, RECOMMENDATION NO. 3, RE OWNERSHIP
ACCOUNTABILITY AND CONFIDENTIALITY OF RECORDS OF
CHURCH COURTS.**

The 1978 General Assembly directed the Clerks of Assembly "to examine the relevant sections of the Book of Forms which relate to the Records of Church Courts, concerning matters of ownership, accountability and confidentiality." The same Assembly adopted a recommendation that "the General Assembly initiate a detailed Records Management Feasibility Study of the Boards and Committees of the Church located at 50 Wynford Drive, Don Mills," but failed to direct by whom or how this study would be done. The latter study has been undertaken by the Office and Property Committee and the Program Co-ordinating Committee of the Administrative Council, together with the Archivist, Prof. John Moir, and Mr. Alex Ross, employee of the Ontario Archives. The Program Co-ordinating Committee has agreed to defer its study until this present report has been presented to the Assembly. The Administrative Council heard a presentation by Dr. Moir and Mr. Ross before referring this matter to the two Committees mentioned above.

The Clerks thought it wise to consult with Dr. L. H. Fowler, Clerk Emeritus, and other Reformed Churches to ascertain their practice on this matter. This report uses some of the material supplied by the Churches in North America.

The most explicit reply received was from the Stated Clerk of the Reformed Church of America, who suggested he was happy his Church in North America was not established in this country long enough to feel the need for such legislation.

The Clerks have been made aware that the issue of preserving records in a safe manner has been recently high on the agenda of the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A., and the Presbyterian Church in the U.S. Therefore we are grateful to the Committee on History for raising the issue with us, and the evident concern of the Archival authorities that our records be safely secured.

Nevertheless the Clerks are concerned that confidentiality be maintained, and that records be preserved in a manner that will make the records most beneficial and available to the producing Board/Committee.

There seems to be very little help in the regulations of our Church to aid us on this problem. Rather it appears we must be governed by tradition and good sense. The Clerks of Assembly hope the following statements fall within these restrictions.

- 1) Minutes of Kirk-Sessions, Presbyteries, Synods, and General Assemblies are the property in perpetuity of the said Courts, or their legal successors.
- 2) When Congregations, Presbyteries, and Synods are amalgamated, the records of such bodies become the property of the amalgamated body.
- 3) When congregations are dissolved, their records become the property of the Presbytery, and the Presbytery decides how such records shall be preserved.
- 4) Congregations, with permission of the Presbytery wherein they are a part, and Presbyteries, and Synods may deposit their Records in the Church Archives by resolution of the said Court.

5) It is the responsibility of the Clerk of the Court to make recommendation to the proper Court for the safekeeping of the Records of that Court.

6) Minutes, correspondence and other documents of Boards/Committees of General Assembly are the property of the body which originates them.

7) Each Board/Committee of General Assembly should retain custody of its documents for five years, and from then to ten years may deposit such in the Church Archives but after ten years documents which the General Secretary of each Board/Committee decides have permanent value shall be deposited in the Church Archives.

8) Documents which the General Secretary of each Board/Committee decides shall be confidential, shall be deposited as above but restricted in its use for a period of fifty years, and may be examined only with written consent of the General Secretary of the Board /Committee which generated the Documents.

9) In the event documents are required from any Board/Committee of General Assembly by Police, or other governmental agencies, the Secretary so consulted shall request permission from the Principal Clerk, who shall require a valid subpoena, and consult the Church Counsel before granting the Secretary concerned authority to release the required information.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 8 C

That the above statement be accepted as the policy and practice of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

**EXPLANATION OF THE PREFERENTIAL VOTE SYSTEM FOR ELECTION
OF MODERATOR OF GENERAL ASSEMBLIES.**

The 104th General Assembly requested a statement be prepared by the Clerks of Assembly explaining the whole procedure of the preferential vote system to be sent to the Presbyteries, and that diligent and prayerful attention be given to all Presbyters in their nomination that only nominees with qualifications befitting the responsible position of Moderator be sent up.

The Clerks have prepared a statement in great detail, and sent a copy to all Presbytery Clerks. If members of Presbytery have any questions on this process unanswered the Clerks beg to suggest the fault must not be laid upon them. No response has come to the Clerks so it is assumed that the confusion has been dissipated.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 9 A

That the above be received as information.

**OVERTURE NO. 26, 1978 PRESBYTERY OF CHATHAM
RE: THE COMMUNION ROLL**

The Presbytery of Chatham expresses a concern felt by many parts of the Church relative to the responsibility of the Session in keeping the Communion Roll so as to reflect accurately the situation in each particular Congregation in keeping with Section 125 of the Book of Forms.

Part of the concern has to do with the difficulty of annually revising the Roll in accord with Section 125(d). If a Roll has not been revised for some time the Sessions of medium-sized and larger congregations will find that it may take several meetings of the Session Committee before it is prepared to bring a report to the Session. However, once the Roll has been revised each year for two or three years, it will not be a difficult matter, nor will it be time consuming, to follow the provisions for an annual review. With records up to date, each Elder's District may be reviewed quickly, as there will only be concern for those who have been absent from Communion during the previous twelve months and a note made for the Session Clerk (or other person appointed for the task) to send that person a letter with information regarding the law of the Church and perhaps arrangement made to have that person called on by an Elder. (Or if the person is absent for two or more years, appropriate action is recommended to Session.) The number will not be large once the annual revision of the Roll has been carried out for two years.

The second part of the concern of the Presbytery is the wording in 125(e) line 4: "shall, if their addresses are known etc. etc.". This has been interpreted as meaning that only those whose addresses are known and therefore notified may be removed from the Roll for neglect of ordinances. However, it would seem to the Clerks that this expression means that if the address is known, the person has a right to be notified. If, however, the person's address is not known and that person has been absent from Communion for two years without sufficient reason known to the Session that person's name may be removed at the next annual revision. It is incumbent upon the Kirk-Session that diligent effort be made to locate the member if at all possible.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 10 A

That the above statement be adopted as the answer to Overture No. 26, 1978, Presbytery of Chatham.

NOTICE OF MOTION RE REGIONAL COMMITTEES 1978 A&P, PAGES 55 AND 82.

This Notice of Motion as adopted by the Assembly asks that "the Clerks of Assembly investigate the possibility of assigning tasks of some smaller Assembly Committees to various regions of the country (west, central, east) by rotation, and with other regions by correspondence as deemed necessary, and that the Clerks of Assembly report back to the 105th General Assembly."

Correspondence was inaugurated with the mover of the motion by the Clerks in order to ascertain more fully what was hoped might be accomplished and to discover something of the reasoning behind the motion.

With the geography of our country in mind, the Clerks are aware of the expense and time involved in bringing people together from great distances. They are also aware of the convenience to members of a committee when they are in close proximity to one another. The mover of the motion is desirous that persons from all areas of our Church be used on committees with a minimum of expense.

The intent of the motion as adopted by the Assembly might be fulfilled by Boards and Committees making fuller use of the following procedures:

- 1) Assign to sub-committees, composed of persons in a generally local geographical area, specific matters for research and study.
- 2) A medium sized board or committee might have general material or specific matters made available to each member in advance and then have a telephone conference on the matters or material made available earlier.
- 3) Use of cassettes to record the discussion and input of each member at a meeting of the members in a local area and then send this cassette recording to members of the board or committee at a distance from the place of meeting. These members could then respond by cassette or in writing.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 11 A

That the 105th General Assembly urge Boards and Committees to experiment with the above suggestions (or others which may prove feasible) in order to make it possible for all regions of the Church to have a part in the ongoing work of the said Boards and Committees with a minimum of expense involved in travel.

RE: SUBSTANCE OF OVERTURES NOTICE OF MOTION, A&P 1978, PAGES 36 AND 82

The 104th General Assembly referred to the Clerks of Assembly a Notice of Motion (A&P 1978, pp. 36, 82) "that henceforth the substance of an overture be printed along with the committee's reply to that overture."

The request asks in effect that committees observe good writing practices in their response to overtures. The request is eminently reasonable. What constitutes the "substance" may prove a matter of opinion. But *some* statement of the subject is called for, if for no reason other than simple courtesy to the reader.

The Clerks are prepared to request Boards and Committees of Assembly to include in their reports on overtures referred to them sufficient substance of the overtures to make their replies comprehensible as a unit.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 12 A

That this report be received as the answer to the Notice of Motion re Substance of Overtures.

REPORT RE STATED SUPPLY AND INTERIM-PART TIME MINISTERS

The Clerks are grateful to the Presbyteries which have studied and sent in reports on Recommendation No. 11 of the 1978 report of the Clerks of Assembly, especially because nineteen Presbyteries expressed various degrees of approval, one appeared neutral, one indicated it would reply later but did not, and one considered the report made unclear water muddier than ever.

Some concern was expressed that there might be confusion over whether or not interim part-time ministries should merit the right to be placed on the Constituent Roll. Interim Part-Time was also considered a confusing term in itself.

The Clerks, in making this report, remind the Assembly of the content of their report on Memorial No. 1, 1977 - Stated Supply, and would like to include that report as the background to this report.

As indicated in Recommendation No. 11 to last year's Assembly we now present the following declaratory interpretation of Section 213, Book of Forms.

Stated Supply is a term to describe ministers of The Presbyterian Church in Canada who are serving in a full-time ministry under appointment by a Presbytery for a period of one year. The minister thus appointed has the right to be named by the Presbytery to the Constituent Roll during the term appointment, which Presbytery may renew annually.

Interim Part-Time Ministries are those where the work involved is more than Sunday Supply but less than that of Stated Supply. It may apply to any minister of The Presbyterian Church in Canada, including retired ministers. The amount of service rendered may be from two to six working days per week including Sundays. Such appointment is made by the Presbytery. Those appointed to Interim Part-Time Ministries may be placed on the Constituent Roll of a Presbytery by permission of the General Assembly after Overture from the Presbytery. Any minister on the Roll of a Presbytery (Constituent or Appendix) may serve as interim-moderator of a charge by appointment by Presbytery. The salary scale should be in keeping with the amount of work rendered (Cf. 1977 A&P, Page 332, Recommendation 1).

RECOMMENDATION No. 13 A

That the statement on Stated Supply be adopted as a Declaratory Act of interpreting Section 213, Book of Forms.

RECOMMENDATION No. 14 A

That the statement on Interim Part-Time Supply go down to Presbyteries for approval under the Barrier Act, with the understanding that if adopted the phrase "full or part-time" be deleted in Section 176(1)(a) B.F.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EWART COLLEGE

To the Venerable the 105th General Assembly:

SECTION I: CONCERNS OF THE COLLEGE BOARD

1. *Enrollment.* The Board of the College is delighted to report that enrollment in College programmes is the highest in the history of the College. The forty-three students include seven University graduates, four Ewart graduates completing their arts degrees, thirty-one students in undergraduate programmes and one special student from Guyana. Eight of the students are men. These students are enrolled in four types of programmes: a graduate degree-diploma programme (Master of Education and Christian Education diploma);

a graduate diploma programme; an undergraduate degree-diploma programme (Bachelor of Arts plus diploma in Christian Education) and a diploma programme. These programmes provide Biblical and theological background plus professional preparation for specialized ministries in the Church with particular emphasis on Christian education.

2. *Financial Concerns.* This increased enrollment has helped to create financial problems for the Board in 1977 and 1978; finances will continue to be a concern in 1979. In performing the function for which Ewart College was established we find ourselves penalized. Increased enrollment in Ewart courses means decreased revenue from University students in residence. In an effort to overcome this decrease, the Board has adopted a policy of gradually raising the residence rate for Ewart College students to parity with that of University students. In 1979-80 this means an increase of 23.5% for Ewart students. However, this will not solve our financial problems.

Everyone knows the inflation rate is approximately 9%. In a budget where we have no control over 96% of our expenditures, the increase granted to the College from budget funds is only 2.6% for 1979. Although the Board has exercised strict financial control, deficits have been unavoidable and will continue to be so.

We strongly feel that if the Church as a whole wishes to have persons competently trained for leadership it must be prepared to bear the cost. The Board and Faculty of the College despair at working in a deficit situation in which the financial structure of the national church, up to the present, seems to be able to offer little tangible relief.

3. *Ewart Graduates and the Educational Ministry of the Church.* The Board is aware that throughout the Church there appears to be so little evidence of real concern to provide for all of children, youth and adults a variety of educational opportunities which are both theologically and educationally sound. The College is endeavouring to educate young men and women in competence for leadership in this educational ministry so much needed in the Church today. We are grateful for the high calibre of young people preparing for such ministry and are proud of the graduates who are now available to undertake professional responsibility. The Board of the College is concerned that the Church make the best possible use of these graduates.

Of particular concern is the question of the future status of and remuneration for men who, in increasing numbers, are studying at and graduating from Ewart College. These men choose to study at Ewart because of a desire to serve the Church in Christian education or other specialized ministry. Those now enrolled are doing well in their course work and field education programmes. The Church will benefit greatly from the particular contributions which they and those who follow them will be able to make. Action needs to be taken to give them, as well as their female colleagues, recognition in the life of the Church and adequate compensation for their work.

Many of the graduates wish, at least at the beginning of their professional service, to serve in congregational settings. Yet there are too few congregations, either singly or in clusters, sufficiently concerned about the quality of their educational efforts to seek the employment of a Ewart graduate. The College would bring to the attention of our congregations the need to evaluate educational programmes and to plan for the strengthening and expansion of Church education with the aid of a person educated by our own Church's College which has a particular concern for the educational ministry of the Church.

4. *Continuing Education.* The Board is encouraged with the response to the College's Continuing Education programmes which always include some direct content regarding Christian education or consideration of implications for Christian education. The Board is particularly pleased with the percentage of ministers who attend these programmes and hopes such programmes will result not only in personal enrichment for those who attend but also in the strengthening of the educational programmes in the congregations represented.

Appreciation is again expressed to the Paulin Memorial Trust Fund for a grant of \$1,937.00 to underwrite the majority of the cost for the February 1979 Continuing education programme, "In The Image of God".

5. *Bursary Funds.* To alleviate increasing costs of education for an increasing number of students, the present bursary funds of the College are completely inadequate. The College is grateful that a number of individuals, congregations and organizations have given special help to reduce the shortage in 1978 and 1979. It is the hope of the Board of the College that bursary funds can be increased in the near future and also that such additional help can again be made available in 1979-80 to provide aid to students.
6. *Resource Fund.* The Board expresses sincere appreciation to the individuals, groups and congregations which have helped to boost the Resource Fund (established by General Assembly in 1974 to strengthen and expand the programmes of the College) to the place where the minimum goal of \$50,000 is within sight. At the time of the Board meeting in early March, this fund had reached \$42,569. We would hope for further donations in the year ahead so that when we surpass the \$50,000 minimum goal, the interest may be used annually to strengthen the College programmes while the capital is increased by further gifts.
7. *References from the 104th General Assembly.* Two matters from the 104th General Assembly were referred to the three Colleges of the Church. These have been considered by the Board. From the Special Report on the state of the Church, the Colleges were "directed to explore ways and means of . . . the incorporation of courses in ministry within their regular curricula and the provision of such courses in a programme of continuing education". Ewart College reports that a good proportion of its work with students is of this nature. In addition to courses such as Christian Education, Social Work, Counselling, Effective Oral Communication, the College provides Field Education in each year of the programme and three six-week Internship periods for each student. The Colleges were also asked to consider the advisability and practicality of making available to students the study of the relationship between Christianity and Communism. The Ewart Board would report that while we do not have courses specifically directed to this question, the relationship of Christianity and Communism is raised frequently within courses available both at Ewart and in the University programmes undertaken by students.

SECTION II: ACADEMIC SESSION 1978-79

1. *Academic Session.* The forty-three students were enrolled in programmes as follows: Four in the graduate degree-diploma programme; three in the graduate diploma programme; twenty-two in the undergraduate degree-diploma programme; four in the diploma programme and undertaking a pre-university course; four in the regular diploma programme; four graduates completing their arts degrees and one special student. The faculty consisting of Dr. Margaret Webster, Principal; the Reverend Irene Dickson, Professor of Biblical Studies; the Reverend Robert C. Mathewson, Associate Professor of Religious Studies; and Miss Ina Adamson, Dean and Director of Field Education, was assisted by the following lecturers - Mrs. Carol Kessler, B.F.A., Director of Ewart College Choir, Dr. R.F.G. Campbell, "Effective Oral Communication" and Dr. Goodwill MacDougall, "The Church in Mission". In addition, a number of deaconesses and ministers assisted in the development of students by supervising Field Education and Internship placements.

1. ACCOUNTING PRACTICES

The following is a summary of accounting practices followed by the College.

(a) Investments and investment income

The Consolidated Investment Portfolio, in which Ewart College has an interest, is held by The Presbyterian Church in Canada and is adjusted to market value each year. Any increase or decrease in market value is allocated to the capital portion of the various scholarship and bursary funds. With the exception of recording consolidated investments at market value, these financial statements have been prepared in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted for non-profit organizations. Other investments are recorded at cost.

Income from investments is recorded on an accrual basis.

Realized gains or losses from investment transactions are recorded on the transaction date.

(b) Fixed assets

Land and building are capitalized in the books of The Presbyterian Church in Canada and are not included in these accounts. Furnishings and office equipment are expensed in the year acquired.

(c) Funds

The fund balances are segregated in relation to restrictions placed upon their use by the donor.

The College Board determines the usage of any bequest received for which no specific use is stated by the donor.

2. COMPARATIVE FIGURES

The 1977 comparative figures have been reclassified to conform with financial statement presentation adopted for 1978.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF KNOX COLLEGE

To the Venerable the 105th General Assembly:

The Board of Knox College submits the following as its 135th Annual Report.

The Board is mindful of the high expectations that the Church has for the work of the College. Therefore, the College is continually endeavouring to maintain and improve the high standards and relevance of its programmes within the Presbyterian tradition.

The Board is also mindful of its responsibility to remind the Church that its high expectations carry with it an obligation to support the College with the means and administrative machinery to cope with the effects of inflation, the changes in the world of academia and the competitiveness of the real world in which it must operate. We, therefore, remind the Church of these obligations.

The Principal

Dr. J. C. Hay was formally installed as Principal of Knox College in September 1978, and even prior to that date was earning our sincere appreciation for his efforts under abnormal and difficult conditions.

The Faculty

Numerically, the teaching staff is still below effective strength, but steps are being taken to remedy this.

Enrolment

Total enrolment reached a new record high of 120 including 29 in first year theology.

Residence

The occupancy rate of the residence was at a relatively high and satisfactory level for most of the regular academic year. One wing was in operation during the summer months.

Commendations

The Board wishes to commend:

The Faculty and staff for their efforts and contributions to a successful year;

The Officers and Committee members who have given so generously of their time and talents;

The House and Building staffs for their loyal and efficient service.

This has been a difficult year for various reasons and has been very demanding on all of these people.

Recognition

The Board extends its special thanks and appreciation to Mr. David Morton who retired this year after seventeen years as Building Superintendent of the College.

The Board also extends its special thanks and appreciation to Mrs. Hilda Tayler who is retiring in May after serving the College so efficiently and faithfully for sixteen years as Matron.

Our thanks also to Mrs. Joan Nicholls who is retiring after serving so effectively and faithfully for four and one-half years as Bursar.

We wish these people well.

Principal Allan L. Farris Portrait

The Alumni Association merits our sincere appreciation for presenting to the College the portrait of Dr. Allan Farris, which was hung in the Caven Library in February.

Student Internship

In response to what we interpreted as a desire of the Church, a pilot project was organized and set in place this year. The Board wishes to thank St. Andrew's Church, Kitchener, for its cooperation and financial support of this project which is designed to broaden the student's experience and understanding of real life conditions in the pastorate.

Relations with the Academic Community

The Memorandum of Agreement between the Toronto School of Theology, its constituent members, and the University of Toronto, has been signed and the resulting machinery set in motion. The interests of the Church and Knox College are protected as explained last year when approval was given to Knox to participate in the Federation agreement.

The self-study by Knox and the Toronto School of Theology is being organized in preparation for the accreditation visit of the Association of Theological Schools in the United States and Canada, in the spring of 1980.

These associations carry with them great benefits to the Church, to the College and its graduates, but they also impose certain obligations and requirements which the Board must make certain are met and fulfilled.

Chair of New Testament

The Board established a search committee to obtain the services of a suitable person for this Chair and is prepared to make a recommendation.

Financial

Every effort is made to ensure that the College is operated on as economical a basis as possible. This, of course, has to be done within the restraints placed upon

the College by (1) growth in the student population, (2) accreditation and the other academic standards, and (3) inflation.

The planned increase in the room and board rates for the residence and the anticipated improvement in the government grant, both of which are related to student population, will partially offset the increases due to these pressures.

The unfortunate fact of the matter is that the College's expenses are largely of a fixed nature, most of which are subject to the pressures of inflation. Regretfully, we must report that the increase in Church grants is not keeping pace with the inflation factor and the increased enrolment.

The net result is that in 1979 the College's capital funds will be depleted further by approximately \$30,000. This will increase the cumulative total erosion of capital to approximately \$205,000 which represents approximately \$17,000 annual income that the College must ask the Church to provide.

This situation does not seem to be compatible with the high expectations that the Church has of the College. We earnestly pray that this trend be corrected by 1980 at the latest.

Property Maintenance

The special studies referred to in last year's report are being carefully considered. Matters of an emergency nature are being given priority; some have already had to be given attention. Other items are being scheduled for attention on an appropriate priority basis. Much of the expense involved is in the nature of maintenance which has been deferred in the interest of short term austerity budgeting which in the long term is turning out to be more costly.

Financial Appeal

The special appeal approved by the 103rd General Assembly is being organized to start late in 1979 or early 1980. The appeal to congregations is scheduled to start later in 1980 when it is anticipated that the Second Century appeal has been completed. Your cooperation and support is solicited by the special committee in charge of this campaign.

1. ACCOUNTING PRACTICES

The following is a summary of significant accounting practices followed by the College.

(a) Investments and investment income

Investments purchased by the College are valued at cost. Investments received by bequest are recorded on the basis of fair market value at the time of receipt.

Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis and dividends are recorded when received. Realized gains or losses from investment transactions are recorded on the transaction date.

(b) Fixed assets

The original land and buildings are recorded in the books of The Presbyterian Church in Canada and are not included in these accounts. Other fixed assets purchased by the College are expensed in the year of acquisition.

(c) Funds

The fund balances are segregated in relation to restrictions placed upon their use by the donor. The College Board determines the usage of any bequests received for which no specific use is stated by the donor.

With the exception of the practice of expensing certain fixed assets in the year of acquisition referred to above the financial statements have been prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

REPORT OF THE SENATE OF KNOX COLLEGE

To the Venerable the 105th General Assembly:

This was an historic year for Knox College. It marks the successful completion of a long process of negotiation, on the subject of full government grants, first directly with the Government of Ontario through its Ministry of Education, and more recently with the University of Toronto. With the approval of the 104th General Assembly and under authority of the Senate and Board of Knox College, the Chairman of the Board and the Chairman of the Senate have signed a Memorandum of Agreement with the University of Toronto. By virtue of this Agreement the first joint degrees will be granted at the 135th Convocation of Knox College, in which the University will participate. The degree diploma of the College now reads: "Knox College and the University of Toronto".

It is, of course, too early in our experience to evaluate the full effects of this association with the University. The University's primary concern is in the area of academic standards governing admission of students, the level at which courses are offered, faculty prerequisites and faculty development. Academic standards are not new to Knox College, and indeed have long since ceased to be optional by virtue of our relationship with the Toronto School of Theology and our accreditation by the Association of Theological Schools in the United States and Canada. Nor would the Church want it to be otherwise.

But at the same time we are moving ever closer to meeting the Church's concern for adequate training in the skills that a professional ministry now demands.

Our Field Education programme, under Dr. Smith's direction, continues to expand. In conjunction with Ewart College and Presbyterian College, and with the cooperation of the Board of World Mission, beginning this summer an attempt is being made to provide trained supervisors for summer students and to develop a report-back system so that the field education directors in each of the colleges might be aware of the strengths and weaknesses and needs of these students. Thus the summer experience will be built into the educational programme. An increasing number of our students are exposed to clinical pastoral education experiences in our Toronto area hospitals, under the direction of the Toronto Institute of Pastoral Training, and our pilot project in an intern year turned out to be most effective indeed. Moreover it is expected that the Board of the College will have a recommendation directed at the 104th General Assembly's request to the colleges regarding ministry courses. Our own resident faculty in the classical disciplines is appropriately sensitive to the fact that they are teachers in a professional school preparing men and women for ministry in our Church.

A primary concern for this year, and one demanding a great deal of our time and attention, is the self-study that we are undertaking in preparation for the accreditation visit of ATS in the spring of 1980. The Curriculum Committee, which is responsible for the self-study, has been meeting regularly under the Chairmanship of Professor Iain Nicol. Questionnaires have been sent to all the graduates of the College since 1970 (the year that TST came into existence), seeking an evaluation of their education at Knox in the light of their experience since graduating from Knox. Questionnaires have also been distributed to all of the students at the College, covering everything from the classroom, through the Library, to the Principal's office. These responses will all be taken into account in our writing of the self-study. It is of course crucial that our accreditation should not be threatened in any way, not only because of what it does to our degrees, to our graduates' capacities to enter other programmes, or our ability to recruit faculty of high calibre, but because our new relationship within the University of Toronto depends on its successful outcome.

Our enrolment persists in its upward trend, although it may just be showing signs of levelling off somewhat. In the 1978-79 academic year the enrolment totalled 120; of which 84 were regularly certified students, 7 were occasional students, and 29 were enrolled in the Advanced Degree programmes (Th.M., Th.D., M.A., Ph.D. and D.Min.).

We continue at this point to be short-staffed, but hope that with the action of the Assembly we will at long last be back to our original strength. It has been diffi-

cult indeed to cope with the number of students that we have had over the last several years in the light of the very limited number of our faculty. We owe a great deal, of course, to the Toronto School of Theology, without which we could scarcely have functioned.

But we owe a great deal also to our sessional lecturers who in large measure out of their own commitment have been of great assistance to us: Dr. Margaret Webster, Christian Education; Rev. James A. Thomson, Liturgics; Rev. Bernard L. M. Embree, New Testament; Rev. A. Ross Gibson, Homiletics, Rev. Brian Fraser, Canadian Presbyterian Church History; and Mr. John Derksen, Church Music.

THE PRESBYTERIAN COLLEGE REPORT OF THE SENATE, 1978-1979

To the Venerable the 105th General Assembly:

The Senate of The Presbyterian College, Montreal submits the following report for the academic year, 1978-1979.

Installation of the Principal

An historic event in the life of the College took place in the Church of St. Andrew and St. Paul on Thursday, November 9, 1978. The Reverend William John Klempa, M.A., B.D., Ph.D., was installed as the sixth Principal of The Presbyterian College, Montreal.

Among those who participated in the service, were The Reverend Dr. Jesse E. Bigelow, Moderator of the 104th General Assembly, who presented Dr. Klempa as Principal; the Honourable Mr. Justice John W. Morden of the Court of Appeal, Supreme Court of Ontario and a Trustee of Rosedale Presbyterian Church, Toronto, who administered the oath of fidelity in office; The Reverend James A. Sitler, Moderator of the Presbytery of Montreal who installed the Principal by prayer and

Dr. Robert Lennox, Principal of The Presbyterian College, 1948-1969, who took the ceremony of gowning.

Following this impressive installation Dr. Klempa gave the inaugural address entitled, "The Theological College: An Amphibian Living in Both Church and University." Now, with God's guidance, we are looking forward to accelerated progress under new leadership.

The Theological Programme

The Presbyterian College participates in and helps to form the McGill University Faculty of Religious Studies. This provides an enlarged faculty and a broader curriculum for our candidates for ministry. The first two years of the theological programme, leading to the Bachelor of Theology or the Master of Sacred Theology degree, are taken in the Faculty of Religious Studies. Here our students receive instruction from Dean Joseph C. McLelland, Professor Robert C. Culley, Professor H. Keith Markell, Dr. William Klempa and Dr. Arthur Van Seters, as well as other members of the Faculty of Religious Studies.

The third year, called the Professional or In-Ministry year, is taken in the Montreal Institute for Ministry. Here our students receive field-based training from a staff of instructors and field education supervisors. The Director of the Montreal Institute for Ministry is Dr. Arthur Van Seters. The Reverend Thomas Gemmill, part-time Director of Studies at The Presbyterian College also serves on the Montreal Institute for Ministry staff. Courses in denominational studies, including the Westminster Standards and Presbyterian Church Government are given by the Principal.

Both the Bachelor of Theology and the Professional Year programmes are under review this year. These two programmes will be evaluated for reaccreditation by the American Association of Theological Schools. This will involve self-study on the part of the McGill Faculty of Religious Studies and the Montreal Institute for Ministry. Academic standards, qualifications of teaching staff, library facilities and related matters will all come under review.

L. W. Anderson Lectures

The 1979 L. W. Anderson Lectures were given during the month of January by Dr. John Dillenberger, President of Hartford Seminary Foundation, Hartford, Connecticut on the subject, "Theology in the World of Many Worlds." These lectures are made possible through the generosity of the late L. W. Anderson, a Montreal businessman and a benefactor of the College for many years.

Continuing Theological Education

During the 1978-1979 academic year The Presbyterian College offered four different programmes of continuing education for ministers:

Programme A: January 9-18, 1979. The following courses were well received: "Old and New in Worship" by Dean Joseph C. McLelland, "New Trends in Old Testament Studies" by Professor Robert C. Culley, "The Preaching Task Today" by Principal William Klempa, and "Religious Dimensions in Contemporary Art" by Mrs. Jane Dillenberger, Hartford, Connecticut.

Programme B: January 30 - February 8, 1979. In response to a recommendation from the State of the Church Committee, a workshop on Church Growth was offered. Dr. Dennis Oliver, Director of the Canadian Church Growth Centre, Regina discussed the general theme, "How Can Canadian Churches Grow Today?" Lectures were also given on such themes as "Canada: Challenge to the Churches" by Reverend Pierre Goldberger, Principal, United Theological College, Montreal, "Has the Church a Future?" by Professor Douglas J. Hall, McGill Faculty of Religious Studies; and "Christianity and History" by Professor H. Keith Markell.

Programme D: March 5-9, 1979 The Paulin Ministers' Institute. An intensive workshop on Preaching and Pastoral Care was led by Dr. James D. Smart and Principal William Klempa, with ministers and theological teachers in the Montreal area assisting. The Paulin Ministers' Institute is made possible by a grant from The Dr. H. M. Paulin Memorial Fund of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Windsor, Ontario and a grant from the Rev. Dr. J. B. Paulin Memorial Fund of Rosedale Presbyterian Church, Toronto.

Programme E: Scholar in Residence. A number of ministers have come for a period of two weeks to do directed reading and research under the supervision of a faculty member.

In addition to the above, two programmes were sponsored by the Montreal Institute for Ministry. A Ministry Workshop, October 22-27, 1978 on the theme "Authentic Ministry for Clergy and Other Aliens" was led by William Stringfellow, a lay theologian of the Episcopal Church in the U.S.A. The second, a Québec Workshop, "Etre Chrétien au Québec: Stratégie pour l'Eglise" was under the leadership of: Dr. Roger Hutchinson, Victoria University, Toronto

A course for Clerks of Presbyteries, under the direction of General Assembly and its Principal Clerk, was held November 27-30, 1978.

The Presbyterian College invests considerable time and financial resources in these continuing education programmes. Although it is now general practice for most congregations to provide their ministers with two weeks study leave and grant annually, many ministers do not attend continuing education programmes. As a result they and their congregations suffer. An increasing number are making good use of the study leave and grant. Unfortunately, some are using the leave and grant for programmes which do not really fit the description of continuing theological education.

With this in mind we recommend that sessions and presbyteries encourage ministers to attend continuing education programmes and that they exercise closer supervision of ministers' study leaves and grants. In addition we ask that the Board of Ministry establish guidelines regarding what constitutes continuing theological education to qualify for a study leave and grant.

Guidance Conferences

The College endorses the institution of Guidance Conferences and commends the Board of Ministry for its efforts in this area of its work. A Guidance Conference was held at The Presbyterian College in September, 1978 and another one is proposed for September, 1979.

When the Guidance Conferences for candidates for the ministry of Word and Sacrament were initiated, these conferences attempted to combine a screening process and a supportive counselling purpose. Last year the Board of Ministry decided to place the emphasis upon supportive counselling and to make screening the exclusive prerogative of the presbyteries.

Our faculty is concerned that the screening function of the conferences has been given up. Though presbyteries must make the final decision regarding the suitability of a candidate for ministry, at the same time we see the need and value of uniform standards and procedures of screening which guidance conferences provide. We, therefore, recommend that the Board of Ministry be asked to reinstate the screening aspect of guidance conferences.

Director of Studies

The 104th General Assembly granted The Presbyterian College permission to appoint a full-time Director of Studies effective August 1, 1979, in accordance with established procedures. These procedures involved the approval of the Committee on Executive Personnel and of the Administrative Council. When this was obtained the presbyteries of the Church were circularized regarding the appointment. The following nominations were received:

A Search Committee appointed by the Senate reviewed the *curriculum vitae* of the persons nominated (two of whom asked to have their names withdrawn) and conducted interviews. The work of the Search Committee and the action of the Senate have resulted in the recommendation that the Reverend Thomas Gemmell B.A., B.D. be appointed Director of Studies at The Presbyterian College, effective August 1, 1979.

Membership in Faculty and Senate

When The Presbyterian College became a part of the McGill University Faculty of Divinity in 1969, the following recommendation regarding ex-officio membership in Faculty and Senate was made by the Board of the College and adopted by General Assembly: "That the Board and Senate meeting in joint session be permitted to appoint annually as ex-officio members of the Faculty and Senate of The Presbyterian College, Montreal, any professor of the Faculty of Divinity (now called the Faculty of Religious Studies) of McGill University who is a member of a congregation of The Presbyterian Church in Canada."

This recommendation enables the College to have on its Faculty and Senate the following Presbyterians teaching in the McGill Faculty of Religious Studies: Dean Joseph C. McLelland, Prof. H. Keith Markell and Professor Robert C. Culley.

When this recommendation was made and adopted, the Montreal Institute for Ministry was not in existence. The Institute was formed in 1974 by the Joint Board of Theological Colleges affiliated with McGill University, to provide field-based training during the third year of the theological programme, usually called the in-ministry year. The Institute is now a permanent feature of the theological programme and the College desires that Presbyterians teaching on the staff of the Montreal Institute for Ministry be eligible for ex-officio membership in Faculty and Senate. We are therefore recommending that the words "and the staff of the Montreal Institute for Ministry" be inserted after McGill University in the 1969 adopted recommendation. If this recommendation is adopted it will enable the College to have as ex-officio member of Faculty and Senate, Dr. Arthur Van Seters, Executive Director of the Montreal Institute for Ministry. This, plus the appointment of a Director of Studies, if adopted, will increase the number of our faculty from four to six members.

Residence

During the past few years residence accommodation at the College has been made available only to candidates for the ministry of The Presbyterian Church in Canada and to persons attending Continuing Education programmes. This has meant that some rooms have been left vacant during the whole term while others have been used for only several weeks. The Senate has decided to make all thirty-five rooms available to university students, preference being given to candidates studying for the ministry of The Presbyterian Church in Canada. Residence rates will be increased for the 1979-1980 academic term so that fees and actual cost approximate each other. This will mean additional income for the College but it will also result in the need for more bursary aid for our candidates for ministry. We hope that more bursary aid will be provided by congregations and interested persons. Accommodation for Continuing Education participants will be arranged for at other residences or at nearby hotels.

Theological Education for Francophones

For the past five or six decades a vital element has been missing from the Protestant and Anglican witness in the province of Québec; namely, a francophone theological institution. This has had a deleterious effect on the life of Protestantism and on the spiritual and theological life of the francophone milieu. Where at the beginning of the century there were about fifty pastors and a dozen or more evangelists, there are now fewer than a dozen ministers who constitute the French work of the Anglican, United and Presbyterian churches. The three theological colleges, through their joint board, have now begun to think and to work at the establishment of a francophone theological centre in Montreal.

Women in Ministry

Thirteen years have elapsed since General Assembly voted to admit women to the Ministry of the Word and Sacraments. Now one-quarter to one-third of our graduating classes are women. These women bring invaluable gifts of mind and spirit to the ministry of Jesus Christ, gifts which the Apostle Paul tells us, are the work of the Spirit (1 Corinthians 12).

Although some progress has been made during these past thirteen years in the Church's acceptance of women as ministers, much more needs to be done. There are presbyteries which contravene the action of the 1966 General Assembly by not permitting women to minister within their bounds. There are congregations which will not consider applications from ministers who are women. There are some congregations applying to the Board of World Mission for appointments which specify that they do not wish to have a woman appointed as their minister. Discrimination exists and steps have not been taken to educate our congregations and to eliminate this discrimination and denial of opportunity for women to exercise their calling and gifts of ministry. The Senate has discussed this and wishes to recommend that the Board of Ministry establish a task force on the partnership of men and women in ministry and that this task force address itself to eliminating all discrimination, where it exists, and to educating our people regarding the partnership of men and women in ministry.

Recommendations

RECOMMENDATION No. 1. A

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 1978

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles appropriate for a non-profit organization. The College makes no charge for depreciation on buildings and equipment in the determination of annual operating results on the grounds that fixed assets, when replaced, will be financed from public or private donations. In order to provide for systematic write off of fixed assets, the Board of Management has adopted the policy of recording depreciation on fixed assets by a direct charge against the Building and Maintenance Fund.

Revenue from investments is treated as income of the General Fund with the exception of the portion thereof deemed to be earned by the Endowments for Scholarships which are allocated directly to Scholarship Funds Held for Disbursement. Gain or losses on the sale of investments are credited directly to the General Fund with the exception of the portion thereof deemed to be applicable to the Scholarship Funds Held for Disbursement.

2. LAND

Land, which was acquired for nominal consideration as part of an exchange with McGill University, is shown at the value assigned by the Board of Management in 1961.

3. SCHOLARSHIP FUNDS FOR DISBURSEMENT

This fund represents accumulated income on Endowments for Scholarships and contributions received for scholarships, bursaries and prizes not specifically donated to the Endowment Fund, less applicable disbursements to date.

REPORT OF THE CUNNINGHAM COMMISSION

To the Venerable the 105th General Assembly

Terms of Reference

1. To meet as soon as possible;
2. To cite representatives of the Presbytery of Vancouver Island and Mr. Roy Cunningham to appear before the commission when it meets;
3. To give judgment on the matter re the alleged discrimination against Mr. Cunningham, but not to annul the action taken by the Presbytery of Vancouver Island re the severing of the pastoral tie, but rather to deal primarily with the need of Mr. Cunningham for counsel and pastoral care."

The Commission: Bruce A. Miles, Chairman, Hugh Lloyd, ruling elder, Winnipeg, the Rev. Ian MacSween, teaching elder, Edmonton, Alberta - met in Victoria, B.C., July 2, 3, 4, 1978.

- Met with Mr. Cunningham (Mrs. Cunningham was with him).
 - Met with representatives of Presbytery.
 - Met with Mr. Cunningham following the Presbytery meeting.
- We reported verbally to Roy Cunningham as follows:
- We have found that the Presbytery of Vancouver Island has spent a great deal of time in regard to the Sooke situation and Mr. Cunningham.

Report of the Cunningham Commission

- We have found that the Presbytery has attempted to deal fairly and with understanding, not only with individuals involved, but also with the congregation. Mr. Cunningham claims that he was discriminated against at the June 21, 1977 meeting of Presbytery, held at Knox, Sooke, when the congregation had been cited to appear before the Presbytery. Some twenty people expressed their views and it seems clear from the reports of representatives of Presbytery and Mr. Cunningham, that feelings ran high and there could very well have been misstatements and misunderstandings. Emotions were much in evidence.

At the meeting, Mr. Cunningham was on his feet several times to answer his critics and felt that he was unjustly treated when asked to take his seat. The court felt that it was doing a kindness to Mr. Cunningham by asking him not to reply to each critical comment because of the steadily mounting emotional tension. The minutes noted that Mr. Cunningham was given an opportunity to speak following the expressions from members and adherents of the congregation, and the Presbytery representatives confirmed that this did happen.

Mr. Cunningham claims that he was forced to resign by the ministry committee, so that it could recommend to Presbytery that the resignation be accepted. The alternative was for the committee to recommend that the pastoral tie be severed.

We, the Commission, can understand how Mr. Cunningham would sense a certain pressure, but at the same time, we recognize that by that time in the sequence of events, resignation had become very necessary, for the sake of all concerned. The recommendation to resign was, we believe, intended to help Mr. Cunningham's future situation since a resignation is much easier to explain than a dismissal.

Mr. Cunningham claims that rather than fair debate, Presbytery acted out of sheer relief, in approving quickly, the motion of resignation. We claim that there was room for debate at this juncture. But we also claim that there was nothing left to debate. We believe that the necessity of resignation was quite clear. We also acknowledge that at this point in the Presbytery deliberations, the atmosphere was so fraught with emotional tension, that any action or discussion could be misconstrued. Mr. Cunningham claims a 'majority' spoke for him and the Presbytery representatives agree. There was, however, sufficient criticism of the minister to make the decision of the Presbytery a wise one, in the opinion of the Commission. An estimate puts it this way - 60% pro, 40% contra.

Counsel to Mr. Cunningham

We are unanimous in noting that Mr. Cunningham's intensity of thought prevents him from hearing what anyone else is saying to him. This was evidenced

particularly in his failing to respond directly to questions put to him by the Commission. We are asking Roy Cunningham to *listen!* He demands this of others, but fails to respond in like manner.

We are aware of Mr. Cunningham's desire to remain in British Columbia. There are health and family reasons. We believe that his opportunities for serving the Presbyterian Church in this geographical area are severely limited, if not impossible. We ask him to seriously consider the reality of that statement. We remind him that there are opportunities for service in The Presbyterian Church in Canada in Eastern Canada.

We, after due deliberation, because of Mr. Cunningham's obsessiveness regarding his alleged treatment, conclude that his ministerial effectiveness is severely hampered. We encourage him to seriously consider secular work for the time being, to give him opportunity to feel usefully employed, and to get his thinking re-arranged.

It was said to Mr. Cunningham that he should give serious consideration to seeking professional help, for, as he says "this is destroying me."

We departed with the promise that:

- (a) we would keep him informed of what we are doing,
- (b) we would seek monetary relief for him from any such funds the Church might have available.

SPECIAL COMMISSION RE THE APPEAL OF MR. T. O. McALLISTER

To the Venerable the 105th General Assembly:

The Commission to hear the appeal of Mr. T. O. McAllister from the decision of the Presbytery of Brampton begs leave to report as follows:

1. The Commission (with the exception of Mr. F. E. Milne who, for personal reasons, begged leave not to act) has met with the parties as requested.
2. The Commission has submitted a complete and comprehensive report of its findings to Mr. T. O. McAllister, to the Presbytery of Brampton, and to the Kirk-Session of Caven Presbyterian Church, Bolton, and this report is also lodged in the office of the Clerk of Assembly, 50 Wynford Drive, Don Mills, Ontario.
3. The Commission finds that the Kirk-Session of Caven Presbyterian Church, Bolton, was unwise in requesting the removal of Mr. T. O. McAllister and, as well, the Session acted with haste in this and in several other respects.
4. The Commission believes that the terms of reference given to the Presbytery Commission were too vague, and the Presbytery itself acted precipitously at several points which are spelled out in the full report.
5. Nevertheless, the Commission has rendered the following judgment:
"In order to assure the peace and harmony of Caven Presbyterian Church, Bolton, and also in consideration of the Health and Welfare of Mr. T. Oswald McAllister, we rule that the decision of the Presbytery of Brampton be upheld, namely, that Mr. T. Oswald McAllister be removed as an elder of Caven Presbyterian Church, Bolton.

It is understood that Mr. McAllister remains as an ordained elder of The Presbyterian Church in Canada, and if elected as an elder in any congregation of The Presbyterian Church in Canada in the future that he need not be ordained again."

RECOMMENDATION No. 1. A

That the report of this Commission be received.

RECOMMENDATION No. 2. A

That the terms of reference for Commissions be very carefully spelled out by Presbyteries and Synods as well as by the Assembly.

RECOMMENDATION No. 3. A

That this Commission be discharged.

COMMUNICATION SERVICES COMMITTEE

To the Venerable the 105th General Assembly:

At the direction of the Executive Personnel Committee of the Administrative Council, this Committee undertook a thorough evaluation of its goals and objectives and established an updated strategy plan for the future: to assist the Church to become more fully aware of the many effective ways of communicating the gospel today and in the future, and to provide training in order that these modern media technologies can be more fully utilized in the service of Christ.

As participants in the Special Committee, established by the Administrative Council, we studied the whole area of the Communication Services of The Presbyterian Church in Canada, which through planning and re-organization, has resulted in a more unified approach to the production of audio-visual resource materials.

Since September 5, 1978, all staff positions within the department have been filled with the appointment of a director, a production technician and a secretary.

Library Services

We have just completed the task of recataloguing all of our media resource materials presently in the library, thanks to the very able assistance of Miss Mabel Booth. A new catalogue listing all of our films, slides, filmstrips and multi-media kits is in the process of being printed and should be available for distribution to every congregation by September.

Postal strikes and erratic delivery of library materials have continued to plague the effective utilization by congregations across Canada. While the use of our media resource materials has almost doubled during the past six months, it has been extremely discouraging and somewhat upsetting when we learned that these materials were not fully utilized by congregations because the materials had not arrived on time.

This problem has not been confined to the Presbyterian Church but to every denomination presently operating a library service. A study has been recommended by Interchurch Communications to consider the feasibility of establishing a number of regional interchurch resource centres across the country to handle the distribution of all church resource materials, with a joint resources catalogue being made available to all congregations. The establishment of such regional libraries could eliminate some of the present distribution problems, but such a study will require more evaluations of all possible ramifications such as costs, ownership, distribution, etc.

Broadcasting - Radio

We are continuing to produce and distribute the weekly radio series, "Amazing Grace", with Dr. Mariano Di Gangi as host. At present this program is aired on three stations in Canada - Oshawa and Renfrew in Ontario and Prince Albert in Saskatchewan. As well the Presbyterian Church has joined with the other denominations in Interchurch Radio to produce a new weekly radio program entitled "Godshow", which is heard Sunday evenings on radio CFRB Toronto. This programme, commencing in January, 1979, has run for 39 weeks. We are extremely pleased and proud of the fact that John Archibald, our production technician, was selected as host of this refreshingly contemporary radio programme.

It is our intention to continue to review the effectiveness of all present and other forms of radio ministry at the local, regional and national level. Funds remaining, as per Recommendation 16 Acts and Proceedings, 1978, page 80, will be utilized to expand this whole area of radio ministry to congregations of The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

Broadcasting - Television

Through representation on the Religious Advisory Council of the CBC, we continue to have three Presbyterian church services televised annually on the national television network programme "Meeting Place". Recent services have been broadcast from:

Westwood Church, Winnipeg, Manitoba, October 15, 1978

Knox Church, Ottawa, Ontario, February 4, 1979

Central Church, Vancouver, British Columbia, May 13, 1979.

As well there are almost unlimited opportunities for participation by our churches at the local level over area television stations and community cable systems. We encourage every congregation to explore the opportunities that are available to them and learn how they might be put to use to meet their individual needs.

We are aware that there are many congregations who have already made excellent use of the broadcast medium (radio, television and community cable systems). The members and staff of this Committee are available and willing to meet with ministers, congregational groups and presbyteries to assist in the development of skills in the broadcast field, offer advice, hold workshops and to support existing programmes. We are prepared to respond to the particular needs that are presented to us.

Public Service Television Spots

The five sixty-second public service television spots, produced by this Committee for The Presbyterian Church in Canada from Birthday Gift Funds, have been distributed to commercial television stations as well as community cable systems across Canada. A total of 195 spots have been copied and made available upon request. We would welcome comments from congregational groups or individuals who have viewed these television spots in their area.

Children's TV Special - U.N. Year of the Child - 1979

Plans have been completed for the production of a television special for children to be financed by funds now held by Burning Bush Productions, Inc. This half hour programme will be produced to honour the 1979 International Year of the Child. We have received a grant of \$2,500 from the Canadian Commission for the International Year of the Child, Ottawa, to assist in the production.

This programme, entitled "Serendipity Spyglass", will be co-produced by the Children's Television Department of the CBC. The production is being filmed in the Toronto area in June, 1979, and will be aired on National television during the Christmas holiday period.

Associations

This Committee continues to be represented on and participate in the activities of a number of associations. Interchurch Communications involves the national communication departments of the Anglican, Baptist, Lutheran, Presbyterian, Roman Catholic and United Church. Through this association we participate in joint research, training and production projects on a basis that would be otherwise impossible for us individually. One of our current joint projects has been the completion of the Interdenominational Audio-Visual Survey.

We are also members of the World Association for Christian Communication, a world-wide communication association which provides information and workshops for churches throughout the world. In March, 1979, at their annual meeting in New Orleans our Director, Donald Stephens, was the only Canadian elected to the Board of Directors of the Association of Media Educators in Religion. The purposes of this association are to stimulate more effective use of educational technology at all levels in the religious community and to increase the awareness of the formative effects of the media upon the shape of society and the theology of the church.

Membership Committee

After a careful study as to what would best serve the needs and purposes of the Communication Services Committee, we respectfully request that the composition of the committee be reduced from 16 members to 14 with the following changes:

- (a) Present composition: two representatives each from Board of World Mission, Board of Congregational Life, W.M.S. (W.D.), Record Committee, National Religious Advisory Council of the C.B.C., and up to six other appointments by the Committee. By correspondence - one representative from W.M.S. (E.D.)
- (b) Requested change: one representative each from Board of World Mission, Board of Congregational Life, W.M.S. (W.D.), Record Committee, National Religious Advisory Council of the C.B.C., and nine other appointments by the General Assembly with 3 retiring in 1980, 3 in 1981 and 3 in 1982. By correspondence - one representative from W.M.S. (E.D.)

Staff Activities

During the past nine months, the two executive staff persons, Donald Stephens and John Archibald, have been extremely busy re-organizing the department, supervising the media resources library, conducting workshops, providing consultation on the production, purchase and use of all types of audio-visual materials and equipment, as well as meet with a number of ministers, congregations, boards and committees to assess their particular communication needs and offer assistance to meet these needs.

In co-operation with the staff of the Board of World Mission, we assisted in the production of two sound filmstrips, "John Geddie and Company" and "With The Moderator in the New Hebrides".

