#### FIRST SEDERUNT

At the City of Montreal, and within First Church there, Wednesday, the fourth day of June, in the year of our Lord, one thousand nine hundred and seventy-five, at eight o'clock in the evening.

Which place and time Ministers and Ruling Elders, commissioners from the several Presbyteries of The Presbyterian Church in Canada, convened pursuant to appointment of the General Assembly held in the City of Kitchener, Ontario, on the second day of June last year.

The Rev. Hugh F. Davidson, M.A., D.D., Moderator of the last General Assembly, assisted by the Rev. C. J. MacKay, B.A., D.D., Interim-Moderator of First Church, conducted public worship and preached a sermon on the text, II. Corinthians 4:18, "The Things That Are Unseen".

Thereafter, with prayer, he did constitute the General Assembly in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ, the only King and Head of the Church.

Whereupon Dr. Davidson did by prayer call upon God to bless the newlyelected Moderator and confer upon him strength and wisdom that he might discharge the duties of his office. He then did install him in the Moderator's Chair.

#### THANKS OF MODERATOR

The newly-elected Moderator thanked Dr. Davidson for his kind words and the Assembly for the trust they had conferred upon him and called upon the commissioners for their support in the business of the Court and in their prayers, and spoke upon the theme of the Church being the Church.

## REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

The Assembly called for the Report of the Board of Education (and the Report of the Committee on Reception) was given in by Dr. C. J. MacKay in the absence of the Chairman.

On his motion, duly seconded, it was received, taken as read, spread on the Minutes, and the Committee on Business was instructed to find a place for it on the docket of a future Sederunt.

The Board of Education begs to submit the following report:

#### I. SPECIAL COURSES

Note:

Attention is drawn to the following regulation adopted by the General Assembly of 1953.

"That status of a catechist must not be understood as a step toward ultimate ordination. The recognition of this office is considered to be desirable only in order that the opportunity for full-time service may be provided for men with preaching and pastoral gifts and who are willing to give themselves to this

work, but who may not be able to meet the educational requirements for the ministry, and also enable the Church to profit by the service which such men can render." (A. & P. 1953 p. 22).

To the Venerable the 101st General Assembly:

This is the Report of a special committee named by the General Assembly last year to receive and consider nominations made by the presbyteries to fill the position of the second deputy clerk of the General Assembly. From the outset your Committee recognized the importance and significance of the office of a clerk of the General Assembly to the life and the administration of the highest court of our denomination as well as the guidance and assistance given to the lower courts.

Therefore we approached our task in a prayerful, contemplative and objective

There were thirty presbyteries who made a nomination, giving us a total of fifteen names. Your committee expresses our gratitude to Dr. Fowler who prepared and mailed to the clerk of each presbytery an outline of the duties and responsibilities of a deputy clerk. Your committee met to consider the qualifications of the nominees.

Each one of the nominees had suitable qualifications and the desire to use these to serve our denomination thus making them most likely and acceptable candidates to fill this important position.

We are indebted to all the nominees who agreed to allow their name to be considered and for their co-operation both before and during our deliberations.

After thoughtful and serious consideration the committee agreed to invite four of the nominees to meet with and be interviewed by the Committee. Each of the four selected did so.

At each of our meetings the principal clerk, Dr. Fowler, and the first deputy clerk, Dr. MacDonald, were present in an advisory and helpful capacity.

Dr. Fowler intimated to the committee his intention to submit to this Assembly his resignation as principal clerk. This broadened the scope of our concern.

Since we had two of our brethren who had outstanding qualifications and apparent suitability to fill this office with distinction we were reluctant not to make use of both of them.

Therefore we are prepared to make unanimously the following recommendations:

We recommend

- That this Assembly appoint Rev. Dr. Everett H. Bean of Sydney, Nova Scotia, as first deputy clerk and Rev. Dr. Douglas Lowry of Campbellville, Ontario, as second deputy clerk of the General Assembly of The Presbyterian Church in Canada, their duties to be assigned by the principal clerk;
- 2. That the matter of a suitable honorarium be left in the hands of the Administrative Council.

#### THE FUND FOR MINISTERIAL ASSISTANCE

To the Venerable the 101st General Assembly:

The Fund for Ministerial Assistance distributed \$57,332 in gifts to eligible ministers and their children in four quarterly payments and a special Christmas gift during 1974. Two gifts were made in special circumstances of need within the terms of the Fund. The Appointors met four times and reviewed the financial situation. During the year an average of 141 ministers and 236 children received the quarterly cheques.

With the larger increase in stipends approved by the last General Assembly it was felt that there might be a large increase in the number of eligible ministers but this is not the case. The new graduating students now are eligible and this was the only significant increase, while several congregations became self-supporting and increased stipends beyond requiring assistance.

The Committee wishes to record its gratitude to Dr. Howard A. Doig who has resigned as Secretary of the Committee. The diligence and knowledge that he has been able to bring to the work of the Fund has been very valuable in assessing the priorities in the Fund.

The details of administration are under the care of the staff of the Comptroller's Office and the Board of World Mission.

(i) That the compulsory retiring age of all ministers be 70, effective as of January 1st following their full age of 70 years.

(ii) That where it is desired to continue the services in the present or another parish, the presbytery, under the authority of Section 213, Book of Forms, make arrangements mutually acceptable to the presbytery concerned, after consultation with the parish and the minister.

(iii) That the following be sent down under the Barrier Act:

(a) An amendment of Section 235, Book of Forms, be made as follows: The words "subject to the regulations concerning retirement" follow the words "to all the rights and privileges thereto pertaining".

(b) An amendment of Section 245, Book of Forms, be made as follows: The first sentence to read, "When a minister, under the regulations concerning retirement or infirmity, proposes to retire from the active duties of the ministry ... "

(If it is the pleasure of Assembly to send this (iii) down under the Barrier Act, the presbyteries should be instructed that their replies must be "no" or "yes" for both sections, inasmuch as a "yes" for one and a "no" for the other would be contradictory).

- (iv) These regulations, etc., as they may be passed by Assembly are declared not to be retroactive for pastors already inducted when the law becomes effective under the Barrier Act.
- (v) If (iii) is passed by Assembly under the Barrier Act, the following items should be noted:
  - I. That the sections (as usual) be printed on the last page of Acts and Proceedings of that year, and with them a reference to this report be given.

II. That the Clerks of Assembly be authorized to make asterisks and footnotes with reference to this report for sections of the Book of Forms where, after consideration, they deem such advisable.

III. That the last page of Acts and Proceedings direct all having copies of the Book of Common Order place on pages 360 and 370 thereof the words "subject to the regulations concerning retirement" in the appropriate place that the act of presbytery be in conformity to the foregoing (iii).

Recommendation adopted.

4. That the prayer of overture 5, 1975, Presbytery of Hamilton be approved. Recommendation deferred until the Pension Board reports.

5. That the prayer of overture 30, 1974, Presbytery of Saint John, re Catechists be answered in the following terms:

(a) That the historic position of the Church be reaffirmed.

(b) That the concerns expressed in the overture will be partially taken up in the consideration of the diaconate.

Recommendation 5 (a) was adopted and recommendation 5 (b) withdrawn.

#### THE BOARD OF KNOX COLLEGE

Consideration of the Report of the Board of Knox College was resumed, Mr. G. B. Mallion, Chairman, reporting.

Pursuant to instructions of Assembly, Dr. R. G. MacMillan reported that the Administrative Council and the Board of Knox College had conferred, and report as

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follows; a revision of Recommendation 39 of the Administrative Council:

- (a) That the increase of 12% in Executive salary scale granted by the Executive of the Administrative Council effective January 1st, 1975, be confirmed and continue to the end of 1975.
- (b) That, effective January 1st, 1976, the salaries of the Professors of Knox College and Presbyterian College not exceed \$19,800. Plus \$2,000 (total \$21,800) in lieu of house allowance.
- (c) That, effective January 1st, 1976, the salaries of Executive Secretaries be \$18,000 and Assistant Secretaries be \$16,500 and that where applicable the sum of \$2,000 or \$1,700 be added in lieu of house allowance.
- (d) That, effective January 1st, 1976, the Professorial salaries at Ewart College and St. Andrew's Hall be increased by 15% over the 1975 scale.

The revised Recommendations were adopted.

"The Committee on Reception under Section 248 II of the Book of Forms met at 50 Wynford Drive on August 15, 1974, to consider the application of Mr. John Sun Noh to be received as a Licentiate of The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

Mr. Noh was born in Seoul, Korea in 1945. He is married and has no children.

He graduated from Kyunggi High School, Seoul in 1964; from Yonsei University, Seoul in 1969; from Harvard University Divinity School in June 1974 with the M.Div. Degree. Mr. Noh also did some post-graduate work in Yonsei University in 1969-1970. He was licensed by the Presbytery of Boston on May 28, 1974 and has passed the written ordination examinations that are given all candidates for the Christian Ministry by the United Presbyterian Church in the United States. He has been serving as supply in the Fourth Presbyterian Church, Boston. He holds landed immigrant status in Canada.

The Committee on Receiption considered Mr. Noh's documentation and found all to be in order. A Circular letter was sent to the Presbyteries under date of August 15, 1974 and there being no valid protest in terms of Book of Forms. Section 248, Sub-Section II, permission was given to any Presbytery of the Church to receive Mr. Noh as a licentiate of The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

On motion of Mr. R. D. MacDonald, duly seconded, this was received for information.

## REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON OVERTURE No. 8, 1975, PRESBYTERY OF LINDSAY-PETERBOROUGH RE: ANNUAL ATTESTATION OF ROLLS AND RECORDS

- (c) That all replies be sent to the Secretary of the Committee on Church Doctrine no later than January 31st, 1976. The motion carried.

John Forbes, and the Committee on Arrangements for the 101st General Assembly for all their work for the confort and well-being of Commissioners, Guests and Visitors and for attending to the many details which have enabled the Assembly to run so smoothly. In particular we thank the Rev. Derek Balmer in connection with the Kirkfest and the Rev. Clair MacLeod for the Shuttle Bus, and the members of St. Columba-by-the-Lake for meeting the airplanes. We also thank the London Free

Press and the members of St. Andrew's, St. Lambert, for transportation. On his motion, duly seconded, the Report was adopted.

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF WORLD MISSION

To the Venerable the 101st General Assembly:

In this third report since the formation of the Board of World Mission, we give thanks to Almighty God for the exciting mission of His Church on earth, of which we are a part. We rejoice in the mission of young people through summer ministries, and the challenge of mission from Whitehorse, Yukon to Grand Falls, Newfoundland where faithful ordained ministers and professional church workers share with laymen and laywomen, in the proclamation by word and deed, of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. We are grateful for the privilege of sharing as servants of Jesus Christ with Sister Churches in Nigeria, Koreans in Japan, Taiwan, Malawi, Guyana, India, through general support for ministry, hospitals, education and in a variety of other ways with dedicated mission personnel.

After two years as chairman, the Rev. James Crabb retired from the Board

which he served with diligence.

## The Church goes Forward in Mission

In Canada and Overseas, population still increases and Presbyterians must be obedient to the will of the Lord and His great Commission. As the Lord opens new opportunities we must be willing to accept the challenges and show our concern of the people for whom our Lord died and rose again.

In November Dr. Goodwill MacDougall was appointed Secretary for Church and University to replace Rev. Ron Mulchey.

Miss Mary Whale and Rev. Alex MacSween were on Sabbatical during part of

the year and are enthusiastic in their reports.

Rev. K. C. Doka was appointed as Superintendent of Missions for British Columbia, Rev. George Johnston as Superintendent of Missions for Alberta and Dr. Dilwyn T. Evans as Superintendent of Missions for Saskatchewan.

Miss Beatrice Scott, Amkhut, India resigned after 34 years of mission work in

India.

#### Mission and Finance

The General Assembly Budget, the Women's Missionary Society (W.D.) and Woman's Missionary Society (E.D.) have worked together to provide support for mission endeavours in Canada and Overseas. The Board has attempted to be a good steward of the \$2,057,190 allocated to it for missions.

The raising of the stipend and travel allowances has met with a wonderful response; many aid-receiving congregations have accepted all or more than, or at least a major portion of the \$1,000 increase. Church workers have been encouraged

by the concern shown by the Church in this time of inflation.

Within the Budget, there is enough flexibility to pay stipends as we begin new work when other congregations become self-supporting - which 8 congregations did this year. We were able to begin three new congregations. Our concern is the lack of Capital Funds. The amount of money on hand in Capital Funds has been committed to these new congregations and there are no funds available to pay the down payment on manses or the purchase of congregational sites for additional congregations in this time of high cost. The B.W.M. proposal through the Administrative Council for the "Second Century Advance" becomes even more necessary if we are to continue even the minimum of Church extension in Canada and assist our Sister Churches Overseas in their spiritual and economic development.

#### Highlights of 1974-75

Most of the Graduates of 1974 from the Theological Colleges have taken up their appointments in Canada and Rev. Ron and Mrs. Archer, have gone to Taiwan as Overseas Missionaries. Eleven theological college graduates, and two graduates of Ewart College were appointed in the Spring of 1975.

The Rev. Terrance and Mrs. Samuel, Miss Diane Petrie, R.N., were appointed to Taiwan, Miss Lillian Wilton, R.N., was appointed to Afghanistan as a nurse.

New congregations were opened in Burlington, Ontario; in Calgary (Marlborough), Alberta; and in Meadowvale West, Mississauga, Ontario.

Overseas visitors who sought to personalize mission as they went across Canada were Dr. In Ha Lee, Korean Church in Japan and the very Rev. J. D. Sangaya, Church of Central Africa, Presbyterian, Malawi, Africa.

"Unknown Country" is one of the mission study resources provided in centennial year.

Films, slides and other literature have had an increased use during the year.

The Presbyterian Calendar sold 48,000 copies,

A Canada Mission Consultation identified some priorities, advises selective and wise use of resources.

A number of senior ministers have assisted in filling vacancies for short periods

A number of marginally self-supporting congregations have asked the B.W.M. for the appointment of ordained ministers.

The variety of mission by The Presbyterian Church in Canada which has international development aspects, has enabled the Church to apply for matching grant funds from the governments of Alberta and Saskatchewan and the Canadian International Development Agency.

The following reports have many details, and many other significant events of progress and encouragement have happened in the missions of our Church which

are not recorded.

The Lord has given our Church a vital mission task, let us do it to the best of our ability, expecting the Kingdom of God to come on earth as it is in heaven.

### RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. That the Mission Theme for 1976-77 be based on the working title "Canadian Concerns" and the Board of World Mission, in co-operation with the Women's Missionary Society (W.D.) and the Board of Congregational Life be requested to provide suitable materials.
- 2. That the following minute of appreciation be embodied in the minutes of the General Assembly:

#### Miss Beatrice Scott -

Miss Beatrice Scott, a native of Port Elgin, Ontario, has served as a missionary of the Women's Missionary Society (W.D.) staff since September 1940, of the Board of World Mission staff since January 1972.

Miss Scott is a graduate of the Normal Schools of Ontario, the University of Toronto, the Missionary and Deaconess Training School. It is as a teacher that Miss Scott has served the major part of her work abroad. Except for two years when she was on the staff of the Helen Macdonald Memorial School in Jhansi, Miss Scott has served on the Bhil Field where she was combining teaching and evangelist work. There she served as principal of the Amkhut School and later as manager of the Amkhut System and Supervisor of the village schools.

Miss Scott has been associated with all our educational workers in India; with the gradual training of Indian people for their place in the life and work of their Church, and of their country.

Miss Scott returned to Canada in May 1974 after thirty-three years of service in India. She will live in Port Elgin, Ontario.

3. That the following minute of appreciation be embodied in the minutes of General Assembly:

# Rev. Ron Mulchey - Consultant For Church and University

The Board of Christian Education appointed Ron Mulchey to this position in 1970. His meaningful visits to University Centres built a new dimension in Ecumenical University Chaplaincies where several denominations could share the services of chaplains in eight university campuses. The principle of working

ecumenically and with I.V.C.F. and S.C.M. had been the basis of the consultants' work. It is high tribute to Mr. Mulchey that he was Executive Secretary for an Ad Hoc Committee on Campus Ministry and part of his salary was paid by the United and Anglican Churches,

His pleasant personality enabled him to relate well to student, faculty and church leaders. Mr. Mulchey did much to promote the first Chaplains' Con-

ference and its success is one of his trophies.

Shortly after the decision by the 1973 General Assembly to transfer Church and University to the Board of World Mission, Mr. Mulchey decided to do further studies. He has now completed his studies in Hospital Administration. On behalf of the former Board of Christian Education and the Board of World Mission, we express our appreciation for his work in the strategic and important field of Church and University.

- 4. That the appointment of Temporary Assistants be approved:
  - A. That the Board of World Mission agree to appoint temporary assistants in charges where there is rapid growth, but where this growth is not expected to justify the establishment of an additional congregation,
  - B. That such appointment be made on the following terms:
    - (1) A formal application from the Presbytery must be received on request of the Kirk Session regarding a temporary assistant.
    - (2) The temporary assistant will work under the direction of the Presbytery in consultation with the Kirk Session.
    - (3) The primary responsibility regarding the stipend and allowances for the appointee rests with the congregation. A grant may be applied for under special circumstances on request supported by full documentation
    - (4) The temporary assistant may be an ordained missionary, a retired minister, a deaconess, catechist, student or other lay person.
    - (5) The appointment will be for a period of up to six months, at the end of which time the appointment will be reviewed by the Session, Presbytery and Board of World Mission.
- 5. That a study of "Two Point Charges in Urban Centres" be made by Presbyteries; and that long range planning by Presbyteries be made relative to:
- A. (1) dwindling membership and financial dependency upon the General Assembly budget;
  - (2) personnel shortage with reference to availability of ordained ministers to fill vacancies:
  - (3) population shifts from or to an area (re-location);
- (4) good stewardship of human and financial resources in the local situation;
- B. and recommend a serious study of this matter and consideration of shared ministries between congregations (urban and rural), dissolution of expiring congregations, amalgamations and other possible solutions.
- 6. Inner City Ministry

That where there is a vacancy in an aid-receiving congregation located in an inner city situation, consultation be held with the Inner City Committee relative to an appropriate appointee and the terms of reference for the work.

That where there are rapid, dramatic changes within the urban scene, Presbyteries be requested to review changes, with the congregations which occur in traditional ministries to determine whether or not a congregation is an inner city situation requiring a special kind of ministry and terms of reference.

7. That an increase of approximately 12% in basic stipend \$800 (\$6,400 -\$7,200 for Ordained Missionaries), and a proportionate increase for other church workers, (deaconesses, women missionaries, catechists and lay missionaries, superintendents of missions, students, directors of institutions, special overseas personnel) be made effective January 1, 1976.

- 8. That the stipend for retired ministers working for the Board of World Mission as per 1971 regulations Acts & Proceedings, page 207, be increased by \$500 retroactive to January 1, 1975 and \$500 effective January 1, 1976.
- 9. That the 1977 basic stipend increase be tied to the cost of living. (We would note that the 1974 cost of living increase is approximately 12%).
- 10. That the basic travel allowance (now \$600) be increased to \$900 per annum for all ordained ministers and church workers, etc. effective July 1, 1975, it being understood that travel for overseas personnel whether in Canada or Overseas, as per travel regulations is included in this travel increase.
- 11. That (1) the student weekend supply rate be \$35 plus hospitality and transportation (mileage at approved rate); and That (2) the minister weekend supply rate be \$50 plus hospitality and transportation (mileage at approved rate).
- 12. That for Missions in Canada and Overseas for 1976. The Board of World Mission request up to \$100,000 for Canada and \$50,000 for Overseas to be allocated for Capital needs (manses, church sites, overseas capital projects, etc.) to the extent that additional funds are available, including bequest monies.
- 13. That the following position paper be adopted, "Our Concern in Regard to the People's Republic of China" Re: Christian Action now in relation to the New China.
  - I. Background
    - A) During the last two years the People's Republic of China has entered in a new way into participation in the world community. It is now a member of the United Nations and has diplomatic ties with over one hundred nations.
    - The New China is bound to have a massive impact on all the world, both developed and under developed nations.
      - It will do so because of its size a continent, bigger in land area than the U.S.A. - a population more than double that of the whole continent of Africa and five times that of Latin America. It has been pointed out that the long history of the Chinese culture area, that is, China and the derivative cultures of Korea and Japan in the north and Indo-China in the south, represents about a third of organized human
      - It will do so even more because of its amazing achievements. In less than 25 years China's 800 million people have achieved an orderly new society and have solved problems still plaguing most of mankind. Competent observers of many backgrounds agree that the people of China now have food, clothing, housing, health care and basic
      - More remarkable, its society is marked by mutual service, self-reliance, innovative courage, and human dignity and fulfilment.
    - This is a unique moment in world history, when for the first time the encounter of East Asian and Western civilizations will take place in a large way. It is important that Christians be prepared to receive and respond to it in sensitive and understanding Christian ways.
  - We remember that in the past century there was no area of the world in which the Protestant churches had a larger missionary activity, both in numbers of people and expenditure of funds, than China. In the mid-twenties there were as many as 8,300 Protestant missionaries and as late as the mid-thirties, close to 6,000. Many of these continued through the first days of the People's Republic of China until events led to the withdrawal of foreign missionary staff in '51 and '52, and their exclusion by China. After that time we let China almost disappear from the active concerns of our churches.

The day is past when we can think of China concerns as the preserve of 'Old China hands' and new 'China experts'. Action in relation to China is the responsibility of the whole church,

Now that a new China has joined the world community, what position should the church take towards it, and what actions should we take?

#### II. Recommendations:

"Our Concern in regard to the People's Republic of China"

- (1) Our concern for the people of China flows directly from our faith in Christ, Because God has given us a mission to all people, we cannot be unconcerned about the Chinese who constitute one quarter of the world's population. For Chistians there can be no iron or bamboo curtains. As God's servants we have a ministry also to the people of China.
- (2) As Presbyterians we recall with gratitude our long experience of direct fellowship with the Chinese people, until this was broken by political events. In the 25 years during which China was largely isolated from the outside world little reliable information about China was received.
- (3) As we seek to understand the new China we should be fully mindful of the substantial bases laid by the Christian missionary movement, and the many Christian teachings reflected in contemporary China, The Christian mission, in its mission to China, established a fellowship of service cutting across family and regional loyalties. It pioneered university teachings of modern science and western medicine, started education of women, initiated many social services and gave a world outlook.
- (4) At the same time we should not forget that the Christian mission came to a China suffering from the humiliating and often brutal domination of China by western nations, Most Christian missionaries came from the same countries which dominated China and they accepted too easily the special privileges gained for them by military action. Protests by the missionaries against injustices and abuses imposed on China by foreign powers were too few and too feeble. In the light of this it is understandable that western Christian missionaries were rejected by the People's Republic of China as cultural tools of western imperialism.
- We should know and understand contemporary China and interpret it accurately to our people, noting the differences between communism and Christianity. While not uncritical we should be open to see China's achievements and to benefit from the many lessons to be learned from the China experience. In the light of Biblical faith, we should seek to know the meaning of this event in terms of the purposes and activity of God in human history.
- 14. That the prayer of Overture No. 6, 1975, Presbytery of Miramichi, be not granted for the following reasons:
  - We recognize that the fulness of the Gospel, which is not a philosophy nor an idea, but the judging/saving love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord, is not restricted either to evangelism nor social justice, and we affirm the saving work of the Person of Jesus Christ, which encompasses the whole man in his total situation, and that we, by the grace of God, and in the power of the Resurrection, are called to serve God's saving purpose for mankind;
  - (2) We recognize that it is the responsibility of the Board of World Mission to provide Popular Accounts of the work, problem and opportunities of missions in order to inform, to promote a greater understanding of and to develop a deeper concern for the church's mission in the world.
  - (3) We recognize and regret that certain sentences in this study have led to the interpretation that political, social, economic, intellectual deliverance is equated with salvation in and through our Lord and Saviour Jesus.

- (4) Notwithstanding, we recognize "Unknown Country" to be a creative and informative effort to produce both a popular report of the work of the Board of World Mission, and to suggest various opportunities for and problems facing missions in a form that can promote lively discussion in our congregations, and encourage a deeper faithfulness in and loyalty to our Lord.
- 15. That the prayer of Overture No. 13, 1975 "Teaching on the New China" be answered in the following terms:

In March 1968 the General Board of Missions adopted a statement on "Our Concern for the People of Continental China", and reported it to the 94th General Assembly (A. & P. 1968 pp. 206-207).

Subsequently the joint executives of the General Board of Missions authorized and instructed the Missionary Education Committee to provide materials about development in Continental China, so that our Church might be prepared for genuine understanding of the conditions and needs of the people there.

The statement adopted in 1968 has been reviewed and revised by the Board of World Mission in light of recent events and information on China. This revised statement, adopted as a position paper by the Board of World Mission in March 1975 is included in the Board of World Mission report to the 101st General Assembly, and is recommended for adoption by the Assembly.

The intent of material which has been circulated regarding the People's Republic of China is to provide, as far as possible, accurate information on the present situation there. The physical conditions of life of individuals in the People's Republic of China have greatly improved, and for this we express gratitude. We regret that this material has been interpreted as an exaltation of communism. Literature produced by Missionary Education is implicitly approved by the Board of World Mission.

The current position paper on "Our Concern in regard to the People's Republic of China" provides the basis for such continuing study materials as may be produced. It also implicitly states the centrality of the Lordship of Jesus Christ in this concern.

- That Presbyteries make available a grant up to \$1,000 to assist new congregations within the bounds with initial expenses.
- 17. Re Work with Canadian Indians

In the light of the action of the 99th General Assembly (A. & P. 53/54).

"The Presbyterian Church in Canada designate one of the chief objectives of our Centennial Celebrations, a nation-wide appeal and effort to reach Canada's native peoples with God's message of love in Jesus Christ, and to further their social and educational development as citizens of Canada', requesting that it be implemented and that this emphasis be continued for five years.

- (1) a) That the Board of World Mission initiate practical steps to call the whole Presbyterian Church to participate in this mission.
  - b) That a first step in this process should be to sensitize the non-native people to the concerns of native people.
  - c) That non-native congregations should be made aware of the native groups located in their communities or areas, and of the efforts such groups are making to resolve their problems. Those congregations should be encouraged to work with the native people in such efforts, in close co-operation with members and congregations of other denominations.
- (2) That our mission work among native people should include the following:
  - a) Frequent consultation with National, Provincial, Band and Community Native Leaders.
  - b) That a special effort be made to recruit native people to participate in the total ministry of the church, and special training be made available to them for an effective ministry.

- c) That a study be made relative to the status of native workers who have taken "non-accredited" training to equip themselves to give Christian leadership to their own people, taking into account recent practices of other denominations in this regard: the study to include the whole matter of administering the Sacraments. To do this, consultation with Committee on Doctrine be undertaken regarding our reformed understanding of the Sacramental ministry.
- d) That workers live on the reserves and in native communities where they serve.
- e) That we encourage native congregations to explore ways of Christian worship and ministry meaningful to them.
- That steps be taken to provide orientation for native persons moving to urban centres.
- Request consultation with our three colleges in regard to providing special courses for theological students preparing for service among native peoples,
- (3) That in all of the above plans, we seek to work in close co-operation with other denominations, wherever possible.
- 18. That the following minute of appreciation be embodied in the minutes of the General Assembly:

Rev. Howard Andrew Doig, D.D.

A third generation member of a pioneer Scottish family which had settled in the lower Ottawa Valley, Howard Doig was born at Lachute, Que., and spent his early years in close association with French and Scottish Canadian families. Enrolling at McGill University, he was soon identified with the campus newspaper, The McGill Daily, as sportswriter and editor.

During his theological course at Presbyterian College he was advised, for health reasons, to take a year off, and volunteered as a student missionary to Salmon Arm, B.C.

Returning to Montreal to complete his theological studies, he graduated in 1936 and became assistant to the highly respected minister of Bethel Church, Sydney, Dr. Max MacOdrum. A year later he was called as minister to the Mira Ferry charge, where he remained for three years. On the resignation of Dr. MacOdrum the Sydney congregation called Howard Doig back as minister, and he exercised wide influence in the congregation and area. He was active in the Church Courts, and as clerk of the Presbytery during a series of historic decisions and appeals, he learned by experience the principles and intricacies of church law, Later on, as Moderator of the Synod, he participated in the establishment of the new Presbytery of Newfoundland.

During World War II he was in uniform, as Chaplain to the R.C.A. Training School at Pembroke, Ont., and later in the Rehabilitation Depot in England. On returning to civilian life he accepted a call to Maxville, Ontario, where he served the congregation and the wider church with distinction. This chapter ended suddenly, when he was "called up" to serve as Senior Chaplain in the Canadian Task Force in Korea. There he served with the troops in the field, often under the most primitive conditions and frequently under enemy fire. He elected to remain in the chaplaincy on his return to Canada, including a two-year tour of duty with the Canadian Forces in Germany.

Wherever he was stationed he immediately contacted the local clergy, and took an active interest in local church life. As a result he has been familiar with conditions and problems in the churches throughout Canada, and overseas as well. On retiring from the Army in 1964 he was appointed Assistant Secretary to Dr. J. Alan Munro, and in 1966 became Home Missions Secretary for the General Board of Missions. His Alma Mater honoured him with the degree of D.D. in 1965.

His unassuming manner and analytical mind, backed by a phenomenal mem-

ory, wide experience and unshakeable integrity, has gained him the respect of the Church at large, particularly his immediate associates. Personal problems were seldom referred to and never allowed to interfere with the discharge of his duties or consideration for others.

In view of his forthcoming retirement after 40 years as an ordained minister and 12 years in the Church office, the General Assembly and the Board of World Mission wishes to record gratitude to Almighty God for the wisdom, diligence and humanity of His servant, and to express admiration for the abounding faith and indomitable courage reflected in his life and work. May he be granted many more years to realize his ambitions and hopes to serve.

# FIELD REPORTS

#### SYNOD OF THE ATLANTIC PROVINCES

Synod notes with gratitude "the good recovery from a heart attack" by Synod Superintendent Allister Morrison.

Synod's number one priority, Wabush, Labrador in the Presbytery of Newfoundland was settled by "Rick" Glass following a period in which the charge was faithfully supplied by William Fitzsimons in his retirement.

Within the Presbytery of Cape Breton a new manse was erected at North River/North Shore while the new church building at St. Giles, North Sydney is in process of construction. Ruth Beattie, Presbytery Mission Worker, includes in her work the responsibility for making visits in five hospitals, four institutions for the elderly and infirm and a number of other smaller guest homes as well as serving at Camp MacLeod, conducting daily vacation bible schools, Explorers and C.O.C. groups and organizing a Woman's Group in the Tobin Road area.

In the Presbytery of Pictou John Finlayson was appointed to Thorburn.

In Halifax/Lunenburg Presbytery Lloyd Murdock was appointed to Iona congregation and R. K. Anderson began his work in the Lower Sackville new development area. The hospital visitor, Mrs. A. O. MacLean continues her work in the Halifax hospitals which is really a ministry to the whole Maritime area. The congregation of Knox Church, Halifax expects to move into its new building before the end of the year. Christine Shaw continues in her important work of Christian Education.

Saint John Presbytery reports that the large area of St. George Penfield, St. Andrew's and St. Stephen's has been divided into two pastoral charges, to be known as St. Andrew's/Penfield and St. George's/St. Stephen's respectively. Miramichi Presbytery was strengthened by the appointment of E. A. Bottom-

ley to the pastoral charge of Newcastle.

The Presbytery of Prince Edward Island reports the appointment of J. C. Bigelow to St. Mark's, Charlottetown while Summerside is contemplating extension in the St. Eleanor area.

# SYNOD OF QUEBEC AND EASTERN ONTARIO

While the mix of language and culture provides a certain enrichment in this Synod there is a tendency to operate in separate compartments. A supportive role in the witness of the church in the French language is played by communications (La Vie Chrétienne), camping (Camp d'Action Biblique), and university chaplaincy (Jean Porret at the University of Montreal). It is suggested that rather than functioning as an appendix which is dependent upon decisions by English-speaking committees and boards, consideration should be given to providing greater autonomy with adequate funding for French work. There are French congregations in Montreal, Quebec and the Eastern Townships.

Montreal Chinese congregation still meets in its building which has been expropriated by the Federal Government and do not know from day to day when they will have to move out. The Tyndale House property is owned by the city of Montreal but was leased back so seems fairly sure of the permanency of its location. The Anglican Church shares in the work through grants and personnel.

Special ministries include the Verdun Day Care Centre, the Community House in Ottawa, Elizabeth House for unmarried mothers in Montreal and Seaway Community Services which serves underprivileged rural areas in Brockville Presbytery.

Parkwood Church's new building was dedicated in April by the Presbytery of Ottawa, George MacDonald was appointed to Port Cartier. Catechists serve at Leggatt's Point and MacDonald's Corners and married students serve Inverness, Duvernay, and Moose Creek.

A greater awareness of the needs, challenges and opportunities of the changing

situation in which this Synod finds itself needs to be developed.

### SYNOD OF HAMILTON AND LONDON

This has been a year of steady growth, more involvement and exciting results throughout this Synod. New work was established in Brant Hills area of north Burlington with the appointment of Charles Shaver in September. The new satellite city of Saltfleet is in the process of development and an architectural study involving seven denominations is under way. In London all three new churches report progress while in Chatham Presbytery St. James and new St. Andrew's became self-supporting. Forest Glade benefited from a mass visitation by some twenty visitors making 900 calls contacting 640 people resulting in a record of 60 families showing an interest in the church.

Bruce/Maitland Presbytery reports an evaluation of the 20th Century ministry at Sauble Beach. Plans for the summer of 1975 include a storefront drug centre and

a hostel development for which government grants are being sought.

In August, 5 volunteers visited Whitefish Bay near Kenora conducting bible study and recreational program among the 4 to 14 age group under "Project Understanding 1974". Plans are being made for volunteers to stay the whole summer in

Synod Missions Committee notes with appreciation the information, assistance

and inspiration received from Cal Elder.

# SYNOD OF MANITOBA AND NORTHWESTERN ONTARIO

Work in this Synod was strengthened by the appointment of three 1974 graduates: H. Ruiter to Flin Flon, D. Freeman to Geraldton and D. Donaghey to St. Vital, Winnipeg. Cranberry Portage was manned by D. Benson, missionary with the Continental Mission. Atikokan was looking to the appointment of I. L. Jackson at the year's end.

Growth in the rural areas is minimal, but the response to increased stipends and

expenses has been encouraging.

Ministry to the Indian native peoples is an important part of the church's mission in this Synod. During the confrontation at Anicinabe Park in Kenora tensions between Indian and non-Indian intensified. The Kenora Fellowship Centre was considered common ground for many of the discussions. Both parties, government and the warriors, used the Centre with complete trust. An appraisal of the Centre and its work has been begun by the Board and the Church with a view to the best use of the facilities amid the new mood that exists among the Indian population. At Shoal Lake, Sheina Smith, church worker, lives in a trailer on the reserve. At Whitefish Bay the church building has been vandalized "beyond repair".

The Anishinabe Fellowship in Winnipeg, as the Inner City Centre for Native Peoples is now called, had as Director Mr. Richard Mark for three months, then Mr.

Ivan Robson for less than five months. Mrs. Mabel Powers was appointed assistant in mid year and has given capable leadership. The Board is seeking an ordained person as director.

It has become obvious that the most effective work can be done by leaders from among the Native People themselves. At present Margaret Cook is in her second year of a four year course at Mokahum Bible School and her own people are underwriting part of her expenses for this training.

Flora House, Winnipeg, under the leadership of Athalie Read assisted by Eugene Rienks, had an active ministry among children while the Fellowship House provided a half-way house ministry for girls in co-operation with Marymound Roman Catholic School, Mrs. Colin MacIver (nee Shirley Cayley) continues as hospital visitor. The work done by summer students was greatly appreciated.

One of the highlights of this Synod's Centennial Celebrations was the visit of Dr. In Ha Lee, Moderator of the Korean Church in Japan. Synod continues to make a contribution to the Inter-Faith Chaplaincy at Long Spruce on the Nelson River project, and at Leaf Rapids.

# SYNOD OF SASKATCHEWAN

There is a positive attitude in the congregations of St. Andrew's, Biggar; Parkview, Saskatoon and St. Andrew's, North Battleford, all within the Presbytery of Northern Saskatchewan, as a result of the capable ministries of Leslie Landell, John Duff and Harvey Reichelt at each point respectively. Calvin/Goforth in Saskatoon is still suffering pains of consolidation but there is good hope for the future under the ministry of Raymond Glenn.

The Camp at Christopher Lake bolsters the spiritual life of Synod; a full-time summer director is needed.

Angus MacGillivray has provided oversight of the Prince Albert Fellowship House and Malcolm Muth has an exciting group of young people, his Communicants Class at Glen Bush, to be received into church membership early in 1975.

In Assiniboia Presbytery the work was strengthened by the appointment of Thomas Rodger to St. Stephen's, Regina and Donald McInnis to Estevan. Indian Head/Qu'Appelle became self supporting at the end of 1974. The congregation of Norman Kennedy, Regina, has sold its old building and is meeting in a Public School pending the construction of a new church building in 1975.

The decline of population in the rural areas of the province has caused problems. The work at Assiniboia has been closed and Stoughton is seriously considering doing likewise. There is no easy answer to the problem of maintaining satisfactory ministries in small rural communities.

# SYNOD OF ALBERTA

The Synod of Alberta continues to be an important area for mission work and church development especially in the rapidly growing urban centres of Calgary and Edmonton. Despite a booming economy and a general strengthening of Presbyterian witness since World War II there are still only 16 self-supporting charges in the Synod compared to 26 aid-receiving charges with over 38 congregations. "Most of these latter charges", writes the Synod Missions Convener, Donald Smith, "will never be able to achieve self-supporting status."

In the Peace River Presbytery the church is well served by young ministers amid difficult conditions. The total church membership of the Presbytery is only 288, yet most congregations have endeavoured to assume a portion of the increase in stipends for 1975. Services have been resumed at Chetwynd, served on a regular basis by the minister and elders from Dawson Creek.

In Edmonton Presbytery, Ralph Kendall left the new extension charge of Dayspring and an experienced church extension worker is needed for the new Millwoods development (Edmonton). Presbytery is proceeding cautiously in Fort McMurray because of the present uncertainties regarding the Syncrude project.

John Ferrier was appointed to Chauvin/Wainwright after a three year vacancy and Louis de Groot went to St. Andrew's, Edmonton. Killam/Galahad is responding well to the ministry of Larry Lin who completed his first year in that charge.

In Red Deer Presbytery, Sidney Chang was ordained in June in the Eckville/ Hespero charge where he had served effectively as a lay missionary. Gordon Agar left the newly aligned charge of St. Andrew's, Red Deer, Valley Centre and Willowdale. Major R. J. Ritchie was appointed to Olds/Carstairs in the fall.

In Calgary/Macleod Presbytery, Banff welcomed Dennis Mahood early in the year from Nanaimo, B.C. and an expanded program to serve summer visitors was carried out with the assistance of a student from the Church of Scotland. In the East Calgary new extension charge a "solid nucleus" of families has been gathered together under the direction of Gerald Graham who took up the work there in August. A new manse has been built. Varsity Acres is showing promise of becoming fully self-supporting within a very few years. B. D. Nagy retired from Calvin, Calgary because of ill health. Late in the year Gordon Haynes was called and inducted into the pastoral charge of Fort Macleod. The team ministry of Riverside and St. John's in Medicine Hat has worked well to date.

### SYNOD OF BRITISH COLUMBIA

There is a great influx of people into B.C. which constitutes a great challenge to the church especially in the Fraser Valley and Kamloops Presbytery.

Kootenay Presbytery is experiencing "an upward swing". Calvin Brown was

appointed to Nelson/Slocan and Castlegar is progressing. Vancouver Island Preshytery: an ecumenical venture has been launched at Port Renfrew-St. Mary's by the Anglican, Roman Catholic, Presbyterian and United Churches, but at Sooke the "Community Church" has had some division over doctrinal differences. In Victoria, Siu-man Lee served the Chinese Church as locum tenens during the minister's study leave, and has been called to the Chinese Church in Vancouver. The Senior Citizens' housing project of the Chinese Church, Victoria has been abandoned because of the lack of sufficient support.

Kamloops Presbytery has approved building plans for Salmon Arm and at

Penticton the building was extended and completed.

In Westminster Presbytery four congregations have become self-supporting during 1974: Richmond, Whalley, White Rock and Abbotsford/Murrayville. There is considerable feeling that the Presbytery should embark upon a carefully planned program of church extension.

# **CANADA: MISSION FIELDS**

The past year has seen some notable changes in the rates of stipend and allowances paid to all workers. Although the increases have barely kept pace with the upswing in the cost of living, they have done much to assure the workers that the Church has not forgotten them, or the stringent conditions in which they

The decision to establish these increases, totalling \$1,000 per annum for ministers and proportionate amounts for other workers, plus a substantial increase in the mileage allowance paid on multiple-point charges, was greeted with great anxiety in some quarters. It may therefore be useful to note what has actually happened. Three charges have been obliged to reduce their support for the ministry, 21 others have continued at the same level as in 1974. Five aid-receiving charges have undertaken full support with remarkable increases: St. Columba, Belleville, \$3,100; Duntroon, \$1,700; Calvin, Kitchener, \$2,200; Rockwood, \$3,800; Prince George, B.C. \$3,300. Five other charges have assumed increases of \$2,000 or more; thirty of \$1,000 or more; sixty-four of amounts varying from \$100 to \$900 per annum. All of which indicates that most congregations have been willing and able to assume the stated increases, and sometimes much more.

New church buildings have been completed at Parkwood, Ottawa; Gateway, Toronto; Strathcona Park, Kingston; St. John's, Kapuskasing; St. Mark's, Malton, and others are nearing completion at Knox, Halifax and St. Giles, North Sydney. Construction is expected to start in the spring on Norman Kennedy Memorial, Regina, and St. Andrew's, Salmon Arm.

The so-called "unprofitable", "unchallenging" or "unnecessary" mission field simply does not exist. There are situations which have been condemned in such terms. The Word has been proclaimed, the seed has been sown, but no instant harvest has appeared. Eventually there comes the ministry of a patient, imaginative worker who "sat where they sat" before undertaking to give leadership, and suddenly it is apparent that the seed was not sown in vain and that "the Word does not return void". There are few communities in Canada where there are too many churches, but there are too many churches which are not reaching the community in any meaningful way.

Closures, re-alignments and amalgamations of congregations may in some cases be advisable, but generally these are the tactics of retreat, and such measures do little to meet the challenge to "lengthen the cords and strengthen the stakes" that is presented by unprecedented national development and opportunities for Christian witness.

The March issue of The Presbyterian Record lists 69 vacant charges, 23 of which have requested appointments from the B.W.M. In addition, there are 25 other charges seeking appointments, making a total of 94 vacancies. Present indications suggest that graduates and others returning to the pastorate will cover about 20 of these vacancies this year. The most immediate need therefore is for an increased supply of workers, men and women, ordained and otherwise. Some drastic steps are required at once.

By the same token, any realistic plan for the future must envision ways and means of assisting new congregations in new communities to secure the facilities necessary for them to carry on their life and work, whether in suburban, frontier, inner city or other areas. The "community of committed people" has always been the backbone of the Reformed Church, and only as such communities are increased, expanded and deepened does the Church become strong and able to perform its divinely ordained function.

The day of the "congregation" has not passed. A notable item appears in one of the reports to the General Assembly of the United Presbyterian Church, U.S.A.: "During the last half of the 1960's many seminary graduates sought non-parish positions since they had little or no interest in the parish ministry. In the 1970's there has been a sharp reversal, with seminary graduates actively seeking pastorates, believing the pastorate is the primary place where there is real mission. In 1970, 170 seminarians filed dossiers, in 1971, 270, and in 1972 over 300". (General Assembly 1973. Journal, page 889.)

It appears that the same trend is occurring in the Presbyterian Church in Canada. Many of the "experimental ministries" so hopefully commenced have withered and disappeared. Rooted in a "community of committed people" they might well have proven significant, and indeed may do so yet.

The basic job remains to be done. The problems and obstacles may in some respects differ from those facing the Church in other times, they are certainly no more difficult nor insoluble. The Presbyterian Church in its Centennial year may surely rejoice in the past and even in the present, but the uncertain future awaits. The Board of World Mission by increasing the Church's beachheads in Canada and Overseas for the proclamation and practice of the Gospel, and strengthening those already established, may well lead the way into a new century of wider and more effective service in the Name of Jesus Christ.

#### Church Extension

Margaret Stewart, deaconess reports on St. David's in the Toronto area. Her work has been largely visiting apartment dwellers referred to her by the public health nurse and others. She finds many are lonely and in need of understanding and friendship. C.O.C. and Explorer groups were set up and local leadership discovered and trained. A group for Senior Citizens was started, has an active enroll-

ment of 35 and is reaching out to others. Most of the children involved in the groups have little or no church background and respond to the program with enthusiasm and great interest in matters pertaining to God, Jesus and the church.

At Malvern there is a team ministry comprising the Anglican, Presbyterian and United Churches, meetings are held once a week to discuss matters of the co-operative ministry. These have been a learning/growing experience for all involved. The youth group is a co-operative effort and there is a rotation schedule for hospital visiting. At the request of members from all three congregations a group of mothers has been meeting weekly for fellowship and a co-operative program. Response has been positive and community-wide.

Erin Mills is reported on by Margaret (Balderston) Read, deaconess associated with the Glenbrook Presbyterian congregation within the Erin Mills South Church Campus. The Church Campus Committee, composed of clergy and laity from each participating congregation, meets monthly for consultation, sharing, planning, negotiating for their space requirements, and interviewing architects. The ministerial team meets weekly and planned such joint action events as an Ecumenical Good Friday Service, sharing in Carolling at the Display Centre during the Christmas season and sponsoring the Joy Company, an ecumenical children's club.

The church campus is also involved in Scouting and Guiding, and C.G.I.T. and discovered exceptional talent and leadership ability within its own members. Glenbrook Church includes a Church School with a Teens Bible Class open to teen-agers

of the campus.

On June 2, 1974 the congregation of Glenbrook was formally constituted —
the opening day of the 100th General Assembly — the beginning of the Centennial
Year of the Presbyterian Church. Elders were ordained and Roy Gellatly recognized
as Ordained Missionary.

Also in Mississauga, the Meadowvale West Church Campus consists of four denominations: Anglican, United, Evangelical Lutheran and Presbyterian. The 4 acre site will be surrounded by a large shopping area, community, social and recreational facilities, library, offices, hotel and parking area.

Derwyn Hill was appointed as Ordained Missionary and meets with his counterparts in the other three denominations. The whole sub-division has only about 250 occupied units and is at a very early stage of development so the feeling of the church group is one of isolation at present.

# CANADA: SPECIAL MINISTRIES

After 20 years of faithful service among the Chinese people, Margaret Near retired from the Chinese Church in Toronto in September. Edward Ling retired from the Victoria Chinese Church and Andrew Ng completed his work in the Vancouver Chinese Church. B. D. Nagy resigned from Calvin Hungarian Church, Calgary because of ill health and Walter V. Kutcher met his death in a tragic accident shortly after terminating his ministry at the Oshawa Ukrainian Church.

During 1974 Ann Drummond who is in a team ministry at Gateway Church, Flemingdon Park, Toronto married Eric Gowers; Shirley Cayley became Mrs. Colin MacIver and continued as hospital visitor in Winnipeg; and Margaret Balderston married Walter Read and serves in the extension charge at Erin Mills South.

New staff added during the year included Eugene Rienks at Flora House, Winnipeg; Ivan Robson as Director of Logan Avenue Inner City Mission, Winnipeg, from which he withdrew after five months; and Mabel Powers took over as assistant at the same institution which was renamed Anishinabe Fellowship.

Negotiations were carried out for securing church sites in Meadowvale West, Mississauga; Malvern, Scarborough; Lower Sackville, Nova Scotia; Calgary East and Millwoods, Edmonton. The first three of these are part of church campus projects shared by three or more denominations.

Presbytery erected the London Korean Mission as a congregation of the Presbyterian Church in Canada in March and the Korean group meeting in Kitchener was recognized by Presbytery as a mission charge. The original Toronto Korean Presby-

terian congregation was reformed into three congregations - two within East Toronto Presbytery and one in the Presbytery of West Toronto.

Chinese work in Sudbury officially terminated with the transfer of Siu-man Lee to fill the vacancy in Victoria while Edward Ling was on study leave.

The ministry of the eight hospital visitors has continued to meet a great need across this land. Mary Farmery directed Armagh with distinction; and the Presbyterian Fellowship House in Winnipeg served as a half-way house for adolescent girls in conjunction with Marymound Treatment Centre. The Presbyterian Fellowship House, Prince Albert has been faced with staffing problems. Tyndale House ministered faithfully to the residents of the Little Burgundy district in Montreal.

In many areas the Native Peoples are beginning to express themselves very frankly and freely. At the request of the band councils at Shoal Lake, Sheina Smith moved on to the reserve to live in a trailer provided by the Board of World Mission. During the confrontation in mid-summer at Anicinabe Park the Kenora Fellowship Centre was neutral ground for mediation between the Indian people and the government. As the year closed, questions were being asked about the nature of the church's witness at K.F.C.

# INSTITUTIONS AND SPECIAL MINISTRIES

#### Verdun Day Care Centre

Hazell Davis reports: "The Children are happy here and show a keen interest in all that goes on. They participate freely and learn to share with each other. The total registration was 31 (14 girls and 17 boys) ranging from 2 to 11 years. They come from all walks of life and are of many races and creeds. Fourteen stay at the Centre all day, 8 attend public kindergarten either in the morning or afternoon, 4 come for lunch and after school, 2 come for lunch only, and 3 come just for the afternoon. Most of the children are of working parents. Eight are from broken homes, two of which are on welfare,

"Our program is varied and flexible. The children enjoy both indoor and out-door activities all year round."

#### Armagh

Purpose: assisting young women through a stressful period of their lives; extending a gracious and strengthening hand to them in the name of the Church. Program: pre-natal care to the unwed mother and help for girls who find themselves in other crisis situations. Parents are asking that Armagh help their teen-age daughters; court judges send non-criminal girls; Agencies refer young women to the care of Armagh for reasons too numerous to mention. In both "Program One" and "Program Two" it is the total welfare of the resident that is undertaken — physical, mental, social, spiritual. The year past has seen a statistical increase of nearly fifty percent in resident occupancy over 1973. Armagh's staff continue to teach, supervise and encourage amidst the beauty of Armagh's setting, concludes Mary P. Farmery, Director.

# Presbyterian Fellowship House, Winnipeg

In 1975 the Presbyterian Fellowship House, Winnipeg, marks the end of its second year as the "Chestnut Unit" of the Marymound Treatment Centre for Adolescent Girls. The name "Chestnut House" is the informal name given to this half-way house to which the girls can move from the more highly structured system at the Marymound Centre. The number of girls at "Chestnut House" is now 8.

The chaptaincy program has included discussion (structured and open), occasional recreation, and various outings.

The relationship between Fellowship House and Marymound Centre continues to be excellent.

Board of Management: Donald A. Donaghey, Chaplain and Chairman, Agnes Loosmore, Secretary,

Staff: Mr. & Mrs. Frank Swirski (Frank & Jo, house parents), Mrs. Trudy Swirski (Child care worker), Ernest Kirkpatrick, Treasurer Florence Sinclair, Gert Bell, Malcolm McLean (Ex-officio). Sharon Graef (Child care worker), Mr. Vic Neufeld (social worker).

## Beckwith Memorial, Montreal

The various ministries at Beckwith included ministry to the aged, needy, sick, bereaved and dying; ministry to people within and without the Household of faith. "Let us see behind these reports faces of people who have been ministered unto, because the sole justifications for existing as a church is that we minister to people in the name of the Lord." writes Arthur larrera, minister.

The ministry to people through the bilingual services was carried out every Lord's Day morning – from 11 to 11:30 in English and from 11:30 to 12 in Italian. The Church School worshipped with the congregation in the sanctuary during the first half hour and during the second half hour met in the lower hall for study.

As in other years, Beckwith co-operated with St. Michel in supporting the ecumenical service at St. Damas Roman Catholic Church. A great time of fellowship was had after the service in the lower church hall.

Bible studies were conducted by Mrs. larrera for high school students and older

## Gateway Community Church

The year 1974 has been an active year at Gateway, a year of congregation building. The congregation lost a number of valued members, and a good portion of its leadership (e.g. 7 out of 8 Elders). On the other hand it gained some newcomers, and others have moved into the leadership vacancies.

The big item of the year was planning and building a new church building, the Flemingdon Park Catholic Presbyterian Worship Centre in Don Mills, Ontario.

Gateway has had an experimental ministry of two associates: a minister and a deaconess. Tasks have been both shared and divided. The congregation is organized into five Commissions under the Session. Each of the four program Commissions is engaged in the two-fold task of programming and leadership support. Ann Gowers staffed two Commissions: Worship, Growth and Training; Rodger Talbot three: Outreach and Community Action, Ecumenical Action and World Mission plus the Administration Commission. In addition, Rodger acted as stimulator for the Youth Group and the Men's Group, and was one of the Gateway representatives on the joint building committee. The shared tasks included planning, pastoral care, leading in worship, preaching, participation in community affairs, ministerial association, and the like.

### KOREAN MINISTRIES

# West Toronto Korean Church

During 1974 the original Korean congregation experienced internal disagreement and decided to divide into two congregations. Congregational assets and records were divided by agreement. The two congregations now free to develop two distinct styles of congregational life, have both moved forward in strength. Both are self-supporting, reports Rodger Talbot, Interim Moderator.

The West Toronto Church began with 77 members on April 30th. The first few months were difficult times, until a new Session, Board of Managers and new pastoral leadership was organized. H. M. Park, recent graduate from a Master of Theology program at Princeton, was invited by the Session to come to Toronto. Under the leadership of Mr. Park, the elders and other dedicated leadership, the congregation has undertaken a courageous and revitalized ministry. By the end of the year the membership had climbed to 160. To the 1975 Annual Meeting they bring proposals to study (a) purchase of the Davenport Road building from the Board of World Mission, (b) calling an associate minister who would be English speaking and focus on the second generation.

H. M. Park, a minister of the Presbyterian Church in Korea, who has had an

interesting experience as a missionary in Ethiopia, has applied through the Presbytery of East Toronto for admission to the ministry of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

#### Kitchener

The Board of Managers has been reorganized. The Rev. Rheem was appointed as supply minister.

Baptisms: 8 adults, 5 children; Confirmation: 1; Additions: 6 families and 4 single adults; Losses: 2 families by transfer; Marriage: 2 couples.

Sunday School: 3 teachers, 18 enrollment from kindergarten to grade 6. Korean language program is set for all classes. Youth Club: they provide entertainment and recreation. Worship and Choir: Outdoor service held once. A choir group was organized.

## London Korean Christian Church

Presbytery of London moved to establish a congregation, meeting in Hamilton Road Presbyterian Church. An assessor session was appointed, and 60 persons accepted as members of the Presbyterian Church in Canada,

Young People's group newly organized this year. Seventeen young people

attended for Bible study, music and Christian fellowship.

The Church School is growing, Samuel Noh, a candidate to the ministry under the Presbytery of London, was appointed as Sunday School Superintendent, and held a seminar "Christian Education for the new comer". Report submitted by A. Lee, minister.

#### **UKRAINIAN MINISTRY**

#### Toronto Ukrainian Church

Our mission work is divided into three fields: local, Canada-wide, and abroad in other countries.

The work in Toronto is a downtown mission with the usual services, It includes, besides worship and preaching, the printing and distribution of literature, visiting, interpreting, counselling, helping to find work, participating in the work of the different committees of Presbytery, participation in the life of the Ukrainian community and organizing evangelistic meetings. There are about 70,000 Canadians of Ukrainian ancestry in Toronto, and at the last census 1,205 declared themselves to be Presbyterians. Ukrainians do not have a Protestant tradition, and for a Ukrainian to call himself a Presbyterian indicates a deliberate choice.

We are trying to reach Ukrainians in other localities through literature and correspondence. The "Evangelical Truth" reaches many a family and is read with interest.

Our work abroad reaches people through radio broadcasts, and the "Evangelical Truth" which is mailed to about twenty countries outside Canada. The "Evangelical Truth" is bilingual. A reader from France sent fifty francs to help with the printing. He is a poor man himself. Every Saturday, Trans World Radio broadcasts our fifteen minute programs from Monaco to the Ukraine and the rest of the European USSR. The CBC gives time on the air twice a year. Trans World Radio claims that they reach 300,000 families. The CBC has a much larger audience. Friends and enemies equally, consider this type of mission work to be very effective. There is no doubt that radio is the most successful way of getting the Gospel across sealed borders.

"This work is expensive. It is distinctly a work of the Presbyterian Church. We appreciate very much the help of the Board of World Mission as well as the generous donation of Knox Presbyterian Church.

"It has been a busy year, and God was good to us," concludes Michael Fesenko, minister.

# HOSPITAL AND SENIOR CITIZEN VISITORS

#### Halifax

"People are grateful to the Church for providing this ministry", writes Eva MacLean (Mrs. A. O.) hospital visitor in Halifax. "Within the past month of writing this report I remember Tommy who was in hospital with terminal Leukemia. He always had so much to tell me, and with me he shared his hopes and dreams. One day he was particularly happy. His teacher visited him from one hundred and fifty miles away and left him with a crisp twenty dollars as a birthday present. His mother, who was not there at the moment, was going to be his guest at, 'the best restaurant in the city', when he got well. 'And thank you for coming so often to see me.' These were his last words to me. A few days later his bed was empty.

"Again there was the young man of twenty-one years paralyzed from the neck down - another car accident. It was with greatest difficulty and pain that he took a pencil and printed. . "Thanks for coming". Five hospitals with more than a thousand beds, with an average of 75 Presbyterian admissions a month make for a busy

schedule."

#### Montreal

The work of visiting and ministering to people sick and shut-in, in homes, hospitals and institutions of rehabilitation was carried on for ten months by Mrs. L. E. Leatherdale, hospital visitor in Montreal. A wide area was covered and Mount Royal Villa, a new rest home in the Town of Mount Royal was added to the list of institutions visited regularly. Literature plays an important part of this ministry. Patients are open and receptive to devotional aids and scripture selections, Friends donated lap shawls for wheel-chair patients and woolen articles for children which brought cheer and comfort to many.

The visitor kept in touch with many shut-ins by telephone and messages were sent by mail to many of the elderly and chronically ill in addition to personal visits.

#### Toronto

Lillian Reay reports: "I continued my work in fifteen Nursing Homes and Senior Citizen Lodges. Every day presents a new challenge as I pack my brief case and see what lies in store.

"I get wonderful co-operation from the Administration in these Homes. They are gratified to see what the Presbyterian Church is doing in their midst. And I am

welcome to come and go at almost any hour.

"I would be very remiss if I did not make known the wonderful way in which many women's groups are behind my efforts - they are now organized into small groups to send cards to all the folks in the smaller, private, welfare aided Homes, and to those without family or relatives in most of the large Homes.

The Presbyterian Church is still enjoying the privilege of taking the regular Sunday morning services at Riverdale Hospital. When the service is over coffee is served to the patients who feel able to stay. They enjoy this extra time away from

their rooms in the company of friends.

Terry Martens, hospital visitor lists her duties: visits to patients; literature; tape recordings of scripture readings are taken to patients who are unable to read; Christmas Fund; Records: a card file of patients is kept with brief notes on admission and visits.

#### London

There are sixteen places being visited outside the two General Hospitals, which are visited on request. Visiting time includes a five day week, the usual average being ten per day. In the past year there were two thousand, two hundred and thirty visits made in two hundred and nineteen days. Lily Schneider is the visitor. The literature received is being distributed regularly.

