FIRST SEDERUNT

At the City of Toronto, Ontario, and within St. Andrew's Church there, Sunday, the first day of June, in the year of our Lord, one thousand nine hundred and sixty-nine, at eight o'clock in the evening.

Which place and time Ministers and Ruling Elders, Commissioners from the several Presbyteries of The Presbyterian Church in Canada, convened pursuant to appointment of the General Assembly held in the City of Toronto, Ontario, on the fifth day of June last year.

The Reverend C. J. MacKay, B.A., D.D., Moderator of the last Assembly, assisted by Dr. J. C. P. Stirling, conducted public worship and preached a sermon on the Subject: "Let the Church be the Church".

According to the appointment of the last General Assembly Dr. MacKay administered the Sacrament of The Lord's Supper. In this he was assisted by Dr. Stirling. The table was served by Elders of St. Andrew's Church, Toronto, Ontario.

Thereafter, with prayer he did constitute the General Assembly in the Name of the Lord Jesus Christ, the only King and Head of the Church.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

The Assembly called for the Report of the Board of Education, which, in the absence of the Chairman, was given in by Dr. H. A. Doig. On motion of Dr. Doig, seconded by Mr. D. St. Clair Campbell, the Report was received, taken as read, spread on the Minutes and the Committee on Business was instructed to find a place for it on the docket of a future sederunt.

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

The Board of Education begs to present the following report.

I. SPECIAL COURSES

Note: Attention is drawn to the following regulation adopted by the General Assembly of 1953:

"The status of a catechist must not be understood as a step toward ultimate ordination. The recognition of this office is considered to be desirable only in order that the opportunity for full-time service may be provided for men with preaching and pastoral gifts and who are willing to give themselves to this work, but who may not be able to meet the educational requirements for the ministry, and also to enable the Church to profit by the service which such men can render." (A. & P. 1953, p. 22).

Attention is drawn to the Book of Forms, Section 248, Sub-section XI(a): "No application for the reception of a minister is considered by the General Assembly, unless the circular letters giving notice of such application were despatched not less than two clear months previous to the meeting of Assembly."
3. The Board of Education calls the attention of Presbyteries to the Book of Forms 248, Subsections VII and VIII, and asks that Presbyteries emphasize the matters therein, especially the interrogation of applicants on the following points: "(1) What course of study has he passed in Arts and Theology? (2) When, where and by whom was he ordained to the ministry? (3) Has he ever been connected with any other Church than that from which he brings documents, and if so, in what capacity? (4) What are his reasons for applying for admission to this Church, and what has led to his change of views? (5) How long has he resided within the bounds of the Presbytery?"

To Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II

May it please Your Majesty:

The Ninety-fifth General Assembly of The Presbyterian Church in Canada at present meeting in Knox College in the City of Toronto in the Province of Ontario, Canada, wish to present to Your Majesty this expression of our loyalty, love and devotion.

We desire you to know the esteem in which the Throne is held and how unanimous are the loyalty and devotion of our people in The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

The age in which we live is filled with change and challenge. Scarcely a day is born without bringing to all of us some new crisis. If your Majesty were to listen to us singing in our Churches on a Sunday Morning "Crowns and Thrones may perish, Kingdoms wax and wane" some idea would be formed of the transitoriness of temporal institutions. However, the message is not complete until we sing, "But the Church of Jesus constant will remain".

We all find ourselves at a moment in the stream of history when tremendous physical forces have been unleashed — forces which earlier generations knew not. At times many people seem to despair that whole nations may face annihilation, but at that very same moment other races and people struggle to form new nations and to take their places in our modern world.

At a moment when men hover over the surface of the moon propelled by great energy it is well for us to remember that "Power belongs unto God" and, therefore, Righteousness shall prevail, Freedom shall triumph, Law and Order shall be established and Justice shall rule. In this situation, under God, Your Majesty reigns. From the Scriptures of the Old Testament, in circumstances different from our own, one has said "who knoweth whether Thou art come to the Kingdom for such a time as this?" So today it is our belief that God has placed your Majesty in this high position of tremendous responsibility and unequalled opportunity. It is our prayer that Your Majesty may be given abiding faith and continued strength for this day.

Our Church intercedes before the Throne of Grace for the safety of Your Person and the security of Your Throne. We pray that the Divine Benediction may rest upon Prince Philip, the Queen Mother, Charles, Prince of Wales, the Prince Andrew, the Prince Edward, the Princess Anne and all members of the Royal House.

"Encircle them with love always
And crown with peace their earthly days
And grant with this all things above
Their people's loyalty and love
That with one voice we all may sing
God save our Prince, God save the Queen!"

Recommendation 1 (a) was adopted.

Recommendation 1(b) was referred to the Administrative Council for report to this Assembly.

Recommendation 2 was adopted.

Recommendation 3 was accepted by the Board as re-worded, substituting the word "respects" for the word "respecting" and the word "and" for the word "nevertheless".

It was moved by Mr. Campbell, duly seconded, that the Re-Worded Recommendation be adopted.

It was moved by Dr. J. C. McLelland, seconded by Dr. John Ross, that with certain material proposed by the Mover, the Recommendation be referred back to the Board together with the document "Violence" Section 4, prepared by the Young Adult Observers, to report to the General Assembly of 1970.

Dr. McLelland's material is as follows:

Amendment to Recommendation #3, Board of Evangelism and Social Action (page 311 and 322).

I move that this statement and recommendation (page 311) be sent back to the Board for further study and report, with particular reference to those social and political-economic conditions which may provoke violent protest. Such "abuse of power" is referred to in our Church's *Declaration of Faith Concerning Church and Nation*, articles 4, 5 and 6, and described most explicitly in Frantz Fanon's book *"The Wretched of the Earth"* (*Les Damnés de la Terre*). Our Church does not teach a doctrinaire pacificism, and the abuse

of civil power in many places today, notably in certain parts of Africa and South America, may well demand overt violence toward the establishment of more democratic forms of government. Finally, our problem in the Province of Quebec needs sympathetic treatment since the question of violence is at this moment a burden on the consciences of many Christians, both Roman Catholic and Protestant.

PERMISSION TO YOUNG ADULT OBSERVERS

On motion of Mr. A. J. Gowland, duly seconded, permission to the Young Adult Observers to speak during the presentation of the Report of the Board of Evangelism and Social Action was granted.

It was moved in amendment, by Mr. T. R. Denton, to Dr. McLelland's motion to refer back, duly seconded, that the whole matter re Recommendation 3 be referred back to the Board of Evangelism and Social Action for consideration and report to this Assembly.

On being put to the vote, the amendment prevailed over the motion and became the judgment of the Court.

RECOMMENDATION 4

Mr. Campbell, duly seconded, moved that the Recommendation be adopted.

It was moved in amendment by Mr. W. L. Young, seconded by Dr. E. S. Mackay, that Recommendation 4 read, "That the General Assembly inform the governments (Federal and Provincial) of its support of the just demands of the Indians of Canada for full participation in all affairs that concern them, and their desires for self-realization within the social and economic structures of Canadian Life." The Presbytery of Brandon reports that the three Catechists employed in that Presbytery will all retire in the fall of this year after long service to the Church.

The three year course available for Catechists has been carried on by the General Board of Missions. Sixteen men are at present enrolled in this course. The attention of the Presbyteries of the Church is drawn to the availability of this course for all laymen who may be interested in serving as lay preachers or as catechists.

The attention of the Assembly is directed to the fact that only those persons who have completed the course or were employed previous to 1966 are to be certified as Catechists — the others are probationers on the course.

The General Board of Missions has under discussion an increase in salary for those who are qualified as Catechists under the regulations and have completed the course prescribed.

2. Presbyteries were urged to encourage student exchange programmes between Indian youth and other young Canadians, it being noted that careful negotiation and preparation are prerequisites for the success of such student exchange programmes.

RECOMMENDATION 3

Recommendation 3: (a) That the General Assembly adopt the following Statement:—

The Right and Duty of Protest. Protest is a major phenomenon of our time. We who belong to the family of *protestant* churches believe in the right and duty to protest for truth and against evil.

Protesters in modern society do not all contend for the same things. Some seek changes and solutions with which the Christian Church is in agreement, including freedom, equity and enlightened authority; others seek objectives with which the Church would disagree. Nevertheless we believe in the rights of all men to protest and dissent.

Violence. We believe that physical violence is neither a proper expression of protest nor a proper response to protest.

We believe that those in places of power and responsibility who reject or neglect the just aspirations of others and thereby provoke them to physical violence are themselves guilty of violence against human personhood.

In its Declaration of Faith concerning Church and Nation our Church recognizes that there may be occasions when the only remedy for tyranny, whether political, economic, or ecclesiastical, is rebellion. In such circumstances all Christians are obliged to be obedient to Christ, to be agents of reconciliation, "bearing public witness to the absolute Lordship of Jesus Christ and to the freedom of all men in Him." (Declaration of Faith concerning Church and Nation, paragraph 6.)

We condemn those who use such occasions to satisfy their greed and lust for power, and also those who resort to brutality in the name of law and order.

(b) That the General Assembly call upon presbyteries and congregations to give serious study to these complex and difficult questions of protest and dissent, of non-violent protest, and of the nature of violence, with guidance being provided for the study by the Board of Evangelism and Social Action, incorporating the document on violence submitted to the Board by the Young Adult Observers to this Assembly, with reports to be made to the Board of Evangelism and Social Action by January 31, 1970.

(c) That the Board of Evangelism and Social Action continue its study of these matters in the terms of the motion to refer by Professor J. C. McLelland in the forenoon sederunt of Wednesday, June 4, 1969.

Recommendation 3 (a), (b) and (c) was adopted.

PERMISSION TO MEET

On request of Dr. W. Butcher, Assembly granted permission for his Committee on Overture No. 5, 1969, to meet during the Sederunts of Assembly.

The Reverend Dr. Robert Lennox having served The Presbyterian Church in Canada with distinction as Principal and Professor of Old Testament Literature and Exegesis in the Presbyterian College, Montreal, for some twenty-four years, this General Assembly records its deep appreciation and sincere gratitude for his outstanding contribution to the life and work of our Church. His wise guidance and friendly counsel to many of our Ministers during the course of their theological training; his great knowledge and deep insights as a scholar and his gifts as a teacher in the field of Old Testament Literature and Exegesis; and his leadership as Principal of Presbyterian College (especially in the planning and construction of a new College building and in the entrance of the College into the Faculty of Divinity at McGill University), have placed our Church in his debt and made a lasting impression on many people. This General Assembly records its thanks for his great and faithful services during these years and prays God's richest blessings upon him as he now brings his gifts and talents to his new sphere of service at Knox College.

THE FUND FOR MINISTERIAL ASSISTANCE

The Assembly called for the Report of the Fund for Ministerial Assistance which was handed in by Dr. G. D. Johnston, Chairman, as follows:
To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

During the year 1968 the Fund for Ministerial Assistance distributed \$41,036 in assistance to eligible ministers and their children. The annual gift for ministers was \$300 and for children \$100. In addition a Christmas Gift of \$50 for each minister and \$25 for each child was sent out.

The numbers eligible gradually declined during the year as congregations raised stipends paid and increments were brought into effect. In the January-March quarter 95 ministers were eligible; in October-December quarter 71 ministers were recipients.

It is with great pleasure we advise the Assembly that the Donor has added bonds of book value of \$100,000 to the Fund since our last report to the Assembly. This brings the book value of the bonds held by the Appointors of the Fund to \$955,000. With accrued interest and cash on hand the assets of the Fund as of the 31st December 1968 were \$977,816.00. Your appointors have conveyed the grateful appreciation of the church to the Donor for his continued interest and generosity.

Every effort has been made by the appointors to see that all eligible ministers receive gifts. Presbyteries are notified regularly and applications are sent to all eligible persons known to the Appointors. The co-operation of all the Courts of the Church is sought to see that no one is missed. Application forms are available on request from the Secretary.

With the eligibility of all ministers in the church for increments, a much larger number of ministers will now become eligible. The necessary steps are being taken to have the benefits from the Fund made known to all such.

The Administration of the Fund continues to be at no cost to the Fund — the Treasurer's Office and the Home Missions staff are responsible for the administrative details.

GENERAL BOARD OF MISSIONS

Consideration of the Report of the General Board of Missions was resumed, Mr. D. G. Neil, the Chairman, reporting.

Answer to Overture No. 40, 1969: The General Board of Missions in consultation with the Committee on International Affairs reported as follows:

SUGGESTED STATEMENT

The Board is in sympathy with the intent of the overture but cannot identify with the terminology. It is not prepared to endorse the recommendation that a document be drafted to "confront" our brethren in Nigeria/Biafra even with Gospel demands. It believes that a more appropriate stance for us in this situation is one of fellowship with both sides, willingness to share their burdens, and a humility in offering advice on their problems.

Therefore, we recommend that Overture No. 40, 1969, be answered in the following terms:

That this Assembly instruct the Secretary for Overseas Missions to communicate to our brethren in the churches in Nigeria/Biafra the continuing concern for them among Presbyterians in Canada as evidenced again by this action of the 95th General Assembly; and

Humbly to offer our services in any way that might be of value in the difficult tasks of Christian reconciliation and peaceful settlement; and further

That the Secretary be requested to communicate this expression of concern personally wherever possible and otherwise as he deems appropriate.

On motion of Dr. H. A. Doig, duly seconded, the answer was adopted, and the Report of the General Board of Missions as a whole with its recommendations was adopted.

REPORT OF THE ADMINISTRATIVE COUNCIL

Consideration of the Report of the Administrative Council was resumed, Mr. W. B. Cross, the Chairman, reporting recommendations on matters referred as follows:

KNOX COLLEGE: RECOMMENDATION 3, PAGE 627

"We report that we do not have sufficient information to make a firm decision, and recommend the matter be referred to the Administrative Council in consultation with the Senate of Knox College."

PRESBYTERY OF CALGARY-MACLEOD

"The Administrative Council met with representatives of the Presbytery of Calgary-Macleod and learned that the participating com-

munions were doing so on a local diocesan basis, but the Presbytery of Calgary-Macleod did not find itself able to participate. On examination, it appeared that the request was for the investment of funds in debentures or bonds of the housing project.

"The Council recommends that General Assembly request the Trustee Board to invest \$15,000 of the Church's funds in the project provided that after careful examination, the Board is satisfied with the proposed debentures or bonds."

MR. J. C. DUFF'S OVERTURE: RE LENDING FUNDS

"That this be referred to the Administrative Council for consideration in Category "B" of the National Development Fund, but we point out that we estimate the present requirements of the Lending Fund Committee for these purposes would be one-half million dollars."

The recommendations were adopted, on motion of Mr. Cross, duly seconded.

NOTICE OF MOTION

Pursuant to his Notice of Motion in the morning Sederunt, Mr. Cross moved, duly seconded, "That 7 (i) of the Lending Fund Committee Regulations be amended to give the Administrative Council authority to increase the present loan limit of \$25,000 to \$35,000 if and when funds are available" and the motion, being put to the Court, carried.

NOTICE OF MOTION

"It is my intention to move or cause to be moved at a future Sederunt, that the staff Member appointed to the Organization and Planning Committee be a member, non-voting, of the Administrative Council, the constitution thereof to be amended for the term of that office.

1. That the Committee on Organization and Planning of the Administrative Council be the agency of the Church for planning and development.
2. That this Committee report both to the Administrative Council and the General Assembly.
3. That the Administrative Council be instructed to add to the members of its Committee on Organization and Planning four members named by the

Administrative Council on recommendation of the present LAMP Committee.

4. That an Executive Staff member be appointed by the Administrative Council on recommendation of the Organization and Planning Committee who shall be responsible to the Organization and Planning Committee, and that the Administrative Council seek means to find the budget.

On motion of Mr. Scarth Macdonnell, duly seconded, it was agreed that "eight" replace "four" in No. 3.

This section of the Council's Report as a whole as amended was adopted on motion of Mr. Cross, duly seconded.

It was moved by Mr. B. Walker, duly seconded, that this be referred to the Planning and Development Committee.

The motion to refer prevailed in the voting and became the judgment of the Court.

Recommendation 17 (c) was lost in the voting.

RE: YOUNG ADULT OBSERVERS' STATEMENT

On motion of Dr. A. E. Bailey, duly seconded, it was agreed that the following statement be received and spread on the Minutes:

The National Young Adult Steering Committee in consultation with the Board of Christian Education selected ten young adult observers to the 95th General Assembly. Four of the ten have been involved in the group called Action for Church Transformation (ACT). Three of the ten have been involved in various levels of Synod and National PYPS structures. Others come from a wide variety of Presbyterian Churches and Christian groups on the university campuses; such as SCM and IVCF. All observers are Presbyterian. They represent a wide cross-section of Presbyterian Young Adults; geographically, culturally and linguistically.

The young adult observers want to make it quite clear that they as a group were not responsible for the publication of the daily newspaper "THE CELEBRANT". "THE CELEBRANT" was produced for the General Assembly by ACT. The positions taken on issues by the young adult observers were their personal positions, and not the positions of ACT or of representatives of the Board of Christian Education or any other individuals or groups. Furthermore, the young adult observers continue to voice their disapproval of the lack of action the General Assembly has taken on the matter of youth and young adult representation and participation in the structures of the church. We refer here to the PYP National Council resolution spread on the minutes of the fifth Sederunt of this 95th General Assembly. The young adult observers still feel a sense of deep frustration and disappointment with the structures of the church because this resolution and the National Council resolution requesting the suspension of the constitution of the National Young People's Society have not been seriously acted upon by the Board of Christian Education responsible for young adult work. We request that this statement in French and English be spread on the Minutes of this Assembly.

The address is as follows:

Moderator, Members of the Court —

It is a great privilege to be able to stand before you this afternoon. My primary function in being here, on behalf of the Young Adult Observers, is to try to communicate to you some of the feelings and reactions of the Young Adult Observers to this meeting of Assembly. To do so is a difficult task, for we are a group with as many attitudes and ideals and personalities as there are people in it. We have found certain issues extremely difficult, if not impossible, to agree upon among ourselves, as I'm sure many of you must realize. As a matter of fact, it is amazing that we could agree on so many matters of concern.

To say that all has been sweetness and light about this week — as far as we're concerned — though, would be misleading and false.

We have experienced a goodly share of deep frustration with the system that on certain issues can say one thing but do another. On the one hand, for example, Assembly has directed the courts to take action to involve young people more fully in the Boards and Committees of the Church; and on this matter we feel that, although a start has been made on implementing this plan at this Assembly, it is only barely a start. There is yet a long way to go. We are aiming for responsible proportional representation, and we'll do just about anything to get it.

Some of us question whether or not the structure itself is worth getting involved with and worth changing. Some of us are considering leaving the institutional church, joining countless others who have done the same for similar reasons. The situation is serious.

Most of us, however, feel that there *is* hope, that the system is worth changing — and *can* be changed — from the inside, and that there will come a day when youth will have a free voice in church courts and church committees. Perhaps we are too impatient. We realize that the Church is set up with built-in safeguards that are meant to insure that change comes in orderly fashion, albeit slow.

There *are* many things about this week for which we as Young Adults can be grateful. The very fact that we are here is a major step forward. Furthermore, the Moderator, the Clerks, and the Chairmen and Secretaries of Boards have really bent over backwards to have our reports handled and considered, to have our voice heard in Assembly wherever permitted by the rules of procedure. We rejoice in the willingness to listen to our point of view demonstrated by the entire membership of the Court while we were meeting in the sections on Monday and Tuesday. We may not always have got the answers we wanted, or been able to *give* the answers we wanted, but at least we hope we were able to raise some issues, such as the French Canadian and Indian situation in Canada, the status of women, our concern with the communications system of our Church, the problem of violence. These problems are very real to us, and we hope we have been able to make them real to you.

The week was, in the best sense of the word, an experiment, and I think that both sides had their failures. We, Young Adult Observers, suffer from a decided lack of experience in Church forms and procedures, and next time we will be much more efficiently and correctly organized.

You people tend, if I may say so, to be overly defensive when you are uncertain — but then maybe we are too. You tend to hold to tradition more than we do — but that has its merits.

We are not finished with Assembly yet. There are plans for a more extensive evaluation to be completed at a later date and fed into LAMP'S successor — and we hope that you have not finished evaluation either.

Perhaps the thing to keep most in mind in all of this is that, regardless of differences, we are all a part of the same Church. The spirit and love of Christ must be in all of us, or we are lost as a united body. I am convinced that if we can keep in touch with Christ, we can keep in touch with each other.

COMMITTEE ON INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS

The Assembly resumed consideration of the Report of the Committee on International Affairs, Dr. E. S. Mackay, Chairman, reporting.

RECOMMENDATION 1

It was moved by Dr. Mackay, duly seconded, that Recommendation 1 be adopted.

It was moved in amendment by Mr. H. L. Nugent, duly seconded, that the participation of The Presbyterian Church in Canada in this arrangement be for a trial period of one year, at the end of which a full report be given to the General Assembly by the Committee on International Affairs.

The motion prevailed in the voting and was referred to the Administrative Council for report.

PERMISSION TO MEET

On motion of Mr. Donald C. MacDonald, duly seconded, the Administrative Council was given leave to meet during the Sederunts, if necessary.

Recommendation 2 was adopted, the financial aspect having been approved by the Administrative Council.

ADDITIONAL RECOMMENDATION 3

3. (a) That the General Assembly express to the people of Nigeria and Biafra its deep concern for the continuing tragic suffering caused by the conflict and call upon the people of Canada to continue and increase their efforts to provide relief for the suffering people on both sides of the conflict.
- (b) That the General Assembly call upon the Government of Canada to follow the example of the United States and various European governments in providing financial assistance to Church agencies engaged in relief, and particularly to support the work of Canairelief.
- (c) That the General Assembly urge the Government of Canada to use its good offices with the Federal Government of Nigeria in securing safe conduct for clearly marked relief planes transporting relief supplies into Biafra.
- (d) That the General Assembly, realizing the growing bitterness and futility of the war, urge the Government of Canada, in consultation with other governments and regional and international organizations, to secure arrangements for a cease-fire and negotiations without preconditions looking towards a peaceful settlement.

Recommendation 3 was adopted.

On motion of Mr. H. Lloyd Henderson, duly seconded, the matter of Recommendation 1 of the Committee on International Affairs was referred to the Administrative Council to issue.

On motion of Dr. E. S. Mackay, duly seconded, the Report as a whole with its recommendations as amended was adopted.

THANKS

On motion of Dr. John A. Johnston, duly seconded, the thanks of Assembly were tendered the Chairman and Secretary for their leadership.

COMMITTEE ON INSTITUTIONAL CHAPLAINCIES

Assembly called for the Report of the above Committee, which, as printed, was handed in by Mr. Donald C. MacDonald, on whose motion, duly

seconded, the Report was received and its recommendations considered seriatim.

RECOMMENDATION 1

With permission of Assembly, Dr. E. A. Thomson presented an amended Recommendation which, on his motion, duly seconded, was adopted as follows:

"That the attention of the Presbyteries of the Church be drawn to their right to approach the General Assembly by overture with a view to having the name of an Institutional Chaplain placed on the Constituent Roll of the Presbytery by order of Assembly."

Recommendation 2 was adopted.

Recommendation 3 was withdrawn.

On motion of Dr. Thomson, duly seconded, the Report as a whole with its recommendations as amended was adopted.

LENDING FUND COMMITTEE

The Assembly called for the Report of the above Committee which, as printed, was handed in by Mr. B. E. Howell, in the absence of the Chairman. On motion of Mr. Howell, it was received and considered.

Mr. J. C. Duff presented Recommendations 1 and 2 as follows, and on his motion, duly seconded, they were adopted.

1. That the Lending Fund Committee give serious consideration to offering a wider range of repayment plans, which would offer appropriate challenges to stimulate congregations in varying circumstances, in the light of the serious effects of loans chronically in default, in many congregations.
2. That Presbyteries be asked to assign the supervision of capital borrowing and the review of existing loans to a standing committee, which would also assist in seeing that the regulations of the Lending Funds are carried out within their bounds.

On motion of Mr. Howell, duly seconded, the Report as a whole with recommendations added was adopted.

PLACE AND TIME OF NEXT ASSEMBLY

Consideration of the Report of the Committee on the Place and Time of the 96th General Assembly was resumed, Mr. D. C. MacDonald reporting in the absence of the Convener.

The motion and amendments of the Ninth Sederunt were placed before the Court.

In the voting, the amendment prevailed and thereby the 96th General Assembly was appointed to meet on Sunday evening, June 7th, at 8 o'clock (Halifax), local time.

Mr. Donald C. MacDonald moved, duly seconded, that the format of the 96th General Assembly be basically the same as that of the 95th General

Assembly, with variations as drawn up by the Committee on Business after study of the evaluation sheets passed in by commissioners and resource people to this present General Assembly.

Mr. Robert Allison, duly seconded, moved in amendment:

That format of next year's General Assembly be as follows: that instead of prepared reports and cut-and-dried recommendations that study papers be prepared by the major committees and boards and sent out in the Stitched Minutes to Commissioners. Then, at Assembly, Commissioners would be involved in the actual preparation of the Recommendations which would be presented for approval in the plenary sessions.

TO TAKE AN IMMEDIATE VOTE

It was moved by Mr. A. K. Campbell, duly seconded, that an immediate vote be taken and the motion being put was adopted.

The motion of Mr. MacDonald prevailed in the voting and became the judgment of the Court.

CONSULTANT

On motion of Dr. J. C. McLelland, duly seconded, it was agreed that Mr. Donald C. MacDonald be appointed as consultant to the Committee on Business of the General Assembly of 1970.

ASSISTANCE TO THE CLERKS

On motion of Dr. John A. Johnston, duly seconded, it was agreed that the Administrative Council evaluate clerical help, typing and reproduction facilities available to the Joint Clerks at this 95th General Assembly and extend to them any additional assistance deemed desirable for the 96th General Assembly.

REPORT OF THE JUDICIAL COMMITTEE RE: MINUTES, SYNOD OF TORONTO AND KINGSTON

The Assembly called for the Report of the Judicial Committee Re: Minutes, Synod of Toronto and Kingston, which was handed in by Dr. Harry Lennox, the Chairman, as follows:

"The minutes of the Synod of Toronto and Kingston having been examined and found neatly and correctly kept (cum nota) the Synod having failed at the adjournment of its last meeting to name the place and time of its next meeting, which was a contravention of Sections 5 and 261, of the Book of Forms, your Committee recommends that by order of the General Assembly, the Synod of Toronto and Kingston shall convene in Knox's Church, Galt, Ontario, on Friday, October 17th, 1969, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon and that the Clerks notify the said Synod to this effect."

On motion of Dr. Lennox, seconded by Mr. Donald MacInnes, the Report was adopted.

Overture No. 48, Presbytery of Peterborough — Re: Major J. D. L. Howson

The recommendation of the Tenth Sederunt was presented and adopted.

Overture No. 51, (Unlisted) Presbytery of Quebec — Re: Mr. Douglas B. Lowry

We recommend that the prayer of the Overture be granted. Recommendation adopted.

Overture No. 52, (Unlisted) Presbytery of Sarnia — Re: Mr. H. L. Jost

We recommend that the prayer of the Overture be granted.

Recommendation adopted.

On motion of Dr. Munro, duly seconded, the Report as a whole with its recommendations was adopted and the names of Mr. Murray M. Graham, Mr. Gordon G. Hastings, Dr. T. J. Watson, Major J. D. L. Howson, Dr. J. Logan-Vencta, Mr. Gordon Faraday, Mr. Douglas B. Lowry and Mr. H. L. Jost, were ordered placed on the Constituent Rolls of the respective Presbyteries.

KNOX COLLEGE, SENATE

Consideration of the Report of the Senate of Knox College was resumed, Dr. E. A. Thomson reporting in the absence of the Chairman.

On motion of Dr. Thomson, duly seconded, the Report of the Senate of Knox College as a whole, was adopted, with Recommendation 3 being referred to the Administrative Council in consultation with the Senate of Knox College.

COMMITTEE ON THE ORDER OF DEACONESSES

Consideration of the Report of the Committee on the Order of Deaconesses was resumed, Mr. J. J. H. Morris reporting in the absence of the Chairman.

On motion of Mr. Morris, duly seconded, the Report of the Committee as a whole, as amended, was adopted.

Consideration of the Report of the Board of Ewart College was resumed, Mr. J. J. H. Morris reporting in the absence of the Chairman.

REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE RE RECOMMENDATION 2,
PRESBYTERIAN COLLEGE BOARD

The Assembly called for the Report of the Special Committee which was handed in by Dr. A. Lorne MacKay, as follows:

1. It is recommended that Recommendation 2 in the Report of the Presbyterian College Board be amended by deleting the words "your Board" and substituting the words "the Board and Senate meeting in joint session", and that the remainder of the resolution be as set down and amended in the Stitched Minutes, p. 425.
2. It is recommended that Professors so appointed shall be eligible for nomination as Principal of the Presbyterian College.

On his motion, duly seconded, the Report was received, considered and adopted.

BOARD OF MANAGEMENT, THE PRESBYTERIAN COLLEGE

On motion of Mr. J. R. McCallum, duly seconded, the Report of the Board of Management as a whole, with recommendations as amended, was adopted.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM AND SOCIAL ACTION

Consideration of the Report of the Board of Evangelism and Social Action was resumed, Mr. A. K. Campbell, Chairman, reporting.

RECOMMENDATION 7

The amendment (Mr. Cunningham's) of the Ninth Sederunt was presented to the Court and was lost in the voting.

On motion of Dr. J. C. McLelland, duly seconded, it was agreed to refer the Recommendation back to the Board.

RECOMMENDATION 5

As directed in the Seventh Sederunt, the Board presented a revised Recommendation as follows:

PART 2

Mr. Wm. Cross, on behalf of the Administrative Council, moved in amendment, duly seconded, that the participating parties be asked to finance this out of their existing budgets and the amendment prevailed in the voting and became the judgment of the Court for the recommendation 13 (2).

RECOMMENDATION 14

Mr. A. J. Gowland moved, in amendment, duly seconded, that the Remit worded "That the General Assembly commend the Christian Labour Association of Canada for their fearless defence of workers in Ontario suffering through loss of work for conscience sake." be answered as follows:

"That the General Assembly commend the leaders and members of all trade unions who demand justice and fair dealings for all workers, and who repudiate all forms of intimidation and foul play in their dealings with each other and in the settlement of differences in the field of industrial relations."

This wording is recommended for the following reasons:—

1. It would not be wise or right to single out one trade union for special commendation and to disregard the contribution of the other trade unions to the cause of freedom and justice.

2. Since the C.L.A.C. is a certified trade union, to the extent to which it has contributed to the cause of freedom and justice in the field of industrial relations it is included in this commendation.
3. To single out the C.L.A.C. for special mention — especially in the light of what it has had to say about other trade unions could be interpreted as an indictment of other trade unions.
4. To commend the C.L.A.C. in the terms of the original recommendation could be interpreted as an endorsement of the views and policies of the C.L.A.C. by The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

Dr. H. F. Davidson moved, duly seconded, that this be referred back to the Board for reconsideration.

TO TAKE AN IMMEDIATE VOTE

It was moved by Mr. H. A. Crawford, duly seconded, that an immediate vote be taken and the motion, being put, was adopted.

The motion to refer back was lost.

DR. WM. FITCH

Mr. B. E. Howell moved, duly seconded, that Dr. Fitch be heard on this subject, and the motion, being put to the vote, was lost.

Mr. Gowland's amendment was defeated in the voting and the Report of the Board on Recommendation 14 was adopted.

RECOMMENDATION 15

Received as a report of progress.

COMMISSIONER'S OVERTURE, RE: CLINICAL PASTORAL TRAINING

REPORT OF THE GENERAL BOARD OF MISSIONS

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

General Introduction

During 1968 the General Board of Missions was very much aware of the rapidly changing Canadian and world scene within which our mission task was performed. Within Canada we took a new look at Canadian life in connection with the general election in June. Across the world our work was set within political upheavals, uncertainties, and active conflicts, in India, and Africa and Guyana, and also in less violent events in Japan and Formosa.

1968 was a year of internal changes for the General Board of Missions. Extensive studies of the structure of the Board resulted in a streamlining of both structure and procedures. The membership of the Board was reduced, many of its committees were eliminated and the Board itself reverted to a once a year meeting in March to replace the March and September meetings of the last several years. The oneness of the Board was expressed in regular meetings of the Joint Executives, which on an experimental basis will meet as one Executive during the next year. At a staff level efforts were made at closer coordination by regular meetings for sharing and consultation. The great extent of the work in Home and Overseas Missions and Missionary Education requires that administrative procedures be as efficient as possible and that Executive Committee procedures should be clearly defined so as to avoid cumbersome machinery which would slow effective decision and action.

OUR WORK OVERSEAS

1968 was a very significant year in many of our historic areas overseas seeing the culmination of dynamic changes which have been in process for more than 10 years. While we have continued to serve in historic areas we have moved out from traditional mission patterns with substantial changes both in forms of work and in structures of relationship.

A major concern affecting all our work has been the unique involvement in the Nigeria/Biafra conflict of our mission staff. From the beginning we have had missionary staff serving on both sides, and we have played an active part both in church life and in relief work in both Biafra and Nigeria. In Lagos Rev. Earle Roberts has served as Director of the Relief Program of the Christian Council of Nigeria and Mr. John Reoch served as one of the field workers under his program. Rev. Russell Hall continued to serve in his important post as minister of the Lagos Presbyterian Church. On the Biafran side Mr. and Mrs. Ron McGraw have played a major part in relief work as has Rev. Alex Zeidman who joined the work in September 1968. The March 1968 meeting of the GBM authorized the Overseas Secretary "to undertake whatever visits and to make whatever contacts may seem valuable toward advancing the cause of a peaceful settlement of the tragic conflict between Nigeria and Biafra." This assignment has involved four trips into Biafra and several trips to talk with relief, church and government people in Geneva, Rome, Paris, London, Ottawa, New York, Washington and other cities. The Board has continued to use its very special position in both Nigeria and Biafra to seek to bring relief to refugees and sufferers from the war and to promote steps towards a peaceful settlement in which alone the suffering peoples might have genuine relief. In co-operation with other agencies we were instrumentive in the establishment of "Canair relief", which through regular flights into Biafra has been credited with averting starvation of countless. Late in the year the Chairman of the Board, the Rev. D. G. Neil attended the opening of the Lagos Church in Nigeria.

While Nigeria/Biafra have demanded major attention, other work has not been neglected. The Assistant Secretary, Rev. C. Rodger Talbot, and Miss Mary Whale, Overseas Director of the WMS(WD), both paid extended visits to Japan, Formosa and India. In spite of the heavy pressures of Nigeria/Biafra their itineraries were not cut because the Board felt that full attention should be given to all our fields. In November the Overseas Secretary had a brief visit also to Guyana and Trinidad to meet with our church colleagues and missionary staff there. None of our fields was without a visit from the executive staff.

1968 has been a year of significant events in many areas. In October the Korean Christian Church in Japan celebrated its 60th Anniversary and launched its 60-70 Decade of Development plan. Special ceremonies were attended by an important delegation from Canada including Rev. Dr. C. J. MacKay, Moderator of the General Assembly, Miss E. L. McClelland, President of WMS(WD), Rev. C. Rodger Talbot, and Rev. R. M. Ransom.

In Formosa the 2nd Century Mission Movement had a year of special focus on the tribal work.

The Church in Guyana began its first year in which the Presbytery of Guyana has full responsibility for its work, assuming responsibilities formerly carried by Mission Council. We note that ours is the only church in Guyana in which the pastoral charges are all manned by Guyanese workers.

In the Bhil area in India the work of the Mission Council was transferred in October in fitting ceremonies to the Vindhya-Satpura Church Council and to an Administrative Council of Christian Institutions. Both in the Bhil area and in Jhansi the churches are looking forward to the coming into being in 1970 of the Church of North India which will draw together seven Protestant churches which are now working separately. This event was the major concern at the General Assembly of the United Church of Northern India in October.

In general observation one notes that there has not been an increase in overseas personnel but there has been a very great increase in the total impact of the work in which our church is engaged. These are not days when large numbers of overseas missionaries are called for, but they are days in which substantial help is called for in the training of leaders in the churches and in the establishment and building up of top level institutions for the continued strengthening of the leadership of the church. Our mission reports note the fine development of the theological colleges, such as the Taiwan Theological College in Formosa and the United Theological College of the West Indies in Kingston, Jamaica.

One cannot close the report without expressing special gratitude and appreciation to our staff overseas. In the midst of political changes and pressures of many kinds, they have carried on their work with imagination and great dedication.

HOME MISSIONS

Changes made last year in the constitution of the Board, in the reduction of members and the elimination of the September meeting, have placed a larger burden on fewer members and especially Synod conveners in matters of appointment and grants particularly.

The Church in our rural areas is still confronted with the dual problem of depopulation and distance. Presbyteries have been facing some of the situations realistically and by realignments and amalgamations saving both manpower and money. In some areas the very remoteness has forced the church to appoint ministers where both the work and the challenge are inadequate, which has led to frustration particularly in younger men. By the same token the situation of churches by "horse-and-buggy" mileages must be faced and although sometimes local feelings are deeply involved, congregations must be realigned and sometimes churches closed.

Churches now situated in industrial and downtown areas seem to be becoming more aware of their opportunities and difficulties. Here some reorganization of the

church's resources is vitally important. Here Presbyteries are urged to act with encouragement and vigour.

Lay Missionaries continue to be used by the Board. The course set up for catechists is also available to laymen who desire to increase their usefulness as lay supply. A separate report is made to this Assembly on catechists employed under the Board. With increased costs of living the Board has been greatly concerned about the marginal stipends paid these laymen. To this end, it is felt, great care must be taken by Presbyteries where the family responsibilities of the men concerned are such as to make it almost impossible for men to survive on the present stipend rates.

It is a somewhat new experience to be able to report that the Home Mission Charges are well settled. We have been fortunate in the number of men who have come to us from sister churches abroad as well as having a more adequate supply of our own graduates. With the initiation of the full incremental scale it will be possible for the Board to give recognition to the faithful services of ministers in Home Mission fields across Canada.

The Assembly's attention is directed to the very full reports of work in the Synods as well as the reports from various mission activities which are appended to this report. These reports are a valuable source of material for missionary information for congregational study.

MISSIONARY EDUCATION

Missionary Education became an Executive of the General Board of Missions by action of the Board at the 1968 Annual Meeting and this was subsequently approved by the 94th General Assembly. The Executive has the power to set up an Advisory Committee which would include members from the other program Boards and agencies of the Church.

During the year resource materials were produced including a special catalogue for the 60th Anniversary of the Korean Christian Church in Japan. In all, 5,000 copies were sent out to ministers and persons on the general mailing list.

Literature productions have not been as numerous as in 1967, though the Missions Report of the Board was published in popular form. These were made available to Board members and to ministers and local congregations in quantity. Additional copies were made available free of charge to groups and organizations for study and reference purposes. This production proved popular and by the end of the year only a few copies remained.

The 1969 Presbyterian Church in Canada Calendar was well received both by our own Church members and those of other denominations. The theme chosen was "Shalom." In 1968 there were 42,000 copies sold.

The Missionary Education monthly newsletter continues to be a popular item and the mailing list is steadily increasing. It now has a circulation of 4,500. A bi-monthly "Mission Memo," geared for Missions Conveners and other Church leaders has also been added to Missionary Education productions. The purpose of this memo is to inform leaders of current resources and other information of interest. Both are available free of charge.

Although there were no staff changes during the year, the Director, Rev. R. M. Ransom went on sabbatical leave from September 1st until March 31, 1969. Mr. Ransom spent his furlough in Japan and Hong Kong with brief visits to Korea and Taiwan. He studied at Universities in Japan and Hong Kong, and took part in a team ministry experiment in Japan. Dr. H. A. Doig assumed the Director's duties. We are most grateful to him for undertaking this additional responsibility.

The area of Audio Visuals continues to be a matter of concern, mainly because of lack of funds to carry out any type of major production. A start has been made, however, on a new filmstrip dealing with "The City." The production will

be spread over two years in order that production costs may be met from the Budget over that period.

During the year we have endeavoured to be flexible and have attempted to respond to requests and to assist people by providing resources for programs related to the mission of the Church.

Deputation in 1968 has been limited since the number of missionaries home on furlough has been small. As a result some World Mission Weekends have had to be cancelled.

In a rapidly changing and challenging world, the Missionary Education Executive continues to seek to interpret the mission of the Church by means of programs and projects that will develop deeper involvement in the Church's witness and outreach. Congregations are encouraged to make use of the services of this educational arm of the General Board of Missions.

RECOMMENDATIONS GENERAL BOARD OF MISSIONS — 1969

1. That a stipend increase of \$500 be made to Superintendents on January 1, 1970, with a further increase of \$500 on January 1st, 1971.
2. That the terms of appointment for Superintendents (Regulations VII, III (2) General Assembly Minutes 1968 Page 224) be amended by the addition of the words "manse or" to read as follows:
"The rate of stipend shall be as determined from time to time by the G.B.M. plus manse or house allowance, moving expenses, and travel expenses while on duty, including a car allowance at the approved rate, with one month's vacation."
3. That the General Board of Missions be authorized to appoint an Ordained Minister to a self-supporting charge on the request of the Presbytery concerned in cases where particular circumstances are deemed to warrant such action.
4. That the General Assembly grant the General Board of Missions, through its Inner City Committee, and in consultation with Presbyteries, authority to initiate studies with a view to developing forms of Inner City ministries where such are feasible.
5. That the basic stipend be increased from \$4,300 to \$4,600 effective January 1, 1970.
6. Whereas the General Board of Missions is exploring;
 - i) new ways of working in historical areas (Japan, Formosa, India, etc.)
 - ii) ways of relating to new areas of need in mission
 - a) other countries (like Afghanistan and Malawi)
 - b) work among other minority groups similar to Koreans in Japan, East Indians in Guyana, Bhils in India.
 - c) joint efforts (like ecumenical teams in Italy, Algeria, etc.) and will report on these matters to the General Assembly,

That the General Board of Missions be authorized to assign personnel and funds within the authorized budget to new programs of mission that do not commit the church beyond 1972 and that the General Board of Missions report back to the 1970 General Assembly.

7. Minute of Appreciation

Rev. Russell Self, M.A., B.D., M.Th.

Mr. Self has for 20 years been a missionary of the Presbyterian Church in Canada in Central India. He served first of all in Jhansi which is in the heart of Hindu India and which has traditionally been one of the most durable centres of Indian resistance to outside influences. It is in one of the most difficult districts in the world.

Mr. Self is a westerner by birth from Vancouver. He came to Ontario, however, for his education and studied at Toronto Bible College, the University of Western Ontario, University Toronto Knox College, and Westminster Seminary. From 1947-49 he was minister of St. James Church in Toronto. In the latter year he accepted the appointment to Jhansi, and has been in India ever since.

When he first started work in India, Mr. Self was a district missionary, helping out various churches whenever they were in need of the services of a minister. In recent years, however, he has become particularly interested in Christian literature, and very concerned that in a country which is rapidly becoming literate for the first time, non-Christian agencies, especially Communists, seemed to have the field almost to themselves.

It is a tribute to his experience and ability that in 1961 he was elected Moderator of the North India Synod of the United Church of Northern India.

In 1961 he was released from some of his duties in Jhansi, so that he could spend more time with the Indian Bible Society. He has served with the Bible Society as a distribution consultant until this present furlough, on a secondment basis from the GBM. He now is resigning from service under the Board to accept an assignment under the United Bible Societies as Distribution Consultant for the Bible Societies of the Asia Area. He will live with his family in Hong Kong.

The Board notes this termination with gratitude for Mr. Self's years of service in India, and with confidence that he will continue to make an important contribution to the life of the church in Asia in the new task he has undertaken. Our good wishes go to his wife Alice, and his four children as they open this new chapter in their life as a missionary family.

MISSION IN CANADA

ATLANTIC PROVINCES

It is reported by the Atlantic Provinces Economic Council that despite increases in manufacturing, shipments, wages, salaries and employment, unemployment increased in 1968. Inflation was more pronounced than in previous years. The annual rate of population growth continues to be slower than the national rate. After the 1967 slow down, the rate of growth from employment seems to be back at its 1965-66 level. It was also reported that the rise in consumer prices in the three major urban areas averaged 3.3 percent, up from 2.7 percent in 1967.

The low income from small sub-marginal farms continues to cause real problems for the people and the Church in the rural areas of the Synod, where many families exist at sub-poverty levels. This of course means continued declines in rural population where the Church finds one of its greatest challenges in mission.

Church leadership remains relatively stable but shows two less ordained ministers at the end of the year. Fourteen ministers left the active ministry in the Synod of the Atlantic Provinces but this was largely made up by the appointments made during the year by the General Board of Missions.

For the support of the work of the Church at home and overseas there should be marked increases as notable gains were made in stipends and normal expenditures.

In February 1968, the Synod was saddened by the death of Miss Susan Sylvester long time servant of the Church who worked as a deaconess in various parts of the Synod under the Woman's Missionary Society (E.D.). Miss Elsie Lee resigned from her work among the Chinese in the Synod in April, 1968.

Through the Presbyteries

Some decision on the future of the Extension congregation of St. Aidan's, St. John's, in the Presbytery of Newfoundland, must be made in 1969. Established in 1956, the congregation had experienced little growth since 1963 when the decision to erect a new Church Extension charge was made. In November of this year the Rev. Eric M. Faust returned to the United States after an appointment of two and a half years. The Presbytery has sought an understanding with other denominations in the hope of some co-operation or joint-project in the area but as yet the discussions have borne no fruit.

In St. Paul's, Cornerbrook, Newfoundland's second city, the two great problems are the lack of an adequate manse and a settled ministry. The appointment in October of the Rev. Fred C. Knox, a missionary retired from overseas service, and the rental of a suitable house, have solved these problems. The work is small, but faithful families continue in devotion to the Church and generosity to the work.

The work in St. Matthew's, Grand Falls, is small and static. The Rev. George Anderson succeeded the Rev. W. M. Moncrieff in September and assures the continuance of a settled ministry. However, the Church is very dependent on the fortunes of the Newfoundland Paper Company in this one-industry town and real concern is felt for its future.

In Wabush, Labrador, daily services were held under the leadership of the ordained missionary, Rev. Blake Walker in the Wabush Recreation Centre. Work continued on the construction of the Church building during 1968 but as it is done on a volunteer basis, progress is somewhat slow. Steps are now being taken to establish formally a congregation in the year 1969.

In Cape Breton, by realignment and the joining of formerly aid-receiving charges, new self-sustaining fields have been developed, now being served by the Rev. D. O. Codling and the Rev. T. Walter Brett. Further new alignments of charges in the Eastern area of the Presbytery are under consideration which will result in the consolidation of the work.

The work in Pictou Presbytery has remained fairly normal. A committee of Presbytery has begun meetings with a similar committee from the United Church to study areas in which the two churches can work together for mutual benefit and the advancement of the Kingdom. Two of the larger fields in the Presbytery were vacant at the end of the year and the work at West River Station has lapsed as has the work at Westville Road Mission Church. This Presbytery seems to be facing a number of serious problems, created by vacancies and scattered preaching points, which will require a basic study and some bold new plans for carrying forward the Church's mission.

Manpower seems to be the great need in Halifax and Lunenburg Presbytery which in spite of the consolidation of two charges is faced with new vacancies in two large rural congregations and continuing vacancies in Windsor and Noel Road.

The St. Columba Extension charge in Saint John, N.B., has made a beginning in the construction of their new church and the congregation is now in an optimistic and forward looking frame of mind. Marked growth was noted in the Riverview Heights area but unfortunately this is not reflected in the congregation of the Bethel Church extension charge. The Rev. George A. Cheatele was appointed to St. Stephen's Church, St. Stephen, and new interest has developed there.

In Miramichi Presbytery, a bold step was taken when Campbellton and Dalhousie charges agreed to a shared ministry. This experimental ministry was set up for a trial period of two years and is being carried out by the Rev. Murray Graham.

On Prince Edward Island, the Extension congregation of St. Mark's Charlottetown, took a great leap forward in 1968 with the erection of their Church building on a beautiful and strategic site in a developing area of the city. The congregation shows steady development under the leadership of the Rev. Ian Glass, Ordained Missionary.

Mission Education and Service

Perhaps the highlight of the year was the holding of three World Mission Weekends during the month of May, in Charlottetown, P.E.I., in New Glasgow, N.S., and in Sydney, N.S. Personnel involved in these weekends included home and overseas missionaries as well as deaconesses. These World Mission Weekends were most successful in terms of interest created and the number of people reached. These weekends were planned by the Missionary Education Committee of the Board of Missions, with strong local support. The Superintendent of Missions for the Atlantic Provinces was active on the various planning committees and also participated in all of the weekends. The Rev. Basil Lowery, Convener of the Synod Committee on Missionary Education, also took an active part in the massive job of organizing the weekend and acts as an agent for the distribution of filmstrips and other Missionary Education material throughout the Synod.

A Church Extension Workshop was held in October in Moncton, N.B., under the direction of the Rev. J. C. Cooper, National Director of Church Extension. It included Church Extension workers and other ministers not only from the Synod of the Atlantic Province but also from that of Montreal and Ottawa. It was well attended and considered very worthwhile.

The General Board of Missions and the National Recruitment Committee combined forces to make the appointment of a student for work in the general area of Christian vocation among young people and recruitment for the Christian ministry. Mr. William McClelland, second year theology student at the Presbyterian College, Montreal, offered his services for this particular assignment and worked under the supervision of the Superintendent of Missions and others. He met with many young people in groups and individually, conducting worship services and camp meetings, and participated in the World Mission Weekends in May. It has been felt that this was a worthwhile endeavour.

SYNOD OF MONTREAL AND OTTAWA

A variety of missionary enterprises operate within the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa. Some of these are Presbyterian efforts directed to the needs of various local and ethnic communities. Others are of an ecumenical nature in which co-operative effort with other denominations, such as with the United Church in the Inverness and Leggat's Point-Metis areas of Quebec, has avoided overlapping and waste of manpower and resources. Another ecumenical venture in which the Presbyterian Board of Missions shares with the Anglican and United Churches is Elizabeth House, a Home for unmarried mothers located on Marlowe Avenue, Montreal, which was opened in 1968, and is now filled to its capacity of 18.

Tyndale House is preparing for the movement back of about 100 families into the new housing now being completed in the first phase of an Urban Renewal program. Summer playground programs, tutorial aid by University students to help prevent youth from becoming school drop-outs, and a job corps program to help youth acquire a sense of responsibility and earn pocket-money, are among the many new directions in which Tyndale House is seeking to meet the needs of its Inner City neighbourhood under the leadership of the Rev. Robert Johnston, who became Executive Director in March, 1968.

There are six congregations in the Church Extension category in the Synod. Preville and Chambly were formed into one pastoral charge last year. Parkwood in Ottawa, together with Ile Perrot, Duvernay and Fabreville complete the list of Extension charges.

The major problem of rural areas, here as elsewhere, is the drain to the cities and larger towns of its young people seeking Higher Education or employment. There is, on the other hand, a larger number of city-dwellers who spend many of their weekends in the country, particularly tourist areas. It was the feeling of the Rural Church Committee, that if ministers informed each other of such movements of their people, it would help these people to develop a closer contact with the Church. The need for special courses to equip people for the Rural ministry, offered

both in the regular course of studies and in Advanced Education opportunities later, was expressed. Eight married students and one catechist serve a total of 19 congregations on a year-round basis. Two summer students served four congregations in the Laurentians. In all, about 15 percent of the congregations in the Synod are served in this way, thus conserving ordained manpower and assisting married students to pursue their studies for the ministry.

In the field of Missionary Education, the main thrust was made by the Rev. and Mrs. David Craig, on their extensive itinerary in the Synod from January to March of last year. In spite of the length of time they were available, the demand to hear them was greater than their availability.

The Immigration office which was opened in 1945 in Montreal to assist servicemen and their families, and which later welcomed immigrants and notified churches of their destination was closed at the end of 1967. Last year saw the re-organization of this work on an inter-faith basis, with the opening of one of the eight regional offices in which our church shares support, in Montreal.

Weekly worship is conducted in Chinese, Italian, Hungarian, Japanese and Korean as well as in the two major national languages. Work is carried on in the French language in Montreal, Quebec City area, Melbourne and Sherbrooke. *La Vie Chretienne* is published monthly under the editorship of Dr. Andre Poulain. Mr. Jean Porret arrived from Switzerland in November to take up his appointment as Director of French Outreach and Christian Education, replacing the Rev. Yves Cruvellier, who returned to France after four years of service.

A special Committee, under the Chairmanship of Dr. A. Goodwill MacDougall, was appointed to survey our French work. The recommendations of this Committee, as approved by the Synod Missions Committee include:

- The organization of a congress of French-speaking Protestants to discuss common problems, interests and aims.
- An increase in effort to recruit and train either French Canadian workers or English Canadians who are bilingual.
- The provision by Presbyteries of instruction in conversational French for ministers in English-speaking congregations.
- The encouragement of English-speaking congregations to seek out the French Protestants and French-speaking English in their area with a view to establishing local groups.
- An increase in the publicity given to French work in English-speaking congregations.
- The endorsement of the idea that French-speaking Protestants should, wherever possible, have the opportunity to receive their secular education in the French language.

In the varied areas of the Church's life and work there seems to be an openness to re-examine its aims and purposes in relation to the particular needs of the community, both now and in the future. It is a time when congregations, as well as those in a supportive role such as Mission and Extension committees, are compelled to take a close look at their own resources, both spiritual and material, to see that they are directed towards the strengthening of faith and effective action in their area of responsibility.

EGLISE SAINT MARC — QUEBEC CITY

The Rev. Jean Cruvellier, D.Th., minister, summarizes his report in a sentence: "we are building a church."

Building a Church, Literally: Two years ago our chapel was built by the Board, but we have had many details left to our congregation: management of the basement; of the kitchen; of the grounds. This past year several things have been completed: the walls and the ceiling of the basement (the floor will be done this year); the parking lot was prepared behind the church with gravel and the ground before the church and the manse covered with grass. Tables and benches have been built. All this has been done by members of the congregation: a good oppor-

tunity for fellowship. Shovelling of snow is well organized as is cleaning the church every week by volunteers.

Building a Church, in the Administrative Sense: We have been able this year, to organize the work of the Board of Managers with excellent chairman, secretary and treasurer. Laymen learn to have responsibilities. Envelopes have given \$2,883.65 in 1968 (\$1,904.80 in 1967). The total of givings has been: \$5,702.39 in 1968 (\$6,366.00 in 1967, when a special subscription of \$1,600 was made at the beginning of the management).

Building a Church in the Spiritual Sense: We have gained several new members: about 10 families. More and more people come to Quebec from France and they are happy to find a "reformed" church. English speaking officers of the government in Ottawa attend our services during their stay in Quebec to learn French. To accomplish our mission we try to give our witness as often as possible: some Roman Catholics come to attend our services or special lectures about the history of Protestantism. Services are held in summer in a Roman Catholic chapel of the University for English speaking people attending the French courses. During the year a small Bible group meets every week in the university and discussion groups have been organized for young people (20 to 35) with a keen Cameroonian (who was a Presbyterian elder in U.S.A.) as supervisor. Bible readings are given in the church where some Roman Catholics come. We take an active part in the ecumenical dialogue in a spirit of love and truth.

We have many problems to solve, among them, the indifference of several old Protestant families. The problem of reaching people outside because many Roman Catholics leave their church and they want to leave Christianity altogether. The first aim of the present minister is to lay solid foundations for this congregation in order that more and more people take their responsibilities.

L'EGLISE DES CANTONS DE L'EST

Church life at l'Eglise des Cantons de l'Est goes its quiet way in this peaceful country town. Most of our people are middle-ages or older and most young people leave for employment or education or marriage.

Considering the small numbers, the congregation does quite well in giving and attendance. In 1968 over \$200 was sent to the Biafra appeal, and to date (67-68) \$600 has been remitted on our \$1,500 N.D.F. goal. Church School continues with Explorers replacing it one Sunday a month. The W.A. and W.M.S. meets monthly, and an adult Bible Study group meets weekly.

Richmond area is over-churched with one United, one Anglican, 2 Presbyterian churches, not counting the J.W.'s and Pentecostals serving perhaps 2,000 Protestants.

Things for the town are looking up. A Protestant Regional High School opened in '68, a French one is rumoured; one plant has expanded and another is opening in the spring.

The Sherbrooke services held twice monthly have two or three families of European French interested — mostly from the University of Sherbrooke and a floating population of visitors. The minister and session of St. Andrew's Sherbrooke are quite interested in these services to the point of cancelling their evening service twice monthly so members can attend our services.

Rev. Gerald Doran, Ordained missionary in charge writes: "Your missionary's French is improving. I can now pray and preach without using a manuscript. I have never been so busy in all my life. At Synod, I am chairman of French work for the Missions committee. E. & S.A. has me on the French-English relations committee of the Board. I am treasurer and registrar of Camp d'Action Biblique (we'll be having a two-week French Camp this year). Lately I have been writing an article a month for *La Vie Chretienne* which means being on the editorial board of the paper a few times a year. Then there are the non-denominational jobs like President of the Sherbrooke Ministerial Association, Melbourne Youth Centre, Chaplain to the Regional High School two days a week. So in spite of the small congregation I find myself busy and happy here."

ELIZABETH HOUSE

Elizabeth House, a residence for unwed mothers, is sponsored by the United, Anglican and Presbyterian Churches in the Montreal area, working in co-operation with governmental, social welfare agencies and the Protestant School Board. It opened in June 1968. It accommodates 18 girls in either double or single rooms. The girls have their own lounge with T.V., piano, hair dryers, etc., to help with their comforts. Girls are expected to assume responsibility in caring for their own rooms and, on a rotation basis, to share in the lighter household routines.

An unmarried mother is frequently confused about herself or plans for her child and it is important that she receive appropriate counselling. Therefore the period of accommodation should be at least for two months if the girl is to benefit from the program offered. A referral is made for every girl in residence to the appropriate social agency. While any girl who wishes may return to the residence for a convalescence period following confinement, the facilities cannot provide for the care of the babies for whom other plans must be made.

Cost of care is \$7.00 per day and many residents or their families may be in a position to pay all or part of this rate. A girl may be attended by the physician of her choice or at the Pre-Natal Clinic of the Queen Elizabeth Hospital. Because of the proximity of this hospital, it is preferable if confinement can be arranged there in all cases.

Stress is put on the importance of proper nutrition during pregnancy and the part this plays in the birth of a healthy child. All meals have been planned in consultation with the Montreal Diet Dispensary towards this end. While it is not possible to cater to individual preferences, the recommendations of the attending physicians are followed.

A program of activities is designed to contribute to the total personality and covers a wide range of interests. Every resident is encouraged to participate fully. Formal schooling in both regular and commercial courses is provided by the Protestant School Board. A full time teacher, Mrs. Margaret Assels, is responsible for the co-ordination of the educational program. Volunteer teachers assist her in covering the various subjects. Educational movies obtained from the Protestant School Board are shown weekly. The purpose of this program is to help keep the girl abreast of her studies and to enable her to rejoin her school, upon leaving Elizabeth House. Typewriters are available for those outside the school program who wish to practice.

Crafts

Through the help of volunteers, regular sessions are held in clay modelling, copper work, plaster of paris moulds, rug hooking, knitting and crocheting. A sewing machine is available, with some instruction, for those interested. Those with special interests or hobbies are encouraged to continue with these.

The program of the residence is flexible and as interest develops it is hoped that further programs can be initiated, e.g. Personal Grooming and Personality Development, Group Discussions, Home Nursing.

Since Elizabeth House opened, 29 girls have been admitted to the residence. While 18 girls can be accommodated, the task of preparing the house for full occupancy has taken much longer than expected. Much had to be done in repairs, painting, furnishings and in general working towards a comfortable and pleasant atmosphere in the home. A great deal further remains to be done.

The residence is full, with a waiting list building up. In order to bring this about many people have been involved. There were those who volunteered their time and energy to help with the cleaning and painting. There were many others, both through their church groups or as individuals, who contributed financially or in other donations.

The need for such a resource in the Montreal area has been apparent for many years and this positive start will contribute towards the rehabilitation of the girls who find themselves in this difficult situation.

Mrs. Elsie McKenzie is the full-time Executive Director and is responsible for the operation of the residence and for all admissions. She is assisted by two full-time live-in housemothers, Mrs. Olive Moore and Mrs. Jean Lowe.

SYNOD OF TORONTO AND KINGSTON

The Synod has 19 Ordained Mission Fields, 23 Church Extension Charges, 5 Ethnic Groups, 2 Student Summer Charges, 4 Fields served by Catechists, 5 Fields served by Married Students and 2 Deaconesses serving the Synod.

The attention of the Synod was drawn (1) to the matter of Increments for years of experience effective 1 April 1968 which are printed on page 324 of the Acts and Proceedings of The 94th General Assembly; (2) to the Literature which is provided by Missionary Education Committee regarding the work being done on our Overseas Mission Fields and the changes taking place in our approach to Missions Conveners and at home today; (3) to the policy of the General Board of Missions that no deficit grants will be paid to any organization unless and until the required documents, i.e. certification that an Every Person Visitation has been held along the lines approved by the Board of Stewardship and Budget, or an Every Person Canvass by Presbytery, in previous year, and the audited financial statements of the congregation (including that of all auxiliary groups as well as the Board of Managers), are submitted to the Home Mission Executive through Presbytery and Synod; (4) that grants for congregations now take effect only when an appointment has been approved by the Board of Missions and the regulations relative to Every Person visitation and audited Financial Statements are carried out.

The work of Missions in this Synod is complex and varied and ever increasing an expansion takes place in our growing communities. In addition to the ordinary Home Missions and Church Extension activities experimental work is undertaken in the Synod in the Flemingdon Park Apartment area, where the Church is meeting in the Plaza, and a new co-operative use of church buildings by United, Anglican and Presbyterian is in effect in Don Valley Village. Careful study and planning must go into effect before new work is contemplated. Every Presbytery was urged to work closely with the Superintendent of Missions and the Director of Church Extension, especially while the formative thinking is in progress.

Flemingdon Park, Toronto

"The Church in the Plaza" has now been in operation for about 15 months, and during that time some steady progress has been made. At the present time we have just over 100 children enrolled in the Church School. The weekly attendance at worship is about 40. This number may not be very large but it is consistent — these are people who are faithful to the congregation and are interested in seeing a vital Church work established in this area. During the week we have a Ladies' Group, a Badminton Club (held in St. Mark's Church, Don Mills) and an Explorers group which is divided into a junior and senior section and caters for children between the ages of 6 and 11 years.

The Rev. Cecil J. Kirk, Ordained missionary in charge, writes: "During the time we have been operating in Flemingdon Park we have learned a great many things. Not least among these is the fact that people recognize the need for a Church witness in the area. Because of the cosmopolitan nature this area presents a unique opportunity as a missionary project, and in addition the presence of a large number of low-income families also gives an opportunity for considerable social outreach. We have been fortunate to have the use of so central a site as the Lower Mall of the shopping centre for our activities, and the congregation is very appreciative of the assistance they have received from the Home Mission Board in the financing of the work here. Towards the end of 1968 an Every Person Visitation was made of our members and as a result of the commitments received we are looking forward to even greater participation in activities by our members. In

addition, the amount of money pledged by members for 1969 shows an increase of about 75 percent over that actually received in 1968."

The congregation is already contributing to the Stewardship and Budget finances of the Church. The amount contributed in 1968 (\$200) will be increased by 150 percent in 1969. In addition, the congregation has been paying part of the rental cost of the minister's apartment and will continue to do so; they also intend making a contribution towards the cost of renting the present facilities. The visitation mentioned above proved to be a tremendous stimulus to the members and plans are already being made to have a further visitation later during the present year.

One of the problems facing a congregation in an apartment area is the fluidity of population. Very few of the people now worshipping with us even lived in this area when services began 15 months ago. We are hopeful that the condominium project planned for the southern section of the area will bring a more stabilizing factor to bear on this problem. In the meantime we are attempting to reach the newcomers to the area through a systematic advertising program and a person has been appointed to be in charge of this work.

For additional accounts of mission activity in this Synod see reports of the various Ethnic groups.

Armagh

During 1968 Armagh served 140 girls from eight provinces in Canada. The majority of the girls were from Protestant backgrounds but other faiths are welcomed when there is room. The average age of the girls was 18. Several occupations were represented but the majority were high school students.

Among the services provided by the home is the opportunity to continue education in co-operation with the Board of Education of the Town of Mississauga. A Christian emphasis is maintained in the home both through the acceptance and love shown to the girls and the daily chapel services and Sunday Worship provided for them. Armagh also provides group sessions for the girls under the supervision of Dr. B. H. McNeel.

The Armagh Auxiliary provided substantial support in 1968 and many gifts were received from concerned people within the church.

"The Board of Armagh was sorry to accept Mrs. Margarete Herrig's resignation as Executive Director of Armagh at the end of December," writes the Rev. R. G. MacMillan, Chairman, Board of Armagh.

"Mrs. Herrig had been the director of Armagh since October 1961. Before the end of the year a new Director, Mrs. Elizabeth Ralph, has been employed by the Board, to take up her new duties in the new year."

The staff for 1968 included: Executive Director, Mrs. M. Herrig; Secretary, Miss E. Lawrence; House Mothers, Mrs. Forbes Watson, Mrs. J. Taylor (until June), Mrs. A. Marks (from June); Grounds and Building Superintendent, Mr. Forbes Watson; Night Supervisors, Mrs. A. Shaw, Mrs. D. A. MacKinnon, Mrs. N. McDonald, Mrs. H. Kennedy; Nurse, Mrs. R. S. Anderson.

SYNOD OF HAMILTON AND LONDON

In surveying the work in this Synod during the past year the general impression received is that of good progress in the newer aid-receiving charges, a static situation in the older charges and little progress in new work. The problems in the ethnic charges have been alleviated to some extent by certain adjustments, such as the amalgamation of the Ukrainian Mission in Hamilton with Knox Church and the relocation of the Hungarian congregation near Mt. Brydges. A survey is planned among the downtown churches in Hamilton, including mission charges, to determine the needs and problems.

The developments to be noted particularly in the past year are as follows: the dedication of the new church building in Welland; the organizing of the congregation in the Westmount Church Extension charge, London, and the election of elders; the opening of a pioneer project for summer visitors at Sauble Beach

and the erection of a building; the reclassification of Chalmers Church, London, as an extension charge; and the purchase by the Hungarian congregation of Mt. Brydges of a former United Church building for worship purposes.

PRESBYTERY OF HAMILTON

Italian: Mr. Mario Spiridigliozzi, catechist, continues his part-time ministry.

Ukrainian Mission: The Rev. Walter Kutcher is serving both this congregation and that of Knox Church. He has recently published his book, "The Living Church," for Ukrainian people.

Roxborough Park: The Rev. Wm. H. McLennan continues to lead the congregation in community outreach, visitation to the Ontario Hospital and a shared ministry at the Wayside House for Alcoholics.

Strathcona: A gradual growth and increased financial capability marks 1968 for this charge. The Rev. Gary Morton reports home discussion groups and a coffee house for youth as places of encounter and spiritual growth.

Pineland: In December, 1968, a finalized covenant agreement was made between the United and Presbyterian Church on the practical aspects of the joint venture. Tenders are to be submitted for the new building in the Spring of 1969.

PRESBYTERY OF LONDON

Westmount Extension Charge: The work here, under the direction of the Rev. John B. Fox, is steadily progressing. The congregation was formally organized on May 5th and in January of this year an election of elders took place. The membership stands at 84. Worship is being carried on in the Arthur Ford School but a site is being retained for a Church building. It is expected that there will be more rapid progress when the other phase of Westmount opens up in the near future.

Chalmers Church: This has been reclassified as an extension charge and the appointment made of the Rev. John Marshall, who begins his work in February. There was a small growth in membership the past year, with the congregation meeting all its commitments. A strong mid-week youth work continues, supported largely by the people of Glen Cairns area into which the Church was moved. The Board of Missions has purchased a manse in the area, situated 1.5 miles from the church, a district in which considerable building is taking place.

Hungarian Congregation, Mt. Brydges: The Rev. L. Vietorisz began his work here in December. The fact that he is bilingual should be of considerable help to him so far as outreach and growth are concerned. The congregation now has its own church building, having purchased a former United Church building a few miles from Mt. Brydges, at a cost of \$2,500. It is in good condition and well furnished, with the exception of the furnace which will have to be replaced. This new move should serve to consolidate and strengthen the work.

PRESBYTERY OF PARIS

Pleasant Ridge Road: The Hungarian community, contrary to expectations when the present church building was erected, is bearing the total responsibility for the indebtedness which presently stands at approximately \$50,000. Over a period of several years there has been a steady increase in congregational revenue. The Presbytery Committee feels it can be cautiously optimistic regarding the future of this congregation. A need which is being emphasized is that of education within the congregation regarding the government and administration of the Presbyterian Church in Canada. A program along these lines is contemplated by the committee of Presbytery supervising this work.

Greenbriar Church: Gradual progress is noted in this Ordained Mission Charge. The Presbytery is asking for the re-appointment of the Rev. Douglas Black.

PRESBYTERY OF CHATHAM

Chinese Mission: The Rev. James Ko reports satisfactory progress in this work, carried on in St. Andrew's Church, Windsor. Average attendance at the

Sunday afternoon services was 45. The Language School is a major part of the work. During the two summer months there were 42 students in attendance and an average of 22 students in the other months. The bi-weekly church bulletin was sent to all Chinese families in the city and eighty copies to the Chinese students at the University and the new immigrant families. The students are showing an increased interest in the work and more contact is to be made with them. During the year a new English class for immigrants was started. There was raised for all purposes in 1968 the sum of \$3,558, of which \$1,320 was contributed to the General Assembly Budget Fund and \$400 to the National Development Fund.

St. James, Chatham and New St. Andrew's, Dover: The Rev. Roderick MacLeod began his work here on November 7th. The Board of Missions, assisted by the St. James congregation to the extent of \$4,000, purchased a new manse in Chatham. First Church, Chatham, provided the property and building for this congregation at a cost of \$74,000, making the final payment in 1967. The congregation itself contributed \$5,000 for this purpose. Tributes were paid to the Rev. Donald MacInnes on the completion of three and a half years service as supply minister.

There have been no new developments in the proposed *Forest Glade* project in Windsor. The possibility of an interdenominational church centre is being explored and meetings were held with representatives of six other denominations. However, only the United Church seems now to be interested in this project, so far as purchase of property is concerned.

PRESBYTERY OF BRUCE-MAITLAND

Sauble Beach: A pioneer project directed primarily at young people was started last summer. A building intended for use as both a worship and youth centre has been erected and will be available for the work this summer. Mr. Henry Link, a student from Pennsylvania, assisted by a student deaconess, served very acceptably on the charge of Stokes Bay and Sauble Beach for the summer months.

SYNOD OF MANITOBA AND NORTHWESTERN ONTARIO

The scope and size of the Mission Board's involvement in the work of this Synod is shown by the Grant Requests for 1969 which total \$123,213. These figures reflect the nature of this Synod, particularly the long distances and scattered population. They also show an increasing ethnic work particularly among the Canadian Indians, who have a large scattered population within the borders.

Our Indian work is growing and does constitute a substantial effort. Our list of workers who are now directly involved in work with our Canadian Indians includes, Walter Donovan, Brian Penny, Larry Jackson, Sheina Smith, Martin Rusaw, George Telcs, Steve Robinson, Colin Wasacase. In addition many people throughout the Synod are assisting in various ways in addition to their normal duties.

But we are aware that great need exists for the expansion of these services. The City of Winnipeg now has an Indian population of some 6,000. A fellowship centre is emerging from the interest and efforts of our people in Winnipeg. Presbytery is investigating the type of centre that will be most adaptable to the needs of the Indian population of the City. A definite proposal is projected for the near future.

Further to Indian work, we would draw attention to the group of Young People from the Synod of Hamilton and London, who in *Operation Ojibway* visited the Lake of the Woods area this summer and conducted Vacation Bible Schools and participated in the life of the Reservations. They made a strong witness and their efforts have been well received by the people they served.

In Brandon Presbytery we would note a summer project that has been carried on for many years by ministers and workers on the Reservation. A Tent Mission is carried out on each reserve for a period of one week, Vacation Bible Schools are held in the morning, with preaching services being conducted at night. Ministers of

the Presbytery, deaconesses, both regular and summer-appointments, share the work, which has had an encouraging effectiveness among the Canadian Indians.

Two new Sanctuary-Centred Church buildings have been dedicated since the last meeting of the Board, one in St. Vital and the other at Thompson. It is of interest to note that careful investigation of the type of building to be erected was carried out before the decision was taken.

We are pleased to report a relative stability in the Mission Fields as regards retention of personnel. We would note with regret the retiring of the catechists from our midst who have served the Synod well, Mr. Wilkie at Winnipegosis, Mr. Hall from Lenore and Mr. Dodds from Hartney.

Presbyteries are making efforts to consolidate work. However, we would again draw attention to a dwindling rural population and the long distances involved, which often means that consolidation is unworkable or even unfair to some small pockets of our people whom we should not, in the guise of efficiency, abandon. But each case is considered, for we also have to be aware that a good stewardship of our resources is required.

SYNOD OF SASKATCHEWAN

The problem of vacancies interspersed by short ministries continues its vicious circle. The congregations have no consistent periods of growth, and become discouraged. This discouragement, intensified by an extended vacancy, infects the new O.M., who in turn stays only a short time. The health of the congregations, both spiritual and financial, will show little improvement until the vicious circle is broken by ministers willing to stay several years. It is hoped that the action of congregations in extending calls to appointees may help in this area. We also feel that the pastoral counsel of a Superintendent of Missions can help congregations and ministers overcome discouragement.

PRESBYTERY OF ASSINIBOIA

Amalgamation: One of the major achievements in the Presbytery of Assiniboia during the past year was the action of the study of amalgamations undertaken the previous year. The congregations of St. Paul's and Knox in Moose Jaw amalgamated to form St. Mark's Church, Moose Jaw. The new congregation meets in the building formerly used by Knox Church, and has done extensive renovations. The Pastoral Charge of St. Mark's, Moose Jaw and Knox, Briercrest, has called the Rev. P. D. Ruddell as Minister.

In Regina, the congregations of Calvin, Northside and Walter Martin Memorial voted on a proposal for amalgamation, and as a result the Presbytery has taken the following action: Walter Martin congregation is dissolved effective January 31, 1969, and the congregations of Calvin and Northside will amalgamate and relocate on a new site in the developing North West area of the City. This amalgamation and move will take place immediately after the arrival of an appointed Minister. All the congregations involved are vacant at the present time.

Vacancies: At the time of writing there are only two vacancies in the Presbytery, a situation that may well be changed by the time this report is read.

Bekevar Church, Kipling. This self-supporting bilingual (Hungarian) congregation has always had a Hungarian-speaking minister, often assisted by summer students. The arrangements have not always been satisfactory as the younger generation has English as their primary language. The congregation has agreed to a proposal by the Presbytery, whereby an English-speaking minister would be appointed, monthly services and pastoral visitation would be conducted by ministers of the Hungarian congregations in Edmonton or Calgary.

Extension Charge, North West Regina. This Charge formed by amalgamation of Calvin and Northside congregations requires a Minister who can weld the amalgamating groups, and lead them in a new area.

Calls: During 1968 three pastoral charges called the Ministers who were serving them under appointment: The Rev. A. Joshua was inducted into St.

Andrew's, Assiniboia; the Rev. S. M. Barron was inducted into St. Andrew's, Indian Head and St. Andrew's, Qu'Appelle; the Rev. P. G. D. Kerr was inducted into Westminster Church, Estevan and St. Andrew's, Stoughton. The congregation of St. Stephen's, Regina, is proceeding with a call early in 1969. The vacancy in Knox, Yorkton, and Dunleath Church, Dunleath, was filled by Call to the Rev. R. E. Glen, who was inducted in November.

PRESBYTERY OF NORTHERN SASKATCHEWAN

Meath Park-Shipman: The Rev. George Johnston took over on the Meath Park, Shipman field for fall supply until the weather prevented holding services. This field has been serviced very well during the summer months by Miss Wightman, third year Theological Student from Knox College. Mr. Johnston will be ready to assume his responsibilities in this Charge as soon as weather permits.

Carragana: It would seem that the general spirit of the Carragana field has improved over the past two months; the atmosphere of the Church seems a very pleasant one. We have continued the services over this fall and winter with very good attendance at the services. The congregation completed every home visitation and are assuming responsibilities toward the continuation of the services. One of the most encouraging Daily Vacation Bible Schools was conducted in the Carragana Field last Summer by Miss Tory Pollock, Presbytery Student. The people were delighted with the atmosphere and the leadership. It would seem that 1969 will be a good year in the Carragana Field and we hope that we will be able to secure the services of a suitable student for this Summer.

Calvin: We can only say that we are grateful that the Grant Request was sustained, and since it was, we have high hopes for the work in the area, under its present minister, the Rev. E. G. Nelson.

Goforth Memorial, Saskatoon: Goforth has secured the services of the Rev. Peter Gilbert. He has been warmly welcomed by the congregation and is pleased with the support he has received. Of course, they have been plagued by their heavy mortgage burden, and they are eagerly awaiting the answer to their recent request for some adjustments in the mortgage structure.

