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FIRST SEDERUNT

*At the City of Toronto, and within St. Andrew's Church there, Sunday, the fifth day of June, in the year of our Lord, one thousand nine hundred and seventy-seven, at eight o'clock in the evening.*

Which place and time Ministers and Ruling Elders, commissioners from the several Presbyteries of The Presbyterian Church in Canada, convened pursuant to appointment of the General Assembly held in the Town of Arnprior, Ontario, on the sixth day of June last year.

The Rev. A. Lorne Mackay, B.A., B.D., D.D., Moderator of the 102nd General Assembly, assisted by the Rev. H. Douglas Stewart, B.A., D.D., the Rev. Eoin Mackay, M.A., D.D., and Mrs. T. Strung, Student Assistant at St. Andrew's, conducted public worship and preached a sermon on text II Corinthians 1:10, entitled "Past, Present and Future." According to appointment, Dr. A. Lorne Mackay administered the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper. In this he was assisted by Dr. H. D. Stewart and Dr. Eoin Mackay. The tables were served by Elders of St.

Andrew's, Glenview and Calvin Churches, Toronto, St. Giles Church, Prince George, B.C., and Melville Church, West Hill, Ont.

Thereafter, with prayer, Dr. Mackay did constitute the General Assembly in the Name of the Lord Jesus Christ, the only King and Head of the Church.

The Rev. DeCourcy H. Rayner, D.D., having been conducted to the Chair by the mover of his election, was welcomed by Dr. A. Lorne Mackay.

Whereupon Dr. Mackay did by prayer call upon God to bless the newly elected Moderator and confer upon him strength and wisdom that he might discharge the duties of his office. He then did install him in the Moderator's Chair.

### THANKS TO DR. MACKAY

Dr. A. L. Farris moved a sincere and hearty vote of thanks to Dr. A. L. Mackay for his services to the Church, and for the sermon with which he had opened the Assembly. This motion was duly seconded and carried unanimously.

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

The Assembly called for the report of the Board of Education which was given in by Dr. James Ferguson, Chairman.

On motion of Dr. A. MacSween, duly seconded, the report was received, taken as read, spread on the Minutes, and the Committee on Business was instructed to find a place for consideration of it on the docket of a future Sederunt.

*To the Venerable the 103rd General Assembly:*

The Board of Education begs to submit the following report:

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#### I. APPLICATIONS FOR SPECIAL COURSES

*Note:*

Attention is drawn to the following regulation adopted by the General Assembly of 1953.

"That the status of a catechist must not be understood as a step toward ultimate ordination. The recognition of this office is considered to be desirable only in order that the opportunity for full-time service may be provided for men with preaching and pastoral gifts and who are willing to give themselves to this work, but who may not be able to meet the educational requirements for the ministry, and also enable the Church to profit by the service which such men can render." (A. & P. 1953, p. 22).

We believe there is a need for the Church to be made more aware of these two perspectives and not to confuse our Christian unity with the unity of our country.

Since the issue is extremely complex we believe that a good deal of consideration must be given to current developments in Canada relative to national unity.

In order to stress the note of the pastoral concern of this Assembly and to highlight the necessity for prayerful study and search for God's direction for our Church and Country we recommend as follows:

- I. That the Moderator be authorized in the name of the 103rd General Assembly to write a pastoral letter to be sent out in both official languages, to all the congregations of The Presbyterian Church in Canada assuring them of the Church's prayers and concern for them during the present developments in Canada relative to national unity.

- II. That a Special Committee of the Assembly be struck to:
  1. Study the implications of our doctrinal position for the present political developments in Canada and particularly in Quebec relative to national unity.
  2. Circulate its reflections and considerations amongst the Presbyteries and Sessions, inviting their response.
  3. Begin to develop recommendations regarding strategies for mission and witness in the Province of Quebec and in Francophone communities elsewhere in Canada.
  4. Report its deliberations and recommendations to the 104th General Assembly.
- III. We recommend that this Special Committee be named by the Moderator with consideration given to including the following:

**THE ADMINISTRATIVE COUNCIL**

*To the Venerable the 103rd General Assembly:*

**PREAMBLE**

The Administrative Council has "good news", and "bad news". The "good news" has to do with the financial showing of the Church in 1976. Through the careful control of spending by the Boards and Committees of Assembly, and the generosity of our loyal supporters, the budget was balanced, and we completed the year with a slight surplus. This is a creditable showing in view of the inflation that has plagued our economy during 1976.

The "bad news" has to do with the financial problems we face in 1977 and in 1978. When the Finance Committee reviewed the Budgets that the Boards and Committees had presented for 1978, it discovered the estimated income was over one half a million dollars less than the total budget needed by all the Boards and Committees to do the minimum work they planned to do. At its March meeting the Council struggled with this situation and agreed such an estimated deficit for one year was unacceptable. So the Council cut budgets until the deficit was reduced to approximately \$300,000.00. This means some worthwhile programs will have to be left undone. In this needy world it is regrettable that we are limited in the work we should be doing for Christ's Kingdom because of financial limitations. \$10.00 additional during each year from each Church member would solve our problem. Is that too much to expect to receive in 1977 and again in 1978?

**MATTERS REFERRED TO COUNCIL BY PREVIOUS ASSEMBLIES****PROVISION OF MORTGAGES FOR RESIDENTIAL HOUSING FOR EXECUTIVE PERSONNEL ON OUR NATIONAL STAFF AND COLLEGE PROFESSORS.**

A committee of the Administrative Council, under the chairmanship of Miss E. Leitch, is carrying out the wishes of the 102nd General Assembly on the above project, and according to regulations set forth by the Administrative Council. Since the last Assembly two applications for mortgages were received and granted for a total of \$33,100.

The 102nd General Assembly asked the Council to consider making available invested funds of the Church for the purpose of granting first mortgage loans to ministers employed in full-time service to the Church who may wish to purchase their own homes. The Council finds that there are insufficient funds available for such an ambitious program and therefore does not consider the plan feasible.

**RECOMMENDATION 1. A**

*That the above statement be approved as an answer to the referral of the 102nd General Assembly re making first-mortgage loans to Ministers employed in full-time service to the Church.*

**TERM APPOINTMENTS**

In the Acts and Proceedings of the 102nd General Assembly (Pg. 410) the

Council reported in detail the study of the Executive-Personnel Committee on term appointments. The recommendation of the Council that the practice of term appointments of executive personnel be discontinued was referred to Presbyteries and Boards and Committees for study and report, along with a recommendation of the Church Doctrine Committee on this same subject.

Reports were received by the Church Doctrine Committee, and indicate the Church appears not to favor term appointments for ministers who have been called to congregations, or for executive personnel and college professors. The only indication in favour of term appointments is with regard to assistants-to-ministers.

The Council has continued a study of how reviews of appointments to executive staff and to college professorships can best be made. (The review of ministers by their Presbyteries does not come under the terms of reference of the Council). If the following recommendations are passed the Council will continue to supervise the review, but the procedure recommended below is slightly different from that recommended to the 102nd General Assembly, and places the responsibility of doing the review on the employing Board or Committee, and places on the Council the responsibility of having the review made.

#### RECOMMENDATION 2. A

*That the practice of term appointments of Executive Personnel be discontinued.*

#### RECOMMENDATION 3. A

*That the Administrative Council, through its Committee on Executive-Personnel*

- A. *Require that appropriate job descriptions be provided for each executive position.*
- B. *Provide for review at least once in each three year period of function and performance of the executive personnel employed by The Presbyterian Church in Canada.*
- C. *Arrange for such action as may be indicated by such review.*

#### REVIEW OF STAFF APPOINTMENTS

The Board of World Mission requested the Council to review all their staff appointments because the time of their term had reached the period for review. In keeping with the recommendations made above the Council would propose the following recommendation in answer to the request of the Board of World Mission.

#### RECOMMENDATION 4. A

*Conditional on the passing of recommendation #2 above, that the Administrative Council, in consultation with the Boards and Committees concerned, negotiate with persons who are now under term appointments to see if they are willing to continue their appointment without reference to a term.*

#### HOUSING ALLOWANCE FOR DEACONESSES.

The 102nd General Assembly, by separate resolution passed at the 7th Sederunt, directed "the Administrative Council, in consultation with the Task Force on the Diaconate of the Board of Ministry, to continue to seek a way of providing a housing allowance for Deaconesses." The Council appointed a committee to study this reference. The Committee met more than once, and reported to the Council on more than one occasion. Along with all church workers it is recognized that deaconesses are underpaid. The Council has tried to alleviate the situation. In 1973 an increase of \$1,200. per year was made in salary, in lieu of granting a housing allowance. Last year the Council agreed to increase the percentage increase for deaconesses on increases in salary scale from 90% to 95%, and to add 1% each year until the percentage becomes 100% of the increase to ministers. At its spring meeting the Council, in reviewing the budget for 1978, decided to freeze all budgets of Boards and Committees at the 1977 figure. An increase of salaries was approved for all church workers, and the Deaconesses this year will receive 96% of the increase of O.M. Basic Stipend. The Council therefore agreed not to approve additional payments to Deaconesses for the cost of Housing.

#### RECOMMENDATION 5. A

*That the above be approved as the answer to the referral of the 102nd General Assembly re Deaconesses' salary and Housing Allowance.*

#### PARITY OF SALARY SCALE FOR PROFESSORS AT EWART COLLEGE.

The Council reported to the 102nd General Assembly "that because Ewart College is concerned with under-graduate education and lay training, whereas Knox and Presbyterian Colleges provide training for the ministry at the post-graduate level, there is no compelling reason to adopt the principle of parity of wage scales for the three Colleges."

The Board of Ewart College recommended to the 102nd General Assembly that it "implement previous decisions and the finding of the Educational Needs Committee, by raising Ewart College Faculty salaries to par with those paid to Faculty members at Knox College and Presbyterian College, as funds become available and as a priority item."

The Council recommends as follows:

#### RECOMMENDATION 6. A

*That parity scale for Professors of Ewart College with Professors at Knox and Presbyterian Colleges be not granted, but Professors at Ewart College receive the increase in salary for 1978 at the amount granted to Executive Staff.*

#### SABBATICAL AND STUDY LEAVES

The Executive-Personnel Committee of the Administrative Council has been making an exhaustive study of Sabbaticals and Study Leaves. The Council has been studying this matter since 1965, and there has been a great deal of variance of practice within our Church. College Professors have been granted Study Leaves for some years now. Some Boards of our Church have granted study leaves to their secretaries, but recently this has applied mainly to the Board of World Mission. The procedures such as pay during sabbaticals, travel expenses, etc., has not been standardized. In recent years study leaves have been granted to ministers in charges but no funds have been provided to ministers in augmented charges.

The Executive-Personnel Committee agreed to a report with recommendations which was sent to all Boards and Committees for their study and report. The Board of Congregational Life replied in writing that they found it difficult for the members of their staff to be able to take long enough off work at one time to go on Sabbaticals. The Boards of Ewart and Knox Colleges and Communication Services, were represented at the meeting of the Executive-Personnel Committee which discussed the proposals sent out. There was no major revision suggested, so the Committee made minor revisions in its report and submitted it to the Council at its March meeting.

When the report was presented to the Council Mr. Cooper reported that the Board of Ministry was presenting proposals to the General Assembly on this matter. The Board of Ministry did this in response to the request of the Executive-Personnel Committee, addressed to all agencies concerned, that they submit their reactions to the Committee's recommendations prior to consideration by the Administrative Council. We have as a result a compendium of ideas which are at variance at certain points. The Council adheres to the recommendations of its committee, as approved, but suggests that the Assembly consider the reports together and resolve the differences, so that in its wisdom a decision may be reached.

The Council believes that Sabbaticals should be applied only to Professors of the three Colleges.

- (1) A professor should receive one academic year for Sabbatical after serving six years.
- (2) The appropriate authority in each College would grant the Sabbatical for an approved program of studies.
- (3) That Sabbaticals be not granted later than five years before retirement.

- (4) That each College set down its own requirements for the granting of Sabbatical Leaves consistent with the above guidelines.

The Council believes that Study Leaves are more appropriate for executive staff than Sabbaticals. The Study Leaves shall be two weeks per year, and may be accumulated up to a maximum of ten years benefits. Full salary is to be continued, plus a maximum of \$200.00 annually towards expenses. Specialized Training, in addition to Study Leaves, may be provided where deemed necessary for the Executive Staff.

#### RECOMMENDATION 7A. A

*That the principle of Sabbaticals be applied only to the Professors in the three Colleges, with the payment of only the full salary during the period of the Sabbaticals, and under the above mentioned guidelines.*

#### RECOMMENDATION 7B. A

*That the principle of Continuing Education be established for those on Executive Staff, which is defined as Secretaries, Assistant-Secretaries, or their equivalent.*

#### NATIONAL DEVELOPMENT FUND

The Council expects additional contributions will be received for the above fund, but has agreed these shall be distributed by the Council on the advice of its Finance Committee.

The National Development Fund has made a splendid contribution to the on-going work of the Church. Although it did not reach its anticipated objective, many projects have received support, and a variety of work has been accomplished which otherwise would have lacked support.

One half the receipts have been put into Category A. The interest from such receipts has done much over the past few years to enable the Church to increase basic stipends. Recently the Council has set aside \$100,000.00 from Category A to be used by the Presbyterian Church Building Corporation in assisting retired ministers and/or their spouses to obtain housing facilities. An additional \$100,000.00 is being reserved for this purpose if needed.

The balance of Category A Funds will now be transferred as a Specific Fund to the Endowment and Restricted Funds of The Presbyterian Church in Canada. Interest from these funds will continue to support stipends, provide bursaries, etc.

#### RECOMMENDATION 8. A

*That the above report be received as information.*

#### OVERTURE #12, (1976) PRESBYTERY OF EDMONTON, RE FINANCIAL RESPONSIBILITY FOR ASSEMBLY PERSONNEL ON DEPUTATION.

This Overture was received too late for the Council to consider it and report to the 102nd General Assembly.

The overture respectfully requested the Assembly to

1. Order and facilitate the enunciation of a comprehensive policy statement defining the role of the Assembly in the financing of such tours and deputations as may be authorized by the Assembly, its Boards and Committees, and
2. Rule that when such a policy statement is enunciated to the satisfaction of the Assembly, it be publicized, and made conveniently available to all Boards, Committees and persons affected, and to ALL Presbyteries and Synods of the Church.

Your committee met twice and also made a survey of the deputation guidelines issued by the Board of World Mission, the Board of Congregational Life, and the Women's Missionary Society (W.D.).

There are two areas of concern with regard to financial responsibility for personnel on deputation.

The first concern is the Moderator of the General Assembly. Your committee is

agreed that the responsibility for the Moderator's expenses rests with the General Assembly, whose servant he is. No congregation or presbytery should feel that they cannot have the Moderator, because of the expense involved.

At the same time, while his expenses are covered by the General Assembly, the Church is willing to receive any contributions that may be made towards his travel and hospitality locally. Contributions, including honoraria usually paid for special services such as anniversaries, should be remitted to the Comptroller's Office. One way of publicizing these guidelines is to include them in the report of the Committee to Advise with the Moderator each year.

The other concern is the deputation expenses of those who go out representing the various Boards of the General Assembly.

The following is an extract from the Deputation Policy of the Board of World Mission:

"Generally speaking, all missionary visits should be self-supporting and all groups receiving such visits should cooperate as fully as possible to this end.

When mission personnel are sent on deputation in response to a request from an area where no one is on deputation at that time, the organization making the request is fully responsible for all expenses including transportation, accommodation and hospitality. When mission personnel are offered for deputation and sent on itinerary by Mission Education all expenses shall be underwritten by the Board of World Mission, but local travel, accommodation and hospitality are the responsibility of the group or groups visited by the missionaries. In addition, the local groups should be urged whenever possible to make a contribution to overall travel so as to enable a wider deputation coverage in every region of the Church without undue strain on the Mission Education budget. Exceptions are usually made for summer camps and young people's organizations. Those are not normally expected to be responsible for any expenses beyond room and board.

It is the responsibility of synod/synodical or presbytery/presbyterial officials to see that local groups understand clearly their financial obligations and make it plain that local groups shall take the initiative in carrying out these arrangements directly with the missionary. (The missionary should not be put in the embarrassing position of having to ask for his/her expenses to be covered or having to pay them himself/herself.)

Whether or not to have special collections to defray the missionaries' expenses is a matter of local decision. It is recommended, however, that offerings be received for the general budget of the Church or W.M.S. and that missionaries' expenses be regarded as a part of the operating expenses of the meeting and be paid from local expense funds."

The W.M.S. pay all deputation expenses but accept any contributions that may be made locally.

The B.C.L. is prepared to pay all travel expenses in providing service to the field.

The Council believes that negotiation beforehand would clarify the situation locally and enable both sides to proceed with mutual trust.

The Council approved the following regulations for financial responsibility of Assembly personnel on deputation:

1. That the expenses of the Moderator of the General Assembly be provided from the budget of that body, and that contributions, or honoraria, be gratefully received and applied towards those expenses.
2. That the provisions of the Board of World Mission, and the Board of Congregational Life, for the expenses of personnel on deputation, as outlined above, be accepted as guidelines.
3. That these statements of policy, as outlined in 1 and 2 above be publicized and circulated to those concerned.

#### RECOMMENDATION 9. A

*That the above regulations be accepted as the answer to the prayer of Overture #12, (1976) from the Presbytery of Edmonton.*

#### COMMUNICATION SERVICES

The 102nd General Assembly agreed that "the whole matter of providing an

effective television program for our Church be referred to the Administrative Council for consideration and report to the 103rd General Assembly."

The 102nd General Assembly was informed that "Burning Bush Productions" has been incorporated to look after the production and marketing areas of the Committee's (Communication Services) work.

The Communication Services Committee approached the Council at its Fall meeting seeking permission from the Administrative Council for the Communication Services Committee and Burning Bush Productions, to carry out a financial campaign throughout the Church from January 1st to May 1st, 1977 in order to raise \$300,000.00 to finance twenty-six television half-hour programs. The Council agreed unanimously "that permission be granted by the Administrative Council for Burning Bush Productions to carry out a financial campaign from January 1st to May 1st, 1977 in order to raise \$300,000 to finance twenty-six "My Place" half-hour programs. The Communication Services Committee will be reporting to this Assembly the result of its campaign.

#### RECOMMENDATION 10. A

*That the above be received as information.*

#### RECOMMENDATION #5, A. & P., 1976, PAGES 323-324

The above recommendation has been considered by the Program Co-Ordinating Committee, having been referred by the Administrative Council.

The members of the Program Co-Ordinating Committee are in agreement with the statement in the body of the report that careful attention should be given to national research and planning. Of the three courses of action proposed, the Committee is of the opinion that number one is to be preferred, namely, that the functions of the Program Co-Ordinating Committee be re-defined to include national research and planning.

At the present time each major Board or Committee of the General Assembly is responsible for its own research and planning in relation to its mandate and its established goals and priorities. The co-ordination of the planning and resulting priorities of each agency then takes place (or ought to take place) at the level of the Administrative Council, which is made up of representatives of the church at large, as are the Boards and Committees of the Assembly. This system allows for a maximum of participation in the national planning process by members of the church across the country.

The problem facing the Administrative Council is how to do the required coordination in the space of time available to it at its meetings. What is required is some creative hard work by a small committee meeting in advance of the Council, so that specific recommendations can be presented with respect to national planning and priority setting. The Council would then be able to approve or amend the recommendations from the point of view of its members who represent the national Church.

If it were to be so directed, the Program Co-Ordinating Committee is representative of all the major Boards and Committees, including the Colleges, yet it is small enough to undertake this kind of bringing together of the goals and priorities of all the agencies for consideration and review by the Administrative Council.

The Council agreed that a function of the Program Co-ordinating Committee be to include Budget Planning.

#### RECOMMENDATION 11. A

*That the Administrative Council use the Program Co-Ordinating Committee for Budget Planning prior to the setting of the Budget in 1978 and 1979.*

#### RECOMMENDATION #10, A. & P., 1976 PAGES 322 and 323

The Program Co-Ordinating Committee has reviewed the visits of the personnel at 50 Wynford Drive, to the Church at large, and reports to the Assembly that a large number of visits has been made to all areas of the Church. The Staff is prepared to undertake visits where needed, and suggests presbyteries and congregations wishing visits send invitations to those from whom they seek assistance.

#### RECOMMENDATION 12. A

*That the above report be received as information.*

#### SECOND CENTURY ADVANCE FOR CHRIST

The Second Century Advance for Christ National Committee under its Chairman, Mr. Frank Whilsmith, has been organised and has held two meetings to plan for the Advance. Dr. Matthew Dymond has been appointed Co-ordinator.

The Synods and Presbyteries were requested to form Committees, and 7 of the Synods, and 32 Presbyteries have done so.

In January, 1977 many congregations discussed the Second Century Advance for Christ at their annual meetings and saw the filmstrip "Into the Second Century".

72 Congregations have reported to the National Committee office that committees have been formed.

The Resource material will include:

Four Bible Studies on Thanksgiving, Commitment, Loyalty and Advance, prepared by the Rev. Zander Dunn for use by Kirk Sessions, Boards of Managers, Adult and Youth Groups. A Prayer Guide will also be available in September.

The purpose of the Second Century Advance for Christ is to provide a spiritual and financial advance. The financial goal is \$3 million for extension of work at home and overseas, over and above the ongoing needs provided by General Assembly Budget.

#### RECOMMENDATION 13. C

*That the above report be received as information.*

#### MACLEAN ESTATE

The Sub-Committee of the Council on the Maclean Estate submits the following report to the General Assembly on activities at Crieff.

"Crieff Hills Community is now two years old, and actively engaged in both hosting and initiating many retreat programmes or conferences. Every week brings more groups to discover the special blessings of a time of study and reflection in the peacefulness of Crieff. About two thousand people stayed over in 1976. With the new six bedroom lodge and the conference dining room and kitchen, completed in April, 1977 there are facilities for even larger groups and expanded programmes. C.H.C. can now operate a conference in one portion of our 250 acres and still have retreat buildings for two separate congregational groups elsewhere on the property. Requests for bookings come in at twice that capacity. In the mid-week periods there is an increased interest in individual clergy retreats, board and committee meetings, and school or study groups. The Resident Director, Rev. Bob Spencer, has now the assistance of a full-time Maintenance Manager, Mr. Alex McConnell.

#### RECOMMENDATION 14. A

#### BIENNIAL ASSEMBLIES

This subject was referred to Presbyteries for study and report.

Replies were received from 21 Presbyteries

a. 3 Presbyteries were in favour of the proposal

b. 18 Presbyteries were opposed to the proposal

A number of Presbyteries cited reasons for their opposition. Generally, these reasons were gathered around the following points.

- i. the fellowship of an annual Assembly is a vital part of the life of the Church
- ii. there would be an undesirable delay in the judicial process, as well as in filling vacancies in executive staff and college faculties

- iii. the anticipated saving would be offset by other costs
- iv. there is fear of giving greater authority to Boards and Committees (including the Council), and the development of bureaucracy

**RECOMMENDATION 15. A**

*That the matter of Biennial Assemblies be dropped.*

**REPORT OF COMMITTEE RE 1985 GENERAL ASSEMBLY**

The 102nd General Assembly received an invitation from St. Andrew's Church, Lethbridge, to hold the 1985 General Assembly in that city. This was referred to the Administrative Council for study and report (A&P p.24).

It became obvious to the Committee that no simple "yes" or "no" answer could be given at this time. Indeed, if any answer were given, it would depend upon a strategy for determining the location of Assemblies and require a change in the Book of Forms. At present, we are governed by sections 5 and 281 which require each Assembly to appoint the time and place of the *next* Assembly.

It is becoming increasingly difficult to make suitable arrangements for Assemblies, particularly in the provision of billeting. Because universities are going into the conference business and their residential facilities are being used during all parts of the year, it is often necessary to reserve such facilities more than twelve months in advance. For a congregation to be able to extend a responsible invitation, it will require longer-range planning than has heretofore been needed.

The cost of holding the Assembly is a significant factor. While it is less expensive because of travel costs in the central area, the Canadian historic and social situation makes it desirable to meet at intervals in different parts of the country.

It is desirable (perhaps necessary) that there be some strategy for determining locations for Assemblies rather than just depending upon invitations that may or may not be forthcoming.

In the light of this, we are proposing appropriate changes in the Book of Forms to permit the development of a strategy that would establish a continuing 5-year plan of locations. In order to deal realistically with expenses as well as with the national aspect of the Church, we suggest that within every 10-year period, the Assembly should meet once in the east, once in the west, and the other 8 years within the 3 central Synods.

It is understood in selecting places for General Assembly to meet over a five year period, each Assembly would have an opportunity to set the place and time of the meeting of the next Assembly, but would only move from the place previously selected for good and sufficient reasons. It is with this understanding that no change need be made under Section 5, and the Council is proposing a minor addition to Section 281 to clarify the procedure now suggested to the Church.

Conditional on approval of the following recommendations the Administrative Council will present to the 1978 General Assembly proposed locations of meetings of Assembly for the next five years. The ordinary scheduling of Assemblies will be based on the guideline that within a ten year period the Assembly would meet once in the east, once in the west, and eight times within the three Central Synods. The Clerks of Assembly will communicate annually to Presbyteries seeking invitations for future Assemblies. No definite answer can be given to the invitation from Lethbridge for 1985, but a recommendation is made below.

**RECOMMENDATION 16. A**

*That Section 281 in the Book of Forms be changed by adding "notwithstanding, any Assembly may determine the location of future Assemblies for the ensuing five years" after "before it dissolves."*

**RECOMMENDATION 17. C**

*That Recommendation #16 above be approved by this Assembly as an Interim Act, (CF. Section 293 (2) Book of Forms), and that the Assembly accept the invitation from Knox Church, Sudbury, to meet there in 1979.*

**RECOMMENDATION 18. A**

*That this Assembly accept tentatively the invitation from St. Andrew's Church, Lethbridge, for 1985, pending final approval by the Assembly empowered to do so.*

**OVERTURES REFERRED**

**OVERTURE #1.**

Overture #1, from the Synod of British Columbia, prays that the "Investments of the Pension Fund be brought under direct management of The Presbyterian Church in Canada so that they could be used in the mission of the Church".

The Administrative Council is of the opinion the investments of the Pension Fund should be kept quite separate from the internal administration of the Church. The cost of hiring qualified actuarial help would be prohibitive. There would be a high potential for abuse of the fiscal responsibility, as well as competition within the Church of who would have the use of the funds to assist in their programs. The Pension Board is responsible to the members of the plan, the ministers of the Church, and they are dedicated to the end that the funds should produce the highest possible returns in order that members of the plan may receive the highest pension possible. Because of these, and other reasons, the Administrative Council recommends as follows:

**RECOMMENDATION 19. A**

*That the prayer of Overture #1 be not granted.*

**OVERTURE #2.**

The Synod of British Columbia, through the above Overture, requests "establishing a dental plan for all Professional Church Workers in The Presbyterian Church in Canada."

The Secretary of the Council secured an estimate from an insurance company for coverage based on the Ontario Provincial Dental Association schedule of fees in force early in 1977. Based on 100% reimbursement, and with 95% participation of all eligible members the total cost of two plans would be \$8,737.74 per month.

It would be most difficult to secure 95% participation, and the cost factor would be more difficult with the present state of the Church's budget.

**RECOMMENDATION 20. A**

*That the prayer of Overture #2 be not granted.*

**OVERTURE #8**

The Presbytery of East Toronto prays for "initiating a national weekly television programme".

The Council understands the Communication Services Committee is exploring various possibilities in this field. The Council realizes the cost may be prohibitive, but it would like to see all possibilities explored.

**RECOMMENDATION 21. A**

*That the prayer of the Overture be granted to the extent that the Communication Services Committee research and evaluate this project, and report to the 104th General Assembly.*

**OVERTURE #15**

The Presbytery of Edmonton prays that the Board of World Mission be released from the regulation preventing ministers serving in augmented charges receiving the \$100.00 expense allowance for continuing education.

The prayer of this Overture will be granted if the Assembly adopts Recommendation #9 of the Board of World Mission, and the Council concurs in the said recommendation.

**RECOMMENDATION 22. A**

*That the above be received as information.*

**CHANGES IN STAFF****BOARD OF WORLD MISSION**

The Council has been informed of the resignation of Dr. E. H. Johnson as Secretary of Research and Planning with the Board of World Mission. The resignation is to become effective December 31st, 1977. No replacement was made for Dr. H. Doig when he resigned, and the Council has agreed the Board of World Mission be given permission to appoint a secretary for Research, Planning and Finance.

**RECOMMENDATION 23. A**

*That the above be received as information.*

**ADMINISTRATIVE COUNCIL**

The Council reports with deepest regret that it has received the resignation of the Comptroller of the Church, Mr. J. B. Barbour, effective December 31st, 1978. After reference to the Executive-Personnel Committee it is anticipated the Council will be calling for nominations from Presbyteries before filling the vacancy.

**RECOMMENDATION 24. A**

*That the above be received as information.*

**OTHER MATTERS****AUDITORS****RECOMMENDATION 25. A**

*That the firm of Thorne, Riddell and Company, Chartered Accountants, be continued as auditors of the Church accounts, and that the Administrative Council be authorized to set their fees.*

**REPORT OF PRESBYTERIES RE PRIORITIES IN THE CHURCH'S BUDGET**

On August 24, 1976, the Secretary of the Council wrote to all Presbyteries asking for their recommendations regarding:

- "(a) The desirability of discontinuing any area of work now extant, and
- (b) The desirability of commencing new areas of work."

Ten Presbyteries replied to the letter.

Of these five had either "no recommendations" or general comments only.

Only five Presbyteries made specific recommendations.

The Council appointed a Committee to study all reports received, and in most cases has made appropriate recommendations to the Boards or Committees involved. However, some suggestions were such that the Council considered it should report to the Assembly, and in some cases includes a recommendation.

Two Presbyteries raised the issue of consolidation of our theological training, even to the extent of "uniting the work of Knox, Ewart and Presbyterian Colleges by 1981".

The Council dealt with this proposal in 1975, and believes it is too soon to reconsider this matter.

The problem of maintaining small congregations, and the need to enter into shared ministries was raised. The Council considered it would be profitable to study such situations in view of:

- (1) The real gospel witness provided.
- (2) The work of other denominations and/or agencies.
- (3) The growth possibilities.
- (4) The costs in light of other possible work.
- (5) The possibilities of shared ministries with nearby congregations.

**RECOMMENDATION 26. C**

*That the Board of World Mission, and the Presbyteries of the bounds, be instructed to review the viability of all aid-receiving charges and institutions in the light of the above comments.*

One Presbytery suggested a task force be formed "to propose all future staff and executive appointments." The Council reminds the Church that such a committee is already functioning, and is called the Executive-Personnel Committee. (Rec. 42, Administrative Council, 1974).

**RECOMMENDATION 27. A**

*That the ten Presbyteries which replied to the request of the Administrative Council to evaluate priorities in the programs of our Church be thanked, and informed that a special committee of the Council considered all suggestions, and referrals have been made to the proper Boards or Committees of items pertaining to their jurisdiction.*

**TRUSTEES**

The six-year term as members of The Trustee Board of Mr. A.R.G. Ament, and Mr. H. M. Griffith, has been completed. Mr. Ament has served in recent years as Chairman of the Board. The Trustee Board has recommended the following appointments.

**RECOMMENDATION 28. A**

*That Mr. J. R. Yarnell, Toronto, and Mr. J. S. Marshall, Hamilton, be appointed to the Trustee Board.*

**CONGRESS - 1979**

The Committee planning for the 1979 Presbyterian Congress is already at work and has had several meetings. The Congress will be held at the University of Guelph from 29 June to 2 July, 1979 (Friday to Monday). The Committee, chaired by Rev. J. J. Harrold Morris, is representative of a broad spectrum of interest within the Church, and is aiming at an attendance of up to 1200. We hope that the Congress will be fully self-supporting, with all those attending sharing equally in the cost and in a travel pool.

In the near future we should be able to announce a selected theme, and theme speakers and leaders. As a first step in trying to ensure that the Congress meets the needs and expectations of those who attend, we are conducting an evaluation of the 1975 Congress by a number of its participants.

**RECOMMENDATION 29. A**

*That the above be received as information.*

**NEW ISSUE OF THE BOOK OF FORMS**

The 1969 edition of the Book of Forms is nearly depleted. The Clerks of Assembly are revising the book so that it will contain the changes of recent General Assemblies, and hope to have a new edition printed.

**RECOMMENDATION 30. A**

*That the Clerks be authorized to publish a revised Book of Forms.*

**FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

The financial statements have been reviewed by an audit committee on behalf of the Council, and appear elsewhere in the book.

**RECOMMENDATION 31. A**

*That the financial statements be received as information.*

**INCREASE IN MAXIMUM SALARY RE PENSION**

As reported last year, the Pension Board wishes to increase the Pension Benefits in ratio to the increase in the cost of living. Inasmuch as the basic stipend increased approximately \$1,000.00 annually on January 1st, 1977 the Council

agreed to increase its payments to the fund to permit raising the maximum payments per year from \$480.00 to \$520.00. All members of the Fund are reminded that it is their responsibility to ensure their payments are being forwarded to the Pension Fund, and payment of arrears cannot be accepted. The deadline for receiving payments from members is March 31st for payments to be credited to the previous year.

**RECOMMENDATION 32. A**

*That the above be received as information.*

**INSURANCE ON CHURCH PROPERTY**

All too often Church buildings are destroyed by fire, and are not adequately covered by insurance. Last year in our report we indicated the Ecclesiastical Insurance Company has comparable rates to other companies and that local insurance agents can grant policies from this company. Furthermore this Company has agreed that they will allow a premium discount based on the number of congregations which insure with this company. This discount is allowed on all new policies and on all renewals effective April 1st, 1977. The amount of discount will increase as the number of participating Presbyterian congregations is increased.

**RECOMMENDATION 33. A**

*That the above be received as information.*

**BASIC STIPEND, AND TRAVEL**

The Council is concerned that the salary of full-time Church workers should not decrease because of inflation. In looking at its budget for 1978 the Council felt compelled to hold down expenditures as much as possible so that the Church would not find itself in the crippling deficit position of a few years ago. Although it decided to freeze the program budget of Boards and Committees at the 1977 figures, it was agreed salaries would have to be increased in order that the purchasing power of the servants of the Church should not be decreased.

The Council is grateful for the many congregations which have increased their givings sufficiently to cover the increases in Basic Stipend and/or travel and therefore in most cases former salary increases have not required additional support from the General Budget of the Church.

At some variance with the recommendation of the Board of World Mission, the Council recommends as follows:

**RECOMMENDATION 34. A**

*That the following salary and travel scale be adopted, effective January 1st, 1978.*

In addition to above scale, those marked \* receive increments in salary for years of service.

All full-time workers above receive a \$1,200.00 travel grant per annum.

**EXECUTIVE PERSONNEL SALARIES**

In its annual review of the salaries of executive personnel the Executive-Personnel Committee studied the salary scale of those serving in similar capacities in other denominations, and found our Church is somewhat below the average. Perhaps this is because our Church has been seeking to keep pace with the increase in the cost of living, but has not attempted to cover increments for years of service, or experience. The Council decided it could not approve the amount of increase in salaries for executive personnel that was recommended by its committee, because of the freeze imposed in other areas. Therefore the Council agreed to recommend as follows:

**RECOMMENDATION 35. A**

*That a 7% increase be granted to the Executive Staff of the Church, and to College Professors, with a corresponding increase in regard to rental allowances where applicable, and that this increase be effective January 1st, 1978.*

**PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN AUSTRALIA**

The Presbyterian Church in Australia has suffered a schism somewhat akin to what took place in Canada in 1925. A remnant of congregations has decided not to enter the Church Union that is scheduled to take place on June 22nd, 1977.

An appeal has come to our Church for financial assistance to The Presbyterian Church in Australia. The Council considered this appeal, and agreed it should be a decision for the Assembly to make, and therefore the following recommendation.

**RECOMMENDATION 36. A**

*That a committee be appointed to study the request referred to above, and make a report to this Assembly.*

**ITEMS IN BOARD OF WORLD MISSION REPORT**

In the report of the Board of World Mission to this Assembly there are some items having financial implications, and therefore the Administrative Council makes the following recommendations.

**A. Capital Grants**

The Board of World Mission is requesting grants of \$100,000.00 for Canada, and \$50,000.00 for Overseas Capital needs to be made from bequest monies at the end of 1977 and 1978. The Council considers it would be unfair to make this decision until a review can be made of all the needs which may become evident.

**RECOMMENDATION 37. A**

*That the request of the Board of World Mission as outlined above be not approved at this time but consideration be given to the request when final disposition of bequests is made by the Council.*

**B. Interest on Capital Funds**

The Board of World Mission is requesting this Assembly to initiate a system of applying interest on capital funds to a particular fund, e.g. Church Extension, Home Missions and Overseas Missions Reserves.

The Council considers this procedure would not be in line with established accounting procedures, nor should the granting of an allocation mean that the funds are set aside in an interest-bearing account for the benefit of a particular Board for which the allocation is made.

**RECOMMENDATION 38. A**

*That the request of the Board of World Mission referred to above be not granted.*

### ADDITIONAL MILEAGE RATE FOR SUPERINTENDENTS OF MISSIONS

The Board of World Mission requests an increase of mileage rates for Superintendents of Missions from 12¢ to 15¢.

The Council considers the Church should not deal with one group of workers to the exclusion of others.

#### RECOMMENDATION 39. A

*That the request re travel grant for Superintendents of Missions be not granted, but the Council study the matter of travel grants for all Church workers, and have power to make adjustments to same.*

#### BUDGETS FOR 1977 and 1978

As mentioned already in this report the Council gave careful consideration to the decision of how large a deficit could be permitted in the 1978 Budget. Originally the Finance Committee reported to the Council suggesting a total budget deficit for 1978 of \$549,603.00.

By a general freezing of the 1978 Budget to the 1977 Budget, except for salaries, pensions, medical and other such required payments. The Council now reports a deficit of \$349,752.00. The Council also resolved to inform its Finance Committee that in future a proposed deficit for any one year of over \$300,000.00 is unacceptable. In view of the considerable reduction of expenditure permitted by the approved budget for 1978, the Council suggests to the Church that the likelihood of balancing the budget in 1978 will require careful economizing on the part of spending Boards and Committees and/or a more generous liberality on the part of our people. We consider the challenge of a balanced budget in 1977 and 1978 is within our reach.

*That the budget estimates of income and expenditures for the year 1977 and 1978 as set forth in the above table be approved, and the Administrative Council make subsequent adjustments as may be required.*

### THE REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE TO ADVISE WITH THE MODERATOR

*To the Venerable the 103rd General Assembly:*

The Reverend A. Lorne Mackay, minister of Central Presbyterian Church, Hamilton, Ontario, was elected Moderator of the 102nd General Assembly meeting in St. Andrew's Church, Arnprior, Ontario.

Dr. Mackay spent a month in the summer in his native Prince Edward Island, and among other events he spoke at a large rally in Summerside.

He attended the Synod of the Atlantic Provinces, as well as the Synods of Alberta and British Columbia.

In February Dr. and Mrs. Mackay visited in Geneva, Malawi, Nairobi, Nigeria and London.

He was the guest of honor at a banquet sponsored by the City of Hamilton, and represented the Church at other public functions. Before leaving with his wife to visit Scotland, and the General Assembly there, the Moderator addressed the Convocation of Presbyterian College, Montreal, on Monday, May 9th.

The ballots for the election of the Moderator of the 103rd General Assembly were counted on April 13th, and Recommendation #1 below indicates the result of that tally.

The Committee considers the Assembly should make a slight change in the regulations re election of the Moderator. Because the deadline for receiving nominations from Presbyteries is that they must be in the hands of the Clerk on November 30th, and the regulation re ballots for the election of the Moderator declares they must be post-marked not later than March 31st, this may confuse some Presbytery Clerks which deadline to follow on each occasion. Also if the deadline for receiving ballots were March 31st, the Committee to Advise could count the ballots earlier than the present regulations permit. Therefore we offer Recommendation #4 below.

## RECOMMENDATION 1. A

That the Reverend DeCourcy H. Rayner, C.D., B.A., D.D., Editor of The Presbyterian Record, be officially nominated as Moderator of the 103rd General Assembly.

## RECOMMENDATION 2. A

That the thanks of the Assembly be tendered to the courts of the Church, the congregations, and the many persons who showed kindness to the Moderator as he visited throughout the Church.

## RECOMMENDATION 3. A

That the thanks of the Assembly be tendered to the Media for their willingness to make their facilities available to Dr. Mackay.

## RECOMMENDATION 4. A

That the regulation re balloting for the Moderator be revised so that the deadline for receiving ballots be "to be in the Clerks' Office by March 31st."

## REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON INSTITUTIONAL CHAPLAINCIES

To the Venerable the 103rd General Assembly:

The Committee on Institutional Chaplaincies (penal, educational, health) exists in order: (1) to assist and support persons serving in The Presbyterian Church in Canada in these specialized ministries. These involve problems not normally faced by the parish minister, not the least of which is in his relationship to the Church-at-large; (2) to inform the Church of their work and its necessity and character; (3) to advise government bodies on policy; (4) to review and assess in co-operation with government authorities the work of chaplains in their employ; (5) to search out and recommend to the General Assembly the inclusion of such areas of ministry as the committee in its wisdom feels is the concern of the whole Church. Persons ordained to the holy ministry may find themselves in these areas of ministry and in need of the concern of the whole household of faith; and finally; (6) in co-operation with governments and other churches to search out those persons best fitted to serve as chaplains.

The committee supports the recommendation of the Board of Ministry dealing with the realignment of this committee as a sub-committee of that Board.

### RECOMMENDATION 1. A

*That the General Assembly endorse and urge presbyteries to make use of the program of the Church Council on Justice and Corrections called "Alternatives".*

### RECOMMENDATION 2. A

*That The Presbyterian Church in Canada continue financial support and involvement in the Church Council on Justice and Corrections as a means of supporting our institutional chaplains.*

### RECOMMENDATION 3. A

*That parole officers who are ordained ministers of The Presbyterian Church in Canada be included under the "umbrella" of the Committee on Institutional Chaplaincies.*

## THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH DOCTRINE

To the Venerable the 103rd General Assembly:

The Committee on Church Doctrine respectfully submits the following report of its work.

### I. MINISTRY IN THE CHURCH

#### A. Term Appointments

The 102nd General Assembly, on recommendation of the Committee on Church Doctrine, agreed "that the statement and questions in the body of the Report about term ministries be sent down for study by Presbyteries, Colleges, the Administrative Council, Assembly Boards and Committees and Kirk Sessions, and that they be asked to reply to the Secretary of the Committee on Church Doctrine by January 31st, 1977" (A & P 1976, pp. 396, 374-5).

A total of 26 replies was received: 6 from Kirk Sessions, 17 from Presbyteries, 2 from Boards and one from a College. Understandably, not all chose to deal with all four questions sent down nor in the precise terms in which our questions were phrased. The following, however, is a fairly accurate evaluation of their answers.

In sum, the concept of term appointments for professional church workers, regardless of how we might wish to categorize them, was rejected by the majority of those who replied. The sole exception which received any degree of recognition had to do with "assistants-to-ministers" who, according to 5 replies, might be "employed" for a limited term. Periodic reviews, however, were suggested by an appreciable number but there was a marked reluctance to see these either tied to or carried out in a contractual way.

We believe that generally speaking the concept of "term appointment" or "term ministry" fails to recognize several factors and has certain built-in questionable assumptions. For example, it may imply that people can give useful service for

only relatively short periods of time, or suggest that the Call of God can be regulated by the Church so as to leave no option for the Holy Spirit's continuing affirmation of the Call over a long period of time. It fails to recognize that a "term" Call or Appointment would open all manner of possibilities within every pastoral charge, within our colleges and within the national offices for a few dissident voices to create problems and to bring to an end an otherwise useful ministry. Moreover, a "term appointment to national staff" fails to appreciate the fact that Board Secretaries etc. require a certain expertise which can only be acquired by years of on-the-job experience. It also fails to appreciate fully the related fact that several key positions on national staff are occupied by laymen who might have in response to an inner Call from God left lucrative positions in the business world for a less lucrative position within the Church. We wonder whether we would presently have their valuable services had we imposed a "term" albeit a renewable contract upon them. Finally, it is our opinion that where a Presbytery or other reviewing agency is not alert to its responsibility, any assessment of a position or of a person's performance at the end of a stated "term of office" would be ineffectual; on the other hand, where a Presbytery or other reviewing agency is alert and exercises due discipline over its members at all times consonant with the present conception of the Call or the Appointment, nothing is to be gained from introducing a "term" concept.

Realizing, however, that there are and probably should be certain exceptions to any rule, we recognize that there is a legitimate place within the structure of our Church for certain inherently time-limited ministries. Under certain circumstances, an office of assistant minister might well fall within this category.

We also agree with many of the replies that a periodic – and we would like to add, a regular – review of pastoral and non-pastoral positions at every level of the Church's structure would be a desirable thing provided it were carried out in a Christlike manner. We believe that Kirk Sessions, Presbyteries, Synods, Colleges and General Assemblies already have within the law of the Church both the freedom and the obligation to review not only their own internal structure but also the bodies and persons within their respective jurisdictions. It is important to put this responsibility into practice if the Church's organizational structure and man's stewardship of God's gifts are to be maintained at the highest level of service.

Representatives of our Committee consulted with a sub-committee of the Administrative Council discussing term appointments within the Church Offices and found that the two bodies are of one mind.

As regards assistant ministers, we recommend that a regulation be enacted under the Barrier Act providing for term induction of assistant ministers. See Recommendation 1.

*B. Overture 6, 1976, The Presbytery of Vancouver Island, re The Office of Moderator*

Overture 6 from the Presbytery of Vancouver Island refers to the law of our Church which states that the Moderator in all our Church Courts must be a Minister and thereby disallows a competent ruling elder from holding this high office. The Overture then goes on to ask the Assembly to "take action to remove this discrimination in so far as it affects the office of Moderator in Presbyteries, Synods and General Assemblies of our Church. . ."

At the very outset we must point out that though the *Acts and Proceedings* treats this Overture as a Presbytery request, the Presbytery Clerk has informed us that it actually emanated from the Kirk Session of St. Andrew's, Victoria, B.C. and was transmitted by the Presbytery *simpliciter*.

In any case, the Overture is puzzling for several reasons. (1) It regards the present rule of allowing only ministers to moderate in the higher courts as "discriminating" against elders, yet without giving any reason it would still require that moderators of sessions be ministers. (2) It does not appear to regard restriction to ministers of ordination to Word and Sacraments as discriminatory although it is the basic reason why elders cannot be moderators. (3) Contrary to our Church's belief that our system of government is agreeable to the Word of God, the Overture says it is not, without giving any reasons. (4) No attempt is made to examine the doctrine upon which our present practice is grounded or to say where it is wrong.

The Committee directs attention to the following points in our doctrine of church government that call for retention of the present practice.

1. In the New Testament, presbyter (i.e., minister) and bishop denote the same office. Modern New Testament studies have borne out the Reformed stand on this point, and this understanding continued to be found in the Church right up to the Reformation. Reformed theologians therefore asserted the *parity* of the ministry over against the three-ranked ministry of bishop, presbyter, and deacon. This parity does not imply parity between ministers and elders but parity of ministers only.

Such being the case, our doctrine is that a true bishop is a shepherd who preaches the Word and dispenses the Sacraments in a particular flock. The heart of church government is Christ's own rule in the worshipping congregation over which the bishop presides in Christ's name. Hence the solemnity of ordination and induction and the desirability that the bishop be one whom the people are prepared to receive in this capacity (WCF 25:3). Church courts are secondary adjuncts to Christ's primary sphere of rule in the congregation. Since the minister alone is bishop, he presides over the congregation and therefore necessarily also over the kirk session. Elders have no official role in worship. (The session should not be constituted before the Sacrament for it does not dispense it, nor is worship a session meeting).

2. The heart of a Presbytery consists of its ministers. The Presbytery does not correspond to the bishop of an episcopal diocese: it is a council of the bishops of a particular area, along with elders. The ministers (or bishops) form the permanent core of the Presbytery as members of it in their own right and this is why it is laid down that in the higher courts a quorum must always have a majority of ministers. Elders are not members of the higher courts by right but are added to ministers "to take away all occasion of tyranny." (*Second Book of Discipline, the Book of Forms*, p.3.) One elder is nominated by each session to represent it for a time in Presbytery and is so appointed by Presbytery. It is not fitting that a non-permanent member should take precedence over permanent members.

3. Elders have a parity of voting power with ministers in the higher courts but not a parity of office. Ordination is deliberately "discriminating," for the ministers are ordained to the ministry of the Word and Sacraments and to rule, but elders are ordained only to rule. It is unfitting that they should preside over ministers.

