FIRST SEDERUNT

At the City of Toronto, Ontario, and within St. Andrew's Church there, Wednesday, the fifth day of June, in the year of our Lord, one thousand nine hundred and sixty-eight at eight o'clock in the evening,

Which place and time Ministers and Ruling Elders, Commissioners from the several Presbyteries of The Presbyterian Church in Canada, convened pursuant to appointment of the General Assembly held in the City of Ottawa, Ontario, on the seventh day of June last year.

The Reverend John Logan-Vencta, O.B.E., C.D., E.D., M.A., D.D., Moderator of the last General Assembly, assisted by Dr. L. H. Fowler, conducted public worship and preached a sermon on the words: "Should such a man as I flee" — Nehemiah 6:11.

Thereafter, with prayer he did constitute the General Assembly in the Name of the Lord Jesus Christ, the only King and Head of the Church.

INTRODUCTION — MRS. OKOI ARIKPO

On request of Dr. J. K. Lattimore, Chairman of the General Board of Missions, and by consent of the Assembly, Dr. John A. Johnston formerly of the Mission Staff in Nigeria, introduced Mrs. Okoi Arikpo, wife of the Minister of External Affairs of Nigeria, a prominent lay lady of our work in Nigeria.

DR. LOGAN-VENTCA'S REPORT

Dr. Logan-Vencta addressed the Assembly and reported briefly upon the principal duties which had befallen him during the year.

ELECTED

The vote having been taken for the election of a Moderator, it was declared to be in favour of Dr. C. J. MacKay.

On motion of Dr. E. H. Johnson, seconded by Mr. S. B. Coles, the election of Dr. MacKay was made unanimous.

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INSTALLATION OF MODERATOR

Dr. MacKay, having been conducted to the Chair by the mover of his election, was welcomed by Dr. Logan-Vencta.

Whereupon, Dr. Logan-Vencta did by prayer call upon God to bless the newly-elected Moderator and confer upon him strength and wisdom that he might discharge the duties of his important office. He did then install him in the Moderator's Chair.

THANKS OF MODERATOR

The newly-elected Moderator thanked Dr. Logan-Vencta for his prayers, expressed gratitude to the Assembly for the honour conferred upon him and called upon the Commissioners for their consideration and assistance as he sought to carry out the duties laid upon him.

THANKS TO DR. LOGAN-VENTCA

On motion of Dr. J. W. Wevers, seconded by Mr. J. D. Wilkie, the thanks of the Assembly were tendered Dr. Logan-Vencta for the excellent sermon with which he opened the Assembly and for the great service rendered the Church throughout the past year.

MacAlpine, the Report was received, taken as read, spread on the Minutes and the Committee on Business was instructed to find a place for it on the docket of a future sederunt.

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

The Board of Education begs to present the following report.

I. SPECIAL COURSES

Note: Attention is drawn to the following regulation adopted by the General Assembly of 1953:

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"The status of a catechist must not be understood as a step toward ultimate ordination. The recognition of this office is considered to be desirable only in order that the opportunity for full-time service may be provided for men with preaching and pastoral gifts and who are willing to give themselves to this work, but who may not be able to meet the educational requirements for the ministry, and also to enable the Church to profit by the service which such men can render." (A. & P. 1953, p. 22).

(a) Applications already considered by the General Assembly.

Note: 1. All recommendations are made in terms of the ruling of the General Assembly that (A. & P. 1957, p. 18): "All ministers from other denominations and Presbyterian Churches outside of Canada, who desire to be received into the ministry of our Church, shall be required by the Presbyteries in which they may labour to pass satisfactorily an examination on the History of The Presbyterian Church in Canada and on its Rules and Forms of Procedure; the examination to be taken any time between the time of application for reception and the time the applicant

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is received; the results of such examination to be sent to the Board of Education before its next regular meeting."

2. Attention is drawn to the Book of Forms, Section 248, Sub-section XI (a): "No application for the reception of a minister is considered by the General Assembly, unless the circular letters giving notice of such application were despatched not less than two clear months previous to the meeting of Assembly."
3. The Board of Education calls the attention of Presbyteries to the Book of Forms 248, Subsections VII and VIII, and asks that Presbyteries emphasize the matters therein, especially the interrogation of applicants on the following points: "(1) What course of study has he passed in Arts and Theology? (2) When, where and by whom was he ordained to the ministry? (3) Has he ever been connected with any other Church than that from which he brings documents, and if so, in what capacity? (4) What are his reasons for applying for admission to this Church, and what has led to his change of views? (5) How long has he resided within the bounds of the Presbytery?"

(a) Applications already considered by the General Assembly.

1. *Rev. Howard Leroy Shantz*. Presbytery of Niagara. It is reported that he has completed the course of study assigned by the General Assembly. It is recommended that permission be granted to receive him as a minister of The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

6. *Rev. John Mackechnie*. Presbytery of Peterborough. It is recommended that the application be granted and he be received as a minister of The Presbyterian Church in Canada.
7. *Rev. Harry Lambert McCall*. Presbytery of Cape Breton. It is recommended that consideration of the application be deferred for one year in order that the Presbytery may provide more information for the General Assembly.
8. *John Calvin Rhoad*. Presbytery of Edmonton. It is recommended that the application be granted to take him on Trials for License.
9. *Rev. Leonard Arthur Weaver*. Presbytery of Superior. It is recommended that the application be not granted.
10. *Rev. Kenneth Murray Leroy Wheaton*. Presbytery of East Toronto. It is recommended that if he does not qualify for the twelve-subject course by September 15, 1968, he be prescribed a full three-year intramural course in Theology under the direction of the Senate of one of our Colleges with no exemptions.

III. THE WILLIAM E. ARCHIBALD TRUST

The Board of Education hereby reports that from the above Trust a bursary of \$55 has been awarded to Calvin Claude MacInnis.

IV. PETITION FROM THE PRESBYTERY OF EDMONTON

A petition dated May 9, 1968, was received from the Presbytery of Edmonton as follows:

"We recommend that this Presbytery ask the 94th General Assembly to permit this Presbytery to place the name of the Rev. Wasyl Winiawsky on the Appendix to the Roll of this Presbytery as a minister in good and regular standing in The Presbyterian Church in Canada."

It is recommended that the petition of the Presbytery of Edmonton with respect to the Rev. Wasyl Winiawsky be granted.

V. INTERIM STUDENT BURSARY REPORT

The 93rd General Assembly asked the Board of Education to study the student bursary situation throughout The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

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The Board reports progress and desires to file an interim report with the Clerks of the Assembly.

Inasmuch as 22 presbyteries and 4 synods did not report and inasmuch as the Board of Education wishes to secure bursary information from the W.M.S. Eastern and Western Divisions it is recommended that the Board of Education be permitted to pursue its studies for another year and report to the 95th General Assembly.

VI OVERTURE No. 24, 1967, Presbytery of Assiniboia re Modification of Courses for the Ministry (A. & P. 1967, pp. 35, 46, 425)

The overture requested the provision of correspondence courses at seminary level for qualified students and the erection of regional summer schools conducted by the professors of our theological colleges.

The Board of Education considered the overture carefully and recommends that the prayer be not granted for the following reasons:

1. At the present time there is little demand for correspondence courses in Theology at the level required by the General Assembly of candidates for the ministry;
 2. There are seminaries of several denominations spread across Canada. Qualified students may take courses in these seminaries and submit their credits to the General Assembly through the Board of Education for validation. Part of the training taken in these seminaries, provided they are recognized by The Presbyterian Church in Canada, might be credited toward theological training for admission to the ministry of our Church;
 3. The professors in our theological colleges already carry a heavy work load during the regular academic session. It would be impossible for them to pursue scholarly activities in order to equip themselves for their major responsibility if they were prevented from reading and preparing their courses during the summer months.
 4. Rather than correspondence courses and regional summer schools it is the opinion of the Board of Education that the General Assembly would be wiser to subsidize the cost of bringing qualified candidates for the ministry to either of our two Colleges where library, classroom, and residential facilities are available.
- The Board of Education therefore recommends that the prayer of the overture be not granted.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RECEPTION UNDER BOOK OF FORMS — 248 II

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee Re Reception Under Book of Forms — 248 II which, in the absence of the Convener, was given in

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by Dr. E. A. Thomson. On motion of Dr. J. W. Wevers, seconded by Mr. M. R. MacAlpine, the Report was received, taken as read, spread on the Minutes and the Committee on Business was instructed to find a place for it on the docket of a future Sederunt.

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

This committee is called to meet only for the consideration of applications for reception under Section 248 — II of The Book of Forms.

1. *Rev. William Marshall Benson*

The committee met on October 6, 1967, to consider the application from Mr. Benson, a minister of The United Presbyterian Church U.S.A., who was invited by the Board of Missions to work in an extension charge in Canada. His documents were all in order, the interview was satisfactory, the presbyteries were circularized, and inasmuch as there were no objections, Mr. Benson was admitted to eligibility for reception into the ministry of The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

2. *Rev. Mariano DiGangi*

Inadvertently the application to receive Dr. DiGangi, a minister of The United Presbyterian Church U.S.A., did not come to the Board of Education in time for consideration and resolution by the 93rd General Assembly. The Committee Re Reception was given power to issue in dealing with the application. Dr. DiGangi was interviewed on October 6, 1967. All the documents were in order, the interview was satisfactory. Inasmuch as the presbyteries had been circularized on April 5, 1967, Dr. DiGangi was admitted to eligibility for reception into the ministry of The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

3. *Rev. Vernon Floyd Holstad*

On October 6, 1967, Mr. Holstad was interviewed and inasmuch as some of the documents were missing, it was decided not to circularize the presbyteries until such time as the documentation was completed and submitted to the Committee Re Reception for its judgment. Mr. Holstad was a minister of The United Presbyterian Church U.S.A. The documentation proved to be in order, the interview was satisfactory, the presbyteries were circularized on October 24, 1967, and there being no objection, Mr. Holstad was admitted to eligibility for reception into the ministry of The Presbyterian Church in Canada two months later.

4. *Rev. Melvin Kay Melton*

On October 6, 1967, Mr. Melton, a minister of the Presbyterian Church in the United States, was interviewed by the Committee on Reception. All documentation was in order, the interview was satisfactory, and two months after circularization of the presbyteries, he was admitted to eligibility for reception into the ministry of The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

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5. *Rev. Neil Robert Tolliday*

On October 6, 1967, the Committee on Reception interviewed Mr. Tolliday, an ordained minister of the Presbyterian Church of Australia. All of the documentation was in order, the interview was satisfactory, the presbyteries were circularized, and two clear months later he was admitted to eligibility for reception into the ministry of The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

6. *Rev. Thomas Scott Wood*

The Committee on Reception met on December 4, 1967, to consider an application from Mr. Wood, a minister of the United Presbyterian Church U.S.A., who had been invited by the General Board of Missions to undertake extension work in Canada. Inasmuch as some of the documentation was missing the committee decided not to circularize the presbyteries until such time as Mr. Wood had submitted additional material. On reception of the documents the Committee resolved to circularize the presbyteries on January 8, 1968. Mr. Wood was admitted to eligibility for reception into the ministry of The Presbyterian Church in Canada effective March 8, 1968, there being no protests from the presbyteries.

All six ministers noted above have been received by their respective presbyteries into the ministry of The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

The Moderator led in prayer and declared the Assembly open for business.

COMMITTEE ON INTER-CHURCH RELATIONS

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on Inter-Church Relations, which, as printed, was handed in by Dr. G. D. Johnston, the Convener. On motion of Mr. S. B. Coles, seconded by Dr. E. J. White, the Report was received.

THE REFORMED CHURCH OF AMERICA

Dr. Johnston introduced Rev. John J. Opmeer, representing the Reformed Church of America. The Reformed Church began in Canada with the influx of many Dutch immigrants. The Reformed Church has been ministering to these people and has held close relationship with The Presbyterian Church in Canada. He brought greetings from the Reformed Church of America.

The Moderator presented Mr. Opmeer with a copy of the Stitched Minutes and thanked him for his greetings.

REV. IN HA LEE, D.D.

Dr. Johnston introduced Dr. In Ha Lee of the Korean Christian Church in Japan, who will address the Assembly at the evening sederunt.

THE UNITED CHURCH OF CANADA

Dr. Johnston introduced Mr. J. Gordon Coburn, a prominent layman of the United Church of Canada, representing the Moderator of the United Church of Canada unable, through illness, to be present. In his address, Mr. Coburn referred to the fact that the scientists living today outnumber all the scientists who have previously lived. He said we are masters of the "know how"; we do not know the "what". The work of the Christian Church is absolutely essential in this hour of opportunity.

The Moderator presented Mr. Coburn with a copy of the Stitched Minutes and thanked him for his greetings.

THE ANGLICAN CHURCH OF CANADA

Dr. Johnston introduced Bishop F. H. Wilkinson, representing the Primate of the Anglican Church of Canada. He recalled his college associations with students in Knox College. The Gospel of God's grace in Christ Jesus is the only hope of the world. There can be no freedom without faith. In all the fervour and criticism there is one word, "Let the Church be the Church". There is a deepening sense of one message to the world.

The Moderator thanked Bishop Wilkinson for his message and presented him with a copy of the Stitched Minutes.

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NORTH AMERICAN AREA WORLD ALLIANCE OF
REFORMED AND PRESBYTERIAN CHURCHES

Dr. Johnston presented a telegram expressing regrets at his inability to be present at the Assembly on behalf of President Arthur R. McKay of McCormick Theological Seminary, Chicago, who conveyed greetings on behalf of the North American Area of Reformed and Presbyterian Churches.

THE CANADIAN BIBLE SOCIETY

Dr. K. G. McMillan, General Secretary of the Canadian Bible Society, was introduced by Dr. Johnston. Last year was a record year for the Bible Society. The scriptures are being published in more and more languages in the world. The "developing nations" cannot develop without the Word of God. The scriptures going forth today have a real significance. He conveyed the greetings of the Society to the Assembly.

Dr. McMillan presented the Moderator with a copy of the Bible on the part of the Canadian Bible Society.

The Moderator thanked Dr. McMillan for his greetings and for the beautiful copy of the Bible and presented him with a copy of the Stitched Minutes.

COPIES OF THE BIBLE TO CLERKS

Dr. McMillan also presented a copy of the Bible to each of the Clerks of the Assembly and was cordially thanked by the Clerks.

THE CITY OF TORONTO

The Clerks of Assembly presented Alderman Richard Horkins, representing His Worship the Mayor of Toronto, who conveyed the greetings and best wishes of the City of Toronto.

The Moderator thanked Alderman Horkins for his greetings and presented him with a copy of the Stitched Minutes.

DR. E. H. JOHNSON

Dr. Johnson, Secretary, addressed the Assembly. After visiting the fields of the Church, one returns with a sense of admiration for the men and women who carry on the work. He paid tribute also to the faithful work of the members of the Office Staff. God is calling His Church into a living activity in His work in the world. His hands are for the healing of the nations.

Almost one-quarter of the human race are living in continental China. For them the Church has the message of God's redeeming love. We must endeavour to understand their aspirations in these times. We should pray for China as a whole and especially for our Christian people there. We should encourage our governments and people to enter into cultural exchanges with these people.

We have many friends both in Nigeria and in Biafra and our hope is that through our Christian people on both sides the spirit of reconciliation may prevail. Dr. Johnson was the first from the outside to visit our people in war-torn Biafra. It is significant that a representative of Christ's Church was the first to come to sit down and talk with them concerning the problems they face. Everywhere he met with the warmest welcome.

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DR. IN HA LEE

Dr. Lee spoke of the Christian Association of six protestant Churches working in Japan. They realize this to be a part of the World Association of Christians. He himself is a minister of the Korean Christian Church in Japan. The Korean Christian Church in Japan is reaching out toward other Christian Churches. Thousands of Koreans and Japanese have never heard the Gospel. He asked the assistance of the Canadian Church and spoke of the factors of war, poverty and the hope of reconciliation among the peoples of Asia. He presented the Moderator with the token of the 60th anniversary celebration of the Korean Christian Church in Japan.

PRESENTATION OF RESOLUTIONS

On the motion of Mr. D. G. Neil, seconded by Dr. E. H. Johnson, it was agreed to receive the Unprinted Recommendations of the General Board of Missions, 1968.

They are as follows:

- I. *Re 60th Anniversary of the Korean Christian Church in Japan*
 - (1) That the Moderator of the 94th General Assembly of The Presbyterian Church in Canada accept the invitation to attend the 60th Anniversary celebration of the Korean Christian Church in Japan in October of this year.
 - (2) That our Church set aside the first Sunday in October to recognize and emphasize the 60th Anniversary of the Korean Christian Church in Japan.
- II. *Re Nigeria/Biafra Conflict*
 - (1) That the General Assembly express to the Christian communities in Nigeria and Biafra, through the Christian Councils and other church bodies, our profound concern for the strife and suffering at the present time; our deep and prayerful desire that ways may be found for a ceasefire and peaceful settlement at the earliest possible date; and our hope that the members of Christ's Church on both sides of the conflict may play their special part in healing and reconciliation.
 - (2) That this General Assembly communicate with the Government of Nigeria through the High Commissioner in Ottawa our profound concern for the innocent victims of the conflict and urge that government to facilitate the free passage of relief goods in the areas within its jurisdiction through the good offices of the International Committee of the Red Cross.
 - (3) That this Assembly request the Government of Canada to continue to press and encourage the federal military government of Nigeria to open the door to free passage of relief supplies, and
That this Assembly request the Government of Canada to express its willingness to provide such supplies for use through the International Committee of the Red Cross.

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(4) That this Assembly express its deep gratitude to the Commonwealth Secretariat and particularly to the Secretary General Mr. Arnold Smith, for the outstanding contribution that has been made in promoting peace talks in London and Kampala, and that we encourage him to continue undismayed until such time as a peaceful settlement has been achieved, and that we inform him of our readiness to make available any staff or other resource which may be useful towards the achievement of a just and durable peace.

Recommendations I (1), (2), II (1), (2), (3) and (4) were adopted, the Chairman accepting the addition of these words to (4): "and that we assure him of our prayers throughout this Church for the eventual success of his effort."

On motion of Mr. Hans Zegerius, duly seconded, the following (5) was adopted:

That this Assembly call our people to informed and continued prayer for the people of Nigeria and Biafra and for our Christian brethren there.

On motion of Mr. B. A. Miles, seconded by Mr. J. P. Posno, it was agreed that \$50,000 be released from available reserves for Nigeria/Biafra relief. The motion is referred to the Administrative Council for report.

RECOMMENDATION, COMMITTEE ON INTER-CHURCH AID, REFUGEE AND WORLD SERVICE

Reference was made to the Unprinted Recommendation of the above Committee in the matter of an appeal authorizing the Committee to launch immediately a campaign to raise a minimum objective of \$75,000 for relief in Nigeria/Biafra and the Secretary of the Council stated he would refer this to the Council for report.

ADJOURNMENT

The Assembly adjourned to meet again in this place tomorrow, at ten o'clock forenoon, of which public intimation was given, and this Sederunt was closed by the Moderator, with the Benediction.

During the year 1967 The Fund for Ministerial Assistance distributed a gift of \$300 to each eligible minister and \$140 to each eligible child. These gifts were sent out quarterly to those eligible. In addition a Christmas gift of \$50 to each minister and \$25 to each child was sent out.

The largest number eligible for assistance was in the June-September quarter of the year when a total of 102 ministers and 190 children were beneficiaries. In addition to the regular quarterly grants the Appointors were able to assist in a few compassionate cases.

Every effort has been made by the Appointors to see that all eligible ministers receive gifts. Presbyteries are notified regularly; applications are forwarded to all eligible graduates of the colleges on appointment or call. The Appointors seek the co-operation of all the courts of the Church so that no one eligible should be missed. Applications are available on direct request to the Secretary.

The Fund has distributed over \$625,000 to ministers and their dependents since its inception in 1950. Each quarter the Appointors make careful in-

vestigation to see that all the available funds are distributed without encroachment on the Capital Resources available.

The donor continues his concern in the welfare of our ministers. He receives regular reports on the Fund and its activities.

The administration of the Fund is continued at no cost to the Fund itself — the Treasurer's Office and the Home Missions Staff are responsible for details.

CHAPLAIN GENERAL (P) E. S. LIGHT

On the request of Dr. Logan-Vencta and by consent of Assembly, the Chaplain General (P) E. S. Light addressed the Court. The Chaplain General spoke concerning the services rendered among the men and women in the Armed Services by dedicated chaplains. He referred to these services being

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rendered in Canada and other nations. The Assembly meets during days of the expression of violence and have a great part to take in such times. He thanked the Church for the Presbyterian Ministers of high calibre who have served and are serving as chaplains.

The Moderator thanked the Chaplain General for his presence and for his message and presented him with a copy of the Stitched Minutes.

THEREFORE this 94th General Assembly of The Presbyterian Church in Canada urge the government which will be elected a fortnight hence to implement the following programme, as a beginning to responsible government for Indian Canadians and to wholesome integration with other Canadians:

1. To grant to Indian Band Councils the same or a similar authority to that which is exercised by municipal councils in the same province.
2. To allot three seats in the House of Commons for Indian Canadian members to be elected by Treaty Indians, and this practice to continue for a period not beyond 2000 A.D.
3. To appoint an ombudsman to insure justice for all Indian Canadians and that the said ombudsman be an Indian Canadian.
4. To institute and implement a student exchange between young people of Indian Canadian ancestry and other Canadian young people.

COMMITTEE ON HOME RELIGION

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on Home Religion, which was given in by Dr. E. A. Thomson in the absence of the Chairman. On motion of Mr. G. Taylor-Munro, duly seconded, the report was received and its recommendations considered seriatim.

The Recommendations were adopted.

On motion of Mr. W. A. Henderson, duly seconded, the Report as a whole with its recommendations was adopted.

NOTICE OF MOTION

"I give Notice of Motion that at a future Sederunt I will move or cause to be moved as follows:

That recommendation No. 2 of the Special Committee Re Recommendation 10, p. 317 be amended to read as follows:

That to implement Recommendation No. 1,

I. That the General Assembly ask the Special Committee to continue to serve for another year and authorize it

- (a) To co-opt additional members to have at least two members from each of the three central synods and one from each of the others.
- (b) To carry forward the work of the Committee in such ways as to involve the whole Church as widely as possible, by such means as synodical or regional working consultations, widely distributed study papers, action projects etc.

Such studying should pay particular attention to paragraphs 3, 4 and 5 of section of Report entitled "Changing Life of Canada" p. 315.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM AND SOCIAL ACTION

Consideration of the Report of the Board of Evangelism and Social Action was resumed, Mr. W. L. Young, Chairman, reporting.

DR. MERLE C. PATTERSON

On request of Mr. Young and with consent of the Assembly, Dr. Merle Patterson of Atlanta, Georgia, addressed the Assembly.

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GREETINGS — THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN THE UNITED STATES

Dr. Patterson presented his credentials as commissioned by The Presbyterian Church in the United States to this Assembly and conveyed the fraternal greetings of his Church to ours.

Dr. Patterson then addressed the Assembly on the problems of poverty. He showed himself familiar with the situation and pointed out the need of an immediate remedy. His address was divided into three points: (1) the nature of man — made in the image of God. After God made this world, he put man in charge of all nature. God gave man power. (2) There is the nature of the problem — man has not realized his own potential. Man has misused the power God has given him. Man has gathered institutions in order to protect his power. He reaches for power not only over nature but over his fellow-man. We cannot look at a man in a ghetto without realizing that man has not provided housing for him. (3) The nature of the Church — It is so profound that no sentence can describe it. When God chose to take all the words of the prophets and gather them in the flesh, He chose the form of a servant. God in Christ laid aside His power and His glory and took upon Himself the form of a servant. The extension of Christ's body is the Church. Its true nature is that of a servant and it is most godlike when it is serving. We are children of God and therefore servants to this evil, smelling, world. The Church prevails in the witness of her people. D. T. Niles said, "Christ never served from a position of power; He always served from a position of powerlessness."

God is using events outside of His Church to effect His will. We are not handling things very well within the Church but God is handling His events on the street. They crucified Christ outside the city for the sins of the city and He also rose outside the city. He tore the curtain away and said "Let the people see God as He is". But "I was hungered and naked and sick and in prison. Doing it unto them, ye are doing it unto Me".

THANKS

The Moderator thanked Dr. Patterson for his excellent address and for the cordial greetings of his Church which he conveyed and presented him with a copy of the Stitched Minutes.

The Assembly accorded Dr. Patterson a standing ovation.

RECOMMENDATION 5

Recommendation 5 (a) and Recommendation 5 (b) were adopted.

On motion of Mr. J. A. Thomson, seconded by Mr. M. R. MacAlpine, the following was adopted as Recommendation 5 (c):

(c) That the government of Canada and the governments of the Provinces be encouraged to consider the human factors and values related to mass housing projects and that provision be made within these for such necessary facilities as those of recreation, child day-care, etc.

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The Board's Recommendation 5 (c) became Recommendation 5 (d) and was adopted.

ADJOURNMENT

The Assembly adjourned to meet again in this place tomorrow at nine-thirty o'clock in the forenoon, of which public intimation was given and this Sederunt was closed by the Moderator, with the Benediction.

SUPPLEMENTARY RECOMMENDATIONS

2. That the 94th General Assembly of The Presbyterian Church in Canada note with deep thanksgiving the inauguration of peace talks at present being conducted in Paris regarding the conflict in Vietnam, and call the people of our Church to prayer that the negotiations may issue in constructive agreements and a just and durable peace. Adopted.
3. That the General Assembly forward the following statement to the Government and Parliament of Canada and to the leaders of all Canadian political parties. Adopted.

The 94th General Assembly of The Presbyterian Church in Canada has noted with deep thanksgiving the inauguration of peace talks being conducted in Paris regarding the conflict in Vietnam and has called the people of the Church to prayer that the negotiations may issue in constructive agreements and a just and durable peace. In the light of the present situation, the Assembly also re-affirmed the following resolutions passed by the 93rd General Assembly. Adopted.

The General Assembly of The Presbyterian Church in Canada

- (i) supports the Government and Parliament of Canada in any plan to make units of our defence force available on request for any peace-keeping operation in Vietnam or elsewhere under conditions agreed upon by the United Nations. Adopted.
 - (ii) encourages the Government and Parliament of Canada in the efforts already being made for the relief and rehabilitation of Vietnamese civilians and urges that these be continued and preparations made now for a widespread program of relief and rehabilitation in Vietnam at such time as the war may be terminated. Adopted.
4. That in view of the tragic situation in Nigeria-Biafra with its present and potential widespread destruction of life the General Assembly
 - (a) request the Government of Canada to do all in its power to help achieve immediate cessation of hostilities;
 - (b) request the Government of Canada to use its good offices in seeking to influence the Government of Great Britain to cease providing arms and munitions for use in the conflict;
 - (c) request the Government of Canada to make every effort to encourage

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a just and viable settlement which, whatever form it may take, will guarantee the security and legitimate aspirations of the Biafran people;

- (d) forward this statement to the leaders of all Canadian political parties.
Adopted.
5. That General Assembly encourage the Canadian Council of Churches in the efforts currently being made to establish a church secretariat in Ottawa on an ecumenical basis for the purpose of expressing, fostering and making effective, Christian concerns in national and international affairs.

Fitch, that this Assembly inform the government of the United States of America of our concern at the recent assassinations of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and Senator Robert Kennedy. We express our sympathy to the nation and families who have so grievously suffered. We desire to emphasize our belief in the utter futility of violence as a means for attaining changes in society.

OVERTURE NO. 11, 1968

On motion of Dr. J. W. Wevers, duly seconded, it was agreed that Overture No. 11 has been answered in Recommendations of the Committee on Inter-Church Relations.

On motion of Dr. Wevers, duly seconded, the Report as a whole with Recommendations as amended was adopted.

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COMMITTEE ON INTER-CHURCH AID, REFUGEE AND WORLD SERVICE

The Assembly called for the Report of the above Committee which, as printed, was handed in by Mr. E. S. Mackay, Convener.

On motion of Dr. J. W. Wevers, duly seconded, the Report was received, considered, and the following Recommendation was adopted:

That this General Assembly authorize the Committee on Inter-Church Aid, Refugee and World Service to launch immediately a Campaign to raise a minimum of \$75,000 for relief in Nigeria-Biafra.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Consideration of the Board of Christian Education was resumed, Mr. R. P. Carter reporting in the absence of the Chairman.

On motion of Mr. T. Norwood, duly seconded, it was agreed that the 94th General Assembly direct the Board of Christian Education to enter into dialogue with the Executive of the Boys' Brigade in Canada to consider joint sponsorship of the appointment of a secretary for boys' work and report back to the 95th Assembly.

On motion of Mr. G. Taylor-Munro, duly seconded, the Report as a whole with its recommendations as amended was adopted.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EVANGELISM AND SOCIAL ACTION

Assembly resumed consideration of the Report of the above Board, Mr. W. L. Young, Chairman, reporting.

On motion of Mr. Eric Beggs, duly seconded, Recommendation 5 (e) was added as follows:

That the Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation give priority to meeting the housing needs of people with low incomes, operating as a social service agency and not as a profitable business.

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RECOMMENDATION 6

The Recommendation was moved by Mr. A. K. Campbell, duly seconded. The Chairman accepted a change in paragraph two as follows: "in our Church in co-operation with other Churches and social agencies." Mr. Hans Zegerius moved, in amendment, duly seconded that the words "We confess before God that" be struck from the first paragraph. The amendment prevailed and became the judgment of the Court.

RECOMMENDATION 7

The Recommendation was moved by Mr. A. K. Campbell, duly seconded. It was moved in amendment by Mr. John Congram, duly seconded, that the following be added to Recommendation 7:

"and that the compensation also take into account such other factors as disruption from the community and the difficulty in acquiring equal accommodation:

"That General Assembly also endorse the principle that where settled areas are under redevelopment that the residents be consulted and given powers in the decision-making processes that they may have a part in the shaping and restoration of their own communities."

The amendment prevailed and became the judgment of the Court. Recommendations 8, 9, and 10 were adopted.

ADJOURNMENT

The Assembly adjourned to meet again in this place at half-past seven o'clock in the evening, of which public intimation was given, and this Sederunt was closed by the Moderator, with the Benediction.

At the same place, on the same day, at half-past seven o'clock in the evening, the General Assembly met pursuant to adjournment and was duly constituted by the Moderator, Dr. W. Fitch leading in prayer at his request.

As instructed by the 93rd General Assembly, the Committee on Synod Corporations filed an application with the Federal Government for a charter to form a National Corporation. This charter has now been granted and the engrossing date is May 4, 1968.

The name of the company is THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH BUILDING CORPORATION.

The basic purpose and object of the Corporation shall be to undertake and assist in the financing of church buildings, including the erection, renovation and repair of new and existing buildings and all accessory structures and facilities, for The Presbyterian Church in Canada within Canada.

The by-laws call for the appointment of a Board of Directors by the General Assembly on the recommendation of the Corporation. The term of office shall be for four years and one-fourth of the directors shall retire in rotation and shall be eligible for re-election. The Board of Directors shall appoint its officers.

At least two-thirds of the directors holding office at any time shall be persons who are not clergymen and at least one representative of each Synod of The Presbyterian Church in Canada shall be a director at all times.

The by-laws provide that the general manager shall be appointed by the General Assembly upon recommendation of the directors.

without qualification, as indicated in the Book of Common Order and as implied in the Formula (408, page 103, of the Book of Forms), and as established by generations of practice in the Presbyterian Church.

2. The ordination questions have been decreed by the General Assembly, but the question concerning the word "satisfactory" refers to the Presbytery's judgment as to the credibility of the Minister.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

Dr. A. W. Currie moved, duly seconded, that the Report be adopted.

It was moved by Mr. S. B. Coles and seconded by Mr. J. A. Crabb, that the answer suggested by the Special Committee be referred to a special Committee to be named by the Moderator, to report to the Assembly of 1969.

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The motion to defer failed to carry. The motion to adopt carried and became the judgment of the Court.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE RE PETITION NO. 2

The Assembly called for the Report of the Special Committee on the above Petition which was handed in by Dr. E. J. White, the Convener.

Requesting that The 94th General Assembly uphold the ruling given by the 90th Assembly and observed in the Reports following 1964, "that the investments be noted in the Annual Reports" met with the interested parties. Commissioners from the Brockville Presbytery and the Comptroller heard these parties.

It would appear to your Committee that the matter comes down to one of interpretation of the resolution of Assembly of 1964 referred to in the petition. The understanding of Mr. Newton Reid is that this meant that the Fund be reported with the investments listed as they were at the time that the bequest was delivered by him as an executor, to the Church. The opinion of the Church's legal advisor, Mr. Hamilton Cassels Sr., Q.C., in a letter dated June 30th, 1966 and addressed to Mr. Howell is that it was proper legally to transfer these shares to the Consolidated Fund as authorized by the Assembly of 1964 in approving the plan of consolidation as recommended by The Trustee Board. (See Acts and Proceedings 1964, pages 432 and 433). In attempting to ascertain the will of the Assembly when it stated, "that the investments be noted in the Annual Reports", and in the recommendation for consolidation, the same Assembly would seem to make it clear that the intention was that this purpose is fulfilled in the consolidated listing of investments. We recommend:

- (1) that this interpretation be approved by this General Assembly.
- (2) that the Brockville Presbytery and the Petitioner, Mr. Reid, be advised accordingly.
- (3) that to make the matter clear to Mr. Reid and the Brockville Presbytery, the Comptroller be asked (as he himself has already suggested) to list the number of units of consolidated investment credited directly to the Rev. David Morrison Reid Memorial Fund.

On motion of Dr. White, duly seconded, the Report and its Recommendations were received, considered and adopted.

 - (b) To carry forward the work of the Committee in ways which will involve the whole Church as widely as possible, by such means as synodical or regional working consultations, widely distributed study papers, action projects, etc. Particular attention should be paid to paragraphs 3, 4 and 5 of the section of the Committee's Report entitled "Changing Life of Canada", A. & P. page 315.
 - (c) To bring to the 1969 General Assembly a full report with recommendations for action.
 - (d) To seek a staff group of three to be made available from present personnel of the General Assembly Boards.
2. The General Assembly instruct and authorize its several Boards and Committees to make adjustments in 1968 and 1969 budgets so as to provide the funds necessary for the work of this Committee.

Dr. J. W. Wevers moved in amendment to the amendment, duly seconded, that Recommendation 1 of the Recruitment and Vocation Committee, Recommendations 1 and 2 of the Special Committee Re Recommendation 10, and Recommendation 4 of the Presbyterian College be added to the Committee named in Dr. Johnson's amendment.

Mr. B. A. Miles claimed the floor when debate is resumed.

NOTICE OF MOTION

Pursuant to his Notice of Motion in the Ninth Sederunt, Mr. Walter Donovan moved, seconded by Mr. M. S. McLean that

WHEREAS a greater amount of responsibility for Indian Canadians is essential for their increasing role in the life of a growing Canada, and

WHEREAS Indian Canadians are the only citizens of Canada who have not been given the responsibility of handling their own finances, except in rare cases, and

WHEREAS no non-Indian member of the House of Commons can speak meaningfully for Indian Canadians, and whereas the right to vote means little or nothing to Indian Canadians who have no voice in the House of Commons, and

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WHEREAS many Indian Canadians are experiencing a sense of frustration and even desperation over their difficulties in receiving a just hearing to their complaints, and

WHEREAS the student exchange program between French and English-speaking Canada prior to Canada's Centennial was successful in promoting much goodwill and mutual understanding.

THEREFORE this 94th General Assembly of The Presbyterian Church in Canada urge the government which will be elected a fortnight hence to implement the following programme, as a beginning to responsible government for Indian Canadians and to wholesome integration with other Canadians:

1. To grant to Indian Band Councils the same or a similar authority to that which is exercised by municipal councils in the same province.
2. To allot three seats in the House of Commons for Indian Canadian members to be elected by Treaty Indians, and this practice to continue for a period not beyond 2000 A.D.
3. To appoint an ombudsman to insure justice for all Indian Canadians and that the said ombudsman be an Indian Canadian.
4. To institute and implement a student exchange between young people of Indian Canadian ancestry and other Canadian young people.

Mr. J. C. Cooper moved, duly seconded, that the motion be referred to the Home Missions Section of the General Board of Missions with power to issue.

THANKS TO DR. JOHN W. WEVERS

On motion of Mr. K. C. Thomas, duly seconded, the thanks of Assembly were extended to Dr. Wevers for his work as Convener of the Committee on Business.

ADJOURNMENT

The Assembly adjourned to meet again in this place tomorrow at half-past nine o'clock in the forenoon, of which public intimation was given, and this Sederunt was closed by the Moderator, with the Benediction.

FIFTEENTH SEDERUNT

At Toronto, and within Knox College there, on Wednesday the twelfth day of June, one thousand nine hundred and sixty-eight, at half-past nine o'clock in the forenoon, the General Assembly met pursuant to adjournment and was duly constituted by the Moderator, Mr. Eric Beggs leading in prayer at his request.

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MINUTES

The Minutes of the Eighth, Ninth, Tenth and Eleventh Sederunts (inclusive) were presented in printed form and sustained.

ASSEMBLY AND SYNOD RECORDS

The Clerks reported that the various Committees appointed to examine the records of the General Assembly of 1966 and the Synods had reported, and recommended that they be attested cum nota.

On motion of Mr. J. A. Crabb, duly seconded, the Report was received, considered and adopted.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON BUSINESS

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on Business which was given in and read by Dr. A. W. Currie, in the absence of the Convener, upon whose motion, duly seconded, it was received and considered and, being adopted, the business of the Assembly for the day was ordered accordingly.

NOTICE OF MOTION

"I give Notice of Motion that it is my intention to move or cause to be moved at a future Sederunt that the Clerks of Assembly be a Committee to issue in the matter of the election of Moderator of Assembly, 1969, to take a vote by mail of members on the Constituent Roll of each Presbytery at a date to be determined by the Clerks, said vote to be as in the Book of Forms, mutatis mutandis, Section 132 (3) and (4) and remitted (unopened) by the Clerks of Presbytery to the Clerks of Assembly, and, if the vote is decisive in the opinion of the Clerks of Assembly, the consent of the minister named to be obtained and his Presbytery notified that if Presbytery see fit, he be named a commissioner: all subject to the right to make any other nomination on the floor of Assembly: and if the vote is not decisive in the opinion of the Clerks, the Presbyteries be notified that the present procedure may be followed. It is further moved that the Clerks be authorized to change any of the foregoing details should, in their opinion, such change be warranted.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE RE: OVERTURE NO. 7, 1967, PRESBYTERY OF PARIS, RE: RECOGNITION OF OUTSTANDING SERVICES OF LAYMEN

The Assembly called for the Report of the above Special Committee which was handed in by Dr. L. H. Fowler for Prof. A. L. Farris as follows:

Your Committee, after due consideration, is of the opinion that there is a considerable body of opinion in the Church favouring some form of recognition for outstanding service by laymen and laywomen in the Church. After examining the feasibility of the alternatives proposed in the overture the

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Committee recommends that the prayer of the overture be granted in the following terms:

(a) That the General Assembly recognize outstanding service to the Church by devoted men and women, by inscribing an appropriate resolution in the Minutes of the General Assembly, and that a scroll embodying the substance of the resolution be prepared in a form suitable for presentation.

(b) That the various Boards of the Church be asked to submit the names of those deemed worthy of recognition, along with such descriptive material as would be helpful to a committee charged with the responsibility of making a recommendation or recommendations to General Assembly.

(c) That a standing Committee of the Administrative Council be set up to consider all submissions and to make recommendations to General Assembly for the appropriate action.

On motion of Dr. Wm. Fitch, the Report was received and adopted.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM AND SOCIAL ACTION

Consideration of the Report of the Board of Evangelism and Social Action was resumed, Mr. W. L. Young, the Chairman, reporting.

RECOMMENDATION 11

Mr. Young presented a revised Recommendation, which was accepted as follows:

Therefore, we recommend that the General Assembly urge the Government of Canada to delete section 213 of the Criminal Code of Canada which reads, "Everyone who attempts to commit suicide is guilty of an offence punishable on summary conviction."

On being put to the vote, the amended recommendation was defeated.

Recommendations 12 and 13 were adopted.

RECOMMENDATION 14

On motion of Mr. J. A. Thomson, duly seconded, it was agreed that the Assembly commend to all Kirk-Sessions and Congregations for study, the material of the Montreal Conference on Poverty.

On motion of Dr. E. J. White, duly seconded, it was agreed that the introduction to Recommendation 14 read "urge sessions and congregations to assist in an unabating struggle to end poverty".

On motion of Mr. S. B. Coles, duly seconded, it was agreed that the following be added:

That the Board of Evangelism and Social Action and the Administrative Council be requested and authorized to study the findings of the Montreal Conference on Church Society so far as these call for re-examination of our national priorities and policies.

Recommendation 14 as amended was adopted.

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Overture No. 14, 1966 was passed in the Report of the Administrative Council.

The Report re Automation and Economic and Social Justice, concluding the Board's Report, was adopted.

On motion of Mr. S. B. Coles, duly seconded, the Report with its recommendations as amended was adopted as a whole.

GREETINGS TO MR. A. J. GOWLAND, M.A.

The Assembly unanimously agreed to send greetings to Mr. A. J. Gowland in his illness, praying for his speedy recovery and wishing him every blessing.

DR. H. E. ELBORN

The Clerks intimated the passing of Dr. H. E. Elborn, formerly Deputy Minister of Education in Ontario, an elder in Calvin Church Toronto, a member of The Board of Knox College, a member of The Trustee Board and one who over the years has served the Church faithfully and efficiently on many Boards and Committees.

The Assembly agreed that the sympathy of the Court be extended to Mrs. Elborn in her great sorrow.

The Moderator called the Assembly to stand while in prayer he commended the bereaved to the comfort and love of God.

COMMITTEE ON THE REVISION OF THE BOOK OF PRAISE

Consideration of the Report of the Committee on the Revision of the Book of Praise was resumed, Dr. Wm. Fitch, Convener, reporting.

Recommendations 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5 were adopted.

Recommendation 6 was authorized in the Report of the Administrative Council.

On motion of Dr. Fitch, duly seconded, the Report as a whole with its recommendations was adopted.

COMMITTEE ON RECRUITMENT AND VOCATION AND SPECIAL COMMITTEE
 RE RECOMMENDATION 10, 1965

Assembly resumed discussion of the above Reports, as from the Fourteenth Sederunt, Mr. B. A. Miles speaking to the amendment to the amendment.

TO TAKE AN IMMEDIATE VOTE

It was moved by Dr. Wm. Fitch, duly seconded, that the vote on the amendments to Recommendation 2 of the Special Committee on Recommendation 10, (1965) be taken immediately and the motion, being put to the Court, carried.

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The amendment to the amendment (Dr. Wevers') was defeated.

MR. B. E. HOWELL

On request of Dr. Wm. Fitch and by consent of Assembly, Mr. B. E. Howell, Comptroller, was heard.

The amendment (Dr. Johnson's) carried in the voting.

The vote being put, the motion as amended became the amended Recommendation No. 2 of the Special Committee on Recommendation 10, 1965.

On motion of Dr. E. J. White, seconded by Mr. S. B. Coles, it was agreed that Assembly now approve both the Recommendation 1 of the Recruitment and Vocation Committee and the amended Recommendation 2 of the Special Committee on Recommendation 10, 1965, with the latter to be commenced first.

MR. W. B. CROSS

On the request of Dr. L. H. Fowler, and by consent of Assembly, Mr. W. B. Cross was heard.

On motion of Dr. E. J. White, seconded by Mr. J. C. Cooper, it was agreed that the Recruitment and Vocation Committee be enabled to carry out Recommendation 1 by being authorized to enter into the necessary contract with a firm of consultants when, after sympathetic consideration by the Administrative Council, funds shall be available.

Recommendations 2 and 3 of the Recruitment and Vocation Committee were adopted, and the Report as a whole with recommendations as amended was adopted.

ADJOURNMENT

The Assembly adjourned to meet again in this place at two o'clock in the afternoon, of which public intimation was given, and the Sederunt was closed by the Moderator, with the Benediction.

SIXTEENTH SEDERUNT

At the same place, on the same day, at two o'clock in the afternoon, the General Assembly met pursuant to adjournment and was duly constituted by the Moderator, Mr. W. C. McBride leading in prayer at his request.

REPORT SPECIAL COMMITTEE RE: RECOMMENDATION 10, 1965

Assembly resumed discussion of the above Report, Mr. C. C. Cochrane, Convener, reporting.

Recommendation 1 was adopted.

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Recommendation 2 — answered in the terms of the action of the morning sederunt.

Recommendation 3 — answered in the terms of the action of the morning sederunt.

Recommendations 4 and 5 were dropped.

On motion of Mr. Cochrane, duly seconded, the Report as a whole with its recommendations as amended was adopted.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF PRESBYTERIAN COLLEGE, MONTREAL

Assembly resumed consideration of the above Report, Mr. J. R. McCallum, Chairman, reporting.

Recommendation 4 — answered by Assembly in the adoption of the reports of the Committee on Recruitment and Vocation and the Special Committee on Recommendation 10, 1965.

RECOMMENDATION 3

Dr. E. J. White moved, duly seconded, that the Recommendation be referred to a Judicial Committee, to be named by the Moderator, with power to issue.

On being put to the vote, the motion to refer carried.

On motion of Mr. J. R. McCallum, duly seconded, the Report as a whole with its recommendations as amended was adopted.

MR. HUGH LLOYD'S MOTION

With consent of Assembly, Mr. Lloyd was permitted to substitute the following words for his motion:

- A. That the Assembly be constituted during the first two full days as working sections concerning the life and work of the Church including the General Assembly Board and Committee Reports, for consideration of policies and priorities to be acted upon by the Assembly.
- B. That the major Boards and Committees of Assembly be instructed to prepare their reports in ways appropriate to this format.
- C. That the business Committee be instructed to prepare the Agenda in the light of this proposal.
- D. That General Assembly Board and Committee reports be called for in advance so that these reports may be distributed through the Clerks of Presbyteries to Commissioners two weeks before Assembly.

On motion of Mr. Lloyd, duly seconded, the motion as amended was adopted.

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REPORT OF THE ADMINISTRATIVE COUNCIL

Consideration of the Report of the Administrative Council was resumed, Dr. L. H. Fowler reporting in the absence of the Chairman.

Recommendation 9 was adopted.

On motion of Dr. A. W. Currie, duly seconded, the Report as a whole with its Recommendations as amended was adopted.

OVERTURE NO. 1 — SYNOD OF HAMILTON AND LONDON RE: FUNCTIONS AND PRACTICES OF CHURCH COURTS

On motion of Mr. H. Lloyd, duly seconded, the Overture was referred to the Special Committee re: Recommendation 10, 1965.

COMMITTEE ON REMITS

The Assembly called for the Report of the Committee on Remits, which was handed in by Mr. W. M. Moncrieff, the Convener.

In view of the fact that over one-half of the Presbyteries of the Church have replied and all favourable to the amendments sent down under the Barrier Act by the Ninety-Third General Assembly, on motion of Mr. Moncrieff, seconded by Mr. D. J. Fortier, it was agreed that Book of Forms, Section 151 now read as follows:

"No debt shall be contracted with security on Church property and no loan for capital purposes be negotiated by any congregation, unless the Presbytery at the instance of the congregation, shall have given its sanction, and only after minute inquiry into the circumstances of the case, the Presbytery realizing its grave responsibility in the matter."

And that Book of Forms, Section 200, Sub-section (h), now read as follows:

"No congregation may sell, mortgage, or otherwise contract debt upon the security of Church property or negotiate a loan for capital purposes, without first obtaining the sanction of the Presbytery. The Presbytery is enjoined to make minute inquiry into the circumstances of each case, the Presbytery realizing its grave responsibility in the matter."

This was now declared to be the Law of the Church.

REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON OVERTURE NO. 4, PRESBYTERY OF CALGARY — RE: NAME OF CALGARY-MACLEOD OVERTURE NO. 15, PRESBYTERY OF SASKATOON — RE: AMALGAMATION OF THE PRESBYTERIES OF PRINCE ALBERT AND SASKATOON OVERTURE NO. 16, PRESBYTERY OF PRINCE ALBERT — RE: AMALGAMATION WITH SASKATOON PRESBYTERY

The Assembly called for the Report of the Special Committee on the

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above Overtures, which was handed in by Mr. M. S. McLean, the Convener, as follows:

1. We recommend that the prayer of Overture No. 4 be granted.
2. We recommend that the Prayers of Overtures Nos. 15 and 16 re: the amalgamation of the Presbyteries of Prince Albert and Saskatoon be granted in the following terms:
 - (A) That the Presbytery of Prince Albert and Saskatoon be joined into one Presbytery called the Presbytery of Northern Saskatchewan.
 - (B) That the Presbytery of Northern Saskatchewan hold its first meeting in Saskatoon, and within St. Andrew's Church there, on Monday the ninth day of September in the year of our Lord, nineteen hundred and sixty-eight, and at ten o'clock in the morning, local time, and that the Rev. Malcolm Muth constitute the Court.

Mr. McLean, duly seconded, moved the adoption of the Report.

Mr. James Weir, duly seconded, moved in amendment that the date be the first Monday in January.

The motion prevailed in the voting and became the judgment of the Court.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE RE PETITION NO. 1

The Assembly called for the Report of the Special Committee on the above Petition which was handed in by Mr. L. D. Hankinson, the Convener.

On his motion, duly seconded, it was agreed that the prayer of this petition be granted, namely, that the Synod of Saskatchewan be permitted to meet outside the bounds of the Synod, concurrently and together with the Synod of Alberta, and within Knox Presbyterian Church, Lloydminster, on the third Tuesday of October 1968 at seven-thirty o'clock evening, Mountain Standard Time.

NOTICE OF MOTION

Dr. Fitch's Motion of the Twelfth Sederunt re the Christian Labour Association, etc., was placed before the Court.

Mr. W. Perry moved, duly seconded, that the first part of the Motion be referred to the Board of Evangelism and Social Action in consultation with Dr. W. Fitch and Mr. N. L. Mathews for report to Assembly, 1969.

The motion to refer Part 1 carried.

Part 2 was adopted.

RECESS

On motion of Dr. A. W. Currie, duly seconded, Assembly resolved in a recess for five minutes.

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NOTICE OF MOTION, MR. DONOVAN, FOURTEENTH SEDERUNT

Mr. Cooper's motion to refer to the Home Missions Section of the General Board of Missions with power to issue, was put to the Court and carried unanimously, it being agreed that the words "approved by Assembly in principle" to follow the words, "General Board of Missions".

- (ii) That in such areas of Christian co-operation in higher learning the new Institute for Higher Learning, established by the Christian Reformed Church in co-operation with the University of Toronto, be likewise involved.

Dr. E. H. Johnson moved, seconded by Mr. B. A. Miles, that the motion be referred to the Board of Christian Education for their consideration and action.

Being put to the vote, the motion to refer carried.

The 94th General Assembly is grateful for the fraternal and civic greetings which were brought by Rev. John J. Opmeer representing the Reformed Church of America; Rev. Dr. In Ha Lee from the Korean Christian Church in Japan; Mr. J. Gordon Coburn who represented the Moderator of the United

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Church of Canada unable through illness to be present; Bishop F. H. Wilkinson, representing the Primate of the Anglican Church of Canada, and Dr. K. G. McMillan, General Secretary of the Canadian Bible Society, who after conveying the greetings of the Society to the Assembly presented the Moderator and the Clerks each with a beautiful copy of the Bible.

We are grateful too for the telegraphic greetings from President Arthur R. McKay of McCormick Theological Seminary Chicago on behalf of the North American Area of Reformed and Presbyterian Churches.

Greetings were also conveyed on behalf of the Presbyterian Church in the United States, by Rev. Merle G. Patterson when he addressed the Assembly at the Tuesday Evening Sederunt.

The 94th General Assembly would also acknowledge its thanks to all those who conducted the Devotional exercises which opened each sederunt and in particular for the inspiring celebration of the Sacrament of Holy Communion by the Moderator assisted by Dr. J. S. Glen and the appointed elders.

Again, as in former years we wish to record our appreciation of the exhibit of literature and post office facilities which were provided by Presbyterian Publications.

We would also express our thanks for the civic greetings which were brought by Alderman Richard Horkins on behalf of the Mayor of the City of Toronto.

Finally, we would record special thanks to Dr. John W. Wevers, Convener of the Business Committee, for his efficient ordering of Assembly's business.

CLOSING OF ASSEMBLY

The business being finished, the Assembly joined in the singing of the one hundred and twenty-second psalm. The Moderator led the Assembly in prayer. He then said: "In the Name of the Lord Jesus Christ, the only King and Head of the Church, and by the authority of this Assembly, I now dissolve this Assembly and appoint another General Assembly of The Presbyterian Church in Canada to meet in the City of Toronto, Ontario, and within St. Andrew's Church there on the first Sunday of June in the year of our Lord, one thousand, nine hundred and sixty-nine at eight o'clock evening".

The Moderator closed the sessions with the Apostolic Benediction.

I. THE REPORT OF THE GENERAL BOARD OF MISSIONS

Expo '67 was the symbol of Canada's centennial year. The world came to Canada and Canada enjoyed being host to the world. This experience made us aware of Canada's place in the world, and our relationships to the great international developments and problems of our time.

Many of the concerns of Canada and the world were gathered together in the 1967 Presbyterian Congress of our church, meeting in Kingston, Ontario, just prior to the General Assembly. While the church has problems, the vitality of the meeting demonstrates a great potential for active Christian witness.

These are some of the background factors in which the work of Home and Overseas Missions was set during the past year. In "The Lively Acts" our Missionary Education Department attempted to interpret our Home and Overseas Missions in relation to the contemporary scene in Canada and across the world.

MISSION IN CANADA

In 1967 the work of Home Missions was marked by the largest number of manned fields that we have experienced in the past 15 years. This has meant that our Budget was stretched to the limit but we are grateful that we were able to supply the requirements of presbyteries as fully as we did.

Basically the work has three aspects of almost equal size — Home Mission Fields; Non-Anglo Saxon and Institutional Ministries; Church Extension charges. At the present moment the church extension budget takes almost as much in deficit grants as the other two. But with the increase in costs of operation and a subsequent full allocation of budget it would appear that church extension projects will be severely curtailed in 1968. The increased costs of church construction and grants required to support a full-time ministry has set the Church Extension Department to making a study of a different method of financing extension projects. The Rev. J. C. Cooper is making this part of his study project while on sabbatical in 1967-1968.

We have been grateful for the number of men who have answered our challenge for workers. The Board has appointed men who have come to us from The Presbyterian Church in Australia, The Presbyterian Church in Ireland, The Church of Scotland, The United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A., and The Presbyterian Church, U.S. The theological colleges in Edinburgh, Glasgow, Belfast, Princeton, N.J., Richmond, Va., New York and Boston have all supplied us summer student missionaries. Without this help we would have been seriously hampered in doing our work.

We have continued our association with other churches and interdenominational projects — The Reformed Church in America; Canadian Urban Training Project; Institute for Pastoral Training; The Indian-Eskimo Association; The Canadian Welfare Council.

Our immigration Offices were closed at the end of December but we are taking our full share of responsibility in the new Inter-Faith Immigration program. The Board continues its interest in key institutional activities — Armagh, Kenora Fellowship Centre, Maritime Interprovincial Home and has agreed to support the Interdenominational Home for Unmarried Mothers in Montreal.

Meanwhile new fields for mission open continuously. Larger work awaits our church. We must increase our supply of trained staff and we must carry on with deeper consecration and in continuing prayer.

CHURCH EXTENSION

At the end of 1967 there were 48 church extension charges of which five received their first full-time minister in 1967. South Edmonton has since had an appointment made and will be settled in March. One further charge will probably begin work before the middle of 1968.

Of the 48 charges, one half are in schools or other rented accommodation; one quarter meet in temporary buildings and are facing a building program and the other quarter have recently built or are in the midst of a building program. The most recent sanctuary to be opened was that of Knox, Welland which was dedicated on the 18th of February, 1968.

The men in extension work come from a variety of backgrounds and experience. While the attempt is always made to find experienced ministers, about one half of the men in charge of extension work are recent graduates. In the latter part of the past year two experienced extension workers from the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. accepted appointments under the Board.

During 1967 the National Church Extension Committee became a Sub-Committee of the Home Missions Department. Under this reorganization the work has progressed smoothly. Under the guidance of the Director, studies in church extension were made in 1967 in the Lakehead Area; Vancouver area; Regina and Moose Jaw.

The field work has been under the supervision of the Rev. A. R. Mackay in the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa and the Rev. J. C. Elder who has had the Synod of Hamilton/London added to his Toronto/Kingston territory. Under their guidance new work in Parkwood Hills, Ottawa; Bramalea; L'Amoreaux, Scarborough; Martingrove, Etobicoke; Wonderland Road, London has grown rapidly. The Superintendents of Missions in the other Synods also supervise church extension fields. One of the outstanding means used to open up work in new areas has been mass visitation in which neighbouring congregations provide a large group of visitors for a blitz visit of a new area. The method can be commended to older congregations as well.

The Director of Church Extension is on Sabbatical leave during which time he is doing a concentrated study on modern methods of church extension among other churches in the United States and Canada.

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OUR WORK OVERSEAS

Many events in 1967 made us aware that we stand at the end of a particular era of world order. We see the rapid disintegration of old structures of international power and security, while new structures to replace them are little more than proposals and plans, and structures are not yet given enough support to function with strength or effectiveness. The chaos and frustration of Vietnam are the most vivid symbols of the failure to settle conflict but this same failure stands in the wall in Berlin, the line which divides Korea, the Arab-Israel problem in the Middle East and similar unfinished business in many areas. Many of the newly independent nations are beginning only now to struggle with problems which existed at their beginning. They are rent by social frictions, economic problems, political divisions, and in some cases by active warfare.