Biggar: Biggar, does not change very much. The work there is in good condition under the leadership of the Rev. R. J. Bernhardt. The congregation has come to the place where they are finding it more difficult to continue a program of grant reduction. The Presbytery will be asking for the reappointment of Mr. Bernhardt. He is an able servant of the Presbytery, acting as clerk and giving much needed leadership in the Rosetown, Coleville area.

Northwest Saskatchewan (Territorial): Mr. Muth carries on this work and he at least believes that it is important. He does hold services in different points and he has, during the past year held communicant classes in Church membership. To date he does not have an organized congregation other than Wilkie. The Presbytery will be asking for the reappointment of Mr. Muth who is now acting as Moderator of the Presbytery.

St. Andrew's, North Battleford: To date the congregation is still vacant, but in very good spirit. A number in Presbytery have taken turns in supplying the pulpit and on the Sundays in between, we have asked the Rev. Ron Witt to take services.

Coleville: Rev. R. J. Bernhardt from Biggar has been supplying this field and I believe is quietly changing the attitude of the people to a more optimistic view of their Church and community. And now since Rosetown will have a settled Minister, Mr. Bernhardt will have more time to devote to the Coleville area. This is a good arrangement for everyone except Mr. Bernhardt, however, Mr. Bernhardt is quite happy serving the Charge and this year the services are being held throughout the winter with the exception of stormy Sundays.

Mistawasis: A full report goes forward from the Indian Missionaries. The Rev. R. A. Davidson, Presbytery Convener, writes: "Recently I had the privilege of travelling with the Synod Convener of Missions and we visited the Mistawasis

reserve meeting with the Rev. Stephen How and Miss Heather Touranjeau. We were both under the impression that these two people worked together well and we conclude that our work in the area was being well handled. There was a little confusion with regard to the program of Miss Touranjeau. A committee of Presbytery has been set up to work with her, to work out her program. It is very difficult to say what our future Indian Work will be in view of the fact that so many people are trying to beat the problem by talking about it, setting up committees, especially tempting to upset the Indian."

SYNOD OF ALBERTA

PRESBYTERY OF PEACE RIVER

Whitehorse (Yukon): The congregation experienced a "first" in her 18 year history when the incumbent, the Rev. A. J. Aicken, was called and inducted as the minister. This has produced a sense of stability in the congregation as the experience of the Peace River Presbytery is one of short-term ministries.

Fort St. John: The Rev. G. Hunter left at the termination of his O.M. year. This is very disturbing to the congregation and Presbytery. The possibility of changing policy to encourage longer ministries has been discussed by both the Presbytery and Synod.

Dawson Creek: The Rev. A. D. McGillivray was settled in this charge in the summer. In addition to Dawson Creek, he has three preaching points: Chetwynd, Gordondale and Blueberry Mountain, with a Sunday mileage of 230 miles. Mr. McGillivray is also Interim Moderator of Fort St. John, providing a monthly service himself.

Grande Prairie: The work of consolidation of this charge continues under the Rev. W. Lemen, presently in his second year. Grande Prairie is the site of a Junior College and is the distribution centre for the Peace River and North.

Brownvale, Wanham, Belloy and Dixonville: These charges are under the ministry of the Rev. H. Grove. The field has recently been re-aligned and will be the subject of discussion and evaluation in the Spring meeting of Presbytery. The four points cover a round trip of 150 miles.

The Presbytery of Peace River is presently discussing the possibility of work in the new mining town of Ross River. The suggestion of a chaplaincy ministry, in co-operation with other denominations, has been made. The Presbytery also plans to review the transition in the Peace area from rural to urban, the former experiencing decreasing population at an unprecedented rate.

PRESBYTERY OF EDMONTON

Killam-Galahad: The Rev. G. J. Perry left this charge after a four-year ministry. This charge is almost self-sustaining and is predominantly rural.

Chauvin-Wainwright: The Rev. R. D. Wilson commenced his O.M. work here in July. The charge is self-sustaining. The Wainwright congregation and Presbytery are currently discussing the possibility of erecting a new building.

St. Albert, Edmonton: The Rev. W. D. Jarvis continues to minister in this extension charge. The first unit has been erected and was dedicated in October.

South Edmonton: The Rev. A. S. MacDonald was appointed in March. The congregation presently worships in a school, but plans are being laid for building in the near future.

Calvin (Hungarian), Edmonton: The Rev. G. Deze is in his 10th year in this congregation. The basement of the Church has been renovated. The work is proceeding satisfactorily.

PRESBYTERY OF RED DEER

Eckville-Hespero: After five years' ministry, the Rev. K. Knight has accepted a call to Rosetown, Sask. The Presbytery plans to review the Eckville-Hespero charge.

St. Andrew's, Red Deer: The Rev. John Duff is in his third year of ministry to this extension charge. The work is proceeding satisfactorily.

Three Hills, Orkney, Lousana, Trenville: This field is served by Mr. J. A. Morrison, Catechist. The field is the first major re-alignment in the Synod as it crossed Presbytery lines. The re-alignment will be reviewed again in the spring after a two-year experiment. It is a self-supporting charge for a Catechist.

Willowdale, Edwell and Valley Centre: For the past four years this charge has been served by lay supply. The situation will be reviewed in the spring.

Innisfail, Penhold: The Rev. J. C. Rhoad was recently received into the ministry of the Presbyterian Church in Canada (from the Reformed Presbyterian Church) and was recognized in May as minister in this two-point charge.

PRESBYTERY OF CALGARY-MACLEOD

Banff: The Rev. R. S. Burns was appointed and called to St. Paul's in October. The congregation appears to be responding well to his ministry.

Calvin (Hungarian), Calgary: The Rev. B. D. Nagy is in his fourth year in this charge. The congregation found it necessary to revert to aid-receiving status, due to stipend increases. The building debt obligations are being met.

Riverside, Medicine Hat: The Rev. N. Tolliday is in his second year in this congregation. Unfortunately he will be leaving in July, 1969. The grant is being reduced by the congregation.

Fort MacLeod-Jumbo Valley: In July the Rev. G. Peters was settled in this two-point charge, town and rural respectively. It is a self-supporting field.

Bethlen (Hungarian), Lethbridge: After 10 years' ministry here the Rev. L. Vietorisz accepted an appointment to serve in Ontario. The settlement of the charge is under study with the possibility of an English-speaking ministry to undertake extension in the North Lethbridge area and minister to the Bethlen congregation.

Varsity Acres (Calgary): The Rev. Charles Scott has completed two years of ministry in this extension charge established in December 1966. The congregation continues to meet in a school with no immediate building plans. Property has been purchased through a loan from the lending funds. The work is proceeding satisfactorily.

The Rev. R. C. Garvin, Convener of Missions, Synod of Alberta, writes: "On all levels, much concern is expressed regarding short-term ministries by men serving their O.M. appointment. It seems, especially in the Peace River, that one year is all that is served. This naturally is a most disturbing factor to congregations and Presbyteries. Closely associated with this is the high cost of moving men to and from their appointments. This problem would take care of itself if the length of stay were increased."

SYNOD OF BRITISH COLUMBIA

The Synod of British Columbia has had a steady ministry with all the pulpits manned except two. There has been a study made of the "team ministry" and its possible effectiveness for some of our congregations. In Kamloops Presbytery plans are being made for a new Extension Charge and a ministry of two or three days a month has been carried out at Alice Arm some 60 miles north of Prince Rupert. The Vernon congregation is in the process of planning a church building to be built on a new site.

KOOTENAY PRESBYTERY

Mr. E. A. Hircok retired as Catechist of First Church, Nelson. The Rev. Jack Wiseman has become minister of the combined charge of Kinnaird and Nelson and has provided services at New Denver and Slocan, with the minister residing in Nelson.

PRESBYTERY OF VICTORIA

The Presbytery is overturing the General Assembly to have a new name: the Presbytery of Vancouver Island. The Chinese church has been completely renovated and refurnished and Trinity congregation is planning to start its new building in the near future. Knox Church, Sooke, one of the vacancies, has had Mr. Brian Crosby a graduate of St. Andrew's College, Scotland, as temporary pulpit supply. During the year the Rev. D. J. Gillies retired from Knox Church, Sooke, and the active ministry. The Rev. David Stewart, a 1968 graduate of Knox College, is now minister of Knox Church, Port Alberni following Dr. Donald Smith who moved to Medicine Hat, Alberta.

PRESBYTERY OF WESTMINSTER

The new congregation at Coquitlam and the congregation of St. Andrew's-Newton have completed plans and financing for new buildings to be erected this year. St. John's Church, White Rock, welcomed their new minister in July, the Rev. Calvin MacInnis, a 1968 graduate of Knox College.

Presbytery voted the amalgamation of the congregations of St. Columba and St. Matthew's under the name of St. Columba Presbyterian Church and the congregations of Richmond and Marpole with the name Richmond Presbyterian Church. Church Services were discontinued at Garden Village Church. The Presbytery is taking steps to sell the property and declare the congregation disbanded.

During the year the Rev. A. Csiszar became minister of Calvin Church, Vancouver and the Rev. T. Plomp, minister of Richmond Presbyterian Church. The Rev. P. W. Sharren left Robertson Church for St. Andrew's Church, Edmonton, Alberta. The Rev. V. E. Ford retired from the ministry and the Rev. George Hunter is now minister of Knox Church, Sapperton, New Westminster.

The Synod of B.C. appointed the Superintendent of Missions and the convener of Missions official delegates to represent the Synod in dealing with other denominations in establishing Comity agreements.

Rev. W. Oliver Nugent, D.D. Superintendent of Missions writes: "Synod noted that several congregations have overwhelming debts and resolved through its Missions Committee to embark on a campaign to raise funds to lower the indebtedness of congregations within its bounds who are faced with an intolerable financial burden."

CHURCH EXTENSION

Ten church buildings were dedicated or built by Extension Charges during the year, as follows: Christ Church, Wabush, Labrador; St. Columba, Saint John, New Brunswick; St. Mark's, Sherwood, Prince Edward Island; Trinity, Amherstview, Ontario; St. Stephen's, Peterborough; Knox, Welland; St. Vital, Winnipeg; St. Andrew's, Thompson, Manitoba; Braeside, St. Albert, Alberta; Knox, Port Alberni, British Columbia.

Fourteen ministers were appointed to Extension Charges as follows: Rev. P. A. MacDonald, to Iona, Dartmouth; Rev. J. Lockwood, to Chambly and Preville; Rev. T. S. Wood, to Strathcona, Kingston; Rev. J. Roe, to Ajax, Ontario; Rev. W. I. McElwain, to St. Stephen's, Scarborough; Rev. E. J. Briard, to St. David's, Scarborough; Rev. J. R. Arbuthnot, to University Church, Toronto; Rev. John Marshall, to Chalmers, London, Ontario; Rev. R. MacLeod, to St. James, Chatham, Ontario; Rev. K. Boyer, to St. Vital, Winnipeg; Rev. J. Henderson, to Thompson, Manitoba; Rev. R. Robinson, to St. Stephen's, Regina; Rev. Alex MacDonald, to South Edmonton; Rev. David Stewart, to Port Alberni, British Columbia.

The manpower situation improved considerably throughout the year, reflecting the amalgamation of charges together with an actual increase of ministers in the Church.

The director returned from Sabbatical leave in May, and was loaned to the Committee on Life and Mission Project (LAMP) for the latter part of the year, which meant that Dr. Howard Doig and Rev. Alex MacSween carried a heavier load of the administration of Church Extension, and Rev. J. Calvin Elder, as Director of Church Extension for the two Synods in central Ontario also performed many extra tasks 'above the call of duty'.

For much of the year, the Sites and Priorities Committee worked on recommendations towards a policy of financial support for Extension Charges which would take into consideration the capital program as well as the usual grants for stipend, rent and travel of the minister.

Regional workshops for Church Extension ministers were held in Saskatoon, Vancouver, Moncton and Toronto. These proved to be very helpful as the men shared their problems and the practical solutions they had found in their parishes.

INNER CITY MINISTRIES

TYNDALE HOUSE, MONTREAL

The expropriation in the "Little Burgundy" district continues as part of an Urban Renewal Program being carried out by the City of Montreal and the Province of Quebec. The Westminster Central Congregation, United Church of Canada, was invited by the Presbytery of Montreal to worship in the Tyndale Chapel when their building was demolished. Westminster Central accepted the invitation and now shares Sunday morning worship with the Tyndale Congregation. The present plan is to continue on a trial basis over a three year period.

Witness and Work: Tyndale House, in the past, has attempted to meet the social-service needs (recreational, educational, and material) of the inner-city ministry. These needs have always been a part of the neighbourhood house situation. But, to see "mission" in this ministry, required, of necessity, a more personal involvement with the people who are needful — more than just the providing of a community centre for social activity.

Tyndale Neighbourhood House had to arrive at that point in its ministry where its outlook was focussed on becoming a vital witnessing arm "distinctively of the Church", supplementing the inner-city and suburban congregations in their witness and work.

To this end, the staff and volunteers of Tyndale needed "organic relationship" with the leaders and peoples of the congregations in metropolitan Montreal. Such relationships were seen as vital to the evolution of the neighbourhood house from a community centre for social activity to being the church in a particular situation.

This evolution has begun, because the Tyndale House staff realized that they could not function without the congregations, and some of the congregations have seen their need of Tyndale House.

Mission Outreach: The Staff and volunteers of Tyndale Neighbourhood House first agreed upon the basic principle, to augment the social services being provided by other agencies for under-privileged people in the neighbourhood, but with their own vision of ministry in mind. The following is a short resume of how this experimental ministry has begun to take form:

In meeting the ever-present problem of idle school children, recreational facilities and programs are provided weekly during the school year for some 80-90 children between the ages of 6 to 18 years.

During the Summer of 1968, high school and college volunteers organized as the 'Play Corps' under the guidance of the Tyndale staff worked with children in the neighbourhood every Tuesday and Thursday, organizing games and craft-work in the play-ground areas of the community.

School drop-outs at 16 years of age are very common; therefore a tutorial programme was begun for some 25 to 30 Protestant or Roman Catholic children of grades 6-7, who qualified for such help. The University of McGill provided Tyndale with 20-25 student volunteers for this ministry, following the principle of individualized service — a tutor for each child.

A difficult problem facing young people in under-privileged neighbourhoods is that of being accepted as responsible persons, in the matter of earning pocket-money. The Tyndale staff set up a Junior Job Corps, made up of 8-10 boys and girls between the ages of 10-15 years, to provide janitorial service in the Tyndale building. The Corps is paid a few dollars each week for their work; but respect, for a job well done, has been the greater remuneration they have received.

The staff and volunteers at Tyndale are beginning to realize, that to serve others seriously and effectively, is to consider the personal needs and lack of personal concern that so many face in areas of poverty.

Experimental Forms: Two experimental ministries in this matter of inter-personal needs, were undertaken to provide an opportunity for children to learn something of how more advantaged children and their families live. In the Summer of 1968, a few children were guests of middle-class families on vacation. During the Christmas holiday season, 35 children were guests for "a special day" with Presbyterian families of suburban congregations. Reactions showed, that these children gained a sense of self-confidence in these interchanges with Christian families, and the results were two-way.

A full Program Schedule is carried on throughout the week, including day nursery, recreation, hobbies and crafts, study and Christian Education groups.

Grades 1 through 6 are provided group work both recreationally and in crafts during the afternoon after school. These groups are organized regardless of race, colour or creed. Student volunteers from the university assist in this program and are guided by the Tyndale Staff.

The evening groups are designed for all young people 12 to 18 years of age. These groups of young people, both girls and boys, are involved in sports leagues, crafts and field trips.

Lack of space in Tyndale Neighbourhood House for study sessions made it necessary to look elsewhere for classroom space to start a tutoring program. Arrangements were made with the Montreal Day Nursery, across the street for space on Monday and Wednesday evenings.

The evening adult groups usually meet for the purpose of advancing the interests of the people in the neighbourhood, such as the St. Martin's Block Citizens' Committee.

Needs: Some 100 families will move into the Little Burgundy Housing Project on May 1st, 1969. Some of these families will be French speaking. The staff should receive some training in conversational French to establish relationships with these families.

— The Preschool Education Program should be expanded to include an afternoon session. The present morning nursery can only accommodate twenty children. The afternoon program would admit another twenty children which, for the most part, are now on our waiting list. The estimated cost of such an expanded preschool program would be \$2,000 per year.

— The Housing Project that will be opening up in May adjacent to Tyndale House will require the implementation of a Friendship Visitation Program. An additional staff worker will be needed to handle this new program in meeting some 100 families.

— The Summer Program which began last summer with the development of 'Play Corps', will require a male and a female student worker. These young people would give leadership to some 15 to 25 volunteer college and high-school age workers. One of these students should be bilingual.

The Rev. Robert W. Johnson, B.Sc., B.A., is the Executive Director and Ordained Minister at Tyndale Neighbourhood House. Miss Ann Drummond, a graduate of Ewart College, is responsible for the work and training of volunteers in both the nursery and children's groups. Miss Lois Cooke, also a graduate of Ewart College, is responsible for all volunteers and their training, especially with girls' and adult women's groups. Both Miss Drummond and Miss Cooke give leadership to the Christian Education classes that are carried out for the Tyndale Congregation. The volunteers are solicited through the English speaking universities, Montreal Volunteer Bureau and Presbyterian Congregations in Montreal.

The Nursery School Assistant is Mrs. Mary Wand (W.M.S.). The Maintenance and Equipment Supervisor is Mr. James Henry. Mrs. Brusaferrero is the Administering Secretary.

EVANGEL HALL, TORONTO

1,000 bed tickets, 30,000 sandwiches with coffee, socks, shirts, shoes — for many people that summarizes the work at Evangel Hall. While this tip of the iceberg is an important ministry to many, it in no way pictures the whole thrust of the work.

Providing material needs for fold in want is important, yet it is our joy to find that through this demonstration of concern we often find opportunities to meet the real human needs at their deepest level. Of more importance, then, are the hours spent in conversation and counselling. Out of these hours there are evidences of God's hand working in the lives of the men who come to Evangel Hall. Many of these who had never been able to respond to the program of other agencies begin to find a new motive for living.

A new dimension was added to our ministry this year when the Women's Missionary Society (W.D.) acceded to our request for the appointment of Miss Margaret Avison to work among the women and families of this area. Through her untiring work many doors have opened and a much wider ministry is possible at Evangel Hall. The Women's Thursday Fellowship meeting has grown in numbers and in effectiveness. Many have found new friends. Defeated and discouraged mothers have found new hope.

Another new development in our program is the inclusion of Day Therapy Patients from the Ontario Hospital on Queen Street in some of the Evangel Hall outings.

Sunday mornings sees up to 85 boys and girls meeting at Evangel Hall for Sunday School.

Christmas was a busy season. We varied our program a little so that rather than having one large event with 100 men at Christmas dinner we held three dinners with about forty present at each. The first dinner was for women and men, the other two for men only. In each case the group felt a sense of warm fellowship and went away truly refreshed and made glad. Evangel Hall provided food hampers to 30 homes. We held a Toy Sale to which families were invited and at which they chose the gifts for each other. The prices were nominal; the value of the event was without limit.

During the summer season we were pleased to have Mr. Ed. Westendorp on our staff to carry on the work with boys, girls and teenagers. A change of circumstance in September necessitated his resignation. This was accepted with regret. Mr. Westendorp carried on an effective ministry with young people. There were four camping periods at a private cottage on Fox Lake. There were other outings for a day at a time as well as the activities in Evangel Hall.

A volunteer staff still carries on the Teens Club activities on Saturday. In the afternoon Mr. Westendorp meets with a group of boys in a nearby gymnasium. In the evening the Club meets for a varied program at the Hall. Out of this many significant contacts have been made and some of these young people find new values.

Rev. George B. Cunningham, Director, writes: "We could not carry on our ministry without the interest, prayers and support of the many congregations, church groups and individuals who share in the work. The provision of sandwiches, and food, good used clothing, etc. is all basic to our offering friendship and help in the name of Jesus Christ. We say thanks to all who had a part in this work.

"1969 will be even busier. We are hoping to find a worker to further our children's and teens' work. We know there will be many more needy folk at our door. With this in mind we set as a budget objective \$30,420. The continued willing, generous support of everyone will be required if we are to fulfil the ministry God has opened up to us at 573 Queen Street West."

CHINESE MINISTRIES

MONTREAL

Chinese Church and Community Centre: The work here continues to grow and expand as more Chinese families arrive in Montreal, and the need for larger accommodations than our present building offers is apparent. Every inch of space is occupied on a Sunday.

In 1968 our main emphasis was on Youth Work — how we could best prepare a solid foundation on which our youth could build their lives so that they can take their rightful place in the church and community as Christian leaders.

Under dedicated Christian leadership the Youth Fellowship Group has increased its membership and now has three sections: Junior, Intermediate and Senior. The boys and girls take an active part in the planning and conducting of their meetings which are varied and interesting. They have formed a Youth Choir and have sung at hospitals and Convalescent Homes. The Annual Summer Bible Study Camp was held again at Cedar Lodge in Memphramagog. Some of our girls took part in the opening of "Man and His World." On Canada Day they performed several classical and folk dances. They also performed at the Christian Pavilion.

Chinese classes were held twice a week throughout the school year. Parents are most diligent in seeing that their children maintain their language and are aware of their long and vivid culture. Visitation is an important part of the Chinese school. This gives our workers the opportunity of bringing the gospel into the homes for the very first time.

Our week-day Kindergarten had a very busy and happy year. The children have shown a keen interest and their response has been very gratifying. The program was divided equally in Chinese and English. The children are taught to sing hymns and litle songs, they hear Bible and other stories. They learn to play and share together. The majority of the children are from non-Christian homes and thus visitation plays a very important part of our work.

Our weekly prayer meeting continued to be a great blessing to all who attend. Many earnest and sincere prayers are offered and many have been answered. The Family meetings in the homes of our members has been another source of blessing throughout 1968. Here friends and neighbours gather together to hear God's Word and for a time of fellowship and friendship within a Christian atmosphere.

English classes are held every Sunday afternoon to help newcomers. There is a short time of worship prior to their lessons. The most busy and time-consuming work here is the social work. During the week there is a constant stream of people seeking help and advice of one kind or another.

In July, The National Conference of Christian Work among the Chinese in America concluded in Montreal and we had the privilege of acting as host to the delegates. Later on in July we again acted as host to a visiting Chinese Christian Chorale Group comprising of dedicated and talented young men and women.

In December we were asked to participate in the Museum of Fine Art, 'Noel 68.' Later in December we issued our first Christmas news bulletin. Our Congregational Christmas Concert helped in a very meaningful way to prepare our hearts and our minds to celebrate the Christmas season in a more Christian way than perhaps we have in the past years. All age groups took part from tiny tots to the adults either in song or plays or dancing. The minister, Rev. Paul S. Chan, writes "During the year we lost two long and faithful elders. We also lost another faithful member, who for many years was a member of the Board. Two very active Board members and their families moved away from Montreal and these people are missed too."

VANCOUVER

Services were held twice every Sunday for the entire year. The evening worship was conducted in the Cantonese language. Morning services are in both English and Chinese. The average attendance at the morning service is 100.

Five Communion services were held; there were nine new members during the year; six of these were received on confession of faith. There were six adult baptisms and three children of believing parents were baptized. Five of these new members are young men. Prayer meeting and Bible study has been conducted on Thursday evenings.

The *Women's Missionary Society* had the honour of being hostess to the opening meeting of the B.C. Synodical in the Spring. This gave friends from all over the province an opportunity to see the Chinese Church and meet the workers.

There were three youth groups carrying on regular meetings and doing a splendid job of helping in the work of the church. They have painted the gymnasium, cleaned windows in the church, decorated for Christmas and many other things. They have a fund to buy a new organ for the Sanctuary. To further this project they put on a Winter Carnival at which they realized more than \$300.

The Church School has classes for all ages from Cradle Roll to adult and they are conducted in both languages for the convenience of newcomers and Canadian-born students. A Daily Vacational Bible School was held in July at which more than 60 young folk were given instruction in Christian truths.

About 31 children attend the Chinese School every day and about 40 on Saturday mornings. Religious instruction is given in their regular lessons but on Friday afternoons the Chinese School pupils become the Explorer and C.O.C. groups.

Day-care: This is a service of our Chinese Church to the Chinese Community. There are many families among our people whose income makes it necessary for both parents to work. The Day-care is a provision for the care of children from such families. Those who can, pay a fee but some are not able.

Social Welfare: There is a great deal of need for help these days among our Chinese people. We try to help where we can. One family was given special help, financial and otherwise when a new baby was expected and the father was unable to get suitable work. The father is an earnest Christian and the mother became convinced of the reality of Christ's love when she saw how the church came to their aid.

Volunteers: Among the many reasons for thanksgiving not least is the spirit of willingness to work and co-operate among our members. Four young women have managed to publish a paper called "Church News." This is entirely voluntary and entails an enormous amount of work. It is very useful and informative. There is a visiting team too that goes out once or twice a week to call on non-attenders. This is composed of the minister, one elder and Miss Susan Yeung.

Rev. Andrew M. L. Ng, minister, writes: "In June 1968, the congregation had an evening service and reception honouring Miss Ruth Yeandle at the time of her retirement from full time work in our midst. Members of Presbytery and Synod and W.M.S. Presbyterial and Synodical joined with some two hundred other friends—

many of whom had been Miss Yeandle's students, to share in giving thanks for this faithful servant."

WINDSOR

Pastoring and preaching have captured the attention of the Chinese community gradually. Worship Services were held each Sunday at 2 p.m. The Presbyterian Chinese Language School was the major work of the missionary. There were forty-two students.

The Church Bi-weekly Bulletin was published and sent to all Chinese families in the city and to some abroad with an increase of eighty copies to the 60 Chinese students of the University of Windsor and the new immigrant families. This kept continuous contact with all families as well as individuals. Chinese Film showing was another favourite project welcomed by the majority of the Chinese community.

Rev. James Ko, minister, writes: "I was happy to see a group of students of the University of Windsor come to attend the Chinese worship service regularly since August. I am planning to make a closer contact with this group."

SUDBURY

Rev. Siu-Man Lee, minister, writes: "Generally speaking there is little change from last year. We are still having worship and Bible study twice a month on Saturday afternoons at the Common Room of Knox Church.

"As I reported last year, a common interest of the parents is to have a Chinese school like those in Windsor or Toronto. Since I cannot find any able person to help in this venture I will start this myself having only one class. The Kirk Session of Knox Presbyterian Church gave us permission to use their facilities Tuesday and Saturday afternoons. This will start as soon as the materials arrive from Hong Kong. The idea of the school is not only to teach the children Chinese but it will also serve as a means to reach the parents.

"Since we are not aiming to have a separate 'congregation' we will not try to follow the example of the Chinese work in Toronto. Rather we will try to follow the policy carried on in Windsor. At the present time they have a C.W.A. in Knox Church. I think it would be better if they have a Chinese Department so I can work with the men as well as the women. Particularly in the time when the Chinese Community Centre will soon be removed through the Urban Renewal Scheme in March, 1969."

TORONTO

In 1967, the congregation had an increase of 30 percent of annual income, and the average Sunday service attendance from about 180 increased to 273. In 1968, our financial increase is 12 percent and average attendance 297. Both are all record high in the congregation's history.

Dr. David Chan, minister, writes: "This congregation is active. Many kinds of activities going on all the year round, such as church picnic, bazaar, concerts, choral, ladies' spring festival, spring tea, Easter sun-rise service, Christmas candle-light service, New Year's Eve watchnight service and so on; others are nursery school, church school, Chinese School, English adult day classes and so on. Over 10 committees formed, some are standing committees, other study committees. Practically every Sunday afternoon we have a meeting going on in the conference room. To cope with our problems and needs, five more elders were elected and ordained on March 8, 1968 to serve the congregation."

VICTORIA

In 1968 eight persons were received into the church. Four children were baptized as well as three infants.

A new piano was presented to the church by Mr. Wong Sing's family in memory of their parents and was dedicated in March. In December we also dedicated two brass offering plates in memory of Mrs. Elizabeth Lee Woo, by her daughter, Mrs. Verna Tam.

Rev. Edward Ling, minister, writes: "I cannot thank God enough for His care of this church during my ministry for the past two years. The congregation is very kind to both my wife and myself."

Miss Catherine Watson, Deaconess, writes: "The kindergarten continued to function thanks to the volunteering of many mothers and friends. The Sunday School studied Bible stories and truths. The teachers met regularly for study and advanced preparation. The Children of the Church, Explorers, and The Followers, held meetings monthly studying Missions and Christian truths. They joined together for the children's World Day of Prayer Service when Trinity Explorers joined them for the Service and the Fellowship Hour following. Some girls and mothers visited the Trinity Explorers at their Afternoon Tea.

"The Vacation Church School held in the afternoons for two weeks in July had 68 enrolled with many volunteer leaders and helpers. Miss Jessie Horne, a student deaconess, was with the Juniors. A hundred and five gathered for the Closing when the Children shared what they had learned."

Sunday attendance: average about 60-70, children about 30. CPYPS, about 20 meet at the Church every Friday evening. Young Women's Group, about 12-15, meet once a month in their homes. W.M.S., about 20 meet once a month at the church. About 36 studied in the English classes each morning.

HUNGARIAN MINISTRIES

PLEASANT RIDGE CHURCH, BRANTFORD

The main concern during 1968 was to keep, and to bring to good order, what we still have. It meant to retain the present membership, to explain to them the obligations that are expected from any Christian and from any Christian church, to inform the Board of Managers of its duties, to have a responsible and correct way of handling the finances, to bring the Session's work to a creative handling of the congregation's affairs.

To all these things the congregation has reacted favourably, however, at times it is difficult to bring our older members to the understanding of the ways which the Church's life is conducted in Canada. The majority of the congregation were not active members of the Reformed Church in Hungary. Therefore they do not have the same experience — in fact they have none! — in church life and affairs. It is only regrettable that in some cases — very little if any, effort has been made during the past few decades, for the "Christian education" of these people. The basic problem in this regard in our Canadian ethnic congregations is again, that the majority of their members had never a first-hand experience in the church's life.

The Session now is working in Committees to study and recommend. Only in this way was it possible to revise the Communion Roll. For the first time in our church the Pledge was introduced and carried out. The Board of Managers works splendidly. Actually the Board has recommended to the Session the introduction of the Pledge. The handling of financial affairs is now correct and up-to-date. The Board informs the congregation quarterly in a financial statement. The much needed repairs around the church were completed and the Manse has been equipped with a brand new washing machine. We owe it to the Board's work mainly, that the income of the congregation has reached an all-time peak, and that this was three times as much as it was five years ago.

A new Superintendent of the Church School was appointed in 1968, and through his efforts and co-operation all the outstanding debts of the school — dating back to

1966, were cleared up by the end of the year. As it is now, the School can be regarded as self-supporting. By introducing the envelope-offerings in the School, the amount of offerings has increased. We have maintained the parallel-School, having the lessons during the 10 and 11 a.m. services respectively. There is also a Sunday School pianist appointed.

Rev. S. K. Meszaros, the minister writes re the possibility of outreach into the English-speaking community. "No major change was taking place during the year. The picture is the same as last year. In a broader sense we are a part of the over-all situation, locally it looks like we have lost what we have never had, meaning that the community surrounding our church can not be regarded as a potential at this time."

CALGARY

The Rev. B. D. Nagy, minister, writes: "May I mention my broad experience in serving among my own people in Hungary, West-Germany, Brazil, Argentina and Uruguay. I served among them not only as a minister, but as a religious professor also. I mention this, because by comparing the Hungarians of the above countries to the Hungarians in our congregation, I find an important difference. It is mainly that the people here are more kindly inclined to the commercial prosperity of life and less careful about the spiritual matters.

"The founders of our Church came over to Canada about 40-60 years ago. With a major effort, in a relatively short time, they built up their own homes and the Church. Becoming the leaders of the Church, they never reached the spiritual level as they, I think, ought to be, and this caused certain problems.

"The second group of the new-comers arrived in the year 1957. First of all they found this "new kind of people" in the Church whom they did not really like. Secondly they got more interested in the outside world than the founders at the first time. So possibly the true picture is now that the Church could get along financially, especially with the help of the Presbyterian Church in Canada. But the spiritual work and leadership — I could say — only burdens me and my family in the Church.

"In spite of this situation, I was able to visit 70 families, 145 sick people and held 25 Bible-hours and 142 devotions in 1968. The only encouraging sign of our Church life is the slowly, but gradually inclining progress in our Saturday-school. In 1968 we had about 30 children (3 to 14 years old) in the school. If we could keep up this fruitful work, we will find a core of the next generation and leaders of the Church."

DELHI, ONTARIO

The General Board of Missions sent Dr. L. Borsay to Delhi to organize the Hungarians who originally belonged to the Reformed Church in Hungary. The first church service was held on Christmas Day in 1948. The new congregation was officially established in 1949. The congregation became self-supporting in 1956. In the same year Dr. L. Borsay departed to the U.S.A., and since then Dr. L. S. Pandy who was called to the post by the congregation has been minister. The new sanctuary was dedicated in July 1951, and the Christian Education addition in 1966.

Since 1964, the worship service has been regularly held in English also. It was thought that the Presbyterians of the town who descended from other than Hungarian stock, would gradually join the congregation. But as of today, only the second and third generation Hungarians and mixed families are participating in English activities. In Delhi, there are many Presbyterians, who are not Hungarian but have either joined the United Church or they are attending the Presbyterian services in neighbouring towns. That which had been experienced by other Hungarian congregations, was confirmed in Delhi: Canadian Presbyterians can conceive of integration only if and when the members of other ethnic groups join them individually, relinquishing completely their cultural background.

Mainly for this reason, the congregation voted to return to the Hungarian method of church government, which is based on term eldership, beginning January 1969. According to this system, the congregation has one governing body, and one third of this board is up for re-election each year. The congregation prefers this system, not only because it is Hungarian, but also because it is more practical and efficient.

Though the congregation receives all kinds of encouragement and aid from Presbytery it still seems sometimes that it may be moving away from Canadian Presbyterianism, partly because the authorities of the Church discard all suggestions which would help the Hungarian congregations become a more integral part of the Church, or accept other suggestions purporting to be for this purpose. The congregation is not encouraged either, by the fact that the Board of Missions has no policy regarding ethnic work, and for the emerging problems have only "ad hoc" solutions. Another sad experience of the congregation has been that, all too often, on questions concerning the Hungarians, the Hungarians themselves have not even been consulted.

"Almost all members of the congregation (175) are farmers, who live within a 25 mile radius and come together for the service every Sunday. This group will tend to decrease, as is already happening, rather than increase, as the younger generation is moving away to the city. Thus, as members pass away, they will not be replaced. Therefore, this congregation has approximately ten to fifteen more years of stable existence, beyond which its future is uncertain." So writes the minister, Rev. Laszlo S. Pandy, Ph.D.

VANCOUVER

The Rev. Attila Csiszar, reviews the work: "The Mission Board appointed me as minister of the Vancouver Calvin Presbyterian Church in January, 1968. With God's help, I am able to report a successful and progressive year.

"We held Sunday and Holiday morning services at which total attendance was 3,607. We held 53 services. Average: 68. We have held Bible Study on 44 occasions in the Church Building. Total attendance: 395, with the average: 9.

We held 10 evening services with total attendance: 413.

We held family nights three times. This past year accompanied by various programs. The average attendance for these nights was: 95.

We have served the Lord's Supper on six occasions. The number of participants was: 326, with the average: 55.

Four children have been baptized. Every second Tuesday confirmation hours were held.

I have made visits in homes and hospitals: 247. The elders of the congregation gave me a tremendous amount of help in organization and mission work. During my three week stay in hospital in August, they alternated in substituting for services.

Through Rev. Dr. W. O. Nugent, the Superintendent of Missions, we received a manse from the Mission Board starting January 1969, for which I would like to express my great gratitude in the name of my family."

EDMONTON

The year 1968 was a peaceful and a prosperous one for Calvin Church. The present minister who was appointed by the Board to this congregation ten years ago and re-appointed every year by the request of the Presbytery is as happy with the results as the members of the congregation. Ten years ago the church's annual income was \$1,300; last year we exceeded the \$10,000 mark, including of course, congregational, Building Fund, N.D.F. and Ladies' Aid.

The church attendance has improved and with it, of course, the offerings. We had 43 children enrolled in the Sunday School, and besides this 18 children regularly

take Hungarian courses in school held Saturdays. In the beginning of December we organized our Youth group. The Ladies' Aid have been busy all through the year. The Session had ten meetings as did the Board.

With voluntary work we redecorated and remodelled the church's basement, at a cost of \$800 and we spent \$431 buying new chairs.

An Every Person Canvass was held, as always, in the last two weeks of March.

HAMILTON

"The old manse was in need of major repairs, so it was sold and a smaller but newer one purchased and partially furnished by the church funds.

"I have put in my resignation as full time minister and we are hoping for a new minister by September 1969.

"We have a flourishing Sunday School; a fairly active Young Peoples, and a very strong Couples' Club who are preparing to take over the reins of leadership in the near future." Eugene Ruzsa, minister.

OTTAWA

In 1968 divine worship was held 56 times in Ottawa and in Kingston on 10 occasions. The services were attended by 1,122 adults, thus the average attendance amounted to 20 persons over 12 years of age, in Ottawa. In Kingston the average attendance was 12 adults. In Ottawa the Sunday School enrolment was 12 children and the average attendance was eight.

Two young adults attended communicant class and by confession were received as members in full communion. Holy Communion was celebrated on five occasions with 22 average participation. Five times in Kingston with 10 participants.

On Sunday evenings special gatherings were held eight times with religious films. The approximate average attendance was 40. In the wider social life of the Hungarian community the congregation was actively involved in the observance of two holidays and provided leadership. These holiday programs were attended by more than 200 persons at each time. In the first half of the year regular mid-week devotions and Bible studies were held on Wednesday evenings with average attendance of seven.

An interdenominational "Hungarian-school" was conducted on Saturday mornings, with an average of 22 pupils. At present a Boy Scout group is being organized. Church members in full communion in Ottawa are 46; in Kingston 12. This means 22 families in Ottawa and 8 in Kingston. Our mailing list includes 110 names in Ottawa.

Rev. Paul Mezo is the minister.

FIRST CHURCH, TORONTO

1968 was the first full year that the congregation spent in the building purchased in 1967. It was a year of spiritual and financial growth. Members and adherents feel more obligated and show concern about the remaining debt and there was no difficulty to fulfill the commitment of the monthly mortgage payments.

It was a time when the Elders and the whole Kirk Session accepted responsibility of leadership that befits a larger congregation. The Session established a Planning Committee to examine the needs of the congregation as well as the Hungarian Reformed population in Metropolitan Toronto and nearby areas. One of the first and immediate plans of the Session was to request the Mission Board to help us to get a co-pastor.

Though the membership did not increase rapidly this year, more and more people attend Sunday services. Average attendance was 129 people.

Activities inside the congregation were extended. Besides the "Karolyi Zsuzsanna" Ladies Aid Society another group, the "Molnar Maria" Missionary Society was organized in the fall. The 21st Century Club was established for our young people. Hungarian Language school is held on Saturdays. Sunday School is conducted regularly.

In 1968 we had a number of large expenditures. We erected a new fence around the property, extended and prepared for black top the parking area and the greatest expense was putting a new roof on the whole building. The congregation met these expenses with enthusiasm.

The minister, Rev. Ed. Seress is active and honoured among the Hungarian Community of Metropolitan Toronto.

OSHAWA

Services were held twice a month regularly in Knox Church, with variable attendance between 12-45. The services are conducted by the minister of First Hungarian Church, Toronto. Those who attend the services come from Oshawa, Newcastle, and Peterborough. This congregation can be doubled if more pastoral care could be provided for them.

"NEW LIFE": CANADIAN HUNGARIAN PRESBYTERIAN PERIODICAL

The editor, Rev. L. Vietorisz, writes: "I am in continuous contact with the European Hungarian Evangelistic Publishers (in Holland, Germany, Austria), so I can obtain from time to time tracts and other smaller publications to satisfy our people's spiritual needs in their own language.

"The New Life is really a missionary work among our Hungarian people not only in Canada, but in Europe (in old age homes, refugee camps, etc.) and in Hungary, too. We are sending continuously about one hundred copies into Hungary. Though we could not check the delivery service, I used to get letters in which they let me know gladly, that they received the paper.

"We are grateful that with the help of our Mission Board and other sources, we can continue this missionary endeavour among our Hungarian people in this country and all over the world."

ABBOTSFORD, B.C.

The congregation of Calvin Church, Abbotsford, is served by the Rev. Robert Pollock who is Moderator of the Session. The congregation has two sections both represented in the session by elders but with separate Boards of Managers.

The Hungarian Section is served by the Reverend S. Meszaros, a retired minister of the Reformed Church of Hungary as weekly pulpit supply. This arrangement began in January 1966. Under this arrangement the ministry of Mr. Meszaros has been quite acceptable. Communion services were conducted by the Moderator of Session, Mr. R. M. Pollock five times with an average attendance of 27 participating. The Hungarian Section of the congregation has 36 names on the Communion Roll for a total of 105 members for Calvin Church, Abbotsford, which is part of the Pastoral charge of Abbotsford-Murrayville.

INDIANS OF CANADA

ST. PAUL'S SIOUX VILLAGE

Miss Sheina B. Smith was appointed to Indian Work, and reports: "I arrived in Portage on September 15th, and started work almost immediately.

"There are approximately 56 adults, and 85 children. Twenty-five of the children attend residential school therefore do not live at home. Thirty-six of the

remaining children are under school age. Five of these attend kindergarten in town. The remaining 24 school age children also attend school in town.

"The week following my appointment here, five of the teenagers at the village volunteered to clean out the church building. We were then able to use the Church basement for group activity. The basement was unfinished concrete and looked rather bleak even after the washing and scrubbing. The young people volunteered to paint it. The paint for the first coat was secured and 12 teenage boys and girls painted with a will to the accompaniment of 'pop' records.

"Since the completion of the renovations I have a regular coffee house meeting which is well attended by the children 11 years and over. They meet on Tuesday and Thursday evenings. There is table tennis for recreation and others play cards and make jigsaw puzzles. There are soft drinks available for 15c. and they play their records on a little machine secured for us by Dr. D. Warne when he visited us in October.

"On October 10th a pre-school class was begun. This class meets once a week and is attended regularly by the children. Average attendance is six.

"An attempt was also made to start a ladies group, a study group for school children, and an explorer group. The latter got under way in November. This group is for children age 6-10 and has an average attendance of 10, and is very enthusiastic. They enjoy handcrafts and playing games.

"Since I took over the responsibility for Church services on October 6th, there has been no attendance. The plans for the future include a sewing class for women, and films for the family. I feel that through visitation and group activity there may eventually be interest shown in church services, at present I am not too concerned about the lack of response to worship. It takes a long time to gain the confidence of the people and thus plans are not made overnight.

"There are several problems at the village, one is the fighting and drinking that takes place frequently. There is the problem with the church being broken into. This happens at least once a week.

"I should like to conclude this report by indicating that my feeling in regard to team ministry is unchanged. I am more than ever convinced that a joint appointment would be much more successful in working in an Indian community."

McKENZIE PORTAGE

Worship services were held on most Sundays. The sacraments were observed on two occasions — Easter and mid-June, taking the form of a common meal service on both occasions.

The Trailer-Chapel continued to serve the purpose very adequately proving to be warm and of a suitable size. The only problems encountered were: some leakage around one door and mice eating some of the wires to the thermostat control! A simple congregational budget was drawn up. Steps were initiated to select local persons to assist in the management of local Church affairs such as banking and other Board of Managers work. Although the budget was not met, it did provide some incentive toward assuming local responsibility.

Attendance at services proved to be quite regular. Some families seemed to develop a more regular pattern of Church going and Sunday observance. The Today's English Version was used extensively in services and groups. Some persons came forward to purchase their own copies at the special rate of 37c. per copy (half the normal rate as is Canadian Bible Society practice for Indians and Eskimos).

The Explorers group suffered from lack of numbers and from a wide age spread. Few children are left on the reserve. However, a program continued on Saturday mornings and included various special outings climaxing in a day trip to Winnipeg.

During most of the year, filmstrips were used as discussion starters. Subjects covered both Biblical events as well as such topics as drugs, juveniles in cities

(Never A Saint), personal matters and family matters (living together, where to turn for advice and counselling), money management. The members were asked whether or not they desired this form of presentation and the answer was in the affirmative after discussion among themselves in their own language.

One lady from the reserve continued to work faithfully at the Alcohol and Drug Addiction Foundation Way Station in downtown Kenora. Her Christian witness is invaluable in such a secular setting.

Craft work has developed as a result of a commercial craft outlet opening on a regular basis in downtown Kenora. Such an opportunity provides another source of income to women and families. Many cases of counselling and aid arose.

Morale among students and parents of those attending Keewatin Public School was not as high as desired. Many complained about rudeness of the Keewatin children. The missionary continued to work closely with Cecilia Jeffrey residence concerning children coming from McKenzie Portage.

Rev. Raymond E. Glen, concludes his report: "As to the future, some areas of possible emphasis are:

- to bring about a closer connection between First Church, Kenora and McKenzie Portage by establishing one session and one congregation with two preaching points.
- to work with the band to explore development of tourist potential on the McKenzie Portage portion of the Rat Portage reserve.
- with new fishing legislation enacted by Parliament, to promote fishing as a livelihood especially with a filleting plant in Keewatin.
- likewise with wild rice and to encourage some form of marketing board to prevent a slump in the trade.
- to provide some simple form of nursery school to prepare children for kindergarten.
- to assist children to attend Red Cross swimming classes to get credit for the skills they already have and to develop swimming abilities.
- to provide more opportunities for young couples and adults from the reserve to meet persons of their own ages in town to learn of common problems and so that both might learn of one another and of the areas of conflict.
- to assist and encourage development of a Home and School program at the Keewatin Public School.
- to revive the former practice of family nights of music and song, films, to counteract the lack of social life on the reserve.
- to continue exploring mediums of worship convivial to the local citizenry — e.g. guitar music, drums.

BIRDTAIL

Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Hall left this charge at the end of September 1968 to take over as house parents at Prince Albert Fellowship House. Since October, Rev. Larry Jackson has been conducting a service on Sunday evenings at Birdtail (average attendance: 21).

Some progress has been made on the Rink, for which materials were provided by a church in Ontario. The location was settled on, close to the hydro, the ground was levelled by the municipal grader, and most of the posts are in. However, winter was upon us, and once again it is not completed for use. A well must be dug to obtain the water, lights erected, and the sides put up.

A gift of \$24.00 was provided, and the same amount for the Pipestone Reserve, "to be used as you deem fit for your work among the Indian people." This was used to purchase 50 New Testaments (Today's English Version) for each reserve (enough for each family and more), plus 100 scripture portions (T.E.V.) for each of these two reserves.

Again, clothing was generously supplied by the W.M.S. Presbyterials in Ontario.

SHOAL LAKE

Last Spring, some repairs were made to the badly damaged Mary Magdalene Church on the Shoal Lake reserve. The broken windows were replaced with fibre glass. As soon as this had been done and the debris cleaned up, we held a re-opening service in the Church. It was a great event, the boys' choir from Cecilia Jeffrey School came down. Thirty people turned out from the reserve, and there were also some visitors. This was the first service held in our church after almost two years.

In July, the young people from the Synod of Hamilton and London "Operation Ojibway" stayed in the church and made valuable contacts with the young people on the reserve. They encouraged them to paint coloured designs on the fibre glass windows, some of the pictures were Indian designs. They are very artistic. Some of the designs were made by the very young men who just before Christmas 1967 broke the original coloured glass windows of the church. The highlight of the month of August was the open air service of the pioneer camp, held in front of our church building.

During October we had our first baptismal service at Mary Magdalene Church. At that service we presented one of the young men with a snare drum. It was his and his friends' desire to form a music band. Our presentation of the snare drum at this service helped to make their dream come true.

There were no further break-ins since early October, not even by small children. Some articles belonging to the church which were removed during the vandalism have been discreetly returned. At the moment, our church building is being treated with respect.

We held our Christmas Communion service and Christmas party at the new school on the reserve. During the service, Christmas hymns were played by the new band, the same five boys who before (the previous Christmas) had broken into our church and caused much damage.

WHITEFISH BAY

The Rev. George Telcs, is in charge of the work at Shoal Lake and Whitefish Bay. He writes: "At Whitefish Bay I continued to teach religion at the Father Moss School at Sioux Narrows, grades 6-8. This term it has been more rewarding. The principal asked the parents to sign a paper stating their choice as to whether they wished their children to attend Catholic or Protestant classes or no religion class at all. As a result, I have had this term five pupils from Whitefish Bay, six from Sabaskong and three non-Indian children. I am glad that they are there because of their own choice.

"The work of 'Operation Ojibway' by the young people from the Synod of Hamilton and London was very much appreciated on the Whitefish reserve.

"I am very grateful to the Mission Board for my language course in Cree at the extension class of the University of Manitoba. It was a great help to me for it gave me an excellent grounding in the Algonquin grammar so essential for the understanding of Ojibway. Here in Kenora, my wife and I enrolled in an Ojibway language class at the local high school. I am greatly encouraged in my efforts by my Indian friends both in Shoal Lake and Whitefish Bay. It is especially gratifying to me during my hospital visits when talking to elderly people or small children who have little English.

"To the very poor such as mothers widowed or otherwise alone with children and on welfare, we give blankets and clothing as the need arises, also to the elderly who have very little money. New mothers receive some items of new clothing for their baby as a gift from our mission. We were able to give gifts of hand-knitted mitts, hats and scarves to the children at Christmas, as well as toys sent to us by friends in the W.M.S. It has all been very helpful indeed in our difficult but not unrewarding work."

MISTAWASIS

One of the elders from Mistawasis attended the Christian Education Conference in Fort Qu'Appelle. He was asked to take part in the closing service of the conference, and he brought back to the reserve the wonderful sense of fellowship and insight of the church work. Two children went to the church camp.

The Rev. Stephen How, Missionary in Charge at Mistawasis, Crutwell, and Wahpeton, describes some of his activities and conditions on the reserve: "One of the religious activities which bring many people together is a funeral service and the three-night wake which precedes it. Relatives and friends gather together for three days and three nights singing hymns, prayers, some sermons, a lot of reminiscences, with much food being served. You would meet most of the parishioners there and also some long lost friends. It is not so much condoning the old tribal custom as it is to cope with the situation and grasp an opportunity to communicate and preach. Usually I attend the wake late in the evening and come back around the small hours of the morning. During winter season, opening the grave is very hard and it is regarded as the job of the Board of Managers. Sometimes it takes several men, 2-3 days burning cords of wood and old tires, to soften the ground in order to open a grave.

"On the reserves one does not hear so much about politics or Red Power movement, or cries about social injustice. One hears these from Indians and Metis in urban settings. As the president of the Prince Albert Indian and Metis Friendship Centre, I have come to observe some of their predicaments and plights.

"Most of our people in Mistawasis reserve have received new homes. Now every home has electricity, and new appliances. And yet most of them remain as poor as ever. The improvement of their living condition does not mean an improvement in their income. There remains the problem of acute unemployment among them. Although we have 48 sections of land in Mistawasis, only a few Indian families are taking farming seriously. The rich get more rich and the poor remain the same. Some Indians venture to the urban settings. Contrary to their expectations, they spend a great deal of time and energy hunting for shelter, job, friendship and acceptance in the strange milieu, so that by the time they settle down they are spent and enervated and lonely for the reserve.

During the winter we used the Community Hall to hold services, because the road to the church was not open. Our four elders, with the exception of Samuel Dreaver are in their 70's and 80's. Most of the Board of Managers do not have any permanent jobs and they are constantly moving whenever they can get whatever meager menial jobs are available. Most of our families are receiving social welfare. But they do their best to support our church under these circumstances. The congregation agrees to accept the budget allocation of \$225 for 1969 and pay toward minister's stipend \$120 annually."

CRUTWELL

Crutwell continues to be the jumping-board for some Indian people from the reserves to city. It provides more work opportunities by being closer to the city but the living condition and atmosphere is that of the reserves. Except for a few families from Mistawasis, most of them have other church affiliations. Although their relationship with the Presbyterian Church is a congenial one, they are not deep-rooted. In Crutwell there is a very strong A.A. movement. They are doing wonderful work among their own people. For 1969 the congregation accepted the budget allocation of \$40.

WAHPETON

The band council of Wahpeton wired the Church so that there is illumination for some evening meetings. This is the desire of the people. Some band meetings were held in the church, including 4-H Club. There are only 12 families in Wahpeton.

At present only 10 families are residing on the reserve. There are about 60 children and most of them are staying at the residential schools. Wahpeton is a little over five sections of land and farming situations are not very good although they try very hard. They are not treaty Indians though they enjoy most of the treaty rights except the annual treaty money of \$5.00 per person.

Mr. How writes: "During the summer months we had good vacation Bible Schools at each point of the field with the help of a student deaconess. Since the end of August, we have had a deaconess working full time for the Indian Mission in this province. She has given us an impetus in the field of Christian Education. During the Advent Season we experimented in pulpit exchange with Rev. G. Ahenakew of Whitefish, Sask. He is an Anglican minister of Cree ancestry. It was a gratifying experience. This year we have received the help from other denominations as well as from some bands and community people to make the Christmas a really unifying fellowship and happy event."

KENORA FELLOWSHIP CENTRE

The Centre must report another year of usefulness to the many people who make this Centre a 'home away from home'. The main function of the Centre has been unchanged during the last year. Both the nature and habits of the people who use the Centre and also the limitation of space are the main reasons for any significant change in program.

The number of people who use the *Hostel facilities* would indicate that this part of the operation is very necessary. There is no other accommodation in Kenora. One other Boarding house which has operated in the past is now for sale. Letters of recognition have been received from the various agencies and in them it is noted that not only the accommodation but the interest in the people is most important, and could not be obtained from any other source.

The volume of business handled in the Clothing Department is very large. Almost every day someone in the community delivers a box or two of clothing items to the Centre or phones requesting a pick-up at their home. This also is a very worthwhile part of the ministry. A second hand Co-op store which was started in the Whitedog Reserve (under the watchful eye of the Christian Atheism Prophet) received its first supply of clothing from the Kenora Fellowship Centre. Many transients and other destitute people have been assisted by the clothing department. All money from this department is placed in the Reserve Fund and used for relief work for the Indian people. Money is paid to Indian women for sorting and straightening the clothes room.

A considerable amount of counselling has been done during the year. It is difficult to assess the value of these personal interviews, but some problems have been resolved and in many other cases the 'talking it out' process has been most beneficial. This is very noticeable in the Jail visiting, especially with those contemplating a long prison term — the request for that little visit week by week indicates that there is a need for some words of consolation or hope.

Donations to the Centre are used as designated. A Redevelopment Fund has been set up by the Board for furnishings or similar items. The Board is made up of a very representative body of men. Some of these are most conscientious and are faithful in their attendance at the meetings and in the other tasks assigned to them. There is, however, a need for some greater challenge to these men. Some of the men are quite conscious of this and are continually trying to devise ways by which there will be more involvement. It seems quite difficult to get Indian people involved in the work of the Board. There are very few who reside in the town or the Reserves close who would be interested. During the year we placed a suggestion box in the Centre but the few notes received referred mainly to the lack of space and the need for additional overnight accommodation.

In September, Mr. Scott, our Staff assistant, suffered a heart attack and did not return to work. In December, he tendered his resignation.

The total number of people using the Centre this year—59,200. People staying overnight: Men, 949; Women, 1,784; Children, 1,016. The Canteen continues to be very popular and necessary.

Mr. S. T. Robinson, the Director of the Centre, writes: "The Centre has been used to capacity. Many nights people have been turned away for lack of dormitory space. Most weekends there are nights when we have to use the chesterfields in the living room to accommodate the overnight guests.

"We continue to make our weekly visits to the local jail. There is also the continuous need for counselling, filling of forms, assisting with employment, both to employees and employers—co-operation with all the local Social agencies, and the many other things that we do to assist people with every conceivable kind of need."

WAYWAYSEECAPPO

Services were conducted on the field with 11 a.m. worship services being held alternately, at Argyle Church one Sunday and at Ekford Church the next Sunday. One of these was a communion service. Services on the reserves have been held at 6 p.m. Sunday afternoons, one being a communion service.

In September with the beginning of the new school year, services of worship were conducted at the Birtle Indian Residence every Sunday at 7:30 p.m., and in the new year regular visits will be made to the residence for counselling during the week. Hospital and home visitation have been carried on regularly.

Camp Work: One full week in July was spent by the missionary in charge directing and counselling at an Intermediate mixed camp at Clear Lake. Fifteen campers were in attendance. A camp reunion was held at the manse on a weekend in November, with 10 campers and four leaders present.

During July, assistance was given at two tent-mission services on the Birdtail Reserve, working with the catechist in charge, Mr. C. E. Hall. In August, a tent-mission and vacation Bible school was held on the Rolling River Reserve. Mr. and Mrs. Penny lived on the reserve in the mission house for the week.

In August, a Vacation Bible School and tent-mission service was held on the Waywayseecappo Reserve, near Rosburn, Manitoba. A five day school with morning and afternoon sessions was conducted with an average attendance of 50 students. Tent-mission services were held in the evenings with an average attendance of 57.

In the Fall an Indian girls sewing club was started at the manse under the direction of Mrs. B. Penny. Two groups of school girls—ten in each group—meet on alternate Wednesdays and take part in Bible study, singing, sewing and sometimes cooking. For one of the film-nights at the community hall on the reserve, they were able to bake Indian bread (bannock) for the evening lunch. Mr. Penny has been assisting with a Boy Scouts Troop on the reserve since the Fall.

In November a film-night was held with lunch and social hour afterwards. Two carloads of young people attended from Elphinstone with Mr. Donovan, along with one carload from the Argyle congregation. Film rentals are expensive, and it is difficult to acquire a film projector in this area.

Another film-night is being planned for each month until Spring, if some means of financing film rentals and projector can be found.

The Argyle congregation people, although few in number, have been regular in attendance at meetings and more generous in their givings. There is also some concern in this congregation for outreach and for making a Christian witness in the community. There are no children of Sunday School age in this congregation.

Since the beginning of December, the weekly service for Argyle-Ekford has been held in the various homes. Bible study and discussion have been used during these meetings. A portable organ has provided music for hymns.

Recommendations

The Rev. Brian Penny, missionary in charge, ends his report with some recommendations:

1. With regard to Sunday School and DVBS Teaching Materials, more suitable materials are desperately needed which will speak to the Indian people in terms that will have meaning for them. The materials which we use in our white upper-middle class congregations do not correspond with the culture and thought patterns of the Indian people in this area. Someone is needed who will be able to develop a Christian Education curriculum for these people.
2. With regard to the work on the Waywayseecappo Reserve, that some time in the near future an Indian Worker's Conference be held in this area to discuss goals, methods, and to share ideas about policy in Indian work.

OKANAIS AND ROLLING RIVER

The Rev. Walter Donovan reports: "There is nothing by way of progress to be reported from this corner of the vineyard, as there is apparently little interest in Church matters. Perhaps the root of this lies in the distribution of "Bales of clothing" through the years, which encouraged the equivalent of "rice Christians". We have attempted, nevertheless, to reach the folk in many ways, e.g. I brought three of the men into the local curling club, assisted with the arranging and holding of the Indian Hockey Tournament, promoting 'integrated church services'. (I have the feeling that the Indian folk would be made more aware of what the Church is—and is not—if there were no building on the reserve and those interested could be brought to the church in the village.)

"There is now an A.A. group which meets here in the village, and the one Indian member was brought into the program through having to serve a term in a correctional institution. (He is one of the Okanais Elders.)

"The ladies looked after the planning of their Christmas program with a minimum of assistance, and their background fits them for *ad hoc* methods of dealing with problems that arise. They are still not concerned in any kind of ongoing spiritual program (generally speaking)—perhaps because they have never had such responsibility under Indian Affairs. As a result of improved social benefits, (e.g. unemployment insurance), the Indian has become almost as much of a 'practising atheist' as his paleface counterpart.

"One Indian Lady was a steady member of a community choir we organized last winter. We try to struggle along with a group of youngsters of Explorer age. The Joint-YPS has a few Indian members. The band is becoming more involved and independent economically as well as politically. I would say that there is generally a good attitude toward non-Indians."

"In Rolling River there is little to report that is optimistic. As Sunday services were just not being attended, I have been holding services in homes. I meet weekly with about seven teenagers for Bible study. We went to Winnipeg during Easter week for a two-day tour.

"I believe that there should be a change in personnel here. Most of the Indian folk—I think—are my friends, many of them very good ones; but I covet for them the friendship of Christ. In bringing them the knowledge of that friendship I seem to have been highly unsuccessful."

PIPESTONE, MANITOBA

The Rev. Larry Jackson reports: "The Young People continue to show interest. Ten to twenty young people (ages 12 to 30) come each Thursday evening for games and Bible Study. During the Winter this becomes a young men's group as following the meeting, all go to town (Pipestone) for hockey at the Community Rink. This Fall, a "Good News Club" for boys and girls, aged 7-12 years has

started at which Bible Stories are taught on flannelgraph, Christian songs and Bible verses. Some 20 children belong to this group. This has helped to interest some in Sunday School attendance.

"Fourteen Indian children from Pipestone attended a Bible Camp sponsored by the Kola E.M.C. Church, along with 80 children from Griswold Reserve. There are many needs for leadership programs on the Reserves. Recently, adult education courses have been started by the Government and an A.A. group with a good response to both.

"Last summer a number of young people helped to "trim" the church, and to paint the new porch. It has improved the appearance immensely already. The young people of the reserve responded eagerly to this project.

ITALIAN MINISTRIES

BECKWITH MEMORIAL, MONTREAL

On the first Sunday of January, the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was held and on the last Sunday, the Annual Congregational Meeting.

Collected \$100.00 over and above the regular giving for the disaster in Sicily, Italy and forwarded the same to the Waldensian Church for distribution to the victims.

Held a Good Friday service in the evening and observed the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper. The Easter service was also well attended.

Office-bearers of Beckwith met with office-bearers of St. Michel and with the Presbytery Committee on Union and Readjustment to review the two-point charge arrangement. All parties agreed that the two-point charge continue for another year. Even though a formal application is made by Beckwith for a grant from the General Board of Missions, this is the third year that the grant was not required. Under the present arrangement, the minister serves both congregations and they in turn make up the full stipend.

The annual Church Picnic was a joint affair with the St. Michel congregation at Rawdon, Quebec. It was a new experience for both congregations, especially the baseball game between churches.

During July and August, Miss Rita DePierro served as our organist while Miss Iole Appugliese enjoyed a delightful vacation in Italy. We are grateful to Miss DePierro for her continual interest in Beckwith and for the way she always helps the congregation which her father pastored for thirty-three years. Miss Appugliese not only renewed contacts with Waldensian Christians, she enjoyed also a well-earned rest in sunny Italy.

As in the past, Mr. L. Godino, an elder, served as supply during the Minister's vacations. Besides helping every year during August, Mr. Godino on the first Sunday each month, takes part in the Italian worship service. His devotion and work in the congregation are deeply appreciated.

On World-wide Communion Sunday a service was held in which the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was observed, the Thanksgiving service was well attended also.

A tri-lingual funeral service was held for old elder, Rinaldo Faveri, who passed away at the Royal Victoria Hospital. Friends of Mr. Faveri came from all walks of life and filled the church. Over fifty percent in attendance were French Canadians. It was a great service of witness for Christ to people of different languages and different religious backgrounds that had never been exposed to our forms of worship.

The minister, Rev. Arthur Iarrera, writes: "The main problem is one of growth in a predominantly French sector where the church is presently located. The 1966 and 1967 Annual Reports point out very clearly the goals and aspirations of the

church whereby it may grow and reach the new immigrants. In my opinion, if monies from the National Development Fund can be invested in the suggested new approach, the problem may be resolved.

"The climax of the year was the Christmas Eve service with the Rev. Mariano DiGangi, Director of the Canadian Bible and Medical Missionary Fellowship, as guest minister. Also, the St. Michel Choir under the direction of Mrs. Helen Claridge provided the Christmas music and anthems. It was reported that a donation of \$100 was given to the Missionary Fellowship by one of our members. As in the past, the New Year's Eve service was held at Beckwith.

"As of December 31, 1967, the communicant membership was 100. One loss by death brought the total membership on December 31, 1968 to 99."

HAMILTON

Mario Spiridiglozzi in charge of the work there, writes: "We have seen some families that were discouraged have come closer, and some new souls have been added to the Church; at the present time we can see a good group, encouraged to serve the Lord. The Lord willing during this month, because of Christmas, we will have two services extra, and we are sure that the Lord will be with us with His rich blessing."

UKRAINIAN MINISTRIES

OSHAWA

The Rev. J. Jacenty, minister in Oshawa, reports interesting new developments: Recently much has been heard, written and discussed about ecumenism. This spirit of involvement started 15 years ago within the Ukrainian community in Oshawa. In 1953, the Ukrainians celebrated the 60th Anniversary of their settlement in Canada. An ecumenical service of prayer was held in the city's Memorial Park. It was the beginning of interdenominational Christian Fellowship among the Ukrainian Canadians in Oshawa. Up to that time, such co-operation was impossible due to the hostile atmosphere and prejudice in this predominantly Greek Catholic and Greek Orthodox community. Our congregation was not considered as part of the Ukrainian community. Evangelical missionaries were called Anglo-Saxon agents for the speedy assimilation of the Ukrainians in Canada. It was very difficult to gain the confidence of the common people.

The breakthrough came recently. For the last five years, I had the honour to be president of the Ukrainian Evangelical Alliance of North America. This created for me an opportunity to attend for six days in New York City, the first World Congress of Free Ukrainians. At that time, a Secretariat was formed, of which I became a member. Now finding myself among those high dignitaries and being a member of the highest representative body of over two million Ukrainians in the free countries of the world, all prejudices against me in Oshawa are vanishing. From "persona non grata," I am now in great demand to speak at various public meetings.

This past Christmas I had an opportunity to deliver a Christmas message over the radio to all the Ukrainians in Oshawa, in a one-hour program prepared and financed by the Ukrainian Business and Professional Men's Organization. A printed message was sent to over 200 members, adherents, sympathisers, acquaintances and friends. Into their homes went two groups of our carol singers, to bring the Christmas greetings in ancient songs, bringing to the church, in offerings, nearly \$500. I am narrating these events to show the methods I am using in order to gain some of the common people who have deserted the old ritualistic churches and are looking for something that will satisfy their spiritual hunger. "I am all things to all men, that I might by all means save some." 1 Cor. 9:22.

Our two morning church services, the Ukrainian service at 10 a.m., and the English at 11.15 a.m., continue to minister to both the older Ukrainian members and the younger English speaking members. On special occasions, such as Christmas, Easter, Thanksgiving Day, and the Lord's Supper, the services are combined. Attendance is slowly increasing, especially at the English service.

There is an increase in the Church School attendance recently — especially in the Primary department. Many of the younger couples have children in this age group, and are now bringing them every Sunday. Several parents assist the teacher during the class sessions, and it is hoped that they will eventually volunteer to do this on a full time basis.

TORONTO

A growing number of Ukrainians are drifting away from the traditional churches, especially the young people. This fact is also supported by a recent questionnaire circulated among Ukrainian students at the University of Alberta and widely discussed in the Ukrainian press. It illustrates the inability of the Ukrainian traditional churches to retain their people. One of the reasons might be that these churches lack missionary spirit. They do not have foreign missions, and at home they try to hold the people by cultural efforts and economic ties (Credit Unions).

On the other hand there is a well-organized atheistic effort to undermine any kind of religion among Ukrainians. Only Ukrainian Protestants can successfully hold their ground against these atheistic accusations. In addition to the Communists, all kinds of queer sects are trying to win stray Ukrainians into their folds.

We should have the future in mind, and be ready for it as a Church. There are growing signs that the Iron Curtain might eventually be removed. In that case, Ukrainian immigration to Canada will greatly increase. These people will have very little knowledge of the Christian religion, and will need a lot of help, as was shown in the recent past. For this eventuality we should maintain mission points, which, while doing their work now, would be ready to expand and help new immigrants. The usefulness of this mission proved itself after the second world war.

Ukrainian work in Toronto began without any membership at all, and we had to win every member that we had. Meetings were originally organized in a rented store, but most of the work was done by preaching on street corners, and by personal visitations. Now the congregation has its own church building. It is free of debt. Membership is varied, and hundreds of people have been connected with our mission in the past years.

The regular work of the church is being carried on faithfully. This includes preaching, visiting, hospital work and welfare. The Ukrainian community appreciates our work.

Christian Literature: The Rev. Michael Fesenko, minister of the Ukrainian Church, Toronto, writes: "I publish the 'Evangelical Truth' which received generous support from the Women's Missionary Society and the Women's Inter-Church Council. Our journal is the only bilingual religious Ukrainian paper in Canada, and it is well-received by its readers. When I read the letters of our readers, I find additional confirmation that the 'Evangelical Truth' answers a vital need and is well appreciated.

"When it was temporarily possible to send religious literature to Czechoslovakia, a Ukrainian War Veterans Organization in Toronto asked me to supply them with copies of the 'Evangelical Truth' and other religious literature, which they intended to send to Ukrainians in Czechoslovakia. They asked me also to send some of our religious literature directly there. I was able to send one parcel to the CSSR, and then the Curtain closed again. This request was significant, because members of this organizations are mostly Greek-Orthodox and Greek-Catholic.

"I am also sending our paper and hymn books to Yugoslavia. There is a chance that our literature will cross the border into USSR."

Radio Broadcasts: Mr. Fesenko continues: "The CBC International Section gave generously of their time during the past year for broadcasts of our religious services to the Ukraine. In addition to broadcasts from our church, in the spirit of good will, I also organized broadcasts for the local Baptist and Pentecostal congregations. These were in connection with the Council of Ukrainian Evangelical Churches which we created together last year.

"The head of the Ukrainian section of the CBC, Mr. J. B. Wesolowsky visited the Ukraine last summer. He told me that the people there listen to our broadcasts and appreciate them.

"Our Credit Union adds a great deal to the load of my work, but I find it to be a great convenience to the members of the congregation. The Credit Union has in the past, helped us to buy the organ, pave the parking lot, and serves as our own bank.

"In 1968 I completed the translation of the Westminster Confession of Faith, and the Shorter Catechism. These are works of tremendous spiritual value, and it is a great pity that they were not available in the Ukrainian language until now. I plan to print these translations in 1969 in the form of a book, and I feel that this will be an outstanding achievement that will greatly enrich Ukrainian religious literature.

"Our choirmaster Mr. Sych and I are preparing a new Ukrainian-English hymn book. The new hymn book will suit new developments, namely the increase in the use of English in our church worship."

HAMILTON

Rev. Walter Kutcher, reports on the work among Ukrainians in Hamilton: "Last year a new chapter of our work developed. Our partnership with St. Enoch congregation terminated on December 31, as we entered into a joint work with Knox Church on November 1, 1968.

"Our Young People and our Sunday School did continue their good work. In their project our youth undertook the sick and shut-ins visitation in Nursing Homes in Hamilton, which certainly speaks well of our Mission.

"In 1968 my book 'The Living Church' was published and we are using it for distribution to the people of Ukrainian origin in their homes and in hospitals. We continued to publish our Church Bulletin despite our financial difficulties, and I continued to work on the Committee for the new translation of the Bible into Ukrainian.

"Our mission is a feeding congregation. Many people come, get help, stay with us for a while and then leave us. Although in 1968 we lost eight students from our Sunday School and six members from our Membership Roll, we gain two new members. So we can say: 'Thus far the Lord led us,' as we look forward to a better year in 1969."

MISSION OVERSEAS KOREANS IN JAPAN

ON THE VERGE OF CHANGE

The theme this year describes the state of the Church in the world, especially in this part of the world. The Korean Christian Church in Japan is subjected to the same theological tensions, social and cultural pressures as any other Christian Church. In addition, there is the continuing minority problem and the complication of first- and second-generation thinking. Many changes are certain to take place within the next decade.

The Japan Scene —

Contrary to popular belief, the chrysanthemum is not the national flower of Japan — it is the emblem of the Imperial family. The national flower is the Cherry Blossom which enjoys a brief week of unsurpassable beauty then falls and is no more. Perhaps it illustrates the traditional Japanese view of life — passing quickly and soon forgotten but capable of great beauty.

Commerce: "Little Japan," it used to be called, "that group of islands off the coast of China" — but in the 20th Century it has emerged as a leading figure in world commerce. Japan now ranks second in the free world in Gross National Product. Most of this has happened since the beginning of the Meiji Era, in 1868. When Admiral Perry forced the opening of trade with the Western world, little did he know that within 100 years the trickle of trade would grow into a flood.

Culture: Artists, musicians, writers and craftsmen from Japan are recognized as among the world's finest. Seiji Ozawa who has completed his contract with the Toronto Symphony and Yasunari Kawabata, novelist and winner of the 1968 Nobel Peace Prize, are among the talented men who have made their mark. But fine arts are not just for the few in Japan, every home shows proof of a deep sensitivity to beauty.

Conduct: The sudden change from the traditional way of Japanese life, the sudden removal of restraints from both community and family, which are the result of rapid urbanization, have left this generation without an anchor. Forced to make a decision for which they have not been prepared they are wide open to suggestion from outside influences — good or bad. It makes the present moment one of real opportunity — or danger.

Confusion: The student riots in Tokyo focussed the nation's attention on the destructive power of an aroused mob. The leading university in Japan has felt the double punch of confusion and discontent and is even now radically reshaping its policy. This unleashed power can build or destroy. At the present moment nobody knows which will happen.

Commerce, Culture, Conduct, Confusion . . . which will dominate Japan during the next century? History, cultural background, drive, tenacity and acquired know-how, along with a great capacity for feeling, provide the conditions for hearing the Gospel in a new and powerful way. Japan on the verge of change challenges the Church here and now to prove the truth of its Good News.

Youth —

Nowhere is the verge of change seen more clearly than among the youth. Caught between both generation and culture gaps, Korean Christian young people living in Japan are faced with decisions which demand a tearing up of some roots, and the fashioning of a new way of life.

As in most Churches, there is in the K.C.C.J. the tension between the traditional attitude toward youth (i.e. to be seen but not heard) and the growing restlessness of youth itself, together with some forward-looking pastors who see that changes are inevitable if the Church is to survive when the present rapidly-aging membership

passes on. The tension is not so much between Christian and non-Christian ideas, but between traditional and progressive thinking within the Church. Added to this is the demand on the part of the first-generation Koreans for a loyalty to a country which second-generation Koreans have neither seen nor known. The risk being taken is that Korean young people will reject both the faith and patriotism of their parents, and close their minds to any attempt at dialogue and understanding.

Young people of the K.C.C.J. in spite of their small numbers have been very active during 1968. The National Conference, held this year at Shodoshima, an island in the Inland Sea, focussed the attention of the young people not only on their own personal problems and frustrations, but on the message and mission of the Church. Over 150 young people and leaders representing four nations were in attendance.

Sooheh Oh, Public Relations Convener of the National Young People's Council, writes "The young people's own newspaper *The Lighthouse* issued five times during the year, carried the program directly to the young people of each congregation. Speaking honestly, one must acknowledge the limitation of our Christian youth — a lack of vitality and enthusiasm. However, the hope and zeal of a few would live out their callings by serving in the world promises well for the future."

Challenges and Needs —

The newest outreach of the K.C.C.J. came into being when Rev. E-Seng Whang was appointed to Sendai City where there is a sizeable Korean community. After two months of visitation, the first service was held in June. Mr. Whang travels the 200 miles by train every week, dividing his time between this new charge and the General Affairs office.

Shizuoka, a city of over 300,000 between Tokyo and Nagoya presents a good opportunity for planting a new church. The ground work has already been done. Mrs. S. K. Sano, Christian Education Secretary for the Kanto and Chubu Presbyteries, has been visiting this area for two days each month. She teaches a mid-week Church School and calls on Koreans living there.

Opportunities: Kindergarten plans are under way for a kindergarten in Nagoya to open in 1969, similar to the one in Shimonoseki. The school will be international with Koreans, Japanese and Canadians on the staff.

Plans for a nursery at Dr. In Ha Lee's Church in Kawasaki were laid in the fall of 1968. Its purpose is to provide a place of supervised play and care for children of working mothers in this industrial suburb of Tokyo. The present facilities can handle about 20 children. There is the possibility of co-operation with a nearby Japanese Church.

Needs: Lay men and women of the K.C.C.J. believe that their program cannot expand further without the acquisition of a Lay Centre. Previous experiments having failed to meet their needs, they have continued to search for a suitable property and believe they have found it in a district in Osaka where the greater number of Koreans reside and within easy reach of three Korean Churches.

Japan's volatile student population faced with the breakdown of the old society and not yet geared to the new is looking for a way of life. Largely concentrated in the city of Tokyo where there are 102 universities, the students can be reached most effectively by an "outside the church" approach. A Christian leader trained in student work and freed from the usual pastoral routine is urgently needed.

1968 Church Diary —

January — This year we are making a new beginning. There is an excitement in the air like that at the beginning of a race. On the first Sunday of the year special congregation services of thanks and dedication were held.

February — Dr. Yoon Tai Oh, Rev. Duk Sung Kim, Rev. K. Sam Chef left for a month of special meetings in Korea touring major centres from Seoul to Pusan. They met with positive response in terms of understanding, prayers and generous gifts. We learned another lesson in looking beyond ourselves.

