

#### FIRST SEDERUNT

At the City of Toronto, Ontario, and within Knox Church there, Wednesday, the sixth day of June, in the year of our Lord, one thousand nine hundred and sixty two, at eight o'clock in the evening.

Which place and time Ministers and Ruling Elders, Commissioners from the several Presbyteries of The Presbyterian Church in Canada, convened pursuant to appointment of the General Assembly held in the City of Toronto, Ontario on the seventh day of June last year.

The Reverend Robert L. Taylor, B.A., D.D., Moderator of the last General Assembly, assisted by the Reverend Dr. Wm. Fitch, conducted public worship and preached a sermon from the words: "He that glorieth, let him glory in the Lord". 2 Corinthians 10:17.

Thereafter, with prayer, he did constitute the General Assembly in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ, the only King and Head of the Church.

Dr. Cameron having been conducted to the Chair by the mover of his election, was welcomed by Dr. Taylor.

Whereupon, Dr. Taylor did by prayer call upon God to bless the newly-elected Moderator and to confer upon him strength and wisdom that he might discharge the duties of his important office. He did then install him in the Moderator's Chair.

The newly-installed Moderator thanked Dr. Taylor for his prayers, expressed gratitude to the Assembly for the honour conferred upon him and called upon the commissioners for their consideration and assistance as he sought to carry out the duties laid upon him.

On the motion of Dr. J. L. King, seconded by Mr. C. M. Pitts, the thanks of the Assembly were tendered to Dr. Taylor for the excellent sermon with which he opened the Assembly and for the great service he had rendered the Church throughout the past year.

#### THE LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR OF ONTARIO

His Honour, J. Keiller MacKay, Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario, was introduced to the Assembly and addressed the Court. He spoke of the great and noble place the Presbyterian Church has taken in the world. The Church presents hope to the world in Him Who is the Way, the Truth and the Life.

The Moderator thanked His Honour for his presence and his message.

#### THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN IRELAND

Rev. W. S. K. Crossley, B.A., minister of Carryduff Church of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland, was introduced by Mr. DeCourcy Rayner. He conveyed the greetings of his Church to the General Assembly. He spoke of Church extension work in the Church at home, the mission of the Church abroad and the task of bringing the youth into the purposes of the Church. The one great need for all is Christ.

Mr. Crossley was thanked by the Moderator who presented him with a copy of the Stitched Minutes.

#### THE MAYOR OF THE CITY OF TORONTO

His Worship Nathan Phillips, Q.C., Mayor of the City of Toronto, addressed the Assembly conveying the greetings of the City to the Court.

The Moderator thanked His Worship and presented him with a copy of the Stitched Minutes.

#### THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH OF FORMOSA

Rev. L. K. Cheng, Moderator of a past Assembly of The Presbyterian Church of Formosa, was introduced by Dr. E. H. Johnson.

Mr. Cheng brought the greetings of the Presbyterian Church of Formosa to the General Assembly. He referred to the great services of The Presbyterian Church in Canada through the missionaries of the Church in Formosa from the days of Dr. George Leslie Mackay to the present.

The Moderator thanked Mr. Cheng for his message and greetings and presented him with a copy of the Stitched Minutes.

#### THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH OF JAMAICA

Dr. E. H. Johnson introduced Right Reverend Clement Thomas, Moderator of the 1962 Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Jamaica.

Mr. Thomas conveyed the greetings of the Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Jamaica. He referred to the fact that his Church was founded by Presbyterian missionaries from Scotland. "Knox" is a familiar word in his Church—"Knox Church" and "Knox College".

#### THE CANADIAN BIBLE SOCIETY

On motion of Prof. John Hughes, duly seconded, the report was received and its recommendations considered seriatim.

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

The Assembly called for the report of the Board of Education, which was given in by Mr. G. L. Douglas, the Chairman. Upon motion of Prof. John Hughes, duly seconded, it was received and taken as read, and the Committee on Business was instructed to find a place for it on the docket of a future sederunt.

#### To the Venerable the 88th General Assembly:

The Board of Education begs to present the following report.

#### I. SPECIAL COURSES

Note: Attention is drawn to the following regulation adopted by the General Assembly of 1953:

"The status of a catechist must not be understood as a step toward ultimate ordination. The recognition of this office is considered to be desirable only in order that opportunity for full-time service may be provided for men with preaching and pastoral gifts and who are willing to give themselves to this work, but who may not be able to meet the educational requirements for the ministry, and also to enable the Church to profit by the service which such men can render." (A. & P. 1953, p. 22).

- (a) Applications already considered by the General Assembly.
  - 1. Charles Falconer. Presbytery of London. It is reported by the Senate of Presbyterian College that he has completed the second year of his prescribed three-year course in Theology.
  - C. George Hansford. Presbytery of Westminster. It is recommended that this case be dropped.
  - Donald James Herbison. Presbytery of East Toronto. It is reported by the Senate of Knox College that he is making satisfactory progress in the assigned course. It is recommended that he be allowed four years instead of three to complete the course already assigned.
  - 4. Adam Houston. Presbytery of Montreal. It is recommended that he be permitted to enter the second year of his Theological course, it being understood that he must complete the assigned work in Arts (in English and Philosophy) before proceeding to the third year in Theology.

   It is recommended that he be allowed another year to complete the Arts assignment to the satisfaction of the Board of Education.

- 11. Wallace Murray. Presbytery of London. It is recommended that he be allowed to enrol again in the two-year prescribed course in Theology.

- Robert Hill. Presbytery of Brockville. It is recommended that, in view of the Arts work already completed, he be assigned a special three-year intramural course in Theology, with exemption from Greek and Hebrew, under the direction of the Senate of one of our Colleges.
- John Kay. Presbytery of Halifax and Lunenberg. It is recommended that consideration of this case be deferred pending consultation with the commissioners from the Presbytery of Halifax and Lunenburg.
- 9. Henry F. MacNeill. Presbytery of Quebec. It is recommended that he be assigned four subjects in Arts viz. English, History, Philosophy, and one of the Social Sciences, and two further years intramurally in Theology, the Arts work to be completed before he is permitted to enter the final year in Theology.

- John Neilson. Presbytery of Brandon. It is recommended that consideration of this case be deferred pending consultation with commissioners from the Presbytery of Brandon.
- 12. George Mitchell Philps. Presbytery of Westminster. It is recommended that he be assigned four courses in Arts viz. English, History, Philosophy, and one of the Social Sciences, followed by a special three-year intramural course in Theology, with exemption from Greek and Hebrew, under the direction of the Senate of one of our Colleges, report to be made annually to the Board of Education.
- 13. Frederick Reed. Presbytery of Brandon. It is recommended that he be assigned two further courses in Arts viz. History, and one of the Social Sciences, to be followed by a special three-year intramural course in Theology, with exemption from Greek and Hebrew, under the direction of the Senate of one of our Colleges, report to be made annually to the Board of Education.

- 14. William Peter Spek. Presbytery of Algoma and North Bay. It is recommended that consideration of this case be deferred pending consultation with the commissioners from the Presbytery of Algoma and North Bay.
- 15. Victor Henry Turner. Presbytery of East Toronto. It is recommended that he be assigned four subjects in Arts viz. English, History, Philosophy, and one of the Social Sciences, to be followed by a special three-year intramural course in Theology, with exemption from Greek and Hebrew, under the direction of the Senate of one of our Colleges, report to be made annually to the Board of Education.

A comprehensive report has been received from the Rev. John A. Ross, Ph.D., Dean.

During the past year forty students have been in residence, twentyseven being Presbyterian. Approximately half of those in residence are newcomers this year, most of the original residents having now graduated.

A close relationship is maintained through the Inter-Residence Council, the University Religious Council and courses offered by the Dean in the Extension Department of the University. The facilities of the Hall have been used extensively by Presbyterian organizations and by University religious groups.

The Hall has a Library to which about one hundred books were added during the past year. Cataloguing is now in process. A Sunday School is operated, primarily for children of students and faculty members. Pre-theological students and some others receive training and practice in relation to the work of pulpit supply.

#### RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that, in view of the fact that both St. Andrew's Hall and

Presbyterian Residence, Saskatoon, report directly to the General Assembly, the practice of having them report to the Board of Education be discontinued.

Smith as Superintendent of Chinese work in Canada and that this Assembly transmit by telegraph its appreciation and best wishes to Dr. Smith.

#### DR. A. LORNE MACKAY

Dr. MacKay said that experience had taught him that the General Board of Missions would always do its work under tension — so great a work to be done at home and abroad and never sufficient money fully to meet the chal-

lenge. This day, when the pressure of other ideologies is being felt so severely, becomes the Church's opportunity to present the Gospel to this age.

#### REV. J. C. COOPER

During the absence of Dr. J. A. Munro for the latter part of 1961 and the early months of 1962, Mr. Cooper carried on the work of the Home Missions. Dr. MacKay paid a deservedly high tribute to Mr. Cooper's leadership.

Mr. Cooper presented a bird's eye view of the work of Missions in Canada. Ministers have refused increases in stipend in order that their congregations might become self-supporting and under such leadership these congregations have prospered spiritually and materially. He spoke about the work among new Canadians and very old Canadians and the need of Christ's message to one and all.

#### Dr. J. A. MUNRO

Dr. Munro expressed his thanks for the privilege of eight month's freedom from leadership in Home Missions to devote himself to academic study and the study of the Churches of Britain and the continent of Europe. He referred to the minister of St. Luc Church in Montreal, a hero of Dieppe, who is giving his life to work in The Presbyterian Church in Canada out of gratitude for what Canada has done for France. We have a duty to the French of Canada to proclaim the Word of Life. When young ministers graduate from their theological college they must be sure that they have the living message of the living Christ and that they are able to proclaim this message in this age among the girls and boys, young people and all in a way that can be understood.

#### Recommendation 4

It was moved in amendment by Mr. H. B. Currie, seconded by Mr. L. M. McNaughton, that the General Board of Missions find some way to pay our catechists at least \$3,200 per year.

As this is a proposal involving the expenditure of funds, the Recommendation as amended was referred to the Administrative Council for consideration and report to this Assembly.

With permission of Assembly, and at the request of Dr. MacKay, Mr. Cheng was heard in commendation of Mr. Dickson and concerning the Formosan work.

#### CITATION TO DR. H. A. MACMILLAN

Dr. Hugh A. MacMillan was presented with a Citation, which was received by himself and Mrs. MacMillan.

Recommendation 10.

The following motion by Dr. A. L. MacKay, duly seconded, was heartily passed by Assembly:

"We take this opportunity to honour Dr. Hugh A. MacMillan on the completion of thirty-eight years of missionary service under the Presbyterian Church in Canada, and to pay tribute to his zeal and vision and manifest achievements in the work of the Kingdom in Formosa. We give thanks to God for the long and distinguished record of this faithful servant of the Church.

"Dr. and Mrs. MacMillan went to Formosa first in 1924; over the years Dr. MacMillan worked consistently toward developing and establishing the Formosan Church, and has given outstanding leadership in the formation of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church of Formosa. Always, however, he has kept in the background, working with his Formosan colleagues with deep humility and devotion, for whom he was always a visible link, not only with the Canadian Church but with the broader stream of the ecumenical movement.

"In the course of his varied and fruitful career, Dr. MacMillan has served successively as a teacher of the Tam Kang High School, Principal of the Theological College, Associate General Secretary of the General Assembly, Principal of the Presbyterian Bible School, member of the Board of Governors of Tunghai University, Founder of the Taiwan Leprosy Relief Association, member of the Board of Mackay Memorial Hospital and Moderator of the North Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Formosa. Throughout his lifetime Dr. MacMillan has maintained a remarkable freshness of spirit and youthfulness of outlook which perhaps accounts for his life-long interest and effectiveness in Young People's work, both in the Church and in the YMCA.

"From the earliest days of his ministry, he devoted himself to language study in which he achieved unusual proficiency. This, together with his sympathetic understanding of the deeper needs and aspirations of the people, has won the affection and confidence of his Formosan friends and colleagues.

"In all his work Dr. MacMillan has been ably supported and assisted by his wife who has had no less a distinguished career than her husband. Besides managing a well-run home, rearing a fine family, she had engaged in a wide range of activities, especially as a nurse in the Mackay Memorial Hospital and in the Social Welfare Department, in Chinese women's work and in girls' work.

"We record our gratitude for the Christian example and missionary spirit so faithfully expressed by Dr. and Mrs. MacMillan throughout their long years of service and wish them God's richest blessings in the years of their retirement."

#### Dr. E. H. JOHNSON

At the request of Dr. MacKay, Dr. E. H. Johnson addressed Assembly on the subject "This Moment in Overseas Missions".

He emphasized the nature of the fast-moving East, its questioning moods, and the opportunity of giving the Christian answer. Dr. Johnson gave examples of needs, victories and visions, and called upon the Home Church to move into action and duty both at home and overseas.

Recommendation 9.

Dr. Hugh A. MacMillan addressed the Court on the significance of the arrival of Dr. George Leslie Mackay in Formosa. Throughout the Church in Formosa the event is being celebrated by young and old. Ninety years ago this intrepid missionary came with the message of Christ as the Hope of the World.

On motion of Dr. A. L. MacKay, seconded by Dr. MacMillan, Recommendation 9 was adopted.

- 16. Thomas Stoddart Cowan. Presbytery of Kamloops. It is recommended that during the coming year he be placed under the supervision of the Senate of Presbyterian College, to assess his theological capabilities, and that a new application be submitted next year.

- (3) making a witness in the frontier areas of Canada more in keeping with the spirit and tradition of our branch of the Church, equal at least to that spirit and tradition now represented in Overseas Missions, Urban Extension and the established congregations of our land.

The Chairman of the General Board of Missions accepted this for study by the Board and it was so ordered.

# REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE, RE THE PRESBYTERIAN COLLEGE, MONTREAL

#### RECOMMENDATION 1

That, in the event of Dr. Lennox declining to withdraw his resignation, this Committee be empowered to appoint an acting Principal to be chosen from outside the Faculty of the Presbyterian College who will hold office pending further action by the General Assembly of 1963. Adopted.

#### RECOMMENDATION 4

That, in view of the extreme difficulties and complexities in the situation, we recommend to the Board of Management that Rev. J. C. Hay be invited to continue in his position as Sessional Lecturer for a further year.

Dr. Johnston moved, duly seconded, that the Recommendation be adopted.

Mr. John Robson moved, duly seconded, that there be added to the Recommendation the words, "and that this Assembly affirms its confidence in Mr. Hay's work".

- Resolve that the Administrative Council or their Executive and the Trustee Board be and they are hereby empowered and directed to apply for such amending legislation as the Administrative Council or their Executive may deem advisable to effect the purposes aforesaid and on behalf of the Church to do all things and execute all petitions and other documents which may be necessary, both as to 'amending legislation of the Parliament of Canada and of any or all of the Legislative Assemblies of the

Provinces, as may be deemed by the Administrative Council or their Executive to be necessary or advisable.

In view of the resolution passed, Recommendation 3 was reworded as follows and on motion of Mr. C. M. Pitts, duly seconded, was adopted:

3. That the Pension Board be authorized, having obtained the approval of our Actuary, to notify the Trustee Board to conclude the agreement with the Canada Life Assurance Company, Toronto, in the terms of the policy to be attached hereto in which the Company agrees to segregate any assets held in accordance with the terms of this policy from the other assets of the Insurance Company and to pay to the person or persons entitled, the income purchased under this policy. The policy holder is The Trustee Board of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, who will transfer on an agreeable date to the Insurance Company, subject to obtaining amending legislation to the Trustee Board Act by the Federal and the Provincial Governments, if found necessary by the legal Counsel of our Church, the assets of the Pension Fund as provided under the policy agreement.

Question 2 was amended to read: "Do you believe the Holy Scriptures of the Old and New Testament to be the Word of God written, the witness to Jesus Christ, the Living Word, the Lord of Faith and Life".

It was moved in amendment by Mr. R. P. Carter, duly seconded, that the words "in sermon, in sacrament, in prayer, in pastoral counsel and gospel discipline" be stricken out and the following substituted "in Gospel preaching and teaching, in sacraments, in prayer, in pastoral counsel and discipline."

# FUND FOR MINISTERIAL ASSISTANCE

The Assembly called for the report of the Fund for Ministerial Assistance which was given in by Dr. J. Alan Munro in the absence of the Chairman, and on motion of Mr. C. M. Pitts, duly seconded, it was received and ordered to be spread on the Minutes as follows:

The Fund for Ministerial Assistance came into being as the result of the gift of \$1,000,000.00 by an anonymous Donor in the late months of 1950. It is administered by Appointors of the Donor in favour of those married ministers in our Church who are on the basic stipend. The increments sent to ministers are in the nature of gifts and are not to be considered as part of stipend.

Because of the effective investment policy carried on by The Trustee Board of The Presbyterian Church in Canada with regard to this gift, the corpus of The Fund has been built up to \$850,000 and during the past year the Appointors of The Fund were able to increase the gift to ministers on the basic stipend. This meant that each married minister on the basic stipend received an annual gift of \$200, and in addition a gift of \$100 for each child in his family sixteen years of age and under, and for each child twenty-one years of age and under still at school.

During the first quarter of the year sixty-three ministers with one hundred and three children received gifts, and during the final quarter of the year seventy-four ministers with one hundred and seven children were assisted. A

total of two hundred and sixty-nine gifts were made during the year to ministers, and an additional four hundred and ten gifts to them on behalf of their children.

\$20,644.17 was the total sent to these ministers during 1961, as compared with \$13,044.60 for 1960.

There was a capital balance of \$876,019.00 at December 31, 1961, made up as follows:

Investments	\$850,549.00
Bank Accounts	13,318.00
Accrued Interest	12,152.00

Letters from ministers who have received gifts from The Fund have been passed on to the anonymous donor of the gifts, for which he has expressed himself as being most grateful.

The Presbyteries have been notified quarterly to make returns to the Secretary with regard to married ministers within the bounds of Presbyteries so that no married man on the basic stipend will be overlooked in the gifts that are being sent out. Married ministers on basic stipend, or on a stipend only slightly above the basic, are urged to write to the Secretary for an application to The Fund. There have been cases in past years where men have not been informed about The Fund, and The Appointors are most anxious that any one entitled to benefits from The Fund does in fact receive gifts from it.

The Presbyterian Church in Canada continues to be grateful to the anonymous donor for this very meaningful gift to the ministry of our Church.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON OVERTURE No. 5, 1962

# PRESBYTERY OF VICTORIA RE FORMAL DISCUSSIONS WITH THE UNITED CHURCH OF CANADA

The Assembly called for the Report of the Special Committee on the above Overture which was given in by Dr. L. H. Fowler in the absence of the Convener.

# RE IN CAMERA

A motion to move into camera was lost.

On motion of Mr. G. Firth, seconded by Mr. I. S. Wishart, the report was received and considered. The report is as follows:

The prayer of this Overture asks simply for the initiating of conversations with the United Church of Canada for better mutual understanding. However, as the Overture has given rise to discussions far beyond the prayer, your Committee considers that a general statement should be made to clarify the subject and emergent problems.

1. It is the opinion of this Committee that conversations on the national level are premature while there is so much misunderstanding at the congregational level. It is at the congregational level that many of our ministers find that acts of friendship and attempted co-operation are construed in terms of Church Union by people of both Churches. For, if it be true there is an obsession among our people that any conversations with the United Church are a betrayal of the Church, there is also an obsession among people of the United Church that conversations — or any overture — can have and should have only one purpose and end, namely organic Church Union. These attitudes may not be sufficiently wide spread to be typical; yet they are such that conversations at the national level will be misleading until local situations improve. We are happy to affirm our belief that there has been great improvement at the local levels.

- 2. Our participation in the Canadian Council of Churches, and the World Council, gives us the welcome opportunity of exploring the alternatives to Church Union that we suggested in 1920-1925. This participation is not therefore an approach to Church Union, as often alleged, and we must remind the Church that the 1925 Union was rejected also by the Anglicans and Baptists. It is therefore a duty for us to maintain our traditional impartiality and friendship. We submit that movements of unity however unity may be defined involve all four Churches, United, Anglican, Baptist and Presbyterian, and others and this viewpoint must not be clouded by conversations readily misinterpreted.
- 3. As an instinctive policy, our successive Assemblies have dwelt little upon our misfortunes of 1925. We have a generation in which some fail to find significant differences. On the other hand there is much evidence there are those who find much difference and are convinced we have a message as a Church within our doctrine of ecumenicity and catholicity. The present theological climate of the revival of Biblical theology obscures the fact that there are the doctrinal, the confessional, positions of the Churches that are deep and significant. These cannot be set aside by ignoring them. The fundamental thing is found in our Lord's words, "By this shall all men know that ye are My disciples, if ye have love one to another." (John 13:35). This Committee submits that it is to this end we should first work, and recommends, in answer to the prayer of the Overture, that ministers and elders strive for better mutual understanding without compromising our own Reformed Witness at the congregational level and defer any action at the national level.
  - Mr. R. B. Cochrane appeared in support of the Overture.
- Dr. W. S. Reid moved, seconded by Mr. F. Whilsmith, that Overture No. 5 be remitted to the Inter-Church Relations Committee for study and report to The Assembly, 1963.
- Dr. Murdo Nicolson moved in amendment, duly seconded, that we grant the prayer of the overture in these terms: "In order to give practical expression to our professed concern for true Christian unity and to correct the widespread impression that the Presbyterian Church in Canada is sectarian and separatist that we ask the Committee on Inter-Church Relations to give serious study as to how best such a conversation with the United Church of Canada could be made under adequate safeguards to ensure that our commitment to our Biblical reformed and confessional faith suffer no prejudice but receive full expression; and report to the General Assembly of 1963, giving counsel and direction also as to how conversations with the United Church may be sustained on the local level in the interests of promoting better mutual understanding.

On being put to the vote, the motion prevailed and the Overture was so ordered.

#### TIME

On motion of Mr. J. E. C. Shepherd, duly seconded, it was agreed to meet at nine o'clock tomorrow morning.

### ADJOURNMENT

The General Assembly adjourned to meet in this place tomorrow morning at nine o'clock, of which public intimation was given, and this Sederunt was closed by the Moderator, with the Benediction.

# EIGHTEENTH SEDERUNT

At Toronto, and within Knox Church there, on Thursday, the fourteenth day of June, one thousand nine hundred and sixty-two, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, the General Assembly met pursuant to adjournment, and was constituted by the Moderator, Mr. J. K. Lattimore leading in prayer at his request.

The Assembly called for the report of the Committee on Business which was given in and read by Mr. J. K. Lattimore, the Convener, on whose motion, duly seconded, it was received and considered and being adopted, the business of the Assembly for the day was ordered accordingly.

# COMMISSIONER'S OVERTURE — RE CHRISTIAN'S OBEDIENCE TO THE CIVIL MAGISTRATE

Permission having been granted in the Sixth Sederunt, Dr. W. S. Reid presented the following Overture:

To the Venerable the 88th General Assembly of The Presbyterian Church in Canada:

- WHEREAS the teaching of our Church, both in the Westminster Confession
  of Faith and in the Declaration on Church and Nation (1954) in
  conformity with the teaching of the Scriptures of the Old and New
  Testaments, is that Christians have the responsibility of obeying the
  civil government within its sphere of authority; and
- 2. Whereas there has been one, if not more cases, of ministers feeling that they had the right as Christian individuals of contravening certain civil statutes; and

WHEREAS, to some Presbyterians none of the doctrinal statements concerning the authority of the state is entirely clear on the matter of obedience owed by the Christian to the civil magistrate;

THEREFORE, the undersigned commissioner to the 88th General Assembly humbly overtures the Venerable, the General Assembly, to define more concretely and specifically, the responsibility of the Christian to the civil authorities, or to do otherwise as they in their wisdom may deem best.

On motion of Mr. W. D. G. Hollingworth, duly seconded, the report of the Board of St. Andrew's Hall, Vancouver, was adopted in conformity with the action of the Assembly taken at the Fifteenth Sederunt.

# REPORT OF THE BOARD OF PRESBYTERIAN RESIDENCE, SASKATOON

The Assembly called for the report of the Board of the Presbyterian Residence, Saskatoon, which, as printed, was handed in by Dr. M. Nicolson, and on his motion, duly seconded, the report was received and adopted.

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH ARCHITECTURE

Consideration of the report of the Committee on Church Architecture was resumed, Mr. J. K. Lattimore in the absence of the Convener, reporting.

On motion of Dr. J. L. King, duly seconded, Recommendation 6 was referred to the Administrative Council or its Executive to issue and as amended the report of the Committee as a whole was adopted.

# REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON REFERENCE FROM THE PRESBYTERY OF EDMONTON

The Assembly called for the Report of the Special Committee on the above Reference which was given in by Mr. I. S. Wishart, the Convener, who moved, duly seconded, that the following be adopted:

- 1. We are not prepared to answer the question of issuing two calls simultaneously to one man by a single presbytery without first citing the Presbytery of Westminster.
- 2. The Presbytery of Edmonton acted within its rights in its refusal to put calls into the hands of Mr. Morris.
- 3. The calls may now properly be returned to the Presbytery of West-minster.

It was moved by Mr. H. G. Marsh, duly seconded, that the Reference be referred to The Committee on Articles of Faith with attention to Overture 24, 1960 Re Reformed Concept of Call.

# TO TAKE AN IMMEDIATE VOTE

On motion of Dr. W. S. Reid, duly seconded, it was agreed to take an immediate vote.

On being put to the vote, the motion to refer carried.

On motion of Mr. Gordon Firth, duly seconded, the report of the Committee was ordered transmitted to the Presbytery of Edmonton as an answer to its Reference.

# WORLD ALLIANCE OF REFORMED CHURCHES, NORTH AMERICAN AREA

The Assembly called for the report of the World Alliance of Reformed Churches, North American Area, which, as printed, was given in by Mr. J. K. Lattimore in the absence of the Convener, on whose motion, duly seconded, it was received as a statement of fact.

#### RE S.C.M. AND I.V.C.F. GRANTS

The Assembly resumed discussion of the motion re S.C.M. and I.V.C.F. from the Fifteenth Sederunt.

Mr. R. P. Carter moved, duly seconded, that the matter of grants to S.C.M. and I.V.C.F. be referred to the Board of Christian Education for consultation with these two bodies, to bring in to the General Assembly of 1963 a recommendation regarding the basis of annual grants to both of these organizations.

On being put to the vote, the motion to refer carried.

# BOARD OF EVANGELISM AND SOCIAL ACTION

Consideration of the report of the Board of Evangelism and Social Action was resumed, Dr. J. C. McLelland reporting in the absence of the Chairman.

On motion of Dr. McLelland, duly seconded, the report of the Board was adopted.

On motion of Dr. McLelland, duly seconded, the report of the Board was adopted, Dr. McLelland accepting the suggestion that the Board provide clarification to the Assembly of 1963.

On motion of Dr. McLelland, duly seconded, the report of the Board as a whole with its recommendations as amended was adopted.

# GENERAL BOARD OF MISSIONS

The great Church event of 1961 was the meeting in New Delhi of the Third Assembly of the World Council of Churches. This meeting which brought together representatives of almost 200 member denominations will stand as a very significant event in contemporary Church history. It marks a decisive moment in which Churches of many traditions and of many lands and nations have formed a fellowship which makes a common confession and seeks to help the Churches fulfill their common calling to the glory of the one God.

Dr. E. H. Johnson, the Overseas Secretary of the Board was one of the two official delegates of the Presbyterian Church in Canada at the Assembly. Various representatives of our Church were present and a number were elected to the continuing work of the commissions and departments of the World Council.

A very significant event at the New Delhi Assembly was the integration of the International Missionary Council and the World Council of Churches to form a new and enlarged World Council of Churches. Mission which has been on the fringe of the World Council now stands at its heart as it should. The Church exists for mission and the World Council and all of its member Churches are committed to press forward in the mission of Christ to the whole world.

1961 was a year of opportunity and of promise in the work of the General Board of Missions in Canada and Overseas. Everywhere the fields are open for the work and a new spirit of inquiry into the deep questions of human life provided a ready hearing for the Gospel. At the same time the people are responsive as never before to the needs of Christian witness and service places of need here and across the world.

Within the Presbyterian Church in Canada and in the actual work of the General Board of Missions 1961 will go down as a year of adjustment and of difficulty. The mission work of the Church had to be frozen at existing levels or reduced in order to meet the financial decision made by the General Assembly.

In order to maintain our integrity as a Church the Assembly face the question of increasing the minimum stipend paid to our workers. The decision was made to increase stipends and until this was done to freeze all other work at existing levels. Everyone agreed that the first decision was a good one. Large number of our people are deeply disturbed that we took this good action at the price of faithfulness in our mission at a moment of great missionary need. We have strengthened our institution at the price of reducing the preaching of the Gospel and the kindly ministries of Christ at a moment of urgent need. As a strong Church in an affluent society and in a prosperous time could we not have done justice to our men by calling on our people for more generous giving rather than by with-holding water from those who thirst and bread from those in dire hunger?

The action of the General Assembly has meant that the officers of the Board have had to give their major attention to plans for curtailing existing work and deferring modest expansion in a moment when all our work calls for substantial strengthening.

During the later part of 1961 Dr. J. A. Munro went to France for theological studies during a well deserved Sabbatical year. His work has been carried forward with diligence by Rev. J. C. Cooper.

Discussions in regard to administrative structure of the Presbyterian Church in Canada and financial adjustments being effected by the Acting Comptroller have added tremendous burdens to the officers and staff of the Board. The Organization Committee and Planning Committee of the Administrative Council and the Finance Committee of the Acting Comptroller have maintained a series of requests and demands for detailed information which has required in many

cases days of additional work. Almost impossible burdens have been laid on all of the Executive Secretaries and there have been few evenings through the year when the lights of the Mission Offices have not been burning.

The same pressures have made life extremely difficult for the officers and committees of the Board. If the Chairman of the Board and the Chairman of the Sub-sections do not attend additional meetings then the Board is not represented. If they do attend the additional meetings as well as those required by the work of the Board then they find themselves under impossible schedules. It has become evident that some revised structures and procedures are essential.

While Mr. Cooper has carried the work of the Home Missions Office Rev. R. M. Ransom has had to carry a good share of the work of the Overseas Office during the period when the Overseas Secretary was in India for field visits and for the W.C.C. Assembly. Mr. Ransom has also carried the major burdens in the field of Missionary Education.

In all this has been a heavy year with financial difficulties, administrative complications and staff shortages. At the same time it can be said that the major part of the work has been carried forward without serious damage. The real effect of the finance decisions will be seen in 1962 and 1963.

# OVERSEAS MISSIONS

To understand Overseas Missions one needs to see them in the perspective of events overseas. God sends His Church into the world as part of His total saving among the nations.

During 1961 the world saw many critical moments and many moments of new achievement and fresh promise. The Berlin crisis came and was averted. The Congo seemed to sink into deeper chaos, but somehow has come through into the possibility of order. The death of Dag Hammerksjold was a shuddering blow, but the UN survived the succeeding chaos and, if anything, has come through in fresh strength. The unity of this global world was vividly dramatized by the orbiting of the first men in space — Gargarin and Titov of Russia. Vast visions of new possibilities for the human race are opened in space exploration and in the developments of nuclear power.

The 100th nation joined the United Nations and since then more have followed. Increasingly the nations of the world are becoming one community.

This was dramatized in the Church by the meeting in New Delhi of the Third Assembly of the World Council of Churches. The meeting of the Assembly in a great nation of Asia was symbolic of the new understanding of the Christian community as a worldwide community. In the Assembly it was pointed out that the day of Missions has not ended. Rather, we are entering a new phase of world mission. We must completely re-examine our thinking about world mission so as to carry forward the missionary enterprise under the new conditions of the second half of the twentieth century.

More and more the Overseas Mission work of The Presbyterian Church in Canada finds itself not only within the context of the worldwide mission, but within the patterns and related to the other bodies which are engaged in mission.

In all our fields we find ourselves working more and more closely with other Churches and Missions that serve alongside us. We also find that many new groups of other nations and other traditions are coming to play their part in areas which formerly we knew as exclusive fields of The Presbyterian Church in Canada. One of the major developments in Mission policy is in the appropriate adjustment to this situation where new and more varied resources for the preaching of the Gospel are in God's purposes being made available.

In April and May the Overseas Secretary made intensive visits to our work in Formosa and Japan. These were concerned with administrative matters largely in the field of policy. In Formosa, he found that the working relationships with the Presbyterian Church of Formosa was developing very satisfactorily. In Japan, extended talks were held with the Executive Committee of the Korean Christian Church, looking towards a formulated statement of relationship of The Presbyterian Church in Canada to the Korean Christian Church in Japan.

In November and December, the Overseas Secretary went as a delegate of our Church to the Third Assembly of the World Council of Churches. He was also representative of the Department of Overseas Missions of the Canadian Council of Churches to the final Assembly of the International Missionary Council, before it became integrated with the World Council of Churches. He also served as an Advisor at the inaugural meeting of the Division of World Missions and Evangelism, the successive body to the International Missionary Council within the structure of the World Council of Churches which met immediately following the World Council Assembly.

Before and after the New Delhi Assembly, the Overseas Secretary visited our India fields. These visits provided opportunity for further extended discussions about the policy of our work for the coming years.

It gradually becomes clear that many of the patterns we are now following are related to situations of the past which no longer exist. Our task now is to discover the shape of things in the coming days and plan work related to this new design.

In June, Rev. R. M. Ransom, paid a brief visit to British Guiana, particularly in connection with school developments there, but also to become more acquainted with the field, both for his own administrative responsibilities and for his Missionary Education work.

The Board was delighted that Principal R. Lennox, as Moderator of General Assembly was able to visit British Guiana and Jamaica early in 1961. His visit was a moment of great encouragement for our missionaries and an occasion for public presentation of our work in Georgetown and other parts of British Guiana.

#### PERSONNEL

During 1961 several new missionaries were added to the Overseas staff: Dr. Roy V. and Mrs. Ward and Rev. Roy and Mrs. Gellatly were sent to Nigeria. The Wards to serve at the Uburu Hospital and the Gellatlys in Evangelistic work in the Calabar area, particularly connected with the great new Dunlop Rubber Estate. Rev. R. M. and Mrs. Shields went to British Guiana where Mr. Shields is serving as an Ordained Missionary. Rev. J. H. and Mrs. McIntosh arrived in Japan to begin their language study and preparation for their work with the Korean Christian Church there. Rev. B. L. M. and Mrs. Embree, and later in the year, Rev. Murray L. and Mrs. Garvin arrived in Formosa. Mr. Embree for theological teaching and Mr. Garvin for evangelistic and Presbytery work.

The Overseas Section of the Board was glad to note a considerable increase in interest in work overseas among the young people of our own Presbyterian Church.

# IN THE SEVERAL FIELDS

In each of our fields we are engaged in trying to understand what is involved in the next phase of the Christian World Mission. Everywhere certain common trends are evident. It is clear that the Church on the field must be at the centre of the picture and the role of the mission is a helping role. It is clear that the task to be done is a vast one and every resource which mission can bring to the small church is needed. The thought that Overseas Missions should withdraw has been replaced in almost every instance by the thought that they must lend their strength to the small churches which face vast and taxing burdens.

In British Guiana, the Presbytery is now called the Presbytery of Guiana. During 1961 it has developed a new structure of parishes and within its own life has a strong development of committees and procedures. A Book of Forms is being developed and at every point the Presbytery is taking responsibilities which until very recently were carried by the Mission Council.

In Japan, the Korean Christian Church General Assembly is working with us on a clear statement of the relationship of our Mission to their Church. They are establishing strong patterns for making use of missionary personnel whom we can provide.

In Formosa, we find ourselves serving as part of the Presbyterian Church of Formosa. The terms of this relationship are being worked out into a healthy partnership in what is one of the strongest younger Churches in any part of the world.

In both our India fields we are conscious that our work is part of the United Church of Northern India. Whereas formerly we dealt almost solely with the Mission Councils in our areas, now we deal also with the Head Office of the United Church of Northern India. In visiting India this autumn the Overseas Secretary was careful to make his visit first to the United Church of Northern India and then to the Bhil and Jhansi fields of our Canadian Presbyterian Mission. In both fields far more time was spent with the Indian workers than on any previous visit.

In Nigeria we have just completed the first year in which the Mission staff is integrated into the Presbyterian Church of Nigeria. The African Church is beginning to think in new terms of its great responsibility for the witness to the Gospel in Nigeria.

All of these developments are fairly hopeful signs of the way in which the new Churches abroad are becoming conscious of their own selfhood and identity and their responsibility as members of the body of Christ. In this second half of the twentieth century we can look for a great development in the outreach of the Gospel as these people bring to the gospel tasks their own resources.

# JOINT WORK

We have continued to do a great deal of our work jointly with those of other Churches and other nations.

We continue to support the Division of World Missions and Evangelism of the World Council of Churches which is the successive body to the International Missionary Council. The Overseas Secretary participated in its first meeting in New Delhi in December and was named Chairman of the Department of Missionary Studies of that Division and of the World Council of Churches

During 1961 members of our staff have participated actively in the meetings of the Department of Overseas Missions of the Canadian Council of Churches. The Overseas Secretary is serving as Chairman of that Department. DOM Regional Conferences were held in 1961 in Saskatoon and at the Lakehead. The DOM Annual Meeting, held recently had a valuable discussion on various aspects of the missionary task in the second half of the twentieth century.

In the Canadian School of Missions we participated in the Orientation Course for Outgoing Missionaries held at Fort Erie from July 15 to the end of September. Rev. R. M. Ransom has acted as Chairman of the Missionary Orientation Course Committee and members of our staff played a part in the lectures in the course. Nine of our outgoing missionaries were present at the

course. Through the year, plans developed for the Canadian School of Missions to develop into a Canadian School of Missions and Ecumenical Institute related to the Canadian Council of Churches. This should provide a badly needed centre of research and fellowship for the Canadian Churches in their missionary obedience both in Canada and Overseas.

Our Church participates both in personnel and in grants to the great Christian Medical Institutions of Ludhiana in North India and Vellore in South India. The Overseas Secretary was privileged to visit Ludhiana during the time he was in New Delhi and to see something of the outstanding work being carried forward at that great hospital and medical college. In modest grants we participated in the development of indigenous Sunday School materials in Africa and in the Caribbean and in East Asia. We have also continued to give strong support of modest grants to plans for strengthening theological education around the world and particularly in Africa.

Our grants to Joint Work are not grants to outside organizations but rather are a pooling of resources in work which is essential for our mission, yet which we could not afford to carry forward by ourselves.

#### STAFF

Again we would express thanks for the faithfulness of all of the staff in our Overseas office. Rev. R. M. Ransom, the Assistant Secretary for Overseas Missions has carried heavy responsibilities both in Overseas Missions and in Missionary Education and has served our Church with distinction in these fields. His work is highly regarded in the whole Church community in Canada. Miss Helen McTavish and Miss Ina Hill have carried the heavy burdens of the office with competence and with genuine Christian devotion. The Board would express to them our deep gratitude.

As we look back on this year we give thanks to God for the way in which He has lead us. These are days of surprising changes and of beckoning new opportunities.

# HOME MISSIONS

The major event coloring all else in the Home Missions Department in 1961 was the reduction in grants to all aid-receiving charges of 10% of the year's total. This followed the action of the General Assembly in instructing the Home Missions Department to come within its authorized expenditure for the year. The reduction in grants had to be made in the last half of the year, so really amounted to approximately 20% in order to achieve a reduction of 10% for the whole year.

Much confusion and some hardship was caused to men who had to go temporarily short of stipend. By year-end, however, all appointees of the Board of Missions had received their full stipend, and the Home Missions over-expenditure had been reduced to \$83.00 on a gross budget of \$699,363.00.

The steps making this remarkable achievement possible were implemented by Dr. J. Alan Munro before departing on his sabbatical leave for study in France. The splendid co-operation of Presbyteries in amalgamating fields and effecting other financial savings wherever possible throughout the year, insured the success of the plan.

It is hoped that the severe restriction of Home Mission work will enable the minimum stipend to be raised to \$3,900.00 in 1962, and that Extension work may be begun again without undue delay.

It was a year of changes in the Immigration Department. Professor John Hughes resigned from the Chairmanship of the Committee on doctor's orders. Dr. J. A. B. de Vleeschouwer resigned as Director of the Immigration Department to accept a post with the Protestant School Board of Montreal. The Rev. A. Ross Mackay, Church Extension Secretary in the Presbytery of Montreal, was appointed Acting Director of the Department and Miss Frieda Matthews was appointed Director effective March 15, 1962.

Vacancies in the Superintendencies remained in the Synods of Manitoba and Alberta. The Superintendents and Extension staff in the other areas of the Church continued to render service to the Church of a very high order.

The Hungarian work has gone forward with quiet but solid growth in every area. All fields were manned and no ministers moved. First Hungarian in Toronto became self-supporting at the year-end.

The highlight in the French work was the achievement of self-support in Eglise St. Luc, Montreal, after ten years of the Rev. Andre Poulain's ministry there.

The Rev. Renzo Bertalot left Beckwith Memorial Church in Montreal and returned to Italy following his seven-year leave of absence from the Waldensian Church there. On the other hand, the Rev. Everardo Finocchiaro and his family arrived from Italy to be with the Italian congregation in Hamilton.

It became known during the year that Dr. David Smith would be retiring in 1962 after 45 years in the ministry and 43 years as Superintendent of Chinese Work. Dr. Smith's work has seen days of great difficulty for the Chinese under the old immigration laws of Canada, and has seen the improvement of their lot under revised immigration statutes.

Dr. Smith's work has borne rich fruit in bringing the Gospel of Christ to multitudes of Chinese Canadians, as is evidenced by the notable expansion of our Chinese Congregations and the erection of fine churches and institutes in several cities across the country.

The other ethnic congregations are, on the whole, growing under steady and fine leadership.

Mrs. M. Herrig is the new Director of Armagh where a Christian ministry is extended to unmarried mothers.

The work at Tyndale House has been extended by additions to Mr. W. H. Wolter's staff, including a Chaplain, the Rev. E. J. Briard. A most helpful conference was held between representatives of the Board of Tyndale House, the Presbytery of Montreal and the Home Missions Department.

The Kenora Hostel for Indian Canadians became a reality with the purchase of a tourist establishment which can be altered to suit the needs of the Hostel, and with the appointment as Director pro-tem, of the Rev. James Files.

Evangel Hall in Toronto is planning to extend its work under the Director pro-tem, the Rev. John Honeyman.

The Maritime Home for Girls and the Interprovincial Home for Young Women were supported with grants as usual, as was the Indian-Eskimo Association.

The Assistant Secretary for Home Missions represented our Church at a Migration Conference in Leysin, Switzerland in June, 1961, sponsored by the World Council of Churches, and on the same trip visited the homelands of the European ethnic groups among whom we work in Canada, viz. Italy, Hungary and the Ukraine.

Dr. Munro left at the end of September on a well-earned sabbatical leave. In his studies in the Reformed University in Montpellier in the South of France, he will give much thought to the place in the destiny of Canada of this great race of people among whom he will live for these months and among whom the Presbyterian branch of protestantism had its birth.

# MISSIONARY EDUCATION

This year has brought into focus the importance of sound missionary education for the continuing health of the Church. Emil Brunner has said, "The Church exists by mission as a fire by burning." To maintain this sense of mission at least two things are required: missionary interpretation which makes it clear that mission is an integral part of the Gospel and essential to the life of the Church, and a steady stream of missionary education to show what our Church is doing to fulfil its missionary responsibility in Canada and around the world.

The Missionary Education Committee has endeavoured to carry out a program of both interpretation and information. The Church has laid increasing demands upon the committee to produce the kind of material that will stimulate our Church members to make a great leap forward. Unfortunately, the Missionary Education Committee with limited budget and part-time staff has not been able to live up to its task.

Despite many inadequacies, however, an ongoing program was maintained and some new departures were made during the course of the year in review.

# PUBLICATIONS

- 1. ANNUAL ACCOUNT. The Annual Account, "Summons of the Spirit", was published in early January with a first printing of 5,000 and immediately ran into a second printing of 5,000 in February. The early rate of sales however did not continue and at the year's end there were still approximately 2,000 copies on hand.
- 2. BRITISH GUIANA BOOKLET. A booklet "The Church at Work in British Guiana" was produced and published in co-operation with the Board of Christian Education and by the year's end the total printing of 5,000 copies was nearly exhausted.
- 3. PAMPHLETS. The first two pamphlets of a new series in a striking new format and a change of emphasis were sent to the printers in the closing days of the year. These were general pamphlets on home and overseas missions. The total plan includes the publication of six additional pairs on specific areas of work in home and overseas missions, to appear in quantities of 50,000 each as rapidly as they can be produced and as the budget will permit. The committee agreed that a charge of \$2 per hundred should be made.
- 4. PRESBYTERIAN CALENDAR 1962. The Calendar Committee functions as a sub-committee of missionary education. The 1962 calendar was acclaimed as one of the finest yet. Approximately 43,000 copies were sold, the highest on record, but unfortunately this did not meet the expectations of the committee which over-ordered, so that the net result was a small financial loss.
- 5. CHRISTIAN EDUCATION CURRICULUM. The Committee continued to produce missionary education materials for the Church School lesson worksheets, the Teacher's quarterly and Victory magazines. It has representation on the Editorial Committee of the Board of Christian Education and has participated in the planning for the Synod Advanced Leadership Training Program.
- 6. PRESBYTERIAN RECORD. The Committee continued its fine working relationship with the Presbyterian Record and would pay tribute to the splendid cooperation of the Editor, the Rev. DeCourcy Rayner, in keeping the mission of the Church before our people through numerous articles, pictures and notes.
- 7. STEWARDSHIP AND BUDGET WEEKLY CALENDARS. The Committee prepares the material for two of the weekly calendars each quarter throughout the year. The Stewardship and Budget Board has requested this committee so far only to produce overseas missions material and not home missions.

- 8. NEWSLETTERS. A total of 19 newsletters from home and overseas missionaries were sent out during the year with an average mailing of 1,200 each. This is an aspect of the work which is growing in size and in importance as the Church becomes more and more conscious of this direct and personal way of maintaining contact with our workers at home and abroad. The following is the breakdown of letters sent out: Canada 2, British Guiana 2, Japan 3, Formosa 7, Nigeria 3, India 2.
- 9. BOOK SALES. The Committee this year entered into a very satisfactory arrangement whereby missionary books will be carried by Presbyterian Publications and included in their book displays, catalogue and general publicity. This will mean more efficient promotion and handling and will result in an integration of missionary books into the general reading and book displays of the Church. Our own facilities for handling books are most inadequate and so this new arrangement has been a welcome one. However, we will continue to stock and sell certain limited types of missionary education material which it would not be profitable to have handled by a commercial firm.

# AUDIO VISUALS

- 1. FILMSTRIP PRODUCTION. The Committee launched this past year into the production of filmstrips on two of our overseas fields which resulted in the publication of "Guiana Tempo" on the work in British Guiana and "Mission to a Minority" on the work among the Koreans in Japan. These were released in the early Fall and have been well received throughout the Church. These were the first of a series on all of our overseas fields which will be followed by similar home mission productions.
- 2. FILMS. A survey of the missions films available through the Audio-Visual Department of the Church was made during the year and it was found to be quite inadequate. The attention of a sub-committee has been directed to this need and it is hoped that something can be done to alleviate the situation. A first step was made in this direction by the purchase of two more copies of the Home Missions films from the TV Heritage series, "The Maybe Kid" and "Armagh".
- 3. RADIO AND TELEVISION BROADCASTS. In connection with some of the World Mission Weekends and with visits of overseas people and missionaries on deputation there have been some radio and television interviews which have helped in the general overall task of missionary interpretation.

# CONFERENCES, DEPUTATION AND SPECIAL VISITS

- 1. WORLD MISSION WEEKENDS. Four World Mission Weekends were held in 1961 at Belleville, Kingston, Owen Sound and Scarborough with fully representative teams from home and overseas missions participating. Reactions from both team members and churches taking part in the weekends have been uniformly enthusiastic.
- 2. CONFERENCES. (a) A major task of the Committee was planning and staging a consultation of Boards and Committees of the Church called by the General Board of Missions on the theme "Preparing the Church for its Missionary Obedience", which was held in May 1961 at McMaster University, with a total attendance of approximately 100. This was a time of consultation and discussion of basic questions concerning the essential task of the Church in this time. It was described by a number of those present as "one of the most significant events that has taken place in our Church in recent years".
- (b) The Committee assisted in the planning of a Missionary Education Conference held in mid-June at Huron College, London, Ontario sponsored by the Committee on Missionary Education of the Canadian Council of Churches, and assisted some of our Presbyterian delegates to attend.
- (c) A new kind of missionary presentation was worked out at the request of the Presbytery of Lindsay in the form of a one-day Mission Conference held in Lindsay, at which the whole Presbytery was very fully represented for a Sunday

afternoon of study and discussion in groups under leadership provided by the Missionary Education Committee and for an evening mass service of witness addressed by Dr. E. H. Johnson. The Lindsay Conference was regarded as so worthwhile that it has been recommended to the Committee as a pattern which could be duplicated in many other centres.

- 3. The Committee has kept in close touch with and participated in the ongoing Consultation on Christian Nurture for the Whole Church, called under the auspices of the Board of Christian Education. It is significant that for all involved in this study there has developed a growing consciousness that Christian nurture must be education and training for mission if it is to produce real Christian maturity.
- 4. ITINERARIES. During the first part of the year the Rev. George Malcolm travelled extensively throughout the central area and the Maritime region. The Rev. and Mrs. Geoffrey Johnston returned home on furlough from Nigeria at the end of June and were located as Mission Counsellors at Glen Mhor Camp for the two summer months. During the fall Mr. Johnston has done deputation work and taken part in World Mission Weekends and has done considerable editorial work for the Missionary Education Committee, including the basic work on the new pamphlets. We are grateful to record that the Rev. D. H. Powell has been sufficiently restored to health and strength that he has been able to assist in missionary interpretation particularly among laymen.
- 5. OVERSEAS VISITORS. Students from our overseas fields who have been studying in Canada during the year have added considerably to our missionary education resources. The Rev. D. S. Kim (Japan); the Rev. Inya Ude (Nigeria); Mr. C. M. Lin and the Rev. L. K. Cheng (Formosa); the Rev. Clement DeCastro (British Guiana); the Rev. K. W. Bay (Japan); have all taken part in deputation work and given generously of their time in interpreting their homeland and the work of the Church there. In addition, a number of overseas visitors spoke to church groups and church courts, including the General Assembly such as Rev. T. T. Wu, Dr. T. C. Tung, Rev. L. M. Cheng, Mr. C. S. Lee, all of Formosa.

# RELATIONSHIP WITH OTHER GROUPS

COMMITTEE ON MISSIONARY EDUCATION OF THE CANADIAN COUNCIL OF CHURCHES. Your Missionary Education Committee is a member of the above committee where joint action and planning is carried out and opportunity is provided for consultation and the pooling of information and resources on many subjects. Through this committee we participated in the planning and program of the International Missionary Education Conference of the Pacific Northwest held in 1961 on the campus of the University of British Columbia at which our Presbyterian Church was fully represented.

COMMISSION ON MISSIONARY EDUCATION OF THE NCCC/USA. Your Missionary Education Committee is also a member of the above commission in whose work it participates at various levels producing materials for the study themes on home and overseas missions. This is a valuable relationship for our committee which helps us to keep abreast of some of the best thinking in field of missionary education today and also enables us to make a contribution in the production of books published by Friendship Press and used to an increasing extent by our people.

In addition, the Chairman of the Missionary Education Committee and the Assistant Secretary for Overseas Missions took part in a joint meeting of the Commission on Missionary Education and the Division of Christian Education of the National Council of the Churches of Christ in the USA held in St. Louis, Missouri, in February 1961 at which there was a real facing of problems common to both these departments of the Church's life and work.

RECRUITMENT. This committee has worked closely with General Assembly's Committee on Recruitment for full time service of the Church in planning and taking part in recruitment meetings at university centres.

## STRUCTURE

Both missionary interpretation and missionary education are essential to the ongoing work of the General Board of Missions. As changes are made in the total structure of the Church, missionary education may well find itself in a department of education and nurture, but it ought never to be allowed to lose its identity as an instrument of education for mission, nor to be separated from the actual missions operations of our Church with which it has a vital and necessary relationship. It must be firmly rooted in home and overseas missions both of which depend so greatly upon the effective prosecution of the work of missionary education throughout the Church. Because mission is a dimension of the whole Church, however, missionary education is involved in every aspect of the Church's life and therefore membership on this committee should be broadly representative of the Boards and Committees of the Church.

## NO TIME TO FALTER

This day of increased urgency in mission is no time to falter in the fundamental task of interpreting missions fully and adequately to all our people.

# RECOMMENDATIONS TO GENERAL ASSEMBLY, 1962

#### 1. RE MISSIONS STUDY THEMES:

That the General Assembly adopt the Overseas Missions theme for 1962-63, "The Christian Mission on the Rim of East Asia," and the Home Missions theme for 1962-63, "The Christian Mission and Persons of Special Need," for study and prayer throughout the Church, and encourage the full use of materials on these themes as provided by the Missionary Education Committee.

#### 2. RE GENERAL FINANCE POLICY:

The General Board of Missions wishes to inform the General Assembly that the General Board of Missions approves in principle the general finance policy proposed by the Acting Comptroller:— Noting with particular approval,

- (a) that it provides for the opportunity of implementing the desire of the General Assembly for payment of a proper minimum stipend;
- (b) that both expenditure and income will be estimated on a gross basis;
- (c) that there will be coordination in the use of capital funds; And raising questions about the use of bequests and capital gifts in the following terms:
  - (a) There should be a clear definition of what is meant by a general designation of the work of the Church, by specific designation for some particular project, and also a clear procedure of consultation between Boards concerned and the general finance agencies of the Church in regard to designation of gifts which do not clearly lie in either of these areas;
  - (b) After clear definition has been made, members of our Church must be fully informed and educated so that they may know how to describe the purpose of bequests and gifts so that these may be used for the purposes desired.

# 3. RE BASIC MINIMUM STIPEND:

- (a) That the minimum stipend be raised to \$3,900 per annum, effective July 1st, 1962.
- (b) That, WHEREAS, the raising of the minimum stipend would be accomplished by making costly sacrifices at the deepest place in the life of the Church, i.e. in curtailing mission outreach at a crucial moment in the life of Canada and of the world;

THEREFORE, the General Assembly set up adequate plans for calling our people to more generous giving so that we may both do justice to our workers by ensuring adequate minimum support, and be faithful as a Church in our missionary outreach.

# 4. RE RATES OF STIPEND:

That the following rates of stipend be approved, as of July 1st 1962:

\$2,200 annual rate for married students.

\$3,900 annual rate for Extension Secretaries.

\$2,700 starting annual rate for graduate deaconesses plus annual increments of \$100 to \$3,200 per annum.

\$2,000 starting annual rate for women missionaries plus annual increments of \$100 to \$2,500 per annum.

\$35 per week plus room and board for student missionaries and student deaconesses on summer employment.

\$2,800 annual rate for catechists.

# 5. RE CARE OF CHURCH WORKERS:

That a special committee of the General Assembly be set up to deal with the care of ministers, deaconesses and catechists, who have lost their source of livelihood because they have been found to be unemployable in church work.

# 6. RE HOME MISSIONS GRANT YEAR:

That the General Board of Missions be authorized to adopt the calendar year as its Home Missions Grant Year as from January 1st, 1963.

# 7. RE CLASSIFICATION OF CONGREGATIONS:

That for purposes of grant reduction, congregations be classified under four categories: (a) High potential; (b) Congregations capable of moving reasonably quickly to self-supporting status; (c) Congregations expected to achieve self-supporting status more slowly; (d) Congregations that may never become fully self-supporting.

# 8. RE APPRECIATION OF THE WORK OF OVERSEAS MISSIONARIES:

That the General Assembly commend members of the staff overseas for their service in the midst of the unsettled yet challenging circumstances which characterize our world today, assuring them of the continued support of the Church and encouraging them in their faithful witness to Christ.

# 9. RE THE 90TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE ARRIVAL OF DR. MACKAY IN FORMOSA:

That the General Assembly take cognizance of the celebration of the Presbyterian Church of Formosa in March 1962 of the 90th Anniversary of the arrival in Formosa of Dr. George Leslie Mackay, the first Canadian Presbyterian missionary to Formosa.

## 10. RE RECOGNITION OF OVERSEAS MISSIONARIES:

(a) That the General Assembly inscribe in the minutes of the General Assembly 1962 the following minute of appreciation of the work of Rev. Hugh and Mrs. MacMillan who are about to retire from Overseas Service:

"We take this opportunity to honour Dr. Hugh A. MacMillan on the completion of thirty-eight years of missionary service under the Presbyterian Church in Canada, and to pay tribute to his zeal and vision and manifest achievements in the work of the Kingdom in Formosa. We give thanks to God for the long and distinguished record of this faithful servant of the Church.