People are needed who care enough to take the time to learn to do such visiting in a helpful way.

There are many shared events - accidents, births, joy at healing and being well and "out" again, doubtful futures, giving up of independence and adjustment to convalescent hospitals or nursing homes and so on.

Visiting in nursing homes and senior citizens residences is not as regular as is desired. This is because of the vast number of such homes and residences and

because hospital patients are a priority.

Shirley MacIver visits regularly the Manitoba Health Sciences Centre - General Centre; Misericordia General Hospital; St. Boniface General Hospital; Victoria General Hospital; Grace General Hospital, and Concordia Hospital.

#### Vancouver

"During the past year it has been a joy to visit 500 people as I have concentrated my visits to the Vancouver General, St. Paul's and St. Vincent's Hospitals, with occasional visits to other hospitals. I have a variety of attractive literature on hand to give out when it seems appropriate - some provided by the Board of World Mission and other by local congregations," writes Florence Edge, Vancouver Hospital Visitor.

#### **New Westminster**

The Presbyterian Visitation program continues to be well received and appreciated by patients and the staff of the hospitals and rest homes, such as the Royal Columbian, St. Mary's, Burnaby General and at local rest homes, as time permits.

In instances where people do not have a church home, follow up is an important part of the visitation program. Names of those patients are forwarded to the ministers in the area in which the person lives, requesting that a visit be made, Many new members have been received into the fellowship of the church through this visitation by the local minister. Peggy Mercer is hospital visitor.

#### FRENCH MINISTRIES

#### Eglise St. Luc, Montreal

L'Eglise St. Luc, French congregation in Montreal, supported by a number of faithful members answers the needs of people in and outside the congregation and witnesses in many realms of life.

For the first time, a Sunday Service was televised directly from the church building on the French network of Radio Canada in February. It was well received

by the general public.

The minister Dr. André Poulain writes: "We have many opportunities to make known our Christian position and while we have never been able to obtain the right of having a program of our own, we are from time to time invited to speak on the radio or on TV or at ecumenical services."

The congregation, while not large, is showing a sense of responsibility and has been able with its own resources to renovate the sanctuary and to replace the furnaces. Since 1962 it has remained self-supporting which is in itself an achievement when one thinks of the difficulty of the French work.

There was an effort of collaboration with the two French congregations of the

United Church in Montreal.

'Due to trends in the Province of Quebec, due to a concern to give to the French language its right place, there is certainly a duty for the Church at large to re-examine its responsibility and the way to fulfil it. The Presbyterian Church should be more committed in the life of this Province."

Dr. Poulain writes: "For the 23rd year I assumed the responsibility of publishing La Vie Chrétienne which reaches members of our French congregations and people sympathetic to our work. We are this way keeping in touch with many and bringing a message of comfort and hope, giving an account of what is going on in the Church and focussing on certain issues concerning Christian life,

"So, La Vie Chrétienne is an important tool in our French work and we are very grateful for the support given us which makes possible its publishing."

St. Marc, St. Foy, Quebec

Attendance has varied from 27 to 7 with the poorest attendance in the summer months. There are no other activities in the congregation except the Sunday services which have continued regularly. Any other activities have been considered special and are the direct responsibility of the missionary. There is little local initiative and sparse desire for any.

Special events included a church picnic, coffee clatches after services (restrained participation), and several series of Bible studies and prayer gatherings, As the pastor I have had several invitations to speak outside of the church - no significant contacts established however. There were six protestant (French) services on the Laval campus but they served no useful purpose and they were poorly

"If the effort is to continue on the same basis, it does not merit a full time appointment. If a new basis is to be established, obviously changes must be made to achieve goals desired," concludes J. Ross Davidson, the bi-lingual minister in charge.

## INDIANS OF CANADA

Stephen How, ordained missionary to the native people in Northern Saskatchewan writes: "The role of the church amongst the native people is to preach the Gospel, but this is sometimes challenged. It is argued that what Indian people need at this moment is not some comfortable pronouncement or exhortation but confrontation with the Government and power groups in order to assert their independence and manhood by struggling to the victory. The role of the church is more or less reconciliatory, a moderating influence, and therefore should have a defusing effect on an otherwise explosive situation.

"Yet we believe that the church is no agent of an earthly authority, but of

Christ, and no one should call the missionary "our man on the reserve".

"In attempting to understand the native people's situation today, we should first attempt to understand more thoroughly and with sympathy the cultural gaps between the Indian and the non-Indian - his thought patterns and reactions which non-Indians often fail to understand and label queer. Today, more than ever before, we must try to find a solution to the tensions. Mankind has learned from many global conflicts that no culture can impose its will on another, but only through mutual exploration and appreciation and acceptance can there be a peaceful co-existence.

"To illustrate how different the Indian's thought patterns are from those of a non-Indian: One day I said to someone who had made a very attractive neck-tie in the traditional bead work, how beautiful it was, and was told "You should not have praised her, because now you have put her in a position where she has to offer you that neck-tie in response to your praise". For us, a compliment is given and received with pleasure, and that is all. But for an Indian (who still adheres to the old culture and values) a compliment received must be returned with visible signs of generosity. One of the fundamental laws of Indian society is that one should not be accused of selfishness. Non-Indians too are taught to be generous, but the way we express these values is where we differ from the native people.

"In recent years the native people have been receiving financial support from the governments and this has brought about some satisfactory changes. In contrast, what the church offers them is in some people's minds vague and remote; and this seems to have left the church in a somewhat dimmer light. However, when tragedy strikes and a crisis takes hold of people, they almost always return to the church for guidance and consolation. But in between crises we find many empty pews."

#### Mistawasis

"Drinking and broken homes are problems many reserves have in common, One frequently hears it said: "the Indians just can't handle liquor, they are different. . . ." At first glance one is inclined to agree. But if one were to look deeper, the root lies not in any racial differences, but in the social conditions in which they live.

"Surrounded on all sides by a fast changing and aggressive society, and yet not a part of the main stream, they are left with a vacuum in which confusion, frustration and a sense of worthlessness have taken over. The values of their forefathers have been discarded and there has been nothing to replace them. Especially among those who have been disillusioned or alienated by the "Christian Religion", the struggle to cope with modern culture is quite a burden. This creates a social condi-

tion in which crime and delinquency are bred.

"A wake service prior to a funeral is still an important occasion for a social gathering and also an opportunity for evangelism. It lasts three nights and three days and the Cree people adhere to this custom. Church services have been well attended and family services during the winter months were well received. Pastoral visitations are more enjoyable as we come to know each other rather well. The annual Christmas party was a success. There are quite a number of young people from Mistawasis working in urban centres. I encounter them frequently in the Friendship Centre, the bus depot, on the streets of Prince Albert and on construction sites. Like the young everywhere they are becoming very mobile and seeking adventure."

#### Wahpeton

"Because of its proximity to Prince Albert some members of the band have obtained secure jobs in the city. Wahpeton is a small reserve with only 3 - 4 sections of land, but it has launched an ambitious farm program. It is rather strange to hear one of the members of the band say to me that certain white people owed the band a couple of thousand dollars for pasture fee. Though much change has taken place, it is still far from being self sufficient and financially independent, as there are still many members of the society on welfare. However, more funds from the government are forthcoming and we are hopeful that this year we can make some progress in the farm management.

"There was a referendum and the people of Wahpeton voted to end prohibition on the reserve. For many years Wahpeton has been one of the few dry reserves where possession and consumption of liquor was a criminal offence. But now they can have liquor in the home legally, therefore reducing the necessity to consume it in haste in a motor vehicle during transit. It seems to me the one advantage of this new by-law is to dispel the guilt of drinking where one is not supposed to and the fear of being apprehended. Beyond that, it has not really altered matters much.

"The socio-economic problems caused by alcoholism remain one of the major tasks to be grappled with. I do feel however that the people of Wahpeton are becoming more aware of the problem and many of them are sincerely trying to do something about it, though the cure is never easy and many attempts do fall by the

"The Band office on the reserve was opened last fall. It facilitates many activities in the community, including some church events."

#### Crutwell

"We had a distinguished visitor from the East last fall. He was shocked to see the poverty and lack of sanitation at Crutwell. Crutwell has no revenues worthy of taxation, no sewage system, no running water - none of the modern facilities we take for granted. Most of the homes use wood stoves for heating which consume at least 25 loads of wood a winter per home. And the going rate for a load of wood is \$22. The house rents are between \$30 - \$70 a month, and that for rather primitive and poor accommodation.
"In spite of all these, Crutwell has some fine qualities which escape onlookers.

Perhaps in a way, Crutwell is a frontier where the affluence of our society has not touched yet and where certain niceties and decorations of other communities have no lasting value. We are working together to improve the lot of the community and already we have received a considerable amount of help from the government.

"I was presented with a plaque at the annual Christmas party with this inscription, "In appreciation of all your help". My name was misspelled and the presentation only took 10 seconds, but it was one of the brightest moments in my association with Crutwell, and I appreciated it very much. Most of the residents are

not of our persuasion. But it does not make any difference when we worship together."

#### Shoal Lake

The Missionary Sheina B. Smith, took up residence on the Reserve at Shoal Lake. This has proved to be very satisfactory. It is more convenient for evening programs and meetings and one really gets to know the people and share in everyday living.

There has been no violence on the Reserve this year and only four deaths, one of which was accidental. D. C. Robertson from Kenora conducted two services of

Communion and Baptisms,

A weekly newsletter was begun in the spring. A contribution was sent to "The Indian Life" magazine, and copies of this paper have been sent regularly to the homes at Shoal Lake.

A Vacation Church School was held with an average attendance of 20. The "Beatitude People" was used as curriculum: excellent for use on an Indian Reserve.

The missionary visits in hospital and jail when necessary and home visitation is done on a regular basis. She is also involved in the recreation program on the reserve. The main problem continues to revolve around liquor and there is little one can do to help unless help is sought.

#### Whitefish Bay

"The mission work at Whitefish Bay is somewhat of an embarrassment to the convener. What started off in the early 1960's as a strong and vital work has been allowed to slip to that of a part-time emergency ministry. The church building which had been built in 1964 has been completely vandalized and remains an eye-sore in the community." so writes D. C. Robertson, Convener.

This past year, an American student and his wife ministered to the reserve from May to August. They were followed by "Project Understanding", a group from the

Hamilton area.

The student, assessed the work in these words: "We believe there is a full time work suited to Whitefish. If the missionaries will prepare themselves in advance, expect to show Christian love and testify to Christ as the Saviour, spend more time in the Indian community than in the white, and be patient, we believe the work will progress.'

The "Project Understanding" group reported: "A longer stay would be more

It is doubtful if a congregation along the lines of those in white communities would ever develop, but with a consistent witness, a Christian fellowship on that reserve would be a likely event.

#### Kenora Fellowship Centre

1974 will go down in history as a very critical year for the Town of Kenora and for the native people of the area. The occupation of the Anicinabe Park by a group known as the Ojibway Warrior Society, and the lengthy negotiations that followed created some very tense feelings in the Indian and non-Indian community which will remain for some time.

The association of the Presbyterian Church with the Anicinabe Park from the time it was closed to the Native People and sold to the Town is brought out in the research done by the Treaty #3 organization. The Centre is the outcome of the concern that the church had for the native people who were without a reasonable

place to stay. During the occupation of the park and for the negotiations after, the Centre was the place where the various parties agreed to meet. This is still the procedure

when continued meetings are held.

In these days of unrest the Centre continues to play a role that is difficult but necessary. Its role is one of bringing the two cultures together and now this is very necessary. Many of the native people wish to control their affairs and wish to exclude others from the direction of the Centre. This then poses the problem: How can the church support them in their struggle for self-determination and do the mediation necessary?

The Hostel has been of some concern and has drained some of the Operating budget. It is generally agreed that in some ways it contributes to the problems of the hard-core people. Other than the Director and Mrs. Robinson all are native people on staff. The Hostel is now without staff because of the pressure of the problem people.

The Centre still has the two court workers financed by the Federation of Ontario Centres. They function well in the local courts and in follow-up work with

The Centre is still connected with the Ontario Federation of which the

Director is the Secretary.

Use of the Centre has been very similar to other years and about the same number of groups use the Centre for meetings. The use of the Centre by the many varied groups, both Native and non-Native, is one of the major ways to bring the two cultures together. "Nowhere else in Kenora is this being done," reports S. T. Robinson, Director.

Anishinabe Fellowship, Winnipeg

After a three-week Missionary Orientation Course in London, Ontario, Mabel Powers arrived in Winnipeg to begin the work with Indian women and children in the inner city in July.

The first month was spent in orientation to the area and the job and the people. After much deliberation, it was decided to remain in the present location (there had been thought of re-locating) and to name the work "Anishinabe Fellowship" replacing the former name, "The Presbyterian Inner City Indian Project".

Sunday services of worship and Sunday School began in October. The group is small as yet, averaging 25 - 30, mainly children, but with growth potential. Ten

children of believing parents have been brought for Baptism.

Four clubs for younger native people are underway; a Boys' Club; a Girls' Club; a Children's Club, after school; and a Youth Drop-in Centre. None of these clubs discriminate against non-Indians and as a result a number of young people from the ethnic groups as well as Indian children attend.

The work with the Indian women, at this time, consists mainly of friendly home visitation but a small group meets each Wednesday for fellowship. Each month there is a Family Night when all the clubs come together with parents. Films and guest speakers constitute the main features of the program.

The work in this Mission is greatly supported by an active Women's Auxiliary

and a sympathetic and responsive Board of Managers.

Argyle, Ekford, Waywayseecappo

The co-operative ministry of the United and Presbyterian Churches in this area was first established in 1969. There are approximately 160 United Church and 86 Presbyterian households under pastoral care, 75 of the latter connected with the Waywayseecappo Church on the Lizard Point Indian Reserve, six miles west of

Rossburn United Church: This congregation has experienced some real growth over the past year and built a new church in the village. This will mean adequate teaching space for a growing Sunday School and better facilities for the whole church family. The final cost is now estimated to be closer to \$52,000 than the original estimate of \$40,000. This has been a valuable experience for the congregation in many different ways, with some real spiritual growth in several families. The Young Peoples' Group continue to meet bi-weekly, and one of their number is studying at the Winnipeg Bible College in preparation for the Christian ministry.

Waywayseecappo Presbyterian Church: Regular worship services, weekly Bible Study and Prayer-time are held. The congregation and the whole community (some 750 people), is pleased that Margaret Cooke is taking second-year studies at the Mokahum Indian Bible School in Cass Lake, Minnesota. Margaret served this past summer as a student among her own people. The Band-Council on the reserve shares the costs of her training equally with the Board of World Mission.

Extra activities that have aided the work of both congregations are: a newsletter twice a year, a Women's Retreat and a Men's Retreat once a year, visiting

missionaries, two visiting youth groups, a book and Bible display, a Communion Service in Ukrainian for a number of families of that descent, a joint Good Friday Communion Service with the Pentecostal congregation and Leadership-training at the CSSM camp at Gimli, Manitoba.

## Elphinstone-Okanais-Rolling River

Jay Bailey Reports:

Elphinstone: 53 households. Regular Sunday morning attendance: 20-45 including the Sunday School. Church School of 18 children from 5 to 12 years old. Youth group of a total of 14 people meets in Fall and from late winter to early summer. Some young people are involved in teaching Church School. They also help with VBS in the summer working with the lay-pastor and his wife. Other instruction given includes Communicants Class, Baptism Instruction and Marriage

Two of the five hospitals visited by the lay-pastor have chaplaincy programs. Shoal Lake is developing a co-operative Pastoral Care Unit in which the lay-pastor shares. In Elphinstone itself, there is good co-operation between the Presbyterian,

Roman Catholic and Ukrainian-speaking Greek Catholic churches.

Okanais: 36 households. Regular Sunday afternoon attendance 10 - 30, mostly children who are picked up by car; Christmas: 90, many of whom participated in the program. A major success is the Wednesday After School Class, taught by Janet Bailey in the Elementary School. The After School classes could well have more community impact than the services on the reserve. Economically this reserve is depressed. Some people are on welfare, but many would never consider it and work hard to avoid it.

Rolling River: 40 households. Very neglected by the church. The present ministry has not altered this situation. No regular church service as yet. Some sporadic meetings have been held and visits made. Most activity centres around V.B.S. and Tent Mission services. Clear Lake Camp was a major event for the children of this reserve. Native leadership was involved in the person of Margaret Cooke, who was joined by two other girls from Waywayseecappo Reserve.

#### CHINESE MINISTRIES

There are two deaconesses working at the Chinese Church in Victoria: Fanny Tse and Catherine Watson. They conducted the bilingual Nursery School five mornings a week for ten months of the year. The school was a happy spot with children singing, stories and handwork. A banner was made depicting "Peace on Earth". Sunday School has a small enrollment but the children attend faithfully; on Communion Sundays they met as a mission group. The Chinese School had an enrollment of 16 with afternoon classes four days a week and evening classes twice a week. The Women's Bible Class in Chinese met regularly every Wednesday afternoon. A new young women's Chinese speaking group was started with worship, Bible Study, cooking classes, good fellowship and much enthusiasm. The Senior Women's Missionary Society met eleven times during the year with a study program in Chinese. English classes were held four afternoons a week divided into beginners and more advanced. Prayer meetings were held monthly and a young teen group was formed. Sponsorship was provided for church members applying for Canadian citizenship.

In Vancouver the kindergarten under the direction of Elsie Young had an enrollment of 53; parents helped with transportation; the daily program is conducted in Chinese and English; in June, 15 graduated to public school; fees were increased in September and this resulted in a decline in enrollment. New immigrants

are contacted and followed up.

Annie 1. Wilson reports greatly improved health with greater participation in the activities of the church. Her primary concern has been the Nursery School. The city licensing requirements necessitated alterations in the building. Enrollment is down from former years. Out of ten families connected with the school one or both parents are baptized Christians and this makes a difference in the prayer support of

the children. Early in 1974 a student of many years ago was elevated to the bench of the B.C. Supreme Court as judge. Extensive visiting in the homes was carried on by the church workers some of whom studied methods of visitation evangelism.

More and more of the Chinese are taking positions of leadership and making congregational decisions. Young people prepare the weekly bulletins, the quarterly newsletter, monthly fellowship teas, and participate in choral groups. The youth group and choir visited homes for Senior Citizens, witnessing and singing, and went Christmas carolling at Bayshore Inn. The congregation hosted a joint service with Central Presbyterian Church.

Toronto reports increased activity in the young people's fellowship which meets once a week with increased attendance. The Women's Association met every Tuesday afternoon and a Young Women's Guild held evening meetings twice a month. The Nursery School had to close because of shortage of staff. The report of Grace Wong closes with an appeal for more visiting among the congregation, especially the elderly and hospitalized.

The report of the Chinese Church, Montreal, is submitted by Paul Chan,

minister and Mrs. Yew Fin Tam Hu and Anita Lee, women missionaries.

Statistics: 21 baptisms, 6 transfers, 32 marriages, and 34 funerals. Besides Mrs.

Hu and Miss Anita Lee, W. F. Tsang and John Chan assisted in the work.

W. F. Tsang conducts the Mandarin Service, and has formed classes to teach Mandarin Chinese to students — attendance is over 30. Regular Church service is always well attended and translated from Cantonese to English. Chinese churches should be fully bilingual.

Prayer Meetings continue to be a blessing. There are Women's Meetings and family worship regularly, a summer Bible School and a "Christmas Special" of

singing, folk dancing and reciting scripture.

Chinese School functions as usual but for the first time in 40 years, kindergarten work had to close due to the fact that many families have moved away and the Government is now supporting many nurseries in the area.

For two weeks in July some sixty girls and boys along with their counsellors

took off for Camp at Magog, Quebec.

Church givings have increased yearly to the Presbytery, the Budget of the

Church, and the Church Building Fund,

Paul Chan writes: "The present building no longer belongs to us and we have requested the Federal Government for sufficient funds to rebuild. The case has been to court and we have won our appeal but now the Federal Government wants to re-appeal, so the case is still in the hands of the court."

#### **HUNGARIAN MINISTRIES**

#### Montreal

John Vajda, the chairman of the Board died at the age of 67 and Leslie Soos, clerk of the Kirk Session at the age of 48. Both were founding members of our congregation and respected by everybody and their departure was a serious blow.

The criteria for membership in the congregation have been fixed on a more spiritual basis than before. Now only those are counted as members who take part conscientiously in worship and communion and carry the financial responsibilities of the congregation according to their means. All other persons are considered as a mission field.

The congregation is going through a process of internal cleansing and renewal. One of the signs of this is the new Youth Fellowship meetings under the leadership of Dr. Saly, which are held monthly in regular season and every Sunday during Advent and Lent. Also, an adult Bible School was started in addition to the regular weekly Bible Study meetings.

Instead of the traditional Sunday Bazaar this year the congregation opted to give free will donations. "The sum of \$1,200 gives some idea of the responsible attitude members have toward the church", reports Peter M. Szabo, minister.

It was also decided to extend a hand of brotherly love and service towards the old and lonely members of our congregation.

#### Oshawa

"This is my second year in which I have had the privilege of serving God in the Hungarian congregation in Oshawa as an Assembly student.

"The Sacrament of the Holy Communion was served four times. Attendance at services varied between 10 and 25. In Communion, the average was 16. Two young people were confirmed at the First Hungarian Church in Toronto. There were 3 funerals, 1 baptism. I visited the sick in hospitals and aged in Old Folks Home. I also visited families in need of help of counselling.

"I feel that this congregation — although small in number — is faithful to God, but I also feel that everything possible should be done to reach those who do not attend regularly, or those who are yet not connected to the Church. I do my best to carry out this necessity," writes Laszlo Szamoskozi, student.

Mount Brydges

The congregation is one of the smallest among the ethnic churches in our denomination. Last year was a good year, the ice of misunderstanding thawed and the minister felt that this time would be better than the previous one.

Reformation Sunday, we remembered the great Hungarian translator, wanderer and pastor: Albert Szenczi Molnar, (born 400 year ago, in 1574) who first translated into the Hungarian language Calvin's big opus: "Institutes of the Christian Religion", and the 150 Psalms in verses.

The Ladies' Aid is like the heart of the body, the motor of our congregation. The Sunday School with our new teacher has a hopeful future. We have good

relationships with the Hungarian Roman Catholic Church in London.

The minister, Louis Vietorisz is the publisher of Quiet Moments — the Hungarian version of the Upper Room and makes himself busy with the Hungarian evangelical colportage, sending Christian literature to Hungarian people in the Americas and Europe. Quiet Moments goes into 35 countries around the world with 2800 copies printed.

Members: 56; baptism: 1 infant; funerals: 6; visitations in homes and hospitals: 341. Financial: receipts: \$11,892.20; Disbursements: \$10,420.92; balance

\$1,471.28.

George Telcs reports: "On Sunday August 4th, in commemoration of the 60th anniversary of the outbreak of the first world war we honoured at a special service ten war veterans who were also founding members of our congregation. In the afternoon we had a joint picnic with the members of St. Basil's Roman Catholic parish, and the Hungarian Old Timers' Club.

"At present we are holding communicant's classes with ten pupils enrolled, some of whom are the grandchildren of our veterans. These classes, like all our

other youth work are held in English.

"Attendance at Sunday School has steadily increased in the last three years."

## Edmonton

1974 was the year of reconciliation, understanding and peace. However, some of the disturbing elements (ten families) have completely withdrawn from the congregation's life.

Services were held regularly (52) however with less attendance. Confirmation

class started in late September and since then it meets every week.

"It seems from the facts - spiritual and material - that the life in Calvin Church will come back to normal," claims Gabor Dezse, minister.

#### Vancouve

Sunday and Holiday services were held with a total attendance of 2,648 over 54 services; average 49. Evening services on 7 occasions, total attendance: 159, average 23; served the Lord's supper on 6 occasions; participants: 254, average 42; Bible Study on 31 occasions, total: 193, average 6. Evangelistic services were conducted. A Gala Dinner was held at the Hungarian Social Club's auditorium. The

honorary speaker was Rev. Stephen Nagy, minister from Winnipeg. 280 persons attended the dinner. Family nights 4 times, total attendance: 430.

There were 3 Sunday School teachers; 44 Sunday School services: total attendance: 631. There are 23 children attending Saturday School. Six children were baptized. There was one wedding and one funeral. So reports Attila Csiszar, minister.

#### Abbotsford

The congregation is made up of predominantly older people although a few young people do attend. Out of about 100 members on the roll of Calvin Church 28 are Hungarian. The Ladies Aid which has been quite active over the years raising considerable amounts of money is curtailing its activities. There is no call upon the

funds of the Presbyterian Church in Canada to support this ministry.

R. M. Pollock, minister of Calvin Church writes: "After spending some 11 years trying to explain to people in this area that Calvin Presbyterian Church is just the same as any other Presbyterian congregation in Canada except that it has a language service in Hungarian I find it strange that the inference left by the Board of World Mission is that the work in Abbotsford is Hungarian work and that I am on the Hungarian staff of ministers in Canada. Out of some 90 households connected with Calvin Church only 20-25 are Hungarian."

#### INNER CITY COMMITTEE

"The Church is Catholic. It is 'the fulness of Him who fills all in all'. This means that the Church has been given for all men without distinction or exception. It means also that in the Church there is offered to all men in Christ the very fulness of God's grace. Catholicity is the mark of the Church which must lie behind

the claim of the evangelist that the Gospel is intended for all men."

This quotation from a document of the World Council of Churches entitled, "A Theological Reflection on the Work of Evangelism" points up the fact that the Church of Jesus Christ has a responsibility in mission to large numbers of persons caught in inner city situations across the nation; persons whose lives are fractured by the pressures of urbanization and the problems with which they are unable to cope and which breed hostility and suspicion. Never was there greater need for the love of God to be shed abroad than in these situations which exist in all of our urban centres.

It is to fulfill such a ministry that the Inner City staff have been appointed and in which they carry out their service. Added to this staff in 1974 was Mrs. Mabel Powers, who in a brief period has undertaken a most effective ministry in the Anishinabe Fellowship, Winnipeg (formerly known as the Logan Avenue Mission). The appointment of a full-time Director to this work was short-lived, and this position is presently vacant. A new type of outreach is being carried on in East Toronto Presbytery by a team ministry in three older congregations. Central Church, Vancouver, is looking at ways in which it can minister to the inner city needs of downtown Vancouver.

Not so encouraging has been the lack of positive activity resulting from studies of downtown congregations where members appear to be content to continue in a downward trend, resisting change and by and large ignoring their mission to the community which they were established to serve. These congregations need the type of leadership which recognizes the challenge facing them and which is prepared to try to do something about it.

The Inner City Committee gained a new chairman during the past year, Dr. E. P. Aikens.

#### INNER CITY MINISTRIES

### Tyndale Neighbourhood House (Montreal)

The report is submitted by Emily Drysdale, Lois Cooke Johnson and Bob Johnson, as follows:

The congregation set up a task force to work out a plan for congregational thrusts. The following goals were set: (1) to hold events that would sustain the congregation's growing fellowship, (e.g. a coffee hour following monthly communion); (2) to search out relationships with neighbourhood religious leaders, (e.g. an ecumenical supper); (3) to create ecumenical activities in the neighbourhood, (e.g. an ecumenical Prayer Service); (4) to celebrate neighbourhood events related to religious and secular holidays, (e.g. special film showings and suppers at Christmas and Easter).

#### Education for Mission

In the Spring of the year, plans were made to create an 80 filmslide and cassette tape presentation of Tyndale's mission in Little Burgundy. These slides will be offered to church groups across Canada. In the Fall, the team ministry was invited to participate in a Mission Week-end at St. Giles Church, Ottawa. In a series of coffee hours in members homes and at an evening pot-luck supper, the team carried out a presentation of Tyndale's ministry to the inner city.

Contact was maintained with all congregations in the Presbytery by sending

out calendar inserts and newsletters.

French language instruction is a serious matter in Quebec. The Tyndale team, located in a French speaking district, has been arranging courses for its members to enroll in French language training courses.

#### Planning and Budgetting

A task force was set up to create a comprehensive plan for the future ministry in the Little Burgundy District. This was in keeping with a request by Presbytery's Committee on Missions to submit a total plan for ministry over the next 5 years. In the fiscal year of 1974, the combined efforts of the local group were able to raise two-thirds of the total budget of \$76,500.00, the balance being received from the Board of World Mission.

### Developing Human Potential

The Tyndale morning Pre-School guides the three and four year old children through a program of personal and social development, aimed at preparing them for future learning experiences in elementary school. The increasing number of French families involved in the program points to our growing acceptance by that culture. The expansion of the pre-school program included a "cottage adventure" in the Laurentians during the summer.

This program continues to be the foundation stone of the work as it guides

children in "coming alive" to their potential in life.

The After-School Program is designed to continue school children, kindergarten to Grade 5, on a journey toward mature adulthood, and so increasingly utilizes the group process of decision making and planning. A new sense of responsibility has developed in the high school and university volunteers. This has led to a stronger relationship between the professional staff and the indigenous volunteers.

More and more, these young people are depending on their own programs and activities, and then reflecting on the future direction they should take. As programs continue to develop and neighbourhood youth return each quarter to take leadership responsibility for the children, one more aspect of the vision of the Church in Little Burgundy is realized. Many leaders who began as pre-school children are now in turn serving the children of the neighbourhood, Indeed the time has come when the seeds planted by the many servants of the Lord who have worked in Little Burgundy over the last 49 years are bearing fruit.

#### Leadership Development

Most of the volunteers who add enthusiasm and assistance are young people from Little Burgundy. Others come from the wider Montreal community; some are students. It became clear that the volunteers needed to have a voice in policy making, and in planning the program. As a result the Volunteer Staff Steering Committee was born which hammered out policies for program and leadership training. A successful training week-end was held. The Staff's role is seen here, as

facilitators bringing out those leadership skills found so richly but often so unex-

pectedly in young people.

The Women's Opportunity Group was started and with the help of a grant from the Secretary of State we were able to build up this work during the summer. One project — a community garden — in which three acres of city-owned vacant lot was transformed into a vegetable garden, brought out family involvement as well as the bonus of fresh vegetables. Other projects — outings, trips, crafts, a keep-fit course, a first-aid course and budget shopping appealed to many.

Confronting children and their families rooted in a secular world with the Christian Faith is one of Tyndale's most puzzling challenges. One way tried was by creating events which celebrated something important in the life of the church.

When regular Christian Education classes recommenced, the Black curriculum was chosen as something very pertinent to our situation. Young people of both black and white races discover that many fine contributions have been made to the Christian Church through the music and poetry of black writers, poets and musicians. The culmination of this unit of study was a Christmas pageant where poems and music from the Black Culture were used to create the liturgy.

#### Christian Community House, Ottawa

Hospitality to neighbours, visitors, and dinner and overnight guests continued to be an important aspect of life at the house. The peak periods are the summer months and the Christmas holiday season when as many as 8 to 10 persons come daily for fellowship, assistance, or counselling. Discussions took place with personnel from the Children's Aid, the Detoxification Centre, the John Howard Society, Welfare, Family Counselling Services, a Correctional Centre, a half-way house for girls from psychiatric hospitals, Alcoholics Anonymous, a hospital psychiatric department, and others.

House Activities: Bible study, devotions, and a weekly house meeting are regular activities for house members. A retreat provided a relaxing change and an opportunity to evaluate our life together.

Sandra Estabrooks writes: "This is only a skeleton picture of what goes on at the Christian Community House in Ottawa. This report reflects the many avenues open to ministry which a house community can provide."

#### Flora House, Winnipeg

An average of over one hundred people use the club house weekly in organized activities. From kindergarten to twelve years there are 80 children attending. The Women's Club has a membership of ten. The club is the centre for creative activities such as arts and crafts, games, sports and field trips, but the Holy Spirit is the main creative activity through the Christian Education program.

There are many children who come to the door for all sorts of things, some to chat, some for mitts, cookies, clothing and skates. These children couldn't fit into a structured program as they are too anti-social. Here is a field of work in itself.

The Women's Club has been busy assisting in preparing breakfast for children at the local public school. This has opened up for Flora House much more credibility in the area. A project called "Project Open Door" is a service venture in the community to aid individuals and groups to identify and to utilize resources or agencies to answer their needs.

"Not as many families as I would like to see have actually considered membership in the church but they do look to Calvin Church as their church," concludes Athalie Read, Director, She is assisted by Eugene Rienks,

#### RURAL MINISTRY

The Committee on Rural Ministry has been concerned that special training be provided for ministers serving in small towns and rural congregations. It was felt that the best means of providing such assistance would be through the Continuing Education program of Presbyterian College, and contact was made with the College with a view to having such a course included in the 1974-75 series. Presbyterian

College, as a result of this communication, has planned a two-day workshop to be held in April 1975, as part of the Continuing Education Program. The Rev. Winston Stokes, a rural development officer with the Alberta Department of Agriculture and Convener of the United Church's Alberta Conference Rural Life Committee is to give leadership in this workshop.

The Committee learned of a number of courses being held denominationally and interdenominationally in the first half of 1975 and requested permission from the B.W.M. Executive to send representatives to several of these. It is felt that information obtained through the attendance at these courses will be beneficial in setting up the course in conjunction with the Continuing Education Program.

Correspondence has been carried on with several of the denominations in the United States as well as with six Canadian denominations in an attempt to learn of rural ministry work being carried on by them and to obtain available literature on the subject.

#### **IMMIGRATION**

Immigration has been of increasing public interest across Canada since the Department of Manpower and Immigration announced that a "Green Paper" would be issued in preparation for the writing of a new Immigration Act. The release of the "Green Paper" was eventually issued at the end of January, 1975. Many gatherings have been held in recent months in anticipation of this four-volumed document, and many more are being planned in the weeks ahead, as concerned Canadians endeavour to have their fellow-countrymen knowledgeable about the implications of a new Immigration Act and, if necessary, bring pressure to bear upon the government in the writing of the new Act.

Total immigration figures for 1974 have not yet been published. To the end of November however, Canada received 203,000 immigrants, as compared with a total of 184,200 in 1973. This means that 1974 witnessed the highest immigration since 1967. The majority of these newcomers have settled in three major cities — Toronto, Vancouver and Montreal. The "Green Paper" expresses some concern about this situation, as these areas of high-immigrant concentration are centres which already are faced with problems of employment, housing shortage and overtaxed community services.

While in earlier years the largest percentage of immigrants came from the British Isles and Europe, today 43% come from Third World countries. There have been some incidents of social and racial tensions. There is also evidence of many of the newcomers being exploited, frequently by their own people who have been in Canada for a longer period.

The National Inter-Faith Immigration Committee, on which the writer, Giollo Kelly, has served as Secretary for the past three years, processed during 1974 a total of 129,407 immigrant names, an increase from 77,493 in 1973. Of these, 66,051 went to Ontario; 23,890 went to British Columbia; and 21,325 to Quebec. A welcome in the name of the Canadian Churches was extended through the regional and local committees, and assistance of many kinds was given to newcomers to facilitate their adjustment to their new home.

Through its Supportative Assistance Program, N.I.F.I.C. has continued to provide assistance to refugees. The balance of the Asian Ugandans were received and over 1,000 Chilean refugees were welcomed and assisted. The funds raised by the Canadian Churches, through the Canadian Council of Churches, under the name of the Canadian Fund for Refugees from Chile — some \$16,590 — were administered through N.I.F.I.C.

#### CHURCH AND UNIVERSITY

In November, 1974 Dr. Goodwill MacDougall assumed duties as Secretary of Church and University for the Presbyterian Church in Canada, under the Board of World Mission. Since that time he has visited a number of university campuses —

Toronto, York, Brock, Waterloo, McGill, Montréal, Laval, Bishop's, University of New Brunswick, Mount Allison, Acadia, Dalhousie, St. Mary's, St. Francis Xavier, and University of Prince Edward Island. He also met with the Chaplains, Principals/ Presidents, Deans of Students, and members of committees concerned with religion on campus, leaders of I.V.C.F. and of S.C.M., local clergymen in the university towns and conveners of presbytery outreach committees. From all these interactions certain points emerge.

First: the importance of the ministry of the University Chaplain. Secondly, the specialized nature of the chaplaincy. Thirdly, the need to help participating congregations understand the nature of university chaplaincy work. Fourthly, the need to awaken the home churches to their continuing responsibility to those students who leave their congregation to attend university in another city. Fifthly, the need to challenge congregations in university towns regarding their outreach to the stu-

dents at the local university(ies).

There is a receptiveness to the kind of guidance and help that a chaplain might provide. This is found not only among students, but also Faculty, several of whom have expressed genuine concern that the work of the chaplaincy be taken more seriously. One University President said, "I believe firmly that the University Chaplain could fulfill a greater role today than at any time in the past." He pointed to the pressures placed on students by the advent of religious pluralism on campus; by the new code of ethics with which they are confronted; by the new freedom campus life affords, especially for resident students. There is also the role of the chaplain in relation to members of Faculty, not only as counsellor, but also in helping them to relate their particular discipline to the lives of the students and to life in general.

At present the Presbyterian Church in Canada supports Chaplaincies of an ecumenical nature at the following universities: Alberta; Calgary; Saskatchewan; McMaster; Carleton; and Prince Edward Island.- In addition, as a denomination it supports chaplains at University of B.C.; Presbyterian Residence, Saskatoon; McGill University, and Université de Montréal. Part time chaplaincies at some other universities are supported by local congregations. If funds are available there will be appointments of an ecumenical nature made to two additional universities: Bishop's in Lennoxville and University of New Brunswick in Federicton — and negotiations are being initiated for a similar appointment at St. Mary's University in Halifax.

The Presbyterian Church supports financially the Student Christian Movement and the Inter Varsity Christian Fellowship. Some of the chaplains give leadership to

these organizations.

The university and college campuses are most important areas in which the Church should be expanding the outreach of the Christian Gospel. The need and the opportunities are great. There is a vital need for additional chaplains; there are persons who are interested. Local congregations are prepared to become involved and to give financial support; but, they can't do it alone. They need assistance.

#### OVERSEAS STUDENTS AND LAYMEN ABROAD

In 1974 O.S.L.A. came under Church and University and it is believed that the work of both will be strengthened by this coming together, reports Patricia Hanna, Director.

#### **Overseas Students**

Requests — Requests continue to come in from overseas students seeking information or help in matters relating to financial difficulties, study in Canada, work and immigration problems, accommodation, church contacts. Requests come also from ministers, church members, university advisors and chaplains and secular agencies on behalf of students.

Emergency Fund — Six loans and three small discretionary grants were made from the Loan Fund. In May a sum of \$500 was given by the Committee on Inter-Church Aid for grants to students who were in no position to repay, and four

grants practically depleted the sum by the end of the year. The guidelines for the

Loan Fund will need to be reviewed.

Japanese Student Group Visit — About 38 students and 6 teachers of the Osaka Cultural Athletic Association arrived in Toronto in August and were guided around by the Director. One of the highlights was a cultural — athletic presentation by the group to 300 parents and campers at a Mississauga Day Camp. One of the students stayed in Canada to attend Grade 13 classes and is living with a Presby-

terian family in Streetsville.

International Christmas Program — With the co-operation of the International Student Centre in Ottawa a 5 day program was arranged over the Christmas holidays. Fifty-four overseas students from campuses across Canada took part. Christmas Eve Church services and Christmas Day in Canadian homes were highlights of the activities. Following this model, chaplains at McGill and McMaster Universities held local Christmas programs this year. It is to be hoped that such a local initiatives will continue to spread.

#### Laymen Abroad

Most requests came from church members going on an overseas visit who wanted church contacts and helpful information on the areas to be visited and the

work of the Christian churches there.

Educational Materials — Because of questions being raised by some overseas churches (e.g. Caribbean, Kenya, Indonesia) about tourism in their countries and the effects of increasing numbers of overseas visitors, the Director has been working in co-operation with the Canadian Council of Churches Committee on Laymen Abroad and the Tourism With Insight (T.W.I.N.) working group on the production

and distribution of materials related to responsible travel for Christians.

Caribbean Study Tour Project — For ten days in November and December the Director was involved in a T.W.1.N. pilot — project study tour to the Caribbean on the implications of tourism for right relationships between peoples. Sixteen church members of various denominations from the Hamilton-Toronto area participated. Pre-departure orientation meetings; working assignments, orientation and reflection sessions in the Caribbean; and post-trip debriefing and evaluation were the key features of the tour. Most of the participants have been involved in follow-up activities in their churches and communities interpreting their learning experiences and raising some of the questions presented to them by the West Indians they met.

#### RESEARCH AND PLANNING

During the two years since it was formed, the Research and Planning Committee has made progress towards clarifying its objectives and establishing the right

kind of working relationships with the other committees of the Board.

The major task of the committee is to review the mission work of our Church and the life of the Church as a whole in terms of gospel understanding of the Church's mission. We see it as our task to scrutinize and evaluate every part of our Board's expenditure of personnel and money for the guidance of the Board in determining priorities and so that we may have confidence that every resource is used most effectively for the whole communication of the gospel.

During the past three years the work of the committee was hampered a little by the absence of the Secretary. While the work was slow it did not stop, and many

of the Task Forces carried forward their research without a break.

Most intensive work has been in relation to our mission in Canada. It seems evident that we need to do more work in the general field of identifying Canadian priorities. Special Task Forces on work among Canadian Indians and our ministry in French/English Relations have resulted in some important recommendations. A Task Force on Witness in a Time of Religious Pluralism is in the midst of study which should throw light on both the special ministries of our Church and the nature of evangelism in a pluralistic society.

In overseas concerns, major attention was given to China and the Christian call there, and to the Caribbean, looking at our call to work in the Caribbean, and to

work with Caribbean people in Canada. There was also a beginning made to a study of overseas mission and a total review of all our work abroad in the light of ecumenical sharing of personnel in the radically changed world order of the seventies.

The committee welcomes criticisms and suggestions in this early stage of for-

mulating patterns of operation.

#### MISSION EDUCATION

Mission Education has experienced a year of increased production, improved relationships with other Board and Agencies of the Church and expanded contacts with groups outside the Presbyterian Church.

#### Deputation

Deputation continues to be one of the most important single services of Mission Education. Probably the health of the Board's work in the field depends upon the continual ongoing work of deputation to a far greater extent than most people realize.

Missioners engaged in deputation numbered 35: overseas personnel 18, mission in Canada 9, special visitors from abroad 8. Six World Mission Week-ends were conducted and assistance was given in planning and providing materials and personnel for several other types of congregational mission events, some such as at Hopedale Church, Oakville, extending over several months. Ten summer camps were provided with mission resource persons. Over the year, 34 Presbyteries of the Church had a representative of mission education within the bounds.

Special Visitors from other lands helped make the fact of two-way mission a reality. These included Dr. In Ha Lee, Moderator of the Korean Christian Church in Japan, and the Very Rev. J. D. Sangaya, General Secretary of the Church of Central Africa Presbyterian, Synod of Blantyre, both of whom spent five weeks visiting church groups in Canada. Another visitor of shorter duration was Dr. Ram Singh, principal of Baring Christian College, Punjab, India.

#### Co-operative Work

Mission Education staff took part in the planning and production of the Bible Study Work Book: "Lord of All" for use with the theme on Global Consciousness.

The main area of co-operative work has been in connection with the new Board of Congregational Life of which the Mission Education secretary is an associate staff member. The staff are members of the Joint Task Force on Mission Education Services, an important clearing house for Board of Congregational Life, the W.M.S. and the B.W.M. on matters of mission education.

Mission Education represents the B.W.M. on the Canadian Council of Churches, Commission for World Concerns, and the N.C.C.C./U.S.A., Commission on Educa-

tion for Mission.

A new instrument of inter church mission education among the Canadian churches was developed in 1974 for the purpose of planning and preparing a complete set of materials for a study of "Canadian Concerns" for the year 1976-77. Active in this group, known as I.C.M.E.C., are the United Church, Anglican Church, Roman Catholic National Mission Council, Presbyterian Church and Lutheran Church with the Baptists and Mennonites as interested observers.

Mission Education is represented on the Inter Church Aid Committee of the General Assembly. Mission Education staff represent the B.W.M. on the Com-

munication Services Committee.

The Canadian Armed Services Chapel Sunday Schools adopted as a special mission project for 1974-75 the Christian Communicare Centre in Port Harcourt, Nigeria and Mission Education was invited to work with the B.C.L. to produce a full set of resources for publicity and promotion of this operation.

#### Publications

The Centennial story of the missions of the Presbyterian Church in Canada

under the title "Unknown Country" was written by Geoffrey Johnston. 10,000 copies were printed. It was prepared jointly with the W.M.S. Adult Study Committee and included in the study kit for use by W.M.S. study groups across the church.

ENCOUNTER was published four times in the year with an initial printing of each issue of 7,500. All issues were completely "sold out", two of them going to

reprints which brought their circulation to over 10,000.

As usual, articles, notes, ads, pictures were provided for the Presbyterian Record, Glad Tidings and the Presbyterian Message as well as for Stewardship bulletins of the Board of Congregational Life.

Mission Education produced a new phamphlet for the Vellore/Ludhiana Committee of the Canadian Council of Churches. A pamphlet A PLACE FOR CHIL-

DREN: FOUR SEAS was also published.

#### Audio-Visuals

The first series of filmstrips on the mission work of the Presbyterian Church in Canada was completed and has had wide usage. These include: AN-JA-GE'GDOWAT (Kenora Fellowship Centre), Church for Others, 100 Years Until Now, Paths of Others, Seaway Community Services, Sugar Please, Wherever You Go, Working Together in Crete, Working Together in Gifu, Working Together in Likubula House, Working Together at Toran Mal: total sales 425.

In the late summer and early fall, Mr. Hummelen made a trip to Western Canada to shoot pictures for the second series of filmstrips which includes CEL-

EBRATION - a centennial overview of the work of Mission Canada.

In co-operation with the Scarboro Foreign Mission Society the Statement by the Canadian Catholic Conference of Bishops on "Sharing Daily Bread" has been made into a filmstrip with cassette and printed script as a resource for use in

connection with world hunger.

An important production was the 16mm film, A PLACE FOR CHILDREN—the Christian Communicare Centre at Port Harcourt, Nigeria. On the same theme, a mini slide set has also been produced and made available on a purchase basis. At the request of the Vellore/Ludhiana Committee of the C.C.C. a new filmstrip on the Vellore Medical Centre, India, was produced.

#### Calendar 1975

The Centennial Calendar 1975 was produced by the Calendar Committee for 1975. Sales increased considerably amounting to 48,000. In addition, over 3,000 copies were sampled out, given away as complimentary copies or made available free of charge to colleges, residences, hospitals and similar institutions. It was printed by C. F. Haughton Limited and there was an excess of income over expenditure this year amounting to \$785.

#### **OVERSEAS OPERATIONS**

Sister Churches overseas have covered most of the highlights in their respective reports. Attention is drawn to the Guyana report and the significance of the incorporation of the Guyana Presbyterian Church; to the Caribbean Association of Reformed Chruches and its change of name and function from an 'assembly' to an 'association'; to India and developments within the C.N.I.; to Japan and steps taken toward the implementation of their Basic Mission Policy statement; to Taiwan and the publication of the New Testament in Tayal; to Nigeria and the decisions taken by the July Synod meetings; and to Malawi and the visit of J. D. Sangaya to Canada.

The March (1974) meeting of the Board honoured Isabel Taylor who retired that same month after 43 years of service in Taiwan. At the end of the year Bea Scott retired after 34 years of service in India. With fewer years of service but having made important contributions, Bob and Priscilla Anderson terminated after eight years in Japan, Louise Gamble after 8 years in Taiwan, Geoff and Mary Lou Johnston after 5 years in the Caribbean, having before that served in Nigeria, and

Muriel Copeland after 2 years in Crete under the Overseas Volunteer program and then a period in Niger as a nutritionist on an Emergency Relief Team in the Sahel.

The 1974 appointments included two new couples to Taiwan, Ron and Bev Archer and Terry and Eileen Samuel; Diane Petrie was re-appointed to Taiwan; Susan Tucker went as an Overseas Volunteer to teach in Japan; and Lillian Wilton was appointed as an Overseas Volunteer and is now serving as a nurse in an operating room specializing in eye surgery. Jim and Cass Whitefield offered as Volunteers and spent 3 months in India and since last June have been at the U.T.C.W.I. in Kingston, Jamaica. During the year the B.W.M. assisted three final year medical students to spend one of their elective periods in a hospital overseas: Peter and Betsy Gregor from McMaster and Rick Allen from Western. John and Carol Bell were appointed as regular missionaries to Nigeria but because of John's ill health had to withdraw.

Perhaps the biggest single issue facing Overseas Operations is inflation. Because the B.W.M. budget over the past several years has remained virtually frozen the churches overseas with whom we work have had to absorb the inflationary effects not only on their portion of program funds but on the B.W.M. portion as well. In some cases sister churches have also tried gallantly to reduce the amount of B.W.M.

grants they receive.

The point where B.W.M. has been most drastically affected has been in Canadian personnel costs. The cost of living scale two years ago placed Taiwan at about 92% of Ottawa. Today it is just over 100%. Nigeria is 132%, Japan over 140%. The problem is not that overseas missionaries are in difficulty in these places, for B.W.M. has a cost of living scale which helps to meet the difference. The real problem belongs to B.W.M. which must find from its frozen budget the extra

money to cover the increased cost of living grant,

Stipend is only one aspect of B.W.M. financial responsibility for Canadian staff overseas. Air travel costs increase constantly, the cost to educate the children of missionaries in overseas countries has been increasing at least 10 - 12% per year, accommodation in Taiwan and Nigeria is almost prohibitive, gasoline in India now sells for around \$3.50 per gallon. For all of these items B.W.M. has received no additional money from the General Assembly Budget during the past several years. Increasing costs have had to be met by reductions elsewhere, usually in the number of missionaries serving overseas. In 1973 our average per missionary cost was \$8,458, in 1974 it rose to \$9,405 and in 1975 we project an increase to \$10,600.

Earle Roberts, secretary, Overseas Operations concludes his report: "In the midst of inflation and frozen budgets we are being confronted with new opportunities and challenges for Christian mission by providing personnel money to make it possible for non-Canadian missionaries from one country to serve in another country, and by new and exciting programs of outreach and witness being undertaken by sister churches overseas who are inviting our Church to share with them in these programs. Do we without careful consideration and prayer simply say no to all new challenges and opportunities because inflation is already killing us? This is the easy way, but is it being true to the purpose of the Board: 'to give leadership to the whole Church in all its structures for mission responsibility and vision. . .'?'

#### THE CARIBBEAN

#### The Caribbean Association of Reformed Churches

The Caribbean Association of Reformed Churches held its general meeting in August 1974 in Georgetown, Guyana. This was a postponed meeting because of the inauguration of the Caribbean Conference of Churches and the necessity to avoid duplication of program and finance. Member churches agreed to postpone the meeting to 1974 when amendments were made to the Constitution so as to give the Association a structure more suited to the present needs of the Reformed family and changed the name from the Caribbean Assembly to Caribbean Association of Reformed Churches.

The Association is not a juridical body. Its concerns are fellowship, study and co-operation and a mutual sharing of these concerns. This has been reflected in the new constitution: It is no longer stated as it was of the former Caribbean Assembly, that the Association is "the highest court for its member churches in matters of faith, order and discipline"; nor that the Association "shall maintain spiritual oversight over its member churches", but rather that it shall provide a frame of reference in doctrine and theological matters for the guidance of its members.

Under a new system, financial contributions by member churches were reduced

by about 50%.

The Association has expressed concern for its students at the U.T.C.W.I. with reference to the denominational classes. It has not yet been possible to work out a syllabus to meet the needs of all students. Other areas of concern are the courses and contents of some of the courses. Are the courses helping as much as they should, to prepare our students for work in the contemporary Caribbean?

As regards faculty, the withdrawal by Mission Boards of the representatives of the denominations poses challenges for the Caribbean Churches not only in the area of academic input but also in terms of finance. The situation is further aggravated by the fact that West Indians who engage in Advanced Theological Study have not chosen these areas of concentration with the needs of the Seminary in mind. There

were fifteen Association students at the U.T.C.W.I.

The C.A.R.C. continued to struggle with the problem of a unified witness by the Presbyterian Churches in Guyana. A special Committee of the Association stands ready to advise with the member churches in Guyana for closer co-operation.

In the wider ecumenical field, the Reformed Churches have had a deep and meaningful involvement, mostly, but not exclusively, through the newly formed Caribbean Conference of Churches. One of the Presidents and the General Secretary are members of the Reformed family. Report submitted by Joseph Williams, Secretary, C.A.R.C.

#### Guyana Presbyterian Church

After more than 80 years the Guyana Presbyterian Church has a membership of about 2,000 and in a multi-racial society its membership is almost 100% East Indian. The report of the Clerk of Presbytery suggests that these figures indicate a ghetto-type Christianity with arrested growth. The church is "inward-looking, pre-occupied with housekeeping and matters of purely domestic nature". There is a total neglect of outreach, very little lay training and very ineffective Christian Education, according to the 1974 report. There is hardly any witness and mission—some kind of social action and concern, having no program, no goals, no strategy to achieve any goal. "We are encumbered with purely business and administrative matters, allowing no time to grapple with fundamental issues."

On Sunday, August 18, 1974 Earle Roberts, Secretary Overseas Operations of

On Sunday, August 18, 1974 Earle Roberts, Secretary Overseas Operations of the B.W.M., Presbyterian Church in Canada, officially handed over all responsibility and assets to the Board of Trustees of the Guyana Church. The Canadian Mission Council had held control of all assets since 1908. The original Ordinance was handed over to the Moderator, H. Sukhu, clearly marked "nul and void 2nd March, 1974." Members of the Board of Trustees for the first five years, at least, are David Karran, David Kunar, Cyril Kanhai, Henry Buchan, the Moderator, the Clerk and

the Treasurer of Presbytery.

On August 20 Presbytery asked the Presbyterian Church in Canada to phase out all financial grants by the end of 1978: Evangelism (salaries), 1976; administration and Lay Training, 1977 and Theological Training, 1978. The last new church building to be erected and dedicated before the official "handling over" was at DeWillem, West Demerara. The first new building to be erected after that event was

at Novar in West Berbice Parish.

Many changes in personnel throughout the Presbytery included the appointment of Dale Bisnauth as Tutor at the United Theological College of the West Indies in Kingston, Jamaica; and the resignation of Oscar Mathura and Girdharry Kissoon from the ministry and membership of the church. Eileen Budhoo also resigned as deaconness. St. Columba's House, the Lay Training Centre at Better Hope is without a director.

Two students for the ministry, Randolph Etwaroo and Albert James are in training at U.T.C.W.I. and Haimdat Sawh is on scholarship from the Presbyterian Church in Canada studying at Knox College, Toronto.

Among visitors welcomed by the church in 1974 were Mr. & Mrs. J. M. Burnett

from Wychwood Church, Toronto.

The report concludes on a note of hope despite its somewhat discouraging beginning: "there is hope for our church. There seems to be arising a new breed of men and women who are concerned and are giving themselves in the service of their Lord...whom I am sure will be led by the Spirit to throw out all the meaningless and irrelevant stuff from among us."

#### CHURCH OF NORTH INDIA

A. C. Dhamaraj, General Secretary, Church of North India, submitted a general report on the first four years of the church's life and this is augmented by reports from each of the two dioceses with which the Presbyterian Church has direct

involvement, namely Bhopal Diocese and Lucknow Diocese.

On 29th November 1974 the C.N.I. completed four years of united life combining six different traditions. The report for these four years indicates that the C.N.I. has accomplished much and gives a basis for optimism with regard to the future. The troubles listed include power, position, prestige, property, trusts, administrative inefficiency and lack of ability to move quickly. The Synod has a feeling of helplessness which can only be rectified by constitutional amendment.

There are, of course, tensions, but these have been faced frankly and openly and dealt with courageously and in good humour. The report notes the importance of 'the grass roots' local congregations and their development in unity, witness and service. So far there has been a very poor response to the courses of training for the

rural ministry offered by the National Christian Council of India.

During the short lifetime of the C.N.I. one Bishop has died, two retired and one resigned. Four new Bishops were consecrated and installed in the Dioceses of Bombay, Gujarat, Darjeeling and Durgapur. A special committee has been set up to study the viability of the present dioceses and advise re delineation of boundaries. There is an annual conference of Bishops to which has been added short training courses in business management. The government of India honoured Bishop Richardson and the University of Serampore conferred on the Moderator the degree of Doctor of Divinity, honoris causa.

The Ordination of Women was discussed at some length in Synod on the recommendation of the Theological Commission that it be accepted. It was ac-

cepted in principle and referred to the Diocese before final ratification.

The relationship of full communion has been established with the Church of Scotland and the Church of South India and the Mar Thoma Churches of South India. Discussions have started towards Union with these latter two churches. Conversations are under way to negotiate a closer relationship with the Diocese of Bangla Desh and a Joint Liaison Committee has been set up. A Council of Child Welfare for North India has been proposed and will soon be catering to the needs of poor children within the area.

The C.N.I. participates in the missionary enterprise of the United Mission to Nepal and individual Dioceses are taking up home missions projects. The C.N.I.

provides a budget of Rs. 3,500/- for evangelistic outreach.

"Priorities in the C.N.I." has been a subject of intense discussion and planning. In missionary obedience to the commission of the Lord to proclaim the gospel to the ends of the earth and the end of time, directives have been issued to attain the target of self-support for pastoral and evangelical ministry by December 1977.

#### **Bhopal Diocese**

The Bhopal Diocese includes the area of the former Vindhya Satpura Church Council (the Bhil Area) and the work in that district is reported on by the Administrative Council for Christian Institutions under the headings, Education, Medical Work, Economic Development.

Educational Work includes Amkhut Christian School and Hostels and the vil-

lage Primary Schools. There are 348 pupils on the roll of Amkhut Christian School, about half of them living in the hostels. Some changes in the courses of study have taken place and new text books are in use in many subjects. Bible Classes are part of the daily program. There are 17 teachers on staff — three are new this year. Beatrice Scott retired in April after 34 years of service in India and returned to Canada. The School again received official government Recognition for one year.

There are two hostels including both Christians and non-Christians – 71 in the boys' hostel and the same number in the girls'. Students share in the every day work under a manager and the Hostel Committee which also employs five full-time

workers. Juliana Tezlo is Headmistress, Kalib B. Singh is Manager.

Five village primary schools were in operation full-time with 13 teachers and 300 children. In Jobat the school added a 5th class and ought soon to be eligible for government grant. In anticipation of building expansion a sod-turning ceremony took place when George Malcolm, General Secretary of the Board of World Mission was in Jobat in July.

Medical Work includes the M. G. Abey Memorial Children's House, Jobat Christian Hospital, the School of Nursing and the Christian Rural Health Services.

There are 17 children at the M. G. Abey House, under the direction of R. Guman and Pauline Brown. Graduates are now attending High School or Nursing School or are working. Two are in the Indian Army and three were married this year. Some of the older children attended youth camps at Toran Mal.

At Jobat Christian Hospital, Dr. R. M. Khare is Medical Officer with Drs. N. Aggarwal and D. Tezlo serving full-time on the staff. The Peter Gregors from Canada served for several months as did R. Allen to gain experience in various fields

of medicine.

There are 23 staff nurses of whom three are ward supervisors. In addition, there are four ward aides and 16 other service persons, Staff education classes are held monthly. All staff nurses are members of the Trained Nurses Association of India and some attended a Nursing Service Workshop on new trends in nursing while a representative went to a meeting of T.N.A.I. in Bangalore.

In the field of Public Health, home visits, ante-natal clinics and baby clinics are carried on weekly. The Hospital received Recognition from the Secretary of the Mid-India Board of Examiners. Nursing statistics include: Deliveries 183; normal 143, abnormal 40 (Caesarian 19); total in-patient days 32,528 or a daily average of 98; total out patient days 10,689 or a daily average of 37. The report was submitted by A. Wilson, assistant director of Nursing Services.