March — The month for the "Mission in Music". The joint concert by the Yonsei University Choir of Seoul, Korea, and the Glee Club of Kwansai Gakuin University in Osaka was enthusiastically received.

April — The Rev. Y. B. Chong appointed General Executive Director of the 60th Anniversary Program. Rev. E-Seng Whang appointed to Sendai City for outreach among the 2,000 Koreans there. He will also double as Assistant to the General Secretary, Dr. In Ha Lee, releasing the latter for work with the National Christian Council of Japan.

May — Dedication of the Paegui Kindergarten in Shimonoseki. At the same time a Presbytery Mission Rally.

June — Presbytery Laity Conferences were held under leadership of three pastors from Korea on our theme "Forward: Following Christ into the World".

July — The two-month fund-raising campaign ended successfully. Pledges from three-quarters of the churches pushed the campaign over the top! For the first time, the K.C.C.J. sent "an accredited observer" to the Assembly of the World Council of Churches in Uppsala, Sweden. The Rev. Glen Davis was routed that way on his return to Canada. The direct contact with the World Council has sharpened the awareness of the K.C.C.J. to its ecumenical responsibilities.

August — Over 150 young people and leaders met for the Young People's National Conference at Shodoshima, an island on the Inland Sea. Also 35 leaders met for six days of theological and practical study at the Pastors' Institute in a quiet mountain resort near Kobe. Close on this followed three days of Laity-centred talks and discussions with 150 persons involved. The lecturers included Dr. H. S. Hong, Methodist Seminary, Korea, Dr. T. Takasaki, Tokyo Seminary and Rev. R. M. Ransom, General Board of Missions, Presbyterian Church in Canada.

September — Rev. R. M. Ransom began his work as a part-time, short-term missionary in the Osaka Church area, stressing the discovery of inner-city opportunities with lay people. Contacts with the youth and laity brought about fruitful discussions.

October — The special celebration of God's grace over the past 60 years was climaxed on October 11th at the Sixtieth Anniversary Service of Commemoration held in the Chapel of the Osaka Girls' School. General Assembly leaders and guests from the Japanese Churches and Community testified to God's gracious action in the past, as well as to the promise of His guidance in the future. An ambitious photo exhibit also led the people through the 60 years of history and faith, and ahead into the next decade. The evening of joy, featuring singing, dancing, movies and speeches, was arranged by the Laity Association. Later in the month, twenty-five guests invited to the celebration, arrived from Korea.

November and December — Plans were laid for years 2 and 3 of the "Decade of Development" in terms of Church Renewal, Social Action and World Mission. Public relations and mass media have been quite co-operative in Japan, Korea and Canada.

Beyond Our Own Doors —

One of the signs of a maturing church is its ability to see over its own walls, and to open its doors both to the world beyond and to other Churches within the Christian fellowship. The K.C.C.J. is beginning to move in this direction spearheaded by the General Secretary, Dr. In Ha Lee, who not only has pioneered in relations with the Japanese churches in his own community, but also was invited to become Interim General Secretary of the Japan National Christian Council. In this position he has brought about a complete re-structuring of the council in order to free its various departments and agencies for more relevant and effective service. He is also doing an excellent job of interpreting the problems of minority churches to the other churches in Japan. Earlier in 1968, Rev. In Ha Lee received a Doctor of Divinity Degree from the Senate of Knox College, Toronto. He attended the East Asian Christian Conference in Bangkok last January as an official K.C.C.J. delegate. He also brought

fraternal greetings to the General Assemblies of the Presbyterian Church in Canada and of the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A.

Two pastors from Taiwan, awarded leadership training scholarships from The Presbyterian Church in Canada, studied in Japan and were cleared through the General Affairs office of the K.C.C.J. The Rev. J. John Whang, Pastor of the Yokohama Church is the recipient of a scholarship for studying in New Zealand, sponsored by the East Asia Christian Conference.

Looking Ahead —

The K.C.C.J. looks upon the next ten years as growing years with a plan for growth drawn up by the 60th-70th Anniversary Committee. The basic aims are clearly set forth as follows: (1) Renewing — renewed within we shall become true servants; (2) Transforming — offering the reconciling ministry to Koreans and Japanese in this nation; (3) Sharing — living under the sovereignty of Christ we shall work to become "A Church for Others".

The time-table for this decade of development is moving along in a lively manner and in 1969 is scheduled to receive three short-term missionaries from Korea, the opening of three or four new Evangelism points, the purchase of a Korean Christian Centre, the opening of a kindergarten in Nagoya Church and a nursery in the Kawasaki Church. In 1970 the Church is planning to participate to the fullest extent in Expo '70, not only through the Christian Pavilion which has the theme "Eyes that See and Hands that Serve", but also by acts of service and interpretation.

GUYANA AND THE CARIBBEAN

THE GUYANA PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

In the previous report it was said that politics was the staff of life in Guyana. This has been very evident in this election year of 1968. This year has also seen the break-up of the coalition government, but the majority party in the government remained in power through the defection of one member of the minority party. Repressive legislation and uneconomic planning are cited as causes of the widespread unemployment.

The election also saw an innovation in the electoral system which did not find favour with a large section of the population. For the first time Guyanese living overseas were allowed to vote. Some 60,000 were said to be eligible. So, amidst cries of fraud and padding of voters lists, the election took place, with the Burnham-led Peoples' National Congress Party (P.N.C.) gaining an overall majority.

How did all this effect the Church? One is tempted to say, it had little or no effect. Perhaps a more correct way of putting it would be to say that the Church had little or no effect on the politics of the day. Indeed, it is recorded in the minutes of the Guyana Council of Churches, that it was decided *not* to make a statement on the

elections. Three pre-election sermon outlines were distributed by the Commission on Social Action of the Council of Churches.

One outstanding event of the year which shocked the nation, was the Rapanuni uprising in December. Led by some of the wealthy ranchers of the predominantly Amerindian area, the uprising was quickly crushed by government forces. It was claimed that Venezuela was behind this move to seize power in the region which borders both Brazil and Venezuela. A result is that all non-governmental personnel have been barred from the area, leaving the Amerindians without pastoral guidance.

These events notwithstanding, Guyana has had another peaceful year in which the Guyana Presbyterian Church has sought to witness faithfully to her Lord. Our Church continues to be the only one whose pastorates are manned solely by Guyanese. Two new churches have been built and several have been repaired.

The Presbytery has continued to struggle with the problem of being fully responsible for the work of the Church. Gradually we are beginning to face the challenge of making our own decisions. The future will call for far more mature thinking and a readiness to accept the challenges and opportunities of a rapidly changing society. In this we are thankful for the good will and support of our friends in the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

Reports which have come in from the parishes speak of several involvements of the local congregations in the life of the community; assisting in painting a Public Hospital, organizing a community library, providing recreational facilities for children and distribution of foodstuff to flood victims.

Within the Church fellowship there has been an emphasis on self-help. Congregations are required to involve their members in any work which is carried out on building or property.

Ecumenically, we have sought to work with other denominations wherever possible. Both at Presbytery and congregational level, we have been involved in seeking a better appreciation of the necessity to do together that which we can no longer effectively do alone. It is, however, to be regretted that we have not moved any closer towards establishing a Synod of Presbyterian Churches in Guyana. This is all the more regrettable when it is remembered that both Presbyterian Churches are members of larger groupings of Churches such as Guyana Council of Churches, Caribbean Assembly of Reformed Churches, World Presbyterian Alliance. Close co-operation in joint programs seems the most that is possible at the present time.

A partnership in service which lasted for some twenty-four years came to an end, during 1968, with the departure from Guyana of Miss Margaret Ramsay. We express our thanks to Miss Ramsay, the Women's Missionary Society, the General Board of Missions and the Presbyterian Church in Canada for their continued support and understanding as we in the Guyana Presbyterian Church seek to answer God's call to be His instrument of love and reconciliation.

This report, the first to be presented by the Presbytery as such, was prepared and submitted by the Rev. Joseph E. Williams, Clerk of Presbytery.

Miss Athalie Read, appointed by the Women's Missionary Society (W.D.), is engaged in Women's work on Wakenaam Island in Essequibo County.

New Forms of Mission

Rev. Zander Dunn, whose special assignment is in the field of Evangelism and Outreach, writes that a real attempt is being made to "try to get the leaders of the congregations to come up with ways in which they might reach out in relevant ways to the community". The three most popular attempts at mission outreach have been (1) the setting up of libraries in the rural communities, (2) the use of "cottage prayer meetings" in new ways, and (3) special services at certain seasons of the year.

"The interesting thing is that none of these methods of outreach is new to the church here. But they have fallen into disuse. In reviving these things, the people are not trying something "foreign" or novel, but are trying to update the old forms. In

the long run, this may not work, but for now it is a start and what is most important it is what the people want. In the past the libraries were in the churches and it was understood the books were just for the Christians. Now we are trying to find housing for the books outside the church building where everybody can get at them. The cottage meetings used to take the form of another church service. Now we are trying to introduce discussion, sharing, audio-visual aids. The special services used to be mostly for the Christians. Now we are trying to conduct these with the outsider in mind and the Church people are encouraged to bring their non-Christian friends."

Rev. David Murphy, who is Director of Stewardship Education for the Presbyterian Church in Trinidad and Grenada, describes his new assignment and its relation to the life of the Church in Guyana. "Our new sphere of work here in Trinidad", he writes, "is an outgrowth of our work in Guyana. Stewardship on a Caribbean scale is occupying more and more of the church's life, and after three years in stewardship education in Guyana, this appointment in Trinidad is like a second stage in a larger stewardship program. Since the terms of my appointment leave me free to assist the Presbyterian churches in Guyana and Jamaica which are part of our Caribbean Assembly of Reformed Churches, I am able to help co-ordinate stewardship plans for a large area. Late in 1968 I spent a week in Guyana as a speaker at the pastors' conference, and I also had the opportunity to travel to Grenada to assist the Presbyterian Church in a stewardship program. As Chairman of the Caribbean Assembly's Board of Mission, Evangelism and Stewardship, I have had fine opportunities to promote stewardship action and to co-ordinate programs in Jamaica, Guyana and Trinidad. One practical outcome of this board's planning has been to arrange for the visit of one of the world's leading stewardship teachers, Dr. Paul Lindholm, who will visit Guyana and Trinidad for two months this year.

"Various aspects of stewardship education have occupied my time since my arrival. I have written a visitation manual and Bible studies for use in the churches. These will form the basis of the church's stewardship program in the year ahead, and they are being used by churches of other denominations as well. One satisfying part of the work is the opportunity to co-operate with other churches, and already I have been invited by the Anglican Church to assist them in their stewardship programs. Therefore, ecumenical projects will form more and more of the work in the future."

FORMOSA

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT IN TAIWAN

In a paper on this subject by Father Guilbert Guerin, S.J., we are told that "the steady economic growth of the last 15 years has placed Taiwan in a promising stage of economic take-off. The economy of Taiwan has attained one of the most rapid rates of growth ever achieved by the developing countries of Asia, with its G.N.P. rising steadily at a rate of almost 8% per annum during the past decade. A realistic program of economic reconstruction has brought the country to a level of prosperity not witnessed before."

Even to the ordinary observer this is apparent. Everywhere there are new buildings being erected; clothes are now more expensive, of better quality and more attractive, and people are wearing them. The price of pork and rice has climbed steadily. There are many more "luxury items" on the market. People have money to buy hi-fi's, refrigerators, washing machines, and gadgets of all sorts.

Specific areas of severe economic depression remain. In particular, the tribal people still have great economic needs. The Church shows little interest in economic development on the plains, but there is an effort to improve the lot of the mountain people, through the organization of Credit Unions, Co-operatives and agricultural engineering projects. The Roman Catholic Church has taken the leadership in the

former two, while Taiwan Christian Service has sought help with irrigation projects and the setting up of community development projects. The Industrial Management College at Tamsui is also making a contribution in this area.

There is a great need for trained personnel and funds to enable the Church to take a more active role in economic development, and the social adjustment that people must make in a rapidly changing economy, for example, agricultural engineers, social workers to help country people adjust to city living, and vocational training specialists. These need not be from abroad. In fact, national workers would be desirable but funds are necessary for their training.

DEVELOPMENTS IN THE CHURCH IN 1968

Tribal Work: The Presbyterian Church of Formosa officially agreed to emphasize Tribal Work this year. It is significant that the Church which is predominantly Taiwanese in organization felt the need to take an increased interest in the tribal people of the Church who actually comprise approximately half of the total Church membership. Many new projects were started.

Experiments in Christian Witness: In June, two Canadian youths came to Taiwan for one month to assist with the setting up of "wilderness camping" for tribal young people. In September, the Presbyterian Church U.S. sent a 2nd year theological student on a theological internship at Taiwan Theological College.

The General Assembly of 1968 was the first to be a representative assembly. But this did not meet with popular support, therefore it was decided to revert to the previous method of a full assembly in 1969.

Mackay Memorial Hospital came under the jurisdiction of the General Assembly of the Church and approval was given for the erection of a new 14-storey hospital on the present site. This is to begin in 1969. The hospital has also taken responsibility for payment of overseas staff salaries up to the level of national wage scale. Anything additional is paid by the related mission board.

Burning Bush Society: As a memorial to Dr. James Dickson, the Burning Bush Missionary Society was set up, supported by voluntary gifts. This independent society commissioned four young tribal ministers as missionaries to Sarawak and Borneo.

CHALLENGES AND OPPORTUNITIES IN THE MEDICAL FIELD

Christian medical work in Taiwan not only strives to meet the needs of the people of this island, but in many instances, gives leadership in the whole field of medicine here. The Presbyterian Church has had a healing ministry in Taiwan dating back to 1865 when Dr. Thomas Maxwell of the English Presbyterian Church began pulling teeth after his preaching services in the north.

Today the Presbyterian Church of Formosa has two well-equipped and highly recognized hospitals and is helping in the work of Taiwan Leprosy Relief Association. Christian doctors in Taiwan contribute much time and support to free clinics for the poor and, in one instance, a school for blind youths.

Changhua Christian Hospital, 169 beds, provided over 50,000 days of patient care for 5,149 patients and treated almost 76,000 out-patients in 1968. Particular progress was made during the year in the departments of Physiotherapy, Radiology, and Social Service. The hospital sponsored an 11-month Physical Therapy training course which was attended by students from seven different Christian hospitals on the island. This is a pioneer field in Taiwan. Here is an instance of leadership.

The Social Service Department not only provided U.S. \$19,404 worth of free patient care, but in addition, is involved in distribution of relief goods, rehabilitation and occupational therapy, job placement, family counselling and a family-planning program. Changhua's new hospital, completed in 1967, is not yet completely paid for, and funds are needed.

Mackay Memorial Hospital in Taipei, the capital, is actively working toward developing a large new modern well-equipped hospital. Taipei city population has grown from 1 million to over 2.5 million in less than 10 years, and Mackay stands in the hub of all this activity. With 350 beds, the excellent treatment and fine nursing care, along with well-trained doctors and specialists, have made Mackay a highly respected institution.

Under the forward-looking leadership of Dr. M. S. Noordhoff, of the Reformed Church of America, Mackay Hospital is making concerted efforts to provide care of the highest standard for the community, and to give leadership in many fields of medicine. This has already been achieved in the following areas:

- (1) Plastic Surgery — (a) a comprehensive program in cleft palate rehabilitation which includes Taiwan's first speech therapy program for post-operative cleft palate patients; (b) a burn centre to which patients from all over Taiwan are referred;
- (2) Intensive Care Unit — the first in Taiwan. 1968 saw the expansion of this service with the opening of a unit particularly for the care of children;
- (3) Leprosy Clinics;
- (4) Ever-increasing development of the Polio-Rehabilitation Centre; and
- (5) Suicide prevention and rehabilitation program, with a trained Social case worker who makes follow-up calls in homes and works in consultation with a panel of doctors, psychiatrists, the hospital Chaplain and other "experts" — again a first for Taiwan.

One of the most interesting emphases of both Changhua Christian Hospital and Mackay Memorial is on the care of the *Total Patient*. Regular conferences attended by the doctor, psychiatrist, pastor and a member of the nursing staff, are held to discuss particular cases, in an effort to "make men whole". To this end, Changhua has a program of six-week courses in Clinical Pastoral education and in Clinical Counselling Training. Both hospitals have resident chaplains with a staff ready to serve at all times.

CHALLENGES AND OPPORTUNITIES IN EDUCATION

Since the government is hard-pressed to provide adequate education for the students of this island, private schools are still welcome. The Presbyterian Church of Formosa has three middle schools which offer sound education in a Christian atmosphere from Grade IX to Grade XII. This year the Government extended free compulsory education from Grade VI to Grade IX (senior middle school). Since no private school receives government grants, our schools are now faced with three possibilities: (i) requiring tuition from junior middle school students, or (ii) offering free junior middle school education, thus placing a great strain on each school's budget, or (iii) discontinuing junior middle school training altogether.

Chang Jung Girls' School, Tainan, was begun by English Presbyterian missionaries, and in this year celebrated its 80th Anniversary. It is of note that out of 2,500 teachers in Tainan City, the Biology Master was one of three chosen to be honored on Confucius' birthday (a holiday honoring teachers). The Science Department held several students' exhibitions and contests to stimulate the students' interest. In common with the other two schools, the Girls' School has a regular program of Bible study, dormitory prayers, Sunday students' services, choirs and T.K.C. (The Church-sponsored youth group).

Chang Jung Boys' School, Tainan: During 1968 the Boys' School recorded a total student body of 927, with 36 teachers and 14 other staff. This school has a well-developed Christian Education Department, with a full-time chaplain (Rev. H. T. Ellis, of Canada) and two others. A varied and stimulating Bible instruction is given. The annual reports show that these classes are the most popular of the whole school curriculum.

Tam Kang Middle School, Tamsui, has a faculty and staff of 72 to serve a student body, both boys and girls, of 1,145. Of these students, 695 are resident in dormitories (Boys — 469; girls — 226). The girls' dorm matron is Miss Isabel Taylor. Of these students, only 374 are Christian or come from a Christian back-

ground. The school has a strong program of Biblical instruction, morning and evening vespers, T.K.C. and Sunday Worship. Christian students with the help of two outside counsellors conduct nine weekly outdoor Sunday schools.

Yu-Shan Training Institute: This school is especially for the training of tribal young people. The entrance requirement is Junior High School Graduation (Grade IX). There are 18 enrolled in the one-year Agriculture Course, 11 (girls) in the Home Economics Course and 43 in the Theological Course, making a total of 72 students (not counting 29 who are doing compulsory military training).

The Home Economics course for girls is a new addition this year. Thus far, the girls have been living in a temporary unoccupied faculty house, but there is a great need for a girls' dormitory as this course is expanded.

Presbyterian Bible School, Hsin Chu: There are 60 students enrolled in the regular 2-year course, of whom 14 are men; 32 girls are enrolled in the Kindergarten Teacher Training Course. The total enrollment is 98, of which 17 are boys.

This Bible School began as an effort to give Biblical training to young men without the qualifications to enter regular theological college. Since that time the student body has changed from almost all boys to the present 83% girls. Greater time is demanded for preparing girls for such services as Church-Kindergarten teachers. The practical work required of the students gives them supervised learning experiences in Sunday School teaching, Bible teaching and preaching. The school provides excellent facilities for conferences and retreats. Each year many short-term conferences are held for Biblical instruction, family life and sewing.

CHALLENGES AND OPPORTUNITIES IN THEOLOGICAL EDUCATION

One of the encouraging factors in theological education is the evident trend toward greater participation by nationals. At *Taiwan Theological College* this participation is evident in the increased givings by the local churches towards the support of the College, and in the number of highly trained persons who have returned from study abroad to take up positions on the teaching staff of the College. All of these people were assisted financially to some degree with study expenses by the Presbyterian Church in Canada. At present, more than half the staff is national with the remainder representing the Presbyterian Church in Canada, United Presbyterian Church U.S., and the United Methodist Church.

Tainan Theological College with a total student body of 228 men and women, is one of the largest theological institutions in South-East Asia. It maintains a particular emphasis on ecumenicity, with students and faculty representing Presbyterian, Methodist and Episcopalian denominations.

The College is made up of three main departments: (1) Theological; (2) Christian Education; in Kindergarten, Church Music, Social Service, Mass Communication; and (3) Graduate; in Master's Program (under South-East Asia Theological Schools).

The Principals and faculties of both colleges are deeply concerned to train men and women in such a way as to prepare them for a relevant ministry for *today* and tomorrow. A new sense of urgency is apparent to up-date methods of proclaiming the gospel and freeing it to work in the community.

CHALLENGES AND OPPORTUNITIES IN TRIBAL WORK

In 1968 the Second Century Mission Movement of the Presbyterian Church of Formosa progressed into its second year, the year of emphasis on Tribal Work. As a result, many schemes and projects were carried out, in an effort to draw the 104-year-old plains (Taiwanese) Church and the post-war mountain segments of the Church together in fellowship and prayer.

One project utilized was a visitation of mountain churches by the Taiwanese ministers and church leaders throughout the island. Another was the establishment

of "sister-church" relationships between individual Taiwanese and tribal congregations. A number of conferences were held throughout the tribal church stressing Bible Study, devotional life, pastoral work, economic and family life and church management.

Kaosiung Presbytery accepted considerable responsibility for supporting newly-started evangelistic work among tribal people who had moved into Kaohsiung City to work in its industries. The Youth Committee of another Presbytery provided 11 bags of cement for repairing mountain churches. A Taipei congregation contributed the pews for a new mountain church. Some of these projects were more successful than others, but they all had one most significant result: an increased consciousness on the part of the Taiwanese church, of the nature, problems and concerns of the tribal people and a deeper commitment to serve and help nurture the church in the mountains.

There are 413 tribal churches, with a total membership of 77,500 (1/3 of the tribal population). Of these, 143 are considered self-supporting. Churches in three of the ten tribes have formed tribal Presbyteries: Taroko, Amis and Paiwan. In January, 1969, the fourth tribal Presbytery was formed among the churches of the Tayal tribe and it is planned that the Bunnun tribe will form the fifth Presbytery next year.

Some of the activities of the General Assembly's Tribal Work Committee included:

Scholarships, mostly from funds received from overseas, were provided for 14 tribal college students, 20 theological students, and 73 High School students. A total of over U.S. \$10,000 is needed annually for this.

Building Grants of about Can. \$300 each (again from overseas gifts) were provided to ten tribal congregations, to enable them to replace old frame or bamboo structures.

Credit Unions are most important today to help solve the economic problems of the tribes peoples. At present only three full-time workers are carrying on this work among over 400 villages. Many more are needed.

Audio-visual education has in the past been done primarily through radio broadcasts in tribal languages over private stations. This has been prohibited recently. Now it is planned to use phonograph records and movies.

Literacy Work continues. The New Testament is complete in the Taroko language, and partially completed in Amis, Bunnun, Paiwan and Tayal. There is a great need for other literature.

In the cities, work is developing among tribal people who have left their villages to find employment in the industrial centres. The *Taipei Service Centre for Mountain People*, directed by a Taiwanese pastor, is now in its third year of operation and is serving in this area very efficiently. Here 25 tribal university students live in the hostel section, and up to 26 other mountain people can have temporary accommodation while passing through the city, or seeking employment. An Amis tribal minister, assisted by an Amis theological student, serve over 1,500 tribal people living in the Taipei-Keelung area. In 1968 such work was begun in Kaohsiung City, where an Amis pastor is now ministering to over 500 people. It is hoped soon to be able to establish a Centre there. Hostels are also needed in other cities.

The great lack of Biblical teaching in the tribal church is a matter of concern. Another need is for meaningful indigenous forms of worship. Many of the original tribal customs and values have been lost in the changing society. The Church has a great obligation to help reunify and strengthen tribal society and develop healthy communities. Other challenges lie in the exodus of young people to the cities to find work. This drains the villages and churches of much of their best leadership, and creates many social problems both for those who leave, and for those who remain behind.

Opportunities facing the tribal church are many, especially in evangelism. It is important to develop better attitudes to other denominations. Christian education has

scarcely begun. A great deal can be done to strengthen Christian family life. Opportunities must be provided for healthful recreation. Public health and family planning are areas of great need. The mountain economy must be developed by creating new skills, discouraging wasteful habits and raising the whole standard of living. Attitudes of self-support and independence must be fostered.

CHALLENGES AND OPPORTUNITIES FOR THE WOMEN OF THE CHURCH

The women of the Presbyterian Church of Formosa form an active segment of the church's membership. An official organization, the Women's Missionary Society is comprised of 7,325 tribal women and 18,668 plains women. As well, many churches have active women's groups which are not affiliated with the national organization.

The nine Presbyteries employ a total of 14 women workers who help with Presbyterian groups, do hospital visiting and carry out a tribal ministry. One Presbyterian in the South takes responsibility for publishing a monthly magazine which contains help for leaders in rural areas. During 1968 the women took part in the "Least Coin Project", a world-wide project to promote good stewardship, uniting the women of South-East Asia in prayer and fellowship.

Three Leadership Conferences in connection with the Year of Emphasis on Tribal work were planned for tribal women. These conferences stressed Christian family life, in particular, family planning and Christian ethics. A significant aspect of women's work is the apparent new interest in what it means to be the Church in this island today. This is evidenced in freer sharing of opinions and livelier discussions.

YEAR-END STATISTICS

Total number of churches is 885 (Plains 473, Mountain 412). This is an increase of one over the previous year, but an increase of 12 in the number of self-supporting churches. There were 73,382 adult baptized members, an increase of 2,975. The total Christian community is 175,656 — an increase of 610. Increases in the numbers of baptized adults, and infants were partly offset by a decrease of 3,027 in the number of inquirers.

It was noted in the report of the General Secretary that Taiwan has a population of 13,000,000, increasing 400,000 every year, while the total number of Christians is just about 600,000, with the Roman Catholics claiming 320,000 and the Protestants 280,000.

It was noted that there has been a considerable loss in the recorded attendance of youth groups and choirs and Sunday Schools. Sunday Schools, which number 891, showed an increase in members from 7,696 to 51,362, but a drop in average attendance of 11,623. Some of these big differences may be partly due to more accurate, or a different way of gathering, statistics.

The number of ordained pastors increased by 17 to a total of 283, with a total number of preachers, pastors, evangelists of 735. There are 2,692 elders, an increase of 49 during the year.

Types of Work in which missionaries are engaged: Theological Education (16), Mountain Work (13), Medical Work (12), General Education (9), Student Work (7), Plains Evangelism (2), Church Office (2), Language Study (5).

CANADIAN PERSONNEL

In 1968, *Rev. H. T. Ellis* returned to Canada for his first furlough after a five year term. Before his return he served as Chaplain at Chang Jung Boys' School in Tainan. While in Canada he spent a term at Simon Fraser University in B.C. studying education and doing some deputation work in B.C.

Rev. B. L. M. and Mrs. Embree, and family, are living on Yang-ming Shan outside Taipei. Mr. Embree is teaching Biblical languages at Taiwan Technological College, and completing a Taiwanese-English dictionary.

Rev. C. M. and Mrs. Costerus, and family, are living in Tainan on the campus of Tainan Theological College where Mr. Costerus teaches New Testament.

Rev. Gordon and Mrs. Williams are new arrivals on the field, living in Taipei and attending Taipei Language Institute, in preparation for tribal work.

Rev. Clare and Mrs. McGill, and sons, live in Hsin Chu. Mr. McGill is translating Scripture into the Tayal language. He has completed parts of the Old Testament this year, and has John's Gospel and Corinthians ready to go to press.

Mr. Jack and Mrs. Geddes, and children, live at Christ's College, outside Taipei city. Mr. Geddes teaches at Tamkang Middle School, Tamkang English College and Christ's College. Betty is Treasurer of the Canadian Committee and has a nursery school.

Miss Isabel Taylor lives at Tamkang Middle School where she is a full-time matron of the girls' dormitory, with much opportunity for personal counselling.

Miss Rose Chambers was on the staff of the Mackay Hospital as a supervisor in the Nursing Department. In the latter part of the year, she studied at the Language School and taught nursing arts at Mackay and Taipei Medical College.

Rev. James and Mrs. Sutherland, and family, live at Taiwan Theological College where Mr. Sutherland was acting-Principal until Dr. David Tan returned from America. Mr. Sutherland continued to teach Old Testament, and became Acting Associate Secretary of the General Assembly. Joyce does part-time secretarial work at the General Assembly offices.

Miss Georgine Caldwell lives at Taiwan Theological College where she teaches Christian Education and supervises the Christian Education students' practical work. This Fall she inaugurated work among juvenile prostitutes in a government detention home.

Rev. Murray Garvin and Mrs. Garvin, and children, lived in Hsin Chu for part of 1968 where Murray studied at the Roman Catholic language school. Camps for tribal young people occupied much of the Spring and Summer. In August they moved to Lotung and are engaged in tribal work among the Tayals.

Miss Louise Gamble taught New Testament and English at Presbyterian Bible School, Hsin Chu, for the first half of the year. In August she moved to Lotung to take up Christian Education work among the Tayal Tribe.

Miss Diane Petrie moved to Lotung on completion of her language study and began a Public Health program among the Tayal people. During the summer she assisted with the tribal camping program. It is with sadness that we note that it was necessary for her to return home in late November because of the serious illness of her mother.

NIGERIA/BIAFRA

LAGOS REPORT

Throughout the year, the life and work of the Lagos Presbyterian Church, of which Rev. Russell T. Hall is the minister, was increasingly overshadowed by the tragic civil war. Usually joyful and important congregational events were saddened by the omnipresent suffering and weariness of war.

In January, Dr. E. H. Johnson was the honored guest at the dedication of the new Church Manse. Again the congregation expressed its gratitude to the Presbyterian Church in Canada for its generous grant of \$13,500 towards the building of the Manse which has cost over \$28,000. Regular morning services were held throughout the year at the Casino Cinema with an average attendance of over 330.

The climax of the year's work and many years of hope was the happy occasion of the unveiling of the cornerstone of the Church building by Elder Dr. Okoi Arikpo, Commissioner for External Affairs, and the opening of the Church for Worship on Saturday, December 14th. The congregation warmly welcomed the Rev. Don Neil, Chairman, General Board of Missions of The Presbyterian Church in Canada and the Rev. Neil Bernard, Africa Area Secretary of the Church of Scotland, who shared in the conduct of the opening services and brought greetings from their respective Churches. Murray Ross, our Church architect, is in charge of the construction. About mid-1970 the Church should be completely constructed and furnished. So far the congregation has been able to pay all the contractors' bills, but anticipates financial problems in 1969.

The fifth anniversary of the congregation was observed on May 5th. The Clerk of Session, Mr. E. Udoffia, related briefly the history of the congregation and expressed deep Christian concern for the former members of the congregation from whom we are separated by the war. He prayed that in God's gracious providence they would be well.

The branch congregation in Ajegunle which almost disappeared in 1967 continues to meet in the local courthouse. It grew slowly through the year under the able work of Elders E. Udoffia, E. E. Efiok and B. O. E. Efiiong. A branch of the Women's Guild and of the Youth Fellowship have been organized.

The community inter-denominational congregations at Victoria Island continues to meet at the American International School. Many of the regular members removed during the year, but new Lagos residents have started to attend.

Together with the Lagos elders, the Rev. Russell Hall shared in conducting numerous services at the Kirikiri, Sarki and Ikoyi prisons. He writes that at the close of the Easter Sunday Service in the prison chapel, the worshippers asked permission to sing some Christian choruses. They sang them joyfully in Hausa, Ibo, Yoruba and Efik.

The Session is particularly keen on organizing a congregation in Nigeria's largest city, Ibadan. This is long overdue. Two of the elders, E. E. Efiok and N. U. Ekefre accompanied Mr. Hall on this organizational work. A Sunday evening Bible study and discussion group had been organized and is under the leadership of Mr. T. Wardlaw, an elder in the Presbyterian Church of England; Dr. Sam Humes, an elder

in the United Presbyterian Church, U.S.A., and Dr. M. Beckhom, an elder in the United Church of Canada.

The Women's Guild, under the tireless leadership of Mrs. Okoi Arikpo, continued strongly through the year, as did the Youth Fellowship under the guidance of Mr. Efiiong Bassey. Mrs. Arikpo visited Canada in June and was extremely grateful for the opportunity to speak to the General Assembly and for the warm hospitality given to her by our Church office and many Church members.

Mr. Hall writes: "During the first two months, I was engaged in intensive work with the Ibo refugees — women and children — who come from Calabar.

"As Chairman of the Lagos Committee of the Christian Council of Nigeria, it was my privilege in January to organize and co-chair with a Muslim, a Joint Muslim-Christian Prayer meeting for the restoration of Peace in the country. Some 2,000 attended the Prayer Meeting held at the Lagos Race Course. In this most memorable event, the Muslims first read from the Koran and offered their prayers. This was followed by the Bible reading, Christian prayers and inspiring hymn-singing. The Christian portion was all in Yoruba except for one prayer in English. Muslims and Christians intermingled freely as there was no separation in the seating arrangements. Many Muslims joined enthusiastically in singing from memory, hymns which obviously they had learned at Christian schools. No hymn books or programs were provided for the meeting.

"In mid-January, Dr. E. H. Johnson visited us immediately after his visit to Biafra. During this most welcome and hectic 8-day visit, Dr. Johnson had continuous meetings with many senior Nigerian officials, including General Gowon, on the possible settlement of the civil war. The Nigerian Government arranged for Dr. Johnson and myself to visit Bonny in the Rivers area immediately after a tough six-weeks' battle. Countless sandy burial mounds and the heavy scent of death, indicated that hundreds of soldiers had died in the battle. We had opportunity to speak briefly to some prisoners of war and to inspect a few home-made Biafran tanks abandoned on the battlefield.

We moved into the new Manse at the end of February, even though the ground floor and compound was not completed until the end of the year. We miss our former crowded neighbourhood and the noisy, friendly young children who constantly swarmed all over us.

"In June, we attended the meeting of the World Association of Christian Broadcasters in Oslo. This body meets once every five years. Representative Christian broadcasters, together with radio and television producers from every corner of the world, made valuable presentations. The point was clearly made that radio and television are the two most important pulpits in the world today, and that often Christian broadcasters use them in mediocre, wasteful and incompetent manner. During the year, the Nigerian Broadcasting Corporation periodically gave me the opportunity to broadcast on radio and television.

"Lagos suffered the heaviest and longest rainy season since records were first kept in 1892. We had rain from May to October. As a result, the church and manse site was often literally a lake of two feet of water. A boat would have been more useful than my car. On occasion, teenagers swam on our street. After Sunday School, the boys caught catfish. I paid attention to the snakes as I waded in and out."

The Rev. Earle Roberts, Secretary of the Social Action Committee of the Christian Council of Nigeria, and its Relief Director, worked tirelessly, often under difficult and frustrating conditions, in organizing and directing the Christian Council's Emergency Relief Program in the war-torn areas.

Mr. Roberts reports: "In June the first C.C.N. overseas medical-relief team arrived, and in July we fielded the first CCN Nigerian relief team. Each medical-relief team consists of a minimum of one doctor, three nurses, one feeding officer, and one administrator with mechanical skills. Five of the teams are here on six month contracts and two for one year. We have recruited our Nigeria staff mainly from the Universities and theological colleges for periods of not less than two months

each. Since July we have had between 20 and 30 Nigerians from either Northern or Western Nigeria working in the distressed areas at all times. These men have in some cases taken time from their studies in order to give this service.

"In addition to the Nigerians from the North and West, the C.C.N. has used between 50 and 75 persons recruited locally in the distressed areas. Some are trained medical personnel, others have been used in the distribution of food.

"In Federal Nigeria the CCN, along with other voluntary organizations, are required by Government order to work as part of the total Red Cross program. On the personnel side, the CCN has contributed about one-quarter of the total overseas staff and two-thirds of the Nigerian staff encompassed in the Red Cross operation.

"Through various overseas agencies, the CCN has received a little more than one and a half million dollars (Canadian) worth of food, medicines and other relief supplies, the bulk of which came during the last three months of 1968."

Mrs. Murray Ross gathered together a few of the Ibo women in the refugee camps to make clothes for distribution in the refugee camps in other parts of the country. The sewers were encouraged to save part of their earnings for the purchase of a sewing machine so that they would have a means of earning their livings. The project and the actual distribution of the clothes to refugees is under the direction of the Lagos Session.

REPORT ON THE BIAFRAN AREA

Throughout the year Biafra was blockaded by the Federal Troops and in the course of the year, Port Harcourt was taken and the boundaries of Biafra were further contracted with the effect of crowding from five to eight million people into an area of only four to five thousand square miles. As this was one of the less fertile parts of the former Eastern Region, the crowded population in a poor food-producing area has been faced with the problems of starvation.

In the early part of the year the situation was not acute, but in the months from mid-June to mid-October, the disease Kwashiorkor caused by protein deficiency, killed over half a million people, most of them children and nursing mothers.

In spite of the terrible pressures of the Federal advance with over-whelming superiority of military equipment, the Biafrans have defended their area with resolution, and at the end of a year of severe attack and throttling blockade, their morale was still good and their determination to resist was still firm. They believe it is a war for survival and freedom, and are not ready to surrender. On the other hand, they are ready for a negotiated settlement.

Ron and Hazel McGraw has done outstanding work in the distribution of relief goods. They were separated from one another for many months when Ron was in Biafra and Hazel was in Ireland, but since September, they have been together in Biafra and continue in good health. They are counted as experienced relief workers and have done useful work in interpreting the situation to the outside world.

Rev. Alex Zeidman of the Scott Mission, Toronto, went to Biafra in the Autumn for a six-month period, and has done a remarkable piece of work as special assistant to Dr. Middlekoop, the head of the Protestant relief effort, first in co-ordinating work in the many areas and camps, secondly, in organizing a measles vaccination campaign, and thirdly, in carrying responsibilities at central stores where the supplies which arrive night by night are organized and dispatched to the various provincial centres.

Rev. Nwachuku Eme, Clerk of Synod and Rev. A. D. Summerville, Assistant Clerk of Synod, continue to carry out their responsibilities for church matters. Like all church leaders they are spending a great deal of their time in relief activities. Rev. Inya Ude is now acting Principal of Trinity Theological College. The College is temporarily closed while the students are all involved in various aspects of the relief program.

As this time, it is not possible to know when peace will be restored, and it is difficult to know how the various fragments into which the former Presbyterian

Church of Nigeria is now divided, may be able to come together again. The remarkable job of relief work being done by the missionaries and church leaders has opened up the whole country to the Christian faith in a way it has never been before.

While we cannot plan definitely about the days ahead, we do know that there will be very substantial needs for reconstruction of church life, and we must see that we keep some reserve of money and of personnel for the time when the doors of access are open again.

INDIA

Our participation in India has been in two areas which in 1968 were centres of interest and development: (1) Vellore and Ludhiana, medical centres, and (2) in the United Church of Northern India.

VELLORE AND LUDHIANA

In 1967 a study was made of Christian medical work in India. Everything from teaching hospitals to small rural hospitals, public health and family planning programs, was included. The findings of this study done by an international team of Christian medical specialists under the World Council's office on Christian Medicine called for radical changes in emphasis in Christian medical programs across India.

Vellore is the famous Christian Medical Centre for treatment and research and for training of medical personnel in South India. Ludhiana is an equally distinguished institution which serves the same purpose in Northern India. Both of these institutions will have an important part to play in establishing new directions for non-governmental medical services in the years to come. This will include the training of doctors and nurses for family planning clinics and for leadership in community health programs, for training hospital administrators and other paramedical personnel so vital to modern medical services.

During 1968, the Presbyterian Church in Canada gave support to both of these institutions.

Dr. Donald Douglas, a clinical biochemist from the congregation of St. Andrew's and St. Paul's in Montreal and his family went to India for a year as volunteers, and according to reports are rendering outstanding service there.

THE UNITED CHURCH OF NORTHERN INDIA

1968 was the year of the quadrennial meeting of the General Assembly, looking forward "with joy and unanimity" to the union of seven churches into a Church of North India in 1970, probably one of the most extensive unions in Church history. It was a year of disintegrating political control by the Congress Party, with the rise of right and left wing governments in several of the states of India, a number of these states passing "anti-conversion laws" to try to contain the Christian influence. It was the year of a growing sense of nationalism in all areas of Indian life and the rejection of many applications for visas from foreign help agencies, especially for missionaries. It was a year of new droughts accompanied by new co-operation and new co-ordination of Christian relief.

This is the kind of India in which the Church sought to be the Church and to move forward under the leading of the Spirit with new courage and imagination to be and to do as it feels called. God has raised up able leadership in the United Church of Northern India, both in its national offices and in local congregations and presbyteries. They need continued support, both through prayer and through the co-operation of their brethren in mission for the challenging days which lie ahead for the Church of Jesus Christ in India.

We have a special relationship to two Church Councils (Presbyteries) within the U.C.N.I.: (a) Vindhya — Satpura Church Council (Bhil area), (b) Bundelkhand Church Council (Jhansi area).

VINDHYA — SATPURA CHURCH COUNCIL (BHIL AREA)

Wilson Herbert, Secretary of the Vindhya & Satpura Church Council writes: "This is the first time that Church Council is sending its report. The outstanding developments which have affected the Church in 1968 are:

"(1) Disappearing of Mission Council and take over of all the evangelistic programs by Church Council. Though the Church Council is inexperienced, it has taken this heavy responsibility boldly.

"(2) The decision has been made to start a Central Fund as recommended by the General Assembly of the U.C.N.I. The Church Council has decided to become fully self-supporting as far as the pastoral ministry is concerned. All congregations will contribute 70% of their income for the Central Fund and other expenses of Church Council.

"(3) Future Role of Indian Evangelists: Some states, including Madhya Pradesh, have introduced laws to stop conversions. Government is making more restrictions for missionaries' visas and special endorsements. It may stop foreign aid for Christian work. At the same time, the General Assembly also advises reduction of the number of evangelists paid by foreign aid. Keeping all these things in mind, Church Council is challenging its congregations to promote a stewardship program."

There are eight congregations under the care of Vindhya — Satpura Church Council, and six unorganized groups of Christian people. Latest reports showed that there were 1462 children and 725 adults, i.e. the total number of Christians was 2187. There are four national ordained ministers, of whom one is Youth Director. There are three probationers (have completed theological studies and may be ordained). Two candidates have been approved by Church Council to go for B.D. work in 1969. The total number of evangelists is 16, of whom one is Hospital Chaplain and two are women. There are four Canadian Presbyterian missionaries engaged in evangelistic work under the direction of Church Council:—Miss M. Kennedy (1939), Miss A. Hislop (1951), Rev. J. W. Milne (1957), and Rev. D. E. Howard (1965).

Mr. Howard is Moderator of the Church Council and also convener of some of the important standing committees like Audio-Visual and Literature and he is taking keen interest in youth work.

Mr. Milne is Vice-Moderator of Church Council and Convener of several committees such as Theological, Church Union, Property and Policy Committee. He is the Director of the Christian Training Centre in Jobat. At the same time he is also looking after the relief work in Mendha.

Church Council is very happy to integrate the women's work with it. Miss Kennedy and Miss Hislop are now members of Church Council, representing women's work. Both are engaged in Christian Education working among children and women in congregations. They arrange camps and conferences. Both are helping in relief work.

The Missionary Committee: 1968 will be remembered for the integration of Mission Council work. Church responsibilities are fully within the Church — evangelism, youth work, Christian training, audio-visual, and women's work. Women evangelistic missionaries are to be full members of Church Council. All responsibilities for institutional work formerly undertaken by the now defunct Mission Council are carried on by the Administrative Council for Christian Institutions.

Under these circumstances, the importance of leadership training and continued Christian nurture is obvious. The work of the Christian Training Centre has made strides. More classes were held and the Centre had greater use than in 1967. Facilities were improved and some furnishings purchased. At the Centre, classes were held for laymen, stewardship classes were conducted, Sunday School teachers and children's

group leaders had courses, refresher courses for evangelists and bible women had full attendance, the Annual Youth Conference gathered there; a Medical Conference in December wound up the year's activities. Classes were carried on in other places than under the roof of the Centre, with some help from the Director.

There are six ordained ministers: four Indian, one of whom was ordained in 1968, and two Canadian. Newly ordained Salatiel Ezra has special responsibilities as Youth Work Director. Rev. Jalal Masih Daniel is pastor in Barwani, and Supervisor of the Evangelists in the area South of the Narbada River. Rev. Samuel Tezlo is pastor of Amkhut — Puniyawat congregation, and is involved in evangelistic outreach in the whole area. Rev. Bhima Ditiya is pastor of the Mendha-Bhabra-Warjhar congregation and supervises evangelists in those areas.

The General Assembly of the U.C.N.I. met in 1968. Its main theme was Church Union. That Church with at least three others, and perhaps more, will unite to form the Church of North India in late 1970. The Vindhya Satpura Church Council has voted in favour, so will expect to go into the CNI.

Education

Amkhut School: In July, due to a provincial change in the system, the eighth grade in Amkhut was closed. Scholarships were given to most of the 8th class pupils to enable them to continue. They are now attending Government Schools from their home or are in other boarding schools or hostels. Ram Singh, baptized last year, was the first person to be granted the special scholarship of Rs. 100. for the outstanding pupil in 8th class. In Rasalpura he stood first in the December half-yearly examination. Enrollment reached an all time high of 352 in July. In October thirteen teachers attended a four-day Refresher Course in Rasalpura for teachers in the Malwa area.

Village Schools: Primary schools are operated by the Church in five villages. In Jobat another teacher was engaged. In Puniyawat enrollment increased and another class was added. The school building was moved to land secured by the Church and was enlarged to accommodate two classrooms and a central living place. For the supervision of the Village Schools, the Education Board accepted a proposal by which a committee composed of a Supervisor, an Advisor, and a member of the Amkhut School staff will be responsible for supervision and budget.

Higher Education: Of the four girls who were in the 10th grade in Jhansi, three passed; one is in the School of Nursing, Jobat, one in Kalvari Bible School in Allahabad and one is studying in Jobat. In Ludhiana Medical College, Dabura Tezlo and Nirmala Agarwal passed well in 1st and 2nd years respectively.

Rasalpura Boys School was raised to Junior College status. Two boys from Jobat have entered the college. One scholarship student received his B.A. degree in 1968. Three boys are receiving Vocational Training: one in the Punjab taking a mechanic's course, two in Rasalpura taking the welding course. Johnny Chakko is continuing in Vellore Medical School. Two continue in Theological College.

Mandleshwar School and hostel continue to co-operate by accepting pupils from the Khalghat-Balkhar area. Ten boys from this area are in Middle School, five boys and six girls in the Primary School. The parents are gradually recognizing the advantages of education for the children and some are making a real effort to pay the necessary fees.

Amkhut Hostels: There are eighty-seven girls in hostel, including two Hindu sisters. Miss Shanti Tauriya, matron for many years, had to resign for health reasons, and was replaced by Mrs. Lily Mankar — an ex-Babies' Home girl. Evening and morning devotions, weekly Girls' group, supervised games' hour twice a week, Sunday Night fellowship hour for those over 17 years of age, are some of the extra-curricular activities. In 'family groups' the girls do their own cooking and clean the hostel.

Seventy-three boys are in the Boys' Hostel and enjoy much the same activities as the girls. However, there is a cook for the boys; they share in the field and other work around the compound and so gain practical experience. The floors of both hostels have been cemented this year; previously they were plastered with the customary mixture of mud and cow dung. Calvin Jigiyo is house father.

There is need of a sick roof, especially for times when contagious diseases break out. Also needed are quarters for the house father and his family. Again this year, gift supplies of milk powder, grain and oil from Church World Service have helped to make ends meet.

Jobat Christian Hospital

Dr. Daniel, the Medical Superintendent left temporarily for further studies and clinical training in the U.K., and left the medical work in charge of Dr. K. S. Dawar, a young Bhil doctor who has thrown himself into his duties with enthusiasm and competence. Dr. Dawar submitted the Annual Medical Report, with comments, which reveals how busy he has been and how wholeheartedly he has entered into the spirit of Christian service which is characteristic of the whole staff. He is seeking another doctor to help with the work load, but is having difficulty getting one who is willing to come to such a "backward area".

Dr. Dawar's report continues: "I am trying my best to keep up the standard of the hospital. It has gained much popularity in the area and we have an even better prospect because there is no such hospital within a 30 mile area where major operations can be performed. As you know, this hospital is surrounded by a poor population so it is a great help to these poor people.

"Due to the kind co-operation of the government doctor, I have had a chance to treat many injuries by arrow to abdomen and chest. We are also getting very good co-operation from other government officials. I am very thankful to my staff who work faithfully and sincerely to maintain the hospital's popularity in this area. The co-operation and work of the staff is quite satisfactory and I can say that they understand their duties well.

"In the past year, we have had 246 major operations, 390 minor operations and 323 minor procedures, a total of 956. In addition, there were 182 maternity cases. Total out-patients numbered 11,912 of whom 4,254 were repeat cases. Total in-patients were 2,296 or a daily average of 95.5 patients."

Dr. Dawar concludes his report with a word of tribute to the Administrative ability of Miss Sherrick which has enabled him "to work freely" as Medical Officer. He notes that the income of the hospital is increasing yearly from Rs. 99,748.89 in 1966 to Rs. 138,771.26 in 1968.

He comments on the report of Mr. Nigel Bruce, Canadian Hospital Administrator, who did a survey of the hospital and made a very helpful report in terms of efficiency and effectiveness of operation. In his report Mr. Bruce raises the question of whether it is profitable to try to operate a hospital in such a poor part of the country. Dr. Dawar, a native Bhil, replies: "India is a very poor country and this area is poorest among all areas. This mission has served the people for about 50 years and this hospital has become very well-known and loved. People in this area are completely backward — they do not even know how to wear clothes properly. But as far as a "profitable market" is concerned, let us remember the Lord Jesus himself was born in a very poor family. He loves the poor, and we are the poorest material with which the highly skilled workers have to work. Being the poorest, the Lord loves us more. We know our ancestors were violent criminals, decoits, thieves and most backward and not knowing what is sin. But He loved us and inspired His people in Canada to come and serve our people and to teach them the love of God. Now we, the offsprings, are in some better position. We have been educated and are working and serving Him in different fields. We are learning to take responsibilities and some are doing it very efficiently to whom the chance has been given. Is that not the profit the Lord has received? We are sure the seeds are not being sown in stoney ground but in fruitful ground."

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

"Our move to Mendha from Jobat was done with the understanding that being engaged in mechanized farming, it is better to be among farmers who can see and

adopt modern practices," says the Economic Development Report, "But few came with a demand for machinery, for various reasons. The solution would be to do experimental demonstration work in Mendha area, but our income is such as to meet only normal running expenses.

"Poultry work was stopped for lack of a proper poultry house. A grant has been requested from AFPRO for one; then this line of Economic Development will be alive again.

"Very little tractor ploughing work was done this year. We were mostly engaged in blasting work — wells, dams, and roads. The little portable engine-pumps for irrigation are doing marvellous jobs. People who could afford to pay rental charges proudly show their wheat crop to visitors.

"Due to late coming and early end of rains in this area, most of the crops either died or yields were about 30%. Winter crops failed also as the late rains were insufficient. Relief work continues—using money from Canada and food from CASA."

School of Nursing, Jobat

In April, Miss Mary Nichol, the Director, left on furlough. Supervision of the school was put in the capable hands of Mrs. Chandra Prabha Fazal. During the year there were thirty-five students, as follows:

First year (12); Second year (7); Third year (11); and Fourth year (5). Third year students were at the top in Mid-India Board exams and secured the third position.

In July we took in a new class of twelve students, three boys and nine girls. Eleven students are from our local area. It is a great joy and privilege to prepare the nurses from our own field. They all received their caps in October at the usual capping service in the Church.

In the month of August, the Secretary of the Mid-India Board inspected the School of Nursing, Nurses's Residence, and the Hospital and gave very good reports. The clinical facilities are excellent for a School of Nursing. Female nurses residence is one of the best residences in the MIBE. Hospital was clean and tidy. The whole hospital is nicely planned with several new additions. There is a good T.B. ward unit, the best in MIBE, and separated from the main hospital.

The Sunday evening Jobat Youth Fellowship is largely attended by students and Mr. Musa Abey, the Hospital Chaplain is in charge of this in Miss Nichol's absence.

Nursing Service Department

Miss Aksha Wilson, Acting Superintendent of Nursing Services, writes: "We have 18 staff nurses and 3 ward aid nurses. Three South Indian staff nurses and two male nurses from our field joined the staff from July after completing their nursing training here in Jobat. Miss B. Calvin who was one of our best staff nurses was sent for the ward sister course in Indore from October 1967 to April 1968 and at present she is teaching in the Nursing School full time.

I very much appreciate the staff nurses' work as they co-operate with Dr. Dawar when he is working all alone. The staff nurses do not grumble when they are called for any emergencies, or when they have to do the extra time duties. This month was the busiest month of the whole year. We had many patients in wards and O.P.D. — the daily in-patient average is 112 for the month.

We hope that you will not mind if we submit our needs: (1) Our old sterilizer has been sent to Indore for repair since 1½ months. Our Central supply for the sterile sets to wards is closed for one month. So we are in great and urgent need of a new sterilizer. (2) Isolation ward is badly required as we have many infectious cases and they are all kept in one room. (3) More kitchens are needed as the patient's relatives cook their food here and there on the grounds as we have so many patients. We tell them not to cook there, but can't tell them where to cook as we do not have enough kitchens. (4) A nurses' sick room is required. The staff nurses have to pay the full charge for private rooms and if the rooms are not vacant they have to stay in the general ward. (5) Quarters for the married staff nurses are a necessity.

Mobile Medical Units (Village Christian Health Services)

The first unit, Barwani area, visits eleven villages each week. A total of fourteen villages are visited in a month. More work has been done through home visiting than in groups. A personal interest is given to people coming for treatment by following up with home visitation, and by trying to help individual families see what they can do to better their own situation. The clinic team also assists in the Family Planning program, teaching and helping those interested to get to the nearest Family Planning Centre. Very ill patients are taken to hospital.

Miss Morrison left for furlough in April and Miss White joined the staff in July.

The Second Unit, Mendha area, has served in village clinics and large numbers of people who have come to the Welfare Centre in Mendha and to the Dispensaries in Mandha and Amkhut. Maternal and Child Welfare clinics are held in several villages regularly. In Bhabra, a town three miles from Mendha, the Fourth Year Midwifery and Public Health Students from Jobat School of Nursing, come to us for part of their field experience. Miss Suzanna Tezlo, Unit Director, also goes to Jobat to teach these students their Public Health Course.

A clinic for Leprosy patients, is held in Mendha, for which Dr. Daniel came from time to time. Now the Government doctor from Bhabra has expressed willingness to come for this clinic. We have seen improvement in some of the patients, and, in some, the disease has been arrested.

In our maternity work there are sometimes emergencies when women have difficulty in delivering their babies and we have to take them to the hospital for help. Mendha school children are weighed each month, and receive a noon meal of porridge, oil and milk, with added multipurpose food and vitamins.

In epidemics of cholera, whooping cough, measles, small pox and chicken pox, we have had available the necessary medicines, and also have taken part in immunization programs. In the latter we have tried to work with the Government agencies.

A special word of appreciation for the driver of the Unit-motor; at any time of the day or night he is ready and on call for those who need to be brought for help. Without his dedicated assistance, it would be impossible for us to do our work effectively.

M. G. Abey Memorial Children's Home

For most of the year, there were 22 to 24 children. In June the children welcomed a new brother, 10-day old Ratan Singh, whose mother died shortly after his birth. We expect he will be returning to his father early in the new year; we are happy to care for children temporarily while their families make a suitable arrangement for their care.

Two of the little girls 'graduated' to the Girls' Hostel. One of the children was adopted by a Canadian family, and we trust that they will meet with little difficulty in their correspondence with governments of both countries in arranging to take her to Canada. A number of the children are 'adopted' by groups or individuals, in Canada. We are also grateful for the gifts of milk powder, clothes and grain which

come from Church World Service and friends. Not only the Babies' Home children benefit from this generosity, but also the children who attend the daily nursery school. Each day before leaving for home, they receive a meal of porridge, milk and oil.

We are especially thrilled with the gift of a washing machine this year. It came to us from a group of United Church women in Kitchener, through a United Church of Canada missionary in Indore.

Famine Relief

Rev. J. W. Milne writes: "We had poor rains in our district so relief work continued the whole year." Miss A. Hislop writes: "Around Jobat, grasshoppers and other insects again appeared to eat what started to grow when rain did come at the beginning of the season. In the past four months, ten men have been supervising work in fifteen or more villages, with about two thousand beneficiaries a week receiving grain." Miss I. White writes: "During the rains, the Narbada River overflowed its banks more than ever before, and many people along the banks were left destitute. An emergency relief work project was started to employ some of these people over about six weeks time."

Personals

In response to the invitation from this field, Mr. Nigel Bruce, Canadian Hospital Administrator, came to assess the medical work and its strengths and weaknesses. During his months there, he became a real member of the group, and in the days to come, the work will reap the benefits of his labours.

Mrs. Mildred Gehman retired from service at Vellore in March, after a long and varied career of dedicated missionary work in Manchuria, Yunnan (South West China) and India.

BUNDELKHAND CHURCH COUNCIL (JHANSI AREA)

In 1968 in two Indian States, (Orissa and Madhya Pradesh), bills were passed (although they were contrary to the Constitution) which evidently are designed to make evangelism and conversions in those States well-nigh impossible. Christians are apprehensive lest similar coercions and restrictions may be introduced by the governments of other states also.

Looking forward to elections in four of the key states in North India in February, 1969, certain interested parties appear to be behind much of the lawlessness and strikes on the part of students, teachers and various others. This all brings frustrations which effect the life and progress of the Church.

The greatest need of the Church in India is a revival of God's ordering — something that shall arouse the Church and get the message through to her, "Awake thou that sleepest, and arise from the dead, and Christ shall give thee light." A great challenge remains before the Church in India in the fields of Stewardship, Christian Education, Youth Work, Laymen's Training and Evangelism.

There is still a need for Mission Schools and Hospitals. Social and economic projects are perhaps more welcome in the eyes of the government authorities than any other form of mission work. Some of this would be good for the farming community at Isagarh if wisely used. This is of little value to the growth and strength of the Christian Church. Some statements issued by a consultation in Nagpur last year: (1) Economic Life and Relief Programs have seemingly made little impact upon the stewardship of the Church. (2) Christians are glad to receive the help these programs provide, but are not eager to share the benefits with other communities. (3) There is little, if any, evidence that such programs produce a grateful perceptive Church which expresses Christ's compassion in self-giving.

Canadian Presbyterian G.B.M. staff at Jhansi: Rev. and Mrs. Angus MacKay. Canadian Presbyterian W.M.S. staff: Miss E. Magee, Miss M. Leask, Miss D. Wadsworth, and Miss E. Knott. The W.M.S. staff numbers from 10 to 20 in all. The G.B.M. national staff consists of one man, John William, who is Sub-Treasurer and helps with the maintenance work.

Helen MacDonald Memorial Girls' School

Of the 34 girls who appeared in the U.P. Board High School exams, one passed in First Division, 14 in Second Division and 18 in Third, and one failed. Twenty-two of these graduates are studying in intermediate classes. Seven are taking nurses training, one is taking Bible Training, one is learning typing and two are teaching.

There have been a number of staff changes. A new teacher was appointed in January. We have been without a school clerk since Miss Dawes left to be married at the end of December. We were all very glad to have Miss Leask back with us in February. Five teachers resigned at the end of the school year, two of whom got married. Of the six new teachers engaged in July, 1968, two left at the end of the same month. Other teachers were found at the end of September to take their places. Mrs. Stephen Lall led the devotions at the staff retreat before the opening of the school. The teachers spent some time in studying the courses for the new school year.

In July the total school enrolment was 199. Twenty-one girls are in Prep. class, 92 in Junior High School and 86 in High School classes (IX and X). Each school day begins with a short chapel led in turn by the teachers. Each Friday the girls themselves lead the worship by classes. Before the school chapel, the teachers have a short time of prayer together.

Bible classes are held twice a week. The courses prepared by the Christian Education Department of the Evangelical Fellowship of India are still used in the Bible classes as well as in Sunday School classes. These courses are a great help in teaching. Special days such as Republic Day, Independence Day and Teachers' Day are celebrated with games. Staff socials are held frequently. In the evenings, the girls have opportunity of participating in different games and clubs.

JOINT ACTION IN MISSION

The underlying conviction of joint work is that what we are doing is part of the total mission to which God sends His Church and we must work in positive relation with those who have been called to the same task.

Through our membership in World Council of Churches Committees, we are able to give added strength to a number of joint undertakings which might otherwise not be carried out. For a fuller treatment of ways in which we work jointly with other churches and agencies, see the Missions Report of March 1968 or "The Lively Acts" of 1967. We report below a more detailed story of one such involvement in mission in the city of Naples, Italy.

THE CASA MIA STORY

The story of the Italian Service Mission in Naples goes back to the year 1945. As soon as the war was over, the Congregational Christian Service Committee sent to Naples a medical mission to assist people who were suffering from malnutrition and starvation.

The Italian Service Mission enlisted the support of Italian and American doctors to give assistance to the thousands of people who had lost their homes because of the bombing. People had taken refuge in caves which became over-crowded with people living in tragedy and misery. For more than three years the work went on, trying to give health, strength and hope to these defeated people. Children were left to themselves, nobody seemed to care about them. The Italian Service Mission gathered together children from the slums and caves, organizing open-air games on public squares.

In 1948 under the auspices of the Italian Service Mission, a barracks village was built in the vicinity of the railroad station. Forty families were taken from the darkness of the caves and housed in the barracks. This called the attention of a group of

skilled Protestant and Catholic social workers to the vocational and educational needs of the children. In 1950, U.N.R.R.A. with the assistance of the Italian Service Mission provided another group of apartment houses where fifty more families were resettled. The Italian Service Mission was instrumental in calling the attention of the municipal authorities and the Press to the problems of the caves and the slums. It took part in the clearing of the last slums of Capodimonte. Its caves were sealed as an expression of the will of the people never to go back there. At the time Casa Mia, which means, "My Home", was founded.

Casa Mia became the headquarters where assistance was organized for all non-Catholic refugees including many Orthodox. The help of Church World Service made it possible to overcome much human distress. Children and young people were able to overcome the frustration caused by living in a barbed wire camp by staying from time to time at Casa Mia. They did not live in elegant rooms, but found brotherhood and mutual comprehension. One of our young men, from Bulgaria, was able to attend the Medical School of the University of Naples. Opportunities were provided for recreation, singing, and handicraft projects.

It is an encouraging sign that in our area there are now children who are attending Junior High School. We have a nice group of young boys and girls of High School age who even before public school opened asked for help especially in the subjects of Italian and Mathematics. Angelina Vito, an elementary teacher, is the leader of this group. To help teenage girls to acquire a skill, Casa Mia has for many years offered a course in pattern-making and tailoring. These girls have the privilege of taking State exams which enable them to earn a Diploma to enter the professional world.

The story of the past has no meaning apart from the hope for the future. What is the future of Casa Mia? Certainly the area where Casa Mia is now located is going to be cleared of all the barracks and tenement houses. The community development which the Italian Service Mission organized brought a general clearing of the areas. However, there are many other places in Naples which should be cleared of their slums. Casa Mia will be re-located in the area of Ponticelli where the Evangelical Hospital is now located. There is a terrible situation of neglect, frustration and misery. The un- and under-employed population is 30,000. It is imperative to do something for these people who are today, still the outcasts of society.

"Casa Mia has a big dream: to place its tents amongst these people, to stay with them, to gather together their children and to open before their eyes the opportunities of life which are also theirs. We want to start with them a dialogue for the purpose of leading them to self-decision in community development and human progress. This is the task to which we feel God is calling us. We have not the means but we know that God will be with us if we are faithful.

"It is estimated that the cost of the new Casa Mia at Ponticelli will be \$100,000. Half of this amount has already been pledged by the United Church Board for World Ministries, and friends from Italy and abroad. "The ground breaking ceremony will coincide with the dedication of the Evangelical Hospital; may God help us, through our brethren, to overcome our financial difficulties so that our dream may be fulfilled." So writes Teofilo Santi, Director of Casa Mia.

It is to this work that the Rev. Donald MacKay was appointed by the General Board of Missions through the World Council of Churches.

OVERSEAS STUDENTS AND LAYMEN ABROAD

We in Canada are fortunate in living at a point where cultures meet. No one who has made close contact with persons of another culture would want to be without this experience. There is also the challenge to Canadian laymen and women to be counted among the "new diplomats" who represent Canada abroad in the world of

business, government, education or scientific development. God is calling the Church to express its mission through these strategic channels of Christian service involving both overseas students and laymen going abroad.

OVERSEAS STUDENTS

In 1968, according to figures released by the Association of Universities and Colleges of Canada, 15,116 overseas students were enrolled in Canadian universities from 151 countries. A total of 389 students have come from countries in South America; over 5,400 students are from Asian lands, and more than 1,000 students have come from the developing nations of Africa. In addition, there are more than 6,000 trainees from overseas countries who are receiving training in technical fields in schools of technology and in many branches of Canadian industry. At present there are more than 21,000 overseas students and trainees obtaining higher education at Canadian universities and colleges, and securing practical training with a number of industrial corporations, community colleges, and government departments.

The Service for Overseas Students of the Presbyterian Church in Canada is under the direction of the Rev. D. H. Powell, of the Overseas section of the General Board of Missions. The objective of the Service is to provide assistance to these students and trainees, so that they may get the maximum benefit from their formal training program while they are in Canada. We work closely in association with the Canadian Service for Overseas Students and Trainees (CSOST) with headquarters in Ottawa, and Mr. Powell is a present Vice-President of this organization.

A number of congregations have had very successful programs furthering good relationship with overseas students and trainees.

Many of these young people who come from overseas to study in our universities and technical colleges are or will become leaders in their own countries. They will return to positions of strategic importance. Some of them come from areas of the work which are closed to missionaries. On returning to their homelands, they may exercise a profound influence. Friendship and effective communication with these students is a priority for our church people who are alive to the implications of this form of the Christian mission.

Members of the Church have a great responsibility to give friends from overseas the good news of the Gospel and to enable them to make friendships centred on an experience of the new life in Christ. Many have been greatly impressed by what they have seen in Christian homes across the land. Some of them are now taking an active part in the work of the church in their own countries. "Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for thereby some have entertained angels unawares" (Hebrews 13:2). It is part of our Christian responsibility to other citizens from all the nations of the world.

LAYMEN ABROAD

Today there is an undeniable persuasion among Christian laymen and women that they can and should try to make their faith a daily and inseparable part of their vocations. The task of the Service for Laymen Aboard is to become part of this movement of the Spirit of God to give basic leadership and to assist in finding new and better ways to enlist, orient and equip those of our lay people who are obedient to this special call to service in new situations in the world mission of Christ and His Church.

The Holy Spirit is calling lay people of the Presbyterian Church in Canada to offer their skills for service in overseas lands in their secular work, to be witnesses in their lives to the concern and love of Jesus Christ for all mankind.

The Service for Laymen Abroad, through the work of its Director in 1968, has endeavoured to secure information from Synods, Presbyteries, Churches, ministers and laymen on what is being done to encourage concerned laity to offer their services in projects overseas, and on the names and nature of work of those who go abroad on

professional assignments. Mr. Powell has maintained liaison with the organized channels functioning within the Church's life that deal with various aspects of the laity.

Local congregations have been encouraged to give pastoral support and recognition to their members living and working abroad, keeping in close touch with them while on an overseas assignment.

The Director has maintained close liaison with the World Council of Churches Department on the Laity and with National Christian Councils in various parts of the world. Focus has been kept on the difficult but rewarding areas of how qualified lay people can be placed in governments and business positions overseas. We have been exploring ways by which concerned Christians now in Government, business and technological services can be reached by training programs to enable them to be more effective in their Christian life and mission, prior to going overseas, while at home between tours of duty, or after arrival in an overseas country.

There is the strong possibility that government, business, private agencies, and the universities may be interested in co-operative programs whereby people destined for overseas assignment may attend orientation courses and briefing seminars. The Church, having had experience in preparing laymen for assignments overseas, is in a position to co-operate effectively in briefing and training programmes. Our concern is to equip Christian lay people for their life and work while overseas, but there are effective areas of co-operation with 'secular' agencies, including various centres of International Studies, to challenge Canadians going abroad to be aware of their contributions to international development, and to enable them to respond creatively to the opportunities that will open to them wherever they go.

The power of the Gospel must be represented in the lives and actions of ordinary men and women in the employ of business and government, education, science and technology if it is to have meaning and validity to people on six continents in today's world.

REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY,
EASTERN DIVISION

To the Venerable, the ninety-fifth General Assembly:

The Board of Management of the Woman's Missionary Society, Eastern Division, begs leave to submit the following report for the year 1968:

Following the special projects of centennial year, and the interest aroused by them, there were fears of a slump in interest in 1968, but we found that the interest and zeal thus produced, were not only maintained, but intensified.

During the year, we supported two presbytery deaconesses for the full year, one deaconess for the first five months of the year; one regional secretary, two part-time hospital visitors, two student deaconesses for summer work, and an assistant for Miss Shaw for the summer. Several grants were made, and these may be noted in the appended financial summary.

In the early spring, Miss Elsie Lee, the Chinese worker who had been on loan to us from the Western Division, W.M.S., since September, 1964, reached full retirement age, and relinquishing her post in Halifax, returned to Toronto. This has left the Atlantic Provinces without any witness to the Chinese people on the part of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, except for a few contacts maintained by some members of the W.M.S. in Halifax. We are very grateful for this cooperation of the W.M.S., W.D., and appreciative of Miss Lee's labor for the Master, and pray that this labor may not have been in vain.

INDIA. Overseas, we continue our support of Miss Mary Nichol, R.N., on the Bhil field, India, and our grant to the School of Nursing. Miss Nichol has been spending the past year at home, on furlough, but the great proportion of her time has been spent on deputation work, and in New York completing successfully two courses of value to the work in India.

TAIWAN: Miss Georgine Caldwell, who, according to the reports which we receive from others, is doing splendid work in Christian Education in the Theological College, Taipei, is expected home for her first furlough in July of this year.

GUYANA: In Guyana, our responsibility is for two native senior deaconesses and one native junior deaconess.

JAPAN and NEW HEBRIDES: Grants to Japan for the support of pastors' families and the women's work are continued from earlier years, as well as the small gift to Tangoa Training Institute, South Santo, our small effort to keep alive the memory of Dr. John Geddie.

The annual meeting of the society, held in Bethel Church, Sydney, May 7th and 8th, was highlighted by the presence of four overseas missionaries: our own Miss Mary Nichol, who reached her home in Smith's Falls on Saturday, and flew to Sydney on Tuesday to be with us, and to give a public presentation of her work and of the situation in India on Wednesday evening; the Rev. Mr. and Mrs. Angus MacKay of the Jhansi field, and Miss Agnes Gollan of Biafra. Each of these very welcome visitors gave a lesson, a message and a challenge, making the 1968 meeting an outstanding one for all who were privileged to attend, and also for the many who received reports from their delegates.

For the first time, a very successful adult week-end workshop was held at Camp Geddie, under the Missionary Education Committee, in September. This drew representatives from all four of the Atlantic Provinces, affording a wonderful time of fellowship and a good introduction to the new mission study. Another stimulating conference, held in New Glasgow, draws together the presbytery deaconesses, regional secretary, hospital visitors and a small group of W.M.S. Board members, and to which the presbytery conveners of Missions and Christian Education are invited.

Girls' and Children's work continues to be supervised by the Girls' and Children's Secretaries of the W.M.S., E.D., who assist leaders, and potential leaders, by workshops on the mission study and any other phases of work which seem to require guidance, and by individual assistance. In the early fall, about one hundred teenagers from Saskatchewan, Ontario, Prince Edward Island, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, and Newfoundland, took part in a "Creative Contest". We were very pleased and proud that our teenagers placed so well. In the senior section, four from our eastern provinces received honorable mention; in the junior section, first place was awarded to Mary E. Cunningham, daughter of the editor of "The Presbyterian Message," while three others were included in the list of honorable mention.

"The Presbyterian Message" continues to provide news of the mission field at home and overseas, as well as carrying out its function to proclaim Christ. Mrs. James Cunningham is the capable editor, and our subscription approximated 3,000.

This year saw our presbyterials reduced from nine to eight, with the union of the Sydney and Inverness-Victoria Presbyterials into the Cape Breton Presbyterial.

Among those of our members called during the year to Higher Service, were a former overseas secretary, Mrs. W. M. Clark of Fredericton, N.B., and our beloved senior deaconess (retired), Miss Susan Sylvester, New Glasgow, N.S. May we, to whom the torch has been passed by them and the others who have gone before, be given the strength and grace to hold it high, and to press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus.

**REPORT OF THE WOMEN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY,
WESTERN DIVISION**

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

The Council Executive of the Women's Missionary Society, W.D., respectfully submits the following report of the Society's work for the year 1968:

ORGANIZATION

Through the various groups — Children's, Teenage Girls' and Women's — which make up the Women's Missionary Society, W.D. there is a continuous endeavour to fulfil the purpose of the Society, "to unite the women, girls, and children of the Church in prayer, study and service for the advancement of the Kingdom of God at home and abroad."

The Organization Department is related to these groups through Synodical and Presbyterian Secretaries who are responsible for the groups within their areas. The National Age Group Secretaries endeavour to keep in touch with the Synodical and Presbyterian Secretaries throughout the year, and in their respective areas the Regional Secretaries work with them as they represent both the Board of Christian Education and the Women's Missionary Society.

In carrying out one of the major responsibilities of the department, that of preparing and selecting suitable educational materials for use in the various age groups, the Children's, Girls' and Adult Work Committees have met regularly throughout 1968 to consider and prepare general materials to assist leaders and particularly materials on the mission theme—"New Forms of Mission". For Adults and Youth this meant the preparing and publishing of a book "New Acts in Mission" as well as programme guides, for the 1968-69 study year. Throughout the 1967-68 study year the majority of the groups used materials either on Japan, concentrating on the Korean Christian Church in Japan, and/or Christ and the Faiths of Men. The former helped them to share more sympathetically in the anniversary celebrations of the Korean Christian Church in Japan and the latter to know the Christian Faith better and to be able to meet other faiths more intelligently.

In 1968 the publication of "Explorers—A Guide for Explorer Counsellors" was a highlight in Children's work. This guide encouraged counsellors to be more imaginative in their approach to the junior weekday programme for boys and girls. This has also stimulated the committee to re-think the purpose of weekday groups for children and to prepare guidelines to assist congregations in exploring the needs of children in their congregations and communities. The Girls' Work Committee sees as its major responsibility the development of training leaders and girls for the church's ministry with youth. It seeks constantly for adequate resources and through a Resource Catalogue makes these materials known to leaders. The over one hundred and fifty entries in the Creative Writing Contest sponsored by the Committee in 1967-68 indicated that young people want to and can express themselves creatively. An issue of *The Glad Tidings* was given to the entries. While there is a trend towards coeducational groups a need is still felt for girls' groups. In the area of Adult Education it is felt wise to have a broad selection of resources and the Adult Work Committee endeavoured to seek out more suitable materials than on one study theme and to make them known to groups as well as being ready to help any group find materials on specific subjects it might wish to explore. During the last two years interesting experiments have been carried out in Adult-Youth discussions which have proved helpful to both age groups. The increasing number of women employed outside the home tends to increase the number of evening groups and decrease of afternoon groups or the amalgamation of groups and is one of the reasons for some decreases in membership.

There is constant concern that more people be willing to give time to lead children's and youth groups as well as to take responsibility in adult work. There is constant need for leadership training which demands careful planning in every area in order that the best use is made of staff available. Changing situations, changing materials to meet the situations call for better trained and equipped leaders. Training was carried out in many areas by Synodical and Presbyterian Officers with the assistance of Regional Secretaries and Presbytery Deaconesses. The Organization Staff has been much involved in the introducing of Curriculum and assisting Church School Teachers as well as in the training of leaders and officers of weekday groups. Christian Education Conveners of Synods and Presbyteries, Regional Secretaries and Presbytery Deaconesses were brought together in Area Conferences through the cooperation of the Board of Christian Education and the National and Organization Departments of the W.M.S. with the result that teamwork planning was begun in many Synods and Presbyteries. A W.M.S. Training Centre was held in Albert College, Belleville, Ontario, July 15-19, 1968 which brought together representative women from the three central Synodicals. There they were involved in individual and group Bible Study, workshops for leaders and officers of Children's, Teenage Girls' and Adult Work. The evening programmes offered opportunity for research and discussion leading to better understanding of problems and situations confronting the Church today and to attempting to find the responsibility of Christians in meeting them. In Autumn, National Staff shared in Training Events and other meetings in Western Canada—Miss Booth in Manitoba; Miss Tetley in Saskatchewan and British Columbia; and Miss Nutt and Miss Reith in British Columbia and Alberta and Saskatchewan.

In response to many requests for speakers deputation was planned for the National and Overseas missionaries available, for members of Council Executive, National Age Group Secretaries and Directors.

During the year the Re-assessment Committee continued its work preparing a questionnaire to involve the women of the Synodicals and Presbyteries in thinking seriously of the way in which women can best take their place in the total work of the Church and what organizational set-up enables them to do it best.