Within these struggles the Christian Church carries on its worldwide activity with missionary support of many kinds. Church and mission structures are sharing the general feeling of insecurity as they seek to adjust their work to the new situations and to carry the healing and reconciling ministry of Jesus Christ to the diverse and multitudinous problems of church and society.

As we review the work of the past year we would first of all express our gratitude to all the overseas staff, both those abroad and those who serve in the offices in Toronto. We give thanks to God for the faithfulness of the men and women who have remained at their posts overseas in the midst of loneliness, misunderstanding, perplexing changes in church and society, and in many cases great risk and danger. The staff abroad is undergirded by the loyal work of those in the offices and we would express our thanks to Dr. E. H. Johnson, the Rev. C. R. Talbot, the Assistant Secretary, and to Miss Ina Hill, Miss Laura Jackson and Miss Gayl Haniford who serve with imagination and loyalty as full members of the overseas missionary team.

Changes in personnel

During 1967 we were happy to add some new staff — the Rev. and Mrs. C. A. Dunn for Guyana, Mr. and Mrs. John Reoch for India, the Rev. and Mrs. Brian Penny for Nigeria. The Duns were able to go to Guyana but the Reochs and Pennys were delayed because of political events and have made good use of the delay in more advanced training for the particular service in which they will be involved. During the same year we accepted the following withdrawals — Dr. and Mrs. D. J. Wilson of Formosa who will continue to serve in Formosa under the United Presbyterian Church of the U.S.A., and from Nigeria the Rev. and Mrs. M. R. Gellatly, Dr. and Mrs. Roy Ward, the Rev. and Mrs. Walter McLean, the Rev. and Mrs. G. D. Johnston and Mr. and Mrs. Don McLaren. The Nigeria withdrawals were occasioned partly by the problems of war but mostly by the completion of the short terms for which these missionaries had been sent to the work. In 1967 Dr. and Mrs. H. Tanzer who were special appointees to the Bhil field in India completed their service.

In mid 1967 we were saddened by the death of Dr. James Dickson. A record of its appreciation for his services is to be found in the minutes of the 93rd General Assembly.

In August of 1967 the Caribbean Assembly met in Georgetown, Guyana, for its second Assembly meeting. The Guyana Presbytery with the Scottish Presbytery played host to the meeting and demonstrated some of the growing maturity which marks its life.

The Church in Formosa began in 1967 the preparatory work for the special four-year program which is the first stage of the New Century Mission Movement. The Church continued to find itself under heavy political pressures from the Formosan government because of its membership in the World Council of Churches.

The work in India was affected very much by the growing political problems with the Congress Party having difficulty maintaining its control. In several provinces, including those in which our work is located the growth in the strength of Jan Sangh, a strong reactionary Hindu party, is causing grave difficulties. It is almost impossible

to secure visas for ordained missionaries and it has been extremely difficult to secure visas even for those going to serve in technical fields. The formation, under the United Church of Northern India of the Related Churches Committee of which our church is a part was a very important forward step in strengthening the General Assembly of the UCNI. Our India work is focusing attention even more strongly on the development of Indian leadership and the strengthening of the Indian church structures.

Exciting plans have been laid by the Korean Christian Church in Japan for their Decade of Development which starts with 60th Anniversary celebrations in 1968. This development has taken some leads from the Formosan Centenary plans and hopes to double the number of congregations in a ten-year period. While the great burden of the development program will be carried by the church in Japan, it will look to our Canadian church for some special assistance through these years.

Early in July the conflict in Nigeria between the Federal Government and the self-declared Republic of Biafra broke into open war when federal government troops invaded Biafra. The war has been a stalemate but Biafra is almost totally blockaded so that communication even by letter has been extremely difficult. Schools are closed, hospitals have been destroyed by bombing, no medical supplies have been reaching the Biafrans and the situation is one of very great difficulty. A great many of the missionaries were withdrawn from the Biafra area early in the war, but a number have remained. Two of our Canadian missionaries, Mr. Ronald McGraw and Miss Dorothy Bulmer are still in Biafra. The work of the Lagos congregation continues in strength in spite of the loss of a great many members when the Easterners returned to their villages in the East. Vigorous extension charges are maintained at Ajegunle and Victoria Island. Both the returned missionaries from Nigeria and Dr. E. H. Johnson have given a great deal of time to activities of reconciliation seeking to interpret the concerns of Biafra and of Nigeria.

The responsibility of our Church for the people of continental China has been a major concern for some years and the Board has adopted the following action as a guide for calling our church to constructive activity in this very important field.

"OUR CONCERN FOR THE PEOPLE OF CONTINENTAL CHINA"

Background

For almost 100 years The Presbyterian Church in Canada has expressed its concern for the people of China in a wide variety of mission activity, first in Formosa, then in Honan, also in Christian literature in Shanghai, later in Manchuria and in the Church of Christ in Yunnan. In recent years, political events on the China mainland have excluded missionaries and our work with Chinese people in Asia has been limited to Formosa.

Because as Christians we are concerned about God's redemptive purpose for the whole of mankind, we cannot ignore the vast numbers of God's people in continental China, almost one-quarter of the whole human race. We cannot believe that God has forsaken these people, nor can we, who have been given a mission to the ends of the earth, forget or ignore them.

At the present time there is a great resurgence of interest in China and a desire for knowledge. This has been stimulated by the cultural and political events of these days. What is actually happening as the people of China seek for a way of life? How can outside nations be of help to China as she seeks to solve her problems?

As we think of our concern as Christians for the people of China, we should think not only in terms of a word and ministry we may be able to share with them, but we should be open to the word they may be able to share with us from the particular experience they have had. We should meet them as fellow human beings and seek to understand their needs and aspirations as they would express them.

Approved Actions

1. That we seek to provide for all the people of our Church up to date information about developments in continental China, so that they may be prepared for

genuine understanding of the conditions and needs of people there.

2. That through the General Assembly we call our people to informed and continued prayer for the people of China as a whole and for our Christian brethren there.
3. That we encourage our Church members to press for the inclusion of studies about China in the general education system at every level. Without basic knowledge and understanding of China, we cannot as citizens participate constructively in the decisions about China which must be made in the coming years.
4. That we encourage our people and our government to work in appropriate ways for increase of contact and communications in trade and cultural exchanges with the people of continental China.
5. That we select one or more able students and make full provision for giving them advanced studies in Chinese with a view: (a) to using them for a period to interpret contemporary China to our people; and, (b) to having available a number of persons competent in Chinese language and thought for communication with China as contacts may develop.
6. That we begin now to give thought to the renewal of fellowship with the churches in China and the people of China and seek to do this in consultation with ecumenical and other agencies, with a view to making co-operative or other plans which may be most appropriate for future mission.

Your Board through its Overseas Section has continued to play an active role in many joint committees where we work with other churches in research on particular problems, in joint support of major institutions, of worldwide programs for developing leadership, and more intelligent approach to matters such as literature and Christian medical work. The establishment of the Christian Medical Council under the World Council of Churches was a major development of 1967 and already we have had valuable results from the surveys of Christian medical work carried on by CMC in Formosa, India and Nigeria.

We continue to find opportunities for overseas missions set on our doorstep in Canada. Our work with overseas students contacts students from many lands and helps to strengthen them in the Christian fellowship and prepare them for active Christian membership when they return to their homelands. Through our program for laymen abroad we are preparing them for intelligent contact with the Christian churches overseas. Rev. Donald Powell played an active role in the first World Consultation on Laymen Abroad which was held in Germany during the past year.

The Chairman of the GBM visited the Caribbean, Japan, Formosa and India, giving great encouragement to the mission areas, and the churches in which they serve.

The Overseas Joint Policy Committee has continued to keep under constant review the work in our fields and the many questions which face overseas work. Because of heavy commitments in field visits, particularly in relation to Nigeria, the longer term study on "The Facts and Meaning of Mission Today" was not completed in time for report to this Assembly but will be continued. In the meantime we are faced with many new questions as older forms of work become impossible. Should we seek new areas in which to serve as older areas, such as India, become closed to us? Should we develop new types of missionary activity as some of the traditional types are no longer workable? How do we involve the total church constituency in Canada in an active participation in the mission of Christ to the whole world? By lively and fresh attention to such questions as these, our church in Canada may be called to be fully part of "the lively acts" of God in our time.

FORMOSA

Dr. James Dickson, veteran missionary of The Presbyterian Church in Canada to Formosa, and Principal of the Taiwan Theological College, passed away in June and was buried on the College campus. A bust of Dr. Dickson was unveiled and dedicated in

November when the Rev. J. K. Lattimore, Chairman of the Board of Missions and Dr. E. H. Johnson, Secretary of the Board, were visiting in Formosa.

At the 14th General Assembly held in Taichung, February 1967, the first year of the New Century Mission Movement was launched with emphasis on prayer and training. On June 18th, the date the gospel first came to Taiwan, more than 800 churches all over the island observed it as the start of the New Century Mission Movement.

A consultation in preparation for the second year of the Movement with emphasis on Mountain tribal work was held in November. Forty delegates attended from both plains and mountain presbyteries. The findings of the consultation were handed over to a Promotion Committee for implementation.

Fuller Unity in the General Assembly

For the past century, the Presbyterian Church of Formosa was divided into the Northern (Canadian) and Southern (English) Presbyterian Churches. In 1952 the Assembly was organized which combined the two churches into one Assembly; however, the North Synod still exists retaining three institutions and its property. At the February 1967 Assembly, the Mackay Memorial Hospital was officially announced as becoming a part of the Assembly structure. A plan for the integration of the Taiwan Theological College has undergone study. It is expected that this plan will be implemented in 1968.

About a year ago the issue of withdrawal from the World Council of Churches organization was raised in the Seven Stars Presbytery. The proposal was brought up at the 1967 Assembly. A study committee was appointed and for a six-month period they did painstaking work. A statement proposing that the Church remain in the W.C.C. was received and approved by the Executive Committee of the Assembly.

The Presbyterian Church of Formosa received financial help in 1967 from the Presbyterian Church, U.S., for the development of student centres. Various student centre buildings were erected where students are concentrated. In Taipei a small but attractive centre was purchased near the University.

Dr. Donald Wilson writes: "A great deal of my time after Assembly was involved with the planning and strategy of the New Century Mission Movement. . . . One of the most promising aspects of this plan has been the desire of the Presbyterian Church to share the New Century Mission Movement with the other churches which are represented in the Ecumenical Consultative Committee. This includes most of the main denominations: the Roman Catholics, and various interdenominational service agencies. There has been a very enthusiastic response to the invitation to share in programs of joint action."

The Assembly Executive unanimously voted to accept the proposal of the United Church of Christ in the U.S.A. to join the other churches of the Consultative Committee as a partner in mission with the Presbyterian Church of Formosa.

For the first time in the history of the Church, a Personnel Secretary has been appointed: the Rev. Chung Chi-an.

Mackay Memorial Hospital

This hospital has had a growth rate increase of 62% since 1965. The number of patients admitted during 1966 was 6,383; in 1967 it was 6,732. Outpatients treated in 1966 numbered 89,442. This was increased to 105,774 in 1967.

In the Nursing Department, the most significant change was the training of practical nurses to relieve the trained nurses in more direct care of the patients. Furthermore the Hospital Board is looking for a person with the proper qualifications to appoint as the Director of the Nursing Department. Miss Rose Chambers finished her second year of language study and began work at Mackay Memorial Hospital as Surgical Supervisor in the Nursing Department.

The Hospital continues to do a sizeable amount of social work, while the Evangelistic Department continues to function adequately under the capable leadership of Pastor Lim. During the past year, 220 people indicated an interest in the Christian faith. Dr. Samuel Noordhoff, Superintendent of the Hospital, writes: "Realizing that we have a fairly large number of attempted suicides, the religious department of the

hospital along with myself discussed the possibility of studying these patients. A pastor was hired to help with this study. We see about 12 suicide cases every month . . . most of their problems are associated with the family, emotional or marital areas of their lives. . . ."

Mackay Memorial Hospital has continued to be active in educational programs associated with the Taipei Medical College, Kaohsiung Medical College, Taiwan University and Taiwan Theological College. The Hospital Board has applied for help in a new building program budgetted at U.S. \$3,800,000.00. The building program has been approved by a medical survey team.

Changhua Christian Hospital — DR. DAVID LANDBOROUGH, Superintendent.

"Bread for the World" of West Germany has, through the W.C.C., given to the hospital a gift to purchase equipment for the kitchen and wards. This organization has also given a comprehensive, top-quality, up-to-date X-ray machine.

A total of 40 girls have been in training during the year. In addition the Nursing School has been training midwifery students from a private nursing school in Kaohsiung. The responsibility of training students is helping to raise the standard of the work.

With the increased ward space in the new building more patients were accommodated. Total out-patients were 56,334; total in-patients, 4,277.

Chang Jung Middle School — Tainan.

Chang Jung Middle (High) School is one of the three high schools run by the Presbyterian Church of Formosa. The other two are Chang Jung Girls' Middle School in Tainan, and Tam Kang Middle School in Tamsui. Our Canadian association with Chang Jung Boys' School began in 1966 with the appointment of the Rev. Ted Ellis as Chaplain. He writes: "The school has made a big contribution to both church and society in the past. Many of its graduates are pastors, doctors, educators and businessmen."

Miss Isobel Taylor is now serving as dormitory matron for the Girls' Residence at Tam Kang Middle School. Her greatly improved health testifies to her happiness in this new work. Mr. and Mrs. John Geddes and family now live on the campus of Christ College, where Jack teaches on a part-time basis while continuing to teach at Tam Kang Middle School and Tam Kang College of Arts and Sciences in Tamsui.

Taiwan Theological College

The Rev. James Sutherland continued as Acting Principal during the absence of Principal Elect the Rev. David Chen, doing Th.D. studies in the U.S.A. Mrs. Chen will return to take over the Music Department of the College. The C. S. Hwang is the acting Dean. There are six full-time Chinese and eleven foreign members of the faculty. In June 1967, 25 students graduated. Twelve were granted the B.D. degree, and the other thirteen graduated from the four-year Christian Education Course. In the year 1967-68 we have an enrollment of almost 150, with another 20 or so doing their military service. Of these students almost one-third are girls in the Christian Education Course. In 1967, two special gifts were received which will strengthen the College: U.S. \$7,500 for the building of a faculty house, and St. Andrew's Church, Victoria, B.C., gave Ca. \$10,000 for the endowment of a chair of New Testament.

Early in the year, a meeting of the faculties of the two Theological Colleges of the Church here was held to discuss common problems and ways of co-operation.

Miss Georgine Caldwell reports: "I am now living on the campus of the Taiwan Theological College so I can join in many of the students' activities and get to know them personally outside of class hours."

Hsin Chu Bible School

The Rev. L. K. Cheng continues to serve part-time in the capacity of Acting-Principal. There are also 11 full-time staff members, four of whom are foreigners. There are about 100 students. A special two-month project for teaching sewing to tribal girls was held in co-operation with Taiwan Christian Service. The School is also a popular meeting place for Presbytery and Young People's Rallies. The General

Assembly has approved the use of this school as a lay-training centre. "The school must re-think its role in equipping young people with an adequate vocational education," writes Miss Louise Gamble, who completed her formal language study in June and was appointed to teach New Testament and English at the Bible School in Hsin Chu.

Yu-Shan Theological Institute

Yu-Shan Theological Institute continues to train preachers for the tribal churches. There are 80 students resident, of which 10 are women. Of the 11 teachers on the staff, four are missionaries. In connection with this Institute is the Yu-Shan Agricultural Institute which seeks to help the mountain (tribal) people improve their way of life by training young men in basic agricultural principles.

Miss Diane Petrie returned to Formosa following an emergency furlough, and received an appointment to do Public Health work in the I-Lan plain area, particularly in tribal villages. The Rev. Murray and Mrs. Garvin and family also returned to Formosa for their second term in September.

The Rev. B. L. M. Embree and family continued on extended furlough during 1967. Mr. Embree is doing graduate studies in Linguistics at the University of Toronto. As of December 31, 1967, Dr. Donald Wilson has changed to the staff of the United Presbyterian Church, U.S.A., so the total staff of the Canadian Presbyterian Church in Formosa numbers 16.

THE CARIBBEAN

During 1967, the Guyana Presbyterian Church continued its ministry to the nation through various parishes, and took part in a wider ministry in the Caribbean through increasing activities under the Caribbean Assembly of Reformed Churches. St. Columba's House, the Lay Training Centre, was widely used throughout the year. The Centre has its own Board of Governors, and the Rev. Joseph Williams is Director. During the year there were Leadership Training Courses in Christian Education, Stewardship, Homiletics and a number of Ministers' Conferences. There was an ecumenical Pastors' Conference held in August with Professor Charles Hay of Knox College, Toronto, as the special speaker. In addition to activities in the Centre, its program is also decentralized and carried into the various parishes across the Presbyteries.

Camping programs for leadership, study and recreation were held for both young people and children. These were conducted jointly with the Church of Scotland Presbytery. During the year, two new congregations were established at Britannia and Hog Island, the first new preaching points to be opened in many years. In August, the second Caribbean Assembly of Reformed Churches was held in Georgetown, Guyana. A pre-Assembly Congress was conducted with a representative group of lay people from Jamaica, Trinidad, Grenada and Guyana.

Ecumenical Activity

There is growing co-operation on the ecumenical scene. For the first time the Roman Catholic and Anglican delegates attended the Stewardship Conferences held by the Guyana Council of Evangelical Churches. There are plans to build an Ecumenical Centre so that Roman and non-Roman churches can study and worship together and carry out joint projects.

The Presbytery of Guyana continues to hold talks with the Church of Scotland Presbytery to form a federated Synod.

There was an increase in the financial givings of the Church as a whole. This is significant as the total membership has remained about the same as the previous year. This is one result of a new understanding of the meaning of Christian Stewardship.

Significant conferences during the year in which members of the Guyana Presbyterian Church participated were: The Religion and Society Conference in Trinidad, which had delegates from many West Indian countries, and the Christian Home and Family Life Seminars also held in Trinidad. The latter continued for four weeks. There was a distinguished staff from the United States and delegates from all the major denominations in the West Indies. This has become an annual event and is making tremendous contributions to a better understanding of this subject.

Canadian Personnel

During 1967, the Rev. and Mrs. David Murphy and family returned to Canada for furlough. Prior to their departure from Guyana, Mr. Murphy served as Director of Christian Stewardship for the Guyana Presbyterian Church. A Presbytery Committee of men trained in stewardship theory and practice was chosen to give leadership and advice to any congregation requesting it. Thus progress is being made towards making the stewardship program the responsibility of Presbytery rather than that of a full-time Director. Mr. Murphy has been asked to return to take up Stewardship Training in Trinidad and other areas in the Caribbean, under the supervision of the Caribbean Assembly of Reformed Churches.

Miss Merle McGowan was Associate Director of the Training Institute at Better Hope and very deeply immersed in all the program carried out there. At the end of 1967, Miss McGowan returned to Canada for furlough.

Miss Athalie Read has been doing Christian Education and Women's work in Essequibo County. Miss Margaret Ramsay has continued to serve in Administration and Christian Education in Georgetown.

The Rev. and Mrs. Zander Dunn arrived in Guyana in September 1967 to undertake an assignment of "evangelism-in-depth". He writes: "I want to say that I think our church has made all the right moves in the area of policy . . ."

KOREANS IN JAPAN

"A time for action" is the title of this year's report from the Korean Christian Church in Japan. As usual it is orderly, attractive and full of useful information. "In our report this year," the editor writes, "we shall attempt to see the church better by looking at the world." The main body of the report consists of a discussion of the plans for the Decade of Development, 1968 to 1978, into which a tremendous amount of energy has been put. This program is now being implemented under the banner "FORWARD! FOLLOWING CHRIST INTO THE WORLD".

Who Am I?

The first section of the report deals with the agonizing attempts of the Koreans in Japan to discover their self-identity.

Where are you — where is your brother?

There follows a section under the above heading which is a discussion of the responsibility of Korean Christians to minister to the needs of the Koreans as "in-between people", and an attempt to evaluate the effectiveness of the church's program in the past year.

Actually this little church is doing a great deal to bridge the gulf between Koreans in Japan and the Japanese people themselves.

Milestones in the year 1967 include:

ITEM — a consultation of almost all Church and Mission bodies working in Japan to lay the ground work for co-operative efforts, in which the K.C.C.J. played a vital, catalytic role and became the focus of some of the concern as the Japanese Church looked at the situation.

ITEM — the Shimonoseki Kindergarten and Night School opened in April, a joint effort of the whole Korean community and the Church (with the support of the Women's Missionary Society, W.D.).

ITEM — after co-operating in a joint local evangelism effort with the Korean Church, two Japanese pastors agreed that "the time has come for the Japanese Church to learn humbly the real work of the Holy Spirit as it may be seen in the Korean Church".

ITEM — the first of the 60th Anniversary Churches was completed in November in Seinan — ahead of schedule.

ITEM — the 1967 General Assembly elected Dr. Y. T. Oh as Moderator for two years and adopted the whole anniversary plan for the decade of development. The report continues, "Humility deepened with each step in advance, and the excitement

at the discovery of who we are, and who our brothers are, is the greatest as we research our identity, our function, and our worldly focus in and through the Lord Jesus Christ."

Aims, Activities and Projects

The 60th Anniversary of the beginning of Mission among Koreans in Japan is not merely an occasion for celebration. It is a time for planning for the next ten years, for which basic aims have been laid down and specific goals tabulated. The basic aims of the Decade of Development are:

- THE RENEWING OF THE CHURCH.
- THE TRANSFORMING OF KOREAN SOCIETY IN JAPAN.
- THE SHARING OF HOPE WITH THE WORLD.

Here are some of the specific goals for the Decade 1968 to 1978:

1. Erection of a Korean Christian Centre to provide training and direction to the growing laity movement.
2. Establishing a student centre with a Korean and a Canadian as co-directors.
3. Strengthening the Christian Literature Program through increased publication and distribution of pamphlets and guideline papers.
4. Promotion of more kindergartens, nurseries and night school facilities.
5. Construction of Anniversary Memorial Churches in each Presbytery for which special capital assistance will be sought from Canada.
6. Requests for short-term missionaries from both Korea and Canada to promote experimental ministries and new forms of Mission.

Canadian Personnel

The Rev. and Mrs. Robert Anderson are in their first term of service and their primary responsibility so far has been the study of the Japanese language.

The Rev. and Mrs. H. Glen Davis are about to complete their first term of service in Japan and will return to Canada during the summer of 1968. En route home they will stop over at Uppsala, Sweden, where Mr. Davis is a representative to the Assembly of the World Council of Churches in July. Mr. Davis's work is described as that of of Presbytery missionary for the Seinan Presbytery. He also played an important role in laying plans for the Decade of Development Program.

Miss Mavis Hyndman returned to Japan in 1967 after her first furlough. Her assignment with the Korean Christian Church in Japan is office secretary to the General Affairs Office. Miss Hyndman also teaches three English Bible Classes which keep her in close touch with young people, both Korean and Japanese.

The Rev. and Mrs. John H. McIntosh also returned to Japan in 1967 after their first furlough. Mr. McIntosh's assignment is Presbytery missionary in Kansai Presbytery with special emphasis upon work among the laity.

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INDIA — BHIL FIELD

Canadian Personnel

Rev. F. C. Knox was evangelistic missionary in the Barwani area; the Rev. J. W. Milne was missionary-at-large in the Alirajpur-Mendha and Amkhut areas, and Interim Moderator of the Jobat Church; Rev. J. D. Howard continued language study

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The M. G. Abey Memorial Children's Home is usually filled to capacity, and this year they were granted a license so that they could increase the number from 20 to 25. Friends in Canada have always helped to finance this home.

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Roger Horrell reports that in 1967, "we have experienced a serious food shortage, and have therefore been active in famine relief. Relief work is closely related to economic development, although, of course, it is infinitely better to have planned agricultural development, than emergency relief at the time of food crisis. In March, Council will consider the Articles and memorandum of Association of our proposed company, whose objects will be to continue the economic development now being done by the Canadian and Irish Presbyterian Missions. A decision to merge and to incorporate will put economic development on a sound and permanent basis."

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Medical

The heart and centre of the medical work in the Bhil area is Jobat Christian Hospital which has had an Indian Medical Superintendent, Dr. Daniel, for the past two years. Miss Mary Sherrick is Business Administrator. The School of Nursing has a student body of twenty-nine with Miss Mary Nichol as Director of Nursing Education. All the students were successful in their final exams. In December, the Rev. J. K. Lattimore, Chairman of the General Board of Missions, officially opened three new buildings in the hospital. Miss Nichol reports that one of the weaknesses in their nursing service program has been the lack of continuity in the post of director. No one has remained in the job for very long. They hope to remedy this soon by appointing an Indian to the post.

Mobile Medical Units

Miss Doreen Morrison reports from Barwani: "The nurses again have been very active in the over-all program for welfare, and relief is very much a part of Public Health work . . . Deficiencies and malnutrition are beginning to decrease as nutritional foods we have helped to provide are beginning to be apparent, especially in small children. . . . Tuberculosis continues to be found in most villages. This, of course, indicates that early symptoms have not been attended to, and many people have gone for a long time without proper nutrition, clothing, or housing. We have found only one or two cases this year of rank starvation which were beyond repair. Mental illness has had a climb which is quite natural after such a long struggle. . . ."

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villages . . . In Mendha and Amkhut there are facilities for deliveries and in Mendha more babies were delivered in the Centre than in private homes by the nurses. This difference is significant for it testifies to the growing awareness, on the part of the villagers, of the benefits of a safe, clean environment at the time of the birth of their children. It also shows the importance of public health teachers in the homes. No report of the work of the Units would be complete without mentioning Miss Ida White and her faithful, outstanding contribution to His witness in the villages. Her gifts of love, laughter and loyalty are sorely missed and needed."

INDIA — JHANSI FIELD

The Rev. Angus MacKay, who has given forty years of service in India writes generally of India in 1967: "India continues to be in a state of revolution, politically, industrially, socially and spiritually, and has reached a stage now which might be described as explosive. Militant political parties are growing stronger; on the other hand, good and constructive elements are also at work including those within the Christian Church."

In May 1967, all commonwealth missionaries (but not other commonwealth people) were required to obtain Residential permits from the Government of India and come under the surveillance of the Civil Investigation Department who check on all movements. Visas for newly appointed missionaries are invariably turned down. This means that a greater burden and responsibility is to be placed upon the national Christians.

Last year's Jhansi Crusade has borne fruit. Sunday Schools have come alive; junior choirs have begun to put new life into worship services; several young men were happy to offer part of their summer vacation for gospel distribution; and two young people left for training in a Bible Institute. The Bundelkhand Convention, held annually on our premises affords an opportunity for evangelism along with helpful Bible studies. Among the crowds which attended many were nominal Christians. A few were non-Christians, including representatives of the CID.

Six new wells have been dug and four deepened as a famine relief measure. Stretches of badly needed village roads have been built and some roadways attended to on our extensive Jhansi property. Hundreds of needy, destitute people received additional help in their daily wages. In October, a special survey team of the UCNI visited our Church Council area for three days. Late in the year, we were happy to welcome the Rev. J. K. Lattimore.

INDIA CO-OPERATIVE WORK

The world-famous Christian Medical Centre at Vellore, one of India's main medical training and research centres, is an illustration of how we work co-operatively with other denominations. It receives a regular grant from the GBM and has on its staff teaching in the School of Nursing, Mrs. Mildred Gehman, appointed by the W.M.S. (W.D.) She writes: "In July, we admitted 60 R.N. students, 20 B.Sc. nursing students, 8 Post-Certificate B.Sc. Nursing, 22 Sister Tutor students, 60 medical students and 100 para-medical students." Steps are being taken to change the status of Vellore from that of a college affiliated with Madras University to that of a university.

Miss Pauline Brown spent the first few months of 1967 at the Graduate School for Nurses in Indore with which our Church is associated. It is of interest to note that the Rehabilitation Centre under Dr. Mary Verghese now has 25 or more handicapped patients learning a new way of life and a way to earn a living in a happy, relaxed atmosphere. (The book *Take My Hands*, by Dorothy Clarke Wilson tells the moving story of Dr. Verghese.)

The church has a great stake in theological training and gives support to the historic Serampore Theological College which sets standards and grants degrees for some twenty-five different theological colleges throughout India, of which Bareilly College is the one most closely related to the work of the Bhil and Jhansi areas and carries on its instruction in the Hindi language.

The church also assists in the support of the Allahabad Agricultural Institute as an indication of its interest in the whole man and in relating the gospel to his needs.

CARREFOUR

The Rev. Donald H. Powell, Director of Service for Overseas Students (in Canada) and Laymen Abroad (from Canada) reports on the work to which he has been assigned by the Overseas Executive. "Carrefour" — cross-roads — suggests the coming and going of both students from other countries and Canadian business and professional people who go abroad. The cross-roads becomes a key point of Christian witness and Mr. Powell's task is to see that the Presbyterian Church — and the Canadian Council of Churches, where his leadership has also been felt — brings this ministry into sharp, clear focus.

Overseas Students

In Canadian Universities, colleges and industrial organizations, we have a stream of students and trainees from almost every country in the world. There were more than 19,000 students and trainees from abroad in 1967, and the number is increasing every year. We have been working with presbyteries, congregations and families in promoting programs of hospitality and friendly interest in the well-being of these visitors from abroad. We have on record the names of a considerable number who have returned to serve with their countries' churches as responsible and dedicated Christian lay men and women. We have been seeking to work closely with the Canadian Service for Overseas Students and Trainees (CSOST), with the External Aid Office overseas students Canadian study program, with universities and other voluntary agencies, to provide reception and other essential services for students from abroad studying in Canada.

Laymen Abroad

We have been given the responsibility of awakening Church people to this new potential in missionary service — the Christian lay men and women who go throughout the world in business, industry, education and government. An important concern has been to relate the laymen overseas with their home Church as well as with the church and community in the area overseas in which they travel or work. Attention has been given to participation in co-operative programs for training personnel going abroad. In laymen abroad we have a missionary potential far beyond the total resources and strength of the professional missionary movement.

NIGERIA: ONE NATION OR TWO?

One of the outstanding events of the year 1967 was the return of thousands of Ibo people from Lagos and the West and Mid-West Regions to the former Eastern Region of Nigeria. Since the coup of July 29, 1966, and the massacre of the Ibo people in the former Northern Region of Nigeria, it is estimated that up to August 1967 some 2,000,000 Ibos returned home.

However, the program of 1966 and the flight of these 2,000,000 refugees to Iboland in 1966-67 created a tremendous psychological situation in the former Eastern Region which the rest of the Federation failed to understand or to act upon with sufficient measures in sufficient time. Almost every Ibo family lost close relatives in the genocide in the North. The exact number of Ibo and other Eastern people killed in the North in 1966 is usually reported as being between 20,000 and 30,000.

The outstanding developments in 1967 were the failure of national reconciliation; the creation by the Federal Military Government of the twelve states to prevent future domination of Nigeria by any region or dominant tribe; the secession of the Eastern Region which was named "Biafra"; and the bloody and bitter Civil War, which has resulted in the economic and communications blockade of the former Eastern Region.

Civil War

The civil war already has had some very serious effects on the Church. It has not been possible to hold the Annual Synod Meeting in January, 1968, and Lagos has not been able to attend meetings of Presbytery since April. The situation has certainly emphasized the need to create a Presbytery for Lagos and the West as soon as possible.

We have reports of death of many of our church members in the battle areas. In addition to civilians, no doubt many young men who joined the armed forces on both sides will be killed or wounded. There are also reports of church property damaged. So far the most notable is the damage suffered from bombing by the Presbyterian Hospital at Itu. The civil war will test the unity and fellowship of many congregations to the very limit. It may well be that the Presbyterian Church will be divided into two — one for Biafra and one for rest of the Federation. Much will depend upon the actual outcome of the war and the success or failure of tribal and personal Christian reconciliation.

Reconciliation

The churches in the Christian Council on both sides of the civil war have been engaged in extensive relief and rehabilitation programs for the war-stricken areas. Massive assistance will be required in many areas after the war has ended. The Rev. Earle F. Roberts and his family are going to Lagos early in 1968 to assist in this work. He will be Social Action Secretary for the Christian Council of Nigeria.

Report From Lagos

The Rev. Russell Hall, minister of the Lagos congregation reports: "The Lagos Session and Congregational Board have with the consent of the Clerk and Assistant Clerk of Synod, assumed administrative authority for the work in Lagos while the Lagos church is cut off from the mother church. Through the critical months of April-August, our congregation lost many members as they suddenly left for home. We still have a few Ibo members in the congregation." The new manse was almost completed during the year and was dedicated by Dr. E. H. Johnson during his timely visit early in January 1968. The Presbyterian Church in Canada provided a grant of \$18,000 for its erection. The average church attendance for the year was 330 per service. All public meetings in Lagos, except religious services, are banned unless a special permit is obtained from the Lagos command of the Nigerian Police Force, and cleared through the Federal Ministry of Internal Affairs. Also there is an almost complete blackout in force. In June, Dr. Okoi Arikpo, co-chairman of the Congregational Board, was ordained an elder and subsequently was appointed a member of the Federal Executive Council which is the civilian administration under General Gowon. Dr. Arikpo is Federal Commissioner for External Affairs.

The Rev. Walter McLean writes: "On April 1st, the corner stone of the new church in Enugu was laid; the building was completed later with new pews, pulpit, communion table installed and dedicated. The congregation increased over the four years since it was established from less than 50 worshippers to a regular congregation of 400 and more with many leaders of government and industry as members."

There have been many changes in Canadian Personnel in Nigeria during 1967. Some were scheduled to terminate their service just about the time of the crisis and others were evacuated, while still others remained at their posts. The complete run-down in summary is as follows:

Rev. Russell and Mrs. Hall, in Lagos, appointed to Lagos Presbyterian Church for two years ending September 28, 1968.

Mr. and Mrs. Murray Ross, architect in Enugu, evacuated in June, 1967, now in Lagos with the firm of Fry, Drew and Atkinson, architects of the Lagos Church and Manse.

Miss Dorothy Bulmer, safe and well in Ohafia in Biafra awaiting the opportunity to come out on her regular furlough.

Miss Agnes Gollan returned to Canada in October on furlough.

Mr. Ron McGraw, teacher at Hope Waddell Training Institute, Calabar. When Calabar fell, he went to Itu. Mrs. McGraw is in Ireland.

Rev. David and Mrs. Craig were also at Hope Waddell Training Institute. Nancy evacuated in July, David escaped in October, to Canada.

Rev. Walter and Mrs. McLean, Enugu, completed their appointment in May 1967 and returned to Canada.

Rev. Geoffrey and Mrs. Johnston, returned to Canada in 1966. Mr. Johnston completed his history of the Presbyterian Church in Nigeria.

Rev. Roy and Mrs. Gellatly, Umuahia, evacuated to Canada in June; term of service almost completed.

Dr. Roy and Mrs. Ward, Uburu, completed their appointment in June and returned to Canada.

Mr. and Mrs. Don McLaren, Agriculturist near Enugu, both returned to Canada, term almost completed.

Miss Elsie Taylor, Uburu, evacuated to Canada in July, now in Britain awaiting possibility to return to Biafra.

Rev. Brian and Mrs. Penny are studying in the United States in preparation for service in Nigeria.

JOINT ACTION

The underlying conviction of the joint work is that what we are doing is part of the total mission of the Church and we must work in positive relation with those who have been sent to the same task.

Programs of Consultation and Research

Through the Canadian Council of Churches, the Board maintains close contact with the overseas missions activities of the other Canadian Churches, sharing information and experience, jointly maintaining contact where necessary with government and ecumenical agencies, and engaging jointly in study and research.

The Board is an associate member of the Division of Overseas Ministries of the National Council of the Churches of Christ in the U.S.A. Through its Asia office, we consult with other Boards and receive expert opinion on matters affecting China, Formosa and Japan. The Africa Committee has provided valuable insights by which to view the work in Nigeria against the background of the whole Christian movement in Africa. The South Asia Committee provides an area for full discussion of the many perplexing matters related to work in India today. The Personnel Committee provides the Board with information with regard to recruiting, training and maintaining missionary personnel.

The Christian Medical Fund of the World Council of Churches has been established to help assess the particular meaning of the Christian ministry of healing in countries where there is a major investment in Christian medical work, and secondly to survey what is being done in Christian hospitals as part of a nation's total medical program. This program is regarded as a most valuable contribution to missions today. Surveys have already been completed in the Philippines and Formosa. The survey in Formosa will be of immense value for planning Christian medical services in that country. A survey is underway in India which promises to be equally useful. It comes at a time when reassessment is essential.

Programs of World Mission Outreach

The Board of Missions is a unit of the Division of World Mission and Evangelism of the W.C.C. which, through its consultations, conferences and travel of a highly competent staff, stimulates and guides and encourages mission outreach in all parts of the world. Two important groups under the Division of World Mission and Evangelism, are the Christian Literature Fund and the Theological Education Fund.

Through the World Council of Christian Education Curriculum Program, Christian Education materials are being written in the regions where they are used. Thus, they reflect local needs and customs and are in the languages of those regions. At present our direct connection is with the Curriculum Program in the Caribbean area and that of the Chinese Language Program for South East Asia.

THE MISSIONARY EDUCATION COMMITTEE

The Missionary Education Committee continues its struggle for recognition by the Board as an authentic and integral part of the Board, and by the Church at large as having anything to say about the mission of the whole Church. Possibly something could be gained by a change of name from Missionary Education to something like Education for Mission.

The most important step in this struggle, of course, is to produce and promote authentic materials (and people) on the mission of the Church today. This has been our main emphasis throughout 1967.

It has been a busy year in the production of materials. A new Church Extension pamphlet was published — the last in the series of the Missionary Education pamphlets started several years ago. A major production was *"The Lively Acts"* — the Centennial Year Account of the missionary outreach of the Church. This was well received and completely sold out before the year's end. At the time of writing this report a second edition of *"The Lively Acts"* is selling well. The Newsletter was issued regularly for ten issues on various areas of our Church's mission at home and abroad. It seems to be meeting a real need. A bulletin to Conveners was published frequently and has been expanded into a "Mission Memo" for a program resource and tool for leaders in education throughout the Church. We continued the practice of sending out missionary letters from any missionaries at home or overseas who make use of this service. The Presbyterian Church Calendar is a production of this Committee and the 1968 edition was hailed as the best yet. 45,000 copies were sold at a profit on the year's operation of about \$1,500. Because of budget difficulties no audio visuals were produced. Missionary Education produced filmstrips continues to be among the most used items in the library of the Audio Visual Department.

We have had a busy and rewarding year in deputation. Despite a shortage of available missionaries, those who did deputation were widely and fully used and made a good impact wherever they went. One World Mission Week-end was held. The guidelines passed by the Board have been of great assistance both in making efficient use of the missionary and in making clear local responsibility in connection with his visit.

There was another change in staff this year when our office secretary, Miss Marie Morgan left to go to College. She was replaced by Miss Mavis Kirk who has worked well as a member of our Missionary Education team and who bears the brunt of the pressures for our many deadlines.

The key word in Missionary Education is flexibility. In publication we have found that it is important to get out timely productions that can be produced quickly and cheaply and in quantities that can be quickly disposed of. In Audio Visuals we must look to other sources (such as Broadcasting and the Film Commission) for more materials and concentrate ourselves on producing simple and cheaper slide sets or displays.

There has been little or no field work done this year because of overwhelming editorial responsibility. The Director did, however, give a course again at the Presbyterian College, Montreal, on "Christian Mission Today."

II. RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY

with the Overseas Missions Secretaries, Missionary Education Director, Home Missions Secretary or Assistant, The Director of Overseas Missions (W.M.S.-W.D.) as advisory but non-voting members.

- (c) The Missionary Education Executive be composed of five members of the General Board of Missions and the Chairman of the Board, (ex officio) with the Missionary Education Director, the Secretaries and/or Assistant Secretaries of Home and Overseas Missions, the Church Extension Director, the Director of Organization of the Women's Missionary

Society (W.D.) as advisory but non-voting members. The Missionary Education Executive is instructed to invite a representative from the other program Boards, and the Colleges, to form a Missionary Education Group.

- (3) That the General Board of Missions hold one meeting a year, in March, and for a maximum of four days.

II. *Re Annual Meeting of the General Board of Missions*

That the General Assembly authorize the General Board of Missions to meet on any Tuesday in the month of March.

III. *Re Stipends and Allowances*

- (1) That the stipend and allowances for Catechists effective July 1st, 1968 be:

- (2) That the stipend and allowances for married students on yearly appointments effective July 1st, 1968 be:

IV. *Overture No. 18 (Part B) 1967 Presbytery of Paris*

That the prayer of the Overture be not granted.

That the Hungarian work in each Synod is already under the care of a Superintendent except in the Synod of Hamilton and London.

That the guidance of the Advisory Committee on Hungarian work is adequate for the purposes of the Board of Missions.

V. *Overture 49 Unprinted, Presbytery of Peterborough*

That the Overture be answered in the following terms:

- That there is no department in the Canadian Council of Churches through which the various denominations can work in extension operations under a co-operative scheme.
- That there is no National Committee under the various denominations that is responsible for the planning for Church Extension in all areas.
- That approaches of the kind suggested by this overture can be made by Presbyteries in planning Church Extension through Presbyteries, Conventions, Dioceses, in other denominations in Canada.
- That the National Church Extension Committee has recommended to all Presbyteries of the Presbyterian Church in Canada that such inter-church co-operation at Presbytery level be sought in locating Church property.

VI. *Overture 50 Unprinted, Presbytery of Peterborough*

That the Overture be answered in the following terms:

The policy of the General Board of Missions at the present time is to request Presbyteries in the Church to seek the co-operation of other denominations in maintaining a ministry in rural areas by mutual co-operation and allocation of territories, and that in many cases Presbyteries of the Church have entered into such mutually co-operative agreements.

That there are no nation-wide denominational bodies that can be approached to cover a general policy.

176. The Form of Reference for Superintendents

For the following words of reference for superintendents be approved:

PERSON OF EXPERIENCE FOR THE OFFICE OF SUPERINTENDENT OF MISSIONS

1. General

- (1) *The title of the office shall be Superintendent of Missions.*
- (2) *The office shall be administered by the Home Section of the General Board of Missions, Association designated on the Board.*
- (3) *The area to be served by a Superintendent shall be determined by the Board and the Board shall have authority to appoint a Superintendent in any case where his services are considered desirable and acceptable in the courts.*
- (4) *When a Superintendent of Missions serves an area which embraces part or all of one or more Presbyteries or Synods, the amount of time the Superintendent will spend within the bounds of either court's jurisdiction will be arranged by the Board in consultation with the courts concerned.*

II. Relationship

- (1) *with the GBM*
 - (a) *the Superintendent shall serve as an executive officer of the Board in the area to which he is assigned (1) interpreting and applying the policy of the Board within the courts and congregations, (2) representing the Board in the processing by the courts of applications for grants and appointments, (3) maintaining contact with workers appointed by the Board and offering guidance, assistance, and encouragement wherever possible, (4) undertaking special inquiries and assignments as the Board may require*
 - (b) *he shall attend the meetings of the GBM as a consultant and on request he may also attend meetings of the Home Missions Executive when matters relevant to his area are being considered*
 - (c) *he shall serve as appointed on various committees of the Board*
 - (d) *the Board shall consult with the Superintendent before making an appointment within the Synod which he serves*
 - (e) *he shall represent also the Overseas Section when requested in such matters as — recruitment of personnel for Overseas service; arrangement of itineraries for Overseas personnel on deputation; etc.*
 - (f) *he shall assist the Missionary Education Department as requested in such matters as — disseminating information throughout his area of the missionary work of the Church; promoting Missionary Education programmes; undertaking engagements on behalf of Missionary Education; etc.*
 - (g) *he shall report on his activities and the progress of the work in his area as the Board shall require.*
- (2) *with the W.M.S. upon invitation to work with the W.M.S. for the improvement of the overall church effort and witness in the area to which he is appointed, e.g. in any of the following ways*
 - (a) *by consultation regarding placement of W.M.S. appointees*
 - (b) *by reports on the usefulness, activities, etc. of W.M.S. appointees*
 - (c) *by offering suggestions regarding projects, present and prospective*
 - (d) *by attending meetings of W.M.S. Synodical and Presbyterial bodies in the same capacity as the Home Missions Secretary attends meetings of the National executive of the Women's Missionary Societies*

- (e) *by examining and commenting on the reports of deaconesses and other W.M.S. workers in the area.*
- (3) *with other Boards and Committees of the Church: the Superintendents are in fact representatives of the whole church, not only of the Board of Missions, and as such they should be provided with the latest information by the General Assembly's Boards. Upon the request of any Board or Committee they may undertake particular responsibilities on its behalf.*
 - (a) *Superintendents may assist the Board of Education in the evaluation of Candidates applying for reception into the ministry and of candidates recommended for courses leading into the ministry*
 - (b) *Superintendents may assist the Lending Fund Committee in obtaining information with respect to applications for loans and in negotiations regarding the repayment of loans*
 - (c) *the Superintendent may, where possible, make himself available for counselling congregations in their Every Person Visitations*
 - (d) *Superintendents may assist the Recruitment Committee in seeking out and encouraging suitable candidates for the ministry and for the order of deaconesses.*
- (4) *with Presbyteries and Synods*
 - (a) *the primary authority and responsibility for the direction of all church work (including the Home Missions programme) in a given area is with the appropriate court of the bounds; however, the assistance of the Church at large is frequently required by the said courts in order to implement missionary projects in their area. This assistance is available through the General Board of Missions. The Superintendent is the agent of the Board for this purpose within the bounds of the court*
 - (b) *in keeping with Section 250, Book of Forms, a Superintendent shall lodge his Presbyterial certificate with the Presbytery within whose bounds he resides, and (under Section 176, Book of Forms) the Presbytery shall place his name on the Appendix to the Roll and may make application to the General Assembly for permission to place his name upon the Constituent Roll*
 - (c) *a Superintendent shall be installed in his office by a service of recognition arranged by the senior court with which he is to serve*
 - (d) *the Synod or Presbytery or their committees may from time to time entrust certain special work to the Superintendent with power to issue, i.e. a Superintendent may be asked to act authoritatively in an executive capacity by the court with which he serves. When a Superintendent has been given responsibility for a pastoral charge he shall then have the usual jurisdiction of a minister according to the custom of the Church. When a Superintendent has been replaced by a minister, called or appointed to such a pastoral charge, the Superintendent shall then sever all pastoral relationships with the said charge unless otherwise directed by the Presbytery*
 - (e) *a Superintendent shall report to the Presbytery and the Board regarding the work and suitability for certification and re-appointment of workers serving within the bounds*
 - (f) *Superintendents shall give all possible assistance, personal and otherwise, to all ministers and other church workers within his assigned area*
 - (g) *the Superintendent shall report to the appropriate courts regarding the state of the work in the area, including ethnic, extension, inner city, rural, etc. He shall continually be alert in exploring the possibilities for new work and reporting the same to the appropriate court and to the Board*

- (h) a Superintendent shall receive reports from aid-receiving fields as ordered by the Presbytery to enable him to keep informed.

III TERMS OF APPOINTMENT

- (1) The Superintendent shall be appointed by the Board of Missions.
- (2) The rate of stipend shall be as determined from time to time by the G.B.M., plus house allowance, moving expenses and travel expenses while on duty, including a car allowance at the approved rate, with one month's vacation.
- (3) Other allowances shall be provided as approved by the Board on request e.g. (a) office equipment and supplies, (b) secretarial allowance as determined from time to time.
- (4) A period of orientation shall be provided from time to time as arranged when the Superintendent shall be invited to observe and participate in the work of the Home Missions office.
- (5) A conference of all Superintendents shall be held annually at the time of the March meeting of the Board. Other conferences may be held as authorized and the recommendations from such conferences shall be directed to the G.B.M. for consideration.
- (6) A Superintendent's appointment may be terminated by the Board only after consultation by the Home Missions Executive with the Superintendent and the Synod's Home Missions Committee and upon three months notice.

VIII. *Re Inner City Work*

That Inner City work become the direct responsibility of the General Board of Missions through its Inner City Committee.

IX. *Re concern for the people of Continental China*

That through the General Assembly we call our people to informed and continued prayer for the people of China as a whole and for our Christian brethren there.

X. *Re Minute of Appreciation for Service of Rev. F. C. Knox*

That the following minute of appreciation of the work of the Rev. and Mrs. F. C. Knox be recorded in the minutes of the General Assembly:

The General Board of Missions notes the termination as of June 30, 1968 of the Rev. Fred C. Knox from the overseas staff. Mr. and Mrs. Knox have served thirty years with the Board in India. Mr. Knox is 64 years of age and hopes to finish out his ministry in Canada. The Knoxes grew up in Northern Ireland. After coming to Canada, Mr. Knox gained a B.A. from McMaster University and in 1938 graduated from Knox College. He was appointed to India the same year.

The ministry of the Knoxes in India has been in isolated areas working and living among the Bhil tribal people in the Vindhya-Satpura region. During his years of encouragement to the Church in India, his experience has included camping in remote villages while conducting teaching and preaching missions, teaching at a Bible School for evangelists and teachers, and guiding the work of village evangelists. In recent years he has helped to design and promote programs whose aim is to bring the tribal people into leadership and initiative in the regular life of the congregations and Presbytery. Annually he has given leadership in training courses for laymen, including elders and in refresher courses for pastors and evangelists. He has had a wide contact with Indian Church leaders and has served as Moderator of the Synod of Gujerat, Rajasthan and Mid-India, in the United Church of North India.

Mrs. Knox also has worked with the Women's Christian Fellowship in Barwani and neighbouring areas in their support of the life of the Church. Their two daughters, Mrs. Les Files and Mrs. Archie McLean grew up in

India. The General Board of Missions offers praise to God and appreciation to the Knoxes for their service in India. They have invested their lives in a remote area of India and served faithfully through many changes and crises in that land for the sake of the Gospel of Christ and His people there. The Board offers to them its good wishes as they return to take up residence and ministry in Canada.

XI. *Re Study Themes*

That the 94th General Assembly adopt the study themes "*Toward Understanding China and the Chinese People*" and (as an alternate) "*Reconciliation in a Broken World*", and

That it instruct the Missionary Education Committee to provide suitable materials on these themes for prayer and study throughout the Church in 1969-70, and

That it request the Women's Missionary Society (W.D.) to promote the same themes.

REPORT OF THE WOMEN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY (W.D.)

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

The Council Executive of the Women's Missionary Society, W.D., respectfully submits the following report of the Society's work for the year 1967:

Organization

Canada's Centennial Year 1967 was an active year in all phases of the work of the Organization Department. All age groups learned more of the contribution of the Church to the development of Canada as they used the materials provided for them on that theme.

The W.M.S. Centennial Project — "Prayer, Programme and People" was interpreted in many ways. The results cannot be evaluated but it is hoped that the project will continue.

The Age Group Committees met regularly working with their Secretaries for Children's, Girls' and Adult Work respectively and reporting monthly to the Organization Committee. Programme materials on the themes "Christ and the Faiths of Men" and "Japan" were completed for 1967-68 and plans for programmes on "New Forms of Mission" for 1968-69 begun.

While reports for 1967 show a decrease in the number of C.O.C. and Explorer groups there is an increase in the number of children attending the existing groups and in their offerings to their "Learning—Giving" project. Lack of leadership unfortunately is usually the reason for groups disbanding.

The Girls' Committee feels strongly that priority must be given to the promotion of leadership events involving youth and adults. Interesting experiments in the joint use of programme materials by senior highs and adults were carried out. There is a definite trend towards co-educational groups at a lower age level than previously with the result that there is a decrease in separate girls' groups. In order to meet the needs of teenage girls today we must be prepared to listen to youth and to work out with them changes in our approach to Girls' Work.

In adult groups a number of afternoon groups have amalgamated with evening groups. There is therefore a decrease in the number of groups but an increase in the number of members.

Regional Secretaries have served faithfully in the various Synods. Regional and National Staff have been involved in a variety of workshops and other training events both with groups and individuals; camps, Vacation Church Schools and Synodical and Presbyterian, Synod and Presbytery committees and meetings as well as representing the Church on interdenominational Boards and Committees.

In May 1967 the Regional Secretaries shared with other staff of the Board of Christian Education and W.M.S. in a Consultation for Presbytery Deaconesses; Regional Secretaries and Synod and Presbytery Conveners of Christian Education in the Central and Eastern Synods, which was held at Ewart College. Such consultations have proved to be valuable in keeping staff people and conveners informed and in making possible adequate planning and team ministry.

In August 1967 the Director and National Age Group Secretaries shared with other staff of the Women's Missionary Society, W.D. in leadership at the Training Centre of the Woman's Missionary Society, E.D. held at Mount Allison University, Sackville, N.B. This was a very fine experience in working with officers and leaders in the Eastern Division.

The Committee on Re-Assessment continued to meet through 1967 and will further involve the members of Council in the re-assessment of the Society's work and organization at the Council Meeting in 1968.

Throughout the year the faithfulness of Presbyterian and Synodical Secretaries for all age groups has been evident as they endeavoured to work with the leaders and officers of their departments.

NATIONAL MISSIONS REPORT — 1967

Canada's Centennial year caused many people, both within and without our borders, to focus their attention upon our nation. Falling within the spotlight during this twelve month period was the work of the Church, as many of our members became more conscious than usual of the Christian outreach which is being carried on in the midst of a wide variety of situations and amongst the peoples of many backgrounds who make up our Canadian mosaic. Opportunity, therefore, was given to make known something of the wide and varied ministry being carried on by members of our National staff as they serve in cities, towns and rural areas from Quebec to British Columbia.

As in less auspicious years, we experienced a number of staff changes in 1967. Miss Dorothy Lukes resigned at the end of June following ten years on the National staff, the greater part of which was spent as an efficient port receptionist in Montreal. Miss Lukes was granted a year's leave of absence following her study furlough and her desire to further pursue her studies resulted in the severance of her ties with the Society's staff. Miss Sheila Stephens who served faithfully within the Presbytery of Hamilton since joining our staff in 1962, resigned on December 16th to become the bride of the Rev. John E. Cotton. Miss Flora Whiteford spent Canada's Centennial year on leave from our staff working for the Presbyterian Church in Australia. Her decision to extend her stay "down under" brought forth her resignation effective December 31, following ten years on the National staff, first in Presbytery work and latterly in an effective inner city ministry in Toronto. Mrs. G. Mitchell, our part-time hospital visitor in Vancouver who had given fine service for several years, found it necessary for health reasons to relinquish her duties at the end of 1967. To each of these persons we are deeply indebted for a job well done and we pray God's continued blessing upon their efforts in days to come.

Four members of the 1967 graduating class of Ewart College were welcomed to our staff and three were assigned to Presbytery work in our more isolated areas of the Church. Miss Dorothy Brown was appointed to Temiskaming Presbytery, Miss Dorothy Knight to Peace River Presbytery and Miss Annabelle Wallace to the northern portion of Kamloops Presbytery. Miss Diane Tait was appointed to Brandon Presbytery to replace Miss Mary-Lou Funston, who was transferred to Westminster Presbytery following five years of service in Manitoba.

In our Christian outreach to the Chinese Canadian, our staff of eight was augmented with the coming of Miss Betty Lam from Hong Kong to serve in our Montreal work. Miss Elsie Lee, who had been on loan to the W.M.S. (E.D.) for work with the Chinese peoples in the Atlantic Provinces since September 1965, reached her official retirement date from our Society on March 31st. She continued to carry on a faithful ministry under the Eastern Division on a part-time basis throughout 1967.

The National Department was served by sixteen deaconesses during the year. These young women carried on their work with children, youth, adults and senior citizens, in our inner city areas, in suburban districts, in towns and in rural areas across our nation. In addition, four students were appointed for the summer months to give assistance in camps and vacation schools within our Presbyteries. The Church's ministry to those laid aside in hospital beds was assisted by seven staff members who served either on a part-time or full-time basis, making thousands of calls in the name of the Great Physician.

Study furloughs were undertaken by two staff members in September of Centennial year. Miss Sheila Stephens enrolled in the Supervised Pastoral Education Course at McMaster University, Hamilton, and Miss Lillian Reay took a course of study at the San Francisco Theological Seminary in San Anselmo, California. Three other staff members undertook short courses related to their work and a Training Session for National staff working in Central Canada, similar to the one held in late 1966 for western staff members, was conducted at Ewart College in May, in conjunction with the staff of the Organization Department, Board of Christian Education and Synod and Presbytery representatives.

During 1967 the Presbyterian Fellowship Houses in Winnipeg and Prince Albert provided a Christian home for twenty-seven and twenty-three young people respectively, in addition to a number of transient residents. These represented a variety of racial backgrounds, including Indian Canadian, Vietnamese, Ceylonese, Chinese, Thais, Guyanese, Jamaican and Caucasian.

The Indian Residential Schools administered by the Society in Birtle and Kenora continued their ministry to approximately two hundred and fifty students. In view of the complete integration of the school program in Kenora with the public school system, a change of name was made from "Cecilia Jeffrey Indian Residential School" to the "Cecilia Jeffrey Residence" and the title of Mr. Wasacase was altered from "principal" to "administrator". An assistant administrator was appointed in September in the person of Mr. A. Loewen, who has given good service on the Cecilia Jeffrey staff in various capacities for a number of years. Two classrooms at Birtle continued to be non-integrated, one of which was a small group of ungraded pupils. Special Centennial celebrations were held at Birtle over the July 1st weekend, including an Open House at the School when over twelve hundred visitors took advantage of the opportunity to visit the School. Representatives of both schools, together with Indian young people from a number of the reserves served by our Church, chaperoned by Mr. and Mrs. Wasacase, visited Montreal, Expo and Ottawa in June. This project was sponsored by the Presbyterian congregation in the Town of Mount Royal.

As we look forward to Canada's second century, it is with an awareness of the many problems to be faced in an increasingly urbanized and secular society. The prayerful support of all Presbyterians on behalf of the members of our National staff is required as they seek to serve Jesus Christ in a changing society.