The Committee's mandate is to serve the boards and congregations of the Church in the most effective use of all the means of communication available. Our aim is to present Christ and His good news in as effective and efficient manner as is possible. Your Communication Services Committee and staff, with your assistance, will do all in its power to honour this commitment.

Although we have accomplished a great deal since September 5, 1978, we see this only as the beginning. As in the past, we are ready to respond to the individual needs of any minister, congregation, presbytery or board. Therefore, whatever the interest or need in all areas of communication, we will do our best to respond. We are grateful for the encouragement and support which we have received from so many parts of the Church.

RECOMMENDATION 1. C

That the membership of the Communication Services Committee be reduced from its present membership of 16 to 14 and restructured so that the composition will be:

One representative from each:

Board of World Mission,

Board of Congregational Life,

W.M.S. (W.D.),

Record Committee, and

National Religious Advisory Council of the C.B.C.

Nine members appointed by the General Assembly.

By correspondence - one representative from W.M.S. (E.D.)

RECOMMENDATION 2. A

That the Communication Services Committee and the executive staff initiate a complete study throughout The Presbyterian Church in Canada of the distribution of library media resource materials from our central library, particularly in the areas of: delays in delivery and costs in operating the present library, and as well co-operate with Interchurch Communications in studying their proposal to establish a number of regional interchurch resource centres across Canada with a joint resource catalogue available to all congregations. This study to take one year with a full report and recommendation to be made to the 106th General Assembly.

BOARD OF CONGREGATIONAL LIFE

To the Venerable the 105th General Assembly:

As the Board of Congregational Life enters upon its fifth year of operation there is reason to believe that the various components of its work are beginning to fit together in ways which are mutually supportive. The decision of the Board to plan its work through stated goals and objectives promises to integrate the various programs and projects in a balance that is fair to each and supportive of all.

I. STAFF

The addition of two new members to the national staff has assisted greatly the work of the Board. Rev. John B. Duncan and Rev. David Murphy, have joined the staff since the last meeting of the General Assembly. Each has brought distinctive gifts and considerable skills to the overall task of serving the church, its courts and congregations.

The number of national staff now stands at seven, two less than was originally approved by the General Assembly. For reasons of economy, it has been agreed that, for the present, no steps will be taken to fill the remaining vacancies. This means that some aspects of the work must receive less support than otherwise would be the case due to the doubling up of responsibilities, and the important area of research and planning for the future is able to receive less attention than is desirable in times of rapid social change.

II. STRUCTURES

Following the action of the 104th General Assembly in reducing the size of its Boards and Committees, the Board of Congregational Life has undertaken a review of its committee structures with a view to reducing costs and streamlining its administrative procedures. A number of Advisory Committees reporting to a Standing Committee on Leadership and Resources Development have been replaced by a series of Functional Committees which are responsible directly to the Board and its Executive Committee for the areas of work committed to them. Each committee has been provided with a goal statement and a series of objectives under which it will organize its work and by which the effectiveness of its work can be measured. After a period of testing of this method of operation the Board expects to report to a future General Assembly regarding its effectiveness.

III. LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT

A major emphasis of the Board of Congregational Life is the assistance provided for congregations and courts of the church in the development of leadership skills among those who are called to responsibility for programs of life and mission within the congregation.

Wherever possible, this leadership assistance is offered within the context of parish planning. This helps the local leadership to develop a strategy for their congregation's life and mission, and to select resources appropriate to its needs.

Church Officer Training

Assistance with eldership training events continues to receive prominent attention as presbyteries and sessions focus on the leadership responsibilities of the session and its individual members. Frequently managers and various committee chairpersons are included in these training events so that it could be called, more properly, "Church Officer Training". Local leaders usually participate in the planning so that future training events can be undertaken without the assistance of outside leadership. This means that, while the number of events involving the Board of Congregational Life staff may actually have decreased in the past year, the amount of church officer training being carried on in the church has increased greatly over former years.

Christian Education: Shared Approaches

CE:SA is a major project of the Board of Congregational Life. During 1978 all four approaches became available to congregations and the response of the church to this venture has been very gratifying. Planning assistance has been provided for a great many congregations as they developed an overall plan for their educational program and selected the resources most appropriate to their needs. Through a national strategy for the support of CE:SA, assistance has been offered to all presbyteries. Through the services of national staff, the Area Educational Consultants, and volunteers, assistance has been provided to congregations from Newfoundland to Vancouver Island, including the northern Presbytery of Peace River. Only a few presbyteries have not availed themselves of the opportunities offered.

Pilot Project for Ministers in Education

In November 1978 a successful project for ministers wishing assistance with their role in church education was held at Crieff Hills Community under the auspices of the Board of Congregational Life. The evaluation of the participants was very positive and urged that similar projects be offered regionally across Canada. These will be undertaken as time and funds permit.

Joint Educational Development - Youth Leadership Training Labs

A series of Youth Leadership Training Labs has been held in North America, with four of them being available to Canadians. The four were planned for Portland, Maine; Toronto, Ontario; Minneapolis, Minnesota; and Vancouver, British Columbia. The presbyteries responded well in obtaining leaders of youth to attend these events. The Vancouver event, however, had to be cancelled due to lack of registrations. Follow-up plans are being implemented whereby those who attended from a given area will be able to work together in planning training events for leaders in their region.

National Advisory Council for Youth Ministry

Under Guidelines established by the General Assembly (A & P 1975, p. 424) one representative young person appointed by each Synod is able to meet twice a year with the representatives of the other Synods and with national staff for the purpose of learning about the life and mission of The Presbyterian Church in Canada and of providing input through the Board of Congregational Life and the Board of World Mission to the Church's national policies and programs.

The present N.A.C. members have presented to the Board of Congregational Life a request that their term of membership be changed from one to two years and that, in order to provide more continuity, one half of the Synods be asked to make an appointment each year. This would eliminate the necessity of one member each year being named as a "ninth member" to the following year for the purpose of continuity, and would thus represent a considerable saving in travel costs. The Board has agreed to recommend accordingly.

RECOMMENDATION No. 1. A

That the Guidelines for the appointment of the membership of the National Advisory Council for Youth Ministry be amended as follows:-

- a) *each appointment to be for a period of two years, one half of the synods being requested to make an appointment each year;*
- b) *the rotation of appointment to begin with the Synods of the Atlantic Provinces, Toronto and Kingston, Manitoba and Northwestern Ontario and Alberta being asked to make appointments in 1979, the representatives of the other synods to continue for a second year.*
- c) *individuals being allowed to serve on the Council for a maximum of one term (two years).*

Church Camping

Church camping in The Presbyterian Church in Canada is sponsored directly by synod and presbytery committees. The Board of Congregational Life offers resources

and leadership training assistance. An inter-church camping consultation was held early in 1979 with eight participants from various regions of The Presbyterian Church in Canada in attendance. National staff visits were made to four camps in 1978 including Christopher, Kannawin, Ryde Lake and Glen Mhor. All the camps are visited on a rotation basis. The Board has agreed to encourage and support regional leadership training events with planning assistance and funding. Copies of the manual on church camping "Christian Community Camping", are available to all Camp Boards at a nominal cost.

Church Growth

Since the adoption of the Report on the State of the Church at the last General Assembly, the Board of Congregational Life has given the matter of church growth a place of high priority among its considerations. The Administrative Council has made an amount of \$5,000. available for the engaging of specialists and the Board, in consultation with the Board of World Mission, has attempted to develop a national strategy for church growth. Since that strategy is not complete at the time of the writing of the report, the Board will seek permission to present a supplementary report on this matter to the 105th General Assembly.

Stewardship Education and General Assembly Budget

1978 was a record year for General Assembly Budget Givings. A total of \$3,347,477. was received, which was made up of receipts for 1978 plus delayed givings from 1977 received after the books were closed.

This results in a \$400,600. or 13.5% increase over 1977. This is the largest ever dollar increase received for the General Assembly Budget. While an extra Sunday in 1978 contributed to this increase, it is nevertheless a result of more committed giving by our people, and for this we give thanks.

The per member rate of givings to the General Assembly Budget rose from \$17.82 in 1977 to \$20.05 in 1978. All Purpose givings rose from \$24,252,300. in 1977 to \$27,083,865. in 1978. The per member rate for All Purposes increased from \$143.93 in 1977 to \$162.25 in 1978.

Besides this, congregations contributed \$130,412. for Inter-Church Aid, Refugee and World Service and \$1,205,978. for other Benevolent Purposes. The Women's Missionary Society (W.D.) and the Woman's Missionary Society (E.D.) contributed \$406,000. In addition \$352,000. was received for the Second Century Advance for Christ Campaign. This totaled \$5,441,867. given for programs outside the congregation.

There is still a great need to educate our people in Christian Stewardship in its widest sense, going beyond the traditional "time, talent and treasure" concept. We need to see it as our responsibility faithfully to hold in trust God's gifts of the environment, national resources, the care of the underdeveloped world, and all of life's treasure.

To this end stewardship education needs to be vigorously inculcated through the leaders in presbyteries. Stewardship workshops in every presbytery in 1979-80 would provide more informed and committed leaders. They in turn would take their enthusiasm with them into their congregations and draw others into that responsible, thankful and committed style of life we call the life of Christian stewardship.

A workshop for presbytery stewardship conveners and other leaders was held for the Synod of Hamilton-London in April, 1979. A similar workshop is planned for the Synod of Toronto-Kingston in 1980.

RECOMMENDATION No. 2. C

That the General Assembly record its thanks to the membership of the Church for their faithful support during 1978 which resulted in the largest ever dollar increase.

RECOMMENDATION No. 3. A

That the General Assembly Budget objective for 1980 be \$4,500,000. and that congregational Required Shares be computed from that figure and sent to all Presbyteries in time to be considered at their October meetings.

RECOMMENDATION No. 4. C

That Presbyteries be urged to accept the total Required Shares submitted to them, and that they be instructed to review and, where necessary, adjust individual congregational shares before submitting them to congregations.

RECOMMENDATION No. 5. A

That congregations be urged to accept an allocation which exceeds the amount given in the preceding year.

RECOMMENDATION No. 6. A

That congregations which find themselves unable to accept their full Budget allocations be required to communicate to Presbytery the reasons they are unable to do so and also to indicate the steps which they propose to take to meet their allocations in the future.

RECOMMENDATION No. 7. A

That Sessions be urged to arrange for the annual renewal of the personal commitment of church members in support of the programs of the Church, both those planned locally and those authorized by the General Assembly Budget, and that use of an Every Person Visitation Plan be encouraged to this end.

RECOMMENDATION No. 8. A

That all presbyteries be urged to plan to conduct a stewardship workshop during the period 1979-80.

IV. RESOURCES DEVELOPMENT

Parallel to its programs of leadership development and equal to them in importance is the provision of appropriate resources for use by congregations and courts of the church in their various programs.

CE:SA

Reference has been made to Christian Education:Shared Approaches under Leadership Development. A major project of the Board has been the participation, through Joint Educational Development, in the production of resources for church education which offer to congregations four approaches to the use of the scriptures in their educational programs. The Board continues to monitor the manuscripts as they are written, evaluating them on their theological and educational approaches, and their North American content. A network of faithful readers across Canada, about eighty in number, are to be commended and thanked for their work. By this means The Presbyterian Church in Canada continues to have a significant influence on the nature and quality of the resources being recommended for use in its congregations.

RECOMMENDATION No. 9. A

That the General Assembly record its appreciation of the work of all who have served and who continue to serve, as readers of the CE:SA manuscripts.

The Presbyterian Church in Canada also is sharing in an extensive evaluation of the CE:SA project. A variety of ways are being used to gather data on the use of the overall project and its resources. Selected congregations are being asked to provide comments on their use of CE:SA resources, suggest where improvements can be made, and make recordings of actual teaching sessions.

Theological college professors are being asked to study and comment on the theological and educational stance and content. A random selection of ministers, Christian Education Committee conveners and teachers will be surveyed on their use of the educational resources they are presently using.

This evaluation will help the Project Team to effect changes where necessary and to ensure that the CE:SA project is appropriate to the needs of the partners in JED.

The Presbyterian Home Study Memory Course

The Board of Congregational Life has undertaken a review and evaluation of

the memory course material available, or previously available, and as a result has published a new course intended to involve the parents as well as the children, and indeed, the session and the whole congregation. In the first few months the course has been available it has been favourably received, with over 1000 copies having been sold. Presbyterian denominations in the United States are exploring the possibility of using or adapting this material for their congregations.

RECOMMENDATION No. 10. A

That the General Assembly record its appreciation to all who have contributed to the writing, editing and layout of the Presbyterian Home Study Memory Course, and that its use be commended to sessions and congregations.

Heritage Resources

Unit I of Heritage Resources is now available. Congregations may plan for its use in 1979-80 as a supplement to the resources regularly used in their educational programs.

RECOMMENDATION No. 11. A

That Unit I of Heritage Resources, "The Church Confesses Its Faith" be commended to sessions and congregations for use as a supplement to the resources regularly used in their educational programs.

Management Handbook

In recognition of the need for a current resource on the management of the affairs of the local congregation, the Board of Congregational Life has published a Handbook for Managers. Carefully researched and written by the Rev. Warren McKinnon, this booklet deals with the relationship of management to the session, and offers many practical suggestions which will prove invaluable to both new managers and those of long experience. It is recommended as a resource book for Church Officer training.

Worship Resources

The Board has continued the policy of the former Committee on Church Worship of making available resources for use in public and private worship. This is done mainly through the newsletter, "Worship Workbench", participation in the Celebration Committee of the United Church of Canada which publishes "Getting It All Together", a quarterly catalogue of resources for worship, and by participation in the Association of Church Worship Executives.

These Days

An evaluation has been completed on the usefulness and suitability to the needs of The Presbyterian Church in Canada of the daily devotional guide, "These Days". This evaluation found that the material presented in "These Days" is mostly readable, stimulating and well-balanced in its choice of themes. It is not particularly helpful to those who follow the church year and lectionary, and the language and illustrations are directed, for the most part, to the mature reader. Often the readings are centered around a theme into which the scripture passage is integrated. There ought to be more Canadian writers. By comparison with other daily devotional guides, "These Days" is judged to be one of the best.

It has been agreed that The Presbyterian Church in Canada will continue to be represented on the Editorial Board of These Days where the concerns mentioned above and others can be presented.

The manuscripts will continue to be read and comments will be forwarded regularly to the Editor.

Canadian writers are being actively sought and their names will be presented to the Editor.

The Board of Congregational Life continues to promote the use of These Days through its mailings and by encouraging its use at camps and conference centres.

A daily prayer calendar is circulated monthly to all congregations, inviting people to remember the church and its workers in their prayers.

The 104th General Assembly asked "that the Board of Congregational Life consider the possibility of producing a Canadian Presbyterian daily devotional book as a substitute for These Days; and report to the 105th General Assembly".

The recommendation of the Board is that The Presbyterian Church in Canada should not attempt to develop its own devotional guide because of the cost, the staff time required, and the tendency it would create toward denominational isolationism. It was found that the present circulation of These Days is only about 9,000, hardly enough to make such a project viable. The lack of response to the Board's promotional efforts raises the question whether the church really wants to have a daily devotional guide, its own or anyone else's.

RECOMMENDATION No. 12. A

That The Presbyterian Church in Canada do not undertake the publication of its own daily devotional guide for the reasons given above.

Family Ministries Resource Kit

A kit of Family Life Resources has been produced and is available free of charge to congregations on request. Because of the cost involved the kits are being limited to one per congregation.

Resources for Adult Study

The Board continues to produce and/or recommend resources for use in adult study groups. While there has been a marked increase in the number of congregations reporting adult study groups, the Board sees this as one area where there is need for a concerted effort by the whole church. The vitality of the life and mission of the church would be greatly improved if more adults were to become involved in group study of the scriptures, the mission of the church and the pressing social issues which profoundly affect the quality of life for people in Canada and around the world.

RECOMMENDATION No. 13. A

That sessions and congregations be urged to provide opportunities for older youth and adults to come together for study and action related to the scriptures, the mission of the church, and some of the pressing social issues which affect the quality of life for people in Canada and around the world.

RECOMMENDATION No. 14. A

That the Board of Congregational Life, in co-operation with the Board of World Mission and the Women's Missionary Societies, be asked to provide or recommend suitable resources for such scriptural study, enabling groups to enter into study/action projects related to human development, dignity and freedom on a global basis.

Mission Study Themes

Through a Joint Task Force on Mission Education, the Women's Missionary Society (W.D.), the Board of World Mission and the Board of Congregational Life co-operate in recommending to the General Assembly the mission study themes two years in advance. Whenever possible, the recommended themes are those agreed upon by the National Council of Churches, Commission on Education for Mission. This gives the advantage of the main study materials being prepared jointly and available to The Presbyterian Church in Canada through the Friendship Press.

Themes were approved by the 104th General Assembly for the years 1979-80 and 1980-81. They are as follows:—

1979-80 — "Human Rights and the International Order" with a panorama of supplementary material including areas where The Presbyterian Church in Canada is at work and human rights are imperilled; also available is material on the "Middle East Mosaic" theme and where appropriate, the Board of Congregational Life, the Women's Missionary Society (W.D.) and the Board of World Mission co-operate in the preparation of suitable materials for use across the church.

1980-81 – "India and Nepal", dealing largely with our Church's involvement in mission there; and material to be made available on "Biblical Understandings of Mission to the Individual and Society" as an alternate theme, with appropriate supplementary materials, where necessary, being prepared co-operatively.

1981-82 – Mission Study Themes.

RECOMMENDATION No. 15. A

That the mission study themes for 1981-82 be "Europe: Dimensions of Christian Mission" and "Pluralism, Poverty and Cultural Bias in Relation to the Christian Gospel", and that where appropriate, the Women's Missionary Society, the Board of World Mission and the Board of Congregational Life co-operate in the preparation of suitable supplementary material for use across the Church.

V. SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC ISSUES

The Board, through its Committee on Studies and Statements, has had a number of important social issues under study during the past year.

Meaning of Life

Arising out of its studies on Abortion and Euthanasia the Board has sought to address itself to a study of the meaning of life. This has led to a major study on Bio-Medical Engineering which has been prepared jointly with the Committee on Church Doctrine, and that Committee will be reporting to the Assembly on this issue.

Violence in the Home

A study paper on Violence in the Home has been prepared for use by presbyteries and congregations. It is not offered as a position paper or a definitive statement, but rather as a resource to be used to raise consciousness of this issue, and to suggest ways in which congregations may become a community resource in dealing with it.

RECOMMENDATION No. 16. A

That the paper on Violence in the Home be commended to presbyteries and congregations for study and appropriate action, with requests for further information and/or comments to be directed to the Board of Congregational Life.

Other social issues currently under study are as follows:

- Euthanasia
- Human Sexuality
- Death: Ministry to the Dying; the Funeral; Pastoral Care of the Bereaved
- Unemployment
- Church and Nation in Canada

Consultation on Church and Society

The Board of Congregational Life convened a consultation on Church and Society on February 2nd, 1979, in accordance with the action of the 104th General Assembly, (A & P 1978, page 381, rec. 5). Representatives were present from each of the following Boards or Committees:

- The Board of World Mission
- The Board of Congregational Life
- The Women's Missionary Society (WD)
- The Committee on Inter-Church Aid
- The Committee on International Affairs
- The Committee on Church Doctrine
- The Committee on Social Responsibility in Investment Policy

Each agency shared with the rest the extent of its involvement in matters of social concern. In a period of reflection and discussion which followed a number of issues were identified for joint effort and discussion. Some were referred to a particular agency for a clarification of its mandate and relation to an issue.

It was agreed that there is a need for a clear statement on why the church should get involved in social issues. There is a need also to help people to deal with conflicting opinions in a constructive manner. The Rev. Brian Fraser has agreed to prepare a working paper on why the church should be involved in social action issues, and what kind of life style is involved in such involvement.

Actions Coming Out of the Meeting

1. The Secretary will circulate the information shared at this meeting to all the participants.
2. Brian Fraser will prepare and circulate a paper as indicated above.
3. An ad hoc committee of staff will continue to meet from time to time for the purpose of sharing information and concerns.
4. A quarterly newsletter on social issues will be prepared by members of staff.
5. The Board of Congregational Life will be responsible for calling the next consultation (1980) and for making the necessary arrangements.

Evaluation

By common consent it was agreed that the consultation had been a profitable experience and one which is well worth repeating on an annual basis. It was agreed also that it is desirable to have at least two representatives from each agency – one staff and one other – attend such consultations.

Social Responsibility in Investment Policy

Since the 104th General Assembly placed the Committee on Social Responsibility in Investment Policy under the Board of Congregational Life some time has been spent in working out the new relationship. Both the Board and the Committee feel that this is progressing satisfactorily. The new relationship is perceived as affording a broader access to individuals and groups throughout the church who share the concerns around which the committee is gathered.

In practical terms, the 1973 mandate which directed the committee to engage in research and appropriate action related to social responsibility in investment policy has centered largely on membership in an ecumenical Task Force of the Churches on Corporate Responsibility (TCCR). Three members of the committee serve on the Task Force, including the Rev. Brian Fraser, who is currently the Vice-Chairman. Presbyterian membership on the Task Force involves a support grant of \$3,025. in the current year. Membership provides access to a good deal of research, and a voice in what the Task Force does. In the view of the Task Force its most significant activity lies in presenting carefully prepared briefs in a few special areas of competence as a basis for discussion in private meetings with business management. Occasionally, representatives of member denominations, though not the Task Force as such, have made public presentations at annual general meetings of corporations in order to highlight the issues before a larger public. Representatives of the Presbyterian Church have not done so.

Our Committee on Social Responsibility in Investment Policy recognizes in its own life the deep complexity of the issues at stake in seeking to define moral guidelines for public investments, particularly where these relate to Canadian involvement in projects of third world countries. It is important that the church be seen, not as sitting in judgment of those who are in positions of responsibility in large corporations, many of whom are themselves active churchmen, but as caring about people. In a world where oppression and revolution are everywhere, the church's deep concern for people must be heard, especially the gospel concern for those who suffer poverty, degradation and the loss of basic human rights.

The committee has opted to make an educational project its principal effort in the current year, on the assumption that its first responsibility is to sensitize our own church membership to this area of social concern.

To meet this objective a one-day seminar was convened on March 1, 1979, at Calvin Church, Toronto, under the auspices of the Board of Congregational Life and chaired by the Moderator of the 104th General Assembly, Dr. Jesse Bigelow. Two separate panels representing special expertise as well as divergence of opinion were invited to discuss the question of external investment in the countries of

South Africa and Chile, and its effect on the present political regimes and the people of those countries. Invited to the seminar were members of the Administrative Council, the Board of World Mission, the Board of Congregational Life, the Committee on International Affairs, and the Presbyteries of East and West Toronto. An edited transcript of the seminar proceedings will be made available throughout the church and to those who register an interest.

On the foregoing and related issues the Board would urge individuals and groups in the church to reflect deeply on their unique responsibility as Christian stewards. In view of our relative affluence and the power which accrues from it in global terms, we can have a profound affect upon the lives of other people. We must be concerned that the beneficent use of human labour and creative enterprise is not marred by contributing directly or inadvertently to human suffering or degradation. Such concern is firmly implied in our Reformed heritage and the manifold pronouncements and involvements whereby the church in the past has sought to engage the problem of social justice in the light of the Word of God.

VI. OVERTURES FROM THE 104th GENERAL ASSEMBLY

OVERTURE #11 – RE: FOLLOWING UP OF CHURCH MEMBERS, PAGE 468

RECOMMENDATION No. 17. A

That the prayer of the Overture be granted in the following terms:—

- a) *that Sessions be urged to communicate as soon as feasible with communicant members who have moved to other communities, encouraging them to associate themselves with the church of their preference and to request their certificates of membership be sent to that church as soon as possible;*
- b) *that Sessions be urged to correspond, as soon as feasible, with the Session of the Presbyterian Church nearest to where members who have moved are then residing, requesting that they be contacted and made welcome by the church in their new community;*
- c) *that Sessions be urged at the time of their annual review of the Communion Roll, to issue a reminder (if no action has been taken) both to the member who has moved and to the Session involved, as per item (b) above.*

RECOMMENDATION No. 18. A

That the Clerks of Assembly be asked to study the question of how the provisions of the prayer of the Overture may become a permanent directive to sessions in their care of the Communion Roll and report to the 106th General Assembly.

RECOMMENDATION No. 19. A

That the Board of Congregational Life provide, on request, sample cards and/or letters for the use of Sessions in the implementing of the prayer of the Overture.

OVERTURE #16, 1978 – RE: FUTURE OF CHURCH CAMPING, page 462

The Board of Congregational Life wishes to report that regular consultations are held with members of the various camp boards on a rotation basis. Many of the issues raised by the Overture have been topics of discussion at these consultations. Others are to be included.

In addition, the following observations are made anent the Overture:

1. Present financial restrictions and program priorities make the appointment of a full-time co-ordinator for church camping impossible.
2. Funds from the Second Century Advance campaign have been clearly designated for purposes other than capital grants for church camping facilities.
3. Church camping is under the direct control of the Synods and Presbyteries and the Board of Congregational Life is able only to recommend resources and offer leadership training assistance.
4. Regional leadership training is being planned for 1980 on an ecumenical basis and with some funding from the Board of Congregational Life.

RECOMMENDATION No. 20. A

That the above report be taken as a reply to Overture 16, 1978.

OVERTURE #27, 1978 – RE: RENAMING THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY BUDGET, PAGE 472

The Board of Congregational Life has the prayer of this Overture under study and wishes to report progress. All presbytery committees have been requested to offer their comments and suggestions on the name proposed for the Budget and/or other possible names they wish to suggest. Since only a few replies came in by the date requested, a second letter has been sent seeking further advice.

On a matter of such importance and with long-range implications, the Board is of the opinion it is wise to await further comment from the presbyteries and to give the whole matter very serious consideration.

RECOMMENDATION No. 21. A

That the above be taken as a report of progress and that the Board be allowed to present a full report to the 106th General Assembly.

OVERTURE #29, 1978 – RE: BUDGET ALLOCATION FOR CONGREGATIONS, PAGE 476

The prayer of the Overture asks that the action of the 103rd General Assembly (A & P 1977, page 369, rec. 16) be rescinded. The Assembly approved a recommendation which made local courts to which Presbytery Mission Workers are under appointment responsible for 10% of the financial responsibility for Presbytery Mission Workers, effective January 1, 1978, and encouraged negotiations with the Board of World Mission to establish an equitable sharing of costs.

The Board of Congregational Life reports having consulted with the Board of World Mission and recommends the following:—

RECOMMENDATION No. 22. A

That the prayer of the Overture be not granted for the following reasons:—

1. *While the hospital visitors are appointed by the Board of World Mission at the request of the presbyteries, they are responsible to the presbytery within the bounds of which they work.*
2. *By the presbyteries being financially involved in the work of the hospital visitors they are more likely to take responsibility for the oversight of their work.*
3. *On the matter of "double allocation" all aid-receiving charges support the General Assembly Budget as well as provide some portion of the minister's stipend and allowance expenses.*

VII. OVERTURE #1, 1979 – 105th GENERAL ASSEMBLY

Re: Co-Ordinated Core Curriculum for all School Levels in Canada.

This Overture was referred to the Board of Congregational Life by the Presbytery of Brampton and received by the Board at its January 1979 Executive Committee meeting.

Basically, it is a good Overture, the kind which ought to be encouraged. It arose out of a local Session as a result of the repeated experience of an elder who has had to move his family several times from one Province to another. It is the view of the Board that granting the prayer of the Overture would benefit the church and the whole country without unduly infringing on local options and emphases in educational priorities. It is understood that the Ministers of Education of the Provinces and Territories are holding conversations on this subject and the church might well offer its support and encouragement to such talks being continued.

RECOMMENDATION No. 23. A

That the prayer of the Overture be granted in the following terms:—

That the General Assembly of The Presbyterian Church in Canada endorse the principle of a co-ordinated national core curriculum for all levels of education in Canada below the university level, and that the Ministers of Education of the Provinces and Territories, the Canadian Education Association, and the Canadian

School Trustees Association be encouraged to pursue their study and consultation to the end that such a national core curriculum may be available to all residents of Canada.

VIII. THE NATIONAL COMMITTEE OF PRESBYTERIAN MEN

When the Board of Congregational Life was established in 1973 the National Committee of Presbyterian Men was continued as a separate entity and given the privilege of reporting to the General Assembly through the Board of Congregational Life. The program of Presbyterian Men was co-ordinated with the program of the Board, and the position of National Director of Presbyterian Men became a staff position of the Board. The budget of the National Committee of Presbyterian Men was consolidated with the budget of the Board, with the exception of a special conference account which is still maintained by the National Committee of Presbyterian Men.

While the Boards and Committees of the General Assembly have been reduced in size, and the Board of Congregational Life has reduced the number and the membership of its committees, the National Committee of Presbyterian Men has increased in the past year. The membership is appointed by the Committee itself, although it has been agreed recently that Synods should be invited to name representatives.

In the light of its revised committee structure, the Board is requesting permission of the General Assembly to enter into consultation with the National Committee of Presbyterian Men to discuss the matter of its relationships to the structures and procedures of the Board. The report of the National Committee of Presbyterian Men is appended herewith.

RECOMMENDATION No. 24. A

That permission be granted for such a consultation to take place.

Report of the National Committee of Presbyterian Men

The National Committee of Presbyterian Men engaged in further promotion of the work of the Church among men in the past year. Extensive study and consideration of new approaches and awareness of service have been carried on throughout the year by the Committee in order to determine the best manner in which to involve more men, especially in the 20-40 age group, in the work of the Church.

National Conferences 1978

In keeping with the program of encouraging men of the Church in various geographic areas of Canada to accept responsibility for the planning and carrying out of conference plans in their respective areas, two conferences were held in 1978 as follows:

Truro, Nova Scotia, May 1978

The Atlantic Synod Council sponsored a three day conference on the theme of "Real Living". Professor T. Grady Spires, of Gordon College, Massachusetts, addressed himself to the theological and philosophical aspects of the subject. Enthusiasm of the men of the Maritimes continues to be strong for a continuation of the basic conference philosophy relating to Christian fellowship, personal renewal and the encouragement of men to serve the church. Attendance was 112 persons.

Banff, Alberta, September 1978

The Alberta Synod Congregational Life Committee sponsored a family-type conference entitled "The Growing Edge" - an examination of the manner in which our personal and church lives can be enriched and encouraged to grow. Leadership was provided by Messrs. Jim Evans, Cal Doka, George Johnston, Ed Bunn, Bert Young and Dr. Matthew Dymond, in workshops, discussion groups and presentations on a variety of subjects relating to the various means by which growth is taking place in the church.

There was no National Conference in Central Canada in 1978 due to the desire of the National Committee to more freely explore the concept of smaller area conferences. Some progress toward the new philosophy was made, and results of planning sessions will be apparent in the 1979 schedule of area conferences. The Presbyteries of Hamilton and Niagara and Lindsay-Peterborough did, however, continue their strong leadership in planning and carrying out mini-conferences on selected themes which will be models for future efforts of this kind.

The Amazing Grace Radio Broadcast Ministry

The continuing purpose of this ministry is to present a fifteen minute broadcast of Biblical teaching in the tradition of the Reformed faith, and to make it available to local congregations for their sponsorship as part of their outreach and witness to the community.

The program continues to be aired on three stations in Canada - Oshawa and Renfrew in Ontario and Prince Albert in Saskatchewan.

The Communication Services Department is co-operating fully in the preparation and distribution of the Amazing Grace radio tapes and production costs have been held to a minimum.

A continuing review of the effectiveness of this and other forms of radio ministry is being made and as a further development in this area of outreach, the Presbyterian Church has joined with other denominations in Interchurch Radio, to produce a program entitled "Godshow" on radio C.F.R.B. commencing in January 1979. Together with other ideas on radio ministry our involvement will be evaluated for future participation.

A continuing challenge to Presbyterian Men will be to work through Synod and Presbytery channels to promote this type of ministry on a local, regional and/or national basis.

Special PM Account

The balance as of December 31, 1978 was \$504.43. The account has been audited and copies sent to the Comptroller, The Presbyterian Church in Canada, and to the Department of National Revenue, Taxation, Ottawa, Ontario.

Annual Meeting

The National Committee of Presbyterian Men held its annual meeting in November at the Crieff Hills Community Centre. Improved facilities at this location contributed to a successful meeting. Representatives from across Canada engaged in serious discussion on the progress of work of Presbyterian Men and a critical examination of relationships between staff and volunteer personnel in this work and the prospects for the improvement of these relationships in the future.

As an outcome of this annual meeting a Task Force is now at work to examine and redefine the purpose of Presbyterian Men, to outline goals for 1979 and on into the 1980's and to establish the plans by which these goals will be achieved. There is a definite conviction that this movement can and indeed must provide the leadership and the expertise in drawing more men into a close relationship with the church.

Optimistic reports were made from conference planning committees in the Atlantic Provinces, Alberta, British Columbia and Central Ontario on a variety of conference plans for 1979.

The National Committee recognized the contributions of members of the committee who were completing terms of service in 1978; Messrs. Bruce Upshall, Doug Stephens and Neil Reichelt, and welcomed the addition of new members, Aksel Aggerholm, Art McCullough, Dr. Walt Mackenzie and Bill Garvie to the committee.

IX. RADIO MINISTRY

The 104th General Assembly agreed that a radio ministry be continued and expanded in its availability to congregations of The Presbyterian Church in Canada. Communication Services was asked to provide technical assistance for production and distribution, and up to \$10,000. was made available for this purpose by means of an addition to the budget of the Board of Congregational Life.

The Board is able to report on two projects which have been implemented in response to the above action. The "Amazing Grace" program has continued as reported by the National Committee of Presbyterian Men. The cost of production and distribution for six months has been \$1,500.

Through the facilities of the Communication Services Committee, the Board has entered into an ecumenical project called "Inter-Church Radio". A program over Radio Station CFRB, Toronto, has been sponsored by Inter-church Radio as a thirty-nine week pilot project. Entitled "Godshow" and hosted by Mr. John Archibald of Communication Services, the program has enjoyed a large listening audience and, as a result CFRB wishes to extend it for another thirty-nine weeks. Also, it is being picked up by other stations and may go across the country. The cost of Presbyterian involvement in this experiment has been \$1,260. for the first thirty-nine weeks.

Of the \$10,000. allocated by the last General Assembly, over \$5,000. will have been spent on these two projects before the end of the current year.

In co-operation with Communication Services and the National Committee of Presbyterian Men the Board has been exploring other avenues of radio ministry. It is hoped that a variety of resources may be made available to local congregations and/or communities for use in their own local radio ministry. These resources may include taped messages by a variety of speakers, tape recordings of appropriate music and comments on issues currently confronting both churches and communities. If such a service is to become available some of the funding provided by the last General Assembly will be required for production and distribution.

1. SUMMARY OF ACCOUNTING PRACTICES

The following is a summary of accounting practices followed by the Church:

(a) *Cash receipts*

Contributions held by congregations at December 31, 1978 for Budget Revenue, for the National Development Fund, for the Secondary Century Advance for Christ Fund and for the Inter-Church Aid Committee which were remitted to the Treasurer of the Church by January 12, 1979 have been included in revenue for the year in which they were given by members of the congregation. These amounts have been segregated for balance sheet purposes and designated as cash in transit.

(b) *Investment transactions and income*

Investment transactions are accounted for on the trade date (date the order to buy or sell is executed).

Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis.

Dividend income is recorded on the date of declaration.

Realized gains and losses from investment transactions are recorded on the transaction date.

On the recommendation of The Trustee Board, the Church follows the practice of valuing marketable securities at market value rather than at acquisition cost.

(c) *Capitalization and depreciation*

Property fund

Fixed assets which are donated are recorded on the basis of fair market value at the time of acquisition. Other fixed assets are recorded at cost.

Properties are depreciated at an annual rate of 3% of cost until the estimated residual value is attained.

Furniture and equipment are depreciated at an annual rate of 10% of cost.

Depreciation expense on properties, furniture and equipment has been charged against the property fund.

Endowment Restricted and Trust Funds

Properties and furniture and equipment are recorded at values determined by executors with subsequent additions recorded at cost.

Depreciation is not recorded on the properties and furniture and equipment.

(d) *Composition of assets and liabilities*

(i) The assets and liabilities of Knox, Presbyterian and Ewart Colleges, Saskatoon Residence, Armagh and St. Andrew's Hall are included in the balance sheet only to the extent of fixed assets.

(ii) The assets and liabilities of the Pension Fund are not included in these statements. A separate statement covering this fund has been prepared.

(e) *Composition of income and expenditure*

(i) Except for the amount allocated from the Budget, no receipts or disbursements have been included in the statement of income and expenditure for the following:

Knox, Presbyterian and Ewart Colleges, St. Andrew's Hall, Saskatoon Residence, Pension Fund and Armagh.

1. SUMMARY OF ACCOUNTING PRACTICES (Cont'd)

(ii) Current operations are charged with both principal repayments on mortgages and with costs relating to the acquisition of furniture and equipment. The related asset and liability accounts are adjusted at year end by a charge to the Property Fund.

(iii) Income and expenditure does not include certain receipts and disbursements recorded directly to Unexpended appropriations Board of World Missions and Special projects and Amounts available for specific purposes.

(f) *Profit on Book of Praise*

The accumulated proceeds on the sale of each printing of the Book of Praise and Praiseways is applied to reduce the inventory value of that printing. Profit on each printing is not realized until substantially all the inventory is sold.

With the exception of the following practices referred to above namely:

(i) valuing marketable securities at market value rather than at acquisition cost (1(b))

(ii) not recording depreciation on Endowment, Restricted and Trust Fund fixed assets and charging depreciation expense on properties, furniture and equipment directly against Property Fund (1(c))

(iii) charging operations with principal repayments on mortgages and with the cost of additions to furniture and equipment (1(e)(ii))

(iv) recording certain receipts and disbursements directly to Unexpended appropriations, Board of World Missions and Special projects, and Amounts available for specific purposes (1(e)(iii)) and

(v) applying proceeds on the sale of each printing of the Book of Praise and Praiseways to reduce inventory values (1(f))

the financial statements have been prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

2. MORTGAGES AND LOANS PAYABLE ON MANSES

The mortgages and loans payable on manses are secured by certain assets included in the properties balance.

3. AMOUNTS HELD IN TRUST

Amounts held in trust are comprised of: a) monies which the Church invests on behalf of certain organization and remits the yearly income to that organization, and b) assets of dissolved congregations which are held for further use pending recommendation by the presbytery of the bounds.

4. SECOND CENTURY ADVANCE FOR CHRIST

The hundred and first General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada held June 1975 gave approval for the Second Century Advance for Christ campaign to be conducted over a two year period beginning in 1978.

The object of this fund is to provide capital for church extension in Canada and overseas.

5. COLLEGE GRANTS

The total cost of operating Knox, Presbyterian and Ewart Colleges, St. Andrew's Hall and Saskatoon Residence is \$1,237,000 (\$1,201,000 in 1977). Separate statements covering these institutions have been prepared. The Presbyterian Church in Canada has contributed \$437,364 (\$425,045 in 1977) towards the operations of these institutions.

6. COMPARATIVE FIGURES

The 1977 comparative figures have been reclassified and restated to conform to the financial statement presentation adopted for 1978. The significant changes are: a) including the National Development Fund with the Endowment, Restricted and Trust Funds; b) incorporating the accounts of the J. B. MacLean Bequest Fund in these financial statements; c) separating the property and operating funds and d) reclassifying certain assets held in trust as Endowment, Restricted and Trust Funds.

SUMMARY OF ACCOUNTING PRACTICES

The following is a summary of accounting practices followed by the Fund. With the exception of the practice of valuing marketable securities at market value rather than at acquisition cost and the practice of not recording depreciation on its real estate and other assets as set out below, the financial statements have been prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

(a) **Investment transactions and income**

Investment transactions are accounted for on the trade date (date the order to buy or sell is executed).

Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis.

Dividend income is recorded on the date of declaration.

Realized gains and losses from investment transactions are recorded on the transaction date.

(b) **Valuation**

The Fund follows the practice of valuing marketable securities at market value rather than at acquisition cost. Adjustments arising thereon are allocated between capital and undistributed income, on the basis of the ratio of capital to undistributed income at the beginning of the year.

(c) **Depreciation**

The Fund does not record depreciation on its real estate and other assets.

(d) **Real estate and other assets**

Real estate and other assets are recorded at values determined by executors with subsequent additions recorded at cost.

THE COMMITTEE ON HISTORY

To the Venerable, the 105th General Assembly:

The Committee on History respectfully submits the following Report of its activities during the year that has passed:

Archives

The administration of the Archives of the Church continues to be the major responsibility of this Committee of the General Assembly. Located in the basement of Knox College, Toronto, under appropriate climatic conditions, the Archives is open five days a week throughout the year, from 9 to 5, for the use of students, research scholars, and the general public. Miss Sheila Moir is the Assistant to the Archivist and is most generous with her time and help to all who come to the Archives. The Committee is pleased with her work, and commend her for taking several special courses in her spare time relating to her field of employment. The address of the Archives is: Archives, The Presbyterian Church in Canada, 59 St. George St., Toronto, Ontario, M5S 2E6. Phone: 1-416-595-1277.

The Archivist of the Church, Dr. John Moir, reports that there are increasing demands being made upon the Archives for research enquiries, through the mail and in person. Although not always able to answer all requests, the Archives is happy to suggest referral sources. While such interest increases, the rate of accession steadily decreases. There were no significant acquisitions of materials in 1978, save for several cartons of materials from the Board of World Mission. The Archivist is

concerned that little more than "lip-service" is being paid at too many levels of the life of the Church to the principle of a properly functioning and effective archival organization. The Committee would again urge upon all the Courts of the Church to "consider our Archives" as the resting place for Records of the Church with intrinsic historical value. Once lost, they cannot be replaced. If it is desirable to retain Records on the local scene, then the microfilming of such is recommended, and to this end the Committee will soon be issuing guidelines for such a process to all Congregations and Courts of the Church.

Since an Archives is not a Museum, the Committee during the year took steps to dispose of several artifacts which had found their way into the Archives and were taking up valuable space. Some of these are now resting in the Historical Rooms of MacNab Street Presbyterian Church, Hamilton, and St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Niagara-on-the-Lake, and the thanks of the Committee is extended to these congregations for accepting them.

Some physical problems occurred during the year to the Archives, but these have been attended to by the Board of Knox College. Unfortunately, a small loss of space resulted, as well as a deteriorating floor surface.

The Microfilming Programme of the Acts and Proceedings from 1875 to the present, along with selected Church Periodicals, was completed during the year, and the Committee would again express its thanks to the Church for its foresightedness in providing the necessary funds for this project.

The Committee is deeply grateful to the Archivist of the Church, Dr. John Moir, for his concern and devotion to the preservation of our Archives, particularly in light of the fact that he declines any reward for his many devoted hours spent in this work.

Presbyterian History

No issues of this paper appeared during 1978, due to difficulties regarding certain editorial copy. However, this has now been cleared up and two issues have already appeared in 1979 and more will follow shortly.

Presbyterian History Prize

Under the new Rules adopted by the Committee last year, two prizes in the writing of Canadian Presbyterian History are awarded each year, to the amount of \$25, with attached Scroll. In 1978 the awards were made to "The St. Andrew's Chronicles, Belleville, Ontario" for the best Congregational History; and to the Rev. Robert Anderson, for his essay, "Colony to Maturity", concerning the work of Canadian Presbyterians among and with the Korean Christian Church in Japan.

Publications

During the year the Committee issued the following publications in their promotion of the preservation of historical materials:

- "Hints for History Convenors"; copies were sent to all Kirk-Sessions through the monthly mailing of the Board of Congregational Life.
- "Consider our Archives"; this is an up-dated version of an earlier pamphlet which explains the goals of the Archives and lists in detail the kind of historical materials the Archives seeks to acquire and preserve on behalf of the Church. This pamphlet also went out through the regular monthly mailing.
- "For the Record - a Brief Introduction to Definitions, Policies and Practices for the Records of The Presbyterian Church in Canada"; this rather extensive document is in process at the present time, but hopefully will be available to all Commissioners at the 105th General Assembly. In the Committee's estimation, there is no comparable document presently available anywhere in Canada on the subject.

At the present time the Committee is also working on a Questionnaire for all Congregations, Presbyteries and Synods, in the form of a "Records Inventory" which if completed and returned to the Archives, will form an invaluable resource for research enquiries. As noted earlier, a paper outlining "Guidelines for the Micro-filming of Records" is also in preparation.

The 104th General Assembly defeated a Recommendation of the Committee concerning the publication of Volume II of "Called to Witness", a volume to contain more than two dozen biographies of prominent Presbyterians, clergy and lay, who have in the past faithfully served this Church and Nation. It is intended to be a companion volume to the previously issued Volume I. All the manuscripts are ready for printing, and the Committee has received a price quotation of about \$3000 for a run of 1000 copies. Recognizing however, that the matter has been before the Church before, and that many copies of Volume I remain unsold, and that we are in a time of budgetary restraints, the Committee concludes consideration of the matter for the moment in terms of its Recommendation I.

Records Management

The 104th General Assembly agreed to a Recommendation from this Committee that a Records Management Feasibility Study of the Boards and Committees at 50 Wynford Drive be carried out. To that end the Archivist and Mr. Alex Ross, members of the Committee, appeared before the November meeting of the Administrative Council in support of the Recommendation. Their concern (and that of the Committee) is chiefly that efficient handling of records at the source of their generation, with planned retention and disposal schedules, will eliminate much waste materials being kept, will facilitate the easy retrieval of information and will reduce space problems for the Offices or eventually the Archives. It appears at present (after a meeting with the Board Secretaries) that there is no unified system of records retention in effect at the Church Offices, each Board or Committee "doing its own thing".

Your Committee looks to the day in the near future when there will be a properly trained person in the employ of the Church for this purpose at the Church Offices. It looks forward to the report of the Administrative Council on this matter to the 105th General Assembly. We hope that the Church will not lose sight of this important subject which, among other things, can save the Church money in the long run.

Canadian Society of Presbyterian Church History

This Society is open to all ministers and lay persons across the Church who have an interest in Presbyterian history. In 1978 the Society met in MacNab Street Presbyterian Church at the conclusion of the 104th General Assembly. In 1979 it will meet in Emmanuel College, Toronto, on June 16th. For further information, please contact the Archivist, Dr. John S. Moir, 167 Main St. N., Markham, Ontario.

RECOMMENDATION 1. C

That the printing and publication of Volume II of "Called to Witness" be a priority item before the Church, if and when the money becomes available, and that this be carried out under the supervision of the Committee on History, proceeds from sales to be returned to the funds of the Church.

RECOMMENDATION 2. A

That Presbyteries and Synods again be strongly encouraged to place their Minutes, as printed annually, in the Archives of the Church.

RECOMMENDATION 3. A

That Congregations be urged to consider the Archives of the Church as the depository of their Records, when no longer in active use, to the end that they may be best preserved against possible loss, misuse or abuse.

THE COMMITTEE ON INTER CHURCH AID, REFUGEE AND WORLD SERVICE

To the Venerable the 105th General Assembly:

During 1978, the Inter Church Aid Committee has continued its work in the field of global relief and development.

INCOME: Income received in 1978 from congregations and individuals totalled \$130,412. In addition, \$130,750 in matching grants was made available by the Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA), the Alberta Council for International Co-operation (ACIC), and the Saskatchewan Council for International Co-operation (SCIC). This year CIDA has raised its matching grant ratio to 3:1 for most development projects. This policy change has enabled Inter Church Aid to increase its scope and participate in many more projects than was previously possible. \$63,200 was received from project refunds and the Inter Church Fund for International Development, bringing the total income received from all sources to \$324,362.

DISBURSEMENTS: Emergency relief, self determination, self reliance, and social justice for developing peoples continue to be important concepts which guide the project selection of Inter Church Aid. The Committee has maintained its policy of support for small self-help development projects.

One example is the construction of an irrigation system in a tribal area of India. The irrigation system is a means through which farmers can grow more productive crops and thereby improve nutrition and health standards in the rural area. Inter Church Aid has assisted local work teams by providing \$2,225 for materials and has attracted \$13,955 in matching grants.

Other development efforts include bee keeping co-operatives, farming schools, tuberculosis control, fishery training, and post cyclone rehabilitation. In 1978, Inter Church Aid sent a total of \$59,000 to 16 development projects in 10 countries.

Relief to victims of both natural and social disasters is another Inter Church Aid focus. In 1978, the Committee responded with \$12,000 to victims of severe flooding in both India and Sudan. Political upheaval in Burma, Lebanon, Nicaragua, and Zambia resulted in humanitarian needs which were partially met by Inter Church Aid. In 1978, the Committee sent \$16,000 to 6 relief operations in 6 countries.

Inter Church Aid does not operate independently. In addition to its co-operation with the Board of World Mission, the Committee participates in several ecumenical programmes. Two Canadian inter-church programmes are 1) Inter Church Fund for International Development (ICFID), and 2) PLURA. ICFID utilizes the pooled resources of several denominations as well as government matching grants, to assist in overseas development. PLURA (Presbyterian, Lutheran, United, Roman Catholic, Anglican) is a programme which enables self-help groups in Canada to undertake local projects.

Our needs for a) documented information about relief and development operations, b) competent channeling of financial and human resources, and c) communication with persons in developing areas, are met largely through our participation in World Council of Churches programmes and the World Alliance of Reformed Churches.

EDUCATION: The Committee realizes that education of Canadians is integral to its development work. Progress towards effective global improvements necessarily includes a recognition of powerful economic and social factors and their impact on the lives of ordinary people. To this end, Inter Church Aid participates with four other Canadian denominations in the educational programmes of GATT-Fly and Ten Days for World Development. In order to evaluate the Presbyterian response to these programmes and to investigate possible improvements and/or changes, the Committee has formed a country-wide network of persons who will study and comment on the materials.

Information about the work of Inter Church Aid has been circulated to congregations through fact sheets, pamphlets, emergency appeals and articles appearing in "Glad Tidings" and "The Presbyterian Record". Worship guides for Lent, Thanksgiving, and Advent were widely used by congregations, as was material for the 1978

Share-Lent theme "Let Us Help the Hungry Feed Themselves". A new filmstrip entitled "Development is For People" was completed, and is available for rental or purchase.

Although information concerning the work and concerns of Inter Church Aid is circulated through the church, the Committee has perceived a need to communicate more directly with congregations. In 1978, Inter Church Aid asked that Presbyteries name an Inter Church Aid Liaison, a request which several Presbyteries have complied with.