4. It does not help to argue that, since presiding in a court is an activity of ruling, the ruling elder is competent to preside. The word *ruling* is not definitive enough and its use for the elder does not qualify him for every kind of ruling. There are *ruling* functions of a moderator that an elder has no authority to perform besides those already named (preaching, sacraments). Ordaining is a good example of ministerial ruling because it means instituting ministers and elders in their respective orders. Ruling on the meaning of Scripture – the prime function of the "teaching elder," for bishops have always been the trustees of doctrine – and ruling in the conduct of worship, as well as ruling in baptism (which is instituting members in their due order in the Body of Christ) are all examples of ruling that an elder cannot exercise. Since the moderator of a higher court will at times have to exercise most of these functions, they help to reveal the nature of the office that a moderator must be expected to fulfill – and, indeed, the nature of the kind of court over which he is called to preside. It is not becoming that an elder should preside over such a court. The members of a court are to rule "every one according to his function," says *The Book of Forms* (*ibid.*). It is not the function of an elder to preside.

The Presbyterian doctrine of the eldership has been muddled not a little by the use made by the Scots commissioners at the Westminster Assembly of Calvin's interpretation of 1 Timothy 5:17: "Let the elders that rule well be counted worthy of double honour, especially they who labour in the word and doctrine" (to use the translation most familiar to the Divines. What Paul actually said was *pay*, not *honour*). In the *Institutes*, Calvin understands the word *presbyter* to mean minister or bishop, in accordance with the view that we have already referred to above. Unfortunately in his commentary on the Timothy verse he takes the word *presbyters* to cover two classes, rulers and preachers. This comment appears, at least in part, to be the origin of what is known as the "presbyter" view of the elder, which has led some Presbyterians to uphold a parity of ministers and elders, although the

text discriminates them in "honour." The Westminster Divines rejected this interpretation, although it persisted with many in Scotland. The Divines maintained the "lay" view of the eldership, for 1 Timothy 5:17 is susceptible of a number of different interpretations. For example, ruling could mean presiding at baptisms or Holy Communion, and in that case *presbyter* would have its normal equivalence with *bishop*. In our opinion, the Westminster Divines were the better exegetes at this point. As well as clearing up Calvin's divagation, they maintained our adherence to the constant teaching of the Church Catholic that *presbyter* means minister. We should not follow sectarian Presbyterians in departing from this rule.

When it came to gifts of government, the Divines called those endowed in this way "Other Church Governors" (see *The Form of Presbyterian Church Government*), "Which officers reformed churches commonly call Elders." They meant that it cannot be said that Scripture so calls them, and they refused to call them presbyters. The word that Calvin uses in the *Institutes* is *seniors*.

The Committee recommends that the prayer of the Overture be not granted.

See Recommendation 2.

### C. Overture 9, 1977, Presbytery of Cape Breton, re Deposition from the Ministry

The Presbytery of Cape Breton will be asking the 103rd General Assembly to consider an Overture calling for this Assembly "to have (the above) matter again submitted to Presbyteries for study and to report their views on the 'Meaning of Deposition' to the Assembly through the Committee on Church Doctrine, with the possibility of this issue being again debated in Assembly. . ."

The Presbytery requests a reconsideration of our Statement on Deposition for several reasons.

The Presbytery first of all cautions the Church against such a stringent exercise of ecclesiastical discipline, quoting in support the W.C.F. XXXI, IV: "All Synods or Councils since the Apostles' time, whether general or particular, may err, and many have erred; therefore they are not to be made the rule of faith or practice but used as an help to both." In reply, we respectfully remind the Presbytery that the preceding paragraph of the same section in the Westminster Confession of Faith reads that "the decrees and determinations (of synods and councils), if consonant to the word of God, are to be received with reverence and submission, not only for their agreement with the word, but also for the power whereby they are made, as being an ordinance of God, appointed thereunto in his word." Not only does this paragraph empower the courts of our Church to execute judgments, even against an ordained Minister, but it requires that Minister to receive these judgments in a spirit of reverence and repentance. The Church may indeed err in making judgments but this does not excuse it from the responsibility of making judgments.

The Presbytery also suggests that we have by our Statement on Deposition breached "our law and our custom to submit matters of importance to the Presbyteries under the Barrier Act, specifically matters of government, worship, doctrine and discipline." In response, we respectfully submit that our Statement on Deposition was never seen as a new law or even as a change in the law of our Church but rather as an explanation of our present law; there was no need, therefore, to submit it to Presbyteries under the Barrier Act.

Regarding the argument that "the Statement on Deposition involves a transfer of responsibility to deal with an individual to a Court outside our own," we simply state that we expect other branches of Christ's Church to honour our acts of discipline just as we do theirs. Moreover, if a "deposed" minister applies for admission into another denomination's ministry and they accept his application, we have not transferred the responsibility of dealing with his offence to them; they have freely accepted it for themselves.

The Presbytery contests our view of the finality of Deposition arguing that "differences in doctrine and law exist among the several denominations of Christians which would account for the proper dismissal of an individual from the ministry of one denomination and the proper acceptance of that individual into another denomination." In reply, we would simply voice our hope that any Presbytery or higher Court having to deal with a minister whose doctrinal position is at

variance with that of our Church would counsel him to seek admission into the ministry of another denomination whose doctrine and disciplines are more compatible with his own views rather than risk deposition; it would only be, therefore, upon his rejecting this counsel and his being determined to follow a divisive course within our Church that the Court would be forced to exercise its disciplinary power. Ministers of our Church are not deposed except for major causes such as a persistently divisive attitude in the face of duly appointed authority or heresy or for acts of immorality which, we assume, would disqualify a person from being a minister in any Christian denomination.

Finally, the Presbytery of Cape Breton says that the Statement on Deposition "implicitly contains a view of the nature of the unity of the Church which The Presbyterian Church in Canada has not yet adopted and which thereby creates a logical pressure upon our Church finally to adopt that view." Both our Church and the Westminster Confession of Faith hold that there is only one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church of which we and all others who call upon the name of the Lord Jesus are a part, for our essential unity is founded in God and Christ. In the words of the Confession, Chapters XXV and XXVI: "The catholic or universal church, which is invisible, consists of the whole number of the elect that have been, are, or shall be gathered into one, under Christ the head thereof; and is the spouse, the body, the fulness of him that filleth all in all. The visible church, which is also catholic or universal under the gospel. . . consists of all these throughout the world that profess the true religion, together with their children; and is the kingdom of the Lord Jesus Christ, the house and family of God. . . All saints that are united to Jesus Christ their head by His Spirit, and by faith, have fellowship with him in his graces, sufferings, death, resurrection, and glory. And being united to one another in love, they have communion in each other's gifts and graces; and are obliged to the performance of such duties, publick and private, as do conduce to their mutual good, both in the inward and outward man. Saints, by profession, are bound to maintain a holy fellowship and communion in the worship of God, and in performing such other spiritual services as tend to their mutual edification; as also in relieving each other in outward things, according to their several abilities and necessities. Which communion, as God offereth opportunity, is to be extended unto all those who in every place call upon the name of the Lord Jesus." It is because we believe in this oneness of the Church of God that we also hold that a person deposed from the ministry of any branch thereof is deposed from the ministry of all.

The Committee recommends that the prayer of the Overture be not granted.

See Recommendation 3.

## II. THE COVENANT OF GRACE

By a motion of the 102nd General Assembly the Committee on Church Doctrine was instructed "to study the various liturgies and recent developments concerning children and Holy Communion" and to report to the present Assembly. As part of its report the Committee would like to point out that it has been actively involved for some time in ongoing study of the subject of reception into communicant membership. Its labours have resulted in three reports to the General Assembly (*Acts and Proceedings*, 1967, pp. 275-279, 1971, pp. 272-278, 1972, pp. 337-341) in which the question of children and Holy Communion was treated extensively. Those reports were written in the light of recent developments in sister churches and those developments were weighed by the Committee in its deliberations.

Essentially the various churches can be separated into three categories on the matter of children and Communion: 1) Those churches, such as the Eastern Orthodox and the Roman Catholic, which have traditionally permitted baptized children to participate in Holy Communion at a young age; 2) those which have maintained that participation in the Lord's Supper represents a later stage in the process of Christian initiation and maturity which follows the order of baptism, confirmation, communion; and 3) those which have recently altered that order to permit the participation of children at a young age and before a formal confession of faith.

The Eastern Orthodox Church has always maintained the practice of administering token communion at infant baptism. Following what is considered the

*traditio apostolica*, the Eastern Orthodox baptismal ceremony combines baptismal immersion, anointing and laying on of hands or *confirmatio*, the last stressing the gift of the Holy Spirit. Thereafter the baptized may participate in the Eucharist without the necessity of a profession of faith or "confirmation" of baptismal vows. In the Roman Catholic Church the child participates in the Eucharist prior to confirmation and without a profession of faith. First communion usually takes place at the age of seven; confirmation follows somewhat later, commonly at the age of thirteen. Since Vatican II the question of the age of confirmation and its relationship to the Eucharist has come under much discussion, but with no definite results.

A majority of the Protestant churches continue the policy stemming from the Reformation of requiring instruction and a confirmation of baptismal vows before admission to the Lord's Supper. This is the practice in the Church of Scotland, in most of the Methodist Churches, the United Church, the Reformed Churches, the Presbyterian Church in the United States, the Lutheran (Missouri Synod) and the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada, although there is some move in the last to admit children to the Lord's Table earlier. Baptists and other churches that practice believer's baptism lay so heavy an emphasis on personal decision that baptism becomes an affirmation of faith and not a sacrament; baptism admits to the Lord's Supper, which is conceived of as remembering the Lord. With only a few exceptions, the Protestant churches hold that while baptized infants are members of the church, they do not partake of full membership with all its privileges and responsibilities until after confirmation; and that admission to the Lord's Table must be preceded by instruction, some form of confession of faith and commitment.

There has been a trend, evidenced by the recent action of a number of churches, to admit young baptized children to Communion without confirmation and prior to a formal profession of faith. The United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. permits local sessions to grant this privilege upon petition of the child's parents; while the Anglican Church of Canada, which has customarily invited children to come to the altar rail for a blessing at the Eucharistic service, now admits them to Holy Communion before confirmation at the discretion of the bishop. In the Lutheran Church in America congregations may admit children above grade five to the Lord's Supper, but only after instruction and some sort of confession of faith. A report by the Archbishop's Commission on Christian Doctrine of the Church of England, published in 1971 (*Christian Initiation: Birth and Growth in the Christian Society*), recommended that discretion be given the parish priest to admit baptized Christians to Communion after some preparation "without using confirmation as some kind of preliminary or education qualification;" but what sort of preparation and the extent to which this has resulted in the admission of young children to the Lord's Supper is not clear. This recommendation is predicted upon a view of confirmation which sees it as commitment to ministry and mission in the world rather than as covenantal fulfillment or a stage in the process of Christian initiation.

In so far as liturgy at Confirmation is concerned, the Committee is not aware of any recent developments. The Anglican Church of Canada recommended that wherever possible the bishop preside at the child's first communion, but apparently none of the churches has devised a particular liturgy for the event.

The argument in favour of early communion for children encompasses psychological, sociological and even pastoral factors as well as theological or scriptural considerations. The Committee on Church Doctrine has dealt with the issue solely on theological grounds, and in its two major reports on the reception into communicant membership (1971 and 1972) it considered the matter of children at Communion primarily in the context of the covenant of grace and Christian nurture within that covenant. The Committee recommended that the Presbyterian Church continue its present policy of requiring a profession of faith in Christ and reception into full communion before admission to the privileges of the Table; but it also suggested that local Sessions admit children into communicant membership "at an earlier age than is customarily the case." To facilitate this it proposed that a distinction be made between the spiritual duties and privileges of communicant membership, including participation in the Lord's Supper, which might come at an early age, and the heavier responsibilities of membership, which would be delayed

until the age of legal majority; this proposal, however, was rejected by Presbyteries.

While the Committee has maintained that reception of the sacrament of the Lord's Supper presupposes a living faith in him, it nevertheless recognizes that there are scriptural arguments and liturgical precedents for inviting young children to the Table prior to a mature confession of faith. We are told that Jesus rebuked his disciples when they tried to prevent infants and children from coming to him (Luke 18:15-17) and scripture indicates that the "bread of life" is meant for children as well, for children were present at the sacramental miracle of the feeding of the multitude (Matt. 14:21). Children were also present at the Passover of which the Lord's Supper is the fulfillment. There certainly is no precedent in the early church for making confirmation a prerequisite for participation at the Lord's Table. This was an innovation of the Protestant Reformers who, in reaction against the superstition that was rife in their day, overintellectualized the necessary qualifications for Christian initiation and insisted on strict catechetical examination before admission to the Lord's Table. The present practice of many churches of requiring confirmation prior to first communion originates in this examination. Is such practice scriptural? Does the theology of confirmation imply that in a certain sense baptism is incomplete unless it is confirmed? Scripture refers to baptism as the only sacrament of admission into Christ's Church. "For as many as have been baptized into Christ, have put on Christ" (Gal. 3:27), and our own Confession of Faith states that children of Christian parents, as heirs of the covenant, are born into membership in the church (XXV,2). Is the baptized infant fully a Christian or only a partial Christian? Does the necessity for a given degree of covenantal fulfillment prior to admission to the Table derogate from the uniqueness of baptism as an objective sacrament of initiation?

The Reformed tradition has required that a person possess a reasoned faith before participating at the Table. He must have "knowledge to discern the Lord's body" and "faith to feed upon Him" (*Shorter Catechism*, Q.97); also required of him is repentance, a "new obedience" and a life in outward conformity with his beliefs (*Confession of Faith*, XXIX,8). But what constitutes meaningful discernment? Adult Christians differ widely in the rational understanding of their faith and some never achieve more than a childlike awareness. Are these to be denied the spiritual benefits of the Lord's Supper? Are young children capable of their own way and within their own spiritual comprehension of partaking of the grace held out to all who come to the Table? Those who oppose the admission of young children at communion argue that the grace in the sacrament is not conveyed merely through receiving and consuming, but through entering into the whole meaning of the sacraments and that the young child is incapable of doing this.

While the Committee assumes that the present practice of our Church falls within the body of Reformed teachings, teachings which emphasize both worthiness and discernment in the reception of the Lord's Supper (see Calvin, *Institutes*, IV, 17:39-42; I Cor. 11:23-34), it is not aware what precisely are the practices in individual congregations. The Book of Forms (section 110a) gives no specific guidance in this matter as it leaves much to the individual Session and appears to tie participation to admission to Church membership. The Committee will therefore seek permission from the General Assembly to ask ministers and Sessions who now admit children at an early age to report their experiences in communion and confirmation practices to the Committee. It also recommends that the present report be submitted to Presbyteries for study without asking for replies. It is not the purpose of this report to deal conclusively with the subject of children at Communion, but it is hoped that it might prove useful in outlining some of the major theological problems in what is expected to be continuing dialogue on the issue.

The Committee on Church Doctrine believes that future discussion of the subject might profitably be focused on the significance of the Lord's Supper itself. Much of the controversy on the issue of children at Communion can be traced to uncertainty about the relationship of the various aspects of this sacrament. The Lord's Supper is an act of remembrance in which Christ exhibits himself as mediator and saviour; it is a seal of the benefits of His sacrifice; it is a source of spiritual nourishment in which we feast on the bread of life; it is an expression of God's grace and a means of nurturing and strengthening faith, of growing in Christ; it is an act of penitence and a confession of faith; it is an engagement or commitment, a

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bond and pledge of communion with him, as well as a communal binding "as members of His mystical body;" and, not the least, it is an act of worship (Wotherpoon and Kirkpatrick, *A Manual of Church Doctrine*, pp. 53-54; *Confession of Faith*, XXIX,1). Are these elements of the sacrament so inextricably intertwined that they lose their efficacy when approached separately? To what extent are the sacramental forms objective and capable of being appropriated by someone who comes to the Lord's Table with less than a mature faith? If a child is able to express some form of childlike faith in Christ, is it right to exclude him from the grace and nurture contained in the sacrament and from the opportunity of participating in this unique form of worship? What are the grounds for such exclusion? The Committee is of the opinion that there is a reasonably coherent argument for the admission of young children to Communion, and it is its hope that our Church will address itself to the kinds of questions outlined above before formulating a definitive statement on the issue.

We recommend that this report be submitted to Presbyteries and Sessions for study and that we be given permission to circularise ministers and Sessions as mentioned.

See Recommendation 4.

### III. THE PROPOSED DIACONATE

The following report has been prepared in response to the instruction of the One hundred and Second General Assembly, 1976, that "the Committee on Church Doctrine be instructed to study this matter further with a view to remitting an amended version under the Barrier Act at a subsequent Assembly" (A & P, 1976, p.55). We plan to present an amended version to the 1978 Assembly, including revised legislation.

The purpose of this study is to clarify issues and answer questions raised by Presbyteries. Many of the questions have already been answered in two prior statements (A & P, 1974, pp.400-405, and A & P, 1975, pp.381-384). The present report deals mainly with questions concerning the function of a deacon and his or her relation to the church courts.

#### A. Preamble

We would begin by affirming that we are a reformed church and "semper reformanda"; and secondly that there is no higher office in the church than that of the ministry of Word and Sacrament, for it is through the grace of hearing the Word and receiving the Sacraments that Christ rules his church. In instituting a contemporary form of the diaconate within the life of the church we are simply recognizing the fact that God calls some of his people, through the preaching of the Word, to a vocation within the service of the church that is not the vocation of Word and Sacrament. "A deacon is one who is called of God to the service of Jesus Christ and His Church and has been trained and ordained to the office of deacon in conformity with the doctrines and discipline of The Presbyterian Church in Canada" (A & P, 1974, p. 401, V.A.).

Although there is an office of deacon in the New Testament which is referred to in the Proposed Diaconate (A & P, 1974, p. 400), it is not the intention that the proposed diaconate stand in direct succession to that rather unclear New Testament office, but that the diaconate be a contemporary order to meet the present needs of the church. We seek not a structural continuity but a continuity of intent. The parallel lies in the fact that the church institutes an order to meet the developing needs of the church (Acts 6:6). We believe that we have a biblical and historical basis for proposing a contemporary diaconate (A & P, 1974, pp. 400f. II: The Biblical Basis and III: A Historical Statement).

#### B. Function of a Deacon

One of the questions raised by Presbyteries concerned the function of a deacon in the new order. We would repeat "that the function of a deacon is to exercise a ministry in education (Mission), counselling social work...to awaken the conscience of the whole church to what needs to be done in these areas and to involve and equip others in the doing of it" (A & P, 1974, p. 402). The future of the

diaconate will depend on the wisdom of the church in response to the preaching of the Word and to the leading of the Spirit, and will be shaped by those who come forward to serve in its ranks. However, it is the accepted rule of our church that persons who preach must be licensed to do so and that the administration of the sacraments is restricted to ministers of the Word and Sacrament. It would, therefore, not be the function of a deacon to preach or administer the sacraments, but, it may be appropriate that a deacon in a congregation assist in its worship.

#### C. Spheres of Work

The spheres of work of a deacon may be:

- (a) in a congregation or cluster of congregations,
- (b) under an appointment within the jurisdiction of the church (e.g. regional or national),
- (c) under the authorization of a higher court of the church, to an institution or area of work not under the direct jurisdiction of the church.

By virtue of a call to the diaconal ministry, a period of educational preparation (A & P 1975, p. 385, B) and the church's recognition of appropriate gifts, a deacon is therefore an ordained servant of the church who shares in the professional leadership of the Christian community.

#### D. Steps to Ordination

Several other points relating to a deacon's work and office were covered in the 1974 and 1975 proposals and we ask that the Presbyteries re-read these documents carefully.

*Ordination:* A & P, 1974, pp. 401 (IV) and 404 (VII). Ordination will be for life but in the case of a call to a specific work, e.g., an overseas mission appointment, the terms of the call may vary according to circumstances.

*Candidature:* A & P, 1974, pp. 401 (C) and A & P, 1975, p. 384 (A).

*Training:* A & P, 1974, pp. 402f. (D) and A & P, 1975, p. 385 (B).

Deacons from outside The Presbyterian Church in Canada will be evaluated by the Board of Education (or other Board so empowered) as are ordained ministers from other communions.

*Relation of Ordained Deacons and Deacons' Court:* A & P, 1975, p. 382 (C).

*The Call:* A & P, 1975, p. 383 (m).

It is the view of the Committee that with the exception of the method of processing a call it is difficult to legislate the terms of appointment in any local situation and that we must leave the details to the wisdom of the Presbytery involved in consultation with the congregation(s), organization or board issuing the call.

Minor revisions suggested by Presbyteries in some of these statements will be taken into account when the proposal and accompanying legislation are prepared to go down under the Barrier Act again.

#### E. Relation of the Deacon to the Church Courts

Another area of concern among Presbyteries was the relation of the ordained deacon to the church courts.

Every ordained deacon called and installed in a congregation will be a member of the Presbytery within whose bounds the congregation lies. In respect of national and regional appointments, the deacon will be a member of the Presbytery in which he or she resides or in which he or she mostly works. Deacons will not be eligible to moderate the Court.

In addition to membership in Presbytery, every ordained deacon called and installed in a congregation will be a voting member of the Kirk Session of that congregation but may not serve as representative elder, or moderate the Session.

An ordained Deacon who is not called and installed in a congregation is eligible for election as a ruling elder in the congregation he or she regularly attends without further ordination.

When a deacon retires or leaves the full time employment of the church, his or her name will normally be placed on an appendix to the roll of Presbytery.

The order of Deacons will be a third order in the church courts without either equalizing ministers or equalizing elders.

Ordained deacons will be commissioners to the General Assembly in the same ratio as ministers, that is one in six, and will be selected according to seniority on a rotational basis by the Clerks of Assembly from deacons on the constituent rolls of Presbyteries. The Clerks will inform the Presbyteries of their right to send these additional commissioner(s) to the Assembly.

Deacons will be entitled to the care and concern of the Presbytery and will be subject to the discipline of the court in the performance of their ministry. Deacons working in a congregation will work under the direction of the minister.

We recommend that this report and previous reports to which it refers be sent down to Synods, Presbyteries, Sessions, Boards and Colleges for study and comment by January 31, 1978 to the Secretary of the Committee, with a view to amended legislation going down under the Barrier Act from the 104th General Assembly.

See Recommendation 5.

#### IV. THE WORK OF THE HOLY SPIRIT

The 102nd General Assembly authorized the Committee on Church Doctrine "to prepare a booklet containing comprehensive material and counsel regarding Neo-Pentecostalism and suitable for study by the whole membership of the Church."

The Committee has undertaken the preparation of this booklet. We have been hampered somewhat by circumstances such as illness. It is hoped, however, that the text can be finalized by the end of this year and that the booklet will become available for distribution early in 1978.

#### V. A STATEMENT OF FAITH

A joint committee composed of members of our Committee and representatives of the Committee on Inter-Church Relations has continued its work, and hopes to make better progress by holding a retreat for more intensive study.

#### VI. TRANSCENDENTAL MEDITATION

Under instruction of the 102nd General Assembly, the Committee has initiated a study of Transcendental Meditation under a strong sub-committee convened by the Rev. F. W. Metzger in Vancouver. We shall report its work in due course.

#### VII. OVERTURE 5, 1976, THE PRESBYTERY OF BRUCE-MAITLAND RE "CALL OF A CONGREGATION"

This Overture was in the first place put in the hands of the Committee on Church Doctrine (*Acts and Proceedings*, 1976, p.62) and later its prayer was granted for the appointment of a special committee. The Committee on Church Doctrine decided to take no separate action.

#### VIII. ONE BAPTISM, ONE EUCHARIST AND A MUTUALLY RECOGNISED MINISTRY

A booklet having the above title has been prepared by the Faith and Order Commission of the World Council of Churches. It sets forth a broad consensus of the member Churches of the Council represented on the Commission. Responses were invited from all the Churches. On behalf of the Committee two members wrote responses of a personal, representative but non-authoritative kind. The Secretary of the Commission, Dr. Lukas Vischer, acknowledged them with thanks and said that they would soon be considered along with other responses.

#### IX. THE VALUE OF HUMAN LIFE

The Committee received a communication from the Clerk of the Presbytery of Calgary-Macleod reporting a motion carried in the Presbytery, "That the Commit-

tee on Church Doctrine prepare a biblical and theological statement on the value of human life including the life of the foetus."

It is not for our Committee to initiate studies without authorisation by Assembly. But we are in sympathy with the request, and indeed have made tentative statements on this and similar issues previously. Moreover, the Board of Congregational Life has already been providing material within the scope of the subject named for consideration of Presbyteries. Since the advance of the biological sciences is bringing very pressing ethical questions to the fore, we believe that the Church should be informing itself and continuously shaping its attitudes and those of society in general. In consultation with the Board of Congregational Life we ask this Assembly for permission to undertake all necessary studies within the general area named by the Presbytery and to authorise the Board of Congregational Life to name two representatives to participate in the study, with a view to reporting to later Assemblies.

See Recommendation 6.

#### X. CHAIRMANSHIP OF THE COMMITTEE

The present chairman having expressed a desire to be relieved of this duty, we ask that the Assembly appoint as Chairman the Reverend Professor Iain G. Nicol of Knox College.

Recommendation 7.

RECOMMENDATION 1. C

*That a regulation be enacted under the Barrier Act providing for term induction of assistant ministers.*

RECOMMENDATION 2. A

*That the prayer of Overture 6, 1976, of the Presbytery of Vancouver Island re THE OFFICE OF MODERATOR be not granted.*

*That the prayer of Overture 9, 1977, of the Presbytery of Cape Breton that the decision of the 102nd General Assembly on the Meaning of Deposition be reconsidered be not granted.*

*That the report on THE COVENANT OF GRACE: THE COMMUNICATION OF CHILDREN be commended for study to Presbyteries and Sessions, and that the Committee be authorised to seek reports of their experience from Ministers and Sessions who admit children to the Lord's Table at an early age.*

*That the report on the PROPOSED DIACONATE and the reports to which it refers be sent down to Synods, Presbyteries, Sessions, Boards and Colleges for study and comment by January 31, 1978, to the Secretary of the Committee on Church Doctrine, Knox College, with a view to amended legislation going down under the Barrier Act from the 104th General Assembly.*

RECOMMENDATION 6. C

*That the Committee on Church Doctrine, with the assistance of two representatives from the Board of Congregational Life, be authorised to formulate Christian principles regarding the value of human life and of the human foetus and regarding a legitimate pursuit of biological science and engineering.*

RECOMMENDATION 7. C

*That the Reverend Professor Iain G. Nicol be named Chairman of the Committee on Church Doctrine.*

## THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH WORSHIP

*To the Venerable, the 103rd General Assembly:*

Again this year, the Committee on Church Worship is encouraged by a continuing growth in interest in the worship of our church. The Committee has received many replies to *Worship Workbench* sent out last fall with the Board of Congregational Life mailing: this indicates a readiness on the part of the church to participate in developments in worship.

*The Book of Common Order*

The Book of Common Order (1964) has been of great concern to the Committee during the past few years, (note the summary in the Acts and Proceedings, 1975, pp. 274-275). The Book of Common Order is now out of print. The Committee feels that it would not be in order to attempt a full-scale revision at the present time (note Acts and Proceedings, 1976, pp. 264-265). What is facing us, though, is the need for worship resources in two areas: firstly, the basic services of the church, and secondly, services in more modern style and language usage. Therefore we are proposing that:

- 1) As a response to the additional recommendation made to the report of the Committee (Acts and Proceedings, 1976, p. 40) we will continue to circulate samples of revised services of worship, asking for comment, under the title *Worship Workbench*. We also will continue to request ministers and congregations who have developed worship services to share them with us. (Recommendation 3).
- 2) We are recommending that an "abridged edition" of the Book of Common Order be printed containing the essential services necessary for ministers and including the changes made by General Assemblies since 1964. This new Book of Common Order would include the following services:

The Order of Word and Sacrament  
 Baptism of Infants  
 Baptism and Admission of Adults  
 Confirmation of those Baptized in Infancy  
 Confirmation Including Baptism  
 Reception of Members from Other Churches  
 Preparation for Holy Communion  
 The Lord's Supper or Holy Communion  
 Holy Communion with the Sick  
 Solemnization of Marriage  
 Blessing of a Civil Marriage  
 Burial of the Dead  
 Ordination and Admission of Elders  
 Dedication of Church Workers  
 Dedication of Memorials and Gifts  
 Orders for Presbytery:  
 Licensing of Candidates  
 Ordination and Induction of a Minister  
 Induction of a Minister  
 Designation of a Missionary or Church Official  
 Designation of a Deaconess  
 Designation of a Catechist  
 Dedication of a Church  
 Dedication of a Christian Education Building

It is hoped that a less costly form of printing and binding could be used for this edition of the Book of Common Order. (Recommendation 2).

*Relationship With The Board of Congregational Life*

As a result of an additional recommendation made to the report of the Committee on Church Worship at the 102nd General Assembly (Acts and Proceedings, 1976, p. 40), a Task Force has been established with members of both the Committee and the Board of Congregational Life. This Task Force has been meeting and has sent a recommendation to both the Committee and to the Board for consideration. (Recommendation 4).

*Christian Native Worship*

As a result of a motion made by Rev. Stephen How at the 102nd General Assembly (Acts and Proceedings, 1976, p. 78, part 4) the Committee has been studying the topic of "Christian Native Worship". This study is continuing, but a number of considerations can be given at this time. Although there is a great variation in types of native North American practices of worship, specifically *Christian* native worship has a similarity everywhere — after all, all Christian worship centres on the person and being of Jesus Christ. "The Indians of Canada" writes Rev. Rex Krepps, "worship the Almighty God in much the same way as anyone else."

Consideration must be made, however, to the social and cultural aspects of Native North American life. In a study paper prepared for the Board of World Mission, Giollo Kelly states that, "if we are to preach the Christian Gospel effectively to the native peoples, we must be aware of their culture, so that the Gospel can be interpreted in terms of that culture." For instance, the native North American holds a *spiritual* understanding of nature which forms an integral part of native practices of worship, and views the earth as a "mother". Just as it would be unthinkable to murder your mother, it is equally abhorrent to desecrate the earth. Rex Krepps writes that Indians "long ago were objecting to the white man's wholesale destruction of the birds of the air (poisons from fields) and beasts of the field (slaughter)." Perhaps we can come to grips with the Biblical injunction of stewardship of the earth by entering into a dialogue with the native people on this spiritual understanding of the earth.

There is an element within the native population that is struggling to recover their native culture and society. Part of this struggle is a reaction against the culture of Western Europe they feel was inflicted upon them. And, it should be noted, part of this reaction is a reaction against Christianity and a turning again to native practices of worship. This could pose increasing problems in the future for specifically *Christian* native worship.

### RECOMMENDATION 1. A

*That a budget of \$1500 be authorized for the Committee on Church Worship.*

### RECOMMENDATION 2. C

*That an "abridged edition" of the Book of Common Order be printed.*

### RECOMMENDATION 3. A

*That the Committee on Church Worship continue to send out revised orders of worship under the title "Worship Workbench" and urge ministers and congregations to send copies of services of worship that they have developed to the Convenor.*

### RECOMMENDATION 4. A

*That the Committee on Church Worship continue discussions with the Board of Congregational Life regarding the relationship of these two bodies.*

## REPORT OF THE CLERKS OF ASSEMBLY RE: COMMITTEE ON CHURCH DOCTRINE, RECOMMENDATION 7 (b) and (c) A&P 1976, Pages 396-397

*To the Venerable the 103rd General Assembly:*

Pursuant to instructions of the 102nd General Assembly A & P, 1976, Committee on Church Doctrine, Re: Recommendation 7 (b) and (c) pages 396-397, the Clerks report as follows:

A. Recommendation (b) reads, "That for those seeking release from ordination vows the name 'dismissory letter' be changed to 'letter of demission from office', and that the clerks supply for the appendices a suitable form of such a letter;"

This recommendation (b) may be met under "Regulations", and passed by Assembly. It does not require a reference under the Barrier Act. Our recommendation 1, herein, covers the following draft for Appendices.

"36. (A). *Letter for Demission from Office for a Minister or Licentiate.*

This certifies that Dr. (or Mr., Mrs. or Miss) \_\_\_\_\_ was ordained as a Minister (or licensed to preach the Gospel) by the Presbytery of \_\_\_\_\_ in The Presbyterian Church in Canada, on the \_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_ 19\_\_\_\_, and he (or she) has of this date, at his (or her) own request, been granted demission from office in the Christian Church (i.e., in The Holy Catholic Church) or by the action of the Court been demitted from office in the Christian Church (i.e., The Holy Catholic Church).

Given this \_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_ in the year 19\_\_\_\_, by order of Presbytery. \_\_\_\_\_ Presbytery Clerk.  
(Place.)

B. Recommendation (c) reads, "That as regards ministers transferring to the ministry of a church with which we do not at present have mutual eligibility of ministry the term to be used be 'letter of standing', and that the present letter in the appendices be so named." To carry out this recommendation, Section 251, Book of Forms, will require a change of the phrase therein 'dismissory letter', in the three places, to a 'letter of standing'. This change, in our opinion, is of sufficient moment to require a reference under the Barrier Act. This change, which is so evident to be the mind of assemblies 1975 and 1976, may be an Interim Act of this year, and is covered in our recommendations closing this Report.

This, if approved by this assembly in the terms of our recommendations, becomes a letter of standing and not a dismissory letter, and there may be ambiguity as to its meaning. It could be used as an introduction for travel purposes, rather than a basis of reception into another denomination, which, we believe, will be its ordinary use. The Clerks believe therefore, for clarity, that the form I:36 should have an addition to make clear that the holder of it, while at its date, was a Minister in good standing, is no longer a Minister of The Presbyterian Church in Canada. Therefore, the following is presented (in full form) for approval under Regulations, and is covered by our recommendations closing this Report.

"36. *Letter of Standing for a Minister or a Licentiate.*

#### REPORT OF THE CLERKS OF ASSEMBLY RE: OVERTURE NO. 6, 1977, PRESBYTERY OF HAMILTON, RE: PREPARATION OF "A DIGEST" OF THE ACTIONS OF EACH ASSEMBLY

*To the Venerable the 103rd General Assembly:*

In answer to an Overture sent to the 101st General Assembly the Clerks recommended a new method of distribution of the Assembly Minutes so that one copy would go to each minister on the Constituent Roll; a copy for each Session Clerk; a copy for each Representative Elder; and a copy to each Church Treasurer. In addition to these it was agreed that the Acts and Proceedings would be made available to any person ordering it through the congregation at a nominal cost. The Statistical Report Form of 1976 was designed that these orders could be received, and approximately 700 additional copies of Acts and Proceedings were distributed. This may seem like a very large number, but in reality it does not amount to one copy of Acts and Proceedings per congregation on the average.

Inasmuch as Overture #6 deals with the problem of Communication, the Clerks of Assembly would agree that there is sometimes a problem in communicating from General Assembly through to the Sessions of the Church. Perhaps in time the Sessions will advertise the availability of the extra copies of Acts and Proceedings more, and thereby more people in the congregation will be able to order it if they so desire. Many persons in congregations have indicated they did not know the book was available last year.

Suggestions one and two in the Overture really deal with the matters which should be considered by Synods and Presbyteries. The Clerks of Assembly consider it a doubtful procedure for the Assembly to formulate guidelines for Synods and Presbyteries to use in the distribution of their Minutes. We sometimes get the idea that Synods and Presbyteries are not very happy if the General Assembly attempts to tell them what to do with matters pertaining to their own affairs. If Synods and Presbyteries wish to do what is suggested in numbers one and two of the Overture they have the authority to do it without any action by the Assembly.

We now move to the major suggestion which is contained in Number three of the Overture, the production of a "digest" of Assembly actions. Many experiments along this line have been attempted by our General Assembly and by other General Assemblies. An attempt was made to prepare a digest of reports of Boards and Committees prior to Assembly, and this met with only limited success. We understand that the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland attempted to prepare a digest of their activities some years ago, but this has fallen by the way. At present the Editor of the Record and one member of his staff attend all the sessions of Assembly, and work over the weekend following the Assembly to get their report ready for the issue of The Presbyterian Record. Unless it were agreed to discontinue what they do in The Presbyterian Record, it would be impossible for them to give enough time to prepare the Digest as suggested in number three.

The Clerks of Assembly indicate to you that not only do they work rather hard during the week of Assembly, but the week following the Assembly is occupied going over the Minutes and getting them in shape to go to the Printers. If they were to take time to prepare a Digest, it would mean the Acts and Proceedings would not be available for the September meetings of Presbytery. Therefore the Assembly would have to decide between having the Acts and Proceedings go out at a later date than they now go, or having the Report of the General Assembly as it appears in The Presbyterian Record deleted, or hiring other persons to prepare this Digest. What is requested is not only the action taken on every report presented to the Assembly, but also the recommendations of the report itself. The Clerks of Assembly are somewhat doubtful about the value of the recommendations if they are removed from their preamble, and also consider what is requested to be a rather major job. It would take someone working full-time during Assembly and for two or three weeks after to prepare the Digest. By the time the Digest has been prepared and printed it would no doubt be into July and the Clerks of Assembly have some grave doubts how useful the document will be if it is sent out to the Church during July and August. The Overture suggested that this could be done in the form of a cassette tape. For the 99th and the 100th General Assembly the Communication Services Department did this very thing. All the proceedings of Assembly were recorded, and the Cassette was edited into a one hour production. All the Presbyteries were notified that this was available at a minimum cost, and less than one hundred were purchased! The Communication Services Committee felt that the work involved did not merit such a limited distribution, and the effort was discontinued.

It appears to the Clerks of Assembly that sufficient changes have been made in getting the material of General Assembly out to the public to merit a further experimental period before new regulations are laid down. We would like to hope that Presbyteries, and Sessions, would publicize the availability of the Acts and Proceedings, and we consider that it is more desirable for these to get into the hands of people who want to know what is going on in the Church than a Digest which is much more open to error than the carefully prepared Minutes of Assembly, and the reports of Boards and Committees. The changes introduced in the last two or three years in the recording of the Minutes, and the proposed change that the Clerks of Assembly are making this year indicating on each recommendation what action the Assembly takes should make these publications more intelligible to the public.

#### REPORT OF THE CLERKS OF ASSEMBLY RE: OVERTURE #9, 1976 PRESBYTERY OF LANARK AND RENFREW - RE LAY REPRESENTATIVES AT PRESBYTERY LEVEL FOR COMMUNITY CHURCHES

*To the Venerable the 103rd General Assembly:*

The Presbytery of Lanark and Renfrew overtures that provision be made within the structure of the Church for lay representation from Community Churches to the higher courts of the Church.

Although the Presbytery of Lanark and Renfrew is especially concerned for a Community Church within the bounds of their Presbytery it should be noted that there is an increasing number of such congregations being established in Canada. There are also a number of established congregations who are using the service of one minister in a community to administer the Word and Sacrament in their midst. The practice, which is sometimes called "cognate work", of recognizing ministers of other denominations for pension purposes, has been approved in some instances.

The Clerks of Assembly believe the solution to the problem raised in Overture #9, 1976 would be a profitable study for the participants in our current talks with

the United Church. It is noted that the United Church along with the Baptist Church, is involved in the Community at Deep River. The Clerks of Assembly beg time to obtain the advice of the Consultation on the issues raised in this Overture. The Clerks of Assembly wish to consult with other denominations in order to discover all the possible implications of the problem raised in this Overture.

*That the Clerks of Assembly continue their study for the solution to the problem raised in Overture #9, 1976, and report to the 104th General Assembly.*

The Clerks therefore request that the Memorial be under study, with consultation with the Church Doctrine Committee, and a report be made to the 104th General Assembly.

**REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EWART COLLEGE**

*To the Venerable the 103rd General Assembly:*

**SECTION I: CONCERNS OF THE COLLEGE**

The attention of the Commissioners, and of the Church as a whole, is drawn to the following matters:

**A. Academic Programmes**

Ewart College provides a broad and varied spectrum of educational possibilities for the service of the Church. Developments in these possibilities are taking place as follows:

1. *Regular programmes* The Board of Ewart College was pleased by the large number of capable students entering the first year last September. There is always a need for professionally educated support persons in the Church other than Ministers of the Word and Sacrament. Our 1976-77 first year class, consisting of ten women and one man, indicates the continuing awareness of this need on the part of dedicated young persons. At the time of the preparation of this report for circulation to Commissioners in the Spring, eight applications for the next first year class had been received. Again this number includes both male and female students. We are encouraged by this continued interest in our regular courses and especially in the degree-diploma programme.
2. *Continuing and Lay Education Programmes* The Board is also encouraged by the excellent reception given to our greatly expanded continuing education programmes, both lay and professional. We would draw the attention of both lay and professional people to the availability of bursary assistance through various agencies of the Church to assist persons to attend these continuing education events.
3. *Curriculum study* Ewart College has had a history over the last ten years and more of undertaking serious revisions of its curriculum in the light of changing circumstances. Such a review is once again being undertaken by the Board.
4. *Graduate study* We are again working to establish a Master's programme in Religious Education in co-operation with Knox College, and a joint committee is now actively studying this.

In addition, the Board is introducing a post-graduate programme at the Master's level in close relationship with the Ontario Institute for Studies in Education. Work at O.I.S.E. will be in addition to work at the post-graduate level in Ewart College. The graduate of the programme will hold a Master's

degree in Education from the University of Toronto as well as Ewart's Diploma.

5. *Pre-theological study* In addition to the basic intention (preparation for specialized ministries in the Church) of the College's several programmes, it is also possible for students to see the primary undergraduate degree-diploma programme as a pre-theological course, providing candidates for the Ministry of Word and Sacrament with a thorough grounding in Christian Education and allied subjects while obtaining a Bachelor's degree from the University of Toronto. Such a programme would provide a professional base in education as well as theology for candidates for the Ministry of Word and Sacrament.

**B. Students and Colleges Sunday**

It is the feeling of the Board of Ewart College that much is to be gained by re-instituting an annual Students and Colleges Sunday as a means of focussing the attention of the Church on the role of the Colleges and the need of the Church for candidates for full time professional service. To this end we are pleased to support similar views being proposed by Knox College and Presbyterian College.

**C. Resource Fund**

The Ewart College Resource Fund has now risen to \$14,800. Since Ewart College had no endowments, and since endowments are of vital importance to any academic institution, the 100th General Assembly authorized the establishment of the Ewart College Resource Fund to provide additional support for the work of the College. Many contributions from concerned individuals and groups, such as Church Schools, Ladies' Auxiliaries, W.M.S., and others, have provided the present support for the Fund. The attention of the Church is drawn again to the existence of the Fund.

**D. Appreciation of the Principal**

The Board of the College wishes to draw to the attention of the Church its appreciation of the growing reputation of the Principal of the College, Dr. Margaret Webster, as an authority in certain areas of educational theory. A new textbook for use in Seminaries and Colleges of Christian Education throughout the United States, *Knowing and Helping Youth*, edited by G. T. Sparkman, will contain a chapter by Dr. Webster.

**E. Faculty Salaries**

Last year, the Board of Ewart College drew the attention of the General Assembly to the actions and recommendations of previous Assemblies and special committees, which had consistently recommended that the salaries of faculty at Ewart College ought to be brought up to parity with those paid to the faculties of Knox College and Presbyterian College. A recommendation to this effect was withdrawn in order that explicit discussion on the matter might be undertaken by the Board and the Administrative Council. A Committee of the Board of Ewart College made a proposal to a special Committee of the Administrative Council suggesting a Salary Grid for the faculty of Ewart College related to the basic salaries paid the faculty of our other two Colleges. Because of the Board's strong feeling on this matter, we are recommending that the following salary grid be implemented for Ewart College faculty:

## SECTION II: THE ACADEMIC PROGRAMME

1. *Academic Session 1976-77*

22 students have been enrolled in study programmes during the 1976-77 session. Programmes undertaken by the students were as follows:

Degree Diploma – 14 students; 2 year Diploma programme for University graduates – 3; 3 year Diploma programme – 2; occasional students – 3.

The faculty consisted of Dr. Margaret Webster, Principal and Professor of Christian Education; Miss Ina Adamson, Dean and Director of Field Education; Reverend Irene J. Dickson, Professor of Biblical Studies and Director of Admissions; Reverend Robert C. Mathewson, Associate Professor of Religious Studies and Director of Continuing Education.

The faculty was assisted by the following sessional lecturers: Miss Ada Adams, B.Sc., Christian Education Teaching Methods; Reverend R.F.G. Campbell, M.A., B.D., Ph.D., Effective Oral Communication; Mrs. Carol Kessler, B.F.A., Director of Ewart College choir. In addition five deaconesses and ten ministers have assisted in the development of students by supervising field education and internship placements.

**Continuing and Lay Education** With the addition of another person to the College faculty, continuing and lay education at Ewart took on additional responsibilities and a new shape is emerging in which three distinctive programmes are developing.

*(a) Continuing and Lay Education – June 1976*

Under the leadership of Dr. Sara Little and Mrs. Elizabeth Ramsey, a programme for everyone concerned with christian education in the local Church was held with the theme, "Developing the Congregation's Educational Ministry". From June 11-16, 46 persons participated in plenary sessions on the programme's theme and small groups for Bible Study, as well as electing for seminars on Youth and Adult work or Children's Work. In addition workshops were offered which taught them additional skills.

*(b) Lay Education*1. – *6 Wednesday evenings, October 20 - November 24, 1976*

A new experiment began in providing a short term study for concerned lay persons in the greater Toronto area. Thirteen lay people met to study "Theology as Biography: Varieties of Religious Experience." Drawing on preparatory readings as well as a brief introductory lecture by the Reverend Robert C. Mathewson, the group discussed some of the historic doctrines of the Christian Church and figures in history who helped to shape them so that they could understand their own faith in the context of our Christian heritage.

2. – *6 Wednesday evenings, February 23 - March 30, 1977*

The experiment continued during the spring with 25 people meeting at the College to examine "Prayer and Personal Religion". After a brief introductory presentation by Mr. Mathewson, the group pursued various activities in a workshop atmosphere as they tried to understand the devotional life of the Christian and develop new ways to make their worship life more meaningful.

*(c) Continuing Education Programme – January 25 - February 1, 1977*

Once again through the subsidization of the National Development Fund, a continuing education programme was held for professional church workers. Twenty-five ministers and deaconesses met at Ewart to study "Family Ministries" under the leadership of the Reverend Doctor George Fitzgerald, the Chaplain in the medical Centre in Princeton, and Mr. Henry Regehr, a family counsellor associated with the Institute of Family Living, Toronto. Participants were made aware of the need to develop a theology of the family. They were exposed to seven different types of family servicing groups.

*(d) June 1977. Another Continuing and Lay Education Programme will be held at the College June 10-15, 1977. Miss Helen Tetley and the Reverend Margaret MacNaughton from the Board of Congregational Life and the Reverend Iain Nicol from Knox College will provide the leadership for a programme on "Choosing Educational Resources for YOUR Congregation."*

The Board is grateful for the assistance from the N.D.F. and hopes that ways may be found to continue such opportunities.

3. *Graduation*

The graduation service for the year 1976-77 will be held at Ewart College on May 17, 1977. Dr. J. S. Glen will speak.

## 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following is a summary of significant accounting policies followed by the College.

## (a) Investments and investment income

The Consolidated Investment Portfolio, in which Ewart College has an interest, is held by The Presbyterian Church in Canada and is adjusted to market value each year. Any increase or decrease in market value is allocated to the capital portion of the various scholarship and bursary funds. With the exception of recording consolidated investments at market value, these financial statements have been prepared in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted for non-profit organizations. Other investments are recorded at cost.

Income from investments is recorded on an accrual basis.

Realized gains or losses from investment transactions are recorded on the transaction date.

## (b) Fixed assets

Land and building are capitalized in the books of The Presbyterian Church in Canada and are not included in these accounts. Furnishings and office equipment are expensed in the year acquired.

## (c) Funds

The fund balances are segregated in relation to restrictions placed upon their use by the donor.

The College Board determines the usage of any bequest received for which no specific use is stated by the donor.

## REPORT OF THE BOARD OF KNOX COLLEGE

*To the Venerable the 103rd General Assembly:*

The Board of Knox College begs to submit the 133rd Annual Report.

We would respectfully and firmly direct the attention of the General Assembly and of the Church at large to the important role and the responsibility of the College in the life of our Church. In order to fulfill its role and discharge its responsibility the College needs the support and appreciative understanding of the Church.

The residence has been fully occupied during the academic year. We have in residence an excellent cross section of young people preparing for varied careers in life both in theology and other fields. The Board feels that good rapport exists with the students, residents, faculty and administration and will endeavour to retain and maintain this fortunate situation. During this past academic year the College residence has become co-educational and accommodation was provided for 7 women theologs. The Board considers the venture to be a success and it will be continued and improved.

The Board commends the excellent work done by the Faculty under the leadership of Principal Allan L. Farris. On September 15th, 1976 the installation of The Reverend Professor Allan Leonard Farris as the Eighth Principal of Knox College was held in Convocation Hall of the University of Toronto. The occasion was memorable and inspiring. The address delivered by The Reverend James I. McCord, President, Princeton Theological Seminary. "Our Theological Responsibility" was singularly appropriate and gave meaningful direction to both the College

and the Church. The Principal's response indicated that Knox College would endeavour to meet the challenge and give leadership to our Church.