THE GLAD TIDINGS

The Synodicals across Canada were given the opportunity in 1967 to tell our *Glad Tidings* readers what they have been doing in the work of the Women's Missionary Society and the Church. The special centennial issues began in February with articles and features from the Eastern Division of the Woman's Missionary Society, and ended in November with the Synodical of British Columbia. The December issue centred on the Christmas theme in various areas of the work of the Church. As a whole the centennial issues were well received but some disappointment was expressed at the heavy emphasis on the historical angle when there are so many pressing needs to look at for today and for the future.

The Editorial Committee of the *Glad Tidings* at the end of 1967 therefore began to look to the future and the place of the magazine in the total mission of the Church. Articles, features and news will reflect this outlook in 1968. The magazine will endeavour to keep its readers informed not only of mission activities within the Society and the Presbyterian Church in Canada, but also of many phases of mission work in Canada and in other countries where we as Christians are directly or indirectly involved.

The *Glad Tidings* is not to be thought of exclusively as a magazine of interest only to women who are members of a W.M.S. group. Its articles, features and news are written for all readers who are interested in the total mission of the Christian Church. We urge members of the Society to make use of this instrument of communication in the outreach of the church's work.

There are many women in The Presbyterian Church in Canada who have never seen the *Glad Tidings* magazine.

Within the bounds of the Women's Missionary Society, Western Division, there are 118,875 Presbyterian families (households). Approximately 30,000 women from these households belong to W.M.S. adult groups. *Glad Tidings* subscribers total around 21,000. The potential is evident. Let us reach out beyond the membership of the Society to confront the women of the Church with the "glad tidings" of Christ's mission in the world.

CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

The programme of providing Christian Literature is a vital part of the work of the Church's ministry in the world today and most challenging as it seeks to reach out to feed the minds of millions of people who are yearning not only for food for the body, but for the kind of freedom that literacy and education can provide in recognizing themselves as individuals and the children of God.

The goal of literacy programmes, once confined to reading the Bible, now has a much broader emphasis and, while being able to read the Scriptures is of major importance, other printed material is becoming more and more necessary. Materials are now being published regularly on health, family life, agriculture, cooking, and child care. Literacy brings the knowledge that people can be free from hunger, from oppression and exploitation and may have a way of life that will make them free from domination and dependence upon others.

As Jesus is the Light of the World, the purpose underlying literacy programmes is to bring people out of darkness into light, and with 700 million adults still living in the darkness of illiteracy it is imperative that a concentrated co-operative effort be made by the Christian Churches and Organizations in joining forces in all aspects of the literacy programmes and the production of literature.

During 1967 the following grants were made:

Africa: The Africa Literature Centre, Kitwe, Zambia, received a \$500 grant. Courses at the Centre are for beginners, the advanced student and those wishing to do specialized training. Quite a new venture has been the production of a trial book entitled "You and Your Baby", with illustrations — for new Mothers (Our grant made this possible). The Centre is hoping to provide reading material in over 800 languages within the next three years. The Art Studio is proving to be a most helpful part of the work at the Centre.

To assist in the publication of the "Nigerian Presbyterian", the official publication of the Eastern Nigerian (Biafran) Presbyterian Church, \$300 was sent to Calabar.

Caribbean: A grant of \$400 was sent to assist in the production of Sunday School Curriculum and lesson helps in this strategic area.

Formosa: This grant of \$600 assists in the publication of the Formosan Presbyterian Church magazine, the Christian Literature needs of the W.M.S. Staff and the Women's Committee of the General Assembly, each receiving \$200.

Guyana: The grant of \$250 was sent again to assist in the Christian Literature needs of the Church, the W.M.S. workers, including the Guyanese Deaconesses. This grant, though small, covers a wide area of literature concerns.

Hong Kong: The Chinese Christian Literature Council received a grant of \$600. This Council is seeking to serve Chinese people on many continents. Requests have been received from the younger generation of English speaking Chinese for bilingual publications, in order to communicate better with their own Chinese speaking people.

India: The National Council of Churches received a grant of \$400. This Council has begun an assessment of priorities re the needs in the Christian Literature field because of the growing requests for some literature suitable for the many new readers.

The Christian Home Magazine received a grant of \$500, \$100 less than previously because there is more need for "beginner" magazines rather than those on the intellectual level.

\$300 was sent to provide Christian Literature for non-Christian University Students for whom no basic study material is available, e.g. the basis of the Christian faith.

\$50 was sent to the Bhil field for Christian Literature and Visual Aids.

Japan: The Korean Christian Church in Japan received \$600 and instead of dividing it three ways, since the Korean Church is celebrating its 60th anniversary in 1968 and has planned the preparation of a number of pieces of literature in connection with it, permission was sought, and given, for the grant to be used for anniversary literature.

Latin America: The Costa Rica Literacy Centre (ALFALIT) received \$300 and the programme of this Centre now involves 12 national organizations. The basic idea underlying the work of each is "Literacy is Evangelism" and partners in this

work include Pentecostal, Holiness Groups, Roman Catholic leaders and many other branches of the Protestant Churches.

The "Testimonium" publication, World Student Christian Federation in Latin America received \$500 and this magazine is hoping soon to become more independent due to increased subscriptions.

New York: A grant of \$1,250 was sent for the World Christian Literature Fund, the World Council of Churches. Many co-operative world projects are assisted by this Fund. Surveys are made. Research and consultations are held with Churches regarding expansion of their literature programmes.

The Committee on World Literacy and Christian Literature (Lit Lit) received \$1,000. This Committee has been supporting Christian Literature projects all around the world, many of whom would not have been able to finance their own work through their Church givings.

\$300 was sent to the Committee on Christian Literature for Women and Children in Mission Fields, Incorporated, and material is provided particularly suitable for the needs of child-parent relationships.

The small sum of \$75 was sent to the Missionary Research Library which is producing essential material for study and research of Christian Mission work both past, present and future.

South East Asia: The World Council of Christian Education reports that this programme has been particularly heavy because of the increasing need to supply curriculum material in the Chinese language understandable to the Chinese in eight countries of South East Asia, many of whom are refugees. For this reason our grant, as requested, was increased to \$520.

World Student Christian Federation: "The need still continues" (quote WSCF) to provide publications for students in many countries around the world where it is almost impossible to secure Christian publications in their own language either because it is not available, or if it is, they cannot afford to purchase it. Our grant of \$350 has been used to assist in the free distribution or the subsidization of a number of copies of the Student World and Federation News to key leaders in Africa, Asia and Latin America.

GENERAL GRANTS

Canadian Bible Society: Requests for Scriptures still considerably exceed the supply available, one such example being — the Indonesian Army purchased 20,000 Bibles and asked for 20,000 New Testaments, but only half of these could be provided. Java reports that copies of the Scriptures are often going from hand to hand until worn out completely. Our usual grant of \$1,500 was sent to the Bible Society, plus an additional \$200, made possible by a special gift for Christian Literature.

Canadian Indians: A grant of \$100 was sent to Prince Albert Fellowship House, to assist in the establishment of a much needed library for both the staff and those who make the "House" their "Home". This is the first time a grant has been included in our estimates for work among the Canadian Indians.

Canadian Council of Churches: Department of Overseas Missions a grant of \$600 — (World Christian Books \$175, Africa S.S. Curriculum \$225 and Theological Study Centres \$200). Perhaps no grant covers such a wide variety of needs as does this one.

French Work: LA VIE CHRETIENNE received a grant of \$100 to assist in the wider circulation of this Presbyterian Publication in the French language.

New Life: This Hungarian publication received the usual grant of \$500. This magazine, as others, is finding that mounting printing costs are creating a problem, but is still attempting to send free subscriptions to many people living outside of Canada, including countries behind the Iron Curtain.

Evangelical Truth: Quote — "There is a growing demand for the Evangelical Truth and often more requests for additional copies are received than we have on

hand." M.F. A lady from Greece writes (in the Russian language), "I heard about your journal and would love to get it." Our grant of \$1,500 almost supports the cost of printing this very excellent magazine in the Ukrainian language.

Special gifts and legacies have made it possible to answer a number of needs not covered in the estimates and these are deeply appreciated, i.e. assistance with "Reading Rooms", Bhil field, India, the library at Amkhut Girls' School, India, Korean Pastors' Libraries, providing subscriptions to children's magazines "The Lighthouse and Happy Childhood" for national missionaries working among the Chinese people, assisting the Ukrainian Mission charge, Hamilton, Ont., to purchase Christian Literature materials, resource books for the Indian Centre, Kenora.

The many letters of thanks received from those who have received grants invariably request that appreciation be expressed to all who have made this assistance possible and the Committee wishes to take this opportunity to register this thanks. Truly God's Word will not return unto Him — void.

FRIENDSHIP AND SERVICE DEPARTMENT

A greater concept of Christian service has been experienced with the changing of the name of this department. No longer has the work been the sole responsibility of the secretary of the department, rather it has become a total project in most groups with almost every woman participating.

The sick, the lonely and the shut-in have not been forgotten. To them visitors go, carrying messages and expressions of sympathy and concern, but now new avenues of service have been opened which in the past, few auxiliaries explored.

We find regular work being done in Homes for the Aged, Crippled Children's Hospitals, Retarded Children's Schools, homes for the chronically ill and other areas where friendship and service lighten the load of others. Women prepare themselves for this service by studying books written by experts on the subject. Auxiliaries are now becoming more interested in the Society because of the practical work which is to be done and for which every woman is needed in order to cover the opportunities for service which regularly appear.

One hopes that much greater emphasis will be placed on the work of welcoming the stranger to the community and also of sending names of persons leaving our area to the Church to which they go. One finds that although close to 50,000 calls were made to shut-ins and others, only 113 names were forwarded to other communities. This is a serious breakdown in the continuity of our work.

At least one presbyterial sends representatives to Citizenship Court thus providing a welcome to our new citizens. As we welcome these newcomers to our country let us also welcome them cordially to our Church. This type of Christian service is well within the scope of everyone who would be His disciple. May we hear His voice speaking to us, too, "As the Father has sent me, even so, send I you."

SUPPLY DEPARTMENT

What a joy it has been to have had the opportunity to study the various reports from across the Western Division of our Society, and to learn of the continued interest and faithfulness of the members, in the Supply Department.

While in this report we are unable to give the total picture, because of the lack of two Synodical reports, we are happy in the knowledge that an excellent effort has been put forth throughout the various Synodicals, Presbyterials and Local Groups.

The New Look in our Department is progressing favourably. For instance, we were keenly interested to learn of one area where our Indian friends, through a fowl supper, raised some money themselves toward the purchase of gifts, etc., for their Christmas party. Wherever necessary, new and used clothing was placed, several pairs of skates, household linens, and various other items, among them an encyclopedia.

We learned that in one area the C.G.I.T. and C.O.C. asked for work to do. How gratifying to have this link with our girls. Then, of course, there were the "Second

Mile" gifts, those which were over and above the allotted responsibilities, and given in the same spirit of Christian love.

While our women have been busy with our country's Centennial celebrations, they have still been loyal to their aim and purpose, as members of the Women's Missionary Society, and we look forward to the privilege which is ours of continuing to share our abundance, in the name of Christ.

W.M.S. BOOK ROOM

After many years as a section of the W.M.S. Publications Department, the W.M.S. Book Room achieved an entity of its own at the beginning of 1967 when it became a full-fledged department of the Society, with Mrs. H. McComb as Manager, assisted by Miss Flora MacPherson as bookkeeper. The Book Room is the channel through which missionary education material is sent out to all our missionary groups — adult, girls' and children's. In 1967 the Book Room assembled and sent out the 1967-68 study packets on two themes: "The Bible and the Faiths of Men" and "The Korean Christian Church in Japan", as well as continuing to mail 1967 packets, all of which had a Canadian Centennial theme.

At the same time the Book Room carried supplies for all groups, as well as books for inspiration, devotions, knowledge of Church history and procedures, autobiographies, children's books. Through the sale of study packets and the books, the Book Room carries itself financially, proceeds being ploughed back into purchase of packets and books and the underwriting of day-by-day expenses. In 1967 a tidy profit now enables us to continue this revolving plan.

Packets and books were brought to the attention of our members across Canada through the Book Displays sent out by the Book Room and displayed by Synodical, Presbyterial or Group Secretaries at many meetings and group gatherings. It is felt that in the past year greater interest has been shown in the displays which were up-dated during the summer months so that they did not become stale.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON ARTICLES OF FAITH — 1968

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

The Committee on Articles of Faith reports as follows:

I. Re: The Church's Relation to Her Standards

In presenting a revised Preamble and Ordination Questions the Committee desires to review its work on the subject of the Church's Relation to her Standards over the past thirteen years.

The whole matter arose out of the question of the status of The Declaration of Faith Concerning Church and Nation, adopted under the Barrier Act by the General Assembly of 1955, and out of two relevant Overtures (No. 30 and No. 46, Presbytery of East Toronto) to the General Assembly of the same year. In view of the constitutional changes created by the adoption of the Declaration, noted both by the Joint Committee on Church and Nation and Overture No. 30, General Assembly instructed the Committee on Articles of Faith to study and report on (a) the relationship of The Declaration of Faith Concerning Church and Nation to the Subordinate Standards of our Church; and (b) the terms of subscription thereto. The same Assembly also ordered with regard to Overture No. 46, which referred to confusion in the Church regarding the relation of office-bearers to the Westminster Standards as formulated in the ordination and induction vows, that "the whole matter of the ordination and induction vows pertaining to the subordinate standards of our Church (Book of Forms, paragraphs 408-413) be referred to the Articles of Faith Committee for study and report as soon as possible to a future General Assembly, taking under serious review the full prayer of this Overture and all relevant matters." (A. & P., 1955, p. 67 and pp. 347-8.)

In response to these instructions the Committee submitted in its 1956 Report three proposed Ordination Questions and a recommendation asking the Assembly to rule "that the 1954 Declaration of Faith Concerning Church and Nation supersedes, in the subordinate standards of The Presbyterian Church in Canada, Chapter 23 of the Westminster Confession of Faith and the limiting reference to the doctrine thereof contained in the 1875 Basis of Union." This latter recommendation was referred back to the Committee for re-wording and was disposed of in 1957 in the following terms: "That the specific problem of the status of The Declaration of Faith Concerning Church and Nation be left for answer by inclusion within the total task of formulating doctrine and determining the terms of subscription thereto. (A. & P., 1955, p. 67.)"

Three revised Ordination Questions along with explanatory material were sent to Presbyteries for study and report.

In the light of comments from Presbyteries, and after consultation with the sub-committee of the Book of Common Order Revision Committee, the Articles of Faith Committee submitted in its 1958 Report a revised form of Ordination Questions, together with a Preamble and a Conclusion. The purpose of the Preamble was to set forth the confessional position of the Church and to avoid making the ordination questions too long and cumbersome.

During the next three years the Committee, working along with the Presbyteries of the Church, pursued the task of formulating questions to be put to ministers at ordination and induction. Then, in 1962, it asked the 88th General Assembly to remit to Presbyteries under the Barrier Act "Ordination Questions with Preamble" with a view to the amendment of Section 409 of the Book of Forms. After one or two amendments were made, Assembly acceded to the request. The same Assembly also instructed the Committee on Articles of Faith to prepare a shorter alternative preamble for use in the service of ordination (A. & P., 1962, p. 62). Other Reformed Confessions; namely, the Second Helvetic Confession, the Belgic Confession, the Gallican Confession, and the Heidelberg Catechism were recognized as standards parallel to ours (A. & P., 1962, p. 98 and pp. 288-289).

The "Ordination Questions with Preamble" remitted to Presbyteries under the Barrier Act failed to carry. Nineteen Presbyteries approved; seventeen Presbyteries disapproved. One Presbytery withheld approval or disapproval.

A Shorter Alternative Preamble was prepared and approved by the 89th General Assembly (A. & P., 1963, p. 34 and p. 300). The Committee continued its work on the Church's Relation to her Standards by preparing documents on Ordination.

The following year, in answer to Overture No. 30, 1963, Presbytery of Miramichi, which asked that the General Assembly cease action on the matter of the proposed ordination questions, the 90th General Assembly reaffirmed its instruction to the Committee on Articles of Faith to continue its task of providing a revised set of ordination questions with preamble (A. & P., 1964, p. 345 and pp. 87-88). It also approved an amendment to Section 407, Book of Forms. The present Section 407 was numbered "407.(1)" and a new section "407.(2)" was added to read as follows: "The 81st General Assembly (1955) did further enact 'that The Declaration of Faith Concerning Church and Nation, having been approved by a majority of the Presbyteries under the Barrier Act, be now adopted by this General Assembly, confirming the action of the 80th General Assembly, as a declaration setting forth the teaching of Holy Scripture on the subject of Church and Nation' (A. & P., 1965, p. 334 and p. 35).

In its 1966 Report the Committee again submitted a set of Ordination Questions stressing that these ordination questions should be considered as forming part of a larger document which would include the "Shorter Alternative Preamble" approved by the 89th General Assembly (1963).

Valuable comments were received from a large number of Presbyteries, many of them stressing the importance of brevity and conciseness in the ordination questions. In response to this demand the Committee submitted to the 1967 General Assembly a single integrated document incorporating the Shorter Alternative Preamble and Four Brief Ordination Questions. During the year the Committee corresponded with the Presbyteries asking them to state whether they favoured the procedure of placing the theological content in the Preamble and making the Questions as few, brief, and simple as possible. Many Presbyteries stated that they favoured this method and a good number of them also indicated that they were in substantial agreement with both the Preamble and the Four Ordination Questions. A few Presbyteries made helpful suggestions regarding changes in both the Preamble and Ordination Questions.

Aware of the importance and the urgency of this matter the Committee on Articles of Faith has concentrated its efforts during the year on preparing a final document. In the light of comments from Presbyteries a number of changes have been made in both the Preamble and Questions without altering them in substance.

In presenting the following document the Committee notes that the Preamble, which appears in the new Book of Common Order, has already been used very effectively in Services of Ordination and Induction. Your Committee also notes that both the Preamble and Four Ordination Questions are intended to replace the Six Ordination Questions which are used at present. The use of both the Shorter Alternative Preamble and Four Ordination Questions (the old Ordination Questions are without a Preamble) will be such as to make the confessional position of our Church clearer and to strengthen the binding of the ordinand to it.

The Committee on Articles of Faith therefore recommends that the General Assembly receive the Preamble and Ordination Questions as the document which the Committee on Articles of Faith intends to submit to the 1969 Assembly to be sent down under the Barrier Act, and that the attention of Presbyteries be drawn to this intended procedure.

Preamble and Ordination Questions

All ministries of the Church proceed from and are sustained by the ministry of the Lord Jesus Christ. He is our Prophet, Priest and King, the Minister of the covenant of grace. By the operation of God's Word and Spirit the Church is gathered, equipped, and sent out to participate in this ministry. All her members are called to share the Gospel with the world, and to represent the world before the Father in worship and service, through Christ the only Mediator, until He comes again. That the Church may be continually renewed and nurtured for her ministry, Christ furnishes her with pastors and teachers. He requires and enables her to discern and to confirm by ordination those whom He calls to this pastoral and teaching office. The standards

of his Church He entrusts in a special degree of responsibility to their care.

The Presbyterian Church in Canada is bound only to Jesus Christ her King and Head. The Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments, as testimony to Him, are the canon of all doctrine, by which He rules our faith and life. We acknowledge our historic continuity with the Holy Catholic Church and her doctrinal heritage in the ecumenical creeds and the confessions of the Reformation. Our subordinate standards are the Westminster Confession of Faith as adopted in 1875 and 1889, the Declaration of Faith concerning Church and Nation of 1954, and such doctrine as the Church may from time to time confess in its continuing function of reformulating the faith, in obedience to Scripture, under the promised guidance of the Holy Spirit.

All these things you have examined and accepted. Being assured of your faith in Christ and your love for men, the Presbytery is prepared to ordain you in the name of the Triune God to the ministry of Word and Sacraments. That your faith may appear in the presence of God and his people, we now ask you the appointed questions:

1. Do you believe in God the Father, made known in His Son Jesus Christ our Lord, to whom the Holy Spirit witnesses in the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments?
2. Do you accept the standards of this Church, promising to uphold its doctrine under the continual illumination and correction of the Holy Spirit speaking in the Scriptures?
3. Do you accept the government of this Church by sessions, presbyteries, synods and general assemblies, and do you promise to share in and submit yourself to all lawful oversight therein, and to follow no divisive course but to seek the peace and unity of Christ among your people and throughout the Holy Catholic Church?
4. Do you promise in the strength and grace of the Lord Jesus Christ to conduct yourself in your private and public life as becomes His gospel, and do you give yourself diligently and cheerfully to the service of Christ's word, sacraments and discipline, for the furtherance of His reconciling mission in the world?

II. Re: THE DOCTRINE OF THE LORD'S DAY

After four years of work on the doctrine of the Lord's Day the Committee submits the following document not as a definitive statement but as one which represents the best consensus that can be obtained by our Committee. The Committee recommends that the General Assembly accept this statement as an interim answer to the request of the Board of Evangelism and Social Action that the Articles of Faith Committee undertake a study of the doctrine of the Lord's Day.

Statement on the Lord's Day

The first day of the week is called the Lord's Day, because it is the day of the week on which Christ rose from the dead. It is the day which marks the beginning of the new age in which Christ has given new life to the world. Acknowledging that every day is to be lived for the glory of God, the Church gathers on this special day to begin the new week with the worship of God, and to give thanks to God for the hope and joy that Christ has brought to the world.

The Lord's Day and the Old Testament Sabbath are closely related; both acknowledged the creative and redemptive work of God. The law commanded that no work was to be done on the seventh day of the week, so that men could rejoice in God's good creation and rest in the knowledge that their work being ended they were free to make a fresh start. This day also acknowledged God's deed of grace in the deliverance from bondage in Egypt. In the course of time, however, the keeping of this Sabbath law became too much a matter of obeying rules; and this defeated the purpose for which it was given. Believers in the Christ who said that the Sabbath was made for man, and not man for the Sabbath, are not bound by Sabbath rules; they enjoy the blessing of rest which was God's true purpose in giving the commandment, knowing that the only true rest for men is to begin a new way of living in Christ.

Believers in Christ begin each new week by putting themselves and their time

in the hands of God, because they know that their time really belongs to God, and that they themselves are stewards who have God's authority to manage it. They seek to prevent it from being spent on a weary routine of endless work and play, or wasted in a dull and irksome idleness, or taken out of their hands by the demands of religious rules. Under God, they have freedom in the use of their time; and their freedom is renewed on the first day of every week, as they assert that this day is The Lord's Day.

There are great benefits available in an intelligent and reverent use of the Lord's Day — personal and family enrichment through corporate and private worship, shared experiences with families separated through the week, time to leave the ordinary problems and pressures of the week to dwell upon the extraordinary love and joy and strength which are ours in Christ. To Christian people the Lord's Day can be a time for gaining familiarity with the Scriptures, for visiting the sick and the elderly, and for doing the works of mercy and love that do not get done through the week.

The Lord's Day is our weekly celebration of the resurrection of Christ. Such a Lord's Day makes the other six days more likely to be truly the Lord's as well. It points us to Him as the living Lord of life, master of all space and time, who at His coming in power and glory will bring in the eternal Sabbath rest which still remains for the people of God, when we shall rest from our labours and rejoice in the fulness of the glory of the triune God.

III. Re: OVERTURE No. 5, 1964

Overture No. 5, 1964, presents a problem concerning Recreation on the Lord's Day and the relevant parts of Chapter XXI of the Westminster Confession of Faith.

The problem which the Overture presents arises out of the inadequate enunciation of the doctrine of the Lord's Day in Chapter XXI of the Confession; the Confession does not sufficiently clarify the scriptural meaning of rest, nor the underlying principle of the stewardship of time. The early Church did not equate the Lord's Day and the Sabbath. Such tendency to equate emerged in the 8th century and appeared again in even stronger terms in the Sabbatarian attitude of the 16th and 17th centuries. In this religious and social climate the Westminster Confession of Faith was prepared and it could not help reflecting the current "Sabbath" prohibitions which had been applied to the Lord's Day. The Committee on Articles of Faith is seeking to assist the Church to enunciate its understanding of the Lord's Day more fully in agreement with the Word of God, and to that end it submitted four study papers to the Assembly of 1964 and a statement on "The Doctrine of the Lord's Day" in 1966, and is submitting a revised statement on the Doctrine of the Lord's Day to this Assembly. In the light of the statements already produced and the one here presented, keeping in mind that for most Canadians two non-working days each week is accepted practice and that, in our present mode of life and work, inactivity is for many not rest but rather a danger to health and well-being, the Committee recommends that the Overture be answered in the following terms:

"Every activity of the Lord's Day, including recreation, is comprehended within the discipline of Christian stewardship, in which, giving the first of our time to the praise of God, and submitting the whole of our time to the direction of God, we become free under God to enjoy the time at our disposal. We recognize that incessant recreation on the Lord's Day, as well as the complete prohibition of recreation on the Lord's Day, would be incompatible with the Christian stewardship of time, and would be destructive of the rest provided for in the Fourth Commandment. The fact that it is performed on the Lord's Day does not make recreation or any other activity unlawful for Christians, but it may render it unhelpful. In his love to the brethren the Christian will always seek to observe the Lord's Day in such a way as will cause no hurt or inconvenience to his fellows or hindrance to their observance of the Day in ways that seem appropriate to them."

IV. Re: OVERTURE No. 11, 1961

This Overture was referred to the Committee on Articles of Faith for study and report but never was given a reply. The Overture is as follows:

Re ORDERS OF ADULT BAPTISM AND CONFIRMATION OF BAPTISMAL VOWS IN THE BOOK OF COMMON ORDER

WHEREAS, the relationship between Adult Baptism and Confirmation of Baptized Persons is no where clearly set forth, and

WHEREAS, present usage tends to call into question the rights, responsibilities, and privileges pertaining to the former, and

WHEREAS, some uncertainty exists as to the necessity of unbaptized adults seeking admission to full communion having twice to confess publicly their faith,

THEREFORE, we the Presbytery of Pictou do humbly overture the Venerable the General Assembly to declare the position of our Church in this regard.

The Book of Common Order authorized by the General Assembly in 1964 would seem to answer the concern of the Presbytery of Pictou in this regard. The new book has an "Order for the Baptism of an Adult and Admission to the Lord's Table" on page 87. This order is for use only when there are no other candidates, already baptized in infancy, to be confirmed and admitted. On page 99 there is an "Order for Confirmation of those Baptized in Infancy and Baptism and Confirmation of Adults". These two orders indicate that the Baptism of adults ought to be regarded as the occasion of profession of faith and their admission to the Lord's Table. It is recognized that the circumstances may require the Session to make a different arrangement from those described in the new Book of Common Order.

For instance, it may be expedient for various reasons for the administration of the Sacrament of Baptism to take place some time prior to a public profession of faith and admission to the Lord's Table. Such an arrangement may make it necessary for there to be a repetition of the vows given on the occasion of the baptism. The Session must make the decision and its responsibilities in this regard are spelled out in the Book of Forms par. 110 (a).

It is recommended that the appropriate orders of service in the new Book of Common Order approved by the General Assembly 1964 for voluntary use be regarded as the answer to Overture No. 11, 1961.

V. Re: OVERTURE No. 17, 1967

Overture No. 17 (p. 421, A. & P. 1967) raises the question about what the writers of the overture consider to be language offensive to the Roman Catholic Church within the Westminster Confession of Faith. It argues that such negative criticism is not part of a confessional statement and therefore should be removed. Four sentences are extracted from the Westminster Confession of Faith, and the prayer of the overture is that these sentences be deleted. The four sentences deal with (a) monastic vows; (b) the pope as antichrist; (c) the marriage of reformed people with infidels and papists, and (d) the celebration of the mass as a blasphemous reflection on Christ's one sacrifice.

Since the Westminster Confession of Faith is an historical document, the judgment of our Church has always been that it ought not to be altered, but that, where necessary, a declaratory statement or other explanatory note can be made; for example, *The Declaration Concerning Church and Nation* A. & P. 1955 p. 288 and the Reply to Overture No. 25, 1964, A. & P. 1966, p. 267 — *The Headship of Christ and Ecclesiastical Authority*. Therefore, we would advise against the deletion of these sentences.

Regarding our present-day attitude to the issues raised in the overture, we draw attention to the fact that the Church of Rome is herself currently re-thinking these matters, and we are watching with great interest the changes taking place in that Church (e.g. see Hans Küng, "The Council, Reform and Reunion"). While we recognize the offensive nature of these statements and do not regard them as true, we

nevertheless advise against making any definite judgment on these matters at this time. For these reasons we recommend that the prayer of the Overture be not granted.

VI Re: OVERTURE No. 18, 1967

Overture No. 18 (p. 422, A. & P., 1967) is concerned with the Christian Faith and Life Church School Curriculum. The curriculum is criticized for its use of the Bible, for its weakness in doctrine, and for its Roman Catholic influence. From a study of the documentation given to corroborate the criticisms, it is apparent that, although some of the judgments possess validity, many examples have been taken out of context, some examples are incorrect, and other examples are not justified in the light of historic Reformed theology. Indeed, in some cases, historic Reformed theology itself has been unwittingly criticized. In addition, the present Christian Faith and Life Curriculum will go out of existence within two years. We would, therefore, advise against granting the prayer of the overture which asked for withdrawal of approval of the curriculum by the General Assembly.

We suggest further:

1. That the Presbytery of Chatham be thanked for its careful study of the present curriculum and for its concern about the education of our young people.
2. That members of the Presbytery of Chatham be invited to consult with Professors W. S. Reid and J. C. Hay for the purpose of discussion concerning some of the criticisms.

VII. LETTER FROM STATED CLERK OF THE UNITED PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

Re: "CONFESSION OF 1967"

A letter to the Clerk of our Church from the Stated Clerk of the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. was sent to our Committee. The letter referred to the adoption of the following resolution by the 1967 General Assembly of the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A.:

"That this 179th General Assembly (1967) humbly commend this our Confession of 1967 to other Christian Churches — Roman Catholic, Orthodox, and Protestant — for their prayerful consideration and study; that, if need be, this our Confession may be corrected out of God's mouth, the Holy Scriptures; and that this our confession of reconciliation in Christ, or some such confession, may be the confession of the one, holy, Catholic Church of Jesus Christ in this land.

We recommend that The Presbyterian Church in Canada accede to this request and refer it to the Articles of Faith Committee for implementation and report back to the 1969 General Assembly.

VIII. Re: THE CONSTITUTION OF THE COMMITTEE

By action of the 91st General Assembly (1965) the Committee on Articles of Faith was established as a standing committee of the Church. At present the Committee is composed of twenty-four members plus six members by correspondence. Members are appointed for a term of three years with one-third of the membership retiring each year.

In view of the Committee's task to maintain a constant review of the doctrinal standards of the Church and to consider and to report on all related matters which General Assembly may from time to time refer to it, we recommend that the Professor of Systematic Theology, Knox College, and the Professor of Systematic Theology, Presbyterian College, be made ex-officio members of the Committee on Articles of Faith.

IX. Re: PROPOSED CONTEMPORARY STATEMENT OF FAITH

The Committee on Articles of Faith together with the Committee on Inter-Church Relations continues to work on a Contemporary Statement of Faith. A com-

mittee of ten persons was appointed to work on the Statement, three from the Inter-Church Relations Committee and seven from the Articles of Faith Committee. It reports progress and the Joint Committee hopes to present a Statement of Faith to the General Assembly of 1969.

The Joint Committee acknowledges the receipt of statements of faith from individuals and courts of the Church, as requested last year. It notes that at least two Synods have indicated that they intend to conduct study conferences regarding "A Proposed Contemporary Statement of Faith," and the Joint Committee encourages other Synods to do the same. The Committee on Articles of Faith is prepared to give its support — financial and theological — to such study conferences. It is hoped that a booklet of study material re: Proposed Contemporary Statement of Faith and New Ordination Vows will be sent to Presbyteries before the end of the year.

X. Re: MATTERS UNDER CONTINUING STUDY

- (a) As instructed by the 91st General Assembly, the Committee is reviewing the statement on Election and Predestination submitted in 1948. It reports progress. A statement will be presented to the General Assembly of 1969.
- (b) Some progress has been made in the study of the doctrine of Confirmation. A number of helpful comments were received from Presbyteries during the past year. Work continues on this matter in the wider context of "The Characteristics and Requisites of Christian Maturity."

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That the General Assembly receive the Preamble and Ordination Questions as the document which the Committee on Articles of Faith intends to submit to the 1969 Assembly, to be sent down under the Barrier Act, and that the attention of Presbyteries be drawn to this intended procedure.
2. That the General Assembly accept the statement on the Lord's Day as an interim answer to the request of the Board of Evangelism and Social Action that the Articles of Faith Committee undertake a study of the doctrine of the Lord's Day.
3. That Overture No. 5, 1964, be answered in the terms of Part III of the body of this report.
4. That the appropriate orders of service in the new Book of Common Order, approved by the General Assembly (1964) for voluntary use, be regarded as the answer to Overture No. 11, 1961.
5. That the prayer of Overture No. 17, 1967, be not granted.
6. That the prayer of Overture No. 18, 1967, be not granted.
7. That The Presbyterian Church in Canada accede to the request of The United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. regarding the "Confession of 1967" and refer it to the Articles of Faith Committee for implementation and report back to the 1969 General Assembly.
8. That the Professor of Systematic Theology, Knox College and the Professor of Systematic Theology, Presbyterian College, be made ex-officio members of the Committee on Articles of Faith.

With great regret we have accepted the resignations of Mr. and Mrs. H. D. Carson, to take effect August 31, 1968, and have the urgent problem of their replacement. Words fail us to say what St. Andrew's Hall and the Church-at-large owe to their faithful and efficient services from the opening of the Hall to this present hour.

Under the Dean's guidance and administrating of the Hall and his diligence as Presbyterian Chaplain at the University, St. Andrew's Hall continues its high rating on the Campus and throughout the Synod of British Columbia as a worthy witness of The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE REVISION OF
THE BOOK OF PRAISE

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

The committee on the Revision of the Book of Praise, being a sub-committee of the Church Worship Committee, begs leave to submit its fourth report.

It has been the policy of the committee to maintain close liaison with the parent committee on Church Worship. This has been done through the circulation of all minutes to each member of the Church worship committee as well as by having the convener of the committee on Church worship a member of our committee. Most fruitful discussions have resulted from this intercommunication.

We have been indebted to the Editor of the Presbyterian Record for frequent mention of the work of the committee and in particular for permitting an article in the February issue of the Record on the whole question of revision. This article resulted in a very large volume of mail from every part of the country — an indication in itself of the very great interest being shown in the project by members of the Church. The committee is most grateful for all who wrote helpfully and constructively. All suggestions have been carefully or will be carefully examined. Indeed, one of our main objectives is to secure the widest involvement of our total membership in this major scheme of revision, and we are most thankful that through the support of the Presbyterian Record we have been able to reach the entire Church.

Discussions have also continued with the Presbyteries. Following the policy begun from the start of our work, we have tried to keep the lines of communication between our committee and the Presbyteries of the Church wide open. On April 9, 1967, Report No. 3 was circulated to the Presbyteries and comments invited. Report No. 4, containing the words of a number of new hymns we are suggesting for incorporation, has recently been issued to Presbyteries. Report No. 5 will follow soon. We await the result of this poll of every minister as well as the leaders of Synodical Youth Groups with great interest. The committee on Revision of the Book of Praise wishes

to be a true servant of the whole Church in this ministry and the fullest possible co-operation of all ministers and youth leaders is earnestly requested.

The pattern of the new book is beginning to emerge. This can perhaps be best indicated by an outline of contents as the committee envisage it as of now. Here it is:

our present committee for the development of indexes of this kind and will be grateful for all help given. We have been asked to consider the possibility of having a series of biblical passages for responsive readings in congregational worship but feel we must be given direction by General Assembly before embarking on this. One of the following resolutions will deal with this question.

Since our last report to General Assembly, we have tentatively completed work on the words of the following sections: Hymns of Baptism, Marriage, Easter, Ascension, The Christian Home, Stewardship, The Holy Spirit, Pastors and Teachers, Harvest Thanksgiving, The Sanctuary, and the Worldwide Mission of the Church. The Psalter has also been completely revised and enlarged. The only comment necessary on this is that we have in a number of cases preferred other versions, including some from the United Presbyterian Church 1912 edition (a revision in which our Canadian Presbyterian Church shared). We have not, however, abandoned the ruggedness of many of the renderings which have become so much a part of our Presbyterian worship. Change has only been suggested where it is felt that greater clarity, pungency and vigour are the result.

The suggestion made by us to the Parliamentary Committee on the new National Anthem was not received favourably. Their recommendation has been to hold to one verse only for the National Anthem, with an alteration to include the Name of God. To make the Anthem a prayer is welcomed by the committee. This alteration makes the inclusion of the Anthem a real possibility in our revised book.

Work has commenced on the music of the revised book. Under the chairmanship of Mr. Carman Milligan, Ottawa, an excellent start has been made on this. We hope to add colour, distinctiveness and beauty to the music we shall use in years to come. We are hopeful that no great tune that has approved itself to the Church in all parts of the world will be excluded from the new Book of Praise. This is a most ambitious hope; but with the wealth of musical talent at our disposal and the dedication of these talents to this great cause, we are confident that this can be done to the glory of God.

Permission to use copyrighted hymns must be secured in certain cases. Dr. George Douglas has already begun to prepare a list of such hymns as will require permission to publish. The decision of the Assembly must be recorded concerning this. (See Recommendation 4).

It is uncertain how much longer the committee will require to complete their work. It is very possible that another three or four years will be required before anything like a completed book can be presented to the General Assembly. The committee is none the less aware of the need for haste in their work as the plates from which printing is now being made are showing signs of deterioration. Some have suggested that we could better serve the Church by preparing some forms of supplementary books of hymns which could be used in addition to our present book. In the light, however, of the condition of the plates now being used, it is reasonable that we proceed as quickly as possible with the present work of revision. When our Book of Praise has been fully revised, reset and in full use across the Church, there may be wisdom in periodic publication of additional hymns. As of now, the committee are of opinion that there is real urgency in their work and they wish to pledge themselves to the completion of this assignment at the earliest possible moment.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That the committee be continued.
2. That the Assembly's thanks be extended to Presbyteries for all the help that their special committees have given to the Committee on Revision.
3. That in reference to Overture No. 15, 1967, Presbytery of Montreal, (re revision of Book of Praise; A. & P., 1967, pages 35, 420, 421, the following be recorded: "That in the judgment of the Committee on Revision the prayer of the Overture may be automatically answered as some years must pass before the work is completed and by that time the National Development Fund campaign may have concluded."

4. That approval of the Assembly be given to securing rights of publication where this is necessary; and that, in the event of any payment being necessary to secure these, the approval of the Administrative Council be sought.
5. That guidance be given the committee concerning the possible inclusion of responsive readings in the new Book of Praise.
6. That the joint expense allocation, which this committee shares with the Church Worship Committee, be \$1,500.

REPORT OF THE PENMARVIAN COMMITTEE

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

Penmarvian is an estate of 12 acres situated in the Town of Paris, Ont., on the banks of the Grand River. It was the gift of the late John Penman, whose will directed that it be used as a home for sick and retired ministers and missionaries of the Presbyterian Church. The cost to such residents was to be practically on a means basis.

The estate was taken over by the Church on November 1, 1937, and for some years full use was made of the living quarters by ministers coming within the categories intended as beneficiaries. However, as time went on, pensions and general economic conditions improved the lot of the ministers, applications for admission fell off, and widows of ministers were admitted, and subsequently elderly ladies of Presbyterian adherence.

Penmarvian is supported by the fees of the residence; the income from a trust fund of \$100,000 left to the Church for this purpose, by Mr. Penman; by sundry gifts and by grants from the Church.

Though the capacity of Penmarvian to implement the donor's intentions was at the start and is now not great, the work being done for our own people is in the humanitarian tradition of the Church and it is worthy of the Church's support and encouragement.

THE COMMITTEE ON THE ORDER OF DEACONESSSES

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

The Committee begs leave to report as follows:

The Committee met four times during the year. One meeting was concerned with the pension arrangements for Deaconesses. The meeting was attended by Mr. J. E. Smart, Chairman of The Pension Board, and representatives of the W.M.S. (W.D.). The problem of Pension Portability was explored. The deaconesses have been advised to build up their pension with each employer integrating the employers' plans with the Canada Pension Plan. Another meeting was a consultation with representatives of employing agencies in the Church — W.M.S., Presbyteries and Congregations.

Your Committee has a constant concern about the exceedingly low salaries of Deaconesses, the minimum being \$3,200 at present and next year being only \$3,600 with no provision by increment for encouragement and increased costs. The Committee, therefore, asks that a policy of an annual increment of \$200 for 5 years be effective in 1970.

Your Committee also asks that each Presbytery and Congregation should provide moving expenses when employing a Deaconess and that a "job description" should be drawn up. A sample or suggested description of work may be had from the Committee. It is also suggested that employers should provide provincial hospital coverage, Workmen's Compensation and expense allowances.

The first biennial meeting of the Deaconess Council will be held at Ewart College on June 14 and 15 this year when Deaconesses from all parts of our Church will meet to consider Council policy, hear papers and discuss mutual problems concerning their work. The Committee regards this as an essential part of the Church's service and asks that The General Assembly assume the cost of such conferences every two years with no decrease in regular holiday time for deaconesses.

The Committee needs a larger budget to carry out these and other objectives. It needs money for its own expenses — for instance for bringing together once a year representatives of employing agencies — and for the biennial conferences of Deaconesses.

The Committee has asked that money be allocated from The National Development Fund for the support of Deaconesses and their work since one of the principal objectives of The Fund is to increase the standard of living of full-time workers.

We also would like to have the names and addresses of Deaconesses published in the annual publication of The Acts and Proceedings of The General Assembly. Presbyteries are now maintaining such rolls as a result of the decision of the last General Assembly.

An excellent 24 page booklet entitled "The Deaconess in The Presbyterian Church in Canada" now is available for all interested.

Consideration also has been given to the question of under whose authority is the Deaconess in a congregation. The congregation should make the decision to employ with the approval of The Kirk-Session. Guidance for the latter is in Section 175 of The Book of Forms. The Committee recommends to Sessions that a small committee of perhaps two members of the Session be set up to be made responsible for the Deaconess; that this committee be most discreet, available for consultation with the Deaconess and ready to give help in any problem.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That beginning in 1970 a policy of annual increments of \$200 per year (from the minimum salary) for 5 years be instituted for deaconesses.
2. That the General Assembly approve of a budget of \$1,950 for the Committee for 1969.
3. That the names and addresses of Deaconesses employed in Presbyteries be recorded in the annual General Assembly Acts and Proceedings in this Committee's report.

REPORT OF THE LENDING FUND COMMITTEE

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

During the year 1967 the following eight congregations paid off their loans completely: St. Paul's, McClure Mills; St. David's, Scarborough; Westminster, Scarborough; St. Matthew's, Toronto; St. Mark's, Orillia; St. Lawrence, London; Knox, Cranberry Portage; and Knox, Cochrane. New loans were made to eight congregations: St. Andrew's, Flin Flon; Parkwood, Ottawa; St. Andrew's, Burks Falls; Knox, Welland; Bekevar, Kipling; Calvin, Calgary; Coquitlam, B.C. and Laurel Lea, Sarnia. In 1967 a total of \$101,428 was repaid on loans and \$170,381 advanced on loans.

For 1967, earnings on the Fund totalled \$22,840, of which \$13,611 was interest on loans received from congregations and \$9,229 interest received on the short term investment of funds which were on hand pending disbursement to congregations as loans. These earnings are added to the capital of the Fund and became available for lending to congregations.

As in previous years the Committee must report that it experiences difficulties in getting answers from congregations regarding loans, in securing mortgages and in obtaining copies of insurance policies and annual financial statements.

The Committee has also reported in previous years concerning loans in default. An analysis of this situation has now been prepared and a summarized statement giving pertinent statistics is appended to this report as Schedule A.

This statement indicates a very serious position. It will be noted that of 116 loans outstanding 86 did not meet the original payment arrangements. In some of these cases no arrangements for repayment had ever been arrived at. This represents 74% of the total loans.

Of these 86 loans, 45 have been renegotiated to a definite schedule and 10 of these renegotiated loans are again not meeting the arrangements. 41 of the 86 loans are simply under review and require continual efforts on the part of the Committee to obtain some repayments.

The members of the Lending Fund Committee are of the opinion that congregations and Presbyteries do not regard the obligations to the Lending Fund in a sufficiently serious manner. Accordingly, at the request of the Lending Fund Committee, the Administrative Council is recommending to this General Assembly that the situation be brought to the attention of all Presbyteries and that specific suggestions regarding loans be made to them.

Schedule B to this report gives certain information by Presbyteries.

One of the congregations in Toronto, with the approval of Presbytery, is proposing to enter into a co-operative building project with United and Anglican congregations. Three congregations would share the same building holding their separate worship services but with a joint Sunday School. A building used co-operatively with other denominations seems to be the only feasible arrangement for this particular vicinity if the Presbyterian Church in Canada is to have a congregation there, because of the prohibitive cost of land. It is anticipated that this might be the first of similar ventures in other parts of the country.

The congregation has applied for a loan from the Lending Fund. However under the terms of the Fund as laid down by the 90th General Assembly (A. & P., pages 462-465) the Committee is precluded from granting such a loan. Paragraph 8 (a) of these regulations contains the following sentence:—"The loan from the Lending Fund shall be secured to the satisfaction of the Committee by mortgage on the congregational property." Under the project envisaged by the Toronto congregation, the congregation would not hold any property. Therefore the Administrative Council, at the request of the Lending Fund Committee, is recommending to this General Assembly that the Lending Fund regulations be amended to permit the loaning of funds to or on behalf of congregations engaged in joint building programmes.

Necessary discharges, postponements, leases, title deeds, releases and similar documents were executed under seal of the Board in behalf of the various departments of the Church's work. The Treasurer's report shows that \$130,011.34 was received from bequests during 1967. A complete listing of these bequests and the purposes for which they were received is included with the audited financial statements for the year 1967 found elsewhere within the Acts & Proceedings.

In accordance with the Act of Incorporation, the Board presents lists of securities

- (i) which have been purchased or received during the year;
- (ii) which have matured or have been sold during the year; and
- (iii) held by The Trustee Board at December 31, 1967, in behalf of the several funds of the Church.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EVANGELISM AND SOCIAL ACTION

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

INTRODUCTION

One of the Biblical descriptions of the kingdom of heaven is that of the sower going forth to sow. In Jesus' parable we are made to see the activity of the sower, the fertility of the seed and the fruit of the harvest. All of these elements combine to make the work of the Church the most challenging and worthwhile enterprise we can undertake.

If in actual experience, the fruit of the harvest is somewhat disappointing we cannot blame it on the infertility of the seed. The Word of God is still "alive and active . . . It judges the desires and thoughts of men's hearts". (Hebrews 4:12, T.E.V.) The fault must lie with the sowing — with the sowers themselves!

In presenting the report of the Board of Evangelism and Social Action we must confess that the reports gathered from Presbyteries and Congregations do not express a great concern in the Church for what we understand to be the real mission of the Church — a ministry to and for others which will result in their coming into the fellowship of the Church of Jesus Christ and the service of His kingdom among men. There are, in isolated instances, exciting results being reported where a Presbytery or a Congregation has taken the task of evangelism seriously or has become involved in a specific piece of social action which expresses the concern of Christ for the total well-being of men. But the attitude far too often seems to be, 'Leave us alone. Don't bother us. We're too busy.' The question may justifiably be raised, busy at what?

It has been the experience of this Board that governments seem more willing to hear what we have to say than the Church in which we carry on our work. Increasingly we find governments asking for briefs on vital social issues and giving serious consideration to the submissions we make. The fact that the Church seems less con-

cerned with these issues than are governments today makes one wonder about the sowing:

where is the evangelical fervour so evident in the New Testament?

where is the dynamic social concern expressed in the Gospels and developed in the Epistles?

We hear references being made to the malaise of the ministry, but surely if there is any malaise it is of the whole Church. It seems evident enough to your Board that the desperate need of our time is for the revitalization of the Church and its ministry so that she may again become a force in society and a factor in the decisions of men. The Gospel has still its ancient power, but it needs to be heard — and acted upon or the Church of the Twentieth Century will be bypassed by its contemporaries and by the purposes of God. It has happened to the Church in other ages. It can happen again!

In order that it may not happen your Board seeks to provide leadership and resources for the use of congregations in re-discovering their God-given ministry. Your attention is respectfully directed to the following report.

THE RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN EVANGELISM AND CHRISTIAN SOCIAL ACTION

The message of the Church is the Gospel of Jesus Christ, the Good News of God's redeeming love in Christ. But for whom is the Gospel good news? Is Christ's redemptive work to be restricted to the salvation of our souls, or does it have a wider connotation?

The answer to these questions is to be found in Paul's letter to the Colossians where he affirms that the boundaries of creation and redemption are the same. He says that Christ is the One by whom "God created everything in heaven and on earth, the seen and the unseen things, including spiritual powers, lords, rulers and authorities" (Colossians 1:16, Today's English Version). He also says that He is the One in and through whom "God decided to bring the whole universe back to Himself. God made peace through His Son's death on the cross, and so brought back to Himself all things, both on earth and in heaven" (Colossians 1:20, 21, Today's English Version). Furthermore, God has made this same Jesus by whom He created and redeemed the world, Lord of all.

What Paul is saying in Colossians is that the message of the Gospel cannot be restricted to the salvation of men's souls only without distorting the Gospel. The fact that God in and through Christ has redeemed the world is tantamount to saying that there is no area of life that is not His concern, and that there is no person or area of life outside His jurisdiction. He is interested in us as individuals, and in man in community. The Good News which is the Gospel of Jesus Christ includes "the whole counsel of God" (Acts 20:27, R.S.V. Westminster Confession of Faith, Chapter I, Section 6), and is Good News for the whole creation. This "whole counsel of God" is to be found in the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments which discuss practically every aspect and area of life from the salvation of the soul to international affairs! In other words, the message which the Church is commissioned to proclaim must include Evangelism and Christian Social Action.

But what do we mean when we speak of Evangelism and Christian Social Action? While both of these things need to be defined, it is particularly urgent that we clarify what is meant by Evangelism. There are those who claim that Evangelism is an all-inclusive word to describe the total task of the Church of Jesus Christ, that is, all that the Church is, says and does. Others seem to equate Evangelism and Christian Social Action as though they are one and the same things. In part, the confusion is one of semantics. However, what is important is that we as a Church know what we mean when we speak of Evangelism and Christian Social Action.

It is the view of your Board that both of the views referred to leave much to be desired. If we think of Evangelism as everything it becomes nothing in particular. If we equate Evangelism with Christian Social Action, an indispensable and essential area of the Church's life and work is neglected or ignored.

We would submit that while Evangelism is an integral and indispensable part of the Gospel, it is not the whole Gospel. It is the Gospel addressed to individuals, and in particular those persons inside or outside the Christian Church whom Paul describes as not being "in Christ". The Gospel affirms that man is lost from God; that his sin has alienated him from God; that he needs to be made right with God, and to "put on the new man, which after God is created in righteousness and true holiness" (Ephesians 4:24). However, the Good News is this, that God in Christ has done for man what man couldn't do for himself; that "Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures"; and that "as many as received Him, to them gave He power to become the sons of God, even to them that believe on His name" (St. John 1:12). Evangelism is an invitation to respond in faith and obedience to God's redeeming love in Christ, and to claim our inheritance in Him. This is an essential part of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, and the Church cannot neglect or ignore it with impunity.

Christian Social Action is also an integral part of the "whole counsel of God", and therefore an essential part of the message of the Christian Church. It is the Good News of God's love and concern for the whole man and the whole world. Whereas Evangelism is the Gospel addressed to individuals, Christian Social Action is the Gospel addressed to man in community, and to the structures of society. It doesn't represent man's effort to bring in the Kingdom of God by changing the structures of society; it is based on the premise that the Kingdom of God is here already; that Christ by His redeeming work has "brought back the whole universe to God", and has thereby changed "the whole context of human living". It is not a kind of "work righteousness" that the Church participates in, but the obedience of faith. To minister to the physical or social needs of people is not, therefore, to be construed as another way of salvation, but a test of whether the Church or the individual Christian has really responded in faith and obedience to Christ. To repudiate responsibility for those whom Christ loves and for whom He laid down His life is tantamount to rejecting Christ Himself. This is in essence the message of St. Matthew 25:31-46.

In the light of what has been said, the relationship between Evangelism and Christian Social Action becomes clear, namely: Evangelism and Christian Social Action though not identical are inseparably related because they both inhere in, and are indispensable parts of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. The imperative for both Evangelism and Christian Social Action is the Gospel of Jesus Christ, which includes the "whole counsel of God". Since Christian Social Action is an integral part of the Gospel, the Church doesn't have to wait until a community has been evangelized to engage in social action. By the same token, the Church doesn't have to wait until the structures of society have been changed or living conditions and standards have improved before doing evangelism.

There is also the question as to where the Church starts first? The answer is simply that it depends on the specific situation, and the nature of the need. In some cases the Church will find itself starting with Christian Social Action; in others with Evangelism; in still others with both simultaneously.

However, wherever the Church begins, to ignore one to the exclusion of the other amounts to nothing less than a distortion of the Gospel. It also needs to be stressed that responsibility for Evangelism and Christian Social Action belongs to the whole Church — the Church corporately as well as individually.

STATEMENTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

EVANGELISM

We have described Evangelism as the Gospel of Jesus Christ addressed to individuals, but since there are many ways of communicating the Gospel, many methods are needed. Congregations are urged to use the method or methods best suited to their situation and the needs of the people of their community. A good way to ascertain what methods are required to reach the people of a community for Christ and His Church is for the congregation to make a study of its community. Too often programs are laid on without any reference to the ages and needs of the people. The Board will be happy to provide congregations wishing to undertake such a study with

"A Guideline for Action — Suggestions for a Congregational Self-Study". Some of the methods recommended by the Board, and for which there are training materials are as follows:

Preaching Evangelism

Preaching evangelism continues to be an effective method of evangelism — and this is to be expected. Every minister is called to be an evangelist, and as such the regular preaching of the Word of God should be thought of as an opportunity for evangelism as well as the nurturing of the "saints".

There is a place for the special preaching mission also, but it should be seen as but one facet of preaching evangelism, and as requiring the faithful, ongoing proclamation of the Word to insure its success.

In order not to perpetuate the view that evangelism is the responsibility of the clergy only, it is good to combine friendship evangelism visiting with a preaching mission. In fact, this can make the difference between a preaching mission being genuine evangelism and only revivalism.

The Place of Lay People in Evangelism

Too many Presbyterians talk as though the only method of evangelism is preaching evangelism, and that the only persons who can be trusted to do evangelism are the clergy. This view is not Biblical, and is certainly not a healthy state of affairs for the lay people of the Church. Until the place of lay people in evangelism is recognized, and they are given the opportunity to share in "the greatest work in the world", attempts to renew the Church will be in vain. One of the most serious ills of the Church today is "spectatoritis". The fact that lay people have been relegated to the role of spectators, has resulted in their being deprived of an essential ingredient for spiritual growth.

If time is taken to train lay people for evangelism, they will not only respond to the challenge, but will also prove to be as effective in reaching people for Christ and His Church as the clergy. It is the conviction of your Board, that failure to mobilize the lay people of our Church for evangelism is the reason for the decrease in the membership of the Presbyterian Church in Canada. In a country where there is almost a "population explosion", the membership of our Church should be increasing by leaps and bounds.

The call of the hour is for the Presbyterian Church in Canada to take evangelism seriously. We have a story to tell to the nations — the greatest story ever told — but if it is to be good news for the people of Canada we will have to go to them, and share the Gospel with them.

But how is this to be done? Your Board would suggest what might be called a graded approach, that is, that we start with the lay people in our Church where they are; that we encourage them to start with an easy approach in the hope and prayer that as they get involved more deeply in the communication of the Gospel, they themselves will see the need for further training. The stages of this approach might be outlined as follows: (a) Begin by participating in a religious census with the other churches of the community; (b) Try a modified religious census, which includes not only obtaining of information but also the giving of information (an attractive brochure) about the congregation, and an invitation to attend the worship services and meetings of the Church groups; (c) If individual and/or families indicate an interest, visit them soon using the friendship evangelism approach; (d) Friendly visiting to older persons, and person to person evangelism in the normal, day by day relationships of life.

Your Board is also concerned about the spiritual welfare of the people who patronize our resort areas in the summer and winter, and has gone on record as follows:

1. That the Board of Evangelism and Social Action commend a beach and resort ministry to presbyteries and congregations in vacation and resort areas.
2. That the Board of Evangelism and Social Action provide on request a list of resource and program materials for the use of presbytery conveners and congregations.

3. That the Board of Evangelism and Social Action commend the summer program of the Scripture Union and the Child Evangelism of Canada, and recommend to congregations the policy of mutual co-operation wherever feasible.

How Does a Congregation Do Evangelism and Christian Social Action?

Effective evangelism and social action do not just happen at the presbytery or congregational level. They are the result of deliberate planning and organization. This doesn't mean that the planning has to be involved and the organization complex, but they are essential. One way to accomplish this is to appoint a Session's Committee on Evangelism and Social Action and/or an Evangelism and Social Action Council. A booklet entitled "How Does a Congregation Do Evangelism and Social Action" is available from the office of the Board.

Canadian Congress on Evangelism

Canadian delegates to the World Congress on Evangelism, held in Berlin in November 1966, felt led of God to call for a Canadian Congress on Evangelism with a view to calling the Churches to a clearer awareness of their evangelistic vocation.