There is a hospital chaplain who uses tapes, tracts and posters in addition to preaching and counselling individuals and groups. He leads weekly Bible classes with the Staff and student nurses and conducts morning devotions daily in the Assembly Hall. Religion statistics show that of the 6,311 new out patients there were 3,440 Hindus; 1,830 Bhils (animist); 509 Christians; and 532 Muslims. Musa Abey is the Hospital Chaplain.

The School of Nursing experienced good times and bad times during 1974. All students passed their exams this year, In June five III-year and 6 mid-wifery students graduated. At year-end there are 40 students: 11 in first year, 12 in second year, 11 in third year and 5 in fourth year with one special student. Soaring prices

are threatening to hinder the progress of the school, according to Pauline Brown, Director of Nursing Education.

THE CHRISTIAN RURAL HEALTH SERVICES have expanded spectacularly

this year with units at Barwani, Mendha and Jobat.

At Barwani regular services included home visiting, health and family planning instruction, use of family record cards and retainer health cards, clinics for pre and post-natal, baby and TB and in addition a complete set of records of all contacts, diseases, illness and treatments; also immunization and control programs in villages, and referrals to hospital in Mandleshwar. Ida White went monthly from Jobat to Barwani to supervise the work. Doreen Morrison returned from Canada in September to become director again. There were also two A.N.M. nurses full-time with one staff nurse and one graduate public health nurse part-time. Nurses travelled to nearby villages on foot and longer distances by bus.

In Mendha a survey was made of two more villages with physical check-up for about half the population, health teaching and demonstrations in groups, clinics and home visits. Services also included an annual physical check-up of school children in Amkhut, Mendha and Sardi with treatment when necessary. When crops failed relief work was carried on and the use of Soya bean and peanut flour was introduced for protein needs in diet. The response of the villagers has been encouraging: more attention to family planning, invitation to re-open work, maternity patients coming to health centres for delivery. S. Tezlo is the director with graduate

nurses and A.N.M. nurses serving full or part-time.

At Jobat the team undertook to make a survey of the population of about 1,000 to determine reasons for non-use of facilities at the hospital and to decrease both birth and death rates. Program included instruction in family planning, hygiene and nutrition: 947 visits; physical examinations 243; patients treated 254, clinics 20. A jeep was acquired in December to assist in the work. Staff included the director of Public Health nursing and two A.N.M. then'a graduate nurse. A former evangelist worked as attendant and was invaluable in building understanding with people in the villages. Staff from all three mobile units participated in a number of activities together.

### KOREAN CHRISTIAN CHURCH IN JAPAN

Implementation of the Basic Mission Policy, adopted by the General Assembly of 1973, was the main matter of concern throughout 1974. It aims at the liberation of every aspect of peoples' life, both spiritual redemption and the attainment of human rights. To this end one of the most ambitious events ever sponsored by the K.C.C.J. was the May Consultation on "Minority Issues and Mission Strategy" with over 80 delegates from 15 different countries, held in the city of Kyoto. It attempted to discover the creative role of oppressed minorities and to create solidarity among the oppressed.

The tense situation in Korea was a matter of grave concern, expressed in a variety of overt actions such as a public statement in support of the Human Rights Declaration of the National Christian Council of Korea, a hunger strike by members of the youth council, fund raising for families of Christians imprisoned in Korea, a petition to President Chung-Hee Park to release these prisoners, and special prayer

vigils on their behalf.

The report notes with sadness the death of a pastor, Y. J. An, but also notes the ordination of four young men to the ministry and the reception of a missionary from Korea. Two theological post-graduates were sent to Korea for special leadership training.

#### Education

The Department of Education of the church emphasized the need for theological reflection and retraining for the mission to this generation. The workers-elders conference on "Today's Church and Mission" helped clarify and re-affirm that the proclamation of the gospel and participation in the sufferings of society are essentially one task. The young peoples' conference tackled the question "What is a real living faith amid the concrete realities of life in Japan today?" It was made

clear that for young people to find their own identity they had to identify with the sufferings and rejection of their fellow Koreans in Japan.

#### Social Action

In attempting to establish basic human rights for Koreans in Japan action was taken in the struggle against employment discrimination, particularly in the Hitachi Corporation; and in support of a young man in his battle against unjust deportation laws; and also in aiding victims of the atomic bomb. In all of these and other issues the Korean Church worked closely with concerned Japanese churches. A gift of over \$2,000 was raised to aid victims of a typhoon in Korea.

The Korean Christian Centre in Osaka has completed its first three years laying foundations and is now an effective agent for renewal in the community. Discrimination against Koreans in a local kindergarten and in a women's junior college was eliminated while the struggle against the exclusion of Koreans from public housing and against discrimination that is holding up the building of a Korean school in

Kyoto.

The Research Action Institute for Koreans in Japan (R.A.I.K.) was established in 1974 as a resource centre on specific issues facing Koreans in Japan and to support movements towards the attainment of basic human rights.

Inter-church relations were fostered by visits on the part of the Moderator, Dr.

In Ha Lee and the General Secretary, K. S. (Sam) Choi.

Three major issues impressed the General Secretary during his first year of office: the need for unity in our common task of evangelism; the need for education for mission; and the need for an attitude of mutual support between the local church and the General Assembly.

Missionary Personnel

R. K. Anderson and family returned to Canada in June after 8 years of faithful service in Japan and were commissioned as missionaries of the K.C.C.J. to do extension work in Canada, In September Susan Tucker arrived from Canada as an Overseas Volunteer under the B.W.M. teaching art at the Christian Academy of Japan, while Dawn Ross became a full term appointee of the B.W.M. as editortypist for the Urban Rural Mission Committee of the Christian Conference of Asia. Jack McIntosh and his family are in Osaka where Jack is program co-ordinator of the Korean Christian Centre. Glen Davis and family are in Fukuoka where Glen is pastor of the Korean congregation. Mavis Hyndman is secretary in the General Affairs office of the K.C.C.J. situated in Tokyo.

#### MALAWI

Church of Central Africa Presbyterian

There are four Presbyteries in this Synod (Blantyre) with over 190,000 adult communicants. Besides the Malawian ministers there are five expatriates - two of whom are Canadians.

Brian Crosby, head of Program of the ecumenical Christian Service Committee of Malawi, is still interested and active in the youth work at Likubula House. Funds from the Presbyterian Church in Canada have assisted work among young people and the accommodation at Likubula House.

Chas. A. Scott serves as an associate minister at the Cathedral of St. Michael and All Angels in Blantyre. He is involved in youth work in the congregation and teaches classes at Kapeni Theological College.

There is a Women's Guild in every congregation and in almost every Prayer House. There are four full-time women workers and every effort is being made to increase their number.

The United Lay Training Centre at Chilema, Kasupe is a joint venture pioneered by Anglicans and Presbyterians which have recently been joined by Baptists and Roman Catholics. Here laymen/women are trained in Bible studies, hygiene, home economics, agriculture and homecraft.

The Theological College is situated at Kapeni. It has 22 students and four tutors, two of these being expatriates. Twelve of the students are married and the accommodation required for their families calls for a building expansion program. Wives of the ministerial students are taught homecraft, sewing and cookery usually by the wives of the expatriates on the faculty. Scholarships are available for ordained ministers under 35 years of age to study overseas. In 1974 there were two such scholarship students, one at St. Andrew's College, Scotland, the other at Knox College, Toronto until he left Canada to complete his doctoral studies at Aberdeen, Scotland. With the assistance of some of the overseas churches new manses have been completed and several old manses renovated.

Ulongwe Hospital at Mulanje provides women's ante-natal clinics, child care, maternity cases and under-five clinics. Staff is not adequate to meet the needs of the area and Synod is requesting two more doctors, five nurses and "a number" of mid-wives at its immediate personnel askings. Courses for nurses and mid-wives are given at the hospital. A hospital administrator is also urgently required. The Synod is looking to overseas churches to meet some of these personnel needs.

## THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH OF NIGERIA

The Annual Meeting of the Synod was held in July 1974, Several "eminent Presbyterians" from different walks of life and different parts of the country were invited to attend as observers, including a High Court Judge, lawyers, medical doctors, administrators and businessmen. Their presence and their contributions during debate enriched the life and resolutions of the Court.

Two far reaching decisions were made at that meeting. The first was to suspend for at least five years the Constitution of the Church which calls for setting up a General Assembly, and increased Synods and Presbyteries. This reflected the fact that the church has neither the finances nor personnel for such a heavy superstructure and also prevented the church from being divided into two Synods on an ethnic or tribal basis which might have proved disastrous from the point of view of unity and co-operation.

The second decision provided a reform and restructuring of Synod Committees and a reduction in numbers so that they can be better manned and do their work

more effectively.

There are 55 ordained and assistant ministers, 51 evangelists and 9 church sisters ministering to 19,519 communicant members plus 2,963 baptized adherents, not including catechumens and other worshippers. There are 436 congregations organized under 50 sessions grouped into 6 Presbyteries under one Synod. In many rural parishes the pulpit is supplied by ruling elders, most of whom are not too knowledgeable of the scriptures. "Lack of staff remains the main limiting factor of the pastoral ministry."

Of significance was the growth and rapid expansion in 1974 of the Presbyterian Church into the towns and urban areas of the Federation of Nigeria. The congregations established in Benin, Warri, Sapele and Agbor have been developed into the "Mid-Western Parish" under the direction of the Yaba Session in Lagos Presbytery with the minister in charge, B. A. Ekubi. In the north the work developed to such an extent that Kaduna/Zaria, Kano and Jos have been set up as three separate congregations. In Enugu the work of the minister, Jas. U. Ukaegbu has been so effective that he has established Presbyterian Churches in the nearby towns of Awka and Onitsha.

The Presbyterian Church life seems to appeal to those who love a democratic way of life. The report continues, "The future of the Presbyterian Church in Nigeria is full of hope, if we resist the temptation to become a sect and if we welcome every good thing in the Nigerian way of life which is not contrary to our fundamental articles of faith and creed." Reference is made to the importance of concentrating more effort on the urban areas where the young people are. The strategy outlined for the immediate future is to post expatriates (missionaries) of maturity to these areas to work side by side with Nigerian colleagues.

Evangelism has come to the fore within the past few years as a matter of primary emphasis. Formerly, the work was heavily weighted towards Education and Medical Services. In 1974 most Presbyteries have held evangelistic campaigns. Synod made the decision to re-open the Hugh Goldie College in Arochuku for the training of evangelists, and a director of competence and maturity and a staff will start work in early 1975. Decision was also made to develop Ikot Obong for training Church Sisters. It is hoped that evangelism supported by a community development and social welfare program as was launched in Ezzikwo in 1959 and disrupted by the civil war, will soon be re-activated. There are signs that this would be welcome and Synod took steps to provide staff accordingly.

Rural Work: The Presbyterian Church is still predominantly a rural church and the opportunities are immense, but severely hampered by lack of funds and properly trained personnel. The present program includes rehabilitating and expanding the Itu Leper Colony Farm, Yakurr and Mbembe plantations in Ogoja Presbytery and the integrated program of rural uplift at Echara in Ezzikwo. The Revolving Goat Scheme has gained a new lease on life and will be expanded. Objectives of the Rural Work Program are to raise the standards of well-being of the people by modernizing agriculture, to assist community service projects, to create employment opportunities and incentives to keep young people from migrating to urban areas in search of non-existent jobs or those for which they have no qualifications. There are some large tracts of fertile agricultural land at the church's disposal.

Medical Work: The following have all been physically rehabilitated after the destruction of the civil war: the Mary Slessor Joint Hospital at Itu, the Eja Memorial Hospital at Itigidi, the Uburu Joint Hospital with extension services for rural health and leprosy work and the Akahaba Joint Hospital at Abiriba. By early 1975 it is expected that each of the church's medical institutions will have two doctors. The generous assistance of the overseas churches in this program of rehabilitation and reconstruction is gratefully acknowledged.

A survey of the Queen Elizabeth Hospital in Umuahia for which the Presbyterian Church shares responsibility with the Anglican and Methodist Churches disclosed the fact that bad administration plus irregular and insufficient government subvention had produced a situation which treatens the continued existence of the hospital. Negotiations are under way with the government of East Central State to take over.

Church Organizations include the Women's Guild, Youth Fellowship, Boys' Brigade, Christian Girls Club, Boy Scout Movement and Men's Christian Association. The first two are singled out in the report as filling an important role in the life of the church. As evidence of this the Ohafia Youth Rally is cited with an

attendance of over 4,000.

In Aro/Ohafia Presbytery there are 32 branches of the Christian Girls Club with 1,280 members; 47 Youth Fellowship groups with over 2,900 members; 46 Sunday Schools with total membership of over 10,000; 18 companies of the Boys' Brigade and 23 Boy Scout Troops, Other Presbyteries are being stimulated to

similar activity.

The report, submitted by the Clerk of Synod, Nwachuku Eme, concludes by pointing out that it is full of signs of hope for which he expresses gratitude to all involved and a complete confidence in God who has led them hitherto and who will supply all their needs "according to His riches in glory in Christ Jesus".

#### THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN TAIWAN

The statistics published in 1974 showed a slight increase in membership after several years of no increase or of decline. It was hoped that this was due, in part at least, to more positive participation in the Faithful Servant Movement which was in

its third year.

If interest in evangelism and outreach will bear fruit in the growth of churches then there should be a notable burgeoning of the church in Taiwan in the next few years. In the spring of 1974 the Asian Bishops of the Roman Catholic Church held a conference on evangelism in Taipei. An observer from the Christian Conference of Asia was present and representatives of the Presbyterian Church were invited to attend. In July about 15 church leaders from Taiwan (five of them ministers of the Presbyterian Church) attended the Congress on World Evangelization in Lausanne. Explo '74 was held in Seoul in August and over two hundred from Taiwan were present. In the fall the China Evangelical Fellowship held a conference on the evangelization of Asia.

It remains to be seen whether all this activity at the world and regional level will have much effect at the level of local witness and service. An increasing interest in the Church Growth principles of Dr. McGavran is taking place in Taiwan, but a great part of it seems to be missionary oriented with only limited participation by the Chinese. In the Presbyterian Church many rural churches were still lacking pastors and the number of graduates from the two Theological Colleges could not

Progress was made in the Christian Education project to develop a new curriculum for Sunday Schools. It was decided to make Tainan Theological College the centre for preparation of education materials.

Credit Unions continue to be promoted in the mountains and in rural churches on the plains and have proved to be a great help both to church and community.

Some progress was made in the relation between the plains and tribal churches. Four Presbyteries have been set up on a tribal and linguistic basis besides the 11 plains Presbyteries. Mountain churches that are not strong enough to form Presbyteries have been organized into districts loosely attached to the nearest Presbyteries. Taichung Presbytery invited all the tribal churches in the area to full participation in the Presbytery, and other Presbyteries, on the recommendation of the Assembly Executive, are considering a similar action, A committee set up by Assembly recommended eventual integration of the tribal and plains churches and the dissolution of the special Mountain Work Committee. Problems to be worked out are those of language, the lower level of salaries and education in the mountain churches, and the great distances to be travelled.

The Church Weekly continued to be extremely useful, though financially in the red. Unless its circulation can be increased it remains a question how long it can

continue to be published.

The translation of the New Testament into the Tayal language by the Rev. Clare McGill was completed in 1974 after 18 years of labour. The tribal translations are printed in a modification of the Chinese phonetic script along with the Chinese text of the Bible, and the Department of Education has given its approval to this form of printing. It is hoped that distribution of these translations may continue without interference.

When the Principal-elect of Yu Shan Theological Institute suddenly resigned in the summer the Rev. Murray Garvin was appointed Acting Principal for a two year

period.

In the fall two new missionary couples arrived from Canada and two couples and a single missionary from the Presbyterian Church in the United States. Two families of the Reformed Church in America were denied visas to return in 1974

after furloughs.

In December about 40 leaders from different areas of the church's life met near Changhua for a three day conference on Dialogue with the World Church. It was generally agreed that in this day when Taiwan is increasingly isolated in the diplomatic world it is important to strengthen international church connections as much as possible. Practical conclusions for the Presbyterian Church were (1) that we need a systematic plan of education for church members so that they be better informed and able to witness, (2) that unity needs to be strengthened at the congregational, Presbytery and General Assembly levels and a spirit of service encouraged, (3) that there must be provision for more participation by women in planning and decision making, and (4) that an overall plan for the church's finance was necessary.

Church membership rose only slightly in 1973 over 1971, but givings almost doubled. In 1974 givings also increased and there was a very good response to appeals for relief at home and overseas. Over U.S. \$2,500 was sent for relief aid to

the Sahel, India and Bangladesh.

In spite of inflation the churches kept up support of their ministers at the local level. Adequate support for Assembly level administration and institutions continued to be a problem and various plans have been suggested for seeking a firmer financial basis. One of these is to erect a multi-storied building on the site of the student centre known as Friendship Corner which could provide adequate space for a Student Centre, Church offices, staff apartments and some rental space to produce income. Negotiations are being carried on with the Presbyterian Church in the U.S. for permission for the property to be developed in this way.

On the diplomatic front, official ties between the Republic of China and five more countries were severed during the year, leaving 31 with which diplomatic relations are maintained. When Japan entered an air relationship with the People's Republic of China, Taiwan stopped all Japanese aircraft from entering Taiwan airspace and dropped its own flights to Japan and Korea. This meant a severe economic loss for the airlines of both countries. Over the year there was a slight

decrease in the total number of foreign visitors.

Premier Chiang Ching-kuo continued to gain popular support for his programs, especially through visits to the farmers and fishermen of rural Taiwan.

#### UNITED MISSION TO NEPAL

The Presbyterian Church in Canada through its Board of World Mission became one of the co-operating mission agencies within the U.M.N. and appointed Lillian Wilton to serve as a nurse in 1974. Educational material is available from the B.W.M. office and an audio-visual is in process of preparation. Mr. Frank Wilcox, Executive Secretary of the U.M.N. has submitted a report for the year which is summarized below.

The National Education Plan, a forward-looking plan, is taking over schools formerly administered by the Mission. In Kathmandu, the Girls High School is now

a part of the new education system, and missionary teachers have been seconded to work under the District Education Office.

King Birendra is interested in the overall development of the country and the government has introduced new and helpful Health Service programs, with a stress on training paramedical workers such as assistant mid-wives, auxiliary health workers and health assistants. The U.M.N. is working closely with government in establishing integrated health services at the local level combining immunization programs, sanitation, hygiene and simple treatment of childhood diseases.

Road building goes on apace and the new East-West Highway is planned to link all parts of the southern strip of the country, the Terai. In the Kathmandu Valley a new and innovative transportation system has been initiated with the assistance of the People's Republic of China. A trolley-bus system is planned to link Kathmandu, the capital with Bhaktapur, ten miles distant, to be completed early in 1975. It is designed to handle the heavy commuter traffic between these centres.

Though poverty is widespread, the kingdom of Nepal is self-sufficient in food

grains and even exports grain to India.

A major change in the work of the U.M.N. in 1974 has been transferring Bhaktapur Hospital to the Ministry of Health. The Hospital has been administered by the U.M.N. for the past 20 years and the centre of its work in that district. Government is building a larger hospital there and has a policy of only one such hospital in each area. The U.M.N. hospital was turned over on December 17 and

both missionary and national staff were re-assigned to other projects.

In the Shanta Bhawan Hospital, the largest administered by the U.M.N., the Nurses Training Program continued to provide nurses for hospitals and public health services throughout the country. The community health program will enter into an integrated Community Health Service in the Lalitpur district early in 1975. The hospital itself enjoyed a record year in terms of volume of patients and medical services provided. A new agreement is being drawn up with government setting forth the relationship of the U.M.N. hospital to the district hospital which will extend the mission's opportunity for service and witness in that area for several years to come.

The U.M.N. has been heavily involved in the Boys' Boarding School (c. 300 students) in the city of Pokhara in Central Nepal. Building has progressed steadily

but slowly because of increased costs.

In Butwal a new Butwal Technical Institute Board has been set up to prepare for the transfer of the Technical Institute into Nepali leadership and administration within the next three or four years. The Butwal Plywood Factory has been engaged in trial production for part of the year and seems to be developing into an industrial project of considerable size and significance.

New member bodies accepted into the U.M.N. in 1974 include: the Mennonite Central Committee, Akron, PA.; The Presbyterian Church in Canada and the Swedish Free Mission. The Protestant Episcopal Church in the U.S.A. withdrew from membership this year. At the close of 1974 about 188 workers were on the

roster of the Mission.

The Executive Secretary hopes to be able to report in the very near future the successful completion of negotiations going on at the year-end for a general agree-

ment with government for another five year term of service as a mission.

The U.M.N. has no official relationship with the church in Nepal but maintains very cordial relations and active fellowship with local congregations. There have been "significant movements of the spirit among Nepali people in three or four parts of the land" and several new Christians have been reported.

#### **OVERSEAS SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM**

The report covers four overseas students who studied in Canada and two in Japan.

Saindi D. Chiphangwi: from Malawi, the Church of Central Africa Presbyterian, Synod of Blantyre, received his B.A. and his theological training in Malawi; practical experience in Scotland and one year study in theology at Knox College,

Toronto. His goal is to achieve his doctoral status for general theological leadership in Africa. Early in 1974 he went to Aberdeen, Scotland to continue his studies under the title: The Nature of Christian Expansion in Malawi.

Ogbu Kalu: from Nigeria, the Presbyterian Church; undergraduate work at University of Toronto; M.A., McMaster; Ph.D. in History, U. of T. followed by complete course in theology at Princeton Theological Seminary, N.J. which he accomplished in two years. His goal is to be qualified in theology and an academic field to work at the University level in training students for the ministry of the Presbyterian Church of Nigeria. In the summer of 1974 he returned to Nigeria and was appointed as lecturer in history at the University of Nigeria in Nsukka. His wife is an assistant lecturer in education.

Mbeke Okore: from Nigeria, the Presbyterian Church; she received elementary school teacher training in Nigeria and successfully completed the two year diploma course at Ewart College, Toronto. She has also done several semesters at Victoria University, Toronto. She spent six weeks in 1974 in Nigeria visiting her mother and consulting with church leaders. Her goal is to teach church sisters in Nigeria.

Haimdat Sawh: from Guyana Presbyterian Church; graduated from Union Theological Seminary at Kingston Jamaica; minister of Better Hope Parish in Guyana. In 1974-75 he worked on his M. Div. at Knox College, Toronto. His goal is a graduate degree in theology to upgrade himself for the work of the church in Guyana. At the completion of his present studies an assessment will be made of the value of further studies.

In Taiwan two mountain work leaders were recommended for further training by the Scholarship Committee of the Presbyterian Church in Taiwan; they were

accepted with bursary aid at Tsulukawa Rural Institute, Japan.

#### WOMAN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY, E.D. REPORT FOR 1974

To the Venerable the 101st General Assembly:

The Executive of the Woman's Missionary Society, Eastern Division, respectfully submits the following report for the year 1974.

#### Constitution

The 98th Annual Meeting of the Woman's Missionary Society, E.D., meeting in Sydney, N.S. in May 1974, adopted a Revised Constitution. Some revisions had become necessary in view of changing structures of the church, and particularly the integration of mission administration in the Board of World Mission. At the same time a general revision was undertaken to clarify procedures and the duties of officers. Under the revised Constitution we have reverted to the academic year as our fiscal and reporting year, and reports for the interim period of 18 months, January 1974 — June 1975, will be received at the 99th Annual Meeting in September. Statistics given in this report as to membership are from 1973 reports.

#### Centennial

1975-76 marks not only the Centennial of the organization of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society in Halifax, 1876, but also 150 years since the first recorded missionary society met in Malpeque, Prince Edward Island, in 1825. It is appropriate that our 99th Annual Meeting will be held in the Kirk of St. James, Charlottetown, with a special service in Malpeque.

Other Centennial plans include the preparation of histories of each presbyterial and a general history of the Society, which is being prepared by Miss Margaret Sylvester, former President. Auxiliaries have been asked to contribute to a special Centennial Fund to finance special projects, such as visits from women leaders from

Another Centennial project is the re-location of the Archives of the Society from Charlottetown to the more central St. James' Church in Truro, and steps are being taken to re-organize and preserve the historic records gathered over many years. We are grateful to The Kirk of St. James in Charlottetown where the Archives have been housed for so long.

#### Co-operation in Mission

Our 1974 contribution to the Budget of the Board of World Mission was \$28,000. (slightly more than in 1973), and special grants through the B.W.M. totalled \$3,200., of which \$1,400. was given by Girls' and Children's groups for work in Port Harcourt and Logan Avenue, Winnipeg, and toward the translation of the Tayal New Testament.

Three members of the Eastern Division Executive are representatives on the Board of World Mission, and our Mission Secretary, Mrs. E. H. Bean, is a member of the B.W.M. Executive and various committees. Missionary visits arranged by the B.W.M. have been greatly appreciated, and we were privileged to have Rev. Malcolm Ransom and Mr. and Mrs. Jack Geddes as speakers at the 98th Annual Meeting.

#### Christian and Mission Education

During 1974 two deaconesses served under the direction of Synod or a presbytery:

Miss Christine Shaw, Presbytery Deaconess, Halifax/Lunenburg.

Miss Jean Clarke, Synod Deaconess.

The deaconesses have given leadership in all areas of Christian Education, and have co-operated with E.D. Executive and presbyterial officers in mission education and leadership training conferences and workshops. E.D. grants for camping last summer totalled \$1,575., including \$275. for "Camperships" from Girls' and Children's groups, and \$900. for new developments in the camping programs. Many of our members are active in Sunday School, camping and youth groups.

Mission Education is a vital part of W.M.S. meetings, and the Education Com-

mittee has endeavoured to assist groups in the use of study programs and available resources through workshops, circulars, and the inclusion of mission information and program suggestions in the "Presbyterian Message".

Purpose of the Society

We ask your prayers as we seek to fulfil the aims and purpose as defined in the Revised Constitution: "to support the mission endeavours of the Presbyterian Church in Canada through the Board of World Mission, Atlantic Synod and presbyteries within its bounds; and to unite women and girls and children in prayer, study and service to this end."

#### REPORT OF THE WOMEN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY, WESTERN DIVISION

To the Venerable the 101st General Assembly:

The Council Executive of The Women's Missionary Society, W.D. respectfully

submits the following report of the Society's work for the year 1974.

Council Executive met regularly during the year to receive and consider reports from its various Committees and to hear reports from its representatives on the Board of World Mission, the Board of Congregational Life and on various Presbyterian and Interdenominational Committees. National and Overseas News was presented each month, missionaries on furlough from Overseas and those serving in Canada met with the Executive when it was possible. In that way the members of

the Executive were kept informed about the work in which the women of the Society share.

In April Mrs. J. M. Burnett shared in the Conference of the Women's Association of the Guyana Presbyterian Church which was attended by 200 women.

Mrs. J. M. Burnett completed her term as President of the Society at the Annual Council Meeting in May 1974 at which time Mrs. J. A. Newstead was elected President.

The Women's Missionary Society serves in cooperation with the Board of World Mission and the Board of Congregational Life — to the B.W.M. it contributes financial support monthly to a total of \$345,000 in 1974; to the B.C.L. the services of National and Area Educational Staff who are considered Associate Staff of that Board. Representatives of the Society serve on Boards, Executives and Committees of these Boards.

The Society takes seriously its responsibility in providing for and making available missionary education resource material and resource people to assist leaders and officers in groups throughout the Church. Involved in this are the National and Area Staff employed by the Society as well as members of Adult Work, Girls' Work, and Children's Work Committees.

The following staff serve through the Education Department:

Area Edcuational Resource Staff

Western Region:

Miss Barbara Woodruff, Miss Brenda Moncrieff.

Eastern Region:

Miss Margaret Boyd, Miss Lois Powrie, Miss Dorothy Keller, Miss Evelyn Murdoch, Miss Mary-Lou Funston (until the end of 1974), Miss Jean Gardner.

For part of 1974 many groups used materials on the theme "Why Christian Mission Today". Beginning in the Autumn of 1974 emphasis was on the Centennial of The Presbyterian Church in Canada. The Adult Committee in cooperation with the Missionary Education Department of the B.W.M. prepared programme suggestions to accompany the Centennial Popular Missions Report — "Unknown Country"; the Girls' Committee prepared material for Teenagers — "Cause for Celebration" and the Children's Committee provided "Celebrating 100 Years" for Explorers and C.O.C. groups as well as for other groups of junior age and primary children

The magazine Glad Tidings provided current information supplemented by "Alive" leaflet which many congregations distributed in various ways. In October the resignation of Mrs. Laura Plummer as Editor of Glad Tidings was accepted with regret. The Society is grateful to the former editor, Mrs. Helen Young for carrying on the editorial work until a new editor is appointed.

The W.M.S. Book Room is the channel through which resource materials are distributed to individuals and active Synodical and Presbyterial Literature Secretaries who make the materials known in their areas. All the mission study packets

proved to be popular as well as Bible Studies and devotional books. At the close of 1974 the Book Room was able to make a financial contribution to the General Fund of the Society.

Many reports in relation to Adult, Girls' and Children's Groups from Synodicals are incomplete as some groups fail to report; however reports show interest and concern in groups of all ages, as they endeavour to help meet the needs of their own Church and community and share in the wider mission in Canada and in other lands. A total of 830 Adult groups were reported with a membership of 18,514; Girls' Groups 123, membership 1,406; Children's Groups 372 were reported and

It is evident from reports that there could be more youth groups if more adults were willing to give leadership. It is hoped the 60th Anniversary year of C.G.I.T. will inspire greater interest.

Throughout the year many groups had visits from missionaries as well as from members of Council Executive, National and Area Staff. The deputation of missionaries was planned in cooperation with the Missionary Education Department of the B.W.M.

Finances - The groups of the Women's Missionary Society, W.D. increased their financial givings substantially in 1974 contributing as is indicated below:

The resignation of Miss Myrtle Rose who had served as Assistant to the Treasurer and to the Secretary for fifteen years was accepted with regret and took effect the end of August. Miss Marjorie McMullin was appointed as Assistant to the Treasurer, Mrs. W. H. Adamson, beginning in September. Mrs. Mary Shepherd serves as Secretary and is responsible for work related to Life Membership.

Supply Fund - Through the Supply Department needed dollars for materials for work at home and Overseas are contributed. The "supply" dollar is a part of the W.M.S. share in the work administered by the B.W.M. as well as supplying materials for Educational Work. In addition to money generous gifts of material supplies are given to institutions of the church and other institutions across Canada.

Christian Literature - For many years the Women's Missionary Society has helped to provide Christian Literature in many lands. In addition to the money given to the B.W.M. the Society contributes \$11,400. in Christian Literature grants. That money assisted in providing Christian Literature in many areas of the world, Japan, the Philippines, Taiwan, Costa Rica Literacy Centre for the Caribbean and South America, Nigeria, African Literature Centre in Kitwe, Zambia, All Africa Council of Churches, Chinese Christian Literature Council in Hong Kong and \$1,500. was contributed to the Canadian Bible Society. In Canada grants were given to help provide a Library at the Kenora Fellowship Centre, Literature in French for use in Quebec, to Evangelical Truth, a Ukrainian magazine. Special gifts in addition to the \$11,400. permitted additional grants to provide Sunday School material for Indian Children in Canada, Bible Commentaries to Burma and to Messiah's Minstrels for literature to distribute as they travelled during the Summer of 1974.

The interest and enthusiasm demonstrated throughout 1974 indicates that Centennial year will find the women of the Society supporting the Church's Mission as

#### REPORT OF THE CLERKS OF ASSEMBLY RE: OVERTURE 4, 1975, PRESBYTERY OF VANCOUVER ISLAND, RE: ADDITIONAL COPIES OF ACTS AND PROCEEDINGS

To the Venerable the 101st General Assembly:

There have been many suggestions made over the years for better, or additional, distribution of Acts and Proceedings. Some congregations want more; some don't think they need any. Some order extras; others use them to support the short leg of the table. While the argument grows, the cost of production goes up.

The biased opinion of the Clerks of Assembly is that the Book is second only to the Book of Books. We believe that it could be used for missionary studies, doctrinal studies and general information of The Presbyterian Church in Canada. The first fifty pages of the Appendices give an excellent view of the work of our church at home and overseas. Every Committee and Board tells the story of their activities. The Financial story is there for those whose interest may lie in this area. We think we could go beyond the prayer of the overture in making this book available to our constituency, and recommend the following procedure for distribution

1. A copy to each minister on the Constituent Roll.

2. A copy to each Session Clerk.

3. A copy to each Representative Elder.

4. A copy to each Church Treasurer.

5. Additional copies to any congregation which submits its order on the Statistical Report Forms in a space provided for that purpose and at a cost which will be set annually by the Clerks in consultation with the printers. (We suggest \$2.50 per copy for 1976 to cover printing and shipping.) The books would be mailed as early as possible to Presbytery Clerks, with an itemized sheet for distribution to each congregation as set out above.

Section 312 requires that a copy of Acts and Proceedings be mailed to "each member of session in all congregations that have contributed to the Assembly Fund during the year then preceding." By general consent, this has not been followed for decades, and the Clerks cannot recall a single instance of any congregation demanding it. The cost would be prohibitive. The Clerks are of opinion that this Section of the Book of Forms should be brought up to date, but are unwilling to send down an amendment under the Barrier Act at this time. They desire to find the response of the Church to the plan outlined in the paragraph immediately above, following which, say in two years' time, an amendment for Section 312 will

be prepared and submitted under the Barrier Act. Such an amendment will not of necessity follow the paragraph referred to, but may be devised to give flexibility, under stated control, as to mailings.

#### RECOMMENDATION:

That the prayer of the Overture be granted as outlined in the body of this report, being effective with the 1976 Acts and Proceedings.

#### THE PRESBYTERIAN RECORD

To the Venerable the 101st General Assembly:

The Record Committee is pleased to report that the increase in price authorized by the last General Assembly has not resulted in any substantial loss of subscriptions. On March 31 we had 89,847 paid subscribers, a gain of 117 over 1974. We lost 12 congregations from the Every Home Plan but we gained 23 congregations, mostly small in membership. This is significant under the circumstances.

The price of paper continues to rise so dramatically that the increases in production costs are not being met by the better return on subscriptions. Reluctantly we have had to sacrifice the quality of the magazine by using a lower

grade of high quality newsprint, beginning in March of this year.

The centennial issue in January with its extra four pages was made possible by a special grant of \$1,600 from the Administrative Council. In December, 1974 The Record received a cheque for \$400 from the trustees of Ailsa Craig Presbyterian Church in Ontario. They wrote: "We wish this money to be used by the editor or staff of The Presbyterian Record for travel in the church to cover events for material as articles in The Record, especially in connection with the church centennial in 1975 — over and above the budget for The Presbyterian Record."

We are deeply grateful to the Ailsa Craig congregation for this special gift and the concern for our budget problems that it demonstrates. No one on staff can recall ever receiving a gift of money of any size for The Record before and we

acknowledge it with great appreciation.

Our circulation manager, Miss Isabel S. Farquhar, retired on March 31 after more than 25 years of devoted service to The Record and nearly 27 years at the church offices. We expressed our deep appreciation and that of the church to Miss Farquhar following the annual meeting of our committee.

The Record Committee has no formal recommendation to this General Assembly. We solicit the support of all commissioners, particularly for the Every Home Plan through which 80% or more of a congregation's households may be-

come subscribers at half rate, \$1.50 per year.

#### THE PRESBYTERIAN COLLEGE REPORT OF THE SENATE, 1974-1975

To the Venerable the 101st General Assembly:-

The Senate of the Presbyterian College, Montreal, respectfully submits our annual report covering the Session 1974-75.

Our association with the Faculty of Religious Studies of McGill University

provides us with the advantages of an enlarged curriculum and Faculty, and has attracted an increasing enrolment of students.

Nineteen students are enrolled this Session in the various years leading to the B.Th., the M.A. or the S.T.M. degrees. These in addition to a number of students

completing their studies in Arts in preparation for Theological studies.

Our programme of Continuing Education for Ministers attracts an increasing number of Ministers from all parts of Canada. Sixty-five Ministers attended the four programmes held this year under an outstanding group of lecturers. Many of these men express enthusiasm for the courses offered and for the experience of returning to academic studies.

The L. W. Anderson Lectures were given this term by Professor James A. Sanders, B.D., Ph.D., D.Litt., Auburn Professor of Biblical Studies at Union Theological Seminary, New York, on the subject "Biblical Hermeneutics". These lectures have been provided since nineteen forty-nine through the generosity of the late Mr.

L. W. Anderson, a benefactor of the College across the years.

The one hundred and seventh annual Convocation was held on Wednesday, the eighth day of May, in the Church of St. Andrew and St. Paul. The Convocation address was delivered by the Reverend Agnew H. Johnston, M.A., D.D., Moderator of the ninety-ninth General Assembly. The Degree of Doctor of Divinity (Honoris Causa) was conferred on the Reverend John Samuel McBride, B.A., B.D. Diplomas and Professional Year Certificates were awarded to John Alexander Finlayson, B.A., B.Th.; Lloyd George Macdonald, B.A., B.Th.; Telford Earle Penfold, B.A., B.Th. and Harvey James Reichelt, B.A., M.A.; the licensing of the new graduates was conducted by the Reverend R. Stuart Johnson, B.A., M.A., B.D., M.Ed., Ph.D. Details of the scholarships, bursaries and prizes awarded during the year are shown in our Financial Statements.

A course for Clerks of Presbyteries and Synods, designed by the General As-

sembly, was held in the College in November and was well attended.

The Reverend Professor D. N. MacMillan again served most acceptably as Acting Principal, as well as teaching in the Faculty of Religious Studies of McGill University.

We acknowledge with gratitude the participation as special lecturers in the work of the Session of the Reverend E. Powell Aikens and the Reverend C. Ritchie

The Joint Board of the three Theological Colleges affiliated with McGill University co-operate in an extension programme of Theological education. Under the auspices of this Board, the Montreal Institute for Ministry functions. While active in the programme of the Institute, the Presbyterian College maintains its separate and distinct identity with complete autonomy in its own affairs and exercising its responsibilities to the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada. A Service of Installation and Dedication for the recently appointed Executive Director of the Institute, the Reverend Arthur Van Seters, a Presbyterian Minister, was held in the Presbyterian College on the first day of October.

The one hundred and eighth annual Convocation will be held on Wednesday, the seventh day of May, One thousand nine hundred and seventy-five, in the Church of St. Andrew and St. Paul. Professor James Barr, M.A., Ph.D., D.D., of the University of Manchester, England, will deliver the Convocation address. The Degree of Doctor of Divinity, honoris causa, will be conferred on the Reverend Robert P. Carter, B.A., B.D., M.R.E., and the Reverend William Lawson. There will be two students in the graduating class, John Chan and Donald MacLeod, B.Th.

1. That the Senate of the Presbyterian College be permitted to renew the appointment of the Reverend D. N. MacMillan as Acting Principal for a further year.

#### THE PRESBYTERIAN COLLEGE, MONTREAL NOTES TO 1974 FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

#### 1. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles appropriate for a non-profit organization. The College makes no charge for depreciation on buildings and equipment in the determination of annual operating results on the grounds that fixed assets, when replaced, will be financed from public or private donations. In order to provide for systematic write off of fixed assets, the Senate have during 1974 adopted the policy of recording depreciation on fixed assets by a direct charge against the Building and Maintenance Fund at the following rates (see Note 2):

Building - 2½% per annum (40 years) Equipment - 10% per annum (10 years)

Revenue from investments is recorded on a cash received basis, in accordance with a resolution of the Senate. Revenue from investments is treated as income of the General Fund with the exception of the portion thereof deemed to be earned by the Endowments for Scholarships which are allocated directly to Scholarship Funds Held for Disbursement.

#### 2. RETRO-ACTIVE ADJUSTMENT

As discussed in Note 1, the Senate during 1974 adopted the accounting policy of recording depreciation on buildings and equipment by a direct charge against the Building and Maintenance Fund. Depreciation has been recorded on a retro-active basis to the year 1963, and the previously reported 1973 figures have been appropriately amended.

#### 3. LAND

Land, which was acquired for nominal consideration as part of an exchange with McGill University, is shown at the value assigned by the Board of Management in 1961.

#### 4. SCHOLARSHIP FUNDS FOR DISBURSEMENT

This fund represents accumulated income on Endowments for Scholarships and contributions received for scholarships, bursaries and prizes not specifically donated to the Endowment Fund, less applicable disbursements to date.

The Senate has, in 1974, adopted the policy of making annual allocations to the General Fund from Scholarship Funds Held for Disbursement. As indicated above, these funds arise from income earned in prior years on Endowments for Scholarships and contributions for scholarships. #### THE COMMITTEE ON INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS

To the Venerable the 101st General Assembly:

#### 1. Structure of the Committee

- (a) Your committee initiated a meeting with those who suggested the general outline of the proposed Committee "The Church in the World"; has been in contact with the B.C.L.; and has prepared a working paper stating our position of two committees in compliance with Recommendation 13(b) O&P pages 424 and 78 to be discussed at the next Assembly.
- (b) Your committee recommends that the answer to the prayer of Overture 21, 1974 (Presbytery of Waterloo-Wellington pages 439-440 and 45) be that:
  - some aspects of the overture have been realized by the action of the 100th General Assembly, and
  - the remaining considerations are under advisement pending the outcome of the discussions of the 102nd General Assembly on the role of the Committee on International Affairs.

#### 2. Hunger

- (a) Wires were sent to Mr. E. Whelen (during The World Food Conference in Rome), Mr. A. MacEachen and the Prime Minister
  - 1. congratulating and supporting the Canadian Government in making a firm commitment to the World Food Depots.
  - urging Canada to take the initiative in setting up an International Body on Grain arrangements to consider both the price and location of regional food depots.
- (b) Further, letters were sent to the Canadian Government stressing that Canada through C.I.D.A. and in other ways, support and encourage population control and new agriculture developments which have proven successful in some parts of the third world.
- (c) We and the other denominations at The Ottawa Churchperson's Seminar sent the following recommendations to the Government:
  - That the Government of Canada be urged to initiate the formation of grain-storage banks in Canada and to press for and contribute to similar facilities to be established internationally.
  - the Government of Canada be urged to enact legislation restricting the sale or use of all arable land in Canada currently used for food production to other purposes.

#### 3. South Korea

- (a) Letters were sent to the General Secretary of the N.C.C. of Korea and the Canadian Embassy in Seoul expressing our support for the churches and our concern over the imprisonment of ministers and students.
- (b) A letter was sent to President Pak expressing our concern for the wellbeing of those expressing a desire to discuss the Constitution in a "free" country with copies to the Korean Embassy in Ottawa. The Canadian Embassy in Seoul and the Korean Desk of the Department of External Affairs in Ottawa.
- (c) We initiated steps to provide winter clothing for some prisoners in Korean iails.
- (d) We wrote to Mr. MacEachen, with a copy to the Prime Minister, stating our concern at the suppression of Freedom in South Korea and that Canada withhold aid to South Korea and in particular the sale of a nuclear reactor.

#### 4. C.I.D.A.

We supported the Ottawa Churchpeople's Seminar that the Government of

Canada make a significant reduction in the present proportion of aid for less developed countries which is tied to the restriction of purchase in Canada.

5. GATT-FLY

We urged the Canadian Churches to continue and increase their support of the work of Gatt-Fly.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS:

1. That recommendation 1(b) be adopted.

2. That the budget for this committee in 1976 be \$2,000.00.

The churches at present participating are: The United Presbyterian Church (North), the Presbyterian Church, U.S. (South), the United Church of Christ, the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, the Presbyterian Church in Canada and the United Church of Canada. The booklet contains devotional meditations for every day in the year, the material being written by writers selected from the churches involved. During 1974 our church was represented by Dr. H. S. Rodney, Prof, A. L. Farris and Miss Louise Reith. The Editoral Committee is seeking the service of good Canadian writers.

The Committee is grateful to THE RECORD for printing the scripture passages

The Committee is grateful to THE RECORD for printing the scripture passages used in THESE DAYS; to its chairman, Dr. L. H. Fowler, who prepared the message for the weekly bulletin in February which the Board of Congregational Life had

assigned for THESE DAYS; and to Mr. Ian MacEachern of Presbyterian Publications for distributing the magazine to congregations, institutions and individuals. During 1974 the average circulation was 8,390 as compared with an average of 8,255 in 1973. The total expense of the Committee was \$212,64 in 1974 as compared with \$220.88 in 1973.

The Committee continues to profit greatly by the interest and support of Dr.

E. A. Thomson.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS:

1. That Sessions commend the use of THESE DAYS to their congregations, and if they have not already done so, appoint a person or group to promote its use within the congregation.

That Sessions be encouraged to present a copy of THESE DAYS to each person uniting with the church, to parents presenting their children for baptism, and to couples uniting in marriage; and that copies be displayed in church vestibules.

That Presbyteries and congregations be asked to consider placing copies of THESE DAYS in hospitals, nursing homes, homes for senior citizens and in other appropriate places and institutions within the area served.

That ministers be encouraged to make use of THESE DAYS in their pastoral

#### THE CHURCH WORSHIP COMMITTEE

To the Venerable the 101st General Assembly:

With great sadness, the Church Worship Committee marks the passing of its convener, Dr. Homer McAvoy, B.A., B.D., Ph.D. It is hard to imagine that his insight and wisdom will be missing from our meetings. During his time as convener, Homer ably led and gave great inspiration to the committee and we thank God for his life.

The Book of Common Order:

The Book of Common Order (1964) has been of great concern to the Church Worship Committee during the past few years. Initially, our concern was for inclusion of the changes that were adopted by General Assembly in recent years and in 1973 the Committee was authorized to prepare necessary supplementary material to incorporate these changes (notably, the changes in the Preamble and Ordination questions; c.f. Acts and Proceedings, 1973, p. 289). However, during 1973 we were informed that the present stock of the Book of Common Order were becoming rapidly depleted and the question of a revision of the Book was being raised. Increasingly, we were being asked (e.g. at the briefing sessions prior to General Assembly) to include services in contemporary English in the Book. Hence, we were authorized by the 1974 General Assembly to revise the Book of Common Order incorporating the changes plus services in contemporary English (c.f. Acts and Proceedings, 1974, p. 473). Originally, we felt that this could be done without a wholesale revision: just changing parts of the Book. However, during the past year, Presbyterian Publications has informed us that stocks of the present Book are completely exhausted and that a new printing is needed.

Therefore we the Church Worship Committee feel that a complete revision is in order. We are recommending that a separate committee be established (Recommendation 2a): the job is too large in scope for the Church Worship Committee with its present numbers and budget. We suggest that the revision committee be seven in number (Recommendation 2b) and that it be given an adequate budget for meeting, etc. (Recommendation 2c).

For the time being, we are suggesting the use of the Book of Common Order of the Church of Scotland if our own Book is not available. Also suggested as further resources are the Worshipbook and Worship Now. All these are available through Presbyterian Publications.

Praise Ways:

The Church Worship Committee is happy to see that the work of the committee to prepare a supplement to the Book of Praise has born fruit and that Praise Ways is now ready. We would encourage our church to take this opportunity to "sing a new song" unto the Lord and use this new book to explore creative ways of worshipping our Lord.

Study on Worship:

The Church Worship Committee has undertaken a study on the subject of worship. After much interesting discussion, we endeavoured to prepare a statement on what worship is. This statement is included in our report with the recommendation that it be studied by ministers and sessions and that results be sent to our committee. (Recommendation 3).

#### What is Worship?

The relevancy of this question

There is within our church a searching for new forms of worship: traditional, contemporary, experimentation. This is a hopeful sign. There is, however, also a danger, i.e. that what satisfies the religious taste of a certain group of people at a certain time becomes the norm of worship ("doing their own thing"). But neither tradition nor what is "contemporary" is normative in worship. The Committee on Worship believes that only if we have a clear concept of the essence or worship will we be able to find new forms of celebration. That is why the question "What is Worship" is so relevant in the church today.

The Essence of Christian Worship

Christian worship is the meeting together of God and his people in the name of Jesus Christ, our Lord. (This is "public worship" as distinct from family and private worship).

Worship is meeting God as his people.1

Worship is determined by the character of the covenant relationship between God and his people. Even though this covenant is bilateral God is the one who took the initiative.<sup>2</sup> This applies also to the order of worship. First, God speaks to us and we listen to "the great things the Lord has done for us." Through the Word and the Sacraments the mighty acts of God of the past become contemporary by the operation of the Holy Spirit.

The worship service is theocentric. 5 Only after God has spoken can we respond

in adoration, repentence, prayer, praise, love and service.

Since worship is a dialogue, either God is speaking to his people or the people are speaking to God. There is a twofold movement - from God to man and from

Since we find ourselves in the presence of God, worship is always a matter of

awe, reverence, beauty, joy, initimacy.

Since we worship God, every word, every action and the "order" of worship itself should be considered very carefully. Such an "order" does not kill spontaneity; on the contrary, it will find its ever refreshing source in the revelation of God's love and greatness.

Since we worship God, it is the opposite of all man-centered worship. At the same time, taking refuge under the wings of God and praising him is man's salva-

tion.

b) We meet God as the people of God, the covenant community, as congrega-

tion. Worship is not a private affair: it is a corporate act, therefore he who leads in worship cannot act at pleasure. He is part of and represents the worshipping community. Even a congregation cannot do as it pleases, it is part of the communion of saints of all ages. Tradition is not normative, but the congregation is the heir of the rich treasures of the past.

Since worship is corporate, involvement of the people is essential.

Since we come together as God's people we can only worship in a spirit of

brotherly love, fellowship and of caring for one another.

c) Worship is meeting God as his people in the name of Jesus Christ. God is the Holy One, and against him, him only have we sinned. 8 Therefore, there is no other way to approach him but through our only mediator Jesus Christ. At the centre of the proclamation of the Word and of the Sacraments is the cross.

Worship and the World

Worship does not isolate the believing community from the contemporary world. The God of redemption is the God of creation.<sup>11</sup> Worship enables us to go back into the world and to be involved in the struggle of mankind in the light of God's saving action and in the assurance that he is going to make all things new. 12

Therefore the worship service is indispensable in order to live as God's people

in God's world.

New Forms of Worship

The worship committee welcomes every new form of worship and encourages churches to find new ways of celebration. At the same time we hope that this paper on "What is Worship" will help congregations to focus on the essence of the

worship service.

#### NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS **DECEMBER 31, 1974**

1. SUMMARY OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following is a summary of accounting policies followed by the Church. With the exception of the practice of valuing marketable securities at market

value rather than at acquisition cost, as set out in part (b) below, the financial statements have been prepared in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted for non-profit organizations.

Cash receipts

Contributions held by congregations at December 31, 1974 for Budget Revenue, for the National Development Fund and for the Inter-Church Aid Committee which were remitted to the Treasurer of the Church by January 14, 1975 have been included in revenue for the year in which they were given by members of the congregation. These amounts have been segregated for balance sheet purposes and designated as cash in transit.

Investment transactions and income

Investment transactions are accounted for on the trade date (date the order to buy or sell is executed).

Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis.

Dividend income is recorded on the date of declaration,

Realized gains and losses from investment transactions are recorded on the

transaction date. On the recommendation of The Trustee Board the Church follows the practice of valuing marketable securities at market value rather than at acquisition cost.

(c) Capitalization and depreciation

Fixed assets which are donated are recorded on the basis of fair market value at the time of acquisition. Other fixed assets are recorded at cost. Properties are depreciated at an annual rate of 3% of the cost until the

estimated net realizable value is attained.

Furniture and equipment are depreciated at an annual rate of 10% of the

Accumulated depreciation, covering all properties and furniture and fixtures, has been increased by \$150,980 (\$149,317 in 1973). This amount has been charged against unappropriated operating and property funds.

(d) Composition of assets and liabilities

- (i) The assets and liabilities of Knox, Presbyterian and Ewart Colleges, Saskatoon Residence, Armagh and St. Andrew's Hall are included in the balance sheet only to the extent of fixed assets.
- (ii) The assets and liabilities of the Pension Fund are not included in these statements. A separate statement covering this fund has been prepared.

(e) Composition of income and expenditure

(i) Except for the amount allocated from the Budget, no receipts or disbursements have been included in the statement of income and expenditure for the following: Knox, Presbyterian and Ewart Colleges, St. Andrew's Hall, Saskatoon

Residence, Pension Fund and Armagh.

- (ii) The total cost of operating Knox, Presbyterian and Ewart Colleges, St. Andrew's Hall and Saskatoon Residence is \$798,540 (\$721,520 in
- (iii) Income of the J. B. MacLean Bequest Fund has been included in the statement of income and expenditure only to the extent of the amount received from the Fund (\$45,000 in each of 1974 and 1973). A separate statement covering this Fund has been prepared.
- 2. CASH AND SHORT-TERM DEPOSITS An amount of \$235,203 (\$193,596 in 1973) is invested in short-term deposits, \$213,203 on behalf of the Chinese Church, Montreal, and \$22,000 on behalf

of Tyndale House. Income therefrom is credited to this congregation and to Tyndale House in proportion to their short-term deposits.

3. MARKETABLE SECURITIES

An amount of \$67,235 (\$89,235 in 1973) is invested in securities on behalf of Tyndale House. Income therefrom is paid to Tyndale House.

COMPARATIVE FIGURES

The 1973 comparative figures have been reclassified to conform with the financial statement presentation adopted for 1974.

5. UNEXPENDED APPROPRIATIONS - BOARD OF WORLD MISSION The Board of World Mission has projects under review which will require the expenditure in 1975 of the greater part of this appropriation.

#### REPORT ON OTHER FINANCIAL INFORMATION

Our examination of the financial statements of The Presbyterian Church in Canada was made primarily for the purpose of forming an opinion on the balance sheet at December 31, 1974 and the statements of income and expenditure and unappropriated operating and property funds for the year then ended. The accompanying schedules are presented for supplementary analysis purposes and have been subjected to the audit procedures applied in the examination of the financial statements referred to above statements referred to above.

In our opinion the accompanying schedules present fairly the financial information contained therein.

#### NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following is a summary of accounting policies followed by the fund:

- (a) Basis of valuation of fund assets
  - (i) Listed stocks are valued at their closing sales prices on the stock exchange where listed, and if no sale has taken place on the last business day, then at the last published sale price.
  - (ii) Listed bonds are recorded at the last published bid price.
  - (iii) Unlisted bonds are recorded at values reflecting current market yields of similar debt obligations.
- (b) Investment transactions and income
  - (i) Investment transactions are recorded on the trade date (date the order to buy or sell is executed). Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Dividend income is recorded on the ex-dividend date. Realized gains and losses from investment transactions and unrealized appreciation or depreciation of investments are calculated on an average cost basis.

#### 2. ADDITIONAL PAYMENTS TO PENSIONERS AND WIDOWS

As approved by the 99th General Assembly, bequests, commencing in 1972, will be used to provide additional payments to pensioners and widows receiving only small amounts from the Canada Pension Plan. The income and expenditure and balance on hand, as follows, is included in these financial statements.

#### NOTE TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS DECEMBER 31, 1974

#### SUMMARY OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following is a summary of accounting policies followed by the Fund. With the exception of the practices of valuing marketable securities at market value rather than at acquisition cost as set out in (b) below, the financial statements have been prepared in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted for non-profit organizations.

(a) Investment transactions and income
Investment transactions are accounted for on the trade date (date the order to buy or sell is executed).

Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis.

Dividend income is recorded on the date of declaration.

Realized gains and losses from investment transactions are recorded on the transaction date.

(b) Valuation The Fund follows the practice of valuing marketable securities at market value rather than at acquisition cost. Adjustments arising thereon are allocated between capital and undistributed income, on the basis of ratio of capital to undistributed income.

(c) Depreciation The Fund does not record depreciation on its real estate and other assets.

(d) Real estate and other assets Real estate and other assets are recorded at values determined by executors with subsequent additions recorded at cost.

#### COMMUNICATION SERVICES COMMITTEE 1975

To the Venerable the 101st General Assembly:

More change has taken place in the world in which our church has been called

to minister in the past 100 years than in the whole of Christian history.

Nowhere has the change been more dramatic than in the field of communications. Technology has taken over in the print media and radio and television strongly influence the field of public information and entertainment. To exemplify the term mass media — now more than 98% of Canadians have television and they watch an average of more than 24 hours per week, 41% of them in colour.

When the moderator preached from Ottawa in January on the CBC "Meeting Place" series, his audience was estimated at more than 175,000 people. That is almost the equivalent of our total membership (176,367), but really a comparatively small audience by TV standards. And even greater change is forecast. Cable systems are transforming TV, computor technology linked to it provide amazing systems of information access and of marketing and business as well as entertainment. Microwave and satellites will provide even greater and more varied sources of information and programming.

All of this is just a superficial indication of the kind of world in which we are called to minister. These are the patterns of information and communication in which the church must proclaim the Good News of the Gospel. This is the challenge and the opportunity afforded the church. We must have awareness, understanding.

support and training to meet that challenge.

Local Church Participation in Broadcasting

There is a strange paradox. In spite of the way the world is being drawn more closely together by these developments into a global village, yet almost all of the opportunities for participation by the churches is at the local level. Indeed the development of cable systems, which are compelled to provide a community channel, has greatly increased the opportunities. Radio — both FM and AM has increased its local involvement. Every congregation should explore the opportunities that are open to it and the best use that can be made of these. This is a congregational responsibility not simply another job for the minister. Our committee exists to serve the church in this field and to assist your congregation in this community ministry.

Members of the Committee and the Consultant have taken morning services, met with congregational groups, made presentations to presbyteries, explored opportunities in communities with ministerial groups, conducted workshops to develop skills in the field and offered advice and support for existing programs. We are prepared to respond to the particular needs that are presented to us. Often we have participated with other churches in sharing information and resources and

providing staff for ecumenical workshops.

Membership in Ecumenical Christian Communication Agencies

Through membership in the Communications Department of the World Council of Churches and the World Association for Christian Communication we are developing contacts that enable us to benefit from developments in the field throughout the world. Here in Canada a new structure called Interchurch Communications has been formed involving Anglican, United, Lutheran, Baptist, Roman Catholic and Presbyterian representatives. It is an agency of coordination and cooperation of the work of Interchurch Radio and Religious Television Associates both of which have been working in this particular area for a number of years. It will also draw together common concerns in media education, audio-visuals, press relations and common approaches to the communications industry and the Canadian Radio Television Commission.

Television for Children

Some of the most significant developments in this past year are in the field of childrens' television which we highlighted at the last Assembly. Through our partici-

pation in Religious Television Associates, we have sponsored a research project which has been well received by educators and producers. It has led to several other projects and experiments in the field as well as exposure of our concerns through other radio and television programs, magazine articles and related publications. The Childrens' Television Institute was inaugurated this year incorporating many areas related to the field of broadcasting and education. Religious Television Associates were asked to appoint a director.

Pilot Project on TV Pre-school children

Our committee encouraged the development of a proposal for the production of a pilot program for a T.V. series for pre-school children. It incorporates those features of production which we feel are essential to communication of the attitudes and values that we hold. It is our hope that this will not only benefit the children for whom it is produced, but also may be an example for the industry. We will appreciate whatever support can be given to this project by our church.

Policies of 1973 continue as basis for work of committee

In our last report, we submitted a list of objectives for the year. The policies outlined there continue as a basis of our work. It is evident that we are now accepted by the program agencies and we expect to be consulted whenever communication matters both broadcast and audio-visual occur. The best time for consultation is at the earliest stages of the planning process. Communication skills are most important in the selection of the medium not just in the details of technical production.

Training in mass media for full-time professional workers

All who are in training for full-time professional service in our church should understand the patterns of communication in our society – the challenges and opportunities outlined in the beginning of this report. We feel that it is too vital to be left to a matter of choice – something to be selected if there is time or prior interest. For this reason, we recommend that it be a compulsory item in training for full-time service. Recognition of the importance of this has been a constant in the reports of the Educational Needs Committee.