"Dr. and Mrs. MacMillan went to Formosa first in 1924; over the years Dr. MacMillan worked consistently toward developing and establishing the Formosan Church, and has given outstanding leadership in the formation of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church of Formosa. Always, however,

he has kept in the background, working with his Formosan colleagues with deep humility and devotion, for whom he was always a visible link, not only with the Canadian Church but with the broader stream of the ecumenical movement.

"In the course of his varied and fruitful career, Dr. MacMillan has served suuccessively as a teacher of the Tam Kang High School, Principal of the Theological College, Associate General Secretary of the General Assembly, Principal of the Presbyterian Bible School, member of the Board of Governors of Tunghai University, Founder of the Taiwan Leprosy Relief Association, member of the Board of Mackay Memorial Hospital and Moderator of the North Synod of the Presbyterian Church of Formosa. Throughout his lifetime Dr. MacMillan has maintained a remarkable freshness of spirit and youthfulness of outlook which perhaps accounts for his life-long interest and effectiveness in Young People's work, both in the Church and in the YMCA.

"From the earliest days of his ministry, he devoted himself to language study in which he achieved unusual proficiency. This, together with his sympathetic understanding of the deeper needs and aspirations of the people, has won the affection and confidence of his Formosan friends and colleagues.

"In all his work Dr. MacMillan has been ably supported and assisted by his wife who has had no less a distinguished career than her husband. Besides managing a well-run home, rearing a fine family, she had engaged in a wide range of activities, especially as a nurse in the Mackay Memorial Hospital and in the Social Welfare Department, in Chinese women's work and in girls' work.

"We record our gratitude for the Christian example and missionary spirit so faithfully expressed by Dr. and Mrs. MacMillan throughout their long years of service and wish them God's richest blessings in the years of their retirement."

#### NOTE: RE CITATIONS FOR YEARS OF SERVICE:

# BRITISH GUIANA

1961 has brought a steady continuation of the development for which former generations of missionaries prepared the way—a Church in British Guiana which is conscious of itself as a Church in its own right, and which is able to take its place effectively in the building of a new nation under God. Much work remains to be done.

# STAFF CHANGES

In July Dr. Kenneth M. Glazier returned to his family, after spending nearly one and a half years in British Guiana, on a special appointment from

the General Board of Missions, as Manager of the Canadian primary schools, and Treasurer of the Mission Council.

August marked the return to Canada of the Rev. Robert D. Duncanson, Mrs. Duncanson, and Kathryn. The Duncansons had arrived in British Guiana in 1954, and during his time here Mr. Duncanson had served in many capacities: Associate Principal at Bethel College, Field Missionary, Acting Principal of the Berbice High School, Interim-minister of many congregations, pioneer in the field of Counselling among High School students and others.

During the first half of the year Miss Anna McDonald and Miss Margaret Ramsay both returned from Furlough. Miss McDonald took up her work in Berbice County, and Miss Ramsay centred in Georgetown, where she has charge of the women's and children's work in Demerara and Essequibo counties. Miss Ramsay is also Treasurer of Mission Council.

October saw the arrival of new Missionaries: Miss Merle McGowan appointed by the W.M.S. (W.D.) to work in the field of Christian Education; and the Rev. R. M. Shields, Mrs. Shields and their son have settled at Sarnia Manse, Essequibo, where Mr. Shields has taken up his work among the churches of the Essequibo Coast parish.

#### VISITORS

The major visit of the year was that made in January by the Moderator of the 1960 General Assembly, the Rev. Principal Robert Lennox, D.D., and Mrs. Lennox. This was only the second time that the Moderator of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada had included British Guiana in his tour. In June the Rev. R. Malcolm Ransom, Associate Secretary for Overseas Missions, paid his first visit to British Guiana. Your Mission Council can without reservation testify to the worth of such visits both for the Church here and for the Church in Canada.

# MISSIONARIES AT WORK

1961 saw for the first time not one single "field missionary".

The Rev. David Murphy, Chairman of Mission Council, is the Minister of Burns Memorial Church, Georgetown, and interim-moderator of two congregations in West Demerara.

The pastoral oversight of Burns Church has involved the work of a minister with a congregation of 300 members. A visitation of the whole membership was conducted as well as regular Sunday preaching. Teacher training classes were held to promote better teaching and to train new teachers for the Sunday School. Regular weekly sessions for leadership training and Bible study were held with the Presbyterian Men's Group. With the assistance of these men, a group of men were trained from the Better Hope and Triumph Churches. Individual members of the Burns' group have taken preaching appointments, and some are beginning to take part in the regular Morning Devotions broadcast over Radio Demerara. In December, visitors went to every home of the congregation to deliver sets of weekly free-will envelopes and stewardship literature.

Miss Ramsay's work as Treasurer of Mission Council brings her into close touch with the Ministers, Catechists and Deaconesses of the Church. As well as this, she has oversight of women's work in Demerara and Essequibo.

The Demerara Presbyterian Women's Association held its annual meeting on April 10th in Burns Church, Georgetown. Well over 100 women attended, from eleven districts or groups in the County. Reports on the year's activities, and discussion on how to make the groups more effective in the life of the Church contributed to the program.

Two rallies for the women of the Churches in Demerara were held, one on the East Coast and the other on the West Coast. It was a time of 'getting together' to know the women of the various groups.

Mrs. Helena Singh continued to work in Demerara among some of the women's groups, and also assisted in the Sunday School and Choir and home visiting in Burns Memorial Church. Miss Genevieve Persaud, who was stationed on the Essequibo Coast, worked with two women's groups.

It has been a great joy to their fellow missionaries to have Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Muchan in their midst, and to benefit from their experience and zeal. Mr. Muchan writes: "During this period of change the missionary is acting as coordinator of the area. The Ministers and Catechists meet every two months with the missionary to discuss and plan for the work for which they are responsible. It is no longer what the missionary thinks but what the leaders think. The possibility of carrying on the work and mission of the Church without the presence of the missionary is beginning to take root in the planning and thinking of the Church.

"During the past year three large Crusades for Christ have been held in the County of Berbice. Before the actual meetings begin there are two weeks of preparation. Laymen are counselled and instructed in visiting every home in the area. Suitable Christian literature is given out. After the meetings there are instruction classes for those who have responded. During this time there is also a week of prayer in which all the churches take part. The follow-up work is very important after such special meetings. Where Catechists and Ministers are faithful and diligent in this there are results.

"Along with the Crusade meetings, teaching missions, geared for the individual congregations, have a very important place in the total teaching program of the Church. Four such missions have been conducted, three in our own denomination and one in the Lutheran church."

Mr. and Mrs. Muchan also laid the foundation for a work in the field of Christian literature. In June a correspondence course was started which now, at the request of Presbytery, is being made available throughout the Church. This is meeting a real need, since many of our young people were studying under the auspices of Jehovah's Witnesses, Seven-Day Adventists, and several pentecostal and adventist groups, by correspondence.

Working out of New Amsterdam also is Miss Anna McDonald, of the W.M.S. (E.D.) who reports for 1961: "My co-workers, Miss Chhangur, Miss Baijnauth, and Miss Budhoo have continued to work in the same districts. They are to be commended for their faithfulness in the midst of various new challenges. Two one-day study conferences for Sunday School teachers were held in April, in Skeldon and New Amsterdam stressing the importance of the teacher's preparation of the lesson and how he could get and maintain the pupil's interest. Weekly teachers' preparation meetings are held in Letter Kenny and New Amsterdam. This has proven to be a real time of fellowship to us all.

"Up to this year there has been no organization for the young teen-age girl. She has had to find her place in the Happy Workers Society or Young People's Society. This year a 'flexible program' using the Canadian Girls in Training program as a basis, was presented to the Presbytery by Miss Chhangur. Presbytery adopted the program 'in principle' and groups have been organized in Number 48, Albion Front, and New Amsterdam."

The first Overseas Ordained Missionary, the Rev. R. M. Shields, writes of his first months in Essequibo: "My work involves the seven congregations on the Essequibo Coast, covering a distance of about 30 miles. At present three Catechists hold the regular services and do visitations, while my work is to bring the Sacraments and to conduct marriages, and to serve as over-all pastor of the parish.

"We arrived at the beginning of the Harvest Festival, and this kept us busy until the Sunday before Christmas. I preached at seven Harvest services, and attended as many Sunday School Harvest Concerts as chairman. Also, I have

celebrated Communion (my first) and conducted special Christmas and New Year services. Inspection of all our Church buildings has given me an idea of the work that has to be done in that area."

Miss Merle McGowan's report on her work during the last two months of the year under review cannot be quoted, since it takes the form of a re-edited and developed quarterly of Sunday School lessons, and a series of Junior work-sheets.

Rev. A. S. MacDonald is Secretary of Mission Council and, temporarily, Clerk of Presbytery. Since the departure of Dr. Glazier he has also served as Manager for the Canadian Mission Schools. He writes: "I am now acting-minister of four congregations on the West Bank of the Demerara River, and this is so only because there is at present no Guianese minister who is able to take over this work. In one way it is sad to mourn the passing of the Field Missionary, who for so many years expended himself in an imposing and impossible task, and at times extended himself over two whole counties. At other times, indeed, there was but one field missionary for the whole of the work in British Guiana! The development of the parish system, which is still in process, has however made him redundant, and it is a joy to see the Guianese ministers, with the backing of Presbytery, grasp the handles of the plough and not look back.

"As Secretary of Mission Council, I have the usual tasks of preparing and sending Minutes and Reports, and dealing with the correspondence to and from the Council."

#### AROUND THE PARISH

The Rev. A. H. Sohan, Moderator of Presbytery, reports from the extensive parish of West Coast, Berbice: "At Bush Lot, the year 1961 has shown an improvement over the previous years in weekly attendance, weekly offerings, and Harvest offerings. Regular Cottage Meetings were held throughout, with Open Air meetings held in every corner of the village. Regular women's meetings have been held. The Sunday School continues to make progress. Members of this congregation are anxiously awaiting the erection of a new Church building.

"At Cotton Tree divine services and weekly visitations are carried out regularly by the minister."

On the Corentyne Coast, a few miles from New Amsterdam, the Rev. W. L. Jagnandan is Minister of four churches at Albion. He writes: "During the past year, considerable progress was made. Enrolment increased and there was need for a building to meet the growing demands of the district. A start was made and on January 22nd the cornerstone of the new ferro-concrete structure, estimated to cost \$12,500, was laid by Dr. Lennox. The members gave unsparingly of their time and talents in the work. More than half of the amount was raised by the congregation. The new church was opened and dedicated on the eve of the General Election on August 20th, in the presence of a large gathering. It provides accommodation for 200. We look forward to the future with faith and confidence. The congregation owes a debt of gratitude to the Church in Canada for her help of \$5,500.

"To give the work a good start a week of special meetings was conducted, and 107 professed their faith in Jesus Christ."

The Rev. G. J. Sukhdeo is Minister at Better Hope, and his parish near Georgetown includes thriving congregations at Ogle and Triumph. Mr. Sukhdeo serves as Interim-moderator for the churches in Eastern Demerara. "At Better Hope, evangelistic services were conducted for a whole week during the Easter season. The Young People's Society meets every Thursday and has a varied program, planned quarterly, with much emphasis on Bible study. The members take part in the Cottage Prayer-meetings. Three men from Better Hope and two from Triumph successfully underwent the Presbyterian Men's training course."

The Rev. E. J. Rambali is Minister at Port Mourant and Letter Kenny on the Corentyne, and Interim-moderator of the Upper Corentyne group of six churches. In the Essequibo River the Rev. Charles Ramcharran, who was ordained in April, ministers to eight congregations on the islands of Leguan and Wakenaam, and in the village of Bartica. All these men are in full charge of work at one time the responsibility of the field missionaries.

#### BERBICE HIGH SCHOOL

The Principal, Mr. B. Beharry, writes of the first full calendar year since his return from studies in Toronto and New York: "The school opened with an enrolment of 491 pupils. There were 14 Forms with a staff of 19 teachers.

"The first phase of the new buildings was completed early in the year, and the formal dedication and opening took place on Sunday, January 22nd. The Minister of Education, Mr. Balram Singn Rai, presided at this function and our guest speaker was Dr. Lennox.

"In the academic field the school was able to hold its own. Of the candidates who were presented for the Oxford and Cambridge Schools examination, ordinary level, there were 57% who gained full certificates (four subjects or more) while subject passes yielded 65%. Only two of the seventy candidates presented failed outright.

#### PRIMARY SCHOOLS

We began the year with 30 Canadian Mission primary schools, but on July 1, 12 of these were taken over by the Government. These 12 schools had been founded in buildings erected by the Mission, but from funds supplied by the Government. The majority People's Progressive Party had long been opposed to continuing involvement of the churches in primary education, and so a Bill was passed in the Legislative Council removing from denominational control all buildings erected entirely from Government funds. This of course stirred up a good deal of controversy among the churches involved in primary education. The Bill became law on July 1, and a total of 50 primary schools changed from denominational to Government control on that day.

Both the Government and the denominations have a good case in the confusing schools issue, and in it all we seek to do only what will be best for the Church in British Guiana.

We must not lose sight of the fact that in these schools the Canadian Mission has made a recognized and lasting contribution to the life and development of British Guiana, especially among the East Indian community.

#### THEOLOGICAL EDUCATION

Dr. W. J. S. Farris continues his work as our representative on the staff of Union Theological Seminary, Jamaica, where he has now been joined by a total of seven students. The Presbytery has received several further applications from young men who wish to enter the ministry.

Early in the year Dr. Farris was asked to serve as consultant to a team from the International Missionary Council which surveyed the field of theological education in the Caribbean area.

# DEACONESS TRAINING

In October began what had been in the passive planning stage for some time, a new idea for the training of young women for Church workers. Eight young women were accepted for a two-year, "Service-in-Training" course, the first three months of which were spent in taking lectures in Biblical subjects and Christian Education lectures and activities. Miss McGowan and Miss Ramsay led discussions on Christian Education, Sunday School teaching, women's group programs, singing, music, and English. The next stage of the 'service-in-training' program is a three-month field work period."

# CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

From July we returned to the beginning of our three-year cycle of ungraded

Sunday School lessons, and so the burden of preparation has lessened for the small Publications Committee.

A Committee in Berbice produces materials for Daily Vacation Bible Schools, which will soon be made available throughout the Church, and will help greatly to develop this phase of activity.

The dream of a curriculum for the English speaking Caribbean approached much nearer to reality this year, as the Rev. D. Mitchell settled into his full-time activity. Mr. Mitchell, who has wide experience through this area, and solid training in Christian Education, is the Editor of the 'Christian Living' series curriculum and Director of Leadership Training for the Caribbean Committee on Joint Christian Action, associated with the W.C.C.E.S.S.A.

In September a two-week Writers' and Artists' Institute was held at Nelson Island, Trinidad, for those in the Eastern Caribbean who had been chosen to work on the new curriculum. Most of the preliminary production of the first year's lessons for Primary and Junior grades was completed during this institute, thus giving a solid thrust to the Christian Living Series. Miss Ramsay and Mr. MacDonald were among the writers chosen, and Mr. Cyril Kanhai, Head Teacher of New Dam Canadian Mission School, was one of the artists.

#### AND SO FORTH

During the year under review, three major events in the life of the Presbytery have occurred: Presbytery has undergone a thorough reorganization of its committees and their functions, which should produce a much more stable oversight of the work. The shift of responsibility from Mission Council to Presbytery continues steadily. After sixteen years as the 'Canadian Presbyterian Church' it is now known as the GUIANA PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH. In August this Church was accepted as a member of the World Alliance of Reformed Churches. All these developments indicate the steady growth of the Presbytery and the membership in general, in carrying forward the mission to which this Church has been called.

The Rev. Clement DeCastro, former Clerk of Presbytery, was awarded a scholarship by the General Board of Missions, and proceeded to Toronto in September.

In August British Guiana entered a new phase of political development, with the coming into force of a new Constitution granting complete internal self-government. The election gave a majority of seats in the House of Assembly to the People's Progressive Party, and Dr. Jagan became this colony's first Premier. Dr. Jagan's support comes mainly from the East Indians of the rural areas, and that of the opposition parties comes from the Negroes and other races in the towns. This racial split, especially between the large East Indian and Negro sections of the community has been greatly magnified by the granting of political power to the masses. There has been adult suffrage only since 1953. It is certainly the largest question mark against the future of British Guiana as a nation.

We move forward into 1962, which has already brought such grief and tragedy, knowing that Almighty God has work for the Guiana Presbyterian Church to do, and praying that He may give your missionaries strength and wisdom for the days that lie ahead.

# FORMOSA

The year 1961 in the Presbyterian Church of Formosa marks the start of a Centenary Planning Program, in preparation for the Centenary in 1965. In the first week of January a special conference was held in Tainan to which leaders were invited to think and plan together for the deepening of the spiritual life of the church, and the extension of its work. As a result, the General Assembly in February approved the general outline of the Centenary Program. Quantitatively, the program calls for the establishment of 200 new congregations during the

next four years, bringing the total to 1,000. Qualitatively, looking to the deepening of the Church's life, and its creative influence in society, there is to be new emphasis on the missionary outreach of each congregation, on the present function of each Church institution, and on the relevance of the church's work in a time of rapid social change. In particular, new efforts are to be made to reach the student world, to serve the industrial workers, to find ways to bring the Gospel by word and deed to the West Coast fisher folk and salt workers, and to the tribal population.

Some modest beginnings have been made in every department of this large program,

#### NEW CHURCHES

Twenty-five new plains churches have been begun in 1961, and five new tribal churches. In 1954, when the Double-the-Church movement was begun, there were 257 plains churches and 177 tribal churches. It was then hoped to double the number of plains (Formosan) churches by 1965. At the end of 1961 there are 414 Formosan churches, and 382 tribal churches making a total of 796. Progress has been encouraging, but the growth in numbers of churches is not matched by growth in church membership, and too few church members are aware of their responsibility for bringing new members into the Christian community, thinking (as in western countries) that this is the task of the minister.

#### TRIBAL WORK

At present one committee of the Assembly is responsible for an overwhelming task which includes church extension, evangelism and Christian nurture among the tribal churches. Presbyterian Christians form one third of the total tribal population, and with the addition of Christians of other churches far more than half the tribal population is under Christian influence. In contrast, not more than 2% of the combined Formosan and mainland population are Christian. Growth in numbers of tribal Christians, and in numbers of churches, is slower now than three years ago. This is partly due to emphasis upon education and nurture of Christians, partly to lack of trained people to do the church's work, partly to the effects of materialism upon primitive people.

On November 29th the Chi-oang Memorial Church was dedicated, at the mouth of the Taroka Gorge. The Church stands beside the cave where Chi-oang, the first tribal Christian missionary led her people in Christian worship, usually in hiding from the Japanese who were trying to stamp out Christianity. This year also marks the leadership in tribal work of Rev. H. T. Cho as Mountain Work Secretary. He was installed by Assembly in February.

#### WEST COAST EVANGELISM

Fishermen and salt workers along the west coast, facing mainland China, are a low income group, isolated by poor communications, and more superstitious than other plains people. In recent years the Chia Yi and Tainan presbyteries have made special efforts to reach these unfortunate people. 1961 and the start of the Centenary Program have seen intensified efforts in this area and a few remarkable ne wchurches have been begun. This year, the Taichung Presbytery has taken on missionary work in its section of the West Coast and an important part of the year's work was a careful social survey in one section.

#### TRAINING FOR CHURCH WORK

The Presbyterian Church of Formosa has four colleges in which young people receive training for church work. The total number of students is about 500 and of these about half are graduates of senior middle school who take a six-year course of ministerial training. About 100 are tribal students. About 150 are taking religious education, or short courses. Many students apply each year to enter our theological colleges, but the graduates are never enough to supply the churches with ministers.

#### TAIWAN THEOLOGICAL COLLEGE

Taiwan Theological College, located on a hillside outside the city of Taipei was started in 1888 by Dr. George Leslie Mackay in Tamsui. It was moved to Taipei in 1914, and to its present beautiful site in 1956.

The majority of its 112 students are graduates of high school and are studying a six-year course in liberal arts and theology. On graduation they receive the B.Th. degree. Nine students are college graduates who are taking a three-year course toward the B.D. degree. High School graduates may also take a three-year Christian Education course. In June 1962, seven students will be graduated from the B.Th. course, three from the B.D. course and four from the Christian Education course.

The staff consists of nine professors, six of whom are Chinese; two full-time lecturers, and 26 part-time teachers. Of the Canadian Presbyterian Mission, Dr. Dickson is Principal, Mr. Sutherland a full-time lecturer, Dr. Wilson and Mrs. Sutherland part-time lecturers.

Out of a total budget of \$18,000 the College received \$3,000 from the Presbyterian Church in Canada. One Sunday of the year is set apart for offerings to the College. This year classroom space has proven to be inadequate and work has begun for the first section of a new building that will eventually house the library and provide additional classrooms. Also urgently needed is an additional dormitory for men students.

The curriculum is constantly under review. It is being changed now so that B.Th. students will take three years of arts subjects and then will study together with the B.D. students for three years.

#### TAM KANG MIDDLE SCHOOL

The year 1961 was another year of progress for the middle school. Enrolment remained at the level of approximately 1,200 students. Following, are some of the statistics for the first term.

During the summer some modifications were made in entrance procedures. It is hoped to reduce the number of students per class, and at the same time upgrade the scholastic level of our senior school on which our reputation is staked.

The Christian emphasis is very important in the middle school. Each day begins with morning chapel. Each class has one hour religious instruction a week and there is an evangelistic service each term, with distinguished Christian leaders taking part. The dormitory is the heart of a mission school. It is here that the students have time and opportunity for Christian witness. The dormitories have an evening worship service led by teachers. There is an active youth organization. There is a weekly morning prayer session and a choir of 84 voices to lead in worship services. Sunday worship must be arranged in two sections. The school term will close with a week-long spiritual emphasis week. The students conduct Sunday Schools in seven places around Tamsui serving 350 students. Fifty-one of the students were baptized this year, a very happy occasion for the school.

Four years ago the girls' and boys' schools were united. Classes were moved to the main building and extra classrooms were added two years ago. The main problem of the school is dormitory space for the boy students. Several plans were brought forward, and finally building began in October. The present plan calls for four new houses each to be occupied by 24 senior boys. At the same time, building of a two-storey junior boys' dormitory to house 150 boys is being carried out. This building will be ready for use in the fall of 1962.

At the same time the Board has endeavoured to clarify the school's legal status. They have continued, with the valuable aid of Dr. E. H. Johnson, to press for a clear title to the school buildings as well as the property.

# MOUNT MORRISON THEOLOGICAL TRAINING INSTITUTE

A significant development in tribal work in 1961 was the strengthening of the Mount Morrison Theological Institute which now has its own board, and the construction of its first permanent building, dedicated May 22nd.

As of December 1961 there were five full-time teachers and 111 students representing 10 different tribes. In the fall, a two-month refresher course was held for 17 mountain preachers.

One feature of the school is the work scholarship program in which each student is required to work twelve hours a week in agriculture — in the gardens or orchards. The school has considerable garden land, also an orange orchard and an area of forest. Work done and produce raised for the school all help to relieve the budget of the school.

In 1962 it is planned to start an agricultural school providing short courses for aborigines in better farming methods, teaching them to improve their farms and make better use of their land.

#### MACKAY MEMORIAL HOSPITAL

Our two church hospitals in Taipei and Changhua have continued to render notable service to church and community, and particularly to poor patients. The Mackay Hospital is already embarked on a building program to modernise and improve its plant and the Changhua Hospital has plans and hopes for a similar program. Few hospitals in the Far East are such centres of evangelism as our hospitals. Countless Christians have learned of the Saviour in our hospitals. A most remarkable example of this is the case of a young dancer who came to the Mackay Memorial with an incurable disease. She was won to Christ during her stay in the hospital and as a result brought her whole family into the Christian life before her death. One of the saddest things to report is that many local pastors fail to follow up and nurture those who began their Christian life while in hospital, after their return to their homes.

The new wing of the Mackay Hospital was begun in March 1961 and will be finished in 1962. This will greatly relieve the crowded conditions in the old building.

In order to accommodate more in-patients, a temporary ward was built to the south of the hospital to provide 27 more beds. The total number of beds is now 177. The staff has been increased and consists of 26 doctors, 76 nurses, and 125 other staff members. This makes a total of 227 staff members. In addition to this, the hospital has 57 student nurses in training.

Additional departments of opthalmology and psychiatry were established during the year.

Mackay Memorial Hospital doctors took the initiative in forming a Christian Medical Society in Taipei, and as their first project, have opened a clinic in one of the worst slum areas in Taipei.

In August, Miss Jean Walvoord of the Reformed Church in America Mission came to Mackay Hospital to be the director of hospital nursing and to be the head of the nursing school. Miss Walvoord has begun a post-graduate training course for nurses, has established a public health clinic, and has improved the nursing school greatly.

The students from Changhua now come to Mackay Memorial Hospital for their first and second year of nurses' training. We are hoping to establish a joint nursing school in the future.

The Social Service Department has continued to serve a very useful purpose

in the overall program of the hospital. It was through the careful guidance of Mrs. Hugh MacMillan that the social service department was established.

A new way in which churches and organizations can help the Social Service Department was set up through the establishment of a "Memorial Bed". The amount of \$450 N.T. (\$12 U.S.) will provide a bed for a patient for a month. This amount does not include drugs or food. Through this plan we hope to interest more local people in making a monthly donation to the social service department to care for the poor.

This year the social service department gave help to 7,704 patients through partial payment of bills or through giving medicines or food. \$337,572 N.T. (or \$8,439.30 in U.S.) was contributed to the social service department in 1961, 54% of which was given by Mackay Memorial Hospital.

During the year of 1961, Mackay Hospital gave a total of \$1,025,267 N.T. in charity (or \$25,631.68 U.S.). Included in this amount is \$118,493 N.T. (\$2,962.42 U.S.) which was given in discounts to pastors and their families. Discounts to staff personnel are not included in this figure.

This year, we increased the staff of the religious department to three full-time workers. In addition to this, there are many staff members who assist in taking charge of Bible study groups and also help in working with individual patients. We had our first annual "Spiritual Emphasis Week" in November. Over 200 people attended every evening and showed an enthusiastic spirit. Some of these discussion groups have continued in the form of Bible study groups. There are now six of these, all of which meet weekly.

During the past year, the records kept by the evangelistic department show that 162 persons became interested in Christianity while in the hospital. Of these, 8 accepted the gospel before dying; 3 were lapsed Christians who returned to the Church; 21 were patients who accepted the Gospel but had no church near their home, so were sent Christian literature regularly by the chaplain; 6 people were influenced by patients to become Christian and are now in the church; 124 were patients who accepted the Gospel and were introduced to local churches for follow-up. One of the patients who found Christ while at the hospital has set up a new preaching station in his home; indications are that this will probably become a new church eventually.

In 1962 we have many pressing problems before us. The hospital must, in some way, pay back a loan of \$45,000 US; and in addition, it needs another \$50,000 US for equipment. Serious consideration must be given to present business procedures which need changing or re-organization. We need to continue to stress the importance of medical work as it is related to the church. Since the hospital is controlled by the church, it is often hard to understand that the hospital's aim is not just to give medical treatment and discounts to pastors and church members; but that its purpose is to help the sick and needy, whoever they may be, and to try to reach them for Christ.

The Mackay Memorial Hospital staff has worked hard to improve its services and its witness in 1961. More people on our staff have come to see our real purpose and objective.

#### HAPPY MOUNT LEPROSY COLONY

Happy Mount Leprosy Colony was started nearly thirty years ago by Dr. George Gushue-Taylor, and has aided hundreds of leprosy patients through the

years. For most of these years it was the only Christian organization caring for these sufferers. Happy Mount is a private Christian Leprosarium solely supported by Christian funds from all around the world.

Within the last few years, with the growth of the Taiwan Leprosy Relief Association, many Christian Leprosy clinics have opened all over the island, caring for all types of patients and touching such a field of leprosy sufferers as none of us dreamed of only a few years ago. In the midst of this whole program, Happy Mount continues with resident patients who stay in the Colony for a number of years.

In 1961, 25 patients were baptized, making a total of 59 baptized Christians in the Colony during the year. Besides these, 17 became Christians but were not baptized, preferring to wait until they were away from the leprosarium and healed, to be baptized. Total — 67 Christians.

#### YOUTH WORK

One of the most important and at the same time one of the most neglected groups in the church is our university students. This summer our Youth Secretary and his committee organized an all-island conference for Christian university students. It was well planned, and leadership was outstanding. Along with this nurture of Christian university students, in Taipei, Tainan and Taichung and also new efforts to understand and serve the university community. At the end of the year, Mr. David Barnes a new Frontier Intern (short-term missionary) of the United Presbyterian Church arrived to take part in this university student work.

#### PRESBYTERY ORGANIZATION

In recent years one of the most active presbyteries in our church is the Chia Yi district, which has had a full time secretary for three years. This year the Tainan presbytery has appointed a secretary and the results are already apparent in a greatly intensified program of church extension and the beginning of a mobile clinic. The entire budget for these presbytery office expenses is raised within the presbyteries. The two presbytery secretaries meet occasionally with the General Assembly staff for mutual help and encouragement.

# TYPHOON PAMELA

On September 12 typhoon Pamela caused great destruction in sections of North Formosa. Never in the past have so many churches been damaged or destroyed. Many Christian families lost houses and possessions, though none lost their lives. In this emergency, the General Assembly took swift action to have staff members visit the stricken areas, to distribute emergency relief to Christians from our Disaster Fund and then to appeal to Christians here and abroad for assistance. Many churches and individuals in Formosaa, including some tribal churches, sent gifts. Our cooperating missions contributed about \$11,000 to help re-build the damaged churches. Some of the repairs have already been completed, and in every case work has been started.

#### RELIEF WORK

This year marks a new degree of involvement on the part of our church in the work of Taiwan Christian Service. This inter-denominational agency acts for Church World Service and Lutheran World Relief. Relief work in Formosa takes the form of a family feeding program, using surplus foods from the U.S. and Canada. Many of our pastors and church members have taken part in this work, but our church has never in the past been officially represented on the Executive or Board of Taiwan Christian Service.

# INTER-CHURCH RELATIONS

In October 1960 when representatives of our church met with delegates from Episcopal, Methodist and Lutheran churches it was decided to meet again in

1961 for informal discussion and fellowship, and to invite delegates from all other denominations. In December 1961 a second meeting was held, with 4 additional denominations represented, namely the Holiness, Covenant, Southern Baptist and Mennonite Churches. There were reports from each Church, the fellowship of a meal together, and an excellent session on Christian middle school work. It was decided to meet twice in 1962.

#### EXPANSION OF THE ROMAN CATHOLIC CHURCH

The rapid expansion of the Roman Catholic church and its institutions in Formosa poses serious and often agonizing problems for our church. The latest Catholic year book shows that priests and other full time workers number 2,200. This is 4 times as many people as our church has in full time church work (Formosan, tribal workers and missionaries combined). In finance, the resources of the R.C. church seem unlimited and it is hard to persuade our people that we must adhere to our principles of self-support when so little financial support is required by the Catholics. There are practical and obvious problems, and of course the theological issues are far more serious.

#### CANADIAN PERSONNEL

The following is a record of the comings and goings of Canadian Presbyterian missionaries to and from Taiwan during 1961. In March, the Rev. James E. and Mrs. Sutherland and children returned to Taiwan to take up their work at the Taiwan Theological College. In June, Miss Hazel Macdonald left for furlough and retirement after several years devoted to organizing and leading the Formosan W.M.S. of the North Synod. July saw the departure of Miss Margaret Mackenzie, now Mrs. Gordon McCutcheon, from her work in the Christian Education Department of the Taiwan Theological College. September brought the Rev. Bernard L. M. and Mrs. Embree and children to begin work on the Formosan language at the Taipei Language Institute. In November, the Rev. Hugh A. and Mrs. MacMillan were bid fond farewells as they left for retirement after 37 years of devoted service to the Formosan people. Also in November, the Rev. Murray L. and Mrs. Garvin and baby arrived and began the study of Formosan.

In February, the McGills moved from the Taipei area to Hsin-chu to continue their translation work. The Gordons and Costerus' exchanged houses in the summer, the Gordons returning to Lotung and east coast tribal work, and the Costerus' taking up new work at the Hsin-chu Bible School. Late in August Miss Eileen Black of the W.M.S. staff was married to the Rev. William Estell, a missionary of the Reformed Church of America. Miss Isabel Taylor, after a serious illness and enforced rest in Tamsui, returned to her work in Tainan at year's end. The Wilsons worked with Taiwan Christian Service (Church World Service) for a period of six months, to assist with relief distribution.

Douglas James Sutherland was born in May, and Stephen Christian Costerus in September, thus bringing the total number of Canadian mission children on the field to 21.

#### CONCLUSION

The discerning reader will see at once that while there is much ground for thanksgiving as one looks back over the year 1961, there is no room for complacency. Many of the situations and problems in this Formosan church of 3rd and 4th generation Christians are similar to the conditions in churches in the western world. As one realizes that this church, almost a hundred years old, is fairly strong statistically, and that it is growing, one must yet probe deeper and ask the question — What is the impact of this oldest and strongest Protestant church on the life of Formosa today? Is it an influence in society, or does society ignore it? Does the church, through its members make any significant impact on an economy which is shifting from rural to industrial? Is Christianity influence

ing thought, action, religion to any important degree? Is Christianity as important an influence in Formosa now as it was 50 years ago? Only God knows the true answers to these questions.

# BHIL FIELD, INDIA

When the World Council of Churches met in New Delhi in November, many expressed the hope that the Church in India would see in a fuller way that its prime task was to spread the Gospel of Jesus Christ to every corner of the nation. It is with this same hope that we have carried on our work this year on the Bhil Field. For many years the authority, and the responsibility for doing the work, was in the hands of the missionaries. It is not an easy task now for the Church in India to accept the great responsibility of the Commission to carry the light of Christ into every area of darkness.

There is need too for a method of evangelism which will not involve great amounts of money. The area cannot sustain an expensive program. While it would seem good to use some paid evangelists still, in no way should they be thought of as doing all the work for which every member of Christ's Church is also responsible. During the year the Churches were asked to be responsible for witness up to an area of two or three miles from the church so that evangelists could be released for outreach in new areas.

In the Barwani area the evangelists have been busy in many places. One evangelist preaches in six villages within a radius of seven miles from Barwani. Farther out another evangelist works in Panchpulla, i.e. a group of five villages. Work has been carried on sporadically across the Goi River, south of Panchpulla, where a tribe of Banjari people live. The people seem eager to hear the Word and are prepared to make a house or give some kind of shelter for the use of an evangelist if one can be spared to dwell among them.

The two evangelists in the Khalghat-Balkhar area have been trying to keep contact with some twenty-two villages, in some of which there are small groups of Christians who need to be nurtured. The flooded Narbada River threatened more than once this year to sweep away the house in which these evangelists live. However, each time they managed to wade through the water to safety and spend the night sitting in a house crowded with refugees like themselves.

At Toran Mal an evangelist ministers to a small Christian group and preaches in a few nearby villages.

The Church in Barwani has been without a Pastor since the end of June because their Pastor has gone to study for an M.A. degree. Nevertheless, the work has been going on. Sunday School, Sunday worship and mid-week prayer meetings have been conducted regularly. Many of the meetings were conducted by laymen and laywomen.

The women of the Church in Barwani met twenty-seven times during the year for the Women's Fellowship Devotional meetings. They had numerous work sessions, and a sale to earn money to provide more furnishings for the church. They helped in visitation of the sick, in conducting devotional meetings at Panchpulla, and they also helped by making a financial contribution to the Presbytery and to the U.C.N.I. work in Kenya.

In the Alirajpur-Mendha area some village evangelism has been done. There was a two week camp in Chandpur, and a one week camp in Sindanpani. In Chandpur, where there are no Christians, numerous friendly contacts were made with teachers and leaders in the town.

In Mendha an attempt has been made in this past year at the Pauline ministry. Two evangelists volunteered to work part time at farming, and their support for a part of the year will be from the crops harvested. The Joint Evangelistic Committee did not decide on this form of Pauline ministry until late in the season, and the amount harvested has therefore been less than hoped.

The Refresher Course for evangelists (for the entire field) was held in Amkhut this year. Mr. Milne headed up planning and arrangements in connection with classes for Adult Literacy teachers. These classes were held in five centres throughout the Presbytery.

Early in the year Amkhut's retired Pastor Tezlo died. His funeral service served to remind us that Christ has worked in the hearts of people here. This service, and the family's conduct, showed a commitment to Christ that was a real witness to His presence.

Dr. Wood reports that during the year his main assignment has been the adaptation in Hindi of Dr. Sigfrid Estborn's English book entitled "The Christian Doctrine of Salvation". This is one of the books in "The Christian Students' Library", a series of theological studies prepared especially for Indian theological students by prominent authors. The aim in preparing these theological study books is that they will be of profit not only to those preparing themselves for leadership in the Church in India, but also to a wider reading public in the Church in this Hindi speaking area. During the latter half of the year Dr. Wood lectured on The Christian Doctrine of Salvation to the senior class at the United Theological Seminary, Indore.

Miss Hislop reports that in the women's evangelistic work, much thought and effort has been claimed by the Women's Fellowship—the women of the Church. The Helping Committee has progressed in planning the program and in writing a greater share of the studies.

The Women's Fellowship held its Annual Meeting on December 29. Delegates and other members were present from nine out of the eleven groups. Reports showed some areas of progress, and also showed areas of weakness where help is needed.

# AMKHUT SCHOOL

In Amkhut, work in the school went on much as usual during 1961. We finished the year with about 275 children on the roll and 18 teachers on the staff. We try to have a well-rounded program in order that our boys and girls may grow spiritually, mentally and physically.

In 1961, 3 boys and 2 girls from our school were granted scholarships for High School in Rasalpura and Jhansi respectively. Arrangements were made for nurse aide training for 2 of the older girls.

# VILLAGE SCHOOLS

Miss Scott reports that the six Village Primary Schools continued to function the first part of the year with no changes of staff. All except Jobat and Mendha have their holidays during the rainy season when farmers are especially busy and the children are needed at home.

When the Puniyawat school closed the middle of June the teacher, Ayyub Master, was not well. He died the latter part of July. It was not possible to get a suitable teacher at that time of year, and Ayyub's widow and family of six children were still in the house.

Some children from the Balkhar-Khalghat area are attending school in the United Church of Canada school at Mandleshwar. The Joint Integration Committee on Evangelism has been asked to start a small hostel at Khalghat to accommodate children from homes of new Christians in villages near there. They can attend the government school in Khalghat. They will get some help with food, as well. As most of the Christians there are quite poor, they need a good deal of encouragement to realize the value of education. Although the government aim for the Third Five-year Plan is compulsory education for all children, the goal is a long way off in this area. We are happy to be able to help in a small measure to reach it and at the same time to prepare Church leaders.

#### SECONDARY EDUCATION

One of our boys passed the Higher Secondary Examinations, receiving the highest marks of any Rasalpura students, and is now at Indore Christian College. Seven girls passed the matriculation examinations at Jhansi. Of these, one has gone on to college, three are in Normal School, and three are taking nurses' training. Two of our girls successfully completed the two year course at the Teacher Training College in Jabalpur. Three of our young men passed the B.A. examinations. Two young men completed their courses in the Trade School at Rasalpura — one in tailoring and one in welding.

#### M.G. ABEY MEMORIAL CHILDREN'S NURSING HOME

"The statistics for the M.G. Abey Children's Nursing Home were encouraging with six new babies between the first of April and the end of July. But during the rainy season and again during the last two months of the year we had a struggle with much sickness among them.

Of the four babies now with us twin girls are to return to their father's home when they are one and one-half years old. It was not easy to make a decision regarding taking them. For some years we have taken only children who have been given to us outright. But the father was loath to give them up. At the same time he knew he could not keep them at home. So we agreed to keep them until they are a year and a half old. We trust that it will be possible to continue to keep a contact with them and their families, and that this service may yet bring forth fruit in their lives and in the lives of those in their villages.

The three who are about two years old seem well now, as do the four fouryear olds. The latter attend Nursery School daily. Ruth Guman, who is in charge of the Home, conducts the school each forenoon for these and six to twelve others of the same age.

# AMKHUT HOSTELS

In the Amkhut hostels the numbers have been about the same as in recent years. At the close of the year there were 74 boys and 85 girls.

School is from 7.15 A.M. to 1.30 P.M. so afternoons are free for hostel jobs, except for an hour of supervised study. The girls do all their own work, being divided into groups for the cleaning, cooking, cleaning grain, grinding, etc. The boys do not cook, but bring wood from the jungle for themselves, the girls and the Children's Home. Others have regular chores on the compound, or help with whatever work is going on in field or garden. The children's parents pay fees which are determined by their salary, but this does not cover the full cost of their food, so they can help with this work. From 4 to 5 p.m. those from fourth class up have supervised study. At this time the boys 14 years or older continue their work, and are paid a little for this time. Most of them are able to pay for their books in this way. From 5 o'clock to supper time is play time for all.

There is a short devotional period each morning and evening. "We try to have the hostel routine such that children will learn to live with others, working faithfully and honestly, playing happily together. Still, a good deal of time is spent in talking and dealing with individuals or small groups, trying to help them to overcome the temptations to deceive, to tell untruths, to steal, to quarrel."

The smaller children take part in the 'Bal Sabha' which meets weekly for Bible Study and handwork under the leadership of Mrs. Milne and one of the teachers. The older girls re-organized the Yuvti Sabha after the rains. These are both Church organizations but the hostel girls and boys are benefited by them.

In July Mrs. Milne began a systematic public health program in the school. She and the nurse in the dispensary examined all the children. A further check was made later, and some visits made to homes. In December Dr. Daniel and a

laboratory technician from Jobat hospital spent three busy days giving a more thorough examination to all the children. In general, the doctor was pleased with the physical condition of the children.

In the work of supervising the hostels a major item is the care of the orphan boys and girls, most of whom are graduates of the M.G. Abey Home. There are fourteen boys and eight girls in the school for whom we are responsible. A few of these are from Christian families and go to relatives' homes during the holidays, but we feed and clothe them. At Christmas time we have a special Khana (dinner) for all here and all 'graduates' who can come.

#### JOBAT CHRISTIAN HOSPITAL

Dr. Williams reports that many areas of progress in the work of the hospital become evident with the review of the statistics and work accomplished within this year. Chief highlights surround evangelism, increases in patients treated, and increase in local support.

"We were most fortunate this year to gain Musa Abey as our hospital evangelist on loan from the Joint Evangelism Committee. This man has proven his capability and sincerity by the responses we see from patients. More want to take literature home; more want to keep in touch with Christian workers in their respective areas. An increased budget is necessary to cover the increasing requirements for Scripture portions and Christian literature. It is refreshing to hear people ask "What is the meaning of the Sabbath" or "Why are there four books in the Bible telling much the same story about Christ?" or "Do you think I should remove from my wrist these string-like 'charms' of the witch doctor?"

In spite of the decision to hold the size of the hospital down to 85 beds, more work has been turned out this year than last in nearly all departments. The out-patient department treated almost 1,000 more than the previous years; in-patients totals were up by 800 to give the average bed occupancy no room for expansion this coming year. Surgery more than doubled over 1960.

The staff has increased only slightly to meet this new load, which indicates that willing hands have taken on additional work. Dr. Daniel's services have greatly helped in sharing the day-to-day medical responsibilities of the administrator.

The T.B. Ward continues to be over-crowded, creating one of our biggest medical problems. Of the 85 beds in the hospital, 25 are devoted to T.B. patients. Not infrequently people are turned away for lack of accommodation. Until we are able to provide more adequate facilities for isolation of these patients, they will continue to be a health hazard to staff and community.

Nearly Rs. 45.45,000 (approximately \$10,000) were locally gained, making the institution over 38% self-supporting. Part of this increase in local support

is due to increasing numbers of patients treated, increase in surgery, and part is due to government projects in the area bringing greater prosperity with them. As the hospital has more than doubled its in-patients in the last ten years, and as medical care per patient has risen considerably, it is our real hope that the hospital will continue to grow in the quality of work performed with increasing local support filling in the financial deficits."

In 1961 we have had on our Nursing Staff:

Six supervisors — three of whom have had post-graduate training. Three younger staff nurses who have had post-graduate training.

Two graduate nurses

One nurse aide-compounder, who is also X-ray technician

One nurse aide midwife, our Out-patient Department nurse

Two nurse aides

Ten years ago, in 1951, the School of Nursing was not open, there were no night nurses and the day nurses were on call for night. In 1961 there was an altogether different picture. There are three shifts: day, evening and night. Each Ward has a Supervisor: the T.B. Ward, Private Line, Men's Ward, Women's Ward, Maternity Ward, plus one Supervisor in the Operating room. There is an evening Supervisor and one graduate nurse. On nights is a graduate supervisor. Twenty-five students contribute to the task of bedside nursing, and the Supervisor has become more of a teacher, helping the student when necessary in the actual nursing. These students are being prepared step by step for the day when they will carry on the nursing services in the Jobat Christian Hospital."

# MOBILE MEDICAL UNITS

"This year found the Units with more staff."

"A nurse aide returned to us as a graduate midwife after her nine months' course in Jobat. The Barwani pastor's wife, a nurse midwife, joined our staff. These two capably carry the load in the Barwani area."

"One of our staff members returned from the M.I.B.E. Post-Graduate School in Indore having completed a year's study to qualify as Ward Sister and Public Health nurse."

"In Panchpulla the nurse aide midwife, wife of the evangelist there, has been a wonderful witness both in word and deed."

"In March our senior nurse attended a conference and workshop of the Public Health group, begun in Indore at the time of the Christian Medical Association Conference the previous autumn. This group, has grown to a membership of over sixty under the direction of Dr. Thomson, Secretary for the Preventive Medicine Department of the C.M.A.I."

"We seem to be coming in contact with more and more leprosy patients in the Mendha-Amkhut area. In a Government survey conducted some time ago, it was reported that this area has the largest incidence of the disease in central India. Perhaps this is another field where we can be of some use, for certainly it is a most important and necessary work."

# THE ISABEL MCCONNELL SCHOOL OF NURSING

Miss Simpson reports, "We started the year with twenty-seven students. Three of these were midwifery students, and they successfully completed their year. Seven third-year students graduated in April, and of them three (all

Christian Bhil girls) are now taking midwifery. One man stayed on the staff of Jobat hospital; one man is in one of the dispensaries.

At the year's end there are twenty-five students in the School: seven in first year, nine in second year, six in third year, and three in fourth year (midwifery class). Our students come from different parts of India; some are local Bhil Christian girls and boys, some are from North India, some are from South India.

Some of the students had the opportunity of attending conferences in different places. Two were sent as delegates to the Student Conference of the Trained Nurses Association of India, a bi-annual event. Two went as delegates to the Christian Medical Nurses Auxiliary Conference, an annual event. Funds from sales, a drama, and such local assistance helped with travel expenses."

#### BUSINESS MANAGER

Mr. Murray reports: "As Business Manager a missionary is not exempt from all the traditional satisfactions as well as frustrations of life, but there have been many compensations as well as the sense of a job to do for God and His Church in India.

There have been tangible opportunities away from desk and committee, such as the Sunday-night Youth Fellowship in our home, regularly attended by an average of 30 young men and women. This has developed after two and a half years into a dialogue with the Word of God in which the young people find each week their knowledge and understanding of their place in the divine community deepened and broadened.

With the co-operation of the extension Services of Government it has been possible to install sanitation for all workers' houses on the Jobat compound. Installation of these simple water-seal latrines throughout our Mission area will mean that every worker is assured a minimum sanitary standard in or near his house.

At last we have been able to re-establish the disused Jobat water system. For many years the pipes have been unused in the ground, but fortunately were found to be in good condition. With a grant from the Board a small diesel engine and 4-stage pump can provide ample water throughout the compound. We are grateful for a good well as our water source.

As a follow-up of January's survey of maintenance needs on all stations my maintenance staff have been at full pressure, visiting in turn most of the Mission area for care and improvement of buildings. There is gradually appearing a great improvement in the basic building facilities of the Jobat Hospital. There is still much to be done, and it is still my conviction that before enlarging the bed-space further these necessary building arrangements should be completed.

Government has not yet renewed our lease, and thus we are waiting still to commence the greatly needed extensions to the School of Nursing."

We stand embarked on the threshold of a new year, looking back over the old and forward to the new. Again comes the realization of the great truth that we live and work day by day, and as each day or year passes on into eternity we must leave it behind and there is another tomorrow—a new year in which we may serve Christ and His Church.

# JHANSI, INDIA

In our turbulent present day world no one can venture to predict what cataclysmic events the future may bring. We are living in the midst of colossal upheavals. This is a time of unprecedented cosmic unrest.

This report is written while this great sub-continent of Asia is in the throes of an election with 210 million voters going to the polls to choose from among ten main parties. 1961 saw the close of the second Five Year Plan and the emergence of enlarged undertakings for the next five years.

A five year plan was chalked out by the Mission Board in consultation with the missionaries for the work in Jhansi. It was to establish a simple organization framework for the churches in the Bundelkhand area. This would give a closer knit fellowship and bring together the various talents for a concerted evangelistic effort in the unevangelized pockets.

In a measure we have seen the plan materialize with the creation of the Bundelkhand Church Council. However, party-strife, deeply ingrained jealousies, and a desire for power and prestige have frustrated outreach. If the Presbytery is to get into orbit in its task of evangelism considerable patience will be required in smoothing out the difficulties of the launching platform.

#### PROBLEMS

The I.M.C. Study Series on the Churches in India describes some of the basic problems that need study and prayer.

"Church members frequently quote a saying that divides Christians into three categories—asli, fasli, nasli. Asli (real) Christians, it is said, are faithful church members who trust and obey the Lord Jesus Christ. This is about 10% or less. Fasli (seasonal) Christians are those who put in an appearance at church festivals, particularly at Christmas and Easter. This is about 40%. Nasli (by descent) Christians are those who belong to the Christian community by birth (caste), but have only a marginal relation with any church. This number is roughly about half of the Christian population."

"The Church in every land has members that fit the three categories described above. What grips the attention of the observer, however, is the judgment, frequently expressed by responsible people, that there are few real Christians and that the Christian community on the whole lacks spiritual depth and seriousness. Only a few Christians have had a personal experience of 'God in Christ'."

A simple analysis is difficult, but two contributing factors are manifest in the Jhansi area.

- 1. There is a serious lack of Christian nurture. Systematic Bible teaching is rare from the pulpit. Christian literature, if read at all, is confined to one or two books in a year. There is little or nothing in the way of a Christian Education program.
- There is a pre-occupation with material and social advancement how to increase incomes, how to educate children, how to acquire prestige and influence.

In the plan that was drawn up in 1956 and approved by the Mission Board, there was a place given to a full-time worker in Christian Education. At present, more than 60% of Sunday Schools are institutional children. As the government is increasingly taking over the educational system, it is imperative that the Church assume the responsibility for the religious training of youth. Over 50% of the population of India today is under 25 years. Much creative work needs to be done in this field and it would appear that this is one place that a new missionary couple could make a worthwhile contribution.

There is a need for a Christian Book Store and Reading Room in Jhansi. For the past five years this has been partially met by having a good supply of vernacular books in our bungalow. This needs to become more closely related to student life with a definite evangelical communication. An excellent site is available.

Pastors Retreats, Lay Studies, Teachers' Training Courses need to be given more emphasis. Perhaps they need to be more mobile on the congregational level.

#### PRIORITY

The greatest priority in India today is to develop a witnessing Church. But there is relatively little interest in witnessing to the Christian faith among the non-Christian neighbours. Only rarely do local congregations arrange programs of evangelism.

In the past the mission supported a dozen or so paid evangelists for evangelism. This complex is dying hard, but gradually the Christians are beginning to awake to their responsibility. One team of laymen go out weekly into the surrounding villages. There is room for experimenting with week-end camps for laymen. If laymen are given encouragement and proper leadership, they are prepared to give time to witnessing.

#### PROGRAM AND PROGRESS

The Rev. Angus MacKay spent the first nine months of the year as Acting Principal of the Missionary Language School in North India. The Winter Language School of 1960-61 was held as usual in Allahabad with some students attending all season and some for only part of the season. The school opened on October 17, 1960 and closed on April 9, 1961. Altogether 31 students were registered representing nine nations and nine denominations.

Besides a busy life in study and considerable time spent in classes and tutorial hours some time was taken for trips on Orientation. Four Field Trips were made to Varanasi (Benares) and Sarnath, the former being the sacred city of the Hindus and the latter the sacred place of Buddhists and where Lord Buddha is supposed to have delivered his first sermon after his enlightenment. Students were able to observe what went on at the bathing ghats and at the temples and to visit not only modern Buddhist temples but also excavations of an ancient Buddhist monastery and the Buddhist Museum. These trips, along with others to different places in Allahabad, and especially to the confluence of the sacred Ganges and Jumna rivers on special days of the Mag Mela, afforded students an opportunity of seeing the masses of worshippers at their sacred places of worship and of getting the feel of things. Hearts were filled with compassion for these people and the desire was increased to see them reached by the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

For about one week in December most of the students attended lectures and other functions in connection with the Allahabad University Orientation Winter School for foreign students. High ranking lecturers from Allahabad University and from other Indian cities delivered lectures on Indian History, Art, Literature Education, Politics, Economics, etc., and held seminars on these. Opportunities were afforded of becoming acquainted with foreign students from America, Commonwealth countries, Africa, Japan, Yugoslavia, Russsia, Peoples' China and Nepal.

Allahabad is a city where one may attend a multitude of cultural, educational and religious meetings and functions. Besides the University there are many schools, colleges and Training Institutions (both Christian and non-Christian) with plenty of scope for language students to mix with all kinds of educated people and educators. Our students were happy to meet some outstanding Christian leaders visiting Allahabad from other places in India or from abroad among whom we might mention Dr. John MacKay (formerly Principal of Princeton Seminary) and Paul Sudhakar of Trivandrum, a zealous Christian leader who was converted from Brahmanism a few years ago. He had studied under Radhakrishnan for many years and is a near relative of Krishna Menon but now he spends his time in reaching out to educated Hindus with the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

Summer Language School opened on April 28th and closed on August 25th. The total number enrolled at the summer sessions was 174. Quite a few of these, however, did not attend classes but had tutorials at home. This number compares favourably with last year's enrolment of 163. Of the total enrolment 80 were Americans, 81 were from Commonwealth countries (Canada 31, England 31, Australia 8, New Zealand 3, Ireland 3 and Scotland 3). From other European countries there were 13. Of these new missionaries 26 have had to have visas

as compared to 32 of the previous year. In one of the Indian daily papers recently it was stated that from now on all Commonwealth people will require visas to enter India. If this is so the number of new missionaries coming to India next year may be cut down. The enrolment of the summer students of the past year may be broken up subjectwise as follows: Hindi 81, Hindustani 67, Urdu 18, Punjabi 3, Nepali 3, and Bengali 2.

After returning to Jhansi late in October there was the task of getting our living quarters cleaned up and in order and taking up once more the work which we had dropped on assuming responsibility in the Missionary Language School. Much time has had to be spent on checking on the registration of old deeds, and boundaries and in the demarkation of quite a few plots sold to Christians for building their own homes. This property work will continue for some time and, although there are some difficult problems connected with it, as is the case with most mission property in India, yet we feel that ours is not too bad a position at present.

In December we were honoured by a visit to our field by Rev. Stuart and Mrs. Coles, Rev. DeCourcy Rayner and Miss Patricia Hanna and later by a visit from our Overseas Secretary, Dr. E. H. Johnson. They had come from the W.C.C. Assembly Meetings in New Delhi.

The strength of the congregations on our Jhansi Field remains about the same with very little growth from without. One Nepali Hindu was baptized at Jhansi on Easter Sunday. One young woman from the Muslim community was baptized at Dabra in October and I had the joy of baptizing an elderly Muslim woman and two good-sized children at Dabra on Christmas Day. A few others are interested but require further teaching.

We trust that the year 1962 will bring much blessing to the life of the local churches and that we may have the joy of seeing more from the non-Christian communities accept Christ as Saviour. We invite our fellow Christians in the homeland to work with us and to pray with us to this end.

Mr. Russell Self's activity this past year has been in three major areas. First, local responsibility in the various city churches and mission work. Day by day routine of the treasureship, correspondence, conversation, building repairs, etc., in an oriental context consumes time and requires patience.

As Moderator of the Synod of North India, there has been extensive travel for ministry and the care of the churches executive and committee meetings. The Synod is composed of four Presbyteries, three of which parallel the mission work of the American Presbyterian Church.