The 102nd General Assembly approved the appointment of Dr. Stanley David Walters to the faculty of Knox College in the Chair of Old Testament, and a service of induction was held at the College under the auspices of the Presbytery of East Toronto, after which a reception was held in the library to welcome Dr. Walters and his family to the College.

Dr. J. Stanley Glen retires from the Chair of New Testament as of August 31st, 1977, having served the College and the Church in this capacity for 31 years with distinction. We are indebted to Dr. Glen for his faithful and loyal service and the distinguished scholarship he brought to his task. A service in College Chapel followed by a reception in the library was held in honour of Dr. Glen at which the College received a portrait of Dr. Glen painted in oils by Clark Cunningham. The portrait will hang in an appropriate place in the College. The Board gratefully acknowledges the considerable efforts of the Knox College Alumni Association in raising the funds and handling the details of the arrangements in connection with the portrait.

The Board commends the work of the various officers and committees of the Board during the year. The diligent and dedicated work of the Joint Planning Committee of the Board and Senate is again deserving of special mention. This Committee will be discharged this year and it is hoped that the recommendations and information presented by the Committee in their various reports will be beneficially utilized in the years to come.

The Board expresses its appreciation of the loyal and efficient service rendered by the staff employees of the College. The administrative offices, the matron's department, the superintendent, and the library have operated during the transition period with understanding and forbearance.

The Board has endeavoured to keep the expenses of the operation of the College as economical as possible. However in the year 1976 the College again incurred a deficit which amounted to \$54,046. Inflationary pressures continue to escalate the costs of the residence, and regretfully it will be necessary to increase the rates of room and board. However, we will continue to remain competitive with the charges of other residences on the university campus.

It was found necessary to replace worn out equipment in the kitchens of the College. This has been installed and will enable the provision of high standard meals to continue. The new refrigeration equipment will enable more economical purchases of food to be made.

Again it is brought to the attention of General Assembly that the Church must give serious consideration to providing more financial assistance to the College to enable it to fulfill its role.

The Board expresses its grateful appreciation to the donors of gifts received during 1976 to be used for scholarships and bursaries. This is a most important function and we would encourage the giving of such gifts and bequests. The donations received are listed below under items (a), (b) and (c).

## REPORT OF THE SENATE OF KNOX COLLEGE

To the Venerable the 103rd General Assembly:

The Senate of Knox College begs to submit its 133rd Annual Report. Enrolment during the 1976-77 academic year has been most encouraging. First term enrolment numbered 81 students, of which 71 were regularly certified students and 10 were occasional students. Second term enrolment numbered 86 students, of which 72 were regularly certified students and 14 were occasional students. The advanced degree enrolment (Th.M., Th.D., M.A., Ph.D.) for the past academic year was 31. Registration projections based on present applications suggest another record enrolment.

### Personnel Changes

The past academic year has been one of great change. On August 31, 1976, Dr. J. Stanley Glen retired as Principal after 24 years of distinguished service. His successor, Professor Allan L. Farris, was installed as the eighth Principal of Knox College September 15, 1976 at an impressive and well-attended service held in Convocation Hall, University of Toronto. The address of the evening was given by President James I. McCord of Princeton Seminary on the subject, "Our Theological Responsibility".

Professor Stanley D. Walters, formerly Professor and Head of the Department of Religious Studies, Central Michigan University, was inducted by the Presbytery of East Toronto into the Chair of Old Testament Language and Literature on November 17, 1976. His inaugural address was entitled, *Living in a House with History; Biblical Scholarship in the Life of the Church*. Dr. Walters has fulfilled his high recommendations by proving to be an able scholar, and an outstanding teacher.

Dr. Donald C. Smith, formerly minister of St. John's Church, Medicine Hat, took up his responsibilities as Registrar and Director of Field Education August 1, 1976. He has been of great assistance to students in planning their programmes, supervising field education projects, advising students in charges, and helping the Curriculum Committee of the Senate prepare a curriculum design adjusted to meet the needs of the contemporary Church.

Dr. J. Stanley Glen will retire as Professor of New Testament on August 31, 1977 after 31 years of service. At a well-attended gathering in Knox College on March 31, 1977 a portrait painted by the well known artist Clark Cunningham was presented to the College by the Knox College Alumni Association. The Senate here records its deep indebtedness to Dr. Glen for his contribution to the College both as Principal and Professor of New Testament. Our prayer is that he may be granted long years of health and well-being, a period of fruitful activity in which more published material may appear from his pen. The Board of Knox College will be presenting a nomination for a successor to Dr. Glen as Professor of New Testament.

### Lecturers

We are indebted to our sessional lecturers. Christian Education was taught by Principal Margaret Webster, B.A., B.Ed., M.Ed., Ph.D., D.D., of Ewart College; Liturgics by Rev. James A. Thomson, B.A., B.D., Th.M.; Canadian Presbyterian History by Prof. John S. Moir, M.A., Ph.D., D.D., Archivist of the Presbyterian Church in Canada; Church Music by Mr. John Derksen, M.A., B.Mus., A.R.C.T. Rev. Ross Gibson, B.A., M.Div., assisted Prof. J. C. Hay with preaching groups, hearing and criticizing sermons. The Very Reverend David Hay, M.A., D.D., offered an advanced course in Liturgics through Knox College to the Toronto School of Theology.

### College Choir

An exciting feature of our College life this year has been the organization and training of a first class choir. The choir produced a Bach Cantata to mark the beginning of the Lenten season, and later produced a Festival of Psalms with the assistance of a nine-piece string orchestra and four guest soloists. Special choral presentations were held in Burlington and Dundas in the interests of raising bursary funds as well as presenting the work of the College.

### Lectureships

The Laidlaw Lectures were given by Prof. Martin E. Marty of the University of Chicago Divinity School and Associate Editor of *Christian Century*. The Charles MacDonald Memorial Lecture was given by Rev. Louis H. Fowler, M.A., B.D., D.D., on the subject *The Classical Concept of Canon Law*.

### Accreditation

Knox College is fully accredited by the Association of Theological Schools in the United States and Canada. Next year the College will be evaluated for reaccreditation. This will require a year long self study on the part of the Faculty and a visitation by a team of examiners. Admission requirements, academic standards, qualifications of professors, library facilities, college financing, and support structures will all come under review.

### Joint Faculties Meeting

The faculties of Presbyterian College, Ewart College and Knox College met at Knox College for a friendly yet serious review of programmes and educational problems. All present were desirous that the practice of designating one Sunday a year as Student College Sunday be reinstated and that the third Sunday of February be set aside for that purpose.

### Caven Library

During 1976 the work of up-dating the Library was continued. The cataloguing phase of the rare books project was completed. Publication of a bibliography of the rare book collection is the final goal of the project. In 1976 the automated cataloguing system of the University of Toronto Library began functioning and negotiations are now proceeding for Caven Library to participate in this system. The Library is also participating in the comprehensive collecting program of the Toronto School of Theology. In spite of continued improvements, the Library continues to have an unsatisfactory rating from the Association of Theological Schools in the U.S. and Canada because of a book budget considered low for Knox College.

### Preparatory Training

The Senate is concerned about the number of students who enter the College without previous training in one biblical language. We have made provision for teaching Greek and Hebrew along with the first year course, but this makes a very heavy and difficult year. We would urge Presbyteries to strongly advise students to meet the biblical prerequisite by including such in their undergraduate courses or to take it in one of the many institutions which offer summer courses. The Senate would also draw to the attention of all Presbyteries the following recommendations concerning preparatory training: "An Arts student in preparation for Theology should therefore make ample provision in his (her) choice of subjects for English, History, and Philosophy. These may be regarded as a primary triad of subjects. . . He (She) shall also make ample provision for social sciences such as politics, economics, sociology and psychology."

### THE PRESBYTERIAN COLLEGE REPORT OF THE SENATE, 1976-1977

*To the Venerable the 103rd General Assembly:*

The Senate of The Presbyterian College, Montreal, respectfully submits its annual report of the Session 1976-1977.

We give thanks to Almighty God whose Providence has guided us through another year.

This has been a year of continued progress in the activities of the College. Our enrolment continues to grow with thirty-three students registered in the various programmes, including nine in the Professional Year.

Students in their final year take part in a programme of Professional Education, giving them practical training for ministry in their own denomination. This is a co-operative effort on the part of the three Theological Colleges affiliated with McGill University and administered by a Joint Board and Academic Council from the Colleges.

Our association with the Faculty of Religious Studies of McGill University, providing as it does an enlarged curriculum and Faculty, has attracted an increasing number of students of superior ability.

We are ever conscious of the changing situation in which the Church must minister today, and we are endeavouring to meet the challenge of these times by equipping our students with the knowledge to meet the opportunities and problems of today, and also providing our graduates with continuing Ministerial education. We have this year scheduled three courses for Parish Ministers to enable them to augment and update their training in the light of present day conditions. It is our hope that many more of our Ministers will avail themselves of these courses.

The L. W. Anderson Lectures were given this year by the Reverend Dr. Ernest Campbell, until recently of Riverside Church, New York, on the general theme "Preaching Today." These lectures are provided through the generosity of the late Mr. L. W. Anderson, a benefactor of the College for many years.

A course for Clerks of Presbyteries and Synods, designed by the General Assembly, was held in November and was well attended.

The One hundred and tenth Annual Convocation of the College will be held on Monday, the ninth day of May, One thousand nine hundred and seventy-seven, in the Church of St. Andrew and St. Paul. The degree of Doctor of Divinity, honoris causa, will be conferred on the Reverend George E. Dobie, B.A., B.D., M.Th., St. Timothy's Church, Ottawa; the Reverend A. Gordon Faraday, C.D., B.A., M.A., St. Andrew's Church, Penticton, British Columbia; and the Honourable George Porteous, M.B.E., C.M., B.A., Lieutenant Governor of Saskatchewan. The Reverend Dr. A. Lorne Mackay, Moderator of the General Assembly, will deliver the Convocation address.

As in former years, many friends have expressed their continued co-operation and interest by the gift of scholarships, bursaries and prizes, which we gratefully acknowledge and which we list in our financial statements.

We are most grateful to our Acting Principal, the Reverend Dr. D. N. MacMillan, for all that he has done to advance the welfare of the College. Through his efforts, the work of the College has been stimulated, and a splendid spirit engendered among the Faculty and student body.

## 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles appropriate for a non-profit organization. The College makes no charge for depreciation on buildings and equipment in the determination of annual operating results on the grounds that fixed assets, when replaced, will be financed from public or private donations. In order to provide for systematic write off of fixed assets, the Board of Management has adopted the policy of recording depreciation on fixed assets by a direct charge against the Building and Maintenance Fund.

Revenue from investments is treated as income of the General Fund with the exception of the portion thereof deemed to be earned by the Endowments for Scholarships which are allocated directly to Scholarship Funds Held for Disbursement.

## 2. LAND

Land, which was acquired for nominal consideration as part of an exchange with McGill University, is shown at the value assigned by the Board of Management in 1961.

## 3. SCHOLARSHIP FUNDS FOR DISBURSEMENT

This fund represents accumulated income on Endowments for Scholarships and contributions received for scholarships, bursaries and prizes not specifically donated to the Endowment Fund, less applicable disbursements to date.

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**THE REPORT OF THE COMMISSION APPOINTED BY THE  
102nd GENERAL ASSEMBLY RE THE COMPLAINT OF  
THE REVEREND DEREK BALMER AND THE RECEPTION  
OF THE REVEREND JEAN CLAUDE RUFENACHT.**

*To the Venerable the 103rd General Assembly:*

The Commission to deal with the above items was appointed by the 102nd General Assembly and the members of the Commission were Rev. John W. McBride, Chairman; Rev. Stanley Gentle, Rev. James McKay, Mr. Bruce Upshall, Mrs. J. F. Cleghorn, and the Principal Clerk of Assembly or his appointee.

The terms of reference for the Commission on the Dissent and Complaint by the Reverend Derek Balmer were as follows:

1. To meet as soon as possible to consider the complaint.
2. To consider the right of the Presbytery of Montreal to sustain the Call to Mr. James Matheson from the Charge of Ormstown, Rockburn as a regular Gospel Call and to place the Call in Mr. Matheson's hands for a decision.
3. If the Presbytery of Montreal be found in error regarding number two above, to consider if the circumstances justify Mr. Matheson being licensed and ordained to preach the Gospel although not called and inducted in the charge of Ormstown, Rockburn.
4. To take such action in cooperation with the Presbytery of Montreal as will promote the welfare of the Church in the pastoral charge of Ormstown, Rockburn and the right for use of the services of Mr. James Matheson as is consonant with the regulations of The Presbyterian Church in Canada. The Commission cited the various parties to attend the meeting which was held at the Presbyterian College, 3495 University Street, Montreal, Quebec, on Tuesday, June 29th, 1976 at 2 P.M., and was duly constituted with prayer by the Moderator. The Chairman reviewed with the members of the Commission the terms of reference and the proposed procedure to be undertaken, and indicated the appellant and the respondent had been notified and the Commission proceeded to meet with the various members of the Presbytery of Montreal. Mr. Matheson was also in attendance as well as a number of representatives of the congregation of Ormstown, and all parties were given an opportunity to speak. The Moderator ascertained that the parties had received their citations and were present. The Clerk of the Presbytery presented the Commission with a copy of relevant Minutes of the Presbytery of Montreal. It was noted in the Minutes anent Call that the stipend was only half of that recommended by General Assembly as a stipend for full-time work.

Presentation: The Moderator called upon Mr. Balmer to speak to his appeal, and Mr. James Armour, Moderator of the Presbytery of Montreal, made a brief reply. Mr. Balmer waived the right to further reply.

It was noted that Mr. Matheson had submitted a brief on the matter under discussion. Representatives of the congregation were introduced by the Interim-Moderator of the charge, and two of them spoke briefly to the Commission.

Report of Commission: The Commission then withdrew from the meeting and met together to consider a report. The report is as following.

"The Commission as named above, having heard a full and frank discussion by the parties at the bar, and by Mr. James Matheson and representatives of Ormstown congregation:

1. Re No. 2 in the terms of reference of the Commission find no irregularity by the Presbytery in this matter, but having received a copy of the Minutes note the Presbytery did not deal with the matter of sustaining the Call and placing it in Mr. Matheson's hands as was indicated in the terms of reference of this Commission, but the Commission finds the Presbytery was in error on procedure by not considering the conduct of the Moderator who presided at the Moderation of the Call, and had the proper procedure been taken Mr. Balmer would have had relevance at that point in presenting his dissent and complaint.

2. Re No. 3 in terms of reference we find we are unable to direct the Presbytery of Montreal to ordain Mr. Matheson because
  - (a) We find the wont and usage of The Presbyterian Church in Canada has not permitted ordination to part-time ministries, and
  - (b) the Presbytery has assured the Commission it has not been the practice of the Presbytery of Montreal to permit ordination to part-time ministries, and
  - (c) Mr. Matheson has intimated his reluctance to give up his secular employment even though the congregation was prepared to support him in the full-time ministry and pay him at least the minimum stipend as set by General Assembly.

3. Expresses the hope that if the part-time arrangement as carried on by Mr. Matheson is not satisfactory to the congregation and the Presbytery of Montreal, the Presbytery of Montreal urge the congregation to issue a Call to Mr. Matheson on the basis of the full-time ministry with at least the minimum stipend as set by the General Assembly, and hope that Mr. Matheson will give such a Call, if issued, his most serious and prayerful consideration, and if this does not issue in a settlement that the Presbytery direct the Interim-Moderator to proceed with filling the vacancy as soon as possible.

4. Direct the Church Doctrine Committee to take under study the matter of part-time ministries and the right of ordination to such part-time ministries, and report to the next General Assembly, and further that we refer the submission that Mr. Matheson has made to this Commission to the Church Doctrine Committee for their information."

A second item had been referred to the Commission which was the reception of Reverend J. C. Rufenacht as a minister of The Presbyterian Church in Canada. In this regard the Commission found that the Presbytery of Montreal should be given permission to receive Mr. Rufenacht as a minister of The Presbyterian Church in Canada after the usual conditions for reception have been met. (These conditions are the sufficient circulation of the Presbyteries of the Church and the Presbytery setting an examination concerning the History of The Presbyterian Church in Canada, and on the rules and forms of procedure of The Presbyterian Church in Canada.)

All of which is respectfully submitted.

**COMMUNICATION SERVICES COMMITTEE**

*To the Venerable the 103rd General Assembly:*

The Communication Services Committee has been encouraged by the steadily increasing interest and support given to our concerns, particularly in the response of presbyteries to the indication of priorities in the work of the church, where the relationship to and participation in the public media emerged as a major item.

At the last Assembly, a recommendation from a commissioner urging the Administrative Council to explore the funding of television programs, received unanimous approval. This year an overture urges the development of a national television program.

In a time of budget restraint and with only one staff member, it is difficult to develop an adequate response to these concerns. Yet the Committee is heartened and encouraged and determined to continue to give leadership, to increase awareness and to offer guidance in the field of responsibility committed to it by the church.

*The A/V Library*

Our library offers films, filmstrips and slide-sets for the use of the church. The service charge remains at a minimum which is very low compared to other agencies offering similar materials. In fact, postal charges now form the largest item on the invoices. The inadequacies of the postal system make it increasingly difficult to

offer an acceptable service to the whole of Canada. Materials have to be sent at first class rates in order to reduce the delivery time – and still we have delays.

The Presbytery of Westminster is organizing a resource centre to co-ordinate the use and distribution of items placed with them for prolonged periods of time.

The addition of many new films and filmstrips to the library has been made possible by a grant from the Birthday Gifts Fund. The catalogue is almost out of print and careful consideration will be given to providing the best information about the resources available.

Both the Interchurch Aid Committee and the Interchurch Relations Committee of The Presbyterian Church in Canada have contributed to the production of films by Religious Television Associates and provided copies to the library. Through a joint gift from the Birthday Gifts Fund to the Board of Congregational Life and to this Committee, several resource films are being purchased to be used as teaching and training instruments in various programs.

#### *"Meeting Place"*

Through the National Religious Advisory Council of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation, our church is allocated four services each year to be televised in the "Meeting Place" series. Some of these are, of necessity, repeats of earlier broadcasts. During the past season, services have originated in Montreal West and St. Timothy's, Ottawa, and the Christmas Eve special broadcast from St. Andrew's Church in Toronto. Next year services will be from Vancouver, Toronto and Montreal. The Communication Services consultant assists in the organization and production of the services.

#### *Radio*

Many opportunities still exist for the church's participation in radio broadcasting. In every instance it is at the local level. Whenever the church has taken advantage of these opportunities it has provided a public presence that has proved to be an asset to the congregation and a valuable ministry to the community. We are always ready to offer advice, suggestions and training to enable the best possible use of this medium. The National Committee of Presbyterian Men has sponsored a series of radio programs entitled "Amazing Grace" featuring Dr. Mariano DiGangi. Our Committee produced the program for the first year. It is available for placement by any Presbyterian group on local stations with local identification.

#### *TV Special*

On December 1st the people of the Lloydminster, Alberta/Saskatchewan district were able to visit Knox Presbyterian Church. A one-hour television special was broadcast in prime time (7 to 8 p.m.) on the local CBC affiliate. The program featured the history, life and work of the congregation – the people involved and their participation in the work of the church in Canada and overseas. It contained an interview with Pat Pooler, a missionary on furlough from Nepal. Our Committee sponsored this experiment and the consultant worked closely with the congregation in the design and production of the program. The evaluation indicates an increased awareness in the community of the presence and work of Knox Presbyterian Church and congregation – and acceptance by the congregation of their part in the larger family of the church. The enthusiastic acceptance of an increased budget allocation and indications of more vigour in the life of the church are attributed to this experiment.

#### *TV Spots*

A grant from the Birthday Gifts Fund will enable the production of a series of TV spots which will be distributed to stations across Canada for broadcast as public service announcements. They will present some of the work and concerns of the church under the general theme, "We care about people". As they are distributed, detailed information will be sent to congregations to encourage their use and alert people to watch for them.

#### *Interchurch Communications*

As members of the Interchurch Communications Committee, we work in association with the Anglican, Baptist, Lutheran, Roman Catholic and United Churches.

Religious Television Associates is the film and TV production agency of Interchurch. Most production begins at the initiative of individual denominations with the rest becoming associated in support and publicity. The Interchurch identification increases the acceptance of many programs to a larger number of broadcasters.

#### *Cable*

Most Canadian towns and cities are served by cable TV systems. It is a requirement that all cable systems must provide a channel devoted exclusively to community programming and that free access to that channel must be offered to all in the community. The use of this channel requires particular consideration. Our Committee continues to offer advice and training to congregations and presbyteries or ministerial associations. In association with Religious Television Associates and using a grant from the Birthday Gifts Fund, program segments are being provided to be used in the development of program series. This medium can be of direct benefit to the congregation and its use in creative and imaginative ways is strongly encouraged.

#### *Birthday Gifts Fund*

Several references have been made to grants from the Birthday Gifts Fund and we are grateful to all who contributed to it. The extra funds are enabling us to undertake some new and exciting projects that would have been impossible otherwise.

#### *Burning Bush Productions*

At its November meeting, the Administrative Council authorized a campaign to raise funds for the production of the children's TV program "My Place". Since the campaign is still in progress, a supplementary report will be presented to Assembly.

#### *Field Work*

In response to a recommendation last year, several presentations have been made to presbyteries outlining the work of the Committee and encouraging wider use of the services of the Committee. There is evidence of a growing awareness of the opportunities and of the potential of the church in these fields. As the sole executive staff person, our consultant has made presentations, conducted workshops and consulted with various groups and individuals on matters relating to the committee in seventeen presbyteries. He has visited several places more than once for special projects.

#### *Media Awareness*

More and more Canadians are recognizing the impact of the media – particularly television – on the shaping of attitudes and values, even to the point of suggesting that the church, the school and the home are being replaced as centres for the development of life-styles, culture and guidelines for living.

Robert Liebert, a child psychologist, considers television as a teacher and states, "It teaches them that might makes right. The lesson of most TV series is that the rich, the powerful and the conniving are the most successful". This concern has been characterized by the establishment of commissions to consider aspects of media. Magazine and newspaper articles, films and media programs have examined and portrayed these issues.

A leading child psychologist is quoted as saying in the cover article of Newsweek Magazine (February 21st, 1977) that after reviewing 25 years of research studies, "the time is long past due for a major, organized cry of protest from the medical profession in relation to what, in political terms, is a national scandal". Can the church remain indifferent to these matters? The first step must be one of increased awareness and a recommendation is offered that will make that a priority concern for the Committee for the next year.

#### RECOMMENDATION 1. C

That General Assembly authorize the establishment of a churchwide program of education concerning the impact of media.

## BOARD OF CONGREGATIONAL LIFE

*To the Venerable the 103rd General Assembly:*

The Board of Congregational Life provides a wide range of support for congregations as they work to develop the shape of their life and mission. The needs of congregations vary from place to place and from time to time, and the Board endeavours to meet those needs as specifically as possible with the resources which the Church makes available to it. This report refers to many projects and programs which the Board has undertaken for this purpose.

Despite the variety of service, it should not be thought that the Board's work is done in piecemeal fashion. Just as the life of any congregation is a whole with many parts rather than simply the sum of all its parts, so the Board tries to take an holistic approach to its responsibilities and provide a service to congregations within that framework. Its declared policy is to render service to the field in the context of total congregational planning.

It is exciting to hear of the increasing number of congregations which are seriously planning their life and work. They identify their purpose and goals in order to develop a program that will enable them to be a responsible Christian community and involve their members in the mission of the Church. The Board rejoices in this development and is able to provide assistance to congregations as they engage in this process.

### I. STAFFING ARRANGEMENTS

*Mr. Hamish Livingston*

In September, 1976, after careful consideration of the nominations submitted by Presbyteries, the Board appointed Mr. Hamish Livingston as Associate Secretary - Board of Congregational Life - with particular responsibility for men's work. Mr. Livingston brings to his position a considerable experience in the business world and especially in the area of radio and television broadcasting.

*Mr. Alex M. Deans*

Dr. H. F. Davidson has indicated his intention to retire at the end of June, 1977. By re-assigning some responsibilities to other members of staff the Board has asked Mr. Deans to assume the major responsibility for Stewardship Education and Budget Promotion.

*Dr. H. F. Davidson*

Dr. Davidson will retire at the end of June after 17 years of leadership to the church in the areas of Christian Stewardship and Promotion of the General Assembly Budget. The Board of Congregational Life wishes to record its deep gratitude and that of the whole church for the many years of outstanding service Dr. Davidson has given to The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

Throughout Canada, among churches of many different denominations, and in the United States, especially through the National Council of Churches, Dr. Davidson's name is associated with Christian Stewardship. His keen theological insight and his incisive manner of writing have brought challenge to many, motivating them to become faithful stewards of God's mercies in all aspects of their daily life.

In 1974, the Centennial General Assembly afforded Dr. Davidson the highest honour the church can bestow by electing him as Moderator.

As he now retires from the active ministry we know he will be anything but "inactive". His advice and experience will be sought by many at the congregational, presbytery and the national level. It is the sincere wish of his friends and fellow-members of staff in the Board of Congregational Life that he will be blessed with good health and have many years in which to enjoy a well-earned retirement.

### II. LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT

*Youth Evangelism Team*

Encouraged by the excellent work of two youth evangelism teams which had toured parts of eastern Canada in 1974 and British Columbia and Alberta in 1975,

the Board has developed a policy for summer youth evangelism. The statement of purpose reads in part:

"Summer youth evangelism is a program in which a team of young people joins forces with a local congregation in a ministry of outreach in a community. This ministry was affirmed as evangelism which means sharing Jesus Christ with others. A variety of methods may be used to this end, including music, drama and personal witness, and this work may be done co-operatively with other churches or community groups."

In co-operation with the Committee on Evangelism and Social Action of the Synod of the Atlantic Provinces, plans are underway to recruit and equip such a team to tour the Atlantic Provinces in July and August of 1977.

#### *Evangelism Workshops*

B.C.L. Staff and other resource people are willing to work with Synods, Presbyteries or Congregations who desire to have workshops or to initiate programs in various aspects of evangelism. Included is assistance in the use of the new Evangelism Handbook and the Evangelism Explosion Training Program.

#### RECOMMENDATION 1. A

*That synods and presbyteries be encouraged to sponsor evangelism workshops in co-operation with B.C.L. to the end that ministers and lay leaders may have opportunity to receive information and training in evangelism.*

#### *Evangelists-at-Large Programme*

In the fall of 1976 the Board added five names to its list of evangelists-at-large. These ministers of our church are prepared to conduct preaching missions and related activities in evangelism upon invitation from congregations, presbyteries or ministerial associations. Board of Congregational Life staff members are prepared to help congregations with their plans and decisions in the use of this program. A subsidy fund is also available to congregations who require financial help in the use of the program.

## RECOMMENDATION 2.

*That Presbyteries and Congregations be encouraged to avail themselves of the evangelist-at-large program of the Board of Congregational Life in which designated ministers of our church conduct preaching missions upon invitation and are able to provide other forms of assistance to congregations in the task of evangelism.*

*Eldership Training*

Eldership Training continues to be an important emphasis among Presbyteries and congregations. Besides those events which are planned with direct assistance from national staff, many others are being carried out with local leadership. To assist sessions and congregations with the election and preparation of elders, a new resource is being prepared, "An Introduction to Eldership Training".

*Strategy for CE:SA (Christian Education: Shared Approaches)*

The 101st General Assembly approved the CE:SA project, and urged congregations to plan for an integrated approach to their educational programs, making use of the planning resources provided. Congregations were encouraged also to explore the teaching/learning resources in CE:SA as they do their planning.

During 1976 and 1977 the Board has been encouraging and assisting congregations to develop an over-all plan for their educational program. Assistance, in the form of introductory material and personnel, has been offered to presbytery committees as they develop support for congregations.

Two different planning models have been widely used and with very encouraging results. When, by mid-1978, the teaching/learning resources in all four approaches are available, those congregations which have done the planning will be in an excellent position to make their selections in keeping with the plans they have made. Congregations which have not yet used one of the planning models are urged to do so.

*Family Life Education*

Interest continues to grow in Family and Marriage Ministries. The emphasis of the Board in these areas is focussed on the training and equipping of leaders. The family life newsletter continues to reach all congregations on a regular basis, suggesting ideas and learning opportunities, and listing resources.

*Youth Leadership Training*

During the next two years the Board will emphasize the training of trainers in presbyteries. Through a Joint Educational Development Youth Leadership Training Project The Presbyterian Church in Canada will share in the development of a series of leadership training events. Two of these will be held in Canada and two others will be close to the Canadian border in the U.S.A. Each presbytery will have the opportunity of appointing four youth leaders to go to one of these training events. It is expected the cost will be shared by the Presbyteries, the Synods, the Board of Congregational Life and the individuals concerned.

*National Advisory Council*

The National Advisory Council for Youth and Young Adult Ministry met in November, 1976 and March, 1977. The latter meeting was held in conjunction with the annual meeting of the Board of Congregational Life. All Synods were represented this year and the calibre of young people appointed by the Synod Committees was excellent. The purpose of the N.A.C. is seen as twofold:—

1. To provide an opportunity for selected young people to learn about The Presbyterian Church in Canada, (its structures and programs) and to share the knowledge gained with others as they have opportunity, e.g., in their own congregations, at presbytery and synod rallies, camps, conferences, etc.
2. To provide input to the Board of Congregational Life from the point of view of a young person who is actively involved in the life and work of the church at the congregational/presbytery/synod level.

*Young Adult Observers*

Since the guidelines for the appointing of Young Adult Observers to the General Assembly were approved (A&P 1975, pp. 419-420) a problem has arisen with respect to the age limit as it affects the students of the colleges. At present one half of the presbyteries and each of the three colleges are invited to name Young Adult Observers to each General Assembly. The maximum age limit is 25. In the case of at least one of the colleges, the average age of the student body is over 30 at the present time. In light of this fact, it would seem appropriate for the General Assembly to waive the age limit in the case of the student bodies of the three colleges.

## RECOMMENDATION 3. A

*That the guidelines for the appointment of Young Adult Observers be amended to make the age limit of 25 inapplicable to the appointment of representatives from each of the three colleges of The Presbyterian Church in Canada.*

*Stewardship Education and Budget Promotion*

## A. 1976 Budget Performance

The first total received from congregations for The General Assembly Budget in 1976 was \$2,819,827., an increase of \$209,712. (8%). This includes \$124,634. received after January 15/77 when the Treasurer's books were closed for audit. This is of course a new record for Budget Support and the increase is in line with the rate of increase which our people have been maintaining in recent years.

In addition to Assembly Budget support, congregations raised \$217,902. for Inter-Church Aid, and \$572,344. for sundry other benevolent purposes. Also the W.M.S. (E.D. and W.D.) raised \$585,553. in 1976. Thus the total raised for purposes outside congregational programs was \$4,413,728.

The total raised for All Purposes in 1976 including the above, was \$26,106,482. an increase of \$2,551,532. (10.8%). The General Assembly Budget received 10.8% of the total for All Purposes.

The per member rate for Assembly Budget support increased by \$1.54 (10.1%) from \$15.10 to \$16.64. The per member rate for All Purposes increased by \$17.37 (12.7%) from \$136.67 to \$154.04. About 1% of the increase in per member rates can be attributed to the decrease of 2436 in communicant membership.

B. *Comparison of Presbytery and Synod Giving.* (See Chart pages 284-285)

1. 20 Presbyteries and 3 Synods show a per member rate above the national average for Assembly Budget Support. 27 Presbyteries and 5 synods were above the national per member rate for All Purposes.

Note: Because some delayed '76 budget money was received after the Statistical Report had gone to the printer, there will be discrepancies between the budget figures in the chart, and the records of presbytery conveners, who have received the revised totals.

2. 6 Presbyteries were above a per member rate (\$20.75) high enough to raise Budget support to the \$3,500,000. level. 12 Presbyteries were above the rate (\$18.00) required to reach the \$3,000,000. level. The first six were: Westminster \$22.97; Vancouver Island \$22.65; East Toronto \$22.54; Brockville \$21.78; Temiskaming \$21.39; Edmonton \$20.78.

The next six were: Algoma-North Bay \$20.18; Winnipeg \$19.71; Assiniboia \$19.47; Ottawa \$19.40; Halifax and Lunenburg \$18.57; Superior \$18.17.

3. The highest per member rate for All Purposes was in Quebec Presbytery \$258.49, followed by Kamloops, \$245.01; Kootenay \$221.74; Peace River \$217.14; Edmonton \$211.98; Newfoundland \$211.70; East Toronto \$208.13; Westminster \$204.71; Red Deer \$201.03.

4. The Synod of British Columbia again had the highest per member rate for the Assembly Budget, \$21.41, and also for All Purposes, \$205.71.

## RECOMMENDATION 4. A

*That Presbyteries and Congregations be commended for their generous support of the General Assembly Budget in 1976.*

## RECOMMENDATION 5. A

*That the General Assembly Budget Objective for 1978 be \$3,500,000. and that congregational Required Shares be computed from that figure and sent to Presbyteries in time to be considered at October meetings.*

## RECOMMENDATION 6. A

*That Sessions be urged to arrange for some method for annual renewal of personal commitment by the members for support of the Church's program, and that Sessions consider an Every Person Visitation plan to this end.*

## III. RESOURCES DEVELOPMENT

*Communicants' Class Kit*

The kit introduced last year for use with communicants' classes has been well accepted. The first printing is almost completely sold out and a second printing will be necessary by the Fall. Comments and evaluations received have been both helpful and encouraging.

*Handbook on Christian Social Action*

The Christian Social Action Handbook has been revised and updated to include the actions of the General Assembly on various social issues up to and including the 102nd General Assembly (1976).

*Christians Doing Financial Planning*

A new resource for individual and family use has been prepared in co-operation with the National Council of Churches Commission on Stewardship. Also available through the Board of Congregational Life is a Wills Emphasis Kit which offers motivation, guidance, and information related to the importance of the Christian making a will and seeing that it is kept up-to-date through the various stages of one's life.

*Kurios - Youth Leadership Newsletter*

A quarterly newsletter for leaders of youth and young adult groups offers suggestions and resources related to the total life of the congregation. These newsletters are meant to be kept on file so they will grow into a very useful catalogue of resources.

*Home Religion*

The 102nd General Assembly asked the Board of Congregational Life to confer with the Committee on Home Religion regarding the relationship of the work of the latter committee to the Board. A meeting was held with the Committee on Home Religion and that committee went on record as being in favour of the Board of Congregational Life taking over its responsibilities. The Board therefore recommends as follows:—

## RECOMMENDATION 7. A

*That the Board of Congregational Life assume the responsibilities of the Committee on Home Religion.*

*Religion in Public Education*

Through its association with the Ecumenical Study Commission, a Toronto-based group representing the member churches in the Ecumenical Forum, the Board of Congregational Life has maintained a watching brief on this important subject. While most of the experience gained is related to the situation in the Province of Ontario, national conferences are held every few years, and the Board seeks to share the insights gained from this association with the church as a whole.

## IV. ECONOMIC AND SOCIAL ISSUES

The Board has under study a number of economic and social issues. Some of them have been remitted to presbyteries and congregations for study and comment. The Board is grateful to those who have submitted comments and made suggestions for incorporation into this report.

## ABORTION

The Board of Congregational Life submitted a statement entitled "Abortion: The Life and Health of the Mother as the Criterion" to the 102nd General Assembly and it was remitted to the presbyteries and congregations for study. Fifteen presbyteries and eleven congregations responded. Some respondents stated that more theological study needs to be made of the words "health" and "life". As a result the Board of Congregational Life has requested the Committee on Church Doctrine to take up this matter.

Whatever the deficiency of the Paper, the responses were virtually unanimous in the view that these terms should be interpreted strictly rather than liberally. They tend to oppose any definition of these words as they apply to abortion that would go beyond physical or mental impairment.

Last year's statement is reprinted here for information, with amendments to the last two sentences of the original:

## ABORTION

## THE LIFE AND HEALTH OF THE MOTHER AS THE CRITERION

"(1) Everyone who, with intent to procure the miscarriage of a female person — is guilty of an indictable offence — ;

(2) Every female person who, being pregnant, with intent to procure her own miscarriage, uses any means — is guilty of an indictable offence — ;

Subsections (1) and (2) do not apply — if, before the use of those means, the therapeutic abortion committee — states that in its opinion the continuation of the pregnancy of such female person would or would be likely to endanger the life or health —"

## THE CRIMINAL CODE OF CANADA, SECTION 237

In the present state of gynecology and obstetrics the danger of a woman's death through complications arising from pregnancy is rare indeed, nor are there many occasions when it is indicated that the continuation of pregnancy might result in the mother's permanent physical impairment. Nevertheless, many abortions occur — abortions authorized by legally constituted therapeutic abortion committees.

The issue lies in what is meant by "life" and "health". In this debate the question is whether "life" ought to mean more than simply being alive, with consideration being given to the threat of an unwanted pregnancy to a woman's total life; in relation to her family, her work or her environment. On this side of the argument it is pointed out that there are circumstances that may not be "life-threatening" but can be "life-devastating".

In the same way "health" may be seen to include questions of social or economic well-being. Further, the question is whether the health of the foetus ought not to be taken into consideration. If it is indicated that there is a 50% chance that a child will be born deformed, deficient or with a lethal disease, what then? Or if there is the likelihood of being neglected, abandoned or deprived, should this not be taken into account?

Far from being academic questions, these factors are at work in the emotion-charged struggle of any woman who considers having an abortion. It is a struggle to decide what is right, what is best, and whether the right and the best are in conflict. The questions of rights involves the question of quality of life. An unwanted pregnancy may be seen as a threat to a woman's right to a certain quality of life that she possesses, or is attempting to acquire. If a foetus seems to be unhealthy, has it not a right to be born healthy or not to be born at all?

The 93rd General Assembly (1967) stated, in a resolution reaffirmed in 1972 by the 98th General Assembly, that "an abortion involves a decision fraught with serious moral and spiritual implications". Among these implications must be affirmed the fundamental right to live. This principle must be seen to obtain also for the unborn. There is no point in time when it can be asserted that the foetus does not qualify as human life. It is unseen, unconscious, dependent and perhaps unwanted, but these are not grounds for its termination.

In view of this fundamental right it is proper to conclude that the interpretations of "life" and "health" must be strict. In the case of the word "life" it ought to have the plain meaning of life as distinct from death, and that danger to life means the danger that the person might die. The claim of danger to "health" is more complex. In fact there is no way to produce a catalogue of "disease states" or conditions that constitute medical indications for abortion. The law provides that therapeutic abortion committees which are accountable to the Minister of Health of the Province, have the responsibility of making decisions in these difficult cases.

BCL - September 1976

#### RECOMMENDATION 8. C

*That the General Assembly request Provincial Ministers of Health that therapeutic abortion committees be instructed to give priority to the principle that the unborn has the right to life and that only a danger to the mother's health indicating the likelihood of permanent or prolonged mental or physical impairment be regarded as cause for abortion.*

#### OVERTURE 16, 1975 - The Presbytery of Calgary-Macleod re Abortion

We have already reported that we have requested the Committee on Church Doctrine to study the theological aspects of "life" and "health". We hope that it will be possible for the Board to participate in this study with particular reference to the issues raised by the Overture including the rights of the unborn. Also, the Board will proceed to study the report of the Badgely Committee which was published on February 9th, 1977, to see what it has to say about possible abuses in the performance of therapeutic abortions.

#### RECOMMENDATION 9. A

*That this information be received as further answer to Overture 16, 1975.*

#### Civil Marriage

An overture from the Presbytery of West Toronto to the 98th General Assembly (A&P 1972, page 464) raised several issues related to the marriage of non-Christians by Christian ministers. As a result, the Board reported to the 99th General Assembly (A&P 1973, page 281) and the 102nd General Assembly (A&P 1976, page 342) with regard to guidelines which presbyteries may wish to adopt.

Another aspect of the issue raised by the Overture is with regard to the practice of Civil Marriage. The Board has considered the matter this year and has sought the views of the Committee on Church Doctrine. The finding of the Committee on Church Doctrine is:

"In the opinion of our Committee there is no doctrinal or theological objection to the concept of a civil marriage for non-Christians; but it is inconsistent with our doctrine for the State to deny full legality to church weddings."

There are many instances in which non-Christians are married in a church with the officiating minister using the service in the Book of Common Order, and where the minister invokes God's blessing on the marriage and the couple is willing to have that blessing pronounced. There are other instances where a couple has no intention of receiving God's blessing and where a church wedding would be an act of hypocrisy. A civil ceremony would suit their needs very well. In our pluralistic society, that option should exist.

Unfortunately, from a practical standpoint, that option is not always readily available. Circumstances differ from province to province and from community to community. In some places couples are able to obtain a civil ceremony quite readily, but just as often they cannot. Sometimes judges or magistrates refuse to conduct weddings or will do so only at stated hours that are inconvenient. In some communities civil ceremonies are conducted in depressing surroundings, in others they are not available at all.

Some of the presbyteries may wish to address themselves to this problem, while for others the problem does not exist at all. Therefore, instead of asking the General Assembly to take some broad action it is our recommendation that the presbyteries take the matter under consideration.

#### RECOMMENDATION 10. A

*That presbyteries be encouraged to urge provincial governments to take appropriate steps to make the option of civil marriage more readily available to those who desire it.*

#### Euthanasia

The Board reports for information that an article on this subject is being prepared together with a discussion guide. It will be mentioned in the Board's monthly mailing in due course.

#### Immigration

The 101st General Assembly approved a Brief to the Joint Parliamentary Committee on Immigration (A&P 1975, page 469). Since that time the Federal Government has produced a new Immigration Bill, C-24. At its Annual Meeting in March 1977, the Board agreed to commend the Minister of Manpower and Immigration for bringing forth this Bill but recorded its regret that the Government had not considered humanitarian values to a greater extent and regretted the over-emphasis of the Bill on economic and demographic considerations in the formulation of immigration policy. The Board also reminded the Minister of several concerns expressed in the Brief of The Presbyterian Church in Canada, and urged an increase in the number of immigration offices and officers in Third World countries; that immigration officers serving abroad be trained to understand the culture and country where they will be working, and to present a realistic picture of life and opportunities in Canada; and that immigration officers in Canada receive orientation about cultural differences so that they can be sensitive to the state of mind and feelings of new arrivals to this country.

#### The Church and Alcohol

On recommendation of the Committee on Church Doctrine the 102nd General Assembly requested the Board to provide educational materials on this matter (A&P 1976, page 396). The Board reports that this matter has been given low priority in its work in view of the fact that there are educational materials available.

### V. NATIONAL COMMITTEE OF PRESBYTERIAN MEN

#### An Overview of 1976

The early part of 1976 was marked by an increased effort and interest in two specific areas. One was the planning and preparation to ensure the success of the three conferences scheduled for the year. The other matter was the finding of a suitable candidate for the position of Associate Secretary - Board of Congregational Life - with particular responsibility for men's work.

#### National Conferences

Although slightly fewer people attended the conferences in 1976, the evaluation sheets indicated that the level of appreciation was high for the spiritual and inspirational leadership the conferences provided. The Reverend Bill Campbell challenged the conferences with his messages on the theme - "To Be a Disciple". The attendance at the three conferences was as follows: - Truro 105, Peterborough 141, Banff 94, for a total of 340.

#### Staff Appointment

After a careful consideration of all the nominations submitted by the Presbyteries, the Board of Congregational Life appointed Mr. Hamish Livingston to a staff position with particular responsibility for men's work. He commenced his duties on October 12th. Special thanks is due to Mr. Roy Hamilton who returned from retirement to serve as "Acting Director" during the vacancy, and to Reverend

James Roe who came into the office as "Interim Acting Director" for a short period of time before the appointment of Hamish Livingston.

#### 20th Anniversary 1957-1977

To mark the 20th year of the P.M. Movement in Canada, a collection of articles as published in the Presbyterian Record concerning people, places and events in the P.M. Movement, has been compiled. As stated in the "Foreword" to this collection by a Former National Director: "some of the dreams of 20 years ago have been realized. Many have yet to come true". The goals and objectives remain unchanged but we must ensure that the means and methods whereby we reach those goals and objectives are compatible with today's lifestyle. . . still maintaining Christian tradition, but using today's methods and approaches to discover a wholeness that is authentic both personally and theologically.

#### Field Work

To assist in carrying out the Presbytery field work assignments allotted to National Committee members as announced in the 1976 Annual Report, field work co-ordinators have been named for Eastern and Western Canada. Mr. Archie McLean, a business executive from St. Paul's congregation in Woodstock, N.B. will co-ordinate the work within the seven presbyteries of the Atlantic Synod. Mr. Llew Codling, a retired school teacher from Parkview congregation in Saskatoon, will work with the National Committee members in the four Western Synods.

#### Radio Ministry

The National Committee of Presbyterian Men has made available a fifteen minute weekly radio program entitled "Amazing Grace" for use throughout the church. A fifty-two week series has been prepared by Dr. Mariano DiGangi with the assistance of the church's Communication Consultant, Rev. Harry Crawford. National Committee members have promoted sponsorship of the program by congregations or presbyteries and, as a result, radio stations in Oshawa, Ontario, Port Hawkesbury, Nova Scotia, and Prince Albert, Saskatchewan are broadcasting the series in its entirety. In Sherbrooke, Quebec, the message only is being used, and at Midland, Ontario, the program is used on a selective basis.

The purpose of the program is to present the Christian message in word and music, in keeping with the confessional standards of The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

#### RECOMMENDATION 11. A

*That presbyteries and sessions be asked to discuss and seek ways and means of obtaining sponsors in their local areas for the "Amazing Grace" radio ministry, and report the results to the National Committee of Presbyterian Men.*

#### Special P.M. Account

The balance as of December 31, 1976 was \$1,152.14. The account has been audited and copies sent to the Comptroller of The Presbyterian Church in Canada and to the Department of National Revenue, Taxation, Ottawa, Ontario.

#### VI. DECLINING CHURCH MEMBERSHIP (A&P 1976, p. 78)

The 102nd General Assembly requested the Board of World Mission and the Board of Congregational Life to study the implications of declining church membership and report on the state of the church. A joint committee was established and some work has been done. As a result of the research of the joint committee it would appear that more needs to be done than analyze existing data. Some original research should be done as well in order to determine the mind of the church on these questions.

The Board of Congregational Life at its meeting in March, decided that, in the light of the Board's priorities, the project should not be allowed to expand beyond that which was indicated by the referral from the 102nd General Assembly without further clarification as to the importance attached to it. Both staff time and considerable cost are involved in any undertaking of original research. For this Assembly the Board reports progress.

#### RECOMMENDATION 12. C

*That the project on declining church membership be re-considered as to its relative importance in the life of the church with instructions to the two Boards concerned as to whether it should be continued and if so the extent of the research which is to be undertaken.*

#### VII. REPRESENTATION ON COMMITTEE ON INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS

The Board, at its annual meeting, undertook a careful review of its representation on other Boards and Committees, as well as on outside organizations. It was felt that staff members in particular were being asked to relate to too many organizations and that, in the interest of efficiency in the work of the Board and its service to congregations, there should be a reduction, wherever possible, in the number of organizations on which the staff are asked to represent the Board.

#### RECOMMENDATION 13. A

*That the Board of Congregational Life staff representation on the Committee on International Affairs be reduced from two to one.*

#### VIII. OVERTURE 13: THE PRESBYTERY OF WESTMINSTER RE: PARTI QUEBECOIS AND SEPARATION

This overture was referred to the Board of Congregational Life but arrived too late to be discussed at the Board's annual meeting. The Board's Executive Committee considered the matter, and decided that there was insufficient time to prepare a statement before the deadline for the finalization of the report, but that the matter is of such current importance that there should be opportunity for the General Assembly to deal with it this year.

#### RECOMMENDATION 14. C

*That overture 13, 1977 be given a place on the docket of Assembly, and that the Committee on Business be requested to allocate at least one hour for a presentation, and consideration of the matter.*

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS  
YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31, 1976

1. SUMMARY OF ACCOUNTING PRACTICES

The following is a summary of accounting practices followed by the Church. With the exception of the practice of valuing marketable securities at market value rather than at acquisition cost, as set out in part (b) below, the financial statements have been prepared in accordance with accounting practices generally accepted for non-profit organizations.

(a) *Cash receipts*

Contributions held by congregations at December 31, 1976 for Budget Revenue, for the National Development Fund and for the Inter-Church Aid Committee which were remitted to the Treasurer of the Church by January 14, 1977 have been included in revenue for the year in which they were given by members of the congregation. These amounts have been segregated for balance sheet purposes and designated as cash in transit.

(b) *Investment transactions and income*

Investment transactions are accounted for on the trade date (date the order to buy or sell is executed).

Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis.

Dividend income is recorded on the date of declaration.

Realized gains and losses from investment transactions are recorded on the transaction date.

On the recommendation of The Trustee Board, the Church follows the practice of valuing marketable securities at market value rather than at acquisition cost.

(c) *Capitalization and depreciation*

Fixed assets which are donated are recorded on the basis of fair market value at the time of acquisition. Other fixed assets are recorded at cost.

Properties are depreciated at an annual rate of 3% of cost until the estimated residual value is attained.

Furniture and equipment are depreciated at an annual rate of 10% of cost. Depreciation expense on properties, furniture and equipment has been charged against unappropriated operating and property funds.

(d) *Composition of assets and liabilities*

(i) The assets and liabilities of Knox, Presbyterian and Ewart Colleges, Saskatoon Residence, Armagh and St. Andrew's Hall are included in the balance sheet only to the extent of fixed assets.

(ii) The assets and liabilities of the Pension Fund are not included in these statements. A separate statement covering this fund has been prepared.

(e) *Composition of income and expenditure*

(i) Except for the amount allocated from the Budget, no receipts or disbursements have been included in the statement of income and expenditure for the following:

Knox, Presbyterian and Ewart Colleges, St. Andrew's Hall, Saskatoon Residence, Pension Fund and Armagh.

(ii) Income of the J. B. MacLean Bequest Fund has been included in the statement of income and expenditure only to the extent of the amount received from the Fund (\$25,000 in 1976 and \$45,000 in 1975). A separate statement covering this Fund has been prepared.

2. **CASH AND SHORT-TERM DEPOSITS**  
An amount of \$498,605 (\$249,553 in 1975) is invested in short-term deposits, \$476,605 on behalf of the Chinese Church, Montreal, and \$22,000 on behalf of Tyndale House.  
Income therefrom is credited to this congregation and to Tyndale House in proportion to their short-term deposits.
3. **MARKETABLE SECURITIES**  
An amount of \$67,235 is invested in securities on behalf of Tyndale House. Income therefrom is paid to Tyndale House.
4. **UNEXPENDED APPROPRIATIONS – BOARD OF WORLD MISSION**  
The Board of World Mission has projects under review which will require the expenditure in 1977 of the greater part of this appropriation.
5. **COLLEGES**  
The total cost of operating Knox, Presbyterian and Ewart Colleges, St. Andrew's Hall and Saskatoon Residence is \$1,082,240 (\$919,593 in 1975). Separate statements covering these institutions have been prepared.
6. **COMPARATIVE FIGURES**  
The 1975 comparative figures have been restated to conform with the financial statement presentation adopted for 1976.

1. ACCOUNTING PRACTICES

The following is a summary of accounting practices followed by the fund:

(a) Basis of valuation of fund assets

- (i) Listed stocks are valued at their closing sales price on the stock exchange where listed, and if no sale has taken place on the last business day, then at the average of the closing bid and ask prices.
- (ii) Listed bonds and convertible debentures are recorded at the last published mid-market price.
- (iii) Unlisted bonds are recorded at values reflecting current market yields of similar debt obligations.
- (iv) Mortgages are valued using current market yields base on one-half of the remaining average term of the portfolio. The yields used for valuation are 10¾% for loans on commercial properties and 10½% for loans on residential properties (11¾% for loans on all properties in 1975).

(b) Investment transactions and income

- (i) Investment transactions are recorded on the trade date (date the order to buy or sell is executed). Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividend income is recorded on the ex-dividend date. Realized gains and losses from investment transactions and unrealized appreciation or depreciation of investments are calculated on an average cost basis.

(c) Basis of establishing capital

It is not the practice of the fund to segregate from capital amounts required to meet future obligations of the fund.

2. ADDITIONAL PAYMENTS TO PENSIONERS AND WIDOWS

As approved by the 99th General Assembly, bequests, commencing in 1972, will be used to provide additional payments to pensioners and widows receiving only small amounts from the Canada Pension Plan. The income and expenditure and balance on hand, as follows, is included in these financial statements.

3. ACTUARIAL EVALUATION

Based on the latest actuarial evaluation at December 31, 1974, the capital at that date exceeded the estimated future obligations of the fund by approximately \$1,600,000.

Improvements to the Pension Plan recommended by the General Assembly in June, 1976 reduced this actuarial surplus to approximately \$130,000. The next actuarial evaluation will be made in December, 1977.

**SUMMARY OF ACCOUNTING PRACTICES**

The following is a summary of accounting practices followed by the Fund. With the exception of the practice of valuing marketable securities at market value rather than at acquisition cost as set out in (b) below, the financial statements have been prepared in accordance with accounting practices generally accepted for non-profit organizations.

- (a) *Investment transactions and income*  
Investment transactions are accounted for on the trade date (date the order to buy or sell is executed).  
Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis.  
Dividend income is recorded on the date of declaration.  
Realized gains and losses from investment transactions are recorded on the transaction date.
- (b) *Valuation*  
The Fund follows the practice of valuing marketable securities at market value rather than at acquisition cost. Adjustments arising thereon are allocated between capital and undistributed income, on the basis of the ratio of capital to undistributed income at the beginning of the year.
- (c) *Depreciation*  
The Fund does not record depreciation on its real estate and other assets.
- (d) *Real estate and other assets*  
Real estate and other assets are recorded at values determined by executors with subsequent additions recorded at cost.

THE COMMITTEE ON HISTORY

*To the Venerable the 103rd General Assembly:*

The Committee on History respectfully submits the following report of its activities during the past year.

**Archives**

In his Annual Report to the Committee, the Archivist, Dr. John S. Moir, notes that a significant amount of material that had accumulated in the Archives in recent years was successfully processed, leaving the way free to initiate several long-term projects within the Archives collection. Church courts and agencies are continuing to respond in a gratifying manner to recommendations of recent General Assemblies regarding the depositing of materials relative to the life and work of the Church within the Archives. Such a response however, means that the present space allotment, which was originally felt to be adequate until 1983, is rapidly being used up, and your Committee considers that it will be necessary to soon initiate exploratory conversations with Knox College regarding the acquisition of additional space. Increasing number of persons, both professional, and from the public at large, are becoming aware of the Archives, and greater use is being made of our facilities as a result.

Acting on the permission granted by the 102nd General Assembly regarding the appointment of a full-time staff person for the Archives to be the Assistant to the Archivist, your Committee appointed a sub-Committee on Archives to deal with this matter, and other related matters concerning the Archives which need immediate attention. Dr. John A. Johnston, who served this Committee for many years with distinction, was appointed Chairman of this sub-Committee. The name of the appointee will be given at the General Assembly.

A private telephone line has been installed in the Archives at the request of Caven Library. This is another indication of increasing usage of our facilities. The number is 1-416-595-1277. Commissioners are invited to visit the Archives while the General Assembly is meeting in Knox College and to view the special displays that have been set up there.

The Committee is concerned that there be better liaison between the Archives and the Church Offices at 50 Wynford Drive, and while not recommending it formally, are suggesting that the Principal Clerk or his appointee might undertake to act in this manner. Further consideration will be given to this matter in the near future.

A "Handbook of Definitions, Policies and Practices" relative to the Archives has been prepared by the Archivist and reviewed by the Committee. With the co-operation of the Board of Congregational Life, it is hoped that this will soon be placed in the hands of all Ministers.

Once again the appreciation of the Church is expressed to the Archivist, Dr. John S. Moir, for his interest and zeal as Archivist of The Presbyterian Church in Canada. Thanks are also extended to the following ladies who have worked part-time in the cataloguing and secretarial work of the Archives - Mrs. E. Fenn and Miss J. E. Mitchell - whose services will terminate with the appointment of the Assistant to the Archivist.

**Presbyterian History**

Two issues of this Newsletter by the Committee on History were produced and circulated to all Ministers in 1976. Additional copies can be made available to interested persons in congregations. Please contact the Secretary of the Committee, the Rev. T. M. Bailey. Much, if not all, of the credit for this publication, must go to the untiring efforts of Mr. Bailey.

**Presbyterian History Prize**

No awards were made in 1976. Submissions from congregations and individuals are always welcome. They should be forwarded to Professor A. L. Farris, c/o The Archives, The Presbyterian Church in Canada, 59 St. George St., Toronto M5S 2E6. Details concerning submissions may be obtained from the Secretary of the Committee.

### Other Historical Publications

All copies of the Centennial volume, "Enduring Witness", by Dr. J. S. Moir, have been sold. Unfortunately the plates were destroyed, making the printing of further copies impossible. Over 800 copies of the biographical volume, "Called to Witness" have been sold. Several hundred copies are still available however, and individuals and congregations are urged to add a copy to their libraries. The manuscripts for Volume II of "Called to Witness" have been written and available for some time now. As much work was done by different writers in preparation, and the Committee feels that the Church could benefit from the publication of Volume II, it has investigated possibilities of printing same, and is recommending to the General Assembly that sufficient funds be made available to finish the task.

### Microfilming

The Archivist has brought to the attention of the Committee that our copies of the Acts and Proceedings in the Archives, along with Church periodicals such as The Presbyterian, the Westminster, and The Presbyterian Record, are in deteriorating condition, due mainly to the poor quality paper on which they are printed, and our present environment. Consistent handling is having damaging results; reproduction by Xerox is becoming increasingly poor. The Committee requests that sufficient funds be made available to either microfilm our present copies, or purchase microfilm copies already available from other Archives.

### The Canadian Society of Presbyterian History

This Society is open to all Ministers and lay persons across the Church who have an interest in Presbyterian History. Details may be obtained from Dr. John S. Moir, 167 Main St. N., Markham, Ontario. The Society will meet at the United Church Archives in Toronto, June 25, 1977, in conjunction with the meeting of the Canadian Methodist Historical Society.

### Miscellaneous

The Committee is concerned with the possibility of implementing a Records Management System at 50 Wynford Drive. Hopefully, a report on this will be ready for consideration at the next General Assembly. Records management systems provide for the orderly preservation/destruction of materials in an organization, and help to reduce bulk, thereby eliminating overhead costs.

### RECOMMENDATION 1. A D C

*That the sum of \$3000 be made available from the funds of the Church for the publication of Volume II of "Called to Witness", and that such work be carried out under the supervision of the Committee on History, proceeds from sales to be returned to the funds of the Church.*

### RECOMMENDATION 2. A D C

*That up to \$3500 be made available from the funds of the Church to the Committee on History to initiate a microfilming programme of the Acts and Proceedings and Church Periodicals in our Archives.*

## REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON HOME RELIGION

*To the Venerable, the 103rd General Assembly:*

Pursuant to the directive of Assembly, 1976, the Committee on Home Religion has conferred with the Board of Congregational Life and has unanimously decided that the Committee be discharged, and its functions taken over by the Board of Congregational Life. A recommendation to this effect will be presented for the

approval of this Assembly by both. The decision of the Committee was made chiefly for the reason that since January 1st, 1971 we have had a partnership in the publishing of THESE DAYS, a partnership that now consists of four Churches of the United States, the United Church of Canada and ourselves. This has relieved us of the writing, editing and printing of our own publication EVERY DAY. We have received magnificent co-operation with the American editor; proofs of forthcoming issues are sent to us for scrutiny, and he takes the occasional suggestion that we make as to words ambiguous in Canada and to make every edition international, rather than American or Canadian. The total circulation of THESE DAYS is over 350,000: of this we subscribe to slightly over 8,000 copies. Canadian writers are used, in numbers far beyond our percentage of the circulation.

A brief history of EVERY DAY, for Assembly records, should be in order at this point.

Our own EVERY DAY was founded October 1st, 1943, under the founding skills and editorship of the late Dr. Norman A. MacEachern. Printing and distributing were done without cost by Presbyterian Publications and Thorn Press. Succeeding editors have been Drs. E. A. Thomson and N. G. Smith, and, in 1968, Dr. L. H. Fowler.

It was evident to the Committee that the MacEachern brothers, Alex and Ian, and latterly Ian, following the death of Alex, for many years personally subsidized EVERY DAY in memory of their father. They smilingly declined to indicate the amount of the subsidy, year by year, but we know it has been very large. The whole Church stands indebted to them.

The circulation of EVERY DAY from 1958 to 1967 was as high as 13,000 each quarter. From 1967 to 1970 it was over 10,000 each quarter.

In 1969 Assembly approved a plan for the work to be done as a joint operation with the Committee on Family Life, which was a joint committee of the Board of Christian Education and the Board of Evangelism and Social Action. Subsequent developments made this plan inapplicable. Postage increases were such that the Committee on Home Religion recommended discontinuance of EVERY DAY at the end of 1969. However, following Assembly, Dr. L. H. Fowler, in a low-key persuasive letter to the postal authorities, succeeded in having the rates lowered, and EVERY DAY continued to the end of 1970. The continuance for one year was condoned by the Assembly of 1970.

The Assembly of 1970 approved a partnership with the Presbyterian Church in the U.S. (South), the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. (North), and the United Church of Christ, all being of the Reformed Faith, in THESE DAYS. EVERY DAY was a quarterly, but THESE DAYS is a bi-monthly. The average circulation of our first year of partnership, 1971, was 9,177 as against an average of 10,465 for EVERY DAY in 1970.

The Assembly of 1970 directed that a report on the cost of subsidizing EVERY DAY be made to the 1972 Assembly. This report was made to the effect that without payment for material, for editorial work or administration the subsidy would have to be from \$3,200 to \$4,000. THESE DAYS, with its large circulation, pays writers ten dollars a page, and maintains a staff. Our guess — we cannot make an estimate — that to put out EVERY DAY now would require, for effective management, a minimum of \$30,000 from the Church yearly. The Chairman will add orally to this Report the difficulties that would lead to a very expensive operation to do our own publishing.

In 1971 the average circulation of THESE DAYS was 9,177; in 1972, 8,663; in 1973, 8,255; in 1974, 8,390; in 1975, 8,178, and in 1976, 8,517.

Dr. E. A. Thomson was Secretary of the Committee from its beginning to 1974, when he resigned, but he has continued as a member of the Committee, giving invaluable counsel out of his long experience. In reality, since the days of Dr. MacEachern, he has been the driving force behind the Committee.

It will be evident from this Report that there is a long list of people, to whom, through the years, we have been indebted. With those already named, we wish to name the editors of *The Presbyterian Record*, and sundry personnel of the Church Offices.

Anticipating the favourable action of this Assembly on our Recommendation 1, we wish to say, with the discharge of the Committee, we give thanks to Almighty

God for His grace through the years, and we pray for the continuance of the Divine gifts as the Board of Congregational Life takes over.

#### RECOMMENDATION 1.

*That the Committee on Home Religion be now discharged and its work continued by the Board of Congregational Life.*

#### RECOMMENDATION 2.

*That thanks be given to the congregations, ministers, and the courts of the Church for their great co-operation, and we ask that they continue this co-operation with the Board of Congregational Life.*

### THE COMMITTEE ON INTER-CHURCH AID, REFUGEE AND WORLD SERVICE

*To the Venerable the 103rd General Assembly:*

#### Contributions

During 1976, contributions from congregations and individuals totalled \$217,902, a 46% increase over 1975. Included in this amount was \$76,021 for victims of the Guatemala earthquakes.

#### Disbursements

The Committee has continued to encourage development projects which enable people in the poorer parts of our world to support themselves. In 1976, grants assisted rehabilitation and development projects in such areas as the Sahel, Lebanon, Nigeria, and Malawi. Our contribution of \$12,500 to the Inter-Church Fund for International Development (ICFID), sponsored by five Canadian Churches: Anglican, Lutheran, Presbyterian, Roman Catholic and United, aided development projects in South America, North and Central Africa, and South-East Asia. Most of these received matching grants from the Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA). One project of special interest to Canadian Presbyterians is the Rural Improvement Mission's 8-Bed Maternity Hospital in Nigeria. The construction of this hospital was made possible by a joint ICFID-CIDA grant of \$22,213.

Emergency grants were made to victims of the war in Angola and earthquakes in Guatemala. We assisted the resettlement of families in Guadeloupe after they had been forced to leave their homes because of a threatened volcanic eruption. Assistance was sent to pastors living and working in Communist countries, as well as to Chilean and Argentinian refugees. Contributions to programmes of the World Alliance of Reformed Churches, the World Council of Churches, and the World Student Christian Federation helped to relieve hardship, to make possible development, and to witness to God's concern for that justice so desperately needed by oppressed people in many parts of His world.

In 1976, the Inter-Church Aid Committee contributed \$5,000 to PLURA, an inter-church fund, which attempts to support self-help development projects among the poor in Canada. Our grant is matched by the Administrative Council.

#### Information & Education

In 1976, the Inter-Church Aid Committee continued to participate in the production of Joint Campaign Committee materials for use during the Lenten period. The theme chosen was "Help Miracles Happen". As in past years, we also promoted the 10 Days for World Development study on the New International Economic Order. In response to requests from clergy and laypeople alike, the Inter-Church Aid Committee produced more material describing the work our contributions have made possible, fact sheets on Bangladesh, Sahel and Sudan, Cal-

cutta, Indo-China Relief, Malawi, and a 1975 financial report. As well, an educational packet on rural development in Nigeria was prepared for distribution and work begun on a film-strip about the Caribbean. The Committee has been gratified by congregational response to these materials. The growing number of requests for educational resources indicates that there is an increasing commitment to development around the world.

Mrs. Marjorie Ross, who has been a member of the Committee since 1971, will leave the Committee this year. She has been responsible for the writing and publication of most of our printed materials over the past several years and has represented our church on various ecumenical committees. Her creative talents and selfless contribution to the work of the Committee will be greatly missed.

#### Administration

Administration expenses for 1976 totalled \$13,458.69 or 6% of contributions. These expenses include the costs of meetings, the production and mailing of educational materials, and secretarial services. 5% of the funds received from CIDA for projects has been used to pay some of the salary of our full-time administrative assistant.

#### Government Grants

In cooperation with the Board of World Mission, the Inter-Church Aid Committee has continued to seek matching grants from the Federal Government's Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA), as well as from the international development funds of the provinces of Alberta and Saskatchewan. During CIDA's 1976-77 fiscal year, The Presbyterian Church in Canada received \$92,000 in matching grants. These grants were used to fund such projects as an irrigation and job-training programme in Jobat, India, a public health scheme at Barwani (also in India), and a Maternity Hospital in rural Nigeria. Approval for matching grants of \$14,300 has been received from the Saskatchewan government and we await the decision of the Alberta government on submissions totalling \$32,300.

In conclusion, the Committee on Inter-Church Aid, Refugee and World Service wishes to thank all those who have supported our work in 1976. We pray that you will continue to do so in 1977 in order that we may effectively carry out the mandate which has been given us: to clothe the naked, to feed the hungry, and to seek justice for the oppressed.

#### RECOMMENDATION 1. A

*That the General Assembly authorize the annual special appeal in 1978 for the work of Inter-Church Aid, Refugee and World Service, and request all ministers and Kirk Sessions to encourage and foster the support of their congregations.*

### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON INTER-CHURCH RELATIONS

*To the Venerable the 103rd General Assembly:*

The Inter-Church Relations Committee begs to report the following:

#### VISIT OF THE MODERATOR OF THE WALDENSIAN CHURCH

In co-operation with the United Church we have been planning for over a year to receive Rev. Aldo Shaffi, Moderator of the Waldensian Church, Italy, as a guest to our denominations. At the time of writing this report the visit is still in the future, but meetings are being planned in the Toronto and Montreal areas, and especially with Italian congregations.

#### BUDGET TO ECUMENICAL COUNCILS

Although our Church has not increased its budget to the Canadian Council of Churches, and the World Council of Churches, for some years, a 20% increase was

made to the former in 1976, and a 20% increase to both Councils in 1977. We are still considerably below the amounts requested as our fair share of the total budget of these two Councils.

#### LITERATURE TO COMMISSIONERS

Arrangements are being made to include copies of "The Reformed World", the publication of the World Alliance; and "The Communicator", the publication of the Canadian Council; in the commissioners' packet. It is hoped that some will be interested enough to subscribe to these publications. The former may be ordered through the office of Dr. D. Rayner.

#### REPRESENTATIVES ON ECUMENICAL COUNCILS

Last Fall the Secretary of this Committee, Dr. Donald C. MacDonald, was nominated as Treasurer of the North American and Caribbean Area Council of the World Alliance of Reformed Churches, and this nomination is expected to be confirmed by the Assembly of the World Alliance meeting in August of this year in St. Andrews, Scotland.

Dr. William Klempa, Recording Secretary of the North American and Caribbean Area, has been nominated to the Executive of the World Alliance, but the result of the ballot has not been announced at the time of the writing of this report.

#### WORLD COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

Mrs. Heather Johnston, Chairman of this Committee, was appointed a member of the Central Committee of the World Council of Churches. Mrs. Johnston reports as follows:

The first full meeting of the Central Committee since the Assembly in Nairobi was held in Geneva at the headquarters of the World Council of Churches August 10-18, 1976. The chapel of the Ecumenical Center resounded to the singing of the 130 members of the Central Committee representing 280 churches scattered through some 100 countries. Archbishop Scott's Moderator's report set the tone for the coming ten days of long and often tiresome discussion and deliberation. His pastoral concern for both the people and the work was clearly expressed in this presentation and during all the sessions he moderated.

The General Secretary, Dr. Philip Potter, unanimously re-elected for a further five-year term, took up his report where he had left off in Nairobi, re-iterating the imagery of the Wilderness. "As Abraham's pilgrim people of God we are called to make real on our time the covenant fellowship of sharing and offering the life of God to all families of the earth. That is the 'raison d'etre' of the ecumenical movement."

During the ten days of meetings we had to decide the overall thrust of the Council's activities for the next several years. To aid us in this, a Review Committee of twelve men and women had worked for several months and the results of their mammoth task helped us zero in our responsibilities and were subjected to critical scrutiny. Four programme thrusts were proposed:

- the expression and communication of our faith in the triune God.
- the search for a just, participatory and sustainable society.
- the unity of the Church and its relation to the unity of humanity.
- education and renewal in search of true community.

In addition the Review Committee suggested two "operational emphases"

- (1) more intensive participation by member Churches and Christian communities in the life of the WCC,
- (2) interaction between theological reflection and action in the total work of the Council.

Cameras were clicking and lights flashing during Mr. Potter's report and ensuing discussion on "Human Rights". The Fifth Assembly had given the General Secretary the mandate "to see to it that the question of religious liberty be the subject of intensive consultation with the member churches in the signatory states of the Helsinki Agreement - that the first report be presented at the next Central Committee meeting". Dr. Potter recommended the following concrete steps:

- a. An advisory group on human rights within CCIA (Commission of the Churches on International Affairs) to be set up.
- b. European and North American member churches to establish their own group to "promote study and frequent encounters among churches" on issues of human rights and religious liberty.

One of the longest plenary sessions dealt with the future of the Ecumenical Institute at Bossey. The widespread spontaneous support for the work of Bossey seems to speak for a need to continue and the Central Committee approved this continuation.

The year ending December 31, 1975 found the WCC with a deficit of S. Fr. 731,763.68 (U.S. \$1.00 = S.Fr. 2.45). This deficit was charged to the "Special Reserve" created from surpluses in former years, a fund now exhausted. The motion "to adopt a unified plan of finance as a basic policy under which the seeking of general and *undesigned* support for the work of the whole Council is made the principal emphasis of all Council fund raising" was unanimously carried. The Finance Committee noted with profound appreciation that there has been an increase in giving by member churches in 1976.

Of special interest to us as Canadians is the discussion on the New York Office of the WCC. Dr. Charles Long had proposed a North American Regional office for the WCC. These discussions are still in progress.

The above are but a few of the extensive, colourful scala of topics and programmes discussed at the Central Committee. We shall meet again in Geneva July 28 to August 6, 1977.

Mr. Brian Fraser, Chairman of the N.A. and C.A.A. of R.C., reports as follows:

#### NORTH AMERICAN AND CARIBBEAN AREA COUNCIL, WORLD ALLIANCE OF REFORMED CHURCHES (PRESBYTERIAN AND CONGREGATIONAL)

The North American and Caribbean Area Council met at Princeton Theological Seminary, Princeton, N.J., September 1-3, 1976. Our Church was represented by Dr. D. C. MacDonald, Dr. W. J. Klempa, the Rev. D. L. Campbell, Mr. K. Hall, and Mr. B. Fraser.

The Committee on Cooperation and Witness reported on the continuing interchanges among member churches, noting with gratification the conversations underway between the United Church of Canada and The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

The Theological Committee pointed out the diversity of the social, economic, geographical, political and cultural contexts from which the seventeen member churches came and suggested that our unity was found in the great tradition of the church catholic, "Reformed according to the word of God", which grew out of the work of Calvin and Zwingli. That tradition sees the mission of the Church as a three dimensional task: the Word forms and reforms the Church, the Spirit drives us out into the world, and the situation in the world drives us back to the Word, which promises to reform us, our theology, our structures and our forms of ministry. The committee's work over the past year was planned in preparation for the Centennial Consultation of the World Alliance at St. Andrews in 1977 where the theme is "The Glory of God and the Future of Man". Dr. G. S. Hendry of Princeton Theological Seminary delivered an address to the Area Council on that topic. The World Alliance's publication, *Reformed World*, was commended to those wishing to follow the discussion.

The Committee on Civil and Religious Liberties presented a thoughtful and provocative paper by Dr. Charles C. West of Princeton Theological Seminary on "The Christian in Business" that initiated a long discussion of the question of the power and effects of the multi-national corporations on civil and religious liberties. A resolution was also passed expressing strong disapproval of the denial of civil and religious liberties in South Korea.

The resignation of Dr. James I. McCord as Secretary of the Area Council was accepted with regrets, and James E. Andrews of The Presbyterian Church, U.S., was

elected to the position, pending worldwide confirmation. Dr. D. C. MacDonald of The Presbyterian Church in Canada was elected to replace Dr. Andrews as Treasurer of the Area Council, again pending worldwide confirmation. Other officers are: the Reverend R. Stanley Wood, Second Cumberland Presbyterian Church, Chairman; Dr. James Oldshue, Reformed Church in America, Vice-Chairman; Dr. W. J. Klempa, The Presbyterian Church in Canada, Recording Clerk; and Dr. F. H. Heinze, The United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A., Director of Information.

In remarks concerning the future program of the Alliance, Dr. McCord drew attention to the continuing theological function which the Alliance performed, a function needed more now than ever in order to recover from what Dr. McCord called our "theological amnesia." The Alliance provided fellowship, cooperation and mutual support and witness, a function which became increasingly important as political freedom eroded in many parts of the world.

#### REPORT ON CANADIAN COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

In the fourteen months since the 3rd Triennial Assembly of the Canadian Council of Churches work has been carried forward both by the Council Structure and the member Churches on the resolutions passed and the direction set by that body. Those which pertain to social issues: Lotteries, Northern and Indian Affairs, Capital Punishment, Liquor Legislation, Employment and Education, were referred to our Board of Congregational Life and their report reflects the direction of their study and action.

Others pertained to the work and purview of the Board of World Mission: Chile, China, Canadian Native Peoples, Quebec, CIDA and issues researched by GATT FLY.

These are also under study, researching the large issues involved and also how these concerns affect the work in which we participate on an on-going basis. These issues are recurring themes in their reports.

Some other resolutions affect the life and operation of the Council itself and their General Board and Executive Committee have placed these items on their agendas. Between Assemblies the General Board which meets twice yearly carries on all business, while the Executive meets more frequently.

Since the resolutions have been channelled into responsible bodies for consideration and action, the insight and concerns generated and gathered together by the Triennial Assembly have been furthered. This consultation process is beneficial for the cross-pollination of the ideas and coordination of action on the part of the member churches.

#### CONVERSATIONS WITH THE UNITED CHURCH OF CANADA

Dr. D.J.M. Corbett, who succeeded Dr. Joe McLelland as Chairman of our delegation holding conversations with The United Church of Canada, reports as follows:

1. The Special Committee to meet with representatives of the General Council of The United Church of Canada was appointed by authority of the 1975 General Assembly through the Inter-Church Relations Committee, and continued during this past year, as follows: Wilfred Butcher, Donald Corbett, Allan Farris, Heather Johnston, William Klempa, Donald MacDonald, Lorne Mackay, Joseph McLelland, George Malcolm, DeCourcy Rayner, and Stanford Reid. During the past year Dr. DeCourcy Rayner was Secretary of the discussions.
2. Three meetings were held: October 1-2, February 5-6, and April 22-23. The meetings sought increased understanding of each other, of our

common origins, and considered ways of cooperation and service. There is no consideration of organic union. It is apparent that organic union is not the contemporary model for ecumenism. Rather, we have sought out ways of effective joint action in Christian Service.

#### RECOMMENDATION 1. A

- (a) That the two national agencies of the Presbyterian and United Churches responsible for home and world mission appoint a joint sub-committee to explore ways and means of cooperation.
- (b) That joint study-and-action groups be formed at the Presbytery level, and that Presbyteries of both churches be encouraged to meet on occasion at the same time and place for fellowship and such joint action as they may determine.
- (c) That exchange of fraternal representatives in agencies and courts at regional and national levels be encouraged.
- (d) That these discussions be continued.

#### THE COMMITTEE ON INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS

*To the Venerable the 103rd General Assembly:*

The Committee on International Affairs gratefully reports that the death sentence of Chul Hyum Kin has been commuted to life imprisonment.

Your committee participated in the annual Churchpersons' Seminar, Ottawa, affirming that Human Rights is a matter of utmost priority yet realizing that dealing with Human Rights Violations is a delicate and complex matter. Many Third World Countries place national security and economic needs before Human Rights issues attaching a greater priority to the duties of citizens than to their rights. To recommend that our Government suspend aid to countries violating Human Rights creates the dilemma of whether a project, such as a new cement plant or an irrigation scheme benefits the people or simply serves the aims of a repressive regime. Further, a continuing debate is whether or not to suggest that the Government draft legislation to prevent individuals or companies from business dealings with countries who violate the restrictions imposed by the United Nations.

Your committee requested that the Administrative Council provide \$1,300 to the Inter Church Committee on Human Rights in Latin America.

The Committee on International Affairs was informed by the Secretary of State for External Affairs that Canada joined in co-sponsoring a resolution for a special session of the United Nations on disarmament to be held in 1978. Further, we were assured that Canada is a staunch supporter of the Non-Proliferation Treaty and its associated system of safeguards administered by the International Atomic Energy Agency. Our Government, before entering into any contracts to supply nuclear material, equipment or Technology to non-nuclear weapon states, would insist that such recipients either be parties to the Non-Proliferation Treaty or otherwise make a binding international commitment not to produce nuclear weapons and accept IAEA administered safeguards on their whole nuclear programmes.

#### RECOMMENDATION 1. A

That the General Assembly authorize the allocation of \$3,000 for the work of the Committee on International Affairs in 1978.

## REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MINISTRY

To the Venerable the 103rd General Assembly:

The second operational year of the Board of Ministry has seen a rapid expansion in the use being made of its services.

*Personnel Services* to vacant congregations increased significantly during the year. A survey of the period March to November 1976 revealed that approximately 75% of interim moderators were in correspondence with the Board about profile forms of ministers willing to consider relocation, and the profiles of 50% of the ministers inducted during that period had been sent to the interim moderators as potential candidates.

*Continuing Education.* The Board of Ministry sees its role in continuing education as follows:

- (a) Assistance to individuals planning their own continuing education in assessing professional needs, and determining objectives and in choosing appropriate resources.
- (b) Financial support to supplement the contributions of the individual and the congregation or employer.
- (c) Information for continuing educators of the needs of our professional church workers since it is not the role of the Board of Ministry to sponsor continuing education courses.

The regulations governing the continuing education funds were revised in the light of the Board's experience and the changing needs of the Church's professional leadership. The two major highlights of the revision are:

- (a) Criteria have been established for the approval of institutions and courses warranting grants.
- (b) The specified maximum total of grants to one eligible person over any five-year period has now been set at \$1,000.00. It was previously \$750.00 for an unspecified period of time.

The full text of the revision of continuing education regulations has been sent to each presbytery, and is available upon request.

*Goodfellow Scholarship Funds.* Mr. Sampson J. Goodfellow has established two scholarship funds for students preparing for the ministry or diaconate of The Presbyterian Church in Canada, in memory of his wife and mother respectively. One fund is for women students and the other is for men students. The capital of each is about \$30,000.00. Applications for grants may be obtained by writing the Board of Ministry office.

An up-to-date list of bursaries available to students for church leadership is in process of preparation and will soon be available for those interested.

Presbytery consultations continue to be a major source of guidance for the various programs of the Board. By the time of the General Assembly only seven presbyteries will remain to be consulted in the three-year program of consultations which ends on December 31st of this year.

*Guidance Conferences for Candidates for the Ministry of Word and Sacrament.* Three initial conferences have been planned from the time of writing until the 1978 General Assembly when a full report will be given. The first conference is scheduled for Aurora, Ontario April 24-26, 1977, after this report has gone to the printer. A verbal report will be given to the General Assembly.

The second conference is planned for the Montreal area in the second week of January, 1978, and it is hoped that the third will be held in Saskatoon in the spring of 1978.

These initial conferences will each be made up of volunteer candidates (normally eighteen in each case) and a staff of five. A full description of the process is contained in the Acts and Proceedings of the 102nd General Assembly, pages 351-355 and 49.

*Employment of Retired Ministers.* A number of retired ministers are currently employed in self-supporting congregations on a full-time or part-time basis. The only guidelines for remuneration are in the regulations of the Board of World Mission for aid-receiving charges (Acts and Proceedings of the 1971 General Assembly, page 207, recommendation 5, as subsequently amended). These regulations do not provide a policy for full-time pastoral service by retired ministers, nor for regular changes in the stipend and allowances in line with those of other ministers.

#### RECOMMENDATION 1. A

*That the basic stipend without increments be the minimum stipend for retired ministers in full-time ministries, and that this be prorated for part-time service on the basis of a six-day week, e.g., 2/3 of basic stipend for four days and 1/2 of basic stipend for three days; plus travel and mileage allowances normally applicable, and manse or equivalent.*

*Vancouver School of Theology.* A study in consultation with the Synod of British Columbia, of the implications and possible forms of participation in the V.S.T. has continued throughout the past year. Discussions have been held with presbyteries in British Columbia and Alberta and with the Principal, Chancellor and Chairman of the Board of V.S.T. A proposed basis of discussion has been offered by these officers of the school. Following study of this document and further consultation with Western Synods, the Board of Ministry will consider the matter again at its 1978 annual meeting.

*The Institutional Chaplaincies Committee* consulted with the Board of Ministry in the light of the action of the 102nd General Assembly (pages 398, recommendation 3, and page 53). Agreement was reached on the constitutional changes to the structure of the Board of Ministry that would be required for the Institutional Chaplaincies Committee to become a standing committee of the Board.

#### RECOMMENDATION 2. A

*That the Institutional Chaplaincies Committee become a committee of the Board of Ministry.*

#### RECOMMENDATION 3. C

*That the membership of the Board of Ministry be increased by three persons and that the constitution of the Board be revised as follows:*

*The membership of the Board shall consist of:*

*15 members to be appointed by the General Assembly chosen to ensure regional representation;*

*7 of whom shall be pastoral ministers;*

*3 of whom shall be professional church workers who need not be pastoral ministers, at least one of these being a deaconess. At least one of the above ten shall be knowledgeable or experienced in the field of Institutional Chaplaincies,*

*and at least one shall be knowledgeable or experienced in the field of the Canadian Forces Chaplaincy;*

*5 of whom shall be laymen or laywomen not employed by the Church.*

#### RECOMMENDATION 4. C

*That the constitution of the Institutional Chaplaincies Committee be as follows:*

*(i) 1 member of the Board of Ministry who shall be named as chairman.*

*(ii) 5 members who may or may not be members of the Board of Ministry to be chosen for their knowledge and understanding of the area and approved by the Board.*

*(iii) 1 representative each of the Pension Board, the Board of Congregational Life, the Board of World Mission, the Armed Forces Chaplaincy Committee, members by correspondence as required, the General Secretary as a non-voting member.*

*The Canadian Forces Chaplaincy Committee* has requested "to be associated with the Board of Ministry," in response to the action of the 102 General Assembly (page 52). The Board has conferred with representatives of the Canadian Forces Chaplaincy Committee and as a result makes the following recommendation:

#### RECOMMENDATION 5. A

*That the principle of the Canadian Forces Chaplaincy Committee being in association with the Board of Ministry be approved, and that the form of this association be worked out between these two agencies, for recommendation to next year's General Assembly.*

*Sabbaticals and Study Leaves.* The Executive Personnel Committee of the Administrative Council asked all Boards of the Church to study this matter and in particular that committee's interim proposals on the subject. The Board decided to make its own recommendations to the General Assembly.

#### RECOMMENDATION 6. C

*That the principle of sabbatical leaves in every area of ministry be approved.*

#### RECOMMENDATION 7. C

*That the need be recognized for separate models for sabbatical leaves in the light of precedent, the character of the ministry, and the resources available.*

#### RECOMMENDATION 8. C

*In the case of pastoral ministries, the current minimum of 2-week annual study leaves may be accumulated for a maximum of 5 years and that this be non-transferable.*

#### RECOMMENDATION 9. A

*That congregations be advised to establish a separate continuing education reserve fund into which the cost of 2 weeks' supply plus a minimum of \$200.00 expenses be deposited annually.*

#### RECOMMENDATION 10. A

*That aid-receiving congregations should indicate this reserve fund clearly in their budgets so that it does not affect their grants.*

#### RECOMMENDATION 11. C

*That the principles outlined in Recommendations 8 and 9 shall apply to deaconesses in congregations.*

#### RECOMMENDATION 12. C

*That the governing bodies of the colleges and the boards be asked to develop their own models; and that deaconesses employed by the national boards be included in this policy.*

*The Joint Committee on the Financial Support for Church Ministries.* The 1977 meeting of this committee noted that since this committee was inaugurated in 1973, a number of changes in church structure have occurred which fulfil the intent of the creation of this committee. Specifically, the Administrative Council now publishes salary scales in the minutes of the General Assembly, an Executive Personnel Committee of the Administrative Council has been established, and there is now a formula for across-the-board changes in remuneration.

## RECOMMENDATION 13. A

*That the terms of reference of the Board of Ministry be amended to delete the requirement of calling a meeting of this committee in the future.*

OVERTURE NO. 3, 1976, PRESBYTERY OF VANCOUVER ISLAND,  
RE CLERGYMEN AND INCOME TAX.

The Board of Ministry has agreed to seek to implement the intent of this Overture. To this end a first step was the preparation of a letter on the subject of "Housing and your Income Tax" addressed to professional church workers who are entitled to income-tax-free housing. The Board has consulted with representatives of other churches and is seeking to produce further documents ecumenically.

## RECOMMENDATION 14. A

*That the statement contained in the above paragraph be the reply to Overture 3, 1976.*

OVERTURE NO. 10, 1976, PRESBYTERY OF KOOTENAY,  
RE PROCEDURE FOR NOMINATING PERSONS TO FILL VACANT  
CHURCH COLLEGE FACULTY CHAIRS

The Presbytery of Kootenay requests that a committee of the Assembly receive and screen nominations for college faculty vacancies which would in turn nominate to the General Assembly. This committee would be geographically representative and made up of laymen, ministers and one representative of the Senate of the College which has the vacancy.

The accepted practice of the Church provides an opportunity for presbyteries to suggest names to the Board of the college, which nominates to the General Assembly. The Assembly may approve the nomination or refer the matter back to the college for another nomination.

The following observations are offered:

1. The colleges are in the best position to know the requirements of the positions and who is qualified and available.
2. The colleges ought to seek the best possible candidates whether or not they are suggested by one or more presbyteries.
3. The colleges ought not to be at the mercy of popularity contests in the appointment of professors.
4. Accreditation by the Association of Theological Schools in the United States and Canada requires that the colleges have primary control over their faculty appointments. The graduates of non-accredited institutions are at a severe disadvantage if they seek to do post-graduate degree studies elsewhere. A college without accreditation would also be at a disadvantage by jeopardizing its network of ecumenical relationships, which provides library and teaching resources not available to a college without this type of affiliation.
5. The colleges welcome nominations from presbyteries. In addition they look to the Church for help in their own understanding of the goals and functions of the ministry and how curricula may best be designed in order to fulfil these goals.
6. The Overture virtually eliminates the theological institution as a major factor in the appointment of its own faculty.
7. The Overture excludes consideration of applicants not nominated.
8. The preamble to the Overture claims that there is considerable dissatisfaction within our Church with the method of nominating persons to fill college faculty chairs, which claim is not borne out by the voting in recent assemblies on the appointment of professors.

## RECOMMENDATION 15. A

*That the Overture No. 10, 1976 be not granted.*

*Pulpit Vacancies.* There has been a marked drop in the number of pulpit vacancies over the past year. In March of 1976 there were 68 vacancies and one year later at the time of writing there are 34 vacancies, a 50% reduction. This

follows a steady reduction throughout the year and a large reduction resulting from the recent appointments of the Board of World Mission. The vacancy rate can be expected to rise again for the remainder of the year as retirements from the active ministry take place.

*Task Force Concerning Deaconesses.* This task force of the Board has been working with a sub-committee of the Church Doctrine Committee in a continued study of the ordained diaconate. The report on their findings will be included in the report of the Church Doctrine Committee, which will seek to clarify some of the practical questions raised by presbyteries concerning an ordained diaconate.

*Review Procedures.* The Board was instructed by the 1973 General Assembly (A. & P., p. 455) to "make a thorough review of its structures and operations during its third year of existence and report to the General Assembly". This being the year for the major review, a committee was created at the annual meeting of the Board charged with effecting this review. A report on the matter will be made to the 1978 General Assembly.

## REPORT OF THE PENSION BOARD

To the Venerable the 103rd General Assembly:

During the past year there have been two meetings of the Pension Board, on October 14, 1976 and April 1, 1977.

The information booklet concerning pensions and group insurance for Ministers was distributed to all participating Ministers. An outline of regulations of the Retirement Plan for Church Employees was also prepared.

It was found possible to continue for 1977, the supplements to pension for those retired Ministers (and widows) who do not receive significant benefits under the Canada Pension or the Quebec Pension Plans. Continuation of these payments depends on the receipt of further gifts and bequests.

The Pension Board recommended and the Administrative Council agreed, that the maximum annual stipend to be considered for purposes of the Ministers' Pension Plan be \$13,000 effective January 1, 1977.

A change was made in the Employees Retirement Plan, to provide that under the terms of the former plan there will be full vesting of the Employer's contributions after ten years service in the event that a withdrawing employee leaves his/her contributions in the fund.

An actuarial valuation is to be made of the Employees Retirement Fund as at December 31, 1977 to comply with government requirements.

A meeting was held with representatives of Canada Life to review that Company's stewardship with respect to the investment portfolio of the Pension Fund. Members representing the Board were Mr. Barbour, Mr. Winhold and the Chairman. Administration was felt to be satisfactory.

During 1976 the amount paid for the purchase of annuities was substantially greater than that for 1975 (\$926,516 versus \$523,010). As a result, there was only \$336,654 available for new investment, compared with \$661,298 in 1975.

There was improvement in security markets during 1976 so the market value of the fund set aside to purchase pensions for members increased by \$755,510 to a total of \$7,349,677.

Overture #11 to the 1976 General Assembly was referred to the Pension Board. The Board has considered the matter and offers as reply the following:

"This overture proposes, in effect, a reversion to the basis of the former plan which had been found inadequate and unsatisfactory.

It was after careful study that the new plan was introduced in 1974, and it was adopted only after general approval had been obtained throughout the Church. The Board does not feel that the change proposed would be desirable and acceptable to the members."

With approval of the Administrative Council, the Pension Board and its staff assumed responsibility for the administration of the Ministers' Group Insurance Plan. We are also pleased to note that Miss Diane Jamieson began taking care of the office administration for the Pension Board during 1976.

### RECOMMENDATION 1. A

The change in maximum stipend for the plan be approved.

### RECOMMENDATION 2. A

The amendment to vesting of benefits in the former plan for church employees be approved.

### RECOMMENDATION 3. C

The response of the Board to overture #11 be approved.

### RECOMMENDATION 4. A

Appreciation of the service of Miss Jamieson and Dr. MacDonald be recorded.

## THE REPORT OF THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH BUILDING CORPORATION

To the Venerable, The 103rd General Assembly:

The Presbyterian Church Building Corporation serves the Church in two main areas:

- a) By helping congregations and organizations in their financial arrangements when they are faced with the erection of a new structure or in making improvements to their present buildings.
- b) By assisting ministers, missionaries, deaconesses, and their spouses to secure housing accommodation upon their retirement.

The congregations, numbering 44, with outstanding debentures or guaranteed bank loans, continue to enjoy a favourable rate of interest.

Seven congregations are in arrears in payments to a total of \$47,470, which is a net reduction of \$26,402, for the year.

The Corporation records its thanks to the congregations for their efforts to meet their obligations and also to those Presbyteries which have come to the aid of congregations in default.

During 1976 the Corporation was happy to make a loan to the Synod of Toronto and Kingston to enable it to facilitate the sale of Glen Mhor Camp and negotiate the purchase of a new Camp Site.

In the matter of housing for our retired servants, thirteen ministers have made inquiries regarding housing accommodation at retirement. Some of these will not retire for a few years. The Corporation is concerned for all of them. With splendid co-operation from the congregation, the Manse at Vankleek Hill, Ontario, has been made available for a retired minister and his wife. In Brantford, Ontario, a house has been purchased and another retired minister and his wife are settled there.

The Directors of the Corporation record their thanks to Mrs. William Ewing of Vankleek Hill and Mrs. Grace Bruner of Brantford for their service to the Corporation and the retired ministers in their respective communities. Appreciation is also expressed to the Rev. J. K. MacLeod, the Rev. J. D. Gordon and Dr. and Mrs. G. D. Johnston for their valuable assistance to the Corporation in helping our retired servants.

There are a number of ways in which the Corporation can help our ministers, missionaries and deaconesses, who are facing difficulties as they approach retirement, and such are invited to contact the General Manager.

If we are to provide adequately for our retired servants, gifts in the form of money or real estate are necessary and the Directors would be grateful for any assistance from individuals or congregations. We are happy to acknowledge an anonymous gift of \$2,000 which was received from an individual this year.

It is with deep regret we record the death of a great churchman and one of our directors, Dr. John Logan-Vencta, O.B.E. Dr. Logan-Vencta gave outstanding leadership in church extension in the Presbytery of Ottawa and was a director of the Corporation of the Presbytery of Ottawa before becoming a director of this Corporation. His wise counsel and deep concern will be greatly missed. We express our deepest sympathy to his wife and family.

### RECOMMENDATION 1. A

That Mr. D. M. Walker, C.A., Dr. G. D. Johnston, M.B.E., Mr. R. Thomson, Mr. G. O. Huggan, C.A., Dr. A. F. MacSween, ex officio and Dr. R. G. MacMillan, ex officio be elected directors of the Corporation for the next four year term.

### RECOMMENDATION 2. A

That The Rev. W. I. McElwain, M.A., Th.M., and Mr. J. B. Barbour, A.C.W.A., ex officio, be elected directors of the Corporation for one year.

### RECOMMENDATION 3. A

That congregations and individuals be encouraged to assist The Presbyterian Church Building Corporation in every way possible in its program to help ministers, missionaries, deaconesses, and their spouses to secure housing accommodation at the time of retirement.

### RECOMMENDATION 4. A

That congregations be urged to provide funds to enable their minister to invest in a Registered Retirement Savings Plan and/or a Registered Home Ownership Savings Plan and, in this way, help him/her to plan financially for retirement housing.

## THE PRESBYTERIAN RECORD

To the Venerable the 103rd General Assembly:

The past year has been a busy one for the Executive of The Record Committee. Two major matters were under consideration: the printing of the magazine and the nomination to the General Assembly of a new editor. Fortunately, the Executive of six members includes three experienced journalists and one graphic arts specialist, persons competent to make decisions on both of these matters.

From January, 1977 onwards The Record has been printed by Web Offset Publications in Don Mills, Ont., not far from the church offices. We are using a somewhat lower grade of paper in an effort to keep the price down, although costs are rising in all areas of production.

The last General Assembly gave Rev. Dr. DeCourcy H. Rayner permission to retire as editor effective December 31, 1977. Eleven persons were nominated by presbyteries for the position and there was one application as well. Three of those who were nominated withdrew their names.

The Executive made a careful study of the qualifications of all candidates, and granted personal interviews to four of them. Their recommendation was accepted and endorsed by The Record Committee, and is part of our report as given below.

The committee would emphasize the major role played by Miss Valerie Dunn in the production, design and lay-out of The Record. She is a writer, a photographer, an artist and the assistant editor, with sole responsibility for the lay-out and design of the magazine each month. Because of her skills and competence, we are asking that her status on the staff be raised to assistant secretary, and a recommendation to that effect follows.

Our figure for deliveries to the post office shows 1,437 fewer subscribers in March, 1977. The average circulation for the first three months of this year is 89,070.