Communication Consultant

This department has only one executive staff person, so it is a wide-reaching and demanding occupation. The activities and associations outlined here as well as liaison with the broadcast industry and attempting to serve the church from coast to coast, provide a job description. The supervision of the audio-visual library, the conduct of workshops and provision of consultation on the production, purchase and use of audio-visual materials of all kinds have hardly been mentioned but are a major part of the services offered. Then, of course, there are the on-going committees etc. that form our church system.

The Rev. Harry Crawford will complete a three-year appointment in August of this year and he has accepted a further three-year appointment at the request of the committee. Progress over the past three years is considered to be merely a mini-

mum basis for further development of this work in our church.

Budget

Two years ago, the General Assembly approved a recommendation of the Organization and Planning Committee that this committee's budget be increased by 25% for each of two years. Other committees have made similar recommendations and widespread and vocal support has been given for such an increase. As yet, the limited funds of the church have not permitted it. The Administrative Council have been generous in granting funds for special projects and capital expenditures. What is really needed is an increase in the budget adequate enough to provide a flexibility of response to opportunities and the ability to budget for longer term projects than can be done under special projects funding.

Three years ago we closed our report with these words: "The Committee looks to the future with eager anticipation. The Committee's mandate is to serve the boards and congregations of the Church in the use of all the means of communica-

tion available to man. The aim is to present Christ and His good news in as effective and efficient manner as is possible. Your Committee with your assistance will do all in its power to honour this commitment."

Although we have accomplished a great deal since that time, this is only the beginning. Your committee renews its commitment and urges the church to recognise the importance of its work.

#### RECOMMENDATION

That congregations and presbyteries be urged to explore opportunities in the
mass media in their communities in order to participate fully in the communication of the Christian faith and values; and to use the resources and assistance
of the Communication Services Committee wherever appropriate.

2. That the General Assembly express appreciation to the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation for the "Meeting Place" televised services and the opportunity given to our church to participate and in particular for the special broadcast of the Centennial Service; that Assembly further commend the C.B.C. for the high standard of its public service broadcasting on both radio and television as it seeks not merely to reflect public interest but also to increase awareness of matters of importance.

3. That all students preparing for full time professional service in the church be required to receive some training in presenting the Gospel through the mass media. And that the Board of Education draft an appropriate regulation in consultation with the Communication Services Committee and the colleges.

#### REPORT OF THE PENSION BOARD

To the Venerable the 101st General Assembly:

During the past year two meetings of the Pension Board have been held, in November, 1974, and in March, 1975.

An amendment has been made to the pension plan for ministers to provide: "in addition to the contributions required to be made under the terms of Section 6 of the plan, voluntary contributions may be received from or on behalf of any contributing member. Such additional contributions shall be accumulated for such member separately from those required to be made to provide the benefits described by Section 8 of the plan. Interest shall be added to such contributions at a rate to be determined from time to time by the Pension Board. At the retirement of the member the accumulation of such contributions and interest thereon shall be applied to purchase for him additional pension". This amendment is considered by the Pension Board to be its response to the resolution presented by Mr. C. R. Talbot to the 100th General Assembly.

The regulations governing the revised Retirement Plan for Church Employees have been prepared and are submitted to this Assembly as part of this report. The

revised plan became effective January 1, 1975.

Overture No. 5 with respect to retirement at age 65 has been received. The

following is the answer of the Board to this overture.

"The New Pension Plan provides for the possibility of a minister retiring at age 65 without reducing benefits accrued at that age. It is not reasonable to assume that a person will get a full pension retiring at age 65 when there is provision in the New Plan to make additional contributions to a month before age 71 years when a pension must be granted.

The overture seems to be referring to the previous plan where a reduction is made if one retires before age 68, and the reference to 35 years of service in the overture seems now to have no validity.

The Pension Board would need the information of the regular evaluation report to decide whether or not it is feasible to lower the retirement age under the previous plan to age 65 years and this evaluation is now underway.

Therefore we recommend to the General Assembly that after the next evaluation has been made the Pension Board consider the desirability of lowering the age for retirement to age 65 years for pension without deduction."

A descriptive booklet covering the New Ministers' Pension Plan is in the course

of preparation and should be soon in the hands of members.

Again in 1974 the financial report for the Ministers' Pension Plan reflects improved interest income. The market value of investments was, however, considerably below cost at the end of 1974, a situation common to all such funds at that time. (The market position has improved since.)

Representatives of Canada Life attended the March meeting of the Board to outline the basic philosophy followed in the investment of the fund and describe the management of the fund during 1974. The Company is willing to amend the terms of the contract with the Church to grant "shopping privileges" for annuity purchases.

Valuation of the Ministers' Pension Plan is being made by the Actuary as at the end of 1974. The results of the valuation will determine whether it will be possible to improve further the benefits under the former plan.

Bequests continue to be used to provide additional payments to pensioners and widows receiving only small amounts or no amount under the Canada Pension Plan.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That the regulations for the Retirement Fund for Church Employees be approved.

That the amendment to the Ministers' Pension Plan providing for voluntary contributions be approved.

- That the answer to Overture No. 5 be as stated in this report.
   That the answer to the resolution presented by Mr. Talbot at the 100th General Assembly be as stated in this report.
- 5. That the recommendations re applicants to retire on pension listed in this report be approved.

 That the General Assembly express appreciation to the Actuary and to Dr. MacDonald and Miss Scott for their dedicated service to the Pension Board and to the Church.

#### REGULATIONS OF THE RETIREMENT FUND FOR CHURCH EMPLOYEES

#### 1. Definitions:

Wherever used in these Regulations of the Retirement Fund for Church Employees of The Presbyterian Church in Canada:

- (a) "The Church" means The Presbyterian Church in Canada.
- (b) "General Assembly", "Synod", "Presbytery", "Congregation" refer to courts of The Church as they are known and recognised by The Church.
- (c) "Pension Fund" means the Retirement Fund for Church Employees.
- (d) "Pension Plan" means the plan of the Pension Fund as revised from 1st January, 1975.
- (e) "Pension Board" means the Board appointed by the General Assembly to administer the Pension Plan as Trustees of the Pension Fund.
- (f) "Member" means a person who has become a member of the Pension Plan as provided in Regulation 7 hereof and is entitled to benefits thereunder.
- (g) "Employer" means any organization within The Church.
- (h) "Pensionable Service" means service rendered to an Employer, whether part-time or full-time, by a Member who is not receiving a pension under the Pension Plan.
- (i) "Pensionable Income" of a Member for any calendar year or part of a calendar year means the salary (up to a maximum of \$12,500 in a full year) paid to the said Member by an Employer for that year or for that part of a year during which the Member is in Pensionable Service but such salary shall not include any extra payments or allowances for bonuses.
- (j) "Paid-up Member" means a Member who has ceased to be in Pensionable Service for any reason other than Death or Retirement and who has become entitled to benefits under Regulation 13 hereof.
- (k) "Retirement" means a withdrawal from Pensionable Service by normal retirement, or early retirement, as provided for in Regulations 11 or 12, hereof respectively.
- (1) "1952 Fund" means the Retirement Fund for Church Employees which was established by the 78th General Assembly (1952) of The Church as revised in 1967.
- (m) "Actuary" means a Fellow of the Canadian Institute of Actuaries appointed by The Church for the purposes of the Pension Plan.

#### 2. Purpose

The purpose of the Pension Plan is to provide pensions for retired Members of the Pension Plan.

#### 3. Effective Date:

The effective date of these revisions of the Pension Plan is 1st January, 1975.

#### 4. Establishment of the Pension Plan:

(a) The Pension Plan was established by action of the 100th General Assembly (1974) of the Church to be effective from the 1st January, 1975, and to

replace the 1952 Fund to which no further contributions shall be made after the 31st December, 1974.

- (b) All the liabilities of the 1952 Fund shall be assumed by the Pension Fund and all assets of the 1952 Fund shall be transferred to the Pension Fund.
- (c) All the contributions which have been made by an Employee Contributor to the 1952 Fund, prior to the 31st December, 1974, and all the corresponding Employer contributions and all the interest which has been credited to the account of that Employee Contributor as at the 31st December, 1974, shall remain to the credit of the account of that Employee Contributor and shall continue to be credited with interest at a rate determined by the Pension Board from time to time and the Employee Contributor shall continue to be entitled to the benefits at Retirement or on leaving or on Death in accordance with and as provided under the regulations of the 1952 Fund in respect of those contributions made prior to the 31st December, 1974, and the interest accruing on those contributions.

### 5. The Pension Fund:

The assets of the Pension Fund shall constitute and be set apart as a common trust consisting of the assets received from the 1952 Fund together with the following:

- (a) Receipts in respect of investments held by the Pension Fund.
- (b) Contributions by Members
- (c) Contributions by Employers

### 6. Registration of the Pension Plan:

The Pension Plan shall at all times remain registered with the appropriate authorities, and investments of the Pension Plan shall comply with the requirements of all applicable legislation, and shall be such as are authorized for Canadian life insurance companies, and they shall be placed in a segregated account in the name of The Trustee Board of The Presbyterian Church in Canada. All benefits payable under the Pension Plan shall be subject to any limitations stipulated in the Income Tax Act or regulations thereunder, or any provincial pension legislation applicable thereto.

### 7. Membership:

The following shall become Members or are eligible to become Members of the Pension Plan:

- (a) Every person who was an Employee Contributor to the 1952 Fund on the 31st December, 1974, shall become a Member of the Pension Plan as from 1st January, 1975.
- (b) Any person who is appointed after 1st January, 1975, as a full-time salaried employee of The Church is eligible to become a Member of the Pension Plan one year after having become a full-time employee or on and after age 21, whichever is the later.
- (c) Any full-time employee of a Synod, Presbytery or Congregation of The Church shall be eligible to become a Member of the Pension Plan one year after having become a full-time employee or on and after age 21, whichever is the later, provided the Synod, Presbytery or Congregation agrees.
- (d) Any catechist who is a full-time salaried employee of The Church who is certified by a Presbytery and by the Board of World Mission as such shall be eligible to become a Member of the Pension Plan.

Notwithstanding the above any person who has attained the age of 25 and has not become a Member of the Pension Plan within one year of having become eligible to do so may not become a Member except with the consent and approval of the Pension Board.

Further, a person who has passed the normal retirement age or is eligible to be a Member of the Pension Plan of The Presbyterian Church in Canada or of any

pension plan or fund administered by the Women's Missionary Society (Western Division) of The Presbyterian Church in Canada shall not be eligible to become a Member of the Pension Plan.

### 8. Members' Contributions:

- (a) Each Member of the Pension Plan shall contribute to the Pension Fund in each calendar year or part of a calendar year 3.2% of his or her Pensionable Income for that calendar year or such part of a calendar year during which the Member is in Pensionable Service, up to a maximum amount of contribution of \$400 in a calendar year.
- (b) Each Member's contribution shall be deducted each month from his or her salary by the Employer and shall be remitted quarterly to the Church Treasurer.

### 9. Employer Contributions:

- (a) The Employer of each Member of the Pension Plan shall contribute to the Pension Fund in each calendar year or part of a calendar year 4.8% of the Member's Pensionable Income for that calendar year or such part of a calendar year during which the Member is in Pensionable Service, up to a maximum amount of contribution of \$600 in a calendar year.
- (b) The amount of the Employer's Contribution shall be remitted quarterly to the Church Treasurer with the corresponding contribution of the Member.

### 10. Voluntary Contributions:

A member may make additional voluntary contributions to the plan, such contributions to be accumulated separately from the required contributions at a rate of interest to be determined from time to time by the Pension Board. The accumulated amount of such contributions shall be used to purchase pension benefits for the member at retirement.

### 11. Normal Retirement:

The normal retirement date both for men and women shall be the first day of the month next following the month in which the Member attains age 65.

The normal annual retirement pension shall be payable monthly during the subsequent lifetime of the Member, the first such payment falling due on the normal retirement date, and shall be as follows:

- (a) An annual amount of pension equal to 1.6% of the total Pensionable Income of the Member from and after the 1st January, 1975, on which the required contributions have been paid, and
- (b) Such a normal pension as is provided under the regulations of the 1952 Fund in respect of all contributions made prior to the 1st January, 1975, (with interest accrued to the date of retirement) by the Member as an Employee Contributor to the 1952 Fund and by the Employer as Employer contributions to that Fund.

### 12. Early Retirement:

After the attainment of age 60 a Member may elect to retire before age 65. In such a case the amount of the pension will be determined by the Actuary as being the appropriate equivalent pension.

### 13. Postponed Retirement:

Subject to the annual approval of the Employer a Member may postpone retirement beyond age 65 and will then remain in Pensionable Service and will continue to make contributions to the Pension Fund. However, the payment of pension must begin before the 71st birthday of the Member.

14. Up to a date one month prior to actual retirement a Member may elect to take a reduced pension which will be payable for as long as the Member and his or her spouse is living. The amount of the reduced pension will be determined by the Actuary and will depend on the age of the Member and the spouse at the time of retirement.

### 15. Withdrawal and Paid-up Membership:

- If a Member ceases to be in Pensionable Service for any reason other than Death or Retirement, he or she shall be entitled to the following benefits:
- (1) The "Benefits on Leaving" as set out in the Regulations governing the 1952 Fund in respect of contributions made to that Fund prior to 1st January, 1975. These Regulations are as follows:

"(a) If an employee contributor resigns or is discharged prior to retirement, the full amount of the employee contributor's contributions and interest thereon may be paid to such contributor.

(b) Any such employee contributor who has not less than \$500.00 in the Fund arising out of such contributor's contributions and interest may elect to leave such accumulated contributions in the Fund to provide a retiring allowance at the normal retirement date. If this be done, a portion of the equal amount contributed by the employer will also be left in the Fund for the benefit of the employee contributor as follows:

After eleven years of service, 10% of the employer's contributions respectively with interest, increasing by 10% for each year of service until the full amount of the employer's contributions respectively

would be left in the Fund after twenty years of service.

- (c) Not withstanding paragraphs (a) and (b) above, any employee contributor at the time of withdrawal from service, who has been a contributor to the Fund for ten years and attained the age of forty-five may not withdraw any of the contributions made by him on or after January 1st, 1965, and the full amount of the employer's contributions after January 1st, 1965, will be left in the Fund. These two amounts together with any amounts which vest under clauses (a) and (b) will be accumulated to provide an annuity at normal retirement age. These contributions, together with the contributions of the employer, may not be commuted, assigned or alienated.
- (d) A deaconess who moves from one congregation to another or to employment by The Church, a synod or a presbytery shall not be considered to have resigned or to have been discharged but shall continue under the Fund and payments will continue to be made by her and her new employer as though she had not resigned or been discharged and all contributions of the congregation whose employment she is leaving plus contributions made by her while there shall remain in the Fund to her credit.

(e) Should an employee of the Church, a synod, presbytery or congregation leave such employment and become employed by The Church, a synod, presbytery or a congregation, the contributions of the employer whose employment the employee is leaving plus the contributions of the employee shall remain in the Fund to the credit of the employee.

(f) Every employee contributor who transfers to the employment of the Women's Missionary Society (Western Division) of The Presbyterian Church in Canada and becomes a contributor to the Pension Fund of the said Society will be permitted to leave his or her contributions and the contributions of the body deemed to be his or her employer in the Fund to accumulate to pension age." (that is the date of normal retirement).

Plus

(2) (a) If the Member's cessation of Pensionable Service occurs prior to the completion of five years' Pensionable Service the Member shall receive a refund of all his or her own contributions, including any voluntary contributions which have been made under Regulation 10, since 1st January, 1975, with compound interest at such a rate as shall be decided by the Pension Board.

- Or (b) If the Member has completed five years' Pensionable Service or more, and is less than 40 years of age, the Member may elect to take a refund of all his or her contributions made since 1st January, 1975, with compound interest, as described in (a) above, or may elect to become a Paid-up Member. A Paid-up Member will be entitled to receive from normal retirement date the retirement pension which has accrued under Regulation 11 (a) hereof in respect of contributions which have been made since 1st January, 1975.
- Or (c) If the Member has completed five years' Pensionable Service or more, and has attained age 40, the Member may not elect to take a refund of any part of his or her contributions and will become a Paid-up Member (as described in (b) above).

### 16. Death in Pensionable Service:

In the event of the death of a Member or Paid-up Member who is not in receipt of a pension in accordance with Regulation 11 or 12, there shall be paid to the Estate of the Member an amount equal to all the contributions which he or she has made with compound interest, at such a rate as shall be determined by the Pension Board.

### **GENERAL PROVISIONS**

- 17. No moneys payable under this Pension Plan may be assigned, charged, anticipated or given as security and any transaction purporting to assign, charge, anticipate or give such moneys as security is void.
- 18. At a date not later than 31st December, 1977, and at intervals of not more than three years thereafter the Employer shall cause the plan to be reviewed and a report prepared by an Actuary.

The report shall certify:

- (a) the estimated cost of benefits in respect of service in the next succeeding year and the rate for computing such cost in subsequent years up to the date of the next report;
- (b) the surplus or the experience deficiency in the pension plan after making allowance for the present value of all special payments required to be made in the future by the Employer or determined by previous reports: and
- (c) the special payments which will liquidate any such experience deficiency over a term not exceeding five years.

### 19. Maximum Pension:

The maximum annual pension payable to a Member at retirement, termination of employment or termination of this plan shall not exceed the lesser of

- (1) \$1,143 times the number of years of Pensionable Service not exceeding 35 or
- (2) an amount that is the product of
  - (a) 2% per year of Pensionable Service not exceeding 35 years and
  - (b) the average of the best five years of salary paid to the Member.
- (19.2 (a) would likely be the only item in these Government rules that might apply to our Members.)

### 20. Proof of Age:

On joining the Pension Plan every Member will be required to produce proof of his or her age to the satisfaction of the Pension Board.

 If at any time or in any case there is any doubt as to the exact interpretation of any of these Regulations the decision of the Pension Board shall be final and binding.

### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE TO STUDY THE CHARISMATIC MOVEMENT

To the Venerable the 101st General Assembly:

The Special Committee to study the Charismatic Movement has met regularly during the past year. We held two joint meetings with the sub-committee on the work of the Holy Spirit of the Committee on Church Doctrine. We are grateful for those consultations, and for the mutual understanding and counsel, which resulted from those meetings.

As we now submit our final report to the Assembly, we firstly, would refer to the interim statement adopted by the 100th General Assembly which reads as

follows:

"A "charismatic" experience is an experience of the presence of Jesus Christ through the Holy Spirit in a gathering of Christians or in an individual's personal life, and of a response with enthusiasm and exultation. This experience of the presence of Jesus Christ is documented in Holy Scripture and, therefore, has a legitimate place in the life of the Body of Christ, the Church."

1. The Cultural and Ecclesial Setting for the Rise of Neo-Pentecostalism.

Since the early 1960's, neo-Pentecostalism has spread through nearly all mainline churches, including the Roman Catholic Church. It brought together people from all segments of society, including scientists, professionals, craftsmen, and laborers; men and women, and large numbers of young people. Thus, neo-Pentecostalism has become an important aspect of our present cultural and ecclesial situation. It seems helpful to indicate some of the factors which have played a role in the rise of neo-Pentecostalism.

I. Cultural Factors

Cultural changes after the Second World War have been fast and numerous. The greatly increased mobility of people disrupted the extended family. It also tended to break up the nuclear family. Frequent relocation in new jobs, communities, schools, and churches unsettled parents and children. The media, especially television, brought the remotest corners of the world within the reach of the eyes and ears of everyone. The shelter of home, community, and church, even of race and nation, was broken wide open. A sense of rootlessness gripped people to the point where all ties seemed to be doomed to snap, so that many became committed to nothing at all.

The fear of the nuclear age led to frantic efforts at mass education. The burgeoning technology brought extreme specialization in order to handle fantastic new instruments and machines. Our living standard jumped to undreamed of heights. At the same time, the extreme sophistication in all areas of production and services caused many to fall behind economically, because they were unable to cope with the new type of job-requirements. So, the gap between rich and poor widened disastrously.

Crisis after crisis emerged: in ecology, in labor relations, disproportionate

defense spending, student rebellions, wars, and war resistance, women's activism, political corruption, uprootedness of youth, absentee mothers (and fathers!), rejection of authority, loss of Christian standards, population explosion, moral nihilism, and of late a world wide crisis in energy and food resources, and inflation.

Our fears resulted in the militarization of science, technology, and resource management.

Our rootlessness and loss of standards have driven our culture into an extreme materialism.

Our failure to find solutions has made many to drift into an uninhibited hedonism.

The questions, "Who am I? Where did I come from? Where am I going?" led to a formula of despair:

I am what I am today; I have what I have today. That's all I am, and that's all I have.

This indicates an abandonment of the past, and despair of the future; a loss of a sense of personal, national, and religious history.

Two extreme reactions to this cultural disintegration occurred, one physical, the other mental: a mad sexual anarchy, and the drug culture. Both are still gaining momentum, the one ravishing the present without thought for past or future, the other dulling the awareness of a present cut off from both its past and its future.

The first break in this pattern of despair was indicated by groups such as the "Jesus People". In Jesus, "the first and the last, and the living one", "the same yesterday and today and for ever", they found past, present, and future re-integrated. Soon there arose alongside these groups the so-called Charismatic Movement, more properly called neo-Pentecostalism. While the Jesus People arose outside the Church's institutional life, neo-Pentecostalism swept through the established churches, Protestant as well as Roman Catholic.

### II Ecclesial Factors

While these groups recaptured a fervour akin to that of the early Church and of some great movements of revival and renewal in the Church's history, they are at the same time marked by a degree of alienation from the traditional, long established patterns of church life.

This alienation is partly due to the tendency to meet together with people who will understand and accept them. Especially those who are new to an intensely personal religious experience will seek the fellowship of people with similar experiences. They need guidance in fitting into their life-style what is happening to them. They also need to share it with others and to learn to give expression to it in appropriate ways. The contrast of this new fellowship with the traditional pattern of church life may be so sharp, that they may feel that they have to choose between the two. Here the danger of divisiveness makes itself felt and can become a real threat to the life of the Church.

At the same time, there are factors in the life of the Church which cause an alienation of neo-Pentecostals. These factors, on the whole, amount to a lack of a sense of reality in matters of the faith, an absence of the awareness of the presence of Christ in worship and daily life, a lack of joy, of peace, of love and of hope. They spell an emptiness in the Church's life, which imparts itself to the daily life of its members. Because of the otherness of the neo-Pentecostal's experience, there is an intuitive tendency in many churches to hold them at arm's length.

To be more specific, there is an intellectualism in the Church, of which many have become suspicious, just as in the secular world people have become suspicious of the promises of science and technology. Many people are tired of hearing the same thing over and over from our pulpits without

finding that their lives are being changed. One may admire the Church's message and still find that in one's personal life it makes no real difference. The hearer himself is too often missing from the picture. Too many people — not only neo-Pentecostals! — are speaking of the Church as "they", thereby revealing their alienation. They chafe under the Church's bureaucracy, its hovering over its traditions and customs, its formality in worship and in fellowship groups. The high standard of learning among our Ministers is not often enough accompanied by the warmth of personal dedication to Christ. Many people, young and old, hear us preaching about Jesus as Lord; they read our tired clichés about the values and standards of Christianity; they listen to doctrinal teaching. Still they ask, in the words of a contemporary Hymn, "What is that to me?"

The hunger for Him Who can put together again our past, present, and future, remains unsatisfied too often. There is a longing for Him to heal our life, to renew it, to fill it with love, with praise, and with the warmth of fellowship. But the Church often fails to fill that longing. When people come to the Church with their need for a Saviour Who will deal with them personally and permanently, the response to their need is too often hesitant, unsure, and impersonal.

It is not enough to answer that in the message of the Church all these things are present and implied. People in need should not have to delve too deeply for answers that are implicit. They need a message and a fellowship in which answers are explicit. Instead of the hemming and hawing of our self-conscious approach to Christian witness, they need the joyful affirmation that in Christ is the victory, the joy, and the peace for which they long, openly and uninhibited.

It will not do to listen to such criticism of the Church with pained innocence, — not when it comes from people who say, "I have found that for which I longed in the Church. I am filled with joy at last." Such people act out their faith with a spontaneity and a newfound freedom which comes as a healthy embarrassment to many staid church members. Instead, it will benefit us all, and the Church as a whole, to grasp once again, "the measure of the stature of the fullness of Christ" (Eph. 4, 13) and to keep firmly before us the full range of the gifts of God's grace to all who believe.

### 2. The Practice of Neo-Pentecostalism in the world to-day

During the past ten years there has been a quiet spiritual revolution going on in the church, which has been called, "The Charismatic Movement." It is considered by those who are part of it to be the work of God's spirit by which God is preparing and equipping His people, for spiritual warfare and service in the world to-day. Reports of this work of the Holy Spirit come from countries around the world. In 1974, four thousand five hundred charismatics from thirty countries gathered in Jerusalem for a World Conference on the Holy Spirit. One of the characteristics of the Conference was an almost complete absence of hysteria, often associated with such gatherings. The main characteristics of the conference were:

 A profound interest in the person and work of the Holy Spirit, together with the praise and adoration of Jesus Christ.

 Sound Biblical teaching, dealing with such basics as God's order in the home, Christian marriage and the nature of obedience and authority.

 There was a strong emphasis on prayer and praise, both in assembly and in small groups.

 Gifts of the spirit were in evidence, prophecies were given, healings were witnessed, and under loving authority, tongues and interpretations were spoken.

Practically all who attended the World Conference on the Holy Spirit were from mainline denominations, and what happened at the Conference is happening around the world to-day in charismatic fellowship.

There is little doubt that neo-Pentecostalism is essentially a revival movement within the confessional and traditional churches. Those who are involved, commonly testify of a former "hunger," "emptiness," "powerlessness," "lovelessness," "loneliness," "unfulfilledness," "deadness," that has been overcome, or which they are new equipped to deal with through the "baptism of the Holy Spirit." They profess an experience of the living Christ, who before was hidden from them behind the doctrines, liturgies, and the unspiritual atmosphere of the churches. They now testify to having the joyful assurance of salvation, the desire for prayer and praise, freedom to testify and witness, liberation from bondage to sin, the power to live holy lives in the service of Jesus, a delight, and understanding in the Word of God, a new capacity to love, a desire for Christian fellowship, and a peace that they had never known before.

Almost everywhere to-day, we hear of the deadness of the church, and the absence of the life of God's Spirit. Many people have lost or are losing interest in church services, because there is so little relevancy to their spiritual needs and problems to be found there. Dr. John A. Mackay, a former President of both Princeton Theological Seminary, and the Presbyterian Alliance, said 15 years ago:

"One of our serious troubles in the church to-day is that it is legitimate to be emotional in anything but religion. The need is for something that will summon one's whole enthusiasm. The moment the church becomes completely programized and de-personalized, it becomes a monument to God's memory, and not an instrument of His living power."

Dr. Mackay in those words was pointing to a need, to which only God has the answer and into which He is speaking, in the lives of many Christians to-day, by His Spirit.

The charismatic movement is deeply concerned about the ministry of the Body of Christ. First of all, ministry to the Body, and secondly, ministry of the body in the World, and how important this is at this point in the missionary history of the church.

Dr. Fisan, the Bishop of Salisbury, has written,

"The story of Acts is the story of stupendous missionary achievement, of a community inspired to make a continual series of creative experiments by the Pentecostal Spirit. Over against this we see today a static church unwilling to obey the guidance of the spirit, no gates of any sort are needed to oppose its movement, for it does not move. But against a church that is on the move, inspired by the Pentecostal spirit, neither the gates of hell, nor any other gates, can prevail."

It is equally clear from the New Testament that the early Christian fellowships were richly endowed with spiritual gifts. Even when writing to the church at Corinth, Paul acknowledged that they were, "not lacking in any spiritual gifts," I Cor. 1:7. He expected every member of the church to manifest at least one of these gifts, "for the common good," and he urged them to bring their spiritual gifts to church with them. Charismatic fellowships to-day are both receiving the gifts of the Spirit, and are learning how to use them in ministry. Charismatics by and large do not reject either the church or denominations. These express love for the church, because they were saved through the ministry of the church. They, however, wish the church to embody, more visibly, the Gospel of Jesus Christ in its fulness, but they have not abandoned the church, and have no intention of doing so in the future.

The church on the other hand must exercise the same love, understanding, and willingness to receive as brethren those whose search for the living God has led them into new dimensions of the spirit-filled life.

Thank God, we are seeing in our day, the renewal of spiritual power in the lives of many Christians. It is springing from the realization, that we do not know the Holy Spirit as we should, and that it is possible, indeed imperative, to be filled with the Holy Spirit, to earnestly desire the greater gifts, and to walk in love as Christ also hath loved us.

### 3. Counselling Section

1 The Place of neo-Pentecostals in the Church

The Charismatic Movement, or neo-Pentecostalism, has many different aspects. Some of them are clear. Others are more difficult to understand, sometimes to the point of causing confusion and strife.

It is not our purpose to present to the Church an in-depth study of the various aspects. We are aware that much theological work is being done by the Committee on Church Doctrine, and that this is still going on. The results of those studies will be before the Church in this and ensuing years, in continuity with previous statements.

Our Special Committee is particularly concerned that the studies in which we have been engaged may result in pastoral and practical counsel, which may sustain and further the cohesion and unity of the Church's life and which, at the same time, may help neo-Pentecostals among us to feel themselves accepted and at home within the Church.

To achieve this end, we undertake to speak the truth in love, not shying away from criticism of both the Church and Neo-Pentecostalism. For we maintain that the work of the Holy Spirit always will serve to bind more firmly together all believers in the Body of Christ, which is the Church, for their mutual edification, the strengthening of their faith, hope, and common witness to Jesus Christ.

The Charismatic Movement has not given rise to an organization with specific leadership and a mass of followers. Instead, Neo-Pentecostals usually remain within their churches. Therefore, as they themselves have found a deeper and stronger relationship with Jesus Christ and with fellow-Christians, they may bring the riches of their experience to the life of the whole Church. On the other hand, they may find their own understanding and growth in grace nourished and upheld by the teaching and the fellowship of the whole church.

### II Counsel to Neo-Pentecostals within The Presbyterian Church in Canada

A. The Holy Spirit and Jesus Christ

Sometimes Neo-Pentecostal teaching is in danger of losing sight of the all-sufficiency of Jesus. This happens when Christians are called upon to move into a life-in-the-Spirit beyond redemption; to enter into a new dimension of communion with God; to receive a "second blessing" after having received Christ into their lives, to strive for new heights, to expect a further dramatic act of God in the so-called "baptism in the Spirit."

The Scriptures maintain the all-sufficiency of Jesus Christ. (Col. 1, 19; I Cor. 1, 30; Rom. 8, 32) Jesus stressed His unity with the Father (John 10, 30; 14, 23) as well as with the Holy Spirit (John 14, 16-18; 26; 15, 26: 16, 7: 13-15) Therefore, the Bible does not hesitate to speak of the Spirit of Jesus (Acts 16, 7), while Paul teaches in II Cor. 3, 17 (with an obvious reference to Christ, see vs. 14): "Now the Lord is the Spirit."

We are, therefore, to be most careful that by the interpretation of our experience of the work of the Holy Spirit we do not drive a wedge between Jesus and the Spirit. We must not move, beyond that which Christ means for us and does within us, to an imagined "higher dimension" of spiritual life. For when we move beyond Christ, we shall lose Him altogether.

B. The Holy Spirit and the Word of God

Peter wrote that the "Spirit of Christ: spoke in both the Old and New Covenant (I Pet. 1, 10-12). Paul said that the Holy Spirit revealed the Gospel to apostles and prophets. (Eph. 3, 5) The apostolic injunction of John (I John 4, 6) is to be taken seriously: "Whoever knows God

listens to us, and he who is not of God does not listen to us. By this we know the spirit of truth and the spirit of error."

When in our time, far removed from the apostolic era, we are called to "test the spirits to see whether they are of God" (I John 4, 1) we are to be careful to hold together the Word of God with the speaking of the Holy Spirit. The Word of God was given through the Holy Spirit, and the Spirit applies His own Word.

C. Special Revelations and Guidance

It is always to be remembered that our understanding of Holy Scripture not only depends on "the inward work of the Holy Spirit, bearing witness by and with the word in our hearts" (Westminster Conf. I, V), but also on the insight and wisdom which the Church has gathered through the ages under the guidance of the Spirit. The Bible will only yield its treasures to us when we discipline ourselves to listen to it within the fellowship of the Church, honouring the doctrines in which the Church has gathered together the great themes of Scripture, and gladly subjecting new insights and experiences to scrutiny in their light.

The Holy Spirit may give us guidance in unexpected and unusual ways. But that guidance can never be in conflict with the Scriptures in which He speaks to the whole Church.

We ought, therefore, to guard against a use of the Bible which would become so individualistic and arbitrary, that it would isolate us from the Church as a whole. Only in the context of what Scripture has to say to all believers can we hear what it has to say to an individual and find how it applies to his peculiar circumstances. No one may appropriate a passage of Scripture for himself alone, with disregard of its message for the whole church. For in doing so he would break faith with God's people, and with Scripture itself.

D. The Sovereignty of the Holy Spirit

In John 3, 8 Jesus stresses the sovereignty of the Holy Spirit. Paul states that gifts, service, working — in their variety — are "inspired by one and the same Spirit, who apportions to each one individually as he wills." (I Cor. 12, 11) In many ways the Bible teaches that the Holy Spirit works in the sovereign freedom of God.

There can, therefore, be no judging or measuring of each other in matters of spiritual gifts. If He is sovereign, He is free to bestow gifts and talents, to each one as He sees fit. For instance, the gift of choosing with wisdom books for a church library is as truly a gift of the Holy Spirit as that of healing.

The Holy Spirit also remains sovereign when He chooses to link the bestowal of His gifts with baptism into Christ and with the unity of the whole church. The sovereign work of the Holy Spirit should not only be found in what is extraordinary, nor only in that which takes place outside a well-ordered church life. It is found also, and more regularly, within that order which is His own creation.

No one gift can, therefore, be singled out as a touchstone of the Spirit-filled life. Neither ought some gifts to be sought because of their unusual or spectacular nature. And no gift, however inconspicuous, ought to be regarded as insufficient or incomplete without the addition of other more ostentatious ones.

All believers are to accept each other as gifted by the sovereign Spirit of God, each in his own way, in obedience to the Word of God in Phil. 2, 3: "In humility count others better than yourselves."

E. "There are Varieties of Gifts" (I Cor. 12, 4)

Neo-Pentecostals sometimes tend to prize very highly certain conspicuous gifts (tongues, prophecy, healing). By contrast, they are then

inclined to attach little value to gifts which may seem humdrum. But we are to remember that the Bible lists a great variety of gifts of the Spirit and stresses that all are precious and useful for the Church—not because of their effect or impact but because it is the same Spirit, the same Lord, "the same God who inspires them all in every one." (I Cor. 12, 4-6; of cf. Rom. 12, 6-8; I Cor. 12, 28; Eph. 4, 11).

In regard to all the gifts of the Spirit the Apostle Paul wrote, "Let all things be done for edification," (I Cor. 14, 26) and "Strive to excel in

building up the church." (vs. 12).

We rejoice with our Neo-Pentecostal members over the peace and joy, the assurance and witness which they display. We would also remind them that the "witness" of Christians has too often been confined within the walls of their churches: they witnessed to each other, but fell silent in the company of non-Christians. This is wrong. Therefore, those who have in recent years received gifts of the Holy Spirit ought not merely to seek the fellowship of people similarly gifted. They should ask themselves:

HOW WILL THIS GIFT SERVE TO EDIFY THOSE WHO ARE NOT SO GIFTED; HOW WILL IT SERVE TO BUILD UP THE

CHURCH?

As Phil. 2, 4 has it, "Let each of you not only look to his own interests, but also to the interests of others."

F. Neo-Pentecostal Fellowship Groups

For these reasons, we urge the Church to create the opportunities for Neo-Pentecostals within our Church to engage in sharing, study, and discussion. We plead for an attitude of the whole Church by which Neo-Pentecostals will not be isolated but included in the life of the Church. They should be given room to express and share their gifts, together with patient and understanding leadership and guidance.

But we urge the Neo-Pentecostals especially to avoid an isolation in which they are confined among themselves and cut off from the teaching of the Church and from the loving service of building up the Church, to which they are called by the very fact of their being gifted by the Holy Spirit.

G. The Gifts and the Fruit of the Spirit

The sovereignty of the Holy Spirit, the variety and range of spiritual gifts, and the need for building up the Church require that gifts of the Holy Spirit are never looked upon as an end in themselves. Nor is any one of the Gifts, be it tongues, or any other, to become the touchstone for a person's being filled with the Spirit. We may rejoice in the fact that the Holy Spirit so becomes manifest today. But the test of His continued indwelling does not lie in gifts themselves, but in the fruit of the Spirit: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control. (Gal. 5, 22-23).

A solemn warning is contained in the immediately preceding paragraph, which lists among the "works of the flesh": enmity, strife, jealousy, anger, selfishness, dissension, and party spirit. The same letter of Paul asks the searching question, "Having begun with the Spirit, are you now ending with the flesh?" (3, 3) This is an indication that every blessing can be corrupted by selfishness and dissension.

In holding together the warning and the promise of Gal. 5, both the Church and its Neo-Pentecostal members may steer a course in which the danger of divisiveness will disappear. For this danger does not result from the gifts of the Spirit, but from our human misunderstanding and misinterpretation on both sides.

Let us be reminded that the Lord Jesus Christ is seeking the fruit of the Spirit in the whole Church as well as among the Neo-Pentecostals. The test of the genuineness of gifts of the Holy Spirit lies in the evidence of the fruit of the Spirit. Yet, we are not to judge each other; let each one test himself. It is God Who is the Judge of all.

H. Eschatology

The hope of the coming of Christ in glory is an integral part of the Gospel. It is the hope of the entire Church. Neo-Pentecostals are spurring the Church to a renewed emphasis on this hope. However, the contemporary teaching and writing is not always in keeping with the scope, the intent, and the goal presented in Scripture. It will be necessary and helpful for all who have found a new interest in this vital aspect of the Gospel to study the material which our Church produced in the years 1955-1962. As all matters of faith, so this hope is centered in Christ. We must avoid alarmist and sensational tendencies. We are not to look for catastrophes. We cannot indulge in futuristic horror-tales, not even when they try to depict the judgment of God. We are to look for Jesus Christ alone. Let us so teach and be taught, according to Scripture which states that we have "turned to God from idols, to serve a living and true God, and to wait for His Son from heaven." (I Thess. 1, 9-10).

- III Counsel to the Church Ministers, Members, and the Courts, in dealing with the Neo-Pentecostal Movement.
  - (a) We urge the church to accept in love and patience, those of our membership who claim a "second experience" of the Spirit subsequent to their conversion, and different from the more ordinary growth in grace, and to give thanks for every working of the Spirit, that leads to a fuller manifestation of the fruit of the Spirit.
  - (b) We urge all ministers, elders and the courts of the church, to deal lovingly, patiently and wisely with those members of the church who claim "charismatic" experience, and/or who engage in charismatic fellowship. Disciplinary procedures should not be contemplated as long as those members evidence the fruit of the Spirit, and do not become divisive as members of the body of Christ.
  - (c) We encourage ministers and sessions to make provision for charismatic fellowship within the church, under their oversight, in order that those who long for spiritual fellowship of a charismatic nature, may not feel rejection by their church, and that they be encouraged to know that the Presbyterian Church in Canada recognizes that this work of the Holy Spirit has a legitimate place in the life of the Body of Christ.
  - (d) We urge the whole church, especially through her teaching and pastoral ministries, to renew her awareness of and desire for the gifts of the Spirit, in accord with the Scriptures, "For the equipment of the saints, for the work of the ministry, for building up the body of Christ, and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to mature manhood to the measure of the stature of the fulness of Christ." Ephes. 4:12.
  - (e) We call on the church to recognize the freedom of the Spirit to bestow his gifts according to His will, and that the Scriptures do not restrict the "chrismata" spoken of by the Apostles, to the apostolic age. Let the church be open to an acknowledgement of the full spectrum of the gifts of the spirit.
  - (f) We, therefore, also urge the whole church, and every member, to live in close fellowship with the Lord Jesus Christ, and not to quench (I Thess. 5:19) or grieve (Ephes. 4:30) the Holy Spirit, but to be "filled with the Spirit" (Ephes. 5:18) and to live (Rom. 8:13) walk (Gal. 5:25) and be led (Rom. 8:14, Gal. 5:18) by the Spirit, according to the admonitions of the Apostle Paul, so that the joy of salvation, and the fruit of the Spirit, may be ever more evident in their lives.

We urge the whole church to continue to search the Scriptures together in order to bring the faith and life of the church into full accord with that which we testify and teach, relative to the work of the Holy Spirit in our salvation.

We counsel the church, members and courts, whose pastor claims "charismatic" experience, to accept the brother fully in the performance of his office, so long as he manifests the fruit of the Spirit, and employs his gifts wisely for the upbuilding of the church and does not disturb the unity and peace of the church.

We urge the churches to safeguard, "the unity of the faith in the bond of peace," acknowledging that, "just as the body is one, and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. For by one Spirit we were all baptized into one body. . "Now there are varieties of gifts but the same Spirit, and there are varieties of service, but the same Lord; and there are varieties of working, but it is the same God who inspires them all in every one." I Cor. 12.

### REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE RE: THE ADMINISTRATIVE COUNCIL AND RELATED MATTERS (A & P 1974, PP 414 FF, AND WITH SPECIAL REFERENCE TO RECOMMENDATION 7, P 417).

To the Venerable the 101st General Assembly:

At this point your Committee is in a position only to report diligence and some degree of progress. The Committee met four times during the course of the year, on which occasions it received various presentations as indicated below:

an explanatory statement from Organization and Planning with respect to their report to the 100th General Assembly and with specific reference to matters set forth in that report leading up to the creation of this special committee.

The present structure of the Administrative Council and the manner in which

changes affecting the personnel of the Council are effected.

Procedures presently followed in preparing a total budget for presentation to General Assembly.

Various discussions relative to such questions as these:

Have recent years witnessed an increase in bureaucratic authority as over against the authority of the Courts of the Church?

Has this been reflected in any marked increase in secretarial staff?

What, if anything, should be done to counteract any trend toward more bureaucracy so as to secure a more significant participation by the Church Courts in establishing programs and thereafter to render budget raising somewhat less impersonal as this relates to the general membership of the Church?

If the Committee can be said to have reached any conclusions whatsoever with respect to these questions, such conclusions must be described as exceedingly tentative. But the Committee felt bound to deal with such questions simply because they would appear to be matters of concern within the Church.

In obedience to its terms of reference, the Committee has endeavoured (by three separate communications) to elicit the response and reaction of all Presbyteries and of the three Colleges, inviting their comments, criticisms and constructive suggestions. To date the response has been disappointing, but not surprisingly so, having in mind the nature and ramifications of our subject of inquiry. In all, nineteen Presbyteries have replied in some fashion and one of the Colleges. These replies, it must be conceded, reflect no real measure of consensus as to what changes should be made, some supporting the sort of changes in our modus operandi recommended in the report of Organization and Planning, some approving certain of these changes and disapproving others, and some favouring the retention of the status quo. The only matter that would appear to receive widespread consensus is by way of appreciative tribute to the excellent service rendered by the Administrative Council over the years.

Among the returns from Presbyteries, specific mention should be made of the very comprehensive, and somewhat unique, report received from the Presbytery of Brampton. Either as they stand, or in some amended form, the measures suggested in this report would have the effect of conserving the right and duty of the spending boards and committees to determine priorities within their own respective spheres of action, while affording the opportunity to the lower Courts of the Church to participate in determining overall priorities designed to render budget raising less impersonal than at present and bringing it into closer relation to "the

grass roots".

The Special Committee felt it incumbent to submit the above scheme simpliciter to the careful and responsible scrutiny of the Church as a whole, and has therefore chosen to refer it for study and report to the Presbyteries, to all Boards and Committees of General Assembly, and to the Administrative Council. Hopefully, since we are now dealing with something much more specific, it may be easier for all concerned to make suitable response. With this in mind, and so as to provide the necessary opportunity for an adequate study and analysis of the suggested scheme, the Committee has set October 15th as the deadline for receiving replies.

### RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That the above be received and approved as an interim report.

### THE COMMITTEE ON INTER-CHURCH AID, REFUGEE AND WORLD SERVICE

To the Venerable the 101st General Assembly:

During 1974 record quantities of I.C. Aid literature were requested and receipts from congregations and individuals increased seventy-one percent over the previous year. There are many congregations making an appeal at Thanksgiving and/or at Christmas, as well as in the pre-Easter season.

Informing-sensitizing

We have published more informational leaflets, including one children's piece, as well as participating in preparation of materials jointly through the Inter-Church Campaign Committee on the theme, "Share to help a Broken World". Materials for use in the pre-Easter season have been sent out earlier than previous years.

There has been active participation by several staff members of the Board of World Mission and the Board of Congregational Life. One has served on the GATT-fly Committee, a research/action group on matters of trade and monetary policy affecting Third World countries. Two have served on the Inter-Church Committee on World Development Education, responsible for the Ten Days for World Development program. As for the latter, half of the cost of the kit and related services is met by a grant from the Federal Government's CIDA and out of the remaining half eight percent is paid by our committee. We are indebted to the Board of Congregational Life for distribution of our materials.

There has been increased use of our audio-visual materials. The slides and cassette on our work in 1974-75, "It Does make a Difference", has been heavily booked, as also the sound film, "Action Sudan". We have decided to share in the production of a film on Sahelian reconstruction by Religious Television Associates in the latter part of 1975. Another set of slides and cassette is in preparation with entirely new material. We are grateful to the Communications Services Dept. for counsel and technical assistance, as well as handling our A.V. resources in its library.

A new information procedure has been inaugurated, with an "Emergency News Flash" sent to all ministers after a grant has been made from our Emergency Reserve. Contributions from congregations or individuals earmarked for that particular crisis will be used to restore the reserve fund to its ordinary level and afterward forwarded to that area.

New opportunities

During 1974 two provincial governments, Alberta and Saskatchewan, decided to make grants matching the contributions of their citizens through churches and voluntary agencies to world development. This means that for every dollar contributed by our people in these two provinces to Inter-Church Aid, a development project of equal value may be submitted for a provincial grant. Also a percentage of the amount contributed to the General Assembly's Budget and to the WMS will be eligible for matching grants, since a substantial portion of the overseas program of the Board of World Mission may be classified as development. If the projects are submitted in turn for federal CIDA funding on a matching basis, it is possible that a dollar given in Saskatchewan and Alberta will be equal to four dollars of aid at the scene of need in the Third World.

Another new facility has been launched in the Inter-Church Fund for International Development (ICFID), an ecumenical fund which we are sponsoring along with the Anglican, Lutheran, Roman Catholic and United Churches. Our annual contribution is \$11,000, since it is not meant to take over the total development programs of the churches. There will be substantial funding by CIDA, with a minimum of detail required in application procedures. Our first submission for a \$32,000 project in Jamaica was approved, providing the Knox Development Foundation with a revolving loan fund to start new industries in under-developed rural areas, to supplement meagre agricultural incomes.

Needs - both new and old

During 1974 emergency relief grants went to West Africa (Sahel), Mexico, Syria, Grand River Valley in Ontario and Honduras. Aid was sent to refugees from Chile entering Canada, from Portugal entering France and in Cyprus, Philippines and South Korea. Rehabilitation grants were given to programs in nations recovering from long conflicts, like the Sudan, Angola and Indochina. Equally important were development programs aimed at causes more than symptoms of need, in Malawi, the Philippines and through the World Council's Commission on the Church's Participation in Development (CCPD) in Ethiopia, Cameroon, Indonesia and the Caribbean. Development can mean community self-help projects such as roads, health and sanitation facilities, piped water schemes, agricultural training and mass vaccination programs. It can also include the identifying of social needs and possible resources for justice and self-reliance.

In a denomination of our size we are very dependent on the expertise of others in assessing need and administering aid at the scene. Our annual grant of \$18,700 to the regular service program of the World Council's Commission on Inter-Church Aid supports wide-ranging refugee services, youth scholarships in developing countries and many health projects, as well as the expenses of competent administration. To the World Council's Program to Combat Racism was sent \$5,000 for legal aid,

shelter, medical and educational services in several nations in Africa and Asia. Through our grant of \$4,500 to the World Alliance of Reformed Churches we have given assistance to other churches in the Presbyterian family, especially those in minority situations, in their programs of witness and community service.

During 1974 PLURA, the inter-church facility responding to proverty needs in Canada, became fully operative. Grants have been given on the recommendation of regional committees to low-income groups for projects that meet a real need in the present and at the same time develop self-reliance for the future. Our annual contribution of \$5,000 is matched by a grant from the Administrative Council.

Administrative

The addition of three more committee members by the last General Assembly has been of assistance in carrying the increasing work-load. There are several active sub-committees and representation on numerous inter-church committees. In August a half-time clerical secretary was secured to assist the Convener both with committee matters and with congregational responsibilities in view of his extensive activities related to the committee. To date the cost of this assistance has been well below the sum authorized by the 100th General Assembly from funds received for Inter-Church Aid purposes. Indeed the total spent on administration by our committee is only about three cents out of every dollar contributed.

Our committee is studying, both on its own and along with representatives of other Boards, the material in the Organization and Planning Committee proposal for a "Committee on The Church in the World" (A & P, 1974 Assembly, page 423),

since it bears on the work of Inter-Church Aid.

The physical needs of people around the world are massive, but we believe that it does make a difference what we as Christians try to do about them. Like the New Testament boy with the five loaves and two small fish, we must put what we have at the Master's disposal. And with His help, miracles can happen with small resources. But in this affluent land of ours, we should also hear this word of Christ, "Much shall be expected from the one who has been given much."

### RECOMMENDATION No. 1

That the General Assembly authorize the annual special appeal in 1976 for the work of Inter-Church Aid, Refugee and World Service and request all ministers and Kirk Sessions to encourage and foster the support of their congregations.

# REPORT OF THE CLERKS OF ASSEMBLY RE: MEMORIAL, PRESBYTERY OF BRAMPTON, 1975, RE: USE OF THE WORD "STIPEND".

To the Venerable the 101st General Assembly:

The Memorial of the Presbytery of Brampton, 1975, Re: Use of the Word "Stipend" has been handed to the Clerks of Assembly under Section 296 of the Book of Forms. The Memorial calls attention to the definition of the word "stipend" as found in A. & P., 1957, page 99, and A. & P., 1960, pages 27, 90, 91, 291 and 292, and the apparent inconsistency with Appendix 1:10 Book of Forms, relating to the Guarantee for Stipend. Although this form is of the portion entitled "Forms that may be used in the foregoing procedure" (note the word "may"), the Clerks are of the opinion that the point is well taken and the Presbytery of Brampton should have Assembly accede to the petition of the Memorial.

The Clerks therefore recommend accordingly. It should be noted that the changes do not affect the amounts paid by the congregations, but make clear the traditional definition of "stipend", which is, "the total amount of the minister's income out of which he is paid the necessary expenses of his work" — and, of

course, manse (or equivalent) and glebe are added. The change is not one that goes under the Barrier Act, but may be changed by motion in Assembly.

The recommendation is that in the present guarantee the words "...the annual stipend of \_\_\_\_\_, dollars (\$\_\_\_\_\_) plus annual car or travel allowance of \_\_\_\_ (\$\_\_\_\_), and to provide manse and glebe or rented house or apartment or \_\_\_\_ dollars (\$\_\_\_\_) annually for housing allowance be changed to stipend of \_\_\_\_\_dollars (\$\_\_\_\_) which amount is inclusive stipend of \_\_\_\_\_dollars (\$\_\_\_\_) which amount is inclusive of annual car or travel allowance, and to provide manse and glebe or rented house or apartment, or dollars (\$\_\_\_\_) annually for housing allowance. In addition to this shall be reported as stipend, and added to the foregoing amount, the amount expended by the congregation under the study leave clause of 1. further in this form 10 in the year in which the congregation provides this cost of a minimum of \$100."

### THE NATIONAL DEVELOPMENT FUND

To the Venerable the 101st General Assembly:

The National Development Fund received \$266,296. in 1974 bringing total

contributions to the Fund to \$3,040,852. at December 31, 1974.

As we enter the final year for collecting, the records show that 147 congregations have incompleted pledges which total \$547,851. 279 congregations have closed out their campaigns; 166 of these had reached or exceeded their allocation; 14 congregations made initial contributions in 1974. This leaves 240 congregations which have not participated.

Early in 1975 a brochure entitled "Semi-Final Report" was circulated to all congregations with a letter from the chairman thanking those who had finished their campaigns, urging those still working to "persevere unto the end", and inviting those who have not participated to make a nominal contribution before the final

report is prepared.

The financial statement, including allocations made to date will be found in the

Treasurer's Statement, Schedule C. (see page 287)

It should be noted that since the inception of the National Development Fund, investment income has amounted to \$538,168. This money has been paid into the general funds of the church as it has been received, and has been used to help increase stipends.

New ways of doing this are constantly being sought and tried, as we support congregations in their program of life and mission.

### 1. LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT

Statement of Philosophy of Leadership Development

The Standing Committee on Leadership Development has formulated the following statement in an effort to describe the nature of their task. It is not intended as a final statement. As the Spirit leads the Church and this Committee the statement will be reworked and improved.

The purpose of leadership development is to help develop Christian leadership within congregations for the sake of building community, the process whereby people through threefold reconciliation (self, God, others) are enabled to work

together for the Kingdom of God.

Christian leadership is something every Christian exercises as he or she seeks to live in response to God's love in Christ. Sometimes this "leadership" is simply the way a person participates with and relates to other people. At other times a person assumes or is assigned a role as a leader. Christian leadership is therefore exercised both formally and informally, consciously, and unconsciously, explicitly and implicitly.

Leadership development happens to Christians in their families, in schools, shops, and offices, as well as in Church life. However, this Committee's concern and task are limited to the leadership development within the life of a local church or a

parallel group under the care of a Presbytery.

Leadership for what? The goal of Christian leadership development is to enable people to work together effectively for the Kingdom of God. The model of leadership is Jesus himself, but as the Spirit gives diverse gifts to members of Christ's body so it can be expected that the same Spirit will make effective a variety of leadership styles.

Leadership development is therefore a process which relates to all in the Church at all stages of their growth and maturity. Planning for it accordingly requires an appreciation of a variety of factors: spiritual, psychological, sociologial,

political. Specifically it involves an awareness of the following:

how leadership emerges and is exercised how people learn; learning readiness

how decisions get made

variety of leadership styles

the part played by motivation, support, enablement, creating a climate of openness, training and retraining.

The task of identifying potential leaders is constantly before us. The most reliable criterion is the actual performance of individuals to whom appropriate opportunities are presented.

Guidelines for a National Advisory Council for Youth Ministry

The Board has had under review the guidelines for a National Co-Ordinating Body for Youth and Young Adult Ministry. Through its Advisory Committee on Youth Participation in consultation with the N.C.B., the following guidelines have been produced by the B.C.L.

Preamble

"All ministries of the Church proceed from and are sustained by the ministry of the Lord Jesus Christ. He is our Prophet, Priest and King, the Minister of the covenant of grace. By the operation of God's Word and Spirit the Church is gathered, equipped, and sent out to participate in this ministry. All her members are called to share the Gospel with the world, and to offer to the Father the worship and service that are due to Him from His creation, through Christ the only Mediator, until He comes again."

(Preamble to Ordination Questions, adopted 1970)

Youth ministry is not to be regarded as something separate and apart from the life and ministry of a congregation of Christ's people, but very much a part of it. Young people need to be part of a worshipping community - which means a caring, evangelical, educational, mission-oriented community, a community of mutual support where the Good News is experienced. A strong youth program outside of a worshipping community is a contradiction in terms. Similarly a worshipping community without young people suggests a failure in mission.

In general, the purpose of youth ministry may be summarized as follows:

(i) To present Jesus Christ as Lord and Saviour.

(ii) To lead young people into fellowship and communion with Him.

(iii) To guide and encourage young people in Christian faith and obedience in their daily living.

(iv) To teach young people to practice Christian stewardship of the whole life: time, talent and treasure.

(v) To promote the spirit of, and support the work of, Christian mission.

(vi) To encourage young people to be interested, active, and well-informed Church members.

(For Functions and Terms of Appointment see p. 424.)

Officers

A Chairman, and if necessary, other officers, will be selected by the N.A.C. from within its membership.

Implementation

The N.A.C. will implement its functions by:

(i) Meeting each year in November with members of the Advisory Committee on Youth Participation for orientation and training in the work of The Presbyterian Church in Canada, and in the role of youth in the total life and mission of the Church.

(ii) Meeting at the time of the B.C.L. Annual Meeting to provide youth input for the Board and to gain a working knowledge of the Board's major policies and its recommendations to the General Assembly.

(iii) Sharing reports and information, possibly through a newsletter, with members of Synod, Presbytery and congregational youth groups.

The cost of the N.A.C. meetings shall be financed jointly by the Board of Congregational Life and the Congregational Life Committee, or its equivalent within each Synod. The B.C.L. will assume responsibility for up to \$1,200 per year, and each Synod Committee will assume responsibility for up to \$200 per year.

### RECOMMENDATION 1.

That the Guidelines for a National Advisory Council for Youth Ministry as presented in the body of this report be approved.

Youth/Young Adult Leadership Workshop

In November 1974, the Board of Congregational Life sponsored a workshop for the training of leaders of youth. This workshop was held within the Synod of Quebec and Eastern Ontario and was held in place of sending a number of youth leaders to a training lab in the United States. The reports and evaluations indicate that it was a very worthwhile and helpful event. Plans are being made for the holding of one or two similar events during 1975, using the Ottawa event as a model for others.

Youth Evangelism Teams

During the summer of 1974 a team of ten young people with the Reverend Robert and Mrs. Fourney of Forest, Ontario as directors, toured parts of Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, presenting the gospel in word and song to other young people. Congregations which invited the team were asked to arrange for them to appear at neighbouring beaches, parks and places where people on vacation were gathered. The purpose of this pilot project was to test the validity of this form of youth ministry and demonstrate its possibilities to Presbyteries and congregations within the denomination.

The evaluation of the work of last summer's youth evangelism team, 'Messiah's Minstrels', has led to plans for the pilot project to be continued for one more year. Two teams are being assembled, one in eastern and one in western Canada. Financing has been arranged by a grant from the Administrative Council - special projects fund, the Board of Congregational Life, Board of World Mission, the W.M.S. (W.D.) and by asking congregations who use the teams to make a voluntary contribution to their expenses.

National Committee of Presbyterian Men

In presenting the report of the National Committee of Presbyterian Men, we take this opportunity to acknowledge with gratitude and thanksgiving the long and dedicated career of Mr. Roy Hamilton, the first and only director of the P.M. movement from 1957 until his retirement on March 8th, 1974. His outstanding contribution and faithfulness to the church makes him beloved by many thousands of people across Canada and abroad. We also give thanks for the many men's work leaders in congregations, Presbyteries and Synods throughout the Church,

National conferences

Three conferences were sponsored by the National Committee of Presbyterian' Men during 1974. At all of these conferences Dr. Mariano DiGangi dealt superbly with the Centennial theme, "Remembrance - Renewal - Response". The conferences were held at the Nova Scotia Agricultural College at Truro, N.S., at Trent University, Peterborough, Ontario and at the Banff Centre of Fine Arts, Alberta. A total of 458 people attended the three conferences.

Conferences planned for 1975 will feature Dr. Max Putnam as the theme speaker. The theme chosen is, "I believe, therefore. . .". The dates are as follows: Truro, N.S., May 9-11; Canadian Keswick, September 5-7; and Banff, Alberta,

September 19-21.