ISSUES: In 1978, Inter Church Aid, as our denomination's funding agent of the Programme to Combat Racism, has been involved in the controversy surrounding this World Council of Churches' programme. As a result of the Programme to Combat Racism's \$85,000 grant to the Patriotic Front of Zimbabwe, many Presbyterians have been concerned about the association of Church funds with organizations involved in violence.

In response to questions raised by Church members, the Committee undertook a careful review of the Programme to Combat Racism in general, and the \$85,000 grant in particular. Review of the programme included study of the Programme to Combat Racism's aims, areas of concentration in both research and funding, examination of information pertinent to the Patriotic Front grant, discussions with other Canadian churches, and with World Council of Churches staff and committee members.

The Committee has accordingly decided to support a critical review of the guidelines for the Programme and in the meantime to uphold the work of the Programme to Combat Racism as a vital Christian response to the presence of racism as it exists around the globe. The Committee would support an affirmation of the 1972 decision of the General Assembly to support the World Council of Churches' Programme to Combat Racism, and would be willing to continue as the Presbyterian funding agency.

The Committee is sensitive to the fact that while some, for their own reasons do not wish to support the Special Fund of the Programme to Combat Racism, they do wish to participate in the relief and development operations of Inter Church Aid. Therefore, all designated gifts will continue to be honoured.

ADMINISTRATION: Administrative costs continue to remain low, thanks to the energetic efforts of committee members. Expenses for 1978 totalled \$13,874: or 10.6% of congregational givings, and 4.3% of income from all sources. Costs include travel and meeting expenses, printing and mailing, and partial staff salary. The Committee wishes to thank Dr. Geoffrey Johnston for his service during 1977 and 1978 as Administrative Assistant Pro Tem.

The Rev. Walter McLean and the Rev. Malcolm Ransom retired from the Inter Church Aid Committee after several years of valuable service. The committee wishes to express sincere thanks and good wishes to both men.

RECOMMENDATION No. 1. A

That the Inter Church Aid Committee be authorized to approach the Church with an annual appeal for funds for relief and development.

RECOMMENDATION No. 2. A

That each Presbytery be encouraged to appoint an Inter Church Aid Liaison person, as a means through which better communication between the Committee and congregations can occur.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON INTER-CHURCH RELATIONS

To the Venerable the 105th General Assembly:

The Inter-Church Relations Committee begs to report the following:

Preamble

Your Committee, as well as many individuals of The Presbyterian Church in Canada, has had an active year in relationship to other Churches both in Canada and abroad. Our Convener has continued to give firm leadership in a year that has produced some anguishing decisions, especially in our relationship with the World Council of Churches, and its committee on the Program to Combat Racism. In spite of the anguish that is a part of the struggle for justice and freedom throughout the ages, the joy of achieving some progress in the building of God's Kingdom of love and forgiveness is surely worth whatever price needs to be paid. If we could always know the mind of Christ in every situation the efforts we make would always lead us on to triumph, but often our sins and weaknesses confound our labours.

Nevertheless we can report some good things that have happened.

We held our first meeting with representatives of the Reformed Church of America (Canada Section) and this proved to be a friendly and profitable experience.

Mrs. Heather Johnston attended the Central Committee meeting of the World Council of Churches in Jamaica in January last. Her report follows as a part of our report. We are represented in discussions with the Canadian Catholic Conference of Bishops, and other Churches, in an attempt to form a more inclusive Council of Churches than that which we have at present in the Canadian Council of Churches. In the meantime we do co-operate with other Churches in the Joint Working Group. Dr. Donald C. MacDonald attended the meeting of the Executive of the World Alliance of Reformed Churches, which was held last August in Geneva. Our Church is co-operating with the United Church in inviting an Assembly of the Reformed Churches to meet in Canada in 1982. We have also joined with other Churches in the Canadian Council of Churches in inviting the World Council of Churches to hold its next Assembly in Vancouver in 1983.

CHANGE OF NAME OF THE COMMITTEE

For sometime now the members of this Committee have felt the need for a more adequate name for the Committee and its work. The name "Inter-Church Relations" gives undue emphasis to the separate and divided nature of the Church - suggesting that we are but one of many Churches that have relationships with a number of other separate Churches. The emphasis we wish to embody in the name of our Committee is that there is only One Universal Church of Christ and that within that One Universal Church there are many branches linked together in unity and dialogue. Of all the suggested names considered, it was unanimously agreed that the name "The Ecumenical Relations Committee" gave fullest expression to the above concept of the Church and of the work of this Committee.

RECOMMENDATION No. 1 A

That the name of this Committee be changed to that of "The Ecumenical Relations Committee."

REPORT OF THE CENTRAL COMMITTEE OF THE WORLD COUNCIL OF CHURCHES, Kingston, Jamaica - Jan. 1-11, 1979

The most crucial Central Committee since Nairobi has come to an end. Against the backdrop of unrest, the haunting beat of the Rastafari drums, the glorious sunshine of the South and the heartwarming hospitality of the Jamaicans, we met on the compound of the University of the West Indies in Kingston. It is exciting, but also a little frightening, to be in Jamaica today, rather like being in a labour room of a maternity hospital during a difficult delivery: brutal, senseless violence is present, the poor comprise 95% of the people and yet 75% of the populace is biblically literate expecting leadership from the Church in their struggle.

This Central Committee was of necessity a midway assessment between the Fifth and Sixth Assembly of the World Council of Churches. Its tasks on the one hand to evaluate - again with the aid of a review committee having examined the past three years work, and on the other, to set priorities for the next four years, largely determined by the financial situation, as the WCC will be operating on a deficit budget until 1981. All existing programmes are to be brought to a fruitful conclusion and no new programmes to be initiated between now and 1983. Staff and ecumenical teams are directed to visit as many member churches as possible during this period.

Two plenary sessions dealt with the themes of Hope and Unity, as a result of recent meetings of the Faith and Order Commission in Bangalore and the Advisory Committee of "The Search for a Just, Participatory and Sustainable Society" (JPSS). These were necessary preparations and support structures for the most agonizing discussions on the last grant from the Special Fund of the Programme to Combat Racism. Agonizing, due to a confrontation between most white First World (Western) churches opposing moneys given to such groups as the Patriotic Front of Zimbabwe, a group engaged in armed conflict against the Rhodesian forces of Ian Smith and the Third World bloc in strong support of such actions. For, one man's hope is another's despair - and only God can create in us that spirit in which one man's hope becomes another one's hope!

It should be pointed out that the Programme to Combat Racism only commands a very small amount of the overall staff and finances (1 1/2%) of one of the

four departments of the WCC. It came into being in 1969.

- a) to end discrimination based on race,
- b) to end the exploitation of person by person, and to expose the racism which is often used to justify such exploitation,
- c) to help the churches to understand and to live out their Christian mission. It is a three-fold programme of 1) research, 2) projects and 3) the much talked about Special Fund. This fund, to be used for humanitarian, non-violent purposes only, consists totally of specially designated moneys from individuals, churches and governments. (In 1977, the Committee on Inter-Church Aid of The Presbyterian Church in Canada made a grant to the Programme to Combat Racism of \$5,500 with the proviso that this money be used for non-military purposes). The research includes the gathering and dissemination of information about the plight of Indians in Latin America, Aboriginal people in Australia, racist attitudes in children's books etc. Each year a Project list is circulated to all WCC member churches through which the denominations can become partners in specific situations. The Special Fund was set up to dramatize identification with the racially oppressed.

The Central Committee could not be the forum where deep-seated differences could be resolved, but a consultative process was set up as a medium for evaluation and change. After many hours of debate in sub-unit and plenary, it was finally agreed:

- a) to set up a process of consultation on how the churches might be involved in combating racism in the eighties as we review what has been done during the ten years of the programme
- b) a serious study on Christian convictions and positions on political ethics must be a priority for the future
- c) that the Programme to Combat Racism be encouraged to continue its work in situations of racial discrimination in the world today (surely we are in just such a situation and as individual Christians and as churches need help first to understand and then act against the deep-seated reasons for rapidly escalating racism in Canada)
- d) that the Special Fund should be continued but with "clearer interpretation to increase the comprehension in the churches", that is to say that member churches must be consulted and become part of the process in offering support to those engaged in overcoming racism.

I personally believe that the consultation to be held as soon as possible - and I have asked to be part of that process - must come to terms with the justified, real questions raised after the grant given to a liberation group engaged in active combat. Questions were asked and strongly voiced in Jamaica by most Western churches, yet in juxtaposition to adamant support of that same action by almost all churches in the Developing World. I trust that the criteria for the Fund will be critically re-examined, especially criteria No. 4: "grants are made without control of the manner in which they are spent, and are intended as an expression of commitment by the Programme to Combat Racism to the cause of economic, political and social justice, which these organisations promote." In the light of experience gained, a new creative way to deal with racism must be found.

Though these tense discussions permeated the whole eleven days of meetings and inter-personal conversations, a veritable kaleidoscope of issues had to be dealt with as well, a list of these is attached. My own view is, that the WCC should have fewer and clearer priorities.

Four hundred church people from every corner of the globe will remember 1979 as the year they began in Jamaica. They hopefully will also recall that their meetings coincided with the beginning of the United Nations International Year of the Child. The gospel shows that children are the most hopeful signs and paradigms of God's unconditional love and promise for all. As a child of God, I, who was privileged to be part of the intense questing, and the profound richness found in community with others in Christ, am once more aware of that Unity, which is God's gift to his undeserving children. I pledge myself anew to

"confessing the Lord Jesus Christ as Lord and Saviour according to the Scriptures and therefore seek to fulfill *together* our common calling to the glory of the One God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit". (Basis of WCC)

REPORT ON CENTRAL COMMITTEE, Jamaica Jan. 1-11, 1979

UNIT I – FAITH AND WITNESS

- Commission on World Evangelism (CWME): Concrete plans for the Melbourne conference (May 1980) on "Your Kingdom Come" were adopted. I hope that our church will actively participate through intercession and study of preparatory materials.
- Church and Society: a) forthcoming world conference on "Faith, Science and the Future" at MIT, Boston b) the "Energy for my Neighbour" scheme is to be continued.
- Faith and Order: Excellent report on the Bangalore consultation "Common Account of Hope" which I highly recommend as a study document.
- A study on the Community of Women and Men in the Church – with a projected consultation in August, 1980.
- The Dialogue with People of Living Faiths and Ideologies (DFI) continues.

UNIT II – JUSTICE AND SERVICE

- Migration: some 50 million workers and their families are involved in the movement of migrant labour around the world.
- Ecumenical Sharing of Resources, to be discussed fully at the next Central Committee meeting.
- Transnational Corporations; the WCC encourages churches to participate in this programme developing a ministry in this new area of mission.
- Militarism and the Armaments Race, a major item of concern to ALL. A study (Doc. 10) to be commended to the churches.
- SODEPAX, a liaison function between this unit and the Pontifical Commission on Justice and Peace of the Roman Catholic Church.
- Christian Medical Commission. An excellent and extremely helpful study/enquiry on Health, Healing, Wholeness could be most useful in every congregation.
- CICARWS (Commission on Inter-Church Aid, Refugees and World Service). The world refugee problem continues to grow on almost every continent. CICARWS requests the member churches to become advocates on behalf of refugees.
- CCIA – Commission of the Churches on International Affairs – continues to struggle with the question of Human Rights and the appalling increase in Torture.
- CCPD – Commission on Churches' Participation in Development – was a) commended for its continuing study on "The Church and the Poor" and b) reiterates its appeal to the churches to set apart 2% of their income as grants for development efforts. What is our response?
The Ecumenical Development Cooperation Society, legally incorporated in 1975, appeals to the member churches to participate with investments in it, thus making loans available for development projects. (\$200,000 to a housing project for the lower grade employees of Vellore Christian Medical College, India)

UNIT III – EDUCATION AND RENEWAL

- Renewal and Congregational Life a) recommends the study "The Life Style of Congregations in Mission" b) will hold a consultation next year to clarify our understanding of the Charismatic Renewal, c) is exploring ecumenical team visits.
- Women – the women's desk publishes a newsletter "Women in a Changing World", leadership training, especially for rural women has been a high priority.

- Education – this subunit tries to respond to requests from member churches and makes efforts to reach a more comprehensive approach to theological and Christian education – it gives many scholarships.
- Youth – there is a deep need to expose a new generation of young people to the ecumenical vision. Thus a proposal for a World Youth Conference in 1981 was approved.

THE COMMITTEE OF THE GENERAL SECRETARIAT has responsibility for:

- the Ecumenical Institute, Bossey
- the Department of Communication
- deals with applications of Churches for membership in the WCC
- relationships with World Confessional Families (a consultation re-examining this relationship was held Oct. 23-25, 1978)
- relationships with regional ecumenical bodies (such as the Canadian Council of Churches)
- staff travel
- matters relating to the forthcoming 6th Assembly to be held in VANCOUVER!

REPORT ON MEETINGS OF NORTH AMERICAN AND CARIBBEAN AREA COUNCIL OF THE WORLD ALLIANCE OF REFORMED CHURCHES HELD IN NEW YORK, FEB. 6-8, 1979.

The meetings were attended by Principal Wm. Klempa (Recording Secretary for the Area Council), Dr. Donald MacDonald (Treasurer of the Area Council), Miss May Nutt, Mrs. E. C. Treleaven, the Rev. Donald Campbell, and the Rev. Brian Fraser. The major focus of discussion and debate was the Report of the Special Committee on the Future of the Alliance. What emerged from the meetings was a renewed sense of the importance of the Alliance and a renewed commitment to making the work of the Alliance known within the member churches.

The ecumenical contacts and experiences provided by the Alliance are particularly important for the smaller churches and those in countries where governments discourage active church life.

One means adopted to revitalize the work of the Area Council was to give the committees a larger role in between annual meetings. This has been the pattern of the Theological Committee for some years, but its expenses have been borne by the member churches. If the Committee on Civil and Religious Liberty and the Committee on Co-operation and Witness are to meet more often and become more active, the budgetary commitment of the Council will have to be increased. Yet, in many ways, they are the bodies best suited to carry the work of the Theological Committee into practice. Plans presented to the meetings by those committees illustrate the possibilities.

Over the past seven years the Theological Committee has articulated a theology of human rights from within the Reformed tradition. The Civil and Religious Liberty Committee has encouraged its member churches to call upon their governments to ratify the United Nations Covenants on Human Rights and to implement the operational protocol, if this has not already been done. Canada has ratified the covenants, but not the operational protocol. The committee will continue to explore the possibility of convening a hemispheric conference on human rights on the Helsinki model. To stimulate and co-ordinate human rights concerns among its member churches, the Council authorized the Civil and Religious Liberty Committee to compile a list of those working in the field of human rights within the member churches, distribute that list, and explore the possibility of a human rights conference to discuss strategies for constituency education. Further, representatives of the Presbyterian Church in Taiwan were heard and the Council passed recommendations in support of self-determination for the Taiwanese population.

The Committee on Co-operation and Witness focused its work on communication, mutual caring, youth and women. It called for changes in the working agenda of the Council meetings to allow for a greater degree of sharing the concerns of member churches. In addition, it commended the practice of inviting fraternal

delegates from other member churches to national meetings and conferences. The committee also has undertaken to improve communications between the Council and member churches by requesting that formal communications from NACAC and/or WARC be submitted to the highest judicatories or appropriate agencies for consideration.

The Theological Committee has begun a new study of the Covenant. The design for the study places considerable emphasis on the method in an attempt to take seriously the historical context of our theological reflection on the covenant tradition. As yet, we have not named a replacement for the late Principal Allan Farris on the Theological Committee.

The Council was addressed by the Rev. Jovelino Ramas, a Brazilian Presbyterian, working in the field of human rights at the National Council of Churches, and by President Howard Hageman of New Brunswick Theological Seminary on the Reformed heritage in America. As always, the informal fellowship and exchange among delegates enhanced the realization that we stand within a broad and rich tradition of the Reformed faith.

CONSULTATIONS WITH THE UNITED CHURCH

This Committee reported to the 104th General Assembly the conclusion of our consultations with the United Church of Canada. On Pages 334 and 335 of the Acts and Proceedings of the last Assembly eight recommendations were presented as a result of the consultation. The Assembly agreed to the recommendation to discontinue the Consultation, but referred the other recommendations to Presbyteries for study and report to this Committee.

The Committee expresses its appreciation to the Presbyteries which made a study, and submitted their reports. There seems to be little disagreement with recommendations 5-10 as presented by this Committee last year. The Committee wishes to report that a one day consultation was held on October 31st, 1978 with representatives of the United, Anglican, Lutheran, Salvation Army, The Religious Society of Friends, Disciples of Christ, etc., and it was agreed the Canadian Council of Churches be requested to arrange a similar consultation in 1979 or early 1980. This Committee would reaffirm, in keeping with the sentiments expressed in reports from our Presbyteries, that we continue and expand opportunities on congregational, Presbytery, and Synod levels to promote mutual understanding and co-operation with our Christian brothers and sisters in the United Church.

On the other hand there was little expression of a desire at the Presbytery level for us to continue exploration how we can "bring about the mutual recognition of ministers" in our two churches. It may be the Presbyteries misunderstood what the Consultation had in mind in this regard. It may be the United Church is so close to us geographically, and so over-powering in its membership compared to us, that we are nervous of having our ministry submerged in the ministry of the United Church. It is understandable that there are concerns over different theological concepts of ministry, ordination, etc. But the reports were explicit in that Presbyteries indicated our Church is not likely to accept at this time the method of calling ministers direct from the United Church as we do with the Church of Scotland, etc. It should be remarked that Presbyteries in some instances showed a lack of knowledge of the authority and power that Presbyteries possess in dealing with any minister called to a congregation within their bounds, or even an indication that Presbyteries make any examination of ministers so called. Nevertheless this committee must report that based on reports received it would be unproductive to proceed further on this matter at this time, and we make an appropriate recommendation to this effect.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 2 A

That Sessions, Presbyteries, Synods, and Boards and Committees of General Assembly continue to explore and promote ways which lead to the better understanding and co-operation with our Christian brothers and sisters in the United Church of Canada, in terms of the following as presented to the 104th General Assembly.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 3 A

We note and commend the great number of local co-operative efforts, such as shared summer ministry presently taking place, and recommend that joint efforts between congregations of the Presbyterian and United Churches be encouraged and nurtured.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 4 A

We recommend that our presbyteries consult jointly about common mission and sharing of resources, and that the result of these consultations be shared through the churches' national networks.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 5 A

We recommend that where appropriate there be similar consultation and co-operation at the conference-synod level in areas of regional concern.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 6 A

We commend the wide consultation going on between our respective boards and divisions (e.g., Div. of Finance and Comptroller's Office, Div. of Communications and Communication Services), and recommend that it be extended to those areas where it is not presently taking place.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 7 A

We recommend that there be an annual national consultation, concerned primarily with doctrine, mission and social action, with representatives of the Presbyterian and United Churches under the oversight of the Inter-Church Relations Committee of The Presbyterian Church and the Inter-Church and Inter-Faith Committee of The United Church.

RECOMMENDED NO. 8 A

Through the Canadian Council of Churches and local councils of churches, multi-lateral co-operation is taking place. While we are commending increased Presbyterian-United co-operation, we recommend that multi-lateral co-operation be maintained.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 9 A

That we consider this is not the time to conduct a study "on bringing about the mutual reception of ministers" between the United Church of Canada and The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

REVIEW OF OUR PROCEDURE IN CALLING MINISTERS DIRECT FROM OTHER CHURCHES

As a result of considering the above recommendation concerning the ministry of the United Church of Canada and The United Church of Australia, as well as our list of Churches from which we may call ministers directly, without referral to the Board of Education or its Committee on Reception of Ministers, the last Assembly directed this Committee to make a general review of our procedures in calling ministers from other Churches, consulting with the Committee on Church Doctrine, the Board of Ministry, and the Board of Education.

A Committee was set up to do this study, and held one meeting. It was evident that this study included more items than first anticipated. The committee was aware of many omissions in our present list of Churches from which we may call ministers directly, in so far as we were able to understand the basis for naming the Churches we did in 1948 and 1961. Consideration was given to the validity of calling any ministers of other Churches unless they come through some screening procedure rather than by direct call. The following recommendations are therefore presented:

RECOMMENDATION NO. 10 C

That the Inter-Church Relations Committee continue to study the mutual reception of ministers from sister churches, and that the Committee be constituted as follows:-

1. *Four representatives appointed by Inter-Church Relations Committee, including the chairperson;*

2. Two representatives appointed by the Board of Ministry;
3. Two representatives appointed by the Board of Education;
4. The Principals of our three Colleges;
5. The Clerks of Assembly (or their alternates)

RECOMMENDATION NO. 11 A

That a report be made to the next Assembly, always recognizing the study may take more than one year to complete.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS

To the Venerable the 105th General Assembly:

The Committee continued to pursue its concern regarding disarmament as it affects both the international community and Canadians. Some information and educational resources prepared by the Canadian Church Study Centre on Disarmament, "Ploughshares" were sent out in the monthly mailing. The matter of international expenditure on the sale of, stockpiling, and potential use of both catastrophic nuclear arms as conventional arms, remains a major threat to the peace and welfare of all mankind. There are major challenges to Gospel values, and anti-Christian views inherent here in which every Christian tax-payer is involved.

The Church Person's Seminar in Ottawa in which six members of our Church were invited and participated, also focussed on the question of arms and national security.

The 104th General Assembly asked the Committee to obtain copies of the Koinonia Declaration for study by Presbyteries. The Committee studied the document and forwarded copies as requested. However, Presbyteries have not had sufficient time for study and reply to the Committee, in order that a report could be made to this Assembly. The Declaration is an unofficial but influential document prepared by young churchmen in the Dutch Reformed Church of South Africa, both black and white, as a theological approach to political participation based on calvinistic theology.

The situation in southern Africa also remains a concern of the Committee. By its nature it is a matter which arouses deep emotions both in Canada as well as in Africa. The Committee commends these critical developments to thoughtful continuing study, to intercessory prayer, and to inward examination of our own racial attitudes.

RECOMMENDATION No. 1. A

"That the budget for this Committee for 1980 be \$2,000."

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MINISTRY

To the Venerable the 105th General Assembly:

The Rev. D.G.M. Herron, D.D., and Miss A. Roy, Chairman and Vice-Chairman of the Board of Ministry respectively, have just completed their six-year term on the Board. They were instrumental in formulating the early goals and objectives of the Board to achieve the mandate given to it by the General Assembly. That these goals and objectives have been largely fulfilled, and that the Board looks forward in good heart to whatever future service may be required of it by the Church to strengthen and support the ministry of Jesus Christ among us, must be gratifying to them. Far from being passive leaders in this achievement, they have in fact played active and key roles in the Board's development and effectiveness. They will be greatly missed.

REVIEW COMMITTEE REPORT

The record of this six-year formative and establishment stage is contained in a comprehensive report by the Review Committee which was called for in the constitution of the Board. Copies of the full report are available on request. A summary follows.

The principal functions of the Board were set out in the Acts and Proceedings of the 1973 General Assembly, page 449, section 3. Briefly stated, they are:

- (a) To advise the Assembly in all matters pertaining to the ministries of the Church.
- (b) To promote the effectiveness, the well-being, and the life-long support of those who serve in Church vocations.
- (c) To provide personnel services to the Church.
- (d) To foster co-operation among the Church's agencies that recruit, train, support, supervise and employ people in Church vocations.

A. Goals and Performance

To these ends, goals were established in the areas of relationships, support function and accountability. These are listed along with actions taken.

1. Relationships Goal:

That there be a climate of trust with opportunities to work together between the Board of Ministry and the presbyteries, the three colleges and the national Boards and Committees of the Church.

Actions:

- (a) In the three years allotted for the task (1975-77), all but five of the presbyteries of the Church were visited by the staff or other representatives of the Board. These visits afforded the opportunity to discuss the policies and operation of the Board with special emphasis on the pastoral ministry, the filling of vacancies, support of students and professional workers, and the vocation of ministry in today's world. The visitors were well received in the hoped-for atmosphere of mutual trust and openness, and heard many valuable suggestions during the visits.
- (b) Meetings with the college faculties were held in 1975 and 1976, discussing ecumenical theological education, counselling candidates, recruitment, co-ordination of the approaches to students by the various Boards (leading to annual visits of the students to 50 Wynford Drive), and other wide-ranging practical issues. One outcome was a survey of all bursary assistance available to students in a comprehensive report. The Board has a good working relationship with all three colleges.
- (c) Mutually acceptable areas of responsibility, working relationships and procedures with the national Boards and Committees of the Church, have on the whole progressed favourably. The development of Administrative Council Committees on Program Co-ordinating and Executive Personnel provided vehicles for working with other agencies, and the General Secretary has participated as a member of both committees.

2. Support Function Goal:

That professional Church workers and students for Church ministries be supported by the Board through specific actions related to identified needs. Specific objectives which were achieved included a plan for counselling students, a statement on the relationship of The Presbyterian Church to ecumenical theological education, a recruitment program design, a study of the implications of an ordained diaconate, a means of sharing with professional Church leaders materials related to practical issues of ministry, and a study of ways and means for the Board to support the presbyteries in their pastoral care for those who minister within their bounds.

Actions:

- (a) A plan for counselling student candidates for the ministry was prepared on instruction of the General Assembly, and revisions were made in the light

of presbytery consultations. The Board is now engaged in a three-year trial program of Guidance Conferences for Candidates. These are filling a need felt by the candidates, the colleges and the presbyteries. The Board has been requested to develop guidance conferences for students for the diaconate certified to Ewart College.

- (b) The Board studied the implications of ecumenical theological education for The Presbyterian Church and reported to the 1975 General Assembly. The report was adopted.
 - (c) The Board included in its report to last year's General Assembly a statement on its role in recruitment of ministerial candidates. It is to forecast the Church's need for ministers and deaconesses, to remind congregations of their primary responsibility in recruitment, to provide resources for congregations in this role, to provide assistance to presbyteries in their role of screening and counselling of candidates (by means of the guidance conferences), and along with others to interpret ministry to the Church so that those who recruit and those who respond will understand more clearly the nature of the calling.
 - (d) The Board's Task Force Concerning Deaconesses was seconded to the Committee on Church Doctrine during the protracted study of the ordained diaconate question, and this task force kept the Board informed on the subject. The Board, therefore, did not undertake a separate study of its implications.
 - (e) The staff of the Board maintains an up-to-date list of continuing education opportunities, and publishes an extensive summary three times a year. It also maintains a library of brochures listing current courses and curricula from many schools in North America and Europe. These offer courses and materials related to practical issues of ministry today.
 - (f) The Board, on a regular basis, supports presbyteries in their pastoral care for those who minister within their bounds by providing consulting services to individuals on their career plans, or referral for professional Church career counselling, and by providing profiles of those open to relocation to interim moderators of vacant congregations, and others seeking ministerial candidates for cognate ministries.
- #### 3. Accountability Goal:
- To set up criteria and procedures for evaluating regular reports on the operation of the Personnel Services of the Board; and to establish criteria and procedures for evaluating the Board's work at the end of its first three operational years.

Actions:

- (a) Ongoing evaluation of the Personnel Services of the Board has led to workable methods of satisfying demands on the profile system, continuing education, career counselling and recruitment.
- (b) This report is a summary of the evaluation made in 1978 of the Board's work up to that time.

B. Relations of the Board

1. Relations with other Boards and Agencies

The Policy Committee has discussed those areas where the concerns of the Board of Ministry touch those of other Boards and Committees. The Committee on Institutional Chaplaincies and the Canadian Forces Chaplaincy Committee have come under the Board's umbrella. The details of their work must remain peculiar to each committee, but, since chaplains are professional Church workers, their concerns are very much those of the Board.

Many of the matters raised in the Policy Committee concern retired ministers and their welfare, which overlap the Pension Board's area of operation. The possibilities of strengthening the links between the two Boards should be investigated.

Efforts have been made to clarify our understanding of the work of the Board of Education and to seek ways by which our two Boards might cooperate in dealing with applicants for entry into our ministry. As a result there is a working arrangement between the secretaries to facilitate handling enquiries from applicants. There are still compelling reasons to suggest that the two Boards should be related in a structural way; such a relationship would bring into one jurisdiction all the services available to candidates for the ministry of our Church. This would be one more step towards completion of the restructuring of Church Boards and Committees begun by the Organization and Planning Committee. The Policy Committee should continue to examine the matter of the relationship of the Board of Education to the Board of Ministry, and study the experience of candidates seeking admission to our ministry.

2. *Relations with the Colleges*

Two consultations with college representatives have helped to clarify the role of the Board in relation to the colleges and overcome a climate of misunderstanding that existed in the beginning. There is now frequent contact between the Board and the colleges in arranging for students to attend the guidance conferences; such ongoing co-operation in a practical endeavour should result in closer ties with the colleges and improved understanding of both bodies for each other.

If the original vision for a Board of Ministry is to be fulfilled, other areas of co-operation need to be developed. As originally conceived the Board was to interpret the Church's expectations to the colleges and similarly interpret to the Church the needs of the colleges.

As a first step the Review Committee proposes that a member of the Board of Ministry sit on the appropriate governing bodies of each of the colleges and receive the minutes of all appropriate committees and sub-committees. Although the prayer of Overture #10, 1976 from the Presbytery of Kootenay re Procedure for Nominating Persons to Fill Vacant Church College Faculty Chairs was quite properly denied, perhaps the Policy Committee could make a contribution to the Church and to the colleges if it were to institute a review of the entire procedure for making appointments.

3. *Relations within 50 Wynford Drive*

The Board of Ministry was conceived as the one Board that would have concern for *all* professional Church workers, not just those in parishes or chaplaincies. The work of the Board in relation to those servants of God who work in the Church Offices has been curtailed by the creation or enlargement of other "Personnel" committees subsequent to the establishment of the Board of Ministry. It cannot be denied that both boards and agencies of the General Assembly have personnel functions in relation to their employees just as a congregation has a personnel function towards its minister. It was the original intention that the policies of the Church concerning all its servants should be the concern of the Board of Ministry through its Policy Committee. This is a study and advisory group. The Personnel Committee of the Board exists to help presbyteries and congregations fulfil their personnel role. The relationship should be similar in the case of General Assembly agencies.

Therefore, the Board ought to seek out ways, in co-operation with the hiring bodies of the Church, to develop personnel policies and practices which should apply to all professional Church workers. Such development and implementation of common policies would in no way detract from each hiring body exercising personnel policies peculiar to its operation.

C. *Structure of the Board*

1. *Organization*

The full report of this Review Committee contains suggestions for study of

possible further development of the Board of Ministry as discussed in the previous section. More immediate internal adjustments have been recommended and implemented, e.g., placing continuing education under the Policy Committee instead of the Personnel Committee.

2. *Staffing*

A task force has been set up to assess the work-load of the staff, duplication of personnel work by other boards and agencies, and to review the division of responsibilities between the General Secretary and the Administrative Assistant. The Board agreed to request the office and Property Committee of the Administrative Council to reclassify the Administrative Assistant's position to that of Junior Executive.

3. *The Deaconess Task Force*

The Deaconess Task Force was set up to do a specific job while the issue of an ordained diaconate was being settled. There is a need, however, for an ongoing Task Force on Deaconess Concerns with a different make-up and purpose. This can be done internally by the Board. The existing body, however, was set up by the General Assembly.

RECOMMENDATION No. 1. A

That the Task Force Concerning Deaconesses established by the 1973 General Assembly be discharged.

RECOMMENDATION No. 2. A

That there be one representative of the Board of Ministry on the Pension Board.

STUDENT CANDIDATES FOR THE MINISTRY AND DIACONATE

A. *Guidance Conferences*

Since the writing of last year's report the following conferences were held:

- (1) April 26-28, 1978 in Saskatoon. Ten candidates attended, one being a student deaconess who made a significant contribution to the conference. In her opinion the format would be very suitable for candidates for the diaconate. The leadership staff was drawn mostly from Saskatchewan.
 - (2) September 5-7, 1978 in Montreal. Eight candidates attended with a staff recruited from within the synod.
 - (3) January 3-5, 1979 at Crieff Hills Community, Crieff, Ontario. Thirteen candidates attended with a staff drawn from the region.
- At all three conferences very positive evaluations were made by the students and staff. Reports were written on each candidate, all but one of which were signed by the candidates for release to the presbyteries, college principals, and follow-up counsellors.
- (4) At the time of writing, the counsellors have met to prepare for the conference to be held April 25-27, 1979 in Knox College. Twenty candidates are expected to attend. Another is planned for the Montreal area September 4-6, 1979.

Margaret Henderson, the Administrative Assistant, administers the entire guidance conference program.

- (5) The Board responded to requests that the guidance conferences be extended to candidates for the diaconate by agreeing to the following proposal:
 - (a) That the guidance conference programs currently in use for student ministers be adapted for use with students for the diaconate, having in mind the quite different career problems and job opportunities, and the younger average age of diaconate students.
 - (b) That one such conference be held in each of the next two years on a trial basis, beginning in the academic year 1979-80.
 - (c) That these not be part of the guidance conferences for ministers of word and sacrament.
 - (d) That deaconesses be included in the planning, counselling and leadership of each of these guidance conferences.

- (e) That for the trial period of two years, attendance be voluntary, and open to all diaconate students or post-secondary students contemplating training for the diaconate.
- (f) That, if authorized by the student, one copy of the report on each student be shared with the follow-up counsellor, the principal of Ewart College, and the presbytery overseeing the student.
- (g) That ongoing evaluations of the guidance conferences be made by the staffs and participating students, that the Board of Ministry consult with Ewart College, and after the second such conference, report to the General Assembly.

RECOMMENDATION No. 3. A

That one guidance conference for students for the diaconate be held in each of the next two years, beginning in the academic year 1979-80 in terms of the above proposal.

B. Goodfellow Scholarship Fund

At the request of the donor, Dr. Sampson J. Goodfellow, the two Goodfellow Scholarship Funds have been amalgamated into one for greater flexibility.

18 scholarships were awarded in 1978 totalling \$2,800. So far in 1979, 20 scholarships have been awarded amounting to \$5,500.

C. Recruitment

The first in a series of pamphlets entitled, "So you feel called to Ministry in the Church" is prepared for printing. It outlines the steps to ordination of the Ministry of Word and Sacrament.

THEOLOGICAL EDUCATION

A. The Vancouver School of Theology

The following report was presented to the Board of Ministry by a composite committee of the Synod of British Columbia, containing representatives of all four western synods, the Board of St. Andrew's Hall, the presbyteries of the Synod of B.C., and the Board of Ministry, along with the Presbyterian representatives on the Board and Senate of the Vancouver School of Theology. The three Presbyterian students enrolled in VST and the Secretary of the Board of Ministry were consultants to the committee — seventeen in all.

The Board of Ministry agreed to present the proposal of this committee to the General Assembly *simpliciter*. The rationale in the form of an historical review has been summarized here in the interests of brevity. The full text is available on request to the Board.

The committee was unanimous in recommending association with, and/or participation in, VST by The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

1. The History

As early as 1928 the Synod of B.C. overtured the General Assembly asking that a students' residence be established at the University of British Columbia. Similar overtures were repeated over the years, leading in 1955 to the approval by the General Assembly of an *Act to Incorporate St. Andrew's Hall*, as a theological college. Theological colleges in affiliation with the University of B.C. are granted nine-hundred-and-ninety-nine-year leases, and this was written into the lease subject to certain provisos, including one for re-entry by the lessor on non-performance of covenants.

A residence and chapel were built, presumably as a first phase of a theological college. These have performed an important function under the capable leadership of the Board of Management, and the Dean, Dr. John Ross. Annual reports have been presented to the General Assemblies.

No further steps were taken towards the establishment of a Presbyterian Theological College until 1971 when the Vancouver School of Theology was formed by the amalgamation of the United and Anglican Theological

Colleges on the campus of University of British Columbia, and they invited other churches to share in this new ecumenical school.

The Presbytery of Westminster overtured the General Assembly in that same year (A & P 1971, pp. 479, 52), to devise a method to begin discussions with VST to explore the possibilities of the Presbyterian Church's participation in "this ecumenical Christian Centre for theological education".

The Committee on the Training of Professional Church Workers recommended to the Assembly (A & P 1971, p. 52), that the prayer of the overture be granted and that a special committee be established to initiate discussions with the Vancouver School of Theology, consisting of Chairman, Dr. J. E. Bigelow of Edmonton, and three members to be named by the Presbytery of Westminster, and to report to the next General Assembly through the committee on the Training of Professional Church Workers. This was adopted.

The above western committee, after their year's study, recommended to the next year's General Assembly (A & P 1972, pp. 616, 617) as follows:

- "(a) That the General Assembly recognize the Vancouver School of Theology as a training school for our candidates for the ministries of The Presbyterian Church in Canada.
 - (b) That The Presbyterian Church in Canada apply for admission as a participating denomination in the Vancouver School of Theology:
 - (i) Proposing to make Presbyterians aware of the School, especially students for the ministry;
 - (ii) Proposing to pay tuition fees for our students attending the School;
 - (iii) Proposing to arrange Chaplaincy-Counselling Service for Presbyterian students attending the School;
 - (iv) Proposing to appoint two members to the Senate and one member to the Board of the School.
 - (c) That The Presbyterian Church in Canada make an initial annual contribution to the Vancouver School of Theology of at least \$10,000., on the understanding that this will be reviewed from time to time."
- The committee was asked to report again the next year after determining:
- (a) The opinion of Knox and Presbyterian Colleges and the Committee on Church and University on the matter of participation in the Vancouver School of Theology.
 - (b) The possible roles of St. Andrew's Hall, Vancouver, in such participation.
 - (c) The projected state of the VST as to staff, student population, American Association of Theological Schools.
 - (d) The opinion of the Presbytery of Westminster and the Synod of B.C. as to scholarship resources, financial commitment.

The Committee on Training of Professional Church Workers reported on the work of the Western Committee to the next General Assembly (A & P 1973, pp. 334-335) and recommended that a study be made of the implications of ecumenical theological education; that the Presbyterian Church accept the invitation of VST to appoint observers to their Board and Senate, who would report to the General Assembly annually through the newly created Board of Ministry; that the western presbyteries be asked to study the advisability of our participation in VST, and to report to the Board of Ministry, and that our three colleges be asked to prepare briefs on the subject to be presented to the Board of Ministry. The recommendations were adopted (A & P 1973, p. 80).

The Committee on Training Requirements of Professional Church Workers became part of the new Board of Ministry, which reported to the 1974 General Assembly (A & P 1974, pp. 390-391) as follows:

"The Board received expressions of opinion from western presbyteries and the three colleges submitted briefs during the year (A & P 1973, p. 335) regarding the desirability of the Vancouver School of Theology becoming an authorized training centre for our Church. Five presbyteries replied expressing approval, disapproval, and qualified support. The briefs submitted by the colleges included no objections in principle to participation but raised pertinent questions regarding our ability as a denomination to support regional expansion at a time when the existing colleges face pressing need for increased financial support. The Board faced a number of questions for which no ready answer was available. Further consultation with western presbyteries would seem to be needed, five out of twelve returns being insufficient to gauge the mind of the Church in the region which might be expected to derive the greatest benefit."

The Board recommended as follows (p. 391):

"In view of the complexity of the issue regarding participation in the Vancouver School of Theology, that a decision in this matter be deferred until the study on ecumenical theological education is completed by the Board of Ministry, and pending further consultation with the presbyteries in the four western synods, also the Board of Education."

In 1975 the Board of Ministry reported on its study of Ecumenical Theological Education (A & P 1975, pp. 349-350). The report contained the following *inter alia*: "Both Knox College and Presbyterian College reported that their ecumenical involvement actually heightened the sense of Presbyterian identity among our students. The differences can no longer remain unexamined."

It is the view of the Board of Ministry that the needs of our students and our Church have been well served by the faculties of our colleges who have helped to create expanded opportunities through ecumenical theological education. They are to be commended as faithful to our Reformed heritage by participating in the inter-church co-operation which is such a vast improvement over ancient rivalries and suspicions.

As for the future, the Board of Ministry plans to examine and evaluate new forms of ecumenical theological education as they emerge, and to keep the matter under study and review."

On October 18, 1975, the Unit on Ministry reported to the Synod of B.C. as follows:

"Whereas, a regional centre for theological education is needed in Western Canada. There are obvious differences between the eastern and western conditions of life that are sometimes subtle but always important. The cost of moving students with families eastward for theological training (and back to the West for ministry) is very high. Single students who go East to study often marry eastern girls and never return to the West. Continuing education (for credit on degrees) should be made readily available for ministers in Western charges. Several are already enrolled in classes at the Vancouver School of Theology. There should also be a Western centre offering theological training for laymen, and the Vancouver School of Theology has begun to implement its mandate for lay education."

Whereas, the Vancouver School of Theology seeks to become a truly ecumenical institution and has invited participation by The Presbyterian Church in Canada. It offers a voice in policy-making decisions and oversight of the School. It offers the possibility of teaching Presbyterian distinctives and worship. The Principal and the entire Department of Biblical Studies are already Presbyterian. The faculty's academic standing and competence, as well as the scope of the curriculum are excellent. The School has been authorized to conduct a self-study, leading to its accreditation by the Association of Theological Schools in the United States and Canada."

Therefore, we recommend the following: (To the Synod of B.C.)

- (a) That the Synod of British Columbia encourage all employed church workers and laity to take advantage of continuing education opportunities offered by VST.
- (b) That the Board of Education allow full credit for courses and degrees taken by Presbyterian students at VST with the usual proviso regarding Presbyterian distinctives.
- (c) That the Unit on Ministry be directed to consider ways and degrees of possible involvement in VST, i.e., participation, affiliation.
- (d) That the Unit on Ministry submit their report to presbyteries by December 15, 1975 for study, with presbyteries to report to the Board of Ministry by February 15, 1976.
- (e) That this report with recommendations be sent to the Board of Ministry as a progress report."

These recommendations were approved by the Synod of B.C.

Dr. J. Martin, VST.

Dr. J. Martin, Principal of Vancouver School of Theology, was invited to speak to the Court. He stated that the understanding of 'ecumenical' implied that the denominational integrity and distinctiveness of participating denominations be preserved and respected. VST is open to dialogue with any denomination with no preconceived requirements or price tags.

The Board of Ministry reported to the 1976 General Assembly (A & P 1976, pp. 350-351) that it had also appointed a committee to consider, in consultation with the Synod of British Columbia, the implications and possible forms of participation in the Vancouver School of Theology.

The Board of Ministry reported to the 1977 General Assembly as follows: (A & P 1977, p. 332).

"A study in consultation with the Synod of British Columbia, of the implications and possible forms of participation in the VST has continued throughout the past year. Discussions have been held with presbyteries in British Columbia and Alberta and with the Principal, Chancellor and Chairman of the Board of VST. A proposed basis of discussion has been offered by these officers of the school. Following study of this document and further consultation with Western Synods, the Board of Ministry will consider the matter again at its 1978 annual meeting."

In 1978 the Board of Ministry reported to the General Assembly (A & P 1978, p. 339), summarized below.

- (a) The Board of Ministry studied a document from the Vancouver School of Theology containing a proposal for a basis of further negotiation in seeking a formal relationship between the college and The Presbyterian Church in Canada. The proposed basis for discussion was sent to the western presbyteries and synods for study and reply. The question put to the western courts was whether or not the Board of Ministry should proceed with negotiations with VST along the lines of the proposal. The results were mixed.
 - (i) Synod of British Columbia said 'yes'.
 - (ii) In B.C. and Alberta, two presbyteries said 'no', three said 'yes', and three were not heard from.
 - (iii) Synod of Saskatchewan. Not in favour of affiliation at present, but recommend that the Board of Ministry explore alternative forms of affiliation.
 - (iv) Synod of Manitoba. Non-committal on the substance of the matter but urges the Board to recommend something to General Assembly about it.

In the light of this lack of unanimity, the Board recommended as follows:

"That The Presbyterian Church in Canada as a denomination, not affiliate with the Vancouver School of Theology at the present time."

This recommendation was not accepted by the Assembly but was referred back to the Board of Ministry.

The four western synods reconsidered the matter at their 1978 meetings with the following results:

The Synod of Manitoba voted in favour of participation in VST by The Presbyterian Church in Canada. Both Saskatchewan and Alberta voted in favour of negotiating terms of admission to VST for presentation to the General Assembly. The Synod of B.C. reaffirmed its support for participation of The Presbyterian Church in Canada in VST.

The Synod of B.C. also set up, at the request of the Board of Ministry, this Negotiating Committee which is now reporting.

2. *The Rationale for Association with VST*

(a) The Vancouver School of Theology as viewed today by this committee.

(i) The Vancouver School of Theology is now fully accredited by the Association of Theological Schools in the U.S.A. and Canada, and is the only accredited reformed theological college on the west coast north of San Francisco.

(ii) The stated objectives of the VST are as follows:
The School of Theology, being an Ecumenical Christian Centre for theological education, shall, so far as and to the full extent which its resources from time to time permit, provide:

- Instruction and training that will prepare men and women to exercise the professional ministries of the Christian Churches;
- Facilities for advanced study of theology and for theological research;
- Instruction and training in theology for laymen that will further the general ministry and mission of the Church;
- For the recognition of the polity, and the support of worship and spiritual disciplines, of the participating denominations; and
- An ecumenical forum for theological dialogue among persons of different disciplines and different theological viewpoints.

(iii) The high calibre of teaching and the philosophy of education of the VST (competency model) are most attractive. The School seeks faculty who are pastor/theologians and theologians who are pastors. It is noteworthy that the School brought in Christian Educators to teach the faculty how to teach.

(iv) The qualifications of the faculty are high and distinguished. This is true of the resident faculty as well as of the visiting professors and the staffs of their summer schools.

(v) Continuing education is built into their approach to theological education. After completion of the three levels at the college for the degree requirements, all students (as well as other ministers and laity) are encouraged to participate in the continuing education program.

(vi) The ecumenical context of the college is an asset.

(vii) The VST desires Presbyterian participation so that the high educational and doctrinal emphases of our Church will help to shape the future of the School.

(viii) The principal and professors of Old Testament and New Testament are Presbyterians from the United States.

(ix) The only financial commitment requested by the VST is that the Presbyterian Church take responsibility for the fees and assist with the room and board of the Presbyterian theological students attending the School.

(b) The Place and Role of St. Andrew's Hall

(i) St. Andrew's Hall is on the campus of the University of British Columbia and is located next door to the VST. It is the only

Presbyterian institutional presence on a university campus in Canada, apart from Knox and Presbyterian Colleges.

(ii) It is highly unlikely that St. Andrew's Hall could fulfil its teaching charter by itself. Participation in the VST is a good example of co-operation making possible what is otherwise impossible.

(iii) St. Andrew's Hall could provide residence facilities and some bursary assistance to Presbyterian theological students attending the VST.

(iv) The St. Andrew's Hall Act states, inter alia, "The General Assembly may from time to time make rules or by-laws for the government of the college, and may alter, amend, and annul the said rules or by-laws from time to time: Provided always that such rules or by-laws be not contrary to this Act. . ."

(c) Geography

(i) There are Presbyterian students in the West who would rather attend VST than relocate their families to Eastern Canada.

(ii) There are those in the West who might seek theological education at VST for economic and personal reasons because it is closer to their homes, if VST were recognized as a Presbyterian College.

There are currently three Canadian and two American Presbyterian students attending the VST.

(iii) Presbyterian graduates of VST could be received for licensure directly by the presbyteries in the West which would mean less expense for the individual candidates and for the Church at large.

(iv) The Goodfellow Scholarship Fund, which originated in the West, is available to assist Presbyterian students at VST.

(v) There are cultural differences between Eastern and Western Canada.

(vi) A significant percentage of mission appointments are to charges in Western Canada. There would be a considerable saving to the Church in transportation charges if some of these were already in the West.

(d) Conclusion

The unanimity of the committee reflects the widespread consensus that has developed in the Church in Western Canada. The following recommendations are motivated by a sincere desire to strengthen the Presbyterian Church in the West, to give it a physical presence in the academic community, and thus to strengthen the witness and influence of The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

3. *The Proposal*

RECOMMENDATION No. 4. A

That The Presbyterian Church in Canada seek participation in the Vancouver School of Theology under the following suggested terms:

(a) *That the Vancouver School of Theology and the Presbyterian Church in Canada agree to a five-year term of association, with a review and report to the General Assembly after three years, by the Board of Ministry in consultation with the Western synods and the Board of Management of St. Andrew's Hall, with a view to possible full participation by the Church if deemed advisable.*

(b) *That either party for stated reasons may withdraw from this agreement, with one-year's notice.*

(c) *That during the period of this agreement:*

(i) *the degree-granting rights of the charter granted to St. Andrew's Hall as a theological college be transferred to the Vancouver School of Theology, which in turn would accept the responsibility for fulfilling those rights;*

(ii) *the General Assembly authorize presbyteries to take on trials for licence graduates of the Vancouver School of Theology who are certi-*

- fied as candidates for the ministry of The Presbyterian Church in Canada;
- (iii) the Board of St. Andrew's Hall retain full charge of the management of St. Andrew's Hall;
 - (iv) the General Assembly appoint the responsible administrative officer or officers of St. Andrew's Hall as may be required. After consultation with the Vancouver School of Theology, the Board of St. Andrew's Hall will nominate to the General Assembly before such appointments are made;
 - (v) the General Assembly appoint annually a member of the Board of St. Andrew's Hall to the Board of Governors of the Vancouver School of Theology, after nomination by the Board of Management of St. Andrew's Hall;
 - (vi) the General Assembly appoint annually one full member to the Senate of the Vancouver School of Theology;
 - (vii) the constitution of the Board of Management of St. Andrew's Hall be amended by the General Assembly to include an appointee of the Board of Governors of the Vancouver School of Theology as a member of that Board of Management;
 - (viii) no property transfer be made by St. Andrew's Hall, and the Vancouver School of Theology not be held responsible for the maintenance of St. Andrew's Hall property;
 - (ix) any change in the use of St. Andrew's Hall be only after consultation with the Vancouver School of Theology;
 - (x) both the School and the Church agree on public recognition of this association agreement, so that St. Andrew's Hall would advertise itself as associated with the Vancouver School of Theology, and the Vancouver School of Theology would list the Presbyterian Church in Canada as an associated denomination.
 - (xi) the Board of St. Andrew's Hall continue to pay the stipend and allowances of the Dean of St. Andrew's Hall.
 - (xii) the General Assembly through the Board of Ministry in consultation with the Presbytery of Westminster, the Board of St. Andrew's Hall, the Board of Education, and the Vancouver School of Theology, provide for chaplaincy services (as defined by the act incorporating VST) and for denominational studies for Presbyterian students attending VST.
 - (xiii) The Presbyterian Church in Canada be responsible for the tuition fees of its certified students attending the Vancouver School of Theology, and that these be paid from bursary funds.