"The Christian Church in this part of India seems to be poised on a question mark! The confidence of a slow but steady growth has been shaken and ahead lies both a challenge and a snare. Is there to be persecution with its cleansing power and sure victories, or is there to be a conforming, within the all-embracing tolerance of Hinduism, so as not to offend? There is some fearfulness abroad but there is also a certain excitement to faith in the thought of how God will use the situation should the withdrawal of the international missionary personnel and funds be enforced. At the end of 1968, it has been good to remember that the Church is the creation of the God of the universe, the God whose sure laws in science, when sought out and obeyed by the astronauts and their team were utterly reliable right to the moon and back! With just such confidence, we in India can pray, "Strengthen Thy Church in every land, O God, that it may survive not for its own safety but for the world's salvation."

Thus did Margaret Kennedy begin her personal report for 1968. What she says in India can be said around the world.

The year 1968 saw the last two Mission Councils with which the Canadian Presbyterian Church is associated disappear and the Church which had grown under the care of those Councils take full responsibility as church courts.

On January 1, 1968, the Guyana Presbyterian Church came of age. Its highest court is the presbytery. It is a member of the Caribbean Assembly of Reformed Churches. On October 29, 1968, the Bhil Mission council formally handed over authority to two groups which succeed it:— The Vindhya and Satpura Church Council (presbytery) of the United Church of Northern India and the Administrative Council for Christian Institutions (ACCI). It is worthy of note that the women's evangelistic work in the Bhil field comes under the Church Council. Women may take responsibility in the church courts — under an act of the United Church of Northern India — taking on full responsibilities, except voting on faith and order.

It was a year of rejoicing in the Korean Christian Church in Japan as its 60th Anniversary was celebrated. Special guests to the October celebrations were Miss E. L. McClelland, President of the W.M.S. (W.D.) and Dr. Clifton MacKay, the Moderator of the 94th General Assembly of our Church. Celebrations were but a small part of the Korean Anniversary. The year 1968 began a "decade of development" through which the Korean Christian congregations and courts are hoping to strengthen the whole life of their Church. This hope is spelled out through plans for moving forward on every aspect of the life of the Korean Christian Church. There is a strong emphasis on education for all age groups — particularly through lay training and children's programmes.

It was a dark year again for Nigeria-Biafra. At the close of the year much was being done by churches in Canada, the United States and Europe to supply relief goods, particularly to Biafra. But the real aim of Christian people — a satisfactory peace in the whole land — seemed as far away as before.

The Canadian Presbyterian Church contributed in a very large measure to the relief operations. Dr. E. H. Johnson, Overseas Secretary of the General Board of

Missions gave almost his full time to the relief operation in Biafra and to discussions of peace in both countries. Rev. A. Zeidman, Mr. and Mrs. Ron McGraw went into Biafra to do relief work. Miss Elsie Taylor went to Sao Tome in the interests of Biafran relief. In Nigeria, Rev. Earle Roberts was acting as relief officer for the Nigerian Council of Churches. Mrs. Roberts and the family are with him in Lagos. Rev. Russell Hall continues his ministry in building up the Lagos Presbyterian congregation — including the building of a new church. Mr. Murray Ross was working for an architectural firm in Lagos, and participating actively as a Layman in church activities. Mrs. Ross organized rehabilitation training for Ibo women for whom the war meant loss of home and family. The W.M.S. contributed to this project from Supply funds. Relief teams were formed to take relief services to the many areas of need in Federal Nigeria. Miss Doris Adams and Mr. John Reoch, supported by the W.M.S. and G.B.M. respectively, joined one of these teams for a period of six months.

It was a year of change and question in India. The change in the Bhil field was an administrative one — but behind this kind of change is the reality that the Church is prepared to be much more a part of Indian life than it has been. The Church and Christian agencies have been active in the famine areas of India over the past four years. While this service was welcomed, State governments have feared that people — particularly tribal and outcaste people — might be lured to Christianity. Laws have been passed in at least two States — one of them Madhya Pradesh (where the Bhil field is located) — forbidding the conversion to Christianity. This fact alone causes the Church to assess its means of proclamation and faith in God's power to use this as a means of strengthening the Church.

Change has been advanced in other ways. Plans moved forward in both Jhansi and the Bhil country to advance Indian leadership; both by seeing that they were placed in positions of authority, and by strengthening through training and sharper definitions of responsibilities those who were already in leadership positions.

It was a year of challenge in the Formosan Presbyterian Church. The emphasis for the year was on tribal work.

In medical work: "It is with pride and thanksgiving that we report to the Canadian Church, that Christ-centred medical work in Taiwan not only strives to meet the needs of the people of this island, but in a great many instances, given leadership to the whole field of medicine here. To-day the Presbyterian Church of Formosa has two well-equipped and highly praised hospitals, helping in the work of Taiwan Leprosy Relief Association, and it has a comparatively high percentage of doctors on its membership roles. Christian doctors in Taiwan, both those associated with our Church institutions and those in private practice contribute much time and support to free clinics for the poor and in one instance, a school for blind youths. Changhua Christian Hospital has a total of 169 beds. During 1968 it provided over 50,000 days of patient care for 5,149 patients and treated almost 76,000 out-patients." (quoted from the Formosan field report).

The influence of the Church on Secondary Education has increased in recent years. There are three Secondary Schools under the Formosan Church — two in the South and Tamkang Middle School in the North. The latter has a faculty and staff of 72 to serve a student body of both boys and girls, of 1,145. Of these students, 695 are resident in dormitories (boys — 469; girls — 226).

The Guyana Presbyterian Church has completed one full year of self-government. It has been a year of *exploring* the responsibilities it faces as part of the Church in the Land. Presbyterians have attempted to evaluate the ministry of the Church as a whole. They have seen more of their strengths and weaknesses.

Political, economic and social life of the nation and of the local community have all had their effects on the work of the Church and on its ministers overseas. Where the Mission of the Church kept itself behind compound walls in the old days, there is an emergence into the life of the nation. There is a distinct call for Christians in every land to live the Gospel of Christ.

Such a brief summary of work abroad cannot give the full scope of either the problem or the progress of the Church abroad. I commend to your study the field reports. They are available upon request of the Overseas Department of the Society.

Director's Personal Report:

Considerable time has been spent attempting to find a more efficient and effective way of administering the whole Canadian Presbyterian overseas work. To this end the Overseas Committee and the Overseas Director have attempted to co-operate with the Overseas Executive of the General Board of Missions. It was thought wise in view of possible changes, for the Director to visit the overseas fields: Guyana, India, Formosa and the Korean Church in Japan were visited in 1968.

Change is very much in evidence everywhere. Some is caused by the development of the Churches in the lands; some by political and economic factors.

The Guyana Presbyterian Church, newly self-governing, is deeply concerned with development. We think particularly of development through education. The time in Guyana was spent in considering leadership training, particularly for women.

In India, Rev. C. R. Talbot and I joined forces to consider with the folk on both fields, the question of the future and our Canadian responsibility. The last of the old Mission Councils went out of existence while we were there. The new structure and new relationships were considered together in the Bhil field.

My concentration in Jhansi was on the Helen MacDonald Memorial School and the role it may play in the immediate future in India.

In Formosa the concentration was on our staff and on women's work in the Formosan Presbyterian Church. In Japan I met with the Christian Education Committee, with the Women's Committee of Assembly, a representative of the Women's Evangelical Association, as well as with our Canadian staff. Miss M. L. Lall, Hostel Warden at the Helen MacDonald Secondary School, in her report, indicates the trend of thinking that one feels in the younger Churches to-day: "Seeing the situation and many changes in India we often think about our work and how it will be carried on if our dear friends will be asked to leave India. But we have a Father who said, 'Be strong and of good courage, and do it; fear not, nor be dismayed for the Lord God, (even my God) will be with thee . . . until thou hast finished all the work for the service of the house of the Lord.'" (1 Chronicles 28:20)

NATIONAL MISSIONS REPORT — 1968

1968 saw a continuation of Christian outreach and service by members of the National Department as they sought to minister to the needs of many hundreds of persons of all ages across our nation.

The year brought a number of changes in the personnel of the Department. It was with regret that we parted with several members who had served the Church well for varying periods of time. Mrs. Hilda Zychowka, nee Blackwell, resigned on April 5th, following twenty years of service on the staff. During this time she was port receptionist in Montreal for nine years, then following a brief period in downtown mission work in Toronto she was appointed as Presbytery deaconess, first to Red Deer Presbytery, and later to Prince Albert Presbytery. Her time on staff during 1968 was spent in assisting in the Presbyterian Fellowship House in Prince Albert. She and her husband also assisted at the Fellowship House during the staff vacancy in July and August. As a result of Mr. Dickson's poor health, Mr. and Mrs. F. J. Dickson found it necessary to resign as house parents of the Prince Albert Fellowship House at the end of June. They served for a year in the Winnipeg House, moving to Prince Albert in the summer of 1964 when the Fellowship House there was opened. Mrs. C. E. Reynolds also resigned at the end of June, for family reasons. She had served for two years as hospital visitor in the City of Edmonton. Another resignation which took effect at the end of June was that of Miss Shirley Smart, who joined our staff in the spring of 1965 following three years of service under the General Board of Missions in Calgary Presbytery. Miss Smart, who resigned in order to continue her education, served in the Presbytery of Red Deer for most of the time in which she was on the National Staff. Miss Dorothy Brown, following a year's service within Temikaming Presbytery was married to the Rev. John Henderson in May and terminated her work in Northern Ontario in mid-June. Mrs. D. F. Hazell found it necessary, for health reasons, to relinquish at the end of June her part time visitation ministry at Riverdale Hospital, Toronto, where she had served for two years. Miss Dorothy Knight terminated her services on the National Staff at the end of the year for health reasons. She served within Peace River Presbytery for a year and a half.

We welcomed to our staff during 1968 three members of the graduating class of Ewart College. Miss Heather Tourangeau and Miss Sheina Smith were appointed to work with the Indian Canadians in Prince Albert Presbytery and Sioux Indian Village, Manitoba, respectively. Miss Patricia Rivett was appointed as Presbytery deaconess in the Presbytery of Assiniboia. We also welcomed several other new persons to the staff of the National Department. Miss Margaret Avison, M.A., of Toronto, assumed responsibility for work with the women and families at Evangel Hall. Miss Shirley Cayley, following two years of service in Cape Breton Presbytery, was appointed to the Presbytery of Temiskaming. Miss Ellen Channon, B.A., came

to us from Massachusetts to work in the inner city ministry based in Queen Street East Church, Toronto. Mrs. Dalice Livingston, a member of St. Mark's Church, Toronto, replaced Mrs. Hazell in the visitation ministry at Riverdale Hospital, Toronto. Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Hall were appointed as house parents at the Presbyterian Fellowship House in Prince Albert.

A significant milestone was reached in our outreach to the Chinese Canadians with the arrival of the official retirement date of Miss Ruth Yeandle on June 30th following thirty-seven years of service to the Chinese people in Vancouver. We are pleased that Miss Yeandle was available from the beginning of September to continue to serve on a part-time basis in this work to which she has given so much of her life. In addition to Miss Yeandle, eight members of the National Staff have continued to serve in our Chinese congregations in Victoria, Vancouver, Toronto and Montreal. A week-day Kindergarten was started in the Toronto Church in September under the direction of Miss Margaret Near.

During 1968, ten members of staff served within the Presbyteries of our Church as Presbytery deaconesses. Their work was mainly in the area of Christian education with the various groups and their leaders. Two ministered to our Indian Canadians and six served in inner city work. Six staff members carried on a visitation ministry to the sick in our hospitals and nursing homes, while one member of staff devoted her entire time to working among our senior citizens. In addition, five young women were appointed to serve in various areas of the Church's work during the summer months.

Area consultations in Christian Education sponsored by the Board of Christian Education were attended by many members of staff in the spring of 1968. Miss Lillian Reay completed her study furlough at the San Francisco Theological Seminary and Miss Margaret Near pursued her course in Pre-School Education.

Miss Ellen Douglas continued on leave of absence during 1968 and Miss Evelyn Murdoch, following seven years service in Saskatoon Presbytery, was transferred to the Presbytery of Hamilton.

The Presbyterian Fellowship Houses continued to serve as Christian homes-away-from-homes to young people of many racial backgrounds. The Prince Albert House started the year with three Indian Canadian students, two Metis, one white, one negro and three Chinese-Vietnamese, while the Winnipeg House was "home" during the year to four Canadian, five Chinese, two Jamaican and seventeen Thais.

The year 1968 continued to bring changes to the work with the Indian Canadian students at Birtle and Kenora. These institutions which were started by the Society and known for so long as "Indian Residential Schools," changed their name to "Indian Student Residences." The Birtle Residence suffered a deep loss in early March with the sudden passing of Miss May Kenny, who had taught at Birtle for twenty-five years. The Kenora Residence also suffered a loss with the retirement in August of Miss Margaret Love, following twelve years of service, first as a teacher and for the last two years on the Residence staff. Both of these women made an invaluable contribution, giving service far beyond the call of duty. A milestone was marked with the ordination in the spring of the Rev. Gordon Williams, a graduate of the Birtle Residence. Mr. Williams and his wife are presently serving our Church in Formosa. As the year drew to a close, it was apparent that the administration of these institutions which have been financed almost entirely by the Federal Government for the past ten years, would soon pass from the Church to the Government, with the staff members of the residences becoming civil servants. At that time the Church's concern for and ministry to these Indian children will continue on a different level.

We solicit the prayerful support of our Church membership for all of the National staff as they seek to faithfully serve Jesus Christ, the King and Head of the Church, within our nation.

CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

"Literature and the Gospel" — "Literature at the heart of New Forms of Mission." Hundreds of new ways to express the Gospel are open to us today and these are challenging Christians to mobilize and co-ordinate the resources of Personnel and money by all Churches and Agencies which are involved in the whole field of Christian Literature and its outreach in the world. "This world is now demanding the mechanical-engineer missionary, the radio-T.V. Gospel broadcaster, the mission aviator, the coffee-house pastor, the family planning specialist, the community organizer." (Quote — Lit-Lit Newsletter).

The newest forms of communication however, have not replaced the written word, but have rather increased its use and made possible the communication of the gospel in more effective ways through books, magazines, posters and literacy programmes. The eradication of illiteracy from the world is by far the most significant action that people could take in their own interests at this point in history as the ability to read, makes available a wealth of new information and opens the door to the message of the gospel by placing in their hands the "Word of God" containing the message of salvation.

During 1968 the following grants were made:

Africa — The Africa Literature Centre, Kitwe, Zambia, received \$500 to assist in the carrying out of a progressive programme, now firmly launched, three points being stressed: First — much more emphasis on providing literacy material, secondly — a wider development of Christian magazines in Africa in various languages and thirdly — to attempt to make sure each Church has at least a minimum amount of Christian Literature in the right language, at its disposal. Correspondence courses have been of great help to thousands of Christian writers, unable to take residential courses. A special training course has been set up to study Christian writing in the French language, for which there is great need in Africa.

Also, \$500 was sent to the All Africa Conference of Churches, Nairobi, Kenya, to assist with the publication of material for the 2nd Assembly of the AACC being held at Abidjan, where there will be approximately 500 delegates from Africa and almost every other part of the world.

Caribbean — A grant of \$400 was again sent for "Curriculum continuation and Leadership" material. This programme is in its final stages, under the direction of CCJCA (Caribbean Committee for Joint Christian Action). This area has a very broad constituency with pressing area problems and an effort is being made to supply material to meet the particular needs of the Caribbean.

Formosa — A grant of \$600 is divided equally between the Formosan Church Publication, the Women's Committee of the General Assembly for their magazine and the Christian Literature needs of the W.M.S. staff.

Geneva — The World Student Christian Federation received a grant of \$600, \$350 being used to provide publications for students and key leaders in a number of countries, particularly Africa, Asia and Latin America, in approximately 290 different language publications. The balance, \$250, was used for a new S.C.M. publication "Aikya" in India. The Federation has undertaken a significant step to try to determine priorities in publications both regionally and internationally.

The Christian Literature Fund of the World Council of Churches (DWME) received \$1,500, an increase of \$250. A special function of the Committee in charge of administering this fund has been to offer counsel and provide opportunity for united action in matters of common interest within the World Council structure. Assistance has been given to Church projects in many parts of the world for writing, printing, publishing and distribution work. Capital funds have been provided for experimental expenditures to help the Churches develop communication through the channels of Christian Literature and the printed word. The time limit set for the operation of this fund is five years — 1965 to 1970.

Guyana — The grant of \$250 is being used for the Christian Literature needs of pastors, deaconesses, church school and primary school teachers, vacation Bible school material, devotional booklets, Bibles and New Testaments.

Hong Kong — The Chinese Christian Literature Council received a grant of \$600 to assist with its Christian outreach programme, which seeks to provide Christian Literature for Chinese people, especially those who have migrated to other countries. An exciting new venture is that of the publishing of Chinese indigenous hymns, with music, including two cantatas, the "Creation" and the "Crucifixion", also complete with music.

India — The National Christian Council's grant of \$400 is used partly to publish family magazines in nine regional languages. The publication — Christian Home Magazine, received \$500. This is part of the Christian Home Movement and in 1968 the emphasis of the contents of the magazine was on "Church and Family Relationships". \$300 was sent to assist the publication of a series of tracts or leaflets for non-Christian students particularly. This is a strategic piece of work since there are now millions of students in India alone.

The Bhil field received \$50 for Christian literature and visual-aid needs.

Japan — The regular grant of \$600 was sent, divided three ways — \$250 for Women's work, \$200 for Children's Christian Literature needs and \$150 for Young People's work. However, permission was given to use this grant, if they wished, to assist with publications in connection with their 60th anniversary projects, their motto being "Forward, following Christ into the World."

Latin America — The Costa Rica Literacy Centre, South America (ALFALIT) received \$300. This Centre also serves the Caribbean. Through the efforts of the ALFALIT programme, the Government has begun a project in Ecuador, assisted by UNESCO, where a new T.V. station will carry training lessons for literacy teachers in remote areas where it has been almost an impossibility to reach teachers previously. In Bolivia, university students, Rotarians and army draftees are trained to become literacy teachers among the very poor.

A grant of \$250 was given to assist in the production of the "Testimonium" magazine for students in South America. For some time it has been the hope of those responsible for the promotion of this magazine that it could be made to be self-supporting and this hope seems to now be a reality. Therefore, after many years of assistance, the grant will be discontinued next year.

New York — The Committee on World Literacy and Christian Literature (Lit-Lit) of the National Council of Churches, U.S.A., received a grant of \$1,000. This committee for many years, has promoted and financed Christian Literature needs in many countries. It has encouraged New Forms of Mission, not only on the North American Continent but in many developing countries such as increased food production, family planning, ecumenical dialogue among Church groups and the promotion of adult basic education. In the Dominican Republic, as a result of a Co-operative church literacy programme, 8,000 persons learned to read and 2,500 became Christians.

A grant of \$300 was sent to the Committee on Christian Literature for "Women and Children on Mission Fields, Incorp." Providing suitable books and reading material for both mother and child has been one of its major concerns and it has now entered on a project involving the production of 500,000 children's books in the next five years.

The small sum of \$75 was given to help with the vital work of the Missionary Research Library. Important statistics and material is available for missionaries, students and scholars both in North America and abroad.

South-East Asia—A grant of \$520 was sent to assist the publication and distribution of the S.E. Asia Chinese curriculum, now in its final stages in the preparation of materials for high school students and adults. Small booklets have been written, a very useful one being on the theological significance of teaching the gospel.

GENERAL GRANTS

Canadian Bible Society—The task of providing the scriptures for every man in his own tongue, the ultimate goal of the 35 National Bible Societies, is still far from being realized. Scriptures have been distributed in 1326 languages and 3000 translators and revisers are currently at work in 800 other languages. The demand for the Bible is the greatest in the Societies' history and there is an urgency as never before to provide bibles and portions for the millions of new readers. The Canadian Bible Society has been asked to contribute \$800,000 towards the World Service budget of the United Bible Societies, amounting to \$7,600,000. Our usual grant of \$1,500 was given to the Bible Society, plus an additional \$50 from a special gift for Christian Literature.

Canadian Council of Churches—A grant of \$500 was given, divided—\$175 for World Christian Books, Africa S.S. Curriculum \$125 and Theological Study Centres—\$200, each one providing a very important and distinct service for churches and missionaries, in relation to specific project needs on mission fields.

French Work—La Vie Chretienne Publication receive a grant of \$100 to assist in a wider circulation, particularly among newcomers to our land who speak the French language.

Hungarian—New Life Hungarian magazine received \$500 to assist with the publication and circulation of this ethnic religious magazine, which seeks to reach all Hungarian Presbyterian people in Canada.

Ukrainian—Evangelical Truth received a grant of \$1,500. This is the only bilingual, interdenomination religious Ukrainian Journal in Canada for adults, young people and children. Its circulation included 21 different countries, some behind the iron curtain. Five Canadian Universities with Slavonic Departments receive gift subscriptions for students enrolled there. A bilingual hymn book is being completed—in English, for the young and in Ukrainian for the older people who do not know English and \$50 was given to assist with this project as a special gift.

The Ukrainian Church in Hamilton received a special gift of \$50 for the Christian Literature needs of the congregation.

It has also been possible to answer a number of requests for assistance through special gifts and legacies and these "extras"—amounting to approximately \$1,340 have all been greatly appreciated. Reading rooms and magazine gift subscriptions, Bhil Field, India; Christian Education Anniversary Project, Korean Church, Japan; publication—"Faith that Moves Mountains" and the Mountain Hill Work, Formosa; Christian Education material for three Indian Reserves in the Lake-of-the-Woods Presbytery; the congregations of Thompson, Manitoba and Dawson Creek, B.C.; assistance in purchasing bibles, hymn books and Church School study material; Library books for Ewart College, Toronto; and Flora House, Winnipeg; Chinese periodicals for National Chinese workers.

The appreciation expressed by all those receiving grants or special gifts, makes the story of Christian Literature a most thrilling and exciting one and challenges us to not only continue this aspect of missionary work but extend its boundaries wherever possible and lay hold of the many opportunities challenging the Church today.

Feature articles in the Glad Tidings throughout the year provided background material for the study "New Forms of Mission", while worship suggestions with a contemporary flavour provided a flexibility appreciated by many.

A new front cover on the magazine as well as the use of a variety of types, sketches and pictures accompanying articles and stories were well received by readers.

The October issue featuring the prize-winning stories, poems and articles written by young people for the Creative Contest was commended by both young and old. Two of these winners later contributed contemporary poems to the magazine.

Sample copies of the *Glad Tidings* were used by many congregations to introduce it to new readers. In spite of this promotion and the efforts of many dedicated Glad Tidings secretaries, there are still many women in the Church who are not subscribers. We point out again that the articles, features and news in the magazine are written for all who are interested in the total mission of the Church and we urge members of the Society in every community to make use of this medium in reaching out beyond the membership of W.M.S. groups to confront others with the "glad tidings" of Christ's mission in the world.

FRIENDSHIP AND SERVICE COMMITTEE

Reports dull? Not when they contain the thrilling story of the work of so many women within the Society. No longer is it correct to say "within this department" for, since the change in name and concept of its aims and scope practically ALL members are now taking part in this great work. Barriers are being broken down—no longer do we just "visit within our own denomination"—genuine concern is being shown to the sick and elderly—real concern, not just a perfunctory visit. Local Church work, community work, social service work—all the things which add up to a true sense of Mission, they are all here in these reports.

Each Synodical report contains in addition to the usual work of sick and shut-in visiting, cards, flowers etc., special occasions, stories of new ways to give help and friendship to all around.

In congregational work:—Organizing church visitation, catering to Youth Group banquets and sponsoring them. Doing secretarial work, even serving coffee to the congregation once a month, thus fostering the idea of friendship.

Community work includes work for the Children's Aid—gifts to children, hospital gifts for those in need, arranging recreational programmes and sing-songs for those confined to rest homes and nursing homes, sponsoring 'meals on wheels' and often providing meals for sick and shut-ins.

Group work reports tell of one meeting in the year being devoted ENTIRELY to visiting. Each group of two making four visits during the evening. Writing letters and shopping for those who need this help.

Oh, that one could tell of all the wonderful things which are being done by nearly ALL the women in our groups. Are we drawing closer to the TRUE concept of Missions?

One spot in which we all fall down, however, is in failing to send removal forms when our members leave our towns and cities. How many Presbyterians are we losing because of this? Let's tighten up our organization here.

The contrast in these reports to those received three years ago is really staggering. Each one is more enthusiastic than the last. One feels sure that the Spirit of God is in the hearts of all these faithful servants who go forth in His Name to minister to the needs of His people.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON ARTICLES OF FAITH

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

INTRODUCTION

The purpose of the Committee on Articles of Faith as stated in The Acts and Proceedings of the Ninety-Second General Assembly (1966) is "to maintain a constant review of the doctrinal standards of the Church, to consider and to report on all related matters which the General Assembly may from time to time refer to it, and to make recommendations to the General Assembly for the furtherance of the Church's continuing ministry of determining and declaring her confessional position."

In this statement of purpose perhaps the key phrase is "to maintain a constant review of the doctrinal standards of the Church." The statement also speaks of "the Church's continuing ministry of determining and declaring her confessional position." Why "a constant review" and why a "continuing ministry"? Simply because theological work is not something that can be carried out, once and for all, but rather has to be laboriously and faithfully undertaken over and over again. There are at least three major reasons for this.

The first reason has to do with the fragmentary, incomplete, and partial nature of all theological formulations. The Apostle Paul's words in I Corinthians 13 are a constant reminder to us of this important truth: "For we know in part and we prophesy in part. But when that which is perfect is come, then that which is in part shall be done away . . . For now we see through a glass darkly; but then face to face: now I know in part; but then shall I know even as also I am known."

To be sure, theology has to do with real and substantial knowledge. Seeing in a mirror is already seeing, even though it is not seeing face to face. Knowing in part is already knowing even though it is not whole and complete.

At the same time, as Paul's word indicate, theological knowledge, like other knowledge, is necessarily partial and incomplete. Accordingly, Reformed theology has denied the notion of perfectability, not only as this relates to the living of the Christian life but also as it has to do with the matter of formulating Christian doctrine. Or to express this somewhat differently and more graphically, the Christian truth is like a bird in flight. In order to capture it we need a moving picture rather than a snapshot or a still photograph. No still photograph whether it comes from the fourth, the sixteenth, seventeenth, or the twentieth century can claim to give us a complete and perfect picture of the Christian truth.

But there is a second reason why the Church has a continuing ministry of determining and declaring her confessional position. It is the Church's task to proclaim the eternal gospel to each new age. The Divine truth as it has been revealed in Christ is unchangeably the same yesterday, today, and forever, but it must be ever reproduced and newly appropriated in a confessional response to new situations. Many of the old problems and questions are still with us and we must continue to grapple with them. But we have also been presented with a whole new set of questions and problems. Theology cannot remain deaf to the newer questions that clamor for our attention in an age of nuclear armaments, racial conflict, urbanization and secularization, protest and violence, and the weakening of traditional faiths. In addressing herself to these new problems, the Church will learn from the wisdom of the past but she will avoid the lazy parroting of established formulas just as much as she will guard against the thoughtless parroting of the latest thing.

There is also a third reason. It is expressed in the word "review". False belief, error, wrong emphasis have a way of creeping into the Church's teaching and preaching. Therefore the Church must maintain a constant review of her teaching and correct the way she speaks of God by the standard of Holy Scripture. Hans Küng, the Roman Catholic theologian, has written that the Church in her theological work will ask: "Is all that the Church is doing and saying, in matters great and small, derived, as the Church herself desires it to be, from the Word of God, does it lead back to the Word of God, is it in accord with it?" If a Roman Catholic theologian sees the necessity of such corrective work, how much more should Reformed theology, which works under the motto "ecclesia reformata, semper reformanda."

In addition to criticising and correcting, it is the task of the teaching office of the Church continually to deepen, enlarge and improve upon what the Church has inherited from the past. To rest satisfied with the treasures of theological knowledge which former generations have bequeathed to us without increasing them is to be unfaithful stewards of the mysteries of God. We must have a love of the truth as it is in Christ which constrains us to seek in Him ever new treasures of wisdom and knowledge.

A teaching Church must be continually a learning Church. This should be true of the teaching office both individually and corporately. John Calvin has written: "None are good teachers but those who have been good scholars . . . they alone in the judgment of God, are reckoned to be 'well-instructed' and 'learned' who permit themselves to be taught before discharging the office of teachers, that they may have clear knowledge of those things which they communicate to others, and may publicly bring forward nothing but what they can testify to have proceeded from God; and in, a word, they alone are 'learned' who, by continually learning, do not refuse to make constant progress."

Primarily, the teaching office must be pastoral in orientation. Theology is not a discipline that is pursued for its own sake as art is pursued for the sake of art. It is pursued as a ministry of the Church which seeks to serve the preaching and teaching of the Church.

It is in accordance with the above understanding that the Committee on Articles of Faith presents its report:

I. "CONFESSION OF 1967"

A year ago, the Stated Clerk of the United Presbyterian Church in the United States of America communicated with our Church regarding the following resolution that was adopted by the 1967 Assembly of the American Church:

"That this 179th General Assembly (1967) humbly commend this our Confession of 1967 to other Christian Churches — Roman Catholic, Orthodox, and Protestant — for their prayerful consideration and study; that, if need be, this our Confession may be corrected out of God's mouth, the Holy Scriptures; and that this

our confession of reconciliation in Christ, or some such confession, may be the confession of the one, holy, Catholic Church of Jesus Christ in this land."

By action of our 1968 Assembly, the Committee on Articles of Faith was instructed to study and consider "The Confession of 1967". We recommend that the following reply, along with fraternal Christian greetings, be sent by the Clerk of our Assembly to the Stated Clerk of the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A.:

"The Presbyterian Church in Canada sincerely commends the United Presbyterian Church in its concern for the contemporary relevance of the Church's faith, as reflected in the Confession of 1967. Our own Church is engaged in a similar confessional task, and we welcome the openness of your invitation to us and to the whole ecumenical community to engage in mutual discussion. There has already been some study of your Confession among us and we propose to extend this. It is our hope that in due course we may be able to refer a statement of our own for your consideration and judgement.

We approve the concept of "The Book of Confessions," setting as it does your contemporary Confession within the context of an apostolic succession of creedal statement. The concreteness and coherence which the theme of 'reconciliation' gives to the Confession makes it especially appealing to laymen, as well as holding up issues which are urgently relevant to the mission of the Church in our time.

We specially commend too the recognition (9.42) of the meaning and challenge of the religions, so notably lacking in earlier Christian confession, and yet of utmost concern for the Church in the global village. It is a statement which we believe warrants considerable expansion.

The situations in society noted (9.45-9.47) as being a particular summons to the Church's discernment and action can only be representative of many. Important as these are in contemporary American society, we would like to see added to their number a Christian judgment on the conflict of beliefs and values occasioned by the scientific and technological revolution through which we are passing, and on the generational gap which is one of its principal effects.

In a somewhat different relation we would point also to man's need to be reconciled with the fact of his own mortality. The fear of death in its personal dimension manifests itself in many aspects of contemporary malaise. We feel that Part III, while rightly drawing attention to the fulfilment of reconciliation in the corporate sphere, could have placed greater stress upon the Christian hope of the resurrection as it pertains to the individual.

We recognize that it was the intent of the Confession of 1967 to avoid engaging in historic theological controversies expressed in metaphysical categories. It has assumed a catholic consensus on such doctrines as the Trinity and the Person of Christ. Accordingly, reference to the Person of Christ has been confined to historically concrete and functional terms. In our opinion the magnitude of the claims made concerning the Grace of our Lord Jesus Christ in this Confession, as in the historic creeds commended, will require of us all much further wrestling with the question which our contemporaries may legitimately continue to ask: 'Who is this Jesus?' We believe that the answer has a transcendent dimension which has to be acknowledge and confessed, even at the risk of considerable logical or semantic confusion.

It is because we feel the weight of such questions, that we regret the fact that Christian nurture in our Churches so often is focussed chiefly upon the age of childhood and an initial profession of faith. This unfortunate limitation tends to be perpetuated by the Confession's section on Baptism (9.51).

The prayer of our Church is that the Confession of 1967 may be an important means of promoting mature Christian reflection and nurture throughout a broad ecumenical compass.

We send our fraternal Christian greetings."

II. THE CHURCH'S RELATION TO HER STANDARDS

After fourteen years of work and several drafts, our Committee is ready to present a revised Preamble and Ordination Questions and to recommend that they be remitted to Presbyteries under the Barrier Act with a view to the amendment of Sections 409 and 411 of *The Book of Forms*.

A full review of the Committee's work during the past fourteen years on the subject of the Church's relation to her standards was given in last year's report. The salient points in that review were as follows:

- i. The committee began its work in 1955 acting in accordance with instructions from General Assembly.
- ii. In 1962, after seven years of work, several drafts, and amendment, the "Ordination Questions with Preamble" were remitted to Presbyteries under the Barrier Act.
- iii. The Second Helvetic Confession, the Belgic Confession, the Gallican Confession, and the Heidelberg Catechism were recognized by the 1962 Assembly as standards parallel to our own.
- iv. The "Ordination Questions with Preamble" (i.e. the Long Preamble) failed to carry. Nineteen presbyteries voted "yes"; and seventeen "no".
- v. The 1963 Assembly approved a Shorter Alternative Preamble.
- vi. The following year, Assembly reaffirmed its instruction to the Committee to continue its work on a revised set of "Ordination Questions with Preamble."
- vii. The 1965 Assembly approved an amendment to the Book of Forms, Section 407. Section 407 (2) was added to include "The Declaration of Faith Concerning Church and Nation" as part of our doctrinal standards.
- viii. In 1967 the Committee presented a single integrated document incorporating the Shorter Alternative Preamble (approved by the 1963 Assembly) and Four Ordination Questions.
- ix. As a result of communicating by letter with each of the 48 presbyteries our Committee learned that a large majority of them favoured the method of placing most of the theological content in the Preamble and making the questions as few, brief, and simple as possible. Substantial agreement with the document was indicated by a majority of the presbyteries. Suggestions regarding needed revisions and additions were submitted and many of these were incorporated in the document which our Committee prepared. At least one Presbytery requested the Committee to expedite its revision of the Church's relation to her standards. After thirteen years of intensive work on this matter our Committee could not but be in sympathy with this request. At the same time we felt that another and final year should be allowed for study of the document to give all Presbyteries ample opportunity to make submissions regarding it.
- x. The 1968 Assembly received "The Preamble and Ordination Questions" as the document which the Committee would ask the 1969 Assembly to remit to the Presbyteries under the Barrier Act.

At the 1968 Assembly and following it, a number of submissions regarding desired changes and additions were received. These were carefully weighed and then acted upon by our Committee. A few of the major ones are as follows:

A. Preamble:

- a. *Suggestion:* That the clause in paragraph 1, sentence 4, which reads "and to represent the world before the Father in worship and service" be changed or omitted. *Answer:* The Committee recognizes that there is both misunderstanding of and objection to this clause for a variety of reasons. We have made the following revision: "and to offer to the Father the worship and service that are due to Him from His creation, through Christ the only Mediator, until He comes again."

- b. *Suggestion:* That sentence 2 of paragraph 2 with regard to the Scriptures be strengthened and that some reference be made to the Bible as the Word of God. *Answer:* We have acceded to this request from a number of individuals and presbyteries. Previously the sentence read: "The Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments, as testimony to Him, are the canon of all doctrine, by which He rules our faith and life." The revised sentence reads: "The Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments, as the written Word of God, testifying to Christ the living Word, are the canon of all doctrine by which He rules our faith and life."
- c. *Suggestion:* That the last part of sentence 4, paragraph 2, "and such doctrine as the Church may from time to time confess in its continuing function of reformulating the faith in obedience to Scripture, under the promised guidance of the Holy Spirit" be rewritten so as to leave no doubt that the Church's confessional task must always be in obedience to Scripture. *Answer:* Our Committee acknowledges that there is some ambiguity in the present wording. We have rewritten the sentence as follows: "and such doctrine as the Church, in obedience to Scripture and under the promised guidance of the Holy Spirit, may yet confess in its continuing function of reformulating the faith."

B. Questions:

- d. *Suggestion* (from the 1968 General Assembly): That the clause "as founded upon and agreeable to the Word of God" be inserted in Question 3 after "general assemblies" and before "and do you promise . . ." *Answer:* Our Committee respectfully desires to retain the original wording for the following reasons:
 - i. It is stated clearly in the Preamble that the Scriptures are the supreme standard in all matters of faith and life. Thus, it is said that everything with the Church, including her government is subject to the authority of Scripture and is based upon it.
 - ii. Moreover, the use of the phrase "all lawful oversight therein" in Question 3 brings out clearly the matter of Biblical authority. The oversight of sessions, presbyteries, synods, and general assemblies is lawful when it is founded upon and agreeable to the lawful canonical authority spoken of in the Preamble; namely, the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments. It becomes unlawful when it departs from the Scriptural norm.
 - iii. Since each of the Four Ordination Questions is in the context of the Preamble's declaration of the authority of Scripture, and since the phrase "all lawful oversight therein" is used in Question 3, the addition of the suggested clause would be redundant. By the same token its inclusion would upset the general balance of the wording for the corresponding subordination of confessional standards to Scripture has been expressed in another way.
 - iv. Moreover, we fear that the inclusion of the clause in Question 3 and not elsewhere might give the impression that undue emphasis is being placed upon church government. Or again, it might suggest to some that we are being too defensive about our form of church government.

In presenting the revised Preamble and Ordination Questions, the Committee on Articles of Faith notes that it is the result of fourteen years of careful study and debate, not only on our part, but on the part of most Presbyteries of our Church. We acknowledge gratefully the very substantial body of submissions that have come to us from over forty Presbyteries and from a large number of interested and concerned individuals. These submissions have been studied carefully, weighed, and acted upon, incorporating whatever changes and additions seemed needful, whether from the result of Presbyteries' studies or from our own. The document is now humbly laid before the General Assembly for its action.

The Preamble and Ordination Questions should be judged as a single integrated document. The Committee's revision of the Church's relation to her standards, if accepted, means that in place of the Six Ordination Questions now being used without any Preamble, the Church will employ a single document of Preamble with Questions. Its use, we believe, will be such as to make the confessional position of our Church clearer and to strengthen the binding of the licentiate and ordinand to it.

Preamble and Ordination Questions

All ministries of the Church proceed from and are sustained by the ministry of the Lord Jesus Christ. He is our Prophet, Priest and King, the Minister of the covenant of grace. By the operation of God's Word and Spirit the Church is gathered, equipped, and sent out to participate in this ministry. All her members are called to share the Gospel with the world, and to offer to the Father the worship and service that are due to Him from His creation, through Christ the only Mediator, until He comes again.

The Presbyterian Church in Canada is bound only to Jesus Christ her King and Head. The Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments, as the written Word of God, testifying to Christ the living Word, are the canon of all doctrine, by which He rules our faith and life. We acknowledge our historic continuity with the Holy Catholic Church and her doctrinal heritage in the ecumenical creeds and the confessions of the Reformation. Our subordinate standards are the Westminster Confession of Faith as adopted in 1875 and 1889, the Declaration of Faith concerning Church and Nation of 1954 and such doctrine as the Church, in obedience to Scripture and under the promised guidance of the Holy Spirit, may yet confess in its continuing function of reformulating the faith.

All these things you have examined and are ready to accept. Being assured of your faith in Christ and your love for men, the Presbytery is prepared to ordain you in the name of the Triune God to the ministry of Word and Sacraments. That your faith may appear in the presence of God and his people, we now ask you the appointed questions:

1. Do you believe in God the Father, made known in His Son Jesus Christ our Lord, to whom the Holy Spirit witnesses in the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments?
2. Do you accept the standards of this Church, promising to uphold its doctrine under the continual illumination and correction of the Holy Spirit speaking in the Scriptures?
3. Do you accept the government of this Church by sessions, presbyteries, synods and general assemblies, and do you promise to share in and submit yourself to all lawful oversight therein, and to follow no divisive course but to seek the peace and unity of Christ among your people and throughout the Holy Catholic Church?
4. Do you promise in the strength and grace of the Lord Jesus Christ to conduct yourself in your private and public life as becomes His gospel, and do you give yourself diligently and cheerfully to the service of Christ's word, sacraments and discipline, for the furtherance of His reconciling mission in the world?

III. MATTERS UNDER CONTINUING STUDY

A. *Proposed Contemporary Statement of Faith*

Work continues on a Brief Statement of Faith. As a result of the virtual completion of our task with regard to the Church's relation to her standards, the major effort and time of the Committee can now be directed to the production of a Contemporary Statement of Faith. The Joint Committee (Articles of Faith and Inter-Church Relations) hopes to present the Brief Statement of Faith to the 1970 General Assembly.

A few Presbyteries have requested study materials. We are recommending that Presbyteries undertake a study of one or more of four recent statements of faith and catechisms along with a study of sixteenth and seventeenth century Reformed Confessionalism. The following four confessions and catechisms are suggested:

- i. "The Confession of 1967" of the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A., in E. A. Dowey, *A Commentary on the Confession of 1967*, Philadelphia: Westminster Press, 1968.
- ii. "Statement of Faith of the United Church of Christ" in *We Believe: An Interpretation of the United Church Statement of Faith*, by R. L. Shinn and D. D. Williams, Boston: United Church Press, 1966.
- iii. "The Dutch Catechism of the Dutch Roman Catholic Church" in *A New Catechism*, New York: Herder and Herder, 1967.
- iv. "A Short Statement of Faith of the Church of Scotland" in *What We Believe*, by J. G. Riddell, Edinburgh: Church of Scotland Publications, 1949.

B. *Statement on Election*

The sub-committee continues its work of reviewing and rewriting the statement on Election and Predestination submitted by the Committee in 1948.

C. *The Characteristics and Requisites of Christian Maturity*

A progress report was received from the sub-committee during the past year. Work will continue on this matter during the coming year with a view to the preparation of a study paper to be sent to the Presbyteries for their consideration and report.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That the reply in Section I of this report, along with fraternal Christian greetings, be sent to The United Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, as the answer of our Church to their request regarding "The Confession of 1967."
2. That the Preamble with Questions, as given in Section II of this report, be remitted to Presbyteries under the Barrier Act with a view to the amendment of Sections 409 and 411 of *The Book of Forms*.
3. That Presbyteries undertake a study of one or more of four recent statements of faith and catechisms listed in Section III A of this report, along with their continuing study of sixteenth and seventeenth century Reformed Confessionalism.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE REVISION OF THE BOOK OF PRAISE

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

The Committee on the Revision of the Book of Praise, being a sub-committee of the Church Worship Committee, begs leave to submit its fifth report.

The report is in two parts: First (Section A) being a summary of the committee's work in the past year; and, second (Section B), Dr. Fowler's assessment of reaction from Presbyteries to our latest communication with them.

SECTION A

Fruitful liaison has been maintained with the parent committee on Church Worship. It has been of particular help to have the convener of that committee a regular member of the revision committee. Minutes of all meetings have been circulated to each member of the Church Worship Committee and some most helpful comments and guidelines have come from these sources.

Since last Assembly, our committee has concentrated on the following areas which concern the choice of lyrics. A few notes will indicate our *modus operandi*.

- (1) *God: His Being, Word and Works*. This opening section of the hymns in the revised book has been divided into four principal areas — The Divine Perfections; The Divine Attributes; The Divine Providence; and The Divine Word.
- (2) *Christ's Coming in Power*. Two hymns from the Trinity Hymnal have commended themselves to the committee — "The King shall come when morning dawns" and "Christ is coming: let creation from her groans and travail cease" — while two others demand equal attention, "Mine eyes have seen the glory of the coming of the Lord" (traditional tune) and "Jesus came the heavens adoring" from the Book of Common Praise.
- (3) *Our Lord's Life and Ministry*. New hymns in this section are "My song is love unknown" (Christian Praise), "All is in Christ" (I.V.C.F. Hymns), and "The Son of God His glory hides" (B.B.C. Hymnbook).
- (4) *Christ's Suffering and Death*. In addition to the many hymns retained from the present book we have added "When my love to God grows weak" (Common Praise), "The royal banners forward go" (Book of Christian Praise), and the very lovely "It is a thing most wonderful". "King of my life I crown Thee now", and "Were you there when they crucified my Lord?" have been added in the interest of colour and variety.
- (5) *Hymns of Guidance*. This is a section already well covered but it was the unanimous opinion that added strength would be found by including Bunyan's "Who would true valour see" to tune: Monk's Gate. A hitherto unpublished hymn by Albert Bayly, "Thy first great gift was light" commended itself to the full committee and it was felt also that "In heavenly love abiding" should be included in this section.

A great deal of the past year's work, however, has been on the music of the revised book. For this we have leaned heavily on the gifted music leaders of our music sub-committee. Their work has been beyond praise. Sources, tunes, keys, and suggested alterations have been made and all suggestions by the music sub-committee have been carefully examined by the full committee. It is now possible to report that full agreement has been reached on the music of the hymns for Advent, Christmas and Epiphany: Easter and Ascension: Marriage: Baptism: The Holy Scriptures. This represents a very large area of completed work. Every effort has been made to ensure that the best textual forms have been secured and in some cases, where the right tune has not been available, a new tune has been written. Christina Rossetti's beautiful words "Love came down at Christmas" now have an unspeakably lovely tune composed by Mr. Carman Milligan of our committee. We are certain it will become one of the truly great and best loved of our Christmas hymns. Music for the hymns of the Divine Perfections and Attributes has also been finalized, and it is expected that the complete section on "God: His Being, Word and Works" will be completed before the Assembly meets.

In discussion with the Committee on Church Worship, it was agreed that the directive given by the 94th General Assembly concerning a series of responsive readings to be included at the back of the hymnal should become the responsibility of the Church Worship Committee. This is now being studied by them and it is hoped to present to next General Assembly a complete list of proposed passages. Suggestions will be gratefully received by the convener of the parent committee.

Dr. Douglas has accepted responsibility for exploring the question of copyrights. This is a most important field and we wish to state that every care will be taken by us to ensure that no copyright is infringed.

The question is now frequently being asked: When will the new book be available for use? It has been deemed advisable to suggest to Presbyterian Publications that a minimum printing of the present P. 400 (Music Edition) Book of Praise be undertaken. We understand that this has already been done and that there should be no real shortage of supplies at any time. It is our hope — and we realize that in saying this we are going well out on a long limb — that we shall have the complete list of lyrics for presentation to next year's Assembly. The necessary musical research will of course demand more time. If, however, we can bring to the 96th General Assembly the completed list of selected hymns together with the full list of responsive readings, we shall be within sight of our ultimate goal. Nonetheless, it must be said that at least three full years work is before us and it would be foolhardy to pretend that a completion date earlier than 1972 could be envisaged. Even this may be over-sanguine. All we can promise is the utmost dedication in forwarding the work with which the General Assembly has entrusted us.

Considerable debate has developed concerning some aspects of our work. We have been asked, for instance, if it would not be better for us to prepare a basic list of hymns from which congregations could make their own choice, binding them in some form of loose-leaf folder. This seems to us a particularly unfortunate suggestion. Few things cement a denomination more firmly than the hymnbook it uses; and if in some way we arrived at a position where every congregation had its own separate and disparate hymnbook, we would be in an undesirable condition indeed. Congregations would tend to use fewer rather than more hymns.

We have also been asked to see to it that hymns with a modern beat, rhythm and lilt, hymns of the 20th century and not hymns of a dead past, should be our first choice. To this we answer that the paucity of new hymns being written which promise to have something of timelessness in them is extreme. It is our understanding that the General Assembly has charged us with the solemn and majestic task of preparing a hymnbook worthy of all our past history and absolutely abreast of our times. This we are endeavouring to do. That we find some of Isaac Watts' hymns to be as modern as anything written in 1969 does not surprise us; it makes us rather rejoice in the glory of that heritage into which we have entered. To have come "to the general assembly and church of the first born whose names are written in heaven" means that we are entered into a most wealthy heritage and we dare not despise it. At the same time, we repeat that from whatever source great modern hymns can be obtained, we shall take them. The assistance of the entire membership of the church is earnestly sought in this.

One suggestion recurring again and again in correspondence from members across the church is that we institute some form of competition for the writing of a hymn or a number of hymns in modern idiom with a tune which would match the words perfectly. We have frequently considered this. There is certainly great need for a fresh statement of our great missionary task in our times. But there is scarcely a section of our hymnody which could not benefit from new inspirations and fresh melodies. The committee feel that guidance should be given by the Assembly on this point. In the event of the decision being taken to institute such a competition, the committee are of opinion that the adjudication should be passed over to a team of experts whose impartiality would be unquestioned. This paragraph forms the basis of recommendation 4.

Following our usual practice, we have referred our findings in particular areas to the Presbyteries across Canada. While the response has not been great (fuller details of this contact with Presbyteries follows in Dr. Fowler's report), we have, nonetheless, achieved a much greater coverage than is normally attained in Gallup poll samplings. We are gratified that in no instance has any one of our major suggestions been turned down by a majority of Presbyteries reporting. It is our wish to keep on listening intently to every helpful suggestion. A great stack of correspondence

has been received over the past four years and we have exhaustively followed through every suggestion. This does not mean that in every case the writer has received an adequate or even any answer. The next year will be the most critical in this committee's work and your co-operation in every way will be greatly appreciated.

SECTION B

Dr. Fowler's report re Presbyteries' reactions:

On behalf of the Committee, being in charge of correspondence with Presbyteries, I sent out the Committee's Report No. 4, being thirteen pages containing the words of 34 praise selections, 33 of them already published in other books. These went to all the presbyteries in sufficient numbers to give one to each minister, and suggestions for distribution were on page 1. Only 12 presbyteries made any return at all. This means that 33 presbyteries were still in possession of copies of praise selections although it had been expressly stated that these should not be retained owing to copyright restrictions. Five copies had been sent to each of the Executives of six synodical organizations of the Presbyterian Young People's Society, with request for distribution to the Presbytery organizations. Not one reply has been received from the PYPS.

In view of these facts, the Committee cannot undertake to send out copies of words again of hymns already published but not in our present Book of Praise. The Presbyteries, however, will be notified of the titles of other praise selections, and in what book they may be found. The Presbyteries, in response, may indicate their approval or disapproval.

As previously indicated in this Report, the Presbyteries answering have so overwhelmingly approved the Committee's choice of the 34 praise selections submitted that the Committee feels justified in its judgment on these. It is therefore encouraged to believe that other judgments (with titles given to Presbyteries that they may avail themselves of comment) will reflect the mind of the Church.

New hymns, hitherto unpublished, will be sent out to all Presbyteries, if the authors consent, words only and text in full, but the names of the authors will not be revealed that the judgment of the Presbyteries may be without the influence of the author's name.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That the Committee be continued.
2. That the series of responsive readings be inserted immediately before the Index of Scripture Passages (as agreed by the 94th General Assembly).
3. That the Assembly's thanks be extended to Presbyteries for all help given to the Committee on Revision.
4. That the Assembly give guidance to the Committee re a proposal that we institute a Church-wide competition for new hymns in modern idiom.
5. That the joint expenses allocation, which this Committee shares with the Church Worship Committee, be \$2,000.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

REPORT OF THE PENMARVIAN COMMITTEE

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

Penmarvian is an estate of 12 acres situated in the Town of Paris, Ont., on the banks of the Grand River. It was the gift of the late John Penman, whose will directed that it be used as a home for sick and retired ministers and missionaries of the Presbyterian Church. The cost to such residents was to be practically on a means basis.

The estate was taken over by the Church on November 1, 1937, and for some years full use was made of the living quarters by ministers coming within the categories intended as beneficiaries. However, as time went on, pensions and general economic conditions improved the lot of the ministers, applications for admission fell off, and widows of ministers were admitted, and subsequently elderly ladies of Presbyterian adherence.

Penmarvian is supported by the fees of the residence; the income from a trust fund of \$100,000 left to the Church for this purpose, by Mr. Penman; by sundry gifts and by grants from the Church.

Though the capacity of Penmarvian to implement the donor's intentions was at the start and is now not great, the work being done for our own people is in the humanitarian tradition of the Church and it is worthy of the Church's support and encouragement.

THE COMMITTEE ON THE ORDER OF DEACONESSES

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

The Committee begs leave to report as follows:

Since the 94th General Assembly met last June, great strides forward have been made in regard to work of the Committee. For some years, efforts had been made to make the Order of Deaconesses a meaningful entity for the support and encouragement of the members of the Order. During the month of June, 1968, immediately following the sittings of the 94th General Assembly, the first meeting of the Council of the Order took place at Ewart College.

The Committee on the Order of Deaconesses is pleased to include in its report a statement from the President of the Council of the Order of Deaconesses, Miss Emma Elton:

"Acting upon the approval of the 93rd General Assembly (1967), a meeting was held on June 14 and 15, 1968, in Ewart College, for the purpose of establishing the Council of the Order of Deaconesses of the Presbyterian Church in Canada. All active deaconesses were invited (31 were able to attend) and non-active members were represented as the result of a postal vote (7 attended). From this historic meeting, a number of recommendations were made and handed down to the new executive to study and take whatever action deemed necessary.

"The purpose of the Council is outlined on page 5, Section II, paragraph 3 (b) of "The Deaconess in the Presbyterian Church in Canada" booklet. The executive is attempting to provide regional gatherings for its members and to strengthen the work of the deaconess through various means. It is seeking and struggling to renew its structure which has in the past proven itself useful and is now re-examining the

situation today and asking where are we going and how might we serve the life and work of the whole people of God?

"Acting upon the recommendations of the June meeting, the question of membership in the Council is under study and recommendations will be made to the 1970 meeting concerning the whole matter of including other professional women church workers with full privileges. The matter of preparation of the Deaconess was raised and suggestions have been made to the Board of Ewart College. Application has been made for membership to the Diakonia World Federation of Deaconesses to be considered at Finland in July 1969. The president, Miss Emma Elton, was able to represent the Presbyterian Church in Canada at the North American Conference of Deaconesses in Racine, Wisconsin, this past summer.

"We have been struggling with the word "designation" and what it means to our Church today and where it will lead. In keeping with Section E II, (3) (b) (ii) the following recommendations were submitted to the Committee on the Order of Deaconesses —

1. Request that the Committee approach those responsible for planning of the study sessions of the General Assembly of 1969 to include, in the study and discussions, the question of the role of the professional woman church worker in all her relationships and functions to the courts and work of the church.
2. Request that Presbyteries be asked to be aware of and study the booklet, "The Deaconess, World Council of Churches Studies, Number 4" (Available through Presbyterian Publications.)"

As a result of the Consultation with employing bodies early in 1968, the Committee was instructed to prepare a description of the work appropriate to a Congregational Deaconess and a Presbytery Deaconess. Much of the impetus for such descriptions had come from requests from Presbyteries and congregations, and also from Deaconesses who were uncertain of the Church's awareness of what their role was. As a result, requests for job descriptions were sent out to Presbyteries and Congregations employing Deaconesses. From the replies many valuable suggestions were received and it is expected that the final draft of these descriptions would be available by the time the 95th General Assembly was in session.

As required of this Committee, it once again met with representatives of employing bodies and agencies in the Church and matters relative to working conditions and related concerns were discussed. To assist Deaconesses in the area of financial support for study leaves and post-graduate training, requests in this regard were made to the National Development Fund.

The 94th General Assembly directed this Committee to consult with the Board of Education in regard to the application made by the Presbytery of Cape Breton for the designation of Miss Georgine Caldwell as a Deaconess of the Presbyterian Church in Canada. The Committee examined very carefully the documentation presented to it and recommended that favourable consideration be given to the request, with the provision that, if Miss Caldwell should seek service in Canada, she be required to take some instruction at Ewart College in order to relate her previous Christian Education training, taken entirely outside of Canada, to the Canadian Church.

We wish to draw Assembly's attention to an incorrect statement to be found on p. 24 of the booklet, "The Deaconess in the Presbyterian Church in Canada", concerning sick-leave as provided by the Woman's Missionary Society (E.D.). The W.M.S. (W.D.) scale of sick-leave applies to the W.M.S. (E.D.) and, in addition, in May, 1968, the W.M.S. (E.D.) adjusted their regulations to provide ten days' sick-leave for employment under six months.

The Committee has referred to the Articles of Faith Committee the concern of the Council of the Order of Deaconesses for a study and definition of the term 'designate' as it applies to the position of the Deaconess within the courts of the Church. Other matters raised during the meeting of the Council and the subsequent meetings of its executive have been the subject of discussion within the Committee.

A revised Roll of active Deaconesses employed in the service of the Church in Canada and abroad is appended to this report. Presbyteries are urged to bring their Rolls up to date. The Committee has communicated with each Presbytery in this regard providing as up to date information as we are aware of. The Committee on the Order of Deaconesses would appreciate being notified by Presbyteries when changes affecting this Roll take place.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. The Committee recommends that all Presbyteries be asked to be aware of and study the booklet, "The Deaconess," World Council of Churches publication number four, which is available from Presbyterian Publications.
2. That the Committee budget, as follows, be approved:

(i) Operation of the Committee itself	\$ 500.00
(ii) Operation of the Council of the Order of Deaconesses	300.00
(iii) For the 1970 Conference of the Council	1,500.00
	\$2,300.00
3. That the revised Roll of active Deaconesses employed in the service of the Church in Canada and abroad, appended to this report, be included in the annual General Assembly's Acts and Proceedings as part of this report.

REPORT OF THE LENDING FUND COMMITTEE

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

During the year 1968 new loans have been made to nine congregations and seven congregations completed payments of their loans. These are shown as Schedule A. A total of \$233,913 was lent to congregations and \$130,632 was repaid by congregations during the year.

For 1968 earnings of the Fund totalled \$25,303 of which \$16,558 was interest on loans received from congregations and \$7,657 interest received on the short-term investments of funds on hand pending disbursement to congregations. A gift of \$790 was received and \$307 was received from the sale of property of a dissolved congregation. There were miscellaneous expenses of \$9.

As in previous years the Committee reports that there is much delay in receiving answers to correspondence with many congregations, also considerable difficulty is experienced in securing documents, copies of insurance policies and annual financial statements. The Committee would ask for the assistance of all Presbyteries in its efforts to carry out the regulations of the Fund.

The Committee has reported in previous years concerning loans in default. This matter is of serious concern as the usefulness of the Fund is impaired, if there is a large volume of loans on which no repayment can be obtained. An analysis of the situation is shown as Schedule B. This schedule shows that only 30 per cent of the loans are being repaid on the basis of the original schedule and that 37 per cent of the loans are not meeting the current terms.

Schedule C shows an analysis of loans by Presbyteries.

A statement of all loans to congregations outstanding at December 31, 1968 is available for any commissioner who wishes to have this information.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEE BOARD

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

In June 1968, while the 94th General Assembly was in session, Dr. H. E. Elborn, a member of The Trustee Board, passed away. The General Assembly paid tribute to Dr. Elborn at that time. At its first meeting following Dr. Elborn's death The Trustee Board adopted the following resolution:—

"The Board desires to place on record an acknowledgement of the outstanding services rendered by the late Dr. H. E. Elborn during the time in which he had served as a member. He was appointed in 1966 and during the past year was made its Vice-Chairman. His wide executive experience and intimate knowledge of the affairs of the Church enabled him to contribute in an exceptional way to the work of the Board as well as to the various committees which he attended on behalf of the Board and its Chairman. His anxious desire to serve his Church whenever possible was always apparent and his fellow members of this Board express a deep sense of personal loss in his passing."

The Administration Council at the request of The Trustee Board is recommending to this General Assembly that the vacancy on the Board created by the death of Dr. Elborn be filled by the appointment of Mr. Norman L. Mathews, Q.C. Mr. Mathews is an outstanding member of the legal profession and has been very active in the work of Knox Church, Toronto. Mr. Mathews will bring to the work of the Board a keen legal mind and complete devotion to the great King and Head of the Church. He will greatly strengthen the Board in its work for the Church.

The Board again desires to express its appreciation to the members of the Investment Advisory Committee. Decisions regarding the investment of funds continue to be extremely difficult. The Church is very fortunate that men experienced in the investment field are willing to give of their time and their experience. The Board greatly appreciates the advice which it receives from these men.

Necessary discharges, postponements, leases, title deeds, releases and similar documents were executed under seal of the Board on behalf of the various departments of the Church's work. The Treasurer's report shows that \$151,291.46 was received from bequests during 1968. A complete listing of these bequests and the purposes for which they were received is included with the audited financial statements for the year 1968 found elsewhere within the Acts & Proceedings.

In accordance with the Act of Incorporation, the Board presents lists of securities,

- (i) which have been purchased or received during the year;
- (ii) which have matured or have been sold during the year; and
- (iii) held by The Trustee Board at December 31, 1968, in behalf of the several funds of the Church.

These lists are available for any commissioner desiring to examine them.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EVANGELISM AND SOCIAL ACTION

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

INTRODUCTION

Before our Lord ascended into heaven He said to His disciples "Go into all the world to preach the gospel to every creature", and coupled with the command was His gracious promise that He would be with them always, and that His Holy Spirit would supply them with the strength and power required for the task. This command still stands for the church today, but so also does His promise to be with us always and to strengthen us for our tasks.

What a privilege and honour to be called and chosen by God to be His people and to have had committed to us the stewardship of the Gospel — God's answer to man's need — the greatest good news the world has ever heard. Not until Christians and the Christian Church accept their responsibilities in this spirit, and let it be known that they really believe what they say, will those "outside" be persuaded that the message of the Christian Faith is really Good News, and be constrained to respond in faith and obedience to Him who is the Good News — even Jesus Christ our Lord.

In seeking to carry out the assignments that the General Assembly has committed to us, we have had in mind both the privilege and the responsibility that have been ours to serve in these exciting and challenging areas of our Church's life and work, and we would report diligence as follows:—

HOW THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY SHOULD DEAL WITH THIS REPORT

If you are a commissioner to the 95th General Assembly, we would like to offer some help as you think about the way you will be asked to deal with this report and make decision on it.

This year's Assembly will be different from those of past years. On Monday and Tuesday, June 2nd and 3rd, you will be a member of a working section that will visit groups of representatives from the Boards and Committees of the church. For a one-hour period your section will meet representatives of the Board of Evangelism and Social Action and the National Committee of Presbyterian Men.

During the visit we hope that you and your fellow commissioners will

- discuss and respond to this report and its recommendations, picking out the matters you feel to be most important.
- ask us questions about the work of our Board, and learn what you can about the ways in which the Board can help you and your work;
- make your comments about how the Board can serve you — and the church — better in the years ahead.

Please keep in mind that you will be called upon to vote on the recommendations that are in this report when Assembly meets in plenary session beginning on Wednesday, June 4th. You will want to vote responsibly and thoughtfully, so please do your homework and read this report carefully.

WHY GOD CALLS US TO EVANGELISM AND SOCIAL ACTION

On the day when Jesus entered the Nazareth synagogue (Luke 4:16-21) He made a statement about the ministry He had just commenced. His was a ministry, He declared, to the poor, the captives, the blind and the oppressed. He read a promise from the book of Isaiah and announced "Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing."

Christians ever since have believed that God was calling them to share in that ministry of Jesus.

It was a ministry to human need. He came to the poor to preach good news, to the captives to proclaim release, to set the blind free from their darkness and to give liberty to the oppressed.

He ministered, therefore, to the needs of men; the need for good news to fill up the emptiness and poverty of our lives, the need for release from the things that keep us in bondage who were born to be free; the need for liberty from those burdens that men contrive to put on the backs of other men.

He calls us Christians to that kind of service. He calls us to "preach good news"—that's evangelism. He calls us to proclaim release and to set the oppressed at liberty—that's social action. It is, at least, provided we realise that the captivities and oppressions Jesus referred to include such things as hunger, poverty, bad housing, discrimination, prejudice, unjust laws—and even the subtle captivities of a too-permissive and aimless society.

In our world of 1969 there is a great ground swell—and often loud and clamorous demands—for freedom, civil rights and equal opportunity. Many segments of society, therefore, are deeply concerned about human need. We ought to listen to their voices, because this is our Christian vocation: to minister to human need.

We have something to offer the world and its value is beyond price. We have been let in on a secret: that man's deep need is to be set free from sin and death, and that Jesus Christ alone is Saviour.

Man's deepest needs, then, are deeply personal, and they cannot be met by dealing with man-in-the-mass or man-in-society. We are called by Christ to minister to persons.

At the same time, if in our evangelism and social action we only deal with the needs of the individual person, we soon discover that we have not adequately ministered to his needs after all. For the individual belongs to a community—indeed to several communities, including his family, his place of work, his church congregation.

This is why the Presbyterian Church seeks to face the issues of the communities and structures where people live and to say a word that springs from its faith and life.

THE NATURE OF THE BOARD'S WORK

The work of the Board of Evangelism and Social Action is varied and wide in scope. To deal effectively with and to help distribute the responsibility for these wide areas of concern, study committees have been set up whose task is to study the topics assigned to them for report to the Board's Annual Meeting. Probably the best way to illustrate the scope of our work is to list the names of the committees. They are:— evangelism, economic and social justice, family life, literature, the Lord's Day and its observance, the town and country church, the church and the ministry of healing, the church and Jewish people, alcoholism and narcotic addiction, the church and the aging, French-English relations, audio-visuals, etc.

Many of the studies undertaken by the Committees end up as study papers for congregations: others are sent forward with suitable recommendations to the General Assembly, and, if approved by Assembly, serve as guidelines for the church's thinking on the topics concerned.

Training Programs

The Board sponsors training programs for the various methods of evangelism advocated by the Board: eldership training; premarital and marriage counselling; and social action information.

The Production and Sale of Literature

The production and sale of literature has come to be one of the major facets of our Board's work. In addition to the training manuals for evangelism, social action, and the training materials for elders, the Board stocks pamphlets, booklets and mimeographed study papers on practically every vital social issue of our day.

Field Work of the Secretaries

The field work of the Secretaries is designed to help congregations move beyond the discussion stage by showing them how to do evangelism and to participate in social action projects in their own communities. Field work includes taking part in conferences sponsored by the Board, and the conducting of workshops and training sessions at the presbytery and congregational level in connection with the Board's training programs.

To help the Secretaries keep abreast of the work being done by other churches, and the new methods of training, the Board has authorized a three months' study leave for the Secretary, Rev. A. J. Gowland, beginning November 1, 1969.

Inter-Board Activities

While each Board has its own specific responsibilities, some things are done jointly by the Boards or their representatives. The Board of Evangelism and Social Action is represented on the following committees:— the General Assembly's Audio-Visual Committee; the Committee on International Affairs; the Committee on Missionary Education; the Committee on Higher Learning; the Committee on Inter-Church Aid, Refugee and World Service; and the Co-ordinating Committee on Adult Education.

Outside Organizations

Another important area of our work is that of representing the Presbyterian Church in Canada on Inter-Church Committees and organizations that are engaged in work similar to that of our Board, namely:— the Commissions of the Canadian Council of Churches; the Canadian Federation on Alcohol Problems; the Lord's Day Alliance of Canada; the Inter-Church Committee on Protestant-Roman Catholic Relations; the Religion-Labour Council of Canada; the National Committee on the church and Industrial Society; the Canadian Council for Supervised Pastoral Education; the Canadian Welfare Council; the Canadian Urban Training Project, the Committee on Chaplaincy in the Canadian Penitentiary Service, etc.

Briefs to Government

In recent years, the Government of Canada has invited the Churches of Canada to share with them their views on issues that affect the moral and spiritual well-being of our nation. In such instances it is imperative that the Presbyterian Church in Canada, along with the other churches, share what we believe are the insights of the Christian Faith with those who have the responsibility for making the laws of our nation. The responsibility for writing many of these briefs, etc. falls to the lot of the Board of Evangelism and Social Action. We are of the opinion that this is a most encouraging development and a great opportunity for Christian witness.

EVANGELISM

What is man's greatest need? It is to know God in Christ and to be rightly related to Him. Evangelism is the call of the hour because it seeks to meet man's greatest need. It is the church in the act of sharing with people the Good News of God's redeeming love in Christ.

But evangelism is important for another reason: it is the key to the renewal of the church. The church that is indifferent to the needs of others, and lives only for and to itself will die, but the church that loses itself in the service of Christ by the identifying with people in need and sharing with them the Good News of Christ will be the means of incomparable blessing to others, and will find its own life also.

Whose Responsibility is Evangelism?

It would be difficult to find a person in the church today who would deny that evangelism is important, and that the church should be doing more to reach those "outside" for Christ and the church. But despite the fact that there is much talk about evangelism, if the reports sent in by congregations are any indication of what

is really happening, they leave much to be desired. Why? The answer seems to be that too many think of evangelism as the responsibility of the other fellow. There are ministers who see evangelism as a job for the professional evangelist; and there are many lay people who excuse their own inaction on the ground that it is the responsibility of the clergy. What we are doing is waiting for someone else to get moving. While recognizing that our gifts differ according to the grace given to us, and that some people have more opportunities for witness than others, the Scriptures make it unmistakably clear that all the people of God are called to be witnesses and stewards of God's Good News.

In other words, all the people of God have a ministry, and the ministry of the laity is not simply that of supporting the ministry of the clergy. The ministry of the clergy is largely a ministry in and to the church—a ministry designed to prepare the laity for their ministry. The ministry of the laity is primarily a ministry in and to the world.

Training for Evangelism

Church people accept the need for training in practically every area of the church's life and work—except evangelism. For some strange reason they have come to the conclusion that every Christian should know automatically how to witness effectively! But whether they should be able to or not the facts are that they don't know—and for this reason even the Christians who would like to share their faith seem reluctant to do so. It is the conviction of your Board that unless the laity are willing to take time to learn how to witness to Christ and to discuss their faith with others, the present inactivity will continue, and the membership of the Presbyterian Church in Canada will continue to decline.

The training that is recommended is not only that of giving information with regard to methods of and approaches in evangelism, but also to provide the opportunity for discussion, the sharing of insights, and above all to provide the fellowship that is so vital and essential for effective outreach.

Information on the methods of evangelism that are recommended, and the training materials that are available is to be found in the booklet entitled "How Does a Congregation Do Evangelism and Social Action?"

Last year the Board printed posters to assist congregations in resort areas to publicize their worship services and midweek activities. These proved to be so helpful that the Board has printed better and more attractive posters for this year.

While recognizing that the present training materials have served their purpose well, the Board has decided that revisions are necessary, and expects that the new training materials will be available next year.

Canadian Congress on Evangelism

The Canadian Congress on Evangelism will be held in the Chateau Laurier Hotel, Ottawa, Ontario, August 24-28, 1970. Practically every Protestant church in Canada is represented on the Planning Committee. It will be a Study Conference, and 500 delegates are expected.

Recommendation:

1. (a) That the General Assembly commend the Canadian Congress of Evangelism to the prayerful interest of the church.
- (b) That the General Assembly authorize the Board of Evangelism and Social Action to solicit an additional two thousand dollars, over and above the one thousand dollars approved by the Administrative Council, from individuals throughout the church for the Canadian Congress on Evangelism.

CHRISTIAN SOCIAL ACTION

The Guaranteed Annual Wage

The Board of Evangelism and Social Action is not ready to recommend that the General Assembly commend the guaranteed annual wage at this time, but because of our concern with the relative economic and social deprivation of an important section of our population, and believing as we do in man's essential integrity and dignity, we believe that it is imperative that study be given to the suggested solution of the guaranteed annual income. The Board had produced two study papers on this topic, and they are available in mimeographed form.

Recommendation:

2. That the General Assembly ask Presbyteries and Congregations to study the question of the Guaranteed Annual Income or Wage, and that they do so keeping in mind the following questions that are relevant to this discussion, namely:
 - (a) Should the introduction of a Guaranteed Annual Income be regarded as a temporary measure or as a permanent solution to the problem of poverty in Canada?
 - (b) If this is an interim measure, in what direction should we go in order to find permanent solutions?
 - (c) How do these considerations stand in relationship to free enterprise, and to man's integrity, so that our attempts to cure a man's poverty do not result in robbing him of his integrity as a man?

The Role of Protest and Violence in Society

A draft study on the question of the role of protest and violence in society was considered at the Annual Meeting of the Board of Evangelism and Social Action. It was the consensus of that meeting that the paper required radical revision before it could be sent out as a study paper for the consideration of Presbyteries and congregations. The Committee of the Board that submitted the draft study has been asked to continue its study and to report to the 1970 Annual Meeting.

However, in view of the increasing use of protest marches and sit-ins to focus attention on social injustices, and in a few instances in Canada, the use of violence, it was felt that the General Assembly should be asked, by way of guidance for our people and in the interest of the good ordering of society to express itself in unequivocal terms with regard to the use of protest marches and sit-ins, and the use of violence as a form of protest.

Recommendation:

3. That the General Assembly respect the right of lawful protest and stand opposed to violence whether an instrument of protest or in the form of brutal suppression of protest.

Canadian Indians and Eskimos

Mr. Gene Rheaume, a former M.P. for the Northwest Territories, who recently headed a Canadian Corrections Association study on Indians and the Law, in an address at the Annual Meeting of the Community Welfare Planning Council in 1968, stated the majority of Canadians belonging to "the so-called dominant society" in Canada believe three myths about Canada's native people.

"The first of these myths is that historically we have been pretty good to our Indian and Metis people, the second is that things are going pretty well and are improving rather nicely, and the third myth is that people of Indian ancestry are well accepted and are not subject to discriminatory attitudes and laws in comparison to what is going on south of the border."

In his address he sought to explode these myths, pointing out that the true picture is one of "widespread complacency" and a failure to live up to our obligations, which has led Indian and Metis people to conclude that "the white man cannot be trusted."

Another factor which annoys Indian people is that we have insisted on their remaining in a state of "permanent minority" and have refused to let them assume responsibility for themselves.

It is the conviction of your Board of Evangelism and Social Action that the situation with regard to our native people is such that the Presbyterian Church in Canada must go on record as supporting the just demand of the Indians of Canada for a much greater degree of participation in all affairs that concern them, and their desire for self-realization within the social and economic structure of Canadian life."

Recommendation:

4. That the General Assembly go on record as supporting the just demand of the Indians of Canada for a much greater degree of participation in all affairs that concern them, and their desire for self-realization within the social and economic structures of Canadian life.

Homes for Senior Citizens

The Presbyterian Church in Canada has lagged far behind other churches in Canada in providing homes for our older members and citizens. In fact, what we are doing is forcing our older members whose health and circumstances require somewhat specialized accommodation, to use the facilities provided by other churches for their own members. Recently the members of the Committee on Aging of the Board of Evangelism and Social Action visited a home for older persons of another church and discovered that more than one-third of the guests of that home are Presbyterians.

While recognizing that this state of affairs has its beneficial aspects, it is the view of your Board, that the time has come for the Presbyterian Church in Canada to remedy this lack—especially when most of the money for the erection of these homes is available from Provincial Governments.

The purpose of our recommendation is not to spell out the types of homes that are required across our varied land, but to challenge the presbyteries of our church to take seriously their responsibility to our own church members and other people of our communities who require assistance of this kind.

It is our considered opinion that our church might well invest some of the assets of the National Development Fund in this type of community project.

Recommendation:

5. (a) That the General Assembly urge presbyteries or groups of presbyteries to take steps to erect homes for older persons within their bounds.
- (b) That the General Assembly urge presbyteries and congregations to use some of the money and/or land made available by the amalgamation of congregations for the erection of homes for older persons.
- (c) That the General Assembly make better use of properties like Penmarvian as homes for older persons.

Compensation of Victims of Crime

The Canadian public, and the churches in particular, are becoming increasingly concerned over the lack of attention being given by our law makers to the hardships suffered by the victims of crime. While much more is being done to rehabilitate offenders, and rightly so, very little is being done apart from welfare provisions to assist those victims of crime who have been incapacitated physically and ruined financially.

Except in a few instances, the only recourse that the victims of crime has is that of a civil suit, and this procedure can be costly and is very often ineffective. We believe that it is the responsibility of the state not only to come to the assistance of these persons, but also to provide the necessary financial compensation.

Recommendation:

6. That the General Assembly make known to the Attorneys-General of Canada and the ten provinces its conviction and desire that victims of crime who are not otherwise compensated for their loss and suffering be compensated fairly by government, and that it be left to the discretion of the authorities to determine to what extent a convicted criminal is to make restitution to the government according to his own resources and capabilities.

Recreation on the Lord's Day

The members of the Board of Evangelism and Social Action wish to express their sincere appreciation to the Committee on Articles of Faith, and to commend them for the excellence of and value to the Church of their statement on the doctrine of the Lord's Day, in particular the last two paragraphs of their statement, namely:

"There are great benefits available in an intelligent and reverend use of the Lord's Day—personal and family enrichment through corporate and private worship, shared experiences with families separated through the week, time to leave the ordinary problems and pressures of the week to dwell upon the extraordinary love and joy and strength which are ours in Christ. To Christian people the Lord's Day can be a time for gaining familiarity with the Scriptures, for visiting the sick and the elderly, and for doing the works of mercy and love that do not get done through the week.

"The Lord's Day is our weekly celebration of the resurrection of Christ. Such a Lord's Day makes the other six days more likely to be truly the Lord's as well. It points us to Him as the Living Lord of life, master of all space and time, who at His Coming in power and glory will bring in the eternal Sabbath rest which still remains for the people of God, when we shall rest from our labours, and rejoice in the fullness of the glory of the triumphant God."