A filmstrip and cassette entitled "P.M. Through the Years" has been prepared and personal copies have been presented to all members of the National Committee for use in their congregations, Presbyteries and Synods for the promotion of men's work.

A change in the interpretation of men's work in the church is indicated by an altered statement on the letterhead - "Promoting Men's Work in the Church" now reads "Promoting the Work of the Church among Men". It was felt that this more clearly presents the purpose of the National Committee.

The Synod Representatives' Reports indicate a wide variety of work and projects being carried on by men in their areas, particularly with regard to the Centennial celebrations. Several regional conferences are being planned for 1975.

Projects

The committee is seriously involved in preparing a comprehensive program for promotion of boys' work within congregations and will continue to give top priority to this vital area of work. Promotion and assistance for projects supporting the program of the church is being continued.

In addition, support is offered for leadership training, prayer breakfasts, special services, hymn sings and other activities. These are all planned to help men perform a more effective work and witness in their congregations, homes and vocations.

The committee continues to ask for your support and your prayers as it endeavours to work with and train men for service in the Church of our Lord Jesus Christ.

### Laity Sunday

Through its Advisory Committee on Adult Programs the Board has undertaken an evaluation of the practice of observing Laity Sunday. This special Sunday is seen as an opportunity for the laity to share with their fellow members what it means to live the Christian life day by day in their homes, communities and places of work.

### **RECOMMENDATION 2.**

That congregations be encouraged to observe Laity Sunday on the third Sunday in October, or at another time suitable to local arrangements.

### Evangelists-at-Large

The Board continues to sponsor the Evangelists-at-Large program. Under this program nine ministers of The Presbyterian Church in Canada who were named by the Board of Evangelism and Social Action and reported to the 99th General Assembly as Evangelists-at-Large may be invited by any congregation to conduct a preaching mission. The Board of Congregational Life offers planning assistance and, if necessary, financial assistance to congregations. Congregations and Presbyteries which decide to conduct a preaching mission, whether they use one of the Evangelists-at-Large or not, are encouraged to consult with the Board of Congregational Life as they make their plans.

### Stewardship Education and Budget Promotion

"With painful steps and slow," (some slower than others because they shirk pain) we are moving up toward the three million giving-level for the General Assembly Budget. But we need to accelerate our pace because program demands are increasing faster than our support.

The problem about an increase in Budget support is not financial. An average increase of ten cents per member per week would wipe out the deficit that is being forecast in the Authorized Expenditures, and provide a surplus of \$200,000.00. The problem is how to persuade the members to accept their responsible share of the Assembly program load.

### Promotional materials

(i) Weekly Bulletins. This medium of communicating information about the general work of the church, continues to be our main promotional tool.

The circulation figure of 65,000 per week has held steady despite the increase in price forced on us by the increase in paper costs.

(ii) Annual Theme Emphasis. Posters and brochures illustrating the theme, "Give: Make a Difference" are being prepared for circulation in the late summer and for use in the 1975-76 period.

(iii) Budget Posters. Illustrating how the Budget dollar is spent and where it comes from, and brochures on the same subject for broad circulation, have been made available to congregations and are being ordered steadily.

(iv) The Commitment Plan. The new handbook and other materials for guidance in conducting effective stewardship visitations was tested in the fall of 1974 in several congregations with good results. A workshop on the Commitment Plan and related stewardship matters was held early in the year to train a corps of Presbytery leaders, so that they can give counsel in their respective districts in the techniques of the Commitment Plan and in stewardship education for congregational leaders.

In addition staff members of the Board are prepared to offer assistance to Presbyteries and congregations in planning and training events for stewardship im-

provement.

### **RECOMMENDATION 3.**

That the target for 1976 General Assembly Budget on which allocations are based be \$3,000,000.

### **RECOMMENDATION 4.**

That congregational allocations for the General Assembly Budget be computed on the above figure and sent to Presbyteries in time for October meetings.

### **RECOMMENDATION 5.**

That Presbyteries be strongly urged to see that every congregation within their bounds either conducts an Every Person Visitation or engages in an approved stewardship emphasis, making use of the trained resource persons now available in each Synod.

### RECOMMENDATION 6.

That the Board of Congregational Life be authorized to continue to collect National Development Fund contributions until the end of 1975.

Summary of 1974 Giving

### SUMMARY OF 1974 GIVING

Congregational support for the General Assembly Budget increased in 1974 by \$148,430 - (6.7%) to a new record of \$2,355,836. In addition congregations raised \$778,641 for other benevolences including \$266,000 for the National Development Fund, and \$130,000 for Inter-Church Aid and \$508,034 raised by the WMS (E.D. and W.D.).

The total raised for All Purposes including the above was \$21,133,983, an increase of \$1,381,280 (7%). Giving for purposes outside the congregations was 17,2% of the total for all purposes of which the Assembly Budget received 11.1%, the same percentage as in 1973.

The per member rate for the Assembly Budget increased to \$13.49 from \$12.51 in 1973. The per member rate for all purposes increased to \$121.07 from \$111.99 in 1973.

Analysis of the Presbytery and Synod Givings (see pages 346-347)

The chart attached to this report shows:

 20 Presbyteries and 4 Synods had a per member rate above the National average for Assembly Budget support, and 25 Presbyteries and 5 Synods had a higher than national average per member rate for all purposes.

 The highest per member rate for the Budget was in the Presbytery of East Toronto, \$17.73; followed by Brockville, \$17.16; Westminster, \$17.13; Temiskaming, \$16.79; Winnipeg, \$16.59; Vancouver Island, \$16.32; Edmonton, \$16.08; Ottawa, \$15.61; Algoma-North Bay, \$15.51; Superior, \$15.39; Kamloops, \$15.19.

 The highest per member rate for All Purposes was in the Presbytery of Kamloops, \$192.61; followed by Newfoundland \$189.07; Quebec, \$178.92; Kootenay, \$177.39; Peace River, \$168.82; Ottawa, \$168.52; East Toronto, \$158.31; Winnipeg, \$152.20.

4. The Synod of British Columbia had the highest Synod per members rate for both Budget (\$16.30) and for All Purposes (\$166.64).

 All Synods showed increases in both Budget support and in total raised for All Purposes.

### II RESOURCES DEVELOPMENT

Through its Committee on Resources Development the Board has a number of resources for use by congregations in support of their work of life and mission. A booklet in popular style entitled, "The Eldership in Today's Church" was written by Stephen A. Hayes and published under authority of the Board. A new catalogue of Resources for Youth Ministry has been widely distributed throughout the Church. It is expected that the communicants' class materials which are presently being tested in selected congregations will be ready for use early in 1976. Resources for continuing education of elders are frequently requested and progress is being made in their production.

A major project during the past year has been the production of Centennial Resources for use in Church School classes, Kindergarten through Junior High, Emphasizing the history and mission of The Presbyterian Church in Canada over the past 100 years, these resources are designed to enable teachers to lead their students in the celebration of the church's centennial and to make a commitment of their lives to Christ and his church in the years ahead.

The production of resources for the promotion of General Assembly Budget occupied a good portion of staff time and Board finances. Included was the promotion of the Birthday Gift project.

### A Systems Approach to Church Education

The concept of a system is common in social sciences today. The main characteristic of a systems approach is the dynamic interrelatedness among all its components so that there is harmony and integration in the entire operation. We speak today of the nervous system, the transportation system, the communications system. The human body, however, probably provides the original model of a system. The muscles, nerves, bones, blood vessels, joints, etc., all operating together constitute a system. The major emphasis of such a systemic approach to education in the church also is upon interdependence, integrity, harmony, and co-ordination so that education contributes appropriately to the fulfilment of the mission of the Church. The apostle Paul seems to have understood this when he wrote of the church that "there are many parts, yet one body". (I Cor. 12:20 RSV) and "...the whole body joined and knit together by every joint...when each part is working properly, makes bodily growth and upbuilds itself in love". (Eph. 4:16 RSV).

An educational system for the congregation is defined as a comprehensive and integrated program composed at least the following components, and characterized by a consistency among the components:

1. An on-going planning/evaluating process.

2. A statement of theological and educational affirmations and goals.

Teaching/learning opportunities organized on the basis of specified constituencies, groupings, educational approaches and a variety of settings.

Teaching/learning resources, including media, people and institutions.
 Leadership support, including physical, financial, human and material resources, also pre-service and in-service training.

Such components are found to some extent in present local educational programs wherever and whenever careful planning has taken place. A systems approach

tries to ensure the inclusion of all components and to assure integrity and consistency among them.

The assumption underlying this effort to support effective education in the congregation is the conviction that it is the congregation which designs and implements its educational program. Other agencies of the church can offer help, guidance, resource materials, and training, but the ultimate decisions and designs are made by the congregation.

### **RECOMMENDATION 7.**

That the General Assembly endorse the systems approach to church education, recognizing that this approach is in keeping with the stance of The Presbyterian Church in Canada regarding "responsible congregational selection of resources".

### Strategy for Congregational Planning and Selection

In order to encourage and assist congregations with planning for church education, a set of planning resources have been tested in selected congregations across Canada and, in the testing, people have been trained to assist other congregations in the use of these resources. It is expected that, over the next two years, thirty per cent of the congregations of The Presbyterian Church in Canada will have become involved in planning for an integrated approach to church education.

### **RECOMMENDATION 8.**

That congregations be urged to plan for an integrated, comprehensive approach to church education, making use of the planning modules developed by Joint Educational Development.

### Joint Educational Development - "Christian Education: Shared Approaches"

The 100th General Assembly approved of continuing participation in Joint Educational Development by evaluating the four shared approaches as to their suitability for use in The Presbyterian Church in Canada, and by developing a strategy for assisting congregations to develop their educational program.

During the past year a network of twenty-six evaluators and some national staff have studied and reported their findings on the foundation papers and descriptions of each of the four approaches. The papers have been examined, also, by members of the Committee on Church Doctrine. This committee will be kept informed as additional material becomes available. The Advisory Committee on Church School Curriculum has reviewed the replies from the evaluators and has recommended to the Board the participation of The Presbyterian Church in Canada in all four approaches, recognizing that approach #4 will require the development of special material related to Canadian cultural and social issues.

### RECOMMENDATION 9.

That the General Assembly approve the continued participation of The Presbyterian Church in Canada in Joint Educational Development – Shared Approaches, being related to all four approaches and recognizing that approach #4 will require the development of special materials related to Canadian social and cultural issues.

### RECOMMENDATION 10.

That congregations, in planning for church education, be encouraged to explore resources from the four shared approaches in J.E.D.

### Heritage Materials

For use with all four approaches and, indeed, with any other curriculum which congregations may select, it will be necessary to develop "Heritage" material related to the history, doctrine, mission and government of The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

### RECOMMENDATION 11.

That the General Assembly recognize the need for the development of "Heritage" materials for use along with J.E.D.-Shared Approaches in The Presbyterian Church in Canada and that the Board of Congregational Life be authorized to proceed with planning for such development and to report to the 102nd General Assembly.

### III. STAFFING SITUATION

The ninety-ninth General Assembly authorized the Board of Congregational Life to employ up to eleven staff at the executive level. The Board began its work in January '74 with a staff of eight, although it had a salary budget for nine. This was due to the fact that Dr. A. E. Bailey, who had been the Senior Educational Consultant with the Board of Christian Education, accepted a call to a pastoral charge. Since that time Rev. R. P. Carter has accepted a call to a pastoral charge, and Mr. Gordon Young has resigned to return to his former place of employment. As of March, 1974, the staff team was reduced to a total of six.

In October 1974, the Administrative Council gave permission to the Board to take steps to appoint an associate secretary with responsibility for youth ministry, family life education, resources for creative worship and church camping. Presbyteries were circularized for nominations and those who were interested were interviewed. At its meeting in March the Board appointed Rev. Brant P. Loper as an

associate secretary with a job understanding as stated above. Mr. Loper comes to Canada from the United Presbyterian Church, U.S.A., and has had experience with youth ministry, church camping and family life education. For the past three years he has been director of renewal at the Yokefellow Institute of Richmond, Indiana. He comes to us highly recommended by Rev. Lyle Schaller of the Institute, and by Rev. Elton Trueblood. Mr. Loper began his work with the

Board on April 1st.

In light of the need to develop "Heritage" materials on the history, doctrine, mission and government of The Presbyterian Church in Canada for use as supplementary material in church education, the Board has taken steps to appoint an associate secretary with editorial and writing skills. The Administrative Council has given its approval and Presbyteries have been requested to submit nominations. When this appointment has been made it will bring the staff team back to a total of eight.

Following the resignation of Mr. Gordon Young the Board referred the matter of the resulting vacancy to its task force on staffing needs for consultation with the National Committee of Presbyterian Men regarding the future shape of men's work

and the staff support needed by the National Committee.

### IV. DELIVERY OF SERVICES

While it can be said that the whole purpose of the Board of Congregational Life is service to congregations, and everything it does is to that end, there is also the specialized way in which the staff provides service directly to the field. The report last year indicated the guidelines within which this is done.

All staff members have responsibility for field assignments, which bring them into direct contact with congregations. But, by the very nature of their work, some spend larger amounts of time on the field. The Educational Resource Persons and the Synod Deaconess in the Atlantic Provinces also are part of the team and relate

to the work of the B.C.L.

Through a Joint Task Force with representatives of the Board of World Mission and the Women's Missionary Society (W.D.), we are seeking to develop a closer co-operation and mutual support by all staff persons, national and regional. We are concerned to avoid overlapping and underserving and seek to enable the best deployment of staff in response to needs.

In March of this year an Inter-Board Staff Conference took place with national and regional staff of four agencies present - the W.M.S. (W.D.), the W.M.S. (E.D.),

the Board of World Mission and the Board of Congregational Life.

The Board is aware that some services are needed regionally rather than nationally, and for a limited period rather than on a continuing basis. Accordingly, we encourage the possibility of making part-time appointments for a short term in order to serve specific needs in a region. This would be done only after consultation

and agreement with the region concerned.

During the past year, a series of consultations was held with Presbytery representatives in each Synod to discuss the present services and programs and to consider new possibilities. This is part of a continuing process of seeking the best way to provide service. It is obvious that we must keep our structures as flexible as possible in order that we can respond readily to changing conditions and changing needs.

In light of this, the Board has offered a block of time to each Synod for concentrated service to be given by national staff. The Synod Committee will decide the area of leadership development to be dealt with, and will, of necessity, be involved with the national staff in planning for the best use of staff time while in the bounds of the Synod. The whole procedure will then be evaluated carefully for future strategy in the deployment of staff persons to serve the Church.

### V. ECONOMIC AND SOCIAL ISSUES

Marriage Guidelines and Related Subjects

This study project deals with the question of whether it is expedient for the courts of the church (especially General Assembly and the Presbyteries) to set guidelines for their ministers in the conduct of weddings. Four study papers were published in September 1974 to stimulate discussion of the issues. Responses have been received by the Board of Congregational Life from 21 Presbyteries and 13 congregations. The Board is grateful for the good work which went into many of the replies.

On the basis of the responses there is definite opposition to having regulations prepared by the General Assembly on the subject of marriage. There was strong affirmation that practices must be flexible since it is the responsibility of ministers to counsel couples who plan to marry. However there seems to be a need for guidelines, presumably at the Presbytery level, which would be general in nature, but would reflect the attitude of the Presbytery toward couples who fall in special categories such as non-believers, divorced persons and people who come from different religious traditions.

The Board of Congregational Life has instructed one of its committees to prepare draft guidelines on the subject of marriage, divorce and re-marriage in consultation with the committees on Church Doctrine and Church Worship. The Board will be consulting with the Colleges regarding the possibility of courses of study on the theology of marriage and divorce, as well as practical courses in pre-marital counselling and marriage enrichment being included in both under-

graduate and post-graduate studies.

Capital Punishment

A study paper on Capital Punishment was published in September 1974 and was considered by 7 Presbyteries and 3 sessions. Several Presbyteries have asked for an extension of time to consider the matter and the Board agrees that it would be desirable to provide the opportunity for further study.

The Board therefore invites Presbyteries and congregations that have not replied to consider the study paper and send in their comments to the Board of Congregational Life not later than January 31st, 1976. The study paper is available

from the Board of Congregational Life at 25¢ a copy.

The Board reports that, in light of the fact that several people are under sentence of death, a letter was written on March 25, 1975, to the Solicitor General of Canada stating that the 93rd General Assembly (1967) went on record as opposing capital punishment.

### Abortion

(a) Overture 3. from the Presbytery of Westminster to the 101st General Assembly re abortion was referred to the Board of Congregational Life.

### **RECOMMENDATION 12.**

That the prayer of the overture be granted and that the Minister of Justice of Canada and the Attornies General of the Provinces be so informed.

(b) "Health" as the criterion for abortion.

This subject was raised by the 99th General Assembly and remitted to the Board of Congregational Life. The Board believes that the present law which makes abortion conditional upon the health of the mother is so general that great disparities in interpretation and application of the law have resulted. The Board has instructed one of its committees to draft a statement of what should be included or excluded from a definition of 'health' for submission to the government.

"Conscience Clause"

Regarding the right of hospital and medical staff not to participate in therapeutic abortions, Mr. Cafik, Parliamentary Assistant to the Honourable Marc Lalonde, submitted Bill C-256 to amend the Criminal Code for first reading on March 12, 1974. The bill read, "Everyone who discharges, expels, demotes or otherwise discriminates against any person in the employ of an accredited or approved hospital because such person refused to take part in the procuring of a miscarriage on the grounds of being a conscientious objector, is guilty of an offense punishable on summary conviction."

The bill was never passed into law. Therefore the Board recommends as follows:

### **RECOMMENDATION 13.**

That the General Assembly recommend to the Minister of Justice of Canada and the Law Reform Commission of Canada that a law be enacted to protect medical workers from demotion, suspension or discharge from employment who refuse on grounds of conscience to take part in abortions.

Surplus Food

In the light of a world food crisis, the Canadian public has been greatly disturbed by reports of wasted food surpluses. The Board presents the following recommendation:

### **RECOMMENDATION 14.**

That the General Assembly recommend to the Government of Canada where a surplus of foodstuffs occurs, it be policy for the various government agencies to distribute the surplus, wherever possible without cost, among non-profit institutions at home and abroad.

Immigration Policy

The Government of Canada has released a Green Paper on Immigration Policy and has invited all Canadians to discuss and comment on the issues. Besides the rather lengthy document described as the "Green Paper", the Government has made available a shorter paper which draws out the issues for discussion. It is also proposed that public forums be held across Canada. It is the hope of the Board that many church members will take the opportunity to study and comment on these matters.

### **RECOMMENDATION 15.**

That the General Assembly encourage Presbyteries and congregations to study the issues raised in the Green Paper on Immigration Policy, to consider the implications from a theological and ethical standpoint, and to make their views known to the Government of Canada.

The 80th General Assembly (1954) adopted a position "unalterably opposed

to gambling whether carried on under government, religious or other auspices". We believe that this position is still valid.

Part of the statement adopted in 1954 reads as follows:

"Legalized lotteries, even though granted official recognition by the State, should nevertheless be regarded as an evil by the church.

"It must be admitted that some who profess Christian Faith hold a light view of gambling, and that some churches use raffles, bingo and other like devices to raise money. Nevertheless, our conscience is to be guided by the Word and the Spirit, and not by the corrupting customs of the world.

Furthermore, gambling discourages thrift and encourages materialism. It exploits philanthropy and debases charity. It tends to replace trust in Providence by dependence on chance. It dulls social responsibility and destroys domestic peace. It prevents a man from being a faithful steward of Jesus Christ in the use of his time and ability and money.'

### **RECOMMENDATION 16.**

That the General Assembly reaffirm the position taken by the 80th General Assembly regarding the legalization of lotteries and that the Government of Canada and the provinces be so informed.

### Drugs and Alcohol Advertising

Both the Study Paper on the LeDain Commission Report prepared by the B.C.L. and a Study on the Majority Report of the LeDain Commission prepared by a task force set up by the 100th General Assembly were remitted to Presbyteries and congregations for study and report by February 15th, 1975. By that date, replies had been received from six Presbyteries and four congregations, indicating general agreement with the position taken by the Board of Congregational Life in its report of last year.

In the light of the number of replies received, the Board has agreed to allow more time for replies to be received and invites those Presbyteries and congregations which have not done so to undertake the study and to report their findings to

the Board.

The Presbytery of Cape Breton made a proposal to the Board that a recommendation be presented to the General Assembly urging the Governments of Canada, which have not already done so, to prohibit the advertising of alcoholic beverages, and encouraging individuals across Canada to write to their local Members of Parliament urging that alcohol advertising be banned in the public media.

### **RECOMMENDATION 17.**

That the General Assembly urge the Government of Canada and the Governments of the various provinces which have not already done so, to prohibit all advertising of alcoholic beverages and that individuals within the membership of the Church be encouraged to write to their local Members of Parliament and/or Provincial Legislature urging the prohibition of all advertising of alcoholic beverages.

### VI. THE BOARD'S PRIORITIES FOR 1975

At the annual meeting in March the Board set its priorities for 1975. The following were identified as matters of high priority: assistance to congregations through field service; promotion of a 3-million dollar G. A. Budget; assistance to Presbyteries in developing a stewardship emphasis among congregations; development of a strategy for the selection of resources and congregational planning for church education; development of Heritage materials, and special resources for use with approach #4, J.E.D. - Shared Approaches; the appointment of a staff person with editorial and writing skills; youth evangelism teams; family enrichment courses/resources.

### VII. OVERTURE 28 (ACTS & PROCEEDINGS 1974, p. 444)

### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MINISTRY

To the Venerable, the 101st General Assembly:

The Board of Ministry became fully operational on January 1st, 1975 on which date the Rev. J. C. Cooper took up duties as General Secretary. The Committee on Personnel Services of which Mr. Cooper had been director went out of existence on the above date and its work was absorbed by the Board of Ministry. The Board appointed its Personnel Committee as provided for in its organizational proposal (A. & P., 1973, page 452) to carry forward the work previously undertaken by Personnel Services. Also on the above date, the work of the committee on the Order of Deaconesses was formally transferred to the Task Force concerning deaconesses which reports to the Board.

Recognizing that the Board is to keep its work under review, including a major review at the end of the initial three years, (A. & P., 1973, page 455, 9. (i).), criteria and objectives have been formulated which will serve as a basis upon which to assess the Board's performance at the end of this period and meanwhile act as a set of priorities for the current work of the Board. One of the top priorities in the next three years will be the visitation of presbyteries, as instructed by last year's General Assembly (A. & P., 1974, page 412, Rec. 3.). This project will afford an opportunity to listen to ministers and church workers discuss the issues which are paramount to them. It is intended to cover one third of the presbyteries in each year.

The organizational proposal for the Board provided for a staff of three of which one is to be an administrative assistant. The Board is currently seeking to fill this position and anticipates making an appointment about mid-1975.

### The Vancouver School of Theology

The Board would refer the Assembly to the statement on this matter in last year's report. In the interval the Board has received no further information which would cause it to conclude that full participation in this venture by our Church is needed or demanded at the present time. The matter is continuing under study by the Board.

### Counselling of Candidates for the Ministry

The Board has been studying American Career Counselling procedures used for evaluating candidates, and the Church of Scotland Selection Schools set up for the same purpose. These are two quite dissimilar methods of achieving the same ends.

The Rev. Thomas E. Brown of the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. and Dr. Murdo Ewen MacDonald of the Church of Scotland — acknowledged leaders in this field — gave Board members a day of comparing and contrasting their methods of counselling candidates before they are certified by the Church.

The Board's Task Force on the subject hopes to have a plan using the best features of both systems, for the consideration of next year's General Assembly.

### RECOMMENDATION 1.

That the Board of Ministry send its plan for counselling candidates for the ministry (including the diaconate) to Presbyteries for study and reply by January 31, 1976.

### Consultations

The Board has consulted with the following (as instructed by last year's Gen-

- The faculties and other representatives of Ewart, Knox and Presbyterian Colleges. This is partially reported in the section of Ecumenical Theological Education.
  - Other items discussed included: Counselling candidates for the ministry and recruitment.
- 2. The Committee on Institutional Chaplaincies
  - The Board has made clear that should the committee become part of the Board of Ministry, it could continue its present function with its present member representation and make-up. The Committee has decided to postpone a decision on uniting with any of the Boards for a year.
- 3. The Board of Ministry and the Board of Congregational Life have established a joint Task Force on the Filling of Vacancies. Guidelines on the matter already published by various presbyteries are being studied along with the appropriate sections of the Book of Forms. The Task Force hopes to report by early next year through the Personnel Committee of the Board of Ministry.

### **Ecumenical Theological Education**

At the consultation with representatives of Knox, Ewart, and Presbyterian Colleges in February, each college reported on its involvement in ecumenical theological education, summarized as follows:

In preparing students for the ministry, (basic-degree level), Knox College is part of a federation of theological colleges known as the Toronto School of Theology. Although a core curriculum must be taken at Knox, the pooling of staff and courses makes 240 courses from 70 faculty members available to the students.

First year classes are normally taken in Knox College, second and third year classes may take one third of their courses outside of Knox College but do not usually avail themselves of the opportunity to this extent unless Knox Professors are on sabbatical leave as has been the case this past year.

At the advanced-degree level, TST administers one program offering several degrees. That is, the member colleges have agreed to a single program with a single admissions policy as distinct from the federation of separate programs at the basic-degree level. There is a co-operative library scheme which saves many thousands of dollars by eliminating unnecessary duplication of purchases.

The faculty and students of *Presbyterian College*, along with those of the Diocesan (Anglican) and United Theological Colleges participate in and help to form the McGill Faculty of Religious Studies. Appointments of professors to the traditional chairs are made by McGill in consultation with the member colleges. There is a core curriculum and the colleges are able to direct their students to take elective courses to fulfil Church requirements.

The third and final year is under The Montreal Institute for Ministry, sponsored by the Joint Board of the Theological Colleges. The goal of this program is competence in Ministry with emphasis on supervised Field Education (usually in a congregation). Denominational studies are taught in each of the colleges.

Two of the four annual Continuing Education programs of Presbyterian College are shared with the Diocesan and United Colleges. Guest lecturers have included Anglicans, Episcopalians, Methodists, Roman Catholics and United Church persons

Both Knox College and Presbyterian College reported that their ecumenical involvement actually heightened the sense of Presbyterian identity among our students. The differences can no longer remain unexamined.

Ewart College, while not being associated with other denominational colleges, encourages its students to study towards a degree at the University of Toronto, concurrently with their studies at Ewart. About half of the Ewart students do so and are thus eligible to do post-graduate studies if they wish.

It is the view of the Board of Ministry that the needs of our students and our church have been well served by the faculties of our colleges who have helped to

create expanded opportunities through ecumenical theological education. They are to be commended as faithful to our Reformed heritage by participating in the inter-church co-operation which is such a vast improvement over ancient rivalries and suspicions.

As for the future, the Board of Ministry plans to examine and evaluate new forms of ecumenical theological education as they emerge, and to keep the matter under study and review. Meanwhile, research is being conducted into the views of

recent graduates who studied under the old and new systems.

### RECOMMENDATION 2.

That the statement on ecumenical theological education in this report be received as the reply of the Board of Ministry in fulfilment of the request of the 1973 General Assembly (A. & P., pages 334 and 335).

## REPORT ON OVERTURE NO. 13, 1972, PRESBYTERY OF EAST TORONTO RE: THE RETIRING AGE OF MINISTERS.

This is the report of a composite committee made up of representatives of the Board of Ministry, the Committee on Church Doctrine and the Clerks of Assembly.

This Overture, which prays that Assembly set seventy years of age as the retiring age of all ministers of the Church and that any extension of this limit be on a yearly basis and on application of the congregation with the approval of the presbytery (A. & P., 1972, page 452) was referred to the Pension Board. The Pension Board recommended (page 322, 6.C) that this be referred to the Administrative Council and the Board of World Mission. The recommendation was approved (A. & P., 1972, page 52).

The Administrative Council (A. & P., 1973, Rec. 5, page 423) recommended that this be placed on the docket, which, page 31, was so ordered. The action of Assembly was to refer this to the Board of Ministry and the Committee on Church

Doctrine, in consultation with the Clerks of Assembly. (Page 91).

The Board of Ministry, A. & P., 1974, page 391, Rec. 5, asked that the Overture be remitted to presbyteries for study and report to the Board by January 31st, 1975. The Recommendation was approved. (Page 40). The Committee on Church Doctrine reported that it had named its representatives. (A. & P., 1974, page 406).

The committee discussed at length various aspects of the problem of a fixed time of retirement for pastors. They have also discussed at length the ways in which presbyteries have tried to meet the needs of ministers retiring under Section 245 of the Book of Forms, who have found that income from all sources, unless they have private means, leaves them with far less than sufficient for housing and other living costs. It was noted that some presbyteries, quite legally, appointed the retiring minister as stated supply to the parish from which he was retiring, which was done

under Section 213 of the Book of Forms.

(It should be stated at this point that Stated Supply was originally a means of placing an experienced minister for a period not exceeding a year — and this became renewable — in a troubled parish to help settle its affairs and to enable it to proceed to a call. It became the practice, without legislation and with no objection, to use this for more than the immediate emergency of a divided parish. The phrasing in 213 BF, "when it is deemed inexpedient to proceed to call", was taken as justification for the act. Thus, in times of such factors as the shortage of ministers, the needs of the retiring incumbent, etc., stated supply was given to the retiring incumbent on agreement of details satisfactory to the presbytery, the congregation and the minister.)

The word "induction" has had a definite ecclesiastical meaning for centuries, and the words in the induction rites, "and admit you to all the rights and privileges thereto pertaining" are not idle words. They mean an induction ad vitam aut culpam (for life without fault), and this phrasing cannot be continued with a compulsory retiring age without a change in the law of the Church. For executives and professors there is this regulation (see Appendices of the Book of Forms, Part

Two), "It is put on record that all appointees of the General Assembly hold office at the will of the Assembly. Minutes, 1945". (Page 30, A. & P., Minutes, 1945). Executives and professors who have been inducted since this date have been inducted with a rite in conflict with this regulation which denies the meaning of induction. Some executives have taken a ceremony of recognition, and others have declined to take any ceremony whatsoever. The Clerks of Assembly have always been under this regulation by virtue of Sections 18 to 24 of the Book of Forms, and have taken office without any ceremony. The conflict noted here, however, is not part of this Overture 13, 1972, which concerns only pastors, but is given as illustrative of a definite problem in the whole picture for called servants of the Church.

Under the regulations of the Pension Board and government regulations now in effect, these remarks must be made: (1) The new Church pension regulations are based on retirement at 65; (2) The receiving of the benefits of the Canada Pension Plan do not preclude receiving other income; and (3) Under government regulations, employing bodies must grant a pension before age 71. Thus it becomes possible for a minister to continue beyond 70 with the full meaning of "induction", and the new Pension Plan of our Church has taken note of this.

Your committee favours the granting of the principle of the prayer of Overture 13, 1972, and in the light of the foregoing remarks and other factors that might be

considered, recommends as follows:

(1) That the compulsory retiring age of all pastors be 70, effective as of January

1st following their full age of 70 years.

(2) That where it is desired to continue his or her services in the present or another parish, the presbytery, under the authority of Section 200, Book of Forms, make arrangements mutually acceptable to the presbytery concerned, after consultation with the parish and the minister.

3) That the following be sent down under the Barrier Act:

(A) An amendment of Section 235, Book of Forms, be made as follows: The words "subject to the regulations concerning retirement" follow the words

"to all the rights and privileges thereto pertaining"

(B) An amendment of Section 245, Book of Forms, be made as follows: The first sentence to read, "When a minister, under the regulations concerning retirement, or infirmity, proposes to retire from the active duties of the ministry...".

(If it is the pleasure of Assembly to send this (3) down under the Barrier Act, the presbyteries should be instructed that their replies must be 'no' or 'yes' for both sections, inasmuch as a 'yes' for one and a 'no' for the other would be

contradictory).

(4) These regulations, etc., as they may be passed by Assembly are declared not to be retroactive for pastors already inducted when the law becomes effective under the Barrier Act.

5) If (3) is passed by Assembly under the Barrier Act, the following items should

be noted:

1. That the sections (as usual) be printed on the last page of Acts and Proceedings of that year, and with them a reference to this report be given.

II. That the Clerks of Assembly be authorized to make asterisks and footnotes with reference to this report for sections of the Book of Forms

where, after consideration, they deem such advisable.

III. That the last page of Acts and Proceedings direct all having copies of the Book of Common Order place on pages 360 and 370 thereof the words "subject to the regulations concerning retirement" in the appropriate place that the act of presbytery be in conformity to the foregoing (3).

### REPORT ON OVERTURE OF THE PRESBYTERY OF HAMILTON RE: RETIREMENT AGE OF 65 AFTER 35 YEARS' SERVICE.

The Board of Ministry looks with favour upon the Overture of the Presbytery of Hamilton and notes that it does not contradict the recommendations in the

report of the Committee on Overture 13, 1972, which recommends the mandatory retirement age of 70 years.

### Report on Overture 30, 1974 (Status of Catechists)

After study by a composite committee made up of representatives of the Board of Ministry, of the Committee on Church Doctrine, and the Clerks of Assembly, it is recommended that the prayer of the overture be answered in the follong terms:

(a) That the historic position of the Church be reaffirmed

(b) That the concerns expressed in the overture will be partially taken up in the consideration of the diaconate.

### The Council of the Order of Deaconesses

The fourth biennial Council of the Order of Deaconesses met in Waterloo, May 30-June 2, 1974. The document on the Proposed Diaconate was the main study of the Council. Agnes Roy led two workshops on the attitudes and responses to change within the Church and society. Deaconesses discussed and recommended that during the year in which the Council was not held, finances be requested for regional meetings to enable deaconesses both active and inactive to meet together for study and fellowship. The executive elected were: President, Jean Gardner; Past President, Ann Drummond Gowers; 1st Vice-President, May Nutt; 2nd Vice-President, Mary-Lou Funston; Secretary, Dorothy Bulmer; 'Inactive' Representative, Gale

### The Task Force Concerning Deaconesses

The Task Force had two main responsibilities this year. The first was to study and analyse the replies from presbyteries concerning the proposal for the diaconate, and to make a recommendation to the Committee on Church Doctrine. The presbyteries replied as follows: 14 in favour, 4 opposed, 9 uncommitted. The Task Force recommended and the Church Doctrine Committee approved that the proposal be sent down under the Barrier Act at the coming Assembly. The Clerks of Assembly were asked to prepare legislation to this intent.

The second responsibility of the Task Force was to assume and/or channel the responsibilities which belonged to the former Committee on the Order of Deaconesses. This is in progress and the Board of Ministry is incorporating these responsi-

bilities within its structures.

The Task Force is also requesting through the Board of Ministry, an increase in stipend for deaconesses in 1976. It is requested that the Administrative Council set the deaconess stipend at 90% of the minister's basic stipend and that the housing and travel allowances be equal. The Board is conferring with the Administrative Council's Committee on proportionate salary increases.

### RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That the Board of Ministry send its plan for counselling candidates for the ministry (including the diaconate) to Presbyteries for study and reply by January 31, 1976.

That the statement on ecumenical theological education in this report be received as the reply of the Board of Ministry in fulfilment of the request of

the 1973 General Assembly (A. & P., pages 334 and 335.).

### THE REPORT OF THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH **BUILDING CORPORATION**

To the Venerable the 101st General Assembly:

The Presbyterian Church Building Corporation begs leave to submit its report for the year ended December 31, 1974.

### Interest Rates on Bank Loans

The interest rate on bank loans guaranteed by the Corporation for congregations increased to as high as 13% during the past year. The Corporation is pleased to be in a position to give some assistance to these congregations and, therefore, instituted the following policy.

That where a congregation that has a bank loan approved by the Presbyterian Church Building Corporation and is paying an interest rate in excess of 8% per annum, the Corporation undertake to assist such congregation by lending it

funds on the following terms,

- That, depending on the availability of funds, so long as the congregation is not in default on its bank loan, the Corporation provide a loan of up to 2% of the interest rate charged.

- That, if the interest rate on the bank loan is less than 10%, the amount of the Corporation loan be the difference between the 8% and the interest rate charged.

- That such Corporation loan be advanced twice annually on dates related to the Corporation's income.

- That such Corporation loan be repaid by the recipient congregation on terms to be arranged when the bank loan is paid in full.

- That no interest be charged on such Corporation loan until the bank loan is paid in full.

6 - That such Corporation loan be used only for interest payments.

- That the recipient congregation provide proof (letter from bank manager or bank statement) of the outstanding balance of the loan and the interest rate charged before funds are advanced.

8 - That the recipient congregation give back to the Corporation a promissory note for each advance. If no promissory note is given, no further advances shall be made.

- The Executive shall have discretionary powers as to which congregation shall receive this assistance and to what extent.

### Loans Approved in 1974

Two loans were approved for guarantee by the Corporation during the year as follows: Norman Kennedy Church, Regina for \$40,000 and St. Mark's Church, Malton for \$60,000. Conversations were carried on with other possible borrowing congregations but formal applications have not yet been received.

### The Elliot Lake Property

The Elliot Lake property was sold to Dr. N. S. McMillan for a medical clinic. The proceeds of this sale, which was completed on January 31, 1974, amounted to \$32,000 with cash of \$20,000 to the mortgage of \$12,000. Although the Corporation was not required to share the proceeds, it divided them on a proportionate basis with the Lending Fund, which held a second mortgage. The loss written off by the Corporation was \$14,556 and by the Lending Fund \$12,782.

While the church building at Elliot Lake was vacant, the municipality, in which the property is located, assessed taxes against the property, which assessment the Corporation appealed. This appeal resulted in three court cases. When all arguments were heard, the judgment was given in favour of the Corporation. We had hoped that other denominations would have assisted with the legal costs since the judgment will benefit those with vacant church buildings. The total legal costs amounted to \$3,825.91.

Six congregations reduced their arrears during 1974. We express our appreciation to these congregations for their efforts in this respect. Unfortunately, two congregations were not able to make any payment against their arrears and three other congregations increased them. At December 31, 1974 the total arrears for the twelve congregations listed below stood at \$91,911.61 as against the \$122,609.50 one year ago.

### Assets and Liabilities

At December 31, 1974 the estimated assets of the 63 borrowing congregations stood at \$14,728,280, the liabilities at \$3,460,896 and the congregational equity at \$11,267,384. Three congregations paid off their bank loans during the year.

### The Capital Reserve Fund

The capital reserve fund of the Building Corporation was \$730,912 at December 31, 1974. In addition the Presbyterian Extension Fund (B.C.) Limited holds \$187,970 and the Presbyterian Extension Fund (Atlantic) Limited holds \$15,706 for a total of \$934,588.

### Synod Corporations Wound Up

The Corporations of the Synods of Toronto and Kingston, Hamilton and London and the Corporation of the Presbytery of Ottawa were wound up and received Royal Assent on April 26, 1974. The Corporation of the Synod of Manitoba was wound up and received Royal Assent on June 10, 1974. The assets and liabilities of these companies were transferred to the National Corporation prior to these dates. The assets and liabilities of the Corporation of the Synod of Alberta have been transferred but this company has not yet been wound up although we expect that the necessary legislation will be passed some time in 1975. Retirement of Dr. D. McCullough

Dr. David McCullough has advised the Corporation that he has notified the General Assembly that it is his intention to retire as General Manager of the Corpo-

ration at December 31, 1975.

Dr. McCullough has been associated with the concept of Synod Corporations and subsequently the National Corporation since 1957 when he became General Manager of the Corporation of the Synod of Toronto and Kingston. He was appointed by the General Assembly of 1962 as Business Administrator of the Assembly's Committee on Synod Corporations and subsequently appointed General Manager of the Presbyterian Church Building Corporation, when it was incorporated in

Dr. McCullough has rendered imaginative, devoted and effective service to the Church in these various capacities and it is with real regret that the Board accepts

the fact of his retirement.

The Corporation has called for nominations to fill the vacancy, which will be discussed with the Administrative Council and a nomination will be presented to the General Assembly in a supplemental report.

Nomination of Directors

The by-laws of the Corporation provide that "Directors shall be elected annually by the General Assembly from nominees of the Directors", We, therefore, have recommendations in this respect.

### ANNUAL REPORT THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH ARCHITECTURE

To the Venerable the 101st General Assembly:

The primary function of the Committee on Church Architecture is to advise

Presbyteries and congregations regarding the suitability of plans and cost estimates

for proposed church buildings.

The Committee met a number of times last year to consider and comment on plans for various church buildings throughout the country. The submission of preliminary sketch plans as set forth in "Guidelines for Planning a Church" has enabled the Committee to offer comments at a crucial stage in the planning process.

The Committee also held a special one day meeting to tour new church buildings in the Toronto area. Most were buildings the Committee had reviewed in the plan stage and it was most valuable to hear from the ministers and see for oneself how the buildings had turned out. This experience will be useful in commenting on

future submissions.

The Committee was forcefully reminded by this tour, of how, as construction costs have escalated, church buildings have been reduced in size to stay within their building budgets. There are now several newly built churches which are too small to accommodate their present congregations and programmes. It would appear that there is a minimum size of building required to operate an adequate programme. The Committee suggests that the funding agencies of the Church consider ways of increasing the financing limits for new church building.

### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON INTER-CHURCH RELATIONS

To the Venerable the 101st General Assembly:

We beg to report some of the activities that have come under our purview during the past year.

### TALKS WITH OTHER CHURCHES

Christian Reformed Church

In recent years our Church has been represented by Dr. L. H. Fowler, Mr. J. C. Cooper, and Dr. Wm. Klempa, in carrying on conversations with representatives of the Christian Reformed Church. No meetings have been held since the last Assembly and the Committee is considering approaching the Christian Reformed Church to see if there is interest in renewing these conversations.

### THE FIFTH CANADIAN LUTHERAN-REFORMED DIALOGUE MEETING

The fifth meeting of the Lutheran and Reformed Traditions in Canada convened in May of 1974 at Ewart College. The basic papers involved the self-understanding of the participating churches; i.e., a paper was presented on "The Lutheran Church's Self-Understanding" and one on "The Reformed Church's Self-Understanding". This was an attempt at seeing not only the formal principles that characterize the churches involved in the discussion, but also the modus operandi of each of the churches in which the operating principles might be most clearly seen. The result of this discussion was the following set of findings:

"As we sought to identify our self-understanding, we acknowledged that each

of our churches has a particular emphasis which marks it;

The Lutheran Church emphasizes doctrinal purity. The United Church of Canada emphasizes unity and inclusiveness.

The Presbyterian Church emphasizes continuing reformation in the light of

We recognize that what each of us holds to as our greatest strength can also be the source of our greatest weakness - a cause of pride and an obstacle to unity.

The Lutheran emphasis on doctrinal unity may encourage divisiveness. The United Church emphasis on unity and inclusiveness may limit commit-

ment to historic creedal affirmations.

The Presbyterian emphasis on continuing reformation in the light of Scrip-

ture may bind it too inflexibly to the past and make it insensitive to the contemporary situation.

Each of these emphases has its place in the fullness of the church. Wholeness calls for all of these emphases. Dialogue with each other can lead us to appreciate the emphasis which the other has and help provide a needed balance."

In discussing the future of the dialogue, some problems emerged. The Lutheran Council in Canada had reduced the funds for the dialogue in 1974 so that it was obvious we would not be able to meet as often as we had previously. One of the United Church participants, Professor Gerald Hobbs, has now moved to Geneva and a replacement will be necessary for him. It has been left with the Reverend Norman Threinen and Professor Charles Hay to get together at the earliest opportunity to arrange for future meetings of the dialogue.

### **EXCHANGE WITH REFORMED CHURCH IN HUNGARY**

Since the last Assembly a delegation visited the Reformed Church in Hungary. The delegation was composed of the Moderator of the last General Assembly and Dr. L. Pandy, Delhi. The visit covered the period from September 12th to 29th, and the reception was cordial.

Your Committee received the report of the delegation and approved some recommendations that they made. Plans are underway to receive a small delegation from the Reformed Church in Hungary to visit our Church in the future. It is recommended that publications of our Church should be sent to the Reformed Church in Hungary. It is hoped also that Funds may be secured to send theological books to the Church as well as to give some assistance to preserve the books in the Ráday Library.

There is a need for Scholarship Assistance to theological students who are in training for the ministry of the Reformed Church in Hungary and the possibility of one of these students being brought to one of our theological colleges for training in Canada is being investigated.

### FIFTH ASSEMBLY OF THE WORLD COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

The location and date of the 5th Assembly of the World Council of Churches has been changed from Jakarta to Niarobi and from a summer meeting to a meeting on November 23rd to December 10th, 1975. Dr. Joe McLelland and Mrs. John Johnston are planning to attend this Assembly as the official representatives of our

### WALDENSIAN SYNOD

The Waldensian Synod, Italy, celebrated its 7th Centennial last Fall and it was possible to arrange to have the Moderator of our last Assembly pay a brief visit to Rome to extend greetings to the Synod at that time.

### CANADIAN COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

The meeting of the Triennial of the Canadian Council of Churches has been postponed until 1976. At that time the Inter-Church Relations Committee will appoint representatives to attend the Triennial according to the formula adopted by the 100th General Assembly.

### NORTH AMERICA ALLIANCE

In recognition of two important Canadian Church anniversaries - the 50th anniversary of the United Church and the 100th anniversary of The Presbyterian Church in Canada - the North American Area Council of the World Alliance of Reformed Churches held its 1975 meetings in Canada. Some 90 delegates, representing 16 Reformed, Presbyterian, Congregational and United Church communions in North America and the Caribbean, met January 7-9 at the Grey Nun's Retreat House in Chateauguay, Quebec.

Appropriately these meetings were chaired by Rev. Dr. Ernest E. Long, a former general secretary of the United Church of Canada. The Council secretary,

President James I. McCord of Princeton Theological Seminary, said in his report: "Churches of the reformed faith are suffering from 'collective theological amnesia." We have forgotten our history and our confession of Jesus Christ and so have lost

our identity and our sense of direction for life and mission."

In addition to the author of this report, who is recording clerk of the area council, The Presbyterian Church in Canada was represented by Rev. Dr. Wilfred F. Butcher, Brian Fraser, Kenneth D. Hall and Rev. Dr. Donald C. MacDonald. The Rev. Wilfred Moncrieff of Chateauguay and the Rev. William Milne of Ormstown, along with two United Church ministers, served on a local arrangements committee and attended the meetings.

The Canadian content, though perhaps falling below C.R.T.C. standards, was remarkably high for an international meeting. Each morning worship and Bible study were led by Prof. George Johnston, a United Church minister who is dean of

religious studies at McGill University.

The first evening was devoted to a discussion of "Significant Developments in the Church in Canada." The two speakers were: The Right Rev. Wilbur Howard, moderator of the United Church of Canada and Prof. Joseph C. McLelland, deanelect of the faculty of religious studies, McGill University and co-chairman of the

Orthodox-Reformed-Lutheran conversations of the Area Council.

Dr. Howard gave a witty address on the work and witness of the United Church of Canada during the past 50 years. He spoke of church union negotiations between the Anglicans and United Church and the Disciples of Christ and of the great challenge which faces all the churches in Canada. Tolerance of different theological positions, Dr. Howard said, was an essential requirement in the new situation in

which all churches find themselves today.

Professor McLelland was also witty but his address was more provocative. He outlined some of the theological trends in Canada during the last 100 years, particularly the formative influence of the late Principal W.W. Bryden on The Presbyterian Church in Canada following 1925. Professor McLelland evaluated critically the positions of both the majority of Presbyterians who went into church union and the minority that stayed out. Using a provocative analogy he described what happened in 1925 as a courtship that had gone sour. The majority accused the minority of a breach of promise; the minority accused the majority of running off with a woman of easy virtue. Dr. McLelland expressed the hope that the Presbyterian and United Churches would enter into genuine conversations with each other. Someone, he said, was blocking such conversations. Theologians are not for they are always prepared to converse with one another. He asked whether it might be church secretaries and other church officials who were and are to blame.

During its two days of meetings, the Area Council heard reports on bilateral conversations between Presbyterians and Roman Catholics, Presbyterians and Orthodox and Lutheran, and between Presbyterians and Lutherans both in Canada

and in the United States.

Professor David Willis of San Anselmo Theological Seminary gave an address on "Conservative-Liberal Tensions in the Church Today." A panel of four persons from different member churches discussed the Liberal/Conservative split as the panelists witnessed it in their own communions. Prof. Idris Hamid of Trinidad spoke of new developments and needs of the church in the Caribbean. He mentioned several ways in which the North American Churches could make reparations to the Caribbean

The civil and religious liberty committee presented resolutions protesting Henry Kissinger's recent statement regarding the possible use of military force against O.P.E.C. countries, the alleged involvement of the C.I.A. in Chile, and the

suppression of religious and political freedom in Korea.

Theses on "The Theology of Human Rights and the Theology of Liberation" were presented by the theological committee under the co-chairmanship of Dr.

Allen O. Miller of the United States and Dr. Ralph Chalmers of Canada.

If funds permit a centennial General Council will be held in St. Andrew's, Scotland in the summer of 1977. The Area Council is asking member churches to contribute one-quarter cent per member to support this centennial General Council and it is also appealing to interested individuals for donations.

### OVERTURE NO. 1, PRESBYTERY OF BRANDON RE: RELATIONSHIP OF STATE AND CHURCH

The General Assembly of 1974 referred this Overture to the Inter-Church Relations Committee for study and report. (A. & P., 1974, pages 433 and 18).

The Overture cites as the major reasons for the Overture "considerable dissatisfaction within the membership of the Church in Canada (several denominations) and in particular within The Presbyterian Church in Canada with respect to the Government of Canada that the financial statements of the churches be forwarded" and that "this action is considered by many to be an unnecessary intrusion into the area of concern of the various religious denominations of Canada". The Presbytery prays "that a Special Committee be appointed to examine and report on the whole question of the relationship of Church and State in Canada. . .

The Committee on Inter-Church Relations begs to report that they find no such dissatisfaction among its members, and have, furthermore, been unable to obtain any specific details of this alleged intrusion. The Committee wishes to comment that if the reference is to receipts for income tax purposes, the governmental authorities giving such receipts are and should be entitled to conduct audits by

asking for financial statements.

The Committee recommends that no action be taken on the prayer of the Overture.

### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EWART COLLEGE

To the Venerable the 101st General Assembly:

The Board of Ewart College begs leave to submit the following report for the vear 1974-75.

### SECTION 1: CONCERNS OF THE COLLEGE

1. The College Programme

The Ewart College Board, through its Committee on Academic Affairs, endeavours to keep its various course offerings under regular review. This spring of 1975 sees the first group of students graduating who have completed the degree-diploma programme within three years. Because of this, a most careful scrutiny is being undertaken of the course content, work load and all other aspects of the programmes we offer.

The College Board is concerned that our students receive the best training we can offer and efforts will continue to improve that training, even with the most limited of resources.

2. Relationships with other Church Colleges

Each year an annual consultation among the faculties of our three Church Colleges is held, providing an opportunity for the sharing of mutual concerns. In addition, during the past academic year, representatives of Knox and Ewart Colleges have been considering new and different possibilities which could provide additional training opportunities for church workers. In recent months, these discussions have focussed on the matter of the granting of a Master's degree in Christian Education. While at the time of this writing no definite details have been concluded, the consultations are continuing in a positive and fruitful manner.

3. Academic Faculty

Previous Assemblies (1971 and 1972) have given permission to the Board of Ewart College to establish an additional faculty position in the field of religious studies as soon as funds are available and to seek nominations from the Presbyteries of the Church. This matter has been under study in the intervening years by the Special Committee on Educational Needs. That Committee has recommended to the Administrative Council and the Council has agreed that the position now be filled. This person at the level of Associate Professor, will carry responsibilities for teaching and for administration of continuing and lay education courses. Ewart College will provide a detailed job description for this position to the Presbyteries and asks that nominations be in the hands of the Clerks of Assembly not later than January 31, 1976.

The Board of the College would report that Miss Ada Adams has indicated her desire to resign as Dean and Professor at Ewart College, effective June 30, 1976. It is our intention to seek permission to ask for nominations for a replacement to serve in this position. A detailed job description will be pro-

vided for the Presbyteries.

In accordance with the regulation in The Book of Forms, page 130, which states that "The General Assembly may, at its discretion, employ any paid official beyond the stipulated age of retirement where there is need of his exceptional services"; the Board of Ewart College hereby requests that Miss Ada Adams be employed for a further year (that is, until June 30, 1976) in her position of Dean and Professor of Christian Education at Ewart College. It should be noted that approval of this request does not involve any addition to the financial needs of the College.

4. Ewart College Resource Fund

By action of the 100th General Assembly, the Ewart College Resource Fund has been established and donations have been received which have initiated this undertaking. The College Board sees the Resource Fund being used to support the work being done, particularly in the following areas:

1. support for additional faculty,

provision for additional educational resources, e.g. library resources, audiovisual resources, other requirements of the College,

- the building up of a Christian Education Resource Library for the whole Church,
- augmentation of Bursary Funds,
- such other requirements as may be determined by the Board.

During this past year, a committee, consisting of representatives from Ewart College and the Finance Committee of the Administrative Council, has been endeavouring to set up the regulations which will govern the operation of the Resource Fund. Hopefully, by the time of this Assembly we will be able to report these regulations.

### SECTION II: THE ACADEMIC PROGRAMME

1. Academic session 1974-75

21 students were enrolled in study programmes during the 1974-75 session. Of these, 14 were studying in the degree-diploma programme taking some courses within the University of Toronto; 7 were enrolled in the diploma programme, The faculty, consisting of Doctor Margaret Webster, Principal; Professor Ada Adams, Dean; and the Reverend Irene Dickson, Associate Professor; was assisted by the following sessional lecturers who offered the courses indicated: Rev. R.F.G. Campbell, M.A., B.D., Ph.D. . Effective Oral Communication Living Religions Rev. M. R. Gellatly, B.A., M.Th. Worship Mrs. J. A. Goldsmith ..... Rev. J. A. Johnston, M.A., M.Th., Ph.D. . The Presbyterian Church in

Canada

Rev. W. J. Klempa, M.A., B.D., Ph.D. . . . Biblical-Doctrinal Studies and Man, His Faith and Society Mr. Henry Rosevear, F.C.C.O., F.T.C.L. . . Director of Ewart College Choir Professor D. V. Wade, M.A., Ph.D. . . . . . . Varieties of Contemporary Theology

Ewart College continues to emphasize the value of practical training for its students. During each academic year students devote approximately 3 hours per week to supervised practical work (observation, teaching and internship). In addition, during the three year programme, three periods of a month to six weeks are devoted entirely to practical experience: first year students participate in a six-week practical programme in May and June involving leadership in a week-day church school, camping and participation in a leadership event; other internship placements are determined in consultation with students, and vary in type of work and location. Internship placements this year will include vacation church schools and camps in Nova Scotia; work at Tyndale House, Montreal; assignments in congregations in Ontario; and Indian work in Manitoba. Supervisors of practical work (both during the academic year and in internship placements at the end of the year) meet at the College for orientation and planning prior to receiving a student.

2. Continuing and Lay Education

The 1974 Christian Education Institute, held at the College from June 9 - 14, had an enrollment of 31. Professors Iris V. Cully and Kendig B. Cully gave leadership, using as their theme "Next Steps in Christian Education". At the Christian Education Workshop, June 14 - 18, the Cully's helped the 32 participants consider "Practical Ways of Taking the Next Steps in Christian Education".

In 1975 these continuing and lay education events will be combined and sponsored ecumenically in cooperation with the Centre for Christian Studies and the Toronto School of Theology. The event will take place at Ewart College from June 16 - 20 and will be led by Dr. John Westerhoff, Professor of Religious Education at Duke University.

Plans are in progress for a Ewart College Institute and Workshop to be held in

June, 1976.

3. Graduation

The graduation service for the year 1974-75 will be held at Ewart College on May 15, 1975. The Reverend Dr. Finlay G. Stewart will speak.

That, because of her exceptional services to the College, permission be granted to the Board of Ewart College to continue the employment of Miss Ada Adams as Dean and Professor of Christian Education for one further year, that is until June 30, 1976.

That permission be granted to the Board of Ewart College to circularize the Presbyteries for the purpose of securing nominations for the vacant position of Dean on the faculty of Ewart College, such nominations to be in the hands of the Clerks of Assembly not later than January 31, 1976.

4. That Presbyteries, Sessions and Congregations be asked to take note of the existence of the Ewart College Resource Fund and be encouraged to provide support for it among their people.

ACCOUNTING POLICIES
 The following is a summary of significant accounting policies followed by the College.

(a) Investments and investment income The Consolidated Investment portfolio, in which Ewart College has an interest, is held by The Presbyterian Church in Canada and is adjusted to market value each year. Any increase or decrease in market value is allocated to the capital portion of the various scholarship and bursary funds. With the exception of recording consolidated investments at market value, these financial statements have been prepared in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted for non-profit organizations. Other investments are recorded at cost.

Income from investments is recorded on an accrual basis.

Realized gains or losses from investment transactions are recorded on the transaction date.

- (b) Fixed assets Fixed assets are capitalized in the books of The Presbyterian Church in Canada and are not included in these accounts.
- (c) Funds
   The fund balances are segregated in relation to restrictions placed upon their use by the donor.

   The College Board determines the usage of any bequests received for which no specific use is stated by the donor.
- COMPARATIVE FIGURES
   The 1973 comparative figures have been reclassified to conform with the financial statement presentation adopted for 1974.

### THE REPORT OF THE SENATE OF KNOX COLLEGE

To the Venerable the 101st General Assembly:

The Senate of Knox College begs to submit its 131st Annual Report. During the 1974-75 academic session fifty-five students were enrolled in the undergraduate department, forty-five of whom were enrolled in the regular course, three Assembly Students and seven part-time. In the post graduate department nineteen were enrolled for the Th.M. degree, three for the M.A. degree and four for the Th.D. degree, making a total in this department of twenty-six students. The total enrolment for both the undergraduate and graduate departments was therefore eighty-one students.

During the Spring term Professor Robert Lennox and Professor James Farris were on sabbatical leave. Although it is unusual for two faculty members to be on leave at the same time, the resources of the Toronto School of Theology were most helpful. Since Professor David W. Hay will be retiring from the Chair of Systematic Theology at the end of August of this year, it is appropriate that our deepest gratitude be expressed for his long and highly distinguished academic and ministerial career which has contributed so much to the life and work of our Church, and to the ecumenical community. Space does not permit an adequate tribute to him as a scholar, churchman and gentleman, but the action of the Senate in electing him to the honour of Professor Emeritus is indicative of the esteem with which he is held.

The following Sessional Lecturers provided courses in their respective fields: Rev. H. F. Davidson, M.A., D.D. (Church Government); Rev. Helen Goggin, M.A., B.D. (Christian Education); Rev. James Jack, B.A. (New Testament Greek), Rev. Homer McAvoy, B.A., B.D., Ph.D. (Hebrew); Rev. James D. Smart, M.A., Ph.D., (Elective K324B New Testament, Spring term). It is with profound sorrow that we record the sudden and untimely passing of the Rev. Dr. Homer McAvoy towards the end of February. His warm hearted and generous dedication to his students earned him the highest esteem. Our deepest sympathy has been repeatedly extended to his wife and family. Dr. James Smart very kindly provided tutorial work in Hebrew for the balance of the term.

In October the Laidlaw Lectures were delivered by Professor Gordon Rupp, M.A., D.D., F.R. Hist.S., F.B.A. Faculty of History, University of Cambridge, England. The subject of the series of five lectures was: The Mature Luther — 1530-1546.