CONTINUING EDUCATION

A. Mandatory Continuing Education

The 1978 General Assembly referred to the Board of Ministry Recommendation 4 of the Committee on the State of the Church, which called for mandatory continuing education for the professional leadership of the Church. The recommendation further requested that this Board present guidelines to the 105th General Assembly for such a program which would be supervised by the presbyteries.

RECOMMENDATION No. 5. A

That presbyteries strengthen their role in continuing education and encourage continuing education among the professional Church leaders within their bounds in the following suggested ways:

1. *Ensure that each professional Church leader plans carefully for his/her continuing education by (a) holding workshops to help individuals choose studies best suited to them; (b) choosing individual(s) to act as continuing education consultant(s) to professional Church leaders within the presbytery.*

2. *Discuss the minister's or deaconess's continuing education with them and the congregation's support with the session during presbytery visitations.*
3. *Consider the quality of the course and the appropriateness of the study for an individual's growth before giving approval for study leave.*
4. *Request annual reports on self-directed study and on courses taken and provide opportunity for these reports to be shared with others.*
5. *Require professional Church leaders to be accountable to the presbytery for their continuing education. Reasons should be given to the presbytery if no courses are taken.*
6. *Devote a stated hour annually to continuing education.*
7. *Develop a library of shared resources of magazines, tapes, books.*
8. *Organize retreats or day events which have a continuing education focus.*

RECOMMENDATION No. 6. A

That professional Church leaders be urged to use accumulated study leave at least every five years.

B. Self-Directed Study

RECOMMENDATION No. 7. A

That congregations be permitted to apply up to \$100. per year of the \$200. minimum annual study leave allowance for professional Church leaders, towards half the annual cost of books or of other similar resources for self-directed study.

C. The Continuing Education Fund

In 1978, 25 parish ministers, two deaconesses, one executive and five unemployed professional Church leaders received grants for continuing education. Of these, 24 of the recipients live in central Canada and nine in the west. The grants totalled \$11,965. with the average grant being \$363.

D. Continuing Education Questionnaire

A continuing education questionnaire was handed out at eight of the nine synods last fall; 105 elders responded and 205 ministers and deaconesses. 73% of both groups consider the continuing education of professional Church leaders to be important, and 43% of both groups think it should be compulsory.

48% of the ministers and deaconesses have participated in continuing education two or more times in the past five years, while 33% did not participate at all. The average number of courses taken per person in this time period was 1.7 with an average of 50% of the professional Church leaders taking courses in each year. 39% of the courses were theological in nature, 38% were practical and 23% dealt with preaching. The most common length of course (48%) was the one to two-week course.

61% intend to take a course in the next year, while 26% do not, and 13% are undecided.

47% of ministers and deaconesses as compared to 54% of the elders consider their congregations to be supportive of the continuing education of their professional Church leaders. 7% of the ministers and deaconesses and 10% of the elders feel their congregation offer little or no support.

52% (i.e., 66% of the self-supporting congregations and 40% of the aid-receiving congregations) indicate they set aside \$200. each year for the continuing education of their minister and/or deaconess.

On an average, 2.3 books were read by each minister or deaconess in the past month. 34% did not read any books, 31% read one or two, and 35% read three or more. 88% indicated they read daily or weekly for sermon preparation, 49% in practical subjects and 40% in other areas.

PULPIT VACANCIES

- A. The Guidelines for Filling Pulpit Vacancies are currently being expanded and re-written by the Rev. W. I. McElwain, who wrote the first edition.

- B. Over the six-month period of September 1978 to March 1979 there were 83 separate vacancies listed in the Record (not all at one time). 65 interim moderators requested profiles of ministers willing to consider relocation. During this period, 43 actual settlements were made, including those not using profiles. 17 of these ministers were called after their profile had been sent to the vacancy. In other words the profile system was instrumental in 40% of all settlements. It is, of course, a voluntary system and is just one of the sources of information for vacancy committees.

At the time of writing, there are 25 vacancies out of 725 pastoral charges. This is a rate of 3.4%, down considerably from last year. This is the all-time-low, reached once before in 1971, when it was difficult for ministers to relocate. The trend of larger graduating classes from our theological colleges shows every sign of continuing, so that it is altogether likely that the number of vacancies will continue to shrink over the next few years. There are seasonal variations. The low point in the number of vacancies is immediately following graduation in the theological colleges. The high point is in the new year.

SPECIAL MINISTRIES

A. *The Abundance of Trained Leaders*

The Board of Ministry agreed at its annual meeting to draw to the attention of the Church that it has currently a resource of personnel with a diversity of gifts, trained in theology and in Christian Education at the expense of the Church and deeply committed to Christian ministry. The Church is urged to view this resource as a gift God has given for the extending of His Kingdom in these times, to accept the challenge of this situation and use its resources of personnel fully, to meet the urgent requests from Canada and abroad for a Christian witness in a wide variety of ministries.

Self-supporting congregations also should be considering the possibility of adding staff to their ministry teams, to utilize this resource of leadership and extend the work of Christ in their several parishes.

Ministers in pastoral charges who believe they have gifts for various special ministries, such as chaplaincies, teaching in faculties of religion, and other cognate work, should consider obtaining the training to prepare themselves for such vocational possibilities. The ministry of Christ encompasses more than parish ministry.

B. *Institutional Chaplaincies Committee*

The committee has met three times in the past year.

Representation of the Presbyterian Church in the area of Institutional Chaplaincies in Canada is as follows:

Six chaplains in health institutions; three chaplains, two intern chaplains, and one supervising social worker in correctional institutions; six chaplains in educational institutions; and four probation officers.

The committee, in 1978, joined a vigorous campaign against a proposed psychologists' Act in Ontario which would have made it illegal for ministers who were not licensed psychologists to counsel anyone other than members of that particular congregation. The proposed act was withdrawn, but the matter is expected to come up again in another form. This committee is inviting the Psychologists' Association to send a representative to one of its meetings to enter into dialogue on the subject.

There is considerable concern and some distress among those involved in chaplaincy services to government-operated institutions, such as federal penitentiaries and provincial correctional and health institutions. There is a widespread move towards decentralization of services seeking to replace professional chaplains with the services of local laity. One suspects that financial cut-backs are the prime reason for this shift, although a rationale for the change is given which is good in itself, viz., the movement away from care in large institutions, to care

in the community. There is a widespread down-grading of the professional chaplain at the present time, both federally and provincially.

At the same time the Canadian Association for Pastoral Education, whose members train chaplains in the arts of Supervised Pastoral Education, seems to be moving further away from a theological base. Some graduates of these training programs who are neither ordained nor theologically trained are being appointed to institutions with the name of "chaplain" given by their churches.

It may be significant that CAPE discontinued accepting grants from the churches last year. The assistance of the churches was solicited and given during the formative and growth years of the organization. Since our theological colleges are still involved in this movement by sending students for S.P.E. training, this committee is wondering if the flow is becoming one-sided, and what theological standards are required by the colleges, of the S.P.E. trainers.

The Board is currently exploring the possibilities of an ecumenical conference between representatives of the theological colleges and those agencies which provide field education for theological students, such as CAPE and Canadian Urban Training (CUT).

C. *Canadian Forces Chaplaincy Committee*

This committee works with the Canadian Council of Churches' Committee on Chaplaincy in the Armed Forces. The Anglican, Lutheran, Baptist, Presbyterian and United representatives meet with the Chaplain General and his staff twice a year. One of these occasions is a five-day retreat at the Royal Military College at Kingston. There are seven Presbyterian chaplains and a total Protestant chaplain service of 92. They are Major W. J. Graham, C.D. stationed at Moose Jaw; Major S. D. Self, C.D. at Kingston; Major P. L. Sams, C.D. at London; Major L. T. Barclay, C.D. at Winnipeg; Major R.A.B. MacLean, C.D. at Cairo, Egypt; Captain W. C. MacLellan, at Calgary; Captain R. E. Baker, at Petawawa; Captain L. Clifton is just finishing his training before posting.

Two of these officers will retire this year, viz., Majors Graham and Sams.

The following ministers serve as reserve-force chaplains attached to units:

Major D. J. Crawford, Captain C. A. Dunn, Captain R. J. Foulis, Captain I. C. Glass, Captain W. D. Jarvis, Major G. G. Hastings, Major R. S. Johnston, Major W. W. MacNeill, Captain R. W. Maddock, Major B. J. Molloy, Captain W. G. French, Captain W. R. Russell, Major I. S. Wishart, Captain J. A. Sitler.

RECOMMENDATION No. 8. A

That congregations be encouraged to observe the annual Canadian Armed Forces Day on Saturday, June 23rd, remembering this in prayers and announcements.

Ministers having served three years in a pastoral charge and under 35 years of age may qualify for chaplaincy service. It is best if men will enter before 30 years of age. Applications should be made to the new convener, the Rev. Charles H. MacLean, D.D. Dr. Ross K. Cameron is resigning as chairman for family reasons after serving faithfully for many years.

In 1978, our share of chapel offerings on Canadian Forces Bases was \$3,933. This was applied to the General Assembly's budget.

THE DIACONATE

A. *Task Force Concerning Deaconesses*

- At the 1967 General Assembly, the titles "active deaconess" and "non-active deaconess" were introduced as part of the regulations of the Order of Deaconesses. There has been much dissatisfaction with the term "non-active" because many deaconesses, although not paid by a congregation, are involved in its life and work, or are employed professionally in other areas of Church service. Therefore, the following change is recommended:

RECOMMENDATION No. 9. A

That deaconesses be listed in the Acts and Proceedings as "active" and "other" deaconesses.

2. In 1960, the committee on the examination for the Office of Deaconess recommended that the regulations of the Book of Forms (Sec. 174, 175 and appendix II, 8) concerning the office and work of the deaconess be revised. The actual revision was contained in the report. (A & P 1960, pp. 368, 86). This revision has not been made to the Book of Forms.

At time of writing, it is not known whether or not new legislation will be introduced because of the formation of an ordained diaconate. In either case the following recommendation is made:

RECOMMENDATION No. 10. C

That future revisions and printings of the Book of Forms contain the appropriate legislation concerning the diaconate.

B. *The Order of Deaconesses*

The Order of Deaconesses held its biennial Council June 15-17, 1978. Dr. Iain Nicol spoke on the theme, "Intentional Ministry". During 1979 there will be regional gatherings of deaconesses.

MINISTRY OF WORD AND SACRAMENT

A. *North American Consultation on the Future of Ministry*

The Board of Ministry, along with similar Boards in most of the other branches of the Church in North America, are currently engaged in preparation for a consultation, October 7-10, 1980 on the theme, "Creative Ministry in an Age of Ambiguity", sponsored jointly by the Canadian Council of Churches and the National Council of Churches in the U.S.A. It is intended to challenge ministry boards/agencies of the member denominations of CCC/NCC to enlarge current understandings of the Church's ministry, with a view to discovering more adequate patterns of and support systems for ministries appropriate to the social, cultural and ecclesiastical ambiguities of the final two decades of the 20th century.

A study has been undertaken by Dr. David W. Hay of the theological implications of the services offered by the Board of Ministry. This and the current review of priorities and examination of new goals by the Board are part of the preparation for the consultation.

B. *Overture 9, 1978, Presbytery of Cape Breton re New Ministerial Remuneration System*

The overture asks that the Church abolish the increments policy by bringing the basic rate up to the maximum ten-year level; that a manse utilities package be established; that provision be made for study leave plus an annual grant for the purchase of books; that cost-of-living bonuses be provided in high cost areas; and that there be an insurance program as at present or better.

*Response of the Board of Ministry in the Form of a Proposal*1. *Introduction*

The principle of parity of the ministry is given as grounds in the overture for doing away with the incremental stipend scale. It is intended, however, to apply to the government of the Church. All have an equal voice. But it does not follow that all should receive the same stipend. The use of such a scale in public services is widely accepted and appears to function as an incentive in the early years of service.

On the other hand, it is recognized that in some cases the incremental scale may be a disincentive to congregations in calling experienced ministers. However, against this must be set the value of experience gained in the ministry, and that increasingly congregations appear less deterred by marginal economic considerations when other factors indicate that a call is in the best interests of all concerned.

However, the study which was conducted in responding to Overture 9, 1978 indicated that not only should some new proposals be put forward, but that a new challenge to the Church should be made.

There are fundamental problems for any national organization in Canada seeking simple answers to benefits for its workers while at the same time achieving equity of treatment. In recognition of such difficulties the Board of Ministry is suggesting that presbyteries use their existing authority to determine suitable allowance levels for costs of travel and cost of living within their regions, above the basic national allowances. New norms and procedures are being recommended for study. The hope is to reduce inequities and avoid additional complex administrative and data-gathering machinery.

Board of World Mission approval of these allowances would be necessary for all-aid-receiving charges in order to ensure budgetary control for that body.

The research leads to the conclusion that the *basic* remuneration levels are only slightly behind other comparably-trained professions in the public service. A dramatic upward revision in the basic stipend is therefore not indicated at this time.

2. *A Statement of Basic Principles*

- (a) Basic stipend should be realistic in terms of national trends relating to professionals requiring comparable preparation who are employed by public institutions. Periodic review of stipend levels becomes a relatively simple task with such reference norms. While increments are more difficult to compare, a regular review of the number and size of such "steps" is desirable.
- (b) The housing (manse) provided should be related to the median standards of the area for the same group of publicly-employed professionals. Housing allowance should more realistically reflect the cost of housing in the area, and be at least equivalent to the cost that would accrue to the congregation which is supplying a manse at the 10th year of a mortgage term. In no cases should housing allowance place the minister in a disadvantageous position when compared with that of the ministers in a manse of adequate standards.
The proposed package of utility costs would apply in either case as per Recommendation 8, page 405, (A & P 1978).
- (c) Provision of an allowance of two weeks per year study leave along with a minimum allowance of \$200. per year on a five-year accumulative basis is already in place. Additional flexibility is required to allow for self-directed study by ministers where appropriate. The principle of a significant personal commitment to, and investment in all study activity is to be maintained.
- (d) Cost-of-living factors for remote and/or high cost areas of the country should be applied to the basic stipend. The determination and annual review of the allowance should be the responsibility of a committee appointed by each presbytery. In the case of aid-receiving charges, this allowance would be subject to Board of World Mission approval.
- (e) The cost of travel while in the service of a congregation is recognized as the single most variable allowance, and hence the most difficult in which to achieve equity. Therefore, additional travel allowances should be added by presbyteries to the basic national allowance as may be appropriate. The presbytery committee established to review significant regional variations in cost-of-living should be charged to review the need for and level of additional travel allowance.
- (f) The current provision for insurance should remain subject to the regular reviews conducted by the Pension Board, and this practice is seen as appropriate.

3. *The Current Situation*

An analysis of the situation of Presbyterian ministers on minimum stipend indicates that in terms of disposable income they are in a similar position to the comparison groups. (See Appendix C). It is probable that these ministers do not do quite as well in terms of fringe benefits, i.e., when the value of the total package of disposable and deferred benefits is compared.

Nonetheless, the real difference begins to take on significance after a few years. After five years the minister who remains on minimum stipend has about \$4,000. less disposable income than his colleagues in the comparison groups. After 10 years the gap has increased to about \$6,000. per year before income tax.

In using the comparison groups, it should be noted that these salaries are in basic categories which do not include allowances for assuming leadership positions or a managerial role. In all the analyses undertaken it is assumed that ministers like those in the comparison groups will receive stipends greater than the minimum when they take up greater responsibilities.

The real difference is in the increment scale. The range in dollar terms is much smaller for ministers on the minimum stipend, \$1,700, as opposed to an average of \$9,000. at the maximum for the three secular comparison groups.

It is unlikely that the Presbyterian Church can or should try to compete with the comparison groups in the increment scale for ministers on minimum stipend. Indeed no immediate change in the increment scale is recommended. However, there are congregations that are able to match such an increment scale and should be doing so as a matter of course. Such congregations should be diligent in this time of changing economic circumstances to keep the stipend and other benefits under regular review.

The increment scale does appear to be inadequate in several ways. The individual increments appear to be unrealistically small, and they should be of equal value. Indeed in the case of those on mission charges, a case could be made for increasing the value of the last three or four increments as an incentive to keep experienced ministers in such work if they feel so called.

It is suggested here that serious study should be given to revising the increment scale by equalizing the 10 steps to \$200. each starting in 1981. Further study should be given to revising the increment scale to \$300. per year (for 10 years) by 1983. Meanwhile, the Assembly should also keep the basic minimum stipend under constant review as variable and substantial inflation continues.

The problem of high living cost areas continues to cause nagging doubts as the Church in Canada attempts to achieve parity of treatment for its professional Church workers. On the whole, the research available suggests that the problem is probably not as acute as most casual observers believe. There are exceptions to the national norms and these should be addressed. It is with this in mind that a new strategy is suggested as a means of coming to grips with this issue. It is believed that it is worth serious study.

4. *Guidelines to Presbyteries in Recognition of Regional Cost Factors*

The presbytery may, at its option, establish a regional adjustment committee to review unusual living and travel costs associated with remote and/or high cost regions of the country. Adjustments to the national basic stipend or travel allowance are suggested where:

- (i) at least two or more national organizations operating in the area have established adjustment factors for their salaried employee, and
- (ii) reliable information about these factors can be obtained by the committee.

In such cases the mean percentage of such factors as are known should be applied to the national basic stipend and/or travel allowance.

The statement of the results of such a review should be in the hands of each Kirk Session of self-supporting charges and of the Board of World Mission for aid-receiving charges by October 31st of each year. This would be in addition to the data already provided to the Board when recommendations for such special consideration are made to it.

5. *Proposals for Study*

Note: (i) No fundamental adjustment is being recommended to the basic minimum stipend in 1980 inasmuch as this is the year for implementation of the utility allowance (recommendation 8, page 405, A & P 1978), where it has not already been adopted.

- (a) The comparison groups used in this report be adopted as the norm reference for regular review of basic stipend increments and fringe benefits.
- (b) The increment scale be revised effective 1981 to consist of 10 steps of \$200. each.
- (c) That a further revision implementing 10 equal steps of \$300. each be effective as of 1983.

Note: (ii) It is understood that these increments would be independent of any cost-of-living adjustments to the basic stipend.

(iii) See Appendix D for the proposed increment scale.

- (d) The congregations adopt a policy to review annually housing allowances or manse provision in keeping with basic principle #2 of this report.
- (e) Where applicable, presbyteries adopt the procedure to review cost-of-living and travel factors in keeping with the "Guidelines to Presbyteries" contained in this report.

RECOMMENDATION No. 11. A

That the feasibility of adopting the foregoing proposals and the statement of principles of this report be studied by all presbyteries and by the other Boards of the Church; that all reports from these bodies be presented to the Board of Ministry by December 31st, 1979; and that a final decision be made by the General Assembly of 1980 upon revised recommendations from the Board of Ministry.

- C. *Overture 5, 1978, Presbytery of Algoma and North Bay re Six Weeks Vacation to Provide for a Winter Break.* (A & P 1978, pp. 466, 467, 24). The Board studied this overture and its implications at some length and noted that the question of vacations is part of the larger matter of stipends and allowances. Since it is being proposed that these be studied by the Church as a response to Overture 9 of Cape Breton Presbytery (A & P 1978, pp. 458, 459, 54) on a New Ministerial Remuneration System, it is therefore recommended as follows:

RECOMMENDATION No. 12. A

That the prayer of Overture 5, 1978 be not granted at this time.

RECOMMENDATION No. 13. A

That a proposal that there be a minimum of five weeks of vacation for ministers, (including five Sundays) which need not be taken all at one time, be included in the proposals for study by the Church contained in the above response to Overture 9, 1978.

- D. *Overture 17, 1978, Presbytery of Northern Saskatchewan re Statutory Retirement Age* (A & P 1978, pp. 469, 24).

The Board notes a certain ambiguity as to what was being proposed in the prayer of the Overture. Since the present practice of the Church, however, is to allow following due negotiations, a continuation of the services of a minister after age 70, the Board of Ministry assumes that the prayer of the Overture is to change the phrase, "compulsory retirement age" to "statutory retirement age" (as in the footnote to section 245 in the Book of Forms, paragraph 1).

RECOMMENDATION No. 14. C

That the prayer of Overture 17, 1978 be granted by the following Declaratory Act:

"The General Assembly affirms that references in the Book of Forms and other Church documents to 'compulsory retirement age' shall henceforth be understood to mean 'statutory retirement age', since provision has been made in certain cases for continuing service in the ministry beyond age 70".

- E. *Overture 9, 1979, Presbytery of Halifax and Lunenburg re Presbytery Membership for United Church Ministers in Joint Charges.*

The overture asks that permission be granted to place the names of United Church ministers in joint United and Presbyterian charges on the roll of presbytery during their tenure in such co-operative charges.

The Board of Ministry concurs in the recommendation of the Church Doctrine Committee that presbyteries be authorized to permit such ministers to have the right to sit and correspond.

RECOMMENDATION No. 15. C

That the prayer of Overture 9, 1979 be not granted.

REPORT OF THE PENSION BOARD

To the Venerable the 105th General Assembly:

There were two meetings of the Pension Board during the past year, on November 3rd, 1978 and March 13th, 1979.

It was found possible through the use of bequests to continue for 1979 supplementary payments to retired persons receiving little or no benefits from the Canada Pension Plan. The generosity of those who give to the Church for such purposes is much appreciated.

It was with regret that we learned of the death of Dr. E. A. Thomson who had given many years of faithful service to the Pension Board as its secretary.

The report of the Actuary was received late in 1978 and its contents were studied and discussed by the Board which decided that:

1. Effective January 1st, 1979, existing annuitants should be awarded increases as follows:
 - (a) Retired members, \$20 per annum for each year of pensionable service under the old plan (i.e. prior to 1974).
 - (b) Widows (widowers), \$12 per annum for each year of their spouse's pensionable service under the old plan.
 - (c) Children, 25% addition to present benefits.
2. For active members at January 1st, 1979, an increase of \$20 per annum (\$51 to \$71 commencing on retirement at age 65) in the annual pension for each year of pensionable service rendered prior to 1974, with a corresponding increase of \$12 per annum is his (her) spouse's possible pension. (Appropriate actuarial adjustment to be made for those retiring at ages other than 65.)

It may be noted that much of the valuation surplus developed has been generated by the contributions made to the new plan instituted in 1974.

Changes are proposed to the group insurance plan, providing for increased coverage, and these should be implemented this year.

While the 104th General Assembly in its wisdom adopted a recommendation to limit to \$13,000 the maximum stipend to be considered for purposes of pension, the Pension Board wishes to express its concern that such a policy, if continued, will again result in flat (and inadequate) pensions to ministers.

The financial results of operation of the Ministers Pension Fund during 1978 were favourable. Market value of invested assets at the end of 1978 was \$9.8 million compared with \$8.2 million at the end of 1977. Net contributions available for investment in 1978 were \$653,000, with the rest of the growth attributable to investment income and appreciation in value of the securities held. Portfolio distribution is 54% bonds, 17% mortgages and 29% stocks.

Dr. D. C. MacDonald in February wrote to the Board, indicating his wish to be relieved of his responsibilities in relation to the Board. Recognizing that for the sake of his health, Dr. MacDonald's work load must be reduced, the Pension Board regretfully acceded to his request. Members of the Board wish to record their appreciation of the significant contribution made by Dr. MacDonald to the Church's programme of Pensions and Group Insurance. He has served the Church well in this area and his absence from the Board will be keenly felt.

The regular administrative work of the Board is ably carried out by Miss Jamieson, assisted by Mrs. Elizabeth MacDonald.

An Overture to the 105th General Assembly - #8 from the Presbytery of Edmonton Re: Assistance at Retirement - was referred to the Pension Board in consultation with Dr. R. G. MacMillan, by the Committee on Business for the General Assembly. The Pension Board studied the Overture and felt that the objectives of the proposal seem to be better achieved through Registered Home Ownership Savings Plans and Registered Retirement Savings Plans. It was also noted that additional voluntary contributions can be made to the Pension Fund.

RECOMMENDATION 1. A

That the General Assembly join the Pension Board in recognizing the valuable work done by Dr. MacDonald during his years with the Board.

RECOMMENDATION 2. A

That the increases in pension benefits outlined in this report be approved.

RECOMMENDATION 3. A

That the recommendations re applicants to retire on pension listed in this report be approved.

The Chairman of the Pension Board consulted with Dr. R. G. MacMillan and they feel that Overture #8 would be difficult to administer because of the extent of record keeping involved and the lack of available staff, in addition to the fact that other more suitable avenues are available to the individual as indicated in the body of the report.

RECOMMENDATION 4. A

That the prayer of Overture #8 be not granted.

ACTUARIAL REPORT

This report is the second to be made since the new pension plan came into effect on 1 January 1974. It deals with the financial situation of the combined funds of the old and new plans as at 31 December 1977, three years after the first valuation.

1. *Benefits*

On retirement at age 68 or more, the member's own benefits for service prior to 1 January 1974 are now 'frozen', at \$60 annual pension for each year of pensionable service before that date, together with a paid-up share of the \$250 annual pension (or multiple) that the member was buying with his/her own annual premiums.

Normal retirement is now, however, set at age 65 under the new plan; a member retiring then is entitled to 82% of the paid-up share of the \$250, and \$51 in lieu of \$60. The figure of \$51 is 82% of \$50, plus a bonus of \$10.

The basic benefit for service after 1973 is an annual pension equal to 2% of the member's total contributing pensionable income from 1 January 1974 to retirement. This becomes available at age 65 or at earlier disability. For retirement in good health between ages 60 and 65, the basic pension is reduced by 0.5% for each month short of age 65. The same treatment applies to the \$51 units and the reduced share of the \$250 described in the preceding paragraph. Provision is also made for postponed retirement with corresponding actuarial increases, but they are applied only to the frozen benefits under the old plan.

The surviving spouse's basic pension is 60% of the member's combined basic benefit, or \$1,365 per annum if greater. These amounts are subject to an actuarial reduction if the spouse is more than 10 years younger than the member. For surviving children, benefits are independent of the member's earnings. The rate per child decreases with each of the first four children.

Old Age Security pensions, and any benefits available from the Canada Pension Plan, are additional to all benefits from the Presbyterian plans.

2. *Data Analysis*

An individual card was examined for each pensioner, surviving spouse, and member, who had been connected with either the old or new plan at any time during the three years ended 31 December 1977.

For this evaluation, the necessary tabulating of the data about the non-retired members as at the end of 1977 was carried out by the office staff of the Church at less cost than an outside agency would have charged.

(a) *Retired Members*

The necessary tabulations for retired members and widows were done by us. Their movement is summarized in the following table:

The 87 total actual terminations during the six years 1972-1977 did not exceed the 87.5 deaths expected on our most recently adopted mortality basis. There is therefore no indication of any long-term safety margin in that basis. Indeed, it agrees fairly closely with the mortality basis now used by the Canada Life Assurance Company in computing its current single premium rates for immediate purchases of additional benefits. Our deferred life annuities for valuation purposes, however, have been calculated on only a 6% per annum interest basis; this provides a substantial safety margin so long as Canada Life's purchase rates are based on much higher 'new money' rates, such as 9½%.

(b) *Non-retired Members' Mortality and Termination Rates*

We decided to continue to use in this valuation the same annuity values for prospective pensioners and their widows as we used in the 1974 valuation. These were based on the *a*(55) Ultimate Mortality Tables, reduced in age by two years for each sex, with each member assumed to have a spouse four years younger at the valuation date. A detailed study of the actual differences in age between spouses at the end of 1977 showed an average difference of less than two years for members under age 40, slightly over two years between ages 40 and 55, and 3.2 years for those over age 55, with an average for all ages of 2.3 years.

Our assumption of a uniform difference of four years is therefore conservative. It can be interpreted, however, as an assumed difference of three years, with the *a*(55) age for the spouse reduced a further year, e.g., a wife aged 49 is thus credited with the mortality rates (or longevity) of a woman aged 46 in the *a*(55) tables. The latter mortality assumption is, we believe, closer to the basis now used by the Canada Life Assurance Co. for females than the *a*(55) rates reduced by only two years of age, (e.g., 49 - 2 = 47).

As in the 1974 valuation, we have again assumed no terminations of membership before age 65 except by death or disablement.

(c) *Children*

A detailed study of the numbers of eligible children of members aged 38 to 51 at the end of 1977 has enabled us to reduce our 1974 assumptions about the average numbers to be expected in this range of ages in the future. The average number now rises to a maximum of 2.5 children per member at age 45 and declines thereafter.

3. Pensionable Salaries

Of the 636 members who made some contribution during the year 1977, there were 573 who contributed for the full year. The annual salaries on which they contributed were very flat in the range of ages above 40, fluctuating only a few hundred dollars about an average of \$10,760. The average below age 40 was \$9,639 and the average for all ages was \$10,537.

As in the 1974 valuation we have again projected each of the 636 contributing members' current salary forward to retirement at an annual compound rate of 3.92% along with the same valuation interest rate of 6% per annum. This combination assumes that future long-run investment earnings will grow at a compound rate 2% per annum higher than future salary growth rates.

Besides the 636 who made some contribution in 1977 there were a further 78 who made no contribution in 1977. Although some of 78 were new ministers who might not yet be aware of the pension plan, 56 of them were over age 45. We have not recognized any contingent liability for any *future* service that these 78 ministers may render to the Canadian Church, nor any contingent asset for any *future* contributions that may be made on their behalf. We have of course included the pension credits that they have already accumulated, under both the old and new plans, in calculating contingent liabilities for service prior to 1978.

In summary, a full year's contribution in 1977 was made by only 573 out of 714 persons with credit in the fund. Each one of the remaining 141 who did in fact serve the Church for the full year should be reminded that his/her pension credit for the year is determined by his/her actual contribution for the year. If this important relationship is ignored, one can expect grief for all concerned when such a member reaches retirement age with unnecessarily small pension credits.

4. Investment Earnings

The gross annual rates earned on the market values of the fund during the past three years have been 8.52%, 7.90%, and 8.01%, in 1975, 1976, and 1977 respectively. These rates do not include gains realized on sale of securities, nor Canada Life Assurance Company management charges. Including these adjustments changes the three rates to 8.46%, 7.94%, and 8.34% respectively.

For this valuation we have continued to assume a long-range average interest rate of 6% per annum. If we had assumed a higher rate, say 7½%, along with a correspondingly higher growth rate for future salaries, say 5.39% per annum, the effects on our actuarial balance sheet would have been to preserve the same contingent asset value of future contributions but to reduce the contingent liability value of benefits, thereby producing a greater actuarial surplus than the \$2,947,000 shown. This surplus figure already permits substantial improvements in benefits for past service to be made now. We therefore deemed it best to delay the introduction of a higher valuation interest rate till a later valuation, in order to maintain a fairly regular sequence of improvements at successive valuations in the future.

5. Contributions

Under the new plan the member contributes 4% of his/her pensionable income. The Church also contributes 4% of the member's pensionable income from its total Budget. In addition, each congregation deducts from the amount raised for all its congregational purposes its mortgage or other capital charges, and then contributes 2% of the net amount to the pension fund. It is estimated that this is equivalent to 6% of the members' total pensionable incomes. For a member not employed by a congregation, the employer contributes 10% of the member's pensionable income.

During the year 1977 contributions from the foregoing sources in respect of members of the plan totalled \$913,636, which is comparable with 14% of the full year's pensionable salaries for the 636 contributors during 1977, estimated at \$936,000 (or \$855,600 for 583 under age 65).

6. Administrative Expenses

To cover future non-investment expenses in respect of present members we again show a contingent liability of 0.45% of their future pensionable incomes. This assumes initial annual expenses of about \$28,000.

7. Actuarial Balance Sheet

Based on the benefit rules and data supplied to us as of the end of 1977, and on the actuarial assumptions described above and an assumed 14% contribution rate, we find the following actuarial balance sheet.

As in each of the preceding three valuations, the actuarial balance sheet again shows a substantial surplus. Following the previous valuations, benefits were increased so as to use up much of the disclosed surplus.

The most recent plan improvements have been the increases in maximum annual pensionable salaries under the new plan from \$10,000 to \$13,000, and in the annual pension for each year of service before 1974 from \$41 to \$51 at age 65 (\$60 at age 68), along with proportional increases in spouse's benefits and an extra \$2 per month for each dependent child (only \$1 for fourth and later children).

The \$51 means, however, that ministers who will retire at the normal age of 65 under the new rules will still be entitled to only \$4.25 per month for each year of service prior to 1 January 1974. This is very much less than the \$17.50 per month credited for the year 1977 to an average member with a pensionable salary of \$10,500 per annum.

8. Recommendations

Since the benefits for future service under the new plan represent such a marked improvement over the old plan units, we continue to believe that it is desirable to concentrate the distribution of surplus on improving the benefits for those persons with service under the old plan. Accordingly we propose:

- (a) a flat addition of \$60 per month to be continued at \$36 per month to the surviving spouse, to be paid from 1 January 1978 to each minister drawing pension at that date, with the \$60 to be reduced by \$0.30 for each month that his retirement age was below 65, and perhaps reduced for those pensioners with only a short service in the Canadian Church;
- (b) a similar addition of \$36 per month to each widow drawing pension at that date, regardless of her husband's retirement age or his age at death in service;

(c) an increase of \$20 (from \$51 to \$71) in the annual pension for each year of service rendered before 1974 by an active member (not yet retired on 1 January 1978), with a corresponding increase of \$12 in his spouse's possible pension.

(d) an increase of at least 25% in the benefit scales for dependent children.

At the current rates charged by the Canada Life Assurance Co. (September, 1978), the single premium costs of item (a) with no reduction, and of (b), would have been about \$870,000 and \$420,000 respectively. Hence the adoption of (a) with some reduction, along with (b), both payable from 1 January 1978, would have used up less than \$1,290,000 of the funds on hand at that time. If payments were not made for the early months of 1978, the cost would of course be smaller.

The adoption of item (c) would add \$1,316,000 to our actuarial value of benefits in respect of the old plan, and item (d) would add some \$17,000 (for a 25% rise). Adoption of (a), (b), (c), and (d) would therefore have reduced the \$2,947,000 actuarial surplus by at most \$2,623,000, leaving at least \$324,000, which would be 4.4% of the \$7.3 million remaining on hand.

It might also be deemed desirable to allocate some of the actuarial surplus to improving the benefits under the new plan. An increase of, say, 10% of the pension earned during the four years 1974 to 1977 would have added \$232,700 to the contingent liabilities, further reducing the actuarial surplus to about \$91,000, which would have been less than 1.3% of the \$7.3 million net funds.

We believe that the actuarial surplus ought not to be allowed to fall much below \$300,000, however, since the assets on hand at the end of 1977 included shares of stock, which have been assigned their full market value of \$2,253,000 in our actuarial balance sheet. A downward swing of 14% in their market value would have therefore eliminated \$315,000 of the disclosed actuarial surplus. While it is true that the market swing since the end of 1977 has in fact been up (not down), it is equally true that no one now knows where the stock market will be at the end of 1980. At that time the new plan will have been in operation for seven years, and an increase in its benefits will likely be more justifiable then.

An alternative to (a) and (b) would be to grant just the same increase as (c) to the present pensioners and their spouses, and to present widows. We expect that the purchase costs would not be greater than those shown above, since it looks unlikely that the existing pensioners have an average service before 1974 of as much as 36 years ($36 \times \$20 = 12 \times \60), assuming that no more than 40 such years would be credited to any one member.

The advantage of this alternative is the fact that it automatically deals with the question of how much bonus should be granted to those pensioners with very short service in Canada. Otherwise, as indicated in (a), the \$60 per month could be reduced by either \$3.00 for each year short of 20 years, or \$2.50 for each year short of 24 years, or \$2.00 for each year short of 30.

A real advantage of (a) and (b) is their much faster implementing. The Church's pension staff will not have to dig out and check the years of service before 1974 that were actually credited to each pensioner (except for those few with, say, less than 20 years), and then have the calculation approved by the Pension Board; to check the pre-1974 service actually credited for each of 161 pensioners and 142 widows could take a long time. In favour of the flat bonus in (a) and (b), it can also be argued that the greater part of the actuarial surplus does not arise from individual congregations but instead from the Church as a whole, and therefore that part can be equitably distributed without precise regard to the individual minister's length of service.

Proposals (a) and (b) relate only to persons already drawing pensions on 1 January 1975. It may be found that some of the persons whose pensions have started in 1978 after that date will not receive as large a bonus under proposal (c) as they would have done under (a) or (b). In such 1978 cases it seems fair to grant the better of the two formulae. We believe that this will not add significantly to our cost estimates. For persons starting to draw benefits in 1979 or later, however, there will not be the same need to compare the two bonus formulae, since their basic pensions will be considerably higher than current basic pensions.

9. Concluding Remarks

Throughout this valuation we have assumed that a member retiring at age 65 will actually be credited with \$51 annual pension for each year of service before 1974, as stated in Section 8(b) of the Plan. This figure was derived by adding \$10 to 82% of the previous \$50 unit available on retirement at age 68.

It appears, however, that some recent pension calculations have in effect used a figure of only \$49.20, derived by deducting 18% from the new \$60 unit available at age 68. Although the difference between \$51.00 and \$49.20 is only 15¢ per month for each year of prior service, present pensioners would no doubt be pleased to receive the extra four to six dollars per month. We believe that such an adjustment should be made along with the bonuses proposed under (a), (b), or (c).

Alternatively, the Board could endorse the \$49.20 figure by amending Section 8(b) of the Plan to bring it into conformity with the current practice.

In closing, we wish to express our sincere thanks to the administrative staff of the Church, who have worked hard, cheerfully, and accurately, to provide the great variety of data needed for this investigation.

THE REPORT OF THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH BUILDING CORPORATION TO THE 105TH GENERAL ASSEMBLY

To the Venerable the 105th General Assembly:

The Building Corporation continues to serve the Church by assisting Congregations, Presbyteries, Synods and Boards to arrange loans at lower rates of interest and, in accordance with the instructions of the 102nd General Assembly, assists the retired servants of the Church in securing housing accommodation.

During the year the Corporation approved guaranteed bank loans for: The Synod of Hamilton and London for Kintail Camp, First Church, Lower Sackville, N.S., White Oaks Church, Mississauga, Ont., Brant Hills Church, Burlington, Ont., Centennial Church, Calgary, Alta., Hopedale Church, Oakville, Ont., and St. Timothy's Church, Ajax, Ontario.

We are pleased to report that the congregation of Norman Kennedy Presbyterian Church, Regina, Sask., discharged its bank loan this year.

We note with satisfaction that congregations which have borrowed through the Corporation are reducing their loans. It is also gratifying to report that the arrears on payments by our congregations was reduced to \$17,236. as at December 31, 1978. The mortgages were reduced by \$272,716. while guaranteed bank loans increased by \$174,483. This increase in bank loans and the increased number of applications approved this year indicates a renewed vigour in our church as it is reflected in the number of new church buildings and expansion programs to present buildings now taking place.

The housing program has involved us with a number of ministers nearing retirement this year and one additional application has been approved for housing accommodation. We again record our thanks to Mrs. William Ewing of Vankleek Hill, Ont., Mrs. Grace Bruner, The Rev. J. D. Gordon, B.A., Mr. Gordon Brown of Brantford, Ont., and Mr. Howard Elliott of Jarvis, Ont., for their assistance to the Corporation in helping our retired ministers.

We have been encouraged this year by receiving assurances from the congregation of St. Giles-Kingsway, Islington, Ont., and Knox, Oakville, Ont., that each of them will loan the Corporation the sum of \$20,000. at a low rate of interest to assist the housing program for the retired servants of our Church. We record our thanks to the ministers, Dr. W. J. Adamson and The Rev. R. C. Taylor, B.D., and the Trustees of each congregation for their interest and co-operation.

We express our appreciation to Mr. A. S. Aitken of Calgary, Alta., whose term as a Director expires this year. Mr. Aitken was a Director of the Synod Corporation of Alberta and since 1968 has been a Director of the Building Corporation.

It is with deep regret we record the death of a great churchman and one of our Directors, Dr. G. Deane Johnston, M.B.E. Dr. Johnston gave outstanding leadership in church extension within the Synod of Hamilton and London and was a Director of the Synod Corporation before becoming a Director of this Corporation. His enthusiasm, wise counsel and deep concern will be greatly missed. We express our sincere sympathy to his wife and family.

The Corporation desires to help ministers, missionaries and deaconesses who are facing difficulties as they near retirement. Individuals and Presbyteries are invited to bring retirement problems to the attention of the General Manager.

If we are to provide adequately for our retired Ministers, gifts in the form of money or real estate are necessary and the Directors would be grateful for any assistance from individuals or Presbyteries. The need in 1979 may be greater than our present resources.

Nominations for Directors

The by-laws of the Corporation provide that "Directors shall be elected annually by The General Assembly from nominees of the Directors." We, therefore, submit the following recommendations:

RECOMMENDATION No. 1. A

That the Hon. R.J.H. Stanbury, Q.C., The Hon. G. A. McGillivray, Mrs. Laura S. Kilgour, LL.B., Mr. R. R. Merifield, Q.C., Dr. J. D. Mundie be elected Directors of the Corporation for the next four year term.

RECOMMENDATION No. 2. A

That Dr. A. L. MacKay be elected a Director of the Corporation for the next two year term.

RECOMMENDATION No. 3. A

That congregations and individuals be encouraged to assist The Presbyterian Church Building Corporation in every way possible in its program on behalf of the whole church to help ministers, missionaries, deaconesses and their spouses to secure housing accommodation at the time of retirement.

RECOMMENDATION No. 4. A

That full time servants of our church be urged to consider carefully the advantages of the Registered Retirement Savings Plans and the Registered Home Ownership Savings Plans and take advantage of the programs most suitable to their individual needs in long range planning for their retirement.

THE PRESBYTERIAN RECORD

To the Venerable the 105th General Assembly:

Two subjects have been of major significance this past year, the cost and the contents of The Record.

The 104th General Assembly adopted a motion that the Administrative Council have authority to issue, after consultation with The Record Committee, that the subscription rates be increased as necessary, to allow The Record to become self-supporting.

The outcome was an increase in the annual subscription of One Dollar within the Every Home Plan and individual subscriptions. There is also an increase in advertising rates that are more in line with those of similar types of publications.

Increased revenue has made it possible to reduce the General Assembly 1978 grant of \$71,105.00 to \$26,215.00 in 1980. This significant reduction in grant from the Budget must be encouraging to the subscribers, as well as The Record staff and committee.

This saving of financial resources to the Church becomes even more meaningful when it is realized the Editorial and Circulation staff, in conjunction with the committee, do not plan to request an increase in subscriptions *this* year, despite higher costs beyond our control, which include postage, paper, and printing.

Advertising space requests continue to increase even although we have refused lucrative business that does not meet with our advertising policy.

Less than twenty percent of our congregations are not in the Every Home Plan. Within this group, we have a fair number of individual subscribers. We will contact directly individuals who are members of congregations formerly in the Every Home Plan and invite them to become subscribers.

Should The Record be only a house organ providing information and subjects of a non-controversial nature? Should it be, in addition to these essentials, a forum for diverse theological and social concepts? The Record committee supports the Editor in the latter policy and we believe this is in accordance with the wishes of the majority of readers. Equal opportunity for contrary ideas, ethical standards, minority and majority rights are respected.

Whatever one feels about The Record and its present policy, the most effective way to use it is to participate, to write, to persuade others to do so, and to encourage non-subscribers to read it and do the same.

The Record staff is few in number but each one is highly competent and we are grateful for their dedication.

We wish to express appreciation to Miss Helen Allen, convener for nine of her twelve years on the committee, and other members of the committee who are not eligible for re-election this year.

RECOMMENDATION No. 1. A

That presbyteries and congregations continue to assist "The Record" to become self-supporting through The Every Home Plan and individual subscribers.

REPORT OF ST. ANDREW'S HALL, VANCOUVER, B.C.

To the Venerable the 105th General Assembly:

The Board of Management wish to report a challenging and stimulating year as stewards of our Presbyterian residence at the University of British Columbia. There were three matters, aside from routine responsibilities, that the General Assembly might wish to take note of. Firstly, the Board was able to grant the Dean, the Rev. Dr. John A. Ross, a sabbatical that he might complete the writing of a book. The leave extended from September 1st, 1978 to April 30th, 1979. The Rev. David A. Stewart has very ably functioned as Acting Dean — a ministry for which students, staff and Board are most thankful.

Secondly, the Board is undertaking a major renovation of the facilities during August 1979. The buildings are now twenty years old and much in need of refurbishing and updating of original equipment.

Lastly, the matter of the relationship of our church to the Vancouver School of Theology has occupied our attentions considerably. The Board wish to express to the General Assembly that they are sympathetic to The Presbyterian Church in Canada establishing a new relationship to the VST. To that end the following motion was passed at the February 3rd meeting of the Board: "Providing The Presbyterian Church in Canada protect the tangible and intangible assets entrusted

to the Board of Management of St. Andrew's Hall, we the Board are not opposed to providing an opportunity for students for the ministry of The Presbyterian Church in Canada to attend an accredited theological institute such as the Vancouver School of Theology."

SPECIAL COMMITTEE RE: NATIONAL UNITY

The 104th General Assembly (1978) instructed its Moderator to appoint a small committee to review progress on certain recommendations made by the Special Committee Re National Unity, and to report to the 105th General Assembly. The Moderator appointed: Mr. William R. Russell, Convener, Dr. Donald J. M. Corbett and Mr. John Cerini, Q.C.

Although the committee has not met during the year, the Convener wishes to report that:

- (1) the theological statement on National Unity, as approved by the 104th General Assembly, has been published in pamphlet form in both English and French, and has been made widely available, without charge, to Presbyterians across Canada;
- (2) the matter of "appropriate strategies, personnel and funds" in support of French reformed work in the Province of Quebec has continued throughout the year among representatives of the Board of World Mission, the Synod of Quebec and Eastern Ontario, and the Presbyteries of Montreal and Quebec — with particular attention being given to the advisability of establishing a French-language presbytery within the Province of Quebec, or of creating some other structure to organize and oversee French work there;
- (3) the matter of "French language communications capacity" for Church Offices is presently being actively considered on an ecumenically-shared basis through the "French-English Relations Taskforce" of the Canadian Council of Churches — involving the Convener, the Principal Clerk of the Assembly, Dr. Donald MacDonald, and Mr. David T. Craig, as representatives of The Presbyterian Church in Canada;
- (4) other suggestions forwarded by the Special Committee on National Unity to the Administrative Council, the General Assembly's Committee to Nominate, the Board of World Mission, the Presbyterian Record, and the Presbyterian College, are in the process of implementation or are still under active consideration.

In view of the fact that this small committee has not met this year, and that the various matters referred to it are now in the hands of other standing boards or committees, it is recommended that:

RECOMMENDATION No. 1. C
the special committee be discharged;

RECOMMENDATION No. 2. C
the funds remaining from the special allocation provided by the 103rd General Assembly be released to the general funds of The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

**REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON OVERTURE #21
RE: LICENSING (A & P 1977 p. 426)**

The Special Committee on Overture #21, 1977 has met and expresses its gratitude to the Presbyteries who replied to its initial re-draft of sections 205-212 (B. of F.), sent down to them for study and report by the 104th General Assembly. The Committee has studied carefully each reply and where suggestions for improvement were made, has given these the fullest consideration. Many of them have been incorporated into this draft now recommended to be sent down under The Barrier Act with a view to becoming the law of the church.

In considering this remit, the Presbyteries will observe that it does not differ substantially from the initial draft sent down in 1978. However, Presbyterian suggestions have helped the Committee to throw light on what may have been too little clear and to enable the canons to meet present day situations. The canons are arranged in a logical order and are so written as to apply to men or women. Presbyteries are asked to note that no order of precedence is being suggested in 205(a) which refers to the licensing presbyteries. The time honoured phrase 'The Presbytery of the Bounds' has been clarified to read 'The Presbytery in which the College is situate'. However, by the requiring of transmission of the application through the Presbytery in which the College is situate, it alerts that Presbytery at an early date as to the students of the graduating year for which it may become responsible to take on trials for license.

The present re-draft has eliminated a canon that refers to students who have been assigned a modified course by the Board of Education and approved by the General Assembly since the Committee regards such a student as coming under the opening words of 205(a): 'Any student in theology and candidate for the ministry . . . etc.' The question has also been posed for the committee regarding the possibility of a student applying for trials and licensure at some time after the December 31st prior to graduation 205(a). While the canons are written with a view to normal practice and procedure, i.e., that the student would seek licensure within a short time after graduation in order to proceed to ordination and settlement, there is nothing in them to prevent a student who has the necessary qualifications from applying at any later time. The student would, of course, be required to await the good pleasure of the Presbytery to which he applies in accordance with 205(a) as to the trials and service of licensure.

In the matter of an appeal procedure if the trials are not sustained (cf. 207), the Committee feels that some Board of the Church such as the Board of Ministry might take this under consideration and in the meantime the applicant has recourse to the existing appeal legislation.

Lastly, the Committee has added the possibility of ordination by a Presbytery other than the licensing Presbytery or the Presbytery to which the applicant has been appointed, provided that the permission of the applicable Presbytery above be obtained.

RECOMMENDATION 1. A

That the re-draft, herein appended below and numbered 205-210 replace the present sections 205-212 Book of Forms, and the 105th General Assembly remit this draft to the Presbyteries under the Barrier Act with a view to it becoming the law of the Church.

RECOMMENDATION 2. A

That the Board of Ministry consider an appeal procedure for students after the conditions of 207 of the draft have been met.

RECOMMENDATION 3. A

That the committee be discharged.