The balance of his time has been devoted to a wider ministry with the Church throughout North India in relation to literature. The attached reports requested by the Bible Society of India and Ceylon for their annual report will give some indication of the whitened harvests, especially in relation to lay evangelism.

Mr. Self assisted in Literature Institutes, set up by both the National Christian Council and the Evangelical Literature Fellowship of India. Trained leadership is a big need in the ministry of literature. The pulpit offers a very limited platform for proclamation. Literature is the greatest opportunity for effective contact with the unfolding, seeking oriental mind. We have yet to take seriously the potential for evangelistic involvement by way of the printed page.

The Bible Society of India and Ceylon has a unique role to play in the outreach of the Church. Traditionally it has been recognized as a very important "handmaid of the Church" in that it supplies the Scriptures in 126 languages of India which enables 93% of the people of India to read God's written revelation in their mother tongue.

With the possibility of India's 440 million population doubling in the next thirty years the Church must give increasing attention to evangelism. The North India Auxiliary, which encloses 25% of the population of India, has been in-

creasingly burdened that the Bible Society must also be "the spearhead of the Church".

The new one-ton jeep Bible Van has enabled the laymen to become mobile in the distribution of Gospel portions and helped to multiply the witness of the small churches scattered here and there in Uttar and Madya Pradesh. In conjunction with this the Bible Society has sent out teams to conduct training institutes to show the importance of the printed page as a tool for evangelism. Many laymen have been thrilled to experience the joy of communicating the Gospel and find the printed page a very effective tool.

The Bible Society team was also invited to hold a workshop in Saharanpur and Yeotmal Seminaries in which some 85 students took part. For the entire month of November some members of this team assisted in 7 workshops set up by Bishop Jebaraj in the Tirunellveli Diocese in which laymen in the churches sold about 12,000 scriptures.

"The Bible Society of India and Ceylon presents readings from the Holy Bible . . ." Daily this call signal is heard in India and throughout south-east Asia from the powerful fifty-thousand watt transmitter in Manila.

On January 1st, 1961 the Bible Society extended its ministry of sowing seed by means of the radio. At present these Bible readings sow the seed in soil that is not always accessible to the Church, but is nevertheless prepared by deep furrows of change and upheaval which cut across the nations of south-east Asia to-day.

## JAPAN

The Korean Christian Church in Japan is not a large Church. It was discovered this year that it was too small to be numbered among the churches in the World Council of Churches. It is not influential even in Christian circles in Japan. And perhaps before the Lord of the Church, its people would not care to claim spiritual largeness on the basis of its record in 1961. But pastors and people, some 3,000 in this land of 90 million, are grateful for redeeming fellowship with the living Lord, and the fellowship He has created and created anew among the Koreans in Japan. While it is small it is an important Church: Important to those who need its ministry here; important perhaps, because the challenges it faces are acutely typical of the real challenges facing the Church in the world today.

The people of this Church are sensitive to economic-political events in Japan and Korea. They are also part of the larger Body of Christ in Japan. Sharing in its ministry is the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

## JAPAN AND THE WORLD IN 1961

While Canada and other Western countries suffered a recession of varying severity in 1961, Japan was riding the crest of economic boom. The policy of the Ikeda government is to double personal incomes in 10 years. Considerable progress was made in 1961; consumer goods became smarter and cheaper and of improved quality. The cost of living inevitably rose. In Tokyo it rose 7.2% in 1961. Part of the boom that is very visible in this crowded land is the building boom. Land costs have steadily zoomed during the year. The key to much of the prosperity of the Japanese people is their industrious nature. Many work long hours, seven days a week. But the growth of large industry and correspondent unions has meant the increase also of leisure time.

The government was and is a conservative one led by a strong conservative political party headed by Hiyato Ikeda. The opposition, holding approximately 25% of the Diet seats but very vocal, is a radical rather than "loyal" opposition — Socialist in nature. It has close relations with the Communist party but at the same time has a number of Christians in leadership positions. The government is stable, pro-American, yet concerned about better relations with Asian neighbours.

Korean-Japanese relations have not yet been normalized since liberation of Korea from Japanese colonial rule. Talks are currently underway again to normalize relations but there are yet no real diplomatic relations, no trade to speak of and no tourist inter-change. These talks are bitterly opposed by Socialist party members who favour relations with North Korea.

Koreans in Japan number approximately 650,000. Of these, 62% were second generation Koreans in 1959, so that by 1962 the bulk are second generation with patterns of thinkings and hopes quite strange to their parents. Koreans in Japan have also profited by the economic boom, perhaps the last social group to do so. They are economically better off than at any period in their history here. For this we are grateful. However it has had the effect of increasing appeal of materialism and "let's get the things we have wanted" is the reaction. More leisure time also means more competition for time for Church affairs among young people.

The "repatriation" of Koreans to North Korea has slowed down almost to a stop, the very poorest and least educated and most dissatisfied having left. Those who ally themselves with South Korea have been shaken again by political instability and revolution in Korea. They have at the same time been encouraged by the current talks between Korea and Japan.

## THE KOREAN CHRISTIAN CHURCH IN JAPAN IN 1961

In this year of our Lord, in this land, we look back with gratitude to the work of the Spirit among us. With the return of Rev. D. S. Kim from study in Canada, to take up the charge of the Fukuoka Church, the work in that rather weak and isolated Presbytery has been greatly strengthened and continues to be. The congregation at Fukuoka has started to show signs of vital life. Pastors, congregations and presbyters have shared in the vigour, imagination, and rededication which Mr. Kim brought back with him.

No new congregations were begun this year, but effort went into the deepening of life among our people. Two presbyteries have held conferences which were well attended and received. Women's groups held special training conferences in home-making and spiritual life in the central and south-west Japan areas. In Tokyo a student centre was completed.

New Church buildings are under way in a number of congregations. They are chiefly in urban areas and so require an extremely high capital outlay for a modest meeting place. Congregations of Fuse, Ube, and Nishinomiya were building new or larger places of worship during 1961.

Special programmes of evangelism were held throughout the Church, some at Easter, and others in Osaka and Kyoto at the New Year's period. The Japan Bible Society offered to co-operate with the Evangelism Department of the Korean Christian Church in Japan by providing Scriptures at reasonable cost for members, and large numbers of scripture portions for evangelism programmes.

The Annual Pastors' and Workers' Retreat was held in July at a mountain conference centre near Kobe. Following a paper presented by Dr. Y. T. Oh on the historical aspects of Christian life and work in Japan, consideration was given to the growth of the Korean churches since 1959. There are at present 30 pastors, deaconesses and full time workers.

At the Annual Conference of Korean Christian Youth on Awaji Island, the largest conference in history studied the theme "Jesus Christ, the Light of the World." Delivering the theme address was Rev. I. H. Lee. In the national youth programme there are more than 26 chapters and 400 members.

The Annual meeting of the Association of Korean Church Women was held this year in Nagoya. There are now 31 local associations and 700 members throughout Japan.

Following the return of Rev. Duk Sung Kim from Canada Rev. Ki Whan Bay was appointed to go to Canada on the Fellowship provided by the Presbyterian College in Montreal.

During the year the Church was brought the Word by a number of visitors from abroad. Among them was Dr. E. H. Johnson, Miss Mary E. Whale, secretaries for missions from the Presbyterian Church in Canada. These visits have value not only for missionaries and their operations, but for pastors and leaders of the Church in a variety of offices—General Assembly Commissioners to Church School Teachers—because they represent in a particular way the missionary concern of a Church.

Visitors from Korea, pastors and laymen, were welcomed and provided latest first-hand news of post-revolutionary affairs of the homeland and the part being played by members of the Church. Besides helping in our relations with the various denominations of the home Church in Korea, the official visit of our Moderator and other delegates to Korea in April, and their report on their return did considerable to renew interest and intimacy between Christians here and their brethren in Korea.

The General Assembly was held in October. Dr. Oh was re-elected Moderator. A number of constitutional changes were instituted to improve the organizational set-up especially the administration of Assembly affairs.

Additions to the missionary staff, Rev. and Mrs. John H. McIntosh, and Miss Tamiko Nakamura, were very cordially received by district councils throughout the Church in November during their brief orientation trip.

# THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA AND ITS SHARE IN THE WORK IN JAPAN, 1961

The Presbyterian Church in Canada shares personnel and funds as well as faith, interest and prayers with the Korean Christian Church in Japan. The personnel are as follows: Miss Tamiko Nakamura, Rev. and Mrs. J. H. McIntosh and Rev. and Mrs. C. R. Talbot.

Funds were shared as follows:

From the W.M.S.-E.D.:

The support of the family of the Rev. D. S. Kim while he was studying in Canada, as well as support of Christian Education programme and help for training of deaconesses.

From the W.M.S.-W.D.:

Complete support of one missionary on the field was provided. A wide range of special projects, the training of leaders, projects in Christian Education, training of women, and young people programmes were made possible by this contribution.

From the General Board of Missions:

The complete support of two missionary couples on the field as well as grants for frontier evangelism, new projects, subsidies to General Assembly Departmental programmes aid for securing Church buildings in addition to some direct support for pastors and deaconesses.

From the missionary point of view a most important event in 1961 was the joining of the staff here of Rev. John H. McIntosh and his family, and Miss Tamiko Nakamura. A field orientation programme was worked out by a subcommittee of the Executive which included lectures, a tour of the three Presbyteries in Japan, and a two week observation trip in Korea. The McIntoshes and Miss Nakamura will engage in intensive language study of Japanese and Korean. Housing for both of them is temporary.

The formal relationship between the Churches has been under discussion in the KCCJ for sometime. This year in December, during the visit of Dr. Johnson, a draft statement of our relationship was discussed with Dr. Oh and Rev. In Ha Lee. As this statement is discussed in the Executive Committee and General Assembly it promises to strengthen here the feeling of integral oneness in the marching Church of Jesus Christ.

In Japan we are living on one of the moving frontiers of this revolutionary world of the 1960's. By the help of God events will not leave us behind. One of the things which has helped us to keep up with progress has been our contact with the secretaries of the mission arms of our Church. The personal visits of both Dr. Johnson and Miss Whale have been most effective opportunities for strengthening the mission relationship and mission outlook here. The mission in our day demands close and personal contact.

It has been highly satisfying to have a part in the sharing of interest and concern and prayers of congregations and groups in our two churches, by letters, tapes, and even personal visits. There are increasing signs of the desire of people on both sides of the Pacific to show their oneness and togetherness in Christ. In Japan we are very grateful for, and proud of, the type of support that we get from Presbyterians in every part of Canada.

#### NIGERIA

1961 was a busy year in the life and work of the Presbyterian Church of Nigeria. Most ministers have between 12 and 20 churches to look after. There is just so much a person can do and no more. Once he passes that point the quality of his work becomes poorer. Our ministers have so much to do that they are becoming frustrated just thinking about it all. We are in desperate need of a younger and better trained ministry. We need young men who will realize how much they are able to do and who will set about and do it.

It is quite evident that we need more ministers to lessen the work load on each minister. The Church is faced with several problems here:

- Our present establishment is very large and needs more ministers. To cover our present area properly we need three times as many ministers as we presently have.
- 2. Our Church is mainly rural and for the most part we are giving early training to young people who later enter the life and work of the other Churches as they enter Secondary Schools or seek employment outside our own area. If we took only Presbyterian students in our Secondary Schools we could still only take the maximum of 180 new pupils each year. We are graduating over 5,000 pupils from primary school each year.
- 3. If we want to extend our sphere of influence into the cities and townships where our youth are finding employment, we are going to have to reduce our ministers in the rural areas. This will mean placing even heavier loads on our older ministers who because of their very backgrounds could not be transferred to the cities. Increasing the work load will mean a decrease of the general spiritual level of these rural congregations. Much careful and prayerful thought and planning needs to be put into this whole question.

#### CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

Not a great deal of progress or new work can be reported in this field. The "Nigerian Presbyterian" magazine is trying to move into a bi-monthly publishing schedule but this is very difficult. We have not yet completely solved our problem of distribution, sales, and returns. As we increase the number of issues per year the problem of distribution and venders returns becomes more acute. Once again the vernacular Daily Bible Reading Notes were produced in co-operation with the Christian Council of Nigeria.

Synod's Literature Committee is presently working out a plan with the Presbyterian Bookshops which should lead to closer co-operation in the production and sales of Christian Literature. We are very fortunate to have bookstores connected with our Church that hold a real interest in promoting African writing even if it means a slight cut in their profit.

Our printing press has continued to develop rapidly. Several new machines have been installed during the year and the quality of the work has risen to a

reasonably good level. Our whole literature program is ready to expand rapidly if we only had the proper person with journalistic training to give the necessary leadership.

There seems to be so much to discourage, but in the midst of it there is a real flicker of light. People are becoming aware that they are part of the Presbyterian Church of Nigeria and are less referring to "the Mission". Something is going to happen here in the next two or three years. What it will all mean to the Church will depend entirely on how much every member of the Presbyterian Church of Nigeria gives himself to God.

#### MEDICAL WORK

Uburu Hospital has been said by many Nigerian spokesmen to be the worst hospital in the Eastern Region. This past year for the first time the hospital made some money as a result of the fees being increased early in 1961. A gift of 240 sheets has put sheets onto the beds. The government has given £10,000 for use in 1962 with which badly needed new equipment (including beds) will be purchased. A water scheme is now in the process of being completed. It is hoped to rewire the buildings as the wiring is in a dangerous condition.

The x-ray machine given by Canada has been in good use in 1961 although it cannot be used to its fullest because of lack of funds with which to operate the machine.

Dr. Ward, in commenting on the understaffing makes the following suggestion: "Either one medical institution closes and the staff of that hospital go to supply another one, or else more staff be given to existing hospitals. If hospitals are going to be operated this should be done in a proper and adequate way. This is no longer a pioneering country with regard to medical institutions. True, there are not yet nearly enough facilities but the Nigerians are demanding a very high standard for their hospitals. They show disdain for under-staffed and poorly equipped institutions, regardless of the reasons for this state of affairs."

## HOME MISSIONS REPORTS

#### SYNOD REPORTS

## SYNOD OF THE MARITIME PROVINCES

This report will review the year's work, assess developments, trends and advances of the past twenty years, as well as the prospects of the future in the light of economic and population forecasts.

#### REVIEW OF WORK IN 1961

On the whole our work was well maintained in the Presbytery of Newfoundland. The new St. Paul's at Corner Brook was dedicated on November 19. The services conducted at Gander were discontinued in order to meet the 10% cut in grants to the presbytery. All other work was maintained and the presbytery remained at full ministerial strength.

The work in the *Presbytery of Cape Breton* was well maintained. All charges were filled, but the projected survey of the Port Hawkesbury-Point Tupper levelopment was shelved after the "freezing" of new work in June.

The *Presbytery of Pictou* has under advisement the linking of Springhill with the Oxford charge in order to conserve grants and obtain a minister. The continued vacancy in Durham has been a concern of the presbytery. The Presbytery is to be commended for placing small churches and mission fields in the care of ministers in nearby strong self-supporting congregations.

The work in the *Halifax-Lunenburg Presbytery* continues to grow. Calvin Church's deficit grant was decreased by \$670. St. Andrew's, Dartmouth and Musquodoboit Harbour became self-supporting.

The Presbytery of Prince Edward Island has a committee studying the possibility of extension work in the Charlottetown area. Action on this is now delayed. In order to make better use of manpower, the three charges in the eastern end of the Island have been reduced to two on a trial basis. In the matter of stipends, the Presbytery took aggressive action, requiring all self-supporting units to reach the proper basic by January 1, 1962. At the end of the year there were five vacant charges making up some seventeen points or churches. Reinforcements are urgently needed.

In the *Presbytery of Saint John* there are two vacancies—Stanley, etc., and Saint George, etc. The West Riverview area near Moncton would seem to be a place for the development of extension work. This situation is under study by the Kirk Session of St. Andrew's, Moncton. The Presbytery has decided that the Brentwood property should be sold. Negotiation to this end is now taking place. It is hoped that this interest may be transferred to the West Riverview area.

In the Miramichi Presbytery the extensive Bass River field, and the Tabus-intac field were settled with ordained missionaries.

In the period 1941-60 the Maritime Provinces population increased by 296,000.

The three metropolitan areas of Halifax, St. John's, Nfld., and Saint John, N.B., account for 19% of the total population. In the big year of immigration, 1957, only 5,092 came to this area and many of these moved west.

In a time when the Church is challenged to reduce deficit grants till no further reductions are possible, and simultaneously reach the proper basic of \$3,900 so that new work may be undertaken — we should examine the record of our stewardship.

Over the past twenty years the following increases may be noted:

Since 1940 personal income per capita in the Maritimes has been about 70% of that in all Canada. It takes \$129.70 to buy what would be bought for \$61.90 in 1941 in the Maritimes. In other words, the dollar has shrunk to less than half of its buying power twenty years ago.

At the 1961 Synod it was decided to establish a Synod office, employing a part-time stenographer. It is expected that a two-room office and full time stenographer will become a reality in 1963.

The recommendation (2) of the G.A., page 327, of the 1961 minutes, was also adopted, and a committee was set up as "The Committee on the Life and Work of the Synod". The matter of more responsibility for the administration of the work of Missions within the Synod is under further study.

All Presbyteries were enjoined to amalgamate congregations where possible.

In the matter of travel and moving expense of O.M.s, students, catechists, deaconesses and student deaconesses, all fields receiving the workers are requested to meet this expense where they can do so. Only the expense, or part of such expense which the field can prove inability to meet shall be requested of the G.B.M. through Presbytery.

Presbyteries were requested by Synod to take immediate steps to arrive at the proper basic stipend of \$3,900 plus manse, travel, etc., and to report to the 1962 Synod.

The Synod's Special Committee on Social Service presented a progress report regarding homes for unmarried mothers, senior citizens and chronically ill persons. Synod's authorized Home Missions Expenditure for 1961, \$33,291.00.

The further 10% reduction in 1961 was absorbed by the curtailment of work and extra amounts paid by congregations. The reduction amounted to \$3,558.20.

Plans for new work in 1962 have been regretfully shelved. This should not discourage us, but should give impetus and spirit to lay plans for the future. Situations of new developments in the whole area of the Synod are under constant study.

There is a growing faithfulness among our people to the challenge of total missionary obedience and the continuing mission of the Church. We are thankful for the opportunities of service in our time and for the wonderful resources God has entrusted to us for His work and task. We are thankful for the "loaves" and "fishes" and the various ways in which our Lord causes them to be multiplied in our hands.

Overseas Visitors — The visit of Rev. Duk Sung Kim to various areas and congregations of the Synod during the early summer was much appreciated.

Mrs. Helen Khongkhekue of Bangkok, Thailand, came to the Synod on invitation of the W.M.S. (E.D.) for a six months' visit beginning in April. This was much enjoyed and appreciated by the Chinese communities as well as by the many church groups to which Mrs. Khongkhekue spoke.

#### SYNOD OF MONTREAL AND OTTAWA

It is with thanksgiving to God that we report continued progress in the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa during 1961. While no new work has been begun, no work has been curtailed, and all existing causes have been strengthened and are in good heart. Two new churches have been built—St. Michel in North-east Montreal, and the Church of the Good Shepherd in Port Cartier on the North Shore of the St. Lawrence.

"The people offered themselves willingly" can be said regarding increased finances. The 1961 reports showed that three mission charges — St. Luc, Montreal, Scotstown, Megantic and St. David's, Ottawa, have decided to be self-supporting.

We thank Stanley Church, Montreal, for free provision of rooms for the Synod office, and for Synod Mission Committee meetings.

Interest has continued throughout the Synod in the Overseas work of our Church, and various missionary services have been held. Copies of the filmstrips "Mission to a Minority" and "Guiana Tempo" have been purchased for rental by congregations, and these are being widely used.

We should mention in passing that a new seriousness and sense of responsibility has pervaded mission and extension committee meetings of Presbytery and Synod. Scrutiny of reports, designing of new report systems, visiting of fields (and the latter in addition to Presbytery visitations of all congregations in the Presbyteries of Montreal and Ottawa) have borne fruit.

In 1960 history was made in the French Press of Montreal with the carrying of one or two Protestant events in the news. Formerly even paid Protestant advertising was not received. The French press ran photographs of five French-speaking African students who were attending l'Eglise St. Luc.

Both Ottawa and Montreal Presbyteries have their eyes open to possibility of future charges being organized and their property committees are alert.

A motion was received from the Presbytery of Quebec, asking that the French Advisory Committee be dissolved. Your Committee agreed to support this motion, and to offer as Synod Committee, to act as Advisory Committee on French work within its bounds.

Those who desire more information regarding work in the Synod should apply to have their names put on the "Synod Survey" mailing list. This mimeographed newsletter is sent out from time to time to acquaint people with events of significance within the bounds of the Synod.

The Superintendent, the Rev. Ronald Rowat, supplied with the Board's permission, the Reformed Church Summer Chapel in Dinard, Brittany, France, during the month of July.

Since Eglise St. Marc, Quebec became vacant in June services have been regularly conducted by the Rev. Joseph Ntyomono of the Presbyterian Church, Republic of Cameroun, who is drawing together the scattered remnants of the congregation, and laying the foundation for a solid and lasting cause there. We have asked Mr. Ntyomono to extend his stay in Canada until September, 1962.

The Church of the Good Shepherd at Port Cartier continues to prosper under the energetic ministry of the Rev. Jack Voelkel. The corner stone of the new church was laid in September, and the dedication of the building is planned for May. The Every Person Canvass brought pledges of \$25,000 for the next eighteen months. Leggatt's Point Church is being used once a month for French language services.

The Superintendent, Rev. Ronald Rowat, preached the first Protestant service at Manacougan Power development in December. Manacougan is 142 miles north

of Baie Comeau. The Rev. J. A. Voelkel with a fellow minister of another communion took a preaching tour into the new territory North of Port Cartier.

The Synod's Camp d'Action Biblique continues to minister to a large number of children and young people. In 1961 the Camp Director was the Rev. Jacques Smith and he was aided by Mr. Warnery and Rev. Joseph Ntyomono of the Presbyterian Church, Republic of the Cameroun.

Presbytery of Montreal — Preville is prospering under the leadership of the Extension Secretary, the Rev. A. Ross MacKay.

Duvernay is flourishing under the ministry of the Reverend Basil Howell, who after retiring from the Assistant Comptrollership of the Bell Telephone Company, offered his services to the Church without salary, and was ordained by the Presbytery of Montreal, and inducted to the charge of Duvernay. Mr. Howell is also serving the Church-at-large in the capacity of Acting Comptroller.

We congratulate the Rev. Andre Poulain on his fine work at Eglise St. Luc. Mr. Gilles Warnery came from France to assist with youth work, and we are asking that he be appointed to the Presbytery as Director of French Youth Work, under the direction of the Presbytery Convener and Mr. Poulain.

Beckwith Memorial Italian Church has been vacant since the departure of Mr. Bertalot in September. Since then the congregation has been served by Mr. Victor Ford, a final year student, without knowledge of Italian, whose services have been much appreciated. The elders of the congregation have assisted by taking prayers and Scripture reading in Italian. We hope soon to have the appointment of Mr. Iarerra, an Italian-Canadian, who is bi-lingual.

The Chinese work has continued unabated despite rather adverse press reports. Our Montreal pastor was unanimously re-appointed by Presbytery to his field along with other annual re-appointments.

Tyndale House has been established as a congregation, and has appointed the Rev. Everitt Briard as part-time chaplain.

Dr. J. DeVleeschouwer resigned as Director of Immigration this summer, and the Rev. A. Ross MacKay was appointed by the General Board of Missions as Director, pro tem, pending the permanent appointment of Miss Frieda Matthews in March. The English classes of Miss Dorothy Lukes, Port Deaconess, for immigrants have now over 50 students attending.

Presbytery of Ottawa — This Presbytery is now incorporated for Church Extension purposes, and hopes to start new work as soon as funds are available.

We congratulate minister and congregations of St. David's on the rapidity of their rise to self-supporting status.

The able minister of Calvin Hungarian, the Rev. Kalman Toth, Ph.D., continues his ministry in Ottawa and Prescott.

The Presbytery is beginning to take an interest in Chinese work on an interdenominational basis. There are now two Presbyterian members on the Board of the Chinese Institution.

Presbytery of Lanark and Renfrew — We are happy to report progress in the Territorial Mission of Petawawa, etc., where a new manse has been built. The increased activity of the field is reflected in reduced grants from the Board of Missions.

Presbytery of Glengarry — For many years Moose Creek was in receipt of grants from the General Board of Missions, but under the student leadership of Thomas Pollock, it has risen to the level of self-support, and also steadily increased its givings to the Budget. It is nineteen years since this charge last had an ordained ministry. They now ask for the appointment of Thomas Pollock on his graduation as O.M.

Ingleside is a new Church in a Seaway town, with a community of great potential growth. Presbytery is requesting a student to develop the work here.

#### SYNOD OF TORONTO AND KINGSTON

Appreciation is expressed to all who co-operated within this Synod in dealing with the drastic deficit grant cut we were faced with last July. In 1960 our grant was \$128,466. This was revised downward by the Board of Missions to \$97,423 or by \$31,403 which meant that we had to slash our deficit grants in some places and erase them altogether in others. As a result of careful and thorough study since then, on the part of our aid receiving presbyteries, we have been able to further reduce our application for grants to \$83,263.50, or by an additional \$14,159.50.

Even with this austere budget the Mission work of this Synod has continued to expand. One promising charge in the *Presbytery of Kingston* is at Amherstview where a new and growing community has been linked with Amherst Island which has been vacant for seven and one-half years. Promising growth is also reported from St. Columba Church, Belleville, where plans to begin construction in the near future are well advanced.

The new extension work in the *Presbyteries of East and West Toronto* has been stopped, but of the nineteen aid-receiving congregations it is encouraging to know that Clairlea Park, First Hungarian, Westminster, Grace, West Rouge in East Presbytery will all become self sustaining in 1962. In West Presbytery, Pine Ridge became augmented on January 1, 1962 and extended a call to the Rev. I. M. Amini, their Ordained Missionary. It is anticipated that North Park will become self-sustaining in July this year. St. Luke's and Guildwood in East Presbytery will be self-supporting July 1, 1963. It is planned to begin a new congregation in each of the Toronto Presbyteries in 1963.

Three of our new congregations opened and dedicated their church buildings during the past year — Clarkson, Albion Gardens, and Grace, Etobicoke. The construction of these churches was financed through the Corporation of the Synod of Toronto and Kingston. Our Corporation marketed a third issue of Collateral Trust Debentures (Series C) on December 1, 1961 in the amount of \$248,000. This amount was loaned to one congregation, St. Giles Kingsway, which was a new congregation in 1950. A fourth issue of debentures is planned for June 1, 1962, the amount of which will be about \$350,000 for six congregations. This will bring the total amount of bonds sold by this corporation since 1959 to almost \$1,750,000.

Calvin Church gave \$11,000 to the Presbytery of East Toronto to be loaned to Guildwood Church to assist in the construction of its Church building later this year. Leaside Church contributed \$1,500 to Guildwood to assist in the final payment on its church site. Glenview loaned \$10,000 to Grace Church, West Rouge, in order to pay off its first mortgage on its land so that this congregation could be in a position to obtain a loan from the Corporation to construct its church. Knox Church, Oshawa, again assisted St. Luke's, Oshawa with the payment of this year's installment on its land. Many of our self-supporting congregations contributed to the Church Extension Funds of the two presbyteries for the purpose of helping the aid-receiving congregations meet the special 10% reduction.

St. Stephen's in Scarborough has constructed a small building costing about \$25,000, which will be opened and dedicated in April. St. Stephen's in Weston purchased its church site at a cost of \$37,250. Chalmers Church, Toronto, loaned this congregation \$35,000 for a period of ten years. A portable church will be moved to this site in March. Ajax purchased its church site for \$16,000, as did also Erindale for a sum of \$31,000.

Up to the present St. Andrew's Church, Barrie, has assumed responsibility for organizing and supporting the work in East Barrie, including the providing of a suitable site. As from February of 1962, the Rev. Malcolm Summers has been appointed O.M. to East Barrie and Angus.

Under the capable leadership of our two O.M.'s in the *Presbytery of Temiskaming* our work in the north continues to progress. Rev. Willard Pottinger at

Val d'Or is conducting bi-lingual services and is most anxious to acquire radio time to preach in the French language, and the necessary grant to make this possible.

In the *Presbytery of Algoma and North Bay* the new church building at Calvin, Sudbury, was completed. The presbytery is about to link Parkside with Calvin, and Emmanuel with Hillside, eliminating one large grant. One of our greatest concerns is Elliot Lake where the congregation is considerably reduced in numbers, but not in spirit. There are current rumours that this city is to come to life again with new orders for uranium being negotiated.

The Missions work in St. Giles, Galt, and Calvin Church, Kitchener in the Presbytery of Guelph is forging ahead.

Appreciation is expressed to the Synodical Superintendent, the Rev. M. A. Mark and to the Director of Church Extension for East and West Toronto Presbyteries, the Rev. D. McCullough, for their untiring work and careful planaing.

#### SYNOD OF HAMILTON AND LONDON

The cities and urban areas within our Synod continue their rapid growth. This development is due both to immigration from abroad and to the continued movement of population from rural areas within Canada itself. As a result, the Church has been presented with a unique opportunity and responsibility to provide the many new housing developments with church facilities.

The Synod Corporation again this year has proven to be a valuable instrument in Church Extension. It has assisted several congregations to erect new church buildings.

Significant progress has been made by almost all of our Extension charges during the past year. Early in the year St. James, Chatham, opened the first unit in its building program. Later in the year Chedoke in Hamilton opened a first unit, and Southgate also in Hamilton, a church. Oakridge in London and Strathcona in Burlington are both in the midst of erecting churches. In Niagara Presbytery both Scottlea and Fonthill are arranging building projects.

Several aid-receiving congregations in our Synod are rapidly nearing self-support. During this year Chedoke in Hamilton and Strathcona in Burlington hope to achieve this status. In two other areas, through the amalgamation of charges it is hoped that grants may be greatly reduced or even eliminated.

A new development in our Extension work is the consideration which Synod is giving to the appointment of a Synod Field Director. His duties would include giving assistance to the Committees of Synod, including the Missions Committee.

Our work among people of Hungarian, Ukrainian and Italian background continues. Four of the Hungarian congregations in our Synod are self-supporting. The congregation in Welland has plans for a new church well in hand.

Your committee has given some consideration to the possibility of the Church arranging tours to our Mission Fields both in Canada and Overseas. We feel that this would be a most worthwhile kind of Missionary Education.

## SYNOD OF MANITOBA

Superior Presbytery — In Atikokan, a new ordained missionary, the Rev. William Morrison, has been well received. Atikokan and North Coldstream Mines are under the ministry of Mr. Morrison; Oliver Road and Calvin Church are under the ministry of the Rev. William Fairley. Hurkett is now a quarterly preaching point under the care of the Session of Calvin Church. Shebandowan is now under the care of the Session of First Presbyterian Church, Fort William, and it is planned to hold services there at Easter and weekly throughout the summer months and early fall. Jumbo Gardens have been brought under the care of the Session of First Presbyterian Church, Port Arthur, and weekly church school is being conducted there.

Winnipeg Presbytery — In 1961 the Presbytery of Winnipeg took a serious look at the possibilities of extension within the bounds of the metropolitan area. Assisting the Presbytery was an extension team sent out by the Board of Missions, and composed of the Rev. David McCullough, Chairman, and Rev. Malcolm Mark, and Rev. A. Ross MacKay. Acting upon the advice of the Extension Team, the work at South Winnipeg was discontinued, and steps were taken to secure a lot in Westwood. The Rev. Neville Phills was appointed to St. David's, and began work in September, 1961.

During the year Presbytery made a number of changes within the bounds, which have strengthened the work, and at the same time have decreased financial requirements from the Board of Missions. For the first time in many years, the historic Kildonan congregation has an ordained minister. Kirkness has been linked with Kildonan. At Stonewall, a new manse was built in 1961 where a student missionary is resident, and serving the Stonewall-Rockwood field.

Brandon Presbytery — Thompson has an ordained missionary, and excellent progress is reported. Elders and managers have been elected, and a building lot selected with the hope of building a church as soon as possible. Plans for the manse are under way. Services were conducted at Dauphin and Grande Rapids, and at Simon House Lake, a summer camp was held.

Through the generosity of Ontario Young People a new church has been built at Pipestone Reserve, and a long-felt need has been supplied. At Beulah a training school is established. The Old Mission House at Rolling River Reserve has been demolished, and a very comfortable new mission house has been built near the church. Daily Vacation Bible School was conducted at Brandon North. Permission has been given to sell the old manse at Boissevain, and to buy a new one.

At Sioux Village the first tent mission by our church in a long time was held from July 31 to August 4.

## SYNOD OF SASKATCHEWAN

Events during the last year present an irregular picture. On the one hand we have witnessed evidences of growth, while elsewhere, mainly because of lack of manpower, we have lost ground. On the whole, however, some progress may be reported.

Presbytery of Prince Albert — With six ordained men, this area of the Synod has enjoyed a greater measure of stability and continuity of leadership. A case in point is Carragana where the excellent service of Rev. John Whiteway over the last two years actually constitutes the longest settled ministry this congregation has had during the whole period of its history. To the deep satisfaction of both presbytery and synod, Carragana has decided to exercise its right to call, so that by the time this report is received, Mr. Whiteway will have been inducted into this charge. In addition, new work has been started with promise of good development in Blighty and Weekes.

In Meath Park and Shipman, with the moving away of several key members, the work has gone back, and this despite a summer student appointment, and the monthly services of the Presbytery Deaconess during the rest of the year.

A very serious situation followed the departure in October of Mr. Alex Joshua from the Mistawasis Reserve where he had rendered fine service. Fortunately, however, in December the Rev. Stephen How was appointed there. The work in Wahpeton and Crutwell continues to thrive under the leadership of Dr. Moore.

As in previous years, application is being made for a Territorial Missionary for Northeast Saskatchewan to provide a Gospel ministry for a wide area of recent development.

Presbytery of Saskatoon — Here such problems as exist could be quickly resolved by an increase in manpower. Though vacant for some time, the Biggar

congregation has displayed surprising vitality and enthusiasm. There was a splendid response to the Every Member Canvass conducted within the local Sector Project.

The cause at Wilkie, by way of contrast, has steadily declined, and with the railway discontinuing its passenger service, resulting in a severe economic change in the community, the Presbyterian remnant has all but disappeared. At their own request, no services have been held this winter. The case of Wilkie will be reappraised in the fall, after a summer student appointment.

Goforth Memorial in Saskatoon, now worshipping in its new church, is making good progress in spite of heavy financial committments.

The Northwest Territorial Mission continues to develop satisfactorily. Regular church services are now being conducted in Buffalo Narrows, Sandwith and Ile Lacrosse, and it is hoped shortly to erect an Advisory Council to provide supervision and leadership for the work as a whole.

The Hungarian work in Saskatoon has begun to show promise of progress under a student missionary.

Though a fully self-supporting charge, Rosetown continues to be a source of very deep concern for Synod's Missions Committee. Here is a fine congregation of loyal and devoted people, second to none in their willing co-operation in schemes of the church on all levels, a congregation from which in the last few years have come two ministers and a deaconess, yet without a minister itself.

Presbytery of Assiniboia — An ordained missionary appointed to the congregation of Assiniboia, was recently called and inducted. Also St. Paul's, Moose Jaw, is preparing to extend a call to its Ordained Missionary. The Calvin congregation in Regina has shown remarkable growth and St. Stephen's, Regina, have plans to build their new church this year.

Northside, Regina has suffered through the lack of a settled ministry over the past four years.

Walter Martin Memorial, Regina, has been combined with Hungarian work under the bilingual Rev. Thomas Nyaradi. By decision of Presbytery, the Estevan-Stoughton field will again be consolidated as a two-point charge, this to become effective as from the time of an O.M. appointment. The Yorkton-Barvas field has now achieved self-supporting status, apart from a required grant for student supply for Barvas during the summer.

The joint charge of Moosomin-Broadview-Whitewood is more or less in the same position as Rosetown and for the same reason application is being made for a summer student to assist the Rev. Mr. Fejes of Bekevar particularly in ministering to the younger people and others not so familiar with the Hungarian language. This arrangement has obtained now for two summers, with considerable success.

From all parts of the Synod come warm tributes commending the diligent and sympathetic work of the Synod Superintendent.

#### SYNOD OF ALBERTA

Presbytery of Peace River — In December, First Presbyterian, Whitehorse, the only Presbyterian Church in the Yukon, observed its ninth anniversary. A most important work is being done in this capital city of 6,000 souls.

Fort Vermilion Presbyterian Church became a reality officially on December 10, when presbytery received 24 members into full communion in the newly constituted congregation. From Fort Vermilion, it is 50 miles out of High Level on the MacKenzie Highway, and another 160 miles south to the closest sister congregation at Dixonville.

The Anglican Church established a mission there as early as 1859, with the Roman Catholics settling in 1864. In the early 1900's the W.M.S. supported a Presbyterian hospital. One of the present members was baptized there by a Rev.

Mr. MacGregor, the Presbyterian Minister in 1919. Therefore, our new mission to Fort Vermilion is a return, timed to coincide with the building of the Great Slave Lake Railroad.

The sister Churches of Dixonville and Brownvale represent an important charge in our ministry to the farming communities of the Northern Peace River area, as do Wanham, Belloy, Blueberry Mountain, Silver Valley and Gordondale in the south.

Burch Church, Fort St. John, has shown courage and vitality in carrying on their worship and witness while without a minister. It has been estimated that almost 40 families transferred to the new St. Luke's United in the period between December, 1959, and December, 1961. In spite of this double blow the remaining congregation has continued to reduce its debt to their hall, maintained their properties, almost reached their budget goal and provided assistance to a new congregation in the nearby pioneer district of Golata Creek. The latter shows its potential when some 45 persons were in attendance at the Christmas service. It is to be noted that eight ministers were contacted regarding a call to Fort St. John. One accepted, but was forced to resign due to ill health. There is some doubt as to whether our Peace River churches will ever have a minister recognize a call to our part of this country.

St. James, Dawson Creek, the newest urban congregation in the presbytery, is enthusiastic about its building programme set for this Spring. Zion, Chetwynd was 6 years old in 1961. There is a thriving Young People's Society, and steady church attendance in the beautifully finished church. A new work at Bond's Siding, 20 miles northeast, has shown promise and arrangements are underway to hold services at the site of Dam construction at Hudson Hope. Chetwynd's population should reach 2,500 by mid 1962, and our responsibility there must include the appointment of an Ordained Missionary, as soon as someone is available.

Forbes, Grand Prairie, the 'mother' church of the presbytery, has made financial strides in the past year, and visible signs of increase are evidenced by the removing of the back wall of the chancel to allow six more rows of pews.

In the *Presbytery of Edmonton* the Hungarian congregation has moved into old St. Andrew's Church, which they have renovated and redecorated. Plans to renovate the basement are under way; and the building is now a real credit to the Church.

Plans are underway for Eastminster Church to become self-supporting this year. The building at Chauvin has been completely renovated, and is now a very beautiful and adequate building. Killam-Galahad have reduced their grant to the point where it merely covers the extra travel expense involved in the long drive between the two places. The student charge at Ganton was commended by the presbytery for very effective renovation of their building.

Red Deer Presbytery has been stressing the re-arrangement and consolidation of fields within its bound, with a view to reducing grants.

A new church is being erected at Eckville, and will be ready for use this Spring. A recent canvass at West Park has been encouraging, and they are planning the building of a new church. Lousana and Trenville have been joined together. Trenville has acquired a new church, and hopes to be self-sustaining within two years. A new manse, free of debt, and a new church will be dedicated this spring at Rocky Mountain House.

In the *Presbytery of Macleod* new Christian Education buildings have been erected in Lethbridge and Fort Macleod. The Riverside congregation has paid off another mortgage, having reduced their total mortgage indebtedness from \$60,000 to \$15,000.

At the fall meeting of the Synod of Alberta it was recommended that there be made available to the Synod's Missions Convener \$500 for honoraria and \$1,000 for travel expenses to exercise some of the functions of the "superintendent"

of mission"; and that an experienced minister be appointed to the Grande Prairie charge with responsibility for general missions supervision within the Peace River Presbytery, and that he receive suitable financial provision for such a position.

It was also recommended by the Synod that missionary education film libraries be established in the presbyteries for the provision of visual aids. It was agreed that these should be supervised by the missions conveners.

Our Hungarian brethren are all doing excellent work, and beginning to show a more vital interest in the work of the presbyteries and of the synod.

For all of which, we thank God and are resolved to continue to do the best that we can in the promotion of the missionary work within our bounds.

#### SYNOD OF BRITISH COLUMBIA

The Presbyterian Church has witnessed to Jesus Christ and His Gospel within British Columbia for the last hundred years. Several churches are holding Centennial Celebrations. During the past decade over fifty new buildings have been erected—half of that number were new church sanctuaries and the other half were Christian Education Buildings and Manses. St. Andrew's Hall on the campus of the University of British Columbia was also built during that time.

In a material way congregations are much stronger. Many have come to self-support and during the past year new church sanctuaries were built and dedicated at St. Columbia in Vancouver, Knox Church in Victoria and Brentwood Park in Burnaby. New Christian Education Buildings were also dedicated at St. Andrew's and St. Stephen's in North Vancouver, and at St. David's Church in Kelowna.

In the case of manpower, however, we have a different picture. In the last year and a half we have seen "The General Exodus". Some two dozen ministers have moved to other fields of labour. Eleven new men have been settled from other places. There are eighteen vacancies within the synod. The presbyteries however, are experimenting with "shared ministries", and the need for ministers has been cut to ten with a corresponding cut in grants. Appreciation goes to the catechists in the synod for the fine work they are doing.

The administrative work of the synod has been very much improved because Mr. Justice A. M. Manson, since his retirement in February, 1961, has spent six days a week within the Synod Office. Tribute is paid to the work of Judge Manson, particularly in connection with the Synod Extension Fund and the Synod Corporation. The Corporation is easily operated and has obtained loans for six congregations at interest rates of  $5\frac{1}{2}\%$ . The Judge has also been responsible for a monthly newsletter intended to keep all the people of the Synod informed as to important events in the life of the Church.

Non-Anglo Saxon work within the Synod of British Columbia is carried on among the Hungarian and Chinese people; (See Dr. Smith's report on the Chinese work).

Calvin Hungarian Church in Vancouver continues to progress slowly but steadily towards self-support, while contributing its share to the Budget of The Presbyterian Church. The Rev. F. Metzger, the minister, has also done a fine work as Chaplain in Central Down Town Mission where he serves on a part-time basis.

Calvin Presbyterian Church in Abbotsford is an experiment that has proved most successful under the ministry of the Rev. K. C. Doka, who is Canadian born, but fluent in the Hungarian language. Two groups of people worship in the same building, and are governed by one Session, but with separate Boards of Managers. An English service is held at 10.00 a.m. and a Hungarian service is held at 11.30 a.m. Mr. Doka has accepted a call to Knox Church, Calgary.

At Oliver Presbyterian Church in Oliver work among the Hungarian people was organized in the fall of 1960 under the ministry of the Rev. Sandor Meszaros, a comparative newcomer to Canada. Mr. Meszaros, following the spade work done

by Mr. Bathory, has found the going difficult, and sometimes discouraging. The missionary is responsible for serving a wide area, and several hundred families.

Extension work in the synod has been held in abeyance during the past year by the financial stringency of the Church, but it is earnestly hoped that we can overtake the task and maintain pace with the rapid growth of communities old and new throughout British Columbia.

## CHINESE WORK IN CANADA

Looking back over the years in Chinese work there have been problems, different and difficult, but in the faith that it was the Lord who was doing the building of our Chinese work, there has never been any doubt as to the outcome.

When the first Mission House was dedicated by the Presbytery of Victoria, for the carrying on of Christian work among the Chinese the Mission Convener said, "We do not know what results, if any, we shall have, but we have faith, and above all, faith in God's promises."

What wondrous things the Lord has brought to pass over the years! Faith pays, not only in the erection of fine buildings in which to worship, but infinitely better still in the winning over from heathen darkness to the light of God's love in Jesus Christ of so many Chinese Canadians in this past year of grace.

Last year we had a staff of 21 with many changes.

The Rev. N. Y. Kwan retired from the active ministry, after 18 years in Vancouver. Miss Gertrude Scott retired after more than 30 years of service under the W.M.S. (W.D.) in Victoria.

The Rev. Andrew Ng, who for the past three years was in charge of the Chinese Church in Victoria, was, in July, appointed to Vancouver, while the Rev. Stephen Lee, recently of Toronto and Montreal, was put in charge of the Victoria Mission. Miss Dorothy Spring, in September, then took over the work of Miss Scott. All these changes have proved most satisfactory.

Miss Mary Duffin, was appointed to Sudbury, to be the first student deaconess to do summer work among the Chinese, and it proved most successful.

Special mention must be made of the fine work done in the Maritime Provinces, under the W.M.S. (E.D.) by Mrs. Helen Khongkhekue a Cantonese-speaking trained Bible woman, from Thailand. Mrs. Khongkhekue spent several months visiting the Chinese women, especially in the outlying areas.

The Rev. Ronald J. Con, has spent the past year in Cantonese studies at Hong Kong University, and was granted a second year's study by the Board of Missions. It is expected that Mr. Con will return to Canada to carry on Chinese work.

We pay tribute to the many voluntary workers across the country, who, from week to week, in Church, Sunday School, and even in their own homes, have helped in this work, especially with the teaching of English to the many mothers and children, who, during the past ten years have entered the country as immigrants.

While it is true that the peak of the last ten years of Chinese immigration is past, the need for this intimate Christian contact throughout our Canadian communities and Churches is just as important and needful as it has ever been. Well over 20,000 Chinese women and children have entered Canada during the past 13 or 14 years. The field, therefore, is still ripe for harvest. Many are yet to be won for Christ.

Last year we had a record of some 57 young men enrolled in our English classes, and 63 women, with 35 lay teachers who gave their time to this important work.

By means of the various departments of our work we seek to lead and guide all into a saving knowledge of the truth as it is in Jesus Christ; and in faith, believing, to accept baptism, and take their place in the active membership of the Church.

Last year, in our Chinese Churches, including St. Andrew's Church, Windsor, and Knox Church, Sudbury, there were 62 baptisms, 32 of these were children, and 30 adults. Moreover, 26 joined the Church on profession of faith, and 9 by letter. These 9 letters were brought from churches in Hong Kong. When we think of these 30 adult baptisms, and the 26 who joined on profession of their faith we must remember that this constitutes no ordinary routine Bible Christian training. In almost every case it means many months of individual or group training and study, for these men and women have no Christian background like our own people on which to draw. They are indeed getting down to the very "grassroots" of the Gospel Message and the Christian life. There is no other way of doing it. This is our Church's task. Moreover, there is nothing, either, that we can do about the baptism of the teen-agers or the children until we have won over to Christ's side the father or mother, or both, but there is nothing that is more worthwhile.

The work among the children continues to hold the premier place in every thing we do. This applies to both the Kindergarten and the Sunday School. There were 202 children enrolled in the various kindergartens last year. When we realize that these children meet every morning during five days of the week, each child getting a thorough grounding in the Bible, we can then understand how farreaching this can be in these otherwise non-Christian Chinese homes from which most of the children come.

Last year Sunday School enrollment was the highest ever. We had 605 Chinese boys and girls in our various Chinese centres. What is even more interesting and important is the growing number of adults who attend Sunday School. This is, of course, understandable, since the great majority of our Chinese parents, the mothers, especially, know little or nothing of the Bible. Moreover, when feasible, we now require parents to bring their children to Sunday School—something that was not required of them before. The result is that parents are formed into Bible Study classes during the Sunday School session.

Of the 69 teachers in our Chinese Sunday Schools, 52 are Chinese. This constitutes a tremendous step forward in our work, since it is not so many years ago that all, save one or two of the S.S. teachers were Occidentals.

What is true of the growth of the Sunday School is, in proportion, equally true of the Women's work. The W.M.S. groups have 160 members, and the Y.W.A. — 57. Then too, in addition to these we had 115 Explorers; 87 in D.V.B.S.; 50 Y.P.S.; and 143 in Chinese Language classes.

Special mention must be made here of the important work being done in Montreal among the university students. There are over 300 in the city. The McGill students not only have a week-day Bible Study group of over 40, but they, for the most part, constitute the Chinese Church Choir, teach in the Sunday School, and in so many ways, during the week, take an active interest in the English classes and play-periods.

Financially, the Chinese congregations have again shown their readiness to accept a greater share of responsibility. Each congregation again increased its contribution to the Stipend, thus reducing the grant. Both Vancouver and Toronto now pay over \$2,200 to the stipend. It is only a few years ago since the Mission Board paid the full amount. \$1,893 was also contributed by the four congregations to the Budget of the Church — that is \$284 more than last year — while \$2,105 was sent to the W.M.S. in Toronto. \$1,190 of this latter amount comes from the Vancouver Kindergarten fees, and goes to pay the salary of a part-time Chinese worker. \$262 was contributed to the Hong Kong Orphan Fund, and other Overseas Mission work, while over 1,200 pounds of good used clothing was sent for Hong Kong relief. \$127 was given to The Canadian Bible Society. This makes a total, for

others, of \$4,387, all of which shows that the Chinese are not unmindful of the needs of others. In addition to the above, the Chinese met all the heavy current expenses of what is, after all, real institutional work.

Compared with the past the work now is as different as day from night. The success that has attended Toronto's new Chinese Church during its first year is evidence of that. The fact that our Vancouver Church has been compelled to plan for more room to house the ever increasing attendance at Sunday School and Worship is also indicative of these changing days.

We have every reason to be thankful for what God has done. "How manifold", indeed, are his works to us-ward, and the end is not yet.

CHINESE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH AND COMMUNITY CENTRE - MONTREAL

"The joy of the Lord is your strength."

Without the joy of the Lord in our hearts, it would not be easy to serve Him as we ought.

Truly God works in mysterious ways His wonders to perform.

Our Church services have been well attended by our members and by the new immigrants, which gives us a special opportunity to present the Gospel to those who do not know Him as their Saviour. Average attendance was from seventy to eighty and our offerings amount to \$1,809.64 (which was the greatest amount ever) compared to \$1,546.10 in 1960. Only one service is held each Sunday and the Chinese language is used.

Choir & Y.P.S. — The Choir has been a blessing. It meets twice weekly. The Y.P.S. meets once a month. It is gratifying to report that the members of the Y.P.S. helped support a college student in Formosa last year.

Social Work is a major part of our work for it presents a great opportunity to establish friendship and understanding. Education Work also is carried on regularly. Kindergarten is held four days a week, Both Chinese and English are taught and the children made good progress.

During the past year there were three adult baptisms, ten registrations of births, eleven weddings and sixteen funerals.

Eighty pupils and a staff of sixteen were enrolled in our Church School which won the Banner for average attendance for the second time. An average of 30 attended the meetings of the W.M.S. Auxiliary. Our doors are open to all at all times. We try not only to help our people in material and physical ways but also in a spiritual way which is of course the main duty of our church.

#### CHINESE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, VANCOUVER, B.C.

The retiring of the Rev. Y. N. Kwan after 18 years of service and the beginning of the Rev. Andrew Ng's ministry were major events of the year.

There were during the year 15 baptisms—seven adults and eight children. Also seven persons joined the church on Profession of Faith and one by letter from Hong Kong. There was one name removed by death from the Communion Roll, which now stands at 103 members.

The congregation in September elected a Board of Managers, composed of nine members, which has already accomplished a good deal of work and promises to be a real asset to the life of the Church.

The addition of a morning worship service also took place in September. It is conducted in both Chinese and English with an encouraging measure of success. The Session is grateful to those who have helped in these services by giving addresses in English, these being summed up in Chinese by the minister, Mr. Ng, for the sake of some who do not understand English.

Monthly Home, or Cottage, meetings were started. These provide opportunity to meet with relatives and friends who hitherto have shown little or no interest in the church.

There is also weekly prayer and Bible study meetings held in Chinese and English on Wednesday evenings.

Classes for the teaching of English to new-comers were held also on three afternoons and evenings each week. In addition, Chinese language classes are now conducted by the Reverend Andrew Ng, with a total enrolment of 23.

The new Board of Managers has dealt with three important matters of business:

- The organization of a Canvassing Committee composed of 18 key people. The result of the canvass in money was \$2,104. In this we recognize God's good hand upon us.
- An arrangement whereby the minister can visit Chinese patients in hospitals
  in this area. This was accomplished when the Chinese Benevolent Association
  appointed our minister, the Rev. Andrew Ng, as chairman of their sick visiting committee.
- 3. A plan to extend the present building. This project is now under consideration and will be put into operation as soon as permission has been granted by the Presbytery of Westminster and the Vancouver City Hall.

#### FRENCH WORK

L'EGLISE DES CANTONS DE L'EST - MELBOURNE, P.Q.

We now have a church building which is both comfortable and clean and with a renovated parish hall with at least functional if not modern, equipment.

Our statistics reveal 6 baptisms, 5 marriages, 1 burial, 5 special services, 8 Communion Services, 42 Bible Studies, 52 Bible Studies (Mid-week) and a yearly Catechist Class. The direction of the church rests on 4 elders, 10 managers. We received 9 new members which gives us a congregation of 66 and 51 adherents.

Camp Richmond is the enterprise of the local church at Melbourne since its beginnings, and is largely supported by our Women's Association. This year we had 54 children, 10 counsellors, 2 cooks and 1 assistant.

The Young People with 26 members hold 2 meetings every month.

The Playgrounds Activities of l'Eglise des Cantons de l'Est received a grant of \$2,500 from Quebec Department of Youth and \$500 from the Home Missions Board for assistance in erecting the combined Recreation Hall and Chapel. The Presbytery of Quebec gave the former Chapel at St. Rene de Beauce which involved demolition and transportation. We thank God for His help during the past year.

#### EGLISE ST. LUC - MONTREAL

There was a continuous progress in Eglise St. Luc during the year 1961. There has been an increase in number: 60 new members have been received, half of them are former Roman Catholics. At the same time we have lost 55 members through death, departure, or revision, so that our membership stands now at 359. For the last three or four years we had 400 families who accepted our ministry, but the number of communicants has increased, and more people at the time of the Every Person Canvass made a pledge and stood by it.

After July 1, Eglise St. Luc will become self-supporting, so this is the last report to the General Assembly through the General Board of Missions. However, we want to remain truly a mission work of the Church among French-speaking people in Montreal, and if we are not asking any more financial support for the Pastoral Ministry of Eglise St. Luc we need very much the prayers of all who realize how important is our witness in this particular period in the history of the Province of Quebec.

There is now among the French-speaking people in Canada, a great revolution going on. It is still a silent revolution, but in this ferment it is imperative that we make a good witness. We have new contacts all through the year and the publication of "La Vie Chretienne" is a great help.

The first French Protestant School started in 1956 with 46 pupils and has now 563 pupils who can study up to the 8th grade. Next year a 9th grade will be started, and a new French Protestant School will be opened in another section of Montreal.

We have been very glad to welcome in February 1961 the Rev. Joseph Ntyomono from the Presbyterian Church in The Cameroun. Mr. Ntyomono was appreciated for the time he was working among us and we are glad that he could serve the Church in Quebec City where he has moved now with his family.

Mr. Gilles Warnery arrived in Canada from France with his wife in July last year. After a part of the summer in Richmond-Melbourne with the Rev. Jacques Smith, they moved to Montreal. Since then Mr. Warnery has been very active as a Director of Christian Education in Children and Young People's Work. We are grateful to God that he has been called to work with us. # HUNGARIAN WORK

#### OTTAWA

1961 was the fifth anniversary year of the beginning of the work in this refugee congregation. This was also the first complete year as an organized congregation and its ordained ministry.

The Ottawa Protestant Hungarian community is a small one; therefore every soul is kept registered not only in the city but within a radius of about 80 miles.

The constitution of the congregation is shown by the following figures:

In 33 households there are 45 members in full communion. )
In 23 households there are 26 adherents. ) 71

In 55 households there are 73 unchurched Protestants.

In 111 Total households there are 144 Protestants fairly equally divided.

This completely "refugee" community shows exactly the same degree of church loyalty and integration into the church as larger refugee communities in other cities to already existing, well established churches.

The influence of the previous years of this same community under Soviet education is shown in the poor attendance at services.

Statistics: Attendance of services 25; communion 15; Sunday School 7; Baptism 3; confirmation 2; marriage 3; funeral 1.

This was the first year of "Soli Deo Gloria Guild"—a lively and active women's group combining in their work the program of the L.A. and W.M.S. They raised 550 dollars.