In February the MacDonald Memorial Lecture was delivered by the Rev. John Cooper, B.A., B.D., Secretary of the Board of Ministry, Presbyterian Church in Canada. His subject was: Career Counselling: A Support for an Effective Ministry.

Our gratitude is expressed to Professor John S. Moir, Department of History, Scarborough College, University of Toronto, who provided a research seminar in Church History (K240H), in the Spring term on the significant subject "Themes in Canadian Presbyterian History". This was a Centennial project and had a wide appeal to our students. As an author of several books on Canadian History, Professor Moir is best known to our Church as the author of "Enduring Witness" which has been described as one of the best centennial gifts.

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### THE COMMITTEE ON HISTORY

To the Venerable the 101st General Assembly

Centennial Year has offered unparalleled opportunities for recalling our heritage and for emphasizing events and personalities intregal to the history of The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

The publication of Enduring Witness, the 311 page denominational history authorized by the General Assembly, has received widespread acclaim, while a companion volume of biographies, Witnesses of the Faith, as well as a Pictorial History, will both be issued prior to the 101st Assembly. Articles in Presbyterian History and The Presbyterian Record, as well as study materials produced by the W.M.S., Boards and Committees, have awakened among young and old new interest

in things historical. The development of congregational historical rooms and the updating of histories have been undertaken by church courts. Over seven hundred metal outdoor centennial signs have been hung by churches. Fifty-five thousand communion tokens have been purchased for commemorative purposes, while a travelling display of antique Scottish and Canadian sacramental disks from the Donald Brown collection have been made available to the church. Lapel pins have been purchased by the tens of thousands and embossed honour scrolls presented to men and women across the Dominion for their dedicated service in His Kingdom, Historic sites have been marked in various provinces. The federal government has honoured the Moderator of the 1st General Assembly through the issuing of a postage stamp bearing the likeness of Dr. John Cook. Audio-visual materials with a strong historical perspective have been produced for the Montreal Assembly and the Hamilton Centennial Congress. Twinning projects have related congregations of various ethnic and geographical groupings, with Centennial tours offering insights into the mission of the church at home and overseas.

The Archives

The 100th Anniversary celebrations have generated additional interest in our denominational archival programme. The new facilities are being increasingly utilized for scholarly research, as well as by congregational groups and church courts as a depository for historical materials. Only moderate results have so far accompanied the project to establish a national picture gallery, while almost too successful have been the efforts of the committee to increase the usefulness of the archives, through letters of inquiry and personal visits. Church office records are increasingly being deposited in the archives. Five of the fifty cases of BWM materials have been catalogued through the efforts of the Rev. G. Johnston and the financial assistance of the Board.

At the close of 1974, the Associate Archivist, The Rev. Fred Rennie of Melrose Church, Toronto, accepted a Call to St. John's Church, Cornwall. The Committee expresses its deepest appreciation to Mr. Rennie for the heavy responsibilities he so faithfully bore in meeting the archival demands of the church, especially following the retirement of Dr. George Douglas, Archivist. Dr. Brian Ross accepted a short term appointment as acting director, and most capably worked through the back-log of inquiries and requests for information from the church. The Committee has unanimously recommended to the Administrative Council that Dr. John Moir be appointed Archivist, effective July 1st, 1975. Tribute is again gratefully paid to Miss M. Bunting and Mrs. E. Fenn for their invaluable assistance in cataloguing and typing with responsibility for arranging the recently acquired Prescott, Milton and Knox, Hamilton materials.

During 1974, the Proudfoot Papers, 1925 Church Union materials and the Morton Papers were brought into better order. Minutes from Church Courts were received and it is requested that the Archives automatically receive Synod and Presbytery minutes as they are distributed. Acquisitions range from tapes, cassettes, microfilms, photos and printed volumes to a Chinese wedding costume, originally the property of Mrs. George Leslie Mackay.

Canadian Presbyterian History Society

Due to the increased interest in history engendered by the centennial, the proposal is made, supported by this committee, to organize a Canadian Presbyterian History Society, with annual meetings and the publication of research papers. All ministers are being circularized in this regard.

American Society of Church Historians

Participating in our anniversary celebrations is the American Society of Church Historians, meeting in Knox College, Toronto, April 1975. It is also noted that the North American Area Council of the World Alliance of Reformed Churches met near Montreal, January, 1975, honouring our denomination during centennial year.

Ecumenical Historical Projects

As early as 1967, this committee met with representatives of the United Church of Canada in planning for 1975, resulting in various consultations and joint projects such as the projected Guides to historic sites and buildings. We pray that God may bless their celebrations and all their future service, in His Name.

History Prize

The Committee unanimously agreed to award the annual History Prize to Professor John Moir for his volume, Enduring Witness.

Presbyterian History

Two issues of our periodical were distributed to all ministers as well as laymen with special interest in Canadian Presbyterian history.

### RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That the 101st General Assembly record its debt and appreciation to Dr. John Moir for his contribution to Presbyterian church history through his authorship of the volume, Enduring Witness; to Mr. Ian MacEachern for publishing the several historical and biographical centennial volumes bearing the imprint of Presbyterian Publications; and to Rev. Fred Rennie for his unstinting service to the church as associate archivist.

That the 101st General Assembly encourage members of the church to consider membership in a Canadian Presbyterian Church History Society.

That congregations be reminded that reports of centennial celebrations, projects etc., together with all historical materials, be forwarded to our national archives, 59 St. George St., Toronto.

4. That Presbyteries and Synods be invited to place their Minutes, as printed annually, in the archives.

5. That Committees and Boards deposit copies in the archives of pamphlets and brochures distributed to the church as a further record of the life and witness of the denomination. Respectifully submitted.

### THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH DOCTRINE

To the Venerable the 101st General Assembly:

The Committee on Church Doctrine respectfully submits the following report of its work: A. Items of information and progress. B. Items for action by the Assembly.

### A. ITEMS OF INFORMATION AND PROGRESS

Overture 30, 1974, re status of Catechists: As requested, the Committee appointed representatives to handle this issue with the Board of Ministry, which will report to the Assembly.

Statement of Faith: Our sub-committee, at work with representatives of the Committee on Inter-Church Relations, reports progress. Its time was almost entirely taken up with last Assembly's remit on the Basis and Purpose of the Mission Task of the Church (see below).

The Use of Alcohol: The Committee was instructed to review the previous statement of the Church on this matter. The work is in hand and we report pro-

Joint Educational Resources for Christian Education (J.E.D.): At the request of the Board of Congregational Life our Committee reviewed and reported upon material which the Board submitted to us.

### B. ITEMS FOR ACTION BY THE ASSEMBLY

- 1. Overture 19, 1974, of the Rev. H. L. Henderson, transmitted simpliciter by the Synod of Manitoba and North-Western Ontario, asking that the Assembly "establish a study of the governmental system and doctrinal standards of the New Testament Church. . and that representatives from other Christian Churches be invited to join in this study." Our Committee desires to point out that the questions referred to are the ongoing concern of the Faith and Order departments of the Canadian Council of Churches and of the World Council of Churches, of both of which we are members along with other Presbyterian Churches, and we accordingly recommend that the prayer of the Overture be not granted (Recommendation #1).
- 2. Proposed General Assembly Committee on the Church in the World (Acts and Proceedings, 1974, pp. 423f.): The Committee begs to submit the following definition of its relation to such a committee, if appointed, and recommends accordingly: "The Committee on Church Doctrine would view its relationship to the proposed Committee on the Church in the World as complementary, in the sense of providing the necessary theological insights which may relate to any proposed national church legislation and action, and also of submitting to such a committee comment on such theological principles as may call for action in the world developing through such a committee." This definition has been transmitted to the Board of Congregational Life (Recommendation #2).
- 3. Ministry in the Church: (i) On the authority of the 100th General Assembly a personal study-paper by Dr. A. van Seters and others was distributed to presbyteries in the form of an article in the publication Arc, Vol. II, Nos. 2 and 3 (combined), 1975. Presbyteries desiring additional copies may obtain them from Dr. van Seters.

- (ii) A number of presbyteries have replied, as requested, to the questions raised in our report to the 100th General Assembly about Term Appointments of National Executive Staff and about regular review of these and comparable appointments (Acts and Proceedings, 1974, pp. 398f., 406). The question of the relation of such appointments to the Gospel Call was mostly omitted in the replies. The Committee expects to be in a position to report fully on the matter to the 102nd Assembly.
- (iii) Assistants-to-Ministers: Some presbyteries were not clear as to how the practice of appointment by Kirk Sessions of assistants-to-ministers "circumvents the place of Presbytery in ministerial appointments." The answer is that no Session has authority to make any ministerial appointment (see Acts and Proceedings, 1974, p. 398). The declaratory statement sent down for study by the General Assembly for study by Presbyteries is designed to make the Church's law clear. Amending the second sentence of (a) (p. 398) to read: "Such persons may be ministers, associate ministers ...etc." we now recommend that the following statements be accepted as declaratory interpretations of the Book of Forms, Section 201:
  - (a) Appointments of ministers to full-time service in congregations shall always be by call and induction, except in cases of stated supply, retired persons, and appointments by the Board of World Mission. Such persons may be ministers, associate ministers, or assistant ministers, but not assistants-to-ministers.
  - (b) Appointments of retired ministers or of part-time ministers in congregations shall be made and terminated only by Presbyteries, at the request of minister and session or on the Presbytery's own initiative. Such persons may be called assistants-to-the minister, and may be installed in a service of recognition.

(See Recommendation #3(a))

(iv) The Role of Presbytery: Overtures 28 and 39, 1969 (Acts and Proceedings, 1969, pp. 612 and 618).

Replies from Presbyteries indicate general approval of the amendment proposed by the Committee in Section 176(1) of the Book of Forms. After slight verbal changes, we offer the following formulation for submission to Presbyteries under the Barrier Act:

176. The Presbytery consists of:

- (1) Ordained ministers within the bounds;
- (a) who are pastors, associate or assistant pastors, directors of Christian Education, or stated supply (whether in congregations or mission fields, full time or part-time), chaplains to the armed forces when stationed within the bounds;
- (b) who are appointed by the Board of World Mission to an overseas mission field and are within the bounds because of furlough or special assignment;
- (c) who serve on our college faculties or are employed on the staff of the courts, boards, or committees of our Church;
- (d) who make request and are serving in agencies not directly responsible to the Presbyterian Church in Canada as Bible Society Secretaries, teachers in Bible or Theological colleges, or University Departments of Religion; workers in inner-city, national, or overseas missions (the last when within the bounds);
- (e) who are not included above, and who, at Presbytery's request and by authorization of the Assembly, have been placed upon the Roll. Such presbytery applications shall not be made for retired ministers except those who are rendering active service, non-theological teachers or professors, psychologists, social workers, or other ministers in secular employment;

(f) who are institutional chaplains in full-time employment as such, appointed for not less than one year with the approval of the responsible committee of the General Assembly.

(See Recommendation #3(b))

### 4. The Proposed Diaconate

Replies were received from 28 Presbyteries to the proposals submitted to last Assembly. Of these, 13 registered approval, 4 disapproved, 10 were uncommitted, and 1 desired delay in action until 1976. There were 22 matters of concern, centring for the most part on the Roll of Presbytery and commission to Assembly. A paper on the points raised will be prepared for commissioners to the 101st Assembly and will be discussed in the briefing sessions.

The Committee believes that the subject has been sufficiently aired to justify sending down under the Barrier Act the following legislation, prepared by the Principal Clerk in consultation with the Committee. It contains the following changes in the proposals offered last year (Acts and Proceedings, 1974):

Page 402, Section C: "... whereas the General Assembly shall determine the educational standards required."

Page 404, Relation to Presbytery, etc.: In the first paragraph, omit "by rotation", and supply fuller guidance in the last sentence.

Page 405, Proposal 3. Add, ". . . with prayer."

### Amendments for the Barrier Act for the Book of Forms

Note by the Clerks of Assembly: This is a Remit under the Barrier Act, and the vote of the Presbytery must be "approve" or "disapprove" (Section 257 (b), Book of Forms). The gist of matters concerning the proposed diaconate will be found chiefly in 138 (B); the other references are chiefly to bring the relevant sections of the Book of Forms into conformity with 138 (B). It is suggested that the Presbytery first consider 138 (B), which will probably establish a negative or a positive. If the vote is negative, consideration of the other amendments is useless; if the vote is affirmative, the other amendments should be considered. A negative on any of them is a negative for the entire remit.

### End of Chapter 1. Amend by adding:

By enactment of the General Assembly, a diaconate has been established, the members of which shall be known as "ordained deacons". The older Deacons' Court, where existing in congregations, are continued without change in legislation, apart from the title which shall be "Congregational Deacons' Court", and its members "congregational deacons" instead of "deacons". The necessary changes of phrasing for both congregational deacons and ordained deacons will be found in the Book of Forms as may be necessary.

Section 121. Amend the first sentence to end, ... "or requested by one third of the elders and ordained deacons."

Section 122. Amend the second sentence to begin, "When from any cause the number of elders and ordained deacons is not sufficient to form a quorum..."

Section 127 (c). Amend the second sentence to begin, "The elders, or ordained deacons, or any number of them. . ."

Sections 135 to 138, inclusive. Amend to add the word "congregational" to

precede the word "deacon" or "deacons" wherever found.

Section 138. Amend present text, as amended immediately above, to be number 138 (A).

Add new title after 138 (A): V THE DIACONATE

Add new section: Section 138 (B)

- (a) The office of the ordained deacon is recognized by the Church to be a distinctive office agreeable to the Word of God, and complementary to the Ministry of Word and Sacraments, and to the Eldership. The ordained deacon is one who is called of God to the service of Jesus Christ and His Church, and has been trained and ordained to the office of ordained deacon in conformity with the doctrine and discipline of The Presbyterian Church in Canada.
- (b) Admission to the diaconate (men or women) will be by ordination for life, by the Presbytery in the rite of the laying on of the hands of the preaching presbyters, and with prayer.
- (c) The person so ordained shall be known as an "ordained deacon." The office of the ordained deacon shall be distinct from the office hitherto known as the office of a deacon in a congregation which has a deacons' court. - (j) An ordained deacon may or may not be in the employment of the Church. Only those in the employment of the Church will be members of the courts, (See also Section 138 (B) (o).)

- (k) Where the work of an ordained deacon overlaps the bounds of presbyteries, the presbyteries concerned shall determine on whose roll the ordained deacon shall be. The Appendix to the Roll for ordained deacons shall be according to the residence of the ordained deacon.
  - (1) For candidature, training, and application for ordination, see Appendices, Part Two, 5.
- (m) A Call should normally be issued to an ordained deacon, stating the terms of employment, responsibility to the congregation or congregations served, or to any other employing body, and processed through the presbytery. When the work is not solely within a congregation, the appointment will nevertheless be processed through the presbytery if the work is confined to the bounds of the presbytery. Where the work is otherwise, the appointing body shall designate the presbytery to process the call, which normally will be the "home presbytery" of the ordained deacon.
- (n) Deaconesses within the service of the Church, or listed as inactive deaconesses at the date of the passing of this legislation shall, on their own application, be listed as ordained deacons on the appropriate roll without further rites, it now being declared for those deaconesses wishing to be known as ordained deacons that their designation as deaconesses is ordination as ordained deacons. For those deaconesses not wishing to make this choice, the presbytery shall list them as previously, that is, as active or inactive deaconesses.
- (o) When an ordained deacon holds an appointment in cognate work (institutional work, chaplaincies, social work, etc., and what is congnate work shall be defined in each case by the presbytery of the bounds) the presbytery may overture Assembly to have his or her name on the Constituent Roll, in the manner provided for under Section 176, Book of Forms.
- (p) An ordained deacon is not eligible to serve as a representative elder or as an assessor, but may be clerk or treasurer of a court.

For those deaconesses not wishing to make this choice, the presbytery shall list them as previously, that is, as active or inactive deaconesses.
- (o) When an ordained deacon holds an appointment in cognate work (institutional work, chaplaincies, social work, etc., and what is congnate work shall be defined in each case by the presbytery of the bounds) the presbytery may overture Assembly to have his or her name on the Constituent Roll, in the manner provided for under Section 176, Book of Forms.
- (p) An ordained deacon is not eligible to serve as a representative elder or as an assessor, but may be clerk or treasurer of a court.

Section 174. Amend by adding as a final sentence, "This section, without prejudice to deaconesses whose status is not changed to that of ordained deacon, is removed as of the date of the passing of Section 138 (B).

Section 175. Amend by adding an asterisk \* after the words, "within its bounds", and, as a footnote the following "\*This applies only to those deaconesses whose status is not changed to that of an ordained deacon."

Section 175. Amend the second sentence by substituting the words "The Diaconate" for "The Order of Deaconesses."

Section 176 (2) (a). Amend the second paragraph to begin, "All other ministers and ordained deacons within the bounds, and ministers and ordained deacons ordained by the Presbytery for work overseas. . .

Section 176. Amend by adding as follows: "(3) Ordained deacons serving according to Section 138 (B) (e), See also Section 138 (B) (o)."

Section 184. Amend by adding this sentence, "The names of ordained deacons, mutatis mutandis, shall also be put on the roll."

Section 193. Amend by adding to the words "also a minister and elder" the words "or ordained deacon".

Title preceding Section 202. Amend by adding an asterisk\*, and as a footnote these words "\* For candidates for the Diaconate, see Appendices, Part Two, 5."

Title preceding Section 213. Amend by adding an asterisk\*, and at the foot of the page these words "\* For the Call of Ordained Deacons, Sections 213-242, inclusive, shall be effective, mutatis mutandis."

Title preceding Section 233. Amend by adding a double\*\*, and at the foot of the page these words, "\*\*For the ordination and settlement of ordained deacons Sections 233-242, inclusive, shall be effective, mutatis mutandis."

Title preceding Section 248. Amend by adding an asterisk\*, and at the foot of the page these words, "\*This Section applies, mutatis mutandis, to ordained dea-

Section 249. Amend the first sentence to read, "Every minister and ordained deacon of the Church is under the care and subject to the authority of the Presbytery with which is lodged his or her certificate of ordination and of presbyterial standing, and which is responsible for his or her conduct and due discharge of his or her ministry."

Section 249. Amend the second paragraph to begin, "Licentiates, candidates for the ministry and those desiring ordination as ordained deacons are under the

primary jurisdiction of the Kirk-Sessions. . .

Section 250. Amend the first sentence to begin, "A minister, licentiate or ordained deacon who has removed..." and add "or she" to follow "he" in the two instances of this sentence.

Section 251. Amend by adding a third sentence, "This Section applies, mutatis

mutandis, to ordained deacons."

Section 258. Amend by adding a second sentence to follow the first as follows: "Ordained deacons shall be commissioners to the General Assembly in the same ratio as that of ministers, that is, one in six, but in order to avoid over-representation in the Assembly of the total body of ordained deacons in the Church, a Presbytery that has fewer than six may at its discretion in every six-year period omit commissioning a deacon once, twice, three times, four times, or five times according as it has five, four, three, two or one ordained deacon."

Section 260. Amend the first sentence to read, "The Synod is composed of all

ministers, elders and ordained deacons on the rolls. . .

Section 260 (a). Amend by concluding the sentence. . "right of the ministers,

elders and ordained deacons to sit in Synod."

Section 260 (c). Amend by beginning the sentence, "Commissions of represen-

tative elders and of ordained deacons. . .

Amend by adding (d) as follows: "An ordained deacon whose name does not appear on the certified roll of Presbytery can be allowed to take his or her seat only on presenting a commission from the Clerk of the Presbytery to which he or she belongs."

Section 276 (c). Amend by adding the words "and of ordained deacons" to

follow the words "death of ministers".

Section 278. Amend by adding to sub-section (3) the following: "(a) Ordained deacons shall be appointed from each presbytery, following the principle of Section 278 (2), but subject to the restriction of Section 258."

Section 278 (6). Amend by adding in the second sentence the words "or

ordained deacons" to follow "elders".

Section 279. Amend by adding the words "and ordained deacons" to follow the word "elders" in the first and third sentences.

Section 296. Amend by beginning the second sentence to read, "It shall be composed of six ministers and three elders or ordained deacons. . .

Section 297 (1). Amend by adding the words "and ordained deacons" to follow the words "deposition of ministers.

Reference to the Presbyteries Accompanying the Remit Under the Barrier Act

Note by the Clerks of Assembly: This is a reference, not a remit under the Barrier Act. Presbyteries may vote to approve or disapprove or may make comment on the material following, which is for the Appendices of the Book of Forms. In the "Appendices" changes may be made at any Assembly (generally speaking) by the ordinary procedure of notice of motion, etc., or out of a board or committee report, or as a result of an overture. Thus, flexibility is achieved in regulations, but Sections 1-413, inclusive, of the Book of Forms, being law, may be changed only under the Barrier Act.

### APPENDICES Part Two

### 5. THE DIACONATE

### A. Candidature

Preliminary qualifications: An applicant presenting himself or herself for training as a candidate for the office of ordained Deacon must have a true sense of vocation, a required standard of education, and be medically fit. The Presbytery within whose bounds the candidate resides shall be responsible for the

determination of the sense of vocation, whereas the General Assembly shall determine the educational standards required. Each candidate will be required to furnish a satisfactory medical certificate upon application.

Pre-training interview: Following certification by a Presbytery of the Church, each candidate will normally be required to apply to the Applications Committee of the College concerned regarding an appropriate programme of studies.

### B. Training

Since ordained Deacons will be trained to serve in a variety of functions, the establishment of training regulations must be more flexible than those prescribed for the office of Ministry of Word and Sacrament. Some will be trained for work primarily within the educational field while others will relate more directly to the field of social service. In terms of work overseas, a satisfactory grounding in Biblical and theological subjects will be required in addition to professional standing in such disciplines as Nursing. To accommodate this wide field, the following training requirements are proposed:

Programme I, A candidate seeking preparation primarily for the role of a Christian Education support person at Presbytery or Synod level or within a congregation, shall have a Grade 13 (Ontario or equivalent) standing (University entrance) and shall be required to take the full prescribed course at the University of Toronto and Ewart College (Degree and Diploma) or equivalent institutions.

Programme II. A candidate seeking preparation as above, but holding a recognized degree from a University, shall be required to undertake a two year programme of three terms each at Ewart College or an equivalent level college, as prescribed by the General Assembly.

Programme III. A candidate seeking preparation for a professional role within the Church other than a Christian Education support person, shall either:

- enter upon the regular Degree and Diploma course at the University of Toronto and Ewart College and proceed thereafter to a post-graduate programme in Social Work at a recognized university, or to such other programme as will adequately prepare the candidate for his or her chosen, professional service.
- or, b) enter upon an undergraduate programme at a recognized university, proceeding thereafter to a post-graduate professional degree, and then enter upon a one year (two term) programme of Biblical-theological grounding at Ewart College, or an equivalent level college.

Programme IV. A candidate who has less than the required standards, but has attained the qualifications of a mature student as established by the University, or a candidate with some post-secondary school training suitable to the office of a Deacon would take the Diploma programme of Ewart College. Ordained Deacons from outside the Presbyterian Church in Canada will be evaluated by the Board of Ministry (or the Board of Education if it is still responsible for such matters) in a manner similar to ordained ministers coming from other communions.

Category IV will make provision for some who have completed professional or vocational training, or who have a particular skill or experience and who visualize their diaconal service in the immediate exercise of that particular training, skill, or experience, and who require a basic orientation in matters particularly related to the Christian Faith and service in the Church. The training for Ordained Deacons, except in those instances in which other professional requirements are indicated, will normally take place within Ewart College.

### C. Application for Ordination

Following attainment of the required standards, the candidate will apply to a Presbytery for ordination to the office of Ordained Deacon, on recommendation by the Board of Ewart College and/or the Board of Ministry, and according to regulations approved by the General Assembly.

(See Recommendation #4)

Two members of the Committee on Church Doctrine, The Reverend Blake Walker and Professor E. Beame, while in general agreement with the institution of the Diaconate, desire to dissent from the legislation going down under the Barrier Act in its present form on the grounds that (1) the delineation of the function of the deacon is too vague; (2) the relation of the diaconal office to the offices of the teaching and ruling elder are unclear, with the result that practical support of the deacon by them is not sufficiently provided; and (3) membership of church courts, particularly of the higher courts, will be anomalous, and will in the higher courts weaken the role of the minstry.

- The Meaning of Deposition: Obeying an instruction of the One Hundredth General Assembly at the request of the Judicial Commission of the 97th, 98th, and 99th General Assemblies (Acts and Proceedings, 1974, p. 470), the Committee has prepared the following statement and recommendation.
  - 1. The One Ministry
    Ordination is into the ministry of the Holy, Catholic Church, just as baptism is into membership of the Holy, Catholic Church.
  - 2. The Corporateness of the Ministry Being one, the ministry is exercised in the corporateness or collegiality of the whole ministry. A person's private call to be a minister, though necessary, is not sufficient to make him or her a minister. He or she must be ordained by the corporate brotherhood of the ministry, which is charged with the stewardship of the office (I Cor.4:1; II Cor.3:5f.)

For the same reason, a minister holds his or her office in standing responsibility to the corporate brotherhood, in our case through the church-courts, on which elders are represented. These courts (above the kirk session) exercise a caring discipline over ministers in the interests of the purity of the ministry of the Holy, Catholic Church. They cannot act in this capacity in any other way than as ministers (and elders) of the Holy, Catholic Church.

3. The Disunity of the Ministry
The churches do not all acknowledge one another's ministries, but this breach in unity gives no divine sanction for churches to create their own ministries as it may please them. A church that might believe that it ordains to something other than the one ministry of Christ does not truly ordain anyone. Nor, on the other hand, may a man lawfully arrogate the ministry to himself on the pretence of a private call, attempting thus to institute a new ministry that lacks the authority of Christ's Church. Christ's claim upon us demands that we ultimately recover a ministry that will be universally recognized throughout the Church Catholic, as it was in the earliest days. Meantime we must adhere to our practice and doctrine of ordination into the one ministry of Christ.

4. Deposition When a court deposes a minister from office, the act is meaningless if it is not the act of the Church Catholic deposing him from the ministry of the Church Catholic. Such is the gravity of deposition that it declares a man to be no minister of Christ. This step is taken only in extreme cases, as when, for example, a minister rejects the corporate discipline of his peers. He then nullifies his qualification to be a minister, and the appropriate court cannot evade its responsibility of declaring his ministry void. In our divided state, sister churches should respect one another's discipline for the sake of the good estate of the whole Church.

5. The Book of Forms
The many references in The Book of Forms to "the ministry" are all couched in the language used above of the ministry of the Church Universal. For example, when Section 252 speaks of deposition "from the ministry", it clearly means deposition from the ministry of the Holy, Catholic Church. The one place in which a seemingly more restricted expression is used is no exception if seen in the appropriate context.

Section 251 says of the granting of a Dismissory Letter (which is not a disciplinary process nor a method of evading discipline) that the recipient "ceases to be a minister or licentiate of the Presbyterian Church in Canada ..." This expression envisages the transfer of one of our ministers into the ministry of a sister communion (cp. Dismissory Letter for a Minister or Licentiate, Appendices, Part One, 36). The Letter may also be granted. however, to a minister who for good cause desires to demit his office altogether, in which case it releases him from his ordination yows and his office in the Church Universal. The doctrine of the ministry set forth in The Book of Forms is therefore consistent and unambiguous throughout. Since The Book of Forms seems in the case of the Dismissory Letter to have more particularly in mind the transfer of a minister to another denomination, it is desirable that the other type of case should be explicitly referred to. The Committee on Church Doctrine therefore recommends that the Clerks be instructed to re-phrase Section 251 and the relevant Appendix so as explicitly to cover both types of case.

See recommendation #5.

6. Response to the Report on the Basis and Purpose of the Mission Task of the Church

The One Hundredth General Assembly meeting in Kitchener, Ontario, June 2-7, 1974, adopted six conclusions regarding the missionary task of the Church. These six conclusions, presented in the Report on the Basis and Purpose of the Mission Task of the Church (Acts and Proceedings, 1974, pp. 252-257) and amended in part by the Assembly, were accepted "as substantially the position of The Presbyterian Church in Canada with respect to Christian Mission" (ibid., p. 74). The Assembly also decided that the body of the Report together with its recommendations "be sent to Synods, Presbyteries, Kirk Sessions, Board of World Mission, Women's Missionary Society (E.D. & W.D.), Board of Congregational Life and the Colleges for study and report to the Committee on Church Doctrine by January 31, 1975" (ibid., p. 257 and p. 74).

The Committee on Church Doctrine reports that it has received responses from the following Boards, Colleges, Presbyteries and Kirk Sessions and herewith presents a summary and its own comments: The Board of World Mission Executive, the Council Executive of the Women's Missionary Society, W.D., Knox College Senate and Board; the Presbyteries of Cape Breton, Pictou, Halifax-Lunenburg, Miramichi, Brampton, Paris, Superior, Brandon, Northern Saskatchewan, Kootenay and Westminster; and from four Kirk Sessions and from the Synod of Quebec and Eastern Ontario. Three Sessions were favourable and one was critical.

Eight of the presbyteries were generally favourable to the six conclusions, two were very critical and one was undecided. The Synod was critical. Two of the presbyteries that were generally favourable felt that there should be a return to the unamended form of Conclusion 6 as originally presented in the report of the special committee on the mission task of the Church, One of these presbyteries also suggested that Conclusion 1 be amended to read: "God has freely and lovingly acted in Jesus Christ for the redemption and salvation of sinners everywhere, and there is salvation in none other." This Presbytery also expressed a preference for the unrevised form of Conclusion 5. The other replies from presbyteries expressing approval of the Report were very brief and simply indicated that they found the Report and its conclusions acceptable.

Two presbyteries were very critical of the six conclusions. One regretted the fact that the Report limited the application of the Gospel "to only those creatures of God which are human." It made reference to the Pauline emphasis that God's plan is to unite into one in Christ all things both in heaven and earth (cf. Ephesians 1:10 and Colossians 1:20). This submission supported a theology of salvation for the whole man which inevitably involves the whole earth and all its creatures. Therefore it recommended that additions be made to the

Report and its conclusions to make clear "that our Church's mission in these times includes such teaching and actions as will share the benefits of Christ's salvation with his non-human creatures in our environment in this fragile, finite planet."

The other critical presbytery response stated that in the final analysis, the report was "a theological position paper." This submission was in favour of holding evangelism and social action together and maintained that salvation is not merely a matter of one's individual relationship to God but it has important social and political implications. It disagreed with the Report's attempt to separate and to establish a primacy in the twofold commandment to love God and to love our neighbour. It pointed out that in Matthew 22:39, Jesus said that the second commandment is "like unto the first" and the Greek word means "corresponding to, equivalent to, the same as, in authority." This Presbytery's submission concluded: "the Gospel is ever accompanied by every service of love. Such services are as much the Gospel as the spoken or written word. They are not appendages of the Gospel. We cannot, therefore, say that preaching is the definitive nature and distinctive task of the Church, any more than it was the distinctive task of Jesus during His ministry. True evangelism must be patterned after the ministry of our Lord who describes His ministry as 'the blind can see, the lame can walk, the lepers are made clean, the dead are raised to life, and the Good News is preached to the poor' (Luke 7:22)".

In its reply to the Report, the Board of World Mission Executive thought that the Church was "getting out of balance," gratifying this or that theological position rather than wanting Christ's "rule to prevail in the ongoing work of the denomination." It felt that debate and formulation, amendment and refinement of verbal statements have led us astray and divided us unnecessarily. The Board of World Mission Executive insisted on the inseparability of word and service. Our Church should not let itself be divided by a vain attempt to give precedence either to word or to service. It is never a matter of "either/or" but "both/and." Moreover, "one cannot talk of priorities between the two. The question which comes first is irrelevant. The point is that both come!" This reply concluded by recommending that "the 101st General Assembly set aside further debate of an arid intellectual and legalistic nature on the Basis and Purpose of Mission" and that the Church commit itself joyfully and obediently to its missionary task. Furthermore, it requested the Committee on Church Doctrine to prepare a short, simple and biblical statement on the Basis and Purpose of the Mission Task of the Church.

The Knox College Senate and Board presented a lengthy critique of the Report. It said, "Scripture is given a very limited hearing. The witness of Scripture to creation, with its testimony to the wholeness of man and to the fact that salvation cannot be spiritualized, and the prophetic testimony to the claims of a divine grace that acknowledges the social dimensions of both alienation and reconciliation, are never even acknowledged." Moreover, the notion of evangelism in the Report is given a very narrow meaning. An unfortunate antithesis between evangelism and social action is established by speaking of primary and secondary goals.

Concerning the statement in the Report that "a truly Biblical theology of mission makes it entirely clear that man's greatest need lies, not in the areas of social injustice or economic deprivation, or political oppression, but in his alienation from God," the College submission asked: "Does that mean...that social injustice and economic deprivation and political oppression have nothing to do with man's alienation from God? Does it mean that alienation is to be understood in strictly personal terms? Is salvation then only a matter of one-to-one relationship with God? But surely the Biblical doctrine of creation with its concomitant testimony to the realities and extent of the fall, point to the wholeness with which God views creation, and to the fact that a spiritualization of alienation and salvation has its rootage in Greek thought rather than in Hebrew thought. . .salvation if it is to be whole must encompass social justice."

The response went on to say that the Church is called to be obedient to her Lord and her obedience will take many forms. It will certainly manifest itself in proclamation. It may even take the form of social action groups. It will take the form of Christian worship. And it may demand of the Church prophetic disobedience to tyrannies which oppress. The submission chided the Report for not acknowledging openly and honestly the failures of Christian missionary enterprise as well as its successes.

Before making its own comments on The Report on the Basis and Purpose of the Mission Task of the Church, the Committee on Church Doctrine notes that the Special Committee was established by General Assembly in 1972, "to study the basis and purpose of the Church's mission task and to indicate the resultant priorities in the face of contemporary conditions and developments in the world, and to report to a future General Assembly" (Acts and Proceedings, 1972, p. 64). The Moderator appointed the following Committee: Dr. Murdo Nicholson, Convenor, Mrs. George Peckover, Rev. A. Donald MacLeod, Dr. D. T. Evans and representatives to be appointed by the Board of World Missions, the Board of Evangelism and Social Action and the Committee on Church Doctrine (ibid., p. 72). Those who were later appointed were the Reverend J. A. Crabb (Board of World Mission), the Reverend W. L. Young (Board of Congregational Life) and the Rev. Hans Zegerius (Committee on Church Doctrine).

The Special Committee named by the Moderator presented an interim-report to the 99th General Assembly. They agreed "that the terms of reference demanded nothing short of a careful and comprehensive study of the whole field of inquiry, involving a thorough knowledge of the relevant bibliography."

#### Questions and Comments by the Committee on Church Doctrine

In a spirit of dialogue, the Committee on Church Doctrine desires to continue the discussion by raising the following questions regarding the Report:

1. We wonder why in a matter of such vital importance as the proper understanding of the Church's mission today, no opportunity was provided for Kirk Sessions, Presbyteries and Synods to study the Report and to respond to its six conclusions before they were presented, amended and adopted by the 1974 General Assembly? There will surely be times when the Church will need to declare her mind on urgent issues without going through the slow procedure of "study and report." But in this case, was there any good reason for such great haste? In its interim-report to the 1973 General Assembly, the Special Committee acknowledged that its terms of reference "demanded nothing short of a careful and comprehensive study of the whole field of inquiry, involving a thorough knowledge of the relevant bibliography." The Report has not presented a bibliography and its references to the extensive literature on the Church's mission are very sparse. Also, in spite of its professed aim to provide "a careful and comprehensive study," the Report does not discuss at all or only touches lightly on such major problems in missiology as religious and cultural syncretism, indigenization, ecumenical co-operation, etc.

Moreover, why is there no attempt particularly in the section called "The Biblical Imperative" to engage in the necessary task of exegeting key passages of Scripture relating to the Church's missionary task? Strangely, not a single passage of Scripture is cited in this section. Instead the Report offers the statement on the Church's Ministry in our Book of Common Order as a summary of the biblical material. Is this an adequate substitute for wrestling with the Bible itself? Furthermore, the Special Committee was instructed to consider "contemporary conditions and developments in the world." Why then is no analysis provided of the peculiar problems faced by the Church as she seeks to fulfil her missionary obligation today in East and West and in the Third World?

In view then of the fact that a comprehensive study was not made and also that no opportunity was provided for study and report, the Committee on Church

Doctrine questions the whole practice of setting up Special Committees when standing committees already exist to do this kind of work. It is our intention to recommend to this Assembly that all matters requiring study be referred to standing committees, that normally presbyteries be given the opportunity to "study and report," and that Special Committees be appointed only when it is deemed necessary.

2. Would not the Report have been greatly strengthened by pointing out that God is the great Missioner and that the mission of the Church is founded on the prior Missio Dei? The Report strives to be theocentric but because it has not always kept the above point in mind, we are sometimes left with the impression that mission is what we do rather than what God does. This is particularly evident in the statement, "in the response of every man to the Gospel everything is at stake, both the quality of life in the present and life with God in eternity" (p. 254), Without minimizing the importance of man's response is this not claiming too much? What about the doctrine of election?

It needs to be made clear that the ground for missionary activity does not lie in man's desire for salvation or in his service to God and man, but "in the mystery of the 'sending' and 'sent' God." God is a sending God, which is what mission means (from the Latin, missio — 'a sending off'). God sends His Son into the world and the Holy Spirit is "sent" from the Father and the Son. As the Son was sent from the Father, even so the Apostles were sent into the world. "As the Father has sent me, even so I send you" (John 20:21). The Church's mission proceeds from and is patterned upon God's mission in Christ. (For a trinitarian orientation to mission see the "Decree on the Missionary Activity of the Church", The Documents of Vatican II, New York: Guild Press, 1966, pp. 585 ff.).

How did Jesus understand his mission? According to St. Luke, Jesus saw his work in the light of the Suffering Servant of Isaiah 40-66: "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to preach good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovering of sight to the blind, to set at liberty those who are oppressed, to proclaim the acceptable year of the Lord" (Luke 4:18-19). The mission which our Lord undertakes here is a total mission to the total man and the total world, holding together proclamation, action and service in an indissoluble unity. What God has joined together we are not to rend asunder. Nor are we to speak of primary and secondary goals as the Report does for in Jesus' understanding of his mission one aspect is not emphasized at the expense of the other. This is also evident in his missionary charge to the Twelve: "Preach as you go saying, 'The kingdom of heaven is at hand.' Heal the sick, raise the dead, cleanse lepers, cast out demons" (Matthew 10:7-8). Proclamation without service is empty; acts of service without proclamation are blind.

- 3. Is it not really the case that the Report operates with a faulty concept of the kingdom of God and of the nature of man? Soul and body, spiritual and material are separated in an unbiblical fashion. Moreover, why is there no recognition anywhere in the Report that the Christian who fulfils his obedience to Christ in his ordinary vocation is participating in the mission of the Church as truly as the person who teaches in a missionary school? A recovery of the Christian understanding of vocation is essential to the Church's mission and yet the Report neglects this matter altogether.
- 4. Would not the Report also have been strengthened by at least some reference to worship so as to keep the matter of the Church's mission in its proper perspective? Before the Church is sent out to proclaim in word and deed the Christian gospel she gathers together as a community to worship the Father. To quote the B.C.O. statement on the Church's Ministry that the Report does not quote in full, the Church is not only called "to bear God's Word to the whole world" but also "through Christ to present the whole creation in worship and service before the Father until Christ comes." Mission does not exhaust all that God does in the world. God is Creator as well as Redeemer. He is continually active in the world in providence. He is at work in history both in and beyond

the Church to accomplish His saving purposes. Nor does "mission" exhaust all that the Church is called to do in the world. She is called to worship the Father through Christ the Son by the power of the Spirit, to feed and to nurture her members so that they may attain to Christian maturity and grow "to the measure of the stature of the fullness of Christ" (Ephesians 4:13).

5. The Report is rightly concerned to counter the view of the social activists that the mission of the Church must be concentrated exclusively on such issues as peace, justice, poverty and race relations to the neglect of concern for the salvation of individuals and their ultimate destiny. But the question must be raised whether in countering this view the Report has not swung too far in the other direction. Does not the Report suffer from what might be called a "privatising" of the biblical view of salvation, as for example, in the statement "that a truly biblical theology of mission makes it entirely clear that man's greatest need lies, not in the areas of social injustice, economic deprivation, or political oppression but in his alienation from God" (p. 253)? Despite the fact that the word "man" is used in a generic sense the thrust of this statement is to issue in an individualizing, privatising tendency. Moreover, such a statement fails to understand the radical nature of sin. Sin or alienation is not merely an individual, private or interior reality but a social, historical reality that is manifested in social injustice, economic deprivation and political oppression. It is never encountered in itself but only in these concrete, particular alienations. Such a radical understanding of sin demands an equally radical understanding of salvation as embracing the whole life of man and all creaturely reality. Both the view that by merely improving social conditions we will create new men and women and the view that by converting individuals we will change society are naive for they operate with a faulty understanding of sin. As Richard J. Mouw has pointed out in his book, Political Evangelism: "Somewhere there is a Christian slum-dweller who rents from a Christian slum-landlord. Each has experienced the redeeming power of the gospel in a personal way, but the reconciliation they might experience together in Jesus Christ is severely hindered by the kind of social system in which they live. There are economic practices, laws, and prejudices woven into the very fabric of society which make it impossible to deal adequately with the reconciliation of such individuals without at the same time being concerned with the social and political context of their relationship" (Grand Rapids: Eerdmans, 1973, p. 16)

Reconciliation with God means reconciliation with our neighbour. The vertical and horizontal relationships cannot be separated. There can be no love of God which does not involve love of the neighbour (cf. 1 John 4:20-21).

#### 7. The Work of the Holy Spirit

A sub-committee has met a number of times during this year, including two joint meetings with the Assembly's Special Committee to Study the Charismatic Movement, appointed in 1973. Some of the aspects of the work of the Holy Spirit are still under study. As we feel that our work would suffer from undue haste, we respectfully request that we may be given another year to fulfill our task.

In the meantime, we call attention to the two previous submissions of the Committee on Church Doctrine contained in the Acts and Proceedings of 1972, pp. 618-624, and of 1973, pp. 348-350. We believe that these papers should be kept before the Church, as we add at this time a study dealing mainly with two concepts: "Baptism in or with the Holy Spirit," and "Being filled with the Holy Spirit."

#### The Reformers and the Westminster Standards.

The Reformers were concerned to maintain the closest possible connection between the Word and the Spirit. Both Calvin and Luther rejected the reliance of the Enthusiasts (Schwärmer) of their day upon "experiences" and "private revelations." Therefore, the Westminster Confession states that "the supreme Judge, by which all controversies of religion are to be determined, and in

whose sentence we are to rest, can be no other but the Holy Spirit speaking in the scripture" (1:10).

The Westminster Standards abound with references to the Holy Spirit. They attest to his work in calling, justifying, and sanctifying the believer. The Confession holds together inseparably the Holy Spirit with the Word of God (1:5), the Ministry (25:3), the Sacraments (27:3), and the Communion of Saints (26:1).

The Concept of a "Baptism in the Holy Spirit."

The term "Baptism in (with) the Holy Spirit" understood as a separate act of God, subsequent to the believer's acceptance of Christ by faith and his being joined to his Church, does not occur in Holy Scripture at all.

The phrase "to be baptized with the Holy Spirit (and with fire)" occurs six times in the New Testament: Mt.3:11; Mk.1:8; Lk. 3:16; John 1:33; Acts 1:5, and Acts 11:16. It seems clear that the main purpose of this expression is to indicate a contrast between the water baptism of John and the water baptism of Jesus. John's baptism is — in his own words — a "baptism for repentance" in anticipation of the Messiah. But baptism into Christ is a baptism with the Holy Spirit and with fire. By the baptism of John one enters into the fellowship of repentance and hope in the promised Saviour. By the baptism in Christ one enters into the fellowship of the Holy Spirit, the Body of Christ, which is the Church. The 'fire' indicates that Christ not only joins to Himself those who believe, but also judges and purges those who deny Him, as Matt. 3:12 indicates.

Although Acts 1,5 speaks of being baptized with the Holy Spirit, the link with water baptism is established immediately when this promise is fulfilled. For when the Holy Spirit is given, the Apostles preach Christ, and Peter gives the assurance to all that they "shall receive the gift of the Holy Spirit" upon repentance and being baptized (Acts 2:38).

In Acts 11:16 Peter refers to the promise of Acts 1:5. But already Acts 10:47 has shown that receiving the Holy Spirit immediately prompts baptism. So baptism and the gift of the Holy Spirit are held firmly together, in Caesarea as well as in Jerusalem.

In Samaria (Acts 8) there exists for a brief while an obviously anomalous situation: though the believers had been baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus, the Holy Spirit "had not yet fallen on any of them" (vs. 16). It is implied in the whole passage that this was unusual, even puzzling. Therefore, the apostles had to come from Jerusalem to set this matter right. They establish and confirm the link between baptism and the gift of the Holy Spirit.

Ephesus presents a similar occurrence (Acts 19). It becomes obvious here that the gift of the Holy Spirit belongs at the beginning of the life of faith in Jesus Christ (vs. 2), and that this gift is linked with baptism in the name of the Lord Jesus (vs. 5 & 6). Again, as in Acts 8, there is apostolic guidance and correction, with the result that both baptism and the gift of the Holy Spirit are properly understood and are firmly held together.

Jerusalem, Caesarea, Samaria, and Ephesus are examples of the irruption of the Gospel into a non-Christian environment, where Christ is proclaimed in a missionary situation. It is not surpising that in this setting the various aspects of the Gospel are in flux and do not immediately fall into place. The biblical record shows that it was a vital apostolic function to put such matters in order. The Bible accordingly holds together our baptism in Christ and the gift of the Holy Spirit. It knows of only one baptism.

To be baptized into Christ's Church is to be baptized into His body and to share the gift of the Holy Spirit. "For by one Spirit we were all baptized into one body — and all were made to drink of one Spirit" (I Cor. 12:13). "There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to the one hope that belongs to your call, one Lord, one faith, one baptism. . " (Eph. 4:4-5) Although there are people who regard baptism in water and 'baptism in the Holy Spirit' as two separate things, we find only one Christian baptism in the Bible, the water

baptism into Christ with which the bestowal of the Holy Spirit is constantly linked,

Yet, the term "baptism in the Holy Spirit" is widely used both in traditional and neo-Pentecostalism to describe what is understood as a very special act of God. It then stands apart from water baptism, from repentance and faith in Jesus Christ, and from regeneration. They are only connected in that repentance, faith, and regeneration are regarded as prerequisites for a "baptism in the Holy Spirit."

We consider the use of this expression with such a meaning as confusing and unscriptural.

#### The neo-Pentecostal understanding.

Neo-Pentecostals have developed the idea of a "baptism in the Holy Spirit" to undergird their understanding of "charismatic experiences." Not always do they use the term itself. But the matter is central in their theology.

One of their ablest spokesmen is J. Rodman Williams. In his book THE ERA OF THE SPIRIT (Plainfield, N.J., 1971), he calls the same phenomenon others designate as the "baptism in the Holy Spirit" an "effusion" (p. 57) or the "movement" (p. 51) of the Holy Spirit. He states that "regeneration and sanctification are the ground, the basis, the framework in which and out of which the movement of the Spirit may come" (p. 48). It is a movement "beyond redemption" (p. 51, emphasis his), "fully claiming the human vessel," "penetrating it through and through" (p. 52). "While presupposing redemption. . .(it) moves freely in another dimension" (p. 53). It creates "a new immediacy between God and man" (p. 57).

Here is the "something more" and "something beyond" which so often is called the "baptism in the Holy Spirit," the "second blessing" over and above and beyond salvation. It manifests itself in such charismata as prophecy, tongues, and singing in the Spirit. It seems that J. Rodman Williams has drawn the inevitable conclusions from his understanding of the outpouring of the Holy Spirit. For he says that prophecy, "while in the language of man, is the direct utterance of God" (p. 28), "more basic than preaching or teaching" (p. 29), "the very Word of God" (p. 29). Of tongues he claims that "every sound, every syllable, every sentence is produced not by our own devising but by the eternal Spirit Himself" (p. 31).

Interpretation of tongues also is "direct utterance of the Spirit of God" (p. 32). Of "charismatic improvisations" (singing in the Spirit) he says, "They are the Spirit's own songs" (p. 33). Williams speaks of a "kind of total letting go" — "so that the Spirit of God may have full possession," and "He takes possession in a total kind of way" (pp. 62-63).

Those who claim to have this experience speak of it often in superlatives. It is to them the most exhilarating and ennobling experience. They testify to an extraordinary sense of God's reality and presence. In praise and adoration they feel themselves lifted up as never before. Throughout their daily life they display a new and deep love, joy, and peace. Above all, they feel empowered to witness to Jesus Christ in a new and vital way. The radiant faith and witness of neo-Pentecostals in particular has proven itself to be an exciting and very appealing phenomenon, especially for young people.

#### Critique of the neo-Pentecostal understanding.

In spite of the apparently genuine nature of the neo-Pentecostal experience, the way in which that experience is often interpreted is not true to Scripture. It is one thing to find an intensely personal communion with Christ; it is quite another to put it into words. We must reject an understanding in terms such as are quoted above from the work of J. Rodman Williams. That interpretation opens wide the door to errors and excesses which the Reformers already opposed in their time. We contend with it specifically at three points:

( i) The statements of Williams imply a false mysticism in the claim that we can have an unmediated relationship with God. Here he is in danger of

falling into the characteristic error of Quakerism, which is the belief that the Holy Spirit, in an unmediated and direct relation to the human spirit, is the sole source of revelation and power.

- (ii) It must be kept in mind that the Spirit does not testify to himself, but to Christ. For this reason the Reformers insisted upon the inseparable bond between the Spirit and the Scriptures, of which Jesus said, "It is they that bear witness to me" (John 5:39). To say, as Williams does, that the "effusion" of the Spirit is a movement "beyond redemption" is to drive a wedge between the Spirit and the Scriptures bearing witness to Christ and, therefore, between the Spirit and Christ Himself. No doubt, Williams does not desire to separate the Spirit from Christ, but his words move in that direction. For it is plain that for him the Christian's goal is a total possession by the Spirit. The work of Christ is to be subordinated to that goal. Thus Christ becomes subordinated to the Spirit.
- (iii) The third effect of his teaching (however it may be restrained by other influences in the believer's life) is to give the "enthusiast" a low regard for the Church visible in favour of an invisible Church which is not the historical Church of Christ's redemption. It will tend to depreciate the primacy of the visible means of grace (Word and Sacraments) as being formal and less spiritual, despite their being Christ's appointed way of uniting with his people in the Spirit. This ill effect shows in Williams' reference to neo-Pentecostal prophecy as being "more basic than preaching and teaching." Although Williams is not speaking about a "baptism" in the Holy Spirit, the matter is quite the same, as he asserts a new and separate experience of the gift of the Holy Spirit.

There is a position, represented by Arnold Bittlinger (see bibliography), in which a stronger connection is maintained between the neo-Pentecostal experience and the work of the Holy Spirit in regeneration and sanctification.

Nevertheless, where a distinct and new event is taught, described as the "Pentecostal" or "charismatic experience," we must maintain our objections on the ground of Scripture and Reformed doctrine.

The pertinent teaching of the Westminster Confession.

As we turn to the teaching of the Confession, we must first recognize that the neo-Pentecostal movement is in part a reaction to a great deal of dullness and, indeed, spiritual deadness in the churches. The love, joy, and peace, and the radiant witness which are evident there, are too often missing in our church life. Although the term "immediacy between God and man" calls for criticism, there is often missing a felt union between our Mediator Jesus Christ and ourselves. Therefore, a sense of God's reality and presence is at times lacking in our services of worship, not to mention our daily life. Only as we confess these shortcomings among ourselves dare we comment further.

Secondly, we note that, in fact, the results of a so-called "baptism in the Holy Spirit" have been claimed and proclaimed by the Church of Christ as the gifts and fruit of the Holy Spirit. Emphases have shifted, sometimes to ward off excesses, as in the days of the Reformers. Yet the Westminster Confession teaches them in Ch. 18 "Of Assurance of Grace and Salvation." From this assurance a sense of God's presence and reality flows. It gives rise to praise and adoration and issues in a love, peace, and joy that make the life of faith radiant in witness to Christ:

Such as truly believe in the Lord Jesus, and love Him in sincerity ...may in this life be certainly assured that they are in the state of grace, and may rejoice in the hope of the glory of God. ...

...an infallible assurance of faith, founded upon the divine truth of the promises of salvation, the inward evidence of those graces unto which these promises are made, the testimony of the Spirit of adoption witnessing with our spirits that we are the children of God... With particular relevance to the concept of a "second blessing" under discussion here, the Confession continues:

This infallible assurance does not so belong to the essence of faith, but that the true believer may wait long, and conflict with many difficulties, before he be partaker of it: yet, being enabled by the Spirit to know the things which are freely given him of God, he may, WITH-OUT EXTRAORDINARY REVELATION, IN THE RIGHT USE OF ORDINARY MEANS, attain thereunto. And therefore it is the duty of everyone to give all diligence to make his calling and election sure; that thereby his heart may be enlarged in peace and joy in the Holy Ghost, in love and thankfulness to God, and in strength and cheerfulness in the duties of obedience, the proper fruits of this assurance...

These are the very things in which the neo-Pentecostals rejoice. They claim, however, that they result from a special act of God, an infilling with the Holy Spirit which is required above and beyond "mere" faith in Christ as Saviour. The Confession, instead, places the "peace and joy in the Holy Ghost," "love and thankfulness to God," "strength and cheerfulness in the duties of obedience," within the reach of every Christian, "without extraordinary revelation, in the right use of ordinary means." For to be Christ's own is not a half-way mark in the Christian's life, beyond which there are further heights of grace and power to be reached. "For in Him all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell" (Col.1,19), and "He who did not spare His own Son but gave him up for us all, will he not also give us all things with him?" (Rom.8:32). The various gifts of the Holy Spirit are there in the life of the Church with baptism into Christ, as God distributes them to each one as He wills. The limitations are ours.

Improving our Baptism.

If we recognize our limitations and long for a fuller and richer life of faith, we ought not to look for a new or additional type of baptism. The Larger Catechism teaches how we may "improve our baptism," that is, how we may grow in grace, in the knowledge of the Lord, and in the joy of faith.

Question 167 asks, "How is our baptism to be improved by us?" Answer: "...by growing up to assurance of pardon of sin, and of all other blessings sealed to us in that sacrament; by drawing strength from the death and resurrection of Christ...by endeavouring to live by faith...and to walk in brotherly love, as being baptized by the same Spirit into one body."

Although the language of our standards is of another era, the matter itself is there in abundance. The endowment with the gifts and fruit of the Spirit is neither dependent on special conditioning techniques or methods, "a kind of total letting go" (Williams), nor on a special "effusion" or "baptism in the Holy Spirit." Every Christian is within the full range of the work of the Holy Spirit, to which we should be continually responsive, thereby "improving our baptism,"

Some phenomena of the charismatic movement are alien to our tradition, but at this point our tradition is seriously lacking. We would no longer say, as the Confession does (21:3: "Prayer...is to be made...if vocal, in a known tongue"), that there is no place in the Christian community for speaking in tongues or other special manifestations. Because of our traditional position, it is difficult for us to accept these manifestations. Yet they are clearly part of the New Testament experience of the Holy Spirit. However, they are never to be regarded as a test of life in the Spirit.

The concept of "being filled with the Holy Spirit,"

The Holy spirit is always to be understood as a Person; never as a substance. Great care should be taken, therefore, not to use the term 'to be filled with the Spirit' as meaning that the Spirit of God is given piecemeal. "For it is not by measure that He gives the Spirit" (John 3:34). The 'measure' is not on the part of God, but on the part of man. To the extent to which the Christian is obedient and receptive to the Lordship of Christ, the Holy Spirit will dwell in him and make him Christ's own — the Holy Spirit fully as a Person with all His

divine grace and power. It is not he who comes in part, a little bit here and a little bit there. It is we who obey and yield to him, a little bit here and a little bit there, "until we all attain to the unity of the faith and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to mature manhood, to the measure of the stature of the fulness of Christ" (Eph. 4:13).

It is significant that the expression "to be filled with the Holy Spirit" or "to be full of the Holy Spirit" occurs only in the writings of Luke, with the sole exception of Eph, 5:18. In nearly every case it is used on occasions when God's people are faced with a serious challenge or are called to a peculiar service. (Cf. Lk 1:15; 41; 67; 4:1; Acts 2:4; 4:8, 31; 6:3, 5; 7:55; 11:24; 13:9, 52). Therefore, this is not a once-for-all act of God, but it is repeatable and is to be distinguished from what has been called the "baptism in the Holy Spirit."

In Eph. 5, 18, the apostle Paul – in the face of the evil and dissipation of this world – admonishes the believers to "be filled with the Spirit." It is of the greatest importance in our time that this apostolic admonition be heard throughout the Church. Then those who desire to live by the Spirit and to walk by the Spirit will be at home in the Church. They will continue in the teaching of the Church and, in turn, share with the Church the riches they have found in Christ Jesus our Lord.

#### The teaching of Eschatology.

In this sharing of the riches of Christ, there is room also for the renewed eschatological interest, which is a significant aspect of neo-Pentecostalism. For the expectation of the coming of Christ in glory is not peculiar to neo-Pentecostalism. It is part and parcel of the Gospel and of the teaching of the Church. Those who wish to become re-acquainted with the Church's hope and expectations are reminded of the extensive studies made by the Committee on Church Doctrine and of the resulting studypapers submitted to the Church during the years 1955-1962. The study of these statements will prove helpful to all who desire to know the Church's teaching on this subject.

#### The need for renewal.

In our Centennial Year we are called to Renewal and Response, Many have lived among us with a hunger for the riches of Christ and a need for a radiant fullness of life in him. Insofar as the Presbyterian Church fails to offer them the love, joy, and peace which some have now found in the neo-Pentecostal movement, the Church itself must share a burden of guilt for the misunderstandings which have arisen around their new-found experience of commitment and exultation. For the Church is called to teach its members to live by the Spirit and to walk by the Spirit (Gal. 5:25).

We express the fervent hope that in our search for renewal we shall rediscover the treasures of our Reformed heritage. We believe that what the Catechism teaches as "improving our baptism" is an arduous task, that requires repentance, humility, and patience. But it is also a joyous task, full of the assurance that Christ will renew his Church as we yield to him; that he will endow the Church with all the gifts of his Spirit and will call forth a rich harvest of the fruit of the Spirit, as "the whole body...upbuilds itself in love" (Eph. 4:16).

Overture 9, Presbytery of Lindsay-Peterborough, regarding the Doctrine of the Holy Spirit. 8. The Covenant of Grace and Reception into the Communicant Membership of the Church.

Background

For several years now the General Assembly has instructed the Committee on Church Doctrine to stimulate discussion concerning the place of children in today's church. This concern is bound up with the very nature of the Gospel and it certainly draws a sympathetic response from Presbyterians in particular. Thus in 1967 (Acts and Proceedings, pp. 275 to 279) the concept of Christian maturity and the significance of "confirmation" as it bore upon admission to the Lord's Table were brought to the attention of the Church. The importance of these themes for children was further explored by a longer and a shorter study paper in 1971 (pp. 272-278) and 1972 (pp. 337-341). This procedure inevitably has involved a measure of repetition for the work of the Presbyteries. Response from across the country has been quite strong, however, attention being paid both to theological and to practical matters. We are impressed by the high regard for the united ministry of Word and Sacraments which continues to characterize Presbyterian thought in Canada today.