Recommendation:

7. (a) That the General Assembly remind the members of the Church that while the Lord's Day ought to be observed willingly and gladly and in response to the love of Christ, nevertheless its observance is not an option but an obligation for Christians.
- (b) That the General Assembly urge that the widest use be made of the last two paragraphs in the statement of the Articles of Faith Committee re the Doctrine of the Lord's Day, as a summary of Christian duty and a guide to an intelligent and reverent use of the Lord's Day.
- (c) That the General Assembly ask Church members to help maintain the sanctity of the Lord's Day by attending worship wherever they may be; by refusing to make unnecessary purchases; and by refraining from the use of services of others for their entertainment; and that they encourage legislation to prevent the abuses of a commercialized Sunday.
- (d) That the General Assembly remind church members of the difference between healthful recreation and spectator sports and other amusements, and that the injunction of the Scripture be "take heed lest this liberty . . . become a stumbling block to them that are weak" (1 Cor. 8:9) should govern the enjoyment of that which is lawful.

Ottawa Office of the Canadian Council of Churches

"A good case can be made for the thesis that, in this century, the history of Canadian Government relationships with churches has been dominated by the concept of strict separation of church and state. While this has been understood as avoiding anything that might possibly suggest an established position for any particular church there seems to have been, nevertheless, a clear assumption that Canadian society and government was built upon the basis of Christianity and the Ten Commandments. Apparently it was assumed that the Christian conscience of the nation

would be adequately expressed by the members of parliament and that the only debate was concerned with the best way to express that Christian conscience in practice.

"In recent years a number of significant developments have been taking place. Instead of describing Canada as a Christian country it is now more accurate to describe ourselves as a religiously pluralist society. The corollary to this is that Government is religiously neutral, a position which is almost a necessity in the face of the whole human rights movement. At the same time the Christian churches have been developing both an increasing social concern and involvement and also a tremendous growth of ecumenical activity. All of these things have occurred at a time when Canadian Government was moving more and more into the field of social legislation and developing the style of government now described as participatory democracy.

"These developments add up to two major conclusions:—

1. "There is now on the part of the federal government a desire or atmosphere as well as the arrangements which make possible a large measure of citizenship participation in the shaping of social legislation and foreign policy.

2. "Theologically, sociologically and ecumenically the churches appear to be ready to use such opportunities to bring a Christian conscience to bear upon this process of policy formation.

"The proposal for the establishment of an Ottawa Office(r) for the Canadian Council of Churches and associated bodies is intended as a practical means of responding to this situation."

Quotation from proposal prepared by the representative of the churches to consider the proposal for an Ottawa Office of the Canadian Council of Churches.

Recommendation:

8. That, on the basis of the proposal prepared by the Canadian Council of Churches, the General Assembly co-operate with other churches in the establishment of an Ottawa Office.

Montreal Conference on Church and Society

The 94th General Assembly asked the Board of Evangelism and Social Action and the Administrative Council to study the findings of the Montreal Conference on Church and Society "so far as these call for re-examination of our national priorities and policies." The Executive of the Administrative Council requested the Board of Evangelism and Social Action to undertake the study.

The Canadian Conference on Church and Society (Christian Conscience and Poverty) was held in Montreal, Quebec, May 26-29, 1968. The primary purpose of the Conference was to help Christians to realize more fully the distance which separates the rich and poor in Canada and throughout the world, and to help them to assume their responsibilities in the face of this gap.

The Christian Churches of Canada have already taken steps to insure that the Conference and its recommendations are not filed away and forgotten. A conference of official representatives of the member churches of the Canadian Council of Churches and the Canadian Catholic Conference was held in Toronto, Ontario, on November 26, 1968, to explore the implications of the Conference Report and to provide the social mechanism by which effective implementation can be achieved.

This Conference authorized the appointment of a committee of eight, four from the Canadian Catholic Conference and four from the Canadian Council of Churches, supported by one staff member named by each body.

This Committee is charged with the development of a practical strategy of unified action by all Christian churches in their present programs of social action, in particular concerning poverty, and their future action programs which may evolve in an ecumenical spirit.

In the areas of co-ordination, communication and information regarding their action programs along the lines indicated in the above agreement, the Committee is to take due cognizance of the views of the poor and of the young in formulating its recommendations.

The Committee is to report to the Canadian Catholic Conference, the Canadian Council of Churches, not later than May 15th, 1969.

The members of the Joint Committee are:— Father Robert Riendeau, Father William Ryan, Mr. Romeo Miaone, Mr. Louis Roy, Rev. Charles Forsyth, Rev. A. J. Gowland, Rev. Clifton Monk and Mr. George Davy.

The 94th General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada adopted the following recommendations with regard to the War on Poverty:—

"That the Assembly urge sessions and congregations to assist in an unabating struggle to end poverty:—

- (a) By being the catalysts that bring together other groups, agencies and concerned people to discuss ways and means of improving the lot of the poor, and enabling them to enter into their rightful heritage as citizens of Canada.
- (b) By getting to know and identifying with "disadvantaged persons" and families in their communities, and supporting them in their desire to have a voice in determining their own destinies.

These recommendations, along with a copy of the recommendations of the Montreal Conference for congregational and community action have been sent to all ministers and deaconesses of the Presbyterian Church in Canada by the Board of Evangelism and Social Action, with the request that they take steps to implement some of them in their own congregation and community.

The Board of Evangelism and Social Action studied the Report and Recommendations of the Conference on Church and Society held in Montreal, Quebec, May 25-29, 1968, and presented the following recommendations re "priorities and policies" to the meeting of the Administrative Council which was held April 8th and 9th, 1969, for their consideration:—

1. That the General Assembly call the courts and congregations of our church to take more seriously the social implications of the Gospel, and alert them to the fact that poverty is not only the greatest destroyer of human rights, but also one of the greatest problems and causes of tension in Canada and the world today.
2. That sessions and congregations be urged to undertake a study of the needs of their own community with a view to providing a forum in the community for the free discussion of the issues of poverty.
3. That presbyteries and congregations discourage the erection of ostentatious church buildings, and emphasize the need for buildings to serve the mission of the Church and the needs of the community.
4. That congregations be encouraged to make their buildings available as community centres as well as places of worship.
5. That, in Presbyteries where two or more congregations have amalgamated, and church buildings and properties are sold, the General Assembly urge Presbyteries and congregations to use some of the money and/or the land that is made available for the erection of homes or residential hotels for senior citizens.
6. That the General Assembly authorize the investment of 25% of the liquid assets of the Presbyterian Church in Canada in residential mortgages and housing developments and that part of the National Development Fund be so invested to whatever extent may be deemed feasible.
7. That the General Assembly commend the Government of Canada for their avowed aim of making 1% of the Gross National Product of Canada available for economic assistance to poor and underdeveloped countries, and urge them to increase our contribution in this field to 1% as soon as possible.

These recommendations, as amended by the Council, will be considered under the Report of the Administrative Council.

Marriage, Divorce and Remarriage

Progress is reported in the matter of the proposed statement on Marriage, Divorce and Re-Marriage. A draft statement was offered to the 94th General Assembly and referred to presbyteries for study. We are pleased to report that thirteen presbyteries replied to the statement and some of them made detailed and helpful responses. These were taken carefully into account in the preparation of a revised statement which was presented to the Annual Meeting of the Board in March, 1969. The Board decided that further work was needed before the document could be presented to the church, and referred it to the Committee of Evangelism and Social Action of the Synod of Alberta for report next year.

Homosexuality

The Board's Committee on Family Life intends to give attention during the next year to the question of homosexuality, its causes and effects, and to consider how the church can perform a ministry to homosexual persons. However, the issue became urgent this year because of the proposed amendment to the Criminal Code of Canada which would exempt homosexual acts committed in private by consenting adults from criminal prosecution. Because this discussion was going on in the Justice Committee of the House of Commons at the time when the Board was meeting in March, the Board decided to issue a statement on its own behalf and send it to the Minister of Justice. The text of the communication was as follows:—

"The Board of Evangelism and Social Action of the Presbyterian Church in Canada is comprised of ministers and lay people appointed by the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church to consider issues of concern and make recommendation to the General Assembly. Since the General Assembly will not meet until June 1st and because of the present discussion on homosexuality in the House of Commons, the Board of Evangelism and Social Action speaks on its own behalf in the following statement:—

The Church and Homosexuality

"With regard to the proposed amendment to the Criminal Code re Homosexuality, the Board of Evangelism and Social Action of the Presbyterian Church in Canada takes the following position:—

1. There is wisdom in what is proposed for these reasons:—
 - (a) It is not practical to insist that civil law should coincide at every point with canon law or to contend that every sin ought to be the object of criminal prosecution.
 - (b) The effect of the proposed amendment is simply to recognize in law what is presently the case in fact, namely, that legal action is not now being taken against homosexual practices when committed in private between two consenting adults.
2. The Christian Church does not condone homosexuality, nor we believe, does society as a whole. Homosexuality is contrary to nature according to the word of God. It is important to understand that the proposed amendments do not in any sense oppose this view, but rather seek to protect minors from corruption and to prohibit public offences.
3. Nevertheless, in a proper understanding of homosexuality, we must take into serious account the psychological and physiological factors that in many cases explain this form of aberration. This is not to deny that in other instances homosexuality may be the result of wrong association and habit. In many people there is some degree of ambivalence of sexuality; what happens in the life of an individual may depend on his own inner discipline and the degree to which he regards himself as subject to the authority of the Word of God. But no matter where the root causes of homosexuality may lie, the homosexual person ought always to be the object of deep compassion. The responsibility of the Church is to

proclaim to the homosexual, equally as to all men, obedience to the law of God, and at the same time, the limitless possibility of forgiveness and renewal in Jesus Christ.

With such observations we would support the proposed amendment to the Criminal Code concerning homosexuality."

French-English Relations in Canada

At its annual meeting the Board of Evangelism and Social Action agreed to:—

1. *Congratulate* the Canadian Council of Churches on its intention to make French-English Relations an important theme at its first assembly to be held in November, 1969.
2. *Suggest* to the Committee on Life and Mission that it emphasize that a truly Canadian church will be conscious, throughout its membership and ministry, in all its policies, practices and teaching, that Canada is a country of two languages and cultures, mutually interdependent, with a Christian responsibility for understanding, comradeship and enjoyment of each other.
3. *Support* all efforts to provide legal safeguards and educational encouragement for the effective development and protection of bilingualism in both societies.
4. *Welcome* the Official Languages Bill and all political, social, economic and information policies which will bring about a new climate of creative communication between the two societies, with the acceptance of necessary constitutional and administrative changes.

The Board decided to send the text of this last point, on the Official Languages Bill, to the Prime Minister of Canada.

The Board further agreed to urge its members, and the conveners of committees of Evangelism and Social Action in Synods and Presbyteries,

- to inform themselves about the spirit of renewal in French Canada, and on all possible occasions to stress the Christian obligation to seek to effect reconciliation between the two principal Canadian societies,
- to use specialists, who need not be either Presbyterians or ministers, to inform the people about the human as well as the sociological, economic, political and constitutional realities of French-English relations in Canada;
- to recognize that young people and others concerned for the human issues of the contemporary world lack perspective when they are deeply disturbed about developments in Africa, Asia and Latin America but ignore the present ferment in French Canada;
- to establish working parties on French-English relations, not denominationally but on community levels, in different types of settings.

THE NATIONAL COMMITTEE OF PRESBYTERIAN MEN

We continued to be encouraged by the response of ministers and laymen, who are participating in the men's movement of our church. The reports we received from ministers concerning the commitment, devotion and service of the men who have been associated with the movement through conferences, rallies and training sessions indicate the value of these events. It is also encouraging to see the growing number of men associated with the men's movement of our church who are now ordained to the Ministry of Word and Sacrament or who are in training for this ministry.

Having said this, however, we are deeply concerned over the lack of identification which large numbers of men find with the men's movement. We believe that this is largely due to their assumption that the "Presbyterian Men's Movement" is a structured organization which men must "join". It seems difficult for some of our men to see this in any other way. As a result, many men of the church who are very active in its work and worship and serve in courts, boards, Sunday School, boys' groups and men's groups do not regard themselves as being a part of the men's movement established by our General Assembly.

To help rectify this misunderstanding, we propose changing the way in which we refer to the Presbyterian Men's Movement. We have recommended to all E&SA conveners that when presbyteries appoint the two or more men who are to be responsible for the development of work among the men of their presbytery (see recommendation 16, 1968 Gen. Ass'y. A. & P. pages 276 & 7) they refer to them as "Presbytery Men's Work Representatives".

In appointing these Men's Work Representatives it is recommended:—

1. that they serve as a sub-committee of the E&SA Committee and that two of them be active members of the Presbytery E&SA Committee. (By correspondence if necessary);
2. that their function be to encourage men of the presbytery to engage in the worship, fellowship and mission of the church through events planned for men at the congregation, presbytery, synod and national levels.
3. To accomplish this, it is recommended that each session appoint a "Contact Man" who is interested in the development of men's work in his congregation and who will assist his minister by promoting interest in functions planned for men.
4. It is recommended that each "Presbytery Men's Work Representative" be assigned a group of congregations from which he will obtain the name of each "Contact Man" through the minister. (By correspondence if necessary);
5. that as functions are planned for men at the presbytery, synod, or national levels, the "Presbytery Men's Work Representative" advise the congregational "Contact Man" of such functions and encourage him to see that every man in his congregation is personally invited.

It is our hope that this will result in a very close relationship between the "Presbytery Men's Work Representative" and the congregational "Contact Man". Through this relationship it is our prayer that more men will become aware of the opportunities offered for men to enter into the fellowship of the church with other men. These opportunities may be stated under three major headings:—

1. Challenge and inspiration through men's conferences, rallies and other events.
2. Encouragement toward active participation in congregational life and service and a meaningful, relevant witness in everyday situations.
3. Specific training to help men carry out the aims of the men's movement, which are:—
 - (a) To grow in our knowledge and love of Jesus Christ, and in our devotion to His way for us.
 - (b) To increase our understanding of, and loyalty to, the church and its work.
 - (c) To develop an effective program of Christian service including stewardship and personal evangelism.
 - (d) To give encouragement and practical assistance to our work among youth of the church and community.
 - (e) To be increasingly aware of our responsibility for Christian witness and the extension of the Kingdom of God throughout the world.
 - (f) To live by the faith which we profess and work it out together for the glory of God and the saving of men.

BRIEF REPORT OF 1967-68 ACTIVITIES

National Conferences

Conferences were held at Truro, Ottawa, London and Banff on the theme "Facing Life's Top Priorities". The theme was dealt with in a most interesting scholarly and helpful way by Prof. Charles H. H. Scobie of the Presbyterian College, Montreal, at all four conferences. He was very ably assisted by the following outstanding speakers:—

Truro — Dr. Forrest Bent of Acadia University.

Ottawa and London — Dr. Frank C. Peters, Waterloo Lutheran University.

Dr. Merville O. Vincent, Homewood Sanitarium, Guelph.

Banff — Dr. Hugh Savage, University of Saskatchewan.

A role playing skit by a group of young men at Ottawa and London was very effective in presenting the various attitudes of youth to the church. At Truro, contemporary music was provided by the Calvinaires, a group of 30 young people from Calvin Church, Halifax. At Ottawa, two young people provided special folk music. At London, 24 young people called "The Prophets" from Ingersoll, presented contemporary devotional music and at Banff, the "Gateway Singers" from Grace Church, Calgary, made significant contributions.

Men's Breakfast

Breakfast meetings ranging from a dozen or so men for discussion of matters pertaining to their Christian Faith, to groups of 100 to 200, with special speakers have proven to be helpful in several areas and are being encouraged.

PM Training Program

An up-dated edition of Training Manual No. 2 has been produced and there is continuing interest in the training program. The course was started by 25 new men in 1968. Another 16 moved on to Manual No. 2, and 7 to Manual No. 3. The total number of manual holders at the end of 1968 was 1,669, which includes 305 ministers.

The committee is anxious to develop strong lay leadership in our congregations across Canada. Our National Director is making a special two-month study of Lay Training Institutes in the United States and Great Britain this year, with a view to learning how we can be more effective in our training of leaders.

We were happy to welcome two additional youth representatives to the committee last year. Douglas Stephens and John Moffat have made significant contributions to our work.

Field Work

The Director and the Assistant visited in Central, Eastern and Western Canada working in congregational, presbytery and synod gatherings. In carrying out the plans announced last year to introduce the PM Handbook throughout the church, either the Director or the Assistant made a presentation at meetings of the Synod Courts in 1968 and at six of the Presbytery Courts in Ontario, in addition to the National Men's Conferences and many other men's gatherings. There are signs that this is resulting in greater participation of men in the fifteen activities outlined in the Handbook.

The National Chairman and the Assistant Director commenced a series of visits to key points across the church last year, holding rallies and banquets and speaking at Sunday services. The Synod of the Atlantic Provinces was visited in 1968 in a ten-day series of meetings. In 1969 it is planned to visit the Montreal-Ottawa, Toronto-Kingston, Hamilton-London and Manitoba and Northwestern Ontario Synods as our budget permits. There has been a warm reception everywhere in our field work and a very real interest in the promotion of men's work.

Laymen's Sunday

Following the pattern of the past two years, the theme for Laymen's Sunday last year was a carry through of the Men's Conference Theme "Facing Life's Top Priorities". While the study material sent to all ministers and session clerks was based on this theme, many congregations chose to develop their own. This is quite in line with the thinking of the National Committee. The important thing is to have an emphasis placed on the witness of the laity at sometime during the year, not necessarily on the Sunday designated.

At the enlarged executive meeting last October it was resolved that we "petition the 1969 General Assembly to change the name of 'Laymen's Sunday' to 'Laity Sunday' in order that all Presbyterians, male and female, both young and old, should be involved in the preparation of their witness to their faith." This is included in our recommendations which follow this report.

Special PM Conference Account

A balance of \$1,847.57 remained in the Special Conference Account as of December 31, 1968. A copy of the Auditor's Statement has been presented to the Comptroller's Office.

1969 Men's Conference Plans

The theme chosen for this year's National Conferences is "The Ring of Truth", which is suggested by J. B. Phillips' book having the title "Ring of Truth" and which he refers to as a translator's testimony. The theme speaker is a well known and highly regarded minister of our church, Allan L. Farris, M.A., M.Th., Professor of Church History, Knox College, Toronto. The lay speaker for this year's conferences is John A. Mawhinney, an Executive in the Shell Oil Companies Offices in New York, and an elder of First Presbyterian Church, Princeton, N.J.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. (a) That the General Assembly commend the Canadian Congress on Evangelism to the prayerful interest of the church.
 (b) That the General Assembly authorize the Board of Evangelism and Social Action to solicit an additional two thousand dollars, over and above the one thousand dollars approved by the Administrative Council, from individuals throughout the church for the Canadian Congress on Evangelism.
2. That the General Assembly ask Presbyteries and Congregations to study the question of the Guaranteed Annual Income or Wage, and that they do so keeping in mind the following questions that are relevant to this discussion, namely:—
 - (a) Should the introduction of a Guaranteed Annual Income be regarded as a temporary measure or as a permanent solution to the problem of poverty in Canada?
 - (b) If this is an interim measure, in what direction should we go in order to find permanent solutions?
 - (c) How do these considerations stand in relationship to free enterprise, and to man's integrity, so that our attempts to cure a man's poverty do not result in robbing him of his integrity as a man?
3. That the General Assembly, while respecting the right of lawful protest, nevertheless stands opposed to violence whether as an instrument of protest or in the form of brutal suppression of protest.
4. That the General Assembly go on record as supporting the just demand of the Indians of Canada for a much greater degree of participation in all affairs that concern them, and their desires for self-realization within the social and economic structures of Canadian life.
5. (a) That the General Assembly urge presbyteries or groups of presbyteries to take steps to erect homes for older persons within their bounds.
 (b) That the General Assembly urge presbyteries and congregations to use some of the money and/or land made available by the amalgamation of congregations for the erection of homes for older persons.
 (c) That the General Assembly make better use of properties like Penmarvian as homes for older persons.

6. That the General Assembly make known to the Attorneys-General of Canada and the ten provinces its conviction and desire that victims of crime who are not otherwise compensated for their loss and suffering be compensated fairly by government, and that it be left to the discretion of the authorities to determine to what extent a convicted criminal is to make restitution to the government according to his own resources and capabilities.

12. *Reply to Overture #12, Presbytery of Peterborough, Re Transplants of Bodily Organs.*

The text of the Overture is:—

"Whereas, medical science is making great advances in the field of transplants in the human body and

"Whereas, the demand for healthy organs is much greater than the number of organs that is available, and

"Whereas, many people continue to suffer because of diseased organs, which could be replaced if healthy organs were available, and

"Whereas, there is confusion in the minds of people regarding the urgency and desirability of donating bodily organs for the health and healing of others.

"Therefore, the Presbytery of Peterborough humbly overture the Venerable the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, to instruct the Board of Evangelism and Social Action to give serious and detailed consideration to the recent development in medical science regarding the transplanting of bodily organs in human beings, and report to the Assembly, or to do otherwise as the General Assembly in its wisdom may deem best."

The Board of Evangelism and Social Action would recommend that the prayer of the Overture be granted in the following terms:

"The subject of Transplanting of Bodily Organs has been seized by the news media to express a phenomenal breakthrough of medical science to resuscitate the dying through vital organ replacement. Transplantation and grafting of human tissues and organs has been practised for many years. Remarkable advances in medical achievement has led to the transplant of a human heart. In all previous transplants, the donor could live on. The transplant of a human heart involves the death of the donor. Legal, moral and religious questions intertwine with medical, biological and experimental factors in this fascinating and most promising advance.

Over a hundred transplant operations of the heart have actually taken place since the pioneer operation of Dr. Christian Barnard in South Africa where he succeeded in putting the heart of a native African in the chest of Philip Blaiberg on January 2nd, 1968. Philip Blaiberg is alive today, one of fifty successes with life expectancy varying from weeks and months to over a year. The medical profession continues to observe in the patients on whom heart transplantations were performed a rapid disappearance of symptoms and signs of cardiac failure, a return to normal breathing and improved functioning of the liver and kidneys. To the present, however, all attempts to overcome the process of rejection set up by the host attacking the transplant organ, be it kidney, liver, heart or any other organ, cannot be prevented but only suppressed. This means that "organ transplantation is to date a palliative and not a curative procedure which should be reserved for special patients where disease has reached the terminal stages!"

The emergency surgery necessary in cardiac transplantation is intricate, costly and difficult to arrange. There is some confusion in the public mind about the circumstances under which a surgeon may remove an organ. Though the consent of the donor, or, in accidental death the notification of the next-of-kin and their consent to the use of the body "designated hospital authorities now would be allowed to remove vital organs from a dead body for therapeutic purposes."² Some attempts have been made through Dr. Barnard to urge the establishment of a panel of experts to authorize the removal of organs, if necessary, without the consent of relatives.

There has been a lot of discussion on the moral and ethical objections to the use of cadaver organs. In Dr. Barnard's mind, the question that arises is whether

it is not immoral and unethical to destroy and bury normal organs when they can be used to save the lives of patients "Once cerebral death has been established by extensive neurological examination, the duty of the doctor towards this patient ends, and further treatment is of no avail. At the time when the first human heart transplantation was performed that was not a new concept, as for several years now neuro-surgeons have been called upon to establish a point of cerebral death when further treatment would be discontinued."³

Conventional medical death occurs with the death of the brain, which dies much earlier than other organs of the body; the heart may still be beating. Dr. Barnard says his donors have lost heart action as well. Others have kept the heart beating for a better heart for the new patient but there is no difference here than in heart massage of a patient. "The neurologist determines the point of death the cardiac surgeon performs the transplantation. There are few donors to be mobilized in all the stages necessary for the emergency. From the aspect of the donor there seems to be no moral problem but supply."

The recipients may be one of many who require a new heart for survival but to a considerable extent the donor supply makes a discrimination mandatory. The medical profession through group consultation must make final decision of a recipient. This decision, we feel, is left in competent hands. Consent means understanding all the implications involved and then acting upon the decision.

As in all cases of complicated surgical necessity the patient can seldom be totally aware of all procedural implications of the operation or, at least, of his revealing this understanding back to the surgical team who operates. Some terminal heart patients have refused participation; others anticipate recovery and seek to proceed at the hands of extremely competent surgeons with ever advancing knowledge of proven methods. When new methods are discovered for restoring otherwise dying patients to a measure of health and useful life, it is timely and fitting to compliment the highly specialized scientific disciplines that have made this possible. It is important for Christians to acquaint themselves with medical advances so that the symbolism so closely associated with the "heart" may allow emotions to gradually accept this operation as a normal part of surgical practice.

13. *Reply to Overture #8, 1968, from the Presbytery of Hamilton re Seminars on Industrial Relations.*

The text of the Overture is:—

"Whereas, our industrial society offers unique opportunities for Christian witness in labour-management relationships, and,

"Whereas, ministers and congregations find themselves being called upon for service in local industrial situations, and

"Whereas, the present courses for study in our theological colleges offer little opportunity for consideration of the issues involved in industrial relations,

"Therefore, the Presbytery of Hamilton overtures the Venerable the General Assembly to ask the Board of Evangelism and Social Action in co-operation with the theological colleges, to develop seminars on industrial relations for all students, or to do otherwise as the Assembly in its wisdom deems best."

The Board of Evangelism and Social Action, after consultation with the Principals of Ewart, Knox and Presbyterian Colleges, would recommend that the prayer of Overture #8, 1968 re Seminars on Industrial Relations be granted as follows:—

1. That the General Assembly encourage the students of our Colleges, and the ministers and laity of our church to participate in the Institutes on the Church and Industry that are sponsored each year by the National Committee on the Church and Industrial Society, a Committee set up to facilitate joint action in the field of industrial relations by the Boards of Evangelism and Social Action of the member Churches of the Canadian Council of Churches and the Canadian Catholic Conference.

These Institutes are held in industrial centres across Canada, and are designed to provide information about the world of industry, and to assist the clergy and laity in their witness to Christ in this area of Christian responsibility. The Industrial Ministry in the City of Hamilton, Ontario, is a direct result of these Institutes.

2. That the General Assembly authorize and underwrite to the amount of \$1,000.00 per year a Seminar or Seminars on Industrial Relations for theological students, ministers and the laity of the Presbyterian Church in Canada; that the Seminars be planned by the Board of Evangelism and Social Action in consultation with Knox and Presbyterian Colleges; and when possible, that the Seminars be held in the industrial centres of Canada on a rotating basis.

A Presbyterian Seminar is recommended in addition to the Institute sponsored by the National Committee on the Church and Industrial Society, because in an ecumenically sponsored Institute the number of Presbyterian ministers and lay people is determined on a pro rata basis and this means that very few are eligible to attend. It would also mean that Presbyterians would have more say as to the content of the Seminars and their location.

14. *Reply to the Remit from the 94th General Assembly re the Christian Labour Association of Canada.*

The following remit was "referred to the Board of Evangelism and Social Action in consultation with Rev. Dr. William Fitch and Mr. Norman Mathews for report to the General Assembly of 1969."

"That the General Assembly commend the Christian Labour Association of Canada for their fearless defence of workers in Ontario through loss of work for conscience sake."

In accordance with the Directive of the 94th General Assembly, the Enlarged Executive of the Board of Evangelism and Social Action, which met September 25th and 26th, 1968, agreed to invite Dr. Fitch and Mr. Mathews to begin discussing the remit at the next meeting of the Executive which was set for November 14th, 1968. Invitations to attend the Executive meeting scheduled for November 14th were sent to Dr. Fitch and Mr. Mathews. Mr. Mathews and Dr. Fitch informed the Secretary that they were unable to attend the meeting on November 14th. Because Dr. Fitch insisted that the remit be discussed at a full meeting of the Board of Evangelism and Social Action, the Executive at its meeting on November 14th decided to postpone consideration of the remit until the Annual Meeting, March 11-14, 1969. Invitations were sent to Dr. Fitch and Mr. Mathews to come to the Board's Annual Meeting on March 13th, 1969, at a stated hour agreed to in advance by both Dr. Fitch and Mr. Mathews.

The remit was discussed by the Board of Evangelism and Social Action and Dr. Fitch and Mr. Mathews on March 13th from approximately 11:30 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. Since no consensus was arrived at during that period, the Board appointed a Committee composed of Rev. Dr. D. J. M. Corbett, Rev. D. L. Campbell, Rev. A. J. Gowland, Rev. Dr. William Fitch and Mr. N. Mathews, to consider the matter further and to report at a later session of the Annual Meeting. Since the Annual Meeting was scheduled to adjourn on Friday, March 14th at 12:00 noon, Rev. Dr. Corbett asked the members of the Committee to meet at 5:00 p.m. on Thursday, March 13th, following the adjournment of the afternoon session. Both Dr. Fitch and Mr. Mathews said they could not attend so

the other members of the Committee met from 5:00 to 7:00 p.m. When the Committee had prepared a revised statement, the Chairman of the Committee, Dr. Corbett, discussed the statement, etc. with Dr. Fitch on the telephone. Since the evening session of the Annual Meeting convened at 7:00 p.m., the meeting of the Committee was adjourned without having arrived at a consensus.

The remit was discussed again by the Board at the final session of the Annual Meeting on Friday morning. At that session, the special committee was discharged and "the question was referred to the Executive with power to issue, in consultation with Dr. Fitch and Mr. Mathews."

Dr. Fitch and Mr. Mathews were invited to attend a meeting of the Executive that had been called for March 27th, for the purpose of finalizing the Board's report to the 95th General Assembly. Dr. Fitch and Mr. Mathews were unable to attend this meeting, but since the 94th General Assembly asked for a report to the 95th General Assembly, the Executive decided to proceed with the discussion of the remit. It was agreed that the reply of the Board of Evangelism and Social Action be as follows:—

That we report to the General Assembly that it is not possible for us to come to an agreement on the matter of the commendation of the Christian Labour Association of Canada, as referred to us by the 94th General Assembly.

15. *Reply to Remit from the 94th General Assembly re Declining Church Membership.*

The General Assembly asked "the Board of Evangelism and Social Action to study the problem of declining church membership with the instruction that it bring a comprehensive report to the 95th General Assembly with recommendations as to how the downward trend in the membership may be reversed."

In view of the ramifications of this study, and the fact that the Life and Mission Project's study may have some light to shed on the question of declining church membership, the Board of Evangelism and Social Action reports progress.

16. *Recommendation #13, Board of Evangelism and Social Action, adopted by the 93rd General Assembly (1967).*

"That the Board of Evangelism and Social Action, or a Committee set up by the Board, be asked to study the implications of automation on the political, social and religious life of the nations, and to make an interim report to the 94th General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada."

In view of the Assistant Secretary's participation in the Life and Mission Project, and the fact that this is a large question and merits continuing study by the Church, the Board of Evangelism and Social Action report progress, and will undertake to report to the 96th Assembly.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

The following report reflects the ferment of thought which has been taking place in the deliberations of the Board of Christian Education in recent years and more particularly in the months since the last General Assembly. During the past year the board has made a special effort to confer with Synod and Presbytery committees and with congregations. The purpose has been primarily to listen and to learn in order to be continually aware of the thinking, problems and needs which are being manifested throughout the Church. The information and insights which have come from these conferences have assisted the board in assessing the present situation and the future possibilities in the educational work of the Church. We hope that many of these things can be explored and tested in the discussions and debates of the General Assembly and in the Church at large.

DISCOVERING THE PURPOSE OF THE CONGREGATION

There is a growing awareness that Church education is centered primarily in the congregation. Since the 94th General Assembly approved the principle of "a responsible congregational selection of educational resources," attempts have been made at many levels to identify the criteria by which a congregation can exercise responsible decisions about its educational program. Congregations are undertaking in a new way an examination of their purpose, leading to a fresh discovery of their corporate life and mission. This process is in itself an experience in education and in renewal. It calls for a serious commitment to the study of the Bible to learn what is God's will for his Church and to recover an understanding of the life style of a Christian community. It requires the members of the congregation to gain a new awareness and knowledge of the human situation in the many communities of life in which they are involved, and of the forces which are shaping the society to which the Church is called to minister. It confronts a congregation with the necessity of identifying in a new way what are the frontiers of its mission today. This discovery of a purpose for its existence can be a painful experience in the life of a congregation but it is unlikely that renewal will ever take place without it. Congregations have been greatly assisted in this endeavour by the work of the General Assembly's Committee on Life and Mission Projects (LAMP).

Only when a congregation has determined its purpose can it begin to develop a strategy and program of education for its members — adults, youth and children — which will equip them to serve and fulfill this purpose. The same applies, of course, to the congregation's program and work in mission, evangelism, service, social action and stewardship.

CHURCH EDUCATION FOR A NEW AGE

How can a congregation make responsible decisions about its educational program? Let us face the fact that it is no longer good enough just to perpetuate the kind of education we have carried on in most of our congregations. To do so will be to completely disregard what is happening in the life of our people and especially in the life and education of today's youth. The presuppositions which are operative in the educational program of most of our congregations are no longer valid for the age in which we now live. What are some of these presuppositions?

- that the provision of a Sunday church school for the childhood years of a person's life is normative, and adequate,
- that the middle or early teen years are the terminal point in church education,
- that a maximum of sixty minutes once a week for seven or eight months in the year is adequate time,
- that no significant investment needs to be made by the congregation in the training of teachers or in providing resources for learning,

- that standards and goals for evaluating learning experiences or effective teaching are not important or necessary,
- that the Sunday church school does not need to have any integral and continuing relationship to the life of worship, fellowship and service of the congregation.

Are these the underlying presuppositions of the educational program in your congregation? Probably nobody in your congregation has ever identified the presuppositions in this way and said that they are adequate. Has any person or group in your congregation ever questioned them?

The time has come when each congregation must not only examine the presuppositions but begin to fashion an educational program and establish goals and standards related to the purpose which it has accepted for itself and to the age in which we are now living.

NEW FACTORS AFFECTING OUR STRATEGY IN EDUCATION

It is beyond the scope of this report to describe the vast changes which are taking place in our society and world. We are living in a new age and we dare not disregard the changed situation. As we plan for the kind of church education which is called for in this new age, a number of very important new factors must be taken into account which were not present when our familiar forms of church school education were generally acceptable. The following attempt to identify a few of the new factors is only for the purpose of assisting congregations to understand the climate and context within which educational planning should take place.

1. Education has become essential for everyone living in today's society. This is one of the important new factors in our time. Dare we in the church assume that the education of Christians can be an optional choice? Or must we not follow Paul when he says "We teach everyone we can, all that we know about him, so that, if possible, we may bring every man up to his full maturity in Christ Jesus"? (Col. 1:28) A thoroughgoing educational ministry in every congregation is essential to develop in Christians the measure of maturity which life in today's complex society is demanding.
2. Education today is a life-long and continuing discipline. Post secondary education is no longer the luxury of a few. Training and re-training throughout life are now accepted as essential requirements.

More than two million adults in Canada are enrolled in some form of continuing education every year. It is estimated that by 1980 the figure will be ten million.

It has been said that adult education is the largest single movement in Canada. Adults are working at their education everywhere in Canada — everywhere except in the church. In an age when an elementary education no longer qualifies a person for responsible participation in life, can the church continue to function on the presupposition that a childhood knowledge of the Bible and of the Christian faith is adequate to equip the members for their life in the world?

It is unlikely that the church can ever have a serious educational program until it has a disciplined approach to adult education for all its members. It is certain that the members of the church cannot address themselves as Christians to the complex and pressing problems which face them in the world today unless there are opportunities for them to gain the necessary competence to understand and interpret the purpose of God and to discern what God is doing in the midst of our history. Martin Buber once said "Are you ready? That is the great question. Are you ready — for each other, for history, for God?"

3. The youth of today, whom we are seeking to teach and to reach through our educational program, are impatient with the methods and approaches to education which have been practiced both in the church and in public education. This is due largely to the age into which they were born. They live in what has been described as a "global village." Their whole social situation has been conditioned by the media of mass communication, especially television.

The events of our history and the problems of the world become an immediate experience for them. They have no memory of those things which shaped and conditioned the life, thoughts, moral standards and faith of their parents and elders. They are demanding to have a voice in what they learn and a role in bringing about change. It is no longer adequate to assume that learning is solely the handing on from one generation to the next the answers of the past to the traditional questions of life. They see all around them the evidence of technological and scientific advances and they have developed a great confidence in what can be accomplished to eliminate the ills of society. Educational psychologists tell us that youth are capable of much greater learning than we have normally believed. Today's youth are being introduced to a variety of educational media and are beginning to learn how to educate themselves at their own rate.

These changes in the social and educational situation of today's youth cannot be disregarded by the church in planning its educational strategy. Youth will become more impatient with and more alienated from the church if it is not able to respond to the educational potential which is now present.

4. The enquiry method of learning is now familiar in the educational experience of pupils at all levels. Pupils are being encouraged and prepared to pursue their own learning. They are being introduced to a wide variety of resources and guided in the use of such resources. One of the aims of the enquiry method of learning is to develop confidence and competence in searching out and reflecting upon the data in order that persons may handle the changing situations which they may face in life.

To a limited extent the church has been aware of this trend toward the inductive method in educational practices. By and large, however, the church has traditionally practiced a deductive method of teaching and learning. The transmission of the faith from one generation to another without openness to people's questions has been the principal educational practice of the church. We must begin to recognize that there is abroad among youth in particular, but also among people of all ages, a spirit of enquiry which calls for open discussion and investigation of so much of what we have believed, accepted and understood. Indoctrination is alien to the style of education with which they are now familiar and which they are demanding at almost every level.

The church must respond to this approach to learning in a positive way. We should not be afraid of open discussion but rather should encourage the disciplined investigation of any question which touches human existence. We must undertake the whole of our church education in the expectation and faith of our Lord's promise that "when he, the Spirit of truth, is come, he will guide you into all truth."

The enquiry method of learning will call for a re-examination of our educational practices in the church at a number of points. Let us consider two of them briefly:

- (a) The role of the teacher is of the greatest importance. He is a facilitator of learning, rather than an authority figure in the classroom. His role is to encourage and guide the pupils in their own learning experiences, rather than to be the person who knows the answers and who transmits all the information. He provides a climate for learning and a rich and stimulating environment. He arranges for adequate resources to be available and guides the pupils in the use of them. He is open and available to the pupils and their questions, sensitive to their abilities, problems and progress, and assists them to set goals and to evaluate their own learning.
- (b) Much greater access to and investments in resources for learning must be made than congregations have been accustomed to provide. An adequate and attractive physical environment is of great importance in providing a climate which encourages learning. In addition, however, major attention must be given to the variety of educational resources which will be required if the pupils are to have direct access to the sources of information which they need for their learning.

We live in an age when an abundance of such resources is readily available to us. There are many resources for Bible study—commentaries, dictionaries, word books, atlases, filmstrips, pictures, dramas. The congregation provides a rich variety of resources through its people, its worship, its acts of confession, its community service and missionary outreach. The people and institutions of the community are important resources for Christian learning—newspapers, welfare agencies, municipal officers, professional persons, labor unions, educators, libraries, other churches. The power of the Gospel is manifested most clearly when it is learned in the context of a living community. True Christian learning cannot be separated from living. Study and action always belong together. They are the essential ingredients of learning and the proof of our obedience as Christians.

EXPLORING NEW MODELS OF CHURCH EDUCATION

There are many inescapable evidences that the church will have to find new patterns for church education in the immediate future. The model of the Sunday church school as we have known it cannot provide the quality of education which is required to prepare Christians to handle the complex and pressing issues and questions of life today. To participate responsibly in the redeeming and reconciling ministry which Christ has given to his Church, Christians must have the opportunities for study which will enable them to grow towards maturity in him. The church is under obligation today as perhaps never before to equip its people biblically and theologically.

With the changing styles of life today, the mobility of families and the increase of leisure time activities, the usefulness of Sunday for any kind of quality education in the church is rapidly diminishing. Even now the average (probably the maximum) time which pupils have in the Sunday church school for their education is twenty-five hours in the year. This is equivalent to one week in public school. By the continuance of this practice we can never hope to command any serious attention or commitment to church education on the part of the pupils, the teachers, the parents or the congregation.

What other options are open to congregations? In this report we shall explore only one alternative course of action in the hope that it may become a basis for experimentation in many congregations.

It is proposed that congregations give serious consideration to the immense possibilities of week-day church education. The after school hours from Monday to Friday offer opportunities which should not be dismissed easily. Expanding the time for teaching and learning from an average of forty-five minutes to ninety minutes or even to two hours each week increases the possibility of moving toward the attainment of greater excellence in church education. The various grades or departments of the school of the church could meet on different days, according to local circumstances. This would provide for greater flexibility in the use of the facilities, and increased availability of the educational resources of the congregation and the community. There would be greater freedom in the employment of a variety of educational experiences than is presently possible in the Sunday church school. An integrated program of education could be achieved by bringing together the learning experiences of the church school and of the weekday groups in which the children and youth are now engaged. Moreover, the opportunity for families to join together in the worship life of the congregation could become a reality once more.

Basic to an experiment in church education through the week are a number of important considerations about which decisions should be made at the very beginning.

1. A total plan should be carefully developed by the session. An interpretation of the plan must be made fully and clearly to the congregation, to the board of managers and to the families, and a commitment on their part to co-operate in supporting the plan should be secured.

2. The success of an experiment of this kind will depend very greatly upon the commitment of qualified teachers and resource persons. Because it offers a challenge to participate in a serious educational enterprise, teachers must understand and accept the commitment which will be required. It may be wise and necessary to ask them to undertake a commitment for a specified period of time. Teachers who accept a commitment of this kind must be set free from all other congregational responsibilities. They are being asked to give leadership in one of the most strategic ministries of the church.
3. Congregations must be prepared to support the teachers fully and to make investments in their training and in providing them with adequate educational resources.
4. A procedure might be developed whereby parents would be required to register the members of their family who would be participating in the school. Depending upon local circumstances, a fee could be established for each registered person on a monthly or quarterly basis. This will serve to indicate the seriousness with which the congregation is undertaking its educational responsibilities, and to provide a tangible expression of the commitment of the family. In cases where a family may not be able to pay a fee, the congregation, as part of its mission, could assume this responsibility. We are all aware of the fact that parents are accustomed to paying a fee for a wide variety of learning and recreational experiences for their family today. We must always be aware that the gospel is free to everyone. If a fee might cause some children to be excluded or families to be embarrassed, the fee could become optional, or other forms of church education should be offered.
5. The time has arrived when congregations must consider the advisability and obligation of offering an honorarium to all teachers in recognition of their commitment and service.
6. A small group of persons should be appointed to provide a continuing supervision, support and evaluation of the experiment.

Other courses of action for experimentation in church education are possible and should be explored. We know that changes in accustomed practices are difficult to initiate and to accept. Whether change is good or bad depends on the goals we have set for ourselves and the direction we give to change. New patterns of congregational life and work take time to develop and to prove their worth. Time may not always be on our side in the education of Christians. One is reminded of the man who asked a gardener to secure a certain tree for him. The gardener replied that this tree did not reach maturity for two hundred years. The man said with some urgency, "In that case there's no time to lose. Plant it this afternoon."

DECENTRALIZING THE RESOURCES OF THE BOARD

The Board of Christian Education is committed to serve all of the courts, congregations and people of the Presbyterian Church in their educational work. The General Assembly has approved the principle of "a responsible congregational selection of resources for church education." This places upon each congregation the major responsibility for determining its own educational program based upon a study of its situation and its needs. Working through synod and presbytery committees of Christian education and in co-operation with other boards and committees, the board seeks to assist congregations in formulating their objectives and in developing a strategy in education to achieve the objectives.

The General Assembly makes available to the board the resources of staff personnel and finances. Over the years the board has sought to deploy these resources in order to serve the educational work of the congregations and of the synod and presbytery committees. In 1966 a department of field services was established. This action enabled the board to work more closely with synod and presbytery committees in a variety of training events and in the extension of planning and consultative

services. From year to year the board has been able to increase its financial support to synod committees to assist them in training personnel within their bounds and in sponsoring workshops, institutes, observation schools and youth-adult consultations.

At its annual meeting in 1969 the board took further action designed to provide maximum support for education at the congregational level. The national staff of the board will be reduced in order to make available financial resources which can be used to secure the services of competent persons who can act as consultants in education on a short-term or longer term basis. These persons will serve in designated areas of the church, normally related to such projects as teacher education and institutes for adult education. Recognizing that increased responsibility for educational planning, decision making and administration will rest with synod and presbytery committees, the board will make available financial support to enable these committees and also groups of congregations, to secure teacher counsellors, master teachers and consultants in education to serve for sustained periods on a part-time basis. The board believes that professional educators can render a valuable service in counselling with teachers in congregations and clusters of congregations. The board has initiated four regional conferences in the past two years for the purpose of developing a team ministry between synod, regional and presbytery workers. All of these plans and activities are part of the declared policy and strategy of the board in order to support congregations in their efforts towards greater excellence in education.

Beginning in 1970 the board has made provision for a full-time worker in the field of campus ministry. This person will work closely with presbyteries and synods in developing a ministry with students, faculty and administrators in the rapidly increasing number of universities in Canada and will maintain liaison with student movements.

A PARTNERSHIP OF SYNOD, PRESBYTERY AND CONGREGATIONAL COMMITTEES

For the effective implementation of the recommendations of the General Assembly and of the policies and commitments of the board, synod, presbytery and congregational committees of Christian education must function in a strong partnership with each other and with the board. With the increasing emphasis upon planning and decision-making at the local and regional levels, all of these committees must assume greater responsibilities. If this is to happen, as indeed it must, synods and presbyteries must provide their committees with sufficient members and adequate resources to undertake the required tasks. A continuity of membership is also essential. Yet many committees are crippled and ineffective for lack of these very things.

Some of the urgent tasks to which Christian education committees at all levels must give top priority are:

1. To interpret the recommendations of the General Assembly regarding resources for church education to presbyteries and congregations.

The 94th General Assembly approved the following recommendation:
That, within the context of a responsible selection of educational resources,

- (a) the General Assembly approve the use of a variety of educational resources (based upon a study of local needs and interests)
 - (i) for adults, from such resources as those recommended by the Boards and Committees of the General Assembly and the Women's Missionary Societies
 - (ii) for junior high and senior high youth, especially from the resources recommended by the Board of Christian Education in the "Resources for Ministry with Youth" (or its successor); and
- (b) for nursery through junior (grade 6) departments of the church school, the General Assembly recommend the use of *Christian Faith and Action/Designs for an Educational System* of the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. and of

the *Covenant Life Curriculum* of the Presbyterian Church in the United States, as the local situation may require (and as the the Christian Faith and Life curriculum resources cease to be available);

- (c) That the General Assembly suggest to congregations having difficulty with graded materials that they try the *Broadly Graded Series* for nursery through primary of the Presbyterian Church in the United States, and the *Uniform Lessons Co-operative Series* for junior through adult published jointly by the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A., the Presbyterian Church in the United States and the United Church of Christ; and that these congregations be encouraged to report their evaluations to the Board of Christian Education.

We believe that there are congregations which are not yet aware of this recommendation or of the timetable for the introduction of the resources of *Christian Faith and Action/Designs for an Educational System*. These resources for early childhood education (nursery and kindergarten) are now available and will come into use in congregations in September 1969. The resources for grades 1-10 will become available in January 1970 and will come into use in congregations in September 1970. All of the resources of the *Covenant Life Curriculum* are now available.

During the past year the staff members of the board have met with every synod committee and with nearly all presbytery conveners to assist them in developing plans for interpretation and for training personnel in the use of the resources. The board provided financial assistance to enable every synod committee to have two persons trained in the approach to early childhood education related to the new resources. Congregations are encouraged to call upon their respective presbytery committees to assist them in preparing their teachers in the use of the new resources.

2. To develop and implement plans for teacher education.

Probably the most urgent need in church education today is a systematic and ongoing plan for the training and support of teachers. They have been asked to do a complex and demanding job. They need training to equip them to interpret the Bible and to understand the Christian faith. They need help to gain competence in the processes of teaching and learning in the classroom. They need counsellors from whom they can receive guidance with their problems and some standards by which to measure the effectiveness of their teaching. They need opportunities to observe good teaching.

3. To establish observation centres in selected congregations within each presbytery, or in areas which can serve a number of congregations, to which teachers may come to observe and evaluate good teaching.

It has been demonstrated again and again that teachers learn best by observing other teachers at work. The board commends to all synod, presbytery and congregational committees of Christian education a small book entitled *Practice Teaching* (40c.) which describes a plan for observation centres. The plan calls for the enlistment of one or more teacher counsellors with experience and competence in education who will work closely with the teachers and the presbytery. The board will give every assistance it can to presbyteries to implement a plan of this kind which it believes to be a proven and continuing method of teacher education.

4. To plan and sponsor institutes for adult education.

In 1964 the General Assembly called upon congregations to give major emphasis to adult education. Since that time the board has been experimenting with a number of approaches to adult education. It has provided financial assistance to synod committees to have personnel trained and to sponsor some experiments in adult education. The Indiana Plan of Adult Education is one which is widely used today. A number of persons in several synods have had direct training and experience with this plan. The board strongly commends this plan to synod and presbytery committees and will give assistance to them in securing trained personnel and in holding institutes of this kind.

DOES THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH NEED A BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Your board is not committed to its own self-preservation. It is convinced, however, of the need to provide strong and effective leadership and services to all the congregations of the church to enable them to have the kind of church education which is called for today in order to equip Christians to participate fully in the worship mission and service of the church.

In 1960 your board presented a brief to the Administrative Council setting forth a proposed re-organization of the structures of the church. In this proposal the board of Christian education would disappear and would be replaced by a division of "community life and mission." Such a division would provide for the co-ordination of the services and resources of all those boards and committees which at present seek to support and serve the congregations of the church.

At the 1969 annual meeting of the board, approval was given to a similar proposal, with the declared intention of releasing staff personnel from national responsibilities in order to provide services more closely related to the congregations. It is hoped that financial resources would also be released to enable synods and presbyteries to secure the services of professional educators and other competent persons for specific projects. The board has taken an important step in this direction with regard to its own resources of personnel and finances.

The board believes that there will be need for a national centre for research and development related to many of the issues in both the church and society.

THE BOYS' BRIGADE IN CANADA INC.

The 94th General Assembly directed the board "to enter into dialogue with the Executive of the Boys' Brigade in Canada to consider joint sponsorship of the appointment of a secretary for boys' work and report back to the 95th Assembly." The board wishes to report that dialogue is taking place and requests additional time to pursue this matter further with a view to presenting a report to a future Assembly.

HIGHER LEARNING

The annual meeting of the Committee on Higher Learning, February 14-16, 1969, followed immediately upon the destruction of the computer centre at Sir George Williams University in Montreal. It is understandable that the Committee would feel compelled to give careful consideration to the climate of university work today. There was much discussion of the events of the past year, and, although there was not universal agreement on the causes, all were agreed that the university today is characterized by not only a potential for fruitful change, but a feeling of deep frustration and anxiety.

Present with us at the annual meeting were the General Secretaries of two university groups, the Inter-Varsity Christian Fellowship and the Student Christian Movement. They identified major factors in the climate of unrest on the campus.

Mr. Don Wilson, General Secretary of the S.C.M. of Canada, said that students experience much frustration with their natural and social environment, with the feeling that they cannot in any way shape their future. Therefore structures of all kinds have become demons. For some students, the only creative way that seems to be open is to stop the machinery. It is in this kind of context that we should see the destruction through the tactics of confrontation at Sir George Williams University.

In many ways, this kind of awakening among students, gives evidence of religious connotations. Along with a social passion like that of the prophets, this movement has its own music, language, piety, folklore, theology (or ideology), and is extremely sectarian (that is, it is right). At the same time many students find it difficult to identify with any religion. There is a kind of Christian brain-drain — a vacuum of Christians with any competence to cope, that is to speak out in any way intellectually with some sense of security in one's faith.

Mr. Wilbur Sutherland, General Secretary of the IVCF of Canada, noted that there is a world-wide explosion in student unrest today. There is an eschatological apocalyptic, prophetic element occurring all the time in the radical movement of our time. We may well ask what has happened to the church which we see as placid in the cross-currents of our own day. This movement has a vision — where are the prophets gone in the church? In many ways we must acknowledge that we are in an end time — the end of the Graeco-Roman civilization. This civilization is rushing pell-mell to its end. The church always faces a danger of being wedded too closely to another era. By its nature it tends to be wedded to the past and senses that when that society of the passing age is attacked it is itself attacked. We should be, but we are not, in shape to take a view of society which is well grounded in faith, and not overthrown by the passing of an age. There are not enough Christians around today who seem to have the courage to be thrown to the lions.

Some members of the Committee on Higher Learning supported these findings. Among other points raised was the claim that many students today oppose the traditional modes of reasoning — that is, they attack the base of rationality in our civilization. This comment led to a further discussion of the move away from linear modes of communication to the impact of other kinds of communication such as movies — a film can change your whole outlook on the world. Some claimed that while radicals are not in a majority on the campus today, they are succeeding in shifting the thought centres of campus life. Students are not now interested in history as such. They are the *now* generation. The unrest on the campus is integrally related to an imminent radical change in society.

Other members of the Committee weren't convinced that such a radical change was about to take place. They attributed the unrest on the campus to a "hard core" of students who are not typical of the general student body, and whose influence is beginning to wane.

Although the Committee has a wide spectrum of opinions on the causes for the campus unrest, all agreed that campus ministry is of strategic importance for the Church, and that such a ministry must receive a much higher priority in both financial and manpower terms. When the university is viewed simply as a place of leadership training, apart from all the other aspects of the catalytic effect university life has on the total society, the university looms large in importance. Future leaders of various communities including the church are given a broader understanding of their task through their experience of university education. Therefore campus ministry, or lack of it, has a far-reaching effect upon the future of the church and of the nation.

CO-OPERATIVE CAMPUS MINISTRY

In keeping with our policy of co-operative campus ministry, the Committee expressed its interest in and support for the work of both the SCM and the IVCF. The current emphases of these student-oriented campus groups are reflected in the following statements:

NATIONAL SCM PROGRAM 1968-69

Our Emerging Concerns:

"A *developing radical perspective* characterizes the main thrust of a growing number of SCM in Canada. The shape and focus of this perspective are, as yet, difficult to perceive, but at least three major characteristics can be noted:

"IT IS POLITICAL — There is a growing realization that any attempt to deal with and purposively change the world and the university must involve an analysis of the structural roots and underlying assumptions and values about man, society, and contemporary social, political, religious, economic, and educational institutions.

"IT IS CHRISTIAN — As individuals and as a Movement we must confront and struggle with, in an attitude of openness, the major themes and claims of Christianity. Such a confrontation will be the basis of our radicalism and our hope.

"IT IS PERSONAL — To look at society and the university in a radical way means also to examine one's personal relationship to institutions and their assumptions and values. Political goals of radical change in the university and society must be appropriated honestly and as freely acknowledged personal goals if one is to be seriously involved in change.

"The integration of these three — the political, the theological and the personal perspectives — into the Movement's life, locally and nationally, is, we hope, the basis of the SCM's development in the future."

INTER-VARSITY CHRISTIAN FELLOWSHIP OF CANADA STATEMENT OF PURPOSE AS ADOPTED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS, SEPTEMBER 21ST, 1968

"To foster among students, faculty and others who are in universities, colleges, professional schools (such as medical, law, theological, teachers', nursing), secondary schools (both public and private), and other educational institutions throughout Canada and elsewhere, inter-denominational groups and other related activities having as their purpose the following objectives:

1. To witness to the Lord Jesus Christ as God Incarnate and to seek to lead others to a personal faith in Him as Saviour and Lord; **EVANGELISM IS A PRIME OBJECTIVE:**
2. To deepen and strengthen the spiritual life of students and others by the study of the Bible, by fellowship and by prayer; **THE SPIRITUAL DEVELOPMENT OF CHRISTIANS IS AN EQUALLY IMPORTANT OBJECTIVE:** (IVCF views Christian growth as primarily the responsibility of the home and the local church, but since Christian students are often geographically and sometimes psychologically separated from these influences, IVCF recognizes the need to give them encouragement and guidance in their educational environment.)
3. To encourage Christians under the enablement of the Holy Spirit to demonstrate responsible Christian love; **THE LOVE OF ONE'S NEIGHBOUR IS A COMMANDMENT OF THE LORD:**
4. To assist Christian students and faculty to explore and assert to the educational community the relevance of the Christian faith to every issue of private life or public concern; **ALL TRUTH IS IN CHRIST:**
5. To challenge Christian students and faculty with the privilege and obligation of participating in missionary outreach — to give and pray and serve in whatever area of life they are called by God; **EVERY CHRISTIAN IS CALLED TO BE SENT."**

UNIVERSITY CHRISTIAN CONFERENCE OF CANADA

Another vehicle of our co-operative campus ministry is the University Christian Conference of Canada. It is an association of some sixteen churches and agencies active in Canadian universities. It serves as a liaison and consultative body for the concerns of Christians in the university. Part of the strength of UCCC is the fact that groups with widely divergent theological, sociological, viewpoints can meet together under its aegis, and engage in honest dialogue. It seeks to encourage among its members, respect for the opinions of other groups and to increase a sensitivity to listening. The UCCC is planning a major national conference on the aims and objectives of education, October 2-5, at Wendigo, Manitoba.

Reports have been received from approximately twenty campuses across Canada where our denomination is co-operating in university ministry. There is a variety of types of support groups, and local initiative in finances and manpower is encouraged. The National Committee on Higher Learning has established a fund for initiating or developing campus ministry and is providing support for co-operative ventures such as Regina. For 1969, this fund amounts to \$3,500. The Committee hopes that \$10,000 will be available in 1970 for this purpose.

TRAINING FOR CAMPUS MINISTRY

The Committee on Higher Learning believes that the training of university workers should have a high priority based on the following affirmations:

- a strong church means a strong congregation,
 - a strong congregation needs the support of the community leaders,
 - by and large community leaders of the future are university students,
 - the church is grossly neglecting the university student,
 - the campus should be the first priority in mission,
 - many students are indifferent because the church seems to be indifferent to the role of modern science and technology,
 - ministers must have training to enable them to understand such matters. Within the theological colleges there should be more schooling in the problems of the day,
 - Campus workers must have special training.
- To facilitate the recruitment and training of campus workers, the Presbyterian Church in Canada should recognize the following needs:
- to enlarge the church's regulations regarding extension and home missions to include university work,
 - to alter the ruling that students must take a mission field on ordination, to permit in addition ordination with a view to university chaplaincy, SCM, IVCF staff, etc., on condition that such workers have taken special training for this work,
 - to give greater consideration to the work among French-speaking Canadians, with the following special emphases:
 - that funds and personnel be made available for student work in French-speaking universities with special reference to Laval,
 - that the Presbyteries of Quebec, Montreal and Ottawa give the church a lead in this matter by becoming bilingual,
 - to reaffirm the principle of co-operation with organizations which have traditionally contributed to the Christian ministry on campus, providing suitable support in personnel and money to such organizations, at least \$10,000 per student organization per year for the support of workers (at present we have in mind two national organizations, SCM, and IVCF).

ROVING SECRETARY

A job description has been drawn up for a full-time roving executive secretary to be appointed in 1970. It is expected that the secretary will spend most of his time in university situations across the nation, helping to initiate and support appropriate programs.

NATIONAL DEVELOPMENT FUND

The Committee on Higher Learning reiterates the need for \$50,000 from the NDF which was requested last year (See General Assembly Minutes 1968, p. 289). This request included amounts for:

- (a) work among French-Canadian students
- (b) scholarships to assist in training chaplains and university workers
- (c) a fund for campus ministry to supplement local funds in carrying out needed experiments.

This request should be underlined on the basis of the Committee on Higher Learning having a full-time secretary investigating the potential of campus ministry, and no doubt placing extra demands upon the financial resources available.

RECOMMENDATION

That the General Assembly direct Synods and Presbyteries to explore ways of providing support for church education in the congregations (a) by developing and implementing plans for teacher education through such means as observation schools and observation centres, and (b) by sponsoring institutes for adult education after the design of the Indiana Plan of Adult Education.

COMMITTEE ON INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

Your Committee arranged for six Presbyterians to participate in the annual Ottawa Churchmen's Seminar held the end of January. The theme this year was "An Era of Hunger" and the conference focussed attention on Canada's responsibility in assisting the underdeveloped parts of the world, the so-called Third World.

Since last Assembly members of your Committee have been active through the Canadian Council of Churches in seeking and encouraging Canadian help regarding the tragic situation in Nigeria/Biafra both with respect to relief and efforts to secure a just settlement of the conflict. In the light of the situation at the time of the Assembly the Committee will be presenting recommendations regarding this and other pressing matters in the international sphere.

The Committee has also been represented and active in a thorough study made by the Canadian Council of Churches regarding the establishment of a liaison office in Ottawa to facilitate two-way communication and mutual sharing of concerns between government and the Canadian Churches and Council of Churches. This study has now been completed and a detailed proposal produced which has been referred to the various denominations for action. Your Committee comes before this Assembly with the strong recommendation that our Church participate in this important project. Copies of the proposal will be available for all commissioners at the time of the Assembly.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That the 95th General Assembly approve the participation of the Presbyterian Church in Canada in the establishment and support of an Ottawa liaison office to serve as an enabling facility for the expression of mutual concerns in national and international affairs between government and the Canadian Churches and Council of Churches.
2. That the present allocation of \$500 for the work of this Committee be continued.

COMMITTEE ON INTER-CHURCH AID, REFUGEE AND WORLD SERVICE

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

Your Committee is pleased to report that 1968 was the most outstanding year in the history of our Church's participation in the work of Inter-Church Aid, Refugee and World Service. Our people responded generously both to the regular annual appeal and to the special Nigeria/Biafra appeal and contributed a grand total of \$213,604. Of this amount \$176,103 was given for Nigeria/Biafra and \$37,501 for the regular on-going work of the Committee.

In this latter category, grants were made to the Nigeria/Biafra Fund of the World Council of Churches (\$10,000), North and South Vietnam (\$100 each), the Presbyterian Alliance of Reformed Churches for its relief and rehabilitation work (\$5,000), India Famine Relief (\$200), Yu Shan Theological Institute, Formosa for repair of typhoon damage (\$1,000), Nigerian Clothing Project (\$100), the Christian Council of Biafra for relief work (\$7,500), and \$15,000 as our pro-rated commitment to the Service Programme of the Division in Geneva.

During 1968 the special focus of world attention in alleviating distress was of course on the Nigeria/Biafra situation and here our Church played a leading role. Because of the splendid response of our people to the special Nigeria/Biafra appeal we were able to take the initiative in the formation of Canairelief, the first public-sponsored airlift operation in Canada's history. Our Canadian Super-Constellation plane was added to the Jointchurchaid fleet and because of its large capacity and the skill and daring of its crew has achieved the highest record of tonnage transported. From receipts of the special appeal our basic Presbyterian commitment of \$50,000 to Canairelief was met and a further \$20,000 contributed toward the cost of the second three-month term of operation which began when this report was prepared (April 14).

Other grants from the special Nigeria/Biafra Fund were, \$40,000 to the Nigeria/Biafra Relief programme of the World Council of Churches, \$10,000 to the Canadian Red Cross for its Nigeria/Biafra Relief ship which transported supplies for needy areas on both sides of the conflict, \$1,000 to B'nai Brith for an airlift of drugs to Biafra arranged by the Jewish community, \$10,000 to the Christian Council of Nigeria for relief work and supplies, \$42,500 to the Christian Council of Biafra through Dr. Francis Ibiam for relief work and supplies, and \$10,000 to Nordchurch Aid, the church sponsored Scandinavian group which pioneered the airlift into Biafra last summer.

All through this massive effort your Committee followed the policy of seeking to alleviate distress on both sides of the conflict in relation to the most pressing needs as these became known. Because Biafra has been under blockade so that the only possible flow of relief had to be by airlift which is very costly, the larger proportion of money naturally had to be devoted to that area. Also, because of the very complicated nature of this whole tragic situation requiring considerable travel and telephone communication in untangling problems and securing an efficient operation, administrative expenses were considerable totalling \$11,803 which includes, of course, the printing and postage required in the special appeal. In this connection, special tribute should be paid to Dr. E. H. Johnson for the outstanding role he has played both in Canada and Overseas regarding the relief operation and efforts made to secure a peaceful settlement.

In conclusion, your Committee would like to express formally its deep appreciation to the ministers and people of our Church across Canada for the splendid support given to its work. We would also express the hope that the outstanding effort made this past year will be continued in making possible increasing participation in the important work of relief and development on the part of our Church in the coming years.

RECOMMENDATION

1. That this General Assembly authorize the annual special pre-Easter appeal in 1970 for the work of Inter-Church Aid, Refugee and World Service and request all ministers and Kirk Sessions to encourage and foster the support of their congregations.

THE COMMITTEE ON RECRUITMENT AND VOCATION

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

During the year the Committee has met monthly instead of the customary four or six meetings. In addition there have been numerous sub-committee meetings. Pressure of business and the necessity for close liaison with the research consultants and the LAMP Committee have made for an increase in the number of meetings.

The Committee welcomed several new members, Messrs. L. R. Renault, W. Little, and Miss K. Copeland. It was dealt a severe blow in the loss of D. R. McKillican, resulting from his resignation as Dean of students at Knox College. His knowledge of the field of recruitment, and of our Church, and his personal initiative and devotion occupied a place in the work which will be hard to fill.

Research Development Project

The major portion of the Committee's time and energy was spent on this project, which is as yet not finished, due to the delay in beginning it. The 1968 Assembly authorized the committee "to enter into the necessary contract with a firm of consultants when, after sympathetic consideration by the Administrative Council, funds shall be available" (Min. 1968, p. 99). Presentation was made to the Council in October. It was referred to the Finance Committee to which presentation was made, then to its Executive, and after due consideration passed in late November. Consultation was also held with the Trustee Board, and the Church's law consultants with the end result that the contract was signed in January 1969. In the meantime consultations were held with the staff personnel working for the LAMP Committee, and a special meeting was called with various people expert in the use of consultants and research, among whom were government people from Ottawa, various psychiatrists and survey people, as well as college professors, and finally Dr. E. S. Golden, Consultant in pastoral care for the National Council of Churches, and director of the Drexel Management Institute. These all gave valuable advice on the right use of consultants and the pitfalls to avoid.

To finance the project's cost the Committee proposed and this was recommended by the Finance Committee of the Administrative Council, that \$5,000 be paid out of its 1968 Budget of \$11,000, \$7,000 out of its authorized budget of \$11,000 for 1969 plus an additional appropriation of \$5,000; \$7,000 out of its recommended budget of \$11,000 for 1970, plus an additional appropriation of \$5,000; and a gross amount of \$9,500 in 1971 to be realized from the Committee's budget, plus an additional appropriation as may be determined.

The Report on the project to the Assembly will be in the nature of progress, since the time limitation does not permit a final and complete report till the fall of 1969 at which time it is planned to circularize Presbyteries, Sessions, Synods, and other policy-making agencies of the Church with the report and its relevant recommendations. Recommendations to this effect are appended.

Other Activities

The Committee:

- Revised and reprinted the pamphlet "The Church Needs Trained Women."
- Prepared material for the Presbyterian Record and the Church bulletin.
- The chairman wrote articles on recruitment for the Glad Tidings and the Record.
- Nominated two candidates for McMaster Centennial Fellowship in continuing pastoral education for each of November and February sessions.
- Assisted financially a tour of Western Ontario by the Ewart College Choir, as well as a week-end trip.
- Assumed responsibility for the transportation of Dr. C. R. Bell to a joint meeting of the Synods of Alberta and Saskatchewan to speak at a seminar on "The Role of the Ministry To-day and Recruitment."

- Sent representatives to the McMaster Consultation on Theological Education which examined trends and defects in present theological education and raised for the Committee the ethical problem of recruitment in a clouded, confused and often defective atmosphere surrounding theological education.
- Continued its program of Presbytery in depth conferences on recruitment. This work was hampered by the change of conveners during the year and the indecision among the Presbyteries approached. The Committee still feels this kind of venture is its most fruitful activity in direct recruitment.
- In association with the Board of Missions and the Missionary Education Committee sponsored a student to visit camps, Y.P. rallies, and congregations in the eastern Synods from May 1-September 1. Contacts were made with over 900 young people in the interests of recruitment and missionary education. Plans to repeat the venture in 1969 have been frustrated by lack of candidates and a lack of money.

Overtures

The Committee had three overtures referred to it from the 1968 Assembly for report to the 1969 Assembly.

Overture 6, p. 395: The Presbytery of West Toronto re a committee to investigate the tasks and responsibilities appropriate to a full-time Secretariat on Ministerial Supply. Your committee recommends that, inasmuch as the Recruitment and Vocation Committee has been charged with the responsibility for investigation and research into the whole area of supply and support for and the multiplicity of ministries, which research embraces the subject of the prayer, the prayer be granted in terms of the research development project initiated by this Committee and its subsequent recommendations.

Overture 3, pp. 383, 394: The Presbytery of Montreal re taking action to implement the recommendations of the Woods Gordon Report and the further recommendations of the Presbytery of Montreal as expeditiously as possible.

Replies were received from two Presbyteries: East Toronto, Winnipeg. Your Committee recommends that, inasmuch as the recommendations of the Woods Gordon Report are under consideration in the research-development project of the Committee; and other recommendations (4, 6) have been or are being dealt with by the appropriate bodies; and still other recommendations are contingent upon further research, therefore the prayer be granted in terms of the research-development project initiated by the Committee and its subsequent recommendations.

Overture 17, p. 401: The Presbytery of Bruce-Maitland re giving Professors a more vital role in presenting the claims of the Christian ministry and the work of our college . . . and that remuneration be provided. Your Committee recommends that, inasmuch as three of its membership are the recruiting officers of the three colleges and they together with other college personnel have been involved in recruitment ventures; and inasmuch as college personnel are available on invitation by Sessions, Presbyteries, and Synods, in so far as their primary duties permit, therefore the prayer be granted in the above terms.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That the Committee be authorized to circularize Presbyteries with the research-development project report together with its recommendations and ask for a report back.
2. That the Committee be authorized to consult with other Boards and Committees on the matters of continuing research and relevant recommendations arising from the project.
3. That the statement in this Report re Overture 6, 1968, be adopted as an answer to the prayer of the Overture.

4. That the statement in this Report re Overture 6, 1968, be adopted as an answer to the prayer of the Overture.
5. That the statement in this Report re Overture 17, 1968, be adopted as an answer to the prayer of the Overture.

THE COMMITTEE TO ADVISE WITH THE MODERATOR

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

The Reverend Clifton J. MacKay, B.A., D.D., was elected Moderator of the 94th General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, meeting in St. Andrew's Church, Toronto, Ontario, on June 5th, 1968.

In October, Dr. MacKay visited the Korean Christian Church in Japan, conveying the greetings of the Presbyterian Church in Canada on the 60th Anniversary of the beginning of Mission among the Koreans in Japan.

It was not possible for Dr. MacKay to accept all the invitations which he received, but a schedule of visits was arranged by which he visited congregations as far west as Brandon, Manitoba, and as far east as Pictou, N.S. In the Presbyteries of Pictou, Hamilton, Niagara, London, Paris and Winnipeg, at the suggestion of the Moderator, informal conferences were held to discuss some of the problems of ministry in our day.

In May, Dr. MacKay attended the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland amongst other engagements in Britain.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That the thanks of this General Assembly be expressed to the congregation of Knox, Crescent and Kensington for their co-operation during the past year when their minister was occupied with the many duties that fall on the Moderator of the Assembly.
2. That the thanks of this Assembly be recorded for the assistance given by congregations and presbyteries in arranging for effective use of the Moderator's time, and for the hospitality and kindness extended to him on his travels.

THE REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SYNOD CORPORATIONS

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

The Committee on Synod Corporations respectfully submits its report for the year 1968.

Charter of National Corporation

As instructed by the 93rd General Assembly, the Committee applied for and obtained a Federal Charter from the Government of Canada to form a National Corporation. Its name is "THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH BUILDING CORPORATION." The Committee has been negotiating with each of the Synod and

Presbytery Corporations to arrange their entrance into the National Corporation. With the exception of the Presbyterian Extension Fund (B.C.) Limited all the existing Corporations have agreed to merge with The Presbyterian Church Building Corporation.

New Loans

During 1968 five new loans were approved in principle. The Corporation of the Synod of Toronto and Kingston approved loans for four congregations totalling \$250,000.00. The Corporation of the Synod of Hamilton and London approved one loan in the amount of \$40,000.00. The congregations concerned were each given a letter of intent by their respective Corporations, which enabled them to arrange bank loans. No collateral trust debentures have been marketed since 1964 because of the unsettled conditions of the bond market but the chartered banks have accommodated twelve of our congregations on a letter of intent given by each Corporation concerned. The total of these unsecured short-term loans is \$1,059,000.00. We are grateful to the chartered banks for their co-operation in this respect.

Existing Loans

The total amount of financing arranged by the Corporations to construct 71 church buildings is \$4,998,217.00.

During the year debenture principal was reduced by \$181,500.00. The principal outstanding on debentures as of December 31, 1968 stood at \$2,492,500.00. The principal of the guaranteed bank loans was reduced by \$25,844.00 during the year. One congregation increased its bank loan by \$26,800.00 and another congregation had its loans increased because of non-payment of the full interest required. As a result, the principal outstanding on these guaranteed bank loans was \$335,794.00 at December 31, 1968.

Assets and Liabilities

At December 31, 1968 the sixty-six congregations, that now have loans through the eight Corporations, had assets of \$11,823,432.00, liabilities of \$5,468,903.00, and an apparent surplus of \$6,598,570.00, all of which is a considerable improvement over 1967.

Number of Loans

As of December 31, 1968 the sixty-six congregations that have loans from our Corporations had 143 additional loans from other sources, making a total of 209 loans, which is the same number as in 1967 although more congregations are involved. It is the mind of the Committee that too many congregations are carrying too many loans.

Congregations Dissolved and Amalgamated

During the year one congregation (Garden Village, Burnaby, B.C.), which had a guaranteed bank loan, was dissolved by the Presbytery of Westminster. It is hoped that the sale of its property will generate sufficient funds to liquidate all the indebtedness on the property, which amounts to \$45,744.00 (The Lending Fund first mortgage of \$15,877.00 and the guaranteed bank loan of \$29,867.00).

St. David's congregation in Ottawa was amalgamated with St. Martin's congregation and the former's property sold. The first mortgage on the property, in the amount of \$40,000.00, was held by the Corporation of the Presbytery of Ottawa.

This amount was paid off from the proceeds that accrued from the sale of the property and the debentures were redeemed. Two other congregations paid off their small guaranteed bank loans.

Defaults

Your Committee is pleased to report that no Corporation is in default. The Committee, however, deplores the fact that nine of the forty-one congregations that received their loans from debenture issuing Corporations have defaulted on their mortgage payments. They are listed below:

The number of congregations in default in 1967 was eleven as against nine in 1968 and the total amount of default in 1967 was \$129,410.98 as against \$127,824.82 in 1968.

The Presbytery of Ottawa continues to give financial assistance to the congregation of St. Timothy's. The congregation and the Presbytery have entered into a new agreement whereby the congregation will now pay half of its debt retirement funds on the Corporation mortgage and half on the bank loan. Prior to this agreement the congregation was concentrating on retiring the bank loan only. Several congregations in the Presbytery of East Toronto have contributed substantial amounts of money to assist the Guildwood congregation. With such assistance it is expected that in about three years the congregation will be in a position to fully service its own debt.

According to reports received from the congregations of Brentwood and Whalley in Vancouver, British Columbia, which have guaranteed bank loans, it appears that neither congregation paid any principal on their loans during 1968. Brentwood did not pay the total amount of interest required and the amount lacking was added to the outstanding principal. Although these congregations may not be technically in default, it is a serious matter because the continuation of this practice could lead to the refusal of the banks to do business with our Corporations and congregations. It is also costing the congregation large sums of money by paying only the interest, which means that the principal will never be repaid.

We repeat again that no congregation should attempt to construct a church building without first preparing a thorough-going feasibility study, which should include the financial ability of its members and their declared willingness to undertake and support such a program.

Permission to Borrow for Capital Purposes

The Committee would remind congregations contemplating borrowing capital funds that the 94th (1968) General Assembly ruled that no congregation may borrow funds for capital purposes from any source without the permission of its Presbytery. Congregations that have borrowed from our Corporations must also obtain written permission if and when they desire to borrow additional capital funds from other sources.

The Committee would remind congregations desiring to borrow funds from or through a Corporation that it is a rule of the General Assembly that all applications for Synod Corporation loans be processed through the Committee on Synod Corporations and that this rule applies to Corporations that guarantee bank loans as well as those that issue collateral trust debentures. (Acts and Proceedings of the General Assembly, 1963 page 351)

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That all congregations having loans from the Corporations be advised that it is their responsibility to make sure that their property is insured adequately and that the interest of the Corporation is clearly defined.
2. That all congregations be reminded that their title deeds should be kept in a safe place where they may be readily available.
3. That all congregations be reminded that they must first obtain permission from their Presbytery before they can borrow funds for capital purposes from any source.
4. That each Synod and Presbytery Corporation be reminded of the regulation approved by the 92nd General Assembly (1966, page 96) "that each application made to a Synod or Presbytery Corporation be examined and analyzed by the General Assembly's Committee on Synod Corporations before final consideration."

COMMITTEE ON HISTORY

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

At this committee's meetings, for which were co-opted additional personnel this past year, our 1967 Canadian centennial celebrations were evaluated, current projects considered, and planning for the 1975 centenary of our denomination undertaken.