Your committee is seriously considering an increase in the price of subscriptions. At present we charge \$3.00 per year and only \$1.50 on the Every Home Plan. Postage went up again in April of this year, and other costs are rising constantly.

Meanwhile we ask that presbyteries support The Record in its promotion of the Every Home Plan. The last General Assembly provided for regular visitation by presbyteries to each congregation. On that visitation inquiry might be made concerning the congregation's relationship to the Every Home Plan.

When he retires Dr. Rayner will have served for more than 19 years as editor of our national magazine. We are all familiar with his work in that capacity. He has also served on a number of the Assembly's committees, often as secretary over an extended period of time. Dr. Rayner is well known beyond the bounds of our church, particularly in the World Alliance of Reformed Churches. For two years he was president of the Associated Church Press, a North American organization of religious publications. He has served on the executive and for a term as president of the Canadian Church Press. In addition to his duties as editor he has acted as information officer for The Presbyterian Church in Canada. Those of us who have had the privilege of working closely with him admire his self-discipline when misinterpreted and his patience with those who do not appreciate the complexities of an editor's responsibilities. The members of our committee thank God for the way in which Dr. Rayner's talents have been used so wisely and well in the service of the church. May he continue to minister effectively in whatever field of service he may choose in the future.

An overture from the Presbytery of Edmonton (No. 14, 1977) proposing that The Presbyterian Record and the Communication Services department be combined was considered by The Record Committee. This is not a new idea, it has been put forward and carefully considered before being rejected previously. Your committee points out that an amalgamation of the kind proposed would be costly because extra staff would be needed. We are quite satisfied with the present arrangement and cannot see any advantage in placing both departments under one director.

#### RECOMMENDATION 1. A

That the Rev. James Ross Dickey, B.A., B.D. be appointed editor of The Presbyterian Record effective January 1, 1978.

#### RECOMMENDATION 2. A

That Mr. Dickey be appointed editor-elect effective September 1, 1977, with the full salary of editor, to provide for a familiarization period.

#### RECOMMENDATION 3. C

That the assistant editor, Miss Valerie M. Dunn, be classified as an assistant secretary for salary purposes effective July 1, 1977.

#### RECOMMENDATION 4. A

That on presbyterial visitations all congregations be asked whether or not they subscribe through the Every Home Plan, and that the advantages of that plan, if the answer is in the negative, be pointed out.

#### RECOMMENDATION 5. A

That our answer to overture #14 from the Presbytery of Edmonton be that The Record Committee, for reasons given above, opposes any amalgamation with the Communication Services Committee.

The demand for accommodation at "Pres Res" is still pressing. Once again 1976 found all the rooms filled for the Spring and Fall terms. Since we need space for the Youth Conference at the end of June, we do not fill the Residence with summer students.

In addition to small group meetings, the Summer Synod Youth Conference and the Ministers' Conference are the main summer events at the Residence. We keep enough summer students to justify keeping the valuable kitchen help employed part-time and the doors open.

The project for the fall of 1976 was a program of renovation for the Manse, which had been rented for the past 12 years. We opened the Manse as an annex to "Pres Res". The plan seems to be popular, and the Board are considering using the Manse for girls attending University of Saskatchewan. Such action is the result of many suggestions and requests to give some thought to housing accommodation for girls attending the University of Saskatchewan.

1977 will find us using funds on hand to add further improvements to the Manse. We are grateful to a number of interested folk who have assisted in many ways in the renovation program.

The early founders of "Pres Res" will be pleased to learn that each year we have at least one candidate preparing for the Christian Ministry and this fall Henry Hildebrandt will be entering Presbyterian College, Montreal, for his theological training.

## REPORT OF ST. ANDREW'S HALL, VANCOUVER, B.C.

To the Venerable the 103rd General Assembly:

Your Board reports a good year of service and witness at St. Andrew's Hall, our Church's residence on the campus of the University of British Columbia. The Dean reports that this year has been one of the best ever. The quality of the students in residence, and of our competent staff has brought about a high quality of life in and around the residence. The chapel-centred activities have been most encouraging. Eleven new members were added to the communicants role at University Hill Presbyterian Church.

We were again fortunate to have the residence fully occupied throughout the academic year and during the months May to August. The high occupancy is in large part due to the efforts of Dean Ross. We look forward, with hope, to a continuance of full occupancy though this is never sure in these days of economic stress and increasing fees at the University.

St. Andrew's Hall enjoys a continuing cordial relationship with Vancouver School of Theology. While the question of possible participation of the Presbyterian Church in Canada in The Vancouver School of Theology is being studied by the Board of Ministry, the Board of St. Andrew's Hall would not consider merging our physical assets with those of the Vancouver School of Theology.

During the year only the most necessary maintenance to the Hall and Residence has been undertaken. Rather extensive maintenance work will have to be carried out this summer.

The audited statement is attached for our fiscal year ending 31 August 1976. It shows an operating deficit of \$3,508.50. However, it should be noted that only \$10,000 of the \$14,000 operating grant had been requested at 31 August 1976. It is evident that the \$14,000 operating grant is a realistic figure.

St. Andrew's Hall continues to be a good witness of the Presbyterian Church in Canada on the campus at the University of British Columbia. The continuing high esteem of St. Andrew's Hall both on the campus and throughout the Church is in good part due to Dean Ross' guidance and his various activities as Presbyterian Chaplain at the University.

RE: A FORUM ON THE CHURCH IN THE WORLD**

*To the Venerable the 103rd General Assembly:*

The terms of reference for this Special Committee are to be found in *Acts and Proceedings, 1976*, page 399, recommendation 2.

The Committee has met twice since its appointment and has begun to discuss the relationship among the Boards and Committees involved and also to look at specific issues in the area of the church in the world. As instructed, we have initiated discussion concerning the need for this type of committee. To date, no firm conclusions have been determined.

The interest and co-operation of the various Boards and Committees has been an encouragement to your Committee as we have taken steps to provide a meaningful forum in which church-society relationships may be discussed. We are hopeful that future meetings will provide us with sufficient experience and knowledge to present an on-going proposal to the next Assembly.

In light of the important implications for our church implicit in our task, we would request permission to hold one extra meeting in the early months of 1978, if such is deemed necessary, in order to submit the most definitive report possible to the next Assembly. Our terms of reference limit us to one further meeting in 1977 and one prior to the Assembly of 1978.

### REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON OVERTURE NO. 5, 1976

The Presbytery of Bruce-Maitland overtured the 102nd General Assembly to appoint a Committee. . . "to study and review the present practice of our church, and to recommend necessary changes in order that our high doctrine of ordination not be further eroded and recruitment to the ordained ministry harmed."

Though the overture is entitled "Call of a Congregation" the preamble to the overture clearly suggests that it is the practice of appointing ordained missionaries that the Presbytery and the General Assembly wish to have studied.

The overture implies that there may be some erosion of our Church's doctrine of ordination because of ordination taking place without a call from a congregation as is the case under the current appointment system.

This issue has been answered by the church in the report of the "Committee on Validity of Orders" (page 98 A&P 1949) adopted by the General Assembly in 1949. Briefly put, this report concluded that "The prime condition of ordination. . . is a 'lawful calling.' . . this 'lawful calling' is God's calling to the spirit of the man, and not the people's selection of the man. . . The reality of this inward Call is judged, not by the person's selection by a congregation, but by the Presbytery . . . according to our standards, the conditions as well as the bestowal of ordination are according to the judgement of the Presbytery. Such selection (by the people) is regarded as simply one way by which a person may be nominated to the Presbytery for ordination." As the Form of Presbyterian Church Government makes clear, the authority to ordain by laying on of hands belongs to ministers, although the elders in Presbytery share in the preliminary decisions. This is why the basic power of ordination resides in the Presbytery and not in a congregational call.

Appointments by or to Boards of the Church have been considered as a Call - a position expressed by the Assembly in adopting a report of the Clerks as printed in A&P 1962, page 414.

The committee believes that the Church must have the right to deploy her ministers as effectively as possible and that it is reasonable to expect that regulations intended to do this should, generally speaking, be honoured as part of the discipline of the church caring for the work of the whole church.

The committee concludes that the present system does not erode or deny our doctrine of ordination or of the ministry.

There are, however, certain other issues in the system that the committee has explored.

The advantages to ministry of a congregation being able to express itself in the settlement of a minister and the similar advantages of a minister being able to experience a sense of his/her own suitability for a congregation are considerable. Though these advantages are fully present in a settlement involving a Call from a congregation, they are not automatically present in the system of ordained missionary appointments unless some effort is made to introduce them. As far as we know,

the B.W.M. makes a considerable effort to do so and tries to match the strengths and talents of its appointees with those of the congregations.

The committee wishes to emphasize the importance of the B.W.M. aggressively presenting the challenge of the work to be done through the appointments to be made and, in ways that are winsome and enterprising, encouraging the appointees to accept such challenges not because they must do so but because they want to do so. In so far as the B.W.M. already does this we believe it is to be commended.

The regulations and practice as they now stand are somewhat inflexible. At the moment there is no allowance made for exceptions to the regulations. At the same time there are increasing diversities of gifts and circumstances among those who would normally be appointed. It follows then that there will be increasing difficulties for the B.W.M. always to make appointments that offer in every case a suitable match between ministerial gifts and circumstances and needs of a congregation.

As the appointment system now operates the appointees are told of their proposed appointments one week in advance of the final ratification of the appointments by the B.W.M. During that time a form of appeal may be made by an appointee who feels he/she cannot accept the proposed appointment. In discussion with the B.W.M. staff the appointee may be offered another appointment that appears to be more suitable to him/her. If this negotiation fails or a suitable appointment cannot be made there is no further recourse for such a candidate. He or she must remain unordained and without opportunity to candidate for a Call.

The committee, therefore, proposes the formation of an appeal committee in the following terms.

The Appeals Committee shall consist of one minister named by the Board of Ministry to serve as convener; one faculty member from each of Knox College and The Presbyterian College; one representative of the B.W.M. and three members of the just graduated classes of the colleges (two from Knox College, one from the Presbyterian College) these being selected by the Board of Ministry from among those having accepted appointments by the B.W.M.

If it is necessary for the Appeals Committee to meet, it shall meet no earlier than September of each year, to hear appeals for exemption from the regulations concerning the mandatory terms of service under appointment by the B.W.M.

Appeals may be made only after at least two attempts have been made with the B.W.M. to negotiate a suitable appointment. None such being available the appellant shall communicate in writing to the Board of Ministry his/her desire to appeal for an exemption from the regulations. The appellant may then meet with the Appeals Committee to present a case for exemption from the regulations offering whatever supporting information, written or oral, that the appellant deems helpful. The Appeals Committee shall review with the appellant all the opportunities available for service under appointment by the B.W.M. with a view to encouraging the appellant to comply with the regulations. If in the opinion of the Appeals Committee there are good and sufficient reasons of an exceptional nature why the appellant should be exempted from the regulations the Appeals Committee may then declare such an exemption thereby releasing the appellant to be a candidate for a call. If, in the opinion of the Appeals Committee there are insufficient reasons to grant such an exemption the appellant is left with the recourse of accepting an appointment under the B.W.M. or remaining without an ordained ministry.

RECOMMENDATION 1. C

*That an Appeals Committee be established in the terms described in the text of this report.*

RECOMMENDATION 2. A

*That a budget of \$700 be authorized to meet the expenses of the Appeals Committee to be paid on vouchers.*

RECOMMENDATION 3. C

*That the referral made to this committee regarding "all ministers wishing to become ministers of The Presbyterian Church in Canada to accept appointment" (P. 79, A&P 1976) be referred to a joint committee of members of the B.W.M. and Board of Ministry.*

The Committee, having met four times, is prepared at this time to make a progress report, outlining the steps it is taking, and the principal matters it is considering.
2. In its initial work, the Committee sought clarification of the intent and scope of its assignment from General Assembly, identified a number of major matters of principle and numerous questions of a practical nature, and devised a plan of research necessary to its work.
3. The major steps taken to date are as follows:
  - (a) Sharing viewpoints from within the knowledge and experience of members of the Committee.
  - (b) Considering a personal and a written submission from Dr. L. H. Fowler, retired Clerk of the General Assembly.
  - (c) Initiating a survey of all actions in the General Assembly concerning the role of the Moderator, since 1925; and considering the report of this research, done for us by Dr. W. H. Fuller, gratis.
  - (d) Writing to the following churches of the Reformed faith, to enquire concerning their doctrine and practice in these matters:
    - Church of Scotland
    - Presbyterian Church In Ireland
    - United Church of Canada
    - Netherlands Reformed Church
    - Presbyterian Church In the United States
    - The United Presbyterian Church In the U.S.A.
  - (e) Writing to all living former Moderators of our General Assembly inviting their comments.
  - (f) Preparing and discussing a statement on the theological issues bearing on our assigned task.
4. At the time of writing of this report (between meetings 3 and 4), the principal matters before the Committee are as follows:
  - (a) Biblical concepts and principles which pertain to this subject.
  - (b) Historical precedents and their significance.
  - (c) Usage in other Reformed Churches.
  - (d) Honorifics, Titles & Symbols of Office.
  - (e) The duties and authority of the Moderator between Assemblies.
  - (f) The relationship of the Moderator to the Boards & Committees of the Church and to the lower Church Courts.
  - (g) Term of Office and method of election.
  - (h) Practical Considerations;
    - Honorarium and expenses
    - Provision for maintenance and support of usual duties
    - Moderatorial tour and itinerary
    - Appointment and function of the Committee to Advise with the Moderator.

### REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY, (E.D.) FOR 1976

*To the Venerable the 103rd General Assembly:*

The Executive of the Woman's Missionary Society, (E.D.) respectfully submits the following report for the year 1976.

The Executive met for regular meetings during the year. The Annual Meeting at St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, New Glasgow, N.S. September 21-23, brought our Centennial celebrations to a close. The opening service of worship was a memorable event. The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was served to a large congregation. Following this service a missionary address was given by Miss Patricia Pooler, a B.W.M. missionary serving in Nepal. A Mission Evening was arranged for the following night, when we heard Mrs. W.E. McCutcheon, chairman of the B.W.M., tell of Canadian Mission work, Miss Pat Pooler her work in Nepal through slides, Miss Mgbeke Okore of her home in Nigeria. An afternoon Tour was arranged when Camp Geddie and the Log Church were visited. Supper was served at Bethel Church, Scotsburn, N.S.

Another highlight of 1976 was our Centennial Conference at Agricultural College Truro, N.S. July 26-29. More than 70 delegates from 7 presbyteries, old and young, attended. Rev. Glen Davis and family, Rev. George and Mrs. Malcolm, Miss Ina Adamson, Miss Georgine Caldwell, Miss Helen Tetley were among those who conducted learning centres. Mrs. Robert Anderson and her committee were responsible for this excellent event.

The Centennial History of the W.M.S. (E.D.) compiled by Miss Margaret Sylvester, New Glasgow, N.S. was published in July, 1976. The new W.M.S. pins (centennial) was another project.

Miss Christine Shaw, who served as presbyterial deaconess in Halifax-Lunenburg, was granted leave of absence in September for one year. Miss Shaw gave leadership at Camp Geddie, also at the Centennial Conference. She will be greatly missed.

The Presbyterian Message was published in ten issues. Overseas work and home, as well as B.W.M. personnel news was featured in all issues. The subscription rate has been slightly increased, due to rising costs in printing. The Message is a vital part of E.D. work, providing a channel between Executive Presbyterial and groups. Mrs. John Posno continues as Editor.

This year the Executive was pleased to undertake sending our Mission Secretary Mrs. E. H. Bean on the India-Nepal Tour arranged by our Church. Miss Riley MacNeil, Children's Secretary, was on the tour, also.

In May, Miss Mabel Bannerman, President of the E.D. was the guest of the W.D. Council at their Annual Meeting at Ewart College. The fellowship and inspiration of these meetings was a real blessing.

Fall Rallies continue to bring added interest, the new study material was introduced. The Education convener was responsible for the itinerary of Miss Pat Pooler for early September, following Annual she joined the Maritime Bus Tour (B.W.M.) and returned to Toronto. Miss Mgbeke Okore spent five weeks visiting throughout the Maritimes. Both visitors were much enjoyed.

Our 1976 contribution to the budget of the B.W.M. was \$29,500.00 Special grants through the B.W.M. \$3,600.00. To the Mary Slessor Church in Nigeria \$2,000.00 for rebuilding.

### REPORT OF THE WOMEN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY WESTERN DIVISION

To the Venerable the 103rd General Assembly:

The Council Executive of the Women's Missionary Society, W.D. respectfully submits the following report of the Society's work for the year 1976.

The Council Executive met regularly during the year to receive and hear reports of its committees and deal with their recommendations. Reports were also heard from representatives on various Presbyterian and Inter-denominational

Boards and Committees as well as from Home and Overseas missionaries and Staff members.

The Women's Missionary Society works in close cooperation with the Board of World Mission and the Board of Congregational Life. Besides appointing ten representatives of the Society to serve on the Board of World Mission and hence on its various committees the Society contributed \$345,000 to the B.W.M. Representatives of the Society also serve on the Board of Congregational Life while representatives of the B.W.M. and B.C.L. are on the W.M.S. Council Executive, Council and Education Committees. National and Area W.M.S. Staff serve as Associate Staff of the Board of Congregational Life. In 1976 the B.C.L. contributed \$6,000 towards travelling expenses of area staff.

During the year staff salaries were reviewed and the salaries of deaconesses raised in accordance with the scale set by General Assembly and proportionate increases were given to other staff members.

The Society is very much aware of its responsibility in participating in the Educational Programme of the church that people may be prepared more adequately to serve in the Church's Mission and know about the way God's Mission is being carried out in the Christian Church around the World.

During 1976 there were a number of staff changes. Miss Louise Reith who has served the Society for many years retired from the work the end of November. The Society was grateful to Miss Reith for continuing to work after her retirement would ordinarily have been effective to train her successor Miss May Nutt and to give the Society time to find a new staff person in the editorial and program planning area - Mrs. Kathleen Hummelen. Miss Mabel Booth, who had been Children's Work Secretary for 14 years resigned from that position in August of this year. A staffing committee was appointed who drew up a job description for a Secretary for Children's and Teenage Work and began to search for a person to fill the position. Two new staff members were appointed for Area Work in the persons of Miss Elizabeth Steele and Mrs. Karen Timbers.

In the office the staff working with the Age Group Committees have taken the responsibility of seeking out and preparing resources for use in study groups of all ages throughout the church. Some groups began to study material related to "Canadian Concerns: Christian Response" in September. Other adult groups completed studies on Taiwan and Japan, while teenagers used the packet containing the book "High Wall, Low Wall, No Wall" and children "All Our Days, Laugh and Praise". Through the Glad Tidings the Society endeavours to provide current information on the Mission of the Church. The Book Room is the channel through which programme resources and books are distributed.

Members of Council Executive, Staff and Missionaries on furlough have all participated in deputation planned cooperatively by W.M.S. and B.W.M.

Area staff continue to work with leaders and teachers of local congregations in planning and carrying out their work as well as with executives of local groups, Presbyterials, Synodicals and Presbytery and Synod Committees.

Statistics received regarding membership are rarely complete. The following is a summary of the statistics received from Synodicals:

739 Adult Groups with a reported membership of 16,397

97 Teenage Groups with a reported membership of 1,085

255 Children's groups with a reported membership of 3,165

The members and leaders of these groups provide a net work of people in mission in the local congregations.

#### Finances

The financial givings of W.M.S. groups are indicated in the report below. In this department Mrs. W. H. Adamson, the Treasurer is ably assisted by Miss Marjorie McMullin, the Assistant to the Treasurer and Bookkeeper. Mrs. Mary Shepherd serves as Secretary and is responsible for work related to Life Membership. During 1976 an Investment Advisory Committee was set up in April by the Finance Committee to advise the Society on investments.

## REPORT OF THE BOARD OF WORLD MISSION

*To the Venerable the 103rd General Assembly:*

The Board of World Mission presents this fifth report. The work of the Board has been consolidated and a strategy has been developed for Mission in Canada and Overseas.

#### Overseas Visitors

– There has been increased activity in Mission Education primarily because there have been more overseas personnel in Canada. Of special significance was the visit of Dr. Akanu Ibiam and Mr. N. A. Ndu of the Presbyterian Church of Nigeria in October. Our Synods, Presbyteries and congregations were stirred by the challenges which were made for Mission and Development assistance in Nigeria. The people across Canada have responded in the appeal for transportation for the Professional Church Workers – "Ministers on Wheels".

#### Dr. E. H. Johnson

– Dr. E. H. Johnson has resigned from the Board effective December 1977 after service as a Missionary in China (1935-41), Mission Education Secretary (1941-46), Overseas Secretary (1954-72), Secretary for Research and Planning (1972-77). Dr. Johnson has given outstanding service to our Church.

#### Highlights

– The Board of World Mission expenditure for operational purposes in 1976 was \$2,422,478. The continued financial support of the W.M.S. (W.D.) and the W.M.S. (E.D.) to the Mission work is appreciated. The B.W.M. is aware of the importance of continued interest in the study of missions and in stirring others to take a serious look at the Mission of the Church.

– The graduates of theology in 1976 are serving the Church well and the graduates of 1977 will be at their appointments by September. The number of vacancies for Board appointments is very small but are in critical new areas and isolated areas. The call is to ministers who are prepared to accept isolation and hardship. Some of the Ordained Ministers have indicated that they will be moving.

– Matching financial grants from Canadian International Development Agency and the Alberta and Saskatchewan governments for projects in medical work and scholarships in Nepal, Rural Industrial Mission in Nigeria and India (Bhil area) have been granted.

– The "Second Century Advance for Christ" will be necessary for the benefit of extension work both in Canada and Overseas. There are new advances to be made in our world and the opportunity is placed before the Presbyterian membership to meet that challenge. It is essential that the Church be called to a spiritual and financial advance at this time with a new desire in Mission commitment. The B.W.M. assisted with the production of "Into the Second Century".

#### Mission Work in Canada

– It is significant that as of January 1, 1977 twelve congregations have become self-supporting. Only one self-supporting congregation has had to request a grant from the B.W.M. Many of the aid-receiving congregations were able to meet all or a large portion of the \$1,100 increase in stipend and travel.

– The high costs of beginning new Extension work, the difficulty of securing experienced ministers, and the restraint in building new homes has slowed the development of new Church Extension charges. Looking ahead to 1977-78, prospects are more favourable for starting three or four new congregations.

– In Special Ministries, the appointment of the Rev. J. Codling to Elphinstone charge has strengthened our work among Indian people. The Anishinabe Fellowship Centre and the Kenora Fellowship Centre have operated effectively among the Native People. A number of congregations have had special events in connection with our appeal to understand the Native People.

In Inner City, Tyndale House in Montreal has a new working arrangement with the Anglican Diocese of Montreal. Miss Helen Taylor was appointed to work at Tyndale.

The Rev. Mary Farmery, Director of Armagh for the past four years, has resigned to take up the pastoral ministry.

Miss Helen Ingleby has been appointed Director.

Miss Karen Hubert was appointed to Flora House, Winnipeg.

Miss Joyce McNevin was appointed to Church Extension Ministry at Doon in the Presbytery of Waterloo-Wellington. Fifty eight students were appointed to serve on mission fields from Cape Breton, Nova Scotia to Whitehorse, Yukon.

#### Mission Overseas

- The Guyana Presbyterian Church has experienced difficulties because people are leaving the country. The membership remains constant but the financial situation has been difficult. The Church had hoped to be financially independent, but has now asked for continued support. The lay people have had to supply a dozen pulpits on Sundays. The Church expresses its appreciation to The Presbyterian Church in Canada and writes "We hope to remain a vital and strengthening force in a new Guyana. With His love and grace we will be His witness in this part of His vineyard!"
  - A new five-year movement in the Presbyterian Church of Taiwan will begin in July 1977. The focus will be on lay training. There has been a significant increase during the past two years in the number of students seeking admission to Taiwan and Tainan theological colleges. 1976 marks the 30th anniversary of the organized church in a number of mountain areas of Taiwan. Of great concern to the Church are the large numbers of tribal people who have migrated to the cities and have not maintained a contact with the church. Dr. James and Mrs. Sutherland, after 22 years of service in Taiwan have resigned. The Rev. Terry and Mrs. Samuel and the Rev. Ron and Mrs. Archer have resigned from service in Taiwan.
  - The Presbyterian Church of Nigeria in its report declares a continued need for overseas missionaries and expresses appreciation for continued financial support by other churches even when fewer missionaries are sent. They reported a serious shortage of doctors, midwifery tutors and nurses in the staffing of the Church's hospitals. In referring to the visit of Dr. Ibiam and Mr. Ndu to Canada, they say: "We await with keen interest the results of their tours in the spiritual awakening and development of our two churches. Rev. R. Fee and Dr. and Mrs. D. Irwin have arrived in Nigeria. Thirty Mission Boards and Societies have joined to form the United Mission to Nepal in working in Nepal in the Spirit of Christ to make Him known by word and life. It operated hostels, boarding schools, education, economic development, community health programs, hospitals, clinics and nurses training.
  - From the Korean Christian Church in Japan, the Rev. Sam Choi writes: "The greatest challenge to our faith and to our integrity is connected with the imprisonment of our beloved theological student Mr. Kim, Chuy Hyun, whose final sentence demands the death chamber." The prayers have been answered in that Mr. Kim's sentence has been reduced to life imprisonment. The KCCJ has an active emphasis in human rights while not ignoring evangelism and social action. Their 70th anniversary is in 1978 and the Rev. K. S. (Sam) Choi has now served three years as General Secretary.
  - The Church of North India celebrated its sixth anniversary on November 29, 1976. Faith and hope have overcome tensions of the first years and slowly led the Church towards integration based on growing understanding and sympathy. The Presbyterian Church in Canada works with the Dioceses of Bhopal and Lucknow of the C.N.I., and we look forward to a visit to Canada from the Bishop of Bhopal, Bishop J. A. Gonsalves, in the fall of 1977.
- The Rev. Desmond and Mrs. Howard, who served for three years with the World Association of Christian Communication, have terminated their service with the Board.
- The B.W.M. representatives have worked with the Administrative Council on its Committee, Financial Responsibility for Assembly Personnel on Deputation.

The B.W.M. was requested by the 1976 General Assembly to prepare a statement on Apartheid which is in the Recommendations, and a statement on Northern Development. Further study on Northern Development is necessary in the light of the Berger Commission and the National Energy Board Reports. It is hoped to report next year.

#### BCL/BWM State of the Church (Declining Membership)

As instructed by the General Assembly 1976, pages 59, 78, "that the Board of World Mission (B.W.M.) and the Board of Congregational Life (B.C.L.) be urged to consider the serious relative and actual decline of members of The Presbyterian Church in Canada, the possible relative decline in income and other aspects of the Church's life, as detailed in, for example, the Grant Maxwell study of the Church in Canada, and report on the state of the Church with recommendations, to the 103rd General Assembly."

A joint Committee of B.C.L. and B.W.M. was appointed and began the study. The Joint Committee has stated that it would not be able to give a report until 1978. The B.W.M. has received the suggestion of the B.C.L. to reconsider this project and B.W.M. has asked B.C.L. for further consideration. A supplementary report will be provided for this General Assembly to help determine the scope of this project.

#### Financial Plan Guidelines for aid-receiving congregations

The Board has given study to the need for guidelines for aid-receiving congregations. The decline in Church membership and the static nature of many aid-receiving congregations has given rise to the adoption of "Financial Plan Guidelines". There are steps which will help to turn the corner toward self-support.

It is recognized that there is "Mission Work" in special ministries and a few congregations which will remain aid-receiving. The Board of World Mission would encourage the people involved, to support that "Mission Work" to the best of their ability and then to request aid from the resources of the National Church.

If the Mission of the Church in extending the Kingdom of God is to go forward, it is necessary that the aid-receiving congregations endeavour to become self-supporting within a ten (10) year period and that the aid-receiving congregations increase the number of active members by a net of 5% each year for the next 5 years, and further that there will be an increase in the commitment of members in time, talents and treasury. The B.W.M. is very much aware of the need to proceed with the "Financial Plan Guidelines". The plan is achievable for most of our aid-receiving congregations. God can do more than we would hope because He is Lord of All. Other details on the Financial Plan Guidelines are available on request.

#### Achieving the Goal

The Board of World Mission believes that The Presbyterian Church in Canada has a new sense of purpose and hope of achieving its goal in advancing the Kingdom of God in Canada and Overseas. The Presbyterian Church does not have to take a back seat to any other group in present achievement, but we acknowledge that there is much for us to do. We can accomplish great things as we look to the guidance of the Holy Spirit and expect greater things of our people. We give thanks to Jesus Christ, the One who gives joy in His service.

## RECOMMENDATIONS

#### Stipend Increase

The Board of World Mission, after lengthy review of the total stipend including, 1) the increase in travel costs, 2) the proposal to increase the increments of the Deaconesses from \$1,000 to \$1,700, 3) the requests for increases in housing allowances for Deaconesses, Superintendents of Missions and others, as well as the need for restraint in salary increases urged by the government, felt that \$1,000 was the appropriate total sum which could be recommended.

**RECOMMENDATION 1 C**

that the increase in the basic stipend by \$1,000 (\$8,300 to \$9,300) for Ordained Ministers and a proportionate increase for other Church Workers (Deaconesses, Woman Missionaries, Directors of Institutions, Ministers, Married Students and Summer Students) be made effective January 1, 1978.

**RECOMMENDATION 2 C**

that in order to maintain the appropriate stipend differential for the Superintendents of Missions – that the amount of stipend increase be \$1,100 effective January 1, 1978.

**RECOMMENDATION 3 A**

that the Administrative Council study and report on the relationship of work responsibility to stipend and allowances of Church Workers (e.g., between Deaconesses, Woman Missionaries, Ordained Ministers, etc.)

**RECOMMENDATION 4 C**

a) for Missions in Canada and Overseas – up to \$100,000 for Canada and \$50,000 for Overseas for Capital needs (manses, church sites, overseas capital projects, etc.) be requested to the extent that additional funds are available, including bequest monies at the end of the year,

b) and request up to \$12,000 for automobiles and heavy furniture as may be found necessary.

**RECOMMENDATION 5 C**

that the Administrative Council have a system of applying the interest on Capital Funds to that particular fund, e.g., Church Extension, Home Missions and Overseas Mission Reserves.

**RECOMMENDATION 6 A**

that the General Assembly authorize the Trustee Board and the Pension Board to use the funds in their care to invest in mortgages on properties and manses owned by the Board of World Mission within the legal terms of the Trust Fund Act, etc.

**RECOMMENDATION 7 C**

re mileage rate for Superintendents of Missions that the mileage rate for Superintendents of Missions be set at 25% above the established mileage rate (from 12¢ to 15¢).

**RECOMMENDATION 8 A**

basic allowance for personal living expenses in moving that the policy of giving \$25.00 for basic allowance for personal living expenses paid to families for moving be amended to a figure of \$25.00 per 400 miles or portion thereof. (At the present time, the approved mileage rate is 12¢ per mile plus 1¢ per mile for each additional passenger in the family).

**RECOMMENDATION 9 A**

continuing education grants

B.W.M. Regulations: 3. 01 *Definitions:*

The General Assembly defined the basic or minimum stipend as being the stipend including increments set by this Court for Ministers, along with a free house or rented apartment, one month of holidays, and allowance not to exceed the maximum paid by the Board of World Mission. Any emoluments whatsoever received by the minister from a congregation beyond these are to be considered as raising his stipend above the basic or minimum paid by the Church.

that Regulation 3. 01 be amended by the addition of the following:

“with the exception that a pastoral charge may make a study leave grant (and pay the supply costs involved) up to the minimum required by the General Assembly, without prejudice to the deficit grant in effect.”

**RECOMMENDATION 10 C****Executive Staff Appointment**

With the resignation of Dr. H. A. Doig, Secretary for Finance and Administration, and now the resignation of Dr. E. H. Johnson, Secretary for Research and Planning, we recommend

that there be one Executive Secretary for Research, Planning and Finance, and that the specific responsibilities of the position called Secretary for Research, Planning and Finance be those listed under Secretary for Research and Planning – Specific Responsibilities (A & P 1972, p.211) with the addition of clause (10) therefore to be amended as follows:

Secretary for Research, Planning and Finance, Specific Responsibilities:

- (1) be accountable to Board/Executive through the General Secretary, and a member of the Staff Executive.
- (2) be responsible for planning
  - i) Evaluation of mission purpose and programme
  - ii) Projection of mission tasks and priorities
  - iii) Adaptation of policies, structures and procedures for mission work
- (3) be responsible for research in various areas, e.g. Inner City, Ethnic, Sites and Priorities, etc.
- (4) be responsible for ecumenical relations
- (5) be responsible for sabbatical leave studies among staff to ensure planning and research function
- (6) be responsible for sites and priorities research and planning
- (7) be responsible for visitors from abroad
- (8) be responsible for programme development
- (9) be responsible for experimental programmes and programme changes
- (10) be responsible for daily financial matters and supervise the work of the Administrative Assistant – Finance

**RECOMMENDATION 11 A****Re Moving expenses for retiring missionaries**

that the following regulations be approved:

**Moving expenses for Retiring Missionaries**

Missionaries (Ordained Ministers, Deaconesses, Catechists or lay missionaries, Women Missionaries, Superintendents, Lay Directors of Institutions), serving in Canada under appointment by the B.W.M., who retire from full-time service at the approved age of retirement or thereafter, or earlier for validated health reasons, shall be entitled to receive an allowance from the B.W.M. to assist in moving with their household and personal effects, to their intended retirement home in Canada. Plans for the move shall be made in advance, in consultation with the B.W.M. and in accordance with B.W.M. regulations.

The allowance shall be based on actual costs incurred. These shall be considered to include the cost of moving furniture, appliances, etc. by a recognized Moving Company; the shipment of books etc., by rail freight where advisable, and a Family Travel Allowance including the basic and mileage rates as authorized from time to time.

The said allowance shall be calculated on the actual moving costs outlined above, at the rate of 15% for each year of consecutive service under the B.W.M. immediately prior to retirement to a maximum of 75% of the total costs.

In the case of the disability or death of the missionary, the surviving spouse and dependents would receive the full allowance of 75% of the total costs if required within twelve months.

The allowance shall become payable on July 1, 1977 and shall not be retroactive.

**RECOMMENDATION 12 A****Minute of appreciation – Dr. Edward H. Johnson**

“Ted” Johnson’s name calls to our mind a global ministry. His work as a missionary to China, as Secretary for Mission Education of The Presbyterian Church in Canada, as Secretary of the Student Volunteer Movement for Christian Missions in New York, U.S.A., as Overseas Secretary of the General Board of Missions of The Pres-

byterian Church in Canada, as Secretary for Research and Planning of the Board of World Mission, bears out the global image.

Within each phase of his career, Dr. Johnson has been part of evolving changing policies in Christian mission to meet social, economic and political changes in the countries of the world. He has witnessed from within the change from mission to church in countries of Asia, Africa and the Caribbean. He has interpreted the changes and led The Presbyterian Church in Canada to participate in them. He has been part of international interdenominational action in the world mission of the church.

Dr. Johnson is a graduate of McGill University and Princeton Theological Seminary. He was honoured by Presbyterian College, Montreal with an honorary Doctor of Divinity degree. He served our Church as Moderator of the General Assembly in 1969. Trent University awarded him an LL. D. in recognition of Nigeria-Biafra relief work.

We cannot think of Dr. Johnson without thinking of Mrs. Kitty Johnson. She has had a ministry in her own right – in her own congregation, as a member of the Women's Missionary Society (W.D.) Council and Council Executive to mention two. The Johnson home has always been open, a place of warm hospitality and happy fellowship.

Dr. Ted's and Mrs. Johnson's interests in these past several years have had a concentration on China – a different China than when they first went out as missionaries in 1935. It is typical of Dr. Johnson that he focuses intensely on that which challenges him. So it is with China today – as he seeks to understand it and interpret it to the western world. So it was with Nigeria in its time of civil turbulence, with each of the areas of change as he applied his philosophy and Christian convictions to them.

It would not seem possible for Dr. and Mrs. Johnson to retire. Their interest and enthusiasm for many things will continue. As a Board of World Mission, we will follow them in these interests and wish them good health to enjoy whatever God reveals for them to do.

#### RECOMMENDATION 13 A

Minute of Appreciation – Dr. James and Mrs. Joyce Sutherland  
James E. Sutherland volunteered for overseas service in 1954. He was appointed to Taiwan to serve in evangelistic work.

Shortly after going to Taiwan, "Jamie" Sutherland was followed by Joyce Adam of Kitchener, Ontario. They were married in Tamsui, Taiwan was the Sutherland home for twenty-two years.

Joyce Sutherland in Taiwan taught English at the Taiwan Theological College and worked with the Canadian Mission Committee. Deborah, Robert, Douglas and Catherine Sutherland were born in Taiwan. The Sutherland family became a part of the life and work of the Presbyterian Church of Taiwan.

Mr. Sutherland is a graduate of the University of Toronto and Knox College. He has been a student of Far Eastern affairs from the time of his appointment. Fluent in Taiwanese and Mandarin, he quickly became a part of the policy-making and development of the Presbyterian Church of Taiwan. In the years of change from a mission-dominated church to an autonomous church, Jamie Sutherland gave sensitive solid thinking and action to the growing church.

Mr. Sutherland served as Old Testament professor at Taiwan Theological Seminary. He was vice-principal of the Seminary and acted as principal for a period of time. He served for two terms as Assistant General Secretary of the Presbyterian Church of Taiwan.

In 1972, Knox College honoured James E. Sutherland with an honorary Doctor of Divinity Degree.

Withdrawing from work in Taiwan, at this time, the Sutherlands leave many friends in the Taiwan Church, friends who would have them return to continue to share with them in the development of their church but who understand the thinking that brings them back to Canada. The years they have been in Taiwan have been critical for the church and the country. It is still a critical time but in this land the church, though it represents a minority of the population, exercises a great influence on the medical, educational, spiritual life of the people. Dr. James Sutherland,

Mrs. Joyce Sutherland and their family have made their contribution in building a strong influential church.

#### RECOMMENDATION 14 A

Minute of Appreciation – Rev. J. Desmond and Mrs. Nancy Howard  
The Board of World Mission records its appreciation for the ministry of the Rev. J. Desmond and Mrs. Nancy Howard as overseas missionaries of The Presbyterian Church in Canada working, first in India, and then with the World Association for Christian Communications in London, England.

Desmond and Nancy were appointed as overseas missionaries in March 1965, after having served in Mission City in the Presbytery of Westminster. They went to India in August of that year and began language study. They were in India during the time of transition from control by the Mission to the assumption of greater responsibility on the part of the national leaders, or as Des put it, "during the demise but before the burial of the old Mission Council structure." Des found an interest in discovering sources of water for irrigation, in addition to his concerns for evangelism and improving the facilities for education of the young. During their second term he developed a keen interest in the usefulness of a cassette tape ministry for education in community development and the instruction of pastors and lay people. On his next furlough he completed studies for an M.A. Degree from St. Michael's University in the field of Communications. In 1973 he was seconded to the World Association for Christian Communications, and was Assistant to the General Secretary in administration and audio-visual consultancy in their Office in London, England.

Nancy is a graduate Nurse who, during these years, has found her main responsibilities in being a wife to Desmond and a mother to their four children. While in London she also found time to give voluntary service to programs such as meals-on-wheels and family planning clinics. Desmond and Nancy and their family came back to Canada in August 1976 willing to continue to serve the B.W.M., but, when no suitable work was found for them in the field of communication, they terminated their service with the Board as of January 31, 1977, while leaving open the possibility of returning to overseas service.

Desmond is a man of great energy, filled with adventuresome ideas for new ways of communication and outreach. The B.W.M., in expressing its gratitude for the service given by Des and Nancy, hopes that an opportunity may be found where both Des and Nancy may exercise the skills and creative imagination with which they are endowed.

#### RECOMMENDATION 15 A

##### Joint Task Force on Mission Education Services

that the Mission themes for 1978-79 be based on the titles "Covenant Living in Times of Change" and "China: Consideration for Christians" or "Contemporary China" and,

that the Board of Congregational Life, Women's Missionary Society (W.D.) and the Board of World Mission co-operate in providing suitable material including materials related to the Second Century Advance for Christ, in a Canadian Presbyterian User's Guide.

#### RECOMMENDATION 16

##### Re Presbytery Mission Workers and Hospital Visitors

##### RECOMMENDATION 16A A

that the local courts to which Presbytery Mission Workers are now under appointment be asked to undertake 10% of financial responsibility for Presbytery Mission Workers, effective 1 January, 1978, and enter into negotiations with B.W.M. to establish an equitable sharing of costs.

##### RECOMMENDATION 16B A

that Presbytery requests for Mission Worker appointments to new work of a continuing nature shall be considered, in consultation with the Board of World Mission, concerning a suitable job description and an equitable sharing of costs.

**RECOMMENDATION 16C A**

that the Board of World Mission may assume the financial responsibilities for a period of up to two years for any new Mission Worker appointments to an experimental and/or investigative task.

**RECOMMENDATION 16D A**

that prior to any new appointment of a Presbytery Mission Worker, there shall be consultation with representatives of the W.M.S. (W.D.) and W.M.S. (E.D.) and the Board of Congregational Life.

**RECOMMENDATION 16E A**

that Presbyteries be requested to provide a Consultative Committee to include the Presbytery Mission Convener or alternate, and a representative of the Presbyterial, with the Superintendent of Missions in a consultative role, for the supervision of the Presbytery Mission Worker in their bounds, and that this Consultative Committee report at least annually to the Board of World Mission through the Presbytery.

**RECOMMENDATION 17**

**Regulations regarding Hospital Visitors (Deaconesses and Women Missionaries)**

**RECOMMENDATION 17A A**

that the local courts (Synod, Presbytery, or Presbyteries) be asked to undertake 10% of financial responsibility for hospital visitors under appointment by the Board of World Mission, effective 1 January 1978; and the courts and the Board of World Mission negotiate to schedule for a more equitable sharing of costs.

**RECOMMENDATION 17B A**

that in any new appointment of hospital visitors, the local court be asked to share the same apportionment of responsibility i.e. 10% and negotiate a schedule for a more equitable sharing of costs.

**RECOMMENDATION 17C A**

that the Board of World Mission will consider giving assistance toward the cost of approved institutional training courses for hospital visitors on request of Presbyteries, in cases where the Fund for Continuing Education does not apply.

**RECOMMENDATION 17D A**

that Presbyteries be requested to provide a consultative committee to supervise the work of hospital visitors resident in their bounds, and that this consultative committee provide reports at least annually to the Board of World Mission through the Presbytery, covering the work of the hospital visitor(s).

**RECOMMENDATION 18**

**Re the Right to Issue a Call**

that the regulation of the General Assembly 1975 (A & P p.483, 75), be amended to read as follows:

**RECOMMENDATION 18A A**

that any pastoral charge which is prepared to pay at least 75% of the Basic Stipend currently in effect (e.g., 75% of \$8,300, January 1, 1977) not including increments and allowances, be permitted to extend a call to a Minister, and that any pastoral charge which is not prepared to pay the said 75% of the basic stipend be not permitted to call a Minister.

**RECOMMENDATION 18B A**

that the Board of World Mission explicitly acknowledge that appointments to specific mission tasks are indeed "the call of the whole Church" by recognizing all appointees of the Board whether to Overseas or Canadian congregations or special ministries, in its publications and reports.

**RECOMMENDATION 18C C**

that the re-appointment of Ordained Missionaries at the completion of their first term of appointment be considered only when the pastoral charge has, at a properly constituted congregational meeting, formally requested the re-appointment and this has been endorsed by the Presbytery. The request shall then be

discussed with the minister involved, and if agreeable a new appointment, without a stated termination date, shall be made.

**RECOMMENDATION 18D A**

that the prayers of Overtures 7 and 2, 1976, be granted in the terms above.

**RECOMMENDATION 18E A**

that all Presbyteries be requested to re-classify charges within their bounds as self-supporting or aid-receiving, as the case may be, and that other classifications be dropped.

**RECOMMENDATION 19**

The Board of World Mission was instructed by the 102nd General Assembly to prepare a statement on Apartheid (See A & P, 1976, Administrative Council Report Recommendation 30, p.414 adopted p.76).

**Statement on Apartheid**

The most recent statement by our Church with regard to racism and to apartheid in South Africa was made by the 98th General Assembly in 1972. (A & P 1972, pgs. 269-270). The statements as affirmed at that time provide background for continued concern.

**Disturbing events**

The increasing number of disturbing events and tragic conflicts between people of different races in Southern Africa emphasizes the need for a continuing study of our position: We would note only a few examples of such events:

The student riots in the black township of Soweto against enforced use of the Afrikaans language and inequality of education opportunities for non-whites and their violent suppression.

The reports of deaths while in custody of more than 16 prisoners in the first two months of 1977.

The seizing of files of the South African Council of Churches by Government authorities and the detention of a number of people including an Executive member of the South African Council of Churches and the National Secretary for South Africa of the Y.W.C.A.

The restriction of activity and support for The Christian Institute in South Africa and its Director, Dr. Beyers Naude, a recipient of the Reinhold Niebuhr Award for Love and Justice.

**Apartheid Policy**

The South African policy of apartheid or separateness of races is undergoing some changes. The emphasis is being placed by the South African government on "Separate Development", and the long-range implementation of the program may result in political independence for the several black "Homeland" areas. The First of these, Transkei, accepted independence in October 1976 and another, Bophuthatswana is scheduled for independence in December 1977. The black peoples of the Xhosa tribe thus have the right to vote for the government of the Transkei now, and those of the Tswana will have the franchise relative to their homeland later this year. It is not clear if or when other homeland areas will be granted independence, inasmuch as the present leaders of these areas — such as Chief Buthelezi of the Kwazulu — are opposed to the South African government policy of separate development and independence.

**Workers without citizenship**

But we must realize that the large majority of employable black people do not live in their homelands but provide the major part of the labour force throughout South Africa. They are classed as migrant labourers (even though many have not resided in the homeland areas for several generations), and have not rights to property or political self-determination apart from their homeland. It has recently come to light that when the homeland receives independence the persons of that tribal group will be declared as citizens of that country and be deprived of South African citizenship. Thus the labour force for South Africa could become primarily composed of non-resident aliens who could be subjected to even greater proscriptions than at the present time.

**Action of a sister Church**

Many Christian communions around the world have made declarations against apartheid. We note with approval that made by the United Presbyterian Church U.S.A. as follows:

"Apartheid as presently practised consigns millions of Africans to perpetual inferiority depriving them of the most elementary political civil and human rights

"Apartheid also limits whitecitizens in the full exercise of their rights of free speech, free assembly and petition

"Apartheid perpetuates and deepens racial divisions in the body of Christ thus violating the unity of the Church

"Apartheid is maintained increasingly by a totalitarian force reminiscent of Nazi Germany

"Apartheid is gravely inimical to the present and future life, work and witness of the Christian Church because its ruthless deeds are perpetuated in the name of Christ" (Minutes 177th General Assembly U.P.C.U.S.A. pp. 402-405).

**Guides to Action**

There has been strong recommendation by the World Council of Churches that member Churches work for the withdrawal of investments and the ending of bank loans to the South African Government and companies involved in South Africa. ("Breaking Barriers - Nairobi 1975" pg. 119.) Former Executive Secretary of the South African Council of Churches, Mr. John Rees, and the Director of The Christian Institute of South Africa, Dr. Beyers Naude, have both stated that it would be preferable for shareholders and investors to act responsibly in an effort to put pressures on the South African economy rather than withdraw their investments to have them replaced by others with no moral or ethical concern for the employment and labour practices in South Africa.

We would note however that the many evidences of tribalism and black totalitarian regimes elsewhere in Africa are also deserving of the strongest condemnation. In particular, the combination of racist policies and genocidal actions by President Amin's regime in Uganda should be condemned by the international community. In many other countries in Africa the right to vote or even to disagree with the authority in power is not granted to any citizen. There are many examples of racial, tribal and ethnic discrimination that could be cited and merit deep concern.

We would also note that there are examples of discrimination (racial, ethnic, etc.) both subtle and violent within our own country which weaken our Christian witness and may render us hypocritical in our judgements about discrimination abroad. As we highlight and comment on situations elsewhere we must be equally aware of the need for comment and action to correct these situations as they become apparent within our own borders. We therefore recommend:

**RECOMMENDATION 19A A**

that the information contained in this report be commended to the Courts and congregations of our Church in their continuing consideration of the problems of racism in society in our own country as well as elsewhere.

**RECOMMENDATION 19B A**

that The Presbyterian Church in Canada reaffirm the statement of the 98th General Assembly that "Realizing that no one individual or Church is 'without sin' including this General Assembly, nevertheless affirms that all forms of racism and apartheid are contrary to the mind and will of Christ."