In the course of this investigation it is the question of participation at the Lord's Supper by children and teenagers which has served to focus our attention. Two basic alternatives have been considered in detail. Present procedure in the Presbyterian Church in Canada: Baptized children are received into full communion by an act of the local Session which in turn is recognized in a service of Admission to the Lord's Table, also known as Confirmation. Considerable emphasis is placed upon pastoral counsel leading up to this event in order that the profession of faith and renewal of the Baptismal covenant may be a meaningful experience for the young communicant. Recent tendencies in sister communions: A specific act of admission to the Lord's Table is discontinued and baptized children are invited to receive the sacrament apart from a profession of faith or service of Confirmation. Age is not a factor in coming to the Table, although consultation with parents and the guidance of the Session is encouraged. Such action has been permitted by the Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. as well as by two Lutheran bodies in North America.

Response of Presbyteries

The mind of our own Church in response to these alternatives has been reasonably clear. Following the study of 1971, fifteen Presbyteries favoured continuing the present procedure, four were prepared to change and two did not comment directly. After 1972, eighteen replies favoured existing practice while six were open to change. The type of change indicated in a number of cases was such as would retain the principle of reception into full communion while applying it more flexibly than the present official position would allow. The majority of Presbyteries have thus indicated the desire to deal with this pastoral situation by working within the existing framework. At the same time, strong support has been voiced for the view that much can be done to introduce children to the Lord's Table on this basis. The second response from the Presbytery of Ottawa is one of a number which might be cited at this point:

"The present custom of leaving 'profession of faith' till age fourteen or fifteen seems to have authority only in practice rather than in law. Sessions should therefore, according to the insights of this paper, encourage younger children to make their profession of faith and welcome them to the Lord's Table instead of the practice of allowing it reluctantly."

In view of these expressions of opinion, and in view of the questions that do remain as to whether unqualified child communion is consonant with the Scriptures, the following recommendations are submitted:

- That steps be taken to encourage baptized children and teenagers to enter into full communion without undue delay.
- That the further question of full communion for baptized children be kept before the Church with a view to further clarification.

#### THE PRESENT PROPOSAL

With reference to the encouragement of believing children to come to the Table, it first should be underlined that the local Session does have power to take action whenever this is deemed appropriate (Book of Forms, Section 110). A further point is that communicant membership presently admits not only to the privileges of the Table, but to the more legal aspect of church membership as well. It perhaps has been inevitable, therefore, that something approaching to an adult level of understanding and experience should be expected of those who enter into full communion. If a separation were made between communicant membership as such, and the legal responsibilities which accompany it, we believe that this would provide opportunity for children to give more spontaneous expression of their faith in sacramental practice. The importance of taking up full adult responsibility at a later stage of Christian experience also would receive its due recognition. Thus a significant parallel with the sequence that dates from Biblical times would be provided whereby Jewish boys were recognized as "sons of the commandment" from the age of thirteen, but did not enter into legal or military responsibilities until the age of twenty.

In order, therefore, that believing children might more readily be encouraged to participate in the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper, we propose that the Book of Forms, Section 140 be revised as follows:

- 1 a) The members of a congregation who are entitled to the privileges of the Lord's Table are those who, upon a profession of their faith in Christ and obedience to Him, have been received into full communion.
  - b) All additional Church privileges and responsibilities belong to those who, being in full communion, have reached the age of their legal majority.
  - c) The children of believing parents, being within the covenant, are members of the Church, and it is their duty and privilege, when they reach the age of discretion, to enter into full communion (Westminster Confession of Faith, Chapter 25, Section 2).

With reference to the keeping of the Communion Roll we further propose that the following statement be appended to the Book of Forms, Section 125, paragraph (c):

However, note shall be maintained on the Roll of those members with privileges of the Table only, and of the date when they enter upon full Church privileges. At the discretion of the Kirk-Session this entrance upon full Church privileges may receive special recognition at the Annual Meeting or in a regular worship service of the congregation.

## FOR FURTHER STUDY IN THE CHURCH

Note should be taken of divergent practice in this sensitive area, and of some of the reasons which account for it. Mention already has been made of the policy of the Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A., and of some Lutheran bodies, in permitting baptized children to come to the Lord's Table. Such policy is under study at the present time in the Church of Scotland, the Church of England and the United and Anglican Churches of Canada. The custom of the Eastern Orthodox Church is to give a token administration of the Lord's Supper to infants at their baptism. Children thus are encouraged to receive the sacrament at any subsequent time. Roman Catholic practice in the twentieth century commonly has regarded the age of seven as the time for "solemn communion," although there is considerable experimentation and liturgical revision at present.

Differences remain among proponents of child communion yet certain common themes do emerge in their writings. A widely encountered view is that the sacrament of Baptism confers regeneration upon those who receive it. Baptized persons also are regarded as members of the church without further qualification. Thus some scholars writing within the Reformed tradition would hold that membership within the covenant community itself gives entry to full communion. The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper, on this position, might be offered to very young children or even to all baptized persons. Again, emphasis is placed upon modern insights into non-rational forms of learning and the strong influence of family solidarity. For lucid presentation of such views in brief compass, see Power to Permit from the Board of Christian Education of the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A.

According to our present standards Baptism is the sacrament of the covenantal relationship into which the children of believing parents are born. It is not possible to confirm the once-for-all act of Baptism but it is expected that the covenant itself will be confirmed by the Church and the individual before the Lord's Supper is received. Those favouring this view recognize that Baptism is spoken of as a means of salvation on occasion within the New Testament, but that so too are the ministries of the Word and Spirit to which repentance and faith are linked. With adults these means of grace can be received at the same period of life and so lead directly to deepened communion at the Lord's Table. With children, however, their efficacy is spread over a period of years in the nature of the case. Participation at the Table thus is to be encouraged after they have been nurtured to display "'knowledge to discern the Lord's body, faith to feed upon Him, repentance, love and new obedience', and a life in outward conformity with such profession". (Book of Forms, Section 110.a). A brief statement of this position is given in A Manual of Church Doctrine, Wotherspoon and Kirkpatrick. (Revised by Torrance and Wright), pp. 51-53.

The further study of this subject will call for renewed examination of such basic themes as the nature of the Church, the meaning of the Sacraments and the natural distinctions of age in Scripture and the Inter-Testamental literature. At present we commend these issues to the attention of Presbyteries and congregations. A selected bibliography is included to assist in this purpose. We trust that careful note also will be taken of the effects of the one basic change in practice which will take place if the present report is adopted.

#### OVERTURE 27, Acts and Proceedings, 1974.

The Presbytery of Calgary — Macleod made overture with a view to widening the grounds for the baptism of infants and modifying the statement regarding "Believing Parents" (Acts and Proceedings, 1957, pp. 230-231). The overture gives timely expression of pastoral concern. It also correctly notes that an unduly mechanical attitude on the part of ministers and elders can prevent them from being true servants of Jesus Christ on behalf of all who come to them for ministry.

Notwithstanding the salutory effects of the Overture, however, your Committee feel that it does not do full justice to this important subject. Basically it is not a particular Presbyterian formulation that is at issue, but rather the fact that Jesus Christ is King and Head over the ongoing faith and practice of His Church. In the Baptismal service parents reaffirm their faith in Christ as Saviour and Lord, and it is He who instituted the Supper saying, "This do in remembrance of me". Out of genuine pastoral concern, accordingly, Sessions will want to guide parents in their need to use this and the other means of grace as practical demonstration of the

Lordship of Christ in their lives.

With reference to the 1957 Statement itself, it is indeed brief yet there is a perspective in it which is quite overlooked by the present Overture. From the outset the Reformed tradition has refused to indulge in subjective tests of piety or to hinder freedom of conscience in judging of members in good standing. Thus the references to attendance upon divine ordinances, including the Lord's Supper over a two year period, by no means imply that these acts of public worship alone are the guarantee of life in the Spirit. Such practice does, however, demonstrate obedience to the objective aspect of the commandments by which Christ has taught that we will show our love for Him. Again, the Statement does refer to the importance of the environment of the Church in addition to that of the nuclear family for the nurture of children. Persons who are deeply concerned for unbaptized children are further encouraged to assume a spiritual and parental oversight of them, and to bring them for baptism on that basis.

In retrospect the statement on Believing Parents is also to be commended in that it points out to parents that it is they who discriminate against their children if they carelessly disregard the covenant obligations of their own baptism. Since the 1950's numerous denominations have attempted to face this situation realistically with parents, rather than to tacitly condone it. This continues to be a desireable course of action, while at the same time we recognize that certain differences among fellow presbyters will occur in individual cases. It is in this positive and prayerful spirit, which also finds some expression in the present Overture, that the

policy of our Church is to be expressed today.

See Recommendation #8(b).

#### STATEMENT ON THE EVANGELISM OF CHILDREN

A copy of the revised statement on this subject from the Board of Congregational Life has been received and studied by the Committee on Church Doctrine. This follows a previous discussion held by representatives of this Committee and the previous Boards of Christian Education and Evangelism and Social Action. The statement was found to be an improvement on the earlier one in that more atten-

tion is paid to the nurture that is appropriate to children from Christian homes and those from outside the influence of the Church. We believe that it would be helpful to be still more specific at this point if we are to assist congregations in dealing practically with young people who have drifted from our Church Schools and youth groups. It perhaps also needs to be more clearly stated that in no case are children to be expected to undergo an adult type of conversion experience. These and other observations have been forwarded to the Board of Congregational Life.

#### RECOMMENDATION 1.

That the prayer of Overture 19, 1974 be not granted.

#### RECOMMENDATION 2.

That the relation of the Committee on Church Doctrine to a General Assembly Committee on the Church in the World be as defined in the report, if such a committee is instituted.

#### RECOMMENDATION 3.

(a) That the statements (a) and (b) in the report upon Book of Forms, Section

201, be adopted as declaratory interpretations.

(b) That the amended form of Book of Forms, Section 176 (1) regarding ministers on the roll of presbytery be sent down to presbyteries with a view to adoption under the Barrier Act.

#### **RECOMMENDATION 4.**

That the legislation prepared for the institution of the Diaconate be sent down for approval or disapproval under the Barrier Act.

#### **RECOMMENDATION 5.**

(a) That Assembly accept the declaratory statement of the Committee upon

the Meaning of Deposition:

(b) That Assembly instruct the Principal Clerk to re-phrase Book of Forms, Section 251, to cover the case of a minister seeking release from discharge of his ordination vows.

#### RECOMMENDATION 6.

(a) That the Assembly take note of the dubious value of the practice of setting up special committees to handle matters that come within the terms of reference of

a board or standing committee.

(b) That the Committee's report with comments on the responses received to the Report of the Special Committee on the Basis and Purpose of the Mission Task of the Church be accepted as discharging its duty in that reference, especially in view of its engagement with the question as it prepares a Statement of Faith.

#### RECOMMENDATION 7.

(a) That the Assembly commend the paper on "Baptism in or with the Holy Spirit" and "Being filled with the Spirit" for study by Presbyteries, Kirk Sessions, Colleges (Faculties and Students) and others interested, and invite comments to be sent to the Secretary of the Committee.

(b) That the present labour of the Committee on the Work of the Holy Spirit be regarded as an affirmative answer to Overture 9, 1975, of the Presbytery of

Lindsay-Peterborough.

#### **RECOMMENDATION 8.**

(a) That the proposed amendment of Book of Forms, Section 140, be sent down to Presbyteries for study and comment with a view to being sent down again later under the Barrier Act.

(b) That the prayer of Overture 27, 1974, of the Presbytery of Calgary-MacLeod be not granted.

#### REPORT OF THE CLERKS OF ASSEMBLY RE: STUDY PAPER ON THE USES AND PURPOSES OF NOTICES OF MOTION IN THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY

To the Venerable the 101st General Assembly:

The above Study Paper, (A & P, 1974, pages 261-263, 82,) was reported upon by seven presbyteries. One of these stated it had no comments to make. The other approved it. One presbytery, in its approval, expressed a desire that if Assembly were unanimous, a subject not in overtures, reports, etc., should be given a place on the docket. This rare procedure, used in emergencies, has always been acceptable. Another presbytery stated an opinion that if a commissioner felt some matter were relevant he should have the right to introduce it. The Clerks are puzzled as to the meaning of "relevant" in this connection. If it means relevancy to some subject already before, or to be before, Assembly the commissioner can bring in an amendment covering his thought. If it means in reference to an emergency in the Church or elsewhere, the unanimous consent of Assembly will judge the relevancy and permit consideration. But if "relevant" refers to some general topic that has been in the mind of the commissioner, the Report of 1974 stresses the topic should be in the form of an overture, sent up from the presbytery of the commissioner concerned. In the foregoing the Clerks following the presbytery's comment, have spoken of "unanimous consent of Assembly", but in the 1974 Report stated their opinion that a two-thirds majority of those present and voting would be sufficient.

The Clerks do not believe the matters of this Report merit a reference under

the Barrier Act for Sections 33 and following in the Book of Forms.

They recommend, however, that Assembly approve the Report of 1974 and this Report as guide lines for Assembly, and that an asterisk be placed at the foot of the page for Section 49 of the Book of Forms calling attention to these Reports.

## THE REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE TO ADVISE WITH THE MODERATOR

To the Venerable the 101st General Assembly:

The Reverend Hugh Davidson, M.A., D.D., Associate Secretary for the Board of Congregational Life, was elected Moderator of the 100th General Assembly

meeting in St. Andrew's Church, Kitchener.

Dr. Davidson has covered many areas of the Church in Canada as well as overseas. He visited our Mission field in Nigeria and Malawi. On his return flight home he stopped over in Rome to bring greetings to the Waldensian Synod, Italy, who were celebrating their 8th Centennial. With Dr. L. Pandy he visited The Reformed Church of Hungary, and received a gracious welcome. The Moderator has just returned from a visit to the General Assembly of The Presbyterian Church of Scotland.

#### OVERTURES REFERRED

Overture #10, 1973, Presbytery of Guelph-Saugeen was referred to the Committee to Advise with the Moderator, and the Overture asked that the Office of the Moderator of the General Assembly be studied anew and redefined. In 1974 the Committee to Advise with the Moderator answered the Overture, recommending that the prayer of the Overture be not granted for reasons stated in the report to

the 1974 General Assembly. The Committee also had in mind the report that the Moderator of the 99th General Assembly had given to the 100th General Assembly, and his report dealt with several items pertaining to the office of the Moderator.

This Committee continues in the opinion that the duties of the Moderator during the General Assembly are adequately covered in Sections 283, 284 and 285

of the Book of Forms.

The area difficult of definition lies in the Moderator's 'representation' of the Church at various functions - civil, social and ecclesiastical. The Committee appreciates the Presbytery's concern and that of others as to the nature of this representation, and also realizes that among the various moderators there are diversities of gifts. It would point out that each year brings a different set of circumstances and occasions that request and/or require the Moderator's presence. Emergent situations also arise from year to year that cannot be anticipated or adequately legislated but are presently dealt with by this Committee to Advise with the Moderator. Further, the Committee must bear in mind that the seat of authoritative utterance in our system of government lies in the Church courts. If these three difficulties could be legislated to the satisfaction of the Church at large, i.e. diversity of annual occasions; emergent circumstances and the preservation of the seat of authoritative statement, the Committee's task from year to year would be considerably lighter. The Committee feels that such legislation, in their experience, is beyond the realm of the possible and re-affirms with regret its former recommendation that the prayer be not granted.

#### RECOMMENDATION 1.

That the Reverend D. W. Hay, D.D., Professor of Systematic Theology, Knox College, be officially nominated as Moderator of the 101st General Assembly.

#### **RECOMMENDATION 2.**

That the prayer of Overture #10, 1973 Presbytery of Guelph-Saugeen, be not granted.

#### RECOMMENDATION 3.

That the thanks of Assembly be tendered to the Courts of the Church, the congregations, and the many persons who showed kindnesses to the Moderator as he visited throughout the Church.

#### **RECOMMENDATION 4.**

That the thanks of Assembly be tendered to the Media for their willingness to make their facilities available to Dr. Davidson.

## THE COMMITTEE ON INSTITUTIONAL CHAPLAINCIES

To the Venerable the 101st General Assembly:

Over the past year this Committee has met three times and continues in its efforts to support the men and women of the Church who are engaged in chaplaincy or related work.

Seven of our ministers are engaged in full-time chaplaincy service. They are:

The Rev. Ian Glass, Charlottetown, P.E.I.,

The Rev. Walter Tait, Calgary, Alta., in Education,

The Rev. James Files, Brantford, Ont.,

The Rev. Arnold Bethune, Cobourg, Ont., and

The Rev. Ross Manthorpe, Coquitlam, B.C., in Corrections,

The Rev. Brown Milne, Calgary, Alta., in Health, The Rev. Dr. George Tattrie, Ottawa in Education. Fourteen of our ministers serve on a part-time basis, two in Health and twelve in Corrections, and there are nine hospital visitors.

The Ontario Public Service has instituted a policy whereby chaplains come before an assessment committee annually. Our Committee has been asked to name a denominational representative. Our policy has been to inform the clerk of the chaplain's Presbytery, so he or another member of the Presbytery can act.

The committee is represented on the Canadian Penitentiary Committee, the Ontario Inter-Faith Committee on Chaplaincy and the Canadian Council of Churches Committee on Institutional Chaplaincies by Dr. A. Goodwill MacDougall, the Rev. Byron Nevin, and the Rev. Robert Armstrong respectively.

Through the Church's Board of Ministry we try to keep interested ministers informed of vacancies in chaplaincy as they occur.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

- That Presbytery Clerks keep the Committee informed of new appointments or other changes for chaplains, full or part-time within their bounds.
- That chaplains be encouraged to keep the Committee informed of interesting developments in their work.
- That congregational organizations be encouraged to invite a chaplain to their meetings to interpret chaplaincy work in the three fields of Health, Education, and Correction.
- That the representation on the Committee be revised from two from the Board of Congregational Life to one from the Board of Congregational Life and one from the Board of Ministry.
- That wherever advisable, when someone leaves a Correctional Institution, the chaplain arrange in the area to which he/she is going suitable pastoral interest.

## THE ADMINISTRATIVE COUNCIL

To the Venerable the 101st General Assembly

The Administrative Council submits the following report on actions it has taken since the last General Assembly, and presents recommendations for the consideration of this Assembly.

Last year we presented a budget that had an anticipated net deficit for the year of \$294,251.00. A gratifying increase in givings to the budget, and careful spending by Boards and Committees, enabled us to end the year with a surplus of \$34,522. For this we thank God, and take courage.

The Council is constantly contrasting projects within the programs of Boards and Committees to decide where our priorities are. If new programs are to be initiated we must either raise more money; discard some programs now in effect; or go into a deficit position. The rapid escalation in the cost of living has increased the problems of the Council. The position presented in our report to the 1974 General Assembly that the Council believes the top priority is providing support, especially financial, to those who labour full-time in the service of the Church is still held.

The Council believes that the Spirit is working in the Church these days to the increasing of the bounds of His Kingdom, and we move into the future with confidence and enthusiasm. Let us follow the guidance of the Spirit in making our decisions at this General Assembly in order that we may do all the tasks that need to be done with the resources that can be made available.

## MATTERS REFERRED TO COUNCIL BY PREVIOUS ASSEMBLIES

# DEGREE GRANTING POWERS FOR EWART COLLEGE also RECOMMENDATION I (BOARD OF EWART) (pgs. 423, 338 and 42, (1974 A&P)

Various items pertaining to Christian Education have been under study by a Special Committee of the Council on Educational Needs. A year ago the Council added to this Committee two representatives of each of our three Theological Colleges, and the Committee has now submitted a definitive report to the Council.

One item under study by this Committee was a recommendation adopted by the 1971 General Assembly "that the General Assembly through its Administrative Council proceed immediately to obtain degree granting privileges in the field of Christian Education for Ewart College and that this be done.

(a) by obtaining a charter from the Legislature of the Province of Ontario.
 (b) or in any other way as the Council, in consultation with the Board of Ewart College, sees fit."

The Board of Ewart College has recently requested that the Administrative Council defer any further discussion of the subject of degree granting at Ewart College until such time as the Board of the College places a further request in this regard before the Council.

#### RECOMMENDATION 1.

That this be received as information.

## DIRECTOR OF FIELD EDUCATION, RECRUITMENT AND REGISTRATION AT KNOX COLLEGE

The Board of Knox College requested the 98th General Assembly to make the above appointment. The Educational Needs Committee had this matter under review, but a delay in receiving the 1976 Budget from the Board of Knox College prevented the Council at its April meeting coming to a conclusion on this matter.

The matter is to be reviewed by the Executive of the Council at its May meeting, and a recommendation will be presented in a Supplementary Report of the Administrative Council.

### **RECOMMENDATION 2.**

That this be received as information.

# SETTING FACULTY SALARIES BY EACH COLLEGE BOARD, also RECOMMENDATION 2 (BOARD OF KNOX COLLEGE) (Pgs. 457, 35 and 72, 1974 A&P)

The 98th General Assembly approved a request from the Board of Knox College that it be permitted to set the salaries of its faculty and referred the request to the Administrative Council.

The Council has approved the recommendation of its Educational Needs Committee that this request be not granted. It is considered unwise that one College Board should have permission to set the salaries of its faculty without relationship to the scale being followed in our other Colleges, or by the General Assembly for executive staff.

#### RECOMMENDATION 3.

That the request of Knox College Board for permission to set the salaries of its faculty be not granted.

## ADDITIONAL MEMBER FOR EWART COLLEGE FACULTY, also, RECOMMENDATION 1, EWART COLLEGE, (pgs. 338 and 42, 1974 A&P)

The 98th General Assembly approved a request by the Board of Ewart College for the appointment of an Assistant Professor of Religious Studies, and this was

referred to the Council. The request has been renewed to succeeding General Assemblies. The Educational Needs Committee, after studying this request among many others for additional expenditure in the field of education, recommended to the Council that this appointment be approved, and the Council adopted the recommendation and added the money necessary to the 1976 Budget of Ewart College.

#### **RECOMMENDATION 4.**

That the Board of Ewart College be authorized to appoint an Assistant Professor of Religious Studies.

OVERTURE #28, 1973, GENERAL ASSEMBLY, RE HOUSING FOR RETIRED MINISTERS, and RECOMMENDATION #7, EVANGELISM AND SOCIAL ACTION RE SENIOR CITIZENS' HOUSING, and OVERTURE #26, PRESBYTERY OF CALGARY — MACLEOD, (pg. 442, 1974 A&P).

The Council has a Committee, chaired by Senator Richard J. Stanbury, considering the above referrals and a large amount of resource material has been secured from Dominion and Provincial Agencies, and this information is being screened, and the study continues. The problem is complex and the solution will not be easily discovered. The Council requests further time to complete its study.

#### RECOMMENDATION 5.

That the above be received as a report of progress.

# AMALGAMATION OF CONGREGATIONS RECOMMENDATION 50, ADMINISTRATIVE COUNCIL 1973, and RECOMMENDATIONS 18 and 19, ADMINISTRATIVE COUNCIL 1974.

This matter has been under study by the Administrative Council and the Trustee Board for some time. The Council is aware that when congregations in large
urban areas are no longer viable the tendency seems to be to amalgamate two such
congregations and the place the assets of the two congregations into the new
formed congregation. This enables the new congregation to continue for a period of
time, but a study carried out by the Board of World Mission indicates that the
result of these amalgamations very seldom produce a congregation with the capacity to grow. If at least some of the assets were used to establish a mission in an
area where successful work could be accomplished, the cause of the gospel would
be advanced.

The Council points out that where a congregation is dissolved the assets revert to the control of The Trustee Board, which suggests to the Council how these assets may best be used, after referral from the Presbytery of the area concerned.

The 100th General Assembly referred this matter to Presbyteries for study and report. Only 15 of the 44 Presbyteries replied.

2 reported approval,

4 gave qualified approval, and

9 disapproved.

The suggested procedure seems to have caused some Presbyteries to believe their rights were being violated, and the Council was proposing another authoritative body that would erode the responsibility of the Presbyteries. The Council is concerned that the procedure followed should be the best for the advancement of the Church as a whole, and not to provide temporary security for a cause that is never likely to become viable. Also the procedure suggested gave opportunity for both Presbytery and the congregations concerned to present their recommendations.

The Council wishes to re-affirm the resolution presented last year, with a change to referring the disposal of assets to the Administrative Council, on the advice of the Trustee Board, which is the procedure now in practice with congregations which are dissolved.

#### RECOMMENDATION 6.

Re Dissolution of Congregations, that there be no changes in present practices.

#### **RECOMMENDATION 7.**

Re Amalgamation of Congregations, that the following new section 200 (j) be sent to Presbyteries under the Barrier Act for insertion on Page 50 of the Book of Forms in the sections referring to the duties and powers of Presbyteries in relation to congregations:

200 (j) in the matter of amalgamation of congregations, as pertaining to the assets of the amalgamating congregations, reference shall be made with recommendations by oral submission or extract of minutes, or both, under authority of congregational meetings and Presbytery, to the Administrative Council, which after advice of the Trustee Board, shall have power to issue, and report for information to the next General Assembly.

#### MACLEAN ESTATE

The Administrative Council has agreed to combine the Maclean Estate Management Committee into the Maclean Estate Development Committee.

With the permission of the 100th General Assembly, and after nominations were received from Presbyteries, the Reverend Robert C. Spencer, Arthur, was appointed Resident-Director effective April 1st, 1975. Plans are being developed under the leadership of Mr. Spencer for producing various programs in leadership and mission on the Maclean Estate property.

#### **RECOMMENDATION 8.**

That the above be received as information.

## ADDITIONAL BUDGET FOR COMMUNICATION SERVICES

The General Assembly of 1973 approved Recommendation 15, Organization and Planning, for an increase in the budget of Communication Services. The Council has authorized a special grant from the National Development Fund of \$12,000 to enable the Communication Services Committee to produce a Pilot Project of a Children's Television Programme. In addition the budget of the Committee, which was \$38,011 in 1974, has been increased to \$50,137 in 1976.

#### **RECOMMENDATION 9.**

That the above action be received as an answer to Recommendation 15, Organization and Planning, 1973 General Assembly.

## COMMITTEE TO CO-ORDINATE CENTENNIAL CELEBRATIONS

This has been a most active Committee of the Council for over three years. Because of their great dedication to their task The Presbyterian Church in Canada has been revived.

#### RECOMMENDATION 10.

That our sincere appreciation and thanksgiving be extended to the Committee to Co-Ordinate Centennial Celebrations, especially Dr. John Johnston, the Chairman, and Dr. F. G. Stewart, the part-time Director.

#### CONGRESS '75

Plans are completed for Congress '75 being held at MacMaster University, Hamilton, later this month. Reports indicate a very exciting event.

#### RECOMMENDATION 11.

That the thanks of Assembly be extended to the Congress '75 Committee, especially Dr. Walter Welch, for their energetic planning for this important event during Centennial Year.

#### CENTENNIAL BIRTHDAY GIFT FOR BUDGET FUNDS

The Centennial Birthday Gift for Budget Funds was established by the 100th General Assembly for the purpose of augmenting funds for on-going budget commitments, and if these commitments are over subscribed other projects could be implemented. The publicity material prepared by the Board of Congregational Life has been well received, and there seems to be a lot of activity going on. An envelope for contributions was inserted in the May issue of The Presbyterian Record. It is hoped some definite information may be available by the time of Assembly to report how much money has been raised by this project,

#### RECOMMENDATION 12.

That the above report be received as information.

#### CAPITAL FUND FOR CHURCH EXTENSION

The 100th General Assembly agreed "that the proposal of the Board of World Mission to conduct a Capital Fund Campaign starting in January, 1976 be sent down with all revelant documentation to the Presbyteries for study and report to the Secretary of the Administrative Council by February 28, 1975" (A&P, 1974, Pgs, 71 and 472).

The request was for a \$3,000,000 Capital Fund, \$1,000,000 for overseas, and \$2,000,000 for Canada.

suggestions but did not express definitely for or against, and one is still studying the Those disapproving, and explaining their reasoning, indicate a problem over a

major campaign for the needs of only one Board, and the closeness of this proposed campaign to the conclusion of the National Development Fund Campaign.

A Committee of the Council and BWM studied reports from the Presbyteries, and considering the needs of the whole Church reported to the Council and the Council reports to Assembly in the following recommendation.

#### RECOMMENDATION 13.

That approval be given for a Second Century Advance for Christ Campaign with a \$3,000,000 objective for extension of our work at home and overseas, to be conducted through our Church over a two year period beginning in 1978; and that the Administrative Council, the Board of World Mission, and the Board of Congregational Life be authorized to plan and organize the carrying out of the Advance.

#### OVERTURE #5, PRESBYTERY OF PARIS (1974 A&P Pgs, 434, 19 and 72)

This Overture requests a 'study of the whole question of the requirements of The Presbyterian Church in Canada regarding academic instruction and student housing, etc.' In essence the requested study had been undertaken beginning in 1972 under the Educational Needs Committee. The fact that the Presbytery of Paris did not know this study was being conducted indicates the Church needs to continuously be in touch with Presbyteries, etc. to inform them of the activites being undertaken, and in the area under study, the Board of Ministry might take this problem as a challenge to it.

### **RECOMMENDATION 14.**

That the Board of Ministry, in consultation with the Colleges of our Church, correspond with the Presbytery of Paris re the issues raised in their Overture, and make the issues raised in the Overture their on-going concern.

### OVERTURE #23, PRESBYTERY OF STRATFORD-HURON (1974 A&P Pgs. 440, 19 and 72)

This Overture requests "the merging of Knox College and Presbyterian College". The Committee on Educational Needs was given this Overture as part of its

Presbyterian College at present receives a relatively small budget for its operation, and provides a unique type of Theological Training to that offered by Knox College. There is a definite value in having a Presbyterian Witness on the McGill Campus in the Province of Quebec. The training in "Continuing Education" provided by Presbyterian College fulfils a felt need in our Church. There is a value in having some diversity of training in our Church.

Knox College has a strong faculty, is working with the Toronto School of Theology, and has an excellent historical building in Knox College. The receipt of the Pitman Estate will give considerable financial relief to the increasing financial needs of the College.

The Committee went beyond the terms of reference of the Overture and considered a possible merging of Ewart with either Knox or Presbyterian Colleges. The course of study at Ewart is different from that provided by Knox or Presbyterian Colleges, and is directed to students in the undergraduate field. The Committee was informed of an increasing degree of co-operation between Knox and Ewart Colleges.

#### RECOMMENDATION 15.

That the prayer of Overture 23, Presbytery of Stratford-Huron 1974 General Assembly, be not granted.

## **EDUCATIONAL NEEDS COMMITTEE**

The 1972 General Assembly granted permission to the Administrative Council "to make a study of the relation of the Educational Needs of our Church to the Resources that can be made available."

The Committee dealt with a number of items referred to it, and has had a part

in guiding the Council to some of the recommendations in this report.

As a part of its study of the problem committed to it, the Committee prepared a questionnaire on the Christian Education situation in the congregations of our Church, and sent it to 20 representative congregations throughout our Church. On the basis of the answers received the Committee recommended, and the Council approved, the following recommendations for the 101st General Assembly:

#### RECOMMENDATION 16.

That Presbyteries be encouraged to engage Directors of Christian Education to serve congregations within their bounds.

#### **RECOMMENDATION 17.**

That Presbyteries be encouraged to engage Directors of Christian Education to serve congregations within their bounds.

#### OVERTURE #28, PRESBYTERY OF EDMONTON (1974 A&P Pgs. 444, 20 and 72).

The Presbytery of Edmonton overtures "that the General Assembly reconsti-

tute the responsibilities of the Board of Congregational Life and the Administrative Council so that matters of Stewardship programmes and services be retained by the Board of Congregational Life, and matters of Budget programmes and services be the responsibility of the Administrative Council.'

The Assembly referred the Overture to the Board of Congregational Life and the Administrative Council for joint study. The Council named a Chairman, and the Council and the Board appointed representatives for a joint meeting, and the joint

Committee reported to the Council as follows:

"The Committee has given consideration to the fact that the Board of Congregational Life became operative on January 1st, 1974 and has completed only one year of its life, which is believed insufficient to warrant a major change at this time. The Board is now operating under conditions approved by the 1974 General Assembly. The 1973 General Assembly was advised by the Board "that an evaluation of the policy, functioning and staffing arrangements of the Board will be reported to the 1976 General Assembly". The 1974 General Assembly appointed a Committee under the Chairmanship of Dr. Nicolson to Study the Structure and cooperation of the Administrative Council and procedures for National Church Planning and Budget Development. Dr. Nicolson's Committee will be reporting to the 1975 General Assembly. In view of the foregoing the Committee makes the following recommendation. That the prayer of the Overture be not granted," The Council understands that BCL concurs in this recommendation which was adopted by the Council.

#### **RECOMMENDATION 18.**

That the Prayer of Overture #28, 1974, Presbytery of Edmonton, be not

#### OVERTURE #12, PRESBYTERY OF WEST TORONTO, AND OVERTURE #16, PRESBYTERY OF TEMISKAMING (1974, A&P, Pgs. 435, 437 and 19)

The prayer of the Overture is "to appoint a special committee to investigate the possibility of effecting economies in the administration of our Church and to examine and determine the work-load of all Executive Staff to the end that the basic stipend may be increased together with the salaries of Mission Superintendents, Deaconesses, and other poorly paid Church workers." etc. The Assembly requested the Administrative Council to do the study.

At the request of the Administrative Council the 100th General Assembly agreed to appoint an Executive-Personnel Committee whose terms of reference (1974 A&P, Pg. 382) includes the essence of the request of the above prayer. The Committee has been appointed and is now meeting regularly. Over a period of time

it will be reviewing the work-load of all Executive Personnel.

The basic stipend has been increased substantially by the 100th General Assembly and this Assembly will be requested to make another substantial increase in an attempt to keep up to the rising cost of living. The Council believes it is fulfilling the prayer of the Overture, and pledges to continue to provide as fairly as possible for the needs of all the servants of the Church.

#### RECOMMENDATION 19.

That the above statement be received as an answer to the prayer of Overture #12, Presbytery of West Toronto, 1974, and Overture #16, Presbytery of Temiskaming, 1974.

#### E. H. JOHNSON'S NOTICE OF MOTION RE CCC (1974, A&P, pgs. 30 and 31.)

Dr. Johnson's motion requested the Administrative Council, "at its autumn meeting to give careful consideration towards making an additional grant to the Canadian Council of Churches towards our 1974 allocation, and meeting our full allocation in 1975."

At its September meeting the Executive of the Council agreed to invite Dr.

Honey to attend the November meeting of the Council. As a result the Council granted an addition of \$300.00 to its 1975 Budget for the C.C.C., and provided a grant of \$150.00 to the cost of an Ecumenical Team the Council had invited to visit Canada. With all the demands being made on budget funds by the Boards and Committees of General Assembly the Council finds it difficult to increase substantially the grants to ecumenical organizations. Admittedly our Church is giving proportionately less to the C.C.C. than other denominations according to the prescribed formula adopted some years ago. The Administrative Council does not consider it advisable to allocate the full amount of our allocation to the C.C.C. for 1976, but agrees to keep the matter under review.

#### RECOMMENDATION 20.

That the Administrative Council keep under review its grants to Ecumenical Organizations.

#### MR. J.J.H. MORRIS' NOTICE OF MOTION RE APPOINTMENT OF A SUPERINTENDENT FOR THE SYNOD OF SASKATCHEWAN (1974 A&P, Pgs. 32 and 78).

Mr. Morris' motion requested the Administrative Council to provide sufficient money to enable the appointment of a Superintendent of Mission for the Synod of Saskatchewan. After intensive study of the request, and after our consultation with the Board of World Mission, the Council made a grant from the Special Project Fund, and the appointment of the Rev. D. T. Evans has been made to this position.

#### **RECOMMENDATION 21.**

That the above be received as information.

#### OVERTURE 32, PRESBYTERY OF HAMILTON, (1974 A&P, Pgs. 445, 20 and 47).

This Overture requested all former Moderators of Assembly be invited as guests to the 101st General Assembly, extending to them the privilege of sitting and corresponding, and providing special seating arrangements for such persons, and the General Assembly added "commissioners to the 1925 Assembly be accorded similar privilege."

The Administrative Council agreed to extend the invitations, except for permission to sit and correspond, which is considered ultra vires of its power in keeping with standing rules of General Assembly, and we are happy to report that a number have accepted, some of whom are present as commissioners to this Assembly.

#### RECOMMENDATION 22.

That the above be received as information.

#### RECOMMENDATION 2, (PERSONNEL SERVICES) (1974 A&P, Pgs. 271 and 49).

This was a proposal made to the 100th General Assembly "that the Committee (Personnel Services) determine, through its Director, courses in evangelism at recognized educational institutions which are acceptable to this Committee (for grants) and make this known to the Church, and that this be recommended to the Assembly as the reply to Overture #11, 1974."

The Assembly adopted the recommendation and referred it to the Administra-

tive Council for action.

The Council reports, that, having received from the Secretary of the Board of Ministry a list of courses available, approval has been given to change the regulations of the National Development Fund Bursary Fund for Continuing Education to permit the proposed coverage.

#### **RECOMMENDATION 23.**

That the above be received as information.

#### RECOMMENDATION 1 (c) BOARD OF WORLD MISSION AND RECOMMENDATION 33 (c) ADMINISTRATIVE COUNCIL (1974 A&P, Pgs. 202, 377, 34 and 54).

The Board of World Mission, in its report to the 100th General Assembly, recommended "that travel on multiple point charges be increased to \$19. per mile per annum round trip Sunday mileage minimum \$100. — maximum \$1,600. All effective July 1, 1974." The Assembly amended this recommendation by adding "except that in cases where Sunday round-trip mileage is more than one hundred miles, the rate shall be sixteen dollars (\$16.00) per annum per mile. This amended motion was referred to the Council with power to issue. The Council reports that after consultation with B.W.M., and with tacit support from them, the Council concurs in the decision of the Assembly and has ordered the recommendation to be adopted.

#### **RECOMMENDATION 24.**

The above is reported as information.

#### PROPORTIONATE SALARY INCREASES

The 99th General Assembly appointed a special committee to study proportionate salary increases. The Committee reported to the 100th General Assembly (Pgs. 263, 41, 42 and 54, 1974 A&P).

Recommendation #1 of the Special Committee that "Re-affirming that the principle of proportionate increases is fair and equitable. ..that this method of granting increases be continued, was adopted. Recommendation 2, 3 and 4 were referred "to the Administrative Council, in consultation with the Board of World Mission for study and report to the 101st General Assembly." The study has been completed and the Council recommends as follows:

#### **RECOMMENDATION 25.**

That proportinate salary increases be granted, using the existing percentage scale as follows:

Ministers and Superintendents	100%
Deaconesses	90%
Catechists	80%
Women Missionaries	80%
Student Ministers	70%

## RECOMMENDATION #2, ORGANIZATION AND PLANNING, (1974 A&P, Pgs. 412 and 32)

In this recommendation the General Assembly of 1974 "adopted the principle of granting assistance to Synods and Presbyteries for the cost of meeting and administration of their work where such help is needed; and request the Administrative Council to study ways and means for a Church-wide sharing of the costs on a more equitable basis, in consultation with Presbyteries and Synods, and report to the Assembly in 1975."

This recommendation was referred to Synods and Presbyteries for study and report. Of the 44 Presbyteries only 5 replied, and the answers varied from approval to "let the matter drop," It should be pointed out that the Board of World Mission makes grants to Presbyteries for the needs referred to by the Organization and Planning Committee.

In view of the lack of response to this matter from Synods and Presbyteries the Council makes the following recommendation:

## **RECOMMENDATION 26.**

That Recommendation #2, Organization and Planning; 1974, be not implemented.

## RECOMMENDATION #6, ORGANIZATION AND PLANNING (1974, A&P, Pages 412 and 32).

This recommendation authorized the Clerks of Assembly to implement a pilot project whereby Clerks of Synods and Presbyteries may together consider the work of the courts, along the lines indicated in the report of the Organization and Planning Committee to the 98th and 99th Assemblies. The Council provided funds for the project which was held at Presbyterian College the last week in November. Approximately half the persons concerned attended, and the evaluations were quite positive on the value of the exercise. The Council has agreed to provide funds for a similar project in 1975, and the Clerks who did not attend in 1974 will be invited.

#### RECOMMENDATION 27A.

That the above report be received as information.

## RECOMMENDATION 8 and 9 ORGANIZATION AND PLANNING (1974 A&P, Pgs, 420 and 32).

These recommendations deal with proposed changes concerning General Assembly's Committee to Nominate Standing Committees. The proposal was remitted to Presbyteries for study and report to the Administrative Council. 17 of the 44 Presbyteries replied and only 1 disapproved, some with minor comments. The Council considers the present arrangement has worked with good success, and has some concern about the suggested core committee exercising more influence than desirable, nevertheless considering the large percentage of those Presbyteries who replied giving approval, recommends as follows:

### RECOMMENDATION 28A.

That this Assembly name the 3 persons for the core committee as set out in the proposal of Organization and Planning to the 1974 General Assembly, A&P, Pg. 420, and nominations for the remainder of the Committee be made by Synods — the odd numbers naming a minister commissioner, and the even numbers naming an elder commissioner for the 1976 General Assembly.

#### RECOMMENDATION 29A.

That the Core Committee named by Assembly compile the data suggested in Recommendation 9 (b) of Organization and Planning 1974 General Assembly, in consultation with the Clerks of Assembly.

## RECOMMENDATION 16 (d) ORGANIZATION AND PLANNING (1974 A&P, Pgs. 426 and 78)

This recommendation gave direction to the Administrative Council re preserving the records of the Organization and Planning Committee, and re continuing the purpose of the committee. The Council reports it has had the records scrutinized, and those considered of value are being placed in the Church's archives. The Council will endeavour to pursue the purposes of the Organization and Planning Committee.

#### RECOMMENDATION 30A.

That the above report be received as information.

## COMMISSIONERS' OVERTURE (1974, A&P, Pgs. 447 - 448 and 80 and OVERTURE #18, PRESBYTERY OF PARIS (1974 A&P, Pgs. 438 and 81).

The Commissioners' Overture requested the 100th General Assembly to designate the said corporation (Penmarvian of Paris) as an agency of The Presbyterian Church in Canada carrying out the avowed policy of that Church in caring for Senior Citizens as part of her care for all people, and to approve the use of the Endowment Fund left by the late John Penman for the maintenance of his former home and estate to the Corporation known as "Penmarvian of Paris" for the implementation of the objectives outlined in its charter, etc."

mentation of the objectives outlined in its charter, etc."

Overture #18, Presbytery of Paris, requested the General Assembly "to permit the Board of Directors of Penmarvian of Paris to advertise facilities and solicit capital building funds for this project throughout The Presbyterian Church in Canada, etc."

The 100th General Assembly requested the Administrative Council "to convene a consultation with representatives of the Presbytery of Paris as soon as possible to consider the prayer of the Overture, (Commissioners') and a similar request was made re Overture #18.

The Council wrote to the Presbyerty of Paris in June offering to meet representatives of Penmarvian of Paris at their convenience. The meeting was not held until the April, 1975, meeting of the Council.

The representatives from the Corporation stated arrangements were still uncertain about the amount of funds needed, and how they were planning to secure these funds, so no action was taken re Overture #18.

The representatives suggested a number of requests for use of the \$100,000.00 Endowment Fund mentioned in the Commissioners' Overture. The Council agreed to implement one of the suggestions, namely to provide the interest from the Endowment Fund to be used for the Building Fund of the Corporation until the building has been completed, and thereafter to be used for the support of Presbyterian ministers, and their wives or widows, missionaries, etc.

#### RECOMMENDATION 27B.

That this report be received as an answer to Overture #18, Presbytery of Paris, 1974 General Assembly, and the Commissioners' Overture to the 1974 General Assembly.

#### OTHER MATTERS

#### TRUSTEE BOARD

There is a vacancy on the Trustee Board, and the Board has recommended to the Council that they desire to nominate Mr. A. Campbell Burgess, a member of Calvin Presbyterian Church, Toronto, for this position.

#### RECOMMENDATION 28B.

That Mr. A. Campbell Burgess, Calvin Church, Toronto, be appointed to the Trustee Board,

#### NATIONAL DEVELOPMENT FUND ALLOCATIONS COMMITTEE

A report appears in the Financial Statement of the Receipts and Disbursements of the National Development Fund (Page 287 of A&P). In former years this report contained a list of allocations, made to date from this fund, but this list has increased in length, and this year we refer to the report in the Financial Statement.

#### RECOMMENDATION 29B.

That the report in the Financial Statement of Receipts and Disbursements of the National Development Fund be noted for information.

## INCREASE IN BASIC STIPEND, AND TRAVEL.

The Council has received with pleasure the information that many congregations picked up the increase in basic stipend and travel made last year by the General Assembly. As a result of the response of the congregations the charge on the Budget Funds was not as great as expected. The cost of living continues to increase, and amounted to approximately 12% in 1974. Therefore the Council has agreed to support the recommendation in the report of the Board of World Mission re stipend and travel.

#### RECOMMENDATION 30B.

That the following salary and travel scale he adopted, effective January 1st, 1976.

#### **DEBT FORGIVENESS**

"The Administrative Council set up a special committee the terms of reference of which were that in cooperation with The Presbyterian Church Building Corporation:

 to examine the advisability of forgiving some of the long outstanding debts of certain congregations; and

 to examine the feasibility of surveying the total indebtedness of our Church in Canada and our resources, and suggesting new and better ways of financing or refinancing loans on church properties.

The Committee made the following report:

#### OBSERVATIONS:

- The total indebtedness of congregations as reported in annual statistical returns (e.g., 1974 A&P, page 603) is declining at a significant rate from year to year. This reflects the retirement of debt incurred during the construction surge of the early nineteen-sixties. Overall indebtedness is equivalent to only six months of aggregate congregational cash flows (\$8,012,584 debt compared to 1973 income of \$16,367,754).
- Only a small number of congregations have defaulted on capital debt repayments or have signalled anticipated difficulties in handling debt retirement. The problem is greatest for congregations which took out commercial loans just

prior to the steep rise in prime lending rate. A close check is being kept on the congregations in difficulty by the Building Corporation and by the Lending Fund.

- The Building Corporation is constitutionally unable to forgive debts, and should not be regarded as a source of funds for this purpose. Its reserves are designated for securing financial leverage in the established money markets.
- The Lending Fund has a limited capacity to provide grants in exceptional circumstances. . .see part 3(b) of the Lending Fund Regulations (1974 A&P, pages 377-380). The Fund does not however "forgive" debts of existing congregations.
- 5. It would seem impolitic to use General Assembly funds for liquidating outstanding congregational debts until an Assembly chooses to designate revenue for this purpose. Your committee does not anticipate that event in the near future. It should also be noted that endowment funds controlled by Assembly generally have too many strings attached to be used for bailing out defaulting congregations. As for pension funds, the first responsibility is to provide good pensions.
- Thus no funds that are in any sense within the purview of the Administrative Council may be used for the retirement of debts of overburdened congregations, New sources of financing would be required.
- 7. One potential source currently yields nothing because of a legal loophole. Neighbouring congregations are siphoning off funds by "amalgamating" with congregations undergoing dissolution. The sale of assets of the latter thus conveys little benefit to the Presbytery or the church at large. The Administrative Council's recommendation number nineteen (1974 A&P, pages 373 and 47) relates to this matter and is under study by Presbyteries.
- 8. There appear to be significant amounts of money held by some congregations in non-church investments. At this moment no mechanisms exist to channel congregational holdings into church-related projects. The committee was pleased to learn that the Building Corporation is studying the possibility of selling term certificates of deposit with the objectives of tapping surplus congregational funds and of providing flexibility of financing within the denomination.
- 9. Your committee questions whether a formal survey of total indebtedness and resources would justify the time and effort, especially since lack of precise information is only one of several hurdles to be surmounted in developing a rationalized system of financing church properties. (Other problems the quality of supervision on occasion by presbyteries, the indifference of investing congregations, legal loopholes.) Much of the information could be gained simply by tightening and modifying existing reporting procedures. Note that recommendation #2 below is in line with the desire of the Department of National Revenue for more specific financial statements of congregations.

As a result of the study the Council submits the following recommendations:

#### **RECOMMENDATION 31.**

That the General Assembly standardize the following procedures:

- (a) Auditor's report to congregations shall include comprehensive lists of trust funds and investments of any nature as well as the debt position of the congregation;
- (b) Annual Financial Reports of all congregations shall be submitted to Presbytery;
- (c) Presbytery shall insure that statistical returns tally with Congregational Annual Financial Reports with respect to total investments and total indebtedness.

#### **RECOMMENDATION 32.**

That the Clerks of Assembly be asked to set out in an official manner the relationship of Trustees of congregations. Boards and Sessions.

#### FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

In accordance with modern business practices an Audit Committee has reviewed the financial accounts on behalf of the Council, and the Council has approved the Financial Statements for signature by the Chairman of the Council and the Treasurer of the Church.

These statements appear elsewhere in the Appendices to the Acts and Proceed-

#### RECOMMENDATION 33.

That the statements on Financial Accounts be received as information.

#### AUDITORS

#### **RECOMMENDATION 34.**

That the firm of Thorne Riddell and Company, Chartered Accountants, be continued as Auditors of the Church Accounts.

#### REPLACEMENTS OF EXECUTIVE PERSONNEL

The 100th General Assembly approved the setting up by the Administrative Council of an Executive Personnel Committee to have oversight of the staffing needs of the Boards and Committees of General Assembly. If a Board or Committee wishes to make a reappointment to fill a vacancy, or to establish a new executive position, the procedure is to have the Executive Personnel Committee do the preliminary study, and make recommendations to the Council, which in turn recommends to the Assembly.

The Committee has dealt with the following requests and the Council has agreed to make the following report and recommendations:

#### A. THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH BUILDING CORPORATION.

With the retirement of Dr. David McCullough from the active ministry, effective December 31st, 1975, the Corporation is taking steps to fill the vacancy thus created. The Council regrets that the Corporation took steps to circulate the Presbyteries before the Executive Personnel Committee had opportunity to make a recommendation to the Council, but realize that initiating new procedures sometimes causes confusion.

As a result of the investigation of the Executive Personnel Committee the Council recommends as follows:

#### **RECOMMENDATION 35.**

That the Presbyterian Church Building Corporation be permitted to make a nomination to the 1975 General Assembly for the appointment of a General Manager, and after a period of one year the Corporation review with the Executive Personnel Committee the terms of reference of this position to discover if there are further functions the General Manager may undertake on behalf of the Church.

#### B. THE BOARD OF WORLD MISSION

With the retirement of Dr. Howard Doig from the active ministry effective December 31st, 1975, the Board of World Mission notified the Executive Personnel Committee they intended to proceed to appoint a replacement. Dr. Doig has filled the position of Secretary, Finance and Administration, as established when the Board was reconstituted by the 97th General Assembly. It appeared to the Executive Personnel Committee that the Board of World Mission is overstaffed, and the Council, after considering the report of its Committee, recomends as follows:

#### **RECOMMENDATION 36.**

That the position of Secretary, Finance and Administration, be not filled, and the Board of World Mission be directed to reallocate the responsibilities of this position to other persons now on the B.W.M. staff.

#### C. BOARD OF CONGREGATIONAL LIFE

The Board of Congregational life wishes to appoint a person to their staff with editorial and writing skills. After discussion of the needs of the Board, and the purpose of making this appointment, the Council, on recommendation of the Executive Personnel Committee, makes the following recommendation:

#### **RECOMMENDATION 37.**

That the Board of Congregational Life be permitted to appoint a Secretary with editorial and writing skills, and if this appointment be made a rearrangement of staff be made to enable congregations to receive more field staff assistance.

#### D. PRINTING AND DISTRIBUTION.

The problem of printing and distributing of material prepared by Boards and Committees of General Assembly for congregations, etc., has presented a perennial problem for the Council. Recently a new off-set printing press has been purchased, and a full-time person has been hired to operate this. This has enabled secretarial staff to have more time for their responsibilities, and a lesser need for part-time help in mimeographing etc. However, there is need for someone to file material, store it, keep an index of what is available, supervise mailing, etc. This person needs an intimate knowledge of the structure of our Church and its operation, as well as the resources our Church has available. Some needs at present are:

- 1. Regular monthly mailings to congregations.
- 2. Monthly orders for Church Bulletins.
- 3. Presbyterian Church Calendars.
- 4. Special mailings such as Ten Days for World Development etc.
- 5. Audio-Visual material.
- 6. Receiving and distributing supplies at 50 Wynford Drive.

After long study, and consideration of the efficiency and the economy of the operation, the Office and Property Committee came to the decision that an appointment of a person in charge of Printing, Distribution and Office Service Co-ordinator would be the best solution to this problem, and considering the full-time and part-time staff employed to do this task at present, the proposed arrangement would not increase the total cost. The Office and Property Committee and the Executive Personnel Committee were authorized to draw up a job description for this person and the following recommendation is presented.

#### **RECOMMENDATION 38.**

That this General Assembly authorize the appointment of a person with the status of Assistant Secretary to be in charge of Printing, Distributing and Coordinating Office Services at 50 Wynford Drive, and that Presbyteries be asked to make nominations for this position.

#### **EXECUTIVE PERSONNEL SALARIES**

The 1975 General Assembly granted a 4% increase in the salaries of Board Secretaries, Assistant Secretaries and College Professors effective July 1st, 1974. By the end of the year it was obvious that this increase fell far short of the increase in the cost of living for 1974, and with the increase in the cost of housing, etc., in the Toronto area new appointments were made, by individuals taking a reduction in salary being received in the congregations. The Special Committee on Educational

Needs considered the problem. Knox College is finding a suitable appointment for the Chair of Systematic Theology, and recommended to the Council that action should be taken in what they considered an emergency. The Executive Personnel Committee also was directed to study the salary scale of our staff, and found it considerably below that of similar positions in other denominations. The Executive of the Council authorized an increase in the salary scale of 12% effective January 1st, 1975.

The Salary scale was further considered by the Council at its April meeting, and in order to maintain the salary scale in keeping with the increase in the cost of living makes the following recommendation.

#### **RECOMMENDATION 39.**

- A. That the increase of 12% in Executive salary scale granted by the Executive of the Administrative Council effective January 1st, 1975 be confirmed and continue to the end of 1975.
- B. That an additional increase of 10% be made effective January 1st, 1976.
- C. That non-ordained General Secretaries, and College Professors be granted a revised housing allowance of \$1,600.00 per year and non-ordained Assistant Secretaries be granted a revised housing allowance of \$1,500.00 per year, because these receive no deduction of a Housing Allowance for income tax purposes.

#### YOUTH OBSERVERS

The 99th General Assembly requested the Board of Congregational Life to evaluate the practice of having Youth Observers at the General Assembly, and report to the Administrative Council with recommendations regarding method of appointment and financing. In 1974 Presbyteries classified as odd numbered appointed a youth delegate, and this year even numbered Presbyteries have made an appointment. In addition each College has named one person. The experience of the past few years with Youth Observers at General Assembly has proved to be acceptable in every way.

The Council received the report from the Board of Congregational Life, and as a result of consideration of the same presents the following recommendation.

#### **RECOMMENDATION 40.**

- A. That the practice of having Youth Observers at the General Assembly be continued.
- B. That they be called Young Adult Observers.
- C. That the method of appointment be by Presbyteries, one-half of the Presbyteries being invited each year to make the appointments (one out of every two across Canada on a rotation basis), plus one from each of the Colleges. Young Adult Observers will be between the ages of 17 and 25 years.

In the event that any Presbytery fails to make an appointment, the B.C.L. may fill the vacancy, care being taken to relate the Board appointed to the Presbytery where he or she resides.

- D. The appointing body will be asked to pay \$50.00 toward the total cost of the Young Adult Observers, per Guidelines for appointing bodies.
- E. The remainder of the cost of the Young Adult Observers attending the General Assembly shall be borne by the General Assembly,
- F. The billeting Committee be requested to billet the Young Adult Observers in the same area.
- G. 1. That the Young Adult Observers be recognized and accredited at the opening sederunt.
  - 2. That the question of how the Young Adult Observers may best participate in debate be referred to the Clerks of Assembly for study and advice.

H. It shall be a condition of appointment that the Young Adult Observers shall be required to attend a briefing session, arranged by the Board of Congregational Life, before the opening of the Assembly, and to report to their appointing bodies following the meeting of the General Assembly. If a personal appearance should be impossible a written report shall be presented.

## ADDITIONAL INSURANCE COVERAGE.

With the consent of the Administrative Council additional insurance has been offered to members on Group Insurance. The Church does not subsidize this coverage, but the Pension Fund Office acts as an agent to receive premiums. A considerable number of ministers have taken advantage of the coverage and others may join if they can show Medical Insurability.

It should be noted the scale of benefits and premiums changes as the age of the insured increases. Further information and application forms, may be obtained from the Secretary of the Administrative Council.

#### RECOMMENDATION 41.

That the above be received as information.

## COMPULSORY GROUP INSURANCE COVERAGE

Group Insurance Plan VII provides a term insurance policy of \$20,000.00, with double indemnity in the event of accidental death, which amount decreases annually after age 50 years to \$7,000.00 at age 60 years and decreases to \$1,000.00 at age 70 years payable at death.

In addition there is provision for \$300.00 per month for income disability after a seven month waiting period, and payable to age 65 years if the disability is total

and permanent.

The Council considers its Group Insurance Coverage augments the Pension Plan, and provides much needed assistance to a minister who can no longer carry on the work of a minister, and support to the minister's spouse, in the event of the minister's death. A number of ministers have not taken advantage of this coverage, and this creates a serious situation in the event of a long illness, or in the event of death. Because the Benevolent Funds are not adequate to cover ministers in the event of this kind of a misfortune the Council desires the Assembly to adopt a similar resolution to Group Insurance Coverage as now exists re the Pension Fund.

#### **RECOMMENDATION 42.**

Every minister who joins the Presbyterian Church's Pension Fund shall join Group Insurance Plan VII, or such plan as may replace it, or submit a statement to the Pension Board indicating he/she understands the benefits provided and does not wish to participate, and will not expect assistance from the Church in areas where participation in the Group Insurance Plan would have provided that assistance.

#### **BUDGET FOR 1975 AND 1976**

#### PREAMBLE

The revised Budget for 1975 shows an estimated deficit of \$199,320 - the projection includes an estimate of \$2,500,000 for Income from congregations this is an increase of \$102,000 over the amount received in 1974 and is \$200,000 ahead of the original estimate for 1975.

When preparing the 1976 Budget the first projection - including \$217,000 for proposed stipend and salary increases in that year - showed a deficit of \$650,000. The Council arranged a meeting of all major Boards and Committees to consider this large deficit - no suggestions for reductions in expenditures were received by

the Council.

The Council accepted the suggestion of the Board of Congregational Life that the estimate of Income from Congregations for 1976 be increased by \$150,000 to \$2,650,000. Estimate income from bequests was increased from \$70,000 to \$100,000 and \$75,000 is available for transfer from the Special Project Fund for Personnel. The Council has reduced estimated expenditures by \$95,000.

The proposed 1976 budget shows a deficit of \$351,082 - this places a major

challenge before the Church.

## NATIONAL ADVISORY COUNCIL FOR YOUTH MINISTRY

In keeping with the above statements, a National Advisory Council for Youth Ministry (N.A.C.) consisting of one representative or alternate from each Synod will be appointed annually who together with one member of the previous N.A.C. will function as indicated below and will be related to the General Assembly and its boards and agencies through the Board of Congregational Life.

#### **FUNCTIONS**

The N.A.C. will have as its specific functions:

- To gain knowledge and experience in the work of The Presbyterian Church in Canada.
- (ii) To share that knowledge and experience with others at the Synod, Presbytery and Congregational level, where possible.
- (iii) To advise the Board of Congregational Life (in consultation with the Advisory Committee on Youth Participation) of the needs, attitudes, opinions and suggestions of youth across Canada.