A planning committee met in December 1967 made up of delegates from most of the non-Roman Catholic denominations in Canada and many of the societies and fellowships whose primary task is evangelism. This gathering reached several decisions:

- To involve as many denominations and evangelistic fellowships as possible throughout Canada in a Canadian Congress on Evangelism. The meeting was determined to involve as many persons of various ethnic origins as possible plus women and youth in the Congress and in the arrangements leading up to it.
- A Canadian Congress on Evangelism is to be held in the summer of 1970 on a date and at place yet to be decided.
- An Executive body is to be set up to carry through the plans and preparations for the Congress. It, too, is to be widely representative of Churches and evangelistic concerns.
- The Congress is to focus attention upon many areas of evangelistic methods, and the many groupings of Canadian people to whom the message of the Gospel ought to be addressed. It is assumed that much preliminary work of a theological and practical kind will precede the Congress; the work of evangelism is not expected to wait until the Congress meets.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- That the General Assembly commend the Canadian Congress to the prayerful interest of the Church.
- That the General Assembly urge Presbyteries to promote training programs for evangelism by (a) Organizing institutes or workshops on evangelism either at the level of presbytery or congregation and, (b) Asking the sessions to report progress on projects in evangelism within the congregation.

CHRISTIAN SOCIAL ACTION

Statement on Marriage and Divorce

Preamble

In granting the prayer of Overture No. 3, 1965 "Re Marriage and Divorce" from the Presbytery of West Toronto, the 91st General Assembly resolved, "That the Board of Evangelism and Social Action be asked to bring to a future General Assembly a shorter statement (i.e. a shorter statement than "A Commentary on the Westminster Confession of Faith, Chapter XXIV of Marriage and Divorce") re our Church's position on Marriage, Divorce and Remarriage. This statement is submitted in answer to the directive of the 91st General Assembly, and to the instruction of the Board of Evangelism and Social Action at its meeting in March 1967, "to prepare a succinct

statement on marriage, divorce and remarriage . . . and the Church's duty thereto . . . as an exposition of our Church's confessional position".

MARRIAGE

1. *Marriage begins with a contract*

Marriage begins when a man and a woman mutually consent that they will live together as husband and wife for as long as they both shall live.

Matthew 19:6

This contract of marriage entails the *giving* of a vow of faithfulness by each to the other; it also entails a *taking* of each by the other. Thus in the marriage ceremony, the man is made to say: "I take thee to be my lawful wedded wife" and "I plight thee my troth" by which he means, "I give thee my solemn word".

The community recognizes that a marriage contract has been made when the vows are made in the presence of witnesses. The public contract acknowledges that the marriage is not solely a private matter between the man and the woman, but that they are making a covenant with God and assuming their obligations as a family in human society.

The *giving* and *taking* to which they testify in the exchange of vows are brought to their fulfillment in sexual intercourse which constitutes the union as valid and effective. Refusal to consummate the marriage is a denial of the *giving* and *taking* that are affirmed in the vows, and the contract is therefore regarded as being null and void.

Christians who marry should make their vows in a service of worship conducted by a minister of the Gospel, since they are under obligation to God to confess their dependence on Him before man, to give Him thanks for His gifts to them and to seek His blessing on themselves and the home they establish.

2. *The Purpose of Marriage*

The intention of God is that marriage should provide for the welfare of mankind in three ways.

(i) That husband and wife should provide for each other, and receive from each other love, encouragement, support and mutual help in their development as persons,

Gal. 6:2

(ii) That the procreation of their children should take place within the context of their love for each other and the joy of a family whose allegiance is to God,

Ps. 127:3

(iii) And that the whole society of man be strong and enduring, drawing its strength from the families which constitute it.

Deut. 6

3. *The Nature of Marriage*

God made man male and female, and He made them for each other. He taught Israel that His intention was that marriage should be a life-long relationship between one man and one woman. This intention is not merely a permissive one: it is clearly in the mainstream of God's will for man. St. Paul taught that it is a relationship which reflects in some measure the relation of Christ to His Church.

(a) *Husband and Wife*

"Therefore a man leaves his father and his mother," says the Bible. A man does not abandon his parents but leaves the parental home to form a new relationship from which the intrusion of any third party is excluded. ". . . and cleaves to his wife, and they become one flesh." The new relationship is a blending of two persons into a unity.

In this unity there are still two persons, each with his own personality. Their personalities will be shaped and modified during the course of the marriage, but one personality must not be destroyed or submerged by the other. Marriage is at its best when each personality is acknowledged, accepted and enriched by the other.

The unity between husband and wife has a *physical* dimension and a *psychical* dimension, and therefore has a total effect upon the partners of the marriage. Their physical union plays a major part in the union of their emotions and their minds — in short, in their love for each other — because their sexuality is made up of their entire beings, not just their bodily functions.

The unity between husband and wife is not a static relationship which once constituted remains at the same level of strength and commitment. It is a dynamic unity in need of constant renewal, and its tendency is in the direction of permanence and ever-deepening commitment.

(b) *Christ and His Church*

Because of the sinful nature of man which entails alienation and destructiveness, God's intention for marriage is never fully realized, and sometimes it is utterly frustrated. The commitment a husband and wife ought to give to each other, the steady development that this commitment ought to enjoy, are thwarted by a self-centredness that causes, in some degree at least, alienation and destruction. "Marriage is a state of life in which and for which man needs God's grace." (Luther)

By His cross and resurrection Christ brings to us the salvation, the grace and the reconciliation of God. The relationship between Christ and His Church is founded upon His liberating power and love, which gifts He grants to His people.

A Christian marriage is one in which Christ's liberating power and love (agapé) are present. To be sure, God graciously grants His gifts to those who do not acknowledge Him, but the Christian acknowledges that God is the Author of these gifts and they are his by right, and he strives to avail himself of them. The Christian is without excuse if these ingredients are absent from his life or his marriage.

(c) *Freedom and Responsibility; Love and Law*

The love Christ bestows (agapé) has a different basis than all other kinds of natural love. Its basis is not self-seeking but self-giving. It is the love demonstrated by Christ in His death on the cross; its characteristics are described in I Corinthians 13. When present in the lives of His people it enriches their other loves — sexual love, affectionate love, friendly love — and causes these loves to develop rather than wither away under the heat of sin. It enables the partners to confess their faults, to forgive and to be reconciled.

Christ gives power and freedom. When these are present in a marriage, it is made mature so that it can cope with the adversities, the sicknesses, the outcroppings of self-will which occur in every marriage.

Freedom entails responsibility. Christians, of all people, know that freedom is accompanied by responsibility. Both partners have the responsibility of keeping their marriage vows, just as both enjoy the freedom which Christ gives them. The equality of man and woman is widely recognized in our day, and there is a consequent tendency to resist the Biblical references to man as the "head of the wife" and the wife as "subject to her husband". We tend to emphasize the need for mutual respect in marriage and shared responsi-

bility in the making of decisions, and this is a Christian insight. But the Bible reminds the husband that God has made him responsible for his wife and family; the wife is to understand that her husband must bear that responsibility and give him her support.

Love is not free from law. The Christian is obliged to obey the law; his marriage is solemnized in the presence of witnesses, and the family he establishes is a responsible unit in society.

He is subject also to laws which are not found in the statutes of the civil state: He is under the Word of God and a rule of self-discipline, so that he may fulfill God's admonitions concerning his marriage partner and their family.

THE UNMARRIED

1. *Not all are Married*

The Word of God speaks to the unmarried as well as the married. It speaks to those who are not yet married but some day will be, and to those who remain single or who are no longer married.

Marriage is a gift of God and so is the single life, and not everyone receives the same gift. Society and the Church must not conduct their affairs in such a way that only the married feel at home, and as if to suggest that there is something abnormal about the single person. Jesus Christ did not marry.

2. *Behaviour*

In our day the dominant emphasis in ethical conduct is upon relevance to the given situation. We are told that the Bible is time-conditioned, and so were the moral codes of the past. There is truth in this. It is also true that God speaks in a timeless way and has given us timeless standards of conduct. God still says to us: "You shall not commit adultery". His apostle says, "Do you not know that your bodies are members of Christ? Shall I therefore take the members of Christ and make them members of a prostitute? Never!" "Shun immorality." "Your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you, which you have from God."

The unmarried are offered the freedom and love of Christ. Their relationships with others ought to be free from sham, pretense and anxiety, and be characterized by acceptance and joy. They also live under the obligations which derive from the realities of their situation: they are not their own, but God's; they are to understand that sexual intercourse is part of a whole picture which involves life-long commitment and a one-flesh relationship.

Therefore, on the basis of the law of God and the nature which He gave us, pre-marital and extra-marital sexual intercourse is excluded.

DIVORCE and REMARRIAGE

1. *Divorce*

Divorce violates the intention of God for mankind. Yet some marriages fail. They may fail even though no one is really at fault. It is generally the case, however, that they fail as a result of the alienation and destructiveness that are the manifestations of sin. Both partners usually share in the blame to some degree or other, but there are also occasions when one spouse is guilty of a marital offense.

In circumstances of marriage breakdown or marital offense it is expedient that there be an orderly enquiry and that the state declare that the marriage is terminated if it becomes evident that there is no prospect of resuming the marriage, having carefully

provided for the just needs of those involved, especially the children of the union.

It is the duty of the Church to minister the gospel to those involved in broken marriages, proclaiming the judgment and salvation of Christ, and providing for them a reconciling fellowship.

2. Remarriage?

Those who have been divorced must consider carefully whether a decree of divorce gives them the moral right to marry again. Should they reach the conclusion that God permits them to do so, they should only remarry when they have come to the place where they realize that they have been forgiven by God.

Indeed, there may be another matter to be solved: their relationship with the former spouse. It is quite possible that God will call a person involved in this kind of situation to take positive steps to right past wrongs, to forgive and seek forgiveness from his former mate. Bitterness and the sense of guilt, which are contrary to God's will for us in any situation, are dangerous threats to any future marriage.

THE DUTY OF THE CHURCH

The Church of Jesus Christ is called by Him to reflect those characteristics she desires to see in the families of her people, and to be herself the family of God. The duty of the Church toward her people is to teach and preach and reconcile.

Especially is it the duty of the Church to prepare her people for marriage, to offer them counsel and the graces of Christ, to admonish them to commit their marriages and families more and more to the will of God, and to be for those who stray and seek to find peace, a fellowship of forgiveness and renewal.

The role of the Church as a reconciling fellowship and the minister as a pastor of the flock of God ought clearly to be demonstrated when a marriage is in difficulty. This is even more the case when a divorce has occurred. In no other circumstance of life is the Bible's estimate of the nature of man more clearly seen nor the message of the Gospel more necessary.

When the divorced person seeks remarriage, the Church and its minister cannot take refuge behind the simplistic distinction that used to be made between "guilty" and "innocent" party. The Church must deal with a person who has experienced sin and failure. The minister is obliged to consider the case on its merits; he is seldom justified in adopting the policy of giving either an automatic "no" or "yes" to every divorced person who wants to marry. It is the Christian Gospel that must be applied: with its message of repentance and faith; with its offer of forgiveness and renewal.

RECOMMENDATION

3. That the General Assembly approve the "Statement on Marriage and Divorce" as answering the prayer of Overture No. 3, 1965 from the Presbytery of West Toronto, and that this Statement be sent down to presbyteries for study and report by January 31, 1969 to the Board of Evangelism and Social Action.

Religion and the Placement of Children on Adoption

Legislation in Canada which requires children to be placed in homes of their own religious faith applies in most instances to children placed in foster care. Seven of the ten Provinces make no religious requirements in legislation specifically relating to adoption. Despite this, the practice has developed that Roman Catholic children be adopted by Roman Catholic applicants and Protestant children be adopted by Protestant applicants.

Adoption placements are made and Adoption Orders signed which cut across religious grounds but these constitute only a small part of the total. Agencies generally tend to conform to the attitudes of local religious groups with the result that most adoption placements are made where the religious faith of the child and the applicants is the same.

Religious faith is a vitally important matter in the life of any person and family, and it is right that careful attention should be given to placing children in homes of the same religion. This is especially so with older children whose religious training has begun.

It would appear, however, that delay and hardship may occur when adoptive parents of the same religion as the child cannot readily be found. Probably no statistics are available to indicate that hardship does or does not take place, but the issue should be clarified for the benefit of the children, prospective parents and the placement agencies.

It is the case that some of the provinces have clauses in their law regulating adoptions of children of one faith by persons of another faith. We are in favour of amendments to the law which would remove undue hindrance and delay on the ground of religious difference. We would also urge the placement agencies in the provinces where no legal religious regulation exists to review their policy along the same lines.

The following specific proposals are offered:

1. That a policy similar to the following be widely implemented. It resembles a policy already adopted in one of the provinces and recommended in another:

(a) a parent giving up her child should be permitted to state she has no preference as to the religion in which the child is to be brought up;

(b) a parent should have the right to state a preference as to religion with such preference expiring after a reasonable time from date of surrender if no home has been found for the child. A "reasonable time", in our view, should not exceed 4 months;

(c) where the child has been permanently removed from the parents and the child placing agency is unable to find a home of the same religion, in the specified time, the child should be placed in any suitable home.

2. The religious faith of couples applying to adopt children, or the lack of a professed faith, or the fact that the husband and wife are of different faiths, should not in itself be a barrier to the approval of their application.

RECOMMENDATIONS

4. (a) That the General Assembly give approval to the position taken in the "Statement on Religion and the Placement of Children on Adoption";

(b) That the Board of Evangelism and Social Action be permitted to correspond with other denominations to see whether a joint brief might be submitted on the subject to the Federal and Provincial Governments and to the adopting agencies in Canada;

(c) That the General Assembly record its concern that many children in Canada are in need of care and takes the position that this situation places an opportunity and a responsibility upon Christian families under certain circumstances to adopt such children or provide them with foster care.

(d) That the General Assembly affirm as its view that Christian parents should make proper provision for their children in case of their own deaths by common disaster, including the naming of the persons they would desire to give guardianship to their children.

Housing

A. Housing — A Matter of Discussion

The press has given great prominence in recent months to the subject of housing. It is widely held that the shortage of adequate housing throughout Canada has reached crisis proportions. Debate on the causes and effects of the shortage, and the possible

solutions has been taken up in parliament and legislatures, in municipalities and action groups, seminars and Churches.

Here and there experimental projects are underway seeking to alleviate the situation. Churches and citizens' groups have sponsored imaginative attempts to provide housing. Examples of these include a project in Halifax sponsored by the United Church, and the co-operative housing development of Willow Park in Winnipeg.

By and large, however, the housing situation has remained at the discussion stage. Some groups organized out of a concern for housing have merely discussed, and some have foundered.

Discussion is not a bad thing in itself. Some of the discussion has been extremely helpful, and is perhaps essential as a prelude to action which has not taken place yet but possibly will. The discussion is perhaps creating a climate — or raising the temperature — of concern. The frustration which has been given a voice in the midst of all the discussion has been necessary so that the problems, the anomalies, the red tape, the buck-passing, the twilight zones between jurisdictions can be brought out into the light of day. It is hoped that this great exercise may indeed prove to be a prelude to action.

It is with this in view that the Board of E. & S.A. produced a "study-action guide" on housing, entitled "A Situation Close to Home". The design of this little booklet is to (i) suggest ways in which a congregation can commence the task of learning what the situation in housing is in their community and to (ii) suggest steps of positive action which are both relevant to the need and within the realm of feasibility.

It may also be reported that some of the synods adopted resolutions in 1967 urging provincial governments to take effective action to alleviate the housing problem, and urging presbyteries and sessions to work very purposefully toward the same end. A recommendation is patterned on some of these synod resolutions.

B. The Problem and Some Possible Solutions

(1) *The Problem* — It is perhaps necessary to list the several ways in which the problem of housing manifests itself in Canada:

(i) Existent housing is expensive. Both rents and purchase prices are high in many areas of the country and are steadily increasing.

(ii) There isn't enough housing. The population is increasing by natural growth and immigration, and there are not enough dwellings for the new families. This situation is more acute in some areas than others, especially in metropolitan areas where most immigrants go to settle, and where the immigration from the rural and small town areas continues apace.

(iii) The quality of much housing is below acceptable standards. The luxury of yesterday becomes the standard of today. This does not mean that today's standards are too high — they become mandatory because of the more exacting demands that modern society places on its citizens. Thus electric power, a luxury of yesteryear, has become essential today. To be deprived of it brings definite hardship. There are many other examples: plumbing, the media of communication, like the telephone, radio and even TV.

To these considerations about the contents of a modern dwelling we must add considerations about its fabric. Building a house is no longer a job for the part-time amateur but for the professional. Labour and materials cost money — more all the time. Maintenance costs more money. There is much more: the costs of land, taxes and the like. There are many pressures, licit and otherwise, that enter the picture.

The result is that dwellings drop below current standards — if they were up to standard in the first place.

(2) *Some Possible Solutions*

(a) *The private sector.* Traditionally, Canadian dwellings have been built by private enterprise. It is probable that private enterprise has done better than nationalized industry could do, except in the area of subsidized housing. It is probable that private enterprise will continue to have the predominant share of house building and house ownership. But private enterprise is not now able to supply the demand, and

there is already plenty of evidence of the abuses and dangers endemic to a seller's market.

(b) *Public housing.* Governments have been very reticent to get involved in housing, and there are some good reasons why this is so.

There is, for instance, the calamitous outcome of a zealous government which treads with too heavy a foot. The stake of the "little man" is fragile, and he is quickly crushed when city hall decides to expropriate his land for a purpose which may very well be to the advantage of the public as a whole.

There have been some good instances of government involvement. There have been many examples of governmental co-operation with the private sector or the individual, as in the N.H.A., or in the grant arrangements that government makes with universities, senior citizens' homes and the like.

There is "limited dividend" housing, where federal money is made available for housing people with limited incomes.

(c) In addition to the traditional modes of private and public sponsorship there is now emerging what is being called the "third force in housing". This takes the form of co-operative housing, and the most prominent present example of it is the Willow Park development in Winnipeg. Residents are members of a Co-op Association, and purchase shares in the association commensurate with the size of the house they live in. The land occupied by the Willow Park development is leased from the city. Investing in the project were several agencies and labour groups — and the residents themselves. Loans were made by CMHC. The residents are owners and administrators of the whole development.

It would appear that the critical nature of the housing situation will likely require this kind of experiment *in addition* to the traditional methods of private enterprise and the more recent involvement on the part of government.

RECOMMENDATIONS

5. That the General Assembly express to the Government of Canada and the Provincial Governments of Canada its concern about the housing situation in Canada and state its conviction that —

(a) The future needs for housing in Canada can no longer be fully supplied by private industry, and that there is a need for public housing and co-operative housing in addition to what is supplied by the private sector;

(b) That there is great need for a co-ordination of (not to say interference in) the many segments in the economy which are involved in housing in one way or another, namely, the providing of finance, the procurement of land, planning by municipal boards, architects, etc., the supply of materials and the labour force and in this co-ordination government is urged to participate;

(c) That a department ought to be established in the federal government and in each provincial government which has housing as its prime concern.

6. That the General Assembly, in its concern for people who live in sub-standard housing, adopt the following statement:

We have not been sufficiently concerned about the plight of families who are compelled to live in inadequate dwellings, and that we have often been too much concerned with the prestige of the communities in which we live and the value of our own properties to welcome the stranger to our street or public housing and low rental projects to our neighbourhood.

We call upon the presbyteries and congregations in our Church to engage in honest study of their communities to identify the needs for adequate housing of the poorly paid, the unemployed, the pensioner and the incapacitated; and then to pursue the courses as God directs, whether through private or congregational action, or through public or political channels, to the end that the lot of people living in inadequate housing may be improved.

We declare ourselves opposed to the taking of excess profits made at the expense of the economically hard-pressed by those property owners who are tempted

to take undue advantage of a housing situation which is in their favour, whether they are owners of slum housing, or absentee landlords, or land speculators; and we call upon our people to shun the immorality of this kind of profiteering.

7. That the General Assembly endorse the principle that owners of expropriated property be adequately compensated, and that calculation of compensation be made by some competent but independent body, and that compensation be on the basis of the current market value of properties in similar condition elsewhere in the municipality.

French and English in Canada

The relationship between French and English in Canada is a matter of wide national concern and has been the subject of careful discussion within the Board of Evangelism and Social Action. At its meeting in March 1968, the Board held a study conference on the subject "French and English in Canada — the Christian Ministry of Reconciliation". The presentation at this study conference included tape recordings of statements made by an English-Canadian woman and French-Canadian man who gave their views with regard to the relationship between French and English, and the Christian ministry of reconciliation which the Church ought to undertake. These tape recordings are now available for use in the synods of the Church and the Board of Evangelism and Social Action is prepared to assist the synods in preparing for a similar conference during the meetings of the synod on this important issue and the responsibility of the Christian Church with regard to the matter. To that end the following recommendations are offered.

RECOMMENDATIONS

8. That the General Assembly urge the synods and presbyteries to give time to a discussion of the subject "French and English in Canada — the Christian Ministry of Reconciliation".
9. That the General Assembly urge all ministers and congregations in bilingual situations to do their best to create working groups whose object would be to develop an understanding of relationships between French and English in Canada, and our Christian responsibility toward them.
10. That the General Assembly commend to the Church the study of the Final Report of the Royal Commission on Bilingualism and Biculturalism and the resumés on the Report which are available from the Canadian Association for Adult Education, 21 Sultan Street, Toronto 5, Ontario.

Suicide — One of Canada's Most Neglected Public Health Problems

Dr. J. D. Griffin, General Director of the Canadian Mental Health Association, says that suicide is one of Canada's most neglected public health problems. In 1962, 1,331 persons were officially classified as having committed suicide in Canada, but some believe that the true figures may have been in excess of 2,000. If, as some suppose, the total number of attempts is up to ten times that of the "successful" ones, it certainly does constitute a major social, medical and spiritual problem.

Research on 501 cases of attempted suicide revealed that only 29% really wanted to die, 20% were undecided and left survival to chance in a "gamble with death", 67% expected or arranged for their rescue. Similar research also indicated that "suicide is neither the rich man's disease nor the poor man's curse. Suicide is very 'democratic' and is represented proportionately among all levels of society".

The nature of and the reasons for suicide are not clearly understood, but it is not a single disease entity. It has been established that at least two thirds of all suicides saw a physician within three months prior to their death. Such a visit was, of course, no portent in itself; but coupled with the "cries for help" can mean a great deal. At least, it points to the need for an awareness of the prodromal clues on the part of physicians and, indeed, of other professional and interested lay people.

Dr. Norman Farberow, Co-Principal Investigator, Central Research Unit, Veterans Administration Center; Co-Project Director, Suicide Prevention Center;

and Associate Clinical Professor of Psychiatry, University of Southern California School of Medicine, Los Angeles, California, states that the identification of the suicidal person is not difficult once the process has begun. The tendency is communicated either in behaviour or word long before any specific act occurs. Some of the warning signs are: (1) Ambivalence. There is the desire to live and to die present at the same time. It may be conscious or unconscious. (2) Feelings of hopelessness, futility, and inadequacy to handle problems. (3) Feelings of exhaustion, both physical and psychological. (4) Marked feelings of anxiety or tension, depression, anger, guilt. Feelings of chaos or disorganization — with inability to restore order. (5) Extreme mood changes—from agitation to apathy. (6) Limitation of potentialities and inability to see alternatives. (7) Loss of interest in usual activities — sex, hobbies, work. (8) Various physical distresses such as insomnia.

Suicide cannot be excused or justified, since to take a life is a matter for God only and not for man himself. However, Karl Barth says that we must go on at once to say that even suicide in the sense of self-murder "is not as such unforgivable sin". Whatever our views on this may be, since authorities tell us that more than half the suicides could have been prevented if timely aid and qualified advice had been forthcoming, it becomes imperative that the Church address itself to this social and moral problem, and "provide the kind of help and assistance which is necessary for the prevention of this distressing wastage of human life".

One agency that has achieved real success in this field is the Los Angeles Suicide Prevention Centre. As a result of the work of their staff only two of more than three hundred patients have committed suicide.

We believe that another way to help reduce the incidence of suicide is to use our influence to have section 213 of the Criminal Code amended namely: "Everyone who attempts to commit suicide is guilty of an offence punishable on summary conviction."

RECOMMENDATIONS

11. Whereas the Suicide Act of 1961 in England repealed the old statutes under which attempts at suicide were punishable unless the attempt was made "while of unsound mind"; and, Whereas, forty-one States of the United States of America have abolished similar laws; and, Whereas, leading authorities hold that suicide, while a manifestation of complex emotional turmoil, is not necessarily the result of insanity; Therefore, we recommend that the General Assembly urge the Government of Canada to amend section 213 of the Criminal Code of Canada, namely: "Everyone who attempts to commit suicide is guilty of an offence punishable on summary conviction."
12. Whereas the high incidence of suicide attempts makes it a major medical, social and spiritual problem, and according to some authorities tenth in the causes of adult deaths; and, Whereas, Suicide Prevention Centres like the one in Los Angeles are proving successful in their efforts to reduce the incidence of suicide; Therefore, we recommend that the General Assembly urge the Government of Canada to consider setting up such centres on a regional basis, staffed by competent persons from the fields of medicine, psychotherapy, and religious counselling.
13. That the General Assembly urge ministers to acquaint themselves with "warning signs" in order to establish a more meaningful and competent system of referral to helping agencies, and to do all in our power to reduce the high incidence of suicide attempts.

The War on Poverty

Though Canada has officially declared war on poverty, the war is far from being won. In fact, if it is ever to be won there will have to be radical changes in both the "advantaged" and the "disadvantaged". The 77% who are enjoying in varying degrees Canada's affluence are going to have to take a closer look at the world of the other

23% if they are to really understand how blighting and demoralizing poverty can be for individuals and families compelled to live in these conditions year after year. On the other hand, the 23% will have to break out of their apparent apathy and demonstrate that they also are prepared to do their bit in the war against poverty. The sixty-four dollar question is how will this be accomplished?

The difficulty with too many otherwise good, honest citizens is that they oversimplify the causes of poverty. It is so easy to salve our consciences by pointing to poor families who aren't trying to help themselves and their children — and these there are — and jump to the conclusion that all poor people are lacking in initiative; that they are lazy and shiftless, and would sooner live on welfare than work. Yet these very same people would resent it greatly if the poor were to generalize and classify all of them as greedy and avaricious — which of course some of them might be!

While in no way trying to justify evils and abuses, wherever they are found, experience shows and research proves that the poor people are essentially no different from other people; that they are not lacking in ideals or indifferent to the accepted standards of society; that the vast majority of them are prepared to work; that they are not as some would suggest "the major source of significant pathologies and social deviance in society".

If poor people seem to be apathetic and indifferent, the reason is simply this: they have given up because they have lost hope. Hylan Lewis in an unpublished paper given at a Conference on Lower Class Culture in New York, June 27-29, 1963 entitled "Culture, Class and Behaviour of Low Income Families" claims that "the poor know the basic values of our society and desire a way of life which meets all acceptable social standards". The students of the University of Maryland School of Social Work have found that the poor are aware of the goals and standards in our society "but they don't expect to attain them". It is, then, not lack of desire but the belief that there is no hope of ever attaining their goals.

Poor people don't want our pity. The need of the hour is for us to understand what constitutes the minimal material and psychic requirements for people to live humanely. What is needed is that Canadians scrap their "punitive system of public welfare", and begin to recognize that material needs must be satisfied before any attempt to motivate poor people can succeed. The Hon. Allan MacEachen, Minister of Health and Welfare, was quoted recently to the effect that "the guaranteed income might cost the taxpayers less than the present system of welfare payments". If this be so, in view of the stigma attached to welfare, maybe the guaranteed income should be taken more seriously.

This quotation from Harris Chaiklin's paper "Motivating the Poor" which appears in Benjamin Schlesinger's book "Poverty in Canada and the United States" deserves our consideration; "If we are to help the poor, we should not be overly concerned about their motivation. A necessary prior condition is to assess basic needs — material and emotional. Only when minimal security is provided can we begin to assess how large is the problem of motivation. We have known for a long time how to treat people in a humane way. If we really provide for people's material needs, our concern with the problem of motivation will, if it does not disappear, at least decline greatly.

"To really help the poor is not an easy job — not because we don't know how; not because it is too expensive; not because the poor are not motivated; but because it still continues to be a somewhat dangerous idea to assume that if society meets the basic material needs of people, they will take care of themselves. The Golden Rule is a radical position. Organized social welfare cannot seem to espouse openly the idea that people should be provided the wherewithal for some security in their lives without society's expecting something from them in return." (Used by permission)

The Canadian Conference on Church and Society, May 26-29, 1968

The theme of the Conference was "Christian Conscience and Poverty". The purpose of the Conference was to help Churches, as institutions, singly and in combination, and individual members and groups within the Churches, discover and determine what they can do about the gap between the rich and the poor, in Canada,

and beyond Canada's borders, and then to do it. In other words, the goal for all of us who participated in this Conference was to develop social awareness (concern), to seek social understanding (comprehension), to accept social responsibility (commitment), and to undertake social action (mobilizing the competence and resources required), and to zero in on the staggering and widening gap between those among us who have much and those who have little of this world's goods.

The Presbyterian Church in Canada was one of the participating Churches.

The Church can help win the war on poverty in two ways:

(1) It can be the catalyst that brings together other groups, agencies, and concerned people to discuss ways and means of helping the poor.

(2) It can help the "disadvantaged", not so much by doing things for them, as by identifying with them, getting to know them as persons, and supporting them in their need and right to have a voice in their own destinies. It is difficult for poor people to stand up for their rights, but to know that the people of the Church are with them as well as being for them, should give them the new hope that so many of them need so badly.

RECOMMENDATION

14. That the General Assembly urge sessions and congregations to assist in the war on poverty:

- (a) By being the catalysts that bring together other groups, agencies and concerned people to discuss ways and means of improving the lot of the poor, and enabling them to enter into their rightful heritage as citizens of Canada.
- (b) By getting to know and identifying with "disadvantaged" persons and families in their communities, and supporting them in their desire to have a voice in determining their own destinies.

ELDERSHIP TRAINING

The purpose of eldership training is to provide ruling and teaching elders with the opportunity to discuss together the nature and mission of the Church with a view to helping them to better understand their duties, and enable them to give imaginative and effective leadership in the congregations in which they have been called to serve.

Eldership training is being undertaken in the following ways:

1. Elders' Rallies —

These rallies have proved valuable as a means of stimulating enthusiasm and providing the opportunity for the ruling elders of a Presbytery to meet and discuss their mutual interests and concerns.

2. Elders' Schools —

The Elders' School makes possible more intensive training and discussion at the Presbytery level. A number of Presbyteries have made an Elders' School a yearly event, with the interest increasing with each succeeding year. It is customary for the School to begin on Friday evening and conclude late Saturday afternoon.

3. Eldership Training in the local session —

While Elders' Rallies and Elders' Schools are invaluable, and are recommended at the Presbytery level, experience has shown that there is "no feasible way for adequate training to be accomplished except in the local session, under the leadership of the minister". Training must be a continuing process in the life of the session. Elders should be encouraged to continue to learn and grow "as they carry out their responsibilities".

It is recommended that Eldership Training should not be in the nature of a lecture by the minister, but rather a series of discussions led by him. "Just to tell a group has little meaning for them in terms of actually changing their opinion or, more important, their lives. What is desired is that each person's own opinion and

experience shall be brought out, and he shall be encouraged to examine its adequacy in the light of the Scriptures, and to understand its meaning in every area of the Church's life. This is learning!"

The course recommended by the Board of Evangelism and Social Action and approved by the General Assembly for sessions at the local level is a three-year course, and the resource materials are as follows:—

Year I—The Nature of the Church

Church Officer Training Program of the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A.

1. Church Officer Training Program Manual — This manual explains the nature of the course, how the materials are to be used, how to organize the training, and how to lead a fruitful discussion group. (Free)

2. Pastor's Discussion Guide, Year I—The Nature of the Church — This discussion guide is for the use of the minister only, and is designed to give him resource material for leading and directing the discussion in the Session. (\$1.00)

3. A Set of Three Booklets: (one for each ruling elder)

THE NATIONAL COMMITTEE OF PRESBYTERIAN MEN

Another encouraging year has marked the progress of the men's movement in our Church. Many ministers are reporting increased activity on the part of men in their congregation as a result of the PM Movement. At the present time we have something close to 3,000 men in our Church across Canada who have participated in some facet of the Presbyterian Men's Movement.

The past year has marked the development of the PM Handbook as a guide to program planning at the congregational and presbytery levels. Many encouraging reports have been received from men testifying to the fact that their training and experience in the PM Movement has been the means of equipping them to give expression to their faith. We would like to see many more men giving leadership in study and discussion groups and other programs to interest those on the fringe of the Christian fellowship.

Upon seeking to find the reason why some men have given greater expression to their training than other equally committed men, we have been led to conclude that greater assistance is needed in the organizational techniques of introducing a program. It is for this reason that the PM Handbook was prepared giving a step-by-step procedure to follow in planning some fifteen activities such as Men's Rallies; Fellowship Breakfasts or Luncheons; Mission Week-ends; Prayer and Study Groups; forming Men's Choirs; involving men in the Church School; Camping or Boys' Work Programs; initiating Stewardship and Friendship Evangelism; Visitation Work; Publicity Suggestions etc.

It is our plan to present this Handbook at workshops organized at the presbytery level by the E. & S.A. Committees. All conveners have been asked to advise a National Committee member in their synod as to when a preliminary meeting can be held with their committee including the laymen named to give leadership to men's work within their presbytery. Several of these meetings have been held and workshops are now being planned to include as many men as possible. Initial reaction to this extension of our training program has been favourable.

Another area of concern expressed by some members of the National Committee is what appeal PM will have to the future generation. It is pointed out that 60% of the Canadian population in the next five to ten years will be between the ages of 25 and 30. From their ranks will come the Church of the future. Many of these young people who are concerned about their relationship to God and Jesus Christ, rebel against the Ecclesiastical Church. We want to work with these young men and listen to their point of view. It is the aim of those in the Presbyterian Men's Movement to be used by God to bring all men into a personal relationship with Jesus Christ and His Church in the world.

Annual Meeting

The Annual Meeting was held October 20-22, 1967 at which all synods were represented. We were particularly pleased to welcome five new members appointed by the Board last year, namely, Aksel Aggerholm, Wm. Jackman, Walter Oldham, Murray Stewart and Douglas Zimmerman; also, the appointed representative of the Presbyterian Record, Ed Oliverio, and the P.Y.P.S. Representative, R Emmelt Hummelen. We acknowledge with grateful thanks the contributions made by the retiring members during their years of service; these are — Robert E. Bisset, our original Secretary, Alex Culley, George Pearsall and the Rev. Stuart B. Coles, who served as Studies' Convener for about nine years.

As reported at last year's Board Meeting, Mr. W. B. (Bill) Cross asked to be relieved of his duties as Chairman of the Committee and was named Honorary Chairman. At the Annual Meeting of the Committee, the Chairmanship was formally turned over to Mr. Frank J. Whilsmith. A pair of books inscribed to mark the occasion was presented to Mr. Cross. We are deeply grateful for the eleven years of faithful leadership and generous support which Mr. Cross has given to the men's movement.

Considerable attention was given to the greater involvement of young men. It

was resolved that a committee be formed to study this and that the Board of Christian Education be advised of our concern.

1967 National Conferences

As the Presbyterian Congress was being held in June, the committee felt it was best not to hold any conferences too close to that date, which reduced the number of conferences from five to three. The Eastern Conference was held at Truro, N.S. May 5-6 and 7, with a new attendance record of 132. The Rev. Dr. Gwynn Walters, Professor of Pastoral Relations at Gordon Divinity School, Boston, Mass. and Mr. Wm. B. Cross, our Honorary Chairman, were the speakers and were enthusiastically received as they spoke on the theme "Good News for a New Age".

After an interval of four years the Central Conference was held at Canadian Keswick in Muskoka, September 15-17, with an attendance of 306. The following weekend 82 men attended the Western Conference at Banff, Alberta. Dr. Louis H. Evans, former pastor of First Presbyterian Church, Hollywood, California and Mr. Wm. B. Cross were speakers at both these conferences. The inspiration at all the conferences was tremendous. Open forum type discussions were instituted under the

Chairmanship of Frank Whilsmith, in addition to the regular small group discussions. The total attendance of 520 (not counting the team) at the three conferences was just 30 less than the total attendance at five conferences the previous year.

We are indebted to Jim and John Laing for their leadership as song leader and pianist respectively and to our soloist, Mr. Norman Rummey, at the Central Conference. Our Registrar, Herman McLean, provided the piano accompaniment at Truro and Banff.

Field Work

Personal contact was made with men in each synod throughout the year, although the limitation of time and money prevented us spending as much time as we would have liked to in the outlying parts. The work of the director and the assistant director was supplemented by our chairman, who addressed many men's gatherings in Central and Western Canada.

Leadership Breakfasts

The experiment in breakfast meetings referred to in last year's report has proven to be a rewarding and growing activity. Several congregations report that they are holding these gatherings with good results. Last fall this pilot project in the East Toronto Presbytery under the Chairmanship of Frank Whilsmith was expanded to include West Toronto and Brampton Presbyteries. Two breakfasts have been held in a centrally located banquet hall. The Moderator of the General Assembly, Dr. Logan-Veneta, was the speaker on one occasion, and Dr. Mariano Di Gangi, former Chairman of the Board of E. & S.A. on the other. Since these breakfast meetings have been started we have made contact with many hundreds of men in the area who were not previously associated with the men's movement.

Management Consultative Group

Under the auspices of the National Committee on the Church and Industrial Society, a group of business executives met with clergymen and lay workers in the Church to consider our Christian responsibility as employers. Wm. Hepburn, President of Hepburn Steel and Mr. Douglas Zimmerman, President of Industrial Wire and Cable were the Presbyterian representatives, in addition to the Secretary of the Board of E. & S.A. and the National Director of PM. Four meetings were held at our Church Offices and these included representatives from the Baptist, Anglican, Roman Catholic and Lutheran Churches. It was felt that the ground work was laid for future discussions with management personnel in a similar way to what has been done with the Labour Union men through the Religion-Labour Council.

Laymen's Sunday

An ever increasing number of congregations are observing a Laymen's Sunday sometime throughout the year. The committee would like to emphasize a point which is brought out in our letter to Ministers and Session Clerks each year, regarding the advisability of the minister participating in the service. It is not intended that the Minister be excluded from the conduct of the service.

The National Committee resolved that we should carry the conference theme through to Laymen's Sunday. It is our hope that there will be a growing practice of men continuing to discuss the conference message at the congregational level. A Laymen's Sunday Planning Guide was produced on the theme "Good News for a New Age". These were mailed with a letter to each Minister and Session Clerk.

Special PM Conference Account

A balance of \$1,166.75 remained in the Special Conference Account as of December 31, 1967. A copy of the auditors' statement has been presented to the Comptroller's Office.

PM Training Program

The number of registered leaders on our roll is 1,374 laymen and 301 ministers. A new up-dated edition of Manual No. 2 is planned for 1968.

1968 Men's Conference Plans

Being sensitive to the situation in which we find ourselves in this time of changing moral, spiritual and social standards, the committee has chosen the theme "Facing Life's Top Priorities" for this year's men's conferences. This will be explored as it speaks to us both as individuals and as men in our community relationships. The basis of the study will be Paul's Letter to the Colossians.

OTHER ACTIVITIES AND ACHIEVEMENTS

How does the Board of Evangelism and Social Action function? The Board itself meets once a year in March to consider reports and formulate the matters it proposes to transmit to the General Assembly. There is also an executive of the Board which meets three or four times a year to take action on the matters that cannot or need not wait until the Board meets.

The work of preparation for these meetings lies with the committees of the Board. There are 15 committees, 3 of them major, which report directly to the Board of Evangelism and Social Action and there are 5 or 6 more inter-board committees on which this Board has representation. At least 125 people are involved in membership on these committees which means that a sizeable number of persons have direct contact with the work of evangelism and social action at the national level. The reports of these committees run nearly 140 pages this year — which is a great deal more material than can be incorporated in the pages of this report. We have to content ourselves with the statement that these reports, all of them of momentous interest to the membership of our Church, can be made available, in part at least to a limited number of enquirers.

On-going Studies

A good number of the matters which were dealt with in these committee reports have recommendations to the General Assembly and are therefore embodied in these Acts and Proceedings. A number of others are in various stages of study, including the following:

Alcoholism and Narcotic Addiction — The Board's Committee on Alcoholism and Narcotic Addiction submitted a very helpful paper on the Consequences of Using Marijuana and LSD, and made reference to some recent legislative steps that have taken place on the subject of alcoholism in the Province of British Columbia where most of the committee members reside. This paper will be available to enquirers in mimeographed form. Enquiries may be addressed to the Board of Evangelism and Social Action, 50 Wynford Drive, Don Mills, Ontario.

The Plight of Primary Producers — The Board has taken note of the plight faced by many farmers in Canada whose produce cannot fetch a sufficient price even to pay for the cost of putting in the crop. A committee is to be set up to work on a study of this matter.

The Town and Country Church — The Committee on the Town and Country Church submitted to the Board a 14 page report consisting of papers entitled "Rural Economy and Social Trends," "Rural Church — Opportunities and Problems," "Town and Country Church Picture: U.S.A. and Canada" and "The Town Church". Most of the papers are accompanied by discussion questions and will provide a worthwhile basis for study in sessions and discussion groups of Churches in towns and rural areas.

Implications of Secularization for Evangelism and Social Action — A preliminary outline has been prepared on this subject and this is likely to be developed in the coming year.

In the area of evangelism, progress has been made on resort evangelism, the evangelism of children, apartment evangelism and the use of newspapers and the coffee house in the cause of evangelism. Future plans also call for the preparation of a position paper on the theology of evangelism and a complete revision of the training materials for evangelism. The Board also gave consideration to the move-

ment that has been followed with so much success in South America: "Evangelism-in-Depth" and went on record as being in agreement with the objects and methods of "Evangelism-in-Depth," and decided to commend their training materials as a helpful resource.

Several studies have also been undertaken or are in process in the realm of economic and social justice. This includes the question of corporal punishment, compensation for victims of criminal injury, the guaranteed annual income, taxation, the artificial prolongation of life and the treatment of Canada's Indians.

Literature — A booklet was prepared during the year by the Board of E. & S.A. which is proving useful as a study action guide on the question of housing. The booklet is entitled "A Situation Close to Home". It is available from the Board of Evangelism and Social Action at 5c a copy.

A booklet for group discussion on evangelism has also been produced. It is entitled "Have You Heard? — Four Bible Studies on Evangelism" and is available at 5c a copy. Other pamphlets and booklets in preparation are on the subjects of the Christian funeral, beginning the Christian life and mixed marriage. A pamphlet on "The Christian View of Sex" will soon be printed.

How This Board Serves the Congregations

It is the purpose of this Board to serve the congregations of the Church. It does so in a variety of ways.

The Secretary of the Board and the Assistant Secretary do field work in the presbyteries and the congregations of the Church. These visits are utilized as opportunities for interpretation and training in evangelism and social action. The Secretaries welcome these opportunities.

The Board also offers training programs in pre-marital and marriage counselling for ministers and cognate workers, and sponsors conferences on evangelism or areas of social concern among synods or groups of presbyteries.

The Manual on Christian Social Action and the Training Manuals for Evangelism are being used throughout the Church along with other literature produced by the Board.

Briefs to the Government

A recent development of great significance is the increasing willingness of governments to listen to the insights of the Christian Church. On several recent occasions, committees of parliament have extended invitations to submit briefs on subjects that require legislative attention. The fact that General Assembly adopts statements on these issues which affect the people of Canada is extremely important and is so regarded by legislators. A recent example of this is the resolution adopted by the 93rd General Assembly on the subject of abortion. Not long afterward, the Committee on Health and Welfare of the House of Commons extended an invitation to the Presbyterian Church in Canada to submit a brief on this subject. The Board of Evangelism and Social Action was able to prepare a brief which was securely tied to the statement adopted by the General Assembly. Other subjects on which government has invited our Church to speak, and which have been referred to the Board of Evangelism and Social Action are: a Bill before Parliament on Hate Propaganda, the revision of the Juvenile Delinquency Act, Divorce and the Status of Women.

Other Boards and Organizations

The Board is represented on a number of committees and organizations. These include committees of the General Assembly: the Audio-Visual Committee, Missionary Education, International Affairs, Higher Learning, Institutional Chaplaincies, Inter-Church Aid, Refugee and World Service and the Co-ordinating Committee on Adult Education. The Board also is represented on several committees and organizations of an ecumenical nature, many of which were listed in our report to the 93rd General Assembly.

Report on Overture No. 14, 1966. Presbytery of Saskatoon re Preparation and Publication of a Book of Sermons for Elders.

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

The 93rd General Assembly referred Overture No. 14, 1966 back to the Board of Evangelism and Social Action for sympathetic consideration and in consultation with the Administrative Council. (Acts and Proceedings, 1967, p. 98)

The Board of Evangelism and Social Action, after consultation with the Administrative Council, begs to recommend as follows:

That the Book of Sermons prepared by the Church History Committee for Centennial Year be commended for the use of ruling elders who are called on to lead a service of worship.

Report on Recommendation adopted by the 93rd General Assembly, 1967, Acts and Proceedings, page 98, namely: "That the Board of Evangelism and Social Action, or a Committee set up by the Board, be asked to study the implications of automation on the political, social and religious life of the nation and to make an interim report to the 94th General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada."

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

The Board of Evangelism and Social Action begs to report diligence with regard to the recommendation of the 93rd General Assembly "that the Board of Evangelism and Social Action, or a Committee set up by the Board, be asked to study the implications of automation on the political, social and religious life of the nation and to make an interim report to the 94th General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada" as follows: That the Board of Evangelism and Social Action referred the study of this question to its Committee on Economic and Social Justice; that a draft statement was presented to and discussed by that Committee; that in view of the scope, complexity and the amount of time required to complete the study we report progress this year, but will endeavour to complete the report for presentation to the 95th General Assembly.

RECOMMENDATIONS

(These are found also in the body of the Report)

1. That the General Assembly commend the Canadian Congress to the prayerful interest of the Church.
2. That the General Assembly urge Presbyteries to promote training programs for evangelism by (a) Organizing institutes or workshops on evangelism either at the level of presbytery or congregation and, (b) Asking sessions to report progress on projects in evangelism within the congregation.
3. That the General Assembly approve the "Statement on Marriage and Divorce" as answering the prayer of Overture No. 3, 1965 from the Presbytery of West Toronto, and that this Statement be sent down to presbyteries for study and report by January 31, 1969 to the Board of Evangelism and Social Action.
4. (a) That the General Assembly give approval to the position taken in the "Statement on Religion and the Placement of Children on Adoption";
(b) That the Board of Evangelism and Social Action be permitted to correspond with other denominations to see whether a joint brief might be submitted on the subject to the Federal and Provincial Governments and to the adopting agencies in Canada;
(c) That the General Assembly record its concern that many children in Canada are in need of care and takes the position that this situation places an opportunity and a responsibility upon Christian families under certain circumstances to adopt such children or provide them with foster care.
(d) That the General Assembly affirm as its view that Christian parents should

make proper provision for their children in case of their own deaths by common disaster, including the naming of the persons they would desire to give guardianship to their children.

5. That the General Assembly express to the Government of Canada and the Provincial Governments of Canada its concern about the housing situation in Canada and state its conviction that —
 - (a) The future needs for housing in Canada can no longer be fully supplied by private industry, and that there is a need for public housing and co-operative housing in addition to what is supplied by the private sector;
 - (b) That there is great need for a co-ordination of (not to say interference in) the many segments in the economy which are involved in housing in one way or another, namely, the providing of finance, the procurement of land, planning by municipal boards, architects, etc., the supply of materials and the labour force and in this co-ordination government is urged to participate;
 - (c) That a department ought to be established in the federal government and in each provincial government which has housing as its prime concern.
6. That the General Assembly, in its concern for people who live in sub-standard housing, adopt the following statement:

We have not been sufficiently concerned about the plight of families who are compelled to live in inadequate dwellings, and that we have often been too much concerned with the prestige of the communities in which we live and the value of our own properties to welcome the stranger to our street or public housing and low rental projects to our neighbourhood.

We call upon the presbyteries and congregations in our Church to engage in honest study of their communities to identify the needs for adequate housing of the poorly paid, the unemployed, the pensioner and the incapacitated; and then to pursue the courses as God directs, whether through private or congregational action, or through public or political channels, to the end that the lot of people living in inadequate housing may be improved.

We declare ourselves opposed to the taking of excess profits made at the expense of the economically hard-pressed by those property owners who are tempted to take undue advantage of a housing situation which is in their favour, whether they are owners of slum housing, or absentee landlords, or land speculators; and we call upon our people to shun the immorality of this kind of profiteering.
7. That the General Assembly endorse the principle that owners of expropriated property be adequately compensated, and that calculation of compensation be made by some competent but independent body, and that compensation be on the basis of the current market value of properties in similar condition elsewhere in the municipality.
8. That the General Assembly urge the synods and presbyteries to give time to a discussion of the subject "French and English in Canada — the Christian Ministry of Reconciliation".
9. That the General Assembly urge all ministers and congregations in bilingual situations to do their best to create working groups whose object would be to develop an understanding of relationships between French and English in Canada, and our Christian responsibility toward them.
10. That the General Assembly commend to the Church the study of the Final Report of the Royal Commission on Bilingualism and Biculturalism and the resumés on the Report which are available from the Canadian Association for Adult Education, 21 Sultan Street, Toronto 5, Ontario.
11. Whereas the Suicide Act of 1961 in England repealed the old statutes under which attempts at suicide were punishable unless the attempt was made "while of unsound mind"; and,

Whereas, forty-one States of the United States of America have abolished similar laws; and,

Whereas, leading authorities hold that suicide, while a manifestation of complex emotional turmoil, is not necessarily the result of insanity;

Therefore, we recommend that the General Assembly urge the Government of Canada to amend section 218 of the Criminal Code of Canada, namely: "Everyone who attempts to commit suicide is guilty of an offence punishable on summary conviction."

12. Whereas the high incidence of suicide attempts makes it a major medical, social and spiritual problem, and according to some authorities tenth in the causes of adult deaths; and,
 - Whereas, Suicide Prevention Centres like the one in Los Angeles are proving successful in their efforts to reduce the incidence of suicide;
 - Therefore, we recommend that the General Assembly urge the Government of Canada to consider setting up such centres on a regional basis, staffed by competent persons from the fields of medicine, psychotherapy, and religious counselling.
 13. That the General Assembly urge ministers to acquaint themselves with "warning signs" in order to establish a more meaningful and competent system of referral to helping agencies, and to do all in our power to reduce the high incidence of suicide attempts.
 14. That the General Assembly urge sessions and congregations to assist in the war on poverty:
 - (a) By being the catalysts that bring together other groups, agencies and concerned people to discuss ways and means of improving the lot of the poor, and enabling them to enter into their rightful heritage as citizens of Canada.
 - (b) By getting to know and identifying with "disadvantaged" persons and families in their communities, and supporting them in their desire to have a voice in determining their own destinies.
 15. That the General Assembly designate the third Sunday in October as Laymen's Sunday; that congregations be requested to choose another date if this conflicts with local plans; that the 1968 Men's Conference Theme "Facing Life's Top Priorities" be the theme for Laymen's Sunday.
 16. Whereas, many more men could be vigorously engaged in the witness and work of the Church, and
 - Whereas, the men's movement in our Church is demonstrating that opportunities for fellowship, study, discussion and training result in greater participation of men in the witness and work of the Church,
 - Therefore, we recommend that the General Assembly urge presbyteries to give full support to, and request regular progress reports from the two or more men who are appointed to give leadership in developing men's work within their bounds, in accordance with approved Recommendations 21 and 22 of the 1960 Acts and Proceedings, pages 309 and 310.
- Report on Overture No. 14, 1966, Presbytery of Saskatoon re Preparation and Publication of a Book of Sermons for Elders.*
- To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:*
- The 93rd General Assembly referred Overture No. 14, 1966 back to the Board of Evangelism and Social Action for sympathetic consideration and in consultation with the Administrative Council. (Acts and Proceedings, 1967, p. 98)
- The Board of Evangelism and Social Action, after consultation with the Administrative Council, begs to recommend as follows:
- That the Book of Sermons prepared by the Church History Committee for Centennial Year be commended for the use of ruling elders who are called on to lead a service of worship.

Report on Recommendation adopted by the 93rd General Assembly, 1967, Acts and Proceedings, page 98, namely: "That the Board of Evangelism and Social Action, or a Committee set up by the Board, be asked to study the implications of automation on the political, social and religious life of the nation and to make an interim report to the 94th General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

The Board of Evangelism and Social Action begs to report diligence with regard to the recommendation of the 93rd General Assembly "that the Board of Evangelism and Social Action, or a Committee set up by the Board, be asked to study the implications of automation on the political, social and religious life of the nation and to make an interim report to the 94th General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada" as follows: That the Board of Evangelism and Social Action referred the study of this question to its Committee on Economic and Social Justice; that a draft statement was presented to and discussed by that Committee; that in view of the scope, complexity and the amount of time required to complete the study we report progress this year, but will endeavour to complete the report for presentation to the 95th General Assembly.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

During the past years your board has been seeking to understand the radical nature of the changes which are taking place all around us and their implications for education in the Church. As part of its 1968 annual meeting the board held a special study and planning conference on the theme "Equipping the Church to live in a world of change." Through preparatory reading and group discussions in their own communities, the members of the board were able to bring valuable information about the ways in which people perceive and respond to change and its impact upon their life. The insights gained from this experience contributed greatly to the board's work of developing plans for the kind of educational services which will be needed in the Presbyterian Church in Canada in the years ahead.

The Church has a very special responsibility to all its members as they daily confront new situations which seem to be calling into question so much of what they have believed, accepted and understood. Every congregation must be prepared to provide the kind of educational services which will permit and encourage its members to explore freely and with openness the foundations of their faith, to understand its meaning for their life in the contemporary world, to discover the nature and form of their obedience and witness to Jesus Christ, and to know how they can participate in God's mission to the world.

EDUCATION IN THE CONGREGATIONS OF THE CHURCH

Through the years the board has brought to the General Assembly a full reporting of its studies of curriculum resources for church education, including the biblical, theological and educational principles of these resources. Through its reports the board has also sought to interpret to the General Assembly its understanding of the purpose of church education within the total life of the congregation in its worship, nurture, mission and service.

The Present Situation

The Christian Faith and Life Curriculum has been authorized by the General Assembly as the recommended church school curriculum of the Presbyterian Church in Canada. This action was taken in 1960 with respect to the nursery, kindergarten

and primary departments and in 1964 for the junior, junior high and senior high departments. The board has produced Canadian supplements for this curriculum throughout the years since the General Assembly authorized it.

In recognition of the need to provide more adequately for the educational program in the congregations of the church, the 89th General Assembly authorized the board to change from a uniform to a graded principle of curriculum.

In response to a recommendation from the 92nd General Assembly the board engaged in a study of the Covenant Life Curriculum. Seven Synod Committees of Christian Education participated in this study. As a result the 93rd General Assembly approved the Covenant Life Curriculum as the recommended alternative curriculum.

For the adults and young adults the board has continued to produce study resources. *Victory* magazine was published until June 1967, and study guide booklets, such as *How God Speaks To Us*, are now being prepared. Since 1965 the Co-ordinating Committee on Adult Education has offered guidance to congregations through the publication of the *Catalogue of Resources for Adult Work* and the *Program Planning Calendar*.

For the church's ministry with teenage youth the board has sought to give guidance to congregations, and to presbyteries and synods. Through its publication of *Resources for Ministry with Youth*, the board has provided a guide for planning and an annotated listing of recommended resources covering a wide variety of study and action interests of youth.

Principle of Congregational Selection

Since 1964, when the board presented to the 90th General Assembly the findings of its major study of curriculum, the board has been experimenting with the principle of responsible congregational selection of recommended resources for church education with adults and teenage youth. This has proved to be of great value and has been received with appreciation and support in many congregations. It enables groups of adults, and of adults and youth working together, to have the freedom to choose the resources for study and action which meet the local interests and needs of their people. It provides for flexibility in relation to the current concerns and expectations of the members of a group for their total life in the community and in the church. It takes account of the situation and the issues in any community and congregation. It calls for local initiative in planning and decision making and consequently encourages motivation for learning and action. It opens the way for groups to draw more fully upon the resources of persons who are in the group, the congregation and the community.

Continuing Study of Resources for Church Education

During the past two years the board has co-operated with a number of Presbyteries in a study and evaluation of seven denominational curricula and two commercially published curricula. These included the curricula of The Presbyterian Church in the United States, The Orthodox Presbyterian Church, The Anglican Church of Canada, The Lutheran Church in America, The Methodist Church (U.S.A.), The United Church of Canada, The United Church of Christ (U.S.A.), David C. Cook, and Gospel Light.

The board hopes to be able to make available the results of these studies and evaluations to congregations or committees which may wish to undertake their own evaluations. The board will also seek to give guidance to any congregation which wishes to evaluate the curriculum which it is using.

Christian Faith and Action/Designs for an Educational System

In 1966 and 1967 the board reported to the General Assembly that it was participating in the development of the next stage of the Christian Faith and Life Curriculum of the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. This new development will be known as *Christian Faith and Action/Designs for an Educational System*. It will become available in three stages as follows:

Autumn 1968 — New resources for Lay Education and Teacher Education
(Lay Education includes grades 11-12, young adults and adults.)

Autumn 1969 — New resources for preschool education
— nursery and kindergarten.

Autumn 1970 — New resources for grades 1-10.

Over a period of more than three years the board has shared in this development. All members of the board have studied the principles of the Design and many members of the board have evaluated the manuscripts of the resources as they have become available to us. As a result of this careful study, the board is presenting a recommendation to the 94th General Assembly relating to the nursery through junior (grade 6) departments of the church school. To enable the General Assembly to take action on the recommendation, the board offers the following information.

Christian Faith and Action is a design for an educational system in the church. There are three integral parts in the design — Teacher Education, Support for Education and Material Resources. These three are inter-related and inter-dependent. A major emphasis in the design will be the education of the teachers and leaders to whom the congregations entrust their educational enterprise. The total life of the congregation, including its worship, mission and service, is the context in which church education takes place. If the church is to achieve the measure of excellence in education which is needed to equip all its people for participation in God's mission, a strong partnership of support is needed among all the responsible groups in congregations, presbyteries and synods, and among the boards and committees of the General Assembly.