The transportation of the 15 children is a handicap; 12 others under 3 are taken care in the home department. In addition to the 2 teenagers confirmed, there are 10 others in Ottawa, Forester's Falls and Prescott also preparing for confirmation. The Heidelberg Catechism is taught in both languages. The Vacation School meeting at the manse was attended by 10 children, for 2 weeks.

In finances the congregation absorbed ½ of the 20% cut in stipend for 6 months, gave \$300 for the Budget of the Church, and initiated a Building Fund, at present amounting to \$657.

Being in the capital city, interesting visitors honored us by their visits, such as Hon. J. W. Pickersgill, M.P., Mr. Ferenc Nagy, former Prime Minister of Hungary, Tibor Tollas famed poet of the Hungarian Revolution and editor in Vienna, and Dr. D. Gyallay Pap, President of the Bethlen Federation, Montreal.

In Presscott 10 to 15 people gather monthly for services, and 3 children are preparing for confirmation.

#### LONDON-MOUNT BRYDGES AND VICINITY HUNGARIAN PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

In the past year on fifty-four occasions we gathered to worship God. The total number of those attending was 1,823, an average of 34.

Prayer Meetings — We had 12 meetings held in the homes of the Minister and of members in Fingal, Union and Iona Station with an average of 18 attending.

Holy Communion — In Mount Brydges the Lord's Supper was held on 7 occasions, with an average of 31 participating. There were five children baptized.

It has been necessary to establish a separate Hungarian Congregation in London because of the great distance between London and Mount Brydges. This congregation has only a few members but we have strong hope that it will increase in the future and share the financial burden of the church in Mount Brydges.

The congregation absorbed what amounted to a 30% cut in Mission Board grants in 1961 amounting to an extra \$52.00 per month. The congregation is unable to absorb a further reduction of grant in 1962.

#### CALVIN HUNGARIAN PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, EDMONTON

Last year was a year of great progress and much happiness. First: The minister of the congregation received his ordination and induction. The Rev. G. Dezse is our first ordained minister since this congregation was founded. Second: Our long awaited hope was fulfilled in obtaining a fine Church building which was newly decorated inside and outside by the members of the congregation. We as the members of the Presbyterian Church in Canada must say many thanks

to the Home Missions Board and the Presbytery of Edmonton. Third: Last year Congregational income was \$3,106.73, compared to \$2,390.36 the previous year, an increase of \$716.36. Thirteen children were baptized.

The congregation is progressing steadily and we hope this year will be better by the grace of our Lord.

## HUNGARIAN CHURCH, OLIVER, B.C.

There are 24 members in full communion. In 1961 we had 48 church services, the Lord's Supper being served five times.

Since May 1961 a paper for the congregation has been issued by the minister every month, and goes to 30 families.

The congregation's income for the year was \$582.29.

#### INDIAN WORK

## LAKE OF THE WOODS MISSIONS, 1961

"Lake of the Woods Missions" is a general designation to cover the work of our Church in the extreme western area of Ontario, where it touches Manitoba and Minnesota. It is a country of lakes and woods in which are set here and there towns, villages, pulpwood camps, tourist resorts and Indian Reserves. The Church is established in Kenora, with a congregation, First Church, and with two institutions, Cecelia Jeffrey Residential School, and the new Lake of the Woods Reception Centre.

Through field workers, resident missionaries, and by radio, we reach out to five different Reserves covering a distance of over 160 road miles. Evangelism, Christian and secular education, social action and Christian nurture are aspects of our efforts to preach and show the glad tidings of Christ to both Indian and white people.

The Indian people of the Reserves are faced with many problems. There is poverty; there is a population growth which is becoming too great for the Reserves to maintain; there is a "welfare mentality" in which people are content to be provided for by others; there is the increasing impact of white society upon the traditional Indian way of life, with its puzzling replacement of new values for old; and there is a loss of self-respect.

The real need is for a meaningful purpose in life, and for the focusing and fruitful direction of the many native abilities that lie dormant. Vital Christian faith is the answer to this need. Where this spiritual need can be met, material needs will soon be met also.

In 1961 our work has seen some changes. Rev. John Carson served as Day School teacher at McKenzie Portage Reserve. Weekly Sunday Services were held for the first time and a Sunday School and evening classes in English language and music have been added to the regular activities.

A Mennonite group from Minnesota sent a resident missionary and built a church on the Big Grassy Reserve. We believe that there is no room for two Protestant groups on a Reserve, and after unsuccessful attempts to arrive at some agreement with the Mennonites, we felt we must concentrate on other places.

In June we came into possession of the property that had been purchased for a Reception Centre in the downtown area of Kenora. A Board of Management was appointed by Presbytery, consisting of members of the Mission Staff, members of First Church, and representative citizens of the town. Since the property includes six tourist cabins, these were operated during the tourist season. A Synod Presbyterian Men's Conference was also held at the property. Various renovations and improvements to the house were planned for and approved.

For the first time, regular Sunday services have been held at Crow Portage and Whitefish Bay, and this work has been most encouraging.

During the latter months of the year Mr. Colin Wasacase, a graduate of Birtle Residential School, and a candidate for the ministry has travelled from Winnipeg to conduct weekly Sunday services at Shoal Lake. These services, conducted by one of their own race, have been appreciated by the people there.

It is our hope that in 1962 there might be a resident missionary and a church building at Shoal Lake. We have the privilege here of nominating the Day School teachers, and these can play an important part in the total missionary program.

A most important feature of our work in 1961 was the integrated classes in which children of Cecelia Jeffrey School have participated. This story was featured by the Star Weekly.

During the pre-Christmas season, pupils of Cecelia Jeffrey School prepared a Christmas pageant, based on the Huron Carol, in which the Christmas Story was told with an Indian setting and in Indian costumes. The pageant was presented at four Reserves on Sundays. This co-operation in presenting the gospel is symbolic of our hope and prayer for the development of the work in the Lake of the Woods country.

#### WAYWAYSEECAPPO RESERVE

Lizard Point Reserve is situated west of Rossburn, Manitoba. Its northern Boundary is Highway 45 and most of its eastern boundary is formed by the Birdtail River. Roughly seven miles long and six miles in width, it comprises about 39 square miles of fairly good farming land. Probably twenty-five sections are under cultivation by non-Indian farmers.

With the population explosion of the last 30 years has come a corresponding increase in unemployment. Within the past decade much land has been cleared of bush. Wild game was thus decimated. Pastures were also ploughed, and the cattle population is less than ten head.

Most adult Indians may secure seasonal employment during the summer, but during the winter families subsist in conditions varying from fair to poor, depending on the discretion of the householder. To try farming on one's own is a discouraging enterprise, particularly in a dry year like the summer of 1961. With the continued trend toward mechanization there will be still more unemployment of these unskilled labourers.

There are now 38 children attending the Rossburn Public School. The Day School still open on the Reserve will likely be closed in June of 1963. Indian children attended Church Summer Camps at Clear Lake. About 55 Protestant children attend Indian Residential Schools. This number will probably decrease when other parents see the successful integration at the Rossburn school. The great need for our Indian Canadians is a ministry of *Teaching*.

## BIRDTAIL AND PIPESTONE INDIAN RESERVES

On the Birdtail Indian Reserve there is Christian Education in the day school. During the winter months Rev. R. Krepps coaches and manages an Indian Hockey Team on the Pipestone Reserve. This usually means late nights with the senior team once or twice a week. We have earned sufficient money to buy new uniforms on the Birdtail Indian Reserve, and are presently saving to buy uniforms on the Pipestone Indian Reserve. The money comes from gate receipts on games away from the Reserves.

Mr. Krepps writes, "Of a necessity I work with these people in this way. I cannot get through to them simply by approaching them and a king about the welfare of their soul." The Reserve at Pipestone, which is called Oak Lake Reserve, has had no consistent teaching in Christianity for a period of some twenty-five years. Since we came to this area the Board has agreed to see that we keep a Christian witness to the Reserve each week, and during the week. The work has been completely uphill, since many on the Reserve are pagan-Usually the division is called Protestant and Roman Catholic, but there is also the

group that have no allegiance whatsoever. Thanks be to God, we are reaching them this year through the medium of sport activities.

Thanks is to be given especially to the Young People of the Toronto-Kingston Synod for making a very substantial donation for a Church on the Reserve (\$5,000). We now have a very fine Church. The Indian people are happy with the Church. We would just continue to pray for one like it on the Birdtail Indian Reserve.

This past few years we have been working in co-operation with the Government Agencies in their work. We have found that where the Missionary, the Indian Health Nurse and the Indian Agent work in close co-operation, there is a much better understanding of the work each one is called to do.

Our Christian Education also consisted of having a two week Vacation Bible School in Virden, and one week V.B.S. on the Birdtail Reserve along with the Tent Mission which is held there each year. The motive of the Tent Mission is to reach people for Christ and bring them to a definite decision, if so moved by the Holy Spirit of God.

Our work is not always enjoyable, sometimes it is extremely difficult and sometimes even hazardous. It isn't always easy to be the white man that bears the brunt of the resentment that the Indian feels toward the white people, and is verbal when the Indian is intoxicated. At such time he vents his feelings against so much of what he disapproves. One Indian lady said that if the white man manages to land on the moon, she hopes they will all go there.

"Wherefore seeing we also are compassed about with so great a cloud of witnesses, let us lay aside every weight and the sin which doth so easily beset us, and let us run with patience the race that is set before us."

#### SIOUX VILLAGE

The Rev. H. Crump retired from Sioux Village Indian Work at the end of September 1961, after 37 years.

Worship was conducted each Sunday from January to September. The Daily Vacation Bible School and Tent Mission was held from July 31-August 4. Average attendance was 27.

## ITALIAN WORK

After the revision of the Church records, the number of members of our Church is about 70.

Our services are: Worship on Sunday at 11.00 a.m. and 7.00 p.m. in Italian and English.

The Women's Missionary Society was re-organized, and is held the first Friday of the month. At these meetings our Pastor is giving a series of studies on the theme "Vocation". The Sunday School, and the children's Bible Club are held respectively every Sunday at 11.00 a.m., and every Thursday at 4.30 p.m. There are about 50 children which are taking part these two last services. Every Thursday evening the prayer meeting with explanation of the Gospel is held. We want to organize the Young People's Society as soon as possible.

We pray Him who can do what we cannot do, that the Italians will accept our preaching of the Gospel, and accept Jesus Christ as the only Saviour of all the world. Our work is a work of evangelization, bringing men to the knowledge of the Gospel. We hope and trust that God will help us and will accomplish for us and by us this special mission among the Italian people in our city.

#### UKRAINIAN WORK

## UKRAINIAN PRESBYTERIAN MISSIONS - TORONTO

Our Missions work in Toronto has a local aspect as well as a larger Canadawide significance. Both are equally important. We serve the local Ukrainian community in Toronto, (about 50,000), and we represent and interpret Presbyterianism to the whole Ukrainian sector in Canada. There are about half a million Ukrainians in Canada.

The majority of them are indifferent to the Church and its message. Most of them lost their religious convictions because of evils they witnessed in Ukrainian traditional churches, others are impressed by secular literature which relegates religion to the things of the past, and what they see in their churches or often hear is of much help in their plight.

On the whole Ukrainians are hardworking and lively people and would be an asset in any movement. This is well understood by the Communists, who try hard to win at least a portion of them and do not spare money or effort for their work among Ukrainians. In every large city there exists a Communist controlled "labour" organization for Ukrainians. Usually they have a comfortable building, instructors in dancing, singing, etc. City of Toronto, for instance is divided in districts and in each district there is an active cell. Also there is a committee for work among the young people (comsomol). They are trying to attract the young people organizing dances and parties in private homes. Another committee is in charge of hospital visitation; they usually leave fruit and cigarettes for the ill with an invitation to come to their hall later. They are also printing Ukrainian weekly newspapers filled with propaganda. They organize life insurance companies, funeral brotherhoods, etc. The coming of Ukrainian refugees to Canada from Soviet Ukraine was a great blow to the communist influences among Ukrainians.

The best way to oppose an evil idea is to proclaim a better idea. Presbyterianism is not only better it is a new message to our people that solves many of their spiritual problems in a new way.

In 1921 and in 1951 we had in Canada about the same number of mission stations among Ukrainians. The same is true about other denominations. In some denominations the number of mission stations became smaller. However the number of Ukrainians who registered themselves as protestant in all Canada census amounted to 20,000 in 1921 and 60,000 in 1951.

The mission work should be considered in this wide aspect and not only as a local Gospel Hall.

By very existence of Ukrainian Presbyterian Congregations we make it possible for many Ukrainians to feel that the Presbyterian Church is not only the Church of English, Scottish or Irish people, but it is Ukrainian Church as well.

We began our work without membership, church building or even hymnbooks. As Ukrainians have no protestant historical background we could not expect them to come to our meetings, so we went after them on the street corners.

When necessary we helped with food and clothing and in every possible way showed the good will of the Presbyterian Church towards the new comer, all this was connected with the Gospel Message.

During the past year we had four radio broadcasts. Two in Canada and two church services were broadcast to the Ukraine through the kindness of the International Section of the CBC.

Our Credit Union continues to serve those who are in need of small loans. Our assets amount to about \$5,000.

Our young people have their own organization and increasingly use English language.

By diverse methods but mainly by the challenge of *The Message* our membership increases, but in the same time we lose our members continually to the farms and suburbs. This is a great hindrance in our efforts to become self-supporting. The salary of the missionary is expected to be cut every year, but the membership remains at the same level and we are reaching the time when the missionary will have to take the reductions instead of the mission.

If we could gather our former members, who are now members of Presbyterian, Anglican and other protestant denominations in suburbs we would make a very strong congregation indeed. However, this is neither practical nor desirable, but should be considered when our work is appraised.

No movement can succeed without the printed word. The Communists spend billions of dollars on their literature. To meet the need according to our ability we are printing *Evangelical Truth* in Ukrainian and English and "Kubansky Krai" in Ukrainian, Russian and English. The letters of appreciation which readers of our papers send to me are always encouraging.

Present day prevailing ecumenical moods and the consequent desire to be friendly with ritualistic churches adds to restraint in mission work among Ukrainians. I am all out for ecumenical movement, but it should not be allowed to cloud the need of missions.

The fact is that Greek Catholic and Greek Orthodox Churches in Canada do not have an extended hold on Ukrainians. According to the most optimistic calculations not more than 40% of Ukrainians are influenced by both churches. Even those are tied up to the Churches mostly by bingo, credit unions, insurance companies, dancing, etc.

The Presbyterian outlook is most suitable for the state of mind of unchurched Ukrainians. The work will be hard and uphill but in the long run, with the help of the whole church it will produce most gratifying results. During the past thirty years these "slow" Ukrainian missions together with the whole church increased the number of Ukrainian Protestants in Canada from zero to 60,000. Much more could be achieved with greater effort and more patience. This is the time to increase the missionary effort among Ukrainians. The Presbyterian Church in Canada should have one Ukrainian missionary in every large city in Western Canada.

#### ARMAGH

Following the resignation of Miss Gwen Davenport in September of 1961, Mrs. M. Herrig was appointed Director. An opportunity was afforded to meet Mrs. Herrig at the annual Open House held in September when many members of the Church visited the Home.

"A house is a place of protection, a home is a place of affection". Armagh is a house and a home in that sense.

In 1961 96 girls came to Armagh, fourteen of whom came from outside Ontario. Armagh has a most important place in the Church's work. Here it is that we have to live more than anywhere else according to the Church's teaching. In the very close contact of everyday living, it is necessary to practice and exercise the love we claim to have as Christ's disciples. It is this love which will let the girls realize they may go out from Armagh and face the world anew, convinced they can be better for this experience.

In 1961 the craftsroom was completed and has been put to good use. Tray decorations for patients in hospital were made by the girls at Christmas time, and it is hoped to find more ways to have the girls take an interest in the needs of others, and thus stimulate their desire to help.

It is unfortunate that the Armagh Home is not better known throughout the Church in view of the nature of this institution as a home for unmarried mothers. As one young woman recently wrote after leaving Armagh, "I would like to be able to sing the praises of Armagh to all and sundry".

## DEACONESSES AND WOMEN MISSIONARIES

Miss Catherine MacFarlane served in Abercrombie, Linacy and Westville Road in the Presbytery of Pictou. The town of New Glasgow is central to these districts. There is large-scale unemployment among residents, with its twin companions of alcoholism and poverty. There is also a constant shifting of population.

The Sunday School re-opened in the Fall with 21 children registered. Mission Band was held this year also, as was a Vacation Church School. There is not quite so much need for welfare work as there was a year ago because of the moving away of some of the needy families. Our people in Abercrombie are cared for, for the most part, by Westminster Church, New Glasgow; and a few families attend St. Andrew's Church and First Church. However, we did conduct a Vacation Church School which was well attended.

Linacy presents the same picture as regards church affiliation in the town, most of them being linked wth St. Andrew's in New Glasgow. The Sunday School children are now transported to New Glasgow each Sunday. The Y.P.S. is a good steady group of young people, co-operating in every way to make their society interesting and successful.

Miss Ruth Starrett's work at Evangel Hall, Toronto has been mainly concerned with women and family situations, a two-week Daily Vacation Bible School, opportunities to tell of the work of Evangel Hall, participation in the "World Mission Weekend" at Owen Sound and vicinity, office work and supervision of women and children's clothing department. The attendance at the weekly meeting for women was thirty-seven. Over 260 families were contacted and helped with food or clothing; a Christmas dinner was served to fifty-six women and eighteen children; a turkey dinner was served to 102 men; and hampers were provided for 82 families at the Christmas season. A supply of food was also given to 115 single men who have housekeeping rooms.

Thirty-five Presbyterian Church groups have taken part in the nightly services, and supplies have been received from churches and individuals throughout Canada. Without this support such a constant ministry could not be carried on, and we believe that many have appreciated the opportunity of havng a mission where they may serve in a practical manner.

The work of Miss Doreen Worden in the Presbytery of Brandon is divided between points as far as Flin Flon in the north and Killarney in the south, to Melita in the west and Portage la Prairie in the east.

Without doubt the most interesting and frustrating part of the work is among the Indian people. Perhaps the main problem is "unemployment". First of all there is little incentive to work and often no work to do. We just seem to be marking time on the Reserves here.

At Oakanais there have been many opportunities to speak with the women. The women's group is affiliated with the W.M.S. They make quilts and sell them among themselves. Material is donated for this, and also flannelette for babies' clothes. They are very friendly and always serve a cup of tea after the meeting. On all the Reserves it is very difficult to have a meeting in the winter time because of lack of transportation. If small children are to be taken it makes the task almost impossible. It is too bad the houses were not built close together on the Reserves.

Waywayseecappo women have tried a new way of distributing bales. They put a price on each article and then everyone can buy what they want. This eliminates much quarrelling. The women are also affiliated with the W.M.S. Some of the women went to the Young Women's Conference, February 29, and Synodical in Winnipeg. They also attended the Presbyterial Rally held in Brandon on May 13.

The summer is a busy time for all. Vacation Schools were held wherever we could get a handful of children together, e.g., North Brandon, Bellafield, Pipestone and Eunola, and Southminster in Brandon.

Of course, camps are the best media for Christian Education, and we were at Bower Lake camp and at Clear Lake. We took part in the following meetings and rallies: four regular Presbytery meetings, three Presbyterials, Young Women's Conference in Winnipeg, Synodical in Winnipeg, C.G.I.T. Rally in Neepawa, P.Y.P.S. Synod Rallies, Presbytery P.Y.P.S. Rallies, three Christian Education meetings, two camp meetings and a Christian Education Training Conference in Saskatoon.

There were three new Senior High Fellowships formed in Brandon Presbytery this year. The summer student deaconess assisted the presbytery deaconess in surveying the North Hill of Brandon. There is no school or church there, so our classes were held in a garage. A survey of Dauphin and Swan River was also carried out. The people were friendly and welcomed us to their town.

Miss Evelyn Walker, Assiniboia Presbytery Deaconess, spent the year mostly in Christian Education work among the churches in Regina. The Vacation Church Schools were held during July and August. In the autumn after holidays, Miss Walker began supplying the pulpit in Estevan congregation and hopes to accomplish work in the field of Christian Education through Teacher Training Classes.

Miss Ethel Mellafont worked at Chetwynd, B.C., which is a frontier town located approximately forty miles from Hudson's Hope. A vacation Church School in which the Anglican Church shared, was conducted in August. Enrolment was 37, and we were assisted by the girls from our Alaska Highway Van, and those from the Anglican van.

In September we began a work with the Junior and Senior High students. This has become known as "Young Peoples". The interest is most gratifying, and the Fall Rally on Thanksgiving week-end, saw the registration of 45-50 Young People representing six congregations, in spite of inclement weather and road conditions. Our local Girl Guide Company provides an added opportunity to encourage and influence the girls.

Recently we were invited to consider services at another point 20-25 miles distant between Chetwynd and Dawson Creek. Many opportunities await Christ's Church in this area.

Miss Ella Green reported from the Shoal Lake Indian Reserve that the following have been conducted: kindergarten for five-year old children in the mornings only, Children of the Church, Explorers, C.G.I.T., Ladies Group, Hockey Club, Sunday Church service, and Sunday School.

Miss Green goes into town to translate into Ojibwa the Sunday School lessons broadcast on the air every weekend. This radio programme is entitled "Mission Time". It is very helpful and interesting to the Indian people in the Lake-of-the-Woods country.

## TORONTO HOSPITAL VISITORS

The spiritual ministry of the Church in their time of need is greatly appreciated by the sick. Literature of a suitable nature is given to every patient visited. Before Christmas visits were made to Lambert Lodge, Toronto, and each of the 680 residents received a Christmas leaflet prepared by the W.M.S. These Christmas messages were also given to each one registered as a Protestant at the Lockwood Clinic, and to patients at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital and the Belmont Home for the Aged.

Recently a hospital visitor was asked "How important is hospital visiting, and what purpose does it serve?" Hospital visiting is the hand of the Church extended in friendship when a patient's card reads "no friends or relatives". A patient said to a hospital visitor, "No one comes to visit me", and from her conversation it was gathered that her past had been rather unsavory, and now deserted by her friends, ill and alone, the only friend she had was the hospital visitor.

## IMMIGRATION

A further reduction in the number of immigrants entering Canada was noted in 1961 when 71,689 came into the country as compared with 104,111 in the previous year. Furthermore, over 40% of all immigrants now arrive by air. Two thirds of those coming from Scotland use this method of travel. Our service to

immigrants originally was set up to deal with returning servicemen, war brides, and the waves of post-war immigrants who arrived for the most part by ship.

Until recently the names of immigrants arriving by air were not available to the churches from any source. However, in December, 1961, the Department of Citizenship and Immigration announced a plan whereby the names would be made available through social agencies in thirteen centres across Canada to churches interested in extending a welcome to those of their own faith coming from other countries.

The Rev. John Service continues to send us lists of Scottish immigrants sailing from Glasgow and Greenock, and to extend a greeting on behalf of our Church prior to sailing. At Halifax, the Rev. A. O. MacLean serves as Port Chaplain, and Miss Mary MacEachern is the Port Receptionist, replacing Mrs. G. Ingraham, who retired. Mrs. I. M. Creaser is the receptionist at the Port of Saint John. In Montreal Miss Dorothy Lukes welcomes the newcomers.

Dr. J. A. B. deVleeschouwer tendered his resignation as Director of the Department after six years of service, effective September 1, 1961. The Rev. A. Ross MacKay was requested to become Acting Director until a full time appointment could be made. Miss Frieda Matthews was named to this post. Her duties commenced March 15, 1962.

Church groups wishing to take up a project such as teaching English to immigrants may secure guides and books for teaching basic English free of charge from the Canadian Citizenship Branch of the Department of Citizenship and Immigration, Ottawa. Whether or not assistance is needed with language, most newcomers wish to have a sense of belonging, of feeling wanted by the community and accepted as an equal. Church groups should take the initiative in extending invitations and helping them to understand and share in their life and work.

Over 2,000,000 immigrants have come to Canada in the post-war period. There can be no doubt that a valuable service has been rendered to many of these newcomers through the combined efforts of the representatives of the Board of Missions, the W.M.S. (W.D.) and the W.M.S. (E.D.), and the ministers and members of the congregations from coast to coast. Our Church has a great and continuing opportunity to extend Christ's Kingdom by welcoming the stranger within our gates and befriending them as Christ would have us do.

# REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY (Eastern Division)

To the Venerable the 88th General Assembly:

The Board of Management of the Woman's Missionary Society (Eastern Division) respectfully submits the following report for the year ending September 1961:—

Reports from our eight Presbyterials show that our adult membership has decreased slightly, while increases have been noted in our Children's and Girl's Departments. The prescribed course "Into all The World Together" was enjoyed by many groups, while others found it uninteresting and hard to prepare. "Missions For This Day" proved popular and instructive.

Leadership Training Courses were planned for all Presbyterials, but due to illness of Director only one was held. It proved most helpful to members in attendance, and plans are under way to hold the remaining seven during 1962.

Our Director of Girls Work served as a Leader Consultant at the National C.G.I.T. Conference at Lennoxville, Quebec. Our Society was represented at the Consultative Conference on Preparing our Church for its Missionary Obedience held in Hamilton. Our representatives presented their impressions of this important conference to the members of our Society at its Annual Meeting.

The 'In Memoriam' Cards were introduced and accepted favorably. Although we regret so many of these cards have to be used, yet we are happy to know that in honoring our departed friends and loved ones we are also helping to spread the gospel of Jesus Christ throughout the world.

Appointments were made to the various Church Committees on which the W.M.S. (E.D.) has representation.

Two briefs were submitted to the "Planning Committee of the Administrative Council" stating the Mission of the Church as seen by our Board, and giving an outline of our plans for future work.

## OVERSEAS MISSIONS

#### INDIA

Miss Mary Nichol, R.N., has completed another five and one half year term as our Missionary Nurse in the Jobat Hospital. She returned home on furlough in January 1961. The annual report tells of her duties as a teacher in The School of Nursing which we partially support with an annual grant. She also tells of her experiences as an examiner for the 3rd year students for nine nursing schools.

On returning home, Miss Nichol spent three months in the Royal Ottawa Sanatarium, and we rejoice that she was able to continue her studies at the University of Western Ontario. She hopes to receive her Degree in Nursing Science at Spring Convocation in May. An itinerary is being planned for Miss Nichol's visit to the Maritime Synod during the summer of 1962. We continue to help support Vellore Medical Centre.

#### BRITISH GUIANA

Miss Anna MacDonald returned to British Guiana in January 1961. Since her return she has worked with our four native workers. The First group of Guiana Girls in Training was organized by Miss MacDonald at M. 48 Village in August. Plans are made by Miss Changhur to organize similar groups in New Amsterdam.

Our Society is keenly interested in the service training of students for deaconesses planned to start in October 1961. We have pledged financial assistance for this work.

The future work in British Guiana is a cause of much concern. Our members are asked to be much in prayer for the work and workers in this field as they face this trying period.

#### FORMOSA AND JAPAN

Although supporting no worker in either of these fields, our Society shows its interest by granting scholarships to The Tam Kang School and work among Hakka students. We assist in Mrs. Dickson's work also.

We appreciated a visit from Rev. Duk Sung Kim in June 1961, before his return to Japan. We follow him and his work with interest. While he was studying in Canada we were happy to help with the support of his family. We continue our support by a grant, of the MacKay Memorial Hospital.

## HOME MISSIONS

Three Graduate Deaconesses were employed by our Society during the past year. Four student deaconesses and one lady missionary were under summer appointment. All these young ladies did excellent work.

It was a matter of much interest that five young ladies from the Maritime Synod graduated from Ewart College during this year. They have been duly designated and have taken up work in various parts of Synod. As president it was a privilege to attend 2 of these designation and 2 recognition services.

A special feature of our Home Mission Work in '61 was the appointment of Mrs. Helen Khongkhul of Bangkok, Thailand, to work among the Chinese people, (especially women) in the Maritime cities and towns. She arrived on April 6th and began her work in Charlottetown, P.E.I. During her stay she visited approximately one thousand Chinese people bringing the gospel to them in their own language and urging them to become connected with a Church in Canada. Mrs. Khongkhul left on Thursday, September 28th for her home followed by the good wishes of all. This work proved worthwhile in most centres, although some seemed uninterested. Where interest has been taken in this work new members have been received. Perhaps the greatest response was in Zion Church, Charlottetown.

During the year, Mrs. Lyle Ingraham and Mrs. F. C. Whitman retired after doing excellent work as Port Worker and Hospital Visitor in the city of Halifax. This work has been combined and is now carried on by Miss Mary MacEachern, Graduate Deaconess.

Mrs. Creaser continues as Port Worker in Saint John.

#### GRANTS

Bursaries of \$100 each were given to three student deaconesses who made application for same. We have made the annual \$300.00 grant to the Interprovincial Home for Women at Coverdale, the Maritime Home for Girls, Truro, and Camp Geddie. Camps Mira and Keir each received \$100.

#### PRESBYTERIAN MESSAGE

Eleven issues of the Presbyterian Message have been published during the past year. This completes Volume 71.

Our little magazine goes far afield—into the 10 provinces of Canada, several of the states, the New Hebrides, Formosa, Japan, China, etc. As it goes month by month may it prove a worthy witness of the living Message which our Woman's Missionary Society seeks to share, that of a living Saviour for a waiting world.

# REPORT OF THE WOMEN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY (W.D.)

Woman's Missionary Society,

(Eastern Division)

To the Venerable the 88th General Assembly:

The Council Executive of the Women's Missionary Society (W.D.) respectfully submits the following report of the Society's work for 1961:—

## ORGANIZATION

April 3, 1962

Throughout the year 1961 the Organization Department carried out its work through its various sub-committees for Children's Work, Girls' Work, and Adult Work and through the work of its National and Regional Secretaries. The end of 1961 saw for the first time a complete staff of seven Regional Secretaries. The department continued to work in close cooperation with all other W.M.S. Departments and the Board of Christian Education in fulfilling

its responsibility for the preparation of Missionary Education material for the various age groups.

The Study theme "Into All the World Together" for 1960-61 helped all groups to think in terms of working with Christians around the world through various types of cooperative work and through World and National Councils of Churches.

Training Centres have now become established as annual events. Albert College, Belleville, Ontario, and Alberta College, Edmonton, Alberta, were the locations for the Training Centres in 1961. Once again all departments of the Society cooperated in planning and carrying out the programme of the Training Centres. All who attended will long remember the Bible Study led by Miss Margaret Kennedy of India.

Much has been done in many Presbyterials in training leaders and officers and in an endeavour to interest others in the work for which the women of the Church have undertaken responsibility. Much remains to be done in this regard if all of the women of the church are to be involved in the total mission of the church.

Speakers were provided for meetings in all parts of the western division and leadership given at camps and conferences in local areas.

The department felt keenly the loss of Miss Ada Adams, who had served so capably as National Secretary for Children's Work, when she accepted the position as Dean at Ewart College. It was with gratitude that Miss Mabel Booth was appointed to the position of National Secretary for Children's Work in which position she serves both the Women's Missionary Society, W.D. and the Board of Christian Education.

#### REPORT OF THE OVERSEAS DEPARTMENT

Throughout the year 1961 we have been conscious that the work given to our Society to do overseas in co-operation with the General Board of Missions has been seriously understaffed. This has been true at a time in history when the Christian witness is so greatly needed. As new nations emerge, as they grasp for material gain, as God allows man to understand how to conquer space, it is essential for the world that the Christian be taught faithfully and well.

Two members of the Formosa staff retired to be married in 1961. In August Miss Eileen Black became the bride of Rev. William Estell, a missionary of the Reformed Church in America. She, with her husband, continues to serve the Formosa Presbyterian Church. In September Miss Margaret MacKenzie who had completed two terms in Formosa was married to Mr. Gordon McCutcheon of Port Arthur, Ontario. Mr. and Mrs. McCutcheon are making their home at the Lakehead.

Two new members of staff went to two fields in 1961. Miss Merle McGowan of Northside, Saskatchewan, formerly a deaconess in Leaside Presbyterian Church, took up her work in British Guiana. Miss Tamiko Nakamura, Vancouver, B.C., formerly a deaconess in the Presbytery of Westminster, was appointed to the Korean Christian Church in Japan.

Despite the fact that we held our own in numbers of staff, we did little to move forward to meet the increasing needs for leadership in the Christian Church abroad. The Society spent \$137,000.00 in the six fields. In addition, capital grants were made for repairs and additions to buildings in Jhansi, India; for new classrooms in Amkhut and a missionary residence, Barwani, both in the Bhil field. A capital grant was made for the boys' dormitory at the Tamkang Middle

Schools, Formosa. Three new cars were purchased for the work in India, British Guiana, and Nigeria.

We must continue to realize that the events of the day demand the best that Christians have to offer. God is calling each of us to fulfil our discipleship in whatever way it is indicated, whether it be in full-time service, or whether it be in continuing and broadening our support of the whole work of the Church.

#### REPORT OF THE NATIONAL DEPARTMENT

1961 afforded our National Department staff numerous and varied opportunities for Christian service as they accepted the challenges which confronted them and sought to be faithful servants of Jesus Christ within our nation.

Two new appointments were made in March. Miss Dorothy McCombie and Miss Dorothy Anne Spring, both graduate deaconesses, were assigned to Downtown Mission work in West Toronto Presbytery and to Chinese work in Victoria, B.C., respectively.

Mrs. Jessie Anderson, who had served most acceptably as Hospital Visitor in the City of Edmonton for nine years, retired at the end of June. After more than thirty-six years of devoted service among the Chinese women and children in Victoria, Miss Gertrude Scott retired at the end of 1961.

Two members of our National staff were transferred to the Overseas Department. Miss Tamiko Nakamura, who had worked as deaconess in Westminster Presbytery since the spring of 1959, withdrew in September to accept a short-term appointment to work among the Koreans in Japan. Miss Athalie Read, who had given eighteen years of most commendable service in various phases of the National work, terminated her services at the end of the year to undertake work in British Guiana.

Four members of the staff served as full-time Hospital Visitors, making many hundreds of visits in the name of our Church to persons who were laid aside by illness and age. Mrs. George Mitchell joined our hospital visitation staff in Vancouver — New Westminster on September 1st.

In our Deaconess Department, seventeen members served as Presbytery deaconesses, in institutions, in Indian work, in Downtown Missions or in Immigration work. Seven student deaconesses were appointed for the summer months to assist the regular staff members in leadership training, Vacation Bible Schools and camps.

Thirteen members of our staff were engaged in work among the Chinese women and children in Montreal, Toronto, Windsor, Vancouver and Victoria.

Our two Indian Residential Schools at Birtle and Kenora had record enrolments with well over three hundred children in residence. Students from the schools won prizes and trophies for musical festival entries, in art and writing contests and in sports. Progress in the integration programme resulted in over half of the pupils attaining integrated classes.

The official dedication of Presbyterian Fellowship House in Winnipeg took place on November 1st. During the few months in which Fellowship House has been in operation, it has served as a home to a number of Indian Canadian students and as a haven to many transients. The Advisory Committee for the House, in its report, stated, "The House is being admirably conducted and is fulfilling well its purpose."

The National Department, and the whole Society, suffered a great loss at the end of 1961 when the resignation of Miss Frieda E. Matthews became effective. Miss Matthews had served as Executive Director of National Missions for fifteen years, and as a member of the Society's staff for over thirty years. Her devoted service to our Society and our Church will long be remembered. Miss Giollo G. Kelly was appointed as Miss Matthews' successor, and joined the National staff on October 1st as Director Designate.

#### CHRISTIAN LITERATURE REPORT

In 1961, the Estimate of the Womens' Missionary Society (W.D.) of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, for Christian Literature throughout the world, was increased to a total of \$12,400, of which \$5,000 was the usual Annual Grant from the Legacy Fund. The increase of \$400 was made in order to include an Additional Grant, sent through the Department of Overseas Missions, of the Canadian Council of Churches, to assist with the following projects—The African Sunday School Curriculum; World Christian Books; and Study Centres. Through Special Gifts and Legacies which came in for Christian Literature during the year, from individual groups and interested friends throughout all the seven Synodicals, to this Estimated \$12,400 was added the goodly sum of \$2,406.85—thus making a total sum of \$14,806.85, which went out into all the world for Christian Literature from the Women's Missionary Society (W.D.) during 1961.

Through the Annual Grants of our Estimate, each designated for its own special purpose, the evangelizing power of the written word, and the important literature needed particularly for our own workers there, has gone into India; Africa; Nigeria; Latin America; Japan; Korea; Formosa; British Guiana; and, through the Council on Christian Literature for Overseas Chinese, with headquarters in Hong Kong, has gone also to the millions of Chinese refugees, who have sought sanctuary all through South East Asia, and are now completely cut off from Christian literature in their own languages and dialects. In Canada, the work of The Canadian Bible Society (an Associate of the British and Foreign Bible Society) has been given strong support and our Christian Literature funds have supported and upheld Christian newspapers and magazines, as well as paid for the translating and subsidizing of books and pamphlets, for the French Protestants in Canada; the Ukrainians, and Hungarians; the Kuban Cossacks; Protestant Italians, and Chinese. Through these Grants, also, we have supported Literacy Programmes and the training of native writers; made possible the setting-up of many Village Lending Libraries in numerous newly-literate villages of India and South-East Asia, which, without these, would have no Christian reading at all with which to offset the floods of Communist literature, which at once follow the close of all Literacy Campaigns; and we have provided Christian books and magazines for women, and children of all ages and nationalities, published in their own languages and vernaculars. These monies, set aside for Christian Literature in the W.M.S. Estimates, have helped to send out, and maintain, untold volumes of good Christian reading, of many types and kinds, into a very great many of the far-away, needy places of this steadilyawakening world, in all the many languages and dialects of widely-differing peoples.

The generous amount of \$2,406.85, provided by the Special Gifts and Legacies, has fulfilled many requests and urgent needs, presented from many fields, for assistance in the outreach and opportunities before Christian literature in this vital hour of challenge in "The Battle for the Minds of Men", which wages, remorselessly and constantly, wherever men are found. Without these gifts of thoughtful Christian concern, no funds could have been found to answer these requests. Financial assistance was given to the publication and circulation of "The Presbyterian", the official newspaper of the Presbyterian Church in Nigeria, which includes in each issue Articles in English, Ibo, and Efik, and whose Editor is the Rev. Earle Roberts; special gifts were sent to Miss Agnes Gollan, to provide the special literature she requires for her work among the women and girls of Nigeria; and to the Literacy and Writing Centre, at Kitwe, Northern Rhodesia, to assist with the good Syndicate Material "African Features", most of which is written by young native Africans, trained at this Centre; to provide a Scholarship for some promising young African writer, and to subsidize the publication of native literature. Through the Rev. C. R. Talbot, in co-operation with Rev. In Ha Lee, and the Church Finance

Committee, a gift was sent to the Korean Churches in Japan, for the production of special Christian literature needed for the Korean Young People of these Churches, and to help support the Church newspaper and its valuable Department for Youth Work.

Our women workers in Formosa received a Special Gift for the literature needs of their own particular work; help was given to Miss Hildur Hermanson's Special Library Project for the Mountain Churches; to assist in publishing "The Women's Magazine" in Formosa; and for the literature needed for the coming Church Anniversary Celebrations in Taiwan, money was also sent. Enough gifts came in to this Department throughout the year, especially designated for this purpose, to provide twenty of those excellent Village Lending Libraries, which, through the Committee on World Literacy and Christian Literature, were set-up in as many newly-literate Villages in India and South-East Asia, through which a Literacy Campaign had just been completed, and into which floods of Communist propaganda immediately pour, with no Christian reading whatever to offset their influence. "Happy Childhood", and the Committee on Christian Literature for Overseas Chinese, also received help from a Special Gift.

In Canada, special gifts and encouragement went to the good Ukranian newspaper "Evangelical Truth"; the Hungarian magazine, "New Life"; "La Vie Chretien", the French Protestant newspaper, produced by the Rev. Andre Poulain, who also received assistance to translate and publish helpful Christian books and pamphlets for his people in Quebec; to the Rev. Jacques Smith, for his needs in Christian literature as Missionary-at-Large in Quebec. Financial help was also given to the preparation of the Carribbean Sunday School Curriculum. In every case there was real need for help in carrying on the work planned in Christian Literature, and each Special Gift fulfilled the wish of its donor—"to send forth Christian literature, into all the far corners of this troubled world; literature bringing the message of God's love and saving power, and lighting the way to the knowledge and enlightenment, which alone can save them from false ideologies and despair."

As we look at our supply department we see the hands and hearts of our W.M.S. members reaching out to bring help to many people as they seek to go the second mile in their concern for the needs of others.

Looking over the supply reports we can picture the happiness brought to little children, sick and elderly people as the result of bales received which contained quilts, baby clothes, Christmas gifts et cetera. Much has been done too to help lighten the load of our overseas missionaries. Through money given to the supply fund we have been able to purchase hospital and medical supplies and other things necessary to our overseas work.

Reports tell too of much being done for city missions and New Canadian families.

Surely it is of service such as this that our Lord says "inasmuch as ye have done it unto the least of these you have done it unto me".

## WELCOME AND WELFARE REPORT 1961

Someone, in a happy moment, named the Welcome and Welfare Department, the "Sunshine Department" of our Women's Missionary Society, and in many

instances this application is very appropriate. Everyone likes to be remembered, but especially those who are shut-in, those in homes for the aged, those in hospitals, including mothers who have small children and are unable to attend church or church meetings, by having someone visit them, possibly bringing a small gift of remembrance. Last year 40,954 visits made and 28,038 letters or cards written were recorded by the 699 secretaries sending in a report.

The number of names received by secretaries from the Immigration Department remains very small, due to restricted immigration.

One of the most encouraging features in the work of this department is the very large increase reported in those who have become connected with the Church and its activities, 1,147 became members, 552 adherents and 1,078 joined other organizations.

Hospital visitation, especially in areas where there is no staff hospital visitor, was reported as being carried on in every Synodical. A very commendable activity was reported from two Synodicals, that of referring the names of University and other students to the Minister of the Church nearest to school or boarding place.

Gifts of money or clothing were reported as having been sent to a number of individuals and needy families and also to Evangel Hall, Ewart College, Scott Mission, Armagh, Winnipeg Fellowship House, also Mission fields in Japan, Formosa and India, thus bringing "sunshine" to many in Canada and Overseas.

## COMMITTEE ON CHAPLAINCY SERVICES

To the Venerable the 88th General Assembly:

During the year 1961 your committee met in person with the Presbyterian chaplains for a discussion of the ministry which our church maintains to its men and women in the armed forces.

We are proud to report that early in 1962 the Rev. Dr. E. G. B. Foote, one of our ministers, was promoted to the office of chaplain-general of the three branches of the services. In the RCAF Command Chaplain James Dunn was honoured with the degree of Doctor of Divinity from Knox College at convocation this year.

Dr. Foote was formerly Chaplain-of-the-Fleet in the Royal Canadian Navy. The Rev. Dr. Charles H. MacLean and the Rev. A. Gordon Faraday are our chaplains in that service.

There are five Presbyterian army chaplains, Major J. M. Anderson, Major Howard A. Doig, Capt. J. D. L. Howson, Capt. W. J. O. Isaac and Capt. P. L. Sams.

In the Royal Canadian Air Force our church is represented by Wing Commander the Rev. Dr. James Dunn, Squadron Leader Kenneth W. House, who retires this year, Flight-Lieut. R. J. G. Ritchie, and Flight-Lieut. William J. Graham, recently appointed.

Shortly after his retirement Lieut.-Col. the Rev. J. Frederick Goforth, 54, died at Brantford on May 14, 1961. Another great loss was suffered in the death of Flight-Lieut. Earl G. Moore, 45, chaplain of the Royal Canadian Air Force, on December 31, 1961.

Your committee is constantly on the search for ministers in the age group of 25 to 35 years to serve as chaplains. Any who are interested should apply to the convener. There is a continuing need for a faithful and conscientious Christian ministry to men in uniform and their families.

Offerings from the three services to the budget of The Presbyterian Church in Canada last year totalled \$5,420. The amount authorized for expenses of the Committee on Chaplaincy Services was \$500, of which \$425 is to be spent on distribution of Presbyterian literature and *The Presbyterian Record*. If the appropriation were \$1,000 your committee could serve the needs of our chaplains much more effectively. St. Andrew's Church, Toronto, continues to provide 50 subscriptions to the church magazine for men in service training colleges, an example which might be followed by other congregations.

During the past year Presbyterian College, Montreal, received a scholarship of \$500 from the RCAF Central Chapel Fund Committee, and Knox College, Toronto, received a bursary of \$2,500 from the same source. These gifts represent RCAF interest in the training of suitable men for the ministry and are contributions for that purpose.

We commend to our congregations the chaplains and service personnel in their areas with the hope that the bonds of Christian fellowship may be strengthened by a discovery of each other and of some mutual concerns.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. That this General Assembly extend to the Rev. Dr. E. G. B. Foote congratulations on his promotion to the office of chaplain-general, and assure him of our prayers and support in his place of responsible Christian leadership.
- 2. That this General Assembly urge the Administrative Council to provide at least one thousand dollars in 1963 for the work of the Committee on Chaplaincy Services.

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON ARTICLES OF FAITH—1962

To the Venerable the 88th General Assembly:

The Committee on Articles of Faith has continued its work within its basic terms of reference, labouring also in the specific fields of inquiry assigned by the General Assembly.

The membership of the Committee consists of: Mr. Scarth Macdonnell, convener; Mr. R. A. Sinclair, secretary; Principal Robert Lennox; Professors Keith Markell, D. N. MacMillan, John Wevers, David W. Hay, W. Stanford Reid, A. L. Farris, J. C. McLelland; Drs. Louis J. Shein, David Gowdy, W. Orr Mulligan (deceased), J. B. Skene, J. A. MacInnis, C. L. Cowan, D. K. Perrie, L. H. Fowler, H. F. Davidson; Messrs. G. L. Douglas, J. C. Hay, J. C. Robson, C. G. Boyd, M. DiGangi, John Fleck, Stuart B. Coles, C. C. Cochrane, J. C. P.

Stirling, G. I. Hopton, James R. Weir, D. Glenn Campbell, Robert Culley. Mr. DiGangi, who has moved to the United States, and Mr. Campbell have tendered their resignations from the Committee.

The detailed report of the Committee's work is as follows:

#### I. THE CHURCH'S RELATION TO HER STANDARDS

(a) In submitting the revised form of Ordination Questions with Preamble which follows, the Committee wishes to review briefly the nature of the task on which it has been working, and the instructions of the General Assembly by which its work is governed.

The task before the Committee has been this. In view of the adoption of the Declaration of Faith Concerning Church and Nation of 1954, it has become obligatory for the Church to define anew what its subordinate standards are, and to establish appropriate terms of subscription to them, maintaining the principle that the subordinate standards are authoritative for the faith and life of the Church, yet not of such infallibility as to limit the Church's responsibility in Christ to examine itself and to confess its faith anew.

The Committee has been acting under the instructions of the General Assembly of 1955, "that the whole matter of the ordination and induction vows pertaining to the subordinate standards of our Church (Book of Forms, paragraphs 408-413) be referred to the Articles of Faith Committee for study and report as soon as possible to a future General Assembly, taking under serious review the full prayer of this Overture (i.e. No. 46, 1955) and all relevant matters" (A. & P. 1955 p. 67), and of the General Assembly of 1957, "that the specific problem of the status of the Declaration of Faith Concerning Church and Nation be left for answer by inclusion within the total task of formulating doctrine and determining the terms of subscription thereto" (A. & P. 1957, p. 51 and 232).

- (b) A number of inquiries have been received concerning the significance of the expression "undue means" to procure a call; and the Committee submits a study of some of the implications of this expression as an interim contribution to the understanding of the matter.
- (c) The 87th General Assembly approved the principle embodied in a recommendation from the General Board of Missions (Recommendation No. 6 to the 86th General Assembly) "that teaching and ruling elders, who come from other Reformed Churches, and who have subscribed to confessions which antedate the Westminster Confession of Faith and which comprise the immediate confessional background from which the Westminster Confession of Faith derives, should be permitted to retain a confessional relationship to such standards while serving within the Presbyterian Church in Canada" (A. & P. 1961, p. 284).

It also instructed the Committee on Articles of Faith to undertake studies "to determine which confessions shall receive such official recognition and in what terms" (A. & P. 1961, p. 285).

The Committee submits its findings in Recommendation No. 3 of this report.

#### ORDINATION QUESTIONS WITH PREAMBLE

Then shall the Moderator proclaim:

The one Holy Catholic and Apostolic Church is joined in body and spirit to the one God, Father, Son, and Holy Ghost.

The Ministry of Christ

The Father sent the Son into the world for its redemption. Though He was the eternal Word by whom the worlds were made, He took flesh for us, overcoming sin and death by His sacrifice on the Cross. Wherefore now, as risen and ascended High Priest, He evermore presents a redeemed creation to the Father. He is our Prophet, Shepherd and King, the Minister in earth and haven of the covenant of grace.

## The Ministry of the Holy Spirit

In this convenant Christ freely offers to all men, through the operation of the Holy Spirit, the gifts of faith, repentance, forgiveness of sins, and eternal life. By His Spirit, working in word and Sacraments, He gathers and instructs a people, a world-wide community of men and women born anew by grace through faith. This people together with their children is the Church, the body of Christ.

## The Ministry of the Church

This Church Christ endues with His own power, offices and mission, that she may participate in His continual ministry in heaven and earth. All her members are accountable to Him, as stewards of His grace and judgment, to bear God's word to the whole world, and through Christ to present the whole creation in worship and service before the Father, until Christ come again.

## The Ministry of the Teaching Elder

Our Lord Jesus Christ appointed and appoints some in His Church with authority to preach the Gospel, administer the sacraments and exercise pastoral rule in His Name. This ministry is an historical order continuing from the Apostles, which Christ perpetuates as He wills by calling and setting apart others to carry onward the true apostolic succession till the end of the age. By His Spirit He enables and commissions His Church to discern His call, to confirm therein by ordination those whom He has chosen, offering them again in prayer by the laying on of hands, that through their ministry His Church may be edified and equipped for her ministry in the world.

## The Authority of Christian Doctrine

The Presbyterian Church in Canada, as part of the Holy Catholic Church, and in historic continuity with the Church Reformed, is bound only to Jesus Christ. The Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments, as testimony to Him, constitute the canon of all doctrine, by which He rules our faith and life. We acknowledge our confessional antecedents in the ecumenical creeds. We believe that the Protestant Reformation was an historic intervention by the Holy Spirit to renew purity of worship, doctrine and daily life in the Church; we further recognize His work of grace in the Reformed creeds and confessions. Our subordinate standards are the Westminster Confession of Faith, as adopted in 1875 and 1889, the Declaration of Faith concerning Church and Nation of 1954, and such further doctrine as the Church from time to time declares, in fulfilment of its continuing function, under the word of God and the promised guidance of the Holy Spirit, to discern and formulate the faith once for all delivered to the saints, in agreement with Holy Scripture. Of this agreement the Church shall be sole judge on earth, allowing such differences of opinion as it finds to be lawful under Christ.

#### The Admonition

In the name of the Lord Jesus Christ, who shall judge the living and the dead at His appearing, the Presbytery now charges you who are assembled in this place and you who are about to be ordained and/or inducted, humbly to obey His Word in the commitment of this hour, not daring to proceed herein without a due recognition of the obligations involved and the grace necessary. Without this grace your labour is vain, and the Lord's condemnation rather than His blessing will be upon you.

#### The Vows

Then shall the Moderator ask the congregation to stand, and the ordinand shall present himself before him. Then the Moderator, addressing the ordinand, shall say:

N. N., in view of the foregoing declaration, and to the end that your faith and integrity of purpose may be evident to all, you are required to give answer to the following questions appointed by the Church:

- Believing in One God, Father, Son and Holy Ghost, do you confess Jesus Christ to be the Word of God made flesh for our salvation, Head over all things to His Church, Mediator of her worship, Bishop of her discipline and Lord of her mission?
- 2. Do you believe the Holy Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments to be the Word of God written, the canonical witness to Jesus Christ?
- 3. Do you receive and hold the Subordinate Standards received and confessed by this Church as founded upon the testimony of God's Apostles and Prophets, acknowledging the Church's continuing duty to examine and reform its faith as the Word of God and the Holy Spirit shall direct; and do you promise to be diligent in interpreting and promoting them among God's people?
- 44 Do you believe that only in Christ our High Priest is the Church's worship accepted by God, do you hold yourself accountable to Him for the purity of the Church's worship as response to His great offering on our behalf, and do you pledge yourself to the service of God and His people, in sermon, in sacrament, in prayer, in pastoral counsel and gospel discipline?
- 5. Do you believe the government and discipline of the Church by Sessions, Presbyteries, Synods and General Assemblies to be founded upon and agreeable to the Word of God; and do you promise to be subject in the Lord to this Presbytery and to the superior courts of the Church, to take your due part in the administration of their affairs, to follow no divisive course, but rather to maintain according to your powers the Church's unity, peace and obedience to her Lord?
- 6. Do you engage in the strength and grace of the Lord Jesus Christ to live as becomes His Gospel, to rule well your own house, and faithfully and diligently to discharge the duties of your ministry, to the edification of the Body of Christ and the advancement of God's Kingdom?
- 7. (If the ordinand is also being inducted into a charge or other office, the following shall be asked:
  - Have you directly or indirectly used any undue means to procure this call?)
- 8. Are zeal for the glory of God, love to the Lord Jesus Christ, and a desire for the salvation of men, so far as you know your own heart, your great motives and chief inducements to enter this ministry?

#### STATEMENT RE "UNDUE MEANS TO PROCURE A CALL"

The phrase, "Undue means to procure a call", has been in Presbyterian procedure for a long time. The Principal Clerk and the Procurator of the Church of Scotland General Assembly believe it, in a slightly different wording, to have had its origin in an Act of the General Assembly, 1596, entitled, "Corruptions in the Office." Branches of the Scottish Church have used it, and our wording apparently comes from the (Scottish) Act of 1711. It has been used by the Free Church, the United Presbyterian Church, and the United Free Church. In the present practice of the Church of Scotland it is omitted in the formal questions at Induction, but the Minister-Elect, after accepting the Call in his own Presbytery, must write a statement to be transmitted to the other Presbytery saying he has used no undue influence.

The intent of the phrase was, apparently, to ensure that there was no unethical conduct on the part of the Minister-Elect in procuring the Call. It has been held by some that the phrase had exclusive reference to the possibility of a candidate making a secret arrangement with the Patron of an endowed parish to the disadvantage of another candidate. This element certainly entered into the question — and perhaps at some time was the chief element — but in the history

of the usage as furnished by the Principal Clerk and the Procurator — to whom we are much indebted for the background — it is clear that the wider meaning was that of ethics. Ethical conduct includes the question of simony, that is, assuring the Patron that a smaller stipend would be acceptable and accepted. That the question had larger implications than an involvement with heritors is seen from the fact that it was retained by the Free Church (and others) after 1843, churches in which patronage was not a factor.

In Canada we think it correct to say that the meaning attached to the phrase by presbyteries and individuals has been in reference to ethical conduct, with little or no reference to stipend. The Committee on the Articles of Faith believes that the question should be retained (either in the formal questions or by the method of the Church of Scotland as a document accompanying the acceptance of the Call), and that what is ethical conduct should have some defining.

It is in the defining of the meaning of the phrase that difficulty arises. Like Dryden's "Great wits are sure to madness near allied, And thin partitions do their bounds divide", the line between acceptable conduct and undue means makes a thin partition. The discreet candidate will make sure he does not come near that line or partition.

The following is presented as a general guide and definition:

- (1) Plainly, a statement to an Interim-Moderator or officials of the vacancy that because of family needs, or other reasons, the candidate is willing to accept less than he understands the pastoral charge is offering, or even if he states he will not accept the Call at less than a certain stipend, is a perilous statement and may indeed become simony - the purchase of an office. No candidate is permitted to bargain with the vacancy. The Call does not mention the amount of the stipend. The Guarantee of Stipend is a separate document between the Presbytery and the vacancy. Although in common procedure a copy of the Guarantee is bound with the Call, it should not be: it comes from a Presbytery and goes to a Presbytery. There must be silence on the part of the candidate, or, at the most, great discretion of speech. It should be observed, in our procedure, that the amount of the stipend is determined before a name is inserted in the Call. Cases have been known where a pastoral charge is influenced in this because it "understands" that the candidate whom they have in mind is likely to accept a small stipend, but the candidates must be clear in conscience they have no part in this.
- (2) Several cases have been known in which one candidate or all the candidates have assured the Interim-Moderator that he or they are prepared to accept the Call if issued. This, upon examination, and on ruling of a Presbytery, may prove to be undue means. It certainly is questionable, although it is so commonly done it must be assumed that those concerned are unaware of the involvements. The amount of stipend, as stated in the preceding, is determined before the name is inserted in the Call. That one candidate, or all the candidates, have indicated acceptance without the formal ratification of the amount of stipend, is influence upon the stipend. It will likely affect the amount of the stipend, especially among voters who believe they are doing the pastoral charge a good turn by "saving money". Of course, this acceptance is subject to the action of presbytery or presbyteries. Where one candidate has said this and others have not, that candidate (doubtless in comparative innocence), if successful, has used undue means. The matter may have further involvements, and cases have been known where Candidate A has made this statement and Candidate B, to protect his interests, has been forced to do the same. But Candidate B is preaching elsewhere, and the other vacancy learns he has committed himself in this manner. Candidate B, then, in the other vacancy, has an ugly choice - to take the same action in the other vacancy and militate against other candidates there, or refuse to make a statement in the other vacancy and thus militate against himself.