**RECOMMENDATION 19C A**

that we communicate an expression of prayerful support to our brethren in the Churches of South Africa, and in other emergent situations where Churches face conflict over repressive racist policies as they endeavour to serve our one Lord.

**RECOMMENDATION 19D C**

that we request the Administrative Council to instruct the Trustee Board as responsible shareholders, to recommend actions towards just employment practices by such companies as have direct activity and/or influence in countries which have declared, or apparent, discriminatory policies, particularly South Africa.

**RECOMMENDATION 19E A**

that we request the Federal Government to reconsider the extent of its program of trade promotion in South Africa in relation to the need of other African states for trade facilities.

**RECOMMENDATION 20****Re Ordained Missionary Appointments**

that the report of the Special Committee of the Board of World Mission (cf. A & P 205/10) to study, in consultation with the Board of Ministry and the Committee on Church Doctrine, the implications for ministry raised by Overture 12, 1975 Presbytery of Montreal, be forwarded to the General Assembly Committee studying Overture 5 in the following terms:

**RECOMMENDATION 20A A**

that for the immediate future, the present appointment system be continued inasmuch as great care is being taken by the B.W.M. to seek a placing of ordinands that is compatible with special requests, such as family responsibilities, health and to a lesser degree special studies or special interests, and concurring with the directive of the General Assembly, 1973.

**RECOMMENDATION 20B C**

that for the long-term period, studies presently being pursued by the Committee on Church Doctrine regarding matters of ordination, licensure and church vocations (e.g., diaconate, special ministries) be continued.

- the changing existential situation of candidates be considered by the Special Committee of the General Assembly, relevant to the requesting of ordination of both husband and wife, or of one spouse with the other pursuing another vocation; and
- the possibility that in the future the Board of World Mission may be unable to find suitable appointments (as presently specified) for all graduates from our theological colleges.
- that the membership of the General Assembly Committee studying Overture No. 5 consider expanding its membership to include a representative of the Board of Congregational Life (related to Family Life).

**Synod of British Columbia**

- St. Andrew's, Duncan; Knox, Port Alberni; St. Columba, Vancouver; became self-supporting.
- St. Andrew's, Duncan has taken great strides under the Rev. James Statham, who upon completion of his three-year appointment was called by the congre-

gation. The congregation is in the midst of a building program to enlarge its facilities.

- Knox, Port Alberni, under the leadership of the Rev. Robert Garvin, has continually accepted a greater share of the responsibility of its ministry.
- Knox, Sooke, has been the subject of concern of a special presbytery committee. Congregation and committee are hopeful for the future work in that location. The congregation realizes its responsibility for ministry and, under the leadership of the Rev. R. F. Cunningham, is striving to meet objectives within its capabilities.
- Chinese Church, Victoria, although in existence for some 70 years, still requires Board of World Mission support. It is doing a fine piece of work as a "day care centre" and has up to 22 children enrolled, for which it receives a government grant. The congregation also received a "New Horizons" grant for a Senior Citizens program now in operation. There is a need for mission outreach by this congregation to the Chinese Community in Greater Victoria. The opportunity for this is available through the English classes conducted for new Chinese immigrants.
- In Vancouver, the Chinese Church, now served by the Rev. R.T.K. Lin, is continuing to reach out into the community with the gospel.
- At St. Columba, Vancouver, the Rev. Fred Metzger was inducted, having served as Ordained Missionary for a number of years. A new Christian Education building was dedicated by the Presbytery.
- The Rev. Hugh Appel was recognized as Ordained Missionary at Brentwood-Robertson. A manse has been purchased for this two-point charge.
- The Rev. Laszlo Szamoskozi was recognized as Ordained Missionary at Calvin Hungarian Church. He replaced the Rev. A. Csiszar who has retired.
- Coquitlam is making steady progress toward self-supporting status.
- The church building of St. Paul's, Vancouver was destroyed by fire. A special committee of the Presbytery is working with the congregation in planning for the future.
- Central Church, Vancouver, has sold its property and will be locating across the street, where they plan to erect a modern church structure.
- All four mission churches in the Presbytery of Kootenay are making progress.
- The congregation in Salmon Arm is growing and has a new building.
- The Parksville area has grown very rapidly and the congregation of St. Columba, French Creek has decided on a building program to serve people from Parksville, Qualicum and other developing communities.
- The Campbell River area has also been "mushrooming" over the past two years and there is a need for a Presbyterian witness in that area.
- The Presbytery of Westminster is considering the possibility of having a witness in the North Langley area.
- The Presbytery of Kamloops has developed a policy statement re Church Extension, which should serve as a strong basis for extending the Church within its bounds.
- With regret the Presbytery of Kamloops accepted the retirement of the Rev. Irvine McKee who served the Presbytery well for many years, and during the past six years has ministered in Kitimat.

#### *Synod of Alberta*

- Many of the clergy in this Synod have a large geographical area to serve. Graduates, who have come on the two year appointment, have remained beyond the required time to minister to their congregations.
- In the summer of 1976, the Rev. Dr. Alex F. MacSween and the Rev. George A. Johnston, Superintendent of Missions, visited Yellowknife and the Western Arctic. Discussions are currently being held with one of the major oil companies about the possibility of an itinerant mission to oil workers in the Western Arctic. There is great pessimism in the Mackenzie Delta about the future, and the native people are divided about what they want. The Christian Church can provide a service by encouraging the presentation of all sides for a sound, considered judgment. Our future in the North has yet to be determined.

- The Presbytery of Peace River is showing new vitality with appointees in Dawson Creek and Wanham-Blueberry Mountain.
- Experienced leadership has been secured for Whitehorse where the congregation is faced with replacing the church building.
- At the mining town of Faro, 225 miles Northeast of Whitehorse, we are involved in an ecumenical ministry.
- At Chetwynd, B.C., we are beginning a co-operative ministry with the United and Anglican churches.
- Central Alberta, which is predominantly agricultural, is undergoing a minor diversified industrial expansion. This should mean a strengthening of our mission work in and around Red Deer.
- With the increased influx of people into Calgary and Edmonton, new, substantial subdivisions are emerging, and there is a need to establish extension congregations. New work should also be commenced in Fort McMurray, centre of development of the Athabasca tar sands.
- Miss Lois Whitwell, deaconess for Calgary Presbytery, was involved in Youth work, plans for a Mini-Congress, a Teacher Training Workshop, Camps, Vacation Bible Schools, and door-to-door visitation in North East Calgary for Centennial Church.

#### *Synod of Saskatchewan*

- The two-year appointments for graduates have been found to be helpful both for the appointees and for the mission fields. It has meant that the appointee begins to "feel at home" and experience the warmth of a congregation, as well as to gain the sense of being part of "the team" in Presbytery.
- The Ordained Missionaries in Assiniboia Presbytery, Donald McInnis, Allan Old, Tom Rodger and Derrick Dick, are ministering beyond the bounds of their individual parishes, and contribute much to the strength of the fellowship within the presbytery.
- The presbytery closed the congregation at Stoughton. Members have been encouraged to serve the Lord as adherents or members of a local congregation, or as members of either Knox, Weyburn or Westminster, Estevan.
- Though not a Mission Field, Bekevar, Kipling asked for an Ordained missionary a year ago. The appointee is not able to converse in Hungarian. The Rev. Louis Beckske of Calgary conducted a Communion Service at New Year's, and it is hoped that Communion Services in Hungarian can be provided at Easter and Pentecost as well. It will be necessary for some years to provide a form of special ministry to the older folk not fluent in English.
- A new manse has been built at Kipling, and a mortgage has been arranged.
- The cause at Carragana burns brightly thanks to dedicated leadership by the late "Mick" Hobman, Clerk of Session, and others during the years since the formation of the Presbytery of Northern Saskatchewan.
- Indian work is active under the Rev. Stephen How assisted by Reg McMillan.
- Meath Park-Shipman, under Henry Hildebrandt, continued to have a meaningful summer activity.
- St. Andrew's, North Battleford, under the Rev. Harvey Reichelt, had a mortgage burning for the main church building.
- St. Andrew's, Biggar, progressed under the leadership of the Rev. Leslie Landell.
- Coleville continued to be served under the Presbytery Mission Committee.
- Parkview, Saskatoon, established a Sunday School in the Westview area of Saskatoon.
- Calvin-Goforth assumed the largest portion of the Mission Board grant in its history.
- Nancy Cocks for the third year conducted summer Vacation Bible Schools, assisted by Karen Pugsley of Regina.
- Fellowship House in Prince Albert, under the leadership of Jack and Ruth Chiang, was back on track with a "positive outlook and all systems go".

*Synod of Manitoba and Northwestern Ontario*

- The Board of World Mission has many commitments to this Synod. The Superintendent, the Rev. M. S. McLean, must cover widely scattered points over a distance of 1300 miles (one way) and not all are easily accessible. The Synod is heavily dependent upon the appointment of graduating students to fill pastoral charges.
- Negotiations are proceeding for the erection of a new church building at Bird-tail where Mr. Ed Bunn ministers.
- At the Kenora Fellowship Centre, Colin Wasacase is seeking to give its work and witness a new direction amid the rapidly changing character of Indian life in the area.
- There is a pressing need for a full time ministry at Shoal Lake reserve where a congregation is established and substantial numbers look to our church for Christian leadership.
- A new director is needed for Anishinabe Centre in Winnipeg, and there is need for other workers, particularly native workers.
- Proposed industrial development in Northwestern Ontario in both mining and paper are being monitored in order to see that Indian and environmental interests are carefully considered. There is a high demand for jobs and industrial development in this area. New towns or enlarged towns are being looked at for possible church extension work.
- Our denomination takes its part in work of an ecumenical nature within the Synod, e.g., Rossburn and Cranberry Portage. The Nelson River Hydro project reaches a summer peak of about 5,000 employees and Presbyterians will be responsible for a student assistant to the chaplaincy in the summer of 1977.
- More than thirty years ago a mission was started in the North Side of Portage la Prairie. It has continued since that time with a solid core of supporters. When the Mission was begun, the area was predominantly European, and mostly Ukrainian. Since the expansion of the city there is a mixture of people from all areas of the city. For the past five years services have been conducted from First Church, Portage la Prairie, with the Board of World Mission paying the rent for the hall.

*Synod of Hamilton and London*

- The congregations of St. Andrew's, Scottlea in Niagara Presbytery and Greenbrier, Brantford in the Presbytery of Paris have taken steps to becoming self-supporting.
- Valetta congregation continued to be served by the Rev. Peter DeJong, minister of the Reformed Church in America, Kingsville. Church school enrolment increased and the financial picture is exceptionally good.
- In the Chinese Church, Windsor, many activities were held. A children's picnic was held for the first time. A worship service was videotaped and telecast as well as being presented at the International Carousel.
- Forest Glade congregation, under the Rev. Brian Headley, is tremendously enthused about its mission to the people in that area of Windsor. During the summer, 11 students did survey, youth and backyard ministry. As a result, there have been large increases in church school and worship attendance and a projected 225% increase in givings for 1977. Church school enrolment reached 81, youth and ladies work was active, and the average attendance of adults at Sunday worship was 65.
- Sauble Beach, Huron Feathers, a ministry that began with a one-week day camp in 1966, has become a significant enterprise of mission and evangelism, ministry and service, to holidayers at the beach. The staff last year included Caroline Lockerbie and David McBride, pastoral students; Patrick McHugh and Joan Shouldice, hostel program; Jim Henderson and Linda Campbell, swim program.
- Summer ministries were ably conducted at Bayfield by Mr. and Mrs. Dwight Nelson and at Stokes Bay by Lorna Mitchell.

*Synod of Toronto and Kingston*

- The following charges gained the status of self-support: Guildwood, Scarborough; St. Luke's, Oshawa; Emmanuel-St. Matthew's and St. James, Toronto; Westminster, Angus; St. Stephen's, Weston; Erindale; and Elmira. Pine Ridge in West Toronto had a grant approved but remained self-supporting.
- There is one new extension charge, Doon in Waterloo-Wellington.
- Glenbrook in Brampton Presbytery and the three other participating congregations (Anglican, United Church and Baptist) are proceeding with the first unit of the campus building in Erin Mills, South Common.
- Other extension charges are approaching self-support and are negotiating for the purchase of their manses.

*Synod of Quebec and Eastern Ontario*

- Deep regret was expressed on the death of the Rev. Ronald Rowat, former Superintendent of Missions for the Synod.
- The Rev. John Herman was appointed to serve as an ordained missionary at Robert Campbell Memorial, Montreal, and the Rev. Linda Corry at Ormstown and Rockburn.
- The Rev. J. D. Wilkie served the congregation in Port Cartier and catechists Mr. J. O. Forrester and Mr. Charles F. Coombs the congregations of MacDonald's Corners and Leggatt's Point respectively.
- The Chinese congregation in Montreal continued to meet in its building although it has been expropriated. They are negotiating for another building.
- The Hungarian congregation in Montreal is meeting in Livingstone Church.
- The Melville congregation sold its building and has amalgamated with the Knox Crescent-Kensington congregation.
- Tyndale House, Montreal, has commenced a second five year phase in cooperation with St. George's Anglican Church. The plan calls for a greater participation by the Anglican Church and a greater sharing of cost of operations.
- A successful Missions Weekend was held in the Presbytery of Ottawa. Meeting in three different sections of the Presbytery, the 18 scheduled meetings on Friday and Saturday had a total of 612 participants.
- Final details are being worked out for the purchase of 4½ acres of land in the Kanata-Glencairn region of Ottawa Presbytery. The Rev. Ralph Kendall has been appointed O.M. (part-time).

*Synod of the Atlantic Provinces*

- Rev. W.J.O. Isaac was recognized as Superintendent of Missions.
- Availability of manpower was a matter of concern during 1976, but this need is being met in 1977.
- The Synod is appreciative of the services of the Rev. Ed. Ling who, although retired, supplied the Wabush, Labrador charge for the latter part of the year.
- The visit of Dr. Akanu Ibiam and Mr. N. Ndu from Nigeria and the Mission Consultation prior to the Synod brought wide response.
- New work being considered: the appointment of a deaconess to work in Prince Edward Island and a chaplain to work in the universities in the Halifax area.
- Mrs. Ruth Beattie, deaconess in Cape Breton Presbytery, continues to be involved in Sunday Schools and week-day groups at the Chalmers Jack Mission and Dutch Brook. A children's weekly group and a women's group are being planned for Birch Grove. Three girls camps were directed by Mrs. Beattie. She also visits in hospitals and homes for the aged.

*Research and Planning*

- During 1976, the fourth year of its life, the Research and Planning Committee of the Board of World Mission has sought to fulfil the functions outlined for the Committee and the specific responsibilities described for the Secretary by the 1972 General Assembly (A & P 72, pp. 208 and 211).

— **Priorities:**

1. Clarifying goals to ensure that all the work of the Board fulfils our Gospel task and is not simply the continuation of long established ecclesiastical practices.
2. The evaluation of programs to ensure that our limited resources are all being used to maximum advantage.
3. To identify priorities among the many claims on the personnel and funds of the Board.
4. To stimulate research-mindedness on the part of the Committees and Staff of the Board so that we constantly review and question existing programs to see that they continue to be effective.

— **"Canada Mission" Consultations**

- Our most comprehensive study continues to be the Consultations in regard to the nature of our Church's mission and ministry in Canada. Regional Consultations were held September 21 - 23 in British Columbia, and September 30 - October 2 in the Atlantic Synod.
- Plans were laid for Consultations, in May in the Synod of Quebec and Eastern Ontario and also in the Prairie Synods and in June in the Synod of Hamilton and London.
- Already it is apparent that at least two factors affect the effectiveness of our Church — 1. the quality and discipline of discipleship within our congregations; 2. the extent to which the professional ministry allows and encourages lay members to play a significant role in the Church's life and witness.

— **The Work of Seven Task Forces**

- The Committee has continued to deal with specific tasks by Task Forces located in different areas of the country joining together people who have competence or initiative in the area concerned.
  - Recommendations came to the 1977 Board of World Mission from the Task Forces on the Caribbean, China, Work with Native Peoples, Self-Reliance in Mission, and Specialized Training. The Task Force on Witness in a Time of Religious Pluralism and B.W.M. Work in Transition have been inactive.
- The Statements adopted by the 1976 General Assembly, particularly from the Task Forces on China and on Work with Native Peoples, have had their effect on the life of congregations across Canada. However, the Board of World Mission needs to give more consideration to the implementation of proposals adopted by the General Assembly.

— **Special Assignments of Research and Planning**

- Three matters referred by the 102nd General Assembly to the Board of World Mission were referred for study to the Research and Planning Committee.
  1. Task Force on Work with Native Peoples brings a proposal in regard to the various issues of energy needs, industrial development, rights and welfare of peoples in the area, and responsible stewardship of the natural environment.
  2. A special resolution in regard to Declining Church Membership was given to the B.W.M. and B.C.L. by the General Assembly and the Research and Planning Committee has acted for the B.W.M. in setting up a Committee on the State of the Church. This Committee is making a careful study and survey and hopes to report in February of 1978 so that the Boards can bring a report to the General Assembly of that year.
  3. In the light of the changing context of mission everywhere, the Research and Planning Committee is making arrangements for "A Day of Study" to be held in mid 1977.

— **Study Leaves**

- Miss Giollo Kelly used her study leave for theological studies at Knox College.
- Rev. R. M. Ransom did his studies largely at the Selly Oak Colleges in Birmingham, and in visitation of various Study Centres in Europe on the theme of "New Forms of Christian Mission and Outreach".

- Our mission outreach both in Canada and overseas, in the coming years, may present a very different picture from what it has in the past. We have a very large task to call our congregations to an understanding of the new missionary patterns. Research and Planning must be given top priority in the continuing work of the Board of World Mission to ensure that the Board serves the Lord in new directions called for by the demanding new questions of this day.

— **Mission Education**

- Continued to produce articles and information for the Presbyterian Record, Glad Tidings, The Message, Prayer Partnership as well as Encounter (3 issues) and the Church Calendar.

The following Visual Aids were produced:

— **Filmstrips**

- "Into the Second Century" in connection with the Second Century Advance for Christ Committee;
- "Caribbean Crosscurrents" for the 1977-78 study theme;
- and a B.C.L. filmstrip on the work of the Church supported by the General Assembly Budget.

— **Slide Sets**

- 14 sets in conjunction with the study theme "Christian Concerns: Canadian Response"; "Nepal"; "Hospital Work in Nepal"; and "Anishinabe Fellowship House" for the Women's Missionary Society.

— **Pamphlets**

- A new series "Quick Facts": Taiwan and Nepal are into a second printing, and India, Japan, Malawi and Nigeria are printed.

— **Film**

- "The Living Water" (28 minutes) was purchased from the United Mission to Nepal for promotional use. It is available from Communication Services.

— **Deputation**

- 33 missionaries were engaged in deputation.
- Four World Mission Weekends were conducted and assistance was given in planning and providing materials and personnel for several other types of congregational and presbyterial events.
- Mission resource persons were provided at nine summer camps.

— **Overseas Visitors**

- Dr. Akanu Ibiam and Mr. N. A. Ndu, outstanding Nigerian churchmen, visited Canada in September and October. They met with Canadian church people across the country, renewing old friendships and making new ones.

— **Calendar 1977**

- 44,000 copies of the 1977 Calendar were sold.

— *Church and University, Overseas Students and Laymen Abroad*

— **Church and University**

- In his report, Dr. Goodwill MacDougall wrote concerning the Church's ministry on the campus: "I am convinced of the importance of the Church being actively engaged in a ministry to those in the learning community. We thank God for the support we have received from the Board of World Mission, the members of the Church and University Committee, from congregations, and we pray that we may be given insight to know what we should do and the strength and perseverance to carry this through to completion."
- Our Church is involved in ecumenical chaplaincies on seven campuses, and we have eight chaplains from our Church working part-time at universities.
- Two Conferences held last year indicate the wide range of concerns shared by "Church and University". One held at the University of Ottawa considered the theme "Third World Students in Canada". It concerned itself with ways to alleviate the hardships being caused by the differential fees and the existing

immigration policy. The sponsors were charged with the task of presenting to the appropriate House of Commons Standing Committee the views on Manpower and Immigration regulations as they were expressed at the Conference. The Atlantic Ecumenical Conference of University Chaplains in Saint John, New Brunswick, considered "What the People hope for in Atlantic Canada; how Higher Education in Atlantic Canada can respond to human beings; and the Role of Campus Ministry."

- "I am convinced," Dr. MacDougall concluded, "that the Church's ministry to the learning community has a potential that we have scarcely begun to tap. I hope and pray that as a committee we can find ways and means of doing it."

#### Overseas Students

- The concern for overseas students was expressed mainly through:
  1. Consultation and co-operative work with university, community, and government to ascertain where the Church can be of assistance to overseas students, as in certain problem areas of immigration, discrimination, accommodation, financial difficulties, etc.;
  2. Contact with individual students or with persons enquiring on their behalf about certain problems or personal situations;
  3. Contact with our congregations by deputation, correspondence, newsletter, etc. to interpret the situation of overseas students, and to encourage and aid their outreach to students.
- In some areas, e.g., Hamilton and Waterloo, Ontario, churches have established links with the foreign student advisor and the chaplains at the university, and are involved with foreign students through host family programs, seeking financial aid, working on accommodation difficulties and on issues of discrimination and even overt racism, as well as welcoming students into the fellowship of their congregations.

#### Laymen Abroad

- Requests for information, orientational material, and overseas contacts came in from church members going overseas to study, work or travel.
- Some of the overseas churches have expressed concern about the questionable effects of foreign tourism in their countries and have asked North American and European churches to seek ways to sensitize their members to the potential for good and bad of their travel abroad. The Service for Laymen Abroad, in cooperation with other denominations and church-related bodies in Canada and overseas, has prepared some resources (study material, pamphlets, slide presentation, etc.) for individual and group consideration of Christian responsibility in travel and the effects of contact with other cultures through travel.
- B.W.M. Insight Tours were made to India and Nepal, October to November, 1976, and to the Maritimes Provinces, September to October, 1976.

#### Missionary Residence

462 Oriole Parkway, Toronto, Ontario.

- The Mission Residence has been full this past year and extra accommodation has been needed. Twenty people are currently in residence with two extra some weekends.
- The budget amount of \$6,500 is being raised due to the increase in taxes and maintenance costs.
- Gifts received from Glenview Church, Toronto, Ailsa Craig Church, and groups from Leaside Church, Toronto, have made possible the purchase of a new washing machine, kitchen table and chairs, and two sewing machines. Plans are made for further replacement of carpeting, upholstering, painting and repairing.

#### Joint Task Force on Field Services

This Committee has met twice during the year and continued discussions on work relationship of Superintendents of Mission and Education Resource Persons (W.M.S.) and methods of coordination of work.

#### Joint Task Force on Mission Education Services

This Committee is composed of representatives of the Board of Congregational Life, the Women's Missionary Society (W.D.) and the Board of World Mission. Joint planning and coordination for Mission Education for congregations has taken place, with an informative pamphlet on "Native Peoples" being produced. Other publications are being planned on the Caribbean and information on Overseas Personnel, including national leaders as well as missionaries.

#### The Church's Role in Immigrants' Integration

(from the report of Dr. R. Singh)

In the twenty-five years that have passed since the introduction of Quota Immigration, Toronto's population has increased from one million to over two million, half of which is foreign born. The number of ethnic communities has increased from 24 to 72; and major established religions, from two to seven. In 1951 the Anglo-Saxon community made up 86% of Toronto's population; and other European communities, 13%. Today the Anglo-Saxon community accounts for 65% and other European communities, 26%. The percentage of immigrants from Non-European countries has risen from less than one percent to nine percent. The arrival of diverse ethnic and religious groups has added new dimensions to Toronto's religious and cultural life, and has made Toronto a distinguished multi-cultural metropolis.

While adding color and richness to Toronto's life style, these cultural and religious diversities have also created value conflicts and social tensions between the new immigrants and some of the white Canadians. These tensions are expressed in a variety of ways, ranging from violent physical attacks on persons and property to beneath-the-surface subtle discrimination in employment, schools, housing, and general social life.

Immigrants coming from Third World countries have been the major victims of discrimination. They are the "visible minority" easily distinguishable by appearance and language. Recently the Indians and Pakistanis have become the specific targets of the violent attacks which have been escalating since December 1976. The Toronto Police, the Toronto Transit Commission Chairman, the Criminal Courts, and Metro's Board of Education are seriously concerned about the destructive aspects of violence and possible methods to keep it from spreading. But the most serious kind of discrimination, the subtle under-the-surface kind, which affects the everyday life of the immigrant, continues unabated and with very little being done to stop it.

Here is an opportunity and a challenge for the churches to participate in nation-building by helping Toronto and Canada discover its true identity.

Prejudice is a cultivated attitude. It begins in the family and is nurtured in schools and in peer groups. It is practised in everyday life through discriminatory words and deeds. It is justified in the name of race, religion, culture, and even ideology. In order to eliminate discrimination, the church's efforts must begin with the family and extend into schools and places of work.

#### Practical Suggestions for Churches:

1. *Grassroots Contact by the Church:*  
Create a small project for a youth group to locate and list the number and details of immigrant families in the area.
2. *Family Friendship Week:*  
Women members choose a non-Christian immigrant family as friends; invite them to your home, church, and other social functions, and attend theirs. Deepen the fellowship by sharing home-making skills, such as cooking, at special sessions of the Women's Association.
3. *Special Family-Friendship Service:*  
Once a year, plan a special ecumenical service for families and their immigrant family-friends. The service may be followed by a potluck meal to which ethnic groups bring their favorite dishes (chance to share).
4. *Inter-Cultural and Inter-Religious Dialogue:*  
This may be extended to include orientation programs for immigrants as well as Canadians.

5. *Inter-Cultural and Inter-Religious Worship and Meditation:*  
One to two-day meditation and worship jointly organized with "living men of other faiths" to discover how God speaks to people of different faiths through different channels (a leap forward in faith).
6. *Immigrant Aid Committee:*  
Encourage immigrants to form their own association to help themselves. Help them further by associating them with the decision-making processes in the community, factory, offices, and other organizations.
7. *Enlistment of Individual Help:*  
Ask church members to help immigrants obtain "equal opportunity" in employment and in renting or buying homes.
8. *English Teaching:*  
Church members can help people who do not know English adequately, by helping them with conversational English.
9. *Educational Institutions:*  
Parents who are members of the Parent-Teacher Association or school boards can help by encouraging removal of culturally prejudicial material from the curriculum.

#### Overseas Scholarship Program

Eight students from churches overseas studied with the aid of the Overseas Scholarship Program:

- **Rev. Haimdat Sawh** completed an M.A. program at the Toronto School of Theology and then returned to his ministry with the Better Hope congregation in Guyana.
  - **Miss Mgbeke Okore** received her B.A. degree from Victoria University, Toronto, and left immediately for Nigeria where she will work in Christian Education.
  - **Rev. Saindi Chipangwi** continued work on his doctoral program, doing research within his home church: The Church of Central Africa Presbyterian, Synod of Blantyre in Malawi. He has returned to Aberdeen, Scotland for the final phase of his program.
  - **Mr. J. S. Chen** continued in the B.Phil. course at St. Andrew's University, Fife, Scotland. Mr. Chen is a nominee of The Presbyterian Church of Taiwan.
  - **Miss Park Shik Kim** completed her study of Korean language and culture, and returned to work in the K.C.C.J. office in Tokyo.
  - We shared in the travel expenses of the **Rev. Kao Ho Kim**, of the K.C.C.J. who worked in a volunteer service program of the United Presbyterian Church U.S.A.
  - The Board of World Mission shared in supporting **Mr. David Udoh** of Nigeria in his studies in hospital administration in Scotland.
  - **Mr. Huang**, nominated by The Presbyterian Church in Taiwan undertook studies in Japan. He is the third leader from the mountain area to study rural and community development in Japan.
  - **Dr. Ram Singh's** research on immigration has come under the Board of World Mission scholarship program.
- The Board of World Mission has been assisted in the scholarship program by gifts from individuals and congregations. This support has allowed more people to be assisted in preparing for leadership in their countries.

#### CANADA MISSIONS

The year 1976 has seen a variety of gratifying developments in the areas which comprise Canada Missions, as well as some situations which give cause for concern.

- Insofar as financial growth can be trusted as an indicator of health and strength in our charges, there has been notable progress. In 1975 five aid-receiving congregations assumed self-support, in 1976 eight others did so, while in 1977 thirteen have taken this significant step. In each case this involved responsibility for the amount previously received as a grant, as well as paying in full the

increases in stipend and allowances, which for 1975 totalled \$950, for 1976 \$1050, and for 1977 \$1100.

In addition, many congregations have undertaken substantial costs relative to the improvement and enlargement of their facilities in order to provide for expanded attendance and programs. We have noted with satisfaction the repayment of loans issued earlier by the various lending agencies of the national Church, some after years of neglect and apparent indifference.

The charges which have undertaken full self support are as follows: Springhill and Windsor in Nova Scotia; Montreal, Hungarian; Warkworth, Ontario; Guildwood, Scarborough; St. Matthew's, Toronto; St. Stephen's, Weston; Erindale in Brampton Presbytery; Scottlea in Niagara Presbytery; Greenbrier in Paris Presbytery; Chinese Vancouver; Port Alberni; and Duncan in British Columbia.

Several other charges are at present negotiating to purchase the manse purchased some years ago and held for them by the Board of World Mission with a view to assuming full self-support.

Moreover, in most of the above cases the charge not only assumed the previous grants and the increases in rates of stipend and allowances, but also made further substantial increases in the latter category to raise the level of support given to their ministers well beyond the basic rates.

There are, however, some cases of slow growth, others of no growth at all and a few charges which seem to be declining.

Difficulty has been encountered by presbyteries in providing regular services on some of the more remote fields, and in others where local problems have disrupted work. The Board of World Mission has been called to help, and we wish to acknowledge the excellent service provided by so-called "retired" ministers. The Rev. Dr. Donald B. Mackay and the Rev. Edward Ling have given invaluable help in maintaining the cause of Wabush. The Rev. Douglas Wilkie, after a winter at Port Cartier, has agreed to serve there for another year. The Rev. John Nute has carried on the work at Kitimat. The Rev. Dr. James Dunn served at Knox Church, Sudbury, and following that, at Creston, B.C. The Rev. W. Fitzsimons, Dr. J.L.W. McLean, Dr. W. H. Fuller, Rev. W. J. McKeown and many others helped to man our pulpits and assist congregations through difficult days. Recently, the Rev. Norman Allison left a semi-retired status to take on full-time ministry at Whitehorse, Yukon and assist the congregation in their plans to erect a new sanctuary.

The visit by two representatives of the Board to the Western Arctic for the first time, has opened the possibility of considering how best our Church may assume its rightful share of responsibility for bringing the message and the fellowship of the Gospel to bear on people and institutions in that vast, challenging and rapidly developing area of Canada, "The Last Frontier".

#### CANADA, SPECIAL MINISTRIES

The work under Special Ministries covers a wide and varied range of outreach which is being carried on in the name of Jesus Christ.

It includes our ministry to persons to whom English is a second language: Chinese, French, Hungarian, Italian, Korean, Ukrainian, as well as the Native peoples of Canada.

Two of our Hungarian ministers retired - the Rev. Attila Csiszar of Calvin Church, Vancouver, and the Rev. Leslie Dienes of Pleasant Ridge, Brantford. The Rev. Laszlo Szamoskozi was appointed to Calvin, Vancouver.

The Ukrainian congregation in West Toronto was dissolved on May 25. The Rev. Michael Fesenko continued to serve as a retired minister, carrying on his ministry through overseas broadcasting and the publication *Evangelical Truth*, as well as giving pastoral care to elderly Ukrainian persons.

In our ministry to the Native people a number of personnel changes took place. Mrs. Mabel Powers resigned as Director of Anishinabe Fellowship to take theological training at Presbyterian College, Montreal. Mr. S. T. Robinson retired as Director of the Kenora Fellowship Centre and Mr. Colin Wasacase became our

first Native Director. Several new programs have been started under Mr. Wasacase's leadership. A committee was named by the Board in March 1976 to assess our Native work in Kenora. It has held a preliminary meeting and supports the expressed need of the Director for the appointment of a person based on the Kenora Fellowship Centre to give leadership in the area of Christian Education. As of February 1, 1977, Mr. S. T. Robinson has been serving as territorial missionary on a part-time basis in the Kenora area, with special responsibility for the Shoal Lake and Whitefish Bay reserves.

- Mrs. W. B. Leatherdale retired as a hospital visitor at the end of June, following 26 years of faithful ministry in the hospitals and medical institutions in Montreal and environs.
- At Tyndale House, Montreal, Mrs. Emily Drysdale Jones resigned from her part-time position, and Mrs. Lois Johnson transferred from her position as Program Director to a part-time position in order to undertake further studies.
- In the area of church planning and church extension, two new church sites were purchased - one in north-east Calgary for the Centennial congregation, and one in the Kanata-Glencairn area of Ottawa.
- The slower economy experienced within our nation in the past two years has retarded the plans of many developers. One of our continued problems is the matter of sufficient capital funds to enable us to secure sites and manses in order to keep pace with the growing areas across Canada, as we seek to share in the extension of Christ's Kingdom within our nation.

#### *Church Extension*

#### **East Toronto Presbytery**

##### **University Church, Toronto**

- For the first four months of 1976 Miss Arlene Randall worked as Church Extension deaconess at University Presbyterian Church in Downsview with the Rev. Fred Howick.

##### **Malvern**

- Since May, Miss Arlene Randall has worked at Malvern.
- Cooperative curriculum development and teacher training were carried on with Anglican and United Churches.
- C.O.C., Explorers and a Youth Group were held in the basements of different homes.
- Tentative plans were made for a morning Bible Study group to be held simultaneously with a program for pre-school age children.
- "Summer Fun" Vacation Bible School, held in ten locations - backyards and parks, was carried out cooperatively by Anglican, Presbyterian and United Church congregations. There were 26 staff people and 267 children were reached.
- Besides hospital visiting and visiting of members and adherents involved in the church, minister and deaconess visited new families in the community as a result of Interchurch Council Welcome Visitation programs.

#### **Brampton Presbytery**

##### **Meadowvale West**

- This Presbyterian congregation has grown slowly in numbers, but has gained momentum in spirit and in its own sense of identity.
- Cooperated with Lutheran, United and Anglican congregations in sponsoring a very successful Vacation Bible School with 70 children registered.
- The Rev. Derwyn Hill and deaconess Mrs. Margaret Read diligently visited and publicized the congregation and its programs.
- C.O.C. group was organized, and plans are to start an Explorer group and a Presbyterian Women's Group early in 1977.

##### **Erin Mills South - Glenbrook Church**

- Vacation Bible School had 160 children registered.
- A women's morning study group is planning a series of studies on parenting, done in cooperation with the Adler Institute of Toronto.

#### **Square One Ecumenical Centre**

- In addition to the Youth Coffee House and Bible Study groups, there is a Youth Outreach Ministry through Campus Life.
- On a Saturday night in Advent some of the volunteers and regular visitors to the Centre staged a Pageant at Dominion Court in Square One Mall. This production was well received, and was videotaped for a later telecast.

#### **Waterloo-Wellington Presbytery**

The Doon-Kitchener area is expanding. In June 1976 a massive friendship visitation and a follow-up visitation involving members of St. Andrew's Church and Doon Church took place. Results seemed "promising".

There are about 50 families associated with Doon congregation. Three buses go door to door and pick up the children.

The following programs are being offered: Cubs, Church School, Adult Bible Study, Ladies Aid, Ladies Choir and Men's Choir.

There are approximately 25 children and 10 very enthusiastic teachers in the Church School. At Christmas they presented a Christmas Play with a number of people within and outside the church school taking part. Following this, the Ladies Aid put on a Family Christmas Dinner with 93 attending.

A few of the Church School teachers attended teachers' workshops in Preston and Calvin, Kitchener.

Programs to begin before the summer months are: a Neighbourhood Nursery Program, and periodically a Fellowship Family Fun Night and a Communicants' Class.

A Work Bee on Saturdays during the fall and winter to complete renovations to the church building proved to be a great opportunity for fellowship.

#### *Inner City Ministries*

##### **Inner City Committee**

The Inner City Committee of the Board of World Mission acts in an advisory capacity to the Secretary for Special Ministries in Canada. The Committee met in early 1977 and reiterated the guidelines for undertaking inner city ministries as formed in 1971.

One concern is the need for some kind of ministry to the large numbers of Black or East Indian persons who have settled in many of the inner city or older urban districts of our larger cities. In view of racial tensions that are evident from time to time, the Church has a ministry of reconciliation to perform. One possibility for meeting this need in part would be the appointment of an area worker who would assist in relating these recent immigrants to our existing congregations.

It is the hope of the Committee that a Conference of Inner City Workers will be held early in 1978, to which Presbyteries with inner city concerns will send representatives. It is felt that there are a number of Presbyteries which should be facing up to the needs, opportunities and challenges of this type of ministry within their bounds.

##### **Flora House, Winnipeg**

Deaconesses - Miss Athalie Read and Miss Karen Hubert.

Chaplain - Rev. Colin MacIver.

The Women's Fellowship Group celebrated its fifth birthday with a luncheon meeting for former members. This group has taken an active interest in the community, preparing breakfast for the children at King Edward School and also visiting weekly at St. Joseph's, the Ukrainian Nursing Home. Some of the members speak Ukrainian and thus make a valuable contribution. Rev. C. MacIver as Chaplain is available to help in all situations. On Sunday about 15 children are transported from the mission to Calvin Church. This year it has been encouraging to see some Flora House families become Calvin Church families.

- "Family Night", once a month, proved to be worthwhile.

- Summer programs were planned and led by Athalie Read, Karen Hubert and summer student Martha Putnam, along with the advice and cooperation of the Chaplain, the Rev. Colin MacIver.
- Some of the older boys and girls attended a residential camp at Clear Lake while the majority of the children were involved in a tenting program at Birds Hill Park.
- A "Summer Ventures" program was held in the backyard, and Vacation Bible Schools during July and August.
- The leadership of the "After Four" clubs and evening clubs is largely volunteers from Winnipeg churches. Also, these churches help in many ways to further the outreach into the community.
- There are after school programs for girls 8 and 9, 9 to 13 (C.G.I.T.), boys 9 to 11, boys 11 to 13, mixed groups for ages 5 and 6, and for 7 and 8.
- The club for boys 9 to 11 deals with problems of the community. Topics such as drugs and alcohol are discussed with the aid of Bible passages.
- Wednesday evening children of all ages have an opportunity to go to choir practice at Calvin Church.
- Friday night there is a drop-in centre for boys 11 to 15. Here boys have the opportunity to have a talk with one of the staff on a one to one basis.
- A women's club meets Wednesday mornings with Athalie Read and volunteer Noreen Wilson leading in worship and crafts, and the children being looked after by Karen Hubert.

#### North End Ministry - Hamilton

Deaconess - Mrs. Helen Allum.

- In 1976 over 200 apartment dwellers and homes were called on and presented with a list of the weekly church activities and a copy of one of the gospels. This resulted in more children becoming involved in the four after-school programs held weekly and in the church school. Over 80 children have come to these groups since September.
- The Neighbourhood Fellowship Hour, once a week, welcomed a few new faces this year.
- At present there is one home neighbourhood Bible study and prayer group, and more coffee-hour fellowship groups are being planned for the near future.
- We are associated with North End Christian Action. The joint summer program involved all ages in hiking, swimming, family camping, picnics and farm-outs.
- Through speaking engagements on the work, churches in the Presbytery were made more aware of the work and the needs of the people.

#### Christian Community House, Ottawa

Miss Sandra Estabrooks.

- Activity was fairly quiet during the first half of 1976 due to the hospitalization of Sandra Estabrooks. She reports: "The dependence created by illness put me in a position of receiving from the persons I had, at another time, ministered to, and the personal care of friends contrasted greatly with the impersonal treatment often encountered in our present medical system.
- "In September I enrolled in a course entitled 'Theology and Pastoral Care in Health Care Services'.
- "In the fall our church became responsible for visiting the Presbyterian patients in one of the city hospitals once every three months. I have been in charge of those visits."
- It was also a year for the house community to reflect on its identity as a Christian community. With a slackened pace and without too many pressures from without or within there was an opportunity to take a serious look at goals and objectives as a Christian community.
- A number of people came to "107", referred from Carleton Chaplaincy Department, Vocational Rehabilitation services, Catholic Family services, Anglican Social services, Salvation Army, Child Evangelism, Inter-Varsity Christian Fellowship, as well as other churches and the now wide circle of friends and alumni.

- Sandra Estabrooks spoke at a Mission weekend in Ottawa, four Sunday services and at Campus-In-The-City and other Inter-Varsity Christian Fellowship gatherings.

#### East Toronto Presbytery

Deaconess - Miss Charlotte M. Stuart.

"During the first year in my new area of responsibility," reports Miss Stuart, "I have continued to work with Queen Street East and the tricongregation of Emmanuel, St. James and St. Matthew's, while working my way into some of the other ten congregations in the east end of the city.

#### Queen St. E. Presbyterian Church

"The response of community people to the ministry of the church continues to be encouraging, and I continue to enjoy the task of interpreting the attitudes and needs of 'non-church' people to members and adherents of the church 'family'," says Miss Stuart.

#### Emmanuel, St. James and St. Matthew's

The Rev. A. Ross Gibson left to take up studies and the Rev. Dr. Charles Cochrane was appointed in team ministry with Miss Evelyn Carpenter. There has been an increase in joint activities - the Sessions now meet jointly, and there is one treasurer responsible for all staff salaries and housing. The team work committee plans joint worship services. With the help of the Rev. Calvin Elder, the treasurers and Board chairmen have decided they should meet their two stipends without the B.W.M. grant.

#### Rogers Memorial

In July Miss Stuart met with a representative committee of Rogers Memorial and Westview congregations. It was agreed to propose to their respective congregations and Presbytery that the congregations become a two-point charge.

#### Gateway Community Church, Toronto

Minister - Rev. Rodger Talbot.

Deaconess - Miss Margaret Stewart.

Miss Lorna Cameron (a third year student at Ewart College) studied the role that culture plays in church participation.

Miss Stewart met with community workers to discuss a senior citizens group. The first meeting was held April 1, and of the 70 people who responded, 67 were from the Ismali Community. The group met every second week and a total of about 20 Anglo-Saxons came on different days. Miss Stewart writes: "We feel being overwhelmed by a majority from one ethnic group was the reason they never returned. The Ismalis are anxious to be integrated with other ethnic groups, but the question remains - how? Other problems have arisen, including a communication problem due to language. We are seeking assistance from leaders in the Ismali Community to determine future action."

Miss Stewart has been meeting weekly with a young boy in the congregation who has cerebral palsy. It is a great challenge to help him grow in his faith.

An Outreach Commission was reorganized and produced a new brochure, 4,000 of which have been distributed.

About 120 initial contacts were made with Anglican, Presbyterian and United Church people living in Flemingdon Park. Newsletters and other information about the church have been mailed out to interested people.

Miss Stewart writes: "Changes are happening quickly, and we need to learn how to keep ahead of ourselves. We need to be open to the Holy Spirit who is at work among us, and seek His guidance in all that we do."

#### Westminster Presbytery - Central Church, Vancouver

Deaconess - Miss Annabelle Wallace.

- Central Church is becoming known to the children and parents in the west end of Vancouver as a church community that is concerned for them, a fun place, and a place where they are welcome.
- There were C.O.C., Explorers and Teen programs, reaching about 40 children.
- A Vacation Church School at "Spring Break" had 40 children, and parents came for the closing. Four Vacation Church Schools were held in the summer.

- Joint ventures with the United Church were a Teen Drop In and Teen Day Camp and a Vacation Church School for Seniors 20 and over.
- A license was secured in September for an Out-of-School-Care program. This is a service to working parents, especially the single parent families, caring for the children after school. The C.O.C. program is incorporated into the program. An off-shoot has been the development of a Park ministry through being at the park and meeting people.
- A few new families attend Central regularly, and the children attend the church school.

#### *Institutions*

##### **Armagh**

- Director - Miss Helen Ingleby.
- Program One for unmarried mothers saw 52 admissions with 43 infants born, many of whom have been adopted.
- Program Two for young women in other stressful situations has endeavoured to meet the needs of some 60 young women.
- Those in Program Two may continue education at local high schools in the community, while those in Program One study in Armagh's classroom.
- As is often the case in problems relating to adolescence, parents also have been in need of assistance - some for counselling; others for supportive reassurance upon entering their daughters to our care. The work of Armagh remains that of consolidating the family structure.

##### **Presbyterian Fellowship House, Winnipeg**

- House parents - Mr. and Mrs. Frank Swirski.
- The relationship between the Board of Fellowship House and Marymount Centre for Adolescent Girls continued to be excellent.
- During 1976 21 girls ranging in age from 14 to 17½ years stayed for an average of 9 to 10 months each.
- All except one of the 21 girls were direct transfers from one of the closed units and/or the group home system.
- Six girls worked in various jobs in the community. The remaining 15 attended Marymount School or a community based school.
- The major focus and purpose of the halfway house has remained: serving the girl who has no real family involvement, or has no intention of returning home but rather has the goal of eventually living an independent life from the family. However, the girl still requires support and direction in enhancing a more realistic, healthy approach to independent living. The original focus was for the girl age 16 and over. Younger girls are now accepted.
- The Rev. Donald A. Donaghey continued to meet with the girls on a weekly basis for dinner, fellowship and discussion.

##### **Tyndale House**

- Director - Rev. R. W. Johnson.
- Program Director - Miss Helen Taylor.
- Deaconess - Mrs. Lois Johnson.
- The full partnership between the Anglican Diocese of Montreal and the Presbytery of Montreal made available resources to enhance the level of ministry being offered in the Little Burgundy district of Montreal. Workers from the two communions shared a leadership role in encouraging the growth of community involvement.
- The Tyndale-St. George's film-slide presentation was a helpful tool used by the staff in presenting the ministry of mission to both Anglican and Presbyterian congregations in Montreal and surrounding region.
- A few citizens of Little Burgundy, together with Tyndale staff, sought to develop a greater sense of community by bringing together some of the multi-cultural and multi-racial factions.
- Tyndale Youth Volunteer Corps met on a monthly basis with Tyndale program staff to plan activities for young people 12 to 18 years of age.

- Leadership training events were held for new volunteers who gave their time and talents as program assistants in the After School and evening programs.
- Tyndale Women's Opportunity Group continued to help women both single and married, young and old, to participate in activities where they can learn new skills for use in their family experiences.
- Events were planned open to all members of the family, e.g. A Getting to Know Your Neighbour outing.
- The Pre-School for three year olds and the after school programs continued, while special camping programs were offered during the summer.
- Ms. Emily Drysdale resigned, and Miss Helen Taylor replaced Mrs. Lois Johnson, who resigned her full-time position as Program Director to study at University. Mrs. Johnson continues part-time. A student deaconess, Anja Oostenbrink, gave leadership in the two-week Vacation Bible School, and two local young people accepted responsibilities as youth workers on staff.

##### **Verdun Day Care Centre**

- Deaconess - Miss Hazell Davis.
- Total registration - 30 children; average attendance 27. Children are from one year to nine years of age.
- A regular program was followed throughout the fall, winter and spring months, with outdoor play when weather permitted.
- The Centre received many gifts of food, money, toys and knitted articles for which they were most grateful.
- Volunteers prepared and served the children hot lunches each day.

#### *Hospital Visitation*

##### **Toronto**

- Hospital Visitors - Miss Catherine Watson and Miss Terry Martens.
- Senior Citizens Visitor - Miss Lillian Reay.
- Visited convalescents and chronic care patients at Riverdale Hospital. These week-day visits were to both those who attend church and non-affiliated patients. The latter responsibility was expanded from two floors to all but one floor, which was visited by the United Church Chaplain.
- Planned Sunday church services at Riverdale with Presbyterian ministers of the presbytery. The work of bringing patients to and from the services was shared by six churches. Fifty to sixty patients attended each service. Cassette recordings of the church services were made available to those who could not come to the auditorium. A member of the Gideons was appointed to hospital administration, so Bibles were readily available.
- Visited at some Nursing Homes - Townview, Colonial, Fudger House, Mayfair Manor, Providence Villa and Cummer House.

##### **London**

- Hospital Visitor - Miss Lily Schneider.
- Fourteen places were visited regularly with approximately 104 Presbyterians. A total of 1672 visits were made.
- Literature such as Glad Tidings, These Days, pamphlets for special occasions were distributed regularly.
- Ladies of London Presbyterian continued to supply small gifts for patients.

##### **Vancouver**

- Hospital Visitors - Miss Florence Edge and Miss Peggy Mercer.
- "The story of the hospital visitor is the story of a helping, reaffirming and enabling ministry," writes Miss Edge. "I am grateful for help to purchase booklets for patients by Kirkwall, Ontario, W.M.S.; thoughtfully chosen and beautifully wrapped Christmas gifts for distribution donated by ladies of St. Paul's, Vancouver, and First and St. Aidan's, New Westminster.
- "Patients with a Presbyterian background are grateful for the genuine concern that the church has for their spiritual and physical needs," writes Mrs. Mercer.