Re-Draft: Sections 205-212 Book of Forms

- 205 (a) Any student of theology and candidate for the ministry of The Presbyterian Church in Canada, and studying in one of our Church's Theological Colleges may, on application in writing to the Clerk of Presbytery before the December 31st prior to graduation, be taken on trials for license by:
1. The Presbytery in which the College is situate, or
 2. The Presbytery of most recent certification, if the latter has maintained oversight for two summers or two years, or
 3. The Presbytery of first certification.
- Such application shall be transmitted to or through the clerk of the Presbytery in which the College is situate. If application for trials is not made elsewhere or is not acted upon, the Presbytery in which the College is situate shall take the applicant on trials for license. If the Presbytery to which application is made deem it expedient and with the request and consent of the applicant and for good cause shown, the application and all relevant documents shall be transferred to another Presbytery. It is the responsibility of the applicant to ensure that the application is dealt with in accordance with the above regulations.
- 205 (b) If the applicant for licensure has studied wholly in a theological College other than one of this Church's Theological Colleges or is currently in the final year in such a college, application shall be made by the Presbytery through the Board of Education to the General Assembly for permission to take such on trials for license. The applicant will submit official transcripts of courses taken with the application and the Board of Education will satisfy itself through reference of these to the senate of one of our Theological Colleges that the course of studies meets the theological prescription and perspective of this Church. In cases of such applicants, the Presbytery applying to take on trials for license is required to circularize the Presbyteries to this effect not less than two clear months previous to the meeting of the Assembly.
- 206 (a) The Presbytery may begin examination of applicants at any time after application is received. In the trials, the Presbytery shall make careful enquiry as to the applicant's personal religion, motivation and aptitude for the ministry, based on the record, academic and practical of the applicant, and on interview and examination. It may, with the applicant's permission, avail itself of such evaluative statements as are forthcoming from other agencies and bodies of the Church. Presbyteries may conduct trials for license, if desired, through a Committee, but members of the court may state their views at any stage before the vote to sustain the trials is taken.
- (b) The trials for licensure shall embrace the elected Biblical language and the core subjects outlined in the report of the Committee on the Structure of Theological Education (Acts and Proceedings 1969, p. 44; 352), as well as the applicant's practical skills. But the Presbytery may accept the testamur of the College as proof of proficiency in these matters and dispense with examination in any or all of these subjects. If the Presbytery sets additional examinations in these subjects, it may assign primary responsibility for examination in each area to particular members of the court.
- (c) Licensure shall take place only after certification from the Senate of one of this Church's Theological Colleges that;
1. The applicant has completed the course prescribed or assigned or approved by this Church.
 2. The applicant has given satisfactory evidence of the requisite practical gifts and skills of the Ministry, and
 3. The applicant's character and conduct are suitable to the position of a candidate for the Ministry.
- An applicant having completed studies in a college other than one of this Church shall present an equivalent certificate from that Theological College.

- 207 If the trials are not sustained, Presbytery may prescribe new trials and initiate them after a period of not less than three months has elapsed, or otherwise dispose of the case as it sees fit. The applicant remains under the care of the Presbytery unless transferred to another Presbytery for trials.
- 208 If the trials are sustained, the Presbytery proceeds to license the applicant in the following manner:
1. The questions prescribed for license (Section 411) and a further question as to willingness to sign the formula when called upon to do so are put to the applicant. Satisfactory answers being given.
 2. The Moderator engages in prayer, and then addresses the applicant in words to the following effect: "In the name of the Lord Jesus Christ, the only King and Head of the Church, and by authority of this Presbytery, I license you to preach the gospel within its bounds, or wherever God in His Providence may order your lot". The Moderator then gives counsel in suitable terms, and the clerk is instructed to give the applicant an extract of license.
- 209 An applicant, under trials for license, may, for good cause shown be transferred to another Presbytery at any stage of the same.
- 210 In the event of an appointment under the Board of World Mission having been received and accepted, the applicant may, on being licensed, also be ordained as a minister of The Presbyterian Church in Canada by the Presbytery to which the applicant is appointed, or the licensing Presbytery or by another Presbytery upon permission being obtained so to do from the applicable Presbytery above.

I AND 30, 1978, RE: PRINCIPAL CLERK AND
DEPUTY CLERKS OF GENERAL ASSEMBLY.
(cf. A. & P. 1978, pp. 57, 74, 465, 476)**

To the Venerable the 105th General Assembly:

The Special Committee met several times and considered matters pertaining to the offices of the Principal and Deputy Clerks of Assembly. The Committee interviewed Dr. MacDonald, Dr. Bean, and Dr. Lowry and gratefully acknowledge the input of these gentlemen to our discussions.

The members of the Committee sensed concern in the Church regarding the method of appointment and terms of reference of the offices and sought to address themselves to these matters in responsible fashion.

OVERTURE NO. 1

This Overture has to do with the Principal Clerk and concern is implied regarding the work-load of the office and the method of appointment.

It is the opinion of the Committee that the Overture overstates the power of the office of Principal Clerk but is in agreement that the concern regarding the work-load was valid at the time. This concern has now been answered to a significant degree by the appointment of an Assistant to the Principal Clerk and in our opinion the work-load has returned to a reasonable level. In our opinion, the participation of the present Principal Clerk in ecumenical interests is by personal choice, is thoroughly enjoyed, and we are not of a mind to interfere in any way — not even by subtle suggestion that he withdraw from any of them.

Dr. MacDonald is at present the Secretary of the Administrative Council. It should be noted in passing that by present regulations, which may be changed without reference to the Barrier Act, the Secretary must be a Clerk of Assembly. Thus, the Principal Clerk may be, but is not necessarily, the Secretary of the Administrative

Council. In general, this Committee feels that where possible, it is a desirable situation for the Principal Clerk to be the Secretary of the Administrative Council.

As a Committee, we were surprised to learn that Dr. MacDonald's total stipend is paid as Secretary of the Administrative Council. There appears to be no provision in the present situation for a stipend as Principal Clerk. This matter may be outside our terms of reference but we are recommending that Assembly request the Administrative Council to give serious study to the question of the stipend of a Principal Clerk who is not the Secretary of the Council.

Our major area of discussion as a Committee centered around the question of the appointment to the position of Principal Clerk. While we reject the idea of electing the Principal Clerk by the same procedure as our Moderators are elected, we are in complete agreement that in the event of a vacancy nominations for the office should be sought from Presbyteries. We reject as well the concept of automatic succession from Deputy to Principal Clerk believing that there is sufficient difference between the two that a call to one must not necessarily be construed as a call to the other, though in the wisdom of the Church this may at times be the case.

We are presenting recommendations regarding the appointment of the Principal Clerk; suggested interim procedures in an emergency; and related matters.

We therefore recommend that the prayer of Overture No. 1 (1978) be granted in the following terms:

RECOMMENDATION No. 1. C

That when in the ordinary course of events a resignation from the Office of Principal Clerk is accepted by General Assembly, the Assembly shall refer the matter to the Administrative Council, which shall have the responsibility of seeking nominations from Presbyteries and after due process, to recommend an appointment for confirmation to General Assembly.

RECOMMENDATION No. 2. A

That the right of succession to the Principal Clerkship by seniority appointment as a Clerk (cf. A & P 1971, p. 25) be rescinded, it being understood that this does not preclude the possibility of a Deputy Clerk becoming the Principal Clerk.

RECOMMENDATION No. 3. A

That in an emergency situation where the office of Principal Clerk becomes vacant through death or by resignation, a Committee of the Administrative Council (including Chairmen of the Major Boards, together with the Clerks of the three Central Synods), be empowered to make a temporary appointment, who may or may not act as Secretary of the Administrative Council, until the procedure outlined in Recommendation 1 can be implemented by the ensuing Assembly.

RECOMMENDATION No. 4. A

That the Administrative Council be requested to give serious study to the question of an adequate stipend for a Principal Clerk who is not the Secretary of the Council.

OVERTURE NO. 30

This Overture has to do with the appointment of Deputy Clerks of General Assembly.

Our Committee gave serious consideration to the suggestion of term appointments for Deputy Clerks but came to the conclusion that this would not only be cumbersome but also could cause excellent possible candidates to decline appointment. As in Overture No. 1 we were in agreement in rejecting the idea that Deputy Clerks be elected following the present procedure used for the election of Moderators of General Assembly. We were also agreed in opposing the concept of automatic succession from a Deputy to Principal Clerk while fully recognizing that this could be possible and desirable. It became the consensus of the Committee that the prime concern should be the method of election to office and that this method be identical to that followed in the appointment of a Principal Clerk.

We therefore recommend that the prayer of Overture No. 30 (1978) be granted in the following terms:

RECOMMENDATION No. 5. A

That in filling a vacancy in the office of Deputy Clerk the same procedure be followed as that which takes place in the appointment of a Principal Clerk.

Your committee has met three times and all members who were absent have much appreciated the cassette recordings of the deliberations and the input of professionals with special skills in personality and psychological assessment.

RECOMMENDATION No. 1. A

That Mr. Robert Dickie be added to the Committee.

RECOMMENDATION No. 2. C

That the Committee be continued.

**REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY, (E.D.)
FOR 1978.**

To the Venerable the 105th General Assembly:

The Executive of the Woman's Missionary Society, (E.D.) respectfully submits the following report for the year 1978.

The Executive met for regular meetings during the year. The Annual Meeting was held at St. James' Presbyterian Church, Truro, Nova Scotia, September 19-21, 1978. We were privileged to have Dr. Margaret Kennedy, now retired from her Missionary service in India of almost forty years, as guest speaker. After taking part in the Annual Meeting, Dr. Kennedy visited the eight Presbyteries, taking part in Fall Rallies and Sunday Services, speaking at Children's and Youth Groups.

The Reverend Donald MacKay, from Nigeria, who has served for ten years overseas (in Italy and Nigeria) under the B.W.M., and who is now serving as a Minister in a home Church in Hopewell, Nova Scotia, thanked the E.D. for their support in his work in Port Harcourt and asked for prayers for new Missionaries in Nigeria.

The Reverend Gerald Sarcen, of Moncton, spoke on behalf of the Second Century Advance for Christ. He urged W.M.S. Members to support this important project.

Dr. Alex. MacSween, B.W.M. Secretary for Canada Mission, presented a panorama of Canada Mission with his beautiful coloured slides.

We are pleased to have Mrs. Priscilla Anderson represent the W.M.S. (E.D.) at the 70th Anniversary celebration of the KCCJ.

We are pleased to report that we now have three deaconesses working in the E.D. area: Two under the appointment of the B.W.M., and one appointed by the Eastern Division. We feel that we are indeed fortunate to have Miss Christine Shaw (B.W.M.) as Education Consultant for Prince Edward Island. Her emphasis will be on Christian and Mission Education. Miss June Pratt (B.W.M.) is Christian Education Worker for Halifax – Lunenburg Presbytery and Camp Geddie. Miss Charlotte Brown (W.M.S. – E.D.), Christian and Mission Education Worker, will serve areas without other deaconesses.

Miss Mary Nichol, on furlough from Nepal, visited the eight Presbyteries, attending Fall Rallies, taking part in Sunday Services, and speaking at Children's and Youth Groups.

The Children's Work report is encouraging; there is an increase both in the number of Groups and the membership. The film strip, "Caribbean Cross-Currents", was very well received. The Girls' Work Secretary reports that the CGIT program is flourishing.

During the year, eleven issues of "The Presbyterian Message" were published. The Editorial Committee has endeavoured to fulfill the four-fold function of "The Presbyterian Message": to provide information, i.e., Mission News; Meditations and Worship resources; also News and Reports of E.D. events. The Editor of the Message is Mrs. John Posno.

The Mission Study on "Contemporary China" was introduced at the Annual Meeting.

The 102nd Annual Meeting of the W.M.S. (E.D.) agreed to undertake the publishing of the Reverend R.K. Anderson's book, "My Dear Redeemer's Praise", the Life of Luther L. Young, D.D.

The Reverend W.J.O. Isaac, Superintendent of Mission, contributed to the success of our Meetings. Dr. A.E. Morrison joined us on Mission Night.

Three members of the Eastern Division Executive are representatives on the Board of World Mission, and our Mission Secretary, Miss Alice Condon, is a member of the B.W.M. and various Committees. Miss Jessie Craise, Education Convener, is a member of the Board of Congregational Life.

**REPORT OF THE WOMEN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY
WESTERN DIVISION**

To the Venerable the 105th General Assembly:

The Council Executive of the Women's Missionary Society, W. D. respectfully submits the following report of the Society's work for the year 1978.

Mission Education and leadership training have been priorities with the Society in 1978. Resource Materials have been prepared and/or recommended for use of Adult, Youth and Children's groups. Much time was spent on preparing and promoting materials related to the theme "Contemporary China" for all age groups.

A leadership event "Designs for Leadership" was held in June for 54 leaders in the three Central Synodicals, encouraging these leaders to in turn give help and leadership to local groups.

The Glad Tidings, the official magazine of the Society provided articles and resource lists related to mission activities and kept readers informed about the work in which churches are involved in various parts of the world. Council approved raising the subscription price for the magazine to \$2.00 effective January 1979.

Deputation was arranged in cooperation with the Board of World Mission with special sessions of deputation arranged in January for Miss Mavis Hyndman in British Columbia Synodical and in October for Dr. Margaret Kennedy in the three Central Synodicals.

Area Educational Consultants continued to give help in leadership training, planning programmes and choosing resources to leaders in local congregations and executive and committee members at Presbytery/Presbyterial and Synod/Synodical levels.

The Society works cooperatively with the Board of Congregational Life and the Board of World Mission. Area Educational Consultants serve as official representatives of the Board of Congregational Life while National Staff members are considered Associate Staff of the Board of Congregational Life. Two representatives of the Society are on the Board of Congregational Life. The Board of Congregational Life contributes \$6,000 to the travel expenses of Educational Consultants. In 1978 the Society contributed \$375,000 to the Board of World Mission, appointed 9 women to serve on the Board of World Mission and its various committees. Both of these Boards have representatives on Council, Council Executive and the Education Committee of the Society.

The Annual Council Meeting was held in May when Miss I. T. Hunter was elected as President. Council Executive met eight times during 1978 to receive reports of its various committees and deal with their recommendations. On reviewing the structure of sub-committees of the Education Committee a change in structure from Sub-Committees to Core Groups and Task Forces was approved in principle with the suggestion that it be reviewed at the end of a year. Salaries were reviewed and the salaries of Educational Consultants raised in accordance with General Assembly's action on the stipends of deaconesses and proportionate increases were given to other staff members.

The following is a statistical summary of groups reported by Synodicals:

783 Adult Groups with 16,847 members
168 Teenage Groups with 1,773 members
229 Children's Groups with 2,635 members

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF WORLD MISSION

To the Venerable the 105th General Assembly:

- MISSION, for some Christians, is only a word until one becomes involved in telling the Good News of Jesus Christ to someone else. One hundred and forty years ago, Rev. John and Mrs. Geddie arrived in the New Hebrides. Ninety years ago Rev. J. Goforth and Rev. J. F. Smith went to China. Twenty-five years ago the first missionaries from Canada, Miss Agnes Gollan and Miss Joan Rochement of the W.M.S. (WD), were sent to Nigeria in co-operation with the Church of Scotland and the Synod of Nigeria Presbyterian. To mark this 25th anniversary a delegation will visit Canada from Nigeria in 1979 and it is hoped that the Moderator of the 105th General Assembly and representatives of the BWM and W.M.S. will visit Nigeria in the fall.

Overseas

- OUR MAJOR overseas work at the present time is with National Churches who have achieved a large measure of financial independence. Increasingly, the overseas Churches are taking more financial responsibility for all aspects of the Church's life and mission, including institutions. Our overall contribution in personnel has decreased 50% in the past 25 years. Our fiscal grants have remained the same amount in Canadian dollars during that period. The purchasing power of those grants, however, has declined significantly.

Canada

- DURING 1978 these congregations became self-supporting: Sackville, N.B.; Tyne Valley, P.E.I.; Moose Creek, Centreville, Ajax, Burlington-Pineland, Port Dover, London-Westmount, in Ontario; North Battleford, Saskatchewan; Grande Prairie, Alberta; Brentwood and Calvin Hungarian in Vancouver, and Sooke, Vancouver Island, B.C. If it were not for this kind of striving for self-support and the support of congregations who have taken a significant portion of responsibility for other congregations, new work could not be started in vital areas of Canada. Planning and concern for Church extension, Ministry in the North, French extension, and work among our Native People are essential as the Church increases its mission to the people of Canada. A notable step forward is the establishment of new full-time ministries to be based at Yellowknife, North West Territories, and Fort McMurray, Alberta. Aid-receiving churches have been kept supplied with ordained ministers, made possible by the two-year O.M. appointments. In 1979, 21 self-supporting charges have also requested appointments from the Board of World Mission.

Notes

- BWM RESPONSE to the Special Committee on National Unity (1978 General Assembly): B.W.M. representatives have had several meetings with representatives of the Synod of Quebec and Eastern Ontario to discuss ways and means of strengthening and upbuilding the Church and its mission in Quebec among French Canadians, and of finding and training suitable workers for this ministry. These consultations are continuing.
- THE RECOMMENDATION on the 1982-83 Mission Study Themes is included in the report of the Board of Congregational Life with the concurrence of the Board of World Mission.
- STATE OF THE CHURCH REPORT TO GENERAL ASSEMBLY: The Board of World Mission has appointed representatives to meet with the representatives of the Board of Congregational Life. Progress has been reported in the areas of church growth and youth studies.
- THE PUBLICATION "Thank God We Can Still Do More in Mission", a popular account of BWM work described in the 1978 Acts and Proceedings, has been well received in the church.

Significant Events:

- IN MARCH REV. DR. DeC. RAYNER and Mrs. Rayner visited the places in the New Hebrides where the pioneer missionaries lived and witnessed.
- REV. GLEN DAVIS has been appointed Secretary for Mission Education after serving 15 years in the Korean Christian Church in Japan.
- REV. J.J.H. MORRIS, chairman of the Board of World Mission, and Rev. C. R. Talbot visited the Guyana Presbyterian Church for consultation on mutual concerns in Mission.
- THE WOMEN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY, W.D. and the Woman's Missionary Society, E.D. continue to study and participate in the World Mission. Their representatives on BWM are active and concerned.
- THE 1978 GRADUATES of our colleges and other colleges who were appointed have served our Church well in a variety of congregations across Canada.
- REV. DR. J. E. BIGELOW, Moderator of the 104th General Assembly, Mrs. Bigelow, Rev. Rodger and Mrs. Talbot, and Miss I. Hunter, President of the W.M.S., (WD) attended the 70th anniversary of the Korean Christian Church in Japan and visited the Presbyterian Church of Taiwan.
- MISS PAT HANNA, Director of Overseas Students and Laymen Abroad, resigned and is studying theology. Dr. Goodwill MacDougall and Rev. Glen Davis are now responsible for these areas.
- MR. REMMELT HUMMELEN resigned as Production Assistant for Mission Education and the BWM audio-visual production is now done in co-operation with Communication Services.
- OVERSEAS PERSONNEL CHANGES: During 1978 Miss M. Hyndman (Japan - January), Rev. D. W. MacKay (Nigeria - September), Rev. and Mrs. J. W. Milne (India - September), and Rev. and Mrs. G. Davis (Japan - November) left the overseas staff. Miss L. Cameron (assignment pending), Miss A. Randall (Nigeria), Mr. and Mrs. T. Fowler (Nigeria) and Miss M. Stewart (assignment pending) joined the overseas staff. In addition, Dr. R. Allen began medical service in Nepal after having been in Nigeria, Mr. and Mrs. D. Willson (agricultural) were able to proceed to Nigeria, and Mr. and Mrs. J. Whitefield rejoined the staff to work in Nigeria but were forced to return to Canada in March, 1979 because of illness.

RECOMMENDATION No. 1. C

- 1) That approval be given to the principle of the appointment of a married couple where circumstances of appointment warrant, as a team to one pastoral charge, or separately to two pastoral charges in relatively close proximity, and
- 2) That there be thorough consultation and negotiation between the Board of World Mission, the Presbyteries and congregations, and subsequently with the appointees involved prior to such appointments, and
- 3) That where a married couple is serving in two separate charges the Presbytery involved shall decide (in consultation with the pastoral charges and the appointees) where they shall reside; and
- 4) That where a married couple is appointed as a team to one pastoral charge
 - (a) That Presbytery be granted permission to ordain either or both of the couple, as the Presbytery may decide.
 - (b) That Presbytery assist in delineation of specific responsibilities in the team situation (e.g., moderation of Session, etc.).
 - (c) That the stipend allowances, etc. be paid either in the name of one member of the team or divided between the members of the team, at their request.
- 5) That such appointments shall be at one stipend for each pastoral charge; and
- 6) That there be comprehensive counselling by the Colleges, Board of World Mission Personnel Committee and appropriate committees of Presbytery relating to all aspects of the ordination of couples to the ministry of Word and Sacrament.

UTILITIES

The 1978 General Assembly approved the definition of minimum stipend for ministers as being the basic stipend plus increments with a free house or apartment including utilities (heat, electricity, water and sewer services, basic monthly telephone charge), one month's holidays and allowances not to exceed the maximum paid by the Board of World Mission, etc.

The Board of World Mission at its annual meeting approved:

- 1) asking the Administrative Council to implement the decision of the 1978 General Assembly to make utilities part of stipend as of January 1, 1980 at an estimated cost to General Assembly budget of \$175,000. The estimated costs include granting Deaconesses, Catechists, Superintendents of Missions, etc. the utilities as part of their stipend, and
- 2) assuring the General Assembly that the Board of World Mission will urge all aid-receiving congregations to assume all or a major part of this cost.

RECOMMENDATION No. 2. A

That the above be received for information.

TRAVEL ALLOWANCES – Overture No. 4, 1979, Presbytery of West Toronto.

RECOMMENDATION No. 3. A

That the General Assembly approve the basic travel increase from \$1,200 to \$1,500 per annum, and that the Sunday mileage rate be increased from \$19.00 per Sunday round trip mile to \$22.00, and that the other mileage be increased from 12¢ to 15¢ per mile, effective January 1, 1980, and that this be the answer to Overture No. 4, 1979.

MINUTE OF APPRECIATION – Rev. and Mrs. H. Glen Davis

The Board of World Mission records its appreciation for the ministry of the Rev. H. Glen and Mrs. Joyce Davis as overseas missionaries of The Presbyterian Church in Canada working with the Korean Christian Church in Japan.

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Glen and Joyce were appointed as overseas missionaries in 1963 and after orientation in Canada arrived in Japan in November 1963. Most of the first 2½ years were spent in language study and orientation in Japan and Korea. The time must have been well spent for it gave Glen a grounding which resulted in his becoming fluent in both the Japanese and the Korean languages to the point where some claim that if they did not see his face they would think he was a Korean. Joyce, while not quite as fluent in Japanese and Korean, has a good command of both languages.

After completing language study the Davis' were assigned to Seinan Presbytery to assist with youth work and evangelism and continued in this assignment until the end of 1972 when the KCCJ, after consultation with the BWM, agreed to allow the Fukuoka Korean Christian congregation to extend a call to Glen.

From 1973 until October 1978 the Davis' served the Fukuoka congregation, becoming deeply involved in the life of their congregation, experiencing the joys and agonies of a pastoral ministry which was somewhat complicated by the cultural difference between pastor and people, and under the guidance of God's Spirit giving leadership to "their people" which resulted in increased membership, expanding understanding of Christian faith and life, and improvements to the church building.

The Davis family were in Canada 3 times for furlough during their 15 years in Japan. The first furlough was a study furlough which was then extended to allow Glen to serve as the interim minister of the newly formed Toronto Korean Presbyterian Church.

Joyce and Glen Davis have shared their ministry, each contributing their time and talents in the congregation, the Presbytery, and their home. Their love and enthusiasm for their Korean colleagues, and of their Korean colleagues for them, was evident even to the most casual visitor.

In recording its appreciation for the ministry of Glen and Joyce Davis the Board of World Mission rejoices that Glen has accepted the invitation of the Board to join its Executive Staff as Secretary for Mission Education. May God bless both of them as they undertake new ministries in Canada.

RECOMMENDATION No. 4. A

That the above minute of appreciation for Rev. H. Glen and Mrs. Davis be approved.

MINUTE OF APPRECIATION – Miss Margaret Kennedy

The Board of World Mission records its appreciation for the ministry of Dr. Margaret Kennedy as an overseas missionary of The Presbyterian Church in Canada working in India.

Margaret was born in England and completed her secondary school education there. After coming to Canada she worked for several years in an office in Montreal and then enrolled in the Missionary and Deaconess Training School in Toronto. She graduated in 1938, was appointed as an overseas missionary by the Women's Missionary Society (W.D.) and sent to the Kennedy School of Missions in Hartford, Connecticut for one year. She arrived in India in October 1939, spent the first one and one-half years in language study and then was assigned to village evangelism among the Bhil people. Margaret was still deeply involved with the Bhil people when she left India in December 1977.

Over the years Margaret has played an active role in leadership training activities at the village, the district and the national level. When the Church of North India came into being in 1971 she was appointed as the first Secretary of the Women's Fellowship for Christian Service of the CNI. In this role she drew upon the wealth and experience of women workers throughout the CNI while at the same time contributing from her own experience and unique personality.

No more fitting tribute can be paid than the words recorded by her Christian friends in the Bhil area at the time she left India in 1977:

"She has been able to share her laughter, sorrow, energy and enthusiasm with all people, Christians and non-Christians, poor and not so poor, low caste and high caste, those in low places and in high places."

"Miss Kennedy has become much loved in a wide circle throughout India as well as in our own dearly beloved area of Vindhya-Satpura. On this field and throughout the total Christian community in India she has served the Lord with undaunted energy and love."

The name Margaret Kennedy is very familiar throughout The Presbyterian Church in Canada. Each time she has been in Canada on furlough she has played an active role in Mission Interpretation. When the WMS (WD) and again when The Presbyterian Church in Canada celebrated their Centennials, Margaret was called upon for special deputation assignments. For the past year, since her return to Canada, she has travelled from one end of the country to the other sharing her understanding and enthusiasm for the mission task of The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

The Board of World Mission and all her friends and colleagues were deeply thankful when in 1978 The Presbyterian College, Montreal honoured Margaret by conferring upon her the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity.

In expressing our appreciation to Margaret we want to assure her of our continued interest and prayers as she officially enters retirement and unofficially continues her participation in mission.

RECOMMENDATION No. 5. A

That the above minute of appreciation for Miss Margaret Kennedy be approved.

BUDGET ALLOCATION "SHARING FORMULA" Overture No. 8, 1978, Presbytery of Cape Breton.

This Overture had been referred to the Administrative Council which recommended that it be referred to the Board of World Mission for study and report to the 105th General Assembly.

The Overture prays that "the General Assembly establish a Budget-Allocations 'Sharing' Formula which will enable the Presbyteries to establish their own funds for

- (a) the honouring of congregational deficit grant requests;
- (b) the development of new/experimental forms of ministry, within their bounds;
- (c) the creation of the necessary working capital with which they can exercise their pastoral care over the congregations within their bounds."

In order to avoid misunderstanding the Overture, a sub-committee of the BWM Committee on Finance met with a member of the Presbytery of Cape Breton and afterwards gave careful consideration to the prayer. The Overture has apparently emerged from several noteworthy concerns which disturb the Presbytery, i.e., the growing tendency to narrow congregational thinking in relation to the requirements of the Church at large, particularly in the matter of established minimum rates for stipend and allowances; the seemingly complicated process of applying for deficit grants; the continuing challenges for more generous support for the Budget of the Church, and the "exporting" of the resultant funds to far-off "Toronto"; the natural tendency of busy and scattered Presbyteries to neglect responsibility for supporting, and if need be, for disciplining congregations within their bounds, and finally, the alarming increase of regionalism to be observed in the Church.

The only real difference between the present policy of the Board of World Mission in connection with (a), (b) and (c) above and the prayer of the Overture is in the matter of who actually handles the funds. The Overture requests that the General Assembly arrange to have Budget funds remitted to the Presbytery Treasurer who would then distribute them for the purposes indicated. The Board can see little advantage in this procedure, but can discern some serious disadvantage which would aggravate rather than ameliorate the concerns expressed.

pate fully in the decisions for the allocation of funds. However, it is well known that the need for funds frequently exceed the supply, both within the Presbyteries and Synods, and indeed in the national Church as well. The General Assembly Budget and the present system of centralizing both givings and grants allows for a sharing in the light of national needs and resources, and with a minimum of 'overhead' in the whole operation, in terms of both manpower and cost.

However, the Board believes that the Overture focusses attention on an area in our Church's life where improvements could and should be made, and gives assurance of its continued efforts to effect such improvements.

RECOMMENDATION No. 6. A

That the above Statement be accepted as the answer to Overture No. 8, 1978, Budget Allocation "Sharing Formula".

MINISTRY IN THE NORTH-WEST

The Synod of British Columbia, Overture No. 3, 1978 (referred to BWM). The Synod of Alberta, Overture No. 7, 1977.

"Therefore the Synod of British Columbia overtures. . . that the Board of World Mission be instructed to form a committee consisting of two representatives from the Synod of British Columbia, Alberta, and Saskatchewan plus the respective Superintendents of Missions to forward a joint recommendation to the 1978 meetings of the respective Synods concerning our church's ministry to the North and any boundary changes necessary to accomplish that mission; etc."

The report of the Special Committee has the approval of the three Western Synods and the Board of World Mission and is as follows:

The Characteristics of the North:

There are few communities with a population greater than 1000, except Whitehorse and Yellowknife which exceed 10,000. The average population ranges from 50 to 1,000 people. In the two large centres various denominations are represented with well established congregations, while in most others there is at least an Anglican or Roman Catholic Mission, which ministers to the native people and others interested.

In addition to the native people of Indian and Inuit ancestry there is a sizable population of Metis. There is also a considerable number of others who have come from southern Canada, U.S.A. and Europe and have made their homes in the north, some for many years. This group is rapidly increasing as new-comers, of many interests and nationalities, move into the North.

Climatic and unusual environmental factors, e.g. the absence of forest and agricultural lands, the midnight sun, etc. dictate an unusual life style which varies with the seasons. In many of the more remote areas a 12 hour working day is not uncommon for one or two week periods, followed by a week or so off duty, and frequently spent in one of the larger northern centres, (Coppermine, Inuvik, Frobisher Bay), or "outside", (Edmonton, Calgary, etc.). Because of these factors there is also a keener than usual sense of dependency on neighbours and local associates, as well as on Industry and Government agencies, (health, education, security, transport, etc.) and in general on the outside world for necessary supplies.

What is our Mission? We see our Mission in the following terms:

- 1) To proclaim the Gospel of Jesus Christ, by Word, Image and in Person.
- 2) To provide service to needs: counselling, practical help in life's situation.
- 3) To revitalize the role of Christians as citizens of heaven and of the world, and to help such people achieve standards as lay missionaries through correspondence courses: resources, tapes, films, etc.
- 4) To help "outsiders" to feel that as part of the Body of Christ they are also "inside" their community. There are many non-churched and un-churched, including Presbyterians, who feel isolated and alone.
- 5) To encourage the Christian faith, fellowship and witness in life situations as the individual finds them.

- 6) To minister to ALL the people of the North, not just certain groups or geographical areas.
- 7) To support existing Christian Missions, and to co-operate with other agencies, if these are compatible with the Gospel.
- 8) To encourage gatherings of Christians for fellowship and service.

How do we accomplish this in Mission?

We see the following as some of the priorities for Ministry in the North:

We see the need to encourage teachers, doctors, nurses, engineers, and others who go into the North to accept the challenge of working and witnessing in that environment. We should seek to have this type of vacancy listed in "The Record". These could also be Canadian Mission Volunteers (similar to our overseas Volunteers and should have some input in ecumenical ministry in "Key Centres". This would necessitate teaching ministers to train articulate Christians who would be active, visible witnesses to their faith. A helpful part of such training would be the providing of bibliographies on basic subjects for ministers, and the establishment of lay leadership training courses for Secondary School graduates.

We should encourage ecumenical co-operation to maximize the ministry in tangible ways, through publicity of existing mission endeavours. We should also seek community arrangements for involvement in new situations; e.g. Shantymen's Mission, certain radio broadcasts, etc., might be recommended or supported. A Committee would evaluate and choose those we might encourage.

There is need to establish "Key Centres", in various locations. These would be centres from which a substantially larger area could be reached, with the location rather than the actual population of the centre as a determining factor. The minister in these centres would become a trainer of people to spread out into smaller communities; obviously this would have to be a flexible style of ministry.

We see the need to have good publicity which will present more dramatically places such as Whitehorse, Terrace, Yellowknife, etc., so that our people will be more forcefully challenged to undertake ministry in such locations.

There is need for the appointment of one "Overseeing Individual", who would first of all become acquainted with the North and be identified with it. Because of the special nature and character of the North, such an appointment would initially of necessity be for a male appointee. He would be responsible for visiting, gathering people together, initiating new ministries, relating to T.V. and radio opportunities in the North. He would also relate and interpret the ministry in the North to the Church at large. This person would distribute tapes, materials and other literature, and would be a type of field minister/circuit rider. He would provide regular comprehensive reports to an advisory committee of Synod Superintendents and Mission Conveners. Taking into consideration the flexibility of work there would be a need for a fairly comprehensive daily diary.

We must learn from past experience:

- 1) We must avoid traditionally faulty approaches to evangelism, and instead see this as a new unique type of evangelism using different terms, concepts, etc.
- 2) There would be a single individual supervisor delegating authority, etc. bearing in mind that there would be little permanence and stability in these settlements.
- 3) In the past there has been lack of understanding of different characteristics of these isolated communities, therefore, there would be a real need for "orientation". Lessons would have to be learned from the "gold rush" similarities meeting specific unexpected needs through variable ministry.
- 4) "Success" must be seen to be vis-a-vis the "whole" Church not just the established church or vis-a-vis The Presbyterian Church in Canada.
- 5) There would be a need to check the correspondence of pioneering ministries to be used as models. There would be a real need to listen to, and evaluate present attempts at penetration of the North, e.g. Faro with a student, and Whitehorse with a traditional ministry.
- 6) We see as viable teams going into the North, e.g., Van ministry, working and witness trips especially among children and youth.

- 7) The term of appointment would have to be 2-5 years, similar to Overseas appointments. There would be the need for suitable training noting the relationships of those who work in the North as husband and wife (e.g. compare with R.C.M.P. appointments.)
- 8) There should be encouragement for ministers to take study leave to experience ministry in the North. We should seek men and women who are willing to spend four months working in this type of situation, then go back to an established charge. Consideration should also be given to appointing student interns who would do this as part of their practical training.

The following recommendations were approved by the three Western Synods and the Board of World Mission:

1. That there be no changes in the boundaries of the Synods of Alberta and of British Columbia, or of the Presbyteries within these Synods at this time.
2. That the opportunity for a specialized ministry, involving the unique T.V. situation in the area of Terrace, B.C. be given sympathetic consideration for a specialized type of appointment by the BWM.
3. That the special character of the North-West, and the consequent need for imaginative and unique approach to ministry be acknowledged, and that the usual criteria for Home Mission work not be applied to mission endeavours in the North-West. In particular, this means that the area will not necessarily be expected to achieve an annual percentage reduction in grants, nor will there necessarily be the expectation of the establishment of congregations of The Presbyterian Church in Canada.
4. That a category of "Volunteers in Mission" be established, for the purpose of challenging Christians who are already in the North, and encouraging others to consider work in the North, with a view to utilizing their opportunities for Christian witness, fellowship, and evangelism, along with their occupations as nurses, teachers, doctors, engineers, miners, etc.
5. That lay-leadership schools and seminars be encouraged on the Synod and/or National level, to assist lay persons in facing their mission opportunities, and to provide training and encouragement for "Volunteers in Mission".
6. That a Missionary-at-large be appointed, with responsibility for oversight and implementation of mission work in the North-West, apart from organized congregations.
7. That the following preliminary job description and terms of reference for a Missionary-at-large in the North-West be approved:
 - (i) The Missionary will have responsibility for those areas where there is not an established congregation.
 - (ii) Among his responsibilities are: contacting Christians in the area; visiting; gathering people into support and study groups; channelling resources; training Christians for ministry in their own areas; relating Presbyterians in remote areas into existing Christian groups; promoting Christian growth.
 - (iii) He will initiate and promote media ministries in the area: e.g. radio, T.V. and newspapers.
 - (iv) The Missionary will be the Pastoral Contact for "Volunteers in Mission" in the North-West.
 - (v) He will relate the Mission in the North-West to the Church at large.
 - (vi) He will recommend in shared ministries specific formalized relationships and/or financial support which may be desirable between The Presbyterian Church in Canada and other Christian denominations in the North-West.
 - (vii) He will relate to a support and advisory committee consisting of the Superintendents of Missions and the Missions Conveners of the four Western Synods, or their alternates, and the Chairman and Secretary of the Board of World Mission or their appointees, and shall be responsible through that committee to the Board of World Mission. This committee shall meet with the Missionary at least twice annually (probably at the time of the March and November meetings of the Board and its Executive.) This committee will approve such materials, etc. as may be used in

his work. Recorded minutes of these meetings with the Missionary shall be kept, and the adjacent Presbyteries of Kamloops, Peace River, Edmonton, Northern Saskatchewan, Brandon and Winnipeg be kept informed by correspondence.

- (viii) The Missionary shall be a member of the Presbytery of Edmonton and will reside in Yellowknife, N.W.T.
- (ix) The salary level will be established by the Board of World Mission as a separate category, and will be above the minimum stipend applicable. A suitable monthly expense allowance will be provided.
- (x) The appointment shall be for an initial period of three years, after which time the position and the appointment will be reviewed by the Missionary, the Advisory Committee and the Policy Committee of the Board of World Mission.

RECOMMENDATION No. 7. A

That the above report and recommendations be approved as the answer to Overture No. 3, 1978, Synod of British Columbia and the Synod of Alberta Overture No. 7, 1977.

IMMIGRANTS AND INNER CITY — Overture No. 34, Presbytery of West Toronto.

The Board of World Mission appreciates the support and the concern for inner city ministry indicated by the Overture.

Within the Board of World Mission the term "Church Extension" has been used to refer to new work in developing areas. Inner City Ministries have been viewed by the Board as ministries with persons with special needs resulting from an inability to cope with the pressures of urbanization, primarily in city cores, and in low income or subsidized housing areas, in which a substantial number of new immigrants are likely to be found.

There is at present an Inner City Committee of the Board of World Mission which has responsibility for the concerns of ministry to the inner city. The Board of World Mission feels, therefore, that no useful purpose would be served by trying to broaden the term "Church Extension" as suggested by the Overture and that Inner City Ministries should continue to be considered as Special Ministries involving personnel with special gifts, and situations, each of which has its own peculiar needs and opportunities.

The Presbytery is the court that has authority to make decisions regarding the use of Church property within its bounds, in consultation with the congregation concerned. Presbyteries should be urged to give careful study to property in cases where congregations are approaching dissolution, with a view to these being made available for special ministries or the proceeds from the sale of the properties being made available to provide funding for the strengthening of existing special ministries or for providing experienced personnel appropriate to the ethnic and social character of the community. The Board of World Mission through its Inner City Committee is prepared to assist Presbyteries in such an assessment, in the development of inner city ministry and in the recruitment of suitable personnel.

The present policy of the Board of World Mission includes the appointment of suitable graduating students to inner city work (three were appointed in 1978).

RECOMMENDATION No. 8. A

That this be the answer to Overture 34, 1978, Presbytery of West Toronto.

STATEMENT SETTING FORTH THE POSITION OF THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA OF MISSIONARIES TO THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA FROM RELATED OVERSEAS CHURCHES WITH WHICH THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA HAS A WORKING RELATIONSHIP.

The Presbyterian Church in Canada recognizes that it shares with Christian churches around the world a mutual responsibility in mission and affirms its readiness for mutual sharing in Christ's mission in Canada and overseas. In order that missionaries from overseas churches may be received in the same manner as overseas

churches have received missionaries from The Presbyterian Church in Canada, the following special regulations shall apply.

These regulations apply only to missionaries who have been offered and appointed by an overseas church as missionaries to The Presbyterian Church in Canada and who have been invited by the Board of World Mission to serve as missionaries in The Presbyterian Church in Canada and appointed by the Board of World Mission to a specific task related to The Presbyterian Church in Canada. This task may relate exclusively to The Presbyterian Church in Canada or be shared with other churches.

1. The missionary to Canada, while a resident in Canada, shall be considered a visible token of the affection of the overseas church to The Presbyterian Church in Canada, and while resident overseas, shall be considered a visible link of affection from The Presbyterian Church in Canada with the overseas church.
2. The Board of World Mission appointment of an overseas missionary to Canada will be made in consultation with the Presbytery concerned and the missionary and may be changed as circumstances warrant.
3. A missionary to The Presbyterian Church in Canada shall become a member of The Presbyterian Church in Canada and shall be subject to its discipline; such discipline shall not be greater than that of depriving the missionary of membership in The Presbyterian Church in Canada, in which case the Board of World Mission will ask the sending church to terminate the appointment.
4. Presbyteries are given permission to place on the roll of their Presbytery, under the heading "overseas missionaries to Canada", the names of ordained ministers who are serving within the bounds of the Presbytery under appointment by the Board of World Mission and who have been sent by their overseas church and received by the Board of World Mission as missionaries to The Presbyterian Church in Canada.
 - a) Such action by Presbytery shall be taken only after receipt of a letter from Board of World Mission stating that the missionary has been invited by the Board of World Mission and sent as an overseas missionary to The Presbyterian Church in Canada by his/her home church and attaching a copy of a letter from the appropriate authority in the overseas church stating that the missionary is an ordained minister in good and regular standing in that church.
 - b) In placing the missionary's name on the Roll of Presbytery, it shall go on the Appendix to the Roll during the missionary's first twelve months in Canada and may thereafter be placed on the Constituent Roll.
 - c) When arrangements made between the Board of World Mission and the overseas church in respect to a missionary are terminated, the Board of World Mission must immediately notify the Presbytery in writing and upon receipt of this notification the Presbytery will remove the missionary's name from the Roll of Presbytery and notify the Board of World Mission in writing the date this action was taken.
 - d) An overseas missionary to Canada is not eligible to receive a Call from a congregation of The Presbyterian Church in Canada without the prior approval of:
 - 1) The Sending Church
 - 2) The Board of World Mission, and on its recommendation
 - 3) The General Assembly of The Presbyterian Church in Canada

If a present or former missionary to The Presbyterian Church in Canada should seek to become a minister of The Presbyterian Church in Canada, it will be necessary for that person to make application through the Board of Education and the fact that the minister was formerly on the roll of a Presbytery of The Presbyterian Church in Canada will not add to or subtract from the application.

5. The unordained missionary shall become a communicant member of a congregation within the bounds of a Presbytery to which he/she has been appointed and as such may be named to any office or position in the congregation or presbytery open to communicant members.
6. When an ordained missionary is transferred from one Presbytery to another by

the Board of World Mission the Presbytery will issue a letter to the receiving Presbytery giving the name of the missionary and stating that he/she is a missionary to The Presbyterian Church in Canada under appointment by the Board of World Mission, that the missionary has been on the Roll of the Presbytery in good and regular standing and is being transferred to the care of the Presbytery by appointment of the Board of World Mission and with the consent of the missionary.

When an unordained missionary is transferred from one Presbytery to another by the Board of World Mission, the Session will issue a letter giving the name of the missionary and stating that he/she is a missionary to The Presbyterian Church in Canada under appointment by the Board of World Mission and is being transferred from one Presbytery to another, that the missionary has been on the communicant roll of the congregation in good and regular standing and is commended to the care of the Session of the congregation where the letter is deposited.

7. When the ordained missionary leaves Canada on furlough, having been invited by the Board of World Mission to return to Canada for another term, the Presbytery shall remove the missionary's name from the Roll of Presbytery and place it in a separate listing headed "Missionaries to Canada on Furlough". When the missionary returns to Canada for another term his/her name shall once again be placed on the Roll of Presbytery. Both of these actions should be taken only upon receipt of an appropriate letter to Presbytery from Board of World Mission.
8. In the event of discipline against a missionary depriving him/her of membership in The Presbyterian Church in Canada as indicated in paragraph 3 of these regulations, three extracts of the minutes shall be given to the Board of World Mission who in turn will give one copy to the missionary, send one copy to the overseas church and retain one copy for Board of World Mission records.

RECOMMENDATION No. 9(A). A

That the Statement be approved as the position of The Presbyterian Church in Canada. (For information refer to Acts & Proceedings, 1965, p. 301/2, reprinted below).

RECOMMENDATION No. 9(B). A

That the following change to the Book of Forms Sec. 176 by the addition of (1)(g) "who are ordained ministers serving within the bounds of the Presbytery under appointment by the Board of World Mission and who have been sent by their overseas Church and received by the Board of World Mission as missionaries to The Presbyterian Church in Canada" be sent down under the Barrier Act.

STATEMENT SETTING FORTH THE POSITION IN THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA OF MISSIONARIES OF THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA RELATED TO OVERSEAS CHURCHES WITH WHICH THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA IS IN WORKING RELATION THROUGH THE GENERAL BOARD OF MISSIONS

- (a) The missionary from Canada, while a resident overseas, shall be considered a visible token of the affection of The Presbyterian Church in Canada for the overseas Church, and while resident in Canada, shall be considered a visible link of affection from the Overseas Church with the Canadian Church.
- (b) A missionary from The Presbyterian Church in Canada on becoming a member of an overseas Church shall be subject to the discipline of that Church; such discipline shall not be greater than that of depriving the missionary of membership in that Church, in which case that Church shall request the General Board of Missions, or the Women's Missionary Society (W.D.) through the General Board of Missions, to terminate the appointment.

- (c) The names of ordained ministers from Canada serving in overseas Churches shall be carried in a yearly listing in the Acts and Proceedings, following the statistical summary of Synods and shall be entitled "Ordained missionaries from The Presbyterian Church in Canada serving in overseas Churches."

In addition to this listing, Presbyteries and Kirk Sessions shall list in their records, under the title "Serving in overseas Churches" the names of those properly belonging there. Any of these returning to Canada whose names have been on a constituent roll or appendix to the roll of a Presbytery in Canada shall, on the request of the General Board of Missions, have their names added to the constituent roll of the Presbytery, and the Board's letter to the Clerk of Presbytery shall be the latter's authority to have that name added by Presbytery to its constituent roll.

In the case of an unordained missionary the General Board of Missions shall inform the Kirk-Session of the congregation of his or her return to Canada so that the name may be added to the roll.

- (d) Names from the roll of a Presbytery or the roll of a congregation shall be removed by motion on notification by the General Board of Missions that the missionary is about to become a member of a court or a congregation of the overseas Church. It is understood that the overseas Church shall take action in accordance with its regulations both in the arriving of the missionary and in his leaving.
- (e) In the event of discipline against a missionary and withdrawal from an overseas Church as indicated in (b) of these recommendations, an extract of minutes shall be requested of the overseas Church by the General Board of Missions, which shall be sent as follows:
 - (1) one copy to the missionary,
 - (2) one copy to the Clerks of Assembly,
 - (3) one copy to the General Board of Missions.

The General Board of Missions shall examine the extracts and if the matter of discipline is such as to prejudice the placing of the missionary's name on a roll in Canada (Presbytery or congregation roll) it shall so inform the missionary and initiate action in the court of primary jurisdiction, Presbytery or Kirk-Session, as it may be. It is an explicit part of these regulations that all missionaries described under (c) shall agree to this procedure in accepting appointment.

Overture No. 2 (1979) from Synod of Saskatchewan re Canada Mission Regulations - Moving Household and Personal Effects

The 1978 General Assembly approved the following regulation (p. 410, Acts & Proceedings, Household and Personal Effects) "That the maximum weight approved for shipment (excluding books) will normally be up to a limit of 6,000 lbs. (3 tons)."

The following rewording of the regulation "Moving Household and Personal Effects" Section C (2) is offered:

Maximum weight of shipments for which the Board of World Mission will assume payment (exclusive of books, etc. as above) is determined by considering the number of people in the household:

Basic allowance for household, up to 6,000 lbs.
 Second and additional members of
 the household living at home 500 lbs.

Normally, the maximum weight allowance approved for shipment (excluding books) will not exceed 8,000 lbs.

The appointee may wish to move household and personal effects in excess of the above limits, and this of course is his/her privilege. The Board of World Mission can assume responsibility for payment only to the above limits. Arrangements may be made to ship any desired quantity of such effects providing the appointee agrees in writing to accept responsibility for payment of charges on the excess, calculated on a pro rata basis.

RECOMMENDATION No. 10. A

That the above rewording of the regulation "Moving Household and Personal Effects" Section C (2) be approved as the answer to Overture No. 2, 1979.

CANADA MISSION VOLUNTEERS

There have been a number of requests particularly by Inner City workers for an opportunity to have "Canada Mission Volunteers". The Board of World Mission after careful consideration approved the following for submission to the General Assembly:

1) Purpose:

That the Board of World Mission establish a category of Canada Mission Volunteers to assist in ministries within Canada, such volunteers to work under the supervision of an experienced person.

2) The appointment of Canada Mission Volunteers shall be made at the request of Presbytery; such request shall specify clearly the task to be undertaken, and the responsibility of the Presbytery and the Supervisor to the volunteer.

In making such appointments, the Board of World Mission will follow the same screening and appointment procedures as apply to all other candidates for appointments in Canada.

3) Terms of Service:

- a) Appointments normally will be for a one or two year period.
- b) One month's vacation per annum will be provided for all workers serving under appointment. Arrangements and timing of the vacation period must be worked out with the supervising person(s) on the field.
- c) An appointment as a "Canada Mission Volunteer" is for not more than a two year period and is not normally subject to renewal in this category.

4) Allowances:

- a) The Volunteer will receive a weekly allowance for personal expense.
- b) The Volunteer will receive a board and room allowance, to be determined in each situation.
- c) That the actual cost of transportation in carrying out the task assigned to the volunteer will be paid by the project which the volunteer is assigned.
- d) The Board of World Mission does not provide insurance coverage for a Volunteer against loss of life, permanent disability, etc., nor does it accept any responsibility in case such events occur. This is the responsibility of the volunteer.
- e) The Board of World Mission will be responsible for travel to and from the place of appointment, together with reasonable moving expenses.

RECOMMENDATION No. 11. A

1. *That the structure for Canada Mission Volunteers be adopted in principle.*
2. *That up to four volunteers be considered for appointment to initiate the program, with particular consideration in older urban/or inner city situations.*
3. *That the experience of sister denominations (e.g. UP/USA, RCA) be taken into account in initiating and evaluating the program.*

CHINA, TAIWAN AND THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA.

The Board of World Mission submits the following statement:

The Presbyterian Church in Canada is thankful to God for the oneness we have with the Presbyterian Church in Taiwan.

In these days when major developments, such as the normalization of relations between the People's Republic of China and the United States of America, and new military alliances in East Asia, imply changes and uncertainties for our friends in Taiwan, we send the Presbyterian Church in Taiwan our warm Christian greetings. We express our appreciation for the role they are playing in helping Christians in

Taiwan and abroad to expand their understanding of and involvement in, Christian Mission; we assure them of our support in their faithfulness to the Gospel; and we express our desire to continue and deepen the relationship between the people of our churches.

The prayers of the people of our Church for the 17 million people of Taiwan are therefore commended at this time. May all of God's people there be drawn together in a new exemplary time of service and witness in that land, and to the whole of East Asia. May The Presbyterian Church in Canada be challenged by faithfulness of the Presbyterian Church in Taiwan to the Gospel and respond with like faithfulness in this day of changing patterns and opportunities in Canada.