The Committee submits that Inter-Moderators should block the question whether so-and-so is likely to accept the Call. The fact that a candidate has

appeared and has not sisted procedure concerning himself is all the assurance a vacancy is entitled to, for his appearance in a vacancy is an indication he is willing to consider it. After the Call is issued the successful candidate may say that if the presbyteries support the Call it is his intention to accept it.

- (3) A variation upon the foregoing (2) is the curious case in which Candidate D, preaching in a vacancy, learns that Candidate C, who preached the preceding Sunday in the same vacancy, has already had a Call issued that week in another vacancy. The news, however, is not current, and the charge in which Candidate D preaches will hold its meeting to moderate the following Monday. Here, if Candidate D says that Candidate C already has a Call it may be judged he is using undue means to procure the Call for himself. Should he keep silence, and if the news reaches the pastoral charge before the following Monday, and influences the voting in his favour, be able to say he has used no undue means? (It may be noted here that candidates, preaching in more than one vacancy, are not thereby necessarily using "undue means".)
- (4) Another curious case is that of a minister, with an unblemished reputation, who finds that despite several appearances in vacancies he is unable to get a Call. By accident he discovers that a dear old lady in his present charge, believing he should stay with them for life, is quietly learning where he was candidating and is taking steps to prevent a Call being issued, usually by letting it be known that his present charge in no circumstances will let him go. She is constituting herself as an agent of the Divine Will, as she sees it. It is one thing for the Church to rule that a man must not use undue means, but it would be most difficult to make an effective rule to prevent devout parishioners from using undue means to keep a man.
- (5) If a Vacancy Committee submits a leet of, say, three names, and all the men have been heard, has the pastoral charge the right to introduce a fourth or a fifth name from the floor for the consideration of the congregational meeting? Certainly such procedure is "unfair", and some Interim-Moderators ask the pastoral charge, by resolution before the voting, to bind themselves to the names submitted, stand or fall on that leet. If the motion is not presented on his request, the shrewd Interim-Moderator gives notice that he will complain to the Presbytery that the leet is being dealt with unfairly, but he is careful not to close the meeting against the will of the meeting. However, the following has been known: A candidate, whose application was not accepted by the vacancy committee, made acquaintance in the pastoral charge and deliberately or inadvertently worked up a group that began to believe the vacancy committee was high-handed and was "robbing the people of their rights." In the meeting for moderation, the name of this candidate was presented and the Interim-Moderator was unable to block it by appealing to the people to respect the leet. The voting was split, and the man not on the leet received the Call. The Presbytery declined to sustain the Call on the ground of the weight of objections adduced. The charge proceeded to hear another leet and called a man not previously considered. Had the case been prosecuted in another direction, the candidate who intruded might have been judged guilty of using undue means.
- (6) The distinction between undue means and unwise actions may be difficult to make. A candidate, unknown to an Interim-Moderator, who make formal application but at the same time writes a friend in that Presbytery asking him to intercede with the Interim-Moderator to get him a hearing, might be judged by some presbyteries to be using undue means. If the friend, learning the application is made, of himself intercedes, the candidate is in the clear. A candidate who submits with his application many press references to himself is unwise, protesting too much—or does he know the charge too well?—but it is doubtful if this could be ruled undue means. If others, as friends, send in such information, the candidate is clear, but there are times when one's friends are less than friends. There are many variations of this question, what is simply unwise and what is really undue means?

- (7) A situation that has aroused considerable discussion in time past, and could arouse it again, is that wherein the Interim-Moderator of a vacancy himself receives the Call. It was actually proposed that an amendment go down under the Barrier Act, a sentence to be added somewhere in Section 213, Book of Forms, "and the Minister who has been appointed Interim-Moderator shall not be eligible for a Call in that vacancy." (Note the wording is not, "and the Interim-Moderator shall not be eligible . . .", which would permit one to resign as Interim-Moderator and take the Call under his successor.) However, this did not come before Assembly, much less become a Barrier Act Remit, the general feeling being, (1) The Presbytery, both in approving his conduct when he presented the Call to himself - or reported it was imminent and asked for another Interim-Moderator — and when he answered the formal question about undue means, had the opportunity and the duty of investigating. (2) Presbyteries which were talking of such an amendment to Section 213 should have had the courage to proceed in the situation and not seek a change in the law of the Church to make it easier in the future for themselves. (3) It could genuinely be, as a result of the Interim-Moderator's association with the vacancy, he should be their choice, and therefore no absolute impediment should be placed in his way. This also, although a situation fraught with heart-searchings, is one for the judgment of the Presbytery and for the individual conscience. But in it there could be "undue means".
- (8) A thorny problem, as related to undue means, is that of the candidate's sermons when he is heard on a leet. There are no doubt congregations to whom the sermons are the sole test, and these contribute to the common impression that "preaching for a call" is only "a preaching and praying competition" among the candidates. To the sensitive and thoughtful minister an appearance before such a congregation is an agony and an indignity. On the other hand, such congregations are in the minority and a minister is indeed naive if he thinks at any time that he is being considered solely for his oratory. Many other considerations enter into the question for the cautious congregation, and although many amusing (or dismaying!) stories are told of how and why men are called, the system that allows the congregation truly to choose its own minister is one which in our tradition we are not likely to abandon in favour of methods used by other denominations. A minister, "honest to a fault", who was invited to candidate in a vacancy that was notoriously weak on its Budget givings, and who deliberately preached sermons on the Budget, really used undue means to lose the Call. He was neither wise as a serpent nor harmless as a dove. The minister who uses sermons that hitherto gave him Calls may, in the eyes of his fellow ministers, be using undue means, but the answer must be held to be in his own conscience as to whether or not such sermons are a reflection of his usual ability. If they are not, nemesis may overtake him in that he will not be able to hold the congregation for a decent length of a pastorate. Perhaps here judgment is exercised without the intervention of a charge of using undue means — which would be most difficult to prove - and such is, generally speaking, the fate of men who have only a handful of effective sermons. There can be no answer here by ruling or legislation: this Committee can only suggest what the problem is in this matter of Call sermons and leave it to the consideration of those who may be affected. Congregations that are well guided by Interim-Moderators will not narrow their judgment to a consideration of the sermons alone.
- (9) Congregations are convinced that they must hear the minister they call, and few will call without hearing. The wording of the Call bears long witness to the fact that it is not essential to hear. The words of the Call run, "... and being satisfied by our experience (or by good information) of the piety, literature..." An examination of Calls, as issued, indicates that there is a large number of Interim-Moderators and presbyteries who fail to see the force of the "or", which is in italies, or the force of the brackets, and run the full line as it is in the Book of Forms. "By our experience" means previous acquaintance in a pastoral or near pastoral relationship, and by "good information" means the representations

made. "By our experience" usually means, however, the hearing that is given the candidate. The Call could read, "by our experience AND by good information." Who is going to give the "good information"? The Interim-Moderator, from discreet inquiry? Is he going to favour one candidate against another, or is he going to make a judicious statement for all the candidates? Some Interim-Moderators simply give the academic history of the candidates and a list of pastorates held. Is the candidate himself, with some assumption of modesty, going to give the "good information"? Perhaps his friends will, prodded or unprodded into action — and somebody gets accused of pulling strings. Attention is called to the Report on Overture 11, 1958, which is found in Acts and Proceedings, 1960, pages 334-335, as to the work of Interim-Moderators on this and other phases of their duties.

If a hearing committee visits the charge where a candidate is now the minister, and the committee reports to the congregation, and the congregation issues a Call on the basis of the committee's report, the report is the "good information". However, very few congregations will proceed without hearing a man in their own pulpit, and are convinced that the right to hear a man for a Call is a charter right of Presbyterians.

(10) Consciences vary greatly in the standards they accept, and, as John Knox reputedly told Mary, Queen of Scots, conscience needs the instructing of the Word of God. Truly, in one set of circumstances, one man may believe he has used no undue means and another, in the same set of circumstances, would keep clear. Just as news is made by one house that burns down and no news is made by the thousands that do not burn, so one abuse of the call system makes much talk and we forget how well the system usually works. The congregation gets the man it wishes, and like the line in the marriage ceremony it's for better or worse, and it is usually well honoured. Let us not forget that standards of honour are high among our clergy, and this Committee wishes to say so plainly. All in all, the phrase "undue means" is a warning to the conscience of every candidate.

#### II. CONCERNING MATTERS "NOT PROPERLY SPIRITUAL"

In this field of study, which relates to Overture No. 31, 1955, the Committee reports progress in working out the practical implications of the statement submitted last year on the Nature of Authority and Government in the Church, and that it is not yet prepared to formulate a recommendation.

#### III. THE SACRAMENTS

- (a) Pursuing its work under its basic terms of reference in the field of the sacraments and related matters, the Committee submits for study a statement on the doctrine of Baptism.
- (b) Concerning Overture No. 11, 1961, which asks for clarification of the relationship between Adult Baptism and Confirmation, the Committee reports that it is presently engaged in the study of the doctrine of Confirmation, and believes that the answer to this overture must necessarily be contingent on further clarification of the question of Confirmation.

#### BAPTISM

Baptism is a sacrament of the New Covenant, wherein Jesus Christ has ordained the washing with water as a sign and seal of a person's calling in the free grace of God to be a partaker with Christ in all things, both in the benefits of His atoning work as our Redeemer and in the burden of His ongoing ministry for the world's redemption. Baptism is the outward and visible sign of the Covenant, wherein the Son of God has identified Himself irrevocably with our humanity in our sin and need. It is also the outward and visible sign that the

person baptized is buried with Christ and dead unto sin, that he is born again of water and the Spirit, that he is risen with Christ unto eternal life, that he is ingrafted into Christ and adopted into the household of God and incorporated into the membership of the Church, and that he is engaged to confess Christ and to walk in newness of life in obedient submission to Him.

Baptism is to be administered but once to any person, by a minister of the gospel lawfully called thereto, and ordinarily in the presence of the congregation, to whom responsibility belongs to receive and to nurture the baptized person within the fellowship of the Church. A person is to be baptized in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. The element to be used in this sacrament is water. Dipping of the person into the water is not necessary; and the sacrament is rightly administered by pouring or sprinkling water upon the person.

The wilful or careless neglect of Baptism can in no way be condoned; yet grace and salvation are not so exclusively tied to this sacrament that no person can be regenerated without it; nor is every baptized person undoubtedly regenerated. Neither is the efficacy of Baptism confined to the moment of time wherein it is administered. Nevertheless, the grace promised in the administration of Baptism is not only offered, but actually made manifest and conferred by the Holy Spirit, and made effectual in the time of His choosing.

Baptism is to be administered to adult persons who, by the profession of their faith in Jesus Christ, bear witness to their calling to participate in the Covenant, and also to infant children within the Covenant, that is to say, to infants, one or both of whose parents are members of the Church.

The administration of infant Baptism is not necessarily restricted to those circumstances in which the parents of the infants are Church members, and competent to provide Christian nurture for their children. Infants, whose parents are not competent to provide for their Christian nurture, may properly be baptized, if they are subject to the Christian discipline of other competent persons, who are Church members, and who are actually fulfilling the function of parents in the Christian nurture of the children.

Baptized infants, no less than adults, are engaged to profess their faith in Jesus Christ in witness to their calling to be partakers of the Covenant. Persons who have been baptized in infancy, and who, having reached the age of responsibility, wilfully or carelessly neglect this obligation, do thereby repudiate their membership in the Church; nevertheless, they are not under any circumstances absolved of the claim of God laid upon them in their Baptism.

In the administration of infant Baptism it is requisite that the parents, or such other persons as are actually fulfilling the function of parents, acknowledge responsibility for the Christian nurture of the children. If Christian friends (commonly called godparents) also undertake to participate in this responsibility, it does not in any way lessen the particular responsibility that pertains to the parents themselves, nor the corporate responsibility that belongs to the congregation for the Christian nurture of the children within its fellowship.

#### IV. ESCHATOLOGY

To augment the studies already submitted, and with particular reference to the prayer of Overture No. 19, 1954, the Committee submits for study the following statement:

## AGAINST DISPENSATIONALIST ERRORS

We believe and confess the one God, whose saving acts are revealed in the Holy Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments and who in Promise and Law and Gospel is effecting His purpose to establish His kingdom; that in His sovereign grace He made a covenant with Israel that they should be His people for the sake of the nations, until in fulfilment of His one covenant He sent forth

His Son, who by His life, death and resurrection has accomplished the promise and hope of the Old Testament that God would visit and redeem His people.

We further believe and confess that under the covenant thus disclosed to Abraham and fulfilled in Jesus Christ the grace of God is realized by the work of the Holy Spirit in the hearts of all who believe, without respect to any distinctions of class or race; that all are one in Christ, in His Body, which is the Church; and that in the consummation of all things, it will be manifest that the kingdoms of this world are become the Kingdom of God and of His Christ. Believing and confessing these things, we therefore disavow and repudiate all such dispensationalist doctrines as would undermine or contradict the unity of the Bible, the sole salvation of man through Christ, and the oneness of all God's people and of their final destiny in His purpose.

#### V. DOCTRINE OF WOMAN AND DOCTRINE OF ORDINATION

Overture No. 6, 1961, was referred to Presbyteries and to the Committee on Articles of Faith, with instructions to report to the 1963 General Assembly. The questions arising out of this overture have been referred to a special subcommittee, which has been working jointly with the Committee on the Place of Women in the Church. This procedure was considered by both Committees to be advisable, in view of the fact that their fields of labour partially coincide, and especially in view of the fact that the Committee on the Place of Women in the Church has already devoted much intensive study to the doctrine of woman.

The Committee observes that some Presbyteries, in reporting their findings, are only reiterating the decision which they made on the specific and limited question of the ordination of women. We believe that this does not meet the intention of the overture, which asks on the one hand for study of the biblical doctrine of woman, and on the other hand for study of the biblical doctrine of ordination, and that it will be advantageous if Presbyteries are careful not to misinterpret the prayer of the overture.

#### VI. REFERENCES FROM THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY

- (a) The Reformed Concept of a Call (Overture No. 24, 1960) is a subject of continuing study in which the Committee has not yet proceeded to the formulation of a statement.
- (b) Overture No. 28, 1961, which has to do with the doctrine of ordination, has been referred to the same sub-committee which is studying both the doctrine of woman and the doctrine of ordination according to the prayer of Overture No. 6, 1961; and no findings are as yet available for report.
- (c) Progress has been made in the study of the doctrine of the Lord's Day (Recommendation No. 8 of the Board of E. & S.A., 1961), but the Committee is not yet prepared to submit a statement.
- (d) A statement has been prepared on the question of the Use of the Appendix to the Roll (A. & P. 1961, p. 65) which requires further study and revision before its submission to the General Assembly.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. That the terms of subscription to the subordinate standards of the Church, as set forth in this report under the heading "Ordination Questions with Preamble", be remitted to Presbyteries under the Barrier Act, with a view to the amendment of Section 409 of the Book of Forms.
- That Overture No. 21, 1961, be answered in terms of the disposition of the preceding Recommendation.
- That our Church recognize the Second Helvetic Confession, the Belgic Confession, the Gallican Confession (Confession of La Rochelle), and the Heidel-

burg Catechism, as standards parallel to ours, and direct that, as we recognize these as parallel, ministers and ruling elders of these standards coming to us recognize our standards as parallel to theirs, and for the sake of uniformity of law within our Church that these ministers and ruling elders in ordinations and inductions subscribe to our subordinate standards as we do, it being permitted to these men, where so desiring, to teach from these Confessions (Second Helvetic, Belgic and Gallican) and the Heidelburg Catechism.

- That the statement on "Baptism", and the statement "Against Dispensationalist Errors", be sent to Presbyteries for study and report to the Committee by January 31, 1963.
- That the resignations from the Committee of Mr. M. DiGangi and Mr. D. Glenn Campbell be accepted, and that additional members be named to replace them.
- That the Committee on Articles of Faith be continued. All of which is respectfully submitted.

## REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH ARCHITECTURE

To the Venerable the 88th General Assembly:

Your Committee on Church Architecture this year has undertaken the task of studying the theological and architectural functions of the church building and the preparation of a building schedule. The results of this study we trust will eventually be made available to building committees throughout our church.

The Committee has studied and made its recommendations regarding eight plans for Churches and Christian Education Buildings. In addition many requests come to your convener regarding church furnishings and requests for source materials, and this requires a good deal of correspondence on the part of your convener.

Your Committee is constantly aware of the difficulties involved when the services of a qualified architect are not employed. It is important not only for the satisfaction of the local congregation, but also the fact that every Presbyterian Church erected represents the Presbyterian Church in Canada, and therefore the best possible skills should be employed, not only for design but also for function.

Members of the Committee attended the Ontario Conference on Church Architecture in November of last year which was held in Toronto.

The Committee regrets the resignation of Mr. Robert T. Macbeth, F.R.A.I.C., from the Committee because of ill health, and Mr. D. Bruce Douglas, M.R.A.I.C. because of the pressure of other tasks.

## RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. That all Congregations and Presbyteries be reminded of the rulings of the 1953 and 1957 Assemblies, namely: "in the future, Congregations applying for financial assistance from the funds of the Presbyterian Church in Canada must have their designs submitted to this Committee, and before a grant or loan is made, the report of this Committee must be received by the General Board of Missions and the Presbytery concerned informed".
- 2. That all congregations contemplating building a church or educational building, regardless of their method of financing, be required to submit the preliminary drawings of their proposed project to this Committee before the working drawings are undertaken; and that the Presbytery concerned receive the report of this Committee before it grants final approval to the congregation.
- 3. That all congregations undertaking the building of a sanctuary or education building be required to employ a qualified architect.
- 4. That the General Assembly request the Clerks of Assembly to give to this Committee a ruling regarding the actual financial responsibility of a Presbytery in the event that a congregation defaults in its repayment of capital loans, whether from a Synod Corporation or from any other loaning institution.
- 5. That all congregations who have recently erected new Churches, new Church Schools or Christian Education Buildings, or Manses, be requested to send copies of final sketch plans and professional pictures, both exterior and interior, together with costs, seating capacity, date of completion, etc. to the Committee on Church Architecture, so that these may be used for our records and possible publication and architectural displays.
- 6. That the sum of Two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for expenses, and Two hundred dollars (\$200.00) for publishing an illustrated Guide to Church Building, be allocated to this Committee for 1962.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE PLACE OF WOMEN IN THE CHURCH

To the Venerable the 88th General Assembly:

In the light of the action of the 1961 General Assembly requesting the Committee on the Articles of Faith to undertake a study of the doctrine of woman it was considered advisable to work with the sub-committee constituted for this purpose to avoid duplication and to have the benefit of joint consultation. This has been done with good effect and it is planned to continue the procedure.

Our work this year has continued along the lines set forth in the report to the last Assembly. All members of the joint consultation have recognized that the question committed to us requires biblical study in depth in arriving at a clear understanding of the place of woman in the purpose of God and in the life and work of the Church as the instrument and servant of that purpose. Before such matters can be dealt with, the biblical understanding of man (male and female constituting the full nature of human being) has to be made clear in relation to both creation and redemption. Such a study naturally raises the question of the nature and scope of biblical authority and in particular of the degree, if any, to which the biblical writers were influenced by contemporary attitudes and problems in giving guidance to the Church regarding the status and role of women in its life and work. For example, was Paul as clear in his own mind and teaching regarding the implications of the gospel for the place of women in the Church as for the place of Gentiles in the Church? Or did his rabbinic upbringing and the varied pressures of the contemporary situation combine to colour and influence his attitude in regard to women? These are the kind of questions on which your Committee is seeking light through study of the biblical material together with scholarly works which describe the religious and secular background of the Church's life in apostolic times. We report progress this year and hope to make a final report to the next General Assembly.

We feel that if this work is to prove fruitful in the future life of our Church the general membership should share as far as possible in the process by which the final conclusion will be reached. Any finding of ours which does not prove convincing to the Church at large would naturally be unproductive and could be divisive. With this in mind, we are preparing material for guidance in biblical study at the Presbytery and congregational level. It can surely be taken for granted that all our people desire the will of God to be done in regard to the place of women in the Church. We must strive for unanimity in the understanding of His will and then have the courage to act in obedience to it.

During the year Mrs. Wm. Geggie, Mrs. A. M. Kirkpatrick, Professor J. C. McLelland and Dr. L. H. Fowler found it necessary to retire from the Committee because of the pressure of other work. We thank them for their valuable contribution and ask the Assembly to appoint replacements for them.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. That the Committee be continued.
- 2. That the Committee to Strike Standing Committees name four new persons to replace those who have retired during the year.

# REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EVANGELISM AND SOCIAL ACTION

To the Venerable the 88th General Assembly:

The Board of Evangelism and Social Action, in presenting its report, would remind the Assembly of the words of one of its most faithful servants, Dr. T. Wardlaw Taylor, in his booklet, The Ruling Elder: "The whole task of the Church is to proclaim the gospel of Christ and to secure its fruits in the lives of men. Every question which can engage the attention of the Church, every agency for work, every form of busyness among its members, is legitimate in the Church only as it may serve toward the end."

To proclaim the gospel of Christ is to declare His lordship over the Church and the world, to bring every man the good news that judgment is abroad in the land and that grace abounds for his every need. It is to bring under Christ's judgment how His people serve His will, fulfil their calling as members of the household faith, give obedience to His word and manifest His grace among men. It is to bring under Christ's judgment all orders of men in society, in education, in government and in the affairs of nations and to hold forth both the promise and the warning of God concerning the treatment of His creatures and the une of His creation. For the Church to proclaim the gospel of Christ is so to involve herself in the world that she becomes the leaven which, quickened by the power of the Holy Spirit, manifests God's glory and promotes His kingdom.

To remind the Church of these truths and to discover and promote ways in which these tasks may be accomplished in our day is this Board's particular function and in the report which follows it gives a faithful account of its stewardship.

#### PRESBYTERIAN MEN

The highlight of the Presbyterian Men's work during the past year has been the increased participation of ministers. It will be recalled that a recommendation was made last year to General Assembly and approved that "presbytery courts work out a plan in conjunction with the Presbytery Men's Training Council whereby all ministers will be able to share in the training of discussion leaders."

We are happy to report that a good number of presbyteries have responded to this recommendation. Our National Director has been invited to discuss this with ministers in 32 Presbyteries and several more invitations are pending. These discussions have resulted in clarification of the ministers role in the council work and the relation of the program to the total work of the local congregation. A pamphlet entitled "The PM Council's Job" has been prepared as a confirmation of the plan which has emerged. Some details of the plan will be mentioned later in the report.

#### National Conferences

For the second year, the National Committee sponsored conferences in Eastern and Western Canada in addition to Central Canada where conferences have been held for four years. A new location was chosen for the Eastern Conference namely, the Nova Scotia Agricultural College at Truro. The facilities and comfortable accommodation of the institution were particularly well suited to our needs. The men of the Maritimes expressed the desire to make this their future conference location. The Keswick Conference centre in Muskoka and the Banff School of Fine Arts continue to be the choice for Central and Western Conferences.

This year we were able to have the same team members at all three conferences which proved to be a distinct advantage in welding the team into a working unit. The response of the men to the messages of our speakers was outstanding. Dr. W. Stanford Reid delivered three challenging addresses with a wealth of practical applications on the theme—"Our Reasonable Service." The Rev. Robert P. Carter presented two thought-provoking Bible expositions on Matthew 25:14 to 30 and 31 to 46 in a most capable manner. Our sincere thanks are extended to our speakers and to the Rev. Stuart B. Coles and Roy A. Hamilton who prepared our Leader's Bible Study Guide on the twelfth chapter of Romans. We are thankful to know through correspondence and verbal reports that God used the 1961 conferences to bring a number of men to a definite commitment to Christ.

Speakers at all three conferences were provided by the Board of Stewardship and Budget to present the work of the Assemblies Boards and Committees and the financial position of the church. Our thanks go to Rev. John Cameron, Mr. Robert Eakins and Mr. Hugh Lloyd for their excellent presentations.

The money offerings made at the 1961 conferences were designated for the development of a PM radio program to be made available to local stations all

across Canada. Two pilot programs are in production. We expect to have more to report on this outreach project, during the coming year.

National Conferences are planned for 1962 as follows: Manitoba, June 15 to 17; Eastern, Sept. 7 to 9; Central, Sept. 14 to 16; Western, Sept. 28 to 30.

#### Synod Conferences

To support the synod councils in their work, members of the National Committee participated in Spring Conferences in the Synods of:

British Columbia, Manitoba, Toronto-Kingston, Montreal-Ottawa, and the Maritimes.

The purpose of these conferences is to provide inspiration and instruction for P.M. leaders in performing their work at the presbytery and congregation levels.

## Budget Support

A letter was sent to all Registered Leaders and to the other men who were present at the 1961 Conferences, urging them to give leadership in promoting "Dollar for Dollar" giving in both sides of their offering envelopes, for the local and wider work of the church.

## Revised Approach to Presbytery Council Training

It has become increasingly evident that the presbytery council training program must be adapted to the working and living conditions of the men. Last year we reported that presbyteries were being encouraged to divide into working groups of five or six congregations to overcome the problem of distance to the meeting place. We have now broken this down still further to individual groups of six student leaders plus a teaching elder and group leader for a total of eight persons who will determine where and when they can meet best to cover the training. In this way a group may be made up of representatives from only two or three congregations or in extreme cases even one congregation. This plan has met with enthusiastic approval. It meets the need of many men who could not fit into the plan of a central meeting time and place as laid down for the whole presbytery. Details are described in the pamphlet "The PM Council's Job."

#### Revised Training Manual No. 1

In line with the new approach to the training of student leaders, Training Manual No. 1 has been revised. This breaks the training down into ten two-hour sessions which includes both effective speaking instruction and Bible Study and discussion. It also provided suggested questions to be used by the group leader in conducting the "Individual Expression Period" and suggestions for the teaching elder in conducting the "Group Discovery Period."

#### Training Manual No. 3

The third manual in the training program for PM Leaders was completed during the year and introduced at the National Conferences. This manual is entitled "Officers in the Kings Army" and deals with the Presbyterian Form of Church Government. This along with Manual Nos. 1 and 2 completes the current course of training. Each manual is designed to be covered in ten two hour meetings.

### Availability of Manuals to Ministers

There has been some misunderstanding as to how our ministers may become registered manual holders. The only requirement is that they indicate in writing to the National Committee Office their desire to engage in the training of student leaders in a presbytery councils group. The one dollar charge to help cover production costs is not required from ministers on the minimum stipend.

## Victory Magazine

To meet the need for a study guide when the PM leaders are ready to apply their training at the congregational level, the Committee has worked with the Board of Christian Education to broaden the application of Victory Magazine. Through the co-operation of their Editorial Committee some revisions have been made in the format and two or three pages have been assigned to Presbyterian Men for program notes. These pages will include Life Situations related to the Bible Studies. Their purpose is to help PM Leaders to engage men in discussion of a topic which will lead into the Bible Study later as outlined in the other section of the magazine. It is felt that this will help meet the need to reach men who are not yet ready to participate in a Bible Study group.

## Laymen's Sunday

There is an increasing response to the observance of Laymen's Sunday. While the third Sunday in October is the day designated, many congregations observe another day and even hold more than one during the year. The guide provided through the National Committee Office was well received last year.

The C.B.C. "Church of the Air" broadcast was assigned to Presbyterian Men on Laymen's Sunday, October 15, 1961. Five members of the National Committee participated in the half hour broadcast. A tape recording of this is available from our Audio-Visual Department.

## Congregational Application

While no official figures are available as to the number of men's study groups in congregations, we know that the program is now working itself out on the congregational level *where it counts*. Over 800 men are now registered in the training program and each of these is a potential leader of a congregational study and discussion group of six to eight people. We know of many such groups that have been formed and these are a vigorous part of the congregational life. One such group has undertaken a project of providing medical care for the children of a Korean pastor in Japan.

## Overseas Groups

As a result of the visit of Dr. James Dickson and Dr. T. C. Tang of Formosa to our 1960 Central Conference and with the co-operation of Presbyterian Men connected with the U.S. Army Men of the Chapel program in Formosa, a PM group has been formed there. The first conference was held in August 1961 attended by over 100 laymen and clergymen representing twelve congregations.

Further to the enquiry reported last year from Jamaica, Dr. Stanford Reid arranged to visit the men there last January and the foundation was laid for the start of PM work. They are in possession of our training material.

The work in British Guiana continued to go forward under the leadership of the Rev. David Murphy and Joseph Muchan. There are now 11 Registered Discussion Leaders.

A request for information regarding the PM Program has been received from the Rev. Earle F. Roberts in East Nigeria and a set of training material has been forwarded to him for study. We pray that this will result in the PM work being undertaken there.

#### ELDERSHIP TRAINING

The great opportunities, challenges and difficulties confronting the Church today in this world of tension, cold war and rapid social change call for informed and energetic leadership in every congregation. Presbyterian congregations rightly look to their sessions for this leadership, for together the teaching elder or elders and the ruling elders share the responsibility for directing and leading "the mission of the congregation in the parish and the world."

It is the recognition of the high calling of the eldership, and the great responsibilities of the ruling elders as well as the teaching elders that account for the new interest in eldership training at both the session and presbytery levels.

Wherever sessions and presbyteries have taken eldership training seriously there have been most gratifying results both in terms of better informed elders and more effective leadership.

The course of training adopted by the 87th General Assembly is as follows:

Year I - The Nature of the Church

(Study materials of the Church Officer Training Programme of the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A.).

Year II - The Order of the Church.

(A Manual for Ruling Elders by Rev. Dr. L. H. Fowler).

Year III - The Nurture of the Church

(Study materials of the Church Officer Training Programme of the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. Year III).

The materials for the Church Officer Training Programme are available from the office of the Board of Evangelism and Social Action, 229 College Street, Toronto 2B, Ontario.

A Manual for Ruling Elders by Rev. Dr. L. H. Fowler is available from Presbyterian Publications.

It is emphasized that eldership training should not be in the nature of a lecture by the minister, but a series of discussions led by the minister.

While periodic Presbytery Schools for training are valuable, and while Presbytery training workshops for ministers are recommended, it is stressed that there cannot be adequate training for elders except in the local session under the leadership of the minister. "One or two meetings will not do. The training must be a continuing process in the life of the Churches."

#### EVANGELISM

Evangelism is concerned with the communication of the Gospel. This makes it the primary and most urgent task of the Church today and every day. Seen in the context of the Church's total life and work, it describes the Church on the march for Christ and His Church; it depicts the redeemed community going forth in obedience to its Divine commission to announce to all people everywhere the Good News of God in Christ.

Whereas Christian Social Action seeks to relate the Gospel to life, and to bring its truth to bear upon the world and its affairs, evangelism is the relating of the Gospel to the individual. It is the proclamation of the Gospel in the power of the Holy Spirit; it is God through His Church announcing to people that He loves them, that He has chosen and redeemed them in Christ; it is God singling them out, calling them by name, inviting them to respond in faith and obedience to Jesus Christ the Saviour and Lord of all, that each might come to know Him personally in Christ, and serve Him in His Church and in the world for His glory and the advancement of His Kingdom. It is outreach for Christ and His Church.

But how are people reached for Christ and the Church? The early Church used three methods: preaching evangelism — Acts chapter 2; lay visitation evangelism — St. Luke chapter 10; occupational evangelism — Acts 18:3. Though these methods have seen many variations since the days of the New Testament, by and large, they are the methods that the Church has used, and they are the methods your Board of Evangelism and Social Action is recommending for use by the congregations of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

While it is encouraging to see an increasing number of congregations taking evangelism seriously, and experimenting with at least one of these methods, if the Church is to penetrate the life of the world and reach people for Christ, it is essential that every congregation endeavour to make use of all three methods.

By using three methods of evangelism, the Church acknowledges that evangelism is the shared responsibilty of the ministers, ruling elders and all the people of God. To concentrate on preaching evangelism alone is to create the impression that evangelism is the task of the ministers only, and tends to ignore the ministry of the laity: to stress lay visitation evangelism (friendship evangelism visiting and visiting for commitment) to the exclusion of preaching evangelism is to overlook a method that the Spirit of God has conspicuously blessed, and deprive the Church of a Divinely-appointed means of renewal: to disregard occupational and industrial evangelism is to close our eyes to a great and challenging field for evangelism, namely, the world of industry and labour.

Your Board would emphasize the necessity for adequate training if lay visitation evangelism is to be undertaken by congregations. Lay people who have not been instructed in the Faith, and are not able to communicate it articulately, will be no match for the cynic, the agnostic, the indifferent and the materialist, etc.

It is for these reasons that the Board of Evangelism and Social Action has prepared training manuals with information on how to engage in every kind of evangelism, especially lay visitation evangelism.

During the past year workshops on evangelism have been held in every Synod of the Church. In some Synods this has meant a workshop in practically every presbytery. The aim of these workshops is to discuss the training methods of the programme of evangelism with the ministers and the general chairmen on evangelism of the congregations so that they in turn will be able to train visitors in their own congregations.

Since one of the aims of the programme of evangelism is to educate the people of the Church to think of evangelism as an integral, ongoing part of the life and work of the Church, it is urged that an evangelism council be established in every congregation.

#### CHRISTIAN SOCIAL ACTION

The Declaration of Faith Concerning Church and Nation states that "Jesus Christ, in the administration of His Father's will, employs all the heavenly and earthly powers He may choose to serve Him. He employs the Church and the Civil State entrusting to each its own distinctive function. He has ordained the Church to serve Him in the proclamation of His Word, in the administration of His sacraments, and in the life of faith which works by love. He has also in His grace ordained the State to Serve Him in the administration of His justice and benevolence, by discerning, formulating, and enforcing, such laws and policies as will promote the well-being of all its citizens and curb license, discord and destitution."

It states further, however, that though the distinctive function of the Church and the State is to be recognized, this is not to suggest that the Church should dissociate itself from "the affairs of the Nation." To proclaim the Gospel of Jesus Christ who is the Lord of the State as well as the Church, and to realize that the Gospel which He has committed to His Church is concerned with the whole man and the whole of life lays upon the Church the obligation of Christian Social Action. The Gospel is not God's Good News for people living in a vacuum; it is Good News for people called upon to wrestle with complex inter-personal relations and a multitude of other problems. When the Church takes an intere to in what is going on in the community and the world, it is simply another way of saying that the Gospel which we proclaim has meaning for life, and has relevance for every area and relationship of life.

This does not mean that all Presbyterians will necessarily see eye to eye on every social question, or on the measures that will be taken by the Church and State for the alleviation of distress and need. The important thing is not complete agreement on every issue, but a willingness to grapple with life's problems and moral courage consistent with God's Word and Will for the world today.

While there may be many other urgent social questions that deserve the attention of this General Assembly, your Board would recommend the consideration of the following in this report, and others will be dealt with in replies to overtures referred to us by the 87th General Assembly:

#### The Church and Older Persons

This quotation from the booklet entitled "Aging" by the National Council of Churches will help to underline the importance of this field for the Christian Church. "Our country has gained a new generation in the last half century through the dramatic increase in the average length of life. This presents the Church with the urgent need to decisive thought and action. No longer can the Church fulfil its social mission to the aged by the provision of shelter alone. Its task now is to lead society to a greater acceptance of the aging and recognition of their value, and to develop a programme which will further their spiritual growth and enable them to share fully in the life of the Church.

"This new generation can contribute much to the strength of the Church through its experience, judgment and devotion. At the same time, it presents special needs. Parishes of the Church are faced daily with the urgent problems of aging people: housing, medical care, insufficient income, loneliness, loss of status, and many others. Community services have arisen which partially solve these problems. The Church has a responsibility and unique resources with which to assist people in this period of life to live creatively and to use existing services; and at the same time to help create new services to meet rapidly shifting needs."

One of the first steps towards effective action in this field on the part of presbyteries and congregations is that of educating the people of the congregations with regard to the importance of this area of the Church's life and work, and of helping them to understand how to deal with this question at the congregational level.

In order to provide ministers, sessions, and congregational organizations with study materials, your Board has asked and received permission to mimeograph two papers by Mr. Louis Kaplan, Executive Secretary, Citizens' Advisory Committee on Aging, State of California, entitled "Philosophy on Aging", and "The Contribution of the Older Person to Society." Additional copies of these papers are available free of charge from the office of the Board of Evangelism and Social Action.

Your Board is also recommending "Friendly Visiting to Older Persons", and is preparing a special booklet on this subject for the training and use of visitors.

## The Church and Penal Reform

A genuine concern for those "in prison", and what happens to these people when they get out of prison, is an obligation which our Lord Himself has laid upon His Church (St. Matthew 25:31-46). The following paragraphs from an address by the Hon. Davie Fulton, Minister of Justice, entitled "The Limits of our Imagination Alone Restrict the Effective Contribution That the Private Citizen Can Make," should help to point up some of the major problems with regard to the rehabilitation of former prisoners and indicate how the Church can carry on its ministry of reconciliation in this long-neglected field of service. "One condtion is vital to the successful rehabilitation in society of an offender who has served a prison sentence. That condition is acceptance of the offender by the community to which he returns. I do not by this mean to imply that we are under some kind of duty to throw open our homes and broaden our normal circle of friends and families to include former inmates solely because those persons are former inmates. Such a proposal would, I fear, soon fail in its purpose if it were put into effect. On the contrary, when I say that the community should accept the former inmate I mean that members of the community should strive to avoid being prejudiced against the offender solely on the ground that he has been a prison inmate.

A very great many Canadians do have just such a prejudice based on that very narrow ground. The prejudice finds its broadest application — and for the former inmate its most frustrating application — in the field of providing employment for the ex-inmate. So very many of our business firms, large and small, in Canada have adopted almost as a matter of policy, the practice of refusing to employ any person who has served a prison sentence — and all this without any reference to the experience, ability or personality of the offender who may, especially as a result of his prison experience and training, be well qualified to perform the work that the job involves. Our hopes of re-establishing him in the community as a law-abiding citizen can have very little chance of fulfilment if, from the very beginning, we refuse him any chance of earning his daily bread and providing shelter for himself and his dependents.

Here is an area in which the prisoners' aid society, not only through its professional workers but also through its lay members, can fulfil an important function in correction work. That function is to break down, by argument and by example, the prejudice that exists against the employment of former inmates. I am suggesting that the prisoners' aid societies should, as far as possible, act as sponsors for inmates in whom they have confidence. It is clear, however, that we do not gain confidence in our fellow man merely by reading reports about him or hearing about him at second hand. Confidence in our fellow man is developed only by knowing him at first hand."

## Unemployment

Unemployment is one of the major threats to the well-being of the nation, the community, the church, the family and the individual. While recognizing that the solution to this complex problem is not an easy one, and requires the co-operation of every person, every organization, every level of government — municipal, provincial and federal, and industry and labour, and though this question was discussed by the 87th General Assembly, your Board feels constrained to bring it to the attention of this General Assembly also, and to recommend that appropriate action be taken by this the highest Court of our Church.

#### The Church and Labour

The following quotation from Bishop E. R. Wickham's book "Church and People in an Industrial Society" serves as a solemn reminder to the Church that all is not well as far as the Church and Labour are concerned, and that steps should be taken to resolve the cleavage that exists between the Church and the "world of work." "The extent of the working-class estrangement is still insufficiently realized inside the Churches, partly because the Churches do not ask embarrassing sociological questions, and also perhaps because they have grown accustomed to the situation, to smaller numbers of all social groups, and can always produce a handful of artisan swallows to suggest that the summer is with us. It is to deny the hard facts of history; and a sociological comparison of the congregation with the parish, or the Churches with the industrial area in which they are set, would show the critical nature of the situation. It would show almost total exclusion of adult men such as miners, steelworkers, engineers, general factory workers, dockworkers, transport workers and so on. Nor is there a sufficiently skilful and sympathetic understanding by the Churches of the working-class pattern of life, in which faith has to be born and the Christian community to grow."

In the parable of the sower (St. Matthew 13), our Lord reminds us that it was in the good ground—the well-cultivated ground—that the seed "brought forth fruit, some an hundredfold, some sixtyfold, some thirtyfold." What does this mean as far as the Church's witness in the world is concerned? It means that the way the Church treats people, its willingness to see their side of things and to identify itself with them in their struggle to get justice and a decent standard of living for all—under God, can make people more receptive to the claims of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. In other words, Christian Social Action can in a very real sense prepare the way for evangelism.

In applying this to the Church and its attitude to organized labour and labour unions, this does not mean that the Church should take sides, but that it should be willing to look at all the facts, and should not hesitate to recognize the invaluable contribution of organized labour to the industrial life of our own great nation and the world.

#### OTHER AREAS OF CONCERN

In addition to the training programmes already described, and the social questions already considered, your Board of Evangelism and Social Action has committees which are studying the following subjects: the Church and the family, the town and country Church, the ministry of healing, Christian burial, the Christian Approach to the Jew, the rehabilitation of former Roman Catholic priests, narcotic addiction, alcoholism, etc.

Though it is not possible to deal with all of these subjects at every General Assembly, it does not mean that no other action is possible in connection with them. This Board sees one of its functions to be that of making information available to Presbyteries' Committees on Evangelism and Social Action so that they in turn will be able to pass on this information to their Presbyteries. This is very important because the true index of a Church's involvement in evangelism and social action is not necessarily the number of recommendations passed by the General Assembly, but the extent to which Presbyteries and congregations act upon these recommendations, and incorporate them into the life and work of the Church.

Another way to help stimulate interest in these areas of concern is that of regional and national conferences on evangelism and social action. Due to limited budget funds it has been necessary to hold these conferences in connection with the Annual Board Meeting or in central Canada, but as more money becomes available it will be possible to hold periodic conferences in the West and the East as well as central Canada.

#### INTER-BOARD AND INTER-CHURCH RELATIONS

Since the mission of the Church is one, inter-board relations are an essential part of the activities of every board. One of the most encouraging features of the life of our Church is the fine spirit of co-operation that exists among the boards and committees of the Church.

Another important area of this Board's work has to do with its representation on the related Departments of the Canadian Council of Churches, namely, the Department of Evangelism and the Department of Social Relations. It also represents the Presbyterian Church in Canada on the following: The Religion-Labour Council of Canada, the Canadian Temperance Federation, the Lord's Day Alliance of Canada, the Society on Aging, and the Inter-Church Committee on Protestant-Roman Catholic Relations.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. That October 21st, 1962 be designated as Layman's Sunday in harmony with the major Protestant Communions in Canada and the United States.
- 2. That, in view of the increasing results across Canada from the men who with their ministers have been engaged in the P.M. programme, teaching elders who are not yet actively engaged in the work be urged to give serious consideration to participating in the training of men in their Presbytery Council groups.
- 3. That Presbyteries be requested to help and encourage ministers to implement the training of elders at the congregational level by means of workshops for ministers and rallies for ruling elders, using the course and materials provided by the Board of Evangelism and Social Action.

- 4. That the General Assembly urge the Government of Canada to consider amending the National Housing Act to include a section specifically designed to meet the particular needs of the various categories of elderly persons. Included in such a special section of the National Housing Act would be specific provision for:
  - (1) Facilitating the purchase of housing for elderly persons.
  - (2) Facilitating the financing of rental housing projects for elderly persons at rents geared to their income.
  - (3) Making public low-rental housing more readily available to elderly persons.
  - (4) Financing the hostel-type accommodations for single, aged persons which would provide certain shared central facilities. (These points are extracted from a Brief on this subject prepared by the Age and Opportunity Bureau of Winnipeg.)
- 5. That Presbyteries and Kirk-Sessions be urged to encourage the acceptance in the church and society of ex-prisoners, through the support of prisoners' aid societies, the establishment of non-discriminatory personnel practices among employers, and through a policy among church members of reaching out with realism and warmth to those offenders who are ready and able to seek and to use the fellowship of the congregation, offering them both compassion and practical help in the solution of their problem.
- 6. That the General Assembly, while appreciative of all that has been done by business, industry, the provincial legislatures, and the Federal Government to alleviate the unemployment situation, nevertheless records its intense dissatisfaction with the present employment situation in our Dominion, and
  - Calls upon its unemployed people to resist the temptation to rely upon unemployment insurance, and in all honesty to seek employment;
  - Calls upon all employers in business and industry to renew their efforts to engage the maximum number of employees;
  - (3) Calls upon legislative assemblies to act with vigor and imagination to create new jobs within the provinces; and
  - (4) Calls upon the Government of Canada to treat the problem of unemployment as a national emergency, demanding a similar mobilization of national resources as is made in the prosecution of war against an external aggressor.
- 7. That the General Assembly recognize that labour unions have been instrumental in achieving a higher standard of living, in improving working conditions through safety and health measures, in the relief of the disabled, the sick and the unemployed in a measure reaching far beyond their own membership, and to the benefit of those who have not shared in the activity; that it recognize the right of labour to organize, to engage in collective bargaining and to withhold its services, and call upon it to express toward the total community a responsible stewardship of its powers.

# REPORT OF ST. ANDREW'S HALL, VANCOUVER, B.C.

Audited Statement of Accounts for our fiscal year ended 31 August, 1961 is hereby attached. It discloses that we operated at a profit of \$3,216.91 before taking into account depreciation of Furniture and Furnishings. The latter amounted to \$2,014.06. The net surplus on operations was \$1,202.85. It has been the policy of our Board of Management from the outset to avoid operating at more than a nominal profit. We must compete with other dormitories and dining rooms on the campus but it is not desirable to charge students more than is absolutely necessary. It has been the policy of my Board from the opening of the Hall in 1955 to ask General Assembly to make an appropriation to cover annual depreciation and that policy has been followed by the Assembly from year to year in the past. For our fiscal year 1961-62 we have asked for an appropriation by Assembly of \$2,589.00. It was estimated that \$3,849.00 would be required but \$1,260.00 was received from the Treasurer of the Church in December. Deducting this cheque from the \$3,849.00 leaves the estimated balance required of \$2,589. The Controller urgently asked in November last for our estimated requirement in this connection. This was given to him at the above figure on the 29th November. The policy apparently has now been reversed and the Controller has advised that no appropriation will be recommended to Assembly. When the Controller so advised, we showed his letter to our auditors, an old established firm in Vancouver. The auditors advised that the failure to provide an annual appropriation against depreciation would be in violation of sound business practice and pointed out that the result would be that the depreciation would accumulate over the years and result in the necessity for an appropriation of \$10- or \$15,000.00 when it became necessary to replace a great deal of the dormitory furnishings. Such a necessary appropriation would be a severe drain in a single year on the funds of the Church at large. My Board, therefore, feels that its policy has been sound and should be accepted by Assembly. If the annual appropriation is omitted it will be moved on the floor of Assembly to amend the budget by including an appropriation of \$2,589.00 as asked.

In constructing the dormitory concrete blocks were used for reasons of economy. The blocks proved porous in the teeth of the occasional heavy rain storm from the Northeast. We get these occasionally from Ontario. An expert was called in and under his direction a seal coating was applied to forestall further leaks. This has proved satisfactory and effective.

During the year \$119.00 came in, \$19.00 from a congregation and \$100.00 from a private donor. This was added to our capital surplus against the day when we shall build another dormitory and expand our dining room and lounge. No campaign has been launched as yet but my Board has such a campaign under consideration. It has been delayed until the completion of other campaigns presently under way.

The report of the Dean has been filed and is self-explanatory. The Dean and his staff are giving an excellent account of themselves and it is gratifying to know that the number of students for our ministry at our University is increasing. The Dean is doing rather more than one man should do who has regard for his health. He should have an assistant at the earliest date possible.

We are still proud of St. Andrew's Hall. The Hall together with the thirty new Church and Religious Education buildings, which have been built in this Synod in the last seven or eight years are adding day by day to the prestige of The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON REVISION OF THE BOOK OF COMMON ORDER

To the Venerable the 88th General Assembly:

The Committee on Revision of the Book of Common Order takes much pleasure in reporting to General Assembly the virtual completion of its task.

By action of the Assembly of 1953, this Committee was named, and its terms of reference clearly defined. The Committee was urged to recognize "the need of a Book of Common Order which shall shape and express the spirit and aspirations of a Church serving in Canada." The 1953 Assembly instructed the Committee "to proceed to complete the work as expeditiously as possible."

During the nine years of its existence, the Committee on Revision has worked conscientiously; every suggested change was scrutinized carefully; every new Order was subjected to minute examination; sub-committees were appointed to study and report on various aspects of worship. As Orders were completed, they were printed and circulated to all ministers, in order that the Church might study the findings of the Committee. In order to assist the Church in its study, seven teaching pamphlets were prepared and circulated, viz:

CALVIN'S LA MANYERE
NOTES ON SERVICES
COMMENTARY ON SERVICE OF WORD AND SACRAMENT
THE NATURE AND STRUCTURE OF CHURCH WORSHIP
QUESTIONNAIRE ON WORSHIP
PERSONS AND THINGS IN THE SERVICE OF GOD
FREEDOM OF THE SPIRIT

In 1960, a draft revision was printed and circulated; Presbyteries were asked to study the draft and report their findings to the Revision Committee. The replies from Presbyteries were collated and a report on the replies was presented to the General Assembly of 1961. On the basis of presbytery reports, the Committee recommended certain changes which resulted in re-arranging the

numerical sequence of the ORDERS OF MORNING WORSHIP and the SER-VICE OF WORD AND SACRAMENT; The SECOND ORDER OF MORNING WORSHIP was reprinted from the 1922 Book of Common Order; a second Order for Confirmation was proposed, with additional rubrics to give an alternative to the "laying-on of hands."; "shall" was replaced in the rubrics with "may" wherever feasible.

In this year, 1962, the Committee issued 4 additional Orders:—

REMEMBRANCE DAY SERVICE

THE BAPTISM OF ADULTS, THEIR CONFIRMATION AND ADMISSION, AND THE CONFIRMATION AND ADMISSION OF THOSE BAPTIZED IN INFANCY.

ADDENDUM TO THE ORDER FOR THE ADMINISTRATION OF THE SACRAMENT OF HOLY BAPTISM TO ADULTS.

Arrangements have been made with Thorn Press of Toronto for the printing and sale of the revised Book of Common Order. This will be done at no cost to the Church for printing; sales will be handled by Thorn Press and royalties will be paid to the Church.

It is our prayer that the Assembly will approve the printing of the revised Book of Common Order, and authorize it for voluntary use. Thus each minister will use whatever Orders serve his need, and will be guided by the prayers included in all the Orders. We would stress again that the Book of Common Order is not compulsory, and its use is dependent upon the discretion of each minister. In the final analysis each minister must provide his own content for the Book of Common Order.

The efforts of the Revision Committee have resulted in a Book that for its incorporation of Biblical, historical and theological principles is one of the most up-to-date in any of the Reformed churches in the world. It is a book of which the Presbyterian Church in Canada can be justly proud.

# COMMITTEE ON THE ORDER OF DEACONESSES

To the Venerable the 88th General Assembly:

The committee on the Order of Deaconesses was set up by the General Assembly of 1960 and is composed of Rev. Ross K. Cameron (Convener), Rev. George Hopton, Mr. T. P. Geggie, Mrs. A. R. Riddell, and Miss M. Webster.

One of the duties assigned to the committee was that of serving as liaison between Boards, Societies, committees and congregations employing or desiring to employ deaconesses and the members of the Deaconess Order. In this connection the committee wrote in October 1961 to all ministers, Boards, Societies and committees within the Church and to the members of the Deaconess Order stating that it was prepared to undertake the preparation of a list of vacancies open to deaconesses and to prepare a second list of deaconesses desiring a change of employment. As a result some deaconesses have received employment in congregations.

The committee has given consideration to the matter of personnel policy for deaconesses with particular reference to salary scales. A study was made of salaries being paid to deaconesses within our own Church, in other Churches and in comparable types of work, such as the Y.W.C.A., Social Work, teaching. This study indicates that salaries being paid to deaconesses within our Church are far from adequate, causing hardships to present deaconesses and hindering recruiting of new deaconesses. The committee brings to the General Assembly a recommendation in this regard.

Discussions were initiated by the Committee with the Women's Missionary Societies and the Committee for the Retirement Fund for Church Employees to discover whether it would be possible to establish portable pension arrangements. These discussions are still in process. It is hoped that a solution will be found in the near future.

Further work at present in progress within the committee includes:

- 1. The preparation of a list of the members of the Deaconess Order.
- 2. A pamphlet outlining the work of deaconesses.
- A study of the status of deaconesses in our own and other Churches.
   The Committee recommends to the General Assembly as follows:
- 1. That congregations be advised that more deaconesses are available each year for congregational appointments and that requests from congregations for such workers should be in the hands of the chairman or secretary of this committee by January 31 each year.
- 2. That the General Assembly approve a basic minimum salary for deaconesses of \$3,200 and that all Boards, Societies and congregations employing deaconesses be urged to reach this minimum as quickly as possible.
- 3. That the Committee be continued.

## EWART COLLEGE

To the Venerable the 88th General Assembly:

The Board of Ewart College begs to submit the following report for the year 1961-62.

The academic year which has just concluded has perhaps been the most kaleidoscopic year in the history of Ewart College. The fall term began brilliantly with a new name, a splendid class of new students, and high hopes of occupying our fine new building before the end of 1961. In the weeks that followed, we were to learn the discipline of patience, and the harder lessons of relinquishing cherished hopes. Because of numerous delays caused by strikes in several building trades, it became impossible to permit our students to occupy the new building for any part of the academic session.

Temporary arrangements were constantly being adjusted to meet these setbacks, and the hostesses into whose homes the students were welcomed for a few weeks in the fall, willingly extended their hospitality. We owe a deep debt of gratitude to these friends of the College for their great contribution in providing homes for our displaced students. We appreciate also the co-operation of the staffs of the United Church Training School and of the Anglican Women's Training College for providing accommodation in their residences for eleven of our students.

Through all of these changing situations we have been richly blessed in having the staff direction of Miss Margaret Webster, B.A., B.Ed., Principal, and Miss Ada Adams, B.Sc., Dean of Students. Miss Webster has miraculously guided the academic programme through many difficulties, and at the same time has continued to carry many added responsibilities connected with the building under construction. Miss Adams has greatly strengthened the course of study through her capable direction of the Field Work, and has already gained the respect and admiration of the students. These staff members are of the highest calibre, and the church is fortunate that we may begin our enlarged activities in a new building under such dedicated leadership.

The Principal and staff of Knox College have again shown the utmost co-operation through lecturing to our students. We are grateful to them, and to all sessional lecturers and field work supervisors who have participated in our teaching programme. We are also indebted to the Board of Knox College for their courtesy in placing additional classroom and other facilities of the college at our disposal.

We still have very limited resources in our Scholarship and Bursary Funds. A number of students have a difficult time in financing their three year course, and any assistance in enlarging these funds would be greatly appreciated by the Board.

## THE COMMITTEE ON HOME RELIGION

To the Venerable the 88th General Assembly:

Your Committee have continued to publish EVERY DAY as an aid to family worship and private devotions. This has been made possible through the gratuitous services of over fifty ministers of our Church. To them the Committee would bespeak thanks for this cordial co-operation. For eighteen years Thorn Press and Presbyterian Publications have printed, published and distributed EVERY DAY without financial profit to themselves.

During 1961 the quarterly circulation has been as follows: January-March 13,800; April-June 13,430; July-September 13,280; October-December 13,860; an average of 13,572 per quarter compared with an average of 13,576 per quarter in 1960.

During 1961 the quarterly cover designs were as follows: January-March, Little Boy on hand-sleigh with his left hand uplifted; April-June, Little Boy at prayer; July-September, Light House on Promentory; October-December, Harvest field with village church in background.

The Committee have been indebted to Principal Robert Lennox for writing the article on Home Religion appearing in a Church calendar kindly arranged by Miss Jean Brown of the Board of Stewardship and Budget; to Dr. J. S. Clarke and Dr. W. H. Fuller of the Board of Christian Education; to Rev. D. H. Rayner, Editor of "The Presbyterian Record"; and to Mrs. A. J. Cherry, Editor of "Glad Tidings" for their fine co-operation through their periodicals. Thanks are also due Dr. N. G. Smith for his able article which appeared in the June issue of "The Presbyterian Record".