The educational objectives of *Christian Faith and Action* for adults, youth and children are defined in relation to what church members ought to be able to do. Five abilities have been identified as essential to mature Christian faith and action.

1. The ability intelligently to interpret the Bible as the unique medium through which God chooses to speak to men, thereby calling his people to active response in the worship and mission of the church in the present world.
2. The ability to understand the beliefs of the church in order to participate constructively in the community of faith through worship, service and witness.
3. The ability to work for the unity and mission of the Christian church.
4. The ability to understand the implications and risks of committing one's personal life — in occupation, home, and all other situations and pursuits — as an offering to God in response to his call to faithful service in Christ.
5. The ability to deal with ethical issues and to work toward the solution of contemporary personal and social problems.

In developing the material resources in the design for church education careful attention is given to the interaction between the processes of teaching and learning appropriate to persons of various ages. For each of the several age groupings of persons an attempt is made to describe the learning capacities and characteristics, the appropriate subject matter and the dominant mode of teaching-learning.

For the pre-school child the appropriate mode of teaching-learning is described as *consciousness*. The child becomes aware of who he is as a part of the household of faith. He became conscious of his own identity as a member of the church. The learning experiences help him to enter into a warm and friendly relationship with the congregation.

For the elementary school age children (grades 1-6) the emphasis in the teaching-learning sequence is upon *communication*. Competence in Biblical knowledge and in the use of the Scriptures is taken seriously. The children should gain a sense of historical sequence, the events and the geography in the history of the people of the Bible, the inter-relationships of the persons involved in this unique history, and the meaning of God's activity in human history as revealed in Scripture.

In grades 7-10 the young adolescent is expected to apply this Biblical knowledge to issues of self-understanding as a person and to his relationships to other persons and other communities to which he belongs. He will begin to reflect theologically and commence the task of confessing his faith. He will be drawn into the process of examining the worship of the church and the manner in which the church confesses its

faith and participates in mission. The sequence of teaching-learning at this stage is called *exploration*.

For older youth (grades 11 and up) and adults the sequence is designated *reflection-action*. The student is expected to use his Biblical competence and his understanding of the church's confessional life in dealing with the complex issues of the adult world. While the resources for older youth are basically the same as those for adults, it does not mean that they must always study together. Sometimes they can and should. Older youth are beginning to make adult decisions and are dealing with adult concerns and issues. A wide variety of resources will be available from which local groups may select and plan their programs of study and action.

The material resources and the teaching-learning sequence for grades 1-10 will be based upon a two-year grading system.

Uniform Lessons Co-operative Series

The board is aware that there are small church schools which encounter difficulties in using curriculum resources which are based upon the two-year grading system which is used in both *Christian Faith and Action* and the *Covenant Life Curriculum*. While still believing that the graded principle provides for thoroughness in education the board is presenting a recommendation which will provide guidance from the General Assembly for congregations which may have difficulty with graded materials because of local circumstances. The *Broadly Graded Series* is part of the *Covenant Life Curriculum* and is prepared to meet particular circumstances of this kind.

The *Uniform Lessons Co-operative Series* is designed to provide an alternate course in Bible study. It is a six-year cycle of study based upon the same background Scripture for juniors, youth and adults, with adaptations and emphases to meet the needs of the particular age group. There will be magazines for the teacher and for the students of each age group.

A Priority in Every Congregation

Education has become a priority for almost everyone in society today. As citizens who are caught up in the movements of our history we are keenly aware of this.

As Christians who are called to participate more fully than ever before in the mission and service of the church, we are becoming equally aware that education must be a priority in the life of every congregation. As we seek to mobilize the church's resources of persons and finances for mission and service, we must be prepared to meet the increasing demands which will be placed upon the educational services of the congregations. The frontiers of mission today are so different and so complex that they can only be served if all the members of the church are adequately trained and continually nourished in the faith of Jesus Christ. Christians are already at the centres of power and decision making in community, national and international life. More and more they will be called upon to be Christ's agents of reconciliation and the interpreters of God's purpose to redeem and renew the whole of life. They have a right to expect the church to equip them for this task.

To provide support, training and resources to assist congregations in fulfilling their educational responsibilities to all their members, the board is attempting to develop a strong partnership between synods, presbyteries and congregations. Two regional conferences were held in April and May of this year for all synod and presbytery conveners of Christian education, the regional secretaries and the presbytery deaconesses. The purpose of these conferences was:

To develop teamwork in supporting church education and assisting teachers and leaders by:

1. gaining insight into changes and developments in society, public education and church education;
2. identifying educational needs in congregations;
3. exploring ways and means of meeting these needs;
4. developing the skills required to meet these needs.

Through the services of its field staff the board is attempting to provide every

assistance to synods and presbyteries in developing plans which will enable them to meet the needs of congregations as they seek to establish higher standards of Christian education for all their members. The board has designated significant amounts from its authorized expenditures as grants to synod committees in order that they may provide advanced training for selected persons who will undertake a commitment to give specialized leadership in the educational ministries at every level. In addition the board offers financial assistance to synod committees to enable them to implement plans for training teachers and leaders, to conduct experiments in adult education, youth ministry and ministers' institutes.

At the present time the board is exploring the possibility of developing a design for church education which will take account of the particular situation, resources, structures and total mission of the Presbyterian Church in Canada. The board is aware of an urgent need to provide for the fullest co-ordination of the educational enterprises of all the boards and committees of the General Assembly and the respective committees in synods, presbyteries and congregations.

CHURCH CAMPING

In the past few years, the board has been giving much attention to our church camps. Camping is an important part of the Christian education program. It provides opportunities for nurture and growth that are not paralleled anywhere else in the church's life. At camp we have a Christian community, a group of people living in close relationship with one another, and living in close relationship with the natural environment. This is a learning situation: learning to live as God's people, and learning to live in God's world.

There is need for mature, trained leadership. The board has both initiated and co-operated in training events. Insofar as possible, this is done both regionally and nationally in conjunction with other denominations. Where interdenominational training cannot take place, then we provide our own. We have also developed a guide for the use of camp committees in their own training program. We are convinced that adequate leadership training is necessary if the standard of camping is to be raised.

Printed program resource materials are recommended for the use of leaders. Careful study is made of existing materials. Only after they have been thoroughly examined and fully tested are they recommended by the board for use in our camps. By such controlled testing, and by the development of pilot projects, we are trying to improve the quality of camping done by the church.

HIGHER LEARNING

Universities occupy a place of strategic importance for the whole of society. They hold a key position in the attempt to understand the nature of the vast changes of our era, and to harness those changes for good. Think especially of the students who are taking four years or more to give their topmost priority to the task of looking at our environment and our culture, trying to understand what it is that makes up our environment, trying to perceive the directions in which our culture should move in the future. This opportunity to stand back from life enables the members of the university to gain objectivity. We hope this will bring about a renewal of society and an understanding of the freedom the truth brings.

In recent years, and especially in the last year, there have been symptoms of trouble in the university. From all across the country — from Moncton, Sir George Williams, McGill, Toronto, York, Brock, Saskatchewan, Simon Fraser and University of British Columbia — there have been reports of dissatisfaction and unrest on the part of a significant number of students and staff. As the evidence pours in, one cannot help but conclude that the university itself is showing some signs of a sick society. There are many who point up their criticisms by claiming that the model of the university today tends toward a production line, toward the corporate view of producing a product rather than emphasizing the quality of the community. This is one of the great issues of university life today. Whether the criticism is true remains to be seen, but the largest body of people involved in the university — the students — are making themselves heard on this matter. It is a healthy situation when the students

themselves address their minds and their whole beings to an understanding of what it really means to be a university student and what a university itself really intends to be.

All of these factors point to the importance of a Christian presence on the campus. The Christian members of the faculty, administration and student body, are there to help the university be true to itself. The Good News — the Gospel — can help sustain or perhaps restore humanity in this university setting and bring hope that this created world, God's gift, will be used and not abused. The university is a kind of microcosm in the microcosm. What happens in this special experience in a person's life has far-reaching results for the total service that he gives to his country and mankind.

The strategic importance of the university has been recognized by the General Assembly. At the 85th General Assembly, 1959, a Special Committee on the Church's Work in the Universities recommended a responsible, ecumenical approach to Christian work on the campus. General Assembly approved this recommendation, and set up a permanent Committee of the Board of Christian Education called the Committee on Higher Learning in order to give leadership in implementing this policy. Detailed policy statements regarding university work were approved by the General Assemblies in 1965 and 1966. These statements rest on certain basic affirmations the Committee has made regarding Christian presence in the university:

1. Recognition that God is present and at work in the university and that the mission is God's mission.
2. Recognition that any presence and service of Christians in the university is to serve God's purpose there and not necessarily to pursue any denominational interests.
3. Recognition that Christian presence and service in the university belongs primarily to the Christians in the university — students, faculty, administrators.
4. Recognition that any appointments which might be made to university work would be for the purpose of stimulating and equipping these Christians for their service.
5. Recognition that the forms of Christian presence and service must be integral and relevant to the nature and purpose of the university.
6. Commitment to joint action with universities, student movements and other churches before taking unilateral denominational action.

These affirmations have been well received by other denominations, and have helped shape the co-operative approaches to campus ministries. The Committee on Higher Learning spent considerable time in examining a draft proposal for ecumenical ministries in higher education. This proposal had been prepared by representatives of the United, Anglican and Presbyterian Churches. It follows the general guidelines laid down by General Assembly. The centre of power in this proposal lies in the universities and not in control which may be exerted by representatives of the institutional church as such. The proposal envisages an ecumenical foundation board related to a university which would have representatives drawn in a balanced way from the university constituency and the participating denominations, movements or agencies. The foundation board would receive policies and principles, money on a pro-rata basis, and advice concerning terms of appointments from the participating denominations. It would work in co-operation with a university Christian community which would have direct relationship to and responsibility for the ministry on the campus. According to this model, students would have a real place in the decision making process of such a community. Where possible some formal recognition on the part of the university administration would be welcomed. In many cases it is recognized that communication with the university structure would have to be informal.

With this draft proposal in mind, the Committee studied other patterns of approach. A review of the basis of co-operation at Carleton University indicated that in particular circumstances a much simpler type of organization would serve the purpose well. The key to the Ottawa situation is a faculty committee, made up of members of each of the participating denominations. This committee consults with the chaplain regarding policy and program and gives oversight in receiving and disbursing

funds. The chaplain is given as much freedom as possible to organize his program, and is encouraged to consult with students as he sees the need. Liaison with the denominations is maintained through a chaplaincy committee, consisting of two representatives of each of the participating denominations. By this means the need for funds and for other kinds of support is communicated to the presbyteries and diocesan groups in the area. It is significant that for several years the Presbytery of Ottawa has maintained its interest in this co-operative venture, contributing \$1,500 a year to the support of the chaplain.

The Committee on Higher Learning proceeded to develop some further examples of co-operative work, models which would suit large urban universities with several chaplains or workers, and other models which would be more appropriate for the university connected with a small city or town, where faculty members would be easily recognized as liaison persons with the denominations in the area. In accordance with our policy of co-operating with the denominational offices in this matter, our studies have been offered to the joint committee, and will be further developed, and shared with the responsible planning groups across the country.

The Committee on Higher Learning recognizes the valuable support given campus ministries by many of the Presbyterian congregations near the universities. The question may well be asked why such congregations cannot be the bases for major thrusts in this mission. Our denomination is not alone in finding, however, that by and large there is a disinclination on the part of students, Christian students as well, to become involved in the life of the nearby off-campus congregation. This varies with the circumstances, and very often if a student is involved in a campus near his own congregation he may continue his associations. But many students who have moved to new areas just do not feel inclined to take up an involvement in that nearby congregation. They speak of two worlds, almost of two solitudes. While this may spring somewhat from apathy, it may also spring from a more basic insight that the first responsibility in ecumenical mission of students, faculty and administrators is to care for the integrity and health of that university. Traditional forms of congregational life based usually on the nuclear cell of the family are inappropriate and perhaps inadequate as a basis for the kind of Christian community which is necessary in the university. We have to find new forms of supporting communities relevant to the interests and concerns of academic life.

Already our church has engaged in some very interesting experiments in this approach to ecumenical ministry. A variety of patterns comes from a variety of circumstances across the nation. We see many encouraging signs as presbyteries and synods have taken action to implement the ecumenical approach to campus ministry. The co-operative work at Carleton University was mentioned above. At York University the Anglican, Lutheran, Roman Catholic, United and Presbyterian Churches provide financial and other support for Miss Lynda Newmarch as an ecumenical worker on the campus. The University itself has co-operated in this appointment by offering Miss Newmarch a position as Don of the Women's Residence, Founders College. At the end of this semester, Miss Newmarch is resigning, and a Roman Catholic person has been appointed by the S.C.M. Advisory Board to take her place. With the growth of the University it is hoped that a part-time assistant can be appointed as well. The presbyteries of East and West Toronto have increased their financial support from \$900 a year to \$1,300. Work among French-speaking students is carried on by the Rev. Dr. Jean Cruvellier at Laval University in Quebec City. Dr. Cruvellier commenced his work at Laval in 1963 by offering to conduct services in French for Protestant students who came from across North America to attend summer school at Laval. Since then, the University has provided facilities for Protestant services during the regular school term. Through co-operation with the Roman Catholic authorities, Dr. Cruvellier has been able to participate as a kind of honorary Protestant chaplain in many ecumenical gatherings at the University.

York and Laval are but two examples of the twenty campuses where the Presbyterian Church is engaged in an ecumenical approach to ministry. With the rapid expansion of existing universities and the creation of several new campuses, the demands upon the churches for support for this special ministry are bound to increase.

The Committee on Higher Learning has given attention to the need for some sort of fund for scholarships, in-service training, preparatory training, some kind of help which enables the persons involved in campus ministry to prepare adequately for the special kind of relationships they have. The committee anticipates that out of this renewed interest in campus ministry it will have requests for experiments, for new relationships, new ways of finding a base of support for a Christian community on the campus. It may be that in some strategic place the committee will encourage the purchase or the building of a residence or centre near campus, especially in some instances where no facilities for students to meet in a casual way are available. The church may be the one group in society which is able to initiate that kind of support. Perhaps at a later date the state will take up the responsibility.

In its draft budget for 1969, the committee included \$2,500 to provide some support for campus ministries. It regrets that this money will not be available in 1969, but hopes that a priority will be given to this work in 1970. The committee has forwarded through the Board of Christian Education a recommendation to the Administrative Council that, in the assignment of the National Development Fund, it include an amount of \$50,000

- (a) for work among French Canadian students;
- (b) to provide scholarships to assist in training chaplains and university workers,
- (c) to establish a fund for campus ministry to supplement local funds in carrying out needed experiments.

The committee heard a report from the National President of the Student Christian Movement, Mr. Roger Perkins. Students who take part in the S.C.M. say that it is because of the specifically Christian roots, heritage and message that the Movement holds for them such great interest. While Bible study is not a major emphasis in the Movement, the personal significance of Jesus is central. Mr. Perkins challenged the church to see the Student Christian Movement as an arm of its work, and to stay sympathetically with the young adults, to help them do things, and to identify themselves with those who don't know where the answers may be found.

The gratitude of the Movement was extended to the Committee on Higher Learning for the services of its Secretary, Dr. D. M. Warne, who served as Acting General Secretary of the S.C.M. for the period of May 13 to September 30, 1967. During that period Dr. Warne was able to help the Movement in an emergency situation with approximately a day-and-a-half a week of his time. The Student Christian Movement is looking forward to the arrival next July 1st of the new General Secretary, Mr. Donald Wilson, who is presently Secretary of the Ecumenical Assistance Program of the World Student Christian Federation in Geneva.

The Committee on Higher Learning extended its hearty appreciation to Prof. George Sinclair for several years of excellent service as its Chairman. The new Chairman is Prof. L. J. Shein, Chairman of the Department of Russian, McMaster University. The Vice-Chairman is Prof. George Hopton of York University.

THEOLOGICAL EDUCATION

Although theological education in the seminaries is not a direct responsibility of the Board of Christian Education, the board sees a close relationship between adult education in the parish and the style of education required in the seminaries. A key factor in the success of a parish adult education program is the skill of the teaching elder in giving competent leadership in this field. Many clergymen have expressed their concern to the board that they are not adequately oriented or skilled to facilitate educational processes in the congregation. The modern communications media have transformed the setting for learning in today's society, and the old authoritative methods of teaching are no longer effective. The style of leadership required of the teaching elder is basically that of a facilitator of learning. He is not the one who can give all the answers. He is a member of a team in a congregation of ministers — and his role is to help his fellow ministers, who are involved in some complex fields of service, to achieve some theological competence in facing the issues of their everyday life. The clergyman helps his people to enquire, to learn the way to learn.

The Board of Christian Education recognizes that one of the major tasks of the

church is teaching. Through its field services, the board is willing to offer its resources to help equip the teaching elders for this task. A variety of programs is available for clergy retreats, conferences and laboratory schools in order to develop greater skills in group leadership and learning by discovery.

Also the board sees the need for a careful consideration of the effect of the style of leadership in the theological seminaries upon the role adopted by the clergyman in his parish work. The board is willing to co-operate fully with the Assembly's Committee on the Structure of Theological Education in thinking through the implications for the seminaries of these insights concerning the skill of being a facilitator of learning. The board's concern is not simply with a course called "Christian Education", but rather that these insights should permeate the whole curriculum of and setting for theological training.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. Resources for Church Education

That, within the context of a responsible congregational selection of educational resources,

- (a) the General Assembly approve the use of a variety of educational resources (based upon a study of local needs and interests)
 - (i) **for adults**, from such resources as those recommended by the Boards and Committees of the General Assembly and the Women's Missionary Societies;
 - (ii) **for junior high and senior high youth**, especially from the resources recommended by the Board of Christian Education in the "Resources for Ministry with Youth" (or its successor); and
- (b) **for the nursery through junior (grade 6) departments** of the church school, the General Assembly recommend the use of *Christian Faith and Action/Designs for an Educational System* of the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A., and of the *Covenant Life Curriculum* of the Presbyterian Church in the United States, as the local situation may require (and as the Christian Faith and Life curriculum resources cease to be available);
- (c) That the General Assembly suggest to congregations having difficulty with graded materials that they try the *Broadly Graded Series* for nursery through primary of the Presbyterian Church in the United States, and the *Uniform Lessons Co-operative Series* for junior through adult published jointly by the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A., the Presbyterian Church in the United States and the United Church of Christ; and that these congregations be encouraged to report their evaluations to the Board of Christian Education.

2. That the General Assembly draw to the attention of the Committee on the Structure of Theological Education the section of this report dealing with the style of education in seminaries.

COMMITTEE ON INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

Apart from recommendations brought before the last General Assembly concerning Vietnam and the Middle East the main work of your Committee during 1967 was

through its representation on the International Affairs Committee of the Canadian Council of Churches. Arrangements were made for Presbyterian participation in the annual Ottawa Churchmen's Seminar held in January with the theme "Canada and the Commonwealth" and in a Canadian Churches Seminar held at the Church Centre of the United Nations in December with the purpose of fostering fuller understanding of and participation in the work of the U.N.

Your Committee would draw to the attention of the Assembly the outstanding contribution made by its secretary, Dr. E. H. Johnson, in seeking solutions to the many problems created by the troubled and tragic situation in Nigeria-Biafra. Dr. Johnson travelled widely, often at great personal risk, to meet and work with government and Church authorities in this connection and our Church can be very proud of the helpful role he has played. Recommendations regarding Nigeria-Biafra will be presented to the Assembly in the light of the circumstances at the time of its meeting.

RECOMMENDATION

That the present allocation of \$500 for the work of the Committee be continued.

COMMITTEE ON INTER-CHURCH AID, REFUGEE AND WORLD SERVICE

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

Your Committee is pleased to report a good response from our people in support of the work of Inter-Church Aid, Refugee and World Service in 1967. Almost \$45,000 was received during the year and this with the balance carried forward from 1966 made possible disbursements of slightly over \$53,000.

The following grants were made — \$8,000 for relief work in Vietnam divided equally between South and North; \$5,500 for emergency relief in the Middle East; \$20,000 for the on-going campaign against hunger in India; \$250 for leprosy work; \$14,000 as our share of the basic service programme of the World Council of Churches' Division of Inter-Church Aid, Refugee and World Service; and \$3,000 for the social service work of the Presbyterian World Alliance in Europe.

Expenses of the Committee amounted to \$2,280, the main item being the cost of producing, in co-operation with the American Churches, a pamphlet reporting on what the Churches have done in coping with the problem of hunger in India. A supply of this pamphlet sufficient to provide one copy for each family in our Church was secured and distributed to all congregations. We hope the pamphlet will prove an effective educational tool in indicating to our people not only what has been done in India but also the kind of constructive work being done by the Churches in this field in other parts of the world.

Your Committee has been concerned about the unsettled and tragic situation in Nigeria-Biafra and will have a special focus on the needs of that area during this current year. Early in 1968 \$7,500 was given to provide relief supplies for Biafra but we must give much more as our share of the \$500,000 the World Council of Churches is seeking to raise. We hope that the response to our 1968 pre-Easter appeal will be sufficiently generous to make this possible but if not a special appeal will be necessary.

While our Church has made steady progress through the years in providing increasing support for this important work of Christian compassion we are still far

from what should be regarded as our potential. One dollar a year from each family would raise over \$130,000 and this should be considered a reasonable objective for a Church of our size and resources. May we all strive together to reach it.

RECOMMENDATION

That this General Assembly authorize an appeal to be made to our Church during the pre-Easter season for the support of the work of Inter-Church Aid, Refugee and World Service and request all ministers to bring the matter before their congregations.

THE COMMITTEE ON RECRUITMENT AND VOCATION

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

Your Committee in making its annual report as a standing committee of the General Assembly wishes to express gratitude to the other Boards who have appointed responsible people to its membership and for the fact that it has developed into a close-working group of concerned people. Our work is carried on by four main sub-committees: Program, responsible for all recruitment projects; Ministry, responsible for an approach to men in and out of the pastoral ministry; Resources, responsible for literature, advertising and visual aids; Research, responsible for inquiry into the changing nation and the ministry of the Church. Each of these committees has met often during the year. In addition the whole Committee doubled its number of meetings, two of them being two-day study meetings. This increase of work-load has come about as we have tried to fulfill our terms of reference as passed by the Assembly of 1965 and recorded in its minutes.

Steps in Growing Concern

In 1965 the General Assembly in its wisdom acted to meet the changing situation of the Church in the following ways:

- (a) Adopted a constitution and terms of reference for the Committee on Recruitment and Vocation.
- (b) Gave a greatly increased appropriation to that Committee (from \$1200 to \$13,500).
- (c) Appointed a Special Committee on Recommendation No. 10 of the Administrative Council "to undertake a thorough study of the Vocation and Mission of the Presbyterian Church in the changing life of Canada, and a study of the resources of the Presbyterian Church in persons, finances and institutions". (A. & P. 1965 p. 124)
- (d) Appointed a Committee on the structure of Theological Education "that the Church may be informed as to the changes that have been made and are being made adequately to train and equip our students to minister in a rapidly changing world". (A. & P. 1965 p. 69)
- (e) Received Overture No. 16 from the Presbytery of Calgary seeking priorities based on urgency and importance for the spending of funds; and Overture No. 27 from the Presbytery of Saskatoon seeking a study which would acknowledge the validity of ministries other than the pastoral.

In 1966 the General Assembly received the following:

- (a) A recommendation from the Committee on Recruitment and Vocation "that Presbyteries be urged to appoint a pastoral committee . . . to exercise a pastoral and counselling function for their fellow ministers.

- (b) Terms of reference for the Special Committee on Recommendation No. 10 of the Administrative Council (A. & P. 1960, p. 397-8) which terms duplicated in good measure those given to the Committee on Recruitment and Vocation.
- (c) Overture No. 34, Presbytery of Paris, seeking determination of programmes of research which would strengthen the spiritual vitality of the Church; Overture No. 37, Presbytery of Victoria, seeking specialized training for urban ministry; Overture No. 40, Presbytery of Westminster, seeking a definition of the role and function of the ordained minister.

In 1967 besides the reports which touched on the changing needs and mission of the Church, the General Assembly received the following Overtures:

- (a) No. 12, Presbytery of P.E.I., seeking inclusion in the Call regulations for a study leave for ministers.
- (b) No. 25, Synod of Toronto and Kingston, seeking the establishment of a category of worker-ministers.
- (c) No. 48, Presbytery of Peterborough, seeking reaffirmation of confidence in the call to the Holy Ministry and more effort and more money to be spent on recruitment.

Your Committee is gratified by these notes of increased concern and feel that in some measure they are a response to its work over the past three years. They indicate concern. That is good. There are two questions which need to be answered. Is it deep enough to cause the Church to grant it a priority in the spending of money? The second question is, where do we begin to meet this concern? It is evident that there is a feeling of malaise, but also confusion as to focus. Your Committee has spent a great deal of time in the past three years seeking to find a starting point. We present a proposal which is born of our own experimentation and research throughout the Church.

Steps in Activity

(a) RESOURCES: Presently available from Audio-Visual Department, 50 Wynford Dr., film and filmstrip on recruitment. Available from our secretary, Miss G. Kelly, 50 Wynford Dr., various pamphlets on Church vocation. Other recruitment literature is in the preparation stage. The booklet "Enlistment", a study guide for Sessions, is being revised. "Jobs worth doing", an inter-church pamphlet was mailed to all ministers in April. A kit of all our materials has been mailed to the Guidance Departments of all Ontario High Schools.

(b) PROGRAM: Choir tours are minimal now due to lack of student time. Presbytery Y.P. rallies begun in 1965 have covered the Church. A new approach was begun in 1967 as a pilot project in Bruce Presbytery. It consists of a prior ministers' conference; sermons on the preceding two Sundays with the mission and ministry of the Church as the theme; a week of meetings with elders, group leaders, and informal pre-arranged coffee-parties with members of the congregation. Presbytery initiative in organization was excellent, and the response encouraged your Committee to make this its priority approach this year.

A training session for leaders has been held and at least three other Presbyteries will be visited this year.

(c) ROLE OF THE MINISTRY: A conference was held in November under the auspices of our committee. Those in attendance were ministers of our Church who had left the pastoral ministry. We were glad they trusted us sufficiently to come and that they found acceptance. From the report the following observations are taken: (1) Ministers desperately need each other, but they don't have each other; (2) A serious dichotomy exists between the minister and the people; (3) The congregation often is too confining for the minister; (4) There is a real feeling of the need for team ministries; (5) There is a great need for re-training; (6) These were men who had not lost their faith. A second conference is planned at the time of writing, to enter into the question of role and intra-personal relations at a deeper level.

(d) **RESEARCH:** During the past three years the Committee has documented evidence from a questionnaire to ministers that there is great uncertainty about the role of the pastoral ministry, and about the validity and motivations of other ministries. It has in its approach to young people found that the climate among them is indifferent, sometimes to the Church, almost always to the pastoral ministry. What's wrong and what's right? Some would answer "Preach the Gospel and you get the fruit". If the Church is not getting the fruit then obviously it isn't preaching the Gospel and that would include those who give such an answer, for they are part of the Church. Can we find out? Your committee held a two-day conference at Aurora to come to grips with this problem. The conclusion was that we needed someone skilled in asking the right questions and evaluating the answers; someone who would not be afflicted with "tunnel vision" because he is part of what is being examined. We approached two groups of consultants who have guided us, so far without cost to the Church. We are proposing, as a result, a research development project in terms of Recommendation No. 1 listed below.

(e) **FINANCES:** The General Assembly has been generous in its appropriations — for 1965, \$13,500; 1966, \$15,900; 1967, \$11,500. We have underspent in each of these three years, not because of lack of activity, but because of a desire to know where we were going before we spent money on promotional efforts. Our total underspending for these three years is \$18,297. To implement our proposal in Recommendation No. 1 we shall need authorization to spend up to \$16,000 for each of 1968, 1969 and 1970. Such authorization would enable us to carry on our regular work and do the research concurrently.

(f) **INTER-COMMITTEE RELATIONS:** When it was recognized that the Special Committee on Recommendation No. 10 of the Administrative Council would be working in the same area, our committee entered into relations with them for the exchange of ideas and study material. The relationship has been most cordial and members of both committees welcomed the avoidance of duplicate efforts. While each committee has pursued its own work of study and research, the one on the changing Church, the other on the changing ministry, the conclusions reached as to symptoms and needs have been surprisingly identical. Much of what is said in their report could be said in this report. The agreement on the need for research and development has come from two relatively independent committees, (there being only one member in common to both committees). The Committee on the Structure of Theological Education opened its doors to consultations again for which we thank them, and express regret that greater advantage could not be taken of the opportunity. During the year the committee dealt also with two recommendations passed by last year's Assembly: (1) that the Committee write the ministers of the Church re the needs for recruitment. This was not done directly; (2) that Presbyteries set up Recruitment Councils and report their action to our Committee. Three Presbyteries replied and the substance was that the present Students and Colleges Committee could handle this matter.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. (a) That the Committee on Recruitment and Vocation be authorized to institute a project of research and development in relation to the changing context of the Presbyterian Church in Canada and the resultant demands upon it.
- (b) That the objectives of the project be:
 1. To assure a continuing viable pastoral ministry.
 2. To develop new forms of ministry and a readiness to accept them.
 3. To develop the fullest use of the talents and abilities of our personnel.
 4. To develop the necessary modifications in the policies of finance and property administration.
- (c) That the initial focus of the project be research into effective ministries in this changing context.
- (d) That the design of this project provide for the maximum involvement of

Boards, Presbyteries and other policy-making agencies of the Church, so that the implications of the research will be taken seriously.

- (e) That in order to co-ordinate this project with the ongoing work of these agencies they be kept fully informed as the findings emerge.
2. Re Overture 25 Worker-ministers, Synod of Toronto and Kingston, A. & P. 1967, p. 425. That inasmuch as this Overture would appear to have far-reaching implications, the Committee be authorized to study the matter in consultation with the Clerks of Assembly, the General Board of Missions and the Board of Education and report to the 1969 Assembly.
 3. Re Overture 48, Pastoral Ministry, Presbytery of Peterborough, A. & P. 1967, p. 605. That the prayer of the overture be answered in terms of the project of research and development proposed to the 1968 Assembly in Recommendation No. 1 of the report of this committee.

The Committee wishes to record its own appreciation to him for unflinching courtesy and co-operation.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That the thanks of this Assembly be given the Kirk-Session and Congregation of St. Giles, Ottawa for their courtesies.
2. That the thanks of this Assembly be extended to all who assisted the Committee in preparing the details of the Moderator's itineraries.
3. That the thanks of this Assembly be accorded the hundreds throughout the Church who welcomed the Moderator so gladly and provided hospitality and assistance for him.

**REPORT OF THE CLERKS OF ASSEMBLY, OVERTURE 12, 1967,
PRESBYTERY OF PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND,
RE STUDY LEAVE FOR MINISTERS**

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

The 93rd General Assembly directed the Presbyteries to study Overture 12, 1967, Presbytery of Prince Edward Island, Re Study Leaves for Ministers, and report to the Clerks of Assembly by April 1st, 1968. (Text of Overture, A. & P., 1967, page 419: references, pages 34, 49, 72, and 97).

The Clerks construe the Minute, page 97, as a directive to compile the returns for the consideration of this Assembly, but not to make recommendations.

Twenty-three presbyteries reported. Of these, two disapproved the Overture, three approved simpliciter, and five stated they approved in principle, some of the five making brief comments. The remaining thirteen made suggestions and judgments of varying length.

This Report will summarize the returns of the thirteen presbyteries. As a background, the prayer of Overture 12, 1967 may be summarized as follows: The prayer asks that Assembly direct all self-supporting charges to grant their ministers study leaves, that the leave be a part of all future Calls, and that the regulations be these: (1) Two weeks' leave in addition to holidays, accumulating up to but not beyond seven years, (2) The study to be approved by the Presbytery, (3) Stipend continues to the minister, but pulpit supply is paid by the congregation, and (4) The leave credits are portable to another congregation in case the minister is translated.

There was considerable overlapping in the opinions relayed to the Clerks of Assembly. The major comments were:

Leaves should be provided for men in augmented charges also.

Refresher courses should be provided.

Ministers should report to Presbytery fully on their courses taken.

There are dangers in the accumulated credits idea: may militate against men seeking calls. Make it three years, not seven; make it four; make it as long as a congregation may decide.

The whole scheme is hard on small congregations.

The portable feature is not workable. Make the portable factor not more than two years' credits. Don't have any portability.

It can't be imposed on congregations now settled with a minister.

Many features of the scheme should not be mandatory.

The General Board of Mission should be responsible for the costs involved for their appointees.

Defer all consideration of the idea until we see if the proceeds of the National Development Fund can finance all of it.

The whole idea can be, and should be, handled by the presbyteries that desire to do so, without reference to Assembly.

In support of this last statement, not originating within the Presbytery of Guelph and Saugeen, the Presbytery of Guelph and Saugeen has already taken action, and their answer will be read in full by the Clerks. For the records of this Assembly, it is summarized as follows:

The Presbytery has directed each congregation at its annual meeting (now past) to give an annual leave up to two weeks, including two Sundays, pay \$100 towards the cost of a refresher course, pay the pulpit supply, give usual month's holidays in addition. The ministers of Presbytery are to co-operate in caring for pastoral duties during their colleague's absence. These recommendations are now to be in all Calls issued in the Presbytery. The ministers are to report in writing or orally on their impressions and diligence in pursuing the refresher course.

The Clerks of Assembly ask that this Report be received and adopted as fulfillment of instruction of the 93rd Assembly to them. They ask that this Assembly be pleased to present its own recommendations in the matter.

COMMITTEE ON INSTITUTIONAL CHAPLAINCIES

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

The Committee on Institutional Chaplaincies begs leave to report in the following terms:

The Committee was appointed by the 91st General Assembly to study the question of institutional chaplaincies. It has completed its first full year as a standing committee of the General Assembly. During the past year the committee convened a conference of full and part-time institutional chaplains in the southern Ontario area to discuss their working conditions, responsibilities to Civil Service Commissions and their relationships with The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

Your committee discovered considerable confusion regarding their status in the Church as ministers. The committee also ascertained that there are a number of anomalies in connection with pension privileges. It learned, too, that some chaplaincies are regarded as cognate work while others are considered to be entirely secular employment.

The committee during the past year has also had meetings with the Committee on Certification of Institutional Chaplaincies of the Canadian Council of Churches. It has had conversations with the Director of Chaplaincy Services for the Provincial Government of Ontario. It has taken part in consultations concerning the terms of employment, salaries, and relationships of chaplains working in Federal penal institutions. It has also had consultations with the Canadian Urban Training Project for Christian Service and has had representation on the Canadian Council for Supervised Pastoral Training.

Although the committee does not intend to make any recommendations to this Assembly it will continue its investigations and bring specific suggestions to future meetings.

**THE REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON
SYNOD CORPORATIONS**

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

The Committee on Synod Corporations begs leave to report on its stewardship and the work of the Synod and Presbytery Corporations during the year.

New Loans

Only two loans were approved this past year; one by the Corporation of the Synod of Toronto and Kingston for \$120,000.00 and one by the Corporation of the Synod of Hamilton and London for \$75,000.00. No debentures were issued due to the extremely high interest rates prevailing at present and the unsettled conditions of the bond market.

Existing Loans

Since the inception of the Corporations in 1957, capital funds in the amount of \$4,708,217.00 have been lent to sixty-six congregations to construct their church buildings. Eight of these congregations were temporarily accommodated with unsecured loans from the chartered banks in the amount of \$769,000.00 on letters of intent.

The principal outstanding on debentures as of December 31, 1967 stood at \$2,673,500.00, which is a decrease of \$193,000.00 over the previous year. At the same date the total of guaranteed bank loans amounted to \$334,652.00. While \$25,185.00 was repaid on the principal of these guaranteed bank loans during the year, the overall decrease was only \$178.00 over 1966 due to the fact that two congregations drew the balance of the approved loans in 1967 and one increased its loan.

Assets and Liabilities

As of December 31, 1967 the 63 congregations that now have loans through the Corporations had assets (fixed and cash) of \$10,743,830.00, liabilities of \$5,431,908.00 and an apparent asset surplus of \$5,547,145.00, all of which exhibits an improvement over the previous year.

Multiplicity of Loans

Your Committee is greatly concerned because congregations persist in carrying a multiplicity of loans, which is one of the major causes of default and, we fear, of declining membership of the Church. It is a demonstrated fact that people, generally speaking, will not associate themselves with a debt-loaded congregation. The 63 congregations that now have loans from the Corporations have a total of 209 loans from several sources. Five have one loan, 15 have two loans, 17 have three loans, 15 have four loans, 7 have five loans, 2 have six loans and 2 have seven loans. The Committee is convinced that no congregation should attempt to borrow capital funds unless it has first meticulously prepared a feasibility study of the proposed project and its members are agreed to repay such funds and are trained in Christian Stewardship. The cost should not only be counted but should be weighed against the ability to pay it.

Defaults

While no Corporation has defaulted on a payment of principal and interest, eleven congregations have defaulted to the Corporations that market debentures. An account of the defaults follows:

To date, the Presbytery of Ottawa, which guaranteed the Corporation mortgages, has been able to provide sufficient funds to cover the defaults by the two congregations involved. The other Corporations prevented defaults on the debentures by paying the instalments on behalf of the congregations but with the stipulation that the funds provided must be repaid to the Corporations involved. The Corporations concerned have written to the Presbyteries which have oversight of these defaulting congregations requesting that all necessary steps be taken by these Courts to correct the situation. Analyses of the position of these congregations have been prepared and corrective measures suggested.

Two congregations (Garden Village and Brentwood) having guaranteed bank loans sold part of their land, which enabled them to reduce their loans (\$4,000 and \$7,000 respectively), otherwise reduction of their loans would have been by a small amount. Although these and other such congregations are not technically in default, it is obvious that steps should be taken to insure larger and more regular repayments. In one case it will take the congregation another forty years to liquidate its loan if it continues its present level of principal repayment. These congregations are as follows:

Reserve and Guarantee Funds

The combined total of the Capital Reserve and Guarantee Funds of the eight Corporations at December 31, 1967 amounted to \$723,041.00, which is an increase of \$60,086.00 over the previous year. (See table attached). Your Committee would again urge all Corporations to accelerate their efforts to increase their Capital Reserve and Guarantee Funds.

National Corporation

In accordance with the authorization of the 93rd General Assembly your Committee has now filed an application with the Government of Canada for a charter to form a National Corporation. (see pp. 586-593)

The six Synods which have Synod Corporations and the Presbytery of Ottawa and the Corporations therein have all agreed to transfer their assets and liabilities to the National Corporation when it is formed and wind up their companies. We regret to inform Assembly that Presbyterian Extension Fund (B.C.) Limited has not indicated its willingness to become part of the new company. Despite the fact that the Synod of British Columbia has directed the Presbyterian Extension Fund (B.C.) Limited to negotiate with the Committee in this respect and the Committee has communicated its willingness to do so, to this writing we have not received any reply to our visits and subsequent letters.

Church Membership

Your Committee took note of the alarming fact that the membership of The Presbyterian Church in Canada has decreased for the third year in succession, which is distressing in view of the fact that the population of Canada increased by 1,190,000 souls in the same period. This fact was expressed graphically to the Committee by charts, which are available to all commissioners. The Committee decided to circulate this information among the Presbyteries for their consideration and action. We are concerned about this serious decrease, an assessment of which would perhaps include a variety of reasons, such as, the shifting population, urbanization, secularization of society, but more important, the debility to confront people with the claims of the Gospel and the seeming loss of the sense of mission. It is the considered opinion of your Committee that this Assembly should appoint a special Committee to study this problem and bring a comprehensive report to the 95th General Assembly with recommendations as to how the downward trend in membership may be reversed in

order that the Church may enjoy an improved membership position when it celebrates its hundredth anniversary six years hence.

Appreciation

The Committee takes pleasure in expressing its thanks to those congregations known to it which have given financial assistance to those congregations that have borrowed from the Corporations to meet their mortgage payments.

Armour Heights, Toronto to Calvin, Sudbury.

The congregations of the Presbytery of Ottawa to St. Timothy and St. David's Ottawa.

We record again our appreciation to the Corporations and their Boards of Directors for their co-operation during the year.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That all Corporations be encouraged to accelerate their efforts to increase their Capital Reserve and Guarantee Funds.
2. That this 94th General Assembly appoint a special Committee to study the problem of declining Church membership with the instruction that it bring a comprehensive report to the 95th General Assembly with recommendations as to how the downward trend in membership may be reversed.
3. That all congregations be advised that it is their responsibility to make sure that their property is insured adequately and that those having loans from one of the Corporations be also advised that the interest of the Corporation concerned be clearly defined in the insurance document.

PRESBYTERIAN RESIDENCE, SASKATOON

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

The year 1967 saw the Presbyterian Residence open to University students providing a home away from home for the boys. We had 28 boys for the spring term; 12 for Intersession-summer lodging and Summer School; and 29 for the fall term. In fall term we had 12 Presbyterian boys, but no candidates for the ministry.

Once again the residence provided a home for the Synod Summer School (now and henceforth to be known as the Synod Youth Conference). The Conference is a very meaningful event in the life of our Church and a highlight in the annual program of the residence. The synod committee on E. & S.A. sponsored the annual ministers' retreat.

The building campaign did not make a great deal of progress in the centennial year but we do have a faithful, growing number who are honoring their pledges and the cash donations increase accordingly. Campaign chairman reports that the fund now stands at \$51,000.00.

RECOMMENDATION

That the Presbyterian Residence Board request a grant of up to \$4,300.00.

THE COMMITTEE ON HOME RELIGION

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

Your Committee on Home Religion have continued to publish EVERY DAY as a guide to family worship and private devotions. We acknowledge with gratitude the services of over fifty of our ministers who, during 1967, contributed material for EVERY DAY. Thorn Press and Presbyterian Publications also receive our thanks for printing, binding and distributing EVERY DAY without profit to themselves.

During the year Dr. H. F. Davidson and Mrs. R. Lezaki of the Board of Stewardship and Budget assigned a church bulletin for a message on Home Religion. Dr. D. H. Rayner, Editor, published each month the list of passages of EVERY DAY. The Administrative Council provided the back cover of the January 1968 issue of "The Presbyterian Record" for the presentation of the work of the Committee. We thank all of them for this kindly co-operation in the service we are endeavouring to render the Church.

During 1967, the cover pictures of EVERY DAY were as follows: January-March, Mountain and hamlet with church in the foreground; April-June, Lilies, sheep and sheepfold; July-September (Centennial year), The Parliament Buildings, Ottawa; October-December, Neil Harbour, Cape Breton Island.

During 1967, the circulation of EVERY DAY was as follows: January-March, 12,784; April-June, 12,622; July-September, 12,560; October-December, 13,102; an average of 12,767 per quarter compared with an average of 13,019 per quarter in 1966.

Since 1946 (for over twenty years) Dr. N. G. Smith, Librarian of Presbyterian College, Montreal, has been Editor of EVERY DAY. With the greatest regret and only on Dr. Smith's insistence did the Committee accept his resignation as Editor. He has done a great work for our Church. His skill as a writer, his knowledge of the scriptures and his gifts as a theologian were brought to bear in a noble service. The Committee regard his contribution to the production of EVERY DAY as outstanding in the total endeavour of the Church. From the bottom of our hearts, the members of the Committee express our profound thanks to this great servant of the Church.

The Committee were fortunate in obtaining the consent of Dr. L. H. Fowler to undertake the editorship of EVERY DAY. In addition to the heavy duties which devolve upon him as Secretary of the Administrative Council and Clerk of Assembly, he has added this extra service to the Church. The Committee are happy that Dr. Smith has been succeeded by one so capable as Dr. Fowler.

The Committee bow in thanksgiving to Almighty God for any success attained through the use of EVERY DAY and pray that His blessing may continue to rest upon every effort to serve Him.

RECOMMENDATIONS

The Committee crave leave to present six recommendations as follows:

1. That the thanks of this Assembly be expressed to Doctor Neil Gregor Smith for his outstanding service to the Church through the many years he has been Editor of EVERY DAY.
2. That in view of the concern for the welfare of the Home, the Church and the Nation in these times and the need for deepening the spiritual life of our people, each Kirk-Session of the Church which has not already done so be urged to appoint one of its members or other interested person to promote the use of EVERY DAY within the congregation.
3. That the congregations of the Church be asked to consider placing copies of EVERY DAY in hospitals, homes and other institutions within the community they serve for the use of patients and others.
4. That Kirk-Sessions be requested to present a copy of EVERY DAY to each person uniting with the Church on profession of faith or by certificate; and on such other occasions as baptism (to the parents) and marriage (to the young couple about to establish a home) and to make copies available by way of a rack or otherwise in the vestibule of the Church for the members and adherents of the congregations.
5. That the Kirk-Session or some other body within the congregation be requested to provide the minister with sufficient copies of EVERY DAY to assist him in making Recommendation No. 3 effective and also for his use in his visitation of the congregation.
6. That the Assembly invite the Presbyteries of the Church to set aside a period of time at one of their meetings during the year for the purpose of discussion and instituting methods of promoting the use of EVERY DAY as a devotional guide among the congregations within their bounds.

COMMITTEE ON HISTORY

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

The observance of the Centennial of Confederation in Canada during 1967 contributed to a stirring of interest in our country and its institutions. Our church participated enthusiastically in the observance of the Centennial. Some congregations held special services on the Sunday before or after July 1st, and approximately 35,000 copies of an order of service prepared for this occasion were called for. In some areas ministers and congregations joined in civic and ecumenical services, and many participated in congregational or community Centennial projects. Wide use was made of the *Centennial Anthology of Prayers and Hymns for Congregations* issued by the Inter-Faith Commission.

Three Centennial publications of our church, *A Short History of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, Enkindled by the Word*, and *The Face of the Church* have been well received. One of your committee's recommendations is that congregations which have not already done so be urged to purchase sets of these books for presentation to their church, or church school libraries, and, where feasible, to the public libraries in their communities. Some religious groups make a practice of presenting to public libraries copies of works dealing with the history or teaching of their groups. In this respect their example is one which we might be well advised to follow. The presence of such books on the shelves of our public libraries would make available to a wide audience information concerning the history and witness of our church.

The annual meeting of the committee was called for January 12th, but owing to severe weather conditions which prevented the attendance of members, a second meeting was called for February 13th. Attention was called to the desirability of having a check-list of theses in Canadian universities and colleges dealing with subjects having a bearing upon the history of Presbyterianism in Canada. An attempt is to be made to compile a list of such theses. The annual history prize was awarded to the Rev. Wilfred Moncrieff for his account of the development of the Presbyterian Church in Newfoundland.

Two issues of the *Newsletter* were issued during 1967, edited by the Secretary of the Committee, the Rev. T. M. Bailey. One dealt with the history of Knox and Calvin churches in the city of Hamilton, and the other contained the first part of Mr. Moncrieff's history of the church in Newfoundland.

Under the auspices of the Synod of the Atlantic Provinces an impressive service was held at Truro in June, 1967, commemorating the hundred and fiftieth anniversary of the formation of the Synod of Nova Scotia.

With one centennial past our church should begin to think about having an appropriate commemoration of the hundredth anniversary of the union of the Presbyterian groups in the provinces of British North America to form the Presbyterian Church in Canada. Biographical studies of ministers and members of our church would be particularly welcome. It is interesting to note that the publication of the Ontario Human Rights Commission gave prominence in its March issue to the contribution made to Canadian life by George Brown. It reprinted part of the memorial address delivered in St. Andrew's Church, Sarnia, in 1880, and reported that a bronze medallion is being issued this year to mark the 150th anniversary of his birth. Through such men our church has contributed much to the shaping of Canadian life and thought. It is not too early to begin now to plan to make the year 1975 a memorable centennial for our church.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That Kirk-Sessions and Presbyteries be urged to exercise diligence in ensuring the preservation of church records and documents.
2. That congregations be invited to purchase sets of the three centennial publications, *A Short History of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, Enkindled by the Word*, and *The Face of the Church*, for presentation to their church or Church school libraries, and, where feasible, for the public libraries in their communities.

THE ARMED FORCES CHAPLAINCY COMMITTEE

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

Your Committee held one regular meeting during the past year.

One nomination was made for a vacancy in the Armed Forces — the Rev. D. S. Moore, B.A., B.D., B.Ed. Capt. Moore was regularly enrolled in the Forces and is now serving in Camp Borden, Ont.

Your Convener has attended the meetings of the Canadian Council of Churches Committee on the Chaplaincy in the Armed Forces. He also was able to attend the Annual Retreat for Chaplains held at Elgin House, Muskoka in June, 1967.

During the year two of the Armed Forces' chaplains retired: The Rev. Charles H. MacLean, C.D., Deputy Chaplain General (P) and Lt. Col. the Rev. J. M. Anderson M.C. with Bar, C.D. It is expected that Major J. D. L. Howson, C.D., will retire early in 1968. With the reduction in establishment of the forces it is not expected that there will be any further vacancies for some time.

The regular Remembrance Day Bulletin was prepared in November, 1967. Through the courtesy of a small group of friends the Presbyterian Record is sent to the Armed Forces Colleges in St. Jean, Que.; Kingston, Ont. and Victoria, B.C.

Your Committee sends out the Presbyterian Record to Chapels and Chaplains at Home and Overseas.

The following chaplains are serving full time: Capt. L. T. Barclay; Commander A. G. Faraday; Capt. W. J. Graham; Major J. D. L. Howson; Capt. W. J. O. Isaac; Lieut. (N) R. A. B. MacLean; Capt. D. S. Moore; Capt. I. Raeburn-Gibson; Major R. J. G. Ritchie; Major P. L. Sams; Capt. S. D. Self.

Part-time chaplains are B. K. Molloy, John Simms, M. S. McLean, B. A. Miles, G. G. Hastings, W. R. Allum, H. MacDonald, A. L. Mackay, W. C. MacBride, R. G. MacMillan, T. M. McKennell, D. R. McKillican, A. C. G. Muir, D. C. Wotherspoon, H. J. McAvoy, J. L. Self, E. P. Aikens, A. R. MacKay, J. S. McBride, A. O. MacLean, R. S. Johnston, W. W. MacNeill, L. D. Hankinson. These serve reserve units in the Navy, Army and Air Force.

During 1967 the sum of \$4,243.98 was received for the budget funds of the Presbyterian Church in Canada from the chapel offerings of Armed Forces Chapels. A contribution over and above budget offerings was also received towards the work at Kenora Fellowship Centre.

In order to keep the Armed Forces congregations informed of the missionary work of our Church copies of the General Board of Missions Annual Report "The Lively Acts" were sent to all chapels at home and overseas.

That this General Assembly assure the Chaplain-General (P) and all our ministers serving as Chaplains in the Armed Forces of our prayers for and our interest in their ministry.

REPORT OF THE RECORD COMMITTEE

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

Two requests were referred to The Record Committee by the last General Assembly.

The first was the proposal of the Rev. H. Lloyd Henderson "that The Record Committee be requested to study the question of supplying the Presbyterian Record to every home of The Presbyterian Church in Canada and in this study to consider advertising rates in relation to the increase of some 40,727 additional annual subscriptions."

Your committee has studied the matter carefully. While we would like to see The Record go into every home, we find that the cost to the General Assembly's budget would be approximately \$120,000 more than the present annual allocation. The Church has a number of priorities that must be met before a sum of this size could be considered.

Indications are that the advertising revenue would not increase substantially on a "give-away" magazine. It can also be argued that people place more value on a publication for which they pay, either as individuals or through their congregations.

The second proposal made on motion of the Rev. E. H. Bean was "that The Record Committee be asked to give consideration to a section in each issue, a page or less, which is directed especially to those who are connected with a congregation in only a most nominal way." The committee has given this careful consideration. The editor is working with the secretary of the Board of Evangelism and Social Action on some experimental material designed to serve this purpose.

The contract for printing and mailing expires this month, and your committee called for tenders from five reputable firms. The result is that the contract for the next two years has been renewed with General Printers Limited, Oshawa.

We are exploring the use of their computer to control subscriptions and print labels for our mailing list. By these means we hope to keep down the costs of distribution in future, and modernize our circulation department procedures. There is also the possibility of providing a coded mailing list for the Presbyterian church offices and for any congregations that may wish to take advantage of their own list of families.

The number of paid subscriptions at March 31, 1968, was 90,049, a decrease of 1,452 from the same date last year. A sub-committee has been working on promotion with the expectation of reaching out into the presbyteries with a presentation on the value of the Every Home Plan.

Clerks of presbyteries have graciously supplied the names of Record conveners so that we might follow up action on Recommendation 2 passed by the 93rd General Assembly. It puts the onus on conveners to present the plan to congregations and then report to this committee through presbytery. Fifteen conveners out of the 46 have reported in response to our query, only eleven of these indicated that they had taken some action in presbytery.

The failure of 31 presbyteries to take the recommendations of General Assembly seriously has led to the absence of any recommendations regarding promotion of The Record in this year's report.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That this General Assembly accept the statement as set forth in the body of this report as the answer to the suggestion of the Rev. H. L. Henderson.
 2. That this General Assembly accept the statement as set forth in the body of this report as the answer to the motion of the Rev. E. H. Bean.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE Re: RECOMMENDATION NO. 10 ADMINISTRATIVE COUNCIL, 1965

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

Your Special Committee on Vocation and Resources (Recommendation No. 10, Administrative Council, 1965) has held four meetings during the interval between the 93rd General Assembly and the present one. We regret having to report the loss by resignation of two members of the committee — Miss Agnes Roy and Mr. D. M. Morison — and would express our appreciation of their services during the first two years of the committee's existence.

The General Assembly of 1967 instructed this Special Committee to pursue its work "in consultation with" the Standing Committee on Recruitment and Vocation, and this we have done, with some interesting results and considerable profit to our-

selves. We are grateful indeed to Mr. Ferguson Barr and the members of his committee for their assistance, co-operation, and shared insights during the year.

We wish also gratefully to acknowledge the help given to us over the years by members of our committee by correspondence, several of whom have written from time to time as they have received copies of the minutes of our deliberations.

En Passant

In accordance with recommendations from this committee adopted by the 93rd General Assembly, we have devoted the year to a consideration of four major areas, as follows: (i) a study of the changing life of Canada and other nations ("within the limits of our competence"); (ii) a study of the vocation, work, and mission of the Presbyterian Church in Canada; (iii) a study of possible areas of discontent in the ministry; and (iv) a continued study of the results of our earlier survey of congregational life within the church. It will be appreciated, of course, that these areas of study are not rigidly self-contained, but that they impinge upon and influence one another, sometimes quite directly. Although we have tried to do our work and present our findings as they are pertinent to each distinctive area, in practice (or better, in discussion) we frequently found ourselves making points which apply to more than one of the designated topics.

In the course of the year, in connection with (ii) above (vocation, work and mission), we solicited essays on the general theme "The Vocation and Mission of the Church" from six persons — some of whom are members of the committee. It is perhaps a measure of our difficulty that we were able to obtain only two such papers, which, however, ultimately formed the ground-work of much of our subsequent deliberations in this area. Critiques of these papers were prepared by other members of the committee, and intensive consideration of the material followed.

The Massive Concern of the Church

In a related connection, our proposal to study "possible areas of discontent in the ministry" (project (iii) above) led to the discovery that the Standing Committee on Recruitment and Vocation already had the matter well in hand, and had formed a sub-committee for this express purpose. Your Special Committee has therefore proceeded no further along these lines of inquiry, having no wish to duplicate the work of an established committee. It was at about this time that our attention was called to the terms of reference given to the Committee on Recruitment and Vocation by the same General Assembly as appointed the Special Committee, viz.,

1. To assist the church with the task of enlisting the personnel required for pastoral and other ministries in church employment;
2. To share in ongoing research into the church's changing role in contemporary society as a basis for helping creative forms of ministry to emerge;
3. To be a channel for communicating the fruits of relevant research throughout the church;
4. To assist in providing resources for presbyteries and congregations in the task of helping each member to discern and respond to his or her vocation in Christ. (A. & P. 1965, pp. 378-9)

We quote this excerpt *in extenso* because of its similarity in general, and at certain points in detail, to our own terms of reference, and to report that this circumstance has brought the two committees into remarkably similar areas of concern.

In 1964 General Assembly's Standing Committee on Recruitment for Full-Time Service was granted an enlarged budget in recognition of the increasing importance of the work assigned to it. In 1965 the personnel of the same committee was reconstituted in accordance with its own recommendation (No. 5), its name changed to "Committee on Recruitment and Vocation", and its terms of reference widened, as above. In short, the present Standing Committee on Recruitment and Vocation has in recent years been upgraded and updated in accordance with the expanded fields of enquiry and responsibility assigned to it.

In 1965, the present Special Committee was appointed by the General Assembly in response to the 10th Recommendation of the Administrative Council, and equipped

with the broadest possible terms of reference—to study “the vocation, work, and mission of the Presbyterian Church in Canada and other nations, and study the resources of the Presbyterian Church in Canada in persons, finances, and institutions, and report . . .”

In 1966, an overture (No. 34) pleading for “long-range planning for research” with a view to “strengthening the spiritual vitality of the Church” was presented to the General Assembly by the Presbytery of Paris, and subsequently referred to this Special Committee.

In the closing weeks of 1966, Woods, Gordon, and Company of Montreal, Management Consultants, reported to the Board of Presbyterian College by whom they had been commissioned to make an “assessment of the problems involved in Ministerial Supply (Recruitment) for the Presbyterian Church in Canada”.

To this 94th General Assembly there will have come an overture from the Presbytery of Montreal which arose out of a careful and painstaking study of the Woods, Gordon Co. Report, and which embodies eleven distinct and comprehensive recommendations.

Finally, there has come to our attention a further document—a recommendation originating with the Board of Presbyterian College and arising in part (but only in part) out of the same deep concern as did the appointment of a firm of Management Consultants, and which asks for the establishment by this General Assembly of a “Special Committee of three . . . to study all aspects of the problem of ministerial supply . . .”