RECOMMENDATION No. 12. A

That the above statement on China, Taiwan and The Presbyterian Church in Canada be adopted.

COMBATING RACISM IN AFRICA AND CANADA

That whereas there are clear indications that some of the Canadian Presbyterian responses to and media attacks on the World Council of Churches in its programme to combat racism appear to arise from a racial bias among people and institutions of our own church, and

Whereas this Board is concerned about combating racism in both Canada and Africa, and wherever it exists,

Therefore, in order that our brothers and sisters across the world may know where we stand and our Presbyterian family in Canada be given appropriate leadership the Board goes on record as affirming its opposition to racism wherever it is expressed, and is committed to combating it wherever it exists in our own hearts, in our church life, in our communities and in our world.

RECOMMENDATION No. 13. C

That this statement be adopted by the 105th General Assembly.

BUDGET 1980

RECOMMENDATION No. 14. A

- a) *That the authorized expenditures for 1980 may be increased up to \$13,000 for automobiles and heavy furniture for overseas as may be found necessary.*
- b) *That the authorized expenditures may be increased in 1980, in consultation with the Administrative Council with regards to the availability of money from the Second Century Advance for Christ, that for missions in Canada and Overseas, up to \$100,000. for Canada and \$50,000 for Overseas for Capital needs (manses, church sites, overseas capital projects, etc.) to the extent that additional funds are available including bequest monies at the end of the year.*

RELATIONSHIP WITH PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH OF KOREA, ECUMENICAL

The Board of World Mission has approved that there be a formal relationship between the Presbyterian Church of Korea, Ecumenical and The Presbyterian Church in Canada and that the General Assembly be informed that Board of World Mission is in conversations with the Presbyterian Church of Korea, Ecumenical; the Board of World Mission will prepare a proposal for consideration by the next General Assembly.

RECOMMENDATION No. 15. A

That the above be received for information.

25th ANNIVERSARY OF RELATIONSHIP WITH THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH OF NIGERIA

RECOMMENDATION No. 16. A

- a) *That the General Assembly remind congregations that 1979 marks the 25th Anniversary of the arrival in Nigeria of Miss Agnes Gollan and Miss*

Joan Rochemont as the first Presbyterian Church in Canada missionaries to the Presbyterian Church of Nigeria, both of whom were appointed by the WMS (WD), and that the Assembly note that as part of their celebrations of this occasion the Presbyterian Church of Nigeria are planning to send a delegation to Canada in the fall of 1979 to visit congregations in every area in Canada.

- (b) That the Rev. Mba O. Ogarekpe, Clerk of the Presbyterian Church of Nigeria be welcomed by this Assembly and invited to bring fraternal greetings.
- (c) That the Assembly send fraternal greetings to the July 1979 meeting of the Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Nigeria expressing our thankfulness to God for the privilege of associating with our Sister Church in Nigeria, praying that the friendship and concern our peoples have for each other may continue and deepen in the years ahead, and expressing our welcome to the delegates who will visit Canada in the fall of 1979.
- (d) That the Assembly appoint the Moderator of this Assembly to join with representatives of the Board of World Mission and others in a delegation to Nigeria in late 1979.

Overture No. 7, 1978 "Maintaining the Rural Ministry" Presbytery of Prince Edward Island

The Board wishes to report to the Assembly that it has this year implemented the prayer of the Overture and not only reviewed the policy, but undertook a study of current problems in rural charges. Ministers who have had experience in rural ministry provided insights and helpful comments which are summarized in a Research and Planning paper with the same title as the Overture.

The problems are now better understood, but the solutions are not simple. The problems need the attention not only of the Board, but of Presbyteries, ministerial training institutions, especially of congregational leaders in rural charges.

The Board would draw to the attention of Presbyteries that a Workshop on Rural Ministry will be held at the College of Agricultural Technology, Kemptville, in the spring of 1980. The Board is willing to work with any Presbytery that wishes to engage in ongoing programmes to make rural charges viable and effective.

We recommend that our theological colleges be directed to provide students for the ministry with opportunity for serious training for ministry in rural charges.

RECOMMENDATION No. 17. A

That Overture 7, 1978 re "Maintaining the Rural Ministry" be answered in the above forms.

Overture No. 20, 1978 "Visitation to Ethnic Congregations" Presbytery of West Toronto

RECOMMENDATION No. 18. A

That the Overture be answered in the following terms:

- a) That Presbyteries be urged to take measures to see that ethnic congregations are encouraged and enabled to participate fully in the main life of the Presbytery and the Church and to guard against the isolation of these congregations; and further,
- b) That in Presbytery visitations, ethnic congregations be treated as far as possible as all other congregations would ideally be treated, rather than be singled out as special cases.
- c) That the Board of World Mission indicate to Presbytery its willingness to consult and advise regarding the implementation of a) and b).

Married Student Summer Rates

RECOMMENDATION No. 19. A

That if a summer appointee is a married person and the spouse is not under appointment by the Board of World Mission but living on the field, then the weekly stipend rates shall be 1/52 of the annual "married student" stipend rate, plus accommodation. Transportation allowance on the field will be at the Board of World Mission approved rates.

Catechists

Each year the Board of World Mission by regulation of the General Assembly reports the Catechists serving under appointment of Board of World Mission.

The faithful service of the Catechists to our Church is appreciated. The Catechist course programme was terminated as of December 31, 1978 and the present materials will be sent out on request.

RECOMMENDATION No. 20. A

That this report be received for information and that Presbyteries be urged to ensure that Catechists participate in the Retirement Fund for Church Employees to have the benefit on retirement.

Overture No. 3, 1979 "Provincial Health Insurance"

The Presbytery of West Toronto has overtured "that health insurance premiums for all ordained missionaries and other full-time church workers employed by the Board of World Mission or by other church agencies such as the Women's Missionary Society be fully paid. . ."

The Board of World Mission consulted with the WMS (WD) and WMS (ED) and are studying the matter since there is a wide variation in Provincial Health Schemes.

RECOMMENDATION No. 21. A

That the Board of World Mission continue the study of the Overture re Provincial Health Insurance and report to the 106th General Assembly.

FIELD REPORTS OVERSEAS

THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH OF NIGERIA

Synod Clerk - Rev. M. O. Ogarekpe

- THE LIFE AND WORK of the Presbyterian Church of Nigeria has had its ups and downs in 1978. "The Church was vividly aware of the many challenges facing her and resolved to tackle them as best she could" reads their report. One of the main problems is that workers for the various ministries of the Church are too few in number, and although an effort has been made to increase the training for ministers and evangelists, funds have been insufficient.
- MEDICAL: Work in mission hospitals at Itu, Itigidi and Uburu continued and plans are underway to make Eja Memorial Joint Hospital in Itigidi a teaching hospital.
- FINANCE: An emphasis on self-help projects to help local congregations raise funds is catching on, though very slowly.
- AGRICULTURE: Synod agreed to raise loans from the Agricultural Development Bank to rehabilitate Itu Farm. This venture is fraught with problems.
- EVANGELISM: Rev. Richard Fee comments: "I believe what is radically needed now and critically is evangelism. Here and in all sections of the country. Indifferent youth, animists and ancestor worshippers who are being bulldozed onto the sidelines and left with no spiritual home, and Moslems who are more motivated by politics than religion are confronting the Christian in Nigeria today. . . For myself in this past year I have shifted my thinking from a mainly

paper ministry to a reaching out, a setting up of programs that reach the edges — a striking out for evangelism, training others. . . People here are no different from those in Canada. . . People feel lost, they want to be listened to, they want to do something in life. . . Elders are working to change their thinking about themselves from being men who judge cases to people who go out to ask what the problems are. . . So often I am staggered at how far these church people in my parish have come. My elders are my age, some younger. . . The great progress is that I am enjoying the people more, being with them more in their good times and rough times. It is a danger here that a moderator will simply become a chief magistrate in a supreme court; would that I could get the church to be more pastoral than punitive, more forgiving than flogging. But considering the past, these Christians have taken leaps, in faith, into a strange world.”

Canadian Staff

- MR. JAMES AND MRS. KATHLEEN WHITEFIELD worked in administration at the Port Harcourt Christian Council Project. Mr. Whitefield also supervised the workshop staff in making furniture and equipment for a Nursery School which opened in September. Mrs. Whitefield was responsible for administration of the school as well as working as a typist in the main office until October. Mr. Whitefield also served on the Building Committee for the housing development at Elekohia, and Mrs. Whitefield was secretary to the sub-committee planning Project Week and the Conference of Urban Ministry.
- REV. RICHARD W. FEE continued to serve as moderator of Ezzikwo Parish (51 preaching points) and says there is enough work for him there until 2016, the year he retires! He says “The answers do not come easily here. I have learned to be content and I know I am where I should be and the people here are thankful to you for allowing me to be here.”
- DR. D. C. AND MRS. IRWIN taught at the University of Port Harcourt. During its first academic year about 400 students were enrolled, 60% of them science majors, the remainder in arts. Dr. Irwin taught first year chemistry, he designed the lab layout for one of the projected new buildings, was a member of the university library committee and helped get the laboratories functioning. Mrs. Irwin taught earth sciences and a course on the human body. She was advisor to a group of eight female students and a member of the staff/student advisory committee.
- MISS ARLENE RANDALL arrived in Nigeria on November 24. She spent December preparing for her temporary assignment of teaching English, New Testament, Church History and Worship to men evangelists at Goldie Training Centre in Arochuko, beginning on January 19, 1979.
- MR. DALE AND MRS. CAROL WILLSON arrived in Nigeria on April 14, 1978. Mr. Willson was given responsibility to reactivate the agricultural projects of the Presbyterian Church of Nigeria, beginning with the Itu Farm Project. The latter encompasses 1,837 acres, consisting of oil palms, rice fields, rubber trees, fish ponds, residential land, arable land and swamp. Major work on this land, however, had to be delayed because of a court case, and in July, Synod asked Mr. Willson to supervise Yakurr/Mbembe and Rural Improvement Mission. Yakurr Farm consists of 500 acres. Mbembe is a leper hospital and settlement of 1000 acres. Rural Improvement Mission consists of the completion of an 8-bed maternity hospital under construction. The aim is to turn these projects into commercial ventures, the income to be used for maintaining the Church.
- MR. TREVOR AND MRS. PATRICIA FOWLER began their work as teachers at Union Secondary School in Ibiaku.

MALAWI

Church of Central Africa Presbyterian, Synod of Blantyre

- General Secretary — Very Rev. J. D. Sangaya.
- CHURCH BUILDINGS: Over 30 village churches were built, using local materials, and local builders and carpenters giving their labour as part of their contribution. There have been difficulties in building and making repairs in the

urban congregations due to city regulations on building standards which makes the cost prohibitive.

- TRAINING: A number of ministers completed training overseas, or in neighbouring countries or at home. Chilema, Chigodi and Likhubula House showed an increase in their training programs. The emphasis at Chilema is on community living, evangelists, and home economics courses; at Chigodi on women's programs, and at Likhubula on youth programs.
- EDUCATION: The Synod continued to administer over 500 primary schools and one secondary school which are not government aided.
- HEALTH CARE: Primary Health Care is being introduced to assist local people to take preventative measures in their localities. Work in the Mulanje Mission Hospital, with two doctors, six nursing sisters and a number of staff nurses, continued at full capacity. An average of 200 babies are delivered each month.
- THEOLOGICAL COLLEGE: A new theological college under all four synods of the Church was established at Zomba near the University of Malawi.
- TRANSPORT was improved as six young ministers bought motorcycles for use in their congregations.
- CO-OPERATION WITH OTHER CHURCHES: The Synod of Blantyre continued to co-operate with other churches in the field of development of the nation through the Christian Council of Malawi and the Christian Service Committee.

Canadian Staff

- REV. CHARLES AND MRS. SHARON SCOTT serve under the Church of Central Africa Presbyterian in Blantyre. At the beginning of the year, Mr. Scott taught New Testament at Kapeni Theological College and Zomba Theological College, and was Associate Minister of Blantyre congregation. Later in the year he was appointed Director of Theological Education by Extension in Malawi. Mrs. Scott taught mathematics at St. Andrew's primary and secondary schools.

THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN TAIWAN

- General Secretary — Rev. Dr. Chun Ming Kao
- NEW SUPERHIGHWAYS, express bus service and major construction projects give an air of prosperity to this land, but it is still a country where 2% of the working population get 39% of the total annual income for all wage earners, and the remaining 98% get 61%. That is, the top 2% get nearly 20 times the average pay of the others.
- In the POLITICAL ARENA, with the election in November 1977 people began to see that their votes count, and issues such as human rights, freedom of the press, abolishing of martial law and amnesty for political prisoners appeared as major planks on election platforms. Tension ran high as the proposed election of December 15 approached. Then, with the announcement of the coming “normalization of relationships” between the U.S.A. and Communist China, the elections were postponed.
- THE CHURCH has been subjected to a defamatory campaign by magazines and newspapers because of its stand on Human Rights. New restrictions on the control of church property have been imposed, applications for passports submitted by the General Assembly have not been processed, and university and high school students have been forbidden to take part in any activities of the Presbyterian Church in Taiwan.
- MINISTERS have been subjected to pressure to provide lists of elders and church members. Some church meetings have been stopped. A new supplementary textbook which is obligatory reading for all junior high school students contains inaccurate and defamatory material about the Church.
- IN THE FACE of these and other harrassments the Church has stood firm. “We are quite clear about our aims and principles. Our actions are based on our Christian faith. . .”

- At the GENERAL ASSEMBLY, attendance was larger than usual; the General Secretary was re-elected by 255 votes to 49 and the Declaration on Human Rights was approved by 235 to 49.
- LAY TRAINING: At the end of the first year of the Lay Training Movement, there were over 25 training centres and 1,930 students.
- THE TEN PLUS ONE CHURCH GROWTH MOVEMENT, to begin on January 1, 1979, aims to increase the communicant membership of every congregation by 10% every year, so that by 1985, the 120th anniversary of the coming of the Gospel to Taiwan, communicant membership will be double what it is now. The first year is called "Coming Back Year", i.e. bringing back those members who have drifted away from the church.
- IN COMMENTING upon the Church in Taiwan during 1978 and how in its response to the tremendous pressures it has become more faithful to its calling, the secretary for overseas operations said, "We in Canada need to thank God that He gave us the high privilege of having played a part in the establishment of this church in Taiwan and we need to humbly ask God to help us to learn from the recent experiences of The Presbyterian Church in Taiwan so that we might become more faithful to our calling as a Church."
- PRAY FOR the Presbyterian Church in Taiwan and its leaders as they seek to continue to proclaim Jesus Christ as Lord. Pray that, through peaceful but powerful methods, Taiwan may become a place pleasing to God, where justice, freedom and peace may flourish.

Canadian Staff

- MISS GEORGINE CALDWELL was on leave of absence in 1978 continuing her Ph.D. studies at Teachers College, Columbia University, New York. She plans to return to Taiwan in June, 1979.
- REV. TED AND MRS. MARILYN ELLIS returned to Taiwan in September, following furlough in Canada. Mr. Ellis is Chaplain in the Tainan Theological College. In May he was named "administrative assistant" directly under the Principal, and also the College's liaison person with presbytery re its plans for establishing new congregations. His responsibilities included Chairman of the Worship Committee and counselling students. Mrs. Ellis is studying the Taiwanese language.
- REV. B.L.M. EMBREE completed course work on a Th.D. degree at Toronto School of Theology and did research on his thesis. He also tutored in New Testament at Knox College. In 1979 Mr. Embree will begin his assignment as Regional Professor in Biblical Languages for the South East Asia Graduate School of Theology.
- MR. JACK AND MRS. BETTY GEDDES continued their ministry in Taiwan. Mr. Geddes taught in the Department of English and the Graduate School of Western Languages and Literature at Tamkang College. He was associate editor of "Tamkang Review" and advisor on the staff of the English "College Echo". He served on the Board of Yu-Shan Theological College and of Tam Kang Middle School. Mrs. Geddes worked as secretary of Taipei International Church and found time for managing the "Rice Bowl" newsletter, swimming and first aid counselling, Sunday School teaching and choir.
- REV. CLARE AND MRS. GRACE MCGILL returned to Taiwan in August, following furlough in Canada. Early in the year Mr. McGill visited about 35 Tayal churches and produced his second LP record in Tayal, a recording of scripture verses arranged to Tayal tunes. Since returning, a Tayal pastor has been helping him revise the first draft of 59 Psalms. He has recently been appointed to the Board of Yu-Shan Theological College.
- MISS DIANE PETRIE, R.N. serves as Project Manager of the Ren Ai Tuberculosis Program. This is community based treatment in mountain villages. She writes, "Tuberculosis in mountain villages is out of control and takes a tragic toll in life and the quality of life. . . We are only endeavouring to work in a few villages as our resources are very limited but it is exciting to see the results in these villages."

- MISS JOY RANDALL, R.N. was in Canada and involved in deputation work for the first part of 1978 but returned to Taiwan in September. As Director of Nursing Services at Changhua Christian Hospital, her responsibilities involve supervision, in-service education, evaluation and administration involving Nursing Care.

KOREAN CHRISTIAN CHURCH IN JAPAN

General Secretary - Rev. K. S. Choi

- The 70th ANNIVERSARY OF MISSION among Koreans in Japan was celebrated in 1978. The theme for the next ten years is "Jesus Christ: Our Hope".
- BUILDING PLANS to celebrate the Anniversary included: Tokyo Church, which began construction on a three-storey building; Yokosuka Church, which purchased two dwelling houses and converted them into a Church building, and Chofu Church, which has a building project to include sanctuary, community centre and manse.
- KYOTO NAMBU CHURCH became self-supporting; NIIHAMA Evangelical Station in Shikoku, a work begun less than a year ago, obtained a piece of land which should be paid for by August 1979.
- OKINAWA CHURCH, ministering to Koreans, Japanese and members of the U.S. Army, has grown daily as a mission field.
- OSAKA CHURCH-NURSERY project, manse and community centre building, five storeys, is a major project under construction.
- EVANGELISM AND EDUCATION: Bible study sessions for pastors and workers and training conferences for teachers were held.
- RAIK (Research Action Institute for Koreans in Japan) and KCC (Korean Christian Centre, Osaka) continued to take responsibility for community service and people's movements.
- YOUTH organized a work caravan for the Niihama preaching station and refurbished a house to be used as a sanctuary. They are undertaking their own faith training and are organizing youth groups in churches where there are none at present.
- WOMEN: A special joint leadership consultation with the Japan National Christian Council women leaders was held. Japanese and Koreans discussed problems facing them and firmly resolved to solve them together through mutual fellowship and joint operation.
- THE KCCJ BECAME A FULL MEMBER of the JNAC (Japan-North American Commission on Co-operative Mission), the purpose of which is to facilitate co-operative Christian Mission in Japan and North America.
- THE BOND with the United Church of Christ in Japan (Kyodan) was strengthened and mission co-operation with mother churches in Korea continued to be strong.
- WORLD COUNCIL OF CHURCHES, Christian Conference of Asia, World Alliance of Reformed Churches and Japan National Christian Council continued to provide the KCCJ with a larger platform from which the needs and rights of Koreans in Japan were brought to the attention of Japanese citizens and governments.
- "KOREAN CHRISTIANS have an uncanny knack of putting first things first," said Rev. Glen Davis, as he left Japan. "Our Korean brothers and sisters taught us something about priorities. Attending Sunday worship comes before any personal plans or trips; when perplexing problems arise, prayer is the first ingredient in the solution, not a last resort; sharing the good news with relatives, friends and neighbours is a primary responsibility for all believers - not just the minister; in the struggle for justice and human rights, doing something to right specific wrongs takes priority over making lofty pronouncements."

Canadian Staff

- REV. ROBERT K. AND MRS. PRISCILLA ANDERSON served in the KCCJ where Mr. Anderson is Associate to the General Secretary. His responsibilities include English language correspondence, English publications and PR materials

in English. He assisted in the preparations for the celebration of the 70th Anniversary of Mission in Japan. Mrs. Anderson worked in the KCCJ office two days a week, taught some English at home, and guided visitors from Canada around Tokyo.

- REV. GLEN AND MRS. JOYCE DAVIS, after 15 years of missionary service in Japan, returned to Canada in 1978, and on November 20 Mr. Davis began work as Secretary for Mission Education. In presenting his report to the BWM, he said "You have given us a marvelous opportunity to serve Christ among some of the choicest of God's saints - the Korean people in Japan." Before leaving Japan, Mrs. Davis had become a member of the teaching team at Fukuoka International School and had been involved in starting and leading three women's Bible studies.
- REV. JOHN H. AND MRS. CLARABETH McINTOSH continued their ministry in Osaka where Mr. McIntosh was Interim Director of the Korean Christian Centre, Co-operating Minister of Osaka Korean Church and Treasurer for the Mission 70 Committee of the KCCJ. Mrs. McIntosh taught one morning a week in each of three different schools. She also taught a Sunday School class, served as Education Convener for Osaka Korean Church's Women's Association, advisor to the Kansai WA of the KCCJ, and as a member of the Osaka YWCA International Friendship Group Executive.
- MISS DAWN M. ROSS continued to have responsibility for English language correspondence, editing of publications, office finance and bookkeeping in the Tokyo office of the Urban Rural Mission of the Christian Conference of Asia. She assisted in the organization of international gatherings of varying sizes, e.g., a Workshop on Race and Minority Issues in Asia held in Auckland, New Zealand, where representatives of 16 ethnic or racial minority groups met to exchange experiences and to promote mutual solidarity.
- REV. RONALD AND MRS. SUSAN WALLACE were involved in Japanese language study early in the year, while Mr. Wallace did some preaching and visitation as well as working in the youth ministry of Kawasaki Church. Mrs. Wallace assisted at Yokohama Nursery and taught English to elementary school students at Chofu Church. From September to December they were at Yonsei University in Seoul, Korea, taking full-time Korean language study.

CHURCH OF NORTH INDIA

General Secretary - Mr. A. G. Dharmaraj

- GRANTS TO CNI: Up to 1970, six overseas churches operated missions in India, drawing up estimates, holding property, making area-wide decisions. Funds were sent to India by the churches designated for specific areas and projects. In November 1970 the Church of North India was established. Until 1974 institutions such as Jobat Christian Hospital, Amkhut schools and the Helen MacDonald Memorial School, Jhansi continued to draw up their budgets and send them to the Board of World Mission, who decided how much money could be allocated to them. Since 1974, however, these institutions have sent their requests for funds to the national office of the CNI Synod. The synod evaluated each request and sent it overseas with their comments. The CNI aims to be self-supporting in pastoral and evangelistic work by 1980, and from January 1979 will receive all monies from overseas in the form of block grants, so that all decisions regarding their disbursement to the many and varied service institutions will be those of the Indian church.
- THE JOINT COUNCIL of the Church of South India, Church of North India, Mar Thoma Church, with a constitution of its own approved by the three churches, held its first meeting in 1978. The Joint Council is to serve as the common organ of the three churches for working toward a visible manifestation of the unity of these churches and of the whole Church of Jesus Christ in India. It is to help the churches to fulfil the mission of evangelization of the people in India and of witnessing to the righteousness of God revealed in the Gospel of Jesus Christ by striving for a just society. Two regional councils have been formed to work toward joint involvement in mission at the grassroot level.

- A CONSULTATION on rural, urban and sub-urban development was held in Calcutta. A commission to evaluate the functioning and effectiveness of all CNI Boards was set up. Two evaluation committees are to assess the usefulness of the educational and medical work, in Bhopal in particular.
- A DIRECTOR FOR RELIGIOUS EDUCATION and Lay Movement and another for Youth functioned on an experimental basis.
- The CNI COUNCIL FOR CHILD CARE expanded its care of children in spite of its present cramped buildings.
- A MAJOR SURVEY on Theological institutions in CNI is under the leadership of the CNI Theological Commission.
- THE COMMUNICATE, a newsletter produced fortnightly by the General Secretary attempts to bridge the communication gap within CNI and between CNI and its related churches.
- INSTITUTIONS in the CNI with which The Presbyterian Church in Canada is particularly related either through personnel or financial grants are: The Christian Institute of Sikh Studies, Baring Union Christian College, Ludhiana Christian Medical Centre, and Vellore Christian Medical Centre.
- CIDA (Canadian International Development Agency) gave \$54,450., the Alberta International Development Fund gave \$19,055, and the Saskatchewan International Development Fund gave \$7,900 for projects in India and Nepal, as a result of funds committed in the budget of the BWM for salaries of BWM missionaries involved in development projects. In addition, matching grants of \$11,600 were received from CIDA for the Jobat and Mendha Community Health Projects.

Canadian Staff

- MISS PAULINE BROWN continues her work as co-ordinator for Christian Rural Health Services in the Bhil area. She is also Acting Manager of the M.B. Abey Memorial Children's Home in Amkhut.
- MISS AGNES HISLOP worked with Rev. D. Patlia in arranging leadership courses in various parts of the Diocese for a variety of groups. She helped in leading and teaching in some of the courses as well as assisting in keeping accounts.
- MISS MARGARET F. KENNEDY retires from missionary service at the end of March 1979, having served in India since 1939. She spent the past year doing deputation work across Canada meeting with all age groups and sharing knowledge and experience, especially as it relates to the evangelical mission work of our church. (See special minute of appreciation in the Recommendation section of this report.)
- MISS ELEANOR L. KNOTT served as Treasurer of the Helen MacDonald Memorial School and Hostel in Jhansi. She supervised the Home Economics department and taught both Home Economics and English.
- MISS MARGARET C. LEASK continued as School Manager and Hostel Superintendent at the Helen MacDonald Memorial School. She taught some high school classes and beginners, and spent considerable time supervising maintenance and repair staff as well as preparing classroom space for additional children.
- MR. CLARENCE O. AND MRS. CATHERINE MCMULLEN served in the Chandigarh Diocese, where Mr. McMullen is Administrator of the Christian Institute of Sikh Studies and teaches Sociology at Baring Union Christian College. He organized several seminars at the Institute to promote inter-faith dialogue and read papers at several other seminars. As three of the McMullen children were a 15-hour trip away at school in Mussoorie, Mrs. McMullen spent time there and was quite active in school activities as well as working in the school dispensary.
- REV. J. W. AND MRS. LUCIE MILNE returned to Canada in 1978 for the sake of their family's educational needs and have begun a new ministry in the Dorchester - South Nissouri charge in London Presbytery.
- MISS DOREEN MORRISON served as Director of Christian Rural Health Services (CRHS) Mandleshwar and Barwani Community Health Project, as well as Acting Nurse Superintendent, Mandleshwar Christian Hospital.

- MISS DIANA WADSWORTH returned to Jhansi in July, following furlough. She taught English and co-ordinated English classes at the Helen MacDonald School and provided teaching aids and books to the Indian teachers. Art club was a pleasant duty for Miss Wadsworth. She was elected as a member of the Lucknow Diocesan Education Board.
- MISS IDA WHITE has completed 26 years in India, her most recent assignment having been to work with Indian staff to establish a Community Health Nursing program within a five mile radius of Jobat Christian Hospital. She returned to Canada in 1978 and is presently doing half-time deputation work while caring for her invalid mother.

THE UNITED MISSION TO NEPAL

Executive Secretary - Gordon M. Ruff

- The UMN consists of 29 different missionary societies, supporting about 240 missionaries who come from 16 countries. In 1979 it will celebrate its 25th anniversary of witness and service in Nepal.
- EDUCATION - New opportunities have opened to place specialist teachers in relatively isolated villages who will be involved in upgrading of village high school teachers. Scholarship aid continued for many promising but economically underprivileged boys and girls. During the year more than 100 were supported in scholarship programs through the Scholarship Committee and about 90 others were supported through private interests.
- DEVELOPMENT PROJECTS - More effort was made to use appropriate technology in seeking to meet the needs of the poor majority in the areas where projects are underway or planned.
- HEALTH SERVICES - The four hospitals have continued with increased patient loads. There has been remodelling for more efficient use of personnel and the physical plant. Nepali staff were added in considerable numbers as they have been trained through UMN Medicine Auxiliary Schools in Tansen and in the Nursing School in Kathmandu. One of the great needs in the villages has been for water, and increasing efforts are being expended to bring water to villages where there is people's participation, co-operation and free labour offered by the people of the village.

Canadian Staff

- DR. RICHARD ALLEN arrived in Nepal in August. He took three months of full-time language study in Kathmandu and one month in a village setting in preparation for work in the UMN Amp Pipal Hospital in the Gorkha District.
- MR. JOHN AND MRS. JUDITH BERTHOLET served at the Amp Pipal Hospital and the Gorkha Project where Mr. Bertholet is responsible for maintenance and for supervising and planning the water improvement program for the Community Health Project. Mrs. Bertholet helped with health education in the Community Health Project and taught some literacy lessons, as well as assisting with correspondence and recording.
- MISS MARY E. NICHOL returned to Nepal in November, after furlough, and is in charge of the Nurse Campus, Shanta Bhawan Program, Kathmandu. This entails being responsible for the operation of the campus in its nursing education program.
- MISS PATRICIA POOLER, a registered nurse, continued to be involved in Community Health work. Children's clinics, located in villages requiring one to three hour's walk, constituted a large part of her work during the year. She also taught village workers, did home visiting and immunization programs, and found herself called upon on some occasions to do the work normally required of a doctor, an engineer and an agriculturalist.

GUYANA PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

- Clerk of Presbytery - Rev. Randolph Etwaroo
- A NUMBER of problems and challenges faced the Guyana Presbyterian Church in 1978. With a membership of around 2,500, the Church continued to lose members due to migration of families overseas.
- THE RESIGNATION of Rev. Haimdat Sawh as a minister of the Guyana Presbyterian Church was a great disappointment. He and his family moved to the U.S.A.
- A REALIGNMENT OF PARISHES reduced the number from 11 to 8. This puts into effect the Presiding Eldership, and it is hoped that laymen and women will continue to give effective leadership and service within the church.
- EIGHT MINISTERS and one female worker work within the parishes. Rev. Moses Harsham, on study leave in Canada, and Mr. Wilfred Ledra, on a special one-year course at St. Andrew's Theological College in Trinidad, are expected to return home in 1979.
- DIALOGUE between the Guyana Presbyterian Church and the Negro Presbytery of Guyana has helped identify areas in which the two Presbyterian Churches in the country may co-operate in ventures of Christian Mission and Service.

Christian Action for Development in the Caribbean (CADEC)

- CADEC's programs include projects in agriculture and fisheries, community development, small industry, crafts, education and vocation training and culture. Contributions to the work are made by agencies, churches and individuals both within the Caribbean and outside.
- THE LAND AND FOOD FOR PEOPLE program continued in its goal of fostering agriculture development particularly through the use of church lands.
- THE DISASTER, EMERGENCY, WELFARE program worked in the areas of natural disasters, emergency relief, and ongoing care of those in need.
- COMMUNICARIB is a communications training program for media personnel. *Radio Contact*, a half-hour weekly program, offered TV and Radio workshops for clergy and lay leaders.
- SEMINARS on Development Issues were held for project carriers and community leaders.
- SCHOLARSHIPS were granted in social welfare, nutrition, leadership training and theology.

Action for the Renewal of the Church (ARC)

- SEMINARS and workshops for clergy and laity are organized by ARC. The first Writer's Workshop to develop a new ecumenical Christian Education curriculum had 66 participants.
- IN JAMAICA, Caribbean Church Women (CCW) were active in the "Crusade for Righteousness", a project to promote an awareness of the causes of Jamaica's present social and economic problems and to foster a search for spiritual resources to deal effectively with these problems. In Antigua, a CCW project "Dress Them Feed Them" challenged the priorities of parents who seem to be more interested in what their children wear than in what they eat.
- CARIBBEAN ECUMENICAL YOUTH ACTION, through seminars and workshops in Antigua, Jamaica and Trinidad, focussed on the problem of how the existing structures of Caribbean society inhibit the realization of "equal opportunity for all".

SPECIAL MINISTRIES

- REV. BRIAN AND MRS. ELIZABETH CROSBY continued at Iona Abbey, Scotland. Mr. Crosby was responsible for general administration, including program, buildings, twice daily worship, and pastoral work with guests and staff. Mrs. Crosby worked on re-cataloguing in the library as well as carrying out various tasks in the Abbey.

- REV. RUSSELL AND MRS. ALICE SELF now serve in New York where Mr. Self is the United Bible Societies World Scripture Distribution Consultant.

BWM PERSONNEL OVERSEAS

- DURING 1978 there were 22 single missionaries and 17 married couples on the overseas staff. Of this number, four married couples and one single missionary were volunteers. Five missionaries were on leave of absence for either part or all of the year for personal reasons or for extended study; five were in Canada on short furlough of less than five months and two on furlough for more than five months. A list of overseas personnel with their addresses appears at the end of the B.W.M. report.

FIELD REPORTS CANADA

Note: In the Canada Field Reports it has been possible to mention only some of the areas in which mission takes place. Other areas will be highlighted in the future.

Synod of British Columbia

- LANGLEY congregation under the Rev. J. C. Rhoad, was officially established on November 19 with 44 charter members. Sunday School has an enrolment of 59, and 88 attended a Vacation Bible School. Attendance has almost doubled in the past year. Homes contacted in the Presbytery visitation numbered 1500.
- PARKSVILLE: Rev. Tony Boonstra began his work as the first minister to this charge. The number of families involved almost doubled.
- SALMON ARM, under Rev. Rex Krepps, grew numerically and spiritually, with 20 joining the church.
- KITIMAT, under Rev. J. B. Kay, was a busy, growing congregation in 1978.
- CRESTON doubled attendance at services, increased its givings, and established a church school. The church building has been re-roofed and painted inside. "New vitality is evidenced in the entire work of the congregation," reported the minister, Dr. E. Bragg.
- NELSON has grown numerically, financially and spiritually and self-support is expected in a few years. The Way-Inn coffee house ministers to singles. Two community houses serve as aids to fellowship and outreach.
- SLOCAN, the only Protestant Church in the area, has doubled its attendance, reports Rev. C. Brown who ministers to the Nelson and Slocan congregations.
- CASTLEGAR has well-attended services and an active church school under the catechist, Mr. H. Harvey. An evening service has been started in an attempt to reach shift workers. A Vacation Bible School was held, a women's group was formed, and two new elders elected. The building is being renovated.

Special Ministries

- CHINESE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, VANCOUVER: Miss Annie Wilson worked with the Nursery School, in home and hospital visitation, and as an organist for services. She writes "Perhaps the biggest problem was in trying to reach out all over the city to bring children to the Nursery School. There have been several parents able to bring children to the Nursery School. There have been a total of 25 passengers during the year. Families are so scattered. . . There are more than 80,000 Chinese residents in Vancouver. Miss Wilson leaves her work at the Chinese Church to become the wife of a retired missionary pastor. She and Mrs. Elsie Young, who has had to resign because of her husband's illness, were involved in this work for over twenty years. "Wendy Shum, another faithful and more than willing co-worker," writes Miss Wilson, "has done a noble job of spreading her talents further since Mrs. Young resigned, and is a great challenge to families who are indifferent to the church and its true message."
- CHINESE CHURCH, VICTORIA: Miss F. Tse operated the Nursery School and directed the church school. The young people have taken over responsibility for directing and training the junior choir. The three women's groups have a

- total membership of 45. Special English classes for new immigrants are held three times a week. The minister, Rev. S. M. Lee, reports that a larger share of the stipends are being assumed by the congregation.
- HOSPITAL VISITORS, Mrs. Roy Mercer and Miss Florence Edge reported a wide ministry which is much appreciated.

Synod of Alberta

- THE POPULATION GROWTH within the bounds of this Synod and in the city areas in particular prompted Synod to urge Presbyteries to set up a Church Extension Fund.
- THE SYNOD is involved in the Church's study of our ministry in the North West and is aware that the urgency of this ministry requires the excitement and commitment of its people.
- BANFF, a small congregation which witnesses to worshippers from many parts of the world, has accepted the challenge to move forward without assistance in the form of grants from the BWM.
- CENTENNIAL, Calgary, is increasing steadily in numbers, and building plans are almost completed. They have two active Bible study and prayer groups. Two Vacation Bible Schools last summer had a total attendance of 180 with two separate teaching staffs.
- VALLEYVIEW congregation, under the ministry of Knox Church, is located in an area on the southwestern outskirts of Calgary, which is now being developed. This congregation could well serve as the nucleus of extension work.
- ST. ANDREW'S, EDMONTON burned the mortgages on both church and manse.
- BRAESIDE, ST. ALBERT is beginning to make building plans.
- ECKVILLE, in Red Deer Presbytery, continued its ministry to the community in a variety of ways.
- FORT ST. JOHN became self-supporting, the first in the history of Peace River Presbytery. They had a 10% increase in communicant membership over the previous year.
- WANHAM-BLUEBERRY has grown and there is an increased interest and commitment among the youth.
- DAWSON CREEK-CHETWYND showed signs of a growing sense of responsibility in stewardship and outreach. Dawson Creek proceeded on a building program to add an addition, having burned the mortgage on the present building last summer. Vacation Church Schools were held in two outlying areas near Dawson Creek.
- GRANDE PRAIRIE session has been trying to come to grips with its purpose and ministry. A decision was made to sell the present building and rebuild on a site in a new residential area of the city. The board had its largest budget ever and the congregation met its General Assembly budget for the first time.
- SUMMER STUDENTS were employed at Faro, Yukon and Tungston, N.W.T. Mr. Henry Hildebrandt functioned as liaison between the local community church and the single workers at the Cyprus-Anville Mine. He was employed full time at the mine to allow maximum exposure to the workers and he lived at the single workers' dormitories. The same arrangements were established for Mr. Marty Molengraaf at the local mine in Tungston.

Special Ministries

- CALVIN, HUNGARIAN, EDMONTON: Church attendance rose about 20%; offerings and donations almost doubled; and there was a slight increase in membership. The congregation is looking forward to celebrating its 30th anniversary in 1979.
- BETHLEN, LETHBRIDGE, under Rev. George Telcs, held its youth services and church school in English. Nine young people between the ages of 14 and 16 received their first communion after attending communicants' classes during 1977-78.

Synod of Saskatchewan

- THE PRESBYTERY OF NORTHERN SASKATCHEWAN, in its report, comments that it is keenly conscious of the fact that they are dependent upon Presbyterians across Canada for their support in carrying out the mission of the church in their area.
- EXTENSION WORK at Westview, Saskatoon, has been placed under the sympathetic and experienced guidance of Parkview session.
- THE GROWTH in "Ministry through Literature" is another facet of the mission work in the Presbytery of Northern Saskatchewan. The Calvin-Goforth charge reports a growing use of its library, especially among young people.
- IN THE PRESBYTERY OF ASSINIBOIA, Rev. Sheina Smith was inducted into the charge of St. Andrew's, Moosomin-Knox, Whitewood, where she had been appointed as O.M. in 1977.
- AT KNOX, YORKTON AND DUNLEATH, the continued ministry of Rev. Derrick and Mrs. Susan Dick has encouraged growth in both congregations.
- THE WORK IN KIPLING, under the leadership of Rev. Walter Donovan, has shown real growth in attitude and support.
- PARTICIPATION in work among the urban poor of Regina and the Native-Metis people by the downtown chaplain, Rev. Robert Gay, has been assisted by a grant of \$1,000.
- THE NORTHWEST TERRITORIAL MISSION underwent some re-organization. The two southern portions, namely Wilkie and Sandwith, were realigned, with the latter now associated with St. Andrew's, North Battleford. The ministry in the North based in Buffalo Narrows, and serving Dore Lake and other communities out of there, will be continued.
- THE WORK AT COLLEGE PARK CHRISTIAN CENTRE, Saskatoon, which began at zero in August 1978, has grown steadily and has attracted a number of families who previously had no church connection.

Special Ministries

- CONCERN FOR OUR NATIVE PEOPLE is a priority and work has carried on week by week on the Reserves of Mistawasis, Crutwell and Wahpeton. Rev. Stephen How had this to say: "There has been a strong trend among the native people to search for their roots in the past and seek the answers to the present situation. Several attempts are going on in our communities to pursue their ancestral origin and to find meaning to their existence in the old religious practices. . . Yet the attraction to all things Indian, does not mean he has rejected all things 'non-Indian' including the church. He attempts to maintain his Indianness in a world dominated by the life style of Western civilization. . . I believe the task of the Church is not to destroy their way of life but to fulfill it to the fullest and to this end the Gospel is preached so that they may confess Jesus as their Saviour, without having to reject their proud heritage."
- AT THE FELLOWSHIP HOUSE, Prince Albert, the Board changed the emphasis from Boarding House to Service Centre for an experimental trial period.

Synod of Manitoba and Northwestern Ontario

- NEW AND VARIED types of training and outreach, connected with the Second Century Advance, were experienced by several congregations in the Synod.

Special Ministries

- PRESBYTERIAN FELLOWSHIP HOUSE, Winnipeg: The halfway house for girls and the residence filled a very useful need for the housing and care of teenage girls who have been in conflict with the law. The staff experienced a trying and rewarding year.
- THE HOSPITAL VISITOR in Winnipeg, Mary McLaren, reported a busy year with 4,586 visits in hospitals and 133 visits in nursing homes. There were many instances where she was able to use the pamphlets and Glad Tidings supplied to her.

- ANISHINABE FELLOWSHIP, Winnipeg, carried on the work among native children and women, under Miss Isabel Allison, with help from the various churches and some students from the Bible College.
- FLORA HOUSE, Winnipeg (Inner City Mission) has been referred to as "a family-based outreach into the community." It carried on a varied ministry to children where love and concern is so essential. The theme for the International Year of the Child "Come share with me" has great significance as the Lord is shared with the children at Flora House.
- KENORA FELLOWSHIP CENTRE experienced staffing difficulties and has been closed for a month or two. An evaluation of this ministry and of the role of the centre in the community is taking place, in the light of changing needs.
- SHOAL LAKE was without a ministry. The church building which had been vandalized has been rebuilt by the Band.
- DAKOTA TIPI AND WESTBOURNE: Services were held at both churches each Sunday under the leadership of Mr. C. Allan Lauder. The boys from Agassiz Centre for Youth have come to the services and Mr. Lauder did chaplaincy work two nights a week at the centre. He also attended Portage Adult Court sessions frequently, assisting native people when necessary, and counselled occasionally at the Portage Friendship Centre.
- WAYWAYSEECAPPO Presbyterian Church has a ministry to 65 or 80 households on the Reserve. 43 children registered for the Saturday School, a two-hour school for children ages 4-13. Two cross-cultural summer Vacation Bible School programs, involving the Presbyterian and United Churches, were held. In the Rossburn-Waywayseecapppo area, over 100 children participated, over 90 of whom came from the Reserve. The school involving Birtle United and Birdtail Presbyterian had equal numbers from the town and the Reserve, as was the intention.
- ELPHINSTONE, KEESEEKOOWENIN, ROLLING RIVER: At Elphinstone, in addition to the pastoral visiting, Sunday services and mid-week study carried on in the past, the Sunday School has been reorganized and a small youth group started. There was fairly good attendance at Keeseekoowenin and Rev. Wm. Morrow, the ordained missionary, is undertaking language study with grade 7-8 Saulteaux. The ministry at Rolling River is confined to visitation and a small Sunday School.

Synod of Hamilton and London

- ROXBOROUGH PARK, Hamilton, under Rev. George Zimmerman, had more community-oriented programs during 1978, resulting in a more active congregational life. First-stage church extension work at Albion-Saltfleet, with about twenty adults and 15-20 children worshipping, is also being carried on by Mr. Zimmerman.
- BRANT HILLS, Burlington plan to begin construction early in 1979. Communicant membership increased to 90 in 1978.
- PINELAND, Burlington revamped its Christian Education program, and the result has been a renewed interest among junior highs, an additional Bible Study class and the revival of a CGIT program with strong leadership.
- BUILDING programs are the concern of both Trinity and London Korean churches. These congregations have been assisted this year by Mrs. Kathy Fraser, Presbytery deaconess.

Special Ministries

- INNER CITY, Hamilton. Miss Helen Allum, deaconess, reports that activities included three after-school groups a week, a Winter Break program and nine children sponsored to Kintail Camp. A Neighbourhood Fellowship Hour met weekly in a senior citizens' apartment building, a mothers' group met weekly, and counselling and visiting was a continuous part of the program.
- HOSPITAL VISITOR in Hamilton Presbytery, Mrs. Joanne Walter, visited in six hospitals. Patients come from congregations throughout the presbytery and

beyond. She made an average of 50 calls a week and church members or adherents made up about half of the calls.

- SUMMER MINISTRY at Sauble Beach and Bayfield proved to be valuable.

Synod of Toronto and Kingston

- ST. STEPHEN'S, PETERBOROUGH, reports Rev. J. W. Hutchison, reached 30 of the 39 goals it set for itself. He writes "The readiness of our parishioners to support the work of the congregation is evidenced by the fact that we encountered no difficulty in recruiting new teachers. . . nor were we pressed for staff for our Vacation Bible School which was attended by 60 youngsters, mostly from the surrounding neighbourhood."
- ST. JOHN'S, KAPUSKASING, under the ministry of Rev. David Sherbino, had approximately 65 families active in 1978. A weekly morning Bible Study group was attended by an average of 40, and a bi-monthly evening Bible Study by 20-25. A Saturday morning Discovery Program in September and October had approximately 45 in attendance.

Church Extension

- WATERLOO NORTH, with Rev. Iris Ford as minister, held its opening service on April 19 with 200 in attendance. On October 1 the Service of Establishment was conducted by Presbytery with 68 persons becoming charter members; 235 attended.
- NORTH AGINCOURT - MILLIKEN. Worship services began on September 10 with Rev. Robert Johnson and Mrs. Lois Cooke-Johnson, the Inter-Presbytery deaconess, working in a team ministry. This church campus project will be shared with the Anglican Church of Canada. New housing has been approved for the area and total population is expected to reach 57,500 people.
- GLENBROOK, MISSISSAUGA, in the Erin Mills Church Campus, is one of four congregations sharing one multi-use building in this developing area.
- WHITE OAK, MEADOWVALE WEST. Building plans are in process for this campus type ministry shared in by four denominations. Membership has reached 60.
- ST. TIMOTHY'S, AJAX assumed self-support status effective January 1, 1979 and called the Rev. Rod Ferguson. A \$95,000 addition has improved their facility significantly.

Special Ministries

- INNER CITY MINISTRY, Presbytery of East Toronto. Miss Charlotte Stuart, resource person, reports "Unemployment continues to be a large factor in the dealings that the church has with hundreds of people in the community, and a large part of any inner-city worker's job has to be to help church members understand the difference between simply feeding the hungry and helping people to budget. . . and in the end to have them feel they have been helped as complete human beings and can still be a part of the church family with all of their dignity intact."
- EVANGEL HALL, ARMAGH, HOSPITAL AND NURSING HOME Ministries, and support of ministries to ethnic groups represent a very significant thrust of mission within the bounds of the Synod.

Synod of Quebec and Eastern Ontario

- MANY ANGLOPHONE congregations in the Province of Quebec are faced with declining membership. As far as the English population is concerned, no new work is possible in the foreseeable future.
- IN OTTAWA, Kanata elected its first session and began a visitation program by the elders. They now have a children's choir and orchestra, a weekly Adult Bible Study group and a group for junior teens. One half of the congregation is 18 years of age or under.
- CALVIN HUNGARIAN Church, Ottawa celebrated its 20th anniversary, with special services, evangelistic meetings, and a trilingual celebration at the University of Ottawa auditorium.

- THE SESSION OF ST. JOHN'S, CORNWALL is undertaking a survey to determine the possibility of a satellite work.
- THE CHURCH AT PETAWAWA has purchased a bus to transport children to church school.

Special Ministries

- HOSPITAL VISITOR, Mrs. Eileen Horne, made over 1,100 visits to hospital patients in the Montreal area during 1978.
- CHRISTIAN COMMUNITY HOUSE, Ottawa: Ms. Sandra Estabrooks reports "1978 provided us with many new persons and new situations which challenged our growth as Christians. . . over 200 different persons came to the House several times for either meals, overnight accommodation, counselling, friendship, or to give or receive some other form of support."
- THERE ARE OPPORTUNITIES in the Synod to minister to people who have come from Egypt, Vietnam, Korea, the West Indies, Haiti, China, Hungary, and building facilities are being shared with them.
- AS A SYNOD, we are grappling with the problem as to the best method of carrying out our Christian responsibility in the vast field of French outreach. English and French speaking pastors have been consulting together with representatives of the Board of World Mission and this is a continuing process.
- LA VIE CHRETIENNE: "Ce magazine a subi quelques transformations depuis que j'en suis l'editeur. Je lui ai donné une forme plus journalistique et les lettres positives de lecteurs satisfaits sont parlantes. . . S'adressant à un public très divers, ce magazine doit répondre aux exigences de certains intellectuels mais être aussi un moyen d'évangélisation adressé à tous. . ." - Jean Claude Rufenacht, pasteur.

Synod of the Atlantic Provinces

- THE SYNOD welcomed the designation of two deaconesses: Miss Christine Shaw began work within the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island, and Miss June Pratt in the Presbytery of Halifax and Lunenburg and with Camp Geddie.
- MISSION CHARGES were well served by ordained missionaries, catechists and summer students.

Highlights of reports from some of the appointees

- ORANGEDALE: Rev. John Vaudry reports: "I have remained interested in youth work, and acted as leader of a young people's group at River Denys. . . There are now two groups meeting for Bible study and prayer in River Denys. . . Some time has been spent in exploring the possibility of starting a new congregation in Port Hawkesbury, but little progress has been made. . ."
- WABUSH: Rev. David Renwick writes "We were delighted to receive a visit from Miss Margaret Kennedy. Knowledge of mission was virtually non-existent before her visit, but in speaking on a number of occasions with such enthusiasm, she provided a foundation for interest in missions on which to build in the future. . . Attendance at morning services averaged 40-50 and Sunday School enrolment reached 90 during the year. . . 20 of us painted the exterior of the church in a day."
- LOWER SACKVILLE: Rev. Murdo Marple reports "Decision was made to withdraw from the campus project and to buy the church building being sold by the Pentecostal congregation. Since moving, the congregation has experienced significant growth and looks forward to the challenges and responsibilities of its ministry."
- RIVERVIEW: "Regular growth in the congregation is a bright sign at Bethel Church," reports Rev. Basil Lowery, "although increasing demands on the church building and its facilities have caused some concern. A study is to be launched to seek ways and means of meeting the need for additional space. Study also is underway to reach out in a greater degree to the 'unchurched' of the community."