The annual prize for contributing to Canadian Presbyterian historical research has been awarded to the Rev. J. P. Schissler of West Flamboro, Ontario. Two issues of the "Newsletter" were printed in 1968 marking its twelfth year of publication by the Historical Society of our Church, and latterly by this committee. Subjects discussed included histories of the Church in Newfoundland and of the 1945 Conference of Western Synods. Editor is the Rev. T. M. Bailey.

Attention is directed to the recent publication of a volume by Victor Ullman entitled *Look to the North Star*, being a history of the Buxton Mission, Chatham, Ontario, and a life of the Rev. William King. The General Assembly will note that the Society for African Church History has printed portions of a "Study in Church Developments in Eastern Nigeria" by the Rev. G. D. Johnston, completed through a grant from the Board of Missions. Tragic events in Nigeria-Biafra have delayed publication, but this committee has recommended an early completion of this project. The *Dalhousie Review* contained an article by C. B. Ferguson entitled "The Sesquicentennial of the First Synod of the Presbyterian Church in Canada."

The Public Archives of Canada is most interested in studying the feasibility of microfilming at least part of the archives of our denomination. The Administrative Council has been asked by this committee to permit this, subject to its predetermined conditions. A list of theses dealing with Canadian Presbyterian Church History has been prepared by this committee with provision for revision as additional works become known to our committee. Present inquiries are directed to universities and seminaries in the United States.

The Synod of the Atlantic Provinces unanimously approved the setting up of archives in each of the maritime provinces. Materials remaining in local congregations are to be properly safeguarded and microfilm copies are to be deposited in the official provincial archives of the synod. (Procedures and expenses involved may preclude early implementation of this laudable project.)

Various Synod annual reports record congregational celebrations, and anniversary booklets are being deposited in the Toronto archives of our church. A most commendable History of the Synod of Alberta has been printed and all Synods of the church are urged to undertake similar projects in preparation for the 1975 centennial. The Presbytery of Hamilton has produced an outstanding local history and it is offered as a guide to Presbyteries considering such a publication. Montcrieff's history of Newfoundland is now being joined by Whyte's history of Presbyterianism in Chatham, New Brunswick, and Pauley's research of Durham, West River, Nova Scotia. These efforts are to be highly commended.

Two major concerns of this committee deserve special emphasis:

1. Archives of The Presbyterian Church in Canada

As is realized by the General Assembly, the control and ownership of much Presbyterian archival materials, by terms of the 1925 church union settlement, passed to the United Church of Canada and is now largely to be found in its Toronto archives. Sizeable minorities are housed at Pine Hill, Halifax, at Queen's, Kingston, and in various western depositories, etc.

In the past forty-five years, however, our Presbyterian Church in Canada has acquired significant archival materials from both a qualitative and a quantitative point of view. Some is found in the Presbyterian archives at the Presbyterian College, Montreal, suitably catalogued through the efforts of the Rev. Dr. Neil Smith. Other magazines and periodicals, unique in nature, of historical value, have

been placed in the library of the college and are considered by the committee to be archival materials. However, the vast majority of the archives of the Presbyterian Church in Canada are presently deposited at 59 St. George Street, Toronto, in very overcrowded quarters on the top floor of the Knox College library, and with cataloguing and cross-indexing untouched in many cases.

In regards to archives, the following actions have been taken by this committee: That Toronto be recognized as the site of the archives of The Presbyterian Church in Canada, and that suitable space and facilities be arranged at Knox College. That the sum of \$1,000 for each of the next five years beginning in 1971 be made available to this committee for cataloguing and indexing archival materials by additional staff help under the direction of the Rev. Dr. George Douglas, archivist. A presentation re archival needs has been made to the National Development Fund regarding the need of additional storage space at Knox College within two years. That archival materials presently in The Presbyterian College, Montreal, be transferred to the Toronto archives if and when the Montreal depository closes or no longer functions as archives for our denomination. That discussion with the United Church, and possibly with other denominations, regarding the development of a church "union catalogue" of archival materials available in Canada, be explored as a 1975 anniversary project.

2. 1975 Centenary

Scarcely does it seem that this committee has completed its responsibilities for the celebration of the 1967 centennial of our dominion than plans for the hundredth anniversary of our own denomination are underway. What an opportunity for nurture and rededication. The year 1975 witnesses to thanksgiving for past mercies, offers a time for evaluation and confession, and stands for rededication and vision in terms of new forms of mission.

Involvement of church periodicals, Christian education materials, publications, audio-visuals, local and national programmes, age-group promotions, are but some of the forty-two areas being explored with various groups and committees of the church in preparation for the 1975 celebrations. This committee recommends to the 1973 General Assembly that it approve St. Andrew's, Kitchener, as the place of the 1974 Assembly, and that First Church, Montreal, be the site of the 1975 Assembly. The former congregation has agreed to support, develop, produce and financially share in underwriting a projected radio, television, audio-visual, involvement of the Assembly commissioners (perhaps more than one-sixth of our Constituent Roll might be enabled to attend this Assembly) as preparation for the involvement of congregations in the months leading to the 1975 Assembly proposed for Montreal the site of the 1875 first assembly and within First Church (established 1793) in that city. One may feel that 1975 is still far distant, but the Assembly realizes with this Committee, that adequate preparations now will enable the church to receive maximum benefit for its labours in centennial year.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That Synods, and Presbyteries where possible, be encouraged to compile area histories, congregational and biographical sketches, etc., in preparation for the 1975 centennial celebrations, and to deposit copies of same in the archives of the church.
2. That congregations now appoint 1975 Centennial Committees to plan for local emphases and for congregational participation in regional and national anniversary programmes.
3. That the National Archives of Canada be permitted to microfilm archives of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, subject to such conditions as may be determined by the Administrative Council.
4. That the sum of \$1,000 per annum for five years beginning in 1971 be made available for the cataloguing and indexing of Presbyterian archival materials.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STRUCTURE OF THEOLOGICAL EDUCATION

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

The committee mainly devoted itself to a revision of the education regulations. These were last revised by action of the General Assembly in 1950. For convenience these revised regulations of 1950 are reprinted here and are followed by the proposed revisions of 1969.

REVISED EDUCATIONAL REGULATIONS 1950

1. Students intending to study for the ministry of the Presbyterian Church in Canada should place themselves under the supervision of the Senate of one of the Colleges of the Church at as early a date as possible in their course of study. They must be members of the Church in full communion and should apply to a presbytery through their own minister or some other minister who knows him intimately, for examination as to character, sincerity and general fitness for the ministry. The Presbytery, if satisfied will certify such students to the Senate of the College of their choice. Such certification must be renewed each year throughout a student's course.

Ministers are urged to be diligent in giving appropriate counsel to students of their acquaintance looking forward to the ministry; and Presbyteries also are exhorted to exercise great care and thoroughness in their important duty of certifying students to a College Senate.

2. All students thus certified and registered in any College of the Church, whether they be in Arts or Theology are required to be in communion with some congregation of the Church in the place where they are prosecuting their studies.

3. The regular course of training for the ministry of the Presbyterian Church in Canada includes the following requirements in Arts and Theology:

A. Arts

(a) University Matriculation (Junior or Senior).

(b) A course of study leading to the B.A. degree in some recognized university.

In order to be assured of an adequate preparation for the study of Theology, the student should regard the following as a minimum equipment. In every case except Beginner's Greek the courses indicated must be of university standard, i.e. beyond Junior Matriculation. These courses should be considered suggestive rather than compulsory.

Latin: To Senior Matriculation

Greek: Beginners Greek or Junior Matriculation Greek and one course in either Classical or Hellenistic Greek

Hebrew: One Course

Philosophy: Two courses

History: Two courses

English: Two courses (including English Composition)

Natural Science: One course

Students who have failed to include the subjects listed may be admitted to Theology through examination if in the judgment of the Senates of the Colleges these be considered necessary, the Senates to be the sole examining bodies.

Since Hebrew and Greek are necessary in the Theological course, students deficient in these subjects must satisfy the Senates of the Colleges by the end of the fall term for first year students that they have sufficient knowledge of these subjects to continue their Theological course.

Entrance examinations shall not be required in any subject or subjects which a student has passed in his university course.

B. Theology

The course in Theology shall extend over three full sessions of six months each, or such other period as the Church may enact and shall embrace the following subjects of study:

(a) History and Philosophy of Religion; Systematic Theology; Old Testament Literature and Exegesis; New Testament Literature and Exegesis; Church History; Christian Ethics.

These subjects all of which are of primary importance in a Theological education should remain central in the Theological curriculum, and be given recognition and emphasis accordingly.

(b) Homiletics, Pastoral Theology, Liturgics (including historical and critical study in the general subject of worship, practical training in the conduct of public worship, the celebration of the sacraments and other services.)

In recognition of the fact that the Theological Colleges of the Church are maintained, not only to provide the Church with scholarly ministry, but also with men trained in the practical duties of this office, it is necessary that the subjects included in the field of Practical Theology should be so distributed over the three years of the entire course in Theology that some substantial part of the field be covered each year.

(c) Church Law and Government; Religious Education; Christian Mission; Church Music; Church Architecture; Elocution.

Every student is required during his course in Theology to present a sermon and a critical exercise in Greek or Hebrew or its equivalent, both of which, in addition to being approved by the Faculty and Senate, must also be presented to Presbytery when the student appears for licensure.

Examinations in English Bible are required of all students entering Theology, these to be held at the end of the fall term. For second and third year students in Theology these examinations are to be held at the beginning of the fall term. All examinations are to be held under the Senates of the Colleges who will specify the portions of the Bible selected for examination.

4. Students applying to be admitted to Theology with degrees from recognized colleges or universities other than the B.A. degree, but which are regarded as its academic equivalent may be received on fulfilment of the entrance examinations as set forth in Section 3.

5. Senates are empowered to admit to the study of Theology without a university degree students of more advanced years (in no case under twenty-five years of age on entering university) on condition that they pass examinations in a series of at least twelve full courses in Arts, all of which must be of full university standard (i.e. beyond Junior Matriculation), except Beginner's Greek and on fulfilment of the entrance examination requirements as set forth in Section 3.

6. It is highly desirable that all students should complete their Arts course before entering on the study of Theology; and in no case except by permission of the General Assembly may a student be admitted to Theology unless he has completed at least three years in a recognized Arts course (i.e. beyond Junior Matriculation).

7. All students fulfilling the requirements as here outlined shall be entitled on the completion of their course in Theology to the diploma of the College in which they have studied.

8. Except by authority of the General Assembly, Senates are not permitted to grant concessions or exemptions to individual students. The General Assembly may, however, on application through a Presbytery, prescribe modified courses, every such case being considered and decided on its own merits. When such modified course is granted and has been completed to the satisfaction of the Senate, the General Assembly shall be informed accordingly, and the student concerned may receive from the College a special certificate to indicate his standing.

9. At the close of each college session students in good standing are entitled to a certificate from the Senate to the General Board of Missions (if they wish to apply

for a Summer Mission Field), or to the Presbytery within the bounds of which they expect to reside during the summer vacation.

10. College Senates are required to report annually, either directly or through the College Board, to the General Assembly.

PROPOSED REVISIONS 1969

Section 1: Approved.

Section 2: *It is Recommended that this section be deleted.* The regulation requires the student to break his connection with his home congregation which may be supporting him financially. In the case of Theological students with week-end charges the regulation cannot be enforced.

Section 3: (a) *It is recommended that the following statement be substituted for the list of subjects in Arts in section 3b: "A good Arts course fulfils several functions in preparing a student for his course in Theology. It gives him a knowledge and understanding of the world in which he will be ministering including its history, culture and motivation, its orientation to the past, present and future. It gives him insight into the basic problems of human existence and the various answers that have been given to these problems. It gives him insight into contemporary political, economic, social and personal issues which confront him in his own experience. It gives him the linguistic preparation in his mother tongue and in those ancient and modern languages that are necessary for thorough biblical, historical and theological study.*

An Arts student in preparation for Theology should therefore make ample provision in his choice of subjects for English, History and Philosophy. These may be regarded as a primary triad of subjects. A thorough knowledge of the nineteenth century broadly defined is highly recommended as a necessity for understanding the twentieth century. He should also make ample provision for the social sciences such as politics, economics, sociology and psychology. These sciences are becoming increasingly important for an understanding of the contemporary world. Attention should also be given to technology and the new developments in the physical sciences as these contribute to social change and modified world views. Finally, he should have as much preparation in the biblical languages as possible, thus relieving him of the extra task of taking tutorial classes in these languages concurrent with his theological course. The above suggestions are intended as guidelines to a choice of Arts subjects."

(b) It is recommended that the following statement be substituted for the paragraphs on entrance examinations in Section 3b, under Arts: "Students deficient in pre-theological studies according to the above principles and objectives may be required to take whatever additional studies the College Senates deem necessary."

The purpose of this recommendation is to simplify the complicated and cumbersome regulations on entrance examinations for Arts students entering Theology as found in the revised regulations of 1950. It will be understood that entrance examinations shall not be required in any subject or subjects which a student has passed in his university course (as in 1950 revision).

(c) It is recommended that the following statement be substituted for the paragraphs (a) (b) (c) in 3B Theology: "The course in Theology shall extend over three full academic sessions or such other period as the Church may enact and shall embrace the following subjects of study: Old Testament Literature and Exegesis; New Testament Literature and Exegesis; Church History; Systematic Theology; History and Philosophy of Religion; Christian Ethics.

These subjects, all of which are of primary importance in a theological education should remain central in the theological curriculum and be given recognition and emphasis accordingly. Old Testament and New Testament are the core subjects of this group. Either Hebrew or Greek is necessary for the graduation diploma. The College Senates may require both languages for the B.D. degree. The study of Christian Missions will come under Church History and under the History and Philosophy of Religion.

The course in Theology shall also embrace the following subjects of study: Homiletics, Communication and Speech, Liturgics, Pastoral Theology, including Counselling, Christian Education, Church Music, Church Government and Administration.

These subjects in the area of Practical Theology should be so distributed over the three years of the entire course in Theology that some substantial part of the area be covered each year. It is expected that as far as possible students will be given the kind of practice and experience that each subject involves.

(d) It is recommended that the requirement of a sermon and a critical exercise in Greek or Hebrew be dropped.

The requirement of sermons is already provided under Homiletics. Moreover the critical exercise is extra-curricular, and not part of the theological course and rarely requested by Presbyteries for licensure.

(e) It is recommended that English Bible be included in the theological course under the direction of the Old and New Testament departments. Portions of the Bible will be prescribed at the end of the first and second years of Theology for study over the summer and examination in the fall.

The regulation as revised in 1950 was difficult to administer especially for incoming students, often with an already over-loaded curriculum. Since the examination results in English Bible were not included in the computation of a student's standing, it was difficult to motivate him with the result that the whole procedure tended to become perfunctory.

Section 4. It is recommended that this section be revised as follows: "Students applying to be admitted to theology with degrees from recognized colleges or universities other than the B.A. degree may be received on fulfilment of such additional courses as the College Senate may require."

Section 5. Approved.

Section 6. Approved.

Section 7. Approved.

Section 8. It is recommended that this section be amended by the insertion of the following at the end of the first sentence: "However, Senates are permitted to use their discretion in assigning courses of study to students coming from a culture where the native tongue is not English."

Section 9. Approved.

Section 10. Approved.

RECOMMENDATION #3 A. & P. 1967 pp. 98, 300-302

The special committee on this recommendation was requested by the Assembly to report after consultation with the Committee on the Structure of Theological Education. The problem mainly concerned a gradation of faculty status (Lecturer, Assistant, Associate, Full Professor) for security of tenure beginning at the associate level.

The Committee on the Structure of Theological Education reported to the above Committee on Recommendation #3 in the following terms:

"That approval be given in principle, provided that it be related to a realistic salary scale and that the Boards and Senates of the Colleges be granted authority to appoint Lecturers and Assistant Professors and to make such promotions as may be deemed advisable and to recommend to the General Assembly appointments or promotions to the position of Associate or Full Professorships."

OVERTURE #9 A. & P. 1968 p. 396

This overture from the Presbytery of Montreal concerned the possibility of making adequate scholarships available to those who wish to pursue theological

studies in French Faculties of Theology in Europe with a view to French work in Canada.

The Committee on the Structure of Theological Education recommends sympathetic consideration of the prayer of this Overture by the Senates of the College.

DISCHARGE OF THE COMMITTEE

It is recommended that the Committee on the Structure of Theological Education be discharged and that its concerns be referred to an annual meeting of at least two representatives from each of the Faculties, Senates and Boards of the three Colleges, to be convened by the Principals in rotation (i.e. Knox College, Presbyterian College, Ewart College).

THE ADMINISTRATIVE COUNCIL

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

The Administrative Council begs leave to report on its activities during the past year.

Matters Referred to Council by Previous Assemblies

A. Overture 10, 1968, Presbytery of Ottawa, Re Recruits, Stipends and Pensions. This Overture was referred to the Council for report to Assembly, 1969. The prayer of the Overture is in three parts, I, II and III. (For text of Overture, see A & P, 1968, page 397).

Part I. The L.A.M.P. Committee will report to Assembly.

Part II. This Part was referred by Council to its Finance Committee. The text reads, "To establish immediately a minimum stipend of \$7,700 per year, including housing and exclusive of travel allowance which should be commensurate with the requirements of the particular parish, and in future planning to give the highest priority to ministerial stipends."

The Council feels that the inclusion of the house allowance in the total stipend figure is undesirable. Housing costs vary so greatly between different municipalities that to include in the total stipend a flat amount for housing allowance would not be equitable. Therefore in considering this Overture the Council assumed housing allowance of \$1,800 (which is the amount currently considered to be in the Board Secretaries' and Professors' salaries) and hence the recommendation was that a minimum stipend of \$5,900 per year, excluding travel allowance, should be established.

With the introduction on April 1st, 1969, of the full increments approved by the 93rd General Assembly the minimum, after nine years of service, is \$5,700. It will be seen therefore that this is only \$200 under the amount recommended by the Presbytery of Ottawa in Overture No. 10.

The Council therefore recommends that the prayer of this Part of the Overture be answered along the lines of the foregoing with the assurance that the Administrative Council agree that ministerial stipends should have the highest priority, that it is supporting the recommendation of the General Board of Missions that the minimum stipend be increased and further that it is recommending that an increased scale of increments be approved by this General Assembly to be introduced as soon as the Council finds that the funds are available for this purpose.

Part III. This Part was referred to the Pension Board, and the Council has approved the following report of the Pension Board and recommends that Part III be

thus answered: "That the answer to both requests is that the Pension Board will undertake to make improvements in the Pension Fund benefits when funds are available."

B. Overture 7, 1967, Presbytery of Paris, Re Recognition of Outstanding Service of Laymen. (The text of the Overture is found on page 416, A & P, 1967). The prayer of the Overture asks for some type of suitable recognition of outstanding service of laymen. The Council recommends that the Council's Committee of Secretaries be a committee to consider requests for recognition.

C. Recommendation 9, Administrative Council, 1968, A & P, 1968, pages 331 and 326. The Council reports that a Congress Planning Committee has been appointed, the Council having approved the recommendation of its Committee of Secretaries in this matter, and that the Congress Planning Committee is now functioning. The Council recommends that this statement be the answer for information on Section 3 of its Recommendation 9, 1968.

D. Recommendation 14, Board of E. & S.A., 1968, A & P, 1968, pages 281 and 97. The Council referred this to the Board of E. & S.A. for report. The Board submitted seven recommendations to the Council meeting of April, 1969. No. 6 was referred to the Finance Committee for report, and the Council, in a later motion, considered that consultation should be held with The Trustee Board and further time was therefore given for study and report to Council. The Council recommends that Recommendations 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 7, following, as adopted by the Council, be approved by Assembly.

1. "That the General Assembly call the courts and congregations of our church to take more seriously the social implications of the gospel, and alert them to the fact that poverty is not only a great destroyer of human rights, but also one of the greatest problems and causes of tensions in Canada and the world today.

2. That sessions and congregations be urged to undertake a study and to cooperate in ecumenical studies of the needs of their own communities with a view to providing a forum in the community for the free discussion of the issues of poverty.

3. That Presbyteries and congregations encourage the erection of multi-functional buildings and emphasize the need for buildings to serve the mission of the Church and the needs of the community.

4. That congregations, emphasizing the primacy of worship, be encouraged to make their buildings available to serve other community needs, where not doing so.

5. That in Presbyteries where two or more congregations have amalgamated and church buildings and properties have been sold, the General Assembly urge Presbyteries to encourage congregations to use some of the money and/or the land that is made available for the care and housing of senior citizens.

6. That the General Assembly authorize the investment of 25% of the liquid assets of The Presbyterian Church in Canada in residential mortgages and housing developments and that part of the National Development Fund be so invested to whatever extent may be deemed feasible.

7. That the General Assembly commend the government of Canada for their avowed aim of making 1% of the gross national product available for economic assistance to poor and underdeveloped countries, and urge them to increase our contribution in this field to 1% as soon as possible."

Other Matters

E. Appointment of Mr. N. L. Mathews, Q.C., to The Trustee Board. The Council recommends that Mr. N. L. Mathews, Q.C., be appointed as a member of The Trustee Board.

F. Re: Method of Electing the Moderator of Assembly.

Arising out of an address given to the Council by Dr. G. D. Johnston, Moderator of the 92nd General Assembly, the Council gave long consideration to a report from

the Committee to Advise with the Moderator, to which Committee Dr. Johnston's address had been referred for study. After consideration of the history of the method of electing Moderators of Assembly, the Committee presented a report to the Council. The Council gave detailed study to the report, and begs leave to recommend as follows to the 95th General Assembly:

"That beginning with the 96th General Assembly (1970), the following be standing orders for the Election of the Moderator of Assembly:

Preamble:

1. That these orders be effective for a trial period of five years in principle.
2. That in the Regulations below where the phrase "nomination of Presbytery" or equivalent is used, this phrase be understood for convenience only. (The only true nomination for Moderator is from the floor of Assembly.)

Regulations:

1. That Presbyteries return to the Clerks of Assembly for the Committee to Advise with the Moderator by November thirtieth their nomination or nominations, not to exceed two in number, each nomination to be accompanied by a biographical sketch of the nominee, not over one hundred words in length. Nominees must have their names on the Constituent Roll of a Presbytery as of December the thirty-first. It is noted that the nominee or nominees need not be members of the Presbytery nominating:

2. The Clerks of Assembly shall ascertain from those nominated their willingness to accept the office if elected:

3. That the Committee send to the Clerks of Presbyteries sufficient ballots for the Presbytery, each containing the names of those duly nominated by the Presbyteries, and each ballot being accompanied by biographical sketches and envelope:

4. That the Clerk of Presbytery give a ballot, envelope and biographical sketches to each of those on the Constituent Roll of Presbytery (alternate Elders not to have a vote). Said ballots, prepared as under 5, following, are to be returned to the Clerks of Assembly, forwarded by the Clerk of Presbytery, to reach the Clerks of Assembly for the Committee to Advise with the Moderator not later than February the twenty-eighth:

5. That the voting in the Presbytery be as in the Book of Forms, Section 132 (3) and (4), *mutatis mutandis*, the envelope sealed and authenticated by the signature of the member on the Constituent Roll and certified also by the signature of the Clerk of the Presbytery on the envelope:

6. That the Committee to Advise with the Moderator, and its quorum for this purpose is here stated to be three members of whom at least one shall be a Clerk of Assembly, open and count the ballots as under Section 132 (4) of the Book of Forms, *mutatis mutandis*:

7. That the Minister receiving the highest number of votes be informed by the Committee, who, upon receiving his/her acceptance, will notify his/her Presbytery with the request that he/she be named a commissioner:

8. That the Committee, if the Presbytery sends notification that the Minister referred to has been elected a commissioner, notify the Church in whatever manner they deem good:

9. That the Committee destroy all ballots at a suitable time after the election of the Moderator:

10. That the nomination be made from the floor of Assembly, and that opportunity be given for another nomination or nominations:

11. That, if the foregoing fails to be effective in any year, the election of the Moderator of Assembly shall proceed in the manner of 1969, notice being given to the Presbyteries as early as possible:

12. And that changes in these Regulations may be made by any Assembly following a Notice of Motion."

G. Re: Appointments to the office of Joint Clerks of Assembly.

The Organization and Planning Committee of the Administrative Council, to whom had been handed an assignment to study the relationship between the office of the Secretary of the Council and the Joint Clerkship of Assembly, reported at the October, 1968 meeting of the Council, and the report was adopted.

The Council recommends as follows to Assembly:

"That future appointments to the office of Joint Clerk of Assembly shall be made by the General Assembly on the nomination of a special committee acting in consultation with the Joint Clerk or Clerks in office and after having asked for nominations from Presbyteries, such special committee to be named by the Committee to Strike Standing Committees:

This rule shall be suspended so long as either or both Dr. E. A. Thomson or L. H. Fowler shall remain as one of the Joint Clerks:

This procedure will supersede all former procedures of the General Assembly concerning appointment of Joint Clerks of the General Assembly.

Such appointees shall be subject to the same retirement and pension regulations as all other appointees of the General Assembly:

The section of this resolution dealing with Pension Regulations be declared to be applicable to and upon all future appointments of the General Assembly eligible for benefits under the Pension Fund and Employees' Retirement Fund."

(The Minutes of the Council meeting include this sentence, "Dr. L. H. Fowler entered protest and indicated that Dr. E. A. Thomson, Joint Clerk of Assembly, supported him in the protest.")

H. Re: Study Leaves and Sabbaticals

The Council has given long study to the question of Study Leaves and Sabbaticals, and out of its Minutes of October, 1968, recommends that the following be adopted by Assembly:

1. The Assembly heartily approves the principle of professors and secretaries being granted periods of leave or sabbaticals, whatever the term be used to describe these, believing these periods are an exceptionally fine investment for the good of the Church at any level.

In this, the Assembly calls attention to the Report of Dr. William Fitch's Special Committee to Consider Sabbaticals, A & P, 1965, pages 121 and 492, and endorses that Report.

2. The Assembly recommends that each of the Assembly's Boards or Committees employing personnel of professors or secretaries be responsible for such leaves or sabbaticals within its activities, and as policy the Committee indicates the following general guide lines:

- (a) That each give approval to the principle.
- (b) That budgeting be provided for in each as may be decided under Recommendation 4, following.
- (c) That the leave or sabbatical be at the rate of a month per year of service.
- (d) That required projects entailing special study by personnel be not considered a study leave or sabbatical.
- (e) That all contemplated studies be approved by the body concerned.

3. That the Principles herein drafted be made applicable to pastors. Attention is called to the Report of Dr. Fitch's Committee (A & P, 1965, page 492), paragraph five therein, as follows: ". . . the Committee would add that, where special circumstances arise, Presbyteries should not hesitate to exercise the powers which are theirs, to advise and direct that Ministers be granted leave of absence from their congregations. It seems to the Committee that this jurisdiction be retained entirely under the control of Presbytery. In such cases, the concurrence of the Board of Missions, where applicable, would be expected." Attention is also called to the Report of the Clerks of Assembly, Overture 12, 1967, page 296, A & P, 1968.

4. That the financing of leaves and sabbaticals be commended to Assembly through the Administrative Council.

I. Re: Amendment to the Constitution of the Council,
Alternates for Secretaries.

The Council has found in its experience there have been times when a Secretary must be absent from its meeting, and the Council is thereby impeded in its work. The Council recommends that the Constitution of the Council be amended in Section 2 (a) by the addition of the words "and secretaries" between "chairmen" and "boards", the Section thereby to read, "Official alternates for the chairmen and secretaries of boards and standing committees as representatives on the Council shall be appointed by each of the said boards and committees for one year."

J. Re: Report of Joint Committee of the Council and the National Development Fund.

The following has been approved by the Council for recommendation to Assembly:

"The 94th General Assembly approved a recommendation of the Administrative Council for the use of accumulating National Development Fund monies (pages 325 and 93). By this action the 94th General Assembly authorized the investment of funds on a short-term basis and the use of the income to support the implementation of stipend increments. The Council hereby reports that this has been done. Details are given in the financial statements.

The Council now brings to this 95th General Assembly a recommendation for the longer-term use of the National Development Fund monies. The Council was cognizant of the publicity used in connection with the National Development Fund and believes that its recommendation is in accord with the spirit of the campaign.

The basic recommendation is that the Fund be divided into two equal parts which, for convenience, have been designated Category A and Category B. These are defined as follows:—

Category A — This portion would be invested (the advisability and degree of investing being reviewed at least every five years) and the annual income therefrom would be devoted to the development and support of the ministry. By development and support of the ministry is meant:

- (i) Supporting the basic stipends of ministers and regularly appointed missionaries and the salaries of deaconesses and catechists.
- (ii) Supporting the Pension Fund.
- (iii) Providing two kinds of bursaries:—
 - general bursaries — for refresher courses
 - special bursaries of a more significant amount for approved advanced courses of studies.

Category B — This portion would be used for projects that lend themselves to outright grants from the Fund, under the following subheadings:—

- (i) Special Ministries
 - institutional chaplains, inner city work, industrial chaplains, high-rise apartment work, work amongst immigrants, evangelism, camps.
- (ii) Research and Development
 - the whole field of communications (radio, TV, films), theological education, Christian education, and other areas of research which may emerge from the studies being done at present by the Life and Missions Project and the Management Consultants.
- (iii) Institutions in Canada
 - Home Missions and Colleges, Kenora Fellowship House, Saskatoon Residence, rehabilitation homes.
- (iv) Institutions Overseas
 - grants to hospitals and training centres.

- (v) Assistance to congregations for capital requirements through low-interest loans, — through grants.

The Council proposes to allocate the first \$500,000 of net receipts to Category A, the next \$500,000 to Category B and thereafter in equal parts to each Category. Until such time as expenditures of Category B funds are required, the earnings therefrom will be used to help support the increases in the stipend increment.

The allocation of amounts within Categories A (income only) and B will be a continuing responsibility of the Administrative Council. In the determination of projects within Category B the Council will ensure that an equitable portion of the funds is allocated under each of the subheadings listed.

Since the increasing of ministers' stipends is generally considered of the highest priority it is interesting to note the progress that has been made in this direction since the middle of 1966 when the National Development Fund was being organized. At that time the minimum stipend, including travelling allowance, was \$4,100. Now the minimum stipend is \$4,800, including travelling allowance. With the introduction as of April 1, 1969, of the full incremental schedule approved by General Assembly in June 1967 the minimum, including travelling allowance, rises for each year of service until, after nine years, it is \$6,200.

The full cost of the last increase cannot be known for some time but the cost to the General Assembly Budget of all the increases introduced from July 1, 1966 to April 1, 1969 will approximate \$200,000 per annum."

K. Re: Stipend Increments.

The 93rd General Assembly approved a scale of stipend increments and provided that "these increments be implemented in stages as the Administrative Council finds the necessary funds available." When fully implemented, individuals with nine or more years of service would receive increments of \$1,400 over the minimum basic stipend.

On April 1st, 1968, the Council made effective the first stage in the introduction of these increments whereby individuals with nine or more years of service received increments of \$800 with others with shorter service receiving less in accordance with the scale approved by the General Assembly.

The Council now reports to the General Assembly that the second and final step was made effective on April 1st, 1969. With this step the table of annual income to be received by all who are on the basic stipend schedule is as follows:—

The 93rd General Assembly (A & P, page 77) also requested the Administrative Council to "study further the matter of increments and report to the 1968 General Assembly". Last year the Council requested an additional year "in which to study this matter so that the results of the partial introduction of the approved increments may be observed and assessed". The Council has studied this matter and reports to the General Assembly that it is in agreement with an incremental schedule and recommends

(1) That this policy be continued by the Church.

The Council further recommends

(2) That the present schedule of increments which provides \$200 at the end of each of the first five years of service and \$100 at the end of each of the four succeeding years be replaced by a schedule to provide \$200 at the end of each of the first ten years of service and a further \$500 at the end of the fifteenth year of service and a further \$500 at the end of the twentieth year of service. This would make total increments after twenty years of service \$3,000 and would bring the total minimum stipend for that length of service to \$7,300 plus \$500 for travel allowance plus manse. In making this recommendation to the General Assembly the Council requests the authority of the Assembly to introduce the additional increments as funds become available.

The Council also supports the recommendation of the General Board of Missions that the minimum stipend be increased from \$4,300 to \$4,600 per annum but recommends

(3) That the General Assembly also authorize the Council to introduce this as funds become available. The General Board of Missions is recommending that it be made effective on January 1st, 1970, but no provision has been made in the 1970 budget for this increase.

L. 1969 and 1970 Expenditures.

The Council presents the attached statement of estimated income and recommended authorized expenditures for the years 1969 and 1970. 1969 expenditures are adjusted figures from the expenditures authorized by the 94th General Assembly.

To this statement must be appended the following notes:

(a) For Overseas Missions for both 1969 and 1970 authorized expenditures may be increased as follows:—

(i) Up to \$10,000 each year for automobiles and heavy furniture for our 1968 Overseas fields as may be found necessary.

(ii) Up to \$45,000 in 1969 and \$50,000 in 1970 for the cost of new appointments to our 1968 Overseas fields to the extent that these costs exceed any unused portion of the amount provided for appointments, furloughs and replacements in the respective years.

(b) For the Presbyterian College for 1970 an amount up to \$15,000 may be added to authorized expenditures should it not be possible for the College to make satisfactory financial arrangements with McGill University.

It will be seen that the expenditures for 1969 are authorized at \$2,427,147 as against estimated income of \$2,343,000, a possible deficit of \$84,147 which, with the allowance for contingent Overseas expenses of \$55,000 amounts to \$139,147.

For 1970 expenditures are recommended at \$2,493,344 against estimated income of \$2,378,000 indicating a possible deficit of \$115,344. To this must be added contingencies for Overseas (\$60,000), Presbyterian College (\$15,000) and General Assembly in Halifax (\$22,500) which brings the total to \$212,844.

In preparing this budget the Council has assumed:—

(a) That \$45,000 will be available from the earnings of the Maclean Estate for the year 1970.

(b) That its recommendations regarding the use of the National Development Fund monies will be approved by the General Assembly.

(c) That L.A.M.P. would not be continued beyond June 30th, 1969. The 94th General Assembly instructed and authorized "its several Boards and Committees to make adjustments in 1968 and 1969 budgets so as to provide funds necessary for the work of this Committee." This was done for 1968 and for 1969 up to June 30th.

THE BOARD OF STEWARDSHIP AND BUDGET

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

The 1968 Budget total was \$2,018,182. Although this was a small decrease (\$17,000 — .8%) from the previous year, it is encouraging to know that the two million dollar level was maintained in the same year that nearly half a million dollars were contributed toward the National Development Fund objective, and the special appeal for the relief in Nigeria/Biafra received a \$141,000 response. Thus 1968 was by far the best year in dollar giving in our church.

In late December, it was feared that the special appeals were succeeding at the expense of the Budget. A study of congregational remittances revealed however that there was no basis in fact for such suspicion. At least there was no discernable pattern of decrease being explainable by corresponding amounts donated to special appeals. In general it is apparent that it was the generous who were generous.

Over \$103,000 of the 1968 Budget total was received after the Treasurer's books were closed for accounting purposes on January 15th, 1969. It is planned to work through Presbytery Conveners to encourage more promptness with final remittances. As it turned out the Treasurer is able to report a balanced budget, but we believe the "delayed" figure is unnecessarily high.

Although Authorized Expenditures for 1970 are probably going to be over \$2,400,000, the Board is recommending no change in the Budget Objective from the present \$2,500,000 because the giving level is so far below the objective, and also because it was agreed that extra demands on the church should be kept to a minimum during the National Development Fund campaign. However it is plain to anyone that an increase in the objective and corresponding adjustment in the Allocation Scale will have to be considered next year.

Analysis of Giving by Presbyteries

The accompanying chart shows dollar totals and per member rates for (1) The Budget and (2) All Purposes. It also shows totals for Inter-Church Aid, Refugee and World Service, National Development Fund and the Women's Missionary Society.

- 18 Presbyteries increased Budget giving by \$21,117.
- 27 Presbyteries decreased Budget giving by \$68,443.
5 of the latter also reported decreases in 1967.
- The per member rate for the whole church for Budget giving increased to \$10.37 (20c. per week) from the 1967 rate of \$10.28. This increase is due to the decrease in total membership. The per member rate for All Purposes increased to \$83.71 from \$79.26, one-third of this increase being due to the lower membership figure.
- 17 Presbyteries were above the average per member rate for both the Budget and for All Purposes. 4 were above for the Budget but below for All Purposes. 9 were below for the Budget but above for All Purposes. 15 were below for both.
- To reach the Budget Objective the per member rate will have to go up to \$13.00 (25c per week). Only one Presbytery (East Toronto) is up to that level. Winnipeg and Northern Saskatchewan are within sight of it.
- The Presbytery of Newfoundland had the highest per member rate for All Purposes (\$148.17). Stratford-Huron had the lowest (\$58.89).
- The 1968 Budget Givings were 80.7% of the Objective approved by the 93rd Assembly, and 93% of the reported Accepted Allocations.

Performance and Potential

The fact that our statistics for church membership, and for financial support have flattened out, in common with those of most denominations in North America, is a challenge to our leadership, especially at the congregational level, to rouse ourselves from our easy acquiescence with things as they are, and get into active service. It used to be that consensus was more or less with the church. Today it is non-church or anti-church. Our message is called "good news" but it doesn't come across as such in a day when the chimera of affluence, and the debunking of values by a pseudo-science, have combined to produce a state of mind that is deaf to news about spiritual reality. Nevertheless there are cries for help and direction and meaning which we must try to answer or we unchurch ourselves. If, as someone has said "life becomes more meaningful the more difficult it gets", then we are living in a day of opportunity. For never has it been more difficult or more necessary for each person to see life as an assignment, and to know himself responsible to the Assigner. When we can enlist church members in this basic work, the statistics will improve. If however we merely try to improve the statistics they will decline.

Confrontation

For over twenty years our Board has emphasized the importance of the Every Person Visitation, not only for its value in securing renewal of the promise of church

support, but for the by-products of leadership training, small group discussion and planning, education in the varied program of the church locally and beyond, and outreach to fringe persons. Although only about 15% of the congregations order materials for the recommended program in any one year, it is not always the same congregations which order each year. Many congregations now develop their own program and prepare their own materials. The Board would remind all such that whatever program is used there are five basic steps which should be taken in order:

- (a) Recognition of need — not by Session and Board but by the general membership.
- (b) Proposal to meet the need — developed with the help of the members, not imposed by the office bearers.
- (c) Organize and train to implement the proposal — Set time table, attend to publicity.
- (d) Carry out the plan to secure commitments.
- (e) Evaluate the effort and provide for follow-up.

Partnership Program

The above steps are in the Partnership Program for which the seventh set of theme materials has been prepared for use in 1969-70. The theme is "Faith in Action". An Audio-Visual training kit of three filmstrips is available to guide congregational committees in the use of these materials. It is possible that this may be the last year for the Partnership Program as such, because the Canadian Council of Churches Stewardship Committee, in response to many requests for "some new things" is engaged in developing a new program for the '70s.

Monthly Reporting System

Used in 1968 by a small number of congregations, all of whom reported good results, this plan, which replaces the quarterly system of reporting givings to members, offers an excellent device for follow-up on commitments. Properly used, i.e. with reports of work being done, it keeps all members informed. It also is a method for alerting the elder to possible problem situations in his district. The Board is prepared to send detailed information about this plan to interested congregations.

Wills and Bequests

The gap between annual contributions from living donors and annual expenditures is largely bridged by the income from bequests by those who have remembered the church in their wills. Whether or not their work results in bequests to the church or one of its agencies, church leaders do a useful service by stressing the importance of everyone having a properly drawn will. Pamphlets and audio-visual materials to aid in discussing this subject are available from the Board.

Information Materials

Samples of weekly bulletins and pamphlets produced by our Board, as well as materials for other Boards are mailed each month to all congregations. In this we endeavour to keep the church informed about what's going on. About 65,000 bulletins are ordered each week. We encourage congregations which print their own bulletins to select occasional numbers from our samples, or to copy pertinent information for them. Approximately 198,700 stewardship pamphlets were distributed in 1968. Copies of a new book on motivation for giving entitled "Why People Give" were distributed to ministers and others on our mailing list.

At the annual meeting the members of the Board received with mixed feelings the news that our office secretary Miss Wilma Welsh, is leaving to take a position under the W.M.S. (W.D.) with the Presbyterian Church in Formosa for three years. Miss Welsh has been a most efficient worker, and the Board's good wishes go with her in her new assignment.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That the Assembly approve a Budget Objective for congregational giving of \$2,500,000 for 1970.
2. That the Board of Stewardship and Budget be authorized to prepare allocations to Synods on the basis of the approved 1970 objective and that the data used to compute Synod Allocations be supplied to Presbyteries for guidance in making allocations to the congregations.
3. That Synods and Presbyteries be strongly urged to allocate the total amount of their respective allocations, making adjustments up or down in the light of local circumstances, so that the challenge of the Assembly objective may be presented in full to the congregations.
4. That Sessions be instructed by Presbyteries to see that the Assembly Budget Allocation received from the Presbytery be included in the study of the congregational budget for 1970.
5. That Presbyteries encourage congregations to set their own Budget Objectives at a figure that calls for an increase over the previous year's givings, even if this is above the Presbytery allocation; and that congregations which have not yet been able to achieve the Suggested Allocation level be challenged to aim for at least a 10% increase; and that Presbyteries request supporting evidence in cases where congregations ask approval of an allocation lower than the previous year's givings.
6. That Sessions be urged to make use of the weekly bulletins, and other materials sampled monthly from the Board of Stewardship and Budget, to inform the congregations about the larger work of the church.
7. That Sessions be urged to see that every member is given the opportunity to review his financial commitment to the work of the Church.
8. That the Partnership program materials on the theme "Faith in Action" be approved and recommended for use in Every Person Visitations for stewardship education, and for securing support for the Assembly Budget, and the National Development Fund, as well as for all congregational purposes.
9. That Sessions and Boards of Managers be asked to study the Monthly Reporting System as a means of informing the members not only about their performance in relation to their promises, but also about how their gifts are being put to work in the church program.
10. That Presbyteries be asked to consider either a systematic Presbytery visitation, or a pulpit exchange Sunday with an informal meeting after the regular service, for the purpose of presenting and discussing the general work of the church at Presbytery, Synod and Assembly levels; and that the matter of prompt and entire remittance of Budget money be stressed.
11. That Sessions be requested to consider making use of materials available from the Board of Stewardship and Budget for "Money Management", and for setting up a Wills and Bequests program.
12. That the thanks of the Assembly be recorded for the faithful work of ministers, congregational leaders and presbytery conveners, by whose diligence our Church has maintained its Budget level above the two million dollar mark while raising nearly half a million for the National Development Fund, and making a generous response to the special appeal of Inter-Church Aid, Refugee and World Service, for relief in Nigeria/Biafra; and that the Assembly express thanks to the Stewardship Committee of the Canadian Council of Churches for the help given in preparing program materials.

THE JARDINE MEMORIAL FUND

THE RETIREMENT FUND FOR CHURCH EMPLOYEES

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

The Retirement Fund for Church Employees is a "contributory fund" to which the employing body in the Church and the employee contribute equally. It is not for ministers, who have the Pension Fund for their membership. At present, the employing body and the employee each contribute 5% of the salary paid to the employee. This Fund was integrated with the Canada Pension Plan on January 1st, 1966, and has been approved by the Department of National Revenue, Taxation Division. Contributors may deduct the sum of their annual contributions from their salaries before calculating their income tax. Out of the 5% "on each side" the Canada Pension Fund assessment is paid. The remainder, "on each side", is held at interest for the purchase of an annuity.

Employees withdrawing from the service of the Church may have their "remainder" returned with interest, less income tax reduction (as calculated by the Income Tax authorities) inasmuch as this was exempted earlier. Employees withdrawing receive only their share of the remainder of the 5%, not the share of the employing body.

On retiring from the service of the Church, employees may elect the form of annuity which they desire to receive, the annuity being purchased by the total of their "remainder" added to the total of the "remainder" of the employing body, plus interest on both totals.

Congregations are urged to consider the possibilities of this Fund for their employees.

A financial statement of the Fund will be found in the Auditors' Reports.

THE AUDIO-VISUAL COMMITTEE

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

Your Audio-Visual Committee has been encouraged by the growing interest in and the effective use of our library materials. In this past year more materials were used by more people to reach larger audiences than ever before. The comments returned indicate that Audio-Visual materials have played an important role in imparting information, stirring interest, provoking discussions, and in training teachers and leaders. In at least one case a group initiated a new outreach project as a result of the use of a filmstrip.

Films and filmstrips age and become obsolete. We wish it were possible for our department to update large areas of the library materials. Under our present setup new materials are added only as boards and committees recommend and are able to purchase the materials they feel are necessary. By stretching our budget we are able to replace some of the older but still useful items. Some of the new films added recently are "It's About This Carpenter," "If the Salt Has Lost Its Savour," "A Happening in Education," "Report on Drought." New filmstrips include "Getting the Most Out of Your Bible," "Learning to Teach," a kit "The Covenant God and His Covenant People." Those wishing A-V material are not limited to what is found in our catalogue, our staff are prepared to find any films or filmstrips required. Our

Librarian-Counsellor has a wide knowledge of existing materials and is glad to be of assistance.

The interest in the use of materials on tape has continued and increased. The staff has been called on to edit conference messages, public addresses and other materials to make them useful as study material and as starters for group discussions.

Because of the growing interest in the effective use of Audio-Visuals our concern is being centred on providing training opportunities for those who are or should be using these tools for communication. Last year we held an experimental workshop in cooperation with the other major denominations. Out of this experience we are hoping to plan other regional workshops. However there are other training situations and workshops that are available in local areas from time to time. We would encourage ministers, leaders, teachers to take advantage of every opportunity to further their knowledge and experience in this important, modern, method of communicating.

We are making no formal recommendations but do urge all our congregations to take advantage of our services. A well prepared, imaginative use of Audio-Visual materials can make any presentation really come alive.

REPORT OF THE PENSION BOARD

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

During the past year, two meetings of the Pension Board have been held — in November, 1968 and March, 1969. In our report last year, we reported that the Actuary was recalculating the Ministers' rates and Widows' and Orphans' rates to provide benefits at age 68 rather than at age 70 to be used for new entrants. These rates have been approved by the Board and are now in use and, as suggested last year, those wishing to purchase additional pension may do so at the rates for their attained age without the 10% additional as in the past.

There have been many suggestions that, as in other denominations, the Ministers should pay more for their pension. The Board has resisted that suggestion because there are too many who are on the minimum stipend who have been unable to pay all of their rates and it would be unfair to ask more from them. This does not restrict those with higher stipends from providing additional pensions for themselves through the payment of additional rates or any other method of their choice.

Again, there have been many requests and overtures suggesting a further lowering of the pension age and increase in the pensions but this cannot be done until the funds are available in the assets of the Pension Fund. Your Board have requested that the Pension Fund should be considered along with the provision of funds for increased stipends for Ministers when determining the application of funds from the National Development Fund.

The Comity Agreement with the Church of Scotland was completed during 1968 and is now in force. This should be of assistance to any Ministers transferring from the Church of Scotland to The Presbyterian Church in Canada in the future.

The Board agreed that a recommendation be made to the General Assembly with regard to years of service for those serving as Assistant to the Minister.

The Financial Statement, included with the Auditors' Report, for the 12 months of 1968 shows an excess of Revenue over Expenditure of \$162,494.00. The amount of \$372,370.00 for annuities purchased represents the increased cost to implement the improvements in Pension Fund benefits authorized by the 93rd General Assembly.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That this Assembly approve an amendment to the Regulations of the Pension Fund as follows: An ordained minister of The Presbyterian Church in Canada who is serving in a congregation of The Presbyterian Church in Canada as an Assistant to the Minister though not inducted into that congregation shall have his years of service as such counted as years of service with respect to the Pension Fund.
2. That Presbyteries review the position within their Presbytery of Ministers who have not joined the Fund.
3. That our participation in the Church Pension Conference be continued.
4. That the Pension Board be empowered to continue to solicit gifts and bequests to increase the assets of the Pension Fund and for additional funds for the Pension Assistance Fund.
5. That an amount of \$25,000.00 be appropriated to cover this year's expenses of the Pension Board, including postage, printing, salary of the Clerk-Stenographer in the Church Office, and administration fees in the Segregated Fund in the hands of The Canada Life Assurance Company from January 1st, 1969 to December 31st, 1969.
6. That the continuing members of the Executive of the Board after the appointment of the General Assembly constitute the Executive until the Fall meeting of the Board.
7. That this General Assembly express most grateful appreciation and sincere thanks to Professor Norris E. Sheppard, M.A., F.I.A., F.C.I.A., our Actuary, who continues to render such dedicated, voluntary professional service to our Pension Board and our Church.

THE COMMITTEE ON INTER-CHURCH RELATIONS

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

Your committee is responsible for correspondence and relationships with other churches and with the inter-church bodies in which The Presbyterian Church in Canada has membership. It arranges for fraternal delegates to this court, and when invitations are received it appoints delegates to the assemblies and councils of other communions.

It now has authority from the Administrative Council to undertake co-ordination of grants from all boards and committees to all inter-church bodies such as the Canadian Council of Churches.

The World Council of Churches

We were officially represented at the fourth assembly of the World Council of Churches in Uppsala, Sweden, July 4-20, 1968, by Rev. Dr. L. H. Fowler, secretary of the Administrative Council, and the Rev. George H. Young of Sarnia, Ont. Mr. James Mackie, a Presbyterian, was one of the youth delegates.

These three have reported through the pages of *The Presbyterian Record*, and the two official delegates have since circulated a letter to ministers for the information of kirk sessions and others in the church. It was accompanied by a statement on ecumenism by President Emeritus John A. Mackay of Princeton Theological Seminary.

The Alliance of Reformed Churches

The Alliance of Reformed Churches, formerly known as The World Presbyterian Alliance, is now being merged with The International Congregational Council, an action that was approved by the last General Assembly.

The next world meeting, the general council of the Alliance, is to be held in Nairobi, Kenya, August 20-30, 1970. We are entitled to eight delegates. Your committee is recommending that two be sent from Canada and if possible that two Canadians be sent from Nigeria, with expenses paid. We have invited each division of the Women's Missionary Society to send a delegate. It is probable that two or three others may be found to represent us at no cost to the church.

Because of the world meeting the North American Area Council does not meet in 1970, we have invited a representative of that body to bring greetings to this General Assembly.

Rev. Dr. Ross K. Cameron of Toronto is now vice-chairman of the North American Area Council, on which fourteen church bodies in North America and the Caribbean are represented.

He reports that the Presbyterian Church of Guyana (formerly Church of Scotland) has been received into membership in the Area Council. A message was sent from the Area Council last January to Cuba expressing the Alliance's concern and desire to maintain fellowship with Presbyterians there.

The much appreciated voluntary services of President James McCord of Princeton Theological Seminary as secretary of the Area Council will be lost with his resignation in 1970. Plans are being considered for opening a permanent office with a full-time secretary for the North American Area. This will mean increased assessments to the member churches. Nominations for the position of area secretary will be made to the general council in 1970.

This year marks the completion of twenty years as general secretary of the World Presbyterian Alliance for Rev. Dr. Marcel Pradervand, who from his office in Geneva, Switzerland, and in his travels throughout the world has done a magnificent job.

The Canadian Council of Churches

Our church was well represented at the central committee meeting of the Canadian Council of Churches last November. The triennial assembly of the Council

will be held in Montreal, November 24-28, 1969. The issues for study will be: 1. The French/English situation. 2. Poverty in Canada. 3. World Development. 4. The Future of the Faith.

Observer-Consultants

We did not send a representative to the Consultation on Church Union this year. At the meetings of the General Commission on Union (Anglican and United Churches in Canada) we have been represented when possible by two of the three observer-consultants named by the 1967 General Assembly.

An invitation to participate actively in the discussions on union in Canada has been received from the General Commission on Church Union. However this has been declined by your committee because the 1967 General Assembly decided "that we confer in Christian charity with our brethren of other churches, but take no action which would commit our church to organic union without the consent of the Assembly".

RECOMMENDATION

That the Committee on Inter-Church Relations be authorized to appoint our quota of delegates to the 1970 General Council of the Alliance of Reformed Churches, at a cost not to exceed \$3,500.

THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH BUILDING CORPORATION

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

The Presbyterian Church Building Corporation respectfully submits its first report.

The 90th (1964) General Assembly received an Overture from the Synod of Alberta requesting that the General Assembly take such steps as are necessary to establish a National Corporation of The Presbyterian Church in Canada. The overture was referred to the Assembly's Committee on Synod Corporations for study and report. The Committee prepared a memorandum outlining the function and organization of a National Corporation. The memorandum was circulated among all Presbyteries, Synods, and Presbytery and Synod Corporations and gained their overwhelming approval. The Committee further studied the proposal taking into consideration the suggestions presented by many of the above bodies. It obtained the advice of the legal firm of Cassels, Brock. In 1967 the Committee recommended to the 93rd General Assembly that a National Corporation be organized and that the existing Synod and Presbytery Corporations be wound up after transferring their assets and liabilities to the National Corporation, and submitted the opinion of Mr. Hamilton Cassels, Q.C., Sr. supporting the recommendation. Consequently, the Committee was instructed by the Assembly to proceed. After further intensive study and extensive consultation, an application for Letters Patent was submitted to the Government of Canada in April of 1968. The Letters Patent were granted on May 4, 1968 and recorded on July 3, 1968. The name of the company is "THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH BUILDING CORPORATION". The charter and by-laws are printed in full on pages 586 to 596 of the Acts and Proceedings of the 94th General Assembly.

While the Corporation is organized, it is not yet in operation because the assets and liabilities of the existing Synod and Presbytery Corporations have not been transferred to it. The solicitors of the National Corporation and the existing Synod and Presbytery Corporations are consulting in respect to this matter and while there are no insuperable problems, it will take time to solve them. The Board of Directors of the National Corporation has been elected, and the Executive and Officers have

been appointed. It is anticipated that this new Corporation will be in operation by the end of the year.

With the exception of the Presbyterian Extension Fund (B.C.) Limited all of the existing Corporations have agreed to merge with The Presbyterian Church Building Corporation.

It is now necessary to elect or re-elect four directors for the ensuing four years. The by-laws of the Corporation provide for the election of these directors upon the recommendation of the Corporation.

RECOMMENDATION

That the following persons be re-elected to the Board of Directors of The Presbyterian Church Building Corporation for the next four years: Mr. D. M. Walker, Vancouver; Mr. G. O. Huggan, Toronto; Dr. H. A. Doig, Toronto and Dr. G. D. Johnston, Brantford.

PREFACE

The Life and Missions Projects committee respectfully submits to the 95th General Assembly, and to the church at large, the report of its work and findings during the year of its appointment. Finally, a word of commendation is in order for the LAMP secretary, Miss Gloria Hipson, whose competence has done much to relieve the members of the working staff of undue absorption in the routine duties of office and paper work.

It remains only for me to express my own genuine appreciation to the members of the committee, consultants, and staff group for their generous support and unswerving loyalty in our common effort to help the Church restate for our day her goals and objectives in the service of her Lord.

INTRODUCTION

Terms of Reference

That this Assembly appoint a special committee to undertake a thorough study of the vocation, work and mission of the Presbyterian Church in Canada and in the changing life of Canada and other nations, and a study of the resources of the Presbyterian Church in Canada in persons, finances and institutions, and report its precise terms of reference to the next Assembly, and its recommendations to the General Assembly of 1967.

General Assembly 1965; A. & P. p. 124

- I That General Assembly ask the special committee to continue to serve for another year, and authorize it:
 - (a) to co-opt additional members so as to have at least two members from each of the three central synods, and one from each of the others.
 - (b) to carry forward the work of the committee in ways which will involve the whole church as widely as possible, by such means as synodical or regional working consultations, widely distributed study papers, action projects, etc. Particular attention should be paid to paragraphs 3, 4, 5 of the section of the report entitled, "The Changing Life of Canada" page 315.
 - (c) to bring to the 1969 General Assembly a full report with recommendations for action.
 - (d) to seek a staff group of three, to be made available from the present personnel of the General Assembly Boards.
- II That General Assembly instruct and authorize the several Boards and Committees of Assembly to make adjustments in their 1968-69 budgets so as to provide the funds necessary for this committee.

Modus Operandi

The report that follows — its proposals and recommendations — are the result of nearly eight months of exposure to congresses, conferences, consultations, conversations, correspondence, briefs, overtures, reports and interviews in accordance with the revised terms of reference quoted above. The volume of the "in-put" to the committee has accordingly been considerable — and varied. To facilitate the orderly arrangement of the material the committee was divided into six task groups as follows: (1) Report Production, (2) Canadian Presbyterians Today, (3) Ministry, (4) Mission, (5) Congregational Life, (6) General Assembly, its Boards and Committees; Presbytery and Synod. Each in its own area, the task groups set about identifying issues and establishing priorities among them, discussing optional solutions appropriate to each, formulating recommendations, and indicating the board, court, or agency to which each might properly be referred for action.

It soon became apparent that some of the key problems arising from the material in hand are "short term" issues, requiring perhaps only the adoption by General Assembly of suitable recommendations; while others are "long range" concerns, involving a good deal more study and research than the committee has been able to give them before action can be taken. For this and other reasons some commissioners may be disappointed in the report, believing that the committee has been "too timid", or feeling that in some important respects the committee has failed to "follow through". The committee would hope for a more charitable verdict on its labours. The work originally assigned to the special committee Re Recommendation #10 (1965), and more recently to LAMP involves a *process*, not a series of decrees; and we modestly believe that LAMP has pointed the way to a beginning, not an end, in the reform and renewal of the church. Accordingly, it is imperative that provision be made for continuity of leadership in the major complex issues facing the church in the years which lie immediately ahead.

Perhaps the key word to express the mood of the church, arising out of the material made available to LAMP, is 'participation': the recognition at all levels of church life of the need for it, and the readiness of our people to engage in it. The earnest desire of our people for increased opportunity for vital participation in the life of the church is the most encouraging single discovery to emerge from the year's work.

Insofar as our present structures have tended to limit participation, or have appeared to do so, they must be amended or replaced if the faith and hope of Presbyterians are to be given their fullest expression in the life of our nation.

SECTION I

GENERAL ISSUES

Foreword

The issues discussed in this report are the ones that Presbyterians have most frequently talked about in interviews and conferences during the past year. Those that are discussed in Section I are, in the main, broad in scope in contrast with the sharply focussed ones in the section that follows. To a large extent the issues in this section reflect general attitudes, feelings and convictions held by our people. This is not the kind of material that lends itself readily to firm recommendations and decisions by General Assembly. For this reason we confine ourselves to a single recommendation that the material be commended to the Church for study.

Why these issues are discussed

In spite of the fact that these issues and the proposals accompanying them are of a very general kind there are several reasons why they are offered.

(1) It is part of our task as a committee to report to the church the things that our people are saying.

(2) It is necessary to draw attention to the points of tensions and conflict among us as well as our points of agreement, so that we can deal with them in creative ways.

(3) The proposals (under the heading "What is Required") leave a great deal to local initiative: to individuals, congregations, church courts. This is as it should be. In our quest for renewal everything depends on what God's Spirit calls each of us to do. The way these proposals are developed will depend on the situation as it exists where we live — and on our commitment to Christ.

THE TIME WE LIVE IN

The prophets of the Old Testament and the apostles of the New Testament were skilled at discerning the signs of the times. Many of those who read the signs of our time find themselves torn between hope and despair, anticipation and apprehension. The technology that has released us from the drudgeries and the diseases of the past and built the breathtaking cities of the present threatens our individual sense of initiative and accomplishment just as the mighty cities bewilder their newest citizens who cannot cope with their insecurity, hurry and faceless crowds.

This is a time of heavy traffic of all kinds. People and ideas are moving over the highways and airways, the printed page and the channels. Presbyterians live in this mobile world like wandering pilgrims. But the vast experience and first-hand knowledge which fascinate and broaden them threaten their sense of identity and security.

Our children amaze us with the things they learn and experience even in their tender years. We glimpse a vast potential in their lives to achieve and see things that are beyond us to imagine. But they perplex us in the way they learn: not in a logical sequence of propositions and proofs but by experience, by total involvement, by sights and sounds more than by the printed page.

These forces of our time have had a massive effect on Presbyterians and on our neighbours throughout the world among whom we live and witness, and they have set many trends in motion.

One is the trend that turns people into things. The warmth of personal relationships, the sense of personal meaning and purpose, the voice crying in the wilderness, all tend to be submerged in the big city, the big corporation and even the big church.

This has set off a counter trend: a resurgence of the emphasis upon man, and this is to be found within Christian churches as well as in the non-Christian culture. This emphasis was exemplified in the theme of Expo '67 in our country: Man and His World. Man is being celebrated, and his emotions, his needs, his society provide the themes for literature and the arts.

There is the trend to rebellion and sometimes to annihilation. The rebellion is directed against virtually all the traditions and structures of the past. Participating in it are those who are indignant with the double standards, the hypocrisy, the heartlessness and lack of purpose of established institutions. Participating also are those bent on the destruction of anything that happens to be in the way.

There is the trend toward what some people call the "apocalyptic." Literally meaning "revelation" or "unveiling", the word is associated with judgment, doom, the complete overturning of the old order and the establishment of the new. Both theologians and secular writers have taken to using it to convey a sense of a disordered, unprogrammed and tumultuous end of the era which they see portended in the chaos of modern society. The violent powers and energies of man which lie in his technology, his political structures and his teeming billions seem on the verge of ushering in a new age — either of fantastic achievement or satanic destructiveness. Convinced that change has quickened its pace, a restless generation has grown up that is completely out of patience with gradual improvement. They cry for freedom — now! and enjoyment, now! but their mirth often seems strained, hollow and mixed with foreboding.

In the midst of all this there is hope and joy, for Christians know that they, and their fellowmen, and the exciting time they live in are in the hands of the Creator and Redeemer of the world.

What is Required: We must strive to understand the concrete realities of our changing environment, both in its destructive and creative, its disastrous and joyous aspects, and what it is to be Christ's people in this changing context.

THE COUNTRY WE LIVE IN

Frequent reference is made to the "identity" crisis that afflicts our church. It is by no means limited to Presbyterians; according to some people it is a Canadian phenomenon. The late Blair Fraser entitled his book in the Canadian history series *The Search for Identity*. New Brunswick's premier Louis Robichaud was quoted by the *Toronto Globe and Mail*, February 10, 1967, as saying "If Canada should perish, it will mark the first time in history that a nation dies from an overdose of diagnosis. If many commentators are to be believed, the spirit of Canada is neuroticism tied to a death wish. In Canada today we should spend less time taking our own pulse and more time taking hold of our opportunities."

A Presbyterian elder who is a specialist in mental health maintains that we know ourselves by the allegiances we hold. If identity is a problem in the Presbyterian Church, it will largely be solved by our allegiance to Jesus Christ and the hard tasks to which He call us.

Canada's identity crisis may be solved in a similar way: by discovering allegiances and taking up hard tasks. At the present time there is a trend toward regional (or provincial) allegiances and a reaction against federalism. It is not hard to see why this should be so, with a country so vast in geography and small in population. Ours is a country of many regions and its east-west boundary line is in defiance of geography.

There are two identifying marks that set us apart as Canadians. The first lies in the blending and tensions of the two founding peoples: "les deux nations." The question of how these two peoples should relate to each other to the enrichment of both has been raised by the French Canadians during the quiet revolution of this decade, but the goals they seek and the demands they make have simply left most English-speaking Canadians mystified. The identity of all Canada including the Presbyterians in Canada must take into serious account the relationships between these two cultures. Nor can we ignore the presence—and the special needs—of two peoples who were here before the French and English: the Indians and Eskimos, to say nothing of the millions who have come to enrich this land from the other continents of the earth.

The other identifying mark of this land is its great wilderness. There are those that claim that it is the wilderness that has shaped our character and mood more than we are aware. Today it stands as a reservoir of great riches of which we in Canada must be good stewards for an increasingly needy world.

It is impossible, however, to think of Canada without also thinking about the United States. The enormous influence of that country on ours in every area of our lives demands of us that we think seriously about our national goals, and about how we can guard the rights of our people. We have even borrowed many of our causes and issues from the United States. For instance, it is easier to organize a protest march on Viet Nam than on the rights of French Canada.

What is Required: (1) We are Canadians and Presbyterians. But we are also Maritimers or British Columbians, dwellers on the prairies or the cities of central Canada. Our ways of work and witness, the needs of our communities and congregations, even our ways of worship will be conditioned by our environments. This means that the initiatives in our life and mission must come from the grass-roots as well as from church offices. It also means that regional structures are important, because they reflect (or should) the interests and character of the regions where we live.

(2) Individuals, congregations and church courts need to be encouraged to develop their own characteristics in response to their environments.

(3) Our church needs to develop new expressions of its corporate life that will relate to the provincial and regional life of this country.

(4) Canada has been founded by two language groups and today we have two peoples each having a specific culture. Our Presbyterian Church must consider its responsibility towards the French work at a time when the identity between French and Roman Catholic tends to lose its meaning.

We must find ways to witness in a more effective manner in French Canada, especially Quebec. (See Recommendations 18, 19 and 20 under "French Speaking People in Canada".)

THE WORLD WE LIVE IN

We live in a world where one half the total population has moved out of colonialism into post-colonial nationalism in a short span of years. So mission patterns related to the colonial era are being adjusted to fit the movements toward nationalism.

We live in a world where revolution in communication and travel has changed the way people understand themselves and others. So mission focus is moving from mission "from us to them" to mission "on six continents".

We live in a world where there is growing conviction among Christian communions and communities now stretched around this earth that we must demonstrate a common loyalty to our Lord, integrity in His service, and a unified witness to His presence. So the church wrestles with the issues of ecumenism and the new divisions each significant step in this direction produces.

We live in a world where men and women are ravaged by wars they cannot understand or control, and which threaten to become a vortex into which many others are sucked. The news is so bad that many Christians dismiss the possibility of their having any good word, or any leverage for this kind of world.

We live in a world where millions of dollars are spent on ABM's and far less on international development. Yet outside of government and official programs there is a growing tide of volunteers for development tasks at home and abroad. Christian volunteers are taking part in new programs: Sometimes they succeed; sometimes they fail. But the volunteers have tried.

We live in a world to which God calls us to share in the hope, dignity, healing, and peace that He has willed for all his children. So the church cannot rest on patterns of overseas missions that were established in response to the conditions of 30 or 40 years ago.

What is Required: New eyes that see the world as a place where God is at work in and through all that is happening.

New heart to feel with our brethren around the world who also reach for something more than war, poverty, and meaningless living.

New courage to work with God and our brethren in the building of the world of the present and the future.

AFFLUENCE AND POVERTY

Canada is one of the privileged "have" countries of the world, yet as everywhere, poverty is a problem in our midst. Affluence, however, may be the subtler problem as the New Testament reminds us. Such intangibles as compassion, faith, responsibility, sense of purpose, courage and joy have a poverty and affluence scale of their own.

There is a certain tendency to feel guilty about being either rich or poor; both conditions suggest something sinister. If we are affluent (and most of us are in comparison with the majority of people in other areas of the world) there ought to be reason for being thankful instead of apologetic. The proper use of wealth and

resources is a matter that few Christians have considered carefully enough, nor understood that the possession of them opens up many options and choices for a satisfying and useful life.

In any case, the church needs to rid itself of the notion that the poor are poor simply because they are shiftless and irresponsible. It needs to understand their plight, to work to remove the conditions that perpetuate their condition, and to free them for more purposeful and productive living.

What is Required: That congregations, congresses, presbyteries and other groups utilize the materials from the Montreal Conference on Church and Society, May 1968, (See Reports of Administrative Council and Board of Evangelism and Social Action), and make use of the people in their membership and in their communities who have the resources for coming to grips with the problems of affluence and of poverty in our society.

Furthermore, we need to take a share in the responsibility for digging out the roots of poverty throughout the world, and find effective ways to ally ourselves with governments and agencies that struggle against illiteracy, disease and maldistribution of resources in the world.

PRESBYTERIANS AND CHANGE

"Renewal" is a word frequently used by Presbyterians these days. It is a word that expresses the need our people feel for change in our worship, in our style of life, our government and our involvement in society. Our people differ among themselves on what they mean by renewal. Some think that a few necessary and urgent changes could be made that would immediately set things right. Others feel that nothing short of a shattering, profound revolution is necessary in order for renewal to take place in the life of our church. Still others recognize the indebtedness we have to our tradition and our heritage. They believe that a mature faith is one that is obedient to scripture and shares joyfully in the communion of saints.

The dominant characteristics of people and institutions usually constitute the best and worst sides of their personalities. The Presbyterian Church is looked upon as stable, sensible, taking the long view, and not carried about by every wind of doctrine. But are our shoes nailed to the floor?

Our heritage is one of renewal and reform — and these involve repentance. Only an infallible church cannot repent, and we are not an infallible church.

The yearning for renewal that is so widespread in our church is largely the result of a sickness in the hearts of many of our people which is closely akin to a sickness in all society. This sickness is characterized by a sense of emptiness in human life, and the notion that it is without meaning and purpose. Among church members the sickness is deepened by the fact that they feel that the Christian faith ought to supply a sense of fullness and meaning. Where these are absent a crisis of faith often occurs and doubts arise about the validity of the gospel.

What is Required: Christians need help to understand that renewal occurs in response to challenge; that the renewal of our faith is tied to our ministry to the real needs of men, and that the prerequisites of renewal include worship, prayer and fellowship.

OUR RELATIONSHIPS WITH OTHER CHRISTIANS

We Presbyterians have for many years been interested in "our distinctive witness," although in recent years this has been very difficult for us to define. We have been very concerned lest our relationships with other Christians water down or compromise this distinctive witness, and for this reason we have been highly resistant to any talk of church union.

Meanwhile, relationships between Presbyterians and members of sister communions have gone on briskly. There has been a good deal of cooperation between neighbouring congregations and clergy of different persuasions. Presbyterian office workers rub shoulders with Anglican or Roman Catholic office workers and discover

that it is only on rare occasions that their Presbyterianism makes them distinctive. Families moving to a new neighbourhood are less likely to choose their church home on the basis of denominational loyalty than for reasons of convenience and meaningful personal relationships. Fellowship is established across denominational lines between Christians who live or work close to one another, and frequently this takes place on the initiative of Roman Catholics whose thirst for fellowship and meaningful faith is a phenomenon of our time.

Circumstances will not allow us to stay aloof from these responsibilities, nor should we attempt to do so. We have a vital contribution to make to these encounters arising from our reformed faith, and other Christians have a great deal to contribute to us.

What is Required: Presbyterians and Congregations should be encouraged to engage in more action-oriented study of our relationship with other churches with a view to initiating local cooperative action in mission.

THE RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN CHURCH AND SOCIETY

During the year of LAMP, there has been a great deal of debate about the relationship between church and society. The debate goes on principally among people who are theologically trained, as they reflect the great theological ferment that is going on throughout the world.

But the discussion is not limited to theologians. Elders and church members are wrestling with the issue. Frequently they ask: "What are the appropriate concerns and activities of the church? Are human rights, economic and social justice, political issues, properly the concern of the church?" Some who believe that the individual Christian should be concerned about these matters and strive for solutions reject the notion that a congregation or a church court should take action or make pronouncements upon these issues.

The basic issue is two-fold: the need for a Christian understanding of the world and of the church.

In the first place, how are we to understand the world? The Bible uses "world" in at least two ways. On one hand, the Bible says, "God so loved the world . . ." The world is God's creation and the place where He is at work. On the other hand, the world of human society is regarded as fallen, corrupted, illusory, holding men in the grip of evil and death. At the present time our people tend to choose one emphasis or the other, and their choice determines whether they believe the church should stand aloof from the world or be committed to it.

In the second place, how are we to understand the church? Is it an outpost of the Kingdom of God, or does it have a greater degree of involvement in the world than this formulation suggests? Should the emphasis be placed on the inner life of the Christian community — its worship and nurture, or on its outreach into society? And should this outreach be viewed primarily in terms of making a proclamation to the world, or should it be regarded as a dialogue with the world in which we in the church realize that the world has much to say to us, and that we need the world as badly as it needs us? A third option is to think of the church as so deeply involved in the world that even a word like "dialogue" is inappropriate. In this view, the Christian participates fully in the world like yeast in a lump of dough, working for change from within the world itself, and being changed by it.

One of the main theological problems raised by this discussion is the tension between the uniqueness and universality of the gospel. "Uniqueness" refers to the Christian claim that only in Christ and his cross is salvation to be found. "Universality" means that the gospel of Christ has relevance for the whole exciting, expanding universe. In our midst many people put emphasis on one or the other of these key words. Others believe that they must be held firmly together, and contend that "the uniqueness of the gospel is to be found in its universality, and its universality is to be found in its uniqueness."

The discussion of questions like these has gone on down through the centuries, but they must be answered afresh. There are two reasons for this. Firstly, there is evidence that the debate of these issues has reached the stage of sharp disagreement and conflict at many levels of church life. The issues must be faced with as much candour, openness and willingness to understand as we can bring to the task. Secondly, the discussion of these matters is not simply an intellectual exercise. The way we answer these questions affects our strategy and tactics in mission whether it be on the congregational level, or the courts of the church, or in the life and actions of the individual Christian. The best example of this can be found in the tensions that frequently exist between exponents of evangelism and exponents of social action.

What is Required: (1) We need to bring together, in dynamic and creative ways, the exponents of varying emphases and strategies in our church.

(2) People in the congregations need more encouragement and help to study social issues, so as to deepen their understanding and equip them for an informed Christian participation in the life of the community, the nation and the world.

(3) Presbyteries should be asked to study the differences of viewpoint that exist in the church regarding the relationship of the church to society, so as to help clarify goals and missionary strategies.

COMMUNICATION

There are two kinds of communication we discuss here. The first kind is communication between persons and the problems that church people face in this regard. Secondly, we discuss the impact that modern technology has made on the ways we learn and understand.

I Communication between Persons — Communication is one of the great "in" words of our time and church people talk about it a great deal. They frequently say that there is a lack of communication between persons, between their congregation and other groupings in society, between pulpit and pew, between age groups or between church agencies and the grass-roots.

When they talk about the barriers to communication they usually refer to the church's vocabulary or its ways of worship or the procedures of church government. But many speak of a barrier that is deeper and more serious. They refer to a reluctance among church people to be honest about the way they really feel and think. It has almost become a cliché that there is more genuineness, openness and acceptance outside the church fellowship than in it.

If it is true that some church people wear masks of unreality and pretense, part of the explanation may lie in a feeling that any admission of inadequacy, doubt or sin would be a betrayal of their role as members of the church. This would suggest that they have not really comprehended the gospel: that in Christ they are forgiven and accepted, and that all they have really heard is the law with its imperious demand to be good.

II The Key Social Change of the Mid 20th Century — As a result of the Communications Revolution — especially television — there is a new way of comprehending reality.

Whereas reality was comprehended by the written description or narrative, in which bits of the whole followed one another in logical sequence leading to logical conclusions — reality is now comprehended as a whole situation. (This oversimplification is for the sake of distinguishing the difference — in fact the change is a trend.)

It used to be commonly asked of a church, "What is its doctrinal position? What does it stand for? Does its constitution allow for reform?"

While these matters are still important, people today, especially young people, who comprehend reality in total situation (e.g. T.V. presents a total situation and flow of reality, rather than in bits logically pieced together) look at the church to

see if there is something happening there in which they can put themselves and participate. If not they switch us off and tune into another channel.

The former period was characterized in the church by a suspicion of the movies as a medium. Today is characterized by the field of popular communication being more and more taken over by this very media via T.V. Many magazines are going out of business.

In the former way of comprehending reality, one could hold the data at arm's length, as it were, and make up one's mind at the end of the examination whether to support or oppose, whether to believe or not believe, whether to affirm or deny.

In the newer way of comprehending reality — one actually or vicariously puts one's self into the total situation whether it is a mission project of the church or a portrayal on T.V., i.e. one becomes involved.

As applied to the church, learning will be by involvement, loyalty will be to a missionary fellowship, i.e. a church that is going somewhere. So Involvement leads to Planning. (This is not to be deplored, because this is a return to a New Testament characteristic, of Jesus' use of life situation parables rather than theory.)

What is Required: (1) We cannot take it for granted that communication really takes place in our congregations and Presbyteries. We need to take definite steps to open the channels of communication so that trust, real listening and mutual acceptance may flourish among us, and so that we can minister to the deep, intense, unspoken needs of our fellow Christians.

(2) We need to make better use of the media of communication. (Please see the recommendation on this matter under the heading of "Communications" in Section II of the report.)

FREEDOM AND AUTHORITY

In the light of the Christian Gospel, what should freedom and authority mean for Christians, and how are these appropriately expressed in the life of the church? At the present time, many Christians fear that true authority is missing in the church, but from two different points of view.

Some in our church are reacting against what they regard as undue authoritarianism. This is directed against such targets as: legalistic attitudes in our church courts; an indoctrination style of education; the "preaching" mode of Gospel communication. There is a cry for freedom from the strictures of creeds and codes. There is a search for a form of authority which is not so much imposed from without, as generated from within the Christian person.

On the other hand, some are worried about what seems to them an erosion of authority in the church. They regard standards for doctrine, ethics and church government as essential. They are troubled by evidences of abdication of authority on the part of ruling and teaching elders; as well as by many parents and adults. And they tend to see a close connection between rebellion against constituted authority and rebellion against God.

Generally speaking, people rebel less against authority than the abuse of authority. They react against a tyranny that is mindless, brutal and frightened, and also against a soft society that has no fortitude, standards or principles.