### RECOMMENDATIONS

The Committee crave leave to renew the four recommendations as passed by the General Assembly of 1961:

- 1. That in view of the concern for the welfare of the Home, the Church, and the Nation in these times and the need for deepening the spiritual life of our people, each Kirk-Session of the Church which has not already done so be urged to appoint one of its members or other interested person to promote the use of EVERY DAY within the congregation.
- That the Congregation of the Church be asked to consider placing copies of EVERY DAY in hospitals, homes and other institutions within the communities they serve for the use of patients and others.
- 3. That Kirk-Session be requested to present a copy of EVERY DAY to each person uniting with the Church on profession of faith or by certificate; and on such other occasions as baptism (to the parents) and marriage (to the young couple about to establish a home) and to make it available by way of a rack or otherwise in the vestibule of the Church for the members and adherents of the congregation.
- 4. That this Assembly invite the Presbyteries of the Church to set aside a period of time at one of their meetings during the year for the purpose of discussing and instituting methods of promoting the use of EVERY DAY as a devotional guide among the congregations within their bounds.

# THE JOSEPH B. ROBERT AND DAME SARAH ROBERT FUND (Benevolent)

To the Venerable the 88th General Assembly:

Mr. Joseph B. Robert was a French Canadian and his wife a Scottish Presbyterian. They lived in Beauharnois where Mrs. Robert and their family were members of St. Edward's Church. The son and the daughter, Mr. W. H. Robert and Miss Sarah Robert, desiring to "perpetuate the memory" of their father and mother established in church and charitable circles several funds to this end.

It is upon one of these funds that we now report.

The son, Mr. William Henry Robert, bequeathed the income from one-half the residue of his estate to The Presbyterian Church in Canada; one-third of this one-half being "for assistance for needy ministers who have retired."

The daughter, Miss Sarah Mary Robert, set up a Donation in terms similar to those of her brother's last will and testament: one-half of the residue to the Church; one-third of this one-half being "for assistance for needy ministers who have retired."

Under the terms of Mr. Robert's last will and testament and Miss Robert's donation, the Montreal Trust Company of Montreal, Quebec, was appointed trustee of both. Each quarter, the Trust Company remits to The Trustee Board of The Presbyterian Church in Canada the share of income falling to the Church. It is with this especial one-third of this share of income "for assistance to needy ministers who have retired" that this particular report deals.

It is to be noted that this especial one-third is "for assistance to needy ministers who have retired". The terms are therefore quite restrictive. No money from this Fund may be granted to ministers' dependents; it is solely "for assistance for needy ministers who have retired".

This Benevolent Fund has brought encouragement and a measure of comfort to a number of our ministers who have been compelled to retire by reason of the infirmities of years or because misfortune has early fallen upon them.

These ministers in particular and The Presbyterian Church in Canada in general express gratitude to God that it was put into the hearts of this son and this daughter to remember His faithful servants who are in needs or will find themselves in need.

Every year a small Committee is appointed to administer this benevolent Fund.

# REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE CHURCH EXTENSION FUND AND THE CHURCH AND MANSE FUND

### THE CHURCH EXTENSION FUND

To the Venerable the 88th General Assembly:

The Church Extension Fund was established to assist congregations and mission fields to acquire suitable lands, premises, buildings and equipment re-

quired for churches or places of worship and for such other purposes as will tend to foster and encourage their activities. Help is extended by way of loans secured by mortgages usually interest free for a few years and thereafter at a low rate of interest. The maximum obtainable from this Fund by any one congregation for any one purpose is \$5,000.00. It is kept as a revolving Fund: as the money is repaid by borrowing congregations, it goes out to help others. No grants may be made from this Fund as the capital is to be maintained intact. All applications must be approved by the Presbytery of the bounds and by the General Board of Missions, though the Board, if it deem advisable, may take independent action.

A statement of revenue and expenditure will be found in the Auditors' Report.

### THE CHURCH AND MANSE FUND

The Regulations governing the Church and Manse Fund are similar to those of the Church Extension except that from this Fund grants may be made. Applications for assistance must be approved by the Presbytery of the bounds and by the General Board of Missions though here too the Board may take independent action.

A statement of revenue and expenditure will be found in the Auditors' Report.

# COMMITTEE ON THE RETIREMENT FUND FOR CHURCH EMPLOYEES

To the Venerable the 88th General Assembly:

By action of the 78th General Assembly (1952) the Retirement Fund for Church Employees was established. The Committee charged with its oversight are: the members of the Executive of the Pension Board; the Chairman and Secretary of the Administrative Council; the Secretary for Home Missions of the General Board of Missions; and the Treasurer of the Church. The Chairman and the Secretary of the Administrative Council are respectively the Chairman and Secretary of the Committee. In consultation with the General Counsel of the Church, Mr. Hamilton Cassels, Sr. Q.C., regulations were drawn up. These regulations have been twice amended by Assemblies since 1952.

The Fund has been approved by the Department of National Revenue—Taxation Division as an employees' or pension fund or plan for the purposes of the Income Tax Act effective as of January 15, 1953. Because of this, contributors to the Fund may deduct the sum of their annual contributions to the Fund from their salaries before estimating their income tax for the year.

Contributors to the Fund as of December 31, 1961 were as follows: 27 members of the Church Offices Staff; 8 catechists; 9 others serving with the General Board of Missions; 5 serving with the Woman's Missionary Society (E.D.); 4 on the Staff of Knox College; 2 on the Staff of Ewart College; and one congregational deaconess; 56 in all; compared with 59 in 1960; 55 in 1959; 50 in 1958; 55 in 1957; 53 in 1956; and 40 in 1955.

The Committee cannot refrain from expressing regret that more congregations are not taking advantage of the provisions of the Fund to enrol their deaconesses as contributors. Only one congregational deaconess in all the Church is on the Fund. Two others reported a year ago, having transferred to the service of the W.M.S. (W.D.), have become contributors to the Fund of that Society.

# KNOX COLLEGE REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

To the Venerable the 88th General Assembly:

The Board of Knox College begs leave to submit its 118th Annual Report.

The increase in the rates charged for accommodation in the residence, which became effective in the Fall of 1960, were in effect for the entire year. With the residence fully occupied throughout the session, the income from this source was sufficient to meet the related operating costs. Essential maintenance and repairs, including the reconditioning of the windows throughout the College, have been carried out but in view of our limited budget, we have not been able to undertake any major renovations during the year. Projects such as the renovation of the lighting in the Chapel and Library, replacement of the wiring throughout the College and improvements in the furnishings, etc., of the rooms in the residence are still receiving consideration and will be undertaken as funds are available.

The College incurred a deficit of \$10,359.95 on its operations for the year ended December 31st, 1961 as compared with a deficit of \$9,325.08 in the previous year. As in the past, the current year's deficit was charged against the unspecified general capital funds of the College, bringing the total amount so charged in the last eighteen years to \$153,119.52. We refer again to the recommendations made in last year's report, namely, (1) Knox College be provided with sufficient funds to avoid drawing on its capital for the operation of the College and (2) that a study be made of ways and means to replace the capital funds used by the Board of Knox College for operational expenses of the College.

We again express the hope that future annual budget allocations from the Church will be sufficient to cover our expenses. We would also point out that the Board has adhered to the policy of presenting budget requirements only for the amount absolutely necessary to cover the net operating expenses of the College.

Changes were made by the Trustee Board during the year to replace some of our low interest rate investments with securities returning a higher yield. It is hoped that in due course and as market conditions permit, it will be possible to move toward a more balanced investment portfolio consisting of high grade bonds, and preferred and common stocks. A sound investment policy is of the utmost importance to the future financial stability of the College and we appreciate the co-operation and assistance we have received on this matter to date.

This year the Board and Senate of the College agreed to participate in the new Library Program of the American Theological Library Association. This is a program supported by Grants from the Sealantic Fund, and is designed to assist theological libraries to enlarge their holdings under a scheme by which the Sealantic Trust contributes an equal amount to that of the College beyond a specified limit. It covers a period of three years and may be extended to five years. The benefits derived from the program will greatly strengthen the College Library.

Your Board and Senate have also agreed to accept the invitation from the Royal Ontario Museum by which Knox College, along with the other theological colleges on the campus and the Department of Near Eastern Studies of the University of Toronto, will participate in archaeological work in the old city of Jerusalem. This is a new project in co-operation with the British and French Archaeological Societies. It will permit staff members and qualified graduate students to participate in a type of work which hitherto has not been possible.

The cost to the College for both of these projects will not exceed \$4,000, and funds will be available for this purpose from the Government Grant.

Permission is requested to again make mention of the matter of the disposition of the present Church Administration Office building.

The Board has given much serious consideration and thought to the question of the property known as 63 St. George Street. It has been concerned about the return of this property to the College because as has been pointed out on previous occasions the architectural design of the College and its future expansion presupposes the use of this property. The Board emphasizes that it is extremely

important to look to the future, and that it would be a tragic loss to the College and to the Church if 63 St. George Street were not retained as College property when it ceases to be used as the Church Administration Offices. We would therefore like to bring to the notice of the Assembly the fact that plans are in the making for the use of this property in the next three to five years.

The Joint Committee of the Board and Senate, which was charged with the responsibility of exploring the field and presenting the name of a suitable candidate for the vacant Chair of Homiletics, Evangelism and Church Administration, reported diligence.

The Board stresses the importance of having the services of a full time faculty member in the areas represented by the vacant Chair, and begs leave to suggest that the Committee be relieved of the restriction on new appointments and be allowed to submit nominations for the vacant Chair.

The Dean of Students, Rev. D. R. McKillican, reported an active year in the supervision of certified students in Arts preparing for theological studies, and in the area of recruitment for the ministry, public relations and publicity.

The Board of Knox College commends to the General Assembly the excellent work of the faculty under the leadership of Principal J. Stanley Glen.

## RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. That Knox College be provided with sufficient funds to avoid drawing on its capital for the operation of the College.
- That a study be made to find ways and means to replace the capital funds already used by the Board of Knox College for operational expenses of the College.
- 3. That the Assembly endorse the conviction of the Board of Knox College that the property known as 63 St. George Street should be made available to the College for its planned expansion when the building is no longer required for church offices.
- 4. That the Board of Knox College be instructed to proceed to present a nomination for the Chair of Homiletics, Evangelism and Church Administration to the next General Assembly.

## REPORT OF THE SENATE OF KNOX COLLEGE

To the Venerable the 88th General Assembly:

The Senate of Knox College begs to submit its 118th Annual Report.

During the academic session of 1961-62 fifty-six students were enrolled in the undergraduate course in theology, fifty-one of whom were in the regular course, four in special courses and one as an occasional. In the graduate department fifty-one were enrolled, thirty-five for the B.D. degree and sixteen for the Th.M. degree. The larger number for the B.D. degree includes twenty-four undergraduates who took elective subjects concurrently with the work of the core curriculum.

Since the beginning of the new year Professor Farris has been on Sabbatical leave at the University of Geneva, Switzerland, where he is engaged in research in Reformation History under the direction of the faculty of Theology. He will

return the first of October. Professor Hay, who has recently been granted a faculty fellowship by the American Association of Theological Schools will be on Sabbatical leave during the 1962-63 session and will study in Edinburgh.

Early in September the Rev. George Douglas, B.A., S.T.M., assumed his duties as new librarian, having been appointed to the position at a joint meeting of the Senate and Board in July. In February both bodies agreed to participate in the new library development program of the American Theological Library Association. This is a program supported by grants from the Sealantic Fund enabling smaller theological libraries to enlarge their holdings under a scheme by which the fund contributes an amount equal to that of the college or seminary beyond a specified limit. It covers a period of three years and may be extended to five. The benefits derived from the program will greatly strengthen the college library.

In February the Senate and Board accepted an invitation from the Royal Ontario Museum by which Knox College, along with other theological colleges on the campus and the Department of Near Eastern Studies of the University, will be a participating college in archaeological excavations in Jerusalem. This is a new project in co-operation with the British and French Archaeological Societies and will cover a period of five years. It will permit staff members and qualified graduate students to participate in a type of work which hitherto has not been considered a possibility.

In October the Laidlaw Lectures were delivered by professor Markus Barth, Department of New Testament, University of Chicago, on the subject "Conversations with Scripture". In March the MacDonald Memorial Lecture was delivered by Mr. Hamilton Cassels, Sr., Q.C., on Some Legal Aspects of the Practical Ministry.

We are grateful to the following sessional lecturers who assisted in the academic program: the Rev. George Douglas, S.T.M., who taught second and third year Homiletics; Mr. Henry Rosevear, A.C.C.O., F.T.C.L., who lectured in Church Music and directed the College Choir; the Rev. James Jack, B.A., who tutored in New Testament Greek; the Rev. R. Carter, Th.M., who lectured in Christian Education and the Rev. A. Lowther, D.D., who lectured in Missions.

Burkhart, B.A., whose course was twice interrupted by illness, the Senate has given the faculty authority to arrange for the completion of his course during May and June and to issue the diploma.

Finally, the desire of the Senate for an appointment to the new Chair of Homiletics, Evangelism and Church Administration should be strongly empha-

sized. While the financial situation of the Church of the last few years has been largely responsible for the delay in making the appointment, it is doubtful whether the inadequate preparation of our students in such important practical subjects is wise economy. In the judgment of the Senate the work of the College is being hampered at a time when enrolment is high, the graduate program heavy, and the demands of an expanding Church for qualified personnel are increasingly strong.

# REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SYNOD CORPORATIONS OF THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH IN CANADA

To the Venerable the 88th General Assembly:

Having now functioned for over four years, the Committee wishes to comment on its responsibilities and on the experience gained by it during this period. First, reference should be made to the report of the Committee to the General Assembly adopted in 1957, specifically to recommendations three and four which read:—

- 3. In order to protect the name of the Church and to establish uniformity in methods of financing, the Synod Corporations Committee shall co-ordinate the organization and operation of the Synod Corporation.
- 4. Unless the Synod Corporations Committee otherwise determines, there shall be embodied in the corporate powers of each such Synod Corporation provision that the Corporation shall co-operate in the co-ordinating functions of The Synod Corporations Committee.

The responsibilities of the Committee are clearly established in No. 3. However, experience has shown that No. 4 does not provide the means necessary for the Committee to carry out such responsibilities. Furthermore, if the required authority were supplied by amendment, the Committee as now constituted would still be unable faithfully to carry out the vital responsibilities entrusted to it.

It is the carefully considered opinion of the Committee that a senior officer of the Church should be entrusted with the following duties:

- 1. To visit each of the Synod Corporations periodically for the purpose of making detailed examination of all activities undertaken.
- 2. In his official capacity, to establish co-ordination of the financing and organization of the various corporations.

The proportions to which the Synod Corporations have grown as shown by Schedule "A" attached, are the best indicator of the urgent need of some means of co-ordination and supervision to protect the good name of the Presbyterian Church both morally and financially. The Committee is satisfied that, as it is presently constituted, it is not in the position to give the Church the kind of protection that is required unless it has a business administrator who will be able to work with each of the Synod Corporations to assist them and to carry out the wishes of the General Assembly as expressed in the 1957 report. More and more it has become apparent to the Committee that some man of experience and ability should be appointed in this supervisory capacity. The Committee felt that Rev. David McCullough, having efficiently served under the General Board of Missions as Director of Church Extension in the Toronto Presbyteries, having served with distinction as President of the Corporation of the Synod of Toronto and Kngston since its establishment, would be ideally suited for this post.

The Committee also realised that it would be necessary to work out a budget and a means of financing this position.

As a result of these considerations, the Committee appointed a sub-committee which took the following principal steps:

- Held a number of discussions with Rev. David McCullough to ascertain if he would be available and would undertake this office;
- Held several discussions with the Corporation of the Synod of Toronto and Kingston to explore its position on making Rev. David McCullough available;
- 3. Discussed with the various Synod Corporations their ability to contribute to the financing of the position; and

 Conferred with Rev. D. T. Evans, Chairman of the Home Missions Sub-Executive regarding release of Mr. McCullough from his present duties as of July 1st, 1962.

The sub-committee was able to report that the Home Mission Sub-Executive were prepared to release Mr. McCullough from his present duties as of July 1st, 1962, that the Corporation of the Synod of Toronto and Kingston was prepared to make Mr. McCullough available provided he could continue in an Executive capacity with that Corporation and it also was willing to contribute \$4,500.00 annually toward the financing of the post provided the Church at large made a substantial contribution to indicate its concern with the problem. The sub-committee also reported that the Corporation of the Synod of Hamilton and London was willing to contribute \$2,500.00 and that they were satisfied that if a grant of \$4,500.00 were made by General Assembly, the balance of the budgeted funds could be obtained through contributions from the other Synod Corporations. The sub-committee recommended that the Stipend of the Business Administrator be \$7,500.00 which, while not commensurate with the responsibilities to be taken, would be comparable with the Stipends of the Senior Secretaries and Professors appointed by General Assembly.

The Committee on Synod Corporations met on Friday, April 6th, 1962 and adopted the recommendations of the sub-committee.

### RECOMMENDATIONS

The Committee therefore makes the following recommendations:

- That the appointment of a Business Administrator of the Committee on Synod Corporations of the Presbyterian Church in Canada be authorized.
- That the areas of responsibility of the said Business Administrator be in accordance with Schedule "B" hereto attached.
- That the Annual Stipend payable to the said Business Administrator be \$7,500.00.
- 4. That the Administrative Council be authorized to pay \$4,500.00 annually toward the total cost of this appointment.
- 5. That Rev. David McCullough be appointed Business Administrator under the supervision of the Committee on Synod Corporations of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

### SCHEDULE B

# THE AREAS OF RESPONSIBILITY AND DUTIES OF THE BUSINESS ADMINISTRATOR OF THE SYNOD CORPORATIONS

The business administrator shall be expected

- To co-ordinate the operations of the Synod Corporations in such a way as to achieve the plan as set forth by the Church at the General Assembly of 1957 (Acts and Proceedings — page 517).
- 2. To be constantly evaluating the whole operation in toto or in part with a view to developing greater efficiency and effectiveness in achieving the objectives of the Synod Corporations.
- 3. To visit each Synod Corporation once each year.
- 4. To meet with the President or Chairman of each Synod Corporation either as a group or individually in Toronto if and when necessary.
- 5. To keep abreast with the current developments in the field of bond marketing as it relates to the Synod Corporations.
- 6. To correspond with and visit, if necessary, other Denominations that are carrying on similar operations in financing the construction of Church buildings so that the information obtained from such correspondence or visits may be used to improve, where possible, the organization and operation of the Synod Corporations of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.
- 7. To advise the Committee on Synod Corporations of the General Assembly as to any changes in practice and in legislation of the various Synod Corporations.
- 8. To appraise the present and future financial needs of the Presbyterian Church in Canada in the matter of Church buildings as they relate to the Synod Corporations that is, to anticipate what Congregations will require loans, and the approximate amounts, from the Synod Corporations for the construction of their Church buildings.
- 9. To maintain a cumulative file on all Synod Corporations, including their Charters, By-Laws, Trust Deeds and other pertinent documents.
- 10. To have copies of all documents relating to the application of a Congregation for a loan so that an independent examination of the application may be made in order to assist the local Board of Directors in arriving at a decision as to whether the loan is good, risky or should not be granted.
- 11. To maintain a register and a cumulative file of all loans made by the Synod Corporations to Congregations.
- 12. To guide the activities of the Synod Corporations as to the making of loans so that the credit and good name of the Presbyterian Church in Canada may be maintained.
- 13. To co-ordinate the operations of the Synod Corporations to obtain the proper emphasis on time and sequence of marketing debentures so that there may be no competition for the funds that are available for such loans.
- 14. To encourage the Synod Corporations in raising their Capital Reserve Funds so that they will have sufficient money on hand to properly secure their bonds and to take care of any default that may occur.
- 15. To advise and make recommendations to the Committee on Synod Corporations of the General Assembly in the matter of policy.
- 16. To be responsible to the Committee on Synod Corporations of the General Assembly.

## REPORT OF THE PENSION BOARD FOR 1962

To the Venerable the 88th General Assembly:

Another year of progress has passed and we are most grateful to Almighty God for His continued guidance and blessing. The increase authorized by last General Assembly has been implemented as of July 1st, 1961, which has been greatly appreciated by the beneficiaries, many of whom have written expressing their thanks for the continued tangible evidence of interest in their welfare. We appreciate also the increased benefits available under the Federal Old Age Pensions (\$780) so that a retired minister and his wife, if both over seventy years, will be receiving in combined pensions \$2,760 annually, of which only \$1,200 comes from the Church pension. In the opinion of your Board there should be no slackening of our endeavours to increase these pensions till the Church pension reaches at least \$1,800 for a full rate paying minister on retirement with 40 years of service at age 70 which will mean \$38.75 per year of service to a maximum of 40 years. As a further step in this direction and after consultation with our Actuary, your Board is prepared to recommend a further increase of 2/19th of the Church's present contribution (i.e. \$26.25 per year of service) commencing July 1st, 1962, as shown on the following table:-

The Board feels that this is the full limit to which the assets of the Fund as presently constituted can be put pending the quinquennial valuation of the Fund by our Actuary as of December 31st, 1962. Our present position as regards the basis of the resources of the Fund is unchanged from that reported to the Assembly last year. Following the evaluation of the Fund, next year's Assembly will be advised as to the course to be pursued in regard to the total rates paid by the Ministers on the Fund, the Congregational Rates, the share required from any Capital Fund Campaign, and the general Budget Funds of the Church. In the meantime it is hoped that the receipts from gifts and bequests to the Pension Fund will be greatly increased as this is an area of support which can substantially and immediately increase the pensions available.

Two meetings of the Board have been held since last Assembly, on September 19th, 1961 and April 27th, 1962 and the Executive met on January 30th, 1962. Close co-operation has been maintained with the Administrative Council and its Executive, and the Committee on Benevolences, also with the Chairman of Presbytery and Synod Pension Committees to all of whom our Board expresses their sincere appreciation for the mutual assistance rendered. We are very grateful

to the Trustee Board for their attention to the investment of the Pension Funds. In this regard a letter was received from the Chairman of the Trustee Board, Mr. B. M. Hannigan, shortly after last Assembly, calling attention to the new provisions in the Canadian and British Insurance Companies Act giving the Companies the power to deal in the investment and administration of segregated funds, in addition to their selling of annuities. With the wider opportunities for skilled and supervised investment of our Pension funds on a more permanent basis than now exists, the Chairman of the Trustee Board suggested careful investigation of these possibilities. The Pension Board appointed a special Committee who have gone carefully into the details of such a plan and have reported favourably on the submission of the Canada Life Assurance Company, after comparison with other Insurance Companies and Investment Companies submissions, as being the most suitable and advantageous for our Presbyterian Pension Fund. This has been approved by the Administrative Council and the Trustee Board and on the approval of this General Assembly the assets will be transferred to Canada Life who will issue fully paid up annuity policies to all the present beneficiaries so that they will receive their monthly pension cheques from the Life Insurance Company in future and the residue of the present Fund will be administered in a "Segregated Fund" which should be greatly to the Church's advantage. The estimated annual cost of administration by the Company is approximately \$8,500, while the estimated increase in investment income through the broader field of investment in equities and mortgages which the Company's organization and supervision permits should be from \$16,000 to \$20,000 annually. The operation of the Fund by the Pension Board will remain unchanged in its relations to our ministers and their dependents except that all the payments to beneficiaries will be through the Company's offices and the investments will be dealt with by the Company instead of the Trustee Board of our Church. Otherwise the present regulations remain in force as at present. It is hoped this plan will go into effect on July 1st, 1962.

Submissions by other Insurance Company and Mutual Equity Investment Associations have been presented and examined with care and our recommendation indicates what we consider the safest and most efficient and satisfactory course for our Church to adopt at this point in our history and the development of our Pension Fund.

We regret to report the passing of 15 annuitants (6 Ministers and 9 widows) and 4 ratepaying Ministers.

Last year's report gave details of the proposed Plan IV under the Group Insurance Plan which increased the benefits of Plan III from \$7,000 to \$10,000 up to 49 years (nearest birthday to January 1st); from \$5,000 to \$7,000 ages 50 to 54; \$3,000 to \$4,000 ages 55 to 69 and \$1,000 from age 70; and raising the annual contribution of each member from \$24 annually to \$33 with a paid-up Policy of \$1,000 to each member reaching age 65, provided under the new Plan that a new member joins the Group Insurance Plan before age 50. No premiums are paid by a member reaching age 70. A questionnaire circulated to the Ministers on Plan III have shown 92.5% in favour of Plan IV with 93 still to be heard from and the Insurance Company is prepared to accept this as a favourable vote and our Board recommends the acceptance of this Plan to both the Administrative Council, who also endorse it, and to the General Assembly to be available on July 1st, 1962. There are now 55 ministers eligible for this Group Insurance Plan (31 under age 38) who have not availed themselves of this privilege. 5 claims were paid during 1961, 2 for \$1,000 each, and 3 for \$3,000 each, a total of \$11,000 (same total as 1960).

A Committee of the Board responsible for the Pension Assistance Fund reports that in 1961 no minister lost his equity in the Pension Fund by falling over four years in arrears of his Pension rates. To obtain this end, 10 ministers were given assistance totalling \$1,197.32. The balance in the Fund December 31st, 1961 was \$1,290.16. Special contributions earmarked for the Pension Assistance Fund are always welcomed.

Our analysis of our financial statement for the 12 months of 1961 shows an increase of \$307,155 in total assets—from \$3,018,812 to \$3,325,967. The net increase last year was \$289,076. The total received from gifts and legacies amounted to \$7,077, a decrease of \$13,185 from last year. This item in our receipts is a great disappointment as it shows that our people are not remembering the claims of the Pension Fund of our Church when drafting their wills or apportioning their gifts. The amount received from Ministers' Rates was \$38,841 an increase of \$1,540. The refunds to ministers withdrawing permanently from the service of the Church was \$2,069, compared with \$1,529 in 1960. This trend gives us serious concern. In 1959 the amount was \$1,204.

The total interest on investments, bank interest and interest on arrears of Ministers' Rates was \$154,547, an increase of \$36,313. Again we record our thanks to Mr. B. M. Hannigan, Chairman of the Trustee Board, and the Trustees and their Advisory Investment Council for their oversight of the Pension Fund investments which are yielding better than 5% on current market values on investment funds and well over  $4\frac{1}{2}\%$  on all assets. This result has only been obtained by great personal attention on the part of these financial experts.

The total revenue for 1961 was \$458,436 compared to \$428,909 in 1960, and total expenditures were \$151,281 compared with \$139,833.

The amount received from the Budget Funds of the Church was \$125,000 the same as last year. Boards and Congregational Rates, including Cognate work totalled \$136,971 compared with \$132,112 in 1960, an increase of \$4,859.

Total amount of annuities paid was \$144,587, an increase of \$9,935 reflecting the six months of increased benefits paid after July 1st, 1961. The expenses of operating the Fund were \$4,625 compared with \$3,652 in 1960 and 11 months of 1959, \$2,991 and \$3,359 in 1958. This increased cost of operation is due to unforseen expenses incurred by changing from quarterly to monthly payment of annuities, postal and office expenses, and is kept at this nominal figure through the fullest co-operation of the Church office staff generally, which the Board gratefully acknowledges.

Analyzing the Congregational Rates for 1961, there were the following cancellations: due to exemptions of assessment being made on mortgage payments, \$6,363 against \$6,916 in 1960; errors in reporting congregational receipts \$62 against \$882 in 1960; on Capital expenditures by congregations, new Church and Manse facilities, \$5,737 against \$10,667 for 1960; for cancelling arrears of rates for special reasons approved by the Presbyteries concerned, \$3,402 against \$2,129 in 1960; for preaching points closed, nil, against \$89 in 1960; a total of \$15,566 against \$20,683, a decrease of \$5,117 from last year. The amount of Ministers' Rates in arrears was \$34,596 a decrease of \$3,788.

The Chairman attended the Church Pensions Conference in New York on November 30th and December 1st, 1961. The statistical report showed gains by all participating bodies (23) with membership of 44,496,884 and beneficiaries total 51,617, paid during 1961 a total of \$48,657,101. The total Receipts were \$128,204,134 and total Funds and resources \$952,094,566. These figures compared with those in last year's report indicate the magnitude and growth of the Pension Funds of Church bodies comprising this Conference. A questionnaire was circulated through the Conference membership, replied to be 22 out of 23 bodies, regarding the Coverage of Seminary Students (not yet ordained) under Church Pension Programs, showed 10 Churches offered full coverage if serving a Church; none offered full coverage whether or not serving a Church; 6 offered coverage for certain benefits under pension plan or supplementary plan, and 9 offered no coverage. Answering the question as to whether any funds are provided through the Budget of the Church or some similar source to "subsidize" any contribution required under the plan from or on behalf of a seminary student: 5 answered "yes" and 17 "no". Our Board has no plan for such coverage and the subcommittee is still studying ways and means before advancing a detailed solution. The review by financial experts of the economic trends and investment predictions for the U.S.A. form a most interesting part of the Agenda, and the operation of Social Security as it relates to Church Pension schemes. Our Canadian system as presented in a paper by Rev. Dr. Harry G. Tuttle of the United Church of Canada formed an enlightening view of the changing situations.

Overtures 12, 16 and 31 were referred by last Assembly for reports to the Assembly in 1962, after consultation with the Actuary.

Overture 12, Synod of Manitoba Re: "Pension Fund Benefits".

The Pension Board agreed unanimously to recommend that the prayer of this Overture be not granted. The premises of this Overture is incorrect because there is no question involved as to the "matter of rights" of pensioners under the Pension Fund. The regulations clearly state that a minister to participate in its benefits shall fulfil all the requirements outlined in the regulations and the foremost of these is that the minister must retire to receive any portion of his pension payments, whether this be before or after reaching age 70.

Overture 16, Presbytery of Montreal Re: Pension Fund

It is evident to your Board that there has been a great area of misunderstanding by the Pension Committee of the Presbytery of Montreal as to the history and present situation of the Pension Fund and the exacting experiences of the last 15 years struggle to bring the Fund to an actuarially sound basis. Pensions have been increased as this has been made possible by increased assets, with the approval of our Actuary. The prayer of Part I of this Overture cannot be granted in the stated terms without seriously departing from the established procedure of the Board in this regard as adopted over these recent years. Progress on a sound basis is proceeding in an orderly fashion. There was an increase in maximum pensions of \$100 granted by last Assembly and a further proposal for an additional increase of \$100 is being presented to this Assembly, bringing the total to \$1,300 for ministers over 70 with 40 years of service and \$650 for widows. Any attempt suddenly to increase ministers' rates or congregational rates as proposed by the Overture in Part II would have serious effects on both the ministers and congregations contributions. The proposal can only be worked out on a gradual basis and it cannot be accomplished in the terms suggested. Ministers can now increase their pension on retirement by increasing the Minister's Rates as "Extra ratepayers", if they so desire, but few can find the funds to pay more than at present and many cannot meet the present rates without great sacrifice and in some cases, assistance. The Board is presently considering a proposal to increase our income from investments which even now is considerably more than 4%.

The Church has had many urgent appeals in the last few years for Extension Building Funds as well as for the Budget and the work of getting bequests and gifts for the Pension Fund has had to take a conservative course, but is being pursued in ways which will not interfere with other imperative claims.

As regards Part III, in the matter of a review of the Pension Fund and its regulations and requirements, these are under constant review, at every Board meeting and throughout the year in consultation with the Actuary. A meeting with the Pension Committee of the Presbytery of Montreal has been held and the situation fully explained, and the thanks of the Board extended for the special interest evidenced in this Overture but recommends that the prayer be not granted, but the problems raised will be further explored by the Board.

Overture 24, Presbytery of Sarnia - "Provision for Home on Retirement".

This Overture was referred by last Assembly to the Council to study and report to the Assembly in 1962 and the matter was referred to the Pension Board which after study reports to the Council and Assembly that the prayer of the Overture be not granted.

The funds for this proposed fund to provide house accommodation for a retired minister and his wife are suggested to come from exactly the same sources as are presently utilized to provide the pensions for the minister and his widow. It is agreed that this present pension is inadequate and any increase from the sources outlined, namely the minister and the congregation would be more acceptably applied directly to raise pensions and allow the pensioner to make his own living arrangements. Many ministers and congregations are making some such provision as the individual circumstances dictate, but these circumstances do not exist in the majority of cases throughout the Church and the provision for the distribution of the assets of the proposed fund would be impossible to administer satisfactorily to those concerned to obtain the objects proposed.

Overture 31, Presbytery of East Toronto Re: "Pensions"

This Overture requests the Pension Board to consider a complete change in the present Pension Plan of our Church which is based on all ministers on the Fund sharing alike for a like period of service in the ministry regardless of stipend, and all widows and orphans likewise sharing alike, to adopt a system of pensions varying according to the minister's stipend as well as his years of service, and then in some way integrating our present system with the new. It should be noted that many in the ministry are presently having great difficulty paying their rates and an increase in these would impose present hardships. It would certainly be an advantage if treasurers of congregations would deduct from the minister's stipend and forward monthly his rates to the Pension Fund instead of the minister trying to find an annual payment. Ministers with funds available can now increase their Pensions on retirement by becoming "Extra ratepayers" as provided by the present regulations and this does not encroach on the equity of all the ministers on the Fund which is provided by the Church at large, which equity is distributed equally among all ratepayers. Any change in the method of the distribution of the assets of the Fund which would upset the equities of those on lower stipends in favour of those on higher remuneration should be guarded against. To carry out the integration of the two plans as suggested would be a most intricate procedure to satisfy all concerned. Many Church Pension Plans have adopted many of the features suggested in this Overture and the Board should continue to investigate the will of the Church in this regard, realizing the fundamental difference of approach as outlined. The Board recommends that the prayer of the Overture be not granted.

Overture 34, Presbytery of Westminster Re: "Group Health and Accident Insurance Scheme".

The prayer of this Overture was granted by the General Assembly and the Pension Board was asked to obtain information from Insurance Companies, and after study to report to the next Assembly.

Your Board has before it a proposal from Confederation Life Association under date of October 19th, 1961, furnished on the request of Mr. J. E. Smart of this Board, A copy of Mr. Robert N. Bray's letter is as follows:—

"At the request of Mr. J. E. Smart, I have prepared and am enclosing a Health Insurance Plan to cover the ministers, and their dependants, of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

As all Canadian provinces now have Hospital Insurance Plans which basically provide free hospitalization at the public ward level, we have not included any supplementary hospital benefits. In the first place, it is difficult to secure other accommodation in most hospitals, and we feel that those ministers who wish to have private or semi-private accommodation can probably afford that expense.

The suggested surgical benefit provides for reimbursement on a level comparable to the suggested charges of the Ontario Medical Association, and will generally prove quite acceptable to most surgeons.

The fees charged by an anaesthetist will be covered by a benefit which provides up to 20% of the amount allowed under the surgical schedule for any particular operation, which normally will prove reasonably adequate.

We believe that most physicians are fairly generous in their charges, and for that reason are providing a nominal allowance for calls at the doctor's office, the hospital or the home. Your ministers will be responsible for the physician's charge for the first call, with allowances made for all subsequent calls during one period of disability. This plan has been in operation with many groups for many years and seems to work very well. Naturally the premium would be considerably higher for a medical benefit providing for payment which would include the first call, which in a good many cases is the only call made when the sickness is not serious.

Most provincial hospital plans do not provide diagnostic benefits for outpatients, and we feel that certainly the hospital is not in a position to reduce their normal charges in the case of a minister or a member of his family. We have therefore included a diagnostic benefit that we feel will be satisfactory.

The benefits for dependants are identical with those for the ministers. We have not included immediate maternity benefits, which can be arranged by increasing the premium, but maternity will be covered in cases where a minister has been insured with dependant benefits for nine months preceding a maternity claim. Under practically all insurance plans, maternity benefits are something less than the amount normally charged by the physician. Our suggested benefit will be \$60 in the case of normal childbirth.

The provinces of Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland provide certain medical and diagnostic benefits through their hospital plans that the other provinces do not provide, and we have therefore suggested that ministers in this province will pay a slightly smaller premium than those residents in other provinces.

The actual claims experienced from year to year in a group such as this determine the subsequent premium rates and it is quite likely that with average claims experienced the total cost of both single and married employees may be reduced. This may be of interest to your committee in determining what portion of the illustrated premium should be paid by your ministers. The cost page under the letter 'S' shows the cost for single ministers and under 'M' the total cost for the minister and his family."

Surgical Fee Benefits \$300 as per schedule with \$500 maximum separated multiple surgery.

Anaesthetist's Services up to 20% of Surgical Schedule with minimum of \$10. Medical Expense Benefit up to \$150 as specified.

Diagnostic Examination Benefit up to \$50 as specified.

Maternity benefits are included for dependants but excluded for Employees.

If all ministers participated the annual cost of this coverage would be about \$35,000 per annum and the Board has made no decision as to how the cost should be apportioned between the minister or employees (i.e. deaconesses) and the Church, but suggest a flat rate be charged as in the Group Insurance with the Church bearing the balance of the expense should such a Health Insurance Plan find acceptance.

You will note that Hospitalization is not included as all Canadian Provinces have Hospital Insurance Plans. It is not necessary to attach the standard surgical benefits list, and the medical benefits payable is the fee charged by the doctor up to \$3 for each home call or \$3 for each hospital call or \$2 for each call at the doctor's office. Up to \$5 is also payable for a call by a consulting physician called in by the attending doctor during one period of treatment. This benefit is payable for the second call for either sickness or accident. There is no limit to the number of calls but the maximum payable during one period of treatment is \$150. This benefit is not payable for any calls during a period of disability due to pregnancy or following a surgical operation.

We have revised the Pension Fund Pamphlet to bring it up-to-date but have delayed printing so as to provide for any further revisions which may be incorporated following this Assembly's action, thus saving duplicated expense. We have two very sad occasions to report in the losses suffered through death in our Pension Board family. On Thanksgiving Sunday 1961 (October 8th) our Clerk Stenographer in the Church Offices for many years, Miss G. S. Welsh suddenly died in hospital and was buried on Wednesday, October 11th. Many of the Office Staff were present at the funeral with Mr. Reid and the Chairman to pay the last respects to one who had been faithful, efficient and devoted to the interests of all the beneficiaries. We miss her and her constant careful supervision of the affairs and routine in the Pension Office.

On Tuesday, January 30th, 1962, following the meeting of the Executive of the Pension Board, Rev. George M. Lamont, Convener of the Pension Committee of the Synod of Hamilton and London, with Mrs. Lamont were returning by car to Mitchell when rounding a sharp curve near Stratford in a heavy blizzard they ran head-on with another car and were both killed instantly; and the driver of the other car died shortly after. The Lamonts' leave two children, a daughter aged 15 and a son aged 9. These sudden tragic passings have left us shocked and grieved, but with earnest prayers that our Heavenly Father will comfort those who are left to mourn.

The grateful thanks of our Board is due Rev. E. A. Thomson, B.A., D.D., who in addition to the multitude of his exacting duties to the Church in so many essential capacities has given freely and at great personal sacrifice of time and energy to acting as Secretary of the Pension Board at all meetings, preparing the Minutes and being always available for consultation and information. His unfailing courtesy has made the work of the Board in its day to day operations most pleasant and efficient. This same attitude and service co-operation is extended by the acting Comptroller Rev. Basil Howell and Mr. H. S. Reid in the Treasurer's Office and the whole staff as supervised by our Church Treasurer, Mr. W. S. Walton, Q.C. On the death of Miss G. S. Welsh in early October, Miss Margaret M. Alexander of the staff of the Treasurer's Office was assigned as part-time Clerk-stenographer of the Pension Board, giving two-thirds of her time to the Pension correspondence and records and we wish to pay our tribute to the fine contribution of efficient service and enthusiasm which she has brought to these new responsibilities.

This year has presented more problems than ever before which needed and received the whole-hearted co-operation and expert advice and guidance of our Actuary, Professor Norris E. Sheppard, M.A.F.I.A., of the Faculty of Mathematics, University of Toronto, who has devoted many hours to conference and detailed examination of our pension problems, particularly as regards the possibilities of increasing the annuity payments from our accumulated assets and recently the highly technical and involved problems of realigning our Pension investment plans and the purchasing of our Annuities directly through an Insurance Company under the "Segregated Fund" Plan. Professor Sheppard has been most helpful as have other members of our Board skilled in these matters in checking the details of the draft agreement presented as it relates to both purchase of annuities present and future and the investment policies involved and have arrived at the unanimous conclusion we have endorsed. Professor Sheppard receives no remuneration for all his many years of guidance and advice and for his quinquennial re-valuation of our Pension Fund which will again be due as of December 31st, 1962. For all these invaluable services of his special technical skills in this field the Church owes him a continuing and increasing debt of gratitude.

### RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That, in addition to the annuities purchased by the ministers' and widows' and orphans' rates, the Pension payments be increased by two nineteenths (2/19) of the Church's present contribution in accordance with the unanimous recommendation of the Board and accompanying table. This will increase the total maximum Pension to ministers with 40 years of service and age 70

- by \$100 and \$50 for widows or a single orphan, who has lost both parents. This increase will become effective as of July 1st, 1962, and is dependent upon the present annual assistance from the Church Budget being continued.
- 2. That Plan IV of the Group Insurance Plan as outlined in last year's and this year's report and in accordance with the similar recommendation of the Administrative Council be approved to take effect July 1st, 1962.
- 3. That the Pension Board be authorized, having obtained the approval of our Actuary, to notify the Trustee Board to conclude the Agreement with the Canada Life Assurance Company, Toronto, in the terms of the policy which is attached hereto in which the Company agrees to segregate any assets held in accordance with the terms of this policy from the other assets of the Insurance Company and to pay to the person or persons entitled the income purchased under this policy. The policy holder is the Trustee Board of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, who will transfer to the Insurance Company the assets of the Pension Fund as provided under the policy agreement.
- 4. That our participation in the Church Pensions Conference be continued.
- That the Pension Board be empowered to continue to solicit gifts and bequests to increase the assets of the Fund, and for additional funds for the Pension Assistance Fund.
- 6. That an amount up to \$5,500 be apportioned to cover this year's expenses of the Pension Board, including postage, printing and salary of a Clerkstenographer in the Church Offices from January 1st, 1962 to December 31st, 1962.
- 7. That the continuing Executive Members of the Board, after the appointments of Assembly, constitute the Executive until the Fall Meeting of the Board.
- 8. That the warmest thanks of the Assembly be extended to Professor N. E. Sheppard, M.A., F.I.A., for his professional services as Actuary rendered so generously and efficiently in the interest of the Pension Fund and that he be asked to make the quinquennial revaluation of the Fund immediately after December 31st, 1962.

# COMMITTEE TO CONVERSE WITH THE ANGLICAN CHURCH OF CANADA

# THE ADMINISTRATIVE COUNCIL

To the Venerable the 88th General Assembly

The Administrative Council beg leave to report on their activities during 1961.

#### DEATH DR. N. H. GRACE

The year was clouded by the sudden death of Dr. N. H. Grace of Edmonton, a member of the Council since its inception. Dr. Grace was a valued and trusted colleague who had the welfare of the Church at heart. He attended the meetings of the Council when a less zealous man would have been resting. His courage and his high regard for duty endeared him to all. We would record our sense of gratitude for his services and our sense of loss at his passing.

Certain matters were referred to the Council by the 87th General Assembly.

OVERTURE 3 THE PRESBYTERY OF WINNIPEG RE FINANCIAL PROVISION FOR LAY WORKERS

The prayer of the Overture is to the effect that a Fund be established to assist lay workers of the Church finding themselves in financial difficulties. A Committee was appointed to study this important matter but the field is so large that sufficient time could not be found to bring in an adequate report. The Council are both well aware of the problems and in sympathy with the prayer of the Overture. The Council request that this be accepted by Assembly as a report of progress.

#### OVERTURE 5 THE PRESBYTERY OF WINNIPEG RE FINANCIAL STATEMENT RE DEFICIT

The prayer of this Overture is to the effect that certain specific information should be provided the Church each month through the Presbyterian Record. This Overture received careful study and it was agreed that the prayer be answered as follows:—That there be published monthly in The Presbyterian Record the latest comparative statement for the current year and for the same period of the preceding year showing (a) receipts from congregations and (b) gross expenditures. The financial position of the Church is set forth in the annual audited statement, and it is not considered practicable to publish a monthly statement thereof, particularly having regard to the necessity of borrowing working capital during most of the year.

#### OVERTURE 18 PRESBYTERY OF KINGSTON RE THE NEEDS OF THE CATHECHISTS

The matter of increase in stipends of catechists was given sympathetic consideration by the Council but it was agreed to answer the prayer of the Overture to the effect that at the present time nothing can be done in regard to this matter.

# OVERTURE 24 PRESBYTERY OF SARNIA RE PROVISION OF HOUSE ON RETIREMENT

The prayer of the Overture is that a Fund, built up by contributions from ministers and congregations, be established to provide money for the purchase of house accommodation for ministers on retirement from the active ministry.

This Overture was referred to the Pension Board for study and by that Board to a Committee of experts in this field. The Committee reported that the money for this proposed fund for providing house accommodation for a retired minister and his wife is suggested to come from exactly the same sources as are presently utilized to provide the pensions for the mnister and his widow. It is agreed that the present pension is inadequate and any increase from the sources outlined, namely the minister and the congregation, would be more acceptably applied directly to raising pensions and allowing the pensioner to make his own living arrangements. Many ministers and congregations are making some such provision as the individual circumstances dictate but these circumstances do not exist in the majority of cases throughout the Church and the provision for distribution of the assets of the proposed fund would be impossible to administer satisfactorily to those concerned to obtain the objects proposed.

The Council therefore recommend that the prayer of the Overture be not granted.

# Overture 36 Presbytery of Saskatoon re Social Projects and the General Board of Missions

The Overture has been referred to the Committee on Organization of the Council for study and report. The Council ask Assembly to accept this as a report of progress.

# RECOMMENDATIONS 1 AND 2 BOARD OF KNOX COLLEGE

These recommendations, having to do with the present and future needs of Knox College, are presently under consideration by the Finance Committee of the Council.

#### RECOMMENDATION 3, BOARD OF PRESBYTERIAN RESIDENCE, SASKATOON

The Board asked for \$5,000.00 to effect certain necessary repairs in the residence. They appeared to agree with the suggestion of the Council that out

of their income from fees and Authorized Expenditure they might undertake a portion of this work every year until completed.

#### RE CAMPAIGN FOR CAPITAL FUNDS

During the year a Committee studied the matter referred by last Assembly and recommended that any plans for a campaign to raise capital funds should be deferred until the present reorganization is completed and has had time to convince the Church of its value. The report concluded — "Such a campaign might be considered by the Church as a project to synchronize with the celebration of Canada's Centennial in 1967".

In the meantime this report has been referred to the Planning Committee of the Council to integrate with the ongoing plans of the boards of the Church.

#### RE OBSERVANCE OF THE CENTENNIAL OF CONFEDERATION

A Committee of the Council under the Chairmanship of Dr. Neil G. Smith of Lochwinnoch have been actively at work. The Council have accepted their suggestion that the Committee co-operate with the Canadian Council of Churches in their plans for the Centennial year. It was agreed that two books should be published—one dealing with the history of The Presbyterian Church in Canada and one dealing with the present life and work of the Church in Canada, one hundred years after Confederation. It was the expressed hope that the General Assembly of 1967 might meet in the Capital City of Ottawa. The Council are well aware of the fact that the setting of the place and time of the meeting of the General Assembly of 1967 is the prerogative of the General Assembly of 1966 but it was agreed to report the substance of this recommendation to this Assembly so that the Church might have this possibility in mind.

#### THE PLANNING COMMITTEE OF COUNCIL

The Council appointed a Planning Committee under the Chairmanship of Dr. J. W. Wevers and this Committee have been active during the year. The Committee report that the cost of continuing the present programme beyond the proposed budget for 1963 would be \$155,300.00. By further paring of the present programme the tentative figure of \$122,300.00 was obtained. New work which the Church ought to undertake, such as Downtown Mission work, three delayed Missionary appointments overseas, and necessary increase of academic staff at Ewart College, would cost a further \$183,500.00.

The Planning Committee in its consideration of organization or reorganization in the Church, submitted seven questions to presbyteries asking their comment and indicating that the questions had specifically to do with the long and short range plans for the work of the Church. These questions were:

- (1) Do you feel that the present Board and Department structure of the Church is best suited to meeting these future challenges? If not, what changes would you suggest?
- (2) Are there areas of first importance which you feel the Church is neglecting?
- (3) Are there areas of secondary importance which the Church is now engaged in that might be shelved for a period until Budget givings improve?
- (4) How can the Church improve its sense of stewardship on the local level for the Budget needs of the Church?
- (5) Do you believe that the Budget is being spent as wisely as possible? If not, would you suggest means of improvement?
  - (6) In your opinion, how can the Synods be made more effective?
- (7) Have you any suggestions that you feel might be helpful to the Planning Committee as it seeks to plan for the future of the Church?

Twenty-one presbyteries, some much later than the asked-for date of November 27th, 1961, sent in replies, a few of them not replying to all questions.

The Committee gave detailed consideration to all replies. In general it may be said that no areas of common agreement were found from which we could report, "This and this is the mind of the presbyteries." It is obvious also that there is much lack of understanding of what the General Assemblies' Boards, Committees and officials are doing, and why they are doing it, and the basis of their authority in so doing. Somewhat arising out of this lack of understanding, and somewhat out of a conviction that the Church must move, radical solutions were occasionally presented.

In Question 1 (present structure), need of further work was indicated. There were expressions of satisfaction with what has been done and convictions that more time was needed to work out the re-organization now under way. Some would make smaller Assembly Boards and Committees with consolidations, and each with a smaller membership; some would delegate more work to synods and presbyteries; some were fearful of too much top authority; some wanted delineation in detail of the powers of this Council. In all, if a general statement can be made in reference to this Question 1, it is that we are working with some satisfaction to the Church and giving hope that better results will be achieved by taking the present direction.

In Question 2 (areas of first importance being neglected, practically every phase of the work of the Boards and Committees was deemed, in the total of the answers, to be neglected. Here our introductory remark as to lack of understanding is pertinent: the answers may be held to indicate an awareness of work to be done.

In Question 3 (shelving secondary work), apart from complaints about the amount of committee work in Church offices, there is little that is specific other than the cutting of grants here and there, that is, to come within budget, to reduce work rather than shelve it. Our inter-denominational grants came under fire here as did printing and mailing costs. Your Committee can find no mind of the Church for shelving anything.

In Question 4 (improving local sense of stewardship), there were varied suggestions: better and specific preaching with a more spiritual basis; develop personal aspects of the Budget and reduce the impersonal; give more presbytery visitations; give more budget preaching; have pulpit exchanges to present the Budget; continue the emphasis through the year; penetrate congregational organizations more deeply; use tape-recorded messages from the Moderator of the General Assembly and from the secretaries at presbyteries and in congregations. Greater emphasis was asked for in present methods, but presbyteries differed in their choice of the methods to receive this emphasis.

In Question 5 (is the Budget being spent wisely?), we found reflections of the emphasis suggested in Question 2 and suggestions of re-allocations. Some answers Were plainly 'no' and pointed in their detail. Alternatives were sometimes given as to what synods might do. It was in answer to this question that presbytery opinions were most definite, but did not reveal a general mind. Your Committee can only take heed that, whether justified or not, here is dissatisfaction.

In Question 6 (Synod powers), it is evident that certain presbyteries were unaware of the report to the General Assembly, 1961, as found on pages 327-330, A & P, 1961 and the total of the answers added practically nothing to this report and its recommendations. Suggestions ran all the way from having synods meet every two years to having them hold intensified meetings in the spring (rather than in the fall, as commonly). Some presbyteries were content with 'Give syonds more authority' without specifying how and what. We found again the desire to have synods spend the home mission money of their area and that there be synod offices. Others saw synods as holding inspirational gatherings for their chief work, and increasing studies at the synod level. One observation was that

the question should have been, How can presbyteries be made more effective? The answers have given nothing for your Committee to take action upon as against the recommendations of the special report, 1961, pages 327-330, previously referred to.

In Question 7 (any other suggestions?), it was evident that some presbyteries thought their answers to Questions 1-6 answered this. Answers often overlapped one another. Concrete suggestions, however, were (1) a department of printing and distribution, (2) reduction of the membership of Boards and of the number of their meetings, (3) work for a deeply spiritual concern and eliminate the friction among the Boards and Committees, (4) make a declaration concerning the future of the Church, (5) improve relationships between Church offices and presbyteries and between the presbyteries and the colleges, (6) make the stipend the first charge upon the Budget, and (7) hold Assembly in September to eliminate the vacation lull and forgetfulness. There was no single trend in answer to Question 7.

The Committee wishes to thank the presbyteries for their consideration of these questions.

During the year the Pension Board under the leadership of Mr. C. M. Pitts have been investigating the applicability of Group Insurance Plan IV which is set forth in the following comparaitve figures:

No premium under either Plan to be paid after 70 years of age.

Sufficient response favourable to the adoption of Plan IV has been received from the participants in Plan III to warrant the carrying companies undertaking to make it available to the Church and the Council recommend accordingly.

#### RE SEGREGATED PENSION FUND

During the year the Pension Board gave a great deal of study to a change in procedure re the securities of the Pension Fund. New provisions in the Canadian and British Insurance Companies Act empowering such companies to deal in investment and segregated funds in addition to their selling of annuities, have been effected. An expert Committee of the Pension Board, having carefully examined the whole situation, recommended that, subject to the concurrence of the Trustee Board, the Administrative Council and the General Counsel of the Church, the assets of the Pension Fund should be transferred to the Canada Life Assurance Company who will issue fully paid-up annuity policies to all present beneficiaries. The remainder of the Fund wll be administered by the Company as a "segregated fund". Estimates indicate that the cost of administering the Fund is approximately \$8,500 per annum and the increase in income through the broader field of investment open to the Company should be from \$16,000.00 to \$20,000.00 annually.

The operation of the Pension Fund will still be under the supervision of the Pension Board as far as their relation to the ministers and their dependents is concerned. This new procedure will bring about two changes (1) monthly payments to beneficiaries will come from the office of the company instead of from

the Church Offices; (2) investments will be under the care of the Company instead of the Trustee Board. In all other respects the present regulations will remain in force. With the approval of this Assembly the Pension Board hope that the new plan will go into effect on July 1, 1962. The concurrence of the Administrative Council was granted and the Council support the recommendation of the Pension Board with respect thereto.

RE OVERTURE No. 34 PRESBYTERY OF WESTMINSTER RE HEALTH AND ACCIDENT INSURANCE

For information, the Chairman of the Pension Board, Mr. C. M. Pitts, reported to the Council regarding the Pension Board's study of the matter of this Overture. This report will be found in the body of the Report of the Pension Board to this Assembly. A pamphlet dealing with the proposed coverage was distributed to the members of the Council for their information.

### COMMITTEE ON ORGANIZATION

The Council's Committee on Organization under the Chairmanship of Dr. W. Stanford Reid have been working hard all year on the re-organization programme of the Church.

The last Assembly accepted a recommendation to appoint a Comptroller. This was a new office in the Church, and the Administrative Council charged the Committee on Organization with the responsibility of determining what the duties of the Comptroller should be. The Committee gave the matter careful consideration and their recommendations in this respect were submitted to Council and adopted. In this connection also, the Committee recommended to Council that the Rev. Basil Howell be made the Acting-Comptroller. This too was accepted.

At the present time the Committee is struggling with the problem of realignment of the Boards and Committees of the Church. The first draft has already been completed and consultations are now being held with the various Boards and Committees and with the Women's Missionary Society. It is expected that this work will be completed in the coming year and that it will be possible to make a detailed report to the next General Assembly.

During the year the Committee have made a study of the procedure of Assemblies. As a result of this study the Committee are making certain recommendations which are embodied in this report and which are being submitted for your consideration.

#### RE NEW CHURCH OFFICES

Under the leadership of Mr. D. L. McDougall, the Building Committee of the Council spent a great deal of time and energy carrying out the recommendation adopted by the last Assembly: "That the work of the Building Committee be continued under the authority of the Administrative Council with a view to erecting or purchasing a building which will be suitable as Church Offices." As time went on it was found that the money available falls short of what it would take to erect a building to meet the needs of the boards for the present and for the immediate future. The idea of erecting such a building had to be given up and the proposal to take advantage of either of two sites freely offered - one in Toronto and one in Ottawa - had to be abandoned. During the year two buildings came on the market and many weeks were spent in investigation. Neither building was acceptable to the Council and both had to be rejected. The Council directed the Building Committee to arrange for accommodation to meet the most pressing needs of the boards. It was further agreed to postpone the erection of new Church Offices until the present Building Fund plus accumulated interest thereon, plus further contributions to the Fund, will be sufficient for the erection of a suitable Church Office building.