In documenting the evident solicitude of the several bodies within the church which have studied the question of vocation and recruitment, your committee wishes to make no immediate comment on the merits of the several solutions proposed. We do, however, regard the enactments of previous General Assemblies, the Presbytery of Paris, the Administrative Council, the Committee on Recruitment and Vocation, the Board of Presbyterian College, and the Presbytery of Montreal, taken together as indicative of a significant trend in the thinking of the whole Church.

If that be so, then we would respectfully submit the following observations:

1. That the concern of the Church in this area of its life and work is both deep and widespread. It may well prove to be No. 1 problem facing the Church in our time.
2. That there is good cause for the Church to consider and enact remedial measures calculated to restore to the whole Church (and its members) a sense of individual and corporate vocation.
3. There is inherent in the present situation a danger to the General Assembly of proliferating committees, boards, and/or secretariats—when so urgent a matter is seriously agitating the whole Church—resulting in possible failure to keep the single issue in proper perspective, and in a diffusion of effort and man-power.

The Changing Life of Canada

Your committee engaged in a wide-ranging discussion of the changing circumstances in which the church is situated in our day—much of it centering on the question of the nature of the church's relationship to society. We began our deliberations with reference to the action taken by the Emperor Constantine in adopting Christianity as the ‘official’ religion of the Roman Empire, thereby setting the pattern for all of western Europe. In the intervening centuries Christianity has enjoyed a favoured, protected, and even entrenched place in western society. In many quarters it is claimed that the days of the ‘constantinian era’ are over for the church, and that we now have entered what may properly be regarded as the ‘post-constantinian age’. As expressed by one member of the committee: “We are called to be disciples and apostles in the dying moments of an age. This age opened with the ‘adoption’ of Christianity as the official religion of the West. It is drawing to a close, as that adoption is dissolving”. And by another: “. . . many of the church's doctrines and practices were formulated and fixed in and for an age known as christendom when the church occupied a privileged, central, and unifying position in a homogenous and religious society—a period when the church had an established identification with the national and social structures and with the culture of the West, and when its main task was

one of ministering to the Christians”. It followed that, “the church was no longer a pilgrim and missionary people”; but “today the church is in a missionary situation everywhere”.

In our discussions it became apparent that there were varying degrees of emphasis and importance attached to the changes outlined above, but no rejection of the thesis that changes are, in fact, taking place. Nevertheless, the variation in views was quite marked. Some members of the committee feel strongly that the change in the relation of church to society has already taken place, and that the church has been lamentably slow in recognizing it and adjusting to it. Others are convinced that the present is a period of transition, and that though there are many residual evidences of society's protective attitude toward the church—exemption from taxation, exemption of the ministry from combat service, religious education in some schools, etc.—the full effects of the dis-establishment of the church are yet to come. A third point of view is represented by those who attach little importance to an analysis of the present situation in terms of the constantinian formula. For them, even its relevance is in doubt. “The church has lived and worked in many varieties of environment . . . and there have always been such cleavages (of opinion and attitudes) within the contemporary church”.

There can be little doubt that all three shades of opinion evident in the committee are reflected in our Presbyterian constituency—though in what proportion we do not know. If that be the case, it is reasonable to suppose that the task of the whole church is to allow and to assist, insofar as it is practicable, the various points of view to achieve their fullest expression of the life of the church. This means concretely, that structures of ministry, expressions of faith, language, and ways of thinking which have come to us from the past are not to be abandoned merely for that reason alone. All change is not necessarily reform. Yet neither should change and adaptation be stifled by unwarranted devotion and adherence to the things of the past. The church must be open and free for new ideas, methods, ministries, and service to mankind. The test of the church's life must not be antiquity, but contemporary relevance consistent with the faith of the New Testament.

It is apparent that the adherents of tradition, convention, and conservation in the life of the church are adequately provided for in the forms, concepts, and ministries presently authorized and in use. If therefore the protagonists of reform, progression and change are to be heard, our major thrust in the foreseeable future must concern itself with that which is new and contemporary in thought, word, and deed. That is to say that if there are substantial areas of the church and society for whom the church's conventional ministry is inadequate, then it is only common sense to experiment with new forms which give promise of gaining acceptance, while retaining for others those forms and expressions of the faith which have proved congenial and effective.

The two ministries which we have called ‘conventional’ and ‘experimental’ must exist side by side as equal partners. They must be prepared to assist one another where necessary; and they should be understood as mutually complementary rather than competitive.

Vocation and Personnel

Your committee has given a good deal of time and thought to the matter of ‘vocation’, because we are agreed that if a sense of Christian vocation can be restored to the whole body, and to its individual members, the answers to other problems might be more readily forthcoming. In this connection we have not been thinking primarily of Christian vocations such as ordained service, deaconess, missionary, and catechist, but of the wider concept—what it means to have been called to be a Christian in any walk of life. In short, what does it mean, corporately, to be “the people of God”, and what does it mean, individually, to be “a child of God?”. This question in its two-fold form did not confront the church as a matter of great urgency in earlier years because church membership and ‘Christian’ persuasion are all but taken for granted in a constantinian setting. In ‘christendom’ the church and society are seen to be virtually co-extensive. One ‘joins the church’ as naturally as he assumes the prerogative of citizenship. Accordingly, as the state includes many citizens who may never vote in

an election, serve the country in time of war, or be impanelled as a member of a jury, so the church includes many Christians who have never been genuinely involved in the Christian enterprise. A constantinian era has, in the nature of the case, proved to be a fertile breeding-ground for nominal Christians.

To paraphrase the words of a member of the committee who has put the matter bluntly: "There seems to be a primary need to recognize that the church which actually exists today has practically no awareness that it is the church at all The age known as christendom no longer exists — but the members of the existing church do not know that. We think of ourselves as "christians" — in the sense that we are "citizens of christendom", although we might not use that language to express it. We think of the church as the "clerical structure" appropriate to christendom, to which we relate ourselves."

Survey of Congregational Life

Your committee had hoped that its survey of the congregational life of our church would prove to be one of the most fruitful areas of our work, and that from it would emerge a new awareness of our "resources and our potential in persons and finances" and a new appreciation of "significant changes which are taking place in congregations". Unhappily, our expectations have not been fulfilled. The task force to which this work was committed laboured assiduously for the desired result, but a combination of circumstances made it impossible to achieve. The fact that fewer than 40 percentum of our congregations made any reply to the questionnaire doomed the enterprise in its early stages. At the time of reporting to the 93rd General Assembly we believed that a substantial number of replies would be received after the Assembly rose. But this was not the case. Further, the knowledgeable person who could collate and appraise the answers we did receive, and who had the necessary time to devote to it, could not be found. In addition, we discovered that to programme the available information for computer analysis would involve an expenditure prohibitive for the church.

General Conclusions

Your Special Committee found substantial agreement among its members in several areas of our discussion through the years. We are convinced of the importance to the present and future life of the church of the work assigned to us, and recommend that provision be made for its continuance. We believe that the church could only benefit from an on-going programme of research, much of it along the lines begun by this committee. But such investigation and inquiry should not be allowed to become fitful, spasmodic, or haphazard. Rather, it should be carefully programmed, properly staffed, and adequately financed. The work which this committee has done should neither be lost nor allowed to gather dust, but should be handed over to our successors in this field for further examination and review.

We have found, as indicated above, that there is widespread concern in the church for the recruitment of men and women to serve in its ranks. We do not believe 'recruitment' to be an isolated problem, standing by itself. The problem of recruitment is, so to speak, the place where the church's difficulties in the area of vocation come to the surface — where they become visible. Accordingly, to consider recruitment to be a mere matter of obtaining 'bodies' for the service of the church is akin to treating the symptom and neglecting the general malaise.

We are particularly concerned that deliberations and findings on the subject of the vocation and mission of the church (including recruitment) should not be confined to the committee level, but should be widely shared for participation by the whole church. In this connection we strongly suggest the publication and distribution of study-papers and working-papers as these may become available through the continuance of research; and that such papers be used as the basis for studies, conferences, retreats, etc., probably at the congregational, presbytery, and synod levels. Only in some such way is committee work likely to bear fruit among our constituency, and renew our self-awareness and self-understanding as the Church of Jesus Christ.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Your committee begs to make the following recommendations:

1. That the General Assembly make provision for the continuance of the work initiated by this Special Committee, and for the supply of adequate resources to pursue the task on the scale which it requires.
2. That, in view of the fact that the terms of reference of the General Assembly's Standing Committee on Recruitment and Vocation can be interpreted as substantially including the task assigned to this Special Committee, the studies and findings and proposals of this Special Committee be transmitted to the said Standing Committee, with a view to implementing Recommendation No. 1 of this report.
3. That the prayer of Overture No. 34 1966, re: Programs of Research, be granted in terms of Recommendations No. 1 and No. 2 of this report.
4. That the Coordinating Committee on Adult Education be asked to consider the possibility of publishing for group discussion, the documents produced for this Special Committee, — and the unused portion of the Budget for this Committee be made available for this purpose, including the money allocated for the congregational survey; it being understood that the authors (of the documents) have full editing rights, respectively.
5. That this Special Committee be now discharged.

REPORT OF THE CHURCH WORSHIP COMMITTEE

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

The members of the Church Worship Committee have been in correspondence on those matters of more immediate concern which have pertained to the Committee's responsibility during the past year.

Of first importance has been our relationship with the Sub-Committee on the Revision of The Book of Praise. While some of our members are on the Revision Committee, all have been kept in touch with the work of the Revision Committee, and have contributed their suggestions to it. These suggestions have been greatly appreciated and have been given careful and sympathetic consideration.

We recognize the magnitude of the Revision Committee's task, and are grateful for the solid progress which has been shown. We further recognize that, though much of the basic research has been done, the Committee's work still requires a substantial investment of time, talents, and resources before the job is brought to completion.

The 93rd General Assembly referred Overture 31 re a National Prayer (pp. 36 and 429-430, A. and P. 1966) to our Committee.

In reporting on this Overture, our Committee, while sympathetic with the Overture's desire to have a National Common Prayer, wonder how far it would be advisable for our Church to go in recommending the formulation and use of a Common Prayer and still preserve the demands of our basic Christology.

The second "whereas" acknowledges that Canada "is comprised of people of many origins, cultures, traditions, and religious faith"; and the prayer of the Overture while taking cognizance of our national diversity in terms of "race, colour, and creed", expresses the hope that the use of a Common Prayer might serve to unite us under God and make us all more conscious of our dependence upon Him.

We may agree that the attainment of national unity is a commendable aspiration. But your Committee fails to see how the use of a Common Prayer that would be broad enough to encompass and satisfy the claims of the wide variety of faiths and creedal

systems within our country—some of which are obviously deistic, humanistic, or merely ethical in character—would serve the purpose which the prayer of the Overture expresses. We believe that true unity, though having political, cultural, and religious connotations, is realizable only in and through the Son of God, Jesus Christ our Lord; and that any National Prayer which was not distinctively Christian in basis, or perhaps trinitarian in formula, would only be a vague insipid expression of some sort of noble-sounding, sentimental, platitude having to do with the brotherhood of man and the fatherhood of God.

Nevertheless, we are of the opinion that there is need for the adoption of a National Prayer to be used, as the Overture suggests, "by the Parliament, the Legislative Assembly, civic and elected bodies, organizations, associations, schools, churches, and indeed whenever or wherever people meet in a body or a group,"—provided that that National Prayer is basically Christian in form and spirit.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. In answer to Overture 31, we are therefore recommending that the Canadian Council of Churches be urged to prepare such a National Prayer in consultation with our brethren of the Roman Catholic Church; and that the Church Worship Committee report further on the matter to the next General Assembly.
2. Finally, on the matter of the expense allocation which this Committee shares with the Revision Committee, we recommend that the allocation be set at \$1,500 for this year.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STRUCTURE OF THEOLOGICAL EDUCATION

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

Three meetings of the Committee were held during the year. The first was a two day meeting at which a paper was read by the convener on The Church and its Ministry in Rapid Social Change. This was followed by discussion of the implications for theological education. The discussion focussed on practical theology and the importance of a proper grounding in the behavioural sciences including clinical training. The later meetings continued to focus on practical theology particularly with reference to the variety and complexity of the human problems the minister increasingly encounters in the contemporary world.

Attention was also focussed on the best ways in which to give the theological student practical experience in church administration and in meeting the variety of practical demands upon his resources in congregational life. Four possibilities are being explored, (1) an intern year as provided in a number of American seminaries.

between the second and third year of the theological course, (2) one summer of supervised work in a mission field in cooperation with Superintendents of Missions and Interim Moderators, (3) assistantships in city congregations and comparable work during the academic session, (4) a stated period (possibly one week) of intensive work in selected congregations under close supervision some time during the academic session for students of the second and third year of theology. During this time they would be excused from lectures.

The Committee has also begun an intensive study of the Educational Regulations adopted by the General Assembly of 1952 (A. & P. pp. 20-25) as presented in the report of the Board of Education of that year. The committee is of the opinion that these regulations require revision in certain important respects and hopes to present its findings to the Assembly of 1969.

The following is the report of the committee on the matters referred to it by the last General Assembly:

1. Overture No. 3 (Presbytery of Kootenay). The committee wishes to give further consideration to this overture and therefore submits a progress report.
2. Overture No. 4 (Presbytery of Bruce). (A. & P. 1967 pp. 25, 415) The committee reports in the following terms: (i) that the arrangement suggested in the preamble is impractical, (ii) that the quest for a new pattern of teaching is already under consideration by the Committee on the Structure of Theological Education, (iii) that the deferment of the appointment of new professors would make it impossible for the colleges to do the work assigned them by the General Assembly, (iv) that the prayer of the overture therefore be not granted.
3. Report of Special Committee re: recommendation No. 3, 1966, Presbyterian College, Montreal (A. & P. 1967 pp. 300-302 recommendation No. 1). In the judgment of the Committee on the Structure of Theological Education a study should be made of the whole procedure of the making and terminating of professorial appointments and that this study be made in the light of the practice of a number of large American theological seminaries; a conference to be held with the Special Committee as directed by Assembly, 1967.

RECOMMENDATIONS

The following recommendations are submitted:

1. That only one biblical language be required for the core curriculum in theology in Knox College and Presbyterian College.
As a background understanding of this recommendation the committee respectfully suggests to the College Senates the following, (i) that both biblical languages be retained for the B.D. degree, (ii) that one elective credit be given toward the B.D. degree for the tutorial class in the second biblical language as an incentive to core curriculum students to take the degree, (iii) that supplementary work be given in the biblical subject for which the corresponding language has not been taken — English Bible probably being the best suggestion for this purpose, (iv) that consideration be given to the privilege of three elective credits in one area for B.D. students to permit specialization and to appeal to students who enter theology already qualified in both languages.
2. That the General Assembly commend to the Senates of Knox College and Presbyterian College consideration of a field work programme in Practical Theology for students in second and third years, in which the student would be assigned to the care of a parish minister for a stated period (possibly one week) each year to observe his ministry within the congregation and community and that the Board of Ewart College consider a similar programme for its students.
3. That the grant of the committee be increased to \$1,000 for 1968-1969 to enable it to undertake a more extensive study of theological education.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

We are indebted to the department of National Missions, Church Extension and Synod Corporations for their valuable help from time to time.

THE ADMINISTRATIVE COUNCIL

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

The Administrative Council respectfully submits their report for the past year, June 1967 to June 1968.

Pursuant to resignation submitted, Dr. E. A. Thomson retired as Secretary of the Administrative Council on September 1st, 1967, and was succeeded by Dr. L. H. Fowler by appointment of Assembly. By direction of the General Assembly, 1967, Dr. Thomson was retained in a consultative capacity to the end of February, 1968. He continues in the service of the Church as Joint Clerk of Assembly. An appreciation of his life and work was placed in the Minutes of the 92nd General Assembly, and he has been honoured by his colleagues and the Council. A portion of the Council's Minute, from its meeting of April, 1968, concerning Dr. Thomson is as follows: "The Council . . . echo most heartily the sentiments expressed by the 92nd General Assembly (A. & P., 1966, pages 117 to 119), and would hereby record their gratitude to God for the fifty years and more our father and brother has given us and the fellowship of the Church."

The Walter Gow Memorial Building, 50 Wynford Drive, Don Mills, Ontario, which is our Church Offices, was officially opened by His Excellency, The Right Honourable Roland Michener, C.C., Governor-General of Canada, on November 30th, 1967. Her Excellency and members of the vice-regal staff were among those present in a distinguished company of guests. A copy of "Opening Ceremonies and Dedication" has been placed in the Archives of the Church.

For the records of this General Assembly it is noted that the Walter Gow Memorial Building was dedicated by the Reverend John Logan-Veneta, O.B.E., M.A., D.D., Moderator of the 93rd General Assembly. His Excellency was introduced by the Reverend G. D. Johnston, M.B.E., M.A., D.D., Moderator of the 92nd General Assembly. Words of appreciation were expressed by the Reverend E. A. Thomson, B.A., D.D., Joint Clerk of Assembly. The keys were presented to Dr. Logan-Veneta by Mr. P. B. Jackson, Builder, Mr. N. H. McMurrich, Architect, and the Rev. R. G. MacMillan, Chairman of the Building Committee. The welcome to representatives of the Church

and to neighbours was voiced by Mr. W. B. Cross, Chairman of the Administrative Council. The entire ceremony was recorded, and the tape has been placed in the Archives of the Church.

A Reception was held following the ceremonies. Their Excellencies presented us with a Karsh portrait of themselves which now graces Board Room No. 1 in the Offices.

For the records of this Assembly it is also noted that the erection of the building and the land on which it stands was made possible by a munificent bequest of the late Walter Gow, Esq., Q.C. The first sod was turned by the Reverend J. A. Munro, M.C., B.A., D.D., Moderator of the 91st General Assembly, on June 5th, 1965. The cornerstone was the gift of Mr. Kirk Entwisle and was laid by Miss Janet Gow and dedicated by Dr. Munro on April 12th, 1966.

Matters referred to the Council by previous Assemblies

(A) *Overture 14, Presbytery of London, 1967, re Taxation.*

The Report of the Council is as follows, it being noted that both the Overture and the Report have as immediate background the Province of Ontario:

Overture 14, Presbytery of London, 1967, re Taxation, was referred by the 93rd General Assembly to the Administrative Council for study and report to the 94th General Assembly. (A. & P., 1967, page 67.) The text of the Overture is found on page 420, A. & P., 1967.

The Overture states the concern of the Presbytery of London in the background within their bounds as to publicity on Church taxation. This publicity questions the good name and integrity of the Church. The prayer of the Overture is that the General Assembly "... initiate corporate action on the part of the Churches and other religious bodies concerned to bring about consultation with the competent Government Authorities with a view of studying the present regulations covering Property Taxation and all relevant exemptions. ..."

The Administrative Council desires to say that for some years it has had a Legal Affairs Committee, the major part of whose work has been in the field of taxation. A submission was made in 1963 to the Ontario Committee on Taxation, whose report, known generally as the Smith Report, was recently published. The submission of 1963 was made by the Inter-Church Committee on Legal Affairs, whose counsel at that time was an eminent lawyer. Our Legal Affairs Committee of that time assisted in the submission. Following the publication of the Smith Report, the Inter-Church Committee on Legal Affairs held two meetings, each meeting being attended by representatives from our Committee. The Anglican, Roman Catholic, United and Baptist Churches were also represented, and the Salvation Army.

The general purpose and work of the Inter-Church Committee on Legal Affairs answers in part the prayer of the Overture.

This Inter-Church Committee seeks to make clear that there are many misconceptions concerning taxation of Churches. Some of these are reflected in the body of the Overture. For example, it should be made clear that manses are taxed the same as other residences, that church buildings are taxed for local improvements, that property used for other purposes than worship or Christian Education is taxed, that many of the difficulties on taxation found in the United States are assumed to exist in Canada and do not exist, that the contributions of the Churches to society are vast and might be endangered if a new financial burden is imposed, that to tax Churches and not libraries and other tax-exempted sectors of the community life could be construed as discrimination, etc., etc.

Our own Legal Affairs Committee, which consists of Mr. Hamilton Cassels, Q.C., our own General Counsel, the Clerks of Assembly, the Treasurer and the Comptroller, are very well aware of the problems enunciated in the Overture, and are working upon the problems.

The Council recommends that this statement be an answer to Overture 14, 1967.

(B) *Overture 19, Presbytery of Ottawa, 1967, re Recommendations of Boards.*

The Council referred this to the Clerks of Assembly for report to the Council, with these terms of reference: "... for report in April as to putting the recommendations

of the Boards in the Index to Acts and Proceedings, and the possibility of placing the Index at the front of A. & P." The submission of the Clerks was approved by the Council, the text being:

The Clerks report that, at present, attention is called to all reports and recommendations by a notice on page 4 of A. & P., and those interested should have no trouble finding these by using the present Index. Placing the Index at the front of A. & P. would make, in the Clerks' view, an unnecessary break with a practice nearly 100 years old and would make awkward paging. (At present, pages 1 and onwards, as necessary, cover the introductory sheets and Minutes of Assembly, and the Appendices, which are reports, statistics, etc., begin at page 200.) Indexes are normally at the back of a book. If it is the wish of Council to have the Index increased in length by indexing each recommendation of a Board or Committee, of course it shall be done; but the Clerks do not think the extra cost of printing should be incurred.

The prayer of the Overture seeks to have these reports and recommendations more widely circulated. Re-arrangements and enlargements of A. & P. will not accomplish this; the Overture states that too few copies of A. & P. are in circulation. The prayer is, that the General Assembly "make available for all elders a compilation of all its Boards insofar as these concern Sessions".

The Clerks call attention to the fact that, beginning in 1967, a mimeographed condensation of all reports and recommendations in full was made available to commissioners at the opening of Assembly. This, on inquiry at Assembly, 1967, met with great approval. The Clerks suggest that sessions wishing copies of this mimeographed material apply, in writing, before the end of June and the Clerks' office will mail them out. We suggest that the number be limited to one-half of the membership of the Session. Postage is costly on this sort of thing.

The following recommendation of the Clerks is framed for the Council's report to Assembly, 1968, to be augmented orally when the report is presented:

"In answer to Overture 19, 1967, Presbytery of Ottawa, Re: Recommendations of Boards, the Council recommends that all sessions wishing copies of the condensation of reports of Boards and recommendations, as supplied to commissioners, apply in writing to the Clerks of Assembly before the end of June, in number not to exceed one-half of the membership of the session."

(C) *Overture 20, Presbytery of Hamilton, 1967, re Refugee Relief Donations.* On consultation, as directed by the 93rd General Assembly, between the Council and the Committee on Inter-Church Aid, Refugee and World Service, the following recommendation was approved, and is submitted to this General Assembly as the answer to the prayer of Overture 20, 1967:

"Since the response to the special appeal for support of the program of Inter-Church Aid normally exceeds the amount of the firm commitments made on behalf of the Church, it is recommended that no provision be made in the Authorized Expenditures but that in the unlikely event that givings fall short of these commitments then the matter be reconsidered at that time."

(D) *Overture 47, Presbytery of Saskatoon, 1967, re Commissioners' Expenses.* The Council approved the following as an answer to the prayer of the Overture, "An allowance of up to \$3.00 per person be allowed to commissioners subject to their attendance at the sederunts of the General Assembly, and that the total amount not exceed \$25.00 in all. The Committee recommends that this be reported to the 1968 General Assembly to become effective in 1969." (It is estimated that the maximum cost of this recommendation would be \$6,250 per annum.)

(E) *Overture 51 (unprinted), 1967, Presbytery of East Toronto, re Hospital Chaplains.* Following lengthy discussions and presentations, the Council (October, 1967) agreed that "the request for \$7,000 be declined".

(F) *Overture 14, Presbytery of Saskatoon, 1966, re Preparation and Publication of Book of Sermons.* The annual meeting of the Board of Evangelism and Social Action recommended that the book of sermons entitled "The Face of the Church", published by the Church History Committee of The Presbyterian Church in Canada for centennial year, be commended for the use of ruling elders who are called upon to lead a service of

worship. The Recommendation was approved by the Council and is presented to this Assembly as the answer to the prayer of Overture 14, 1966.

(G) *Re Stipend Increments.* The Council gave long consideration to the reference of Assembly, A. & P., 1967, page 77, "to study further the matter of increments and report to the 1968 General Assembly." The Council reports as follows, the text being taken from the Finance Committee's reports and duly approved by Council:

The 93rd General Assembly passed the following resolution (A. & P., page 77): "That increments be paid for the first years of service at the rate of \$200 commencing at the end of each of the first five years and \$100 at the end of the next four years, to a maximum of \$1,400, applicable to all ordained Missionaries, non-ordained General Board of Missions appointees overseas and all Ordained Ministers who are on the basic stipend and these increments be implemented in stages as the Administrative Council finds that the necessary funds are available, and the Administrative Council be requested to study further the matter of increments and report to the 1968 General Assembly."

There are two parts to this resolution, viz.:

- (i) The introduction in increments approved by the General Assembly;
- (ii) The further study of the matter of increments.

The Administrative Council is given authority to implement the stated increments in stages as the necessary funds are available. Your Committee recommends that the first step be to make effective April 1st, 1968 the increments applicable from the fourth year of completed service leaving in abeyance the increments in respect of the first three years. The following table sets forth the annual income which would then be received by all who are on the basic stipend schedule:

On this basis annual costs are estimated at \$14,300 for Home Missions personnel and \$55,600 for self-supporting charges which would probably need assistance, for a total of \$70,000. For 1968 (from April 1) the amount would be \$52,500. On the assumption that this proposal would be approved these two amounts have been included in the 1968 and 1969 budgets.

In informing the General Assembly of this action your Committee would recommend that the Assembly also be informed that the increment schedules which were in effect prior to June 1967 for Overseas and certain Home Missions personnel have been continued in effect and will be followed until such time as a schedule of increments in excess thereof is introduced.

Regarding the second part of the General Assembly resolution, viz., a study of increments, your Committee recommends that the Administrative Council report to the 94th General Assembly along the following lines:

In answer to the request for further study of increments the Administrative Council, in view of the fact that the increments already approved could only be partially introduced, requests a further year in which to study this matter so that the results of the partial introduction of the approved increments may be observed and assessed.

(H) *National Development Fund.* The Assembly of 1967 (see A. & P., 1967, page 108) directed the Council "to give directly or through its Executive both encouragement and ongoing oversight to the National Development Fund Committee." The Council believes it has met the direction of the 1967 Assembly.

The National Development Fund will report separately to this Assembly.

The Council, April 1968, gave approval to the following from the Report of the

National Development Fund for transmission by the Council to and approval by Assembly:

(a) Be it resolved, that in view of the fact that the N.D.F. campaign is incomplete, no recommendation be made to the 94th General Assembly regarding the allocation of the capital funds.

(b) Be it further resolved that the Trustee Board be authorized to invest on a short-term basis the funds available from time to time.

(c) Be it further resolved that this Council recommend to the 94th General Assembly that the income derived from the aforesaid investments be used to support the implementation of the increments to the basic stipend as approved by the 93rd General Assembly.

(d) Be it further resolved that this Council, in its Report to the 94th General Assembly, invite presbyteries, boards and committees to send in their recommendations for the utilization of the N.D.F. not later than December 1st, 1968, and any recommendations that have been received be acknowledged and referred to the Joint Committee of the Executive Committee of this Council and the Management Committee of the N.D.F. for consideration when preparing their recommendation regarding the allocation of capital funds to the Administrative Council in April, 1969.

(I) *Definition of the Term "Stipend".* The Assembly of 1967 (see A. & P., 1967, page 109) directed the Council "... to prepare a modern definition of the term 'stipend' ..." The Report of the Council on this is as follows:

The 93rd General Assembly requested the Administrative Council to "prepare a modern definition of the term 'stipend', taking into consideration the question of expenses currently acceptable in business practice and in relation to income tax procedures; in this taking into account also the understanding of congregations with respect to stipends, recognizing the relationship of this matter to recruitment and to the continuance of men in the active ministry and to report to the 94th General Assembly". This was referred to the Finance Committee for study and report.

Your Committee has reviewed the definition given by the Clerks of Assembly and feels it is satisfactory except that under "Other emoluments" (Item 15(f) of the Statistics Report furnished to the Clerks of Assembly) it could be specifically indicated that any house (manse) allowance paid to a minister who owns his own home or any rent paid for a manse should not be included. Otherwise some congregations will include these amounts and there will be an inconsistency between such congregations and those congregations which own their manse. Further it could be specified that where a congregation pays manse fuel, telephone, hydro, etc., direct rather than as an allowance to the minister that these items should be included as part of the "stipend".

There appears to be some thought that personal expenses of a minister should be treated in accordance with "currently acceptable business practice". There is, of course, no comparability between personal expenses and business expenses.

The suggestion is made that the definition of stipend has some "relationship to recruitment and to the continuance of men in the active ministry." Your Committee could not see this relationship. Admittedly the level of stipends may have a bearing on recruitment and continuance but the definition thereof could hardly do so.

Regarding the taxability of stipends (and particularly the various allowances included therein) your Committee suggests that any individual who may be in doubt in this matter be advised to consult with his local Income Tax office.

Your Committee recommends that the Administrative Council report to the General Assembly in accordance with the foregoing.

(J) *Recommendation 3, Committee on History, 1967.* (See A. & P., 1967, page 67). The matter of costs was issued, under authority of this Minute. The account of printing "The Face of the Church" was paid, \$1,672.25, the action was ratified by the Council, and it was noted that royalties on the sale of the book are accruing.

(K) *Letter to the Church from Chairman of the Council.* (See A. & P., 1967, page 61.) The letter was duly written and addressed to all congregations.

Other Matters

(L) *Pre-Assembly Congress.* Arising out of the Pre-Assembly Congress of 1967 it is recommended to this Assembly.

1. That a series of quadrennial congresses be planned for our Church, the next one to be in 1971 and the second in 1975 (the centennial year of The Presbyterian Church in Canada).

2. That Synods be encouraged to hold some sort of similar meetings in the intervening two year periods.

3. That in the event of a congress or series of congresses be approved, the Council appoint a Congress Planning Committee three years in advance of each congress.

(M) *Rental Allowance, Principal, Presbyterian College, Montreal.* References to this subject will be found in A. & P., 1966, pages 72 and 357. It is now recommended to Assembly that the amount of \$900 be approved for each of 1967 and 1968.

(N) *Salaries of Professors, Board Secretaries, et al.* Pursuant to direction of the 91st General Assembly, the Council gave consideration to this subject, and approved the following report of an ad hoc committee:

Your Committee recommends that:

(a) For those position where the salary includes a house allowance (\$1,800) the maximum (including house allowance) be increased as follows:

(b) For those positions where living accommodation is available and the salary does not include a house allowance, the maximum be increased as follows:

(c) For ordained ministers who are principals or professors in the theological colleges, the income tax allowance be increased from \$656 to \$710 per annum.

(d) The increases for principals (Knox and Presbyterian Colleges), professors, Board secretaries, assistant Board secretaries and the dean of St. Andrew's Hall be made effective:

- (i) \$500 on January 1st, 1969, and
- (ii) \$500 on January 1st, 1970, provided that the increments to basic stipends approved by the 93rd General Assembly shall have been fully implemented but, if not, then the increase shall only become effective on the date when such increments are fully implemented.

(e) For the principal and dean of Ewart College, \$400 and \$200, respectively, on July 1, 1968 and the remaining \$1,000 in accordance with the preceding item.

(f) Income tax allowance \$680 on January 1, 1969 and \$710 when the second \$500 salary increase becomes effective.

NOTE: No recommendations are made for the deans and librarians of Knox and Presbyterian Colleges, the dean of the Presbyterian Residence, Saskatoon, nor the lecturer at Ewart College, since salaries for these positions are determined by their respective Boards.

It is estimated that the foregoing recommendations, if approved, would require \$16,266 for 1969.

Your Committee notes that there is a General Assembly Committee studying the

matter of salary parity between professors and Board secretaries and that its report, if adopted by General Assembly, may have some bearing on this matter of salaries.

(O) *Salary Progression for Professors and Board Secretaries.* The Administrative Council, October 1966, directed its Office and Property Committee to study and report to Council concerning a sliding scale of income for general secretaries and professors. The Report of the Committee was subsequently approved in the following terms:

The Administrative Council, at its meeting in October 1966 (Minutes, page 11), "agreed that the Office and Property Committee be asked to study and report to the Council on a sliding scale for the category of secretary in which are included general secretaries and professors of colleges".

Your Committee recommends the following progression schedules which, subject to approval by General Assembly, should then be effective with all new appointments after September 1st, 1968.

If there is any change in the approved maximum salaries then the progression schedules would require to be altered accordingly.

In some cases it may be necessary to make appointments at other than the starting rate and for these your Committee recommends as follows:

(a) For professors, that new appointees who have professorial experience be given credit to the next higher rate according to their years of experience and that pastors appointed as professors be given a starting income at the next rate above their pastor's income, e.g., a pastor receiving \$8,500 per annum and manse allowance would receive a starting rate of \$8,800 plus income tax allowance.

(b) For Board secretaries and assistants, that if it is proposed to start a new appointee at a higher rate than the indicated starting rate, the suggested salary be referred to the Office and Property Committee for consideration prior to recommendation to the Administrative Council.

Your Committee notes that a General Assembly Committee is studying the matter of classification of professors, associates, assistants and lecturers in our theological colleges.

(P) *Tax Allowance for Professors.* At the 1964 General Assembly provision was made to offset the favourable tax allowances held by pastors and secretaries as against professors, and an amount of \$656 was provided for each professor for 1967. As this was intended to be a continuing amount, the Council now recommends to Assembly that the tax allowance be applied to years subsequent to 1967 until changed by General Assembly.

(Q) *Guide to Council Functioning.* Following a suggestion from the Board of Ewart College, the Council has directed its Secretary to prepare a Guide for Council members, old and new, by way of introduction to the Council and its functioning within the administration of the Church. It is expected that the Guide will be ready (a mimeographed document) for the first meeting of the Council Executive of the autumn. This Report is presented to the Assembly for information.

(R) *Amendments to the Constitution of the Administrative Council.* Amendments to the Constitution, arising out of the year's work of the Council, will be presented in the Recommendations closing this Report, and will receive Notices of Motion.

(S) *Lending Fund Committee: Report and Amendment of Regulations.* The Lending Fund Committee will report separately to Assembly, but at its request the Council presents the following:

(1) The Lending Fund Committee made an analysis of the Fund and presented to Council statistics concerning loans in default. The situation is extremely serious. The Committee asks that the situation be brought to the attention of all Presbyteries, and to advise them:

(i) Before approving an application for a loan to examine carefully the situation of the congregation and its capacity to meet the commitments which it is making in regard to the payment of all its loans, in this estimation giving consideration to a realistic estimate of growth in the congregation.

(ii) Before requesting the Lending Fund Committee to grant a moratorium on principal payments and an extension of the interest free period to explore all possible ways of assisting the congregation to meet its commitments.

(iii) Where a congregation is in default in its loan payments to endeavour to find ways and means of assisting the congregation and encourage it to make payments on its loans.

(2) Co-operative Building Projects. Arising out of the desire of one congregation in the Presbytery for a co-operative building project, the Lending Fund Committee, to clear the way for this, and possibly other similar actions, recommends, with approval of Council, the following amendment of the Lending Fund Regulations as printed in A. & P., 1964, pages 462 to 465:

(Adding) Paragraph 8 (c),

"Notwithstanding the provisions of sub-paragraph (a) and (b) of this paragraph 8, where a congregation is engaged in a joint building programme with another denomination or other denominations, a loan from the Fund may be made to or on behalf of the congregation and shall be secured by such mortgage, debenture or other security in favour of The Trustee Board of The Presbyterian Church in Canada as is considered satisfactory by The Trustee Board."

This will receive a Notice of Motion.

(T) *The Trustee Board.* The Council has approved the recommendation of The Trustee Board that the Rev. H. G. Lowry, M.A., D.D., of Burlington, Ontario, be appointed a member of The Trustee Board to the vacancy created by the resignation of the Rev. William Barclay, D.D.

(U) *The Pension Board.* Council gave approval to an improved plan of Group Insurance for ministers and recommends to Assembly that it be made effective from July 1st, 1968, that the increased cost of the plan for the six months period from July 1st, 1968 to December 31st, 1968, estimated at \$3,162.00, be paid by the Church, and that commencing January 1st, 1969, half the added cost be absorbed by the Church and half paid by the ministers.

(V) *Authorized Expenditures, 1968 and 1969.* In the table following are set forth the estimated income for 1968 and for 1969 and the authorized expenditures to Boards, etc., for 1968 and 1969, as recommended to this Assembly by the Administrative Council.

THE BOARD OF STEWARDSHIP AND BUDGET

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

The two million dollar Budget barrier has been breached finally. The 1967 Budget Revenue figure was \$2,035,502, an increase of \$73,135 (3.7%). This new record does not include the 1967 offerings for Inter-Church Aid, Refugee and World Service. This fact is considered in computing the 1967 increase, but must be kept in mind in making comparisons with the performance of previous years.

Gratifying as the 1967 increase was, there can be no resting on the record. Reaching the two-million height has only put us in sight of greater heights to be reached. The annual expenditures are at the \$2,300,000 level, and will be increasing. There can hardly be satisfaction with the situation when the gifts of living donors are so far short of meeting the annual operating costs. We are not suggesting any change in the total target for 1969 which is \$2,500,000, nor in the allocation scale, but we hope that an increased number of congregations will set their own objectives at a higher figure than the Suggested Allocation in order to make up for those who cannot yet meet this minimum standard.

Impact of National Development Fund on Budget Support

There is anxiety in some regions that the National Development Fund will cut into Budget giving during the next four or five years. It is too soon of course to say that such anxiety is hallucinatory, but where congregations have resolutely promoted the National Development Fund along with the Budget and local needs, the commitments have indicated that the National Development Fund will not cut into Budget giving. In fact there is enough experience to warrant the claim that if the National Development Fund seems to interfere with Budget support it will indicate that the congregational leadership has been lax in its responsibility for promoting both the Budget and the National Development Fund.

Comment on Statistical Report

- 39 Presbyteries had a dollar increase over 1966
- 22 of these had increases in 1966
- Of the 9 Presbyteries showing a decrease in 1967 only one had also shown a decrease in 1966.
- The per-member rate for the whole Church for Budget giving was \$10.28, an increase of 38c. The per-member rate for all purposes was \$79.26, an increase of \$6.30. Again as in 1966 there was a decrease in membership which accounts for about one-third of the per-member rate increase for the Budget and about 14% of the per-member rate increase for all purposes.
- The amount given to the Budget was 12.9% of the amount raised for all purposes, compared with 18.7% in 1966.
- 23 Presbyteries were above the national average per-member rate for the Budget and 27 were above the per-member rate for All Purposes.
- Four Synods were above the per-member rate for both Budget and All Purposes. In two of these all Presbyteries were above the whole Church average. If the whole Church could come up to the Synod of Saskatchewan giving rate for all purposes, an extra \$6,000,000 would be raised in one year, i.e. one-half million more than the National Development Fund objective.

A Hidden Weakness

What Presbytery and congregational totals do not reveal is the large percentage of our membership which, as far as Church support goes, is "hiding in the weeds". Recently we were shown the giving profile of a congregation whose record for both Assembly Budget and All Purposes is well above the national average. However, the profile showed that 68% of the total came from 20% of the envelope users. 21½% came from another 20% of envelope users. The remaining 11½% of the total came from 60% of envelope users. Undoubtedly in the 60% group, there are some

generous persons who can't afford to give more, and there are undoubtedly some grudging givers amongst the higher rate 40% group, but the ratio of low to high indicates a cancerous parasitism that is eroding the Christian witness of that congregation in its community.

The problem is not financial poverty, but a myopia about possessions and their use.

The generous man and the avaricious man both have things, but there is a difference in their "having". The former has his wealth as a trustee. The latter has his wealth as a possessor. The difference is in attitude. "We are all wealthy enough to be generous." (II Cor. 9:11) and we are all tempted to avarice. Which it will be with each of us depends on moral decision.

In the Christian community we are obligated to help one another "bear one another's burdens and so fulfill the law of Christ". At times this "helping" may mean giving. At other times it means encouraging others to give in order that they may grow. For example, Jesus did not hesitate to make a radical demand on the rich young Ruler for he saw how deep rooted was the avarice in that person's life.

Congregational leaders must not be satisfied with totals and averages. They owe it to their brethren to get personal, for it is persons who matter, not finances.

Monthly Reporting System

Some twenty-nine Presbyterian congregations along with a number of Anglican and United Church congregations are experimenting with a Monthly Reporting System in place of the system of sending our quarterly statements of members' giving. With the Monthly Reporting System it is recommended that along with the statement of donations there be included a brief achievement report from the Board; a letter from a congregational leader, occasionally but not always the minister; and perhaps a pamphlet or brochure about the national or overseas work of the Church. Of course it means more work, but not much more, and it will not be useless work as is the case now with the perfunctory quarterly system. Details about the Monthly Reporting System can be secured from the Board of Stewardship and Budget or by writing direct to Comondor Forms Ltd., 1841 Greene Avenue, Westmount, Quebec.

Conveners' Conference

In order to give Presbytery and Synod Conveners a refresher course in the "why" and "how" of their task, a conference for all conveners was held in February 1968, in conjunction with the Board meeting. All but five presbyteries were represented at what turned out to be a helpful and inspiring experience.

The conference speaker was Dr. Nordan Murphy, Executive Secretary of the Stewardship and Benevolence Section of the National Council of Churches, U.S.A. Dr. Murphy emphasized the need for Church people to get free from the misguided notion that stewardship is concerned only with money, and only with money for the Church. He urged the importance of developing a sense of responsibility in the use of all the resources of God's creation by and for all God's people.

A major part of the conference agenda was devoted to small group discussion about methods and resources that are effective for education and motivation in Christian discipleship. Because the convener in our Presbyterian system is the key-man for Budget promotion, and for guiding congregational leaders, the Board believes that orientation and training conferences for conveners should be arranged at suitable intervals — perhaps every three years.

The Board is grateful to the Administrative Council for a financial grant toward the cost of the Conference, and to a number of presbyteries which contributed to a travel equalization pool.

Partnership Program

For the sixth year of the Partnership Program, the study theme is "Changing Times Demand Responsible Stewardship". The emphasis is being placed on the word "responsible". At no time of course is the Christian person allowed to be irresponsible, but in times of upheaval there is a strong temptation to try to play safe,

which amounts to an abdication of responsibility. The Bible studies selected for the 1968-69 theme show that playing safe in changing times is highly irresponsible.

Hardly used at all in 1967 because they were late in appearing, is a set of three training filmstrips designed to assist even inexperienced leaders in carrying out a full-scale every person visitation program.

Budget Promotion Materials

The weekly bulletin blanks continue to be the major medium for giving capsule comments on various aspects of the Church program. The circulation of these is approximately 65,000 per week of which 9,000 copies are supplied free to aid-receiving charges. We would urge congregations which have their own bulletins to select occasional numbers from our samples to use for Budget promotion letters or as agenda-forms for group meetings.

Pamphlets on stewardship to the number of 201,000 were printed and distributed in 1967. Reprints of many as well as some new ones will be sampled in the late summer.

In co-operation with the representatives of the Boards who comprise the Committee on Co-ordination of Adult Education we have participated in producing a Program Planning calendar. The second edition of this booklet will be available in time for planning a balanced program for the 1968-69 season. A section in the booklet will contain a catalogue of resource materials — pamphlets, study books, audio-visuals — for all groups in the Church.

The '67 Congress

Our Board is grateful for the '67 Congress which gathered a cross section of Presbyterians for a four day experience of worship and study at Queen's University in June 1967, and then sent them home to share their insights, and enthusiasm for the task which Christ has given to His people. We are aware that interested people are more important than books, pamphlets and films, for challenging Church members to faithful stewardship. We believe that the '67 Congress has already stirred in our Church a spirit of confidence to meet the challenges of our day, and we expect that this spirit will spread and bear fruit for years to come.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That the thanks of the Assembly be recorded for the ministers, congregational leaders, and presbytery conveners, whose diligent work has encouraged our people to a new record of Budget support in the year 1967.
2. That the Assembly commend to Sessions and Boards of Managers the Monthly Reporting System as a means of keeping the membership better informed about the use of the money being received each week.
3. That Sessions be urged to see that every member is confronted with the opportunity to renew his financial commitment to the Church, whether by an Every Person Visitation or otherwise.
4. That the Partnership Program materials on the theme "Changing Times Demand Responsible Stewardship" be approved and commended for use in stewardship education and in promotion of the General Assembly Budget.
5. That the Assembly approve a Budget Objective of \$2,500,000 for 1969.
6. That the Stewardship and Budget Board be authorized to prepare allocations to Synods on the basis of the approved 1969 objective, and that the data used to compute Synod Allocations be supplied to the Presbyteries as Suggested Allocations for guidance in making congregational allocations.
7. That Synods be requested to allocate to Presbyteries the total amount of their respective allocations, and that Presbyteries be requested to allocate similarly to congregations, so that the total challenge of the Assembly's objective may be fairly presented to the Church.
8. That Sessions be requested to assure that Suggested 1969 Budget Allocations as

received from the Presbytery be included in the study of the congregational budget for the coming year.

9. That Sessions be requested to report to Presbytery Stewardship and Budget Conveners the Accepted Allocation for the Budget after the congregational meetings.
 10. That Sessions be urged to secure support for the Suggested Allocation; that congregations which are now giving more than the Suggested Allocation, be encouraged to set their own allocation at a figure which calls for an increase; and that congregations which have not yet been able to reach the suggested Allocation be asked to aim at at least a 10% increase.
 11. That the Assembly commend to Presbyteries the Board's proposal for pulpit exchanges within the bounds, for the purpose of discussing the general work of the Church, at Presbytery, Synod and Assembly levels.
 12. That the Assembly express thanks to the Canadian Council of Churches Stewardship Committee for the help received in preparation of promotional materials.

THE JARDINE MEMORIAL FUND

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

THE DR. EPHRAIM SCOTT BENEVOLENT FUND

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

This Fund, established under the Will of the late Dr. Ephraim Scott, Moderator of the 1925 Assembly and Editor of *The Presbyterian Record*, came into being in 1932. Several bequests have augmented the capital, and a statement of receipts and expenditures will be found in the Auditors' Reports.

The terms of the Trust are, "To be used to relieve cases of distress and misfortune happening to ministers of The Presbyterian Church in Canada or their families through ill-health or misfortunes, especially in cases where the amounts available from other funds of the said Church are insufficient to provide adequate relief, or are not available."

The Administrative Council administers the Fund through its Committee on Benevolences. Amounts are paid monthly to several beneficiaries, and letters of appreciation bear witness to the need that is met and the gratitude of the recipients.

In adopting this Report Assembly also gives thanks for the generosity of Dr. Scott and others whose bequests have made possible a continuing thought and action for the needy.

THE AUDIO-VISUAL COMMITTEE

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

Your committee, with quiet efficiency, serves every area of our Church, making available tools and materials for the communication of the Word and the work. Within the limits of our budget we have tried to keep up-to-date with materials and with methods of communicating that might help to stimulate our people to response and action. We are encouraged by the comments submitted to us that indicate that the library materials are being used seriously as sources of stimulation leading to discussion and raising the question "What Should We Be Doing?".

LIBRARY SERVICES

A number of new films and filmstrips have been added to our library by various Boards and Committees. "The Long March", "To Children With Love", "The Parable" are films that are in much demand. Filmstrips for training purposes and others for use in Church School and Missionary Curricula are kept up-to-date.

PRODUCTION SERVICES

The Boards and Committees of our Church have cooperated in the production of a new filmstrip — "Speaking to People". This production is designed to stimulate and challenge our people in the mission responsibility that faces the Church in the changing conditions of the day. We commend this filmstrip for use in adult groups where they can discuss its message in relationship to their own situation.

PRODUCTION SERVICES

Tape Recordings

A new venture in communication in this past year was the making available of major addresses by tape recordings. Many congregations and Church groups enjoyed the full impact of the Pre-Assembly Congress through the use of tapes. Almost 200 tapes of these addresses and Bible Studies were sold and another 100 tapes were sent out on a rental basis. Tapes of the Presbyterian Men's Conference have also been widely used. As the opportunities present themselves we will make available the major addresses and messages from significant events.

BROADCASTING

We were asked to reply to Overture No. 29 on pages 428-429 of the Acts and Proceedings of the 93rd General Assembly. This Overture presented by the Presbytery of Huron-Maitland asked that the Presbyterian Church in Canada make provision for a ministry by radio or television which could be recognized as a national voice and official witness of our Church. Your committee has studied this question seriously and in the past has made similar recommendations to the General Assembly. The latest presentation had been made in 1965 when a detailed plan was presented to the General Assembly. Having taken another look at the suggestion of a national broadcast and having conferred with knowledgeable men in the broadcasting industry we have been forced to recognize that there are changing conditions that alter the effectiveness of such a witness. Fewer and fewer stations are prepared to engage religious broadcasting and those who do relegate such programs to the poorest spots in the time schedule. Experience has proven that religion is the fastest audience loser that is known and the traditional devotional and preaching programs are recognized as the greatest offenders.

We believe that local groups using imaginative programming for short time periods (2-5 minutes) is the most effective form of witness our Church can present to the nation. Our committee is ready to offer suggestions.

RECOMMENDATION

We, therefore, recommend that the Presbyterian Church in Canada do not, at this time, prepare and present a national broadcast but that we encourage congregations or presbyteries to find the most effective means to make their witness felt in their local situation, and that this be the reply to Overture 29/67.

REPORT OF THE PENSION BOARD

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

During the past year, two meetings of the Pension Board have been held — in November 1967 and April 1968. As a result of the recommendations in the Supplementary Report to the 93rd General Assembly, it will be necessary for the Actuary to recalculate Ministers' Rates and Widows' and Orphans' Rates to provide for the benefits at Age 68 rather than Age 70. These new rates would be used for any new entrants. The Board approved the suggestion that the new rates be used for those wishing to purchase additional pensions of \$250.00 without a 10% addition as in the past but that, where a Minister purchases additional pension, he should pay both Minister's Rate and the Widow's Rate in order that the additional pension would provide the same benefits as the normal pensions, that is, \$250.00 to the Minister with an Annuity to his widow of \$125.00.

At the same time, it was agreed that we should urge Ministers where possible to purchase additional pension on their own behalf. Any further amounts paid by them will be deductible from their Taxable Income in calculating their Income Tax in the same manner as their present contributions to the pension and their Canada Pension Plan contributions. There have been suggestions at different times that we should ask the Minister to contribute 5% of his stipend. This change which has been suggested on many occasions would not be reasonable with a plan such as our present plan which provides the same pension for every person, regardless of income but the Minister has control of this himself and if he is able, he should make the additional contributions and purchase additional pension.

There have been a number of Overtures which were submitted to the 93rd General Assembly and other requests have been received directly from Synods that we reduce the 40 years' service now that we have reduced the Retirement Age from 70 to 68 and should aim at 35 years' service at Age 65. These overtures were discussed thoroughly in the Pension Board and it is not possible to make this type of change at the present time because all of our surplus was used to increase pensions and reduce the Retirement Age last year. A reduction in the number of years of service would require a higher pension for each year of service which would be equivalent to an increase in pension. Normal pensions in the normal work span in most organizations are related to 40 years of service.

What we should strive for is to reduce the age of retirement further as surplus is available. The recommendation last year provided for earlier retirement with a reduced pension between Ages 65 and 68.

The Pension Board recommended that Presbyteries should not consider cancellation of arrears of Pension Fund payments by congregations in the future but that they should request rather than cancellation, that provided the congregation undertakes to pay current contributions, they should be granted a moratorium of a suitable length of time up to five years with no interest. At the end of that time, the outstanding payments to the Pension Fund should become a debt of that congregation. A letter was sent to Presbyteries asking them to deal with unpaid congregational rates in this manner in the future.

At the same time the letter to Presbyteries urged them to take steps to persuade any Minister not now a member of the Pension Fund to join immediately and it was pointed out to them that when a Minister joins he pays rates according to his attained age but his years of service count while an active Minister of the Church as if he had been a member since Ordination and induction.

The Pension Board urges that the recommendation of the Administrative Council for increased Group protection be approved.

The 93rd General Assembly asked that the Pension Board report to the 94th General Assembly on ramifications of allowing additional pension for service after normal retirement and the possibility of continuing to the widow of the pensioner the full pension for one year after the death of the pensioner. The Actuary advises that he could not judge the cost of changes such as these until the next valuation of the Pension Fund and the matter will be investigated at that time.

The financial statement, included with the Auditors' Report for the 12 months of 1967, shows an excess of Revenue over Expenditure of \$379,000.00. This is almost \$100,000 less than the previous year, mainly due to the fact that 1966 included a substantial bequest.

In the statement of capital, the depreciation of investments is much smaller than that reflected in last year's statement due to a change in the market value of the assets. The large cash balance was provided in order to have funds available for the purchase of the increased pension approved at the 93rd General Assembly for those on pension, commencing January 1st, 1968, and will be reflected in next year's statement.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That Presbyteries review the position within their presbytery of Ministers who have not joined the Fund.

2. That the increase in the amount of the Group Insurance protection as recommended by the Administrative Council be approved.
3. That our participation in the Church Pension Conference be continued.
4. That the Pension Board be empowered to continue to solicit gifts and bequests to increase the assets of the Pension Fund and for additional funds for the Pension Assistance Fund.
5. That an amount up to \$25,000.00 be appropriated to cover this year's expenses of the Pension Board, including postage, printing and salary of the Clerk-Stenographer in the Church Offices and the administration fees of the Segregated Fund in the hands of the Canada Life Assurance Company from January 1st, 1967 to December 31st, 1967.
6. That the continuing members of the Executive of the Board after the appointment of General Assembly constitute the Executive until the Fall meeting of the Board.
7. That this General Assembly express its most grateful appreciation and sincere thanks to Professor Norris E. Sheppard, M.A., F.I.A., F.C.I.A., our Actuary, who continues to render such dedicated voluntary professional service to our Pension Board and our Church.
8. That this General Assembly approve the comity agreement with the Church of Scotland.

**REPORT OF THE CLERKS OF ASSEMBLY RE OVERTURE 2,
PRESBYTERY OF BRANDON, 1967
RE REVISION OF THE BOOK OF FORMS**

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

Overture 2, 1967, Presbytery of Brandon, prays the General Assembly to establish a special committee with instructions to complete a revision of the Book of Forms within the next three years. In the body of the Overture it is stated that, in the opinion of the Presbytery, methods of procedure in the present book are unnecessarily complex, that terms are archaic, and that a revision is greatly needed.

In order to do justice to the Overture, the Clerks have been in touch with the father of this Overture and are grateful for amplification upon what has been in his mind.

In the year 1959 Dr. L. H. Fowler obtained permission from Assembly to undertake a codification of certain legislation with a comprehensive index of Acts and Proceedings from 1925 onwards, to be furnished to Clerks of Synods and Presbyteries for their guidance. A report on this will be found in A. & P., 1959, page 260. It was thought that a study of Acts and Proceedings would indicate what should be done, if anything, with the Book of Forms itself in order to relate it to some of the thinking indicated in this Overture. The Report of 1959 is an illustration of desire out-running performance, for the pressure of time has been such that Dr. Fowler has been able only to make the merest beginning of a start upon this work.

It has also been in the minds of the Clerks that there should be prepared for the Church a text book of the background of the Canon Law of the Church, and with it a commentary, section by section, as based upon the hundreds of interpretations and rulings the Clerks have given in the last fifteen years. To their knowledge, there is no such text available within the Reformed Church family, and such is greatly needed. The writing of such a text would take a minimum of a year's full time, and it is not believed that the Church would be willing to underwrite the cost. These facts are mentioned that the Presbytery of Brandon and the Church itself should understand that the Clerks are aware of the problems emerging within this Overture.

A reading of the Preface to our present Book of Forms, a preface written by the late Dr. T. Wardlaw Taylor, would indicate that our present book took a period of seven years for its revision. The Clerks have consulted the Minutes of the period, 1925 to 1932, and have seen that the amendments as presented there under the Barrier Act aroused great opposition throughout the Presbyteries. In fact, at one time, Dr. Taylor, overwhelmed with the type of opposition that he was meeting, presented his resignation to the Assembly. The present Clerks would be hopeful that a revision today, not in the immediate background of the injustices suffered in 1925, would meet with a more ready acceptance throughout the Presbyteries, but it is certain that much opposition would be encountered.

The question should be raised: is a complete revision necessary, or how much revision is necessary?

The Clerks submit that at the present time our procedure is really workable. References are made to the Clerks for rulings, and they are quickly given. The Clerks have established a policy of replying to Overtures and other references in full detail that a body of opinion might be found in the Acts and Proceedings of Assemblies. The answer to this Overture 2, 1967, is in itself an example of what is meant. All in all, despite the allegation that some things are unnecessarily complicated, the methods have received general acceptance. Those who are acquainted with procedures in civil law, and the work of civil lawyers, will find (we think) that the work of the canon lawyers of the Church does not suffer badly in comparison.

It is admitted that some terms are archaic. Yet is it too much to ask presbyters and members of the Church to acquaint themselves with a particular terminology? If they are sport fans, they do this for their sport. Many terms that could be considered archaic have been defined within the procedure of the Church, and in that respect are something like terms used in marine and other types of insurance. Substituting new

explanations for these may lead, indeed, to many difficulties. For example, we use the phrase *pro re nata* for a certain type of Presbytery meeting. This is from the Latin, and means "concerning the things that are born." Would a word like "emergency" suffice? This says too much. It is much easier to learn the specific meaning of the phrase and keep the phrase.

Another factor the Clerks desire to mention is that of cost. They desire to keep the Book of Forms within a price range that will make it acceptable to ruling elders. The re-casting of the book would be very costly. If the Church wishes this, of course it will be done. But the cost of doing so, the time involved, the sending of it down under the Barrier Act make a major task upon which we must give much deliberation. It cannot be done in three years.