Whether in the home, or in society as a whole, or in the church, an authority is needed which provides strength, cohesion, direction and protection for all the members. This kind of authority is blended with, and scarcely distinguishable from true freedom. The freedom of which the New Testament speaks carries an authority with it — an authority which is accepted because people see in it love, justice, purpose. Conversely, there is true freedom in this kind of authority, because it offers the possibility of development and integrity, while honouring the rights and needs of all.

What is Required: (1) Effective authority in the church should be wielded, not on the basis of the office one holds, of age, or other similar prerogatives, but on the

basis of personal maturity, experience and competence and evidences of the presence of the Spirit of God.

(2) Authority in the church must be less "authoritarian" in spirit, and more in the mode of the Lordship of Christ who has freed us from bondage to codes, creeds and human domination; and made us subject to one another in love.

(3) Because freedom in Christ involves us in mutual responsibility, those who lead and govern, and those who are led and governed, must together serve Christ in mutual helpfulness for the sake of the world for which Christ died and rose again.

OUR GOAL

What is the Presbyterian Church called of God to do in our time? This was the main issue the General Assembly committed to this committee, and we can report that it has been raised again and again as congresses, congregations and Presbyteries have asked themselves: what is our goal?

We can report that a great number of our ministers and laity are able to articulate their answer to the question in very positive terms. They see that the goal of the church's life cannot be stated in a single sentence, because there is a richness and fullness to our life as Christians which has several dimensions to it. There are three emphases that John Calvin made centuries ago that are still valid and necessary. These include the God-man relationship expressed in worship; the relationship between Christians expressed in fellowship, nurture and education; the relationship between Christians and the world they live in, often described in terms of outreach, mission, evangelism or social action.

But this balanced view of the church's goal is not shared by all our people. Many of them tend to adopt a single view and write off the emphases of others as irrelevant. Some see the church's goal in terms of evangelism: in proclaiming the gospel and winning men to Christ. Others see it in terms of social action. Still others shun both of these outward-looking goals, placing their emphasis on the worship and educative functions of the church's life. To another group, outreach (whether expressed as mission, evangelism or social action) is regarded as a movement that goes in the wrong direction: from the church into the world. They argue that God's presence permeates all society and the world; the proper Christian strategy is to live in the world as a sign of faith and hope. And there are many Presbyterians who fall into none of these categories, but consider that the only goal of the church is simply to stay in existence.

We believe that the best way to summarize the goal of the church is in terms of *obedience to Christ*.

What is Required: Obedience to Christ means: (1) The starting point in our life and mission is in our allegiance to Jesus Christ. The starting point does not lie in our heritage, our doctrine, our church government, our common humanity. Jesus is Lord.

(2) He calls us into the service of "missio dei", the mission of God. Our priorities and the strategies we employ may change, but the mission of God remains the same. God's mission in our world is to save us and our world from sin and death. The needs of persons and the social structures they live in may differ considerably, but the basic need — for salvation — remains. This salvation which God accomplishes in his mission extends to all the slaveries by which man is bound: poverty, discrimination, ignorance, fear, bad habit, lust, pride — but the basic slavery is to sin and death.

(3) We share in God's mission. This means that we are called to share him with the world. The world understandably resents being "preached at" and resists any notions of a lordly church imposing itself on their lives. We share what we have received from God — not what we are in ourselves.

(4) Obedience to Christ involves coming to him repeatedly for cleansing and new life. If our outreach is not fed and sustained by worship and Christian nurture our outreach becomes mere social dabbling, without motivation, purpose or effectiveness.

(5) Obedience to Christ involves subduing the earth and enjoying God in our secular calling. As long as our life lasts in this world we are called to live, love, laugh, weep and die here. Our obedience to Christ and our awareness of him is not limited to our occasions of worship or "church work" but are extended to all our occasions in the whole created realm.

"All people that on earth do dwell,
Sing to the Lord with cheerful voice.
Him serve with mirth, His praise forth tell;
Come ye before Him and rejoice."

Recommendation

1. That this Section I of the report, "General Issues" be commended to the courts, congregations and people of the church for study and action.

SECTION II

IMMEDIATE OBJECTIVES — RECOMMENDATIONS

CONGREGATIONAL LIFE

The decision-making process in congregations today calls for competence in many fields. The expanding mid-week program involving e.g. outreach, evangelism, fellowship, stewardship, social action, missions and audio-visual education are added to the traditional areas of worship, discipline and nurture in which the session's rule is exercised.

People who actually function as leaders in these areas, whether men or women or young people, should be ordained to these functions as elders and thus help the Session to be the effective ruling body in the congregations.

The membership of the average congregation has a wider diversity of training and skills than ever before, and should be encouraged to participate in the decisions affecting the on-going life of the congregation.

Recommendations

2. In order that Sessions might better plan, supervise, and execute the affairs of the congregation, a series of committees should be elected from the congregation, including committees of Policy and Planning, Nurture and Worship, Mission and Outreach, and a committee entitled Finance and Maintenance which would fulfil the terms of the Board of Managers as described in *The Book of Forms*, together with any other committees required by the local situation; the chairman of all such committees to be nominated for membership on the Session as soon as possible after assuming office, unless already a member of session.
3. That in order to facilitate access to the court by the congregation, Session meetings normally be open, reserving the right to move in camera; and that the Clerks of Assembly be instructed to draft the necessary changes in *The Book of Forms* to be submitted to the Presbyteries for consideration under the Barrier Act.
How can an elder gracefully retire from active duty on the Session, or obtain a leave of absence, without shirking his responsibility? How also can membership in the Session be open to a steady flow of leaders?
4. (a) That ruling elders serve on the Kirk Session for terms of five years at a time, followed by a leave of absence of two years,
(b) That ruling elders have the right to return to membership on the Session without re-election at the end of each two year leave of absence.
(c) That an elder who does not exercise this option of returning to the Session after two years without re-election, may at a later date return to the Session upon re-election.

(d) and that the clerks of General Assembly be instructed to draft the necessary changes in *The Book of Forms* to be submitted to the Presbyteries for consideration under the Barrier Act.

A major problem in the church is the tendency of many congregations to be inward-looking and building-centered, to the detriment of the commission of Christ to go into all the world with the Good News. The migration of membership away from the area of the building, the gradual decline of inner-city and rural congregations and the swing away from the post-war church boom, all contribute to a tendency towards defensiveness, defeatism and survival-consciousness. The task of the church becomes grim rather than glorious, and direction in the congregation's life and program can be lost.

Recommendations

5. That congregations be urged to take their communities more seriously and to discover areas of need in which the congregation's resources of people, buildings, and gifts can be used to serve the community with the whole gospel.
6. That congregations be urged to link their occasions of study and worship to the specific tasks of outreach in which their members are engaged.
7. That congregations be urged to avail themselves of the many helps now existing for developing the planning process; including clarification of purpose, identifying goals and objectives, implementing plans to achieve these goals, and evaluating the results at regular intervals.
8. That program boards be instructed to provide assistance to congregations in the following ways: (a) Providing training in the planning process through their field staff; (b) Providing printed and audio-visual resources to enable congregations to relate their study and worship to their outreach program.
9. That Presbyteries be encouraged to experiment in new forms of mobile task-oriented congregations.

CONGRESSES

The church needs to find avenues and structures that will widen participation and improve communication between the people and those whom they elect to office in the church.

Many Presbyterians are anxious to have greater involvement, to participate more fully in the processes of evaluating, planning and shaping the future course of congregations and the church at large.

In our doctrine of ministry, we make an increasing place these days for lay ministry, and we are constantly urging the laity to take a larger part in the life of the church. But in practice, we have not worked out suitable machinery to allow this to happen as fully as it should. There is a widespread need at all levels of church life to provide new channels and structures that will gather in and put to work the rich human resources of the church.

One major means of achieving this is to develop the congress idea, which has found favour in recent years. Congresses have tended to be educational, and often inspirational. They broaden people's horizons and lift their morale. But when Presbyterians are gathered in congress to think and talk about the church's purpose, policies and programs, they need to know that those who hold office and make decisions in the church are listening, and that the people of the church can help in some way to shape and redirect the church's life. We need to recognize the congress as a valuable supplement to the work of the courts of the church, and make authoritative provision to give congresses proper access to the courts.

Recommendations

10. That the General Assembly encourage broader participation by the people of the church through congresses, initiated or recognized by the courts of the church, which would consider church affairs and bring their findings and

recommendations to the courts; the court in each case to inquire diligently into what the people have to say, and to decide how the mission and life of the church may best be served in the matters the people have raised.

11. That the General Assembly publicize to the people of the church their privileges as members and adherents to assemble for the consideration of church affairs, and the means provided in the law of the church whereby their findings and recommendations may be brought before the courts of the church for consideration.

YOUTH IN THE CHURCH

The General Assembly decided in 1967 that young adults should be drawn more fully into the life and work of the church, and that the courts of the church should be asked to appoint capable young adults to boards and committees to share in planning and decision making.

Some progress is being made in this direction, but many ministers and elders may not even be aware yet of the Assembly's decision on this question.

We are often told that more than half the world's population is under twenty-five years of age. This is not new. What is new is that people are living longer. In the past, when life expectancy was thirty-five years, the young adults were the leaders both in the church and society. Today people live longer and continue to act in all facets of life to the exclusion of those who, in the past, would have borne all responsibility. As a result, the number of young adults actively associated with the Presbyterian Church in Canada is pitifully small.

Not only is the church not succeeding in extending a Gospel ministry to any substantial segment of the young adult population. But the church is being deprived of the awareness, energy, and creativity which young adults could be contributing to its life and mission.

Perhaps one of the most important factors in whether young adults will associate with the Presbyterian Church in the years ahead will be the church's attitude and response to the challenges of change and renewal.

One of the encouraging features of recent congresses has been the large number of young people participating, and the absence of any serious generation-gap in the lively discussion and fellowship! To bring this same thing to pass in the life and worship of our congregations is surely a major objective for the coming years.

Little new information has come to L.A.M.P. this year concerning young adults and youth in the church, although contacts were made with Synod, young people's societies and students' societies of our three colleges.

Several problems require continuing attention: How to maintain contact and dialogue with young people; how to extend a supportive ministry to them which is not tied to traditional church structures and programs; how to open up congregational life and work to them so that they feel welcome, accepted and needed; how to better equip leaders for youth ministry.

Recommendations

12. That the General Assembly reaffirm its policy that a larger place be made for youth and young adults in the courts and committees of the church, and urge that this policy be implemented.
13. That all adult Presbyterians be urged to listen to the voice of youth, including those presently alienated from the Church, by seeking opportunities to enter into conversation with them.
14. That congregations and Presbyteries, with the assistance of program boards of the church, provide more support and better training for those young adults and adults who are willing to serve in the church's youth ministry, including training in human relations and sensitivity.

15. That all those holding office in the church, especially those who are members of the courts and boards, take steps to ensure that all members and adherents of the church, whether youth, adults or older adults, have opportunity to share fully in the church's life and mission in whatever ways they may be qualified by their gifts and experience.

WOMEN IN THE CHURCH

Since the 1966 General Assembly, women have had complete equality with men for election to the courts and committees of the church. But representation of the women of the church on these bodies, in actual practice, will probably remain disproportionate for some time to come.

Some women do not now, and perhaps never will, wish to be involved in any way with the courts of the church. These women are content to be part of the unrecognized army who tirelessly labour, and raise funds to maintain manses and to provide new facilities in local churches. They also spend themselves in work with children and youth, and in community services.

Some church women, however, are concerned that they, as a group having special needs and gifts, do not in practice have access to the policy-making bodies of the church. The phrase "the disenfranchized half" is sometimes used. They are entitled to hold office, and are willing to do so, but are not granted the opportunity.

While it is recognized that this is a time of transition in the traditional structures of women's work in the Presbyterian Church in Canada, this should not be used as an excuse for ignoring other aspects of this complex issue — the role of women in the life and mission of the church.

Recommendations

16. That all courts, boards and committees of the church be urged to seek out and bring in to the policy and decision-making bodies of the church women who are willing and able to serve.
17. That all courts be open to and supportive of the legitimate aspirations of women within their bounds, and make every effort to assist in the furtherance of these aspirations.

FRENCH SPEAKING PEOPLE IN CANADA

Canada has been founded upon two language groups, each having a specific culture. The Presbyterian Church must consider its responsibility towards the French speaking people of Canada at a time when the identification between French culture and Roman Catholicism tends to be lost.

We must find ways to witness in a more effective manner among French-speaking people, especially in Quebec.

Recommendations

18. In order to engage in a larger ministry in predominantly French-speaking communities, professional church workers obtain at least a working knowledge of the French language, and that money be made available from Bursary funds, scholarships or otherwise, for intensive courses in French language and culture.
19. That the Home Missions section of the General Board of Missions be encouraged to approach other denominations with a view to cooperating with them in French work.
20. That our French-speaking congregations be encouraged to cooperate with those of other denominations.

MINISTRY

Many in the church are asking why our colleges are not training men and women for new kinds of specialized ministries and for an approach to parish ministry that would better meet the needs of modern mobile society.

It is easy, however, to talk about specialized ministries in a vague way. First the church must establish specific ministries to meet special needs. This in turn would make possible specific goals for the training of personnel, and provide employment opportunities for people with such training.

The colleges usually train people for the kind of ministry which the church at large accepts. If there is a need for new forms of ministry, and new training for these ministries, the General Assembly must first study these questions, then decide, and instruct the colleges accordingly.

Recommendations

21. That a standing committee be created to recommend to the General Assembly the training requirements for lay and ordained professional church workers, consisting of:
- four people with competence in the fields of university instruction, business administration and the social sciences,
 - one representative from each of the Boards of Christian Education, Evangelism and Social Action, Stewardship and Budget, Home Missions, Overseas Missions, W.M.S. (E.D.) and W.M.S. (W.D.),
 - two pastoral ministers,
 - two consultants from each of the three church colleges,
 - two consultants from among the recent graduates (two to four years from graduation) of each of these colleges.

22. That this committee be given a budget of \$1,000 for its first year of operation.

The Gospel does not change, but the means of communicating it have always changed as society has changed. Our Lord used a boat for a pulpit; medieval religious art was an important aid in communicating the gospel to illiterate multitudes. Today, social change is more rapid than ever before, and communicators of the gospel need a continuing educational process, and in some cases retraining.

Recommendation

23. That fees and leave for study at a recognized college, for a period of not less than two weeks per year, be part of the structure of stipend and allowances for pastoral ministers, deaconesses, catechists, women missionaries and field workers.

There are several needs at present in the general field of personnel work in the church. For instance, more information is constantly needed on the training, gifts and experience of church people, both laity and clergy.

Or again, when a member of the church responds to the call to serve in a professional capacity in the church, he or she trusts the church to be a good steward of the personnel resources thus enlisted. Many feel that personnel policies and support structures for ministry are not adequate in such areas as:

- assessing the gifts or lack of same before the candidate embarks on a long and costly training program,
- the operation of the call system in a geographically widespread country,
- counselling facilities to assist in assessing the direction of one's church career in the light of training and gifts, and assisting those who should leave the employment of the church to do so with dignity,
- practical apprenticeship,
- ordination, designation, and recognition questions and procedures,
- appointments procedure,
- continuing education,
- stipend and retirement provisions.

Recommendation

24. That a personnel committee of six members be established with one full time executive person and stenographer, whose functions would include (a) gathering

data on the resources of church personnel, both laity and clergy; (b) acting as a clearing house for professional church workers desiring employment and those requiring their service; (c) developing *support structures* for church employees; (d) projecting future personnel requirements; (e) and fulfilling the terms of reference of the Committee on Recruitment and Vocation after the present research project of that Committee has been completed.

THE NATIONAL STRUCTURES OF THE CHURCH

A number of submissions have been received by LAMP calling for changes in the structures and activities of the boards and agencies of the General Assembly.

These submissions are in succession with a series of overtures to the Assembly and several major reports which have been before the church over the last several decades.

One of the complaints most frequently heard is that the national agencies are over-staffed in relation to the size and resources of the church. Another is that there is poor communication and lack of rapport between the national agencies and the Presbyteries and congregations. A third is that the services and activities of the program boards tend to overlap, and to produce programs which congregations neither want nor need. A fourth complaint is that in the matter of co-ordinating and establishing priorities for church program, the present structures of boards and committees and Administrative Council do not seem to have adequately solved the problem.

Decentralization — There has been a call to consider decentralization of some of the national program services. It may be that regional diversities in Canada provide some foundation for such a proposal. But decentralization can mean a number of different things, and this matter requires study and definition. Preliminary consideration has been given to this by LAMP, but it would be premature at this stage to make a judgment as to the value and feasibility of various types of decentralization at this time.

Principles for Organizational Development — In thinking about organizational change at the national level, several principles have emerged which are cited here for the guidance of those who may continue this inquiry beyond the present year. (1) An organizational structure should always be based and built on clearly defined needs, purposes and functions. (2) The definition of functions and structures at the national level of church life must be developed in co-ordination with definitions of function and structure for other levels of church life. (This does not mean that the structures must be in parallel, but that they must be designed to form a co-ordinated total structure.) (3) In determining the functions and services required at the national level, the church should be consulted. This would help to build confidence, rapport, and mutual support, which are so essential to the proper functioning of the national agencies of the church. (4) The present boards and committees should also be consulted in relation to changes which will affect them and their work at the national level of church life. (The most effective processes of structural change in modern business are based on a cooperative principal of organizational development.) (5) Church structures and services should be under constant review and development, because the needs which they serve can never be assumed to be fixed or unchanging. The social context of the church's life and mission is in constant flux.

Recommendations

25. That a careful study be made of the functions and services needed by the church from its national agencies, in consultation with Presbyteries and congregations, and with the present boards and agencies of the Assembly.
26. In the light of the definition of functions and services arrived at under (25) above, that a plan be devised to develop appropriate structures for the national agencies of the church.

Leadership For Organizational Development — Leadership for the task of organizational development at the national level is a critical factor in whether planned and comprehensive changes can come about, how soon, and how effectively. During

the current year, two committees have been studying these matters at the national level, the Committee on Life and Mission, and the Committee on Organization and Planning which is a committee of the Administrative Council. Some preliminary consultation has taken place between these two committees.

For such a complex and demanding task it is evident that a period of at least three to five years will be required. It is also evident that the services of a small but competent staff will be needed, and that specialists in management and organizational development should be consulted from time to time as the work requires it. Elsewhere in this report (Recommendation No. 32) a planning and development agency is suggested to deal with this project, and other long-term priority matters which are presented in this report to the Assembly.

Recommendation

27. That recommendations (25) and (26) be referred for implementation to the planning and development agency of General Assembly proposed in Recommendation 32 along with the balance of this section of the LAMP report (on National Structures) for consideration.

EXPERIMENTATION IN CHURCH GOVERNMENT AND ADMINISTRATION

The Book of Forms is a subject of concern to many Presbyterians.

Viewpoints in the church vary widely. Some have great confidence in the laws and usages of the church, while a few feel that nothing short of a whole new approach will suffice.

On numerous occasions during the year, the LAMP staff has heard in different parts of the country comment to the effect that we needed a new *Book of Forms*. Such a statement requires definition for it can mean many things. Perhaps for a few, the statement meant that they could no longer believe in our life-time ordination of ruling elders or our system of a hierarchy of courts. But for the majority, it seemed to reflect a general discontent with the mood and spirit in which the laws and usages of the church are applied. They speak of legalistic attitudes which seems to run counter to a gospel of grace; of rigidity, resistance to change, and unbending authoritarianism.

On the other hand, many are equally vehement in support of *The Book of Forms*. They point to its provisions which, when properly administered, provide for church discipline that expresses Christian love in its highest forms, and to the provisions which it contains for bringing about change in the laws of the church, and for protecting personal rights and freedoms.

Many of the difficulties arise from a lack of knowledge or a misunderstanding of the laws of the church. Sometimes, the stumbling blocks are custom or usage, and are not actually found within *The Book of Forms*.

Some have pointed out, rightly, that the book is open to revision and is being constantly changed. Many of the specific suggestions requiring change in *The Book of Forms* which have been brought to the attention of LAMP are the kind of thing that can readily be channelled through overtures and brought to the General Assembly and the church at large by this means. It has not been possible in the time available for LAMP to deal with many of these specific suggestions calling for change in *The*

Book of Forms.

However, it does appear that there is some inflexibility on the part of ministers and elders, some of whom seem bound by the letter of the Law, more than by its intent. On occasion, they use the provisions of *The Book of Forms* to block change. And it would be very desirable if a way could be found for the Assembly to encourage Sessions and Presbyteries to adopt an attitude of openness toward controlled and guided experimentation.

Presbyterians, traditionally, have moved toward change very slowly and cautiously. But today we find ourselves in a time when the rate of change going

on around us may make it difficult for our normal procedures to bring about the necessary adaptations of church government and administration quickly enough.

Recommendation

28. (a) That the Assembly designate the next five years as a time for study and experiment at all levels of church life (within the law of the church) in matters pertaining to church government and administration, Sessions and Presbyteries being encouraged to interpret the law of the church with as much openness and flexibility as the law allows.
- (b) That Presbyteries and Sessions be ready to report to the General Assembly (or an agency established for the purpose) whatever findings they may have from their study and experimentation.

The Assembly would then be in a position in the light of the findings of this period of study and experimentation, to take suitable steps, if necessary, toward a revision of *The Book of Forms*.

Recommendation

29. That the General Assembly provide leadership at the national level for this study and experimentation in church government and administration, by referring the matter to a planning and development agency (Recommendation 32).

COMMUNICATIONS

We are making little effort as a church to understand the impact of the new developments in the communications field, or to learn how to put communications technology to work in the service of the church.

Back in 1958-59 the Price Waterhouse Report recommended the establishment of an integrated department of communications for the church at the national level in which the various agencies that disseminate news and information on behalf of the church would be consolidated.

This is still being talked about and advocated in various quarters of the church. But the matter takes on a new dimension and a new urgency in the light of the amazing developments in the communications field in the ten years since the Price Waterhouse Report made this recommendation.

The Audio Visual Department as presently constituted is only a token recognition of what is now becoming a major feature of modern life. Even as recently as the centennial year in Canada, EXPO '67 made Canadians aware in an altogether new way of the possibilities of audio-visual forms of communication. If we are to communicate effectively with people living in a country which is changing so rapidly as far as communications are concerned, we must seriously ask what the effect and effectiveness will be if we continue to assume that preaching and the printed page are still normative and adequate as modes for the communication of the Gospel.

This is a vast subject with many implications for church policy and program. The cost factor has extensive ramifications. It would be premature to make proposals at this time as to how the church can catch up in the field of communications. But the very least that should be done at this stage is to recognize the problem for what it is and take steps to find some of the solutions.

Recommendation

30. (a) That the Assembly instruct the Administrative Council to appoint an ad hoc advisory committee on communications.
- (b) That the committee study the needs of the church in the whole field of communications, consult with and advise the boards of the Assembly regarding communications in relation to their work, and report to the Assembly with recommendations either in 1970 or 1971.

- (c) That the committee make a preliminary report to the Administrative Council, so that the question of financial support for proposed recommendations may be explored before being brought to the Assembly.
- (d) That the committee consist of five to ten persons having special competence in various sectors of the field of communications and some understanding of the life and mission of the church.

CONFERENCE CENTRE

There is evident need for a Presbyterian conference centre somewhere in the population centre of the church.

In developing the human resources of the church, the value of conferences, residential centres and short-term training courses is now widely recognized throughout the Christian world.

Our own church has been talking about these matters for some years; but limited resources, a relatively small membership, and various administrative problems connected with properties we own, have prevented any effective action.

Presbyterian groups have been making use of facilities developed by other churches, by community agencies, or private business enterprise. It is becoming increasingly difficult to obtain accommodation in the conference centres of other denominations. We are now competing with many businesses and community groups for the use of these facilities, as the conference method gains in popularity.

Our church owns properties which are suitable for development into convenient conference centres with facilities for meetings and comfortable residential accommodation.

Because any good conference centre is now in demand from many non-church groups, it is economically possible to develop our own year-round conference centre, and over a few years to give it an administrative and program staff on a self-supporting basis.

Recommendation

31. That the General Assembly instruct the Administrative Council to establish a national church conference centre, or do otherwise to accomplish this purpose as it may in its wisdom deem best.

CONTINUITY OF LEADERSHIP IN ON-GOING REFORM

It will be evident to those who have read through the report that many of the issues and concerns brought to the attention of the LAMP Committee during the year are of such a nature as to prohibit snap judgments and hasty decisions. The reform of the church is a "process" rather than an act. A good deal of thought must be given to such areas as the structures and activities of the boards and agencies of the church, the practicality of decentralization, varieties in ministry, church government and administration, and many others. Your committee therefore believes that the church would be greatly strengthened in its life and work by a properly conceived agency responsible for giving leadership in review and evaluation, long-range planning and development, for the years that lie immediately ahead.

The LAMP Committee (successor to the Special Committee re Recommendation #10, Administrative Council, 1965) has been working on an *ad hoc* basis during the past year — and rightly so. Accordingly, we believe that this phase of the work is finished, that LAMP should be discharged, and its three-man working staff returned to their respective boards. The fact remains, however, that if effective provision is not made for following up some of the major issues facing the church, much of the valuable work that LAMP has been permitted to do will be allowed to fitter away. Your committee has come to a strong consensus that a planning and development agency is necessary for the guidance and direction of the next steps in reform.

Your committee has arrived at this conclusion only gradually. Yet we believe it to be self-evident from the contents of the report. In order that the committee may give no grounds for misunderstanding which might tend to prejudice the matter, the recommendation is deliberately constructed in an 'open-ended' fashion.

Recommendation

32. That the General Assembly provide for continuity of leadership for on-going reform of the church, in matters such as the long term development needs described in this report, by setting up an agency for planning and development, for a period of three to five years beginning in 1969, having at least one executive staff member, competent secretarial assistance, and an adequate budget.

REPORT RE OVERTURE 64, 1966, PRESBYTERY OF PARIS

The Committee reports that the prayer of this overture has been granted through the work of the Assembly's Committee on Recommendation 10 of the Administrative Council, 1965, later called the Committee on Life and Mission, and through its report and recommendation to this, the 95th General Assembly.

REPORT RE OVERTURE 1, 1968, SYNOD OF HAMILTON-LONDON

The Committee recommends that the prayer of the overture be granted in terms of recommendations (28) and (29) of this Committee to the 95th General Assembly.

REPORT RE OVERTURE 10, 1968, PRESBYTERY OF OTTAWA

The preamble and Section I of the prayer were referred to this committee. The Committee questions the accuracy of the claim that we face an acute shortage of ministers, and is not persuaded that stipends and pensions, however inadequate, are a prime cause for decline in recruitment to the ministry.

Because the 94th General Assembly authorized the Committee on Recruitment and Vocation to proceed in due course with a special research project in matters pertaining to the ministry and recruitment thereto, and a preliminary report will be made to the 95th General Assembly, therefore, the Committee recommends that the prayer of the overture be not granted.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That this Section I of the report, "General Issues" be commended to the courts, congregations and people of the church for study and action.
2. In order that Sessions might better plan, supervise, and execute the affairs of the congregation, a series of committees should be elected from the congregation, including committees of Policy and Planning, Nurture and Worship, Mission and Outreach, and a committee entitled Finance and Maintenance which would fulfil the terms of the Board of Managers as described in *The Book of Forms*, together with any other committees required by the local situation; the chairman of all such committees to be nominated for membership to the Session as soon as possible after assuming office, unless already a member.
3. That in order to facilitate access to the court by the congregation, Session meetings normally be open, reserving the right to move in camera; and that the Clerks of Assembly be instructed to draft the necessary changes in *The Book of Forms* to be submitted to the Presbyteries for consideration under the Barrier Act.
4. (a) That ruling elders serve on the Kirk Session for terms of five years at a time, followed by a leave of absence of two years,
(b) That ruling elders have the right to return to membership on the Session without re-election at the end of each two year leave of absence,

- (c) That an elder who does not exercise this option of returning to the Session after two years without re-election, may at a later date return to the Session upon re-election,
- (d) and that the clerks of General Assembly be instructed to draft the necessary changes in *The Book of Forms* to be submitted to the Presbyteries for consideration under the Barrier Act.
5. That congregations be urged to take their communities more seriously and to discover areas of need in which the congregation's resources of people, buildings, and gifts can be used to serve the community with the whole gospel.
6. That congregations be urged to link their occasions of study and worship to the specific tasks of outreach in which their members are engaged.
7. That congregations be urged to avail themselves of the many helps now existing for developing the planning process; including clarification of purpose, identifying goals and objectives, implementing plans to achieve these goals, and evaluating the results at regular intervals.
8. That program boards be instructed to provide assistance to congregations in the following ways: (a) Providing training in the planning process through their field staff; (b) Providing printed and audio-visual resources to enable congregations to relate their study and worship to their outreach program.
9. That Presbyteries be encouraged to experiment in new forms of mobile task-oriented congregations.
10. That the General Assembly encourage broader participation by the people of the church through congresses, initiated or recognized by the courts of the church, which would consider church affairs and bring their findings and recommendations to the courts; the court in each case to inquire diligently into what the people have to say, and to decide how the mission and life of the church may best be served in the matters the people have raised.
11. That the General Assembly publicize to the people of the church their privileges as members and adherents to assemble for the consideration of church affairs, and the means provided in the law of the church whereby their findings and recommendations may be brought before the courts of the church for consideration.
12. That the General Assembly reaffirm its policy that a larger place be made for youth and young adults in the courts and committees of the church, and urge that this policy be implemented.
13. That all adult Presbyterians be urged to listen to the voice of youth, including those presently alienated from the Church, by seeking opportunities to enter into conversation with them.
14. That congregations and Presbyteries, with the assistance of program boards of the church, provide more support and better training for those young adults and adults who are willing to serve in the church's youth ministry, including training in human relations and sensitivity.
15. That all those holding office in the church, especially those who are members of the courts and boards, take steps to ensure that all members and adherents of the church, whether youth, adults or older adults, have opportunity to share fully in the church's life and mission in whatever ways they may be qualified by their gifts and experience.
16. That all courts, boards and committees of the church be urged to seek out and bring in to the policy and decision-making bodies of the church women who are willing and able to serve.

17. That all courts be open to and supportive of the legitimate aspirations of women within their bounds, and make every effort to assist in the furtherance of these aspirations.
18. In order to engage in a larger ministry in predominantly French-speaking communities, professional church workers obtain at least a working knowledge of the French language, and that money be made available from Bursary funds, scholarships or otherwise, for intensive courses in French language and culture.
19. That the Home Missions section of the General Board of Missions be encouraged to approach other denominations with a view to cooperating with them in French work.
20. That our French-speaking congregations be encouraged to cooperate with those of other denominations.
21. That a standing committee be created to recommend to the General Assembly the training requirements for lay and ordained professional church workers, consisting of:
 - (a) four people with competence in the fields of university instruction, business administration and the social sciences,
 - (b) one representative from each of the Boards of Christian Education, Evangelism and Social Action, Stewardship and Budget, Home Missions, Overseas Missions, W.M.S. (E.D.) and W.M.S. (W.D.),
 - (c) two pastoral ministers,
 - (d) two consultants from each of the three church colleges,
 - (e) two consultants from among the recent graduates (two to four years from graduation) of each of these colleges.
22. That this committee be given a budget of \$1,000 for its first year of operation.
23. That fees and leave for study at a recognized college, for a period of not less than two weeks per year, be part of the structure of stipend and allowances for pastoral ministers, deaconesses, catechists, women missionaries and field workers.
24. That a personnel committee of six members be established with one full time executive person and stenographer, whose functions would include (a) gathering data on the resources of church personnel, both laity and clergy; (b) acting as a clearing house for professional church workers desiring employment and those requiring their services; (c) developing *support structures* for church employees; (d) projecting future personnel requirements; (e) and fulfilling the terms of reference of the Committee on Recruitment and Vocation after the present research project of that Committee has been completed.
25. That a careful study be made of the functions and services needed by the church from its national agencies, in consultation with Presbyteries and congregations, and with the present boards and agencies of the Assembly.
26. In the light of the definition of functions and services arrived at under (25) above, that a plan be devised to develop appropriate structures for the national agencies of the church.
27. That recommendations (25) and (26) be referred for implementation to the planning and development agency of General Assembly proposed in Recommendation 32 along with the balance of this section of the LAMP report (on National Structures) for consideration.

28. (a) That the Assembly designate the next five years as a time for study and experiment at all levels of church life (within the law of the church) in matters pertaining to church government and administration, Sessions and Presbyteries being encouraged to interpret the law of the church with as much openness and flexibility as the law allows.
- (b) That Presbyteries and Sessions be ready to report to the General Assembly (or an agency established for the purpose) whatever findings they may have from their study and experimentation.
29. That the General Assembly provide leadership at the national level for this study and experimentation in church government and administration, by referring the matter to a planning and development agency (Recommendation 32).
30. (a) That the Assembly instruct the Administrative Council to appoint an *ad hoc advisory committee on communications*.
- (b) That the committee study the needs of the church in the whole field of communications, consult with and advise the boards of the Assembly regarding communications in relation to their work, and report to the Assembly with recommendations either in 1970 or 1971.
- (c) That the committee make a preliminary report to the Administrative Council, so that the question of financial support for proposed recommendations may be explored before being brought to the Assembly.
- (d) That the committee consist of five to ten persons having special competence in various sectors of the field of communications and some understanding of the life and mission of the church.
31. That the General Assembly instruct the Administrative Council to establish a national church conference centre, or do otherwise to accomplish this purpose at it may in its wisdom deem best.
32. That the General Assembly provide for continuity of leadership for on-going reform of the church, in matters such as the long term development needs described in this report, by setting up an agency for planning and development, for a period of three to five years beginning in 1969, having at least one executive staff member, competent secretarial assistance, and an adequate budget.

REPORT OF ST. ANDREW'S HALL, VANCOUVER, B.C.

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

Attached is the audited Statement of Accounts for our fiscal year ending August 31, 1968. It is evident that our requested increase in the operating grant is a realistic figure due to increased costs of operation and the action of the General Assembly.

Your Board continues to study the need to implement the Dean's proposal for an adequate non-residence student centre. For action much depends on a favourable consideration of our request from the National Development Fund.

Permission for Study Leave has been granted the Dean and the estimates for 1970 include the necessary \$3,000.00 to make this possible. The 1969 estimates, already approved, include \$3,000.00 for this year. We are presently negotiating for an acting dean during the Dean's absence.

Your Board has considered favourably the application of Regent College, a newly incorporated trans-denominational theological college sponsored by local "Open" Plymouth Brethren to rent our premises for their first term, the six weeks of the summer season. This, of course, will ease the problem of filling our rooms during that period which becomes increasingly difficult.

In recognition of their long and valuable service to the Hall and to the Church-at-large, Mr. and Mrs. H. D. Carson were entertained at the Jestley home by Mrs. H. Lyle Jestley and Mrs. Harry Lennox when the Board presented a beautifully engraved silver tray, a well-filled purse and gave other tributes.

The continued high status of St. Andrew's Hall both on the campus of U.B.C. and throughout the Church is in no small measure due to the Dean's guidance and administration and his various activities as our Presbyterian Chaplain at the University.

COMMITTEE ON INSTITUTIONAL CHAPLAINCIES

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

The terms of reference of this Committee are (1) to study and report on the relation of the Church to chaplaincies and other special areas (A&P, 1964 p. 308) and (2) to receive inquiries from organizations and institutions outside of the Church in relation to chaplaincy appointments other than the Armed Forces (A&P, 1965 p. 492).

A letter was sent to all Presbyteries of the Church inquiring about chaplaincy work within their bounds and another to full-time chaplains asking about their work. We found that the following Presbyterian ministers are serving as full-time chaplains.

- Rev. A. A. Bethune, B.A., B.D., Chaplain, Brookside School for Boys, Cobourg.
- Rev. J. Y. Fraser, Chaplain, Department of Veteran Affairs, Sunnybrook Hospital, Toronto.
- Rev. Allan Reoch, B.A., Chaplaincy Director for the Presbytery of East Toronto.
- Rev. James W. Files, B.A., Chaplain, Burtch Industrial Farms, Brantford.
- Rev. W. D. Hollingworth, B.A., Chaplain, Provincial Gaols, Vancouver.

Each of these men is on the constituent roll of his Presbytery. In at least one case, the Presbytery held a Service of Recognition to which representatives of other Communion were invited. Your Committee believes that it is important for Presbyteries to support and encourage in every way possible the men who are serving as chaplains, and for the chaplains to be as active in the work of the Presbytery as their other duties permit.

In addition to those who are serving full-time, many parish ministers are part-time chaplains under appointment by Presbytery in hospitals, jails and other institutions. In some cases small honorariums are paid by the Presbytery and this seems to be a commendable recognition of their services.

Inquiries are made from time to time by the Canadian Penitentiary Service and the Ontario Department of Correctional Institutions when there is a vacancy in the ranks of their chaplains. We propose to make this information available through the Presbyterian Record. This Committee is represented on the Committee of Certification of Chaplains in Public Institutions of the Canadian Council of Churches and on the Inter-Faith Committee on Chaplaincy in the Canadian Chaplaincy Service.

Your Committee is convinced that increasingly ministers in the parish are expected to counsel individuals, some of whom are members of their congregations and many are not. Courses in Supervised Pastoral Education are an invaluable help in equipping the minister to counsel more effectively. Since its organization in December 1965, the Canadian Council for Supervised Pastoral Education has been active in setting standards for such courses and for the men who supervise them. At present, courses are available at Acadian University, Toronto, Hamilton, Winnipeg, Calgary and Vancouver. We believe that men interested in improving their counselling skills should be encouraged to take courses in Supervised Pastoral Education.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That Presbyteries make it a practice to receive on their constituent roll, ministers of the Presbyterian Church in Canada who are serving as institutional chaplains within their bounds and to give them all the support possible in carrying out their pastoral role in the institution and the community.
2. That ministers be encouraged to take courses in Supervised Pastoral Education and that congregations and Presbyteries be encouraged to provide the funds and time for this purpose.
3. That the number of members of this Committee appointed by General Assembly be increased from six to nine and that three members, one retiring each year, be an institutional chaplain.

REPORT OF PRESBYTERIAN RESIDENCE BOARD
SASKATOON, SASK.

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

The year 1968 found the Residence Board keeping the door of the old building open to male students attending University. For the spring term we had 28 boys, from 10 to 12 over the summer sessions, 6 remained in residence until beginning of fall term, 32 from September to Christmas. Once again the residence was the home of the Saskatchewan Youth Conference.

In our attempt to meet the freedom cry on campus, we have operated without a matron for 1968, leaving more responsibility to the boys. The idea worked very

well, especially in the fall term when we had a very responsible student council. We believe that the worthy tradition of Pres Res has been maintained during 1968.

Response to the campaign gives evidence of considerable caution on the part of our Presbyterian people, in so far as building the residence on campus is concerned; however some recent donations have revived our hope. We still need between nine and ten thousand before we fulfill our part of the agreement with the 1963 Assembly. We have been receiving some encouraging offers for the present property, but unless the price is attractive we will not be in a position to complete the project. We are hopeful that the Board will be in a position to make some encouraging announcements in respect to the project by June 1st.

RECOMMENDATION

1. That the Grant of up to \$4,500 be approved.

THE COMMITTEE ON HOME RELIGION

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

During 1968 your Committee on Home Religion continued to publish EVERY DAY as a guide to family worship and private devotions. We acknowledge with gratitude the services of over fifty of our ministers who during 1968 contributed material to EVERY DAY gratuitously. Thorn Press and Presbyterian Publications also receive our thanks for printing, binding and distributing EVERY DAY without profit and latterly with financial loss to themselves.

During the year Dr. H. F. Davidson, Secretary, and Miss Diane Osborne, Editorial Assistant, of the Board of Stewardship and Budget, assigned a Church bulletin for a message on Home Religion. Dr. D. H. Rayner published in "The

Presbyterian Record" each month a list of the passages of EVERY DAY. The Administrative Council provided the back cover of the January issue of "The Presbyterian Record" for the presentation of the work of the Committee. We cordially thank them one and all for their cooperation in the work we endeavoured to do.

During 1968 the cover pictures were: January-March, winter scene, snow on evergreens; April-June, forest scene, birch trees with spring flowers in foreground; July-September, summer school among trees with students in foreground; October-December, winter scene, small boy muffled in winter clothes with patches on knees.

During 1968, the circulation of EVERY DAY was as follows: January-March 12,376; April-June 13,670; July-September 13,699; October-December 12,459. We are of the opinion that through EVERY DAY we reach about 20,000 persons each year.

From April to July, the Committee offered ten free copies of either the April-June or the July-September issue of EVERY DAY to any congregation wishing to introduce our devotional guide or to extend its usefulness in the congregation. 170 congregations availed themselves of this offer and hence the circulation for the two mid-year quarters became inflated. Without this inflation the average circulation in 1968 was 12,626 per quarter compared with an average of 12,767 per quarter in 1967.

From this, it would appear that the 1,700 free copies which were distributed in the hope that there would be an increased use of EVERY DAY did not produce the results expected.

Re Overture 20, 1968, Presbytery of Winnipeg Re Integration of the Committee on Home Religion with the Board of Christian Education (for text see A&P, G.A. 1968 pp. 402, 403).

This Overture asked that the Committee on Home Religion be made an integral part of the Board of Christian Education in order that the stated purpose of the publication be more adequately fulfilled, and gave supporting reasons for its prayer. The Assembly of 1968 directed that the Overture be referred to the Committee on Home Religion in consultation with the Board of Christian Education, and report in 1969 (A&P G.A. 1968, page 43).

The consultation was held with a committee of the Board of Christian Education, empowered to speak for the Board, and the following answer was acceptable to the committee of the Board of Christian Education and the Committee on Home Religion:

"We recommend that the Committee on Home Religion be continued with its standing terms of reference and continue to publish EVERY DAY as now arranged for, and that the Committee on Family Life, a joint committee of the Board of Christian Education and the Board of Evangelism and Social Action, be involved with the Committee on Home Religion in a study of family life education and how EVERY DAY may be used in it."

Subsequent developments have made this recommendation inapplicable.

Re EVERY DAY and the new Postage Rates.

The Committee on Home Religion was established by the 68th General Assembly (1942). In October 1943 the first issue of EVERY DAY was published under the auspices of the Committee. For twenty-six years it has appeared quarterly without subsidy. This Assembly then may well understand the feelings of the Committee when they learned of the drastic nature of the increase in postage rates made by the Government of Canada and effective April 1, 1969.

Prior to April 1, 1969 the postage rate for EVERY DAY was 2 cents per pound in any amount. The new rate is 25 cents per pound, that is, 4 cents for the first two ounces and 3 cents for each additional two ounces. No parcel may exceed one pound in weight. Five copies of EVERY DAY weigh one pound. An order of fifty copies would involve the wrapping of ten separate parcels plus cost of labour,

wrapping paper, labels and string (or stick paper). The Committee also learned that an increase in printing costs is pending.

In these circumstances a decision could not be made lightly. Experts in the field of printing and mailing were consulted. It was immediately perceived that any reasonable increase in the selling price could not meet the situation. It was likewise felt that any subsidy from the general funds of the Church would need to be very large. Thus, after lengthy discussion and searching examination, the Committee reluctantly reached the conclusion that they must bring to this Assembly a recommendation to the effect that we cease publishing EVERY DAY with the October-November-December 1969 issue.

In coming to this conclusion the Committee would offer thanks to Almighty God for the many years during which he has blessed the use of EVERY DAY.

RECOMMENDATIONS

The Committee therefore beg leave to present three recommendations as follows:

1. That this Assembly direct that the publication of EVERY DAY cease with the October-November-December 1969 issue;
2. That this Assembly direct that the Committee on Home Religion be continued until the 96th General Assembly (1970); and
3. That this Assembly grant permission to the Committee on Home Religion to work with the Board of Christian Education and the Board of Evangelism and Social Action within the framework of their joint Committee on Family Life should this cooperation appear helpful and desirable.

THE ARMED FORCES CHAPLAINCY COMMITTEE

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

Your Committee held one regular meeting during the past year.

No nominations were requested from the Committee for vacancies in the Armed Forces. At the present time there are ten Presbyterian chaplains serving. This is one over our entitlement.

The Convener attended the regular meetings of the Canadian Council of Churches Committee on the Chaplaincy in the Armed Forces except for one meeting which he was unable to attend because of his duties as moderator. He was unable to attend the Annual Retreat for Chaplains held at Elgin House in Muskoka in June, 1968 for the same reason. The Secretary of the Committee attended in his absence.

Major D. J. L. Howson retired in 1968. It is not expected that there will be any further vacancies for a Presbyterian Chaplain for some time.

The regular Remembrance Day Bulletin was prepared in November, 1968. The Presbyterian Record is sent out to chapels and chaplains at home and overseas. Through the courtesy of a small group of friends the Record is also sent to the Armed Forces Colleges in St. Jean, Quebec; Kingston, Ontario and Victoria, British Columbia.

The following chaplains are serving full time: Capt. L. T. Barclay; Commander A. G. Faraday; Capt. W. J. Graham; Capt. W. J. O. Isaac; Lieut. (N) R. A. B. MacLean; Capt. D. S. Moore; Capt. I. Raeburn-Gibson; Major R. J. G. Ritchie; Major P. L. Sams; Capt. S. D. Self.

The reserve chaplains serving in the Armed Forces are as follows: B. K. Molloy, M. S. McLean, B. A. Miles, G. G. Hastings, W. R. Allum, H. MacDonald, A. L. MacKay, W. C. MacBride, R. G. MacMillan, T. M. McKennell, D. R. McKillican, A. C. G. Muir, D. C. Wotherspoon, H. J. McAvoy, J. L. Self, E. P. Aikens, A. R. MacKay, J. S. McBride, A. O. MacLean, R. S. Johnston, W. W. MacNeill, L. D. Hankinson and S. A. Hayes.

During 1968 the sum of \$3,777.98 was received for the budget funds of the Presbyterian Church in Canada from the chapel offerings of the Armed Forces. Over and above the budget offerings a contribution was also received towards the work of the Kenora Fellowship Centre.

In 1969-1970 the special project of the Armed Forces Sunday Schools will be work carried on in the Korean Christian Church in Japan and the missionary contributions from the Sunday Schools will be used towards work among children in

that church. Further details of this project will be published in the Bulletins as well as Missionary Education literature.

In order to keep our Armed Forces Chaplains informed of the missionary work of our Church, copies of the General Board of Missions Annual Report as well as the 1969 calendar and the Program Planner for 1968-1969 were sent to all chaplains.

RECOMMENDATION

That this General Assembly assure the Chaplain-General (P) and all our ministers serving as Chaplains in the Armed Forces of our prayers for and our interest in their ministry.

REPORT OF THE RECORD COMMITTEE

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

There are two problems that the Committee on The Presbyterian Record would share with the General Assembly at this time.

The first is the decreasing circulation of our national magazine. The number of paid subscriptions at March 31, 1969, was 88,529, a decrease of 1,520 since the same date last year.

We are aware of the decline in communicant membership and the consequent smaller number of households reported. But we are concerned that The Record reach a larger number of Presbyterian homes.

Your committee depends upon presbyteries to encourage congregations in participation in the Every Home Plan. We have already asked that The Record be placed on the docket of each presbytery for discussion, and that presbyteries report the results to this committee.

We are undertaking a survey of readers with the object of continuing to change and to improve the magazine to meet their needs.

The second problem is that of increased postage. The Presbyterian Record has been accepted for second class mailing under the new regulations, but the cost under the new rates from April onwards has increased tremendously.

Our committee is reluctant to raise the subscription rate. At present we have 82,114 subscriptions at one dollar each on the Every Home Plan, 6,208 individual subscriptions at \$2.00 each, and 207 short-term student subscriptions at 85c. each.

From time to time we propose to publish a 32-page magazine instead of 36 pages. The Record is now smaller in page size by one eighth of an inch all round. We will ask this General Assembly to authorize publication of ten issues a year instead of eleven, to keep costs down. The proposal is that the September and October issues be combined in one.

The entire subscription list has now been converted to computer mailing, and in time this process will facilitate the work of the circulation department.

We trust that full discussion of the magazine, its purpose, policy and promotion, will take place during this General Assembly.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That the Every Home Plan be endorsed by this 95th General Assembly and commended to all presbyteries and congregations as an effective means of enlisting the interest and support of all our people.
2. That The Record Committee be authorized to reduce the number of issues of the magazine from eleven annually to ten, if and when budget problems make this necessary.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH WORSHIP

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

The Committee on Church Worship met in Toronto on March 11th and considered a variety of matters which fall within the purview of its responsibility — among them, the following:

(1) *Our Relationship with the Committee on the Revision of the Book of Praise*

This relationship continues to be harmonious and mutually helpful. It is maintained

- a. By some members of each Committee serving on both Committees;
- b. By members of the Worship Committee receiving the minutes of the Revision Committee; and
- c. By the Revision Committee inviting suggestions from the Parent-Committee, which suggestions are given prompt and serious attention.

We unanimously express our support of the work of the Revision Committee. Their task is not an easy one, but, for what it is worth, we offer our encouragement and eagerly await the day when their labours — which from the beginning have been applied with remarkable dedication — are ultimately brought to completion.

(2) *Re. Recommendation 1 of last year*

This recommendation, in answer to Overture 31, A. and P. 1966, and approved by last Assembly, reads as follows: "That the Canadian Council of Churches be urged to prepare a National Prayer in consultation with our brethren of the Roman Catholic Church, and that the Church Worship Committee report further on the matter to the next Assembly."

Our report is that this request has been forwarded to the Canadian Council of Churches, whose Faith and Order Commission studied the matter. Their reply to our request was unanimously in the negative: their reason being a feeling "that there was grave doubt of the suitability of such a prayer and about whether it would actually be used if provided." (quotation from J. C. Hay, Secretary of the Faith and Order Commission, Canadian Council of Churches).

(3) *Re. Responsive Readings*

Recommendation 5 of the Revision Committee's presentation to the Assembly last year asks for guidance re "possible inclusion of responsive readings in the new Book of Praise." Our Committee resolved to share this responsibility with the Revision Committee and, to that end, have appointed a sub-committee "to prepare a draft-outline of responsive readings suitable for inclusion in the revised Book of Praise."

(4) *Public Worship*

This Committee recognizes the existence of considerable disquietude within the Church over traditional norms of public worship. This disquietude is evidently a part of the general ferment of our time. Not uncommonly the charge is made that the Church is ineffectively communicating her message, is "out of step" with the social trends of today, is "out of tune" with the aspirations of contemporary society, is failing to engage the people in meaningful experiences of worship and praise.

We welcome this criticism, and are of the opinion that it is not entirely unwarranted. But we are also of the opinion that our traditional patterns of worship are in large measure acceptable and satisfying to many within our congregations. On this question there is obviously an intermingling of unease and contentment. No doubt this has always been the case, though more conspicuously today.

Having regard for this condition, and with a view to improving our worship practices, we recommend that ministers and kirk-sessions make every effort to preserve the best of the past (in terms of worship forms), and to experiment with new and "contemporary" forms.

The fact is that many congregations are now devoting their Sunday evenings almost exclusively to experimentation, while adhering to more traditional forms at their morning services.

We suggest a wider use of drama, dialogue, panel discussion, musical combos, etc., thus allowing for a more conscious sense of participation on the part of the entire congregation. We also suggest that, whatever forms are used, care should be taken to present all aspects of worship "decently and in order". Slovenliness can, and often does, result when there is a forgetfulness of the basic principles of Christian worship: dignity, simplicity, and reverence.

Finally, we would observe that the historic elements of worship are prayer, praise, preaching, the Holy Scriptures, and the sacraments. While these have come down to us with scriptural authority and have been tested and proven through almost 2000 years of Christian experience, they would also seem to be indispensable. Their indispensability, however, should not preclude the advisability of experimenting with them in order to realize such variations of worship expression as will be more sensitive and responsive to the spiritual needs of our day.

RECOMMENDATION

That the joint expense allocation, which this Committee shares with the Revision Committee, be \$2,000.00.

COMMITTEE ON CHURCH ARCHITECTURE

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

The Committee on Church Architecture has, in the past year and a half, been reviewing its procedures and policies. This report indicates some of our concerns, which we wish to be raised for discussion and debate in this year's General Assembly and in the Church at large.

Increasingly we are awed by the extent of the problems facing the Church in a period of spiralling building costs, rapid social and ecclesiastical change, and the physical degeneration of many older urban buildings. This is happening within the context of some increase in financial resources but little if any numerical growth. The architectural component in these matters has been our field of study.

Purpose of the Committee

The Committee on Church Architecture was established by General Assembly for consultation with congregations planning building programmes to prevent architectural mistakes, though these still occur. The Church should be reminded that Presbyteries have authority to overrule any decisions this Committee might take or any advice it might give. Presbyteries should take very seriously their responsibilities in helping to guide congregations—from the earliest stages of discussion about a building programme through to a conclusion. However, each Presbytery should also be reminded of the ruling of the 1962 Assembly that it must receive the report of this Committee before it grants final approval to the congregation.

The Committee's main function is to be watch-dog: to review preliminary (or design) drawings of projects and to offer advice on them, giving approval to them before the lending agencies of the Presbyterian Church in Canada will authorize loans. In some cases projects have been under construction before the Committee was consulted, effectively negating the purpose of the Committee. In other cases, and this has been the cause of considerable misunderstanding, congregations have not retained an architect, countering a directive of General Assembly. A package-deal arrangement may result in an adequate building, but in many cases the project has been ill advised; the dangers of the package-deal are sufficiently great that the Committee attempts to enforce the decision of the General Assembly to require the services of an architect.

The concerns of the Committee on Church Architecture overlap with those of Presbyteries, the General Board of Missions (especially its Extension Committee), the Synod Corporations (Presbyterian Church Building Corporation), and the Church Lending Fund. Each is concerned with different aspects of a building project and approval by one does not imply approval by others. There is at the moment no adequate relationship between these groups. However, our Committee is very grateful for the work of the Board of Missions and of the Synod Corporations in helping congregations to set and maintain budgets for projects. Anything that could be done further to streamline procedures in setting financial limits and granting approvals would seem wise to this Committee. If a group to co-ordinate planning and development were set up, the Committee on Church Architecture, among others, should be considered for inclusion.

In short, this Committee's purpose is to implement the existing decisions of General Assembly. To do this, the Committee has a role to play in:

- (a) advising congregations on how to retain an architect;
- (b) advising on what to expect from an architect within his normal fee structure;
- (c) advising on the pitfalls of a package-deal or do-it-yourself approach;
- (d) encouraging congregations to evolve and keep to a strict (and realistic) budget;
- (e) advising on how to prepare a feasibility study of the need for, size and cost of a building;

- (f) advising on setting up a building committee;
- (g) reviewing design drawings (and also preliminary working drawings if the project has undergone significant change since the design stage) before final Presbytery approval.

Theology of Church Architecture

Included in our discussions this year has been some study of the theology of church architecture. The reason for this is simple: every building for worship, Christian education and social service will convey something either theologically correct or incorrect, to the observer. In lieu of presenting a statement on this, we recommend to all congregations contemplating a building programme the book *Christ and Architecture: Building Presbyterian/Reformed Churches* by D. J. Bruggink and C. H. Droppers (Eerdmans, Grand Rapids, 1965).

Two important items have stood out as we discussed theology: the effect of a doctrine of the church and of the ministry upon the extent and form of the church building. These are rather neglected concerns at the local level. We urge congregations to make a careful study of these matters and to convey the results to their architects before asking them to undertake the design of a suitable structure for congregational needs.

All congregations, new or old, face the problem of how to master-plan their space requirements for all congregational activity. One issue that arises for new congregations is whether a church building is necessary to worship in the reformed tradition. Some of the Committee feel that in the early stages at least a building project is impractical. Others see a building as the beginning of a forward movement of the congregation. However, within our theological framework there is latitude for congregations to explore the best ways for each to provide for its requirements.

In its survey of building projects across the country, this Committee sees a succession of buildings patterned upon one stereotyped view of the Church and its ministry. There is little indication in the buildings that we inherit a rich tradition of variety and flexibility—from the New Testament on down. Most projects seem predicated upon a limited view of the ministry, and an understanding of the Church that sets the desirable size at a level which will support an ordained minister and pay off the mortgage on the building.

Good buildings are the result of careful analysis and theological awareness by the congregation, coupled with clear direction to a competent architect. The combination is all too rare. The inadequate expression in many of our buildings is largely the fault of the congregation.

Capital Expenditures

In some cases large amounts of money are spent each year on buildings inadequately motivated, incorrectly conceived or injudiciously estimated as necessary. As well, some recently erected churches, which were the result of very careful planning, located strategically and built well are in severe financial difficulties. Other well established congregations are beginning to feel that a crisis point is approaching soon. While givings are rising in the church at large, overall membership is in slow decline.

We wish to raise a question about where our financial resources can best be used. We do not suggest that buildings are unnecessary, they are simply tools to be used in the real life and work of a congregation. But we fear the danger of becoming building oriented, especially when a congregation must put all its resources and energies into building expenses and payment of a mortgage. Others can comment better on the debilitating effects this may have on a congregation's witness.

Because buildings may lock a congregation into a particular pattern of ministry, we recommend flexibility in any building project. A congregation, especially in a rapidly changing neighbourhood, can have such a large capital outlay at stake that it becomes unable to meet new or different needs as they arise.

There is no reason to expect this situation to improve. Rising construction costs are not likely to slow down noticeably, and these costs are rising faster than the Church's capacity to afford them. This has a side effect in the rapidly increasing value of church properties, which creates an additional tension as the congregation attempts to understand its place in the life of the neighbourhood in which it is set.

Inner City Churches

Many of the churches that have provided the backbone of the resources and personnel of the Church are located in the old once residential but now changing areas of our major cities. These congregations are facing stupendous problems, not just with old and deteriorating (and sometimes irrelevant) buildings, but also in their locations with respect to the actual geographic distribution of the membership. Some of these will be tempted increasingly to relocate to an area either nearer their constituency or with more potential. This temptation can be spurred by an almost irresistible offer for the site (because of the need for easy development land), or simply by the slow death of the congregation as a result of its inability to accept the changed conditions and to meet them with new kinds of evangelism and service.

This could soon lead to a sharp reduction in the Presbyterian witness in our large cities. In the near future, however, the present movement back into the city centres will accelerate, and the Church may find itself out of step with population shifts. Town planners, management and development consultants, architects and engineers, sociologists, urban redevelopment planners could be of great help to Presbyteries in developing strategies to meet such challenges.

In the inner city, of all places, old structures and old patterns of ministry and service and outreach may not be adequate. The inner city church which is housed in a 60 or 80 year old building with a waning congregation faces a genuine quandary in responding to the changed circumstances.

Such a situation demands study by the congregation of the neighbourhood it must serve. It must ask about present and future density in the area, its character and street layout, its assessment values now and in the future. It must query the relationship between this church and others, between this church and social agencies working there, between church and schools. It should be willing to consider new emphases in its ministry to reach specific age groups or ethnic groups or social groups.

A study may suggest the need for drastic changes in the physical structures serving the congregation: remodelling, curtailing or adding to the existing facilities. There are examples to show how new life has been encouraged by such changes. But this must always be accompanied by a new vision of people's needs and the way to meet them with the gospel of Jesus Christ.

There may be wisdom in establishing, as a part of a planning and development group, an advisory panel on 'Use of Church Properties in the Inner City,' whose main function would be consultative. The will to change and move ahead would have to originate in the local congregation.

Suburban and Rural Areas

How long congregations, even in relatively affluent and stable areas, can afford the luxury of a single purpose or single occupancy building is an open question. Some suburban experiments have been attempted to reduce capital expenditures: joint buildings with other congregations and shopping centre rental locations are the two best known. This is not the full range of choice available: the Committee believes that in the local situation and in the Presbytery more creativity can be brought to bear on the problem to discover other ways of providing facilities at reduced cost. Indications that a congregation can afford a single occupancy building need not settle the question whether to build and what to build. Suburban and rural congregations will find themselves asking much the same questions as their urban friends about the needs of the area, how their ministry should be shaped to meet those needs, and the physical structures necessary for the job.

Possibly there will be some situations where a congregation feels it will be able to minister effectively without any buildings. The Committee on Church Architecture should like to encourage, selectively, such experiments.

Summary

The stress in this study report has been on problems to be faced and questions to be asked. We are well aware that this is one-sided, but since we are concerned with problem-solving we stress this by choice. The notes that have been sounded throughout are (a) rapid change; (b) decrease in resources and personnel; (c) increasing discrepancy between capital expenditures necessary in a building programme and the ability to pay for them; (d) the need for creativity in planning and flexibility in executing any programme to provide space for congregational needs.

An essential in any development programme is study — study of the congregation and the area in which it is set, study of the financial resources, study of the theological implications of any structure, study of the future expectations for the area and the congregation. We understand one of our functions to be to encourage congregations and Presbyteries to do such studies and to act upon the results.

To help in some of the procedural matters, the Committee is preparing a mimeographed booklet to guide congregations. This will include information on the kinds of study a building committee might undertake before moving into a building programme, how to select an architect, what to expect from him, various types of contractual arrangements, cost estimates, the approvals necessary etc.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That the General Assembly establish an advisory panel on the Use of Church Properties in the Inner City;
2. That, in any reorganization of the Boards and Committees of General Assembly such as that under study by the L.A.M.P. Committee, the Committee on Church Architecture and the above mentioned advisory panel together with other committees involved, be put together in a Planning and Development Agency.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE RE: RECOMMENDATION 3, PRESBYTERIAN COLLEGE, MONTREAL, A & P, 1966 PAGES 356, 357 AND A & P, 1967 PAGES 98, 300-302

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

The Special Committee appointed by the 92nd General Assembly to consider Recommendation 3, Presbyterian College, Montreal, 1966 (appointment of professors for fixed but renewable terms) consists of Dr. H. D. Stewart, Convener, Drs. D. C. Hill and L. H. Fowler, Ministers; Mr. Robin Ross and Mr. Alan Gordon, Elders. The Committee reported to the 93rd General Assembly (see A & P, 1967, pages 300-302) and was directed to report to the 94th General Assembly after consultation with the Committee on the Structure of Theological Education (A & P, 1967, page 98). Due to sundry difficulties, the consultation was not held until February 7th, 1969.

The Committee on the Structure of Theological Education, following the consultation, resolved as follows: "That approval in principal be given . . . provided

that it be related to a realistic salary scale, and that the Boards and Senates of the Colleges be granted authority to appoint Lecturers and Assistant Professors, and to make such promotions as may be deemed advisable, and to recommend to the General Assembly appointments and promotions to the positions of Associate and/or Full Professors."

Your Special Committee recommends as follows:

1. That this Assembly likewise give approval to the principle outlined in Acts and Proceedings, 1967, page 302 (indicated thereon in 3. and following) and appoint a Committee to consider the question further within the terms of the resolution of the Committee on the Structure of Theological Education, and to report to Assembly, 1970, with recommendations.
2. That the Special Committee be discharged.

**REPORT OF THE JUDICIAL COMMITTEE RE:
RECOMMENDATION NO. 3, 1968
THE PRESBYTERIAN COLLEGE, MONTREAL**

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

The Judicial Committee appointed by the 94th General Assembly to consider and issue upon Recommendation No. 3, Report of The Board of The Presbyterian College, Montreal (A & P, 1968, page 365) re: the title 'Professor Emeritus' for Dr. C. Ritchie Bell and composed of Drs. E. A. Thomson, S. W. Vance, L. H. Fowler, Messrs. J. R. Waldie, W. MacNeill and J. D. C. Jack, Chairman, hereby reports its deliberations and judgment.

Meeting on three occasions, February 26th, March 7th (during which a representative of the Board was heard) and March 14th, the Committee found no canonical statute that could be applied directly in this instance. Nor has it been able to find a directly applicable precedent in wont and usage upon which to base the granting of such a request.

It finds it must take its direction from Section 247 of the Book of Forms whose subject is the conferring of the title 'Minister Emeritus' upon a parish minister, and attempt to apply the principle embodied therein to the matter at hand. This legislation envisages the proper application of such a title to a minister who, 'having resigned his charge on account of the infirmities of advanced years is precluded by age from resumption of the work of the pastorate and that it is *not* to be applied to a minister so long as his connection with his congregation is such that in virtue of it he retains his right to discharge ministerial and judicial functions as one of its members.'

By way of interpretation of the above, the committee takes the view that those who can assume no formal continuous ministerial responsibilities in a pastorate by reason of infirmity, whose advanced years render them less mobile and whose activity is severely restricted and circumscribed thereby are fit subjects for the title. The canon seems to preclude such as are able to discharge ministerial functions such as moderating in a Kirk Session or participating in the debates of a church court by reason of his name being upon the Constituent Roll of some Presbytery.

In considering the title of 'Professor Emeritus,' the Committee finds that it must proceed by analogy and that the office of 'Professor' in one of our Colleges is but another form or extension of ministry in general. (Witness the practice of the Church in inducting such a one into his chair upon his answering the call of the Church and the placing of his name on the Roll of the Presbytery in whose bounds the college is situated.) A professor may indeed resign his chair and may be called to one of the charges of the Church, be inducted and thus resume the duties of the pastorate and discharge ministerial and judicial functions.

The General Assembly of 1958 granted permission to The Board of The Presbyterian College to confer upon Dr. F. Scott Mackenzie the title of Principal Emeritus. The Committee understands, however, that he resigned his office as professor and did not take up a pastorate. In passing, the Committee notes that with such permission granted, the Reverend the Presbytery of Montreal seems not to have acted thereon in the listing of its ministers in the Acts and Proceedings.

The Committee is acutely aware of Dr. Bell's great and distinguished service to the Church as minister and Moderator and to The Presbyterian College in particular as professor and registrar. It is aware of his warm personality and great gifts, especially in the field of recruitment. It expresses gratitude to the present chairman of The Board of The Presbyterian College who, in his appearance before it, underlined and verified these facts. It feels that Dr. Bell's ministry has not yet reached the stage where the title 'Emeritus' is either a fitting or a proper designation for the honour he deserves and therefore feels it must deny the request of Recommendation No. 3 1968 of The Board of The Presbyterian College, Montreal in the terms in which it is made.

If the Committee may be permitted to go beyond its terms of reference, it records its opinion that Dr. Bell would be more appropriately honoured and the interests of the Board better served by the conferring of the title 'Honourary Professor' upon Dr. Bell. It requests the 95th General Assembly for permission to present the following motion: That this Assembly grant permission to the Board of The Presbyterian College Montreal to confer forthwith upon Dr. C. Ritchie Bell the title of Honourary Professor, The Presbyterian College, Montreal.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT, 1968**

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

The Board of Management of the Presbyterian College, Montreal, report a year of satisfactory progress in the work of extending our usefulness to the Church in preparing her Ministry for their role in the unsettled world of today.

As intimated in our report of last year, our programme of Continuing Education for Ministers was extended to two courses throughout the Session. The first course, held during late October and early November, fell short of our enrolment expectations, largely owing to the Postal strike which curtailed our publicity arrangements. The second course, held in January, was most successful, with full enrolment and enthusiastic participation.

As a result of our favourable experience with these courses, the Board and Senate have decided to expand the programme for the forthcoming academic year by

adding a third course immediately after Easter. We would urge Presbyteries and Congregations to support this effort to provide refresher courses to men in the Parish ministry by making it possible for Ministers to update their studies in this way. The College is making every effort to meet the expense of this programme by providing accommodation and meals for those attending, but we are hopeful that the Congregations involved will meet the travelling expenses and cost of Pulpit supply of their Ministers.

At a meeting of the Board of Management on March 20th, Principal Robert Lennox intimated in a letter to the Board that he had been invited to assume the Chair of Old Testament Literature and Exegesis at Knox Theological College. The Principal intimated that, with the approval of the General Assembly, he felt that he should accept this appointment, and asked that his resignation as Principal of The Presbyterian College, Montreal, be transmitted to your Venerable Body. Your Board has received with great regret the Principal's decision to relinquish the Principalship of the College he has served with great distinction and devotion over a period of some twenty-three years. In all our efforts to increase the effectiveness of the College in the life of the Church, Dr. Lennox has given us leadership, and his enthusiasm and dedication have been a source of great encouragement to us. We wish for him every blessing as he continues to serve the Church in this new sphere of useful service.

Your Board has continued to carry on negotiations with the Faculty of Divinity of McGill University, in accordance with Recommendation 2 of our report to your Venerable Body last year, which was approved. The successful conclusion of these negotiations is anticipated and our students have been taking classes at McGill since last autumn. The association with McGill envisions the appointment of Professor Charles H. H. Scobie and Professor H. Keith Markell to the Faculty of Divinity of McGill University and their consequent resignations as professors of The College. With their resignations and the resignation of Principal Lennox, our Faculty will be greatly reduced. We would therefore seek the permission of your Venerable Body to appoint annually as ex-officio members of our Faculty and of the Senate of The College, any professor or professors of the Faculty of Divinity of McGill University who is or are a member or members of a Congregation of The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

Owing to our new relationship with the Faculty of Divinity and the fact that our students are carrying on the major part of their studies under these changed conditions, your Board has endeavoured to cultivate with even greater intensity our corporate life within the College and, by various means, to strengthen the link between the College and the Church, particularly in those Congregations within the immediate area of the College.

In common with other Boards of the Church, we have been asked to make a contribution to the work of the Committee on the Life and Mission of the Church. Your Board, recognizing the importance of this project, has by careful budgeting been able to donate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars to this cause.

As in others years, we have had many expressions of interest in the work of the College in the form of bursaries, scholarships, prizes and donations for our general expenses. To these generous donors and to all friends who have encouraged and supported us we would express our thanks.

The work of the Principal and Faculty of the College is worthy of our sincere appreciation. Our Sessional Lecturers have served with great competence and the contribution of our whole staff to the work of the College has been outstanding.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That the Board of The Presbyterian College respectfully recommends that the resignation of the Reverend Robert Lennox, M.A., Ph.D., D.D., as Principal of The Presbyterian College, Montreal, be received and accepted by your Venerable Body.

2. That your Board be permitted to appoint annually as ex-officio members of the Faculty and Senate of The Presbyterian College, Montreal, any professor of the Faculty of Divinity of McGill University who is a member of a Congregation of The Presbyterian Church in Canada.
3. That Presbyteries and Congregations within their bounds be urged to make provision for as many Ministers as possible to avail themselves of one of the courses in Continuing Ministerial Education offered by The College.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SENATE OF THE PRESBYTERIAN COLLEGE, MONTREAL, FOR THE SESSION 1968-69

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

The academic work of the College during the Session of 1968-69 has been largely governed by the decision of the 94th General Assembly that the College become one of the participating schools in the McGill University Faculty of Divinity. Although this arrangement has not yet been formalized, we have proceeded on the assumption that in due course it would be and, so far as possible, our classes this year have been integrated with those of the Faculty of Divinity. The graduating class of 1969 will receive the degree of the College, but it is anticipated that those who may graduate in 1970 will be eligible for the McGill B.D. Most of the courses this Session have been taken with the McGill students, and all members of the College Faculty have shared in the teaching programme of the Faculty of Divinity. A good deal of attention has been devoted throughout the Session to proposed changes in the curriculum, always bearing in mind the requirements of the Church for ordination, and various experiments in the restructuring of courses and in teaching methods have been undertaken.

Courses specially designed for our own students, such as those in Church Government and Westminster Standards, have continued to be given by Professor D. N. MacMillan, and we are much indebted to the Reverend Dr. C. Ritchie Bell who has served as Sessional Lecturer in Pastoral Theology and Homiletics. The Very Rev. Dr. Clifton J. MacKay was Director of Field Work during the first term but found that his Moderatorial duties did not permit him to continue in this capacity, and in the second term the Rev. Harry A. Crawford assumed the post of acting director.

At the beginning of the Session 15 students were enrolled in Theology, six in the Third Year, five in the Second Year, three in the First Year, and one partial student who was obliged to withdraw owing to ill health.

The names of those enrolled in first year were David Collins (Partial), Robert P. Fourney, James E. Matheson, B.A., and J. Kenneth McLeod.

The names of those enrolled in the second year were Robert W. Cruickshank, B.A., J. Colin MacIver, B.A., B.Ed., David C. Robertson (Assembly), Gerald E. Sarcen, B.A., and W. Campbell Smyth (Assembly).

The names of those enrolled in the graduating year were John A. Bodkin, B.A., James W. Davidson, B.A., Lloyd W. Fourney, B.A., William C. MacLellan, B.Sc. (Agr.), Cedric C. Pettigrew, B.A., and Leslie G. Smith (Assembly).

Five members of the graduating year were working toward the B.D. degree, and four others were expected to fulfil the requirements for the B.D. extra-murally.

The Senate at its meeting on February 13th agreed to offer the degree of Doctor of Divinity, honoris causa, to the Rev. W. D. Grant Hollingworth, B.A. and the Rev. Donald B. MacKay, B.A., Th.B.

With the resignation of the Rev. Dr. Neil G. Smith as Librarian, and pending consummation of the agreement with McGill University, Mrs. Scarth Macdonnell was appointed Librarian on a part-time basis, and with student assistance, for the Session of 1968-69. We are grateful to Mrs. Macdonnell for the efficient manner in which she has performed her duties during this interim period.

Arrangements have been made for the holding of the one hundred and second annual Convocation of the College on Wednesday, April 30th.

7. BEQUEST

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
Year Ended December 31, 1968

1. Fixed assets are shown mainly at cost but include properties which have been donated and on which a fair value has been placed at the time of acquisition.
2. Accumulated depreciation, covering all properties and furniture and fixtures, has been increased by \$205,000 by a transfer from capital.
3. The assets and liabilities of Knox, Presbyterian and Ewart Colleges, Saskatoon Residence, Armagh and St. Andrew's Hall are included in the balance sheet only to the extent of fixed assets.
4. On instruction of The Trustee Board all securities held on behalf of the Church were revalued at the market prices prevailing on December 31, 1968 and have been so stated in all the financial reports.
5. Except for the amount allocated from the Budget, no receipts or disbursements have been included in the statements of income and expenditure for the following:
Knox, Presbyterian and Ewart Colleges, St. Andrew's Hall, Saskatoon Residence, Pension Fund, Penmarvian, Presbyterian Record, Armagh.
6. Income of the J. B. Maclean Bequest Fund has been included in the statement of income and expenditure only to the extent of the amount received from the Fund (\$45,000). A separate statement covering this Fund has been prepared.
7. The assets and liabilities of the Pension Fund are not included in this statement. A separate statement covering this Fund has been prepared.
8. Investment income includes \$16,411 earned on short-term investments of National Development Fund monies. The 94th General Assembly (A & P, pages 325 and 93) authorized these investments and provided that the income derived therefrom be used to support the implementation of the increments to the basic stipend as approved by the 93rd General Assembly. As indicated in Note 11 an amount of \$23,639 was required for the increments made effective on April 1, 1968.
9. Changes in authorized expenditures by the Administrative Council, subsequent to General Assembly, are included.
10. Total received to December 31, 1968 from National Development Fund was \$808,160. Expenses amounted to \$602,402 and \$12,000 was expended for Overseas Missions projects and \$3,101 for a Knox College project. Of the remaining \$490,657 an amount of \$490,644 has been invested in short-term securities.
11. Authorized expenditures included an amount of \$52,500 for stipend increments. Amounts required were charged to Home Missions and its authorized expenditures increased accordingly. The total required was \$23,639, leaving a difference of \$28,861 unexpended.
12. The generous response of \$176,103 to the Nigeria-Biafra Appeal does not represent the entire contribution of the Church to this need. Considerable amounts have been expended through Overseas Missions current accounts to cover the salaries and expenses of individual missionaries specifically assigned to relief activities in Nigeria and Biafra and salaries and expenses of Overseas staff particularly the Overseas Secretary who has spent a major part of his time on this problem.
13. The 94th General Assembly instructed and authorized "its several Boards and Committees to make adjustments in 1968 and 1969 budgets so as to provide the funds necessary for the work of this Committee" (A & P page 94). Accordingly an amount of \$10,686 was transferred from the following Boards:

14. The statement of Income and Expenditure for 1967 showed a disbursement of \$4,100 towards the Christian Pavilion at Expo '67. During 1968 an amount of \$2,761 was returned to the Church from the surplus of Pavilion funds. Since 1967 accounts were closed, this amount was added to the Reserve for Emergencies.
15. An amount of \$76,142 was received from the City of Montreal as a deposit towards taking over Tyndale House property. Net income thereon has amounted to \$2,153. Of the total of \$78,295 an amount of \$70,000 has been invested in short-term securities.

SYNOD OF THE ATLANTIC PROVINCES

THE REVEREND SAMUEL DAVIES, PH.D.

The Reverend Samuel Davies, Ph.D., passed away at Woodstock, Ontario, on June 27th, 1968. The funeral service was conducted by Rev. W. A. Henderson, retiring Moderator of the Presbytery of Paris, and Minister of Knox Church, Woodstock, where Dr. Davies attended. Mr. Henderson was assisted by the Clerk of the Presbytery of Paris, Rev. D. C. MacDonald.

Dr. Davies was born in Wales, November 17, 1889. After coming to Canada, he studied Theology at Robertson College, Edmonton, graduating in the Spring of 1921. He was ordained to the Christian Ministry in May of that same year. Later he obtained the degree of Doctor of Philosophy from Hartford Seminary in the United States. He served our Church at Wainwright, Alberta; Smiths Falls, Ontario; and St. Andrew's, New Brunswick. Because of failing health he retired from the active ministry in 1949.