- The completion of the Presbyterian Senior Citizens Home "Dunwood Place" will be another challenge to our Christian outreach.

#### Chinese Ministries

##### Toronto

- Minister - Rev. W. Doo.
- Deaconess - Miss Grace Wong.
- Chinatown is expanding. It is a very challenging mission field.
- Women's Association, Young People's Group, Prayer meeting, took place once a week, while Young Women's Guild had its meeting every two weeks. Church annual meeting, picnic, evangelistic meetings and bazaar were all in schedule.
- 80 young people participated in a retreat at Echo Lake Youth Camp.
- An Adult English class, sponsored by the Ministry of Culture and Recreation and the Church, was held twice each week.
- The Church, Young Men's Institute and Chinese Public School are in the same building, thus Church workers become involved in helping to solve outside problems.

##### Victoria

- Minister - Rev. Siu-man Lee.
- Deaconess - Miss Fanny Tse.
- Sunday School was in operation the whole year. There were four classes and five teachers. Average attendance was 26 pupils.
- The Women's Bible Class in Chinese met once a week with eight or nine attending regularly.
- A new women's group was organized. The members are mostly from Hong Kong, and Cantonese is their work language. Two other ladies groups met regularly, one using English and the other Cantonese and Taiwanese.
- Nursery School continued with the children enjoying stories, music and games, and taking part in special church services.
- Instead of a Christmas party for the parents, the children of the Nursery School visited the Chinese Hospital and the home of Senior Citizens, where they sang Christmas carols. They also presented the Christmas drama for the Chinese Lions Club City-Wide Children's Christmas Party.
- Junior Choir had 17 members.
- Newsletters were circulated.

##### Vancouver

- Minister - Rev. L. K. Lin.
- Deaconess - Miss Annie I. Wilson.
- Woman Missionary - Miss Elsie Young.
- The general pattern of activities remained basically the same as in 1975: nursery school, lesson preparation, home and hospital visits, Bible and prayer hour, W.M.S. monthly meetings, monthly congregational tea, two regular Sunday worship services, Board of Managers meetings, Sunday School Staff prayer and planning meetings, and Christian Education meetings.
- Nursery school had a total enrolment of 62, and four special programs were held.
- Visiting families of the nursery school children was considered very important. The staff also visited members of the congregation, former students and new immigrants.
- Average attendance at Sunday School was 24.
- Counselling by phone and letter were also part of the total outreach.
- 63 students were enrolled for the two-week Vacation Bible School.

#### Windsor

- Minister - Rev. David Chan.
- Sunday service average attendance is 45; Baptisms 5; Transfer 1; Sunday School enrolment 16; Adult English class 6.
- Fellowship tea was held once a month.
- Outdoor service was conducted at community picnic.
- A Children's Picnic was held for the first time.
- T.V. local station videotaped a Sunday service and telecast it as part of the Chinese Community Program. During the International Festival in June the videotaped service was shown continuously for three days at the Chinese Pavilion.
- Printed newsletters and periodicals were circulated to the community.

#### French Ministry

##### Montreal

- Eglise St. Luc is our only self-supporting congregation. With a membership of 214, it has been served by the Rev. Dr. André Poulain for over twenty years. In addition to ministering to Eglise St. Luc, Dr. Poulain is editor of a fine French language paper, *La Vie Chrétienne*.
- Rev. Jean Porret**
- Mr. Porret's main responsibility is a chaplaincy ministry at the Université de Montreal.
- Ste. Foy, Quebec**
- Eglise St. Marc is a small mission to French-speaking peoples in this suburb of Quebec City. The Rev. David Craig has ministered to the congregation of 29 members since January, 1976. In addition, he carries on a ministry to the students at Laval University.

#### Hungarian Ministries

##### Montreal

- Minister - Rev. Peter M. Szabo.
- Hungarian Presbyterian Church in Montreal moved from the east end of the city to Livingstone Presbyterian Church. In addition to the joint use of the building, the two congregations have the same minister. Mr. Szabo conducts both the English and Hungarian services.
- In the life of the ethnic community, congregational dinners play an essential part in providing opportunity for scattered members to meet and get to know each other. The Hungarian congregation renovated the kitchen and constructed new tables for the hall. The English congregation purchased chairs. A new P.A. system was installed, and the Nursery and Sunday School rooms were renovated and redecorated.
- Evangelistic meetings with guest speakers were held for four successive nights prior to Easter.
- Seven young people became members of the congregation.
- Two conferences for elders were held. "How to be together" was the topic of the first. The Eastern Ontario and Quebec Elders Program was translated and used with some revision for the special ethnic situation at the second conference.
- A memorial service for the 300th Anniversary of the Hungarian Galley Slaves was shared with the Livingstone congregation.
- On Reformation Day, the two congregations celebrated with special worship services and a joint congregational dinner, followed by a film on the life of Martin Luther.
- At Christmastime, the bilingual Candlelight Service was a memorable occasion.
- Due to the noticeably strong nationalistic feeling and language discrimination in Quebec, many families, especially those with children, are seriously considering a move to the western provinces. "With this in mind," writes Mr. Szabo,

"it is hard to make any predictions about the future of our congregation, yet we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love Him."

#### Mount Brydges

Minister – Rev. Louis Vietorisz.

- Congregation ministers to small group of ethnic people in and around Mount Brydges, London and Strathroy.
- Membership 56; Baptism 1 infant; Confirmations 5; Communion six times; average attendance 29.
- Repair work to the church building was done by members, and substantial financial support was given by the Ladies Aid.
- Mr. Vietorisz is the publisher of "Quiet Moments", the Hungarian edition of the Upper Room, 2900 copies of which are printed. Hungarian Bibles and evangelistic literature were distributed.

#### Calvin, Edmonton

Minister – Rev. Gabor Deze.

- 1976 was one of the best years in the life of this congregation.
- Church attendance was above average and individual Sunday contributions and special gifts increased.
- After three years without a Sunday School, it was started again, and the Ladies' Aid was revived.
- Session meetings now begin with Bible Study and more people realized the importance of the visible word, the Lord's Supper, administered on six occasions.
- The congregation fulfilled all its allocations and took over the increased stipend.
- In order that the church building be used more efficiently, a community project is organizing the Hungarian old timers and other senior citizens in the Church neighbourhood, providing them with a place and opportunity for fun, play and fellowship.

#### Calvin, Vancouver

Minister – Rev. Laszlo Szamoskozi.

- After 43 years of active service in the ministry (25 years in Hungary and 18 years in Canada) the Rev. Attila Csiszar, minister of Calvin Church since 1967, retired from the active ministry. The new minister, the Rev. Laszlo Szamoskozi, and his family arrived on September 15, 1976.
- Average attendance is 52.
- The Lord's Supper was served six times. Total participants – 280; average – 46.
- Baptisms – 3 infants.
- A Newsletter was sent out six times.
- Sunday School average attendance – 15. Saturday School average attendance – 15.

#### Italian Ministry

##### Beckwith Memorial, Montreal

Minister – Rev. Arthur Iarrera.

- The two-point charge arrangement at Beckwith Memorial and St. Michel congregations continued.
- The bilingual ministry was maintained at all regular services of worship.
- Bible Study was held once a week at St. Michel for both congregations under the leadership of the minister.
- The Annual church picnic with St. Michel was held.
- The public address system was replaced.
- The Every Person Visitation was conducted and received good response.
- The Ladies groups of the congregation assisted financially.

#### Korean Ministry

##### Sae-Hahn, Toronto

Minister – Rev. Dai Kyun Kim.

- There was an increase of about 50 members.
- Sae-Hahn Korean Christian Centre was organized for evangelical, cultural and social work. This is a new project for 50,000 Korean immigrants in Toronto.
- A Radio Mission in the Korean Language was presented through CHIN multi-cultural broadcasting for thirty minutes every Sunday evening.
- The congregation is seeking a church building and has raised \$10,000 toward this goal.

##### London

Minister – Rev. Andrew S. Lee.

- Two elders were elected.
- The minister and members arranged cemetery space for the congregation.

Other Korean congregations are active among the Korean communities in Toronto, Kitchener-Waterloo and Vancouver.

#### Ukrainian Ministry

##### Toronto

Minister – Rev. Michael Fesenko.

On request of the congregation and with the approval of the Presbytery and the Board of World Mission, this work was dissolved at the end of May 1976. The church building was sold. The reasons for the dissolution were changes in downtown population, the process of assimilation of Ukrainians, as well as the absence of the immigration of Ukrainians.

54 weekly programs were broadcast to U.S.S.R. in the Ukrainian language, each program of fifteen minutes duration.

The bilingual journal "Evangelical Truth" was published regularly and sent free to pensioners, hospitals, and abroad.

Counselling and visitation among Ukrainians in Toronto included Greek Orthodox and Greek Catholics as well as Presbyterians and other Protestants.

#### Native Peoples – Indians of Canada

##### Winnipeg – Anishinabe Fellowship

Deaconess – Miss Isabel Allison.

Lay missionary – Mr. Douglas Goodwin.

- Mabel Powers continued until May when she left for study. Douglas Goodwin came at that time as a summer worker and stayed on.
- Three tenting camps and a residential family camp were conducted by Sandra Munro (Percy).
- A Vacation Bible School was held.
- Clubs included: Boys' 9 and over, Girls' 9 and over, Mixed for 5 - 8 year olds, and a Young Life group of teenagers. The Board and the Women's Auxiliary meet monthly.
- Sunday School and Worship Services are held Sunday afternoons.
- A family night of films was held in November and December.
- Douglas Goodwin writes: "We are located in a very needy area of the city. Many of the people living here are ensnared by the evils of city life – alcoholism, loneliness, family trouble, delinquency. Many are Indians recently arrived from reservations and are unprepared culturally for the rigours of the white city with its prejudices, meaningless hustle and bustle, tight schedules, and impersonality.

"Anishinabe Fellowship was established to help restore a spiritual basis to people through the gospel of Jesus Christ. By supporting the human dignity of each individual, by recognizing the integrity of the native way of life, by providing the facilities and opportunity for worship, action can be taken pastorally, socially, and in the realm of worship."

**Elphinstone**

Minister – The Rev. James Codling.

- This is the only Protestant church in the village and the only church with a Sunday School program.
- A Kids and Moms group met every second week and the young people's group was very active.

**Keeseekoowenin (Okanais)**

- The church building is not usable at present but it is hoped it can be repaired in the spring.
- Sunday School and church services were held regularly but sometimes very few attended. There is an interest and a need for the Church and the Bible.

**Rolling River**

- The young people of the reserve repaired the church as a summer project.
- An evangelist came to speak for three nights, and attendance was good.
- Terry Shannacappo from Rolling River is taking his third year of Bible School in Regina.

The three Saulteaux reserves have Young People's groups which have native leaders and inter-reserve competitions. A series of speakers is speaking on such areas as family, alcohol, interpersonal relationships.

**Dakota Tipi Reserve (formerly Sioux Village)**

- This is the newest reserve in Manitoba and one of the newest in Canada. The Rev. H. L. Henderson ministers to the people. The native people have self-government, with a chief and councillors, and an administrator (Native).
- There is a Sunday School program and an adult service at the close of the Sunday School each Sunday.
- A number of Native boys and girls attend the children's and youth program at First Church. There is a patrol of girls in the Guide Company, four girls in the Brownie pack, and seven boys in the Cub pack.

**Mistawasis, Wahpeton and Crutwell**

Missionary – Rev. Stephen How.

- Mr. How writes: "Indian people are on the move. . . About one-third of the treaty Indians are moving and the major flux of this migration is toward the urban centres. "Perhaps one of the most serious problems related to the native people is the increase of native inmates in the Federal penitentiaries. This means that serious crimes are on the rise among our native people, instead of petty crimes of a few years ago. This situation naturally leaves its mark and scars on the native communities. And yet in the midst of this bleak picture we can detect the quickening of the Spirit among our native congregations, faint though it may be at times. There are some faithful households who would stand and be counted when the occasion arises and declare their faith."
- Good Summer Vacation Bible Schools were held on the three reserves. Student minister Reg MacMillan was well received. Seven children were sent to Christopher Lake Camp. There were 31 baptisms.
- **Mistawasis** – Since the signing of Treaty No.6, there has been progress in many fields, such as housing, welfare, medicare and education. Living conditions have improved.
- **Crutwell** – After a long delay the community of Crutwell is entering the new phase of its development. Two houses are under construction, using native labour but partially paid by the government. These will be occupied by the most needy families in Crutwell. The church supports this project wholeheartedly.
- **Wahpeton** – This is a very well organized small reserve – population 80. People are very active in recreations and community farming. Sunday services in the homes are well observed throughout the year.

**Prince Albert**

- There are many native people in Prince Albert. The Rev. Stephen How is involved with the Presbyterian Fellowship House and the Indian and Metis Friendship Centre. Native people find it difficult to adjust to the value systems of a much more dominant culture and in turn feel dehumanized because they are not accepted by the culture they are taught in schools to emulate. Our church must speak to this situation.

**Prince Albert Fellowship House**

House parents – Mr. and Mrs. Jack Chiang.

- The purpose of the Fellowship House is to provide a Christian home for teenage Indian boys and adults as they come to Prince Albert to attend school or work in the city.
- The house has sleeping accommodation for 12 boys, plus an office.
- The Director counsels the boys, encouraging them to obtain as much education as possible to prepare them for the future.
- Regular Family Worship and a weekly Bible study session were held.
- Mr. and Mrs. Chiang operate a well disciplined, well-managed home.

**Kenora Fellowship Centre**

- Mr. S. T. Robinson completed ten years as Director.
- Mr. Colin Wasacase, the first native Director, was appointed on August 1, 1976.
- The Centre was well used not only for its own activities but also by various native organizations.
- A group representing various churches in Kenora conducted worship services at the jail in Kenora once a week.

**REPORTS FROM OVERSEAS CHURCHES AND OVERSEAS STAFF****GUYANA PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH**

Clerk of Presbytery – Mr. Charles Kartick.

- Guyana is now designated a socialist country and this offers a greater challenge to the Guyana Presbyterian Church. Every means of education from kindergarten to university is now under the control of Government, and teaching of religion is prohibited, thus emphasizing the role of the Church in Christian Education. Sabbath schools now play a vital role in the advancement of Christianity in Guyana.
- With a membership roll of approximately 2,250, the average attendance was 924, ranging from 95 in the large church to 4 in the smaller congregations.
- Eight ministers, one catechist and one female worker served the eleven parishes with 48 churches.
- The Rev. Randolph Etwaroo, following graduation from the United Theological College of the West Indies, serves in the Lower Corentyne Parish. The Rev. Haimdat Sawh, who completed his Master's degree under a Board of World Mission scholarship is back in his parish. "We are very grateful for this scholarship program," they report, "and plan to send someone in 1977." Mr. Albert James will be graduating from U.T.C.W.I. this year, and strenuous efforts are being made to recruit additional persons for training.
- Many parishes have small youth groups.
- Seventy-five percent of church members are women and this is very pronounced in the country areas. Mrs. Jessie Ledra has been appointed to concentrate on women's work. Financial restraints make it difficult to employ additional female workers but parishes are being asked to encourage lay-women in all areas of the church.
- Nearly every congregation has a sabbath school with enrolment ranging from 10 to 100 children. Every parish is advised to give full attention to the young as the sabbath school is the best means now for a child to learn of "The Master and His Love."

- For two years the Guyana Church offered that ten per cent per year be deducted from their Board of World Mission grant and they hoped that in five years they would be financially independent. Guyana, however, is passing through a severe crisis with many pressures on the economy, and it has been necessary to appeal to the B.W.M. to sustain their grant at the 1976 level for a period.
- The year was one of consolidation and there is evidence of a steady spiritual growth. Dedicated lay people are being trained and ministers are taking the position of teachers as they give the people an opportunity to grasp the message of the gospel. The Church in Guyana is grateful to The Presbyterian Church in Canada for financial help, advice and prayers and looks forward to continued fellowship. The people are going through the anguish of a changing Guyana and the Guyana Presbyterian Church hopes to play an important part in this change. They also hope to remain a vital and strengthening force in a new Guyana.

#### CHURCH OF NORTH INDIA

General Secretary - Mr. A. C. Dharmaraj.

In freedom and in unity, in witness and in service, the Church of North India celebrated its sixth anniversary on November 29, 1976. The tensions appearing in the initial years, the misgivings that emerged among the uniting traditions and the sombre clouds that flickered on the horizon here and there are being dispersed. Faith and hope are slowly and steadily leading the Church towards integration based on growing understanding and sympathy.

- The Plan of Action drawn up by the Church of North India Executive Committee in relation to C.N.I. priorities is being worked out in all the Dioceses to the best extent possible bringing them down to the grass-roots level. Yet, another plan of Outreach in Mission has been planned at Synod level and commended to all the Diocese. In both of these plans, proclamation by word and deed is given first priority, the next being self-reliance by 1980 for pastoral and evangelistic ministry reinforced by unceasing efforts of Stewardship education.
- Budgets at both Synod and Diocesan levels have been very carefully scrutinised under the guidance of the respective officers and treasurers. This is linked up with stewardship teaching and persuasion and is receiving encouraging response. A C.N.I. Pension scheme is being forged with the generous support of related churches overseas. The C.N.I. is also thinking in terms of partnership in the best sense in relation to overseas related churches and is looking forward to the first meeting of the C.N.I. Related Mission and Churches to be held in London in February 1977.
- The third Synod will meet in October 1977 at St. Stephen's College. One of the most important matters that will be discussed at that Synod will be the Ordination of Women to the Priesthood. Certain amendments to the C.N.I. Constitution will also figure at the Synod.
- Factors like Trusts, Boards of institutions are raising some problems and C.N.I. is doing its best to solve them. A few legal battles are being fought in certain pockets. The C.N.I. Trust Association is also picking up speed in exercising its functions in relation to transfer, and development of property as well as investments.
- The Liturgical Commission of the Church is steadily adding to its several books on worship and they are being used by the Dioceses.
- The North India Churchman is being published regularly. The C.N.I. has been able to bring out a map showing the 22 Dioceses and their headquarters and a brochure which serves as an illustrated introduction to the C.N.I.
- The C.N.I. is engaged in selecting seven Directors to be in charge of the various aspects of the life of the Church.
- The C.N.I. is in full communion with the Church of Pakistan, Church of Bangladesh and the Church of South India and Mar Thoma Church. A Joint Theological Commission of C.N.I., C.S.I. and M.T.C. is active in joint action for mission.

#### BHOPAL DIOCESE - Bishop J. A. Gonsalves.

The institutional work in the Vindhya-Satpura area is carried out under the Administrative Council for Christian Institutions (A.C.C.I.). Their report begins: "The Lord has said 'I will never leave Thee nor forsake Thee'. Time and time again during the past year, He has proved that His promises are true."

#### Masihi Middle School, Amkhut

Headmistress - Miss Juliana Tezlo.

- 360 pupils on the roll, many coming from surrounding villages.
- 17 teachers. Miss Agnes Hislop advises in educational affairs.
- In the Indore Divisional Board Examinations, 35% passed in class 8th and 67% in class 5th.
- 140 pupils in classes 6th and 8th received tribal stipend for ten months. Some textbooks were given from Book-Bank supplied by the State Government Education Department.
- The District Education Officer inspected the School and temporary recognition for the year was obtained. Application was made for the past two years for "Grant-In-Aid" but this has not been received as yet. A Teachers' Retreat was held when the Rev. D. Patliya emphasized the importance of Christian Education in schools.

#### Amkhut Hostel

Hostel Manager - Mr. Kalib B. Singh.

- 90 boys, a few of whom are non-Christian, lived in boys' hostel and 102 girls in girls' hostel. Warden, Matron and night Matron assist the Hostel Manager; and after school activities, the pupils living in the hostel help in the fields and kitchen.

#### Village Schools

Supervisor - Mr. Michael V. Singh.

- 6 Schools in 6 different villages, i.e. Jobat, Sardi, Chichaniya, Mendha Puniyawat and Mandhar. There are 13 teachers.
- In Jobat Primary School there are classes up to 5th standard and they hope to start 6th class in July 1977. One additional room will be completed in 1977. Many non-Christian pupils come from the town.
- Mr. Singh hopes to visit Canada and gain knowledge re Primary educational standards which could be utilized in tribal areas.

#### Christian Rural Health Centres (C.R.H.S.)

##### Barwani

Director of Public Health Nursing - Miss D. Morrison.

- The staff consisted of 1 Public Health Nurse; 1 Male Nurse; 3 Female Nurses; 1 Auxiliary Nurse Midwife and 1 Auxiliary Nurse. Two senior staff nurses resigned this year.
- In Barwani, home visits totalled 94, New Born and Infant care 16, Prenatal 3, Tuberculosis 2, Malnutrition 5 and Central Program 18.
- In Khalghat, home visits totalled 1,411, New Born and Infant care 313, Prenatal 85, Tuberculosis 58, Malnutrition 156 and Central Program 437.
- In Jalkhan, home visits totalled 2,103, New Born and Infant care 368, Prenatal 183, Tuberculosis 165, Leprosy 94, Malnutrition 656 and Central Program 443.
- In Mandelethwar, the work has been started with surveys, and a Clinical program is scheduled to begin January 1977. The project has been sanctioned by A.C.C.I. and the Regional Board, and Community Health work will include teaching, immunization, family planning, nutrition and sanitation.
- Dr. J. Naku and Dr. Paul Christian helped with the Clinics.
- Director and staff attended several workshops, retreats, classes, conferences and meetings where they have been taught and have taught. The students from Isabel McConnell School of Nursing, Jobat came for two weeks field experience.

**Mendha**

Director of Public Health Nursing – Miss S. Tezlo.

- This is the third year of Five Year program. In an area of five miles radius around Mendha, ten out of twelve villages have been surveyed and 8,086 people reached. The findings are much the same in each village, i.e. Poverty, and illiterate people struggling for mere existence.
- There are three dispensaries on the Mendha Project. Antenatal clinics, baby clinics, and general clinics are held regularly at four places. Nurses do home visiting, survey, and attend maternity cases and emergency calls.
- At Amkhut, Mendha and Sardi most of the Christians are educated and are progressing in their physical health.
- The Mission Agriculture land was used to grow corn, pulses, rice and wheat, and the grain produced was used for under five's in six villages.
- The Community Health field is used as a practice field for Public Health Students coming from Post Graduate School, Indore and Isabel McConnell School of Nursing, Jobat.
- In Mendha, out-patients totalled 6,543, home visits 3,840, antenatals 104, whooping cough 115, tuberculosis 157, and night blindness 169.
- In Sardi, out-patients totalled 3,301, home visits 127, antenatals 41, and tuberculosis 8.
- In Amkhut, out-patients totalled 8,091, home visits 506, antenatals 172, tuberculosis 6, and night blindness 22.

**Jobat**

Director, Community Health Nursing – Miss Ida White.

- This is the third year of a Five Year program. In an area of five mile radius around Jobat Christian Hospital, eight out of twelve villages have been surveyed and 5,918 people reached.
- Home visiting with health teaching, including care of infant and under five's and special emphasis on nutrition, has been done regularly but 65% of the children are suffering from second and third degree malnutrition. Obstacles include: Some of the villages have thick jungle and many little streams, homes are far apart so home visiting is difficult at any time and impossible during the rains; and many of the villagers move out to cities to find work during the hot season.
- The Community Health Building was completed and the inaugural and dedication service held on November 4, 1976.

**M. G. Abey Memorial Children's Home**

Acting Manager – Miss Margaret F. Kennedy.

Warden – Miss Ruth Guman.

- Twelve children live in the Home. They attend Primary School and Nursery School.
- Fourteen girls and eight boys live in the Amkhut Hostel.
- One boy and three girls are in High School, one boy in college, two girls in special training.
- About 150 children and adults shared the fellowship at the Abey Children's Home dinner in December.

Major changes have been made in the Nursing Curriculum. The Midwifery training period is reduced to nine months, and Community Nursing and Ward Administration will be taught in the third year. Beginning in 1977 all students must spend two weeks at Indore in order to get psychiatric nursing experience. The 3rd year and Midwifery students were sent to various places for field experience and two students from the Post Graduate School at Indore came to this School for their two months teaching experience.

Two young people who had completed their training returned to the School of Nursing as staff.

**KOREAN CHRISTIAN CHURCH IN JAPAN**

1976 can be summarized as a year of "Trial and Hope in the Mission of the K.C.C.J.," reports the Rev. Kyong Shik Choi.

"For the last several years we have emphasized the church struggling for the liberation of the people and possibilities for the oppressed people in terms of human rights. We reconfirmed this purpose by participating in the Fifth General Assembly of the World Council of Churches at the end of 1975."

The K.C.C.J. is a member of the Christian Council of Asia and shares in Asian suffering and burdens.

"As we reflect on our relationship with our homeland, Korea," the report continued, "we know that we have not identified as deeply with their difficulties as we ought. We have prayed and supported them for peace and reunification. We have endeavoured to provide special funds and to share with the suffering and mission of the Churches in Korea and part of this is experienced through our mission to the 650,000 Koreans living in Japan."

The four presbyteries have done their best to realize the goal of mission embodied in the 60th anniversary decision of "Forward, Following Christ In The World". The Seinan Presbytery stressed evangelism meetings at each church, provided an excellent Leadership Training Conference in May and a Mission Rally in September, had outreach in Evangelism, Social Action - Human Rights Movement, Leadership Training and Community-Church Centre Project by cooperating with one another. The Kansai Presbytery attempted a new approach through a Team Ministry and Visitation Program, Joint Exchange Services of Worship, Mission Rallies and Leadership Conferences. The Chubu and Kanto Presbyteries have worked hard in their eagerness to carry through their special mission calling. The response to those who suffered complete loss of home, clothing, etc. at the time of the typhoons indicated God's grace and the response of His people to meet the needs. Community action and educational outreach for the oppressed people and handicapped persons has been a service to the communities and a special witness.

"Each person and Presbytery is aiming toward the 70th Anniversary Mission Development which will be celebrated in 1977-1978."

The Christian Education Department concentrated on Youth Leadership Training. The special focus centred on the case of theological student Kim, Chul Hyun. This special historical trial has tested all the pastors, elders, youth, women and men, missionaries and workers. The response of individuals, as well as that of churches and national and international church organizations indicated Christian solidarity in the cause for human rights, peace and justice. (N.B. Early in 1977 Mr. Kim's death sentence was commuted to life imprisonment.)

Leadership Training Sessions provided for pastors and workers, elders, women and youth were the best so far and all participants are eager for further training sessions.

The Gospel News was provided monthly to each home, as well as other Christian literature. Arirang was sent throughout the world twice during the year, and a new K.C.C.J. brochure was distributed.

- Church membership continued to rise steadily and reached over 143,000 communicants. Congregations and Prayer Houses were established in many new areas including along the border of Mozambique.
- Intensive and extensive training programs were organized for women, youth and church leaders and for all Christians in congregations. The already established centres such as Chigodi Women's Centre, Chilema Lay Training Centre and Likhubula Youth Centre will further this training by preparing leaders with the necessary skills for effective leadership. Some ministers and lay people will attend courses and short experiential study tours within Africa and overseas.
- The Rev. Saindi Chipangwi is now studying for his Ph.D. at the University of Aberdeen and the Rev. John Mphatso is taking pastoral studies at New College, both in Scotland. The Rev. Lau Makata and Mr. Dennis Kalunga returned from Zambia where they took a Diploma course in Youth work.

The Mission Hospital in Mulanje continued to be of great service to thousands of people in the area. New buildings have replaced the old ones and new equipment has furnished the wards, the theatre and out-patient departments. A ten-year development plan was drafted by the Synod in youth work, education, women's work, building program, training of personnel, evangelism, administration, transport, community action, and its relationship with other churches. The Synod is attempting to focus on its mission as an African Church in the southern part of Malawi and its role in the world as part of the Church of Christ universal.

Centenary celebrations took place at Blantyre Mission on October 24. "The success of the celebrations gave us courage and assurance that Christ is guiding us, the African leaders, to enter into the second century of His Church in Malawi with hope and confidence that we are victorious and we shall be victorious with Christ ahead of us. We are proud to be the inheritance of the work of the early missionaries from overseas many of whom had high regard for and trust in the capabilities of the African people," wrote Mr. Sangaya.

About 30 Mission Boards and Societies have joined to form the United Mission to Nepal.

The new Executive Secretary, Gordon Ruff, assumed his duties in mid-June. A new Personnel Secretary and three functional secretaries for Economic Development, Education and Health Services also came into the headquarters office, as the new relationships for carrying out their many tasks came into effect.

The United Mission to Nepal seeks to minister to the needs of the people of Nepal in the Name and Spirit of Christ, and to make Him known by Word and Life. In working towards this goal, it operates hostels, boys and girls boarding schools, and a scholarship program in the area of education.

A major field of activity is the Economic Development Board under which agriculturalists, builders and technicians work and train the Nepalese. They also operate a plywood factory and a power company. In the field of community health, hospitals, clinics and a program of training nurses are operated.

Miss Mary Nichol was Superintendent of Nursing Education at the Shanta Bhawan Program. Miss Pat Pooler was active in the Community Health Program before leaving on furlough.

Forty-five additional persons from various denominations and agencies were approved to work with the United Mission to Nepal, and there is a list of eighty on the personnel needs list.

**THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH OF NIGERIA**

Synod Clerk — Rev. Nwachuku Eme.

**I. Synod 1976** — The Rt. Rev. O. Mbila was re-elected the Moderator of Synod for the ensuing year. The highlights of the meeting were:

1. The transfer of the Synod Clerk's Office from its temporary residence at Igbera, Umuahia, to Aba effective as of January 1977.
2. The office of Synod Clerk will be held initially for three years subject to re-election. A new Synod Clerk will take over July 1977.
3. To mark the 100th Anniversary of the coming of Mary Slessor to Nigeria a special Synod Service was held at Duke Town Church, Calabar, in September. A week-long celebration by all the Presbyterian Church of Nigeria was observed in October, when a special appeal to support the training of women of the church was launched.
4. Medical work: There is a serious shortage of doctors, midwifery tutors and nurses in the staffing of the Church's hospitals. However, there is progress in the work of the hospitals.
5. The Synod adopted the following policy on the Medical Service of the Church: "In view of the declared intention of all the governments of the Federal Republic of Nigeria to expand the provision of medical and health services to all parts of the country, and in view of the decision of Synod to continue and strengthen its Medical Mission, it is hereby resolved that the Medical Board of Synod should carefully review the existing Medical Program and advise Synod how it can be carried out effectively to supplement and strengthen the Medical Program of the civil governments."

**II. Missionaries**

- Before the Nigeria Civil War there were about 60 missionaries from the Church of Scotland, Canada, Netherlands Reformed Church and the United Presbyterian Church in U.S.A. Today there are seven. Representatives of The Presbyterian Church of Nigeria unanimously declared a continued need for Overseas Missionaries.

**III. Financial Support**

- Mr. Eme stated that continued financial support to The Presbyterian Church of Nigeria even when there are fewer missionaries, shows the breadth, width, height and depth of Christian concern. They look forward to self support and to supporting other churches. The Church of Scotland is arranging to transfer their leasehold property to the Trustees of The Presbyterian Church of Nigeria.

**IV. Visit of Dr. Akanu Ibiam and Mr. N. A. Ndu to Canada**

- was considered helpful: "Such visits help to cement the relationship of both churches and strengthen the united effort in the proclamation of the Gospel."

**THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN TAIWAN**

"The Chinese New Year holiday, the celebration of a basically agricultural festival taking place in a modern cosmopolitan city of two million people, . . . reminds us of the different and contrasting ways of thinking and living which make up life here," begins the report from The Presbyterian Church in Taiwan. Labour-intensive industries are being replaced by those requiring more technical skill. A new super-highway is being constructed north-south right down the western plain, and many new multi-storey buildings are going up in the cities. The country is moving to "developed" status with increases in gross national product, in trade and in number of people employed.

**Change in General Assembly Constitution**

as at the 1976 General Assembly.

Delegates are now appointed on a Presbytery rather than a congregational basis. It was decided that the 1977 General Assembly would consist of half of the eligible elders and half of the eligible ministers from each Presbytery. (General Assembly Secretaries, heads of institutions, etc. may be corresponding members.)

**Theological Education**

- During the past two years there was a large increase in the number of students seeking admission to Taiwan and Tainan theological colleges. Progress is being made in relating the two colleges. In 1976, agreement was reached on standardization of tuition fees and a joint entrance examination. Possible exchanges of teachers and students between the two schools was discussed.

**Medical Work**

- A new dormitory building was opened at Kuantu for Mackay Hospital's School of Nursing.

**Mountain Work**

- 1976 marked the 30th anniversary of the organized church in a number of mountain areas. The main problem facing the mountain church is the improvement of church leadership and how to help pastors who have received inadequate training to nurture their congregations effectively. At present there are 435 mountain churches with 371 pastors, of whom 80 have had no training and many have had only one or two months of Bible School. In many cases the younger church members have a better education than the pastor. Language is also a problem.
- Huge numbers of tribal people have migrated to the cities. Many work on Sundays, some around the clock, so it is difficult to find a suitable time for church service. It is also difficult to trace these people, and many become lost to the church.
- An annual all-island conference of pastors and elders, meeting for three or four days, provided an opportunity for mountain pastors to help each other work out a basic program for nurturing church members.

- Every year graduates of Yu Shan Theological Institute who are about to be ordained to the ministry after a period of service in the church meet for one month's further training.
- The Mountain Work Committee organized many district retreats and conferences. They included Bible Study, teaching about stewardship and encouraging the spiritual life of Christians.

#### Women's Work

- The Mount Lebanon Retreat Centre was expanded, adding a dining hall and increasing the space for living accommodation and meetings.
- A retreat for tribal women was attended by 185.
- An interdenominational Women's Evangelistic Meeting held on four evenings in Taipei was attended by about 1,500 people each night.

#### Christian Education

- The Sixth Bible Study Conference for university students had as its aim to train leaders and to encourage university graduates to enter theological colleges.
- "Student Ambassador" program involved university students in helping in rural or other areas which need help in the Pescadores. Eleven students worked for a month helping nine local congregations in community service, especially youth work. The program was financed by the big city churches and was an expression of the spirit of mutual aid which is growing in the church.
- Over 200 people attended a Christian Home and Family Conference.

#### New Five-Year Movement

- A new five-year movement will start in July 1977. The focus will be on lay training, and the training will be of two kinds - "concentrated" training primarily for elders and deacons organized on a presbytery basis, and "general" training for all church members held on a congregational basis.

#### The Bible Society

- The General Assembly asked the Bible Society to find out what can be done about publishing the new translation of the Bible in Taiwanese. A letter to the Bible Society from the government has given guidance. It states that the text shall appear in three parallel columns - Mandarin Chinese, Mandarin phonetic, and Taiwanese.  
There are still some problems to be worked out.

#### Relationship with other Church bodies

- Continued to evolve toward equal partnership. Out of the Formosa Consultative Committee in 1976 came a document: Relationship between General Assembly and Overseas Cooperating Church Bodies is a first draft.

#### Local Church News and Developments

- Within presbyteries resources are being shared so that churches may be independent. Four or five churches work in a group.
- Churches with the same name get together across presbyteries, to become better acquainted and for mutual aid.
- General Assembly secretaries go as delegates to presbyteries, attending meetings throughout in order to get greater insight into situations and problems in the hope of building firm relationship and mutual trust.

#### Mass Evangelism

- The Presbyterian Church in Taiwan has become concerned with increase in promotion of mass evangelism. Foreign and Taiwanese funds are used. The organizers are usually a small group who do not share responsibilities but are judgemental of Presbyterian members who do not become wholeheartedly involved. The meetings average one every two months, making the pressure intolerable and question priorities. The effect of the Billy Graham Crusade does not warrant vast amounts of time and money: out of 140 Presbyterian referrals, one person attends church regularly and one occasionally.

(Such a "Digest" is not intended to replace the Acts and Proceedings which would continue to be the official record of the Assembly.) That this "Digest" in either print or cassette tape format be readied for distribution almost immediately following the adjournment of Assembly. That the expense of preparing and distributing this "Digest" be recovered from its sale to congregations and individuals.

THEREFORE, we would humbly overture the Venerable the General Assembly to favourably receive and implement these recommendations or to do otherwise for this purpose what in its wisdom it may deem best.

## No. 9—PRESBYTERY OF CAPE BRETON

Re: STATEMENT ON DEPOSITION FROM THE MINISTRY  
(Referred to the Committee on Church Doctrine)

To the Venerable, the 103rd General Assembly:

WHEREAS, the Statement on Deposition from the Ministry was adopted only by a narrow majority of the 102nd General Assembly; and

WHEREAS, the Statement on Deposition seems to imply the rejection of one of the Standards of our Church, cf. W.C.F. XXXI, IV "All Synods or Councils since the Apostles' time, whether general or particular, may err, and many have erred; therefore they are not to be made the rule of faith or practice but used as an help to both"; and

WHEREAS, the action of the 102nd General Assembly also seems to involve a breach of our law and our custom to submit matters of importance to the Presbyteries under the Barrier Act, specifically matters of government, worship, doctrine and discipline; and

WHEREAS, the Statement on Deposition involves a transferral of responsibility to deal with an individual to a Court outside our own; and

WHEREAS, differences in doctrine and law exist among the several denominations of Christians which would account for the proper dismissal of an individual from the ministry of one denomination and the proper acceptance of that individual into another denomination; and

WHEREAS, this Statement on Deposition involves an implicit denial of those differences; and

WHEREAS, the action proposed in the Statement on Deposition would effectively and possibly unjustly bar such an individual from access to the ministry of another denomination and thereby injure both that individual and our own denomination; and

WHEREAS, the Statement on Deposition thus implicitly contains a view of the nature of the unity of the Church which The Presbyterian Church in Canada has not yet adopted and which thereby creates a logical pressure upon our Church finally to adopt that view; and

WHEREAS, through oversight or lack of time for study, only fifteen Presbyteries replied (G.A. Appendix, p. 395, 1976), and of those, only eleven supported the declaratory statement; and

WHEREAS, now that Presbyteries are alerted to the importance of this issue as a result of reports coming back from their Commissioners of the debate during the 102nd General Assembly,

THEREFORE, the Presbytery of Cape Breton humbly overtures the Venerable, the 103rd General Assembly, to have this matter again submitted to Presbyteries for study and to report their views on the "Meaning of Deposition" to the Assembly through the Committee on Church Doctrine, with the possibility of

this issue being again debated in Assembly, or to do otherwise as in its wisdom it deems best.

No. 10 - PRESBYTERY OF WATERLOO - WELLINGTON

*Re: RESPONSIBILITY OF THE SESSION*  
(Referred to Clerks of Assembly)

*To the Venerable, the 103rd General Assembly:*

WHEREAS, the senior courts of the Church hold the session responsible in all matters of stewardship, including the raising of funds for the maintenance of its own ministry as well as for the Budget of the General Assembly, and

WHEREAS, section 128 of the Book of Forms assigns to the session general oversight "over all the interests of the congregation," and,

WHEREAS, section 111(b) states that "it is the duty of the Session to see that the congregation, as an association of Christ's servants enjoined to spread His Gospel among men, is contributing, according to its ability, to the mission funds of the Church", without laying this responsibility upon them among themselves or in the community in which they reside, and,

WHEREAS, section 158 of the Book of Forms states that the Board of Managers is to be concerned with "the management of the financial affairs of the congregation", and,

WHEREAS, section 162(2) states it is "their (i.e. the Board of Managers) duty to obtain from the people contributions", and

WHEREAS, the wording of the Book of Forms creates uncertainty and confusion, and therefore also, at times, tension between the Session and the Board of Managers as to who is responsible in the area of stewardship,

THEREFORE, the Presbytery of Waterloo-Wellington humbly overtures the General Assembly to take the necessary steps to eliminate the possibility of confusion now extant by altering the Book of Forms as follows:

1. Section 109(c) be reworded to read: "the Session is responsible for all aspects of stewardship, spiritual and material. With regard to the latter, the session is to see to it that the programmes of the Church at all levels are adequately presented to the people for their financial support. It may also appoint collections for special religious or charitable objects in addition to those appointed by the General Assembly or other competent authority. It regulates the time and mode of receiving offerings at public worship."
2. The words "not only for the maintenance of its own ministry but also" be inserted in section 111(b) between the phrases "to its ability" and "to the mission".
3. Section 162(2) be reworded in part to read: "The duties of the Board of Managers have special regard to the temporal and financial affairs of the congregation. It is their duty to co-operate closely with the session (which is responsible for all aspects of stewardship) in securing from the people contributions for the sustentation of the ministry and to disburse. . .etc." (See also section 158).

Or that they may do otherwise to this end as the General Assembly in its wisdom may deem best.

No. 12 - PRESBYTERY OF EAST TORONTO

*Re: BURSARY STRUCTURE FOR THEOLOGICAL  
TRAINING FOR MINISTERS*

(Referred to Senate of Presbyterian College,  
Board of Ewart College, Board of Knox College)

*To the Venerable the 103rd General Assembly:*

WHEREAS, Knox College has widened its ministry of theological education beyond the limits of the training of pastors and has thus been a means of outreach to theological enquirers not easily reached by other Church structures; and

WHEREAS, this College must bear the cost of this ministry and that of graduate education out of its own funds and out of its inadequate part-share in Provincial education grants; and

WHEREAS, there is reason to believe that some students, by reason of inadequate scrutiny at Session and Presbytery levels, have found their way into the Church-subsidized category of candidates for the ministry of Word and Sacrament who are not properly such candidates; and

WHEREAS, it is not the function of Knox College to question the judgements of Presbyteries in this matter; and

WHEREAS, the said College and the Church as a whole suffer from the confusion of the distinct ministerial and theological enquirer streams; and

WHEREAS, the subsidization of ministerial candidates alone creates the possibility of judgements of vocation being influenced by the availability of funds for one stream and not the other; and

WHEREAS, the good of the Church, that of the College and that of the two streams of students is best made to serve the glory of God, the testimony before men and the wise stewardship of the Church's funds when each of these streams is given its proper role in the College; and

WHEREAS, the Church, Knox College and both streams of students should be aware of the true financial costs of theological education,

THEREFORE, the Presbytery of East Toronto humbly overtures the Venerable, the General Assembly to take the following steps.

1. To act through Knox College and through Church agencies to distinguish the two streams of students so that full justice can be done to both, educationally and in terms of a nurture appropriate to each.
2. To encourage Knox College to set up a fee structure common to all students at a realistic level, to enable the College to meet its obligations to both streams.
3. To set up, through the appropriate General Assembly agencies and Knox College, a bursary structure to support, as now, the stream of students properly certified and genuinely intending the ministry of Word and Sacrament.
4. To encourage and enable Knox College further to place before the Church corporately and before individuals its distinct roles in Christian training and the need for Presbyterians to support both with money.
5. To include Presbyterian College and Ewart College within the action contemplated, or to do otherwise for these objectives as the General Assembly in its wisdom may deem best.

“The necessary steps be taken to amalgamate the Record Committee and the Communication Services Committee under the name Committee on Communications and the Media;”

or do otherwise as the General Assembly in its wisdom may deem appropriate.

WHEREAS, the aid-receiving congregations in which such appointees serve are unable to provide this expense allowance without affecting their grant from the Board of World Mission, and

WHEREAS, the present regulations of the Administrative Council exclude such church workers in aid-receiving congregations from receiving the expense allowance for continuing education permitted church workers in self-sustaining congregations, and

WHEREAS, such church workers are equally entitled to continuing education assistance without prejudice,

THEREFORE, the Reverend the Presbytery of Edmonton respectfully overtures the Venerable the General Assembly that: such action be taken as would release the Board of World Mission from the present ruling of the Administrative Council of the Church concerning the \$100 expense allowance for continuing education of church workers under appointment by the Board of World Mission, which ruling presently prejudices such appointees, or do otherwise for this purpose as in its wisdom the General Assembly deems best.

THEREFORE, the Presbytery of Lindsay-Peterborough humbly overtures the Venerable, the General Assembly to consider afresh the implications of inappropriate interference of one Minister in another Minister's Pastoral Charge and to rule decisively on the matter; or that they do otherwise for this object what to their wisdom may seem best.

#### MEMORIAL – PRESBYTERY OF BRAMPTON

*Re: STATED SUPPLY*  
(Referred to the Clerks of Assembly on consultation  
with The Committee on Church Doctrine)

*To the Venerable the 103rd General Assembly:*

The Presbytery of Brampton wishes by this memorial to draw the attention of the Venerable the 103rd General Assembly to an apparent change in the role of Stated Supply within The Presbyterian Church in Canada. We raise the question whether this change should be reviewed and clarified.

The historical understanding of Stated Supply was set out in a statement sanctioned by the 60th General Assembly (A&P 1934, p. 63; Presbyterian Record, August, 1934, p. 241). It noted that "the office of stated supply is not provided for in our doctrinal standards. It does not create a pastoral relation within the meaning of the Westminster Form of Presbyterian Church Government. It has been recognized by our Church only as a last resort, an anomalous expedient reluctantly acquiesced in when some unusual difficulty makes any attempt at immediate settlement unwise. . . ." The same statement noted that persons thus appointed were not, nor had they ever been, eligible for a place on the constituent roll of a Presbytery.

Assemblies other than the sixtieth have been relatively quiet about the role of Stated Supply. Responses to overtures (e.g., 1935, #26; 1936, #6 and 1941, #3) did not substantially change the earlier understanding.

The Book of Forms contains one reference only to Stated Supply (section 213), and that by way of a non-definitive aside.

The apparent change arises through the action of the 102nd General Assembly in making "stated supply (whether in congregations or mission fields, full-time or part-time)" a basis for membership on the constituent roll of a presbytery. (A&P 1976, pages 444, 12, 54, 55.)

A change in voting privileges raises the question whether other changes in the role of Stated Supply are to be inferred.

In view of the items indicated, we humbly request the Venerable the 103rd General Assembly to give clarification of the matter and to take whatever action the Assembly in its wisdom deems best.

*Re: CHANGING THE NAME OF THE SYNOD OF ALBERTA TO THE SYNOD OF ALBERTA AND THE NORTHWEST**To the Venerable the 103rd General Assembly:*

WHEREAS, the 71st meeting of the Synod of Alberta adopted the following recommendations, viz: (a) "that the Administrative Committee (of Synod) be authorized to prepare and transmit to the General Assembly the appropriate overture, including a redefinition of the boundaries of the said Synod"; and

WHEREAS, the present name "Synod of Alberta" does not give a true designation nor description of the area now served by the Synod; and

WHEREAS, a true description of the area served by the Synod of Alberta is as follows, viz:

A. Between 49 degrees parallel and 60 degrees parallel; The Province of Alberta plus from 55 degrees parallel, 120 degrees longitude diagonally northwest to 60 degrees parallel, 125 degrees longitude.

B. North of 60 degrees parallel: The territory including the Arctic Islands, between 110 degrees and 141 degrees longitude.

(NOTE: A. The diagonal section through British Columbia is the area traversed by the Alaska Highway from its start at Dawson Creek, B.C. to Watson Lake in the Yukon; all easily reached by car or plane from Alberta. We formerly served this area through to Whitehorse when we had a mission van on the Alaska Highway. It does not infringe on any area of British Columbia being served by the Synod of British Columbia.

B. This included the most lively part of the Northwest Territories, viz: Yellowknife, Coppermine, The Mackenzie River basin and delta, the Yukon Territory and the offshore islands and oil-drilling sites in the Western Arctic.); and

WHEREAS, historically The Presbyterian Church in Canada has followed its people to the furthest frontiers of the land with the Gospel, and ought always so to do; and

WHEREAS, the people, and Presbyterians, living outside the bounds of the Province of Alberta would feel much more "included" in our Church if their territory were included in such a change in the name of the Synod of Alberta, and

WHEREAS, there is still a migration of people to the Northwest which seemingly will continue, and even increase, for some time; which will cause the Church to serve an ever-broadening area of settlements in the Northwest,

THEREFORE, The Synod of Alberta humbly overtures the Venerable the General Assembly to re-name the Synod of Alberta, that it be henceforth known as THE SYNOD OF ALBERTA AND THE NORTHWEST, having the boundaries herein described, or to do otherwise as the General Assembly in its wisdom deems best.

WHEREAS, there is a marked proliferation of processed foods, food substitutes and chemical food additives, in produce on the grocer's shelf, many of which are of high "risk to benefit ratio"; and

WHEREAS, the information on some food labels is euphemistic and incomplete, and many consumers have not sufficient knowledge to evaluate the chemical content appearing on labels of food products; and

WHEREAS, a preponderance of processed foods with high additive content are those which appeal to, and are widely consumed by, children and young people; and

WHEREAS, some chemicals used in additives do not appear to be excreted by the body, and the accumulation of these chemicals in our organs is not presently understood; and

WHEREAS, an increasing number of nutritionists, biochemists and food allergists are expressing grave concern about the long range detrimental effects of food additives and food substitutes on our bodies;

THEREFORE, we would humbly overture the Venerable the General Assembly to support the Presbytery of Hamilton in urging the Federal Government to instruct the Food and Drug Directorate to: –

- A. Immediately initiate a code system (similar to that on "care labelling of fabrics") to indicate the proportion in each food product of
  - i. natural whole food
  - ii. substitute food
  - iii. No. of chemical additives
  - iv. level of nutritional value.
- B. Include staple food products such as bread, milk, ice cream under the code labelling system.
- C. Place an immediate moratorium on the acceptance of any new additive in food products until there are more sophisticated and accurate methods of testing the long range and inter-chemical reactions of these additives in the body.
 