#### METHOD AND TERMS OF APPOINTMENT

- (i) Any communicant member of The Presbyterian Church in Canada between the ages of 16 and 25 is eligible for appointment to the N.A.C.
- (ii) The Synod Congregational Life Committee, or its equivalent, will be responsible for the appointment of a representative and an alternate(s) selected from nominations provided by
  - (a) the synod young people's organization, and/or
  - (b) a Presbytery or congregational youth organization within the Synod.
- (iii) The names of the representatives and alternates shall be submitted by the Synod Congregational Life Committee to the Board of Congregational Life not later than October 31st of each year.
- (iv) No person may serve as an N.A.C. representative for more than three years.
- (v) One additional member will be designated from and by the previous N.A.C. to give continuity. (continued on page 336)

#### No. 3-PRESBYTERY OF WESTMINSTER

Re: ABORTION
(Referred to Board of Congregational Life)

To the Venerable the 101st General Assembly:

WHEREAS, the 1967 General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada resolved to "ask. Parliament to amend the law with regard to abortion to make therapeutic abortion lawful when the continuance of a pregnancy endangers the mother's life or is likely seriously to impair her physical or mental health, when requested by the woman concerned, and when authorized by a panel of qualified medical authorities",

WHEREAS, the present statutes of the Government of Canada permit abortion when "...the therapeutic abortion committee for the accredited or approved hospital, by a majority of the members of the committee and at a meeting of the committee at which the case of such female person has been reviewed,

(c) has by certificate in writing stated that in its opinion the continuation of the pregnancy of such female person would or would be likely to endanger her life or health." Criminal Code of Canada, Section 251, 4(b) & (c)

WHEREAS, the actual practice now in some Canadian hospitals amount to abortion on demand,

WHEREAS, there are serious violations of the laws of our country pertaining to abortion,

THEREFORE, we the Presbytery of Westminster, humbly overture the 101st General Assembly to urge the Government of Canada to take the necessary steps to

ensure that the laws of the land respecting abortion are not abused or that the General Assembly do otherwise for this object what to their wisdom may seem best.

That each Kirk Session be asked to notify the Clerks of Assembly at an appropriate time before the meetings of the General Assembly of the number of extra copies of the Acts and Proceedings required by the Session, such extra copies to be paid for, and sent directly to the congregation requesting them;

#### No. 5-PRESBYTERY OF HAMILTON

Re: THE RETIRING AGE OF MINISTERS

THEREFORE, the Presbytery of Hamilton overtures the Venerable the General Assembly to grant permission to any minister of the Church to retire on full pension after attaining age 65 and 35 years of service, or to do other for this matter as, in its wisdom, it may deem best.

#### No. 6-PRESBYTERY OF MIRAMICHI

## Re: "UNKNOWN COUNTRY" (Referred to the Board of World Mission)

To the Venerable the 101st General Assembly:

WHEREAS, this Presbytery finds itself in serious disagreement with the concept of salvation presented in the booklet *Unknown Country* (see pp. 12 and 47 in particular). This concept equates socio-economic and political liberation and betterment with the salvation offered in Jesus Christ through His cross and resurrection. The concept of salvation has thereby been so widened and secularized as to negate the meaning it has in Holy Scripture.

WHEREAS, this Presbytery rejects the view which flows from the above concept of salvation, making Mao Tse Tung appear as a servant of God and super missionary and thus making him, the communist regime, and program appear as instruments of salvation (see p. 60). We know of no salvation offered in the Gospel other than that which is in Christ through His cross and resurrection.

WHEREAS, this Presbytery considers the teaching of the above and related ideas to be in conflict with the Gospel of Jesus Christ preached from Presbyterian pulpits.

THEREFORE, the Presbytery of Miramichi humbly overtures the Venerable the General Assembly to instruct the Board of World Mission to cease distribution of the booklet *Unknown Country* and of study material based on it, and further, to guard in future publications against the emphasis on a view of salvation as cited above and, in particular, against a presentation of Mao Tse Tung as a missionary or instrument of God's salvation, or to do otherwise in this matter as in its wisdom it deems best.

#### No. 9-PRESBYTERY OF LINDSAY-PETERBOROUGH

Re: FORMULATING A PRESBYTERIAN DOCTRINE OF THE HOLY SPIRIT (Referred to the Committee on Church Doctrine)

To the Venerable the 101st General Assembly:

WHEREAS, the Committee on Church Doctrine was instructed by the 97th General Assembly to make a study of the work of the Holy Spirit with special reference to glossolalia and other charismatic gifts as they may be related to the Doctrines of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, and

- WHEREAS, the 98th General Assembly agreed to receive the supplementary report of the Committee on Church Doctrine on 'The Work of the Holy Spirit' with reference to glossolalia and charismatic gifts as an interim answer to the 97th General Assembly, and
- WHEREAS, the 98th General Assembly instructed the Committee on Church Doctrine to develop further its study of the doctrine of the Holy Spirit with an emphasis on the Biblical and theological view of the Trinitarian understanding of God, and to clarify the Scriptural usage of the word 'person', or 'hupostasis', and
- WHEREAS, the 99th General Assembly did commend for general study the statement of the Committee on Church Doctrine, on the work of the Holy Spirit as a person of the Triune Godhead, and
- WHEREAS, the 99th General Assembly did appoint a special committee to prepare a study paper dealing with the charismatic movement and its relationship with the members and particularly, the youth of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, and
- WHEREAS, the 100th General Assembly was informed in the report of the Committee on Church Doctrine that they had sent out to Presbyteries on request four study papers on glossolalia and charismatic manifestations, and that they intended to have a joint meeting with the special committee on the charismatic movement, and

WHEREAS, the 100th General Assembly accepted an amended report of the special committee as a statement to be taken as an interim-report, and

WHEREAS, the Westminster Confession of Faith does not have a chapter dealing with the work of the Holy Spirit, and

WHEREAS, the Committee on Church Doctrine has many subjects within its responsibility, and

WHEREAS, the special committee is responsible for a limited study of the work of the Holy Spirit;

THEREFORE, the Presbytery of Lindsay-Peterborough humbly overtures the General Assembly to bring all aspects of the studies on the Holy Spirit within the responsibility of the Committee on Church Doctrine, that the Committee be charged with the responsibility to prepare for approval by the General Assembly a written Doctrine of the Holy Spirit for the Presbyterian Church in Canada to be made part of the subordinate standards of our church, or do whatever the General Assembly in its wisdom deems best.

This Overture was considered by the Presbytery of Lindsay-Peterborough at its meeting on January 14, and the Presbytery approved the Overture and ordered it to be transmitted to the Committee on Church Doctrine for submission to the 101st General Assembly.

#### No. 13-PRESBYTERY OF KINGSTON

## Re: TEACHING ON THE NEW CHINA (Referred to the Board of World Mission)

To the Venerable the 101st General Assembly:

- WHEREAS, the statement of the 100th General Assembly gives clear direction to the Lordship of Christ in the mission of the Presbyterian Church in Canada; and

endeavour failed to accomplish; and

WHEREAS, many people in the church, because of a lack of understanding of the true nature of communism are being influenced to give credence to error. We, the Presbytery of Kingston, therefore humbly overture the 101st General Assembly as follows:

- (a) That such subtle teachings, which exalt communism, and continue to appear in a variety of releases from Board of World Mission personnel cease forthwith.
- (b) That all literature, distributed for missionary education purposes be carefully scrutinized and approved by the Board.
- (c) That Jesus Christ, His Gospel and the power of His redeeming love, be given its rightful place, and His Lordship be central to our mission in the world.

OR that the Assembly take such action in this matter, as in its wisdom seems best.

#### RECOMMENDATION NO. 19

That the following minute of appreciation for Miss Mary Sherrick be embodied in the minutes of General Assembly:

As people return from a lifetime of ministry these days, we comment that an era is ending. Today missionary service abroad very rarely is for one's whole career. The development of the Church overseas, thus changing needs for mission service, is the reason for shorter terms of service.

Mary Sherrick has spent her working days with brief exceptions, in the Bhil area of central India. Her work and witness have bearing on the fact that a church has developed, that Bhil leaders are in charge of the church's work in the area.

In 1933 Mary Sherrick was appointed by the W.M.S. (WD) to India. She served as a teacher in the Amkhut school system. She was principal, manager, teacher. A most significant part of her programme was teaching agriculture and mechanics. In an area struggling to produce food she helped to find methods to offset natural disasters - poor soil, inadequate techniques. As the motor car became part of the transportation system, boys were taught mechanics until the shop in Amkhut was the central repair depot for all the cars of the mission and a few others. Young mechanics found their life work as repairmen and drivers in the area surrounding Amkhut.

Needs developed in other areas. Mary Sherrick was asked to take charge of the Administration of Jobat Hospital and to be Treasurer of Administrative Council for Christian Institutions. She carried a heavy burden of responsibility in difficult days.

Mary Sherrick is a builder. Whether it is a building, a repair, a garden or whether it is human lives, the task is done with integrity and with faith. Her students now are leaders in the community and in the Church.

Miss Sherrick's home is Weyburn, Saskatchewan. She has a B.A. and a B.Ed. from the University of Saskatchewan. She graduated from Ewart College when it was the Missionary and Deaconess Training School. During World War II she was asked to serve as principal of Berbice High School in what was then British Guiana.

It is the prayer of the Board of World Mission that Mary Sherrick may have many blessings in her retirement, after forty-two years of mission service in the Church.

## REPORT OF THE BOARD OF KNOX COLLEGE

To the Venerable the 101st General Assembly:

The Board of Knox College begs to submit its 131st Annual Report.

We are again happy to report that the residence was fully occupied during the academic session. The relationships in the residence and in the classrooms have continued on a very high plane. Again we record our appreciation of the resources available to us through our membership in the Toronto School of Theology, which is one of the largest of its kind in North America.

Your Board commends the excellent work done by the Faculty under the leadership of the Principal, Dr. J. Stanley Glen. We are fortunate in having such a distinguished group of Professors and Sessional Lecturers who over the years have shown a deep devotion and concern for the work of the Church.

Expenses continue to increase, as the rate of inflation soars. Thus, even with the increased rate of room and board introduced last September, we incurred a deficit in the house account of \$9,580.00, which resulted in an overall deficit on the year's operation of \$9,847.00. In an effort to overtake these deficits the Board of the College has approved another increase in the rate of room and board beginning September 1975. The new rate will be approximately \$1,400.00 for the academic year.

Regarding renovations, it was necessary to replace the dish washing equipment

#### PRESBYTERY OF BRAMPTON

Memorial Re: USE OF WORD "STIPEND"

To the Venerable the 101st General Assembly:

WHEREAS, the 83rd General Assembly (A&P, 1957, page 99) and the 86th General Assembly (A&P, 1960, pages 27, 90, 91, 291 and 292) have approved definition of the word "stipend" consistent with historical usage as "the total amount of the minister's income out of which he paid the necessary expenses of his work;" and

WHEREAS, this usage is reflected in annual statistical returns of congregations and WHEREAS, the revision of Book of Forms, appendix number 10, (Guarantee to Presbytery for Minister's Stipend) as appended to Acts and Proceedings, 1972 includes wording to this effect: "annual stipend of . . . dollars, plus annual car or travel allowance . . .;" and

WHEREAS, the discrepancy in usage causes needless confusion in the moderation of calls to ministers;

THEREFORE, we, the Presbytery of Brampton of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, humbly petition the Venerable the General Assembly to instruct the Clerks of Assembly to prepare revised wording for Appendix 10 of the Book of Forms consistent with historical usage of the word "stipend", or to do otherwise as in its wisdom it deems best.

The referral was discussed from various viewpoints and it was realized that recommendation 13 while requesting study and reports did not recommend structures for receiving these reports and preparing a report to the 102nd General

Therefore, the meeting agreed upon a recommendation which when later presented to a meeting of the Inter-Church Aid Committee was adopted as a recommendation to the 101st General Assembly.

#### RECOMMENDATION

- 2. That the Assembly appoint a Special Committee re recommendation 13 of the Organization and Planning Committee's report to the 100th General Assembly (A & P pages 78, 423/24); that the Committee consist of 6 persons, nominated by the Assembly's Committee to Nominate, plus one representative each from the Board of Congregational Life, the Board of World Mission, the Committee on Church Doctrine, the Committee on Inter-Church Aid, Refugee and World Service, and the Committee on International Affairs; and that the Committee's terms of reference be as follows:
  - To study the reports received from Presbyteries, Synods, Boards and Committees and establish procedure to be followed in preparing the report to the 102nd General Assembly.
  - To present to the spring 1976 meeting of the Administrative Council for information and consideration the Committee's report to the Assembly, and
  - 3) To present the report to the 102nd General Assembly.

What shall be done about ministers who fail to report degrees to the Clerk of

Presbytery, and yet use them, is a matter primarily for the Presbytery discipline.

#### COMMUNICATION SERVICES COMMITTEE SUPPLEMENTARY REPORT

To the Venerable the 101st General Assembly:

Following the expression of concern by the 100th General Assembly about the lack of Television Programmes for children that present attitudes and values that we hold, this Committee developed a proposal for the production of a Pilot for a proposed series of children's Television Programmes. A grant from the National Development Fund enabled us to produce that Pilot and it will be shown at this Assembly. This Pilot has been created and produced by people who are professionals in the broadcast field and it is the intention of the Committee that the Series will be made available within the television industry in Canada, in order that it will be effective in reaching the widest possible audience.

To operate within that industry it has been important that we receive and follow the best advice of those knowledgable in the field. We have therefore been advised by Mr. Peter Steinmetz of the firm of Cassels, Brock who have been for many years the legal firm used by the Church. Mr. Steinmetz is a specialist in this field.

He has submitted the following advice:

"We understand that the Church will provide approximately \$12,000 to pay the production costs of the Pilot, to remunerate the performers and the Creative Team and to acquire certain ownership rights in the program concept and the Pilot. Thereafter, it is the intention that the Committee will use the Pilot to sell the program concept and the Pilot as the basis of a 13 week television series to major television networks, independent television stations, and/or commercial sponsors both within and outside of Canada. It is also possible that a co-production relationship may be entered into with an independent television station or a network for the purpose of financing and producing the series.

"In view of the foregoing, it is our feeling that the Church should consider the incorporation and organization of an Ontario corporation without share capital the function of which would be to fund, supervise and carry out this project as well as any other similar projects which the Church may contemplate in the future.

"The carrying on by the Church of its film and television production and distribution activities by means of this sort of corporation appears to be desirable partly on the grounds of administrative convenience, but mainly because of the advantages of limited liability and in order to insulate the Church from the risks of being a day-to-day presence in the commercial activities of such an industry. In our opinion the realization of the aims and objectives you have outlined are better served by means of a separate corporate body. In this way, the Church would avoid entering into, in its own name, a significant number of contractual obligations with performers, writers, unions, broadcasters, sponsors and others that are absolutely essential in order to operate in the industry.

"We therefore suggest the incorporation of a corporation without share capital pursuant to the provisions of part 3 of The Ontario Corporations Act. Such corporations are generally incorporated for purposes of charitable or welfare activities and other activities principally intended for the benefit of the community-generally or a wide segment of the community, as, for example, recreational organizations,

professional or trade associations and churches.

"Corporations without share capital are to be carried on without the purpose of gain for their members and any profits or other accretions to such a corporation are to be used in promoting the objects of the corporation. This requirement must be set out in the letters patent of the corporation. While such a corporation may not pay dividends to its members, it is specifically authorized by the Corporations Act to be used in promoting the objects of the corporation. This requirement must be provide services to the corporation. The proposed corporation would be similar to The Presbyterian Church Building Corporation ("PBC") except that the PBC was incorporated as a dominion corporation under the Canada Corporations Act because of its interest in real property throughout Canada. In the case of the proposed corporation there is no compelling reason why it should be incorporated federally and the balance of administrative convenience rests in favour of incorporating provincially."

We understand that this advice has been reviewed and concurred in by Mr. Hamilton Cassels, the Church's lawyer. We therefore submit the following resolu-

tion for your consideration:

That the Communications Services Committee be authorized to organize and incorporate an Ontario Corporation without share capital, the function of which will be to fund, supervise and carry out projects in the field of Radio, Television, Film and Recording and any other related projects.

# SUPPLEMENTARY REPORT OF THE BOARD OF KNOX COLLEGE JOINT PLANNING COMMITTEE

Knox College held its 131st Convocation this Spring, graduating thirteen men and women. Since its small and humble beginnings in 1844 it has graduated almost fifteen hundred men and women who have gone on to occupy pulpits in our Church and other Churches, to serve on mission fields at home and abroad, to work as chaplains in various institutions and to occupy professorial appointments in Canada and elsewhere. The large role that the College continues to play within our Church is indicated by the fact that of a total of 875 ministers in our Church about 430 are graduates of Knox College. Over the years several thousand men studying in other faculties at the University of Toronto have been residents at Knox, many of whom now occupy responsible positions and are also active in our congregations.

We are indeed fortunate as a Church to have such a fine theological college with a world-wide reputation. Moreover, the building is a national architectural treasure and a public testimony in the major seat of learning to the role that The Presbyterian Church in Canada has historically played in the spiritual and intellectual life of the nation.

A serious situation faces Knox College and our whole Church. Much of the future composition and direction of the College will have to be decided within the next two or three years. During the next three years half of the present faculty will retire. Professor David Hay retires from the Chair of Systematic Theology in August, 1975; Professor Robert Lennox will retire from the Chair of Old Testament in August, 1976; and Dr. J. S. Glen has recently announced his intention to retire as Principal of the College in August, 1976 and as Professor of New Testament in August, 1977. There is a distinct possibility that we may lose other members of the faculty. To fill these vacancies with competent scholars will be exceedingly difficult in view of the smallness of the salaries now paid to our theological professors. Moreover, the College will have to re-assess the adequacy of its present course of studies, its organizational structure, etc. with a view to making such changes as are necessary to provide an adequate theological education for ministry in the 1970s and 1980s.

The Senate and Board of the College took an important step last fall by setting up a Joint Planning Committee that would look ahead for the next five to ten years to ascertain the needs of the College and to make proposals to the Church regarding how its work and therefore its contribution to the life of the Church and be made more effective. This Committee was asked to study the following matters:

1. The question of term appointments.

2. The ranking of professors (Professor, Associate-Professor, Assistant Professor).

3. The organizational structure of the College.

The concept of ministry which shapes training. The size of the faculty and the required salaries.

6. The consolidation of the educational resources of the Church.

The improvement of public relations so as to provide more information to the Church about what the College is doing.

Curriculum design.

The provision of Research and Field Work Resources.

Relations with the Toronto School of Theology.

11. Relations with Alumni and Continuing Theological Education Program. 12. The launching of a financial drive to build up the endowment funds to re-

furbish and to develop the College.

13. And such matters as the Senate and the Board may refer, or as circumstances may produce, and which the Committee decrees to be within its purview.

Our Committee has met three times. It is our intention to make a full report to next year's General Assembly, but meanwhile we present the following provisional report:

#### Curriculum Design - Field Education

The Joint Planning Committee has spent some time thinking about what an adequate theological education for a total ministry in the strange new world of the 1970s and 1980s involves. Education for ministry, we know, is much more varied than our fathers realized.

Theological education today must seek to integrate the academic and the practical in such a way that the two become inseparable. This had not always been achieved in the past. Certainly theology is an academic discipline worthy of the most serious and painstaking study, and in this respect education for the ministry must be "completely and unfailingly theological". It is for this reason that our Church has always placed such a strong emphasis upon an educated and godly ministry. A minister of the Word and Sacraments has to be familiar not only with the biblical, theological and historical fields but also with the intellectual and cultural developments in societies to be present day. Our Church still rightly insists

on an education in the humanities and sciences as a prerequisite for entrance into theological college.

Theology is an academic discipline but it is also a function of the Church. Theological colleges exist to contribute to the theological health and vitality of the Church by training men and women for the practice of ministry. That is, theology must be done in such a way that it is relevant to the pastorate. It is evident that the classroom and the library are not the only places where theological learning takes place. Theological education also takes place as men and women engage in the practice of ministry. Therefore our theological colleges must utilize other teaching resources; namely, in those places where people practice ministry.

To accomplish this necessary integration of the academic and the practical an adequate program of field education is urgently required. Field education means supervised ministerial activity under ministers or chaplains who co-operate with the Faculty to bring this activity under continual theological inquiry and stimulation.

Knox College now has a very limited field education program which has been made possible by the sparetime labours of a member of the Faculty (Professor Lennox). The College needs a full-time Field Education Director who will counsel students and place them in institutions outside the Church, such as hospitals, the family court, the Ontario probationary services; in institutions more or less related to the Church such as Scott Mission, and in congregations offering practice in parish activities. Such a person would also assume responsibilities as a registrar.

The Board of the College has budgeted for a full-time Field Education Director cum Registrar for 1975-76 and the Board and Senate have appointed a search committee. We are asking this Assembly to approve the immediate appointment of a Field Education Director. (Recommendation I)

#### Size of Faculty and Salaries

There are six Chairs in Knox College: Old Testament; New Testament; Systematic Theology; Church History; History and Philosophy of Religion and Christian Ethics; and Homiletics, Evangelism and Church Administration The in cumbent of the last-named, Professor J. Charles Hay, is at present half-time while he works also half-time as Assistant Director in Toronto School of Theology Advanced Degree Studies. Two other professors discharge additional class duties in Pastoral Theology and Liturgics (Principal J. Stanley Glen and Professor D. W. Hay). There are a number of sessional lecturers in Christian Education Church Government, Church Music and Biblical Languages.

The teaching staff is small in view of the extensiveness of the theological fields. No professor nowadays is able to be competent in all of the areas of specialization within his own subject. Knox College by itself is unable to appoint all the staff that are called for in a qualified theological institution, which must incorporate a strong division of graduate research and teaching. Participation in the Toronto School of Theology makes specialization in the various fields possible; but it is also desirable that our Faculty have assistants or lecturers within their own departments so that they may be free for more research than they can do now.

Salaries at Knox College are roughly \$10,000 below salaries for theological professors at other comparable theological colleges in the Toronto School of Theology. At present our professors are paid a little over \$14,000. In view of the need to make at least three appointments within the next three years immediate action will need to be taken by our Church to make the salaries at Knox College comparable to that paid in other theological colleges and therefore competitive. Moreover, in view of the high cost of housing in the City of Toronto and the vicinity, mortgage money at a reduced rate of interest will also need to be made available.

The matter of professor salaries has been before the Church for several years. Immediate action is now required. We now have a first-class faculty although we pay second-class salaries. If we are to continue to have a first-class theological college we will need to offer salaries that are competitive with other theological colleges and faculties. The amount of money that is required to bring our salaries to the level that the United Church of Canada and the Anglican Church pay theological professors is approximately \$55,000 a year for a faculty of five and a half.

Knox College hopes in the very near future to launch a financial campaign to build up its endowment funds and to develop the work of the College. The extra \$55,000 which the College will require to bring professors' salaries to a level comparable with salaries at other theological colleges will, we hope, be only for a short period until the College builds up its own sources of revenue. But something must be done immediately to assist the College to overcome the problem of making three appointments. Unless something is done about salaries we risk having second-class or very junior and inexperienced new faculty members. But we are confident that a College which has made such a contribution to the life of The Presbyterian Church in Canada will not lack the support and prayers of her people. A vital theological college is essential for the theological health of our Church.

#### The College and the Church

A further concern of the Joint Planning Committee is the Charter, Constitution and by-laws of the College. The original Charter was drawn up in 1858. Some revision of the by-laws was undertaken at the time of the Eakin-Morrow dispute in the early 1930s and a more complete revision was completed in 1948 (Acts & Proceedings 1948, pp 45, 75-79). Many changes have since taken place in our society and in the structures of the Church which substantially affect the operation of the College. It is apparent to the Joint Planning Committee that a further rewriting of the Constitution and by-laws is imperative, not only with a view to updating procedures to make them more appropriate to contemporary needs but also to provide for proper and legal relationships with new structures which have come into being in the Church since 1948.

The Joint Planning Committee in undertaking this review will be guided by a desire to guard jealously the historic prerogatives of Knox College in terms of its right of direct access to General Assembly; its autonomy in relation to its Charter granted by the Government of Ontario; and further, by an urgent concern to achieve sufficient flexibility and freedom in all aspects of its operation, yet consistent with our historic relationship to General Assembly, to provide ways and means to ensure the presence and support of a first-class professorial staff; and to initiate programs that are widely demanded by the Church; and to develop such other programs which will make Knox College an effective instrument in the training of men and women for service in the Church of Christ.

#### Two Recommendations:

That Assembly authorize the College to proceed immediately with the appointment of a Field Education Director and Registrar.

 That General Assembly allocate an additional sum not exceeding \$55,000, commencing in 1976, to raise the salaries of faculties to a ranking level with the faculties of comparable theological colleges in the Toronto School of Theology.

#### SUPPLEMENTARY REPORT to the 101st General Assembly from the BOARD OF CONGREGATIONAL LIFE

#### Re: IMMIGRATION POLICY

In the interval since the printed reports to this Assembly went to press the Government of Canada has announced that written briefs to the Joint Parliamentary Committee on Immigration Policy must be submitted by June 6th, 1975 and that public hearings on the Green Paper would be held in various cities from April 30th to June 27th. It is the intention of the Joint Parliamentary Committee to make its report to Parliament by July 31st.

It is hoped that some of our people, whether representing their congregations, presbyteries or merely themselves, will have been able to appear at the public hearings or will yet do so, but for most of us this will be impossible. However, the Government has indicated that Canadians will still have opportunity to express their views on the subject at a later stage — presumably when the Government submits a new immigration Bill to Parliament. It is still appropriate, therefore, that we recommend to the General Assembly in the terms of Recommendation 15 as printed on page 344 and we now designate it as Recommendation 15a.

We also report that a Brief to the Joint Parliamentary Committee on Immigration Policy was approved by the Executive Committees of the Board of World Mission and the Board of Congregational Life and submitted before the June 6th deadline. Copies of the Brief are in the hands of Commissioners. It would be desirable to have the endorsement of the Assembly so that the Brief could be considered by the Government as a statement of the highest court of the church.

#### RECOMMENDATION 15b

That the General Assembly endorse the Brief to the Joint Parliamentary Committee on Immigration Policy from the Executive Committees of the Board of World Mission and the Board of Congregational Life of The Presbyterian Church in Canada, and that the Joint Parliamentary Committee be so informed.

#### Mandate

The Board of World Mission has responsibility for the mission program of The Presbyterian Church in Canada and abroad. Among its concerns is the wellbeing of immigrants and visitors to Canada and Canadians working or travelling abroad.

The Board of Congregational Life has, among other things, responsibility in the areas of congregational education and social action.

Both bodies are constituted by ministerial and lay personnel from a number of walks of life across Canada.

#### PROLOGUE

- 1. "You shall solemnly recite before the Lord your God:
- Deuteronomy 26: 5-9

  2. God became involved with migrant people very early in human history. In fact he called Abraham, the settler in Haran, to become the wandering Aramaean who "left home without knowing where he was to go". (Hebrews 11:9). God became the migrant's God.
- 3. When Abraham's descendants at long last took possession of the land of promise they were commanded to offer the first fruits of the soil to God and to make special provision for the sojourners and strangers in the land. Although they regarded the land as theirs it was more properly God's, for:
  - "The earth is the Lord's and all that is in it, the world and those who dwell therein."

    Psalm 24:1
- 4. Human as they were, their sense of proprietorship grew in the centuries that followed, and their attitudes toward their land, race and religion became dominated by selfishness. The book of Jonah is an object lesson of the fact that God intended his people to take his message to foreign nations. Jonah did his best to thwart that intention but in the end he was compelled to go. Jesus dealt with interracial relationships on a number of occasions, and he shocked the sensibilities of his compatriots by showing the way of mercy to a Samaritan woman (John 4) and using another Samaritan as an exemplar of mercy in his most famous parable. (Luke 10:29-37).
- 5. Immigration policies in modern Canada have their peculiar problems but at least two are the same as the problems of antiquity; our anxiety to preserve our culture and our desire to hold on to our wealth. None of us is exempt from these anxieties, but difficult as it may be for us emotionally, economically or politically, God is calling us to unselfish action.

#### I. INTRODUCTION

- 6. The Presbyterian Church in Canada welcomes this opportunity to respond to the Green Paper on Immigration and Population and supports the government's decision to encourage public study and debate on this important topic, which the Minister of Manpower and Immigration has stated has to do with "no less than the future of Canada's population".
- 7. We take issue, however, with the short length of time given for the study of the complex issues involved and for the preparation of submissions. The unexpected and sudden announcement by the government of the unreasonably short deadline for submissions has aroused scepticism about the seriousness of the participatory consultations which the government invites. The shortage and high price of the study documents have added to that scepticism. We support the communique sent to the Special Joint Committee on Immigration Policy by the Inter-Church Project on Population dated March 26, 1975.

#### II. A KEY QUESTION

8. A key question for a discussion of any Canadian policy is not just what kind of Canada do we want, but on what values do we base our vision of Canada. What role does and might Canada play in a global society? What are and might be key criteria for the formulation of immigration policy?

#### III. PERSPECTIVES

- 9. The recommendations we propose in this submission are consistent with and flow from several assumptions we make about persons and society. We must encourage and challenge Canadians to see that immigration is a moral and spiritual issue. Canadians should be presented with a realistic vision of the creative and responsible role we can play in making our society relevant and contributory to the ever-developing globally interdependent world community. We affirm our view that immigration policy should not be centred around restrictive economic and racial factors, but rather on a responsible endeavour to share our resources and develop creatively our potential for a society rich in social, cultural, moral and spiritual values.
- 10. We realize that immigration is one of the most sensitive subjects with which our nation deals. It arouses defensive instincts on the part of many Canadians to protect our jobs, our share of Canadian resources, and the present social and cultural constitution of our society. The mention of broader policies touches on emotions sharpened by a concern for what may happen to change our present life style. We believe that the discussion and formulation of a new immigration policy must not be permitted to focus on these threatening concerns.
- 11. Another important criterion for establishing immigration policy is the consideration of mankind's need to live without fear of starvation, injustice, and oppression. Canada has great resources which, with imaginative and responsible development, enable it to share in fulfilling that need.
- 12. We do realize that practical issues cannot be ignored. We must continually review Canada's population and society, and study our capacity to absorb new population ecologically and economically. People must not be encouraged to emigrate unless they are well informed about Canadian life and are prepared to live in it.

#### Summary of Perspectives

- 13. a. We believe that all human beings are valuable persons and that any attempt to measure the value of human life in economic or educational terms provides an opportunity for a display of injustice, prejudice, arrogance, and racism.
  - b. We believe that a multi-cultural and multi-racial nation offers an interesting and desirable environment for personal and societal growth.
  - c. We believe that government immigration policy should establish and uphold moral principles that lead the Canadian people into a growing awareness of social and moral responsibility.
  - d. We believe that because we live in an interdependent global society, our immigration policy will have a far-reaching impact on the world.

#### IV. RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. Immigrants as Manpower
- 14. The very name, "Department of Manpower and Immigration", suggests that Canada views immigrants primarily in relation to their utilization in the country's labour force. This overemphasis on the economic value of persons is a dehumanizing point of view and tends to present an image of Canada selfishly keeping an eye on her own economic well-being, rather than seeing the whole area of immigration policy as a humane response to human needs and problems, acknowledging that some of these needs are economic. Our policy and its administration should reflect a concern for immigrants as persons with a very real contribution to make socially, culturally, politically, and spiritually, as well as economically.

15. We recommend that Manpower and Immigration be separated creating two departments and that a Department of Immigration co-ordinate its responsibilities with those of several other departments, Manpower being one.

#### 2. Brain Drain

- 16. The present point system for granting landed immigrant status, besides focusing heavily on the applicant's usefulness to the labour market, is weighted in favour of those who have had the advantage of higher education and training in advanced skills. This automatically restricts acceptance of many less trained who seek opportunities for a better life in Canada, as well as encourages the application of highly trained scholars and professionals who are often needed in their home country. Immigration policy should express concern for people in other parts of the world and for the part Canada might play in a more just attitude of sharing our many resources, Immigration policy should not contradict the humane concerns reflected in Canada's many aid-giving programs.
- 17. We recommend that the point system, or whatever system used, should not be weighted in favour of immigrants with higher education.

#### 3. Racial Quotas and Controls

- 18. We support the fact that the present point system does not give advantage to immigrants from any specific area of the world. We view with alarm certain allusions in the Green Paper that seem to suggest the need for imposing racial quotas, a retrogressive step completely out of keeping with the growing international understanding that all races and people live in global interdependence and must share and learn from one another in order to survive and develop the fullest human potential.
- 19. We recognize the need for control of numbers so that the country can effectively and harmoniously absorb population increase. To avoid false expectations, accurate, up-to-date publicized information about life and opportunities in Canada should be readily available for would-be immigrants. Although immigrants should not be viewed primarily in terms of their contribution to the labour market, as the present point system seems to indicate, there must be some balance between the number of immigrants and employment opportunities. Considerable care must be exercised in establishing controls which are humane and just.
- We recommend that in granting landed immigrant status neither consideration
  of race nor the country of origin be a restrictive factor.

#### 4. Refugees

- 21. Some provision for refugee or asylum status is needed in Canadian immigration policy. Crises in many parts of the world have made it obvious that there is a need for countries to offer asylum. Canada has played a commendable role in receiving many refugees. This important role should be continued. Such refugees should not have to go through the process of seeking landed immigrant status as many persons want temporary asylum only. In the case of political refugees the decision to grant admission should be based on humanitarian grounds. Hungary, Uganda and Chile are three cases in point.
- 22. We recommend the establishment of a refugee or asylum category so that a refugee remains free to choose either to remain in Canada or go elsewhere after a prescribed period of time.
- 23. We recommend that in the case of political refugees the decision to grant admission be based on humanitarian grounds.

#### 5. Location of Immigration Offices Abroad

24. The limited number and lack of Canadian Immigration Offices and staff in Third World countries is insufficient to deal with interviewing and processing people in adequate ways. The greater number of offices in Europe and the U.S.A. suggests to many people a discriminatory attitude towards the con-

- sideration of Third World applicants. We realize that host countries can refuse permission for such offices. An international agency might co-ordinate and facilitate global migration.
- We recommend an increase in the number of immigration offices and officers in Third World countries.
- 26. We recommend that the government support any present work or future plans for an international agency to co-ordinate global migration.

#### 6. Selection and Training of Immigration Officers

- 27. This is one of the key points for the administration of any immigration policy. It is important that immigration officers both for posts abroad and in Canada be selected with care and trained so that they understand the Canadian needs as well as the needs of potential immigrants. Culturally insensitive or overburdened officers may be accused of disregard for human dignity, of discrimination, or of giving false impressions of life and opportunities in Canada.
- 28. We recommend that immigration officers serving abroad receive training:
  - a. to give them knowledge and understanding of the culture and country where they will be working;
  - to help them communicate a sensitive understanding of the aspirations of applicants for landed immigrant status;
- c. to help them present a realistic picture of life and opportunities in Canada.
   29. We recommend that officers in Canada receive orientation about cultural differences to help them be sensitive to the state of mind and feelings of new
- 30. We recommend the granting of temporary entry permits to persons whose status on arrival requires clarification in order to avoid injustice caused by

#### 7. Geographic Distribution of Immigrants

- 31. Recognizing the need to plan for population growth and the varied pressures and problems that can result from a large influx of immigrants to a limited number of urban centres, we feel there should be incentives offered to immigrants willing to settle in less populated parts of the country. Opportunities and needs in various geographic areas would need to be carefully researched with close co-operation and co-ordination between federal and provincial governments. We also feel that such incentives should be offered to Canadian residents to encourage distribution of population.
- 32. We recommend that incentives be offered to prospective immigrants as well as residents to settle in less populated areas in Canada where consultative planning has established need and opportunities.

#### 8. Services to Immigrants

misunderstanding.

- 33. Immigrants require special and varied assistance to help them settle and adapt to life in a new country. Although there have been some good attempts by government, community, and voluntary groups to assist immigrants, there is still a great need for various services offering general orientation to Canadian life, information on Canadian history, government, labour and human rights, social services, language learning and training opportunities. With respect to such services there needs to be better co-ordination between federal, provincial and municipal levels of government and the voluntary groups. A national co-ordinating body for services to immigrants with representatives from community, church, and government agencies seems indicated.
- 34. We recommend:
  - a. that the needs of all immigrants, not just those in the labour force, be carefully considered and more adequate services designed to help with orientation and adjustment;
  - that government give more financial and consultative support to community organizations involved in immigrant services.

- c. that the federal government encourage and support financially the creation of a national co-ordinating body for services to immigrants.
- 9. Public Education with regard to Immigrants
- 35. It is extremely important that a climate of acceptance of immigrants be created in Canada in conjunction with the provision of services to immigrants. More attention needs to be paid by federal and provincial governments to ways of educating citizens to an understanding, acceptance and appreciation of cultural and racial differences among Canadians.

36. Emphasis needs to be put on creating positive attitudes towards the rich diversity and contributions that immigrants of various backgrounds bring to Canadian life. More public funds should be spent on this crucial area of public education.

37. We recommend:

 that Departments of Education and other public institutions be encouraged to provide more educational material and programs to promote cross-cultural understandings, and

b. that encouragement and financial support be given to community organizations and groups interested, or already involved in providing such

intercultural education.

#### 10. Overseas Students in Canada

38. Students from overseas countries need separate classification and appropriate controls to comply with their particular situation in order to avoid unreasonable pressures and misunderstanding. Such controls should not be difficult to apply, in comparison to other non-immigrants, since students are attached to educational institutions and remain in one place longer. The presence of overseas students enriches the international educational milieu of Canadian colleges and universities as well as other areas of Canadian life. We need to have immigration regulations that fit the unique needs of these students.

39. We recommend that students from overseas countries attending bona-fide accredited Canadian educational institutions be accorded a special category or

status in the Immigration Act.

#### 11. Migrant Workers

 Short-term labourers (guest workers) run the risk of exploitation by employers and the breakup of their family structures.

41. We recommend that a study be made of migrant workers from a humanitarian point of view and that adequate legislation be enacted providing guidelines relating to the rights and responsibilities of both workers and employers.

42. We believe that the views in this submission, which are shared by many other organizations and individuals in Canada, are crucial for the establishment of a just and wholesome society.

# THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH BUILDING CORPORATION SUPPLEMENTARY REPORT

To the Venerable the 101st General Assembly

When Dr. David McCullough advised the Board of Directors of The Presbyterian Church Building Corporation of his intention to retire as General Manager of the Corporation at December 31, 1975, it was decided by the Board to seek a replacement and a Committee with power to issue was appointed for this purpose.

The Administrative Council's Committee on Executive-Personnel was consulted and agreement obtained to fill the vacancy. The salary and expenses for this posi-

tion are paid entirely by the Corporation.

The Board of Directors circularized the Presbyteries of the Church requesting nominations for the position of General Manager of the Corporation. Five persons, four ministers and one layman, were nominated but the layman and one minister withdrew. One other layman expressed interest in the position. The four candidates interested were interviewed by the Corporation's Committee. Following very thorough consideration, it was agreed unanimously by the Committee and the Executive of the Board of Directors to nominate Dr. R. G. MacMillan as associate General Manager of The Presbyterian Church Building Corporation from November 1, 1975 to December 31, 1975 and that his appointment as General Manager take effect as of January 1, 1976.

That the General Assembly appoint Dr. R. G. MacMillan as associate General Manager of The Presbyterian Church Building Corporation for the period November 1, 1975 to December 31, 1975 and that his appointment as General Manager take effect as of January 1, 1976.

# AN ADDRESS DELIVERED BY HOWARD S. BILLINGS, B.A., D.C.L., TO THE HUNDRED AND FIRST GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA, IN ST. ANDREW'S CHURCH IN QUEBEC CITY ON JUNE SIXTH NINETEEN HUNDRED AND SEVENTY FIVE

Moderator, Your Excellency, Commissioners of the General Assembly,

honoured guests, ladies and gentlemen.

Upon the invitation of St. Andrew's Church to the Board of Governors of Morrin College, of which Dr. Edward Bragg and I are members, I am here to pay tribute to a most outstanding man, the Reverend John Cook, Doctor of Divinity, Doctor of Laws, who 138 years ago began his ministry in this church and for the next 48 years was the well-beloved and distinguished leader of this congregation.

(I shall refer to Morrin College later in my remarks.)

The board asked me to bring to the attention of this assembly the outstanding work done by Dr. Cook in this community in particular and in Canada in general.

Dr. Cook was born in Scotland in 1805. He attended Glasgow University and later transferred to the University of Edinborough where he studied under Dr. Chalmers. He was ordained a clergyman of the Church of Scotland at Cardross in 1835 and came to Quebec the following year to begin a ministry in this church that was to last until his retirement in 1884 — nearly half a century of service to one congregation! During this long term of 48 years he served the community with great devotion, dignity and distinction in the many fields of activity in which he was engaged. Dr. Cook should be remembered for his great contributions (a) to his church (b) to education (c) to this city and (d) to Canada.

He took a prominent part in bringing about the union, in 1875, of the four branches of Presbyterianism then existing in Canada; all became one on June 15th, 1875, under the name of "The Presbyterian Church in Canada" which held its first General Assembly in Montreal on that date. At that meeting Dr. Cook was chosen as the first moderator by the unanimous vote of the 600 delegates who were

present.

He was always opposed to the divisions which may have had relevance in Scotland but did not apply in Canada because, in his opinion, without regard to the Church in Scotland, it was the duty of Canadian Presbyterians to remain united in upholding the unity of the Presbyterian Church in this country.

In 1884, on the occasion of his retirement, in reply to an address of appreciation of his services, on behalf of the congregation, he said, "I remember with satisfaction that I was opposed to the division of the Church in 1843 and I was favourable to the union of the churches in 1875 and I do heartly rejoice in the extension of the United Church and the harmony which prevails in it."

Dr. Cook was, in addition to being an excellent Pastor, an outstanding preacher. Many of his sermons were published in book form and received praise from the reviewers. The Halifax Presbyterian Witness said, in part, "Dr. Cook's discourses are especially adapted for cultivated readers. By such a class they cannot fail to be greatly appreciated. They are calm and elevated treatises upon great gospel themes. The preacher has utterly disregarded the traditional sermon mould.

Unshackled by pulpit traditions he handles each subject with the skill of a great orator and teacher. The language is impressive and the metaphors and illustrations are appropriate."

Again, acting for his Church he went with other delegates to the United Kingdom to obtain a Royal Charter for the University of Queen's College, (1841) Kingston, Ontario, of which he had been a trustee for several years. In 1857 he agreed to act as Principal until a permanent principal could be engaged. He held the office for two years. In addition to his arduous duties as head of the College and leader of this congregation he found time to teach a course in theology.

He was also the first Chancellor of Queen's.

Again Dr. Cook should be remembered for the part he played in providing high school and college education for the youth of this city at a time when facilities for higher studies were not available here. He and a few other enthusiastic citizens of Quebec City were instrumental in establishing in 1843 the Quebec High School for boys, on St. Denis Street which for the next 97 years was operated as an independent and private school well known for the excellence of its instruction. Dr. Cook was for many years Chairman of the Board of Directors and was to a high degree responsible for its success. The graduates have made a worthwhile contribution to the Canadian way of life.

I have mentioned Morrin College. The original buildings of this college, which ceased to operate as a college in 1901 are still in a state of good repair and are

located about 100 feet from this church.

This college was established in May 1861 – 114 years ago — by an Act of the Parliament of Canada as a result of the great interest in education of two public-spirited citizens — Dr. John Cook and Dr. Joseph Morrin a physician and surgeon of this city, and a member of this congregation. As Dr. Morrin was well aware of Dr. Cook's interest in providing higher educational facilities for this community and as he, too, recognized the need for a college here, he made a generous gift of money and land to a corporation organized with Dr. Cook as its chairman. When Morrin College was organized in 1861 Dr. Cook became its first principal. He continued as principal for 31 years during which time it was affiliated with McGill University in Montreal. It had faculties of theology and arts. It may be of interest to know that in 1881 there were three professors of theology, two of whom would not accept any remuneration for their services. The professor of mathematics was to receive \$800 annually provided he taught efficiently and to the complete satisfaction of the governors. In 1901 the college ceased to function as an educational institution.

As it had been generously endowed over the years there has been since that time (1901) annual income from investments and rent which provides the funds that are disbursed annually, in the form of bursaries to students of this area who fulfil the requirements established by the founders and who continue their studies after graduation from high school. Thus, the work undertaken by Dr. Cook and Dr. Morrin 114 years ago still goes on in assisting students who wish to continue their

studies.

Dr. Cook was a member of the Corporation of McGill University in Montreal. He was a member of the Protestant Committee of the Provincial Council of Public Instruction. The twenty-six members of this Committee were appointed by order-in-council and were charged with the duty of making regulations for the operation and administration of Protestant schools in this Province.

You will, I feel sure, agree with me when I say that, in addition to his outstanding work in the Presbyterian Church, he contributed in very large measure to the improvement of education in Quebec City, in Quebec Province and in Canada.

Parenthetically – it is possible that Dr. Cook experienced more than a little discomfort in commuting between Quebec and Montreal and Kingston because the types of transportation that were available to him were far from being as rapid or comfortable as they are today.

Dr. Cook should be remembered for his work on the relief committees that were appointed in this city in 1845 and 1866 following the two great fires that destroyed much of the suburbs of St. Roch and St. Jean in 1845 and St. Sauveur twenty-one years later.

The Municipal officials of the City of Quebec recognized his valuable contributions in so many fields of endeavour by naming a street in his honour. Cook Street runs along the north side of this church where he laboured so successfully for so

The following quotations are from the sermon preached by Dr. Cook, in Toronto, at the opening of the second General Assembly of The Presbyterian

Church in Canada:

"Science, with all its past triumphs, is but in the beginning of its career, and it is reasonable to believe, they are only the first fruits which have yet been reaped of that magnificent harvest, which shall finally reward the application of human genius

to the study of the works of God."
"The cause of truth, of righteousness of God, is ever advancing."

"May not a clearer understanding of the great law of love, the law that we should love our neighbour as ourselves, introduce a far greater community in the possessions and enjoyments of mankind, and Christianity become, as it only can become, the author of that real socialism and brotherhood, for which so many apart from Christianity are now blindly striving?"

On March 31st, 1892 Dr. Cook died. And so passed from the earthly scene a great preacher, an inspiring teacher, a brilliant scholar and a Christian gentleman.

And we are proud at this time, and in this historic setting to pay this our tribute.

#### PRESBYTERIAN RESIDENCE SASKATOON

The Residence has experienced a good year with 31 men in Residence for the fall of 1974. The fact that the student, Henry Hildebrant (student leader) is an active church member with plans to enter the Ministry in the Presbyterian Church, contributed to the general atmosphere of residence life. Also Jack Chiang from Taiwan furthering his studies in Theology, was a real asset to the general conduct with his loyalty to the Church and his unique ability in such sports as ping pong.

We are calling on interested folk to contribute to the building up of a suitable library, adding basic reference material, some contemporary books to add to the fine collection of books from the library of W. G. Brown and John Brent.

We would welcome more Presbyterian young people since only one third is from our church. The addition of some oriental students help make life at Pres Res a good place for young men to learn how to appreciate folk from other cultures. One high-light during the past year was the decision of a young man from South Vietnam to be baptized and become a member in full communion of the Presbyterian Church.

The boys and members of the Board pay tribute to the dedicated interest of Peter Mackie who gives so much time to the operation of Pres Res.

We pay tribute to Dr. Hilda Neatby a former member of the Board. Dr. Neatby was called to her Eternal Reward.

#### AUDITORS' REPORT

Our examination included a general review of the accounting procedures and such tests of accounting records and other supporting evidence as we consider necessary in the circumstances, except that our examination of receipts and contributions, because of their nature, was limited to comparisons of recorded receipts with bank deposits.

Except for the above qualification with respect to receipts, in our opinion, these financial statements present fairly the financial position of the Residence at December 31, 1974, and the results of its operations for the year ended on that date, in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

#### SUPPLEMENTARY REPORT OF THE BOARD OF WORLD MISSION

Recommendation No. 20

Right to Call (A & P General Assembly, 1969, p. 113 and p. 621)

With respect to the issuing of a call in an aid-receiving pastoral charge, the
responsibility and authority rest with the Presbytery.

Any pastoral charge may issue a call whether or not it receives financial
assistance from the Board of World Mission, provided the Presbytery is
satisfied with the guarantee of a stipend from the pastoral charge.

 In cases where the pastoral charge calling is an aid-receiving one there must be prior consultation between the Presbytery and the Board of World Mission.

THAT the regulation of A & P General Assembly 1969, p. 113 & 621 section 2 be amended as follows:

Any pastoral charge may issue a call whether or not it receives financial assistance from the Board of World Mission, provided the pastoral charge guarantees the Presbytery 100% of the basic stipend (e.g. 6,400 Jan. 1, 1975) not including increments and allowances.

II. Response to Administrative Council recommendation No. 36

The Board of World Mission response to the Administrative Council 1975 No. 36.

THE B.W.M. having the staffing of the Board always under constant review, and relative to the 98th General Assembly's authorization, and in light of the necessity for co-ordination within the Board's financial structure.

THAT the position of Secretary for Finance and Administration is held as necessary within the responsibilities of the Board, the duties cannot successfully be discharged by division among present staff.

HOWEVER the B.W.M. is prepared to try, for an interim period and relative to the review of all Executive Staff position by the Board before Jan. 1, 1978 (c.f. A & P 1972, p. 205), that an Administrative Assistant be authorized for appointment to the Board by the Office & Property Committee of the Administrative Council (c.f. A & P 1974 p. 271), to enable the work responsibilities to be carried forth in a unified way during this experimental period.

III. Reply to Overture #12 1975B - 433 Presbytery of Montreal Re: Ordained Mission appointment.

THAT the Board of World Mission study the matter and examine the wider implications of this overture, consult with the Presbytery of Montreal and report to the next General Assembly.

# Memorial Records

#### SYNOD OF TORONTO AND KINGSTON

### REVEREND WALTER VICTOR KUTCHER, B.A.

The Presbytery of East Toronto records with sorrow the sudden death by accident on January 8th, 1975 of the Rev. Walter Victor Kutcher. He had received a call from the charge of Essa Road, Barrie and Stroud, and had been living in

Barrie only one week when the accident occurred.

Mr. Kutcher was born on a farm in the Western Ukraine. His parents belonged to the Greek Catholic Church. Following World War II he attended the University of Munich from which he received his Bachelor of Arts degree. In 1948 he emigrated to Canada intending to study law at the University of Toronto, but believing that God was calling him to the ministry of Word and Sacrament, he attended the Toronto Bible College for a while, and then enrolled in Knox College from which he graduated in 1954.

He had pastorates in Killam and Galahad, Alberta, New Jersey, U.S.A., Port Carling and Torrance, Ontario, Rodney and Kintyre, Ontario, the Ukrainian Presbyterian Church, Hamilton, Ontario, and the Ukrainian Presbyterian Church,

Oshawa, Ontario.

He is survived by his wife, the former Ria Osypowich, and their three sons:

Stanley, Victor and Walter.

He was a dedicated servant of Jesus Christ, an able preacher of the Word, a faithful pastor and an enthusiastic churchman. Under his ministry the congregations in which he served grew both spiritually and materially. His influence also extended far beyond the bounds of his own congregations. He was interested in the total wellbeing of people, and for this reason he also took an active interest in the life and work of the communities in which he ministered.

#### THE REVEREND HOMER WILLIAM McAVOY, B.A., B.D., Ph.D.

The Presbytery of East Toronto records with deep sorrow the passing of Dr.

Homer McAvoy on February 24, 1975, after a sudden illness.

Dr. McAvoy was born in Wakefield, Quebec, March 3, 1935, the son of the Reverend James McAvoy and Rosina Alice Duffin. He received his early education at Campbellford High School and Westdale Collegiate in Hamilton. After graduating Bachelor of Arts from McMaster University in 1957 he entered Knox College where in the course of his studies he received the Eastman, the N. A. MacEachern, the Jane Mortimer, and the Barbara Ogilvie Gray Scholarships, and the Brydon Prize. Upon graduation with the Diploma and the Bachelor of Divinity degree from Knox College in 1960 with high honours, he was awarded the post graduate Travelling Scholarship.

During his student days he served pastorates in the Presbyteries of Saint John, Edmonton, and Kamloops. Reports from his fields emphasized that he was a faith-

ful pastor, an earnest worker, and well-loved by his people.

After his ordination on May 16, 1960 he served the two-point charge of Wainwright and Chauvin. In 1962 he married Elizabeth Doherty of Calgary and the same year commenced studies in New College, Edinburgh, leading to the Ph.D. degree in Old Testament studies. (The degree was conferred July 11, 1974.)

Returning to Canada in 1964, he served the congregation of Grace Church West Rouge, in East Toronto Presbytery until 1967, when he accepted a call to St.

Andrew's Church, Aurora.

While serving the congregation at Aurora he was employed by Knox College as a special lecturer in Hebrew, and during the sabbatical leave of Dr. Robert Lennox he taught the Introductory Course in Old Testament Studies with great acceptance.

Dr. McAvoy was a winsome evangelical preacher, a wise and gentle pastor who did not spare himself in the service of his congregation or his students. He was deeply loved by his several congregations who were able to see in his life and

ministry transparent commitment to Christ. All who knew him were convinced of the fact that here was a man of exceptional promise, and the Presbytery of East Toronto which he served one term as Moderator expresses its deep sense of loss, but at the same time rejoices in the fact that his ministry while short as men measure time was nevertheless fruitful and rewarding. His classmates who admired and respected him have set up a scholarship in his memory at Knox College.

He is survived by his wife, Elizabeth, and three daughters; Carolyn, age 11

The Reverend Malcolm Gillies passed away in Oakville, Ontario on Sunday the sixteenth of March, 1975 in the ninety-second year of his age.

Born on the Isle of Lewis, Scotland, the first of December 1883, he came to Canada as a young man. His theological education was gained at the Presbyterian College, Montreal. He was ordained by the Presbytery of Quebec in July 1929 at Marsboro, where he had served as a student minister since 1927.

His first charge was Indian Brook, Cape Breton, followed by Milan, Quebec; Barvas, Saskatchewan; and Mount Brydges, Englehart and Uptergrove, Ontario. He was a faithful preacher of the Word in both Gaelic and English, a devoted pastor and much loved in the communities he served. Retiring in 1956 he lived for about a decade in London, Ontario, and then in Oakville.

He was married to Christine Ann Macauley who pre-deceased him on the 18th of February, 1975. Two of their five children, Donald and Murdo also pre-deceased them. To the survivors: Mary, Mrs. N. Campbell, Thunder Bay; Malcolm, Mississauga and Dolena, Mrs. T. W. Rushby, Oakville, all in Ontario, and their families the Presbytery of London extends sincere sympathy.

### THE REVEREND H. L. JOST, TH.B.

Mr. Jost, son of Henry Jost and Caroline Luecke was born 1899 at Wadena, Minnesota and died suddenly November 26, 1974 near Alvinston, Ontario.

Mr. Jost was educated at Wadena Schools and attended Teachers' College at St. Cloud, Minnesota following which he taught school for several years. He also graduated from Minneapolis Business College. After sometime he turned his attention to

To this end he began his training at the Baptist Theological Seminary, Louisville, Kentucky. He came to Canada in 1926 as a Baptist student to serve at Barney's River Presbyterian Church, Nova Scotia. On graduation from the Seminary in Louisville he returned to Canada at stated supply to Durham, Green Hill and Salt Springs in Pictou Presbytery. He then completed his training for the Ministry in the Presbyterian Church in Canada by altending Presbyterian College in Montreal for

Mr. Jost held pastorates in Sherbrooke, Little Harbour, Rose Bay, North Sydney and Elmsdale - all in Nova Scotia. Then in 1960 he came to Ontario and was inducted into the charge of Alvinston, Napier and Euphemia where he served till his retirement in 1969.

The funeral was conducted by the Presbytery of Sarnia on November 29, 1974 with an old friend, the Rev. R. R. Gordon of London preaching the funeral

message.

Mr. Jost is survived by his widow, Christena Robertson and four sisters living in Minnesota. He was predeceased by one brother and two sisters, and by his one son,

### THE REVEREND EDWARD CARSON MCLARNON, B.A., B.TH.

On Sunday, September 15th, 1974, the Reverend Edward Carson McLarnon passed away in the Henderson General Hospital, Hamilton, Ontario, after a six month illness. With his passing, the Presbytery of Niagara lost a most devoted member. Mr. McLarnon was a former Moderator of this Court, and had been Chairman of the Committee on Students and Colleges, and the Property Committee, for a number of years.

He was inducted as minister of Knox Presbyterian Church, Fort Erie, on September 6th, 1962, and continued as minister of the enlarged congregation of St. Andrew's-Knox Church, upon the amalgamation of the two congregations in 1968.

His gifts of leadership were much in evidence as he drew the two congregations together into one Church family. Again, in 1973, following the fire that largely destroyed the Church, his ability to inspire people gave the congregation the heart and courage to rebuild their church within the year.

Mr. McLarnon was a devoted pastor and a faithful preacher of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. He was active in the community life of the Town of Fort Erie; and over the years of his pastorate in Fort Erie, he earned the respect of the entire community. He brought to his work a sense of humour that endeared him to all who met him.

He was born in Belfast, Northern Ireland. He served in the Belfast City Mission and as Chaplain for the British Sailors Society. Pastorates in Nova Scotia; Bradford, Ontario; and Westview Church, Toronto, preceded his ministry at St. Andrew's-Knox Church, Fort Erie.

He is survived by his wife Eveline, a son, Graham; and two daughters, Sarah Ann, and Mrs. Drusilla Masters, to whom the sympathy of this Court is extended.

#### THE REVEREND HUGH WILSON, B. TH. 1906-1974

The Reverend Hugh Wilson passed away November 17, 1974.

Mr. Wilson was born in Newtownards, Northern Ireland in 1906. He received his education in Northern Ireland and after some years in business, he felt the call to full time service in the church. After further training at The Bible Training Institute in Glasgow, Scotland he proceeded to India where he served with the Jungle Tribes Mission (Irish Presbyterian) for sixteen years (1932-1948). He was ordained in India in November 1939 as a minister of the United Church of Northern India (now the Church of North India).

Before retiring in 1974 he accepted a mission charge in Centreville and Millbrook for a year and a half. After retirement he came to live in Stoney Creek where he was Assistant Visiting Minister at Cheyne

He is survived by his wife, the former Mary Dunlop, one son Kenneth, Toronto and one daughter Eleanor (Mrs. James Illman), Stoney Creek and two grandsons Timothy James and Graeme Mark. He was predeceased by one son James,

The following are the amendments under the Barrier Act, etc., as authorized by the 101st General Assembly.

From year to year other revisions will be found in this place in Acts and Proceedings.

Section 162. Add the following as 162 (1):

All decisions regarding major capital expenditures by a congregation require a two-thirds majority of those present and voting at congregational meetings, 'major capital expenditures' being defined as any amount in estimated costs equal to or exceeding the Total Normal Expenditures as reported in Acts and Proceedings of the preceding year of that congregation. (Adopted under the Barrier

Section 201. Add the following:

(a) Appointments of ministers to full-time service in congregations shall always be by call and induction, except in cases of stated supply, retired persons, and appointment by the Board of World Mission. Such persons may be ministers, associate ministers, but not assistants-to-ministers, (Declaratory Act, 1975).

(b) Appointment of retired ministers or of part-time ministers in congregations shall be made and terminated only by Presbyteries, at the request of minister and session or on the Presbytery's own initiative. Such persons may be called assistants-to-the-minister, and may be installed in a service of recognition. (Declaratory Act, 1975).

In addition to this shall be reported as stipend, and added to the foregoing amount, the amount expended under the study leave of clause 1. further in this form 10 in the year in which the congregation provides this cost of a minimum of \$100."