# NEW FINANCIAL POLICY

Since its inception two years ago the Administrative Council of the Presbyterian Church in Canada have devoted much time and study in an atempt to clarify the state of our Church's finances. When the Rev. Basil Howell took over, last October, as Acting-Comptroller, almost his first act was to make an exhaustive and detailed study of the Church's financial policy. As the result of his study he has formulated a completely new policy.

The Administrative Council have meticulously examined this new policy from all aspects, particularly from the accounting and legal viewpoints, and are firmly convinced that it is both sound and workable — one which the Church has needed and has been waiting for, for years. All the spending Boards were invited to submit their comments and only one — that of Ewart College — objected to some of its particulars.

The financial policy which the Administrative Council is now submitting to this Assembly for its consideration is as follows:

- (1) To authorize expenditures on a gross basis. At the present time authorization is on a net basis, i.e. after deducting revenue from sales of materials, anticipated gifts and appropriations from reserves. However some departments do not estimate sales etc., and this creates an inequity between departments.
- (2) To estimate income on a gross basis. This would include budget receipts and sales, and also bequests, gifts, and investment income available for current purposes.
- (3) To budget for capital expenditures as well as for current expenses. Most capital expenditures are incurred by Home and Overseas Missions and heretofore most of it has come out of reserves and special funds. There is thus no co-ordinated control and no assurance that at some time one department may have urgent needs but no reserves while another department has unused reserves.
- (4) To discontinue the practice of placing bequests, gifts and income from investments at the discretion of particular departments, and treat these as part of the total income of the Church unless they are for specifically designated purposes. Bequests and gifts such as "for Missions", "for Overseas Missions", "for work in Formosa" are of so general a nature that the terms of the bequest are met provided we spend at least the amount of the bequest for the indicated purpose or area. Specific bequests, e.g. "for ministerial assistance", "student assistance", "for a scholarship" or for work in a new area or type not being presently done or for a named specific project must, of course, be kept separate. So also must obvious capital bequests, e.g. "for endowment funds" or "for the Mission Fund" but the income from such funds would be available for current use. After the bank loan has been fully liquidated it might even be desirable for us to fund, or at least reserve, larger bequests, say \$50,000.00 and over.

Take one case, at the present time bequests and gifts "for Missions" and interest therefrom are placed for use at the discretion of the departments and are used for (a) capital items, (b) new budget items and (c) for making up the differences between total expenditures and the expenditures from the budget funds authorized by General Assembly.

In comment on this practice, it may be noted that:

- (a) If the proposal for a co-ordinated capital expenditure budget is accepted, the control of reserves, bequests etc., must also be co-ordinated.
- (b) Authorized expenditures should include all essential items. If additional funds become available, the expenditure thereof should be co-ordinated and not be on the basis of availability of cash to a particular department.
- (5) In summary it will be seen that the proposals seek to:

- (a) Utilize the total resources of the Church for the total programme of the Church and avoid the fragmentation of our funds which causes confusion, uncertainty, and loss of control.
- (b) Place responsibility on departments to determine their needs, both current and capital: and
- (c) Enable the Administrative Council, having determined what funds are available, to allocate the funds to meet the departments' needs, which are accepted as reasonable.

The Administrative Council desire to report that the attached budget estimates for 1962 and 1963 have been prepared on the assumption that the foregoing proposal will be adopted. They also desire to report that, in preparing the Budget for 1963, the suggestion of the General Board of Missions, that their estimate may be reduced \$60,000, has been gratefully accepted.

If this General Assembly in their wisdom see fit to adopt the above submitted proposals for a new financial policy for the Church, the Administrative Council jointly with the General Board of Missions can assure the Assembly and the Church that, beginning on July 1st, 1962, the basic stipend of our ministers will be raised from \$3,100.00 to \$3,900.00 per annum. If this is accomplished, it will be because of the ability, experience, diplomacy and seeming inexhaustible energy of our Acting-Comptroller — Rev. Basil Howell, coupled with the hearty and willing co-operation of all the Boards.

Instead of presenting one column of figures as in 1961, the Administrative Council present three columns as follows:

- 1. Actual gross expenditures in 1961 in the amount of \$1,824,446.00;
- 2. Suggested Authorized Expenditures for 1962 in the total of \$1,851,161.00; and
  - 3. Suggested Authorized Expenditures for 1963 in the total of \$1,940,690.00.

### Re Overseas Relief

The Authorized Expenditures do not include any sum for overseas relief, this being an undetermined amount wholly dependent on the sums designated for that purpose by the congregation over and above the minimum allocation. The amount received from any congregation designated for overseas relief will, nevertheless, be credited as part of their budget givings in the statistical reports published in the stitched minutes and the annual Acts and Proceedings of General Assemblies.

#### Joint Recommendation Council and General Board of Missions

 That the basic stipend of ministers be increased to \$3,900.00 per annum as of July 1, 1962.

#### Re Financial Matters

8. THAT, for the purpose of, (i) utilizing all the resources of the Church for the whole program of the Church and enabling the Administrative Council properly to allocate available funds to meet approved expenditures, and (ii) reflecting more accurately the income and expenditures of each year, and (iii) assuring more effectual control of moneys available and co-ordinating expenditures both on current account and capital account;

#### This Assembly enact:

- (a) THAT the annual budget for current expenditures shall state gross estimated income and the statement of Authorized Expenditures shall set forth the gross or maximum amounts which the respective spending boards and committees will have available for expenses. Gross estimated income will include, (i) budget receipts, (ii) revenue from sales of material, rentals etc., (iii) bequests and gifts available for current operations in accordance with section (b) of this resolution, and (iv) investment income and any other amounts available for current operations; and no deduction of estimated receipts will be made in fixing the amount available to the board or committee.
- (b) THAT the practice of placing gifts, bequests and income from investments at the discretion of certain spending boards shall be discontinued and these will be considered as part of the income of the Church except (i)

where the conditions contained in the instrument of bequest or gift do not permit this course to be followed or (ii) where the Administrative Council determines that any particular gift or bequest is to be reserved for a specified purpose. (Note: In explanation of this section of the resolution it is pointed out that bequests and gifts such as "for missions", "for overseas missions", "for work in Formosa" are of so general a nature that the terms of the bequest or gift are met if an amount equivalent to the bequest or gift is expended in the indicated area or for the indicated purpose. On the other hand where a bequest or gift is "for ministerial assistance", "for a scholarship" or for work in a new area or a type not presently being done or for a named specific project, the funds, of course, will be so applied. Likewise, where a bequest or gift is given for endowment funds or wording is used making it a capital fund, those moneys would not be available for current operations but the income from such funds would be available for current use subject to any contrary direction contained in the instrument of bequest or gift.)

- (c) THAT an annual budget of capital expenditures be established, and that for the years 1962, 1963 and 1964, capital expenditures for Home Missions and Overseas Missions will be provided by liquidating their respective reserve investments on hand at the end of the year 1961.
- (d) THAT the provisions of this resolution shall apply to the year 1962 and to subsequent years.
- (e) THAT all resolutions or directions in whatever form heretofore enacted which conflict with the provisions of this resolution are hereby rescinded.

# 9. Re Operation and Conduct of Assembly

- (a) That mimeographed copies of Overtures, reports and recommendations of Boards and Committees be sent out at least two weeks in advance of the opening date of the General Assembly to all Commissioners, Board Chairmen and Secretaries.
- (b) That the General Assembly elect a Moderator and Vice-moderator at the first sederunt of the General Assembly. The vice-moderator will be the nominee of that General Assembly to the office of Moderator of the following General Assembly. After the first year of implementation, presbyteries may nominate only to the office of vice-moderator.
- (c) That the first sederunt of the General Assembly be convened at 4 p.m.
- (d) That the order of business be:
  - A Acceptance of the Provisional Roll of Assembly
  - B The election of a moderator and vice moderator
  - C Calling for Synod Records
  - D The Report of the Committee on Business
  - E Other Business
  - F Adjournment
- (e) That the Second sederunt of the General Assembly be convened at 8 p.m.
- (f) That the order of business be:
  - A Public Worship
  - B Sermon by the moderator of the last Assembly
  - C Installation of the moderator-elect
  - D Thanks to the moderator of the last Assembly
  - E Adjournment
- (g) That the report of the moderator of the last General Assembly on his activities during the previous year be mimeographed and distributed to the commissioners instead of being presented orally.
- (h) That the observance of "Special Nights" be discontinued.

 That special presentations of the work of the Boards and Committees be given on Sunday.

# REPORT OF THE RECORD COMMITTEE

To the Venerable the 88th General Assembly:

We are happy to report an increase of 3,861 in circulation since last year. The total distribution at March 31st was 90,192 copies, of which 89,386 were paid subscriptions.

On our free list we provide for all missionaries and port workers, most hospital vistors and jail chaplains. We communicate with the major Presbyterian bodies throughout the world by sending the magazine to them. Chapels and chaplains in the armed forces are provided for at the Every Home Plan rate through an arrangement with general assembly's committee on chaplaincy services.

Adoption of the Every Home Plan under the incentive of a group discount was the chief reason for the new peak in circulation. When the price was raised to \$1.50 the individual subscriptions dropped from 29,000 to 10,800, but the gain on the Every Home Plan was over 22,000.

Vigorous mail promotion, together with a change in price, were responsible for the increase in subscriptions in 1962. Nevertheless, we depend upon the courts of the church to support our magazine in its effort to reach into all Presbyterian homes, and the editor will endeavour to keep in constant touch with all presbyteries and synods.

Ten years ago, in 1951, the circulation of *The Record* was 30,250; it has now tripled, to 90,192. Ten years ago *The Record* was supported by the budget funds of the church to the extent of \$5,000. Merely to keep pace with the tripled circulation the support this year should be \$15,000. Other heavy increases in the costs of printing, engraving and distribution have arisen during this ten year period as well.

Consequently, the committee has encountered grave budget problems in maintaining *The Record* at its present high level. The over-expenditure of \$9,788 in 1961 has exhausted the small reserve of prepaid subscriptions on which we have operated. The estimates for 1962 are shown, with the actual expenditures for 1961, on the attached statement so that the actual costs of operation can be studied.

It should be emphasized that no significant increase in advertising revenue can be anticipated, and that an increase in the subscription price would have a detrimental if not disastrous effect on circulation.

Your committee earnestly believe that *The Record* provides a unique service to the church that merits greater support from the general budget funds. We know of no church magazine in Canada or the United States which is not so supported. *The Record* requires less than 18 cents a subscription or about 1.6 cents a copy from the general budget funds to maintain its present level; whereas one Canadian church magazine requires 25 cents a subscription support this year, while another Canadian denominational paper will get 40 cents per subscription.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. That the Every Home Plan which has been approved by past general assemblies be again heartily endorsed as one of the best means of bringing the work of our church both at home and abroad to the attention of our people.
- 2. That this assembly recommend to each presbytery the presentation of the Every Home Plan to those congregations not already enrolled, at the annual meeting or at the time of the setting of the congregation's budget. Also, that

the congregation report what action has been taken to the clerk of presbytery, who will forward the information to the secretary of *The Record* committee.

3. That the general assembly recommend to presbyteries that established older congregations be encouraged to sponsor first year subscriptions to *The Presbyterian Record* in newly-organized churches.

# THE JARDINE MEMORIAL FUND

To the Venerable the 88th General Assembly:

The Fund was established under the will of the late Mr. James Jardine, a farmer residing near Schomberg, who died January 31, 1950. The terms of the trust are as follows:

"To pay over to The Presbyterian Church in Canada the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000) to set up a Fund to be known as "The Jardine Memorial Fund". This Fund to be subject to the control and administration of the Board of Administration of the said Presbyterian Church in Canada. The revenue of the Fund so constituted to be used by the said Board to relieve worthy cases of distress and misfortune happening to ministers of the said Presbyterian Church in Canada, through ill health, age, infirmity, or other misfortune."

This Fund has been of very great assistance to many of our ministers who have fallen on days of misfortune. Careful investigation in each case has revealed a need for help which can be forthcoming without the embarrassment consequent upon publicity. This Fund is administered on the scriptural principle that the left hand is not to know what the right hand is doing. By reason of the generosity of the donor much good has been accomplished. We thank God and take courage,

## THE COMMITTEE ON INTER-CHURCH RELATIONS

To the Venerable the 88th General Assembly:

From November 19 to December 5, 1961, the third assembly of the World Council of Churches met in New Delhi, India. Rev. Dr. E. H. Johnson and the Rev. S. B. Coles were our official delegates. Miss Patricia Hanna was a member of the Canadian youth delegation, and the Rev. DeCourcy H. Rayner attended as an accredited press correspondent.

It was surely in the providence of God that in an age of international and interracial tensions 197 churches in 60 countries sent participants to an assembly where the central theme was "Jesus Christ, the Light of the World". The third assembly will be remembered as the occasion on which the International Missionary Council was officially integrated with the World Council of Churches as

part of the Division of World Mission and Evangelism. The new basis of membership was accepted after careful study by the Faith and Order Commission and the Central Committee. The basis now reads:

"The World Council of Churches is a fellowship of churches which confess the Lord Jesus Christ as God and Saviour according to the Scriptures and therefore seek to fulfil together their common calling to the glory of one God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit."

At New Delhi 23 new members were accepted, 11 of them from Africa, and two from Pentecostal churches in Chile. Four of the new members are Orthodox churches from behind the iron curtain, including the Orthodox church of Russia which claims some 50 million members. As the official message from the third assembly noted, the fellowship is now wider, with considerable numbers and strength coming from the ancient Orthodox tradition of eastern Christendom, and from Africa, Asia, Latin America and other parts of the world, a demonstration of the universal character of the church.

The Presbyterian Church in Canada is involved in the ongoing work of the World Council of Churches, not merely through the contribution made each year to Inter-church Aid and Refugee Relief, but in participation by some of our leaders. Rev. Dr. E. H. Johnson is the chairman of the Department of Missionary Studies of the new Commission on World Mission and Evangelism. As such he is a member, ex-officio, of the central committee of the World Council of Churches. Professor David W. Hay of Knox College and Professor W. J. Farris have been named to the Commission on Faith and Order. This Commission's next meeting will be held in Montreal in July, 1963.

#### WORLD PRESBYTERIAN ALLIANCE

Principal J. S. Glen led a delegation of five to the North American Council of the World Presbyterian Alliance in Atlantic City in January. The 19th General Council of the Alliance will be held in Frankfurt, Germany, August 3-13, 1964 when the study theme will be "Come, Creator Spirit". Once again the Alliance quarterly, The Reformed and Presbyterian World, is commended to our people. Sample copies may be obtained through the secretary of this committee.

#### THE CANADIAN COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

The biennial meeting of the Canadian Council of Churches, of which Prof. David W. Hay is president, will be held November 5-8 of this year in York-minster Park Baptist Church, Toronto. Co-operation through the Council reaches into many phases of church life in Canada, and Presbyterians have shared in the work of all its departments and committees.

The proposal to create a Canadian ecumenical centre, in co-operation with the Canadian School of Missions in Toronto, has been given the approval of member churches and will become effective June 1, 1963. By-laws to govern the operation of the new joint venture have been framed and an interim board has been set up to bring it into being.

#### INVITATION FROM THE UNITED PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, USA

At the last general assembly it was decided to send three observers from The Presbyterian Church in Canada to sit in with the churches in the United States of America which are discussing what is generally known as the Dr. Eugene Carson Blake proposal for church union. It was felt that by the nature of its witness and because of its experience in the past, our church might have something worthwhile to contribute to such discussions. The moderator of the 87th general assembly named our representatives as follows: Rev. Dr. Neil G. Smith, Rev. Prof. D. W. Hay and Mr. C. M. Pitts; alternates: Miss Mary Whale, Rev. Dr. A. Lorne MacKay and Rev. Principal Robert Lennox.

### FRATERNAL RELATIONS

Our committee has been represented at the synod of the Reformed Church of

France and at a number of Presbyterian general assemblies overseas by the Rev. Dr. J. A. Munro. The usual correspondence with sister communions has been carried on and there have been some private contacts with members of a reformed church with a view to closer co-operation.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

- That the general assembly hear the two official delegates of our church to the third assembly of the World Council of Churches in New Delhi, Rev. Dr. E. H. Johnson and Rev. S. B. Coles.
- 2. That the general assembly refer to the Committee on Articles of Faith the findings of the New Delhi assembly, particularly regarding witness, service and unity, for study and report.
- 3. That the general assembly remind our people in Canada of the meeting of the Faith and Order Commission in Montreal in 1963 and of the Central Committee of the World Council of Churches in the United States of America the same year, and that presbyteries be asked to make preparatory study of the faith and order issues.
- 4. That the general assembly recommended to presbyteries and sessions that the congregations of our church be urged to make full use in study groups of the printed materials coming from the third assembly of the World Council of Churches.

# BOARD OF STEWARDSHIP AND BUDGET REPORT TO 1962 GENERAL ASSEMBLY

We are pleased to report a new record total of \$1,735,000.00 in General Assembly Budget contributions for 1961, an increase of 7% over the 1960 total. During the past 10 years, our church has increased its Budget support by an average of \$100,000.00 per year or a total of 290%.

As soon as the 1961 total was reported from the Treasurer's Office, our Board requested the Moderator, Dr. Robert Taylor, to issue a pastoral letter to all the congregations to thank the members for their splendid support.

The following table sets forth some details of the 1961 givings in comparison with the previous year.

The Board is pleased to report the above facts, but we do not believe the church should be satisfied. Our Church is able to reach higher levels of giving.

### STEWARDSHIP RESPONSIBILITY ANALYSIS

Notwithstanding the praiseworthy annual increases in Budget support, and in spite of the fact that in every congregation there are some deeply concerned and sacrificial givers, several facts indicate that on the whole, our Church has a poorly developed sense of stewardship responsibility. Consider:—

- 1. The fact that over one third (396 out of 1,161) of the congregations decreased their Budget givings in 1961. If the decreases had come from aid-receiving charges, we could attribute them to the reduction in grants of last July, but this has not been the case. There is no discernable reason to explain the decreases.
- 2. SELF ALLOCATION Reports from Presbytery Conveners indicate that 177 congregations set their own objective for Budget at a figure higher than the Basic Scale. 462 accepted the Basic Scale. 348 congregations refused the Basic Scale and set themselves a lower objective which is self-allocation of an unhealthy nature. 174 congregations made no report.
- 3. EVERY PERSON VISITATION ACTIVITY Reports from Presbytery Conveners show that approximately 219 out of total 1,161 congregations conducted some sort of Every Persons Visitation in 1961. Our records show that 76 congregations participated in Sector Projects last year.

We know that the annual E.P.V. is the best way to inform the people about the work the church is doing. We know that increased giving is the result of increased interest. Yet, despite over twelve years of urging about one half of our congregations have not yet attempted such a visitation.

#### 4. USE OF PROMOTIONAL MATERIALS

No. of congregations using some promotional material—514, i.e. more than half the congregations are not being given the opportunity to learn about the programmes of the church under General Assembly direction.

5. The low rate per member for both Budget and for all church purposes means that we can easily do better. Moreover, the percentage of money given to others (13.7%) out of total amount raised indicates that our concern for others can hardly be said to be vigorous.

These facts reveal that our stewardship sense needs to be sharpened. Furthermore, it is almost certain that poor church support is indicative of faulty stewardship in other areas of life. Poor givers are as a rule extravagant livers. In our affluent economy there are many enticements of questionable worth to drain away discretionary income, which fact makes it the more imperative for Christians to show an example of economic orderliness, and sense of proportion.

Convinced that the responsibility for healing this disease of spiritual arteriosclerosis lies with the Kirk Sessions, the Board has moved in two ways to assist the elders. For one thing, we have issued a Handbook for the guidance of Presbytery Committees in their work with the Kirk Sessions, and secondly,

we have co-operated in the production of a year round Stewardship booklet written for the guidance of congregational leaders. As opportunity offers conferences are held with Synod and Presbytery Committees to discuss the practical application of the ideas in these two booklets,

#### MATERIALS

- 1. WEEKLY BULLETINS The demand for these seems to be increasing. We now print 55,000 for each regular issue, plus 10,000 to 25,000 extra for Thanksgiving, Christmas and Easter, and special issues for Communion Services and Anniversary Services. Bulletin distribution 3,068,000. 375,000 of this total are given free of charge to aid-receiving congregations.
- 2. Other materials distributed:

3. New Stewardship Film — In co-operation with the Stewardship Department

3. New Stewardship Film — In co-operation with the Stewardship Department of the National Council of Churches, U.S.A., we are able to provide for rental a new stewardship film entitled "The Gift". This will be available in September.

### SINGLE, DUPLEX AND TRIPLEX ENVELOPES

The Board wishes to re affirm its recommendation that congregations continue to use Duplex or Triplex envelopes, especially since these are now being made available in single pocket form but with Duplex or Triplex printing. We strongly urge Kirk Sessions to insist that the printing on the Budget section include mention of the variety of work which is financed from Budget funds. We would further urge that congregations consider giving a proportion of loose collection to Budget, perhaps 50%.

#### 1962 BUDGET OBJECTIVE

In accordance with the long range plan adopted in 1959 to seek for a Budget income of \$2,000,000.00 by 1964, this Assembly will need to approve of an objective for 1962 of \$2,140,000.00. In order to divide this sum equitably amongst the congregations, the Board proposes to alter the Basic Scale which has been in use for a number of years by changing Part A from \$5.00 per member to \$5.50. Part B which is a sliding scale percentage of the amount spent for ordinary congregational purposes will remain unchanged.

#### SECTOR PLANS FOR 1962

Although there has been a reduction in the number of congregations of all denominations, participating in Sector Projects, the Stewardship Committee of the Canadian Council of Churches has authorized the Sector Plan Committee to operate projects next autumn in any community in Canada where at least five congregations will join. The materials will be available, as in previous years, for congregations wishing to carry out a solo visitation. The Board is strongly of the opinion that visitations will prove to be disappointing unless the four basic principles of the Sector Plan are observed. We base our opinion on the evidence of some who have tried short-cuts, and verily they have had their reward.

Because we believe that the only way to get money is to ask for it, and because we believe that money should be asked for in the right way, we are again urging Kirk Sessions to begin immediately to plan an every person visitation for this autumn, and to make this a regular annual feature in the life of the congregation.

#### YOUTH STEWARDSHIP

The Board is studying the importance of good stewardship training for the children and youth.

#### PRE ASSEMBLY CONGRESS

The Board had presented to the Administrative Council a proposal for a Pre Assembly Congress for 1964, but withdrew the recommendation on learning that the W.M.S. (W.D.) is planning a special observance of its one hundredth Anniversary in May of 1964 in the City of Montreal. However, we believe our Church would be greatly helped in a variety of ways by another Pre Assembly Congress.

### RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. That the General Assembly recommend to Kirk Sessions that an Annual stewardship visitation, using a commitment card, be made in every congregation, preferably in the autumn of the year; and that Presbyteries be urged to see that this recommendation is considered by the Kirk Sessions of their bounds; and further that Presbyteries inform the congregations of the advantages of doing the E.P.V. under the Sector Plan.
- 2. That Presbyteries be instructed to explain to all congregations, within their bounds, the importance of regular and preferably monthly remittances of Budget money to the Treasurer's Office.
- 3. That the Stewardship and Budget Board be authorized to prepare allocations to the Synods on the basis of the Budget objective for 1962 as approved by this Assembly; and that the data developed in making the Allocations to Synods be supplied to the Presbyteries as "Suggested Allocations" for the congregations: and that Presbyteries take steps to see that these Suggested Allocations are presented to the congregations.
- 4. That the General Assembly renew to congregations its recommendation of the use of the Duplex envelope, and that where the Triplex envelope is used, congregations make sure that the detail explaining the use of Budget Funds be printed on the General Assembly Budget section.
- 5. That Kirk Sessions secure from the Stewardship and Budget Department the booklet "Year Round Stewardship Programme", and endeavour to integrate the suggestions contained therein into the congregational programme.
- 6. That Kirk Sessions be urged to see that a proportion of the loose offerings be voted to the General Assembly Budget by the congregations.
- 7. That the General Assembly record its thanks to:
  - (a) the Presbytery Conveners, ministers and office bearers throughout the church for their work in supporting and promoting the General Assembly's Budget.
  - (b) to the Counsellors and Directors of Sector Projects in which Presbyterian Congregations were assisted in 1961.
  - (c) to Miss Jean Brown, who served the church faithfully and capably for nine years as Editorial Assistant in the Stewardship and Budget Department, and assure her of our good wishes in whatever work she may assume.

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON HISTORY

To the Venerable the 88th General Assembly:

The Committee on History met twice during the year, in October, 1961, and March, 1962.

The following were among the special anniversaries observed during the year: the 100th anniversary of Knox Church, Harriston; Knox Church, Kintyre; Argyle Church, Crinan; St. Andrew's, Ross Township, and New Westminster, B.C.; 108th, St. Peter's, Madoc; 110th, St. Andrew's, Southampton; 121st, Kenyon Church, Dunvegan; 125th, Boularderie, N.S.; 168th, St. Paul's, Simcoe, and 175th, First Church, Pictou. Among new churches opened were St. Paul's, Cornerbrook, Newfoundland; Albion Gardens, Toronto; Grace Church, Etobicoke; and St. Michel, Quebec. It would be appreciated if Orders of Service or commemorative booklets issued in connection with the observance of special anniversaries or the opening of new churches could be sent to the convener or secretary of this committee for inclusion in the church's archives.

In the ten year period between 1950 and 1960 there were 124 new congregations established. From the painful experience of older congrgations which so often have difficulty in verifying circumstances concerning their early history it would appear desirable that these newly established congregations and others take pains in the preservation of historical records and documents. One means to this end would be the appointment of a congregational historian or historical committee to compile a congregational scrap-book or collect and preserve notices from the press, photographs, bulletins, or other items which may be useful in future years in tracing the development of the congregation and its organizations.

We would express our thanks to those Kirk-Sessions in the Synod of Hamilton and London and in the Synod of Toronto and Kingston which cooperated with the Ontario Historical Society in the microfilming of historical records prior to 1900. Through this project, carried out without cost to the church, the records of many of our older congregations in Western and Central Ontario are now conveniently available for historical research.

At its meeting last June the Presbyterian Historical Society, realizing that it could accomplish little that could not be done by the Historical Committee, agreed to disband, and requested the Historical Committee to continue the publication of its Historical Newsletter. At its October meeting the Committee appointed Rev. T. M. Bailey of Hamilton as Editor of the Newsletter, and one number has been issued.

Some of the material forwarded during the year for inclusion in the Archives was sent directly to the Archivist, and some to the Library at Knox College. These materials have been catalogued and added to our collection. Items may continue to be sent to the Archivist, Neil G. Smith, Glasgow Station, Ont., or to the Archives, c/o The Library, Knox College, Toronto. In response to an enquiry from one of the Boards of the church a tentative arrangement has been worked out for the "sealing" for a period of years of materials which it is desirable to preserve but which it would not be desirable to have open to public scrutiny. It is suggested that a period of forty years be set for such "closed" materials, and that at the expiration of the closed period such materials be treated as other materials in the collection.

The year 1963 will mark the 400th anniversary of the compilation of the Heidelberg Catechism. In view of the widespread influence of this statement of the Reformed faith it would be appropriate to make special reference to the Catechism and recommend study of its statements in the anniversary year. It may also be noted that the filmstrip, "Ring the Jubilee", with sound recording, and the filmstrip on the work of John Knox, with script, are still available for use in congregations.

For many years the committee has noted that many Presbytery Historical Committees while regularly appointed year by year, have not been active in forwarding items of historical interest to the Synod conveners. The Synod committees, accordingly, have often had little to work on in the presentation of their reports, or in reporting to the Assembly's committee. It is hoped that our first recommendation may be a means towards the righting of this situation.

The centennial of Confederation in Canada will be commemorated in 1967. A committee of the Canadian Council of Churches is giving consideration to a number of projects through which the churches may give recognition to this significant landmark in Canadian history. A committee of our church, composed chiefly of members of the Committee on History is preparing to recommend a number of projects for use in our own churches. It is desirable that such observances of the centennial of Confederation should not only encourage thanksgiving for, and pride in, our Canadian heritage, but should also encourage and stimulate the church to play a worthy part in the building of the Canada of tomorrow.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. That Presbytery Historical Committees be requested to exercise diligence in collecting and forwarding to the Conveners of the Synod Historical Committees information concerning special anniversaries, the erection of new congregations, the opening and dedication of new churches, and other items of historical interest, and in forwarding to the Archives of the church, bulletins, brochures, booklets, or other items prepared to mark occasions of historical significance.
- 2. That Kirk-Sessions be urged to exercise diligence in the preservation of church records, and in the preservation of materials which may be useful in tracing the history of the congregation and its organizations.
- 3. That an allocation of five hundred dollars be made available to the Committee on History in 1963.

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS

To the Venerable the 88th General Assembly:

The 87th General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada set up a composite committee to be called the Committee on International Affairs and charged the Committee with two duties:

- (1) To act as a Liaison Committee with the Canadian Council of Churches Committee on International Affairs.
- (2) To work on a statement of function and relationships covering the work of this Committee.

The 87th General Assembly also approved a method of appointment of this Committee which is set forth in the minutes of that Assembly.

During the year, the Committee co-operated with the Committee of the Canadian Council of Churches in planning and sponsoring a Churchmen's Seminar on International Affairs which was held in Ottawa on February 8-9, 1962. This

Seminar was attended by the members of the Committee and by several of our ministers in the Presbytery of Ottawa which provided for a useful exchange of viewpoints between the churches represented and various departments of Government such as — Immigration and Foreign affairs.

The Committee held one meeting at which its function and relationships was discussed and it was felt that for the present, the Committee could discharge its duties adequately if continued in existence in the form authorized by the 87th General Assembly.

#### Recommendation:

(1) THAT the Committee be granted a budget of \$220.00 for 1962.

# WORLD PRESBYTERIAN ALLIANCE North American Area

To the Venerable the 88th General Assembly:

There were two themes in particular which occupied the mind of the North American Area Council of the World Presbyterian Alliance which met in Atlantic City, New Jersey, January 16-18. These were the Catholicity of the Reformed Tradition and Religious and Civil Liberty. The former is the subject of study in preparation for the meeting of the general council of the World Alliance in Frankfurt, Germany, in 1964. The latter is the subject of concern due to the emergence of extreme right wing political and religious groups in the United States. There were other items of interest like the report of the committee on the new translation into English of the Heidelberg Catechism and ecumenical developments in America and elsewhere but these two themes were predominant.

The first is of interest chiefly because of its importance in relation to the nature of Christian unity, which is a problem widely discussed in all churches at the present time both Protestant and Roman Catholic. The ecumenical interest has stimulated it. But the interest in confessionalism which balances as it were the trend toward unity by emphasizing the particularity of the christian faith has also stimulated it. In recognition of the fact that one of the significant features of the present era is the revitalization of the great confessional bodies, Reformed churchmen are obliged to consider the contribution of their tradition to the meaning of catholicity. It is all the more important to know where they stand in relation to the recent interest of the Roman Catholic church in ecumenicity. The first evening of the council was devoted to a workshop on this theme with the delegates divided into small discussion groups. The next morning reports were heard from each.

The second theme is of a more immediate challenge because it draws attention to certain dangerous tendencies in America which if not restrained could become as serious for the churches of all communions as similar tendencies were for the European churches during the thirties and forties. It was somewhat surprising to witness a shift of concern by the committee on civil and religious liberty from the racial problem in the southern United States to that of the extreme right wing political and religious bodies. Since the position represented by these bodies is seen as constituting a threat to the institutions that preserve our democratic and christian heritage—the church, the courts of law, the schools and government—it is important that we exercise vigilance.

The delegates attending the meeting of the Council from the Presbyterian Church in Canada were: Rev. Charles Cochrane, Dr. J. Lewis McLean, Dr. Hugh Davidson, Principal Robert Lennox and Principal J. Stanley Glen.

The new president, succeeding Rev. Dr. H. Shaw Scates of Memphis, Tennessee, is Dr. Glen Harris, Birmingham, Michigan, representing the United Presbyterian Church, U.S.A. The next meeting of the North American Council will be held in Lancaster, Pennsylvania, January 15-17th.

# REPORT ON THE AUDIO-VISUAL COMMITTEE

To the Venerable the 88th General Assembly:

The year 1961 showed steady progress in the work and development of the Audio-Visual Committee through each of its four Divisions:

#### LIBRARY SERVICES

A survey taken indicated that during the year 1961 more than forty thousand persons in our Church were involved in the use of audio-visual materials rented from our library. The number of individual orders during the year was 3,230. Reports show an increasing interest in this medium of communicating and furthering the work of the church. A significant factor in the development of the library was the actual number of sales of filmstrip kits and equipment.

#### TRAINING SERVICES

During the year we again co-operated with other Protestant Denominations and the Roman Catholic Church in continuing a definite program of training for our ministers and Church leaders. Seminars and Workshops on the use of Radio and Television were conducted in Edmonton, Toronto and other major centres. In addition to this, individual and group instruction was provided through the department for ministers, theological students and other leaders in the Church.

#### PRODUCTION SERVICES

Work was completed on the production of the sound, colour filmstrips, "Mission to a Minority" and "Guiana Tempo", a timely report of the work of our Church in Japan and British Guiana. Both of these productions have been received enthusiastically and are being widely used. Production was initiated on three further filmstrips presenting our work in India and Formosa for release in the fall of 1962.

#### BROADCASTING SERVICES

During 1961 sample program tapes for the new "Teen-Time" radio series were sent out to one hundred and twenty Radio Stations across Canada. The results were most encouraging, with many stations requesting that the program be released immediately. The series, sponsored by the Presbyterian Young Peoples Society, is now completely taped and edited, and ready for broadcasting. In co-operation with Presbyterian Men, plans were developed to produce two sample programs for a laymens series of broadcasts to be distributed to the Radio Stations across Canada.

#### FINANCIAL REPORT

Lack of funds has again limited the efforts of the Audio-Visual Committee in carrying out the work and responsibilities assigned to it.

#### RECOMMENDATION

 That the Boards and Committees of the Church be asked to include within their budgets a realistic amount to cover the cost of their requirements in the use of audio-visuals.

# THE COMMITTEE ON THE LAITY

To the Venerable the 88th General Assembly:

The Committee on the Laity presents this brief report of its activities and plans in terms of certain questions, frequently asked, which lead to a consideration of our central concern.

"WHY DO WE HAVE A COMMITTEE ON THE LAITY?"

Back of this lies the fundamental question: what is the ministry of the laity? The Committee was established by the General Assembly out of the concern of its programme boards and teaching institutions for the full-time ministry of all the members of Christ's Body, especially as related to their vocation in the world. Its task springs from the conviction that Christ carries out His ministry and mission essentially through all His people, not primarily through the clergy; that it is essentially a ministry and mission within the word, not only within the church.

Do we really believe in this essential ministry of the laity? The boards and colleges, church courts and congregational organizations are designed to foster Christian nurture and outreach, but they constantly face the temptation to minister to the church rather than to the world, to hear God's voice in the demands of the church rather than in the cries of the world. The church should grow and prosper, programmes should show success, the institutions should flourish, church extension and missionary projects should "pay off". But what about the world — the world of industry and finance, work and play, politics, science and culture? How are the members of our congregations being trained and equipped to show Christ's glory in their worldly calling?

Out of concern for the ministry and mission of the church in these strategic areas of life, the Assembly's boards and colleges joined together for study and action within the committee on the laity.

The following paragraph from the New Delhi report of the Department of the Laity highlights this issue in terms of the Assembly theme, "Jesus Christ the Light of the World."

#### REFLECTING THE LIGHT

"Christ the Light did not remain outside the world to illumine it from above, but entered into human life, conquered the darkness and radiates light from within. This says to us that wherever we are in the world, God is there before us—the light is already there. The responsibility of the laity is to serve as reflecting mirrors or focusing lenses, to beam the light into all parts of the life of the world. Every Christian, carrying out his work as a ministry and using his

particular gifts and the opportunities afforded him, can bring the light of God's truth to bear in the world where he is, where dilemmas are faced and difficult decisions made. Clouded or obscured as the light is by the darkness of human sin, 'the darkness has not overcome it'. There is too often a wrong distinction between the 'religious' and the 'secular'. A negative concept of the secular as a place where the darkness does not shine, could close the Church in a ghetto of their own making. It is necessary to affirm, by word and deed, the fact that all creation is God's, the theatre of His judgment and mercy and glory."

Do we really believe that God's theatre is all creation, or do we think that it is only the church and the sanctuary? Do we accept the doctrine that Christ's mission is carried out through the daily vocations of the laity? Is this doctrine Presbyterian? Is the world-wide interest in the ministry of the laity a modern fad, or a fresh awareness of New Testament truth?

The committee believes that the doctrine of the ministry and mission of the laity is essential to the Biblical understanding of the nature of the Church. Taken seriously what can this mean to the effective witness of the church through its members who live and work in the whole of society? What changes are required in the present patterns and programmes of church life in order that the laity may be fully equipped for their Christian service in the world?

Within the context of these and similar questions the committee has the duty, by research and experimentation, to study the implications of lay ministry, and to present plans for appropriate action. In this, we are grateful to know that we are not alone. For example: Conferences in 1961 by the Board of Evangelism and Social Action and the General Board of Missions on occupational evangelism and missionary obedience dealt with the same central question; the training programme of Presbyterian Men (in which our Secretary has given assistance) is for the same purpose; the Women's Missionary Society, W.D., sponsors two training centres each year to equip women for their mission; the Board of Christian Education has initiated an inter-board study of the meaning of Christian nurture for the whole church. All of these boards are partners in the committee on the laity. For its own part, the committee has assigned high priority to a research project on the theological education of the laity. The E. W. McNeill Foundation, as an arm of the committee, has challenged us to study a question full of portent for our affluent corporation-structured society: "How can the Christian faith be related in a transforming way to the fact of economic power?" Study groups at the Caledon Farm and elsewhere have probed into various aspects of the Christian mission.

# "WHAT IS A LAY CENTRE?"

The obvious answer to this frequent question is that every parish is a lay centre. Do our parishes understand themselves this way? Are our congregations usually centres where Christians are training to minister to the world? Are they not rather places where Christians come simply to be ministered unto, or at best to minister to fellow-believers? Are not the majority of congregational activities designed to support the church's ministry to itself? Do not many so-called "missions" really intend the preservation of the church, rather than the salvation of the world? If the field is truly the world, why do congregational lay centres spend so little time considering the world and what God is doing in it?

Two or three Christians who meet in a home or a factory to seek God's will, may be engaged in lay training of a decisive sort.

"God so loved the world, . . ." To serve that love, we too must love the world, study it, listen to it, learn from it, live in it, and bring God's Word to bear on every nook and cranny of it.

To serve such a task, a laboratory is needed. That is the reason why we have recently (through the instrumentality of the McNeill Foundation) purchased the Horseshoe Farm, Caledon Township, Ontario. We realize that it is only a beginning, a pilot-type national Lay Centre, yet we envision it as a

break-through development for the work and renewal of the whole church. We have given much thought as to the basic understanding, the purpose, which must be at the heart of a Lay Centre, for use both by church and by non-church groups. Here we hope there will be study in depth which will lead to a better understanding of lay training throughout the church.

"How does the whole church participate in these concerns?"

This question is pressed especially by those from east and west, to whom reports of conferences and lay centres in Ontario mean little. It also comes from small town and rural congregations who feel remote from the problems of the church in the great urban centres where committee activities are most evident. Yet there are ways in which the whole church may take part.

At the Presbytery and congregational levels. Here we can encourage our church courts and congregational organizations to face the world; to engage in conversation with it, not merely to preach at it behind its back; to listen to what it says, believing that God may be busier in it than inside church walls; to examine our churchly life and activity to see whether or not it is of any use at all in serving Christ's mission, and to act courageously in the light of what God shows us.

Through this Committee. We are anxious to communicate with our brethren throughout the country. We want to hear about study groups and experiments which deal with such matters as the church in relation to economic power, labour-management, vocational problems and opportunities for Christian witness. We are in touch with lay centres and lay experiments in various parts of the world. We have relevant literature to recommend, including materials useful for study groups and study projects. Where a need is uncovered for creative experiment in encounter with the world—the results being quite unpredictable—it is possible that we may be free to act for you when other channels are not easily available.

Through our Secretary. The Secretary is available to give help, particularly with projects and programmes relating to Christian witness to "secular" concerns. As Secretary of Lay Studies he is crucially involved with the "Caledon Laboratory", and with experiments in any part of the church. The committee and the secretary are ready also to work with those throughout the church who seek to understand the meaning of Christ's Lordship in the midst of worldly powers, and with those who are trying to experiment in new ways of equipping the laity for their ministry and mission.

# REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON RECRUITMENT FOR FULL TIME SERVICE

To the Venerable the 88th General Assembly:

The Committee on Recruitment for Full Time Service held two meetings and various sub-committee meetings during the past year. It is difficult to ascertain the effects of our efforts as we seem to be dealing with intangible factors which only time can evaluate. The issue of Recruitment is a crucial one and there seems to be no magic formula for its solution. In the efforts of the Committee to analyse the difficulties we have realized that more and more emphasis must be placed in the homes of our people regarding the relevancy of the Church and its Mission in the world. In the kind of world in which we are living, which

seems to emphasize material success, scientific achievements and space conquest as being more important than moral and spiritual values, there is urgent need for more zealous commitment on the part of professed Christians and a more determined effort in keeping our people and particularly the young people informed and challenged concerning the mission and place of the Church. We must in our homes and congregations present an environment that makes our young people aware of the necessity for a dynamic and courageous witness. Young people will not be attracted by a watered down challenge nor a luke warm Church. The kind of image we older ones are presenting is an important factor in the thinking and evaluation of Christian service.

The role of the laity is a vital one in Recruitment. We rejoice in the increased part the laymen of the Church are taking in the life of the Church, but we also urge them to take a personal interest in this vital area of recruitment and wherever possible keep before our people the matter of full time service.

Because your committee feels there is need for more serious planning of our programme of recruitment, and because we are not fully aware of our complete function and policy as a committee and because the cultural, sociological and theological aspects of recruitment require further clarification, a sub-committee has been appointed to make a thorough-going study and report.

No new recruitment pamphlets were published this year, but the one published last year is still in demand and has been widely used in church schools and young peoples' societies as well as on Career Days in many High Schools. The various Boards of the Church have published some fine pieces of literature which include the area of recruitment, helping to round out the total picture of the Church's work and needs. Much literature is available from other sources, and names of these sources can be secured on inquiry to this committee.

Articles on Recruitment appeared on the Back page of the February Record, and in two of the weekly Calendars issued at the Church Offices and these were widely circularized and well received throughout the Church.

The 1962 Choir Tour has received three hundred dollars from our committee and some 20 churches and 10 high schools were visited. Three radio broadcasts were made and one telecast reaching several thousands of listeners and viewers.

The last General Assembly granted us permission to participate in meetings of the Committee on Christian Vocations of the Canadian Council of Churches. In October at Five Oaks a Consultation on Recruitment is being held at which there will be an interchange of ideas, problems, methods and literature. A study of the role of Committees on Recruitment and the basic principles underlying the Biblical interpretation of Vocation and Ministry will also be included. Your committee has been asked to send three representatives.

Appeals for men and women for the service of the Church has been made at Young People's Camps and Rallies and we are grateful for the interest in this matter taken by the National Young People's Society and the Synodical and Presbytery Young People's Societies.

We beg leave to present the following recommendations:

- 1. That the Committees of the Presbyteries dealing with Recruitment endeavour to have our Church's programme and needs presented at Career Days held in the various High Schools throughout the country.
- 2. That each Minister and Elder make Recruitment a matter of personal prayer and be on the alert for likely young people for the full time service of the Church.
- 3. That Kirk Sessions endeavour to have presented periodically to the Church School and Youth Organizations of the Church, as well as in the homes, the need for dedicated full time workers in all branches of the Church's Mission.

# PENMARVIAN HOUSE COMMITTEE

To the Venerable the 88th General Assembly:

Penmarvian is situated in the Town of Paris, Ontario on the banks of the Grand River. It is the gift of the late Mr. John Penman to the Presbyterian Church in Canada and has been used for a home for retired Ministers and their dependents. Penmarvian derives its running expenses from the fees paid by the guests, interest derived from the Trust Fund; legacies devoted to the support of the home, gifts from congregations, groups and individuals and a small Authorized Expenditure from the Budget Funds of the Church.

The Committee endeavour to keep the property in a good state of repair. Extensive new electric wiring has taken place and more is to be done in 1962. The residence is to be connected by water mains to the new sewage system being installed by the municipal authorities. These expenditures have not been a charge on the budget funds of the Church as Penmarvian has been fortunate in receiving two legacies, a portion of which has been used and a further portion will be used to effect these necessary improvements.

The Committee would like to take this opportunity of thanking Miss Mary Watson, the Superintendent, and her associates, for another year of service to the Church.

# THE DR. EPHRAIM SCOTT BENEVOLENT FUND

To the Venerable the 88th General Assembly:

The Fund was established in 1932 in the form of a Trust under the Will of the late Dr. Ephraim Scott, Moderator of the 1925 General Assembly, "to be used to relieve cases of distress and misfortune happening to ministers of The Presbyterian Church in Canada or their families through ill-health or misfortunes especially in case where the amounts available from other funds of the said Church are insufficient to provide adequate relief, or are not available".

A committee of three ministers and the Chairman of the Pension Board administer the Fund. The Committee endeavour to carry on their work on the scriptural principle that the left hand is not to know what the right hand is doing.

Amounts from this Fund are paid monthly to several beneficiaries. Though not large, these benefits have brought comfort and assistance to these faithful servants of the Church whose circumstances are quite straitened. The Administrative Council has been good enough to set aside a small Authorized Expenditure which has assured the Committee of a support beyond the income derived from the Trust. We are grateful to those ladies and gentlemen who through their gifts in their life time or through their wills have shown their interest in the great work of mercy which is continually being carried forward through the operation of this Fund.

# BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

To the Venerable the 88th General Assembly:

In presenting its report to the eighty-eighth General Assembly your Board acknowledges with deep gratitude the work of the Holy Spirit which is manifested in many ways throughout the Church. The Board is deeply aware of the growing concern for the recovery of Christian teaching. This is one of the ministries which Jesus Christ gives to His Church in order that all who believe in Him may be brought to a mature faith, and equipped to take their place in a full and responsible way in the Church's mission and service to the world. The Board seeks only to serve this teaching ministry.

The Board wishes to introduce to the General Assembly two servants who have been appointed this year. Miss Mabel Booth is the National Secretary for Children's Work, succeeding Miss Ada Adams who resigned in August 1961 to become the Dean of Students of Ewart College. Miss Helen Tetley, B.A., M.R.E., is the National Secretary for Teenage Work and succeeds Miss Margaret MacNaughton who resigned in 1959. The Board believes that our Church is fortunate to have such experienced and competent persons to serve as national secretaries

in these very important areas of work. Miss Booth is on the staff of the Women's Missionary Society, W.D., and serves the Board of Christian Education in children's work. The Board wishes to express its gratitude to the Society for the services of Miss Booth and the Regional Secretaries who work in each Synod of the Church.

#### CHRISTIAN NURTURE FOR THE WHOLE CHURCH

The General Assembly in 1960 authorized the Board to undertake a programme of study and research for the development of a new curriculum for The Presbyterian Church in Canada. The Board has been pursuing this study with diligence. Early in 1961 the Board became convinced that any new curriculum must be for the whole church and not just for the Sunday church school. It became clear that such a curriculum must seek to preserve the wholeness and unity of the Gospel and the full dimensions of the Christian faith for every member of the Church. The Board realized that this is a task which must include all of the programme Boards and Committees of the General Assembly, the Colleges and the Women's Missionary Societies. To explore this further, the Board invited the secretaries of the Boards and Committees, of the Women's Missionary Society, W.D., and the Principals of Knox and Ewart Colleges, "to discuss the development of a curriculum embracing all aspects of the church's work, for all the people of the Church."

Seven consultations have been held and ten study papers have been prepared and discussed. A report of the consultations was agreed upon and has been sent to the Boards and Committees inviting comment and requesting them to indicate whether they are prepared to enter officially upon the further development of this project. At the time of writing this report, the Board of Evangelism and Social Action, the General Board of Missions and the Board of Christian Education have replied in the affirmative. A full report of the consultations is being made to the Planning Committee of the Administrative Council.

The Board of Christian Education believes that this project is one of the most significant developments which have taken place on an inter-Board level in our Church. It is hoped that Synods, Presbyteries and congregations will soon be able to share more fully in the development of it. The Board believes that it is of such value to the whole Church that it merits priority of consideration, of leadership and of financial support so that it will be able to move ahead quickly.

#### THE SUNDAY CHURCH SCHOOL

As directed by the General Assembly in 1960, the Board has prepared and carried forward a programme of interpretation and training to assist Synods, Presbyteries and Kirk-sessions to implement the action of the General Assembly in approving the Christian Faith and Life curriculum for use in the nursery, kindergarten and primary departments of the church school in every congregation. The Board believes that this work is of such importance that it wishes to present a full report, in order that the whole Church may know the significance of what is happening, and that kirk-sessions may know of the action of the Presbyteries and be informed of the help which is available to them in their Presbytery.

The programme is being carried forward in five steps, as follows:

STEP I — The instruction and training of persons selected by each Synod.

During the past year four regional conferences were held. Nearly 150 persons who had been chosen by their Synods received instruction in the Biblical, theological and educational principles of the curriculum. These persons are now at work assisting Presbyteries to undertake the next steps. Synod conveners of Christian Education are directing their work and will welcome invitations for their services from any Presbytery within the Synod.

STEP II — The presentation of the curriculum to the Presbyteries

The curriculum has been presented and explained to each Presbytery of the Church. Brochures on *The Basic Principles of Christian Faith and Life* and *The Theology of the New Curriculum* have been distributed to the members of each Presbytery. At the time of writing it has been reported that forty-one Presbyteries have recommended the use of the curriculum in the congregations within their bounds.

The Board is gratified by this action of the Presbyteries and hopes that they will keep before kirk-sessions the need to recognize and honour the recommendation of the Presbytery and of the General Assembly.

Step III — The training of persons appointed by each Presbytery to assist congregations in the use of the curriculum

Many Presbyteries have already appointed persons for this work. Training sessions have already been held in a number of Presbyteries and qualified persons are now available to assist congregations to a degree that has not been possible before. Congregations may receive the help of these persons by writing to the Presbytery convener of Christian education.

STEP IV - The presentation of the curriculum to kirk-sessions and congregations

The Presbyteries which have recommended the curriculum have also authorized a visitation to each kirk-session and congregation for the purpose of presenting the curriculum. The representatives of the Presbytery, at the time of the visitation, will present a recommendation to the kirk-session and will leave with them literature for study.

The Board commends to every kirk-session the brochure *Pointers for Evaluating Christian Faith and Life*. It is of great value to them in understanding the curriculum and in preparing the church school teachers for the full and effective use of it.

The choice and approval of the curriculum of Christian teaching which will be used in the church school is the responsibility of the kirk-session. This choice and approval should be made in adherence to the Biblical and theological interpretation which is accepted and confessed by the Presbyterian Church. Too often considerations of cost, or facility, or individual preference are the determining factors in making the very important decision of what will be taught in the church school. Kirk-sessions ought not to surrender their right and their duty to determine which curriculum will be used in the church school.

STEP V — The training of church school teachers in the use of the curriculum

In each Presbytery persons have received or will receive training to enable them to provide instruction for the church school teachers of the nursery, kindergarten and primary departments of each congregation in the effective use of the Christian Faith and Life curriculum. The Board hopes that kirk-sessions will invite the Presbytery Committee of Christian education to conduct one or more training conferences for the church school teachers of the children's departments.

The Board wishes to correct a misunderstnding which has arisen in some parts of the Church regarding the curriculum for older children, youth and adults. The Presbyterian Uniform curriculum, which has been authorized by the General Assembly and published by the Board, will continue to be provided for the junior, teenage, older youth and adult departments.

#### SYNOD ADVANCED LEADERSHIP TRAINING

The first Synod Advanced Leadership Training School will be held in the Synod of Toronto and Kingston in Knox College from June 17-22, 1962. This is a co-operative undertaking of the Board of Christian Education, the Board of Evangelism and Social Action, the General Board of Missions and the Board of Stewardship and Budget, together with the respective committees of the Synod. We believe that this school will meet a great need in our Church for intensive

training and for serious examination of the tasks to which Jesus Christ is calling our Church today. It is hoped that in the years ahead similar schools will be held in every Synod and that they will become a regular part of the life of the Church.

#### HIGHER LEARNING

Through its Committee on Higher Learning, the Board is seeking in many ways to discover and develop a policy and a programme which will enable the Church to give an effective witness in the universities of Canada. Believing that there is a great potential for Christian witness and ministry already present in the university communities in the persons of Christian faculty members and Christian students, the Board is seeking to establish contact with these persons and to develop a fellowship among them.

The studies of the Committee on Higher Learning have focussed on three areas of strategic importance: work among faculty members, the guidance of students preparing for the university, and the provision of staff and facilities for pastoral and missionary work in the universities.

#### 1. Work among faculty members

It is recognized that Presbyterians who are members of various faculties need to be helped in relating their faith to their academic disciplines. It is clear that this problem must be attacked before a professor can take his place as an effective Christian within the academic community. The Committee on Higher Learning has been in communication with more than one hundred Presbyterian faculty members. Steps are being taken to form faculty Christian fellowship groups and to draw upon the wisdom of these men and women in the development of a campus ministry. The committee is keenly aware that the parish churches in university centres have the opportunity to do the most fruitful work among Presbyterian faculty members.

#### 2. The preparation of students for the university

Realizing that the Church has a great responsibility to prepare students who will be entering university, the committee is undertaking a study of ways in which the pastoral and educational ministry of all our congregations can render this particular service. A booklet will be published to introduce students to the character of the university, its methods and goals, and to help them to meet the challenge to their faith which they will encounter.

#### 3. Staff and facilities for pastoral and missionary work

The committee has been gathering information from many universities and denominations regarding various patterns of work among students and faculty, especially in terms of Christian workers, and student centres and student residences. The universities are strategic communities of life within our Canadian society. They are communities which need the truth of the Gospel if they are to be centres of learning in the true sense of a university. They are communities of people who need the ministering and missionary presence of the Church in their midst.

The Board believes that when the Church appoints persons to carry forward its mission in Canada, primary consideration should be given to appointments within these university communities.

A study is being made of the contribution and effectiveness of church residences and student centres in terms of their pastoral and missionary work.

The General Assembly, 1960, directed the Committee on Higher Learning "to give further study to the respective policies, doctrinal statements and programmes of the voluntary student movements and the Church's relationship to them" (Acts and Proceedings, 1960, p. 99). The committee has made a serious study of this matter over the past two years. The General Secretaries of the Student Christian Movement of Canada and the Inter-Varsity Christian Fellow-

ship, in consultation with each other and with the chairman of our Committee on Higher Learning, have prepared the following statement:

#### STUDENT CHRISTIAN MOVEMENT OF CANADA

#### A. POLICIES

1. Basis and Aim

The Student Christian Movement of Canada is a fellowship of students based on the conviction that in Jesus Christ are found the supreme revelation of God and the means to the full realization of life.

The Movement seeks through study, prayer and practice to know and follow Jesus Christ and to unite in its fellowship all students in the colleges of Canada who share the above conviction together with all students who are willing to test the truth of the conviction upon which the Movement is founded.

The Movement desires to share with others the values discovered in Jesus Christ and to join with those of like mind in all lands and of every race and rank in the creation of a world-wide order of society in harmony with the mind and purpose of God as revealed in Jesus Christ.

2. The S.C.M. is a fellowship based on Christian conviction and concern to include the questioner and doubter in its program. Its method of evangelism pre-supposes the need for a bridge between the church and university world.

Group leadership is nearly always senior, including professors, S.C.M. staff, chaplains and clergymen.

B. DOCTRINAL STATEMENTS
1. The S.C.M. has no doctrinal bases except those of its participants who are members of various confessions.

#### INTER-VARSITY CHRISTIAN FELLOWSHIP

#### A. POLICIES

- 1. All officially affiliated I.V.C.F. groups accept as their purposes the following:
- (a) To witness to the Lord Jesus Christ as God incarnate and to seek to lead others to a personal faith in Him as Saviour.
- (b) To deepen and strengthen the spiritual life of students and others by the study of the Bible, by prayer, and by Christian fellowship.
- (c) To emphasize the essential duty and privilege of every Christian to take a definite interest and share in world-wide missions, to give and pray and serve where God directs.