- SACKVILLE and PORT ELGIN, N.B.: Rev. Brian Ross reports that "The Book Stop" became a successful program of outreach sponsored by St. Andrew's, Sackville. Both congregations have given overwhelming support to the proposal that Sackville-Port Elgin reclaim its self-support status in 1979.
- ST. STEPHEN'S and ST. GEORGE: "A growing attendance at Sunday services and increased interest in mid-week activities. . . a young adult couples group now meets monthly in both points of the charge," reports Rev. Stephen Cho.
- HAMPTON and BARNESVILLE: A. J. Ballard writes "A Church School started in the Barnesville congregation is attracting growing interest and plans are underway for the construction of a new church building. At Hampton, the loan toward the newly-constructed manse has been paid."
- STANLEY and WILLIAMSBURG: "Services continued on a regular basis. . . We held an annual service at Tay Falls. . ." reports K. B. Weeks; "I also serve as a member of the pastoral care department of the hospital in Fredericton."

Special Ministries

- HOSPITAL VISITOR, Mrs. Eva L. MacLean writes "Patients from every presbytery in the Synod come (to Halifax) for treatment and were visited many times. Gifts from church groups help to provide pamphlets, lodging for out-of-city relatives who are in financial need, and long distance calls."
- MISS JUNE PRATT, deaconess, reports "I have met with Christian Education committees and Church School teachers in several congregations and have been involved with W.M.S. at various levels. Camp Geddie has taken hours of time."

CANADA, SPECIAL MINISTRIES

THE MINISTRY with persons whose mother tongue is other than English continued in the following language groupings - Chinese, French, Italian, Hungarian, Korean, Ukrainian, Native people.

- THE CHINESE CHURCH IN MONTREAL which relocated in mid-1977, became self-supporting at the beginning of 1978 with the help of interest on funds received from the sale of their former property. Rev. Paul Chan retired at the end of March following 41 years of Christian ministry, 38 of them as minister of the Chinese Presbyterian Church, Montreal. Mrs. Yew Fin Tam Hu retired at the end of 1978, having spent 14 years of faithful ministry with the Chinese women and children in Montreal.
- THE CHINESE CHURCH IN TORONTO assumed full financial responsibility for Miss Grace Wong, who has served there since 1969, under appointment of the WMS, WD and the BWM.
- In the CHINESE CHURCH, VANCOUVER, Mrs. Elsie Young, who gave excellent service on a part-time basis since 1958, resigned for family reasons.
- WITHIN THE HUNGARIAN MINISTRY, Rev. Louis Vietorisz was appointed to the work in Ottawa in February. Ukrainian outreach through Christian literature and broadcasting programs was continued by Rev. Michael Fesenko. The Ukrainian Church, Oshawa, under the leadership of Rev. Gregory Adams, welcomed ten new members during the year.
- WORK WITH NATIVE PEOPLE: After having this work fully staffed in 1977 for the first time in many years, 1978 brought many changes. Miss Carol Sharpe became Mrs. Fred Kahkeeway and in September withdrew from a very effective ministry in the Lake-of-the-Woods Presbytery. Rev. James Codling completed his ordained missionary term at Elphinstone and is taking further studies.
- THE VERDUN DAY CARE CENTRE was closed on June 30. An effective ministry had been carried on through the Centre for nine years under the leadership of Miss Hazell Davis. Miss Davis retired at the end of 1978, following 21 years as a deaconess.
- CENTRAL CHURCH, VANCOUVER assumed full financial responsibility for Miss Annabelle Wallace, deaconess, involved in their outreach work in the west end of Vancouver.
- AT FLORA HOUSE, WINNIPEG, Mrs. Cathy Larsen served on a temporary basis beginning in September.

- MISS ARLENE RANDALL, who served as Church Extension deaconess in the presbyteries of East and West Toronto and Brampton for three years, and MISS MARGARET STEWART, who served in Church extension work and at Gateway Church, Toronto, terminated their work in order to prepare themselves for service overseas.
- NEW APPOINTMENTS of Presbytery Mission Workers were: Mrs. Linda Robinson to Calgary-Macleod; Miss June Pratt to Halifax-Lunenburg and Camp Geddie; Miss Christine Shaw to P.E.I.; and Mrs. Katherine Fraser to London. Mrs. Lois Johnson was appointed, effective November 20, to fill the Church Extension deaconess vacancy which resulted from Miss Randall's transfer to overseas work.
- ARMAGH - With the very limited number of unmarried mothers seeking institutional care and the extremely disturbed girls referred to Armagh for a very limited time, this work suffered considerably in 1978. The Director, Miss Helen Ingleby, resigned in December and the Armagh Board engaged Miss Bette Menary as a consultant to study the situation and make recommendations regarding the direction the work at Armagh should take. This study is in process.
- FIFTY-ONE STUDENTS were appointed to serve during the summer of 1978.
- THE EXPANSION OF FRENCH WORK which we anticipated last year did not materialize. The Rev. Jean Porret, who, in addition to chaplaincy work at the University of Montreal, had been giving 40 per cent of his time to French work under the BWM, was appointed to the full-time chaplaincy by the University of Montreal in September.
- IN CHURCH EXTENSION, three new manses were purchased to house appointees to new work; Parksville, Vancouver Island; College Park, Saskatoon; and Milliken, East Toronto Presbytery. The work in College Park is showing great promise under the leadership of Rev. Frank VanderZwan, a 1978 graduate of Knox College. New work in Heart Lake, Brampton Presbytery, is planned for early 1979.

N.B. For further information on "Special Ministries" see the field reports from each synod.

CHURCH EXTENSION

- THE PARTICULAR aspect of the Church's work assigned to the Church Extension Committee continued to be one of the most hopeful, exciting, satisfying and frustrating areas covered by the BWM.
- TEN ACTIVE, vibrant new congregations established within the past five years are now well organized and making a significant witness in their respective communities. These are: First, Sackville, N.S.; Trinity-Kanata, Ottawa, Malvern, East Toronto; Brant Hills, Burlington; White Oak, Mississauga; Glenbrook, Mississauga; Waterloo North; St. Mark's, Malton; Centennial, Calgary; and Langley, B.C.
- WORK has also started in Milliken, East Toronto; Saltfleet, Hamilton; College Park, Saskatoon; and Parksville, Vancouver Island; and an appointment has been made to Heart Lake in the Brampton area.
- THERE are numerous other communities across Canada where the opportunities for Church Extension are obvious, but the resources are not available.
- PLANNING for Church Extension, and the direction of the work, are within the authority and responsibility of the local presbytery. When a proposed site is approved by the presbytery and the Board of World Mission, there begins the long and often discouraging process of seeking a suitable site to be purchased for the new congregation. Often there is consultation with other denominations interested in the same area, and occasionally, because of the inflated cost of land in many areas, the only possible alternative is to purchase a site jointly for shared use. When sufficient housing units are occupied in the area to justify a start, a minister interested in and suitable for this type of assignment is appointed. The work generally begins in rented facilities, frequently a public school. The

emphasis in every case is on the development of a worshipping, Biblically-knowledgeable community. Communicant classes, eldership training courses, etc. follow naturally, as well as outreach to the neighbourhood through evangelism and service programs.

- ACCOMMODATION for the minister and his family is required at once. Wherever possible a manse is purchased by the Board of World Mission, to be held for the new congregation until development has reached the stage where the local group can assume responsibility.
- APART from the need for substantial grants to cover the basic stipend and allowances over the first years in the life of such congregations, there is also urgent need for capital funds. Under present policy, the church site is purchased by the national Church as a gift to the new congregation. Funds are also required to purchase a manse, and these funds will not be recoverable for a number of years. When construction of a sanctuary begins, the congregation will look to the Lending Fund Committee and The Presbyterian Church Building Corporation to assist them in securing loans at reasonable rates. The success of such special appeals as the Second Century Advance for Christ is directly related to our ability to respond to the needs and opportunities for Christian Outreach into new communities.

INNER CITY

- AN INNER CITY WORKER'S CONFERENCE was held at Ewart College, Toronto and was attended by 24 persons from across the Church. The theme was "The Church in the Inner City". Representatives of various denominations were invited to address the conference, indicating their approach and strategy for inner city ministry. Visits were made to the Warden Woods Community, Scarborough, and St. John's Place, Hamilton. A doctor from a Community Health Centre and a minister working with immigrants in Toronto also addressed the conference. In addition, there was an opportunity for those present to share with each other the work in which they are involved.
- THE MATTER OF USING VOLUNTEERS in urban ministry was discussed at the conference. It was felt that because many older urban or inner city congregations are lacking in young people who can give leadership and assist in outreach in the community in which the church is located, and also because this type of outreach can be more effective with a team ministry, a program of home mission volunteers could meet a real need. (See recommendation #11 of the BWM).
- THERE ARE a number of inner city areas across the Church where declining Presbyterian congregations are situated in the midst of a mission situation and very little, if anything, is being done to meet the need for the ministry of the Christian Church. The Inner City Committee is prepared to assist presbyteries to assess such situations, and to consult with them about the development of an inner city ministry and the recruitment of suitable personnel.

CANADA MISSIONS

- THE WORK of Canada Missions covers a vast territory and a wide assortment of projects.
- AID-RECEIVING fields which attained self-supporting status in 1978 are: Sackville, N.B.; Tyne Valley, P.E.I.; Moose Creek, Centreville, Ajax, Burlington-Pineland, Port Dover, London-Westmount, in Ontario; North Battleford, Sask.; Grande Prairie, Alta.; Brentwood and Calvin Hungarian in Vancouver; and Sooke on Vancouver Island.
- SOME of these congregations have been requiring grants since their inception as new charges, others while recovering from disaster. The first is the group of congregations in process of growth from the original Church Extension phase, where all costs of stipend and allowances were met by the Board of World Mission. The other type of situation is in a previously self-supporting charge where some problem in the congregation has brought a sudden threat to its existence

and the Presbytery has requested the BWM to provide support until the situation can be rectified. The failure rate in such "rehabilitation projects" is gratifyingly low.

- THERE ARE NOW 23 WOMEN in the active ministry across the Church, 3 others not presently on active service, and 12 new women graduates joining ranks of Canada Missions during the coming summer.
- IN ADDITION to ministers from overseas who have served their own people in past years in our so-called "ethnic" congregations, there are now a dozen others serving in other congregations. This is in addition to ministers from the British Isles and U.S.A., and students from other lands graduating from our colleges.
- A NOTABLE STEP forward being made by the Board of World Mission is the mission work on the frontiers of Canada, notable in the unique plan for a Ministry in the North (N.W.T.) and also in the opening of new full time ministries based at Buffalo Narrows in Saskatchewan, and Fort McMurray in Alberta. Because of unusual circumstances, the work at Whitehorse falls into a similar category, and an effort is planned to restore the witness of our Church in the Yukon which began with the ministries of Sinclair, Grant and Dickey during the Goldrush days. This is particularly timely with the recent designation of Whitehorse as the capital city of Canada's next province.

MISSION EDUCATION

- REV. MALCOLM RANSOM retired in July and Rev. Glen Davis began work as Secretary of Mission Education in 1978.
- DEPUTATION: A total of 31 people, including 18 home and overseas missionaries, four overseas visitors and students, and 9 staff, were engaged in deputation in 41 presbyteries. Dr. Margaret Kennedy carried a major share of the deputation.
- OVERSEAS VISITORS were Rev. Duk-Sung Kim and Rev. Kyung-Shik ("Sam") Choi of the Korean Christian Church in Japan, who proved, through a month of strenuous deputation, that mission is not a one-way street.
- LITERATURE:
 - Quick Facts were produced on Church Extension, Overseas Students, and Laymen Abroad, Church and University, Peace River, and People in Mission. Demand for Quick Facts continued to be high and all 13 are being updated and reprinted.
 - Encounter - One issue, on the current mission study theme "China" was produced. "Encounter" will be replaced by a new publication "Mission Update".
 - Thank God We Can Still Do More in Mission, a popular account of mission work at home and overseas, was dedicated "to the Rev. R. Malcolm and Gerry Ransom in tribute to their years of service in Christ's mission".
 - A Mission Resources Catalogue was published and distributed.
 - Mission Capsules on the work of the BWM, now being prepared for use in church bulletins, etc., are sent out to ministers each month.
- AUDIO VISUALS: Filmstrips produced were: "Development is for People" (in co-operation with Inter-Church Aid), and "John Geddie and Company" (in co-operation with the Presbytery of Pictou).
- STUDY THEMES: Mission Education participated in the development and promotion of study materials for the 1978-79 theme "Contemporary China". The 1979-80 theme "Human Rights and the International Order" will be supplemented by materials relating the question of human rights and the gospel to specific areas in which The Presbyterian Church in Canada is involved.
- FIELD WORK: The new secretary feels it is essential to spend as much time as possible in the field working with congregations and presbyteries on their mission education work. He also feels the need to see at first hand the work being done throughout the church in order to understand and interpret that work.
- MISSION CONTACT PERSONS: In keeping with the General Assembly's instruction to presbyteries "to secure a contact person in every congregation to be responsible for mission information", a total of 240 names have been received to date and a packet of information and suggestions has gone to them.
- LAYMEN ABROAD: With the resignation of Miss Pat Hanna the services to lay people going abroad are now the responsibility of Mission Education.

1979 Presbyterian Church Calendar

- 40,000 COPIES of the 1979 Calendar were sold. Approximately 2500 Calendars were used for promotional purposes and sent out as complimentary copies to friends around the world.
- THE 1980 CALENDAR will have as its theme "Human Rights and the Gospel."

Joint Task Force on Mission Education

- THE TASK FORCE exists in order to co-ordinate the production and promotion of mission education resources by the WMS (WD) BCL and BWM.
- MISSION STUDY THEMES: Work was begun on materials on the 1979-80 theme "Human Rights and the International Order" and a film on the Middle East entitled "Hope for Life", along with a study guide related to the theme "Middle East Mosaic", is available through Communication Services. Miss Margaret Kennedy has been requested to prepare background materials on "India and Nepal", the 1980-81 study theme.
- THE MISSION POSTER KIT, a BCL project with assistance from BWM in providing materials, was very successful, and materials have been reprinted.

MISSIONARY RESIDENCE

- 462 Oriole Parkway, Toronto
- THE MISSIONARY RESIDENCE was well used in 1978. It is a well furnished comfortable home for overseas personnel and a limited number of Canadian personnel. Mr. & Mrs. Douglas Randall kept the Residence in good repair during the year.
- SPECIAL GIFTS were received: From Glenview Church, Toronto - \$1,000; WMS (ED) - \$500; and Leaside, Toronto Ladies - a set of dishes. These gifts which make improvements in the residence possible, are much appreciated.

RESEARCH AND PLANNING

- TASK FORCES on (1) China, Taiwan and The Presbyterian Church in Canada, (2) The Presbyterian Church and Native People, and (3) Combatting Racism in Africa and Canada prepared a number of recommendations which are being brought to the General Assembly by the Board of World Mission.
- RESEARCH AND PLANNING papers and recommendations were also prepared in reply to Overture #7, 1978 "Maintaining the Rural Ministry" and Overture #20, 1978 "Visitations to Ethnic Congregations."
- REFERRAL FROM 1978: State of the Church Report to the General Assembly. Representatives were named to two joint committees (with BCL) to examine recommendations regarding (1) Church growth, and (2) support of national ministry with youth. The decision was made to obtain the services of Rev. Douglas Walrath as a Consultant to help develop a strategy for church growth.

CHURCH AND UNIVERSITY

- There was increased participation during 1978 by congregations in organizing ministry to their own students who are attending college or university and the endeavours of congregations close to a campus to reach out to the students of that campus. Interesting and very positive comments have been received from those involved in this interchange with students. It has helped enrich not only individual lives but also congregational life.
- THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA continued to participate in ecumenical type chaplaincy at seven Canadian universities and Rev. Jean Porret served full-time as a Protestant Chaplain at the Universite de Montreal. Nine Presbyterians served as part-time chaplains at other universities, a community college, and student residences.
- OUR SUPPORT of Inter-Varsity Christian Fellowship, the Student Christian Movement, the International Fellowship of Evangelical Students, and the World Student Christian Federation continued.

- THERE IS CONCERN that there are a number of universities where The Presbyterian Church in Canada does not have any official representation, e.g., Dalhousie, York, University of Toronto, University of Waterloo, Guelph, University of Manitoba. Quoting from the Secretary's report: "although chaplaincy will never provide a self-supporting congregation, it may have a vital influence on those whose lives it touches. These people are, in future, likely to be among those who work in the power structures and the decision making bodies that effect the lives of many."

OVERSEAS STUDENTS

- IN SEPTEMBER 1978, with the resignation of Miss Pat Hanna as Director of Overseas Students, the Secretary for Church and University became responsible for this work.
- THE SECRETARY works with International Student Advisors on college and university campi and with the Canadian Bureau of International Education, endeavouring to assess needs of foreign students which the Church can help alleviate.
- THE SECOND ASPECT of work with foreign students is to help churches realize the potential enrichment there is for the congregations that arrange for foreign students to be resource people in some of their study groups.
- CONGREGATIONS close by a college or university campus are urged to contact the Director for Overseas Students on the campus to ascertain opportunities available for members of the congregation to relate to them.
- ANOTHER CHALLENGE for Presbyterian congregations results from government policy of contracting education, e.g., beginning in 1978, 500 Nigerian students will come to Canada in each of the next five years to study at community colleges and universities. The program is administered by the Canadian Bureau for International Education. Local churches are encouraged to work with the colleges in helping students to adjust. In 1978, the area where students made the best adjustment was in Windsor, Ontario. It was generally agreed that the reason was because the college worked with the local town council, churches, business establishments and others in Windsor to provide a number of events for these students when they arrived. This enabled the students to relate to the community and vice versa. Furthermore, it established an ongoing relationship that made it easier for the students to adapt to their new environment.

OVERSEAS SCHOLARSHIPS

- REV. DR. DAVID SAINDI CHIPHANGWI completed his doctoral program at University of Aberdeen. He returned to Malawi in September to teach at the Joint Theological College in Zomba, Malawi.
- REV. DAVID ESSIEN of Nigeria studied in St. Andrew's College Selly Oak Colleges, Birmingham, England for one academic year on a Board of World Mission program. He is continuing studies in Birmingham but with private support.
- REV. C. J. SU of Taiwan is on the second year of studies at Westhill College, Selly Oak Colleges, Birmingham, England. Mr. Su is in a religious studies Christian education program.
- REV. DAVID MPHANDE completed B.Th. studies at Presbyterian College. He has been accepted into the S.T.M. program and continues on B.W.M. scholarship through to completion of these studies in 1980. Mr. Mphande is from the Livingstonia Synod of the Church of Central Africa (Presbyterian).
- REV. MOSES HARSHAM of the Guyana Presbyterian Church, is taking classes at Ewart College and at Knox. His aim is to return to Guyana to give leadership in Christian Education.
- THE BWM PROVIDED partial support for three leaders of the Korean Christian Church in Japan. Miss Lee Eung Ja, Mr. Park Mi Woong and Miss Kim Hae Sook.
- THE BWM IS GRATEFUL to those who contribute to the BWM Scholarship Program over and above the Budget.

No. 1—PRESBYTERY OF BRAMPTON

*Re: CO-ORDINATED CORE CURRICULUM FOR ALL SCHOOL LEVELS
IN CANADA
(Referred to the Board of Congregational Life)*

To the Venerable the 105th General Assembly:

WHEREAS, Statistics Canada indicate forty-five per cent (45%) of all Canadians relocate their homes through intra and inter provincial immigration and forty-three per cent (43%) of children between the ages of five and nineteen also move; and

WHEREAS, basic levels of education should be co-ordinated to University levels; and

WHEREAS, such a co-ordination would also foster a deeper sense of unity; and

WHEREAS, the British North America Act prevents the Federal Government from co-ordination of such a venture and therefore a National Group should encourage such a practical approach to uniform education; and

WHEREAS, the Church, as in the past, should be a leader in education;

THEREFORE, the Presbytery of Brampton humbly overtures the Venerable, the Assembly, to study this matter and take whatever steps it deems necessary, with the co-operation of the other church bodies, as willing, to encourage the Ministries of Education for the Provinces and Territories to continue their study and consultation for the implementation of a co-ordinated national core curriculum for all school levels in Canada. This basic core to be gradually expanded, while leaving room for local flavour topics within our educational system, or to do otherwise as The General Assembly in its wisdom, may deem best.

No. 2—SYNOD OF SASKATCHEWAN

*Re: MOVING HOUSEHOLD AND PERSONAL EFFECTS
(Referred to Board of World Mission)*

To the Venerable the 105th General Assembly:

WHEREAS, the 104th General Assembly adopted Recommendation 25 of the Board of World Mission – Revised Regulations on Moving Household and Personal Effects – prescribing a maximum weight limit of 6,000 pounds for shipment by moving van, any excess to be refunded by the appointee; and

WHEREAS, in many normal households, especially of families with children, or where appliances are not provided at the destination, the weight of a reasonable complement of furniture and effects exceeds this amount; and

WHEREAS, the new regulations adopted in June, 1978, have been applied to appointees graduating in the spring of 1978 (who had little opportunity to prepare themselves for meeting a considerable portion of the moving expenses); and

WHEREAS, the new regulations impose an inequitable burden on married graduates with families, who have already accepted many sacrifices, and who at the end of their course of study are typically loaded with heavy debts, including student loans, and the necessary expenses of relocation; and

WHEREAS, the burdens of our present financial condition in the church should not be inequitably laid on the shoulders of those least able to bear them; and

WHEREAS, the new regulations impose an inequitable burden on appointees sent – through a process ultimately beyond their control – to places in Canada distant from the theological colleges, and may even make it impossible for the most qualified candidates to accept appointments in Atlantic or Western Canada, and especially in remote frontier fields; and

WHEREAS, the acceptance of the prescribed Board of World Mission appointment is a prerequisite for ordination in our church, and to require payment for the necessary move of a normal range of furniture and effects would appear to be exacting a purchase price for a spiritual office, something which is contrary to the Gospel;

THEREFORE, the Synod of Saskatchewan humbly overtures the General Assembly as follows:

1. That the regulations requiring appointees' repayment to the Board of World Mission for shipments in excess of 6,000 pounds be rescinded, and any amounts collected in this respect by the Board of World Mission from 1978 graduates be refunded;
2. That in framing revised regulations the Board of World Mission take into account the differences in normal and reasonable complements of furniture and effects arising from such circumstances as the number and ages of dependents, and the appliances, etc., furnished or not furnished at the destination, and establish a scale of weight limits which would more appropriately encompass these differences;
3. That any excess weight charges under the newly-framed regulations be repayable by the appointee in monthly or quarterly instalments over the full length of his or her two- or three-year term of appointment; and
4. That the implications of the revised regulations be fully disclosed to all students for the ministry, and prior to any discussions with graduating students re: opportunities for service in various parts of Canada;

or to do otherwise for this object as the General Assembly in its wisdom may deem best.

No. 3—PRESBYTERY OF WEST TORONTO

*Re: PROVINCIAL HEALTH INSURANCE
(Referred to the Board of World Mission in Consultation

To the Venerable the 105th General Assembly:

WHEREAS, one of the benefits received by some Ordained ministers in self-supporting charges is payment of Provincial Health Insurance premiums;

Re: STEWARDSHIP STRUCTURE
(Referred to the Administrative Council)

To the Venerable the 105th General Assembly:

WHEREAS, the work and witness of The Presbyterian Church in Canada has for many years been seriously hampered by a chronic inadequacy of funding for the initiation of new projects, and for the maintenance of those already undertaken, as is evident from the frequency of major campaigns, — the Foundation Fund, the Advance for Christ and Peacethankoffering, the Sector Project, the National Development Fund, and (now) the Second Century Advance for Christ; and of lesser appeals — for Presbyterian College, for St. Andrew's Hall, for India Famine Relief, for Ewart College, for Gracefield Centre, for St. Andrew's Homes Inc., for Tyndale House and Community Centre, for Evangel Hall, for Glen Mhor Camp, for the Native Canadian Centre. . . . all of these and many more over the past forty years; and

WHEREAS, our present financial stringency has been confirmed and emphasized in a circular letter from the Administrative Council dated February 15th 1978; and

WHEREAS, as a method of procuring funds for the legitimate and foreseeable work of the Church, campaigns and appeals are time-consuming, counter-productive, and wasteful of the personnel and material of the Church; and in the last analysis do little to solve the basic problem of Christian stewardship among us; and

WHEREAS, the wide disparity evident in the liberality of our membership — a circumstance which has demonstrably no relation to our respective personal resources — tends to be institutionalized rather than alleviated by successive campaigns and appeals; and is accordingly destructive of the harmony, unity and vitality of the Church; and

WHEREAS, the use of the *duplex* envelope — entrenched and popular as it is — rests on the totally erroneous assumption that the Church is a self-existent body that *has* a mission to the world, in such a way as to divorce the existence of the Church from its life, as though the two were separate entities and concerns — thus creating "members" of the Church whose interests are confined to the local congregation, and who do not therefore participate in the Church's life; and

WHEREAS, the principle of establishing a "floor" or minimum in financial matters is already accepted and in general use in connection with the terms of calls to ministers which may be issued by self-sustaining congregations and pastoral

charges; and this principle (the "minimum stipend") ensures that a minister may not be required to serve under circumstances of financial stringency and embarrassment;

THEREFORE, we the Presbytery of East Toronto, humbly overture the Venerable the 105th General Assembly seriously to consider re-shaping the stewardship structure of the Church so as to eliminate the need for financial campaigns and special appeals; and to modify, insofar as may be practicable, the appalling inequities which exist in the stewardship of our members — in the following manner:

1. By reaffirming the principle of guaranteed annual minimum stipends and allowances as presently authorized by the General Assembly;
2. By promulgating the principle, *in congregations*, of guaranteed annual minimum average of contributions per member sufficient to permit the Church to discharge its obligations for initiating new work and in maintaining that to which we are already committed;
3. By abandoning the use of the word "allocation" with regard to a congregation's responsibility for the Budget, and substituting instead the term "assessment" — thereby signifying more clearly the obligatory (as opposed to optional) nature of the Christian stewardship of money; the amount of the assessment to be reckoned as at present: (a) a stated levy per member of the congregation, and (b) a fixed percentage of the "Total Normal Expenditure" of the congregation as reported for the previous fiscal year; the percentage to be reviewed from time to time by the General Assembly in consultation with the Administrative Council;
4. By requiring all congregations and/or pastoral charges — whether aid-receiving or self-sustaining — in order to be eligible for assistance from the church at large, to meet the per member minimum average of contributions established by the General Assembly as in (3) above; and that all congregations and/or pastoral charges seeking the services of a minister, whether by appointment or by moderating in a call, be required to furnish the Presbytery with a guarantee of per member average of contributions conformable to that established as a minimum throughout the Church, as in (3) above;
5. That the use of the duplex envelope be dispensed with and replaced by a simple one-cell envelope, without differentiation.

No. 8—PRESBYTERY OF EDMONTON

Re: ASSISTANCE AT RETIREMENT
(Referred to the Pension Board consulting with Dr. R. G. MacMillan)

To the Venerable the 105th General Assembly:

WHEREAS, the Presbyterian Church Building Corporation, at the 103rd General Assembly, expressed concern for church "retired servants"; and

WHEREAS, the General Assembly recommended that congregations and individuals be encouraged to assist the Presbyterian Church Building Corporation in every way possible. . . to secure housing accommodation (for church servants) at the time of retirement; and

WHEREAS, we believe that each retirement situation would have individual needs whether it be housing, apartment, furniture or cash; and

WHEREAS, gifts, donations, etc. are of great assistance but are not necessarily reliable enough that plans can be based on them; and

WHEREAS, financial contributions and financial donations can result in actual planning and offer an entitlement to the contributor;

THEREFORE, be it resolved that we recommend consideration be given to establishing a "gratuity fund" operated through the central Presbyterian Church administration whereby both the congregations and the church servants would contribute to the fund. Basis of operation would be as follows:

GRATUITY FUND

PART I - CONTRIBUTIONS

1. Church servants to contribute \$10.00 per month; (a suggested amount that could be adjusted)
2. Employer (local congregation) to contribute \$10.00 per month;
3. Items of contribution as referred to in 1 & 2 above to be forwarded to the Church Office to invest, on best advice, to provide best possible secure growth of the Gratuity Fund;
4. Provision made for church servant contributors to participate in the management, control and general administration of the Fund;
5. Provision made for adjustment of contribution in keeping with the cost of living and/or other reflective costs, or desires of the majority of the contributors;
6. Contributions to the Fund may be made:
 - (a) voluntary by congregations or individual donors to assist in the initial growth development;
 - (b) extra contributions may be made voluntarily by church servants to the credit of a particular church servant or to the general growth of the Fund;
 - (c) individual donors may donate to the general growth of the Fund or to the credit of a specific church servant.

PART II - ENTITLEMENT

1. Gratuity payable in accordance with;
 - (a) his/her accumulative contribution; plus
 - (b) employer's accumulative contribution; plus
 - (c) any contributions made by a third party; plus
 - (d) any declared growth benefits.
2. Church servants, upon retirement or leaving the service of the Church, shall receive a lump sum payment.

PART III - PAYMENT

1. When a church servant decides to retire or leave the service of the Church he/she shall be entitled to receive the total gratuity payment at the date of retirement or separation, providing that at least 90 days prior written notice has been given.
 2. In all other cases payment shall be made as expeditiously as possible.

WHEREAS, the total of 168,502 communicants would provide \$4,749,108. at \$28.18 per member;

THEREFORE, we the Presbytery of Kamloops do humbly overture the Venerable the General Assembly that a budget figure be assessed in the following manner: \$20.00 per communicant member plus 10% of the amount spent in excess of \$25,000. of normal operating expenses, per charge, as a minimum, or to do otherwise as in their wisdom they deem best.

"WHEREAS, according to the Declaration of Faith concerning the Church and Nation, The Presbyterian Church in Canada states, that

7. The Church and the State are intimately related, with manifold overlying concerns and common responsibility to their Lord.
and

8. . . .the Church may not hold aloof from the affairs of the Nation; and

WHEREAS, the Presbyterian Church during the last several years of debate has never stated its position in regard to proposals for a new Canadian Constitution; and

WHEREAS, the Session of St. Columba on July 22, 1978 through its spokes-person, Mrs. Kay Berry, has won the B.C. Province-wide contest to a preamble-to-the-constitution;

THEREFORE, the Session of St. Columba petitions the Presbytery of Westminster to overture the Venerable the 105th General Assembly to adopt the following contest-winning text as the Church's proposal for a preamble-to-the-constitution and forward the same to the Parliament of Canada, or do as in its wisdom may deem best:

'In This the second century of our nationhood, we, the Parliament of the people of Canada, grateful to Almighty God who has given us this beautiful country and accepting the ethnic and cultural contributions made by those who compose the nation of Canada, reaffirm as follows:

We reaffirm our faith in freedom to live, to work, to have our being with dignity without let or hindrance;

We reaffirm our freedom to worship God in whatsoever manner our consciences may dictate;

We reaffirm our faith in the democratic form of government securing us the right to select and choose how and by whom we shall be governed;

We reaffirm our belief in the rights and privileges of all who live in this land, acknowledging the cultural contributions and privileges of our native Indians and Eskimos and the courage of the French and English settlers who opened up this land, pushing the boundaries from sea to sea and from the Arctic Circle to the 49th parallel;

We reaffirm the same rights and privileges to all others who have come from all continents seeking freedom, to contribute to the kaleidoscope of cultures which is to be the birthright of all who come after us;

Thus, in this second century of our nationhood, with the advice and consent of the Senate and the House of Commons, we petition Her Majesty to re-enact a constitution, particularly and peculiarly Canadian in concept and origin, embodying all the relevant points of the British North America Act and adding to it as the needs of our nation change;

Finally, we affirm the unity of Canada as a nation dedicated to the larger good of all humanity."

*Re: TERM ELDERSHIP**To the Venerable the 105th General Assembly:*

WHEREAS, according to the Book of Forms, Sec. 108, "Elders once lawfully called to office and having gifts of God meet to exercise the same, may not leave it again. Elders continue elders for life unless deposed, or suspended in process of discipline. Nevertheless they may demit the active exercise of the office in any particular congregation;" and

WHEREAS, an increasing number of elders after serving diligently in the office for many years wish to resign their place on the Session, but hesitate so to do because of the appearance of dissension and disapproval such action would suggest, and therefore remain on the Session somewhat reluctantly; and

WHEREAS, many communicant members increasingly refuse to accept an election to the eldership because they do not wish an appointment to any office for life, and thus many excellent men and women are lost to our Sessions; and

WHEREAS, a term eldership on a Session would ensure that those on a Session at any particular time were more representative of a changing society, and a constantly changing membership within our congregations, and thus more competent to meet the problems and determine the policies of the Church in the world; and

WHEREAS, an increasing number of Churches within the Reformed Tradition have had the policy of term eldership for many years, and this policy has been apparently workable and sufficiently successful that such churches have no thought of reverting to life eldership; and

WHEREAS, a maximum term of six years has become an accepted policy in our appointments to the various Boards and Committees of our Church.

THEREFORE, the Presbytery of Superior humbly overtures the Venerable, the General Assembly of The Presbyterian Church in Canada,

1. That the necessary procedures be followed in the General Assembly and under the Barrier Act to alter the rules of The Presbyterian Church in Canada, to make it the rule and practice of our Church that when a ruling elder is elected and ordained, his or her ordination shall be for life, and that such an elder's active term on the Session of that particular congregation shall be for six years, and thereafter he or she will not be eligible for re-election to the active eldership for a period, not less than twelve months.
2. Or do otherwise for this object, as in its wisdom the General Assembly may deem best.

WHEREAS, questions regarding these grants have received uncertain answers; and

WHEREAS, thousands of Presbyterians are concerned and angry that monies sent by The Presbyterian Church in Canada could provide arms for such revolutionary forces; and

WHEREAS, the Salvation Army General Council felt deeply concerned over these grants and took the serious step of suspending its membership in the World Council of Churches to support this concern; and

WHEREAS, the Presbyterian Church in Ireland at a specially convened General Assembly suspended its membership because of a similar concern; and

WHEREAS, other bodies within and without the Presbyterian Alliance are in the process of considering the grave action of the World Council of Churches;

THEREFORE, the Kirk Session of Trinity Presbyterian Church (Victoria, British Columbia) humbly overtures the Venerable General Assembly to condemn in the strongest possible terms the sending of money that could be used for purposes other than as intended; that because of the continuing political emphasis of the World Council of Churches, The Presbyterian Church in Canada suspend its membership in the World Council of Churches, or do otherwise to answer the concern within the Church as in its wisdom it deems fit.

Re: GRADUATING STUDENTS' APPOINTMENTS

To the Venerable the 105th General Assembly:

WHEREAS, the freedom to preach for a call was denied graduating theological students by action of the General Assembly of 1938 (Minutes p. 47), for the purpose of "solving the problem of Winter supply for student Mission fields"; and

WHEREAS, such freedom was restored to graduating theological students by action of the General Assembly of 1970 (minutes p. 45), as the result of study and unanimous recommendation by a special Committee of Assembly in consultation with the General Board of Missions; and

WHEREAS, such freedom was abruptly withdrawn from graduating theological students by action of the General Assembly of 1973 (Minutes p. 61), for the purpose of ensuring "the continuing witness of our Church outside the main centres of population"; and

WHEREAS, the problem of winter supply for student mission fields is no longer a major problem of the Church as it was deemed to be in 1939; and

WHEREAS, a primary and major missionary concern of the Church in contemporary Canadian society must be the spiritual and social needs of people *inside* the main centres of population, i.e., blighted inner city areas, ghettos, and suburbia; and

WHEREAS, the offering of sufficient suitable mission fields for all graduating theological students is becoming an increasingly vexatious problem for the Board of World Mission; and

WHEREAS, the appointment of some graduates to self-sustaining charges rather than mission fields destroys the principle of parity in appointments; and

WHEREAS, the growing enrolment of theological students may soon lead to an over-supply of graduates, with a consequent delay in appointment and ordination for many; and

WHEREAS, graduating theological students can always be challenged, enlisted, and called to serve as volunteers under Board of World Mission appointment wherever the need appears; and

WHEREAS, the attitude of voluntary cooperation is more appropriate to our Presbyterian tradition, and more to be desired than a sense of resentment against coercion;

THEREFORE, the Reverend the Presbytery of Algoma and North Bay respectfully overtures the Venerable the General Assembly for the good of the Church's ministry and mission, to repeal the restrictive regulation enacted by the General Assembly in 1973 anent graduating theological students, and to restore forthwith the freedom that was granted by the General Assembly of 1970; or to

appoint a committee whose responsibility it shall be to declare and demonstrate conclusively that such restriction of the freedom of graduates is not only beneficial but essential to the advancement of the Kingdom; or to do otherwise as the General Assembly, in its wisdom, may deem best.

MEMORIAL NO. 1 – PRESBYTERY OF MONTREAL

Re: PLACE OF WOMEN IN THE CHURCH

To the Venerable the 105th General Assembly:

The Presbytery of Montreal wishes to draw the attention of the Venerable the 105th General Assembly to the fact that, although the ordination of women to the eldership and to the ministry was enacted into the law of the church by the 92nd General Assembly, women, who are trying to obey Christ's call to His ministry, are experiencing discrimination and prejudice at all levels of church life.

In 1953 the 79th General Assembly appointed a *Committee on the Place of Women in the Church*. Its mandate was to make a full study and report on all aspects of this question, including ordination. (A&P 1954 p. 33) In the ensuing 13 years this committee did a superb job. Before the issue of women's liberation became headline news, they gave us "how and why" men and women should accept each other as equals.

"Within the life and work of the church which is the expression and servant of the purpose of God for mankind there can be no distinction in the status accorded men and women as members of the Body of Christ. As partners in the mutual and unified relationship which constitutes the nature of man, both are created, redeemed, called, commissioned, and empowered to express and serve the purpose of God for the world throughout the life, witness and work of the church." (A&P 1964 p. 387)

They recommended:

"That The Presbyterian Church in Canada affirm the right of women, who believe themselves called by God, and in whom the church is able to discern the necessary gifts, to enter and share the ministry of Word and Sacrament in all its aspects." (A&P 1965 p. 385 Recommendation 3)

The substance of this was sent down to the presbyteries under the Barrier Act in these terms:

"By enactment of the General Assembly women are eligible to become ministers of the church, and any reference herein or hereafter in the Book of Forms to men as candidates for the ministry, as licentiates or as ministers shall refer *mutatis mutandis*, to women, where applicable."

It was enacted into the law of the church in 1966. (A&P 1966 p. 47, 78)

It is our contention that, in the change from vision to law, the church began to lose sight of the "harmonious partnership in the image of God" which the committee had given us. It has become apparent that the spirit and intention of the law got lost in the period between the enactment of the law and the times when congregations, presbyteries and boards had to come to grips with the challenges presented by the ordination of women. It is not enough to have the law; we must provide means throughout the church to educate clergy and laity in the concept that

"Men and women alike are the objects and servants of the purpose of God, which the church has been created to express and fulfill." (A&P 1963 p. 307)

Now, when women in every part of society are claiming the parity that the church has offered for 13 years, women in ministry are experiencing discrimination and prejudice. They encounter it in "jokes" and crude remarks; in examining committees who ask them if they would not be happier at home rather than being ordained; in congregations who object to their appointment only because they are women; from interim-moderators who allow that to happen; from presbyters who do not reach out to educate their own congregations; from boards which do not apply the law with equity. In all these and other ways, what women in ministry really experience is a denial that Christ ever called them, and that His call is important, necessary or authentic. This denial of Christ's call to women is what cannot be tolerated in the church of Christ. The purpose of God requires the gifts of men and women in partnership.

"All women members of the church should accept the responsibility and be given the opportunity of serving Jesus Christ and their fellow human beings

in all areas and occupations of life as the members of His Body. This in turn should be the example to the world of how women should be accepted in all spheres of activity." (A&P 1964 p. 387)

In view of the above, we humbly request the Venerable the 105th General Assembly to appoint a special committee to undertake:

1. Education of the church in the implications of its law and commitment with regard to the ordination of women;
- 2.a. Change in the attitudes which cause congregations to be unwilling to consider a woman as their minister; interim-moderators to be unduly influenced by this prejudgement; presbyteries to permit this prejudice; and boards and committees of Assembly to be insensitive to the issue of discrimination against women in ministry;
- 2.b. Change in the attitudes which cause congregations to be unwilling to consider women as ruling elders, and presbyteries which permit this prejudice amongst their members;
3. Modification of the church's language and terminology, both oral and written, on all church bodies, so as not to be exclusive of women, with particular attention to the Book of Forms, the Book of Common Order and the Book of Praise;

or, to take whatever action the General Assembly in its wisdom deems best.

MEMORIAL NO. 3 – PRESBYTERY OF THE LAKE OF THE WOODS

THE CLERKS OF ASSEMBLY
 (Additional Report)
 Overture No. 28, 1979, Presbytery of Ottawa

The Presbytery of Ottawa overtures the General Assembly that Section 106 (a) be changed to permit any member of the congregation, regardless of age, to be eligible to be elected an elder.

This was last before the Church ten years ago when by notice of motion during the 1969 General Assembly it was agreed to remit to Presbyteries under the Barrier Act the revision of the above section in the lowering of the age wherewith members might be elected as elders from eighteen years and up rather than from twenty-one years as at present. It should be noted that the present overture prays for the removal of any restriction on age in the election of elders to Kirk-Sessions.

This matter came to the Clerks of Assembly too late to be considered, and included, in our report to the 105th General Assembly, but in this supplementary report the Clerks make reply to Overture No. 28.

The Clerks do not consider they are appointed to restrict changing the law of the Church, but rather to be means whereby the Church may amend its laws as it deems best. If this Assembly is of a mind to test the Church whether or not it agrees with the prayer of the Presbytery of Ottawa, the Clerks offer the following recommendation as the action this Assembly needs to take to enable such change to be made in our regulations.

RECOMMENDATION 15 A

That Presbyteries be invited under the Barrier Act to approve changing Section 106(a) by deleting "and twenty-one years of age at the least".

RIGHT TO REFER OVERTURES

The regulations of our Church permit Presbyteries to request the Committee on Business of the General Assembly to refer Overtures to Boards/Committees if the Presbytery makes such a request. In practice there have been times when Presbyteries have transmitted Overtures with requests for referrals to Boards/Committees after these Boards/Committees have held their stated meetings, and thereby the Overture has not received the consideration it would otherwise have. The Clerks of Assembly therefore present the following:

RECOMMENDATION 16 A

That if the Board/Committee to whom an Overture has been referred by a Presbytery has no upcoming meeting in which to consider the Overture before the Assembly meets, then the Committee on Business has the right under Section 296-3 to refer the Overture to the Committee on Bills and Overtures for disposition.

INTERPRETATION OF RECOMMENDATION NO. 21,
 AMENDED BY THE 1978 GENERAL ASSEMBLY

The Clerks of Assembly were requested by the Board of World Mission to interpret the above recommendation as it appears on pages 409 and 81 of the 1978 General Assembly. The Clerks gave an interpretation, and consider the subject is important enough to be recorded in the Acts and Proceedings of the 1979 General Assembly, and that the interpretation given should be confirmed, or otherwise interpreted by this General Assembly.

The recommendation as amended is as follows:

"That at the completion of the two year term of service a certificate shall be issued by the Board of World Mission indicating that the ordinand has complied with the terms of appointment, and that an ordinand may receive a call but not leave the place of appointment earlier than the completion of the two year term".

The Clerks interpreted this resolution to mean –

- 1) That an ordinand must accept a two year appointment as set forth in the 1974 Acts and Proceedings Pages 203-204.

2) That the ordinand must complete the two year appointment before he/she is eligible for induction in a local charge.

3) That in order to facilitate a reasonable settlement after the two year appointment has been served, the Clerks consider the minister should have the right to preach for a Call during the three month period immediately before the completion of the appointment, and the Presbyteries should be permitted to process any Call so that the minister could be ready to be inducted on the completion of his/her two year appointment.

4) These regulations apply to the pastoral charge where the ordinand is serving as well as any other pastoral charge to which he/she may be called.

RECOMMENDATION 17 C

That the above interpretation be confirmed by this Assembly.

INTERPRETATION OF SECTION 235 (b) AS SUBMITTED UNDER THE BARRIER ACT BY THE 1978 GENERAL ASSEMBLY

Section 235(b), if approved by this General Assembly under the Barrier Act, will enable congregations, through their Presbyteries, to induct an Assistant Minister for a term of . . . years.

One Presbytery has raised the question of what happens after the expiration of the term for which the minister has been inducted and the parties concerned wish the relationship to continue for another term. The Clerks believe that to accomplish an extension of the induction for another period of years the Presbytery of the bounds could approve this on application of the congregation from a regularly called meeting of the congregation, and such not requiring another service of induction.

RECOMMENDATION 18 A

That the above interpretation be approved by General Assembly as a Declaratory Statement.

KNOX COLLEGE BOARD (Additional Report)

- I. The Report of Knox College previously submitted should be corrected as follows:
 - i) The cumulative total erosion of capital should read \$190,000.
 - ii) The Reverend James R. Weir's gift of \$114, and the gift from St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Kitchener, in the amount of \$20,000, should be listed under *Gifts to the College*.
 - iii) The G. F. MacDonald Estate (under (c) Distributions) should read \$100. Knox College does not hold the capital.
 - iv) The Class of 1950 Award should read \$1,248.12.
- II. Additional Recommendations from the Board of Knox College to the 105th General Assembly

Subject: *Governance*

The Board of Knox College brings two major concerns to the General Assembly: (A) The need to strengthen existing sources of income and develop new sources of support; (B) The need to meet accreditation standards of the Association of Theological Schools in the United States and Canada in preparation for the accreditation visit of 1980, specifically in the area of governance.

We therefore recommend:

RECOMMENDATION 2 (1) A

That the Board of Knox College be enlarged to 24 members, in addition to the present seven ex officio members.

RECOMMENDATION 2 (2) D

That the Board of Knox College be allowed to nominate one-half of the members for appointment to the Board by the General Assembly.

RECOMMENDATION 2 (3a) A

When a professional chair becomes vacant or a new chair has been established by the General Assembly on recommendation from the Board of Knox College, the Board shall have authority to circulate the presbyteries directly, informing them of the vacancy, providing a job description, and inviting names for information.

RECOMMENDATION 2 (3b) A

If the appointment is at the rank of a full professor and thereby involves tenure, the Board will send the name and nomination directly to the General Assembly, and the General Assembly will deal with the name in accordance with present procedures.*

RECOMMENDATION 2 (3c) C

When an appointment is at the rank of associate or assistant professor, and is non-tenured, then the appointment may be made directly by the Board of the College. After circulation of the Presbyteries.

RECOMMENDATION 2 (3d) A

Where a non-tenured faculty member is to receive tenure, presbyteries will be informed by the Board, and his/her name will be presented directly to the General Assembly, there to be dealt with in accordance with present procedures.*

RECOMMENDATION 2 (4) C

Within a framework of a budget submitted to and approved by General Assembly, the salaries of faculty and principal are to be determined by the Board of Knox College.

**Present procedures call for a single nomination from the Knox College Board to the General Assembly. The Assembly may approve that nomination or vote against it, in which case it is sent back to the College for reconsideration. There are no nominations from the floor.*

The Goal of Knox College

- 1:1 The College's primary purpose is to prepare men and women for ministry in our church.
- 1:2 This purpose shapes and re-shapes our curriculum. Hence recent revisions in the curriculum have placed increasing emphasis on the development of the skills of ministry.
- 1:3 This emphasis requires a wide range of expertise: pastoral psychology; worship, spirituality and preaching; Christian education; communications; parish and mission; and clinical pastoral education.
- 1:4 Our Field Education Programme, which involves our students in the practice of ministry under careful supervision, calls for the training of supervisors, and resources that can provide such training.
- 1:5 In fulfillment of this goal our faculty are ministers of The Presbyterian Church in Canada, committed to its service and its mission.

The Task of Fulfilling This Goal Beyond the Church's Present Provision

- 2:1 The enrolment of the College has doubled in a 10-year period. In 1968, with a faculty of six, our enrolment was 65; and in 1978, with a faculty of five, our enrolment was 120. No provision has been made by the church to meet the extra demands this involves.
- 2:2 The wide range of material to be covered in each of the major disciplines requires more than one faculty member in each of those disciplines.
- 2:3 The church cannot afford the necessary financial resources to enable Knox College to provide the additional faculty resources that the increasing range of disciplines and skills demands. The College must therefore seek access to these resources through related institutions and additional funding.
- 2:4 No one college can any longer afford to provide adequate library resources in all the areas of studies required at both the basic and advanced degree level.

- 2:5 No one college can provide the essential range of courses in the traditional disciplines.

Additional Resources Now Available

- 3:1 Our relationship with the Toronto School of Theology, in existence now for nine years, is able to provide us with access to the necessary range of disciplines and the essential resources for training in the skills of ministry.
- 3:2 The Toronto School of Theology and the University of Toronto library system enables us to concentrate our limited resources on those areas most appropriate to the preparation of men and women for ministry in the Reformed tradition.
- 3:3 The *Toronto Institute of Pastoral Training*, a subdivision of TST, provides our students with access to supervised training in clinical pastoral education in hospitals and correctional institutions.

Additional Funding Required

- 4:1 Knox College provides candidates for ministry at a cost far in excess of the allocation which is given out of the budget funds of the church. The budget funds of the church for 1979 will constitute about 45 percent of the total cost of the academic operation (exclusive of the residence) of the College.
- 4:2 Financial support for the work of the College in its task of preparing men and women for ministry comes from two other major sources: endowments and government grants.
- 4:3 Endowments for general purposes have been consistently eroded as the College has been forced to use them to make up operating deficits. At the end of 1978 the accumulated deficit was \$162,089, of which \$118,342 arose in the last five years.
- 4:4 It is imperative that the Board of the College be reconstituted in such a way that it can develop new sources of funding both within and without the church, so as to enable the College to fulfill its responsibilities to the church without imposing increasingly difficult financial demands on the limited resources of the church.