Dr. Davies brought his scholarly approach to the task of the Ministry and left a deep impression on all who knew him. In 1942 the Synod of the Maritime Provinces honoured him by electing him their Moderator.

Dr. Davies is survived by his wife, the former Aleda Irene Lamminan, and their daughter, Gwynneth, who resides in Montreal, Quebec; to both of whom the Presbytery of Paris extends deepest sympathy.

SYNOD OF MONTREAL AND OTTAWA

THE REVEREND JOHN HARDWICK, D.D.

On Sunday, July 28th, 1968, there passed away in the Memorial Hospital, Listowel, Ontario, after a very short illness, The Rev. John Hardwick, D.D., a senior minister of our Church and one of the rapidly dwindling group who were active in the Church's ministry in the years preceding 1925. In that critical period he took an active and effective part in the struggle to maintain The Presbyterian Church in Canada, and throughout the years his ministry has been one of singular fidelity and fruitfulness, a blessing to many in the congregations in which he has laboured, and a cause for devout thanksgiving to Almighty God.

Dr. Hardwick received his theological education in The Presbyterian College, Montreal, from which he graduated in 1915. The early years of his ministry were spent within the bounds of the Synod of the Maritime Provinces, but following the disruption of the Church in 1925, he accepted a call to the newly organized Presbyterian Church in Carleton Place, Ontario, a congregation made up of several minority groups from churches which had entered union by a majority vote, and where he laboured with conspicuous success in the delicate task of welding these groups into one united whole. He held subsequent pastorates at various points, both in eastern and western Canada, among them being Teeswater, Morrisburg and Monkton in Ontario, Campbellton, New Brunswick, St. Andrew's, Saskatoon, in Saskatchewan, and for a short time Port Alberni, B.C. Following his official retirement a few years

ago, he was prevailed on to accept an appointment as Stated Supply at St. Andrew's East in the Presbytery of Montreal where he speedily endeared himself both to the congregation and to his fellow-presbyters who now desire to place on record their grateful memory of his counsel and fellowship and their deep sorrow and sense of loss in his death.

It is gratifying to remember that Dr. Hardwick in his lifetime was not left without practical and tangible expression of the esteem in which he was held throughout the Church, and to note in particular that in 1958 his Alma Mater, The Presbyterian College, Montreal, in recognition of his distinguished service to the Church, conferred on him the highest honour in the gift of the College, the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity.

Other honours came to Dr. Hardwick, among them being his election as Moderator of the Synod of Saskatchewan, 1940-1944. For a number of years he was a valued member of The General Board of Missions. His service in this field still bears fruit.

Dr. Hardwick was twice married. To him and his first wife (nee Georgia Foster) were born a family of three sons and one daughter, John, of Bristol, England, Dr. David and James of Ottawa, and Janet (Mrs. Ross Imrie) of Winnipeg, all of whom survive him, and to whom, along with his second wife and sorrowing widow (nee Lyall Erskine) the Presbytery would extend its warmest sympathy.

Funeral services were held on Wednesday, July 31st, in Knox Church, Monkton, Ontario, conducted by the minister, The Rev. C. A. Winn, assisted by The Rev. Dr. F. Scott Mackenzie, with interment following in Elma Centre Cemetery.

THE REVEREND C. J. ST. CLAIR JEANS, D.D.

The Rev. C. J. St. Clair Jeans, D.D., died in Lachute, Quebec, on December 6th, 1968, at the age of 77 years. At the time of his death Dr. Jeans was serving as stated supply at St. Andrew's East.

Born in Scotland, Dr. Jeans came in 1910 to the U.S.A. with his parents. Five years later he returned to Glasgow University where he graduated in Arts and Theology and was ordained in 1922. He served in the U.S.A. until 1927, when he was called to Summerside, P.E.I. From there he was called to the Church of St. John and St. Stephen in Saint John, N.B., where he served from the beginning of 1935 until 1950. After a four year period of service in the U.S.A. he returned to Canada and served in Arnprior, Ontario, from 1954 until his retirement in December, 1966.

Dr. Jeans was well loved by his family, his congregations and his fellow ministers. He was an eminent preacher, a devoted pastor, a Christian statesman of God. Christ fashioned his character, governed his thought, determined his career, anchored his intellect, was the source of his power, the eternal hope of his heart, and the centre of his preaching. Dr. Jeans believed with his whole heart in the power of the Risen Christ. He lived richly here because he believed he would live forever.

The funeral was held on December 9th, 1968, in the Presbyterian Church, St. Andrew's East, Quebec, and was conducted by Dr. C. Ritchie Bell, assisted by Dr. W. Harold Reid of St. Andrew's East and by Rev. Leo E. Hughes of Arnprior.

Dr. Jeans is survived by his wife, Anna, and his son, Rev. C. J. Jeans of the Methodist Church in Middleboro, Mass., U.S.A.

SYNOD OF TORONTO AND KINGSTON

THE REVEREND FREDERICK DIXON DOUGLAS, B.A., M.TH.

The Presbytery of West Toronto records with sorrow the passing away of the Rev. Frederick Dixon Douglas, minister of St. Paul's Church, Toronto. His death

occurred in St. Michael's Hospital on September 12, 1968, following a brief illness. He was 65 years of age.

Mr. Douglas was born in Edinburgh, Scotland. After receiving his Bachelor of Arts degree at Bishop's College, Lennoxville, Quebec, he took theological studies at McGill University, Montreal, and later received his Master of Theology degree at Columbia University, New York.

In 1934 Mr. Douglas was married to Miss Lenna Berry of Gananoque, Ontario, and the following year was ordained to the Christian ministry. He is survived by his wife, his son, Dr. Fred G. V. Douglas, M.D., and daughter, Mary, Mrs. Robert McKinney, both of Toronto. He first served in Chesterville in the Presbytery of Brockville, then at Monkton, in the Presbytery of Stratford, and then Glencoe, in the Presbytery of London. On December 11, 1941, he was inducted to the congregation of St. Paul's Church, Toronto.

In 1966, on the occasion of his 25 years of faithful ministry at St. Paul's, Mr. and Mrs. Douglas were honoured by the congregation. Special mention was made of Mr. Douglas' scholarly sermons, and his able exegesis of Old Testament Scriptures; also his faithfulness in visiting the sick and shut-ins.

Funeral service was conducted at the Earle Elliott Funeral Home, North Yonge St., September 14, 1968 with interment in Mount Pleasant Cemetery. The Rev. Earl Smith, Moderator of the Presbytery of West Toronto, presided, and was assisted by the Rev. J. M. Laird, who presented a biographical sketch, and by the Rev. P. L. Storms, who delivered the sermon.

THE REVEREND ROBERT H. M. KERR, B.A., B.D.

The Presbytery of East Toronto wishes to place on record its sorrow in the death of a beloved brother, Rev. R. H. M. Kerr, B.A., B.D., a good soldier of Jesus Christ, a faithful Minister of Christ's Church, and Veteran of the Armed Forces, who passed to his eternal reward on Remembrance Day, November 11th, 1968. The Presbytery conveys its deepest sympathy to his widow and daughter, his relatives in Ireland, and to the congregation of Trinity Church in their loss.

Mr. Kerr was born at Portglenone, Co. Antrim, Northern Ireland. On completion of his public school education he assisted his father in his Road Contracting business, later completing his High School in Brandon Man. As a young lad, he committed his life to Jesus Christ, his Saviour and Lord, and soon declared a desire to serve his Master in the preaching, teaching ministry. He worked for some time with the Belfast City Mission before coming to study in Canada. He graduated from Knox College in 1936. He was called to Chesley, and later to St. Andrew's Streetsville. It was when he was Minister at Streetsville that he was called to be a Chaplain in the Canadian Army. He served in World War II and saw action in the United Kingdom, North Africa, and the continent of Europe. He was decorated with the Canadian Decoration (C.D.).

Returning to Canada, Mr. Kerr was called and inducted as colleague and successor to the minister at Parkdale Church, Toronto, and was later called to Beaches congregation, Toronto. From there he was called to be Director of Church Extension in the Presbytery of East Toronto, and missionary at the new charge of Trinity Presbyterian Church, York Mills, 1953. He took over the work at Trinity on a full time basis in 1956 as Ordained Missionary, and was called and inducted in the same year.

Mr. Kerr has left behind many good things by which he will be remembered. He was a faithful and wise Pastor, and a lively congregation at Trinity is among his finest memorials.

In this Presbytery, Mr. Kerr's attention to his tasks, his regular attendance at Presbytery, his experienced guidance and charitable judgments, made him highly esteemed among his brethren. He was honoured by being elected first Moderator of the new Presbytery of East Toronto in 1949. The Synod of Toronto and Kingston elected him as its Moderator in 1963. In Synod and General Assembly Mr. Kerr took an active part, both in debate and on numerous committees.

Mr. Kerr continued his brotherly concern for the Veterans with whom he served in peace as well as in war, and was also Chaplain of the Toronto Fire Fighters.

We remember Mr. Kerr as a true sportsman and a lover of sport. His fellow Ministers knew him best, in this regard, on the Curling Rink and Golf Course. He was a Charter Member and the first President of the East Metro Ministers' Curling Club where he was held in high esteem by the Clergy of all faiths. He was a former President of the North York Ministerial Association, a keen participant in all truly ecumenical efforts.

Among us all, Mr. Kerr will be remembered as a beloved brother, a true friend, a devoted pastor, a preacher of the Gospel, and a faithful disciple of his Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. In spite of the over-shadowing strain of illness, during the last few years, he continued active, as he was able, in his pastorate, in the Presbytery, and in his service to the Church he so dearly loved, until the end. Through all his ministry he continued to hold up before men the evangelical faith which he had claimed in his early days, and which he found sufficient for all his needs, until Almighty God, in His merciful will, released him quietly and quickly from his frail earthly body and called him to his eternal reward.

We sang at the funeral service in Trinity Church on Thursday, November 14th, humbly, thankfully, triumphantly — the hymn of Mr. Kerr's own choosing, which so finely expressed his own joy and peace in God:

"With mercy and with judgment
My web of time He wove,
And aye the dew of sorrow
Were lusted by His love;
I'll bless the hand that guided,
I'll bless the heart that planned,
When throned where glory dwelleth
In Emmanuel's Land."

THE REVEREND J. B. PAULIN, B.A., D.D.

The Presbyterian Church in Canada lost one of its senior ministers who served her faithfully through turbulent years, when the Rev. James Burnside Paulin, B.A., D.D., died in Toronto on February 25, 1969, in his 90th year.

Born at Arthur, Ontario, J. B. Paulin was a graduate in Arts of the University of Toronto. He received the diploma of Knox College in 1907, and then studied in Edinburgh for a year.

In November, 1908, the Rev. J. B. Paulin was called to the pulpit of St. Giles Church, Hamilton, Ontario. During World War I he took leave of absence and then resigned from St. Giles to serve overseas as a chaplain with the Canadian Corps. He was wounded in action and was said to have been left on the battlefield for dead, but he recovered and was repatriated.

In 1918 J. B. Paulin was called to Rosedale Presbyterian Church, Toronto, and was minister there for six years. In 1925 he was inducted as minister of St. Paul's Presbyterian Church, Toronto.

In 1930 he received the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity from Knox College, and in the same year left St. Paul's to become chaplain of St. Andrew's College, the private school for boys, at Aurora, Ontario.

There followed a short period as interim minister in St. Andrew's Church, St. John's, Newfoundland, from whence he returned to Rosedale to a second term as minister there. It was only then that he married. Dr. Paulin retired from the active ministry in 1949.

J. B. Paulin was active in all the courts of the church, and had a warm interest in his alma mater, Knox College. As a pastor and preacher he was beloved and respected throughout his ministry of 41 years.

A private funeral service was conducted by the Rev. Eoin S. Mackay.

The Presbytery of East Toronto would place on record its high regard for his

life and witness, and for the devoted service rendered to The Presbyterian Church in Canada by this faithful disciple of Christ.

We thank God for his long and distinguished ministry, and extend to his sorrowing widow, the former Marjorie Bickell of Toronto, our sympathy and the assurance of our prayers.

THE REVEREND DAVID CHESTLE SOULES, M.A., S.T.B.

The Reverend David Chestle Soules was born on a farm near Queensville, Ontario, February 20, 1883, of United Empire Loyalist stock. Graduating with a B.A. degree from University College, University of Toronto, he was of the Class of 1917 Knox College. In 1919 he obtained two further degrees: Bachelor of the Science of Theology (S.T.B.) from Union Theological Seminary, New York, and Master of Arts (M.A.) from Columbia University, New York.

Mr. Soules was ordained to the Christian Ministry by the Presbytery of Bruce May 15, 1917 and held pastorates in St. Andrew's Southampton, Alma Street St. Thomas and Knox Waterdown, all in Ontario, and for some years was hospital visitor within the Presbytery of East Toronto.

Mr. Soules died in Toronto on October 14, 1968. Funeral services were held in Rosedale Church Toronto on October 17, 1968, conducted by Rev. E. S. Mackay, assisted by Dr. E. A. Thomson, a classmate, who gave the address. Interment took place in Mount Pleasant Cemetery Toronto. The bearers were six ministers of the Presbyteries of East and West Toronto — Rev. C. G. Boyd, Dr. D. T. Evans, Rev. J. D. C. Jack, Rev. J. C. Robson, Rev. J. R. Waldie and Dr. J. H. Williams. The honorary bearers were Dr. J. S. Clarke, Dr. L. H. Fowler, Rev. B. E. Howell, Rev. Donald McQueen, Mr. J. Gordon Beatty and Professor Andrew Thomson, the last two being classmates of Mr. Soules.

Mr. Soules is survived by two brothers, Mr. Roy Soules of Toronto and Mr. Guy Soules of Hamilton and was predeceased by a brother, Mr. Clifford Soules, and a sister, Mrs. Carrie West, and his wife née Miss Gertrude Harris.

Mr. Soules will be remembered as a kindly man much interested in the welfare of others and the good of his Church. He kept up studious habits almost to the last, frequently branching into new areas of learning and able to engage in intelligent conversation in many subjects. The Presbytery of East Toronto place on record their heartfelt sympathy with those who mourn his loss.

SYNOD OF HAMILTON AND LONDON

THE REVEREND CHRISTOPHER E. FISHER

The Presbytery of Bruce-Maitland records its sense of loss, and pays its tribute to a faithful minister of God, in the death of Rev. C. E. Fisher at the Saugeen Memorial Hospital in Southampton, on Monday, November 25th, 1968 in his 89th year.

Mr. Fisher was born at Grantham near Nottingham, England. From his youth he was vitally interested in the Church, and began to serve in the Church Army in London, England, devoting his time to social work and prison rehabilitation. It was under the Church Army that he came to Canada in 1911, as a missionary to the Pegan Indian Reserve near Banff, Alberta.

As western Canada became settled in 1913, he was appointed as missionary-at-large in Saskatchewan for The Presbyterian Church in Canada. After completing his theological training at St. Andrew's College, University of Saskatchewan, he was ordained to the Presbyterian ministry in 1925.

His ministry included pastorates in Saskatchewan, at Condie, Estevan, Earl Grey, Vedora, Rosthern, and Duck Lake; and Alberta, at Olds, and Westmount (Edmonton), and Grande Prairie. While at Grande Prairie, he was Supervisor of Missions for the Peace River district, and a kindly advisor of the many young ministers who pioneered in the area. In 1942 he moved to Ontario, and served at Corunna, and at Wiarton, and at Mount Bridges. He was a Reserve Army Chaplain during World War II. He then returned to the west, to Melfort, Saskatchewan. In 1954 he was inducted into the Burgoyne-Dunblane pastoral Charge, from where he retired in 1962, to make his home in Port Elgin.

Mr. Fisher was pre-deceased by his wife, the former Eliza Shearling, in 1949. In 1955, he married Mae Jones More, who survives his death. Also surviving are three sons, Ronald of Hamilton, Ontario; John of Haney, British Columbia; and Ray of Calgary, Alberta; and one daughter, Christine, (Mrs. Frank Kowal) of Toronto.

The funeral Service was held in Knox Presbyterian Church, Burgoyne, on Thursday, November 28th, conducted by the Rev. Maurice D. McNabb, Moderator of the Presbytery of Bruce-Maitland who was assisted by Rev. G. H. Millar of Wiarton. Rev. D. G. Archibald of Tara preached the sermon. Burial was in Prospect Cemetery, Toronto.

Mr. Fisher's rewards in this life were few; we know that his reward is great in heaven. His name was Christopher — "Christ-bearer" — and like the Old Testament saints, his name is a description of his life. To us who remember him, his example of faith and patience will encourage us to be better Christ-bearers in our lives.

The Presbytery extends sincere sympathy to Mrs. Fisher and the bereaved sons and daughter.

THE REVEREND WILLIAM ANDREW JASON GRAHAM

William Andrew Jason Graham was born in the city of Londonderry, Northern Ireland, on October 7th, 1878. He received his education at Clooney Terrace National School, Foyle College, and Magee Presbyterian College, all in that city. After leaving Magee College, he was ordained in Clonavan, Ballymena, County Antrim, Ireland; from which he was called to Kingstown, County Dublin; then to Buttershaw, Bradford, England; and later to Castleford in Yorkshire. From here he was called to Westdale Church, Hamilton, Ontario. He was called to Thorold, where he ministered to the congregation of St. Andrew's for the next 21 years; retiring in 1953. In Thorold, he formed the St. Andrew's "Crusaders"; a young people's group, which grew rapidly and took a very active part in youth work throughout the Presbytery and the Synod.

Mr. Graham's quiet kindness and fatherly counsel endeared him to many who passed through the "Crusaders". During his ministry, two members of the St. Andrew's congregation entered the ministry:—the Rev'd. Donald A. Campbell of Sherbrooke, Quebec, and the Rev'd. John F. Allan, of Toronto.

His wife, the former Margaret Jane Bredin, predeceased him. He is survived by one son, James, of Toronto; and three daughters; Ida, Mrs. Denis Senior, Chelmsford, Essex, England; Elizabeth, Mrs. Thomas Gilfillian, Castleford, Yorkshire, England; and Marguerite, Mrs. E. Karner, of Thorold. Mr. Graham died on December 11th, 1968, in the St. Catharines General Hospital. The funeral Service was held in St. Andrew's Church, Thorold, on December 14th. It was conducted by the Rev'd. A. K. Campbell and the Rev'd. John F. Allan. Interment took place in Lakeview Cemetery, Thorold, Ontario.

THE REVEREND GEORGE W. MURDOCH, B.A.

The Rev. George W. Murdoch, B.A., died suddenly in Hamilton, on February 17, 1969, at the age of 58 years. Born at Whitewhills, Scotland, he came to Canada at the age of two years with his parents who settled at Woodstock, Ontario.

Mr. Murdoch received his public and secondary schooling at Woodstock and in 1935 graduated from the University of Toronto with his Bachelor of Arts degree.

He graduated in Theology from Knox College in 1939 and was ordained to the Christian ministry on May 2nd, 1939.

Mr. Murdoch served as Minister of St. John's, Wardsville and Knox, Kintyre; St. Paul's, Ingersoll; St. Andrew's, New Liskeard; and the Renfrew Presbyterian Church, Renfrew, before coming to New Westminster Church, Hamilton in May, 1964.

Though cut off in the midst of his years, George Murdoch leaves behind him the record of an unselfish stewardship, the example of a noble character, the continuing power of a vital faith and the ongoing influence of a dedicated life. He entered fully into the life of his congregation and was deeply respected and greatly loved by his people. He shared God's sorrow for a world bent and twisted by sin; he spent his life trying to remedy the wrongs of life, and never failed in his faithful witness for and devotion to the Gospel of the Living Christ.

His fellow Presbyters mourn the untimely death of a respected colleague, a dear friend, and Christian gentleman. They record their thanksgiving to Almighty God for the life and work of a dedicated Minister who served his Lord with faithfulness and ever adorned the Ministry of the Word and Sacraments.

Mr. Murdoch is survived by his wife, Eva Doris, two daughters, Mrs. Robert Sutton (Helen) and Mrs. David Marquardson (Pauline) and his son, Robert.

A largely attended Presbytery funeral service was held in New Westminster Presbyterian Church on Feb. 20, 1969. Rev. M. S. Reside conducted the service, assisted by Rev. T. G. Marshall, Minister Emeritus of New Westminster, and by Dr. A. Lorne MacKay, who delivered the funeral address. Interment took place in Woodland Cemetery, Hamilton.

THE REVEREND ROBERT THOMAS RUTHERDALE, B.A.

The Rev. Robert Thomas Rutherford passed away on April 17, 1969, in his 73rd year, at Burlington, Ontario.

Mr. Rutherford was born in County Monaghan, Ireland, in 1897. He graduated from Queen's University, Belfast, and received his Theological training in Assembly's College in that city.

He served as assistant minister in Castleton, Belfast, and Great Victoria Street Presbyterian Church, Belfast. He received a call to Ballyronney and was ordained to the Christian ministry in 1921. He then served in College Square, Belfast.

Coming to Canada in 1929 he was called to Pembroke, Ontario, then to Alvinston, where he served for ten years before going to Port Colborne, where he ministered for eighteen years, 1942 to 1960. His last charge was Warkworth and Hastings, retiring from the active ministry in 1966. On coming to live in Burlington, he still helped out in the ministry of the Word when the occasion arose.

Mr. Rutherford was a man of deep integrity, gracious and unassuming, a faithful and beloved pastor, a forthright preacher of the Word of Life, and a devoted servant of the Church. During his ministry at Port Colborne he was Moderator of the Presbytery of Niagara and served that Presbytery as Clerk for a number of years.

He is survived by his wife, the former Elizabeth Allen, two sons, Gordon and Dr. John A., and two daughters, Mrs. Olive Ryckman and Mrs. David Jean (Mary).

The funeral service was conducted by the Rev. William Skelly, assisted by the Rev. Thomas J. Caldwell. Mr. Skelly, in paying tribute to his friend, Robert Rutherford, whom he had known over many years, both in Ireland and Canada, mentioned the esteem in which he was held by his brother ministers and the people under his pastoral care. Evidence of that esteem was shown in the large numbers attending the service from the Churches where Mr. Rutherford had ministered.

Following the service, interment took place at the Greenwood Cemetery, Burlington.

We commend his loved ones to God's gracious keeping in their loss, and rejoice in our Christian hope that Robert Rutherford is with his Lord. Servant of God "Well done".

WHEREAS, the clearness of the situation of remarriage following divorce is not always evident, and

WHEREAS, a hasty remarriage of persons divorced may lead to further difficulty to parties involved and cause for grief within the Church,

THEREFORE, the Presbytery of Peace River humbly overtures the Venerable the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada to instruct the Board of Evangelism and Social Action, to give serious and detailed consideration to the following:

- (1) That a person or persons seeking remarriage and legally permitted to do so, be required to wait until one year has elapsed from the date of granting of the decree, before Presbytery or its authorized representative give its approval.
- (2) That since marriage confers the blessing of Christ's Church; its solemnization lays upon ministers a weighty responsibility thereby demanding counsel of his brethren for correct interpretation; such aid be provided by Presbytery election of a Christian Marriage Committee.
- (3) That if good cause may be shown by parties seeking remarriage following divorce by one or more of those parties and such marriage is sought prior to one year's elapsed time from granting of decree, the said parties through their minister submit all papers and facts of case, including minister's considered judgement to presbytery or its authorized representative which shall be the judge as to whether there are grounds for marriage or remarriage in keeping with the spirit and teachings of our Lord Jesus Christ; the decision of presbytery to be a matter of record;

and that the committee report to the next Assembly; or to do otherwise as the General Assembly in its wisdom may deem best.

No. 12 — PRESBYTERY OF KAMLOOPS

Re: RULING ELDERS AS MODERATOR IN ALL CHURCH COURTS

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

WHEREAS, one of the cardinal doctrines of the Presbyterian Church is that Jesus Christ is the only King and Head of the Church, and

WHEREAS, this is reflected in our church government, namely in that all decisions of our courts are determined by groups rather than by individuals, and that in the higher courts there is no permanent moderator; and

WHEREAS, there is a real distinction between the teaching presbyter and the ruling presbyter in that the former is the minister of word and sacrament and the latter is not; and

WHEREAS, there is no ex officio theological reasons to restrict the office of moderator to the teaching presbyter; and

WHEREAS, the Book of Forms specifically stipulates that only a teaching presbyter may be moderator in any of the courts of our church, and

WHEREAS, this ruling reflects an age when the teaching presbyters were very often the only educated members of the court, a condition that no longer exists; and

WHEREAS, this ruling appears to be a reflection on the intelligence and abilities of the ruling presbyters in our courts, and serves only to deepen the gulf between teaching and ruling presbyters; and

WHEREAS, in the case of the Kirk Session this ruling means that in the absence of the teaching presbyter (for whatever reason) the Kirk Session can no longer function, and all spiritual authority within the congregation ceases to exist so long as a teaching presbyter is not present, and

WHEREAS, our practice of having a permanent moderator in the Kirk Session tends to obscure our church's doctrine that Jesus Christ is the only King and Head of the church,

THEREFORE we, the Session of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Kamloops, B.C., humbly petition the Rev. the Presbytery of Kamloops to transmit this overture to the venerable the General Assembly embodying the following recommendations, namely:

1. That the Book of Forms be amended to allow ruling presbyters to be eligible for election as moderator in all our church courts, and
2. That the Kirk Session be given the right to elect its moderator annually from its members at large.

WHEREAS, the University population in Canada is steadily increasing, and the University campus is a strategic mission field of such a nature, that it requires the full-time work of on-campus Chaplains, and,

WHEREAS, other Churches in Canada (Anglican, Lutheran, United Church) have deemed it wise to appoint full-time on-campus Chaplains to Universities in Canada, and have done so (The Lutheran Church has 10), and,

WHEREAS, the Presbyterian Church in Canada, has shown a marked interest in higher education past and present: and,

WHEREAS, the contribution of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, to a University campus ministry as largely been on a part-time basis, which is neither adequate nor realistic, and,

WHEREAS, the ecumenical approach to full-time University Chaplaincy has been unsuccessful, up to this point in time, with other denominations in Canada appointing denominational on-campus Chaplains, on a full-time basis, and the Presbyterian Church in Canada (with a few exceptions) appointing none: and,

WHEREAS, the rights of Presbyteries be recognized in this strategic ministry in that they be given authority to appoint in consultation with the appropriate assembly and synod committees the appropriate persons to Universities within their bounds.

THEREFORE, it is humbly overtured by the Presbytery of Calgary-Macleod, that the 95th General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, in its wisdom, instruct the appropriate Board to make provision for the appointment of two full-time, on campus Presbyterian Chaplains to Universities in Canada immediately with a stipend that will take cognizance of the special gifts, and experiences required, and that the appointment of full-time, on-campus Presbyterian Chaplains to Universities be recognized, and included as an integral part of the ongoing mission of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

No. 16 — PRESBYTERY OF HALIFAX AND LUNENBURG

Re: APPOINTMENT OF O.Ms., LICENTIATES, GRADUATES,
AND MINISTERS

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

WHEREAS, under present regulations the General Board of Missions may at its discretion appoint graduate students or licentiates to non aid receiving congregations at the request of a Presbytery, (A. & P., 1940, p. 43), and

WHEREAS, under present regulations (conditionally) a Presbytery may apply to the G.B.M. for an appointment of a minister to a self-supporting charge, (Pages 23 and 24, Home Missions Regulations), and

WHEREAS, there is some uncertainty and ambiguity in the matter of such an appointment, and

WHEREAS, the G.B.M., its Committees, Presbyteries, and the Committee of the General Assembly on Inter-Church Relations have encouraged, and Presbyteries have effected many amalgamations and consolidations in order to effect a saving in finances (grants and stipends) as well as ministers, and

WHEREAS, in some instances these new units being served by one minister are completely self supporting, in some cases supporting the ministry above the present minimum rates of stipend and etc., and

WHEREAS, many such arrangements have been accepted by congregations on a trial or experimental basis for two or three years and consequently the minister cannot be called in the usual terms of the CALL, and

WHEREAS, some Presbyteries are now negotiating and entering into a concept of shared ministry with other Denominations on an experimental and trial basis, and

WHEREAS, such a shared ministry would seem at this time to pose problems in effecting a Call by members of other Denominations to a Presbyterian minister, and

WHEREAS, it is a cumbersome and delayed action to have the names of such ministers added to the constituent roll of a Presbytery by overture in each case by a Presbytery to the General Assembly — this might take eleven months, and

WHEREAS, in such cases the minister cannot act as a full member of the courts; Presbytery, Synod, and General Assembly,

THEREFORE, the Presbytery of Halifax and Lunenburg humbly overtures the Venerable, the General Assembly to permit the General Board of Missions to amend (or add) to its present regulations respecting appointments, permitting it without hindrance to appoint licentiates, graduates, and ministers at its discre-

tion in respect to each case, on request of Presbytery to a self supporting charge; or do otherwise for this object what to their wisdom may seem best.

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

WHEREAS, the word *ministry* (diakonia) is a key concept in the New Testament, with an Old Testament background in God's covenant with the people of Israel and His calling of that people into the service of the covenant; and

WHEREAS, there has arisen through the ages a double meaning for the concept, one having to do with function ("ministry") and one having to do with office ("the ministry," etc.); and

WHEREAS, some regard ministry as the calling and function of the whole church, each and every member being given special gifts for his or her particular ministry as a partnership (koinonia) in the gospel; and

WHEREAS, some regard ministry as designating only a special group within the covenant people, often characterized as "the ministry", "the ministry of the word and the sacraments", "the Christian ministry", "the ministry of the Word", etc.; and

WHEREAS, practical considerations relating to Christian presence and witness in the modern world make it urgent for the church to understand more clearly how it ought to exercise its ministries, what forms, functions, and offices of ministry are called for today, and what education is requisite for them; and

WHEREAS, there exists today considerable ambiguity regarding the recognition of ordained ministers who are engaged in other than the usual form of parish ministry; and

WHEREAS, the whole interlocking subject of salvation, baptism, calling, commissioning, training and ordination for ministry requires thorough-going theological re-examination to dispel the present confusion; and

WHEREAS, the General Assembly's Committee on Articles of Faith has been at work in this area for several years, in connection with such matters as revision of the ordination vows, the nature and meaning of baptism into Christ and church membership in the context of the nature, mission and calling of the church, and in the production of a major study entitled "*What Does Ordination Mean?*" (Acts and Proceedings, 1965, pages 318-332);

THEREFORE, the Presbytery of East Toronto humbly overtures the Venerable the General Assembly to instruct the Committee on Articles of Faith or a Special Committee to undertake a study of the meaning of ministry with a view to producing a clarifying statement, and, in the process, to include the engagement of Presbyteries and congregations in this study, or that the General Assembly do otherwise for this purpose as in its wisdom it may deem best.

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

WHEREAS, previous General Assemblies, on various occasions, have been overtured to promote a policy of term appointments to Sessions, and

WHEREAS, these Assemblies declined the prayers of the Overtures, at one time because of recommendations of a Special Committee (A. & P. 1953; pp. 95, 354-5), and later on the basis of a report from the Joint Clerks (A. & P. 1966; pp. 392-3), and

WHEREAS, Section 134 of the Book of Forms, which appears to be the backbone of both reports mentioned above, does protect a Session against its need to retain within its ranks "an elder who has ceased to be helpful to the congregation" but does not

1. encourage a member of the Church, possessed with a gift for spiritual administration but who for legitimate reasons is reluctant to assume any office whose term is indefinite, to seek or to stand for a position on the Session; nor does it
2. appreciate the fact that should a Presbytery remove an elder who has served long and faithfully but whose advanced age has incapacitated him from discharging the responsibilities of an elder in a modern congregation but who for one reason or another is reluctant voluntarily to resign, such a Presbyterial act would indubitably carry with it an undeserving stigma detrimental to the good name of the elder concerned and possibly to the relations between Congregation, Session, and Presbytery; and

WHEREAS, our act of ordination is both a recognition that God has blessed a person with certain spiritual gifts and a recognition that the person has the ability to use them wisely toward the good of the Church and the glory of God (an elder may possess the gift of spiritual wisdom but through age may still have lost the power or the means to exercise his gift in the best interests of a congregation); and

WHEREAS, the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. has already enacted a workable form of term appointments to Sessions which should make us question whether ours is the only practical and theologically sound one;

THEREFORE, the Presbytery of Westminster humbly overtures the Venerable the 95th General Assembly in these terms:

1. that a Special Committee be formed to prepare an amendment to Section 108 of the Book of Forms which would make term appointments to Session optional at the discretion of Presbyteries; and
2. that this amendment be sent down to Presbyteries to vote under the Barrier Act before the 1970 General Assembly;

WHEREAS, traditionally, in the Presbyterian Church in Canada, there have been two kinds of Ministry rendered by Christian people, namely the Ministry of the "Priesthood of all Believers" and the Ministry of the Word and Sacrament, and each subject to its appropriate disciplines and oversight; and

WHEREAS, within the office of the Eldership there have been two traditional ministries—

- (1) shared by all Elders, that of ruling, and
- (2) that confined to the Ministry of the Word and Sacraments; the office and Ministry of the Teaching Elder; and

WHEREAS, in recent years a considerable number of positions related to the Ministry of Word and Sacraments, namely, the Ministry of Theological Professors, Administrative Secretaries of the Boards of General Assembly, Superintendents of Missions, and certain other such activities, have been considered to be directly related to the Ministry of the Word and Sacraments; and

WHEREAS, there has been, traditionally, in our Church a recognition given to those whose Ministry, although not directly related to the Ministry of the Word and

Sacraments, has been in cognate work, as, for example, the work of the Secretaries of the Bible Societies; and

WHEREAS, it has been recognized by our Church that the Ministry of the Word and Sacraments carried out in such activities as the work of the Chaplaincy Service entitles those engaged in such work to be considered still exercising their Ministry; and

WHEREAS, in recent years there has been a good deal of confusion between the idea of the Ministry of the Priesthood of all Believers and the Ministry of the Word and Sacraments; and

WHEREAS, this has led to confusion regarding the nature and purpose of, as well as the rights and privileges pertaining to, ordination to the Ministry of Word and Sacraments; and

WHEREAS, there is the opinion in the minds of many throughout our Church that new kinds of Ministry should be considered, presumably for those ordained to the Ministry of the Word and Sacraments; and

WHEREAS, in the light of such developments, the Presbytery of Edmonton seeks the assistance of the General Assembly for a settlement of these vexing problems, particularly as it relates to men ordained to the Ministry of Word and Sacraments who are engaged in non-pastoral work;

THEREFORE, the Presbytery of Edmonton humbly overtures the 95th General Assembly to make such declaration regarding the meaning of "Ministry" as it is used technically of ordained Ministers; to distinguish between this Ministry and the Ministry of the "Priesthood of all Believers"; and in general to clarify the confusion now existing; or to do otherwise as in its wisdom it deems best.

WHEREAS, according to the action of the Ninetieth General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada it is so stated that 'any pastoral charge may issue a Call regardless of whether or not it receives a deficit grant from the General Board of Missions' and also that 'before approving such a Call from an aid-receiving pastoral charge the Presbytery dealing with the Call must ascertain that the General Board of Missions has appointed the minister called to that pastoral charge';

WHEREAS, the introduction of the new scale of increments in stipend has resulted in a sharp increase in the number of aid-receiving charges,

WHEREAS, there seems to be some confusion and conflict between the right of Presbyteries to process a Gospel Call, and the necessity for a prior appointment by the General Board of Missions, and

WHEREAS, we are aware that the General Board of Missions is responsible to the whole Church for processing of deficit grants,

THEREFORE, it is humbly overtured by the Presbytery of Saint John that the General Assembly delete #2 portion of the Report of the Special Committee on Overture #23, 1968, as agreed upon at the 90th General Assembly and accordingly substitute the words "before approving such a Call from an aid-receiving charge, the Presbytery considering the said Call, inform the General Board of Missions of its terms; and that the latter be invited to make requests or recommendations to the Presbytery regarding the terms of the Call, or the General Assembly do as in its wisdom it deems best to clear up the apparent confusion and conflict."

WHEREAS, the last comprehensive history of the Presbyterian Church in Canada is that written by the Rev'd. Professor Wm. Gregg, D.D., entitled *History of the Presbyterian Church in Canada*, and published in 1885 — a valuable, but by now incomplete text;

WHEREAS, the recent (1966) *Short History of the Presbyterian Church in Canada* was well received across the Church and in other quarters, but was intentionally brief in form;

WHEREAS, much valuable work has been done in the history of the Presbyterian Church in Canada in both the 19th and 20th centuries, in the form of learned papers, theses, studies, etc., but such have not been drawn together into comprehensive form, making their findings available to the members of the Church at large, as well as the students in our Colleges.

WHEREAS, the Presbyterian Church in Canada has a history of which she can feel deeply thankful, but of which her members should also be knowledgeable;

THEREFORE, the Presbytery of Niagara humbly overtures the General Assembly to take immediate steps to commission the research and publication of a new and comprehensive history of the Presbyterian Church in Canada from its earliest beginnings to the present day, as an integral part of any plans set in motion to appropriately observe the Centennial of the Church in 1975, or to do otherwise for this object that which in its wisdom the General Assembly may deem best.

No. 36 — PRESBYTERY OF LONDON
Re: MINISTERS' STIPENDS

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

WHEREAS, the increase in the basic stipend in the last few years, commendable as it is, is inadequate in terms of the preparation involved for the ministry, in terms of the minister's professional status and in terms of the current costs of living, and

WHEREAS, our Church has not sufficiently implemented the practice generally recognized in business and education of increments based on qualifications, years of experience and living costs, and

WHEREAS, the inadequacy of the stipend imposes economic hardship on the minister and his family, disrupts his family life by the compulsion often laid on the minister's wife to find employment to subsidize the family income, and distracts the minister from an undivided devotion to the pursuit of his calling, and

WHEREAS, the inadequacy of the stipend also damages the image of the ministry and is a factor doubtless contributing to both the lack of recruits for the ministry as well as the exodus of men from the pastoral ministry, and

WHEREAS, the fringe benefits of the ministry often cited as advantages such as free manse, travel allowance, utilities, etc., substantial as they are in some cases, are by no means uniform for all ministers, nor do they compensate for an inadequate

stipend, nor do they take into account that period at the end of his ministry when a man must provide a house for himself for which he has been poorly prepared by an inadequate stipend, and

WHEREAS, medical and hospital benefits in most work contracts are either provided for or deducted at the source but are not generally provided by the congregation but are paid by the minister, and

WHEREAS, the adequacy of the stipend in many self sustaining congregations could be assured with the reorganization of congregational spending based on the recognition of the principle of the priority of the minister's stipend, and

WHEREAS, the same principle of the priority of the stipend in congregational expenditures is also a valid principle for the whole church in the administration of its funds, if it is to exercise true pastoral care of its ministers.

THEREFORE, the Presbytery of London humbly overtures the General Assembly to implement a new policy with respect to ministers' stipends which would include the following considerations:

1. That the new basic stipend including basic travel grant be \$6,000.00.
2. That the present scale of increments for experience (stitched minutes, 94th General Assembly, p. 324) be continued.
3. That there be an Annual Cost of Living increment of \$200.00.
4. That all Congregational Boards of Management be directed to review the way the stipend is set up to give the minister the advantage of any benefits under the Income Tax Act, without penalizing the minister in relation to the Canada Pension Plan or violating ethical principles.
5. That the Board of Missions only consider applications for additional grants because of the implementation of this plan when the Presbytery has exhausted all possibilities of the Congregation raising this additional stipend including Presbyterian visitation and possible realignment of Charges.
6. That there be an annual review of this stipend policy at Congregational, Presbyterian, Board and Council levels or
7. That the General Assembly do otherwise for this purpose as in its wisdom it deem best.

Re: YOUNG PEOPLES AND YOUNG ADULTS

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

WHEREAS, the Presbyterian Young People's Society (P.Y.P.S.) has served the Church well in the past, but due to social and economic changes in our society, a very small number of congregations have groups that can really be called P.Y.P.S. (18-24 years), and

WHEREAS, most congregations have high school youth who may be formed into Young People's groups (circ. 14-18 years), and have post high school adults who may be formed into Young Adult groups (Circ. 18-50 years), and

WHEREAS, some congregations have already successfully formed new groups as above, and the names are acceptable to most youth and young adults:

THEREFORE, it is humbly overtured by the Presbytery of London that the General Assembly suspend the constitution of Presbyterian Young People's Society (P.Y.P.S.) at Congregational, Presbytery, Synod and National levels, and those high school groups still active be named Young Peoples and those post high school groups be named Young Adults; and

THAT groups of Young People and Young Adults be formed at Congregational, Presbyterian, or on a regional basis where desirable, and

THAT Young Adults act as consultants for Young Peoples, and give assistance to them in organization, programs, worship, rallies, etc.; and

THAT the organization of Young Adults be structured to meet the needs of local members, but at the same time attempt to interpret the programs, work and worship of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, and suggest new forms of work and mission that can, should and may be engaged upon; and
 THAT where desirable regional and national conferences of Young Adults be held which may be planned by a Steering Committee of about seven persons; and
 THAT Young Peoples and Young Adults have the responsibility of suggesting their own leaders to courts, boards, and committees of the Church; and
 THAT at least yearly, groups and conferences of Young Peoples and Young Adults report their program, activities, finances and suggestions to the courts, boards and committees of the Church within whose jurisdiction they have met, and in so doing may ask permission for two of their number to speak on their behalf; or
 THAT the General Assembly do otherwise for this object what to their wisdom may seem best.

The Overture prays the General Assembly "clarify and determine the relationship (responsibility and authority) as between the courts of the Church and the boards of the Church with respect to the issuing of a call in an aid-receiving congregation."

This matter has been before several Assemblies and the Special Committee, having carefully studied the actions and decisions taken in previous years, recommends that the prayer of unprinted Overture No. 52, Presbytery of Brandon, A. & P., 1967, be granted in the following terms:

1. With respect to the issuing of a call in an aid-receiving pastoral charge, the responsibility and authority rest with the Presbytery.
2. Any pastoral charge may issue a call whether or not it receives financial assistance from the General Board of Missions, provided the Presbytery is satisfied with the guarantee of a stipend from the pastoral charge.
3. In cases where the pastoral charge calling is an aid-receiving one there must be prior consultation between the Presbytery and the General Board of Missions.
4. That this statement be a revision of the regulations, A. & P. G. A., 1964, page 87, re right to call.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT OF KNOX COLLEGE

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

The Board of Knox College begs leave to submit its 125th Annual Report. The Financial Position of the College as at December 31, 1968, proved to be somewhat more favourable than had been anticipated. During the year ending on that date capital bequests received amounted to approximately \$51,500. In the main, the donors of these funds specified that they be used for bursaries and scholarships. Income exceeded expenses by an amount of \$9,754.22, after providing for a contribution to the L.A.M.P. Committee. This has been added to the unspecified capital funds of the College, thereby reducing the cumulative deficits of prior years to \$199,508.

The excess of \$9,754.22 mentioned above was due mainly to an increase in the amount of the government grant received during the year and to income received from the building at 63 St. George Street, which is under rental to the University of Toronto for a period of five years ending in 1972. The rental income is being used to provide much needed facilities in the College and to initiate programmes which will be carried on and extended after the University of Toronto vacates the building. These programmes, we believe will serve to increase the influence of the College and our Church on the University Campus. It is hoped that funds will be available to the College to make full use of 63 St. George Street by the expiry of the rental period.

During the year ending December 31, 1968, the principal repairs and replacements were for major repairs to slates on the roof of the College building, expenditures on plumbing and the cost of installing a new boiler. The women's separate cloak room and lounge for the staff and students in the basement were renovated and refurnished and certain renovations were undertaken in the faculty and library offices.

The Board has endeavoured to carry out any necessary maintenance which is required to keep the building in good state of repair.

The residence of the College was again fully occupied throughout the session. There was no change during the year in the rates in effect, which remained at \$25.00 per week for non-Church students and \$19.00 per week for theological and Church students. A slight increase is being made beginning in September 1969.

Your Board would express appreciation to the donors for gifts received during the past year which are gratefully acknowledged.

A matter which has been of particular concern to your board for several years, as our previous reports to the General Assembly have indicated and which becomes increasingly acute year by year, is the matter of Professor's salaries. This is a subject which calls for most thoughtful and serious consideration. The whole salary question was brought most forcibly to our attention again when the Committee of the Board and Senate was considering candidates for the vacant Chair of Old Testament.

In reviewing the salary schedule of our two Colleges in comparison with those of other Theological Colleges both in Canada and elsewhere we were amazed to find such sharp disparity between the salary of a Professor in Knox and those of similar institutions. In several cases applicants for the vacancy withdrew their names after initial correspondence, due to the disparity in salary.

A comparison of salaries in other Theological Colleges in Canada also revealed a wide difference in the salary schedule — for instance:

College A —	Full Professor	\$15,800
	Associate Professor	\$11,700
College B —	Full Professor	\$16,000 to \$17,000
	Associate Professor	\$12,000 to \$15,000
Knox College —	Professor	\$10,800 (including house allowance)

It may be of interest to note that the American Association of Theological Schools, which accredits theological schools in Canada and the United States, has given Knox College the following notation in their published report:

Notation: 4.7 — "In this school the Faculty Salaries are inadequate."

We have been fortunate in the Presbyterian Church, that due to a deep sense of loyalty both to the Church, and to the Colleges on the part of our professors, we have been able to keep men of high academic standards in the service of our Church.

The training of men for the Ministry of the Church calls not only for a deep sense of commitment to the Gospel, but also the highest Academic standards.

In this complex society in which we find ourselves today, the future ministers of the Church must be fully trained and equipped to meet not only the needs of their individual congregations but also to the leaders in the many fields outside of their congregational activities, and to have a very positive influence in the life of the community in which they serve.

Your Board takes this opportunity to express our appreciation of the work of the Principal and all members of the Faculty in their efforts to promote the welfare of the College and the Church.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. The Board recommends that the Reverend Principal Robert Lennox, M.A., Ph.D., D.D., be appointed to the vacant chair of Old Testament in Knox College.

2. The Board would recommend that a Special Committee, to include representatives from the Board of both Colleges, together with representatives of the Administrative Council be appointed to make a study of the Salary structure of Professors and report to the General Assembly of 1970.

REPORT OF THE SENATE OF KNOX COLLEGE

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

The Senate of Knox College begs to submit its 125th Annual Report. During the 1968-1969 academic session 42 students were enrolled in the undergraduate department of which 34 were in the regular course, 6 in the Assembly course and 8 occasionals (two full time). This represents a slight increase over last year and a larger increase over the previous year. The graduating class is smaller than usual because of an unexplained drop in enrolment limited to this one class. But our first and second year classes and the incoming class in September (1969) are larger than usual so that our enrolment is generally encouraging. In the postgraduate department there were 39 students of whom 4 were enrolled for the B.D. degree (exclusive of undergraduates), 31 for the Th.M. degree and 4 for the Th.D. degree. These were all part-time students.

During the past academic session Professor Robert Dobbie, recently retired from Emmanuel College, Toronto, has been guest professor of Old Testament and tutor in Hebrew. We are grateful to him for his work in the classroom and his congenial cooperation on all occasions.

The gratitude of the college is expressed to the following sessional lecturers: Rev. James Jack, B.A. (New Testament Greek); Mr. H. Rosevear, F.C.C.O., F.T.C.L. (Church Music); Principal Margaret Webster, B.A., M.Ed., of Ewart College (Christian Education).

In November our Dean of Pre-Theological Students, the Rev. Donald McKillican, B.A., B.D., Th.M., submitted his resignation in order to accept the position of Registrar in Georgian College, Barrie, Ontario. His resignation was accepted with deep regret but at the same time with equally deep appreciation of his distinguished and energetic work over the past ten years, mainly in the field of recruitment of students for the ministry. Recently he had been on loan part time to the National Development Fund of our Church, combining his travel for recruitment with the travel for this fund. Consideration is being given to the area of work in which Mr. McKillican served having regard to the changing situation and the best way to meet our present needs. There is a growing opinion that a field work secretary for whom recruitment would be a second responsibility would be the better type of appointment. This has to be explored before a decision is made.

The MacDonald Memorial Lecture was given on February 12th by the Rev. D. Crawford Smith, M.C., C.D., M.Th., D.D., of Knox Presbyterian Church, Guelph, on the subject "The Minister as a Pre-Marital Counsellor." The high quality and relevance of this lecture were much appreciated.

It is appropriate to express the gratitude of the College to the Rev. Dr. Louis H. Fowler for the generous donation of his time and talent over a forty year period in the lettering of all the diplomas and testamurs for degrees that have been granted. Dr. Fowler is professionally qualified to provide this unusual service to the College.

Turning to the Library, Dr. G. L. Douglas reports that it contains an extensive collection of over 60,000 books designed to provide support, in the realm of theological and related literature, for our educational program at both the undergraduate and graduate levels. Included are many rare books, some of which have an interesting and even romantic history. Their value, however, lies primarily in their worth as

research materials, since we are not collectors in the usual sense of the term. Some of our recent acquisitions are reprints of works long unavailable, such as the Calvin and Melancthon sections of the Corpus Reformatorum, and quite a number of microfilms of the works of Theodore Beza, Calvin's colleague and successor in the Church of Geneva. We hold, in addition, many early editions of the writings of the Reformers. The Library maintains a mail-order service for ministers of our Church, with emphasis on materials useful in sermon preparation.

In accordance with the directive of the General Assembly of 1968 (A. & P. pp. 44-45) representatives of Knox College Senate and representatives of the Ewart College Board have been meeting "to explore possibilities of amalgamation and report to the Assembly". At this stage of the discussions, amalgamation does not seem feasible, but other possibilities do exist, such as federation or affiliation. Additional items under discussion are: standards, cross representation, degrees, faculty, finances, program, scholarships. The consultation is continuing and a further report will be made to a subsequent Assembly.

During the past academic session we have been engaged in discussions with other theological colleges in the Toronto area on the possibility of co-operation in theological education at the undergraduate level. This was anticipated in our report to the General Assembly last year. These discussions began initially with the decision of the Toronto Graduate School of Theology in November 1967 to secure professional assistance to develop and strengthen its program. Attention gradually shifted to the undergraduate level with the result that by June 1968 what became known as the Committee on Cooperation on Theological Education in Toronto (C.O.C.T.E.T.) was set up with an executive and a number of sub-committees. Dr. Charles Taylor, retired secretary of the American Association of Theological Schools, was employed to direct the discussions with a view to the establishment in the Toronto area of a central school known as the Toronto School of Theology (T.S.T.) around which the present theological colleges would be clustered, each participating to a greater or lesser degree. The colleges participating in the discussions are: Knox (Presbyterian), Trinity (Anglican), Wycliffe (Anglican), Emmanuel (United), St. Michael's (Catholic) (with St. Basils), Regis (Catholic). In February a proposal was submitted to each of the colleges participating in these discussions. This proposal involved the establishment of the Toronto School of Theology with a director, promotion officer, registrar and clerical staff, at an initial budget of \$50,000. The school will be supervised by a council of approximately 30-35 members. During the 1969-

1970 academic session a constitution will be worked out. It will be recognized for confessional reasons that some or all the associated colleges will require assurance that courses of certain orientation or content be available to their students, especially in the basic degree level.

The Senate gave this proposal long and detailed attention at its last meeting (May 1st) having regard to our historic, confessional position, the need for the best academic and practical education and our obligation to prepare students for the ministry of our church. As a result of these arduous deliberations the Senate agreed as follows:

That it report briefly and comprehensively to the General Assembly what is suggested academically and financially in the T.S.T. proposal, and say that we cannot commit ourselves fully at this time because the Senate (and Board) have not had time to study all the implications of participation.

On this basis the Senate recommends to the General Assembly that (1) we declare ourselves generally in agreement with the objectives of T.S.T. on the ground that we consider such an ecumenical encounter a desirable and necessary enrichment of the theological education of our students.

(2) As an interim measure for the coming year that we take advantage of section IV-2 in the proposal at the discretion of the Senate. (This section reads as follows: "Colleges or other institutions in or near Toronto which find it impossible to become fully associated members of T.S.T., shall be able to take advantage of services and programs offered, on terms to be arranged.")

(3) That as evidence of good will and recognition of our obligations we ask for a special donation of \$10,000 for T.S.T. for the next academic year, from whatever source possible, it being understood clearly that we are not committing ourselves thereby to any specific future financial obligations.

(4) That the Senate be authorized to give additional study to the T.S.T. proposal with a view to bringing in suitable recommendations to the General Assembly of 1970 and that meantime its representatives be authorized to participate in the formulation of a suitable constitution for T.S.T.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

**REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON OVERTURE 14
PRESBYTERY OF BRAMPTON 1968
RE REVISION OF SECTION 125 (e) BOOK OF FORMS**

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

This Overture was forwarded to the 94th General Assembly by the Presbytery of Brampton at the instance of the Kirk-Session of Knox Church Milton, Ontario, and will be found A. & P. G. A. 1968 pp. 399 and 400. The 94th General Assembly appointed a committee to study the Overture and report to this Assembly.

The prayer of the Overture is as follows:

"THEREFORE, the Kirk-Session of Knox Church, Milton, humbly overtures the Venerable the General Assembly, to delete Section 125 (e) of the Book of Forms, and substitute I. a rule permitting the deletion of the names of those who have both— (1) left the ordinary geographical boundaries of the congregation, by having moved more than one-half the distance to the next nearest congregation of this denomination in that direction; and (2) have not attended a communion service in three years without a sufficient reason known to the Session; the Session being required to have contacted them, by whatever means shall be deemed best if their addresses be known; every possible effort having been made to obtain same, and to have encouraged them to transfer their membership to a local congregation and advised them of this rule, at least one year prior to removal of their names from the Communion Roll; the grounds for removal to be "Non-Resident"; and II. a rule permitting the placing of the names of those who are not covered by Cause (1), of the grounds of removal, and who have not attended Communion for three years, on an inactive list, which would not be used for Budget allocation purposes, but which persons would continue to be communicants, and to be the pastoral responsibility of Ministers and elders; or to do otherwise as the General Assembly in its wisdom shall deem best."

Your Committee studied the prayer of the Overture point by point and concluded that the suggested replacement of Book of Forms Section 125 (e) would entail more difficulties than those which the prayer purports to avoid. In justice to the Kirk-Session of Knox Church Milton, the Committee also studied other possible amendments to the Section. In the end they were of the opinion that the whole of Section 125 Book of Forms makes adequate provision for action on the part of any Kirk-Session.

The Committee therefore recommend that the prayer of the Overture be not granted but at the same time would draw the attention of Kirk-Sessions and Presbyteries to Book of Forms Section 125 (d) "The Session shall revise, correct and attest the Roll each year, and at the same meeting shall make entry in the minutes to the effect that they have done so."

 SYNOD OF HAMILTON AND LONDON

THE REVEREND CHARLES EDEN DOUGAN, B.Sc., Ph.D.

The Reverend Charles Eden Dougan, B.Sc., Ph.D., passed away in Windsor, Ontario, on January 3rd, 1969, at the age of eighty-three years. Born in Glasgow, Scotland, he came to Canada in 1907 to serve under the Baptist church and later with the Presbyterian Church, U.S.A., during which time he secured his Ph.D., from Bradley College, Atlanta, Georgia. In 1925 he responded to the call from the Presbyterian Church in Canada for ministers to man its many vacant pulpits and served her faithfully and well for well over forty years. His first Canadian charge was in Edmonton, Alberta, and was followed by successive charges at Clinton, Trenton, and Erskine Church, Hamilton.

Forced into semi-retirement through ill health, Dr. Dougan became an Extension worker and hospital visitor for the Presbytery of Hamilton, during which time he established the Eastmount and Chedoke congregations in that city. In 1964 he was invited by the Kirk-Session of St. Andrew's Church, Windsor, to become the Pastoral Visitor to the congregation, a position he filled graciously and well until his retirement in September of 1967.

As a dedicated minister Dr. Dougan laboured under considerable difficulty to discharge his responsibilities to his Master and the Church. A learned man, he made no display of his learning; a concerned man, he served with kindness and diligence; a faithful man, he lived his faith in daily dedication to his pastorate.

Dr. Dougan is survived by his wife, the former Jean Orsborn, a son Kenneth of Ottawa, and a daughter, Joyce (Mrs. Leslie James). The funeral service was held in Windsor on January 6th, and was conducted by his colleague at St. Andrew's, the Rev. Wm. Lawson, assisted by the moderator of the Presbytery of Chatham, the Rev. James Grant, and was attended by the many friends Dr. Dougan had made during his brief residence in that city.

Interment took place in Greenlawn Memorial Gardens, Windsor.

SYNOD OF TORONTO AND KINGSTON

THE REVEREND A. GORDON MACPHERSON

The Presbytery of East Toronto desires to record its tribute to the memory of our esteemed fellow Presbyter, the Rev. A. Gordon Macpherson, B.D., D.D., who died in Toronto on June 11, 1969.

Dr. Macpherson was born at Bay St. Lawrence, Cape Breton Island, Nova Scotia, on August 17, 1890. He enlisted as a private in the service of his country at the outbreak of hostilities in the First Great War in 1914. He early received his commission, and when the war ended in 1918 he continued on active duty in Europe for another year. He returned to civilian life in the Fall of 1919.

Thereafter Dr. Macpherson resumed his academic pursuits, and graduated in Theology from Westminster College, British Columbia, in 1921. He received his Bachelor of Divinity degree from Knox College, Toronto, in 1930, and his honorary Doctor of Divinity degree from Presbyterian College, Montreal, in 1947.

Dr. Macpherson was minister of St. Columba's Church, Vancouver, from 1922 to 1925, of St. Andrew's Church, New Westminster, from 1925 to 1930, of Knox Church, Listowel, Ontario, from 1930 to 1936, and of Riverdale Church, from 1936 to 1962.

Dr. Macpherson retired from the active ministry in December, 1962, after 40 years of faithful service. His strong preaching and diligent pastoral care contributed to the effectiveness of his ministry, and have secured for him a place of respect in the memories of his fellow churchmen.

The heartfelt sympathy of the Presbytery of East Toronto is extended to Mrs. Macpherson, his daughter, Betty, and his sons, Gordon (Jr.) and Bruce, in their great loss.

The funeral service was held in Glenview Church, Toronto, on June 13, 1969, and was conducted by the Moderator of the Presbytery of East Toronto, the Rev. W. W. MacNeill, assisted by Drs. J. A. McNab, and J. H. Williams, who gave the address.

SYNOD OF THE ATLANTIC PROVINCES

THE REVEREND HENRY LYALL ORR

The Reverend Henry Lyall Orr died in an automobile accident near Calais, Maine, U.S.A., on May 30th, 1969, at the age of 49 years. Mr. Orr, minister of Greenock Presbyterian Church in St. Andrew's, N.B., took up his duties there in November, 1964, having come to Canada from Hamilton, Lanarkshire, in Scotland. Born in Dumbarton, Scotland, he was educated at Dumbarton Academy, Glasgow University and Trinity College. Mr. Orr was a past Moderator of the Presbytery of Saint John, convener of Presbytery's Committee on Evangelism and Social Action and a member of the Synod's Committee on Evangelism and Social Action at the time of his death. He was also chaplain of the St. Andrew's Society in Fredericton. During World War II Mr. Orr served with the Royal Air Force in India.

Mr. Orr is survived by his wife and his three daughters Elaine, Susan and Lindsey, by his mother, Mrs. Robert Orr, of Scotland, and two brothers, the Reverend David Orr, of Glasgow, Scotland, and the Reverend John F. Orr, of Edinburgh, Scotland.

The funeral of Mr. Orr, who was a faithful Presbyter in the Presbytery of Saint John, was held from Greenock Church, St. Andrew's, N.B., and was conducted by the Reverend Robert W. Ross, assisted by the Reverend George Cheatle and the Reverend Laurence Blaikie. The address was given by the Reverend S. R. Jackson, a personal friend, and minister at Harvey Station, N.B. Following the service the ashes of Mr. Orr were taken to Scotland, where a committal service was conducted by the Reverend David Orr and interment was in the family plot.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EWART COLLEGE

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

The Board of Ewart College begs leave to submit the following report for the year 1968-69.

SECTION I — CONCERNS OF THE COLLEGE

(for special consideration of the Commissioners during the two day working sections)

1. Purpose of the College

The ongoing work of curriculum revision required the Board to reconsider the purpose of the College. The Board believes that the primary purpose should be to provide specialist training in Christian Education. To clarify this purpose, the following statement has been approved by the Board.

Ewart College — Statement of Purpose

The Church's task is to communicate the Gospel. Christian Education is essential in this task. The purpose of Christian Education is to help people to hear the Gospel, to respond to it in commitment of their lives, and to demonstrate their faith in Christian living. This purpose is accomplished through an educational ministry that involves confrontation of individuals and groups of all ages, classes and conditions both within and without the church.

In the context of the total congregation, we begin to see the extent of the church's educational task. Its scope includes adults, youth and children, as they are prepared for mission in the world.

For a task of this dimension, more persons with specialized training in Christian Education are needed to train and support those persons on whom much of the direct responsibility for teaching has been and still must be placed. Professional leadership is also required for the preparation and selection of curriculum, administration of programmes, and direction of policies.

The Presbyterian Church in Canada has given to Ewart College responsibility for the training of the Christian educators who will guide and strengthen this teaching aspect of our Church's mission.

2. Alternative to Degree Granting Privileges

Since the last report of your Board, the College's Private Bill seeking incorporation and degree granting privileges was withdrawn from the Ontario Legislature after second reading. This action was taken on the advice of our legal counsel, since it appeared that the Province was not likely to accede in our request. Since that time, the Board of the College has been considering several alternatives with diligence. One of these involves relationship with Knox College.

In accordance with the directive from General Assembly 1968, representatives of Knox College Faculty and Senate and representatives of Ewart College Board and Faculty have been meeting "to explore possibilities of amalgamation and report to Assembly".

While at this stage in discussions "amalgamation" is not considered feasible, other possibilities do exist, such as federation or affiliation.

Consultation is continuing and further report will be presented to a subsequent Assembly.

3. Opportunities for Continuing Education

The College is proceeding to the formation of continuing education courses for ministers, directors of Christian Education, and others giving professional leadership in the field of Christian Education. Whereas the College has offered such courses occasionally in the past, the Board now sees the need to offer these on a regular, systematic basis.

4. Lay Training

The Board of the College is concerned to work in co-operation with the Board of Christian Education to provide opportunities for lay persons throughout the Church to gain competence in the field of Christian Education. The College Board

has approved consultations with the Board of Christian Education in terms of the establishment of a lay training school for the summer of 1970.

Consideration is also being given to expanding this type of training to include extension courses.

5. Church related Social Services Course

The Board has been in discussion with the faculty of Ryerson Polytechnical Institute and representatives of other denominations concerning the establishment of a Church related Social Services course. The Board has agreed to participate in this venture, and accordingly has established in the College a Church related Social Services option.

Because of the necessity of prior Biblical and theological content, students will spend one year at Ewart College for Biblical and theological orientation before proceeding to the Two Year course at Ryerson Polytechnical Institute. A student would be enrolled as a regular student in Ewart College, and normally be required to live in residence during the full three years. On satisfactory completion of this Three Year course, a student would receive the Diploma of Ewart College. Consideration would be given to students previously enrolled in the Two Year Ryerson course who then desired the Biblical and theological orientation. These could take the One Year course in Ewart College in the third year, also receiving the Diploma of the College on completion of the course. It is understood, however, the normal approach to the Church Social Services Course would be to take the Biblical and theological orientation in the first year of the course.

Ewart College is concerned to draw to the attention of the Church that, if this course is to be a fruitful means of service within the Church, the Church itself must provide opportunities of employment for its graduates.

6. Board Membership

The Board notes with pleasure the first meeting of the Council of the Order of Deaconesses. Inasmuch as the Council members represent a large percentage of the employed graduates of the College, the Board is anxious to have the guidance of the Council in its deliberations. Therefore, the Board desires the appointment of the President of the Council of the Order of Deaconesses as an Ex-Officio member.

SECTION II — REPORT OF THE ACADEMIC SESSION

(for the general information of the Church at large)

1. College Year

During the academic session just completed, fourteen students have been enrolled in the courses at Ewart College — five in the graduating class, three in the second year, five in the first year, and one special student. These students represent a wide range of geographical areas across our Church as well as the country of Thailand.

The Board of the College is grateful for the support it receives from the members of the faculty of Knox College, who again have taught the Biblical and theological subjects to our students. Under this arrangement, most courses for First Year Ewart students are given separately, whereas the Second and Third Year courses in these disciplines have been shared with the students at Knox College. The Board of our College is mindful of the efforts expended on behalf of our students by the Knox faculty and we express our sincere thanks to them for their work and to the Senate and Board of Knox College for permitting them to assume this extra responsibility.

Our own faculty, consisting of Miss Webster, Principal; Miss Adams, Dean; and Miss Dickson, Lecturer, have continued to render leadership in the courses in Christian Education, Introduction to the Bible, Worship, Counselling, and The Art of Communication. In addition to their academic responsibilities, these three persons have the added task of the administration of the total work and life of Ewart College. The Board acknowledges the large contribution made by our staff to this area of our Church's work.

In order to equip the students at Ewart with an awareness of the Church's life, the curriculum during this past year has again included courses involving persons from several areas of our Church's outreach. We are grateful for the help we have received from the various Boards of our Church and others who have assisted in this work.

Ewart College believes that a strong programme of field work is needed if its graduates are to be well equipped to work in the Church. The students of the first year have again received experience in the leadership of children and youth groups in Davenport Presbyterian Church; while second year students participated in a wide variety of youth and adult groups, as well as sharing in nursery and kindergarten Church School experiences. The members of the graduating class were placed in individual congregations throughout the city of Toronto. The College faculty were assisted in the supervision of this field work by the ministers and deaconesses in the churches where the field work was conducted.

Following the Graduation, the Ewart College students made a ten day tour of southwestern Ontario, accompanied by Miss Webster, Miss Dickson, and Mr. Henry Rosevear as Choir Director. These tours every few years permit the College students to meet people throughout the Church as well as providing an opportunity to publicize the work of all our training institutions and seeking recruitment for service within the Church.

The Graduation Service was held in the Chapel of Knox College on Thursday, May 1st. The Reverend Charles E. S. Kraemer, B.A., B.D., S.T.M., D.D., President of The Presbyterian School of Christian Education, Richmond, Virginia, was the speaker.

In the summer of 1968, Ewart College co-operated with the women's training schools of the sister denominations in sponsoring "Seminar '68". Most of the working sessions of this seminar were held within our building. Out of a total enrollment of forty-nine, eleven graduates of Ewart College were present for this venture in continuing education.

Once again our facilities have been utilized by Boards and Committees of our Church and other groups for meetings of various size and duration. All available space is used to house summer school students during the required time they are at university.

REPORT ON NATIONAL DEVELOPMENT FUND — JUNE, 1969

A. Progress of Campaign

As of the 23rd of May, 1969, 503 congregations of The Presbyterian Church in Canada have not taken any part in the National Development Fund campaign. 677 congregations have mounted, or are now mounting, National Development Fund campaigns. Of these, 74 have undertaken campaigns since the 25th of October, 1968. This new increase is largely from congregations of 150 members or over with whom the Director has had recent contact. Their total allocation (minimum) is \$1,172,822. Encouraging reports are reaching the office daily from this group. \$368,060 is shown on the 1968 year end statement as individual gifts. The individuals comprise the larger advance gifts, together with congregations whose members have made gifts from time to time though the congregation has not gone on campaign.

B. 1969 Campaigns

Two campaigns have been mounted for 1969 — Spring and Fall. Results of the Spring campaigns are just coming in and to date some 70 new enlistments have occurred.

Our slogan for the Autumn is:

"As a goal for '69, 4½ will be just fine,

Then in 1970, 5½ will be plenty"

(millions that is)

New literature has been printed and is now being distributed. It should be pointed out that all literature for the campaign should be distributed whether congregations are on campaign or not. No one has the right to deny any member or adherent of The Presbyterian Church in Canada any literature published by the authority of the General Assembly. This literature has a missionary value beyond the actual campaign. There are four new pieces of literature.

1. Pamphlets — Our Work Overseas
2. Pamphlets — Our Work in Canada
3. A bookmark — reminders of the campaign
4. "The Flame" — an indicator of campaign progress available on order

C. The use of the money received from the campaign

The action of this Assembly on the exact use of money received will have a real impact on the Church and will decide the enthusiasm of the Church for the National Development Fund Campaign. Much skepticism has been caused because of the claim "we don't know how the money is to be used"! After this Assembly the goals will be more clearly defined.

The fact that 70 percent of the increased stipends has already come from National Development Fund invested funds and that \$12,000 had been sent to emergency causes overseas before the last Assembly, has helped many congregations to decide for a campaign. Goals were mentioned in the pamphlet "There's A Place For You On Christianity's Frontiers" but were so indefinitely stated as to leave some doubts. This General Assembly will help us reach our 5½ million dollar goal by being specific.

D. Attached are:

1. Financial statements from the auditors to end of 1968.
2. An Interim Progress Report to June 2, 1969.

The thanks of the Director and staff of the National Development Fund and of the Management Committee go to all the congregations which have participated in the campaign and to men and women who have done so much to help.

Some changes have taken place during the year in the committees. The Rev. D. R. McKillican who did a great deal of field work during 1968 resigned to take up work in Barrie. We are grateful to him and to Knox College for co-operation in making Mr. McKillican available.

Mr. H. J. G. Jackson of Windsor, who gave good leadership in publicity during the early stages of the campaign, resigned early in 1968. He has been replaced on the

committee by Mr. R. Douglas Creelman, a young man of our church who has his own design business in Toronto.

Mr. J. W. G. Macdougall removed from Montreal to Moncton, N.B., and was replaced by Mr. Henry Johnson who joined Dr. C. Ritchie Bell and Mr. A. H. Hart in Quebec, with special interest in Montreal.

A list of area and Presbytery workers will be published later on in the campaign. There are many of these who have persisted in their congregational visitations and have helped to rouse our people to the need and the magnitude of the campaign.

The church must be grateful to all who, by gifts large and small, have brought us to the 63 percent mark of our campaign.

ADDITIONAL OVERTURES

COMMISSIONER'S OVERTURE *Re: LENDING FUNDS*

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

WHEREAS, the financing of new church buildings by means of bank loans guaranteed personally by a number of members or adherents of congregations, in addition to mortgages held by The Presbyterian Church in Canada, has taken place in a number of instances, and

WHEREAS, this practice of bank financing and direct mortgages distorts the congregations' programs for the orderly repayment of capital indebtedness, and

WHEREAS, it has been found that the terms requiring lump sum repayment of church extension loans have proved unrealistic for congregations, resulting in much discouragement despite great efforts in congregations, and

WHEREAS, these situations could be remedied if the Lending Fund Committee were authorized by the General Assembly to lend funds to congregations for refinancing, and

WHEREAS, such refinancing would result in earlier and more orderly repayment of congregational obligations, and

WHEREAS, funds made available through the National Development Fund may make possible a more liberal policy,

THEFORE, I, John C. Duff, a Commissioner to the 1969 General Assembly from the Presbytery of Red Deer, humbly overture the Venerable the General Assembly to authorize the Lending Fund Committee to deal with refinancing of the total capital obligations of congregations indebted to the lending funds of the church, beyond the limitations now imposed, or to do otherwise for this object, as in its wisdom, the General Assembly may deem best.

An overture in the same language was approved by the Kirk Session of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Red Deer, Alberta, at a duly constituted meeting held on April 22nd, 1969, and the Presbytery of Red Deer agreed to transmit the same at a duly constituted meeting held in Red Deer on April 24th, 1969, and also to overture the General Assembly in the same language on its own behalf. This Commissioner's Overture is presented lest for any reason these overtures from lower courts of the church fail to reach the floor of the Assembly. Sec. 67, 77, 79, 80, 297, 299, 300, Book of Forms; Acts and Proceedings of the 1967 (93rd) General Assembly, p. 407, Recommendation 2.

COMMISSIONER'S OVERTURE *Re: APPOINTMENT — WHALLEY*

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

WHEREAS, the General Board of Missions has made an appointment to the mission congregation of Whalley in the Presbytery of Westminster, and

WHEREAS, at a duly called congregational meeting on March 16th, the people of Whalley congregation asked the Presbytery of Westminster to endeavour to secure the appointment of Mr. B. J. Ogdon, and

WHEREAS, this congregational request was considered by the General Board of Missions at its March meeting but not approved and the above-mentioned other appointment made, and

WHEREAS, the request for the appointment of Mr. B. J. Ogdon was reaffirmed by a telegram to the General Board of Missions from the Session, expressing deep distress that the congregational request had not been approved, and

WHEREAS, the unanimous action of another duly-called congregational meeting on May 25th reaffirmed the congregation's desire for the appointment of Mr. B. J. Ogdon, and requested the permission of the Presbytery of Westminster to proceed to moderate in a Call to the said Mr. Ogdon, and

WHEREAS, it is impossible for the Presbytery of Westminster to give permission for a Call to a man who has not served his mission appointment year and impossible for the Presbytery to meet in time to request the next meeting of the General Board of Missions to reconsider their appointment to Whalley for the good of the congregation and the good of the two young men who are thus beginning their ministry, and

WHEREAS, the congregation of Whalley Church has during the week previous to the Assembly circulated a petition in which 86 percent of the communicant membership plus a large number of the adherents in writing, signified for the third time their desire for the appointment of Mr. B. J. Ogdon, whose gifts for the type of ministry required in Surrey, B.C., they know, because of his year of excellent service as the assistant to the minister of First Presbyterian Church, New Westminster,

THEREFORE, I, Robert J. P. Foulis, a commissioner to the 95th General Assembly from the Presbytery of Westminster, humbly overture the Venerable the General Assembly to ask the General Board of Missions to give good reason why Mr. B. J. Ogdon should not be appointed to the Whalley congregation or to confirm the action of the General Board of Missions, or to do otherwise for this object, as in its wisdom, the General Assembly may deem best.

COMMISSIONER'S OVERTURE *Re: CLINICAL PASTORAL TRAINING*

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

WHEREAS Clinical Pastoral Training (Supervised Pastoral Education) has proven itself to be an invaluable asset to ministers and to lay people, at a time when every minister must deal with emotional disturbances frequently, and

WHEREAS our clergy and lay people are presently denied the opportunity to pursue this training, either through lack of money and or time,

THEREFORE, we the Presbytery of Westminster humbly overture the Venerable the General Assembly to take the following steps:

1. To endorse Supervised Pastoral Education as standardized by the Canadian Council for Supervised Pastoral Education.
2. To make a regular grant to the Canadian Council for Supervised Pastoral Education.
3. To make available to ministers and to lay people the financial resources to permit them to take full advantage of Supervised Pastoral Training opportunities.
4. To make Supervised Pastoral Education a requirement for the training of Presbyterian ministers.

Or to do otherwise for this object that in its wisdom the General Assembly may deem best.

(On motion of Mr. V. M. Ford and Mr. Milne the court gave approval to this overture, and agreed that it be presented on the floor of the 95th General Assembly.)

SYNOD OF MANITOBA AND NORTHWESTERN ONTARIO

Re: THE RIGHT OF SILENCE AND PRIVILEGED COMMUNICATIONS

To the Venerable the 95th General Assembly:

At Kenora, Ontario, and within First Church there, on Thursday, the third day of October, in the year our our Lord, one thousand, nine hundred and sixty-eight, at nine o'clock A.M., the Synod of Manitoba and Northwestern Ontario met, and . . . was constituted in prayer by the Moderator, Mr. J. M. Ritchie.

Inter alia: It was moved by Mr. H. L. Henderson, seconded by Mr. J. Currie, that the (following) overture be transmitted to the General Assembly with approval of Synod. Carried.

WHEREAS, there is at present in the various provinces of Canada, no common legal standard with respect to the "right to silence", so far as "Protestant" clergymen are concerned, and

WHEREAS, there is no clear interpretation by the courts as to what constitutes "the right to silence", nor what constitutes "privileged communications" given to clergymen of the "Protestant" faith, and

WHEREAS, there is an ever-expanding field of pastoral counselling in which clergymen, psychiatrists and other specialists are involved, and

WHEREAS, unless this whole area of confidence is duly protected by Statute Law or by other satisfactory means, the work of clergymen, psychiatrists, etc., is and will continue to be seriously handicapped,

THEREFORE, the Synod of Manitoba and Northwestern Ontario humbly overtures the General Assembly of The Presbyterian Church in Canada, that a full study of this question be made by a Board or Committee of the General Assembly at the earliest possible moment, with a view to having standard legislation in Canada and in the Provinces of Canada; or that they do otherwise for this purpose what to their wisdom may seem best.

WHEREAS, the work on the Indian Reservations between Fort Frances and Kenora has not developed according to the expectations of six years ago, when Lake of the Woods Presbytery was erected, and

WHEREAS, the suggested bounds have not been implemented, and

WHEREAS, the opening of the Highway to the Lakehead has shortened the distance of travel from Fort Frances by 115 miles, and

WHEREAS, the Presbytery is numerically weak to the extent that it is impossible adequately to do the work of the Court, and

WHEREAS, participation in a larger Presbytery would give the benefit of collective experience and fellowship,

THEREFORE, the Presbytery of Lake of the Woods overtures that the Presbytery be dissolved and the congregations restored to their former affiliations.