2. The I.V.C.F.'s method of evangelism first seeks to penetrate into the life of the university where students gather to discuss with them the Christian faith. It then seeks to bring together the serious seekers after truth into an "open fellowship of inquiry" in the context of Scripture. Great emphasis is, therefore, placed on student responsibility.

For this reason and because the authority of the autonomous student group is the Bible student, leadership is drawn from those persons having a measure of maturity in Christian conviction concerning the Bible and its message.

#### B. DOCTRINAL STATEMENTS

- 1. Statement of Distinctives
- (a) The unique Divine inspiration, integrity, and authority of the Bible.
- (b) The deity of our Lord Jesus Christ.
- (c) The necessity and efficacy of the substitutionary death of Jesus Christ for the redemption

of the world, and the historic fact of His bodily resurrection.

(d) The presence and power of the Holy Spirit in the work of regeneration.

- (e) The consummation of the Kingdom in the "glorious appearing of the great God and our Saviour Jesus Christ".
- 2. All officers are required to be in accord with the above Statement of Distinctives which, however, is not regarded as a creed but simply as a delineation of these aspects of the historic, evangelical faith and of the nature of their authority which are most commonly questioned within the university. This statement is in no way required of participants in the I.V.C.F. program or of voting members. (See C.2)

2. The S.C.M. requires no statement of faith on the part of its participants, and admits to its program all who wish to enter in, including non-Christians and agnostics.

#### C. Program

1. The S.C.M. program exists for the sake of all students and professors who wish to participate. 2. Membership in the S.C.M. includes all those who accept the Basis and Aim and who participate in the program.

3. S.C.M. program attempts to relate the knowledge of the University to the truth of the gospel. It thus attempts consciously to relate to all levels of university life. Therefore there is both a Christian education sector and an outreach sector of the program. This includes

#### C. PROGRAM

1. The program exists for the sake of all students and professors who wish to participate.

2. In larger groups voting is frequently (but not necessarily) limited to those who can make a profession of faith and a commitment of association in the following terms:

Desiring to become a member of the Inter-Varsity Christian Fellowship, and to share in the responsibilities of its work in this University, I declare my faith in Jesus Christ as my personal Saviour and Lord; further it is my earnest life purpose to witness for Him and work for His Kingdom.

The relative order of the denominations' participation in I.V.C.F. in terms of their students follows approximately the relative order of denominational size in the Protestant community.

3. The basic activity of every I.V.C.F. group is corporate, daily prayer in the conviction that spiritual growth and witness is a work of God. Corporate discussion and witness is carried on within the context of Scripture; usually directly, sometimes indirectly, in the conviction that it is the source of the

the light of the gospel as, for example, in the summer projects in industry, mental hospitals and offices.

4. The S.C.M. Vocational Register enlists students who are concerned about God's purpose for the world, and who are trying to make their choice of vocation in terms of this concern, particularly with overseas service in mind.

#### D. CHURCH RELATIONSHIPS

1. The S.C.M. assumes that its participants express their allegiance to Jesus Christ as members of a congregation.

2. The Presbyterian Church in Canada names its representative to the National Council, and currently this representative is a member of the Board of Directors of the S.C.M. of Canada.

The Presbyterian Church thus helps to determine the shape and character of the S.C.M.

3. The S.C.M. is an affiliated member of the Canadian Council of Churches and is recognized by the Council as "an agency of the Churches in the University."

knowledge of God, and that understanding of it is essential for both faith and witness.

As time and resources permit and occasion demands, other activities are added, most commonly a public lecture or series setting forth the basic elements of the Christian faith primarily in relationship to those issues confronting students within the academic community.

Summer school and pre-school training camps are held for Christian students wishing to understand their faith better with a view to more effective Christian witness both in the university and elsewhere.

4. The total missionary concern of the church is constantly kept before students by study groups, lectures, etc. Considerable assistance is given to students through information of opportunities for Christian service through both church and secular channels. The immediate mission field of overseas students studying in Canada is an area of major emphasis.

#### D. CHURCH RELATIONSHIPS

- 1. The I.V.C.F. believes that its participants give their allegiance to Jesus Christ as separate individuals but that God in regeneration joins them to His Body which is the Church and that they, therefore, grow in grace as they realize their fellowship with all faithful Christians everywhere, and, in particular, as they become functioning members within the life of the local church.
- 2. No denomination officially names representatives to the Board of Directors of the I.V.C.F. The appointments, however, are made with a view to as wide and as significant a denominational representation as possible.
- 3. Local area staff secretaries are encouraged to associate with local ministerials or councils of Christian churches as observers. There is no organizational association nationally with the Canadian Council of Churches.

- 4. The S.C.M. is a fully affiliated movement within the World Student Christian Federation, and through it is related to the World Council of Churches.
- 5. The S.C.M. is committed to working for the visible unity of God's Church, as it is made manifest by the Holy Spirit, to the end that all together in each place may share in the fellowship, witness and service of the Church.
- 4. The I.V.C.F. of Canada is affiliated internationally with the International Fellowship of Evangelical Students. The I.F.E.S. is not related to the World Council of Churches, the World Evangelical Alliance, or the International Council of Christian Churches.
- 5. The I.V.C.F. encourages students to look upon their participation in a student group as being intimately related to their participation in the life and witness of their church. The I.V.C.F. further desires that each student group in its evangelism within the student world should assert its true oneness with historical Church of Jesus Christ down through the centuries and around the world, a oneness which is no mere externality but rather which is inherent in the spiritual life and Biblical witness of the evangelical student group a unity which is in the truth.

Many students active within I.V.C.F. are also concerned for the advancement of the ecumenical movement as it is expressed in the World Council of Churches and through the ecumenical activities of their own churches. At the same time the I.V.C.F. includes within its ranks Christians who disagree fundamentally as to the spiritual value and Biblical validity of the present ecumenical movement. Differing sharply on this issue these Christians nevertheless find fellowship together and grow in understanding of each other within the I.V.C.F.

The Board recommends to the General Assembly that this statement be accepted as a satisfactory reply to the directive of the General Assembly 1960.

#### THE PRESBYTERIAN RESIDENCE — SASKATOON REPORT — 1962

The Presbyterian Residence in Saskatoon has to report on what proved to be a very interesting year, mainly because of the installation of the Rev. J. N. Buchanan as the new Dean. In Mr. Buchanan, with his special academic qualifications and previous experience in this type of work, the Board feels confident that it has found a person emminently suited to discharge the work of the deanship with efficiency and distinction. The interesting developments of the past year were also due to the special circumstances governing Mr. Buchanan's appointment. As full time lecturer in the Department of History of the University of Saskatchewan, the Dean was able to enter on his work as a fully accredited person within the life of the University. The Board felt this to be of great importance, not only with reference to the limited period of his teaching appointment, but also for the future, when, as we fully expect, Mr. Buchanan will be able to devote his full time and attention to the work of the deanship, both within the Residence and on the campus. The Board would wish to record its sincere thanks to all who in their various capacities were responsible for the smooth and efficient operation of the Residence during the year under review: to the Rev. L. S. van Mossel, as acting-dean prior to the time of Mr. Buchanan's arrival, to Mrs. A. P. Kerns and her staff for their capable work, and, of course, to Mr. Buchanan.

The principle concern of the Board has to do with the future of the Residence. As we have had previous occasion to report, the property itself is in urgent need of major repairs. This factor alone probably explains why for the first time in years we did not operate at full capacity. Even more than the fact of not being on the campus proper, the Residence in many ways reflects its age: deficient heating and lighting, plumbing installations that keep on breaking down, and furnishings that have become dowdy and shabby. As well as our limited resources would permit, we tried over the last few years to handle some of these problems as they arose. But the time has come to tackle this question on a much greater and more realistic scale.

Inevitably, therefore, this condition of things brought into sharp focus the possibility of something about which the Board had talked for some years, and concerning which tentative explorations had been made from time to time, namely to move the Residence to the campus. This would mean selling both the Residence and the Dean's home, and erecting a new Residence within the University community. With this in mind, the Board has made formal application to the University for an appropriate grant of land and substantial financial assistance. At the same time we have placed the matter in the hands of the Committee on Higher Learning as the indicated body to pronounce upon the general policy of University Student Residences within the total context of Church and University relations. Also, we have notified the Administrative Council of the situation as it has developed to this point, since for the implementation of such a scheme we would necessarily have to look to the Church for considerable help. At the time when this report is being prepared these three lines of approach still remain indefinite as to what may eventually transpire.

Finally, in the present position of uncertainty as to what the future may hold, we must realize that the one alternative to the erection of a new Residence on the campus would be to proceed with the necessary repairs to the present structure. In such a case the Board would try to plan these alterations over a period of two to three years in order to render need for financial assistance as unembarrassing as possible. However, let it be clearly understood, that in the view of the Board, this alternative would be a very poor second best. Having in mind that there can be few areas in our national life more important or strategic than the University campus, surely the Church must realize that the responsi-

bility of maintaining an effective Christian witness within the University calls for vision, courage and enterprise far beyond what we have dsplayed up to the present.

Whatever transpires, we look forward into the future with very real anticipation, confident that the Residence will continue to fulfil a role of ever increasing importance in the life and witness of the Church of Jesus Christ in this area.

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF THE PRESBYTERIAN COLLEGE, MONTREAL — 1961-1962

To the Venerable the 88th General Assembly:

The Board of Management of the Presbyterian College begs to submit the following report for the year 1961-1962.

For all the indications of Divine blessing upon the work of the College during the year, we render unto Almighty God our grateful thanks.

Owing to the work of our College being carried on in temporary quarters, there have been the inevitable disruptions and inconveniences. Nevertheless, the work of the year has been marked by a splendid spirit and evident indications of the continued growth of the College. We should like to call attention particularly to the fact that our enrolment this year has been one of the largest since 1939, being equal to that of 1956.

Twenty-seven men were enrolled in all. In the first year, eight students were entered; in the second year, ten students; and in the third year, nine students. Fifty men were enrolled in special studies leading to the Degree of Bachelor of Divinity. Of these, eighteen were doing this work as part of the three-year course, here while the remainder attended the special seminars which were arranged.

Evening Extension Courses were again given this year for eight weeks during the first term. The lectures were given by Professor D. N. MacMillan and Principal Robert Lennox. As a result of the more difficult accessibility of our present quarters, the enrolment was not as large as last year; though the interest was strong and full of promise for the future.

The L. W. Anderson Lectures were given this year by Professor J. Pelikan of the University of Chicago, on the theme "The Light of the World". We are happy to announce that these lectures, which were well received at McGill University, are being published as the Anderson Lectures given under the auspices of the Presbyterian College.

The Board expresses its appreciation to the Principal and Faculty of the College who, together with their capable leadership within the College, continue to serve the Church in many other areas of its life and thought.

During the year, the Building Committee of your Board has been diligent in preparing the plans for our new College Building. Sketches of the new College,

setting forth its distinctively collegiate lines and functional qualities, have been approved and working drawings have been completed.

#### THE COMMITTEE TO ADVISE WITH THE MODERATOR

To the Venerable the 88th General Assembly:

The Reverend Robert L. Taylor, B.A., D.D., Minister of St. John's Church, Medicine Hat, Alberta, was elected Moderator of the 87th General Assembly of The Presbyterian Church in Canada, meeting in Knox Church, Toronto, Ontario, in June, 1961.

During the months following his election, Dr. Taylor carried out an extensive visitation of the Church. In the Fall he addressed the Synod of the Maritime Provinces and visited every presbytery within the bounds of that Synod. With Mrs. Taylor and their daughter, he represented the Church at the opening of the Parliament of Canada in Ottawa and was the guest of the Premier of Ontario at the dinner accorded the Prime Minister of Great Britain, the Right Honorable Harold MacMillan. He took part in the dedication of many new churches, church halls and Christian Education centres in various parts of the Church. He addressed the Council of the Women's Missionary Society (Western Division) at their annual meeting in Toronto.

During the year, Dr. Taylor won many golden opinions. One young minister wrote: "Our congregation was thrilled to have Dr. Taylor with us and to listen to his splendid, inspiring sermons, and I would like to say that our current Moderator is a very distinguished goodwill ambassador for the Church."

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. That the thanks of this General Assembly be extended to the Kirk-Session and congregation of St. John's Church, Medicine Hat, who made it possible for their Minister to perform so many duties during the year.
- That the thanks of this General Assembly be accorded the Reverend John Allison who took up his residence in Medicine Hat in order to undertake the work of Dr. Taylor during his absence.
- That the thanks of this General Assembly go to the Clerks of Synods and Presbyteries, others ministers, elders and people who assisted in carrying forward the itinerary of the Moderator.
- 4. That the thanks of this General Assembly be given to all who extended courtesy, kindness and hospitality to the Moderator while performing his arduous duties.

### REPORT ON OVERTURES REFERRED TO THE BOARD OF EVANGELISM AND SOCIAL ACTION BY THE 87th GENERAL ASSEMBLY

Report of the Board of Evangelism and Social Action: Overture No. 2, Presbytery of Montreal, re Marriage, Divorce and Re-Marriage, Acts and Proceedings, 1961, Page 413.

To the Venerable the 88th General Assembly:

The 87th General Assembly ruled as follows: That Overture No. 2, Presbytery of Montreal, re Marriage, Divorce and Re-Marriage, "be referred to the Board of Evangelism and Social Action for study and report to the 1962 General Assembly." Acts and Proceedings, 1961, Page 71.

The Board of Evangelism and Social Action begs to report that a Special Committee, composed of four members from the Board of Evangelism and Social Action and three members from the Board of Christian Education has been appointed, and is studying this subject. However, in view of the nature and scope of this question, the Committee finds that it is not ready to report to this General Assembly. Our report is therefore one of progress, but the Committee hopes to have its report ready for presentation to the 89th General Assembly.

Report of the Board of Evangelism and Social Action, Overture No. 10, Presbytery of Victoria, re Modern Nuclear Weapons, Acts and Proceedings, 1961, Page 413.

To the Venerable the 88th General Assembly:

The 87th General Assembly ruled as follows: "That the matter of Recommendation No. 6 (Report of the Board of Evangelism and Social Action) and Overture No. 10 be referred back to the Board of Evangelism and Social Action for study and report to the General Assembly of 1962." Acts and Proceedings, 1961, Page 72.

The Board of Evangelism and Social Action recommends that the prayer of the overture be granted in the following terms:

- By a re-affirmation of the Declaration of Faith Concerning Church and Nation, 1954.
- 2. By the further declaration that since modern nuclear weapons are not, and cannot be a means of enforcing or restoring peace, but only of destroying, basically and universally, the Order which Christ has ordained governments to preserve, therefore no nation, including our own, has the right before God, to resort to nuclear weapons, either offensively or defensively.

- 3. By repeating recommendation No. 6 of the Report of the Board of Evangelism and Social Action to the 87th General Assembly, namely, "That the General Assembly urge the Government of Canada to use its influence to stop by international agreement the testing of nuclear weapons, and to bring to a halt the production of nuclear weapons under such international inspection and controls as will most fully ensure compliance; to stand for the repudiation of nuclear warfare; and to press toward the prohibition of nuclear warfare by international agreement, and to accelerate international co-operation in the development of atomic power for peaceful purposes under proper safeguards.
- 4. By calling upon the General Assembly to issue a Pastoral Letter, addressed to the members of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, along the following lines:

JESUS CHRIST is our Lord. He is Lord also of the whole world. By His death and resurrection He has set us free from every fear. We cannot fear sin for it has been forgiven. We cannot fear death for it has been vanquished. There is nothing which man can devise or do that can make void or ineffective the victory over the world that has been achieved by our Lord Jesus Christ.

In His Name, and in His strength, we will work, and fight and pray to maintain and defend the peace in our own land and amongst the nations, but we repudiate the use of modern nuclear weapons as a means of enforcing or restoring peace.

In company with prophets and apostles and the Church in all ages we will boldly say, "The Lord is my helper; I will not fear what man shall do unto me. Even though the earth itself be removed, and the mountains carried into the midst of the sea, we will not fear. God is our refuge and our strength; and we will trust Him, in life and in death."

Report of the Board of Evangelism and Social Action, Overture No. 20, Presbytery of Miramichi, re Spiritual Condition of the Church, Acts and Proceedings, 1961, Page 422.

To the Venerable the 88th General Assembly:

The 87th General Assembly ruled as follows: "That Overture No. 20 be referred to the Board of Evangelism and Social Action for study and report to the 1962 General Assembly." Acts and Proceedings, 1961, Page 72. The Prayer of Overture No. 20 reads as follows:

THEREFORE, we, the Presbytery of Miramichi, acknowledging that spirituality cannot be legislated but comes through the ministry of the Holy Spirit in the midst of the Church and in the hearts of men, do humbly overture the Venerable the General Assembly as follows:

(a) to call the Church to penitent prayer, claiming the forgiveness of Almighty God for sins and failures in the past, and asking Him to give to the Boards and Committees of the Church boldness in obedience to Divine leading, that the Mission of the Church may go forward in all areas with renewed vigour;

- (b) to instruct the Church to show greater concern for unity to be found in a deepened allegiance to the King and Head of the Church, Jesus Christ our Lord, rather than in the unity being sought on an organizational level;
- (c) to give to the Board of Evangelism and Social Action increased means and facilities to develop a program for evangelism and the deepening of the spiritual life of our people; and
- (d) to instruct the Board of Evangelism and Social Action to look out a suitable person to be a Church Evangelist to the end that the Church should be rededicated to her true calling of witnessing to the saving and keeping power of Jesus Christ."

The Board of Evangelism and Social Action recommends that the prayer of the Overture be granted in the following terms:

- (a) That section (a) of the Overture be granted, and that our Church seek the forgiveness of Almighty God for past sins and failures, and His guidance under the power of the Holy Spirit, that we may be able to face the great task committed to us by our Lord Jesus Christ.
- (b) That our reply to section (b) of the Overture be sought in the report of the Committee on Inter-Church Relations.
- (c) That the Church utilize the Programme of Evangelism which has been developed by the Board of Evangelism and Social Action, and that the Presbyteries use all the facilities of the Board to attain this deepening of the spiritual life of our people.
- (d) That the Church renew the directive of the Board of Evangelism and Social Action to select men of proven abilities and gifts in Preaching Missions to work within the bounds of our Synods.

Report of the Board of Evangelism and Social Action: Unprinted Overture by Dr. E. F. Molnar, re Worldly Activities in the Church, Acts and Proceedings, 1961, Page 71.

To the Venerable the 88th General Assembly:

This unprinted Overture by Rev. Dr. E. F. Molnar requests "the General Assembly to name a committee to study the principles of the Scriptures and the teachings of the Reformers regarding the worldly activities in the Church and to issue a statement in this matter at the 1962 General Assembly for the guidance of congregations."

The 87th General Assembly ruled as follows: "That it be referred to the Board of Evangelism and Social Action for study and report to the 1962 General Assembly." Acts and Proceedings, 1961, Page 71.

The Board of Evangelism and Social Action recommends that the prayer of the Overture be granted in the following terms:

The substance of this Overture is a feeling of alarm over the encroachment of the 'world' in the affairs of the Church, and a request for an official statement from the General Assembly which would serve as a rule to congregations in avoiding the secularization of church life.

In reply the Board of Evangelism and Social Action would remind the General Assembly that the Incarnation involves the Church, as the Body of Christ, in an identification with the world in such a way that any division of life into 'sacred' and 'secular' is false. Our concern must be with the whole of life and to brand some of its activities as worldly, and therefore not the proper concern of the Church, is to limit the area of the Church's concern to what are usually termed 'spiritual' matters, which would be a betrayal of God's purpose for His Church.

The Board would also offer the reminder that it belongs to the Kirk-Session, as a Court of the Church, and not to the congregation (or the General Assembly) to determine what activities shall or shall not be permitted in the congregation. It is our conviction under God, that such matters are best left in the hands of the Court most competent to issue in them.

# REPORT OF THE CLERKS OF ASSEMBLY: OVERTURE 1, 1961, PRESBYTERY OF WEST TORONTO, RE MINISTERS RESIGNING OUR MINISTRY

To the Venerable the 88th General Assembly:

The Presbytery of West Toronto, in reference to a Minister resigning our Ministry, asks that there be standing rules wherein such a Minister shall inform the Moderator of his Presbytery of his desire three months before the intended date of his resignation, and the Moderator shall appoint a committee to consult with him, following which, if the Minister still desires to withdraw, he shall give reasons in writing and his charge shall be cited in accordance with Section 244 of the Book of Forms.

The Clerks of Assembly are unwilling to have such standing rules drawn up, for these reasons:

- (1) The number of men who have resigned our Ministry since 1925 is exceedingly small, and of these the number whose conduct might be questioned on grounds of ethics or concerning whom it might be truly said this Church has failed them being still smaller, the Clerks believe that to make such standing rules—even if they could be drawn to suit all cases—would magnify a rarity into an implied frequency.
- (2) The law of the Church is now adequate to deal with any such situation. The Clerks draw attention to the fact that a Minister leaving our Ministry may receive a dismissory letter (Section 251, Book of Forms), holding which he leaves in honour and lacking which he leaves under a cloud. Before issuing such a letter, or declining to issue it, the Presbytery may hold any inquiry, in conformity with the law of the Church, that it deems necessary and may issue its judgment. The Presbytery, indeed, might in its wisdom set up its own standing rules in the terms requested by the Presbytery of West Toronto, and do so entirely within its rights as a Presbytery. The Minister who desires to resign is still a Minister subject to the Presbytery, especially in this point relating to his vows in acknowledging the government of the Church by its courts. He cannot question the right of the Presbytery to make inquiry, and if the Presbytery considers his conduct not ethical it may record its judgment and refuse to grant a dismissory letter. Appeal may be made. The Clerks of Assembly wish to make note of the fact that

the Church has always been considerate of the conscience of men who may on one or more grounds find themselves unable to continue their Ministry with us, and has been traditionally gracious with these. While speaking in the foregoing of 'ethical conduct', which the Clerks deem to be the chief factor of inquiry, there could be other grounds for inquiry, such as the Presbytery examining its own past relationship to the man in question. The traditional graciousness of the Church does not set aside the Presbytery's right of making inquiry and the duty that may arise of issuing Christian judgment.

The Clerks recommend that the Overture be answered in the foregoing terms. Respectfully submitted,

## REPORT OF THE CLERKS OF ASSEMBLY: OVERTURE 27, 1961, PRESBYTERY OF HAMILTON, RE STEPS BY WHICH AN APPOINTMENT IS MADE TO A BOARD OF ASSEMBLY

To the Venerable the 88th General Assembly:

The Presbytery of Hamilton, in reference to steps by which an appointment is made to a Board of Assembly, asks clarification of the steps by which the appointment is made and the appointment is completed.

The Clerks offer the following comments:

- (1) There is a wide-spread idea that unless a Minister receives a call from a congregation he cannot be ordained, or if ordained that there is some doubt as to his position in the Church, that is, he is not truly exercising a Gospel ministry because he has "not received the call of the people". Out of this background may come also the idea that a Minister serving by appointment of a Board or Assembly is exercising something less than a Gospel ministry. The General Assembly of 1949 received and adopted a Report of the Committee on the Validity of Orders (A & P, 1949, Appendices, pages 98 and 99; Minutes, page 38), which should be read in its entirety for its bearing here. The report sets aside the idea that the call of the people is necessary for a valid ordination. It follows that the exercising of a Gospel ministry is not necessarily confined to the work of the parish Minister.
  - (2) The Report of the Special Committee re Regulations, Appendices to the Book of Forms, Part 2, Section 1, is referred to in the Overture and the text is in A & P, 1960, pages 289-290. The regulations are clear, and it seems to the Clerks that the Overture requests clarification of the procedure involved. It is to be noted in these regulations that in some of the cases the presbyteries make nominations, and that in others appointments are made without nominations of presbyteries. In all cases where a parish Minister is involved, that is to say when a pastoral tie may be dissolved, the Clerks consider (in the light of the foregoing (1) that the Presbytery should hold that the Minister concerned is receiving a call to another sphere of work. The appointment is usually accompanied by a request to the presbytery should proceed as if receiving call documents and, mutatis mutandis, deal with it, citing the charge, setting a date of the dissolution of the pastoral tie, etc. This also applied (again, mutatis mutandis) to any Minister.

The Minister, moving to his new sphere of work arising from his appointment, is exercising a ministry. Any suggestion that he is not exercising a true ministry is beneath his dignity to answer: if any answer has to be made, despite the 1949 report previously referred to, it would have to be made by Assembly or Board appointing defending itself against the curious charge that it has issued a call which is not really a call.

The question of whether or not such an appointee should be inducted is not requested by the Overture and the Clerks consider that though the question is cognate there is no necessity of answering it at this time.

In summary, the Clerks recommend that the following be the answer to the Overture; "The principle underlying the making of an appointment is the principle underlying the call from a pastoral charge, and should be dealt with \*nutatis mutandis by a presbytery."

# REPORT RE OVERTURE No. 4, PAGE 414, ACTS AND PROCEEDINGS, 1961 GENERAL ASSEMBLY

An overture from the Synod of the Maritime Provinces complaining of inadequate and misleading press coverage on the activities of the General Assembly was referred to the Public Relations Committee of the Administrative Council which had been appointed to deal with matters of policy.

The overture was considered at a meeting on September 28, 1961, at which were present Rev. Dr. Robert L. Taylor, Rev. Dr. E. A. Thomson, Rev. D. G. Seaton and Rev. DeC. H. Rayner. After due consideration it was decided to answer the overture in the following terms:

"In reply to the overture of the synod of the Maritime provinces regarding the lack of Presbyterian Church news, the committee would point out that the increasing number of clippings from all parts of Canada show that use is being made of the regular news releases which go out from the publicity officer of The Presbyterian Church in Canada.

"Coverage at the last general assembly was satisfactory and plenty of material was provided over the wires of the Canadian Press.

"Your committee would suggest that contact be made at the local level to encourage the editors responsible to use the news now being provided on the Wires of the Canadian Press. If this contact is made immediately prior to each general assembly with advance of any other special happening, local editors will be encouraged to watch for and print such news.

"Your committee will undertake to remind ministers of this necessity from time to time."

Whereas this will necessitate further economies on the part of the Board of Missions, and

WHEREAS the present policy of the Board of Missons, which we commend, calls for an annual reduction in grants,

THEREFORE, the Presbytery of East Toronto humbly overtures the Venerable, the General Assembly, to instruct the Board of Missions to desist from any further special reductions in grants for Stipend to settled Aid-Receiving charges, or that they do otherwise for this object what to their wisdom may seem best.

No. 10 - Presbytery of Montreal

### Re REVISION BOOK OF FORMS APPENDICES 4 SUBSECTION 17 (pp. 142 & 143)

To The Venerable the 88th General Assembly:

Whereas the regulations of the Church concerning the appointment of Professors or other permanent members of the teaching staff of the Colleges, as stated in the Book of Forms, pages 142-143, provide:—

- (a) that all such appointments shall be made by the General Assembly;
- (b) that the Board of Management of the College concerned shall nominate to the General Assembly the person whom they deem suitable for the position, having previously given notice of such intention, so that Presbyteries may have the opportunity of submitting names to the Board for its consideration;
- (c) that, in the event of the nominee of the Board being unacceptable to the General Assembly, "the matter of appointment to such position shall be referred back to the Board for further consideration and nomination, such nomination to come before the next General Assembly, and (that) temporary arrangements for carrying on the work of the Chair until a permanent appointment is made, shall be arranged for in the manner provided for such appointments". (B. of F., p. 143); and
- Whereas provision (c) as quoted above, a provision obviously designed to constitute a safeguard against hasty and ill-considered action on the part of the General Assembly itself, has been held to be capable of such interpretation as would make it impossible for the General Assembly ever in any circumstance to appoint anyone to a professorship or other permanent teaching position unless and until he had first been nominated by the Board of the College concerned, an interpretation which in practice would mean the transferring of the final authority in the matter of such appointments from the General Assembly to the Boards of the Colleges; and

WHEREAS there is, therefore, a very urgent need of such a revision and re-wording of these regulations as will remove all confusion and uncertainty, and make clear and explicit

- (a) that permanent appointments to the teaching staffs of the Colleges are made by the General Assembly and not by the College Boards;
- (b) that, in all cases when such appointments are under consideration by the General Assembly, the Assembly shall have the benefit of the Board's considered judgment regarding the qualifications of all whose names are being considered, thus assuring

(c) that adequate safeguard is provided against precipitate and probably unfortunate action by the General Assembly itself.

THEREFORE, the Presbytery of Montreal humbly overtures the Venerable, the General Assembly, to order the deletion from the present regulations in the Book of Forms of the sentence on page 143, line 7, beginning "In the event, etc., and continuing to the end of the paragraph, and to substitute therefore the following:

When such nomination of the College Board comes before the General Assembly, other nominations may also be made on the floor of the Assembly, but only of those whose names have already been submitted to the College Board by one or more of the Presbyteries of the Church, and the General Assembly by majority vote shall determine the final election.

Should the General Assembly decline to appoint any of the candidates thus nominated, the whole matter shall then be referred back to the College Board for further consideration and exploration of the field of qualified candidates, with instruction to report to the next General Assembly, the said Board being given authority in the meantime to make such temporary arrangements for the work of the Chair as may be found necessary. In such event, Presbyteries, if they choose, may again submit names for consideration:

Or to do otherwise to this end as the General Assembly in its wisdom may deem best.

That a special committee be appointed to study a proposed policy more or less along the lines of the following:

That the MAXIMUM basic stipend be declared at the level of \$4,500.00 to be achieved by one or more of these provisions wherever applicable:

- (a) That the MINIMUM basic stipend for unmarried ministers be \$2,500.00;
- (b) That the MINIMUM basic stipend for married ministers be \$3,000.00;
- (c) That a special stipend allowance of \$300.00 be made in respect of each dependent child;
- (d) That, after ten years' service, there shall be an annual increment of \$100.00;

(it being understood that none of these special provisions shall be so applied as to make the stipend exceed the maximum of \$4,500.00).

Or that the General Assembly do otherwise for this purpose as in its wisdom may seem best.

And that the Presbytery of Lake of the Woods be constituted by the Moderator of the Synod of Manitoba during the meeting of the Synod to be held in Kenora on October second, third and fourth, of this year; or that they do otherwise for this object what to their wisdom may seem best. #### NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

#### Year ended December 31, 1961

- Fixed assets are shown mainly at cost but include properties which
  have been donated and on which a fair value has been placed at the time
  of acquisition. Morgan House property is not included as no valuation has
  been reflected on the books. Accumulated depreciation has been increased
  by \$194,571 by a transfer of this amount from Capital in 1961. No appraisal
  or review has been made of these assets.
- The assets and liabilities of Knox and Presbyterian Colleges, Saskatoon Residence, Armagh and St. Andrew's Hall are included in the Balance Sheet only to the extent of land and buildings and the liability of St. Andrew's Hall to the Royal Bank of Canada.
- The property of Presbyterian College, Montreal has been tentatively carried at the previous book value although the property has been sold in exchange for a parcel of ground plus a cash figure in excess of the book value.
- The property of Ewart College has been carried at the previous book figure pending completion of the new building.
- 5. Except for the amount allocated from the Budget, no receipts or disbursements have been included in the Statement of Income and Expenditure for the following:— Knox, Presbyterian and Ewart Colleges, St. Andrew's Hall, Saskatoon Residence, Pension Fund, Penmarvian, Morgan House, Presbyterian Record, Armagh.
- Income of the J. B. Maclean Bequest Fund has been included in the Statement of Income and Expenditure only to the extent of the amount received from the fund (\$9,546). A separate statement covering this Fund has been prepared.
- 7. In some Funds provision had been made for possible losses on loans.

These amounts have now been reinstated in the Funds as follows:—

Church and Manse \$50,000

Church Extension 50,000

Christian Outreach 75,000

Peace Thankoffering Church Building 42,000

The Funds are thus shown at the full capital amount. If and when losses are encountered they will then be written off and the capital of the Fund decreased accordingly.

8. Income and expenditure include amounts received and amounts disbursed for special work in addition to the expenditures authorized by the General Assembly. The excess of income over expenditure of these items has been retained in Mission or Other Reserves or in Amounts held for Special Purposes.

On a gross basis actual expenditures exceed authorized by \$123,961 (which would have been \$186,461 had the debt reduction and payment on St. Andrew's Hall Loan been included). ## COMMITTEE ON INTER-CHURCH AID, REFUGEE AND WORLD SERVICES

To the Venerable the 88th General Assembly:

There are six basic points to keep clearly in mind in regard to Inter-Church Aid, Refugee and World Service, to use the new name adopted at the recent meeting of the World Council of Churches and our involvement in it.

First, the ministry of practical compassion to those in distress is mandatory, not optional, for the Church of Jesus Christ. It is not something which may be done after all the other bills are paid or fobbed off with the excuse that it wasn't included as an item in the every-person visit. If it should be that our Lord has to say to us, Inasmuch as ye did it not unto one of the least of these my brethren ye did it not unto me, it will be very embarrassing to have to say, we're sorry but we told our people that if they had an every-person canvass we wouldn't allow any special appeals. If it wasn't mentioned in your congregational objective it should have been and in any case our people must at least be given the chance if not the exhortation to give because the need continues and the compassion and command of our Lord continue.

This leads to the second point which is that the work of Inter-Church Aid, Refugees and World Service is an on-going work and will continue to be till the end of time. Some Presbyterians seem to think that because, through the special efforts made during World Refugee Year, most of the refugee camps set up after the second World War in Europe were cleared, the problem has been solved. If in regard to point number one they have been drowsing over their Bibles, in regard to this point they have surely been drowsing over their newspapers or at their radio and television sets. The problem of the refugee will continue as long as there is political and economic tension, unrest and upheaval in the world which means till the Kingdom comes in its fullness. The work of inter-church aid, i.e. the strong denominations helping the weaker, will continue as long as we ascribe any authority to the apostolic command "Bear ye one another's burdens and so fulfill the law of Christ". And the challenges and opportunities of world service, i.e. grappling with the economic problems of

mankind in an imaginative and creative way will continue until the natural order is gathered in the consummation of all things into the eternal order and glory and perfection of the Kingdom of God. And this leads to the third point.

Some people say I want my money to go to feeding the hungry and clothing the naked and housing the homeless and not for the fancy schemes dreamed up by the World Council of Churches. Well of course this is done and done well within the limits of possibility. But it is rather stupid, to say the least, to have people in a given area suffer periodically from being homeless and hungry and unclothed if this could be avoided by building a dam or an irrigation system or helping to develop better methods of agriculture in close co-operation with the United Nations which regards the Division of Inter-Church Aid, Refugees and World Service as its full partner in this field of human endeavour. And this leads to the fourth point.

Our involvement in this work is almost entirely through the channels set up, administered and supervised by the World Council of Churches and its confessional components such as the Presbyterian World Alliance. You need never feel, therefore, that your money is being wasted or that there is unnecessary overlapping of services or prodigal spending of funds. The work of the Division of Inter-Church Aid, Refugees and World Service is a top-flight operation carried on by top-flight personnel receiving remuneration much below that given their opposite members in secular agencies, people who give outstanding leadership and exercise careful and responsible control in all the details of this vast undertaking. And this leads to the fifth point.

If you say, this sounds as if the work of this division is very close to, if not identical with, the work of world mission and evangelism, you will be right. They are closely inter-related and they support and complement and express one another in the same way that evangelism and social action do. A very important meeting is being held the end of this month in Copenhagen at which policies for the coming years will be developed and ways and means worked out for carrying forward in the future what has always been the case in the past, the close relationship in thought and action between these two divisions to the end that the whole church may bring to the whole need of the whole world the whole ministry of the gospel of Jesus Christ.

And the final point is this. What we give for this important work must not and need not interfere with what we give for the General Assembly's Budget. We are all aware of the financial problems of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, problems not of a dying Church but of a living dynamic and growing Church seeking to grapple with the challenges of a growing situation and growing responsibilities, and of the need for increased generosity on the part of all our people in providing financial support for the Church's total programme. No one is more aware of this than I am serving as I do as chairman of the overseas executive of the General Board of Missions.

But the point is this. We can do both jobs properly and much better than we have been doing. After all, if every Presbyterian communicant gave each week in the red side of his or her envelope the price of one small packet of cigarettes we would have an annual budget of three and three quarter million dollars. Last year our Church raised a little less than \$28,000 for inter-church

aid and refugee relief and that was very good compared with other years. But that amounts to a little over 13 cents a year or a little over one cent a month from each Presbyterian communicant not to speak of our hundreds of thousands of adherents. Some members of our church in Canada say that because of the remarkable and thrilling increase in giving over the last ten years or so we have now reached a plateau so that giving will almost now level off. Don't let anyone, be he minister, elder or manager give you that kind of nonsense. The Presbyterian Church in Canada has done great things in this regard but it is only beginning to learn how to give and it is my conviction and my experience that when Presbyterians are told of the needs and given a reasonable explanation of how they can be met they will give and will give generously.

Two points of current special interest in conclusion. So far this year a little over \$15,000 has been contributed which I think indicates a forward trend remembering that Easter, when the annual appeal is made, came very late this year. Almost all this amount received to date has already been distributed and of this \$5,000 is being sent for relief work in Hong Kong. The United Church of Canada has sent \$10,000. Sometimes people feel we should give proportionately to the other Churches which would mean we should give about \$2,000 in this instance. But the point is that no church in Canada has yet even begun to give properly for this kind of work and that Presbyterians should not gauge their giving by what others are doing but should give a lead to others to show what should be done. Personally I would have preferred, had it been possible to vote \$20,000 for relief in Hong Kong and that would mean only 10 cents from every communicant.

But let us get on with this work. Five cents a month from every communicant or 60 cents a year would give us \$100,000 to use in 1962 and for this I appeal to you for it is what we should aim for in the light of the needs which the World Council has presented to us. I'm not talking about generosity. Five cents a month isn't a matter of generosity. I can't imagine a Presbyterian, provided this work is properly presented to him by his minister, having the gall to give less or to say it would diminish his support of the General Assembly's Budget. I can imagine our Presbyterian Church in Canada rising to this challenge if it is properly presented to her and I leave that to you.

Your committee has one recommendation to present to the Assembly: That the General Assembly request and encourage the Government of Canada, one — to continue to make surplus food available for use in Hong Kong and, two — to make possible an easier flow of refugees to Canada.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON OVERTURE 15, 1961, PRESBYTERY OF STRATFORD, RE USE OF THE LEET

To the Venerable the 88th General Assembly:

The Special Committee appointed by the General Assembly of 1961 to give study to and report on the above Overture concerning congregational difficulties and the evils of "Competition" in connection with the use of the "Leet" in settling Vacant Charges, has corresponded with the Clerks of all the Presbyteries regarding present customs and seeking suggestions for better procedures. Your committee desires to report as follows.

- 1. We would draw attention to the report of the Special Committee re Overture 11, 1958, Presbytery of Victoria, re Pastoral Relations Committee, which appears on pages 334-335 of the Acts and Proceedings of the 86th General Assembly, 1960. This report deals with several matters related to Calls and "Leets". Section 3g which recommends two advisory ministers to assist the Interim-Moderator has been used by only a very few Presbyteries and, apparently, has not proved too helpful. Section 3h which recommends only single nominations for a vacancy be considered by the Congregation, has been adopted as general practice in many Presbyteries and has proved very satisfactory. However, in almost every case reported to your committee, a vacancy committee made a careful search for and examination of information regarding possible candidates and, where feasible, sent a delegation to hear them before the single nomination was made to the Congregation.
- 2. "Leets" are still being used to advantage, especially in Southern Ontario and in very large congregations. Again, the majority are following the recommendation 3i of the above-mentioned report which limits the "Leet" to three names. In a large number of Presbyteries the "Leet" is a luxury seldom enjoyed with the present shortage of ministers.
- 3. We would also draw atention to the fact that Overture 24, 1960, Presbytery of Saskatoon, re Reformed Concept of the "Call", which included some concern re the difficulties associated with our present procedures in filling vacancies, was referred to the Committee on Articles of Faith for study and report to a future Assembly.
- 4. We would suggest in answer to the prayer of Overture 15, 1961:
  - a. that Presbyteries and Interim-Moderators at least make trial of the recommendations made in the report of the Special Committee re Overture 11, 1958, on pages 334-335 of A & P, 1960.
  - b. that where difficulties are being experienced with "Leets", the practice of making a single nomination to the Congregation be instituted.
  - c. that in the latter case, a vacancy committee (of Session or of Congregation) is almost essential to ensure that a careful and thoughtful choice of the sole nominee is made.
  - d. that the Committee on Articles of Faith be encouraged to complete its report on the "Reformed Concept of the Call".

#### SYNOD OF THE MARITIMES

#### REV. JAMES ALEXANDER GRANT

The Reverend James Alexander Grant passed away at Guysborough, Nova Scotia, on February 4th, 1962, in his seventy-fourth year. Born in Toronto, son of the late John and Mary Grant, he was educated in that city. Graduating in Theology from the Presbyterian Seminary in Omaha, Nebraska, he held several pastorates in the United States of America before being called to St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church in Innisfail, Alberta. From there he went to Burns Church in Erin, Ontario, for a number of years before accepting a Call to St. Andrew's Church at Rose Bay, Nova Scotia. When his health failed about ten years ago he retired to Guysborough Nova Scotia, He was a member of La Have Lodge No. 81, A.F. & A.M., R.N.S., in Riverport, N.S. He is survived by his widow, Winnifred, and a brother, John P., in Toronto.

Burial service was conducted by the Reverend C. H. Foote of Marion Bridge and the Reverend C. Shaver of Thorburn, Nova Scotia. Interment was in Evergreen Cemetery, Guysborough.

#### SYNOD OF MONTREAL AND OTTAWA

#### REV. JOHN HENRY ALEXANDER DUBOIS, B.A., B.D.

On 16th March, 1961 four days after his fifty-first wedding anniversary, Mr. Dubois passed away. He was born October 4th, 1883, at Frankfurt Germany, received his early education in Switzerland, and afterwards studied Theology in Geneva and Edinburgh.

In May, 1910, the Presbyterian Church in Canada, needing a bilingual minister at Namur, Quebec, invited him to his first pastoral Charge. Here began a life of rich, varied and fruitful service in the twin ministries of preaching and teaching. To the care and education of youth at Sherbrooke, Stanstead College, Montreal West, Mount Allison University, and New England College, New Hampshire, he consecrated his great gifts of a cultured personality, complete dedication, and personal idealism and example.

A sincere and broad-minded member of the Church Universal, he spent his summers in the service of the Congregational Churches of Vermont. From the vantage point of his Shawbridge summer home, he saw the fine work of the Boys' Farm and Training School, and gave the boys his friendly encouragement in their services of worship. A versatile scholar, he was also an accomplished cellist, and taught cello at the McGill University Faculty of Music. A firm believer also in physical fitness, he was a proficient skier, both in Switzerland and Canada, and for a time taught fencing at Montreal West High School.

Mr. Dubois retired in 1951, to Newport, Vermont, and later to St. David's, Niagara Peninsula, Ontario, where the home call came. He leaves the fragrant memory and example of a grave, dignified presence, a kindly and engaging personality, and an inspiring and enduring influence on his fellow-men.

#### REV. HAROLD RICHARD PICKUP, B.A.

The Reverend Harold Richard Pickup died in St. Anne's Military Hospital, St. Anne de Bellevue, Quebec, after a long and painful illness, on Friday, the 13th of October, 1961.

For many years of his ministry, Mr. Pickup was a devoted and highly esteemed member of this Synod, first as minister of the Presbyterian Church, Renfrew, from 1931 to 1935, later as minister of Montreal West Presbyterian Church, 1935 to 1945, and finally, as Director of Immigration for the Presbyterian Church in Canada, with offices in Montreal, from 1945 until his retirement in 1953.

Mr. Pickup was born in Elizabethville, Ontario, on July 25th, 1881. At an early age he felt the Divine call to the holy ministry, and after a few years spent teaching school, following his elemntary and High School education, he proceeded to the University of Toronto and Knox College, where he completed the required studies, in Arts and Theology, for admission to the ministry of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, graduating in Arts in 1906, and in Theology in 1909.

For a short time following graduation, he was engaged in Home Mission work in British Columbia, but in 1910 he received and accepted a call to College Street Church, Toronto. With the outbreak of war however, in 1914, he immediately entered the chaplaincy service, recruiting and going overseas with the 220 Battalion. After a distinguished record during the war years, he was appointed by Sir George Perley, the High Commission for Canada, to have charge of the Canadian Investigation Office in London, England, an office which was continued for several years following the war, and which, under Captain Pickup's direction, rendered a most significant service to Canadian servicemen and their families in the period of demobilizaton and repatriation.

Mr. Pickup's ministry therefore has been of an unusually rich and varied character, a ministry moreover of unusual demands both of mind and heart, just because of its many-sided character. As those who knew him best will most readily testify, he met all these demands in worthy fashion, with credit to himself and to the Church which he served. With quiet self-effacing efficiency, with firm faith and strong courage, albeit with true Christian sympathy and kindly human understanding, he has proved himself, in all the varied types of his ministry, a workman needing not to be ashamed; and the Synod would give thanks to God on every remembrance of him. He rests from his labours, and his works do follow him.

To his widow and family the Synod extends its warmest sympathy.

#### REV. EDWIN E. PRESTON, B.D.

The whole community of Vankleek Hill and district was saddened by the passing, in a Montreal hospital on May 19, 1962, of Rev. Edwin E. Preston, B.D., formerly minister of Knox Church.

Mr. Preston was born in London, England, and came to Canada in 1907. He graduated from Toronto Bible College in 1910, and pursued his theological studies at Louisville Presbyterian Seminary, Kentucky, from which he received the degree of B.D. He was ordained in 1913, and his experience included mission work among the Indians in Casper, Wyoming, and some time in the Canadian West.

He was on war service overseas from 1916 to 1919, enlisting first in the Canadian Contingent and later transferring to the Imperial Army, his branch of service being the Machine Gun Corps. In the course of his war service he was severely wounded.

He was minister of the Presbyterian Church in Almonte, Ont., from 1925 to 1927, when he was called to Vankleek Hill. There he carried on a happy and

highly successful ministry for over 22 years. In 1948 he was granted leave of absence in view of impaired health, and the following year he submitted his resignation from the active pastorate, the affectionate regard of his congregation being manifested by their insistence that he continue as minister emeritus. By authority of the General Assembly his name was retained on the constituent roll of Presbytery.

Mr. Preston was an earnest and convincing preacher, a devoted partor and friend to his people, and even after his retirement a faithful member of Presbytery. He had many times acted as interim moderator of neighbouring charges which were without a minister, and for many years served as Missions Convener of Presbytery.

The funeral was held in Knox Church under the auspices of the Presbytery of Glengarry. The Moderator, Rev. Iver D. MacIver, conducted the service, and Professor D. N. MacMillan, Montreal, formerly of Kenyon Church, Dunvegan, gave the address and paid tribute to the long and faithful ministry of Mr. Preston. Dr. W. Lloyd MacLellan, Cornwall, and Dr. Robertson Millar, Clerk of Presbytery, took part in the service.

Mr. Preston was twice married. His first wife, the former Miss Susanna Mary Allan, died in 1954. In 1957 he married Miss Agnes Lowry, of Almonte, by whom he is survived. Also surviving are two daughters, Mrs. Howard MacDonald (Gladys), Vankleek Hill, and Mrs. John Webster (Pearl), Dorval, Quebec.

#### REV. T. DeCOURCY RAYNER

The Reverend T. DeCourcy Rayner died on September 16th, 1961, in Ottawa, where he had lived since his retirement from the active ministry of the Church in 1959.

Mr. Rayner's ministry, for the most part, was carried on in congregations beyond the bounds of the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa. For some years however, he was minister of St. Andrew's Church, Lachine, during the earlier

years in the history of that congregation; and later he held the pastoral charge of Almonte, in the Presbytery of Lanark and Renfrew. By the older members of these congregations, as well as by the senior members of the Presbyteries in which they are situated, he is still remembered as a faithful, diligent pastor and preacher, a kindly, courteous Christian gentlemen, a trusted friend, and a loyal and conscientious presbyter.

In the intervening years, Mr. Rayner has held several pastorates, including New Carlisle, Quebec, and Dalhousie, New Brunswick—also Markham and Gravenhurst in the Province of Ontario and within the bounds of the Synod of Toronto and Kingston. In all of these congregations, Mr. Rayner's many gifts and graces, and his earnest concern for his people's highest welfare, have won him many warm friends, who will deeply mourn his passing.

The Synod desires to express and place on record its sorrow and sense of loss in the death of this well-loved minister of the Church, and its sympathy with the members of his family in their bereavement.

#### SYNOD OF TORONTO AND KINGSTON

#### REV. K. C. ALLARD

Rev. K. C. Allard passed away at Toronto on Friday, 9th February, 1962, aged 48 years. Born in Maine, educated in New Glasgow, N.S. and in Toronto,

Mr. Allard graduated in Arts from Acadia University and in Theology from Presbyterian College, Montreal. He served our Church at Penticton, B.C. and St. John, N.B. Mr. Allard served as an army Chaplain in World War II. Since the war he has been engaged as a writer and creative artist.

Mr. Allard is survived by his widow, Mrs. Maude Baker Allard, and his mother, Mrs. Minnie Allard, New Glasgow, N.S.

The funeral service from St. Andrew's Church, Toronto, was conducted by Revs. J. C. P. Stirling and J. G. Murdock.

#### REV. WILLIAM McROBERTS, B.A., B.Th., M.Th.

The Reverend William McRoberts, B.A., B.Th., M.Th., minister of Cooke's Presbyterian Church, Toronto, passed away on Thursday, March 29th, 1962, in the 59th year of his age, and the 32nd year of his ministry.

Mr. McRoberts was born in Northern Ireland and received his early education in that country. Immigrating to the United States in 1927 he continued his studies at the Presbyterian Theological Seminary, Omaha, Nebraska, receiving the Diploma of Theology in 1930. He graduated in Arts from Parson's College, Fairfield, Iowa, in 1932. Continuing post-graduate studies at the Presbyterian Theological Seminary, Omaha, Nebraska, he received the Degree of Bachelor of Theology in 1933 and the Degree of Master of Theology in 1937.

Following his graduation, Mr. McRoberts was ordained by the Presbytery of Des Moines, Iowa, and inducted into the Presbyterian Church of Leon, Iowa, later ministering in Griswold Presbyterian Church, Iowa, until coming to Canada in 1937. He served as minister of Knox Presbyterian Church, Bobcaygeon, Ontario, for 4½ years, and Knox Presbyterian Church, Oshawa, for 3 years before coming to Cooke's Presbyterian Church, Toronto, in May, 1945.

For the past 17 years Mr. McRoberts was Pastor and Friend of young and old in this down-town congregation, serving his people with a tenacious loyalty. He always preached with conviction, and in his daily life served the standards he advocated for others. He was trusted and beloved among his fellow ministers, seeking ever the good estate of the Church.

His many commitments in his congregation still left him with the will and energy for multiplicity of Presbytery, Synodical and General Assembly tasks. He served on many committees, and in the general routine of Church life he was increasingly active.

In 1951 his fellow Presbyters honoured Mr. McRoberts by electing him to be Moderator of the Presbytery of East Toronto.

His concern, however, was never narrow ecclesiastical; his interest in public affairs was that of a good citizen.

Mr. McRoberts is survived by his wife, the former Jeannetta Burns of Iowa, a daughter, Mrs. Arthur McCullough of Toronto, and a sister, Miss May McRoberts of Liverpool, England. To these, and other members of the family circle, and to the Session and Congregation of Cooke's Presbyterian Church, the sympathy of the Presbytery is extended.

The funeral took place from Cooke's Presbyterian Church on Monday, April 2, being attended by many of his brethren and a large congregation.

The service was conducted by the Moderator of Presbytery, Rev. J. H. Marshall, and assisted by the Reverends John Forbes, John Honeyman, George Cunningham, E. Carson McLarnon and Andrew Chisholm. At the graveside the service was conducted by the Moderator of the Toronto and Kingston Synod, Reverend John Waldie, assisted by Reverends W. C. McBride and John Honeyman.

#### REV. ROBERT W. MANNING, M.A., S.T.M.

The Rev. Robert Warren Manning, M.A., S.T.M., died on May 31, 1962 at the age of 47 years. Born on a farm near Maple, Ontario, in 1914 he always showed interest in the church and its work. Deciding to enter the ministry, he attended the University of Toronto, and graduated in Honour Philosophy, taking the post-graduate degree of Master of Arts in Philosophy. He attended Knox College, graduating with honours. He then attended Union Theological Seminary, New York, from which institution he received the degree of Master of Systematic Theology. He was ordained in May 1941 and became minister of Cookstown Town Line and First Essa in the Presbytery of Barrie. In 1943 he was selected to be assistant minister at the church of St. Andrew and St. Paul, Montreal. In September 1944 he was called as minister of High Park Presbyterian Church, Toronto and served in that church for the next 18 years. During the latter part of his ministry he was stricken with muscular dystrophy, and though he carried on valiantly, he was finally unable to perform the duties of the charge and resigned on April 30, 1962. One month later he died, leaving his wife and seven children, ages three to eighteen.

Mr. Manning always gave evidence of keen intellectual ability in his pulpit ministrations and in the courts of the church. He contributed much to the discussions of Presbytery matters. At the same time, he had great warmth of heart and won for himself many friends. He took an active interest in community affairs and was for many years chaplain of the Runnymede Lions Club and of the Humber Gun Club.

The funeral service was conducted by the Moderator of the Presbytery of West Toronto, the Rev. W.J. Adamson, assisted by the Rev. J. K. Lattimore and the Rev. M. E. Burch. The service was held in High Park Church and was attended by a large number of the members of Presbytery as well as by many friends and members of High Park Church. Internment was in Maple cemetery.

#### SYNOD OF HAMILTON AND LONDON

#### REV. H. BEVERLEY KETCHEN, M.A., D.D.

When some men die, they are immediately forgotten. Not so the late sincerely lamented, and beloved, Beverley Ketchen. No minister, perhaps, ever found himself so deep in the affection of his people and city, actually of all denominations, as he, His name was a household word.

Dr. Ketchen was Canadian born (Brucefield, 1872). His ancestors came from the doughty town of Peebles, Scotland. He chose the University of Toronto for his Arts course, where he took his Master's degree, and Knox College, Toronto, where he graduated in Theology.

His ministry began with an assistantship in Peterborough, Ontario. It was a happy day for many when he was inducted into the Pastorate of MacNab Street, Hamilton, where he laboured for 41 years. When the time came that he felt he should retire, a Minister of the House of Representatives, literally, at Presbytery, on behalf of the Congregation, begged Dr. Ketchen to withdraw his resignation. It was a moving scene.

When not preaching, a greatly congenial task to him, he loved to lecture on the land of his forbears, and also enthusiastically and humorously declaimed on the poet, Robert Burns, from Winnipeg to New York. He never failed to have large audiences.

Dr. Ketchen's devotion to the Church was rewarded in 1943 by his election to the Moderatorship of the General Assembly. Two books came from his facile pen, *The Sons of Martha*, and *The Harper of the Hills*, which for literary insight and devotional quality are among the top-level of our Canadian sermons.

For a period of years, he was also widely read by the people of our church through his monthly contribution to the *Presbyterian Record* on the devotional page.

After 15 years of retirement, Dr. Ketchen died on June 9, 1961, in hospital, in Montreal. His family consisted of Maude, his wife, who died several years ago; a son, T. Beverly, of Hamilton; May, wife of J. Frank Duff, Burlington; and daughter, Dorothy, wife of Douglas Coombes, with whom he lived in retirement. He leaves 8 grandchildren and two great-great-grandchildren. John Duff, a student at Knox College, is preparing to carry on the tradition of his grandfather.

The funeral was conducted at MacNab Street Church, Hamilton, by the present minister, the Reverend D. Glenn Campbell, B.D., M.Th., the Reverend E. Powell Aitkins, B.D., M.Th., Minister of the Town of Mount Royal, Montreal, where Dr. Ketchen worshipped, and the Reverend Doctor J. B. Paulin, life-long friend of the deceased. Afterwards, the body of the beloved pastor was laid to rest in Woodlawn Cemetery, London, Ontario, the service there being conducted by the Reverend Doctor William Barclay, for many years a contemporary of Dr. Ketchen, in the Presbytery of Hamilton.

#### REV. ALBERT COOKE

A retired minister of our Church, on the Appendix to the Roll of the Presbytery of Hamilton, the Reverend Albert Cooke, died at Bobcaygeon, Ontario, on August 31, 1961. Born in England in 1871, Mr. Cooke did considerable supply work for our Church following 1925. The funeral was conducted in Hamilton by the Reverend A. Lorne MacKay. He is survived by two sons.