The Clerks, in partial answer to this Overture, are planning a page of definitions concerning the Latin and other terms used in the Book of Forms, to be included with the next printing. This is done in the Church of Scotland under the title "Glossary", but the Church of Scotland, due to its longer history and its involvement with civil law, uses many more terms than we do. Nevertheless, the Clerks believe this would be of value to the Church and would add very little to the cost of printing.

In addition to this written Report, the Clerks, upon request at Assembly, 1968, will give oral amplification upon some of the matters that emerge from Overture 2, 1967.

**REPORT OF THE CLERKS OF ASSEMBLY RE OVERTURE 9,
RE HANDLING OFFERINGS
SYNOD OF MONTREAL AND OTTAWA, A. & P. G.A., 1967, PAGE 417**

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

Section 162 of the Book of Forms reads in part as follows: "It is required that all offerings, whether for general revenue or missions, be counted and recorded before being removed from the Church". The Kirk-Session of St. John's Church, Cornwall, Ontario, discovered as a result of a visitation of one presbytery of the Church that only one congregation of that presbytery "handle Sunday offerings of the people according to the Book of Forms, Section 162, Paragraph 2, page 40". The Kirk-Session of St. John's Cornwall requested the Presbytery of the bounds to study the situation. Apparently the presbytery took the matter to the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa, who, in turn, presented the above-indicated overture to the 93rd General Assembly praying that a study of the situation be made to ascertain whether disregard of this law is prevalent across the Church and, if so, it prays "the General Assembly to amend or delete Section 162, Paragraph 2 of the Book of Forms."

A review of the whole Church has not been made but from observation the Clerks are of the opinion that this regulation is widely observed especially in the larger congregations. The Clerks believe that it is a good regulation, well designed, and that it should not be amended or deleted. It is the duty of Presbyteries to see that the regulation is enforced within their bounds.

The Clerks therefore recommend that this be the answer to the Overture.

**REPORT OF THE CLERKS OF ASSEMBLY RE OVERTURE 46,
RE ELDERS' RIGHTS WHILE SERVING AS CATECHISTS
PRESBYTERY OF WINNIPEG, A. & P. G.A., 1967, PAGE 431**

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

Book of Forms, Section 278(5) excludes ministers whose names are on the Appendices of the Rolls of Presbyteries and who are not acting elders in congregations from being commissioners to Assemblies and it further states: "Nor shall men under appointment of the Board of Missions be eligible for eldership in the congregation they have been thus appointed to serve. This rule automatically excludes such persons from eligibility as commissioners to the General Assembly."

The prayer of the Overture is "that when an active elder in one congregation is employed as a catechist in another congregation or charge, he be not deprived of his rights as an active elder to represent his brethren in the higher courts of the Church when so commissioned".

The Overture assumes that a man can be an acting elder in one congregation and at the same time be in charge of another congregation. When he is in charge of a congregation as a catechist, he ceases to be an acting elder in any other congregation.

If a catechist should return to the congregation in which he has been elected an elder in order to perform the duties of this office, he is not giving full-time attention to the work to which he has been assigned as a catechist. As long as he is a catechist, his commitment is to the congregation over which the Presbytery of the bounds has placed him in a pastoral relationship and not to any other congregation.

In the congregation to which he has been appointed, a catechist cannot be an elder because he has been placed in a pastoral relationship to the congregation and is subject only to the authority of the Presbytery of the bounds. If he were an elder, he would be subject to the authority of the Kirk-Session.

The Clerks therefore recommend that this explanation be in support of the validity of Book of Forms, Section 278(5).

The Overture draws attention to the conflict of authority between the courts and boards of the Church and prays that the General Assembly "clarify and determine the relationship (responsibility and authority) as between the courts of the Church and the boards of the Church with respect to the issuing of a call in an aid-receiving congregation."

In recent years this matter has been before two Assemblies but the problem has not been resolved and no study has been made regarding the issues involved.

The Clerks therefore recommend that the prayer of the Overture be granted in the following terms: That a Committee be appointed to study the whole matter involved with instructions to report to the 95th Assembly with recommendations, the Committee to consist of two representatives of the General Board of Missions, one representative of

the Presbytery of Brandon and the Clerks of Assembly, together with the Chairman of the Committee to be appointed by this Assembly.

**REPORT OF THE CLERKS OF ASSEMBLY RE
MOTION, PAGE 104, A. & P., 1967**

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

The Assembly of 1967 directed that the Clerks of Assembly report to this Assembly on the Motion, page 104, Acts and Proceedings, 1967. This motion is in five sections, and the text of it will be found in this year's Stitched Minutes.

The Clerks beg leave to report as follows:

Sections 1 and 2 have much merit. Attention is called to the Report of the Administrative Council this year, in which, for information, it is stated that in response to a request for an introduction to the functioning of the Council a booklet will be given to all old and new members of the Council. At its April meeting the Council directed its Secretary (L. H. Fowler) to prepare this for the autumn of 1968. With a little addition of material, this could be made to answer the desires expressed in Sections 1 and 2 of this motion, and if this Assembly so direct it will be done by the Secretary.

The Clerks would point out that a briefing session is given by one of the Clerks of Assembly at four o'clock on the first Wednesday afternoon of Assembly, and this really fulfils the request of Section 1 of the motion.

Section 3 is impossible procedure, Sections 4 and 5 can be met, and often are met, in the procedure of each Assembly. The difficulty is in persuading conveners not to make a speech — which is perhaps their right — and the Clerks would hesitate to make a regulation depriving them of their privilege. No new regulation is necessary to meet the principles of Sections 4 and 5.

The Clerks recommend that this statement be an answer to the directive of the 93rd General Assembly to them.

**REPORT OF THE CLERKS OF ASSEMBLY RE
RETIRED MINISTERS AND OVERTURE NO. 16, 1967**

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

Overture 16, 1967, Presbytery of Victoria, Re Placing of Names on the Constituent Roll, overtured the General Assembly to amend Section 176 of the Book of Forms, particularly by eliminating clause (e) of paragraph (1). The Clerks reported on this in 1967, and the Report will be found on page 108, A. & P., 1967, recommending that the prayer be not granted. There was no other action for the Clerks to take even if they had been minded to take some other action. The Assembly of 1966, in approving the Report of the Committee to study the law of the Church re placing names on the Con-

stituent Roll (pages 93, 94, 399 and 400, A. & P., 1966) had made definite statements in this matter.

Overture 16, 1967, was really asking for a reversal of the decision of the 1966 Assembly. Notwithstanding the action of 1966 and the Report of the Clerks in 1967, the following motion was passed, "it was agreed that the matter of retired ministers be referred to the Clerks of Assembly to report in 1968, to determine a more equitable policy with regard to Section 176(1) (e) with particular reference to the status of retired ministers in The Presbyterian Church in Canada." To ask an Assembly to reverse the decision of the Assembly immediately preceding is not in order. Assembly, in so short a time, must respect the decisions of a previous Assembly.

The Clerks submit that it is an error to state that the placing of a minister's name on the Appendix is not treating him equitably. The placing of a name on the Constituent Roll is not a matter of prestige, but a matter of function and usefulness to the Church. The Clerks submit that any matter of equity is not a matter of where the name is, but what the Presbytery itself does concerning retired ministers. It is the privilege of Presbytery, if the court cares to exercise the privilege, to overture Assembly for permission to continue the name of the retiring minister on the Constituent Roll of the Presbytery. To do so is not to assert some idea of equity, but to obtain the assistance of an able and willing retired minister for the work of the court.

The Clerks recommend that this Report be an answer to the Minute on page 108, Acts and Proceedings, 1967.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY, (E.D.)

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

"Hitherto Hath the Lord helped us" might well have been upon the lips of all in Canada at the beginning of the year 1967, and certainly it was the feeling of all the women of the Woman's Missionary Society, E.D., as we came together for the first time for our annual meeting in the spring. Very fitting, too, was the fact that we met in the Kirk of St. James, Charlottetown, P.E.I. on May 24th and 25th. The theme of our meeting was one which we felt very appropriate as we began a new era, as it were, having our fiscal year synchronize with the calendar year; the theme, "Lord, what wilt Thou have us to do?" and the worship services of each meeting, led by Miss Eileen Budhoo of Guyana made us cognizant of the fact that that is the question that must be uppermost in our minds at all times.

Reports brought to the meeting covered the period from September 1966 to December 1966, and as we have not yet received all reports for the year 1967, it is difficult to give an accurate statistical report. Sufficient to say that the membership remains only slightly higher than last year. The number of Home Helpers has increased by nearly one hundred and sixty — a good omen, we hope and pray for an increase in active membership during 1968. The prescribed studies were used in the majority of groups, with the "Presbyterian Message", "Glad Tidings" and the "Presbyterian Record" used as supplementary material. Girls' organizations and Children's groups were very active, the reports being most encouraging, both as to numbers, money raised and studies carried out. Many of the girls' groups undertook special projects in addition to the general project — UNICEF collections, sending Braille Bible sections to Taiwan and many others.

We were blessed indeed, in having with us for our meeting two missionaries from overseas fields, Miss Eileen Budhoo, Native missionary from Guyana, who, as already mentioned conducted the worship services at each session, and the Rev. J. C. MacIntosh of the Korean Christian Church in Japan.

On Wednesday evening, the Rev. Malcolm McCuaig conducted the public service, during which Mr. MacIntosh gave us an excellent and timely message. After the service, Mr. MacIntosh showed slides of the K.C.C.J., with suitable commentaries which gave all who were privileged to be present at this meeting, a new insight into the work among the Koreans in Japan.

Miss Eileen Budhoo is our senior deaconess in Guyana. The W.M.S., E.D., supports two native senior deaconesses and one junior deaconess. Miss Budhoo's visit to Canada was made possible by one of our centennial projects "The Book of Remembrance". While in the Atlantic Provinces, she visited several missionary groups and spent some time at two of the camps — Camp Geddie and MacLeod Camp. She had been invited by Presbyterian women of U.S.A. to visit and speak at Montreat, Georgia, and we were very thankful that she was able to accept this invitation. The impact of Miss Budhoo's visit cannot be fully realized at this time. Her timely messages and the influence of her Christian character on all whom she met, but especially on the campers will surely bear much fruit. Arrangements have already been made for Miss Chengghur, our other senior native deaconess, to represent us at the centennial anniversary in Trinidad in July.

August 4-11, 1967, saw the culmination of a year's planning for a Training Centre. Should we call such a gathering a "success"? Rather, I believe, a blessing to all who attended and to many more who have profited by direct contact with those who attended. We owe a debt of gratitude to those of the W.D. who gave so unstintingly of their time and talents to add to those of our own leaders, but I believe that the greater gift was the fellowship — the "oneness" in Christ Jesus which gave us such joy. If I may mention one name, I am sure all will agree on the contribution of Miss Margaret Kennedy, on furlough from India, who conducted unforgettable worship services each evening on the topic "What Think ye of Christ?" Every aspect of our mission responsibility was touched upon during the conference and teenagers and adults joined hands and thoughts.

On our home field we were able to grant the request of the Pictou Presbytery, when in June, 1967, Miss June Pratt became Presbytery deaconess there. Miss Mary MacKenzie continues to be well nigh indispensable in P.E.I. presbytery, as is Miss Christine Shaw as regional secretary. Miss Shirley Cayley continues as deaconess in the Cape Breton presbytery. A student deaconess was supplied for P.E.I., a graduate deaconess for D.V.B.S. in C.B., and a student helper for Camp Geddie. Miss Elsie Lee continued as part time worker among the Chinese and we also provided a hospital visitor for Halifax, part time. For your information Miss Lee is resigning as of April 1968, leaving the Presbyterian church in the Atlantic Provinces without a Christian witness to those Chinese unable to speak English. Again "Lord, what wilt Thou have us to do?" Grants were given as usual to the Interprovincial Home for Women at Coverdale, N.B., School of Missions, Toronto, and Maritime Home for Girls. In India Miss Mary Nichol continues her work for the Master as director of the School of Nursing in Jobat, and we have again given a grant to the School.

Taiwan: Miss Georgine Caldwell continues to carry on her work of Christian Education in the Theological College, Taipei.

New Hebrides: The token gift given for so many years to the Tangoa Training Institute, South Santo, continues. This, as you know, is to try to keep before us the memory of the life and work of Dr. John Geddie.

Japan: The grant given annually for women's work in Japan and for the support of the family of the native pastor studying in Canada was continued.

As we go forward into this year of 1968 many problems face us as a Missionary society and as a Church, in this world of turmoil and confusion. But as we, as individuals and groups seek, on our knees, the answer to our question "Lord, what wilt Thou have us to do?" surely the answer will come to us clear and plain when we are ready to listen "This is the way, walk ye in it". May God give each of us grace

to listen, patience to wait for His leading, strength and courage to pursue the course He lays out for us.

THE COMMITTEE ON INTER-CHURCH RELATIONS

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

This is the year in which the fourth assembly of the World Council of Churches is held. It meets in Uppsala, Sweden, July 4-20. The two official delegates from our church will be Rev. Dr. L. H. Fowler, secretary of the Administrative Council, and the Rev. George H. Young, Sarnia, Ont. Your convener was compelled to give up his place for personal reasons, and this committee appointed Mr. Young as delegate.

The Canadian Council of Churches has appointed Mr. James Mackie of St. Andrew's Church, Ottawa, as a youth delegate, one of six from Canada. Prof. David W. Hay, who is retiring as a member of the Faith and Order Commission of the W.C.C., will attend a meeting of the working committee of that commission in Uppsala.

The World Presbyterian Alliance

Our church has always been active in the World Presbyterian Alliance, also known as the Alliance of Reformed Churches. Each year we send a delegation to the meeting of its North American Area Council. The world body, which is the General Council, meets every four or five years. We are entitled to send six delegates to the General Council in 1970. One of our elders, Mr. Harold M. Jackson, is chairman of the finance committee of the World Presbyterian Alliance.

At this General Assembly we would like to focus on the work of the North American Area Council. Rev. Dr. Ross K. Cameron, chairman of our delegation, and a member of its administrative committee, reports as follows:

Our church was represented at the North American Area Council of the World Presbyterian Alliance in Atlantic City, January 9-11, by Dr. R. K. Cameron, Dr. J. L. W. McLean, Miss Louise Reith, Prof. A. L. Farris, Rev. Charles C. Cochrane, Rev. Wallace McKinnon, Mr. H. M. Jackson and Dr. DeC. H. Rayner.

The Council was composed of 100 delegates from 13 Reformed and Presbyterian Churches in the Caribbean, the United States and Canada, representing an estimated 7,984,000 members.

The Alliance is the oldest organization concerned with the ecumenical problem and the resultant unity of the Christian church. The Alliance recognizes that basically theological problems must be faced and solved before practical issues can be dealt with. Closer relations with Lutheran Churches have been established.

One of the principal speakers at the Council meetings was Bishop F. C. Fry, President of The Lutheran Church in America who said that "Christian Churches are under obligation to act vigorously now on things on which they agree".

Another address was given by Bishop E. L. Unterkoefer, Roman Catholic Bishop of Charleston who indicated that we have begun to understand one another and our future problems — all churchmen should work together for peace, religious liberty and justice.

The Council agreed with and underlined the appeal of the Roman Catholic Bishops of South Vietnam to the governments of the North and South Vietnam and all governments allied with them to stop the bombing of the North and infiltration of Northern people into the South.

Concerning injustice and violence in the United States the Council condemned the racial caste system which prevails in the United States and concluded a lengthy

statement thus: "We pray that they (Negro churchmen) may be God's ministers in bringing us to repentance and Christian obedience."

The theme of the meetings of the World Alliance meetings in 1970 will be "God Reconciles and Makes Free." This is to be considered in the areas of the new humanity, creation, ecumenism, world peace, and stewardship.

The Rev. H. G. Williams of Trinidad, clerk of the Assembly of Reformed Churches in the Caribbean, was elected chairman of the Council for 1968. Judge John A. Fulton of The Presbyterian Church in the United States was elected vice-chairman.

We are privileged to have at this Assembly a fraternal delegate from the North American Area Council of the Alliance, President Arthur R. McKay of McCormick Theological Seminary, Chicago. He will be heard in connection with the work of the Alliance.

For some years now the World Presbyterian Alliance has been negotiating with the International Congregational Council with a view to merging the two world organizations. We have asked the Committee on Articles of Faith to consider the theological and doctrinal implications of this proposal, and that committee has raised no objections to it. We shall therefore ask this General Assembly to approve the merger of the World Presbyterian Alliance and The International Congregational Council.

Canadian Council of Churches

Presbyterians have participated in the works of the Central Committee and the various commissions of the Canadian Council of Churches. Through the Ecumenical Institute of Canada we have been represented at consultations with other communions in Whitby and in Montreal.

The assembly of the Canadian Council of Churches will not meet until 1969. In September of this year Rev. Dr. Floyd Honey will become general secretary of the Council.

Observer-Consultants

As agreed at the last General Assembly, the moderator appointed as observer-consultants to the General Commission on Union (Anglican and United Churches in Canada) Rev. Dr. G. Deane Johnston, Rev. Dr. A. Lorne Mackay and the Rev. D. G. M. Herron.

For some years now we have sent observer-consultants to the Consultation on Church Union in the U.S.A., as the result of the invitation accepted by the General Assembly in 1962. In March of this year the secretary of this committee attended that Consultation in Dayton, Ohio. Ten major denominations representing over 25 million members are active members of that Consultation. Your committee feels that we should continue to send observer-consultants in order to keep abreast of developments that may affect church life and work on this continent.

Overture 5, General Assembly 1967

The prayer of this overture from the Synod of Hamilton and London asked the General Assembly "to instruct the Committee on Inter-Church Relations to review the possibilities of mutual invitations between our ministers and Roman Catholic clergy to attend and add to the rites of the inviting Church, and to report to the next General Assembly, or to do otherwise as the General Assembly in its wisdom may deem best".

The preamble states that "it seems advisable that a common policy be established for the ministers of The Presbyterian Church in Canada regarding this matter."

Your committee, which includes in its membership the joint clerks of General Assembly, replies that there is no restriction on any Presbyterian minister taking part in the service of another communion. In any case he is under the discipline of the presbytery. Under the circumstances we can see no need to determine policy on a national scale.

Other Matters

Your committee has had a hand in appointing representatives to the Advance

for Mission in the Seventies, which is an inter-denominational movement on this continent in which members of the Canadian Council of Churches are invited to participate.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That this General Assembly approve of the merger of the World Presbyterian Alliance with the International Congregational Council.
2. That the statement in this report be the answer to Overture 5 from the Synod of Hamilton and London.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EWART COLLEGE

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

The Board of Ewart College begs leave to submit the following report for the year 1967-68.

Report of the Academic Session

The 1967-68 academic session marks the first year of the complete implementation and normal operation of the revised curriculum adopted by the Board after a careful curriculum study made by the Board during the years 1963 to 1966. This revision appears to be most satisfactory. The new curriculum attempts to achieve a good balance of Biblical and theological, social science, and professional courses, as well as a balance of theory and practical experience. It is the conviction of the Board that this revision has resulted in a strengthening of the academic as well as the field work programme. It has also provided a satisfactory work load for both faculty and students.

Biblical and theological subjects have again been taught by members of the faculty of Knox College. In some cases separate courses have been given for Ewart College students in Ewart classrooms. In other cases Ewart College students have shared with the students at Knox College in joint classes. The gratitude of the Board is expressed to the Board and Senate of Knox College for this continued co-operation and assistance. Courses in Christian education, Introduction to the Bible, Worship, Counselling, and the Art of Communication have been given by Ewart College faculty — Miss Margaret Webster, Principal; Miss Ada Adams, Dean; and Miss Irene Dickson, Lecturer. The course in Missions was given by the Reverend Dr. Kenneth G. MacMillan of the Canadian Bible Society, and the secretaries of Home and Overseas Missions of the General Board of Missions and the Women's Missionary Society (Western Division). Assistance has also been received from the staff of the Board of Christian Education and the Women's Missionary Society in a survey course on the work being done by the Presbyterian Church in Canada in Christian education. A few courses are provided ecumenically, either through the Ecumenical Institute or a co-operative plan of teaching of the Anglican Women's Training College, Covenant College (United Church) and Ewart College. The Board is grateful to all who have assisted in the teaching of students.

The Field Work program has continued, following the plan adopted a few years ago, but was strengthened in certain sections which required improvement. First year field work provided experience in leadership of children and junior-high youth at Davenport Presbyterian Church. In the second year one term was spent in teaching in nursery-kindergarten work at Rosedale and the Chinese Presbyterian Churches, and the

second term included visits to a great variety of youth, adult and senior citizens' groups. Graduating students had individual placements, four of them in Presbyterian congregations — one in the suburbs, two in city Churches and one in an inner city Church, while one student undertook work under the supervision of the Church nurse at the Hospital for Sick Children. Emphasis in third year field work is on experience in leadership education. Gratitude is again expressed to the ministers, deaconesses and leaders in the various Churches in which field work was conducted.

Several special events took place during the academic year. The first weekend provided opportunity for experience in unit camping with a weekend spent at Ryde Lake in Muskoka. During two other weekends — one in the fall and one in the spring term — the choir visited the Presbytery of London and the Presbytery of Lindsay to acquaint Church members and especially young people with the needs of the Church for trained workers and the training offered in the various colleges.

During the summer Miss Adams, Director of Field Work, was able to visit a number of students on their summer appointments to give supervision and suggestions for leadership development.

Enrollment at the College totalled 18. Students were originally certified by presbyteries in the various Synods as follows: Atlantic — 3; Montreal and Ottawa — 2; Toronto and Kingston — 4; Hamilton and London — 3; Manitoba — 0; Saskatchewan — 2; Alberta — 2; British Columbia — 0. In addition one young woman from Formosa and one from the Korean Christian Church in Japan were enrolled as special students.

The Graduation Service was held in Knox College Chapel on May 2. The Reverend H. Douglas Stewart, B.A., D.D., minister of Knox Presbyterian Church, Ottawa, addressed the graduates.

The Residence

The residence, which houses fifty-seven students, was completely filled during the academic year with Ewart College students and others enrolled in various courses at the University. Many of these students came from Presbyterian homes in Canada. A number came from overseas countries, contributing something of their culture to residence life; these represented Formosa, Hong Kong, Iceland, India, Japan, Thailand and Trinidad.

The residence committee of students helped to establish a happy spirit of fellowship among all living in residence and sponsored several special events. Worship in the chapel provided daily spiritual enrichment for staff and a large majority of resident students.

Between academic sessions the residence housed several conferences and was completely filled during the summer with students taking summer courses. Throughout the year College facilities have been used by several of the Boards and Committees of the Church for meetings and conferences.

Report of Other Aspects of the Life and Work of the College

The College noted with sorrow the death in February of Miss Winnifred Ferguson who served as Principal of The Missionary and Deaconess Training Home from 1927 to 1939. During this time the present site at 156 St. George Street was chosen and the school relocated and reorganized there. We pay tribute to the memory of Miss Ferguson whose vision and administrative ability contributed greatly to the growth of the present College.

During the summer of 1967 the College staff suffered a severe loss in the death of Miss Hazel Herd who had served as cook for close to twenty years. Other staff changes took place at about the same time. The Board expresses its appreciation to those members of the household staff who carried extra responsibilities until replacements were found.

Staff changes made the Board aware of the necessity of setting down statements regarding personnel policy. The Board has completed this work during the year and a mimeographed statement of personnel practices of the College is now available.

At the end of December 1967 the first full year of responsibility for the maintenance of the College's financial accounts in the office of the College was completed. This plan of handling the receipt and payment of all College accounts through the College's own office has proven to be satisfactory and more economical in regard to time involved.

CONCERNS OF THE BOARD

Three chief areas of concern have received the attention of the Board and staff during the year

- the whole matter of recruitment of women for the specialized ministries of the Church,
- the recognition of the work being done by students by the granting of appropriate degrees,
- and provision for continuing education for former students and graduates.

Recruitment —

The matter of recruitment has given us continuing concern. The low enrollment in the College means that, during the next few years there will be relatively few new trained women workers to give leadership in our Church in the fields of Christian education and Church social work. The Board is convinced that the Church has great need of persons trained in these fields, and that as qualified, capable persons are available there will be positions for them.

In April 1967 the Board decided to undertake research regarding the factors that motivate persons to undertake training at Ewart College for work in the Church. A committee on research has been convened by Dr. E. E. Williamson, M.D., C.M., and has made its preliminary report in May of this year. Dr. Williamson has interviewed forty-three graduates and received completed questionnaires from another fifty-one. As the findings of this research are analysed and interpreted, it is hoped that directions for recruitment, for further curriculum study, and for strengthening of the status of the Deaconess and Director of Christian Education in the Church may be indicated.

At both of the meetings of the Board during the year and at several meetings of the Executive the matter of the need for increased effort in recruitment has been discussed. Study has been given to the suggestions regarding recruitment being made and actions undertaken by other interested Boards and committees of the Church. The Board believes that, in many of the general recruiting activities of the Church, because of the obvious lack of ministerial supply, we have been remiss in our responsibilities for the recruitment of men and women to act as Christian Educators, welfare and mission workers in the Church, turning an undue proportion of attention upon the pastoral minister. The Board hopes that, if the Committee on Recruitment proceeds with its proposed research project, that Committee will include in its study the subject of the recruitment of men and women as Christian educators and workers in related fields, and that, in all recruitment projects of the Church, emphasis on the needs for workers in these fields may be increased.

Miss Dickson, who has served as Special Lecturer and Administrative Assistant through a three year interim appointment, has carried responsibility in the field of recruitment and has co-operated in several projects sponsored by General Assembly's Committee on Recruitment. In addition Miss Dickson has administered the plans for visits of prospective students to the College, two Choir weekends for the purpose of recruitment in the Presbyteries of London and Lindsay, and undertaken regular correspondence with a large number of girls and young women who have inquired about study at the College and work in the Church. The Board at the end of the year sent letters to each presbytery and congregation asking for co-operation throughout the Church in the presentation of the needs of the Church to young people.

At the present time the Board is considering several additional ways of making contact with the young people of our Church in the hope that more of them may consider study in preparation for leadership in the specialized ministries of Christian education, Church social work and missions.

Granting of Degrees —

Following approval of the last General Assembly that the Board of the College apply for incorporation of the College through a Private Bill in the Ontario Legislature, requesting at the same time permission to grant degrees in Christian Education, a suitable Bill was prepared and presented to the 1968 Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario. At the time of the writing of this report the Bill has passed second reading in the Legislature. Questions have been raised regarding the advisability of permitting small colleges to have degree granting powers. What the final outcome of the Bill will be has yet to be determined.

Provided the Bill with the degree granting powers receives legislative approval, the College will proceed immediately to secure the advice of consultants from the Commission on Christian Education of the American Association of Theological Schools as well as other qualified persons so that the academic standing of the College, its curriculum, and courses may be tested. It is hoped that as soon as possible the College may be able to proceed to grant degrees in Christian Education which will be acceptable not only within our own Church but by comparable colleges elsewhere. Should the Bill with its degree granting clause not receive legislative approval the Board plans to proceed immediately to consider other avenues through which appropriate degrees may be granted to qualified graduating students.

The Board is convinced that the quality of the work being done at the College is worthy of recognition by an appropriate degree. It is prepared to test this conviction with the help of experienced personnel. It believes that workers in the fields of Christian education, Church social work and missions within our Church in Canada and overseas would benefit from the holding of such degrees through increased recognition and acceptance. It therefore believes that it must proceed as quickly as possible in this matter.

Continuing Education —

The continuing education of persons carrying professional leadership responsibilities within the Church must be an increasing concern to the Church as a whole. In order to carry out their work effectively and find enjoyment and satisfaction therefrom, the servants of the Church must be given opportunities for refreshment, stimulation of thought, and opportunities to assess current thinking and practice.

During the year the College has co-operated with representatives of the Anglican Women's Training College, Covenant College and the Baptist Women's Leadership Training School at McMaster University in planning for Seminar '68, the second co-operative refresher course for graduates. This Seminar, with leadership in the fields of Theology, Christian communication, Pastoral work and counselling, Christian education, and the Church and Social Change will be held at Ewart College from June 16 to 28, 1968. It is planned that, if possible, refresher courses for graduates be held approximately every three years.

The Alumnae Association of the College has established a Bursary Fund for the assistance of graduates who wish to undertake post-graduate study. It is hoped that, through that fund and other sources of financial aid, an increasing number of graduates may participate in a variety of continuing education projects.

APPOINTMENT OF A LECTURER

At the 93rd General Assembly permission was given to the Board of Ewart College to make a permanent appointment to the College's professional staff in the person of a Lecturer in the summer of 1968 when the interim appointment of a Lecturer and Administrative Assistant would be completed.

Presbyteries were requested to submit nominations for this position. Replies were received from twenty-nine Presbyteries. Twenty-four of these nominated Miss Irene Dickson, B.A., B.Ed., B.D. for the position. As a result the Board of the College presents with this report a recommendation to the Assembly.

RECOMMENDATION

The Board of Ewart College recommends that Miss Irene Dickson, B.A., B.Ed., B.D., be appointed to the position of Lecturer at Ewart College, the appointment to be effective July 1, 1968.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT PRESBYTERIAN COLLEGE — 1967-68

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

The Board of Management of The Presbyterian College, Montreal, submit their report with thankfulness to God for His guidance throughout another year.

The year 1967-68 was one of extensive activity in which your Board sought new and additional means of extending the work of the College.

The 100th Anniversary of the beginning of classes at The College was celebrated last Fall. A Centennial Banquet was held on September 27 when the Rev. Nathaniel H. Parker, Principal Emeritus of the Divinity College, McMaster University was the principal speaker. The Anderson Lectures were given on September 27 and 28 by three of the foremost authorities in the field of theological education, the Rev. Charles R. Feilding, the Rev. Stanley B. Frost and the Rev. Walter D. Wagoner and the address at the Centennial Convocation held on September 28 was given by the Rev. Jesse H. Ziegler, Executive Director of the American Association of Theological Schools.

As we enter our second century of service as a Theological College, we are conscious of the changing situation in which the Church must minister today, and we are endeavouring to meet the challenge of these times by equipping our students with the knowledge to meet the problems and opportunities of today and also by providing our graduates with continuing Ministerial education. This year saw the inauguration of a course for Ministers wishing to study the many developments in fields of study relating to the Church's task. Some fifteen Ministers took advantage of this. Two more courses are scheduled for the initial course the next term and it is hoped to extend this work in subsequent years if conditions permit.

During the period of Expo '67, our College Residence was occupied by a project known as the Presbyterian Youth Hostel. This project was a combined venture sponsored jointly by our College, the General Assembly's Committee on Recruitment, and the General Board of Missions. It provided accommodation for over 2500 young people visiting Expo. The Rev. Donald McKillican had direct responsibility for its operation, and to his enthusiasm and drive must be attributed the success of this venture which brought much goodwill to The College.

At a joint meeting of the Board of Management and the Senate held on November 2, 1967, a committee was appointed to approach McGill University with a view to discussing the possibility and means of closer affiliation between it and The College.

Such conversations were authorized by the 89th General Assembly. The College's committee consisted of the Principal, Professor Markell and Mr. Henry Wright representing the Senate and the Messrs. McCallum, Bush, Crawford and McDougall representing the Board.

An immediate approach was made to the Chancellor of McGill but due to administrative problems it did not prove possible for the McGill Committee to be appointed until January of this year. Its members are Vice-Principal Oliver, Dean Frost, Dean Jay and the Messrs. Henry Birks and Colin Webster. The College's committee records with gratitude the very real interest shown by these gentlemen and the unflinching co-operation which they extended throughout the months of negotiations.

Prior to the first meeting with the McGill representatives in February, The College's committee studied the problems involved and formulated a brief for presentation on behalf of The College. In this brief, it outlined the advantages it could foresee from participation in the McGill Faculty of Divinity:

(i) We could share as a college and as the representative of the Presbyterian Church in developing and promoting within the University an important centre of theological education striving for excellence in an ecumenical climate;

(ii) Our Faculty would have the challenge of working at every level of theological education and the experience of working with a body of students larger in number and more diverse in tradition; and

(iii) Our students would be part of a larger community of learning, sharing in the fellowship and stimulus of others and having available additional opportunities for specialization in their preparation for the ministry.

The College's committee expressed the opinion that to be acceptable any agreement between the University and The College would have to insure that:

(i) Apart from instruction in the distinctive doctrines and disciplines of our Church for which we would remain responsible, students of our College would receive instruction at the University in all other subjects within the curriculum required by our Church including Old and New Testament Literature and Exegesis, Systematic Theology, Church History, History and Philosophy of Religion and Christian Ethics as well as other subjects of a more professional character such as Psychology of Religion and Clinical Pastoral Education;

(ii) Those occupying professorial chairs at The College would receive appropriate appointments to the Faculty of Divinity;

(iii) Future appointments by the University to the chairs of Old Testament, New Testament, Systematic Theology and Church History would be made only after consultation with the participating colleges;

(iv) The College would maintain its separate and distinct identity with complete autonomy in its own affairs, having its own Board and Senate, owning its property, administering its funds, retaining its endowments, awarding its scholarships, bursaries, diplomas and honorary degrees (holding its own Convocation for such purposes) and appointing its own staff for the administration of its affairs and the teaching of supplementary subjects; and

(v) The arrangements would decrease rather than increase the Church's financial responsibilities.

With respect to Condition (i), relating to the instruction of students, The College's committee has received assurances that all the courses we required would be given by the Faculty of Divinity.

With respect to Condition (ii) the McGill Committee is prepared to recommend to its governing bodies the appointment of all four of our Professors to the Faculty of Divinity. Initially the appointments offered to the Principal, Dr. McMillan and Dr. Scobie would be as Associate Professors and to Professor Markell as Assistant Professor.

The remuneration of Professors Scobie and Markell (which would not be less than that they were receiving from the Church at the time of appointment) would be borne by the University and they would enjoy the rights and be subject to the

obligations of McGill professors under the McGill Pension Plans. While they would be permitted to perform certain duties at The College, and, if required, act as sessional lecturers to a limited degree The College's committee feels that if a formal agreement is reached between The College and the University and the Professors Scobie and Markell are offered such appointments in New Testament and Church History respectively on the conditions outlined above, their resignations from the chairs they presently occupy might be expected. Assurances to that effect have been given by them.

Interesting and challenging work at both B.D. and graduate levels will be offered to Dr. Lennox and Dr. McMillan but to a degree which will not interfere with their duties as Principal and Registrar, bearing in mind the responsibilities they will have in forthcoming programmes of Continuing Education and the development of The College's role in the Church and Community. Their remuneration would be borne by The College.

With respect to Condition (iii) relating to future appointments by the University to the Faculty of Divinity, The College's committee has been advised that such appointments are made on the basis of nominations by the participating colleges.

With respect to Condition (iv) relating to the identity and autonomy of The College, no problem arises.

With respect to Condition (v) relating to financial responsibilities, The College's committee anticipates an immediate net saving of about \$12,500.00 annually. The saving of stipends of the two professors and of the sessional lecturers whose services would be no longer required would reduce expenditures by about \$25,000.00, while The College's annual contribution to the expenses of the Faculty of Divinity and to its library should be about \$10,000.00 and \$2,500.00 respectively. These contributions which should be equal to and not exceed the individual contributions of the other participating colleges, would be in lieu of tuition fees for regular, limited and partial students who are candidates for ordination registered in The College. Books and periodicals purchased with the funds contributed by The College would be catalogued as the property of The College.

The existing library of The College would be made available to McGill but would remain our property and could be withdrawn if the agreement with McGill were terminated.

The recommendations of the Board and Senate which are contained in this Report were unanimously adopted at a joint meeting held on April 18, 1968.

In 1966, when transmitting to the 92nd General Assembly, the Rev. C. Ritchie Bell's resignation from the Lord Strathcona Chair of Pastoral Theology and Homiletics, your Board requested permission to confer on him the title of Professor Emeritus in recognition of his outstanding services to The College as a teacher and as friend and counsellor to its students and graduates. This recommendation was not acted upon and your Board was sorely disappointed. Named Moderator of General Assembly 20 years ago, Dr. Bell is one of the most beloved senior statesmen of our denomination. He continues to serve The College as its recruiting officer and unofficial ambassador-at-large and his appointment would recognize in a proper and fitting manner his long standing connection with The College and his continuing interest in its work and aspirations.

The problems of attracting men to the Ministry of the Church continues to exercise the minds of your Board. The study initiated by the Board last year, in which we engaged the services of Woods-Gordon, a management firm of some repute, has received wide circulation throughout the Church and the report of this firm has been studied by Presbyteries and some General Assembly Boards and Committees. The College is grateful to those which have shared our concern by sending us their comments and suggestions. The four committees appointed by your Board have been most diligent in their work and have accumulated much valuable data and source material but feel that the work should be now taken up on a national scale. Their recommendations have been adopted by your Board.

It is with profound regret that your Board has received the resignation of the Rev. Neil G. Smith as Dean of Residence, Librarian and Lecturer in Homiletics. Dr.

Smith has accepted a Call from the Congregations of Kirkfield and Bolsover in the Presbytery of Lindsay. Dr. Smith will be greatly missed in our Faculty and in the work of the College where he was much beloved. We wish him God's continuing blessing in his new charge.

We would record our gratitude for the many bursaries and scholarships we have received this year which have encouraged and stimulated the work of The College.

We would also express our appreciation of the work of the Principal and all members of the Faculty in all that they have done to promote the welfare of The College.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. WHEREAS the Board and Senate recognize the trend for Theological Education to be carried on in the larger context of the university; and
WHEREAS we feel that our Church should offer to its students for the ministry the opportunity of studying in such a situation; and
WHEREAS participation in the Faculty of Divinity of McGill University would provide such an opportunity and insure our presence in this strategic area of higher education in Eastern Canada; and
WHEREAS the courses would conform to those required by the Presbyterian Church in Canada; and
WHEREAS participation in the University would not diminish the role of The College in the life of the Church, but would rather increase its opportunity to represent the Church at new levels of education; and
WHEREAS The College would be enabled to continue and to enlarge its programme of Continuing Ministerial Education and work in other areas of education within our Church; and
WHEREAS an immediate reduction in our requirements upon the financial resources of the Church would be made possible; and
THEREFORE the Board and Senate of The Presbyterian College, Montreal respectfully recommend:
That the Venerable the 94th General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada approve of the participation of The Presbyterian College, Montreal, in the Faculty of Divinity, McGill University, in accordance with the conditions stated in the foregoing report; and
2. That the Board of Management of The College be authorized to proceed with its implementation and to conclude such agreements with McGill University as it deems in the best interest of the Church and The College.
3. That your Board respectfully recommends that permission be granted to confer on the Reverend C. Ritchie Bell, B.A., B.D., D.D. the title of Emeritus Professor.
4. For many years, the Colleges and numerous other Boards and Committees of the Church have been deeply concerned with the failure of the Church to develop, maintain and support its ministry. It is evident that this concern is now shared at all levels of the Church, that the problem has reached crisis proportions and that the time has come for broad imaginative corrective action by the whole Church.

It is apparent that this problem is so basic, and that it so deeply permeates the whole Church that it is beyond the competence of existing Boards and Committees with their limited terms of reference.

In the circumstances, this problem demands immediate action by this General Assembly so as to insure that the next General Assembly will have before it concrete, specific, detailed recommendations. Therefore this College submits the following recommendation:

That a Special Committee of not more than five persons be established to formulate a plan of action for the development, maintenance and support of our

ministry, such a plan of action to be submitted for consideration by the 1969 General Assembly.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SENATE OF THE PRESBYTERIAN COLLEGE, MONTREAL, FOR THE YEAR 1967-68

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

We began the Session with a special Convocation which brought to a conclusion our Centennial Celebrations, which had extended throughout the preceding year. We began these celebrations by a backward look at our past history. We concluded them with this special Convocation by a look into the future. Prior to the Convocation proper we had our Annual Anderson Lectures, which on this occasion were given by three leaders in the field of Theological Education: Professor Charles Feilding of Trinity College, Toronto, Dean Stanley B. Frost, of the Faculty of Graduate Studies and Research and of the Faculty of Divinity, McGill University and Dean Walter D. Wagoner of the Theological Graduate Union, San Francisco, U.S.A. Principal Nathaniel Parker of the McMaster Divinity College addressed a special Centennial Dinner and the Convocation address on the Church and Theological Education was given by Dr. Jesse Ziegler, Executive Director of the American Association of Theological Schools. All of these addresses lifted our sights and stimulated our thinking as we thought of our responsibilities in the new Century on which we had entered. At this special Convocation the degree of Doctor of Divinity, *honoris causa* was conferred on these four distinguished teachers of the Church.

In respect of the Session 1967-68 the Senate begs to submit the following report. At the beginning of the Session 16 students were enrolled: Third Year 3, Second Year 6, First Year 6, Partial 1. One student in the Third Year discontinued his studies temporarily at the beginning of the Second Term.

The regular members of the Faculty conducted the classes in their respective departments with the exception of the Principal, whose work was interrupted by illness from which, happily, he has recovered. The interrupted work which involved the first year class will be made up next year.

In addition to the Faculty the following served as Sessional Lecturers: Dr. C. R. Bell and Dr. Neil G. Smith in Pastoral Theology and Homiletics; The Rev. R. M. Ransom in Christian Missions; Professor J. C. McLelland in History and Philosophy of Religion and Christian Ethics and Dr. W. H. Reid, tutor in Biblical Hebrew and Dr. C. J. MacKay as Director of Field Work.

The following students were awarded the Diploma of the College: Donald W. MacKay, B.A., and Gordon E. Williams, B.A. The degree of Bachelor of Divinity was conferred on these together with the Rev. Dr. Bell has served this College as a lecturer since 1946. In 1950 he was appointed Lord Strathcona Professor of Pastoral Theology from which he resigned in 1966 to become the minister of the Margaret Roger Memorial Church in Lachute. All during these years Dr. Bell has continued to give of his time and rich talents in ways that have served generations of students through the College and the whole Church in his many extra-mural activities. We take pleasure, therefore, as a Senate in asking this General Assembly that Dr. Bell, one time Professor of this College, Past Moderator of the General Assembly and devoted minister and pastor be appointed Professor Emeritus.

KNOX COLLEGE
REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

The Board of Knox College begs leave to submit its 124th annual report. The financial position of the College as at December 31, 1967 proved to be somewhat more favourable than previously anticipated. During the year ended December 31, 1967, capital bequests received amounted to approximately \$50,000. In the main, the donors of these funds specified that they be used for scholarships and bursaries. A deficit of \$2,383.29 was incurred on the operations of the College for the year ended December 31, 1967. This amount has been charged to the unspecified capital funds of the College bringing the cumulative deficits so charged during the past twenty-four years to \$209,262.22.

The 1967 deficit was less than anticipated due primarily to an increase in the amount of the government grant received during the year and to the fact that the College did not proceed with its plans to use the property at 63 St. George Street. Due

in part to the fact that funds were not available either for operating or capital purposes, the Board agreed to a request from the University of Toronto to rent the building at 63 St. George Street for a period of five years ending in 1972. The opportunity to rent these premises reduced the drain on College funds and it is urgently hoped that funds will be available to the College to make proper use of 63 St. George Street by the end of the rental period.

Plans are being developed for the renovation of space in the basement of the academic wing of the College. This will enable us to begin the various projects which we had in mind for 63 St. George had it been possible to make the repairs and meet the operating expenses of that property for such purposes. Space is required for the extension of library services, graduate students, the Alumni Association and especially for work with Presbyterian students in the University of Toronto. As the initial step in implementing this pilot plan, a large, suitable furnished common room is contemplated which will be useful not only for faculty student fellowship, but as a centre for Presbyterian University students.

No major renovations or improvements to the College building were undertaken during the year, although the Board has endeavoured to carry out any necessary maintenance which is required to keep the building in a good state of repair.

The residence of the College was fully occupied throughout the session. As reported last year, the Board found it necessary to increase the rates charged to \$25.00 per week for non-Church students and \$19.00 per week for theological and Church students, beginning in September, 1967.

Your Board would express appreciation to the donors for gifts received during the past year which are gratefully acknowledged.

Your Board wishes to record its tribute to the life and work of one of its most distinguished graduates. Professor David Keith Andrews, graduated from the University of Toronto with first class honours in the honour course in Greek and Hebrew. In the same year he entered Knox College, carrying on post-graduate studies at the University of Toronto concurrently with his course in Theology. He obtained his M.A. degree from the University in June 1935, and graduated from Knox College in 1936.

In 1945 following several years of post-graduate study in Europe and Chicago, and a teaching period in the United States, he received his Ph.D. from Chicago.

Dr. Andrews returned to accept the Chair of Old Testament Literature and Exegesis in Knox College. His scholarship and teaching were distinguished by a devotion to the truth. His loss will be sorely felt not only by Knox College, but throughout the whole Church.

In commenting on the work of the College your Board would express a word of sincere appreciation to the Reverend Donald R. McKillican, Dean of Students, who, at the request of the directors of the National Development Fund, undertook extra duties in connection with the Fund, while carrying on his duties at the College. We commend to the General Assembly the excellent work carried on by all members of the Faculty, and the Library staff, under the very able direction of Principal Dr. J. Stanley Glen.

REPORT OF THE SENATE OF KNOX COLLEGE

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

The Senate of Knox College begs to submit its 124th Annual Report. During the 1967-1968 academic session 41 students were enrolled in the undergraduate department, of which 31 were in the regular course, 5 in the Assembly course and 5 occasionals (two full time). This meant an increase of 4 in the number of regular students over last year (1966-1967). In the postgraduate department there were 34 students of whom 4 were enrolled for the B.D. degree, 27 for the Th.M. degree and 3 for the Th.D. degree. Most of these were part time students. The number for the B.D. degree does not include, of course, the undergraduate students (16) enrolled for the B.D. electives.

In November the College and the whole Church were saddened by the death of Professor D. Keith Andrews following an illness of several months. The loss sustained to the faculty and students and to all who knew and loved Professor Andrews, and who profited by his friendship, scholarship and wisdom, is incalculable. The whole

academic session was deeply conditioned by the sad awareness that he was not among us. The students, faculty members and Senate have in mind a suitable memorial which we hope will consist of the publication of some of Professor Andrews' scholarly works — perhaps on the Psalms and/or the Book of Jeremiah. A suitable tribute has been inscribed in the Senate Minutes (Feb. 20, 1968) which is substantially the same as that submitted to Presbytery for inclusion in the Acts and Proceedings of the Ninety-Fourth General Assembly.

Under the circumstances the College was fortunate in securing the services of Professor Thomas Barnett, M.A. in September at short notice to lecture in the Old Testament department for the entire academic session. Professor Barnett was able to provide the desired courses with a minimum of interruption of the academic sequence. The Senate and Faculty are most grateful to him for his kindly and competent assistance at a time of urgent need. He was formerly Professor of Old Testament at Wycliffe College, a sister college on the Toronto Campus and known to us all.

The gratitude of the College is also expressed to the following sessional lecturers: Rev. R. P. Carter (Christian Education); Mr. Peter Gilbert (Hebrew); Rev. James Jack (New Testament Greek); Mr. H. Rosevear, F.C.C.O., F.T.C.L. (Church Music). Gratitude is expressed to Professor Robert Dobbie of Emmanuel College for the acceptance into his Elementary Hebrew Class of those of our first year students beginning this subject and also for his supervision of one of our Th.M. students in the field of Old Testament. Gratitude is expressed to Professor Stuart McCullough, Department of Near Eastern Studies, University College, for his supervision of the doctoral thesis in Old Testament of Professor Teigen who was enrolled in the post-graduate department.

On September 20, in the College Chapel, the Presbytery of East Toronto inducted into the Chair of the History and Philosophy of Religion and Christian Ethics, Professor William James Stalker Farris, M.A., Ph.D. The title of his inaugural address was "Theological Intimations in the Time of the Secular".

On October 31st, an historical plaque was unveiled in recognition of Macdonald-Mowat House, 63 St. George Street, Toronto. The project was sponsored by Knox College in co-operation with the Historical Branch of the Department of Public Records and Archives of Ontario at the request of the latter. The plaque was unveiled by Dr. Joan Harrison, Great-granddaughter of Sir Oliver Mowat, and the address given by Professor J. M. S. Careless, History Department, University of Toronto. His Worship, Mayor William Dennison of the City of Toronto and other dignitaries were in attendance.

For the purpose of the records we insert herewith the pertinent facts regarding Macdonald-Mowat House: "Sir John A. Macdonald, Canada's first Prime Minister, purchased this house in 1876 and lived there between 1876 and 1878. He owned the property until 1886, and it was occupied by his son, Hugh John, 1879-1882. The Hon. Oliver Mowat, Prime Minister of Ontario, bought and occupied the house in 1888, and retained ownership until 1902. The property was leased 1897-1898 to the Hon. Arthur Sturgis Hardy, who succeeded Mowat as Prime Minister, and sold to Knox College in 1910. Knox College still retains ownership of it under the Trustee Board of the Presbyterian Church in Canada."

During the latter part of the autumn term the faculty undertook a detailed self-study project, on the basis of material provided by the American Association of Theological Schools. An extensive report was submitted to the Association prior to the visit of its inspection team in January for the purposes of accreditation. The team consisted of five members, the Chairman of which was Dr. Raymond Morris of Yale University. The report of the inspection team through the office of the Association is not yet available. Earlier we had learned that notation 1:1 against the College for having too large a percentage of students without college degrees had been removed.

The College is grateful to Mrs. Maude Turnbull of London, Ontario, for the gift of two side chairs of matching design to be used behind the Communion Table in the Chapel. These were given as a memorial to her husband who graduated from the University of Toronto in Arts and from Knox College in Theology (Travelling Scholar) and who was killed in action in World War I at Vimy Ridge, 1917, shortly

after graduation. The amount of his travelling scholarship was later given to Mrs. Turnbull who after an interval of years has decided to provide this lasting tribute to her distinguished husband. The chairs will be dedicated at an appropriate time in the near future, probably at the opening of College in September.

At its annual meeting towards the end of November the Toronto Graduate School of Theology (incorporated) of which Knox College is a member, agreed to secure professional assistance to undertake a study of its resources, program and future policy. The circumstances prompting this decision pertained chiefly to the fact that the University of Toronto is expected to establish a graduate department of religion offering an M.A., Ph.D. program. There is some indication that the University will depend in part on the teaching staff of the various theological colleges on campus. The assistance of the American Association of Theological Schools has been solicited and more particularly its Resources Planning Commission with the possibility of financial aid from the Sealantic Fund. A co-operative study is being planned with a view to strengthening and developing the graduate program. At the same time the various undergraduate programs will be examined to see how these might be strengthened and developed. The whole study will probably require several years. The Senate will be giving the subject a special place on its agenda at its meeting in September.

Caven Library, named after the late Principal William Caven, who served in that capacity from 1878 to 1904, is well stored with a rich collection of theological books. Our holdings of some sixty thousand volumes are designed to serve in at least three areas. Our primary concern must be, of course, our students preparing for the work of the ministry up to the B.D. level. Beyond that we are committed to a graduate program leading to the M.Th. and Th.D. degrees, for which extensive research materials are required. Finally, we aim to serve our ministers by lending them books for the continuation of their studies, particularly in sermon preparation. For this purpose a mail order service is maintained.

Our policy is to avoid unnecessary duplication of library materials on the campus. We are, however, rather single-minded in our endeavour to continue building in the fields of Biblical studies, Church history with emphasis on the Reformation, Reformed doctrine, Christian ethics, world religions and the philosophy of religion. Furthermore, while we never give up our search for wanted older works in the classical theological disciplines, we are fully aware of the need for keeping abreast of the current theological and social movements in these significant times. Our library service is designed to make our materials readily available.

No. 1 — SYNOD OF HAMILTON AND LONDON

*Re: FUNCTIONS AND PRACTICES OF CHURCH COURTS**To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:*

No. 3 — PRESBYTERY OF MONTREAL

*Re: RECRUITMENT FOR THE MINISTRY**To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:*

WHEREAS, the situation in our Church in regard to recruitment for the Ministry and retention of ministers in pastoral charges is grave, and the outlook for the future alarming, and

WHEREAS, this situation has been studied by the Woods Gordon firm of business consultants, and the following Recommendations made:—

1. That a detailed study be made, leading to the ultimate formation of a permanent full-time Secretariat, solely responsible for ministerial supply and recruiting in all its aspects.
2. That a comparative and detailed study be made of ministerial stipends, allowances, and ancillary benefits, designed to establish a substantially improved standard of living commensurate with the academic and professional standing of the minister.
3. That a detailed plan be prepared to cover the creation and administration of a series of Scholarships, designed to support qualified candidates for the Presbyterian Ministry, during the candidate's pre-seminary and seminary years of study.
4. That a thorough examination be made of current policies and practices of the two Presbyterian Colleges in Canada, in relation to trends in theological education in North America.

WHEREAS, the Presbytery of Montreal has studied the Woods Gordon Report, and at a regular meeting on November 14th, 1967 approved the following Recommendations:—

1. That Presbytery approve in principle all four Recommendations of the Woods Gordon Report.
2. That Presbytery write to all Kirk Sessions, requesting that they study the Woods Gordon Report and make known to their congregations the grave situation with regard to recruitment, either by correspondence, or by devoting a Sunday Service to it, or both.
3. That Presbytery request the Committee on the National Development Fund to clarify their intentions (if any) with regard to the improvement of ministers' pensions.
4. That Presbytery recommend to the Board and Senate of Presbyterian College that the funds presently available for bursaries and scholarships be consolidated, to provide more substantial amounts for the greater assistance of recipients.
5. That Presbytery recommend that the enlargement of capital funds for scholarships and bursaries be encouraged.
6. That Presbytery recommend to the Board and Senate of the Presbyterian College that steps be taken to re-examine the possibilities of a closer relationship between the Presbyterian College and the Faculty of Divinity of McGill University.
7. That Presbytery request the General Assembly Committee on Articles of Faith to expedite its revision of the Church's relationship to its subordinate standards.
8. That Presbytery request the General Assembly to instruct all Boards and/or Committees dealing with the matters involved in this Report to keep all Presbyteries closely informed of their progress.
9. That Presbytery recommend to the General Assembly that the present Committee on Recruitment be dissolved and be replaced by a full-time Secretariat with an adequate staff, and supported by a Council.
10. That Presbytery prepare an Overture or Overtures to the General Assembly to the effect that action on all the above Recommendations be taken without undue delay, and that copies of this Overture be sent to all Presbyteries and Boards of the Church.
11. That this Report, with its Recommendations, as approved or amended, be the reply of the Presbytery to the Board of the Presbyterian College.

THEREFORE, the Presbytery of Montreal humbly overtures the Venerable the General Assembly to take action to implement the Recommendations of the Woods Gordon

Report and the further Recommendations of the Presbytery of Montreal as expeditiously as possible, or to do otherwise for this purpose as in its wisdom may seem best.

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

WHEREAS, the Board of Knox College have requested Presbyteries to submit nominations for the vacant Chair of Old Testament in Knox College; and

WHEREAS, the Presbytery of Kootenay has shown its concern regarding the mission of the Church as it relates to our Colleges and their usefulness to Christ's Church in Overture No. 3 Acts and Proceedings, 1967, pp. 414-415

'Whereas, the purpose of the Church of Christ is primarily missionary, and Whereas, much of the resources of The Presbyterian Church in Canada are being utilized in the education and training of ministers, and Whereas, the work, presently being carried on in two colleges, could be adequately performed by one college at greatly reduced cost to the church, and

Whereas, any loss of certain trust funds implied by such a proposed amalgamation would be negligible in comparison to the present heavy drain on church funds (\$159,000 1965), and

Whereas, present facilities and staff of either college could adequately serve present, and probable future, combined student enrollment, and

Whereas, monies and personnel freed by having one college are sorely needed in other aspects of the church's mission,'

and
WHEREAS, the Presbytery of Bruce has shown a similar concern in Overture No. 4, Acts and Proceedings, 1967, p. 415

'Whereas, the supply of students for our two colleges, Knox College, Toronto and Presbyterian College, Montreal, is small, and

Whereas, the number of Professors, while few in each, could be used to better advantage if one professor occupied two chairs, and commuted between Montreal and Toronto on certain days of the week, and lectured to students in both colleges on his special discipline, and

Whereas, the funds for the upkeep of our colleges must come from the dedicated people in congregations; and these are now quite critical about anything in the Church that seems unnecessary or wasteful,

and

WHEREAS, the Presbytery of Kamloops shares this concern,

THEREFORE, we, the Presbytery of Kamloops, humbly overture the Venerable the General Assembly either to seek a Professor from one of the Theological Colleges in the Toronto area to lecture in Old Testament at Knox College, or to appoint the Professor of Old Testament in Presbyterian College, Montreal, to the chair (he commuting between Montreal and Toronto on certain days of the week), or to do otherwise as the General Assembly in its wisdom deems best.

No. 10 — PRESBYTERY OF OTTAWA

Re: RECRUITS, STIPENDS AND PENSIONS

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

WHEREAS, the church in all denominations is faced with an acute shortage of ministers, together with a diminishing number of candidates for the ministry, and

WHEREAS, all the churches have been engaged in extensive studies of the problem, and

WHEREAS, the situation demands immediate action, and

WHEREAS, the present inadequate stipends on the one hand discourage potential recruits, and on the other hand, force others to leave the ministry, and

WHEREAS, the pensions offered by the Church are hopelessly unrealistic in light of the cost of living, and when compared to the pension offered by government and industry.

THEREFORE, the Presbytery of Ottawa humbly overtures the Venerable the General Assembly to take immediate steps:

- I. 1. To institute an adequately financed campaign immediately throughout the church to secure recruits for the ministry.
2. To refer the said campaign, including personnel and budget requirements initially to a committee consisting of the Dean of Students of Knox College, his counterpart at Presbyterian College, and Dr. Findlay Stewart.
3. The said committee to prepare recommendations to be distributed to Presbyteries and to be presented to the next General Assembly.
- II. To establish immediately a minimum stipend of \$7700.00 per year, including house and exclusive of travel allowances which should be commensurate with the requirement of the particular parish, and in future planning to give the highest priority to ministerial stipends.
- III. To take immediate steps to raise the maximum pension to \$2700.00 at age 65 or after 35 years service and to consider ways of raising the pension as soon as possible to a total including government pension, of 70% of current minimum stipend.