Re-examine all high "risk to benefit ratio" additives and substitutes, removing any that are suspect,

OR that the General Assembly do otherwise as in its wisdom it deems best.

2. to recognize that since Synods and Councils are fallible, the right of appeal from one denomination to another must be acknowledged,
3. to maintain that in view of the unity of the church, judgements of other denominations will be recognized until and unless such appeal is made and upheld, or to do otherwise as in their wisdom they deem best.

The motion to forward as amended was made by H. McWilliams, seconded by D. Murphy. Carried.

WHEREAS, the members of this Presbytery are deeply concerned for the ethics inherent in the handling and distribution of the Church's liquid assets;

THEREFORE, we, the Presbytery of East Toronto do humbly overture the Venerable General Assembly in the matter of the disposition of the assets of the amalgamation of congregations in the following terms:

1. That no assignment or distribution of the assets of merging congregations shall be made unless and until their funded debt(s), if any, shall have been discharged.
2. That the amalgamating congregations shall normally\* make representation to the Presbytery in writing, setting forth their recommendations regarding the disposition of the funds in their possession resulting from the merger – as documented by relevant extracts of minutes of congregational meetings and meetings of Kirk Sessions.
  - (a) In formulating these recommendations to Presbytery, congregations are enjoined to seek out those areas of the Church's life and work where financial assistance is most needed, and which give the greatest promise of opportunity for service. Of primary concern in such a survey is a realistic assessment of the needs of the immediate (geographical) area vacated by one (or more) of the merging congregations in terms of Christian ministry and mission.
  - (b) Beyond the borders of the Presbytery, the congregation(s) shall confer with the Administrative Council and/or the Board of World Mission and with the appropriate officers of such agencies of the Church as, e.g., the Pension Board, Armagh, Tyndale

Neighbourhood and Community Centre, St. Andrew's Presbyterian Homes Inc., the three Colleges, Presbyterian Summer Camps. . .

3. Upon receipt of these recommendations the Presbytery shall ascertain whether, and to what extent the provisions of 2(a) and (b) have been observed. The Presbytery (or a committee thereof) in consultation with the duly appointed representatives of the congregation(s) shall consider their proposals carefully, having due regard to the needs, obligations and aspirations of all parties to the merger, to the requirements of the work of the Church within the bounds of the Presbytery, and to the shared responsibility for supporting the work of the Church in Canada and overseas. The Presbytery shall accede to the wishes of the congregation(s) where they are deemed to be consistent with responsible stewardship; and suggest changes in the allocation of funds in cases where the allotments submitted by congregations appear to be disproportionate to the needs.

Accordingly, having reconciled through negotiation any differences which may have existed between the Presbytery and the congregation(s), Presbytery shall forthwith approve the resulting document and so order. . .

Or to do otherwise as the General Assembly may in its wisdom deem best.

\*The word “normally” is inserted solely to provide for those few congregations which are incorporated under provincial law. The application of this section would then depend on the precise terms of the congregation's charter.

WHEREAS, ministers in aid-receiving Charges often have a more demanding ministry in isolated places and/or with the various Sessions and Boards of their respective multi-point Charges; and

WHEREAS, the present system can lead to inaccuracy in reporting by those Congregations which want their ministers to have the same benefits that other ministers have in self-sustaining Charges;

THEREFORE, the Presbytery of Cape Breton humbly overtures the Venerable the 103rd General Assembly, to have this matter referred to the Board of World Mission for the purpose of coming to a revision of those policies which make it difficult to give expression to the parity of the Ministry, by allowing aid-receiving Charges to pay their ministers manse fuel, hydro, study leave, insurance and other fringe benefits which belong to the Category of Minister's Stipend, or to do otherwise as the General Assembly in its wisdom may deem best.

## No. 28 — PRESBYTERY OF KAMLOOPS

## Re: THE PENSION FUND

To the Venerable the 103rd General Assembly:

WHEREAS, the Pension Fund of The Presbyterian Church in Canada is now set to bring greater benefits to retiring ministers due largely to an increased rate being levied upon both members and congregations and,

WHEREAS, it is commendable to see such increase for future years, there are still many who will benefit but little from such increases and,

WHEREAS, the capital funds of the Pension Fund have increased by 40% over the past 5 years, balances transferred to the capital funds indicate an increase of 48% increase could have occurred, and,

WHEREAS, the resultant discrepancy is due to the depreciation of securities held, and,

WHEREAS, the Capital Fund of the Pension Fund is made up of securities that are liable to both appreciation and devaluation, in the amount of some 81% and,

WHEREAS, a great deal of concern has built up over the past several years with misunderstandings that weighty matters such as pensions are beyond comprehension, such misconception must be eradicated since financial matters and pensions rest eventually on all economic principles of financial markets, therefore;

WE, the Presbytery of Kamloops do humbly overture the venerable the General Assembly to implement the following:

1. that the General Assembly take the necessary steps leading to complete church administration of the Pension Fund within two years.
2. instruct the Pension Board to use only current premium income to purchase annuities for the future.
3. instruct the Pension Board to publish a statement of securities held showing purchase price, percentage payable, maturity and current market value at time of statement as recommended by the Price Waterhouse Report; this to be sent to Presbyteries annually.
4. the Pension Board be instructed to create guidelines for implementing investments within the Church (i.e., mortgages to congregations, mortgage funds for capital investments of the Board of World Mission, and personal mortgages to retiring professional church workers.
5. the Pension Board be instructed to secure the appointment of a competent investment councillor to advise the Board in the administration of pension funds.

## THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH ARCHITECTURE

To the Venerable the 103rd General Assembly:

The Committee on Church Architecture was established by the General Assembly in the re-organization of the Church following the events of 1925. Its purpose is to advise Presbyteries and Congregations in evaluating the suitability of plans and cost estimates for proposed church buildings. The Committee meets as business warrants to consider and comment on plans for proposed buildings throughout the country. The submission of preliminary sketch plans enables the Committee to comment at the critical early stages of the planning process, occasionally preventing costly adjustments at a later date.

The terms of reference for this Committee are summarized by the following decisions of the 88th General Assembly (1962, A & P p. 291).

### RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That all Congregations and Presbyteries be reminded of the rulings of the 1953 and 1957 Assemblies, namely: "In the future, Congregations applying for financial assistance from the funds of the Presbyterian Church in Canada must have their designs submitted to this Committee (Church Architecture), and before a grant or a loan is made, the report of this Committee must be received by the General Board of Missions and the Presbytery concerned.
2. That all Congregations contemplating building a church or educational building, regardless of their method of financing, be required to submit the preliminary drawings of their proposed project to this Committee before the working drawings are undertaken; and that the Presbytery concerned receive the report of this Committee before it grants final approval to the Congregation.
3. That all Congregations undertaking the building of a sanctuary or education building be required to employ a qualified architect.

The Committee wishes to remind congregations that as the cost of buildings continues to escalate, continuous maintenance against deterioration of the fabric of buildings, and particularly of the electrical, heating and water systems, is increasingly advisable. Furthermore, adequate insurance valuation against disaster such as fire is essential, and should be reviewed annually. A Guidebook on Maintenance of Church Buildings is now being produced and will be available later in the year.

### BOARD OF EWART COLLEGE SUPPLEMENTARY REPORT

To the Venerable the 103rd General Assembly:

Several years ago, the membership of the Board of Ewart College was decreased in size as the result of a general move to cut the costs of various Boards and agencies of General Assembly. At the time, the Board of Ewart College expressed some concern about the results of such a move in regard to the operating efficiency of the Board. The passage of time has confirmed those apprehensions.

Our Board is composed of three groups of four elected persons each, for a total of twelve people, plus some additional representatives from other Boards. Because of the need to provide representation from across the various regions of our country, and also to provide functional representation by dividing membership amongst Ministers, Deaconesses and Lay people, we find ourselves with too few members drawn from the central region who are within travelling distance of the College and who can thereby give service on the Committees of the Board, which are necessary to the adequate functioning of the planning and operating capabilities and requirements.

It should be noted that the Board of Ewart College serves as both a Senate and Management Board. Knox College is served by a Senate (with 9 appointed members) and a Board (with 18 members) while Presbyterian College, Montreal, has a Senate, which combines the functions of a Board, and which has 24 members. Ewart College has an appointed Board of only 12 members. We simply cannot adequately carry out our Board responsibility with so few members, especially since many of those 12 are scattered across the country and cannot be used on Committees which must meet frequently.

#### RECOMMENDATION 4. A

*That the composition of the Board of Ewart College be changed to add two additional persons to each of the three years, for a total of six persons per year, effective June, 1978.*

### BOARD OF KNOX COLLEGE SUPPLEMENTARY REPORT

*To the Venerable the 103rd General Assembly:*

The Board of Knox College established a Search Committee to obtain a suitable person to fill the Chair of New Testament vacated by the retirement of Reverend Dr. J. Stanley Glen. Nominations were received from a number of Presbyteries in response to the invitation to submit names. In addition the Committee investigated those whom it was considered to be suitable to the position. The Search Committee seriously and carefully considered and studied all the names and supporting information and material submitted. When the list of names had been reduced to a small number personal interviews were conducted. A joint meeting of the Board and Senate of Knox College was held to receive and review the report of the Search Committee, and this meeting recommended that the Board present to General Assembly the name of Professor J. Charles Hay for appointment to the Chair of New Testament. This recommendation will be presented to the General Assembly.

Professor J. C. Hay's appointment to the Chair of New Testament would result in his vacating the Chair of Homiletics Evangelism and Church Administration and General Assembly will be requested to grant permission to circularize the Presbyteries for nominations for this Chair.

In this connection the Senate of Knox College felt that a redefinition of the Chair of Homiletics Evangelism and Church Administration was necessary and desirable. A special committee composed of the Executive of the Board, the Executive of the Senate, and the Faculty was requested to redefine the Chair now known as Homiletics Evangelism and Church Administration with a view to making recommendation to General Assembly.

The Board will request General Assembly to approve the promotion of Dr. Iain Nicol from the rank of Associate Professor to the rank of full Professor as of July 1, 1977. Dr. Nicol presently occupies the Chair of Systematic Theology in Knox College. The Board feels that Dr. Nicol's teaching experience, his proven scholarship, his published writings, and his ability to direct and examine doctoral theses merit the rank of full professor.

Reverend Dr. J. Stanley Glen retired last year from the office of Principal of Knox College after 24 years of distinguished and faithful service. The Board feels that it would be fitting and proper as a tangible evidence of gratitude and esteem to offer Dr. Glen the title of Principal Emeritus of Knox College and the Board will request the General Assembly to approve the action of the Board in so doing.

The Joint Planning Committee of the Board and Senate has reviewed the Office of Principal of Knox College. The duties and responsibilities of the office have

increased considerably over the past several years and the Principal is called upon to participate more actively in administrative matters of the College and in matters with which the College is associated and concerned in the University of Toronto and the Toronto School of Theology. These are in addition to his teaching responsibilities. The emolument of office for the Principal has for many years been the sum of \$1500 and this is deemed to be inadequate in the light of present circumstances. The Board will recommend to General Assembly that the Principal of Knox College be given an emolument of office equal to 15% of his professorial salary.

The Joint Planning Committee of the Board and Senate have studied very carefully the financial situation of retiring faculty members in the light of pension entitlements which they would receive. The inevitable conclusion reached was that the financial entitlements would be inadequate in present circumstances. In order to alleviate the situation in some small degree it was felt that there should be a supplementary pension plan instituted for retiring Faculty members. The Board has considered and studied the reports of the Joint Planning Committee in this regard and has endeavoured to evolve a plan which would be feasible and commensurate with the ability to provide the financing of such a plan. The Board will present to General Assembly for approval a plan for annual supplementary pensions for retiring Faculty members, which it is hoped will be favourably received.

It is recalled to General Assembly that Knox College has indicated over a period of several years the need for additional funds, and that at a propitious time the College would desire to make an appeal for funds. Again you are referred to the past reports of the Joint Planning Committee which dealt with the needs and aspirations of the College and the requirements to fulfill them. Much time and thought has been given to this aspect of the situation of Knox College by both the Board and Senate. The Board respectfully informs General Assembly that it is the intention of Knox College to organize a financial campaign with appeals being made to former residents of Knox College, Special Names, Foundations, etc. In addition to this the Board of Knox College will request that General Assembly grant permission for Knox College to appeal to the Church at large for funds for re-furbishing, bursaries, scholarships, distinguished Graduate Lectureships, Chairs, etc. There will be a special financial campaign committee established and the Board will request the permission of General Assembly to add six additional members to this special committee, such members to be selected and appointed by the Board. In making such selection and appointment the Board would have regard to special qualifications in the area of financial appeals.

#### RECOMMENDATION 1. A

*That James Charles Hay, M.A., B.D., Ph.D., be appointed to the Chair of New Testament in Knox College with the rank of full professor effective September 1, 1977.*

#### RECOMMENDATION 2. C

*That the Board of Knox College be granted permission to circularize the Presbyteries inviting the submission of names to be considered for nomination to the Chair of Homiletics, Evangelism and Church Administration of Knox College.*

#### RECOMMENDATION 3. C

*That the incumbent of the office of Principal of Knox College receive an emolument of office equal to 15% of his professorial salary.*

#### RECOMMENDATION 4. A

*That Reverend Iain Garden Nicol, M.A., B.D., Ph.D., the present incumbent of the Chair of Systematic Theology in Knox College be promoted from the rank of associate Professor to the rank of full Professor, effective July 1, 1977.*

## RECOMMENDATION 5. A

*That the General Assembly approves the action of the Board of Knox College in offering Reverend Dr. J. Stanley Glen the title of Principal Emeritus of Knox College.*

## RECOMMENDATION 6. D

*That the General Assembly approves the establishment by the Board of Knox College of an annual supplementary pension plan of \$50.00 per year for each year of service, for retiring Faculty members, for a maximum period of 10 years years or upon the death of the recipient whichever occurs first, the supplementary pension to begin six months from the date of retirement; and the plan to commence as of the 1st day of June 1976; and that the Board of Knox College be granted permission to proceed immediately to implement the plan.*

## RECOMMENDATION 7. C

*That the Board of Knox College be granted permission to make a financial appeal to the Church at large for funds for refurbishing the College, for bursary funds, for scholarship funds, for funds to provide distinguished graduate lectureships, and for the endowment of Chairs, etc.; and the Board of Knox College be granted permission to select and appoint six additional members to the special financial campaign committee to be established for this purpose.*

### THE PRESBYTERIAN COLLEGE MONTREAL SUPPLEMENTARY REPORT

*To the Venerable the 103rd General Assembly:*

The Senate of The Presbyterian College was authorized by the last General Assembly to circularize the Presbyteries of the Church asking for nominations for the Principalship of the College. A Search Committee was appointed by the Senate to nominate a person suitable for this post and considered the nominations sent in by the Presbyteries. Personal interviews were conducted with a number of those suggested and the Committee indicated its readiness to submit its recommendations.

At a special meeting of the Senate called to receive the report of the Search Committee held on May 24th, 1977, the Senate agreed to present to the General Assembly the name of Reverend Arthur Van Seters, Th.D., for appointment to the Principalship of The Presbyterian College, Montreal. Dr. Van Seters is at present Executive Director of the Montreal Institute for Ministry (a programme of the Joint Board of the Theological Colleges affiliated with McGill University). His commitments to the Institute would necessitate his giving them six months notice of his intentions. This means that, if appointed, he would not assume the duties of the Principalship until the beginning of next year.

The Senate of the College begs to submit the following recommendations:

## RECOMMENDATION 3. C

*That the Senate of The Presbyterian College, Montreal nominate the Reverend Arthur Van Seters, Th.D., to the 103rd General Assembly for appointment as Principal of the College, said appointment to be effective as of January 1, 1978.*

## RECOMMENDATION 4. C

*That the Senate of The Presbyterian College, Montreal be permitted to renew the appointment of the Reverend Dr. D. N. MacMillan as Acting Principal for the period ended January 1, 1978, in accordance with the recommendation of the 102nd General Assembly (see A. & P. 1976, pg. 413) that he be permitted to remain on staff for a period of six months following the installation of the Principal, this to facilitate the change of personnel.*

### THE PENSION BOARD (Supplementary Report)

*To the Venerable the 103rd General Assembly:*

The Pension Board wishes to bring to the attention of the Assembly certain changes in the Regulations of the Retirement Fund for Church Employees and the Constitution of the Pension Plan for Ministers which have not yet been approved by the Assembly, which approval must be reported to the Pension Commission of Ontario and the Department of National Revenue in Ottawa. Both government bodies require that any changes made to the Plans be listed specifically.

The following are a list of changes specific to the Regulations of the Retirement Fund of Church Employees:

Regulation #7 (b) & (c) concerning Membership is changed from, "one year after having become a full time employee or on and after age 21 whichever is the later." to "on or after age 21 except employees at 50 Wynford Drive who have a waiting period of one year before being eligible."

The last paragraph in Regulation #7 is altered by removing the reference to the Women's Missionary Society (Western Division).

Regulation #10 is amended by the addition of the following at the end of the regulation, "But the total of the required and voluntary contributions made by the Member shall be limited to those permitted under Section 8 (1) (m) of the Income Tax Act."

Regulation #15 (1) (b) concerning the vesting of the employer's contribution between the 10th and 20th years of service is amended by replacing, "If this be done . . . after twenty years of service." with "Full vesting of the employer's contribution after the 10th year will be permitted, if the employee leaves the employment of the Church, provided he/she leaves his/her contributions in the Fund."

The following is a change specific to the Constitution of Pension Plan for Ministers:

Rule #6 (c) of the Plan is amended by adding this clause, "But the total of the required and voluntary contributions made by a Member shall be limited to those permitted under Section 8 (1) (m) of the Income Tax Act."

REVEREND CHARLES ANDREW RONALD ROWAT  
 1907-1976

Valiant for Truth is how his life was lived among us. He knew what he believed. He was not afraid to declare it and to remind others of their theological shoddiness when he saw it. An outspoken Evangelical, he had the courage to declare his convictions and could do so with both gentleness and dry humour.

But Ron was not only concerned for the Truth of the Gospel. He also manifested the love of the Gospel. He gave unstintingly of himself, especially to the underdog. In his quiet way he reached out to the immigrant, the common worker, the rural pastor. He served both French and English communities in his zeal to point people to Christ his Lord.

In the heart of the city, through rolling countryside, amid the falling of leaves in the Gatineau bush he walked with God. Through his life and in his passing we have been pointed to both the Spirit's inner resources and outward call to faithful service.

With his wife Kathleen and his children Kitty, Donald and Bruce we rejoice in the triumph of final victory in Christ and commend them to God's loving strength. The words of the Apostle Paul may indeed be applied to Ron.

"For me to live is Christ  
 and to die is gain."

## REVEREND JOHN WILLIAM LOGAN-VENTA

The Very Rev. Dr. John William Logan-Vencta, Minister Emeritus of St. Giles Presbyterian Church, Ottawa, died suddenly at his home in Ottawa on March 9, 1977.

Dr. Logan-Vencta was born in Scotland in 1898 where he received his early education and also his first experience of military life when he served in the army in World War I. In 1924, with his wife, Ruby, he came to Canada and studied at the University of Toronto and Knox College, during which time he served as a student minister at Port Colbourne, Port Robinson and Merriton, all in Ontario. In 1931 he was called to St. Giles Church, Ottawa, where he served until his retirement in 1969, except for five years service as Army Chaplain during World War II.

His service with the Army Chaplaincy began with the Cameron Highlanders of Ottawa but later he became Principal Protestant Chaplain Overseas. On his return to Canada he was promoted to Principal Chaplain (P) of the Army and retired with the rank of Colonel, although he continued to serve the Veterans in the Ottawa D.V.A. hospital.

Dr. Logan-Vencta's ministry was strong in preaching and in compassionate pastoral care of the congregation but his Christian service was extended widely into the work of the whole Church and into the community life of Ottawa. The quality of his devoted labours was acknowledged by Presbyterian College, Montreal, when he was awarded the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity in 1953. He was further honoured in 1967 when he was elected Moderator of the 93rd General Assembly. He was a zealous and tireless servant of Jesus Christ, of the Church and of the community at large and he will be long remembered by all who knew him.

The funeral service, held by the Presbytery of Ottawa in St. Giles Church on March 11, was conducted by the Moderator and Minister of the congregation, the Rev. Hamish M. Kennedy, and the Rev. Dr. Ernest G. B. Foote, representing the Moderator of the 102nd General Assembly, the Right Rev. Dr. A. Lorne Mackay,

and the Rev. Dr. Malcolm A. McCuaig, representing the very Rev. Dr. C. Ritchie Bell, who for health reasons was unable to attend.

Dr. John Logan-Vencta is survived by his wife, the former Ruby McGill, his daughter, Margaret, (Mrs. Derek Standfield) of Vancouver, two grandchildren, and by his brother, Ted, in Scotland, to all of whom the Presbytery of Ottawa extends deepest sympathy.

## SYNOD OF TORONTO AND KINGSTON

### REVEREND JAMES DOUGLAS BAILLIE

James Douglas Baillie was born on July 19, 1893 in Scotland. He graduated with a Master's Degree from Glasgow University in the year 1914. He was a Prize Man in English Literature with Distinction Certificates in French, Natural Philosophy, Moral Philosophy and Hebrew (Divinity Course). He was gazetted to the Royal Field Artillery Imperial Territorial Army and served with the Egyptian Expeditionary Forces attaining the rank of Major. He was demobilized in the year 1919, retiring and retaining a Major's rank with permission.

He entered the Church and held assistantships at Elgin Park Church, Glasgow and St. Michael's, before going to Carnoustie, Scotland, in the year 1924 (Old Parish Church). To mark the Old Parish Church's Centenary in 1937 he wrote and published a History of the Church. He left the Church in Carnoustie in 1941 and was appointed Minister of St. Andrew's Church in Nassau in the Bahamas. During his short stay in the Bahamas the Baillie family were frequently guests of His Royal Highness, the Duke of Windsor and his wife, the Duchess of Windsor.

The late Mr. Baillie came to Canada in 1942 and enlisted in the Canadian Chaplains' Corps, attaining the rank of Captain therein. On demobilization from the Canadian Chaplains' Corps he took a charge in Belmont and Yarmouth, Ontario, where he remained from the year 1946 to the year 1948 at which time he retired and moved to the City of Toronto.

In the next few ensuing years he took on supply work for various churches in the City of Toronto until his full retirement. Mr. Baillie passed away on November 10, 1975.

### REVEREND JOHN MUNRO LAIRD

The Rev. John Munro Laird was called to higher service on June 3rd, 1976, in his 86th year. In failing health for the last two years, he never lost his interest in The Presbyterian Church in Canada, and kept abreast with all aspects of the work. He had the honour of attending the Centennial Celebrations of the General Assembly of The Presbyterian Church in Canada in Montreal in June 1976.

Mr. Laird was a son of the Manse, born in 1890 in Charlottetown, P.E.I., but spent his early years in the Kingston area, where his father preached at Sunbury and Glenburnie. He graduated in Honours in English and History, Queen's University, in 1913 with the Bachelor of Arts Degree. He continued his studies for the ministry at Queen's Theological College, from which he graduated in 1916 with the Bachelor of Divinity Degree. He was awarded a travelling scholarship, but never took advantage of it, owing to war conditions, and feeling the urgency of the call to serve in Western Canada.

He held pastorates in Shellbrook and Penzance, Saskatchewan, and Melita, Manitoba, followed by a lengthy pastorate, 1925-1943, at Knox Church, St. Thomas, where he had a very successful ministry. From 1943 to 1946, he served as Chaplain with the Armed Forces, and rendered distinguished service.

From 1946 to 1965, he was Assistant Minister of Knox Church, Toronto, where he was a pastor and friend to all. He imparted strength as he prayed with the sick and sorrowing. He gave comfort and hope to the distressed and the perplexed. He gave joy and encouragement to each home he visited. During this time, he also played an important part in the founding of Armour Heights Presbyterian Church. Upon retirement, he was made Pastor Emeritus. But retirement was not for him,

and God opened up other avenues of service, and he was stated supply in St. John's, Newfoundland, Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario, and Wabush, Labrador, as well as occupying many pulpits in the Toronto area as Guest Preacher on special occasions. He was a faithful presbyter and served on many committees of the church through the years.

For sixty years he served as a minister of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, and the impact of life, and that of his life's partner, the former May L. B. Taylor, B.A., was felt in the various churches where they served as a team. The verses which seem to summarize his life are 2 Timothy 4: 7-8, where we have the words of Paul: "I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith; henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness which the Lord shall give me."

His wife predeceased him in 1961. To his daughters, Mrs. Louise Turnbull, Mrs. Marjorie Palmer, and Doreen and Joan, the Presbytery of East Toronto extend sincere sympathy and record with thanks our gratitude to God for His servant, who so faithfully served Him and His church through the years.

### REVEREND WALTER HARRY WELCH, Rel.D.

The Rev. Dr. Walter Harry Welch, for twenty-five years Minister of St. Andrew's, Humber Heights in Weston, was called to his Eternal Home, Palm Sunday, April 11, 1976 at age forty-eight. Surviving are his wife Jessie and four children, Mary Jean, Paul, Mark and Timothy.

A Witness to the Resurrection with over 1500 people was held in St. Andrew's on April 14, 1976. The Rev. Prof. Allan Farris delivered the sermon and Mr. Harry Learoyd conducted the music accompanied by the magnificent sound of the trumpet by Mr. Kenneth MacGregor.

While a student at Knox College, he served at Carragana, Saskatchewan and the Birdtail Indian Reservation in Manitoba. Walter came to St. Andrew's in 1951 while in his final year at Knox. At that time there were only twenty members meeting in a local school. The congregation grew under his dynamic ministry and very soon property was purchased and a small church building was dedicated in 1952. During this same period he also established the Rexdale Presbyterian Church and conducted early morning services there each Sunday. St. Andrew's grew both numerically and spiritually and by 1961 an impressive modern church was built in order to accommodate the membership.

In 1965 Walter received the graduate degree of Bachelor of Divinity from Knox College and in 1969 his congregation, in appreciation of his services, sent him on a year's sabbatical to Claremont, California, where he received the degree of Doctor of Religion.

As a former moderator and active participant of the Presbytery of West Toronto, he was innovative and inspirational. He was not afraid to suggest new forms that he felt might bring people to a fresh awareness of the gospel. He organized and enthusiastically inspired the Presbytery and its churches to have a great rally in Victoria-Royce Presbyterian Church on October 19, 1975. He was active in committee work and, as a member of the Pastoral Relations Committee, he composed the series of questions to be asked ministers, sessions, and boards for the every congregation visitation.

Walter was Chaplain at Armagh, and also at Mercer Reformatory (now Vanier Institute) for several years. One day each week was spent as a counsellor, and each Sunday afternoon he packed his trumpet under his arm and off he would go to conduct a worship service. He was intensely concerned about these girls and was greatly disturbed by the fact that, on being released, they had no where to go but back into the same situation which had fostered their problems. This concern has led to the establishment of a half-way house which will be called the Walter Welch Community Resource Centre.

A long time dream was realized when he discovered six other musical Presbyterian ministers and joined them together in that happy, popular musical group known as The Lost and Found Department.

Walter's missionary zeal reached out into the community and he was made Vice-Chairman of Etobicoke's Social Planning Council. He was the founding Chairman of the Ecumenical Association for Ministers and Priests which organized celebrative services throughout the community. This association in turn founded the Christian newspaper called 'Spires'. Walter established Telecare, the telephone answering service for distress calls in Etobicoke.

On the national scene of the church, he was a member of many committees, the most recent being the Centennial Committee. The germ of the Banner Contest for the church was initiated by Walter in his own congregation by the making of banners in the early 1970s. He was one of the Evangelists at large and was Chairman of Congress '75, that vibrant, dynamic experience which took place at McMaster University with over 800 celebrating Presbyterians.

Reflecting on the life of Walter Welch has been like witnessing the painting of a masterpiece — with some very bold strokes, both in design and masterly in execution like his vision and creativity which risked large and small things for Christ; his concern for justice; and his vibrant preaching which applied the Gospel to today's hearts. In that masterpiece there was also an infinity of fine brushstrokes which gives the canvas such depth and richness — a web of prayer and caring; his zeal for his Lord; his humility; his ability to call forth the gifts in others; his affirmation and acceptance of everyone he met; his sense of humor; his great love for his family. And finally, what do we see portrayed in this masterpiece? Surely none other than the face of Jesus Christ Himself, whom Walter served and sought to illumine and make transparent for others.

"The strife is o'er, the battle done;  
The victory of life is won;  
The song of triumph has begun!  
Hallelujah!"

## SYNOD OF HAMILTON AND LONDON

### REVEREND W. ROSS ADAMS

The Presbytery of Niagara records with deep regret the passing of the Rev. W. Ross Adams, B.A., who passed away in the Welland County Hospital on February 28, 1977, in his 70th year. With his death our Church has lost a most concerned presbyter and beloved minister.

Ross Adams was inducted as minister of St. Andrew's Church, Welland in June 1967 and served there until his retirement from the active ministry in October 1975. In 1976 the congregation honoured him with the distinction of Minister Emeritus of St. Andrew's.

Born in Palmerston, Ontario, where he received his early education, Ross Adams graduated from Listowel Secondary School. He attended the University of Toronto for a short time and received his Bachelor of Arts degree from McMaster University, Hamilton. He graduated in theology from Knox College, Toronto, in 1937.

During his years of service within the church, our friend has served congregations in Corunna (1937-39), Paterson Memorial, Sarnia (1939-43), Owen Sound (1943-50), Sherbrooke, Quebec (1950-53), Fergus, Ontario (1953-60), St. Andrew's, Barrie (1960-67) and St. Andrew's, Welland.

Ross Adams, throughout his entire ministry, had a special interest and love for young people and was affectionately known by many of them within his congregations as "the Rev". Seven young people from various congregations in which he served have entered the ministry of the Church.

Mr. Adams has served on practically all Presbytery committees and many of our national Boards, as well as on the Board of the Canadian Bible Society. Within the local community, he was always extremely interested and active in many organizations and lodges, particularly those which had a special concern for helping other people.

Ross Adams is survived by his wife, the former Greta Tweedle, and one son, David, in Toronto.

The funeral service was held in St. Andrew's Church, Welland, on March 3, 1977, conducted by the minister, the Rev. M. S. Jess, assisted by the Rev. J. K. English. The funeral message was delivered by the Rev. DeC. H. Rayner, D.D., a classmate of Mr. Adams. The interment took place in Woodland Cemetery, Hamilton, where the committal was conducted by Mr. Jess, assisted by the Rev. A. L. Mackay, D.D., Moderator of the 102nd General Assembly.

## THE REVEREND GEORGE A. GORDIER

It is with a deep sense of loss that the Presbytery of London records the passing on September 15, 1976 of one of its devoted and faithful servants, the Reverend George A. Gordier, B.A., L.Th. Mr. Gordier was born in Williamsburg, Ontario on January 30, 1904. He attended Waterloo Lutheran Seminary, and when he graduated in 1926, he was the youngest graduate of the Seminary up to that time. His early ministry was in Bridgewater, Nova Scotia. Later in connection with the Anglican Church he served in Bancroft, Ontario. He also taught in high schools in Thornbury and Parry Sound for a number of years. Accepted as a minister of the Presbyterian Church in Canada by the General Assembly of 1950, he received a call in 1951 to Alvinston, a four-point charge where he served for eight years. In 1959 he was appointed to serve the new charge of St. Lawrence in the Presbytery of London where he ministered for ten years. In 1969 he accepted a call to the Dorchester and South Nissouri charge in this same presbytery where he remained until his retirement in 1974. At the time of his passing he held the office of Treasurer for both the Presbytery and the Synod of Hamilton and London.

George Gordier was a faithful pastor and a wise teacher, a man of dedication and diligence. He had a keen sense of humour and a genuine gift of friendship. Wherever and whenever he served, he served in full measure to the honour of Christ and the advancement of His Kingdom.

The funeral service was held in the Dorchester Church, conducted by the minister, the Reverend K. McKenzie, assisted by the Reverend John H. Marshall, a close personal friend. The Sessions of Dorchester, South Nissouri, and St. Lawrence congregations along with members of the Presbytery shared in the farewell service. Interment was in Strathroy, Ontario.

The Presbytery offers its deepest sympathy to his survivors: to his wife, the former Jean Downie, to his daughter Ruth (Mrs. Peter Shillington of Blenheim), to his son, Lyle of London, to his step-daughter, Jean-Ann (Mrs. Neil Armstrong of Stittsville), to his three grandchildren, to his brothers, John of Ottawa and Wesley of Morrisburg, and to his sister Ethel of Morrisburg.

## REVEREND SAMUEL HUGH HILL

Born in Lisburn, County Dawn, Northern Ireland, February 10, 1889. After his early education in Ireland, he came to Canada at the age of 17. When his formal education was completed he went to McCormick Theological Seminary in Chicago. He was ordained in 1917 and after serving on Mission fields in Ohio and Western Canada, he returned to the United States and ministered in North Dakota and Chicago before coming back to Canada in 1928. His ministry was in Bobcaygeon, Amherst Island, Kinburn, Hastings, Pembroke, Emmanuel-Toronto, St. Enoch's-Hamilton, Ailsa Craig and Corunna in Ontario; Parkview in Saskatoon and St. James, Winnipeg. He retired from active ministry in 1963 while in Corunna, moving to London where he remained until his death, August 26, 1976. His main hobbies were reading and travelling.

On June 21, 1916 he married Mary Boyd a Kindergarten teacher in Chicago, Illinois, who survives. As well, he leaves to mourn two daughters Lois (Mrs. George) Woelfle of Paisley, Ontario and Eileen (Mrs. Keith) Goodfellow of Ancaster, three

sons, Gordon of Oakville, Paul of London, and David of Walworth, Wisconsin, U.S.A. He also had fourteen grandchildren.

The funeral took place at the George E. Logan & Sons Funeral Home in London with burial in Forest Lawn Memorial Gardens. Rev. J. J. Jennings of Oakridge Acres Presbyterian Church and Rev. M. Pollock, Moderator of London Presbytery officiated.

#### REVEREND STEPHAN JOHN LOOKMAN

From his arrival in Canada from Amsterdam, Holland, in 1929, Stephan Lookman gave of his best to all his employers. These labours began at Trail, B.C., where he was employed in the steel industry.

Influenced to answer the call to the ministry, he took classes at Presbyterian College, which was affiliated with Knox College during the war years. As a student, he served Kimberley, B.C., and graduated in 1944.

Stephan Lookman's ministry was characterized by humour, singing, and affectionate concern for people. He gave to his charges the best of his hand and heart: at St. Andrew's, Brandon; Marpole, Vancouver; Knox, Fort Frances; St. Paul's, Carluke, and Knox, Binbrook; where he came in 1960, and retiring there from the ministry in 1976. At Binbrook, he supervised the building of a new church.

Moving to Brantford, Ontario, he died on May 23, 1977, in his 72nd year. The funeral took place in St. Paul's Church, Carluke. Interment was made in the White Brick Cemetery.

He is survived by his wife, Nellie Douglas, and a family of three children: Gordon, Brampton; Marilyn (Baird), Wingham; Louise (Post), Galt.

#### REVEREND DONALD HECTOR MACKAY

Donald Hector Mackay was born in Winnipeg, Manitoba, in 1891. Following the death of his parents, he moved to British Columbia where his studies in Law were interrupted by the First World War in which he served with the 7th and 54th British Columbia Regiments. Accepting Jesus Christ as Lord and Saviour, he sought to follow in the steps of His Master and following the awarding of his law certificate, he entered the Bible Institute of Los Angeles completing both undergraduate and post-graduate courses. He studied for three years at the Pittsburgh Theological Seminary, Pennsylvania, where he heard God's Call to a ministry to the Jews.

Following graduation in 1929, he served in northern Canada with The Presbyterian Church for two years in the expectation that our denomination would open a Jewish Mission. In LePas, Manitoba, his son, David was born, shortly to be returned to the Creator. The Jewish Mission in Hamilton called Mr. and Mrs. Mackay as their first missionaries and for 41 years they served amongst the Friends of Israel, retiring in 1974. On May 8, 1976, Donald Hector Mackay was called into the nearer presence of His Lord. May his burden, passion and vision be shared by his fellows in order to fill the gap left by our brother who has joined the celebrities of the redeemed.

#### REVEREND E. C. McCULLAGH

Rev. E. C. McCullagh, 84, a retired minister, died at Dunnville, Ontario, on February 22, 1977.

Ernest Crawford McCullagh was born in Belfast, Northern Ireland, and studied for the ministry after serving with the Canadian army in World War I.

Mr. McCullagh took a B.A. at the University of Toronto and in 1925 was graduated from Knox College.

His first pastorate was at Pembroke, Ontario. After four years he was called to Alexandra Church, Brantford, Ont. In 1941 Mr. McCullagh was commissioned as a chaplain in the Royal Canadian Air Force. He rose to the rank of Wing Commander and to the post of Command Chaplain during his five years with the R.C.A.F. In

1946 he was called to Knox Church, Dunnville, Ont. where he served until his retirement in 1968.

Surviving are his wife, the former Annie Echo Dickson of Port Ryerse, Ont. and six daughters: Sheilagh (Mrs. Ken) Hearnden, Thunder Bay; Mrs. Rhea Norton, Dunnville; Moira (Mrs. Eric) St. John, Ottawa; Deidre (Mrs. Keith) Polson, Toronto; Brigid (Mrs. Robert) Kemp, Brantford; and Maeve (Mrs. James) Railton, Port Colborne. He was predeceased by one son, James Crawford.

#### REVEREND EUGENE RUZSA

Rev. Eugene Ruzsa, 77, a retired Presbyterian minister, died in Hamilton, Ont. on Jan. 4, 1977.

Ordained in 1932 after completing his academic course in Hungary, Mr. Ruzsa emigrated to Canada. He served as minister of the John Calvin Hungarian Church in Hamilton from 1942 until his retirement in 1969.

Surviving are his wife, the former Helen Strompf, three sons, Theodore of Hamilton, Eugene of Beamsville, Ont. and William of Toronto; and three daughters, Pearl (Mrs. J. Sojnocki) and Videt (Mrs. S. Karnay) both of Hamilton and Lillian (Mrs. M. Gara) of London, Ont.

#### REVEREND ADAM THOMSON

The Reverend Adam Thomson was born at Lerwick, Shetland Islands, Scotland, on Oct. 9, 1911. Educated at Glasgow University and Trinity College, Glasgow, he was ordained in 1940 by the Church of Scotland. During the war years, he acted as honorary chaplain at a Midget Submarine Base in North Scotland, and in 1953 was awarded the M.B.E. for service to the Crown.

After special studies, Mr. Thomson served from 1950-1953 as minister at St. Andrew's Scots Kirk, Grenada, British West Indies. Returning to Scotland he served as parish minister at Ardeonaig, Perthshire, before coming to Canada in 1955, where he served in Montreal as assistant minister at Knox Crescent & Kensington Church. He took further studies at The Presbyterian College.

Mr. Thomson was active in adding church buildings in the charges where he served as minister in Canada: at St. Paul's, Hawkesbury, 1957; Chalmers, Hamilton, 1965; and St. Andrew's, Hagersville, 1970, where he died on April 19, 1977. As well as serving as Moderator of the Presbytery of Ottawa and the Presbytery of Hamilton, Mr. Thomson was active in civic life. At his death he was chaplain to the Erie L.O.L. #128, and the Legion Branch #164, and had served a term as president of the Hagersville Ministerial Association.

Married in 1941 to Marjorie Brown who survives him, they had one son, Norman, who lives with his wife, Carrol in London, Ont. His funeral was conducted by the Presbytery of Hamilton in St. Andrew's Church, Hagersville, April 22.

#### REVEREND STANLEY W. VANCE

The Rev. Dr. Stanley W. Vance, 58, the minister of St. Paul's Church, Hamilton, Ont. for the past 27 years, died suddenly on Oct. 26, 1976.

Born in Ottawa on September 25, 1918, Dr. Vance attended high school in Fort William, and received his B.A. degree from the University of Toronto in 1940. He graduated from Knox College in 1943. His alma mater conferred the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity on him in 1966.

Stanley Vance was ordained in 1943 and was appointed to Vernon and Armstrong, B.C. In 1945 he accepted a call to St. Andrew's Church, St. Lambert, Que. where he served for four years before being inducted at St. Paul's Church, Hamilton in April of 1949.

Dr. Vance served on the old board of administration and on other Assembly boards and committees. Latterly, because of health problems his energies were devoted to his congregation, where he was highly regarded both as a preacher and a pastor.

A Memorial Service was held in St. Paul's Church, Hamilton on Friday, October 29, 1976 conducted by the Rev. Dr. L. J. Shein. The Moderator of the 102nd General Assembly, the Rev. A. L. Mackay, a close personal friend of Dr. Vance gave the eulogy. Dr. Vance had a distinguished and influential ministry and was a preacher of persuasive power and vigor, a preacher of the first order stated Dr. Mackay.

Surviving are his wife, the former Eleanor Griffith, and two sons, Paul and Graham, both of Toronto.

### SYNOD OF BRITISH COLUMBIA

#### REVEREND CHARLES E. BRAY

The Presbytery of Kamloops records with sadness the passing of Charles Edwin Bray in the City of Penticton, B.C. on August 8th, 1976 at the age of 86.

Mr. Bray was born in England, April 24, 1890 and emigrated to Canada in 1909. He found employment in Toronto where he engaged himself in the life of the Church, and seeking to serve his Lord in full time service graduated from Toronto Bible College (now Ontario Bible College) in 1916. That same year he married Amy Smith who predeceased him in 1954. He studied at McMaster University for 2 years and entered the armed services. Returning to civilian life he was sent by the Sudan Interior Mission to Nigeria where he served until 1925 being forced to return to Canada because of malaria.

He then served The Presbyterian Church as a catechist at Buckhorn, Lakeview, Peterborough and Saugeen. From 1932 until 1941 he served the Associate Gospel Churches.

Upon being received by The Presbyterian Church he served at Willowdale, Three Hills and Orkney in Alberta, Nelson and Armstrong in B.C. and Assiniboia in Saskatchewan. He retired in 1964 moving to Penticton where he continued to give service as health would permit. He served as Moderator of the Presbytery of Red Deer, Calgary and Kamloops and as Moderator of the Synod of Alberta.

In 1959 he married Mrs. Mary Miller who survives him. He is also survived by his daughters Jean of Lethbridge, and Mrs. Ruth Graham of West Bank, B.C., six brothers and sisters, grandchildren and great grandchildren.

Funeral services were conducted in St. Andrew's, Penticton by the Rev. A. Gordon Faraday, Rev. David Stewart and Rev. Daniel Firth, members of Presbytery being in attendance. Internment is in the Naramata Cemetery in British Columbia.

His life was spent in the service of his Lord, he ran with diligence the race that was set before him giving guidance, courage and comfort to the people entrusted to his care.

#### REVEREND EDISON LLOYD GARVIN

The Reverend Edison Lloyd Garvin passed away in White Rock on January 10, 1977.

Mr. Garvin was born in Southport, Saskatchewan, in 1896. His early theological education took place in California, and on return to Canada, in Manitoba College, but due to illness he was compelled to spend two years in hospital and two further years convalescing. His courage and determination were such that he studied extramurally from Knox College and was ordained by permission of the General Assembly in Knox Church Selkirk, in 1931, where he proclaimed the Gospel until June, 1938 when he was inducted into St. Andrew's Church, Lethbridge. He was called to Robertson Church, Vancouver, in 1949, and then to St. John's Church, White Rock, in 1960, from which he retired in 1966.

During his ministry he served as Clerk and Moderator within the bounds where he was minister.

Like His Master he set his face as a flint against all who would compromise the Word of God, within or without the Church. He responded to the dictates of a

simple faith, with a passion for the conversion of others. His ministry both in the pulpit and his pastoral concerns was one of evangelism.

He is survived by his wife, two sons, Rev. Robert C. Garvin of Port Alberni, B.C. and Rev. Murray L. Garvin of Weston, Ontario and one sister.

Interment was in White Rock on January 13, where Rev. Frank Morley conducted the Committal Service. The Presbytery of Westminister, Rev. Keith Wilcox, Moderator, conducted a largely attended and representative Memorial Service in St. John's, White Rock, the same day.

By this Memorial the Presbytery of Westminister records its sense of great loss and extends its deepest sympathy to the family and relatives.

#### REVEREND JONATHAN H. GREENE

Born in Lurgan, Co. Armagh, Northern Ireland, in 1905, Jonathan Henry Greene was brought up in the city of Belfast and received his early education at Belfast Model School. As a boy, he attended Oldpark Presbyterian Church. Later, hearing the call of full-time Christian service, he prepared himself by a three year study course at the Bible Training Institute in Glasgow. Following graduation from the Bible Training Institute, he was engaged for some years in evangelistic work in Scotland and England.

He went into the grocery business in the city of Belfast for a short time, and hearing the appeal of the Mission Board of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, he emigrated in 1949. He was appointed a catechist in the Keene, Westwood charge in the Presbytery of Peterborough. Later he served in Colville, Saskatchewan, and from there he was appointed to Moose Creek, Ont.

While serving at Moose Creek he undertook a three year special course in Presbyterian College, Montreal and graduated in 1957. In 1949 he married Gladys McFarlane of Belfast, Northern Ireland, who survives him and at present resides in Victoria, British Columbia.

During 1957 he was ordained in St. Andrews, Assiniboia. He also ministered in Brussels, Ontario. From there he went to Cardinal, where he spent the next six years. After a brief ministry in Hanover, Mr. Greene went to Kemptville where he spent the last five years of his ministry. He retired in 1972 and came West to Victoria, where he died on September 4th, 1973.

Mr. Greene was of a quiet disposition, a good student of the Bible and a warm-hearted pastor. His message had a keen evangelistic thrust, and he made a valued contribution to the life and work of our Presbyterian Church.

THE BOOK OF FORMS**

The Book of Forms, as issued by authority of the 95th General Assembly (1969), brought all previous revisions to and including 1969 up to date.

From year to year since 1969 other revisions have been found in this place in Acts and Proceedings.

Clip this page, trim, and place in your copy of the 1969 edition of the Book of Forms beside or over, the sections as indicated.

*Section 200.* Add the following between (i) and (k) -

(j) In the matter of amalgamation of congregations, as pertaining to the assets of the amalgamating congregations, reference shall be made with recommendation by oral submission or extract of minutes or both, under authority of the congregational meetings and Presbytery, to the Administrative Council or to its Executive Committee for study and report to the Presbytery concerned with suggestions after which the Presbytery shall consider the disposition of the project involved, making use of the Guidelines printed under Section 5 Appendix, part two, and shall then have power to issue.

Add the following after Appendices - Part Two, Section 4. Information Re Boards of the Church. (Page 148)

**5. Guidelines for Use of Presbytery Re Disposition of Assets of Amalgamating Congregations.**

a - Any debt that may exist on the property of the congregation that is amalgamating should be paid in full from the proceeds of the sale of the property if it is to be sold.

b - If the amalgamated congregation (that is both) has a debt, it should be paid off.

c - If the amalgamated congregation does not have a debt, 25% of the residue of the proceeds of the sale of the subject property be given to the amalgamated congregation to assist it to establish its program.

d - The Presbytery concerned should assist the amalgamated congregation in planning and promoting a thorough-going program suitable for the community.

e - 50% of the residue of the proceeds that accrue from the sale of the subject property be given to the Presbytery concerned to be used only to reduce on a prorata basis the debts of the congregations within the bounds of the Presbytery concerned, or to be used within the bounds of the Presbytery concerned for extension work of the Church.

f - 25% of the residue of the proceeds that accrue from the sale of the subject property be used to promote good Christian programs in communities outside the bounds of the Presbytery concerned or to assist in reducing a nagging debt of some struggling congregation anywhere in Canada.

At the end of Section 32 add - "save that a Presbytery if it is desired may call for the Session records once every two years for attestation."

Revise first sentence of Section 82 to read: - "The record of the Presbytery and Synod is reviewed by the next higher court at least once a year, and the Session record is reviewed by the Presbytery at least once every two years. The higher court may call for the records of a lower court at any time."

Revise the first paragraph of Section 255 to read: - "It is the duty of the Presbytery to revise and attest at least once every two years the records and rolls of all Kirk Sessions within the bounds." (See Section 32)