The Importance of Accreditation

- 5:1 Through the Memorandum of Agreement signed February 15, 1979 with the University of Toronto (under authorization of the General Assembly of 1978), the College is receiving government grants at double previous rates.
- 5:2 This means that we expect in 1979 to receive a government grant of approximately \$164,000.
- 5:3 This is obviously a major financial resource for the College in its endeavour to provide for the church candidates for ministry that meet the church's expectations. This is equal to about 70 percent of the budget contributions of the church, and nearly one-third of the total operating expenditure for educational purposes of the College.
- 5:4 This total government grant depends on our relationship with the University of Toronto, which in turn depends on our relationship with the Toronto School of Theology, which in turn depends in a significant measure on our accreditation by ATS.
- 5:5 Our accreditation stands under some threat by virtue of our inability to order our own affairs with an appropriate degree of autonomy and integrity.
- 5:6 The accreditation visit of some 12 years ago led to the imposition of two notations: N11 - "Policies are unduly determined by others than the governing board or faculty"; and N27 - "The finances or other assets are unduly controlled by agencies outside the school itself". Notations are published annually in the ATS Bulletin membership list and are public signals of deficiencies in the seminary or college.

- 5:7 This situation could be alleviated in some measure if it could be demonstrated that we have taken some steps in the direction of a greater degree of integrity in the area of governance and faculty appointments.

The Proposed Changes are Minimal

- 6:1 The changes suggested in the reconstitution of our Board do not in any way affect our relationship with the church. We still remain as a Board an instrument of the General Assembly, with clear accountability to the Assembly.
- 6:2 The changes in appointment procedures are also minimal. Appointments with tenure remain as they are except that we could go directly to the General Assembly. All other appointments to existing chairs, or to new chairs established by the General Assembly, would be made by the Board of the College.

Conclusion

- 7:1 The goal of these recommendations is clear. The College is seeking to provide for the church candidates for ministry who have been prepared in the most effective manner possible for that ministry, while keeping the cost to the budget funds of the church at the lowest possible level.

**KNOX COLLEGE
(Supplementary Report)**

**Recommendations from Knox College
re: Chair of Church and Ministry and Field Education**

The Board of Knox College, in considering the instruction of the 104th General Assembly (1978) regarding courses in ministry, has been conscious of the economic considerations as well as the usual routine procedures in the matter of faculty appointments.

In attempting to respond affirmatively to the General Assembly's instruction and giving priority to the economic considerations involved, as well as one of the major elements of a Chair of Church and Ministry (Field Education and Counselling of students), the Board of Knox College with the support of the Administrative Council recommends:

RECOMMENDATION 3-1 A

That the General Assembly approve the establishment of the Chair of Church and Ministry as outlined in the terms of reference attached.

RECOMMENDATION 3-2 A

That Rev. Donald C. Smith, B.A., B.D., Ph.D., be appointed to the Chair of Church and Ministry for an initial period of three years at the rank of Associate Professor effective September 1, 1979.

RECOMMENDATION 3-3 A

That the position of Director of Field Education be established on a permanent basis and that this function be the responsibility of the Professor of Church and Ministry.

KNOX COLLEGE

**A PROPOSAL FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT
OF A CHAIR OF CHURCH AND MINISTRY**

STATUS OF CHAIR:

For the initial period, appointment to this Chair will be at the rank of Associate Professor.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF CHAIR:

The Chair will be responsible for those aspects of theological education commonly designated as the 'practice of ministry'. It will include within it supervisory

responsibility for the three courses currently taught by sessional lecturers* as well as several other areas of 'ministry' as outlined in detail below, which are not presently a part of the existing curriculum. It will also include the responsibility for field education which involves the placement of students where ministry is practiced.

EDUCATIONAL, PROFESSIONAL & PERSONAL QUALIFICATIONS FOR CHAIR:

These shall be as follows: Advanced theological degree at the doctoral level; a wide range of pastoral experience in a variety of congregational and community settings; extensive knowledge of the Presbyterian Church in Canada - its Courts, Boards and professional church workers, and the essential requirements for effective ministry in that Church; familiarity with the realities of the Canadian culture and society in which ministry today is practised.

GOALS OF CHAIR:

The Church and Ministry department will seek to address the basic question: "What are the minimum specific competencies necessary to equip graduates to meet the demands of contemporary ministry in today's society?" To a considerable extent the traditional approach to theological education in Knox College with its major stress on the acquisition of knowledge in the major academic theological disciplines has produced candidates with a high degree of competence in important areas of ministry primarily as preacher, teacher and worship leader. Opportunities are provided for the development of ministerial skills in the areas of communication and pastoral counselling but inadequate attention has been given to the minister as administrator, counsellor, innovator, facilitator and leader in the life of the congregation and the Church. In addition, effective ministry calls for the ability to minister to the community outside the congregation - to develop a prophetic ministry that is sensitive to social issues and which can assist in the righting of injustices, the meeting of human needs and the enhancing of community life. It should be stressed, however, that the concern of this Chair is for something more than the mere learning of functional skills and techniques of ministry. Rather the goal will be to discover how our theology informs our practice of ministry. What 'models of ministry' are appropriate to our Reformed theology and which are not? The practice of ministry must be as thoroughly grounded in a valid theology as any other course or programme in the educational curriculum. Our goal will be to subject all ministerial practice to the scrutiny of the Church's biblical and theological perspective.

IMPLEMENTATION OF GOALS:

To achieve the goal of genuine competency in ministry, courses in ministry must take full account of the minister as a person. Competence will include the individual's personal growth in self awareness, their spiritual formation, their development as a ministering person, their ability to reflect theologically and integrate theory and practice, as well as their acquisition of specific skills in ministry. To achieve this, it is proposed that first year students would be exposed to an "Introduction to Ministry" course that would focus on their call to ministry, their vocational concerns, their incoming 'operational theology', their life experience and 'spiritual journeys', their peculiar gifts for ministry, their strengths and weaknesses - where they need to grow - spiritually, professionally as ministering persons. The course, in seminar form, through a mutual sharing of ministry concerns, would be a vehicle for building a sense of community among the incoming students who often feel alienated from the College and faculty, and even from their fellow classmates. Following the

*These are Christian Education taught by Dr. Margaret Webster; Church Music taught by Mr. John Derksen; and Church Government and Administration presently taught by Dr. D.C. Smith. The following is a sample course outline of the latter course:

Church Government and Administration: Lectures, seminars, case studies, projects centering on the history, theology and practice of government and administration in the Presbyterian Church. Based on Revised Book of Forms (1977) with application to the role of future ministers in congregations and church courts. Attention will be given to administrative and management skills such as communication, decision making, planning, setting of goals, delegation of responsibility, supervision, motivation and recruitment of lay persons, lay leadership training, dynamics of leading meetings and small groups, and handling change and conflict.

initial focus on the ministering individual, the course would move on to a consideration of issues of ministry in the Church and in society. Since all theological education is concerned with these goals, it would be important that as many faculty members as possible share in these seminars.

It is also proposed that a third year course be offered for those soon to be licensed and ordained. Such a course might be called "Ministry in the Church today." It would utilize both the lecture and seminar method. From time to time relevant case studies would be employed and, for certain classes specialists in particular areas (e.g. church growth, marriage enrichment, palliative health care, etc.) could be invited as guest lecturers and resource persons. The course would expand upon the present church government and administration course to include such 'ministry' subjects as pastoral care in the congregation, pre-marital and family life counselling, the principles of evangelism and church growth, developing skills for small group leadership, programmes and principles of Christian stewardship, ministerial priorities and time management, and various other aspects of the 'practice of ministry'. This course would be closely integrated with the theological reflection seminars of the field education programme presently operating for third year students.

FLEXIBILITY OF CHAIR:

The needs of students in the area of the 'practice of ministry' are no less important than those in the other areas of theological education. However, they are subject to a more rapid change in emphasis and priority. Therefore, for this reason, and because it is a new Chair, it is important that it be structured in as flexible a manner as possible. The expectation is that it will take at least 3 years before the concerns of this Chair are fully integrated into the curriculum. Due to its broad range of concerns it must be the most 'generalist' and least specialized of all the Chairs. Being the most professionally oriented Chair in the College it will help to 'bridge' the gap between that sphere of academic theology in the College and University setting and the sphere of the Church's ministry in the life of the world. In so doing it is hoped that the Chair will serve to improve the liaison between the Church's College as it prepares men and women for the ministry of Word and Sacrament, and the Church's Courts, Boards and Agencies concerned for the pastoral care, support and continuing education of that ministry.

BOARD OF CONGREGATIONAL LIFE

Supplemental Report to the 105th General Assembly Concerning Church Growth and The Report on The State of the Church

The Board of Congregational Life has indicated in its main report that the implementation of the recommendation concerning the Report on the State of the Church has been a major priority during the past year.

A. CHURCH RENEWAL and GROWTH

Following the last Assembly, copies of the Report on the State of the Church, the recommendations approved and a Study Guide were widely distributed throughout the Church. The response to this material and the impetus of Recommendation 5 has been very positive. Several Synods and Presbyteries have begun to carefully examine their own situation in the light of the Report. So many congregations have undertaken their own study that we have had to reprint the material twice. Responses to this Study are due by January 31, 1980. We encourage earlier submissions as these will form an important part of the development of strategy for renewal and growth.

With the funding provided, we began to search for well-qualified consultative services in the area of church growth and renewal. We looked for experience, training and the ability to adapt a variety of resources to the needs of our particular situation, including the size, type and geographical distribution of our congregations as well as the spectrum of theological emphasis in our Church. We engaged the services of the Rev. Douglas Walrath, an independent church development consultant who met our criteria. He brings to this work a sound academic background in both theology and sociology. He has many years experience in church growth using a variety of approaches. He has been a Synod Executive in New York for the Reformed Church in America and has been involved with all phases of planning and implementing their programs of growth and new church development. He is a consultant to a number of national boards of major denominations. He has been well received by our Board at its Spring 1979 meeting and by the Board of Congregational Life and Board of World Mission Team planning church growth strategy. He will be conducting the Church Growth Workshop at Congress '79.

In addition to Mr. Walrath, we have participated with other denominations in Canada in several workshops with Lyle Schaller, a well-known church planner, author and consultant. One workshop on Assimilating New Members was over-subscribed by Presbyterians and we had the largest representation of any denomination. We have had three staff persons attend workshops on consulting with local congregations for denominational executives. We will continue to promote the participation of Presbyterians in various Lyle Schaller Workshops planned for the future.

The Board has produced two instruments for use in local congregations. One is a clear statement of some church growth principles to give congregations an initial grasp of the concept. The second is a more extensive workshop outline entitled "Church Growth – A Presbyterian Perspective". Designed for use by Sessions, leadership groups or others concerned with growth and renewal, it has been tested and evaluated by three congregations in each Synod. On the basis of their critique, the instrument is being revised and will be available to all congregations to stimulate planning and action for growth and renewal. The test-congregations were varied by size, age and location so as to have responses from all types of congregations. Responses from this instrument will be used in developing our national strategy. In this way, congregations will not only begin to work at intentional church growth but also contribute to national planning.

It is important to note that the test-congregations were overwhelmingly positive in their response to the instrument and receptive to the concepts of renewal and growth. The sense of need, the excitement and the receptiveness are encouraging.

Three meetings have been held to plan for the development of a national strategy. The first was a preliminary planning and organizing meeting between representatives of the Board of World Mission and Board of Congregational Life. The second was a meeting with ministers in several different types of congregations – growing urban,

multi-ethnic, established suburban, new church in a new housing development, and ex-rural now rapidly growing. This meeting was held with Mr. Walrath to exchange views and to give him some first-hand insight into The Presbyterian Church in Canada. The third meeting was a larger working group from the Board of World Mission and the Board of Congregational Life plus Staff representatives of both Boards and the Women's Missionary Society with the consultant to plan the development of the strategy.

The following steps are now being taken in the development of a national strategy:

1. Revision of "Church Growth - A Presbyterian Perspective" based on the responses from the test-congregations. Wide distribution will be made with built-in feedback of results and needs.
2. Identify who are the people in our own church who have special training and experience in church growth and renewal. These persons can be used as resources for training and workshops.
3. Identify existing congregations where growth and renewal or unique ministry is taking place. Develop models of how they are functioning that can be shared across the church.
4. Identify the various types of congregations in each presbytery and the various approaches to growth appropriate for each.
5. Research and design a resourcing system of persons, models, methods and training for churches seeking to grow that will be useful in enabling congregations to develop a quality of worship, nurture and fellowship that is receptive to new persons, able to assimilate and hold them in the church, and, the ability to reach out to persons not now related to Christ and His Church.
6. Involvement of representatives of each of the colleges in future planning so that their implementation of Recommendation 3 (State of the Church Report) will be integrated with the strategy being developed by the Board of Congregational Life and the Board of World Mission.
7. Utilize the Congress '79 Workshop on Church Growth to stimulate interest, inform and motivate congregations to become involved in church growth and renewal. It is especially important that our efforts be broadly based within the congregations and that the laity be fully involved in the planning and ownership of growth and change in the context of their church and community.

B. MINISTRY WITH YOUTH

Arrangements have been made for the Board of Congregational Life and the Board of World Mission to consult together on the matter of youth ministry as called for in Recommendation 1(f), (State of Church Report). The recommendation has far-reaching implications requiring consultation with representatives of youth and leaders of youth as well as with the Boards identified in the recommendation. This process has begun.

During 1978-79 The Presbyterian Church in Canada has participated in a series of Youth Leadership Training Labs. The location of each of these events is in the main report of the Board of Congregational Life. Approximately forty-five leaders of youth from the Presbyterian Church in Canada attended.

The next stage of this youth leadership development process is already under way. Those who attended the Labs from each region are being encouraged and assisted to plan local leadership training events for their areas. In this stage, as with the original training Labs, the support and encouragement of the Presbytery is most important.

The Board of Congregational Life is involved in three other kinds of training for youth and leaders of youth. These are the National Advisory Council for Youth Ministry, the Young Adult Observers at each meeting of the General Assembly and the North American Triennium in 1980.

- a) *The National Advisory Council for Youth Ministry* has as its primary objective the provision of opportunities for representative young people to gain knowledge and experience concerning the work and witness of The

Presbyterian Church in Canada, and to share that knowledge and experience with others at the Synod, Presbytery and Congregational level.

- b) *Young Adult Observers*. Each year one half of the presbyteries and each of the colleges, Ewart, Knox and Presbyterian College are invited to name Young Adult Observers to the General Assembly. This, too, has proven to be an excellent means of informing young people about the work of the church and of involving them further in its life and mission.
- c) *Youth Triennium*. Representative youth and staff of the Board of Congregational Life have participated in the planning of a Youth Triennium for North American youth. This Triennium will be held August 4-8, 1980, at Indiana University, Bloomington, Indiana. The stated goals of the event are as follows:

to enable Presbyterian youth of North America to address the prophetic and crucial dilemmas of our world and embark on a journey toward global unity.

to enable Presbyterian youth to rediscover their Christian and Presbyterian roots, to nourish personal faith, and to develop leadership through worship, theological reflection, study and devotion.

to enable Presbyterian youth to participate in setting the directions for the youth ministry programming of their own Presbyterian denominations.

Resources and ideas for youth ministry are featured regularly in the quarterly newsletter, *Kurios*, published by the Board of Congregational Life, and in the annual *Prospectus for Christian Education: Shared Approaches*. Of particular interest to leaders of youth is the new *Youth Elect* series mentioned on page 25 of the current *Prospectus*.

In the matters referred to the Board of Congregational Life by the 104th General Assembly, namely, "concrete plans for strong church renewal and growth" and "ways and means of implementing a strong on-going national and local ministry to youth", the Board reports diligence and progress.

That the General Assembly endorse the Overture from the Presbytery of Niagara, realising that such a study is beyond the terms of reference of Inter Church Aid; and that this issue be studied by the Committee on Inter Church Relations, the Committee on Church Doctrine, or a special committee, with attention to Declaration of Faith Concerning Church and State.

INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS COMMITTEE (Supplementary Report)

The International Affairs Committee has reviewed from time to time this year, the widespread, painful reaction across the Presbyteries of our church, to events in Rhodesia, and especially the involvement of the World Council of Church's *Programme to Combat Racism* grant for the care of non-combatants of the Patriotic Front.

Looking only at the political aspects of this situation from the Christian perspective, the Committee feels that the issues are not as simple as some of the criticisms suggest. It has been difficult to get a fair and balanced picture of events from the North American media. It is big news when 18 whites are killed in a plane crash. It is not news at all when 300 black women and children are killed in a commando raid.

The whole question of violence, and our participation in and contribution to violent struggle, (through the grant in question) became a large and sensitive question for many Canadian Christians. It is an important question and one that deserves further study and attention.

It needs to be acknowledged that Canadian Presbyterians have not, historically, as a whole, been able to accept and practice the pacifist position. As recently as the Biafran war, we felt it our duty to actively support a violent struggle, with grants much larger than the one in question.

When freedom and friends were threatened in Europe in 1939 and power-hungry national leaders challenged and overran weaker neighbours, Presbyterians individually and collectively joined in a violent struggle, were themselves combatants, chaplains to combatants, and supporters of a war effort, which was, at times, very violent and destructive of human life.

It is not adequate to excuse such participation by saying that we were on the side of right, on the side of God, on the side of the oppressed, engaging in self-defence. The people in the Patriotic Front of Zimbabwe say quite the same thing.

Beside the difficult and painful question of when and how we are justified using arms and in participating in war, there is also the question of civil violence. Presbyterians are well known as supporters of law and order, which often involves violence by the state in apprehension and punishment of offenders. Indeed, some of us advocate ultimate violence — capital punishment. This presumes a 'legitimate' state with justice based on law. What about illegitimate, cruel, oppressive state governments? Would we condone violence in protecting oneself against such?

The recent events in Zimbabwe-Rhodesia have brought the Committee to the place where they feel that the time is right for us as a Church to seek a new Christian understanding of violence as means of defending oneself or others against injustice, and oppression.

Therefore the Committee recommends:

RECOMMENDATION 2. A

That the Assembly encourage study throughout the Church on violence as a social and/or political instrument; and

That the International Affairs Committee be instructed to organize a Task Force for the purpose of producing a paper as a basis for study, based on

- a) *a review of the positions which the Presbyterian Church in Canada has historically taken, explicitly or implicitly, on war, militarism and civil violence,*
- b) *a review of current printed and audio-visual resources available to individuals and congregations of our Church for study of this subject; and*

The following be invited to participate:

The Committee on Inter Church Aid

The Board of World Mission

The Board of Congregational Life

The Committee on Church Doctrine; and

That the Committee on International Affairs report to the next General Assembly on this matter.

SUPPLEMENTARY REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MINISTRY

To the Venerable the 105th General Assembly:

A number of developments since the stitched minutes went to press require this supplement to the report of the Board of Ministry (pp. 355-377)

A. *Overture No. 35, 1979, Presbytery of Chatham*

Provision for annual sick leave of two weeks for ministers, to be cumulative for up to five years.

The subject of this overture is part of the larger question of remuneration policy, which is the subject of recommendation 11 in the report of this Board.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 16 C

That Overture No. 35, 1979 be part of the study of benefits policy for ministers referred to in recommendation 11 in the report of this Board.

B. *Overture No. 18, 1979, Presbytery of Chatham, re Definition of Study Leave*

This overture was received after the annual meeting of the Board of Ministry. The matter is related to recommendation No. 1, part (2) of the Report of Presbyterian College (p. 273) and will be studied by the Board with a report to the 1980 General Assembly.

C. *Diaconate Concerns*

In the event that the Ordained Diaconate proposal has not received sufficient support from presbyteries, the following recommendations are proposed for the consideration of the Assembly:

RECOMMENDATION NO. 17 C

That this General Assembly appoint a special committee to re-examine the role and place in the Church of specialized ministries, deaconesses, Christian education workers, social workers, outreach and other ministries; and that this committee include one representative each from the Board of Ministry, the Committee on Church Doctrine, the Clerks of Assembly, the Deaconess Council, Knox College, Presbyterian College, Ewart College and the Board of Education; and that funds be made available for this committee to meet, and to report to the next Assembly.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 18 A

That until the study referred to above is completed, male graduates of Ewart College undertaking employment in positions usually filled by deaconesses (such as presbytery deaconesses, directors of Christian education, area educational consultants, and so on) be considered to be in the same category as deaconesses in regard to stipend and allowances.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 19 A

That until the study referred to above is completed, any employing body engaging the services of a male graduate of Ewart College be encouraged to arrange for a service of recognition for that person at the commencement of employment.

D. *Board of Ministry Staff*

The Board of Ministry has become increasingly aware of an ever-greater number of tasks laid upon it through the years, as is discovered in even a cursory examination of the annual reports of the Board to succeeding General Assemblies. And when one realizes that much of the most important work of the Board never finds its way into the annual report at all because of its informal, ad hoc, and confidential nature, it becomes patently obvious that there is too great a volume of work for a one-executive department.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 20 C

That a new position be established in the Board of Ministry staff at the Assistant Secretary level.

BOARD OF WORLD MISSION
Supplemental Report to the 105th General Assembly
Minute of Appreciation – Miss Ida M. White

The Board of World Mission records its appreciation for the ministry of Miss Ida White as a missionary nurse of The Presbyterian Church in Canada working in India.

Ida is a graduate of the Marine and General Hospital School of Nursing, Goderich, Ontario. She earned her mid-wifery certificate in Edmonton, Alberta and was awarded a certificate in Public Health by the All-India Institute for Hygiene and Public Health in Calcutta. She studied for three years at the Toronto Bible College.

Before applying for an overseas appointment under the Women's Missionary Society (Western Division), Ida did general duty and private duty nursing. She served four years as a nursing sister with the South African Army, obtaining the rank of Captain.

In September, 1952, Ida left Canada for India and after language study, started to work among the Bhils, and continued working among them until she left India in May, 1978. During these years she has played a significant role in the development of the church's witness through medicine, both in her relations with Jobat Christian Hospital and with public health programmes in Barwani, Mendha and Jobat.

God gave Ida the gift of deep love and concern for people. She has made many lasting friendships among the Bhils. She has unselfishly given of herself and her talents. Through her quiet way many lives have been profoundly influenced. As a result of her faith and commitment, people have sought to learn about her Christ.

It was with regret that the Board of World Mission accepted Ida's resignation from overseas service. In recording its appreciation for the ministry of Ida White, the Board of World Mission wants to assure her of its continued interest and prayers as she finds new avenues for service in Canada.

RECOMMENDATION NO. 22 A

That the above Minute of Appreciation for Miss Ida White be approved.

PRESBYTERIAN RESIDENCE REPORT

The 1978-79 term has concluded after an interesting year with a part-time Dean. Our rates are low in lieu of the fact that our accommodation is a little less than first class. However, the atmosphere in Pres Res in fellowship and conduct is second to none in the area of University student dwellings, and the term 78-79 was no exception.

The Residence Board is now facing some decisions that requires response from the Presbyterian constituency that believe in Pres Res as a home away from home for university students, including the former Dean's Residence at 330-6th Ave. N. presently used as a girl's residence. (a plan now facing a third experimental year with a vote of confidence from the second year occupants, in spite of some questions from the first year occupants).

There is pressing demand on the Board to sell the Pres Res property for business offices in view of the choice location. Some would build for us a residence in another location in exchange for the present location. Others are anxious to secure title to the property with the top two floors designated to Pres Res in a six-story building. Pres Res accommodation would consist of a possible 40 bachelor suites with a large conference room etc. We will be seeking guidance from the Administrative Council and would welcome input from interested parties and congregations.

The Board are anxious to maintain the concept of Pres Res in the best area for students and conference occasions.

Once again our facilities provided a good centre for the Annual Youth Conference and the Ministers' Conference at reasonable cost. In '79 it will provide 30 beds for a rotating number of delegates attending the Conference of the Learned Society held at U. of S. for a 3 week period.

While we house a number of Presbyterian students each year, it is somewhat surprising that many of our students are not informed or encouraged by congregations to stay at Pres Res.

1. ACCOUNTING PRACTICES

The following is a summary of accounting practices followed by the Fund:

(a) Basis of valuation of fund assets

The assets of the Fund are carried at current market values and unrealized gains and losses resulting from the adjustment to market are included in the statement of capital.

Market values are determined by the Fund as follows:

- (i) Listed stocks are valued at their closing sales price on the stock exchange where listed, and if no sale has taken place on the last business day, then at the average of the closing bid and ask prices.
- (ii) Listed bonds and convertible debentures are recorded at the last published mid-market price.
- (iii) Unlisted bonds are recorded at values reflecting current market yields of similar debt obligations.
- (iv) Mortgages are valued using current market yields based on one-half of the remaining average term of the portfolio. The yields used for valuation are 10-7/8% for conventional five year and long term loans and 10 3/4% for NHA five year and long term loans.
- (v) Short term investments are carried at cost which approximates market.

(b) Investment transactions and income

- (i) Investment transactions are recorded on the trade date (date the order to buy or sell is executed).
- (ii) Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividend income is recorded on the ex-dividend date.
- (iii) Realized gains and losses on sale of investments are recorded as the difference between the proceeds and market values at the beginning of the year or the date of purchase during the year.

(c) Basis of establishing capital

It is not the practice of the fund to segregate from capital amounts required to meet future obligations of the fund.

2. ADDITIONAL PAYMENTS TO PENSIONERS AND WIDOWS

As approved by the 99th General Assembly, bequests, commencing in 1972, will be used to provide additional payments to pensioners and widows receiving only small amounts from the Canada Pension Plan. In 1978, the Administrative Council agreed that \$75,000 of bequests would be used to pay part of the amount required from the Church. Accordingly, there are bequests of \$75,000 included in the Church budget allocation rather than in the \$152,686 referred to below. The revenue and expenditure and balance on hand, as follows, are included in these financial statements.

3. ACTUARIAL EVALUATION

Based on the latest actuarial evaluation at December 31, 1977, the capital at that date exceeded the estimated future obligations of the fund by approximately \$2,947,000.

In presenting the Statistical and Financial Report for the year ended December 31st, 1978, the Clerks of Assembly beg leave to draw attention to certain features of the report and cognate matters.

MEMBERSHIP

Received by profession, 4,184, or an increase of 120 from 1977; received by certificate and otherwise, 4,964 or a decrease of 415 from 1977; removed by certificate, 3,042 or an increase of 9 from 1977; removed by death or otherwise, 6,517 or a decrease of 578 from 1977; total number of communicants as of December, 1978, 166,920 or a decrease of 1,582 from 1977.

HOUSEHOLDS

The total number of Households reported 115,348, an increase of 410 from 1977.

ELDERS

The total number of Elders reported is 12,260, a decrease of 190 as compared with 1977.

MINISTERS

The total number of Ministers reported 971, an increase of 26 as compared with 1977.

BAPTISMS

The total number of Baptisms reported is 5,185, or a decrease of 33 as compared with 1977.

PASTORAL CHARGES

Self-Supporting charges reported as 583, an increase of 24; Aid-Receiving charges reported as 149, a decrease of 17; number of congregations reported as 1,055, a decrease of 12.

REVEREND GEORGE RAYMOND TANNAHILL

The Rev. George Raymond Tannahill died suddenly in Amherst, N.S., on January 3rd, 1979, at the age of 47.

Born in Montreal, he was a son of the late Alexander and Mary (White) Tannahill. He received his early education in Montreal and was a graduate (B.A.) of Sir George Williams University, where he spent his "spare time" in the College Records Office as a clerk. In 1960 he graduated (B.D.) from The Presbyterian College, Montreal, being licensed April 27th and ordained May 3rd of that year by The Presbytery of Montreal.

He was appointed to the Lake Ainslie, Strathlorne, Orangedale Charge in Cape Breton Presbytery, serving there until August 1963. From September 1963 until November 1964 he served the Hanover, Ayton Charge in the Bruce Presbytery of Ontario. Returning to the Maritimes, he then served the Kensington, Freetown, Malpeque Charge (Nov./64 to Aug./66), and the North Tryon, Breadalbane Charge (Sept./66 to July/67) in The Presbytery of Prince Edward Island. He then left the pastoral ministry on July 31st, 1967 to take up work as a counselor with the Family Services Office in Amherst, N.S., where he laboured until his death.

He is survived by his wife, the former Frances MacDonald, two sons, Andrew and Jonathan, and a daughter Eve Christine, all of Amherst; a brother, Gordon, of Huntington, Quebec; and a step-mother in Montreal. He was pre-deceased by his first wife, the former Elizabeth Schollie in 1971. His body was cremated with committal service in the Spring.

George was well-known for his diligent work and his friendly manner. Wherever he went, he made many friends, and there is no calculating the goodness which he has been able to spread in his abbreviated lifetime.

The Presbytery of Pictou records his sudden loss with deep regret.

SYNOD OF QUEBEC AND EASTERN ONTARIO

REVEREND ROBERT GOOD

On Sunday, November 26, 1978, the Rev. Dr. Robert Good died suddenly in Carleton Lodge, Manotick, Ontario. Dr. Good was born in Manchester, England, in 1899, and came to Dutton, Ontario, as a boy with his family. In 1916 he enlisted in the Royal Navy and at the end of World War I he enrolled in Toronto Bible College. After graduation he served in several charges in Nova Scotia, including Indian Brook, Port Morien and Birch Grove. Then he moved to Montreal North in 1926 and looked after a "charge" while he pursued his studies at McGill and Presbyterian College. He also served at Pointe aux Trembles in Montreal. In 1931 Dr. Good was licensed and ordained and served in Cushman Memorial Church in Hull, Quebec, from 1931 to 1934. In 1934 he began a long ministry in Erskine Presbyterian Church, Ottawa, which was to continue for 28 years until he retired to become a judge in the Family Court where he served with distinction until he retired in 1974.

Dr. Good was not only an active and diligent churchman who served the Church at every level and made some worthy contributions to the publications of the old Board of Evangelism and Social Action; he was also active in the life and work of the community, giving outstanding service on the Parole Board and also on the "bench" at Family Court. In recognition of these services Presbyterian College in 1950 conferred on him the Degree of Doctor of Divinity. Through the years many have spoken with respect and admiration of the work of Dr. Good as minister and as a judge.

The funeral was held in Erskine Presbyterian Church on Wednesday, November 29, 1978 and the service was conducted by the Moderator of Presbytery, the Rev. Dr. Malcolm A. McCuaig, assisted by the minister of Erskine, the Rev. C. Sheldon Hastings, and the Clerk of Presbytery, the Rev. Dr. Peter C. Wotherspoon, of St. David & St. Martin Church. Dr. Good was pre-deceased by his wife, Avada Aveling, and is survived by his daughter, Mrs. George Curzons (Betty), his brother, Ernest, and two grand-children, Robert and William Curzons. His services to the community and to the Church will long be remembered and greatly missed by all who knew him.

SYNOD OF TORONTO AND KINGSTON

REVEREND E. A. THOMSON

The Presbyterian Church in Canada lost one of its loyal servants and beloved pastors on August 22, 1978 when the Reverend E. A. Thomson, B.A., D.D., entered into rest at the age of eighty-five. For sixty-one years a minister, Dr. Thomson had retired in 1973 as Principal Clerk of the General Assembly, and in 1977 the General Assembly named him Principal Clerk Emeritus. He was born in Hastings, Ontario, a son of the Reverend David A. Thomson, D.D., and was ordained in 1917 in his first charge, Knox Church, Monkton, in the Presbytery of Stratford, after graduating from the University of Toronto and Knox College. In 1925 he was called to Knox Church, Elora. He served as Clerk of the Presbytery of Guelph from 1928 to 1941, where his understanding of church law, as taught by his father who had been Clerk of the Presbytery of Peterborough, served him in good stead.

Dr. Thomson served on many boards and committees during his ministry. He was Chairman of the Board for Sabbath Schools and Young People's Societies (later the Board of Christian Education) and became its Secretary in 1941. He maintained a lively interest in youth throughout his ministry. He was appointed Secretary of the Board of Administration on September 1, 1947 and Joint Clerk of the General Assembly the following year. Upon formation of the Administrative Council in 1960, he became its Secretary, a post in which he continued until after the Assembly of 1967.

A pastor, first and foremost, he exercised a ministry of helpful counsel and encouragement to many colleagues in the ministry who sought his advice and found his office door always open to them. Widows and orphans as well were his care and concern. He maintained a scholarly interest in the Scriptures. As a member of the Committee on Home Religion he sought to uphold a traditional strength of our church: family worship.

The principles of Presbyterian theology and government found in him a staunch advocate; his convictions were nurtured in experience and study, and from his reading there came "Keepers of the Faith", a chronicle of the lives of leaders of the Reformation movement, as well as other publications. He was twice honoured with the degree of Doctor of Divinity (honoris causa): by Knox College, Toronto, in 1948 and by Presbyterian College, Montreal, in 1975.

During his long ministry, both in the pastorate and in administrative posts, Dr. Thomson represented The Presbyterian Church in Canada with dignity and diligence, in local matters as well as in inter-church and international committees. His careful attention to administrative detail was coupled with wise judgment and

gracious kindness and courtesy. In the church to which he gave selfless service he will be remembered as himself one of the keepers of the faith.

We record our thankfulness to God for one who shared with us the high calling of being a minister of Jesus Christ; whose guidance was often sought; whose gifts were clothed in humility. Though the loss of his presence is very real, we share his hope in the eternal love and mercy of Almighty God, in death as in life. He was laid to rest in the Trent Valley Cemetery at Hastings, beside his father who had been minister of St. Andrew's Church for almost fifty years.

We offer our sympathy to his widow, the former Edith Erskine, his sons David and Hugh, and his daughter, Margaret (Mrs. E. C. Simard). His memory will be cherished and revered by those who knew and loved him best.

The service was held in Calvin Church, Toronto, and was conducted by his minister, The Rev. Dr. D.G.M. Herron, who also gave the address. The lessons were read by Dr. L. H. Fowler, Dr. Thomson's colleague in the Clerkship; the prayer of thanksgiving was offered by Professor Emeritus David W. Hay. The Moderator of the 104th Assembly, The Reverend Dr. Jesse E. Bigelow, sent a personal message which was read by his representative, the past Moderator, The Reverend Dr. DeCourcy H. Rayner.

REVEREND ARTHUR EARL TOOMBS

The Presbytery of Lindsay-Peterborough places on record its deep appreciation of the life and ministry of The Rev. Arthur Earl Toombs who passed away on Friday, December 8th, 1978 at the age of 77 years.

Earl was the son of the late Edward Toombs and the late former Mae Wilkinson. He was born in Delhi, Ontario, Norfolk County, on May 22nd 1901. He graduated from Toronto Bible College in the class of '26, the class of which he was president.

In 1927 he went as an evangelist to the Bhil field in Central India. He took charge of the mission work in Amkhut when Dr. John Buchanan went home on furlough. In 1928 Earl was married to Selina Elliott in the First Bhil Church in Amkhut. On Dr. Buchanan's return to India, Earl was stationed to Barwani, Barwani State where he worked for many years. At first there were few converts, the work difficult and discouraging, but the faithful preaching of Earl eventually began to bear fruit as many came to know the Lord. Before furlough in 1935, his two daughters Yvonne and Joan were born.

In 1935-36 while home on furlough from India he received his B.D. from Presbyterian College, Montreal, and was ordained by the Presbytery of Paris in The Presbyterian Church in Simcoe, Ontario.

Returning to India in 1936 his son "Ted" was born in Jobat. When Ted was 14 months old an unfortunate accident occurred and his brain was damaged causing him to be retarded. While continuing to work on the Bhil field, for security reasons Earl was asked to join the Central India States Officers Training course in Indore. For the next five years he was in the Indian Army.

In 1946 he returned to Canada with his family. Due to Ted's condition Earl found it impossible to take his son back to India with him. Therefore, Earl returned to India alone in 1947 leaving his family in Beeton, Ontario.

Returning to join his family in Canada in 1949, he then began a fruitful ministry of 20 years, first in Campbellford, then in Campbellford-Burnbrae. He soon became well-known as a diligent and faithful servant of the Lord who made his presence known in the court meetings within the Presbytery of Peterborough. Seeing the need, he and his wife were then responsible for establishing and operating a home for retarded children in Rawdon Township called "THE HOUSE OF HAPPINESS", which was not only a blessing for their own son Ted, but has been a blessing for many children and parents looking for a Christian home. This home now known as WINGFIELD continues to be a blessing to many children.

Retirement for Earl was merely a transition from one way of serving the Lord to another. Retiring from Campbellford-Burnbrae, he then took on the position of pastor in St. Andrew's Roslin, and Fuller within the Presbytery of Kingston until a brief period of illness just prior to his death.

Earl leaves behind many fond memories of many fine victories that were achieved by the Lord through Earl's ministry. Earl leaves behind his wife Selina, his daughters Yvonne and Joan, his grandchildren Janice and David Thorel, and Roselyn, Kevin, and John Fraser. Earl has gone to be re-united with his son Ted who just months earlier had been called home to be with his Heavenly Father.

By this memorial the Presbytery of Lindsay-Peterborough wishes to express their deepest sympathy to the Toombs family and also to express their gratitude to Almighty God for the life and ministry of a man who was truly a man of God. A man who witnessed throughout his life to the one who said, "I AM THE RESURRECTION".

REVEREND JOHN WILLIAM WILLIAMS

The Rev. John Williams passed away suddenly on Thursday, September 7, 1978, in Peterborough, Ontario, as the result of a heart attack.

He was born in Florence, Cape Breton County, N.S., on June 27, 1910, and served in the Air Force in the Second World War. Mr. Williams took undergraduate studies at Sir George Williams University, and graduated from Presbyterian College in 1950. He ministered to the pastoral charges of Burns Church, Milverton, Ont.; Knox Church, Lloydminster, Alta.; St. Andrew's Church, Niagara-on-the-Lake, Ont.; and St. Andrew's Church, Aylmer and Cushman Memorial Church, Hull, P.Q. In 1964, Mr. Williams graduated from Ottawa Teachers' College, and served as a teacher in Nairn Centre, Ont.; retiring from the Peterborough County Board of Education in 1977.

The funeral service was held on Friday, September 8, 1978, in Lakefield, Ont., and was conducted by the Rev. Carol Johnson; the committal service was held the following day at Belleview Cemetery, Aylmer, P.Q., conducted by the Rev. Willis Sayers. Mr. Williams is survived by his wife Joyce and daughter Heather, who reside in Lakehurst, Ont.

SYNOD OF HAMILTON AND LONDON

REVEREND DEANE JOHNSTON

Rev. Dr. Deane Johnston, 71, a retired Presbyterian minister, died in hospital in Brantford, Ont. on July 14, 1978 after a long illness. Dr. Johnston was elected Moderator of the General Assembly in 1966 by acclamation. He had served as minister of Central Presbyterian Church, Brantford from 1932 until his retirement in 1973, except for 5½ years on leave of absence during World War II.

Born in Dublin, Ireland where his father was minister of Abbey Presbyterian Church for 38 years, Geoffrey Deane Johnston was educated there, in Northern Ireland, and at Princeton Theological Seminary in the U.S.A. He was married to Alexandra Sherwood in Indianapolis, Indiana in 1930.

During his long ministry in Brantford Dr. Johnston led the congregation of Central Church in rebuilding the sanctuary and adding a Christian Education wing after a storm toppled the spire in 1959. Mosaic reproductions of the seals of Reformed churches from 12 countries are built into the interior walls of the church.

For 12 years Dr. Johnston was chairman of what was then the General Board of Missions, and as such travelled widely in Canada and overseas from 1948 to 1960. He served as chairman of the Committee on Inter-Church Relations for some years, and in many ways in the various courts of the church. He was chairman of the Police Commission in Brantford, and was a member of the Ontario Press Council at the time of his death.

For 27 years he was an army chaplain, in war and in peace, and had the distinction of being made Honorary Lieutenant-Colonel of the militia unit in Brantford. For his wartime service which included a period as senior chaplain of the 5th Canadian Armoured Division, Major Johnston was made a Member of the Order of the British Empire. The honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity was conferred on him by Knox College, Toronto in 1955.

Surviving are his wife and their four children; John, of Peterborough; Rev. Dr. Geoffrey, of Toronto; Mrs. Murray (Marjorie) Ross of Toronto; and Dr. Alexandra of Victoria College, Toronto.

REVEREND H. J. SCOTT

The Reverend Herbert Joseph Scott, 94, retired Minister, died at St. Catharines, Ontario, on March 29th, 1978.

Herbert J. Scott was born in Barrow-in-Furnace, England, on February 20, 1884, and emigrated to Canada in 1905. Later he left for San Francisco, California, where he engaged himself in the Insurance business. In 1910 Sarah Gill arrived from England and they were married in San Francisco on February 22nd, 1910. Seeking to serve their Lord in full time service they both entered the Bible Institute of Los Angeles, California. After graduation they served the Community Church in Blue Diamond, Kentucky. In 1925 Mr. Scott returned to Canada and entered the Presbyterian Church in Canada. He served the Churches of Smithville and Wellandport, 1925-1927; Calvin Church, Hamilton, 1927-1933; North Bay, 1933-1937; Grand Falls, Newfoundland, 1937-1946, and at Beamsville and Smithville, 1946-1954. He served as Visiting Minister at Knox Church, St. Catharines, 1956-1960.

The funeral service was held in Knox Church, St. Catharines, on March 31st, 1978, conducted by the Moderator of the Niagara Presbytery, the Rev. Gordon G. Hastings, assisted by the Rev. John Kurtz and Dr. Frederick W. Sass. The interment took place in the cemetery of St. Andrew's Church, Niagara-on-the-Lake, where Mrs. Scott was laid to rest on January 21st, 1974.

SYNOD OF ALBERTA

REVEREND L. LOUIS de GROOT

The Rev. L. Louis de Groot died suddenly on January 17, 1979 at the age of 67, while attending to the spiritual and material needs of the congregation of Millwoods, of which he was Interim-Moderator.

Born in Newmarket, Ontario, Mr. de Groot graduated from Knox College in 1948, and immediately took a course in the United States to prepare for Overseas Mission work.

For a short time, he was involved with the congregation of Meaford-Thornbury then, in 1949, he took a very active part in Overseas Mission work in Taiwan. Upon his return to Canada in 1955, he saw service in Toronto, Kemptville, Montreal, Dixie and on March 4, 1974, was appointed to St. Andrew's in Edmonton, which congregation he served faithfully and well until his death.

At one time, he was an active member of the Board of World Mission and served as Chairman. He was active in the re-organization of that Board. He had been active in Inter-Church Committees and in Inter-Church Aid.

Mr. de Groot was a very active member of the Presbytery of Edmonton and, at the time of his death, was a member of the Missions Committee.

At the Annual Meeting of the Synod of Alberta, in October, 1978, Mr. de Groot was elected Moderator, by acclamation.

The funeral took place on January 22, 1979, in St. Andrew's Church, Edmonton. The service was conducted by the Moderator of the Presbytery of Edmonton, Rev. P. D. McKague, assisted by Rev. J. C. Ferrier. Rev. G. A. Johnston gave the eulogy.

Mr. de Groot is survived by his wife, Emma; two sons, Edward James and Robert Louis, of Mississauga, Ontario; and one daughter, Mrs. Barry (Helen Hildur) Smith of Toronto.

He is sorely missed by his colleagues and friends.

REVEREND ROBERTSON MILLAR

Dr. Robertson Millar died on the 26th of March, 1979, aged 90 years, in the Southwood Nursing Home, Calgary. Ordained as a minister in the Church of Scotland, on the 14th of May, 1917, he was inducted into the parish of Glengarry in the

Presbytery of Lochaber. By coincidence, the last twenty four years of his active ministry were in the Canadian Presbytery of Glengarry.

He came to Canada in 1931 and, after four years in each of the Presbyteries of Saugeen and Barrie, he was called to Finch and Crysler. In November, 1946, he began his seventeen year ministry in Martintown. The Church prospered, becoming self-supporting and contributing liberally to many causes.

A dutiful presbyter, Robertson Millar served on many Church Committees and, in 1955, as Moderator of the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa.

Having had experience as a Presbytery Clerk in Scotland, he discharged the duties efficiently and graciously in Glengarry for twenty years. In 1960, when he was presented for the degree of Doctor of Divinity, honoris causa, at the Convocation of the Presbyterian College, Montreal, it was stated that, gifted in the art of writing, familiar with Church Law, accurate in the recording of minutes, punctual in correspondence, and possessing withal a merry heart that did good like a medicine and a wit that was both kindly and pleasing, he seemed to be the perfect Presbytery Clerk.

His nearly sixteen years of retirement were spent in Edmonton and Calgary in order to be close to his son-in-law and daughter, the Rev. and Mrs. J. R. Flagler. On the 14th of May, 1967, Dr. and Mrs. Millar celebrated their golden wedding anniversary. Mrs. Millar had shared in the life and work of the Church, especially in the W.M.S. Predeceased by his wife, Dr. Millar is survived by his daughter, Mary, and two granddaughters.

A memorial service in St. Andrew's Church, Martintown, was conducted by the Rev. A. Ross MacDonald, assisted by Dr. Donald N. MacMillan, who gave the address and led in the prayers. Interment was in the North Branch Cemetery, Martintown, Ontario.

SYNOD OF BRITISH COLUMBIA

REVEREND GRANT HOLLINGWORTH

Rev. Dr. W. D. Grant Hollingworth, born in Montreal, P.Q. in 1906, passed away April 21, 1979, after a brief illness. He was 73 years old. In May of last year Dr. Hollingworth celebrated the 50th Anniversary of his ordination. At 22 years of age, he had completed the full course in Arts and Theology. He was ordained and inducted on May 25, 1928 in Knox Church, Calgary. His other pastorates were in Prince Rupert, Medicine Hat, St. Paul's Vancouver and West Point Grey, Vancouver.

He served six and one half years with the Canadian Army in World War Two. Four of those years attached to No. 1 Neurological Hospital in Basingstoke, England. He completed his Canadian Army Service as Senior Chaplain in the Vancouver Military District.

In 1952 Dr. Hollingworth was appointed Chaplain of the British Columbia Correctional Service. He became Senior Chaplain of the Department, and remained in that service until he retired in 1970. He continued as a Consultant to the Department until 1975.

In 1976 Dr. Hollingworth became Interim-Moderator at West Point Grey Presbyterian Church, and had an outstanding ministry there until June of 1978 when he retired. His outstanding service to the Church was recognized when he was given an Honorary Doctor of Divinity degree from Presbyterian College in 1969.

During his ministry in Vancouver he served five years as Chaplain to the city; was President of the Vancouver Council of Churches, and was for many years a member of the Library Board of Vancouver.

He leaves his wife Catherine, a sister Florence, and a brother Leslie. His work will be long remembered and appreciated. A Memorial Service was held on April 26th at West Point Grey Presbyterian Church, Vancouver. The Service was conducted by the Minister Dr. Max V. Putnam. He was assisted by Rev. Tony Plomp, Clerk of the Presbytery of Westminster.

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CHANCES FOR THE BOOK OF FORMS

The Book of Forms, as issued by authority of the 103rd General Assembly (1977), brought all previous revisions to and including 1977 up to date.

Blank pages were included in this production to enable changes to be included each year as the Assembly may adopt same.

Replace Section 109 (c) with the following:

"The Session is responsible for all aspects for stewardship, spiritual and material. With regard to the latter, the session has responsibility for determining what presentation is made to the congregation in seeking to elicit financial support for the programs of the Church at all levels. It may also appoint collections for special religious or charitable objects in addition to those appointed by the General Assembly or other competent authority. It regulates the time and mode of receiving offerings at public worship."

In Section 111 (b) add "not only for the maintenance of its own ministry but also," between "to its ability" and "to the mission" . . .

In order to put Section 162 in proper form considering what was done by the 1975 General Assembly, and the 1979 General Assembly, the Section should read:

(1) All decisions regarding major capital expenditures by a congregation require a two-thirds majority of those present and voting at congregational meetings, 'major capital expenditures' being defined as any amount in estimated costs equal to or exceeding the Total Normal Expenditures as reported in Acts and Proceedings of the preceding year of that congregation. (Adopted under the Barrier Act, 1975.)

(2) The duties of the Board of Managers have special regard to the temporal and financial affairs of the congregation. It is their duty to co-operate closely with the Session (which is responsible for all aspects of stewardship) in encouraging the liberality of the people in support of the congregation's total ministry, and to disburse all moneys received for this purpose, subject to the approval of the congregation; to provide for the payment of the minister's stipend and other salaries, and generally to administer all matters committed to their charge as the congregation may from time to time direct.

It is required that all offerings, whether for general revenue or missions, be counted and recorded before being removed from the church. (See also A.&P., pp. 79, 80 - re Use of Duplex Envelopes)

Add ", or for the appointment of an ordained missionary." at end of Section 125 (d).

Present paragraph in Section 235 becomes 235 (a).

Add to Section 235 paragraph (b) - When the person being ordained and inducted is to be the Assistant Minister having been called to a specific term of years, paragraph (a) may be used except that after naming the Presbytery, the presiding minister shall say, "I invite you to take part of this ministry with us, induct you to the pastoral charge of this congregation as Assistant Minister for the term of . . . years, and admit you to all the rights and privileges thereto pertaining."

Present paragraph in Section 241 becomes 241 (a).

Add to Section 241 paragraph (b) - When the person being inducted is to be an Assistant Minister having been called for a specific term of years, paragraph (a) may be used except that after naming the Presbytery, the presiding minister shall say, "I induct you to the pastoral charge of this congregation as Assistant Minister for the term of . . . years, and admit you to all the rights and privileges thereto pertaining."

In Section 176, after "shall be placed upon an Appendix to the Roll on proper motion" add ", and have the right to sit and correspond at all meetings of Presbytery."

That Section 176 (1) (b) be changed to 176 (1) (b) (i) and Section 176 (1) (b) (ii) be added as follows:

"who have been appointed to mission work in Canada within the bounds for not less than one year by the Board of World Mission."

After Section 125 add:

(For interpretation of this Section see 1979, A. & P., pages 237-238).

After Section 132 (1) add:

(For interpretation of this Section see 1979, A. & P., pages 235-236).

After Section 213 add:

(For interpretation of this Section see 1979, A. & P., page 239).

After Section 296 - 3 change the period to a comma, and add:

"If the Board or Committee to whom an Overture has been referred by a Presbytery has no upcoming meeting in which to consider the Overture before the Assembly meets, then the Committee on Business has the right under Section 296 - 3 to refer the Overture to the Committee on Bills and Overtures for disposition."

After Section 235 (b) add:

(For regulation re intention of term of induction see 1979, A. & P., page 470).

After Section 301 (5) 2 add:

(a) Each Synod is required to notify the Clerks of Assembly by November 30 of each year of the Presbyteries within their bounds responsible for appointing members to the Committee to Nominate Standing Committees for the next General Assembly; and

(b) Each Presbytery indicated in (a) above shall send before March 31 of each succeeding year, the names and addresses of their appointees to the Chairperson of the Committee to Nominate Standing Committees.

After Section 301 (5) 4 add:

That the Secretary so appointed be a member of the Committee to Nominate Standing Committees in the year before his appointment as Secretary.