Or to do otherwise to these ends as the Venerable, the General Assembly in its wisdom may deem best.

No. 14 — PRESBYTERY OF BRAMPTON

*Re REVISION OF SECTION 125e, THE BOOK OF FORMS**To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:*

WHEREAS, Section 125 (e), of the Book of Forms requires that the names of those members who have not attended communion for three years be removed from the Communion Roll, and
 WHEREAS, many Sessions hesitate to remove the names of these persons because of the possibility that they may return to the Church if some contact is maintained by the Minister and elders, and
 WHEREAS, it would seem that those members having been led by the grace of God to join with the Church of Christ, it should be left to God to decide whether or not they are still members of that Church, and
 WHEREAS, the Minister and elders will no longer visit those whose names have been removed, thereby removing the opportunity to counsel them as to the benefits of the Christian life and their Christian duty to God, to others and to themselves, and
 WHEREAS, the only situation where the above rule might be applied without harm is the case of those who have moved beyond the reach of the local congregation, and
 WHEREAS, many persons do not immediately transfer Church Membership on leaving the community, and because of the increasing mobility of the members of our modern society, this results in the membership lists of the Churches becoming more and more inflated, and thus destroying their accuracy,
 THEREFORE, the Kirk-Session of Knox Church, Milton, humbly overtures the Venerable, the General Assembly, to delete Section 125 (e) of the Book of Forms, and substitute I. a rule permitting the deletion of the names of those who have both — (1) left the ordinary geographical boundaries of the congregation, by having moved more than one-half the distance to the next nearest congregation of this denomination in that direction; and (2) have not attended a communion service in three years without a sufficient reason known to the Session; the Session

being required to have contacted them, by whatever means shall be deemed best if their addresses be known; every possible effort having been made to obtain same, and to have encouraged them to transfer their membership to a local congregation and advised them of this rule, at least one year prior to removal of their names from the Communion Roll; the grounds for removal to be "Non-Resident"; and II. a rule permitting the placing of the names of those who are not covered by Cause (1), of the grounds of removal, and who have not attended Communion for three years, on an inactive list, which would not be used for Budget allocation purposes, but which persons would continue to be communicants, and to be the pastoral responsibility of Minister and elders; or to do otherwise as the General Assembly in its wisdom shall deem best.

Re SUPPLEMENT TO THE BOOK OF PRAISE

To the Venerable the 94th General Assembly:

WHEREAS, the Venerable the General Assembly has appointed a committee to revise the Book of Praise;

WHEREAS, there is reason to believe that the theology of the laity is supported and directed as much if not more by the theology of hymns sung in Church services as through that learned from sermons;

WHEREAS, there is a widespread theological ferment in the Church today as Christians

attempt to express their faith in contemporary terms, understandable to a contemporary world;

WHEREAS, the Presbyterian Church in Canada has at this time a Statement of Faith under preparation;

WHEREAS, the hymns of the Church should act as a vehicle of expression for that Statement of Faith;

WHEREAS, a few hymns are being written today expressing the faith in a modern idiom, — a practice which needs much encouragement;

WHEREAS, the Committee on Revision proposes to produce a hard cover Book of Praise consisting largely of a variety of old hymns from long extant sources which could conceivably fixate theological expression among the laity at a point in yester years;

WHEREAS, the new book of Praise will undoubtedly raise unnecessary, heated controversy, in many congregations, particularly those not disposed to adapt to change, even in choice of hymns;

WHEREAS, the Book of Praise promises to be an expensive venture when produced as a hard cover music edition;

WHEREAS, an inexpensive good quality soft cover edition, containing with music, a quantity of both the new hymns and the much loved older hymns which are not at present contained in the Book of Praise, would act as a useful supplement to the existing Book of Praise and familiarize congregations with hymns that would be new to them while allowing time for the writing of further new hymns that speak to the modern world;

WHEREAS, this could be expanded if required to a series with additional soft cover books as new hymns were written over a period of time and would reach the congregations much earlier than the more expensive and more extensive hard cover edition thereby introducing the congregations to the changes in hymnology with a minimum of controversy and at a nominal cost in funds;

WHEREAS, the soft cover editions would either prepare the way for the larger hard cover edition, or indicate that the proposed hard cover edition with its fixed choice of hymns is obsolete for the modern age;

THEREFORE, we the Presbytery of Winnipeg humbly overture the Venerable the General Assembly to give serious consideration to producing a series of inexpensive good quality soft cover editions along the lines suggested above for use as a supplement to the existing Book of Praise, until such time as the publication of a hard cover edition is deemed advisable; or do otherwise for this object as they in their wisdom deem best.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Year ended December 31, 1967

- Fixed assets are shown mainly at cost but include properties which have been donated and on which a fair value has been placed at the time of acquisition.
- Accumulated depreciation, covering all properties and furniture and fixtures, has been increased by \$205,700 by a transfer from capital.
- The assets and liabilities of Knox, Presbyterian and Ewart Colleges, Saskatoon Residence, Armagh and St. Andrew's Hall are included in the balance sheet only to the extent of fixed assets.
- On instruction of The Trustee Board all securities held on behalf of the Church were revalued at the market prices prevailing on December 31, 1967 and have been so stated in all the financial reports.
- Except for the amount allocated from the Budget, no receipts or disbursements have been included in the statement of income and expenditure for the following:
Knox, Presbyterian and Ewart Colleges, St. Andrew's Hall, Saskatoon Residence, Pension Fund, Penmarvian, Presbyterian Record, Armagh.
- Income of the J. B. Maclean Bequest Fund has been included in the statement of income and expenditure only to the extent of the amount received from the fund (\$45,000). A separate statement covering this fund has been prepared.
- The assets and liabilities of the Pension Fund are not included in this statement. A separate statement covering this fund has been prepared.
- Pursuant to authority given by the 86th General Assembly (A. & P. pages 310 and 89) an Assistant Director, Presbyterian Men was appointed effective October 1, 1964. This is at no cost to the Church. However, salary and expenses have been charged to the regular accounts of the Presbyterian Men in order to portray the costs of the work. This results in an apparent over-expenditure which, however, has been offset by special gifts.
- Changes in authorized expenditures by the Administrative Council, subsequent to General Assembly are included.
- Current account cash includes separate bank accounts amounting to \$48,181 representing unexpended income of endowment and restricted funds.
- Authorized expenditures included an amount of \$75,000 for increased travel allowances and stipends. Amounts actually expended were charged to Home and Overseas Missions and authorized expenditures were increased accordingly. Home required \$49,816 and Overseas \$9,860 leaving a difference of \$15,324 unexpended.
- Expenditures for the new Church Offices at 50 Wynford Drive, Don Mills, Ontario (the Walter Gow Memorial Building), which had largely been made out of the Walter Gow Fund (page 433) were added to Property Accounts. Total amount for land, building and furniture was \$832,632.

THE SYNOD OF THE ATLANTIC PROVINCES

THE REVEREND JOSEPH CATHCART

The Presbytery of Cape Breton desires to place on record its profound sense of loss in the death, on July 22, 1967, of the Rev. Joseph Cathcart, in Harbour View Hospital, Sydney Mines. He had been ill for only ten days previous to his death.

Born in Belfast, Ireland, sixty-nine years ago, he came to Canada in 1920. Some years later he took studies preparatory to entering Presbyterian College, Montreal, from which he graduated in 1934. In that same year he came to Cape Breton, and after serving the Church at Grand River for a few months he began his ministry at Louisbourg, where he was ordained and inducted on November 18, 1935. He was minister at Louisbourg for seven years. In 1942 he accepted a call to Bobcaygeon and Rosedale, in the Presbytery of Lindsay, where he served for eleven years. In 1953 he returned to Cape Breton and in July of that year he was inducted as minister of Orangedale, Malagawatch, and River Denys. Two years later he accepted a call to Westville, Presbytery of Pictou. After two years at Westville he accepted a third call to Cape Breton, and in September 1957 he became minister of North River and Shore, where he served the Church faithfully for a period of ten years until his death.

Mr. Cathcart was not only a faithful pastor but also a loyal servant of the Church in its courts and activities. He was a devout man, and a preacher with a strong evangelical message.

The funeral service was held in St. Andrew's Church, North River Bridge, on July 25th, 1967, under the auspices of the Presbytery of Cape Breton. The Moderator, Rev. A. D. MacKinnon, conducted the service. The sermon was preached by Rev. Neil J. MacLean, who was a son-in-law of Mr. Cathcart. Those taking part in the service were Rev. Wallace MacKinnon and Rev. Murdock J. MacRae. Burial was at River Bennett, in one of the cemeteries of the pastoral charge.

Mr. Cathcart is survived by his widow; a daughter, Grace (Mrs. Rev. Wallace E. Whyte), Chatham, New Brunswick; and a son, Thomas J., in Montreal. Another daughter, who died in 1958, was Ruth (Mrs. Neil J. MacLean).

THE REVEREND ANGUS WILLIAM RUGG MACKENZIE

The Presbytery of Cape Breton records its deep sense of loss in the sudden death, in Sydney, on May 20, 1967, of the Rev. A. W. R. MacKenzie.

Born in Portree, Isle of Skye, Scotland, seventy-six years ago, he came to Canada in 1913. He served in World War I, after which he entered Presbyterian College, from which he graduated in 1929. His first pastoral charge was Spencerville-East Oxford, in the Presbytery of Brockville, which he served until 1935. In May 1936, he became minister at Baddeck, in the Presbytery of Cape Breton, where he served for six years. In 1942 he was chaplain at Argentia, Newfoundland, and later in that year he resigned from the active ministry.

In 1938 Mr. MacKenzie established the Gaelic College of Celtic Arts and Crafts, at St. Ann's, Cape Breton, and he directed this institution for twenty-nine years, up to the time of his death. He developed the Nova Scotia Mod, an annual event which has become popular in Eastern Nova Scotia, and beyond. In all this development Mr. MacKenzie was ably assisted by his wife, who died in 1960.

During the last thirty years of his life Mr. MacKenzie did much to keep Scottish traditions alive in Nova Scotia.

The funeral service was held in Sydney on May 24th. The Moderator of Presbytery, Reverend A. D. MacKinnon conducted the service, assisted by Reverend E. H.

Bean and Reverend Charles A. MacDonald. Burial was at St. Ann's, near the scene of Mr. MacKenzie's labours for so many years.

Mr. MacKenzie is survived by a brother in Scotland and two sisters in the United States.

SYNOD OF MONTREAL AND OTTAWA

THE REVEREND DEREK A. P. ALLEN, M.A.

The late Mr. Allen was born in County Donegal, Ireland, on April 22, 1928. He received his M.A. degree from Trinity College, Dublin and graduated in Theology from the Presbyterian College, Belfast. Ordained in October 1952, he served the Presbyterian Church of Ireland until 1957 when he came to North Battleford, Saskatchewan as Minister of St. Andrew's Church. In 1958 he was called by St. Paul's congregation Oshawa, Ontario and under his leadership, a new church was built. St. Timothy's, Ottawa, extended a call to Mr. Allen in 1964 and in September of that year he was inducted by Ottawa Presbytery. He settled in the capital with his wife and two sons and from the very beginning gave evidence that he was a true minister of the Gospel, possessing spiritual grace and quiet warmth and understanding in his relationships with his people.

Mr. Allen preached the Word with clarity and insight and through the pulpit he brought a blessing to his congregation, Sunday by Sunday. He was happy in his work in St. Timothy's and it appeared that he could look forward to a long and fruitful ministry there. But his health became impaired and after a courageous struggle he died on November 1st, 1967. It was characteristic of him that he not only made his own peace with God but helped to prepare his wife and sons and friends for the day when he would be with them no longer.

Presbytery expresses its own sorrow in the death of Mr. Allen but gives thanks to God for his life and example. It extends its deepest sympathy to Mrs. Allen and her two sons and to their many friends in St. Timothy's and Ottawa. May all be comforted and inspired by the memory of a man who dedicated his life to the service of God and mankind and never counted the cost to himself.

MAJOR THE REVEREND G. LLOYD FULFORD, C.D., B.A., M.A.

The death of Major the Reverend George Lloyd Fulford, C.D., B.A., M.A., occurred at the age of sixty-six years, at St. Anne's Veterans' Hospital, St. Anne de Bellevue, Quebec, on the 23rd day of November, 1967. Mr. Fulford, although stricken with a fatal illness nine years ago, continued active until the early autumn of this year.

A graduate of McGill University, Montreal, and of The Presbyterian College, Montreal, he had a faithful career in the Ministry, as a Chaplain with Hospital and Field Ambulance Unit in World War II and in forms of Social Service enterprise. He was a member of Montreal Kiwanis Club and of the Masonic Order. For many years his name has appeared on the appendix to the Roll of the Presbytery of Montreal. At the time of his death he was an Elder and a Trustee of St. James Church at Preville, Quebec.

In the service of the Church and of his country he used his gifts with grace and dedication. Because of his friendly personality, his love for people and his strong conviction, he won the esteem and affection of all those with whom he served. Mr. Fulford was a fine preacher and a faithful pastor. In the pulpit his sermonic work reflected the blending of his insights into the relationship between God and man, which were forged on the anvil of a keen mind, a compassionate heart, an authoritative delivery and a vigorous faith. In the days of good health his name was to be found on many of the Committees of this Presbytery where he gave wise leadership and faithful counsel.

The funeral service was held in the Joseph C. Wray Funeral Chapel, Mountain Street, Montreal, on November 25, and was conducted by his friend of college days back in 1927, The Very Rev. C. Ritchie Bell, D.D. Mr. Fulford's body was cremated at the Mount Royal Crematorium, Montreal. He is survived by his wife, Gladys; and one brother, Ernest L. Fulford of Arnprior, Ontario; two sisters, Edna (Mrs. F. J. McCallum of Oakville, Ontario) and Jean (Mrs. Cecil Lyon of Arnprior, Ontario) and several nieces and nephews.

The sympathy of the Presbytery goes out in full measure to his sorrowing widow and to the members of his family. Though the burden of their sorrow is heavy indeed, yet God has given them the bright pages of memory and the strong wings of hope eternal. His Grace will be sufficient for them even in this hour.

THE REVEREND SIDNEY G. GARLAND, B.A., M.A., B.D.

The Reverend Sidney G. Garland, Chaplain of Queen Mary Veterans' Hospital since 1962, died in hospital December 22, 1967, following a brief illness.

He was born in Lower Island Cove, Conception Bay, Newfoundland, on June 14, 1899. There he received his early schooling. He earned his Teacher's Diploma in 1918, and for the next two years followed the vocation of School Teacher.

Following this he attended McGill University, Montreal, receiving his B.A. with Honours in 1928 and his M.A. in 1929. In 1931 he received his B.D. from the United Theological College, and shortly afterwards was ordained to the Christian Ministry. During these years of higher education at McGill he was active as a lecturer in Sociology in the Evening Division, Sir George Williams University.

His first official pastorate was in Fresh Water, Newfoundland, where he served until he was appointed Chaplain and Dean of Students, Prince of Wales College, St. John's, Newfoundland.

In 1942, Rev. Sidney G. Garland joined the Chaplaincy Service and served in the U.K. and North Western Europe until 1946.

Following this service to God and his country, he accepted a call to the Rosemount Central Church, Montreal. In 1949, he went to West End Presbyterian Church, Albany, New York. There he served until 1954, when he decided to return to Canada.

The call of God took him this time to St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Sherbrooke. It was here on January 30, 1962, that his wife died, leaving him tired and lonely.

He found renewed vigor in the challenge of the Chaplaincy to Queen Mary Veterans' Hospital, which he assumed in September, 1962. There he laboured, until his recent sudden death, with dedication, skill and Christian understanding.

Rev. Sidney G. Garland is survived by five children: M/Sgt. Robert Garland of Ballston Spa; Elizabeth of Ticonderoga, N.Y.; Flight-Lieut. David, Air Transport Command, C.F.B., Trenton; Cpl. Peter, R.C.A.F., B.C.; and Joanne, a student of Memorial University in Newfoundland; and by seven grandchildren.

The Funeral Service from Montreal West Presbyterian Church on December 24, 1967, was conducted by Rev. John A. Simms, assisted by the Rev. James A. Crabb, Moderator of Presbytery, and Father Leo Berthaume, Chaplain (R.C.) of Queen Mary Veterans' Hospital. The Memorial Address was delivered by The Very Rev. C. Ritchie Bell, D.D.

THE REVEREND PRESCOTT WILLIAM MURRAY, B.A., B.D.

The Reverend Prescott William Murray died at his home in Kars, Ontario, on December 20, 1967, at the age of seventy-one.

He was born in York Mills, N.B., where he received his early education. He served as a private in the Canadian Army during the First Great War. On his return to Canada in 1918, he attended McGill University, obtaining a B.A., and in 1930 was graduated from Presbyterian College, Montreal. Mr. Murray served in two congregations in Nova Scotia, Barney's River and in Little Harbour where he suffered a broken back. Incapacitated for six months, he resigned from that charge, and December 1938 was called to the congregation of Erin, Ontario, where he remained until the outbreak of World War II. He enlisted for duty in the Chaplain Service, going overseas in the

fall of 1940. In England he was attached to the Toronto Scottish Regiment as Chaplain, and in France, he became Second in Command of the Chaplain Service of the Second Canadian Division.

H/Major Murray was Mentioned in Despatches for services beyond the call of duty at Falaise in 1944. Invalided home in 1945, H/Major Murray remained in the service of his country until October, 1946 when he was appointed Protestant Chaplain in Queen Mary's Veterans' Hospital, Montreal. He served there until 1961 when he retired to a farm near Ottawa. That same year Presbyterian College Montreal conferred on him the Honorary Degree of Doctor of Divinity (Honoris causa).

Doctor Murray was a man of peace, and yet spent ten years in the service of his country. He leaves behind his wife, Ruth Joy, and his daughter, Mary, Mrs. B. I. Parsons, her husband, Doctor Parsons, and three grand-children, Ian, Susan, and Sara.

SYNOD OF TORONTO AND KINGSTON

THE REVEREND PROFESSOR DAVID KEITH ANDREWS, M.A., Ph.D.

The death of Professor David Keith Andrews on Saturday, November 18, 1967, terminated a distinguished scholarly and academic career, and deprived Knox College and the Presbyterian Church in Canada of a faithful servant of Christ. Professor Andrews was born in 1912 in Calgary, Alberta, secured his High School education in Sarnia, Ontario, and graduated from University College, University of Toronto, in the honour course in Greek and Hebrew with first class honours in June 1933. In the same year he enrolled in theology in Knox College, carrying his post-graduate studies in the University of Toronto concurrently with his course in theology. He obtained his M.A. degree from the University of Toronto in June 1935, and graduated from Knox College in April 1936.

From Knox College he received the Post-Graduate Travelling Scholarship, which took him to New College, Edinburgh, in 1937 after he completed his ordained mission year in Alberta. His program of study in Edinburgh included a period in the University of Tubingen, Germany. He later held a teaching fellowship at the Divinity School and Oriental Institute in the University of Chicago. From 1941-1945 he taught at DePauw University, Indiana, and at the same time pursued graduate work in Aramaic at the University of Chicago, being awarded the Ph.D. degree in 1943. The subject of his thesis was "The Translation of Aramaic Di in the Green Bibles". In 1945 he returned to Canada to accept the Chair of Old Testament Literature and Exegesis in Knox College, a post which he held until his death.

In the spring of 1953 he made a three month study of Palestine, and during the academic session 1963-1964 took Sabbatical leave in Germany. Accompanied by his wife he spent a year at the University of Heidelberg studying with von Rad and Westermann.

Dr. Andrews served for a number of years as the Secretary of the Senate of Knox College, and as the representative of the College on the Committee of Direction of the Toronto Graduate School of Theology. In 1965 he was elected president of the Toronto Oriental Club. Latterly he was a representative of the Presbyterian Church in Canada on the theological committee of the North American Area of the Alliance of Reformed and Presbyterian Churches.

The high quality of his scholarship may be seen in his "Preaching from Proverbs", Canadian Journal of Theology IV, 1958; "Yahweh the God of the Heavens", published in the Meek Festschrift (See Review in Journal of American Oriental Society, 89, 1967) and "The Call Narratives of Isaiah, Jeremiah and Ezekiel" his presidential address to the Oriental Club. This paper was but one fruit of the research which he had devoted in recent years to the Book of Jeremiah.

His scholarship and teaching were distinguished by a fidelity to the biblical text, a desire to explore its historical and archeological context, and to seek relevant com-

parisons. All that he did was motivated by a genuine love of the truth and a desire to further the claims of Christ. His gentle, kindly manner, his patience and care of detail, and his willingness at all times to co-operate contributed greatly to his success as a teacher and his stature as a faculty member. He graced the pulpit with a high standard of preaching which gave to his sermons rich content and inspiration.

He was a devoted servant of Jesus Christ, faithful presbyter, kind friend, distinguished scholar, capable teacher, and a wise counsellor.

The funeral service was held in Glenview Presbyterian Church, Toronto, and was conducted by the minister, Reverend Dr. James Williams, assisted by the Moderator of the Presbytery of East Toronto, Reverend Eoin Mackay, Prof. David W. Hay, and Dr. R. K. Cameron. The Memorial Sermon was preached by Reverend Professor David W. Hay of Knox College.

Professor Andrews is survived by his wife, the former Dorothy Glazier, and his daughter Catherine (Mrs. James Spence), and his son David.

THE REVEREND JAMES DICKSON, D.D.

The Presbytery of East Toronto desires to place on record its tribute to the memory of one of our esteemed senior missionaries, Dr. James I. Dickson, who was a member of this Presbytery. For 38 years Dr. Dickson served as an overseas missionary of the Presbyterian Church in Canada. The whole Church shares in the sense of loss of this devoted servant of God who passed to his reward on June 15, 1967, in Formosa, where he laboured for so long.

Dr. Dickson was born in South Dakota in 1900. While attending Macalister College in 1922 he was challenged by the Student Volunteer Movement to enlist for overseas work. After graduating from College and obtaining his Bachelor of Theology at Princeton Seminary, he applied, with his wife, for work in Korea. The Board, however, requested them to go to Formosa. They accepted this challenge and change in plans with obedience and joy. They never regretted the course taken, and learned to love the people of Formosa. Labouring among them with a zeal and sacrificial spirit, Dr. Dickson was greatly beloved and respected.

As principal of Taiwan Theological College he was responsible for its relocation on the scenic slopes of Yan Ming Shan outside Taipei, and for the many fine buildings that have been erected on the beautiful campus. Dr. Dickson was instrumental in setting up a program for rebuilding mountain churches by which light bamboo structures were replaced with sturdy stone buildings able to withstand the destruction of typhoons year by year. He devoted himself as an evangelist, working among the aboriginal mountain tribes people with a passion that carried him even into the territory of former head-hunters whose confidence and affection he soon won. His efforts resulted in the formation of the Mountain Work Committee of the Presbyterian Church of Formosa and subsequently in the establishment of two Presbyteries in the mountain tribal areas.

Dr. Dickson served on many committees of the General Assembly, Synod and Presbyteries of the Presbyterian Church of Formosa, and was always willing to train others who would replace him so that leadership would pass to the hands of his Formosan colleagues. Though he spent the greater part of his missionary service in Formosa, he was appointed during World War II to work temporarily in British Guiana. He saw the need for training Guianese leadership and his efforts towards this end resulted in setting up a training college for evangelists and led to the ordination of the first Guianese ministers in the Canadian mission. Subsequently the Presbytery of Guiana was formed and the foundations of an indigenous Church were laid before Dr. Dickson returned to the Island of Formosa. He resumed his itinerating ministry in the mountains taking the Good News of the gospel to the humble tribal peoples who responded to an amazing degree. Through the efforts of the mountain work committee leadership and the many men and women who were faithful Christians among the mountain tribes, more than 350 Presbyterian churches were established. It was to this fruitful work that Dr. Dickson gave vigorous support for many years.

It is gratifying to note that in 1953 Dr. Dickson was given a citation from Macalister College for distinguished service on the frontline of the Kingdom, and that

in 1960 he was honoured by having conferred on him the degree of Doctor of Divinity (honoris causa) by Knox College, Toronto.

For family reasons Dr. Dickson found it necessary to resign from active service as a missionary of the Presbyterian Church in Canada in 1965, when his resignation was accepted with greatest regret by the General Assembly. Though in retirement Dr. Dickson remained tireless in his activity in the many tasks of the Kingdom, travelling frequently from his home in the United States to undertake deputation work throughout our Church in Canada, and maintaining an energetic interest in the work of the Presbyterian Church of Formosa.

The heartfelt sympathy of the Presbytery of East Toronto is extended to Mrs. Dickson and members of the family in their great loss. On Sunday June 25th, 1967, a memorial service was held at 7 p.m. in Knox Church, with which Dr. and Mrs. Dickson were associated, in Toronto. The arrangements were made by the Chairman of the General Board of Missions and the Overseas Secretary in consultation with Dr. Fitch and representatives from the Presbytery of East Toronto.

While saddened by the great loss sustained by the Church in the passing of a good and faithful servant we rejoice in the confidence that he is now in the Master's presence and that he has now entered into the joy of his Lord, whom he so diligently served in the years given to him among the beloved people of Formosa.

THE REVEREND CREBA A. MacSWEEN

On February 17, 1968, the Rev. Creba A. MacSween died at Campbellford, Ontario, at the age of 50.

Prior to his Call to serve as a Minister, Mr. MacSween served in the Royal Canadian Navy 1942-1946. For nine years he was employed as a Public Health Officer including six years under the R.C.A.F. He studied at the University of Manitoba and graduated from Knox College in 1958. He served as a Minister of the Presbyterian Church in Canada at Scotsburn, Nova Scotia for 3 years, at Hamilton, Bermuda for 5 years and at Campbellford and Burnbrae 1½ years.

Mr. MacSween was faithful in his responsibilities in the Courts of the Church and a leader on the various committees on which he served. He was Moderator of the Presbytery of Peterborough at his death.

He is survived by his wife, the former Marjorie Christie, two daughters, Mrs. T. L. (Sheila) Trott of Weston, Anna, 9, at home, six sisters and three brothers.

His only son died following a traffic accident in Bermuda in 1962.

The funeral service was held in St. Andrew's Church, Campbellford, Ontario, with the Rev. A. A. Bethune, Clerk of Presbytery conducting. He was assisted by the Rev. K. E. Wilcox, Acting Moderator, who brought the Message and the Rev. A. E. Toombs, Minister of St. Andrew's until his retirement, led in prayer. A second service was held in Knox Church, Kincardine where he was ordained in June, 1958. The Moderator of Presbytery of Bruce-Maitland, Rev. T. J. McKinney of Teeswater began the service, the Rev. Wm. Knox of Paisley preached the sermon and the Rev. James R. Weir, Minister of Knox Church, Kincardine read the scriptures, gave the prayers and the Benediction. Interment was in Kincardine Cemetery where the service was conducted by the Rev. James Weir, who as Legion Chaplain also led the Legion service.

THE REVEREND N. SHARKEY, B.A.

The death occurred suddenly en route to Toronto for treatment of the Rev. Norman Sharkey on July 27, 1967, minister of Mackay Presbyterian Church, Timmins, Ontario, in his 59th year.

He was born in Montreal and received his early education there. He received his degree from McGill, and graduated from Presbyterian College. He held charges in Bristol, P.Q.; St. Andrew's, N.B.; Kirkhill, Lancaster, Cochrane, and Timmins, Ontario. He served in the chaplaincy service from 1939-1945, first with the Cameron Highlanders and then with the Second HAA Artillery, during which time he won mention in despatches. He also served with the Armed Forces of Occupation in

Germany for a period following 1951.

He is survived by two sons, Norman, of Vancouver, B.C., and James, of Ottawa, Ontario, and one daughter, Marilyn (Mrs. W. Smith), Los Angeles, California, and by one brother, Rev. Sydney Sharkey, Tisdale, Saskatchewan. Also surviving are six grandchildren.

The funeral service was held on Monday, July 31st, 1967, the Presbytery of Temiskaming being in charge. Rev. T. A. A. Duke, Moderator, conducted the service. Interment followed in Timmins Memorial Gardens.

Throughout his life, he endeavoured to be a faithful preacher of the Gospel. He was well known and sought after for his ability in TV and radio work.

SYNOD OF HAMILTON AND LONDON

THE REVEREND CHARLES CARNEGIE, D.D.

The Rev. Charles Carnegie, D.D., died in Hamilton on December 25th, 1967, at the age of 80 years. Born at Dundee, Scotland, he came to Canada as a young man and entered the business world in Western Canada.

Dr. Carnegie entered the active ministry later than most and paid a higher price than most in doing so. In a time of great need in our denomination, he turned his back on a career in business which could give him great material benefits and answered the call to the Ministry. With responsibility for four young children, it was not an easy decision to make, but with the completely loving and loyal support of his wonderful wife he entered upon and successfully completed his theological training at Presbyterian College, Montreal, and was ordained to the ministry in 1936. No one, apart from his wife and family, can ever fully appreciate the struggles and trials of those days, but never once was the decision regretted.

Dr. Carnegie served at Campbell Memorial, Montreal; Rodney, Ontario; Streetsville, Ontario; and Summerside, P.E.I., before coming to St. David's Church, Hamilton, in 1949. He served as Moderator of several Presbyteries, and was elected Moderator of the Synod of Hamilton and London in 1956. He served on numerous Boards and Committees of the Church. The Doctor of Divinity degree was conferred upon him in 1948 by the Presbyterian College in recognition of his service to the Presbyterian Church in Canada. He retired in 1962.

His strong preaching, faithful parish care, and expert knowledge of procedure added lustre to the ministry in the congregations he served and in the several Courts of the Church. His fellow Presbyters will always be grateful for his wise counsel, his sane judgement, his high concept of the ministry, his undeviating determination that all things should be done decently and in order. In all things pertaining to worship he set a high standard of reverence and conduct. As a dedicated minister, he served his Lord with faithfulness and ever adorned the Ministry of the Word and Sacrament.

Dr. Carnegie is survived by his wife, Mina, and four sons, David of Summerside, P.E.I., Robert of London, Ontario, Keith of Oakville, Ontario, and Stanley of Stouffville, Ontario. The funeral service was held in Hamilton with Dr. A. Lorne Mackay, a close personal friend, conducting and delivering the Memorial Address. Dr. John A. Johnston and the Rev. D. Glenn Campbell assisted in the Service. Interment took place in the Rodney Cemetery, Rodney, Ontario.

THE REVEREND CHARLES L. COWAN, B.A., B.D., D.D.

The Rev. C. L. Cowan, B.A., B.D., D.D., died in Ottawa on May 21st, 1968, at the age of 83 years. A native of Lanarkshire, Scotland, he came to Canada as a young man and studied Arts and Theology at the University of Manitoba, from which

he was graduated in 1912. He was ordained to the Holy Ministry in the same year and served in mission stations among the lumber camps of British Columbia. He later held pastorates at Rainy River and Fort Frances, and at Picton, Ontario.

In May, 1925, he was called to St. Andrew's Church, Hamilton, where he laboured as a beloved pastor and friend for forty years. During his ministry there, six young men entered the ranks of the ministry. Inspired by his example they have served the Church with distinction both in Canada and Overseas. Dr. Cowan was the author of several books, and under the pen name of "Roman Collar" he contributed articles to several periodicals.

An outstanding churchman, he served as Moderator of the Synod of Hamilton and London, and as president of the Hamilton Council of Churches, of which he was a co-founder. For several years he was convener of the General Assembly's Board of Evangelism and Social Action. He was chairman of the committee which revised the Book of Common Order in 1936. He also served for several years as Convener of the Assembly's Committee on Church Worship. In recognition of his service to the Church the degree of Doctor of Divinity was conferred upon him in 1946 by Knox College. He also received the degree of Doctor of Divinity from United College, Winnipeg, his Alma Mater. In 1949 he was elected Moderator of the 75th General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

He was married to the former Marcia Waddell who predeceased him in 1963. Surviving are one son, Glenn Keith of Ottawa, a brother, Walter of Glasgow, Scotland, and two sisters, Mrs. Susan Patterson of Ottawa and Miss Agnes Cowan of Glasgow, Scotland.

The funeral service was conducted in St. Andrew's Church, Hamilton, by his successor, Rev. W. L. Young, assisted by Rev. Dr. A. Lorne MacKay, Rev. W. B. Mitchell, and Rev. Dr. Ross K. Cameron, who represented the Moderator of the General Assembly. The tribute was given by Rev. Dr. J. K. Lattimore, one of those who entered the ministry under the influence and guidance of Dr. Cowan. The Presbytery of Hamilton pays tribute to the memory of one of its outstanding ministers, and extends its sympathy to the members of his family.

THE REVEREND W. A. WILLIAMS, B.A.

The Rev. W. A. Williams, B.A., passed away July 18th, 1967, in Brussels, Ont., where he had lived after his retirement in 1954. Mr. Williams was a graduate of Presbyterian Bala College, Wales, and was ordained in 1913. He served the Church in Wales until 1921 when he and his family emigrated to the U.S.A. He ministered in Pennsylvania and Ohio for six years, coming to Canada in 1927 and accepting a Call to Cranbrook and Ethel in the Presbytery of Huron-Maitland, serving there until 1939. He accepted a Call to Valetta and New St. Andrew's, Presbytery of Chatham and ministered in that parish until his retirement in 1954.

Mr. Williams was highly thought of as a fine and pleasing preacher and for his faithful pastoral work throughout his lengthy ministry. He was frequently called upon as a supply preacher during his years of retirement until he was crippled with arthritis and confined to his home the last six years of his life.

He was deeply grieved and disappointed by the loss of his son, Rev. Maldwyn Williams, an officer of the R.C.A.F. in the Second World War.

The Funeral service, largely attended both by the people of Brussels and many of his former parishioners, was conducted by the Rev. C. A. McCarroll of Melville Church, Brussels, assisted by the Rev. Gordon L. Fish, Moderator, Presbytery of Huron-Maitland, the Rev. J. H. Greene, Hanover and the Rev. T. Owen Hughes, Watford, Ont. He left to mourn his passing, his widow, Mrs. Annie Williams, a daughter, Eluned (Mrs. Stuart McNair), Cranbrook, Ont., and a son, Ivor Williams, Managing Editor of the London Free Press; three Grandchildren also survive. The Presbytery extends deepest sympathy to the Family, with our thanks for the long and faithful ministry of this servant of the Lord who served the Church so well.

SYNOD OF SASKATCHEWAN

THE REVEREND NORMAN D. KENNEDY, M.C. M.A., D.D.

The Presbytery of Assiniboia records its great loss in the death of the Reverend Norman D. Kennedy, M.C., M.A., D.D. on August 2, 1967 at Regina, Saskatchewan.

Dr. Kennedy was born in Edinburgh, Scotland, a son of the Manse — his grandfather and father were both ministers.

Dr. Kennedy gave up his studies to serve in France and Belgium during the First World War with the King's Own Scottish Borderers. He was wounded twice, awarded the Military Cross and demobilized at the end of the war with the rank of Captain.

Following the war, Dr. Kennedy resumed his delayed studies and attended George Watson College in Edinburgh and the University of Edinburgh graduating with a Master of Arts degree and a diploma in Theology. He was ordained in 1925 and served the Church of Scotland at Arbroath, Scotland, for three years, coming to Canada in 1928. Dr. Kennedy preached for a short period of time at Woodstock, Ontario before moving to First Presbyterian Church in New Glasgow, Nova Scotia in 1929. During his service there he was Moderator of the Presbytery of Pictou and of the Synod of the Maritime Provinces. He served as a member of the Board of Administration of the Presbyterian Church in Canada from 1938 to 1941.

Dr. Kennedy married Marion Miller of Woodstock, Ontario, in June of 1930 and he is survived by his wife.

In September, 1942 Dr. Kennedy commenced his ministry in First Presbyterian Church, Regina. In 1947 he was Moderator of the Synod of Saskatchewan. From 1948 to 1950 he was Moderator of the Presbytery of Regina and of the Presbytery of Assiniboia which resulted from an amalgamation of the Presbytery of Regina and the Presbytery of Moose Jaw.

During Dr. Kennedy's ministry in Regina he received the highest honour in the Presbyterian Church in Canada when he was elected Moderator of the 77th General Assembly meeting in Ottawa in 1951. As Moderator, Dr. Kennedy represented the Presbyterian Church in Canada far beyond the boundaries of Canada. He visited the Commonwealth Division in Korea and Formosa during a trip to Asia that lasted for several months. In the same year Queen's University in Kingston conferred an honorary Doctor of Divinity degree upon him.

There was many demands made upon Dr. Kennedy's personal time during the quarter-century of his life that was spent in Regina. He was a past-president of the South Saskatchewan District of the Canadian Bible Society. For many years he was a member of the Family Service Bureau in Regina. He was a member of the Board of the Victorian Order of Nurses, a past-president of the Canadian Club and the Canadian Institute for International Affairs.

He was a former chaplain of the Canadian Army. He was chaplain of the Provincial Command and Regina Branch of the Royal Canadian Legion and honorary chaplain of the United Services Institute. He was invited many times to speak at annual Remembrance Day Services.

Dr. Kennedy was paid many tributes at the time of his retirement in 1966. His understanding of human nature and his quiet, gentle manner in presenting his views while respecting the views of others earned the comment that he was loved by all throughout the entire community. His canny instinct in understanding the problems of others and his sound judgment brought the often spoken remark that Dr. Kennedy could have been a success in any business or profession that he might have chosen.

Dr. Kennedy was active in the Masonic Order most of his life and was elected a few months before his death Deputy Grand Master of the Great Priory of Canada, Knights Templar.

The funeral was held from First Presbyterian Church, Regina. Representatives from all organizations with which he had been associated were present. The service was conducted by the Reverend J. J. Harold Morris, B.A., B.Ed., B.D., Minister of First Church and the Reverend Ronald A. Davidson, B.A., B.D., D.D., Minister of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Saskatoon.

CANADA

BY THE MINISTER OF CONSUMER AND CORPORATE AFFAIRS

To all to whom these presents shall come, or whom the same may in anywise concern,
 GREETING:

WHEREAS, in and by Part II of the Canada Corporations Act, it is, amongst other things, in effect enacted that the Minister of Consumer and Corporate Affairs may by letters patent under his seal of office grant a charter to any number of persons not being fewer than three (3), who, having complied with the requirements of the said Act, apply therefor, constituting such persons and others who thereafter become members of the corporation thereby created a body corporate and politic without share capital for the purpose of carrying on, without pecuniary gain to its members, objects, to which the legislative authority of the Parliament of Canada extends, of a national, patriotic, religious, philanthropic, charitable, scientific, artistic, social, professional or sporting character, or the like, upon the applicants therefor establishing to the satisfaction of the Minister of Consumer and Corporate Affairs due compliance with the several conditions and terms in and by the said Act set forth and thereby made conditions precedent to the granting of such charter;

AND WHEREAS HOWARD WANLESS HUNTER, DAVID McCULLOUGH AND RICHARD JAMES HARDY STANBURY have made application for a charter under the said Act, constituting them and such others as may become members in the corporation thereby created a body corporate and politic under the name of THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH BUILDING CORPORATION for the objects hereinafter mentioned, and have satisfactorily established the sufficiency of all proceedings required by the said Act to be taken, and the truth and sufficiency of all facts required to be established previous to the granting of such letters patent;

NOW KNOW YE that the Minister of Consumer and Corporate Affairs under the authority of the said Act, does, by these letters patent, constitute the said HOWARD WANLESS HUNTER, DAVID McCULLOUGH AND RICHARD JAMES HARDY STANBURY and all others who may become members in the Corporation a body corporate and politic without share capital under the name of THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH BUILDING CORPORATION with all the rights and powers conferred by the said Act, and for the following objects, namely:—

- (a) to assist in the advancement of religion and education, the relief of poverty and the performance of other charitable activities of The Presbyterian Church in Canada within Canada;
- (b) to undertake and assist in the financing of the acquisition of lands and buildings and the erection, renovation and repair of new and existing buildings and all accessory structures and facilities for The Presbyterian Church in Canada;

- (c) to guarantee repayment of money lent to finance or assist in the financing of the acquisition of lands and buildings and the erection, renovation and repair of new and existing buildings and all accessory structures and facilities for The Presbyterian Church in Canada upon such terms as the Corporation may determine, but this shall not include the power to carry on the business of guarantee insurance;
- (d) to lend money, with or without security therefor, to finance or assist in the financing of the acquisition of lands and buildings and the erection, renovation and repair of new and existing buildings and all accessory structures and facilities for The Presbyterian Church in Canada upon such terms as the Corporation may determine;
- (e) subject to the provisions of section 63 of the Canada Corporations Act, to borrow money upon security as the Corporation determines, or without security therefor;
- (f) to issue debentures or other evidences of indebtedness;
- (g) to invite the public to subscribe for debentures or other securities;
- (h) to purchase, take, have, hold, receive, possess, retain and enjoy property, both real and personal, and any or every estate or interest whatsoever therein given, granted, devised or bequeathed to the Corporation or appropriated, purchased or acquired by the Corporation in any manner or way whatsoever to, for or in favour of the uses or objects of the Corporation or The Presbyterian Church in Canada;
- (i) subject always to the terms of any trust relating thereto, to sell, convey, exchange, alienate and, subject to the provisions of section 63 of the Canada Corporations Act, to mortgage, pledge, charge or hypothecate and to lease or demise any property, real or personal, held by the Corporation, whether by way of investment for the purposes of the Corporation or not, and from time to time to invest all or any funds or moneys vested in or acquired by it for the uses and objects aforesaid, in and upon any security by way of mortgage, hypothec or charge upon property, real or personal, held by or for The Presbyterian Church in Canada and, for the purpose of such investment, to take and receive mortgages or assignments thereof, whether made and executed directly to the Corporation or to any corporation or company or person in trust for it, and to sell, grant, assign, transfer and discharge such mortgages or assignments either in whole or part;
- (j) to receive gifts and donations, whether subject to conditions or not;
- (k) to invest and deal with the moneys of the Corporation not immediately required in such manner as may from time to time be determined;
- (l) to receive moneys from or on behalf of The Presbyterian Church in Canada and, as trustees, to invest them for the benefit of the said Church in or upon any securities, real or personal, in which a Canadian insurance company may invest its funds or upon which it may lend its funds under the authority of the Canadian and British Insurance Companies Act, subject to the same limitations and conditions as apply to such a company pursuant to that Act, except that investments in common shares shall not be subject to the limitations set out in subsection (7) of section 63 thereof;
- (m) to delegate to any one or more chartered banks or trust companies the custody and management of all or any portion of any property, real or personal, from time to time held by the Corporation, upon such terms as the Corporation may consider requisite;
- (n) to engage or assist in special fund-raising campaigns, if considered advisable and necessary for the better promotion and attainment of the objects of the Corporation.

The words "The Presbyterian Church in Canada" as used herein shall mean The Presbyterian Church in Canada within Canada and any organization or body within

Canada, including a congregation of the said Church or the trustees thereof, associated or affiliated with the said Church.

The operations of the Corporation may be carried on throughout Canada but not elsewhere.

The head office of the Corporation will be situate at the Municipality of Metropolitan Toronto, in the Province of Ontario.

The said HOWARD WANLESS HUNTER, DAVID McCULLOUGH AND RICHARD JAMES HARDY STANBURY are to be the first directors of the Corporation.

And it is hereby ordained and declared that the powers set out in paragraphs (c), (j), (o), (t) and (u) of subsection (1) of section 14 of the Canada Corporations Act are withheld from the Corporation.

And it is further ordained and declared that the Corporation shall be a charitable organization constituted exclusively for charitable purposes within the meaning of section 62 (1) (e) and (f) of the Income Tax Act and all its resources shall be devoted to charitable activities carried on by the Corporation and no part of the income of the Corporation shall be payable to or otherwise available for the personal benefit of any director thereof, provided that nothing in this paragraph shall prevent the payment in good faith of remuneration to any director, officer or servant of the Corporation in return for services actually rendered to the Corporation or prevent the payment of interest on money borrowed by the Corporation or the payment of any other sum reasonably necessary for the attainment of any of the objects aforesaid.

And it is further ordained and declared that if, upon winding up and/or dissolution of the Corporation, there remains, after the satisfaction of its debts, liabilities and obligations, any property whatsoever, it shall be transferred to The Trustee Board of The Presbyterian Church in Canada for the objects of the said Church.

And it is further ordained and declared that the liability of the directors is limited.

And, in accordance with the provisions of section 63 of the said Act, it is further ordained and declared that, when authorized by by-law, duly passed by the directors and sanctioned by at least two-thirds (2/3) of the votes cast at a special general meeting of the members duly called for considering the by-law, the directors of the Corporation may from time to time

- (a) borrow money upon the credit of the Corporation;
- (b) limit or increase the amount to be borrowed;
- (c) issue debentures or other securities of the Corporation;
- (d) pledge or sell such debentures or other securities for such sums and at such prices as may be deemed expedient; and
- (e) secure any such debentures or other securities, or any other present or future borrowing or liability of the Corporation, by mortgage, hypothec, charge or pledge of all or any currently owned or subsequently acquired real and personal, movable and immovable, property of the Corporation, and the undertaking and rights of the Corporation.

Any such by-law may provide for the delegation of such powers by the directors to such officers or directors of the Corporation to such extent and in such manner as may be set out in such by-law.

Nothing in this section limits or restricts the borrowing of money by the Corporation on bills of exchange or promissory notes made, drawn, accepted or endorsed by or on behalf of the Corporation.

And it is further ordained and declared that the business of the Corporation shall be carried on without pecuniary gain to its members and that any profits or other accretions to the Corporation shall be used in promoting its objects.

BY-LAWS OF THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH BUILDING CORPORATION

CORPORATE SEAL

1. The seal of the Corporation shall be in such form as shall be prescribed by the provisional directors of the Corporation and shall have the words "The Presbyterian Church Building Corporation" endorsed thereon.

MEMBERS

2. Membership in the Corporation shall be limited to those persons who are from time to time the directors thereof and every person who is a director shall, by virtue of such office, be a member of the Corporation. There shall be no annual membership fee.
3. The annual meeting of the members shall be held at the Head Office of the Corporation or elsewhere in Canada as the directors may designate on such day in each year as the directors may from time to time determine.
4. The directors may call a special general meeting of the members to be held at such time and at such place within Canada as may be determined by the directors.

HEAD OFFICE

5. The Head Office of the Corporation shall be located in the Municipality of Metropolitan Toronto in the County of York and Province of Ontario, Canada, at the place therein where the business of the Corporation may from time to time be carried on.
6. The Corporation may, by resolution, establish such other offices and agencies elsewhere within Canada as the directors may deem expedient.

DIRECTORS

7. The affairs, property and business of the Corporation shall be managed by its directors, the number of whom shall be not fewer than three nor more than twenty-one, as fixed from time to time by resolution of the directors.
8. A quorum for meetings of the directors and members shall be the greater of one-third thereof or two thereof.
9. Directors shall be elected and shall retire in rotation so that, except as hereinafter provided, each director shall be elected for a term ending at the fourth annual meeting of the General Assembly of The Presbyterian Church in Canada (hereinafter called "the General Assembly") after election, and one-quarter of the directors shall retire from office in each year; provided, however, that at the first annual

meeting of the General Assembly for the election of directors after the date of the issuance of Letters Patent incorporating the Corporation, one-quarter of the directors shall be elected for a term ending at the next annual meeting of the General Assembly after such date, and one-quarter of the directors shall be elected for a term ending at the second annual meeting of the General Assembly after such date, and one-quarter of the directors shall be elected for a term ending at the third annual meeting of the General Assembly after such date, and one-quarter of the directors shall be elected for a term ending at the fourth annual meeting of the General Assembly after such date. If at any annual meeting of the General Assembly at which directors are elected, the number of directors authorized by resolution of the Corporation is not divisible by four, the excess of directors in office over the highest number divisible by four shall retire from office in the order in which they were first elected.

10. Directors shall be eligible for re-election at the annual meeting of the General Assembly.

11. Directors shall be elected annually by the General Assembly from nominees of the directors for the terms set out in Paragraph 9 hereof, provided that:

- (a) at least two-thirds of the number of directors holding office at any time shall be persons who are not clergymen; and
- (b) at least one representative from each Synod of The Presbyterian Church in Canada shall be a director at all times.

12. The office of director shall be automatically vacated:

- (a) if a director shall resign his office by delivering a written resignation to the Secretary of the Corporation;
- (b) if he is found to be mentally incompetent;
- (c) if he becomes bankrupt or suspends payment or compounds with his creditors;
- (d) if removed by the General Assembly;
- (e) on death.

Provided that if any vacancy shall occur for any reason contained in clauses (a), (b), (c), or (e) of this paragraph, the remaining directors may, by resolution, fill the vacancy thus created and the person appointed to fill such vacancy shall continue in office until the next annual meeting of the General Assembly. The General Assembly from nominees of the directors shall fill any vacancy occurring under clause (d) of this paragraph and the person appointed to fill this vacancy shall hold office until the next annual meeting of the General Assembly. Notwithstanding vacancies, the remaining directors may exercise all the powers of the directors so long as a quorum thereof remain in office.

13. Meetings of directors and members may be held at any time and place within Canada as the directors may determine, provided that fourteen days' written notice of such meeting shall be given to each director and member respectively. No formal written notice shall be necessary if all directors and members respectively are present at the meeting or waive notice thereof in writing either before or after the meeting.

14. Directors as such shall not receive any stated remuneration for their services, but, by resolution of the directors, expenses of their attendance may be allowed for their attendance at each meeting thereof. Nothing herein contained shall be construed to preclude any director from serving the Corporation as an officer or in any other capacity and receiving compensation therefor.

15. Upon election at the first annual meeting of the General Assembly following the issuance of Letters Patent of Incorporation, the directors then elected shall replace the provisional directors named in the Letters Patent.

16. The directors shall have power to authorize expenditures on behalf of the Corporation from time to time and may, by resolution, delegate to an officer or officers or the executive committee of the Corporation the right to employ and pay salaries to employees. The directors shall have the power to make expenditures for the purpose of furthering the objects of the Corporation.

17. At all meetings of the members, directors, or of the executive committee of the Corporation every question shall be determined by a majority of votes cast by those present unless otherwise specifically provided by the Canada Corporations Act or by these by-laws.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

18. There shall be an executive committee composed of the chairman, vice-chairman and five other directors of the Corporation to be appointed annually by the directors. Four members of the executive committee shall constitute a quorum.

19. The executive committee shall conduct the ordinary business of the Corporation between meetings of directors and shall be responsible to the directors for their conduct of all such business.

OFFICERS

20. The Directors of the Corporation shall elect from among themselves, at the first meetings of directors following the annual meeting of the General Assembly, a chairman and a vice-chairman and may from time to time elect or appoint such other officers and agents as they deem necessary or expedient who shall have such authority and perform such duties as may from time to time be prescribed by the directors.

21. All officers of the Corporation, except the general manager, shall hold office for one year and until their successors are elected or appointed. A general manager shall be appointed by the General Assembly on the nomination of the directors and shall hold office until removed by the General Assembly upon the recommendation of the directors. The general manager may, but need not, be a director.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

22. The chairman shall be the senior officer of the Corporation. He shall, if present, preside at all meetings of the members, the directors and of the executive committee and shall perform all duties and powers as may from time to time be assigned to him by the directors.

23. The vice-chairman shall, in the absence or disability of the chairman, perform the duties and exercise the powers of the chairman and shall perform such other duties and shall have such other powers as may from time to time be assigned to him by the directors.

24. The secretary (if any) shall attend all meetings of the members, directors and of the executive committee and record all votes and minutes of all proceedings in the books of the Corporation. He shall cause to be given notice of all meetings of the members, the directors and of the executive committee. He shall be the custodian of the seal of the Corporation and shall perform such other duties as may be assigned to him by the directors.

25. The treasurer (if any) shall have the care and custody of all the funds and securities of the Corporation and shall keep full and accurate accounts of all receipts and disbursements, and shall render to the directors and executive committee, whenever required, an account of all his transactions as treasurer and of the financial position of the Corporation. He shall also perform such other duties and have such other powers as may from time to time be assigned to him by the directors.

26. The general manager shall have the general management and direction, subject to the authority of the directors and the supervision of the chairman, of the Corporation's business and affairs, and shall perform such other duties and have such other powers as may from time to time be assigned to him by the directors, including the powers and duties of secretary, treasurer or both.

27. All cheques, drafts or orders for payment of money and all notes and acceptances and bills of exchange shall be signed by such officer or officers or person or persons whether or not officers of the Corporation and in such manner as the directors may from time to time designate.

28. The books of account of the Corporation may be kept either at the Head Office or such other place in Canada as the directors may from time to time determine.

29. All shares and securities owned by the Corporation shall be lodged in the name of the Corporation, or its nominee, with such chartered banks or trust companies or other depositories as may be determined from time to time by the directors.

30. All share certificates, bonds, debentures, debenture stocks, certificates, notes, mortgages or other obligations belonging to the Corporation may be issued or held in the name of any chartered bank or an agency thereof or any trust company authorized to carry on business in Canada, as nominee of the Corporation.

31. Contracts, documents, guarantees or any other instruments in writing requiring the signature of the Corporation may be signed by the chairman or vice-chairman and by the general manager or the secretary or acting secretary and all contracts, documents and instruments in writing so signed shall be binding upon the Corporation without any further authorization or formality. The directors shall have power from time to time by resolution to appoint any officer or officers, person or persons, on behalf of the Corporation, either to sign contracts, documents and other instruments in writing generally, or to sign specific documents, contracts or instruments in writing. The seal of the Corporation when required may be affixed to contracts, documents and other instruments in writing signed as aforesaid or by any officer or officers appointed by resolution of the directors.

32. In particular and without limiting the generality of the foregoing the chairman or vice-chairman and the general manager or the secretary or acting secretary shall have the authority to sell, assign, transfer, exchange, convert or convey any and all shares, stocks, bonds, debentures, rights, warrants, mortgages, hypothecs, charges or other securities owned by and registered in the name of the Corporation and to sign and execute under the corporate seal of the Corporation or otherwise, all deeds, assignments, transfers, conveyances, powers of attorney, guarantees and other instruments that may be necessary for the purpose of selling, assigning, transferring, exchanging, converting or conveying any such securities.

33. Any notice, communication or other document to be given by the Corporation pursuant to any provision of the Letters Patent or the by-laws of the Corporation or of the Canada Corporations Act to a director, member, officer or auditor of the Corporation shall be sufficiently given if delivered personally to the person to whom it is to be given or if delivered to his last address as recorded in the books of the Corporation or if mailed by prepaid ordinary or air mail in a sealed envelope addressed to him at his last address as recorded in the books of the Corporation or if sent by any means of wire or wireless or any other form of transmitted or recorded communication. The secretary may change the address on the books of the Corporation of any director, member or officer in accordance with any information believed by him to be reliable. A notice, communication or document so delivered shall be deemed to have been given when it is delivered personally or at the address aforesaid; and a notice, communication or document so mailed shall be deemed to have been given when deposited in a post office or a public letter box; and a notice sent by any means of wire or wireless or any other form of transmitted or recorded communication shall be deemed to have been given when delivered to the appropriate communication company or agency or its representative for dispatch.

34. In computing the date when notice must be given under any provision of the Letters Patent or by-laws requiring a specific number of days notice of any meeting or other event, the date of giving the notice and the date of the meeting or other event shall be excluded.

35. Notice of the time and place of each meeting of members shall be given in the manner hereinbefore provided not later than fourteen days before the date on which the meeting is to be held to the auditor of the Corporation. Notice of the time and place of each meeting of the executive committee shall be given to the members thereof in the manner hereinbefore provided not later than forty eight hours before

the time on which the meeting is to be held. No formal written notice shall be necessary if all members of the executive committee are present at the meeting or waive notice thereof in writing either before or after the meeting.

APPROVAL, AMENDMENT AND REPEAL OF BY-LAWS

36. The by-laws of the Corporation may be amended or repealed by by-law enacted by a majority of the directors at a meeting thereof duly called for the purpose of considering the said by-law, provided that such enactment, repeal or amendment shall not be enforced or acted upon until the approval of the Secretary of State has been obtained.

REPORT TO GENERAL ASSEMBLY

37. The directors shall present to the General Assembly at each annual meeting thereof a report in which shall be set forth fully the various moneys, securities and property, real and personal, which shall have come unto the hands of the Corporation since the last preceding report of the directors, and the moneys, securities and property still held by the Corporation and in which shall also be set forth fully the disposition made by the Corporation, since the last preceding report of the directors, of any moneys, securities and property and the income thereof.

AUDITOR

38. The members shall at each annual meeting of members following the annual meeting of the General Assembly appoint an auditor to audit the accounts of the Corporation and he shall hold office until the annual meeting of members next following the next annual meeting of the General Assembly, provided that the directors may fill any casual vacancy in such office. The remuneration of the auditor shall be fixed by the directors.

39. The auditor shall make an annual report to the directors and members on the financial statement of the Corporation, and a certified copy of the auditor's report and of the financial statement shall be furnished to the General Assembly by the directors forthwith after receipt thereof.

40. The fiscal year of the Corporation shall be fixed by resolution of the directors.

INDEMNITIES

41. The directors, executive committee and officers for the time being of the Corporation and every one of them and every one of their heirs, executors and administrators shall be indemnified and saved harmless out of the assets of the Corporation from and against all actions, costs, charges, losses, damages and expenses which they may incur or sustain by reason of any act done, concurred in, or omitted in or about the execution of their duties or supposed duties in their respective offices, except such (if any) as they shall incur or sustain by their own wilful neglect or default.

42. The directors are hereby authorized from time to time to cause the Corporation to give indemnities to any director or any other person who has undertaken or is about to undertake any liability on behalf of the Corporation and to secure such director or any other person against loss upon the Corporation.
